## CONSTITUTION

#### Name.

Article I. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

### Messengers.

Art. II. This convention shall consist of messengers appointed by Baptist churches and associations in sympathy and in co-operation with the convention as follows: Each church shall be entitled to one messenger, and one additional for every five dollars contributed by the church to the work of our convention, in no case, however, to exceed five messengers from any church. Each district association shall be entitled to two messengers.

The following resolution was adopted, and the Secretary instructed to place it in brackets in the constitution in Art. II.: (Resolved, that it is the sense of this convention that the phrase "work of our convention," as used in Section 2 of the constitution includes all money contributed to the State Missions, Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Sunday School and Colportage Missions, Orphans' Home, Christian Education, B. Y. P. U. and Woman's Work.)

### Requirements.

Art. III. The usual requirements for membership and service in Baptist State convention and missionary organizations shall apply to this convention and there shall be no other tests.

### Objects.

Art. IV. The objects of this convention shall be to promote Missionary operations, Sunday School work, the dissemination of religious literature, the cause of Christian education and our denominational enterprises in general, and to develop our people in missionary enterprise at home and abroad.

#### Officers.

Art. V. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, two Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, who shall be Superintendent of Missions, Treasurer, Auditor and a Historical Secretary, who shall be elected by ballot annually and hold their respective offices until their successors are elected, and whose duties shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

### Board of Directors.

Art. VI. There shall be a Board of Directors consisting of the President, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer of the Convention and twenty others, who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. Seven members of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All officers of this convention, members of the Board of Directors, and the members of all Boards of Trustees and other agencies of this convention, shall be members in good standing in a Baptist church within the state. The Board shall appoint all missionaries, determine

their fields of labor and fix their salaries and the salary of the Corresponding Secretary. It shall have power to fill vacancies occurring in the office of Treasurer, auditor, Historical Secretary and Corresponding Secretary of the convention, and to fill any vacancy in the Board of Directors.

### Proceedings.

Art. VII. The proceedings of this Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretaries may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Associations, shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

### Annual Meeting.

Art. VIII. The convention shall hold its meeting annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention, with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

### Special Funds.

Art. IX. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

### Amendments.

Art. X. This Constitution may be amended by two-thirds of the members present and voting at any regular annual meeting, provided that the proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is to be taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board of Directors in its annual report and notice of same be published at least two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

## PROCEEDINGS.

Enid, Okla., Nov. 16, 1910.

Pursuant to appointment Messengers to the Fifth Annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma convened in the First Baptist Church of Enid, Oklahoma, at 10 o'clock a.m.

The devotional service was led by Dr. J. B. Gambrell, who read with comments the first chapter of Phillippians.

For Treasurer—C. W. Brewer was nominated, nominations closed, and the ballot of the Convention east by the Secretary.

For Historical Secretary-L. W. Marks was nominated, and

on vote elected, the Secretary casting the ballot.

For Auditor—Geo. E. McKinnis was nominated and elected the Secretary casting the ballot.

On introducing pastors who have come into the state within the past year, thirty-six brethren came to the platform and were introduced by the Corresponding Secretary.

Visitors recognized. Refreshing messages from Dr. J. B. Gambrell, R. H. Willingham and L. V. Barnes. Miss Crane, of the Women's Missionary Union, S. B. Convention, Mrs. Mary C. Reynolds, Home and Foreign Missionary Society, Boston, Miss Inga Petterson, Missionary to Japan, and others, whose names and work appear in the list of visitors.

S. M. Brown, of the Word and Way, was requested to sing a song, and following extension of time and announcements, he did so to the edification of all.

Program for the afternoon was read by Dr. Jones, and adopted.

Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was read by J. B. Rounds.

On motion to adopt the report of Sunday School Missionary was read by Missionary Moorer, both reports being considered. The reports were then discussed by Joe P. Jacobs, of the American Baptist Publication Society, and J. M. Frost of the Sunday School Board of the S. B. Convention. The Convention joined in singing, "Oh, to Grace, How Great a Debtor."

The reports were then adopted.

The Sunday school development of the last half century has transformed the school for Bible study in the church from a haphazzard medley into a thoroughly organized, up-to-date institution with all the scientific appliances of pedagogy. The successful Bible school must have teachers who know their Lord, His book, the pupil and himself. To the exacting duties of the day school teacher, the Bible school teacher must add a real heaven born heart culture.

To assist in qualifying teachers for their exacting duties the convention is supporting a man well qualified as a normal teacher to lead the teaching force of our Baptist hosts to success in their chosen calling and increase their usefulness and efficiency. During the year Brother Moorer's long illness has seriously impeded his progress but his report shows very gratifying results.

We recommend the continuation of the mid-winted teacher training and mission study school as conducted by the state workers assisted by the expert representatives of the Sunday School Board and the Publication Society, and that greater efforts be made to enlarge the influence of the school by touching more widely the churches of the State.

We recommend that the business gathering of the Sunday School Convention be held in connection with the mid-winter Bible School this year and that the standing committees on Sunday Schools and B. Y. P. U. for the ensuing year be requested to correspond with the pastors over the state so far as possible and report next year to the convention the concensus of opinion of the pastors and churches regarding the best methods of organization of these bodies.

### REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK BY W. D. MOORER.

It is with a sense of deep gratitude to God and to my brethren that I find myself once more able to be on my feet and with such good promise of soon being fully recovered from my serious affliction which kept me for so long confined at home. I am thankful to be able to say that, while the outlook for a while was exceedingly dark, the "uplook" came to be bright indeed with His promise and presence, and, I have not been altogether helpless and idle.

### Work on the Field,

The work was prosecuted on the field during a period of seven months with results as indicated in the tabulated report. It is needless to remind you that a report that is concerned with figures, numbers of days, miles, letters, addresses, places, etc., cannot from the very nature of the case express the things that really count, but are but the visible vehicle of the things that abide. I want to confess my joy in coming in contact with the real heart problems of the Sunday School teachers and other workers on the field and of being able in some small measure to help. On the field emphasis was placed on teacher training, adult class work, better grading, and, mission study and teaching in the Sunday school. At the same time an effort was made to gather up the results of several years study of the adolescent boy problem as it relates to the Sunday schools of Oklahoma resulting in the discovery that the object of my study had practically ceased to be a problem in either the home or the Sunday school and is working at the problem himself

on the outside assisted by the public school teacher and the county judge—the boy and society working at the problem. The need for emphasis on the subjects mentioned above seem greater now than ever before.

### Work From the Bed and Desk.

While confined at home my work was done through correspondence assisted by Rev. J. S. Henderson on the field who did splendid work in organizing normal classes. I could not attempt every line of work, therefore confined myself to teacher training by correspondence with the result that over five hundred teachers are actually engaged in the study of one of our normal courses and a number have completed the course and received the diplomas. This work has brought hundreds of letters from the field pertaining to this and other departments of the work. There seems to be a more wide-spread interest and sense of need than ever before.

#### Recommendations.

I would recommend a continuation of the State Board plan of Sunday school work, that greater attention be given to teacher training and mission study, that we hold at least once each year a state-wide training school for Sunday school and young people, workers, and that a committee be appointed with whom the Sunday School missionary may advise from time to time Sunday school matters.

I cannot but express my thanks to God for his loving kindness to the state board and many friends over the state who by kind words and deeds have made my work possible, my suffering tolerable, and recovery so sure. The field men of the Sunday school board and of the Publication Society have rendered valuable help in the work on the field.

The report on Christian and Ministerial Education was read by Carter Helm Jones, and on motion to adopt, addresses were made by Dr. Gardner and W. Y. Quisenberry of the Louisville Seminary. Dr. Love spoke in the interest of Home Missions. H. • P. Crego also spoke briefly. The report was adopted.

### REPORT.

Education is the harmonious development of every human power.

It is the growing up in all things to our highest possibility.

A Baptist is a regenerated servant of God, who has obediently acknowledged Jesus Christ as Lord by uniting with His church for the establishment of the Kingdom of God on the earth.

Hence Baptist progress means the advancement of the kingdom. The Kingdom of God is a kingdom of righteousness, justice, peace, knowl-

edge, beauty, harmony and brotherhood.

Therefore education is the first postulate of a Baptist. A Baptist demands education that he may realize himself. That he may come into his own, the heritage of yesterday; the wealth of today. That he may serve his King, and thus achieve his mission in the world.

Our educational institutions should be the expression of our faith in God and in our fellow men. They should be our voices, our cultural personalities. To shut the doors and quench the light is a crime, to fail to open the doors, to fail to light the torch would be a fatal blunder. With the terms of the great commission before us, Baptists cannot, if they would, separate education from religion. If their education be an inalienable human right, how imperative is the obligation to give to our ministry the best education possible.

Address on Foreign Mission field work by Dr. Willingham, thrilling all hearts and intensifying our interest in Foreign Missions.

On call for report on Woman's work, the report was read by Miss Sue O. Howell.

On motion to adopt, addresses were made by Mrs. Mary C. Reynolds, Miss Edith Campbell and Miss Inga Petterson, and the report was adopted.

#### Woman's Work.

To the Baptist General Convention: -

Dear Brethren:-Your committee on woman's work would respect-

fully submit the following:

Our work the past year has not been so much in taking rapid strides in advance, as it has in srengthening, fortifying and developing what has been established. Much stress has been placed upon the importance of a strong organization in each Association, through which the local societies can be more readily reached, and more effectively strengthened.

We have had no regular field worker during the year. Mrs. A. F. Wasson was employed three and one-half months during the summer, and our Training School students, Miss Gray and Miss Purviance did very acceptable service during vacation. These workers, together with the Cor. Sec., represented our work in 26 associations, and we are deeply

grateful for the splendid hearing and the hearty support which we have everywhere received.

Statistics of the work will be given fully in our own minutes, so that we need not present them here. We regret to report that of the \$6,500 apportionment we hoped to raise, only \$5,033 has been received, and yet we believe our women have been loyal to the work. In many of the weaker churches conditions have been such that the women's society has borne a large part of the financial burden and have written that it seemed impossible this year to give their apportionment. This we cannot deplore, knowing as we do that to strengthen and establish the work at home means the ability in years to come to do a greater work in the uttermost parts of the world, and yet we urge the great importance of women's work for women and children, and ask that it may have its just proportion in the work of the church.

Many of our Associational Presidents have received valuable help from District and Association Missionaries. The majority of the pastors are giving us their hearty co-operation, and this means much towards making our organization effective in fulfilling the purpose for which it works. Year after year God's call comes louder and stronger to the women of Oklahoma, as well as of other states, to do the work which He has given them to do. We want our organization to do only that which will best promote and strengthen and help in every department of the work of the church as a whole. Our motto, Fellow Helper to the

Truth is ever before us.

We ask your continued and increasing co-operation. We need the help of the pastors to make our work serve the largest purpose in the extension of the Kingdom of God, and so we exhort you in the words of Paul, "Help those women who labor with you in the Gospel."

The Annual Report of the Board of Directors and the report of the Corresponding Secretary were read by Bro. Stalcup, announcement having been made of a deficit in State Mission Funds approximating \$3,500.00.

During the reading of that part of the report referring to Indian Missions Bro. Stalcup paused to announce the serious illness of Superintendent of Indian Missions, A. G. Washburn, and upon vote of the Convention a message of greeting and sympathy was ordered sent to our brother by the Secretary.

On motion to adopt the reports, announcements were made and the Convention adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock Thursday morning. Prayer by G. M. Harrell.

### REPORT OF EECUTIVE BOARD-1910.

With gratitude in our hearts and with praises on our lips, to Him who has redeemed us and so lavishly blessed our labors and the laborers during the past year, we again greet you in Convention and bring you our annual report.

At the close of the Convention last year at Chickasha, the Board organized by electing Rev. C. H. Jones president, and Rev. W. P. Blake Recording Secretary and then adjourned to meet in Oklahoma City, November 18th, to consider the making of appointments and the transaction of other business.

At this meeting, after much thoughful consideration, the same general plan of work for the ensuing year was agreed upon and the work planned on a basis of \$42,000 for State Missions. Of this amount each of the co-operating boards agreed to give \$8,000 with the understanding that we should ask the churches to raise the balance of \$26,000. It was also further agreed that these two boards should give us \$3,000 each for Church Edifice Work and make such loans as they might be able and willing to make as occasion required throughout the year.

Before any appropriations were made, much serious thought was given to the matter of the General Policy of the Board for the year, further reference to which will be made under the head of Evangelism.

The two Foreign Boards were again asked to contribute to the salary of the office secretary, to which they cheerfully agreed, each paying \$200, the balance being charged to our co-operative work.

A detailed list of appointments and appropriations, showing the precise disposition of all money coming into our hands, is attached and made part of this report. From this it will be noted that the total appropriations exceed the \$42,000 limit but resignations and reversions therefrom, bring it within the limit at the beginning of the year.

In planning and directing the work of the Convention, it has been done with two important things before us—Evangelism and Development for service; to this end, the matter of getting all of our churches supplied with capable constructive pastors, who will cement their forces together and develop them along all lines of Christian activity, has come in for a large share of consideration and attention by the Board, when making appointments and appropriations. In the opinion of your Board this policy is worthy of serious thought by the Convention and the new Board. I may add also that ultimate self-support at the earliest possible time, consistent with duty to the entire work of the church has been kept in mind when making appropriations.

### District Associations.

We have sought to place District Associational Missions on a more

effective basis by making appropriations to supplement the salaries of the men employed and encouraging them to employ the most capable men available. Twenty associations have been helped this year and where the associations employ capable men, we believe this policy should be continued by the new Board. We suggest, however, that where it is done, the Associational Missionary thus helped by the State Board should join most heartily in the final campaign for State Missions during the months of September and October, as several have done during the past campaign; such a policy has a tendency to the development of an associational spirit and also brings our State Convention work and the associational work into closer fellowship. At this point, our Board wishes to suggest the great importance of universal observance of the schedule by all of our workers throughout the state. A disregard of it, by any material number tends toward defeat, if not disaster.

### Church Edifice.

Compared with the amount of money and energy invested in this department of our work, it is one of the most important and far reaching. With the building of ample and adequate meeting houses, our work takes

on a permanency that nothing else can give to it.

This year, we have aided 32 churches in building houses; few, if any of them would have been built but for the timely help and encouragement which we have been able to give through the kindness and generosity of the two co-operating boards. Many of these houses have been built at a great sacrifice by the churches even with the help given but they will stand as monuments, in time to come, to the wisdom and efficiency of our plans of co-operation. A good motto for our Convention and our future Boards, would be, "A strong, self-supporting church with adequate house, manned by a capable consecrated, constructive pastor, in every town and community within the limits of our state.

### Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Work.

These two departments of our work may well be called the "recruiting and training departments of our army." Our people are beginning to put a proper estimate upon this work and our churches are realizing more and more that Teaching, which is a part of training, is as much the work of the church in its organized capacity as is preaching or Baptizing. We are learning that the denomination of today, that will be wise enough to gather in and properly train and develope the children and young people, will occupy the first place in the religious world of tomorrow. The Board, believing this to be true has placed a competent man at the head of each of these departments, in the person of W. D. Moorer and E. E. Ford and given them and their departments the same consideration and encouragement that has been given to other important phases of our work. As these two departments are so closely allied these two brethren have been helpful to each other in holding Institutes. Teacher Training and Mission Study Classes over the state. In the opinion of your Board, looking to the future of the Kingdom, this is a most fruitful field for the investment of missionary endeavor and should be given sympathetic and hearty co-operation by the Convention and future Boards.

In this connection, we beg to make grateful mention of the timely and substantial aid given us in helping to carry on this work by the Publication Society of Philadelphia and the S. S. Board of Nashville, in making a donation of \$500 in cash each to this work as well as the friendly and sympathetic assistance rendered to our leaders in this work by the field men of these two Boards.

### Evangelism,

At the first regular meeting of the Board much time and consideration was given to the work of General Evangelists and the special work of general missionaries; our attention having been called especially to this by the action of the Convention on the report of State Missions. The final outcome was, that only one general evangelist was employed for the year, with the intention at that time of increasing the number of District Missionaries to do general mission work in important and needy fields where the District Associations were not strong enough to supply that need. On account of the unusual number of applications for help from the churches and District Associations which called for the appropriation of so large a portion of the funds at our disposal, the Board could not see its way clear to appoint as many district men as were actually needed. This policy was decided upon, first, because it was understood to be the expressed will of the Convention; second, because it was believed that such a policy would reach and help develop a larger number of weak churches than heretofore, we had been able to reach in any other way. We are of the opinion that to reach and enlist and develope the smaller churches in all of the work of the denomination is a work greatly needed and will bring large returns to the Kingdom, looking to the future and permanency of the work.

### Our Indian Work.

Under the leadership of Brother A. G. Washburn this work has made substantial progress. The Indian Missionaries and pastors are becoming more deeply and intelligently interested in the work. This has been more manifest this year in their offerings for Missions, more churches contributing and giving larger sums than ever before. This being a department of our work upon which a separate report will be made, both by Brother Washburn, Superintendent of the work and the standing Committee on Indian Work, it need not be discussed further in our report.

#### Woman's Work.

We are pleased to note the increased interest and efficiency of the work done by our women; and the further fact that a larger number of our pastors are encouraging them and co-operating with them in their special work; and that these same women are not slackening nor abating their interest in the larger work of the church.

We desire to make special mention of two things in their work which is well worthy of the thoughtful consideration and emulation of all, namely, their regular systematic study of Missions and their regular systematic and liberal giving to all phases of our work. A regular systematic study of Missions by our men not only as taught in the Word of God, but of what is actually taking place on the field through the denominational press, will greatly facilitate the coming of the Kingdom and the spread of the Gospel both at home and abroad.

### Christian Education, Orphans' Home and Baptist Hospital Work.

These three important departments of our work being under the control and management of separate Board, need have no special mention in this report, further than to announce our deep and abiding interest in all and to add that in the management of the work entrusted to us, we have tried to administer it with due reference to all of these departments, seeking to make State Missions the basis and foundation of each and to encourage all of the employes of the Board to give help to each at the proper schedule time.

### Work in the Mining District.

The quarterly and annual reports of Brother Rounds, our missionary to the Mining Districts, show very gratifying and encouraging results concerning this work. In this district, where such a large per cent of the population are foreigners, most of whom cannot even speak our language, but who greatly need the gospel, they form one of the many grave problems which confront our churchs in these districts. These problems are too large for the churches, locally, and consequently should receive generous aid by this Convention. Brother Rounds is getting the work well in hand, and the influence of his work is being felt by the churches in this district. We bespeak for him, or whoever may have charge of this work from time to time the cordial and sympathetic support of the pastors and churches in that part of the State, as well as the continued generous help of this Convention.

### Home and Foreign Missions.

These two departments of our work are so inseparable that they are considered as one in this report. It is a pleasure to report that our churches are making substantial progress in these lines of activity, and in a measure it is expressed by the liberal advance in their offerings. For the year ending April, 1909, \$5,333 was given for Home Missions, and for the year ending April, 1910, \$6,387, being an increase of 20 per cent. For the year ending April, 1909, \$5,263 for Foreign Missions, and for the year ending April, 1910, \$6,613, an increase of 25 per cent.

The policy of making the office of our Superintendent of Missions headquarters for the distribution of Home and Foreign Mission literature, agreed upon by the Secretary and the Secretaries of the iour co-operating Boards, and the pratcice of urging all churches to send their efferings for these two objects through the same channel, in order to have a record at home of all that is done by our churches, appears to be in harmony with our general policy of work and in the interest of economy and efficiency and should be encouraged in the future. In view of the importance and magnitude of this work and of the vital relation our churches hear to it, we suggest that this Convention recommend to the churches an advance of 25 per cent in their offering for the coming year, and that the matter of an equitable apportionment of the amounts to be raised be referred to an apportionment committee, which we hope this Convention will authorize the new Board to appoint.

#### Our Helpers.

Again, publicly, we desire to make acknowledgment of the continued generous help given us in the prosecution of our work by the Home Mission Society and the Home Board. They have stood loyally by us through our days of numerical and financial weakness and have been strong factors in planting and developing Baptist interest in the two territories, which now form our beloved state of Oklahoma.

As long as gratitude and appreciation are characteristics of our people, so long will this magnificent and enduring service be remembered and be an incentive to us to listen to the calls for help that come from these Boards, as they undertake to meet and solve the problems that confront our citizenship, and which are peculiarly Home Mission problems.

#### Baptist Newspapers.

While these great denominational agencies are receiving more liberal and generous consideration than formerly, we have not yet given to

them the place in our Convention work and that generous support which their important demands. In the past they have been in this state and elsewhere tremendous factors in the achievement of the past, and if we will give to them their rightful place in our work and that sympathetic and generous support to which they are entitled, they will be still greater factors than they have been. While we wish to make grateful mention of the valuable help rendered to us by all of the good constructive papers which are published out of the state, but which have a large circulation in it, we desire, in this report, not only to make grateful reference to the valuable service rendered by the Baptist Oklahoman and its editor, but to commend them to the brethren of the state generally and to urge them to subscribe for the paper and to write for its columns and to read it and, and, last, but not least, to pay for it, and thus help to make it a real necessity in every Baptist home in the state.

### Summary.

We have had in our employ this year for part or all of the year 203 persons, viz: Ten evangelists and general missionaries, nine full-blood Indian missionaries, 20 district associational missionaries, two women workers and 162 pastors. The reports of these workers show:

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF J. C. STALCUP.-1910.

Wright, I. S. \_\_\_\_\_High Hill \_\_\_\_

With a deep sense of gratitude in my heart to God for His Grace and Blessings upon me, during the year; and to all of the Pastors and other workers, who have so faithfully followed my leadership, making the achievements of the past year possible, I greet you in the name of our risen Lord and bring to you my annual report.

The year just closed has been one of hard work and rich experiences to me. In the main, the work has been conducted along the same general lines as in former years. I have sought to carry out the will of the Convention, as I understood the same to be, and as it has been interpreted to me by your Executive Board.

Believing, as I do, that the church is to be the center, and the pastor the leader of all New Testament evangelism and missionary endeavor, I have tried, in all of my work, to magnify the church and dignify the work of our pastors.

At the time of writing this report Nov. 11, we are confronted with a deficit of more than \$7,000; but I have before me a list of ten of our larger churches who, up to this late hour have not sent in their offerings; several have wired what to expect, while a few have given me no information at all upon the subject. I am confidently expecting, however, that out of their loyalty to the work of the Convention, that each and every one of them will yet respond with an offering by the time we meet in Convention. These delays in reporting and sending offerings not only greatly increase the work and burden of the office but make it well night impossible to have the books and reports ready to submit to the Convention. If we could all remember that our Convention year closes with the 31st of October and not with the meeting of the Convention and send these reports and offerings in at that time, it would give to the Superintendent of Missions, and Treasurer time to close the books and have accounts audited and annual reports printed and ready for distribution and consideration by the Convention when in session.

During the year, I have counseled with many churches about the important matter of calling pastors—rendering to them such meagre assistance as I could, urging upon them the importance of securing capable, consecrated and constructive pastors and paying to them adequate salaries. Unless our churches shall realize the importance of paying living salaries, at least as much as is paid to pastors for similar service in other states, we cannot hope to obtain and retain the most competent men; and as a result our entire work will suffer irreparable loss.

A vigorous campaign was made for Home and Foreign Missions in

February, March and April with very satisfactory results as will appear from the report of the Executive Board\_ aid was given to other objects as they appeared upon our Schedule and a most strenuous campaign waged for State Missions during the months of September and October. I have sought to make each of these Campaigns educational inspirational and effective. Organization and Enlistment have again been our watchwords. I have tried to organize the forces, which are already interested in the work, with the intention of enlisting and utilizing the churches and individuals which in the past have done little or nothing for the work of the Kingdom. I consider this one of the superlative tasks confronting us. We will never take our rightful place in the front ranks of the conquering forces of God, in the world wide evangelization until we solve this problem. I have undertaken to assist the pastor in the solution of this problem, by the appointment of a missionary committee in each association, and have been urging upon pastors the appointment of a like committee in each church, taking for our Motto, "An offering from each church and as nearly as possible from each member of each church in this state for each phase of our work, during the year." This plan has worked well where it was well worked. Wherever one of these associational committees took the appointment seriously and worked at the problem faithfully, the results have fully justified the wisdom of the plan and compensated for the energy expended. I am encouraged to believe that if this plan of organization is continued and faithfully observed for two or three years longer, its power for good will be felt and seen, both in the local and general work of all of our churches.

#### A WORD ABOUT OFFICE DETAILS.

Your secretary and the secretaries of the two co-operating Home Boards have had under consideration for two or three years, some important changes in the details of office work, which have been consumated this year. Under the new management, each of these two Home Boards send to my office, at the end of each quarter, a draft for one-fourth of the entire amount, which they have promised to pay during the year and which is credited to them and turned over to our Treasurer to be used by him, with the funds received from churches, in the payment of our workers, instead of each Board mailing to each one of our workers a separate check for their part of the amount due. On account of this change, it is no longer necessary for applications for help from our joint fund and quarterly reports by our workers to be made in triplicate; but a single application and report is sent to our office and the data and information, which the other Boards desire, is furnished to them by your secretary from time to time. This change in procedure has been appreciated by our workers and relieves the offices of the two Home Boards of much detail without increasing the work of my office.

In harmony with our general plans of co-operation and by agreement of your Secretary and the Secretaries of the other Boards both Home and Foreign, the office of the Superintendent of Missions of this State was made the general headquarters for the distribution of Home and Foreign Mission Literature in the interest of Missions without regard to its source. During the schedule period for this work, large quantities of literature were distributed, which I am sure proved a real blessing to the work and resulted in larger offerings from the Churches.

As in other years, churches have been urged to send offerings for both objects to my office, and then disbursed as directed by the church or individual sending it. All funds not designated were divided equally between the Boards of the two Conventions. This plan was adopted in the interest of harmony, economy and efficiency and seems to have given general satisfaction. There were a few churches, however, which sent their offerings direct to the Boards, which will account for the difference in amount reported upon our books and those of the other Boards.

Attached, will be found a financial statement showing the source and amount of all money coming into my hands and its disposition. On account of the delays referred to above, it has not been possible for me to have this account audited but will have it done before it appears in the minutes.

In concluding this report, I wish to publicly express the deep gratitude of my heart to the members of the executive Board with whom, it has been such a pleasure to work; and to the pastors and all other workers, who have been so faithful and uniformly courteous to me throughout the entire year. May God's richest blessing continue to abide upon each and every one of you.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE OKLAHOMA STATE BAPTIST UNIVERSITY.

Dear Bretheran: We beg to submit for your consideration our Annual Report. We think it well to recount briefly the work of our Convention in seeking to establish a central school of higher education in our beloved state.

The Indian Territory and Oklahoma Territory conventions were consolidated at Shawnee in 1906. On page 18 of the minutes of the first annual meeting of our consolidated convention, you will find the following report on Christian Education:

"We, your committee on Christian Education, beg to submit for your consideration the following report:

Whereas, recognizing the great value of Baptist institutions to the denomination itself, and to the cause of the kingdom of our Lord, we recommend that, while acknowledging the great good that is being accomplished by our public schools, and our secular schools, we give the most hearty support and co-operation and the prayers of our people for the Baptist schools now located in the bounds of our State.

"Furthermore, we recommend that the peculair conditions under which our schools now labor, with regard to constituency and support to be recognized, and that out of justice to their welfare and their future development a commission be constituted whose duty it shall be to study carefully and impartially, existing educational conditions as they effect our denominational interests. This commission be empowered to make any special provision for urgent needs of our schools during the ensuing year.

"This commission shall report to this convention one year hence, the result of their work, and recommend such measures as they may deem for the best interests of Christian education."

The commission was appointed and made a report at the second annual meeting at Ardmore. The following part of the report refers specificially to the proposed University:

"We find that our present school equipment is wholly insufficient to meet the demands of the denomination, for the reason that upon investigation we find that there are more than 700 Baptist young men and women (upon a conservative estimate) who are receiving their higher education in our state schools other than denominational schools. believe that our denomination must arise and meet the crying need of our denominational life by the provision of the education of our children that they may be able to take their places in the responsible positions before them in all phases of our social, political and govenr-Your commission in view of these facts, took into conmental life. sideration the question of the advisability of the establishment of a new institution of higher education and passed the following resolution by "That it is the sense of this Commission that as unanimous vote: soon as practicable a new Baptist University be established."

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at this session: Resolved, that this convention at its present session, nominate and

elect a Board of eleven Trustees, who shall form a corporation under the name of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University, the members of which said board of Trustees shall each be a member in good standing of a Baptist Church within the State of Oklahoma, and said Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to acquire title to lands and other property and to consummate the matter of locating the proposed University and to carry out the expressed will of this Convention as near as possible and practicable. That said Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to take such steps as may be necessary to erect same or prepare suitable buildings for the starting and maintaining a school as outlined in the report of the Educational Commission heretofore made and adopted.

That said Board of Trustees provide in the articles of incorporation used in procuring charter, that their successors shall be elected by this Convention at its regular annual meeting.

That the said Board of Trustees and their successors make annual report of its work to this Convention.

It will be seen by the resolution that the matter of establishing the University was given to the Board of Trustees, with power to launch the enterprise. This new Board did good and faithful work trying to solve the problem; spending their own time and money and doing much hard work. Their annual report made to the Convention at Muskogee is a great document and worthy of a place in the valuts of our historical society.

During this session of the Convention the following was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, it is the expressed purpose and desire of this Convention to establish and maintain, at some suitable place within the State of Oklahoma, a Baptist University worthy of the name; and;

Whereas, the needs of such an institution are many and pressing; be it therefore Resolved, that we, the authorized representatives of the Baptists General Convention of Oklahoma, in annual session assembled, in full confidence of the hearty support of the churches of the state and of the denomination at large, hereby pledge and agree to raise within a reasonable time, to be fixed and agreed upon by the committee in charge of the location of said University, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, provided said committee can secure such additional aid in the way of bonus and of an endowment which in the judgment of the committee will be sufficient.

The report for last year can be found in our last annual report. Thus it will be seen that the matter of establishing the Oklahoma Baptist University has been very promintently before our Convention ever since our consolidation five years ago. These years of preliminary work have not been spent in vain but was necessary in clearing away the brush and planning for a forward educational movement, meaning so much to our churches. Your present Board had held several meetings during this year. The University has been located at Shawnee. One of the interesting and valuable co-incidents of these five years of preliminary work is the fact that is was at Shawnee that our Conventions were merged into one, five years ago and after these years we return to the same place and locate our University.

#### SHAWNEE.

The city of Shawnee occupies a unique place in the history of our state. It was neither in the old Indian territory nor Oklahoma territory;

it is located in what was the Pottawatomie Nation, and came in at the second opening. Therefore, it is not only centrally located but is a place where all our forces can easily unite.

#### THE BONUS.

The city of Shawnee, through its development Company, gave to the Denomination Sixty acres of Land worth One Thousand Dollars per acre, and a cash bonus of One Hundred Thousand Dollars. The deeds and abstracts of the land are now in the custody of the treasurer of the University. The title to the real estate has been found to be perfect so that we now have a clear title in fee simple. The cash bonus is being paid in accordance with the terms of our contract with the Shanwnee Development Company. Twenty Thousand Dollars having already been placed to our credit, which gives us a cash balance of unused unds of several Thousand Dollars at the present time. There is every reason to believe that the balance of the bonus will be paid promptly in accordance with the terms of the contract.

The city of Shawnee has also paid a bonus of Ten Thousand Dollars to the Electric Street Railway Company to extend its car line to the University campus. This line is now being built,

#### THE CHARTER.

The legal incorporation of this University is a matter of great importance. It is a difficult thing to define legally the relation that should subsist between the University and the denomination, so as to give to the School on the one hand sufficient freedom to do its large and complicated works, and on the other hand that denomination control so desirable and necessary.

The situation in Oklahoma, educationally and religiously has made it difficult to copy in detail the methods of our older states. It was needful to traverse new paths and blaze our way into new educational methods. When our older Institutions of learning were founded the churches were poor and the denomination unable to assume their management and as a consequence the control was vested in self perpetua tion boards of trustees. In the present instance we find that the consciousness of power in our churches is such that the convention may safely be called upon to take the initiative in their educational movement and to assume such control as it may in its wisdom, deem advisable. Our charter has been drawn to meet these conditions and to embody these ideals. We believe not only in Christian education but in Baptist Christian education. Therefore your Board has sought to make such a charter as would forever set at rest this matter.

The statutes of our State are very liberal in regard to Religious corporations. Our charter provides for absolute control by the Convention.

## DEVELOPMENT OF THE PLANS.

On Feb. 28, 1910, the Board elected W. P. Blake, W. S. Wiley, E. A. Wesson, J. A. Scott, and George E. McKinnis, with instructions to adopt plans, employ an architect and let the contract for the erection of the Administation building. W. S. Wiley was elected Educational Secretary, whose report is hereto attached. Chas. H. Sudhoelter & Co. of Muskogee, were employed as architects.

On the 3rd day of June, 1910, the plans for the Administration building were accepted and the committee entered into contract with C. E. Higgins and C. R. Furnas, contractors and builders of Shawnes,

for the erection of the Administration building to cost \$94,660.00. Exclusive of the architects fees, the heating, lighting and furnishing.

The construction is fire proof, reinforced concrete, Carthage Stone trimming, brick facing, tilled corridors and vestibules and absolutely sanitary. When fully equipped and furnished will cost \$140,000.09.

## THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

The work of the Educational Secretary on account of prevailing conditions was not to go into the fields or solicit money in a general way but rather to place the matter on the hearts of our people by personal means. However, there has come to his hands in cash and pledges, \$3000.00. The details of this financial work will be found in the report of the secretary attached hereto.

W. P. Blake was employed jointly by the Board and Chas. H. Sudheolter, at a salary of \$125 per month, to have the supervision over the erection of the building; of which salary the Board was to pay \$25 and Mr. Sudhoelter was to pay \$100.

In concluding this report we desire to say, that a general correlation system of Baptist Schools in Oklahoma is essential to the success of the denomination. Such a system would be incomplete without a University at its head. It is the further desire of this Board that the powers of the educational commission be so defined that the Trustees of the University may co-operate with them in the general supervision of the University. We are pleased to note that the contributions to the current expenses have come from thirty counties and that our people over the entire State are in hearty accord and sympathy with this great movement and that the outlook for buildind and endowing the University is very promising. This outlook is an appeal to every Baptist in the State to heroic assistance in the building of a great Baptist School system for our people.

The report of the Educational Commission was read by A. N. Hall, and on motion to adopt, the time having expired, a motion carried placing the address of D. W. T. Elmore on Foreign Missions for this evening at 7:30.

E. D. Cameron and W. J. Caudill spoke to the report of Educational Commission, and the report was adopted.

## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION.

The Educational Commission begs leave to make the following report:

The members of the Commission were not advised of their appointment until several months after the Chickasha Convention and were uncertain in regard to their duties and powers. The instructions given the first commission were not definite or specific.

At a meeting of the Commission, held in White Temple, Oklahoma City, A. N. Hall was elected chairman and J. B. Rounds, secretary. The representatives of the several Baptist educational interests were invited and a number were present. After a free and full discussion of the interests involved, the following report was adopted:

- 1. We are convinced of the sad fact that enough time and money have been wasted in other states by our denomination in ill-advised educational endeavor to lead us to unite, harmonize and direct our forces in such a way as to avoid a repetition of the same blunders.
- 2. It is the sense of the Commission that the time is ripe for Oklahoma Baptists to begin to lay plans for a system of correlated schools under the direction and control of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. We recognize that this cannot be done in a day. The ideal arrangement toward which we should be working is to ultimately plant academies in each section of the state, which will prepare our boys and girls, under Baptist influences to go to our colleges and furnish material for the Baptist University which we are soon to have. In order to do this the Convention, through its Educational Commission, should arrange and adopt a uniform curriculum for all the adademies and colleges. This curriculum should be in harmony with accredited standards.
- 3. It is deemed wise by the Commission to take up with the Aemerican Baptist Home Mission Society the matter of conserving Bacone College for the Baptists of Oklahoma. The chairman is authorized to correspond with them with the view of establishing some relationship between that school and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
- 4. The Commission invites the Trustees of the school at Hastings to correspond with them relative to placing that school under the control of the Convention.
- 5. The information furnished by the Trustees of Oklahoma State Baptist University is very encourageing. Plans and arrangements are being completed for the erection of buildings. This enterprise is worthy of the confidence and should receive the support of the denomination.
- 6. We recommed to the brotherhood of the state the campaign for \$50,000 for the buildings to be begun at once on the campus of the Oklahoma State Baptist College at Blackwell. The plan presented by President Moore and his Trustees to raise this by \$1.00 subscriptions from Fifty Thousand Baptists, or their friends is heartily endorsed.

The chairman of the Commission under above instructions communicated with the American Baptist Home Mission Society in regard to Bacone College, or Indian University. It seems to be the desire of the society to continue that school under its present control and policy. We heartily commend Bacone and bespeak for it the sympathy and support of the denomination. We express our appreciation and thanks to the society for this work.

The President of the school located at Hastings is present in this Convention, desiring to have his school placed under the control of the Convention and correlated with our other denominational schools. We request that he be heard.

There is now before the Commission a proposition from the city of Hobart looking toward the establishment of a Baptist school at that point.

In view of the present conditions and future necessities we recommend that an Educational Commission of nine members be appointed by this Convention and that they be instructed and empowered to correlate the schools under the control of the Convention; That they further be empowered to confer with cities or communities in regard to the establishment of academies as above suggested, no academies to be located except by the approval of the Convention; That they also

be empowered to employ an Educational Secretary who shall be the representative of the educational interests of the state, define his duties, arrange his salary, and designate where his headquarters are to be located.

Signed, A. N. Hall, J. B. Rounds, W. A. Caudill, for Committee.

On motion, voted that the Committee on Order of busiess be in structed to assign in our meeting a year hence, a full half day to the consideration of our Educational interests.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BAPTIST HOSPITALS AND SANITARIUMS.

Your committee begs leave to submit the following report: It is within the memory of many in this convention that Baptists began their work along this line. Today the eyes of our people are being opened to the necessity and possibility of this service. It is well for us that as our people grow numerically and financially that new enterprises shall be launched to enlist their interests and utilize their resources.

The report of the Board of Directors of our Oklahoma Baptist Hospital shows a year of splendid service and success that should be gratifying to our people and lead them to rally to the support of that institution. That a new hospital, with limited facilities, in a new country, in the first year of its operation, should minister to so many patients, give so much in gratuitous service, and yet more than pay its own way, is little short of marvelous and we think makes a new record in Baptist hospital work. Caution and care need to be exercised lest the success of this institution shall encourage unwise efforts and enterprises along this line. The founding and operating of a hospital makes possible either a great success or a great failure. If these institutions can be located in great centers of population where they will receive professional, financial and moral support they should be encouraged.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS OKLAHOMA BAPTIST HOSPITAL.

With gratitude and joy we come to make our annual report to the Convention. Our hospital had been in operation only eighty days when we made our report last year to the Chickasha Convention. This is therefore our first report of a full year of hospital service.

## TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

During the year Miss Lenora Linderme and Miss Ella Hoover completed their course of training and received diplomas as Graduate Nurses. They had received previous training in other hospital training schools and completed their course in our institution. There are now in training seven pupil nurses, four of whom are our own Oklahoma Baptist girls.

These receive their support and training in return for their services and are no expense either to their parents or to the denomination.

#### NURSES' HOME.

We had hoped, during the year, to build a home for our nurses but as our people over the state were burdened with other denominational interest, only \$438.00 of the \$1700.00 pledged to this enterprise at Chickasha convention has been paid. The building must wait until these pledges are collected or some provision is made to raise the additional amount that is needed. Our hospital room was all needed for patients and our nurses needed a home apart from the hospital building. We were compelled to rent a cottage at an expense of \$37.50 per month. This added materially to our operating expenses and reduced our net profit by that amount. In this rented building we have a home for our nurses with the comfort, convenience and refinement of a Christian home. Miss M. Ellen Cheek, the superintendent of the hospital, is the superintendent of this home. Under her direction our pupil nurses are being trained for efficient service and inspired with high ideals of life.

#### OUR PRESSING NEED.

The first is the building of the Nurses' Home that we may save more than \$400 we are paying annually for rent. This could be done easily without burdening any one if our people all over the state would give us their co-operation.

#### PATIENTS.

At the beginning of this conventional year, November 1st, 1909, there were 12 patients in our hospital. We have received during the year 327 and discharged 306. There were 19 deaths and 24 births during the year. We have had 196 surgical cases. Gratuitous service was given 14 patients, the value of which was \$401.89. There are now in the hospital 14 patients.

#### RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES.

The reports of Superintendent show that \$11,253.79 was received from patients, \$2,931.58 paid for saalries of hospital employees, \$6,204.06 paid for provisions and supplies, making the total operating expenses \$9,135.64. The net profit of operation was \$2,118.15. By the terms of the charter this profit belongs to the institution and has been used in paying interest, paying taxes, insurance and for fixtures and furnishings.

#### RECEIPTS FROM GIFTS AND DONATIONS.

The report of our Treasurer shows that \$976.25 was paid on pledges to our Building Fund and \$438.00 to our Nurses' Home fund. The latter may only be used for the building of a home for our Nurses.

Our hospital building is constantly crowded with patients. At times it has been necessary to use the reception room for patients and at others we have been compelled to turn patients away for lack of room. Often there are patients who must wait until others are discharged before they can be admitted. If we had \$20,000 with which to build the second wing of our hospital building our ministry to the sick and suffering could be doubled within a year. How or when, from where or from whom this is to come we do not now know, but that it will come we do not doubt.

With the building of a Nurses' Home and the enlargement of the Hospital we shall have an institution that will enlarge our opportunities for service and enlist the sympathies of all good people.

On invitation, S. M. Brown, of the Word and Way, addressed the

body.

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Adjournment after announcements. Prayer by I. N. Clark. Adjourned to 6:30.

#### THURSDAY NIGHT.

Devotional service conducted by John E. Carney.

On call for reports, the report of Committee on Nominations was read in part by Brother Hawkins, and that it might receive proper consideration was laid on the table.

The report on Foreign Missions was read by T. F. Coe, and on motion to adopt, the Blackwell Male Quartette favored the Convention with a song.

Dr. I. N. Clark, for the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society, spoke to the report, and then introduced W. T. Elmore of India, who came with a message portraying the need of the Gospel in that land among our fellowmen.

Song by the Young Ladies' Quartette.

The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We, your committee on Foreign Missions, report as follows:

Baptists stand for nothing short of the outer limits of the commission of our Lord, which means carrying the glad news of salvation to earth's remotest bounds.

The last words of our risen Redeemer were, "Ye shall be my witnesses after that the Holy Spirit is come upon you in Jerusalem, in Judea, in Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth."

The supreme mission of the churches of Jesus Christ is the evangelization of the world. Loyalty to Christ in the membership of our churches in obeying these words of our Lord, is of the utmost importance to the church's life and growth.

Baptists all ought to be foreign missionaries in belief and practice, because it lays the foundation for growth in the divine life. Our interest in and the contributions to this department of our work should be in a constantly increasing ratio, to insure the enlargement of our own personal and church life.

There was no organized effort to carry out the last words of our Master from Apostolic days until Carey and Fuller organized the little foreign missionary society in Kittering, England, October 2nd, 1792. During the intervening centuries between these periods of time, the people sat in gross darkness and the shadow of death, with only a little light here and there, by which God left not Himself without wit ness.

The darkness which prevailed during these periods of unorganized plans, and the marvelous achievements that have been realized since organized efforts begun, are two of the mightiest arguments before Baptists today in favor of combined, co-operative foreign mission methods.

When we consider the almost unapproachable conditions, and wellnigh insurmountable difficulties with which sin had incased the heathen nations, and when we see two missionaries—a man and his wifepray and labor and wait, seven long years for the first-fruits of the harvest, we are made to exclaim: All things are possible with God, and

the persistent, faithful man.

The success of American Baptist Foreign Missions is nothing less than phenominal. It counts for its fruitage in the hundred years, and a little over, more than 300,000 immersed believers, and over 1000 self-supporting churches, which are doing mission work in the regions beyond.

There have been 30,548 believers buried with Christ in baptism the past year. An average of 2500 per month, and of over 85 for every day in the year.

From these glorious achievements, may there come a world-vision of our opportunities, and a widening, deepening incentive to larger foreign mission contributions.

The report of Home Missions was read by Brother Cameron for the committee, and on motion to adopt, L. C. Barnes, Field Secretary of the A. B. H. M. Society, delivered an address replete with interest on the Grace of Agreement, and the report was adopted.

#### HOME MISSIONS.

Dear Brethren: Your committee on Home Missions beg leave to

make the following report:

We have conferred with the American Baptist Home Mission Society and the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and find that these great organizations are in a healthy and prosperous condition.

#### HOME MISSION BOARD.

The Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention does ten classes of mission work as given in the brief catechism of the Home Mission Board: Aiding weak churches, mountain mission schools, evangelism, cities, church building, foreigners, Indians, Negroes, Cuba, and the Canal Zone. We will not take up the space to enlarge on these different departments of work, but will say that the reports of the Board show that in each of these departments distinct work is being done and marvelous progress is being made. Last year the Board maintained wholly or in part 1,182 missionaries. Southern Baptists raised the past year from various states, \$329,475 for Home Mission work. Of this amount, \$63,502 was expended in church building work; \$191,833 was expended in maintaining missionaries in the various states, in Cuba, and in the Canal Zone. \$19,467 was, by special provision, set aside for the church building fund. \$14,909 was used in liquidating a debt brought over from the previous year. \$12,000 was used for rents, tracts, stationery, office expense, extra help, postage, and interest on annuity funds, the small balance to administration expenses and to publishing the Home Field, leaving a balance of a little less than \$2,000 to commence this year's work on.

The Lord of the Harvest blessed the workers of the Home Board very graciously last year. The reports show that the missionaries of the Home Board baptized 27,426 believers and there were 52,910 additions to the churches through their instrumentality. Nineteen per cent of all the baptisms in Southern Baptist churches last year resulted from the labors of missionaries of the Home Board, as shown by statements of the Board.

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#### PROPOSED CAMPAIGN AND WORK MAPPED OUT.

The Home Board has inaugurated a campaign to raise a fund of \$500,000 this year as a church building loan fund. There was 45,000 on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year for this purpose. This campaign for a church building loan fund somewhat commensurate with the needs of the field is strictly in compliance with the Great Commission as there are now 4,500 houseless churches in the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### AMERICAN BAPTIST HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

The American Baptist Home Mission Society was never in a more prosperous or vigorous condition than at the present time. The work of the Home Mission Society is too vast to be condensed into the short space at our command for this report. We can only say that the work being done in the widely extended territory covered by the Society bears every evidence of skilled consecration to the Master's cause and is a present and living verfication of the promise, "And lo, I am with you alway even unto the end of the world." The Society is doing work in practically every state of the Union, and in Mexico, Alaska, Eastern Cuba, Porto Rico, and Canada. The Society is supporting wholly or in part 1,663 missionaries and teachers, distributed as follows: In New England, 75; in the middle and central states, 160; in the southern states, 269; in the western states and territories, 1,023; in the Canadian Dominion, 12; in Mexico, 33; in Cuba, 46; in Porto Rico, 45; French missionaries have worked in seven states; Scandinavian missionaries in 23 states; German missionaries in 23 states and Canada; negro missionaries in 15 states.

Among the foreign populations there have been 359 missionaries; among the Negroes 57 missionaries and 256 teachers; among the Indians 37 missionaries and 26 teachers; among the Mexicans 26 missionaries and 12 teachers; the Cubans, 34 missionaries and 12 teachers; the Porto Ricans 41 missionaries and 4 teachers; and among Americans 826 missionaries. If we had the space we would like to speak in detail of the city mission work, the work among foreign populations, the educational work, the church edifice work, and all of the different departments.

The Society disbursed from all sources last year \$875,892.29 and closed its books with all obligations met and a balance of \$756.52 on hand. The Lord blessed the missionaries in their labors this last year, as He has ever done. There were 10,126 members received into the churches by baptism and 9,750 by letter and experience and 172 new churches were organized.

We are thankful to God that under His good providence we have our present plan of co-operation with both of these great and gloriously efficient Home Mission organizations. We wish to again express our appreciation of the work done and the aid given our churches in the bounds of Oklahoma by the Home Board and the Home Mission Society in the past and to say to them that we favor co-operation with them in the future as in the past. It is the desire of your committee to express the appreciation of this Convention in regard to Women's Work and the various Home Mission Organizations they represent. We bid them Godspeed and give them the hand of co-operation.

We respectfully urge all of our people to subscribe for and read the new joint magazine, "Missions," representing Home and Foreign Missions of the Northern Baptist Convention, and the "Home Field" of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and we respectfully suggest that our people, and especially our pastors, draw on the Board and Society for tracts and other Mission literature. The mis-

sionary spirit is the life of the church and Mome Missions is the foundation of all missionary work. We believe that this republic is the hope of the world and that Baptists are the hope of the republic. "As goes America, so goes the world," is true, and it is the firm conviction of your committee that the churches represented by the Home Mission Board and the American Baptist Home Mission Society are doing more to make America what it ought to be than all the other forces on this earth put together, therefore the Baptist churches of the United States are the hope of the world for religious liberty and a full New Testament Gospel.

Your committee recommends that our pastors be requested to preach at least once a year a special sermon on Home Missions and that each of our churches during the year make at least one liberal offering for this work; that churches and pastors make liberal use of the information and educating tracts and other literature furnished by the Board and the Society and gladly sent on request. The report on Baptist Orphan Home was read by the superintendent, W. A. McKinney, and on motion to adopt, Brother McKinney spoke of the great blessings coming to the orphans who are gathered in the home. This was followed by a free-will eash offering of \$148.09.

Brother F. M. Overless tells of the great joy which one of the orphan girls is bringing into his own home as they have adopted her in the family.

J. B. Garrison spoke briefly outlining in a practical way how to meet the ever enlarging obligations of the home.

The report was adopted, and after announcements, adjourned.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME.

Never in the history of our Baptist people of Oklahoma have the times been fraught with such tremendous responsibilities and opportunities as at the present. With the incoming tide of immigration is also the call of God's hosts for the enlargement of the fields of operation with increased activities to occupy till He comes again.

Not until God's churches have met the human needs with a Gospel, the spirit of which will crystalize our Christianity into institutions, visible and tangible, and capable of performing their humane and Christly service, can it be said with any degree of emphasis—they have done what they could.

The Gospel of the grace of God teaches us that in proportion to our

faith will victories come, "For this is the victory that overcomes the world, even our Faith.

The principles of faith cannot be seen, but men can see all good works. "Show me thy faith without thy works, and I will show thee my faith by my works," says James 2:18.

There is nothing practical with which we have to do in business, religious or any other realm of human activity, that does not require work as well as faith-of the measure of our obligation to this lost world is in proportion to the blessings obtained, temporal or spiritual, it follows that our good works of love must measure up to the standard of our obligations.

Back of every institution that is to bless the world is a life or lives of service. The underlying principle of our Christianity as announced by our Savior to His disciples, in Matt 20:26-8, "But it shall not be so among you, whosoever will be great among you, let him be your minister; and whosever will be chief among you let him be thy servant, even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto but to minister and give His life a ransom for many."

The institution this report represents is to minister to the needs of helpless orphan children, and turn their sobs into laughter and their crying into song. Does not an institution thus serving, merit the love and support of every lover of our Lord Jesus Christ?

What are we doing? We have cared for more than seventythree here most of the past year. There are at present sixty inmates of the home, while half a score have been placed in good Christian

Our children are attending the public school located three-fourths of a mile of the home. During the year we had a siege of measles and pneumonia, but all were nursed back to life again.

We desire to make honorable mention of Dr. W. E. Dicken the Home Physician, who has so loyally ministered to our children.

WHAT WE HAVE.

We have forty acres of ground on which is built a twenty-five thousand dollar building. We have team, wagon, farm implements. Cows furnished by Brother A. Nunery, of the Baptist Worker.

WHAT WE NEED:

Possibly the greatest need is endowment to meet the monthly ex penses. We need a larger farm on which we could have our own industrial training. We need an Orphans' Home Hospital where we would be able to separate our sick children from our well ones.

We need a chapel, so we could have our Sunday School and church.

We need a building for half orphans.

## FRIDAY MORNING.

Devotional service.

On call for reports, the report on laymen's Work was read by W. J. Caudill, and on motion to adopt, Brother Caudill spoke favorable to the report, followed by others, and the report was adopted.

#### REPORT OF LAYMEN'S WORK.

One year ago at our meeting in Chickasha all our hearts were stirred up by the splendid address of Dr. J. T. Henderson, one of the field men for the Laymen's Movement of the Southern Baptist Convention. At that time a committee was appointed to encourage and develop the work in our state. Little has been accomplished by this committee. Our heloved Secretary Stalcup has given the matter all the time and attention possible and with Bro. E. E. Ford has held twelve Laymen's Banquets in some of the larger churches, with the help of the local pastor and outside speakers.

Brother Ford has spoken upon the Laymen's work in a good many of our churches, and by the help of twelve brethren was able to purchase a dozen traveling libraries for the use of the men. These books are for the use of any church who makes a request to the Secretary.

In many of our churches a Committee of Laymen has been appointed to work with the pastor in the matter of encouraging Mission Education

and systematic giving for the extension of Christ's Kingdom.

We recommend that this work be continued and brought to the attention of more of our churches that greater emphasis be placed by all our pastors on missionary information and Christian Stewardship.

We also recommend that a Baptist Brotherhood be formed in our state to include all the organizations of men in our churches.

We recommend that our pastors make a strong effort to get our laymen to attend our State Convention so as to have our great men discuss Missions.

On motion and vote, the report of the Committee on Nominations was taken from the table. On motion to amend, the amendment was lost, and the report of the Committee adopted, Durant being the choice of the Convention for the place of next Convention.

On further vote the time was made Wednesday before the Third Sunday in November, 1911, and other items of the report adopted as appear elsewhere.

The Secretary here announced the following proposed amendment to the Constitution.

Amend the central paragraph of Article II, to read as fol-

lows: "Each church shall be entitled to one messenger, and one additional messanger for every Twenty-five dollars contributed to the work of the Convention, provided that in no case however shall any one church have to exceed Ten (10) messengers."

The Report of the Committee on Systematic Beneficence was read by Dr. Holt, and on motion and vote was adopted.

#### SYSTEMATIC BENEFICENCE.

Dr. J. B. Gambrell, once laconically remarked that Systematic Beneficence usually consisted in much system, but little beneficence. This doubtless is correct in some instances. But in Oklahoma and in Texas, as well, this year, missionary conditions continue to be tense, despite both system and benevolence. System without beneficence in church work, is to have a body without spirit. Beneficence without system is to have spirit without body. A body without spirit is dead. A spirit without body is vague. It takes both body and spirit combined to produce the greatest—or any genuine efficiency.

We have two rivers in Oklahoma which are vastly different, although they are quite near each other, and spring from near the same source and run—when they run—in the same direction. The South Canadian—on the map—appears to be a lordly stream. Its bed is half a mile in width, and when it is up it is immense. At this present writing it is as dry as the proverbial bone. As I write this report, seated on a Santa Fe train at Purcell, the dust is rising from its bed. It is absolutely unreliable. The city of Purcell, that depended on this stream for water

supply, is waterless now.

The Washita river is not half so wide, nor half so long, nor half so imposing. It flows between high safe banks, in a never ceasing stream. It furnishes a never failing water supply for the cities along its border. It has also been harnessed and furnishes light and power for several cities.

Churches which resort to high pressure collections alone for their benevolences may occasionally have an overflow, but they cannot be depended on for a steady stream of contributions. Our great denominational benevolences are supplied by small streams. Occasionally a Rocketeller steps forward with commendable generosity and gives a million at a time. We would not undervalue the million dollar offering. It is needed, and will bless the world. But a million dollars coming from a million members, will bring a million blessings more than the million dollars coming from one man. It being "more blessed to give than to receive" a million givers would be blessed in giving, instead of one. When we shall have induced all our pastors and churches to observe systematic giving—if that shall ever come to pass, then our days of hurtful high pressure collections will have ceased, and very many more blessings will be given both to the giver and receiver than now.

Concerning our present schedule of missionary and benevolent and educational contributions, your committee consulted our worthy Secretary J. C. Stalcup, who says: "This schedule is the result of several years' careful, painstaking work by former committees, and adopted by the Convention, and practically by all our associations and churches in the state. In my judgment it ought to be continued just as it is unless experience and thoughtful consideration of the whole subject matter should indicate a change." Therefore, taking our initiative from these words, we recommend a continuation of the schedule heretofore adopted.

The report on Religious Literature was read by J. H. Boyet, who had been asked to prepare the report.

Pending the motion to adopt, Convention adjourned, after announcements, including the programme for tonight.

## FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Devotional service by Dr. Wiseman.

On call for business, the report on Baptist Sanitarium was presented by A. N. Hall, who requested that it have a place in the minutes without discussion.

The report on Religious Literature was then taken up for consideration, and discussion followed, by Dr. Ray, Boyet, Nunnery and others and the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Your Committee believes that the word "religious" is best defined in what the Baptists believe and practice. We believe that while the Baptists should never cease, or relax their efforts in the perfection of a literature for themselves and the whole world, they are now giving in their liteature the very best in the world's religious thought. We do not hesitate, therefore, in calling special attention to the importance of sound Baptist literature. All else should be censored by healthy expression of Baptist public sentiment, and avoided as a deadly poison to our people.

For our Sundays schools and our Baptist Young People's Unions we have abundant supplies in the American Baptist Publication Society and the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, which we heartily commend to our people in these departments of Christian work. We also recognize the exceeding value of a rapidly increasing literature of an educational and inspirational character on the subjects of missions, and being sent forth from these sources, and we earnestly urge the free use of them in all our churches.

With reference to the denominational weekly paper we cannot too strongly express the conviction that every home should be supplied with at least one sound and thoroughly reliable Baptist paper. In the noble efforts which have been made, and which are now being made to meet the needs of our people in regard to a weekly family newspaper, and advocate of our denominational work, we heartily recognize the

valuable services rendered by the Texas Baptist Standard, The Word and Way, Baptist Worker, and other Baptist papers which are, or have been, circulated within our borders.

After much consultation and prayerful consideration your committee has reached the conclusion that Oklahoma should have a great Baptist weekly journal such as the Baptist Oklahoman promises to be, and we are profoundly impressed that the time is now at hand when the Convention should in no uncertain way lend its influence and support to the matter of placing the Baptist Oklahoman on an enduring financial foundation. The unity of our work and the maintainance and upbuilding of all our enterprises must always depend largely upon a reliable medium of communication published within our own borders. To ignore this fact will be imemasurably hurtful to every Baptist interest in Oklahoma, and to delay longer in this important matter is to invite disaster.

We therefore recommend that immediate steps be taken in the wisdom of this Convention to organize its influences and resources for the accomplishment of the ends herein suggested.

The report on Old Minister's Relief Fund was read by J. A. Scott, and on motion and vote was adopted without discussion.

#### OLD MINISTERS' RELIEF FUND.

No one is more deserving than the minister who has given his whole life to service of our Lord and the denomination, and is now unable to support himself. The call for help from him stands parallel with the orphan's cry for assistance. He has been too long neglected. He should have our prayers, fellowship and financial help, and his dependent widow whose life of self-sacrifice and devotion to home duties has largely made possible his success, should share in this beneficence. Therefore, we recommend.

First: That annual collections be taken in all the churches for this

worthy cause.

Second: That homes be secured over the state by donations of communities desiring such homes, or by purchase, and that these homes be let rent free to any such minister or minister's family as may be approved by the proper authorities. These homes shall be distributed in various communities over the state.

Third: That we seek co-operation with any denominational organi-

zation of this class that may seem desirable.

Fourth: That all of this matter be placed in the hands of the Executive Board of this Convention; be directed by the corresponding Secretary of this Convention; and that the Convention hold title to all property acquired by this provision. And that monies be disbursed according to the exigencies of the case.

The report on Indian Missions was read by the Secretary, and on motion to adopt, was spoken to, by Robt. Hamilton. G. L. Phelps, Mary P. Jayne, Miss Kelley, Brother Blake and

Holt Song by Creek Indians, John Smith and Joe Mingo. Report adopted.

To the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma:

Dear Brethren: -In compliance with my duty, as Superintendent of Indian Missions, I hand you written statement concerning the condition and progress of the work entrusted to me. It will be proper, in the beginning, for me to say, that, the results of the year's work has not been as fruitful in one particular, as I had fondly desired and expected; yet in many other respects, more has been accomplished than was expected. I greatly desired, that, this should be a time of great ingathering, and in this particular, I have been disappointed; yet, when I consider the unprecedented progress that has been made along other lines I am constrained to glorify God. remembering, that, there must be a gathering of the forces and a preparing for the battle before the walls can be expected to fall down; and a tarrying at Jerusalem before the Pentecost can be looked for. Since my coming into the work, four years ago, it has been more a gathering of forces, restoring conditions and setting things in order for the work, than the making of any effort toward Evangelistic work. The disturbed conditions due to the change in the tribal relations had very near ruined many of the churches, and had so scattered the membership, that much time and effort was required to restore conditions, so that, any substantial progress could be made. It will appear from the best estimate that can be had, perfect statistical information being impossible now, that, about six hundred persons have been restored to the churches during the year just ending; so, it thus appears, that, at this date, they are still coming back and reenlisting for the Master. All in all, the Indian work is in better condition than ever before in its history, and my heart is full of joy and hope for the future.

The Chickasaws, heretofore united in their associated relations with the Choctaws, feeling that they could prosecute the work among themselves best alone, asked for Letters of Dimission, at the last meeting of that body, and have organized the "Chickasaw Baptist Association." Our Chickasaw brethren are a loyal, consecrated and industrious little band, and good work may be expected of them. A particular account of my work, as will appear from my tabulated reports, is, as follows: Have spent in the Convention's service 52 weeks, delivered 164 sermons and addresses, visited 52 churches, attended 5 Associations, 6 Board meetings, 3 Fifth Sunday meetings, held 4 Bible Schools, and 3 Mission Conferences and assisted in the organization of 2 Associations; have copsulted with 7 churches about building houses of worship; have traveled 10,544 miles and paid for traveling expenses \$359.45. As a result of the Indian work, there has been about 300 baptisms and about 600 restored and received otherwise. There is no disturbance anywhere, and the outlook is very flattering indeed. Pray for us.

B. Y. P. U. REPORT.

Efficiency is the motto of the Baptist Young People's Union of Oklahoma. We want an army of young people in our churches and the idea of any army is inseparably connected with training. The battles of Oklahoma to be fought in the future are to be waged by the Christian forces against organization as never before. The recent Prohibition victory was a glorious victory against not a mass but a thoroughly organized movement. More and more the Devil's forces will thus organize. So the Baptist Young People's Union will stand for the training of the Lord's young people.

Our State Convention has a man on the field whose duties are to thus train the membership under the co-operation of the church and pastor. We heartily commend him to the churches of the state and urge that the churches use him in training the young people and organizing Mission Study classes. His training and enthusiasm fit him thoroughly for his duties.

We recommend that the Associational organizations get in touch with and use this man for the development of their latent manhood and womanhood.

#### REPORT OF HISTORICAL SECRETARY.

Your Secretary begs leave to submit the following report:

After my election at the last Convention, I asked the Executive Board to outline whatever work they desired me to do, and was told that the matter was referred to the Executive Committee.

Later, Dr. J. S. Murrow, of Atoka, wrote me about some valuable files of minutes and papers in his possession which he desired to present to the Baptist General Convention.

The most valuable of these papers had been placed, for safe keeping, in the Carnegie Library in Oklahoma City. I presented his generous offer to the Board of Directors of the Convention and asked if they would accept the gift and prepare a safe place in which to deposit the material. This matter was referred to a committee.

I have in my possession files of minutes and some papers that may be of interest in the future.

I would most earnestly recommend that this Convention make some provision for preserving such material as we have or may be able to collect. And I would urge with special emphasis that you receive and take care of the very valuable material collected by our honored Bro. Murrow. For more than fifty years he has been gathering minutes and papers and books pertaining to Oklahoma Baptist work, and such material ought to be preserved.

At the last meeting of the Board of Directors they asked me to write a paper on ten years of Convention history, to be read at this Convention. I have prepared the paper and am ready to read it at such time as it may be called for.

The report on Temperance was read by G. L. Phelps, and on motion and vote was adopted by a unanimous vote, the audience standing.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your committee, come before you at this time with great rejoicing, and with profound gratitude to God, for the victory so recently given to his people in Oklahoma. It was a most strenuous campaign, with Law, Order and Righteousness, on one side, and Lawlessness and Sin on the other. When Oklahoma adopted Prohibition three years ago, the brewers and distillers of other states, with the saloonkeepers and other lawless element of our own state, swore vengeance against the law, and from that day to this they have flooded the state with false and slanderous reports concerning the law, and have done all that wickedness could do to make the Oklahoma Prohibition law obnoxious. They finally succeeded in bringing upon the state the enormous expense of a resubmission of the law. The good people of Oklahoma have again arisen and rebuked this unscrupulous foe, for which we thank God and take courage. We would, therefore, recommend:

- 1. That we remind our people that this battle is not over with this victory, but that we still have allied against us a great combination of wealth and wickedness.
  - 2. That we favor the organization of civic leagues, and law enforce-

ment clubs, in every community, and that we give every encouragement to the officers of the law that are inclined to enforce the law, and that we use our influence to have deposed from office the officer who will not enforce the law.

- 3. That we re-affirm our confidence in the great work of the Anti-Saloon League, the W. C. T. U. and other temperance organizations of the state, and that we pledge them our further co-operation and support.
- 4. That we request the law making bodies of our state  $t_0$  pass such laws as will compel the liquor interests to pay the expense of any future re-submission election.
- 5. That we pledge ourselves not only for state-wide prohibition, but to the abolition of the liquor traffic in the whole world.
- 6. That we favor a more emphatic, scientific treatise of the subject in our institutions of learning.

#### BAPTIST MINISTERS' CONFERENCE.

Enid, Oklahoma, Nov. 15, 1910.

The Oklahoma Baptist Ministers' Conference met on this date in the meeting house of the First Baptist church, and was called to order by former Moderator J. A. Sutton, the song service being led by Song-Evangelist W. G. Lewis.

By motion, Dr. J. M. Frost was substituted on the program for J. N. Prestridge, who could not be present.

After appropriate remarks by the Moderator, Pastor J. A. Sutton, and a short devotional service, J. M. Frost, of Nashville, Tenn., spoke of the two books, "The Psychology of Thinking," and "The Psychology of Teaching, speaking in connection therewith of some other books.

The Conference organized by the re-election of J. A. Sutton, Moderator, and T. B. Harrell, Secretary.

Rev. Jeff D. Ray, of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, was introduced and made brief remarks.

After announcements, the Conference adjourned til 2:30 p. m.

#### Afternoon Session.

. The Conference convened at two o'clock, and the devotional service was led by A. N. Hall of Muskogee, using a portion of Matt. 6th ch.

Carter Helm Jones addressed the conference on "The Outlook of Oklahoma Baptists."

#### TEN YEARS OF EFFORT AND ACHIEVEMENT.

At this annual session of the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention we complete ten years of history. It is mete that we should review the work of these years, and gather lessons from the successes and disappointments attending our efforts. The most conspicuous feature of this ten years of Convention history is the guiding providence of God. Even when the path was dim and the shadows deep the unerring guide has not failed us. Calling to mind the first assembly of the contending factions of our Baptist Zion; and comparing it to the slpendid gatherings of brain and brawn and spiritual power here assembled, our hands reach for the stone that we will set up, and call "Ebenezer," hitherto hath the Lord led us.

We must push back more than three quarters of a century to see the beginnings of Baptist work in the land of beauty and home of the Indian. About the years that lay back of the date, known as the Unification, we have very little to say. Only to see what God hath wrought, do we call to mind the unbecoming contentions of the opposing factions into which the Baptist population of this state was then divided. Beloved brethren upon whom the serum of reconstruction had taken no effect; men of God from North and South; bred and reared in an atmosphere of sectionalism and prejudice, often mistook provincial customs and personal stubbornness for principles. Heavy stress was laid upon debates and rival organizations between different factions of our own people. In the selection of official servants their partisan record had sometimes more weight than their general fitness for the work.

The Home Mission Society of New York and the Home Mission Board of Atlanta, Ga., each through the emmigrants from their sections fostered the Baptist work in the Indian and Oklahoma Territories. Rival associations occupying oftentimes the same territory sprang up. Two State Conventions in each of the two territories were organized. One in each territory co-operating with the Home Mission Society, and one in each territory with the Home Mission Board. These conditions produced inevitable friction and strife. The faithful historian will record some things that bring a blush of shame.

To the above occasions of discord were added the catchy contentions of extreme landmark and gospel mission brethren. Their persistent tinkering with the methods and objection to names, drew off some brethren and prevented them from doing anything worth while. As they paraded the labor and expense involved in organized mission work the lazy brethren approved and the stingy brethren applauded.

But before diverting our minds from this period in our history we must bear testimony to the apostolic boldness and martyr sacrifices of the great body of our Baptist people in the two territories. In isolation and poverty they struggled to express their faith. They preached and taught and builded the best they could. The children of this world may

have been wiser in material forethought; but they cannot surpass the zeal and generosity of the childrenof light. These plains and valleys have seen a thousand Baptist homes that knew naught of luxury, put under mortgage and the bread on the table divided to build churches in God's name.

The days of martyrs are not past, and our conviction is that the Father's watchful eye has seen since apostolic days no more genuine and heroic sacrifices for the faith than has been made on Oklahoma and Indian Territory soil. The word of life and the spirit of Christ resident in these Baptist people was bound, in due time, to throw off the excrescencies of division and strife, and grow into a compact body cemented together in the fellowship of love and service of a common Lord. Brethren grew tired and ashamed of the unseemly strife. The heavy work of maintaining what we had and the ever increasing demands for enlargement set their hearts on the main cause, rather than incidental issues. The best of God's children, and hardest workers for His cause longed for the fellowship and co-operation of all their brethren. The dark angel of suspicion and contention was expelled from council. God's spirit moved them to seek the fellowship and co-operation of all His forces.

In Indian Territory the two convention met at Durant and September 10, 1900, came together and formed the Baptist General Convention of Indian Territory. This convention co-operated with the Home Mission Society of New York and Home Board of the Southern Baptist Convention at Atlanta, Ga. For every dollar raised by this convention for its own work these two boards appropriated four dollars each for the same work. In addition to this, these two co-operating boards appropriated \$1,000 each for church edifice work in the territory. This part of the arrangement continued during the life of the convention, except that the proportion raised by the convention gradually increased.

The two conventions in Oklahoma met at Blackwell, Oct. 5, 1900, after closing up all their business and each adopting the recommendations of a joint committee from each of the two conventions, the Home Mission Society of New York and the Home Mission Board of Atlanta, Ga. They came together and organized the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention. The terms of union and of co-operation with the Home Mission Society and the Home Mission Board were practically the same as those in the Indian Territory.

The combination of these four Baptist bodies into two marks an epoch in Baptist work of the Southwest influencing the denomination in the entire United States. It marks the beginning of better days in both territories. The bitter feelings and unbecoming acts resulting from the unfortunate conditions began rapidly to disappear. The work to be done was so great that the workers had no time to note each other's defects. God's blessings on the work was so abundant that everybody was busy rejoicing over success.

Unification in spirit and plans of work has gone steadily forward. These two conventions, running along parallel lines, enjoyed a steady growth. Every year marking a distinct advance over the preceding year. In six years the conventions increased their offerings from \$3.078 to \$12,863. The number of baptisms the first year was 1,459 and the sixth year 3,854. The number received by letter increased from 2,531 to 3,626.

November 8 these two conventions met, one in the Baptist and the other in the Methodist meeting house at Shawnee. After closing up their work for the year each convention adjourned sine die, and by previous arrangement met at the Opera\* House Nov. 9, at 10 a.m. Accredited messengers from the two conventions to the number of 400 proceeded to form the present Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. This event should be known in history as the Combination.

The meeting was called to order by our beloved Bro. M. D. Early of Blackwell, and Dr. J. S. Murrow of Atoka led in prayer. J. A. Scott was elected president of the new convention; E. D. Cameron and A. G. Washburn, vice-presidents; W. P. Blake, recording secretary, and L. W. Marks, assistant recording secretary. J. C. Stalcup was elected corresponding secretary; W. P. Blake was elected treasurer and L. W. Marks historical secretary. All institutions owned or fostered by either of the old conventions were taken over by the new convention. Members of the two former conventions mingled together and joined in the common work in such a way as soon to wipe out the line between Oklahoma and Indian Territories, and begin the making of a great Baptist state.

The Home Mission Board and the Home Mission Society continued to co-operate with the new convention. As it grew in numbers and wealth it gradually assumed more and more of the responsibility of evangelizing the new state of Oklahoma.

There have been employed during all or a part of the year officials, evangelists, missionaries and missionary pastors, 250. These have reported 4,293 baptisms and 3,165 received by letter.

We now have about 1,100 churches, 38 associations and approximately 70,000 members. We have one Baptist College owned and controlled by our State Convention, Oklahoma Baptist College, located at Blackwell, Okla., with property worth about \$70,000. It is in a flourishing condition.

Besides this, we have Indian University, at Bacone, Okla., and Southwest Baptist College at Hastings, Okla., and we have now in course of construction a Baptist University at Shawnee, Okla. We have a Baptist Orphans' Home founded in 1902. It now has property worth \$65,000. In the home at present are 60 children.

We have a Baptist hospital at Muskogee that is doing a blessed work in the Master's name.

The constant changing of our pastors and other leaders has been a source of embarrassment and weakness, but some of our best men have continued with the work from the beginning. Many of these are worthy of extensive and honorable mention, but space will not permit. Before passing, however, we must mention the names of some whom we have delighted to continuously honor from the beginning up to this good hour:

J. C. Stalcup was the first president of the Indian Territory convention. He resigned that position in 1993 to accept the position of corresponding secretary and superintendent of missions for Indian Territory. This position he held until the combination of Indian Territory Convention and Oklahoma Convention in 1906, when he was elected to the same position in the new convention. This responsible position he has held with credit to himself and satisfaction to the convention. The unparalleled growth of Baptists in this state is due in large measure to the generalship of this consecrated layman and uncompromising Baptist.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the beloved and lamented L. L. Smith, the first corresponding secretary of the Oklahoma Convention, was assisted by his capable wife. After God transferred him to the church triumphant she assisted C. W. Brewer, his successor, until the combination when she was elected assistant to J. C. Stalcup. Thus it will be seen that our present secretaries have been connected with the office of corresponding scretary since its creation by the original conventions.

- Rev. W. P. Blake was prominent in Baptist affairs in Indian Territory at the time of the unification. He was elected the first recording secretary. After the combination he was elected to the same position in the new convention. The convention continues to honor itself by elecing him to this position.
- Dr. A. G. Washburn, now Superintendent of Indian Missions, has been through all the years of the convention a prominent figure in all of its meetings. He has had some official relation to the convention during its ten years of history.
- Rev. C. Stubblefield, N. P. Bullock and G. W. Brewer have held some official relation to the convention during its ten years' history.
- Rev. C. Stubblefield, W. P. Blake, J. W. Soloman and N. B. Bullock have been members of the Executive board continuously for the ten years.

If the next decade shows a corresponding increase, Oklahoma Baptists will indeed be a mighty host for God and righteousness. Our praises for past blessings are mingled with our prayers for future achievements. The rainbow of hope spans the way that is paved with the promises of God. The rock that led us this far will still be to us a pillar of cloud by day and fire by night. A conquering host, under God, are we. For what are we and for what we hope to be let glory be to the Father and to the Holy Ghost. Amen.

### CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE I.

#### Name.

This Society shall be called the Woman's Baptist Missionary Sosiety of Oklahoma, co-operating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

#### ARTICLE II.

#### Object.

The object of this Society shall be to cultivate a Missionary spirit, especially among the women, young women, and children throughout the State, and to aid in the word-wide spread of the Gospel. In this work it shall co-operate with the Home and Foreign departments of the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention; with the American Baptist Home Mission Society the Woman's Baptist Foreign Missionary Society of the West, and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, in the work presented by their respective constitutions.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Officers.

Section 1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be elected annually by ballot.

Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the Auditor, together with the Presidents of Associations, the Secretaries of Departments, and an Advisory Committee (provided for in Article I, Section 6 of the By-Laws), shall constitute the Executive Board, five of whom including two officers, shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Membership.

The Membership of this Society shall be composed of the Executive Board, and one messenger from each Baptist Woman's Society or Baptist Church, and one additional messenger for every ten dollars contributed through the Treasurer of this Society, provided, no society shall have more than ten messengers, also messengers from Young Women's societies on the same basis of representation as the women.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### Distribution of Funds.

All money raised by local societies for missions shall be sent to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of this Society. All money for Home Missions not otherwise designated, shall be equally divided between the Home department of the Woman's Missionary Union and the Woman's American Baptist Home Mission Society. All money for Foreign Missions not otherwise designated, shall be equally divided between the Foreign Department of the Woman's Missionary Union and the Woman's Baptist Foreign Missionary Society of the West. All money for State Missions shall be sent to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of this Society and by her forwarded to the Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist General Couvention.

#### ARTICLE VI.

#### Time of Meeting.

The Annual Meeting of this Society shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, at the same place and on the day previous to the opening of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### Amendments.

This Constitution may be changed, or amended, by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present at any Annual Meeting, provided, notice of proposed changes has been given to each local society one month previous to the Annual Meeting.

#### BY-LAWS.

#### ARTICLE I.

#### Duties of Officers.

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the Society, and at the meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and shall be an ex-officio member of all standing Committees. With the concurrence of the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, and at least one member of the Advisory Committee, she may call special meetings of the Executive Board, when in her judgment it may seem needful.

Section 2. Vice Presidents. The Vice Presidents shall be qualified to act in the place of the President and to aid her in all practical ways.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual Meeting of the Society to prepare the Minutes for publication, and also to act as Secretary of the Executive Board, a condensed report of which shall be given to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. As Corresponding Secretary, it shall be her duty to conduct the official correspondence of the Society and transact all necessary business connected therewith; be the means of communication between the co-operating Boards and Societies (named in Article II of the Constitution) and the local societies of the State.

She shall have general supervision of the State Program and the Traveling Libraries, shall have charge of the Correspondence to Baptist papers unless other provisions shall be made for it, and shall give general directions to the Field Work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity may permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out the various funds of the Society according to the directions of the Executive Board, keeping always an exact account of the receipts and disbursements.

She shall make an annual report to this Society and quarterly and annual reports to the co-operative Boards and Societies, and shall forward monthly to the Treasurer of said Boards and Societies all money for Home, Foreign and State Missions.

Section 5. Auditor. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine the books of the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer and make a report in writing to the Annual Meeting.

Section 6. Executive Board. This Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care and shall have power to make such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the constitution of this Society.

It shall hold regular quarterly meetings following the close of each quarter, notice of which shall be given by the Corresponding Secretary. Also foffowing the Annual Meeting the new Executive Board shall meet to plan for carrying out the work of the year. It shall elect the Secretaries of departments, viz., A secretary of Young Woman's Work, a Secretary of Junior Work, and a Secretary of Baby Band Work. Also an Advisory Committee which shall be composed of five members who are familiar with and interested in Woman's Mission Work.

It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the Annual Meeting recommendations concerning the depelopment of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and promotion of the work which may seem expedient and judicious.

Section 7. Secretaries of Departments. It shall be the duty of these Secretaries to assist the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may organize and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular department of the work by correspondence and shall make quarterly reports in writing to the Executive Board, and an Annual report to the Society.

## ARTICLE II. Amendments.

These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulations as those governing changes in the Constitution.

#### WOMAN'S BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF OKLAHOMA.

Minutes of the Fourth Annual Meeting, Held in First M. E. Church, Enid, Nov. 15, 1910.

#### TUESDAY MORNING.

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by the President, Mrs. W. E. Dicken.

The Devotional meetings were arranged in a series conducted by Mrs. J. H. Scott, of Alva. Her subject at this hour was "Missions as an Educator." The progress of the world due to Missionary effort, and woman's large part, were emphasized. Scripture selections from 119 Psalm. Songs: "Revive Us Again," "Onward Christian Soldiers," and "I am Thine, O Lord." Closed with a precious season of prayer.

Mrs. E. L. Atkins, of Enid, spoke cordial words of greeting and welcome to the visiting delegates, to which response was made in behalf of the Society by Miss Kate D. Perry, of Mc-Alester.

Committees were appointed as follows:

Visitors were introduced and gave a word of greeting, viz:

Mrs. E. A. Nelson, a returned missionary of the S. B. C. who has been in Brazil twelve years and is temporarily residing in Stillwater recuperating her health and educating her children.

(The representative of the Woman's Baptist Foreign Missionary Society of the West. Mrs. Inga Petterson, through a misunderstanding did not arrive until Wednesday.)

#### PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE.

The annual gathering of our workers, who are friends of heart and spirit, and who come seeking the fulfillment of the will of God, is to each of us a joyous as well as a solemn occasion.

Let us this time prepare our hearts to hear His Voice above all others in all that is said and done during the busy hours that we spend together in this our Fourth Annual Meeting. My prayer is that each one here may receive such an out-pouring of His spirit as to go from this meeting strengthened and enlightened for another year's service. Tis so sweet that service never ceases, life would not be worth living if service was finished at the close of the year. The close of our Conventional year is the commencement of a year. Thanksgiving for service, and hope of service are locked in loving embrace.

And now as the year closes we have assembled to do this double service of closing and commencing a year's work. In a backward look over the past year's work, we want first of all to pause with reverent thanks to Him whom we believe has led us, not for our work, but His. This year has brought to us joy and sorrow, success and failure. The reports of our different departments, today, will in a measure indicate the extent of our success or failure, but the complete results will only be revealed in eternity. But whatever these reports will be, I hope it may be said of each one, "She hath done what she could." And have we remembered through the year—Our Wathchword, "Lord what will thou have me to do?"

In viewing the situation in our State, I want to put great stress on two things, organizing more women's societies in churches without such organizations, and enlisting more women in the societies already organized. I feel in doing this it means larger service for the enlisted, and of course an awakening of the re-enlisted. If we can do this that will mean enlargement all along the lines, educationally, spiritually and financially. In Oklahoma we have one thousand church organizations with only 360 woman's societies including both Missionary and Aid. How can we reach and enlist the 640? And out of the 69,585 Baptists, we can certainly estimate 40,000 of these to be women; then with our 360 women's societies, with, I would judge, an average membership of fifteen, we will have six thousand women enlisted, with thirty-four thousand women and girls not enlisted.

In the Baptist Oklahoman our Brother Holt ventures to assert that there are fully as many Baptists in Oklahoma who hold letters, or have not moved their membership, from home churches in the older states, as there are members now enrolled in all our churches. If this should prove true, dear sisters, we are compelled to feel overwhelmend and that our work is in a very small beginning, as compared to what we can and must do in our Woman's Baptist Missionary Society of Oklahoma. The possibilities then that lie before us are great, we are here today to plan to meet these needs: Now to each one of you, I want to picture your own local society. This is the bone and sinew of our work. No matter how efficient our Corresponding Secretary, our Associational Presidents and Secretaries of Departments, if you do not have a live local society with live members, our state work is hampered and we do not have the desired results.

This brings us to what I want to emphasize—the individual work, or better say, Personal Services. This I believe is the only means of solving this problem. Now, don't understand me to say we do not need our Secretary and leaders. Oh yes, but that is only our machinery

through which we carry on our work, but it is very essential. Our Lord calls us to give ourselves, not merely our money, or even our prayers. He needs both of these, but with them ourselves,—"Ourselves for Others." I want to leave this imprint on our hearts today—"Ourselves for Others."

The field of the local secretary is great, whether in country or city church. In the country church perhays the field is not so vast as town or city, but you have as large a field in proportion to our workers. How many churches and Sunday schools owe their existance to a band of women, ofttimes gathered in a private home or school house, the small beginning is officered by persistent, faithful women, going day after day, warm or rainy weather, so the work goes on and today there stands a church built on the lives of these faithful women of the Missionary Society. There are hundreds of cases like this. Does it pay? Then ofttimes we find our very best young women in our country churches. Then we need our older women to prepare the channels for our young women. Our Young Women are valuable factors in this Personal Service. Some one has said the very expression "Young Women" suggests two possibilities: (Possibilities for good or evil. So it behooves us a swomen to be ready to win our young women for Christian service.

Our town or city churches have a larger field for personal service—the Sunday school, Mother's meetings, sewing classes, and various other ways for Christian service. It seems Christian visiting it a lost art. We need this so much. Visiting the sick, the poor, the old—not by proxy, but giving personal service. The work of woman is not rounded out, and the worker herself fully developed unless all the world is her field—unless she gives HER MONEY to the field beyond her home and HERSELF to the field at home. This we are doing in our work.

Mission education is an important opportunity for larger service. You cannot give out what you do not possess. So if we would know missions, we must study missions. Our Program Committee has prepared an excellent program for his year's study. We want and expect every society to use them. Then our missionary periodicals—it is so important that we have these if we keep in touch with our work and workers. I want to say right here, I wish every society had one woman or a committee on missionary information. Soliciting subscriptions, etc, for our missionary periodica's. Then we have our missionary libraries, containing so much valuable and helpful information. Sorry they have not been used more extensively this year.

To those of us that desire more study than our State programs, I would recommend Mission Study Classes. Many of our societies have done this in the past year. You will find two books recommended by State Program Committee. To those of our girls who desire training for special service, we most heartily recommend our two Training Schools, one at Chicago and one at Louisville. We are proud of our "Oklahoma girls," and the progress they are making with their work. Many of us had the pleasure of seeing and hearing them this summer. They graduate this year, and who will be our next?

Now in closing I want to say, I believe of far greater importance than anything else that has been said is the duty and privilege of special and definite prayer. Is prayer a service? If so, this service undone means work undone. This view makes prayer a very serious matter; but this is the conception taken by the apostles and by Christ himself. "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that He send forth laborers into His harvest." Yet we neglect to pray. As I was thinking of this sub-

ject—prayer, and answer to prayer— a letter came with the report of the last Executive meeting of W. M. U. In this was a report from Corresponding Secretary, Miss Crane, who had been visiting and attending Institutes in Arkansas. In a number of cases the leaders agreed beforehand upon certain definite results to be prayed for in all the institutes, and not in a SINGLE ONE was there failure to secure a leader for the neglected part. What does this mean, Sisters? Have we failed in this, that we haven't the right woman for field worker to give her whole time to this work? Let us think and pray about this. This is one thing especially I want to recommend here, (other suggestions that I may have will come through the Recommendation Committee) that we have a capable woman, the one for the place, to take our Field work, to learn it, to stay with it long enough to lay plans and execute same.

Some one has said, "Pray as if all depended on prayer—Plan as if all depended on plans—Study as if all depended on knowledge.

Clothed in this tri-unite of power—prayer, plan, knowledge—you may go before the world with a message.

In response to Roll Call of Associations, reports were given from the twenty-one associations. Four of these were Indian Associations sending full reports through their Superintendent, Mrs. Murrow. Many presidents brought maps showing the number of churches contributing to woman's work. Only three minutes were allowed for each erport.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY-TREASURER.

The history of our organization lengthens. One more year is behind us with its work recorded and we pass on. God alone knows how well or how poorly we have gleaned in His vineyard. As individuals, perhaps our own hearts will tell us whether we deserve the condemnation of an unworthy servant of the "Well done."

Have we said, "Lord what wilt thou have me to do?" and then did that which suited best out own comfort and convenience, or have we faithfully and conscientiously followed the path of duty even though it meant sacrifice in many ways?

As I try to bring you a truthful record of the year's work I regret that so far as statistics go it is not equal to the report of the previous year, yet I would not sound for you a low note, or give you a word of discouragement. I believe that general conditions only are responsible for our failure to make greater progress.

I have no reason to believe, either through personal contact or my correspondence that any who were once enlisted in our work have grown weary in well doing or have fallen by the wayside; but many have been hindered by the circumstances and conditions surrounding the work of the local church.

And so I bid you take heart this morning; buckle on the armor anew. The future lies before us. We may make it largely what we will. If there have been hinderances and difficulties to overcome in the past we shall be stronger for the battle to come.

We have a great field in which to work; an active, faithful and increasing membership, and an organization capable of overcoming changing conditions if we rally to its support.

As we take an inventory of our work and see exactly how we stand let us hear God's voice calling us to large service.

"Hear ye not Jehovah's orders, High above the eastern sea? Zion rise, enlarge thy borders, Lo, the nations flock to thee.

Help us to enlarge, oh Lord for Thee, From north to south, from sea to sea; Where ever a heart or home may be, Help us to enlarge, O Lord for Thee."

THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.—Quarterly meetings have been held regularly, with good attendance. Much prayerful consideration and discussion has been given to evry phase of the work. The Secretary is especially grateful for the sympathy and encouragement and absolute co-operation she has received from every member as she tried to carry our the plans made.

Our mid-year Conference was held June 1st at Shawnee, and, although not largely attended, was a great spiritual uplift to all present.

One member of the Board, Mrs. Anna E. Smith, President of Longtown Association, has been called to her reward.

OUR APPORTIONMENT.—It will be remembered our aim in total was \$6,500. Of this amount we have raised \$5,033.49, leaving a deficit of \$1,466.51. Of this shortage, \$605.50 is Home Missions, \$590.91 Foreign Missions, \$295.13 State Missions, while to Training Schools we have given \$25.03 above the \$500 apportionment.

The increase above last year is \$217.87, or 4 1-2 per cent.

OUR STATE ORGANIZATION.—We now have 419 organizations, including Missionary and Aid, Young Women and Junior Societies. Of these, 254 have contributed to the work through our treasury.

Our greatest problem is the unenlisted. How shall we reach them?

ASSOCIATIONAL DEVELOPMENT.—Perhaps the most gratifying result of the year's work is the strong evidence of better associational organization.

On the whole the annual meetings have been more largely attended, the exercises have been carried on with more systm, rports the work for another year. This is largely due to the work of our Associational Presidents. The growth of these organizations means a strong state organization.

In this connection let me say that an important part of this work is to establish a permanent associational expense fund. The lack of it has retarded the work.

Of the forty associations 37 have had a President working all or part of the year.

THE DEPARTMENTS.—The Secretary of Y. W. going away in the early part of the year left the work to an assistant secretary, who also found it imperative to be away during the summer, but in spit of these conditions nine Y. W.'s have been organized.

Our Junior Secretary had protracted, serious illness in her home and left the state two months ago. Fuorteen new societies have been reported, 30 Junior programs have been sent out to leaders, and the opportunity for work in the three departments is limitless.

We shall be largely successful in this work only when the Womer's Societies assume the responsibility of fostering them. There ought to be a Baby Band leader in every society, and some one to organize the Juniors and Young Women. In this we have perhaps our largest opportunity for mission work. Do we long to see an army of young women going out into the harvest field equipped for the best service? Then we must train the boys and girls. While we wait, and busy our hands and hearts with other parts of the work, they will have grown to manhood and womanhood and drifted away, perhaps beyond our reach.

THE TRAINING SCHOOL AND OUR GIRLS THERE.—This part of the work is a source of inspiration to us all. The apportionment of \$500 more than met, and in addition \$436 given for our scholarship fund, which is now being used by Miss Gray and Miss Purviance. One year of their training has been completed and they have done most excellent work. No work done by Baptist women will count for more in the years to come than this special training of young women for missionary work among women and children.

FIELD WORK.—The Corresponding Secretary has visited seventeen associations during the year, some of them twice.

During the winter one month was spent with Miss Julia Austin, District Field worker, at which time fifteeen meetings were held in different parts of the state. Miss Austin's service was appreciated by all, and we believe was very profitable. I have also attended nine associational meetings.

No regular Field worker has been employed during the year. Mrs. A. F. Wasson was employed during the summer and Miss Gray and Miss Purviance each did acceptable work during their vacation. These workers attended seventeen associational meetings. A special report of their work will be given separately.

The month of May was spent by the Secretary in attend the annual meetings in Chicago and Baltimore. Time forbids, and words fail me to tell of the great inspiration of those meetings and what made it greater was the fact that Oklahoma women had a part in it all, not alone North or South, but whenever Baptists missions are established we have a share through our plan of co-operation.

You will be glad to know that your Secretary could report our apportionment for Home and Foreign Missions fully paid to each of our co-operating societies, and I wish to say that I deeply appreciated the honor of representing Oklahoma.

One especially interesting feature of the trip was the opportunity at Baltimore to go on board an immigrant ship and see our faithful missionary, Miss Buhlmeir, at her work. We realized as never before what it means to have these people brought to us that we may give them the gospel.

MISSION STUDY.—While not quite so many state programs for mission study have been sent out as last year, yet there has been evidence that they were more carefully studied and are srving btter their purpose.

Our Missionary Traveling Libraries, thirty in number, have been much appreciated at some places, but have not had as large a circulation as we wish, owing to the lack of time for this work. Is is hoped that some plan will be devised by which the libraries may be made a valuable accessory to mission study.

We are much indebted to our co-operating societies for large quantities of literature for free distribution. We have tried to use it wisely and trust that the sowing of missionary information may bring a rich harvest.

A SUMMARY.—In the foregoing report you will see there has been activity, although we have not taken a marked step in advance. We cannot always measure growth by visible results, and so we believe that much work of faithful women all over the state has not been recorded in this report, but in the future will bear fruit to the glory of God.

Let me ask you to bear in your minds and hearts all through the year the various topics which have been mentioned.

The Executive Board needs your earnest prayer that we may have wisdom for the task entrusted to us.

Continue your loyalty to the apportionment and strive to establish the quarterly payment plan. Let us bring our state and associational organizations to the highest point of efficiency by co-operating heartily and promptly with the leaders.

I would emphasize again the paramount importance of the departments if we would make our work sure and steadfast.

Let the Training Schools and all the students, as well as our own girls, continue to have a large place in our hearts. I ask your prayers for those who do field work, whether she be a regular field worker, the Corresponding Secretary, or the Associational Presidents, as they visit their fields. It is a work which needs tact and patience, and love.

The importance of mission study is too evident to need reiteration.

I close my report, realizing that I have brought to you nothing new, but for your encouragement I wanted to impress upon you the truth that our work must be "precept upon percept; line upon line; here a little, and there a little." If this be faithfully done we shall go onward and upward to victory.

A called meeting of the Board was held in Oklahoma City, Dec. 9, 1909. Members present, 7.

The resignation of Miss Braswell as Field Worker was accepted, due to her becoming Mrs. A. Floyd Wasson, and entering school in Louisville.

Efforts were made to secure a Field Worker.

It was voted to accept the service of Miss Julia Austin of the W. B. F. M. S. W. to make a tour of Oklahoma and to plan meetings at different points in the State.

The Corresponding Secretary was voted a three weeks' vacation.

The First Quarterly Meeting was held in Oklahoma City, Feb. 3, 1910, Members present, 14.

The illness of First Vice President, Mrs. McBride, and the death of Mrs. John Nuveen, President of W. A. B. H. M. S. were reported, and Miss Howell was instructed to send messages of sympathy.

Six new libaries were named as follows: One in memory of Mrs. Nuveen, the others respectively in honor of Miss Howell, Mrs. Dicken, Mrs. Clouse, Mrs. Halsted and Miss Perry.

Mrs. Dyke presented a desk for use of Corresponding Secretary.

Voted to have Miss Howell represent the Society in annual meetings of Co-operating Woman's Societies.

By request of Mrs. Porterfield, Mrs. E. E. Ford was eletced Assistant Secretary of Young Woman's Work.

Voted to ask Miss Purviance and Miss Gray to do field work in vacation.

The Second Quarterly Meeting was held at Shawnee, June 1, 1919. Members present, 8.

Appreciation of the Woman's number of the Oklahoma Baptist Journal was expressed.

Committee appointed to recommend plans for the care of traveling libraries, viz: Miss Howell, Mrs. Stalcup and Miss Jayne.

Voted to ask Mrs. Wasson to do field work in vacation.

Voted to accept \$800.00 apportionment to each of the Women's Home and Foreign Societies of the N. B. C., and \$800.00 each to the Home and Foreign Departments of W. M. U. for next year.

At Mrs. Branch's request, Mrs. J. S. Ramsey was eletced Assistant Junior Secretary.

The Third Quarterly Meeting was held at Oklahoma City, July 27. Members present, 13.

Voted to prepare Junior Program again for next year and apportion Juniors.

Mr. Whorton's resignation as Auditor was accepted and Mr. E. H. Rishel was eletced.

Voted to ask President of each Association to prepare a map of her Association, marking churches contributing to Woman's Mission Work, for use in the Annual Meeting.

Motion carried that Miss Howell have her reports, including also reports of Field Work, printed for distribution at Annual Meeting.

Miss Jayne was appointed Chairman of Committee on Recommendations due to Mrs. McBride's continued ill health.

The Fourth Quarterly Meeting was held at Enid, Nov. 14, 1910. Members present, 18.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RECOMMENDATION.

In view of the great spiritual blessings which have been ours, and the answers to prayer which we have witnessed, we would recommend:

First: A continuation of the noon hour of prayer, also a day or week of prayer at a suitable time during the year. We would recommend Thursday, January 5, 1911, as a special day of prayer for Woman's Work in Oklahoma, at which time our special petition shall be for larger enlistment of the young women of our churches in mission study, prayer and gifts.

Second: We would recommend that larger emphasis be placed on the use of Mission literature, State Programs, Mission study and traveling libraries, but not to the neglect of the season of prayer at each meeting for missions and mission workers.

Third: As Baptist women and as citizens of the State of Olkahoma, we rejoice in the recent victory achieved over King Alcohol, and do most heartily recommend to our women the exercise of the special privilege accorded us as wives, mothers and sisters in training the present and future voters of our fair state, so that the white banner of temperance may ever proclaim to the world that Oklahoma is striving to hasten the coming of the kingdom by leading not into temptation the men and boys of Oklahoma, and to use our influence in every way for "God and home and native land," and "to keep Oklahoma dry" now and evermore.

Fourth: We would recommend the holding of Associational women's meetings and institutes at Fifth Sunday meetings, and at other suitable times, for the instruction of the women of the churches.

Fifth: For our watchword for the coming year we would recommend the text, "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it." For our colors, yellew and brown is suggested, and for our flower for the year, the chrysanthemum.

Sixth: We would recommend that the Board employ a Field Worker for the coming year, and that they increase the salary of the Corresponding Secretary to \$50.00 per month, and that our apportionment for the coming year remain the same as last year, \$6,500, but that special effort be made to enlist the churches which have not given heretofore.

The President introduced Mrs. A. E. Reynolds of Chicago, Field Secretary of W. A. B. H. M. S., who gave an address on "Woman's Work in Home Missions" as effected through the Society she represents. She emphasized the value of the work among the negroes particularly in Spelman Seminary and Hartshorn Memorial College; also the school work in Mexico where she said the day school is the thing most needed. She told of the missionaries and their work in the West Indies; among the foreign-speaking people of the United States; the mission in Alaska; the work among the Orientals, the Mormons, and the Indians; closing with an appeal for personal service and consecration.

Miss Edith Campbell Crane who has grown dear to us through former visits was presented and spoke on "The Call for Efficiency." Miss Crane was a delegate to the World's Missionary Conference" in Edinburgh and her address included a valuable report of the conference. She told of its great call for efficiency, in its personnel, its purpose, its methods and in its spiritual depth and power. Among other calls for efficiency were mentioned the 1103 churches in Oklahoma with only 419 women's and children's societies—and these not perfected; the new State Program—a call for best efforts in working it out in local societies; the fact that the Foreign Mission Board received only 22 cents per member and the Home Board 11 cents per member, call for systematic proportionate giving. In prayer and in giving of life we have fallen far short. Spirituality costsit requires incessant unremitting effort to learn the lessons of God."

Adjournment to meet at 9:00 a.m. Closing prayer by Miss Crane.
