Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

Article I—Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Article II—Constituency

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers appointed by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the Convention.

Section 2. Each Church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

Article III—Object

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this convention shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

Article V—Boards, Trustees and Committees

Section 1. This convention shall have power to appoint such Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Article VI—Board of Directors

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention and thirty-two (32) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention, at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

Section 4. This Board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all sal-

aries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

Article VII—Proceedings

Section 1. The proceedings of the Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

Article VIII—Annual Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Article IX—Special Funds

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

Article X—Change of Constitution

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BY LAWS

Article I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of Directors shall be thirty-four (34).

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided; the term of office for these members shall be four years. Eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible or re-election to this board for a period of one year.

Section 3. The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Board of Directors as herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.

Section 5. The Directors shall hold quarterly meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall by proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held at above provided.

Section 7. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.

Two Vice-presidents, selected by the Board.

A Recording Secretary elected by the Convention.

An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.

A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.

A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Vice-president, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make quarterly reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasure may be held by one and the same person.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws, will be voted upon at that meeting provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done only in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 5. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until same has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State Paper at least six months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request comes to the convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following convention a year hence.

1. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma met in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, at 7:00 p. m., on Tuesday, November 16, 1943.

2. President Auguie Henry called the Convention to order calling attention to the fact that it was the 38th annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and the 61st annual meeting of the Baptists organized at Tahlequah, Indian Territory, June 1, 1883.

3. Music director Gayle Holcomb led in singing "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name" and "Heavenly Sunlight."

4. The Organist played "The Star Spangled Banner" as the flags (Christian and United States of America) were presented.

5. Dr. J. Howard Williams led in the salutes to the flags and President Auguie Henry led in prayer. Congregation sang "My Country 'Tis of Thee."

6. Mrs. H. B. Wilhoyte, president of "Woman's Missionary Union," took charge of the evening's program.

7. Dr. J. W. Storer led in worship service, reading from Daniel chapter one, and emphasized the teachings of the chapter. "God Gives" being the subject.

8. Pastor Ira Peak of Ardmore, presented the report on Foreign Missions and motion was made to adopt it.

Foreign Missions Report

As we contemplate the seemingly insurmountable obstacles in the way of our Southern Baptist Foreign Mission program today, our thoughts turn to the words of the Master, "My strength is made perfect in weakness," and "My word will not return unto me void." In spite of seeming temporary limitation, opposed by powerful antagonistic church groups in some countries, and in the presence of victorious enemies in others, our Baptist people are still faced with the imperative command of the Lord to go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. There is only

one panacea for the destruction, destitution, darkness, and death that stalks the earth today—the old, old story of the saving power of our Lord Jesus Christ.

We need to face some facts regarding our work and seek to utilize every available means at our command in the carrying out of our Lord's will around the world. In the first place, there are many problems which impede our Foreign Mission effort at this moment. The onslaught of the war in Asia saw many of our missionaries interned as prisoners of war. Even as we meet in this Convention, a great number of these are sailing toward home abroad the Gripsholm under the protection of our Heavenly Father, but still there are ten missionaries and one missionary's child in the Japanese occupied territory.

The Catholic Church is also using its extensive political power to close the doors of Brazil to Baptist and Protestant missionaries. This situation is deplorable and the voice of Southern Baptists should be raised in protest to the fact that our National Government is yielding to this pressure.

Another problem that faces us is the drain on our potential missionary personnel due to the demand of military service on unordained volunteers. There is also a large number who have volunteered their service to their country in this hour. That leaves us with no small problem of meeting the challenge of the hour.

There is also a tremendous additional financial expense involved in bringing some of our missionaries home from the countries where war has halted present activity. Many of our buildings and equipment have been destroyed or confiscated in occupied territory and replacement is impossible at the present. The missionaries on the fields are also facing an acute situation in maintaining their standard of living due to the enormous increase in prices. These are only a few of the many problems we face, but they do in themselves demand our utmost attention.

In meeting the situation as described above, extensive plans are being formulated. The wisdom and foresight of our great Foreign Mission Board, under the capable leadership of our Secretary, Dr. Charles E. Maddry, are being revealed in this trying hour. The office force of the Board has been greatly strengthened by the addition of our own Dr. E. C. Routh, as editor of the Commission, and J. W. (Bill) Marshall of Texas, as Personnel Secretary. These two are lending themselves unstintingly in making their contribution at this hour together with the other capable leaders that comprise the office force.

The Board continues to appoint and send out new missionaries as rapidly as possible to all accessible fields. In such cases where the doors are temporarily closed, the newly appointed missionaries are in some cases placed in language schools preparatory to the day when they may begin their work in the fields of their calling. The Board again has manifested its wisdom in the appointment of a special committee to study the mission needs of the world and the type of work that will be the most effective in particular fields. From this study, plans for post-war missions are being evolved. We also are setting aside a substantial reserve which will enable us to enter open doors when the time is ripe and guard us from financial reverses that may follow in the wake of this war. Strategic places must be filled; forward progress must be realized, and the campaign so wisely planned that we will never be faced with the humiliating problem of retreat.

Another far reaching project was suggested at the Foreign Mission Week at Ridgcrest, North Carolina, namely, that the Sun-

day School Board should own and operate a radio station powerful enough to encircle the globe. Recordings of Gospel messages would be made in all languages and be broadcast around the world.

We also see the utilization and relocation of our returning missionaries as a wise and fruitful move on the part of the Board. The valuable work in schools and missions, state meetings and individual appearances all over the Southland are indoctrinating us anew with the implications of the Great Commission. The hearts of Southern Baptists are being deeply moved by the suffering of those who represent our Savior throughout the length and breadth of the earth.

What are the prospects for our work? They are as bright and challenging as the promises of the Lord. Many are the encouraging things that are emerging from this hour. It is truly the time for the forward march of all those who claim the name of Christ. The burdensome debt which has for so many years encumbered the work of our Board has been paid in its entirety. The large amounts that have been expended on interest alone can now be used in our constructive, forward looking program. The Board is now located in its new home and its facilities are sufficient to meet the challenge of an expanded program.

Gifts to the cause of Foreign Missions are reaching the highest peak in the history of our denomination. The Lottie Moon Offering of 1942 alone was \$558,372.68, an increase of \$109,210.20 over the previous high year. There has been also a tremendous increase through the Unified Budget and through special gifts to the challenging cause. Much credit for the increased interest and gifts goes to the Woman's Missionary Union of the South. Their untiring efforts, earnest prayers, wise leadership, and faithful stewardship of the past years are now being reaped in this glorious harvest.

We have never had a finer group of men and women composing the missionary family around the world. They shine as beacon lights to challenge Southern Baptists to a more worthy effort of meeting the demands of our Lord.

The **Commission** is literally a stream of information and inspiration flowing into the homes of Southern Baptists and is causing them to lift their eyes to the field that are white unto harvest. Let this Convention offer up thanks to God for the victories of the past, redouble our effort for the challenge of the present, and consecrate our all for the day that is to come until the kingdoms of this world have become the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Study Course Books from the Sunday School, and Training Union Departments are also published by our Sunday School Board. These books are well written by people who know, and cover the fields of organization, methods, and doctrines. They offer a course of study and training for our people that will make for efficiency in our churches and redound to the glory of God.

The Sunday School literature published by our Board is attractively printed, well written and "sound in the Faith." We believe it is the very best literature obtainable and should be used by every Baptist Sunday School.

We have two excellent missionary magazines which give to us helpful reports and important information concerning our mission work at home and abroad. The "Commision" is published by

the Foreign Mission Board and "Southern Baptist Home Missions" is published by the Home Mission Board.

Our state paper, "Baptist Messenger," ably edited by Mr. Porter Routh, is a most excellent medium of communication, a messenger of instruction and a method of propaganda, by which the teachings of God's Word, the needs of a lost world, and the plans, programs and work of our people are made known. No other publication can or will take its place in giving to Oklahoma Baptists full information, correct interpretation of our doctrines, and dependable statements of our plans, programs and progress.

We recommend:

(1) That our Baptist people give "heed to reading" especially the Bible and the books from the Broadman Press.

(2) That we make the widest possible use of our Study Course Books, ever studying and striving to make our organizations more efficient and helpful in the life and program of our churches.

(3) That we use only the Bible and our own Baptist literature in our Sunday Schools.

(4) That we endeavor to increase the circulation of our state paper, "The Baptist Messenger," and our mission magazines, by securing individual subscriptions and through the church budget plan.

(5) That wherever feasible a church library be maintained and used. The Baptist Sunday School Board offers some helpful suggestions and makes a generous offer to churches desiring to establish a library.

Baptist Messenger Report

The **Baptist Messenger** was founded in 1912 and for nearly a quarter of a century has been the property of the Baptist General Convention. During the 31 years the paper has been published, there have been only three editors, including the present editor who was elected on July 2, 1943.

Thanks to the growth of the church budget plan, the **Baptist Messenger** now has the largest circulation in its history with the paper going into 27,000 homes. More than 300 Baptist churches have adopted the church budget plan where the **Messenger** is sent to each home in the church for two cents per copy per week. Several churches use the "church club" plan where the **Messenger** is sent to more than five homes at a cost of \$1.00 per year for each individual. The individual subscription price is \$1.50 a year, payable in advance.

Despite the rising cost of printing during the past year, the **Baptist Messenger** has all bills paid and a small cash balance.

Woman's Missionary Union

Berta K. Spooner

Women are asked to do many different things for Victory—**CAN** for Victory, **SAVE** for Victory, **WALK** for Victory, **SEW** for Victory, even **DEFROST** for Victory, but no one of these slogans, nor all of them together, will achieve true Victory. Women will more wisely **PRAY** for Victory, **LOVE** for Victory, **SERVE CHRIST** for Victory, **GIVE TO CHRIST'S CAUSE** for Victory, and **READ AND STUDY** for Victory. How are Oklahoma women participating in such vital ways—in the only real Victory?

In our Oklahoma Baptist churches there are 641 Woman's Missionary Societies with a membership of 25,000 and 1153 missionary organizations for our young people with a membership of 16,000. These women and young people are, in some measure, keeping their hearts courageous for real Victory in the carrying out of W. M. U. plans in their church life. The records show some loss of membership. In some cases loss of members by removal was not turned into gain by enlistment of other women, who should be in attendance. In some instances women have taken defense positions and have been or have not been enlisted in Business Women's circles.

When missions is, as now more than ever, recognized as the one basis for International peace, we must enlarge the number and effectiveness of the work of our societies, no matter what difficulties present themselves. Rationed gas and worn tires will seem poor excuses in that Victorious Day when we shall stand before the throne of our triumphant Christ.

Most of our associations have continued their customary meeting, finding encouragement in discussions of accomplishment and plans. The 14 district meetings in April were largely attended, representing two-thirds of the societies and all of the associations. We were grateful for the messages of Miss Mary Christian from Southern Woman's Missionary Union and Miss Lucy Smith, one of our own Oklahoma missionaries to China. All who were present went to their homes quickened in earnest zeal. The offering that we take at these meetings for magazines for our Oklahoma missionaries, was the largest we have ever given in a single year.

Woman's Missionary Union has paid its Hundred Thousand Club goal of \$53,000 and trust at the end of this year of 1943 that Southern Baptists will be free from debt.

All offerings thus far have been increased and details will be found in the minutes. This year we have, through our Scholarship Fund, six of our own girls in special training—four are in Louisville and two in Southwestern Seminary. We have also a young woman and a young minister, both colored, in Nashville. A very fine Indian and a Japanese young woman in Oklahoma Baptist University. Our Foreign Student Fund is going to help Theodore Boushy and Rev. Petre Trutza in the Southern Seminary at Louisville. Both of these plan to return to their native country to do mission work—Syria and Roumania. Thus we are helping ten fine young people to train for larger service for the Master.

As we think of these amounts we must be continually mindful that we are still unprofitable servants, for most of us are far below paying our tithe. Recognizing that all we have and are is Christ's, so few tithers are reported. Where is God's money; We,

as Christians, did not even pay our tithes. War is costing America two billion dollars every week. Victory can scarcely be ours as long as we are dishonest with God. Not only our money is going into war but our sons and daughters, withheld from mission service, must go now with instruments of destruction to the far lands and the seven seas.

We are learning the hard way that Christian women—Baptist women— must feel responsibility for showing God's World Plan so clearly to boys and girls and young women that they are ready to put service to Christ's Kingdom first in their lives—going as missionaries—supporting missionaries—rising above racial prejudice and class distinction to win the lost everywhere. This is true Victory.

For the co-operation of all our women and the many courtesies throughout the days, I am most grateful. Oklahoma women are writing larger letters of Victory, but they could be more clearly visible in the coming year if all of us together devoted ourselves more completely to our Master.

37. Special order of the Baptist Orphan's Home was opened by Dr. T. P. Haskins, who presented Mr. H. Truman Maxey and Mrs Gladys Dickens. The boys and girls who live in the two new cottages, and their matrons were brought to the platform.

38. Secretary Andrew Potter presented the following paper which summarizes the facts of the development of our Children's City, and the impetus given it by the \$100,000.00 gift of the Frank Phillips Foundation.

THE CHILDREN'S CITY

A thrill State-wide in its effect swept the hearts of our Baptist Zion with the announcement recently made of a gift of \$100,000 from the Frank Phillips Foundation of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, to help us in the completion of the Baptist Children's City. This blessed benefaction designated for the Baptist Orphans' Home electrified Oklahoma Baptists and caused great rejoicing throughout our State. It is a gift of great significance for the on-going of the Kingdom of Christ. It came like a flash of good news from the battle fronts of the world, and is destined to unify our Baptist forces in a concerted effort toward that golden day when the Baptist Children's City will no longer be a dream but a reality.

The founders of this Home, together with those who have carried on through the forty-one years of its blessed ministry, looked forward to the time when this institution could be enlarged and equipped to meet the needs of this day of destiny.

The Baptist Orphans' Home of Oklahoma City has a noble history. A multitude of helpless, homeless children have had a protecting shelter beneath its roof. It has served well through the years gone by and we acknowledge a debt of gratitude to the founders, administrators, and helpers, who have blessed the lives of these children through the forty-one years of its existence.

The time has come, however, when it should be enlarged and equipped for a greater service to humanity. To this end, the Baptist General Convention has dedicated its energy and effort. When the Children's City is completed, it will be one of the finest in America and an institution of which the citizenship of Oklahoma City and the Baptist people of our Commonwealth may justly be proud.

The family group plan of our Orphanage was adopted after wide and extensive study of such institutions in many sections of our nation. It removes the institutional stamp from our children and enables them to have the personal attention given by real mothers and fathers. The family group plan we have adopted is patterned, in a large measure, from the Moose Home near Chicago, which is one of the very finest orphanages in America.

We here pay sincere and lasting tribute to Mr. Frank Phillips for this magnificent gift of \$100,000. It is the largest single gift ever made to our denomination in this State, and we are confident such benefaction is prophetic of many other large and substantial gifts, which may be inspired by the generosity of this man whose philanthropy deserves the highest praise. Our denomination owes an everlasting debt of gratitude, both to God and to Mr. Frank Phillips, whose example of liberality will challenge the highest and best loyalty to our Lord and the institution where our orphan children live.

This noble gift of Mr. Frank Phillips was made on the condition that Oklahoma Baptists would raise \$150,000 by the end of 1944, and thus make possible the completion of our proposed Children's City.

Following the announcement of this generous gift, the Secretary called at Oklahoma City on Friday, October 29, a joint meeting of the Orphans' Home Committee of the Board of Directors and the Plans and Policies Committee of the Baptist General Convention to discuss ways and means to meet the condition of this gift. After frank and full discussion this joint committee voted heartily and unanimously to recommend to the Board of Directors that we accept the challenge and proceed immediately to launch a movement to raise the \$150,000 from the churches, and also that a representative committee be appointed from the several Associations in our State, which would be known as The Promotional Committee of the campaign.

When this gift was announced, the Secretary immediately contacted Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union, and Mrs. H. B. Wilhoyte, the president, and requested the co-operation and assistance of the Woman's Missionary Union in this great endeavor. We are happy to announce that the W. M. U. of Oklahoma has agreed to assume responsibility for raising one-third of this amount—\$50,000—and give their hearty approval to this glorious enterprise.

Dr. John W. Raley, president of Oklahoma Baptist University, was present and pledged his unbounded co-operation in making this crusade a complete success. From all over the State comes word from pastors, laymen, and other interested friends, wholeheartedly endorsing the plan and pledging their co-operation.

In view of all this, we recommend that this challenging offer of Mr. Frank Phillips be accepted by the Convention and that we immediately launch a crusade for funds to meet it.

We further recommend that we bend every effort and energy to raise this \$150,000 by **Founder's Day, March 15**, and that in any case that we bring the campaign to a glorious and successful consummation not later than **May 1, 1944**.

We also recommend that the various workers and department heads of the Convention so arrange their programs and schedules that they will be available for the campaign during the period allotted thereto. We urge all pastors and churches to give their

unstinted support to this holy cause that the history-making movement for the completion of the Children's City may be triumphant and victorious in the last degree.

We further recommend that Dr. Elmer Ridgeway, Brotherhood and Institutional Secretary, be the general director for the campaign and that we all pledge to him our heartiest support to see that it is finished by May 1, 1944.

Report of Brotherhood and Institutions

The type of program usually presented to our Convention on the "Brotherhood," must, of necessity, be different this year. This is true because, as most of our Baptist people in Oklahoma know by now, the matter of the promotion, building, and maintenance of our several Baptist institutions in this state, has been, by unanimous vote of the Board of Directors of our Convention, as of July 2, 1943, merged with the department of the Brotherhood. This does not mean that less emphasis will be placed upon the Brotherhood. It means, rather, that the great work of that department of our denominational life will be enlarged and enhanced. By adding the institutions to the Brotherhood department, their work will be greatly objectified. This new arrangement will give the Brotherhood a challenging and constructive program, one in which they can find the fruition of their yearning through the years.

In this day of unbounded and unprecedented prosperity, we have an opportunity to enlist our Baptist laymen in the high matter of rallying behind our institutions in a way they have not known or dreamed before. The fine men in our Brotherhood organization can lead and lure untold thousands of dollars into the coffers of our unfinished and incomplete institutions and agencies, thus releasing the flood-gates of liberality, wherein the golden stream will vitalize, enrich, refresh, and invigorate our constituency from every section of this fair state.

The Brotherhood of the South was born in the spirit of flaming zeal for missionary and evangelistic effort around the world. This was the dominant and animating passion of the Brotherhood during those pristine years when the organization was getting started, and facing the future with radiant hope. Away back then it was called, "Laymen's Missionary Movement." When, in 1926 is assumed the title, "Baptist Brotherhood of the South," it didn't mean that the men's movement in our Southern Baptist Convention would be any less missionary and evangelistic than before. If a local brotherhood is a group of consecrated men promoting the whole program of their church, then a State Brotherhood would be the same type of men, enlisted in the whole program of the denomination, in the state—and to the uttermost parts of the earth.

It is implied that the brotherhood seek to get all other men, in the churches, and in the denomination, to join in the conquest of the world for Christ. The immortal motto of the Brotherhood, "A Million Men for Christ," which came to Southwide Secretary Lawson Cooke in a dream, will, when fully realized, be the most significant accomplishment in the history of the Baptist name.

The Brotherhood will never reach the blessed goal which God has in mind for our men, if there is a tendency to centralize and localize their work. The commanding note in their battle cry must be, "Others, yes, others for Christ, everywhere!" When the Brotherhood becomes satisfied to confine their activities to the local front alone, the inertia of their inevitable state will prevent their doing the will of God. Those organizations that have died perished largely because their horizons were entirely too limited for God's sky. There is no desire to discount the glorious history of our Brotherhood movement. They have done well in the past. However, with this new idea propounded by Dr. Andrew Potter, our far-sighted and enterprising State Secretary of the Baptist General Convention, and so heartily approved by the entire State Board, that of merging the Brotherhood and the institutions, we now have a new channel through which definite blessings of delight will flow, and a generation as yet unborn will rise up to see the wisdom of the plan. What a fine opportunity for service presents itself now to the Brotherhood, in building and equipping the several institutions, so close and dear to the hearts of our people in this empire of the golden West. Many of our fine Baptist laymen in Oklahoma have it in their hearts to make a worthy and enduring offering for the preservation of our institutions, and if large and substantial gifts are ever made to our Cause, the laymen themselves will lead the way.

Your secretary, therefore, comes with his first report. He is thrilled in heart with the response of our Baptist men in this state. Several large gifts have already been made in cash to our institutions, and these have been sacredly marked and put away in the Building Trust Fund, from which not one penny can ever be taken for expense. In other words, every cent given by our Baptist people to this trust fund will go for some building in the program of enlargement when the war has come to an end. Your Secretary has spoken to Brotherhoods all over this state, since we accepted this department, and our laymen everywhere have shown a marvelous spirit of co-operation for this new and better day in our Baptist life in Oklahoma. The eyes of the Southland are upon us as they study the reaction of our laymen to this momentous matter of our institutions, in which this state now pioneers. Our people are in for some grand thrills in the near future. Sums of money, far larger than we have ever known in our Baptist work in this state, will be announced from time to time. Our men are truly marching with the Master. We look down the road where the darkness will salute the dawn! A high noon is on the horizon of our endeavors, and we are going forward—just as our Lord would have us do.

We would like to recommend to our Baptist Brotherhood in this state that we fall in line with every movement fostered by those noble leaders of our men throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. Special attention should be given to the observance of

LAYMEN'S DAY

Each year brings some worthy objective to be emphasized by all of our Baptist laymen on that day. It is a day when special recognition is given to that royal crowd of Baptist men, and these

That will mean that our Brotherhood will be in the forefront in stressing the Unified Budget of our beloved denomination, worship services in the churches where the individual member belongs, the replacement of those wondrous men who have gone to war, or have been deprived of their usual church activities because of working in war plants, etc., and, as suggested in the folder sent out to our Baptist Brotherhoods in the South by the Secretary, Mr. Lawson H. Cooke, we loyally stand by and support our BAPTIST INSTITUTIONS, knowing that a godless intelligence is the most dangerous force in human society, and that education without Christ is really not education at all.

We urge that every Brotherhood loyally support the superb leadership of our State Secretary, Dr. Andrew Potter, and that we give unstinted devotion to that colossal task which is paramount in our esteem, the building of the several institutions in this state by prayer, purse, and power, looking forward to the time when the beneficent influence of our institutions will be so far extended that every human being within the domain shall be lifted, inspired, and blessed thereby. To this holy task we ask our Brotherhoods to dedicate their lives, ever looking unto God to crown our humble efforts with success, to the end that our joy may be known in the light of a new—and a more glorious day!

42. Reverend Sam Scantlan presented the Report of the Falls Creek Assembly and spoke on the report. Motion prevailed to adopt the report.

Falls Creek Assembly

As far as the Assembly is concerned, the year 1943, was a record year of inactivity.

Because of an epidemic of Poliomyelitis that swept our State last summer, Falls Creek Assembly was postponed for the year. Besides the epidemic that raged incessantly, at Assembly time there were all sorts of other difficulties encountered. There was no ice to be had; food of all sorts was a problem, as well as help to do the work. Gasoline rationing and the tire shortage made transportation most difficult.

When all these problems were considered, it became obvious that Falls Creek should be cancelled. All of the committees were contacted and were unanimous in the opinion that we should not attempt to have it. Doctor Potter and all of his office force concurred in the action and reports from everywhere assured us that we did the right thing.

All of our property is in good shape and is being well cared for. Special care will be taken to continue this upkeep until next year. We pray that conditions will be such that we can have a great Assembly in 1944. Our young people were sorely disappointed

because our 1943 Assembly was cancelled and they will be looking anxiously to the coming Assembly. Your committee recommends that every effort be made to make the Assembly the best ever in '44.

Let us pray that we shall escape the difficulties encountered this year.

43. Secretary E. W. Westmoreland, of the Sunday School-Training Union-Baptist Student Union, presented the workers in these departments. Brother Westmoreland spoke regarding the needs of the Sunday school and the methods necessary to meet these needs. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Report of the Sunday School, Training Union and Baptist Student Union

Throughout the past year the work of the Sunday School, Training Union and Baptist Student Union Department has been fraught with many difficulties, but despite the difficulties progress has been made in many directions.

Tremendous changes have taken place during the last three years. These have been years of war—our young men and young women by the hundreds and thousands have gone into war service of one kind or another. By the end of 1943 it is estimated that Southern Baptists will have 440,000 persons in the armed forces. Literally hundreds of our finest Trainnig Union, Sunday School and Baptist Student Union leaders are among those now wearing the uniform of our country.

Our churches also have suffered a severe loss of leadership because of the tremendous defense program which has been growing steadily for more than two years. Literally thousands of our Sunday School officers and teachers, Training Union leaders and sponsors are working in defense plants and are required to work on Sunday. Because of changed conditions brought about by a world at war, most of our Sunday Schools and Training Unions are showing losses in enrolment. Southern Baptists, with the best Sunday School work in the nation, have suffered a loss in Sunday School enrolment of 160,000 in two years. As severe as these losses are, they are not as great as that suffered by other denominations. United Methodists report a loss of 325,000 during these same two years.

Our present day difficulties and problems for the most part, are temporary. Dr. Alldredge states that there has been a shifting of our people to war work centers and that during the last two years the young people alone who have been detached from churches in the Southern Baptist Convention, will reach the startling number of 200,000.

Despite our losses in enrollment, the number of new Sunday schools organized and the number of new Training Unions reported has reached a new high during the past year. We have reported 93 new Sunday schools and 94 new Training Unions. This is evidence that our people are not discouraged or disheartened. As a matter of fact, our Sunday school and Training Union leaders of Oklahoma are accepting their difficulties as a challenge to more strenuous effort.

OUR WORKERS

Oklahoma Baptists are fortunate indeed in having a group of consecrated Sunday school and Training Union approved workers who are skilled in their work. All of them have had wide experience in their own field of work in their local churches before coming to the state office. The full-time workers in the Sunday school and Training Union department are as follows: Miss Sophia Duerksen, Young People's worker; Mrs. J. W. Barron, Junior worker; and Mrs. Dorothy Sneed, office secretary. Approved workers: Mrs. C. E. Wilbanks, Intermediate; Miss Jewel Kirkpatrick, Primary; Mrs. Walter H. Crowder, Beginner; Mrs. G. H. Caudill, Cradle Roll.

In addition to our regular and approved workers, we constantly use a group of qualified workers who help us in enlargement campaigns and training schools. These workers have been tireless in their efforts. During 1943 they have spent 188 weeks on the field.

Oklahoma stands fifth in Training Union enrollment among the states of the Southern Baptist Convention. We are led by the states of Texas, Tennessee, Georgia and North Carolina.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The nation's call to arms has had a serious effect upon our student work. First, a large number of our most faithful secretaries from local campuses have left for the service. Second, the going of the men students from our colleges into military training and the service has greatly reduced the working force of the Baptist Student Union. In some cases, it has been necessary for the entire leadership to be delegated to the girl students. However, the small number of students remaining on our college campuses have responded heroically to keep the structure of the organization intact. At the present time, we have paid student secretaries on the following campuses: University of Oklahoma, Mr. Marion Morehead; A. and M., Miss Dorine Hawkins; Central State Teachers' College, Miss Blanche Graham; Muskogee Baptist Hospital, Miss Connie Bradley. Even though some of our Baptist Student Union organizations do not have paid workers, they have local secretaries and the B.S.U. Council which is now working sacrificially to maintain the B.S.U. organizations. Miss Anne Crittendon, our State B.S.U. President, has done a wonderful work during the last year. Our annual B.S.U. Convention was held Nov. 5-7 at the First Baptist Church, Shawnee, Oklahoma. The attendance

was surprisingly large considering the small number of students on Oklahoma campuses.

SOME RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that every Sunday school and Training Union in Oklahoma launch an intensive enlargement campaign during 1944. There are at least 90,000 members of our churches who are as yet not enrolled in our Sunday schools. At least 75% of our total church membership has not been enlisted in the Training program. Our possibilities for enlargement are absolutely unlimited.

2. We recommend that at least two teacher training courses be held in every church each year and that at least two Training Union study courses be conducted each year. The number of persons enrolled in our Sunday schools and our Training Unions depends largely upon the number of Sunday school departments and classes, the number of Training Union departments and Unions, but the number of units in our organization cannot be increased without also increasing the number of leaders necessary to carry on these units.

3. We urge every church in Oklahoma to sponsor a Vacation Bible School during 1944. This is one of our very finest opportunities to teach the Bible. Boys and girls are exceedingly anxious to attend a Vacation Bible School. Our schools last year reported more than a thousand conversions. The Vacation Bible School is an evangelistic opportunity which we cannot afford to overlook.

4. We recommend that our Sunday schools and Training Unions make a restudy of our standards. We do not work to reach standards, we work standards to reach people. A standard is simply a guide to good work. We suggest that wall chart standards be secured from the Sunday school and Training Union Office and placed in department and class rooms and Training Union assembly rooms.

5. We suggest that our Sunday schools emphasize better teaching in 1944. Dr. Dobbins is the author of a new book entitled, "The Improvement of Teaching in the Sunday School." We challenge every pastor in Oklahoma to set aside five nights during the early part of 1944 and teach this book to the teachers of his church.

44. Dr. M. F. Langley presented the report on "Hospitals" and Motion carried to adopt it. A. F. Wasson of Muskogee spoke to the Report.

Report on the Hospitals

Oklahoma Baptists have a well rounded mission and benevolent program. Much of the ministry of Jesus was healing the sick; and we believe that, when He commanded His disciples to "heal the sick," He must have meant our hospitals. Our two great hospitals at Muskogee and Miami are a credit to Oklahoma Baptists, and we have right to feel proud of them and the work they are doing. There is so much sickness and suffering, and the need is great; and these two institutions are meeting the need worthily.

Not only do they minister to the bodies of the patients, but they minister to the spiritual welfare of both patients and their relatives

and friends. Perhaps at no time is one more easily approached, and in a responsive mood, than when sick, or when a loved one is sick. These institutions are bearing the message of the Great Physician while they "heal the sick" and minister to the anxious and sorrowing.

Miss Florence Worley continues to serve as Superintendent at Miami, and Rev. A. F. Wasson as Superintendent at Muskogee. Both these institutions have had one of the greatest, if not the greatest, years in their history. In his address, Brother Wasson will present interesting statistics from both institutions. Your Committee feels that we should lay the burden of our hospitals upon the hearts of our people.

Be assured that they are serving faithfully. There is a constant need for supplies of various kinds. Above all, they need the prayers and sympathy and understanding of all our people. They are ministering at maximum capacity. As far as possible under present conditions, they should be enlarged for larger service. And let us make a larger place in our plans and prayers for the healing ministry of these great hospitals.

45. Dr. Rupert Naney, presented the "Report of Committee on Future Plans and Policies," and motion carried for its adoption.

Report of the Committee on Future Plans and Policies

Your Committee on Future Plans and Policies was established by the action of the Baptist General Convention, November 16, 1938 on the recommendation of Secretary Potter in his report. He had just concluded a statement on the recommendation of Secretary Potter in his report. He had just concluded a statement on the near approach of the time when all debts would be out of the way and was thinking of the next step. We quote from the Minutes of 1938, page 39.

"Can we go on with expansion and enlargement without incurring disastrous debt? We can if we plan wisely and execute faithfully a constant program of building within Budget bounds. WE THEREFORE SUGGEST that the president appoint a future Plans and Policies Committee of five, together with the general officers of the Convention, who will study all our needs and resources and recommend to the next Convention what enterprise should first be undertaken. We can make progress without dangerous debt if the proper plan of procedure is followed. Let us move on, but move cautiously."

The specific purpose of the Committee, as you therefore see, is:

- (1) To avoid debt.
- (2) To achieve harmony and co-ordination in our whole program.
- (3) To provide for orderly progress.

I. **Okahoma Baptist University** The needs of Okahoma Baptist University for enlargement, particularly a dormitory for men, has been repeatedly recited by this Committee to previous conventions and recommendations made for the construction of a dormitory as soon

as conditions would warrant and in each case the Convention has adopted our recommendations.

Again we call attention to such need and to the further fact that it will be accentuated by the ending of the war. For, many of the young men now serving their country in the Armed Forces will want to continue their education on their return home. The government is now making plans to provide for from one to three years education within certain limitations for the men. In this program Oklahoma Baptist University will find both a responsibility and a great opportunity. A men's dormitory will be necessary if we shall be able to meet the challenge thus in prospect.

Therefore, the Committee recommends that just as soon as it is feasible this dormitory be built.

II. The Orphans' Home Several years ago the Executive Secretary and the Orphans' Home Committee began a careful analysis of the needs of the Home. All the buildings were old and in a distressing state of repair. Much money had been previously expended to make them livable at all. A wide study was made by the Secretary including visits to orphanages over the country and looking to the recasting of our housing plans. Certain funds were acquired through wills for buildings. Your Committee recommended to the 1940 session of the Baptist General Convention the beginning of a building program with these funds and others that should be added by the Baptists in the state in a special offering. Our people responded liberally to the appeal so that in the year 1941 and the early part of 1942 three splendid new buildings were constructed and occupied. It was one of the happiest ventures undertaken by Oklahoma Baptists throughout their history. That, however, was but a beginning. The officials of the Home and the Orphans' Home Committee have daily planned for and looked forward to a resumption of these building operations so that every child admitted to the Home might be housed in a comfortable convenient, and happy environment and so that there might be on those sacred grounds a Children's City which should be "a thing of beauty and a joy forever".

It has been estimated by responsible officials that a minimum of \$250,000.00 would be necessary to complete the plant. A great hearted business man and Christian citizen of Oklahoma, Mr. Frank Phillips, of Bartlesville, had his attention called to the needs of the Home, the excellent progress that had been made, and the plans of all of our hearts for its completion. On a visit to the Home arranged by our brother, the Honorable Robert S. Kerr, Chairman of the Orphan's Home Committee, and our Executive Secretary, Dr. Andrew Potter, Mr. Phillips challenged Oklahoma Baptists with a gift of \$100,000.00 providing we should raise \$150,000.00 and thus complete the plant.

That was one of God's high days which only at rare intervals Christian fraternities experience. This is an easy place to go into a peroration but that shall be left to others. Your committee would have this convention suitably register its thanks to Almighty God for the gift and the opportunity it proposes and its gratitude to that noble man, Mr. Phillips, in whatever manner it shall deem fitting.

Therefore, we heartily recommend that the challenge of Mr. Phillips shall be accepted by this Convention and that we proceed at once and complete the task within this Convention year to raise a minimum of \$150,000.00 with much to meet the terms of his gift. We further recommend that building operations for the completion of the plant be resumed just as soon as priorities are lifted and con-

struction is possible. And that our responsible officers are hereby clothed with authority so to do.

Report of the Unified Budget Committee

Oklahoma Baptists are making history. The year of 1943 has brought victories for the Unified Budget that were undreamed of a few brief months ago. Our goal of "A Quarter Million Dollars from a Quarter Million Baptists" in 1943 has been long since surpassed. The total receipts as of today, November 17, at 4:00 p.m. were \$274,025.02. With the interest continuing, we shall reach and go beyond our enlarged goal before December 31. For all this we thank God and take courage. The increased income of our people is being shared with the great advancing Kingdom of Christ. Our people are finding new joy in giving. In many of our churches, the portion for outside causes has been greatly increased, often multiplied by two, three, or more.

These new victories are opening our eyes to the possibilities which lie before Oklahoma Baptists. Many of us are thinking in terms of \$2 per capita for the Unified Budget, or one-half million

dollars for causes outside the local church. May the Lord speed the day.

Our Oklahoma Baptist program is one of varied interests and demands. Every Baptist, every church, and every association has a place in its attainment. This year the associations were asked to set goals for 1944. Every association responded with a worthy challenge for their churches. Measured by their response, the **Unified Budget Committee, approved by the Board of Directors, has set** as our goal in Oklahoma for 1944 \$308,575.00. In view of our Orphan's Home expansion program adopted by the Convention this afternoon, we believe that this is a worthy goal and shows progress in our missionary consciousness. We recommend this to you hoping that it shall meet with a ready response from all our people.

Report of the Board of Directors

The Board of Directors presents herewith its annual report. It becomes us first to recognize the goodness of God as manifested in the success that has attended the labors of those entrusted with the various activities, and to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we plan for the constructive and aggressive work before us.

We meet an ominous day. Hatred, greed, selfishness, ill-will have thrown their blackness across the world's horizon. Totalitarianism, with its train of ills, battles with the high principles of democracy as it grapples for the ascendancy. In a day such as this of war and bloodshed, we are prone to look at surface appearances, lose heart and hope, become discouraged, relax our efforts, and fail to measure up to the supremacy of such opportunities. We must remember, however, that God is on His throne; that dictators have made their appearance in other days; and that as sure as God is God, the dictators of the present day, with all the evils of totalitarianism, will go the way of all the earth.

This will be the Baptist day. The message of our people will be needed, and welcomed. It will be a tonic for the spirit of the peoples of all the earth. It will be a sought remedy for the spiritual ills of the people of all nations.

This is a day to look ahead. It is a day to re-fortify our institutions, remagnify our agencies, re-vitalize our churches, re-energize all our members, and seek to thoroughly spiritualize our work through and through. The need today and tomorrow will be a spiritual need. The way for the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention is ahead. We need more constructive thinking, more money, more consecration on the part of all our people if we are to go forward toward the goals we know we can reach. Daily we are meeting with new issues, facing new problems, all of which give us courage and faith. We need God's guidance in all our plans for the extension of His Kingdom and our prayer is that we may be aware of His voice and obedient to His will.

This has been a year of many distractions and yet the constructive and spiritual progress has been most encouraging. We are deeply grateful to Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, and the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma for their fine co-operation and help. Without their able assistance we would not record the victories and achievements of the year gone by. We gratefully acknowledge the healthful spirit of Christian unity, fellowship, and co-opera-

tion manifested by the pastors and other leaders in Oklahoma Baptist ranks. They have shown themselves to be loyal and devoted to work which Christ has committed to us. Their unfailing courtesy and help in promoting the causes supported by Oklahoma Baptists have been of inestimable value and have seemed to be more in evidence during the past year than during any recent year.

UNIFIED BUDGET

Enough time has passed by now for us to estimate with accuracy the worth of the Unified Budget as a method of work. Slowly but steadily the facts regarding this simple, Scriptural method have been carried to the members of our churches. Today there are comparatively few of them that do not know something about it, but all too many members of every church have not been enlisted to support it.

Your Board believes that one of the surest ways to get the members of the church interested in local tasks is to let them see the gigantic Kingdom program that exists to the ends of the earth, and to show them that it is utterly impossible to perform that task without first of all laying strong foundations at home by building great churches everywhere so that through their gifts they may support the workers needed to go into all the world with the gospel message. Pastors everywhere can testify to the growing ease of meeting budgetary expenses when their members have become vitally concerned about outside causes. Churches which do not give to missions rarely provide their pastors with an income that will meet their sores need. Wisdom cries aloud for the followers of the Son of God to realize that to shut up their hearts against the cries of orphan children, of the sick and the lame, of the old helpless, and of teeming lost souls everywhere at home and abroad, means to allow selfishness to enslave any Christian, which in turn means that any appeal to such a Christian will fall on dull ears and a cold heart.

The increased support of the Unified Budget during the past year is a source of joy and inspiration to us. Month by month our offerings for the Unified Budget exceeded those of last year. In the year of 1942 we raised \$218,291.23 for the Unified Budget and set our goal for \$250,000 for 1943. On July 1, 1943, the Board of Directors met and raised the goal to \$300,000. And the indications are at this writing that we will reach that amount or more.

Figures go a long way in revealing the spiritual condition of any people, and the reports both of the number of churches giving to the Unified Budget, and the amount given, bring gladness to our hearts and give us hope that before many years Oklahoma Baptists will have so united their hearts, hands, and purses that the regular contributions through this channel will provide bountifully for the labors always pressing to be done.

As an indication of the growth of interest in, and support of, the causes included in the Unified Budget, we present the following interesting tables:

1933: Co-operative Program, \$87,537.01; Designated Gifts, \$32,867.91; Total, \$120,404.92.

We must develop the financial program from the local church to the Convention. With this in mind, we asked the Associations to set their own goals for the Unified Budget in 1944. Every District Association, with a complete picture of its former financial performances before it, has voted a goal for itself. Why not? An association is a miniature state convention in session with messengers pres-

ent from the co-operating churches. Every interest of the Convention is represented in the District Associations. The Unified Budget goal has been passed to the Convention by the messengers of the churches in association assembled, and not to the churches from the Convention. Furthermore, we have not encouraged the Associations to set for themselves an impossible objective, but one that could be reached with reasonable effort.

The sum total of the goals thus adopted by the thirty-three associations is \$308,575.00. It would seem, therefore, that with this procedure we have reasonable expectancy of reaching the above amount.

We therefore recommend to the Convention a Unified Budget of \$308,575.00 for the calendar year 1944; the funds to be divided on the following basis:

1. To the Co-operative Program, as a first preferred item, \$96,000.00. (This \$96,000 is our working budget out of which all expenses will be paid. This amount to be divided on a sixty-four basis.)

2. That \$34,000 go to the Oklahoma Baptist University (in lieu the endowment) and the Ministers' Retirement Plan.

3. That \$25,000 go to the building of the Boys' Dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University.

(The above figures represent \$155,000 of the total Unified Budget.)

4. That the balance of \$153,575.00 be divided fifty-fifty between state and southwide causes with nothing deducted therefrom.

We give below a summary of the amount paid to the Unified Budget from the various associations in 1943, and the goals which they voted for themselves in 1944.

The total receipts, including all funds received through our office, both designated and undesignated, for the year 1943 were \$676,365.94. Of this amount there was contributed through the Unified Budget, \$317,377.70.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That it be our policy to operate on a cash basis.
2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best administration and promotion of our work.
3. That we instruct all agencies provided for in the budget not to make any debt during the year 1944.
4. That the 1944 State Mission budget be projected on a basis that will insure no deficit at the close of the year.
5. That we continue the ten per cent contingency fund from the In-the-State objects as a safeguard against possible deficits.
6. That a substantial sum be set aside to cushion the shock of post-war conditions.

STATE MISSIONS

Oklahoma's population is cosmopolitan. It is one of the melting pots of the nation. Out of this heterogeneous citizenship we are growing a Baptist empire. With our unlimited resources, our enterprising, militant people, the outlook is as bright as the promises of God, and there is a rainbow of hope in our Baptist sky. Many churches in Oklahoma are performing a fine State Mission service in the establishment of missions, Sunday school and preaching services, contiguous to their churches. With the elimination of distance by the automobile, the churches should extend their sphere of influence and push back the horizon of their own neighborhoods.

It cannot be too often repeated that State Missions is the backbone of our denominational life. Upon its strength depends the ability of the whole denomination in any State to press onward, ever bearing larger loads, and conducting a more vigorous work for our Master. We rejoice in the forward steps taken during the recent year, and the growing strength of our denomination in Oklahoma because of these steps.

More of our rural and village churches are actively engaged in the support of the denominational program than ever before in our history. Many gains have been made in enlisting them to this end. But the major emphasis of the State Mission workers just now is in bringing these churches to where they will appreciate the value of a resident ministry and make provisions for securing the same.

There is a growing demand from Associations for aid in caring for the expenses of missionary workers who can supervise the general work and at the same time answer the calls from weak churches that are not able to secure pastors.

There is yet much land to be occupied in Oklahoma. Baptists are growing rapidly in numbers. New churches are being organized, and weak churches are being built up. But the rate of growth is all too slow for the vast field that awaits our labors. There are vast areas without Baptist churches and large sections where there is not a resident pastor. This is the time to enlarge our work and enter these inviting fields.

People are inherently religious. Created in the image of God, it

is impossible for them to be satisfied without some form of expression for their religious instincts. The challenge of the hour is imperative. We must do something about these destitute sections of our state or else they will become breeding grounds for religious diseases which sooner or later will spread into those sections where our churches have been planted. There is only one way to counteract contagious diseases—whether they be of the flesh or of the spirit—and that is to throw into the lifeblood of the people an anti-toxin that will destroy them. Vigorous evangelism, the establishment of churches under the supervision of capable pastors, teaching and training our people, are the ways to defend ourselves against the dangers which are already showing themselves in our State.

We have no statistical report of the fine work rendered by some of the associations.

RURAL WORK

A deep and abiding interest is developing among our people over the sad plight of many rural churches. This is true all over the Southland. Oklahoma does not have as many rural churches as some of the Southern states, but those we do have are finding it difficult to maintain an effective church program. There is sorely needed a more strenuous campaign along this line. With the help of the various field workers the movement to better the country churches will gain momentum, but still be slow in spreading. The Home Mission Board is launching a rural church program. It would seem to your Board that some arrangement might be worked out with the Home Mission Board so that the effort to enlist and develop our rural constituency could be more vigorously pressed.

Some of our states have employed a rural church missionary. We have three of them, and their work is proving quite valuable. It is our deep conviction that Oklahoma Baptist University and the seminaries should put more stress on rural sociology and the needs and opportunities of the rural field and thereby increase the interest of graduates from these institutions in going to rural fields to plant their lives.

EVANGELISM

Oklahoma and Southern Baptists have majored on evangelism through the years. This is the reason for the great growth of our cause in Oklahoma and beyond. We must never become a family church. Our fore-fathers laid well the foundations for our present work. They preached the Gospel and called sinners to repentance; they baptized and indoctrinated believers. So must we also if we grow and prosper. Our state evangelist, district and associational missionaries have done much in re-emphasizing the importance of winning the lost of our state to Christ. These fine workers, supported in all or in part by the Baptist General Convention, are holding meetings in every section of Oklahoma, in all types of churches. The value of these men can be measured in one way, by the Lord's blessing upon their work; and still another way, by the popularity of their work in the thinking of our people. Oklahoma and Southern Baptists must keep alive the evangelistic passion. The fires of evangelism have burned on a thousand sacred altars.

War, which emphasizes hate and killing, makes more difficult the already difficult task of winning men to Christ. Hate,

which is an integral part of war, is incompatible with the love of God that must burn upon the altar of the heart if one is to win souls. The organized classes and departments in the Sunday schools have become the vehicles used by churches to contact the lost and win them to Christ. The organizational life of the churches has been greatly disarranged since the war work has moved multitudes of our people from their moorings. We may not be able to check this decline in baptisms entirely, but we must strive to check it as much as possible. Our main business will always be evangelizing the people.

ASSOCIATIONAL MODERATORS

We wish to express our grateful thanks and undying gratitude to the moderators of the various associations for the work they are doing to enlist the churches in their respective associations in the support of the Unified Budget. An increasing number of these fellow workers are realizing the need of keeping the associational group at work during the entire year. The moderators of the associations, and others of the general officers of the associations, have become, to all intents and purposes, assistants to the Executive Secretary in promoting the causes of the Kingdom in the various associations. And an increasing number of moderators are coming to see themselves as directors of bodies which should function all the time. These fine leaders use the Workers' Conference as an occasion to promote the Unified Budget and kindred Kingdom causes throughout the year. We record our sincere thanks and appreciation to the moderators.

CHURCH DEBTS

From all sections of the state come reports of the final payment on local church debts from churches both large and small. The Secretary will have participated in the dedication free of debt of nine churches from September 1 to Christmas.

Our churches have been wise in taking advantage of the increased earnings of their people to retire obligations upon the church buildings. And those churches that have not liquidated their indebtedness entirely are trimming it down month by month. This is a happy situation, both for the local churches and the denomination. Naturally as the local indebtedness is lifted the churches have more money to give to outside causes. A number of churches during the past year greatly increased their gifts to the Unified Budget because of having paid off their local debts.

We would urge the churches while money is easy to secure to pay off their church debts. This will be a good thing for them and also for the denomination.

DEPARTMENT LEADERSHIP

The teaching and training department of the Baptist General Convention is led by E. W. Westmoreland, general secretary. He is ably assisted by:

Regular workers: Sophia Duerksen, Young People's leader; Mrs. J. W. Barron, Junior leader; and Dorothy Sneed, office secretary.

Approved workers: Mrs. C. E. Wilbanks, Intermediate worker; Jewell Kirkpatrick, Primary worker; Mrs. Walter H. Crowder, Beginner worker; and Mrs. G. H. Caudill, Cradle Roll worker.

In addition, the Sunday School Board sends to our state a group of expert workers in the field of teaching and training, who render invaluable service to the churches of Oklahoma. We acknowledge

a debt of gratitude to these dynamic leaders and to the Board that has matched us with men and money to aid in this important work.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL

The work of the Sunday School Department, viewed from any angle, gives us cause for thanksgiving and rejoicing. From a small beginning years ago, this department has grown, developed, and multiplied its numbers, fortified its work, and has helped to solidify all phases of the denominational program. There were 10,585 awards given in 1942. We have in Oklahoma 1,082 Sunday schools, with an enrollment of 166,241. Forty-four have reached the Standard of Excellence. While the growth in the Sunday School Department has been marked along all lines, Secretary Westmoreland and his efficient helpers are not by any means satisfied with what has been done. The large number not enlisted in Sunday school constitutes not only a challenge, but a clarion call for renewed emphasis upon every phase of Sunday school service.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION

The Baptist Training Union of Oklahoma has made fine progress through the years. The armed services taking away most of our young men has greatly depleted Training Union attendance, but in spite of the handicaps under which this department is laboring, they are still making fine progress. We now have 3,541 Training Unions in Oklahoma, with a membership of 52,395. The awards in 1942 were 14,095. Oklahoma has attained most of the goals set for the five-year program launched by the Sunday School Board. This work, like the work of the Sunday School Department, is now in position to do far greater things in every realm of its field for the advancement of the work of our Lord.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The Baptist Student Union is filling one of the most urgent and essential needs in our generation. In Oklahoma there are 42 colleges with thousands of students enrolled. Thousands of Baptist students are found upon their campuses. The B. S. U. is functioning on the campuses of many of these schools and doing an outstanding work with the students. The Baptist General Convention is helping to pay the salaries of five full or part time student secretaries. There is no way to measure, calculate, or discern the value of the work of this department. It is dealing today with the leadership of tomorrow.

The Baptist Student movement is greatly supplementing the work of the local church in state school centers where throngs of our Baptist youth are seeking preparation for a successful life. Since careers are very largely determined during college days, it is of the utmost importance to see to it that our Baptist boys and girls away from home, and often under the pressure of materialistic ideals, have a spiritual stabilizer that will preserve them to the faith of their fathers.

BROTHERHOOD AND INSTITUTIONAL WORK

The newest department of our organized work is the Brotherhood. The Brotherhood work, under the leadership of Porter Routh, has been carried on for the past two years and has shown marvelous advances. One of our greatest encouragements at the present time is the awakened interest among our laymen. The Brotherhood meetings, both in churches and associations, bring together large groups of men to think and pray and plan for their work. Such

meetings as these, together with increased activities among our men in the local church, presages a new and better day for the advancement of Kingdom interests. When the dormant manpower of our churches is thoroughly awakened our work will be increased along all lines.

When Porter Routh resigned as Brotherhood Secretary to take up the work as editor of the **Baptist Messenger**, the Board decided to widen the scope of the Brotherhood work. Dr. Elmer Ridgeway, pastor of the Oklahoma City Immanuel Baptist Church, was elected as Brotherhood and Institutional Secretary to carry on the work of the Brotherhoods and in addition to enlist givers to build and equip our starving institutions. He took over his duties on August 1 and has made fine progress in the months following.

Let us pray for, work with, and encourage in every way the secretary of this department, the district lay leaders, the associational leaders, and the men in the local churches as they carry on their enlarged program through the coming years.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The work of the women in our state gives cause for profound gratitude to God. The Woman's Missionary Union has had a large and creditable part in every phase of our denominational life. They have remained true to the aims and purposes of the organization. Multitudes of women in the churches, inspired by the Woman's Missionary Union, have come to deeper consecration, a more sacrificial devotion, and an unflagging zeal in the promotion of missionary work. Intensity in effort and perseverance in spirit, characterize our women in their work. Through prosperity and depression, encouragements and discouragements, days of high morale and low morale, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, guided by Mrs. Berta K. Spooner and Mrs. H. B. Wilhoyte, has gone right on from one achievement and glorious victory to another. The offerings from the weeks of prayer sponsored by the women have greatly increased the receipts to State, Home and Foreign Missions. The W. M. U. has literally mothered the Baptist Children's Home at Oklahoma City by providing cash and clothing for the orphans. They have spent thousands of dollars in building and equipping the fine Girls' Dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University. They have provided scholarships for worthy young women who could not otherwise attend school. They have sent hundreds of dollars' worth of supplies to the Baptist hospitals at Miami and Muskogee. They have sponsored the Hundred Thousand Club and made it really effective in Oklahoma. They have co-operated with the Executive Secretary in every good work and word. We wish to take this opportunity to express to them our profoundest gratitude and thanks.

DR. ROUTH RESIGNS

Dr. E. C. Routh came to the editorship of the **Baptist Messenger** early in 1928 and served faithfully and well in that capacity for fifteen years. We had come to think of Dr. Routh as a permanent fixture in Oklahoma Baptist life. Therefore, Oklahoma Baptists were shocked and grieved when he resigned July 1 to go to Richmond as editor of **The Commission**—the organ of the Foreign Mission Board.

Dr. and Mrs. Routh had both become so identified with Oklahoma Baptist life that it is difficult to visualize a Convention without them. Dr. Routh is not only a gifted editor, a gentleman and a scholar, but a denominational leader and seer. His counsel is wise, his judgment on any denominational policy or problem is valuable. The Secretary often profited by the wise counsel and guidance of this great hearted editor, who was modest, unassuming, gentle, and

who always thought of the best interests of the Kingdom and never of himself. We all miss Dr. Routh. We heartily congratulate the Foreign Mission Board on securing his valuable services. His heart is in foreign missions. He gave a daughter to Africa. While editor of the **Baptist Messenger** he prayed, labored, and wrote in the interest of the great foreign mission enterprise. Oklahoma Baptists love Dr. Routh with undying devotion.

THE BAPTIST MESSENGER

The **Baptist Messenger** ranks high among the Baptist papers of the South. It acquaints Oklahoma Baptists with every phase of Christ's program of missions, Christian education, and benevolence. It is our most effective enlistment agency and indispensable for the promotion of our work.

The value of the **Baptist Messenger** cannot be adequately appraised. It carries a storehouse of facts each week to thousands upon thousands of our constituency. It is a source of information inspiring articles. It carries column after column of distinctive and inspiration. It carries columns of strong editorials, and other Baptist beliefs, thus it is a means of indoctrination. Proper information together with the right type of inspiration spurs our people to greater activities.

The paper has had a steady growth. It has grown in the last fifteen years from 2,500 to near 30,000 subscribers. We believe the time has come for this Convention to address itself with serious purpose to increasing the circulation of the **Baptist Messenger**. We should run the circulation to 35,000 during 1944. It can be done and the returns from an informed membership will justify the effort and expense of each church that puts in in the budget.

When Dr. Routh resigned to become editor of the **Commission**, a committee composed of Drs. J. W. Storer, Auguie Henry, B. M. Jackson, Rupert Naney, H. G. Bennett, H. W. Stigler, and Andrew Potter, was appointed to recommend a successor. Plenty of time was given for the brotherhood to consider the matter and reflect the opinion of the people. The first and only meeting of the committee was held a month and a half later when Porter Routh, an illustrious son of a brilliant father, was unanimously recommended, and on July 2, 1943, was unanimously chosen as editor by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention.

The selection of Porter Routh as editor has met with general approval and the circulation of the paper has increased steadily each week. Porter Routh has had special training in religious journalism and has given evidence of outstanding editorial ability.

The **Baptist Messenger** has today the largest circulation in its history. We should join with all our forces and agencies to increase the number of readers as rapidly as possible. There is a Southwide movement for the increased circulation of our papers. This concerted action will greatly stimulate our people in enlarging the scope and influence of the **Baptist Messenger**. The importance of this matter calls for more than acquiescing in a movement. It calls for concerted co-operation backed by such a spirit of perseverance that we will go to great lengths in increasing the circulation of our paper.

Churches should place the **Baptist Messenger** in their church budget. This will make the budget more easily raised and will bring to the members of our churches information not only necessary but indispensable to the most rapid progress of our work. We congratulate Porter Routh and bid him godspeed.

BOOK STORE

The Baptist Book Store is owned and operated by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. It fills a great need in our state and is rendering an ever-enlarging service. Good literature is essential to the best interests of our denomination. The Book Store has enjoyed, under the management of Mr. H. Kay Killingsworth, an ever-increasing volume of business. Mr. Killingsworth and his associates in the Baptist Book Store, render invaluable service to the denomination. Our Book Store is one of the best in the South with modern equipment, with adequate window display space. Our store is rendering a greatly enlarged service to the denomination. While owned and operated by the Sunday School Board it is still our institution and should have our full support and patronage.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our home for orphan children is a great asset to Oklahoma Baptists. The three new buildings, two cottages and administration building erected in 1941 and dedicated in April, 1942, are the best equipped and most modern in the South. When our orphanage plant is finished, it will be one of the finest in the nation and one of which Oklahoma Baptists may justly be proud.

We acknowledge a debt of gratitude to Walter Gray, Roy Staton, Guy James, James M. Johnson, Tom E. Earp, and other members of the Men's Bible Class of the First Baptist Church and also to Governor Kerr, for the paved roads that circle our grounds. This fine group of men were tireless in their efforts to give us a road.

Reverend H. Truman Maxey, the resident manager, with Mrs. Gladys Dicken, head matron, and their associates, are doing an excellent job at the Baptist orphanage. We have every reason to be proud of the boys and girls who have been brought up in that Home. Forty-seven of our young men are now in the armed forces. Two, Albert Steele and Harry Scott, have given their lives for their country. One fine boy is now in Annapolis.

We refer you to a special report elsewhere on the future plans and program for our orphanage.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Under the wise and capable leadership of our princely president, Dr. John W. Raley, Oklahoma Baptist University is making rapid strides toward higher attainments in culture and curriculum. There has never been a day when it was so hard to maintain Christian schools as now. The difficulties they face are many. The Army calling for young men eighteen and over has depleted the schools everywhere of their manpower. Some of our noble faculty, including the dean, have gone into the armed services. Dr. Raley—always alert and ahead of the procession—has secured approximately five hundred soldiers who are training in Oklahoma Baptist University. This has saved the day for O. B. U. and is of valuable assistance to the war effort.

Oklahoma Baptist University is rendering invaluable service to the denomination. We could not get along without the school, but if O. B. U. is to be continued and make a worthwhile contribution to our denominational life and the on-going of the Kingdom of God, it must be given adequate financial support, provided with buildings and equipment, and kept free from the strangulation of excessive debt. We must maintain and enlarge Oklahoma Baptist University. It is a training camp for leaders, a source of information and inspiration. It fills a unique place in our denominational life

and wields a limitless influence for the cause of Christ. It is more popular with our Baptist constituency today than it has ever been. Too great value cannot be placed upon our Christian school. Oklahoma Baptist University is essential to Oklahoma Baptists—a place where Christian principles, ideals, and doctrines are taught and inculcated without apology. Just as the training camps serve in training soldiers for our Army, our school serves as a training camp preparing our young people for the duties, responsibilities, and various phases of service in life and Kingdom enterprises.

Today there are 96 young preachers in Oklahoma Baptist University preparing themselves for the ministry. Not only are these a line of defense, they are an army for conquest.

Let us decide once and for all that we will both control and support Oklahoma Baptist University. If we support the University, we can control it. If we do not support it, we have no right to control it.

BAPTIST CHAPLAINS

During the past year, we have received letters from Oklahoma Baptist men serving as Chaplains in all parts of the world. These letters warm your heart as you read of the work these men are doing with servicemen in camps in this country, in the South Pacific, in India, Africa, Palestine, Iceland, England, and even in Italy.

Reports are not complete, but these Oklahoma Baptist chaplains have won literally thousands to Christ during the past year. It has not been an easy matter for them to leave their homes and loved ones, but they have been glad to give their best.

It is impossible for anyone to accurately say when hostilities will cease, but it is not too early for Oklahoma Baptists to address themselves seriously to the obligation to use these chaplains to the utmost when they return to civilian service. Of course, some will be called to churches at once, but during the transition period there ought to be some plan devised whereby these men might be used as Christian soldiers on the battlefield of sin in Oklahoma, proclaiming the unsearchable riches of God. In order to make this work possible, it will be necessary for a reserve fund to be built up to help finance this work. I believe that it would be good religion and good sense to see that this is done.

We now have eighty-three Oklahoma Baptist men serving as chaplains in the Army and Navy. They are listed below:

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

The Ministers' Retirement Plan grows in favor and is proving a great blessing not only to our ministry, but to our denominational work. Great strides have been made in the progress of this plan in Oklahoma, but much remains to be done. All of our general workers should do what they can in seeking to get every preacher in Oklahoma into the plan. Every church and every preacher should seek to make this possible.

At this writing we have 533 pastors, chaplains, and denominational workers participating in one of the denomination's retirement plans. Dues are now being paid on a salary base of \$55,000 per month which is 87% of the total salaries reported in last year's minutes. Many of the pastors receiving smaller salaries have not entered the Plan. Many of the young preachers have not availed themselves of the opportunity of providing for their future. These two facts enable us to readily see that those who will need the help most have not yet availed themselves of its benefits. Every pastor and church in Oklahoma should be in the Ministers' Retirement Plan.

The total number of members of the Plan who have retired is forty-three, six of which retired during the year 1943.

CONCLUSION

There are many difficulties and obstacles that hinder the progress of the Kingdom of God. Many things that are barricading the way on. And there is only one direction for our Baptist people, and that is onward. Our failure to be challenged by the greatest task ever given to man, our indifference, complacency, and placidity, are blockades on our way to victory. We are so easily discouraged. We allow fear to dominate us and fail to push the battles to the gates. Yes, there are many things to discourage and hinder us, but they are not insuperable. We should not be dominated by fears, discouragements, and forebodings. God's Word warns: "He that observeth the wind shall not sow; and he that regardeth the cloud shall not reap." Faith, not appearances, should be our guide.

"Faith treads on the world and on hell,
It vanquishes death and despair,
And, what is still stranger to tell,
It overcomes Heaven by prayer."

The prospects are as bright as the promises of God if we go on. The harvest was never more abundant; the forces never more interested; and the Master's challenge never greater than today. "But ye shall receive power after the Holy Ghost has come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto Me." We need this power. We need a new sense of our obligation as the children of God. Our sin is the lack of fidelity to our trust.

We are not in a losing battle. The work we are in has the promise of perpetuity. We glory in numbers but the quantitative

phase of our work is not our greatest joy. Our greatest joy is found in our qualitative assets.

Report of the Hundred Thousand Club

A brighter day dawned May 20, 1933, in Washington, D. C., when the bewildered messengers of the Southern Baptist Convention adopted the Hundred Thousand Club as a plan to free our denomination from the crushing and burdensome debt of \$6,500,000. The day grew brighter as debts were paid and the other work carried on.

The Hundred Thousand Club has rendered invaluable service to our denomination. All of our institutions are now entirely debt-free. There is only one remaining obligation to be met. This last obligation is a Convention note held by a New York bank. It represents the consolidated debts of the Convention itself for capital investments at Ridgecrest and money advanced for missions, education and other work. This debt was \$565,000 but it is now a little less than \$200,000.

Did you ever see a coon dog come in for the kill? Now is the time for every one to come in for the kill for the last of these vicious debts. The fight is nearly over but some things must be done if we are debt-free in '43.

Your committee therefore earnestly recommends:

1. That all of our churches, organizations, and people make a special effort to secure money to pay this Convention note in full by December 31st.

2. That members of the Hundred Thousand Club pay up, and pay an additional two dollars during the next two months.

3. That we urge as many people as possible to join for the next two months and give the two dollars for the final liquidation of these debts.

4. That all Debt Funds be paid early in December and that church treasurers send these funds promptly and properly marked to Dr. Potter's office so that they can be sent on to the Executive Committee in Nashville before December 31.

5. That you do your part and do it now, so when the debts are all paid and the shouting day comes you can be numbered with the shouting group who did their part to make Southern Baptists Debt-free in '43.

Home Mission Report

Let us, in this report, take a backward and a forward look. A backward look to the accomplishments of the past years and a forward look to the plans for the future of the Home Mission Board.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE PAST YEAR

On May 12, 1943 the last payment of \$55,000 was made on the debt of the Home Mission Board. This debt stood at the peak of \$2,425,531.91 in September of 1928.

A total of 450 workers are now employed by the Home Board. During the year forty-three mission stations have been opened and six churches constituted. The missionaries distributed 14,445 Bibles and Testaments and 672,093 tracts. They preached 37,657 sermons, and led 15,928 to profess faith in Christ.

Miss Kathleen Mallory, W.M.U. secretary, states that the total of the Annie W. Armstrong Offering to Home Missions, as reported by the states, was \$280,714.26.

Dr. Alfred Carpenter, field secretary and superintendent of Camp work, reports approximately 750 Baptist ministers in the Army and over a hundred in the Navy, making a total of around 850 in the Service. One of our chaplains, Guy Henry Turner, former pastor of Central Baptist Church, Memphis, Tennessee, has been reported by the War Department as "killed in action" on the Aleutians. These men are doing a great work. Let us remember them in our daily prayers.

The newest department of our Home Mission Work is that of "City Missions," under the direction of Dr. Solomon F. Dowis. The program is now under way in twenty-three cities in the South and it is likely that two more will be added this year.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

As we look to the future, with the debt out of the way, what are the plans of the Board? At the Home Mission Conference at Ridgecrest in August, the members of the Home Mission Board discussed at length plans for Home Mission work in the future. No official action concerning any definite work was taken, but the policy of the Board concerning the work in the future was considered and the Board expressed a unanimous opinion on methods of procedure in laying out its work for the future. Some of the most important conclusions reached in the discussion are given here as copied from the Southern Baptist Home Mission Magazine for October 1943.

"It was the unanimous conviction of the members of the Board, that in making out the budget of work for the future, care should be taken to avoid the possibility of debt.

"Since we do not have, and more than likely will not have, money enough to do all the work that ought to be done, it will be necessary to select the most important fields of need. The selection will be made on the basis of careful surveys.

"On account of the burdensome debt, the Board has not been able to pay many of its missionaries an adequate salary. It has not been able to equip the mission stations for efficient service. Many new chapels are needed and homes for missionaries. Provision for kindergartens and Vacation Bible Schools should be made.

"In order to co-ordinate the various types of work that we are doing, and to secure adequate proportionate support and enlargement for each type of work in the future, the work of the Board should be budgeted, giving to each phase of work a definite amount of money to be expended each year and that expenditures should be held within the allocation made for each type of activity.

"The Board voted unanimously to set up a reserve fund of at least \$150,000 to meet any decrease in receipts that might occur after the war is over, and, if there should be no decrease in receipts as we hope, the fund will be used in meeting special Home Mission needs in the future."

Dr. Lawrence states in the same issue of the Home Mission Magazine, "Prospects are good for the beginning of a program for the revitalization of the country church by the Home Mission Board in co-operation with the state mission boards. The first movement looking in this direction has been taken by Dr. Andrew Potter and his Board in Oklahoma. At the meeting of their Board, it was voted to co-operate with the Home Mission Board in launching a great rural mission work in Oklahoma. We shall begin immediately to make our plans for co-operation with the Oklahoma Board in a revitalization of the country church program."

From the plans stated above, it can be seen that under the Board's competent leadership, and the wise management of our Secretary, Dr. Lawrence, with the continued help of Southern Baptists in providing the money, and by the help of God, we are ready to go forward in a great Home Mission Program in the years ahead.

Report of Social Service Committee

The conditions of modern American life, which have presented problems of constantly increasing complexity and importance, have been greatly aggravated by the advent of war. Already there had been a marked relaxing of moral restraints, a lowering of moral standards, greater disrespect for law and increased crime. Already thoughtful leaders in all ranks of life were endeavoring to warn the people of America of the rising tidal wave of vice, corruption and crime, and the dangers of complacent apathy and mawkish sentimentalism.

By 1939 our crime bill had reached the then staggering sum of \$15,000,000.00, or about \$120 for every man, woman and child. It equaled our annual food bill, exceeded our tax bill and quadrupled the amount spent for education. It resulted from nearly a million and a half serious crimes such as murder, manslaughter, rape, robbery, burglary, and aggravated assault; and thirteen million lesser crimes:—one offense for every nine persons; committed by an army of criminals numbering three and a half times the students in our colleges and universities and nearly four and a half times the teach-

ers in all the school of America; an army numbering more than 4,750,000 individuals. Thirty-three persons were murdered every day, a serious crime committed every twenty-two seconds.

These figures become the more appalling when we realize that 12 per cent of our murderers, 28 per cent of our robbers, 24 per cent of our rapists, and 52 per cent of our automobile thieves were under twenty-one years of age. The greatest crime problem today is that of youth. Delinquency had been steadily increasing during the years before the war. Its subsequent rise has been sharp and alarming. Especially and tragically has this been true with reference to girls in their teens. During the first six months of 1942 there were 6,020 arrests of girls under 21. During the corresponding period of the present year there were 9,915 such arrests, an increase of 64.7 per cent, and exceeding by 236 the number for the entire year of 1941. For crimes against property (burglarly robbery, theft and related crimes) arrests of girls under 21 increased 30.8 per cent; for miscellaneous offenses 62.8 per cent. But for offenses against common decency, including drunkenness, vagrancy, disorderly conduct, prostitution, commercialized vice and adultery, the increase in such arrests rose to the appalling figure of 89.5 per cent—almost doubled in one year. The increased participation in crime on the part of young girls is further indicated by the fact that while during the past decade the highest crime rate among girls had been in the ages of 21, 22 and 23, the age dropped to 19 and 18 during the first six months of the present year. These statistics are shocking. They are surprising only to the blind. In the words of Mr. J. Edgar Hoover, "This is a problem which no community can neglect without suffering the consequences in terms of degraded youth and rising crime costs."

Closely interwoven with this problem, and partly responsible for it is the liquor evil. The liquor forces, backed by unlimited finances and aided by some of the shrewdest brains in America, have taken full advantage of the situation arising out of this war. A most carefully planned campaign is in progress to the end that the conclusion of the war will find millions of our youth "educated" into becoming customers of the liquor interests. Every conceivable appeal is being made to youth. Oklahoma has constitutional prohibition. Conditions, particularly in cities and towns near our training camps and defense plants, are far from ideal. But we may well thank God that we have not voted repeal. Beer-dance halls have been a source of vice and crime, especially of delinquency and sex crimes. In the last legislature the House of Representatives passed a bill intended to separate beer and public dancing. In the Senate this bill was discarded and a different one substituted. The bill as passed has many defects but is a step in the right direction. Its constitutionality is under attack by certain beer dealers of Tulsa and Oklahoma City interested in the profit derived from the sale of beer in dance halls. The case is pending in the Criminal Court of Appeals.

The responsibility for these conditions does not lie at the door of youth. Again quoting Mr. Hoover, "The underworld would not exist except for conditions in the underworld.—Unfortunately, the responsibility for youthful law infraction today rests more upon the shoulders of the adult than it does upon that of youth. It exists largely because of the lack of discipline. Thirty million homes hold the solution. If the younger generation is properly trained and the proper examples set before it, the safety of tomorrow is assured.—The course is from the high chair. It is up to the parents to see that the end is not the electric chair. The American home holds the ultimate solution to our crime problem."

And in this battle for righteousness and the solution of these problems, the church, as a living, vital, social force, with its incomparable message and mission, must play a most important part. "The antidote for lawlessness is decency and the development of character." The exercise of Christian character cannot be limited to the Lord's day and the house of worship. It is virile and effective in a community and state only as it finds practical application in the business, the social, the civic, the political and the governmental affairs of that community and state. We need a sober, aroused, Christian, public sentiment determined upon the solution of these problems. Youthful and first offenders should not be incarcerated with hardened criminals. We have parole laws; we need a parole system devoted to the assistance and rehabilitation of those entitled to another chance. We need the enforcement of present laws and the enactment and enforcement of further legislation and ordinances for the prevention and eradication of these evils. On battlefields far away our boys are dying for the ideals of America. That their sacrifice may not be in vain; that righteousness and justice and honor and clean living may continue to characterize the American way of life; to that end may our hearts and minds be devoted.

75. The Oklahoma Baptist University program was introduced by Mr. John Hall Jones, personnel director of the University.

Annual Report of the President of Oklahoma Baptist University

The Report of the President and the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University to the Baptist Convention:

Progress has been real at Oklahoma Baptist University during the past year and is best demonstrated by two events: first, the acceptance of Oklahoma Baptist University in the State System of Higher Education as a constituent institution; and second, the decision of the Board of Trustees to contract with the Government to train a unit of the Army Air Forces.

The phenomena of new strength gained through struggle has been dramatically demonstrated in the life of O. B. U. during this critical era. At the time when many American colleges were curtailing their programs or closing their doors, your University readjusted its program for intensification of training "To Win The War and Plan The Peace."

Two purposes of O. B. U. transmitted to us from the founding fathers are well known to Oklahoma Baptists and to all who have had even indirect relations with the school. Our intent to produce trained leaders with ideas and ideals continues to be uppermost in the program, plans, and policies of the administration.

THREE SCHOOLS IN ONE

The personnel of the University which has traditionally

been students in the colleges of Liberal Arts or Fine Arts has been expanded to include instruction to meet the exigencies of this era. Ministerial students, pre-medical, and pre-law students continue to attend in substantial numbers along with music majors and coeds who are in preparation for practically every field of human endeavor. To these have been added trainees for war industries under the U. S. Office of Education program of Engineering, Science, and Management War Training. We have led the citizens of Shawnee to exceed all other sections of the state in per capita participation in these nation-wide courses. The School of Aviation has served for many years as a training center for the Civil Aeronautics Administration and until March 1 of this year we had trained a total of over 600 pilots. The Army Air Forces are now utilizing the facilities of the Flight School and a large portion of O. B. U. faculty in a program of pre-aviation cadet training. During the past seven months, 1500 aviation cadets have studied in this detachment, taking a variety of courses including history, geography, English, first aid, physics, mathematics, and physical fitness. From early morning until late at night these three elements of our student body fill the class rooms, libraries, and laboratories in a progressive program of preparation for fullest participation in this world struggle.

TRAINED 2717 IN A YEAR

Three hundred and thirty-three civilians have enrolled in the college of Liberal Arts and Fine Arts this fall. Three hundred and three adult citizens have received war training in night classes during the past year and 1500 air cadets have been assigned to O. B. U. for training. To these we add 128 Liaison pilots trained for Army and Navy under CAA, 45 who came for the summer school for preachers, 18 who enrolled for the Teachers Workshop, and 723 regular students, or a grand total of 2717 who have received some training on Bison Hill during the past year.

PLANT IS IMPROVED

Progress in plant improvement has been made through the contract with the Army. At the expense of the Air Forces and for the benefit of the soldiers, class room facilities have been increased and improved and other services of the University have been greatly enhanced. The library has been moved from Shawnee Hall to quarters formerly known as the old gymnasium. Special gifts from friends and from the general budget increased the quality and quantity of books to fill the new stacks which surround the adequate and attractive reading room. The former library space is now utilized as a physics laboratory and three lecture rooms. The basement of Montgomery Hall has been converted into a cafeteria for civilian students, a P-X and day-room for soldiers. Campus walkways have been extended, landscaping continues, and shrubs increasingly enhance the beauty of the campus.

DEGREES NOW STANDARD

The action of the Board of Trustees in making application to the State Regents of Higher Education in Oklahoma

for accreditation and acceptance as a constituent member was a farsighted step in the progress of the University toward standardization. The report of the special committee making the investigation was highly commendable of every phase of our work. They were particularly impressed with the interest of the Convention shown in the special provision of library funds with which the University is charged to purchase basic books for a liberal arts college. So, in spite of war and disruption, the loss of students and the consequent loss of income, we can say that during 1942-43 O. B. U. has made definite progress.

SPIRITUAL LIFE IS VITAL

The progressive outreach of O. B. U. includes the present ministry of 95 ministerial students who serve churches in all sections of Oklahoma and three adjoining states. During the summer months these young ministers preached 2910 sermons, had personal talks with 1470 unsaved people and reported 836 conversions, plus 1043 rededications, and 758 additions to the church. In line of duty these ministers in training traveled during the summer alone, 92,737 miles. Their monthly mileage girdles the globe and their spiritual ministry is equivalent to the work of many full time men. We have 100% enlistment in active church membership of all Baptist students by the BSU and a spiritual influence of alumni to the ends of the earth. The University would not be possible without the support of Christian homes from which Christian youth come. We are dependent upon the gifts of our constituency whom we exist to serve. Our greatest need is more active and specific aid in the enrollment of fine high school graduates because our product can never exceed the material which is sent to your University for training. If we meet the needs of the coming era with an adequate leadership, we must have finer youth in larger numbers for the creative experience of Christian Education in a growing University.

BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

The program now planned for adequate plant and other suitable facilities and faculty should become the major concern of this Convention. The completion of our plant requires an adequate library building, a dormitory for men which will accommodate 250, and a combination chapel—fine arts building. It is proposed that the dormitory funds now being set aside by the Convention be added to through a special campaign for such an amount as may be considered by the architects as sufficient to construct the building plant. In the past, \$1,000 per man has been considered a requirement in dormitory construction. This then would mean a total sum of \$250,000 would be needed.

POST-WAR PLAN CHALLENGE DENOMINATION

It is possible that the library building can be provided without recourse to the Convention organization. The combination chapel and fine arts building should constitute our major goal immediately upon the completion of the campaign for dormitory funds. It should reflect the cultural and religious attitudes of a great denomination, and by its very construction should inspire the youth who walk through its halls to higher and nobler things.

In the post-war planning program the personnel of the faculty should be of primary consideration. It is our purpose

to add only those persons who are fully qualified and whose addition will strengthen us as we strive toward complete standardization.

Given the plant envisioned and the faculty we should be able to care for the training needs of our denominational life for the next generation. To this end we dedicate our energies and appeal to this Convention for its full support.

84. The following Recommendation of the Board of Directors regarding the American Bible Society was presented and motion carried for its adoption.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Whereas, the Convention, together with the Southern Baptist Convention and other Baptist state conventions, has already recognized the essential world-wide service rendered by the American Bible Society in its missionary non-profit work of translation, publication and distribution of the Scriptures, and has commended this work to the interest and financial support of our people, and

Whereas, the American Bible Society today, in addition to the regular work of supplying Scriptures for World-wide Missions, is also (1) providing New Testaments and other Scriptures in many languages for our Armed Forces, (2) supplying Scriptures in many languages for War Prisoners and Refugees and (3) preparing now to send large quantities of Scriptures to Europe and Asia as soon as these lands are set free, **Therefore, Be It Resolved**, in view of these needs and opportunities.

First, that we earnestly request our churches and our people to make contributions to the work of the American Bible Society, all such contributions to be sent through the regular channels to the Baptist state headquarters office, designated for the American Bible Society, and

Second, that we approve a special offering for this work, to be taken in the churches on a day to be set by the Executive Board, and to be promoted by our Convention as a definite part of its mission program.

January 16, 1944 was the day set by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Report of American Bible Society

Southern Baptists are taking a leading part in the essential task of providing the Scriptures for mission work throughout the world, through their greatly increased gifts to the American Bible Society for its missionary non-profit work of translation, publication and world-wide distribution of the Scriptures.

We are grateful for generous gifts from Baptists in Oklahoma and throughout the South, during 1942 and 1943, which have helped us to,

1. Supply Scriptures in many languages for mission work around the globe, including Scriptures for the blind in systems of raised letters which are read with the fingers.

2. Provide New Testaments for our Armed Forces, including Testaments in waterproof containers for lifecrafts and lifeboats.

3. Send Scriptures in more than 30 languages for War Prisoners and Refugees.

4. Prepare large quantities of Scriptures, in the languages of the various countries, to be sent to Europe and Asia for immediate post-war needs, before publication there can be resumed to any extent. When the closed doors of Europe and Asia swing open, as soon as those lands are set free, Scriptures in many languages must be ready for immediate shipment. While our Government sends food and other relief supplies, Bible loving Christians in America dare not fail to send the Bread of Life to satisfy the hunger of men's souls.

Beyond the emergency requirements immediately at the close of the war, almost unlimited Scripture needs can, even now, be clearly foreseen:

- (1) Mission Boards and their missionaries are emphasizing the absolute necessity for greater distribution of the Bible because experience has shown that widespread distribution of the Scriptures in the native languages of the people serves as the advance agent and powerful ally of all other forms of missionary work. In every missionary advance, the Bible goes forward first.

- (2) The heart hunger of the people has produced a great demand for the Word of God in lands like Latin America, India, China, and Africa, as prejudice, opposition and indifference have broken down.

- (3) Although three-fifths of the adult population of the world cannot read, millions each year are being taught to read in lands that have been blacked-out by illiteracy. This vastly increases the number of potential readers of the Scriptures and likewise creates an obligation for us to supply them with the Word of God. For example, Russia, with fully 90% of her people literate today, in contrast with 90% illiterate twenty-five years ago, has become a new nation of readers. What an opportunity when Russia someday will reopen her doors to the Bible!

Because these needs for increased Scripture distribution must be a major factor in all plans for world-wide missionary advance after the war, the American Bible Society looks to Southern Baptists, with gratitude and confidence, for an even greater measure of support.

88. Dr. R. M. Inlow, Oklahoma City, led in prayer in memory of our Brethern and Sisters who have gone to their reward since last convention.

89. Time having arrived for the organization of the Convention, nominations were called for to fill the various elective offices of the convention.

90. Dr. C. C. Morris, Ada, nominated Honorable Robert S. Kerr, Governor of Oklahoma, for President of the Convention.

91. Brother Bill Lucas seconded the motion.

92. Dr. J. Howard Williams, host pastor, seconded the nomination. Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Governor Kerr for president of the Convention.

93. Motion carried that nominations cease and that the Recording Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Governor Kerr, for President of the Convention.

94. Recording Secreatry cast the ballot of the Convention for Governor Robert S. Kerr for President of the Convention.

95. Dr. C. C. Morris and Dr. J. Howard Williams accompanied President-elect Kerr to the platform. Brother "Bob" spoke words of appreciation for the honor bestowed upon him.

96. Dr. J. W. Storer, Tulsa, nominated Dr. Henry G. Bennett, President of Oklahoma A. & M. College, for First Vice President of the Convention.

97. Brother Bill Lucas, Howe, moved that the Recording Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Dr. Bennett as First Vice President of the Convention.

98. Recording Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Dr. H. G. Bennett as First Vice President of the Convention.

99. Reverend Samuel W. Scantlan, Oklahoma City, nominated Reverend J. W. Hodges, El Reno, for Second Vice President of the Convention.

100. Brother Bill Lucas, Howe, moved that the Recording Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Reverend Hodges for Second Vice President of the Convention. Carried.

101. Brother Bill Lucas nominated John T. Daniel, Oklahoma City, for Recording Secretary.

102. Reverend G. R. Naylor, Ada, moved that President Augue Henry cast the ballot of the Convention for John T. Daniel for Recording Secretary of the Convention. Carried

103. President Henry cast the ballot of the convention for John T. Daniel for Recording Secretary.

104. Reverend John T. Daniel nominated Reverend J. A. Pennington, Mangum, for Assistant Recording Secretary of the Convention.

105. Some sister made motion that Recording Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Reverend Pennington, for assistant Recording Secretary. Carried.

106. Recording Secretary cast the Conventions ballot for Reverend J. A. Pennington for Assistant Recording Secretary.

107. Brother Bill Lucas, Howe, nominated Dr. J. B. Rounds, Oklahoma City, for Historical Secretary of the Convention.

108. Motion carried that the Recording Secretary cast the Conventions ballot for Dr. J. B. Rounds for Historical Secretary of the Convention.

109. The Recording Secretary cast the ballot of the Convention for Dr. J. B. Rounds as Historical Secretary of the Convention.

110. Dr. Rupert Naney, Oklahoma City, nominated Dr. Andrew Potter for Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Convention.

111. Brother Bill Lucas, Howe, moved that nominations cease and that a standing vote be taken for the election of Secretary Potter. Carried.

112. The Convention crowd stood enthusiastically voting, for the eleventh time for the election of Dr. Andrew Potter as Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Convention.

113. Brother Bill Lucas, Howe, was appointed by President Henry, to accompany Secretary Potter to the platform.

114. Secretary Potter spoke words of appreciation for the confidence placed in him by honoring him again with the Secretaryship and pledged to continue to give himself unreservedly to the work of Oklahoma Baptists.

115. Reverend Robert S. Scales, Durant, read the Report of Committee on Committees and motion carried to adopt the report.

(8) That we thank Dr. Henry, our retiring presiding officer, for his year of arduous labors for which he received no material compensation and for the impartial, Christian and discerning manner in which he has conducted the sessions of the Convention.

(9) That we affirm our confidence in the honor, Christian integrity and character of our Brother, Dr. H. G. Bennett, servant of God, and friend of mankind.

COMMENTS

Organization

The "Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, without authorized capital stock. Its first articles of incorporation were filed on or about May 1917, for a term of twenty years and its amended articles of incorporation providing for an organization in perpetuity were placed on record March 6, 1928. Its purpose is to foster Baptist denomination activities in the State of Oklahoma and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various members of the denomination in accordance with the instructions of such contributors.

Since November 1, 1935 the convention has had direct supervision of the Baptist Orphans' Home, located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The "Baptists Orphans' Home" was organized in March, 1904 for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital. Assets, liabilities, income and expenses of the Baptist Orphans' Home are treated as a separate "fund", both on the convention books and in this report.

Cash on Deposit

The account with The First National Bank and Trust Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, amounting to \$133,495.61 was reconciled and verified by certification obtained from the depository. This cash is applicable to the various funds as shown in the Balance Sheet, Exhibit "A". All recorded receipts were traced to deposit in the bank. The daily recapitulations of cash received were compared with their recording in the cash book, and tests were made of the individual receipts from which the recapitulations were prepared. Paid checks were compared with the record of checks drawn and signatures and endorsements were scrutinized.

Unexpended Balances in Designated Funds

These accounts are included as shown by the books of account without further verification by us. They are presented under the liability section of the Fund Balance Sheet (Exhibit "A"), and the changes are summarized in the Fund Capital Statements (Exhibit "C").

Fund Capital Statements

A Fund Capital Statement for the period under review, is presented in Exhibit "C". The operations of the executive office are divided into nine major classifications as follows:

STATE MISSION'S FUND — Subdivided into "Appropriations and Operations—Regular and Annuity (unrestricted) and "Property and Other". The former includes financial transactions applicable to Oklahoma State Mission's activities, whereas the latter embraces properties and other items not applicable to a specifically named fund.

GENERAL DEBT LIQUIDATION FUND—Special provision from the co-operative program for liquidation of certain denominational "debts and deficits."

HOSPITAL GENERAL AND RETIREMENT FUND—For general hospital items clearing through the convention office, and for reimbursement of prior indebtedness against the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital Muskogee, Oklahoma, liquidated from other convention funds.

BAPTIST MESSENGER FUND—Maintaining and publishing a denominational paper known as the **Baptist Messenger**.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION AND SUNDAY SCHOOL FUND—Providing for Training Union and Sunday School enlargement and educational activities in the State of Oklahoma.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY FUND—Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of "Assembly property."

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY BUILDING PROGRAM—For receiving contributions toward and accounting for contributions of a future building program.

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN AND EMPLOYEES' RELIEF AND ANNUITY FUND—For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers, missionaries, churches and organizations throughout Oklahoma participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and shared in by the convention.

BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME FUND—Embracing all transactions pertaining to enlargement and maintenance of the children's home and care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, subdivided into the following:

General operations—Maintenance of the Home.

Endowment—Representing contributions but not transferred to the general and property funds, plus earnings thereon.

Property and other investments—Accounting for plan and investments other than designated "Endowment."

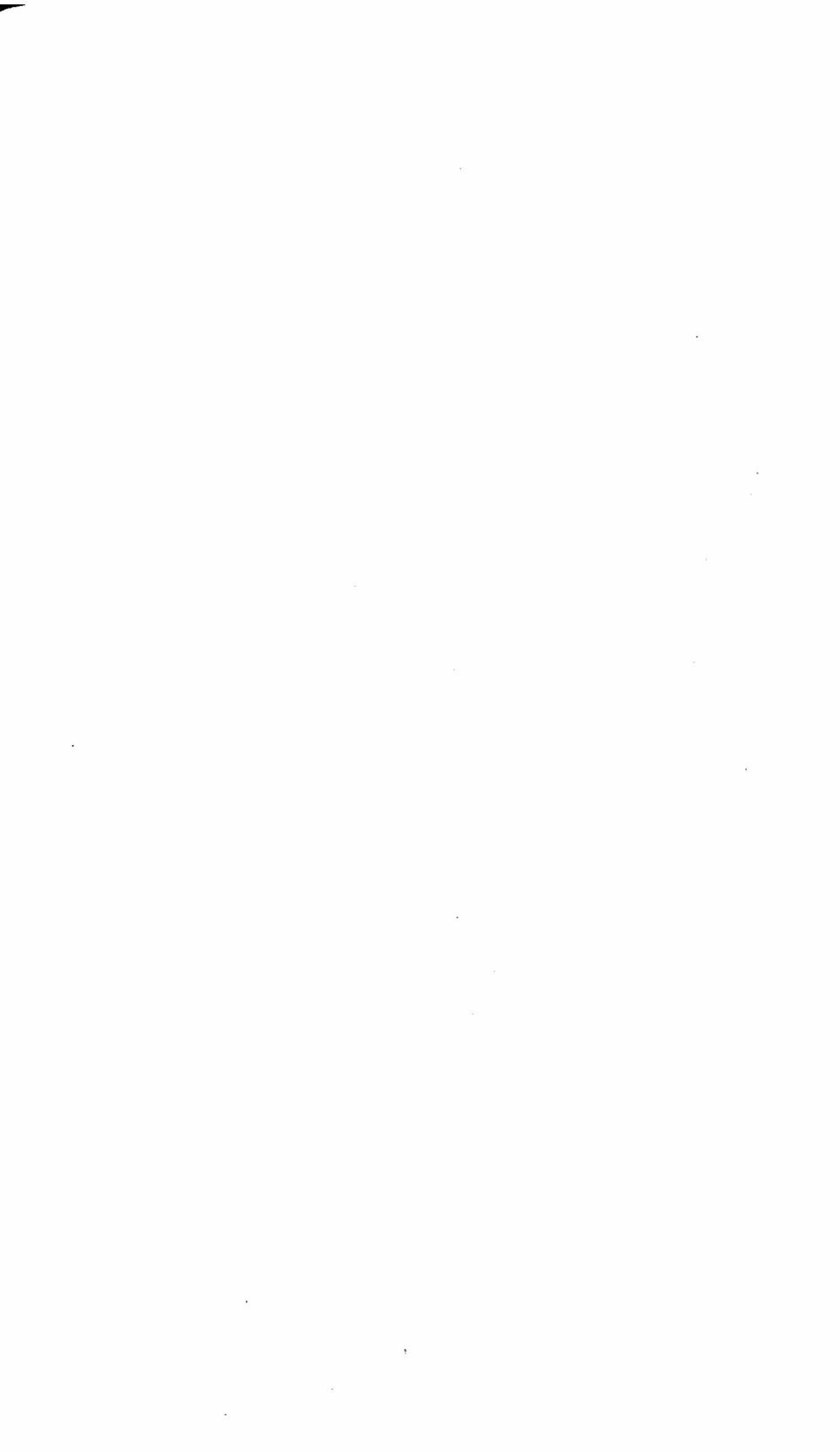

Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union

PREAMBLE

Desirous of cultivating and stimulating the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and young people of the churches, we, the women of Missionary Societies of the Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and shall be auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to cultivate the missionary spirit, especially among the women and young people throughout the State, and to aid in the world-wide spread of the Gospel.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The constituency of this organization shall be the Missionary organizations of women and young people. Messengers to the annual meeting shall be all members of the Executive Board, all auxiliary counselors and one member from each society with one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof not to exceed ten members from any church.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Young People's Secretary, a Field Worker, Chairman of Departments, and Advisory Committee who shall be named by the Nominating Committee and elected by acclamation at the Annual Meeting, and a Vice-President from each District who has been elected in her respective District.

Section 2. Executive Board. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Union and Presidents of the Associations. Eleven, including two officers, shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each District, all to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting for the succeeding year, seven constituting a quorum.

ARTICLE V

Time of Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, time and place to be designated by the Executive Board at its first meeting.

ARTICLE VI

Financial Policy

In accordance with the Preamble, our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education, training, and giving; the strength of the organization being used to help raise all apportionments for every phase of the work to which the church con-

tributes. One-third of all the Unified Budget Funds shall be credited to the State W. M. U.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention and all salaries paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE VII

Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present and voting at any Annual Meeting provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting of the Executive Board and recommended by the Board to the annual meeting for adoption.

By - Laws

ARTICLE I

Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the organization and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, shall be ex-officio member of all standing committees and with the concurrence of the Executive Secretary call special meetings of the Board. She shall be the Vice President of the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 2. Vice Presidents. It shall be the duty of the Vice Presidents of the organization to assist the Executive Secretary in developing the districts, preside at their district meetings and keep in touch with Associational officers by correspondence and other ways that will further the interest of Woman's Missionary Union. In the absence of the State President one of the Vice Presidents shall be asked to preside in her place.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual Meetings of Woman's Missionary Union, to prepare the minutes for publication and to act as Secretary of the Executive Board, presenting a condensed report of the sessions to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Executive Secretary-Treasurer. As Executive Secretary it shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith, to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local societies of the State. She shall have supervision over all departments of the work and shall have correspondence with Baptist papers, unless other provision shall be made for it, and shall give general direction for the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity shall permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds used all expense of the work, according to the directions of the Executive Board, keeping always an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements.

As Executive Secretary-Treasurer, she shall make reports to the Executive Board, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma,

Baptist General Convention and Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. Young People's Secretary. The Young People's Secretary shall, under the direction of the Executive Secretary, have oversight of the work of all the auxiliaries, and in every way possible shall seek to enlist the young people of our churches, colleges and hospitals in missionary work. She shall make regular reports to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 6. Executive Board. The Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care, and shall have power to recommend such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the Annual meeting any recommendation concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and production of the work which may seem expedient.

It shall hold its semi-annual meetings at the call of the President and Executive Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 7. Duties of the Advisory Committee. It shall meet four times annually at the call of the President and Executive Secretary. This committee shall have power to act for the Executive Board between sessions of the Board.

Section 8. Duties of Standing Committees. (A) Obituary Committee shall present a memorial service at the Annual Meeting. (B) Recommendation Committee shall meet two weeks prior to the semi-annual meeting to make recommendations to be presented to the Executive Board at its semi-annual meeting. (C) Scholarship Committee shall meet annually to approve application for Scholarships.

Section 9. Chairmen of Departments. It shall be the duty of these chairmen to assist the Executive Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular departments of the work by correspondence and shall make reports in writing to the Executive Board and an annual report to the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Section 10. Associational Presidents. They shall be elected at the Woman's Missionary Union quarterly rally preceding the Annual Meeting of the Association. They shall have general supervision of the work of the Association and in co-operation with the pastors they shall endeavor to promote the organization of women and young people in all churches, by visiting and holding Associational Meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of the work done. It shall also be their duty to arrange for and preside over the quarterly meetings of their associations.

ARTICLE II

Parliamentary Rules

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law, not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2. Amendments. These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulations as those governing changes in the Constitution.

Theme: "Until the Day Dawn"

Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, November 15, 1943

The thirty-eighth annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, was called to order in the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City, November 15, 1943, at 1:30 P. M. by the president, Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite.

Mrs. R. A. Willard, song leader, was presented and led in singing the hymn for the year, "The Morning Light is Breaking." Mrs. Dana Lewis Griffith was at the organ.

Report of Executive Secretary

Mrs. Berta K. Spooner

Women are asked to do many different things for Victory. CAN for Victory, SAVE for Victory, WALK for Victory, SEW for Victory—even DE-FROST for Victory. But no one of these slogans, nor all of them together will achieve true Victory. Women will more wisely PRAY for Victory, LOVE for Victory, SERVE CHRIST for Victory, GIVE to Christ's Cause for Victory, READ and STUDY for Victory. How are Oklahoma Baptist women participating in such vital ways in the only real Victory?

In our Oklahoma Baptist churches there are 641 Woman's Missionary societies with 19,988 members. These women are in some measure keeping their hearts courageous for real Victory in the carrying out of W.M.U. plans in their church life. Of these organizations, 26 societies have reached an A-1 record. In some cases loss of members by removal, was not turned into gain by enlistment of other women who should be in attendance. In some instances women have taken defense positions and have been or have not been enlisted in business women's circles. When Missions is now, more than ever, recognized as the one basis for International Peace, we must enlarge the number and effectiveness of the work of our Woman's Missionary societies, no matter what difficulties present themselves. Rationed tires and gasoline will seem poor excuses in that Victorious Day when we stand before the throne of our Triumphant Christ.

Most of our associations have continued their customary meetings, finding encouragement in discussion of accomplishments and plans.

The 14 district meetings in the spring registered 2386 in attendance from 376 societies. We were grateful for the messages of Miss Mary Christian from Southern W.M.U. and Miss Lucy Smith, one of our own Oklahoma missionaries to China. All who were present went to their homes quickened in earnest zeal. The offering for magazines for our Oklahoma missionaries, which is taken at these meetings, was the largest single offering from 11 of the districts.

An unusually excellent group of missionaries had been secured for the Assembly at Falls Creek, which had to be cancelled at the request of the State Board of Health. Some of the missionaries were used in Church Schools of Missions.

A partial report indicates that 36 schools of Missions were held. These schools promoted by Woman's Mission societies, in co-operation with pastors and other agencies of the church life, have proved blessings wherever held—enlisting more members in the W.M.U. family, advancing missionary intelligence and augmenting gifts to missions.

Our Co-operative Program gifts reached the high of \$105,792.56 with \$29,864.00 for the Hundred Thousand Club. We have paid in three years our Hundred Thousand Club goal for a five-year period. How happy we are for Southern Baptists to be free from the shackles of debt. Gifts for 1942 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions were \$24,677.41; for 1943 Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions were \$11,050.50; and for Edna McMillan State Mission Offering, \$7,261.95. Total gifts to all of these, \$42,989.86. Other special gifts: White Cross, \$2,384.87; Margaret Fund, \$726.46;

Orphans' Home, \$7,707.40; Magazines for Missionaries, \$204.68; and Scholarships, \$2,188.40.

We have two scholarships for special training of our colored young people. Corrine Smith and Robert Hardeman both are taking special training in Nashville. Celestee Oliver, who graduated two years ago and has served most of the past year as Young People's leader to her own race, was married in September to Rev. Johnson of Kingfisher, but is continuing to use her trained personality, not only in her own church, but often helping in the state work. We also have this year on scholarships, eight of our own fine girls. Four in House Beautiful and four in Southwestern Seminary. Then we have a very splendid Indian girl, Miss Olelah Mae Cornell from Tulsa and Miss Helen Ige, an American-Japanese young woman from McGehee, Arkansas, in Oklahoma Baptist University—both doing fine work. Thus you are helping nine young women and one young minister to train for larger service for the Master.

As we think of these amounts, we must be continually mindful that we are still unprofitable servants—most of us far below paying our tithe, and just are surpassing that payment in joyous stewardship, recognizing that all we have and are is Christ's. Of our 19,988 members, 6,310 are reported as tithers. That is but a little more than one woman in three. Where is God's money? We did not even pay our tithes but war is costing America two billion dollars a week! Victory can scarcely be ours so long as we are dishonest with God. Not only our money is going to war but our sons and daughters—withheld from mission service—must go now with instruments of destruction to the far lands and the seven seas. We are learning the hard way that Christian women—Baptist women—must feel responsibility for showing God's World Plan so clearly to boys and girls and young women, that they are ready to put service to Christ's Kingdom FIRST in their lives—going as missionaries, supporting missionaries, rising above racial prejudices and class distinction—to win the lost everywhere—that is TRUE VICTORY.

As you look at the service flag in your church be reminded that your church could be represented by numbers of Christian missionaries, soldiers in truth, for the Lord of hosts. Lessons about the world's people which we would not learn in home and foreign mission study classes we must learn now as we follow our armed forces with painful interest. In our small world we can no longer escape the Master's command to world evangelization, to world concern.

Our Mission Study record for the past year shows 8,237 awards granted from 2,295 classes. Truly, we shall greatly miss Mrs. A. L. Aulick, who for 11 years served as our State Mission Study chairman. She was so well informed and always so enthusiastic about her work that many were inspired by her, to study missions.

Study alone will not assure Victory. There must be the individual witness of every woman by winning souls to Christ and helping to develop Christian people and Christian environment. Our Community Missions projects constantly spur along these lines. Only changed people can build a changed world so Victory is dependent upon the Christian people who, by the power of the Holy Spirit, win lost people to Christ.

The most powerful and the most costly weapon for Victory is prayer. Individual and united prayer for a revival that will sweep our nation and make it useful in Victory. The daily use of the Prayer Calendar in Royal Service would stretch our souls in def-

inite petition for our steadfast missionaries, encountering extraordinary obstacles and opportunities in their witnessing now.

There are 4,827 subscribers to Royal Service which means that many homes do not have its world outlook to help them be right-fully missionary. The homes need our Young People's magazines in larger numbers also. Homes are centers of Victory. If the home is not definitely Christian juvenile delinquency and crime increase, the nation is weakened at its foundation and any Victory is sadly empty. Women make our homes and can, through them, influence for eternal Victory and lasting peace.

Your secretary has been busy in the many activities which claim her attention of mind and heart—traveling, speaking, planning, writing. Out of state I had the joy of attending the Business Women's Conference at Ridgecrest, North Carolina, with the other secretaries from the Southern states, also the semi-annual meeting of Executive Committee in Birmingham, in January.

For the co-operation of all our women and the many courtesies throughout the days, I am most grateful. Oklahoma women are writing large letters of Victory but they could be more clearly visible in the coming year if all of us together would devote ourselves more completely to our Master.

Report of Young People's Secretary

Mrs. Bill V. Carden

"That the generation to come might know" is the theme of Woman's Missionary Union for 1944. A resume of 1943 reveals a need for our attending more diligently to the fourth of our Five Chief Aims—that of the "missionary education of the young people." It is always easier to work with "things" than with "people." Money and materials are an easier task than the molding of missionary character.

In spite of all the interruptions caused by war, many Missionary Societies have been diligent in the dispensing of missionary information to youth and in the leading of young people into the adventures of missionary activity and giving.

A report of our auxiliaries shows the following:

Present Number: Sunbeams 303; R.A. 250; G.A. 470; Y.W.A. 227.

New in 1943: Subeams 17; R.A. 19; G.A. 34; Y.W.A. 15.

Membership: Sunbeam 4545; R.A. 2500; G.A. 5640; Y.W.A. 3010.

The account of churches having a full-graded W.M.U. shows 102. One hundred forty-seven have three auxiliaries, 73 have only two and 93 others have only one auxiliary.

Following the organization of a missionary group, comes the effort to give missionary information.

A record of this effort follows:

Mission Study classes: Sunbeams 194; R.A. 126; G.A. 546; Y.W.A. 278; Total 1144.

Mission Study awards: Sunbeams 518; R.A. 381; G.A. 826; Y.W.A. 482; Total 2207.

Missionary magazines: World Comrades 1621; Window of Y.W.A. 490.

Teaching young people "Stewardship of Possession" is another task attempted by Woman's Missionary Union. The number of tithers is indicated to be 2008.

Actual money gifts are difficult to tabulate since gifts of young people are often sent in with the total W.M.U. or church gifts. But the associational reports show that many counselors are teaching their youth to be faithful stewards.

Seventeen young women shared the inspiration of Ridgecrest Y.W.A. Camp. Ninety-eight enrolled in the State G.A. Houseparty. These interested G.A. girls brought an offering of \$107.00 to World Emergency Relief.

The State R.A. Camp and the State Assembly at Falls Creek Loth had to be cancelled at the last minute due to an epidemic of poliomyelitis.

Realizing that the present emergency of tire and gas shortages makes associational and district meetings for young people inadvisable and therefore increases the importance of the local church in stimulating missionary enthusiasm, many missionaries were brought to the state primarily to serve in local churches, some in schools of missions, others to be scheduled to speak in a rotation of meetings. Those who served us are:

Report of Executive Board

Today in the midst of the world confusion how much we need to listen to the voice of one who bids us go into all the world "that the generations to come might know." But even though we cannot see the hidden meaning in his command we know that if we walk on in faith the light will come and as we march on, all obstacles surmounting, our God, the strong, will open up the way and step by step will lead us as He goes on before.

On the morning of January 19, 1943, the Executive Board of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma convened in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City for a two-day session. There were 25 members present and a number of Young People's leaders and departmental chairmen from the associations in attendance. Throughout the day there were general discussions on the different phases of W.M.U. work.

The resignation of Mrs. R. Y. Bandy as Community Missions Chairman was presented and accepted and the president, Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, appointed a committee composed of Mrs. Tom Earp, Mrs. B. F. Sanderson and Mrs. Frank Webb, to find someone to take the place of Community Missions Chairman, left vacant by this resignation.

Regular reports were presented and adopted. The Executive Secretary reported letters received from Dr. E. D. Head, president of Southwestern Seminary at Fort Worth, expressing thanks for the turkey money and also the nursery fund of \$400.00 and from Miss Littlejohn, principal of W.M.U. Training School at Louisville, in acknowledgment of the turkey money.

The Executive Secretary, Mrs. Spooner, presented her report which showed that the W.M.U. of Oklahoma is paying \$35.00 toward the salary of Miss Celesteen Oliver, Young People's Leader, for the Negro women of the state. The W.M.U. is also giving scholarships to a young Negro woman and to a young Negro preacher from Sapulpa to the Training School at Nashville, Tenn., and is paying \$25.00 on Maggie Bruce's salary as field worker for the Negro women. This money for the Negro work, totalling \$1080.00 comes out of our State Mission Offering.

Mrs. Tom Earp, chairman of the committee on nominations for Community Missions Chairman, presented the name of Mrs. H. H. Boston of Muskogee. Mrs. Boston was unanimously elected.

In accordance with the policy adopted in the September, 1942, meeting, the Executive Secretary presented the itemized budget for the year, 1943, totalling \$7648.00.

Since the amount of the apportionment (\$7500.00) set aside by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the annual work of the W.M.U. is inadequate to meet the necessary demands of the work, Mrs. Frank Webb moved that we use \$500.00 from our State Mission Offering to supplement our budget. The motion was carried unanimously.

Because of the difficulties of transportation there was no other meeting of the Executive Board during the year but on July 14 the Advisory Committee was called together in the office of the Executive Secretary to consider some matters of importance.

The resignation of Mrs. H. H. Boston as Community Missions Chairman, because of her removal from Oklahoma, was presented and accepted.

The resignation of Mrs. A. L. Aulick as Mission Study Chairman was also presented and accepted as Mrs. Aulick has left the state to make her home in New Mexico.

Expressions of regret at the loss of these two fine workers was voiced by all present.

The name of Mrs. O. F. Fahnestock of Okemah was presented for consideration as Mission Study Chairman and it was voted to elect Mrs. Fahnestock to fill the unexpired term left vacant by Mrs. Aulick's resignation.

Mrs. George Boston of Muskogee was elected Community Missions Chairman to fill the unexpired term left vacant by Mrs. H. H. Boston.

Since our Young People's Secretary, Mrs. Bill V. Carden, had been offered another position but had refused it we felt that, under the existing circumstances, we should meet the salary offered her. On motion it was voted to increase her salary \$25.00 per month, making a total of \$150.00 per month.

The matter of securing a worker among the Indians was discussed with the hope that at an early date we might be able to secure someone.

In the meeting of the Board held in the Young People's auditorium of the First Baptist Church prior to the annual meeting, the following recommendation was presented: "We recommend that in co-operation with the Baptist General Convention in their plan to gather \$150,000.00 for the Phillips Orphans' Home Fund, we assume responsibility for \$50,000.00 of this amount, our portion to be gathered through the channels proposed by the General Convention committee.

"We recommend that such details as are necessary shall be added to this recommendation in the State W.M.U. Year Book, when they have been worked out by the General Convention committee."

On motion by Mrs. T. W. Stevens of Muskogee, it was voted unanimously to adopt this recommendation.

The matter of filling Kits for the Russian War Relief was explained by Mrs. Spooner and Mrs. W. F. Crittendon moved that we undertake the filling of 10,000 of these kits. The motion carried.

The Executive Secretary spoke of receiving a letter from Dr. Rounds, superintendent of Indian Missions under the Home Board, emphasizing the great need for training Indian preachers and suggesting that we set up G. Lee Phelps scholarships for this purpose.

On motion by Mrs. J. E. Kirk of Holdenville it was voted to establish a scholarship of \$500.00 for worthy Indians as a memorial to G. Lee Phelps, for many years missionary to the Indians, this amount to be set aside from our State Mission Offering.

Mrs. H. C. Grimmett of Anadarko was presented to the Board as our W.M.U. worker among the Indians, elected by the Home Mission Board, whose salary is taken care of through the Annie Armstrong Offering. Mrs. Stevens reported briefly the work she is doing among the Indian women in the eastern part of the state, stating that the Indian Association is sending a couple to Florida to work with Willie King among the Seminoles.

Mrs. H. K. Graves of Chickasha, chairman, presented the W.M.U. Recommendations for the year 1944 for the consideration of the Board. Mrs. Stevens moved that we recommend that our apportionment for the Annie Armstrong Offering be \$12,000.00 and the motion carried.

On motion by Mrs. Bill V. Carden, Young People's Secretary, it was voted to recommend that the Edna McMillan Offering for 1944 be \$6,000.00.

Mrs. Spooner reported that we have in O.B.U. as our special

scholarship girl, Miss Helen Ige, a Japanese girl. We have also in O.B.U. on our Mary P. Jayne scholarship, Miss Olelah Mae Cornell, an Indian girl of Ponca City.

We were glad to have Mrs. B. A. Copass, president of Texas W.M.U., in our meeting.

Report of Margaret Fund Chairman

"Until the Day Dawn"

Amidst the world's terrible conflict, God is upon His throne—the same God yesterday, today, and forever, working out His plans for a redeemed world—"until the day dawn," when the foreign mission fields will be opened again to Southern Baptist work.

From cottage and palace, from the Orient, and from every European and American hamlet, comes the united cry that the post-war world must be so reshaped and remotivated that the causes of misunderstanding, of hatred, of fear of armed conflict can never again become a tidal wave sweeping across the earth.

Men and nations are today saying that the Christian Gospel—proclaimed and lived—is the only hope for tomorrow's world for peace, for salvation, for goodwill, for justice, for righteousness.

Woman's Missionary Union as "laborers together with God" in His divine plan for saving the world, has established her great system of education—the Margaret Fund for the sons and daughters of S. B. C. Foreign and Home Board missionaries, that "the generation to come might know" of Christ's redeeming love.

The Margaret Fund links three mighty forces for world righteousness, the missionary, the child of the missionary, and Woman's Missionary Union.

It is her joy to place the children of our beloved missionaries in Christian schools where the early training of their devout parents is continued and intensified; to train them for the greatest possible efficiency in His service.

"Investment in training that tends to the development of Christian character will bear noble interest in multiplied service. We believe that these students are not gaining knowledge for its own sake alone, but that they may apply it in the service of God and humanity."

It is the privilege of Woman's Missionary Union to help Margaret Fund students see that missionary service offers the heroic life possible and that it is greater to give one's life in sacrifice on some mission field than to die on any battle field.

"One generation passeth away, another generation cometh." The Margaret Fund has functioned long enough for us to see great spiritual harvests and note one generation of college students come, pass on, and another generation take its place.

We rejoice today over the second generation of missionaries.

As a general reviews his army to get a vision of its size and strength of training, let us review our army of former and present Margaret Fund students. We see that some march with the faltering steps of those grown old in Christian warfare—still carrying their only weapon, "the sword of the Spirit." Others march with the steady tread of youth preparing themselves through education—putting on the "whole armor of God—the breastplate of righteousness; the helmet of salvation; their loins girt with truth; their feet shod with the preparation of the Gospel of Peace," "until the day

dawn" when they can take up the mantle of their fathers in missionary service.

As the King of kings sits on His Heavenly Throne and reviews the vast army of Margaret Fund students, may He see in them a force of marvelous power, courage and faithfulness to His cause—that "the generation to come might know," and crown Him Lord of all.

Among the voices bidding for youth today, there is a voice stronger and more insistent than that of all others—the voice of God. The same voice that called fishermen to become fishers of men is sounding through college halls calling young hearts to give themselves wholly to His service—our missionary recruits of a brighter tomorrow.

Last year, some of our Margaret Fund students were called to the ministry, some as medical missionaries, others as Christian workers on home and foreign fields. The cessation of hostilities in Europe and Asia will be the beginning of a greater missionary enterprise than Southern Baptists and the world have ever seen.

As we are sacrificing for the victory of our armed forces, we must prepare to sacrifice for Christian victory throughout the world.

"The Morning Light is breaking" and darkness will disappear.

"Until the day dawn"—preparations must begin with vision, prayer, and gifts.

Since Margaret Fund scholarships are financed through the Season's of Prayer Offerings, may our gifts be generous, that no part of the mission causes shall suffer nor the work of the Margaret Fund.

Today, because of its great spiritual significance, we would write in your hearts with words of fire—Margaret Fund. With renewed devotion to the Margaret Fund "guard that which is committed to thy trust."

The prayer of Woman's Missionary Union in behalf of her Margaret Fund students is: "This I pray that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge . . . that ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere . . . being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ, unto the glory and praise of God" (Phil. 1:9, 10, 11).

Report of W. M. U. Training School

In these war days we realize how wise the Woman's Missionary Union was in locating the new building which houses the Training School at the "Beeches." In it all we see God's hand and gratefully acknowledge His leadership. Now the school, located in the peaceful setting next to the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, is away from transportation needs and away from the crowds and turmoil of a busy city. Here our students easily attend classes in the Seminary in addition to those they have in House Beautiful.

The latest report from the Training School shows 107 boarding students—the largest resident group since 1925-26. Day students number 70, making a total attendance of 177. Miss Mary Nelle Lyne reports 157 students in three classes of Missionary Education which rejoices our hearts. Here we are training these young women as soldiers of the Cross to carry on not only for a "duration" but for time and eternity in Zion's war.

Since last we met in Convention another Oklahoma student has been called to Foreign Mission work. Margaret Foltz Schmidt of Ft. Gibson who graduated last May has, with her husband, been appointed by the Foreign Mission Board to serve in Brazil. Oklahoma is fortunate in having four young women in the Training School this year: Minta Mae Drake of Custer City; Hazel Smith of Enid; Katharin Tiefel and Gordie Vaughtner of Oklahoma City. All four fine girls have already signified their intention to work in the State next summer. Following are selections from letters received from these girls:

"To be a member of the student body of the W. M. U. Training School is one of the most wonderful things that can happen to any young woman . . . To the women of Oklahoma I want to say 'Thank you' from the very depths of my heart for your thoughtfulness and consideration in providing the funds for me to live in 'House Beautiful' . . . Remember your girls in prayer, that our lives may be strengthened spiritually as we study to do His will." Katharin Tiefel.

"The opportunity of attending the W. M. U. Training School is the greatest I have ever experienced . . . I will say, simply 'Thank you' for your loving kindness. Please continue to pray for us as we study here." Gordie Vaughtner.

"Just must thank the Baptist women of Oklahoma for their expression of love extended again to me my second year at House Beautiful . . . May we unite in prayer that the number will be doubly increased next year, that Oklahoma women will continue to accept the challenge of contributing their part in presenting the universal message of 'Good News' around the world. As you lovingly place your gifts in the scholarship fund, you enable us, your state young women, to train for further Christian service." Minta Mae Drake.

"Many times I have wished that every Christian young woman could have the privilege that is mine in coming under the influence of this great school . . . Tears of joy must needs burst forth from my soul as I express my appreciation to the W. M. U. of Oklahoma for making it possible for me to receive this training, which is one of the greatest experiences I have ever enjoyed. Surely your expressions of love will not return unto you void. Continue to pray for us." Hazel Smith.

Report of White Cross Chairman

In Matt. 6:33 we read: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you." That is, the things we have need of will be added. So in making a White Cross report we are happy to say that the many things our hospitals have asked for that they needed have come flooding in from all over Oklahoma. The children, the young people and the women have given sheets, blankets, towels, pillows, pillow cases, baby things, Bibles and other things for which our Superintendents at Miami and Muskogee have asked.

Our response to this call goes to show that we have tried to put first things first. It must be so. "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness." We have done this through definite prayers for our hospital work, a definite information program concerning all our White Cross activities, and definite information about our growing black children in far off Africa. Then, too, this year we have tried to stress the nurse's training for better opportunity for service in our hospitals. How vast is our responsibility as a denomination. Other groups are doing a great job but we have our own task to do.

The Board of Directors of the Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans has declined to go into the Cadet Nurse Corps plan for the education of nurses. They declined the offer of Federal Government funds and the hospital itself will bear all the expenses of educating young women nurses and will make a cash allowance to each student of \$10.00 per month for the first year, \$15.00 per month for the next 18 months and \$25.00 per month for the last six months of training. We were told we could not secure students unless we accepted tax money for expenses. We believe there are enough Christian women who desire to become nurses who will prefer not to be compelled to sign a contract to work for the Government after they graduate but who will be free to work wherever they may desire. Our graduates are eligible to enter the army, navy, public health, industry, private duty, civilian hospital, or any other line. They will not be bound by a contract signed three years before but will be free to choose. Applications for the January class are being received now. Applicants should be 17 years old, of Christian character, of normal weight and height and of strong physique.

What we do to relieve the sufferings of mankind demonstrates to the world that we are like the Christ. This crisis is teaching us that suffering is involved in the making of each of us. The problem of sickness is a problem the Modern Church has to face. Christ faced it and healed all manner of sickness. We claim to be a New Testament Church and no partial view point can be taken. Poverty, loss of power and even disgrace can sometimes be used to grow great characters.

We pray for young girls to volunteer for a nurse's career to give their lives to the healing of humanity. Doctors and nurses have been put on a level with any other skill in modern life. The school of nursing is something of which we are proud. One-third of all nurses

are trained in Catholic hospitals. Do you think Baptists are awake to the responsibility and opportunity that is ours along this line? Faith in tomorrow must be put into our program. Imitating the life of Christ we shall use every possible means at our disposal to foster His cause on the earth.

Dr. and Mrs. Ray Northrip write that the Baptist hospital in Ogbomoshos, Nigeria, Africa, has been full and running over. In 1942 they treated 3072 different patients and 37,330 treatments were given during the year. They had 288 operations. They delivered 26 babies which is twice as many as any other year. Even mothers in Africa are learning to go to the hospital to have their babies. The hospital is full most of the time and frequently they have to say "Come back tomorrow."

The cry of distress rises from every quarter of the globe. Who can be untouched by the wail that comes out of myriads of human hearts? The appeal is everywhere urgent and no true heart can turn a deaf ear. In the face of the unequal task that is before us in 1944 let us respond in the strength of our miracle working Lord. Let us always go in His name, believing that ere another year rolls around the Sun of Righteousness shall rise and shine out over all this weary world.

Report of Stewardship Chairman

For a number of years our women have endeavored, more and more, to cast aside old methods of financing the work of the kingdom and have come to realize a blessing in putting "Christ first" in our plans.

Today stewardship holds a well-defined place in our plans of work. We are more determined to heed the call of Jesus when He commands us to follow Him, the perfect example of a faithful steward who came to serve rather than to be served.

The call is for that kind of stewardship living, which is love in action. This stewardship has been committed to all the disciples of Christ, the stewardship that comprehends the use of **all** we have and are to the end that the people of **all** the earth may be evangelized

In Jesus stewardship reaches its highest degree of perfection. He gave Himself, and lives again in the lives of His disciples and in the hearts of true stewards.

To Simon Peter on the seashore after His resurrection He asked, "Simon lovest thou me?" This is life's ultimate and most important

question. Jesus could have asked; "How is your faith? Can I count on you not to deny me again? Will you carry on my work when I have ascended?" All of these questions were important but the all inclusive question was, "Do you love me?" He is asking it today. Most of our churches have some members, whose names on the roll is all they have of them. This does not help much. We belong to the person or thing to which we are most devoted. It is genuine Christian living that is needed and not simply our names on the church roll or W. M. S. records.

Our love for Christ is the mainspring of all our giving, living and serving. People drift away from the church because they have not completely fallen in love with Christ, other devotions lead them astray. Jesus did not make it easy for anyone to become a follower of Him. The church is threatened by the complex, complicated times of our modern life. We suffer from indifference within and opposition without. God has made His remedy known. It is Christian stewardship. Is there any task quite so imperative as the awakening of believers everywhere to the privilege and obligations of stewardship? One cannot be true to God and neglect His church and His cause, withholding her tithes and offerings and testimony.

The average Southern Baptist gave last year one cent every three days to give the gospel to the whole world. We need an evangelistic emphasis that would result in stewardship and a stewardship conviction that would provide more men and means for a greater evangelism.

Last year we repeated many times, "That Thy way may be known upon the earth, Thy salvation among all nations." His way is not known, it is a way of love, and if it were known the nations would not be at war with each other, dictators would not be ruling, millions would not be starving, refugees would not be wandering from place to place. If we were obedient Christians we would seek to have a larger part in taking the gospel of love and forgiveness to all His creatures.

We must work and serve and give that these lost and suffering ones may live.

I. ENLISTMENT

1. October be Enlistment month with added emphasis on enlistment in January.
2. Strong organizations to co-operate with associational leaders in assisting weak ones.
3. A 10% net increase in W.M.U. organizations and membership over the previous year, being careful to lose no members nor organizations.
4. We recommend that W.M.U. officers be elected according to the plan of your church and that they take office in January.

II. STEWARDSHIP

1. Our goal for 100% churches be at least one in every association.
2. Local Stewardship chairman secure the splendid free leaflets on stewardship from the state office and use them freely in stewardship teaching.
3. Stewardship chairman of the W.M.S. assist the counselors of the auxiliaries in stewardship education of young people culminating in Church Stewardship night.
4. A book on Stewardship be studied in every W.M.S. and Y.W.A. Special attention to new stewardship book for Juniors.
5. We strive to reach point 4 of the Standard of Excellence (see page 4).
6. We increase the number of 100% churches by our continued efforts to secure a gift from every resident member.
7. Wide use be made of plays, pageants and posters on Stewardship.

III. MISSION STUDY

1. Woman's Missionary Union urge and co-operate with the pastor in holding Church Schools of Missions. The state W.M.U. Department plans to secure missionaries for a limited number of schools on Foreign Missions in October and on Home Missions in February.
2. Mission Study Chairman see that every auxiliary studies two mission books during the year.
3. Mission libraries be established in churches and associations.
4. Emphasis be placed on books dealing with the Missionary Teachings of the Bible, using as a text a book recommended by Woman's Missionary Union.
5. We study each year the new series of Foreign Mission Books (see recommended book list).

6. We strive to have wide distribution of text books, preferably every member of the class own a book. Books be secured and read in advance of the class.
7. We collect and use available visual helps to make mission study vital and interesting. Such helps are:
 - a. Slides and motion picture reels (Write Home and Foreign Mission Boards).
 - b. Picture Sheets on each country (free from state W.M.U. office).
 - c. Picture sheets of missionaries.
 - d. Maps.
 - e. Pictures from missionary magazines.
 - f. Missionary Album (\$1 Foreign, 25c Home—from Baptist Book Store).
 - g. Newspaper clippings, etc.
8. Pioneer Classes
 - a. Associational Mission Study Chairman seek out Woman's Missionary Societies that have never had a mission study class and
 - b. Local Mission Study Chairman contact those in their churches who have never studied a book on missions and arrange for classes to be taught.
9. Mission Study Institutes be held, particularly city or associational, to train prospective teachers of our Mission Study books. (Free leaflets.)
10. Mission Study the year around in each W.M.U.
11. Advanced Course (see Southwide year book).
12. Societies organize "catch-up" classes that all may complete the outlined courses 1 and 2.
13. Renewed interest be given to the Reading Course, this in no way to take the place of Mission Study in class.
14. Emphasis upon current books on missions recommended by state W.M.U.
15. Emphasis upon the study of a home mission book before Season of Prayer in March; a foreign mission book before the Season of Prayer in December; and a book on Stewardship during the year.
16. Special emphasis upon study courses for young people, written test taken with closed books in all organizations except Sunbeams, where oral tests are approved. At least two books for each organization annually.
17. A successful mission study class devotes an average of one hour of study and discussion to each chapter of a book and endeavors to see that every member of the class reads the book. Naturally there must be a teacher, students and texts to be a class.

V. OUR YOUNG PEOPLE

1. We give attention to training of leaders for our auxiliaries through provision of "Correspondence Course" materials and through the promotion and attendance at associational classes for leaders and prospective leaders.

2. We give added emphasis to Stewardship training, tithing and gifts to the three Seasons of Prayer.
3. Each W.M.S. endeavor to organize and foster one new auxiliary during the year.
4. We increase subscriptions for auxiliary magazines to reach our state goals.
5. We carry out the new revised section of the Southwide plan of work pertaining to young people.
6. Each W.M.S. Chairman realize her responsibility toward young people in assisting them in her phase of the work.

VI. COMMUNITY MISSIONS

1. To do that which any missionary on any field finds to do to relieve the need and suffering of the people on his field and to present Christ in the doing of it (Applied Christianity).
 - (a) Find the needs that are opportunities to the Christian.
 - (b) Enlist and assign to all the women and young people of our societies in helping to meet these needs as opportunities for Christian Service.
 - (c) Pray definitely for the work at hand.
 - (d) Report—gathering from each assignment.
2. Give attention to winning to Christ with friendly visits; to provide places of worship and service for those of other races and nationalities and in assisting them in training of leaders and in securing Bibles and literature.
 - (a) Indians
 - (b) Foreigners
 - (c) Jews—Send Mediator to them—25c from Home Mission Board, Atlanta, Ga.
 - (d) Negroes
3. Christian Fellowship to enlisted men in camps near our churches or to those from our churches in camps, providing the latter with Bibles.
4. Special plans made for Business Women's Circles, realizing their particular opportunities.
5. Community Mission plans always to be made with "winning the lost" and "edifying the saved" in mind.
6. Co-operate with the mission study chairman in emphasis upon studying the "Guide for Community Missions," books on soul-winning and prayer.
7. Place emphasis on "needs met—not activities to "count."
8. Christian Americanization offers a great field of service. Since one-third of our entire population is foreign born, the task of helping them to become American and Christian presents a soul-winning opportunity.

VIII. WHITE CROSS

1. Each Society have a White Cross program, preferably in February (see program in January '44 Messenger).
2. Each society make a cash contribution to White Cross work in our Baptist Hospital in Ogbomosho, Nigeria, Africa, and to the Hospital in China with which Dr. J. H. Humphrey is connected.
3. All hospital supplies to be sent to our Baptist Hospitals in Miami and Muskogee. List of needs may be secured from hospital.

IX. MARGARET FUND

1. We request each society to present a program on the Margaret Fund (see pages 78-81 of the Southwide W.M.U. Minutes).
2. Each society pay its apportionment to the Margaret Fund.
3. All cash for Margaret Fund to be sent to the state W.M.U. Office.

X. SCHOLARSHIPS

1. We offer a scholarship to young women who are ready for special training in one of our Training Schools.
2. A committee of five shall pass on all applications and award scholarships.
3. Renewed emphasis be given to the Foreign Student Fund. This fund is given to students from foreign lands who seek training in our country with the purpose of returning to their people as missionaries.

XI. ORPHANS HOME

We continue our local support of the Oklahoma Baptist Orphan's Home through contributions of clothing, canned fruit and vegetables, linens, etc.

XII. APPORTIONMENTS FOR 1944

1. Oklahoma W.M.U. apportionments to Unified Budget be one-third of amount proposed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
