# CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

### ARTICLE I-NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE II-CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the Convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

### ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This Convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

### ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

#### Section 1.

A. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary, a treasurer, and a historical secretary. It is hereby provided that the executive secretary may be treasurer.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. In balloting, the one receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

### ARTICLE V-BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this Convention.

### ARTICLE VI-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. This board shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the Convention and forty-eight (48) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be treasurer of the board.

Section 4. This board shall elect all denominational workers whose salaries are paid by the Convention (except those elected by the Convention) and may approve those whose salaries are paid in part by the Convention. This board shall also fix salaries of all denominational workers elected by the board and determine the fields of work for each.

### ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

### ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

### ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

### ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

#### BY-LAWS

### ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be fifty (50) including the president and secretary of the Convention.

The president of the Convention shall be ex-officio president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the Convention shall be ex-officio secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semi-annual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

### ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the Convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

### ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention. A Recording Secretary, elected by the Convention.

An Executive Secretary, elected by the Convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Executive Secretary and treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

### ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

### ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahama shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the Convention or the Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the Executive Secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the Convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year.

Convention Theme: "Partners in Progress"

Scripture: I Corinthians 3:9 "For we are labourers together with God."

# Music Under the Direction of Ira C. Prosser

- 1. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma met in the auditorium of the Capitol Hill Baptist Church of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, at 6:55 p.m. on Tuesday, November 11, 1952. This, the first session of the convention, was a joint meeting with, and closing session of, Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.
- 2. A five minute organ meditation was given by Mrs. Glenn Magers of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. President Anson Justice called the convention to order stating that it is the forty-seventh annual meeting of the Baptist General Convenion of Oklahoma.
- 4. Reverend Horace Lee Janes, Elk City, led in prayer for the blessings of God upon our convention.
- 5. Mr. Thad Roberts, Exchange Avenue church, led in congregational singing. Songs used were: "We're Marching to Zion," "Higher Ground." and "Christ for the Whole Wide World."
- 6. Mrs. Earl Stark, Holdenville, led in the devotional service. Her text was: James 4:17. "Lift up your feet and go" was the theme of her message.
- 7. President Justice appointed the Committee on Credentials as follows:

8. Reverend V. A. Jones, Sayre, presented the report on Home Missions, moved its adoption and spoke to the report. Motion carried for its adoption.

# Home Mission Report

The will and mind of our Saviour in the Great Commission is so plain that none should misunderstand. All authority, with all power, issues to all Christians a command to go into all the world and teach all things that he wills to be observed. God did not lay off the boundary lines of our cities, counties, states, and nations. Thus, we are not to think of Home Missions as set against any other of our mis-

sion programs. We should think of it as a complementary part of a world mission program placed upon us by the Lord himself. In the heart of Jesus was a world; he never thought of his kingdom as anything less. Jesus saw one world. There were no home and foreign lands, but one world in need of salvation.

This world evangelism that God has enjoined upon the churches is so great that it necessitates a strong and mighty home base. We cannot meet that need elsewhere while neglecting the same need at home. Thus, Southern Baptists, conscious of this, established our Home Mission Board one hundred seven years ago. With the passing of each year more laborers and additional departments have been added to meet the ever growing needs of the many nationalities, underpriviledged, and the new territories which have been added to our Home Mission field.

In 1951 our Home Mission personnel was 1,170, which was a gain of 145 over 1950. This group of witnesses delivered 99,033 sermons and addresses, and the Lord blessed with 36,390 conversions. These workers were endowed with a like spirit as that of Paul, which kept back nothing that was profitable. They conducted 23,372 prayer meetings, made 233,061 religious visits, personally witnessed to 79,636 souls, distributed 55,199 Bibles and Gospels, and placed into the hands of others 1,292,275 pages of religious tracts. There were 24,585 mission classes taught, 669 new missions opened, 239 new churches constituted, and 136 churches revived.

The 104 simultaneous schools of missions in which 1,885 churches participated enjoyed a grand total of 691,422 which brought the grand total for the past several years to 5,460,132. The 235 home missionaries and the 49 approved workers served for 669 weeks. There were 1,020 dedications to definite service, which brought the number to 9,548 for the past seven years.

Other accomplishments not given above were 387 chaplains, who reported 10,646 professions of faith. The evangelistic personnel of the Home Mission Board reported 7,485 baptisms with 11,068 additions. Our radio program, heard throughout the southland, is reaching many for Christ that only eternity will reveal.

# Foreign Mission Report

Southern Baptists had at the beginning of 1952 a total of 832 missionaries serving in 30 countries of the world. They were associated with 3,000 native Baptist workers and 1,900 organized churches, with a membership of 189,225. These churches are sponsoring 3,660 mission points. They reported 18,372 added to the church

ty baptism during the year. In 1951 Southern Baptists contributed \$8,900,000.00 to Foreign Missions.

There are signs that our people are beginning to consider earnesting the command of our Lord, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature . . ."

During the year, work has begun in three additional countries; Ecuador, Peru in South America; Southern Rhodesia in Africa. Missionaries have been assigned to Jordan, in the Near East, but will not be on the field until later on. With these additions the Foreign Mission Board now has missionaries residing in the 30 areas of the world.

Never in history has the confused world needed God as we need him today. We, as Baptists, must continue to carry the Gospel to the far corners of the world. In order to accomplish this task we recommend the following:

- 1. Encourage Bible-taught tithing in every church.
- Encourage an increase in budget percentages to the Cooperative Program.
- 3. Support the special Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.
- 4. Continue to pray for God's leadership in our Mission program.

Field representative of the Home, Reverend M. Judson Cook, brought an appeal to the messengers of the convention for the financial support of the Home. Special emphasis was given to the "One Day's Pay" campaign which is to be presented to the churches on November 23, 1952.

An offering was taken for the Home which amounted to \$486.24.

# Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home

In the new Revised Standard Version of the Bible in the letter to the Ephesians; the first chapter, verse 18 reads "... having the eyes of your heart enlightened ..." Here is an emotional feeling of understanding even beyond wisdom and knowledge.

Baptists interpret this, in practice, by having a great family of homeless children gathered together, where they minister to them in a Christian Home. This benevolent work begins its forty-ninth year of service and has had the privilege of providing for 1,547 children.

The beautiful buildings and the landscaped campus give an evidence of work performed. The best of planning for proper care and training of each child has had much thought and is followed fervently. Consecrated Christian men and women, feeling the call of God to serve, have been employed. They plant the seed of hope, love, and confidence with children who have been denied the very necessities of life.

There were eleven high school graduates this year. Six of these, by the help of scholarships, are enrolled in Oklahoma Baptist University. One is in college at Edmond, one a beauty operator, one in nurse's training, one married and the eleventh went to work at the telephone company. Baptists had served these young people a total of 99 years.

Blueprints for two new cottages are ready. We need \$60,000 more for the third cottage. Plans are made for our Golden Jubilee next fall and part of the program will be the dedication of the new cottages and perhaps the breaking of ground for others.

With "the eyes of your hearts enlightened" we expect a great Thanksgiving offering November 23 when all our people bring their "One Day's Pay." We pray our Baptist people shall be challenged with the "One Day's Pay" goal.

The Lord will use the hands of Oklahoma Baptists to build buildings and deliver the manna which is truly the daily food and keep of our Baptist Orphans' Home family. This is the heartbeat of Oklahoma Baptists.

# Religious Literature

Oklahoma Baptists' weekly news journal, the Baptist Messenger, brings the missionary message to an ever enlarging number of families each week as circulation continues to increase and more churches include the state paper in their budgets.

Circulation has reached 61,000. More than 630 churches have the **Baptist Messenger** in the budget and 59 use the club plan.

Latest Baptist news from churches, associations, the State Convention, Southern Baptist Convention and Baptist World Alliance is printed each week along with doctrinal and devotional articles of an inspirational nature. This material is designed to keep our people informed of all denominational activities and to help them become stronger Christians and better church members. No other publication meets this need.

We recommend most highly the many fine publications of our Baptist Sunday School Board and call particular attention to the invaluable **Home Life**, a Christian family magazine. Reading of the two great missionary publications, **The Commission** and **Southern Baptist Home Missions**, is encouraged.

An ultimate objective for the state paper is "Every Baptist family in Oklahoma reading the **Baptist Messenger** every week."

To hasten the realization of this high ideal we make the following recommendations:

- That every church be encouraged to include the Baptist Messenger in the church budget.
- 2. That every family in the church membership be placed on the mailing list.
- 3. That new members be added to the mailing list as soon as they join the churches.

# **Baptist Foundation**

# CASH RECEIPTS, TRUST, AND WILLS

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has had its best year. This report covers the period, September 15, 1951 to September 15, 1952. During that time, the total cash receipts have amounted to \$142,-16512 including income from investments, and contributions for the following causes: Oklahoma Baptist University, Oklahoma Baptist Itahans' Home, Baptist Student Centers at A. & M. and O. U., Miami Espital Trust, E. C. Routh Memorial, Falls Creek Assembly, Oklahoma City Baptist Hospital, Hollums Building, Holcomb Annuity, Fanard Stock, Foreign Missions Trust, Herbert Leases, Student Loan Notes and Funds, Kinnard Foreign Missions, Grow Estates at Frederick and Oklahoma City, Miscellaneous and Undesignated. The Emplut received by trusts in the way of stocks, bonds, and properties totals \$62,210.00, which makes a total of \$204,515.12 in actual reneipts.

In addition, fifteen wills have been written with bequests to the Foundation for Baptist causes totaling \$302,000.00, and a pledge of \$500,000 to be paid over a period of five years, which makes a grand total of \$556,515.12 which has been contributed outright or written as bequests in wills.

Not included in this amount are the bequests in the will of Olive C. Thurmond, which has been admitted for probate in the Carter County Court, and which will not be received until 1953. The bequests designated for the Foundation and the Oklahoma Baptist University will, perhaps, exceed \$250,000.00, which will be the largest amount in bequests ever to be given in any single will to Oklahoma Baptist causes. A more detailed and appropriate report will be given concerning the bequests from the Olive C. Thurmond estate in our 1953 report.

# KERR ORPHANS' HOME COTTAGE

The Foundation gratefully reports the receipts of gifts from Senator and Mrs. Robert S. Kerr, for the construction of a cottage at the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home. The cottage will be a memorial to Senator Kerr's deceased father, Wm. Samuel Kerr, who was a pioneer of Oklahoma and lived at Ada. The building will cost approximately \$100,000.00. The Board of Directors of the Convention, upon the recommendation of the building committee, will have a recommendation regarding authorization from the Convention for building the cottage.

# STUDENT CENTERS CAMPAIGN

In keeping with the policy of the Convention to channel all capital and endowment funds through the Foundation, the Board of Directors of the Convention requested the Foundation to lead in a special campaign to procure additional funds for the Oklahoma University and the Oklahoma A. & M. Baptist Student Centers.

After the building committee for these centers had revised building plans and by eliminating some items for the buildings, furnishings, landscapings, etc., it was only necessary to procure \$50,000.00 in additional funds, instead of the \$200,000.00 which would have been

necessary in keeping with original plans. However, the centers will have the same floor space as the original plans, which have been printed in a special folder.

With the understanding in the beginning, that this was not to be a "church campaign" in the sense of apportioning amounts to be raised by churches, the Foundation outlined what it called a "Sponsor" program, for the procuring of funds. Sponsors or solicitors were pledged to endeavor to raise a specified amount.

Later, realizing that a large amount of the additional funds that would be needed for these centers would be contributed by gifts in the lower brackets, the Foundation, with the approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention, has planned zone dinner meetings for the purpose of getting together a group of individuals so that the centers' cause could be presented, with an opportunity being given to those present to make pledges and contributions for the campaign.

Up to date, through various means, the Foundation has received in pledges and contributions \$30,000.00. The Board of Directors of the Convention is making recommendations in its report regarding the completion of this campaign. It is the hope of your Foundation that the additional funds needed will be paid, or, at least, pledged by the end of 1952.

# O.B.U. ENDOWMENT AND CHURCH BUILDING LOAN FUND

The Board of Directors of the Convention has appropriated \$100,000.00 to the Foundation from the 1952 Cooperative Program for OBU endowment and Church Building Loan Fund. The \$100,000.00 will not be available until the Cooperative Program goal of \$1,200,000.00 is reached. The amount received from this allocation will be held in trust by the Foundation as OBU endowment, but the Board of Directors of the Convention designated that it might be loaned to churches for buildings, preference being given to churches desiring to construct mission buildings.

Anticipating the receipt of the \$100,000.00, the Foundation is making plans and policies for the lending of this fund when the allocation is available. Several inquiries and applications have already been made for loans from this fund.

According to the proposed 1953 Cooperative Program, the Foundation will receive \$36,232.85 for OBU endowment and Church Building Loan Fund. It is hoped that individuals, churches and groups will make a contribution to the Foundation for this fund during 1953.

#### POLICIES

During these early years of the Foundation, it is necessary to make policies affecting its work not only in the present, but in the future, as well. Among the policies made during the past year, we mention four:

1. The creation of the advisory council, in keeping with a recommendation which was approved by the 1951 Convention. The council is made up of representatives from the 38 associations, and are elected for a term of one year. The purpose of the council is to advise with the Board of Directors and to assist in promoting the work of the Foundation within the associations. The first meeting of the council with the directors was held at Oklahoma City, on September 4, with an excellent attendance.

2. Plans have been made with Miss Margaret Hutchison, executive secretary, and the Woman's Missionary Union for an active cooperation on the part of the WMU in promoting the work of the Foundation. State, associational and church chairmen have been elected, just as chairmen of other phases of the WMU work are elected.

The Southern and Oklahoma Baptist Brotherhoods made the Foundation one of their major objectives in 1950. Rev. J. A. Pennington, secretary, and the Oklahoma Brotherhood have been most cooperative with the program of the Foundation.

- 3. A publicity program has been worked out with other state Foundations which has resulted in the securing of better publicity material at less cost.
- 4. The Foundation has approved a comprehensive program for the procuring of funds, including contributions in cash, stocks, bonds, properties, gift contracts, life insurance, and bequests in wills.
  - Foundation clubs have been set up, and certificates are (1) issued to members for as small a contribution as \$25.00.
  - At the present time, the main emphasis is being given to (2)the procuring of gifts through the media of cash, stocks, bonds, properties with trust agreements, and through wills.
  - (3) The best way for one to contribute real properties is by

deed. Properties may be deeded with a trust agreement in which certain stipulations are agreed upon by the donor and the Foundation. A donor may deed properties with a trust agreement, reserving a life interest for himself and his wife, with the properties being used by the Foundation for the cause or causes designated by the donor after his or their decease.

- (4) It is through the medium of wills that the Foundation will receive a large percentage of its gifts. Thousands of Oklahoma Baptist property owners have no wills. There are millions of dollars in the estates of Oklahoma Baptists that should go to the Foundation that will otherwise go to taxes, unless they are encouraged to write wills in which bequests are made to the Foundation for Baptist causes.
- (5) Every possible assistance will be given to the testator or his attorney in the writing of a will. The Foundation will serve as executor of the will. Our people should be taught and encouraged to put the will of God in their wills by bequeathing a portion of their estates to the Foundation with some Baptist cause as the beneficiary.
- (6) JANUARY has been designated as "Make-Your-Will Month" in the calendar of activities of Southern and Oklahoma Baptists. Posters and folders on will-making will be available for all of the churches.
- (7) There surely would be no question regarding the prerogative of the Foundation among our Baptist people in the field of procuring funds through trusts and wills.

# THE FOUR-YEAR PROGRAM

In keeping with the general over-all program of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the next four years, ending in 1956, which will be the 50th anniversary of the Convention, the Foundation has set up the following goals:

# Baptist Book Stores

Growth is always a healthy sign. Increased sales and services necessarily call for increase in store space and equipment. The Baptist Book Store of Tulsa has been handicapped by the need of space for several years. Recently they were able to double the floor space of the store by securing the remainder of the building which they occupy. We all rejoice with Manager Martin and her staff in this newly remodeled store and predict they will increase their sales far in excess of the goal set for this year.

Two departments of our work have had unusual growth this past year. The Visual Education Department now has in its film rental library 230 prints of 16mm films which are available to all our churches. From January, 1952, through June, 1952, bookings from this library numbered 1,175. The Baptist Sunday School Board is emphasizing the establishment of church libraries in village and rural churches during this year. Since the movement was begun April 1, 27 new libraries have been opened in Oklahoma. The value of a book in the hands of a boy or girl cannot be estimated. Our churches have the opportunity to guide the reading of their young people through the selection of the right kind of books circulated through their church libraries. The facilities of both of these departments are available through either the Oklahoma City or the Tulsa store.

The sales goal as set for the year 1952 is a  $17\frac{1}{2}\%$  increase in sales over 1951. Oklahoma had reached 103.68% through the month of August and stands sixth in goal standing among the states.

We are grateful to the Baptists of Oklahoma for the support given these two stores. We pledge to you our earnest efforts to give you the best service possible for us to give.

- 38. Reverend Tom E. Carter, administrator of the Southwest Baptist Hospital, Mangum, gave the report on Baptist Hospitals and spoke on the importance of the healing ministry. Motion carried for its adoption.

# Baptist Hospitals In Oklahoma

For a period of 43 years at Muskogee, 33 years at Miami, 3 years at Mangum, 1½ years at Perry, and 6 months at Stillwater, or a total of 81 years, Oklahoma Baptists have been engaged in the hospital ministry. This represents 29,565 days of hospital operation. In the past 12 months, we have given 45,196 patient days of care in our five houses of healing.

More and more, through the years, we have learned through our operation of hospitals the value of caring for the sick and afflicted as a means of carrying out the ministry of Jesus. Not to perform acts of healing, that rests with God, but to provide a place where the sick may be cared for in a Christian atmosphere.

Oklahoma Baptists recognized this need when they opened the hospital at Muskogee in 1909; continued interest was shown in the acceptance of the Miami Baptist Hospital at Miami, Oklahoma, June, 1919. Thirty years passed before the people of Mangum, Oklahoma re-awakened our interest in the hospital field. Then, we accepted the hospital property and assumed operation of the Southwest Baptist Hospital at Mangum. Two years later, through the efforts of the Baptist people of Perry, Oklahoma, we were offered another

opportunity for furthering our hospital ministry. We accepted a contract to operate the newly erected Perry Memorial Hospital at Perry. This move provided the way for another hospital when, in less than a year, the city of Stillwater, Oklahoma asked that we take over the operation of the Stillwater Municipal Hospital.

The Stillwater hospital is the largest of the five operated by the Baptist General Convention. J. P. Cox, the present administrator, was transferred to the Stillwater hospital from the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital at Muskogee, beginning the operation at Stillwater, May 1, 1952. Dr. J. Frank Murrell came to the Muskogee hospital from the Miami Baptist Hospital. Joe R. Baker moved to the Miami hospital from the Southwest Baptist Hospital at Mangum, and Tom E. Carter came to the Mangum hospital from the Perry Memorial Hospital. David Foster, pastor of the First Baptist church of Anadarko, Oklahoma became administrator at Perry, Oklahoma.

In the five hospitals, we now have a total of 330 beds and 75 bassinets. From September 1, 1951, through August 31, 1952, including five months of operation at Stillwater, we have admitted 8,294 patients, for a total of 45,196 patient days of care, during which time 1,339 babies were born. Our hospitals have averaged admitting 29 patients each day, and have had 161 average patients in hospitals during this period. During this same period, at a cost of \$19,442.81, we have given 1,175 days of charity service to those unable to pay for care and medication. All of this has been done in the name of the Baptist people of Oklahoma, who provided through cash gifts the amount of \$6,489.93. Linen received from the state Woman's Missionary organizations is valued at \$2,933.77, for a total of \$9,423.70.

The Mother's Day Offering this past year was designated for the School of Nursing at Muskogee. This is the only church-operated nurses' training school in Oklahoma, other than Catholic. We have fifty student nurses in training at this time, the largest class in the history of the school. Oklahoma Baptists provided \$12,190.40 through the Mother's Day Offering, leaving a balance or loss of more than \$12,000.00 for operation of the School of Nursing during 1952. Student nurses are required to pay \$250.00 for the three years' tuition. Out of this amount we must house them, furnish uniforms, instructors, junior college tuition and other necessities during these three years.

Let us not forget that the Mother's Day Offering for 1953 goes to our School of Nursing at Muskogee, and we should give even more liberally than in the past.

In the five hospitals, we employ more than 300 persons, including registered nurses, practical nurses, nurse aids, technicians, dieticians, assistants, engineers, office personnel and numerous other employees. We use approximately 2,000 pounds of laundry each day, and buy \$231.63 worth of food each day. Our utilities cost averages \$66.82 per day.

Reverend Ben F. Bland is the chaplain of all five Baptist hospitals. He makes his home at Stillwater, Oklahoma, and will be in the other hospitals on frequent occasions.

Through the five hospitals, Oklahoma Baptists are striving to

carry on the ministry to the sick and afflicted—in a small way attempting to represent Jesus, who came preaching, teaching and healing.

# **Brotherhood**

The work of the Brotherhood in Oklahoma continues to show remarkable progress.

- 1. As of October 1, 1952, there are 551 churches in Oklahoma reporting active Brotherhoods.
- All 38 of our associations have a functioning associational organization.
- There were 6,220 men in attendance at the evening meetings of the Evangelistic and Missionary conferences in January, 1952.
- 4. Thirty-three associations were represented in our state Brotherhood Convention. Five challenging goals were unanimously adopted by the group: 100 new Brotherhoods, 10 laymen's revivals, 100 boys enlisted in Sunday School through the Man and Boy Movement, 3,000 Brotherhood Journals per quarter, and 20 associational Brotherhood clinics. - 6. This department for the second year cooperated with the Woman's Missionary Union by paying the salary of Mr. Bob Banks of Baylor University as Field Worker with the Royal Ambassadors for the summer. His work has been very acceptable and the reports are encouraging.

In order that our men of Oklahoma may more efficiently and effectively serve the Lord through our churches and be better informed as to the work of our denomination we would recommend:

- (1) A Brotherhood organization in every church, making regular monthly reports to the church and quarterly reports to the associational Brotherhood presidents and the state Brotherhood secretary.
- (2) That our associational Brotherhoods be thoroughly organized and that the presidents be asked to make regular quarterly reports to the associational boards and to the state Brotherhood secretary. Also, that the dates and places of meetings for the quarterly associational Brotherhood rallies be planned immediately and included in the calendar of activities for the association.
- (3) That the state Brotherhood Convention be held on Monday night and Tuesday preceding the annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
- (4) That every possible effort be made to build a great attendance in each association for the January, 1953, Pre-Jubilee meetings for our men. (These meetings are to take the place of the associational Evangelistic and Missionary conferences formerly held in January.)
- (5) That the men of Oklahoma make plans to attend the first Brotherhood conference at Glorieta, New Mexico, June 22-29, 1953.

# Woman's Missionary Union

# CO-WORKERS . . . LOOKING . . . LIFTING CO-WORKERS

We bring our report of Woman's Missionary Union under this title drawn from our permanent and 1952-53 WMU Watchwords, Laborers together with God, Lift up your eyes and look on the fields for they are white already to harvest.

Co-workers are we with women of the South as auxiliary both to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the Southern Baptist Convention in disseminating missionary information in order to help bring about an increase in gifts to mission work as directed by the Baptist Foreign, Home and State Mission Boards.

The State WMU executive secretary with the young people's secretary, state officers, state chairmen and office secretaries have worked together in twenty-three state meetings and series of meetings, eight of which were young people's state meetings. The recent fourteen District WMU conferences were attended by 3,370 women, 707 more than attended these practical conferences last year. These meetings were designed to prepare officers as better co-workers.

For state and associational meetings during the summer, Woman's Missionary Union secured 35 different missionary speakers to serve in 133 associational, district and state camps, rallies and assemblies, contacting more than 10,000 people during the summer.

Oklahoma WMU has been represented in all Southwide WMU meetings. Again we met our quota of sivty delegates for the Southern WMU meeting in Miami, with many, many visitors besides.

The thirty-eight associational WMU presidents have promoted WMU work through regular quarterly rallies and special institutes and clinics. The average attendance at quarterly rallies reported for three quarters was 2,713. The summer rallies had 3,016 present.

At the close of the WMU year, September 30, there were 785-missionary societies in Oklahoma and 1,794 young peoples' organizations, with a WMS membership of 25,524. There are 133 Full Graded Woman's Missionary Unions.

# CO-WORKERS . . . LOOKING

Members of Woman's Missionary Union have studied missions through regular society and circle programs, through mission study books, Missionary Round Tables and weeks of prayer programs. They have made community missions surveys to look upon the fields white to harvest in their own communities. They have looked near through home mission books. They have lifted their eyes and looked afar through foreign missions books. They have seen many mission fields through weeks of prayer programs, state, home and foreign:

The Home Mission Study Institute schedule for January 3 was sleeted out, but seventeen associations held their institutes with 783 mission teachers of all grades attending. The Foreign Mission Study Institute enrolled 201 from 29 associations and one Indian association. The state institute limited the groups to five or seven for each association. The State WMU office distributed 2,100 packages of teaching helps for 26 associational institutes. In all, the office distributed 3,300 packets of teaching helps on the foreign series alone.

The State Community Missions Conference, recently held, directed the eyes of 252 women to look upon their own communities through discussions, mainly on the two major emphases in Community Missions for 1952-53. These are "Ministry to Other Races and Nationalities" and "Christian Living in the Home."

# CO-WORKERS . . . LOOKING . . . LIFTING

"For it is God who in His good will is at work in your hearts, inspiring your will and your action." Philippians 2:13 (Goodspeed)

Having looked and surveyed the fields, women were then ready to get under the load to lift. Women, as auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention, as one way of lifting have loved promoting mission giving primarily as it is done through our churches through the Cooperative Program and the special seasons of prayer offerings. So much do we believe in the Cooperative Program, our Standard of Excellence requires that at least 75% of the members of each WMU organization contribute regularly to missions through the Cooperative Program. We also add that we believe the tithe should be given through the church budget, always working toward a larger proportion of the church income going for missions. Another standard requirement for WMS is a 10% net increase in tithers

annually. The third quarter there were reported 9,902 tithers among the women of WMU.

The offerings for the past year for the three seasons of prayer were:

Lottie Moon Christmas Offerings for Foreign Missions \_\_\$123,144.37 Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions \_\_\_\_\_\_ 45,340.35 Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions as of Oct. 17 15,737.96 State WMU Apportionment, \$12,053.37, which cares for certain Southwide WMU obligations and certain educational objectives; \$1,200.00 for the WMU Training School expenses, \$1,800.00 for scholarships for young women in training for Christian service in Southern Baptist Training Schools; \$1,100.00 for Margaret Fund Burney Gifts and the Foreign Student Fund and \$1,500.00 for the nursery for OBU students' children.

One of the best ways of lifting is to pray God's blessings and power upon His workers. Daily, women and young people pray for missions in their homes, using the prayer calendar. They pray for missions at every gathering of any WMU organization. They spend a day in prayer for state missions and a week in prayer for home missions and a week in prayer for foreign missions.

As eyes have been lifted through surveys, women have done much to lift their communities to better conditions for Christian living.

Our State WMU chairmen have helped promote various phases of our State Baptist work: The Mother's Day Offering for the School of Nursing; the One Day's Pay for the Orphans' Home, the church scholarships from our churches for Oklahoma Baptist University. We now have associational Baptist Foundation chairmen to help the Foundation promote this year the Baptist Student Centers.

Our Christian Education chairman has done an excellent work with scholarship students in O.B.U. last year. Woman's Missionary Union provides scholarships for eleven young women in seminaries and the WMU Training School. These young women are being prepared to lift up Christ in various parts of the world.

Thus has been reported some of the work of Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention, Co-Workers . . . Looking . . . Lifting.

# Report of the Board of Directors INTRODUCTION

Archimedes, the ancient Greek scientist, said that if he had a crowbar large enough he could lift anything. Psychological research says that if you have a sufficiently strong motive, you can do almost anything. Jesus said, "Ask and ye shall receive, seek—find, knock—opened"!

Oklahoma Baptists are now witnessing a year of unparalled and phenomenal progress. The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma humbly and gratefully acknowledges these remarkable blessings. We now know the meaning of Jehovah's words when he said, "Call unto me and I will answer thee, and show thee great and mighty things which thou knowest not." Jeremiah 33:3.

This year we have watched a strong new leader apply the fulcrum of faith in God and confidence in the people. Doctor Thomas B. Lackey, our executive secretary, has literally "Trusted the Lord and told the people". With the crowbar of confidence in God and Oklahoma Baptists he has lifted a challenge to goals we had heretofore thought unattainable. With the love of our Lord as his only motive he has instilled in us the compelling desire to accomplish the impossible and to breathe the rarified atmosphere of new mountain peaks of achievement. We have caught sight of new plateaus that may be reached if we "ask, and seek, and knock."

We urge all Oklahoma Baptists to join the Board of Directors in earnest prayer for Doctor Lackey and all of our denominational servants. If we will do this, the future of the Baptist work in this state will be "as bright as the promises of God".

Here is an account of the activities and recommendations of your Board of Directors elected at the last anual convention.

# DEPARTMENTS, INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES

Since there will be printed elsewhere in this booklet detailed reports from each department, institution and agency it is not necessary for the Board of Directors to duplicate this information. The report of the Board is confined to actions taken by the Board of Directors during the year, and with recommendations to this convention. Suffice it to say here that each department, institution and agency has made remarkable gains, as careful study of the various reports will reveal.

# ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

On December 4, 1951 the Board of Directors elected W. E. Grindstaff, pastor of the First Baptist church, Mangum as assistant executive secretary. Mr. Grindstaff has the background of successful pastorates, chaplain in the armed forces and secretary of the department of evangelism in Colorado.

The church at Mangum made phenomenal progress under his capable leadership. This church is contributing 40 per cent to world missions through the Cooperative Program this year. Mr. Grindstaff assisted the city of Mangum and surrounding communities in raising approximately \$100,000 for the establishment of Southwest Baptist Hospital.

His first year of service in the capacity of assistant executive serretary leads the Board of Directors to believe that the Holy Scirit has led in the election of W. E. Grindstaff to this position. He has served in every section of the state in various capacities and has been well received by all the churches.

# SIMULTANEOUS STEWARDSHIP EFFORT October 18-25, 1953

We recommend that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma join the other states of the Southern Baptist Convention in a Simultaneous Sewardship Emphasis Week, October 18-25, 1953. The aim is a school of stewardship in every church at the same time. The still small voice of God urges us to aggressive action. World needs call for Oklahoma Baptists to advance in stewardship. The love of Carist constrains us to go forward.

The plans for a simultaneous stewardship effort, October 18-25, 1953 have been accepted in all sections of the state and have met with enthusiasm everywhere. Every organization, department and agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is cooperating. Pastors and churches all over our state have indicated their desire to participate.

# HERE ARE THE PLANS

New books now being prepared for this school of stewardship include: Growing in Stewardship, Merrill D. Moore; Good Stewards, J. E. Dillard; Partners with God, Elizabeth Evans Terry; The Talking Penny, Bethann Van Ness. Sunday School and Training Union credit will be given for the completion of the young people and adult books when the necessary requirements for credit are met. Training Union credit only may be secured for the completion of the junior and intermediate books. We recommend a goal of one-half of the resident church membership attending this stewardship study course in every church. This would mean more than 100,000 people in Oklahoma studying stewardship at the same time.

- 1. The associational stewardship committee which has already been elected in every association will be asked to plan a leadership rally in each asociation in 1953. At this rally the School of Stewardship plans will be presented to the leadership of the churches in the association. Upon this leadership rally will depend much of the success of the School of Stewardship. A similar stewardship committee should be appointed in every church and should be present at the rally.
- 2. A carefully prepared budget should be prayerfully presented in every church on October 18 or the nearest convenient Sunday.
- 3. Every-Member Canvass Day when everybody is given an opportunity to pledge to the budget will be on Sunday, November 15 or the nearest convenient Sunday.

There are certain principles we must follow for success in the stewardship effort. We must utilize all organizations; enlist every church and its entire leadership and then strive to reach the entire membership. We should set a goal for at least one-half of the entire resident membership in attendance each night. We must make it an all church program with each organization promoting attendance every night. We must pray that God will direct in all the plans

for this advance in stewardship. We must remember that in such spiritual matters advance will come "not by might nor by power, but by my spirit, saith the Lord". (Zechariah 4:6).

# A FOUR YEAR PROGRAM OF PROGRESS FOR OKLAHOMA BAPTISTS—1953-1956

At the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma on December 3, 1951, the president of the convention was requested to appoint a committee charged with the responsibility of preparing a long-range plan or program of activity for the convention.

After consultation with Doctor T. B. Lackey, executive secretary, and the department heads of Oklahoma Baptist work, the committee suggested a four year plan to be launched at the State Convention in 1952, and to be climaxed at the State Convention in 1956, at which time our convention will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary.

The four year "Program of Progress" as suggested and approved by the directors of the convention on March 3, 1952, is divided into goals and means for reaching those goals. This is the over-all plan. Each department head of the State Convention staff has prepared his own detailed four year program. We believe that every association and many Baptist churches in the state have a similar program or will have one in the near future.

#### MEANS

- A detailed written four year program in every department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma with definite goals and specific plans for reaching these goals has been prepared. This will supplement and distribute the responsibility in this over-all four year plan.
- 2. A suggested four year plan for every association with goals and means recommended by department heads of the Baptist General Convention has already been adopted. This was prepared as early as possible to enable the association to carefully consider, raise or lower suggested goals. Action by associations on the entire four year plan was taken at the annual meetings in most cases.
- 3. An associational committee broke down the suggested four-year goals for the churches and suggested some means for reaching these goals. Every church should now carefully consider these suggestions and then make its own "Four Year Program of Progress." Of course, these goals will be raised or lowered to suit the pleasure of the local church.
- 4. We recommend that at the respective annual meetings, the local church, the association, and the State Convention should hear a detailed report on progress in reaching goals. At this time plans should also be made for reaching the next year's goals. If goals for the year ahead need to be changed, this is the time to do it. Some changes are to be expected.
- 5. This plan calls for much prayer, new plans, intense activity, more publicity, an optimistic expectancy, the spirit of victory, and above all, Christ-like cooperation. With God's help, we will not fail.

# STILLWATER HOSPITAL

Early in 1952 the city of Stillwater asked the Baptist General Convention to operate the Stillwater Municipal Hospital on a similar basis as that in the Perry Memorial Hospital. The Catholic sisters, who had operated this institution for ten years, terminated their lease with the city. After thorough investigation, the Board of Directors, on March 3, 1952, voted to authorize the submitting of a bid for a lease on the hospital at Stillwater. The attorney was instructed to exercise due care to see that the terms of this lease would not violate the historic Baptist principle of separation of church and state.

This institution and its equipment belongs to the city of Stillwater. The Baptist General Convention began operation May 1, 1952. Mr. J. P. Cox, former administrator of the Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, was transferred to Stillwater as administrator.

During the first six months of operation hundreds have received care in the name of Christ and our Baptist denomination. This is our largest hospital.

#### THE CONSTITUTION

After careful study and much deliberation, the Board of Directors recommends the following changes in the Constitution and By-Laws, as prepared by a special committee of the Board of Directors composed of M. E. Ramey, chairman, H. H. Hobbs, W. A. Carleton, H. Tom Wiles and Grady C. Cothen. The entire Constitution and By-Laws are printed below with all proposed changes indicated by heavy or bold-face type.

# CONSTITUTION

# ARTICLE I-NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Con-

# ARTICLE II-CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the Fork of the Convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and the additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no murch shall have over ten messengers.

# ARTICLE III-OBJECT

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This Convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together inpromoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

# ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

# Section 1.

- A. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary, a treasurer, and a historical secretary. It is hereby provided that the executive secretary may be treasurer.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the rmainder of his term by the first vice president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. In balloting, the one receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared elected.
- Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

# ARTICLE V-BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this Convention.

# ARTICLE VI-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors **elected** by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. This board shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the Convention and forty-eight (48) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it. He may also be treasurer of the board.

Section 4. This board shall elect all denominational workers whose salaries are paid by the Convention (except those elected by the Convention) and may approve those whose salaries are paid in part by the Convention. This board shall also fix salaries of all denominational workers elected by the board and determine the fields of work for each.

# ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

# ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETING

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

# ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

# ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

# BY-LAWS ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be fifty (50) including the president and secretary of the Convention.

The president of the Convention shall be ex-officio president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the Convention shall be ex-officio secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be elegible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semi-annual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

# ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the Convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

# ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention. A Recording Secretary, elected by the Convention.

An Executive Secretary, elected by the Convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The Theasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Boad of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Executive Secretary and treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

# ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

# ARTICLE V

- Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.
- Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the Convention or the Beard of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the Executive Secretary.
- Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in casses of emergency which were unforseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the Stte of Oklahoma.

# ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the Convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year.

# BROTHERHOOD CONVENTION

The Board of Directors upon the suggestion of the Brotherhood Committee recommends that the annual state Brotherhood convention be held on Monday night, Tuesday morning, and Tuesday afternoon preceding the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention. This meeting is to take the place of the annual Pastors and Laymen's Conference now being held on Tuesday morning and afternoon preceding the convention.

This change is recommended because there are conflicts in the spring months with the Sunday School and Training Union conventions and the Simultaneous Revivals. We believe it will be possible to build a larger attendance and bring more laymen into the following sessions of the Baptist General Convention.

#### EVANGELISM

In keeping with the southwide plans for evangelism in 1955 the Board of Directors upon the recommendation of the committee on evangelism recommends that our state be divided into two territories and that two dates for simultaneous revivals be set for 1955. It is recommended that the South Canadian river be designated as the dividing line. The twenty-two associations in the southern area which includes 530 churches should have their revivals March 27-April 10. The sixteen associations including 532 churches in the northern area should have their revivals April 10-24.

It is believed that these dates will be very satisfactory because most of the associations are having simultaneous revivals the two weeks preceding and the two weeks following Easter Sunday. This will enable the churches to secure other pastors in the state to assist in their revivals.

# OKLAHOMA BAPTIST CHAPLAINS

We recommend continued prayer for Oklahoma Baptist ministers who are now serving as chaplains in the armed forces. Our records reveal that the following men are at the present time serving as chaplains:

These men are our missionaries to the youth of our land. They deserve our assistance.

The chaplaincy offers an unparalleled opportunity for missionary service. Unfortunately the Southern Baptist quota is not filled. We urge all qualified young ministers to carefully consider this field of service.

# BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The Baptist Student Union committee composed of H. H. Hobbs, Thurmond George, M. E. Ramay and Harold McGlamery in conference with pastors and student secretaries where Baptist Student Union work is being conducted has given much thought to the Baptist Student Union program and its relation to the local church and Convention. We therefore recommend that the Baptist Student Union be defined as "a department of a local church or churches reaching out to the Baptist and Baptist preference students to enlist them in the full program of the local churches and to enable them to better understand the whole program of our denomination." The Board of Directors also recommends that the local Baptist Student Union secretary and other personnel be elected and directed by the church or churches and will therefore be members of the local staff. The state secretary and Board of Directors are to act in an advisory role to coordinate the local Baptist Student Union work with denominational aims and policies. The State Baptist Student Union department is not to exercise authority but to offer counsel and cooperation.

# RETIREMENT PLANS

A special campaign was launched last spring to encourage ministers and other full-time church workers and churches to participate in the Ministers Retirement and Widows Supplemental Annuity Plans. One year ago 341 were enrolled in the Ministers Retirement plan and 103 in the Widows Supplemental Annuity plan. New applications have been received which bring the total to 412 in the Ministers Retirement plan and 140 in the Widows Supplemental Annuity plan. We recommend that every church worker participate as fully as possible in all of our retirement and annuity plans.

During the past year, the following have been retired: Reverend Andrew H. Borum, Mr. Charles McGaha, Reverend W. R. Martin, Doctor Elmer Ridgeway, Reverend Ben F. Bland and Mrs. Flora D. Wilkie. We have 76 members who are receiving monthly annuity checks, and 26 churches that participate in the Ministers Retirement Plan whose pastors do not participate.

#### GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

Nineteen hundred and fifty-six will be the Golden Anniversary of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In order to properly celebrate the completion of fifty years of service, the Board of Directors asked Doctor W. A. Carleton to prepare a history of the Baptist work in Oklahoma. He was authorized to appoint a committee to work with him in the preparation of the history and other details concerning the Golden Anniversary convention. Committee members are Charles H. Black, Marvin Gaskin, Lee Spencer, Harry Roark and W. A. Carleton.

The committee met in the Baptist office in Oklahoma City October 7. At the suggestion of the committee, the Board of Directors recommends the following:

- 1. That the Convention create a Historical Commission consisting of nine (9) members, to be elected annually by the Convention to serve terms of three (3) years, provided that the first year members shall be elected as follows: Three (3) members to serve one year; three (3) members to serve two years; and three (3) members to serve three years.
- 2. That the historical secretary serve as chairman of the com-
- 3. That this commission shall be responsible for planning and directing the Golden Anniversary observance of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1956.

#### 1952 COOPERATIVE PROGRAM GOAL INCREASED

The convention voted last year to adopt a goal of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the Cooperative Program for 1952. However, this objective was exceeded by more than \$4,000 in 1951. The response to the slogan, "Up Two in '52" was such that on March 3, 1952 the Board of Directors voted to increase the objective to \$1,200,000, and that the state's fifty per cent of the increase be placed with the Baptist Foundation, the income from which to be used as endownment for Oklahoma Baptist University, and that these funds be loaned to churches for building purposes, preference to be given churches desiring to erect mission buildings.

#### 1953 COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

We recommend that the slogan for 1953 be "Advance Three in '53" with an objective of \$1,400,000. We recommend that the \$1,400,000 Cooperative Program be distributed as follows:

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention recommends the election of the above named persons to the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation.

#### PROPOSED NEW BUILDINGS

The building committee of the Board of Directors, composed of Thurmond George, chairman, H. H. Hobbs, H. Tom Wiles, Harold McGlamery, M. E. Ramay, W. A. Carleton, J. W. Wade and Harold Lindsey, with the counsel of student secretaries and pastors from Norman and Stillwater, has given considerable thought and study to the proposed new student centers.

The building committee, with the counsel of the Orphans' Home committee, has also given considerable thought regarding the construction of new cottages at the Orphans' Home.

#### I. BSU Centers

Ideal locations at Norman and Stillwater have been secured and paid for in full, at a cost of \$75,419. There is available through the 1951 Cooperative Program, \$85,111.65; through the 1952 Cooperative Program, \$25,000; appropriated from 1953 Cooperative Program, \$50,000; cash and pledges through the Baptist Foundation, \$30,000; making a total of \$190,111.65. The approximate cost of each building, exclusive of air-conditioning and furnishings, is \$100,000.

#### WE RECOMMEND:

- 1. That the building committee of the Board of Directors be authorized to let contracts for the construction of these two centers and that we endeavor to have them ready for use by September 1, 1953.
- 2. That ground-breaking services be held at Norman on Dad's Day, November 15, 11:00 a.m. and at Stillwater, November 22, 11:00 a.m.
- 3. That the Baptist Foundation continue to secure additional funds for construction, air-conditioning and furnishings:
  - (1) By zone or associational dinner meetings.
  - (2) By churches or groups contributing out of budgets or special offerings.
  - (3) By special offerings at "Student Night at Christmas" programs.
  - (4) By approaching individuals who may be interested in this program.

## II. Orphans' Home Buildings

1. The Baptist Foundation now has contributions from Senator and Mrs. Robert S. Kerr, sufficient for the erection of a cottage at the Orphanage. We recommend that the building committee of the Board of Directors be authorized to construct this cottage when Senator and Mrs. Kerr approve building plans and procedure.

2. Funds on hand in the general office for the erection of another cottage total \$42,522.42. The Baptist Foundation has approximately \$9,000 that may be used for this purpose. Other friends have indicated their intention to contribute additional funds. There may be money available from the Cooperative Program allocation to the Home and from other sources, sufficient for the erection of a second cottage, immediately following the first of the year. We recommend that when sufficient funds are available for a second cottage, that the building committee be authorized to proceed with construction.

# III. O.B.U. Science Building

At the special session of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, October 10, 1952, President John W. Raley and Mr. Guy James, chairman of the building committee of the Oklahoma Baptist University Board of Trustees presented a recommendation made by the Board of Trustees on Februray 22, 1952. The recommendation is as follows: "We recommend that the residue of the T. A. Thurmond estate be designated as the original contribution to a Science Building honoring Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Thurmond

of Ardmore and that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma be requested to provide funds for the completion of this building as rapidly as possible. Actual construction is to begin only after receipt of at least \$200,000 or fifty per cent of the estimated funds needed for the completion of the entire project and then only after a confirming vote of the Board of Trustees of the University and the Board of Directors of the Convention.

"In order that the University building plans be incorporated in the projected program of the Convention for approval, we submit this recommendation for vitalization. We further recommend that authorization be granted for construction in accordance with stated provisions and with the following safeguard: That at no time shall construction proceed beyond the cost of money available or in sight. The Board of Directors recommends approval of this recommendation."

#### BUILDING COMMITTEE

Upon the recommendation of the building committee of the Board of Directors, the Board recommends that the Convention elect a standing building committee of twelve (12) members, whose term of office shall be three (3) years, with one (1) year intervening before any member shall be eligible for re-election to the committee; and whose duty shall be to make recommendations to the Convention or its Board of Directors regarding any new buildings to be erected by the institutions and agencies of the Convention and to assist in expediting all building programs.

The Board further recommends that the building committee of the Board of Directors, which has labored very satisfactorily in planning the student centers and cottages at the Orphanage, be asked to continue serving in this capacity until these projects are completed.

#### GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

The Board of Directors of the Baptist Convention of Oklahoma recommends:

- 1. That we continue to exercise the strictest economy which is consistent with efficient administration.
- 2. That we continue the policy of operating on a cash basis as far as possible.
- 3. That the 1953 State Mission budget be projected in such a fashion as to incur no deficits.
- 4. That all institutions and agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be instructed to incur no debts that are not authorized by the Board of Directors.
- 5. That we continue to emphasize the Cooperative Program as the main line of missionary endeavor for 1953.

#### CONCLUSION

God is our partner so we have made our plans large. We expect great things from our Heavenly Father, therefore, we shall attempt great things for him.

# Falls Creek Assembly

The growth and development of Falls Creek and the spiritual influence that has been projected by this Baptist institution is today a symbol of Oklahoma progress through partnership. The founders of the Assembly established it more than thirty years ago with a supreme faith and partnership with God. Our Baptist people, both young and old, have joined hands through the years in a partnership of purpose and provision to build a Christian encampment that leads all other Baptist assemblies.

For the first time in the thirty-six year history of Falls Creek the program was divided this year into two separate assemblies of seven days each. This proved to be a successful plan even though total registration was slightly under the 1951 figure. More full time registrations were recorded for the two periods than had been experienced in any previous assembly. The total registration for the two weeks was 18,419. During the first week 12,004 registrants were recorded with 4,942 of these representing persons who attended full time. Total registration for the second week was 6,415 with 2,150 full time registrants.

Class attendance remained at a higher level throughout both periods than during any former assembly. More than 7,000 awards were given as a result of this increased full time participation. Since one of the prinicipal objectives of Falls Creek Assembly is to provide Bible study for the throngs who attend, this objective was accomplished in a very effective manner. The daily worship programs and recreational activities were also given proper emphasis during the 1952 Assembly but with less strain on physical facilities because of the divided periods.

During the five-month period, from April through August, the Assembly accommodated twelve scheduled camps in addition to the two weeks annual Assembly. Total registration reported through the manager's office during this five-month period was 20,050. It is estimated that more than 10,000 different individuals were served by these camps and assemblies.

Accurate estimates on total property valuation at Falls Creek are not available since property ownership is distributed between, not only the Baptist General Convention, but also churches and individuals. The Baptist General Convention owns all of the land in the 195 acre tract and the valuation of this, together with Assembly-owned buildings, exceeds \$160,000.00. Church-owned property will likely increase this total by \$350,000.00.

Major improvements completed during 1952 were (1) black-topped roads totaling 8,000 feet (2) three new class pavilions (3) a chapel that may be enclosed for use during winter months (4) a new concession building (5) addition to the Assembly Hospital (6) new bridges across Falls Creek and across the dam at the Assembly lake.

The need for added physical improvements still prevails at Falls Creek. The most pressing of these needs are (1) new dormitories (2) additional road improvements (3) enlargement and remodeling of the Tabernacle (4) extension and improvement of the Assembly water system, and (5) concrete swimming pools.

Vernon C. Walker, Business Manager 65. Dr. E. W. Westmoreland presented his report for the department of Religious Education. Assistants in the department were introduced. Brother Westmoreland spoke to the report and motion carried for its adoption.

# Department of Religious Education Sunday School

When we check the record and find a continuous growth on the part of Baptist churches in Oklahoma in the field of religious education, we feel a deep sense of gratitude to God.

At the close of the year 1951, our Sunday school enrollment was 246,832. We have recently made a study of the present record over against the record for five years ago and we find that during the five year period, the Sunday school enrollment has increased by 67,857, or an approximate gain of a little more than 1,000 per month.

Our Sunday schools have had steady enrollment gains annually since 1945, but one of the most satisfactory gains is in the quality of work done, indicated by the increase in the number of Standard units and training awards earned by our Sunday school workers.

Our Standard record five years ago, over a period of twelve months, showed a total of 350 Standard units. This year we reported a total of 877 Standard schools, departments and classes.

Five years ago we reported 15,895 Sunday school training awards. This year we had a total of 31,098.

Last year 820 Vacation Bible Schools were reported in Oklahoma, with a total enrollment of 87,425, or a gain in enrollment over a five year period of 34,472 and a net gain of 280 in the number of schools held in our state.

At Falls Creek Assembly this year a total of sixty Sunday school and Training Union classes were offered each week with a total of 7,055 awards issued at the close of the two week period; 1,218 of these were Sunday school and 5,837 were Training Union awards.

#### A Look Into The Future

Beginning today (this report was written on October 1st) our new Sunday school year begins. Today is also the beginning of the Oklahoma Baptist Four Year Program of Progress, which includes Sunday school and Training Union work, along with other denominational causes. The following state goals have been accepted:

We are also now in the process of making preparation, along with our Southwide leaders and other states in the Southern Baptist Convention, for a campaign to reach "A Million More in '54". This will be by far the most gigantic effort Southern Baptists have ever made to reach people for Bible study.

# Training Union

At the close of 1951, our Training Union enrollment was 84,802 or a gain of 37,842 during the last five years. During 1952 a total of 36,178 Training Union awards were earned by Oklahoma Baptists over against 19,523 five years ago.

## Youth Rally

On May 31, 1952, the fifth annual State-Wide Youth Rally, sponsored by the Training Union Department, was held at Oklahoma Baptist University. With each succeeding year the attendance at this meeting has grown and this year the Oklahoma Baptist University auditorium was filled to capacity. At this meeting the state-wide Better Speakers' Tournament for young people, the Intermediate Sword Drill and the Junior Memory Work Contest were held. The winner of this year's Better Speakers' Tournament, Mr. Ronald Carlburg of Enid, went to the Southwide tournament at Ridge-crest and won first place.

# "M" Night

"M" (Mobilization) Night, which is held annually in the early part of December, has become an outstanding occasion for launching our Training Union program in the associations each year. We are happy to report that many associations in our state have such large attendance each year that it has become necessary to engage high school auditoriums, armories, or municipal auditoriums to accommodate the crowds.

# March Enlargement Month

We are looking forward to tremendous Training Union growth during 1953. A Southwide Simultaneous Enlargement Campaign will be held during the month of March and we are making an urgent request that all our churches re-study the Training Union methods books at that time. Since the Training Union Manuals have all been revised recently and since during the last two or three years our Training Union forces have given so much time to the study of evangelism during the spring and fall months, we have neglected the study of methods. We feel that the Southwide Enlargement Campaign in March of 1953 will be an ideal time for all our churches to have an intensive study of all Training Union method books.

# Stewardship Week October 18-25, 1953

The greatest week of training ever undertaken will be the Stewardship Week to be held next fall, October 18-25, 1953. Our Southern Baptist leaders have been working for two years on the plans for this school and are preparing a new book for each age group for use in the campaign. The Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention has requested that all our churches, without exception, engage in the study of stewardship at the same time, the pastor teaching the Adults and providing capable teachers for Young People, Intermediates and Juniors.

Brother Lackey, our executive secretary, has suggested that our attendance goal in Oklahoma be not less than 100,000. That goal would be impossible without the enthusiastic co-operation of all our state, associational and church leadership. Every department of our

denominational life, without exception, has pledged itself to full and complete support of this program. But to make the week a success, we need the wholehearted co-operation of every pastor, Sunday school superintendent, Training Union director, Brotherhood president, WMU president, educational director, choir director and others in places of leadership in the local church. If we all give our best in preparation for and promotion of Stewardship Week, making it the one thing in all our lives for one week, that goal can actually be attained.

# Evangelism

"Evangelism has no parallel." It is the central theme of the word of God. It is the insistent command of our risen Saviour. It is the divine imperative for every New Testament church. It is the pre-eminent task of every saved individual. As Oklahoma Baptists, let us always keep evangelism at the heart of all our work.

The following report will show that the year 1952 has been a good year in evangelism in our state. Every association except one conducted a simultaneous revival this year. Most of the associations made splendid preparation for these revivals. We believe that this fine preparation for the revivals, with the participation of so many of our churches have made possible this splendid report.

We are truly grateful to the Lord for the fine work that has been done by the chairmen of evangelism and the organizers in each association. Without the zealous, untiring, and cooperative efforts of our pastors the above accomplishments could not have been reported.

Dr. T. P. Haskins closed his first year as state evangelist on August 31. His report is an encouraging one. He preached in 22 revivals with 282 additions for baptism, 170 by letter, and 45 other professions that did not join. This statistical report, however, does not tell the whole story. Everywhere Brother Haskins goes he promotes the whole program of the church and denomination. He builds the fellowship of the churches. He encourages and strengthens the pastors. He is truly a blessing wherever he serves. We thank the Lord for the spirit and work of this man of God.

In order to reach more souls for Christ and His church we do not need a new program or new methods. What we need is to project

the program we now have, to energize the methods already in use. This program carried out by men filled with the Holy Spirit will do the work God wants done.

Therefore, we recommend a tested, tried, and proven program that will produce results:

- Every association with a simultaneous evangelistic crusade every year.
- (2) Every association with an evangelistic organizer and a chairman of evangelism elected annually.
- (3) Every church with at least two revivals every year (one simultaneous.)
- (4) An evangelism church council functioning in every church.
- (5) A perennial visitation program of evangelism.
- (6) A "New Members' Union" in every Training Union with the pastor teaching the booklet, "Your Life and Your Church."
- (7) Every pastor attending the statewide Evangelistic Conference each year.
- (8) A constant effort by every church in solving and preventing the non-resident church membership problem.

Looking to the future, we would urge you to give prayerful consideration to the recommendation of the Board of Directors concerning the plans for evangelism for 1955. Mark your calendar now with these two dates:

- March 27-April 10, 1955 for the simultaneous revivals in the 22 associations south of the South Canadian River.
- April 10-24, 1955 for the simultaneous revivals in the 16 associations north of the South Canadian River.

# REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

By Dr. John W. Raley

To the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University and To the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City, November 13, 1952

In the chronicle of the postwar decade at Oklahoma Baptist University, the outstanding achievement to be recorded has been our election to membership in the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools on April 2, 1952. Every faculty and staff member had a part in raising the standards of academic excellence so that we succeeded in 1952 where we had failed in 1937. The decisive factor in our accreditation was the positive assurance from

our Convention leaders, reinforced by the record, that the Baptists of Oklahoma are serious in their purpose to build a first-rate university.

The fact that the churches of our fellowship have concentrated their efforts on a single institution of higher learning is the more impressive as the membership of those churches mounts past the 350,00 mark. The financial grants of seventeen consecutive years are concrete evidence of the support we enjoy from our Baptist constituency, and a never-failing sign of the future stability of the University.

In the distress of Christian higher education, our own school has given thanks for the effective planning which gave us 125 church scholarships in 99 congregations. The twofold purpose of encouraging potential leaders and reinforcing the university in the difficult years of slumping enrolments has been appreciated by the enlightened Baptist leadership of Oklahoma.

A second class in Bible taught by Dr. N. M. Stigler of the Extension Service has been added in Oklahoma City. The total enrolment is 59 students, as against 22 a year ago.

No summary of University affairs would be complete without mention of the recognition that has come to the Department of Biological Science under Dr. J. A. Trent's chairmanship. Affiliations have been announced by four of the leading Oklahoma institutions for the training of medical technologists and nurses. General education will be the province of the Shawnee campus, while the pathology and nursing schools will add clinical and laboratory experiences appropriate to the desired specialty. In all cases the degree will be confered by the University.

A collegiate program in nursing, nearly one year in preparation, was begun in September in conjunction with Wesley Hospital, a large and well-equipped private institution in Oklahoma City. Nurses may now elect a broader cultural education leading to a standard degree, along with their state registry. The Wesley School of Nursing, which

has an honored tradition in nursing education, has abandoned its diploma program in order to devote its full resources to the OBU degree program.

The University's application for a non-commercial FM broadcasting station was approved in October.

#### Faculty

The instructional staff of 50 has shown its greatest stability since the end of World War II. Regular appointment, promotion, tenure, and retirement policies are in effect, and these, together with salary schedules and regulations on a large number of other topics, have been published in the Faculty Handbook. A teaching staff of vital personalities and dedicated scholars is hard to assemble, and even harder to keep. The university is fortunate in the training, stability, and professional pride of its teachers.

#### Religious Activities

In the current enrolment, 276 students are in training for the ministry; 88 additional full-time religious volunteers are in the Life Service Band, including 27 apprentice missionaries, 5 medical missionaries, 4 of them Chinese who will return to their native land; 27 religious educators; 13 religious music specialists; and 2 religious journalists. A large number have no specific commitment.

In the summer of 1951 and in the regular term of 1951-52 this amazing record was compiled by the young men of the campus ministerial alliance: 245 student preachers delivered 7,154 sermons and collected \$7,503.61 for benevolences. They reported 1,298 conversions, 2,053 rededications, and 1,309 additions to the church.

## Financial Report

The gross income of the University for the fiscal year ending May 31, 1952, was \$922,521.90, with \$853,893.21 for current operations and \$68,628.69 for capital outlay such as additions to endowment, annuities, loan funds, and building fund. The gross expense for the year was \$956,811.65 with \$860,701.94 for current operations and \$96,109.71 for capital outlay.

The total valuation of Land and Improvements, Buildings, and Equipment as of May 31, 1952, is \$4,180,599.70, which represents a net increase over the previous year of \$53,179.40.

#### Capital Improvements and Building Prospects

Of interest to the Trustees and the Convention is the anonymous gift underwriting the construction of new recreational units in the athletic fields, specifically a cinder running track and baseball diamond. Further developments to the recreational area now in prospect will give Oklahoma Baptist University the finest facility for physical educational needs in Oklahoma.

Of major importance, co-equal with the accreditation by the North Central Association of College and Secondary Schools, is the bequest from the Olive Thurmond estate. This gift represents the largest received from any single source by any agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and has been designated for a joint investment in endowment and in a new science-administration building to memorialize the donor. While the total amount cannot now be accurately stated, it will be approximately one quarter million dollars. This gift will form an inspiration point for others who through

years ahead will make permanent and secure the investments of the Baptists of Oklahoma in Oklahoma Baptist University.

# Radio and Television

## RADIO AND TELEVISION ACTIVITIES GROW IN MANY DIRECTIONS

The work of the Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has grown tremendously during the past twelve months. In every area of activity more work is being done this year than at any time in the history of our Southern Baptist Convention. The last payment was made on Baptist Radio Center in Atlanta this spring, and the Commission is now operating on a sound financial basis.

The Baptist Hour is being heard each week by some four million people, as it is carried by more than 320 stations in 28 states and 5 foreign countries. The spiritual results of this weekly broadcast of the Gospel are amazing. Souls are being strengthened in all of their work.

The Southern Baptist Convention voted in Miami that the Radio Commission should continue to finance the **Baptist Hour** through voluntary contributions sent in by listeners, and through direct mail solicitation. It will take a minimum of ten thousand dollars per month from this source to continue the **Baptist Hour** on its present basis.

Television is becoming increasingly prominent in the thinking of Southern Baptists. To meet the challenge of this great new field, the Commission has set up a television department and has employed a full-time television man to direct this work. He is Louis Allison Howard, of Garland, Texas, and he is now at work developing ideas for religious television programs. The Commission already has a weekly live telecast over WSB-TV in Atlanta; has produced two films with Howard Butt, Frank Boggs and Jack Hamm; has had one broadcast this year on the NBC Television network; and is now at work on a number of other projects in television. Sample formats of good religious telecasts are being created by the Commission, and

are being distributed to local pastors and television stations all over the Convention.

While carrying on the largest **Baptist Hour** in its history, and launching new programs in television, the Radio and Television Commission is also expanding its transcription library. A number of new 15-minute devotional programs of the **Chapel Upstairs** series have been produced this year, and others are now in progress. In addition a new series of six 15-minute dramatic programs on the Christian home are now in the production stage, and these transcriptions will be available next spring for use in connection with Christian Home Week the first of May. Some new Christmas dramatic programs have already been planned for 1953, and will be available some time next fall.

The Radio and Television Commission continues to cooperate with all the agencies of our Southern Baptist Convention, with our state conventions, and with local groups. The organization produces and distributes the Good News Hour for Dr. J. B. Lawrence and the Home Mission Board, and does occasional work of a variety of kinds for a number of our Southwide boards and agencies. The facilities of Baptist Radio Center are always available to any one that can use them to advantage.

The activities of the Radio and Television Commission will be featured in November issue of the Baptist Training Union Magazine; the December issue of the Baptist Student Magazine; the January issue of the Sunday School Builder; the January issue of the Baptist Program; and the January, February and March issue of the Brotherhood Journal. It is hoped that other of our denominational publications will help us in familiarizing our Baptist people with the continually expanding work of the Radio and Television Commission.

On October 4, 1952 the hearts of Southern Baptists were deeply saddened by the death of Dr. S. F. Lowe, beloved director of the Baptist Hour and pioneer of our Radio Ministry.

Dr. Lowe led Southern Baptists into radio in 1938. From 13 weeks broadcasting over 17 stations in 1941, he brought us by his untiring efforts to a year 'round program with 325 stations broadcasting the gospel of Christ in sermon and song every Sunday. On the eve of his departure for his heavenly home he was calling Southern Baptists to share the vision he had of ever expanding the Ministry of the Baptist Hour, taking the gospel of Christ to yet more thousands through new stations in the west. His final words were these, "Let us put more of our hearts and our treasure into this wonderful missionary enterprise which is saving souls, remaking lives, uniting homes and strengthening churches throughout our whole convention. Although the Baptist Hour is now heard every Sunday by millions, we will not rest until its message is beamed to every community that needs the message of Christ."

While Baptists of Oklahoma have shared in the promotion of the Baptist Hour, they have likewise been alert to the splendid facilities available in radio broadcasting through the channels of the many stations of our state. An incomplete tabulation of broadcasting activity in Baptist churches in Oklahoma indicates that a total of 44 worship services originate in the auditoriums of 22 churches every week on Sunday during the year. A total of 20 Baptist churches have utilized the week-day studio broadcast.

The vast possibilities of ministering to the hearts of people by means of the radio are only now beginning to be realized. God's resources for the propagation of the gospel are unlimited. Through the power of the Holy Spirit he is able to transform the ether waves into channels of saving grace to men around the world.

# Social Service

Many are saying "times are better than we have ever known them." Still others are saying "our religious and political freedoms are in jeopardy." Both claims could be correct. Thoughtful people are distressed over world conditions and are seeking some means of their alleviation. It is our conviction that the gospel of Christ with all of its implications is the answer to the world's needs.

We are at war in Korea. No one seems to know when the end will come. The threat of another world war is ever before us. War and the preparation for war have led us into such a staggering debt that no one seems to know when or how it can be paid. The campaign for universal military training, which has been in progress for thirty-three years has met with a temporary setback. We must maintain our vigilance lest this plan of militarization shall become a part of our American way of life.

According to Arnold Toynbee, the eminent historian, the two great menaces to civilization are racism and alcohol. We are now witnessing the most rapid improvement in race relations than at any other time in American history. The Christian spirit is breaking through. We must remind ourselves that the race problem is basically a moral and religious problem. That means that we Christians in our approach to it must invoke the principles of our religious faith. Such principles impel us to follow certain standards of conduct. These standards were outlined by the Social Service Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention with which we are in hearty accord.

- We shall think of the Negro as a person and treat him accordingly.
- We shall continually strive as individuals to conquer all prejudice and eliminate from our speech terms of contempt and from our conduct actions of ill-will.
- We shall teach our children that prejudice is un-Christian and that good-will and helpful deeds are the duty of every Christian toward all men of all races.
- We shall protest against injustice and indignities against Negroes, as we do in the case of people of our own race, whenever and wherever we meet them.

- 5. We shall be willing for the Negro to enjoy the rights granted to him under the Constitution of the United States, including the right to vote, to serve on juries, to receive justice in the courts, to be free from mob violence, to secure a just share of the benefits of educational and other funds, and to receive equal service for equal payment on public carriers and conveniences.
- We shall be just in our dealing with the Negro as an individual. Whenever he is in our employ we shall pay him an adequate wage and provide for him healthful working condiditions.
- 7. We shall strive to promote community good-will between the races in every way possible.
- 8. We shall actively cooperate with Negro Baptists in the building up of their churches, the education of their ministers, and promotion of their missions and evangelistic programs.

The alcohol problem becomes more acute. According to the department of commerce, Americans are spending about \$9 billion a year for alcoholic beverages. This compares with \$2 billion spent in 1932. In 1933 the per capita consumption of alcoholic beverages was 1.69 gallons. In 1947 it was 27.25 gallons.

There are now about one-half million legal retail liquor outlets in the country.

Bootlegging was supposed to pass out of the picture with legalized drink. However, the Florida crime commission records show that there was never a year under prohibition when as many bootleggers were arrested as have been arrested each and every year since.

The National Safety Council in its publication Accident Facts states that there are 55 accidents for drivers under the influence of alcohol for one accident for non-drinking drivers, and that "alcohol is responsible for between 40 and 60 per cent of all death and injury accidents caused by autos on highways."

Dr. H. M. Pollock of the New York State Board of Health estimates that the nation's economic loss from drinkers, in the form of extra costs for police, jails, courts and hospitals, come to at least \$10 billion annually.

Judge John A. Sbarbaro of Chicago says: "Seventy-five per cent of all divorce cases I have heard resulted from alcohol." His statement is echoed by divorce court judges throughout the country.

The Rockefeller Foundation, through Dr. Dayton, reports that 20 per cent of the mental patients in the United States are alcoholics. Forty per cent of admissions at Bellevue Hospital and 32 per cent at Massachusetts General Hospital are alcoholics. The Yale School reports that two-thirds of all alcoholics began their drinking habits in high school days. Dr. Charles Mayo declares that three out of ten drinkers become alcoholics and no one can tell when they begin which one will go that route.

There is a growing demand that some answer be found to check the devastating results of alcoholic beverages on human health and personality, on the home, on business, on the cost of government and on the quality of American culture.

## Marriage and Divorce

The marriage rate in 1951 dipped to its lowest point since 1938 and the divorce rate to the lowest since 1941 according to provisional statistics released by the Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency.

This may be accounted for by two possible reasons. One, the wave of post-war marriages following demobilization reduced the number of single persons of marrying age and, second, during the past few years the number of young people reaching marrying age has been relatively small because of the low birth rate during the business depression of the early 1930's.

Marriages in 1951 totaled 1,594,000. This was 72,300 fewer than in 1950. The number of divorces granted in 1951 totaled 371,000.

#### Management and Labor Relations

In their relationships both management and labor have come to realize that there are certain fundamentals of human nature which cannot be ignored if human relations are to be creative and peaceable.

First, man must have essential dignity. Every man has certain basic human rights which must be respected. Such dignity demands self-expression, an opportunity to advance, and a sense that one has attained a point of usefulness in life.

Second, a man must have the esteem and respect of others. More than anything else he wants to be recognized as a person and to possess the confidence that he will be treated like a human being in all relationships.

Third, man yearns for survival. Food, clothing, housing, and other essentials are rightly his. He wants to know that he has access to them.

Finally, man reaches out for security. It is not sufficient that he have bread for today but that there also be bread for tomorrow. He needs to have the confidence that he will be able to face illness, possible disability, and, ultimately, old age with financial security.

#### Challenge to Christians

As we face this vast field of human relations, we are made to realize that, as Christians, we have a tremendous challenge. Our churches and denominational schools must continue to produce men and women of character and integrity who will take with them the ideals of the Christian life into their economic professions, whether they become leaders in the ranks of labor or whether they take their places behind the desks of management.

All of us, through a serious and unprejudiced study of the problem, need to bring ourselves to a thorough understanding of all that is involved in the human relations of industry. The implications are of tremendous significance for both Christianity and our democratic way of life.

# American Bible Society

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in their world-wide mission work. The Society serves every form of missions at home and abroad.

#### Bible distribution is a "must" in mission work.

If the people of the world are to know Christ, they must have the Bible. It is the one primary source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. But, in most countries of the world the income of the people is so low they cannot

afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures.

Supported by gifts, the American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world. It also supplies Scriptures for the Blind in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

#### During 1951 the American Bible Society—

- distributed at home and abroad more than 16 million volumes of Scriptures:
- helped the Japan Bible Society to distribute 3,372,803 Scripture volumes, making a total of approximately 10 million volumes distributed in Japan since V-J Day:
- in Korea, supplied over 1 million Scripture volumes for civilians. South Korean and other UN armed forces and North Koreans and Chinese in prisoner-of-war camps.

- aided the Brazil Bible Society to reach the largest Scripture distribution in the country's history, 1,510,712 volumes. Of these, 168,670 were whole Bibles—almost three times the average of whole Bibles distributed in recent years;
- provided 941,241 Scripture volumes to our armed forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to more than 10 million volumes.
- received from churches and individuals, gifts which made possible the largest budget in its history—and in faith adopted an even greater program for 1952;
- but faced additional urgent requests from many fields, especially Brazil, Korea and Japan, emphasizing the fact that a worldwide missionary advance, through increased Scripture distribution, waits!—Waits only for needed funds!

In 1951, Southern Baptist churches gave \$90,909 to the American Bible Society. \$2,762.25 of this came from the churches of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. ### Article VI

Section 4. Neither the convention, nor any institution or agency, owned or supported in whole or in part by the convention, shall accept or receive, directly or indirectly, any gifts, grant, or aid from the Federal, State, County or City governments or any other governmental agency, neither shall any lease or purchase of government owned property be made except by payment of the reasonable cash value thereof for the same, provided that no such lease or purchase be made except by and with the approval of the convention.

#### SUBSTITUTE RESOULTION

Whereas, the doctrine of separation of church and state has, through the years, been a basic doctrine of Baptists, and

Whereas, there is a wide spread tendency in certain religious circles to violate this doctrine by receiving gifts, grants or aid from the Federal government as evidenced by the fact that one religious group has received more than \$68,000,000 from the Federal government for hospital purposes, since the passing of the Hill-Burton Act by congress, Therefore

Be it resolved the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma should positionize itself on this vital matter in the following statement:

Neither the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, nor any institution or agency of this convention, shall accept directly or indirectly any gifts, grants or aid from Federal, State, County, City or any other governmental agency. Neither shall any lease or purchase of government owned property be made, except by payment of a reasonable value, either in cash, exchange of property or in service rendered.

# Department of Student Work

Figures obtained from the records of the registrars reveal an increased enrollment of freshmen in practically every college and university. Statisticians predict this increase will continue through the year 1960.

The total enrollment for the colleges and universities in Oklahoma, this year, exceeds 35,000. Nine-thousand plus of these students look to Oklahoma Baptists for spiritual guidance. Seventy-five hundred are our own Baptist young people, and 1,500 non-church members indicate their preference as Baptist.

There are 16 active Baptist Student Union organizations in the state. Four full-time and seven part-time Baptist student secretaries are serving effectively on the various campuses. In way of equipment, there are eight Baptist Student Centers. Two or three of these are adequate for a while; others are totally inadequate, especially the ones at the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma A. & M. College. The building committee of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is recommending to the Convention, this year, 1952, that we break ground, in November, for the erection of adequate Centers for these two great campuses. Through these Student Centers, Baptists are "Building for Tomorrow"!

The Baptist Student Union Movement is making steady growth, and through its ministry our Baptist students are being developed in every phase of Christian stewardship, through a Christ-centered, Church-centered, Student-centered program peculiarly adapted to the needs of students.

We join our partners in the Four Year Program of Progress, as we seek the employment of Baptist student secretaries, where needed; a greater enlistment program for our churches; more personal soul winning and conversions; the organization of Baptist Student Union Movements, where needed; and an increased attendance for all state and southwide BSU meetings.

We make the following suggestions for helping attain these goals:

## KNOW THE PROGRAM!

- a. Strive to promote one program, within the association, for the purpose of informing the people about the ministry of the Baptist Student Union. This could most profitably be done sometime during the fall months; then urge each church in the association to promote a similar meeting locally.
- b. Literature which outlines the BSU Movement and explains how the program is peculiarly adapted to the total needs of college students is available from the State Student Department, upon request.
- 2. ENCOURAGE YOUR YOUNG PEOPLE who go away to college to identify themselves with a local Baptist church, upon arrival. Parents and friends of these students would do well to take them to the college, in advance of their enrollment, and visit the local Baptist churches, Baptist Student Center and meet the pastors, student leadership and as many students as possible.
- 3. CONTINUE TO SUPPORT THE STUDENT CENTER BUILDING PROGRAM for the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma A. & M. College until the Centers are completed.
- 4. PRAY FOR AND COOPERATE with everything being done for our Baptist students. The Baptist way, tomorrow, can best be assured through the investment in our youth of today!

- 133. Reverend Thurmond George, chairman of the Board's Committee on Student Work, spoke in the interest of our student work on our college campuses.
- 134. Mr. Ira C. Prosser spoke announcing the early ground breaking for the Student Centers which are to be erected at Norman and Stillwater.
- 135. Congregation stood in silence in memory of the lamented B. B. McKinney, who contributed so much to our Saviour's work with his ministry in song. Congregation sang a verse of "Breathe on Me!"
- 136. Mr. Clarence White led the congregation in singing, "Are  $Y_e$  Able."
- 137. The choir of Exchange Avenue church under the direction of Thad Roberts, minister of music, presented "Amazing Grace," and "This Is My Father's World," assisted by Earl Scarbrough.
- 138. Dr. H. H. Hobbs, chairman of the Hospital Committee of our Board of Directors, brought a report regarding the proposed hospital which it is hoped will be built in Oklahoma City. Dr. Hobbs moved that the recommendations in the report be adopted.
- 139. Senator Robert S. Kerr was presented and spoke to the report.
  - 140. Motion carried to adopt the hospital recommendations.

# OKLAHOMA CITY BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The Board of Directors unanimously and enthusiastically recommends Convention approval of the report and recommendations of the Oklahoma City Baptist Hospital committee as presented at the special session of the Board, October 10, 1952.

"Oklahoma Baptists, for many years, have prayerfully considered the founding of a large general hospital in Oklahoma City. Committees have been appointed upon numerous occasions to study the advisability of Baptists giving leadership in building such an instiution as another forward step in extending the avenues for further Christian service to the people of the community and the state.

"Launching an ambitious program, in which Oklahoma Baptists would take initiative in financing a large centrally located hospital to serve the health needs of Oklahoma, for a long time had been close to the heart of our beloved departed leader, Dr. Andrew Potter. This project would have been his next important undertaking had not the Lord called him to his Heavenly reward.

"The Board of Directors of the Convention, at its meeting on December 4, 1951, authorized appointing a Special Hospital Committee to go thoroughly into the matter and appropriated funds for study and preliminary planning. The presidents of the Boards of Directors of the Convention and of the Baptist Foundation, jointly appointed the following as members of this committee.

H. H. Hobbs, Chairman

Auguie Henry Anson Justice Robert S. Kerr T. B. Lackey M. E. Ramay Bryce Twitty W. R. Wallace R. A. Young

"This committee undertook its task seriously. It has worked diligently to ascertain the facts, understand the ramified phases of the problem, and to bring to the Board an intelligent report and set of practical recommendations based on exhaustive data, facts, statistics, information and deliberation, and the advice and counsel of qualified consultants with broad experience in various branches of the hospital field.

"First action of your committee was to engage Bartholomew and Associates of St. Louis, Missouri, well known city planners, who drafted the City Plan for Oklahoma City, to make a thorough hospital survey of the state, as to existing facilities and needs for additional hospitals, both present and future.

"This survey showed that by far the greatest need was in Oklahoma City-County, with an immediate need, as of 1952, for 455 additional general hospital beds and an indicated need by 1960 for 1,100 more general beds than now available.

"Based on its findings, the survey group recommended building a general hospital in Oklahoma City which could be expanded to an ultimate capacity of 500 beds, and that for practical reasons the first unit of such a project be limited to 300 beds.

"The report also recommended including provisions for a School of Nursing, and that the hospital and school be designed and operated as a base hospital for cooperative service to the Baptist hospitals and to other voluntary hospitals in the state which might desire to avail themselves of this relationship. Many other matters pertaining to the hospital situation in the state are dealt with in the report, too voluminous to attempt to summarize here, but emphasis is laid on the serious need existing and increasing in Oklahoma County.

"The next move was to engage, in a consulting capacity, the firm of National Fund Raising Services, of Fort Worth, Texas, which firm recently planned and directed the raising of over \$3,000,000.00 in public subscriptions to expand hospital facilities in that city. Their function was to make a study and preliminary estimates of financing potentials and to counsel with the committee concerning policies, program, plans and procedures for successfully financing a project of this character and magnitude..

"Considerable and careful thought has been given to this important phase by your committee, and others called in for advice in consultation with representatives of the Fund Raising firm, who have had years of experience in directing the financing of hospitals and other publicly supported institutions.

"After many long meetings, thorough discussions, earnest and prayerful weighing and consideration of the many and ramified factors involved, your committee makes the following recommendations:

That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma now initiate
the founding of an ultimately 500 bed voluntary General Base
Hospital to be built in Oklahoma City, and a complementing
School of Nursing preliminarily estimated to require an ultimate
capacity for 150 student nurses.

- That the Convention assume the responsibility of planning, administering and operating such Hospital and Nursing School.
- 3. That as the first part of this over-all project there be adopted as the immediate objective of the Convention, the securing of the financing and the building of a General Hospital of approximately 250 beds, to be so designed as to accommodate future expansion, and a School of Nursing, which first part of the project is estimated to cost approximately \$4,000,000.00.
- 4. That the Convention initiate the financing of this first project by agreeing to provide \$1,500,000.00 toward its cost, of which \$1,000,000.00 will be made available by the time construction contracts are ready to be let to build the Hospital, and \$500,000.00 of which will be made available when contracts are ready to let for construction of the School of Nursing, subject to the general provision and condition that citizens of Oklahoma City-County raise \$2,500,000.00 toward this first part of the project, by subscriptions, grants, and gifts from individuals, foundations, corporations, firms, and/or other non-governmental sources.

Further, that the Board of Directors be authorized and empowered to determine all matters of policy and detail to implement and expedite consummation of the foregoing objectives,

undertaking and general plan.

5. That your hospital committee be continued and be instructed to recommend methods for providing the Convention's share of the financing to assist in every way possible with the Oklahoma City-County phase of the undertaking; and to supplement the work of the Board in carrying out details for furthering the Oklahoma City General Hospital Program."

141. Motion carried to adopt the report of the Board of Directors.

142. Motion by John T. Daniel to wit:

"That the Board of Directors of the convention be authorized to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention and that the president and the recording secretary be authorized to sign any legal papers of the convention which require signatures."

143. President Justice announced the adjournment of the convention and D. Wade Armstrong pronounced the benediction.

### COMMENTS

The Baptist General Convention of the State
ORGANIZATION of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of
fostering Baptist denominational activities in the
State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided
for by the various contributors. It was incorporated under the laws
of the State of Oklahoma without authorized capital stock. Its first

of the State of Oklahoma without authorized capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed on or about May, 1917, for a term of twenty years, and its amended Articles of Incorporation were placed on record March 6, 1928, as an organization in perpetuity.

Since November 1, 1935, the convention has had direct supervision of The Baptist Orphans' Home, and its assets, liabilities, income and expenses are treated as a separate fund, both on the convention books and in this report. The Home is located in the environs of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital. It was organized in March, 1904, for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans.

On October 28, 1946, the convention created a separate corporation, namely The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, for the stated purpose of building, undergirding, and stabilizing the agencies and institutions owned and operated by the convention. Subsequent thereto transfer of custody of certain investments for trust and endowment funds was made by the convention to the foundation. The accounting for such specified funds has been handled by the foundation as a separate entity, since its inception.

The operations of the executive office of the convention are divided into the major classifications described below.

COLLECTING AND ACCOUNTING—Receiving contributions for the cooperative program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention, the various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, the Women's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and other designated donees.

**STATE MISSIONS** — Subdivided into rural and city missions, promotional and general, miscellaneous, and administrative activities of all departments of the convention.

**THE BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME**—Embracing all transactions pertaining to solicitation of monies and supplies, operation of the children's home, care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, and maintenance of the orphanage properties.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY—Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma, and the maintenance of assembly properties.

**BAPTIST MESSENGER** — Maintenance and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BAPTIST TRAINING UNION — Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in churches of the state.

**BAPTIST STUDENT UNION AND SACRED MUSIC**—Coordinating Baptist work in the student union centers at the various state educational institutions, and fostering better music in the churches.

MINISTERS' EMPLOYES' AND WIDOWS' RETIREMENT, RELIEF, AND ANNUITY PLANS — For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers, missionaries, churches, and organizations, throughout Oklahoma, participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist General Convention.

**BUILDING PROGRAM** — Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

#### COMMENTS

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was grantORGANIZATION ed a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without
capital stock, with its principal place of business at Oklahoma City,
Oklahoma. It was created by the Baptist General Convention of
the State of Oklahoma, and its Articles of Incorporation and by-laws
were approved by the body in convention assembled at Oklahoma
City, Oklahoma, on October 28, 1946. Its stated purpose was to
build, undergird and stabilize the agencies and institutions owned
and operated by the convention.

The purpose for which the corporation was formed is that of a

private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest, and otherwise dispose of all real, personal, or mixed property of whatever nature and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gifts, devise, bequest, or otherwise any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Chrisian education and both home and foreign missionary work; to borrow money; hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to procure funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, dispense and invest funds according to designations made and as set out in the charter.

Accordingly on April 7, 1947, transfer of custody was made from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma of certain investments and their corresponding trust and endowment funds totaling \$76,776.29.

Cash and other contributions during the year 1952 are summarized in Exhibit C—Statement of General Fund and the cash transactions are further detailed in Exhibits D and F and Schedule 1.

**EQUIPMENT** The furniture and office equipment are stated at cost.

Mortgage Payable \$21,401.08—This instrument is dated February 12, 1947, in an original amount of \$65,000.00 with interest at 4-1/2%, payable \$497.25 monthly including interest to the Home State Life Insurance Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It is secured by a first mortgage on the Hollums Building located at 1010 N. Broadway, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This building was donated to the Foundation in January 1950, by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hollums with the provision

that the Foundation assume the liability for the mortgage which had a balance due of \$35,054.78 at that time. The building is recorded on the books at an appraised value of \$100,000.00.

Surety bonds are carried on Dr. Auguie Henry. GENERAL executive secretary, and Mrs. Ira C. (Alice) Prosser, office secretary, in the respective amounts of \$50,000.00 and \$10,000.00. A personal accident policy is carried on Dr. Auguie Henry, executive secretary, in the amount of \$5,000.00 with the insured's wife named as beneficiary.
