# Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

#### Article I-Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### Article II-Constituency

- Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers appointed by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.
- Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

#### Article III-Object

- Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.
- Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

#### Article IV-Officers

- Section 1. The officers of this convention shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.
- Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.
- Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

#### Article V-Boards, Trustees and Committees

- Section 1. This convention shall have power to appoint such Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.
- Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

#### Article VI-Board of Directors

- Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.
- Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the convention and thirty-two (32) other members who

shall be chosen by the convention, at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

Section 4. This Board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

#### Article VII-Proceedings

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

#### Article VIII--Annual Meetings

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

#### Article IX-Special Funds

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

#### Article X-Change of Constitution

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

# BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of Directors shall be thirty-four (34).

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its

annual Convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one year.

- Section 3. The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Board of Directors as herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the convention.
- Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.
- Section 5. The Directors shall hold quarterly meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.
- Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall by proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held as above provided.
- Section 7. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### ARTICLE II

- Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.
- Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.

Two Vice-presidents, selected by the Board.

A Recording Secretary elected by the Convention.

An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.

A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.

A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

- Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board, and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.
- Section 4. The Vice-president, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.
- Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.
- Section 6. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make quarterly reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.
- Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He shall attest with the President all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

#### ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws, will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

#### ARTICLE V

- Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.
- Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- Section 4. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when

expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done only in cases of emergency which were unforseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 5. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until same has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State Paper at least six months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the Convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request comes to the Convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following Convention a year hence.

#### ALL MUSIC UNDER DIRECTION OF IRA C. PROSSER

- 1. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma met in the audition of the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 5, 1946.
- 2. President T. B. Lackey called the convention to order, calling attention to the fact that it was the 41st annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the 64th annual meeting of the Baptists organized at Tahlequah, Indian Territory, June 1, 1883.
- 3. Rev. Dan Curb, who was present in Shawnec in 1906 when the convention was organized, led in prayer.
- 4. Mr. Ira Prosser, music director for the Convention, led the congregation in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers," "The Solid Rock" and "Amazing Grace."
- 5. A ladies' chorus from the First Baptist Church of Pryor sang "I'd Rather Have Jesus," which was a helpful message.
- 6. Rev. R. Lofton Hudson, new pastor of First Church of Shawnee, led in the devotional service. His theme was: "What It Means to Follow Christ."
- 7. Dr. H. Tom Wiles presented the "Report on Foreign Missions" and moved its adoption. Motion carried.

# Report on Foreign Missions

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention enters the second century of its work with a considered sense of the responsibility resting upon it.

Ours is a world in chaos, which finds its political leaders attempting to build a warless superstructure on a Christless foundation. The preaching of the Gospel, which is what obedience to the Great Commission means, therefore becomes the primary imperative of all Christians. The Foreign Mission Board so realizes, and to this realization has given its whole thought.

To illustrate, this paragraph from a letter written by Dr. M. T. Rankin, the Executive Secretary of the F.M.B. as of September 11, 1945, from Shanghai, China. It will be remembered that Dr. Rankin was then on the closing round of his survey tour of China.

"The pressure of constant travel and the unending succession of

conferences have kept me from supplying you with current information about the situation here in the Orient. I am sure this same situation applies also to Dr. Cauthen. We are leaving early tomorrow morning by plane for Tsingtae and Tsinan in North China. We return on Tuesday of next week and leave again on Friday for Chengchow and Kaifeng in the interior of China. I, therefore, do not have time for an extended letter now.

"When I get home I shall try to give to you an insight into the remarkable and, on the whole, most encouraging developments in China. The ability of the Chinese people to keep things going and to bring about worthwhile achievements in the midst of chaotic confusion is almost incredible. Political strife and the wild economic inflation have drawn China into frightful confusion. The political situation is distressing and one wonders how the country goes on without economic collapse.

"I believe firmly that the move made at the Miami Convention to raise \$3,500,000 for relief and rehabilitation was providential. Truly God Himself saw that without these funds Baptist work in China would collapse before the end of 1946. We have already been able to give aid in places where undertakings could not have been carried through without immediate help. With these funds in hand, we can look to 1947 with a degree of assurance that Baptists in China will be able to come out of the chaos which has followed the end of the war."

The Budget adopted at the October meeting of the Board calls for appropriations of \$2,276,206.37, which is an increase over 1946 of \$575,780.36.

Budget receipts for the first nine months of 1946 were \$3,452,918.00, an increase of \$615,281.00 over a like period for 1945.

It is well to keep in mind that the total administrative expense (both at home and on the fields) is less than 10 per cent. Or in other words, for every \$10.00 contributed, \$9.00 is actually expended on the fields.

The times demand a greatly stepped up missionary force, for money, no matter how much, is useless without personnel. To that end let us pray that the Lord of the harvest shall send forth reapers.

30. Mr. J. P. Cox, Superintendent of the Muskogee Baptist Hospital, brought a report on the two hospitals. Motion carried to adopt the report.

# Report on Hospitals

Between January 1 and November 1 this year, your two hospitals, Miami and Muskogee, cared for 4,429 bed patients, rendered 37,894 patient days service, performed 1,973 surgical operations, gave emergency treatment to 1,235 additional patients and delivered 839 babies. On November 1 we had given charity service in the amount of \$4,713.10. This amount of charity might be smaller than some might expect but the economic condition is such that a larger appropriation for charity is unnecessary. We never refuse to accept a patient, his ability to pay notwithstanding.

HOSPITALS HAVE BECOME BIG BUSINESS. Hospitals have ceased to be the last resort; hospitals are now First Hope. When sight-seeing in a town you are always shown the hospitals. Chamber of Commerce bulletins always set forth the hospital facilities the community has to offer. It will behoove Baptists to become aware of this. The more Baptists do for the sick, lame and injured, the better. To a far larger extent than most of us realize, our denominational prestige is at stake in our hospitals. Catholics were quick to realize this. While in 1946 Baptists either have built or purchased five hospitals in the Southern Baptist area, Catholics took over five in Oklahoma alone, and have added or are in process of adding 125 beds to St. John's in Tulsa.

For a few years during and following the depression, the hospitals were carrying quite a debt load. When the debts were paid and we were able to see our way, the war came and the equipment we needed was diverted to the armed forces. By the end of the war we were at our rope's end in the way of equipment. Since January 1, we have been buying quite a few things. The hospital at Muskogee has bought (1) stationary Westinghouse X-ray and a portable X-ray; (2) two operating room tables; (3) new waiting room furniture; (4) an electrocardiograph; (5) a flake ice machine; (6) five new refrigerators; (7) new furniture for the entire hospital; (8) an electrically heated food conveyor; (9) reworked our heating plant; (10) extra equipment for our laundry and are at the moment redecorating the interior of the hospital. The hospital at Miami has, (1) reworked their nurse's home; (2) purchased two X-ray machines, stationary and portable; (3) two operating room tables; (4) a heat therapy machine; (5) two operating room lights; (6) redecorated the entire hospital; (7) opened one wing of the building for patients with new furniture in all this wing; (8) are at the moment reworking their heating plant. With these additions and replacements both hospitals will be set up as they should be except for their laundries and kitchens.

The hospital at Muskogee is in dire need of a nurses' home. The one have is inadequate in every way you can appraise a building. We have is inadequate in every way you can appraise a building. We have in the first and it is almost impossible to get them under any circumfunces. The American Hospital Association in August reported a national hirtage of 30,000 freshman nurses. When you consider the fact students hirty 75% of your nursing load, it seems to me the least Baptists can it is to furnish them an attractive, comfortable place in which to live while they train.

Our hospitals are too small to keep a chaplain busy. Instead we similable every patient and have one of the local ministers visit them. Issasionally a patient prefers that a minister not visit him, but such tases are few. This is proving a very satisfactory religious program.

We have many interesting cases. One night a man brought his meanscious wife to the hospital. They had seven children, the oldest it years of age, the youngest, still nursing, died while its mother was in the hospital. Thanks to penicillin, the mother is now home with her hildren. A mother brought her little 3½ year old son in one day. The father was overseas. The child had drunk sulphuric acid. We were mable to repair his throat but were able to make an opening into his samuch, through which he will be fed the remainder of his life. Nevertueless, he is living.

Your hospitals cannot be both the good Samaritan and the Innesseper. If you recall the story, it says, "He set him on his own beast and took him to an inn, and on the morrow when he departed he took that two pence and gave them to the host, and said unto him; Take care if him and whatsoever thou spendest more,—I will repay thee." In ther words, we have no record of the Innkeeper losing any money on that patient. That's where you come in. On July 16 the Executive Board if the Convention designated next Mother's Day as Hospital Day. On Hospital Day you will have an opportunity to give to your Hospitals. Then you give, ask yourself this question, "If I were taking my mother to a hospital tonight would I want to take her to a hospital whose equipment was inadequate?" Because somebody's mother will come in to be cared for and it could be yours, or maybe yours has already gone because the hospitalization needed could not be afforded. What an apportunity for a memorial to your Mother.

We should put more and more into our hospitals, save more fathers and mothers, have fewer orphans, fewer broken homes, fewer child delinquents, mend broken homes, correct physical deformities and put less into pension funds for unemployables and corrective institutions. We have a glorious missionary opportunity in our hospitals.

I don't know what the equipment for Miami will cost, but at Muskogee we need \$25,000.00 right now. The Baptists in Oklahoma should give a very minimum of \$25,000.00 to their hospitals next Mother's Day. In this same program last year, Texas Baptists gave \$50,000.00 to their hospitals. Why should we proportionately do less?

Opportunities don't wait. If Baptists don't fill the hospital need, some other group will move in and take the torch from our hands. God took a golden opportunity from the Jews and gave it to the Gentiles. There is no reason to believe He will wait on us. We, in your hospitals are doing the best we can. However, we need the love, loyalty, support and prayers of you all.

#### ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

#### BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

#### KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, under Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

#### ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUN-DATION OF OKLAHOMA.

#### ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

#### ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

#### ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section No. 12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

#### ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

#### ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which said The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both the and foreign missionary work.

#### ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the mathrow

#### ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corpomations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

#### ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

#### ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and insuring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

#### ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist Church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and all shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma; and at an election held at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the twenty-eighth day of October, 1946, the following names were selected as temporary directors for the purpose of this organization, who are to serve as such until their successors and the full complement of said sixteen (16)directors are elected and qualified, said tors to be presented to the Baptist General Convention at its annual meeting in Oklahoma City on Wednesday, November 6, 1946, to be approved by it, and the temporary directors signing the Articles of Incorporation, are as follows, to-wit:

The fiscal year of the Foundation shall be January 1st of each successive year.

## BY-LAWS OF THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

# ARTICLE I MEMBERSHIP

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

#### ARTICLE II

#### ANNUAL MEETING OF THE DIRECTORS

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting in connection with The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, at which time the annual report and recommendation of the directors shall be presented to, and acted upon by, such Convention.

#### ARTICLE III

#### **OFFICERS**

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and a Board of Directors; the secretary and treasurer of said board may be one and the same person. Such elective officers shall be chosen at a meeting of the members of said corporation to be held at The Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only.

#### ARTICLE IV

## DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1-President: The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2-Vice President: It shall be the duty of the vice president to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president.

Section 3—Secretary: It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and to perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of sec-

Section 4—Treasurer: The treasurer, subject to the provisions hereof, and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have, the custody of the funds, securities and property of the corporation, and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation. Current funds may be withdrawn only upon draft or check signed by the treasurer, investment funds by counter signature of the president.

The treasurer shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The treasurer shall file with the secretary of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a bond for the faithful performance of his duties, in such sum as may be fixed by the directors—the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 5—Directors: The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devise, bequest or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

#### ARTICLE V

## METHOD OF ELECTION AND TERMS OF OFFICE

Section 1—Directors: The directors for the first year shall be those designated in the charter and as may be approved at the Convention of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, when the charter and these by-laws are submitted for the approval of the board.

The directors shall serve for a term of four (4) years, beginning with the 15th day of November, 1946, and the first sixteen (16) directors shall serve as follows:

Each year thereafter the Board of Directors of the Convention shall recommend to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years.

Section 2—Other Officers: The directors shall select from among their own number a president, one or more vice presidents, secretary and treasurer, each of whom shall hold office for one year. The office of secretary and treasurer may be held by the same person.

Section 3—Vacancies: Vacancies on the Board of Directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If The Baptist General Convention should fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

## ARTICLE VI

#### BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1—Regular Meeting: The Board of Directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings: Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the Board of Directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committees: The Board of Directors may, at their first meeting or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum: A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of nine (9) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority: The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas

leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice president of the Board of Directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the Board of Directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### DISTRIBUTEES

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### SEAL

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of a Five Pointed Star, representing Oklahoma Baptist Institutions, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

## "THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA."

#### ARTICLE IX

#### AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meeting of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors for their consideration and examination before being submitted to the general meeting, subject to the approval of The Baptist General Convention.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

#### 1946

#### INTRODUCTION

"In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the wilderness of Judaea. And saying, Repent ye, for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." Matthew 3:1-2.

Since the day that John the Baptist was sent as the forerunner of Iss Jesus, disciples of Christ have been preaching the glorious gospel if the Son of God to people far and near. Never in the history of the world have the needs been greater and never have the doors of opportive been opened wider than they are today. People throughout the world are crying for help. Christ is the only one who can meet the needs if this war-torn and restless world.

Baptists have the whole message for the whole world. We must, therefore, renew our efforts in taking the gospel to every creature on this earth. Surely we prefer to send our youth who have felt the divine with Bibles and hymn-books today, rather than wait and be forced send them with guns and bombs tomorrow. The extent of our loyalty Christ will determine the course we pursue.

God has marvelously blessed the missionary work and our institutions and agencies during the past year. The contributions of Oklahoma Baptists to world missions beyond our own state compares favorably with other states in the south. Oklahoma is eleventh among the states in the Southern Baptist Convention in membership and it holds eighth place in contributions to outside causes.

The future of Oklahoma Baptists is as bright as the promises of God. In this report we are striving to set forth briefly the past, present, and future of the work of Oklahoma Baptists. In reports submitted to the Convention by the heads of various departments, a more complete record if past accomplishments and future plans will be found.

#### STATE MISSIONS

The Romance of State Missions in Oklahoma is one of unparalled interest. The first Baptist Church was organized in what is now Oklahoma by Isaac McCoy September 9, 1832. In 1906, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma was organized in Shawnee.

In 1945, there were 1,045 Baptist Churches in Oklahoma with a combined membership of 280,256. In round numbers, one-eighth of the population of Oklahoma is Baptist and one-third of all church members are members of Baptist churches. This gives Baptists a tremendous responsibility for making this state what it ought to be.

There is much work to be done in Oklahoma. Three-fourths of the population are not members of any church. The state mission forces should be enlarged. Every church should have a pastor, a building, and a well-rounded program. New churches should be organized where needed. More emphasis should be placed upon Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship and Doctrine. The different phases of the work presented in this report constitute the state mission program.

#### RURAL MISSIONS

The Department of Rural Missions was established January 1, 1944. Sam W. Scantlan was elected superintendent and has served in a very effective way. Working with Mr. Scantlan in this department are: Jess Dittmar, John G. Heard, Dorval W. Tabb, Thomas F. Glosup, J. E. Outlaw, C. H. Crouch and M. W. J. Richardson.

These eight men have shown the following visible results from January 1, 1946 to September 30, 1946:

Through the rural church department every church is encouraged to contribute through the Unified Budget. Simultaneous revivals are conducted in the associations, and branch Sunday Schools and new preaching stations are established where needed. The missionaries are available to assist in promoting schools of missions throughout the state. It is the plan of this department to encourage more and better church buildings, new preaching stations, a revival conducted in every church and community, and the promotion of the program in general at home and abroad.

#### CITY MISSIONS

In 1943, the Home Mission Board inaugurated City Mission Programs in the two largest cities of Oklahoma: Oklahoma City with Guy Bellamy as superintendent, and Tulsa with A. L. Lowther as superintendent. In 1945 upon the recommendation of the Home Mission Board, the State Board agreed to co-operate in the City Mission work supporting the two superintendents jointly with the Home Mission Board.

During this brief period several new churches have been organized — Oklahoma City and Tulsa; many mission stations have been opened with Sunday School, Training Union, and preaching services held regularly. Under the leadership of these two men, the Baptist work has been vitalized, and simultaneous revivals, training schools, and schools of missions have been conducted annually. Work among the foreign speaking people, the deaf and the negroes is being carried on in an effective way. The churches are working together in extending the Kingdom of God in the City Mission Program.

#### FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY

There were 9,250 registered at Falls Creek Assembly last August. Forty-nine surrendered for special service, 17 as foreign missionaries and seven to the gospel ministry; there were hundreds of rededications. Eternity alone can reveal the good that has been accomplished at Falls Creek Assembly since the first meeting in 1917.

The time has come when improvements must be made on the assembly grounds. The tabernacle must be enlarged, water lines laid, athletic grounds improved, additional swimming pools built and many other improvements.

Local churches will continue to build and repair their properties and Falls Creek will continue to grow. Sam W. Scantlan is the manager and E. P. Edwards, caretaker.

#### EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the heart of all missionary work at home and unto the uttermost parts of the earth. Our Convention, Executive Board with all institutions and agencies, realizing this to be the supreme task, placed evangelism at the head of the list of Major Objectives for the year of 1946. In the first Board meeting of the new year a committee was elected with Dr. Harold Graves, Bartlesville, Chairman, and assigned the responsibility of promoting evangelism for the year. They took the task seriously and began at once to lay plans to reach every community in the state with a special evangelistic meeting.

The annual meeting of the Moderators and Missionaries in January in Oklahoma City was well attended. Definite plans were presented and enthusiastically accepted by this group of leaders from each of the thirty-three associations.

Ten Regional Rallies were conducted throughout the state in which practically every church was represented by pastors and members. In these conferences it was suggested that the pastor of each church call his people to prayer, and make plans for a revival meeting. It was also suggested that a revival for all pastorless churches be arranged by the Associational Evangelistic Leader and Missionary, and that our churches go into the unchurched communities for two or more mission meetings during the year.

A state-wide Evangelistic Conference for prayer and counsel was held in the First Church of Shawnee the last of May. Each association reported that plans were well under way to carry out these objectives.

Evangelistic leaders, pastors, and missionaries have worked untiringly at this glorious task. Simultaneous revivals were conducted in many associations, including Oklahoma county and Tulsa-Rogers county. Nearly every church in the state has had a revival meeting. There have been hundreds of mission meetings in unchurched communities. Personal soul

winners have gone from house to house witnessing for Christ. Even with all the faithful work that has been done, information received from the associations reveals a loss in baptisms. We have the promise, "His word shall not return void." We believe this year has been a time of seed sowing which will bring forth a bountiful harvest.

We would express our sincere appreciation to Dr. Graves, his committee, and all of those who have given their best in evangelism. We give thanks unto God for the salvation of more than 10,000 people. As we face a new year with a field that is full ripe unto harvest, a challenge is presented to our spiritual leadership to sound the awakening call for all our constituency to give their best in a Holy Crusade of winning the lost to Christ.

The Board of Directors in the July meeting elected Dr. Elmer Ridgeway as State Evangelist. He is giving his entire time to revival meetings. His successful work as an evangelistic pastor in our state, and his marvelous gift of preaching the gospel of Christ, offers to our churches the very best in evangelistic help for revival meetings. With his God-given talent of evangelism, consecrated to this Holy Cause, he will make an invaluable contribution to a larger evangelism. The time has come when Oklahoma Baptists should think seriously on the enlargement of this department.

All those who serve our denomination through its many departments will continue to place a major emphasis on evangelism. There is a great need of more workers who will give all their time in a special way in winning the lost to Christ. We should earnestly seek divine guidance in this Convention, and "pray the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest field." Evangelism has made us what we are today, and evangelism alone can maintain us in the Holy task that has been committed to our churches.

## **BROTHERHOOD**

When Dr. Ridgeway resigned as Brotherhood and Institutional Secretary, the organization was left without leadership and direction. It was necessary, therefore, that some arrangement be made to carry on the work of this department.

After counseling with Mr. Bryce Twitty, Brotherhood President, and many other interested Board members, pastors, and laymen, it was unanimously concluded that the wisest thing to do was to ask Dr. Haskins. Assistant Executive Secretary, to handle this department at the present time. The announcement that Dr. Haskins was to guide the Brotherhood met with the hearty approval of laymen and pastors throughout Oklahoma. Already he is in the process of producing needed literature, and is planning a series of meetings with the men to climax the associational rallies scheduled for early next year.

The enlistment of the Baptist men of Oklahoma to play their part in Kingdom-building is a challenging task. There is great potential power in the Brotherhood movement. Our men want to help in every great enterprise for the advancement of Christ's Cause. Men properly guided and encouraged in their efforts will stimulate and strengthen Christian endeavor from the local church to the ends of the earth.

It is our hope to strengthen, undergird, and stabilize our institutions during this period of unprecedented prosperity. If this is done, the laymen must make it possible. The Brotherhood has pledged whole-hearted support to this gigantic task. The Brotherhood can help the churches in reir local work and be a mighty force in advancing the Cause of Christ

We now have a large group of active and efficient Brotherhoods. Our singan for 1947 is: "A Functioning Brotherhood in Every Church." We, herefore, urge the men in all the churches to organize a Brotherhood and back their pastors in every effort, local and world-wide, to advance the kingdom of Christ. The men in our churches can be the difference between success and failure in any church program. Our men love the Lord. They love His Holy Cause. They are interested in the on-going of the Kingdom. They will respond to vigorous and aggressive leadership, which calls them to the high and holy tasks of winning souls and building the church in all its departmental life.

#### BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME

For these past forty-four years, our Baptist people have lovingly cared for homeless children in the State of Oklahoma. Thirteen hundred boys and girls have come under this beautiful Baptist ministry; a ministry born in prayer and operated by faith. A birthday house and a Christmas stocking have surely become a symbol of Baptist people blessing little children.

H. Truman Maxey has served as resident manager for a number of years. He is assisted by Mrs. Gladys Dicken, head matron; C. E. Goatcher, farm manager; and, during the past year, Wade East has been employed as field representative. Dan Curb has retired from active service as field representative after 16 years of effective service.

The Home is now full beyond normal capacity. A waiting list has been made for those seeking admission and only the most extreme cases are given consideration. Every effort is being given to rush the building program. A boys' cottage and a nursery will be ready sometime in 1947. This will give some relief. Other buildings will be started as soon as government restrictions are lifted.

A music teacher for the Home has been employed by the Alford Bible Class and the Men's Bible Class of the First Church, Oklahoma City. This gives the children training and development in both instrumental and vocal music.

An excellent addition in equipment to the Home was a swimming pool given by Dr. Diyonis Worten of Pawhuska. This pool was dedicated July 4 and has been a keen delight to every child of the Home.

The dairy farm, under the supervision of C. E. Goatcher, has produced plenty of milk, and, in addition, a nice supply of pork and beef for table use. This winter's meat supply is already assured. Fencing and other improvements are being completed at the farm.

To make possible academic and professional training, beyond high school, a new plan has been inaugurated, which has been approved by the Executive Board. Money will be solicited and placed in an Education Fund. The children of the Home now in school will look forward to the opportunity of going on to college or other special training. Two of our young ladies are now enrolled in college.

We look forward, hoping that within the next five years, this Children's City will be so completed in the building program that 300 children can be adequately housed. Also, we hope to develop our financial income so that the life and stability of the institution shall not be in danger of any sudden change of economic conditions. Large gifts for buildings and

endowments by wills and legacies will go a long way in making this possible.

The load will be particularly heavy during these first post-war years. We urge our churches to give strong financial support through the special offerings of the Home.

#### BAPTIST MESSENGER

#### Past

Vol. 1, No. 1, of the BAPTIST MESSENGER was published in Oklahoma City, May 15, 1912, Dr. C. P. Stealey, editor. Dr. Geo. W. Truett, Dallas, had just assisted Carter Helm Jones and the First Baptist Church in a revival meeting. The church building itself, the same one they have now, was new. The advertisers included Kerr's and O. G. and E., still faithful contributors to the annual Convention edition of the BAPTIST MESSENGER. But the 1912 paper was not the first effort of Baptist journalism in Oklahoma. Many other periodicals had been published over a period of years, the earliest being THE CHEROKEE MESSENGER first printed in 1844 by Evan Jones. Since Vol. 1, No. 1, the BAPTIST MESSENGER has been printed nearly 1,800 weeks. The bound volumes occupy a shelf seven feet long. There have been three other editors: Dr. E. C. Routh, Porter Routh and Albert McClellan.

#### Present

The Baptist paper is owned and controlled by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Nineteen hundred forty-six has been one of its most eventful years with many gains in circulation, typography and general usefulness, even though paper shortages and mechanical difficulties have been noticeable. The paper this year stands as probably the most-read-one of all time and under the leadership of our present editor will make even greater gains before the year expires.

#### Future

Wide expansion of the paper is planned for the future. Though for the present (the paper shortage has no foreseeable relief in 1947) the circulation goal is "47,000 in 1947." This can be reached two ways: (1) see to it that the BAPTIST MESSENGER is included in the budgets of all the churches; (2) for churches already having the MESSENGER in the budget, add one new name for every five already on the subscription list.

This kind of program will bring tremendous gains to the Kingdom of God in Oklahoma.

#### CHURCH MUSIC AND BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

On September 15, 1945, the departments of Church Music and Baptist Student Union were established. Ira C. Prosser was elected director of these departments.

A recent survey shows a total of more than 8,500 Baptist students and those of Baptist preference enrolled in institutions of higher learning in Oklahoma. One thousand of these are in Oklahoma Baptist University, leaving 7,500 not enrolled in denominational schools. These students offer a great challenge to Oklahoma Baptists. It is our purpose to offer religious encouragement and help to these fine young men and women now in training.

Oklahoma Baptists have responded to the plan for church music

efficiation in an enthusiastic manner. Music institutes have been held in many sections of the state during the past year. Each of the 34 associations has elected a music committee to work with the director in this institute in promoting the work of church music education in 1947.

#### OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

In a brief span of 36 years Oklahoma Baptist University has sent out 1.564 graduates. They are serving in important capacities all over the wirld—as doctors, ministers, teachers, missionaries, business men, and in minutess other capacities. The graduates of Oklahoma Baptist University ministrate its most effective and most accurate advertising medium. Totar the student body of Oklahoma Baptist University numbers 1,070, of which 621 are freshmen, 407 are upperclassmen, and 42 are unclassified in special students.

Until recently the acquisition of property and equipment by the unitersity has been neither rapid nor regular, yet in the space of a few short years it has accumulated 13 buildings, and at present its capital worth is more than \$1,116,896.58. The faculty of the University is stronger than ever before, as a result of strategic additions to the faculty and advanced study by its members. The college of fine arts is second to none in the state, and very promising futures are in prospect for the newly-ineated departments of engineering and photography. The department of furnalism and publicity has been revitalized, and the quarters of the fepartment of home economics have been remodeled, with installation if the very latest and best of equipment. Evident throughout the University is a growing spirit of progress and alertness. In view of the enhausiastic good will and support of the Baptists of the State of Oklahoma, with every evidence of favorable prospects for continued growth and improvement, the future of Oklahoma Baptist University is as bright as the promises of God.

The completion of the W. L. Brittain Memorial Library and Art Center in the spring of 1946 in the face of war-time shortages and difficulties of all sorts marked the successful culmination of the campaign to provide adequate library facilities for the students of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Alterations which converted storerooms into additional classroom space in Shawnee Hall and Montgomery Hall have made it possible to accommodate more students in classes than ever before. Construction continues on the Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory for Men and also on 35 apartment units provided by the Federal Public Housing Authorities for the use of veterans and their families. Ample housing for single men has been supplied through the use of buildings on the navy base adjacent to the campus.

Enrollment figures for the 1945-46 session included 722 students during the regular session, 301 during the summer school, and 73 students in the summer school for preachers, making a grand total of 1,096. Ministerial students enrolled during the regular session numbered 132, while 60 were enrolled during the summer session. The report of the Ministerial Alliance for the school year listed 568 conversions, with 828 additions to the churches and 302,852 miles traveled. Extension activities of former years were maintained.

With a probable enrollment of 1,400 to 1,500 for the second semester and prospects for continued growth in the future, the University is looking to the Baptists of Oklahoma to match academic expansion and growth with physical expansion. In order properly to accommodate so many

students, in order to provide classrooms and equipment which will assure efficient teaching conditions, the University must expand its physical plant. Its most pressing needs are as follows:

- 1. Furniture and furnishings for library and art center.
- 2. Furniture and equipment for Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory.
- 3. New dormitory for women.
- 4. Science building.
- 5. Chapel and Fine Arts Building.
- Student center.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

On January 1, 1946, Mrs. Berta K. Spooner resigned as Woman's Missionary Union Secretary after twenty-five fruitful years of service. Mrs. Bill Carden, who has been associated with Mrs. Spooner for some years was given the responsibility of secretary.

The purpose of Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma has not changed during its 41 years of service. Its endeavor has always been to supplement the work of the General Convention primarily in the spreading of missionary information and in the collecting of funds to meet the missionary needs.

In its effort to spread missionary education, it set up for 1946 a goal of 22,975 missionary periodicals. In addition to these current magazines published by our Southwide WMU and Home and Foreign Mission Boards, the WMU has urged the regular reading of the BAPTIST MESSENGER.

Mission books are a second channel through which Woman's Missionary Union secures a knowledge of missionary needs. Thus far in 1945, 9,549 mission awards have been issued for missionary reading and study.

One thousand one hundred ninety-six organizations throughout the churches of Oklahoma are also being taught stewardship of money. Aside from regular and urgent promotion of the Unified Budget, Woman's Missionary Union has, in the last year, brought \$57,957.96 through the Lottie Moon Christmas offering for Foreign Missions, \$18,248.99 through the Annie Armstrong offering for Home Missions, and \$5,247.01 through the Edna McMillan offering for State Missions, in addition to \$6,866.67 given to the White Cross offering for hospital work and \$2,263.44 for Christian education, providing scholarships for six young people in our Baptist colleges.

Two nurseries have been supported, one in whole and the other in part at Oklahoma Baptist University and Southwestern Seminary, making it possible for minister's wives to obtain training along with their husbands.

A gift of \$782.55 has come to the Margaret Fund to provide special gifts to the children of missionaries.

Aside from these tangible results of the endeavor of Woman's Missionary Union, its members are an integral part of all teaching and evangelistic efforts of our churches. We approach the coming year with increasing desire for close co-operation in all that our state and associational officers, and local pastors plan.

#### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

E. W. Westmoreland is the secretary of Sunday School and Training Union work. He is ably assisted by Jack Gritz, Associate and Adult Worker; Miss Sophia Duerksen, Training Union Promotion and Young People's Work; Mrs. J. W. Barron, Vacation Bible School Promotion and Junior Work; Miss Connie Bradley, Intermediate Work; Mrs. Dorothy Sneed, Office Secretary; and the following approved workers, Mrs. Wayman Hiner, Primary Work; Mrs. W. H. Crowder, Beginner Work; Mrs. G. H. Caudill, Cradle Roll and Nursery Work.

Nineteen hundred forty-six has been one of the best years in the history of the department. The 1945 report shows a gain of 11,671 in Sunday School enrolment and 4,792 in Training Union enrolment. Oklahoma ranks third among the southern states in standard Sunday School units. Tremendous progress has been made in Vacation Bible School work. Last year 453 schools were reported.

The outlook for continued growth in the Department of Religious Education is bright.

#### UNDERGIRDING OUR INSTITUTIONS

Baptists of Oklahoma face a day of unparalleled expansion and growth. Baptismal reports from our churches Sunday by Sunday attest the vitality of our evangelistic spirit. The growth of the church organizations such as the Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood, together with the training program inaugurated for developing leaders, express the purpose of the church to maintain continuous growth. Within the cycle of ten years the membership of the churches has increased, in round numbers, from two hundred thousand to three hundred thousand.

While we are gratified beyond measure at the growth in our local churches, we must bear in mind that as a denomination we are yet in our swaddling clothes. We have yet to build our institutions to such a point that we can guarantee denominational integrity and perpetuity.

The Baptist Orphans' Home in Oklahoma City now accommodates 175 children and has a property valuation of \$265,196.79.

Our needs are such that we should now be able to accommodate twice that number and then build for an increasingly larger group in the immediate future.

Generous friends over the state have remembered this institution with loving gifts, which in ordinary times would have guaranteed this high purpose, but, owing to the increased cost of building, the money now in hand will not meet the pressing needs upon us. We must have additional gifts for the Baptist Orphans' Home if we are to fulfill the dream of yesteryear.

Last year our hospitals at Miami and Muskogee treated some 4,000 patients. The greatest need now is for improvement and enlargement. Friends have supplied our needs in the past and we confidently expect the increased needs to be met by those who sense the purpose of healing as a part of the program of Christ.

Both the hospitals at Miami and Muskogee should have additional equipment to lift them to the highest point of efficiency. The hospital at Muskogee desperately needs a nurses' home so that we might better care for the young women who come to us to be trained for the high calling of nursing.

The Falls Creek Assembly numbers 175 cabins on its campus at the present time. Reports indicate that one hundred churches have made their plans to build or to rebuild in the immediate future. The responsibility is upon this Convention to provide facilities and equipment for general use.

The tabernacle should be enlarged and suitable accommodations should be provided for visiting speakers and teachers. More facilities must be added to accommodate the ever-increasing throngs who attend each summer. We can look only to our people for the funds to supply these needs. No religious gathering in Oklahoma has greater spiritual significance than Falls Creek. Eighty percent of those attending can be classified as youth. Here they meet the high tide of our spiritual life and are challenged to match it by consecrating their lives to the service of Christ. Falls Creek is the Youth Center of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. An investment in Falls Creek will insure dividends in the spiritual growth of the denominational life of tomorrow.

There are now on the campuses of the state colleges of Oklahoma more than 8,000 Baptist students and 1,400 of Baptist preference. There always has been ten times as many Baptist students on state school campuses as we have been able to care for at Oklahoma Baptist University. It goes without saying that our Convention has a definite responsibility for these young men and women who are training for leadership in the professional and vocational life of Oklahoma. The facilities on all the campuses of the state colleges and universities are wholly inadequate to meet the demands of today, much less supply the needs for tomorrow. We hereby assure Mr. Ira C. Prosser, Baptist Student Union Secretary, and the pastors and church leaders in the various college towns of our intention to erect adequate facilities to care for the ever-increasing number of Baptist youth educated on these campuses. A definite appeal will be made to our people for funds to provide these facilities in the immediate future.

Oklahoma Baptist University is our financial problem child. While great progress has been made in the last decade, much remains to be done to provide the basic needs in plant and equipment.

We have no dormitory facilities whatever for men on the campus and will not have until the completion of the Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory now under construction. When this magnificent building is completed it will cost multiplied thousands of dollars to furnish and equip it for use in September, 1947. Funds have been raised with which to complete the dormitory but none have been provided for equipment. The unit cost per boy is \$350.00 and we have no way of securing it but to ask for individual contributions from our people.

The beautiful W. L. Brittain Library and Art Center which adorns the campus and is now in use must be furnished and equipped in keeping with its graceful architecture and artistic design. For this we need a minimum of \$10,000, which amount could be given to memorialie some loved one.

Our plans contemplate the erection of a chapel and fine arts stillding on the campus of our beloved University as quickly as materials can be secured and as funds are made available.

In order to vitalize the program envisioned in these needs, the Epard of Directors and the Board of Trustees have released Dr. Andrew Fotter and Dr. John W. Raley from some of the duties and responsibilities which they have carried in the past so that they might devote a larger part of their time and energy to the personal solicitation of funds so greatly needed to undergird and stabilize our institutions and agencies. It was the unanimous conclusion of the Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees that Drs. Potter and Raley, because of their background, experience, and training, were better equipped for this specific task than any one else who might be secured.

The job we have outlined here is difficult. It cannot be done over night. It will be of long duration. It will require patience, persistence, and devotion. In the opinion of the Boards this was the most practical and feasible plan to follow and it gives great promise of eliciting the support of our people and achieving success.

Thomas Bert Lackey was unanimously elected to share with Drs. Potter and Haskins the heavy responsibilities of the general work of the Convention. Mr. Lackey is well-equipped for the task assigned him. His coming to the general office to work with Dr. Haskins will insure the continuance of the Unified Budget momentum and relieve Dr. Potter of many details that he may give himself more fully to the new program.

The Board of Trustees elected Dr. Orin Cornet as Vice-President of the University, in order that the administrative details of the President's office might be cared for in the absence of Dr. Raley.

This team is now ready to go afield to secure the funds to supply the needs outlined above. It is well to call your attention to the fact that between the close of the Convention and the thirty-first day of December men and women in Oklahoma will be in position to make substantial gifts. While it will not be possible for them to see all prospective contributors with a personal appeal, it is hoped that pastors and others who know of the needs will supplement the efforts of Drs. Potter and Raley in the few weeks that remain of this calendar year.

Let us dedicate ourselves to this task and pledge our cooperation to the end that we may secure funds to undergird and stabilize the Baptist institutions of Oklahoma.

#### BAPTIST BOOK STORE

The Baptist Book Store located at 223 West First Street in Oklahoma City is owned and operated by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. It serves the churches of Oklahoma with books and other necessary supplies.

During the past year, H. Killingsworth, who has served as manager for many years, resigned to accept a similar position with the Baptist Book Store in Dallas, Texas. Miss Mary E. Tongee was employed as the manager and few changes in management and methods of handling orders have been made. Under Miss Tongee's management, the largest sales in the history of the book store have been reported.

It is the desire of the personnel of the book store to make, first, the church library department available to every Baptist church; second, the visual education department a guide to every church in the purchase and use of visual aids; third, the mail order department the quickest way by which the church can secure supplies; fourth, the accounting department to render prompt and accurate service; fifth, a store in which Oklahoma Baptists can be justly proud, attractive in appearance, well-stocked with merchandise, and with a capable, courteous, and well-trained sales force to serve.

## BAPTIST HEADQUARTERS

More than twenty years ago a dilapidated store building was purchased at 223 N.W. First Street in Oklahoma City. This building has been outgrown and five offices have been rented outside.

At the Baptist General Convention in 1945 a recommendation was adopted authorizing the purchase of a building site and the erection of a Baptist Headquarters Building as soon as practicable.

The building site has been purchased at Fifteenth and Robinson streets in Oklahoma City. An architest has been employed and a thorough study is being made of the needs. The scarcity of materials and labor have delayed the erection of the much-needed structure; however, as soon as materials and labor are available, the Board of Directors will carry out the authorization of the Convention and the new Baptist Headquarters building will be erected.

#### MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

At the Convention meeting in Shawnee in 1938, the Ministers' Retirement Plan was inaugurated. Since that time 57 veterans of the cross have been retired.

There are 503 pastors and other full-time religious workers who have the protection that this plan affords.

We earnestly urge every full-time religious worker—pastors, secretaries, janitors, educational directors and denominational workers to avail themselves of this opportunity.

#### WIDOWS' SUPPLEMENTAL PLAN

July 1, 1946, the Widows' Supplemental Plan became effective. This plan is to give protection to the widows of pastors and others who are participating in the Ministers' Retirement Plan in case of death of the member before the time of retirement. The Widows' Supplemental Plan does not require additional funds from the church. The minister pays one and one-half per cent of his salary and the Convention matches that with an equal amount. Many have already entered this plan.

We urge every married man in the Ministers' Retirement Plan to give his wife and family this protection. Additional information may be secured from Andrew Potter, Executive Secretary.

#### HOSPITALS

Oklahoma Baptists own and operate two hospitals: Oklahoma Baptist Hospital at Muskogee with J. P. Cox as administrator, and Miami Baptist Hospital at Miami with A. F. Wasson as superintendent. Both hospitals are free of debt and are in the process of redecorating, refurnishing, and replacing the equipment with the latest and best that is available. It is our purpose to make the Baptist Hospitals among the most modern and efficient in Oklahoma.

Mother's Day, the second Sunday in May, 1947, has been designated as Hospital Day. At this time the Baptist people of Oklahoma will be given an opportunity to show their interest in the hospital work.

#### RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

The Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Miami, Florida, May, 1946, voted unanimously to launch a campaign to raise \$3,500,000 for relief and rehabilitation to be distributed through the Foreign Mission Board to suffering people in the war-torn and weary world.

Oklahoma had not planned a special campaign for funds during 1946. Major emphasis was to be placed upon the Unified Budget; however, our people gladly entered into this emergency appeal and the ruota of \$172,000 suggested for Oklahoma has been raised in full. When it the money given by our people has been received, Oklahoma will, doubt, go far beyond the amount suggested for our state.

It is encouraging to note that the campaign has been successful irroughout the Southern Baptist Convention and the \$3,500,000 sought has been raised with money being received daily. We are grateful to the pastors and churches for their response and for their generous right to this emergency.

#### UNIFIED BUDGET

Everything dear to the hearts of Baptists is included in the United Budget—State, Home and Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Hospitals, Orphanage and Ministerial Relief. This plan continues to grow favor with Oklahoma Baptists. There is an increasing conviction that the Unified Budget has finally placed us on a permanent financial frundation. When one understands the set-up of the Unified Budget and adequate support for all our work; second, distributes that it causes proportionately; third, enlists our people in the support all phases of work done by Oklahoma and Southern Baptists. Such program is sane, scriptural and successful. The increased receipts through the Unified Budget is proof of the soundness of this plan.

#### GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That it will be our policy to operate on a cash basis.
- 2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best administration and promotion of our work.
- 3. That we instruct all agencies provided for in the budget not to incur any debts not authorized by the Board of Directors during 1947.
- 4. That the 1947 State Mission Budget be projected on a basis that will insure no deficits at the close of the year.
- 5. That we continue the ten per cent contingency fund from in-the-state objects as a safeguard against possible deficits.
  - 6. That the Board of Directors be authorized and instructed to

==adjust the figures of the Unified Budget if receipts do not justify == suggested distribution. We solemnly renew our pledge to the Bapass of Oklahoma that there will be no debt debacles during this administration.

7. We further recommend that all Unified Budget funds above £51,000.00 (which is the basis of operation) be divided fifty-fifty between state and southwide causes.

#### A POLICY

Inasmuch as the Baptist General Convention has a large mailing list of the Brotherhood, the W.M.U., Baptist Messenger, Sunday School Superintendents, Training Union Directors, church Treasurers, Clerks, and a multitude of other names; and since almost every week names are requested of some department for various purposes—these requests often coming from our best friends and supporters—and since the Secretary and Department Heads do not want to be arbitrary nor discourteous by refusing to accommodate people, even though they pay for their work; therefore, we recommend that the Secretary and department heads be authorized and instructed not to furnish names to any one for any purpose other than for our own work, unless directed to do so by the Board of Directors or the Convention.

This will relieve us of the responsibility of refusing favors to our friends and supporters and will at all times safeguard our best interests and meet with the hearty approval of all concerned.

## CONCLUSION

The Lord has led Oklahoma Baptists out of the wilderness of debt and on toward the land of promise. When the Israelites stood before the Red Sea on their journey from Egyptian bondage toward the promised land, their great leader Moses said, "Fear ye not, stand still and see the salvation of the Lord... The Lord shall fight for you and ye shall hold your peace. And the Lord said unto Moses... Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward." Exodus 14:13-15.

The Lord's marching orders have ever been forward. It matters not what the difficulties and obstacles may be, there is but one desire for Baptists and that is forward. The Christian armor provides no protection for the back because God's people are to be found marching on.

The theme song of this convention expresses the sentiments of Oklahoma Baptists.

Onward, Christian Soldiers, Marching as to war, With the cross of Jesus, Going on before! Christ, the royal Master, Leads against the foe; Forward into battle, See, His banners go!

At the sign of triumph, Satan's host doth flee; On then, Christian soldiers, On to victory! Hell's foundations quiver, at the shout of praise Brothers, lift your voices, Loud your anthems raise!

Like a mighty army, Moves the Church of God; Brothers, We are treading, Where the saints have trod; We are not divided; All one body we, One in hope and doctrine, One in charity.

Secretary Potter stated his belief that in the entire twelve months of 1946 we should have at least \$1,000,000.00 cash contributed to all purposes included in the Unified Budget.

Goals for Unified Budget in 1947 total \$650,000 from undesignated gifts, which with designations, should make it possible for our state to give at least \$500,000 to outside causes.

58. Secretary Potter announced that the Miami citizens have raised \$25,000.00 as part of a \$37,500.00 hospital campaign. The time for the campaign is not over, and it seems certain at the time of the convention that the final \$12,500 will be given.

## SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

A report on social service to the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention requires a re-defining of terms and a clarification of purpose. Traditionally, our denomination has continued to hear statements in its annual session which have, for the most part, merely enumerated certain obvious current social evils. The liquor traffic, the deterioration of the modern home, with its attendant evil of juvenile delinquency, and the prevalence of undesirable literature on newsstands have been favorite themes for castigation. Each of these items of complaint are, doubtless, with us today, but merely protesting their existence does not adequately convey what the term "social service" includes in its derivation or ultimate meaning.

"Social service" implies specific services by the denomination, through the churches, to the areas of social relationships where injustices have dominated and injured the lives of the people, rather than a mere protest against such evils. "Social service" suggests positive procedures initiated by, and carried through by, the churches of the denomination to alleviate undesirable living conditions, hurtful social conduct and injurious patterns of social thinking. Therefore, your

Social Service Committee wishes to suggest the following areas where conditions need correcting, and to indicate some possible procedures by which the churches may aid in bringing these evils under control.

1. The disintegration of modern home life is still the darkest cloud on the horizon. Much of the break-down may truthfully be traced to the uprooting of life by the exigencies of war, but a larger percentage of the trouble dates to earlier pre-war years. The gradual change of our patterns of living from those of a predominantly agrarian society to those of a highly industrial-type existence has contributed far more than has war to this regrettable condition. Life in our cities and towns, where delinquency thrives, has stimulated congested living conditions, encouraged poor housing, perpetuated impossible sanitary conditions, and provided a crude familiarity between people that has contributed inevitably to a loss of respect for the sanctity of human personality and the rights of the individual. A really major social problem among us, then, is how to cope with the evils attendant upon a highly regulated and complex industrial pattern of living.

Your Committee feels that a major step would be taken to combat the ugly by-products of the break-down of nome life if our churches would open their buildings on week-days for "social centers" in which recreation, supervised play, creative arts and classes in the techniques of building successful home life would be provided. It is common knowledge that the majority of delinquents are found among those persons who are idle, bored, or unguided. Utilizing church buildings a few hours on Sunday for worship, and on week nights for religious promotional meetings—the latter primarily for "priming the pump" for Sunday's activities—is not, to say the least, the most intelligent way to use church property for the salvation of human personality. Too often the criticism of the average church that it knows how to do nothing but "preach and pray" is too valid an appraisal for comfort.

2. Tensions between the races have been accentuated by the war's widely proclaimed thesis of liberty for all men. Minority groups have rightly anticipated that after the war something tangible would be done to eliminate unjust racial discrimination. Efforts of the Federal Government to enforce the Fair Employment Practices Act have proved ineffectual, and many groups, including some religious, and otherwise, have condoned such prejudice which deprives an individual because of his race of "life and liberty and the pursuit of happiness" which our forefathers said were his "inalienable rights." It is the feeling of your Committee that the longer the Convention, through its churches, delays in presenting a strong front against the unfair and un-Christian attitude of great sections of our population against people of other races the longer will an understanding of this danger spot be delayed.

As an approach toward relieving racial tensions your Committee suggests that our churches make a large place in their curriculum for teaching strictly scientific data with Christian attitudes that will do much to destroy the fiction, so long held, of there being such a phenomenon as a "superior race." Churches ought to say, by every means at their disposal, that discrimination, because of race, is utterly out of harmony with the Christian faith.

3. America has a notorious name throughout the world as a profligate and immoral people. The practical elimination from American life of the sacredness and primacy of Sunday as a day for worship and rest is but one indication of the ultimate complete secularizing of our life. With this wide-spread abandonment of religious worship, all standards of high living have been lowered. To the secularizing of

ine one must add the predominance of materialism, the sordidness of social custom and conduct and the debauchery of many of our res with intoxicants, indecencies and infidelities as evil children n is secularization of life.

Your Committee does not see a wide-spread turning to religion, so many have prophesied, but, rather, it envisions signs of a startening of the lines between those in our society who are motivated strictly Christian principles and those who are pagan in their re-actions to life. Standing in the midst of such a divided generation, churches must continue to speak their message of devotion to the reset in life, realizing that "if the trumpet give an uncertain sound, which shall prepare himself to the battle." (I Cor. 14:9).

Other areas of modern life where our denomination has made little, no, effort to cope with social evils are: The injustices involved in == employer-employee relationship; the struggle for international un-Erstanding and good will; and positive practical suggestions as to how = relieve the badly housed, and poorly fed and the ill-treated portions our population. There is a Christian answer to all such social ills, but Christian forces must do more than pass resolutions condemning heir existence. There must be action, direct and positive, in the local churches. There must be strong impassioned words from the pulpits against social injustice. There must be deliberate dedication of our people to the ideal of hastening the day when God's will shall "be done in earth as it is in heaven." Then can we feel that as a denomination we are worthy of the people's trust. Who knows but that Oklahoma Baptists have "come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"

#### SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEES

Recognizing the pressing need of unifying our temperance forces in this state and the building of a strong effective temperance organization, we heartily endorse the efforts of the Anti-Saloon League of America in sending to this state Rev. W. J. Herwig of the National staff to reorganize, vitalize and enlarge the Oklahoma Anti-Saloon League, and we urge our pastors and churches to cooperate in this important endeavor, giving the representatives of the reorganized Anti-Saloon League a hearing.

In order that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma may have a voice and vote in the program and policies of the reorganized Anti-Saloon League we recommend the following be elected as members of the Board of Directors of the League:

## CHURCH MUSIC AND BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

## Ira C. Prosser, Director

Since Oklahoma Baptists have established these new departments and are seeking to give renewed emphasis in this field of labor, we will outline the work under three heads: 1. Establishing the Departments. 2. Surveying the needs. 3. Outlining the program of work.

#### 1. Establishing the Departments

These new departments of Oklahoma Baptist work were established by the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, September 15, 1945. The promotional offices are located in Room 405 of the Colcord Building, corner Grand and Robinson. The congested condition at Baptist Headquarters is the occasion for this and other departments having to be located elsewhere.

## 2. Surveying the Needs of the Baptist Student Union Field

In the B. S. U. (Baptist Student Union) field, the 1946 Fall survey of the colleges, universities, business schools, and institutions of higher learning and specialized training reveals an enrolment of 7,500 plus Baptist students and 1,000 plus Baptist preference, making a grand total of 8,500 plus.

Oklahoma Baptist University has its largest enrolment of 1,000 plus. This leaves a grand total of 7,500 plus not on denominational campuses. These students offer a great challenge to Oklahoma Baptists for Christian education and enlistment. This is the field of B. S. U. Through this movement, Baptists go with their students to college, ever keeping before them their church and denominational program.

The survey further reveals a great need for strengthening the personnel of leadership on local campuses and providing them with necessary equipment for efficient work.

Outlining the program of work—1946-47:

1. The denominational calendar of student activities, suggested

ing the various states and promoted from the Southwide office, is being followed.

- 2. A state meeting for all the B.S.U. leadership was held in the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, in February, when the entire rear's program was planned and enthusiastically adopted.
- 3. One hundred and forty-five students attended the Student Reteat, Ridgecrest, North Carolina, June 5-12, Oklahoma's largest Ridge-rest attendance.
- 4. Emphasis was given the B.S.U. promotional program, at Falls Creek, under the leadership of Robert S. Denny of Nashville. The B.S.U. class had an average attendance of 125.
- 5. B.S.U. evangelistic teams directed youth revivals and mission work, during the summer vacation days.
- 6. The climax for student activities, 1946, was the State B.S.U. Convention held at the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, November 1-3. The program was outstanding; the attendance was Oklahoma B.S.U.'s greatest.
- 7. Oklahoma Baptists and their student leadership will give special attention to raising funds for student centers and other equipment needed for the local campuses, beginning in 1947.

## 3. Surveying the Needs of the Church Music Field

In the church music field, the survey to determine the desire for a progressive church music education program has met with enthusiastic response. Oklahoma Baptists are exceedingly anxious that our church music training program be brought up to a level commensurate with the other training programs in the field of religious education.

Outlining the program of work-1946-47:

- 1. The director has demonstrated, through music institutes held in practically every section of the state, the type training that needs to be done through associational, city-wide and local church units.
- 2. It was his pleasure to assist Dr. B. B. McKinney, Secretary, Department of Church Music, Nashville; Mr. Ralph Wesson and Miss Lois Hall in directing a great Falls Creek music program of teaching and singing. The enrollment for the class in church music exceeded 1,000.
- 3. Each of the thirty-four associations has shown a fine spirit of cooperation in selecting a committee to work with your state director in setting up a suggested program of promotion for church music, to begin in 1947.
- 4. There will be four outstanding events, in the promotional work for 1947:
  - (1) A meeting of the associational officers, in February, to set up a program of enlistment for the training work to be done during the year.
  - (2) A church music leadership Clinic to be held at the Oklahoma Baptist University, June 2-6, with Southern Baptists' greatest church music leaders serving as faculty members. Dr. B. B. McKinney, Secretary, Department of Church Music,

Nashville, Tennessee; Mr. Hines Sims, Associate to Dr. Mc-Kinney; Mr. Plunkett Martin, Professor of Sacred Music, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, New Orleans, La.; and Dr. Warren Angell, Dean of Fine Arts, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. Others will be added, as the needs demand.

- (3) The annual Falls Creek program of directing and teaching.
- (4) Associational-wide simultaneous music institutes throughout the state, to be promoted late in the Fall.
- 72. Report on Home Missions was presented by Rev. Tom Carter. Dr. Auguie Henry, McAlester, introduced Dr. Courts Redford who spoke to the Report.

#### HOME MISSION REPORT

The responsibility of the Home Mission board has been from the beginning to inaugurate Baptist work among the people not being reached through the regular channels of our work. Thus, the Board has year by year expanded its work until it now has 642 missionaries in the field and these missionaries are working through 15 different phases of the work. The department is continually finding new fields and new opportunities of service for expanding this great division of the work of Southern Baptists. Dr. J. B. Lawrence, our able Executive Secretary, has been assisted in the general executive work by an Oklahoman, Dr. Courts Redford, our Assistant Executive Secretary.

We now have 72 churches and 95 missionaries among the Mexicans. Four churches and Missions, with 14 missionaries among the Italians. Twenty-two churches and missions and 23 missionaries among the French. Four churches and missions and eight missionaries among the Chinese and 21 mission stations and 25 missionaries at Panama, Costa Rica and in the Canal Zone area.

Oklahoma's own Dr. J. B. Rounds was elected superintendent of the Indian work in July, 1943, and the program of this work has been enlarged until we now have 204 churches and missions with 93 missionaries among the Indians. There are more than 1,575,000 Indians unevangelized.

We have at present nine centers of work and seven missionaries to the deaf. One hundred ninety-one mission stations and 119 missionaries to the people of Cuba. We have 22 Negro center workers to serve these fields. We have 12 mission centers and two rescue homes with 26 missionaries striving to reach those who are far from the Lord.

The great city mission program inaugurated in 1942 has grown to where there are 42 of our cities participating, with every state of the Southern Baptist Convention territory represented. The 42 cities and missionaries do not include the work in Arizona, New Mexico and California where a splendid work is also being accomplished.

In addition to the above listed, we have cooperative work in Rural Missions; this being carried on in 10 states which include 47 cooperative workers who are working with more than 19,400 rural churches. Oklahoma has the distinction of being the first state to officially enter this program.

Our Home Mission Board also has 18 mission centers, serving under the classification of Special Missions with 20 missionaries employed in these fields. There is so much to be done. Our Home Mission Board must evangelize the homeland and maintain a strong base for world missions. With perhaps the greatest strength in the history of the Board, having at present more than 587 churches and missions and 702 workers and missionaries, still 326 churches and missions are needed and at least 389 workers and missionaries to meet the needs of the unevangelized fields in the homeland. This would call for an expenditure of \$2,616,000 for Mission properties and a \$1,300,000 increase per year for operation. Surely Southern Baptists are able to supply these needs and should accept these figures in thanks-giving for the splendid accomplishment in the past and a challenge to even greater things for Christ in the years ahead.

#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

In a brief span of 36 years Oklahoma Baptist University has sent out some 1564 graduates. They are serving in important capacities all over the world—as doctors, ministers, teachers, missionaries, and business men, and in countless other capacities. The graduates of Oklahoma Baptist University constitute its most effective and most accurate advertising medium. Today the student body of Oklahoma Baptist University numbers 1070, of which 621 are freshmen, 407 are upperclassmen, and 42 are unclassified or special students.

Until recently the acquisition of property and equipment by the university has been neither rapid nor regular, yet in the space of a few short years it has accumulated 13 buildings, and at present its capital worth is more than \$1,116,896.58. The faculty of the University is stronger than ever before, as a result of strategic additions to the faculty and advanced study by its members. The college of fine arts is second to none in the state, and very promising futures are in prospect for the newly created departments of engineering and photography. The department of journalism and publicity has been revitalized, and the quarters of the department of home economics have been remodeled, with installation of the very latest and best of equipment. Evident throughout the University is a growing spirit of progress and alertness. In view of the enthusiastic good will and support of the Baptists of the state of Oklahoma, with every evidence of favorable prospects for continued growth and improvement, truly the future of Oklahoma Baptist University is as bright as the promises of God.

The completion of the W. L. Brittain Memorial Library and Art Center in the spring of 1946 in the face of war-time shortages and difficulties of all sorts marked the successful culmination of the campaign to provide adequate library facilities for the students of Oklahoma Baptist University. Alterations which converted storerooms into additional classroom space in Shawnee Hall and Montgomery Hall have made it possible to accommodate more students in classes than ever before. Construction continues on the Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory for Men and also on 35 apartment units provided by the Federal Public Housing Authorities for the use of veterans and their families. Ample housing for single men has been supplied through the use of buildings on the navy base adjacent to the campus.

Enrollment figures for the 1945-46 session included 722 students during the regular session, 301 during the summer school, and 73 students in the summer school for preachers, making a grand total of 1096. Ministerial students enrolled during the regular session numbered 132, while 60 were enrolled during the summer session. The report of the Ministerial Alliance for the school year listed 568 conversions, with 828 additions to the churches and 302,852 miles traveled. Extension activities of former years were maintained.

With a probable enrollment of 1400 to 1500 for the second semester and prospects for continued growth in the future, the University is looking to the Baptists of Oklahoma to match academic expansion and growth with physical expansion. In order properly to accommodate so many students, in order to provide classrooms and equipment which will assure efficient teaching conditions, the University must expand its physical plant. Its most pressing needs are as follows:

- 1. Furniture and furnishings for Library and Art Center
- 2. Furniture and equipment for Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory
- 3. New dormitory for women
- 4. Science building
- 5. Chapel and Fine Arts building
- 6. Student center

The University had for the year an income of \$363,289.08, expense of \$326,108.15, leaving a reserve of \$37,180.93. This net reserve is made up largely of gifts for special purposes—namely, library stacks— \$21,-

170.00; library books—\$5,000.00; loan funds—\$1,522.00; endowment—\$2,-300.00; boys' dormitory—\$518.50; scholarships—\$224.97; other— \$148.00; total—\$30,883.47, income for special purposes. This leaves a net general operating reserve of \$6,297.46, which was invested in equipment during the fiscal year.

# REPORT ON THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

## 1946

## I. Relief

The amazing growth of the Ministers' Retirement Plan, promising new day for multiplied thousands of our Southern Baptist preachers has not led the Board to the conclusion that there is no longer a need for our relief department. Such a conclusion would be not only erroneous, but greatly disastrous, for there are other thousands where today, or will become in after years, dependent on the relief grant of this Board for even a modicum of comfort and ease.

There is now, and there shall continue to be, need for a strong relief department for many, many years. Indeed, the challenge of this hour is the need for greatly increased grants for our approximately 1,300 beneficiaries now on the relief rolls of the several states.

#### II. Annuities

In the several annuity plans of the Relief and Annuity Board there are now enrolled some 13,000 ministers and other persons employed in denominational service. There were reported 1,742 monthly beneficiarie of these plans at the close of 1945. All pastors and employed lay workers of our churches may and should avail themselves of the benefits of these contributory retirement plans.

## III. Widows' Supplemental Annuity Plan

Sufficient number of the Oklahoma members have been enlisted in this plan and it was inaugurated as of July 1, 1946. The plan has also been adopted and is in operation in five other states, namely, South Carolina, Kentucky, Missouri, Illinois, and Virginia. The Relief and Annuity Board is confident that by January 1 nearly all the states will have inaugurated this plan.

This Widows' Plan is a necessary supplement to the Ministers' Plan

as it provides for ministers' wives who become widows before their husbands have actually retired under the Ministers' Plan. Let it be remembered that a great many ministers die between the ages of 30 and 65; something like 40 out of 100 do not live to be 65. For the amount of money involved, the benefits to widows in this plan are very excellent and surpass those of any benefits that can be had from any other source in the world for a like cost. The State Board of Oklahoma will pay half of the cost of this supplemental plan while the minister pays the other half. The churches are not called upon for any additional sum.

By all means, let every eligible minister, that is, those who are members of the Ministers' Retirement Plan and have living wives, contact Dr. Andrew Potter at Oklahoma City and place his application. Do not delay, for delay may be disastrous,

professional services he gave our children over such a long period of time.

#### Gentlemen:

We have examined the balance sheet of the "Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma," Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, including only the funds as hereinafter defined, as of December 31, 1946, and the statements of capital and of income and expenses for the year then ended, have reviewed the system of internal control and the accounting procedures of the organization and, without making a detailed audit of the transactions, have examined or tested accounting records of the organization and other supporting evidence by methods and to the extent we deemed appropriate. Our examination was made in accordance with the generally accepted auditing standards applicable in the circumstances and included all procedures which we considered necessary.

No provision was made for depreciation of the fixed assets.

#### COMMENTS

# Organization

The "Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, without authorized capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed on or about May 1917, for a term of twenty years, and its amended Articles of Incorporation providing for an organization in perpetuity were placed on record March 6, 1928. Its purpose is to foster Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various members of the denominations in accordance with the instructions of such contributors.

Since November 1, 1935 the convention has had direct supervision of the Baptist Orphans' Home, located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The "Baptist Orphans' Home" was organized in March 1904 for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital. Assets, liabilities, income and expenses of the Baptist Orphans' Home are treated as a separate "Fund," both on the convention books and in this report.

#### Cash

The account with The First National Bank and Trust Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, amounting to \$592,201.01 was reconciled and verified by certification obtained from the depository. This cash is applicable to the various funds as shown in the balance sheet, Exhibit "A." All recorded receipts were traced to deposits in the bank. The daily recapitulations of cash received were compared with their recording in the cash book, and tests were made of the individual receipts from which the recapitulations were prepared. Paid checks were compared with the record of checks drawn and the signatures and endorsements were scrutinized.

It is estimated by Ellis, Nicholson, and Cramer, general contractor for the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, that an additional expenditure of \$155,000.00 will be required to complete the superintendent's home, boys' dormitory, and other buildings now being built at the Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home in Oklahoma City, and that an additional expenditure of \$225,000.00 will be required to complete the boys' dormitory now under construction at the Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

# Unexpended Balances in Designated Funds

These accounts are included as shown by the books of account without further verification by us. Their classification and the changes therein during the year are summarized in the fund capital statement (Exhibit "C").

#### **Fund Capital Statement**

A fund capital statement for the period under review is presented in Exhibit "C". The operations of the executive office are divided into nine major classifications as follows:

COLLECTING AND ACCOUNTING—Receiving contributions for the unified budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention and other designated donees.

STATE MISSIONS FUND—Subdivided into "Appropriations and Operations—Regular and Annuity (Unrestricted)" and "Property." The former includes financial transactions applicable to Oklahoma State Missions activities, whereas the latter embraces properties.

BUILDING PROGRAM — For receiving and accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a future building program of the Baptist Orphans' Home, Oklahoma Baptist University and other building projects of the convention.

BAPTIST MESSENGER FUND — Maintaining and publishing a denominational paper known as the Baptist Messenger.

BAPTIST TRAINING UNION AND SUNDAY SCHOOL FUND—Providing for Training Union and Sunday School enlargement and educational activities in the State of Oklahoma.

SACRED MUSIC AND BAPTIST STUDENT UNION—This department was added in 1946 to foster better music in the churches and to assist in the coordination of Baptist work in the Baptist Student Union centers at the various state educational institutions.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY FUND—Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of "Assembly" property.

MINISTERS', EMPLOYES' AND WIDOWS' RETIREMENT, RELIEF AND ANNUITY PLANS—For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers, missionaries, churches and organizations throughout Oklahoma participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and shared in by the convention.

BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME FUND—Embracing all transactions pertaining to enlargement and maintenance of the children's home and care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, subdivided into the following:

### The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

On October 31, 1946 the Secretary of State of the State of Oklahoma issued a charter to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, a nonprofit corporation without capital stock. The Articles of Incorporation state that the purposes of this foundation are to receive money or property either absolutely or in trust; to enter into contracts or trust, agreements; to prosecute or defend any action in which the corporation may be involved; to borrow money and secure the same; to hold, administer, and dispose of property; to make conveyances, assignments, and contracts; and, otherwise "to promote Baptist doctrines, Evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work." On November 6, 1946, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in session at Oklahoma City, authorized and directed that all property in the nature of endowments or trust funds held by the Baptist General Convention should be transferred to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. As of December 31, 1946 the records of the Baptist General Convention did not show that these funds had been so transferred.

#### Contingent Liability

There was a lawsuit pending (cause No. 30,698) in the District Court of the United States for the Eastern District of Oklahoma, styled "Alta Jacobs Hull vs. Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, et al," arising from apparent misstatement of records in a maternity case at the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, involving alleged damages in the amount of \$100,000.00. According to confirmation letter direct to us from W. R. Wallace, attorney for the convention in this matter, the plaintiff cannot, in his opinion, sustain her main cause of action and is not entitled to any damages.

# Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma

# PREAMBLE

Desirous of cultivating and stimulating the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and young people of the churches, we, the women of Missionary Societies of the Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, adopt the following constitution:

# ARTICLE I Name

This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and shall be auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention.

# ARTICLE II Object

The object of this organization shall be to cultivate the missionary spirit, especially among the women and young people throughout the State, and to aid in the world-wide spread of the Gospel.

# ARTICLE III Membership

The constituency of this organization shall be the Missionary organizations of women and young people. Messengers to the annual meeting shall be all members of the Executive Board, all auxiliary counselors and one member from each society with one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof not to exceed ten members from any church.

# ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Young People's Secretary, a Field Worker, Chairman of Departments, and Advisory Committee who shall be named by the Nominating Committee and elected by acclamation at the Annual Meeting, and a Vice-President from each District who has been elected in her respective District.

Section 2. Executive Board. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Union and Presidents of the Associations. Eleven, including two officers, shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3. Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each District, all to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting for the succeeding year, seven constituting a quorum.

# ARTICLE V Time of Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, time and place to be designated by the Executive Board at its first meeting.

# ARTICLE VI Financial Policy

In accordance with the Preamble, our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education, training, and giving; the strength of the organization being used to help raise all apportionments for every phase of the work to which the church contributes. One-third of all the Unified Budget Funds shall be credited to the State W. M. U.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention and all salaries paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention.

# ARTICLE VII Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present and voting at any Annual Meeting provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting of the Executive Board and recommended by the Board to the annual meeting for adoption.

# By-Laws

# Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the organization and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, shall be ex-officio member of all standing committees and with the concurrence of the Executive Secretary call special meetings of the Board. She shall be the Vice-President of the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 2. Vice-Presidents. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents of the organization to assist the Executive Secretary in developing the districts, preside at their district meetings and keep in touch with Associational officers by correspondence and other ways that will further the interest of Woman's Missionary Union. In the absence of the State President one of the Vice-Presidents shall be asked to preside in her place.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual Meetings of Woman's Missionary Union, to prepare the minutes for publication and to act as Secretary of the Executive Board, presenting a condensed report of the sessions to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Executive Secretary-Treasurer. As Executive Secretary it shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith, to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local societies of the State. She shall have supervision over all departments of the

work and shall have correspondence with Baptist papers, unless other provisions shall be made for it, and shall give general direction for the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity shall permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds used all expense of the work, according to the directions of the Executive Board, keeping always an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements.

As Executive Secretary-Treasurer, she shall make reports to the Executive Board, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Baptist General Convention and Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 5. Young People's Secretary. The Young People's Secretary shall, under the direction of the Executive Secretary, have oversight of the work of all the auxiliaries, and in every way possible shall seek to enlist the young people of our churches, colleges and hospitals in missionary work. She shall make regular reports to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 6. Executive Board. The Board shall have entire management of all matters entrusted to its care, and shall have power to recommend such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma. It shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number. It shall bring to the Annual meeting any recommendation concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and production of the work which may seem expedient.

It shall hold its semi-annual meetings at the call of the President and Executive Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 7. Duties of the Advisory Committee. It shall meet four times annually at the call of the President and Executive Secretary. This committee shall have power to act for the Executive Board between sessions of the Board.

Section 8. Duties of Standing Committees. (A) Obituary Committee shall present a memorial service at the Annual Meeting. (B) Recommendation Committee shall meet two weeks prior to the semi-annual meeting to make recommendations to be presented to the Executive Board at its semi-annual meeting. (C) Scholarship Committee shall meet annually to approve application for Scholarships.

Section 9. Chairmen of Departments. It shall be the duty of these chairmen to assist the Executive Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular departments of the work by correspondence and shall make reports in writing to the Executive Board and an annual report to the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Section 10. Associational Presidents. They shall be elected at the Woman's Missionary Union quarterly rally preceding the Annual Meeting of the Association. They shall have general supervision of the work of the Association and in co-operation with the pastors they shall en-

deavor to promote the organization of women and young people in all churches, by visiting and holding Associational Meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of the work done. It shall also be their duty to arrange for and preside over the quarterly meetings of their associations.

## ARTICLE II

# Parliamentary Rules

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law, not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2. Amendments. These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulations as those governing changes in the Constitution.

# REPORT OF EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

"For we are laborers together with God; . . . ye are God's building  $1\ \text{Cor.}\ 3:9.$ 

The annual report of Oklahoma W. M. U. heartens each of us who, viewing the smallness of our own contribution, rejoice as we contemplate the combined accomplishments of all of us who labor together with God.

Like laborers on a huge construction project, some have been excavators clearing out detrimental hindrances through love and prayers. Some have originated new tasks and in so doing, have laid firm foundations. Some have faithfully performed the small, seemingly insignificant duties—but like a brick mason the total of their efforts and those of others erects the impressive building. Others have come along to bring climactic results to well-established endeavors and, like those who lay the protective shingles for the roof, they have helped to complete the well-established, useful building dedicated to the work of God.

The reporting on the part of associational presidents was excellent in 1946. Every quarter, every associational president reported. In four associations every society reported each quarter. These associations are: Banner, Beckham, Caddo and Chickasaw.

There are 661 societies and 1,254 auxiliaries on our mailing list. The W. M. S. membership is 15,883. The 19,563 auxiliary members make a total of W. M. U. enrollment of 35,446.

There were 2,629 W. M. S. mission study classes and a grand total of 3,189 classes for W. M. U. A total of 10,841 mission study awards was granted. To increase our knowledge of missions, members of missionary societies in Oklahoma were reading 7,244 copies of Royal Service.

Ninety-eight churches reported Full-graded unions. One-hundred forty-four organizations were A-1. Of this number 54 were societies.

Our reports listed 9,330 women engaged in Directed Community Missions.

There was a heartening increase in reported tithers in 1946. The 1946 number of 7,721 exceeded the 1945 report by 2,576. This is a 50% increase.

#### REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SECRETARY

"Christ has no hands but our hands to do His work today, He has no feet but our feet to lead men in His way, He has no tongues but our tongues to tell men how He died, He has no help but our help to lead them to His side."

So upon each of us rests the responsibility of carrying the Gospel of Christ to all the earth. As we think of responsibilities we are reminded of the patient counselors and workers who have accepted the

God-given privilege and responsibility of leading young people. We are also reminded of the faithful wise Woman's Missionary Societies who are fostering these auxiliaries of W. M. U. According to reports received in the W. M. U. office, we have, during 1946, organized 238 new auxiliaries. There were 144 organizations which reached the A-1 Standard of Excellence. The total number of organizations in the state are:

Sunbeam Bands—285 Royal Ambassadors—277 Girls' Auxiliary—511 Young Woman's Auxiliary—181

One-hundred-eight Young People's leaders and counselors have had the Leaders' Correspondence Course. We have issued 1,047 mission study seals to the Sunbeams, 3,684 to the GAs, 794 to RAs, and 525 to YWAs, making a total of 6,050 mission books studied by our Young People.

Nine associations reported mission study camps. There were also two state camps, one for GAs and one for RAs held at Falls Creek. The attendance at all camps was about 2,000. For these camps there were: 1,007 mission study awards, 76 conversions, 119 volunteers and a total relief offering of \$415.19.

Missionaries who served: Miss Jaxie Short, Dr. Jeanette Beall, Miss Pearl Johnson, Miss Helen McCulloch, Rev. Joe Townsend and Emily Goon—China; Dr. W. W. Enete and Sammy, Rev. H. C. Lacerda of Brazil; Rev. E. O. Mills, Japan; Roy Starmer, Rumania; Ruby Howse of Chile.

Home Missionaries serving the youth of Oklahoma were: Martha Thomas Ellis, Mrs. A. Worthington, V. J. Zunigha, Lewis Hancock, Victor Kaneubbe and Dorothy Armentrout.

Twenty-nine young women from Oklahoma attended Y. W. A. week at Ridgecrest; here they gave \$325.00 to the relief offering. Five young men, accompanied by David Owery who served Oklahoma during the summer as R. A. leader, attended the Young Men's Mission Conference at Ridgecrest. All six of these boys are mission volunteers.

During the year under the leadership of the counselors and other leaders, our magazine subscriptions have grown until at the end of the year, records show: 2,839 World Comrades (a gain of 260 over last year), 827 Window of YWA (a gain of 96) and 1,006 Ambassador Life (This magazine started with the June issue).

Under the faithful fostering of the Woman's Missionary Societies in the college towns, we have Ann Hasseltine Y. W. A.'s in the following towns: Ada, Alva, Chickasha, Edmond, Norman, Shawnee, Tahlequah, Stillwater, Weatherford and Wilburton, and Grace McBride Y. W. A.'s in Muskogee and Tulsa.

As this year draws to a close, we look with a degree of satisfaction upon the work which has been done, but let us not tarry too long looking at the things of the past but let us look at our task of next year and answer as did Paul: "I do not count myself to have apprehended, but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Phil. 3:13-14.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

During the past year much has been said and written about the achievements of the past century but we must not rest on the laurels of the past. Let us remember that the key of yesterday unlocks the door of tomorrow and this is the tomorrow we dreamed of yesterday. "Our lives are songs," so wrote the poet, "God writes the words but we must write the music." Are we setting the words to a minor strain or are we making a paean of gladness? As we have entered this new century of progress your Executive Board has endeavored to set the words to a glad triumphant measure that His kingdom may go forward.

On the morning of January 10th the Executive Board met in the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a day of conferences conducted by the departmental chairmen.

On the following day, January 11th, the Board convened in the Assembly Room of the Baptist Building for a regular business session. It was our privilege to have presented to us Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Mc-Murray who were appointees of the Foreign Mission Board to Uruguay.

After routine business a recommendation from the Advisory Committee, which had met on January 4th, was presented, recommending that Mrs. Bill V. Carden be elected executive secretary-treasurer of Oklahoma W.M.U. On motion by Mrs. T. W. Stevens it was voted to adopt this recommendation and Mrs. Carden was unanimously elected.

Mrs. Stevens also moved that the matter of a young people's secretary be left in the hands of the president, the executive secretary and the Advisory Committee. Motion carried.

The president presented a tentative budget for the year and on motion by Mrs. J. C. Hering it was voted to approve a tentative budget of \$15,000.00 and ask the executive secretary to confer with Dr. Potter in regard to the needs of this department.

Mrs. Stevens moved that the former executive secretary, Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, be made a life member of the Executive Board and the motion carried.

On March 19th the Advisory Committee met in the office of the executive secretary.

Mrs. C. B. Means moved that we elect Miss Vivian Cochran young people's secretary and the motion carried.

Mrs. J. W. Storer moved that in the month of June, which is Margaret Fund month, we recognize Mrs. D. H. Bell's nineteen years of service as Margaret Fund chairman. The motion carried.

Since the Margaret Fund chairman, Mrs. A. Hope Owen, had moved from the state, on motion by Mrs. R. A. Baldry it was voted to elect Mrs. John W. Raley to fill this vacancy.

Mrs. D. D. Phelps was elected to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. J. Howard Williams on the Advisory Committee.

It was voted to pay the expenses of the Chairmen of Departments to the January and the September Board meetings.

It was also voted to pay the expenses of the Advisory Committee to the Board meetings and any other necessary meetings of the committee.

Mrs. Means moved that we approve an honorarium of \$5.00 per day for the workers sent out from the state office. Motion carried.

On motion by Mrs. George McMillan it was voted to discontinue the printing of books for sale.

On June 7th the Advisory Committee met again in the office of the executive secretary.

A request having come from Mr. A. Worthington, missionary, for a car to use in his missionary work, Mrs. R. A. Baldry moved that we give Mr. Worthington \$500.00 to be applied on a new car, this amount to be paid at the time of the purchase of the new car. Motion carried.

Mrs. J. H. Wells moved that the old scholarship accounts be closed by January 1st, 1948. Motion carried.

Mrs. Carden read a letter from Miss Mallory, executive secretary of Southwide W.M.U., suggesting that we adopt as a goal one-third of the amount set by our State Convention for the World Relief and Rehabilitation Fund. Mrs. D. D. Phelps moved that we accept one-third of the State Convention goal and strive to reach it. Motion carried.

Mrs. Carden suggested that we invite Mrs. Una Roberts Lawrence, Southwide Mission Study Chairman, to speak for us at our January Board meeting and that we ask the mission study chairmen of the state to be present. There was general approval of this plan and it was voted to invite Mrs. Lawrence to come at this time.

The R. A. work for the summer was discussed and Mrs. J. W. Fowler moved that we employ David Owery for summer R. A. work at a salary of \$25.00 per week and expenses. Motion carried.

On July 30th a meeting of the Advisory Committee was held in the executive secretary's office.

After discussing the scholarship plan it was voted that the same plan that we have for scholarships to the W.M.U. Training School at Louisville prevail for the Southwestern Training School at Ft. Worth.

The matter of vacations for the stenographer and the young people's secretary was presented and Mrs. Fowler moved that we grant vacations of two weeks each with pay to these workers. Motion carried.

It was voted to include in the apportionments for the year 1947 our gifts to the building funds of the Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Ft. Worth, Tex. and the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary at New Orleans, La.

The Executive Board met in regular session in the Assembly Room of the Baptist Building on September 9th.

Regular reports were presented and adopted.

Mrs. Raley reported that while we have only one Margaret Fund student in O.B.U., Miss Lois Richardson, there are two other children of missionaries enrolled. Mrs. Stevens moved that we extend the courtesies usually accorded to Margaret Fund students to Thelma Richardson Notley and Eugene Craighead. Motion carried.

The resignation of Mrs. D. D. Phelps as a member of the Advisory Committee was presented and it was voted to accept her resignation.

A request from Dr. Raley for carpeting for the Memorial Dormitory at Shawnee was presented and a motion was made that a committee be appointed to investigate this matter and report its findings at the November meeting. Motion carried.

The request having come from Mrs. Brockway for Oklahoma W.M.U. to help build a dormitory at Langston University the president had appointed a committee composed of Mrs. W. A. Carleton, Mrs. J. E. Kirk and Mrs. Clyde Hilsheimer to investigate this matter. Mrs. Carleton, chairman, brought the following recommendation:

"That we give \$10,000.00 for a dormitory at Langston, this \$10,000.00 to be given over a period of 5 years in the amount of \$2,000.00 per year. This \$2,000.00 per year to be added to our Annie Armstrong offering in March and designated for this negro work; the money to be given when they are definitely ready to build." This recommendation was unanimously adopted.

A motion was made and carried that a committee be appointed to study and bring in a report on the revision of our constitution.

On motion by Mrs. Stevens the recommendation presented by Mrs. Hayden Morton was referred to the committee appointed to revise the constitution.

Mrs. Carleton made a motion that a request be made to the Baptist General Convention for a \$600.00 increase in our budget to provide for a \$25.00 per month increase in the salaries of Mrs. Carden and Miss Keys. Motion carried.

On Monday morning, November 4th, there was a meeting of the Executive Board in the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City.

At this time Mrs. J. D. McGovern, chairman of the committee on carpeting for the Memorial Dormitory at O.B.U., brought a report of this committee which is composed of Mrs. McGovern, Mrs. J. H. Wells, and Mrs. John W. Raley. Mrs. E. R. Jacks moved that the amount of money necessary to purchase carpeting for the Dormitory be apportioned to the associations who will in turn apportion the societies. Motion carried.

The president appointed the following committee to work on the revision of the constitution:

Mrs. C. A. Richards, Mrs. J. W. Storer and Mrs. R. Y. Bandy.

Mrs. Carden presented a plea for help from Dr. W. T. Watts who is in charge of negro center work in Oklahoma City and Mrs. A. Dayton moved that we take care of his office rent and telephone. Mrs. Carden stated that this would be an expenditure of around \$400.00 per year. Motion carried.

The needs of our Oklahoma missionary to Chile, Miss Ruby Howse, were discussed and on motion by Mrs. T. W. Stevens it was voted to send a letter to the associations at the discretion of the executive secretary, outlining the needs of this missionary.

Beginning the first of the year the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention is presenting a series of programs for children over the network. Mrs. J. C. Hering moved that this program, which will cost \$185.00, be put on the air on five stations for three months. Motion carried.

Mrs. Carden presented an appeal from the Long Perry Church in the Cherokee Association and Mrs. J. N. McKeel moved that we send this church \$50.00 to help on their building. Motion carried.

Since point No. 3 on the Standard of Excellence reads: "Gifts according to plan outlined by state W.M.U." on motion by Mrs. J. C. Hering it was voted to explain this point by stating the policy of our state which is "Two-thirds of the membership of the W.M.S. contributing through their church to the Unified Budget."

#### REPORT OF MARGARET FUND CHAIRMAN

A patch of red geraniums in a weed-grown field is the only indication that people ever lived on the spot that was once the village of Lidice. The flowers survived fire, explosion, and the industrious levelling operations of Nazi workmen. Even the course of the brook was changed to erase all traces of village life. The geraniums were probably once carefully tended by some woman, who later suffered the indignities of rough Nazi hands as she was shoved into a truck for the weary journey to the concentration camp.

As the bright red flowers have bloomed again—surviving fire and desolation—so Christian missions emerge triumphantly through the aftermath of global war. Centuries of hate and greed are only the backdrop for a brighter and more glorious future. Since Christianity counts only as it is lived and shared, "Missions for Moderns" is designed to answer that age-old plaintive cry, "Come over and help us!"

Thus; the tremendous job of mission rehabilitation as we reestablish our Christian trading posts.

And thus: We move out with our Christian obsession and equipment into a militant expeditionary force—not particularly to enrich the world's culture, but to change the world's life.

OBU is possessed of an abiding missionary purpose—our graduates are all over the world today—some in remote sections, others in the most cosmopolitan areas. Indeed, we are very proud for you to know that the largest percentage of graduates serving now is from our campus. Certainly, it is encouraging, and to a degree, most prophetic—that we have the largest group of mission volunteers in our history.

Two generations have been blessed by the program and policies of the Margaret Fund, whereby, educational scholarships are extended to the children of our missionaries. It has developed through the years in scope and influence—a beloved evidence of our appreciation and concern for our Christian ambassadors.

But because we are very young at OBU, we are just now enjoying the second generation of our students. It is my pleasure to present to you today:

Lois Richardson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Spurgeon Richardson, who went to Africa to serve twenty years ago.

Charlotte Arpaio, daughter of the late Mr. Arpaio and Mrs. Arpaio, home missionaries.

Eugene Craighead, son of Dr. and Mrs. W. E. Craighead, who served 25 years in Bessarabia, (Roumania).

Thelma Richardson Notley, another daughter of the Spurgeon Richardson's and a bride of last summer, to whom we extend courtesies and remembrances, although she is not a Margaret Fund student this year.

#### REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION TRAINING SCHOOL

As has been the case for several years the Woman's Missionary Union Training School is now filled to overflowing with 134 boarding students and 76 day students.

Your trustee attended the annual board meeting at the school in the early spring and again realized the need for sending our young women to the school for definite missionary training, that we may better meet the demands now made on us for a larger number of trained leaders. At this time it was decided for the present to admit no students for the certificate course.

Sixty-six were graduated last May and at the meeting of the Foreign Mission Board in April sixteen students of the school were appointed as missionaries.

Oklahoma had one graduate, Miss Louise Tadlock of Tahlequah, who a month after graduation married Rev. Luther Copeland of the Seminary. Both are volunteers for the foreign field and hope to go out as soon as he finishes work leading to his doctorate degree in the coming spring.

Two years ago Margaret Foltz Schmidt of Fort Gibson and her husband, Rev. K. J. Schmidt, were appointed by the Foreign Mission Board as missionaries to Brazil. At that time new workers were not going into Brazil. However, last January they sailed with their little daughter and are now representing us in the South Brazil Mission at Rio de Janeiro.

We are happy to have Miss Ruby G. Howse of Chile and Mrs. Stephen Jackson of Brazil with us in this Annual Meeting. Both of these missionaries are graduates of the Training School. Miss Howse will return to Chile about January 15th.

We give thanks for these fine young women from our state who one by one are going "into all the world."

We have had this fall only one student at the school, Miss Maxine Campbell. In recent days because of a tragedy in her home she has returned to her home in Guthrie. However, she hopes to re-enter the Training School and complete her course later.

In January 1947 we enter the Ruby Anniversary year of the Training School. I bespeak your prayers that we will with God's help be able to send out the largest number of missionaries in the history of the school to work in bringing in His Kingdom.

#### REPORT OF SOUTHWESTERN TRAINING SCHOOL

The number of young women resident members of Southwestern Training School is 120. They come from fifteen states and Brazil. Oklahoma leads all other states save Texas in the number of girls enrolled which is 14. There are 21 young women who are volunteers for foreign missions. Five of these are from Oklahoma. Lorene Carter of Tecumseh and Gracia Bailey of Oklahoma City, both graduates of O.B.U., look forward to receiving their appointments from the Foreign Mission Board in the spring. Their hearts turn to South America. The other three of the Mission volunteers are just beginning their Seminary preparation. They are Myrtle Capps of Randlett, Opal Barker of Oklahoma City and Lillie Ragsdale.

Judy Whenry of El Reno is an ex-wave and one of nine volunteers for Home Missions. Four other young women will complete their Seminary work in 1947: Eugenia Davie of Wilson, a graduate of East Central Normal, is now working with College Ave. Baptist Church of Ft. Worth while completing her work. Isma Johnson of Duncan, finishing in January, wants to do Church secretarial work. Catherine Simmons of Erick, a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University of Abilene, Tex., also finishes in January and will enter some field of religious education. Josephine Holdeman of Lawton was a student of Cameron College. Beth Prim, former reporter on the staff of the Daily Oklahoman and graduate of Oklahoma University, plans to enter the field of religious journalism. Imogene Fry of Davis is enrolled in a combination course of religious education and sacred music. Vera Beth Hallock of Norman, graduate of Okla. University, is enrolled in a course leading to Master of Religious Education degree. Claudia Thompson of Wilson is graduate of and former Baptist Student Secretary at Highland University, Las Vegas, N. Mex.

Three of Southwestern graduates of last year are working in Oklahoma. Miss Vivian Cochran is W.M.U. young people's secretary; Estell Moody is at present with Good Will Center; Miss Dorothy Grubbs worked with our children at the Baptist Home until September when she entered A. & M. College for further study. She is a volunteer for Foreign Missions. In Southwestern this year there are 58 scholarship girls. The total enrollment from Oklahoma this year is 113, including ministers, their wives and the young women in the Training School.

Of course there will be exceptions to this rule for none can say when sudden illness or death may come. Many special calls will come for help. We will not limit to only one day a month our efforts to speak to lost souls but will ever be alert to the fact that the stranger we meet may be lost and may never cross our path again. The usual projects however, such as hospital visitation; jail work; tract distribution; cottage prayer meetings; mission Bible classes; visits to strangers, new members, shut-ins, the sick, and above all the unsaved should be standing engagements and as such can be effectively done on the society's Community Missions Day each month.

Let us ever be mindful that the heart of community missions is soul winning and the heart of soul winning is prayer and visitation. It is becoming more and more difficult to win the lost to Christ because they will not attend our church services. If we win them it must be through personal contact. Each visit should be a definite object of prayer. In our own strength we can do many helpful things but we are promised power to do greater things. Let us say with the Psalmist: "I will go in the strength of the Lord. I will make mention of Thy righteousness, even of Thine only."

As we approach the end of the first year in our second century of progress we are grateful for the manifold blessings from above. Our efforts in the past have not been in vain—yet this is a day of hunger, want, and helplessness. Countless thousands are dying for a "little bit of love." We who have not seen cannot imagine the suffering of the world. Is the world my affair? We Christians need to fully realize that only in proportion as we are willing to hear the burden of the world will we be able to solve our own problems.

The progress of science has made the world a neighborhood; only Christianity can make it a brotherhood. "The brotherhood of man depends upon the fatherhood of God." The love of Christ in human hearts is the only possible means to a world brotherhood.

At the close of World War I, we heard "Christ or Chaos." Which

It is indeed significant that many in authority in world affairs are calling for a deeper spirituality on the part of Christians. The Foreign Mission Board is calling for one thousand missionaries by 1950 as a minimum need. "Who Will go?" Unless we give more preeminence in our thinking and acting to missions we will not answer this call.

What can we do? We can enlarge our ranks and enlist more women and young people in the missionary branch of the church. Let no one say, "No one hath tried to enlist me." We can so teach, so train, and so plan for our young people that they can hear the call of God. We who stay must furnish the impetus and the support for those who go.

We can study and learn to do well. Our mission study department offers a glorious opportunity to all ages to be informed on each phase of our work. We have the study class for group work; the reading circle for individual reading of missionary books; and Missionary Round Tables for broader missionary reading.

Our reports show that more women and young people have been studying this year than last. However, many have had no part in definite, systematic mission study. We can never be really missionary until more of our people catch the true missionary spirit. Why not be enthusiastic about this phase of work? "Enthusiasm is a contagion that laughs at quarantine and inoculates all who come in contact with it." The World in Books is full of books and materials that will thrill our hearts.

Missionary Round Tables offer splendid opportunity for a better understanding of World conditions. The book lists are in the Baptist Book Store. We have twenty-one such groups reported.

All our mission study to be worth while must result in missionary activity. Every class should awaken the missionary potentialities of each soul. The study should lead each member to go in prayer, to every conceivable field of endeavor and to give the over and above gift. Our classes must so inform us that we thru knowledge and understanding free ourselves and the world from the confines of spiritual ignorance. We need classes that prod the mind into alertness so that conditions and needs are no longer a fable but a haunting reality.

If our local societies will have real honest-to-goodness mission study we will see young men and women surrender to definite Christian service and say "Here am I, send me." No dedicated lives means no missionary zeal. No missionary zeal means no love for Christ. No love for Christ means we are lost in sin. May we in 1947 with all our new promotional aids—Major on truly missionary studies in each organization.

"Study to know the grace our Lord bestowed on thee, Study to know the love He had for you and me. Study to lift your soul above the din of things Study to hear the voice which thru the ages rings. Study to know the price He paid upon the tree Study to know His plan that spans eternity. Study that thou a workman unashamed may be Study to share the word of truth entrusted to thee."

#### REPORT OF STEWARDSHIP CHAIRMAN

At a time like this when so many doors are open to receive the Messengers of the Gospel what more fitting question could be asked than the one used as the theme for this convention program. "Who will go?" The Master said as he sent the Seventy out, "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth laborers into his harvest." May we as christians lift up our eyes and look on the fields and see that they are today ripe unto the harvest; then seeing may we be conscious of our individual responsibility in having a part in its reaping.

The wonderful triumphs of the Gospel have encouraged and inspired us, but the marvelous opportunities of the present for still greater achievements should inspire us to a new consecration to God's worldwork. We might well be reminded of the question of old, "How shall they hear without a preacher, and how shall they preach except they be sent?" The answer is, faithful stewardship. Certainly missions wait on stewardship. A revival of stewardship is the need of the hour. That revival can come only as the principles of christian stewardship are thoroughly understood and God's people put them in practice in their every day lives.

This year and the coming year we are emphasizing stewardship, particularly in tithes and offerings, endeavoring to enlist a million tithers in the Southland. Woman's Missionary Union is undertaking as their part of that goal one third of a million. If we achieve in that wonderful undertaking, Christian women, young and old, rich and poor, must devote themselves to an earnest and faithful consideration of stewardship. I am afraid God's people generally do not realize that they are stewards. Many live as though they were owners instead of trustees. There is a tremendous need these days to teach and study stewardship. Many Christians do not know what the Word of God teaches concerning this vital subject. Where the people do not know the truth they can not put it in practice.

The churches today need not only to be reminded, but impressed with the fact of God's ownership. He not only owns the "earth and the

fullness thereof," but they that dwell therein. "Ye are not your own, ye are bought with a price." God requires that we be faithful in all phases of our christian lives. We are not simply stewards of money, we are stewards of the Gospel. Then being entrusted with the Gospel, surely we must be faithful in the stewardship of our time, talents, personality and material possessions. Women of Oklahoma, are we as conscious of our stewardship to God as we need be? According to the reports received by your state stewardship chairman, we are not as faithful in our tithes and offerings as we should be. Surely more women and young people in our State tithe than the figures of this report show. May this coming year be one in which Christian stewardship will be studied, preached, taught, practiced, emphasized, magnified and glorified; not merely for the sake of reaching our goal of 13,121 tithers, but that the missionary need of the hour be supplied in a way which is pleasing to Him who said "Ye are my witnesses," "Go ye . . . . and make disciples of all nations."

### REPORT OF WHITE CROSS CHAIRMAN

Since there is no southwide committee for White Cross the states who are continuing this work do it according to state plans. Therefore, the chairman in the state is responsible for the promotion of it. After my election as White Cross Chairman last November I realized the need of information and data so a letter was written to both hospitals, viz. Miami and Muskogee, asking for their needs. Letters were also written to Dr. George Green, medical missionary emeritus, having served many years in Africa, and to Dr. J. H. Humphrey, medical missionary to China at present in this country. The response was very fine. The information secured was compiled, mimeographed, and was soon on its way to the six hundred and forty-one societies in the state. A new playlet was also included.

The report of our work is sent from the chairman in the local society to the Associational president and she in turn reports to head-quarters. The cash is sent to headquarters and linens and supplies are sent direct to the Miami and Muskogee hospitals. At the end of the year \$1,500.00 is sent from headquarters to the hospital at Ogbomosho, Nigeria, Africa and the remainder of the cash is placed in the accumulating fund for Dr. Humphrey until such time as he can return to China.

At the September State Board meeting a recommendation was approved to raise the apportionment for White Cross to \$5,000.00 for 1947. I trust that in the coming year the societies will continue the fine work they have been doing in 1946.



#### ORGANIZATION

The "Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma" was incorporated on April 9, 1927 under the laws of the State of Oklahoma without authorized capital stock. Its chief purpose is to foster religious and mission activities, particularly among the members of the Baptist churches of Oklahoma.
