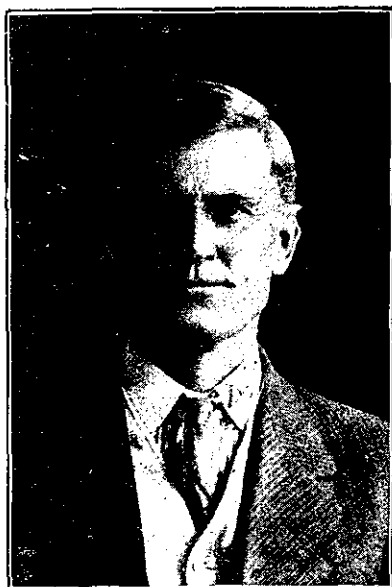

# Constitution

## Article I—Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## Article II—Constituency

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers appointed by Baptist Churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

## Article III—Object

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the Churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all the denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

## Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this convention shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

## Article V.—Boards, Trustees and Committees

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to appoint such Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this Convention.

## Article VI.—Board of Directors

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention and thirty-two (32) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention, at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

**Section 4.** This Board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

#### **Article VII.—Proceedings**

**Section 1.** The proceedings of this Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the Churches.

#### **Article VIII.—Annual Meetings**

**Section 1.** The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

#### **Article IX.—Special Funds**

**Section 1.** All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

#### **Article X.—Change of Constitution**

**Section 1.** This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

**Section 2.** Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

### **BY-LAWS OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA**

#### **ARTICLE I**

**Section 1.** The business and the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of Directors shall be thirty-four (34).

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

**Section 2.** The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year, as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year.

**Section 3.** The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Board of Directors herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the convention.

**Section 4.** In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.

Section 5. The Directors shall hold quarterly meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall by proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held, as above provided.

Section 7. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall be:  
A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.

Two Vice-Presidents, selected by the Board.

A Recording Secretary, elected by the Convention.

An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.

A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.

A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention, shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes, and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make quarterly reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He shall attest with the President all contracts authorized by the Board



of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

#### ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of an emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefor, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

#### ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention, except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done only in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 5. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

#### ARTICLE VI.

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until same has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State Paper at least six months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request comes to the convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following convention a year hence.

#### PROPOSED ARTICLE OF AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

##### Article

No law shall be passed respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, nor shall the National Government or any State, county, city, town, village, or other civil division use its property or credit or any money raised by taxation or otherwise, or authorize either to be used, for the purpose of founding, maintaining, or aiding by appropriation, payment for services, expenses, or in any other manner, other than by remission of taxation, any church, religious denomination or religious society, or any institution, school, society, or undertaking which is wholly or in part under sectarian or ecclesiastical control.

43. A. L. Gregg read the following report on cooperative missions and after brief discussion it was adopted.

#### REPORT ON COOPERATIVE MISSIONS

Evangelization has always been dependent upon cooperative missionary effort. Jesus sent missionaries by two's. The foundation principle is from "Jerusalem" to "the uttermost". Missions is evangelism at home

and evangelism is missioons away. And since the world has become a neighborhood it becomes the duty of Baptists to make the world, through missions, a brotherhood. Therefore, for efficiency and convenience we have boundary lines and boards known as Associational, District, State, Home, and Foreign.

The first unit of this organization is the Association. There are 32 associations in Oklahoma and each association is doing a monumental work; but within the bounds of the associations are the sections where 76% of our population are victims of heresies, ignorance, and superstition. Missionizing the associations must be done, 186,000 invisioned and inspired Baptist. The enlarging of prisons, and the increased demand for the electric chair, are direct or indirect results of our failure to missionize the associations. Thousands of souls within 20 miles of our warm churches know nothing of our message.

The second unit is District Missions. At present ten missionaries are at work and are reporting \$5,401.64 raised and 1,232 baptisms; 1,592 conversions for the year ending October 31, 1935.

Third, is the State, with her vast territory of fertile soil, oil wells, 1,076 Baptist churchless preachers; with three-fourths of her 2,500,000 people unchurched, but with 186,000 Baptists to lead in the forward march. This state work is gracefully manned by Dr. Andrew Potter and Rev. T. P. Haskins. The slogan, "Pay out and stay out," has had the hearty support of the departmental leaders: Secretary T. H. Farmer, Editor E. C. Routh, Secretary W. M. U.; Mrs. Spooner, President of O. B. U.; Dr. John W. Raley, and the hosts of Baptists over the State, the once baffling debts have become steppnig stones to great spiritual heights and to the sun-rising of a new day.

Fourth is the Home Mission division. The Home Mission Board has 247 missionaries with 598 out stations, 22,072 Sunday Schools. Within the bounds of the Home Mission Board are 45,000 deaf mutes, and a total of the various groups of foreigners and aliens of 19,000,000.

Therefore, with the Associational challenge of heresies, ignorance and superstition; and with the 76% of Oklahoma, 2,500,00 extending the Macedonian call; and with the 19,000,000 foreigners and aliens, plus our own millions with outstretched hands, ought we to see the fields white unto harvest—and seeing them ought we to spare money, mind or energy?

"Look on the fields, they are white already . . .

"Pray ye the Lord of the harvest" . . . and "Go ye" into the fields.

We recommend that special emphasis be given the Cooperative Program, and that we bend every energy to stimulate all our Mission activities.

# **REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS, BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION**

For the Year Ending October 31, 1935

"Lead on, O King Eternal,  
The Day of march has come."

We open our report with the words of this beautiful hymn. We acknowledge the grace of God in strengthening power upon us as we have labored in days of preparation for this "Forward March." The two years of our administration as Executive Secretary have seen vast changes in our national life and uncertainty and anxiety have gripped the whole earth. The people of God, however, have carried on in spite of hindering causes, as numerous achievements will eloquently testify. So we find ourselves today under a new debt of gratitude to God for His manifold blessings upon our work in the year 1934-35.

We have never had a finer spirit of unity among our people. Our associates and helpers in denominational work have given closest co-operation and we hasten to express our appreciation for the helpful attitude that the pastors and other church leaders, those who have been responsible for the different organizations of our denominational life, the office force, the field workers, and all employees of your board have given during this past year.

This annual report represents a year of sacrificial and consecrated service which will bring joy to every Oklahoma Baptist heart and a renewed determination to say, in the stirring words of the poet:

"And now, O King Eternal,  
We lift our battle song."

We present herewith a brief statement concerning the different agencies and institutions.

## **Hospitals**

We own and operate two splendid Baptist Hospitals, one at Miami and one at Muskogee. These two institutions have made an excellent record the past year. More and more of our Baptist people are coming to recognize the value of their institutions of healing. This patronage is appreciated and it is hoped that our people, in increasingly large numbers, will avail themselves of the facilities offered by their own hospitals.

It is the earnest desire of the hospital management and staff to render the highest type of service to those who enter the institutions for treatment. Our hospitals are Christian institutions. The speech and conduct of all connected therewith are expected to conform to recognized Christian ideals. The doctors generously make their knowledge and skill available to the end that every patient may receive the best of care and service.

The Baptist women of Oklahoma have been most generous during the year in their gifts of linens, jellies, jams, preserves, etc., etc. Donations of this kind are of great help and are highly appreciated.

## **Book Store**

The Book Store is a distinct asset and a denominational investment. The total net worth December 30, 1934, was \$16,789.12.

At our own Book Store you can get supplies for every department of the church as well as a complete line of general and religious books and Bibles. It is the desire of the Book Store, and Mr. H. Killingsworth,

the manager, to serve Oklahoma Baptists promptly and efficiently. The Book Store covets your continued patronage and support.

#### Oklahoma Baptist University

Oklahoma Baptist University continues to grow in favor with the people throughout the State. It is our one and only Baptist school. Dr. Raley has proven his ability as a leader and every indication points to his successful administration of O. B. U.'s affairs. We heartily approve the plans and policies set out for the school by its Board of Trustees and its noble young president, and pledge our co-operation to their sane, constructive, forward-looking program.

#### Orphans Home

There is probably no work fostered by the Baptist General Convention which is dearer to the hearts of our people than the care of the big family of fatherless and motherless children at our Orphanage in Oklahoma City. In our own homes the boys and girls all too soon reach maturity and leave to engage in their own activities but your Orphanage is the one perennial Baptist family, where the place of some child whose term has expired is constantly sought by some younger one needing the protection and care of this motherly institution.

Upon the resignation of Mr. E. A. Howard, superintendent, a few months ago, occasioned by ill health, the work of directing the affairs of the Home was assumed by the Board of Directors and the General Secretary. A splendid organization is being perfected for the conduct of the Home's affairs and a successful administration is predicted.

The Home property is in a terribly dilapidated condition and must have immediate attention to obviate suffering and hardship for the children. The property must be repaired, new equipment installed, and a more comprehensive program of physical, cultural, moral, and spiritual training must be instituted for the proper care and training of our children. Ten Thousand Dollars is the minimum amount that should be expended within the next year. The Home must have better support or suffer.

#### Woman's Missionary Union

We wish to record our grateful appreciation of the splendid work of our women through their programs of instruction and inspiration. They have greatly stimulated the cause of Missions in the churches. We bespeak their continued support of the Co-operative Program and trust they will be able to enlist all of the women in its support. We acknowledge our debt of gratitude to Mrs. George McMillan, president, and Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, secretary, for the unselfish service they have rendered to our Baptist people the past years.

#### Baptist Brotherhood

The Baptist Brotherhood idea is growing in favor with the Baptist laymen of Oklahoma. One of the most significant Baptist meetings in the history of Oklahoma Baptists was held last April in Oklahoma City when one thousand men, representing every section of Oklahoma, came together to consider the call and challenge of the Kingdom of God.

At practically all of the associations this year, the Brotherhood plan was presented, and we found pastors and laymen heartily in favor of aggressive and intensive effort to enlist and develop the man-power of our churches. We hope that in every church the laymen will be urged to organize brotherhoods for Bible and mission study, and for practical services in soul-winning and stewardship. The women have already demonstrated the value of systematic and continuous plans of study and

work. They know about missions because they study missions; because they know, they pray and give. We have a mighty host of Baptist men, who, when enlisted in their respective churches and associations, will bring in a new day in our Oklahoma Baptist Zion. Already a great number of strong laymen have shown us the way by their intelligent and unfaltering devotion to Christ's cause. Let us, in the year before us, give more attention to the strengthening of interest in Baptist Brotherhoods for the wider enlistment and development of Baptist laymen.

### Training Department

The consolidation of the work of the Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Baptist Student Union, and Assembly Departments under one directing head has proven quite satisfactory. It was effected for the sake of economy but has commended itself for purposes of unity in action, harmony of purpose, and efficiency in administration. Mr. T. H. Farmer has worked untiringly at this big job and has sometimes been almost compelled to "make brick without straw." We recommend a continuance of this departmental grouping.

We desire in this connection to acknowledge a debt of gratitude to the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention for the help given us the past year on the salaries and expenses of our employees. They furnished \$3,847.55, our Board supplied \$3,385.47, and \$4,700.98 was obtained from State and District Conventions, Assembly registrations, rentals, churches, etc., making a total of \$10,858.53 received and expended by this department during the year. Further, the Sunday School Board paid direct to workers in our State \$4,176.43, making a grand total of \$15,034.96.

We are happy to report that the Sunday School Board has offered, through its secretary, Dr. T. L. Holcomb, to give us next year \$5,500.00. We urge our churches to register their gratitude and appreciation by buying supplies and paying promptly Sunday School Board accounts.

### Baptist Assembly

The Baptist Assembly at Falls Creek, led by Mr. T. H. Farmer, had this past summer the greatest session in its glorious history. We feel that the Assembly offers an excellent opportunity for our people to combine needed vacations with most profitable study. The programs rendered are of high order and we hope that more of our people will spend their vacations in connection with this great Assembly. It is rich in fellowship, instructive in purpose, inspiring in results. All of our leaders would be benefited, and the cause promoted, by attending our Assembly.

### Baptist Messenger

The Baptist Messenger is owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention. Its noble editor, Dr. E. C. Routh, is one of the outstanding writers and scholars of the South. The Baptist Messenger, being a Convention-owned enterprise, we can duly rejoice over the progress made. The paper exerts a wide influence among Oklahoma and Southern Baptists and ranks high in circulation among Baptist periodicals in America. We are earnestly hoping that the number of subscriptions will continue to mount until our people generally are reading this valuable publication.

The Baptist Messenger is the pipe line supplying to the Baptists of Oklahoma the information necessary for the conduct of our denominational work, and necessary to the highest development of the Christian life of our people. Let us undertake within the next few months a large increase in circulation.

### The Tithing Test

Several months ago the attention of Oklahoma Baptists was called to the "Belmont Plan," or the "Tithers' Test" Movement, by which members of churches were induced to try, for at least three months, the giving of the tithe. Scores of Oklahoma Baptist churches have adopted this plan, with gratifying results. In every case, where given a fair trial, the receipts have increased from twenty-five per cent to more than one hundred per cent, and many churches, for the first time in years, went through the summer without any deficit in operating expenses. Many have been so thoroughly convinced of the practical value of tithing that this has been adopted as a permanent policy. After all, we believe this to be God's plan, and we should obey Him. Certainly, under grace, we should not do less for God's cause than did the Jew under the law. We have had a clearer revelation on the Cross, of God's love for us, than men had under the law, before Calvary. If God so loved us as to give His only Son for us, we should so love Him, as to give Him the best.

Giving should be considered by us as much a part of worship as praying, or singing, or preaching. Let us place and keep giving on the high plane where it belongs, and honor God with our best. We urge the teaching and practice of scriptural stewardship, with the tithe as the minimum but not as the full measure of our giving.

### Assistant Secretary

The retirement of Rev. E. A. Howard, as superintendent of the Orphans' Home, put the matter of a solution of the problem created thereby in the hands of the Board of Directors of the General Convention. It was incumbent upon the Board of Directors to procure a superintendent or make such adjustment in lieu thereof as would best serve the Home in all its appointments, and the general cause of the Oklahoma Baptist Brotherhood. The fact could not be overlooked that Superintendent Howard had been able to so manage the fiscal policies of the Home that, at the point of his retirement, no deficit existed. The Board of Directors remembered that, at the past three annual sessions, the Convention specifically declared itself upon the question of relieving our Boards, agencies, and institutions of all debts against them, and of refusing to make more debts while present ones were being liquidated. It was the opinion of the Board of Directors that this oft-reiterated policy should be continued. The Board looked upon the carrying out of the debt-retirement policy as a primary responsibility. They decided that their action with reference to solving the problem at the Orphans' Home must accord with this specific charge and policy of the Convention. The Orphans' Home could easily create a further debt debacle. Commitments could be made within a few months that would involve the Convention in embarrassment and have a tendency to break the growing morale of our people. It was decided, therefore, that whatever was done must be done with a "No Debt" policy in mind.

Pursuant to the above set forth, the Board of Directors, on June 27th, passed the following resolutions:

"1st. That the general supervision, direction, and management of the Orphans' Home be laid upon the Board of Directors and their responsible officer, the General Secretary.

"2nd. That all promotional activities of the Orphans' Home be originated in and directed by the general office of the Board of Directors.

"3rd. That, in view of the ever enlarging scope of the work under the direct supervision of the Board of Directors, and its responsible officer, Secretary Potter; in view of the Secretary's arduous labors in

giving oversight to the Hospitals at Muskogee and Miami, in addition to the primary duties of his office; in view of the fact that the Board of Directors has committed itself and the General Secretary to the Campaign soon to be launched to liquidate all indebtedness upon Oklahoma Baptist University; and in view of the further duty and responsibility the action above suggested will lay upon the General Secretary:

"It Is Hereby Provided and ordered that an assistant to the Secretary be employed to assume certain specific duties and responsibilities now incumbent upon the General Secretary, and that his selection be made by the Board of Directors in counsel with Secretary Potter."

It was felt by the Board of Directors that this action would give balance, unity, harmony, and efficiency to the general program of the Baptist work in Oklahoma, properly lodge authority and responsibility, and give practical assurance to the Brotherhood at large that the oft-reiterated policy of the Convention to free itself of debt would be continued until the final consummation of the Convention's expressed purpose and plan.

After the action of the Board, as set forth above, they faced the problem of finding a suitable man for this tremendously important position. A committee, composed of E. L. Watson, chairman; J. W. Bruner, K. D. Turner, Ernest Quick, and Augie Henry, was appointed to nominate a man for this office. This committee unanimously agreed upon and recommended to the Board Rev. T. P. Haskins, who was unanimously and heartily elected.

Brother Haskins is eminently qualified for the position. He has spent more than twenty years as pastor of some of the leading churches in our State. He is greatly beloved by the people everywhere, and the reception accorded him in the Associations throughout the State, and the unanimity of the acclaim he has received from the Brotherhood at large, is evidence of the wisdom of the committee and Board in his selection. No man in Oklahoma has a finer background for a general worker than Rev. T. P. Haskins. His election greatly pleased the General Secretary, who has known and loved him since boyhood days.

We are happy also that his election has not involved the Convention in additional expenditure of money, for the reason that the salary paid to the superintendent of the Orphans' Home is applied on the salary of the assistant.

#### District and Associational Missions

Special emphasis has been placed upon the District and Associational Mission work the past year. Ten fine men have been sent forth to win souls and strengthen churches. The results of their labors are as follows:

The district mission idea has grown in favor the past two years as evidenced by the number of districts which have underwritten the full salary of a missionary. Oklahoma County, led by Dr. R. M. Inlow, threw down the challenge two years ago. They also led in underwriting the full salary of their missionary this year.

The district missionaries are doing the most constructive sort of work as the above report will indicate. This type of work has passed the experimental stage and we are convinced that it is the best method now open to us for the enlisting and training of our people in winning souls to Christ.

We owe an everlasting debt of gratitude to Rev. R. C. Howard and the Kelham Avenue Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for making it possible to keep a missionary in the Kiamichi Valley.

District mission work has been greatly strengthened this fall. Defects in the plan have been remedied and the outlook is brighter than ever.

We are also encouraging Associations to have their own missionaries where it is practical. We have several fine men in the State serving as Associational missionaries: Grover Scales, Northeastern Association; J. H. Muse, LeFlore-Latimer Association; John Crabtree, Muskogee Association; George Davis, Chickasaw-Union Association; I. W. Archer, Bryan Association. All these men have done, and are doing, most excellent work in their respective territories.

We recommend the continuance of this method wherever practical and that the Board be instructed to promote any plan of missionary work that is satisfactory to the Board of Directors and the Associations involved. We should not wed ourselves to any one plan, but adopt any method that will get the gospel preached to the lost multitudes of Oklahoma.

### Evangelism

Baptists must never lose the seeking note. We have been majoring on evangelism through the years. This is the outstanding reason for the great growth of our cause in Oklahoma and beyond. We must never become a family church. Our forefathers laid well the foundations for our present work. They preached the gospel and called sinners to repentance. They baptized and indoctrinated believers. So must we also if we grow and prosper. To keep alive in Oklahoma the evangelistic passion we suggest a committee composed of Dr. C. C. Morris, president of the Convention; Rev. T. P. Haskins, and the district and associational missionaries, to promote a State-wide Summer Evangelistic Campaign and to make it simultaneous in Associations and Districts where practical. Let us go afield next year preaching the gospel to the lost and calling sinners to repentance.



### Enlistment

We are to "make disciples" and then "teach them to observe." So our evangelistic efforts must not outrun our enlistment and training. It is not sufficient to win souls. Saved people should be trained for church and pastoral support. They should be taught the doctrine of the stewardship of life and means, and led to support the causes of the Kingdom. We, therefore, suggest that the Convention seriously address itself to the matter of strengthening, enlarging, and intensifying its enlistment work. A church or denomination commits spiritual suicide that majors on evangelism and minors on enlistment, thus failing to tie the saved people into the church life.

### The Co-operative Program

As individual Baptists and as a group, we are under inescapable obligations to carry out the Great Commission of our Lord. Furthermore, it is our unspeakable privilege and opportunity to do so. That we may do this most effectively we have voluntarily come together in churches and in various organizations in the churches, in District Associations, in State Conventions, and in the Southern Baptist Convention. The Co-operative Program is the plan that has been used by Southern Baptists for the past several years for supporting every phase of their missionary, educational and benevolent work, including State, Home, and Foreign Missions, Baptist Schools, Colleges, Seminaries, Orphanages, Hospitals, and Old Ministers' Relief.

We call attention to the fact that only money contributed to the Co-operative Program can be allocated. All funds that are designated go directly to the specified objects without the deduction of even the cost of a postage stamp. While recognizing the right of every church and individual Baptist to designate his money, it is our earnest desire that all our churches and all our Baptist people shall support all the causes of the Kingdom. The Co-operative Program undertakes to carry out the Scriptural plan of giving and to make equitable distribution of the funds of all denominational objects. Let us get in the Co-operative Program this year.

### Recommendations

We recommend to the Convention as follows:

1. That we put strong emphasis on the State-wide evangelistic campaign.
2. That we do more enlistment work and stewardship teaching the coming year.
3. That it be our policy to operate on a cash basis.

4. That the 1935-36 state mission budget be projected on a basis not to exceed the reasonable expectation of receipts for this purpose.

5. That special efforts be made through Associational leadership, pastors, and laymen, to secure support for the causes from the churches not contributing to the Program.

6. That the Convention heartily endorse and co-operate through all of its agencies in the Every Member Canvass Movement.

7. That an intensive State-wide ingathering effort on behalf of the Co-operative Program be put on during the entire year. We urge our churches and leaders to adhere in the main to the budget plan for raising funds for the Baptist Co-operative Program as all told the most satisfactory and successful plan we have ever had.

#### Death to Deficit

We must safeguard the future. There must not be a recurrence of the debt debacle of the past ten years. We therefore recommend that every agency and institution owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention be, and are hereby instructed:

1. To exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best interests of the administration and promotion of their work.

2. That we instruct all interests provided for in the budget not to increase their indebtedness during the year 1935-36.

3. That all contracts and appropriations be made provisional to the end that the will of the Convention be made effective. In other words in case of appropriations in excess of receipts it is understood that the contract is not binding.

(Note:—Report down to section entitled "Down with Debt" was read with the request from Dr. Potter that he be allowed to read the balance of report at a special order tonight.)

Upon motion the above section of the report was adopted.

49. Report spoken to by J. T. Jones, Walters, and T. P. Haskins, assistant secretary of Baptist General Convention, Oklahoma City.

50. E. C. Routh read report of the Committee as ordered in Paragraph No. 29. Motion to adopt carried. The resolution is as follows:

#### Resolution

WHEREAS, the Initiative Petition for the repeal of prohibition laws in Oklahoma, has been filed and certified in the office of the Secretary of State; and

WHEREAS, serious consideration has been given the suggestion that control measures be submitted together with the repeal issue, either at a special election, or at the next general election; and

WHEREAS, such a ballot so complicated would tend to confuse the voters; therefore be it

RESOLVED: (1) That this Convention, representing 186,000 white and Indian Baptists, go on record as being unalterably and unequivocally opposed to the repeal of existing prohibition laws in Oklahoma, and we urge our Baptist people to resist every such effort.

(2) That we call upon public officials who are charged with the administration of law to enforce laws relating to the liquor traffic and all other laws.

(3) In order that all the people may be able to vote on this question, since more voters cast their ballot at the general election than at any other election, we respectfully make request of the Governor of the State of Oklahoma that the liquor question be submitted to the voters of Oklahoma at the next general election in November, 1936, and that the issue be a clear statement of Repeal or No Repeal, unconfused with methods of control;

(4) That, while we recommend that the standing committee appointed by this Convention have general direction of the campaign so far as our own Baptist forces are concerned, we co-operate in every practical way with other religious bodies and with all agencies opposed to the liquor traffic;

(5) That a copy of this resolution be dispatched to Honorable E. W. Marland, Governor of Oklahoma, and that copies be given the daily press and news agencies.

51. The secretary read telegrams from Convention of Alabama, also fraternal messages from Oklahoma students in B. B. I. of New Orleans, at Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth, also Tennessee Convention.

52. Motion carried that the Secretary send suitable replies to these fraternal messages.

53. Motion to adjourn carried and J. M. Jones led in closing prayer.

### WEDNESDAY NIGHT, 7:00 P. M.

54. The O. B. U. Band gave a 30 minute Musical Recital. It was a colorful program. Oklahoma Baptists may well be proud of the Band and Bugle Corps of O. B. U. Mr. Donald L. McCollum is Band Director.

55. J. L. Collins led the congregation in singing "Love Is the Theme." Mrs. Collins at the piano.

56. A. A. Duncan led in prayer.

57. President Morris turned the gavel over to T. W. Medearis, President of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University, who conducted the O. B. U. program.

58. The Girls' Quartette of O. B. U. sang, "The Lord is My Shepherd."

59. The Mixed Quartette of O. B. U. sang, "Jesus is Standing in Pilot's Hall."

60. The Men's Quartette of O. B. U. sang, "Though Your Sins be as Scarlet."

61. T. P. Haskins read the report on Christian Education and moved its adoption. Motion carried. The report is as follows:

We rejoice today in the fruitage of our Baptist forbears who have established and wrought wondrously well in the field of higher education. The deep need of a trained leadership in the new country was so keenly felt that they, in an early day, established colleges and universities under Christian leadership. Therefore, Christian Education is the mother of higher education in America.

Our Baptist people have made a marvellous contribution to our present civilization in this field and with this good beginning we expect to carry on this type of education until Jesus comes. We gratefully acknowledge the splendid work in higher education now being offered by all state colleges and universities, but there is still an open field for the Christian College.

"The Christian College is not a denominational luxury but a denominational necessity." This is a beautiful truth expressed by Dr. Dodd and needs a re-emphasis at the present time. If we as a Baptist people continue our progress, it is more essential today that we have a trained leadership than in any previous period of our history. Illiteracy is on the decline. High School and college graduates are found in all of our churches, even to some of the most remote rural sections. It is impossible for our preachers, missionaries, and Christian workers to be spiritual leaders of this group of educated workers in the most effective way unless they, too, have been trained.

We rejoice in the successful effort of Southern Baptists in meeting this need. We have today 18 Academies, 21 Junior Colleges, 29 Senior Colleges, 5 Seminaries and Training Schools with an enrolled student body of 23,000 plus, 2,000 of this number in training as preachers, missionaries, and special Christian workers.

Oklahoma Baptists have wrought wondrously well in this field in spite of all their reverses. We have so much today for which we should be grateful. We have concentrated our efforts in this field on one institution, viz.: Oklahoma Baptist University at Shawnee. We have a young man as president who is qualified in every way to be a real leader in the sphere of higher education and has already won his way into the hearts of Oklahoma Baptists. We have confidence in his ability to build one of the greatest Christian colleges of the South. We have a faculty which cannot be excelled in any college. We have the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, with its Executive Secretary, giving whole-hearted support to this one institution of higher learning. Surely this work shall continue so long as we need leaders in establishing the Kingdom of God on earth.

Let us build strong our Christian Colleges, Seminaries, and Training Schools, and may we ever magnify the Man of Galilee and follow strictly His teaching in all these institutions.

62. Miss Ruth Mitchell, head of the Voice Department of O. B. U., sang, "Arise, Shine, For Thy Light is Come." Miss Mitchell is director of all O. B. U. Quartettes.

63. President J. W. Raley presented his report of the work of Oklahoma Baptist University for the past year, and addressed the Convention concerning the need of Christian schools. The report is as follows:

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In order that messengers to the Convention may have a brief yet comprehensive survey of the actual situation in Oklahoma Baptist University, the report of the President is given in the following form:

- A. Academic structure
- B. Financial situation
- C. Physical improvements
- D. Enrollment
- E. Promotion
- F. Religion

##### A.—Academic Structure

In setting forth the academic organization, objectives, guiding principles, and practical appeal, I shall quote from the preface of the newly published book, "Why Christian Education?". This comprehensive and concise statement was prepared by Dean J. W. Jent and it admirably sets forth the entire program of the University.

##### 1.....Academic organization

a. A College of Liberal Arts, combining well-balanced groups of departments in the Division of Languages and Literature, Natural Sciences, Philosophy, Social Sciences, and Physical Education, with a flexible program of study leading to the degrees, A. B. and B. S.

b. A School of Education, offering a four-year technical course, leading to the degree, B. S. in Education.

c. A College of Fine Arts, offering a well-balanced program of cultural and technical study, leading to the uniform degree, B. F. A.

##### 2. Objectives

Complete education; the mastery of the arts and sciences plus religion; education in a religious environment; the impelling influence of classroom attitudes and campus atmosphere; the study of the Bible, the ideals and institutions of Christianity, and the principles of personal religion; the development of the spiritual impulses; the culture of Christian character.

##### a. A CHRISTIAN EDUCATION PROGRAM:

A faculty of Christian teachers, scholarly, efficient, and sound on religion; a select student body, sympathetic with the religious genius of the school; academic study and technical training in Bible and Religious Education; a place for Christianity in the general pattern of the curriculum; the supernatural in science, a "soul" in psychology, divine providence in history, the social thesis of Jesus in sociology, revelation in the search for truth, the primacy of permanent principles in ethics, the determinism of character in conduct; laboratory drill in Christian service; a school as actively religious as any church in the state.

##### b. A CHRISTIAN EDUCATION PRODUCT:

A symmetrical, spiritually energized personality; an approximation of the ideal life, exemplified by Jesus, socialized unselfishness; optimism and morals; stewardship and service, the standard of success.

### 3. Guiding Principles

THE ARTICLES OF FAITH, adopted by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, approved by the Board of Trustees of the University, and signed by all members of the Faculty, constitute the body of belief to which the institution is committed, and in the light of which the arts and sciences are interpreted.

The University is frankly conservative. It reflects and represents the Baptist churches of Oklahoma, in atmosphere and attitude. Its objective is, therefore, CHRISTIAN CULTURE. Its program conserves the synthesis of real scholarship and revealed religion. Its thesis is grounded in the contention that faith is a fact; that truth is a complex of reasoned and revealed reality; that the accurate interpretation of religious experience is the only adequate philosophy. Its mission and ministry is, thus, as broad as life and as high as the destiny of spiritual personality.

### 4. Practical appeal.

The University provides a professional course for teachers, with major specialization in elementary education, or secondary education; Fine Arts courses in music, dramatic art, and public school music, which prepares students for teaching in the various fields, or a professional career; a technical course in home economics, leading to the B. S. degree, which prepares for teaching, vocational service or home making; a thorough program of vocational training in the technique of printing, including every phase of vocational printing, preparing the student to operate a country newspaper or a commercial printing plant; fully-accredited pre-professional courses in medicine, law, journalism, and business; a well organized major in Bible and Religious Education, which prepares for the Theological Seminary or the active work of the Christian Ministry and other phases of specialized religious work.

### B. Financial Situation

The financial report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935, shows a decrease in indebtedness of \$3,153.00 from the amount owed one year previous. This reduction in indebtedness was partially due to a substantial reduction in accounts and notes owed the University. Collections on accounts reduced this asset from \$30,891.00 as of June 30, 1934, to \$25,984.00 as of June 3, 1935, representing a net reduction of \$4,907.00. A continuation of this improvement is being reflected in current collections.

Students enrolling in September paid 40 per cent more cash on their initial installments than during the corresponding months of the previous year.

The auditors' report shows an operating deficit for the past year of \$5,773.12, compared with an operating surplus for the previous year of \$3,886.27. Contributions received through the Co-operative Program increased approximately \$1,000.00 during the past year while the contributions received through the special Christian Education campaign decreased \$3,300.00. In 1934 a special O. B. U. campaign in Shawnee netted the University \$10,000.00. There was no campaign in 1935 but contributions amounting to \$6,390.00 were obtained in Shawnee by individual solicitation. A Shawnee campaign is planned for next spring.

The decrease in special contributions for Christian Education during the past year was \$5,998.00, which is a little more than the deficit of \$5,773.12. The total income from all sources was \$193,628.00, of which amount approximately \$20,000.00, or a little over ten per cent, was received from denominational channels but this is the margin that makes continuous operation possible.

Contributions amounting to \$1,293.05 have been received to apply on the purchase of equipment and remodeling of the residence hall for men, which cost approximately \$4,000.00.

We now have on hand endowment insurance policies, on which the premium is paid, amounting to approximately \$40,000.00.

We are submitting herewith a summary of the audit report as of June 30, 1935. A complete statement of the financial condition of the University as reflected in the audit, will be found in the minutes of the State Convention.

#### C. Physical Improvements

##### 1 ROCK WALL.

Considerable attention has been given during the past year to a campus beautification program. The Senior Class of 1935 began this program with a retaining rock wall as a memorial to the University. This wall proved to be of such beauty and added such attractiveness to the campus that it was deemed wise to continue this work, until now we have practically all of the campus on which we have buildings, surrounded by this beautiful wall of native stone. This improvement has been estimated to be of \$1,500.00 value to the University.

##### 2 MEN'S DORMITORY

It was necessary that certain repairs be made in the Men's Dormitory and that new furniture be purchased, before the opening of the fall semester. Repairs have been made and furniture purchased at an expense of a little over \$4,000.00. It is the hope of the University that the Men's Brotherhood units and Sunday School classes over the state will provide this amount on the plan followed by the women's organizations in furnishing the Memorial Dormitory. The cost per room for redecorating and refurnishing was approximately \$150.00. To date, \$1,293.05, to be applied on this expense, has been received from individuals and organizations. We have reason to believe that others will join in this movement and that before the year is over contributions will be sufficient to care for the expense. We are placing a brass plate on the door of each room thus paid for as a memorial to the donor.

### 3. PAVING

An arrangement was made with the City of Shawnee whereby the University was enabled to qualify for a Federal W. P. A. Project. Accordingly a paving project is now in process on the University campus. The estimate of the cost of this project is \$12,000.00. This entire amount is to be borne by the City Federal appropriation.

### 4. OTHER IMPROVEMENTS

Some other improvements have been made at no considerable expense to the University but when totaled with those mentioned, and approximately \$20,000.00 value to the University property. We are continuing the campus beautification program during the next year and we believe that within two or three years, the Oklahoma Baptist University campus will be one of the beauty spots of Oklahoma.

We shall appreciate hearing from anyone who wishes to contribute shrubs, evergreens, roses or any other plants or trees for the purpose of beautifying the campus.

### D. Enrollment

The present number of students enrolled in Oklahoma Baptist University is 507. It is worthy of our attention to note that among this group there are eighty-one honor scholarship students, that is, students who were recognized as the honor students in the high schools of the state. While there is a slight decrease in the number enrolled for the fall semester of 1935 as compared with the fall semester of 1934, there was a decided increase in the cash income brought by the student body. The student body of the fall of 1935 came 40 per cent better able to take care of themselves financially than did the student body of 1934.

In order to build the University on sound business principles, we found it necessary to be more rigid in our demands. We could easily have had a larger enrollment during this semester than we had at the same time last year, if we had followed the same policy in enrolling students. While we have every consideration for the student who must work for his own expenses while in school, and while we have a deep sympathy for those who cannot in any way provide for themselves, we must insist that more of the responsibility of financing the student come from his home or the local church and that the insistence that the University assume financial responsibility for the student be lessened.

We adopted a policy of assisting every student who actually needed assistance, in some way, but we have limited the amount of help that he may receive from the University. Thus we feel that we are helping more students to continue in school and at the same time encouraging self-help and thereby increasing University income. It is well to note that a number of churches and associations are arranging for loan funds and service scholarships for worthy students and we would encourage such a program on the part of local churches, associations, brotherhoods, W. M. U. units, and others interested.

We would call attention to another problem in student enrollment, that of many of our Baptist people sending their sons and daughters to Baptist institutions in other states. We would urge on the basis of our ability to care for them, as well or better than schools of other states, that all of our people recognize the need of their loyalty to this institution and support it with both students and money.

Regarding enrollment, there is one additional problem to which I would like to call your attention, namely, that Oklahoma Baptist University must have more income in order to take care of a larger student body in an adequate and proper manner. No student ever pays for the



complete cost of his education, either in a tax-supported school or in a private school. We must have financial stability commensurate with the growth of the student body if we would build a permanent institution. It will doubtless be of interest to the Baptists of Oklahoma to learn that Oklahoma Baptist University ranks near the top in enrollment among the Baptist senior colleges and universities of the Southern Baptist Convention. There are twenty-nine senior colleges and universities owned and operated by Baptists in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. Among these twenty-nine, Oklahoma Baptist University ranks eighth in enrollment, as given in the report of the Education Commission for the fall semester of 1934. Only the following outrank Oklahoma Baptist University, namely: Baylor University, Howard College, Richmond College, Wake Forest College, Howard-Payne College, Simmons College and Baylor College. A further check reveals that there are only four states in the South that have larger schools than does Oklahoma, namely: Texas, Alabama, Virginia, and North Carolina.

If our people really considered all matters related to this fact, they would appreciate better the achievements made by the Baptists of Oklahoma during the lifetime of this University. All of the other schools named have had the support of their constituents many times the years numbered in the life of Oklahoma Baptist University.

The financial side of the picture, however, is not nearly so encouraging. While we rank eighth in point of number enrolled, we rank twenty-fifth in financial strength. This is due largely, of course, to the fact that we are young as compared to the age of other institutions, but it is a fact that we should immediately begin to remedy. We have the smallest amount of endowment of any college or university in the South. This is not true, either because Baptists of Oklahoma are more poverty stricken than those of other states or because the depression has been more devitalizing in our own territory, but it is due to the fact that as yet we have not rallied to the cause as have Baptists of other states to the call of their institutions.

## E. Promotion

The following is a list of the ways and means in which we are attempting to promote the interest of the University and to properly advertise it to the people of the state:

### 1. STUDENT SOLICITATION

It has been deemed wise by the administration to change the program of student solicitation for the ensuing year. Under the plan now in operation, all student solicitation is carried on through the office of the President.

Pastors have been urged to lend every assistance by suggesting prospective students. Efforts have been made to contact school superintendents, principals, and interested teachers to aid the University in securing students. Adequate and proper appeals will be made through the mail to these prospective students, advising them of the opportunities to be had in Oklahoma Baptist University.

Professors in the University will give a considerable portion of their time while filling appointments in the state, in approaching students personally. In fact, every plan that we can devise, whereby we can turn the young people toward O. B. U., will be used. We are appealing, however, to the pastors and to the Baptist constituency to aid us in making our young people O. B. U. minded.

One practical method is for the local church to arrange for an O. B. U. program and invite members of the graduating class to meet a

representative of the University. Our representative will thus have an opportunity to give first hand information regarding Oklahoma Baptist University to them and to conduct personal conferences to much profit. A number of churches and associations have followed this plan and by this means have turned money toward our school. It will never be possible for the University to pay someone to do all of this type of work required. We must, in the final analysis, depend upon the pastors and upon the constituency of the local churches.

## 2 SUPPLYING CHURCHES WITH SPEAKERS AND WITH QUARTETTES

There are seven ordained ministers on the faculty at Oklahoma Baptist University and any one of these men will be happy to supply the pulpit for the pastor in the event of his absence or to appear on a church program at his request.

We have three official quartettes: the Male Quartette, the Women's Quartette, and the Mixed Quartette. They have been well trained by Miss Ruth Mitchell, Professor of Voice in the University, and are willing to accept appointments at any time for church programs. They are prepared to render programs consisting of a sermon in song or programs suitable for banquets, before church groups and school groups. We trust that our churches may use these young people much during this year. They are anxious and willing to give of their time and service for the ongoing of the Kingdom of God.

It is also worthy of note to call attention to the O. B. U. Bison Band and the Bisonette Drum and Bugle Corps. Professor Donald L. McCollum, Director of the Band and Professor of Band Instruments, has developed two splendid organizations and will doubtless make concert tours over the state during the spring months. These will, without question, give considerable impetus to the interest in Oklahoma Baptist University. We shall probably call upon you to aid us in arranging programs and in advertising the appearance of these organizations.

A number of our professors are prepared to go before civic groups, study clubs and other groups of similar nature for discussions on various topics of immediate social, economic, and political interest. This group should be used.

In fact every department of the institution is ready and willing to engage in a great service program to the people of the state, not only to advertise the school but in order to render a real and needed service to our constituency.

## 3. THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY SYMPOSIUM

Not the least among some of our promotional enterprises is the new volume, "Why Christian Education", a symposium by the faculty of Oklahoma Baptist University.

This book contains material that should be in the hands of every pastor and every interested layman in the entire South and most especially of that group in Oklahoma. We have printed one thousand copies of this book to be sold at \$1.50 each. If our people will read this volume carefully, they will receive a new appreciation of the value of Oklahoma Baptist University in the educational program of the State of Oklahoma. I am urging that you purchase this volume and study it carefully.

## 4. DEBT PROGRAM

Your attention has been called at numerous times during the year to the absolute necessity of a debt program for Oklahoma Baptist University. Such a program is being launched at this Convention, together

with a program for the indebtedness of the other Baptist institutions of the state, and we trust that it will have the whole-hearted support of every loyal Baptist. Oklahoma Baptist University will never grow into a great institution as long as it is hampered with debts. We must pay our debts. Even now we are making some progress in debt payment. We have been able to operate during the past year and have something over \$3,000.00 to apply on former indebtedness. If we can pay our debts during the next year, we will free the University for a real expansion program, and give heart and encouragement to everyone connected with its inner life.

### F. Religion

The one phase of the University life in which I am most interested, is the religious program. I am quite frank to say that in my own thinking, this is the major reason for my own relation to the University and the only justification for its existence. It should be of refreshing interest to the Baptists of Oklahoma to know that there are more regularly scheduled religious services on the O. B. U. campus than in any church in Oklahoma of which I have any knowledge. By actual count, there are twenty-nine religious services scheduled on the campus at O. B. U. each week between Monday and Friday.

This report of the Ministerial Alliance of their activities during the past year is one of the most heartening reports of Christian work that I have found anywhere during a similar period of time:

Not a church in the state can match the report given by these young preachers.

In addition to the other regularly scheduled religious activities, we have a revival meeting each year. This year, Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City, has accepted the invitation to conduct the meeting; the week of December 8 to 15. We covet your prayers to the end that every student on the campus may be won to Christ during the revival season.

### Conclusion

The ways of God are strange and mysterious. Two years ago, I had no idea that I would ever be associated in the life of a great University. I now believe that I am in O. B. U. by the will of God. I have spent the happiest period of my life, thus far, in attacking the problems of this institution. This more intimate relationship with the University has deepened by appreciation for the magnitude of the task we have at hand and at the same time has given me a vision of what can be accomplished if we will consecrate ourselves to the task.

I have no doubt of the successful future, or the growth and increasing usefulness of Oklahoma Baptist University to the life of Oklahoma Baptists and to the Christian life of the world. I thank God from the depths of my heart for the trust which you have imposed in me and I pray unceasingly that I shall not fail you in the performance of my duty in the light of that trust.

I believe that we are looking forward to a period of genuine growth and real achievement, and I am willing and happy to go on for the glory

of God and the growth of the institution. In this purpose. I am but voicing the sentiment of our noble faculty, who have consecrated themselves to one task, namely: that of building in Oklahoma an institution worthy of the great people whose name it bears. We have an abiding conviction that God is with us and that we can do anything in His name.

64. J. L. Collins led the congregation in singing, "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood."

65. President Morris took the gavel and called for Secretary Potter, who read the last part of the Report of the Board of Directors, that part under the caption "Down with Debt." It is as follows:

At the meeting of our Convention in Ada, November 14, 1934, we completed the payment of all indebtedness against State Missions. It was a glorious hour, hearts were made to sing praise, and new hope was inspired with our people. This taste of victory caused us to realize as never before the need and value of again freeing all our institutions of debts.

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention, in its regular meeting held in Oklahoma City on Tuesday, July 2, 1935, appointed a committee composed of the President of the Convention, Corresponding Secretary of the Convention, the President of Oklahoma Baptist University, and the President of Trustees of O. B. U., Judge W. R. Wallace, J. W. Storer, and J. W. Bruner, and instructed this committee to bring recommendations to this Convention on plans for liquidating the indebtedness of O. B. U. The committee devoted much time to its task, and, after securing expressions from pastors and leaders over the state, and much counsel, brought to the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors in a called meeting held in Oklahoma City Monday, October 28, 1935, the recommendation that all institutions and debts be included in this effort. Your Board is therefore making the following recommendations:

#### 1 Debt Liquidation

That this Convention hereby launch a debt liquidation movement to be conducted during this Convention year with the understanding that plans are to be made and program carried out with the least possible interference with the Co-operative Program and with the Baptist Hundred Thousand Club.

#### 2 All Debts Included

That this debt liquidation effort include all debts of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, except the bond issue on the Muskogee Baptist Hospital. The following items are to be included:

### 3 W. M. U. Memorial Dormitory

That this Convention assume the balance on the W. M. U. Memorial Dormitory of \$30,000.00 after the payment of December 11, 1935, is made, and that the W. M. U. of the state be requested to join with us in this liquidation debt movement.

### 4 Privilege of Designation Granted

That we recognize the right of designation with contributors to the Debt Liquidation Fund and that all undesignated gifts be applied on debts according to the total amount involved, with each institution receiving the per cent to which it is entitled at the end of each month and that trustees in charge of each institution be charged with the responsibility of distribution on the various items except that the W. M. U. Memorial Dormitory shall receive its percentage regardless of other obligations. It is also agreed that the expense of the campaign be recognized as a preferred item.

### 5 Directors

That our State Corresponding Secretary, Dr. Andrew Potter, be designated as director of the Debt Liquidation movement and Dr. J. W. Raley, President of O. B. U., Assistant Director.

### 6 Committee

That this movement be placed under the supervision of a committee composed of the following: The President of the Convention; the Corresponding Secretary of the Convention; the President of O. B. U.; the President of the Board of Trustees of O. B. U.; the Corresponding Secretary and the State President of the W. M. U.; Judge W. R. Wallace, Oklahoma City; Dr. A. A. Duncan, McAlester; Dr. J. W. Storer, Tulsa; Dr. W. R. White, Oklahoma City; Dr. J. W. Bruner, Chickasha; and Rev. Paul Cullen, Muskogee. Said committee shall organize at its first meeting and elect its own officers.

### 7 United Effort

That all Convention organizations be, and are hereby, requested to major on this task and give whatever time may be necessary to carry it to successful conclusion. This group to include the office force of the Convention, B. T. U., and Sunday School workers, W. M. U., Baptist Messenger, O. B. U., Orphans' Home and Hospital employees, Brotherhood, District and Associational Missionaries, Board of Directors, Trustees of O. B. U., and all pastors and other volunteer workers who are willing to contribute of their time without salary.

## Plans

### 1 Personal Approach

The emphasis in this movement shall be placed on the personal approach to our people rather than the public collection.

### 2 March 1-15, 1936

Shall be designated for the Every Member Canvass period. During that time we shall seek as nearly as possible to approach every prospective contributor, this to be done through the state workers, associational organizations, with a large group of volunteers in each association—to be arranged in advance—and all pastors of the state who are willing to assist.

### 3 Units of \$12.00 Each

Subscriptions are to be made in units of \$12.00 each and payments to cover a period of thirteen weeks, beginning March 1st (twelve Sundays will be used for payments and the thirteenth Sunday for rounding

up delinquents and taking the public collections to make up for any shortage). Each individual will be privileged to take as many units as desired and small contributors will be privileged to form groups in taking even one unit.

#### 4 Victory Day

Sunday, May 31, 1936, which will be the closing Sunday of the thirteen weeks, is designated as Victory Day. All churches co-operating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and all auxiliaries and groups in the churches, are requested to designate this day as "LOYALTY DAY" and use their best effort for gleaning all available funds and aiding in registering complete victory for this movement.

#### The Challenge

When we remember the struggles and the difficulties of the Debt Paying Campaign of 1926, there is some feeling of dread in our hearts about undertaking another, but our feeling is somewhat like that expressed by Sergeant Alvin C. York on war. He said: "I don't want any more European fighting and I don't think any of the boys who were over there the last time want to go back, but I am absolutely ready to enlist if somebody attacks this country and I think all the other boys are too." Our sense of loyalty and our love for the great denomination with which we are connected will overshadow and overcome every fear and objection.

Debt is a most devitalizing thing. No individual can be at his best or do his most effective work when handicapped by obligations he cannot meet. The debts of our denomination will hinder us in a forward program of missions and endowment for O. B. U.

There are times in the tides of events which, when taken at the flood, lead on to fortune. Oklahoma Baptists have come upon one of these times. Opportunities and conditions in this state demand a great forward program for Christ. We now have the chance to show ourselves a big people. With debts paid we could swing out into the open sea with every sail stretched to the breezes of God's favoring providence. What could we do in the coming year that would mean more to the Kingdom of God? What could we do that would be more pleasing to our Father in Heaven?

It is a bugle call for every Baptist of Oklahoma to fall in line and march to the promised land of Victory. Let us answer with willing hearts and steady tread to do His will and bring the Kingdom to the hearts of a lost and waiting state.

"Lead on, O King Eternal,  
We follow, not with fears;  
For gladness breaks like morning,  
Where'er Thy face appears.  
Thy cross is lifted o'er us;  
We journey in its light;  
The crown awaits the conquest,  
Lead on, O God of Might."

66. Judge W. R. Wallace, Oklahoma City, spoke concerning the debt movement recommended in Secretary Potter's report.

67. Mrs. Berta K. Spooner announced that the Oklahoma W. M. U. has accepted \$50,000.00 of this entire debt.

68. Dr. W. R. White, First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, spoke on Christian Education and the Debt Program.

69. Corresponding Secretary Andrew Potter, who is to be the leader of the debt movement, spoke a word around the idea, "It Can Be Done."

70. The Secretary's plan as printed in Paragraph 65 was adopted.

71. Motion carried to adjourn.

72. T. B. Lackey led in closing prayer.

73. C. Thomas Hodges led in singing, "Glory to His Name."

74. J. M. Jones led in the opening prayer.

75. Horace Lee Janes read the "Report on Benevolence," and moved its adoption. Motion carried. The report is as follows:

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SYSTEMATIC BENEVOLENCE

This report concerns three phases of our State Convention work, all of which are included in the Co-operative Program. The committee was unable to see much reason for a report, since each of the objects will have a separate report, as well as being in the Co-operative Program report. The Co-operative Program includes the seven objects of our work. The three causes in the Co-operative Program with which this report is concerned are: The Baptist Orphanage, Baptist Hospitals, and the Relief and Annuity Board. The word "Benevolence" means to have a will to do well. Certainly in these causes is the channel through which our people may do well. Each of these represents the spirit of the message in the Good Samaritan. In this we observe the lesson in the Golden Rule.

There are in Oklahoma two Hospitals which are under the control of this Convention. Each of these institutions are making progress as the separate report will show. We shall not try to give statistics or figures on either of them. The Hospitals are in the cities of Miami and Muskogee. There is no work we do that is more Christian than this. Jesus paused in His own busy life to heal the bodies of men, and thus set us the example. Jesus said "Follow Me," and truly this is following Him. May we support, with our prayers, and money, and gifts, these institutions.

How proud we are as Oklahoma Baptists of our Home for the homeless. This institution is located in Oklahoma City. We refer you to the special report for details. This Convention stands in the place of parents to these dear parentless children. God gave us true parent love, and devotion for them. Christianity is the religion which is benevolent. True Christians will find some way to carry out their duty to the orphan children. This is our own answer to this part of our task. God gave us a real vision of the possibilities of Christian service this institution gives us a chance to render. We are indeed following our Saviour, who gathered the little children in His arms, and blessed them. We honor our Saviour as we support our orphanage.

The journey of life, like a day, must come to sunset. The preacher is no exception to this rule. Truly the laborer is worthy of his hire, and the ox to eat as he treads out the grain; but what when he can not

labor, or tread any more? The finger of God is writing on the wall of most of our churches today: "Thou are negligent of THE OLD PREACHER," and the accounting day is coming. We thank God that in recent years we are making some effort in this direction through our Relief and Annuity Board, Dallas, Texas. There should be some plan devised by which no old preacher should meet the end of the journey of his life, devoid of that which we can supply. God who knows, knows how well they have wrought, and we see as we behold. When we read our statistics we are made to marvel. Who blazed the trail and laid foundations on which we are building? We are not building worthily if in building we forget those who builded before us. We must do more, and talk less, for they are going home, and our time to do for them will soon be over.

Your committee is very anxious that we support all our work to the ends of the earth, and carry out all the Great Commission. God grant that every one of us go home to take more seriously our work to everyone in the world. We are not commanded to do anything, if we are not commanded to do all. If we are to carry out part of the Great Commission, we are to carry out all the Great Commission.

76. W. O. Miller read the report on Religious Literature and moved its adoption. Motion carried. The report is as follows:

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

It goes without question that literature has much to do in the matter of character building. There can scarcely be a greater enemy to any nation, class or religious group than that of the wrong kind of literature; while on the other hand one of the greatest blessings to any individual or group, is the blessing of good literature. The wrong kind of literature will result in the wrong kind of thinking and the wrong kind of thinking will result in the wrong kind of character. It must be remembered when the character of an individual, a group or a religious denomination is wrong, all else is wrong. Yet the individual is not always to blame. A careful survey would demand that we, as Baptists, set ourselves to the task of giving to our people information that will set and keep them right in their thinking, and thus be right in character. To this end, there have been established three agencies, namely: The Sunday School Board, Baptist Book Store, and the Baptist Messenger. These agencies have been established for the purpose of giving the people proper information and to promoting the interest of Christ in our churches. Just here, we are reminded that "where there is no knowledge the people perish." Too, we are reminded that Paul advises: "Give heed to reading." Francis Bacon has very truthfully said: "Reading maketh a full man; conference a ready man; and writing an exact man." When General Pershing would keep the morale of the American soldiers, during the World War, up to the highest pitch, he brought into existence a publication known as the "Stars and Stripes." The messages of this publication put a spirit and power into the American dough-boys, such as was not contributed by another factor. We need to remember that in the army of God, His Church, which is the mightiest army that ever marched across any continent with power unlimited to this church, the "Stars and Stripes" is God's Holy Word. If we will use the Bible as our text book in the pulpit and in



ur Bible Schools and use His Word as a basis for all our teaching and vining, we will soon have drawn our people together and will have set in motion a worthy "World Wide Program." Then, too, we should use the literature which has had its birth and inspiration from the Bible, such literature has been produced by the noblest of our brethren and the greatest Bible scholars. Surely we will use the same to the glory of Him who has done so much for us all. The three agencies provided to furnish this literature should be considered and used to the greatest possible extent.

### 1. The Sunday School Board

Our own Sunday School Board of Nashville stands ready, and does under noble service in our state as in other states of our Southland. The Sunday School Board does not receive gifts from the churches, but contributes largely to the financial support of our South and world-wide causes. The work of the Board in all of its departments, is worthy of our praise and our support. It does a great work in distribution of religious, denominational and evangelistic tracts free of cost to our churches.

We, therefore, commend to our people the religious books and publications of the Sunday School Board. The Sunday School literature published by the Baptist Sunday School Board is unquestionably the best literature for our Baptist Sunday Schools. May we say that the literature is not to displace the text book of all Baptist Sunday Schools, the Bible, the Word of God, but only renders such helps as are needful.

### 2. The Baptist Book Store

Mr. H. Killingsworth is manager of our Book Store located in Oklahoma City, which is owned and operated jointly by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee, and our Baptist General Convention. You are able to buy through your Book Store any kind of book that relates to our denominational life, devotional, doctrinal or missionary. These books deal with the vital life of our denomination, clear the vision, promote loyalty and keep our people from thinking crookily. The last year gives a brighter outlook for the future, since there has been an increase of sales, substantial profits and better collections. We would suggest that individuals and churches having accounts with our book store be prompt in the payment of same, and the purchase through our book store in Oklahoma City, so that our Baptist Book Store may be strengthened, and in doing so we will enable the Sunday School Board to contribute more largely to the work of our denomination, and to help the mission work in our state.

### 3. The Baptist Messenger

The Baptist Messenger is our own state Baptist paper. It is edited by Dr. E. C. Routh, and is printed in our own Oklahoma Baptist University print shop. This furnishes work for a number of worthy students who are working their way, in whole or in part, through Oklahoma Baptist University. The Baptist Messenger keeps before us the best news and methods concerning our missionary enterprises; keeps before us through its editorials, questions relating to civic, state and national righteousness; in this respect our denominational paper is doing for us what the secular press dares not, and will not do. Our editor, Dr. E. C. Routh, is to be congratulated upon his fearless stand on every moral issue. Surely now is a time when Baptist people need to be informed, and know how intelligently to meet the moral issues of the hour. The tragedy is: that so few of our Baptist people are reading our Baptist paper. A survey reveals that there are more than 4,000,000 white and Indian Baptists within the territory of the Southern Bap-

tist Convention, and that our Southern Baptist State papers have a combined circulation of 142,000 or an average of one paper to every 29 Baptists. Something should and must be done just here if we are to take our place in the world of intelligent and useful servants of the Lord.

We therefore recommend:

1. That we continue the plans as outlined by our editor, Dr. E. C. Routh, to substantially increase the subscription list.

2. That we accomplish this task by organizing clubs in our churches or by putting the Messenger in our budget and send it to every home in our church.

3. That we put the Baptist Messenger on the desk of every pastor and on the library table of every Baptist home in the State of Oklahoma.

Your committee feels that we have in E. C. Routh, one of the ablest and best editors in the whole Southland. We urge the unreserved support on the part of all our pastors and churches to make possible a greater ministry through the printed page.

## REPORT ON AUXILIARIES

Webster tells us that the word "Auxiliary" means giving, or furnishing aid. He defines it as being subsidiary, and—an accessory. He refers to it in the plural as being "allied troops." Thus we see that our auxiliaries are those agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which really aid and assist the main body of our constituents to reach the heights to which we all aspire.

This report is confined to a brief discussion of the significance of the Sunday School, the Baptist Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, and Laymen's Work. It is not our purpose in this report to detail the marvelous achievements made during the past year by these glorious auxiliaries of our Convention. We are not here discussing details. Those golden facts will be found in the various reports of the organizations, made by their sponsors and leaders to this body. To rehearse these triumphs would be a needless repetition, and would take up unnecessary space in the records of our proceedings at this session of the Convention.

## Sunday School Work

To peruse the pages of our advance in Sunday School work this past year is, indeed, an inspiration. From every section of this fair state glowing reports have come in, delineating the wonderful work fostered by that great department of our Baptist Zion, ably led by Secretary, Mr. T. H. Farmer, and capably assisted by a noble group of helpers whose zeal for promoting the study of the inerrant Word of God, has known no bounds. Many new Sunday Schools have been organized. These in remote and destitute places where a perennial search of the Scriptures has never been known before. Wherever this has been done, a new hope has come to the community, and every phase of the Kingdom of God in those parts has been enhanced by the new regime. Hundreds of Sunday Schools have been revitalized this past year, as they have been touched by the flame of zeal reflected in the dauntless devotion of our State forces to the high and blessed task of "lengthening the cords and strengthening the stakes" of that vital part of our denominational life. Many recruits have enlisted under the banner of Teaching. The new books for study are producing great interest in the churches. There is an earnest desire to make departments and classes far more effective and efficient, as well as the general organization, and the leadership of our State forces in that capacity is something for which we are justly proud. A brighter and better day has dawned for Oklahoma Baptists. This fact no one can truly deny. Aiding and assisting in this new and enviable milestone, the glory of which cannot be fully realized, will be found that royal group of Sunday School personnel whose thinking by day and whose dreaming by night is a perpetual advance in the study of the Book of all books!

## Baptist Training Union

One glance at the new Southern Baptist Handbook, on that page where Southwide comparisons are made, will delight the soul of every Oklahoma Baptist. In that first table, on page 181, OKLAHOMA is leading the South in the number of churches that have Baptist Training Unions. This was a distinct surprise to your chairman of this committee, but a surprise that maketh glad the heart. Thousands of young lives have been directed into channels of usefulness this past year, throughout the domains of our State.

Since the close of the World War, Southern Baptist Young People have made a record unknown to the Young People of any other denomination in the world. It is a matter of record that the Youth of our own Baptist churches have become the greatest body of organized Young

People found in any single denomination in America—or the world! Marching along by the side of the rising generation in other states, will be found a multitude from Oklahoma. High hopes are held for this mighty throng upon whose shoulders will rest the destiny of leadership in our churches a few years hence. No state can boast of a more efficient corps of workers in this line than our own. This phase of our church life is certainly worthy of admiration and esteem. When God has called those noble men and women home, who now direct the spiritual destinies of our Oklahoma Baptist churches, another group will come into their own. These are now being trained throughout every section of our State. Perhaps the greatest Baptist Assembly in America is the one that meets in the majestic Arbuckle hills every August, and is attended by more than five thousand anxious, aggressive and enterprising souls, whose chief concern is that they may be better trained in the Lord's work. The Baptist Training Union of Oklahoma is under the same very capable and efficient directorship as that of our Sunday School work. Secretary T. H. Farmer and his worthy aids are to be congratulated upon the marvelous advance made each year. The thousands of awards given from time to time attest the unstinted interest of our people in the glorious task of TRAINING in church membership!

#### Woman's Missionary Union

Here is an organization that never promotes a retreat. Resolute, purposeful, undiscourageable—the Union steadfastly and seriously attends to the objectives set by Christ for his friends. Consistently and constantly it is true to its original constitutional purpose, "to aid the Convention by stimulating a missionary spirit and the grace of giving among the women and young people of our churches." The technique for achieving that original purpose is arresting. Oklahoma Baptist women have an informing and appealing literature adapted to the needs of all ages. They have definite objectives and clear cut methods for attaining the goals desired. They are intelligent, consecrated, and are dominated by an unflagging zeal. They play on no low strings. They sound the POSITIVE note. One of the conspicuous and continuous contributions of Christianity to the world has been a wonderful womanhood. The onlooking world today may exclaim, as did the pagans of old, "What women these Christians have!" Often in Oklahoma our noble women have come forward to aid in worthy enterprises that were desperately in need of sacrificial devotion. They have furnished both money and morale, and many of the benedictions we now enjoy could never have been, had the women of our churches assumed the same attitude as the men. Be it said to their everlasting praise, they have often been the "heart" of movements in Oklahoma Baptist history. This department of our Convention is ably led and directed by Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, and she has the confidence and veneration of our constituency. She is assisted by a royal group of queenly women whose hearts are on fire with the zeal to carry forward the whole program of God. Many and varied are the avenues of blessings walked by these righteous women. The present state of satisfaction and harmony within the ranks of our people, the manifest determination to go on and up in the work of God, has been greatly enhanced by the Woman's Missionary Union within our gates.

#### Baptist Student Union

A great and abiding work has been accomplished among the Baptist students in our various colleges and universities. No one can overestimate the value of this significant effort to develop and train the mature youth of our churches in the vital task of the Kingdom of Christ. Oklahoma has held her own in the past, and the indications are that

this blessed work in coming days will surpass anything yet known along the line of Baptist student work. Since careers are very largely determined during college life, it is of the utmost importance to see to it that our Baptist boys and girls, away from home, and under the pressure of materialistic ideals in many places, have the right kind of interest shown in their future tasks. The very fact that we, in Oklahoma, are concerned about them, has a stabilizing tendency in their dreams of destiny. Throughout all the activities of the Baptist Student Union the spiritual emphasis predominates. Really, this activity is a MOVEMENT—not an organization. On the campuses throughout our state our Baptist students meet for the high purpose of enhancing their religious lives. The potential power of this movement cannot be estimated in words. The local Baptist church is the place where approach is made. Church loyalty is stressed during college life, and many of our most talented are saved to the denomination—and the world.

#### Laymen's Work

Here is a field of glorious opportunity. It is, perhaps, the most neglected phase of our denominational life. Say what you please, but the Lord's work cannot go forward as it should without the conquering zeal of our Baptist men. We have long needed a special emphasis of the enlistment of our laymen in Oklahoma. We have no paid secretary directing this work. It is our earnest hope that the day will soon dawn when such a secretary can be had for full time. The dividends spiritual and material would certainly justify the employment of some lofty-visioned and deeply devoted layman for the leadership of the men in the churches of our Faith. Wherever pastors have given time and attention to the enlistment of their men, almost unbelievable results have been obtained. Among that royal group of Baptist laymen in this state certain credit should be given to Mr. J. E. George, of Enid, who has laboriously and consistently done what he could to advance the Kingdom of God through our Baptist men. He has been assisted in various churches and associations by a great group of loyal laymen, numerous my name, and the results of their labors have greatly enhanced the program of our Lord. We would like to recommend that a new emphasis be given to this effort, and that something definite be done to extend the scope of this mighty movement among our men.

To all of these departments and auxiliaries we extend our hearts and our hands, pledging our utmost in co-operation to make successful the efforts of those who have them in charge, and we shall continue to pray that you may abound in the holy tasks which aminate your souls in the various capacities where you serve

96. Report on Orphans' Home read by John T. Daniel, discussed by him, and a free-will offering was taken and \$101.19 was raised. Report was adopted as follows:

#### REPORT ON ORPHANS' HOME

When we come to give consideration to our Baptist Orphans' Home, we touch the tenderest chords in our nature. Where is the person so cold and heartless that he is not aroused by the call of orphans? When we think of children being deprived of the love and care of mother and father and deprived of the comforts and blessings of home, our deepest sympathies are awakened.

There is no institution among Oklahoma Baptists that is nearer and dearer to our hearts than our Orphans' Home in Oklahoma City. There is no institution that can approach the appeal that this Home has to the hearts of our people. Oklahoma Baptists want to support this home in such a way as to adequately provide for these unfortunate children.

For the past eleven years, the home has been under the superintendency of Rev. E. A. Howard and, in many respects, his administration has merited the appreciation of our Baptist host. On June 24, 1935, Rev. Howard presented his resignation to the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, effective November 1, 1935. Ill health and the weight of years were the reasons given for this resignation.

A called meeting of the Board of Directors was held on July 22, 1935, at which time the resignation was accepted and the superintendency and general management of the Home was placed under the direction of State Secretary Andrew Potter, effective November 1, 1935.

At this meeting fitting resolution was adopted, spread upon the minutes of the Board, and subsequently printed in the Baptist Messenger.

Upon November 1, 1935, Secretary Potter assumed charge of the Home and all of its interests and is now its directing head.

It is fitting that a word of commendation for the services of Superintendent Howard be included at this point. In spite of the depression through which we have passed, he has been able, by his keen business sense, to keep the Home out of debt. This is no small achievement and he merits our praise for the same. Detailed audit of the Home's finances will appear in the State Convention Minutes for 1935.

While Rev. Howard has kept the Home on a cash basis, and passed it over to Secretary Potter without any debt against it, he has not been able to keep the equipment in first class condition. The property is in a bad state of repair and must have immediate attention to bring it to a livable condition. Oklahoma Baptists want to provide a suitable Home for their orphan children. To have such a Home we will have to spend at least \$10,000.00 on repairs and equipment this year. Every dollar of this ought to be spent at once. To cite some of the urgent needs, I would say that the plumbing in all the buildings needs to be replaced. The lighting system needs to be rebuilt. The heating system needs to be junked and a new one installed. All the wood work in the Boys' Dormitory needs to be replaced, except the floor. Nearly every mattress at the Home ought to be burned. There is scarcely any furniture worthy of the name, in the boys' building. All the walls and woodwork in all the buildings need to be repainted and redecorated. There needs to be at least \$600.00 spent in the kitchen. Both of the stoves are burnt out and ought to be junked.

The dairy herd is old and ought to be disposed of. There are about forty head, calves and all, but they produce only about 10 gallons of milk daily. The children have neither milk to drink nor butter for their bread. The hospital building ought to be finished and would take close to \$1,000.00 to make it of value for this purpose.

These are the major needs of the home and each of them calls for immediate attention. These conditions do not meet with the approval of Oklahoma Baptists, and, in my opinion, we are not going to let them go without attention. Economic conditions are greatly improved and we can, ought and must take care of these things. There are many other matters of great and minor importance which need attention, but we think enough has been said to arouse interest and stimulate us to action.

At present there are 143 on the roll at the home. Three of these are working temporarily outside the home. There are six of these who have no society to care for them.

There is room for six girls, ages 10-12, and four boys could be cared for if we had the beds for them.

This frank statement of conditions should not become the occasion of criticism but the spring board, for a day of delayed action to the end that our Home be a fitting place for our orphan children.

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#### SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

It is not our purpose to go into a discussion of the merits or demerits of the proposition for Southern Baptists to establish a Bureau of Social Research. We are not so much concerned about the machinery used as we are about getting the task done.

We are not uneasy about our Oklahoma Baptists or Southern Baptists losing sight of the New Testament plan of salvation by grace. We are not at all afraid that they will be led into preaching or believing in the salvation of a soul through or by any sort of social service or system of education.

But we are deeply concerned about all of us doing our Christian duty in social service in every way possible. That this is an important subject for serious consideration and action no informed, thoughtful Christian doubts. The field for social service is a wide one of pressing need just now. Time and space are too valuable for me to go into a discussion of the many phases of this work, but we must mention a few of them:

(1) **The Liquor Question.** There is a persistent effort on the part of some politicians, brewers, distillers, hotel-keepers, druggists and the devil to repeal prohibition and flood this country with all kinds of intoxicating drinks. Certainly no intelligent, informed man or woman who loves God and is interested in the welfare of humanity doubts or hesitates for one moment about what to do when it comes to voting for or against the repeal of prohibition. How could any child of God grieve at Father's heart or bring shame upon the cause of Christ by voting for the liquor business?

(2)....**Motion Pictures.** A motion picture is good or bad according to the moral it presents. There are many intelligent, well-informed people who believe that certain kinds of pictures have done and are doing more to undermine the morals of our country and break up the sanctity of our homes than the saloons ever did. It might be well for every minister, every Sunday School teacher, every day school teacher and every parent in Oklahoma to read "Our Movie Made Children." We can ill afford to close our eyes to this danger.

(3) **Sex Relations.** If the metropolitan papers, the daily press and police court records are to be believed, our moral standards of virtue are tottering for a fall. This sort of conduct is not confined to the slums, we are to judge from the sales of certain drug store articles in some educational centers.

(4) **Salacious and Obscene Literature.** Many news stands and book stores have on prominent display books and magazines noted for their vulgar, filthy contents. The greatest demand for such publications is not from the young, but from men and women past forty years of age.

(5) **War.** War certainly is not the best method of settling troubles. We doubt if it ever really settled differences after all. The World War threatened the very foundation of civilization. It took the staggering toll of 26 million dead, 20 million crippled—many of whom were worse than dead, 9 million war orphans, and over 5 million war widows. And yet the war clouds dark and threatening hang low today over most of this earth.

We, as Christians, should do all the good we can and prevent all the evil possible.

We call upon Oklahoma Baptists and all of God's children everywhere to register their protest against all these and other evils, in the most effective way possible. We cannot, we must not assume a neutral attitude. We must be militant and stand against every social evil.

#### REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY, W. M. U.

Berta K. Spooner

As we come to the close of another year of activity in Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union, we pause to see what has been accomplished. "Faith if it hath not works is dead being alone," counseled James. The Baptist womanhood of Oklahoma has accompanied a living faith by

a year of loyal work. In 593 Woman's Missionary Societies month after month there has been for faith the companionship of enlarged knowledge of denominational activities gained by missionary programs.

There are still in Oklahoma 250 Baptist churches where women are not organized to keep the missionary passion aglow in their hearts and in the life of the church—134 of these gave absolutely nothing to denominational causes and 116 gave less than five dollars for an entire year. Before us these wait to be enlisted. The District and Associational leaders have been faithful in their co-operation, reporting 213 new organizations; 24 W. M. S.; 46 Y. W. A.; 71 G. A.; 33 R. A.; and 39 Sunbeam Bands. In 196 churches, you have maintained full W. M. M. U. families—a gain of twelve over last year.

Woman's Missionary Union realize that the young people must share in the faith in the ultimate victory of Christ Jesus, so she fosters missionary education and a graded system of organizations. There are 353 Sunbeam Bands in Oklahoma for children under nine years of age. There are 501 Girls' Auxiliaries for girls in their teens, 303 Royal Ambassador Chapters for Junior and Intermediate boys and 336 Young Woman's Auxiliaries—of these three are Grace McBride Y. W. A. in our hospitals and four are Ann Hasseltine Y. W. A. in colleges. Generations ago, David exhorted the people in behalf of his son, Solomon, who became the wisest of men, saying, "My son is yet young and tender and the work is great." No matter how wise our youth may some day become, as young people they need the motivation of missionary purpose which Woman's Missionary Union should give through these missionary education organizations.

There are special state gatherings which are particularly the work of Woman's Missionary Union in the interest of young people. The enthusiasm for our camps and house parties is increasing with each year's program. This year at the annual Intermediate G. A. Houseparty held in W. M. U. Memorial Hall at Oklahoma Baptist University, there were 130 fine girls representing a number of churches and associations, eager for information. The following week, 100 Y. W. A. girls spent a very happy and profitable time with Miss Earl Hester of Roumania and Miss Inez Lung of China as guest speakers. The girls of both groups went away with a greater vision of a world task after having listened to and associated with these splendid missionaries. We have fine reports of Associational and District Camps and Conclaves. Fifteen enthusiastic Y. W. A.'s chaperoned by your Secretary went by bus to Ridgecrest, North Carolina, to attend the Southwide Y. W. A. Camp in June. Our girls came back inspired and happy over the contacts made and the friendships formed. There will be nearly a thousand girls at the Ridgecrest camp. Encourage your girls to go with us next year.

The Assembly at Falls Creek was well attended and W. M. U. enrolled 489 in seven classes. Mrs. Taul B. White was the very capable and fine teacher of adults, and we thank W. M. U. of the South for sending her to us. Truly each member of her class enjoyed and appreciated her teaching. We are also grateful to Mrs. John T. Daniel, Mrs. Walter Lane, Misses Lucille Smith and Bertha Thompson, and Mr. Fern Miller, who so splendidly took care of the auxiliaries. 246 awards were issued at the close of the study. May we keep uppermost in our hearts and in all of our plans, the great purpose for which we stand—dissemination of missionary information. "Knowledge is power" in spreading the Gospel. More mission study is a primary need if we are to enlist the deepest interest. Knowledge has walked with faith unceasingly in 1991 mission study classes among our members, 22 completing Kingdom Bible Course with 114 awards. Bible and Mission Study have a large place

the program of our Woman's Missionary Union. Information leads to inspiration and inspiration to service and giving. 26,142 awards have been granted this year.

It is exceedingly difficult to measure the achievements in personal service. These labors of love through a cash gift made it possible for Mrs. Brockway, the State Worker for Negro women, to hold eight missionary study institutes in strategic places, furnishing also teachers and inspirational speaker. It was my joy to assist in one of the institutes in Oklahoma City, and in other places the women of the missionary societies co-operated beautifully in this work. Many of you have been busy in ministering in a substantial way to the needy in your midst, and our own hearts testify to the joy it has brought to you. Personal service carries with it a challenging responsibility with a two-fold purpose, Christian development and soul winning.

Some times we feel we have done all and more than we could, then we turn to the schedule of the busy life of our Lord, and watch Him adding healing and relief of suffering to His crowded hours, hearing Him say, "I must work the works of Him who sent Me." So we add to all else our White Cross work. We rejoice in the far away witness of Elizabeth Smith whom He sent to work for Him in Africa. Through your cash gifts to White Cross, you keep Elizabeth's salary paid in advance. Your gifts of supplies to the hospitals here have been generous and so you have helped in the care of the sick in the homeland as well.

For many years, W. M. U. has rejoiced to help in the education of the sons and daughters of foreign missionaries through the Margaret Fund. Six students have been assigned to Oklahoma W. M. U. to "mother." Mrs. D. H. Bell, the State Chairman, will give detailed report and assign to the Districts their student. All cash gifts are sent to W. M. U. headquarters, Baptist Building, Oklahoma City; personal gifts are sent direct to the students.

We have been unable to secure an accurate list of W. M. U. members of the 100,000 Club, but from the latest reports of Dr. Tripp we find that Oklahoma ranks fourth with the states in number of members, but seventh in amount of contribution. "Let's catch us." The club is still on the way toward the half million mark. Let us be faithful in carrying out this obligation.

The spirit of giving has accompanied faith in the regular gifts to the Co-operative Program which have amounted to \$30,161.64, and in the payments on the Memorial Dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University. Through the years we have paid a total of \$180,000 on building and furnishings. This year to complete the annual payment of \$1,000 plus \$1,300 interest due December 15, 1935, we must have \$4,500 later than January 1st. I am counting on you. When this is paid, there will be left only \$30,000. Faith will continue to guide in the spirit of giving so that this work of Oklahoma W. M. U. may be completely finished. You will be happy to know that every room in the dormitory occupied this year.

We report 2,266 new tithers, 616 are young people. Much interest is shown this year in the Stewardship Declamation contest. It had an important place on the program in each District meeting hence a large group of our young people are studying stewardship. Winners of the state contest held during the houseparties are: Intermediate G. Miss Oma Jeanne Hager, Mangum, Southwest District; Y. W. A., Miss Barbara Corley of Immanuel Church, Oklahoma City, Central District; and R. A., Northeast District.

If all our women and young people would keep informed by reading their available missionary periodicals, the work of the Lord would be greatly prospered. It is all but impossible to lead adequately in missionary education organizations without World Comrades or The Window of Y. W. A. according to the aged group concerned, yet our goal for World Comrades subscriptions is only 845 and for The Window of Y. W. A. 440. To October first we had sent in 633 subscriptions to World Comrades and 349 subscriptions to The Window of Y. W. A. A cursory glance at popular periodicals on the newsstand will make thoughtful parents eager to put these magazines in their homes for ready access by their children and young people. Certainly our women need to read their official organ, Royal Service, and literature chairmen should be more zealous in sending subscriptions for all three of our missionary magazines and our state paper, The Baptist Messenger.

There are three special seasons in the year when it seems especially appropriate to recall the words of Chronicles regarding the wise-hearted families of those early Biblical days. In the weeks of prayer for State, Home and Foreign Missions, Woman's Missionary Union seeks to abide in Him in prayerful mood and bring gifts for His work. Last year, we gave in the Lottie Moon offering \$7,638.73, to Annie W. Armstrong offering for Home Missions \$3,805.37, State Missions \$1,638.82. Reports show a gain in number of organizations observing the season of prayer. 432 W. M. S. and 644 young people's auxiliaries, a total of 1,076, shared in the blessing of the prayer season for Foreign Missions, 512 W. M. S., 642 young people's organizations, total 1,154, for Home Missions, and 1,172 for State Missions, but we cannot be satisfied with this record. It is so much lower than it should be.

The thirty-two Associational organizations have had their quarterly rallies and are realizing the value of such meetings in giving information and inspiration and in training their constituency for greater service. I truly want to express my sincere appreciation for the splendid service rendered by this group of volunteer workers, the Associational Presidents, twenty-six of whom have sent in reports each quarter during the year. It has been a joy to work with them and with all our loyal W. M. U. friends.

Many courtesies extended to me while on the field and enthusiastic letters received in the office brighten the retrospect of the past year. I have this year visited in 24 of the Associations, 185 days were spent on the field, 49 times I have talked on my trip to Palestine and shared with 48 churches my entire trip in pictures, taught the Why and How of W. M. U. to 18 groups, helped in ten Schools of Missions, attended 9 District meetings that were splendidly planned and executed by their respective Presidents. Seventy per cent of the Societies were represented in the meetings with a total attendance of 3,140 in the nine meetings. I conducted the two state houseparties for Y. W. A. and Intermediate G. A., attended two camps, G. A. and R. A., spent ten delightful days at Ridgcrest, the Southwide Camp for Y. W. A., ten days at the State Baptist Assembly, Falls Creek, and there were more calls for field work than one person could accept. Deeply do I appreciate the work of Mrs. Mildred Wells whose efficiency in the office made it possible for me to spend more than half of my time on the field.

Indeed the year has been a busy one, but a very happy one. I thank you most sincerely for your confidence and love and for the privilege of service. I have tried to be faithful.

**CONSTITUTION OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION****Preamble**

Desirous of cultivating and stimulating the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and children of the churches, we, the women of Missionary Societies of the Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, adopt the following Constitution:

**ARTICLE I****Name**

This Organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and shall be auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention.

**ARTICLE II****Object**

The object of this organization shall be to cultivate a missionary spirit, especially among the women, young women and children throughout the State, and to aid in the world-wide spread of the Gospel.

**ARTICLE III****Membership**

The constituency of this organization shall be the Missionary organizations of women, young women and children; each woman's and young woman's society shall be entitled to one Messenger to the Annual Meeting, and one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof, not to exceed ten members from any church.

**ARTICLE IV****Officers**

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Young People's Leader, Field Worker, Chairman of Departments and Advisory Committee who shall be named by the Nominating Committee and elected by acclamation at the Annual Meeting, and a Vice-President from each District who has been elected in her respective District.

Section 2. Executive Board. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Union and the Presidents of the Associations. Eleven, including two officers, shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each District and one from the State at large, all to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its first annual Session.

**ARTICLE V****Time of Meeting**

The Annual Meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, time and place to be designated by the Executive Board at its first meeting.

**ARTICLE VI****Financial Policy**

In accordance with the Preamble our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education, training and giving; the strength of the organization being used to help raise all apportionments for

every phase of the work to which the church contributes. One-third of all the Co-operative Program Funds shall be credited to the State W. M. U.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention and all salaries paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer of the State Convention.

## ARTICLE VII

### Amendments

This Constitution may be amended by two-thirds votes of the Messengers present and voting at any Annual Meeting provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting of the Executive Board and recommended by the Board to the Annual Meeting for adoption.

## BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I

#### Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the organization and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, shall be Ex-officio member of all standing committees, and with the concurrence of the Corresponding Secretary she may through the Corresponding Secretary call special meetings of the Board when in her judgment it seems needful, or at the request of the members of the Board. She shall be Vice-President of Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 2. Vice-Presidents. It shall be the duty of the vice-presidents of the organization, to assist the Corresponding Secretary in developing their districts, preside at their district meetings, and keep in touch with Associational officers by correspondence and other ways that will further the interest of Woman's Missionary Union. In the absence of the President one of the Vice-Presidents shall be asked to preside in her place.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions, and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual Meetings of Woman's Missionary Union, to prepare minutes for publication, and to act as Secretary of the Executive Board, presenting a condensed report of the sessions to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer. As Corresponding Secretary, it shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith, to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local Societies of the State. She shall have the general supervision over all departments of the work, and shall have correspondence with Baptist papers, unless other provision

hall be made for it, and shall give general direction for the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity will permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds used all expense of the work, according to the directions of the Executive Board, keeping always an accurate account of receipts and disbursements.

As Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer she shall make reports to the Executive Board, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Baptist General Convention and Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. Executive Board. The Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care, and shall have power to recommend such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the Annual Meeting recommendations concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and production of the work which may seem expedient.

It shall hold its regular meetings during the months of December, April, September and preceding the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. If the Corresponding Secretary shall deem it wise to defer or omit altogether a designated meeting, she shall be free to do so, provided notice has already been given to that effect.

Section 6. Chairman of Departments: It shall be the duty of these Chairmen to assist the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular departments of the work by correspondence and shall make reports in writing to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Associational Presidents. They shall be elected at the regular Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of their respective Associations. They shall have general supervision of the work in the Association and in co-operation with the pastors they shall endeavor to promote the organization of women and children in all the churches by visiting and holding Associational Meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of work done. It shall also be their duty to arrange for and preside over the Annual Meetings of their Associations.

## ARTICLE II

### Parliamentary Rules

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law, not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2. Amendments. These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulation as those governing changes in the Constitution.

## REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

Berta K. Spooner

As we come to the close of another year of activity in Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union, we pause to see what has been accomplished. "Faith if it hath not works is dead being alone," counseled James. The Baptist womanhood of Oklahoma has accompanied a living faith by a year of loyal work. In 593 Woman's Missionary Societies month after month there has been for faith the companionship of enlarged knowledge of denominational activities gained by missionary programs.

There are still in Oklahoma 250 Baptist churches where women are not organized to keep the missionary passion aglow in their hearts and in the life of the church—134 of these gave absolutely nothing to denominational causes and 116 gave less than five dollars for an entire year. Before us these wait to be enlisted. The District and Associational leaders have been faithful in their co-operation, reporting 213 new organizations; 24 W. M. S., 46 Y. W. A., 71 G. A., 33 R. A., and 39 Sunbeam Bands. In 196 churches, you have maintained full W. M. U. families—a gain of twelve over last year.

Woman's Missionary Union realizes that the young people must share in the faith in the ultimate victory of Christ Jesus, so she fosters missionary education and a graded system of organizations. There are 353 Sunbeam Bands in Oklahoma for children under nine years of age. There are 501 Girls' Auxiliaries for girls in their teens, 303 Royal Ambassador chapters for Junior and Intermediate boys, and 336 Young Woman's Auxiliaries—of these three are Grace McBride Y. W. A. in our hospitals and four are Ann Hasseltine Y. W. A. in colleges. Generations ago, David exhorted the people in behalf of his son, Solomon, who became the wisest of men, saying, "My son is yet young and tender and the work is great." No matter how wise our youth may some day become, as young people they need the motivation of missionary purpose which Woman's Missionary Union should give through these missionary education organizations.

There are special state gatherings which are particularly the work of Woman's Missionary Union in the interest of young people. The enthusiasm for our camps and houseparties is increasing with each year's program. This year at the annual Intermediate G. A. Houseparty held in W. M. U. Memorial Hall at Oklahoma Baptist University, there were 130 fine girls representing a number of churches and associations, eager for information. The following week, 100 Y. W. A. girls spent a very happy and profitable time with Miss Earl Hester of Roumania and Miss Inez Lung of China as guest speakers. The girls of both groups went away with a greater vision of a world task after having listened to and associated with these splendid missionaries. We have fine reports of Associational and District Camps and Conclaves. Fifteen enthusiastic Y. W. A.'s chaperoned by your Secretary went by bus to Ridgecrest, North Carolina, to attend the Southwide Y. W. A. Camp in June. Our girls came back inspired and happy over the contacts

made and the friendships formed. There were nearly a thousand girls at the Ridgcrest camp. Encourage your girls to go with us next year.

The Assembly at Falls Creek was well attended and W. M. U. enrolled 489 in seven classes. Mrs. Taul B. White was the very capable and fine teacher of adults, and we thank W. M. U. of the South for sending her to us. Truly each member of her class enjoyed and appreciated her teaching. We are also grateful to Mrs. John T. Daniel, Mrs. Walter Lane, Misses Lucille Smith and Bertha Thompson, and Mr. Fern Miller, who so splendidly took care of the auxiliaries. 246 awards were issued at the close of the study. May we keep uppermost in our hearts and in all of our plans, the great purpose for which we stand—dissemination of missionary information. "Knowledge is power" in spreading the Gospel. More mission study is a primary need if we are to enlist the deepest interest. Knowledge has walked with faith unceasingly in 1991 mission study classes among our members, 22 completing Kingdom Bible Course with 114 awards. Bible and Mission Study have a large place in the program of our Woman's Missionary Union. Information leads to inspiration and inspiration to service and giving. 26,142 awards have been granted this year.

It is exceedingly difficult to measure the achievements in personal service. "These labors of love," through a cash gift you made it possible for Mrs. Brockway, the State Worker for Negro women, to hold eight missionary study institutes in strategic places, furnishing also teachers and inspirational speaker. It was my joy to assist in one of the Institutes in Oklahoma City, and in other places the women of the missionary societies co-operated beautifully in this work. Many of you have been busy in ministering in a substantial way to the needy in your midst, your own hearts testify to the joy it has brought to you. Personal service carries with it a challenging responsibility with a twofold purpose, Christian development and soul winning.

Sometimes we feel we have done all and more than we could, then we turn to the schedule of the busy life of our Lord, and watch Him add healing and relief of suffering to His crowded hours, hearing Him say, "I must work the works of Him who sent Me." So we add to all else our White Cross work. We rejoice in the far away witness of Elizabeth Routh whom He sent to work for Him in Africa. Through your cash gifts to White Cross, you keep Elizabeth's salary paid in advance. Your gifts of supplies to Baptist Hospitals here have been generous and so you have helped in the care of the sick in the homeland as well.

For many years, W. M. U. has rejoiced to help in the education of the sons and daughters of foreign missionaries through the Margaret Fund. Six students have been assigned to Oklahoma W. M. U. to "mother." Mrs. D. H. Bell, the State Chairman, will give detailed report and assign to the Districts their student. All cash gifts are sent to W. M. U. headquarters, Baptist Building, Oklahoma City; personal gifts are sent direct to the student.

We have been unable to secure an accurate list of W. M. U. members of the 100,000 Club, but from the latest report of Dr. Tripp, we find that Oklahoma ranks fourth with the states in number of members but seventh in amount of contribution. "Let's catch up." The club is well on the way toward the half million mark. Let us be faithful in carrying out this obligation.

The spirit of giving has accompanied faith in the regular gifts to the Co-operative Program which have amounted to \$30,161.64, and in the payments on the Memorial Dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University. Through the years we have paid a total of \$180,000 on building and furnishings. This year to complete the annual payment of \$10,000

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\$1,300 interest due December 15th, 1935, we must have \$4,500 not than January 1st. I am counting on you. When this is paid, there be left only \$30,000. Faith will continue to guide in the spirit of g so that this work of Oklahoma W. M. U. may be completely finished. You will be happy to know that every room in the dormitory is pided this year.

We report 2,266 new titheers, 616 are young people. Much interest shown this year in the Stewardship Declamation contest. It had an important place on the program in each District meeting; hence ge group of our young people are studying stewardship. Winners he state contest held during the houseparties are: Intermediate ., Miss Oma Jeanne Hager, Maugum, Southwest District; Y. W. If all our women and young people would keep informed by reading available missionary periodicals, the work of the Lord would be tly prospered. It is all but impossible to lead adequately in mission-education organizations without World Comrades or The Window . W. A. according to the aged group concerned, yet our goal for ld Comrades subscriptions is only 845 and for The Window of W. A. 440. To October first we had sent in 633 subscriptions to ld Comrades and 349 subscriptions to The Window of Y. W. A. A yory glance at popular periodicals on the newsstand will make ightful parents eager to put these magazines in their homes for ly access by their children and young people. Certainly our women l to read their official organ Royal Service (Oklahoma goal 3,415 we have sent in 2,222, 1,193 short) and literature chairmen should ore zealous in sending subscriptions for all three of our missionary azines, and our state paper, The Baptist Messenger.

There are three special seasons in the year when it seems espec- appropriate to recall the words of Chronicles regarding the wise-rted families of those early Biblical days. In the weeks of prayer State, Home and Foreign Missions, Woman's Missionary Union seeks abide in Him in prayerful mood and bring gifts for His work. Last r, we gave in the Lottie Moon offering \$7,629.73, to Annie W. Arm- ng offering for Home Missions \$3,805.37, State Missions \$1,638.82. orts show a gain in number of organizations observing the season prayer. Four hundred thirty-two W. M. S. and 644 young people's iliarities, a total of 1,076, shared in the blessing of the prayer season Foreign Missions, 512 W. M. S., 642 young people's organizations, al 1,154 for Home Missions, and 1,172 for State Missions, but we can- be satisfied with this record. It is so much lower than it should be.

The thirty-two Associational organizations have had their quarterly lies and are realizing the value of such meetings in giving informa- and inspiration and in training their constituency for greater serv-. I truly want to express my sincere appreciation for the splendid vice rendered by this group of volunteer workers, the Associational esidents, twenty-six of whom have sent in reports each quarter dur-; the year. It has been a joy to work with them and with all our al W. M. U. friends.

Many courtesies extended to me while on the field and enthusiastic ters received in the office brighten the retrospect of the past year. I ve this year visited in 24 of the Associations, 186 days were spent on e field, 49 times I have talked on my trip to Palestine and shared with churches my entire trip in pictures, taught the Why and How of W. U. to 18 groups, helped in ten Schools of Missions, attended 9 District etings that were splendidly planned and executed by their respective esidents. Seventy per cent of the Societies were represented in the



meetings with a total attendance of 3,140 in the nine meetings. I conducted the two state house parties for Y. W. A. and Intermediate G. A., attended two camps, G. A. and R. A., spent ten delightful days at Ridgecrest, the Southwide Camp for Y. W. A., ten days at the State Baptist Assembly, Falls Creek, and there were more calls for field work than one person could accept. Deeply do I appreciate the work of Mrs. Mildred Wells whose efficiency in the office made it possible for me to spend more than half of my time on the field.

Indeed the year has been a busy one, but a very happy one. I thank you most sincerely for your confidence and love and for the privilege of service. I have tried to be faithful.

As we view with gratitude and joy the number of classes taught and awards received, we are reminded that the real success of Mission Study is not in these. Success is measured only by what the members do with their new knowledge and greater vision. The class has not reached its possibilities if it has not resulted in increased giving, deepened prayer life and more consecrated service in the home churches and around the world. Mere acquisition of knowledge will not bring this result. Knowledge acquired must be pondered in the heart until application to life is the result. Only faithful prayer and effort under the

eadership of the Holy Spirit, together with an absorbing passion for Christ and His Kingdom can bring this result. (Mission Study—Why and How.)

Your Mission Study Chairman has had the pleasure of assisting in Mission Study Institutes held in Sulphur, Norman, Chickasha, Clinton, Bartlesville, Hugo, Spiro, Kingfisher, Oklahoma City and two Institutes in Shawnee; to have had a part in Associational Rallies held in Guthrie, Tahlequah, Haskell and Cleveland; classes were taught in Church Schools of Missions in Shawnee, First Church, and Muskogee, Calvary Church. Three annual District W. M. U. meetings were attended, West Central, Central, and Northwest. Classes were taught at Northwest Assembly, Cherokee. The Girls' Auxiliary House Party held in Oklahoma Baptist University; Kelham Avenue Church, Oklahoma City and First Church, Altus, was a privilege to speak on missions. The Y. W. A. House Party for Central District, Oklahoma City, and the Y. W. A. House Party held in Stillwater which was attended by one hundred fifty young women; Mission talks were made at Cherokee; O. B. U. Chapel preceding the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, two in Muskogee, one before the District W. M. U. meeting (Negro) together with many others. It was a pleasure to represent Oklahoma W. M. U. at the State B. S. U. Convention which met at Ada. Total enrollment according to registration in classes, only 1153. Many conferences have been held and personal interviews enjoyed. One book manuscript has been written, several articles for the Messenger have been prepared, one Teacher's Helps on Missionary Lessons from the Bible for Royal Service, together with articles for other publications.

Everywhere there is a spirit of optimism and the desire to go forward. There is no place for pessimism among Oklahoma Baptists.

Your Chairman desires to express thanks for the gracious hospitality extended by you in your homes.

To know the Baptist women of Oklahoma is to love them. May we go on to greater things as we labor with Him.

#### REPORT OF PERSONAL SERVICE CHAIRMAN "Laborers Together"

This division of program is headed "Labors of Love." The whole program is based on "Laborers together with God." If, then, we are working with God our work must be done in love, and because His love is in us and should be the compelling force to send us forth with glad tidings that others may have the knowledge of Him.

Personal Service is Local Missions—winning the lost and enlisting the unenlisted. All of the methods that we use are but approaches or contacts to reach the individual. God has worked on many a heart where we may be the spokesman for winning that person for Him.

I noticed this thought the other day—"When an employee ceases to say 'our' business, he is greasing the skids for himself." If we make God's business our business God will make our business His business. We are losing many opportunities of service to go "with the Gospel as our Motive and Salvation as our Aim." Christ says, "As the Father hath sent Me, even so send I you."

What is Organized Personal Service? It is a committee Chairman, in a small Society, directing and planning tasks for the individuals to do, giving instructions and places of service.

In a large Society it is a Chairman with a member from each Circle forming the committee directing and aiding the other members how to be of the greatest service, where and when the need is greatest. The individual is not lost in this program. It is co-operation of the whole Society through the committee. It must be individual so that it may serve and go farther than any program can ever go.

Visiting is just a method. Garments, tracts, trays, all of these are only an approach to the main task. As Paul says, "I am made all things to all men, that I might by all means save some." It is you at work in your community. Our Year Book for 1936 again gives the three-fold aim for personal service:

- Soul Winning.
- Manifesting Christian Fellowship.
- Development in Christian Service.

We are asking that Societies report the fact of conducting the various activities or helping in them, rather than the total number of visits, etc. This will take away the desire to excel some other Circle or Society.

I quote from the 1936 year book, page 21: "Each Society is urged to conduct its personal service through a committee, reporting only such activities as are directed by that committee (or chairman in case of a small Society.)"

The local W. M. S. secretary will report what work has been done by answering "Yes" or "No" for her Society and each auxiliary, then the report will be sent to the Personal Service Chairman of the Association, who will combine all reports and send to District Chairman. The District Chairman will compile all of these for her District, giving W. M. S. and all auxiliaries records and send her report to the State Chairman. Please study the Year Books and Personal Service Guide.

This thought from Charles Haddon Spurgeon: "A sluggard desireth nothing and hath nothing, whatever his trade may be. What, then, can he hope to win who calls himself a Christian and neither learns of Christ as his teacher, follows Him as his Master, nor serves Him as His Prince? Salvation is not by works, but it is salvation from idleness. We are not saved because we are earnest, but he who is not earnest has great reason to question whether he is saved."

Labors of Love! with Him who has given the greatest love gift, His Son, our Saviour, our Lord. Winning the lost in our locality, State, our nation—unto the uttermost.

We have no record of any time when Jesus was on earth that he did miracles merely to do something spectacular or to attract a crowd. So it is that Southern Baptists have learned that, as in the days of Jesus, the surest and best way of gaining the confidence of the stranger is by relieving his suffering. Since the scientific method is so much less effective than the crude and oftentime brutal treatment used by the untrained native doctor, the patient when relieved is ready to listen to the message of Christ and believe.

Hence our Foreign Mission Board has established hospitals in two foreign fields, China and Africa. The results have already proved the wisdom of this step.

This year, it has been the privilege and pleasure of Oklahoma Women's Missionary Union to pay the salary of Miss Elizabeth Routh, who has been doing Christian service as well as secretarial duties in the first hospital in Ogbomoso, Nigeria, Africa. Her letters printed in "Baptist Messenger" from time to time have truly been an inspiration to all who have read them, and made us know we had chosen wisely in electing her to represent us among the black people.

I am happy to report every association in the state has contributed to White Cross work this year. Some of the larger churches have sent more than their apportionment for which we were very thankful. Many of the smaller ones were unable to have a part in this important work.

We are again urging each society to adopt the Service Calendar found in the State Year Book, and observe White Cross month with a formational program.

Lend all cash offerings to Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, Oklahoma City, and lend all supplies to the Baptist hospitals located in Muskogee and Miami.

May we go forward in our labors of love for the Master in a way that will be pleasing to Him.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION TRAINING  
SCHOOL AT LOUISVILLE, KY.

I must first say to members of our State Board and to all of you women how much I appreciated the opportunity you gave me early in October to visit in House Beautiful, our Woman's Missionary Union Training School. Before telling anything of that inspiring visit I shall give you my report.

We have sixty-one boarding students, an increase of twenty-five per cent over last year. This is the largest enrollment since 1931. All but three states and the District of Columbia are represented. However, we have one student from Pennsylvania and one from China. I would particularly like to mention our Oklahoma girls: Miss Frances Bryan, Central District Scholarship girl, which is our only scholarship given in the state; Miss Jane Moore, of Wewoka, our Stewardship Chairman's daughter, who is paying her own way, and I would add another name at this time to our Oklahoma group—that of Miss Mary Lucille Saunders, of Shui Chow, China. I add her name because she is our Northeast District Margaret Fund daughter for this semester.

## ANNUAL OF THE OKLAHOMA

He forbids me to tell you of these three girls except to say we are fortunate in having them to represent our state at the Training School.

Scholastic standards are higher than ever before. Thirty-three students, or fifty-five per cent, are college graduates; another eighteen have had two to three years college work. Only nine have had no college training, but five of these nine have had better than high school work, one being a graduate nurse, two graduates of business colleges, and two having had one year in another religious training school.

There is no change in faculty or staff for this year. The total value of the Training School property is \$185,417.00. For full financial statement please see the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention at Memphis.

As your Trustee, I want to lay on your hearts as forcefully as I can the following facts:

1st. We must remember our Training School is not a State school. It is controlled and owned by the Woman's Missionary Union of the South. It is our school. Its two boards are elected at our annual convention; its President is the President of the W. M. U. of the South, Mrs. J. B. Armstrong. The Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees is Mrs. W. J. Cox, the Treasurer of W. M. U., and Miss Kathleen Hilly is the Corresponding Secretary. It is our task particularly to send girls from the eighteen Southern states to go there for their missionary training. This does not hurt our state or other colleges as the Mission Boards require students have college degrees.

2nd. I know of no school more reasonable in cost—\$200.00 a year for tuition, board, room, laundry, books, matriculation fee, and incidentals. Where can you get so much for so little? The low cost is possible because Southwide W. M. U. contributes \$21,000.00 each year, part of it coming from the endowment fund of \$172,000.00, \$1,500.00 is given each year by the Sunday School Board, and 8/15 of one per cent of Co-operative Southwide Program receipts are contributed. Pray, brethren, that your District will be ready at an early date to provide a scholarship. When you are ready to send our girls, you will find God will put it into the hearts of the right girls to answer His call.

3rd. Get the Training School before your local Societies; talk to your girls in the Y. W. A.'s, and particularly to those graduating from colleges this year. Do your talking and planning early as it takes time to take care of the applications. Miss Littlejohn says demand for work is again on the increase. Rev. John Abernathy, of China, recently told our Foreign Board that the greatest need for his field was one hundred and eighty missionaries.

4th. Next April is set aside as "Forget-Me-Not Month," when not only the Training School and the Margaret Fund plan to build up respectively the Mrs. Geo. B. Eager Emergency Fund of the Training School and the Elizabeth Lowndes Scholarship Fund of the Margaret Fund. Every Society in the State is urged to plan for an over and above gift during April of at least \$1.00 per Society on up. Many of your members may want to make individual gifts also. Watch the Baptist Messenger as Mrs. Bell, Margaret Fund Chairman, and I will tell you more about the special funds.

5th. Every State has one thing especially to send to school each year. Long since our special gift has been turkeys at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Please give liberally when the collection is taken for this purpose. They are counting on us for the turkeys.

Everything you have heard—lovely and fine—about House Beautiful is true. This is one time I can say from experience. I wrote you about Founders Day in the Baptist Messenger, and time will not permit me to say more. I felt particularly privileged to meet and to sit and

talk with the only surviving founder, Mrs. McLure. As I talked with her I realized what a rich heritage the school has in its founders. I have been privileged to know two other founders, having met Miss Heck on one of her last trips to my former home town, and Mrs. Geo. B. Eager, whom I remember was entertained in our home when I was a child. Mrs. S. E. Woody and Mrs. Eliza Broadus were the other founders.

These awards to be presented at the Central District Annual meeting in the spring. One Association—Central—won three of these awards in the Annual meeting of the District at Chickasha last April.

There were more entrants in the Stewardship Declamation Contest this year than ever before and all were so good the competition was close. The winner in our Y. W. A. Contest, Miss Barbara Corley, of Oklahoma City, was also the State winner in the contest conducted at the Y. W. A. house party in Shawnee and went to Ridgecrest. Our District paid her expenses at the house party as a reward. We also paid the expenses of our G. A. winner at the G. A. house party.

Encouraging reports come from the Associations of new auxiliaries being organized, resulting in more W. M. U. Families.

We are glad to have as our representative at House Beautiful our W. M. U. Training School Scholarship girl, Miss Frances Bryan, who is in her senior year.

It was with joy that we learned that Dr. M. T. Rankin, Superintendent of Oriental Missions in China, has chosen Miss Lucy Smith, of Oklahoma City, to be his secretary. My heart is filled to overflowing. Rejoice with me, Central District women, because Lucy is one of our very own Central District Scholarship girls. How it thrills our soul to have one of our girls called to a foreign field. Truly do we praise His holy Name.

## REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

God hath spoken once; twice have I heard this; that POWER be-  
longeth unto God. Psalm 62:11.

Truly do the reports of the different departments of the W. M. U. of Oklahoma that have come to the Executive Board from time to time testify to the manifestation of His power in the steady growth along all lines. "O, give thanks unto the Lord; call upon His name. Make known His deeds among the people."

We are standing at the portal of the opening year; let us go forward singing: "Lead On, O King Eternal! The day of march has come! \* \* \* Thy cross is lifted o'er us; we journey in its light; Lead on, O King Eternal, Lead on, O God of might."

The first meeting of the Executive Board of the W. M. U. of Oklahoma was held on March 11, 1935, in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City, when the regular reports were presented and adopted.

Mrs. Kirk, in bringing her report as trustee for the W. M. U. Training School at Louisville, stated that only one district has a scholarship—Central District—sending Miss Frances Bryan.

The District meetings were discussed by Mrs. Spooner who announced that Mrs. W. G. White of Brazil, and Mr. King of China, would speak in these meetings. The faculty for the Y. W. A. Houseparty in Shawnee, June 10-14, was announced; Miss Inez Lung, a Chinese girl, Miss Earl Hester of Roumania, Mrs. Aulick, and Mrs. Daniel.

Mrs. Brockway, state representative of the Negro women, was introduced and after thanking the women for the funds given at the State meeting, made a plea for our women to help in teaching mission study to the Negro women. Mrs. McMillan asked the women to help in putting the missionary magazine for the Negro women, "The Worker," in the hands of the Negro societies.

Mrs. Spooner suggested a method study in the Board meeting the first of the year and upon motion it was voted that we recommend to the messengers in annual session next November that a mid-year Board meeting be held the first Monday and Tuesday after the first Sunday of the month in January.

The Corresponding Secretary also suggested that the Associations have a week in January in which conferences for Young People's leaders be held throughout the state.

Upon motion by Mrs. Daniel it was voted that a committee be appointed to confer with Dr. Potter about putting a Young People's Leader on the field. The President stated that the committee previously appointed for this purpose would be continued as follows: Mrs. R. D. Sheldon, Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, and Mrs. John Daniel.

The announcement was made that Oklahoma's part in the Lottie Moon Offering was \$7,629.73.

Mrs. Dahlem was asked to tell what she did in Tulsa-Rogers Association for the Lottie Moon Offering. She replied that they began in August to ask for enough to send a missionary—\$800.00, and the Lord gave them \$1,000.00.

Mrs. McMillan stated that before the Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong offerings are designated a committee is appointed from the W. M. U. of the South to confer with both Dr. Maddy of the Foreign Mission Board and Dr. Lawrence of the Home Mission Board and they suggest the most needy fields where these offerings are sent.

In the Board meeting the following morning Mrs. Spooner discussed the Dormitory payments and also stated that we went over the top in our subscriptions for missionary magazines last year.

The President, Mrs. McMillan, announced a revised Young People's Committee as follows: Mrs. Daniel, Mrs. Wilhoite, Mrs. Stinson, Miss Elizabeth Miller and Mrs. Hood Shannon.

The second meeting of the W. M. U. of Oklahoma for the year was held on Sept. 9, 1935, in Oklahoma City.

Regular reports were presented and adopted.

Mrs. J. C. Hering, W. M. U. Training School Trustee, gave a report of the spring Board meeting of the Southern W. M. U. Training School trustees and spoke of the plan of a "Forget-Me-Not" month which is to be sponsored jointly by the Margaret Fund and the Training School. The Margaret Fund part will be called the Elizabeth Lowndes Scholarship Fund and the Training School Fund the Mrs. Geo. B. Eager Fellowship Fund. The plan is that each member of every Society be asked to give ten cents, the amount being divided equally between the objects and the month to be set by the State W. M. U.

Mrs. Spooner spoke of Founders' Day in the W. M. U. Training School, October 2nd, stating that it was the plan for each state to send their Trustee as a representative to Louisville for this occasion. Upon motion by Mrs. Stevens it was voted that we take care of Mrs. Hering's expenses to Louisville to attend the Founders' Day celebration.

In bringing her report as Margaret Fund trustee, Mrs. D. H. Bell made the assignment of students to the district. (See page 149.)

The Corresponding Secretary brought a request for help on a scholarship for Miss Alpha Worthington, daughter of Rev. A. Worthington, missionary to the Osage Indians in Oklahoma, so that she may enter O. B. U. \$150.00 was the amount needed.

Mrs. Bandy moved that the W. M. U. of Oklahoma support Miss Worthington with our love gifts, that the money be sent in to Mrs. Spooner's office, and that the Board act as messengers to the local Societies urging them to give to this worthy cause. Motion carried.

Mrs. Spooner announced that we are indebted to Mrs. Myrle Anderson Lane for the Young People's Program and to Mrs. R. D. Sheldon for the W. M. S. program for State Mission Week of Prayer to be observed the first week in October.

Mrs. Spooner in bringing her report of the Dormitory emphasized the need for each Society to do their part to meet the payment due December 15th.

Dr. Routh came before the Board and spoke about Messenger subscriptions, giving some information on Elizabeth's work and expressing his appreciation for what Oklahoma W. M. U. is doing in their support of Elizabeth in Africa.

Rev. T. P. Haskins, Assistant to Dr. Potter, was introduced and spoke to the women, commending them on the Memorial Dormitory and encouraging them to promote the State Mission Offering in October.

There was a splendid attendance in the session of the Board November 11th, preceding the annual meeting.

After the routine business, Mrs. Spooner spoke of the Dormitory and the urgent need of meeting the payment due December 15th. The Corresponding Secretary explained that the Baptist General Convention is planning to launch a debt paying campaign in the annual meeting this week and that the \$30,000.00 still unpaid on the Dormitory will be incorporated in this campaign and made a preferred item.



Upon motion by Mrs. D. H. Bell of Shawnee, it was voted that we recommend to the W. M. U. of Oklahoma in annual session that our women assume \$50,000.00 of this debt paying campaign.

Mrs. Spooner announced the approaching marriage of Elizabeth Routh and Christopher Poole and suggested that if any Society wishes to have a part in a gift for Elizabeth the money be sent direct to the office of the Corresponding Secretary of W. M. U.

Mrs. D. H. Bell, Margaret Fund Chairman, presented a recommendation from the Southwide W. M. U. relative to a "Forget-Me-Not" month. Mrs. J. C. Hering, W. M. U. Training School Trustee, also discussed this recommendation.

Mrs. R. Y. Bandy moved that we recommend to the W. M. U. in annual session that we set February as "Forget-Me-Not" month at which time emphasis shall be placed upon programs featuring the Margaret Fund and the W. M. U. Training School, the offering which is ingathered at the time to be divided between the Elizabeth Lowndes (Margaret) Scholarship Fund and the Mrs. Geo. B. Eager Fellowship (Training School) Fund. Motion carried.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RECOMMENDATIONS

Your committee on recommendations presents the following suggestions for your endorsement:

### 1. Plan of Work

That we adopt the Plan of Work of the W. M. U. of the South as published in the 1936 Year Book.

That our Watchword be: "As the Father hath sent me, even so send I you."—John 20:21.

That our song for the year be: "Lead On, O King Eternal."

That all Districts and Associations and local societies keep complete records of all their meetings.

That an intensive enlistment campaign be put on in all of our churches to enlist the great host of unenlisted women and young people in the work of Missions.

That more time and study be given to plain parliamentary rules in all of our meetings.

That one program at the quarterly rallies in the Association be a "Clinic," viz.: Each Associational Chairman of the different departments shall have a conference with the corresponding officers from the local societies.

That each local W. M. S. shall have an annual School of Instruction for all officers, using as a text book, "Why and How," by Miss Bucy.

That Publicity and Educational Chairman be elected in the District, the Association, and the local society.

That the Oklahoma Service Calendar for the year 1936 be as follows:  
January—Scholarships.

February—White Cross.

March—Home Missions.

April—Forget-Me-Not Month and Orphans' Home.

May—Debt Paying Campaign (which includes the final debt on the Dormitory).

June—Associational expense; District expense.

July—Southwestern Training School Nursery at Fort Worth.

August—Scholarship.

September—Special efforts for the Debt Paying Campaign and subscriptions to Baptist Messenger and Missionary periodicals; Orphans' Home.

October—State Missions and boxes to frontier preachers and missionaries.

November—Margaret Fund; final collections for Debt Paying Campaign.

December—Lottie Moon offering.

## 2. Prayer

We recommend daily reading of God's Word and prayer in our homes. Regular use of the Calendar of Prayer found in our "Royal Service." Observance of the united prayer hour at 9 a. m., for America and World Wide Missions.

We sincerely desire that the prayer book, "Prayer—the Golden Chain," edited and published by Woman's Missionary Union, be purchased and studied by every Baptist woman in our constituency.

## 3. Mission Study

That Mission Study Institutes, presenting teaching methods preferably lasting two days, be held in each Association annually. A leaflet, "The Mission Study Institute," available from the State W. M. U. headquarters, suggests many plans for real training work.

That books be distributed one week before the meeting of a one-day class and that some kind of visual teaching, such as maps, charts, blackboards, or pictures be used.

That mission study chairmen exercise greater diligence than ever before in securing reports of classes taught and the number of awards granted. As diplomas and certificates are valuable in educational work, we should make use of them in missionary work.

That Woman's Missionary Societies urge and co-operate with the church in supporting the Church School of Missions. Catalogues giving detailed instructions may be secured from the State W. M. U. headquarters.

That mission libraries be established wherever possible in churches or Associations.

That at least one program on World Peace be given in the Circles during the year.

That all who have completed Courses I and II enroll for the Advanced Course of Study.

That renewed emphasis be given to teaching missions to the young people.

That classes be organized for women who lack only a few books of finishing Courses I and II.

That Associational Chairmen seek to organize mission study classes in societies where no mission study work has been done. As never before, let us make every effort to have at least one mission study class in every Society in the State where a study class has never been held.

That "Telling You How," by Juliette Mather be used as the young people's method book and "Mission Study, Why and How," by Mrs. A. L. Aulick, be used as the W. M. S. Method Book, each receiving credit on Certificate Course II in place of home or foreign mission book.

That two mission study classes be held during the year in every Woman's Missionary Society, thus meeting the requirement of the Standard of Excellence.

That emphasis be placed on the study of books dealing with the missionary teaching of the Bible, using as texts one or all of the books recommended by the Woman's Missionary Union of the South and leading to the seal on Certificate Course I.

That the ideal of the Woman's Missionary Union be to fix and intelligent missionary consciousness in the heart of every woman, young person, boy or girl who may come within the influence of a Woman's Missionary Society.

#### 4. Personal Service

That we keep in mind always the aim of all personal service is soul winning. Keeping always before us the three-fold plan of work as follows:

- A. Soul winning.
- B. Maintaining Christian fellowship.
- C. Development in Christian Service.

That we follow the Southwide plan of reporting personal service by stating we are helping in the various activities rather than the total number of visits, garments, etc.

That each Personal Service Chairman report for the W. M. S. and all Auxiliaries each quarter, sending her report to the Associational Personal Service Chairman, who will compile all reports for the Association and send to the District Personal Service Chairman who, in turn, will compile all Associational reports and send to the State Personal Service Chairman.

That special emphasis be given to "Open Doors" for Negroes. Special emphasis on Jewish work by groups known as "Friends of Israel."

#### 5. Stewardship

That each Society or Circle study a book on Stewardship during the year.

That each Stewardship Chairman have a regular conference with each Circle Chairman to study the Stewardship devotionals suitable for the Service Calendar of the Year Book. (This includes the Auxiliary Leaders who teach the Stewardship of Tithes and Offerings.)

That Stewardship be given an important place in our programs.

That we co-operate in the Stewardship Contest, beginning on the contest now and completing not later than December 20th.

Then the Associational contest not later than January, so they may be ready for the District meetings in the spring.

That we display posters often in our churches, the best to be sent to Associations, etc.

That we practice and teach tithes and offerings as God's plan of financing His Kingdom.

That we present Stewardship plays and pageants whenever possible.

That we strive for an increase in the number of tithers in each organization.

#### 6. Missionary Education of Young People

That we be faithful stewards of YOUTH in our churches in enlisting and training them in the missionary spirit by fostering all the missionary auxiliaries: Y. W. A., R. A., G. A., and Sunbeams, not being satisfied until a full family is organized in each church.

That each Society conduct a training class for Auxiliary Counselors.

#### 7. White Cross

That each Society contribute to the support of Elizabeth Routh, our representative in the Baptist Hospital at Ogbomoso, Nigeria, West Africa.

That each Society put on a White Cross program during the year..

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### 8. Margaret Fund
