Constitution

Article I—Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Article II—Constituency

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers appointed by Baptist Churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

Article III—Object

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the Churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all the denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this convention shall be a President, two Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, and historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

Article V—Boards, Trustees and Committees

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to appoint such Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this Convention.

Article VI—Board of Directors

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention and thirty-two (32) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

Section 4. This Board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

Article VII—Proceedings

Section 1. The proceedings of this Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the Churches.

Article VIII—Annual Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Article IX—Special Funds

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

Article X—Change of Constitution

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BY-LAWS OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

Article I

Section 1. The business and the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of Directors shall be thirty-four (34).

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year, as herein-after provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year.

Section 3. The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Board of Directors herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of

the term of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.

Section 5. The Directors shall hold quarterly meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall by proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held, as above provided.

Section 7. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.

Two Vice Presidents, selected by the Board.

A Recording Secretary, elected by the Convention.

An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.

A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.

A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention, shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Vice President, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make quarterly reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He shall attest with the President all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of an emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefor, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention, except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done only in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 5. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until same has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State Paper at least six months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request comes to the convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following convention a year hence.

Proceedings

Oklahoma City, Tuesday, November 17, 1936, 8:00 P. M.

Theme of Convention: "Conditions of Success." Heb. 12:1.

Tuesday's Theme: "Seeing the Fields."

1. The Tuesday evening session was a joint meeting of the W. M. U. Convention and the Baptist General Convention.

2. President C. C. Morris called for the report on Foreign Missions and T. W. Medearis, chairman of the committee, read the report and moved its adoption:

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

In 1927 the report on foreign missions made to this Convention indicated that receipts for the year had amounted to \$1,633,477.93 and yet that "151 missionaries are in this country on furlough or have been withdrawn from their respective fields." In 1932 your report said that 32 missionaries would not be returned to their work. In 1933 the report said that 30 missionaries who were at home on furlough could not be returned to their fields and indicated that for several years our missionary forces had been dwindling. "During this year we have lost 17 missionaries by resignation and 2 by death. Not a single recruit has been sent out this year," says the report. It goes on to say, "We will pay \$65,000 in interest this year on borrowed money and our debt is \$1,115,107.17."

We are happy to report at this time in far more optimistic terms. Our debt has been reduced to \$400,000 in round numbers and whereas, we reached a peak of \$69,000 in annual interest at one time, our interest for the current year will be approximately \$13,000. The increase in contributions between 1932 and 1935 of \$44,919 is at least a step in the right direction. The one thing which has done more to turn the tides in the fortunes of the Foreign Board and the missionary giving of our people than anything else is the wonderful Lottie Moon Christmas offering which the W. M. U. of the South has raised each year. That offering in 1935 amounted to \$240,455.12.

Once again we are sending out missionaries in encouraging numbers. We reached a low number at one time of 376 missionaries on the foreign field, but have built back now to a total of 414. Some of the finest and most promising young people ever appointed by any board have gone out in recent months to our mission fields.

The morale of Southern Baptists with reference to foreign missions has improved mightily and the same thing is true of our missionary forces. The perfection of a pension plan whereby our aged and broken missionaries might be retired on a small pension has done much to reassure these self-sacrificing servants of ours in the foreign fields. Fifty-six missionaries are now retired on pension. It is heartening also to note that there is once again an increase in volunteers for foreign mission service in our colleges, seminaries and training schools.

Our Secretary has visited all our foreign mission fields except Africa during the last two years and has gained much needed information about the fields and the forces, and a great deal of reorganization work for better efficiency has been effected all around the world.

While this report sounds optimistic, we must remember that there is most urgent need for highly trained men in nearly all the

fields; men of fine minds with the best training and deepest consecration are needed in a dozen strategic places. Our property all around the earth is in a bad state of repair and many thousands of dollars need to be spent to preserve this property. Hospital and other equipment is sorely needed in many places. Surely the fields are white and the Macedonian calls come from every side. The budget as adopted at the October meeting of the Board this year provides for a grand total of \$762,065.73, which is an increase over last year of approximately \$30,000.

We believe that large place ought to be made for foreign missions in the programs of district associations, assemblies and conferences of every sort, and that our churches should all conduct mission training schools. "My people perish for lack of vision." "Lift up your eyes and look upon the fields for they are white already unto harvest." "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The fundamental purpose in missions is the projection of the saving grace of our Lord Jesus Christ into all time and into all lands. This never changes. The disciples of Christ of every age are to go into all the world and into all the life of the world, sent by Christ as Christ was sent by the Father, to carry to its consummation the redemptive work of Christ.

The point of approach to this world-task for Southern Baptists is the homeland. Keep the homeland evangelized and we have the hope and the assurance of the world's evangelization. Let apostolic faith perish from the homeland and our missions in far away fields will fail for lack of support. Home Missions are essential to world missions.

Great Missionary Need

The Home Mission task is greater today than ever. Millions of people in the homeland are waiting for the Word of Life. Our brothers in black, 10,000,000 of them, are looking to us for help; 5,000,000 foreigners spiritually marooned on our shores are a challenge to our passion for the lost; in Oklahoma and New Mexico 200,000 Indians will never have a chance if we do not send the Gospel to them; the 225,000 Spanish-speaking people in New Mexico will never know about Christ as a personal Savior unless some one

goes to them with the Gospel; 800,000 Mexicans this side the Border are crying out for the Light; the great Acadian section in French Louisiana with its more than 600,000 souls should know about the Savior. There is much land to be possessed.

A Glorious Work

The Home Mission Board last year appointed 27 new missionaries, making a total of 283 missionaries working in 894 mission churches and mission stations. There were over 4,000 conversions and baptisms, eighteen new churches were organized and 62 mission stations opened.

In Cuba, the missionaries made 31,855 visits, 2,802 prayer meetings, and conducted 4,987 preaching services. In the homeland, in addition to the multiplied thousands of prayer and preaching services conducted, 5,563 individuals were reached by personal evangelism. Of these, 578 were Italians, 1,610 Indians, 1,974 Mexicans, and nearly 1,000 were Negroes. Moreover, 9,326 Bibles and Gospels were distributed.

In the ministry of teaching, the Board is maintaining 566 Sunday schools with 11,554 pupils. It also maintains Acadia Baptist Academy in Southern Louisiana, the Anglo-Mexican Institute at El Paso, Texas, the Mexican Baptist Institute at Bastrop, Texas, and does other efficient and effective work in Christian education.

Time would fail us to tell of all the benevolent work being done by our Board such as that of our Southern Baptist Sanatorium at El Paso, the orphanage for Mexican children at Bastrop, Texas, the free clinic for poor children in Cuba, and almost innumerable other services, the spiritual ministries back of which, as Miss Kelly suggests, "cannot be estimated until the Judgment Day."

The Budget of Operations

In 1935 the Board received from all sources \$416,576.85. This was \$82,880.82 more than was received in 1934. The budget for 1936 is \$150,000.00 for mission work, and \$194,896.67 for interest and principal on debts. The Board is operating within the budget and for over two years has operated without borrowing money.

The Board has received from the Hundred Thousand Club up to May 1, 1936, \$98,766.37, all of which has been paid on the principal of its debt.

Our Home Mission Board is conscious of its stewardship and determined to meet it. We believe that the paramount issue before Southern Baptists is whether the homeland is to be made Christian or is to become progressively pagan and go the way of all nations that forget God. The Home Mission Board is set for the saving of the homeland.

WHEREAS, repeated efforts are being made to repeal prohibition laws in Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, in spite of the overwhelming defeat at the recent general election of the initiative referendum amendment proposing repeal, there is every indication that at the next regular session of the Legislature an attempt will be made to submit the repeal issue again to the citizens of Oklahoma; therefore be it

RESOLVED: (1) That this Convention go on record as opposing such submission of the Repeal question, especially since the state has so recently rejected the Repeal proposal.

(2) That we call upon public officials who are charged with the administration of laws to enforce laws relating to the liquor traffic as well as all other laws; and we pledge such officials our whole-hearted support in law enforcement.

(3) That in every way possible, by precept and example, in the homes and in the schools and in the churches, we teach temperance and inculcate respect for constituted authority.

(4) That a standing committee consisting of ten members, including the president of the Convention, be appointed by the President of the Convention, which committee shall be authorized to represent this Convention in a consideration and the disposition of questions mentioned in this resolution in so far as this Convention may properly deal with such matters.

REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION

For Year Ending October 31, 1936

"It is a good thing to give thanks unto Jehovah."

We take this occasion to express our deep gratitude to God for His manifold blessing and favor upon all our work. The past year has been exceedingly difficult, owing to the unprecedented drouth that has practically parched our Commonwealth. This is true for individuals and local churches, but it has been even more so for denominational groups somewhat removed from the local churches. In spite of such conditions, however, genuine progress is being reported all along the battle front and we feel that, in times that have taxed the strength and resources of every kind of organization and institution, it has been nothing short of a miracle that has enabled us to emerge from the drouth and depression with increasing assets and shrinking liabilities.

Our needs are many and urgent, but favors of our Heavenly Father have been so gracious and bountiful that we should continually give thanks to Him and express this gratitude through our lives set apart anew to His service.

We wish to express the appreciation of your Board for the co-operation of the officers of the District Associations, the Associational, District, and State Missionaries, the pastors and multiplied thousands of our people throughout the state. Without such co-operation all our promotion and Debt Liquidation efforts would have been in vain. We are happy to say that the reports that come to us from over the state during the past few weeks show that Oklahoma Baptists have decided to go on with the Lord's work in a more faithful and effective manner. There are abundant signs of more aggressive plans for the new year among our churches.

We have endeavored to bring to the attention of our people throughout the state this year the need of a genuine revival of religion in our individual hearts and in all our churches. You have specifically charged us with the responsibility of promoting denominational plans and policies, and we have endeavored to recognize this responsibility. We realize that the greatest need of our Baptist people is a closer fellowship with the Heavenly Father.

"Oh, for a closer walk with God,
A calm and heavenly frame;
A light to shine upon the road
That leads me to the Lamb."

If such fellowship should be established, the promotion of our denominational enterprises would be easier and more effective. We wish here to impress on your hearts the necessity for this revival and urge that, during 1936-37, every denominational interest, every church, and individual endeavor to promote it.

"Lead on, O King Eternal,
The day of march has come!"

This annual report represents a year of sacrificial and consecrated service which will bring joy to every Oklahoma Baptist heart. We present herewith a brief statement concerning the different agencies and institutions.

Book Store

For sixteen years the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention has owned and operated a book store. Eleven years ago the Sunday School Board purchased a one-half interest, and since that time it has been jointly owned and operated by the two boards.

The store has been operated as a denominational service rather than for profit. The service rendered cannot be accurately estimated by any of us.

The new policy of the Sunday School Board, under the leadership of Dr. T. L. Holcomb, is to purchase the states' interests in the various book stores of the South and to operate them as a Sunday School Board project. The Sunday School Board proposes to buy our interest or sell theirs to us.

The Executive Secretary went to Nashville and conferred with Dr. J. O. Williams and Dr. T. L. Holcomb about purchasing our interest. The matter was brought to the attention of the Board of Directors at their meeting September 14, 1936, and a motion was made by Dr. W. O. Leach 'that we look with favor upon the Sunday School Board's offer to buy or sell the Book Store, and that a committee of three be appointed (including the Executive Secretary) to work out the details and report their proposals at the Convention session of the Board of Directors.'

The committee was Rupert Naney, E. V. Mashburn, and Andrew Potter. This committee recommends that after the actual value of the store has been determined by an inventory that we sell our half-interest in the Baptist Book Store to the Sunday School Board.

It is the expressed desire of the Sunday School Board to continue to operate the store in connection with the Baptist Headquarters at Oklahoma City and to render to Oklahoma Baptists the same service as we have had heretofore with joint ownership. And it is the purpose of Oklahoma Baptists to continue to give to the Book Store as owned and operated by the Sunday School Board, the same enthusiastic and hearty support as has been given before.

Oklahoma Baptist University

Oklahoma Baptist University is making substantial progress. The student body is steadily increasing, the fine faculty is stronger than ever, the physical property has been greatly beautified and its value enhanced, and the internal affairs are running smoothly. The University continues to grow in favor with our people.

We heartily approve the plans and policies set out for the school by the Board of Trustees and its brilliant young president, Dr. John W. Raley, and pledge our co-operation to their sane, constructive, forward-looking program.

We own and operate this school. It is a child of the Baptist General Convention. We seek its control and direction and are careful that it does not wander from the straight and narrow way. If we have a school that meets the competition of the day it must get sufficient support from the Baptist General Convention so that it can qualify as a standard college. There are no short cuts. We must maintain such academic standards and have such physical equipment as fully meet the requirements of a college of the first grade. The income derived from tuition and fees will not support a college of the first order. The University must have an income from sources outside of itself.

The operating deficits on Oklahoma Baptist University for the past ten years have ranged from \$23,907.69, the lowest, to \$52,381.92, the highest. It is gratifying to note that the lowest deficit (\$23,907.69) accrued during the past year, which indicates good business judgment and the sound financial policy of the present administration. The University authorities and Executive Secretary have been studying the operating budget requirements. Expenditures in every department for the past year were set out, and, over against this, the proposed budget for the present year. This intelligent diagnosis of the operating budget requirements indicates the necessity of the school having an income other than

the regular college revenue. It further reveals the wisdom of providing annually a specified amount to supplement the college income, in order that no deficit should accrue.

The school must have adequate support and it should also live within the budget agreed upon by the Convention.

We, therefore, recommend: First, that we adopt a permanent policy of underwriting the amount of money the school is to receive on operating expenses from Convention sources each year.

Second, that we instruct the school administration and the Board of Trustees to submit annually a proposed operating budget to the September meeting of the Board of Directors so that it may be passed on to the Convention for approval or disapproval.

Third, that we provide from Convention sources \$34,000.00 for the operating budget of Oklahoma Baptist University during the 1936-37 school year.

This method of requiring the University administration to submit an operating budget annually will enable the Convention to have an intelligent understanding of the amount of money we are to provide each year for this purpose. It will put upon the Convention the responsibility of providing that money and at the same time require the University to live within that budget.

The sources of income to provide this operating budget supplement will be the Co-operative Program receipts for Christian Education, the June offering to Christian Education, and other special gifts that may be provided by friends of the institution.

Training Department

The Baptist Training Union, Sunday School, Baptist Student Union, and Assembly under one directing head has proven very satisfactory. This consolidation was effected for the sake of economy but has commended itself for unity, harmony, and efficiency in administration. Mr. T. H. Farmer has worked untiringly at this big job. We recommend a continuance of this departmental grouping.

The work of these departments is expanding with each passing year. These departments sorely need more workers. It is the purpose of the Board of Directors to increase the appropriations to this department when our receipts to state missions justify it.

The past year the Sunday School Board furnished \$4,173.51, our Board supplied \$3,341.60, and \$11,094.99 was obtained from State and District Conventions, Assembly registrations, rentals, churches, etc., making a total of \$18,610.10 received and expended for this department. The Sunday School Board paid direct to workers in our state \$2,176.53, making a grand total of \$20,786.63.

We must continue to place special emphasis upon training. Evangelism creates a constituency but training is necessary to assimilate them into our church and denominational enterprises.

Falls Creek Assembly

Founded less than twenty years ago, the summer Assembly at Falls Creek has steadily grown until it is the largest Baptist summer encampment in the world. The total attendance last summer was approximately 5,000. Instruction is provided each year for all who are interested in various phases of teaching and training—Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, Baptist Training Union, and Baptist Brotherhood. One of the greatest contributions that Falls Creek makes to Baptist life and progress is the vision which it gives of Christ's cause and work. It has untold inspirational value. Last summer in one high hour after an address by Dr. J. W. Raley of Oklahoma Baptist University, more than 125 young people dedicated their lives to God's supreme world task.

Mr. Farmer has done a monumental work in providing an attractive educational program and in adding continually to the material assets of the Assembly.

Hospitals

We have sought to carry out the program of Jesus, who went about teaching, preaching, and healing. We own and operate two hospitals, one in Muskogee and the other at Miami. These institutions have ministered in the name of Jesus Christ to multitudes of suffering people and have brought joy to hundreds of homes as men, women, and children have gone out healed in body and with a vision of the importance of such a Christ-like institution. Both hospitals have paid all operating expenses for the past year with a gratifying net profit. The auditor's report shows for the Muskogee Hospital an excess in income over expenses of \$8,893.35, and for the Miami Hospital (including special gifts) a net income in excess of expenses of \$8,458.75. We thank God for the gratifying progress being made in our two Baptist Hospitals.

Baptist Messenger

The power of the printed page is apparent to all. Its potency in molding public sentiment and in directing the thought and activities of men is clearly manifest. Literature is doubtless one of the greatest forces for character building in the life of today.

In view of the ever-widening stream of popular reading material flowing from the public press, much of which is salacious and sinful, the need of religious literature is paramount. For in the realm of reading we can overcome the evil only with the good.

We most heartily commend the Baptist Messenger as being worthy of a place in every Baptist home. It is replete each week with inspiring information concerning Baptist affairs in Oklahoma and throughout the world. We recommend a wider circulation of the Baptist Messenger and urge pastors and churches to put it in their church budgets and send it to every home.

The Baptist Messenger is a Convention-owned enterprise. It does not exist for itself but is a missionary agency. Its noble editor, Dr. E. C. Routh, gives himself without stint or reserve to the promotion of every denominational enterprise. We are proud of the Baptist Messenger. It exerts a wide influence among Oklahoma and Southern Baptists. Let us undertake within the next few months increasing its circulation many thousands.

Baptist Brotherhood

Interest in Baptist Brotherhoods has grown steadily. In the state meeting held last April the attendance of men reached the high mark of 2,000 or more. At that time there were 172 Baptist Brotherhoods in the state. Over one half of the Associations have organized Associational Brotherhoods. Recently we have heard of several Associations that are planning such organizations.

Dr. J. T. Henderson, secretary of the Southwide Baptist Brotherhood, places Oklahoma in the front rank of states in the Southern Baptist Convention in the development of Baptist laymen.

We express the hope that many more churches will organize Brotherhoods and thus enlist and utilize men who might not be reached otherwise.

Woman's Missionary Union

No department of work has experienced a more gratifying growth or made a more distinct contribution to Oklahoma Baptist progress than the Woman's Missionary Union, under the capable leadership of Mrs. George McMillan, president, and Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, corresponding secretary.

The women undertook nine years ago the building of a Woman's Dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University which, with the furnishings, cost more than \$200,000.00. The women have steadily reduced the indebtedness against the Memorial Dormitory and with the completion of the Debt-Liquidation Movement it will be paid in full.

The women set as their goal in the Debt-Liquidation Movement \$50,000.00 and many of their organizations have gone beyond their quotas. They propose to continue in this movement until the last dollar of our indebtedness is paid.

The Oklahoma Baptist women, through their three mission offerings during the year, the Lottie Moon to Foreign Missions, Annie W. Armstrong to Home Missions, and the State Mission offering, have greatly set forward the cause of missions. Through their study classes and auxiliaries, as well as their gifts of money, they have set us an example of enlistment which we may profitably follow.

Enlistment

The Scriptural idea for giving is for each one to give as the Lord has prospered. There is as much warrant for each one to give for himself as there is for each one to believe or to be baptized for himself. For the sake of the church membership, as well for the sake of Christ's cause, we should promote enlistment until every member has been taught his plain duty in the matter and has been urged to give regularly and proportionately through the church to world wide missions. From the pulpit and in classes of instruction the Lord's people should be enjoined to be faithful stewards of God.

Stewardship covers the whole range of Christian activities—stewardship of life, of time, of talents, of money. The tithe should be regarded as a minimum, not the maximum of Christian giving. The New Testament nowhere lowers the demand of the Old Testament for loving service and joyful obedience. It places a motive for giving on a higher level. According to Christ Himself our 'righteousness should exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees.' With the faithful enlistment of all our people in all of the work which God has committed to us, with a conviction begotten of the Spirit that all we have belongs to God, all of our financial problems will be solved in carrying out Christ's program.

Evangelism

Our primary business is winning the lost. Jesus came into the world to "seek and to save sinners." After men are won to the Savior they are to be taught and trained, but we must never fail to give first place to evangelism. This year our State, District, and Associational missionaries and evangelists have won multitudes to Christ. Throughout the state hundreds of pastors have lead their people in soul-winning endeavor. It is no uncommon experience to get reports from churches having from fifty to one hundred and more baptisms in a single revival. For example, in a recent issue of the Baptist Messenger there were reports of more than 500 additions to churches. In this particular issue Stigler had 116 additions in a revival, most of them for baptism, and Capitol Hill, Oklahoma City, had 188 additions.

We recommend placing even stronger emphasis on evangelism and that we plan to reach every community in our Commonwealth with one or more evangelistic meetings. Let us all go out as soul winners proclaiming the good tidings of God's redeeming grace.

Co-operative Program

Co-operation is taught throughout the Bible. In the beginning God said, "Let us make man." In the New Testament the saints were called "fellow-workers with God." In the Great Commission Jesus sent His disciples into all the world and promised to be with them all the way. Paul visited many churches on a co-operative mission, that of ministering to the needs of their famine-stricken brethren in Judea. Following scriptural teaching and precedent, Oklahoma Baptists are engaged in a glorious co-operative task—evangelism, Christian education, and beneficence—beginning at home and extending to the ends of the earth. Every dollar given to the Co-operative Program is divided among all interests and institutions in which Oklahoma and Southern Baptists are concerned. In giving to the Co-operative Program we contribute to the support of every member of the denominational family and not to any one member to the neglect of others. God hasten the day when there will no longer be need for special financial campaigns but we will provide after a scriptural fashion for all of Christ's causes. To that end let us constantly and consistently promote the Co-operative Program. It is gratifying to report that in spite of the Debt-Liquidation Movement, to which our people have so generously responded, the Co-operative Program receipts for the year just closed were \$10,440.29 in excess of the preceding year.

Recommendations

We recommend to the Convention as follows:

1. That it be our policy to operate on a cash basis.
2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best administration and promotion of our work.
3. That we instruct all agencies provided for in the budget not to make any debts during 1936-37.
4. That the 1936-37 state mission budget be projected on a basis that will insure no deficit at the close of the year.
5. That we continue the ten per cent contingency fund from "In State" objects as a safe-guard against possible deficits and with which to retire debts. It is understood that this contingency fund may be distributed back into the various percentages if it is not needed for deficits or debts.
6. That we cheerfully recognize the unquestionable right of donors to designate gifts to specific causes and bind ourselves faithfully to send such designated monies to the interests for which they are designated. At the same time we earnestly hope that our people can and will foster the whole program so long as this is the plan and purpose of both the State and Southern Baptist Conventions.

State Missions

We rejoice in the progress of our State Mission endeavor. The foundations have been well laid and we are building a superstructure thereon. Oklahoma offers a great challenge for missionary and

evangelistic work. Our people are unanimous in their desire to evangelize and Christianize our Commonwealth. "Oklahoma for Christ" should be our slogan as we stand upon the threshold of another decade.

The district mission plan is no longer an experiment. It has been a marvelous success in many sections of the state. It has enabled various Associations and groups to participate with other groups in mission work, when they could not have carried on a program alone. Without exception each of the co-operating Associations voted unanimously to continue this type of work the coming year, and are making plans for prompt payment of the missionaries' salaries.

We now have nine men serving as district and general missionaries. There have been ten during the past year but Rev. J. W. Chapman in the Panhandle recently resigned to accept the pastorate at Guymon, Oklahoma.

We have had a great sorrow the past year in the tragic death by automobile accident of Rev. T. B. Holcomb, our general missionary. Brother Holcomb was a loyal, faithful, and sacrificial Christian soul and rendered invaluable service to our State Mission cause. We record our deep sorrow at his Home-going and pray the blessing of God upon his loved ones. Upon the death of Brother Holcomb, Rev. T. B. Lackey of McAlester was elected general missionary to take his place.

Our State and District Missionaries are as follows:

General Missionary, T. B. Lackey, Muskogee; General Evangelist, C. M. Curb, Shawnee; Missionary in Kiamichi Mountains, H. J. Ballew, Tahihina; District Missionaries: B. N. In addition to these that are now serving, Rev. Bill Smith and R. K. McGregor served a part of the year, resigning to take other work.

God has graciously blessed the work of these fine men. We give below a summary of their work:

In addition to the district work we have encouraged Associations to have missionaries wherever it was practical. Six associations have had missionaries for all or part of the year and a seventh voted in their annual meeting to employ one. The state office has not received a full report of the work of these Associational Missions but from information gathered in the Associations where they served the work has been successful. These missionaries have evangelized the country places, established Sunday schools, organized churches, conducted training schools, and have done all round earnest and faithful missionary work. They have given themselves whole-heartedly to the stimulation of the entire State and South-wide missionary program.

The following brethren have served all or part time as Associational missionaries the past year: Ben Hill, Spiro; J. H. Muse, Bengal; John Cragtree, Muskogee; Floyd Looney, Pawhuska; Harvey Scott, Stigler; E. M. Agee, Miami; G. W. Davis, Chickasha. The Tulsa-Rogers Association voted to employ a missionary for the coming year.

Baptist Children's Home

Solomon says: "He that giveth unto the poor shall not lack, but he that hideth his eyes shall have many a curse. He that hath pity upon the poor lendeth unto the Lord, and that which he hath given will He repay him again."

All of us who have means have an obligation resting upon us as God fearing people to share with those who have nothing. Orphan children, having neither houses, land, money, stocks nor bonds, are the poorest of the poor in that they have lost their parents.

Giving for the support of children that have lost their parents is sometimes prompted by pity, yet the Holy Scriptures call attention to certain assurances that the givers themselves "shall not lack," that the gifts will return in some form "after many days," that each of the givers is recognized as one who "lendeth to the Lord."

There is a sweetness in direct giving which all of us have enjoyed but there is wisdom as well as sweetness in co-operative giving through agencies which can investigate and classify cases, protect us against imposition, combine our gifts with the gifts of others so as to supply all of the real needs of those upon whom we would have pity.

For the administration of the combined gifts of the people, for the relief of helpless children in Oklahoma, the Baptist Orphanage was established and has been maintained for over thirty years. The Lord of Heaven has smiled upon this Home, blessing it as His administrator of the funds loaned Him. For particulars about the administration we refer you to the report given by Mr. E. V. Mashburn.

In order to supply the necessities of the Baptist Orphanage we must have more money than has been provided from the regular income to the Home. We therefore recommend:

1. That an annual Thanksgiving-Christmas offering for the Home become a permanent policy.
2. That a goal of \$10,00.00 be set for November-December of this year.
3. That we provide an operating budget for 1936-37 of \$30,000.00.
4. That the name of the Home be changed to the Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home.

Debt-Liquidation Movement

The major financial objective for the past year has been the Debt-Liquidation Movement. Dr. W. R. White, chairman, will report this matter to the Convention tonight.

What Next?

For three years now the representative of this Board has been saying with prayerful, pleading emphasis that he was looking forward to the time when we would be free from the debt debacle and could lead Oklahoma Baptists in a great spiritual crusade—a campaign in which spiritual values would be emphasized and not money matters. Today we are thrilled with joy that that time has arrived. We stand upon the threshold of a mighty future. That future calls, calls to the Baptist hosts of Oklahoma, calls to our hearts and brains.

Today we believe this Convention should order its Board of Directors and its responsible officials to launch a mighty campaign of spiritual conquest. This campaign should take certain well defined courses.

The emphasis should be placed first where Christ always puts it—on evangelism. When we lose the seeking note, we are lost. The evangelization of the world should dominate our thinking, planning, and labors. During all the years of debt and depression, and the necessary campaigns resulting therefrom, we have tried never to lose sight of the first impulse and privilege of the Christian heart nor of our first responsibility. Today our hands are freer, we can move into this field of battle and attack the enemy.

We say Oklahoma Baptists are a mighty people, with a great spiritual vision. Well, they are. But let us remember that the white and Indian Baptists of Oklahoma constitute less than ten per cent of our population. Of the more than two and a half millions of souls in Oklahoma not more than twenty-five per cent make any sort of religious profession or have any character of church connection. Seventy-five per cent of our people unevangelized, unchurched by anybody, and ninety per cent of them untouched by us. In addition, there are several hundred consolidated high school districts in the villages and rural sections of Oklahoma where there is no Baptist church, Sunday school, B. T. U., or Baptist message of any kind. In these rural centers are growing to manhood and womanhood the young people upon whose shoulders the obligations of church and state are soon to rest. These constitute what has always been known as the life line of the American social order. Oklahoma Baptists have an imperative obligation and duty to these unsaved multitudes.

Secretary Alldredge of the Sunday School Board, after a very painstaking survey, has released figures to the effect that only thirty-two per cent of Southern Baptists are enlisted in missionary endeavor. Oklahoma is an average Southern Baptist state. The figures that apply to other states will hold with us. What a travesty and a challenge! What are we going to do about these things? It is because of these conditions that we call upon you to enter upon a program that will evangelize the lost, that will establish churches in places of destitution, and will enlist and train our people.

We need a campaign for stewardship of living and giving. People never get far nor stay long by spurts and starts. If we are to succeed with a program of stewardship which will develop our people in scriptural giving we must teach them "line upon line, precept upon precept; here a little and there a little." Special campaigns in the past three years have been necessary to save our institutions and agencies from bankruptcy. But for the future it seems to us there is a better way.

The Co-operative Program has been our life line—our very blood stream. Without the weekly and monthly receipts, the regular giving of our churches, we could not have kept the doors of our institutions open nor our missionaries on the field. Missionary work will always suffer so long as it must depend upon a missionary sermon once or twice a year with a collection following. God has

provided the method of financing His kingdom. It is bringing the tithe weekly into the treasury of the Lord as an act of worship. The Board of Directors and their Secretary call the Baptist hosts of Oklahoma to a crusade of stewardship teaching, evangelistic preaching and a more whole-hearted consecration of their spiritual powers and possessions.

We call Oklahoma Baptists to a great crusade of spiritual preaching of New Testament doctrines. Without great convictions there will be no great conquests. It is an unusual day that does not bring forth some new religious "ism." It is time that we sought the old paths and walked therein. Oh, for a recrudescence of mighty preaching of the doctrine of "salvation by grace." If the world is saved at all it must be by the application of the blood of the sinless Son of God who died and rose again for our justification.

A Final Word

God once said to spiritual Israel, "You are my battle-axe and weapons of war: and with you I will break down the kingdoms and destroy the nations of this world; and with you I will break in pieces the pale horse and his rider." Let us from that word be instructed that we are the weapons which God uses in His warfare against Satan.

We call upon Oklahoma Baptist forces from the Kansas line to the Texas border, from the Klamichi Mountains to the Panhandle prairies, to adorn themselves with garments of righteousness and march into the mightiest conflict against sin and Satan that Oklahoma has ever witnessed. Let us arise and stretch ourselves; let us measure our duty and compute our strength, for our glory is in going on. We are the embattled battalions of the Ancient of Days, we are the phalanx of the present, we—and those generations following us—are the prospect of the future. Let us blaze pathways for the coming generations of the children of God. If we can get our people to thinking, praying, preaching evangelism and missions, stewardship and the other great doctrines of the New Testament, the house of God will be filled with plenty.

"Ah, great it is to believe the dream
As we stand in youth by the starry stream;
But a greater thing is to fight life through
And say at the end the dream is true."

Oklahoma Baptists have barely emerged from their swaddling clothes. We are making traditions, and, what is more significant, writing destinies. We must not tamper with opportunity, nor piddle with responsibility. Let us make our day God's high day! We must be unafraid. We must send forth on every ocean the ships of our faith, and we must laden every ship that sails those seas with love, with service, with sacrifice. Our fathers laid well the foundations. The chief corner stone was Emmanuel—God with us. He is with us today as we break from the moorings that have held us through recent years and move out into new frontiers. The way of ease is to sit in the glow of the new day that has come to us, but it is not the way of God.

"It is easy to foot the trodden path
Where thousands walked before;
It is easy to push my fragile bark
Past the reefs of a charted shore;
It is easy to ride the road
Where others laid the rail;
It is easy to sail my ship
Where others also sailed.

"But when a dream enslaves a man—
 A dream of the vast untrod;
 A dream that says, 'Strike out with me!
 Strike out, or part with God.'
 Ah, then, my soul, bethink thyself,
 For God hath laid this scroll
 To test the rough-hewn stuff of your faith
 And try the fibre of your soul."

Report On Debt Liquidation

At the Enid Convention last year, Oklahoma Baptists set out to liquidate all of the indebtedness, which was actually \$245,715.44, save the bonded indebtedness which was on the Muskogee Hospital and cared for by the regular budget. By a cash income designated to

Debt-Liquidation Movement, by local campaign of business men where our institutions are located, by reduction of expected deficits by cash balances achieved by some agencies of the Convention, we have reduced our indebtedness to the outside world to \$108,400.00. In face of the worst drouth in the history of the state, and a most intense political campaign, both local and national, this is a most remarkable achievement. This remaining indebtedness carries a \$50,000.00 item of bonded indebtedness on Oklahoma Baptist University, \$25,000.00 not due until 1938, and \$25,000.00 due in 1939. If we can care for the other amount, \$58,400.00 in cash and bonafide pledges at this Convention, Oklahoma Baptists will be out of the woods and in the best shape of nearly any state in the Southern Baptist Convention. We can face the \$25,000.00 in 1938, and the \$25,000.00 in 1939, without the necessity of a special campaign. It is our conviction that debt paying should continue, but that this Convention should close the Debt-Paying Campaign. Very few causes or institutions, business or religious, are so fortunate as Oklahoma Baptists in this regard. We can place the matter in the clear tonight. We can say to the wide world that the perpetuity of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and of her institutions, is assured. This special phase of debt paying is only an integral part of a three-year campaign led by Secretary Potter. From the time he started debt paying until the present, the debts of the Convention have been reduced approximately \$236,925.28. This is a phenomenal achievement. We lift our hearts to God in solemn gratitude for His unspeakable goodness. The day dawns for Oklahoma Baptists when they can soon dismiss the restraint of shackling debt and expand a great missionary program. Many thanks to the faithful women, the laymen, and pastors who have kept step with the Lord and have shown apostolic spirit during these years, and especially during these last few months.

Christian Literature

Doubtless all will agree that the most powerful and the most effective agency for disseminating knowledge is the printed page. The American people are reading, and are reading as never before. Every conceivable class of reading matter, including the most vicious and destructive is being dumped into the hands of the people. The forces of error are alert to the situation and are literally flooding the country with every type of false teaching. The baneful effects on the thinking and conduct of the people are to be observed on every hand. Some of the most glaring of these results may be cited: False and distorted ideals of life, low moral standards, disrespect of law, and corrupt living. If Baptists fail to realize their responsibility to provide helpful and wholesome literature for the reading public, they will bring moral and intellectual decline, not only upon themselves but upon humanity at large. If we are "the children of light" let us "walk in the light" and lead a groping world into the light.

Baptists of Oklahoma have three agencies for getting good reading matter into the hands of the people: The Sunday School Board, The Baptist Book Store, and The Baptist Messenger. Our denominational life will become stagnant and weak if these mighty channels are not kept open and made to function to their full capacity.

1. **THE BAPTIST BOOK STORE.** Dr. Potter, in his report for the Board of Directors of this Convention for 1935, says: "The book store is a distinct asset and a denominational investment. The total net worth of the store December 30, 1934, was \$16,789.12. At our own book store you can get supplies for every department of the church, as well as a complete line of general and religious books and Bibles." Your committee commends the Book Store without reservation and urges Oklahoma Baptists to give it the patronage it so richly deserves.

2. **THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.** The services rendered Oklahoma Baptists by the Sunday School Board cannot be estimated. It has proven its genuine spirit of sympathy, and co-operation with all of our denominational agencies. This year the Board is contributing \$5,500.00 to our work in this state. To give some idea of the character and magnitude of the work being done by the Sunday School Board, we mention the fact that it published 41 books during the past year. The literature published by the Board is unquestionably the best for Baptist Sunday schools. We urge our people to give expression to their gratitude and appreciation by purchasing their literature and Sunday school and Young People's supplies from the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

3. **THE BAPTIST MESSENGER.** The Baptist Messenger is the property of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Dr. E. C. Routh, its editor, is a profound scholar and one of the outstanding editors of the South. He is wise and courageous in his advocacy of all moral questions and lifts up for our people high standards of Christian living and good citizenship.

The Baptist Messenger now goes into something like 10,000 Baptists' homes, and its noble editor and his staff are exerting every effort to increase its circulation. What a tragedy that vast numbers of Oklahoma Baptists do not read the Messenger! As a result, many are not informed, and therefore, are not interested in the great work of the kingdom of God. In this connection, are not the words of Hosea applicable? "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge."

YOUR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS:

1. That we give the fullest co-operation to every plan outlined by Dr. Routh to increase the circulation of the Baptist Messenger.
2. That Baptist pastors seek to place the Baptist Messenger in every home in their churches. To accomplish this most desirable

end, we suggest that clubs be formed as planned by the editor, and that pastors, with a new emphasis, call the attention of their congregations to the importance of reading our own Baptist paper.

3. Since the times in which we are now living are so crucial, and since the demand for the right sort of reading matter is so acute, we urge all pastors and churches to put forth renewed effort to make possible a greater and wider ministry through the printed page.

79. Dr. E. C. Routh, editor of the Baptist Messenger, read his report and spoke to it. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Report of Baptist Messenger

We are able to report one of the best years in the history of the Baptist Messenger. During the past Convention year we had an average weekly circulation of 9880. We paid all operating and publication expenses and closed the year out of debt with a small cash balance.

Oklahoma Baptist churches are beginning to realize the absolute necessity for the Baptist Messenger as a publicity and propaganda agency. Please visualize two churches—one without the Baptist Messenger and the other with the Baptist Messenger in the homes of the membership. One church knows nothing about the denominational work either state or south-wide, except as the pastor, granted that he reads the denominational paper, has the opportunity occasionally, with all his other duties, to refer to something he read in the Baptist Messenger. That church cannot be expected to contribute much to world missions, Christian education, and benevolence for the reason that the people know little or nothing about these causes which Christ has committed to our care. Such a condition is largely responsible for the fact that Southern Baptists in 1935 averaged only \$1.05 per capita in gifts to missions and benevolences, and for the further deplorable fact that Southern Baptists were at the foot of the list of twenty-five evangelical denominations in per capita denominational benevolence. The other typical church which we ask you to visualize has the denominational paper going regularly to the homes in its membership. The members in that church are informed, and the pastor needs only to give the opportunity for the people to respond heartily and liberally to the world program of Jesus. Practically every Baptist church in Oklahoma that had the Baptist Messenger going last year to any considerable proportion of its membership gave to the Co-operative Program and Debt-Liquidation. Not one of the 346 churches in Oklahoma that were reported in 1935 as giving nothing to missions, received the Baptist Messenger. Such a situation ought not to require any argument or persuasion to induce every aggressive pastor in the state to see that the Baptist Messenger is placed in as many homes of his church as possible. Baptists, with their principle of soul liberty, with their affirmation of the voluntary principle in religion, certainly of all people ought to see that members of Baptist churches are informed. Paul's message to young Timothy is the one for us: "God would have all men to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth." Our first step in enlisting the Baptists of any church in Oklahoma in giving to the interests represented by this Convention, should be to put the Baptist Messenger in the homes of the people.

We mention another reason for increasing the circulation of the Baptist Messenger, namely, for the propagation of Scriptural

teachings concerning faith and practice. During the recent heated political campaign much use was made of publicity. We never heard of the national committee of the Democratic party sending Republican literature, or nondescript, non-partisan literature to anybody; nor did we hear of the Republican national committee placing in the hands of the people nondescript, nonpartisan literature, even though such literature was free. The Democrats sent out Democratic propaganda, Democratic literature, just as strong as it could be made. Just so with the Republicans. Every bit of literature for the distribution of which Baptist churches are responsible ought to be Baptist literature—every page of it. We ought not to be hesitant in the propagation of our faith. And there is no more effective means of propaganda than the printed page. In an age when all sorts of heresies and "isms" are besieging the souls of men and women and boys and girls we ought to meet such attacks with constructive Baptist literature setting forth Scriptural teachings. In our literature, in our schools, and in every phase of our work, we ought to seek first of all to win the lost to Jesus Christ, and to lead every saved man to be a Baptist—an informed Baptist, a Baptist who is obedient to the commission of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The Baptist Messenger is not published for its own sake. It is the principal publicity and propaganda agency of Oklahoma Baptists. It ought to go to every Baptist home in Oklahoma. Oklahoma Baptists will never be one hundred per cent enlisted until the Baptist Messenger does go to every Baptist home. In a day when demoralizing forces are seeking to entice the youth of the land away from the homes, we need in such homes healthy literature which will keep before them the highest ideals of life, put iron into their spiritual constitutions and send them out as flaming evangels of righteousness.

The very low cost of the Baptist Messenger places it within reach of practically every home, in church club or church budget lists. The cost is only two cents a copy per week, less than a postage stamp a week. Many churches have placed it in the church budget as a necessary item of expense. The increased receipts from an informed people is more than the cost of the Baptist Messenger. Payments may be made monthly, making the cost of missionary publicity proportionately a small item. We face a new day, a glorious day, with Oklahoma Baptists. Let us make the most of it. Let every church place the denominational paper in its membership, at least in the hands of those who have positions of leadership. The returns will far more than justify the small expense. As faithful stewards of God we are under obligation not only to evangelize but to enlist every regenerated man and woman in the world task which Jesus Christ has committed to our hands. We must work while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work.

82. A. L. Aulick, chairman of Committee on Auxiliaries, read the Report on Auxiliaries. Report as follows:

Report of Committee on Auxiliaries

This report includes the work of the S. S., B. T. U., B. S. U., Falls Creek Assembly, W. M. U., and Brotherhoods.

Sunday School

The gain in Oklahoma Baptist Sunday school work over a period of 12 years is gratifying. According to Dr. E. P. Alldredge, the Baptists of Oklahoma conducted, in 1924, 738 Sunday schools with a total enrollment of 90,325. In 1935 the number of schools had increased to 927 and the enrollment had reached 150,007; a gain of 189 schools and 59,682 added to the enrollment. The Sunday school work during 1936 has made marked advance by organizing 35 new schools and increasing the enrollment by 10,839. The Baptists have, in Baptist Sunday schools, one-fourth the number enrolled in the white Sunday schools of Oklahoma. The educational work has kept pace with the enlistment. During this year 389 awards have been granted and 287 diplomas issued. In comparison with the other states of the South, Oklahoma holds fifth place in red seals; third place in blue seals; and second place in gold seals. These facts, however encouraging, furnish no ground for boasting. While the Baptist churches of this state have one-fourth the number enrolled in all white Sunday schools, yet 76.7 per cent of the white population is not enrolled in Sunday school. Here is a challenge that really challenges. Instead of parading our progress, we should pray for power to evangelize the unevangelized.

B. T. U. and Falls Creek

The work of the B. T. U., likewise, is gratifying. Facts are impressed by contrast. In 1924 there were 722 unions, with a membership of 20,224, and 3,042 awards were issued. The report for 1936 shows that there are now 2,251 unions, with a membership of 46,426, and 9,737 awards have been issued. The number of unions and the number of awards issued have increased three-fold and the membership doubled in thirteen years. The Falls Creek Assembly has come to be, in numbers and spirit, the outstanding assembly of all the South. Great growth in physical equipment has been made. In 1921 there was a debt of \$6,199.49 against the assembly. In 1925 Mr. T. H. Farmer took over the management and during that year reduced the debt by \$1,000.00. All debts have been paid and the number of buildings increased from 36 to 100. Here is a record of achievements worthy of honor.

B. S. U.

The Baptist Student Union has come to be a great force and unifying factor among Baptist students. In all the colleges and universities of Oklahoma, the B. S. U. is now functioning. The recent convention in Stillwater was, in every way, a great convention. Over 300 students from the schools of this state were present and the spirit of Christian unity and denominational loyalty was beautiful to behold. In the recent past, interdenominational movements controlled the religious program in all schools. This has been changed and the B. S. U. is leading our students into a deeper spiritual life. Daily prayer meetings are now held by the B. S. U. on practically all the campuses of the state. This work is still in its infancy, but the achievements of its youth have commended it to all who are familiar with its work.

The S. S., B. T. U., B. S. U., and Falls Creek are all under one direction, that of Mr. T. H. Farmer.

Laymen's Work

The work of the laymen was long neglected and is at present unappreciated by the vast majority of our men. However, the situation is improving and real progress is being made in the organization and the development of the men. New Brotherhoods have been organized during the past year; a great Laymen Convention was held, and the work is growing.

W. M. U.

The work of the W. M. U. under the leadership of Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, reveals wholesome progress. A full report of its achievements will be found elsewhere in the minutes of this Convention; hence we include a mere summary of the financial and educational work for the past years.

Resolution

WHEREAS, the Radio Station KFXR owned and controlled by the Exchange Avenue Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, of which Rev. E. W. Westmoreland is pastor, has been exceptionally considerate in giving the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma time and publicity, the same being without charge and compensation; and

WHEREAS, this service was unsolicited but was proffered by the management of the station which has resulted in untold good to our denomination; and

WHEREAS, the publicity far surpassed that of any other agency and this station is of great value to the religious interests of all denominations of this state;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Baptist General Convention, representing a Baptist membership and constituency of 200,000:

First. That we express our very grateful appreciation to the management and personnel of this station for this invaluable service during the Convention.

Second. We wish to express our thankfulness to God for this great station owned by and operated by a noble church.

92. Dr. John W. Raley made report on Oklahoma Baptist University and spoke to same. He presented the O. B. U. Men's Quartette who sang "I Walk with the King" and "The Old Rugged Cross." The report was adopted as follows.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

I beg to submit the following report regarding the present status of Oklahoma Baptist University:

Oklahoma Baptist University is composed of a College of Liberal Arts, organized on the divisional plan which offers a program leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science; a School of Education offering a four-year professional course of study leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education; a College of Fine Arts offering both technical and cultural courses leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Fine Arts and Bachelor of Music Education.

Our Objective

Our objective is the development of a standardized university according to the requirements of the North Central Association for Colleges and Universities in the academic, cultural and technical courses of study and college units as follows:

I

A college of Liberal Arts providing ample opportunity for breadth of education and a genuine appreciation of the cultural values;

II

A College of Fine Arts properly organized within and properly related without to serve at least three groups—

A. The fine arts students. To this group it has a two-fold stewardship:

1. To provide technical and professional training. Mr. Warren M. Angell, the new dean of the College of Fine Arts, has organized a Bachelor of Music Education degree which provides for a double major in instruments and voice with sufficient content matter to give the student an adequate appreciation of the entire field of music and, at the same time, sufficient private lessons to develop him as a professional.

2. To give aesthetic appreciation of the Fine Arts.

B. The student in other divisions. The College of Fine Arts provides stimulation of interest in and an appreciation of these arts in the students of other divisions.

C. The general public. The College of Fine Arts seeks to develop a sense of appreciation of the Oklahoma Baptist College of Fine Arts as a cultural center in the thinking of our community and in the thinking of our constituency over the state.

III

A School of Education providing highly technical and professional courses for its students, which will qualify them for success in one of the most competitive fields of service in modern social life.

IV

AND A NEVER-ENDING PRESENTATION OF CHRISTIAN CULTURE REFLECTED BOTH IN OUR TEACHING AND IN OUR CONDUCT TO THE END THAT EVERY OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY STUDENT MAY EMBODY IN HIS EQUIPMENT CHRISTIAN CONCEPTS OF LIFE. Such education personalized will be revealed in the following:

1. Laymen who will be inspired to live a Christian life in the role of an intelligent and worthy citizen.

2. Teachers who will be both professionally qualified and morally and religiously sound.

3. Religious leaders who are capable of adapting themselves to the ever-changing social order.

Our Organization

1. In order to correlate better our efforts and to redistribute administrative duties, it seemed wise to ask Dr. J. W. Jent to accept such duties as are attendant on the office of the Vice President in addition to those incumbent on the Director of the Personnel Department.

2. Professor Lewis E. Solomon, Registrar of the University, was asked to accept the position as Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, to succeed Dr. Jent. The Board of Trustees formally ratified this recommendation in the meeting on October 12, 1936.

3. This reorganization made possible the proper installation of the Personnel Department along the lines set forth by the North Central Association. For your information, the following statement is made regarding the program of the Personnel Department:

One of the most important developments in the expanding life of the University this year is the organization of our new Personnel Department. The program is grounded in educational, vocational and moral guidance. It includes Freshman orientation, an efficient advisory system, and a well-organized health department. Dr. Jent is the Director of this new department and twelve members of the faculty co-operate with him as Freshmen advisers. A time budget schedule of study and student activities, reinforced by weekly conferences, provides an invaluable safeguard against homesickness, the tendency to "get behind" in class work, and consequently, to become discouraged and quit school. This new department has already demonstrated the wisdom of its organization. Our Freshmen have made their adjustments easier this year than in any previous year of our history. We not only have better Freshman morale, but far better co-operation. We no longer have a discipline committee because the Personnel Committee makes it unnecessary. The Director of the Personnel Department not only has had thorough training in mental hygiene and the technique of guidance, but years of experience. He and his helpers take care of the situation. This new department marks an epoch in the educational expansion of the University.

It is, perhaps, true that Oklahoma Baptist University now has the best organization for teaching and training its students that it has been able to present to the Baptists of Oklahoma. We have unquestioned loyalty to the denomination, and to the principles for which Baptists stand, among our teachers, and their rank in the academic world will match that of any other institution of similar strength.

We are happy to report a substantial reduction in our indebtedness. In addition to the reduction in the amount of \$23,335.50, there has been an increase in the assets of the University in the amount of \$31,742.24—thus reflecting an improvement of \$55,077.74.

A survey of the financial history of Oklahoma Baptist University for the period 1927-36 inclusive is encouraging in its reflection of the present operating budget program. For the sake of comparison, attention will be called to the operation of the University in 1927 and in 1936. During the fiscal year of 1927 the University showed assets amounting to \$348,925.84 with an indebtedness of \$60,199.43, a grand total income of \$219,437.29 and an operating deficit of \$37,936.84; while in 1936 the assets had increased to \$660,716.91 and the indebtedness was \$116,957.55. The grand total income for 1936 was \$200,114.61, while the deficit was \$23,907.69, or \$14,029.15 less than in 1927.

Interpreting these figures—it means simply this—that in 1936 we operated a much larger plant, almost double the size of the one operated in 1927, with double the debt load at a decrease of \$14,029.15 in operating expenses.

Your attention is called to the recommendation made by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention regarding the future financing of Oklahoma Baptist University by which the Convention will underwrite the anticipated deficit year by year. This means that the Convention will know in advance how much will be expected for the University, in order that no deficit may accrue; that the University authorities will the more intelligently plan the program; and that all will understand that there is a maximum expenditure beyond which the University shall not go. We believe that this program will guarantee us sufficient financial security so that we can qualify for membership in the North Central Association for Colleges and Universities.

Our Endowment Program

The most serious problem affecting the future of Oklahoma Baptist University is the problem of "no endowment." We can arrange to take care of a considerably larger student body than we have at the present time, with but little cost, but we cannot afford to go on without guaranteeing our future with a substantial endowment. The suggestion is made, therefore, that the next objective for the University be an Endowment Program. The present Endowment Fund amounts to \$19,716.12. The slight increase over the amount reported last year is due to the maturity of a policy upon the death of Mr. Ray Evans, who was one of the first to make application for a ten-year endowment policy with the Liberty National Life Insurance Company, following the agreement between said Company and the Board of Trustees; and his policy was the first to mature.

The question of endowment is not debatable. In fact, if we are to build a permanent institution and enrich it with cultural tradition, we must provide permanent support upon which it can depend during days of depression. It is recommended, therefore, that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma through the office of the Executive Secretary take definite leadership in the promotion of the Endowment Fund Campaign for Oklahoma Baptist University.

In the promotion of the Campaign the following suggestions seem to be desirable:

That the Executive Secretary and President of the University co-operate in formulating plans and policies for a continuous program of soliciting large gifts and that they set up whatever organization is necessary to make the plan effective.

That a definite period be designated for a special drive for endowment. Two years ago the Liberty National Life Insurance Com-

pany and State Manager R. C. Howard entered into an agreement with the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University for the purpose of securing a million dollars in ten-year endowment policies for the Oklahoma Baptist University Endowment Fund. In order that the program might have universal appeal, the Liberty National Life Insurance Company granted the privilege of writing policies in units of \$250.00, \$500.00, and \$1,000.00—thus enabling the man of moderate means to have a share in the permanent endowment of his institution.

If the University can secure one million dollars in endowment policies, there will likely be maturities amounting to \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year. This will represent an endowment investment on the part of the constituency at large and will encourage men of large means to give more liberally. It should not be difficult to underwrite one million dollars in endowment policies if we have state-wide support. We urge, therefore, the adoption of such a program.

Our Enrollment

At present we have 558 students enrolled as compared with 507 last year. Thus we see an increase of 51 over the enrollment of the same period last year, and we believe that the enrollment the second semester will maintain this substantial increase. It is worthy of our attention that we have had fewer students to withdraw this semester than we have had in the same period in preceding years. This means, in effect, that we have a more substantial student body. Of the total student body there are 56 enrolled in the School of Fine Arts as compared with 50 last year. In the light of the change of the personnel of the Dean, we consider this to be encouraging.

Our Promotion Program

I. Field Work.

We are continuing the policy of contacting prospective students by a regular field worker. Miss Amy Wade is now on the field and will continue this type of work in an endeavor to reach every community in the state between now and the fall semester of 1937. In addition to the personal work being done, letters are being mailed to prospective students in an effort to interest them further in attending Oklahoma Baptist University.

The administration appreciates the splendid help given by pastors, former students, superintendents and principals of schools in suggesting the names of prospective students upon our request. We hope to enlist others in this Student Admissions Program until we have a group of Oklahoma Baptist University boosters in every community of the state.

II. High School Honor Scholarships.

We are continuing the awarding of high school and junior college honor scholarships to graduates over the state. There are at present 129 scholarship students enrolled in Oklahoma Baptist University. We look forward each year to granting these scholarships, because the individuals thus reached are of excellent quality and make fine students.

III. Indirect Advertising.

A. Special Lecture Programs by the faculty. Last year we introduced "Programs for Every Occasion," which we are continuing this year. Notices were sent to churches, schools, clubs, and other organizations with the suggestion that these programs would be available upon request. We have had a gratifying response and believe this type of promotion to be very effective in presenting Oklahoma Baptist University to the public, as a cultural institution.

B. Student Activities such as:

1. Music programs and concerts by the various vocal and instrumental groups.

2. Debate meets with colleges and universities of Oklahoma and elsewhere.

3. Athletic contests and meets.

These activities are exceedingly valuable in properly presenting Oklahoma Baptist University to the public.

C. Weekly Radio Broadcasts over Station KGFF, Shawnee, on which students and faculty appear from time to time.

D. In addition to the publicity given through the Baptist Messenger, a definite contact is being made with most of the newspapers in Oklahoma whereby they accept news bulletins sent them from our News Bureau. We attempt to get every student's name in his local newspaper at least three times each semester.

Our Improvement Program

We are happy to call your attention to the improvements which have been made on the campus since our last report:

1. The paving around the oval has been completed of concrete instead of the originally planned black-top compound.

2. The rock wall which was begun as a memorial to the Class of 1935 has been extended on around the campus and will be continued until the campus is completely enclosed.

3. The Class of 1934 voted to use funds on hand for the installation of a white way around the oval.

4. The Class of 1936 chose as their memorial a sunken garden.

5. By using wasted space on the third floor the Men's Residence Hall has been remodeled to accommodate 16 more boys.

6. In order to comply with a large number of requests for light housekeeping apartments, Co-operative Homes have been arranged to take care of those desiring such accommodations.

7. The Class of 1937 voted as their memorial the completion of the auditorium.

8. Plans are being made to beautify the entire west side of the campus. The first step in this program was the removal of the athletic stadium, fence, and lights from the Hurt Athletic Field, this being made possible by an arrangement with the Shawnee Board of Education for a ten-year contract on the newly constructed athletic unit. A landscape architect is now preparing the plans for the beautification of Hurt Athletic Field. A golf course has already been laid out and is now being constructed on the 35 acres west of the athletic field.

All of these improvements contribute to the appearance of the campus and increase its value considerably. They constitute the first step in our general program of creating a beautiful park. Such surroundings will contribute very definitely to the welfare of the student body and greatly enhance our teaching and training program in the cultural things of life.

Our Needs

Great though the improvements have been—our needs are greater. I would suggest that our needs may be listed as follows: better library facilities, more class room space, a dormitory for men, and a Student Union Building. As the student body increases, its needs will become more and more apparent. We feel confident that Oklahoma Baptists will rise to the occasion and make ample provision for their youth.

Our Religious Program

The main purpose of Oklahoma Baptist University is to give Christianity its proper place in education. The founders and present supporters of Oklahoma Baptist University believe that the intellectual and spiritual elements of man cannot be divorced without serious injury to both. The faculty consists of men and women who have devoted their lives to the task of building character. The spirit-

ual atmosphere on the campus is wholesome and readily recognized by all who visit the University. All the religious organizations for the young people fostered by Baptists are really functioning on the campus. Seventy-five per cent of the students enrolled in the University are enlisted in some church activity. Three noon-day prayer meetings are held daily with an average attendance of 120.

It is the child of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and all of those associated in any way with any church in co-operation with the Convention are partners in the building of Oklahoma Baptist University. The University represents and reflects the investment of our lives. Whatever talents, monies, energies, and ambitions we may present for its use will be reflected in the life of the student body, our boys and our girls. As a partner in this task let me assure you that I will always have an open ear for suggestions and a measure of good will for every partner of mine in the growth and glory of Oklahoma Baptist University. That we may be of one mind and of one purpose is my sincere wish and most earnest prayer.

93. W. R. White presented a resolution by the Debt-Liquidation Committee, announcing \$38,788.30 raised in cash and pledges last night, and that the Memorial Dormitory of O. B. U. was paid entirely out of debt. Report adopted and committee discontinued.

Resolutions by the Debt-Paying Committee

Resolved: First, that we set as our financial objective for the coming year, \$150,000.00.

Second, That this amount include both the Co-operative Program and the \$58,400.00 to the Debt-Liquidation Program now due.

Third, That the appropriation for the Co-operative Program be increased from \$85,000.00, the basis of last year, to \$90,000.00.

Fourth, That other details in the working out of this program be left to the Board of Directors, urging them, and all other agencies of our Convention, to keep in mind the closest economy in order to prevent the incurring of further debts, and that savings may be made with which to assist in reducing debts.

Fifth, That the source of income for this objective be:

1. The Co-operative Program.

2. The payment of pledges to the Debt-Liquidation Movement. We have in mind the pledges made last evening. Pledges that may be assumed in the future.

3. The June Christian Education Offering.

4. Any other funds that may be given by individuals or groups to that objective.

5. That it be the sense of this Convention that this matter be handled as a Unified Program by our Executive Secretary, and the Board of Directors as the set-up of the Baptist General Convention, and that our Secretary lead us toward the idea of making the Co-operative Program the method of raising funds for denominational objectives.

6. That we complete the securing of pledges from the churches on the Debt-Liquidation Movement at the earliest possible moment, even within the next few weeks as far as possible.

7. That we urge the pastors and churches to throw themselves into this great combined unified program with sacrificial urgency, emphasizing the Co-operative Program through the budget, as our ultimate solution.

Observations

1. With the Program before us, the emphasis will be upon the budget as the primary method of meeting our needs.

2. Many churches and individuals added their new pledges to their Debt-Liquidation Movement as part of their budgets for the coming year.

3. Many churches no doubt will depend on the period of the June Christian Education week offering, or some other methods to care for this item.

4. Some of our churches will care for their part of the Debt-Liquidation sections of our budget, by adding a per cent to the Co-operative Program to which they are now contributing.

5. Our Executive Secretary is very desirous of getting away from heavy drives for special funds, in order that we may concentrate upon the Co-operative Program, enlarging it to enable us to have a larger share in the whole program of Christ around the world.

6. By adding the Debt Liquidation amount to the increased amount for the Co-operative Program, we have set before us a somewhat worthy objective. We are hoping that it will be a step toward a Co-operative Program of these proportions in the near future, all of which is to become distributable on a percentage basis.

The pledges and cash last evening amounted to \$38,788.30. The women will go after an objective of \$5,000.00. With amounts coming in daily, this places us above \$44,000.00. All of the churches that have not had a part in the subscriptions, made at this Convention, and those particularly, who have not been able to make their assumed objective, will be solicited, to assume some share to be cared for according to their own plans. This should be done immediately.

Baptist Children's Home Report

The year 1936 has been a very good one in the affairs of our Home. We are grateful to God for the general good health of the children and workers, and for the entire freedom from any kind of epidemic.

As safeguards to the children's health this year, they have been through the tubercular clinic twice; the dental clinic once, as well as complete examination for typhoid and diphtheria. We wish to express our deep appreciation to Doctors Erwin and Lawson; to the County Dental Clinic and the National Tuberculosis Society for their valuable services rendered toward the good health of our children.

We are glad to be able to report a fine spirit existing in the Home and very much improved physical conditions of the property. The response to the call for funds to cover the rehabilitation of the property was very fine and, with the funds received, many much needed improvements have been made.

The physical equipment is in possibly the best condition it has been for a number of years, but we must not overlook the fact that the buildings for the most part are old and will be in need of constant repair to keep them in proper shape. We, therefore, cannot allow ourselves to remain satisfied with the special offering that has been made towards the Home, but must realize that it will be economy in the end for us to designate sufficient funds each year to the maintenance of our property, thereby preventing a recurrence of conditions that existed a few months ago.

The personnel of the supervisory force at this time is excellent. The workers reflect an atmosphere of good will towards the entire situation. They are interested in their work and co-operate in every way with the management.

Dr. Potter has set up an excellent organization which is functioning to care for the needs of the children. The children are on a well balanced diet, and are all in school with sufficient books to meet requirements; the management has instituted a study hour period for five nights of the week, at which time any backward

pupils are given help so that they will be enabled to make their grades in school.

The play life of the Home is also being given attention, and possibly one of the finest things that have been done during the year has been an arrangement recommended by the special Home Committee and worked out by Dr. Potter whereby the children are now attending regular church services twice each Sunday at four of the larger churches of Oklahoma City. Transportation is furnished to and from the Home by the churches interested and this affords an opportunity for the children to make contacts with children from private homes and enter into the regular church life of the community. All of those who are members of the church at the Home have been encouraged in placing their membership in the church where they attend. We feel this is a decided forward step in the religious life of the Home.

The receipts for operating purposes of the Home the past year have amounted to about \$20,000.00. This is inadequate to care for the actual needs of the Home and maintenance cost that by all means should be taken care of each year.

We recommend, therefore, an operating budget of \$30,000.00 for the coming year and a Thanksgiving-Christmas offering with a goal of \$10,000.00, to be taken over the state in the same manner as last year, receipts from which would apply on the \$30,000.00 budget.

We further recommend that the name of our Home be changed to "The Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home."

Social Service

Regeneration is the tap root of all social reform. Jesus said, "Ye must be born again." Social reform is needed. It should be encouraged. But we should never forget that all betterment of society follows the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This Gospel of God's grace has power to regenerate and transform the lives of individuals. Both history and experience show clearly that nothing else has that power. The deepest needs of mankind are sin and sorrow. Jesus Christ has the remedy for both. He forgives sin and brings comfort and consolation to sorrowing hearts. Let us make no mistake about it, man is "dead in trespasses and in sin." Satan saw to that in Eden. There is but one remedy—Jesus Christ and Him crucified. He died for our redemption. He arose for our security and justification. He opened the way for lost man back to God. God's called messengers have no alternative. They are to proclaim the Gospel of His Grace as the all sufficient remedy for man's ruined condition.

When Jesus said to His disciples, "Ye are the salt of the earth" He was giving a clear statement of what He wanted His regenerated men to be in this world. Salt arrests decay and preserves what is decaying. A casual glance of conditions today shows an appalling situation. Every phase of life—moral, social, economic and governmental—is sick. There is but one physician who has the remedy for the ills of mankind. Let us call Him. If we give Him a chance, He will save the day for us. Quoting from the annual report of Social Service Commission to Southern Baptist Convention in 1935: "Our first word then is to plead for a deepening of the spiritual life of our American people, and for their rededication of themselves to the service and glory of the infinite and blessed God, for a nation-wide revival" of Holy Ghost preaching.

There are problems aplenty facing and perplexing us today. They are problems that Christian people cannot ignore. The liquor problem; the gambling craze; wide-spread unemployment; the general let-down in moral standards and ideals; vicious and corrupt motion pictures; the non-observance and desecration of the Christian Sabbath; unusual experimentations and policies of government; mounting volume and cost of crime; international friction and wars of aggression and conquest; unheard of appropriations for armies and navies, are some of the problems which we face today. It is not ours to legislate nor to resolve. As Christian men and women redeemed by the blood of the Lamb, let us proclaim in the highways and hedges, in the temple and market place our unwavering faith in the presence, promises, and power of our gracious God and Savior.

Report of Committee on Systematic Benevolence

This report concerns three phases of our work, namely: Hospitals, Baptist Children's Home, and the Relief and Annuity Board, and inasmuch as we will have special committees reporting on all three of these organized benevolences, this committee will only deal with them from the spirit of co-operation. The word "benevolence" means to have a will to do well. Certainly, in these channels, our people may have an opportunity to do well. The Good Samaritan showed such a will when he found a man wounded and dying and ministered to his needs. God is calling upon His people today to express His will to the needs of humanity.

Hospitals

We have in Oklahoma two hospitals which are under the control of this Convention, and each of these hospitals has been making a marked progress during the past year, as you will see in separate reports. The hospitals are located in Muskogee, Oklahoma and Miami, Oklahoma. Then we have a hospital under the direction of a group of Baptist laymen at Enid, Oklahoma. We would commend these for the service they have rendered and ask our people to support them with their prayers, money and gifts that these institutions may function properly in the field that they serve.

Baptist Children's Home

We are proud of the marked progress of the Children's Home under the direction of Dr. Potter's office in Oklahoma City. This convention has an opportunity to provide a home for children that have no home—not only is it a home for them to live in, but it is a place for character training, education and spiritual guidance. Jesus never demonstrated a greater love than when He gathered the little children around Him and said "Suffer little children to come unto me." Certainly Baptists in Oklahoma can do no greater work than provide a greater home for orphan children.

Old Ministers' Relief

Nearly twenty years ago Southern Baptists awoke to their duty of devising a plan whereby every faithful pastor might be cared for in his dependence or old age. To carry out this plan, the Baptist Relief and Annuity Board was organized and located in Dallas, Texas. Beginning with a small amount of money given to it by the Baptist Sunday School Board, our Relief and Annuity Board has grown marvelously, and has been the means of bringing timely

assistance to hundreds of Baptist ministers and their families who otherwise would have suffered great hardships. It ought to give to the Baptists a great deal of joy to provide for old ministers, and we must do more in the future than we have in the past, so that no one will be left helpless in his old age. We commend the Relief and Annuity Board to preachers and churches.

CONSTITUTION OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Preamble

Desirous of cultivating and stimulating the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and children of the churches, we, the women of Missionary Societies of the Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, adopt the following Constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and shall be auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to cultivate a missionary spirit, especially among the women, young women, and children throughout the State, and to aid in the world-wide spread of the Gospel.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The constituency of this organization shall be the Missionary organizations of women, young women and children; each woman's and young woman's society shall be entitled to one messenger to the Annual Meeting, and one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof, not to exceed ten members from any church.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Young People's Leader, Field Worker, Chairman of Departments and Advisory Committee who shall be named by the Nominating Committee and elected by acclamation at the Annual Meeting, and a Vice-President from each District who has been elected in her respective District.

Section 2. Executive Board. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Union and the Presidents of the Associations. Eleven, including two officers, shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each District all to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting for the succeeding year, seven constituting a quorum.

ARTICLE V

Time of Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, time and place to be designated by the Executive Board at its first meeting.

ARTICLE VI**Financial Policy**

In accordance with the Preamble our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education, training and giving; the strength of the organization being used to help raise all apportionments for every phase of the work to which the church contributes. One-third of all the Co-operative Program Funds shall be credited to the State W. M. U.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention and all salaries paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer of the State Convention.

ARTICLE VII**Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers, present and voting at any Annual Meeting provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting of the Executive Board and recommended by the Board to the annual meeting for adoption.

BY-LAWS**ARTICLE I****Duties of Officers**

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the organization and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, shall be ex-officio member of all standing committees and with the concurrence of the Corresponding Secretary she may through the Corresponding Secretary call special meetings of the Board when in her judgment it seems needful, or at the request of the members of the Board. She shall be Vice-President of Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 2. Vice-Presidents. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents of the organization to assist the Corresponding Secretary in developing their districts, preside at their district meetings, and keep in touch with Associational officers by correspondence and other ways that will further the interest of Woman's Missionary Union. In the absence of the President one of the Vice-Presidents shall be asked to preside in her place.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions, and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual meetings of Woman's Missionary Union, to prepare minutes for publication and to act as Secretary of the Executive Board presenting a condensed report of the sessions to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer. As Corresponding Secretary, it shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith, to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local Societies of the State. She shall have the general supervision over all departments of the work, and shall have correspondence with Baptist papers, unless other provision shall be made for

it, and shall give general direction for the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity will permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds used all expense of the work, according to the directions of the Executive Board; keeping always an accurate account of receipts and disbursements.

As Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer she shall make reports to the Executive Board, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Baptist General Convention and Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. Executive Board. The Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care, and shall have power to recommend such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the Annual Meeting recommendations concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and production of the work which may seem expedient.

It shall hold its regular meetings during the months of December, April, September, and preceding the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. If the Corresponding Secretary shall deem it wise to defer or omit altogether a designated meeting, she shall be free to do so, provided notice has already been given to that effect.

Section 6. Chairmen of Departments: It shall be the duty of these Chairmen to assist the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular departments of the work by correspondence and shall make reports in writing to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Associational Presidents. They shall be elected at the regular Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of their respective Associations. They shall have general supervision of the work in the Association and in co-operation with the pastors they shall endeavor to promote the organization of women and children in all the churches by visiting and holding Associational Meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of work done. It shall also be their duty to arrange for and preside over the Annual Meetings of their Associations.

ARTICLE II

Parliamentary Rules

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law, not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2. Amendments. These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulation as those governing changes in the Constitution.

"Best of Every Test" was the theme of a splendid address by Miss Kathleen Mallory, Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Closing prayer by Dr. W. R. White of Oklahoma City.

TUESDAY MORNING

The session was opened at 9:00 o'clock with the president, Mrs. George McMillan, in the chair.

Singing: "Come, Thou Almighty King" and "Lead On, O King Eternal" led by Mrs. R. A. Willard of Oklahoma City.

The devotional was led by Mrs. A. F. Crittendon of Ponca City on the theme "The Triumphant Gospel" reading the Scripture of His Kingdom there shall be no end." Luke 1:33, closing with prayer.

The president introduced Mrs. W. E. Dicken, the first corresponding secretary of the Woman's Baptist Missionary Societies of Oklahoma and a former president; Mrs. F. J. Merrill who was the first vice president and the only one of that first group of officers till on the Executive Board; Mrs. H. R. Denton, a former president; Miss Sue O. Howell, for many years Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Kizzie Halstead, first Recording Secretary; and Mrs. J. A. Woodruff, also former Recording Secretary.

Under the topic "Laying the Foundations for Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union," Mrs. W. E. Dicken gave a short historical sketch of the early years of the Woman's Missionary work in Oklahoma beginning with the organization on November 8, 1906, when Indian Territory brought 31 Missionary and Aid societies and Oklahoma brought 54 to organize the Woman's Baptist Missionary Societies of Oklahoma. At that time there was only one young Woman's Society—the Dorcas Society of the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City.

Miss Sue O. Howell continued with some of the problems of the early days of transportation, etc. stating one great need was enlistment.

Mrs. H. R. Denton spoke of her work in the state—first as a missionary at Indian University (now Bacone College) then as vice president of the W. B. M. S., later as president and then as Mission Study Chairman.

"The Year's Record of the Executive Board" was presented by Mrs. C. A. Richards, Recording Secretary. Report adopted.

A vocal solo "How Beautiful Upon the Mountains" by Harker was sung by Mrs. Jacqueline Fitzpatrick of Oklahoma City.

Dr. E. C. Routh in "Presenting the Baptist Messenger" showed in a clever manner the need of missionary information that can be supplied through our state paper.

Participation of Oklahoma W. M. U. in World Missions was presented by Mrs. Berta K. Spooner in bringing her report as Corresponding Secretary. When Mrs. Spooner made the statement that arrangements on the Dormitory had been completed the body stood to sing "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow." It was voted to adopt this report.

Miss Katherine Harris moved that her report as Young People's Leader be adopted as it will appear in the minutes. Motion carried.

Miss Harris then presented the District and Associational Young People's Leaders with goals for the coming year.

The president asked Mrs. C. A. Richards, Vice President from Central District to take the chair.

The president delivered her annual message "Christ for the World."

A quartet from O. B. U. composed of Bonnie Mae Smallwood, Roberta Leazer, Bob Netherton and Neal Elwell sang "Must Jesus Bear the Cross Alone" also "The Wonderful Story."

Miss Kathleen Mallory, Corresponding Secretary of W. M. U. Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, gave an inspiring address on "Spirit-filled Plans of Woman's Missionary Union."

Prayer by Mrs. W. A. Everett of Tulsa.

Adjournment.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The session was called to order at 1:30 by the president.

Singing: "Near the Cross" and "The Kingdom Is Coming" with Mrs. H. A. Yandell leading and Mrs. R. A. Willard at the piano.

Prayer by Dr. T. L. Holcomb, Executive Secretary of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn. was a talk on the necessity of paying our debts by Mrs. W. R. White of Oklahoma City.

Singing: "Leave It There."

The Memorial Hour was conducted by Mrs. J. W. Bruner of Chickasha.

Solo: "No Night There" was sung by Miss Madeline Watson from O. C. W. at Chickasha, accompanied at the piano by Miss Curtis.

Singing: "America, the Beautiful."

In speaking on the subject "Come Over into Macedonia" Miss K. M. Hegwood of Guthrie pleaded for a better understanding between the negro and white races and stressed the need of a school of religion for negro Baptists in Oklahoma.

Mrs. David Alley, president of the Pawnee Indian W. M. U. spoke briefly of the work among the Indian women.

"Home Missions in the World Program" was a stirring appeal for work in the Homeland by Dr. J. B. Lawrence, Executive Secretary of the Home Mission Board at Atlanta, Ga.

MESSAGE OF W. M. U. PRESIDENT

CHRIST FOR THE WORLD

The great missionary hymn "Christ for the World We Sing," the hymn on which our Union is to place especial emphasis throughout 1937, is filled with missionary passion. Its phrases outline a definite march for Christian missions and as we sing its lines there comes to the mind a picture of the victorious progress of the Gospel from its beginning.

The Christ of whom we sing came a sacrifice from the heart of the Father God as He looked upon the appalling need of man—a sacrifice incomparable, a gift of love from the Creator to His creation, a Savior for the World!

And man, bound by limitations of mind and heart, unable to "comprehend the breadth and length and depth and height" of such love, has never made adequate response. Yet, the story of the Cross has been the compelling force, the miraculous power

which through 1900 years has sent men and women out every where to proclaim Christ to the World. May we together repeat the words of the hymn? Do we not see in them the march of Christ across the centuries?

The most enthralling story of all the ages is this Christian conquest of the world. Where is the heart that does not thrill afresh at a review of the deeds of heroism and sacrifice of the first disciples as they responded to the words "Go" . . . "As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you"?

No story of history or literature is so heart-stirring as the life story of the Apostle Paul, faithful, courageous servant of Jesus Christ. Going far hence, not to his own whom he loved with undying fervor, but to an alien race, heretofore persecuted and despised, his days became a sacrifice, his hope a prayer.

Recall with me the fervent zeal of Wycliffe, from whose failing hand the torch passed to Luther and to Huss who shared the reproach and bore the cross for the Lord Jesus.

In the onward march of the Gospel, a shining mark of progress was the work of Carey, of whom a great judge of India said that the greatest miracle of modern times was Carey's coming from a little island unknown even by name to his forefathers, bringing a message so full of spiritual life and strength that it permeated every phase of Hindu thought and will eventually bring India to Christ.

Following close upon the consecrated footsteps of Carey were those of Adoniram and Ann Judson, courageous messengers of the Christ, whom "having not seen they loved." Six years of labor and prayer they gave for one lone believer, but today that one is a multitude, through whose passionate zeal Burma will yet bow at the feet of Christ.

Every age has had its soldiers of the Cross, faithful unto death. To them you and I are debtors today, for in due time these "sent ones" came to plant on the virgin soil of a new continent the Banner of the Cross.

There is a page of American history replete with interest, and especially thrilling to Baptist hearts, which tells of "our fathers chained in prisons dark, but still in heart and conscience free," who, from behind the rusty bars of colonial prisons, unflinchingly preached the Gospel in its purity. Is this message still needed in our world of today?

The thinking mind seems to be turning back to the conviction that Christ for the world is a necessity. One example,—a leading scientist of today has said: "Science laid the foundations for a new and a stupendous advance in man's conception of God, for a sublimer view of the world and of man's place and destiny in it. Personally, I believe that religion is one of the world's supremest needs."

The verdict of a great poet is this: "Those who deliberate against missions have but one thing to do; see them on the spot and be convinced."

Truly, from a purely rational viewpoint, our present civilization suffers a deep need and demands Christ. In an age of crime and flaunting of law, when human life is cheap, with turbulence and unrest everywhere. Christ is the only solution for the world's ills. One of the marvels of all ages has been the adaptability of Christ to meet the demands of the time. Through His precepts can be solved every problem, national or individual.

Through the years men have sought to redeem the world with the sword. Nation has struggled against nation in bloody combat, all in vain to make the world safe for its particular ideals. Over

all these wrecks of time is the serene face of the lowly Galilean who came to bring a reign of peace and good will to the hearts of men, who would have "men beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks, that nation lift not up sword against nation, neither that they learn war any more."

A reason more important and of far greater significance that Christ must be given to the world, is that He alone satisfies the desires of the human heart. In unsatisfied longing the peoples of the earth have sought the Lord "if haply they might feel after Him and find Him."

Education, industrial betterment, physical welfare nor world peace will suffice; the message of evangelism must reach every heart.

Today is ours; the message is ours. Is the spirit of the forefathers alive today? Do we truly believe that Christ "made of one blood, all nations for to dwell on the earth, that He willed *one flock* when He said: "Other sheep I have that are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice; and there shall be one fold and one shepherd"?

The task is not finished. If we know the dimensions of the unsaved world, we shall realize that men still grope after God, seeking Him through idols of wood and stone, through man-made rituals and through false philosophies.

A writer has called the development of Christian missions the *hour hand on the world clock*, advancing steadily yet irresistibly, until God's predestined time is fulfilled.

Shall we go forward? If we make our contribution to the success of missions, if indeed, we would bring Christ to the world, there are some things necessary; these essentials are found enumerated in our hymn. May we think of them again: Joyous zeal, a spirit of accord, constant prayer and a certainty of the triumph of the Gospel.

We who hear today are products of such a program; our beloved state itself a marvel of God's grace and the zeal of pioneer soldiers of the Cross. The new year holds a mighty challenge—a challenge to clearer vision through study of our missions and the need of our missionaries who stand in our stead out there; many of them, Oklahoma's very own, whose behavior under trial, sorrow, yea, even persecution, has thrilled the hearts of thousands.

There should be a renewed faithfulness in the stewardship of time and talent, that all of our forces be enlisted and taste the sweetness of service.

That our young people be recruited and trained.

Perhaps the greatest need of our work in Oklahoma is for young people, qualified mentally and spiritually, who passionately long to tell to the nations the story of peace and light.

Dear women, if we would drink from the well-springs of life, let us catch step and march with youth toward the new day when Christ shall be enthroned in the earth.

There is also a challenge for consecration of possessions. We have only begun to realize the spiritual enrichment which accompanies our Seasons of Prayer and special offerings. Let us in our forthcoming week of Prayer for the Christmas offering, link our hearts through worthy gifts to the need of the world, crowning all with intercession. May our eyes be opened to see the host of lost at our doors; our ears be attuned to the appeal of missions and the way opened for larger gifts; then we can truly pray: "Thy Kingdom Come."

PARTICIPATION OF OKLAHOMA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION IN WORLD WIDE MISSIONS

Report of Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Berta K. Spooner

With the urgent, compelling motif of our Annual Watchword in our hearts, our work in the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma has in many ways been blessed of the Heavenly Father. Some have felt sent to organize new Societies of missionary purpose so we report 99 new organizations, of these eighteen are Woman's Missionary Societies and 81 for our young people. There yet remain in our state 299 co-operating churches with no missionary organizations.

The Sunbeam Fiftieth Anniversary was observed in many churches in various delightful ways and has given impetus to the zeal for missionary education of children of the Sunbeam Bands.

285 organizations report having reached the A-1 Standard, 78 W. M. S. and 207 of our auxiliaries. This is only about fifteen per cent of our organizations. It is strange that our missionary societies are content to fall below A-1 Standard requirements. One trouble, some point, is that of enlistment of the women and young people in our churches—when the very missionary purpose of our organization should send us to win those who need the missionary information which would be received through W. M. U. organizations.

Full Graded Unions

There are only 139 full-graded Unions reported this year. This means that there are at least five W. M. U. graded organizations in 139 churches, thirty Associations reporting one or more, Oklahoma County, Tulsa Rogers leading with twelve each, Chickasaw-Union 11, North Canadian 9, Northeast 8, Perry, Pawnee-Creek, Muskogee, Concord-Kiowa and Banner with 7 each—others having from one to five.

Five are A-1 Standard Unions which means that each organization attained the Standard. Last year, we reported six. We have lost three from that list: Bristow, Hugo and Saubla, First Church; but we are happy to report two new ones: Nicoma Park and Talihina—and retain Lawton, First, Idabel and Spiro.

Stewardship

We have reported 3,438 new tithers—those signing the covenant cards this year. The Stewardship Declamation Contest has been helpful in teaching tithing and we believe the adoption of the new plans for stewardship education of our young people will also be helpful as we put them into effective practice. The study of Stewardship books is included in our required course of W. M. J. Mission Study and emphasis should be given this study.

Debt Paying Campaign

Your co-operation, this year, in all of our work has been splendid—your spirit fine. It is true that our state has passed through perhaps the most devastating drouth in its history, but early in the year we entered the campaign to pay off our debt, W. T. U. assuming as our part \$50,000. Some felt that we couldn't do it, but many were willing to try, so, heroically, notwithstanding the severe drouth, many societies have more than paid their apportionments. If all had been willing to try, and with faith in God put their hand to the plow—not willing to turn back as many have done—this would have been a Victory Convention. A number of the societies, among them some of the larger ones, made their gifts through the churches with no credit given to the W. M. S. Therefore it is lost so far as helping Woman's Missionary Union to pay the \$50,000 that we assumed. The books show that we have aid on Debt Liquidation \$25,272.43.

Seasons of Prayer

Societies observing the three special seasons of prayer have, according to the reports received, decreased. 416 observed the season for Foreign Missions or Lottie Moon—a loss of 16, 408 for Home Mission or Annie W. Armstrong—a loss of 26, and 384 for State Missions—a loss of 42. A total of 84 societies have missed the blessings and inspiration that only these seasons of prayer can bring.

Personal Service

If we are sent anywhere or for any purpose, we are certainly sent to win the lost, so through our Personal Service we have been busy in witnessing for Christ as our Savior and in seeking to win others to Him.

Margaret Fund

Thinking of those who are sent to Foreign fields for Christ's sake, we rejoice that we have our Margaret Fund to help care for the sons and daughters of the missionaries. Oklahoma has special interest in "mothering" seven this year—two sons and five daughters—also sharing with Georgia in furnishing a scholarship for Alpha Marie Worthington, daughter of Brother A. Worthington, Home Missionary to the Indians in Pawhuska.

Training School

At our W. M. U. Training School, we are represented by two splendid young women, Miss Jane Moore of Wewoka, and Miss Elizabeth Price of Noble, Miss Price being the scholarship girl of Central District. We rejoice in the going of Miss Lucy Smith to Shanghai, China, to fill an important place in the service of the Foreign Mission Board. Lucy is a graduate of our W. M. U. Training School, a former scholarship daughter of Central District.

White Cross

White Cross work is an important part of W. M. U. activities, and it has a strong appeal to the hearts of women because it is

so truly a Christ-like ministry. The work is both local and foreign. Our Foreign Hospital is in Ogbomoshu, Nigeria, Africa, and all cash goes to this hospital; supplies to Muskogee and Miami Baptist Hospitals. This year, every white Association and one Indian, Cherokee Indian, contributed to this work. Twelve of the Associations exceeded their quotas, 332 societies were enlisted. We need to increase our cash gifts as equipment is greatly needed. As we follow in His foot-steps we too must care for those who are sick. In ministering to the body, we find entrance into the heart.

Mission Study

Mission Study is the foundation of all the plans of Woman's Missionary Union work so plan for it as such. If we are sent to win the lost, we are, through Mission Study, to know the conditions. It is our opportunity to know and we can do no more than we know what to do and how to do it. Never have books been more delightful nor the variety so interesting for all ages and groups as now. You must have the year-round mission study program if you would be well developed, well-nourished, strong and healthy in your knowledge of missions. You will find in the report of Mission Study a decrease in number of classes taught both in W. M. S. and the auxiliaries. We cannot go forward by going backward, and truly mission study deserves our best thought.

Young People's Work

Under the direction of our newly-elected Young People's Leader, Miss Katherine Harris, the work for young people is again making progress. Much constructive work has been done in the past year and with this foundation laid, the building of more and better organizations will continue through the coming year.

The camps held at O. B. U. for our Y. W. A.'s and Intermediate G. A.'s were gratifyingly successful. The first R. A. Conclave, also held at O. B. U., made a fine beginning. Another year, no doubt, there will be an appreciable increase in attendance.

Our Missionary Societies are feeling increasingly the necessity for fostering young people's organizations. Surely as we realize we are Christ's sent ones, we will see that we are sent to give missionary education and training of our young people. We must foster intelligently and adequately, and one immediate, tangible way is through more subscriptions to our Missionary Magazines. These should be in our homes for our young people to read, as well as provided in sufficient numbers for the preparation of the program for the organizations. We have not quite reached our quota of subscriptions to the magazines and truly this is the minimum. We should do far better than this in providing good literature for our young people and for ourselves.

Districts and Associations

In the work of Woman's Missionary Union, the labors of our volunteer leaders are of inestimable value and we rejoice in the service of our District Presidents, Associational leaders, and various departmental and committee chairmen. In very truth, each has developed her corner of the field as one sent—commissioned to that particular task.

This year, we have maintained the ten well-organized Districts. The meetings last April reached 2,996 individuals, but only 346 Societies, Southwest District having the largest attendance. These meetings are primarily for inspiration and we covet a group from each Society or Church. Happy indeed were we to have as guest

speakers for these meetings Mrs. Carter Wright, of Alabama, whom we all have learned to love and appreciate, and Mrs. J. Franklin Ray of Japan. Their messages thrilled our hearts and left us with an urge to go forward.

At the September Board meeting, it was decided to divide the state into fourteen Districts, believing that the smaller territory and shorter number of miles to travel would make it possible for us to reach a group in every Baptist Church and thus enlist them in our missionary program. The four new Districts have been organized and are ready for work.

We have thirty-two well-organized Associations. These bind together the forces which make for promotion and enlistment in W. M. U. work in that Association, and give to a group from each church the privilege of a program of missionary education and co-operative service. Twenty-nine of these have had their quarterly Rallies regularly, and eleven—Caddo, Central, Enon, Comanche-Cotton, Frisco, Mills, Oklahoma County, Pawnee-Creek, Pottawatomie-Lincoln, Salt Fork and Tillman—have sent a report each quarter, eight sending only three—Banner, Harmon, Leflore, McIntosh, North Canadian, Northeast, Northwest, Panhandle and Pittsburg, others sending in only one and two. We are happy to record, however, that every Association made a contribution to the Margaret Fund and to White Cross. With only twenty-two participating in Scholarship and Nursery Fund, Muskogee and Chickasaw-Union leading in gifts to scholarships.

Assembly

At the summer Assembly at Falls Creek, a full system of classes was conducted for all grades with the following faculty: Mr. and Mrs. John L. Bice, missionaries from Brazil; Miss Emma Leachman, W. M. U. Field Worker for Home Mission Board of Atlanta; Miss Juliette Mather, Young People's Secretary, Birmingham, Alabama; Miss Katherine Harris, State Young People's Leader; Mrs. Walter Lane of Alva, assisted by Miss Clara Brashears, B. S. U. Secretary at O. C. W., and Miss Bertha Thompson of Sayre. How grateful we are for their splendid service and the fine spirit. We enrolled more than six hundred in classes.

The Children's Home

It has been the joy of Woman's Missionary Union to continue their help and co-operation in maintaining the Children's Home, keeping the children happy by providing many of the necessary comforts of life. The clothing, quilts, linens, eggs, chickens, cakes, canned fruit and vegetables, furnishings for the Home, books for their school work, etc., has amounted to \$16,010.07.

Field Work

Your Secretary has visited 54 societies, 21 associational meetings, ten special rallies in interest of Debt Liquidation, four weeks in schools of missions, and 9 other special meetings. I have rejoiced in the happy contacts made and the opportunity for service. In the general field work, Miss M. Katherine Harris has helped since her arrival February 1st, and truly her coming has greatly relieved your secretary. We rejoice to have her associated with us.

In my absence from the office, Mrs. Mildred Wells has given careful attention to the letters, requests for literature, and record keeping. The choice fellowship with our President, our State Leaders and all W. M. U. friends has been a blessing and I am grateful for all the courtesies shown me on the field. It is my prayer that all our working together may help fulfill His commission—His purpose in sending us.

Our W. M. U. cash gifts through 1936 have included: Lottie Moon Christmas Offering \$9,174.46; Home Mission or Annie W. PARTICIPATION OF OKLAHOMA W. M. U. IN WORLD MISSIONS

Report of Young People's Work

When Oklahoma Baptists come to full participation in the program of World Missions, it will be that time when there has been planted in the hearts and minds of every youth in our churches the impulse and desire to extend the Kingdom of God to the uttermost parts of the earth.

To that end, Woman's Missionary Union in its January Board meeting called into its service another worker who might give herself in field work and to some extent specialize in young people's leadership. For these nine months, that leader has been here and there, in the office and out, trying to catch up loose ends and organize her own thinking for more effective work in the state.

Journeying over the state, she has met some seventy-five or more appointments on the field. At least thirteen weeks of the time were spent in Assemblies, camps, house-parties, a Royal Ambassador conclave, and schools of missions, or weeks of mission study. The meetings of the Southern Baptist Convention and joint sessions with the Northern Baptist Convention took up two weeks of the time. It was the privilege of your leader during the Convention to attend a joint banquet of the World-Wide Guild and the Crusaders, young people's organizations of the Northern Baptist Convention, where our own Southern Baptist Young People's Secretary was a guest speaker. Another two weeks was spent in attendance upon our South-wide Y. W. A. Camp at Ridgecrest, N. C. Twelve Oklahoma Y. W. A.'s shared this delightful privilege along with your leader. During both the Southern Baptist Convention and the Ridgecrest Camp, your leader was privileged to share in conferences and fellowship with other state leaders in our Southland.

Ten days at the Falls Creek Assembly and a week at the Southwest Assembly gave to your leader the opportunity to meet and know Oklahoma young people as she taught them in mission study classes and had conferences with them about their work.

A real introduction to the state came about through attendance upon eight of the ten District meetings. The last two were missed because it seemed wise to meet the Y. W. A. girls

from our Ann Hasseltine College Y. W. A.'s in conference as they met in their B. S. U. Spring Retreat. Our College Y. W. A. is a unit organization of the B. S. U. on our college campuses so we co-operate with the B. S. U. leaders every way possible. Your state leader also participated in a Panel discussion during the State Convention of the B. S. U. in October. In addition to this co-operative effort with the B. S. U., your leader has also visited Y. W. A. organizations on the college campus at O. B. U., Shawnee, Oklahoma A & M, Stillwater, Oklahoma University, Norman, Oklahoma College for Women at Chickasha, Northwest State Teachers College, Alva, and the Eastern College at Wilburton. Some of these have been visited more than once, in the spring and again this fall. Your Young People's Leader wishes to express her appreciation to the B. S. U. Secretaries on these campuses, and to the officers of each Y. W. A. who have so beautifully planned for the year's work.

While on a visit to Muskogee, it was a joy to meet the Grace McBride Y. W. A. of our Muskogee Baptist Hospital with its consecrated counselor, Miss Lula Carruthers. We sincerely hope that our one Grace McBride Y. W. A. may be numbered among the A-1 societies in the South next year.

Seeking to teach and inspire our young people to participation in world missions, you sent to our state Y. W. A. and G. A. Houseparties this year 51 young women and 114 girls. Working with your young people's leader in these Houseparties were such outstanding missionaries and leaders as Miss Emma Leachman, of our Home Mission Board, Miss Essie Fuller and Miss Blanche Simpson of Brazil, Miss Ruth Wilkin of Tulsa, who led in recreational activities, Mrs. Spooner, Mrs. Mary Meador, Miss Earle and Mrs. Moffitt of O. B. U., Mrs. A. L. Aulick of Shawnee and others. We are particularly grateful to Miss Loutie Halley of O. B. U. who so generously served our young people in the dining room. We are grateful to the counselors who gave of themselves to bring the girls and share with them the experiences of the Houseparties.

Hoping to further enlist and encourage our boys in their Royal Ambassador chapters, we held our first State-wide Royal Ambassador Conclave this year at O. B. U. Only thirty-nine boys came, and seventeen of these from our Children's Home were there for one day only. But the spirit was splendid. The boys were very responsive to the leadership of Rev. John J. Evans of Thomas, Rev. Bill Smith of Spiro, Miss Leachman, Rev. Peter H. H. Lee of Shanghai, China, Dr. Chesterfield Turner of Shawnee First Church who represented Dr. Potter, Rev. M. E. Ramey of Edmond, Francis Jackson, Neal Elwell of Shawnee, and others. Particularly grateful are we to the Royal Ambassador Counselor of the First Baptist Church of Tulsa, who made a real sacrifice in order to attend the whole conclave. With more of his spirit, Royal Ambassadors would grow by leaps and bounds.

An interesting feature of the Houseparties and of the Conclave, was the Stewardship Declamation Contest. In the Y. W. A. Contest, Ruby Wheat of Northwest District, Georgia Elwell of Central District, Virginia Lobaugh of Northeast District, Carol Isbell of Southwest District and Betty Huff of East Central District were entered. Georgia Elwell won and was presented with a check for twenty-five dollars to be placed on her expense account to the Southwide Y. W. A. Camp at Ridgecrest. Mrs. Spooner made the presentation for W. M. U. In the Intermediate G. A. Contest, Sarah Marie Moseley of Central District, Charlotte Ann Agee of Northeast District, Oma Jeanne Hager

of Southwest District, and Wynona Salmon of East Central District were the entrants. The loving cup for the winner went to Charlotte Ann Agee. The loving cup for this contest was given by our President, Mrs. Geo. McMillan.

Though there was really no contest in the R. A. Conclave, John Miller of McAlester gave his declamation and was presented with the cup which had recently been given to the Union by Miss Earl Hester of Roumania. We had hoped to make this contest an annual feature of the Conclave, but will now fall in with the new stewardship teaching plans of the General Union when they are presented to us.

Believing that G. A.'s who use the Forward Steps are learning through study and projects true service in the Kingdom's program, we encourage such activity by featuring a beautiful Coronation service at the State Houseparty each year. The following girls were crowned Queens this past June: Inez Lewis of Guthrie; Leta Rogers, Blackwell; Charlotte Ann Agee of Miami; and Audeanne Cupps, Tulsa. Norma Erwin of Tulsa received her Scepter, and Vera Condonier of Mountain View was presented with a Queen Regent's Cape, having already been crowned Queen and passed the rank of Queen-with-a-Scepter.

Throughout the state, there were a number of Associational and District houseparties and camps reaching numbers of boys and girls who could not attend the state affairs. In a number of these, it was a joy for your young people's leader to teach and speak. Others furnished their own local talent or outside help.

Through the work of our associational and district young people's leaders and the other workers over the state, we are reporting this year 17 new Y. W. A.'s, 34 new G. A.'s, 16 new Royal Ambassador Chapters and 14 Sunbeam Bands, making a total of 81 new young people's organizations. But in spite of these new societies, our total number of organizations shows only 310 Y.W.A.'s, 426 G. A.'s, 214 R.A.'s and 306 Sunbeam Bands, one Grace McBride Y.W.A., and 7 Ann Hasseltine Y.W.A.'s which is a loss of 229 auxiliaries in this one year.

In Oklahoma's report to the W. M. U. of the South at its last Convention, we reported 46 A-1 Sunbeam Bands, 48 A-1 Royal Ambassadors, 59 A-1 Girls Auxiliaries, 44 A-1 Young Woman's Auxiliaries, and 1 A-1 Ann Hasseltine Y. W. A. We need to encourage our young people in reaching the A-1 Standard by providing them with their wall charts and stars for marking them.

Oklahoma young people have reported this year only 423 Mission study classes: 141 in Y.W.A., 83 in R.A., 146 in G.A., and 53 in Sunbeam Bands. Surely no organization should be allowed to go through a whole year without at least one study class and this total leaves 841 societies with no classes at all! Surely it behooves us to be more alert to lead our youth into participation in the program of World Missions in their definite study of the world, its peoples and their needs.

As you have encouraged and led them, our young people have joined with you in many and varied types of Personal Service and in observing the various seasons of prayer bringing in their gifts as they have studied and prayed.

Of the total number of tithers reported to your state headquarters 1,071 of them are young people. We feel, however, that this reported number is inadequate and urge that a more careful record of this be made and turned into W. M. U. headquarters.

As our young people begin to tithe and study their principles of stewardship they will naturally want to share their gifts. Think-

ing to encourage our young people through a definite goal, W.M.U. in its Day of Prayer for State Missions asked the young people to equip the infirmary at O.B.U. Up to convention time, the treasurer's books show \$135.21 given by Oklahoma young people's organizations for this purpose. We trust that other funds may yet come in that the infirmary may be equipped during this school session. Let us be sure that our young people have a share in the giving program of our churches as we encourage them through definite goals and objectives to pledge and to give to the Co-operative Program and to the special offerings taken by Woman's Missionary Union.

Up to November the first according to figures from the Birmingham office, Oklahoma has sent in only 747 of her 1010 goal in subscriptions to World Comrades, and 364 of her 540 goal in subscriptions to The Window of Y.W.A. Since we know that many organizations are subscribing to more than one magazine each, we wonder how programs are being provided for those societies which have no magazines at all. Surely you will encourage and aid your young people along in this respect.

We would not sing the song of woe, though it may seem so! We merely quote facts and figures as they appear in the reports sent to your state office. We are confident that much has been done that is not reported. We know of splendid activity of which we are justly proud. We rejoice in the knowledge that many consecrated and devoted counselors and leaders are happy in leading into World Missions hundreds of the youth of our land. To them, we offer our grateful thanks and appreciation.

Many thoughtful kindnesses and courtesies have been extended to your young people's leader along the way. To the many hostesses, and "chauffeurs" who have so graciously used their cars in our behalf, we say "Thank you, and God bless you." May we all more gloriously give ourselves to Him as "Laborers together" that the youth of Oklahoma may truly come to take their places in the World-wide program of the Kingdom of God.

Truly our Margaret Fund work has been multiplied and blessed of our Heavenly Father. The motto of our Margaret Fund Committee for the past year, "Guard that which is committed to thy trust," inspired and challenged us to our best year's work.

Through the cooperation of District, Associational and local Margaret Fund chairmen, six students, three sons and three daughters, assigned to our state W. M. U. to "mother," have been faithfully, tenderly, and lovingly remembered monthly, on birthdays and special days by some Association.

The happiness and joy that our love gifts produced in their young hearts have made sacred, lasting memories which will always bind these young people and their parents in tenderest ties to Woman's Missionary Union of our State and Southland.

The reports of District Margaret Fund Chairmen reveal great interest and greater joy in this service and that some Y.W.A.'s, A.'s and Sunbeams have contributed to love gift showers.

In the past year we joyfully gave \$621.67 in cash to the Margaret Fund and Forget-me-not Fund, boxes and love gifts amounting to \$390.41, a total of 1012.08; of this cash \$12.00 was for Margaret Memorials, \$400.00 was for Forget-me-not Fund and \$100.00 for the Elizabeth Lowndes Scholarship Fund.

Every Association has participated in the work, yet none are 100 per cent in support of the Cause. Oklahoma County leads in largest cash contributions from W.M.S. organizations for Margaret Fund. Tulsa-Rogers leads in more societies supporting the Fund, all except one having made contribution to the Fund, also second in amount contributed. Pottawatomie-Lincoln leads in largest Forget-me-not Offering.

In annual Southern Baptist Convention report, Oklahoma ranked second in reported love gifts, second in gifts to Elizabeth Lowndes Scholarship, and led all states in total gifts to Elizabeth Lowndes Scholarship, having contributed \$400, from the time the Fund was created.

Our greatest need today toward better organization is a Margaret Fund Chairman in every society. The local Margaret Fund chairman is the key woman; much depends on her vision, enthusiasm and love for her Master, and for this task assigned to her. Until the knowledge of this blessed cause reaches the individual woman through the local Society, the Margaret Fund will not be able to become the great beneficent work that its possibilities provide. A Margaret Fund Chairman in every Society would soon mean an enlarged Fund and an enlightened constituency. More women would give and labor in this task with joyful praise. A good slogan for 1936-37 — "Every local Society with a Margaret Fund Chairman and program."

The Margaret Fund is a real missionary agency, and by the blessings of God, we are privileged to help mold and polish vessels fit for His service. The presence and joyful service of many Margaret Fund students in foreign lands is a witness to the value and far-reaching influence of our Margaret Fund.

We praise our Heavenly Father that seven more students, children of former missionaries, were appointed by our Foreign Mission Board at its October meeting. The words of the Psalmist "That ye may tell it to the generation following," has proven true in the work of Woman's Missionary Union through her Margaret Fund invested in the training of students. We rejoice today over the second generation of missionaries.

Because of the leadership, cooperation, energy, faith and prayers of our Margaret Fund chairmen, also the mother love of Woman's Missionary Union, our work has enlarged, and as "Laborers together with God" let us continue with all our hearts bearing this message—

through our Margaret Fund.

ANNUAL REPORT OF MISSION STUDY CHAIRMAN

In Jesus' eagerness that His disciples might know the greatness of their task to which He had called them, He told them to look upon the fields which were white already unto harvest. The study of books on world missions is the only opportunity the majority of Christians have to look upon the fields of the world. Jesus would have Christians look beyond the country in which they live, beyond their own churches and catch a glimpse of the ends of the earth. To get this broad view is the duty of every follower of Christ.

A new-born infant, although normal in every respect, could not survive more than a short time if left to itself. It must be educated by degrees as to the purpose of life that it may adjust itself to its environment and use its powers for growth and development. There must be knowledge.

In the spiritual life the gift of grace does not do away with the need of knowledge. To a great extent missionary interest depends upon knowledge. First, knowledge of the Bible teaching on missions, which is fundamental to secure and lasting zeal. Second, the opportunity as taught in books on world missions. Human nature is limited by its knowledge. A man cannot desire the salvation of the African if he does not know that the African exists. If the spirit of Christ is in the heart, the minute knowledge of souls without Christ is received the heart bursts forth in love for them and in desire that they may know Him, whom to know is joy everlasting.

This is the purpose of missionary education; to give knowledge of the Bible and of the needs of men; to press upon the hearts of men Christ's mind for the world, that ultimately it may be brought to Him.

The Baptist women and young people of Oklahoma have acted nobly during 1935-36. A total of 21,804 awards have been granted as follows:

REPORT OF PERSONAL SERVICE CHAIRMAN

Christ for the World We Sing:

"Fear not, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

From that night when the Judean hills rang with the song of the heavenly host, proclaiming the Christ as Savior, glorifying

od and bringing peace to lost mankind, until this, the people of the world, to a greater or less degree, have been singing Christ for the world, telling how this One who came because of God's love for a lost world, was the fulfillment of prophecy and one who overcame sin, death and the grave.

The more we study the more we realize the far reaching of our singing and the victories won through His name.

he World to Christ We Bring:

He said, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me." The world to Christ we bring by the drawing power of Christ, lifted up in our lives by Personal Service. All of the things we do are but a means of approach or contact to win for salvation or enlist in His service.

The individual is not lost by directed Personal Service, but is aided so the society may reach a larger number of people in the various forms of service. It may not all be reported in numbers; it could not be.

Personal Service is presenting the Savior through prayer for leadership in the task, and to the particular individual with whom we are to work, either to win or to lead in service.

Through the "Open Doors" we can help the Negroes help themselves by training them in the missionary education of their race.

Personal Service is also showing the spirit of kindness to our Jewish neighbors. Much can be done to win them by a kindly interest and love for them. This applies also to our own Good Will center in its different fields of service.

May we cease to think of such petty things as garments, food, clothing and so forth as the AIM of Personal Service, but rather as the means to the end as is told us in James 2:15-17: "If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled: notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; that doth it profit? Even so faith if it hath not works is dead, being alone."

In our own Oklahoma where 76 out of every 100 are unattached, and many of the 24 unenlisted, what an opportunity for Personal Service—and from here "even unto the uttermost part of the earth."

The world to Christ we bring by having a vital relationship to Him as Savior, and as Lord of our lives, and a vital knowledge of His cleansing power, transforming power, restraining power, sustaining power, preserving power.

As we realize these things in our lives we will be factors in Personal Service that will magnify the uplifted Christ.

THE WORLD TO CHRIST WE BRING THROUGH TITHES AND OFFERINGS

Christ committed to His followers the task of bringing the world to Him. Everyone who is redeemed is obligated. "Ye are not your own." No man comes back from Calvary out of debt. Jesus in parables taught definitely that life as well as its oppor-

tunities and possessions is a sacred trust from God for which we are accountable.

Why are Christians so slow to recognize their stewardship? Why do millions wait? Why, after nearly two thousand years do we have only fifteen missionaries for the fifteen millions of people in Japan? Why this debt at home? Why so poor spiritually?

While the Kingdom is spiritual and deals with spiritual values, yet it is God's plan that it must be financed by the money of those belonging to it. God says: "Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me . . . In tithes and offerings." But you say "I don't believe in tithing—that was under the law." Abraham paid it before the law was given; Jacob pledged it; Malachi commanded it; Jesus commended it. The tithe was holy unto Jehovah and was never abrogated.

Paul gave us a plan "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him." "Not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Moses called for offerings for the Tabernacle: everyone whose heart stirred him up, whose spirit made him willing; as many as were willing hearted, brought an offering of gold—ear rings, pins, jewels of gold. Every sacrifice save one had been made—the mirrors of brass remained, very necessary to personal appearance. Yet he made the laver of brass and the base from the mirrors of the women who assembled to minister at the door of the tent of meeting.

During David's reign a deadly pestilence swept the land. To stay it he was commanded to go, erect an altar unto the Lord on the threshing floor of Araunah. Araunah said, My king, take the floor, but David said—I will not offer the Lord that which costs me nothing. If we are to stay the pestilence of sin in the world, we must give that which really costs. The world cannot be brought to Christ by giving that which we will not miss—it takes real sacrifice.

The "Prove Me" plan is an exercise of faith. We could give ourselves rich. God does not desire to keep us poor. No one can give so much to God that he does not get more in return. It never was loving that emptied the heart nor giving that emptied the purse. God does not need our gifts. He could have financed the kingdom without them. For so long a time all sacrifices were consumed on the altar. Give for the blessings that come to us. Giving will save from covetousness.

Three-fourths of one percent of the American dollar goes for religious purposes. The contents of our church envelope reveal not nearly so much poverty of pocketbooks as poverty of our souls. "That there may be meat in my house—"

The church has a hem to its garments

That reached the very dust.

It can cleanse the stains

Of the streets and lanes,

And because it can, it must.

The greatest need of the Church is for Christians who are willing to exercise faith in His promises to bring the world to His feet through tithes and offerings.

Rise up, O men of God,

Have done with lesser things;

Give heart and mind and soul and strength

To serve the King of Kings.

Rise up, O men of God,

To you the world doth call;

On you His Kingdom waits
 To crown Him, Lord of all.

WHITE CROSS REPORT

Mrs. Russell Reeves, Chairman

Every association in this state made a contribution to White cross work. Three hundred and thirty-two societies contributed to this cause. Twelve associations went over their goal in cash apportionments, as follows: Central, Chickasaw-Union, Concord-Iowa, Delaware-Osage, Enon, Frisco, Mullins, Northeast, Oklahoma county, Panhandle, Pawnee-Creek, and Perry. Northeast Association led in percentage of gifts of cash and supplies, with fifteen societies giving \$192.60. Delaware-Osage Association ranked second, with \$153.79 from thirteen societies. Central was third with \$80.69 from ten societies. Central Association has the distinction, however, of being a hundred per cent in societies giving.

REPORT OF W. M. U. TRAINING SCHOOL

"Christ for the world we sing, The world to Christ we bring" through our W. M. U. Training School.

Our Woman's Missionary Training School opened this, its 30th year, with the largest enrollment since 1929—seventy-two boarding students and twenty-two day students. It is also worth noting that the third floor west wing in House Beautiful is now open—the first time in six years. We rejoice and give thanks to our Heavenly Father that our young women in larger numbers are consecrating their lives to the task our Lord set for His followers and co-laborers—to bring the world to Him.

Oklahoma is happy to have again two students in the school this year: Miss Jane Moore and Miss Inez Price. Miss Price has the scholarship this year from Central District. May it be our prayer and determination that the number of students from our State will steadily increase.

Last year, you will recall, we stressed the "Forget-me-not Fund" for the Mrs. George B. Eager Fellowship Fund. At the time of the last report from the School this Fellowship Fund was near the \$2,000.00 mark; Oklahoma's gift to same through local societies was \$289.06. We thank those sending gifts and we thank Mrs. Bell, Margaret Fund Chairman for the privilege of working with her in putting on the "Forget-me-not" programs throughout the state.

As decided at the Convention last May in St. Louis, the Annual Board meeting of the Training School is to be held the first week in October each year in Louisville. The first annual meeting under this new plan was held last month in connection with Founders' Day. It was a most significant meeting; perhaps the most significant since the building of House Beautiful twenty years ago. At this meeting it was decided as already suggested by our Executive Board at the Convention in May:

First, that hereafter the administration of the affairs of the school would rest in a Board of Trustees, elected as usual, and an Advisory Board to be selected the same way and time as the Board of Trustees. The latter Board will be made up of the Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, the Secretary of the Home Mission Board, the Secretary of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, two members of the faculty of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and two laymen in or near Louisville. This plan does away with the usual local Board of Managers.

Second, a. The next forward step was that the Board voted that the Training School resume its former policy of having the majority of its classes at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. The reasons for this are too lengthy for this report but seemed sufficient for such a move. To this end our president, Mrs. Armstrong, was empowered to enter upon negotiations with the Seminary looking to the possibility of having the Training School students in the Seminary classes with the beginning of the Fall term in 1937.

b. Also, the distance between the House Beautiful and the Seminary out at "The Beeches" means that soon following the above change it will be necessary to provide Training School property nearer the Seminary. A committee has been appointed to investigate land values at "The Beeches" and arrange for purchase of same by the end of this year, as property values in that section are increasing. Much time and care will be needed in making these vital changes.

Through these thirty years since the founding of the School daughters of the Southern States and some from across the seas have received training and inspiration which has helped to advance His Kingdom in our own beloved country and to the farthest parts of the world. Close to two hundred Training School graduates in recent years have labored in Foreign Mission Fields. Truly this great host of highly trained Christian workers in the Mission Fields are as "Lights set upon a hill" to lead and bring the world to the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Pray for this large group, also for the larger number of graduates working in different fields in this country in all capacities in which Christian workers are needed. Pray, too, for our present student body as they prepare to take their places in helping spread the Gospel to all nations, and pray for a deeper consecration and greater wisdom for all connected with the Training School and that there will be one aim, one thought, for all: "The World to Christ to bring."

REPORT ON SOUTHWESTERN SEMINARY

Mrs. Berta K. Spooner

I had the pleasure of a recent visit to Southwestern Seminary and Training School and seeing the student body assembled in chapel. The enrollment of the entire school is 416 which is larger than it has been for ten years. The percentage of students with degrees is higher than ever before.

They have a splendid group of young women in training—8 from Oklahoma. All seemed happy in their work. Southwest District gave a scholarship but the young lady had to return home on account of ill health.

There are 95 students from Oklahoma, 42 of them from O. B. U.

Southwestern Seminary has made a great contribution to Oklahoma Baptist life. Many of our most aggressive pastors and pastors' wives received their theological training there. Never has there been a more thrilling example of faith and devotion in Southern Baptist history than the faith and devotion of the members of the faculty who stayed with the Seminary through years that tested men's souls. And truly some permanent provision should be made for the salaries of these loyal teachers. The eight near-by states—Arkansas, Missouri, Louisiana, Georgia, New Mexico, Mississippi, and Oklahoma assumed the responsibility of maintaining the nursery to make it possible for the wives of our ministers who are mothers to have a place for the care of the children in order that they may get their training along with their husbands.

I wish we might realize the importance of the nursery and be more prompt and more generous in making our contributions.

REPORT OF BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

The Baptist Bible Institute of New Orleans, La. is eighteen years old. Dr. Hamilton said "The ten happiest years of a young woman's life are the ten years that she is eighteen." This school was founded in 1917 by the Southern Baptist Convention. The first session began in 1918. Its charter states "This Institution shall center around the study of the Bible as the word of God and its purpose shall be to provide religious instruction suited to the needs of a constituency varied in its educational equipment; to require courses of religious activity as well as courses of intellectual development; to secure training through service; to equip all types of religious leaders for efficient service, whether as pastors, missionaries, evangelists, church and Sunday School workers, Gospel singer, women's and young people's leaders, financial secretaries, deacons and pastors' "helpers." The faculty is unanimous in its desire and purpose to do as the charter says.

Our theme for this meeting "Christ for the World" expresses what this school is doing in bringing to those who do not know our Savior his message of mercy and grace. Last year for every regular student of the Baptist Bible Institute there was won to Christ every thirty days a lost soul. There was an average of eight converts for the eight months for each student. If our State with its two hundred thousand Baptists should do the same thing we would come to our next convention with two million six hundred thousand and the world would soon be won to Christ.

This school is bringing the world to Christ through their Mission work. There is a great mission opportunity, not only in the city of New Orleans but throughout southern Louisiana. With more funds and the mission points now established they look forward to a great harvest. Christ for the world—through organizing and building churches. When the Baptist Bible Institute was located in New Orleans there were six little organizations, now there are twenty-four churches and many others established in the counties of Southern Louisiana. It all reads like a romance.

They are bringing Christ to the world in praying for and training workers. When the Foreign Mission Board appointed 26 missionaries six of these were from the Baptist Bible Institute. You could not expect otherwise when you realize mission work is constantly before the Institute. Four of the teachers have spent many years as missionaries in Brazil, China and Palestine. Dr. John Shepard was for years in Brazil and was the founder of the Rio College and Seminary. Dr. Park Anderson was a member of this church. His brother Will was pastor here when I came to Oklahoma. Dr. Anderson served as President of the Graves Theological Seminary in Canton, China. Dr. and Mrs. J. Wash Watts were for years missionaries in Palestine.

The total enrollment last year was 260; seven of those students were from Oklahoma. Through the Hundred Thousand Club \$60,000.00 was paid on indebtedness. They hope to be out of debt by 1939. There are three ways in which you are urged to help:

1. By keeping this school in your hearts and prayers, calling it by name and asking God to bless it.
2. By making your regular gifts to the Co-operative Program and to the Hundred Thousand Club.
3. By providing scholarships in full or part for worthy students who cannot meet their expenses.

Do this and you will be helping this school to do their part in bringing the world to Christ.

REPORT OF CENTRAL DISTRICT

There are many encouraging features of the work in Central District for the past year and yet we realize that we have hardly touched the hem of His garment in our giving and service.

Happy are we to have in House Beautiful this year Miss Inez Price of Noble who writes glowing letters of her work in W. M. U. Training School. Miss Price is the fifth girl that Central District has sent to Louisville for special W. M. U. training, our first scholarship girl having gone to Southwestern Seminary at Ft. Worth.

For the second year in succession the winner of the Y. W. A. Stewardship Contest in Central District was also the State winner; this was Miss Georgia Elwell of Shawnee, who represented Oklahoma at Ridgecrest.

It is gratifying to note that Pottawatomie-Lincoln Association led in Margaret Fund Forget-me-not offerings; Chickasaw-Union Association was one of the two associations leading in gifts in the state to scholarships; and Central Association was 100% in societies giving to White Cross.

Since the re-districting of the State, Central will be composed of Central Association, Chickasaw-Union Association and Oklahoma County Association.

Our Annual District meeting held at Shawnee in April had a greater attendance than any previous meeting. It was our privilege to have Mrs. J. Franklin Ray of Japan and Mrs. Carter Wright of Alabama who thrilled our hearts with their inspirational messages.

The report of this committee was brought by Mrs. F. J. Merrill, Chairman, recommending that Miss Katherine Harris of South Carolina be chosen as Field Worker for Oklahoma. It was voted unanimously to adopt this recommendation.

It was our privilege to have with us in this meeting Mrs. A. J. Terry, missionary to Brazil, who told interesting experiences of her work in that county.

Upon motion by Mrs. Hering it was voted that we ratify the action taken in the annual meeting when the month of April was selected for the observance of the Forget-Me-Not month.

It was voted to send a letter of sympathy to Mrs. Mary Rogers, Associational President of Atoka Association, who had recently lost a grandson.

Mrs. Spooner announced the quotas for the magazines and distributed them to the associations. Mrs. Spooner also read the Report blank prepared by the Young People's Leader of Northeast District, Mrs. Hood Shannon of Tulsa. Upon motion by Mrs. Bandy it was voted to revise these blanks for Young People's Leaders and send them out for the use of the Associational and District Young People's Leaders.

The second meeting of the Executive Board was held on September 4, 1936.

Regular reports were presented and adopted. The report of the Young People's Leader was brought by Miss Harris and adopted. Miss Harris presented the plan that the young people be asked to equip the infirmity room at Memorial Dormitory with their State Mission Offering. This room is dedicated to the memory of David Appleby, missionary to Brazil.

After bringing her financial report Mrs. Spooner brought the suggestion that the state be re-districted as follows:

In the instance where there is no elected District President it was suggested that some woman be asked to serve until the District Meetings in April. Upon this suggestion Mrs. J. M. Jones of Perry was asked to serve as President of the newly made North Central District. The dates of the District meetings in 1937 were set from April 12th through the 30th.

Upon motion by Mrs. Barron it was voted that this re-districting be made as suggested. It was decided that the change in district boundary lines would not affect the scholarship apportionments for this year. Inasmuch as the scholarships had been accorded by the present District setup it was believed best for the associations to go ahead with the scholarships as they had already planned.

Mrs. Spooner read a request from Mrs. McWilliams of Missouri asking for names of any Oklahoma women who have special talent along the lines of song writing, writing of plays and pageants, making posters, programs, exhibit suggestions, etc. These women will be asked to help on the work of the Golden Jubilee program of Woman's Missionary Union in the annual meeting in '38. It was asked that all names be sent in at once to the State Office so that the Secretary could send them to Mrs. McWilliams.

Mrs. Spooner reminded the members of the Board of the need of the Nursery fund for Southwestern Seminary.

It was asked that we remember Miss Earl Hester in prayer as she has heavy responsibilities of the Training School and the Seminary would rest upon her in the absence of the Gills who had returned to the states because of the serious illness of Mrs. Gill.

Mention was made of the scholarship for Alpha Marie Worthington and members urged to send in cash as soon as possible to cover this scholarship to O. B. U.

Oklahoma has been asked by the W. M. U. of the South to use 1530 units of \$12.00 to apply on debts both state and south-
le. These units are to include the Hundred Thousand
and the Debt Liquidation for our State campaign. It was
voted that Societies report units accepted by the women on
of these campaigns.

The Board expressed appreciation to Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite for initiating the State Mission Program by a rising vote.

Mrs. Spooner announced that Oklahoma W. M. U. had published Mrs. Aulick's new book for Intermediates "God's World Plan" and urged that the women acquaint themselves with the book and promote it among the young people. The Board expressed appreciation of the work of Mrs. Aulick by standing.

In the Board meeting preceding the annual session the matter of amending the constitution was presented and upon motion by

Mrs. Barron it was voted that a committee be appointed to retire and bring back to the Board suggestions as to the necessary change. The president appointed on this committee: Mrs. J. W. Barron, Mrs. T. W. Stevens, and Mrs. J. E. Kirk.

The report of the Committee on Recommendations was brought by Mrs. H. H. Boston, Chairman. Mrs. Bandy of Bartlesville moved that we approve these recommendations. Mrs. Herring moved to amend that the recommendations as presented be approved with the exception of the clause that refers to designations of the Lottie Moon and Annie W. Armstrong offerings. The motion was carried as amended.

The president called for a report of the committee to prepare an amendment to the constitution and Mrs. J. E. Kirk presented the following amendment:

Your committee recommends that Section 3, Article 4 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows: "The Nominating committee shall be composed of one member from each District to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting for the succeeding year, seven constituting a quorum."

Upon motion by Mrs. D. A. Mayer it was voted to recommend this amendment to the Woman's Missionary Union in annual session for adoption.

It was reported that Atoka Association has gone into East Central District from Southeast and that Mills Association has returned to West Central District.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RECOMMENDATIONS

Your committee recommends the following concerning the plan of work for 1937:

I. Plan of Work

That we adopt the plan of work of the W. M. U. of the South as published in the 1937 Yearbook.

That our watchword be: "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts." Zech. 4:6.

That our song for the year be: "Christ for the World We Sing."

That an intensive enlistment campaign be put on in all of our churches to enlist the great host of unenlisted women and young people in the work of missions; those having less than 25 per cent seek to bring their enlistment up to 25 per cent; those with less than 50 per cent up to 50 per cent; those with less than 75 per cent up to 75 per cent; those with more than 75 per cent up to 100 per cent.

That more time and study be given to plain parliamentary rules in all of our meetings.

That one program at the quarterly rallies in the associations be a clinic, viz: Each associational chairman of the different departments shall have a conference with the corresponding officer from the local societies.

That each local W. M. S. shall have a school of instruction immediately following the annual of officers, using as a textbook "The New Why and How" by Miss Bucy, the Southwide Yearbook and the State Yearbook.

That a historian be elected to gather from the pioneers and from other sources and compile all of the early history of our work at the earliest possible date.

That the Oklahoma Service Calendar for the year 1937 be as follows:

January—Scholarships.

February—White Cross.

March—Home Missions.

April—District Expenses and Children's Home.

May—Memorial Love Gifts (for finishing the furnishing of territory).

Plans for an enlarged program for Auxiliaries.

June—Associational Expense, House Parades and R. A. Conclaves.

July—Southwestern Training School Nursery and special work with Auxiliaries.

August—Scholarships and special work with Auxiliaries.

September—Missionary Literature Subscriptions Campaign; Children's Home; Memorial Love Gifts.

October—State Missions; boxes to frontier preachers and Indian missionaries.

November—Margaret Fund.

December—Foreign Missions.

Personal Service.

That we follow the personal service plans as suggested in the Southwide W. M. U. Yearbook on page 19.

That we keep in mind always the aim of all personal service **SOUL-WINNING.**

That we follow the Southwide plan of reporting only organized personal service, checking the various activities engaged in rather than numbers of visits, garments, etc; also the number of members engaged therein.

That each personal service chairman report for the local W. S. and all auxiliaries each quarter to the associational personal service chairman, who will compile all reports for the association and send to the district personal service chairman, who in turn will compile all associational reports and send to the state personal service chairman.

Children's Home.

That we continue our policy of "adopting" the children of the Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home to clothe and to send canned fruits, vegetables, etc. to the home.

White Cross.

That each society have a White Cross program once a year, preferably in February.

That each society be urged to make a cash contribution to White Cross for work in our Hospital at Ogbomoshos, Nigeria, Africa.

That all hospital supplies be sent to the Baptist Hospitals in Miami and Muskogee.

Mission Study.

That Mission Study Institutes, presenting teaching methods, preferably lasting two days, be held in each Association annually. Leaflet—"The Mission Study Institute" available from the State M. U. headquarters, suggests many plans for real training work.

That books be distributed one week before the meeting of a one-day class and that some kind of visual teaching, such as maps, charts, blackboards, or pictures be used.

That mission study chairmen exercise greater diligence than ever in securing reports of classes taught and the number of awards untied. As diplomas and certificates are valuable in educational work, we should make use of them in missionary work.

That Woman's Missionary Societies urge and co-operate with the church in supporting the Church School of Missions. Catalogues giving detailed instructions may be secured from the State W. M. U. headquarters.

That mission libraries be established wherever possible in churches or Associations.

That at least one program on World Peace be given in the Circles during the year.

That all who have completed Courses I and II enroll for the Advanced Course of Study.

That renewed emphasis be given to teaching missions to the young people.

That classes be organized for women who lack only a few books of finishing Courses I and II.

That associational chairmen seek to organize mission study classes in societies where no mission study work has been done. As never before, let us make every effort to have at least one mission study class in every Society in the State where a study class has never been held.

That "Telling You How" by Juliette Mather, be used as the young people's method book, and "Mission Study, Why and How," by Mrs. A. L. Aulick, be used as the W. M. S. Method book, each receiving credit on Certificate Course II in place of home or foreign mission book.

That at least two mission study classes be held during the year in every Woman's Missionary Society, thus meeting the requirement of the Standard of Excellence.

That leaders of W. M. U. Auxiliaries encourage young people to buy mission study text books as they are studied. Satisfactory work cannot be done if teacher, only, has a book.

Mission study classes of three hours each be discouraged except in situations where it is impossible to meet for a longer period of time; preferably 5 hours or more for a class.

That emphasis be placed on the study of books dealing with the missionary teaching of the Bible, using as texts one or all of the books recommended by the Woman's Missionary Union of the South and leading to the seal on Certificate Course I.

That the ideal of the W. M. S. be to fix an intelligent missionary consciousness in the heart of every woman, young person, boy or girl who may come within the influence of a Woman's Missionary Society.

That we substitute "Missions in the Bible" by Dr. J. B. Lawrence, and "Missionary Lessons from the Bible," by Mrs. A. L. Aulick, as optional books for "Missionary Bible Studies" by Binford in the Moner Kingdom Bible Course.

VI. Missionary Literature.

That we endeavor to increase greatly our subscriptions to the missionary periodicals: Royal Service, The Window of Y.W.A., World Comrades; also the Baptist Messenger and Home and Foreign Fields.

That we provide a Literature Fund for the Women Foreign Missionaries of Oklahoma by taking a free-will offering in the annual meeting.

VII. Young People's Auxiliaries.

That we be faithful to the youth in our churches in enlisting and training them in the spirit of missions by fostering all the missionary auxiliaries: Y. W. A., G. A., Sunbeams and R. A., not being satisfied until a full-graded W. M. U. family is organized in each church.

That special emphasis be laid during 1937 on the organization of a Sunbeam Band in every church where there is a Woman's Missionary Society.

That each W. M. S. have at least one training class a year for all Auxiliary Counselors using as a basis for study the Correspondence Course as suggested on page 68 of Southwide W. M. U. Yearbook, urging Y. W. A.'s, Intermediate G. A.'s and any prospective leaders to take this class also.

That Woman's Missionary Societies will provide each auxiliary with sufficient copies of World Comrades and The Window of Y. W. A. to carry on their work in an efficient way, and encourage parents to subscribe to the magazines for their own children.

That stronger emphasis be laid on securing monthly reports from auxiliaries through the third vice president or Young People's Director, and including them in the quarterly reports of the W. M. S.

That Annual Promotion Days be observed in every W. M. U. family at time of other church promotions.

That Forward Steps of G. A.'s and the Ranking System of R. A.'s be emphasized and encouraged by special recognition of the W. M. S., before the church, as requirements are fulfilled for advancement, providing armbands and insignia and pins as required.

That participation in the Southwide Focus Week be urged to give emphasis to missionary education activities of W. M. U. young people. (See W. M. U. Yearbook, page 22 for dates.)

That Young People's Directors be asked to encourage all auxiliaries to participate with the W. M. S. in all activities listed in the Service Calendar.

VIII. Margaret Fund.

That the Margaret Fund work be given special emphasis in all districts and associations.

That each local society have a Margaret Fund chairman who shall strive to interest and encourage societies and auxiliaries to give and to support the Margaret Fund work.

That we send boxes of stationery, stamps and little personal gifts often to our Margaret Fund Students.

X. Christian Education.

That we co-operate with Oklahoma Baptist University in a great Christian Education program by:

1. Supplying the names of prospective students.
2. Having banquets and socials for high school graduates in the early spring and inviting a representative from the school and one of the quartettes for the program.

3. Taking a group of high school seniors or graduates to visit the school when possible.

4. Providing bulletins for high schools and libraries, and furnishing publicity material for distribution to our young people.

C. Scholarships.

That we make our Scholarships state-wide with all districts, and associations sharing proportionately in the apportionments.

That we give scholarships to young women who are ready for our Training Schools. (W. M. U. courses are offered at W. M. U. Training School, Louisville, Ky., Southwestern Training School, Ft. Worth, Tex., and Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans, La.)

That a special committee shall have charge of all applications, working out the requirements for awarding scholarships.

That in case scholarship girls do not become missionaries of the Home or Foreign Mission Board these scholarships become loans and that they be required to pay back the money.

I. Stewardship.

That each society or circle study a book on Stewardship during the year.

That stewardship be given an important place in our programs by having devotionals on stewardship, stewardship plays and pageants whenever possible.

That we display posters often in our churches, the best to be sent to the association, district and state.

That we teach and practice tithes and offerings as God's plan for financing His Kingdom.

That we co-operate in the Stewardship Education plans for young people, page 58 of Southwide Yearbook.

XII. Apportionments, Gifts To Missions

That Oklahoma W. M. U. apportionment to the co-operative program be one-third of the amount proposed by the general convention of Oklahoma.

That we encourage each resident woman member to contribute to missions. (Co-operative program designated and undesignated or offerings during the three seasons of prayer.)

That we adopt as our goal fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the State Mission offering.

That we adopt as our goal four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) for the Annie W. Armstrong Thank offering for Home Missions.

That we adopt as our goal ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions.
