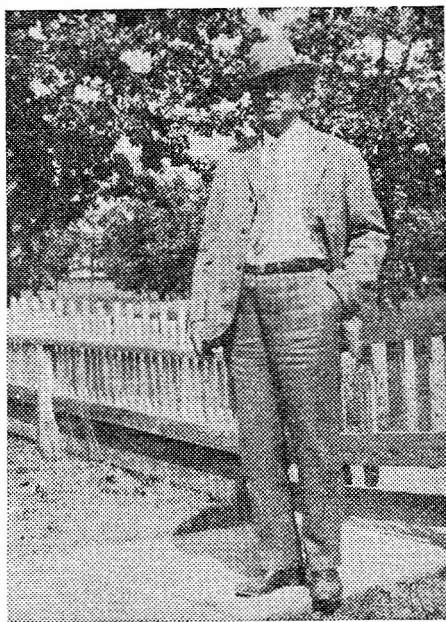

Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

Article I—Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Article II—Constituency

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers appointed by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

Article III—Object

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers of this convention shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

Article V—Boards, Trustees and Committees

Section 1. This convention shall have power to appoint such Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these Boards, Trustees and Standing Committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Article VI—Board of Directors

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors appointed by this convention through which this convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the convention and thirty-two (32) other members who shall be chosen by the convention, at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a Corresponding Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board.

Section 4. This board shall appoint all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each.

Article VII—Proceedings

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

Article VIII—Annual Meetings

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Article IX—Special Funds

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

Article X—Change of Constitution

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of Directors shall be thirty-four (34).

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Eight (8) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one year.

Section 3. The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Board of Directors as herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.

Section 5. The Directors shall hold quarterly meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall by proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held as above provided.

Section 7. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

- A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.
- Two Vice-presidents, selected by the Board.
- A Recording Secretary elected by the Convention.
- An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.
- A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.
- A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All Officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Vice-president, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make quarterly reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose. He shall attest with the President all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws, will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with

the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done only in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 5. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until same has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State paper at least six months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year.

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the Convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request comes to the Convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following Convention a year hence.

2. Vice-President Harold K. Graves called the Convention to order, calling attention to the fact that it was the 42nd annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and the 65th annual meeting of the Baptists organized at Tahlequah, Indian Territory, June 1, 1883.

3. Dr. J. W. Storer called attention to the fact that our Constitution and By-Laws makes no provision for 1st and 2nd Vice Presidents and proper succession. He made motion that Dr. Harold K. Graves be elected to serve as president of the Convention for the unexpired term of the late President R. C. Howard. Motion carried and Dr. Graves was elected president to serve until Thursday's election.

4. Dr. J. W. Storer served notice that he would present proper resolution at this session of the Convention to establish succession of leadership of the Convention in case of death or removal from the state, of the president of the Convention.

5. Music Director, Ira C. Prosser, led the congregation in singing "At the Cross." "Work for the Night Is Coming" was presented as the theme song of the convention.

6. The Glee Club of Oklahoma Baptist University, under the direction of Dean Angel, furnished special music.

7. Vice President George C. Boston, read the Scripture portions which had been selected and used daily in the W. M. U. convention.

8. Dr. W. O. Carver, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, led in the devotional service, reading from John 4:20-24—Rom. 11:33-36. Worship was the theme of his message.

9. President Graves led in prayer.

10. President appointed committee on credentials to report at 9:30 on Tuesday: J. A. Pennington, C. E. Hendricks, Ernest Hitt.

11. Rev. Earl Stark presented the Report on Foreign Missions and moved its adoption. Motion carried for its adoption.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, in its 102nd year, faces the most significant opportunities of its history. Appalling world needs, material and spiritual, constitute a tremendous challenge to Southern Baptists.

In the order of occupation, Southern Baptists have entered China, Nigeria, Italy, Mexico, Brazil, Japan, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile, Palestine-Syria, Spain, Romania, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Manchuria, Hawaii, Colombia, Paraguay, and, early this year, the Gold Coast, West Africa. They have also arranged to enter Guatemala and Honduras, which for the time will be regarded as part of our Mexico work, directed by national Baptist leaders.

The Foreign Mission Board has already designated the Hadhramaut in South Arabia as a field to be occupied when a medical missionary couple can be secured. There are vast possibilities in that area, especially in the field of medical missions.

We have 624 missionaries in active service. Of this number 56 were appointed at the April semi-annual meeting of the Board and two more in May. Sixty missionaries were appointed last year. Even with these additional recruits, we have only one foreign missionary to approximately 10,000 Southern Baptists.

An encouraging feature of missionary effort is the development of national leadership in practically all mission fields. Messages have been received in recent weeks concerning bountiful evangelistic harvests. In Romania, for instance, hundreds are confessing Christ and following Him in baptism and Baptists in that land have more freedom in worship and in propagating their faith than was ever accorded them before the recognition of Baptists as a historic cult.

From Spain, Missionary John Hughey writes that evangelical Christians are manifesting unusual interest and enthusiasm. From all of our mission fields come gratifying reports of evangelistic zeal, although our comrades in service in those lands are beset on every side by adversaries. Within recent days the way has been opened for the representatives of our Board to re-enter Japan.

The appropriations of the Foreign Board for current missionary work this year total \$2,276,000, an increase of approximately \$600,000 over last year. This increase was due largely to inflation in most areas of the Board's work. We must not overlook the fact, too, that with a net increase of approximately 62 missionaries, long-range provision must be made not only for their salaries year by year, but for hospitals and equipment, training schools, and missionary residences.

We your committee therefore recommend:

Because of the wide spread need for both material and spiritual help throughout the world, that every Baptist Church in Oklahoma give hearty support to the One Million Tithers' campaign and to the One Million Prayer Band program, that we might see a definite relief given to our Foreign Mission board

in their many responsibilities and to those who stand in such great need in all of our mission fields for help in this trying hour.

Adjournment followed these messages in song.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

It is a joy to note that Baptists while denouncing impure and anti-Christian literature have not been guilty of a policy of mere negation or denunciation. The uprooting of tares in order that the fields may be left barren is not the Master's way of overcoming evil, nor is it a workable plan in any field.

Wisely then, our great denomination has set itself to the task of not only opposing evil publications but also of providing literature which shall uphold and interpret the Word of God in terms of every day living and in the light of present world needs. Mindful of the power of the printed page, an unusual effort is being made to produce and circulate wholesome, helpful reading matter for all age groups.

Our Sunday School, Training Union, W. M. U. and Brotherhood publications have proved their worth and occupy first place in their respective fields. Our missionary periodicals are a valuable aid in bringing to our people the problems and needs of our mission fields. The Broadman Press is putting into print some of the great Christian literature of our day and our bookstores are making available to our people the very best in the world of religious books. The promotion of church libraries has made much of this literature accessible to all of the membership of a great number of our churches.

In Oklahoma we are fortunate to have as our state paper one of the leading Baptist publications of the entire South. The Baptist Messenger passes every test of what a Baptist periodical should be from a doctrinal, literary and practical viewpoint. Our efficient and capable editor, Albert McClellan, is being rapidly recognized as an outstanding Christian journalist. Under his capable leadership the circulation has increased to 41,458. Earnest effort should be made to place the Messenger in the budget of each church.

We call on Oklahoma Baptists to make a greater use of tracts, books and periodicals to overcome evil and "publish glad tidings" in a world where such deep need abounds.

HOSPITALS

Our hospital work is one to which little thought is given by most of us until we are sick, or our loved ones are sick and need somewhere to go to find help. But of course, if we are to have such a place to go when we are sick we need to make provision for it while we are well.

We believe that this method of spreading the gospel, and reaching those who are spiritually sick is definitely included in God's program. Jesus said to His disciples in Luke 9:2 "to preach the kingdom of God, and to heal the sick." Not many better opportunities are ever afforded to bring the message of the Lord to a soul than in our hospitals. This is not only true of the patient but many times the entire family. I recall one experience in a hospital as we visited the patient we also had the pleasure of reaching the father, three brothers and three sisters.

Surely, Baptists cannot afford to turn all of our hospital work over to other people. I know that we say many times that some other denominations can do it much cheaper than Baptists, but Baptists can make their hospitals self-supporting and at the same time prove a blessing not only to Baptists but also to others as well.

There is another phase of our hospital work, if it is properly carried on, that many times we forget. Just as we train preachers, missionaries, educational directors, music directors, etc., in our colleges and seminaries, we also train nurses in our hospital work. We must recognize the fact that if we are to operate our hospitals successfully we must train our nurses.

In Oklahoma we have two hospitals, one at Miami and one at Muskogee.

In each of these hospitals we have made some very splendid improvements in a material way, such as remodeling and putting in new equipment.

Both hospitals have reported a very good year financially and the Miami hospital has admitted 1,553 patients up to and includ-

ing the month of September. The Muskogee hospital has admitted 1,807 up to and including the month of August.

Instead of getting out of the hospital business let us do more about it. Let us plan to do, in training for our nurses, what we are trying to do for all the rest of our workers.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME

1. The number of applications for admission of children into the Home has shown a continual increase since the close of the war. A large number of needy and dependent children must be provided for by our Home.

2. The construction program has reached the end of the present designated money. A boys' cottage, a preschool children's building combined with an infirmary, superintendent's home, and a commissary building have been completed, besides the purchase of additional land at the dairy farm.

3. We need six more cottage units, a laundry building, and a shop-garage building.

4. The Charles Frederick Wheeling estate was executed and bonds worth about \$10,000 were turned to the Home. Several more wills were signed this year. We offer to bring free legal counsel anywhere in the state for the making of wills. Moneys received from this source will go into the building fund.

5. A full-time registered nurse is now employed, and Dr. Elmer Ridgeway, Jr., is the family physician. Our children are well cared for in health or in sickness.

6. Many fine contributions have been made in grain, hay, lumber, food materials, livestock, etc.

7. Three fine boys graduated from high school. Two girls are attending college, one boy attending Southern College of Optometry, and another received his law degree.

8. Increased prices and an increased number of children make it imperative that our people respond liberally to the special offerings of the Home.

9. Our Baptist Churches are very responsive and co-operative to our Field Secretary, Wade B. East. He plans to contact each church annually for a food offering, which may be food or cash for food.

10. The capacity of the Home is now 200. Each child receives individual attention, and experiences normal growth physically, mentally, and spiritually.

The educational program in our churches in Oklahoma is most encouraging. Constant progress has been made every month since the close of the war. It is with thanksgiving to God and a deep sense of gratitude to Him that we make the following report:

The progress Oklahoma Baptists have made in Training Union work can be seen only by comparison with other Southern Baptist states: 74% of our churches have Training Union work; Texas churches 54%; Alabama 44%; Georgia 42%; Kentucky and North Carolina 39%.

Assemblies

Falls Creek—

Falls Creek, our largest assembly, had a registration of more than 11,000, which was an all-time high. The Department of Religious Education provided a faculty of 55 persons; 28 books were taught at the Sunday School Hour and 27 at the Training Union Hour.

The average attendance in classes for the first five days was more than 9,000. More than 4,100 awards were earned.

Other Assemblies—

Other assemblies held during the summer of 1947 were: The Statewide Indian Assembly at Falls Creek, Kiamichi, Northwestern, Heart of the Hills, Panhandle and Boiling Springs.

Statewide Training Meetings—

Training meetings were held for both Sunday School and Training Union associational officers. Twenty-four associations were represented at the Sunday School Officers' Meeting and twenty-eight associations answered roll call at the Training Union Officers' Meeting.

Sunday School Convention—

A State Sunday School Convention was held March 19-20 at the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, with a registration of more than 1,500. The Sunday School Board furnished leaders for all department conferences and several speakers for the inspirational periods.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

46 Porter W. Routh, State Brotherhood secretary for Oklahoma in 1946, in presenting his report to the Convention that year, made the following statement:

"Men are on the march today for Christ in Oklahoma. The greater the challenge—the larger the task projected—the faster the tempo of that march will become. Men are more serious about this business of really being Christian. If Christ is THE WAY—and as Christian men with an experience of grace—we KNOW that He is the ONLY WAY—then it is time now as in the days of old that there be in every church 'a band of men whose hearts God has touched'." (1 Sam. 10:26).

This was true in 1941; even so is this true today. We have a great task before us. Our men are ready. Let us lead them to be "doers of the Word."

I

Mr. Bryce Twitty, president of our Oklahoma Brotherhood, has tersely stated the purpose of the Brotherhood in these three statements:

1. To support the whole program of the church.
2. To sponsor an every-member tithing campaign.
3. To win the lost to Christ and to enlist the saved for service.

President Twitty made a tour of the state the first of the year, meeting the associational Brotherhood presidents. Many new Brotherhoods have been organized in the state during the year. Outstanding state events of the year were: the Evangelistic and Missionary Conferences in January and February, which were concluded with a great Laymen's Rally at night; and the State Laymen's meeting in Oklahoma City on April 29. Many of the associational presidents have had special Evangelistic meetings in their respective associations. Oklahoma County had a special Laymen's Revival August 17-24, 1947. Local Brotherhoods have successfully sponsored mission revivals through their churches in many sections of the state.

II

As an expression of their love and appreciation for Dr. Thomas P. Haskins, our state Brotherhood secretary, the men of the state raised the money to send Dr. and Mrs. Haskins to the Baptist World Alliance at Copenhagen.

Dr. Haskins has done a remarkable work in leading the men of Oklahoma in the Brotherhood work. He has expressed the purpose of the brotherhood in these statements:

"The Brotherhood is a movement for the enlistment of men in the work of their individual churches and of their denomination. It is primarily a service agency.

"The main task of the Brotherhood is to enlist every member of the church, new and old, in the financial support of the local church work and world missions, through the Unified Budget." Dr. Haskins has set forth the objective of the Brotherhood as follows:

1. A Brotherhood organization should be set up in each association, electing a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer.
2. Organize a Brotherhood in each of the churches; instruction for the organization is suggested in BROTHERHOOD OBJECTIVES published by the Convention.

3. There should be at least four committees in the local Brotherhood: Soul-Winning, Worship, Stewardship, and Doctrinal.

4. The men of the Brotherhood should sponsor mission revivals, and promote regular mission work in unchurched communities.

5. The men of the Brotherhood should organize with a work partner, for personal visitation of the lost.

6. The Brotherhood should sponsor doctrinal and stewardship weeks in the church.

7. The associational Brotherhood should hold rallies once a quarter.

8. The ultimate goal in the Brotherhood movement is a place for every man and every man in his place in the local church, backing the pastor in all the activities of the church.

Under the leadership of Dr. Haskins and President Twitty, and with the full cooperation of our pastors, we should be able to lead our men into a closer walk with God, and to a greater service in the Master's kingdom. We covet your prayers for this important phase of our denominational life.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Introduction

" There remaineth yet very much land to be possessed." Joshua 13:1. The Lord appeared unto Joshua and reminded him that Israel had come a long way from Egyptian bondage, across the Red Sea, through the forty year wandering, across the Jordan

River and had possessed much of the promised land; yet he reminded Joshua that "there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed."

Oklahoma Baptists have come a long way since the first church was organized with six members, three of whom were Negro slaves. There are today approximately 300,000 Baptists co-operating with our Convention. There are more than 100,000 Negro and other Baptists in Oklahoma who are not affiliated with the Convention program. We now have more than 1,000 co-operating churches located in the country, towns and cities.

Oklahoma Baptists own and operate a university, two hospitals, an orphanage, two Baptist Student Union centers, and assembly grounds. We are humbly grateful to God for His blessings upon our work. The words of Joshua apply so forcibly to Oklahoma Baptists, "there remaineth yet very much land to be possessed." Everything that Baptists possess needs enlarging. Practically every church is in a building program or raising funds for that purpose. The university, hospitals, Orphans' Home, Baptist Student Union centers, and the assembly are in need of additional buildings and equipment. Every department is pleading for additional workers to match the challenge of this hour. We have not by any means reached the heights that are possible for Oklahoma Baptists. "... There remaineth yet very much land to be possessed."

In the words of Joshua and Caleb, we can say, "We are well able to possess the land." No finer, more loyal, group of pastors can be found anywhere. The churches have responded to every appeal for advancement. The fields are white unto harvest. Let us go forward to possess the land that lies out before us today.

We present in this report a brief statement of the accomplishments of the past year and some recommendations for the future.

IN MEMORY OF PRESIDENT R. C. HOWARD.

The Convention in November, 1946, elected Reverend R. C. Howard, the beloved pastor of Kelham Avenue Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, as their president. He was likewise president of the Board of Directors. He served the Board and the Convention faithfully and efficiently until the Lord called him to his eternal home on May 6, 1947.

His last active ministry was to preach on the evening of his illness for one hour to one hundred eleven men in the First Baptist Church, Buffalo, Oklahoma. On Wednesday before, he represented Oklahoma Baptists at the Langston University School of Religion in an all day meeting of Negro Baptists. On Tuesday before that he sat with his brethren for hours in the great laymen's convention.

These last days of his ministry were typical of the busy life which R. C. Howard lived for his Lord and his brethren.

STATE MISSIONS

In a very real sense, everything that Baptists are doing within the bounds of Oklahoma is State Missions.

Andrew Potter, who has served as secretary-treasurer for the past fourteen years, is the leader of the State Mission work. During these years the membership of the churches in Oklahoma has increased from 175,000 to approximately 300,000. Fourteen years ago the Convention was in debt close to one-half million dollars. Every cent of the indebtedness has been paid and many fine substantial buildings have been erected. The missionary force has been increased manifold.

Close by the side of Secretary Potter has been his assistant for the past twelve years, Thomas P. Haskins. September 1, 1946, T. B. Lackey was called to assist in the promotion of the Unified Budget and other administrative duties. These men are constantly working with the pastors associational leaders and churches in the promotion of the cause of Christ within the state and to the ends of the earth.

The State Mission program is divided into a number of well defined departments, agencies, and institutions. All of these are controlled by the Convention and its Board of Directors. Capable leaders have been secured for every department.

A brief report of these departments, agencies, and institutions follows:

EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the very heart of our work. A committee of the Board composed of W. A. Carleton, chairman, Charles Black, H. Tom Wiles, M. F. Ewton, R. C. Miller, R. Lofton Hudson, and Clyde Blaylock have been working with Thomas P. Haskins, state evangelistic leader, in the promotion of evangelism.

Emphasis is being placed on associational-wide simultaneous efforts in 1948. We present below the associations, evangelistic leaders, baptisms for 1946 and 1947, and the date of the simultaneous revival for the coming year:

A total of 16,588 baptisms have been reported in 1947 compared to 14,483 for the previous year.

An Evangelistic Conference will be held at the Trinity Baptist Church in Oklahoma City, January 26-28, 1948, at which time instructions and inspiration will be given to the evangelistic program for the coming year.

Dr. Elmer Ridgeway is the state evangelist. He has conducted quite a number of successful revivals during the past year.

CITY MISSIONS

We have the record of Jesus beholding the city of Jerusalem and weeping over it. During the early ministry of our Lord his chief concern was for the multitudes. The past few years multitudes have flocked into the larger cities. New residential sections have sprung up all around Oklahoma City and Tulsa. Two of the greatest mission fields are to be found in and near these two largest cities.

With the help of the Home Mission Board, Albert L. Lowther of Tulsa and Guy Bellamy of Oklahoma City, have been serving as Superintendents of City Missions for the past four years. These men work with local committees and the associational board in assisting the churches to establish local missions, promoting the whole program of the association and the Convention, and assisting in the organization of new churches. They also work among the foreign speaking people, deaf, and Negroes, and promote associational simultaneous revivals, training schools, and the schools of missions.

There are approximately one hundred churches and some thirty-five missions in these two cities. Some of the greatest work in the Southern Baptist Convention is being done in these two cities in Oklahoma under the direction of Superintendents Bellamy and Lowther.

RURAL MISSIONS

An important part of the state mission program is Rural Missions. Sam W. Scantlan has served for the past three years as superintendent of this department.

There are 335 churches located in the open country. Some of these are without pastors and buildings. The department of Rural Missions seeks to rehabilitate the country churches that are inactive and to make a close survey in every association concerning the need for new churches, mission points, and revival meetings. The Rural Mission department sponsors schools of missions throughout the state.

During the past year the following state missionaries have served in this department: C. H. Crouch, Jess Dittmar, Thomas F. Glosup, J. G. Heard, J. E. Outlaw, M. W. J. Richardson, and Dorvell W. Tabb.

William Huffman served in Central Association part of the year. LeRoy Crawford is now Superintendent of Missions in Frisco Association; J. H. Goins, Chickasaw; W. E. Fountain, Panhandle; and M. W. J. Richardson, Bryan. The following associations are without missionaries at the present time: Central, Creek, Delaware-Osage, Harmon, Jackson-Greer, Johnston-Marshall, Latimer, Mullins, Pawnee-Payne, Perry, and Pittsburg. The Home Mission Board has co-operated by contributing \$8,000 to the Rural Mission program in Oklahoma during 1947.

A New Approach

In January of this year the Board of Directors voted to discontinue the district mission plan at the end of 1947 and to channel the money through the associational missionaries in an effort to make possible a good missionary program in each of the thirty-six associations. The state will assist only upon the invitation of the association. It has been suggested that the title of the men be Superintendent of Associational Missions, rather than Associational Missionary.

After the Superintendent of Associational Missions has been elected by the association, he will be approved by the Board of Directors. The state Board will be in a position to contribute not more than \$75.00 per month to each Superintendent of Associational Missions co-operating in the plan.

If each association has a good mission program, it is evident that the state as a whole will have a good mission program.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY

The largest attendance in the history of Falls Creek was recorded the past summer with 11,340 paid registrations. There were many conversions and rededications of life and talents. A genuine camp meeting revival spirit prevailed throughout the ten days. Many have said that it was not only the largest, but also the best assembly in the thirty years of Falls Creek.

Many substantial improvements have been made on the assembly grounds in a new swimming pool, ball field, electric lights, water pump and water lines, class pavilions, and new roads and streets.

Churches over the state have built magnificent cottages; some costing as much as \$10,000. The improvement program must be continued on the assembly grounds. The seating capacity of the tabernacle must be doubled before the next assembly August 2-12, 1948. Many other improvements need to be made as rapidly as possible.

It is impossible to estimate the good that is done at Falls Creek. Reverend Sam W. Scantlan is the efficient business manager. Reverend E. W. Westmoreland plans and presents the program. These men make a real team at Falls Creek.

BROTHERHOOD

Thomas P. Haskins has served efficiently in the promotion of the whole program of the churches and denominations through the men of our state. Bryce L. Twitty of Tulsa is the State Broth-

erhood President and gives valuable time and counsel to the promotion of the work among the men.

During the months of January and February an Evangelistic and Missionary Conference was held in each association. Special emphasis was placed upon the work of men in the evening services. Large crowds attended these meetings and much and lasting good was done.

A layman suggested in one of these meetings that the men in Oklahoma send Dr. Haskins to the Baptist World Alliance. The idea caught fire and an offering was taken in each of the meetings for this purpose. The amount contributed was sufficient not only to send Dr. Haskins, but also Mrs. Haskins. These two faithful servants attended the Baptist World Alliance and returned to their places of responsibility with renewed strength both physically and spiritually.

A great laymen's rally was held in Oklahoma City, April 29. Men from every section of the state gathered for this occasion. The purpose of the Brotherhood department is to assist in enlisting men to support the whole program of the church—Sunday School, Training Union, prayer meetings, preaching services — and to bring into the Lord's treasury on His day that which is holy unto the Lord.

ORPHANS' HOME

H. Truman Maxey, the efficient and faithful resident manager of the Orphans' Home, is ably assisted by C. E. Goatcher, farm manager; Wade East, field representative; Mrs. Edith Stinson, personnel supervisor, and other employees who are at their places of responsibility day and night.

Four new buildings have been completed during the past year: a boys' cottage; pre-school children's building, combined with an infirmary; superintendent's home; and a commissary. A full-time registered nurse is now employed and the children have the best of care.

The churches are urged to continue their fine support of the Home through birthday offerings, Christmas love offerings, truck offerings, and other ways that people find to help the children at the Home.

Additional buildings and equipment are needed to take care of many others who are seeking entrance into the Orphans' Home. Thomas P. Haskins is in charge of receiving the children.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

For the past thirty-seven years the Convention has operated Oklahoma Baptist University. Dr. John W. Raley is the aggressive president.

More than 1,300 students have enrolled for the first semester this year compared to 1,094 at the same time last year.

The Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory has just been completed and is filled to capacity, with many boys being housed in other places. The new W. T. Short Science Building and Administration Building have also been added to the campus this year.

Twenty-one new faculty members and two that have returned from leave of absence have been added to the University staff this fall bringing the total faculty and staff members to seventy-five. The University is in need of additional buildings and equipment to take care of the increased enrolment. Oklahoma Baptists should continue to build this important institution which means so much to the denomination.

The Bison Glee Club, with Dean Warren Angell as director, made several appearances at the Southern Baptist Convention at St. Louis in May. In May, the Glee Club also made recordings from which commercial record albums are being manufactured by Decca Records, Incorporated.

Oklahoma Baptists were saddened by the death on February 20, 1947, of W. T. Short, beloved professor of mathematics and senior member of the faculty.

The church Music clinic, June 2-6, enrolled 117 men and women.

O. B. U. Summer School for Preachers, June 16-27, enrolled 85 men and women.

New departments and curricula include a new photography department comprising eight student darkrooms, a master darkroom, a finishing room, and a studio, completely and beautifully equipped. Curricula leading to two new degrees, Bachelor of Business Administration and Bachelor of Journalism, have been set up. Special curricula have been set up in religious journalism and church music, the latter for choir directors.

CHURCH MUSIC AND BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

For the past two years Ira Prosser has served as secretary of the Department of Church Music and Baptist Student Union. He has been assisted by a committee of the Board composed of:

A survey made in 1946 revealed that there are approximately 8,000 Baptist students enrolled in the twenty-six colleges and universities of Oklahoma. There are three full-time student secretaries at the present time. They are working on the campuses of Oklahoma University, Norman; Oklahoma A. and M., Stillwater; and East Central, Ada. There are five part-time secretaries working on the campuses of Oklahoma College for Women, Chickasha; Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee; Central State, Edmond; Northeastern State, Tahlequah; and Baptist State Hospital, Muskogee.

The 1947 Baptist Student Union Convention was held in Shawnee, October 31-November 2. A meeting of the associational music officers was held in Shawnee, February 24, with twenty-two associations represented. A church music leadership clinic was held at Oklahoma Baptist University, June 2-6, with twenty-seven associations and sixty-four churches represented and an enrolment of one hundred thirty. Local church and associational-wide music schools have been held over all the state throughout the year.

BAPTIST MESSENGER

For the past thirty-five years the **Baptist Messenger** has gone into the homes of the people. The circulation has increased the past two years from 36,756 to 41,458. The goal is "47,000 in 1947." The circulation should reach 50,000 by 1950.

More than 500 churches have the **Messenger** in the church budget. Albert McClellan, the popular young editor, is to be congratulated upon the **Baptist Messenger**. All our people are urged to receive and read this important periodical.

The editor attended the Baptist World Alliance which met in Copenhagen, Denmark, July 29-August 3, of this year.

MINISTERS RETIREMENT AND WIDOWS SUPPLEMENTAL ANNUITY PLANS

The Convention, meeting in Shawnee in 1938, voted to enter into the Ministers Retirement Plan. Since that time 68 aged preachers and religious workers in Oklahoma have retired. There are 295 churches and 369 preachers participating in the plan in Oklahoma at this time.

The Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan became effective in 1943. Pastors entering the plan at that time already have provision for their loved ones. There are 200 participating in this plan at the present time. Every full-time religious worker should be in the Retirement Plan and every minister with a family should be in the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan.

The minister or other religious worker, the church, and the denomination co-operate in making possible the retirement plans.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Mrs. Bill V. Carden is the Executive-Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union in Oklahoma. She is ably assisted by Miss Vivian Cochran, young people's leader, and Miss Marjorie Keys, office secretary.

The purpose of the department is to distribute missionary information and to enlist the women and young people in prayer for our missionaries and in contributions to missions. The Woman's Missionary Union seeks to secure 100 per cent co-operation of the women and young people in every department of the church.

More than 10,000 study course awards were granted last year. More than 11,000 of the graded program magazines were read and studied. There are 1,915 organizations in the state with more than 35,000 members enrolled. The W. M. U. gives full support to the Unified Budget of Oklahoma Baptists in addition to their special contributions to missions. The women contributed \$59,-433.40 to Foreign Missions; \$18,306.06 to Home Missions; and \$10,-125.75 to State Missions during the regular seasons of prayer last year.

Great gains have been made the past year in every department of the work. Some of these are as follows:

- 11 per cent increase in study courses
- 18 per cent in members
- 35 per cent in mission magazine subscriptions
- 50 per cent increase in the number of titheers

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Reverend E. W. Westmoreland is the secretary of the Religious Education department comprising both Sunday School and Training Union work. There was a gain of almost 12,000 in Sunday School enrolment last year. There were more than 15,000 rewards

issued in 1946. Oklahoma has thirty-one large Sunday schools with an enrolment of more than 900 each.

The state Sunday School Convention was held March 19-20 in Oklahoma City with a registration of more than 1,500. There were 554 Vacation Bible Schools held in 1946, which is an increase of more than 100 over the previous year.

The Training Union enrolment reported a gain of almost 4,000 over the previous year. Dr. Jack Gritz, assistant to Mr. Westmoreland, resigned June 1, to accept the pastorate of First Baptist Church, Tahlequah. Reverend Clyde Clayton was elected to this position. He began his work October 1, 1947. Other workers in the department are Miss Sophia Duerksen, Young People's Work; Miss Connie Bradley, Intermediate Work; Mrs. Dorothy Sneed, office secretary; and the following approved workers: Mrs. J. W. Barron, Junior Work; Mrs. Wayman Hiner, Primary Work; Mrs. M. L. Field, Beginner Work; and Mrs. G. H. Gaudill, Cradle Roll and Nursery Work.

HOSPITALS

The Oklahoma Baptist Hospital is located at Muskogee with J. P. Cox as the administrator. This hospital serves approximately 200,000 people in eastern Oklahoma. New furniture and other modern equipment have been added during the past year, bringing the hospital to first class condition.

The Miami Baptist Hospital is located at Miami, Oklahoma, with A. F. Wasson as the administrator. Approximately, \$75,000 has been spent on improvements, new furniture, and new equipment during the past year bringing the capacity to seventy-five beds and fifteen basinetts.

Mother's Day was observed as Hospital Day in many churches over the state. The offerings that day amounted to \$2,196.45. It will be a great help if more churches will observe Hospital Day on May 9, 1948. This offering will help the Baptist Hospitals to carry the heavy load and to minister to more people.

Both these stores are owned and operated by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

BAPTIST HEADQUARTERS BUILDING

The Convention in 1945 authorized the purchase of a site and the erection of a new Baptist Headquarters building as soon as practicable.

The present building is inadequate to house the Convention offices. The site has been secured and it is the hope of the Headquarters Committee that the new building will be constructed during the coming year. The Board of Directors and the Headquarters Committee will carry out the authorization of the 1945 Convention as soon as possible.

THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Baptist Foundation was organized at the meeting of the Convention last year (1946). Andrew Potter is the Secretary-treasurer and John W. Raley, assistant.

The Board of Directors is thoroughly in accordance with the procedure and plans of the Foundation. The following procedure was adopted at a recent Board meeting:

1. That the Board of Directors of the Convention assist the Foundation in every way possible in developing a plan whereby funds for capital improvements and endowment may be secured on an over-and-above basis from men and women of means.

2. That the pastors be requested to work with the Foundation in assembling a list of prospective donors who are financially able to make over-and-above gifts to buildings and endowment.

3. That a group of churches be encouraged to make over-and-above love offerings designated to the Foundation.

4. That the Foundation be encouraged to proceed with all haste in the creation of literature and in making plans for immediate prosecution of the program.

5. That plans be made to channel information regarding the Foundation and its program through the secular press, the denominational papers, and church bulletin service.

6. That the Foundation plan a series of conferences to which prospective givers may be invited and challenged with the possibilities of the program.

TITHERS' CRUSADE

The Southern Baptist Convention, meeting in Miami, Florida, adopted a goal of 1,000,000 tithers. The Board of Directors of the

Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma set a goal of 50,000 tithers for Oklahoma. T. B. Lackey was asked to lead in the promotion of this work along with his other responsibilities.

Considerable literature on stewardship and tithing has been made available to the churches without cost to them. A special Sunday School lesson on tithing was printed and distributed. The requests for literature were far beyond our expectations. The interest in the crusade ran high, and judging from early reports it would seem that it is already a grand success.

We are printing elsewhere in the report the stewardship chairman and the tithers' goals adopted by the thirty-six associations for 1948. The crusade for tithers will continue throughout the coming year.

UNIFIED BUDGET

Under the wise planning and leadership of the Convention the financial program of all the work has been placed in one Unified Budget. Through this Unified effort every phase of the work in the state and outside receives equitable support.

The churches have responded in a very encouraging way to the support of the work of our Lord through the Unified Budget. The contributions have increased year after year until in 1946, \$591,878.03 was contributed. The goal of \$650,000 adopted last year for 1947 will be surpassed by the end of this year if the offerings continue the last two months as they have the past ten.

The Board of Directors and the Foundation Board in an effort to secure additional funds for buildings and capital needs as well as the enlarging of every department, suggested a Unified Budget goal of \$800,000 for 1948. This is a 25 per cent increase over the goal for this year. This challenge has been presented to each of the thirty-six associations in their annual meetings and the response has been most encouraging. Many churches are increasing their contributions through the Unified Budget 25 per cent or more. The goals adopted by the associations total \$784,849.80. We believe that it is entirely possible to reach the state goal of \$800,000 in 1948.

Therefore, we recommend a Unified Budget objective of \$800,000 for 1948 to be divided as follows:

The balance of \$619,000, if raised, to be divided fifty-fifty between state and southwide causes.

Each association has elected a stewardship chairman to keep the tithers' crusade and the Unified Budget before the churches throughout the year. The service of these men along with the moderators and superintendents of associational missions is invaluable. T. B. Lackey, assistant executive secretary, devotes much time to the promotion of the Unified Budget. SECRETARY POTTER VISITS MISSION FIELDS

The Board of Directors in the December meeting voted unanimously and enthusiastically to send the Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Andrew Potter, to visit the Foreign Mission fields in many nations of the world.

Friends made it possible for Mrs. Potter to accompany her husband on the journey. They left Oklahoma in April and returned early in September. The information and inspiration gained from this tour will bear fruit in an enlarged mission program for many years to come.

Dr. Potter was not only a representative of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, but also of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Missionaries in all parts of the world where the Potters visited have reported that their presence was a great inspiration and help to their work.

Secretary Potter has brought back a most interesting and helpful report from our missionaries and mission fields on which they labor. The Board is grateful to him for making this strenuous tour and bringing back the information regarding our work.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That it will be our policy to operate on a cash basis.
2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best administration and promotion of our work.
3. That we instruct all agencies provided for in the budget not to incur any debts not authorized by the Board of Directors during 1947.
4. That the 1947 State Mission Budget be projected on a basis that will insure no deficits at the close of the year.
5. That we continue the ten per cent contingency fund from in-the-state objects as a safeguard against possible deficits.
6. That the Board of Directors be authorized and instructed to re-adjust the figures of the Unified Budget if receipts do not justify the suggested distribution. We solemnly renew our pledge to the Baptists of Oklahoma that there will be no debts debacles during this administration.
7. We further recommend that all Unified Budget funds above \$181,000 (which is the basis of operation) be divided fifty-fifty between state and southwide causes.

CONCLUSION

We are humbly grateful to God for the accomplishments of the past. To Him be the honor and glory for it all. We are also grateful for the fine co-operation of the noble pastors and the efficient associational officers. We would say "Thank You!" to each member of every church in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma stands near the top in comparison with other states in the Southern Baptist Convention. In 1946 the churches contributed a total of \$1,032,044.69 to missions and benevolences through the office of the secretary-treasurer. Of this amount \$517,332.48 or 50.16 per cent went to work beyond our own state, leaving \$514,362.48 or 49.84 per cent for the work in the state. It should be kept in mind that all the expense of raising the total amount was borne by the in-state share.

There were 14,578 baptized in Oklahoma in 1946. That is one for every 19.7 members. The average throughout the Southern Baptist Convention was one to every twenty-four members. Oklahoma stands ahead of fifteen states in this comparison. Oklahoma was surpassed only by Arizona, California, Florida, and New Mexico. Only six states reported more baptisms than Oklahoma.

Sixteen churches in Oklahoma baptised one hundred or more in 1946. Only the state of Texas reported a larger number of

churches baptizing more than one hundred. Oklahoma and Texas had fifty-three churches baptizing more than one hundred and all the other states in the Southern Baptist Convention had only fifty-seven baptizing more than one hundred.

Oklahoma makes a favorable showing in comparison with the other states in Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Baptist Student Union and Music, and in every other phase of the work.

Greater days are ahead for Oklahoma Baptists. The spirit of unity, co-operation, and progress was never better. Let us march on to higher grounds!

Those recommended for election at this session for four (4) years:

James T. McAlester, McAlester; Fred White, Ada; N. W. Brillhart, Madill; O. L. Ledgerwood, Pauls Valley.

Mr. R. A. Young is recommended to take place vacated by the death of Dr. R. C. Howard. His is for a one (1) year term.

48. The following change in the By-Laws and the election of New Foundation Board members were both included in the Board of Directors Report and in the motion to adopt The Board of Directors of the Convention recommend that the By-Laws of the Baptist Foundation be amended in Article five (5), regarding the method of nominating new members from year to year, and to fill other vacancies that may arise.

The article as recommended by this resolution, to read as follows:

"Each year thereafter the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years."

Those recommended for election at this session for a four (4) year term are: James T. McAlester, McAlester; Fred White, Ada; N. W. Brillhart, Madill; A. L. Ledgerwood, Pauls Valley.

Mr. R. A. Young, Oklahoma City, is recommended to election to fill the one (1) year term vacated by the death of Dr. R. C. Howard.

49. Judge Wallace (W. R.) presented the Report of the Baptist Foundation Board and moved its adoption. Motion carried.

REPORT OF FOUNDATION BOARD

The Baptist General Convention at its meeting in 1945 authorized the establishment of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and the Foundation was incorporated prior to the meeting of the 1946 Convention, which Convention adopted and approved the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws.

Since the 1946 Convention, the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation have made a survey of the needs of the Convention's institutions and agencies. The Foundation interprets its responsibilities as two-fold:

(1) To procure funds for capital improvements and endowments.

(2) To hold, disperse and invest funds according to designation made and set out in the charter, and by the donor.

After the appraisal, a total objective of \$3,500,000 was set up to be raised over a period of seven years by the Foundation. The method of procedure was set forth in the following recommendations:

(1) That a campaign be inaugurated for capital improvements and endowment.

(2) That the first objectives be designated as follows:

\$150,000 for a Baptist Student Center at A&M, Stillwater.

\$150,000 for a Baptist Student Center at O. U., Norman.

\$200,000 for buildings and equipment at O. B. U.

(3) That 25 per cent of all undesignated funds be set aside as endowment for Oklahoma Baptist University.

(4) Upon completion of these projects, new objectives to be set out as the needs are determined.

(5) That the above funds are to be raised over and above all regular gifts through the churches.

The Foundation is a non-profit organization. None of its officers or directors receive any compensation whatever. The Board of Directors have been attempting to secure endowments and to hold and administer all trust funds which have come into its hands in the most careful manner.

The Board of Directors have provided every safeguard for the security of the monies that it receives. The bonds and endowment funds which have been transferred to the Foundation by the Convention are likewise protected. Safe deposit boxes have been procured where bonds and other negotiable securities are kept. The safe deposit boxes can only be entered by a representative of the bank being present, together with the president or vice-president and the treasurer of the Foundation. Permanent records of deposits in said boxes and withdrawals therefrom are kept, available for the officers of the Foundation, members of the Board and the Convention.

The Treasurer has been put under a surety bond of \$50,000, which amount shall be increased from time to time as the assets of the Foundation warrant.

The Foundation received from the Convention \$76,776.29 in cash, bonds, securities and negotiable instruments. Since the Foundation office was opened in April, we have received the sum of \$21,126.99, of which \$8,525.48 was designated for moving buildings to the OBU campus from Camp Maxey, Texas.

The purposes of the Foundation are exactly parallel to those of the Baptist General Convention. It is to supplement the gifts to the Unified Budget, and to handle its finances in a way to make its appeal especially to those who have money enough to give additional amounts to buildings, trust funds and endowments. The Foundation does not handle gifts for current operations except to transmit them to the designations indicated. The main purpose in setting up the Foundation was that it might make all of the institutions and agencies of the Convention permanent and to put them on a sound basis, and, also, to build new institutions.

The Directors of the Foundation are of the opinion that there are multitudes of Baptists in Oklahoma with property and money who are reaching the age that they should think seriously about how they are going to dispose of their accumulations. Many inquiries have been received about wills and bequests by reason of the liberal percentage of tax deduction therefor. It should be well understood that there is no income tax of any kind on gifts and bequests to the Foundation. The Foundation is an avenue whereby our people can provide in their wills for bequests of various and sundry kinds and their funds will be handled in a way that will carry out their desires, and be of great benefit to the institutions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The Foundation is set up in such a way that annuities may be arranged for those who would like to place their money in the hands of the Foundation and to receive back a good rate of interest and be secured in their investment.

The Convention has adopted the theory that we are through with creating debts and that in order to avoid debts in the future, our institutions and agencies shall be endowed that they may have funds at all times through the Foundation.

The Foundation is appealing to everyone and especially to churches to make designated gifts to the Foundation for the capital needs of our hospitals, now owned and hospitals which we want to acquire; Oklahoma Baptist University; student centers which we contemplate building; the Orphans' Home and the Falls Creek Assembly.

We want every member of our Baptist churches in Oklahoma to become familiar with the Foundation. We believe when they are informed about the needs they will make designated gifts to the Foundation for capital needs and endowments for our institutions and agencies. Oklahoma is a new state and we are just arriving at the age when we know that these institutions should be undergirded and maintained without any risk as to their future. It is the purpose of the Foundation to sustain these institutions for the Baptists of our great commonwealth.

52. Evening session opened at 7:00 p. m. with Music Director Ira C. Prosser leading in song service. Songs used were:

"There is Power In the Blood" and "Jesus Paid It All."

53. Rev. R. L. McClung led in prayer asking God's blessing and leadership during the evening session of the convention.

54. The choir of the Tulsa First Baptist Church, under the leadership of Mr. Edgar Patterson, favored the convention with special music singing "Man of Sorrows."

55. Dr. N. M. Stigler, Blackwell, led in the devotional service using Scripture found in John 16:32 through 17:5. His theme was "The Urgency of the Hour."

56. The choir of the First Baptist Church sang another special number to the delight and uplift of all.

57. Consideration of the Unified Budget and the Baptist Foundation was scheduled to fill the entire evening hour.

58. Dr. J. W. Storer was introduced to speak to the interest of the Unified Budget and all it embraces emphasizing that "the Unified Budget is every Baptist's Business."—"Obedience to the Great Commission is every Baptist's Business."

59. Dr. J. W. Storer gave notice that at the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the state of Oklahoma, he would make motion that Article 4, Section 1, now reading:

"The officers of this Convention shall be a President, two Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer and Historical Secretary, provided that the Corresponding Secretary may be Treasurer."

shall be amended to read:

- a. "The officers of this Convention shall be a President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice President, a Recording Secretary, an Assistant Recording Secretary, an Executive Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Historical Secretary. It is hereby provided that the Executive Secretary may be Treasurer.
- b. And that in the event of the removal from the State of the President while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the First Vice-President.
- c. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the Second Vice-President shall succeed to the remainder of the term."

60. Mr. Ira C. Prosser led in singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers."

61. Honorable Robert S. Kerr addressed the convention on the Baptist Foundation and its program of progress and security, using Deuteronomy 2:3, "Ye have compassed this mountain long enough, turn you northward."

62. The choir led in singing "Are You Washed in the Blood."

63. Dr. Andrew Potter brought the closing message of the evening using as his subject, "Looking toward the sunrise," quoting from the Scripture, "On the east side toward the rising of the sun."

Dr. Potter called to our memory the growth our denomination has made during the past fourteen years. He turned attention to the future. "Looking toward the Sunrise" was urged as a directive for activity of the convention.

64. The congregation stood pledging cooperation in the program for the coming year.

65. Music Director Ira C. Prosser led in singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers."

The benedictory prayer was by Dr. John W. Raley.

REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE:

Everything in the spirit, attitude, and teachings of Jesus Christ would urge upon His followers the necessity for the Christian to have an acute social conscience.

Is the Christian ambitious? Jesus answers: "Let him that would be greatest among you be the servant of all."

Jesus was constantly interested in the down and out, the wounded and weary.

The command is "Love thy neighbor as thyself." To the question, "Who is my neighbor?" comes the Good Samaritan answer portraying the man in need—the one who has fallen among thieves and is stripped, wounded, helpless. His neighbor is the man who shows mercy. Shining above this picture of the social-minded Samaritan is the command: "Go, and do thou likewise."

Selfish, vested interests, the modern Robber Chieftains, have stripped and wounded many, leaving them helpless. If we would be neighbors, we must show mercy.

(1) The American public is being stripped and wounded by the Liquor Industry—stripped of \$6,000,000,000 annually; stripped of sobriety to the tune of 750,000 alcoholics and 3,000,000 potential alcoholics; stripped of food, clothing, shelter, homes, and honor; wounded physically and spiritually almost beyond repair. These Robber Barons are at the same time subsidizing press and radio and posing as public benefactors and law enforcement agents.

It is the business of Christians not only to aid the stripped and wounded, but also to use every legitimate means to unmask and outlaw the liquor interests.

National gains are being registered constantly in local elections. Let us be on the alert to make Oklahoma increasingly dry.

We again urge that the various temperance and prohibition agencies seek further to unify their forces in the battle against drunkenness in Oklahoma.

(2) The Home itself, ordained and established of God as the foundation of the human social order, is being stripped and wounded by the constant increase of immorality and divorce. These forces are, of course, aided and abetted in their work of havoc by the evils of intemperance. Salacious literature breeds delinquency among young and old. Indecent or suggestive movies add their wounds. Poor housing conditions strengthen the robber bands. Increased living costs have added to the strain.

In many cities divorces equal the marriage licenses issued. Homes dissolve. Morals are undermined. Little children, the innocent victims of the divorce mills, are left stripped of home, wounded in heart, helpless prey of the unscrupulous.

What can Christians do? Much! We can care for the victims and, at the same time, unceasingly do battle against the lax laws, liquor forces, industrial and housing conditions, suggestive literature and movies, and general looseness of thought that encourage the undermining of the home. We can further intensify a counter campaign of Christian teaching concerning personal purity, the sanctity of the home, parental responsibility for children, and the need of the Regenerated Life.

(3) Minority groups are still being stripped and wounded in America, both racial groups and religious groups. Without compromising our own doctrine or relaxing our campaign for world evangelization—"with malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness for right as God gives us to see the right"—we must chart our course. We must believe in and insist upon equal

opportunity for all races and creeds. Baptists do not promote toleration, they are heralds of freedom always and everywhere.

(4) Since "the love of money is a root of all evil," we find many stripped and wounded and left bleeding by the economic wayside. Both capital and labor are capable of robber practices. The New Testament does not take sides with either but insists upon honesty, fairness, and neighborliness on the part of each. We must stand with the New Testament.

The gambling craze that is sweeping the world today is but another symptom of the love of money that has become almost a mania. Governments—local, state, and national—are winking at lotteries and raffles by civic and church organizations.

Only an all-out campaign of teaching concerning the right use of money in Christian Stewardship can heal the social wounds and defeat the thieves along this Highway of Life. Men must learn that possessions are as holy to God as are bodies and souls; that it is as immoral to cheat or gamble as it is to commit adultery, since each debauches that which is sacred.

In these and all other realms we reaffirm our loyalty both to Government and to God, our intention to "render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's." We maintain our right in every phase of living to do aggressive battle against wrong, and to minister to the wounds of the victim's along the Jericho Road.

REPORT OF RADIO COMMITTEE

We, the Radio Committee, wish to submit the following report and recommendations.

I. Introduction

Our Lord said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." He not only meant that we shall go to all nations and to all people in every nation with the gospel message, but the implication of His commission carries with it the imperative that we shall go into every area of life through which we may be able to reach the hearts of men with His gospel. Because this is true, it is imperative that Baptists lay hold of the radio and send the gospel message through the airplanes to the masses of people who listen to the radio. In other words, it is just as imperative for Baptists to carry on a great gospel radio program as it is a state mission, or home mission, or foreign mission program. It is not optional, but it is imperative that Baptists use the radio in a most effective way.

II. Our Report

1. The Baptist Hour

The first Radio Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention was appointed in 1938. The first Baptist Hour broadcast was in 1941, January through March, over a total of 16 stations, 9 of which carried the program directly from the network and 7 of which carried the program by transcription. Every year since the Radio Commission has broadcast three months on a network and for the most part the network has covered the greater portion of the Southern Baptist Convention. In 1945, and again in 1946, the Commission broadcast two, three months' periods over the network. In 1947, we broadcast only one three months' period with a substantial response as reflected in the fan mail and the general interest. The subject of the series for 1947 was "Christ the Answer."

In 1948, we shall broadcast during the quarter January through March again. The theme, "Divine Light for Daily Living." The speakers have been chosen, and they are among the greatest pastors, and laymen.

2. Transcriptions

It has been the policy of the Radio Commission to build the best possible transcription library, building into the records the best and most helpful Christian messages and music of which we are capable. This library has now grown to include 7,000 records that are available for broadcast over local stations, and via transcription machines in local churches, and local church situations.

During the three quarters, January through September, including the broadcasts by transcription for other agencies of the Convention, the Radio Commission has promoted the broadcasting of 4,101 programs over 512 stations within the coverage of the Southern Baptist Convention. Thus literally multiplied millions have heard the gospel in message and music through the transcribed programs from the library of the Radio Commission.

(1) **Transcription Service to Local Churches.** The Radio Commission is firmly convinced that its transcription library should be made available to local churches for use in local church situations. Thus we have launched the transcription service to local churches making available the thousands of records we now have in our library and looking towards the making of new records especially prepared for use via the record player in local churches and local church situations. Situations in which this service will be helpful:

a. At the close of Bible school in churches with part-time preaching. A number of churches are now using this transcribed service, using the transcription service at the close of Bible school on days other than regular preaching days.

b. Sunday school and Training Union and W. M. U. groups use the transcriptions in smaller groups in our larger churches. This is proving very effective in many of the churches. Some church groups hold forum discussions following the use of the transcribed program in small groups.

c. Other situations in which this transcription service is of splendid assistance are: In local hospitals, convalescent homes, county jails, county poor houses, county and state prison camps, etc.

3. Promotion of Broadcasting in the Southern Baptist Convention Territory.

Since its first appointment, the Radio Commission has sought to promote broadcasting within state convention territories. We have sought to enlist state conventions to take an active interest in this type of service. The result has been the appointment of a radio committee in every state in the Southern Baptist Convention territory and much broadcasting has resulted within the states. Several of our state conventions, notably North Carolina, South Carolina and Oklahoma during the years have broadcast network programs within their own state.

A Plan of promoting F.M. station ownership and operation.

(1) The fundamental plan is for Baptists to promote local ownership of F.M. stations by local people. We are particularly interested in leading Christian people, and predominantly Baptists, to finance the cost of stations and to supply the directorship of such stations in order that such station ownership and management may be in full sympathy with religious broadcasting and with a higher type of popular programs.

(2) We propose to promote networks within a given state. Such networks will be small at first with the ultimate goal of a sufficient number of stations to give state coverages.

CHURCH MUSIC AND BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Ira C. Prosser, *Director*

Church Music

Although this department is one of the newer fields of work, interest is growing and the promotional program is meeting with enthusiasm. This interest is evident through the response to the activities promoted through the southwide, state, association and local church units during 1947.

Perhaps the greatest stride of progress in the state was Oklahoma Baptists first Church Music Leadership Clinic held at the Oklahoma Baptist University, in June, with 27 associations represented 64 churches and an enrollment of 130. No finer faculty could be engaged than the one had for this history making

school. Splendid reports have come from those who took advantage of the five-day program of teaching and training.

Twenty-nine of the 34 associations cooperated with the suggestion that three officers be elected to serve their association: a music director, an associate music director and a pianist-secretary.

A meeting of the newly elected associational officers was held in Shawnee, in February, with 22 associations represented and more than 100 in attendance. The following state officers were elected:

Dr. B. B. McKinney, secretary, dept. of church music, Nashville, directed the music program and taught the large church music class at the Falls Creek Assembly. Oklahoma Baptists honored Dr. McKinney for his many years of faithful service as he spent his last year with them at the encampment.

Local church and associational music schools have been taught throughout the year, with excellent results. The state director was privileged to teach in some of the schools, and direct the music programs for summer encampments, statewide and southwide conventions.

During the month of December, the local churches are being urged to make much of church music programs such as oratorios, cantatas, pageants and hymn fests.

1948 Plans for Promotion

A meeting of all the state and associational music officers will again be held early in the year.

Plans are being made for a bigger and better Church Music Leadership Clinic, May 31-June 4, at the Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. The following have already accepted invitations to serve on the faculty:

A different teaching music program for the Falls Creek Assembly is being arranged to meet the needs of the growing attendance.

Hymn festivals, association and local church music institutes will be held.

The music leadership of the associations will be urged to attend the Southwide Music Conference to be held one week in August at the Ridgecrest Assembly Grounds.

Outstanding local church music talent will be featured in the music programs of conventions and encampments.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

1. Student Possibilities

The 1947 fall registration in the institutions of higher learning in the state reveals the greatest enrolment of students in Oklahoma history. The survey indicates 45,000 students enrolled in 27 colleges and universities. Ten thousand of this number are Baptist and an additional 1,500 gave the Baptist church as their preference. Included in these totals are Oklahoma Baptist University's enrolment of 1,320 with 1,110 Baptists and 18 Baptist preference, and the Muskogee Baptist Hospital reporting 42 student nurses, 33 of whom are Baptist and 6 Baptist preference.

These students offer a great challenge to Oklahoma Baptists for Christian education and enlistment. This is the field of the Baptist Student Union. Through this movement, Baptists go with their students to college, ever keeping before them their church and denominational program.

2. Leadership Personnel

Oklahoma Baptists are justified in being proud of their student secretary personnel. Three full-time and five part-time student secretaries serve eight campuses. Full-time: Miss Frenchie Bramwell, East Central, Ada; Mr. Kermit Whitaker, Oklahoma A. & M., Stillwater; and Mr. Warren Woolf, Oklahoma University, Norman. Part-time: Miss Avalon Stevens, O.C.W., Chickasha; Miss Vivian Kelly, Northeastern State, Tahlequah; Mrs. Ray Ingram, Central State, Edmond; Miss Frankie Harris, Baptist Hospital, Muskogee; and Mr. Jerome Zickrick, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee.

This loyal, consecrated staff meets the high standard of requirements consistently maintained for the student secretary field. Visible results and statistics given in their monthly reports to the state office indicate excellent leadership. The Oklahoma A. & M. Baptist Student Union, under the leadership of Mr. Whitaker, was one of eight colleges in the Southern Baptist Convention to reach the standards for the First Magnitude Award for the school year 1946-47.

3. Some Over-All Needs

Additional local campus personnel must be secured and provided with necessary equipment for efficient work.

Present student center buildings and BSU rooms are inadequate to meet the growing needs of the day. Just as classrooms are overcrowded, the work among the Baptist students is hampered because of insufficient housing space.

Nineteen of Oklahoma's 27 colleges and universities have Baptist-Student Union organizations. The majority of the remaining eight desire to organize and employ student secretaries as soon as finances will permit. Business colleges and schools of specialized training offer a further challenge.

1947 Activities

The Calendar of Student Events suggested by the Dept. of Student Work, Nashville, is being followed in Oklahoma. In addition to state and southwide activities, this calendar calls for such local campus observance as a Dedicated Vocations Week, Evangelistic Emphasis Week, Volunteer Missions Week, Volunteer Summer Service Week, Join-the-Church Day at College, Fall Retreats and Student Night at Christmas.

The state meeting for all the BSU leadership was held in Oklahoma City early in 1947, to plan the years' program. Forty students and student leaders were present.

A State Spring Retreat was held at Falls Creek, in April, for the purpose of instructing the newly elected local BSU Council officers who are serving their campuses this fall. Two hundred registered for the three-day meeting. Mr. William Hall Preston, associate secretary in the Dept. of Student Work, Nashville, was the principal speaker.

The attendance for Student Week at Ridgecrest, in June, was restricted. Oklahoma's delegation numbered 70.

Miss Jenny Lind Gatlin, associate in the Student Department, Nashville, taught the BSU Methods Book, at the Falls Creek Assembly, in August. Mr. Kermit Whitaker taught a book for high school seniors, introducing them to the Baptist Student Union and its purpose. More than 250 young people enrolled in these new Falls Creek classes.

Students are contributing generously to the fund for the erection of a building for college age young people at Falls Creek.

BSU evangelistic teams directed youth revivals and mission work during the summer months.

Plans are being made for an attendance of 1,000 for the 1947 State BSU Convention to be held Oct. 31-Nov. 2 at the Oklahoma Baptist University. Miss Frances Barbour will represent the Nashville office.

The year's activities will be climaxed with Student Night at Christmas in the local churches, at which time students home for the holidays will participate in this annual worship service.

73. Rev. Harold Lindsay presented the Report on Home Missions and Dr. Alfred Carpenter of the Home Mission Board spoke to the Report. Motion carried for its adoption.

HOME MISSION REPORT

Into the hands of the Home Mission Board Southern Baptists have placed the task of evangelizing the homeland. Under the careful leadership of Dr. J. B. Lawrence and his assistants, a com-

petent force of 924 missionaries have worked through 25 channels of service to mark the recent past with signal victories for Christ.

We now have 550 missionaries in the field of Direct Missions, which includes work among the Indians, language groups, mission centers, the deaf, Cuba, and Panama. This is an increase of 91 during the past year. The work is going forward under the new Secretary of Direct Missions, Dr. Alfred Carpenter. Immediate needs include additional missionaries, new church buildings, and mission assembly grounds.

The Board's work among Negro Baptists is on a co-operative basis, the emphasis of the work being upon ministerial training. Twenty-four Negro educational institutions are directly benefited by the Board. Among the Negroes the opportunities for Southern Baptists are great, but the responsibility is grave at the present time. Negro Baptists need our help, co-operation, support, and prayers as they face the threat of a determined Catholicism.

The Department of Evangelism has had a remarkable year under the leadership of Dr. C. E. Matthews who assumed his responsibilities on January 1, 1947. A Southwide Committee on Evangelism at the Convention in St. Louis, recommended that a unified program of evangelism be presented to each state. Evidences of the past progress and the promising future of evangelism in the homeland were witnessed in Oklahoma during revival services conducted by Dr. C. E. Matthews at the First Baptist Church of Lawton with 193 additions, 138 of whom came for baptism.

Co-operative missions includes the city mission program, rural church missions, and special work in Arizona, California, and New Mexico. The city mission program in its sixth year now has 40 cities with superintendents and numerous other smaller cities and churches with their own workers. The rural work, under the head of Dr. John D. Freeman, reaches out to over 1900 rural churches in 10 states, offering assistance through 47 co-operative workers. The special work in the western states has made progress under Fred A. McCaulley and his 20 field workers. All co-operative missions done by the Home Board are in co-operation with state mission boards.

In addition to the above efforts the Board has work among the Jews, field work for the W.M.U. of the South, a Chaplain's Commission for the Convention, an active Department of Education and Publicity, and a summer student mission program.

The Home Mission Board has ambitious plans for the future. In the words of Dr. J. B. Lawrence, "There should be no needy mission field in the homeland without the gospel." In realizing this need of blanketing the homeland with the gospel, 400 additional missionaries and workers are needed, an equal number of new mission stations and buildings, a \$4,000,000 capital improvement fund, and the united prayers and efforts of all Southern Baptists. Surely the Baptists of the South with gratitude for the past and in recognition of a promising future are ready to rise and meet the challenge of greater things for Christ in the coming years.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

By W. A. Carleton, Chairman, Evangelistic Committee

The spirit of evangelism is the spirit of Jesus for His Great Commission to the church is the evangelization of the entire world. Since it is our supreme obligation to reach the people who have never had an experience of divine grace, then it is a sin to be satisfied with a church program that calls merely for the maintenance of services for those who enjoy good preaching and singing and are willing to pay the bills.

Both the Word of God and the facts of experience prove that our civilization cannot be saved from ruin and decay by legislation, education or reformation. They have been tried and found wanting. "Out of the heart are the issues of life," and none of these methods can change the heart of a man. Only the power of God can accomplish that task.

The most hopeful sign on the Oklahoma Baptist horizon today is not the vast amount of money that is being raised for the Kingdom work, important as that is, nor the increase in numbers of new buildings, in Sunday School attendance and in an appreciation of the importance of Christian education, highly desirable as all of these things are. It is the spirit of growing concern for the souls of men as is manifest in greater and greater effort to reach the lost with the healing message of the gospel.

This year our hearts have rejoiced as our Oklahoma churches have sought in a variety of ways to bring the good news of redemption to the needy world. The evangelistic conference at Shawnee in February sounded an urgent note and through the year in youth revivals, laymen revivals, Sunday evangelism, child evangelism, visitation evangelism, and with many other methods our people have told the story of God's love.

The annual associational reports show the glorious results of this concern and activity. In almost every report an increase in number of baptisms is shown. Better still, the associations plan increased soul winning efforts for the coming year.

The associational-wide simultaneous revival campaign has proved to be a mighty force in reaching the lost. Each association that has met this year is making plans for such a campaign during 1948. If we prayerfully and earnestly put our best into this effort in the power of God, 1948 should be the greatest year in the history of Oklahoma Baptists.

There have been a total of 15,123 baptisms reported as of October 13. The report shows 484 baptisms by 8 general missionaries from January 1 to September 1, 1947, and there were 841 baptisms reported by 33 associational missionaries during the same period of time.

There have been 32 mission meetings reported with 326 professions of faith made, and 274 baptisms.

75. Music Director Ira C. Prosser led the congregation in singing "Rescue the Perishing."

76. Dr. John W. Raley, president of Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee addressed the Convention in the interest of the University, calling attention to the fact that there were 1766 students enrolled last school year.

Subject of Dr. Raley's address was "The Path of Peace."

77. Dr. George C. Boston led in the closing prayer.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

To the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University and to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in Session at Tulsa, November 6, 1947.

The year 1946-47 can be properly called the year of transition and expansion for Oklahoma Baptist University. The decided increase in enrollment over the previous year of some 600 students made excessive demands for additional housing, classroom space, equipment, and faculty personnel.

For your convenience and for sake of brevity the following report is given in outline form with as few comments as possible consonant with clarity.

The death of Professor W. T. Short, professor of mathematics, on February 19, 1947, marked the passing of the only faculty member who had served the university continuously since its beginning. A symbol of enduring loyalty and service, Professor Short will always live in the hearts of those who knew him as Christian, Teacher, Friend.

Buildings and Plant:

The major building unit provided on the campus during the year is the Brotherhood Memorial dormitory for men which was completed and made ready for occupancy September 10, 1947, in accordance with instructions of the Convention. This magnificent dormitory accommodates 200 young men, two to a room, provides an apartment for the hostess, a cafeteria in which all men on the campus are served, a large recreation room, and suitable parlors. No building in Oklahoma is more sturdily constructed or more attractively designed and appointed. The young men of the University for many college generations to come will be grateful to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for this much needed campus unit.

In accordance with the veteran's program the Federal government made provision for a science building to be constructed on the university campus. Two large Navy barracks buildings were removed from the Naval Air station at Clinton, Oklahoma, and redesigned into an attractive classroom building following the colonial style of the other buildings on the campus. This building has an area of 16,000 square feet and accommodates the biology, physics, geology, engineering, and mathematics departments. Under the same provision the Federal Works agency procured the administration building of the Shawnee Naval Air station which was moved to the university campus and remodeled to provide for the presidents office, the business manager's office, and for a pervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of suitable bookstore.

Under the Federal Public Housing Authority 35 apartments were provided at the expense of the Federal government for housing veterans with families. These buildings were removed from Camp Howze, Texas, re-erected and remodeled at government expense. Under the same authority nine buildings on the Shawnee Naval Air station were made available to the university for housing for faculty members and dormitory space for students. Under the Federal Works agency two additional buildings were secured, one a large sports arena, which will care for the needs of the university for many years to come; the other an auditorium seating approximately 1,000, together with all of its equipment. Titles of these buildings were passed to the university with the agreement that the university would demolish, transport, and re-erect at university expense. Total estimated valuation of all government buildings received is approximately \$750,000. All of these with the exception of the last two named, the auditorium

and gymnasium are in operation. The valuation of the Brotherhood Memorial dormitory, building and equipment is \$540,000 making a grand total of increase in valuation of buildings owned by the university procured during the past year \$1,200,000. When added to the audit report of our total of \$1,284,000 the property is now worth approximately \$2,400,000 having practically doubled within the last year.

Curriculum:

Significant additions to the curriculum include a program of study leading to the degree, bachelor of business administration, and expansion of the department of journalism sufficient to set up a strong degree in that field. Additions to the modern language faculty have almost doubled the number of courses offered in that field.

Ministerial Alliance Data 1946-47:

Of interest to all who are concerned with state missions is the report of the Ministerial Alliance. During the year the ministerial students delivered a total of 4186 sermons, their efforts resulting in 908 conversions, 1240 rededications, and 1181 additions to churches. They traveled a total of 360,569 miles and raised \$4,498.40 for general benevolences.

Financial Report:

The university had for the year an income of \$584,348.50, expense \$490,054.18, leaving a reserve of \$94,294.32 which has been, primarily, either invested in capital improvements, or absorbed in working capital. The reserve has been distributed as follows: Accounts and notes receivable in excess of notes payable—\$14,500.00; increase in food and supplies inventories—\$25,000.00; land purchased—\$7,500.00; improvements in buildings—\$21,000.00; new equipment—\$32,000.00. This is a capital investment and working capital absorption \$5,705.68 in excess of the net reserve. Capital worth, June 30, 1947—\$1,142,878.28.

Building Needs for the Future:

1. The most pressing building unit needed at the present time is an auditorium. If provision can be made for funds, all the materials procured from Camp Maxey can be utilized in a permanent construction by adding it on to Shawnee hall. This addition can be made to provide for auditorium and classrooms for the department of dramatic art. The present student body is double the capacity of the auditorium and it is impossible to achieve the spirit of unity and to capitalize on the enthusiasm of the larger group without sufficient auditorium space to seat the entire student body.

2. The re-erection of the gymnasium procured at Camp Maxey. The present gymnasium will serve the need of approximately 500 to 600 students and is located where it can be used as a gymnasium for women. The gymnasium procured at Camp Maxey will take care of general university needs for many years to come and should be erected as quickly as funds can be provided.

3. A new dormitory for women. At the present time most of our dormitory rooms for women are occupied by three girls. It is impossible to achieve the cultural effect or to provide the kind of atmosphere and the grace of living so much desired under such

conditions. A new dormitory for women becomes, of necessity, a part of the building program of the future.

4. A suitable home for the president properly located. The present home occupied by the president is located almost in the center of campus activity and the location and building are needed for dormitory service.

5. The chapel and fine arts center which must remain in the minds and purposes of the Convention until it crowns the university campus encompassing in its architecture and beauty of the highest exemplification of culture and Christianity as expressed in the ideals of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Oklahoma Baptist University has definitely passed the experimental stage and now stands as a great Kingdom service agency to be stabilized by your wise provision of additional needed buildings and sufficient endowment to undergird plant and faculty. Investment is the proper word to use from now on when referring to any contribution made to Oklahoma Baptist University.

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:45 p. m. with President Harold K. Graves presiding.

78. Song Service began under the leadership of Ira C. Prosser. The following songs were used: "Standing on the Promises" and "Take the Name of Jesus With You."

79. Devotional service was led by Rev. Lewis Prince. His subject was, "We Still Have Now."

80. Dr. Herbert Howard presented the report on the American Bible Society and discussed the work of the society.

Motion carried to adopt the Report.

The following resolution was presented by Dr. Howard and adopted by convention vote.

American Bible Society Resolution

WHEREAS, this convention recognizes that the American Bible Society renders an essential service to all forms of mission work throughout the world by aiding in Bible translation, publishing the Scriptures without note or comment, and distributing them without profit and usually below cost, and

WHEREAS, in addition to its regular work, the Society is also supplying without charge, millions of volumes of the Word of God for needy people who have been cut off from the Scriptures because of war conditions

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, First that we earnestly request our churches and our people to make contributions to the work of the American Bible Society, all such contributions to be sent through the regular channels to the Baptist state headquarters office, designated for the American Bible Society.

Second, that we approve an offering for the work of the American Bible Society to be taken in the churches on a day to be set by the Board of Directors and to be promoted by our Convention as a part of its mission program.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The world must have the Bible.

1. Jesus Christ is the one hope of men and nations . . . and Christ.
2. In every missionary advance the Bible goes forward first.
3. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Giving the Bible to the World is a Missionary task.

1. Every man must have the Bible in his own native language if the message of Christ is to speak effectively to his heart.
2. Someone must translate the Bible into his language, print it, and send it to him wherever he lives. Since most people in the world are too poor to pay the cost of books, someone must also give to help those who can pay only a part of the cost and many who cannot pay at all.
3. The American Bible Society, supported by gifts, serves as that "someone." As a missionary organization, it aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work throughout the world.

During 1946 the American Bible Society—

—distributed at home and abroad over 11 million volumes of Scriptures;

—sent to Japan more than one-third million Gospels and more than one-third million of the two and one-half million New Testaments requested by Japanese Christian leaders;

—shipped to Germany over one million Scripture volumes and 205 tons of materials for a self-help plan by which the German people and the German Bible Societies will do the actual printing of at least 1 million full Bibles.

1. Hungry-hearted multitudes, especially in liberated countries, Germany and Japan, are eager for the Word of God. But it is a race against time. Their eagerness may not last indefinitely and opposing forces are actively at work.

81. The Report of the Committee on Church History was presented by Dr. Wm. A. Carleton, and after discussion a motion for its adoption was carried.

REPORT ON CHURCH HISTORY

Since the roots of the present lie deep buried in the past and we must know the story of yesterday if we would understand how the present came to be, the study of history is always both interesting and profitable. By a close examination of the past we are able to form some judgment of what the future may be as we avoid the mistakes of our fathers and seek to repeat their successes.

For 115 years the people called Baptists have labored for the Master in what is now the state of Oklahoma. The story of their toils, sacrifices—even persecutions in early tribal days—reads almost like a page from the book of Acts. Unfortunately, the records of these early days have in most cases not been preserved, and even the names of many of the territorial heroes of the faith "of whom this world was not worthy" are rapidly passing from the memories of men. In honor to these valiant witnesses now at home with the Lord, for our own benefit as we seek to fight the good fight of faith, and above all for the glory of their God and ours, we call upon Oklahoma Baptists to take immediate steps to collect, preserve and make available the historical material which is still in existence.

Among the definite steps which should be taken we urgently recommend the following:

1. That someone be charged with the responsibility of collecting Oklahoma Baptist historical material and that such material be kept in some designated depository where it will be protected from fire and other hazards and be accessible to those desiring to make historical studies. This collection should include such things as files of minutes and periodicals, individual church histories, associational histories and, so far as possible personal manuscripts, letters and records which while in private collections have bearing on the story of Oklahoma Baptists. In case the possessors of such material are unwilling to part with it microfilm copies should be prepared for our collection.
2. That an effort be made to encourage someone in each of our associations to write an associational history and that a copy of each history written be secured for the collector of historical material.
3. That suitable markers be placed at spots which are important enough in Oklahoma Baptist history to merit special attention.
4. That those still among us whose memories reach back to the days of dual alignment in our state organization be

encouraged to prepare written memories of those early days, or in any case to grant interviews to those who will prepare such written records.

5. That the board of directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be requested to provide the funds and make the designations necessary to carry out these recommendations.

In conclusion we urge that emphatic publicity be given to the principle that the records and minutes of any Baptist organization belong to the organization and not to the clerk or secretary who prepares them. Such material should always be handed by the clerk to his successor in office until age makes it no longer of any value to the organization at which time it should be offered to some historical collection.

THE DEPARTMENT OF RURAL MISSIONS

Sam W. Scantlan, *Superintendent*

The Baptist Association is more closely related to the churches than any other denominational unit of missionary endeavor. Therefore, we believe that major emphasis should be placed on the promotion of the rural mission work through the association.

The passion of our hearts drives us on to do our best for rural missions. If we can really get our mission program to continue moving like it should, like our Lord would have it move, we can lead greater multitudes of sinners to know our Savior and Lord.

Our continual hastening to preach the gospel to benighted souls will change the destiny of many more from Hell to Heaven.

The Breath of Eternal Life is sweet. We must share it with others. Humanity surges toward Hell, yet it struggles to be free from the impelling, downward drag of sin and satan.

Do we look upon the sea of lost human beings as a place to immerse our lives to the glory of God or as a place to fish out for ourselves a life of personal glory and success?

Let us continue a mighty program of Rural Missions with one purpose in mind—the winning of neglected souls to Christ.

Below is given a table showing some of the results accomplished by a hard working group of godly men—our Oklahoma Baptist Missionaries. These reports are from January 1, 1947, to September 30, 1947, as follows: professions of faith 1845; additions by baptism 1491; by letter and statement 741; churches and missions visited 3274; conferences held 3788; revivals conducted 191; revivals arranged for others 180; Vacation Bible Schools held

76; Vacation Bible Schools arranged 114; schools of missions 32; sermons preached 4902; helped secure 112 pastors for churches; gave 37,654 tracts and scriptures; helped establish 89 mission stations; 22 inactive churches revitalized; \$2,754.88 raised for state missions; \$5,434.25 raised for associations; assisted in erecting eleven new church buildings; and many other things for Christ's cause not on report blanks. We Oklahoma Baptists have the green light to stake out our claims for mission work. [We must train and inspire men to work on the rural field. Christ's work will suffer when we leave our rural churches only with men of lesser gifts of leadership.

This is our day—our only day—our only chance. What will this generation of Baptists do with it? The opportunity will soon pass to other hands.

The association is the handiest and most effective administrative unit Baptists have for good mission work. Our greatness or weakness as missionaries of Oklahoma will largely depend upon how well we can utilize our associational organizations. We can always reach struggling churches and neglected souls more easily through the work of a live associational organization that has a wide-awake God-fearing, soul-loving superintendent of associational missions.

FALLS CREEK

The year 1947 saw more activity in every phase of work, worship and plan than ever before in the long, fruitful life of Falls Creek Baptist Assembly.

FACTS:

Physical property improvements: More than fifty cabins were either built or remodeled; some forty loads of gravel were put on the roads; a new swimming pool was constructed; another ball field was added; the third concrete tennis court was ready for use; three new class pavilions were erected in Young People's Park; electric lines have been brought to the grounds by R.E.A.; a new telephone system is in operation (built since the Assembly); new roads have been opened; two hundred new seats were built; a new water line was laid over the grounds and a pumphouse was built; as well as many other improvements.

It is our desire to have a more efficient water-pumping arrangement, a larger tabernacle and better roads by next year.

The Assembly expenditures from January 1, 1947, to August 31, 1947, were \$55,992.18. The income during that same period of time was \$41,402.92; which leaves a deficit of \$14,589.36.

However, the State Board allotted \$21,000 to Falls Creek and there was a \$3,000 offering taken by Charley Taylor to apply on same which made \$24,000. Subtract \$14,589.36 from \$24,000 and you have \$9,410.64 left in the Falls Creek Fund as of August 31, 1947.

The value of our Assembly grounds has been increased at least \$14,000 through this new construction on Assembly property, while the churches have increased the value much more than that by building and remodeling their cabins. The value of our Assembly grounds is fast approaching the one million dollar mark.

The new attendance record soared to 11,351, which was over 2,000 more than ever attended a previous assembly. The spirit was high and we believe the 1947 Assembly was the best meeting in Falls Creek history in most every respect.

SCHOOLS OF MISSIONS

During the year of 1947 there have been eleven associational-wide Schools of Missions in Oklahoma.

Some of our strongest missionaries, foreign, home and state, have been sent into the churches during that time.

We have had difficulty in our effort of promotion because of cancellations, both of schools and individual missionaries.

Surely this large band of men and women from every mission field have had influence on our increased Unified Budget funds. As the people have seen the various mission fields and opportunities they have been led to give more to missions.

Dr. Lewis W. Martin of the Home Mission Board is director of this work in the Southern Baptist Convention and his help and encouragement have been invaluable.

We urge every association to plan for a School of Missions in 1948. Write Sam W. Scantlan, 223½ West First Street, Oklahoma City, for particulars.

R. C. HOWARD

Pastor, Kelham Avenue Baptist Church, 1924-47

President, Oklahoma Baptist General Convention, 1946-47

Robert Clinton Howard was born at Devine, Texas, June 26, 1887, and departed this life to be with his Lord, May 6, 1947. His entire ministry was spent as pastor of the Kelham Avenue Baptist Church, which he took as a mission and grew to one of the greatest churches in the world. He had an independent income and never accepted a salary as pastor, but put that money into the establishment of missions. Under his leadership, Kelham established twenty-four missions, eight of which are strong self-supporting churches. The church now supports eight missions in Oklahoma County and one in Fayum, Egypt.

Under his leadership, the church ordained 16 preachers who are serving well in the Lord's service.

For ten years, under his leadership, the church led the Southern Baptist Convention in the number of baptisms, according to the May issue of the Sunday School Builder, 1944.

During his 23 years as Pastor of Kelham Avenue Baptist Church there were 3,832 additions by baptism, 3,041 by letter, and 235 otherwise, making a total of 7,108 additions.

Brother Howard was elected President of the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention in November of 1946, and served in the capacity until his death in May, 1947.

Perhaps, the denominational work that he enjoyed the most was the service he rendered the Convention as chairman of the Baptist Orphans' Home Committee that raised \$240,000 for the construction of the new Children's City. He loved orphan children and, in fact, everyone, that was in need physically or spiritually and did everything that he could to alleviate that need.

This good man believed in the tithe as God's program of church finance and preached it with a passion. He believed in missions and led his church and everyone else in giving to the Unified Budget and every other missionary enterprise.

R. C. Howard left us an abiding example of what positive, faithful, earnest leadership will do for a church and for the world. He was positive in his convictions, earnest in his preaching, sacrificial in his living and determined in his pursuit of the will of the Lord.

In recognition of his great work in missions, his organization of churches, his love for orphan children, his business ability, his statesmanship as a Baptist, the Oklahoma Baptist Convention honored itself a year ago in electing him as its president. He was a conscientious and careful presiding officer and during his tenure steered the activities of the convention with a loving and gentle hand till his death.

"Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth: Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them."

As a memorial to this faithful servant of God, my honored predecessor, I move you, sir, that this brief estimate of his work in this state, with this picture, be placed in the minutes of the Convention and an adequate number of copies be provided the family.

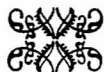

COMMENTS

ORGANIZATION The "Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, without authorized capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed on or about May, 1917, for a term of twenty years, and its amended Articles of Incorporation providing for an organization in perpetuity were placed on record March 6, 1928. Its purpose is to foster Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various members of the denomination in accordance with the instructions of such contributors.

Since November 1, 1935, the convention has had direct supervision of The Baptist Orphans' home, located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The Baptist Orphans' Home was organized in March, 1904 for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital. Assets, liabilities, income and expenses of The Baptist Orphans' Home are treated as a separate "fund", both on the convention books and in this report.

On April 7, 1947, transfer of custody was made by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma of certain investments totaling \$76,776.29, for the following trust and endowment funds:

NOTE RECEIVABLE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

\$85,000.00—This is a noninterest bearing note payable upon demand, secured by assignment by O. B. U. of its claims against the U. S. Government for tuition and other fees on G.I.'s enrolled, on a basis to be paid off as assigned claims are paid by the government. It was given to cover advances by the convention for assistance in meeting obligations of the university, of \$65,000.00 up to December 31, 1946 and a net amount of \$20,000.00 throughout the year 1947, or a total of \$85,000.00. Recorded remittances from O. B. U. disclose this obligation was paid in full by February 5, 1948 but that a new loan was again made on February 28, 1948, under the same terms, to the extent of \$30,000.00.

FUND RESERVES A statement of operating, investment and construction fund reserves for the period under review is presented in Exhibit "C". The operations of the executive office of the convention are divided into the following major classifications:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the unified budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention, the hospitals at Miami and Muskogee, the university at Shawnee, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, and other designated donees.

State Missions—Subdivided into missions, evangelism and brotherhood activities and promotion and administration of all departments of the convention.

Baptist Orphans' Home—Embracing all transactions pertaining to solicitation of monies and supplies, operation of the children's home and care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, and maintenance of the orphanage property.

Sunday School and Baptist Training Union—Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in the churches of the state.

Baptist Student Union and Sacred Music—Coordinating Baptist work in the student union centers at the various state educational institutions and fostering better music in the churches.

Falls Creek Assembly—Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of the assembly property.

Baptist Messenger—Maintaining and publishing a denominational paper known as the Baptist Messenger.

Ministers', Employees' and Widows' Retirement, Relief and Annuity Plans—For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers, missionaries, churches and organizations throughout Oklahoma participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and shared in by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Building Program—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

CONTINGENT LIABILITIES Potential liability with respect to assessment of ad valorem taxes for 1947 on property of the convention, per confirmation letter from attorney, estimated at approximately \$1,150.00.

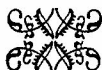

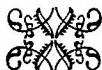

COMMENTS

ORGANIZATION—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock, with its principal place of business at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It was created by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and its articles of incorporation and by-laws were approved by that body in convention assembled at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 28, 1946. Its stated purpose was to build, undergird, and stabilize the agencies and institutions owned and operated by the Convention.

The purpose for which the corporation was formed is that of a private, non-profit, religious association to "purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest, and otherwise dispose of all real, personal, or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated . . . for church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, or any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work; to borrow money, and hold, administer and dispose of property, make conveyances, assignments, incur obligations, and prosecute or defend any action or suits in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to procure funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disperse and invest funds according to designations made and as set out in charter.

On April 7, 1947 there was a transfer of custody from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma of the following investments and their corresponding trust and endowment funds:

CASH—The cash in the operating fund has been maintained in the Liberty National Bank, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, whereas cash for endowments, trusts, and capital improvements has been deposited into The First National Bank and Trust Company, Oklahoma City. The balances in these funds at December 31, 1947, were \$195.20 and \$13,064.76, respectively.

INVESTMENTS—Details of the investment in United States Bonds are set out in Exhibit "F" in so far as type, date of maturity, denomination, maturity, or par value, total cost or issue price, and the funds to which they belong. The total cost or issue price was \$65,966.00. Description of the other investments stated at \$13,525.53 is given in Exhibit "G".

OFFICE EQUIPMENT—Office furniture and equipment to the extent of \$2,479.40 was purchased during the period out of the operating fund.

GENERAL—Surety bonds are carried on Andrew Potter, Secretary-Treasurer, and Mrs. Ira C. (Alice) Prosser, office secretary, in the respective amounts of \$50,000.00 and \$10,000.00.

Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma

PREAMBLE

Desirous of cultivating and stimulating the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and young people of the churches, we the women of Missionary Societies of the Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, adopt the following constitution:

ARTICLE I—Name

This organization shall be known as the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma and shall be auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE II—Object

The object of the organization shall be to cultivate the missionary spirit, especially among the women and young people throughout the State, by the dissemination of missionary information and the collection of funds to aid in the world-wide spread of the gospel.

ARTICLE III—Membership

The constituency of this organization shall be the Missionary organizations of women and young people. Messengers to the annual meeting shall be all members of the Executive Board, all auxiliary counselors and one member from each society with one additional for every ten members or fraction thereof not to exceed ten members from any church.

ARTICLE IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Assistant Recording Secretary, Young People's Secretary, Field Worker, Chairman of Business Women's Circles, Chairmen of Departments and Historian.

Section 2. All officers shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee or from the floor and elected by acclamation at the Annual Meeting and shall enter into the discharge of their duties on January first.

Section 3. All officers shall be elected annually and no officer exclusive of the paid officers shall serve in the same capacity for more than four (4) consecutive years.

ARTICLE V—Advisory Committee

The Advisory Committee shall be composed of seven (7) members to be chosen annually from the Executive Board. These members shall be nominated from the floor and elected at the first meeting of the Executive Board, after the annual meeting of Oklahoma Baptist W.M.U.

ARTICLE VI—Executive Board

Section 1. There shall be an Executive Board composed of the officers of the Union, the District Presidents, the Associational

Presidents, the Oklahoma member of the Advisory Board of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, the Trustee of the W.M.U. Training School, the Oklahoma member of the Advisory Board of the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, the Oklahoma member of the Margaret Fund Committee, and nine members-at-large who shall have rendered active service in W. M. U. work. Twenty-one (21), including two officers, shall constitute a quorum.

Section 2. The nine (9) members-at-large shall serve for one, two and three years respectively, no member being eligible for re-election until at least one year has elapsed. They shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee or from the floor and elected at the same time and in the same manner as the officers.

ARTICLE VII—Time of Meeting

The Annual Meeting of this organization shall be held in two or more consecutive sessions, time and place to be designated by the Executive Board at its first meeting.

ARTICLE VIII—Financial Policy

In accordance with the Preamble, our organization will be maintained for the purpose of inspiration, education, training, and giving; the strength of the organization being used to help raise all apportionments for every phase of the work to which the church contributes. One-third of all the Unified Budget Funds shall be credited to the State W.M.U.

The expense of carrying on the work of this organization is to be provided by the Baptist General Convention and all salaries paid by the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; the work is to be done under the supervision of the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention.

ARTICLE IX—Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present and voting at any Annual Meeting provided the amendment has been submitted in writing at a previous regular meeting of the Executive Board and recommended by the Board to the annual meeting for adoption.

By-Laws

ARTICLE I—Duties of Officers

Section 1. President. The President shall preside at the Annual Meeting of the organization and at all meetings of the Executive Board, appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, shall be ex-officio member of all standing committees and with the concurrence of the Executive Secretary call special meetings of the Board. She shall be a Vice-President of the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 2. Vice-President. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President. She shall co-operate with the president at all times in promoting the interest of the organization and in case of the disability of the President she shall become Acting President. It shall be her duty to promote enlistment and organization.

Section 3. Recording Secretary. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of all business transactions

and of all items of special interest and importance at the Annual Meetings of Woman's Missionary Union, to prepare the minutes for publication and to act as Secretary of the Executive Board, presenting a condensed report of the sessions to the Annual Meeting.

Section 4. Assistant Recording Secretary. The Assistant Recording Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary with her work and in the absence of that officer she shall discharge the duties of the office.

Section 5. Executive Secretary-Treasurer. As Executive Secretary it shall be her duty to conduct all official correspondence of the Woman's Missionary Union and transact all necessary business therewith, to be the medium of communication between the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local societies of the State. She shall have supervision over all departments of the work and shall have correspondence with Baptist papers, unless other provisions shall be made for it, and shall give general direction for the field work, doing such field work herself as time and opportunity shall permit.

As Treasurer, it shall be her duty to receive, acknowledge and pay out of the funds all expense of the work, according to the directions of the Executive Board, keeping always an accurate account of the receipts and disbursements.

As Executive Secretary-Treasurer, she shall make reports to the Executive Board, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Baptist General Convention, and Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention.

Section 6. Young People's Secretary. The Young People's Secretary shall, under the direction of the Executive Secretary, have oversight of the work of all the auxiliaries, and in every way possible shall seek to enlist the young people of our churches, colleges and hospitals in missionary work. She shall make regular reports to the Executive Board and an Annual Report to the Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 7. Field Worker. The Field Worker shall, under the direction of the Executive Secretary, promote WMU work especially in and for rural communities organizing and assisting in training all grades of WMU through conferences, institutes, mission study classes, camps and associational meetings. She shall make regular reports to the Advisory Committee and Executive Board and an annual report to the Union.

Section 8. Chairman of Business Women's Circles. The Chairman of B.W.C. shall endeavor to promote Business Women's Circles where advisable, organizing and instructing as time will permit.

Section 9. Historian. The Historian shall collect data and record significant events and achievements of the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma filing these materials each year at Union headquarters.

ARTICLE II—Executive Board

Section 1. The Executive Board shall have entire management of all matters intrusted to its care and shall have power to

recommend such by-laws and carry out such plans as may seem judicious, provided they are in accordance with the Constitution of the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Section 2. The Executive Board shall bring to the Annual Meeting any recommendations concerning the development of the field and any other matters pertaining to the interest and production of the work which may seem expedient.

Section 3. The Executive Board shall nominate the Oklahoma member of the Board of Trustees of the Woman's Missionary Union Training School, the Oklahoma member of the Advisory Board of the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, the Oklahoma member of the Advisory Board of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and the Oklahoma member of the Margaret Fund Committee.

Section 4. The Executive Board shall have power to fill vacancies in its own number with exception of the District Presidents and the Associational Presidents. These vacancies are to be filled in their respective districts and associations.

Section 5. The Executive Board shall hold semi-annual meetings at the call of the President and Executive Secretary of the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union.

ARTICLE III—Departments

Section 1. There shall be a department of Mission Study, of Stewardship and of Community Missions.

Section 2. Chairmen of Departments. It shall be the duty of these chairmen to assist the Executive Secretary-Treasurer in the development of the Department represented by each. They may originate and present plans to the Executive Board for the furtherance of their respective work, recommend their adoption and assist in carrying them out. They shall keep in touch with their particular department of the work by correspondence and shall make reports in writing to the Executive Board and an annual report to the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE IV—Duties of Advisory Committee

Section 1. The Advisory Committee shall meet four times annually at the call of the President and Executive Secretary.

Section 2. The Advisory Committee shall prepare and submit for adoption at the annual meeting of the Executive Board the budget for the ensuing year as to salaries, printing, postage, traveling expenses, etc., and any plans for all other funds.

Section 3. The Advisory Committee shall have power to act for the Executive Board between sessions of the Board.

ARTICLE V—Standing Committees

Section 1. The following standing committees shall be provided: Obituaries, Recommendations and Scholarship.

Section 2. Duties of Standing Committees.

A. The Obituaries Committee shall present a memorial service at the Annual Meeting.

- B. The Recommendations Committee, together with the State Chairmen, shall meet at the call of the President two weeks prior to the semi-annual meeting of the Executive Board to make recommendations to be submitted to the Executive Board at its semi-annual meeting.
- C. The Scholarship Committee shall meet annually to approve applications for scholarships.

ARTICLE VI—Nominating Committee

Section 1. The Nominating Committee shall be composed of one member from each District or her alternate, all to be nominated from the floor and elected by the body at its annual meeting for the succeeding year, seven constituting a quorum.

Section 2. This Committee shall be called together by the President to organize before the final adjournment of the Annual Convention and shall report to the next Annual Convention following its election.

ARTICLE VII—District Presidents

It shall be the duty of the District Presidents to assist the Executive Secretary in developing the districts, preside at their district meetings and keep in touch with associational officers by correspondence and other ways that will further the interest of Woman's Missionary Union.

ARTICLE VIII—Associational Presidents

Associational Presidents. They shall be elected at the Woman's Missionary Union quarterly rally preceding the Annual Meeting of the Association. They shall have general supervision of the work of the Association and in cooperation with the pastors they shall endeavor to promote the organization of women and young people in all churches, by visiting and holding Associational Meetings.

It shall be their duty to keep in close touch with the State Executive Secretary-Treasurer by correspondence and make quarterly reports of the work done. It shall also be their duty to arrange for and preside over the quarterly meetings of their associations.

ARTICLE IX—Parliamentary Rules

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law, not covered by the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2. Amendments. These By-Laws may be amended under the same regulations as those governing changes in the Constitution.

PROCEEDINGS

Theme: Jesus Shall Reign

The forty-second annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, was called to order by the Tulsa District W.M.U. President, Mrs. Frank Webb, at 7 p. m., November 3, 1947, in the First Baptist Church of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Mr. Ira C. Prosser, director of Sacred Music of the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention, led in singing the hymn: "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

Mrs. Gordon Psalmonds of the First Baptist Church, Bartlesville, was at the organ.

Prayer was offered by Reverend Kenneth Mullins of Buffalo.

"Jesus Shall Reign" was sung by the Young Women's choir, directed by Mr. Paul Green of Immanuel Church, Tulsa.

The recording secretary moved that those whose registration cards had been deposited with the secretaries be recognized as constituting the organization, and that the secretaries be empowered to add to this list from the cards subsequently deposited. Motion carried.

Mrs. Webb appointed the following committees:

Mrs. J. W. Storer, on behalf of the host church, extended a gracious welcome to the messengers and visitors. She introduced Mrs. G. H. Hall, general chairman of the local committee.

Mrs. Webb introduced Miss Vivian Cochran, State Young People's Secretary, who in turn introduced a pageant—depicting the growth and accomplishments of forty years' service of the W.M.U. Training School and the Young Woman's Auxiliary. Y.W.A. girls from Tulsa Baptist Churches participated in the pageant with Mrs. Frank Glosop, Y.W.A. counselor as the reader. Miss Marilyn Kent, Dewey, Oklahoma, sang during the pageant which closed with the Young Women's choir of Tulsa, singing the Training School song, "We Would See Jesus."

The hymn, "Trust and Obey," was sung. Rev. Fred Wilhoite, of Yukon, brought the Scripture Reading, selected passages of worship and praise, for the meditation.

All Home Missionaries present were asked to come forward. Rev. Guy Bellamy, Superintendent of City Missions of Oklahoma City introduced the following: Rev. Jess Dittmar, Rev. and Mrs. Collier, Rev. and Mrs. A. Hancock, Rev. and Mrs. A. Worthington and Rev. Victor Kanuebbe.

"Oh Master Let Me Walk With Thee" was sung by Rev. Kanuebbe, accompanied by Mrs. Psalmonds at the organ.

Mrs. Aaron Hancock made a passionate plea that more missionaries be sent to assist with the work among the Choctaw, Chickasaw, Creek, and Seminole Indians of Oklahoma. She and her husband, under the Home Mission Board, are missionaries to these people.

Miss Martha Thomas Ellis, former missionary to Argentina for five years, and serving later as Home missionary in New Mexico, told of soul winning experiences on these fields of service.

The closing prayer was brought by Rev. Fred Wilhoite.

TUESDAY MORNING

The Tuesday morning session of the W.M.U. was called to order at 9:30 o'clock by Mrs. Webb.

Mr. Ira Prosser led in prayer and then in the singing of "Am I a Soldier of the Cross" and "How Firm a Foundation."

Rev. Pete Jones led in prayer.

A letter from Mrs. Bill Carden, Executive Secretary, was read. She expressed regret that she was not able to attend the convention.

Mrs. Webb introduced Miss Vivian Cochran, Young People's Secretary, who in turn introduced the various state committee chairmen.

Mrs. C. A. Summers, Stewardship chairman, emphasized the need of stewardship of the tithe.

Mrs. L. W. Anderson, Community Missions Chairman, presented the aim of community missions as being soul winning and family altars.

Mrs. Tom Earp, White Cross Chairman, announced that White Cross, as a special department, was being discontinued; that the money on hand was to be sent to the Foreign Mission Board.

Mrs. O. F. Fahnestock, Mission Study Chairman, revealed that 18,000 women and young people had enrolled in Mission Study courses in 1947.

Mrs. A. C. Stewart, in Mrs. Raley's absence, gave the Margaret Fund report. There are two of the Margaret Fund students enrolled in O.B.U. this year—Charlotte Arpaio and Eugene Craighead.

Mrs. Berta K. Spooner, Southwestern Seminary trustee, reported that 169 young women were enrolled in the Seminary Training School. These represented 18 states, with 3 from foreign countries.

Mrs. J. C. Hering, W.M.U. Training School trustee, reported that 267 young women students through a period of 40 years had been sent to foreign fields, including 23 foreign countries. An offering of \$174.00 was taken with which to buy turkeys for Thanksgiving for both Louisville and Southwestern Training Schools.

Mrs. T. W. Stevens, field worker to the Indians, reported that there had been 350 in attendance at their assembly last June.

Mrs. Maggie Bruce, field worker to the Negroes, reported that the women were showing an increased interest in the work by buying more literature and attending study classes in larger numbers.

Miss Vivian Cochran, Young People's Secretary, expressed appreciation for the opportunity of working with Oklahoma young women. Miss Cochran moved that the reports, as presented, be accepted—motion carried. The hymn, "Wonderful Words of Life," was sung.

Mrs. George McDow of Allen brought the Scripture readings.

Mrs. George R. Martin, President, Southern W.M.U., was then introduced and brought a challenging message on the opportunities for mission work in Africa as she saw them this past summer.

The Tuesday evening meeting was called to order at 7 o'clock by Dr. Harold K. Graves, Vice-President of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, since this was a joint session with that body.

Dr. J. W. Storer was introduced and with words of love and devotion paid tribute to Dr. R. C. Howard, the deceased president of the Baptist General Convention. Upon motion by Dr. Storer, Dr. Graves was elected president of the Convention, by acclamation.

Mr. Ira Prosser led the congregation in the singing of "At the Cross" and "Work for the Night is Coming."

The Men's Glee Club of O.B.U. under the direction of Dean Warren Angell, rendered special music.

Dr. Geo. C. Boston brought the Scripture Reading followed by Dr. W. O. Carver who led the convention in its worship period. Hearts were humbled and spirits lifted as Dr. Carver spoke of the "grandeur, majesty and holiness of the Lord God".

Dr. Graves led in prayer.

The report of the committee on Foreign Missions was given by Rev. Earl Stark of Holdenville.

Dr. Graves presented the gavel to Mrs. Frank Webb who presided during the remainder of the program.

Dr. M. T. Rankin, Executive-Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board was introduced and made a plea for a world mission program "big enough for a world".

The Men's Glee Club of O.B.U. brought two special numbers, "Battle Hymn of the Republic" and "Dry Bones".

Dr. Andrew Potter, Executive-Secretary, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, recently returned from a round-the-world tour of mission fields, challenged his hearers to action as he reported that Christianity is the only answer to the ills of the world.

With the singing of the "Hallelujah Chorus" by the Men's Glee Club, the 42nd annual session of the Baptist Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma was adjourned.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

A wee three year old from next door runs in to see me every day and she is a delightful visitor. She loves to bring me astounding bits of news and one day with shining eyes she declared: "My daddy helps me say my prayers every night." At my evidenced interest she repeated in her winsome manner, her "Now I lay me down to sleep"—ending with these words: "Bless all the people **everywhere** in the world and make me a good little girl."

How glad I am that already the heart of that tiny child is endearing in love to encompass the whole world. Her earnest

petition, "bless all the people everywhere in the world," caused me to remember a similar phrase from the old, old story when an angel sang out news of the wondrous event: "Behold I bring you tidings of great joy which shall be to all people—unto you is born this day a Savior."

Both the baby's prayer and the angel's message suggest a condition in the world today that motivates the hearts of Christian women to endeavor to remedy that condition. **All the people**—these are the words that make us mindful of the task that is ours. **ALL the PEOPLE EVERYWHERE**—it is because of them and their need that we study and give and minister. **All the people**—we try to so inform ourselves and each other that these multitudes who so moved the heart of Jesus shall hold us to our labors of love for Him in serving them. **All the people**—who make up this world God so loved that He sent His only Begotten Son—these are the entire cause for the existence of Woman's Missionary Union.

This past year the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma serving in faithful groups throughout the churches has been mindful of our part in the great Kingdom enterprise of carrying the gospel to **all the people**.

This year our State Chairmen, officers, and field workers will share in the report of the Executive Secretary, each bringing the report of her division of the work.

Gleanings from Reports

The number of associations the first of January, 1947, was thirty-four.

First Quarter. Thirty-one associations reported. Seven were 100 per cent in receiving a report from every society in the Association—Beckham, Caddo, Chickasaw, Comanche-Cotton, Concord-Kiowa, Frisco, and LeFlore.

The number of societies reporting were 471, the number doing community missions—299, with 8,500 women engaged in the service. There were 200 won to Christ, new tithers—829, mission study classes—722, family altars established—273, 2 new W.M.S.'s organized, and 45 auxiliaries.

Second Quarter. Thirty associations reported. Eight were 100 per cent—Beckham, Caddo, Chickasaw, Harmon, Mills, Mullins, Salt Fork, and Tillman. Societies reporting—435, doing community missions—223, women engaged in service—7,734, family altars established—343, souls won to Christ—255, new tithers—169, mission study classes—873, new societies organized—8, auxiliaries—10.

Third Quarter. Twenty-nine associations reported. Nine were 100 per cent—Beckham, Caddo, Chickasaw, Central, Mills, Mullins, Muskogee, Salt Fork, and Haskell. Societies reporting—426, doing community missions—235, women engaged in service—6,304, family altars—353, persons won to Christ—131, new tithers—48, mission study classes—532, new societies organized—10, auxiliaries—6.

Fourth Quarter. Twenty-five associations reported. Seven were 100 per cent—Beckham, Caddo, Chickasaw, Mullins, Perry, Salt Fork, and Tulsa-Rogers. Societies reporting—335, doing community missions—227, women engaged in service—4,079, family altars established—307, new tithers—204, persons won to Christ—103, mission study classes—400, new societies organized—4.

You will notice that Beckham, Caddo, and Chickasaw, made a perfect record for the entire year. Mullins, and Salt Fork were 100 per cent for three quarters. There were 42 new societies organized during the year, making a total of 703 societies. A total of 81 societies observed Stewardship Night. We have a total of 1,620 new tithers—grand total of tithers 18,440. Boxes of food and clothing sent to relief valued at \$28,467.88. There are eighty-one 100 per cent churches reported, Perry Association leading with 12, Salt Fork 9, North Canadian 7, Pittsburg and Comanche-Cotton 6 each, Caddo, Chickasaw, Pawnee-Payne, Potawatomie-Lincoln, and Union 5 each, Oklahoma County and Beckham 4 each, Central and Harmon 3 each, and Frisco 2.

REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SECRETARY

According to reports received in the W.M.U. office we have 1,300 young people's organizations, composed of:

372 Sunbeam Bands
277 Royal Ambassador Chapters
475 Girls' Auxiliaries
176 Young Woman's Auxiliaries.

During the past year, records show that mission study seals issued were: 1,032 to Sunbeams; G.A. 2,167; R. A. 1,045; Y.W.A. 854, making a total of 5,098 mission study seals issued.

Magazine subscriptions show 2,261 World Comrades; 763 Window of Y.W.A.; 1,002 Ambassador Life.

The second annual Young People's Director Conference, which was held in February, proved to be larger than the first, with enrollment of 66 directors and counselors.

Eight associations reported young people's camps. They are: Delaware-Osage, Muskogee, Panhandle, Jackson-Greer, Tillman, Caddo, Comanche-Cotton, and Tulsa-Rogers.

There were 5 state camps held this year, instead of the 2 usually held. Junior and Intermediate G.A.s were divided. Junior G.A. camp was held at Falls Creek with an enrollment of 341; Intermediate G.A. Houseparty at Oklahoma Baptist University—290; R.A. Camp, Falls Creek—244; Y.W.A. Houseparty (college girls and nurses) at Oklahoma Baptist University—82; State Y.W.A. Camp, Falls Creek—66.

Estimated attendance at associational and state camps—2,000, with 94 conversions, 78 mission volunteers, and a total World Relief offering of \$824.37.

Foreign missionaries who served these camps are: Rev. and Mrs. John Parker, Chile; Rev. and Mrs. Christie Pool, Africa; E. O. Mills, Japan; Rev. and Mrs. Ming Chang, Chinese students, now in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky; Miss Emily Goon, Chinese student, Oklahoma Baptist University; Rev. and Mrs. L. L. Johnson, Brazil; and Dr. Jeannette Beall, China.

Home Missionaries who served are: Miss Vena Aguillard, Victor Kaneubbe, Rev. and Mrs. V. J. Zunigha.

Other out-of-state guests were Miss Virginia Wingo, teacher of Missionary Education at W.M.U. Training School, Louisville, Kentucky, and Miss Roberta Cochran, Young People's Director, First Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, who served as teachers for Y.W.A. classes at Falls Creek Assembly.

We are thankful for all the faithful, consecrated pastors of Oklahoma, who helped in the camps, and those who served as teachers of the thirteen young people's classes for mission hour during the assembly.

Missionary Night at Falls Creek was under the direction of the Young People's Director and featured the 40th anniversary of Y.W.A. and the W.M.U. Training School.

Thirty-five young women attended Y.W.A. Camp at Ridgecrest, North Carolina. There were five of these who served on the faculty in various capacities: Miss Hanami Nishi, Japanese-American registered nurse of Tulsa, Oklahoma, served as Y.W.A. camp nurse; Miss Abbie Louise Green, as handicraft director; Mrs. J. C. Fowler, as workshop counselor; Emily Goon, as workshop assistant, and Eith Buck, workshop president. Total amount given for World Relief was \$2,104. Of this amount, Oklahoma girls gave \$310.40.

Five young men attended Young Men's Mission Conference at Ridgecrest, North Carolina. They were accompanied by David Owrey, who has served as R. A. field worker during the past two summers.

We have Ann Hasseltine Y.W.A.s on the following campuses: East Central State College, Ada; Northwestern State College, Alva; Oklahoma College for Women, Chickasha; Central State College, Edmond; University of Oklahoma, Norman; Oklahoma Baptist

University, Shawnee; Northeastern State College, Tahlequah; A&M College, Stillwater; and Eastern A&M College, Wilburton.

We have two Grace McBride Y.W.A.s—one in the Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, and one in the Hillcrest Memorial Hospital, Tulsa.

The days spent with the fine young people of our state has been a challenge to me, and continues to be, and I am made to realize anew the God-given privileges and opportunities, which we have as adults in leading young people.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD

I said to a man that stood at the gate of the year,

The Executive Board met in the Assembly room of the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City on January 6, 1947.

Dr. R. C. Howard, president of the Oklahoma Baptist General Convention, brought an inspiring talk on "Oklahoma—Our Mission field." He stressed the need for personal evangelism and the establishment of mission stations.

The report of the Executive Secretary was presented by Mrs. Carden. She reported the W.M.U. budget for 1947 as being \$13,000. The report was adopted.

The various state committee chairmen brought their reports, which were accepted.

Miss Marjorie Keys brought a report on the Ruby Howse fund. The report revealed that \$1,976.99 in cash had come in.

On Monday evening, January 6 at 7 o'clock a "Hearts and Flowers" banquet was served at the Oklahoma Club honoring Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, who served for eight years as President of

Oklahoma W.M.U. and Mrs. C. A. Richards, for 28 years Recording Secretary of Oklahoma W.M.U. Both of the honor guests were presented with gifts.

The Executive Board reconvened on Tuesday morning to make plans for the year's work.

Goals for 1947 were presented by Mr. T. B. Lackey, assistant to Dr. Potter. He emphasized the need of enlisting every member of every church in every phase of our Baptist work.

Letters were read from Congressman Tom Anglin, Mr. M. A. Nash, representing the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and G. L. Harrison, president of Langston University. These people expressed their appreciation for the interest that Oklahoma W.M.U. has taken in advocating better educational advantages for the students of Langston University.

Mrs. Carden set up our apportionment plans for 1948. Mrs. Frank Webb of Drumright moved that the state office send out the apportionment goals for W.M.S.s of the associations to the associational presidents (2) that each apportionment in one sum or amount be sufficient to cover the needs of the various apportionments of W.M.U. work (3) that the percentages of these apportionments were to be worked out in the state office, to meet the definite needs as they arose. The motion carried.

Relative to the State Mission offering in 1947, Mrs. T. W. Stevens made the motion that a committee be named to work with Mrs. Carden in formulating plans for a state mission program. Mrs. Stevens, Mrs. L. J. Hardiman and Mrs. E. A. Jackson were named on the committee. At a subsequent meeting this committee recommended Rural Missions of the main objective for 1947. Their recommendation was adopted.

Mrs. Hering moved that the W.M.U. send a resolution to the Legislature regarding our stand on the presentation of the liquor question to the citizens of Oklahoma—motion carried.

At a meeting of the Advisory Committee on March 13, 1947, a motion was made by Mrs. Carden that we set aside a fund from the State Mission offering not to exceed \$500 to answer calls of worthy students and wherever possible to make direct contact between missionary organization and the student. Motion carried.

The Advisory Committee met in the executive secretary's office on May 22, 1947.

A letter from Mrs. C. B. Means was read requesting that her resignation be considered due to ill health. The request was granted with regret.

Upon motion, our contribution to the salary of Mrs. Maggie Bruce, negro field worker, was raised from \$25.00 to \$35.00 per month.

A motion carried that we supply \$300.00 as requested by Dr. Rounds, for the needs of the Indian Assembly at Falls Creek, June 14-20, 1947.

In a meeting of the Advisory Committee on August 27, 1947 a motion carried granting Mrs. M. S. Whitehead, W.M.U. president, a leave of absence from the attendant duties of her office until January 1, 1948.

A letter from Dr. Courts Redford, of the Home Mission Board, was read stating that \$2,500 was available for scholarships for Indian students.

The Executive Board met for luncheon at 12 noon Tuesday, September 9, 1947, in the Crystal Room of the Skirvin Hotel, Oklahoma City.

Brief reports were brought on the 1947 W.M.U. week at Ridgecrest, North Carolina by Mrs. J. N. McKeel and on the Baptist World Alliance by Mrs. R. Y. Bandy.

The state chairmen brought reports of the work as it has progressed thus far.

Mrs. J. W. Raley's report revealed that funds available for redecorating and recarpeting W.M.U. Memorial dormitory, amounted to \$3,262.24 with a reported expenditure of \$5,125.00.

Recommendation from the Advisory Committee that expenses of the District and Associational W.M.U. presidents to the Board Meeting (three a year) and the expenses of the Associational Young People's leaders to the annual Young People's Leaders Conference be paid by the state W.M.U. Office and that the proportionate share of these expenses be included in the apportionments sent out from the state office. Recommendation was moved for adoption by Mrs. McKeel, seconded by Mrs. Stevens and carried.

A second recommendation from the Advisory Committee was that the W.M.U. of Oklahoma employ Miss Martha Thomas Ellis as a field worker in Oklahoma. Mrs. Anderson moved that we ask her to come. Motion carried.

On Wednesday morning, September 10, the Executive Board reconvened in the fourth floor Lounge Room of the Skirvin Tower Hotel.

Mrs. Berta K. Spooner directed the discussion on constitutional changes. The amended Constitution was approved article by article and then as a whole and recommended to the W.M.U. for adoption.

Mrs. Ira Daniel presented the recommendations for 1948. Motion made that these recommendations be approved. Motion carried.

Motion made by Mrs. Spooner, that we recommend to the W.M.U. that all White Cross funds be sent to the Foreign Mission Board, with the understanding that these funds were to be used for Foreign Mission hospitals, designating that \$1,500 of this fund be used for the Ogbomoshos Hospital. Motion carried.

The Executive Board met in the First Baptist Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma on November 3, 1947 at 2 P. M.

Miss Marjorie Keys presented the 1948 apportionments which were adopted.

Motion made by Mrs. Spooner that we retain Margaret Fund in the 1948 apportionments. Motion carried.

Mrs. Berta K. Spooner introduced Mrs. George R. Martin, president Southern Woman's Missionary Union, who brought an

inspirational message on the opportunities for consecrated leadership.

Thus ended a year dedicated to the highest and noblest purposes for which it is given man to be "co-laborers with God."

It is well we can say this Ruby Anniversary year has been the best in the history of the School with the largest graduating class in any year—71 in May last.

The Anniversary number of the Alumnae Bulletin lists the ways in which well over three thousand students have served the Mission Cause around the world and we give you this most interesting list:—

- 267 Foreign Missionaries
- 87 City, Associational, State, and Home Mission Work
- 103 Served through W. M. U. as Executives, Young People's and office secretaries, field workers
- 178 Worked as church secretaries, Pastors assistants and educational directors
- 52 Good will center work
- 32 served through Sunday School and Training Union departments
- 30 Student secretaries in schools and hospitals
- 45 Faculty and staff members in colleges and special schools
- 21 Taught in mission schools
- 30 Taught Bible in public schools
- 17 Worked in orphanages
- 19 Social Workers
- 1,055 Day students, wives of Seminary students

It is interesting to note that the two hundred sixty-seven Foreign Missionaries heading the list have served in twenty-three Foreign countries and that eighty-seven have become missionaries in the Homeland.

Miss Doris Rippy, Norman

You very graciously granted Miss Rippy a State Scholarship. Already I have in hand an application for a scholarship for next fall and another good possibility.

Quoting from a recent article by Dr. W. O. Carver, long closely connected with the Training School, he says "The School Exists to learn Jesus Christ and to serve Him, and to cause every student to learn Him and become a revealer of Him . . . "In these forty years he has revealed Himself in new ways and in new situations. Seeking ever to see Jesus, the Training School has adjusted plans, methods and materials as far as possible to enable her students to satisfy this ambition to see Him in His beauty, in His purpose, in His power." As the School starts a new decade toward its Golden Jubilee they will continue their glorious quest to "see Jesus" and to help others to "see Him" whom to see and know is life eternal.

REPORT OF SOUTHWESTERN TRAINING SCHOOL

169 Single women enrolled in Training School this year—studying for special Christian work.

122 live in the Woman's Building.

47 live out in homes on the campus.

They come from 18 states, and 3 foreign countries. Texas has the largest enrollment, followed by Alabama, Tennessee, Georgia,

Missouri and Oklahoma. There are 4 from Mexico, 3 from Brazil, 1 from China, and 1 from Massachusetts.

Scholarships—Most of these are service scholarships, that is, a girl does some type of work for the Seminary to show her appreciation for the money. The girls serve as secretaries to professors, helpers in the library, office girls in the woman's building, music monitors, etc. In this way the money for scholarships does double duty; it helps the girl and helps the Seminary. Mrs. W. B. McGarity, a former superintendent of the Training School, introduced this idea. Some of the scholarships are direct gifts to girls, and some states (outside of Texas) have loan scholarships. This, of course, is a matter between the young woman and her state W. M. U.

In the life of the Training School, which is 32 years, 112 young women have gone to foreign fields as missionaries, and many are serving in various capacities on the home field.

8 are volunteers for Home Missions.

26 for Foreign Missions.

10 from Oklahoma, 3 of whom are on scholarships given by the W. M. U. of Oklahoma. Each one of these girls is finding her place of service in Kingdom activities of the city of Fort Worth and near-by localities.

This report will show you the scope of the work the girls do in the churches in Fort Worth: At the close of the semester last year, our girls were working in 30 churches in and around Fort Worth. During the school year, they made 7,633 visits, wrote 20,177 letters, made 5,487 phone calls, had 1,135 conversations concerning individual relation to Christ, led 51 to Christ, and were responsible for 9 re-dedications.

COMMUNITY MISSIONS REPORT

A little boy was overheard to say to his friend, "I surely would hate to wear glasses; wouldn't you?"

"Not if they were my grandmother's kind I wouldn't," he replied.

"What kind are they?" he was asked skeptically.

"Why, they make her see how to fix everything. They make her find lots of nice things for boys to do when they are sick. She sees when folks are tired or sorry and what'll make them feel better. She just sees what everybody needs!

"When I asked her how she could, she told me it was just the way she had learned to look at things as she grew older. Then, of course I knew it was those spectacles of hers."

We know it wasn't, really it was just the love of God in her heart.

In Oklahoma this past year we have had 8,525 women wearing just that same kind of spectacles. One fourth of our women report definite work in soul winning and one-half of our auxiliaries are definitely working at our main task, which is soul winning. We know we don't win souls unless we pray, and that it is not a

mere coincidence that there were reported 514 souls saved, and 513 family altars!

The right kind of glasses enabled our women to do some lovely things for those around them. One family, whose father became paralyzed was given a cow. Because of this kindness shown the whole family became part of the church group. Several organizations have been blessed by their help given to minority groups. One society joined with the women of other churches in their town in getting a petition signed to keep beer out of their town, and they were successful.

Many of our organizations have been blessed by following the community missions calendar of activities as suggested in our state year book. There is a sense of completeness about our work in doing this because our needs are visualized, assignments made and reports turned in.

Some societies this year observed the week of prayer for community missions and soul winning. It is hoped soon that every society will undertake this special week of prayer.

Nineteen centuries ago Christ had compassion and a concern for the multitudes who, He said, were like sheep without a shepherd. Christ then commanded us to make disciples of all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. This command is an imperative for Southern Baptists. We must have a spiritual concern for sinners and suffering humanity in this day of world disorder and unrest and we must begin in our home town and community.

"Be ye doers of the Word and not hearers only." We pray "Thy Kingdom come." As Baptists we must put our words into action and endeavor to bring His Kingdom in by personally speaking to those around us in our own community who do not know Christ. Dwight L. Moody, the famous evangelist to large mass audiences, in answer to the question as to the best method to win souls, said: "Go after them one by one." The individual testimony of a consecrated Baptist will win others to Christ.

With a prayer that Oklahoma women may have the passion to be soul winners,

REPORT OF MISSION STUDY CHAIRMAN 1947

Our attention has been focused, in our 1948 Southwide Year Book, on a rather significant question,—namely, "Has the line been drawn underneath or through Mission Study in your society?" My answer must come from your reports. To date eight associations have a hundred per cent record in reporting as follows: Beckham, Chickasaw, Creek, Frisco, Mullins, North Canadian, Northeast, and Tillman. Ten associations have reported three quarters: Banner, Caddo, Enon, Delaware-Osage, Muskogee, Northwest, Oklahoma County, Panhandle, Pawnee-Payne and Perry. Seven associations reported two quarters: Atoka, Central, Jackson-Greer, Mills, Salt Fork, Tulsa-Rogers and Union. Four made only one report: Bryan, Concord-Kiowa, Harmon, and Pottawatomie-Lincoln. No report was received from Comanche-Cotton, Haskell, Latimer, Le Flore or Pittsburg.

From the eighty reports in hand, I have gleaned the following facts: I find that 21,820 women and young people have been enrolled in 2701 Mission Study Classes. These women and young people have drawn a line underneath mission study and have thereby increased their knowledge, enlarged their vision, grown spiritually, strengthened their prayer lives, improved their efficiency, and given more time, talent, and money to the ongoing of Kingdom affairs.

6434 women and young people went a second mile and received a second blessing by qualifying for the award. That is, they attended more than half the class sessions, read the text, and gave an oral or written statement concerning new facts learned. These, no doubt, will radiate the spirit of missions for months to come because their souls have been set on fire for missions. They are well rounded in their thinking, because their studies have been from World Missions, Missionary Fundamentals and Kingdom Builders. The most popular books have been "Shining Like the Stars" that lead each of us to see our individual responsibility in soul-winning and "Christus Emptor" that delightful gem which made us see that we are stewards of our eyes, ears, hearts, tongues, hands, feet, and even our knees.

What fun we have had keeping our own records on these most attractive folders! Or—did you?

I find that 3386 women and young people went a third mile and have done missionary reading in reading circles. These have, beyond a doubt, encircled the globe in their reading. Therefore, they are better able to interpret present day problems in the light of God's eternal purpose.

We have 31 churches reported in which each W. M. S. member has read at least one Missionary book. I predict for these churches an ever-increasing interest in world-wide Missions because it is impossible for women's hearts to be permeated with missionary zeal and not overflow. May we watch with interest the following churches?—Amber, Bethel, Hawley, Cox City, Calvary Durant, Calvin, Choctaw, Duncan First, Durant First, Foster, Holdenville, Hollister First, Indian Center-Oklahoma City, Konawa, Liberty, Miami Third Avenue, Northeast Oklahoma City, Norman Immanuel, Nicoma Park, Okemah First, Okmulgee First, Pauls Valley Trinity, Prairie View, Pleasant Hill, Pond Creek, Pharoah, Ringling, Stonewall, Silver Lake, Bartlesville, Terral, Trinity (Union Association) and Vici. Don't you wish your church could be included?

Missionary Round Tables have grown by leaps and bounds. In fact, if you don't belong to one you have definitely drawn a line through Mission Study. Last year we had 16—today, we have 64 reported with 776 members. We have had experiences too numerous to mention. We have traveled through the ice and snow of Alaska—listened in amazement as Anna Louise Strong introduced to us the world's largest country, the U.S.S.R.—stopped and wondered as Mrs. Paul Robeson took us on her "African Journey"—sympathized tenderly with the Japanese as we read "Japan, the Son of Heaven"—realized anew the hopelessness of India without Christ, yea, even in the upper caste as we followed Ishvani in the "Brocade Sari"—have a deeper appreciation for medical missions from "Doctors East, Doctors West" weren't you made to think as never before when reading "Quality" about the yellow and white as portrayed in the "Tale of the Twain?" There are many, many others.

According to my reports over 2000 have drawn a line through Mission Study and have had no part in this basic department of all our work. Where have you drawn your line? Where has your society drawn its line? For the sake of Christ, may we all put the line underneath Mission Study and give it its proper emphasis in our W. M. U. organizations by enlisting all our women and young people in some phase of Mission Study.

REPORT OF STEWARDSHIP CHAIRMAN

We have heard a great deal about Stewardship the past two years and have placed emphasis upon its importance in the promotion of the Kingdom work. Unless God's people are faithful in their Stewardship His Work will suffer in every respect. Realizing the importance of Christian Stewardship, we seek to find out through reports what is being done. Woman's Missionary Union has been charged especially with the responsibility of promoting "Tithes and Offerings" though we do not in any manner minimize the other phases of stewardship. During the past two years many have come to know more about God's financial plan and have experienced the joy and privilege of bringing to Him their tithes and offerings though we still have not reached our goal.

Reports have come to me from 29 of the 34 associations during the past three quarters. From these reports we find that there are 19,576 persons contributing to the Unified Budget. 316 Stewardship programs have been presented, 247 Stewardship books studied and the total number of tithers according to reports in hand is 6,593. We sincerely hope that the fourth quarters reports will bring all these figures much higher.

May we put forth every effort to enlist many new tithers during the remaining weeks of this year. When Christian Stewards become more convinced that "Missions wait on Stewardship" surely they will be more faithful in all dealings with the Lord.

We have 89 Churches 100% in gifts to Missions and 64 churches have observed Annual Stewardship Night.

God has wonderfully blessed us in ways too numerous to mention and out of love and gratitude as well as duty we should give to Him all that is due—that the Gospel may be given to all Nations.

REPORT OF WHITE CROSS CHAIRMAN

The time has come for your White Cross Chairman to give an account of this department of work. You recall that the 1947 apportionment for White Cross was raised to \$5,000.00 and you met this in your usual fine way — to the amount of \$5,857.85 —. The value of boxes sent to the two hospitals in the State amount to \$12,514.18.

The Oklahoma policy for a number of years has been to send \$1,500.00 to the hospital in Ogbomosho — Nigeria, Africa — and keep the remaining funds in an accumulating fund for Dr. J. H. Humphrey, for his equipment when he returns to China, and the fund has grown to the figure of \$17,390.01 — and we are keeping this when the world is in such dire need and we do not know when Dr. Humphrey will return.

Even before your present chairman was elected — there had been a question in her mind whether the work should be continued as a separate department. The longer she has served, the more convinced she has become that White Cross has served its purpose — at least for the present time.

It was organized for Foreign Hospital Work — and when we send linens to the Hospitals in our State, that is not carrying out the policy, and these hospitals are owned and supported by all of us anyway — I wrote to eight states and all had discontinued the work.

Then I wrote to Dr. Rankin to ask him to help us in our thinking — that I felt like this money in an accumulating fund should be put to work, of course in Foreign Hospital Work, for it was given for that purpose.

He wrote a long letter to me and said 4 hospitals are open in China and the need of funds is great. They would be glad to accept this money and likely Dr. Humphrey would go back to one of these hospitals.

When I received a letter from Mrs. Carden saying that Oklahoma had not met the goal of Home Missions for two years I could not get away from the fact that White Cross in February is a detour in the way of the main road we are traveling, namely the plan of our churches—giving through the unified budget—then our own three offerings—State, Home and Foreign Missions.

Therefore I recommend to the Committee that we discontinue White Cross as a special department and let the work be absorbed in the many phases of State, Home and Foreign Missions. The State Board meeting, September 8 and 9, passed it unanimously and I hope you will vote for it, when you have the opportunity this afternoon.

If you pass this, all funds in W. C. in the office of Executive Secretary on Jan. 1st, will be sent to the Foreign Mission Board,

the \$1,500.00 going to Ogbomosho and the accumulating fund to Foreign Hospital work as given by you. If Dr. Humphrey returns, the Board will likely send him to one of these four hospitals already opened and running in China.

Dr. Rankin is here and will be glad to discuss this with any of you.

MRS. STEVENS REPORT OF INDIAN WORK

A project that has yielded amazing dividends in joy as well as in the growth of mutual understanding and good will in our state has been this work among our Indians. It gives promise of being a real factor in laying foundations for better relationships between us and our Indian people.

We are thankful to God for the opportunities which continue to multiply. There are so many evidences of increased interest in all of the work of Woman's Missionary Union. The response has been as follows:

Adopting the Standard of Excellence and trying to measure up to the requirements.

Having a New Vision of the chief aims and electing chairmen of all of the departments.

Increased Interest in Young People's Work, 9 women enrolled in Young People's Leaders' course.

Fifteen Societies Observed Home Mission Season of Prayer and Mission Study Classes using as the text book "Shining Like the Stars." Even the men were interested in this book and frequently sit in classes in book on Methods as well. Quick to understand our plan of work, they are more interested in the **Unified Budget**. If their church does not contribute, the women do through the Society. They are most enthusiastic about the all Indian **Assembly** and want it to be an annual affair, 330 attended from this association last year.

The Sunday School and Training Union Convention is coming back to the Standard of pre-war days in attendance. T. U. adopted 8-point Record System.

An Increased Attendance at the Associational Meeting at Sand Creek Church.

A Deeper Appreciation of the program for the entire sessions as was outlined for the past two years. Knowing a year in advance as to their topics and working on them.

A Larger Group of Young People in classes at association—(tell about Gene Harjos and the boys).

Their Bible Conferences are held twice a year—A three-day conference with all groups studying the Bible.

Managing Board Meetings are held quarterly and attended by all officers and a representative from each society.

They are Truly Mission Minded and have sent a new missionary to Texas this year to work with Alabama and Quarsarty Indians, paying the wives of the missionaries a salary. We have four women missionaries, three in Oklahoma, one in Texas and help with Nancy Smith. Their contributions were to interpreters' fund, four women missionaries, Florida Mission, Orphans' Home, Student Fund, Unified Budget, Worldwide Relief, Free Will Offering, and several other funds, amounting to \$4,163.65. Number of Societies 28. Number of Tithers 132.

I have spent seventy-five days on the field teaching Bible classes, Sunday School classes, Missions, Books on Methods. I could not say number of talks made, but hours talked would be a better term. Sometimes we visit churches where no W.M.S. meeting scheduled, but we are invited to take part in service. Many conferences have resulted in an enlarged vision. Much is accomplished through prayer. Forty-two family altars. Many of them now have a definite program including Mission Fields and other phases of the work. Just remember our day at these meetings begins early—5:30 rising bell, Sunrise Service and breakfast and in session from 8:00 to 12:00 with one hour for lunch and back at 1:00 until 5:00—sermon, supper and back in church for evening service. To listen to their singing is a joy to the ear and an inspiration to the soul, especially their Hallelujah song.

The all Indian Mission in Muskogee is growing and many Indians not in church are becoming interested. Seven tribes attended this last Sunday.

May we go from this convention in a new spirit of devotion to all races in our state and help them to a deeper consecration to our one great task—spreading the Gospel.

2. That we follow the Calendar of Prayer for missionaries and Margaret Fund students.

IX. Scholarships

1. We offer scholarships to our three Training Schools to qualified young women who apply through the State W.M.U. office.
2. We offer scholarships from the State Mission Fund to students of other races who are approved by the Scholarship Committee.
3. Renewed emphasis be given to the Foreign Student Fund. This fund is given to students from foreign lands who seek training in our country.
4. A committee of five, including the State Board representatives of the three Training Schools, shall approve all scholarships.

X. Orphans' Home

We continue our local support of the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home through contributions of clothing, canned fruit and vegetables, linens, etc.

XI. Apportionments for 1948

Apportionment to Unified Budget be \$800,000, one-third the amount proposed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma \$266,667.00.

FURNITURE—The furnishings in the office of the executive secretary were increased during the year by the purchase of a second-hand desk for \$25.00. The cost of these furnishings at December 31, 1947 amounted to \$1,233.27 and the reserve for depreciation there-against, \$806.46.

LIABILITIES—The accrued withholding tax of \$302.70 was re-mitted to the Collector of Internal Revenue during the course of our examination.

DESIGNATED FUNDS—\$39,245.24—This amount represents the total of the unexpended balances of the designated funds shown in detail in Exhibit "D".

OPERATING RESERVE—A Statement of Operating Reserve and Designated Funds for the period under review is presented in Exhibit "B". Except for the designated funds mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the operations are general in nature and are subdivided as follows:

Program Supplies—For resale

Other General —Including all financial transactions not applicable to a specifically named fund.

Records available for our inspection did not permit an analysis of funds as to date of inception, original amount provided, subsequent contributions, or changes effected periodically by organization income and expense.

GENERAL—Fidelity bond is carried by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma on all employees, at \$10,000.00 each.

A certificate was obtained from the acting executive secretary of the organization to the effect that all liabilities were recorded upon the books at the balance sheet date, and that there were no litigations or contingencies of a legal nature pending at December 31, 1947.
