PASSING OF REV. J. W. JENNINGS

Rev. J. W. Jennings passed away at Pawhuska, Oklahoma, Sunday afternoon at two-thirty o'clock, September 27, 1925, in the sixty-third year of his age. The funeral service was conducted in the First Baptist Church of Pawhuska, at 2:30 p. m., Monday, September 28. His body was placed to rest near his old home in Texas. He is survived by his devoted wife, two sons, two daughters, his aged father, several grand children and a great host of sorrowing friends.

Brother Jennings served as a member of the State Board for about eighteen years.

# Constitution

#### ARTICLE 1—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers appointed by Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the Convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

#### ARTICLE III—OBJECTS

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This Convention is purely a co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the Churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all the denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

# ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall

hold their respective office until their successors are elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

# ARTICLE V-BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to appoint such Boards. Trustees and standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this Convention.

#### ARTICLE VI-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention and 20 other members who shall be chosen by the Convention, at the annual meeting.

Section 3. The Board shall in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

Section 3. This Board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

#### ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of this Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention, shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

### ARTICLE VIII-ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings, annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

#### ARTICLE IX-SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

#### ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board of Directors in its annual report, notice of change having been published two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

#### EXHIBIT "A-2"

#### OKLAHOMA BAPTIST ORPHANS HOME REPORT

Nov. 10th, 1925

As Superintendent of the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans Home I wish to bring before you the following report of the work and activities of the Home for the past eleven months.

During the past year God has blessed our Home in a wonderful way. We now have 142 fine boys and girls in the Home. Since January 1st, we have received 61 children and have dismissed from the Home 43, making a net gain of 18. The health of the children has been exceedingly good—no disease of any kind, no sickness worthy of mention. We lost one little girl with appendicitis.

Our children are doing fine work in school. We have nine in High School. Pearl Brooks graduated this year, and is now in the Baptist Hospital at Muskogee taking a Training Course.

We are taking special pains in looking after the religious and moral life of our children. The religious activities of the Home are as follows: Sunday School and Church every Sunday at Trinity Baptist Church, Prayer Meetings every Wednesday night, Daily Bible Reading every day, two B. Y. P. U.'s—one Intermediate and one Junior, one Training School, one W. M. U., one Snunbeam Band, one Junior Girls Auxiliary, one Junior Royal Ambassadors, one Intermediate Girls Auxiliary, one Intermediate Royal Ambassadors and one Young Womans Auxiliary.

The Womans Missionary Unions of the State have given exception ally fine co-operation through the year. Without their wonderful assistance we could not maintain our Home on the present standard. They have bought practically all the clothing for our children, amounting to \$7,248.80. Besides this they have given to the Home during the past year \$9.055.02 in Fruit, Chickens, Eggs, Linens, etc., making a total of \$16,303.82.

We, also, would not fail to mention the fine support given our Home by the Sunday Schools of the State. We have received from this source during the year a total of \$18,560.62. Without this support the Home could not live. If every Sunday School of the State would give us the one Sunday a month collection we would never have to go before a church with a special appeal.

In February of this year we lost our Dairy Barn, together with all of our feed and much of our machinery, by fire. The barn has been rebuilt. In addition we have re-constructed and rebuilt all lot and barn fences. We have, also, built a new milk house and butcher shop, repaired and put all three Heating Plants in operation. We have spent during the year \$3.829.63, for improvements and repairs, all of which are paid for. We need to re-decorate the interior of all the buildings. There has been none of this work done for several years and the inside of the buildings are in a bad condition. If we can raise the funds we expect to make these improvements this winter and spring.

The following is a financial stateemnt of all money received and disbursements inade for the past eleven months, which will not harmonize with the report shown in the Annual as this report covers a period of only eleven months:

# REPORT FOREIGN MISSIONS COMMITTEE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST CONVENTION MUSKOGEE, OKLAHOMA NOVEMBER 11, 1925

God has blessed our work abroad. Last year was a triumphant year. The fact that our missionaries baptized  $12{,}134$  people into the

membership of our churches on our foreign mission fields is an achievement which should set our hearts aglow with joy. In order to illustrate other triumphs, we quote here some paragraphs taken from some of the reports from the various fields to the Foreign Mission Board:

"This being the year of our Diamond Jubilee of our work in Africa, we look back with rejoicing and thanksgiving for all that God has done in this land. A great expansion has taken place during the last few years all over the country especially in the outlying districts. Much of this has been the result of Home Missionary effort on the part of the independent churches."

"Two years ago a Chilean Home Mission Board was organized to carry the Gospel into the frontier. The Board is composed of five missionaries and five Chileans named by the Convention, and administers the funds raised by the churches supplemented by an equal amount from the Richmond Board. During the past year they have supported three missionaries who are doing a great work in the regions beyond."

"Many feel and say that the anti-Christian movement in China has come too late. There is too large and strong an army of Christian men and women from the mission schools for such a movement to make much progress. It is true that Christianity thrives on persecution. Our Christian people are rising up and showing where they stand. Well written English articles by Chinese who have been educated in mission schools are apperaing in the newspapers in highest praise of missionaries and their work."

"Our China Baptist Publication Society is one phase of our Foreign Mission enterprise which serves every phase of our work and contributes in a vital way to every department of our church life."

"This year (1924) has been the best in the Italian Mission since the outbreak of the World War. The largest number of baptisms ever reported in our Mission consoles us no little. Two hundred and fourteen new members baptized into Christ and a large number of inquiries for 1925 make us more hopeful for the future. Last year we had twice as many baptisms per members as either Virginia or Georgia had, while the difficulties are immensely greater. This represents an increase of 64 per cent over 1923."

Establish April 11, 1926, with 105 students and a teaching force of 12, the Willingham Memorial School for Boys at Fukuoka, Japan, has grown until we have today a school with three departments, viz: Middle School, College and Theological Seminary, with a total enrollment of 635 students and more than fifty teachers."

"The religious life finds experssion in the Gethsemane Band, two B. Y. P. U. regular Bible study in the class room, special Bible classes, street preaching, mission Sunday Schools in nearby mining towns, night schools and special work among the social outcasts. The work is all carried on by the students under the supervision of some of the teachers. The school has its own church and Sunday School, and the dormitory boys are required to attend the services. Good meetings were held from time to time during the year and sixteen of the students received baptism."

"It makes us sad to be forced to turn from such triumphs as these to call attention to the embarrassment our Foreign Mission Board is now experiencing on account of the failure of the churches to support it properly."

The board reported to the last Southern Baptist Convention a debt

of \$1,250,000.00. This debt came through no extravagance on the part of the Board. In fact the Board has been cutting its appropriations severely for the last three years, and is now holding back more than one hundred volunteers who are ready to go to the front. It has also denied for two years any additioned equipment to the missionaries. This debt grew because our Baptist people are not giving adequately. The large program of the Board cannot be maintained upon the amounts they are now giving.

We therefore as your committee recommend that the churches put on the 1925-26 program. Let the churches make the Every Member Canvas, and support the large program including all the interests fostered by the Southern Baptist and our Foreign Mission Board will be cared for along with all the others. The practical and the effective thing for the churches to do is to put on the 1926 Program NOW. In co-operating with our brethren we will serve and strengthen our foreign mission enterprise.

In addition to the above it now appears from a statement just submitted by our Foreign Mission Board to this Association showing, that notwinstanding every possible effort has been made to reduce administrative expenditures, and at the same time with steadily decreasing appropriations for the work, the debt for the past two years has gradually increased until it has reached the appalling sum of \$1,813,000.

It is further evident that this sad condition of affairs has been brought about by steadily decreasing contributions on the part of the Baptists of the South to this great work. The Board now faces the alternative of either receiving promptly large contributions, or the closing dwon of a number of the missions and the withdrawal of missionaries, which would surelyprove disastrous to all of our own missionary undertakings, as also to the cause of Christian missions generally.

We therefore, as your committee heartily approve of, and urge you to accept, the request of the Foreign Mission Board that Sunday, December twenty-seventh, next, be set apart by all the churches of our Stare for the presentation to our people of the graet cause of Foreign Missions, and the pressing and critical needs of the Foreign Mission Board at the present time, and agree that at that time to endeavor to secure special contributions for the relief of said Board.

And further, that we hereby pledge our loyal support to the carrying out of this program under the leadership of the Executive Officers of this Convention as also that of the Officers and members of th Forign Mission Board.

# EXHIBIT "C"

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Luke 6:43-45; Jer. 17:7-8. The right of a denomination to an existence is found in their loyalty to God. They should be the salt of the earth—the light of the world. As such the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma desires to express the will and wishes of Jesus Christ and His gospel; to interpret to this state and to the world the Baptist, Bible conception of the church and its mission; and to justify the existence of Baptist Christianity with its manifold activities and institutions. As such it is the servant and the cumulative expression of its individual churches.

We come to this Convention in the midst of turmoil; turmoil that is political, commercial, social, educational and religious. When human agencies fail the world turns their eyes to God and His Church for deliverance. When unprecedented catastrophies and calamities bear down upon the human race, they turn their eyes to the hills from whence our strength cometh. Surely man's extremity is God's opportunity. For that reason the Church and its agencies need to be continuously so close to the Holy Spirit of God that they can surely interpret the Divine will to a non-plussed world.

Upon us devolves a studendous stewardship. Upon us rests a fearful responsibility. From us should come the interpretation of the Divine plans through which humanity is extricated from its hopeless condition. We are God's human go-betweens. He has chosen through the foolishness of preaching to save those who believe. (1 Cor. 1:21.)

Our Baptist task lies out before us with the most awe-inspiring responsibilities that have ever weighted the shoulders of the stewards of God. Without Divine leadership and loyal service only the blackness of darkness awaits our future. Upon the threshold of this Convention we need to be burdened beyond human endurance and thus driven to our Great Leader and Deliverer, whose wisdom alone is equal to our task.

#### I. OUR STEWARDSHIP IN ACCOMPLISHMENT.

We now want to look at the work of the year just closing and give an account of our stewardship to date.

- 1. Our Benevolent Enterprise. We are operating the Orphans' Home, the Muskogee and Miami Hospitals, aiding the Hospital at New Orleans and the Relief and Annuity Board.
- (1) The Orphans' Home. The death of Rev. H. J. Ridings over a year ago threw the responsibility for detail upon the Secretary of this Board, who was also Superintendent of the Home and so burdened him that other enterprises had to suffer while he was looking after one institution. Thus, at our Board Meeting in December he was relieved of the Orphans' Home Superintendency and Rev. E. A. Howard was elected to that position. The results of the year will in every way justify the action. Brother Howard is admirably adapted to this sort of work and he has saved the Home several times his salary this year. His report will speak for itself eloquently.
- (2) Our Muskogee Hospital has had a wonderful year. They have apid off the mortgage indebtedness against their nurses' home and purchased an additional lot which greatly enhances the value of the hospital property. They have a negro annex in white they render medical aid to a class of our citizens that can be won to better lives through white cooperation. I want to especially mention the going of Miss Pearl Brooks from the Orphans' Home to this Hospital as a student nurse. The religious influence of this institution is very fine. Mr. Filson conducts a Bible class every week for the nurses. Supt. and Mrs. David Furry live in the Nurses' Home and are as a father and mother to the girls.
- (3) The Miami Hospital reports its most successful year. They have had a balance in the treasury and look out hopefully into the future for increasing financial victories. Supt. London's report shows very encouraging progress.
- (4( We aid the New Orleans Hospital enterprise as a Southwide Institution. It is built in the strongest Roman Catholic center in America. Supt.

Bristow is a great business man and is managing this new enterprise in a splendid fashion. They have the sympathy and support of the City of New Orleans.

- (5) Our Relief and Annuity Board is caring for 42 old ministers and their wives in Oklahoma. Their present stipend is very small but we have begun a great move in the right direction. We should relieve this Board by paying in full the indebtedness we owe them this year.
- 2. Our Educational Responsibilities. The religion of Jesus Christ is always intellectually stimulating. It joined battle with the culture of Greece and after centuries of struggle it won. It succeeded the Renaissance and built upon an intellectual chaos the glories of modern culture. We are now in a death grapple with rationalism and our battle must be won in the intellectual arena. Christian educational ideals run counter to those of the world which are essentially Pagan.
- (1) In Oklaohma Baptist University we have an opportunity afforded very few states. Only one school on which the entire denomination centers its interest and bestows its gifts. How we need to arise in this unique condition and build one of the greatest educationa linstitutions in Baptist annals. The report of Dr. Lawrence will show in detail the wonderful progress of this institution.
- (2) The Southwide Educational Institutions, embracing the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and the Training School in Louisvill, Ky.; the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Training School at Seminary Hill, Texas, and the Baptist Bible Institute at New Orleans, La., are our institutions which deal with theological and practical religious education. Here our ministry, missionaries and experts in divergent religious activities receive their training.
- 3. Our Massionary Activities. The most vital growth of a denomination centers around its local churches. Their ministers, services, ordinances and tasks are in fulfillment of the New Testament requirements for Christian progress. All institutions and enterprises of the denomination should be secondary to and for the more efficient progress of the New Testament Churches. The so-called missionary tasks are those that actually and rimarily further the real operation of the Great Commission in its first hand activities.
- (1) Foreign Missions deals with the world beyond our immedate reach. As they cannot adequately and economically be carried on by each local church, we stand as a denomination in proclaiming the Gospel to the world. Our great Board is ensirouded in gloom as they look out into an uncertain mist and feel for sure ground. Their debt must be lifted or their spirit will be crushed. The downfall of the Foreign Mission Board would mean denominational disintergration and death. We must arise in a mighty way and shake off the crushing load so that our Lord may be glorified in our efforts at world evangelization.
- (2) Home Missions stands almost in as serious a plight as the Foreign Board. The unified development of the great South rests upon the progress and leadership of the Home Board. Oklahoma was developed out of a wanton wilderness through Home Mission money, when there was no other possible agency through which we could come to our place of supremacy. The Home Board still has great and crushing problems that no other agency is or ever will be able to grapple with. No state owes more to Home Missions than Oklahoma.
- 3. State Missions embraces a group of activities in Oklahoma that have vitally affected its citizenship. We co-operate with associations in the

support of their missionaries. We aid weak churches in the support of their pastors. We supported four district enlistment men who covered the entire state. At this, writing only Rev. G. R. Naylor remains on the field. But this force will be enlarged during the coming year so as to have men supported by our state who will give their entire time to helping weak churches in whatever way they need help. We also have a Women's Work department, a Sunday School Department, a B. Y. P. U. department and a missionary to the Indians. The work of these departments will be reported elsewhere. I wish to say that Rev. G. Lee Phelps has done good work in his field this year. Renewed evangelistic fervor seems to possess the Indians now. Rev. David Cooper, a Choctaw, is developing into an outstanding evangelist. There is a renewed interest on the part of country churches just now. Seven years ago Rev. Lyman Coker became pastor of Corbett Church. This church is ten or twelve miles from the railroad, in the open country. When he became pastor they had 43 members. They were out of harmony with the Convention work, were lifeless and listless. At the Association this year they reported 327 members, have called Brother Coker for full time and they are considering the building of a modern Country Church plant as an outstanding example and inspiration to our many undeveloped country opportunities. They made offerings to the Co-operative Program and the Orphans' Home this year.

- (4) Our Messenger Book House has become the property conpointly of the Baptist General Convention and the Baptist Sunday School Board. Thus our book business now—one of the greatest if not the greatest in the south—forms a part of a wonderful denomination business mreger, the advantages of which can be plainly seen.
- (5) The Baptist Messenger has passed through a year of progress. Its financial report is the most encouraging ever presented to our Convention. Editor Stealey is to be commended for his ability and business acumen in his exacting efforts here. Reports from both the Book House and the Messenger as given by Dr. Stealey will furnish food for thought and facts for encouragement.
- (6) This year the Oklahoma Baptist Assembly was placed under the management of Mr. T. H. Farmer owing to the request of the Secretary that he be relieved of it. Brother Farmer has handled the finances in a satisfactory manner and has reduced the indebtedness about \$1,000.00. Besides the financial improvement the Assembly was probably the greatest from standpoint of attendance we have ever held. It was also of such a character and spirit as to be peak for next year a larger attendance than this.
- (7) The Baptist Building is now carrying a loan of only \$16,500.00 at 6 per cent interest. Since last report it was found necessary to increase the office space so as to allow room for Rev. E. A. Howard, the new Superintendent of the Orphans' Home. Thus the Secretary's office was moved to the second floor and the crowded condition somewhat relieved. We have held many meetings in the Hall and served noon meals one week during the Sunday School Training School in the City Churches. Here the Baptist Pastor's Conference meets every Monday morning and many other missionary and religious gatherings are held.

# II. OUR STEWARDSHIP IN DEVELOPMENT.

We face now the problem of the future upon this resume of its accomplishments of the past.

1. The Baptist Student Union is operating in our state and held a splendid meeting in Ada, Oklahoma, October 9-11th. They are dealing with the student situation and coming to a place of prominence and power as they find their real task. Their work in Oklahoma is heartily supported by both the O.B.U. and the State School forces in our Baptist chupches. They are requesting a secretary appointed by our Board and while we believe this impossible in our present financial condition we express our confidence in their work and promise our co-operation and friendship to their great activity.

- 2. Our Laymen's Movement has been given impetus also through the coming of Mr. J. H. Anderson of Knoxville, Tennessee who toured our state in the interest of men enlistment, and in stressing tithing. One hundred and one promised to tithe as a result of this tour. State Chairman, J. E. George of Enid, has been tireless in his efforts and the prospects for Laymen enlistment are brightening. They also are urging a secretary and asking the Board to put one on the field this coming year. But this also appears impractical at the present juncture. Mr. L. A. Ellison of Ada, Oklahoma has been elected as Associate Secretary with Dr. J. T. Henderson in the Laymen's Missionary Movement of the Southern Baptist Convention and has established headquarters at Little Rock, Arkansas. He has entered into his labors and gives prospects of great success in this work. We commend him to the confidence of the Brotherhood and urge that you seek his aid in your Laymen's Movement.
- 3. Our Associational Work presents a grave problem. Very few Associations are now supporting missionaries. They lack vitality. They are not doing the Missionary work of former years. They appear to be facing a new day. We recommend to the leading pastors in our various associations the most serious consideration of this matter. The Northwestern Baptist Association has decided to put on a Campaign to become A-1 according to Dr. Aldredge's standard as published in the tract entitled "The District Association." We are hopefully looking to their effort as the first step in Oklahoma to the revitalizing of Associational life.
- 4 Our Campaign for Christian Education last year netted \$4,280.27 for endowment for O. B. U. This fund is placed with the Secretary looking to a permanent investment plan that will protect the money with the greatest security. This fund is invested by the Board of Directors and the interest is to be turned over to the University for their use. We recommend that this plan agreed upon between th University Board of Trustees and the Board of Directors be continued.
- 5. Believing the experience of the past three years has justified the wisdom of the policy adopted at that time, we recommend the continuation of the policy then established of requesting the Boards of Trustees of the various institutions to borrow any money to meet their emergencies upon the signatures of the Boards of Trustees of the institution involved, only after permission is granted and consent given by the Board of Directors to the transaction.

## III. OUR STEWARDSHIP IN SETTLEMENT.

Our denominational movements are handicapped or liberated according to the degree of our liberality. We are grateful to be able to report decreasing indebtedness annually.

This shows a healthy decrease of \$111,998.80 up to the close of the books this year from the highest peak of indebtedness. 1924 showed a slight increase over 1923 but that year we purchased the Baptist Bullding for \$27,000.00 which debt will be retired out of what we would have paid

out in rents. The indebtedness within the last year has been decreased \$52,571.97.

The entire indebtedness including Oklahoma Baptist University, Miami Hospital and all other denominational obligations total at this time \$270,686.32.

2. The 75 Million and 1925 Program funds have come in as follows during the same period for the year ending:

Thus we see that the lowest year was that ending October 31st, 1923. We have started on the up grade and this year received \$8,731.35 more than the previous year, and \$12,358.41 more than in the lowest year. This indication is good though the mauont of increase is small.

3. As a supplemental report we have received on the 1925 Program from November 1st to noon of the 11th, \$6,271.50. We are therefore thankful to God for slightly increased gifts and considerably reduced indebtedness this year.

## IV. RECOMMENDATIONS.

- 1. We heartily endorse the Stewardship and Budget method of raising our finances, believing it to be Scriptural, economical and business like. We believe its methods are applicable to city and country churches alike. The double Budget is highly recommended in preference to the single because of its actual worth proven after years of experience with it. We urge upon all our churches and pastors the adoption of tithing and its presentation through sermons and otherwise to all our people.
- 2. There are country churches who do not believe they can successfully budget. We recommend that such as passess that conviction give at least four offerings a year—one a quarter to the Co-operative Program until such time as they are convinced they can operate on the budget basis.
- 3. We recommend Budget Week, December 6-13th to all our churches who have not an earlier date to budget. Later will cause the loss of the first weeks of the new year and no plan will prove satisfactory that does not complete the Cahmpaign before the date it is supposed to begin operating.
- 4. We recommend the continuation of the pro ratas as they are operating at this time in the State. They are as follows:

5. The Efficiency Committee will present a supplemental report that will embody the most vital recommendations that this Convention has faced in years. This supplemental report is most heartily approved by the Board of Directors as it is presented to you for your consideration.

Religion is composed of human and divine systems. The philosophy of the human religious system defies man and reduces God from a personality to an influence. No religion can be essentially divine unless it's God is a conscious, intelligent, dynamic, living personality. Such is the Baptist interpretation of the Trinity. The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are persons. Such an intelligent God has given an infallible guide in the Bible, His verbally inspired revelation to man. It portrays a loving Father, a sacrificing son and a powerful leader in the person of the Holy Spirit.

The Baptist task is to proclaim this complete gospel to the whole world. Out into its sin and despair is thrust the word of life. It sets up its standards in the midst of human opposition and criticism. It endures persecution, it loves its enemies, it preaches the blood. Before it religious systems fall, and year after year it battles on through the intrigues of its enemies. It battles on through the apathy of its friends. It does not weary in well doing. It faces positions that appear impregnable. But in the din of the conflict it hears its great Master say: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation." Mk. 16:15. As He speaks they no longer hear the criticisms, the intrigue, the oppositions of their enemies. They see a brow crownd with thorns, they see hands and feet pierced with nail prints, they see the side pierced with the fearful Roman spear. He stands intently watching His little band of servants. Some are fighting, some are wavering, some are retreating. He stands on an eminence where all can see. The thorn-crowned brow arises in majestic greatness, the nail pierced hands are stretched victoriously above that thorn crowned brow. What a contrast with what they have seen. They have seen bickering, strife, dissension and selfishness. But now their eyes rest upon their heroic but suffering Master. Oh, was a vision of bravery and dauntless courage. His clear voice rings out again His command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation." They waver a moment, then fall upon their knees. New courage possesses the wavering soldier. With a new vision of his captain and his Savior, he turns a dauntless face to his foe and presses the battle with renewed vigor and fury for the Christian conquest of a dying world.

Arise, Of Oklahoma Baptist, the captain of your salvation calleth. Put on the whole armor of God. Your Captain calls you to the conquest of the world. Hear Him as with prophetic grandeur He calls the gospel prophet of the Old Testament: "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" Then see that prophet stand and say: "Here am I, send me."

Oklahoma Baptists, arise in your might. That thorn crowned Savior is yours. Those nailed pierced hands are the hands of your Savior. That

sweet, but blood stained face is looking at you. That wonderful command is directed to you. It is the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to whom He is calling, calling, calling. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to the whole creation." God give us grace to arise as one man and say: "Here am I, send me."

## REPORT OF THE EFFICIENCY COMMITTEE.

The financia embarrassment of the Board of Directors had greatly hindered the work of our Denomination for the past year. It has been a serious problem facing every meeting of the Board, has consumed a large portion of the State Secretary's Time, and greatly hindered him in the work he is anxious to do. It has forced retrenchment to a serious and alarming degree. This embarrassment comes at a time when we are presented with the greatest opportunity in all the history of our beloved denomination. Every department of the work shows remarkable results, and the fields were never more inviting.

The Efficiency Committee was appointed by the State Board for the purpose of making a survey of our conditions, financially and otherwise; to find some method of relieving our financial embarrassment; and make recommendations to this Convention on the policies, organization and methos for the work of the denomination during the year.

## Conditions.

Your committee has endeavored to make careful investigation and out facts concerning our denomination, unpleasant as well as pleasant. And the investigation established the following facts:

#### 1. Our total indebtedness is as follows:

The indebtedness on the Oklahoma City Hospital includes the notes owed on the Hospital when it was sold and outstanding bills. The Miami Hospital indebtedness on running expense before 1925. The indebtedness on the Muskogee Hospital is money spent for the original property. (There is no indebtedness for operating expense.) Indebtedness against State Missions is the old overdraft which has been carried for some years, and gradually reduced for the past three years. The indebtedness against the Baptist Orphans Home is a balance due on the two buildings finished during Dr. McConnell's administration. The indebtedness against the Baptist Building of Oklahoma City is a balance due on property bought for \$27,000.00 and now valued at \$40,000.00. The indebtedness of Oklahoma Baptist University includes the \$54,000.00 of bonded indebtedness, \$520.00 accrued interest and \$25,000.00 payable.

2. The total assets or value of property owned by this Convention is \$790.939.89. This value represents the following property:

- 3. We have only one general missionary on the field and the Board is unable to make necessary supplements for Missionary Pastors and Associational Missionaries.
- 4. We are in need of a revival in denominational loyalty and mission zeal. Many of our people are unenlisted and must be informed on mission work and denominational activities before we can overcome this condition.
- 5. The Associational organizations are not functioning as they should and as they must if we are to experience denominational efficiency and success. Denominational Efficiency must wait for church and Associational efficiency and we feel that the time has come for placing the emphasis where it belongs.

## PROGRESS OF THE COMMITTEE.

After finding conditions as above described and spending two days in council and prayer, your committee has decided—(1) that all indebtedness of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma should be pooled and paid off by a "debt paying movement." (2) That a budget of \$200,-000.00 should be adopted by this Convention to be raised for operating (3) That the budget of \$200,000.00 should be expenses the coming year. apportioned to the Associations and churches and that the Associational Organizations be requested to co-operate with the State office in bringing the apportionments to the attention of the churches for adoption. Churches are urged to accept their apportionments and notify the State office before the Annual meeting in December. (4) That the State Board should adopt a vigorous and more general policy of co-operating with week churches in securing Missionary Pastors. (5) That there should be elected by the State Board two or more strong men as Evangelists and that we should continue to put strong emphasis on Evangelism in every department of the work, that there should also be elected four General Missionaries.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

Your committee recommends the adoption of the following plan for liquidating all indebtedness of this Convention during the coming year:

First. That we launch a special "debt paying movement" for the purpose of raising money with which to pay off the entire indebtedness of the Convention during the next Conventional year.

Second. That a special committee be created to have charge of this task to be known as the "Debt paying movement committee" that this

Committee be composed of one member from each of the Boards of this Convention and four additional members from the State at large to be appointed by this Convention; that this committee shall be instructed to outline plans for the raising of the debts, select and employ a director for the task if deemed necessary, and to vigorously prosecute the undertaking to its successful conclusion. Committee to be composed of the following brethren: Andrew Potter, A. N. Hall, J. F. Robinson, Dr. W. W. Phelan, W. S. Spears, W. W. Chancellor, Elmer Ridgeway, J. W. Bruner and J. B. Wilhoyte.

Third. That the money raised on the debts be sent to the headquarters office in Oklahoma City and that the Corresponding Secretary be instructed to make payments on the debts as the money is received, thereby stopping the payment of interest.

Fourth. That the net proceeds after expenses have been distributed to the various objects on a pro-rata basis, each cause and interest participating in proportion to its indebtedness as compared to the whole indebtedness of the Denomination, provided however, that all designated gifts go as designated over and above the pro-rated distribution.

Five. That the offering on December 27th for Foreign Missions be made a part of this task and pushed vigorously and that no other special campaign be launched during this period.

Six. That we instruct all Boards and agents of the Convention not to incur other debts except for current expenses until instructed by this Convention and request that all debts for current expenses be reported to this Convention each year.

- 2. That the selection of the Evangelists and General Men above referred to be left to the Board of Directors and that the Board of Directors be left unhampered and without embarrassment by any other recommendation of this Convention concerning the selection of men for putting over the Denominational Program of the coming year. This recommendation is made by your committee because of the feeling that numerous details unthought of at this time will be brought to the attention of the Board during the progress of our program, and the Board may find it necessary to make some changes in the General Organization of its work.
- 3. We further endorse and recommend for adoption, the report of the Committee on enlargement and endowment of Oklahoma Baptist University which report is in words and figures as follows:

First. We recommend: That a campaign for One Million Dollars, be launched to be divided; \$500,000.00 for Endowment; \$500,000.00 for Enlargement, Equipment, and Scholarships, provided however that of the funds raised a minimum of \$300,000.00 shall be placed to Endowment. And provided further that nothing herein shall interfere with the W. M. U. Campaign to raise \$100,000.00 for a Girls' Dormitory which is to be considered a part of the Million Dollar Campaign.

Second. We further recommend that the management and direction of the Campaign for Enlargement, equipment and Endowment of O. B. U. be entrusted to Dr. J. B. Lawrence, president of the University as director, and special committee. Said committee to be composed of the Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist General Convention, two members of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University to be appointed by said Board, Corresponding Secretary and one member of the W. M. U.

Board, said number to be selected by the Board, and the Chairman of the Laymen's organization in Oklahoma.

And we further recommend that Dr. J. B. Lawrence be requested to resign the care of the First Baptist Church of Shawnee and devote his entire time to the University and the direction of the campaign.

Third. We recommend that all denominational agencies including the Corresponding Secretary, Secretary of S. S. work, B. Y. P. U. work, W. M. U. Secretary, Laymen's Organization and all state workers and the Baptist Messenger be instructed to assist in every possible way in the campaign to complete the task which we have undertaken. And we urge all pastors and churches to assist in every way possible in this campaign.

We recommend, however, that active solicitation of funds for enlargement and Endowment, except the W. M. U. Campaign to be postponed until after the meeting of the next State Sonvention. (Committee.—C. C. Hatchett, G. M. Barrett, F. B. Thorn, W. W. Chancellor and O. M. Swaim.)

Fourth. That in order to care for the immediate needs of the "debt" paying movement we recommend that the Efficiency Committee be continued until the meeting of the State Board to be held in December.

# EXHIBIT "E"

### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, in the Spring of 1917, F. M. McConnell, the then Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and acting on and in behalf of the said Convention, did enter into negotiation with James F. Robinson of Miami, Oklahoma, looking to the building and operating in Miami, Oklahoma, of a Baptist Hospital, which after completion was to be delivered to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for its maintenance and operation.

AND, WHEREAS, the said General Convention did through its said Corresponding Secretary cause to be written to the said James F. Robinson on April 30th, 1917, a letter setting forth in general terms the policy of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in the building, maintenance and operation of its hospitals in said state, a copy of said letter being as follows:

# "BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF OKLAHOMA"

Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, April 30, 1917.

Mr. Jas. F. Robinson, Miami, Oklahoma. Dear Sir:—

Referring to our recent conversation about the management of our hospitals will say that the following are the rules or principle governing us in the conduct of these institutions.

- 1. Their purpose being solely to care for suffering humans, no person is ever allowed to make any profit, or gain, out of them; or to receive any amount of money from them except for services rendered for necessary equipment or supplies.
- 2. There is no discrimination in treament permitted to be shown for, or against, any patient, doctor, nurse or visiting friend on account of church affiliation or any kind of religious belief. While these institutions are Baptist in management their service and benefits are offered to all on absolutely equal terms.
- 3. All reputable physicians, practicing medicine or surgery according to the laws of the state, are treated exactly alike regardless of religion or the number of patients they may bring to the institution. The management and nurses stand ready to give every physician the fullest cooperation to bring about the recovery of his patients.
- 4. All profits from our hospitals, above a strictly economical administration, are either used in caring for the poor treated in the institutions, or else put into enlargement or to secure the completest, most up-to-date scientific equipment.
- 5. A board of trustees from the city, town or immediate section where the institution is located has charge of its management and co-operates with out state boards in all things looking to its efficiency and improvement.
- 6. In taking charge of a hospital we appreciate full well the great responsibility we assume and we pledge ourselves and our people to per-

petuate it as an institution, carrying on the gracious work for which it was founded according to the will and purpose of its founders.

If I can be of any service to you in any way in establishing such an enterprise, command me.

AND, WHEREAS, after the receipt of above letter the said James F. Robinson and George L. Coleman and other citizens of Miami, Oklahoma and in the vicinity thereof, relying upon the representations made in said letter and with the understanding that when completed said hospital would be taken over and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in accordance with said representations, did subscribe and give large sums of money which were used in the erection of said hospital and the furnishing and equipping of same, and in addition thereto the securing of a nurse's home and the furnishing and equipping of same.

AND, WHEREAS, said hospital and nurses' home so completed, equipped and furnished at a cost of\$150,000.00 were turned over to said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma free of all debts and encumberance, and were duly accepted by said convention as set forth in a resolution adopted by it in its annual meeting in the fall of 1917, mention of which is to be found in its annual minutes of said year.

AND, WHEREAS, said hospital has been operated by said convention from that time down to the present and in so operating it, it has incurred obligations and indebtedness in the sum of \$23,702.19.

AND, WHEREAS, the said James F. Robinson and George L. Coleman have executed a good and sufficient deed to said hospital and nurses' home conveying the same to the said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and have tendered same to said convention, a copy of said deed being hereto attached and marked "Exhibit A."

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma that said deed so tendered is accepted this date, and the said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in accepting said deed agrees to the general policy erpressed in the letter above quoted and further agrees to assume and pay the outstanding obligations of said institution at this date.

# WARRANTY DEED

# KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That G. L. Coleman and Jessie E. Coleman, his wife, and J. F. Robinson and Kittie Robinson, his wife, parties of the first part, in consideration of the sum of one dollar and other valuable considerations, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, do by these presents grant, bargain, sell and convey unto Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, party of the second part, and its successors, all of the following described real property and premises situated in Ottawa County, State of Oklahoma, to-wit:

Lots Seventeen (17), Eighteen (18), Nineteen (19), Twenty (20), Twenty-one (21), Twenty-two (22), Twenty-three (23), Twenty-four (24), Twenty-five (25) and the North 15 feet of Lot Twenty-six (26), all in Block One Hundred and Five (105), in the City of Miami, according to the original plat thereof, and all of the fur-

nishings, and equipment and supplies now in use by and belonging to Miami Baptist Hospital, located on the foregoing described property,

together with all improvements thereon and the appurtenances thereto belonging, and warrant the title to the same.

This conveyance is made and accepted on the following express conditions:

First: The grantee and its successors agree to operate and maintain forever at its own expense said property so conveyed for Baptist Hospital and nurse home use and no other.

Second: The grantee and its successors agree that said property shall be so operated and managed with the sole view of serving humanity in the community in which said hospital is located and Oklahoma at large, and not for profit.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said described premises unto said party of the second part, and its successors, forever, free, clear, discharged of and from all former grants, titles, charges, judgments, taxes, mort gages and other liens and incumbrances of whatsoever nature.

First of all, we wish to say, we believe that the good hand of our God has rested upon us and we are grateful for His unfailing grace. The paper has been splendidly supported by the cooperation of brethren and sisters everywhere. During the 14 years of our connection with the paper in Oklahoma the cooperation on the part of many has been fine. Last year it was the best up to that time,but this year has surpassed all others in hearty support and cooperation on the part of the brother-hood generally.

Our receipts are slightly above those of last year and this notwithstanding we have put forth much less effort in collecting money this year than we did last. We are glad to report that our subscription list is above 7,000, and while it should be double that number, when we compare it with the per capita circulation of Baptist papers generally, it is probably above the average.

We call attention to the fact that the Corresponding Secretary is not limited in his use of the paper and that a page each week is devoted to the W. M. U., S. S., and B. Y. P. U. Departments with news items generally from O. B. U. and the Orphans' Home. In addition to this the Editorial utterances support our program with sincerity and earnestness.

We believe that the major emphasis of the paper should be given to the 1926 program and the debt paying campaign, especially for the immediate future. The women and young people have had 781 mission study classes this year. They have been actively engaged in many forms of Personal Service work, visiting sick, sewing for orphans and hospitals; raising and dispensing flowers for good cheer; caring for needy ministers and educating worthy young people. During the year we have welcomed into our family 245 new organizations, making a total of 930 societies. Can we truly sing praises in our hearts when so few of the nearly 1200 Churches in Oklahoma are really teaching Missions. There are 486 Churches that have at least one organization of our Graded Union, give thanks for these which are in the most strategic points as to population, and realize that when other pastors and churches catch the world wide vision in spirit and in truth they too will recognize the absolute necessity of Missionary training, not only for adults, but particularly for our girls and boys, if we are to hasten the coming of the Kingdom. The outstanding task for W.M.U. at present is the building of the Memorial Dormitory for O. E. U.

Orphans Home: The children of our Home are adopted by the societies and all are well cared for. Each childs measurement and a list of needs are sent in the Spring and Fall and our women take great delight in supplying the needs. They not only send clothing but many coops of chickens, cases of eggs, fresh and canned fruit, linen and plenty of nice warm quilts. The donations sent this year by the Missionary Societies amount to \$15.082.85.

Contributions: This year we have given through the Churches to the 1925 program, \$56,573.17; to local work \$38,951.00; to Miscellaneous causes, \$2,471.00; to W.M.U. Speciars \$7.108.66; to District and associational expense \$529.00; Orphans Home, \$15,082.85, making a grand total of \$121,520.10, and an increase over last years gifts of \$19,916.10. Our women have given more than our records show since in many instances, all church gifts are recorded as a whole. We lift our hearts in thankfulness to our Heavenly Father for the success attending our efforts, but most of all are we grateful for the lessons learned from the undertaking. We have been made to realize in Oklahoma the bigness of little things for not one of our gifts have been in the large class. Our sympathies have been quickened, our love has been strengthened and our faith made firmer, our vision has been broadened until we can say from the depths of our hearts, let the whole earth be filled with His glory.

In our W.M.U. Convention we voted to adopt the plan outlined by the Foreign Board for the Liquidation of the debt by the Christmas Love Offering. We rejoice in the action taken by the Baptist General Convention in this matter victoriously then let us all work together for a Christmas clearing of the Debt, earnestly remembering the five points of Star.

# ANNUAL REPORT

of

# STATE B.Y.P.U. DEPARTMENT

#### Introductory remarks:

The first part of the nineteenth century was marked by the Sunday This was followed in 1851 by the or-School movement in America. ganization of the Y.M.C.A. in the United States. Many other efforts in behalf of the young people were being made outside the churches. preachers and church leaders would not have much to do with the young people's organization because those organizations made use of the social It was thought by religionists that fun was of the devil, therefore, it was not until 1881 that sporadic efforts were crystallized into an organization known as the Christian Eudeavor and was founded by a Congregational Minister of Portland, Maine, Dr. Francis E. Clark introduced his newly organized Young People's organization and claimed for it all young people of all denominations. It being designed for all denominations, was forced to use inter-denominational literature. Baptists soon saw that this organization would unearth all Baptist principles, and therefore busied themselves to perfect an organization that would emphasize Baptist's Doctrines and train its individual members in "Training in Church Membership." In 1890 the Baptists of the United States and Canada met in Convention at Chicago and organized the Baptist Young People's Union of America which bid fair to solve the problem, but proved a failure when those in charge decided on a policy of "Cultural Development" for which leadership and it was for that reason that the B. Y. P. U. as auxiliary of the Southern Baptist Convention was formed in 1896. Dressed in its swaddling cloth it moved to advance against considerable opposition on the part of those who had not come to see the need for such an organization. But the Baptist Young People's Organization came to stand and therefore could not be defeated by unorganized indifference of those who were its enemies. The following figures show the remarkable growth of the B.Y.P.U. in the South:

"One of the most striking phases of our work and indeed of the denomination's work is the development of the Baptist Young People's Union in the last six years. The latest figures are not only interesting, but encouraging. There are now 17,665 B.Y.P.U.'s with an enrollment of 546,193, a gain during the last year of 1,646 Unions and 51,044 members. This enrollment equals about one-sixth of our entire membership. The growth of the educational work is gratifying. Our young people are becoming acquainted with our Baptist Principles and informed about our Baptist work. No single aspect of our denominational life is more encouraging than our work along B.Y.P.U. folks."

# OKLAHOMA BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE ARE DOING THEIR BIT.

Our Rural B.Y.P.U. and Sunday School Campaign.

Our B.Y.P.U. and Sunday School Rural Workers cause us to marvel as we take inventory of the superb co-operative work that have accomplished as they served the eleven Associations, participating in the generous offer made Oklahoma by the Baptist Sunday School Board. These workers issued 338 Senior B.Y.P.U. Diplomas, 367 Senior Seals, 78 Intermediate Diplomas and 24 Seals, 90 Junior Diplomas and 24 Seals; or a total of 921 awards for the 56 months work or an average of five months to the rural Worker. They organized 19 adult, 19 Senior, 10 intermediate, 8 Junior and 3 Story-Telling-Hour B.Y.P.U.'s. Mailed out 4.129 B. Y.P.U. letters, \$83 Circular letters, 101.549 B.Y.P.U. tracts. ers report 142 Tithers enlisted, 1577 people enrolled in 87 B.Y.P.U. classes that were taught by themselves. Monthly reports show 144 days worked by each worker or a total of 1,581 days spent in the work during the year. They delivered 1162 addresses, 157 on B.Y.P.U. work, 151 on Sunday School and 854 on Education, W.M.U. and other Denominational lines. 118 Baptists and 75 additions to the churches by letter, and 43 volunteers called out. This work has been carried on at approximately a cost of Therefore, Oklahoma has only used approximately \$4,500.00 \$9,000.00. of the \$7,500.00 offered by the Sunday School Board for Rural Campaign B.Y.P.U. and Sunday School work. We take this opportunity to thank the Baptist Sunday School Board, the Associational Boards and the following workers who have labored earnestly that the Master's voice might be heard by the Baptists of Oklahoma:

# OUR OKLAHOMA BAPTIST ASSEMBLY

Our own Falls Creek is out of its swaddling clothes and bids fair to become one of the largest attended as well as best equipped Assemblies in the confines of the Southern Baptist Convention. We have sold lots to private persons who have erected some thirty summer homes on the grounds. There were three new houses constructed this summer by Okmulgee, Blackwell and Walters. More lots were sold this year than usually are sold during the Assembly. Therefore, if plans carry we hope to find many more new homes constructed by the opening of the As-The Ninth Annual Encampment enjoyed a record sembly next year. attendance. It is not definitely known just how many persons were on the grounds during the Assembly as no registration fee was charged. However, various estimates have gone upward to twelve hundred. Judging from the class registration, we would say between eleven and twelve hundred persons attended. Credit for the wonderful showing should go to Secretary Farmer and the splendid speaking faculty, teaching force, co-laborers who so faithfully helped in making our Assembly the best The out of state workers used in our program were: in the World. Dr. John L. Hill, Nashville, 'Tennessee; Miss Juliette Mather, Birmingham, Alabama; E. E. Lee, Dallas, Texas; T. C. Gardner, Dallas, Texas; Miss Bertha Mills, Dallas, Texas; B. B. McKinney and John Josey, Fort Worth, Texas; Dr. C. E. Burts, Nashville, Tennessee. These workers and our own State preachers, secretaries and church workers will never know how much good was accomplished in the ten days work until we meet our Lord and Savior, who holds and will present our records to us some day. Mr. Ferguson, the care-taker of the Grounds, is due much credit for the splendid condition of the Grounds, equipment, etc. We are happy to report that the assembly paid all its own expenses and left some to apply on the debt.

We are glad to report that thru Assemblies and Conventions the B.Y.P.U. Department has raised to carry on its work upward of \$4,000.00 in addition to the above item.

The Debt Raising Campaign launched by this Convention last night covers our Assembly's indebtedness and your Committee, the State B.Y. P.U. Secretary and the B.Y.P.U. forces of the State pledge hearty cooperation in that program.

# B.Y.P.U. SECRETARY'S PERSONAL REPORT.

The Year has been a very pleasant and fruitful one. God has richly blessed our efforts in every section of the State. We have been greatly edified as we lifted our eyes to see that we were encompassed about by so great a cloud of witnesses who, through the efforts of the B.Y.P.U. have heard the voice of the Baptist cause in Oklahoma and who have responded to the still small voice, which has led them to vocations and pursuits of life. Many have gone to Oklahoma Baptist University because of their having come in contact with the inspiration that is engendered in B.Y.P.U. Quite often we meet a splendid boy or girl who is making ready for the Home or Foreign field and upon investigation, we find that the source of their inspiration came through the weekly Program as rendered in the B.Y.P.U. We find church members, who are laying aside every weight and the worldly sins which have in the past so easily beset them and they are studying Baptist Doctrines, Scripturally given to the Church, and working better as they are being trained in Church Membership. Our General B.Y.P.U. Training Department is rapidly finding its place in the local churches. The Story-Telling Union is ineeting with a happy response and the Adult B.Y.P.U. is filling a great need. We are thankful to Dr. J. B. Rounds for writing weekly lesson topics for this Department of the work.

Eighty B.Y.P.U. Training Departments have reported regularly to the State B.Y.P.U. Department. We have an average of fifty Unions that are A-1. These Unions are doing superb training work and you may read their names listed in the Honor Roll section of Quartlies from quarter to quarter. The churches reporting are in the race for the silver loving cup which will be awarded at our State B.Y.P.U. Conventiton March 25-28 for the most efficient B.Y.P.U. Training Department in the State. Afton now holds the cup, having merited it last year for the best all round Training Department in Oklahona.

One Associational B.Y.P.U. (Northeastern) has reached the A-1 standard for such organization this association also contains the first church in the state having a completely organized Training Department with all five organizations. And the only B.Y.P.U. to ever hold a South-wide officiary banner, and also containing the B.Y.P.U. which now holds the State loving cup.

# RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANOTHER YEAR.

We recommend that each local Baptist Church in Oklahoma observe B.Y.P.U. Study Course Week at some time during the year of 1926.

- 1. That each Training Department enter into the Debt Raising Campaign of the Denomination.
- 2. That each local B.Y.P.U. Department endeavor to organize another B.Y.P.U.
- 3. That much emphasis be given to the Systematic-Giving, Daily Bible Reading and that Family Alters be erected in every B.Y.P.U. Home.
  - 4. That 1926 will be a Banner A-1 Standard of Excellence year.
- 5. That Tither's Bands be organized as an auxiliary to each Union in the Training Department and that those Bands will be supervised by the General Director of the Training Department.
- 6. That Life Service Volunteer Bands be organized in each Church under the supervision of the Director of the Training Department.
- 7. That the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Okłahoma, keep before them the urgent need of a Field Secretary, working under direction of B.Y.P.U. Secretary, whose duties will be to look after our Colleges and Associational needs, with the idea of placing such work when financially advisable. This work is growing at a rapid pace and is greatly in need of a B.Y.P.U. Field Worker.
- S. That each Union in the State elect Messengers and raise the necessary funds for sending their workers to the Fourteenth Annual State B.Y.P.U. Convention which meets with the Churches of Shawnee, March 25th, 26th, 27th, and 28th, 1926.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

We, your committee on Sunday school work present the following:

The year 1924-25 has witnessed among Oklahoma Baptists, an enlarged vision of Sunday school work; a crystalization of Sunday school sentiment into Sunday school achievement; and a determination to utilize this great activity of the church in a measure commensurate with its opportunities for teaching God's word. All over our great commonwealth our pepple are realizing the necessity, as well as the privilege that is ours, of enlisting the redeemed in the great service of teaching and evangelizing the lost in our church communities.

The one thing cauculated most to do this, has been the institution of the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign. In the promotion of such a campaign, a most thorough and practical enlistment program is carried forward. First, religious census of the entire community is secured; and to this list are added those names of people on the church and Sunday school rolls, not found in the census. All of this information is then sifted out, and all of those who are Baptists, of Baptist preference, of not church preference, or with a church preference expressed but who are neither members of, nor attendants upon the stylices of such denominations, are included. All these names then are arranged and classified according to

departments, and a corps of teachers and officers sufficient to enlist the unenlisted host, is secured. These same teachers and officers are elected by the church, and each night during the week finds them in steudy classes conducted for their respective departments. This enlarged organization is then put in motion, definitely charged by the church, to bring in and teach, the untaught multitudes of the surrounding community as revealed by the census.

The largest effort of its kind held in the southland up to that date, was in Oklahma City last April, when 10 Baptist churches banded together, brought in 44 out-of-city workers and conducted a very profitable city-wide campaign. Many pastors and church workers pronounced these campaigns as the greatest single week's work ever conducted in their churches. They combine the elements of evangelism, enlistment, and eaucation that make for permanency in church building.

Another feature of the work that has been growing in favor, has been the Daily Vacation Bible School. A number of these schools were conducted by the churches of our state during the past summer vacation period. Detailed reports of ten of these schools have come to our State Sunday School Department. From these ten reports, we learn there were 1,274 boys and girls enrolled and taught by a faculty of 156 officers and teachers, on an average of three hours per day for sixteen days. The average cost was 53 cents per pupil, which means that it cost but slightly more than one-ecent to teach a pupil God's word for one hour.

The question to be asked of, and answered by, our Oklahoma Baptist churches next summer, is whether or not it is worth the effort, and one cent per hour, to have each of ourboys and girls taught God's book, in God's house, by God's teachers, during a period of time when all three would have but little other employment.

The Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Rural Campaign work of Oklachma has enjoyed a most profitable year. There were eleven workers, laboring in ten different associations, a total of 1905 days. During this time they delivered 266 sermons and 559 other addresses; taught 1,465 class periods; had 237 conversions and 92 additions to the churches by letter and statement. They sold 953 books; called out 141 volunteers; enlisted 174 tithers; wrote 5,201 letters and 1,.086 circular letters. They prepared 54 articles for publication; and labored in 240 different Baptist Chruches. Half of the above should be credited to the B. Y. P. U. Departments as these are combination workers. There same workers taught 148 Sunday school training classes, with 2,429 people enrolled in classes, and with 1.230 completing the work and receiving the awards. In addition to the above, there has been some special campaign work conducted by means of this same campaign fund, in associations without a regularly employed campaign worker. Through it all however, Oklahoma has lost a great opportunity for work of this kinnd during the present year, as only threefifths of the amount set aside by the Sunday School Board of Oklahoma, conditional upon Oklahoma's matching it dollar for dollar, has been used. It is to be desired that we shall not be so dilatory in the utilization or our opportunities during the ensuing year in this Christian conquest of our rural communities.

During the past twelve months, Oklahoma has awarded 1,090 Sunday school diplomas, and 3,221 seals and certificates for other study cours, books, making a total of 4,312 training course awards granted during tryear. There are seventeen schools in the state that have attained the

standard, of which number 6 are in Northeastern Association. While this is the greatest number of Oklahoma schools to attain the standard it is far below what it should be.

Many of the accomplishments set forth thus far, have been made possible by the most splendid co-operation on the part of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, by its liberal provision of workers, funds and literature. Whether it be in the rural campaign work, the city-wide training school, the enlargement campaign, the assembly, or any other phase of our Sunday school work, we find this great Board our staunch ally and friend.

Our Sunday School Secretary's personal report, sets forth such items as 94 sermons preached; 398 other addresses delivered; 100 class periods taught; 76 conversions; 5 baptisms; 97 additions to churches by letter and statement; 10 enlargement campaigns conducted; 735 books sold; 23,340 miles traveled; 160 volunteers called out; 177 meetings attended of which number 104 were visits to local churches. He organized three new Sunday schools, 203 new Sunday school classes, and 99 new training classes. He graded 23 Sunday schools; organized 8 B. Y. P. U.'s; wrote 4,681 letters; 16,570 circular letters and 82 articles for publication. Including his work as Treasurer of the Sunday School Convention, he has collected for all denominational purposes, a total of \$4,074.36 during the year.

Another factor that has contributed greatly to the increased efficiency of our work in the state is the putting on of a full time office secretary for this department, thereby releasing the State Secretary for more field work. Still another powerful agency in Baptist Sunday School growth in Oklaohma, is our great Baptist Sunday School Convention, which meets in its fourth annual session at Elk City, January 25-28, 1926.

When all human and material forces have been named, our forward looking Sunday school program in Oklahoma has not listed its greatets Power of achievement, and it is here that we give pause to thank God, our great Leader, for His guidance in this work. We would claim the glory for all of success that has crowned the efforts of these combined earthly forces for Him who reigns on high.

Your committee recommends to this great Baptist host, that we stress, during 1925-26, the enlargement and education of our working Sunday school forces; the enlistment and evangelization of the untaught multitudes about us; and the establishment and maintenance of mission Sunday schools in needy territories adjacent to our churches. Let us become truly MISSIONARY.

We further recommend, with regard to our State Sunday School Department program, that there be no retrenchment, and that as speedily as is possible, in keeping with our great forward looking program, the growing needs of this department be adequately cared for.

# REPORT OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

In rendering an account of our stewardship to the Convention, we would express first of all our gratitude to God for His abundant blessings

throughout the year. We would also register our appreciation of the confidence and co-operation of our Baptist people throughout the state.

# STANDARDS AND STANDING

The period of pioneering in your University has passed. The institution is now thoroughly entrenched, not only in the program of the Convention, but in the educational system of the state. Full recognition by representative universities and accrediting agencies has been secured. There is no longer any question about STANDARDS and STANDING. O. B. U. has been accorded official rating as an "equivalent college" of the North Central Association. Our graduates are qualified to teach in any high school in Oklahoma and they are admitted, without condition, to the best graduate schools in America.

# ENROLLMENT AND ALUMNAE

The enrollment for the session 1924-25 shows 453 in the College of Arts and Sciences, 395 in the College of Fine Arts, 63 doing secondary work in the training school, with a total net enrollment for the session, 653. The total for the 1925 summer term was 403, making a grand total for the school year, 1066. The enrollment for the first term of the current session (1925-26) shows 34 Seniors, 61 Juniors, 138 Sophomores, 257 Freshmen, a total of 490 in the College of Arts and Sciences. 198 special students are enrolled in the College of Fine Arts. 45 are enrolled for secondary work in the training school. Net total enrollment for the first term, 643, which is only 10 short of the total enrollment for last year. This rate of increase will probably put the 1925-26 enrollment as high as 900, with 500 additional in the summer school, or a grand total of 1400 for this school year.

The number of graduates is rapidly increasing. The total for last year, including the spring and summer sections, was 63, as compared with a total of 44 for the previous year. The quality of work done is high, 24 graduates last year were awarded the scholastic predicate, "Cum Laude" and 4 received the high award, "Magna Cum Laude."

We have more than 200 alumnae holding degrees. All of them are either carrying forward graduate or professional study or they are busy in worthy and worth while work. They are the best advertizes we have. More than half of them are high school and college teachers. About one-third of them are pastors, denominational workers and foreign missionaries. Almost without exception they are radiating centers of the O. B. U. spirit, passing on the O. B. U. ideal and attitude.

# ATMOSPHERE AND SPIRIT

The general atmosphere of the school was never quite so good. The fellowship is fine and a spirit of optimistic enthusiasm is manifest. Our students come from the best homes in the Southwest. They are select and superior, loyal and cooperative. The general judgment is that we have the best Freshman class in our history. Our discipline committee has not had occasion for a meeting this year. We have plenty of "pep" and "splz" but it is tempered by cultural influences and tuned to the ideals and attitudes of consistent Christianity.

The religious life of the institution is impressive. Our student prayer meetings and all the auxiliaries of the General Christian Association are flourishing. The permeating persistence of religious enlistment is evident in the occasional surrender of a student to preach the gospel or the decision to prepare for foreign mission service.

All the influences of the institution are converging for our annual revival to be conducted by Pastor H. B. Wilhoyte, of Blackwell, beginning November 30th. The religious genius of the school was never more manifest nor its evangelistic potency more dynamic. The mystical presence of the Divine is felt everywhere. Jesus is being crowned "campus comnander," by faculty and students alike. We are happy in the consciousness of His lordship and leadership.

#### TEACHER TRAINING

Teacher training has become a fundamental function of O. B. U. Upon our recommendation the State Department of Education issues any certificate that can be earned in the University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma A. & M. College, or any of the State Teachers' Colleges. Last year 176 state certificates were issued to O. B. U. graduates and under graduates. 32 of these were life high school certificates, 48 were life elementary certificates, 11 were Fine Arts certificates, and the remainder term state certificates. Our department of Education is organized to provide the same professional cources as are offered by the State Teachers' Colleges and the State University.

# TRAINING OF RELIGIOUS WORKERS

The student file of the current session shows 65 ministerial students an d17 foreign mission volunteers, five of whom are included in the group of ministerial students. While these beneficiary students are the pride of the University, they are ultimately wards of the denomination. All tuition of ministerial students is remitted and one-half the tuition of foreign mission volunteers; also, one-half the tuition of wives and children of ministers. There are 39 in this latter group, making a total of 115 beneficiary students, or nearly 20 percent of the entire enrollment. The total remitted runs about \$9,000.00 per year. Although this ifem is provided for in the Convention appropriation for Christian Education, the scholarship method of administering it would be a vast improvement because it would eliminate all discrimination between students and react upon the beneficiary in the realization of his stewardship as a denominational ward.

43 of our 65 ministerial students filed reports of their work during the convention year covering last session, the past summer and the first term of this session. The totals, herewith submitted, reflect service rendered far beyond the realization of any of us who are not familiar with the life of the O. B. U. "preacher boys."

Miles traveled 182,215; days labored 6,030; revivals conducted 97; sermons preached 3,616; addresses delivered 231; Churches organized 11; Charter members of new churches 33; prayer meetings organized 26; Sunday Schools organized 12; Sunday School Classes organized 26; K. T. Classes organized 6; W. B. M. S's organized 9; Deacons ordained 76; professions 3,738; recieved for baptism 2,310; baptized 742; received by letter 1,313; religious workers called out 216; Sunday School classes taught

741; students secured for O. B. U. 62; pages and tracts distributed 36,225; subscriptions for religious periodicals 270; religious visits 1,550; number of churches supplied 53; church lots secured 12; value \$4,850.00; churches completed 6; value \$15,500.00; churches repaired 17; value \$3,389.00. Collected for: Ministerial Student's loan fund \$300.00; 75 Million Campaign \$4,479.00; Associational missions \$1,669.50; miscellaneous \$24,636.50; making a total of \$63,719.58.

# DEPARTMENTAL REORGANIZATION

The School of Christianity and the School of Education have been reduced to departments, but the professional grouping of courses has been North Central Association and the Standardization Commission of the North Central Association and the Standardization Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. It strengthens the College of Arts and Sciences and preserves the conservative principle in academic structure. 3 full time professors are now teaching in the professional field organized for religious workers. 2 full years' work may be done in the pre-seminary course, for which a year of credit is given in the seminaries. We are not competing with the seminaries. We are really co-operating with them in an effort to not only take care of the mature student who will never have the privilege of a seminary course, but to better prepare those who will attend the seminary.

#### NEW DEPARTMENTS

The Unversity response to the growing demand for the curricula expansion is the creation of several new departments this year. The preseminary combination has been reorganized and strengthened. Dean J. W. Jent has shifted entirely to this field in this teaching. His courses in Sociology now have professional value for teachers, preachers and other religious workers. The curricula of this department groups under the heads "CHRISTIAN SOCIOLOGY" and "RURAL SOCIOLOGY." Christian Ethics and the Country Church are the major objectives.

Dean Jent also heads the new Department of Theology, comprehending both the practical and the systematic fields. Students may now major

in Theology.

Professor Gillespie is head of the new Department of Philosophy. In addition to the general introduction and fundamentals in history, metaphysics, intensive courses are offered in Christian Evidences, Compara-

tive Religions and the Philosophy of Religion.

The departments of Journalism and Economics have been reorganized, strengthened and thoroughly professionalized. Professor Watts, head of the former, and Professor Hybarger, head of the latter, brought to their tasks ample experience and training to make these major departments.

# PRE-PROFESSIONAL COURSES

The academic reorganization, upon departmental rather than school bases, has in no way modified the pre-professional program of the University. While the professional course for teachers has been sufficiently modified to meet the A. B. requirements, it is as highly professionalized as the former B. S. course. The pre-professional courses in law, medicine, business, and journalism have been materially strengthened. They meet all requirements for admission to the best professional schools in America.

# FACULTY

The faculty of the Univerity is composed of carefully selected people whose training and credentials guarantee the very best scholarship, and whose religious character and doctrinal integrity are above reproach. They meet all the requirements of the North Central Association. They are consistent Christians and sound Baptists. They sincerely endorse the O. B. U. Creed. There is not an evolutionist in the group. They are all fundamentalists who not only accept the Bible as inspired of God and authoritative, but they are committed to positive denominational propagandism. We believe that O. B. U. approximates the ideal in the complex of scholastic efficiency and orthodox faith. The SCIENCE of the O. B. U. scientists is validated by advanced degrees from the best universities in America and their loyalty to the faith of our fathers, as revealed in the Word of God, is vindicated by their frankness and candor in class room and laboratory.

The faculty has been materially strengthened this year by filling vacancies and the creation of new departments.

Our great linguist, Dr. R. J. Kellog, resigned to accept a position in Ottawa University. He was succeeded by Professor J. T. Gillespie as Professor of Greek and Philosophy. Professor Gillespie is an A. B. graduate of Wake Forrest College and has finished all the requirements for the Doctor's degree in the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary except the thesis. He is an experienced teacher; a highly efficient preacher; and a man of dynamic, driving personality.

Professor J. V. Harvey heads the new department of Botany, associated with the department of Physics. He is a graduate of Mississippi College and holds the Master's degree from the University of North Carolina. He has won honors in scholarship and is a real scientist. He is the son of a Baptist minister; sound in the faith; committed, without reservation, to conversative Christian thought. He is no kind of an evolutionist in his interpretation of natural phenomena. He is an active, old fashioned Baptist. He fits the fundamentalist program of O. B. U. as if he were made for it.

The department of Economics has a new head in the person of Professor Fred G. Watts, associate of Professor Holcomb in the department of History. Professor Watts is a nOklahoma product, known and loved by our people throughout the state. He did most of his under graduate work in Oklahoma Baptist College at Blackwell. He was a student in O. B. U. the first year, 1912. He holds the A. B. degree from Ottawa University; A. M. from Brown University; and has done additional graduate study in other universities. He also did research in the historic centers of Europe. He is an experienced teacher, a splendid preacher, and equipped with a magnetic personality.

One of the most valuable additions to the faculty is Miss Ethel Rader, head of the Voice Department in the College of Fine Arts. She has had the best training afforded by the masters of Europe and America and is a concert artist of international reputation. She has no superior in the Southwest and very few equals in America. She is a consistent Christian, a loyal Baptist, and a woman of enkindling personality.

Professor Courts Redford is on leave of absence, doing graduate study in the School of Religious Education of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. We are very fortunate to have as acting professor of Religious Education, during his absence. Professor W. F. Yarborough, Jr. He is an A. B. graduate of Howard College; has the Master's de-

gree in Religious Education from the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary; and has completed all the requirements for the Doctor's degree except the thesis. He is a man of the very best culture and a growing scholar.

The head of the new department of Journalism is Professor J. W. Hybargr, A. B. and A. M. of the University of Oklahoma. He is also a associate in the department of English. His culture and professional efficiency are evident.

Miss Kathryn Anne Tissue is the new head of the department of Home Economics. She is a B. S. graduate of Marshall College, West Virginia, and has completed practically all the requirements for the Master's degree from the University of Chicago. She is an experienced teacher, a woman of strong character.

Miss Mildred O'dell, A. B. of the University of North Dakota, is a new assistant in Piano. She had her musical training under Professor Conte in the Conservatory of Wesley College. She is the Magazine Editor of the National Music Fraternity. She is not only an efficient teacher but a cultured, refined leader.

Rev. W. A. Wilcoxson of Purcell has been added to the administration of the University as Dean of Men, Supervisor of the Hall for Men, and Director of the department of Self Help. Brother Wilcoxson brings to this responsible position the background of a successful ministry and the experience of an expert scout executive.

Other instructors in various departments bring the total teaching force of the University up to the respectable number of 45. The O. B. U. faculty is not only larger but better balanced, more symmetrical, and in every way the strongest the University has ever had. It compares favorably in every particular with the faculty of any other college or university in the Southwest. It is not only a credit to the University, but to this Convention and the Baptist churches of Oklahoma.

# DENOMINATIONAL LOYALTY

The denominational anchorage of the University is guaranteed by the unique denominational structure of the institution. Our charter vests ownership and control in this Convention. We realize that every teacher is a trustee of a denominational task. It is our ambition to make O. B. U., in every particular, the kind of a school the Baptists of Oklahoma deserve and desire to have. We acknowledge and accept our denominational stewardship.

The University plant has been materially improved by the addition of a scientifically built athletic field, with cinder track and bleachers seating 1500; 2 new class rooms on the first floor of Shawnee Hall; a new Physics laboratory on the third floor; and a new job press in the Printing Department. O. B. U. now has one o fthe largest and best equipped College Printing and Publicity Departments in the Southwest. All buildings have been repainted throughout. The cafeteria has been rebuilt with facilities for quadrupling its service. The campus has been beautified with shrubbery, driveways, walks, and sodded lawn. O. B. U. has become one of the beauty spots of Shawnee, the pride of the city, admired by all visitors.

#### COLLEGE OF FINE ARTS

The growth and development of the College of Fine Arts since Professor Poolo Conte wa smade director has been phenomenal. He brought great prestige to the institution. His reputation has attracted an increasing number of talented students who come to O. B. U. for professional training. He is a master of administrative detail an done of the finest Christian characters in the institution. He is a loyal Baptist, faithful to his task as organist of the First Baptist Church of Shawnee.

The election of Miss Ethel Rader as head of the Voice Department brings the Fine Arts Faculty to the highest height of efficiency. It is entirely possible that no other school of music in the West has two artists of the ability and the reputation of Professor Conte and Miss Rader.

The department of Expression and Dramatic Art under Mrs. Rhetta Mae Dorland is known throughout Oklahoma as one of the best in the State. She has trained the winner of the State High School medal again and again.

A large group of music instructors work under Professor Conte and Miss Rader in the training school organized to prepare students for State Teachers' Certificates.

The department of Public School Music under Professor David L. Sheldon meets all the requirements for Life Certificate as Public School Music Supervisor. All these State Music Certificates are issued by the State Department of Education, direct, upon our recommendation.

The University Glee Clubs are trained by Miss Rader. The Band and Orchestra are under direction of Professor Sheldon. These organizations give promise of attaining the highest efficiency this year in the history of the University.

#### NEEDS

- 1. O. B. U. sorely needs more buildings. An additional girls' dormitory must be provided by the opening of the next session or the number of students limited to the present capacity. Our class rooms are crowded to the doors. We have grown to the maximum capacity of our present quarters.
- 2. We need more teachers. All members of our faculty are overloaded and overworked. We cannot continue increasing the student enrollment without more teachers to teach them. A larger Freshman class is impossible without more instructors in the prescribed courses, such as, foreign language, mathematics, natural science, history, English, etc.
- 3. We need more general equipment. We cannot maintain the standards of the North Central Association in a growing student body without bigger and better libraries and laboratories. It is as impossible for teachers to teach without "teaching tools" as it was for the Hebrews to "make brick without straw."
- 4. All these needs mean an insistent demand for more money. We have reached the maximum of our expansion within the compass of our present income. We have no option in an expanding budget. We cannot and will not project a program beyond our income. Since the tuition income is more or less limited, the only outlook for financial expansion is denominational funds.
- 5. The one and all encompassing thing is endowment. Interest income from permanent endowment is indispensable to the guaranteed per-

manency of all accrediting agencies without the guarantee of permanency. We would urge that the Convention carry forward the campaign launched last year, to a successful issue in the \$500,000.00 proposed for endowment and enlargement. To draw back from this decision would be little short of suicidal and calamitous. The moral and psychological reaction would be discouraging and disheartening. This campaign involves a denominational challenge which can neither be repudiated nor disregarded.

- 6. A fundamental need is the adequate realization of the constituency of this Convention of the magnitude of the task of building and maintaining a standard institution for higher learning. The O. B. U. of which our Oklahoma Baptist people have dreamed, for which they have prayed, and on behalf of which many have already sacrificed, is impossible apart from the expenditure of multiplied thousands and even millions of dollars. The institution is an invaluable investment, worth all the Baptists shall ever put into it, but we will never do the task in a worthy way until the mass of our people come to realize the magnitude of the undertagink.
- 7. Our final need is the consciousness of the denominational option in the O. B. U. challenge. Continued growth and development depends absolutely upon the unflinching support of the Convention and the churches. We cannot continue to grow on the inside without the growth of financial support on the outside. We give it as our candid judgment that the endowment and enlargement campaign, launched at the last Convention, involves a determining option. Success here essentially involves not only the guaranteed permanency and efficiency of the University, but the realization of our comprehensive denominational objectives in all departments of our common task.

The financial report for the year ending September first nineteen hundred twenty-five shows a substantial gain in every vital point. The complete itemized report as published shows that the net operating deficit was reduced three thousand dollars this year in spite of additions to the faculty and necessary repairs and improvements. The amount of contributions from all sources remained practically the same.

The total operating deficit including the cost of the bonded indebtedness and beneficiary tuition was reduced eight thousand dollars during the past year. At the same time the deficit was being reduced the net amount of debts was reduced four thousand dollars and the permanent assets increased sixteen thousand dollars.

The NET WORTH, which is the difference between all assets and all liabilities, has been increased from \$245,000.00 to \$265,000.00 during the past twelve months—a gain of \$20,000.00.

This financial progress has been made possible only by the most careful planning and most stringent economies which have often times made sacrifice necessary on the part of members of the faculty, other employees and students.

# CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It is doubtless not within the province of your committee to define Christian Education. Education as we think of it and discuss it in a convention like this one is the training given in an institution of learning. And Christian Education is the training given in a Christian Institution of learning.

A Christian of learning evidently should be one having its atmosphere charged with the fear of God and the Spirit of Jesus Christ. There is an old saying that an educated fool is the biggest fool in the world. Perhaps it would be truer to say that a half educated fool is the biggest fool in the world. There is a peril in education, but it is the peril that grows out of an incomplete education.

Any educational system that leaves out a thorough collegiate training is incomplete from the intellectual standpoint. There is no substitute for a thorough four years college course. In such a course as this foundations are laid for a cultural super-structure that will be stabled, sane, efficient, satisfying.

A college needs especially to be Christian. The time of life when the college course is taken is a critical one. Usually the boy and girl who enters college is away from the old home, from the old church and the other influences which minister to moral and christian integrity. Oklahoma Baptist University offers the two things which are essential to a real education. The first is a thorough college training. Our school is seeking to make its scholastic standards as high as that of any school all the land. This is necessary if a denominational school is to compete with other educational institutions. It is not enough simply to write Baptist before the name of an educational institution. We must make that name Baptist stand for the highest possible ideals and attainments.

In the second place O. B. U. is Christian. It not only conserves our Christian standards, but it promotes by teaching and example, all that is finest in our Christian Faith.

Without hesitation or reservation, we desire to recommend to our Baptist people of Oklahoma, O. B. U.

We should send our young people to this school for their collegiate training.

We should see to it that our O. B. U. has the equipment it needs to enable it to complete in educational processes with any institution in all the land.

We should give to O. B. U. an endowment which will enable it to carry on the splendid work it is doing without hurtful limitations and with that freedom and efficiency which it has a right to demand and which we, by our liberality should command.

We refer you to the report of the school for information in detail as to the work being done and as to the needs which must be supplied.

# EXHIBIT "N" 1

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PASTOR'S HOME BUILDING FUND FOR COUNTRY CHURCHES

Believing that a pastor's home owned by the country church will add much to the permanancy of the pastorate and help greatly in solving the country church problem, we beg to submit the following plan for the establishment and maintenance of a fund to be known as the Baptist Pastor's Home Building Fund:

- 1st. Let this conference elect two country pastors, who, with our corresponding secretary, shall constitute a committee for the development and administration of such fund.
- 2nd. The first business of this committee shall be the enlistment of Oklahoma pastors in subscribing to such a fund, the basis of subscription being one dollar by each pastor for each country church aided, not to exceed twelve dollars per year.
- 3rd. The basis of contribution from the fund shall be thirty percent of the cost of building when matched by at least thirty percent raised by the local church. The committee will lend its assistance to each church if desired, in securing a loan of forty percent, or less, of the cost of such buildings.
- 4th. The corresponding secretary shall be secretary-treasurer of this committee and the other members shall serve without pay, except that their expenses shall be paid when necessary for them to meet as a committee or visit for inspection or any proposed pastor's home.
- 5th. While it is our purpose that the pastors shall themselves finance this fund, each pastor may use his own judgment in securing additional contributions to it from his church, or other sources.
- 6th. That not more than one thousand dollars shall be contributed to any one church, and the committee shall pass upon the architectural plan.
- 7th. The committee may use its judgment in contributing to town or city pastor's homes on the same basis laid down for country churches, it being understood, however, that the creation of this fund is especially designed for country churches.
- Sth. The two members elected now shall serve until the general convention meets in November, when they shall be elected by the convention or their successors chosen then.
- 9th. Applications shall be considered and approved in the order in which they are received.
- 10th. Each church shall agree to carry ample fire and tornado insurance on its pastor's home, if such is obtainable.
- 11th. This resolution shall be sent to the Baptist Messenger for publication and shall be sent in circular form to each pastor and church in Oklahoma. An enlistment card shall be sent to each pastor for his subscription.
- 12th. A call shall be made now for charter members and the payment of a dollar as a first subscription,

# REPORT ON SCHEDULE OF DATES FOR ASSOCIATIONS.

To the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Dear Brethren:

Your committee appointed to prepare a schedule of dates for the holding of associational annual meetings commencing with the year 1926 desires to report as follows:

Soon after the meeting of the state convention your committee convened in Oklahoma City and made a study of the schedule of dates for the year 1924. The schedule revealed only one actual conflict with slight overlappings in two or three other instances. Moreover, the state had been recently redistricted with the election of enlistment men for the various divisions. In view of these facts it seemed to the committee to be unnecessary to attempt any rearrangements. The committee, therefore, decided to report that no further action be taken.

Later, when the schedule of dates for the year 1925 was made up and published, numerous conflicts were evident. These were due to the fact that a number of associations had shifted their dates from the early anamid-summer to the fall season. Your committee, upon the strength of these changes, reopened the discussion of our problem. We addressed letters to state leaders and others asking for advice and suggestions. The replies indicated a variety of opinions but brought us no nearer the solution of the problem. It is our opinion that nothing very definite can be accomplished without an extension of time covering a period of two or three years.

If conflicts are to be removed many associations must change their dates from August and September to June and July. If any associations are willing to make this change the committee would recommend that they do so at their earliest convenience. The committee is willing to assist in the selection of a suitable date for any association that desires to make the change but does not think it wise to offer a suggested schedule of dates for all the associations. We suggest that the committee be discharged unless there is a demand for its continuance.

# REPORT OF EDUCATION BOARD OF SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Education Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was created for the purpose of uniting and promoting the Educational forces of the Southern Baptist Convention. While the Education Board does not have organic control over the Baptist Schools and Colleges of the several states yet, it has a vital interest in fostering the growth and stability of all of them. The contact of the Education Board with the student life of the schools and colleges is exercised in co-operation with the Inter-Board Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, directed by the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board, the Sunday School Board, the Woman's Missionary Union, and the Education Board.

#### Indian Education

The policy of the Southern Baptist Convention has been, since its organization, to follow up missionary and evangelistic work among all peoples with Educational Work. The Education Board saw that the American Indian had been made the exception to this rule in the organized work of Southern Baptists. Southern Baptists have lost a large opportunity through neglecting to follow their seventy years of evangelism among the Indians with a constructive educational programme. A goodly number of Indian preachers now doing excellent work in the Indian Baptist churches of Oklahoma are products of the Levering Mission, which was conducted at Wetumpka for a few years and discontinued nearly thirty years ago.

About a year and a half ago the Education Board of the Southern Baptist Convention acquired the Nuyaka School located near Okmulgee, and began the operation of the Nuyaka Baptist School and Orphanage on the first of last September with four teachers in charge, and with Rev. J. M. Wiley, who is well acquainted with local conditions and needs, as superintendent.

Before this school was opened, a working agreement was made that will enable the school to work in close co-operation with Oklahoma Baptist University. As the students are prepared for college they will be encouraged to enter the Baptist School fostered by the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention. This school has been endorsed by the Creek, the Choctaw and the Chickasaw Indian Associations and by the Executive Board of the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention, by the W. M. U. Committee of Oklahoma, by the Home Mission Board and the W. M. U. of the Southern Baptist Convention and also by the Southern Baptist Convention itself.

To build up a school, after this long period of neglect by Southern Baptists will involve much hard labor. The Education Board is convinced that this movement for education among the American Indians, by Southern Baptists, which has been so largely endorsed, is a move in the right direction. Under the present plans this school is to serve all the work being done by Southern Baptists for Indian Education and caring for Indian orphans. Other denominations have preceded us in this field and we rejoice that our own people are now taking advantage of this long neglected Mission opportunity here in our own land. The Education Board appreciates the hearty co-operation of the Oklahoma Baptist Convention and of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and begs for your continued sympathy and prayers. The school property is valued at \$80,000 and we have enrolled 57 students to date. With this promising beginning we are seeking divine guidance that under God's blessing we may be used in training the Indians in the "Jesus Road," and train preachers and other leaders in their churches.

The girls in the Training Schools of these two hospitals receive instructions in the art of nursing and courses in Bible Study. There is a Grace McBride Circle of the Y. W. A. in each hospital.

We would like to mention some things separately at this time.

It is very gratifying indeed to note that your hospital at Miami, under the capable management of Mr. G. M. London, shows a profit this year of \$1,428.59, before providing for depreciation. Last year there was no deficit.

It is with very much pleasure that we can announce to this Convention that your hospital at Muskogee is a Standardized Hospital, and so recognized by the American College of Surgeons in list published this fall. Also your hospital at Muskogee completed paying for their Nurses' Home, and it is now the property of this Convention, and free from debt. The amount paid for this Home is \$11,354.10, and was paid by this hospital from the earnings of the same.

These encouraging and gratifying reports are brought to you through the complete co-operation of the fine young ladies, most of whom you saw last night at this Convention. In our mind, there is no higher calling for a young lady than that of giving her life to the relief of the sick. The possibilities are unlimited. She may become an Angel of Mercy in our own land, and may carry the story of Christ to those in foreign lands, by her ministry to the suffering.

It is the hopes of your hospitals to be able to lead those who come to your institutions, to Christ, and to educate a band of consecrated young ladies, who will feel the call to foreign fields for service.

We ask an interest in the prayers of each Baptist in the Oklahoma General Convention, that God will bless your institutions of healing, that they may help carry on the great work of healing the sick and spreading the gospel.

# ARMY CHAPLAINCIES

Under the 1920 defense act our army and navy are partially reorganized.

This act makes impossible the waging of an aggressive war, for the regular army has but nine (9) skeleton divisions, only two of which are even up to peace strength, and most of which are scattered in small garrisons or as instructors for the National Guard and organized reserves, R. O. T. C. and C. M. T. C.

There will be eighteen (18) National Guard Divisions if the act is carried to completion, and twenty-seven (27) Reserve Divisions.

There are few Chaplains and many thousands of soldiers without a preacher. We urge our young Baptist preachers to apply for commis-

sions in the National Guard and Reserve where they will be able to minister in time of peace to our men of the various semi-military organizations, and in time of emergency be available for service according to our quota.

There are no restrictions as to message and there has never been a better opportunity, with less restraints than at present for the chaplains of the United States army.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON 1925 PROGRAM

The Seventy-five Million Campaign has passed into history during our fiscal year. Oklahoma's total contribution to that great cause was \$673,337.69. With the completion of that mighty enterprise ended the most gigantic accomplishment ever undertaken by Southern Baptists.

But as to how well we did it, God knows we cannot boast. If there be any glory, it belongs to Him whose head was crowned with thorns. And if there be any shame on account of failure, that belongs to Southern Baptists, whose coffers are lined with gold.

The year 1925 dawned upon us with new and larger opportunities, increased responsibilities and a vast co-operative program. Seven and one half million dollars was the objective for South-wide interests. This, divided between our three and one-half million white Baptists of the South, would mean only a fraction over \$2 per capita. This seems like a mere pittance for each one, and only a drop in the bucket in comparison to our needs on the home field and the progress of our work in seventeen foreign countries.

Our state was responsible for its share which was \$122,500. To meet our portion of that amount, and for the support of the various phases of our own state work, your committee reporting to the State Convention a year ago, suggested a goal of \$350,000. This scenned like a great amount, but when divived between our 125,000 white Eaptists in the state, is less than three dollars per capita, for all our interests in State, Home and Foreign work.

But in accepting even this small suggested goal, we over-estimated, not our Baptist ability, but our devotion and consecration. Our total receipts for this fiscal year is about \$169,000. But while this is \$181,000 short of the mark we set for ourselves, it is also \$8,731 more than our total receipts of the previous year. During this fiscal year, we have contributed \$71,448.79 to all interests of Southern Baptists, outside of our own state work. But how meager is this supply compared to the vast needs represented to us in other reports coming before this body.

The 1926 financial goal for South-wide objects has been set at only five million dollars. This does not begin to be commensurate with the vast needs. It would take at least twice that amount to relieve our present financial embarrassment and provide adequately for a program of advancement which would be becoming for three and one-half million Southern Baptists.

In view of the appalling needs, both at home and abroad, your committee would recommend for our next fiscal year:

- 1. A goal of \$500,000 for state and South-wide objects, \$200,000 of which is for campaign support, and \$300,000 to remove all indebtedness.
- 2. That we most earnestly urge all our people to study and practice God's plan of Christian Stewardship, giving as a minimum, and not a maximum, the tenth.
- 3. That the churches that have not already made their every member canvass for 1926 fall in with the suggested plan and make such a canvass Dec. 6-13.
- 4. That offerings be sent regularly each week, to our burdened State Secretary.
- 5. That all our people be urged to cooperate most strenuously with our O. B. U. in their enlargement campaign.

#### MESSENGER BOOK HOUSE

C. P. Stealey, Manager

In this fifth Annual report on your Book business, we are combining the four years and 11 months from the establishment of the house to the partnership arrangement with the Sunday School Board. However, the financial table will indicate the business from June 1, 1924 to May 1, 1925.

For some years conferences of the managers of the various State Book Stores have been held with the S. S. Bourd, seeking to work but a desirable plan for creating the desire for and distribution of valuable books and religious literature generally to our consistency, which is the largest field "white unto the harvest" for a religious publishing house in the world. Finally the plan adopted for accomplishing this purpose was proposed by the S. S. Board which was to take a half interest in the various book stores, creating a chain of stores where the interest is mutual on the part of the Board and the local groups. Ten of these stores were taken over as of May first, 1925, including the Messenger Book House, the transfer of which had been agreed to by the Board of Directors.

This, we believe, is a splendid arrangement, which will unify, systematize and increase the efficiency of this department greatly. One particular advantage is that we are enabled to have attractive catalogues for general distribution which will be appreciated by the people and increase the business of the houses.

Remember that we furnish everything you may wish in the line of Books, Bibles, Church supplies, etc. Order everything except S. S. and B. Y. P. U. Quarterlies from the Messenger Book House.

We call attention to the fact that for the four years and 11 months when the Book House was owned by the Convention the net profits were \$6.325.82, not large, but certainly better than a deficit.

# REPORT OF THE LAYMEN'S MISSIONARY MOVEMENT OKLAHOMA BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION MUSKOGEE, OKLAHOMA, 1925

We, your committee, extend greetings to this the twentieth annual session of the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention and submit the following report and make the following recommendations:

Since the organization of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in 1907 it has emphasized, with considerable success, the importance of the following practical measures, each of which is re-enforced by scriptural quotations:

First, loyalty to and adequate support of the pastor. "We should esteem Him very highly in love for His work's sake." "The laborer is worthy of his hire."

Second, the weekly offering by every member of the church as a vital feature of worship. "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by Him in store as God hath prospered you." "Bring an offering and come into His courts."

Third, faithful attendance on the worship of the sanctuary. "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is."

Fourth, religion in business. "In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and he shall direct thy paths."

Fifth, a larger study of God's word, study classes in stewardship and missions, and the reading of religious books, papers and tracts by the laymen. The Executive Committee is announcing a study course for men in stewardship and missions, and is awarding an attractive certificate with seals to those who complete these books. "Study to show thyself approved unto God."

Sixth, the organization of the men in the churches into Brotherhoods that shall hold monthly meetings for the cultivation of fellowship and promotion of intelligence and consecration. It also suggests the organization of Associational Unions that the laymen of the different churches may compare notes and plan for the promotion of co-operative work; these may meet quarterly Sunday afternoons or at night during the week in connection with a banquet. "That in all things Christ may have the preeminence."

Seventh, your Committee also claims that the laymen, as well as the preacher, should recognize that he is a Kingdom factor. He should share the burdens that come to the pastor, college president, and mission secretary. "How shall they preach except they be sent?"

Eighth, because of intimate friendship and business relations, a layman may have unusual influence with his neighbor or partner. He may win the indifferent to service, reclaim the erring Christian, or lead the unsaved to Christ. "If a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual restore such an one in the spirit of weakness." "He that winneth souls is wise."

The Executive Committee has recently employed Mr. L. A. Ellison, a banker of Oklahoma, to serve as Associate Secretary to J. T. Henderson,

Your Committee further reports that approximately 6000 letters have been written in the interest of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in Oklahoma during the past year; that numerous addresses have been delivered at Associations, Fifth Sunday Meetings, Laymen's Banquets and individual churches.

That a Conference of Oklahoma Baptist Laymen was held in Oklahoma City last March for two days when a representative number of Baptist Laymen came up from various parts of Oklahoma. A very fine program was rendered and two definite things set out as the principal task for the Convention year just closing, namely, the teaching of the Laymen's Missionary course, placing emphasis upon Stewardship and Missions, and the advancement of the interest of the Oklahoma Baptist Orphan's Home.

Some very definite results have been accomplished in the carrying out of these two purposes. Hundreds of men have studied the books, "Stewardship and Missions" by Dr. Cook. And we are very greatly grati-

fied to learn that the receipts at the Orphan's Home, through the Sunday School contributions, have very materially increased, since this Conference.

We are glad to report that we have many assurances of a decided growth in interest in the Laymen's Missionary Movement and its objects.

We offer the following recommendations:

First, that the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention, at as early date as practicable, employ a trained and consecrated Laymen on salary to enlist, organize, and develop the Laymen, stressing the Association as the leading unit of organization.

Your Committee strongly recommends that a group of six or more choice Laymen be enlisted in every Association, that they be given a course of training, and thereby be prepared to render any service needed in the churches of the Association, with emphasis upon the ability to help install the budget plan of church financing and Scriptural giving.

Second, that the Laymen of the state join with all other agencies employed in making a success of the Debt Raising Campaign just launched by our Convention.

Third, that the Pastors conduct an aggressive educational campaign, laying emphasis on the larger Stewardship, and budgeting and financing especially.

Fourth, that the Annual Laymen's Conference be continued and that same be held in Oklahoma City upon a date to be determined by the State Chairman and the Corresponding Secretary of this Convention.

# CONSTITUTION OF THE W. M. U. OF OKLAHOMA Preamble

We, the women of the Baptist churches of Oklahoma, known as the Woman's Missionary Union, believing literally the truth of the Apostle Paul's declaration, found in Romans 2:4-5: "For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office; so we, being many, are one body in Christ, and every one members of another;" and in Gal. 3:28: "That in Christ there is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female, for ye are all one in Christ Jesus," and deeply and earnestly desiring the most efficient training and highest degree of consecration and missionary endeavor on the part of each and every member of our churches, do adopt the following Constitution, convinced that in the faithful pursuance of the policy outlined, there will be a close and harmonious co-operation of all the departments of work fostered by the Baptist General Convention, and that "in deed and in truth" the members of Baptist churches in Oklahoma will have in all missionary activities, the same care for one another. (1 Cor. 12:25.)

#### ARTICLE !.

#### Name

This organization shall be called the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II.

#### Object

The object of this organization shall be to cultivate a missionary spirit, especially among the women, young women and children throughout the State, and to aid in the world-wide spread of the Gospel.

#### ARTICLE III.

#### Membership

The constituency of this organization shall be the Missionary organizations of women, young women and children; each woman's and young woman's society shall be entitled to one delegate to the annual meeting, and one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof, not to exceed ten members from any church.

#### ARTICLE IV.

#### Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, who shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting; ten district Vice-Presidents elected in their respectiv districts, and a Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer who shall be seleted and recommended to the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention for approval.

Section 2. These officers, together with the President of Associations and Advisory Committee and Chairman of Departments shall constitute the Executive Board, seven of whom, including two officers, shall be a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### ARTICLE V. Financial Policy

In accordance with the thought brought out in the preamble our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education training, and giving, the strength of the organization being used to help raise all apportionments for every phase of the work to which the church contributes. One-third of all mission funds credited to the State W. M. C.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention, and all salaried workers appointed and paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention, and the work is to be done under the general supervision of the Superintendent of Missions.

#### ARTICLE VI. Time of Meeting

The annual meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, at the same place preceding the opening of the Baptist General Convention.

### ARTICLE VII.

This Constitution may be changed or amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present at any annual meeting; provided, notice of the proposed change has been given to each local society one month previous to the annual meeting.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE !.

#### **Duties of Officers**

Section 1. President: The President shall preside at the annual meeting of the organization, and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided, for and shall be an exofficio member of all standing committees. With the concurrence of the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer and one other member of the Executive Board, she may call special meetings of the Executive Board when in her judgment it may seem needful.

Section 2. Vice-President: Vice-President shall be qualified to act in the place of the President and to aid her in all practical ways.

Section 3. Recording Secretary: It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions, and of all items of special interest and importance at the annual meetings of the W. M. U.; to prepare the minutes for publication, and also to act as Secretary of Executive Board, a condensed report of which shall be given to the annual meeting.

Secretary, It shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of

the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention; the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and the local societies of the State. She shall have general supervision of all departments of the work, and shall have charge of the correspondence to Baptist papers unless other provisions shall be made for it, and shall give general direction to the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity may permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds used for the expense of the work, according to the direction of the Executive Board, keeping always an exact account of receipts and disbursements.

The Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer shall make quarterly and annual reports to the Executive Board, to the Baptist General Convention, and an annual report to the State Woman's Missionary Union and the Southern Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 5. Executive Board: The Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care, and shall have power to make such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the State Woman's Missionary Union.

It shall hold regular quarterly meetings following the close of each quarter, notice of which shall be given by the Corresponding Secretary.

Following the annual meeting, the new Executive Board shall meet to plan for carrying out the work of the year. It shall elect the Cahirmen of departments, viz: Personal Service, Mission Study, and Leader of Young People; also an Advisory Committee, composed of five members, who shall reside at or near headquarters.

It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the annual meeting recommendations concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and promotion of the work, which may seem expedient and judicious.

Section 6. Chairmen of Departments: It shall be the duty of these Chairmen to assist the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommended their adoption and assist in carrying thm out. They shall keep in touch with their particular department of the work by correspondence and shall make quarterly reports in writing to the Executive Board, and an annual report to the State Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 7. District President: They shall have general supervision of the work in the Districts and in co-operation with the Associational Presidents shall seek to thoroughly organize each association within the District, and lead them to keep in close touch and sympathetic co-operation with the District and State leaders. It shall be their duty to arrange for and preside over the annual District meetings, also District rallies.

Section 8. Associaional Presidents: They shall be eleced at the regular annual meeting of the W. M. U., of their repective associations. They shall have general supervision of the work in the association, and in co-operation with the pastors they shall endeavor to promote the or-

ganization of women and children in all the churches, by visiting and holding associational meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of work done. It shall also their duty to arrange for and preside over the annual meetings of their association.

# ARTICLE II. Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulations as those governing changes in the Constitution.

#### REPORT OF SOUTHEAST DISTRICT

We were highly favored and honored by having Miss Elizabeth Watkins, State Young People's Leader, Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, our Corr. Sec., and Mrs. Withoft of Georgia as our guests at our District meeting at Idabel in May. The messages they brought to us were a great source of inspiration and enthusiasm. We thank God and take courage as we face new tasks and rejoice that we are counted worthy to have a part in the great work of the W. M. U.

Truly all through these sessions there should be a note of joy and happiness and thankfulness to Him for His goodness to us. We thank Him for the restoration to health of our beloved Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Spooner, who for so many, many weeks was so great a sufferer. We thank Him for the officers and members of the Executive Board who have so faithfully counselled and carried on the work of the past year. They have sought to know the mind of the Lord and to follow what appeared to be His providential leading in all cases.

I thank Him for you, the members of the various local societies, you who constitute the great host of women loyally carrying on the work with such splendid results. In proportion as the individual members in our societies live clean, consistent Christian lives and as they are intelligent and active in their service, will our Woman's Missionary Union be a strong center of missionary power. It will be a long step toward the high ideal of the general Union when each member realizes that she is a member of a Missionary society because she desires to stimulate a missionary spirit in the women and children of her church through prayer and increased knowledge of the Bible, the study of missions, and some form of personal service.

Seventeen years ago, in 1908, the Baptist General Convention was held in this beautiful city of Muskogee. It is most interesting to read the history of that meeting. Rev. T. C. Carleton presented the report of the "Woman's Work" as it was then called and he sounded a prophetic note. We read: "Miss Mary Jayne, one of last year's efficient field workers, retired to her wigwam and her former work among the Cheyennes, 'not that she loved Caeser less but Rome more.' She has been sadly missed. We coaxed her out of her cozy Indian corner to help present Woman's work to the Associations but her heart led her back to her beloved Indians." Prophetic. Yes, for Miss Jayne is still with the people of her choice and is very happily located at Bacone College. There were 271 societies, 22 Y. W. societies, 23 junior bands and 144 stúdy classes. "The work," concludes the report, "is in a healthy condition and growing in favor with God and man." And so it has been from year to year a steady growth in knowledge, wisdom, in a better understanding of the W. M. U. ideals and in a compactness of organization, until this glad hour. How well we have served, how faithfully we have guarded the trust God has given us will be indicated by the various reports.

Our study of Missions has increased our knowledge of the world's needs and helped us to realize the purpose and mission of life-service. May we love and labor, pray and give, and yield to no discouragement. There are unfinished tasks yet to be completed, there are great new tasks awaiting us. May we be faithful to the Woman's Missionary

Union's specials, in study, prayer and gifts for Foreign and Home Missions. May we be loyal and true to the fundamentals: Prayer, Bible Study, Mission Study, Enlistment, Personal Service and Giving.

And in the language of the Psalmist 1et us say: "I will bless the Lord at all times; His praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul shall make her boast in the Lord; the humble shall hear thereof and be glad. Oh, magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name together."

#### EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORT

Your Executive Board begs leave to submit the following report: Following the annual meeting held Nov. 10-11 in Chickasha the Executive Board of the W. M. U. of Oklahoma met in regular session in the Methodist Church, South, in Chickasha.

Mrs. McMillan of Bristow, Mrs. Merrill of Oklahoma City, Mrs. Huff of Oklahoma City, and Mrs. Wells of Purcell were re-elected members of the Advisory Committee and Mrs. J. B. Lawrence of Shawnee was elected the fifth member of this committee.

Mrs. P. B. Lowrance of Ponca City was re-elected Personal Service leader.

Mrs. E. E. Lively of Enid was elected Mission Study Leader and Mrs. A. J. Thrasher of Enid was elected White Cross Chairman.

Upon motion it was voted that we empower our Board to select and employ a trained young people's leader and that if th budget given us by the B. G. C. is not sufficient to cover her salary this deficit be supplemented by apportioning our missionary societies.

Motion carried that our President be the Vice-President of the W. M. U. of the South for Oklahoma.

It was voted that we pay the expenses of our President and Corresponding Secretary to the semi-annual meeting of the Executive Board of the W. M. U. of the South at Birmingham in January.

Our Corresponding Secretary was instructed by the Board to continue to send the package of literature to the local societies.

Upon motion it was voted that we have a directory and general information leaflet instead of the year book.

Motion made that the teacher of the Bible Study Class grade the papers of her class. Carried.

Mention made by Mrs. Spooner of the three seasons of prayer, the offerings of two of which will be over and above the regular campaign. \$50,000 is the minimum for the Lottie Moon offering for Foreign Missions which will go to the four needy fields in China. \$35,000 is the minimum for the offering for Home Missions in March and \$25,000 of this will go to Mountain Schools as a memorial to Dr. Brown and the other \$10,000 will go to Good Will Centers.

The First Quarterly meeting of the Executive Board for the year 1925 was held in the reception room of the Orphans' Home at Oklahoma City.

Mrs. Spooner reported that the B. G. C. had raised the budget of the W. M. U. \$1200.00 to cover salary of a field worker, stating that she was in correspondence with a young woman for this work. In explanation our Corresponding Secretary stated that W. M. U. is supposed to increase her pledge to the Margaret Fund and the Training School Expenses 10% each year. However, during the 75 Million Campaign this was not done and so we have a deficit which has accumulated to \$750.00; but in conference with Bro. Rounds he agreed to take care of the 10% increase for this year (which will leave us with a deficit of about \$600.00) and we have agreed to have only two specials over and above the regular 1925 program, i. e., the Lotti eMoon Offering and the Thank Offering in March.

Motion carried that we give a pennant for White Cross work at the next Convention for the association having the largest number of societies giving to White Cross.

Mrs. McMillan, Trustee for Louisville Training School, reported \$57.00 was the amount sent to Louisville for turkeys.

Dr. Lawrence, president of O. B. U., was present and addressed us briefly, speaking of the need of the girls for more dormitory room and suggesting that the W. M. U. of Oklahoma should build a Girls' Dormitory.

After general discussion it was voted that we give the building of a Girls' Dormitory first consideration and that the raising of funds for the furnishing of the Boys' Dormitory be left in the hands of the District Presidents to be divided among the different associations.

Motion carried that our next Board meeting be held in Shawnee.

Mrs. Spooner read a communication from the W. M. U. of the South in regard to a proposed amondment to the by-laws concerning the close of the fiscal year which now reads: "The fiscal year shall terminate and the books of the W. M. U. be closed on the date of the closing of the books of the Home and Foreign Boards." Proposed amendment reading: "The fiscal year shall terminate and the books of the W. M. U. be closed with the calendar year."

Motion carried to instruct our delegates to vote that this article 6 shall be changed to read: "The fiscal year shall terminate and the books of the W. M. U. be closed with the calendar year."

Also request was made by the W. M. U. of the South of the sentiment of the W. M. U. of Oklahona in regard to changing the time and place of the W. M. U. Annual Meeting. Upon motion it was voted that the W. M. U. of Oklahoma express as their sentiment that the W. M. U. of the South meet at the same place as the Southern Baptist Convention but two days previous.

Mrs. Spooner read a letter from Miss Mallory in regard to a memorial in honor of Mrs. James, President of the W. M. U. of the South, to be given to the Foreign Mission Board. Motion carried that our Corresponding Secretary write to the Missionary Societies and Auxiliaries in regard to this offering in honor of Mrs. James.

Motion carried that Mrs. Spooner write a letter to each local society asking them for a definite sum to take care of the deficit to the training school at Louisville and the Margaret Fund expenses.

Mrs. Spooner announced that Mrs. Withoft of Georgia would probably be with us in the District Meetings until the 5th or 6th of June. and above the regular 1925 program, i. e., the Lottie Moon Offering and to the Orphans' Home for their delightful hospitality.

Motion carried that we send our president to the annual meeting of the W. M. U. of the South in May as a gift to her and token of our appreciation of her work among us and that the districts co-operate in getting the money.

On April 20th the Executive Board of the W. M. U. of Oklahoma met in Shawnee and went in a body to O. B. U., attending chapel exercises and then inspecting the dormitories of the University. Afterwards meeting in executive session in the First Baptist Church of Shawnee.

Mention was made by Mrs. Spooner of the Sisterhood Special, Oklahoma's apportionment for this being \$70.00. Report of White Cross presented by Mrs. Thrasher, total \$1069.12. Cash donations \$940.40. Report adopted.

In regard to the Girls' Dormitory for O. B. U. to be built by the W. M. U., Mrs. Spooner reported the building would cost \$100,000, and spoke of having already received a pledge—a love gift from Mrs. Foster, President of Central Association, of \$1,000. Pledges should be in by Jan. 1, 1926, and one-third of the amount pledged should be paid by this time.

On June 17th, in response to a call from the Corresponding Secretary, the Advisory Committee of the W. M. U. met in the office of W. M. U. headquarters in Oklahoma City.

Miss Watkins, State Young Peoples' Leader, was introduced and welcomed to the State by Mrs. Mansfield.

Mrs. Spooner spoke of the money offered by the Sunday School Board for rural work, stating that Dr. Van Ness of the Sunday School Board proposed at the W. M. U. annual meeting in Memphis to match dollars with the W. M. U. of the South to the amount of \$10,000.00 for rural work. This would make about \$600.00 for each state to raise. Motion that the W. M. U. of Oklahoma match dollars with the Sunday School Board and put out one field worker to do exclusive rural work and that a letter be sent out by the corresponding secretary to the societies over the State asking for contributions for this purpose. Carried.

Mrs. Spooner read a letter from Dr. Cammack in regard to the Nuyaka Indian School, controlled by the Educational Board, asking for the indorsement of the W. M. U. Motion carried that the W. M. U. of Oklahoma indorse the Nuyaka School.

Mrs. Spooner stated the apportionment for expenses of Training School and Margaret Fund as given by Mrs. Lowndes for this State is \$1408.00, this being in excess of even the 10% increase. Motion made that Mrs. Spooner confer with Mr. Rounds and write to Mrs. Lowndes in regard to this matter. Carried.

It was voted that we (the Advisory Committee) recommend to the Executive Board of the W. M. U. that we revise our reporting system to correspond with the calendar year to comply with the request of Miss Mallory, Corresponding Secretary of the W. M. U. of the South.

Owing to the illness of our beloved Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, there was no third quarterly meeting of the Board.

In the fourth quarterly meeting Mrs. Spooner took up the matter of excess apportionment for expenses of Margaret Fund and Training School and reported having written Mrs. Lowndes that we felt \$1408.00 to be too much and that we would agree to take the 10% increase. Bro. Rounds and the Board decided they preferred taking our W. M. U. specials and Margaret Fund and Training School out of our general fund, giving to us three specials: The Lottie Moon, the Thank Offering, and

the Scholarship fund. This goes out of the general fund monthly and goes to the 10% increase, making our gift about \$1200.00.

Mrs. Spooner reported the District meetings having been well attended considering the inclement weather; the meetings are growing in interest and spirit. Mrs. Withoft of Georgia was in these meetings and also our young people's leader, Miss Elizabeth Watkins.

Reporting on the Assemblies, the Corresponding Secretary spoke of having attended Northeastern Assembly at Radium Springs and having taught a class of men and women in the W. M. U. Manual. There was a large attendance at Falls Creek and we had good classes in every department. Miss Mather taught "Looking Ahead With Latin America"; Miss Watkins taught the Y. W. A.'s, "Along the Highway of Service"; Miss Rachel Wiley taught the G. A.'s, Miss Boatright the Sunbeams, and Mr. Bailey of Seminole the R. A.'s. There was a banner given to the association having the largest number in all the classes and Atoka won the banner.

General discussion in regard to changing the reporting system to correspond with the calendar year as recommended by the advisory committee to comply with a request made by Miss Mallory, Corresponding Secretary of the W. M. U. of the South, was followed by a motion that we change our quarterly year to correspond with the calendar year. Carried.

Mrs. Spooner reported having received on the Rural fund \$360.00 and also that the James Memorial fund amounted to \$765,00.

Reading of letter from Miss Mallory, Corresponding Secretary of the W. M. U. of the South, in regard to the million dollars asked for by the Foreign Mission Board by January 1st to relieve the pressing debt, asking that our Lottie Moon Offering be made in the regular Lottie Moon envelopes on Dec. 27th. Motion made that we give our Lottie Moon offering on Dec. 27th and follow with a prayer program through Dec. 30th. Carried.

A year has come and gone since I stood before this body and read to you the report of the work of Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. How swiftly the year has brought us to this hour again. A year freighted with its joys and sorrows has been numbered with the past, in which we had our bright days, days when the many duties and fretting cares were tests to our faith.

Some of us have had our dark days when we could not see our way and the only light that shone across our pathway was a glow from the Cross of Christ as "it towered o'er the wrecks of time". A year full of days has been recorded with the past, and I wonder if you and I can say of each one of these days that we did our best for Jesus, and that our Father has written across the page of each one of these yesterdays, "Well done". #### DISTRICT MEETINGS

Ten of them with uniform programs based on the Woman's Missionary Union plan of work. In spite of the rain and sand storms the attendance was good, spirit fine. Great progress in our work has been made through the organized district. Much praise is due the faithful vice-presidents in carrying on in these first years. We were delighted to have with us, as a representative of Woman's Missionary Union, Mrs. Withoft of Fort Valley, Georgia, a charming woman whose messages were inspiring and helpful.

#### ASSOCIATIONS

We have forty white associations and during the year, I have heard personally from the presidents of each one. Some are not so well organized as others though the presidents are more and more seeing the wisdom of letting no year go by without having at least two meetings in addition to the Annual meeting; many do more, as they have associa-

tional divisions with leaders in charge. Such meetings afford the best of opportunity for the leaders to know their women and for mutual help to be given. Too much stress can not be put on this important work. One great need is an expense fund to be used by the President in her work of enlistment as she visits the churchs and societies. Much of the progress of our work is due these faithful, untiring associational presidents. Specially is this true concerning their work with the young people. You will remember that Oklabona was awarded, at the W. M. U. Convention in Memphis, the Girls' Auxiliary Banner for the greatest proportionate increase in G. A. Organizations

#### ASSEMBLIES

I had the privilege of spending, for the first time, a week at the Northeast Assembly meeting at Radium Springs. I taught the W. M. U. Manual to a large and interesting class of men and women. It was a joy indeed to have this personal touch with many whom I had only known through correspondence. The State Assembly at Falls Creek was the very best in attendance and interest in the various study courses. Classes were taught for all W. M. U. organizations. It was our great joy to have Miss Juliette Mather, Young People's Leader for the South, to teach the new Foreign Book, "Looking Ahead with Latin America", to a large class. We urge our women and young people to take a greater interest in our assembles.

#### PERSONAL SERVICE

A step forward has been made in personal service. According to the rule adopted at the Convention in Memphis, only that which has been done under the direction of the Personal Service Committee is to be reported. Point Eight of the Standard will read, "Some definite organized personal service for the spiritual uplift of the local community conducted by the members of the society under the society's personal service committee."

#### OFFICE WORK

The office work has been a joy. I love that personal touch through the hundreds of letters that come from the dear women all over this state, answering questions, sending literature, planning programs, etc. I cannot write this report without expressing my appreciation of the splendid work done by our very faithful and efficient Secretary, Miss Sampson, so beautifully did she assume the responsibilities of the office during my long absence. And how delightful to have Miss Elizabeth Watkins, who looks after the work of the young people and helps in general field work. While she has only been with us half a year, she is most efficient, altogether dependable, a joy to be associated with her.

#### MISSION STUDY

The very decided change in mission study plans, caused some confusion and retarded the progress to some extent but our women are recovering from this and the work is going on with increased interest.

#### ORPHANS' HOME

The children of our Home are adopted by the societies and all are well cared for. Each child's measurements and a list of needs are sent in the spring and fall and our women take great delight in supplying the needs. They not only send clothing, but chickens, eggs, fresh and canned fruit by the barrels, linen and plenty of nice warm quilts and blankets. The donations sent this year by the Missionary Societies amount to \$16,334.85.

#### PROGRESS MADE

The past year has been a year of real growth along many lines, in new organizations, in standard societies, Mission Study, Bible Study and reporting. We are happy indeed to report a good increase in the number of societies observing the Weeks of Proyer, and in their gifts, too, we have an encouraging increase.

During the year, we have welcomed into our family two hundred forty-five new societies. Societies now on our record, including new organizations 930, with five hundred forty actively reporting on the official blanks. This will give you some idea of the work yet to be done in enlisting co-operation in the great program of the Woman's Missionary Union.

#### STANDARD OF EXCELLENCE

Forty-four societies reported having reached Class A-1; sixty reached Class B; seventy-three Class C; and thirty-six reached Class D, making a total of two hundred eleven societies reporting their standard of excellence, leaving more than three hundred who failed to fill in the blank and I have no other way of knowing where to place them. Everything on the blank in the Record Book is intended to be used. It is all valuable information and absolutely necessary in making reports to the State and to the Southern Woman's Missionary Union.

As we face the new year, God grant that we enter it with the faith that will always bring Him into our work; with the courage that will help us to finish the great task before us and to take up the new program with an enlarged vision and carry it to a glorious victory; with a little more faithfulness in prayer, Bible and Mission Study, Soul Winning, Enlistment, Stewardship and sacrifice. May we feel that no task is too hard as we make ready for our King.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS

This year our women have given to the 1925 Program, \$56,573.17; to local work, \$38,951.00; to miscellaneous causes, \$2,471.00; to Orphans' Home above their church pledge, \$16,334.85; to W. M. U. Specials, \$7,108.06; to District and Associational expenses, \$520.00, making a grant total of \$121,967.68, an increase over last year of \$21,697.68.

We have had a little self-sacrifice, but only a little. We have had some giving down to blood but not much. "God so loved the world that He gave." Jesus "so loved the world that He gave." Whenever we reach the point in our work that we are willing to give ourselves freely and that without reservation to his cause here, there, and across the seas, the burdens of our great boards will be made lighter.

# REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S LEADER AND FIELD WORKER OF OKLAHOMA

Diamonds! Diamonds! Diamonds! How they shine! How many there are—no, not in Arkansas, Brazil, South Africa or India especially, but in Oklahoma. As the luster of the diamond is so great that it is conspicuous among all other stones, so the gleam of the W. M. U. jewels surpasses all earthly shining. As the 114 Girl's Auxiliaries radiate through their sacred five pointed star in answer to the command,

"Arise, Shine"; the 100 Y. W. A.'s glow with the true beauty of winning souls; sixty-five R. A. Chapters give the light of the Heavenly King to men in darkness, and the one hundred seventy-one Sunbeams "Carry the light to make the world bright", from over our state a glorious light is rising. Alone, as imperfect members of a small group, these stones often look pitifully dim to the average person, but as we behold the great light flooding into the world from the four hundred forty-four separate organizations we remember the words of the Saviour who said, "I am glorified in them."

After exposure to the Sun, many diamonds glow in a dark room. Our diamonds must needs be brought in contact with the Sun of Righteousness, that from Him they may get visions of His love and the work He wants done in the world. To aid them, they have the facinating prograins in World Comrades and Royal Service to direct their study of God's Word and Work. The Royal Ambassador's, Girl's Auxiliaries and Sunbeams report one hundred sixty-five subscriptions to World Comrades-far too few since each should have a book. Nevertheless their interest in the Kingdom is proved by the fact that 2,086 young people joined the auxiliaries this year. Their study appears to be not in vain since the Girl's Auxiliaries now report eighty-six tithers, the Royal Ambassador's twelve and the Y. W. A.'s one hundred thirty-six. Their giving is becoming more and more intelligent. Forty Sunbeam Bands, four Royal Ambassadors and ten Girl's Auxiliaries report as contributing to the great objects supported by our churches through the 1925 Missionary Program. Besides the regular offering, all four auxiliaries report a total of \$126.43 for such objects as the Orphanage, Scholarships and Missions.

Happily are these diamonds realizing that they can shed the Christ light personally into darkened China by contributing to our hospital at Chengchow through the White Cross. This last quarter alone, thirty-six Sunbeam Bands with \$18.15, seven Girl's Auxiliaries with \$5.60, four Royal Ambassador Chapters with \$4.25 and twenty-one Y. W. A.'s with \$43.75 helped in this work.

Another great ray of light being embedded in their heart is that of prayer, shown by the fact that twenty-nine Sunbeam Bands, twelve Girls' Auxiliaries, five Royal Ambassador Chapters, and twenty-one Y. W. A.'s observed one or more special seasons of prayer for Missions this year.

Even as the diamonds must be washed in acid to free them from foreign matter clinging to them, so our jewels must be immersed in the white light of truth. The challenging needs of a lost world, the efforts we are making to send the gospel, the conditions of the work, the successes and failures of Baptists in the light of Christ's love from the Cross, alone will free them of selfishness and enable them to shine. The Girls' Auxiliaries report forty-one classes and one hundred five seals; the R. A.'s seventeen classes and twenty-three seals; Sunbeams ninety-eight classes and three hundred fifth seals, and the Y. W. A.'s sixty-six classes and two hundred thirty seals, a total of six hundred seventy-three awards. Five of the Y. W. A. girls at Poteau have already obtained the green official seal, the only ones in the state with this distinction. Many auxiliary members wisely and happily attended the Assemblies this year and enrolled in the Mission Study classes, there winning their awards by faithful work.

The light reflected by the diamond makes it beautiful. So it is a reflected light shed by our auxiliaries—a light cast by One who "went about going good." In trying to make plain the fact that Christ said,

"I am the Light of the world" they have done much, reporting 1,871 visits to strangers and unenlisted; 4,231 visits to the hospitals and sick; 1,114 trays, 1,344 bouquets of flowers, 1,133 baskets of fruit, 1,514 garments given the needy, and 1,375 individuals helped. Furthermore, Sunbeams have made sewing cards for the White Cross, sent Christmas boxes to China, helped with the Hospital Medicine Fund, sent baskets to the needy, made scrap books for the sick, sent boxes and tea towels to the orphanage, and taken part on Woman's Missionary Societies programs.

The Girls' Auxiliaries have sent boxes, embroidery floss, and clothes to the orphanage, led prayer meetings and conducted Gospel Team work in the country.

The Holdenville Counsellor and eighteen Royal Ambassadors put on a splendid demonstration at their Association. The Y. W. A.'s have conducted a number of religious services, distributed tracts, helped furnish the Boys' Dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University, organized three new auxiliaries in neighboring churches and provided leaders and other help for twenty auxiliaries.

Best of all, they are earnestly pointing the lost to the light of the World. The Y. W. A.'s have spoken to five hundred twenty-two loss souls and the G. A.'s thirty-seven in one quarter alone. The Royal Ambassador's in one town are mentioned by their pastor for their unashamed soul winning.

Just as there are black, white, pink, blue, brown, yellow, and green diamonds, so the color of our Oklahoma jewel is not always white. We rejoice greatly in the splendid work done by R. E. Young, the colored Royal Ambassador Leader of the State. Last year he had one Chapter, the one in Oklahoma City. Now he has five, one of the most fruitrabeing in the Negro College at Langston. He is a most enthusiastic leader who used his boys in their State Convention. He eagerly utilizes every bit of help suggested for the Royal Ambassadors, a thing many white leaders neglect.

Our precious stones being fashioned like the "Semilitude of a palace" in the colleges are glowing brightly. The students at Ada, Durant, Norman, Oklahoma Baptist University, and Stillwater are seeking to be called wise by God as well as by man. Thanks to the consecrated, loving, faithful and inspiring counselors and College Y. W. A. presidents, the girls are striving toward the Standard. About eighty College Y. W. A. girls attended the Y. W. A. banquet given at the State Student Conference at Ada. We are confidently expecting Oklahoma to appear on the College A-1 Honor Roll this year. Our dear, busy Christian Nurses, too, at our Baptist Hospital at Muskogee are working happily in the Grace McBride Y. W. A.

U. Family! How wise and how happy that church with all the Family! How pitifully blind the one content with saved and intelligent mothers but lost and ignorant children! We rejoice to mention the splendid mines—the churches with the Full Family. The most complete (having all six auxiliaries) are: Albany, Bristow, Coalgate, Durant First, Baptist Orphanage. Those with full auxiliaries are: Anadarko, Caddo, Enid, McAlester First, Okmulgee First, Tulsa Immanuel, and Tonkawa. Those with all four are: Blue Jacket, Bennington, Bokchito, Bartlesville, Buffalo, Cleveland, Cameron, Holdenville, Kenefic, Laverne, Miami, Kobay, Roberta, Spring Creek, Sapulpa, Tulsa Nogales, Woodward, Wynnewood—a total of twenty-nine Full Families.

Sometimes the question, "Is it real?" is asked about the stone on her finger. This same question comes over and over to the minds of your leaders at the office. Truth! Truth! If we could only report the truth! This does not pretend to be a true report. Why? Because eighteen Y. W. A.'s, twenty-eight Girls' Auxiliaries, seventeen Royal Ambassador's and forty-five Sunbeam Bands have not reported at all this year. Many others have sent in only one of the four quarterly reports and 12 came too late to be counted. Is it fair, O Leader, for the other states looking at our jewels to think they shine much more dimly than they do because you refuse to report their activities?

How wonderful it is to meet and learn to love the great host of Oklahoma diamond diggers. Splendid women and men with one hand clasping that of the Saviour and the other lovingly holding those of young people as they patiently show them how to follow our Saviour into all the world. How they pray, plan and give time, self, money! Some wisely used the auxiliary members in the District Meetings in giving plays and programs. Some so successfully substituted, at the Associational Meetings, an exhibit of live Auxiliary members at work for mere talk about them. Some few have splendidly instituted the District Y. W. A. House Parties. Some conducted a charming G. A. Camp this summer. The Holdenville R. A. Counselor conducted a Construction Hike, and many

arranged special Young People's services. May God bless the faithful leaders. Yes, and may He give us mare. We could have four times the auxiliaries we have if the grown people would say, "Here am I, use me."

It is possible to make artificial diamonds almost exactly like the real ones. There is one difference, though. The artificial kind cannot be penetrated by the X-Ray; the real can perfectly. Many young people, at a glance, look like Missionary Baptists, but they are only initation unless they can bear the searching question of Jesus, "Lovest thou ne??? \* \* \* If ye love me, ye will keep my commandments \* \* \* Go ye into all the world \* \* \* and preach the Gospel to every creature."

When Jesus, the Great Valuator, sorts out the jewels at the last day, how happy we leaders and parents will be to see our jewels recognized and highly esteemed by Him because they shed a great light. How ashamed we will be if some of ours equally capable of serving Him are ranked as having been valueless because nobody cared to put forth the effort to find and polish them!

As a friend and helper of the diggers and polishers, and a great lover of the diamonds, your Young People's Leader and Field Worker most humbly and thankfully acknowledges her high and holy privilege and great responsibility. She would not swap tasks with a single girl in America! The work must be pleasant in such a state with such people working for the King of the World! She has been royally entertained in sixty-six different homes over the state. She has made eighty talks, attended nine District Meetings, fifteen Associational Meetings, two Y. W. A. District House Parties, one Girls' Auxiliary Camp, two Summer Assemblies, one State Baptist Student Conference, one Rally, one Fifth Sunday Meeting, visited three Colleges and Universities, taught three Mission Study Classes, taken twenty-five subscriptions to our magazines; organized two Y. W. A.'s, three R. A.'s, four G. A.'s. She has spent in the office 53.

"In the mines in dirt, mud and grime, half naked men dripping with perspiration, labor hammering, picking, shovelling, wheeling trucks, with excessive muscular strain. All this mighty organization, strenuous expenditure of energy, costly machinery, ceaseless toil goes on night and day Just to win a few stones wherewith to deck my lady's finger and gratify her vanity." Should we not, as Baptists, in our own communities, surroundede ever by the dirt and grime of sin, using the splendid W. M. U. organization, work with unrestricted physical, mental and spiritual energy, and as costly machinery as necessary, ceaselessly day and night to win the jewels for Jesus—whom He has already bought with His blood?

#### SUGGESTIONS

. That each of us ask ourselves the question, How am I answering to God for my responsibility of the Young People? Do something definite for them.

- 2. That Each Woman's Missionary Society without all six auxiliaries make the matter of the young people an object of earnest prayer and thought util God points out the leader andthe Family is complete. Pray definitely for leaders.
- 3. That the Woman's Missionary Society not think the leadership of the young people to be just the counselors' business, but realize they must foster them, provide literature, personal encouragement, standards, arm

bands and all the attractiveness possibe, remembering how fascinating Satan makes his work appear.

- 4. That every Baptist Mother in Oklahoma subscribe to World Comrades for her children, and every woman not a mother subscribe for some other woman's child.
- 5. No W. M. S. allow an auxiliary in her church to exist without a copy of Home and Foreign Fields and at least five World Comrades.
- 6. That the Woman's Missionary Society of every church set aside one day each year as promotion day, having a public program, promoting the auxiliary members according to age, using the new promotion certificates from the State Headquarters.
- 7. That every Auxiliary remember it is a Missionary organization and as such it's gifts must go to the 1925 Missionary Program through the church envelopes. The church treasurer is under sacred trust to forward all auxiliary gifts intact to the State Secretary of Missions, recording such separately on his books and reporting them in the church letters.
- 8. That every member of an auxiliary realize that he is expected to give some amount each month regularly to missions, be it large or small That no one is an active member who does not. That each one make a definite monthly pledge to missions, the secretary keping a record of all such pledges and checking them monthly, sending the apportionment for the year thus obtained to the State Young Peoples' Leader.
- 9. That each auxiliary keep a careful record of gifts to missions through the church, extra mission offering at the Prayer Seasons, contributions for Personal Service, White Cross, Oklahoma Baptist University separately and report this to the Woman's Missionary Society. That the society report these items separately by auxiliaries to State head-quarters.
  - 10. That every child and young person be urged to tithe.
- 11. hat every auxiliary taking a mission study book, stand the examination and send in the names immediately to the state leader for awards,
- 12. That each church have a mission study book reading contest and  $\cdot$  a school of missions for the young people.
- 13. That each organization start the year with a Standard of Excellence from Birmingham and carefully mark it monthly.
- 14. That the young people be used on every District and Associational W. M. U. meeting during the coming year.
- 15. That in every city where there are as many as two Y. W. A.'s a city Union be formed.
- 16. That in every Association there be quartely rallies for the G. A.'s, Y. W. A.'s, R. A.'s and Sunbeams with interesting programs by and for the young people.
- 17. That in every Association with two or more R. A. Chapters there be at least an Annual Conclave.
  - 18. That in every District there be instituted a Y. W. A Houseparty.
  - 19. That summer G. A., R. A., and Y. W A Camps be held.
- 20. That the State conduct a Y. W. A., G. A. and R. A. Camp this Summer with intensive Mission and Bible Study,
- 21. That the W. M. S. and Y. W. A. of every church do its best to send a representative to the Annual Southwide Y. W. A. camp at Ridge-crest, North Carolina in June.

22. That each leader realize the importance of reporting and of sending them in on time.

# REPORT OF MISSION STUDY

No woman has a broad idea of the life of the world who lacks a knowledge of the achievement of missions. It has been said that your

interest in missions is the mark of your Christian character, your participation in missions is the measure of your Christian attainment but the real measure of your Christian efficiency is your knowledge of missions.

Down through the ages has rung that clarion call of that old prophet when he said: "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge." The Christian ideal is that every one who names the name of Christ shall in theory and practice acknowledge himself the steward of all intellectual powers and should direct every effort toward the time when "The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the Blor yof th Lord as the the waters cover the sea." So we are urged to be students of the many mans of missionary activity that are placed in our hands and we must be continuously working at this glorious task "in season and out of season" for "The love of Christ constraineth us" and we must

"Proclaim to every people, tongue and nation, That God, in whom they live and move, is love; Tell how he stooped to save His lost creation And died on earth that man might live above."

During the past year some less work has been done owing to the change in the course but when the details have been worked out and torecords are well in hand the work will go forward in a surprising way and looking forward the time when are to for work done will reach our women promptly as they deserve them. We realize that at all times we should seek to put before those who study the direct results in Kingdom work instead of a seal won and that the knowledge gained should draw us closer to Him and a seal should seal us in His service, as it only represents a recognition of work done, of knowledge gained. But any work promptly rewarded is more readily followed by that of more intensive interest and a deeper yearning to obtain even greater rewards and all efforts, however feeble, must have proper recognition at the proper time. This will require both time and effort on the part of someone but will be the means of a marked growh "Old things are passed away" and "Behold, all things are and interest. become new" truly applies to our new course and the change will benefit us far beyond our expectations.

When Home and Foreign' Books are used it is sometimes a disadvantage to use some missionary books as a text because of changes made as the work on the field progresses and missionaries and statistics change, so we advise that leaders urge the study of our latest publications, at all times making comparisons and using helps found in late copies of Home and Foreign Fields, Royal Service, World Comrades, pamphlets, etc. Our teachers must be practical and give those who study a correct knowledge of our present day progress and visualize our future achievements.

The change in our course and the work not being well understood can be overcome in a great measure if everyone will strive to impart what information they have and pass on to another any literature they have after it has been carefully, prayerfully, and understandingly read, hastening the time when we will be working to reach a desired end with clear and definite path before us, not groping in the darkness of a misunderstood plan. Books should be exchanged, reading clubs formed, circulating libraries established and every means possible used to keep all society members busy.

Schools of instruction and Mission Study Conferences should be held by capable leaders and talks to encourage and inspire others are invaluable helps to us in the work and in training leaders. Of all influences about us in the present age perhaps none is so largely educative as that of reading; the press even distances the pulpit in its control over the minds of men and women. The paper and the pamphlet go where the pastor and the preacher cannot find thir way, and where the W. M. U. organization is not a reality. So in the presentation of the advanced course and reading course we feel that lives will be greatly enriched and many reached and claimed for service. Heretofore there has been some tendency toward superficial study and this course comprising twelve books, four of which a written test with closed book is required and eight for reading with a general test and a time limit of one year for the twelve books and recognition of completed course with diploma and also recognition at the annual meeting of the W. M. U. auxiliary to the Southern Convention, all tend to intensify the already growing interest in the work in which many women are now anxiously waiting to begin. Many things of vital interest concerning the work of Mission Study crowd our minds and fill our hearts and move our hands and many plans are yet to be worked out so we must ask the help and leadership of Him who said: "Hearken unto Me, every one of you and understand," "Let these sayings sink down into your ears," "Be of good cheer."

A growing interest in Bible Study is the result of much prayerful effort and many classes deserve special mention. While the sales of Dr. Moore's Outlines have not been as many as in previous years the fact that all outlines previously bought are being used in addition to the ones bought this year is evidence of increased Bible study. Dr. Tidwell's "Bible, Period by Period" has served many classes worthy of mention besides we have had many other Bible classes in various other books. We feel the year has brought many things to our notice which when satisfactorily adjusted will be for the betterment of many who are on our list and mean the enlistment of others and we are praying that we may have the approval of those we are trying to serve and of Him who will

justly reward us in the end.

#### MISSION STUDY

Certificate cards with seals attached for the required books previously taken have been sent to 2.983 women. Seventeen having completed Course One, and four, Course Two. Seals issued for work done this year to women, 1,784; to auxiliaries, six hundred seventy-three. Total silver seals, 2,457; Mission study classes for W. M. U., five hundred fifty-nine; for the Auxiliaries, two hundred twenty-two, making a fotal of classes reported to the office of seven hundred eighty-one.

Diplomas issued in the Kingdom Study Course (Bible Outline) this year, sixty-seven. The change in this course of Bible Study retarded the

Missionary Training School, Louisville, Kentucky.

Communications from Mrs. Eager, Chairman of the Board of Managers, tell us that the summer was full of interest, as the fond dream of many years was being realized—a model Good Will Center. On October 15th, this splendid up-to-date building was dedicated. It stands on a fine lot at 524 East Madison Street, replacing the two old houses which stood there. The contractor, with suggestions from Misses Littlejohn and Johnson, who have charge of the religious and social work done in the city by the Training School, has made possible at the minimum cost of \$35,000.00 this truly model workshop. You are cordially invited to come and see!

Also during the summer much fine work has been done putting into shape the Maud R. McLure Reference Room. Gifts from Mrs. W. C. James, from Miss Evie Brown's estate, a generous collection taken at Memphis to honor the 21st birthdayof the school and a splendid gift or books on "Christian Education" from the Sunday School Board, have formed the nucleus of a working library for the school, which will indeed be needed when the Seminary is moved. Miss Mary B. Pratt, Chairman of the Library Committee, and Miss Littlejohn have served most faithfully in this work and Frederick Bose, son of the Principal, has been a willing assistant.

The complete renovation of House Beautiful during the summer gave it a fine appearance for the opening, September 21st. Mrs. Janie Cree Bose, the new Principal, Miss Littlejohn, who has so ably done the work of Principal for two years, and the other members of the staff were all ready to greet the young women with enthusiasm and sympathetic interest.

The enrollment this year is not as large as in other years, due no doubt, to the sad fact that for three years our Boards have not been able to give any work to our home or foreign volunteers. The student body is composed of one hundred fine, earnest young women.

Oklahoma again has no students in the school. This is not due to lack of interest on the part of our girls. I have received more applications for information than ever before. However, most of these who are applying are hoping to go in the near future. I have written 63 letters this year and have sent out 71 bulletins.

I have made appeals for funds for Christmas turkeys, Oklahoma's annual gift to the faculty and our girls. One generous Association, Delaware, has given me \$24.02. I am asking you today to complete that fund. Respectfully submitted.
