Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

Article I—Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Article II—Constituency

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers appointed by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the Convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

Article III—Object

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This Convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Convention shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

Article V—Boards, Trustees and Committees

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to appoint such Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this Convention.

Article VI—Board of Directors

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention and thirty-two (32) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention, at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

Section 4. This Board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

Article VII—Proceedings

Section 1. The proceeding of the Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published annually among the churches.

Article VIII—Annual Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Article IX—Special Funds

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

Article X—Change of Constitution

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors. The number of Directors shall be thirty-four (34).

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual Convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year.

Section 3. The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Board of Directors as herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual Convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual Convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the Convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.

Section 5. The Directors shall hold quarterly meetings in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall be proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held as above provided.

Section 7. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.

Two Vice-presidents, selected by the Board.

A Recording Secretary elected by the Convention.

An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.

A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.

A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Vice-presidents, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make quarterly reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He shall attest with the President all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws, will be voted upon at that meeting provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done only in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 5. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until same has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State paper at least six months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the Convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request to the Convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following Convention a year hence.

MUSIC DIRECTOR FOR THE CONVENTION

1. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma met in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, at 7:00 p. m.; on Tuesday, November 6, 1945.

2. President H. T. Wiles called the Convention to order calling attention to the fact that it was the 40th annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and the 63rd annual meeting of the Baptists organized at Tablequah, Indian Territory, June 1, 1883.

3. Mr. Ira Prosser, music director for the Convention led the congregation in singing "Jesus shall Reign."

4. Dr. E. L. Watson led in prayer.

5. Reverend William D. Wyatt read a portion of the scripture and led in devotional service emphasizing the present day importance of the Great Commission.

6. President Wiles appointed the Committee on Credentials to report Wednesday at 9:50 a. m.

Members were J. C. Wilhelm, Harold McGlamery, and E. L. Smith.

7. Reverend Marvin Gaskins presented the "Report on Foreign Missions" and motion carried for its adoption.

The war is over. As the smoke of battle rises above the earth, scenes will again become visible on our Foreign Mission fields. One of the first and major steps in our immediate post-war period will be to "restore the wastes" in war ravaged lands where our work has been retarded. We know little of actual damages done to our work on many fields, but that the task of rehabilitation will cost much we do know. And, we know the damages suffered by our brethren in such fields as Germany and Italy are such that they cannot repair them unassisted. The needs of the churches in Europe's devastated areas will require right now five times as much as all of us gave last year.

Despite the fact that the clouds of war have obscured our work on foreign fields we know the work has been going on, for "the work of God is not bound," and those who have labored there have literally "Loved not their own lives unto death." We should pray for them daily, that they may have "grace to help in time of need."

As the children of Israel journeyed toward the Promised Land they first had to cross the Red Sea, a seemingly insurmountable obstacle, but their God led them across. Then, there was the wilderness, typical of a long and difficult journey, but again their God led them through. And, as they came upon the threshold of the Promised Land they again faced difficulties, for the land had to be conquered. Our Foreign Mission work today surely faces the Promised Land of golden opportunity. There is a "great door and effectual opened unto us, but there are many adversaries" too. The world at large needs the gospel. The whole truth of God's word is the only answer to the needs of the world in this crucial hour. Rehabilitation, new fields, soul-winning, healing, training, and feeding the hungry multitudes—all challenge our best. The world is READY—are WE? Now is the time for young men and women to give themselves to mission service, and now is the time for our churches to give to the limit to world missions. Surely this is the hour for Baptists to rise up and do things!

One suggested means of enhancing our Foreign Mission work is for all of our churches to put **THE COMMISSION**, our Foreign Mission magazine, in their church budgets. Another is the new plan for schools of missions. An informed people will give to missions.

The marching orders of Baptists have always been, and please God may they always be, "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19, 20.)

The challenge of God to his people that moved Carey to inaugurate the modern world missions movement should stir our hearts to action today. It is, "Enlarge the place of thy tent, and let them stretch forth the curtains of thine habitations; spare not, lengthen thy cords, and strengthen thy stakes." (Isiah 54:2.)

Report of Religious Literature

Paul's admonition to Timothy to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth," is a good message to our Baptist People. Everyone should study the Book, God's Holy Word. In addition to the inspired word of God, Baptists have a number of periodicals which are of tremendous value to the churches, and to the denomination.

Foremost among these is our own Baptist Messenger. During the past year the circulation has reached a total of 35,000, which is the largest in its history. This increase is due largely to the church budget plan, which the majority of the churches have adopted. On October 1, editor Porter Routh resigned to become Secretary of Survey, Statistics, and Information of the Southern Baptist Convention. Mr. Routh was an efficient editor, and we commend him heartily to Southern Baptists in this larger field of service. The new editor, Reverend Albert McClellan formerly pastor of the First Baptist Church of Waureka, Oklahoma, assumed the position as editor October 1, and is doing a splendid job. With his aggressive leadership, the Messenger should reach higher planes of usefulness.

The Sunday School Board is publishing numerous books and periodicals of outstanding rank, which our people are using with great interest and profit. The Southern Baptist Home Mission is a monthly magazine, published by the Home Mission Board, and is filled with information which our people need. Dr. J. B. Lawrence is the editor. The Commission, The Foreign Mission Journal, edited by Dr. E. C. Routh, should be in every Baptist home.

We, your committee, make the following recommendations:

1. That the churches be urged to place the Baptist Messenger in their budgets, and send it to every home within the membership;
2. That the Southern Baptist Home Mission, and The Commission, be placed in the church budgets, and sent to the entire membership;
3. That our churches continue to use the splendid literature and books published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention;
4. That the churches make greater use of church libraries, using the services of the Sunday School Board for the establishment and the enlargement of these libraries;
5. And that all of our churches study the word of God, and the available literature, that they may be "workmen unashamed."

39. Rev. Horace Lee Janes led in prayer and the ladies' quartette of the First Baptist Church of Elk City brought a special message in song, namely "I'll go Where You Want Me to Be."

40. Rev. John Strutton, Alva, led in devotional service using Acts 1:6.

41. The afternoon service was dedicated to our State Mission work and Dr. T. P. Haskins, associate to Dr. Potter, took charge of the afternoon's program.

42. Dr. A. Hope Owen brought the "Report on Hospitals" and motion carried for its adoption. Mr. J. P. Cox, superintendent of the hospital at Muskogee, brought a report on the work at Muskogee.

Report on Hospitals

The Committee on Hospitals submits the following report.

During the past few years all hospitals have been crowded to capacity and at the same time, it has been most difficult to get nurses and supplies. However, our hospitals have carried on in a magnificent way. Oklahoma Baptist people have two hospitals. The Miami Baptist Hospital of Miami—Miss Florence M. Worley, Resident Superintendent—and the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital of Muskogee—Mr. J. P. Cox, Resident Superintendent.

The Miami Hospital admitted 2,355 patients during the past year and gave treatment to an additional 500 out patients. Miss Worley reports that they do about an average of \$500.00 worth of charity work each month. Plans are now

underway to rehabilitate this hospital and repair the buildings, replacing all equipment and bringing the entire hospital up to date. This is a long needed service for this worthy institution.

The Oklahoma Baptist Hospital of Muskogee reports current assets of \$339,400.44. The refrigeration and much of the other equipment needs to be replaced and brought up to date. This hospital is approved by the American College of Surgeons and is also approved by the American Hospital Association. The religious work is carefully carried on by the Baptist Student Union under the direction of Mrs. Frank Job. The School of Nursing is under the direction of Miss Leora Simpson, R. N. This School of Nursing is producing efficient and Christian women to minister to the sick and needy. The facilities of the nurses' home are obsolete. They should be brought up to date and rightfully furnished to care for the student nurses enrolled there.

A recapitulation of the Muskogee Hospital's facilities and service during the year reveals:

Number of beds.....	125
Number of graduate nurses working.....	18
Number of student nurses enrolled in school.....	40
Number of patients admitted.....	2732
Number of out patients treated.....	1360
Number of babies born.....	595

Totaling the three groups we cared for 4,687 patients. Of these, we rendered 1,423 patient days charity service at a cost of \$6,643.27.

From these reports we find that the hospitals of Oklahoma Baptists ministered to 5,087 patients and gave treatments to 1,860 out patients, thereby helping 6,947 sick people in the name of the Great Physician.

Oklahoma Baptists also have a part in the work of the Southern Baptist Hospital located at New Orleans, Louisiana. This hospital, so strategically located in New Orleans, renders an increasing service for our Saviour to the thousands of patients admitted to it each year.

43. Brother Haskins introduced all the workers in Secretary Potter's office; Editor Albert McClellan and the workers in the *Messenger* office; H. Truman Maxey and the Orphans' Home workers; The smaller children of the home were brought to the platform and they sang "Jesus Loves Me." An offering for the Orphans' Home was taken which amounted to \$288.22.

44. Dr. Berta K. Spooner, introduced the personnel of the Woman's Missionary Union Office. Miss Inabell Coleman, foreign missionary to China, spoke.

45. Dr. Elmer Ridgeway presented Mr. Bryce Twitty as president of Baptist Brotherhood work in Oklahoma. Dr. Ridgeway presented the Report on Brotherhood and Institutions.

Brotherhood and Institutions

This is, really, a department of ENLISTMENT and PROMOTION. It includes the promotion of all of our Oklahoma Baptist institutions, endowments, wills and bequests, and the enlistment of ALL of our Baptist men. Truly, this is a colossal task, though noble indeed, and one which every pastor and church in this state will endorse. Without our institutions, the denomination would be greatly impeded in the promotion and preaching of the gospel of God.

During the past year great emphasis has been placed on the Centennial Thank Offering, a worthy part of which goes to the building fund of Oklahoma Baptist University. This significant institution has long needed the lift of just such a

crusade. It has sent out more missionaries to foreign lands in the past, than any other denominational institution with the same percentage of enrollment. It has trained many of the successful pastors of Oklahoma—and adjoining states. It has directed the destinies of a generation as yet unborn, by preparing young men and women to go out into life's rugged domain, thoroughly equipped for their professional and business careers.

The potential power of our Baptist men in this state has never been estimated or realized. One of the high purposes of this department is to give all of our laymen a new vision of the needs of our several institutions. Many hundreds of our men have caught the vision, and are doing definite tasks that will insure a new and better day for the institutions which all of our people revere so much. Untold possibilities are ahead of us if we can only get ALL the man power in our churches harnessed up with the ongoing of our beloved institutions of Oklahoma.

The men who compose the memberships of the Brotherhood organizations have featured certain worthy activities this past year. More than 25,000 copies of the "Gospel of John" have been distributed through the office in Oklahoma City. Thousands of "extra" men were invited to our churches on "Layman's Day," October 14th. Through the leadership of Mr. Bryce Twitty, of Tulsa, who is State president, practically every radio station in Oklahoma carried brief programs on laymen's work on their day. The men in this organization have given encouragement and financial support to the great enterprise of building a new dormitory for men at Oklahoma Baptist University. Many associational meetings for men have been held throughout the state.

It so happens, however, that the Brotherhood organizations in Oklahoma have only a small portion of our Baptist men in their work. The ratio of churches with these men's organizations—and those WITHOUT them, would be about ten to one. This means, as anyone can see, that we have not begun to touch our Baptist man power by this method. It means, also, that we must enlarge our scope of endeavor if we are not doomed to defeat in the matter of our men. We must, somehow, secure ALL of our Baptist men in a mighty movement to advance the Kingdom of God. Where the Brotherhood organizations are succeeding with such total enlistment of our laymen, well and good. Where they are not, we must have some OTHER method of eliciting their interest and concern. There are approximately 900 Baptist churches in Oklahoma WITHOUT Brotherhood organizations. Some of these, yes, most of these churches will NEVER sponsor a Brotherhood. We can't go on with nine-tenths of our men UNENLISTED just because they won't belong to a Brotherhood. It is our belief that any movement which will be successful in reaching the men in our churches for denominational enterprises, and local church effort, will have IMMEDIATELY the whole-hearted support of ALL our Baptist pastors in this state.

No effort is here made to minimize the present Brotherhood organization. We believe that enlistment can be had through many of these. We are, however, forced to the conclusion that we are to go after men—ALL Baptist men, and where one method fails to reach them, then another plan must be found. Our institutions deserve and should have the unbounded loyalty, love, and labor of our laymen. Oklahoma Baptists are far behind other states in the matter of the endowments of institutions. Many millions of dollars are wisely invested in endowment funds by our sister states. Oklahoma Baptist University, our very own, has the smallest endowment of any Baptist university in the South. Our Orphans' Home should be endowed. Our two Baptist hospitals must have expansion and new equipment. Our men should swing behind these institutions with all their might. Many wills and bequests should be made by them. Estate analysts should be consulted in order that free and liberal gifts can be made for the perpetuation of the life and usefulness of our institutions.

The plan for the next conventional year calls for several district and associational meetings for our laymen, a far more extensive effort for the enlistment of our men, whatever the method or meeting may be called, and a general all-out

advance to secure for our institutions the active support toward progress and growth, by every Baptist man—in every Baptist church—in Oklahoma.

Report on Religious Education

With grateful hearts to the Lord for his continued blessings upon us, we present this report of the work of the Department of Religious Education.

The personnel of this department is as follows: Dr. Jack Gritz, Associate Secretary; Miss Sophia Duerksen, Training Union Promotion and Young People's Leader; Mrs. J. W. Barron, Vacation Bible School Promotion and Junior Leader; Mrs. Dorothy Sneed, Office Secretary; Mrs. Wayman Hiner, Approved Primary Worker; Mrs. W. H. Crowder, Approved Beginner Worker; Mrs. G. H. Caudill, Approved Cradle Roll and Nursery Worker. In addition to these workers we have other qualified workers who are used from time to time in enlargement campaigns, central training schools and assemblies. All the workers in the department are capable, consecrated and efficient in their individual position.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

The report of our Sunday school work for the year is most encouraging. There were 38 schools which received standard recognition, which is a gain of 19 over last year; and a total of 11,781 Teacher Training Awards granted, which is a gain of 2,610.

Oklahoma ranks high among the Southern states in standard Sunday School work. The number of standard classes and departments for the past year is as follows:

- 1 Adult department and 26 classes
- 1 Young People's department and 17 classes
- 7 Intermediate departments and 79 classes
- 19 Junior departments and 40 classes
- 26 Primary departments
- 13 Beginner departments
- 12 Nursery departments
- 2 Cradle Roll departments

We are especially grateful to God for the increased interest in Vacation Bible School work in Oklahoma. The number of Vacation Bible Schools held in Oklahoma during the last ten years is as follows:

All the reports for 1945 are not in, but to date we have received 429 reports and we have every reason to believe that 450 or more schools were held in Oklahoma during the past summer.

TRAINING UNION

Southern Baptists had a small loss in Training Union enrollment last year but Oklahoma Baptists had a gain of 774. We rank fifth in Training Union enrollment in the South. The states of Texas, Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia have a larger enrollment, but each of these states have more than 400,000 church members.

One of the most encouraging things about our training program is the number of study course awards earned in 1945: 14,732 awards were issued this year to Oklahoma Training Union members, which is an increase of 3,730 over last year.

Although it was impossible to have our Falls Creek Assembly last summer, ten associational and district assemblies were held in the state. Most excellent reports came from all these assemblies and each of them has made a very definite contribution to our training program and the youth of our state.

EVANGELISM

In the fall of 1944 the Department of Religious Education began making preparation for a major contribution to the Centennial Crusade. In January 1945 a religious census was taken in many communities and this census provided many of our churches with the names and addresses of our evangelistic possibilities. During the year a great emphasis was placed upon training in soul-winning, both in the Sunday School and Training Union. January was designated as the month for all-church schools of evangelism in our churches and Mr. J. N. Barnette, head of the Sunday School Department at Nashville, prepared a special book for the Centennial Crusade entitled "The Place of the Sunday School in Evangelism." From January 1 to May 1, 1945 more than 5,000 teachers in Oklahoma had received credit on this book alone.

On March 6, Oklahoma churches co-operated in the Southwide Sunday School Rallies and on April 24 in the Southwide Training Union Rallies. The attendance upon these rallies was the largest in our history. One association alone had more than 2,100 in attendance. The emphasis in both of these rallies was on the Centennial Evangelistic Crusade and we feel that they made a great contribution toward creating an evangelistic spirit for the crusade of 1945.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Never before have the campuses of America suffered such up-sets, reorganization and disruption as during the past year. However, in spite of the many difficulties, our student organizations have done very fine work. Dr. Jack Gritz has had charge of the Student Work during 1945 and has wrought well in that field. He has recently made a tour of the campuses, along with Mr. Bob Denny of the Student Department in Nashville, and they report that there are more girls on the college campus than ever before and the boys are returning in increasing numbers as they are discharged from the armed services.

During the next few years our college and university enrollment will be larger than ever before, which will greatly increase the challenge of student work. A new department of Music and Student Work has recently been created and Mr. Ira Prosser, who has done most excellent work in Louisiana, has been elected secretary.

The Student Union Convention, held in Stillwater on November 2 and 3, was well attended. Most of our colleges and universities were represented at the convention.

The future for Sunday School and Training Union work is exceedingly bright. Our Sunday Schools and Training Unions are showing a marked increase in attendance since the close of the war. Our people are far more responsive now than at any time during the last three or four years.

As we enter the year 1946 we will be launching a New Century for Christ. We hope to launch this century with an accelerated emphasis upon teaching and training.

Report of the Board of Directors

"For whosoever shall call upon the name of the lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard and how shall they hear without a preacher and how shall they preach, except they be sent

—Romans 10:13-15

This closing year of war has been one of our greatest in denominational achievement. When other groups in our state are compromising with each other, retrenching and retreating, we are standing firm upon the tried and proven principles which Baptists have loyally practiced through the years and which they yet find to be consistent with the teachings of God's Word.

God has blessed us because of our willingness to stand by our convictions. He has given us marvelous increases in both churches and church membership. He has permitted us to go afield with an army of vigorous, warm-hearted preachers, new and old, to proclaim His Word to the people of neglected areas in city and country. He has granted us our greatest year of material gain during 1945.

He has given us laymen who can represent His cause in the high places of every community, and represent it well. Many of our people are like the far-seeing and able Apostle, the beloved Paul, "No mean citizen." The name, Baptist, has come to stand for something—vigor, progress, fidelity to conviction, democracy, and unyielding loyalty to the Word of God. The name, Baptist, is indeed your open door to many a man's respect.

There are a few states in the Southern Baptist Convention more blessed than

ours. Few where there is a happier relation between the leaders and the people, and few where progress has been so markedly harmonious.

To find reason for this achievement, we must harken back to our starting point in religious matters, to that singular, powerful, eternally fixed starting point, the revelation of God in and through Jesus Christ. We must start with Christ and go with Christ if we are to be true to our faith. This must be so of all Baptists, whether individuals, churches, or the denomination. Whenever we forsake this truth we forsake the one truth that justifies our cause. Let this be the everlasting sentiment of every Baptist.

These victories are not without purpose. They have been the work of God in a new state laying a foundation for a new day yet to come. He expects us to keep building both foundation and superstructure in order that this potent new state may become forevermore a stronghold of truth and order. We must be an example of what the New Testament message rightly interpreted can mean to the world.

Brethren, we are yet traveling toward tomorrow. We must keep our line of advance in order. We must not give way to Satan. Indeed we must move forward all the way up and down the line as one man. The time is here, not for retrenchment, but for advancement!

STATE MISSIONS

Nearly everything we do can be called state missions, but it is well to note that work is divided into several departments each assigned a special task. Many varieties of talent and experience are necessary to reach the large field so white unto harvest.

Out of the multitude of two and one half million people living in the bounds of our lovely Sooner state, Baptists have grown a constituency, 277,000 strong.

The Commonwealth of Oklahoma, therefore, will be greatly influenced by our Baptist people. It is imperative that we "be much as well as many." All those charged with special duties will make their contribution alongside the churches.

DEPARTMENT LEADERS

Andrew Potter, Executive Secretary, ably assisted by Dr. Thos. P. Haskins, has several departmental leaders, engaged in work, all of which is state missions,

Our state convention is set up much in the same way as an efficient Sunday School. Besides the general superintendent, there is a sufficient number of department superintendents, each assuming responsibility for getting the work done in his own field.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

E. W. Westmoreland, Secretary of Sunday School and Training Union work, is assisted by the following full-time workers: Jack Gritz, Sophia Duerksen, Mrs. J. W. Barron and Dorothy Sneed. His approved workers are: Mrs. G. M. Salmon, Intermediate; Mrs. Wayman Hiner, Primary Sunday School and Intermediate Training Union; Mrs. Walter Crowder, Beginner; and Mrs. G. H. Caudill, Cradle Roll.

Oklahoma stands high in Sunday School and Training Union work. The following is a report from the office of Secretary Westmoreland: In 1945 there were 1,014 Sunday Schools with a total enrollment of 157,627; 3,449 Training Unions with an enrollment of 50,978. There were 11,288 Sunday School awards and 14,045 Training Union awards (accounted for by 10 regional assemblies.) Oklahoma reported 38 Standard Sunday Schools this year, twice as many as reported in 1944.

Standard departments and classes are as follows: One Adult department with 26 classes; one Young People's department with 17 classes; 7 Intermediate departments with 78 classes; 18 Junior departments with 40 classes; 28 Primary departments; 13 Beginner departments, 12 Nursery departments (twice as many as any state in the south;) and 2 Cradle Roll departments.

The department also furnished teachers and workers for the ten regional summer assemblies.

SACRED MUSIC AND STUDENT UNION

The newest phase of our work is under the leadership of Ira C. Prosser, who recently came to Oklahoma from the Student Union and Brotherhood Department of the Louisiana State Convention.

Some time will be needed to organize and promote the right type of music program for the churches that are badly in need of better music. Mr. Prosser is efficient and well qualified to give us a fine program in the field of music.

The Baptist Student Union has a bright future. Thousands of our young men and women are returning from the armed services to re-enter college, while a multitude of freshmen come to the campuses each year. The Baptist Student Union renders valuable service by touching the lives of these college young people. Under the leadership of Mr. Prosser, who has had wide experience in youth work, the Oklahoma Student Union Department will continue to grow.

Baptist Student Secretaries are on the following campuses: University of Oklahoma, Norman; Oklahoma A. & M., Stillwater; Central State Teachers, Edmond; Baptist Hospital, Muskogee; and North Eastern State Teachers, Tahlequah. There is a strong Student Union on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University and on most of the other campuses of the state even though they do not have paid secretaries.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Oklahoma Baptist women under the wise and constructive leadership of their honored secretary, Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, have made commendable gains even though 1945 has been a time of heartbreak for many whose sons have been at war.

They exceeded every goal accepted. The goal for the Lottie Moon offering was \$30,000, but they received \$44,981. The goal for the Annie W. Armstrong offering was \$12,000 with total cash receipts reaching the high mark of \$17,130.52. The goal of \$5,000 for State Missions was almost doubled \$9,742.96.

Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, State President, with her corps of helpers has been an inspiration to Oklahoma Baptist women in their intensive missionary activities.

The Auxiliaries of W. M. U. have been ably promoted by the Young People's Leader, Mrs. Bill Carden.

Mrs. Berta K. Spooner holds the record for long-time service with the Baptist General Convention. On December 31, 1945, she will complete a quarter of a century of noble service to the woman's Missionary Union and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

During these twenty-five years, her work has been highly efficient; she has given herself without stint or reserve to every good cause; she has been a sympathetic and helpful counselor in every advance movement planned by the Baptist General Convention; and she has devoted her time and talent with warm-hearted devotion

Your Executive Secretary takes this opportunity to say that in Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, we have had a helper indeed and truly she is a great woman.

BROTHERHOOD AND INSTITUTIONS

Dr. Elmer Ridgeway, Secretary of this department is doing excellent work among our men. He travels widely, speaking to large groups of men concerning every phase of denominational life, especially on the building of our institutions.

Dr. Ridgeway is continually seeking out donors of gifts, large or small, for the institutions.

Any person interested in making gifts or wills to any of our institutions should get in touch with him for conference.

Let each of us pray, as we "Launch a New Century for the Master," that God may put it into the hearts of many people to come to the aid of our institutions, helping us to build them strong and enduring.

RURAL MISSIONS—FALLS CREEK

Sam W. Scantlan is Superintendent of Rural Missions. Working with him are eight State Missionaries, jointly supported by the Home Mission Board and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The state has been divided into eight separate districts with a missionary in charge of each. These men work with the Associational Missionaries among the rural and village churches.

No field offers greater possibilities. Thousands of war workers and service men are returning to the farms. Country churches everywhere are making some gains.

The small fund used this year to help rebuild country church buildings in strategic locations must be enlarged. Rural churches need aid in their construction program and many of them need help in the support of the ministry.

The Rural Mission Department is engaged in this gigantic task in a progressive and vigorous fashion.

Mr. Scantlan also manages the Falls Creek Assembly grounds.

Next year will see no doubt, the largest group of Baptists ever assembled at Falls Creek. The war has prevented us from having the Assembly for three years, but plans are being made for the largest gathering ever in attendance at Falls Creek, August 5 - 15, 1946.

Large sums of money must be expended and improvements made in roads and all facilities on the grounds.

We recommend that all churches repair their cabins or build new ones at the earliest time possible.

BAPTIST MESSENGER

Porter Routh, editor of the *Messenger* for two years, recently became the successor to Dr. E. P. Alldredge as Secretary of the Department of Survey, Statistics and Information of the Sunday School Board at Nashville Tennessee.

Albert McClellan, the capable young Pastor of the First Church, Waurika, Oklahoma, has been called as editor of the *Baptist Messenger*.

He has started off in a commendable way. His first editions demonstrate his ability as an editor. We believe the *Baptist Messenger* has once again been transferred to wise and capable hands.

The *Baptist Messenger* is an outstanding religious journal that keeps all of us informed about the program and progress of Oklahoma Baptists.

The circulation of the *Messenger* has reached an all-time high with a total of 36,034 subscriptions.

The *Baptist Messenger* finds its way into homes far out in the country, as well as the city homes. It goes to the poor and the rich, to the faithful and unfaithful members, to the young and the old.

Baptists meet on a common ground in the *Messenger*. Upon its pages missionaries and other writers visit multitudes whom they could not meet in person.

Many churches are using the back pages of the *Messenger* for local news, and most churches have the state paper in the budget. We would recommend such a plan to all.

PORTER ROUTH RESIGNS

Porter Routh resigned the editorship of the *Baptist Messenger* October 1, 1945, after two years and three months of outstanding service. Within this period the paper gained a net of 18,000 subscribers, or 50 percent, testimony enough to his success. He gave us a periodical satisfying to preachers, but not too technical for laity. He executed suitable balance between inspirational and promotional material, reporting fairly and accurately all necessary and interesting matters. His editorials were pithy and fully matured, striking aptly at most problems and commending where commendation was due.

Technical improvement of the MESSENGER was very noticeable. The layout was efficiently managed, with all departments in proper place with proportionate headings. His frequent human interest stories made the paper refreshingly readable. And, despite increased costs in publication, he kept expenses within the budget and had a considerable cash balance at the end of his tenure.

Oklahoma Baptists have confidence in Porter Routh. And though they regret losing him, they wish him success and happiness as Secretary of Survey and Statistics for the Southern Baptist Convention. As Executive Secretary, I keenly feel his absence. He was a consistent, far-seeing adviser.

BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME

The Baptists Orphans' Home is an institution close to the heart of our Oklahoma constituency. The Baptist Orphanage has furnished a haven and sanctuary impuning thousands of boys and girls from the sufferings and heartaches of a cold and heartless world.

Resident Manager, H. Truman Maxey, is making an outstanding record. Associated with Mr. Maxey are Mrs. Gladys Dicken, head matron, and C. E. Goatcher, farm manager. Their influence, and that of the many other helpers, make our Children's Home one of the best in the nation.

The Oklahoma Baptist Orphanage is now providing food, shelter, education and religious training for 175 helpless children—the largest in our history. The successful conclusion of the financial campaign inspired by the magnificent gift of \$100,000 by Mr. Frank Phillips, Bartlesville, has provided sufficient money to erect a group of buildings to care for practically twice the number now in our home. Owing to war-time restrictions we have been unable to erect these greatly needed buildings to take care of our growing family. Now that priorities have been lifted, we have buildings already under construction, and hope to complete others as rapidly as possible.

A fine anonymous friend has provided funds to build a swimming pool as soon as materials can be secured with which to construct it. What a joy this will be to the children in our Baptist Home.

We have purchased additional land also and are enlarging our farm operations. Thus, we will be enabled to provide part of our food, as well as dairy products. C. E. Goatcher is directing activities on the farm, which furnishes work and training for our growing boys who need something to engage them during the summer period.

All the children of school age attend either the grade or high school. In addition, some of our fine young men and women of college age are now in training in colleges in Oklahoma. We do not guarantee a college education to our ambitious boys and girls, but if they want to go to college we assist in every way possible to see their ambitions realized. We have the same hopes and ambitions for our growing Baptist family that you have for your own children at home.

Generous friends are providing funds to assist in the college education of some of our young people. If there are those who desire to assist in this worthy enterprise of helping our orphan young people secure a college education, we would deeply appreciate it. We promise to see that your money is properly spent and that you get value received for your investment in young life.

When the Baptist Orphanage is finally completed and dedicated debt-free, it will be an institution as good as the best in America of its kind. On that happy day of celebration, we will invite you, our Baptist friends and supporters in Oklahoma, to be present for that glorious occasion.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Dr. John W. Raley has proved his ability to build a university, for none can deny that the appearance of the campus has gradually changed for the better since he became president over a decade ago.

The Convention supplies \$50,000 each year (in lieu of endowment) for the operating expenses of the school.

The faculty has been strengthened until it is fast becoming one of the best to be found on any campus.

Christian education is the process by which we learn to correctly interpret life. All of our Baptist people should see to it that our children have the best in higher education, the kind offered by Oklahoma Baptist University. All of us are anxious about the future of our one Baptist school, but we are not really interested until our own children go there, and we furnish the money needed to make Oklahoma Baptist University a school preeminent in Christian culture and learning.

The school has been operated for several years without deficits or debts, and as to the future, we expect to keep it free from the strangulation of excessive financial burdens, and, finally, to supply an endowment fund that will assure adequate support for the future.

HOSPITALS

Oklahoma Baptists own and operate well-equipped hospitals at Miami and Muskogee, debt free, and performing worth while healing ministry, with Miss Florence Worley and Mr. J. P. Cox as superintendents. Remarkable improvements have been made in the Muskogee Hospital in equipments, operation and popularity.

Within the last five years because hospitalization insurance has become one of the established necessities for people industrially and professionally employed, demand for hospital space has greatly increased. Oklahoma Baptists should prepare to meet this modern medical tempo with increased and improved facilities, for there is just something different about the atmosphere of Christian hospitals. They offer some of the greatest opportunities for reaching people for Christ.

BAPTIST BOOK STORE

The Baptist Book Store, located in the Baptist Building, 223 West First Street, Oklahoma City, is owned and operated by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Mr. H. Killingsworth, Manager of the store, is rendering invaluable service by furnishing Oklahoma Baptists with all types of books and helps necessary for every phase of church work.

Keep in touch with your own Baptist Book Store for good books and literature, and remember that even though the Sunday School Board owns and operates the Baptist Book Store that it is an integral part of the Baptist General Convention.

BAPTIST HEADQUARTERS

A new Baptist Headquarters in an imperative necessity. We have outgrow our present building, and have been compelled to rent five offices in other building in Oklahoma City in order to house our growing personnel.

Every department head is crying for more room to expand and enlarge his work but there is none available. The present three-floor structure, purchased more than twenty years ago, was a dilapidated store building, never designed for the type of work in which we are now engaged. Effective promotion of the work of the various departments of the Baptist General Convention demands twice the room available in the present building.

After discussing this serious problem with department heads, Board members, pastors, and other interested friends, the matter was brought to the attention of the Executive Committee, who unanimously recommended to the Board of Directors that we acquire a lot, plan a building suitable to our needs, and proceed as quickly as practicable to erect a home for the Baptist General Convention.

The Board of Directors, therefore, recommends to the Convention that we proceed immediately to purchase a suitable building site in Oklahoma City; and employ architects to make plans and specifications for said building; and, as soon as practicable, to erect a building suitable to the needs of the Baptist General Convention; and that all the details be referred to the Board of Directors and Executive Secretary for consummation; and that said Board of Directors and Secretary shall have plenary powers to do all things necessary to carry out this provision; and are hereby authorized and directed to proceed for the purchase of a proper building site and do all things necessary for the erection of a suitable building in accordance with the needs of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION

At a meeting of the Board of Directors on July 3, 1945, the matter of the organization of a Baptist Foundation was discussed at length. It was agreed to give further study to this matter and to look with favor upon the organization of a so-called "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma."

We, therefore, recommend that we continue the study and that the Board of Directors be authorized to organize the foundation *when* and *if* they deem wise to do so.

CHURCHES

In order to have a strong mission program that will reach around the world, it is first necessary to build mighty churches. The spirit of cooperation prevails among our churches enabling us to do a great and noble work for our Lord as a Convention.

It would be hard to estimate how much building our churches will do during this post-war era, but undoubtedly multiplied thousands of dollars will go into new houses of worship.

Our churches are baptizing more converts and giving larger sums to missionary causes. Some of them are approaching a fifty-fifty division of funds between local and missionary enterprises.

THIRTY-THREE ASSOCIATIONS

The district associations are the first units in denominational life and co-operation. We need, therefore, to make them strong, emphasizing their importance and preserving their status.

Associational Moderators are actually assistants to the State Executive Secretary in promoting the work of Oklahoma Baptists.

The monthly and annual meetings of the associations are invaluable to the effectiveness and force of both state and southwide work.

INCREASE IN BAPTISMS

Thirty associations have reported commendable gains in baptisms. The three associations not reporting increases are not at all reasons for alarm, because each one had exceptional records in baptisms last year.

During the war period there has been a steady decline in baptisms. Thousands of our best leaders marched away to battle, interrupting the organized life of most of our churches.

But Oklahoma Baptists, under leadership of Dr. Thos. P. Haskins, Assistant Executive Secretary, entered whole-heartedly into the "Crusade for Souls" launched by the Southern Baptist Convention. Pastors, missionaries, evangelists and laity went to work earnestly seeking the lost.

Records from the churches show that Oklahoma Baptists have baptized more people this year than ever before. In spite of the emotional upsets of the many critical days of war and victory, our churches have continued to win souls. While our men were fighting and dying on the battle fronts, Baptists at home were marching "into the highways and hedges" constraining the lost to come to Jesus.

Evangelism makes Baptists what they are. All critics are silenced when souls are won. Our record this year is far below what it should be, but let us never lose sight of the fact that, in all our work, we are dealing with the eternal destinies of men. The best fight against sin is soul-winning. Evangelism is our most powerful force for righteousness. It is our business as Oklahoma Baptists to preach the Gospel of Christ to every lost soul. All of our institutions are in one way or another soul-winning agencies.

Lost men, like the Greeks, come seeking Jesus. We must be able to show them

our Lord Christ when they come inquiring.

"We would see Jesus,"
Said the Greeks of old,
"We are tired of sin
And its death-bound goal."

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

A great host of Oklahoma Baptist pastors are participating in the Ministers' Retirement Plan. What a blessing this will be to them in the days ahead!

We have 573 pastors and other denominational workers who have the protection which the Ministers' Retirement Plan affords. Too many have failed to take advantage of this golden opportunity to provide for themselves a retirement annuity. We earnestly urge young men coming into the Ministry to begin at once to provide an annuity for the days ahead when they will be compelled by age or physical disability to retire from active service of the churches. This is the first time in the history of our denomination when it has made provision in a substantial fashion for aged or disabled preachers and other church and institutional employees.

To date, there are 56 men who are already receiving the benefits of the Ministers' Retirement Plan. Some have retired because of old age, others because of infirmities that prevented them continuing in the work. What a joy it is for this office to send a check to them each month; thus, providing the necessities of life to these aged or disabled veterans of the Cross.

The Ministers' Retirement Plan has extended its ministry to include all full-time employees of any Baptist Church or institution. We urge all workers who are not pastors to avail themselves of the opportunity of providing for their future. In case a lay-worker in a church enters other work in the future, all he has paid in will be returned to him with 3 percent interest. It thereby becomes a savings account.

The Baptist General Convention sponsors and promotes these retirement plans for all classes of workers in Baptist churches and institutions, and provides funds to support it. The Board of Directors earnestly urges all pastors and lay-church workers to avail themselves of this opportunity to protect their future.

In the past, we have seen veterans of the Cross who have made outstanding contributions to the Kingdom of God die in poverty and some have been buried in a pauper's grave. What a shame that this should happen! It must not happen again! Provision through the Ministers' Retirement Plan has been made to protect our workers from poverty and distress. If our workers come to a penniless old age, it will be because of their own volition; they have chosen not to protect their future through a retirement annuity. We suggest you investigate the Plan immediately.

CENTENNIAL THANK OFFERING

Last year it was universally realized that 1945 would close a century of successful organized mission achievement, a period in which Southern Baptists had grown to be one of the most forceful Christian bodies on earth. It was natural, therefore, that we should plan special effort commemorating this century of glorious gospel enterprise. Oklahoma Baptists wanted to make this great centennial year really historical. For this purpose a representative Centennial committee was formed, consisting of nine pastors, nine laymen, and nine women, as follows:

When this committee reported last year at Tulsa, they challenged the people to accept a special love offering goal of \$400,000. This added to the goal of \$355,000 for the Unified Budget, and \$245,000 expected designated offerings, meant that \$1,000,000 was in prospect for 1945.

We owe a debt of gratitude to the First Church, Oklahoma City, for releasing their pastor, Dr. J. Howard Williams, to give whatever time was needed for the raising of this money. It was my happy privilege to work with him and the committee as campaign director. No group on earth ever displayed more loyalty or happier than these 27 far-visioned leaders.

We are well over the goal of \$355,000 for the Unified Budget; and doubtless designated gifts will be raised by the end of the year. Also, we now have \$240,654.49 of the \$400,000 love offering. We believe that the churches can and will complete this offering before January 1, 1946.

Let us not rest upon the glorious gains of this one hundredth year. Indeed, let us make the first year of the second century as epochal as the last of the first was historical.

Let us press on to victory.

UNIFIED BUDGET

At long last Oklahoma Baptists are getting their financial program on a sound and satisfactory basis. For years we have been hampered by debts, deficits, and special drives for money.

The Great Commission, given by our Lord to the churches, is world-wide in scope; therefore, a momentous responsibility. This gigantic task to-be-done has brought the creation of what we familiarly term THE UNIFIED BUDGET OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION.

The Unified Budget means parenthood and home to orphan children, preaching the Gospel of Christ to a war-torn and sinful world, providing Christian Education for young people, and furnishing good hospitals in which Christian doctors and nurses can perform their healing ministry. In short, it means cooperative effort in missions wherever men live upon the earth.

Last year at Tulsa, the Convention set a 1945 Unified Budget goal of \$355,000. Cash receipts for the first ten months were \$386,645.35. At this rate, we shall probably raise \$465,078.43 for the year.

Also in 1945, we have had the Centennial Thank Offering, amounting to \$240,654.49 by October 31.

In 1946, we do not plan an extra campaign, but we are challenging all churches to increase their giving to missions through the Unified Budget. The regular program will be the special program next year.

We, therefore, recommend a Unified Budget of \$625,000.00 for 1946 to be divided as follows:

1. That the Cooperative Program receive \$96,000 as a first preferred item

based on the same percentage as heretofore. (This \$96,000 is the working budget out of which all regular expenses will be paid and is to be divided on a sixty-four basis.)

2. That \$50,000 go to Oklahoma Baptist University (in lieu of endowment) and Ministers' Retirement Plan.
3. That \$25,000 go to the building program wherever needed, designation to be made by the Board of Directors. (The above figures represent \$171,000 of the total Unified Budget.)
4. That the balance of \$434,000, if raised, be divided fifty-fifty between state and southwide causes with nothing deducted therefrom.

This plan will provide substantial amounts for state and southwide causes from the \$96,000, provide for current expenses of the University, furnish \$25,000 for the building program, and, in addition, allow \$217,000 each for state and southwide causes.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That it will be our policy to operate on a cash basis.
2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best administration and promotion of our work.
3. That we instruct all agencies provided for in the budget not to incur any debts not authorized by the Board of Directors during 1946.
4. That the 1946 State Mission Budget be projected on a basis that will insure no deficits at the close of the year.
5. That we continue the ten per cent contingency fund from in-the-state objects as a safeguard against possible deficits.
6. That the Board of Directors be authorized and instructed to re-adjust the figures of the Unified Budget if receipts do not justify the suggested distribution. We solemnly renew our pledge to the Baptists of Oklahoma that there will be no debt delacies during this administration.
7. We further recommend that all Unified Budget funds above \$171,000 (which is the basis of operation) be divided fifty-fifty between state and southwide causes.

We are happy to announce the largest total receipts, \$1,010,763.34, in the history of the Baptist General Convention for 1944. Of this amount \$380,493.14 was given through the Unified Budget.

CONCLUSION

Baptists of Oklahoma are in a position to do really big things. Were we to stop now, to rest upon the gains of the past, the golden dawn of tomorrow's world would change to a dark, foggy sky. The sun would be there but the clouds of inertia would hide its face from our view. The last thing we can afford to do is to rest upon our laurels. We are yet traveling toward tomorrow!

Because the world needs truth now more than ever, we are more than ever custodians of truth. The need of the world has increased our responsibility. And because in these years of achievement, our orphanage, university, hospitals, and assembly, have grown to majestic heights, and our denominational organization has become a fully developed institution of missionary endeavor, comparable to any big business, we are more than ever God-called custodians.

We must keep our organizational efforts to the highest point of efficiency. Every individual Baptist and every church should attempt to measure up to their breadth and length, keeping in mind that our Lord has given us the stewardship of these mighty instruments of Gospel proclamation.

Oklahoma Baptists have attained a unity of purpose and policy unknown in many states. Because of the brotherhood of our institutions, we are able to keep all the wheels of missionary progress moving at the same time, in the same direction, for an identical goal—the glory of Christ and the building up of His Kingdom. Within our denominational life in Oklahoma there are no conflicting purposes or competing institutions. We are traveling toward tomorrow together!

It should be re-emphasized that in 1946 the foundation on which rests the financial integrity of this brotherhood of institutions is to have special emphasis. None claim the Unified Budget perfect. What is claimed is that the Unified Budget represents what we believe to be conviction in the hearts of the people as to the need of Christ's Kingdom in Oklahoma in these years. In 1946 let us give it glorious support.

But let us not forget that the Unified Budget is worth little apart from the Christ of the Cross, Who is the hope of humanity. And in 1946 it will be tragedy for us to succeed in the Unified Budget, which we will, and fail in the all-out-spiritual campaign. But if Oklahoma Baptists are as faithful next year as they have been in

he years past, we will succeed in both undertakings more gloriously than ever. It is ours to follow the leadership of God, "to strive, to seek, to find, and not to yield."

54. Dr. Rupert Naney, Chairman of the "Committee on Future Plans and Policies" read the report and motion was made for its adoption with final vote to be taken at the evening session.

Report of the Committee on Future Plans and Policies

PROLOGUE:

This Committee was established as a standing agency of the Convention in 1939. Since that time it has regularly made a report to every annual session of the Convention, with perhaps one exception. In every report it has sought to be clear, brief and definite as to our plans and policies for the future. This report shall conform to that tradition. We beg leave, therefore, to recommend as follows:

I.

1. That we renew and reaffirm the purpose of this Convention to complete the building of the physical plant at our Baptist Children's Home in Oklahoma City. As you well know this work was begun several years ago by the construction of three new buildings and was continued by the raising of a large sum of money, namely \$343,247.20 to complete the work.

2. That we proceed with the construction of the buildings, already approved by this Convention, on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University. These include:

(1) The Library and Art Center now nearing completion; which building is being constructed under the direction of the Board of Trustees of the University and the University Administration.

(2) The Boys Dormitory for which the ground was broken several month ago and now awaits only the necessary labor and materials.

(3) The Chapel and Fine Arts Center. A prospectus of this building has been prepared by our Architects and its construction awaits, likewise, necessary materials and labor, but in addition the completion of our Centennial Campaign, out of which the funds for its completion are to be provided.

3. In recommending the completion of this program we also recommend that the work be done without involving this Convention in debt.

II.

Over a period of years, and almost throughout the history of this Convention, we have had repeated Special Campaigns for our Denominational enterprises and our Missionary endeavors. We would call your attention to the report that is being made by a special committee to this convention, recommending that the ensuing year be dedicated to making the Unified Budget our program. You will note from the report of the special committee that the objective of the Unified Budget is to be greatly enlarged. Let us look forward to the year ahead when we shall be free from special campaigns and to give emphasis in all of our churches to the Unified Budget.

III.

SPECIAL NOTICES:

1.—There is nothing in this report that prevents a local effort to supply a need of any of our Institutions.

2.—There is nothing that prevents seeking and receiving special gifts to any agency or institution of this Convention.

IV.

THE BAPTIST BUILDING:

It is not news that we own our own Headquarters building in Oklahoma City.

The purchase of this building was one of the most profitable steps we have taken. We find now, however, that it is inadequate for our present needs, to say nothing of the future. Already we find it necessary to find office appointments for some of our people in buildings outside our own, therefore, your committee commends, and recommends your approval of, the decision of the Board of Directors of this Convention to relocate the Baptist Building—thus to provide ample office and conference space for our present needs and for many years ahead.

62. Dr. J. Howard Williams, Chairman of the Committee on "Program for 1946" presented the report. Motion was made for adoption.

Oklahoma Baptists Joining a Century of Conquest

Oklahoma Baptists with five million fellow Southern Baptists are standing at the threshold of a new century. God's blessings have never been more clearly indicated than in the Centennial year which is soon to close. The fires of evangelism have never burned as brightly as now. The first "million dollar year" for Oklahoma Baptists seems to be assured. The accomplishment of the "dream of Secretary Potter" for the establishment of our institutions certainly is at hand. Here in this Convention we are to sound the keynote of the new Southern Baptist century. We must assure that this inaugural year of the new century will present Oklahoma Baptists with their greatest challenge.

We face the year 1946 in the midst of spiritual demoralization wrought by war. The most deadly attacks of the forces of evil with which we contend are those directed at our faith. The subtle propaganda of "unionism" and "nondenominationalism" finds many of our people uninformed as to the great doctrines of the New Testament. There is great need for a new emphasis on the doctrines of our faith. We must make the foundations of the New Century for Christ the "Thus saith the Lord" of the New Testament. Heresy needs to be met and vanquished by truth.

We should recognize also that the evangelistic crusade of the year closing has opened doors for us. The programs engaged in successfully for winning men have prepared us for greater accomplishments in the year that lies ahead. Much of the harvest from seed sown in '45 should be reaped in '46.

The financial program recommended in our great Unified Budget goal of \$625,000.00 for '46 presents us with our greatest opportunity for the re-discovery of the spiritual necessities and values in New Testament stewardship. It is to be hoped that we shall so emphasize the spiritual obligations that cause God's people to bring their tithes and offerings on the Lord's day to the Lord's house, that the needs of this Unified program will be assured. There are no special campaigns and the resultant upsurge in consecrated stewardship through the regular channels of our churches should be tremendous.

We, your committee, therefore suggest that the 1946 program be centered in three words:

First—Conviction. Let us have this year a reaffirmation of the doctrines of our faith. We should resolve to give an emphasis to doctrines which is the greatest in our history. We ought to establish anew "our reason for being" as Baptists. We will preach and teach with Christian love and fervor, Salvation by Grace, Christ's doctrine of the church, regeneration requisite to church membership, the ordinances of the church, and the officers of the church and other distinctive Baptist beliefs. No other foundation will be adequate for the program of a new century.

Second—Compassion. In the blood stream of Baptists is a concern for a lost world that makes evangelism an imperative. We ought to win more people to our Saviour this new year than in the last. We will challenge our people to pray for broken hearted compassion that will envelop the world in its warmth. The wounds of our mission fields will be bound up by people with compassionate hearts.

The third work is Consecration. We use this word because it is all inclusive concerning the response of the Christian to the Lordship of Jesus. We seek for a revival of holy Christian living on the part of God's people. As a part of our consecration we will call ourselves to honest stewardship. We have the challenge of a great unified program. Bringing our tithes to the Lord's house on the Lord's day is intensely spiritual. Consecration is our must for victory.

To implement the carrying out of these 1946 objectives, your committee recommends:

1. The adoption of these three Spiritual Superlatives as the 1946 program of our Convention.

2. That our Secretary, Dr. Andrew Potter, be requested to lead us in this spiritual conquest for '46 directing the work of all the employees and agencies of the Convention to this end.

3. That great district rallies be arranged for early in the year presenting these major objectives before our people.

4. That the educational program of the Convention in rallies, Assemblies, conventions and campaigns put doctrine, evangelism and stewardship at the heart of it.

5. That we offer the full resources and all the agencies of the Convention to the churches through the associational organizations in helping them in whatever measure we can to fulfill their loftiest hopes in the attainment of these goals. We recognize that all of this work is dependant upon the churches. Therefore, we suggest that a specific time be given in each annual associational meeting next summer and fall to the matter of practical methods, ways and means by which rural, town and city churches may enlist the greatest number of their members in the fullest experience and expression of stewardship of self and substance.

The spiritual resources of the people of God are infinite. There could not be a better time for Oklahoma Baptists to embark on a great spiritual enterprise. The significance of the launching of a new century of Southern Baptist life and the present world situation combine to make this the most challenging hour of Okla-

homa Baptist history. With Conviction, Compassion, and Consecration as our keynote, we will go all out for Christ in 1946.

66. Rev. W. A. Carleton brought a heart-moving address, urging a positive and definite message for the days before us.

67. Congregation stood singing "Are You Washed in the Blood?" Miss Eunye Register sang two of the stanzas.

68. Assistant Secretary, Dr. T. P. Haskins, brother beloved by all Oklahoma Baptists, brought the closing message of the evening. "Launching a New Century with Jesus" was the subject of the address.

69. Motions made following presentation of the Report of the "Board of Directors"—"Future Plans and Policies"—and the "Program for 1946" were called to attention of the Convention and upon unanimous vote carried, making the recommendations contained in them the 1946 objectives.

70. The choir of the First Baptist Church sang "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" dedicated to the memory of Rev. Geo. P. Drake, who for a third of a century served our Lord and Denomination in Oklahoma. Congregation stood as the song was sung.

71. Dr. John W. Raley, President of Oklahoma Baptist University, pronounced the benediction.

Thursday Morning November 8, 1945, 9:00 A. M.

72. The morning session opened with song service led by Mr. Ira Prosser. Mr. Prosser led in prayer for God's guidance and blessings upon the day's activities. Songs used were: "Take the Name of Jesus With You." "I Gave My Life For Thee," and "Tread Softly."

Social Service Report

Many have had a feeling that the closing of the war would be a cure-all for most of the present day evils. The war is over; that is the war against sin. We come to conventions every year and pass resolutions against evil and meet the

next year to find things about as bad as they were before. What is to be our attitude? Shall we give up? No. Eternal vigilance is the price of victory. We call to your attention:

1. **LEWD, NUDE, CHEAP LITERATURE.** Doctors say we are what we eat. That is true morally with regard to the literature we read. Solomon said, "As a man thinketh in his heart so is he." We have law enforcement officers and public health officers trying to cope with the results of sin and crime while the things that feed them are overlooked or not dealt with. Not much use to deal with venereal disease and crime while we let continue the literature that incites them. Much of the present day literature for sale at drug stores and news stands in proposed in the name of psychology and sex education, but is as filthy and dangerous as the literature that helped to lead to Rome's fall.

2. **DELINQUENCY.** We did not limit that to Juvenile delinquency for we feel that Adults are more at fault than youth. Themistocles said his little girl ruled Greece. He said that she ruled her mother and that her mother ruled him and that he ruled Athens and that Athens ruled Greece. These have been trying times through which we have passed. We do owe our youth a lot. We have neglected them. The old prayer altar is gone in most homes. We feel that we do not have time for our children in many homes. Youth needs recreation. God recognizes that and says for His people to rejoice. But, with the rejoicing He reminds us that we will be held accountable as to what type our recreation is. Ecclesiastes 11:9. Many are working diligently at this problem. But, in trying to meet this problem, let us not defeat our purpose. When a ship is on fire it is possible to knock holes in the bottom and let the water flow in and extinguish the fire, but the ship is also sunk. Let us not forget the true mission of the church.

3. **LIQUOR.** Liquor is still a number one enemy of man. Liquor is having its heyday. Many of our young men and women who never tasted liquor or beer had their first taste while in the armed service. Beer has been glorified by the appeal that its revenues help send children to school and help take care of the aged. While a woman's picture never appeared on a liquor ad, liquor concerns have now become bold and woman's picture even seems to dominate, with even the child being brought into the picture. We are happy to hear of the victory in local option elections in some parts of some of our states.

We suggest that prayer be made for the unfortunate ones who have fallen prey to the devil in these and other evils. We suggest that prayer be made for those in authority who have to do with the making of laws and with law enforcement. We urge our people to take their stand against present day evils though they be prevalent as in the days of Noah. We would magnify the home. In closing, we would remind ourselves that the great hope of the world is not reformation, legislation nor education, but regeneration. Jesus said, "Ye are my witnesses." Let us take heed lest we slacken our soul-winning efforts after this "Million soul" campaign of 1945. Let us bring them to Jesus Christ who is the only hope for the individual and for the world.

80. The Oklahoma Baptist University hour arrived and Paul Nance gave a report on the School. Special Music—Men's Glee Club of O. B. U. under the direction of Dean Warren Angell.

Message by Dr. John W. Raley—"Christ or Annihilation."

Oklahoma Baptist University Report

An increase of nearly fifty percent in student enrollment, plus enlargement and strengthening of the faculty and improvements and adjustments of the physical plant—these are among the evidences of a successful transition from war to peace at Oklahoma Baptist University. We are not "getting back to normal" in the sense of returning to pre-war conditions. When the gains during the emergency period have been consolidated, and when the last visible traces of war-time adjustments have disappeared, a new and far greater Oklahoma Baptist University will have come into being.

Enrollment: The total enrollment for the school year just past was 780 of which 503 were for the regular session. Our enrollment for first semester this school year is twenty percent above the first semester last year. We have at present 26 Veterans enrolled. During the next year this amount should be greatly increased with the rapid transition of Veterans to civilian life.

Faculty: The faculty of the University has been strengthened by the return of faculty members who have been on leave during the war and the addition of other capable persons. The beginning of the current semester has brought with it a new enthusiasm, a new spirit of progressiveness among the faculty of Oklahoma Baptist University, and they are united in their determination to set a pace of continuous growth and achievement. Among those who returned to the faculty are Dr. L. E. Solomon, Dean of Liberal Arts and Registrar, who served in the Navy for 28 months as Instructor in Naval Organization at the Navy V-12 Unit of the University of Southern California, and Dr. K. Orin Cornett, who served as Lecturer on Electronics in the Graduate School of Communication Engineering, Harvard University and as special Research Associate, Division 13, United States Office of Scientific Research and Development. To Dr. Cornett's duties as Professor of Physics have been added other responsibilities as Assistant to the President.

Plant: At long last the dream of adequate buildings for O. B. U. is on the verge of realization. Several years ago the city of Shawnee provided funds to build a

gymnasium. A beautiful Library and Art Center, now nearing completion, was made possible by special gifts, the largest of which was made by Mrs. W. L. Brittain in honor of her late husband. Construction has begun on a dormitory for men provided by various Convention Units which will be ready by the fall of 1946.

By vote of the Convention, the Centennial Program includes the raising of funds for a beautiful Chapel and Fine Arts Building. The Board of Trustees have employed an architect to serve as consultant on drafting the plans for the future Campus. The plant and campus reflect both progress and promise with a Science and Engineering Building and Central Heating Plant as the outstanding needs for the future.

Religious Activity: A total of 99 ministerial students was enrolled during the regular session, and 27 during the summer. The report of the Ministerial Alliance shows 824 conversions and 1077 additions to the churches, and 300,920 miles traveled in line of duty. For the third consecutive year the Baptist Student Union reports the enlistment of 100% of the resident Baptist students in local church membership. Attendance at the noonday prayer meetings on the campus is extremely good, with a majority of the resident students attending regularly. Extension activities include a mission Sunday School, a regular weekly meeting at the Indian Sanatorium; monthly programs at the Girls Industrial School at Tecumseh, and work with the Ministerial Alliance in street services.

Financial Operations: The University has been able to operate during this past year without a deficit. Through the years the Baptists of the state have built up an equity for the denomination in University Properties amounting to nearly one million dollars with no indebtedness against the property. This, along with the present building program is an indication that Oklahoma Baptists will continue to give to an even greater extent to the furtherance of Christian education.

81. Dr. Gordon Singleton, President—Mary Hardin Baylor University, Texas led in benedictory prayer.

Thursday Afternoon

November 8, 1945, 1:45 P. M.

82. The afternoon session was opened with prayer led by Ira Prosser. Songs used were "Break Thou the Bread of Life," "My Jesus I Love Thee," and "Near To The Heart of God."

83. Rev. Charles M. Black, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Sapulpa led the Devotion for the afternoon using Psalms 46. Closed with one stanza of "Nearer My God to Thee."

84. M. E. Ramay led in service honoring our returning service men. All chaplains in the service were presented. There were 25 chaplains present. Chaplain LeRoy Raley spoke briefly on the work of the chaplains.

85. The Report of the American Bible Society was given by Rev. Frank W. Langham, representative of the Society. Recommendations were read by Rev. Wade B. East—Adopted.

American Bible Society

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

THE REGULAR WORK of the American Bible Society includes all those essential missionary tasks. It aids in translation work publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, supplies them at cost or less, and encourages their use. It provides

the Scriptures on foreign fields at less than cost because the income level of the people is so low that they can pay only a fraction of the cost of printing the books. In cases of special need, at home and abroad, the Scriptures are given without charge.

THE WAR EMERGENCY AND POST-WAR REHABILITATION WORK provides without charge (1) New Testaments and other Scriptures for our Armed Forces who are yet on duty throughout the world, and for the thousands of wounded men still in government hospitals, (2) Scriptures for persons still being held as War Prisoners, and (3) Scriptures in many languages for the spiritual rehabilitation of needy people in the war areas.

Southern Baptists recognize the American Bible Society as an essential part of their own regular program of world-wide missions. Resolutions have been adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and by state conventions, commending the work of the Society and requesting the churches to contribute to its support. The Society is grateful for increasing gifts from Baptist churches throughout the South. During 1944 the Society distributed 12,403,541 volumes of Scriptures. From all sources, it received a budget income of \$1,060,647 for its regular work and received for its War Emergency Fund \$423,010. All these records were the largest for any year in its 129 years of service—and yet it had to leave unanswered more needs than in any previous year.

Great needs still lie ahead in the war emergency and post-war rehabilitation work. For the four-year period which began July 1, 1944 conservative estimates show emergency needs for more than eleven million Scripture volumes costing \$3,089,570. This total includes the work actually done since July 1, 1944 and estimates for the future which have been carefully revised since the close of the war. As of September 1, 1945 the amount still needed for this fund is \$1,730,821.

Enlarged opportunities on many mission fields call for an increased regular program of Scripture distribution. This is especially true in lands blacked-out by illiteracy, where millions each year are now being taught to read. These multitudes with eager minds and hungry hearts must have the Word of God.

Scripture distribution is at the heart of the missionary enterprise. It serves as the advance agent and powerful ally of all forms of Christian work. An increase here will strengthen every phase of missions. This is particularly true in evangelism at home and abroad.

Because the Baptist people of the South so strongly believe in the necessity of Scripture distribution, the American Bible Society confidently looks to Southern Baptists for whatever increased support may be required to meet the demands and opportunities for missionary advance in the post-war world.

In the years just ahead, Southern Baptists can give enough each year to make a significant increase in world-wide Scripture distribution just at the time when such an increase is so urgently needed.

Whereas, this Convention recognizes the essential world-wide service rendered by the American Bible Society in its missionary non-profit work of translation, publication, distribution and encouragement of the use of the Scriptures, and

Whereas, in addition to its regular work of supplying Scriptures for world-wide missions, its War Emergency and Post-War Rehabilitation Program also provides without charge,

1. New Testaments and other Scriptures for our Armed Forces who are yet on duty throughout the world, and for the thousands of wounded men still in government hospitals,
2. Scriptures for persons still being held as War Prisoners, and
3. Scriptures in many languages for the spiritual rehabilitation of needy people in the war areas;

Therefore, Be It Resolved:

First, that we earnestly request our churches and our people to make contributions to the work of the American Bible Society, all such contributions to be sent through the regular channels to the Baptist state headquarters office, designated for the American Bible Society, and

Second, that we approve an offering for the work of the American Bible Society to be taken in the churches on a day to be set by the Executive Board and to be promoted by our Convention as a definite part of its mission program.

86. Southwide Benevolent Work was discussed by Dr. Thomas J. Watts of the Relief and Annuity Board.

Relief and Annuity Board

Dear Dr. Potter:

Of course I know that there will be a report on the work of the Relief and Annuity Board in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and it is usually done by a committee appointed by the president. I think that you will agree that it will be a very good thing if the work of the Relief and Annuity Board might be reported in a more comprehensive way than is likely to be done in the usual way. Hence I am sending you a statement of the operations of our Board for the twelve months prior to October 1, 1945, as it applies to Oklahoma alone.

If you will examine this statement, I believe you will see that it is a worthy statement either as a part of your report or to be presented by the committee to report on our work. In some way Oklahoma Baptists ought to have this comprehensive view of our activities. In many states such report has been published in the minutes and we hope we can have it in every one this year. Of course there will be reference to our work in other states, our assests, etc. but that is not as important as the fruitage of our work in your state. We are sending you two copies so that you can have one for your own use and file and you can send the other to the chairman of the committee to report on our work.

88. The time allotted to the Seminaries was placed in charge of Dr. Olin T. Binkley, Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. Dr. Binkley addressed the Convention.

89. Place on the program for "Memorials" arrived and Dr. J. F. Murrell conducted the service. Miss Eunye Register sang "Sunrise Tomorrow." The following paper was read and motion carried for its adoption.

We share the sorrow of the bereaved, and will cherish the memory of these departed ones forever within our grateful hearts.

To some of these departed one, however, we are so deeply indebted that we cannot refrain from adding a personal word of appreciation for the service they have rendered to this Convention. Among these is Judge Richard A. Billups, a deacon in the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City, and for many years the Attorney for this Convention, who efficiently handled all our legal matters without charge. There are also Reverend George P. Drake, former pastor at Drumright and Edmond, a loyal servant of his denomination, and one of our State Missionaries at the time of his death. Reverend M. F. Langley, for many years the beloved pastor of the First Baptist Church of Alva; and Reverend L. C. Vermillion, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Morris. There is also Mrs. J. B. Rounds, the wife of Dr. J. B. Rounds, who for ten years was State Secretary of Oklahoma Baptists.

Let us memorialize these departed heroes of the faith, by rededicating ourselves to the task they loved, and by greater conquests for Christ.

COMMENTS

Organization

The "Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, without authorized capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed on or about May, 1917, for a term of twenty years, and its amended Articles of Incorporation providing for an organization in perpetuity were placed on record March 6, 1928. Its purpose is to foster Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various members of the denomination in accordance with the instructions of such contributors.

Since November 1, 1935 the convention has had direct supervision of the Baptist Orphans' Home, located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The "Baptist Orphans' Home" was organized in March, 1904 for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital. Assets, liabilities, income, and expenses of the Baptist Orphans' Home are treated as a separate "fund", both on the convention books and in this report.

Cash

The account with The First National Bank and Trust Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma amounting to \$332,967.23 was reconciled and verified by certification obtained from the depository. This cash is applicable to the various funds as shown in the balance sheet, Exhibit "A". All recorded receipts were traced to deposit in the bank. The daily recapitulations of cash received were compared with their recording in the cash book, and tests were made of the individual receipts from which the recapitulations were prepared. Paid checks were compared with the record of checks drawn and the signatures and endorsements were scrutinized.

Account Payable

The \$3,158.77 under this caption was owing to the O. B. U. Press for printing of the Baptist Messenger as at December 31, 1945 according to statement on file and subsequent record of disbursement.

Unexpended Balances in Designated Funds

These accounts are included as shown by the books of account without further verification by us. They are presented under the liability section of the fund balance sheet (Exhibit "A"), and the changes are summarized in the fund capital statement (Exhibit "C").

Fund Capital Statement

A fund capital statement for the period under review is presented in Exhibit "C". The operations of the executive office are divided into eight major classifications as follows:

COLLECTING AND ACCOUNTING—Receiving contributions for the unified budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention and other designated donees.

STATE MISSIONS FUND—Subdivided into "Appropriations and Operations—Regular and Annuity (Unrestricted)" and "Property". The former includes financial transactions applicable to Oklahoma State Mission's activities, whereas the latter embraces properties.

BUILDING PROGRAM—For receiving and accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a future building program of the Baptist Orphans' Home, Oklahoma Baptist University and other building projects of the convention. Although not specifically mentioned in the recorded minutes of the proceedings of the convention and its committees, the files relative to the discussions therein pertaining to the convention building program have embodied references to the authorization to hold all available non-designated funds at December 31, 1944 as a reserve to supplement the building construction at Oklahoma Baptist University, same "to be invested in U. S. bonds", and likewise to set apart all available funds accumulated since that date for use in construction of the convention headquarter building so as to be "ready to build when restrictions are removed" (See Schedule 4).

BAPTIST MESSENGER FUND—Maintaining and publishing a denominational paper known as the Baptist Messenger.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION AND SUNDAY SCHOOL FUND—Providing for Training Union and Sunday School enlargement and educational activities in the State of Oklahoma.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY FUND—Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of "Assembly property."

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN AND EMPLOYEES' RELIEF AND ANNUITY FUND—For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers missionaries, churches and organizations throughout Oklahoma participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and shared in by the convention.

BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME FUND—Embracing all transactions pertaining to enlargement and maintenance of the children's home and care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, subdivided into the following:

General operations—Maintenance of the home

Endowment—Representing contributions made with certain endowment provisions

Property and other Investments—Accounting for plant and investments not otherwise designated

ANNUAL REPORT

Berta K. Spooner, Executive Secretary

Any report in this Centennial year of Southern Baptists naturally partakes of an historical flavor. "The past is a prelude to the future" and certainly gives the background for the score of the present, so that our years work cannot fail to be measured against the back-drops of history.

Southern Baptists were organized to do mission work. Woman's Missionary Union was organized to be auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention in missionary activities. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union continues that organizational purpose of helping extend the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ.

During the past year we have joined in the Centennial plans of giving and winning. Our emphasis was strengthened at once upon the winning of the lost. When the "Million Souls for Christ" slogan was advanced by the Convention Community Missions Chairman rallied quickly to church plans for revivals and cottage prayer meetings. The churches will report the number of souls won into the Kingdom and we share to some extent, at least through our efforts. Zealous to evangelize we know there is a work beyond our personal witness. It is accomplished by others supported by our gifts to the Centennial Offering and by our White Cross, Scholarship, Margaret Fund, Nursery Fund at the Southwestern Seminary, Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions and Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions. To this date we have exceeded all goals except the Centennial which we hope will be reached by the end of the calendar year.

As you will see from the Stewardship report, there has been only a slight increase in tithers.

We rejoice in the fine work of the White Cross committees in sending the many necessary supplies to our two hospitals and in reaching the financial goals for the hospitals in Africa and China.

Baptist women must be an intelligent group to follow in the great succession of our forefathers. The circumstances of our world, moving from a war economy into an era of possible lasting peace demands a womanhood which comprehends the immensity and the smallness of our one world. How gratefully this historic year we watched the realization of our prayers for the end of hostilities. Our prayers were linked with penitence for we knew our missionary short-comings had contributed to the cause of the terrible conflict. As we studied in mission study classes and saw the lostness of people, looked at the pitiable efforts to feel after

God—we come to know that peace requires transformed people, saved people—if peace is to be permanent. Our mission study is more earnest than ever and must continue to be so. The innovation of the "Missionary Round Table" should stir more adequate reading and discussion among our women.

Our women and young people have co-operated with and assisted in Schools of Missions in our Associations. Such schools have been weeks of spiritual refreshing to the churches.

We talked and dreamed of the post-war world and were scarcely ready for it when suddenly we realized it had come upon us. It is full of the same old problems only aggravated by death and destruction, hatred and intolerance, greed and poverty. Our hope is in young people who will build better than their predecessors, as as they yield themselves more to the leadership of Christ. We are glad to have in special training this year, four splendid young women, 2 in Louisville and 2 in Southwestern Seminary in Ft. Worth. One young colored minister and one young colored woman in the Seminary and Training School at Nashville, Tenn. Two Indian girls at Bacone College and two Indian girls in Oklahoma Baptist University. Receiving the Foreign Student Scholarship Fund is a charming young Chinese woman who is a missionary to her own people, studying in O. B. U. this year. She is Miss Emily Goon.

Before our women always is the opportunity and privilege of leading Missionary Education organizations, which give to our youth missionary vision. We rejoice for the 1016 auxiliaries that we have but with the 643 societies that we have and only 72 full families, we see that not yet are all of our women recognizing their responsibility in this respect. How can we face our Savior—How can we look at our lost world—and not do our utmost for our young people.

Facing tomorrow we enter a new Southern Baptist Century. Believing that God has a larger place of usefulness for us than we have yet fulfilled for Him—a turning point gives opportunity for a change of leadership so after 25 years as your Executive Secretary it seems wise and well that I retire. So my name will not be considered by the Nominating Committee.

You will be assured of my sincere gratitude for your splendid cooperation and the fine fellowship through these years—for your love and confidence in me—for your goodness to me in many personal ways and for the joy that has been mine as we have served together.

I shall continue to work in the ranks with you in this enlarged service that awaits us in the immediate future. May God give us all grace to go forward in courageous, undaunted service in the strategic days ahead, as we build for him.

INDIAN WORK

Our work with the Indians is showing fine progress. From the reports I receive they have had 56 mission study classes with 107 awards.

The Cherokee Association has 40 societies and are 100% in reports. They have 135 titheers. They made 1061 quilts this year, selling \$410.53 worth. Total receipts for all purposes \$2880.66.

There are 6 Indian Associations with a total of 152 churches. 46 churches contributed through the state office to all causes—\$2,491.60. A few years ago they did not know what the Cooperative Program meant. They report 25 Vacation Bible Schools—65 Conversions and 6 Schools of Missions.

"EACH WITH HIS WORK TO DO"

The Moffatt translation of Mark 13:34 reads: "For the Son of man is as a man leaving his house to go abroad; he puts his servants in charge, **each with his work to do.**"

How thoroughly we prove these words of Jesus when we seek His will, for every one of us soon discovers we have a place in His wise design, we have a work especially assigned to us!

"Each with his work to do" is God's plan, and, in the missionary education of our young Baptist people, many devoted women have found their peculiar task. As we examine the records of the learning of missions, there first comes to mind the hundreds of patient counselors who through all the discouragements encountered in inserting an auxiliary meeting into a busy midweek, have faithfully carried on. Close beside them stand the fostering Societies who have provided material and spiritual support. One hundred fifteen of these local leaders completed the leaders course so far this year.

Results of their work is shown in many ways. Our mission study awards are largely due to their efforts. A total of 5089 awards have been requested in 1945 for members of our auxiliaries. In addition to these mission study awards, 3564 stamps for missionary reading have been awarded. In both mission study and missionary reading, in 1945 we have exceeded 1944 totals.

Local auxiliary leaders become the agents for our missionary magazines. In 1945 they sold 2579 subscriptions to World Comrades and 731 subscriptions to Window of Y. W. A.

Consecrated women of the local societies have organized 187 new auxiliaries. An encouraging event already evident in this post-war world is the revived interest in Y. W. A. among our college young women. Almost without exception the Missionary societies of our college towns have already launched out eagerly on the fruitful tasks of fostering a college Y. W. A. during the coming months. Charming, capable, consecrated women have been chosen as leaders and a hopeful enthusiasm is evident. Y. W. A.'s are being fostered in the following towns: Ada, Alva, Chickasha, Durant, Stillwater, Norman and Shawnee.

Counselors of our R. A.s and G. A.s have been leading their members along the pathway of individual attainment in Ranks and Forward Steps. Dozens of Recognition and Coronation services have been held throughout the state and hundreds of the colorful armbands have been proudly earned by our aspiring boys and girls. More than 1500 were reported the first two quarters to be working on these attainments. The reports list 45 Queens, 9 Queens with Scepter and 4 Queen's Regent. Twelve Royal Ambassadors had completed their ranks also.

There is another group of W. M. U. leaders in Oklahoma who deserve fervent commendation. These are the Associational Young People's Leaders. If time permitted I would call many of them by name and tell you of their faithful and successful service. This group of associational leaders held their first annual conference in Oklahoma City in early 1945. Leaders who had been previously in service shared the benefits of their experience with the new leaders and much profit was gained as together we planned for Oklahoma Baptist youth. Large in their service the past year were the camps held under their direction. Eighteen associations reported mission study camps held with a total enrollment of 2741. This is well over three times the number reached by the state camps in 1944. Leaders joyfully reported 91 conversions, and cause for rejoicing also came in the 161 volunteers for missionary service. Gifts totaling \$833 were reported, most of it given for World Relief. These camps were for the most part planned and successfully conducted by our associational young people's leaders.

A third group served our youth in Oklahoma this year. Twenty missionaries gave us all or a part of their time in July and August to bring missionary inspiration to the young people in our camps. We are grateful to these Oklahoma missionaries who served: Mrs. Eugene Hill and Miss Lucy Smith, China; Mrs. A. Worthington Mrs. Aaron Hancock, Rev. Lewis Hancock, Rev. Victor Kaneubbe, Dr. J. B. Rounds, Indians; Rev. A. V. Alvarado, Mexicans; Rev. Guy Bellamy, City Missions. Coming to our state to serve were Misses Auris Pender and Emily Goon, China; Rev. and Mrs. Ira Marks, Miss Vena Aguiard, French; Rev. H. C. Lacerda Brazil; Mrs. J. A. Abernathy, Miss Alda Grayson, Dr. and Mrs. Frank Connolly China; Mrs. G. D. Crow, Arizona.

"Each with his work to do" Jesus directed in Mark 13, and in Mark 14 is recorded the sacrificial act of love by Mary when she anointed Jesus. His welcome commendation of her was: "She hath done a beautiful thing—she hath done all she could."

As the eventful year of 1945 draws to a close, will we endeavor to merit Jesus approval of our own service as we strive to make this indeed the best year the young people of Oklahoma have ever known as we present to them the story—the vision the challenge of "missions, the plan of the ages."

What remains to challenge us in the future? First there are still thousands of Baptist youth in Oklahoma for whom no missionary education is provided, so endeavor to have a Full graded Union in your church with missionary information provided for all. Then pray daily that missionaries may be called from among our young people. You have done well in 1945. Do your better, and your best, that we may speed the coming of the knowledge of Christ to every creature through the fine missionary service of Baptist youth.

Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma

PREAMBLE

Desirous of cultivating and stimulating the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and young people of the churches, we, the women of Missionary Societies of the Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and shall be auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE II

Object

The object of this organization shall be to cultivate the missionary spirit especially among the women and young people throughout the State, and to aid in the world-wide spread of the Gospel.

ARTICLE III

Membership

The constituency of this organization shall be the missionary organizations of women and young people. Messengers to the annual meeting shall be all members of the Executive Board, all auxiliary counselors and one member from each society with one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof not to exceed ten members from any church.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Young People's Secretary, a Field Worker, Chairman of Departments, and Advisory Committee who shall be named by the Nominating Committee and elected by acclamation at the Annual Meeting, and a Vice-President from each District who has been elected in her respective District.

Section 2. Executive Board. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Union and Presidents of the Associations. Eleven, including two officers, shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each District, all to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting for the succeeding year, seven constituting a quorum.

ARTICLE V

Time of Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, time and place to be designated by the Executive Board at its first meeting.

ARTICLE VI

Financial Policy

In accordance with the Preamble, our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education, training, and giving; the strength of the organi-

zation being used to help raise all apportionments for every phase of the work to which the church contributes. One-third of all the Unified Budget funds shall be credited to the State W. M. U.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention and all salaries paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE VII

Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present and voting at any Annual Meeting provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting of the Executive Board and recommended by the Board to the annual meeting for adoption.

ARTICLE I

Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the organization and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, shall be ex-officio member of all standing committees and with the concurrence of the Executive Secretary call special meetings of the Board. She shall be Vice-President of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 2. Vice-Presidents. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents of the organization to assist the Executive Secretary in developing the districts, preside at their district meetings and keep in touch with associational officers by correspondence and other ways that will further the interest of Woman's Missionary Union. In the absence of the State President one of the Vice-Presidents shall be asked to preside in her place.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual Meetings of Woman's Missionary Union, to prepare the minutes for publication and to act as Secretary of the Executive Board, presenting a condensed report of the sessions to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Executive Secretary-Treasurer. As Executive Secretary it shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith, to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local societies of the State. She shall have supervision over all departments of the work, and shall have correspondence with Baptist papers, unless other provision shall be made for it, and shall give general directions for the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity shall permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds used all expense of the work, according to the directions of the Executive Board, keeping always an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements.

As Executive Secretary-Treasurer, she shall make reports to the Executive Board, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Baptist General Convention and Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. Young People's Secretary. The Young People's Secretary shall, under the direction of the Executive Secretary, have oversight of the work of all the auxiliaries, and in every way possible shall seek to enlist the young people of our churches, colleges and hospitals in missionary work. She shall make regular reports to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 6. Executive Board. The Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care, and shall have power to recommend such by-laws, and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the Annual Meeting any recommendations concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and production of the work which may seem expedient.

It shall hold its semi-annual meetings at the call of the President and Executive Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 7. Duties of the Advisory Committee. It shall meet four times annually at the call of the President and Executive Secretary. This committee shall have power to act for the Executive Board between sessions of the Board.

Section 8. Duties of Standing Committees. (A) Obituary Committee shall present a memorial service at the Annual Meeting. (B) Recommendations Committee shall meet two weeks prior to the semi-annual meeting. (C) Scholarship Committee shall meet annually to approve applications for scholarships.

Section 9. Chairmen of Departments. It shall be the duty of these chairmen to assist the Executive Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular departments of the work by correspondence and shall make reports in writing to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Section 10. Associational Presidents. They shall be elected at the Woman's Missionary Union quarterly rally preceding the Annual Meeting of the Association. They shall have general supervision of the work of the Association and in co-operation with the pastors they shall endeavor to promote the organization of women and young people in all churches, by visiting and holding associational meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of the work done. It shall also be their duty to arrange for and preside over the quarterly meetings of their associations.

ARTICLE II

Parliamentary Rules

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law, not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2. Amendments. These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulations as those governing changes in the Constitution.

Message of W. M. U. President

Mrs. H. B. Wilhoyte

The work of the world has been done by men who believed more than they could see. One whose faith does not go beyond his sight is always limited in the possibilities of his achievements.

Joseph dreamed of bowing of the sun and moon and stars, and he had no limit to his horizon. Paul reminded us that the seen and temporal only is transient. It is the unseen that is eternal.

Poor indeed are we if we count only that which can be tabulated for the tax gatherer as wealth. Castles in the air—high ideals and ambitions which can crystallize our visions into purpose are the most valuable resources we can have.

A popular slogan that recently attracted my attention read, "The difficult we do immediately, the impossible will take a little longer."

Once there was an emperor who would call his counselors to ask their advice about some project he was contemplating. We are told that this ruler liked to be advised that the thing he proposed to do was utterly impossible; then he set out to do it and he rarely failed to accomplish the impossible.

Too often we set low goals, we are easily satisfied and hesitate to try the difficult, yet we have an additional power—"A power that worketh in us." He who is aware of the infinite resources of God can undertake the most difficult tasks and succeed.

Christ our Pattern

Christ ever seeding to arouse in us the spirit of the dreamer that will not be satisfied with the commonplace. He holds up before us a pattern, for "We are to be like Him." We must be satisfied with nothing less. Conscious that we are yoked in fellowship with Him, that we carry no burden strange to His shoulders, we are truly laborers together with God.

The sky as well as the ground on which we walk belongs to us. There is no need for heads bowed down or for hearts walled in. Our cities rise skyward, yet we forget that men should build their lives skyward as well.

Moses on the mount of God saw a plan for the tabernacle. Repeatedly afterward God reminded him, "See that thou make it in all things after the pattern showed to thee in the mount." In various ways, in mountain-top experiences He sets before us ideals. He makes love and service seem desirable. Sometimes this pattern is revealed to us as we study God's Word.

Christlike Character Sure Foundation

But desire alone will not erect a building. We may have the plan, but we need more. A building, or a life, that is going to reach very far skyward must have a good foundation.

Skyscrapers are built to withstand storms. The life too must be built to withstand storms, storms of temptation, floods of evil which will beat upon it.

A house is not complete with plan and foundations. No magnificent building ever grew of itself, but brick by brick and stone by stone were laid in place by toil and effort. Neither can one build a Christlike character without working at it.

"Souls are built as temples are,—
Here a carving rich and quaint
There the image of a saint;
Here a deep-toned pane to tell
Sacred truth or miracle.
Every little helps the much;
Every cheerful, careless touch
Adds a charm, or leaves a scar."

Building Fitly Framed Together

No one dreams himself into love, purity and goodness. The building must arise in each heart of exquisite symmetry, "fitly framed together."

"Build it well what e'er you do;
Build it straight and strong and true;
Build it clear and high and broad;
Build it for the eye of God."

We cannot believe little things and do great things. A man's faith is the limit of his horizon. He must conquer the fatigues of the way in his heart, or he will never set out on the road. The difficulties in the way of a new and better world must be conquered in the heart.

There was a man who had a pattern for this world. It was a dream—and He called His dream the kingdom of heaven. It was to be on this earth, made up of people like you and me, but it would be free from poverty, greed, persecution and war.

He dreamed that it would be possible by following some simple rules found in the Sermon on the Mount. For two thousand years we've been struggling to fulfill that dream of the kingdom but perhaps we've had too many architects and too few bricklayers.

An architect complains that many of his clients ask him to design a house for them only to find that they have already designed it themselves and only want him to approve their plans. In this kingdom there is to be no prejudice of race—creed or social station; no Jew, Negro, Japanese, no underdog, but a place the prophet dreamed of where "Every man shall sit under his own vine and his own fig tree and no one shall make him afraid."

New World One of Sharing

The way to peace is brotherhood. In this new world do we want peace enough to work for it as vigorously, as whole-heartedly as we worked for war?" To pray for it as earnestly as we prayed for victory?

The price of peace is brotherhood and brotherhood means sharing. Do we pray for the isles of the sea as we did a few months ago? Do we believe that men shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks? Neither shall they learn war any more. Not in your time or mine perhaps shall it come to pass, but it shall come, "The voice of the Lord hath spoken it."

When the plague of darkness fell on Egypt for three days we are told "But all the children of Israel had light in their dwellings." We need not be afraid of outer darkness of this world, nor be conquered by it. It is the Light within our hearts that will fulfill this dream of the Kingdom of God.

A candle loses none of its light when it lights another. This world is but a collection of houses, of homes. If Christ can but obtain entrance into each home the dream of His Kingdom on this earth will be fulfilled.

As we turn our eyes toward the future we realize we are facing a new day—a day of tremendous possibilities and unlimited opportunities for service, remembering always that it is God that "giveth the increase."

On Monday afternoon, December 18th, 1944, the Executive Board of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma convened in the Assembly room of the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City.

With Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, president, in the chair, reports of the officers and departmental chairmen were presented and adopted. There were also interesting reports of the work done among the Indians brought by Mrs. Stevens and Mrs. Grmmett

The second session of the Executive Board meeting was held on Tuesday, December 19th, 1944

In this meeting Mrs. Bill V. Cardin, Young People's Secretary, presented plans for the meeting of the Associational Young People's Leaders to be held in February, 1945, and also for the summer camps for young people.

Since under the new plan of reporting there are no reports made to the District departmental chairmen, Mrs. R. L. Kuhne moved that we dispense with all officers in the District except the president and secretary. The motion carried.

On motion by Mrs. T. W. Stevens it was voted to include the names of the associational chairmen in the State Year Book.

Our executive secretary suggested that the girls who are in the Training Schools be moth'ed by the districts. Mrs. T. W. Stevens moved that we provide scholarships for the three Cherokee Indian girls who are in Bacone College at Muskogee. The motion carried. These girls are Lucille Backwater, Lula Davis and Ruth Raper.

On motion by Mrs. J. C. Hering it was voted to take care of the expense of sending twenty of the wives of the preachers to the school for preachers at O. B. U. in March.

Mrs. Spooner spoke of the financial program for the Centennial year, our share being one-third. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer also presented the budget for the year to the amount of \$8,500.00 which was adopted.

Mrs. J. Howard Williams moved that our W. M. U. arrange a meeting for the leaders of the Indian Associations. The motion carried.

On October 2nd, 1945, there was a meeting of the Executive Board in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. There were 42 members and 21 visitors present, making a total attendance of 63.

The theme for the day was "Completing Tasks Planned for 1945 as outlined in the State Year Book." There were some very fine discussions presented on the various phases of the work of W. M. U.

On Wednesday morning, October 3rd, the Executive Board convened and the regular quarterly reports of the departmental chairmen and the officers were presented and adopted.

The president stated that Mrs. Frank Williams of Oklahoma City had been asked to work on the Recommendations Committee, substituting for Mrs. R. D. Sheldon who has moved out of the State. Mrs. Bill Cardin was asked to present the report of the Committee on Recommendations in order that it might be con-

sidered by the members of the Board before being presented to the W. M. U. Convention in annual session when action will be taken.

Mrs. J. D. McGovern moved that we help to provide a Nursery Fund for Oklahoma Baptist University. The motion carried.

On motion by Mrs. W. R. King it was voted that the balance of \$868.18 in the Hundred Thousand Club account be transferred to the account of World Relief

Mrs. Spooner stated that Mrs. R. T. Mansfield, former president of Oklahoma W. M. U., was in the hospital. The recording secretary moved that \$115.36 left over from the expense fund allowed for the Southwide W. M. U. Convention be used for the comfort of Mrs. Mansfield. The motion carried.

On motion by Mrs. Sam Pool it was voted that a thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) be taken from our State Mission Fund to supplement the 1945 budget to take care of a small deficit and to provide for an increase in salary of \$25.00 per month each to be given to the Office Secretary and to the Young People's Secretary.

Mrs. T. W. Stevens offered as an amendment that the Executive Secretary be included in the raise proposed for the Office Secretary and the Young People's Secretary; these increases to be retroactive to January 1st. The amendment carried and the motion carried as amended.

Mrs. Geo. McMillan suggested that historical material be gathered, looking forward to the 40th year of Oklahoma W. M. U.

On November 5th, prior to the annual meeting, the Executive Board met in the Progressive Class Room of the First Baptist church of Oklahoma City at 10 A. M.

After routine business the Young People's Secretary spoke of the enthusiastic response of the Young People's Leaders to the conferences which she held in February and Mrs. T. W. Stevens moved that we authorize a meeting of the associational young people's leaders on February 12 and 13, 1946. The motion carried

Mrs. Spooner discussed the meeting of the Indian women from the associations and on motion by Mrs. Tom Earp it was voted that we make plans for a conference for the women of the Indian associations in 1946.

Since it was brought to the attention of the Board that Lucy Smith and Dr. Eugene Hill were soon to return to China, Mrs. A. N. Atkinson moved that the Board present gifts to them. The motion carried.

Mrs. J. E. Kirk moved that we give \$300.00 to the nursery at Southwestern and the remainder of the apportionment to the nursery at O. B. U. The motion carried.

It was suggested that the nursery goal be set at \$2,000.00. This matter was referred to the Committee on Recommendations.

Mrs. Spooner spoke of the fund for an Infirmary at O. B. U. started by Rosalie Mills Appleby in honor of her husband, stating that more equipment had been added to this Infirmary.

The president recognized Mrs. Vernon Snell, president of the W. M. U. of the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City.

The closing prayer was offered by Mrs. George Boston.

Report of Community Missions Chairman

The Community Missions Committee seeks to help every W. M. U. member obey the command of our Lord when said, in substance, "Love God; love your neighbor." To love our neighbor we must first find out about him, so we survey our community. Then when the need is found we join in a month-by-month program of christian service. As we assign the needs to be met we realize the mission field nearest us is sometimes the least appealing. It is often easier to manifest interest in the lost across the ocean than the lost individual across the street. But the God who gave the command has promised to be with us as we go in His name.

Women have had a large part in soul-winning throughout the history of Christianity. In our Centennial crusade this year we are told that 90% of the attendance at each morning service were women, 75% of the evening congregation were women, and 95% of the personal workers were women. A woman once remarked that she wished she could preach from a pulpit, so she could be a great soul-winner. No doubt she was affected by the glamour which attends a great revival campaign: but one does not have to occupy a pulpit to be a great soul winner. In many cases the great evangelists with their multitudes of converts have only to top the scales of religious experience already laden by the influence of some woman or women. After all, the traveling evangelist has only to preach Christ, while the person who would win to Christ in her home community must live Christ.

Let us first consider the homes in our community because they are the foundational institution of a Christian Society. The Church can win very few to Christ who come from unsympathetic and ungodly homes. The most definite way to approach our visitation task is to block off our territory or our community, assign a key woman to be responsible for each block, then she with a helper should take a census or survey. Let christians go, two by two, into homes for definite soul-winning purposes. It was into homes specifically that Jesus sent the seventy. He gave detailed instruction about conduct in a home and about the message for the home. When we go let us immediately introduce our purpose for visiting. No need to chat about weather, war or wearing apparel. In ten minutes the team should be at the very heart of the question about accepting Christ or transferring church membership or leading the children to the Lord. Let the visit be definite. Go for a decision, ask for a decision and expect a decision.

Let us seek to establish family altars in each home. Daily scripture readings and prayer objects are suggested in our Royal Service. We must learn that we cannot substitute organization for prayer and expect God to use us. "Churches are only as powerful as they are prayerful." If the world ever again is to get on its feet the church will have to get on its knees. Let us pray God to drive us to our knees till we are ready to be used in the sweeping revival He is ready to send.

We will show no prejudice to other races, "for there is no difference—All have sinned and come short of the glory of God." If they have churches or missions of their own we will gladly aid with literature or in Vacation Bible Schools and missionary organizations.

We will cultivate the friendship of Jews—remembering the gospel was to the Jew first. This is perhaps the slowest of all mission work but the most joyful. God still says, "I will bless them that bless thee."

There may be congested areas where children have little home life. We will seek to provide adequate play grounds; if possible a day nursery, a medical department, clubs for mothers as well as boys and girls with clothing and food for the needy.

Of course some communities have opportunities for work that others do not but may it be said of Oklahoma Baptist women next year, "all were interested in making their communities christian and all did something."

Report of Margaret Fund Chairman

In the century of Southern Baptist mission work just completed, our hearts rejoice with gratitude and praise in the words of the Psalmist:

"Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy Name give glory." Psal. 115:1.

Standing at the portals of a new era of mission work, Woman's Missionary Union as "laborers together with God" in His divine plan for saving the world reviews with gratitude the achievements of the Margaret Fund as a missionary agency during the twenty-nine years of the past century that it has functioned.

In 1916, with its motto, "Steadfastly in Prayer and Ministry," the Margaret Fund was launched to assist our missionaries in the higher education of their sons and daughters. At that time, four mission fields, China, Japan, Brazil and Panama were represented in that first student's list of eight beneficiaries. Today, the Fund touches every mission field where Baptists are at work.

The Margaret Fund was founded in love and prayer. Its achievements have been the result of prayer. The problems and responsibilities connected with the work can be handled only through prayer. Its future possibilities depend upon prayer.

Truly the Margaret Fund has been multiplied and blessed of our Heavenly Father through the years. Today, the Margaret Fund is a vital part of our denominational life and its achievements. It has influenced many realms of Baptist world-life.

The fundamental purpose of the Margaret Fund scholarships is to develop the God-given talents of the sons and daughters of our missionaries and train them for world-wide Christian service.

Margaret Fund students typify Paul's words in 1 Cor. 12:4-7 Moffatt's translation: There are varieties of talents, but the same spirit; varieties of service, but the same Lord; varieties of effects, but the same God who effects everything in everyone. Each receives his manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.

There is a constant ebb and flow of new life in the Margaret Fund. Year after year the students come from devout homes of missionary parents who have dedicated their lives to the spread of the Gospel. In the missionary home God is made real to their children and His kingdom work becomes paramount in their lives.

These students enter our Christian colleges where their early religious training is intensified. The Christian college furnishes a sturdy religious influence for its students and fits them for a constant and consistent meeting of life's duties. These students are identified with religious movements on their campuses and serve in church organizations as leaders.

Many students have returned to foreign fields as missionaries—oft times to the land of their birth or that of their parents' service. Many of the students have faithfully and effectively served long years in mission fields and some now have children under the Fund serving as missionaries.

The former students represent many phases of service etc.—ministers, doctors, teachers, writers, journalists, embassy attaches, government and state employees.

If we review World War II, we see that students served as chaplains in the army and navy; still larger groups in the ranks. Some students in the U. S. Navy sail far seas,—girls serve in Red Cross and as nurses in distant lands. Former and present students serve in Naval Intelligence divisions and in places of strategic importance.

From the standpoint of investment, education is the most important business of all nations for the world's future. Education is preparation. "Education and religion must go hand in hand." The most dynamic and valuable thing in education is the impact of life upon life, provided always it is the right kind of life which makes the impact.

The only hope for a better world of tomorrow is in the Gospel, and the only way to make the ideals and principles of the Gospel the dominating ideals and principles of civilization is through Christian education of youth.

Armies cannot build a new world. It is not enough to be supplied with the power of planes, tanks and guns. The new world of order, progress, justice and an enduring peace can only be built by soldiers of the Cross who proclaim His message of "Peace on earth—good-will to men."

No phase of Woman's Missionary Union work has brought or promises to bring larger returns in Kingdom work, than the investment in the education of young lives under the Margaret Fund.

Missionary Agencies are preparing today to meet the demands of the post-war period. More important than money, are the educated and consecrated young men and women the Boards are seeking to serve as future missionaries.

When the mission fields of Southern Baptists are opened again to the Gospel we shall see many Margaret Fund students go as messengers of "His truth" and righteousness to "fields white unto harvest."

Let us renew our devotion to the blessed Cause; "keep the trust committed" to us through advisory care of students and prayer that God will bless, protect and lead them into joyous Kingdom service.

"Lead On, O King Eternal."

Report of Mission Study Chairman

"Thanks be to God, who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." We have just emerged from a world revolution that has affected all people every where. Far too familiar are we with the tragedies of war. Today we are confronted with the most tragic needs ever faced by any previous generation—a world bankrupt morally, economically, and spiritually—a world filled with strife, jealousy, and tyranny. And yet—we know that "The Lord God reigneth." We know even during dark hours that "All things work together for good to them that love God."

Today—a day of reconversion, reconstruction, and rehabilitation is a day of unprecedented missionary opportunity. Many perils of the war have proven to be blessing. Many of our service men had to go oversea to discover missions. They found a quality of life—among primitive folk seldom seen in Christian America—that has made them firm believers in missions. Doors of opportunity are wide open: if we enter, God will richly bless; if we fail, only God knows our fate.

A new world is being built. We can never build a better world until we have better people; and we'll never have better people until lost men are saved and those already saved live Spirit filled lives. We cannot manufacture a model world and install it in society by making external changes. World peace must come from within the hearts of people.

We Christians have that inner "peace that passeth all understanding." It is our duty as His servants to "arise and build." We need to ask God to give us a sense of values. We are all building—but what? In our personal lives is it econ-

omic security, popularity, social prestige or political favor? In our churches—are we building strong organizations and great reputations? These things are temporary. Our foundation is a rock—the Word of God. Prayer is a powerful material that has stood the tests of time. It is a force that will encircle the globe, overcome difficulties, and break down opposition. Mission Study will enable us to pray more intelligently, more effectively, and more fervently. Another material of paramount significance is our gifts. Gifts combined with information and prayer will insure success. It takes education in stewardship and enlightenment on all Baptist causes to produce cheerful givers.

Where are the workmen? God is calling for approved workmen who have surrendered to His will—who are dedicated and consecrated Christians. Many will be discovered and developed in Mission Study classes.

Who will pay the bill? Christian witnessing pays big dividends in joy, peace of mind, and spiritual satisfaction that no man can take from us.

May we as His servants "arise and build." In 1946, may we strive to so plan each course that it will produce members who can best be described by M. S. (Mission Study)—Morally Strong, Missionary Spirited, Merciful Servants, Magnanimous Stewards, and Mission minded Spenders.

The key to effective study is the Institute of which there have been few in 1945. Plan a Mission Study Institute in each association in 1946. Strive to reach each W. M. U. member in a well planned Mission Study class, Reading Circle, or Missionary Round Table. May we expect great things of God and attempt great things for God." By so doing we can depend on Him to lead us From Victory Unto Victory As We Build.

Report of White Cross Chairman

Peace again, thank God; but this time it comes to us freighted with the most staggering problems that ever faced mankind. Peace, and half the world in chaos. Peace, and multitudes homeless, starving and despairing. All of us are glad for the hostilities to be over and we are looking for all of our men and women to come home, but every one of us knows that the real suffering is not finished. This is a time for solemn thinking and prayerful spirits. This is an opportune time for re-conversion of our hearts for we know that we his servants cannot arise and build unless the post war Christian catches up spiritually with the atomic—bomb age.

The rusted wheels of the world must be greased with the oil of human kindness; then each of us may be able to think of others as Christ would think. With all christendom practising the golden rule we could feed many hungry people, we

could touch many sick people and heal them. We could feed them with vitamins, love and sympathy, and we would want to inoculate them with the spirit of understanding. We would work harder to see that each person would have an opportunity to be exrayed by the light from heaven.

White Cross work is but one of the threads that make up the fabric of Christian obligation. While but one of the threads is necessary for the completion of the World program of Jesus. His program is inclusive of every human need, spiritual, mental and physical. He said "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath annointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the broken hearted, to preach deliverance to the Captives, a recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised." Luke 4:18. Twenty-eight of his recorded miracles were miracles of healing. His presence in a village awakened hope in the heart of the leper, the blind, the halt, the lame. This hope was never crushed when brought to him in faith. The blind were made to see, the lame to walk, the Leper to rejoice in a clean and wholesome flesh. With our large Baptist Hospital in New Orleans and seventeen hospitals scattered throughout our great southland we can touch a host of broken spirited, sick of soul bodies in these days just ahead.

I bring you greetings from our Baptist Hospitals at Muskogee and Miami. You will be delighted to know that both of them have ministered unto more people this year than in any preceeding year. Even with the nurse shortage and other help so hard to get, they have made strides we are proud of. Much of the old equipment is out of date, in fact, almost obsolete, ready to be junked for modern facilities. We feel sure with our new plans we will bring our Hospitals up to date.

We asked you last year for two-thousand dollars for White Cross, and you gave \$3,715.00. So this year we are asking for \$3,500.00.

One thing has made us especially happy even with the shortage of linens in stores and homes our women have shared their meager supply so our hospitals have not been short. We are asking again for linens.

We want to think for one moment of our children in Ogbomoshu, Nigeria, Africa. Have you been away from some child you knew well for two or more years and when you returned, that child had grown so much you were hardly able to recognize him? Well, can you imagine how large the children that Elizabeth Ruth poole told us about are today? Their needs multiply as they grow. We send them one thousand dollars each year from our White Cross offering. We have also kept in reserve one thousand each year since Dr. Humphrey returned from China for him to use in helping to get started when he could go again to China.

Eternal vigilance is necessary if we are to do our best for that great tomorrow that is out there knocking at our door. Selfishness must be weeded out of our hearts and practices and teachings of our Lord must take on new meaning. Some how it must be blended into our every day life. Jesus came into the world to release men from the power of sin. He came to proclaim the good news that men might be accepted with God. Jesus came to heal all who were sick either in mind or soul. He healed blind eyes so they could look into his face and recognize him as the Saviour of the world. He also changed hearts so with eyes of faith the poor suffers could see and understand that he was the Son of God.

Oh, let us pray that this may be the year when all of us will do our best in our homes, in our every day living, in our local churches, in our Hospitals, so we can gladly say Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven. Let us join Tennyson in saying;

"Build thee more stately mansions oh my soul,
As the swift seasons roll
Leave the low vaulted past
Let each new temple-nobler than the last,
shut thee from heaven with a dome more vast,
Till thou at length art free,
Leaving thine outgrown shell by

Life's unresting sea."

Report of Woman's Missionary Union Training School

The service Flag of the Woman's Missionary Union Training School to-day contains 228 stars representing the School's graduates in Foreign Mission Service. The Flag also carries two large groups of stars denoting the service of hundreds of women working in our Country under the Home Mission Board and State Boards and in all phases of missionary and church work.

Oklahoma has added another Foreign Mission star to the Flag in the past few months be the recent Foreign Mission Board appointment to Brazil of Hazel Smith. Hazel graduated in May of this year (1945) with the degree of M. R. E and at the present time is enroute to her field of service.

Katharin Tiefel and Gordie Vaughter, both of Oklahoma City, also graduated last Spring, with diplomas from the Certificate Courses. Both are now working in churches in Oklahoma City.

Recent reports from the Training School show this Fall's enrollment 128 Boarding Students, and 87 Day Students (living out in town,) a total of 215 Students. Another year every space is taken including the garage apartment which was fixed for student rooms during the summer. already applications are on hand to fill any vacancies that may occur by the end of the first term in November.

This school year we have two young women enrolled to whom the State Woman's Missionary Union is giving Scholarships. Louise Tadlock, of Tahlequah is a Senior, and will graduate in May '46. Louise has worked the past two summers in New Mexico under the Home Mission Board. Our other State student is Maxine Campbell, of Guthrie, in her first year as a Junior. Reports say "both aregetting into their work in a splendid way—Maxine is making a fine contribution with her violin."

Also Dorothy Weaver of Tulsa is enrolled as our State's first woman student in the Church School of Music of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, with several classes also in the Training School.

I take this opportunity to make an appeal for more students—those with faces turned toward the Foreign Mission Fields. There is almost unlimited need for for missionaries to carry on work already established and to open up new Fields. Sec'y Rankin says that over 200 new missionaries will be needed within the next few years—requiring the appointment of 50 new ones a year for six years (replacements to be taken care of in the additional number.) So there is urgent need that our State seek out its finest daughters to help supply this great need—and have them studying, looking forward to the day when they can give Christian Service to a hungering world.

Send applications in as early as possible to the State Trustee (name below) for entrance in September 1946. At the present time no students are admitted to the Certificate Course. The School admits its students now according to the following plan; (1) priority is given to college graduates with at least one year of practical experience; (2) second consideration is given to applicants with at least two years of college work and several years of experience; (3) whatever space is left after these two more mature groups are admitted is given to girls just graduating from college.

Urgent and unprecedented world missonary opportunities are facing Southern Baptists. I therefore call on Oklahoma Missionary Baptist women to put it on the hearts of our talented young women of the State churches to enroll in our Training Schools to help in the great task before us.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the balance sheet of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, as of December 31, 1945, and the statements of fund capital and cash receipts and disbursements for the year then ended, have reviewed the system of internal control and the accounting procedures of the organization and, without making a detailed audit of the transactions, have examined or tested accounting records of the organization and other supporting evidence, by methods and to the extent we deemed appropriate. Our examination was made in accordance with the generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which we considered necessary.

We present our report as contained in the exhibits below, and two pages of comments thereon:

In our opinion the accompanying balance sheet and related statements of fund capital and cash receipts and disbursements present fairly the position of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma at December 31, 1945, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTS

Organization

The "Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma" was incorporated on April 9, 1927 under the laws of the State of Oklahoma without authorized capital stock. Its chief purpose is to foster religious and mission activities, particularly among the members of the Baptist churches of Oklahoma.

Cash

The cash on deposit was reconciled with the books of account and verified by direct correspondence with the depositories. The amount on deposit with each depository was as follows:

Inventories

The inventories of program supplies and books aggregating \$743.13 were taken under our supervision and priced by us. Certification thereof was made by the management.

Furniture

\$880.23—This represents cost of furnishings in the office of the executive secretary. Provision has been made for depreciation.

Accrued Loyalty

\$175.00—This amount was payable to Mrs. A. L. Aulick, author of certain books sold by the organization, and was computed by us from sales and cost records.

Accrued Salary

\$11.00—This item was withheld from the salary of the office secretary in excess of the amount remitted to the Bureau of Internal Revenue for withholding taxes.

Designated Funds

\$18,581.07—This amount represents the total of the unexpended balances of the designated funds shown in the Fund Balance Sheet (Exhibit "A".) Receipts and disbursements for each fund are presented in Exhibit "D".

Capital Accounts

A Fund Capital Statement for the period under review is presented in Exhibit "B". Except for the designated funds mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the operations are general in nature and are subdivided as follows:

Program Supplies—For Resale

Other General—Including all financial transactions not applicable to specifically named fund

Records available for our inspection did not permit an analysis of funds as to date of inception, original amount provided, subsequent contributions, or changes effected periodically by organization income and expense.

General

A certificate was obtained from the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the organization to the effect that all liabilities were recorded upon the books at the balance sheet date, and that there were no litigations or contingencies of a legal nature pending at December 31, 1945.
