CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

Article I—Name

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Article II—Constituency

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers appointed by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. *elect*

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

Article III—Object

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This Convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the great commission.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1.

- a. "The officers of this Convention shall be a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Recording Secretary, an Assistant Recording Secretary, an Executive Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Historical Secretary. It is hereby provided that the Executive Secretary may be Treasurer.
- b. And that in the event of the removal from the State of the President while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the First Vice President.
- c. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the Second Vice President shall succeed to the remainder of the term."

Section 2. Article VI—Board of Directors *elected*

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors ~~appointed by~~ this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This Board shall consist of the President and Recording Secretary of the Convention and ~~thirty-two (32)~~ ⁴⁸ other members who shall be chosen by the Convention, at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years, eight ~~12~~ of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The Board shall, in case of vacancy, elect a ~~Corresponding~~ ^{Executive} Secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of this Board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be Treasurer of the Board. *secretary*

from Section 4. This Board shall ~~appoint~~ ^{elect} all missionaries, fix all salaries of all workers employed and determine the fields of work for each. *except 1000*

Article VII—Proceedings

Section 1. The proceedings of the Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the Secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches. *3*

Article VIII—Annual Meetings

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Article IX—Special Funds

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

Article X—Change of Constitution

revised Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendment be recommended by the Board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in Oklahoma Baptist State paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BY-LAWS**ARTICLE I**

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of Directors shall be ~~thirty-four (34)~~ ⁵⁰

The President of the Convention shall be Ex-officio President of

the Board of Directors, and the Recording Secretary of the Convention shall be Ex-officio Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. ~~Eight~~ ²⁰ of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this Board for a period of one year. *add*

Section 3. The date for the annual meeting of the State Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the ~~Board of Directors~~ as herein provided for, unless the Convention itself in its annual meeting designates the day and place where its next annual convention shall be held, provided that the Board of Directors for good cause may advance or postpone the date set for the annual convention and may likewise select a place for the holding of the convention. *Committee select*

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the Directors the remaining Directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term, ~~of the Director whose place shall be vacant and until the election of a successor.~~ *semi-annual*

Section 5. The Directors shall hold ~~quarterly~~ meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

~~Section 6. The Board of Directors after its first meeting after the adoption of these By-Laws shall by proper action designate the day upon which each quarterly meeting shall be held as above provided.~~ *eliminate*

^{6 16} Section 6. Seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the Directors an Executive Committee and ~~shall designate for such Committee a Chairman, who shall continue to be Chairman of the Committee during the pleasure of the Board of Directors. The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.~~ *6/21/91*

Section 2. All actions of the Executive Committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Executive Officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention itself.

~~Two Vice Presidents, selected by the Board.~~

> A Recording Secretary elected by the Convention.

> An Assistant Recording Secretary, elected by the Board.

A Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, elected by the Convention.

executive secretary

A Historical Secretary, elected by the Board.

Section 2. All Officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the Board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the Executive Committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

~~Section 4. The Vice President, in the absence of the President, shall perform the duties of the President of the Board.~~

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a General Counsel to represent the Board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The Treasurer shall make ~~quarterly~~ ^{annual} reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors, ~~in books provided for that purpose.~~ He shall attest with the President all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of Secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of ~~Corresponding Secretary~~ ^{executive secretary} and Treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the Directors at any regular or special meeting of the Board, provided that the notice calling the Board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws, will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the Directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the Board without notice.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section ~~4~~ ^{Part in Section 3}. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section ~~4~~ ³. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except that in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the Board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section ~~6~~ ⁵. The Board of Directors through the President and Secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from usual operating expenses, until any has been presented to the Executive Board and published in the Baptist State paper at least six months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year. *Part of section 1 to be included* *ex. 1, B. G. C.*

Section 2. No new enterprise shall be launched by any group or agency of the Convention without notice served as provided in Section 1.

Section 3. In case any proposal not so conforming with this request comes to the Convention direct, it shall be laid over until the following Convention a year hence.

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION

Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Tuesday, October 30, 1951—6:55 P.M.

Convention Theme: "Higher Ground"

Scripture: Numbers 13:30 "Let us go up at once"

Music Under the Direction of Ira C. Prosser

1. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma met in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, at 6:55 p.m. on Tuesday, October 30, 1951.

2. Mrs. James Read, Altus, gave a five minute organ recital for meditation.

3. President W. A. Carleton called the Convention to order with the following historic statement: "Although neither a wedding ceremony, nor the adoption of a new name, changes the birthdate, there is some confusion concerning just how old we are as an organized Baptist general body.

"The Baptist General Association of Indian Territory was organized in 1876. This is the seventy-sixth annual meeting since that organization.

"The Baptist Missionary and Educational Convention of Indian Territory was organized in 1883 at Tahlequah. This is the sixty-ninth annual meeting since that date.

"The Oklahoma Baptist State Convention was constituted in 1895. This is the fifty-seventh anniversary of that organization.

"The Oklahoma Baptist Convention came into existence in 1897. This is the fifty-fourth anniversary of that organization.

"In 1900 the two conventions in Indian Territory united, and the same year the two general bodies of Oklahoma Territory became one.

"In 1906 the Convention in Indian Territory united with the Oklahoma Convention and the combined organization took the name of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. This is the forty-sixth annual meeting of this body.

"Take your choice according to your light; the seventy-sixth, the sixty-ninth, the fifty-seventh, the fifty-fourth, or the forty-sixth annual meeting will now come to order."

4. W. J. Reynolds, Minister of Music of the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, led the song service. Songs used were: "All Hail the Power," and "O Zion, Haste."

Mrs. James Read, Altus, was at the organ and Dr. Robert E. Beddoe, Shawnee, was at the piano.

5. Reverend J. E. Kirk, Oklahoma City, led in prayer.

6. Mrs. George McDow, Allen, led the devotional service with the subject: "The Name of Jesus—King of Kings." Mrs. McDow led in prayer.

7. Miss Martha Sue Standridge, Oklahoma Baptist University, sang: "The Name of Jesus."

8. The Committee on Credentials was appointed by President Carleton to report on Wednesday morning at 9:55 a.m. The Committee was:

HOME MISSION REPORT

One Hundred Six Years of Home Missions

Southern Baptists in one hundred six years have employed 48,134 home missionaries for one year or one missionary for 48,134 years. Home missionaries have organized 10,012 churches and reported 1,011,134 professions of faith. There has been one profession for every \$34.97 expended by the Board.

In recent years the Convention has added 988,642 square miles of territory to the home mission field and 22,000,000 people.

In the western states, the four western provinces of Cuba, the Canal Zone, Panama, and Alaska there are 75,000,000 people with 25,000,000 of them unchurched.

In 1950 the Schools of Missions Department promoted 136 simultaneous schools in which 3,309 churches participated and 959,193 gross attendance was registered, making a grand total of attendance of Schools of Missions in the past four years 4,768,710.

The Five-Year Crusade in Home Missions, which is now in its second year of operation, seeks to double the number of Good Will Centers, to add 500,000 unaffiliated Baptists to our church membership, to double the number of churches in the outposts of the Board's mission field, to have every church in the territory of the Convention winning souls, to establish 181 missions in the language-group field, to secure 200,000 subscriptions to **Southern Baptist Home Missions**, to publish and distribute annually 200,000 mission books, and to secure a total attendance of 5,000,000 in Schools of Missions. For this, it needs an annual operating budget of \$2,000,000 and an annual capital needs fund of \$4,000,000.

In 1950 there were 754 missionaries plus 271 student workers for the summer making a total of 1,025. The missionaries reported 32,600 conversions. They made 231,393 religious visits, distributed 87,241 Bibles and portions and 1,130,261 pages of tracts, taught 18,512 classes, conducted 3,958 revivals, opened 598 new missions, and constituted 293 new churches.

In addition to the above accomplishments there were 259 chaplains who reported 6,120 professions of faith, and the evangelistic staff reported 5,989 baptisms in crusades which they personally conducted and a total of 9,922 additions to the churches in those

crusades. The radio programs were responsible for many conversions. The number cannot be tabulated.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

The Foreign Mission Board has lengthened its cords and strengthened its stakes in all parts of the world during the past year. Funds for Foreign Mission Advance have enabled the Board to establish new stations in almost every country in which it has work, and in four countries in which Southern Baptists have not been represented before. We have never before had as many foreign missionaries on the field as we have now.

Lengthening

The largest number of missionaries ever appointed by the Board in any one year (111) were appointed in 1950, giving a total force of 803 active missionaries. Thirty more have been appointed during the first four months of 1951.

Our four new mission fields are Ecuador, Peru, Southern Rhodesia, and Malaya—placing our missionaries in a total of twenty-eight countries. The other countries are: Arabia, Argentina, Brazil, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Gold Coast, Guatemala-Honduras, Hawaii, Israel, Italy, Japan, Jordan, Lebanon, Mexico, Nigeria, Paraguay, Philippine Islands, Spain, Thailand, Uruguay, Venezuela, and Switzerland. (Korea, also, was entered by our missionaries in February, 1950; one of the missionaries forced out by the outbreak of the war the following June expects to re-enter in 1951 to administer relief.)

A total of 15,620 baptisms reported on the foreign field, exclusive of China from which no report came in 1950, lengthen and strengthen the Baptist influence in those lands.

Strengthening

Two hospitals are under construction in South America where we have never had a hospital before. One of them is being opened in Asuncion, Paraguay, the latter part of 1951; construction began on the other in Barranquilla, Colombia, late in 1950. Our first hospital for medical service among Moslems is located at Ajloun, Jordan. A gift from Anglican missionaries, the hospital will be manned by Baptist personnel in 1951. Medical work has been strengthened all over Nigeria with four hospitals now where only one was maintained for many years.

Strong international theological schools which have been located at strategic points will strengthen our work for years to come. Dr.

Josef Nordenhaug's inauguration as first president of the seminary in Switzerland in the fall of 1950 launches that institution into the full stream of European education. Advancing the Argentina seminary to international status assures strong theological leadership for the southern section of Spanish America. Plans for opening a similar institution in Colombia promise the same service for the northern section.

Inauguration of agricultural missionary leadership in two mission fields launches a new service which will deepen Baptist influence among people in farming areas. One of the agricultural missionaries is stationed in interior Brazil; the other at a co-operative Hebrew settlement in Israel.

Division of the North Brazil Mission strengthens missionary effort in the equatorial area. The new Equatorial Mission includes the Amazon Valley, far away from Recife, the center of North Brazil Mission work.

The Future of Advance

Every new missionary, every new station, every new institution established requires much more than the initial financial outlay which inaugurates their services. Dr. M. Theron Rankin, executive secretary of the Board, estimates that \$3,000 is the minimum yearly requirement for every new missionary added to the foreign mission staff.

The Foreign Mission Board's total receipts for 1950 were \$6,014,909.49, an advance of \$695,644.45 over the preceding year. Virtually all of the increase came as a result of the allocation to the Foreign Mission Board of all Co-operative Program receipts in excess of \$6,500,000. But in 1951 other commitments of the Co-operative Program make it necessary to change the Co-operative Program budget figures to \$7,000,000 before the excess can go wholly for foreign missions. That means Foreign Mission Advance is stopped unless Co-operative Program receipts are higher in 1951 than in 1950. Oklahoma Baptist goal for 1952 is \$1,000,000 to meet this Advance. The 1950 Lottie Moon offering receipts totaled \$1,854,634.59. Oklahoma Lottie Moon offering receipts were \$95,753.17, surpassing our goal by over \$20,000. The 1951 offering is still before us to increase our gifts this year.

Advance is definitely related to how well-informed Southern Baptists are about the needs of the world. **The Commission**, your world journal, should be received and read in every Southern Baptist home. In order to keep step with the program of Advance your committee recommends the following support for 1952:

1. Continued use of Tithers Enlistment Visitation program as a means of enrolling every member in every church in the program of Advance.
2. Adoption by each church of the slogan "Up-two in '52" as a means of enrolling every church in the program of Advance.
3. Supporting the special Lottie Moon Christmas offering for a greater increase in foreign missions.
4. Enlisting our youth to answer the call to world missions.
5. Continually praying for God's world program.

Mr. Clarence White was director, Mrs. Glen Magers organist and Dr. Beddoe was at the piano.

17. Dr. Alfred Carpenter of the Home Mission Board, spoke on Home Missions with the subject: "Ye Chosen Seed."

18. Mr. Bill Reynolds led the congregation in singing "Take the Name of Jesus with You."

19. Dr. M. Theron Rankin, Executive Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, was introduced and spoke on the subject—"World Revolution and World Missions." He emphasized the challenge to Christianity that comes from the upheaval of down trodden and depressed mankind throughout the world. Dr. Rankin led in prayer.

26. Dr. Claybron Deering, Chairman of the Program Committee, presented the proposed program and motion carried for its adoption, subject to necessary changes ordered by the Convention.

27. The Committee on Credentials reported that at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, October 31, there were 933 messengers and 293 visitors registered making a total of 1,226 enrolled. "We recommend that these messengers, together with those who may subsequently register, shall constitute the Convention."

28. The Orphans' Home work was presented by Superintendent H. Truman Maxey. A number of the smaller children sang several beautiful songs.

29. Reverend Maxey spoke in the interest of the Home.

30. Reverend Judson Cook, Field Secretary of the Home, led the Convention in a cash offering which totaled \$400.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME

The ministry of the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home in caring for children has a lot of similarity to the beautiful word picture used by Isaiah in describing the coming Messiah—He said, "He shall feed his flock like a shepherd. He shall gather the lambs with his arm, and carry them in his bosom . . ." Isa. 40:11.

Upon the record has been written the names of 1,504 children who have been admitted into the care of our Home within its life's span of 48 years. These are the little ones carried near the heart of our Baptist people.

Six fine young people graduated from high school this past

spring. One girl and two boys are now enrolled in college. There are eleven high school seniors this year.

The world condition of unrest was evident in intake and dismissal of children. Forty-five new ones entered the Home and fifty-nine were dismissed. A number of applications for admission have been made and are being processed as rapidly as possible.

The building program is looking up. A \$1,000 check was received from settlement of a will. The building fund should be \$30,000 by January 1. It will take \$85,000 to build a new cottage unit to house the twenty-three little girls now living in the old building basement. We recommend that construction be started on a new building when the money is in hand and that building plans be prepared for approval of the building committee of the Executive Board.

November 18 is the accepted date for the annual Thanksgiving Offering with "Tuck Me In" as a motto and "One Day's Pay" as a goal for every Baptist in Oklahoma. Every department of the denomination is pushing this offering. Many churches are planning on this offering to be their major contribution for the year. It is very important that extra special effort be given in the promotion of "One Day's Pay."

The art and science of child care is working at its best in our Baptist Home through the effort of our fine Christian workers. Through the gift of the Baptist people, by their prayers, and by their faith, they shall carry the homeless children near their hearts. The Baptist Orphans' Home is the heartbeat of Oklahoma Baptists.

31. Reverend Alvin Hedin presented the Report on Religious Literature and motion was made and carried for its adoption.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

For Oklahoma Baptists the BAPTIST MESSENGER is the major medium among magazines for the distribution of the missionary message to an ever enlarging circle of readers among the families of our churches.

The BAPTIST MESSENGER, more than any other periodical, unifies our people by its news from the churches, the associations, the State Baptist Convention, the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Baptist World Alliance. The MESSENGER brings to us a balanced distribution of material in doctrinal, devotional, promotional and inspirational articles.

The highest circulation achieved by the BAPTIST MESSENGER so far this year was that of the week of September 6 when our press run was 56,561. We now have 571 churches with the MESSENGER in their budgets, 69 churches with club subscriptions and 401 churches where the people are not receiving the paper. The paper has gained 5,000 circulation since the first of the year.

The management is now in process of installing new equipment for addressing the MESSENGER to the subscribers in a more speedy and economical manner. The BAPTIST MESSENGER is a blessing to the lives of our people and an indispensable assistance to every pastor in the state in promoting the cause of Christ.

The BAPTIST MESSENGER gives a large place to Home and Foreign Missions and encourages our churches in the use of Southern Baptist Home Missions, and The Commission. The MESSENGER commends most highly all of the publications of the Sunday School Board to our constituency.

Southern Baptists are justly proud of their 35 Book Stores, cooperating with the Sunday School Board in providing the choicest literature for home and church. Among the services offered by these agencies is to cooperate with churches in the setting up of Church Libraries. This is at least one definite step in counteracting false propaganda and in providing positive Christian reading matter of varied emphasis.

We recommend:

1. That all the churches not now receiving the BAPTIST MESSENGER in Budget or Club Plan be encouraged to enlist that all our people be informed and inspired.
2. That churches now enlisted, keep their list up-to-date by adding all new families.
3. That we express our appreciation to our efficient and capable Editor, Dr. Jack Gritz, for the noble work he is doing.
4. That we commend the Baptist Book Stores to our people for a wider use in book selections and that we urge the establishment of a Church Library in every church without such ministry.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Meeting in Annual Session, Oklahoma City

October 30-November 1, 1951

It is with a sorrowful heart that The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma records the Homegoing of Dr. Andrew Potter on August 29. Dr. Potter, as Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, led in the organization of The Foundation, and served as its first Secretary-Treasurer. He, also, served as a Director. As the years go by, the Baptists of Oklahoma will more and more appreciate his foresight in leading the Convention to establish The Foundation for the purpose of undergirding, and perpetuating our Baptist agencies and institutions.

The present program of The Foundation includes the procuring, investing and safeguarding of funds for the capital and endowment needs of Baptist agencies and institutions.

The first big job in this program is to inform our people regarding the work of The Foundation.

Dr. Augue Henry, the successor to Dr. Potter as Executive-Secretary of The Foundation, completed two years of service on September 15, 1951. During these two years, he has spoken in every section of Oklahoma, promoting the work of The Foundation. He has been in the pulpits of practically all of the larger churches, and many of the smaller ones. He has spoken in one or more associational meetings in every association in the state, except four. He has been the evangelist in eight revivals in Oklahoma, and in one outside the state.

Three tracts have been given wide general distribution:

"The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma"—a general tract,

"Some Practical Helps for Reaching a Major Objective"—prepared especially for the Brotherhood organizations; and

"Have You Made Your Will?"—a general tract on wills.

An article has appeared weekly in the BAPTIST MESSENGER, and material has been furnished to pastors and associational leaders for publicity in church and associational publications. Also, the secular press has carried stories pertaining to The Foundation.

A Public Relations Program has been inaugurated to form an acquaintanceship with organizations, such as lawyers, bank and

trust officials, tax experts, accountants, publicity and advertising consultants, and outstanding businessmen. Dr. Henry was elected Secretary of the Southern Baptist Foundation Executive Secretaries at their annual meeting in Nashville, Tennessee.

The Foundation has been emphasized as being a Service Organization as well as being the Permanent Trust of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and for all agencies and institutions owned and operated by the Convention.

In addition to being a Service Organization to our agencies and institutions, The Foundation is qualified to be of service to individuals in making trusts and in writing of wills. It is a policy of The Foundation to furnish legal and other services in the writing of trusts or wills without a service charge when The Foundation is made a beneficiary for the use and benefit of any Baptist agency or institution.

Also, the Executive Secretary will serve as executor of wills without a service charge when The Foundation is made a beneficiary.

In its annual meeting in 1950, the Convention authorized The Foundation to elect representatives from the Associations to what will be known as an **Advisory Council of The Foundation**. It will take some time to complete this matter, but considerable progress has already been made.

GIFTS

As a large percentage of the contributions to The Foundation are received in trusts and as bequests in wills, the only way for the Board of Directors to present a complete report if its receipts is to include the value of gifts in trusts and in wills on the basis of the appraisal of the donor at the time the trust or wills were written.

The total **cash receipts** for the two years' period covered in this report amount to \$257,887.74. This total includes income from investments and contributions for the following: OBU Endowment, Ministerial Tuition for students at OBU, Student Loan Funds for students at OBU, The Field House and the Ford Music Building of OBU; The E. C. Routh Memorial Fund for Summer School for Preachers; Orphans' Home Endowment, Orphans' Home Building (Kerr); Baptist Student Union Centers at O. U. and A. & M., and the Falls Creek B.S.U. Center; Miami Hospital Trust Fund; Memorial Baptist Hospital in Oklahoma City; The Hollums Building; Holcomb Annuity; Foreign Missions-Lemen-Hill Trust; Falls Creek Tabernacle Improvement and Undesignations.

We have on file **34 wills** that have been written during this period, which include bequests for the following: Orphans' Home, Oklahoma Baptist University, The Foundation, American Baptist Theological Seminary (Negro), Oklahoma County Association, Baptist Student Union Work, Hospitals, Foreign, Home and State Missions, and local churches. The bequests in wills, and the face value of two insurance policies have a total appraised value of \$433,600.

In addition to the above, we have received **deeds** to oil and mineral rights that are difficult to evaluate. Also, The Foundation has been made the beneficiary of **oil and mineral rights** on land in ten different counties in Oklahoma.

Then, there is **The Hollams Building**, valued at \$125,000. and stocks worth \$12,660. which are included in this report.

The total contributions (Sept. 15, 1949-Sept. 15, 1951) in cash, trusts, stocks and bequests in wills amount to \$829,147.74.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The policy of the Board is to give first attention to security in the investment of trust funds. Every contribution received by The Foundation is safeguarded as a sacred trust. The Board has connections whereby they can get the best in advice on investments. No fund is invested without the approval of the Investment Committee of the Board of Directors.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The first observance of "MAKE YOUR WILL MONTH" during April, 1951, was the beginning of a needed annual emphasis. With the cooperation of associational leaders, pastors and churches much good can be accomplished for the cause of Christ by designating a month in the Calendar of Activities of the Baptist General Convention as a time for putting special emphasis on wills. In keeping with the recommendation made by the Southern Baptist Foundation Executive Secretaries organization, we recommend that JANUARY be observed as "Make Your Will Month" instead of April. We recommend that every possible effort be put forth to inform our people regarding the writing of wills and the importance of putting the "Will of God" in their wills.

II. In keeping with the action of the Southern Baptist Convention, and in keeping with last year's action of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, we recommend that SEPTEMBER be designated as "FOUNDATION MONTH," and that cooperation be given toward informing our Baptist constituency regarding the work of The Foundation.

III. In addition to urging our people to contribute to The Foundation through trusts and wills, and large cash gifts, we recommend that individuals of smaller means be encouraged to contribute through The Foundation's Club Plan.

This type of program kept up over a period of ten years would give us from this source alone over \$5,000,000. for needed building and endowment funds.

IV. We most earnestly appeal to every Baptist to give his utmost cooperation in the endeavor of The Foundation to do a gigantic service which has been assigned to it by the Convention.

BAPTIST BOOK STORES

There is no way to measure the results of the work of the book stores accurately. We can get some idea of the things they are doing from the report of sales, operating costs, etc. The reports for 1950 show a total increase in sales of the two stores in Oklahoma of 47.85% for 1950 over 1946, the year the Tulsa store was opened. The Oklahoma City store shows an increase of 18.02% for 1950 over the sales for 1946 for this one store. The operating costs for 1950 show an increase of 75.16% for the two stores over the 1946 operating costs, of this the Oklahoma City store shows an increase of 40.49%. For the first eight months of 1951 the Tulsa store has more than reached its goal of a 15% increase over 1950 while the Oklahoma City store lacks less than 1% of having reached its 15% increased goal.

During the year 1951 the Oklahoma City store as the state store has had representatives with displays of books and materials in sixteen state sponsored meetings, one representative at the Southern Baptist Convention and representatives with books at the meeting of the National Baptist Convention, Incorporated, in Oklahoma City. This is a book store ministry which usually costs the store in actual money spent but one which we are always glad to give for the help we may bring to the support of our Baptist work. We are finding it necessary to limit our representation with the displays to state sponsored meetings because of the numerous requests which we have. We are always glad to supply any church with book displays for special occasions or to send them to camps or assemblies but we find we cannot furnish a person to take care of the display except for those which are state meetings.

BROTHERHOOD

The past year has been a very successful one in Brotherhood work.

1. As of October 1, 1951 there are 504 churches reporting Brotherhoods.

2. Seventy-nine new Brotherhoods were organized during the first nine months of 1951.
3. All 39 of our associations have a functioning organization.
4. There were 5,770 men in attendance at the evening services of the Evangelistic and Missionary Conferences in January, 1951, with the associational Brotherhood Presidents presiding.
5. The state Brotherhood Convention for 1951 was well attended. The following officers were elected to serve during this year.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the group attending the state Brotherhood Convention.

BE IT RESOLVED that we reaffirm our faith and determination to carry forward the following program of activities for 1951.

- (1) Believing that the chief task of every Christian and every church is to win souls to Christ, we would urge our men to make EVANGELISM Primary.
 - (2) We, also, commit ourselves to the MAN AND BOY MOVEMENT.
 - (3) We assure our wholehearted support of the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM.
 - (4) We commit ourselves to the support and promotion of THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION of Oklahoma.
 - (5) We further recommend that the Brotherhood accept as a Fifth Objective assistance in the enlistment of all our pastors and church workers in the MINISTERS RETIREMENT PLAN and in the WIDOWS SUPPLEMENTAL ANNUITY PLAN.
6. This department cooperated with the Woman's Missionary Union by paying the salary of Mr. Bob Banks of Baylor University as field worker with the Royal Ambassadors for the summer.

In order that the men of Oklahoma may more efficiently and effectively serve the Lord through our churches we would recommend:

1. A Brotherhood organization in every church, making regular monthly reports to the church and quarterly reports to the associational Brotherhood presidents and the state Brotherhood secretary.
2. That our associational Brotherhoods be thoroughly organized and that the presidents be asked to make regular quarterly reports to the associational boards and to the state Brotherhood secretary. Also, that the dates and places of meetings for the quarterly Brotherhood rallies be planned immediately and included in the calendar of activities for the association.
3. That the above named activities adopted by the state Brotherhood Convention be accepted as our Brotherhood activities in Oklahoma for 1952.
4. That the state Brotherhood Convention be held Tuesday, March 4, 1952, in Oklahoma City.

46. Reverend E. W. Westmoreland presented the workers in the Department of Religious Education and reported the activities of his departments.

DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

During the last twelve months the churches in our state have made greater progress in their educational programs than in any twelve month period in the history of Oklahoma Baptists.

Sunday School

Our Sunday school enrollment on October 1, 1950 (1951 figures not yet available) was 238,062. Our net gain in Sunday school enrollment last year was 18,354. This is the largest net gain ever reported in a single year.

For the first time, churches in our state report a total of more than 50,000 training awards, of which 25,458 were teacher training awards earned by the workers in our Sunday schools. This is an indication that our Sunday schools are not only growing in numbers, but in a better Bible teaching program as well.

The quality of work being done is also indicated by the fact that we had 457 Standard Sunday school units last year. Oklahoma was second only to Florida in the total of Standard units.

During the month of March, eight district Sunday school conventions were held with a total attendance of 3,112.

Vacation Bible School

Seven hundred and fifty-four Vacation Bible Schools were reported, with an enrollment of 63,895 pupils and 14,503 faculty members, making a total of 78,398. Sixty-four and seven-tenths per cent of our churches had a Vacation Bible School last year. There were 1,897 professions of faith in 458 schools, and 469 schools reported a total mission offering of \$9,508.

Training Union

Our Training Union enrollment on January 1, 1951 was 78,256, which was a net gain of 8,059. There was at that time 779 churches with Training Union work, including 1,006 Nursery, Beginner and Primary units, 782 Junior unions, 616 Intermediate unions, 607 Young People's unions and 1,034 Adult unions, making a total of 4,045 organizational units.

Twenty-six thousand eight hundred and twelve Training Union awards were earned during the last year. This is the largest number of awards ever earned in a single year.

On May 26, 1951 the Annual Youth Rally, sponsored by the Training Union, was held in Shawnee on the Oklahoma Baptist University campus. At the time, the statewide Young People's Better Speakers Tournament, the Intermediate Sword Drill and the Junior Memory Work Contest were held. The winner of the Intermediate Sword Drill, Miss Janet Matthews of Oklahoma City, and of the Better Speakers' Tournament, George Smith of Chickasha, went on to the Southwide Assembly at Ridgecrest and both won first place. Oklahoma has had many Southwide winners, but this was the first year to win both events.

Falls Creek Assembly

The Department of Religious Education sponsored 67 classes at our Falls Creek Assembly in 1951. For four successive days, attendance at the Training Union Hour exceeded 4,000 and attendance at the Sunday School Hour was more than 3,000.

Associational Work

More and more this department appreciates the work of our associational officers, both in Sunday school and Training Union. Our associations are better organized than ever before, which accounts for the unusual progress made in the program of Christian education. The superintendents of missions in the various associations have made a tremendous contribution to Sunday school and Training Union. They, more than anyone else, promote Vacation Bible School, the teacher training program and the all-church training schools in the association.

The future of Sunday school and Training Union work in our state is extremely promising for two reasons in particular, we have more educational buildings than ever before and a larger number of trained workers. More space provided, larger organizations and better trained workers assure a bright future for Oklahoma Baptists.

47. Dr. J. F. Murrell, of the Miami Baptist Hospital, represented the four Baptist Hospitals in Oklahoma and submitted the following report:

BAPTIST HOSPITALS IN OKLAHOMA

In the past four years, Oklahoma Baptists have made considerable advancement toward supplying hospital needs. Thousands of dollars have been spent for new equipment and building repairs in Miami and Muskogee. Thousands more must be spent. Two new hospitals have come under our supervision, one at Mangum and one at Perry.

For a denomination such as ours, to be effective in the health field in a glorious way, we must give immediate and serious consideration to a large metropolitan hospital. You should see immediately, I am suggesting a large general hospital for Oklahoma City, controlled by the Baptist General Convention of the state. We are commanded as much to heal as we are to preach and teach. It is apparent Baptists have woefully missed the third part of our three-fold commission.

For Baptists to undertake a ministry of healing and to be, for the most part, wholly reliant on outside forces to carry out this ministry does not seem proper to me. As a hospital administrator, I must point out to you our obligation to medical science and Christian institutions to train doctors and nurses.

We must realize the tremendous advances in medical science and with every advance, new responsibilities are placed on us, as Baptists, to furnish our share of the vehiclurism on which these advances in science will be carried to a needful and suffering people.

To do this, we must have in Oklahoma, a large metropolitan hospital carrying a quantity of pay and charity cases that will be adequate to furnish teaching material to interns and resident doctors.

In addition to furnishing these facilities to people from every nook and corner of this state, we must be brought to procure and furnish the best and finest medical and surgical care and, let it be said that this service will be provided at Baptist hands for the glorification of our Lord.

I will point out the collective statistics of the four Baptist hospitals in Oklahoma compared favorably with the larger Baptist Hospitals. These statistics have been compiled in caring for people with an immediate need with no view to training personnel to increase the availability of medical care to our people. Our report reads thusly: Total patients treated, 7,031. Total patient days of service rendered, 34,164. Total babies delivered, 1,151. Total charity done in our hospitals \$14,421.91. The total contributions from Baptist sources with which to sustain this charity load, was only \$7,824.24.

Six years ago, I stood here and reported an average cost of hospitalization per day of less than seven dollars. During these six years, the cost of medical care in Baptist Hospitals in Oklahoma has risen beyond \$15 a day. I hasten to add however, this increase in cost of hospital care in the Baptist hospitals in Oklahoma is less than the average over-all increase nation wide.

There have been a number of factors to consider. For instance an analysis of patients in 1951 showed something over 45% of our patients beyond fifty years of age. The same analysis of patients admitted in 1928 show 11% of our patients fifty years of age or older. During that same period of time, the average length of stay in our hospital reduced from seventeen days to six. I call to your attention the great change in medical treatment. Ten years ago, a case of pneumonia in a person sixty years of age or older required from 21 to 30 days in a hospital. Now it requires 72 to 96 hours. A few years back, children were brought into the hospital with diphtheria, small pox, and various infectious diseases with their complications. Now, practically all of these have been done away with. In the six years I have been in Muskogee, in so far as I know, not one case of diphtheria has been admitted. To wipe out these diseases and to treat the rare cases that do appear, penicillin, streptomycin, terramycin, aueromycin, cortone, ACTH, blood banks with their whole blood, blood plasma, and now a synthetic plasma is on the market, all must be furnished at great expense. These drugs push the daily cost up, but the total cost down. It takes millions and millions of dollars and thousands and thousands of research tests to bring about such results. To my mind it is a deplorable fact, Oklahoma Baptists have not made, in the past, the contribution to Christian medical care that they should.

The School of Nursing of the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital has operated on patient income. We have gone along from year to year graduating from six to twenty girls. These girls have taken their place in the medical world as assistants to doctors, staff duty nurses, supervisory nurses, general duty nurses, industrial nurses, and many have given service to the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and the Air Corps. A few have given their lives the same as your sons.

In my mind, it is high time that we Oklahoma Baptists realize we have a duty to suffering mankind to furnish capable Christian professional people to help man the battle line against suffering and disease.

The cost of operating the School of Nursing in the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital is becoming increasingly harder to bear. Most people still think a nursing school is a means whereby a hospital obtains cheap labor. There was a time when this was true, but it no longer remains. In this state during the past two years, two hospitals in Oklahoma have closed their schools because it was impossible to defray this cost from patient income. It is a thin thread that is holding ours together at this time. A School of Nursing is expensive. We can hire everything our students do, done for less money than it cost to maintain a school.

I would caution you further, ours is the only church hospital School of Nursing in the State except those operated by the Sisterhood of the Catholic faith. I maintain that we, as Baptists, can not afford to abandon the field to the sisters. Neither can we afford to operate a school of inferior quality. Our school must meet the requirements of the Nurse Examining Boards. Our faculty must be on Junior College level. Oklahoma Baptists must put some money into the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital School of Nursing or it will close, because the sick people are not going to underwrite this expense much longer and allow Baptist people or any other sectarian group to take credit for it. **Our school of Nursing must be an educational institution and not a sweat-shop for under privileged girls.**

It has been my main objective as the administrator of your hospital in Muskogee, to increase the strength of our Nursing school facilities and to this end, the Lord has graciously blessed our efforts. Today, we have four teachers with college degrees. One teacher has her Masters degree and another is working toward hers, and still another is studying toward her Baccalaureate. Our graduates are Registered Nurses any place. All Nurse Examining Boards of the forty-eight states grant reciprocity to the graduates of our school who have successfully passed the State Board of Nurse Examiners of Oklahoma. Our graduates have training, the quality of which earns for them forty odd college hours toward a degree, if they want further education. Our graduates are full-fledged professional people. We must as Baptists, with the help of the Lord, continue to train these girls.

We have several girls now who want to enter training, but can not afford the cost of tuition. Why can not at least a dozen churches in this state afford a scholarship of \$250 to train a nurse in a Baptist hospital School of Nursing? Our churches should by all means, aid in recruiting students for Nurses training.

During the past five years, there has been opened some 1,500 hospital beds in this state, but there are not trained nurses and technicians available to staff these hospitals. There are new hospitals in this country today that can not open because of personnel shortage. There are wings of hospitals that have been in existence for years that are closed because of the shortage of nurses. Your sons are in the Army hospitals in Korea today suffering perhaps because of a shortage of nurses. I know of a four-million dollar Shriner's hospital completely built and equipped that is standing closed because it can not find the people to staff it.

Everytime we turn our radio on, we hear it. Everytime we look in our papers and magazines we see it, as we drive down our high-

ways the bulletin boards proclaim "MORE NURSES NEEDED." It is a high calling. Humanity needs them. God can use them. We appeal to you as Oklahoma Baptists to increase your support of the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital program.

48. Reverend J. A. Pennington gave the Report on Evangelism and discussed this phase of the work of his department.

EVANGELISM

"Christ is the Answer." Not only has this become a slogan with Southern Baptists, but also it is a living reality in the lives of thousands of people who have found Him as Saviour in recent years. "Christ is the Answer" has become the imperative that has led us on as Southern Baptists in a unified program of Evangelism. Since the inception of this unified program of which the Simultaneous Revivals are a part there has been a gradual but a consistent increase in the number of baptisms reported by our churches. This is due, in a large part, we believe, to this cooperative effort in the promotion of our main business, Evangelism.

Since there are "multitudes in the valley of decision" and our people are awakened, as never before, to their need of Christ, we feel that "Now is the time" to "thrust in the sickle" and reap the harvest that is now ripe. We should use every type of evangelism, such as personal, visitation, local church, youth-led, Simultaneous and any other means that the Lord can use to keep the fires of evangelism burning and reach as many people as possible for Christ "while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work."

A forward step was taken by the Department of Evangelism in the election of Dr. Thos. P. Haskins as State Evangelist. Dr. Haskins was elected by the Board of Directors in its July meeting. His election has received the enthusiastic endorsement of our people. He is now dated for several months. Churches desiring his services should write him at his office in the Baptist Building, Oklahoma City.

Youth-led revivals are growing in favor with our churches. They have become a part of the annual program of many of our churches. This department again sponsored a youth team for the summer. The team composed of J. N. Harber, Preacher; Miles Seaborn, Singer; and Ray Ferguson, Pianist led in six meetings with good results. Many of our pastors have reported very successful youth-led revivals during the year.

The following recommendations for our 1952 Program of Evangelism were unanimously approved at the state Evangelistic Conference and by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention in its semi-annual meeting July 17.

1. That the Evangelistic Conference be held January 21-23, 1952 in the First Baptist Church, Ponca City.
2. That EVERY ASSOCIATION in the state be encouraged and urged to have Simultaneous Revivals in 1952; each as-

sociation to set its own date as soon as possible and have the Steering Committee elected in order that thorough plans might be made; and that every possible effort be put forth to ENLIST EVERY CHURCH in the association to participate in the Crusade.

3. That we urge each church to have at least two revivals each year (one a Simultaneous Revival) and if possible to have a Youth-led revival.
4. That we urge the churches to have a regular consistent visitation program to reach the lost.
5. That every pastor be encouraged to form a Church Council on Evangelism, and that this council give careful study to those things which would contribute to a Perennial Program of Evangelism.
6. That special effort be given to conserving the results of Evangelism and the indoctrination of all the members of the church.
7. That each association continue to elect an Organizer and Chairman of Evangelism.

In keeping with our southwide program of Evangelism we would further recommend that each association give consideration to the advisability of setting a permanent date for their annual associational Simultaneous Revival.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

For Nine Months—January to October, 1951

"Laborers Together With God"—Our Permanent WMU Watchword

Woman's Missionary Union exists to cultivate and stimulate the missionary spirit, the study of missions, the practice of missions and the grace of giving to missions among the women and young people of the churches. This organization bears the relationship of auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, supporting and promoting all phases of missionary endeavor of Oklahoma Baptists. Woman's Missionary Union reports to the convention at its annual meeting and at its Board of Directors Meetings and through space in The Baptist Messenger weekly seeks to keep Baptist women informed on mission work in the state, the South and the world.

Oklahoma WMU is one of 22 state groups banded together forming Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention. Oklahoma women bear their share of responsibility to those needs of Southern WMU as well as benefiting from

the work of this Union. The responsibility of support of the WMU Training School is shared by Oklahoma WMU to the amount of \$1,200.00 annually and also annually \$300.00 is sent for the Margaret Fund Burney Gifts. Oklahoma WMU paid in 1951 toward the WMU Building in Birmingham, purchased this year, \$215.52 which is that much beyond the \$10,000.00 pledged and paid during 1949 and 1950.

Oklahoma again had its full quota of sixty delegates besides the many visitors to the Southern WMU meeting in San Francisco. This state Union had 25 representatives to attend the WMU Week at Ridgecrest. From Southern WMU comes quantities of WMU literature for free distribution in our state.

Mrs. Dan M. Reed, President of Oklahoma WMU serves as one of the Vice-Presidents of Southern WMU. She and Miss Hutchison, Executive Secretary, and Miss Green, Young People's Secretary, serve on various committees of Southern WMU and attend the Joint Sessions where the plans and program of Woman's Missionary Union are worked out.

Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma receives its support from the Cooperative Program of Oklahoma Baptists. For 1951 that amount was \$20,000.00. Because the Union believes that the Cooperative Program is the first duty as well as privilege of Baptist women and young people, the Standard of Excellence for each grade of WMU organization requires that at least 75% of the members must be regular contributors to missions through the Cooperative Program. The percentage is actually far higher than that.

The relationship of the State Union to the association and local WMU organizations is one of cooperation in the great work of mission study and giving. The state Union provides meetings for inspiration and practical helps, brings many missionary speakers into the state each summer, prepares programs for associational, local and state missions, sets forth a plan of work and mails out great quantities of WMU and mission literature.

And so the organizations are closely knit together, cooperating for mutual helpfulness, each dependent upon the other. Therefore reports are gathered to see the progress of the work to encourage greater efforts for the cause of missions. No one person can boast over reports because the totals are the results of many people's efforts, whose work was made possible because of helpfulness of the larger organizations. Rather all together women—locally, in associations, in the state and in the South—rejoice over any and all progress in missions and missionary organizations.

Change in WMU Promotional Year

Since in June 1951, Southern WMU voted for its promotional year to run from October to October, Oklahoma WMU did likewise at its Annual Meeting in October, joining the plan already used by all but two or three states. Therefore this report will be for only nine months, from January 1951 to October 1, 1951, in order for us to start our new year right.

State Promoted WMU Meetings

January Evangelistic and Missionary Rallies. Although these are promoted and planned by the administrative office of the Baptist General Convention, since many associational unions consider this a quarterly rally, more time is given for WMU work. Misses

Hutchison, Green and Ellis, Mrs. Earl Stark and Mrs. A. C. Stewart represented the Union at the thirty-nine associational rallies in which there was a total attendance of 3,764 women in the conferences.

State WMU Board Meetings. The February WMU Board had 51 members and 29 visitors present. The September WMU Board was attended by 56 members and 46 visitors. Most of the visitors were the young people's directors of the associations whose way was paid to the February meeting by the State WMU and to the other meeting by their association.

State Business Woman's Circle Federation Meeting. Business women numbering 217 from 47 circles met in Norman for their Third Annual State Federation Meeting. Officers elected were: President, Mrs. R. R. Bullis, Tulsa; Vice President, Mrs. J. A. Cowling, McAlester; Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Mary Ann Shaw; Chorister, Miss Ann Marshall, OBU; Pianist, Mrs. Clarain Rains, McAlester, and a new State BWC Adviser, Mrs. W. R. Fisher, was elected for approval at the Annual WMU Meeting.

State Assembly Miss Green, young people's secretary, served as Dean of the Mission Hour at the State Assembly at Falls Creek. Eleven classes in missions were provided, most of them being taught by missionaries or nationals. These were Miss Yuriko Yagi of Japan, Rev. and Mrs. J. D. McMurray from Uruguay, Miss Irene Smith from Argentina, Mrs. Ira Marks, home missionary to Mormons in Utah, Bill Nakihiro from Hawaii, Bob Banks, Misses Green, Ellis and Mary Elizabeth Williams and Betty Ware.

Summer Rallies Into Oklahoma during the months of June, July and August, there were brought 25 missionaries, nationals and missionary speakers who made 93 assignments, some of which were ten days in length, reaching more than 8,000 people. There were six state young people's camps, 22 associational camps, 3 district or regional camps and assemblies reaching 4,389 people. There were 34 associational rallies in which these speakers presented missions to 4,277 people. This makes a total of 8,666 people reached with a missionary message. Some of the speakers were Miss Lucy Smith, China; Miss Lucy Lan, China, Miss Yuriko Yagi, Japan; Miss Irene Smith, Argentina; Rev. R. F. Ricketson, China; Rev. C. F. Landon, missionary to deaf; Dr. Eugene Hill, China; Rev. Charles Singer, Latvia; Rev. Seferina Jojola, Isleta, New Mexico; Miss Vena Aguilard, home missionary; Dr. and Mrs. J. C. Pool, Rev. and Mrs. J. A. Harrington, Brazil; Rev. and Mrs. J. D. McMurray, Uruguay; Miss Pauline Cammack, Santa Fe Indian work; Miss Gladys McClannahan, Mexican work; Mrs. Ira Marks, Utah; Miss Regina Sliger, home missions; Rev. R. G. Van Royen, home missions; Dr. Guy Bellamy, Negro work; and others.

WMU Week at Ridgecrest Twenty-five Oklahoma women, eight were business women, went on the chartered bus to Ridgecrest for WMU Week. Among the group were several present and past state chairmen and present state officers.

Southern WMU Meeting in San Francisco Oklahoma again had its full delegation of sixty delegates with many visitors for the WMU Annual meeting. Several made the trip by bus and cars, stopping enroute at ten home mission fields and two foreign mission fields of Southern Baptists.

State Mission Study Institute In August a State Mission Study Institute was held to present teaching helps for the five books in the foreign missions graded series for 1951. Of the 39 associations, 29 were represented, also one Indian association had representatives, with a total attendance of 266. Each group of five from an association was to return to hold a mission study institute for all mission study teachers in the churches. Reports show that 26 associational institutes were held with 1,751 women attending.

Summer State Workers Mr. Bob Banks served our state as a summer Royal Ambassador Secretary, directing the two State RA Camps, assisting with associational RA Camps and the assembly. His report is separately given.

Miss Mary Elizabeth Williams served as the summer training school student worker, assisting Miss Green with all six of the camps, teaching at the assembly and other camps.

Other State Work Miss Abbie Louise Green, young people's secretary, held many state meetings for young people, promoted more and better WMU young people's organizations in our churches. Her report is separately given.

Miss Martha Thomas Ellis, WMU Field Worker, is constantly on the field teaching, holding conferences, encouraging, enlisting and inspiring our WMU constituency. Her report is made separately but here is a summary which does not give the entire picture. She conducted methods conferences in 7 associations for 25 churches, taught the Manual of WMU in 5 associations for 28 churches, taught 9 mission study classes, attended 24 associational and district meetings, assisted with 3 associational mission study institutes, attended many state meetings and camps, spoke 74 times for missions and WMU.

DISTRICT MEETINGS

For the second year now, the District WMU Meetings have been held in the fall and in the fashion of methods conferences. There were eight simultaneous conferences held both morning and afternoon in each of the fourteen districts. All 39 associations had women present from 332 societies. Total attendance was 2,600 women. Those leading the conferences were Miss Edith Stokely, Community Missions Director for Southern WMU; Mrs. H. B. Wilhoite, Mission Study Chairman; Mrs. A. B. Cockrell, BWC Adviser, Mrs. W. E. Price, Orphans' Home Chairman; Mrs. R. E. Hagood of Arkansas, Young People's Director; Mr. Jerome Zickrick of OBU, Christian Education; and the state workers, Misses Hutchison, Ellis, and Green. Mrs. B. Frank Belvin was the missionary speaker and Miss Stokely spoke inspirationally on community missions each day. An offering of \$580.42 was given at these meetings to help in small ways with Indian missions in Oklahoma.

ASSOCIATIONAL WORK

Local WMU organizations make quarterly reports to associational presidents and young people's directors. From these tabulated associational reports the state compiles the record for each quarter for the organizations in the state. Of the 39 associational presidents all 39 reported one quarter and 37 reported the other two quarters of this nine months' year.

These associations have a Standard of Excellence to grade themselves by, just as a society does. Five associations made the

A-1 grade for the nine months, namely: Beckham, Mrs. B. S. Hawkins, president; Enon, Mrs. C. C. Hutson, president; Frisco, Mrs. Foster G. Brown, president; Oklahoma County, Mrs. C. L. Fike, president and Pottawattomie-Lincoln, Mrs. Leroy T. Taylor, president.

Most of these associations hold rallies of one sort or another each quarter. The attendance reported for the first quarterly rally was 3,252, for the second quarter 3112 and the third quarter 2987.

Although there are on the mailing list 745 missionary societies, only 588 reported the first quarter, 532 the second and 550 the third. Had all societies reported every quarter one can readily see that the totals in all phases of our WMU work would be better.

It is from the quarterly reports sent in from associational presidents and young people's directors that the statistical information was gathered for this nine months' report.

ASSOCIATIONAL BWC FEDERATIONS

Business Woman's Circles in four associations have federated, calling themselves Associational BWC Federations. They are Craig-Mayes, Enon, Oklahoma County and Tulsa-Rogers Associations.

FULL GRADED A-1 WMU

One and only one Woman's Missionary Union in Oklahoma for the year 1951 made the record of being Full Graded A-1. That is Idabel First WMU and so to Mrs. Dale H. Griffin, WMU president, to Mrs. John Strutton, Young People's Director and to the pastor, Rev. John Strutton, go our congratulations and honor for this high achievement.

A-1 MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

The following 35 missionary societies attained and maintained for the nine months the A-1 Standard of Excellence grade: Ardmore First, Arnett First, Chattanooga First, Clinton First, Durant First, Edmond First, Elgin Paradise Valley, El Reno First, Frederick First, Frederick South Deep Red, Healdton Bethel, Healdton First, Hugo First, Idabel First, Kiowa First, Leedey, Mannsville, Miami First, Mooreland First, Newkirk First, Oklahoma City Capitol Hill Oklahoma City Kelham Avenue, Oklahoma City West Tenth, Okmulgee Calvary, Okmulgee First, Picher First, Putnam City First, Shawnee First, Stringtown First, Sulphur First, Tulsa Calvary, Tulsa Red Fork, Velma Waynoka First and Weatherford First.

STATE WMU APPORTIONMENT

In order to have funds for our share in certain Southwide obligations we have set up a State WMU Apportionment of \$11,600.00 which is divided among the associations who in turn divide their apportionment among the societies according to their ability and willingness. No society is obligated to pay this but is requested to have this share in these worthy objects that our WMU appropriation from the Cooperative Program cannot take care of. Soon after October 1, 1951 the receipts had passed the apportionment set so every item in this apportionment will receive its full share and more. Twelve associations paid in full their apportionment from the state and 444 societies paid in full that requested of them by the association.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR TRAINING SCHOOLS

Woman's Missionary Union rejoices in the scholarship help it has for worthy young women to attend one of four Southern-Baptist-conducted training schools. The Scholarship Committee acts upon the applications, carefully considering the requirements, recommendations, etc., before granting the scholarships.

At Southwestern Training School these young women are using a scholarship: Mary Elizabethe Williams for her second year, Miss Cherri Loper second year, Ruth Bridges and Frances Long for their second year but first to use the scholarship, Margaret Ball, Mary Fitzer and Monda Marlar, all first year students.

At the WMU Training School there are three scholarship students this year: Yuriko Yagi from Japan, Odessa Walker and Marion Rohrbach.

Lois Williams used a scholarship for the year 1950-51 at Golden Gate Seminary but married in the summer so did not request renewal of her scholarship.

Mary Eliska Gentry finished at the New Orleans Seminary in May, 1951, and there is no scholarship student there for the 1951 year.

OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS

Two Seniors at Oklahoma Baptist University, Lucille Stidham and Stella Wapskinch, Indian young women, are receiving a scholarship from Woman's Missionary Union. Ramona Osborne, a Sophomore, is using a scholarship for this her second year at OBU.

Vassa Casey, an Aleutian girl from Alaska, will be helped when she needs help. Upon entering she had sufficient help to carry her along for a while.

At the National Baptist Training School in Nashville, Mary Ritter Threat has completed two of the three years of training on a scholarship from WMU.

50. Mr. Ira C. Prosser presented the reports on Church Music and Baptist Student Union and spoke concerning the work of these departments.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH MUSIC

The progress of the church music program in Oklahoma is receiving widespread recognition from the leaders of church music throughout the South. This progress is due to the teaching and training program being promoted by the state, associational and local church music leadership, together with the cooperative spirit of fellowship, on the part of Oklahoma Baptists, who more and more are expressing, in a tangible way, a desire for better church music.

Five years ago, there was only one full time minister of music in the state. At present, there are fourteen well trained workers giving their full time in the music program of a local church. Although the addition of full time directors to our church staffs is a comparatively new realm of ministry, one can readily see the field is definitely established. It is encouraging when churches indicate they are ready for a full time graded music program. This plan for expansion demands a lot of unselfish adjustment on the part of the leaders of all the organized work of the church.

In addition to the full time directors, there are many capable individuals serving as combination music and education directors. There will always be a need for such workers to serve in this dual capacity.

Church music has been promoted, during 1951, through a seven-point program:

I. **THE PLANNING MEETING**, early in the year to which the associational directors, full time ministers of music and state officers were invited, expenses paid, to plan the year's work.

- a. A **Committee** was appointed to study the plans and progress of our present program and to recommend new areas of service for further development and training. Persons comprising the Committee: Loren R. Williams, First Church, Tulsa, Chairman;

Thad Roberts, Jr., Exchange Avenue Church, Oklahoma City; Edwin Chenoweth, First Church, Pauls Valley; Mrs. Gordon Psalmonds, First Church, McAlester; and Mrs. Alma Booth, of Poteau.

- b. The following **State Officers** were elected to serve in 1951: Thad Roberts, Jr., Exchange Avenue Church, Oklahoma City, President; Kenneth Myers, First Church, Lawton, Vice President; Mrs. Gordon Psalmonds, First Church, McAlester, Accompanist; and Miss Bonnie Schmickle, State Office Secretary.

II. SECTIONAL AND LOCAL CHURCH SCHOOLS OF MUSIC

—The excellent response to the promotion of this phase of our work is gratifying.

III. STATE CHURCH MUSIC LEADERSHIP CLINIC — This fifth annual Clinic was held in Oklahoma City, in May, and attracted a representative group of the leadership in our churches, as well as the leadership from some of the churches of other denominations. A very prominent faculty led the two-day Clinic: DR. NOBLE CAIN, Noted Composer and Conductor; MRS. B. W. NININGER, Church Music Director, Arkansas Baptist State Convention; and DR. ROBERT G. McCUTCHAN, Outstanding Author and Lecturer. The contribution these eminent leaders made to the Oklahoma church music leadership, through the Clinic, will bear fruit for many years to come.

IV. ASSEMBLIES: (a) **Falls Creek**—A graded music program was offered, using fourteen of our most qualified music directors in Oklahoma as teachers. These classes, together with a great chorus choir under the direction of Dean Warren M. Angell, provided what many have said was our greatest Falls Creek music program. (b) **Kiamichi** The State Department provided the music program, using four students from our colleges and universities: Ruth Rivers, O.C.W.; Rose Elaine Lewis, Okmulgee; Wesley Forbis, Tulsa; Victor Varner, O.B.U.

V. SOUTHWIDE CHURCH MUSIC CONFERENCE, RIDGECREST, N.C.—This conference is fast becoming one of the most popular meetings at Ridgecrest. Oklahomans are justified in being proud of the five music directors from over the state who served on the faculty.

VI. THE TUNING FORK—This paper, published periodically by the State Department, goes to all the choir directors in the state. It is proving a means of contact in promoting the work.

VII. CHURCH MUSIC MONTH—More and more our people are rallying to the challenge of a special month to emphasize church music. In cooperation with the Southern Baptist calendar, September is the month designated for this observance.

Special Objective for 1952

I. Promote **FIVE MISSION MUSIC SCHOOLS** in needy areas that will agree to cooperate in reaching their constituency.

II. Begin a program to stimulate interest in hymn playing and accompanying.

III. Encourage Hymn Festivals, local and associational, and sec-

tional Graded Choir Festivals, looking toward the time when we can have a State Hymn Festival.

DEPARTMENT OF STUDENT WORK

Baptist Student Union (B.S.U.) work for 1950-51 has been guided through the six annual promotional emphases followed by Oklahoma Baptist student leadership and students:

I. THE STATE STUDENT CONVENTION was held with the First Baptist Church of Norman, in November, 1950, with the students of the Oklahoma University serving as hosts. Despite the fact that college enrollments have decreased, within the past several months, the attendance reached an all-time high. The program was built around the theme, "That All May Know Christ." Among the outstanding speakers were Reverend Jack Robinson, of the Southwestern Seminary; Dr. Roland Q. Leavell, President, New Orleans Seminary; Mr. William Hall Preston, of the Southwide Department of Student Work; Dr. W. R. White, President, Baylor University; and Dr. John M. Wright, Pastor, First Church, Port Arthur, Texas.

II. STUDENT NIGHT AT CHRISTMAS—More and more of our churches are capitalizing on this annual opportunity to give their college students, who are home for the Holidays, the privilege of sharing their spiritual experiences through the ministry of the Baptist Student Union.

III. THE ANNUAL PLANNING MEETING was held in January, at which time the student leadership shared ideas and ideals for the work, including effective promotional techniques.

IV. STATE STUDENT RETREAT—The student secretaries, state officers and newly elected Executive Council officers from the colleges and universities met at Falls Creek for the Retreat, in April. Out-of-state speakers included Dr. Courts Redford, of the Home Mission Board; Mr. Robert S. Denny, of the Southwide Department of Student Work; Dr. John Price, of the New Orleans Seminary; and seven student secretaries from the State of Texas who led the simultaneous work-shop conference periods. Drs. Andrew Potter and T. B. Lackey also shared in the program.

V. Another "GREATER THAN EVER RIDGECREST" was held in June. Some seventy Oklahoma college students joined 3,000 fellow students from the Southern Baptist Convention in the annual Student Retreat. Among the outstanding speakers was Oklahoma's own Senator Robert S. Kerr.

VI. FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY—The Student Center Building, provided by friends of students, gives opportunity to demonstrate the work of the B.S.U. to thousands who come to the Assembly. This, together with the classes offered for prospective college students, explaining the ministry of the Baptist Student Union, pays off in untold values when the students arrive on the campuses to begin their college careers.

OTHER PROMOTIONAL ACTIVITIES, DURING 1951

I. SIMULTANEOUS "YOUTH-LED" REVIVAL CAMPAIGNS were held in nineteen college centers in Oklahoma, October 14-21.

This is the largest number of schools participating in a like Campaign held elsewhere in other states of the Southern Baptist Convention. We are grateful for the cooperation of pastors and people throughout the state, in this effort.

II. **THE BAPTIST ALUMNI** of the state schools have been organized for a three-fold purpose: a. To educate them to the benefits of the program; b. To enlist their cooperation in getting all the Baptist students to participate and profit from the local campus B.S.U. program; c. To solicit their financial support in acquiring needed equipment.

PROMOTIONAL OBJECTIVES THAT WILL RECEIVE SPECIAL EMPHASIS IN 1952

I. Continue to strengthen the Baptist Student Union Program on the smaller college campuses.

II. To promote whatever steps of progress may be recommended by the Convention in the Student Center Building Program to which we are committed at O.U. and Oklahoma A. & M.

RURAL AND CITY MISSIONS

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations." Matt. 28:19.

Enlisting church resources is a major task of our denomination.

It is much easier to define and consider our problems than to solve them.

When our Lord said, "Go into all the world and teach all nations," He was chartering a course of action for His churches. Our task and problems will be less complicated if we first recognize and set out our major objectives. "For a great door and effectual is opened unto me (us) and there are many adversaries." I Cor. 16:9.

We are working at such objectives as: adequate church plants; real and lasting evangelism; church purchasing power; stronger preachers; and a more stable, efficient membership.

It is of utmost importance that we put spiritual needs of the people above theories and physical properties.

Our Oklahoma Baptist Missionaries have been cutting through economic barriers and bridging uncertainties for the preacher and his family, as they seek to build a solid, spiritual and economic foundation under the associational and state mission program.

52. Mr. Vernon C. Walker, Business Manager of Falls Creek Assembly, gave the Report on the Assembly. Mr. Walker made motion that all Departmental Reports presented in this afternoon's session be adopted. Motion carried.

FALLS CREEK BAPTIST ASSEMBLY

Falls Creek Baptist Assembly continues the upward trend that has characterized it during the past several years. Each August it has seemed that a maximum capacity has been reached for this great Assembly but each year since 1946 a still higher peak has been attained. An all time high attendance was reached in 1951 with a total registration of 20,435.

A total of 828 decisions was recorded in response to inspiring messages by Charlie Taylor, and the program of instruction which touches the lives of the many thousands who study, worship, and pray in these hills. Decisions included 84 professions of faith, 201 commitments for special service, and 543 rededications. Attendance in the 90 classes averaged 8,850 with a high attendance on one day of 10,038.

The physical growth of the Assembly is almost without equal. In order to keep pace with the churches and associations that are building new cabins and dormitories each year, the Baptist General Convention has invested many thousands of dollars in buildings, roads, utilities, and permanent equipment. Major improvements during the past year include 6 new class pavilions, a remodeled platform and rostrum, extension of water mains, new roads, and improved sanitation units.

Approximately \$17,000 has been invested this year alone in equipment. This investment involves replaced kitchen and cafeteria units, additional hospital facilities, new refrigeration, and approximately 200 additional mattresses.

Assembly operations required a staff of 180 employees during the ten-day period and more than 100 other workers were engaged in teaching and directing the program.

The Assembly grounds are no longer utilized for a short period each year. Many smaller conferences and camps are scheduled over a period of 15 weeks during spring and summer. Fifteen scheduled

groups met on the grounds during 1951 in addition to the August Assembly. Many church groups also held week-end retreats throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

INTRODUCTION

The Board of Directors, as "servants of God and the Lord Jesus Christ," to Oklahoma Baptists, "Greetings."

Oklahoma! A musical word! A Baptist Empire.

Oklahoma, the "Sooner" state is the seventeenth in area with 69,919 square miles and a population of 2,336,434.

It seems little more than yesterday when the sun stretched its long fingers across the wild country which is now Oklahoma, painting the rolling hills and fertile valleys red and gold against a background of unplowed plains and Indian villages.

The buffalo, wild ponies, long-horned cattle, and all sorts of small game lived their natural lives without being molested by the white man. In that day Oklahoma was truly an outpost of western frontiers.

The sudden rise of Oklahoma to a place among the leading states has been little short of phenomenal. Her exciting history reads like a romance. Baptist history has kept pace. Perhaps in some respects it has outstripped that of the state. Strong, rugged, God-fearing men and women have built Baptist churches and institutions to a place second to none in the Southern Baptist Convention in a very short time.

Certainly for the last eighteen years Oklahoma Baptists have had strong, positive leadership in their Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Dr. Andrew Potter.

DR. ANDREW POTTER

"Wisdom conducted the just man through the right ways, and showed him the Kingdom of God, made him honourable in his labors, and accomplished his works. She kept him safe from his enemies, and gave him a strong conflict, that he might overcome; and in bondage (of sickness) she left him not till she brought him the sceptre of the Kingdom, and power against those (sickness) that oppressed him, and gave him everlasting glory."—Wisdom X.

These remarkable words give us in a small way the glorious history of a great and famous man of old. They could well have been written of Dr. Andrew Potter, the tried, trusted leader of

Oklahoma Baptists until death took him away at 7:15 p.m., August 29, 1951.

Add to those words, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Spirit and of faith" and you have the true source of his greatness, and the secret of his long, successful career as our leader.

Andrew Potter was a man led by the Spirit through the right ways—the way of truth and justice—the straightforward paths of reason and obedience, the object ever before his far-seeing eyes was the advancement of the Kingdom of God and the spiritual freedom of men everywhere.

The road was long and steep. He tasted suffering, but the spirit of wisdom, truth and justice forsook him not.

Andrew Potter's name has been permanently inscribed in the golden book of Oklahoma Baptist annals. His footprints will not soon be erased from the trails which he blazed across Oklahoma.

We miss his wise counsel today. His firm grip has been released from the wheel. A great joy has come to him, upon entering the "Great White Gate" which lies beyond our earthly vision. God has willed it so. He who seemed to many of us a "tower of strength which stood full square to all the winds that blow" has laid down his weapons and has gone home to be with his Heavenly Father.

"He is gone who seemed so great—
Gone: but nothing can bereave him
Of the force he made his own,
Being here; and we believe him,
Something far advanced in state
And that he wears a truer crown
Than any wreath that man can weave him."

DR. T. B. LACKEY ELECTED

According to our constitution, article VI, section 3, the Board of Directors has been given the responsibility of filling vacancies which occur on our staff. Consequently the Board met September 4, 1951, in a serious, prayerful session after Dr. Potter's death and unanimously elected Dr. T. B. Lackey as Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

We believe this enterprising, courageous young man has the character, disposition, ability and the will to lead Oklahoma Baptists into the unknown and unexplored future.

We earnestly ask all Oklahoma Baptists to join the Board of Directors in prayer for our new leader. May it be said truly that while he is leading us, we will make a greater and stronger man of him. We pray that our posterity can truthfully say, "There went with him a band of people whose hearts God had touched."

BAPTIST RETIREMENT PLANS

Too few Oklahoma pastors and denominational workers are active in the Retirement Plans arranged between the Relief and Annuity Board and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Many of our pastors have neglected to join the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan and the friends may suffer for their negligence. There is also a large group of pastors who have joined, but are now inactive because of non-payment of dues.

Officers of the Board are: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. Robert S. Jones, associate secretary; and Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer-investments.

We urge all of our pastors, church and denominational workers to get into the Retirement Plan at once.

RURAL AND CITY MISSIONS OUR MISSIONARIES

Reverend Sam W. Scantlan is superintendent of this department Oklahoma Baptists are putting time, money, brain power, and heart power under God's leadership into associational missions.

State Mission money is spent through our associational organizations. Of the thirty-nine associations in the state, thirty-seven of them have capable superintendents of associational missions jointly supported by the state and associational executive boards.

Results of their work in part are as follows. See following table.

In the past year there have been five simultaneous School of Missions in Oklahoma with eighty-four churches participating. Fifty-four missionaries made 363 addresses.

Twelve Summer Students, who were paid by the Home Mission Board worked in Oklahoma's ripe mission fields throughout the summer months and were responsible for revivals and Vacation Bible Schools, and the winning of many souls to Christ.

EVANGELISM

"Repent ye: for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand." Matt. 3:2.

Reverend J. A. Pennington, secretary of this department, has gone up and down the state challenging the brethren to win more souls, hold more revivals and to keep the fires of evangelism burning brightly.

Evangelism is the very heart of church life. A committee of the Board, composed of Milo Arbuckle, Hugh R. Bumpas, H. G. Bennett and Paul Stevens, has been working with the department in the promotion of evangelism.

Emphasis still rests on association-wide simultaneous revivals. We are listing the associations, chairmen of evangelism, baptisms for 1950-51, and the dates for simultaneous revivals for 1952.

Dr. Thos. P. Haskins was added to the evangelistic staff at the July Board Meeting as state evangelist.

For twelve years, Dr. Haskins was Assistant Executive Secretary of Oklahoma Baptists. Leaving that position he went to Lebanon, Missouri, as pastor of the First Baptist Church for two years. He then returned to the Immanuel Church, Oklahoma City, where he served as pastor for three years.

Always Dr. T. P. Haskins has been a soul-winner. His heart has burned to be in evangelistic work, and he is happy to be doing that which he has always wanted to do; that is, to be free to preach revivals and win souls to Christ.

The State Evangelistic Conference was held at Ardmore on January 22-24, 1951. It was one of the best ever held in Oklahoma. The date for the Evangelistic Conference in 1952 is January 21-23, at Ponca City First Church.

A total of 19,266 baptisms was reported in 1951 as compared with 20,042 in 1950 when Oklahoma Baptists conducted state-wide simultaneous revivals.

BROTHERHOOD

Reverend J. A. Pennington is secretary of the Brotherhood and has witnessed an increase of interest on the part of men.

The Brotherhoods over the state have shown special interest in promoting the Summer School for Preachers at Oklahoma Baptist University. Many of the preachers who attended had their tuition and expenses paid by the Brotherhood organizations of the associations.

A state Brotherhood meeting in Oklahoma City last spring brought together a fine group of Oklahoma Baptist Men.

The night meetings of the Evangelistic and Missionary Conferences last January were in charge of the associational Brotherhoods. Several thousand men were present at these conferences. The same program has been planned for 1952.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Reverend E. W. Westmoreland, secretary of the Department of Religious Education, works incessantly at the task of promoting better Sunday school, Training Union, and Vacation Bible School work.

Through the years, Oklahoma Baptists have made steady progress in training teachers and officers to man the expanding Sunday schools and Training Unions.

Sunday school enrollment on December 31, 1950, was 238,062. (The figures for 1951 are not available.)

Training Union enrollment on the same date was 78,256.

Eight district Sunday school conventions were held during the month of March with a total attendance of 2,183.

The Department of Religious Education supplied Falls Creek Assembly with a faculty of 64 persons in Training Union and Sunday school work. The average daily attendance in these classes was 8,850.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

Mr. Ira Prosser, secretary of the department, is seeking to enlarge the ministry of the Baptist Student Union through the untiring efforts of B. S. U. secretaries on the campuses of our state schools and also at Oklahoma Baptist University.

Student work for 1951 has included planning meetings; the spring retreat at Falls Creek; the annual student retreat at Ridgecrest attended by sixty Oklahoma Baptist students; volunteer youth-led revival teams and youth programs in many of our churches.

The state Baptist Student Union Convention schedule for November 9-11 and observance of student night at Christmas claim student interest for the remainder of this year.

The Baptist Student Union Committee, composed of Thurmond George, H. H. Hobbs, M. E. Ramay, Harold Lindsey, Harold McGlamery, Ira Prosser and T. B. Lackey, is making a study of the proposed new buildings at Norman and Stillwater. The committee is also making a thorough study of plans whereby the Convention may continue to assist the churches in school towns to meet the challenge of our young people who are attending college.

The above named committee will make recommendations to the Board of Directors.

CHURCH MUSIC

Mr. Ira C. Prosser also carries the responsibility of this important department.

In this day when Southern Baptists need to place emphasis upon great church music, this department faces the supreme task of training leaders. Associational officers are playing a big part in the program.

Mr. Prosser, through leadership clinics, music schools, teaching and training classes at assemblies and throughout the state, etc., is seeking to promote better music in all of our churches.

BAPTIST MESSENGER

Dr. Jack L. Gritz, popular editor of the BAPTIST MESSENGER, continues to improve the contents and increase the circulation of our state paper.

The circulation has reached a total of 56,485 copies each week.

More than 571 churches have the MESSENGER in their church budgets. Other churches are urged to adopt the plan and to see to it that our Baptist paper goes into every Baptist home.

The BAPTIST MESSENGER publicizes the work of Oklahoma and world Baptists, providing our people with latest missionary information.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The Woman's Missionary Union is organized into fourteen separate districts with a corps of officers for each; and each association of the thirty-nine in the state of Oklahoma has a complete organization of W. M. U. officers.

The districts hold one meeting each annually, while the associations have at least quarterly meetings.

Miss Margaret Hutchinson has served as Executive Secretary of Woman's Missionary Union since February 15, 1948, and has endeared herself to the hearts of Oklahoma Baptist women.

Rallying around the Watchword, "Ye are my witnesses" (Acts 1:8b), Oklahoma Baptist women have done a monumental work. Some of the results are as follows:

BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME

Reverend H. Truman Maxey is superintendent of the Home. The property has been kept in good repair and the general appearance speaks well for the Home.

In the very center of all our activity around our Orphans' Home is a little child. It is most gratifying to know that when meal-time comes many children without the love of father or mother can gather about the tables laden with bountiful food supplied by Oklahoma Baptists.

The love offering to be taken on November 18 with "One Day's Pay" from every Baptist in Oklahoma as the goal is very important to the ongoing of the Home. Last year the offering was good and we hope that emphasis will be placed upon it in the churches and associations again this fall.

An Orphans' Home chairman is elected by each association and these individuals do much in keeping the Home before our people.

Reverend Wade B. East, field secretary, resigned to become superintendent of the Illinois Baptist Children's Home. Since Mr. East left, the Home has been carrying on with only one field representative, Reverend Judson Cook, who has held this position for the past three years.

FALLS CREEK BAPTIST ASSEMBLY

Falls Creek Baptist Assembly, with its throngs of young people, its inspiration, and its growing magnitude as a Christian influence, is permanently established in the hearts of Oklahoma Baptists. Its fame is also known throughout the Southern Baptist Convention.

The 1951 Assembly brought 20,435 persons through the gate to share in the great blessing that the Lord provided during the ten-day period. An average of 8,850 interested youth and adults attended the ninety classes, which were conducted, and on one day a total of 10,038 were in attendance.

Reverend Sam W. Scantlan, who has been business manager for the past seven years, asked to be relieved of the responsibility of managing the Assembly. His work on the mission fields coupled with the ever growing responsibility at the assembly was more than one man could care for as it should be.

Mr. Vernon C. Walker, office manager of the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City, was given the added responsibility as manager of the Assembly. The choice has proven a good one. Mr. Walker did an excellent job with his first Assembly last August.

Reverend E. W. Westmoreland is chairman of the Program Committee and continues to do an excellent work in that capacity.

The Board of Directors recommends a new policy for Falls Creek, which should enlarge attendance and improve the quality of work. It shall also give a wider use of the money invested by the Convention and churches. This new policy has been under consideration for quite some time. The 1950 and 1951 assembly committees were appointed more than a year ago to make a thorough

study and to report to the Board. The joint committee, with the heads of the departments, met on October 1, with the following attendance:

This committee brought a unanimous report to the Board of Directors in its session Monday, October 29. The Board accepted the report of the committee and makes the following recommendation to the Convention:

That the Assembly be extended from ten to fourteen days, divided into two seven day periods, with identical programs. Such plan provides six teaching periods, not including Sunday, which will meet the requirement for proper credit and awards for class work.

That the first week begin Tuesday evening, July 29 and run through Tuesday noon, August 5; the second week start Wednesday evening, August 6 and run through Wednesday noon, August 13. Churches and individuals may select the week most convenient. Many churches will doubtless have a large group each week, which will make the blessings of Falls Creek available to larger numbers of our people over the state.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Oklahoma Baptists are now operating four hospitals in our state located at Muskogee, Miami, Mangum and Perry. Mr. J. P. Cox is administrator of the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital in Muskogee; Dr. J. F. Murrell is administrator of the Miami Baptist Hospital in Miami; Reverend Joe R. Baker is administrator of the Southwest Baptist Hospital at Mangum; and Reverend Tom Carter is administrator of the new Perry Memorial Hospital at Perry.

Statistics show that during the year 1950 the three older hospitals admitted 6,675 patients, rendered 38,094 patient days of service, 1,074 babies were born in these hospitals, and they gave \$14,569.49 in charity service to worthy people who could not pay for hospital service.

The Perry Memorial Hospital was opened April 8, 1951. The building and equipment was leased from the city of Perry and, although the Convention does not own the property, we have complete charge of its operation. Dr. A. F. Wasson, who had successfully operated the hospitals at Muskogee and Miami and opened the new one at Mangum, opened the hospital at Perry. Because of heavy responsibilities of his ranch in New Mexico, he resigned July 1 and was replaced by Reverend Tom E. Carter, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Sapulpa, Oklahoma. The first six months of operation 303 patients were admitted, rendered 1,443 patient days of service and 46 babies were born. Initial success has proven the need for a hospital at Perry.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Dr. John W. Raley is now serving in his eighteenth year as president.

Enrollment figures for the 1950-51 session included 1,241 students during the regular session, 386 during the Summer School and 92 students in the Summer School for Preachers, making a total enrollment of 1,719 for the school year.

The 247 ministerial students enrolled reported 5,771 sermons preached, 1,070 professions of faith, and 1,079 additions to the churches where they served.

The J. Lloyd Ford Music Hall was dedicated on September 27 this year. This lovely red brick structure is a fine addition to the beauty of the campus, and now houses our Department of Music. The building has been erected free of debt.

Though our faculty was reduced in number, Oklahoma Baptist University is in the best position academically in the history of the school.

The church scholarship plan has brought us this year some of our finest students. It is hoped that this program will be greatly expanded.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Dr. Auguie Henry is Executive Secretary of The Foundation.

The purpose for which it was organized as a permanent trust by the Baptist General Convention in 1946, is to build, undergird, stabilize and perpetuate our Baptist agencies and institutions.

The program of The Foundation includes the procuring, investing and safeguarding of funds for the capital and endowment needs of these agencies and institutions.

The first observance of "Make-Your-Will-Month" during April was the beginning of a needed annual emphasis. With the co-operation of our churches much good can be accomplished for the causes of Christ by observing this month in the calendar of activities of the Baptist General Convention.

BAPTIST BOOK STORES

Our two Book Stores in Oklahoma are located in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are owned and operated by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Falls Creek Book Store is also in operation for several weeks during the summer months each year.

Miss Mary E. Tongee is manager of the Oklahoma City Book Store and Miss Virginia Martin manages the store in Tulsa.

We feel that the contribution made by these stores is a great help to the progress of our work.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Board of Directors bring the following recommendations to this convention:

1. That the goal for the Cooperative Program in 1952 be set at \$1,000,000.
2. That after the deduction of expenses of the general office, Woman's Missionary Union, Ministers Retirement Plan, Supplement

to the Baptist Messenger and Oklahoma Baptist University, funds are to be divided fifty-fifty between state work and Southern Baptist Convention causes.

3. That \$22,000 in addition to the present \$78,000 be allocated Oklahoma Baptist University for operating purposes and that \$28,000 be allocated for building purposes, the latter to apply against the university building deficit. Both \$22,000 and \$28,000 items will be taken from state funds, after the division between State and Southern Baptist Convention causes.

4. That the churches now giving through the Cooperative Program on a per cent basis be commended, and that they be encouraged to increase the per cent a minimum of two per cent of the total church budget during the coming year and that we adopt the slogan "UP 2 IN 52".

5. That the churches not now giving on a per cent basis be encouraged to adopt this plan and give as large a proportion as possible.

6. That the week of October 19-26, 1952, be observed as stewardship week looking forward to the giant Southern Baptist Convention Simultaneous Emphasis October 18-25, 1953.

7. That the churches renew their efforts to enlist every member in bringing the whole tithe into the storehouse.

Nineteen hundred fifty-one has been an eventful year in the life of Oklahoma Baptists. Death has invaded our ranks, as it always does each year, but we are moving forward; "On to Victory."

We humbly and gratefully thank God for His presence with us during the year. Thousands of our Oklahoma people have been saved and added to the churches. Much monies have been given for preaching the gospel in lands afar, for which we thank God and take courage.

The missionary spirit of our women, the united work of our Baptist laymen, as well as the renewed work and interest on the part of our fine young people everywhere causes us to say with the psalmist of old, "Bless the Lord, oh my soul, and all that is within me, bless His Holy Name."

Dr. T. B. Lackey's address was voted to be added as a part of this report and it follows.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That it will be our policy to operate on a cash basis.
2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with the best administration and promotion of our work.
3. That we instruct all agencies and institutions provided for in the budget to incur no debts not authorized by the Board of Directors during 1952.
4. That the 1952 State Mission Budget be projected on a basis that will insure no deficits at the close of the year.

SUMMARY

Through the years the Baptist General Convention has grown to be as traditional a part of Oklahoma Baptist life as "Indian summer's fragrant ritual of burning leaves" is a part of the autumn.

THE NEXT PLATEAU

T. B. Lackey

I stand here with mixed emotions.

My heart is heavy, as is yours, over the absence of Dr. Andrew Potter, who meant so much to all of us. I know you miss him. But you do not miss him as much as I. A thousand times already I have longed for his counsel. Eternity alone can reveal the contribution he made to the cause of Christ in Oklahoma and beyond.

My heart is humble because of the heavy responsibilities placed on me. I earnestly solicit your prayers. If you have not already done so, please put me on your prayer list. I must have divine guidance and cooperation and encouragement of all our people if I am to do the big job that you want done.

I promise that I shall do the best I can. I want you to feel free to call upon me. If there is anything you desire to know about our work, please ask. We are here to serve all our people to the best of our ability.

I wish to speak on the subject, "The Next Plateau."

If the next plateau is to be higher, much higher, than the one on which we stand to-night, it will be necessary to apply all the rules of good mountain climbing.

Mountain climbing is for hardy and disciplined adventurers. It has attracted people from all levels of society. Peasants and kings of Europe, farmers and factory hands, college teachers, Supreme Court justices, and Presidents of America. Poets, artists and scientists have proudly listed in their ranks those daring spirits whose exploits have been recorded in the history of mountaineering.

It is interesting to study the qualifications of physique and spirit possessed by good mountain climbers. High mountain climbing demands a suitable pulse beat for serving the body in rarified atmosphere. Endurance and sure-footedness are necessary, since weakness at a critical point or a miss-step could hurtle the climber over the precipice and cause him to pull his comrades to death after him.

Alertness and patience must be practiced every moment for the moods of nature are both fickle and tenacious.

To summarize, a definite sense of balance, cool-headedness, fearlessness and strong determination are essential qualifications.

But there is another qualification of first importance. However well equipped in body and mind, the mountain climber will never succeed if he is not possessed by the compelling desire to accomplish the impossible... the will to conquer the next obstacle... to mount the next plateau.

He must project himself forward into that moment of exaltation when he stands upon the table land of that forbidding, yet challenging plateau, BREATHING IN the rarified atmosphere and capturing the broad scene below him and beyond him to the ever-widening horizon. With such a vision in mind the mountain climber will steel his will to all necessary disciplines; then at the moment of challenge will launch his attack against the unknown hazards and perils of the cliffs, daring his life against the odds that he can and will mount the next plateau.

My brethren, of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, I have used this parable of the mountain climber as an introduction to my message because to me it sets forth in strong imagery the position which we, as a convention, occupy today. Seeing us as we are, at first glance a visitor would say that we stand on a broad plan of achievement which stretches endlessly to the horizon. But a careful study of the picture toward the west reveals a series of plateaus, with its panorama of achievement. But to the east, rising sharply into cliffs and receding into the clouds above, is the next peak, and, we believe, the next plateau of achievement for the Baptists of Oklahoma.

PLATEAU OF BEGINNINGS

May we look first at the PLATEAU OF BEGINNINGS

Baptist work in what is now Oklahoma started on a rather low plateau. Work among many Indian tribes began long before they moved to the land of the Red Man. Whole churches in some instances were moved from states east of the Mississippi to Indian Territory.

Isaac McCoy, who was originally from Kentucky, worked among the Indians in Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Missouri before coming to Indian Territory. He was married shortly after his conversion and call to the ministry, to a "heroic girl who had been kidnapped and held prisoner for five years by an Indian tribe." He later became missionary to this tribe, which had persecuted his wife. He describes the organization of the first church in the following manner:

"On the ninth of September, I constituted the Muskogee (Creek) Baptist Church, consisting of Mr. Lewis and wife, Mr. Davis, and three black men, who were slaves of the Creeks.... That was the first Baptist Church formed in Indian Territory."

The next church to be constituted was among the Cherokees, about fifty miles northwest of Fort Smith, November 19, 1832. By 1835 it was a flourishing church of over twenty members and a school. Organization of other churches followed.

The First Association

In September of 1860 the first association was formally organized, with five churches. By 1903 seventeen churches were co-operating. In the meantime, two other associations had been organized.

First General Organization

The first general convention was formed in 1876. IT WAS CALLED THE BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION OF WESTERN ARKANSAS AND INDIAN TERRITORY. By 1900 there were four conventions in Oklahoma, two in Indian Territory and two in Oklahoma Territory. The churches were divided between Oklahoma and Indian Territory, and between the Northern and Southern Baptist Conventions. The two conventions in Oklahoma Territory were united on October 5, 1900. About the same time the two conventions in Indian Territory were united. Had they not been led to form separate conventions in the two territories, they might never have consolidated into one convention for the state.

Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Oklahoma Baptists were reaching higher ground when they organized the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The Oklahoma Baptist State Convention met in 1906 in the first Methodist Church of Shawnee, and at the same time the General Convention of Indian Territory met in the First Baptist Church of Shawnee. Both attended to their business and closed their work. Each convention then adjourned, and according to previous plans, met at the opera house on November 9. The combined messengers, numbering about 400, "formed a line in front of the Methodist Church and marched two and two to the opera house to organize a new convention for the new state of Oklahoma." Dr. J. C. Stalcup, who was elected the first Executive Secretary, said: "The marriage of the two Conventions . . . was really a very delightful experience . . . and we lived happily together ever afterward."

The number of Baptists increased rapidly following the organization of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In 1906 there were only 29,666 Baptists but in 1915 there were 81,111. By 1922 the number had increased to 98,921.

In 1916 Dr. F. M. McConnell succeeded Dr. Stalcup as Executive Secretary. Dr. J. B. Rounds succeeded Dr. McConnell in 1922. The period through which Dr. Rounds served was a critical one. 1920-1929 has been called THE MAD DECADE. It was an era of great change and much confusion. The name given to this period holds for Baptist work as well as secular life. The madness was particularly apparent in the matter of finance.

A debt-paying campaign was launched in 1926 and all debts were paid. Although the campaign was concluded with victory, before the ink was dry on the checks, THEY went right back to borrowing more money for one institution and agency after another, until four years later they owed nearly one-half million dollars.

Dr. Rounds did a wonderful job under these trying circumstances. He is one of the most gracious servants of God I have ever known. He is a very dear and personal friend.

Plateau of Growth and Development

The next plateau could well be called the PLATEAU OF GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT.

In 1933, following the resignation of Dr. Rounds, Dr. Andrew Potter was elected Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Dr. Potter's slogan was, DEATH TO DEFICITS AND DOWN WITH DEBT! Can't you hear him say it?

In 1934 he expressed his belief that "We have been cured of this wild orgy of spending money we do not have." He added, "We can exercise as much faith, and more judgment, in first getting money and then spending it, rather than spending it and then trying to get it . . . WHEN WE GET OUT OF DEBT, LET US STAY OUT."

The debt was completely liquidated at the 1940 Convention in Tulsa. Dr. Potter announced that he lacked \$319.81 being able to complete the Debt program. An old-fashioned collection was taken, by coming to the altar and making a gift. The offering amounted to \$332.00. Dr. Potter presented Dr. Raley a check for \$7,184.94, which was the amount needed to pay the University's outstanding obliga-

tions. THERE WAS GREAT REJOICING THAT THE DEBTS WERE ALL PAID!

The second characteristic of this period was the re-vitalizing of the denomination by re-organizing the various departments and the creation of additional needed agencies.

Every department of our work was organized and expanded. More emphasis was placed on RURAL AND CITY MISSIONS, EVANGELISM, BROTHERHOOD, MUSIC, BAPTIST STUDENT UNION, WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION, SUNDAY SCHOOL, TRAINING UNION, and the BAPTIST MESSENGER.

THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION was organized as a permanent trust and a service organization for the purpose of building, undergirding, stabilizing and perpetuating Baptist institutions and agencies.

This was a period of BUILDING and STABILIZING our institutions. The BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME was re-built and is now one of the most attractive homes for the homeless to be found anywhere; not complete but the pace has been set!

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY was steadily improved year after year.

The two HOSPITALS in existence in 1933 were enlarged and re-decorated. A NEW HOSPITAL was opened at Mangum on June 6, 1949, and is rendering efficient service to the Southwest part of the state. On April 8 this year we began the operation of the Perry Memorial Hospital. There are larger hospitals but none better than the one at Perry.

The campus at OBU has been completely changed. The original buildings have been modernized. Many new buildings have been erected. Those who have not seen OBU in twenty years would hardly recognize it now.

THE BAPTIST BUILDING, across the street, is the fulfillment of Dr. Potter's long and cherished dream. It is the climax of his wonderful leadership as a builder. He knew, when he was leading Oklahoma Baptists in the erection of this building, that he himself would not get to use it for too long a period; yet his far-seeing vision prompted him to make it a reality, not for today . . . but for tomorrow. One hundred years from now Oklahoma Baptists will thank him for providing an adequate building to meet the needs of an ever-growing denomination. The income from rentals insures our convention an adequate office building for years to come, without using mission money for upkeep and operation.

Great Gains Were Made From 1933 to 1950

Total mission contributions through the state office in 1933 were \$120,404.92 compared to \$1,285,800.25 in 1950; total value of convention property in 1933 was \$1,310,832.21, on which there was almost one-half million dollars indebtedness, compared to \$5,826,858.50 in 1950.

Church membership during this period increased from 165,000 to 340,660.

Sunday School enrollment climbed from 124,190 to 238,062; Training Union enrollment, from 41,734 to 78,256.

The number of baptisms increased from 10,322 to 20,051.

And the value of church property, which was \$9,044,916 in 1933 increased to \$30,466,916 in 1950.

Surely, this was a period of Growth and Prosperity. PRAISE GOD FROM WHOM ALL BLESSINGS FLOW!

The Next Plateau

The big question now IS? WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE? HOW SHALL WE GET THERE?

The next plateau to which Oklahoma Baptists must climb will challenge the best we have. We must catch the full meaning of the old song:

"I'm pressing on the upward way,
New Heights I'm gaining every day;
Still praying as I onward bound,
Lord, plant my feet on higher ground.

"Lord, lift me up and let me stand,
By faith, on Heaven's table land;
A higher plane than I have found,
Lord, plant my feet on higher ground."

I. Expand Departments

If we are to reach that high plateau we must concentrate our efforts on reaching the unreached millions in our state and around the world and enlist and utilize their potential strength in building the Kingdom of God at home and abroad. THIS IS OUR BUSINESS!

MAKING DISCIPLES, BAPTIZING THEM AND TEACHING them to observe the commandments of our Lord. We must enlarge and expand every department of our work as funds become available. The speakers preceding me have emphasized that missions wait on money. Many churches must join First Baptist Church, Ada in a fifty-fifty division of funds between local work and the rest of the world, through the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM. Oklahoma will join heartily in the Southern Baptist Simultaneous Stewardship Emphasis in 1953.

II. Emphasize Doctrines

Another absolute essential in our climb to the next plateau is a REVIVAL OF DOCTRINAL PREACHING AND TEACHING!

We must remain true to the word of God. HIS BOOK is our rule of faith and practice. We shall never compromise on the distinctive doctrines of our faith.

THE GREAT COMMISSION is the Lord's marching orders to his CHURCHES! Everything we do as a denomination must be done BY, WITH, and THROUGH NEW TESTAMENT CHURCHES. Every department of our work is designed to help the churches. Our program must always be CHURCH-CENTERED. The GREAT COMMISSION was not given to a convention, an association, a college or a seminary. It was not given to departments and agencies. IT WAS GIVEN TO THE CHURCH!

III. Undergird, Expand And Increase Number Of Institutions

We must undergird, expand and increase the number of institutions, as the need arises.

We must continue to build the Orphans' Home, to meet the increasing need of homeless children.

Falls Creek Assembly must be restudied, that it may serve **MORE EFFICIENTLY** and **LARGER NUMBERS OF PEOPLE**.

Oklahoma Baptist University must be endowed, to supplement the denomination's annual appropriation, in order that effective Christian Education may be provided for our Baptist young people on a guaranteed and continuing basis. Further building and equipment needs must be supplied.

Our **GROWING HOSPITAL** program, so essential to the health and welfare of our people, must be carried on with concern and vigor. All of us have been grateful that we have been able to serve 7,000 patients in our houses of healing during the last year.

More than \$14,000 was contributed to charity work alone. Our Nurses Training School as Muskogee is rendering unusual service in training some of our finest Baptist girls to serve as nurses. Our graduates are full-fledged professional nurses. We must, with the help of the Lord, continue to train these girls. Ours is the only church hospital School of Nursing in the state, except those operated by the Sisterhood of the Catholic Faith. In this way we have served in the name of Christ. This ministry of healing, so important to the Master, must be enlarged by the Baptists of Oklahoma.

Dr. Duncan

I recall a story, told some years ago by the late Dr. A. A. Duncan, then pastor of First Baptist Church, McAlester. He was conducting a revival in a country church, and staying in the home of a farmer who had a large family. One of the children, a little girl about 10 years of age, was crippled. Her foot was so crooked that she walked on a portion of her leg.

One night, following the service and after the children had gone to bed, Dr. Duncan asked the father if he had sought medical aid for the child. The father replied that he was not financially able to have the child's leg treated. He then asked the father if he would be willing for him to take the child to the Baptist hospital. Before the father could answer the mother spoke and said: "Oh, if you would! It has been my prayer since the child's birth that something could be done to strengthen her leg."

After the revival Dr. Duncan and the little girl were on their way to the Baptist hospital. The surgery was successful.

Years later Dr. Duncan was walking down the street in Dallas when he met a beautiful young lady. To his embarrassment she took him by the arm and almost carressed him saying: "You do not know me but I am the little girl you took to the Baptist Hospital years ago. I want you to see how well I can walk today. And on the busy street she demonstrated her ability to walk perfectly.

"I believe the time has arrived for us to give serious consideration to the vitalization of the dream held jointly by the sainted R. C. Howard, former president of this Convention . . . and our beloved Dr. Andrew Potter . . . that a great hospital, ~~BEARING THE NAME, OKLAHOMA BAPTISTS~~, be erected in Oklahoma City. The Board of Directors of the Convention has voted twice to place this on the agenda as the next major objective. This project could be undertaken shortly after the fulfillment of obligations resting upon us

in connection with the Baptist Student Centers at Norman and Stillwater.

I am convinced, after conferences with pastors and civic leaders, that a joint undertaking would be welcome by Oklahoma City and that the result of our efforts would fulfill the dream of leaders of other days, without aid of federal funds. I want to make it plain that if we undertake this objective that we will do so (1) without consideration of tax money from any source; and (2) without a campaign in the churches.

Already the news of the possibility of such an institution has spread across the country. A layman in Texas recently sent a check in the amount of \$500 to The Baptist Foundation, designating....
.. BAPTIST HOSPITAL, OKLAHOMA CITY.

Personally, as a matter of respect to a leader who dreamed great dreams and achieved them fully, I should like to see a great building in Oklahoma City, bearing the name... ~~BAPTIST HOSPITAL MEMORIAL TO ANDREW POTTER.~~

Such is the challenge of my heart. ~~Your answer will determine the level of assent which we shall attain in achieving the objectives outlined for the next plateau.~~

Conclusion

I return to the words of the old gospel song, HIGHER GROUND, with a warning...

We cannot expect God to do more than give us the VISION, the FAITH and the STRENGTH "to scale the utmost height." HE IS NOT GOING TO "lift us up and let us stand on heaven's table land" without DARING EFFORT on our part. Our feet will never be planted on higher ground unless and until we, by DEDICATED STRENGTH and CONSCIOUS WILL, plant them there.

OUR GOD WILL GIVE US THE VISION AND PROVIDE ALL THE MEANS, BUT WE MUST DO THE CLIMBING! DARING and DEVOTION are the key words to such a conquest. STRENGTH and SKILL will come in direct ratio to the applied daring and devotion of our hearts and our lives.

To conclude, I refer to the scaling of a mountain and the conquest of a plateau important in the history of America.

When Pitt, the great British statesman, determined to break the grip of France on the new world, he summoned his military leaders and questioned them as to the ability of his forces to take Quebec, the strong point of French control and the one position without which the British could not capture or hold Canada. One by one the generals found insurmountable obstacles and difficulties, until at last thirty-two year old Brigadier General James Wolfe said quietly, in answer to the Prime Minister's question, "I will take it, or die in the attempt."

Given the task, he did both!

Tragic though his death, we cannot forget that it was also his hill of victory. On hearing the shouts, "They run, General, see how they run" he died with the words, "NOW GOD BE PRAISED. I will die in peace."

He had scaled the impregnable walls of the cliffs below Quebec and planted the flag of his country on the plains of Abraham, the next plateau of British conquest in an expanding world.

Such daring devotion to duty....EVEN unto DEATH....is the price of the crown of life and the conquest of the next plateau of the Baptists of Oklahoma.

"I can do all things...."

ALL HAIL THE POWER OF JESUS' NAME!!

All hail the power of Jesus' name,
Let angels prostrate fall;
Bring forth the royal diadem,
And crown HIM..LORD of all!!

69. The Thursday morning session of the Convention was called to order by Vice president Bryce Twitty, Tulsa. Mr. Twitty led in prayer.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

To the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University
and to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in
session at Oklahoma City, November 1, 1951

The years continue to add their increment to the physical and spiritual growth of Oklahoma Baptist University. Everywhere, since the outbreak of war in Korea in June, 1950, the colleges have been on the defensive to maintain those elements most essential to a thriving university community—an efficient physical plant of well-ordered buildings and campus; an able and productive faculty with

a sufficient degree of stability and scholarly promise to insure the scholarly future of the institution; and a student body of potential leaders who will carry on the work of the denomination and contribute solidly to community achievement as the strength of the alumni increases from year to year.

Thanks to the devotion of its faculty and staff, together with the bold if not drastic measures of protection and retrenchment taken by the Board of Trustees in the first months of the present crisis, Oklahoma Baptist university has successfully weathered the first year of the armed truce, and appears to be in the strongest possible position for the difficult years which the colleges certainly face in the early 1950's. The crisis is twofold: the international tensions which have put this nation, along with others, on a semi-military basis, robbing civilian institutions of a substantial, and often the choicest, part of their potential leadership, so that the ranks of both faculty and students have been thinned, and second, the peculiar fluctuations in the population cycle, which reached a modern low just eighteen years ago. This means that the freshman class in 1951 in the collective colleges of the nation was likely to be the smallest in history, even under "normal" conditions.

Let us, therefore, take heart from the enrollment statistics, which shows Oklahoma Baptist University strongly maintaining its hold on the student body:

A particularly reassuring figure is the size of the Freshman Class, which is currently 335 as against 353 in September, 1950, only a 5% decrease. The total enrollment is bolstered by 70 night students, most of whom are business and professional men and women from downtown Shawnee. Not included are the figures for the Extension Service, now in the capable hands of Dr. Nolan M. Stigler, a former pastor and former member of the Board of Trustees, who is meeting a serious need in our denominational life by taking regular credit university Bible courses to the church leaders in remote areas who cannot afford to come to the campus.

No summary of university affairs in the past twelve months will be complete without a tribute to the Church Scholarship Plan. The preservation of our student body is a tribute to this denominational project, which is the work of many people. Special mention should be made of the two trustees who have captained the Scholarship committee, Fred Willhoite and Frank Baugh. More than fifty OBU students are on the campus today because their own local congregation underwrote the tuition expense by putting this modest and supremely practical plan in the church budget.

In the past two months we have received notice of the participation of many churches and associations beginning with the second semester or summer term of 1952 or in September, 1952. Many of the larger churches are providing two, three, four, or more scholarships for their worthy young members of college age.

Faculty

The instructional staff of 1951-52 numbers fifty-three, of whom three are employed for less than half time. Of the remaining fifty, fourteen have the doctor's degree, twenty-nine the master's degree, and seven the bachelor's degree as the highest earned degree. There are twelve professors, four associate professors, thirteen assistant professors, and twenty-one instructors.

Buildings and Grounds

Constructed and furnished at a cost of \$187,000, the Ford Music Hall was dedicated September 27, 1951. This lovely structure is furnished with the finest obtainable practice pianos in its air-conditioned studios. Portraits of the original donors, Mr. and Mrs. J. Lloyd Ford of Shawnee, were unveiled in the foyer. At the other end of the building is the R. C. Howard Memorial Chapel, furnished by the family and friends of the late President of this Convention, with memorial windows contributed by the Kelham Avenue Baptist church of Oklahoma City, of which he was pastor, and by the Senior class of 1951.

The campus valuation is therefore enhanced by at least the sum which the Ford Music Hall cost; the building could not be reproduced at that figure today. The second and third floors will be completed to provide additional studios as funds are available.

Buildings deteriorate, and some of the oldest structures on the campus need modernization and repair at the present time. Every facility is being used; it will not be possible to maintain topflight service without some urgently needed repairs. New building needs include another dormitory for women, a university chapel, a modern science building, and a second dormitory for men. The census figures tell us we must be prepared by 1956, certainly by 1960.

Religious Activities

During 1950-51, 229 students were being trained for the ministry. Nearly one hundred additional special service volunteers have found channels of usefulness through the Life Service Band. Last year's Ministerial Alliance reported 5,771 sermons delivered, 1,070 professions of faith, 2,005 rededications, and 1,079 additions to the church. The impact of this faithful group on the Baptist congregations of Oklahoma is inestimable; no relationship is more vital to the preservation of the university as an integral member of the denominational program.

Financial Summary

The university had for the fiscal year ending May 31 an income of \$938,511.06, with \$155,645.50 of the income designated specifically for endowment investment and/or building construction. The net income for current operations was therefore \$782,865.56. The expense for the year was \$772,619.45, leaving a reserve of \$10,246.11 that has been invested in classroom equipment and library.

The total valuation of land, buildings, and equipment is \$4,127,-420.30, which includes land and buildings acquired by the Faculty Building Association in the amount of \$255,478.35. The Faculty Building Association is a private, non-profit corporation organized and chartered to acquire self-liquidating property for the benefit of the university. It will be of interest to the Convention to know that this association has accrued property for the university valued at one-quarter million dollars without one penny of expense to the university or to the Convention.

79. The Bison Glee Club brought special music under the direction of Dean Angell.

80. Dr. John Wesley Raley, President of Oklahoma Baptist University, brought his nineteenth annual message to the Convention with his subject: "Dynamics of Democracy."

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

November 1, 1:30 P.M.

83. The afternoon session of the Convention began with a song service under the leadership of Mr. Ben Prince, Music Director of the Temple Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. Mrs. Prince was at the piano. Songs used were: "At the Cross," "He Keeps Me Singing," "Blessed Be the Name," and "When We All Get to Heaven."

84. Reverend C. Chalon Meadows, Hobart, brought the devotional message of the afternoon with the subject: "Using the Sword of the Spirit." Reverend Meadows led in prayer.

85. Reverend H. B. Woodward, Wewoka, brought the Report of the Committee on Social Service and motion carried for its adoption. Honorable David Shapard, head of the United Drys of Oklahoma, spoke to the report.

SOCIAL SERVICE

The people who are the salt of the earth and the light of the world cannot be indifferent to their responsibilities to the society in which they live.

Christ Jesus is certainly interested in every problem that affects our society; He hates every evil that plagues the lives of the people. Evils are always with us but the people of God should face them squarely and deal with them in the most effective way.

This report takes cognizance of some of the evils that plague our days, and suggests a course of action.

First, there is the divorce problem, and the breaking up of homes. We believe that our people should stand with Jesus against divorce with all its attendant evils. It would be most helpful if our preachers continue to give the people the Bible teaching on this subject. The breakdown of our homes strikes at the very heart of our civilization, and constitutes one of our major evils; and one that calls for the earnest, prayerful attention of our Christian forces.

Second, the evils of liquor and dope call for continued Christian action. Eighty-five percent of the children admitted to our Orphans' Home in Oklahoma are victims of liquor, according to information the Home has given out. And our state is legally dry. The majority of serious automobile accidents are chargeable to liquor and beer.

The beer tavern continues to be a source of lawlessness and crime. In fact, the evils that grow out of the beer tavern steadily increase. We believe that 3.2 beer should be eliminated from our state. We believe that our Christian people should cooperate with law enforcement agencies in making it hard on bootleggers.

Therefore, we suggest that our Baptist churches in Oklahoma—
(1) Support the United Dry Organization in its efforts to eliminate beer and liquor from our state, with our prayers, and financial help though regular contributions; (2) Keep alive in the interests of our people the seriousness of the beer and liquor business, and the direct connection of 3.2 beer with narcotic addictions of our young people, and juvenile delinquency; (3) Stress from the pulpit the moral issue concerning alcoholic beverages and insist upon total abstinence for our church members; (4) Encourage the Christian men and women in our communities to vote for moral right, and for men who stand for Christian principles in government.

86. Dr. Harold Lindsey, Shawnee, gave the Report of the Committee on Radio. Dr. Allen Graves, Tulsa, who is a member of the Southern Baptist Radio Commission, spoke to the report. The following report is the one adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in San Francisco and is printed here for information. The recommendations were adopted by the Southern Convention only.

THE RADIO COMMISSION OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Southern Baptist Convention formally entered the religious broadcasting field with the appointment of a radio committee in 1938. The Radio Committee was changed to the Radio Commission in 1946, when the Convention placed its radio service in the Co-operative Program.

The first Baptist Hour was broadcast January through March 1941. During every year from 1941 to 1949, the Baptist Hour was broadcast one or two quarters at a morning hour on a sustaining basis. Beginning October 2, 1949, the Baptist Hour was launched on a year-round basis on the American Broadcasting Company network at 3:30 p.m., Eastern Standard Time every Lord's Day. This program is on a commercial basis and by the approval of the Convention and the Executive Committee of the Convention is to be financed through contributions received by mail. In 1951 the Baptist Hour is broadcast over 230 stations by current transcription.

The Radio Commission renders many other services. Through a transcription library, thousands of broadcasts are given every year. These transcriptions are available to pastors and churches, without cost, for broadcast over local radio stations.

Through a special veterans hospital service, the Commission carries transcribed devotional programs to thousands of sick service men in veteran and other government hospitals every year.

Television is here. The premier showing of the first two television films, which the Radio Commission has made, were given over WAGA-TV, Atlanta, Georgia, on January 15th and 22nd respectively 1950. These films are available for broadcast over local television stations.

We recommend the following:

1. That the Radio Commission be and is hereby authorized to continue to seek to finance the cost of the Baptist Hour by soliciting contributions from individuals in keeping with the Business and Financial Plan of the Convention.
2. That the Radio Commission be and is hereby authorized to extend the loan of a balance of \$21,000 of the original \$50,000 on Baptist Radio Center to a time not later than April 1, 1953.
3. That the Radio Commission be and is hereby authorized to take advantage of opportunities now open in the radio industry for the presentation of television programs, provided the financing of this phase of its work be in accordance with the Business and Financial Plan of the Convention.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Missionary advance must continue!—The American Bible Society, working with Southern Baptist mission agencies in their Advance Program for worldwide missions, joins in reporting that advance has begun.

The Society also joins in urging that this missionary advance must continue and increase. Experience on mission fields around the world shows that

In every missionary advance,
the Bible goes forward first.

The Bible is a "must" in mission work.

If the people of the world are to know Christ, they must have the Bible. It is the one primary source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

In most countries of the world, the income of the people is so low that they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures. Someone must help those who can pay only a part of the cost and the many who cannot pay at all.

The American Bible Society, a missionary non-profit organization, supported by gifts, serves as that "Someone." It aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world.

During 1950 the American Bible Society—

—distributed through its own work, at home and abroad, more than 11 million volumes of Scriptures. Another 3 million volumes were produced through gifts of materials and money to Bible Societies of other countries, especially Germany and Japan, bringing the grand total to more than 14 million volumes for the year;

—supplied Testaments in 9 different languages for United Nations forces in Korea;

—started printing 2 million service Testaments for our own expanding armed forces;

—in Japan, distributed 3 million volumes, which was the goal for 1950, making the total distribution in Japan since World War II, more than 6 million volumes.

1951 opportunities call for even greater Advance in Scripture distribution.

Japan is the major challenge for greater Advance. It is not just an "open door"; "the whole side of the house has fallen out" and we are free to walk right in. Other fields also present needs which, though not so dramatic, are just as real.

In 1950, Southern Baptist churches gave \$78,643 to the American Bible Society; gifts from churches of all denominations amounted to \$646,756. In view of Southern Baptists' strength and readiness to respond to missionary needs, it is expected that Southern Baptist churches will soon be giving to the American Bible Society at least

\$150,000 each year. Please send gifts to your Baptist State Headquarters office, marked "for the American Bible Society."

88. Dr. J. W. Storer, Tulsa, brought the Report of the Memorial Committee and gave special and appropriate tribute to the memory of Dr. Andrew Potter, who for thirty-six years has labored in Oklahoma for the Baptist cause. For the past seventeen years he has served this Convention as Executive Secretary-Treasurer. The contribution of this great man's leadership will never be forgotten in Oklahoma.

John T. Daniel paid tribute to Reverend Charley M. Curb, who has preached the Gospel in Oklahoma for more than fifty years. Charley Curb was the most persistent soul winner Oklahoma Baptists have ever had.

Motion carried to adopt the Report.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

Your Committee would come to this sacred hour on our program under the definite assurance of those who have an anchor sure and steadfast, within the veil.

From the household of faith here, have gone those who, seeing a door opened, and a voice calling, have crossed over the threshold, and entered into the mansions not made with hands.

His voice, his guidance, his discerning wisdom, forever gone from us but in retrospect, our hearts all alike listen for in vain; but for him all of us are humbly grateful. Dr. Andrew Potter walked with God—and walking thus climbed up the hill and beyond our sight.

At the funeral of Dr. John W. English, 45 years professor at Newton Seminary, amongst other things said of him by Dr. Arbuckle was this word:

"He taught his students many things about their work as ministers, and gave them sage counsels for their preaching, but the greatest thing he ever gave, was himself.

He was his own text book; he incarnated a whole theology:

The work of man

The power of Christ

The reality of God

The leading of the Holy Spirit were all manifest in his life."

Of Andrew Potter these things are also true. As our leader for long and trying years he seized each opportunity with capability and patient efficiency.

Words fail—and so does time, to give adequate tribute to our comrade, friend and brother. In a very real sense it can be summed up by saying that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is the life blood of Andrew Potter.

And this is so because in his long leadership, he sought and followed the leading of our God, without whom, all plans and planners come to nought.

For all who have gone on before:

"Heaven open'd wide

Her ever-during gates, harmonious
sound,

On golden hinges moving."

We shall see them again!

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Whereas, our forefathers came to North America in search for religious freedom, denied to them by Church-State unions in Europe, and—

Whereas, the founding fathers of the United States in the first amendment to the Constitution provided for the absolute separation of church and state, and—

Whereas, the New Testament everywhere teaches that there should be no organic union of the church and state, and—

Whereas, on October 20, 1951 the President of the United States announced the appointment of an Ambassador to the Vatican, and—

Whereas, this is discrimination on the part of the state against all other religious groups, and—

Whereas, this action is in direct violation of the Constitution of the United States, and threatens to disrupt the unity of our nation at a time when it is so desperately needed.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

1. That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, representing 1,100 churches with more than 350,000 members, assembled in the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on this day, November 1, 1951 protest the appointment of an Ambassador to the Vatican, now or at any future time.

2. That we urge the President of the United States to reconsider the inadvisability of such an appointment.

3. That we call on our United States Senators to oppose the confirmation of said appointment.

4. That we challenge all our people to make their wishes known individually by writing or wiring the President of the United States and our United States Senators.

5. That we pledge ourselves to pray for the President of the United States and all members of the Congress of the United States to the end that they may be guided and strengthened for the tremendous responsibility with which our nation has entrusted them.

Whereas, the United Drys, under the leadership of David C. Shapard, is waging a courageous fight against the liquor traffic in the State of Oklahoma.

BE IT RESOLVED THEREFORE:

That all our Baptist churches in Oklahoma give their moral and financial support to the effort being put forth by the United Drys.

Finally, that we thank the City of Oklahoma City, with special emphasis upon the churches, the hotels, and the press, for all they have done to make our visit to this fine city a happy and useful one.

That we hereby express our appreciation to the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for the use of the material facilities of their church plant; for the hospitality of their efficient pastor, Dr. H. H. Hobbs; and for the many services and courtesies accorded us by the membership.

C O M M E N T S

ORGANIZATION The "Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various instructions of such contributors. It was incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma without authorized capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed on or about May, 1917, for a term of twenty years, and its amended Articles of Incorporation were placed on record March 6, 1928, as an organization in perpetuity.

Since November 1, 1935, the convention has had direct supervision of The Baptist Orphans' Home, and its assets, liabilities, income and expenses are treated as a separate fund both on the convention books and in this report. The Home is located in the environs of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital, it having been organized in March 1904, for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans.

On October 28, 1946 the convention created a separate corporation, namely The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, for the stated purpose of building, undergirding and stabilizing the agencies and institutions owned and operated by the convention. Subsequent thereto transfer of custody was made by the convention to the foundation of certain investments for trust and endowment funds, and the accounting of such specified funds has thereupon been handled by the foundation as a separate entity.

The operations of the executive office of the convention are divided into the following major classifications:

COLLECTING AND ACCOUNTING — Receiving contributions for the cooperative program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention, the various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and other designated donees.

STATE MISSIONS — Subdivided into rural and city missions, promotional and general, miscellaneous and administrative activities of all departments of the convention.

THE BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME — Embracing all transactions pertaining to solicitation of monies and supplies, operation of the children's home and care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, and maintenance of the orphanage properties.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY — Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma, and maintenance of assembly property.

BAPTIST MESSENGER — Maintenance and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BAPTIST TRAINING UNION — Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in churches of the state.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION AND SACRED MUSIC — Coordinating Baptist work in the student union centers at the various

state educational institutions and fostering better music in the churches.

MINISTERS', EMPLOYES' AND WIDOWS' RETIREMENT, RELIEF AND ANNUITY PLANS — For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers, missionaries, churches and organizations throughout Oklahoma participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

BUILDING PROGRAM — Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

COMMENTS

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock, with its principal place of business at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It was created by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and its Articles of Incorporation and by-laws were approved by the body in convention assembled at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 28, 1946. Its stated purpose was to build, undergird and stabilize the agencies and institutions owned and operated by the convention.

The purpose for which the corporation was formed is that of a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature and wheresoever situated. . . for church and other religious and charitable purposes. . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise any money or property to be used as may be directed;

to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education and both home and foreign missionary work; to borrow money; hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action and suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to procure funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, dispense and invest funds according to designations made and as set out in the charter.

Accordingly on April 7, 1947, transfer of custody was made from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma of certain investments and their corresponding trust and endowment funds totaling \$76,776.29.

Cash and other contributions during the year 1951 are summarized in Exhibit "C"—Statement of General Fund and the cash transactions are further detailed in Exhibits "D" and "F" and Schedule 1.

It is secured by a first mortgage on the Hollums Building located at 1010 N. Broadway, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This building was donated to the Foundation in January 1950, by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hollums with the provision that the Foundation assume the liability for the mortgage which had a balance due of \$35,054.78, at that time. The building is recorded on the books at an appraisal value of \$100,000.00.
