CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I-NAME

Section I. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This Convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the Convention.

Secion 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE III-OBJECT

Section 1. This Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This Convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the Convention shall be a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary, a treasurer, and a historical secretary. It is hereby provided that the executive secretry may be treasurer.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. In balloting, the one receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V-BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This Convention shall have power to **elect** such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the Convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committeed to them by this Convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this Convention through which this Convention shall function in its co-

operative work.

Section 2. This board shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the Convention and forty-eight (48) other members who shall be chosen by the Convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

He may also be treasurer of the board.

Section 4. This board shall elect all denominational workers whose salaries are paid by the Convention (except those elected by the Convention) and may approve those whose salaries are paid in part by the Convention. This board shall also fix salaries of all denominational workers elected by the board and determine the fields of work for each.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the Convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the Convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The Convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the Convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the Convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of the donors.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the Convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Secion 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amend-

ed but shall be held inviolate.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be fifty (50) including the president and secretary of the Convention.

The president of the Convention shall be ex-officio president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the Convention shall be ex-officio secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual Convention, which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the Convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semi-annual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the Convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be:

A President of the Board of Directors, elected by the Convention.

A Recording Secretary, elected by the Convention.

An Executive Secretary, elected by the Convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the General Convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Direcors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the General Convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The President of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse on behalf of the Convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the Convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by he General Convention and shall affix the seal of the Convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

The office of Executive Secretary and treasurer may be held by one and the same person.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The By-Laws shall be adopted by the General Convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the By-Laws of the Convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the By-Laws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the By-Laws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The By-Laws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the By-Laws and the Constitution the provisions of the Constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the Convention or the Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the Executive Secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by any auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the General Convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the General Convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual **meeting** of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this Convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the Convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the Convention of the same year.

- 1. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma met in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church of Tulsa, Oklahoma, at 6:55 p.m. on Tuesday, November 10, 1953. This, the first session of the convention, was a joint meeting with and closing session of the Baptist Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union.

- 3. President Robert S. Scales called the convention to order stating that it is the forty-eighth annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

- 5. Mrs. W. J. Reynolds led the devotional service using texts from Matthew 10 and 28, Acts 1, Romans 10 and John 3. Miss Joe Ann Shelton, Oklahoma Baptist University, sang "Christ for the World We Sing." Mrs. Reynolds led in prayer.
- 6. Rev. J. A. Pennington, secretary of our Baptist Brotherhood, brought the report of the Baptist Brotherhood.
- 7. Mr. David T. Mashburn, of the Southwide Brotherhood Movement, spoke to the report.

Brotherhood

Oklahoma Baptist men are marching onward and upward in the work of the Lord. Our state ranks fifth in the number of Four-Star churches, meaning the churches with an active Brotherhood, a departmental Sunday School, a graded Training Union, and a fully-graded Woman's Missionary Union.

- As of October 31 there are 630 churches reporting an active Brotherhood.
- All 38 of our associations are organized for Brotherhood work.
- In spite of bad weather and the "flu" epidemic 5,893 men attended the associational Pre-Jubilee Conferences in January, 1953.

His matchless record of 24 years as our Secretary stands as a monument to his ability, integrity, and compassion. Surely he was God's man for Southern Baptists' Home Mission program. Our hearts are saddened because we must lose him. However, in our sorrow we yet rejoice because we know his influence will last until Jesus comes again.

We rejoice over the election of Dr. Courts Redford as our new Secretary. Surely our leaders could have found no other man more fitted for the task. Under his leadership we shall march forward in an ever expanding program of missions. Dr. Redford was reared in Oklahoma. He received his early training in our State and we are justly proud of his illustrious record. We are also thankful that we have two other Oklahomans in places of responsibility on our Home Mission Board, Dr. Guy Bellamy and Dr. Frank Belvin, Superintendents of our Negro and Indian work.

We are deeply grateful for the help of our Mission Board in carrying on our fine Rural and City Mission programs because these programs are the very heart beat of all our work.

The crusade of "A Million More in 54", the great expanse of territory in the Northwestern United States, the far flung land of Alaska, together with our other fields of service, present unprecedented opportunities for preaching the unsearchable riches of Christ.

With these added opportunities come greater obligations, obligations that cannot be met apart from prayer and sacrificial giving on the part of all our churches. Your committee would recommend that we remember our Home Mission Board in prayer before Him who said "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest" and that our mission gifts will honor Him whom we love and serve.

Foreign Missions

A great man once said, "Every church should have two missionaries—one for the thousands at home, and the other for the millions abroad." Those fine words express themselves very beautifully in our Southern Baptist Foreign Mission program. In vision, in

scope, in effort, and in achievement Southern Baptists are true to the last commandment of our Lord when he said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel."

At the beginning of 1953 the story of foreign missions rang with thrilling and encouraging notes of accomplishment. The board launched work in two new countries, appointed 84 new missionaries, giving Southern Baptists a total of 879 missionaries serving the cause of Christ in 32 different foreign countries.

Baptisms on all fields totaled 18,154 bringing the combined membership to 195,067 in the 1,942 churches. For this we lift our voices in gratitude unto God who giveth the increase. These churches are served by 1,276 national pastors. There were 2,919 Sunday Schools with an enrolment numbering 205,901. Among the 460 schools operated by the mission forces, there are 17 theological seminaries, which enrolled 563 of the 61,705 students in all the schools. This, among others, is a glorious aspect of our foreign mission program, the "Developing of indigenous Christian constituencies who themselves become the evangelizing agency of their own peoples and their own nations." This is a prime objective of our foreign mission program, and Southern Baptists are making worthwhile gains in this worthy phase of mission work.

Total income from the Cooperative Program, the Lottie Moon Christmas offering, and designated gifts was an all time high of \$7,785,699.64. Approximately 94 per cent of this total was used for the support of the missionaries and their work done on the field. This fact as reported by the late Mr. Rankin, reveals that Southern Baptists are getting the maximum from their mission dollar.

These glorious victories from yesterday assure Southern Baptists of even a greater ministry during this coming year. The challenge is tremendous as we visualize world conditions and the vast multitudes who cry for the "Bread of Life." Southern Baptists can adequately meet the challenge through our cooperative effort. The promises and provisions of God are sufficient to guarantee victory. Southern Baptists must arise to the opportunity and expectation.

Therefore, your committee, to encourage and foster our foreign mission program among Oklahoma Baptists, recommends that the following support be given to the cause of foreign missions:

1. Teach and encourage our people to practice Bible tithing

and Christian Stewardship.

Urging every church, as God may lead, to increase their budget percentage to the cooperative program each year as suggested by our denomination.

. Support enthusiastically the Lottie Moon Christmas offering

for foreign missions.

4. Challenge the youth of today for the task of tomorrow.

 In faith, and with regularity, pray for all of our missionaries; a lost world which needs the Gospel; and God's global program of redeeming grace.

Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home

Fifty years ago, Baptists launched forth in the field of Child Care and incorporated an organization called Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home of Oklahoma City for Indian and Oklahoma Territories. The Oklahoma Baptist State Convention of Oklahoma Territory, meeting at Norman in 1902, started the movement by appointing a committee.

The Baptist General Convention of Indian Territory, held at Duncan in September, 1903, voted to help the other Convention and proposed to elect five trustees to assist a like number from the other Convention.

It was recorded in those early minutes, "that the necessity for such an institution will increase, as the years come and go, is a fact apparent to all."

From these beginnings, first a family in a one-story residence, then a two-story, then the purchase of 40 acres and building a Home for 70. A few more years roll by with each generation adding a part until now we have a modern Children's City with room for 200.

Golden Jubilee Anniversary and dedication of W. S. Kerr and Andrew Potter cottages was on October 30. The entire Home had been redecorated. The streets were paved and nine new street lights put up. Considrable landscaping and grading was done to make the entire Home very presentable.

The One Day's Pay offering this year has for a theme, "Their Future Is In Your Hands." It is hoped the offering will reach \$100,000 this jubilee year.

There is a need for a Senior Boys' cottage, Primary children's cottage, gymnasium, library and a deep well with storage tanks. We will supply these needs as rapidly as we can obtain the money.

Upon the family register have been written 1,624 names, representing lives ministered unto by Baptists.

The hand of mercy is extended by Baptists. Back of the hand is the power God gives us and "his arm is not shortened." Fifty more years will reveal marvelous things in the life and work of our Baptist Orphans' Home.

32. Rev. Carlos Berry brought the report on religious literature and motion carried for its adoption.

Dr. Jack Gritz, editor of the **Baptist Messenger**, spoke regarding this important part of our work. Assistants Mrs. Fern Hurt and Sam Brents were introduced.

Religious Literature and Baptist Messenger

Our people everywhere are becoming increasingly conscious of the vital role of Christian literature in the development of individual spiritual lives, in the work of our churches, and in our missionary undertakings together.

We commend the very fine work that Dr. Jack Gritz is doing, as Editor. Under his capable editorship, the Messenger brings, each week, the missionary message to our people.

On its pages is found the latest news from churches, associations, the state convention's agencies and institutions, the Southern Baptist Convention and the Baptist World Alliance, along wih helpful doctrinal and devotional articles.

At present 730 churches are using the church budget plan of subscription and the circulation of the paper is 67,570.

Because of the need which it meets in informing our people concerning all denominational activities and the unity it gives to our missionary work, we recommend that all of our churches enter the budget plan of subscription to the Messenger and send the paper to all families in the church membership.

We recommend most heartily the publications of our Sunday School Board for use in the educational organizations of the church. We call attention to *Home Life* magazine, which should be in the homes of all our people. We express appreciation for the invaluable services of the Baptist Book Stores.

We recommend that our people be encouraged to read the volumes on Oklahoma Baptist history which will be appearing during the next few years beginning with this year's volume, *Trail Blazers of Sooner Baptists* by Marvin Gaskin.

We commend the two missionary periodicals, *The Commission*, published by the Foreign Mission Board, and *Southern Baptist Home Missions*, published by the Home Mission Board, and urge that they be given the widest circulation possible.

We call particular attention to the value and importance of the church library and urge that churches without libraries give serious consideration to establishing them at once because of the blessing which they can be to the members.

33. Senator Robert S. Kerr, vice president of the Oklahoma Baptist Foundation, presented Dr. Auguie Henry, executive secretary of the Foundation, who brought the report of the Baptist Foundation. Motion carried to adopt the recommendations in the report and also the entire report.

Report of Board of Directors

Of The Baptist Foundation

Introduction

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is seven years old. The child is doing well. He is quite large for his age, and his accomplishments and experience far exceed what is expected of one so young. He has a great mission ahead of him for Oklahoma Baptist institutions and agencies. He is sure to be a strong man at maturity. He has a fine background, a good start, and a promising future.

The fiscal year of The Foundation is the calendar year, but in order to include a more recent report than for the year 1952, which is included in the Auditor's Report and printed in the 1952 Annual of the Convention, we are giving this report covering the twelve month period from October 1, 1952 through September 30, 1953.

As the incorporated trust organization of the Convention, The Foundation was created for the purpose of procuring, safeguarding and investing capital and endowment funds for the Convention and for all agencies and institutions owned and operated by the Convention. Funds are disbursed according to the desire of the donors.

Procuring Funds

It has been necessary to put a lot of emphasis upon the procuring of funds because of the pressing building needs of our institutions, and because we had practically no endowment funds at the time The Foundation was established. During the twelve months covered by this report, The Foundation has received the largest amount for any one year of its existence.

The Receipts Have Been As Follows:

Included in the receipts was the largest single gift ever made to The Foundation, or for Baptist denominational causes in Oklahoma, and so far as is known the largest single gift to any denomination for denominational causes in Oklahoma. This gift, including cash and properties, totaling \$537,787.39, was made by Mr. and Mrs. James M. Johnson, members of the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City, toward the building and endowing of a Boys Ranch Town,

near Oklahoma City, in memory of their son, Jimmy, who died at the age of fourteen.

The second largest gift ever received for Oklahoma Baptist denominational causes was received as bequests from the estate of Olive C. Thurmond, Ardmore. These were received by The Foundation on January 29, 1953. Cash and properties of various kinds, totaled \$330,204.00. Of this gift, \$5,000.00 was left to The Foundation to be used according to the decision of the Directors, and the remainder for the Oklahoma Baptist University. Of the latter amount, \$68,997.95 will be held in trust by The Foundation as Endowment, and approximately \$256,206.05 will be used in the construction of the Thurmond Science-Administration building.

On the basis of receipts during the first nine month of 1953, and anticipated receipts by the close of the year, we believe that we will be able to reach and possibly go beyond our goal of \$1,400,000.00 for 1953.

Pledges To The Foundation:

In addition to the above receipts, The Foundation has received a pledge of \$250,000.00 from Senator Robert S. Kerr toward the building of another woman's dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University, in memory of his mother, Mrs. W. S. Kerr.

Also, a pledge of \$100,000 has been received from Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rinard, of Ada, Oklahoma, a portion of which is to be used in the building of another cottage at the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home. This pledge has been secured by wills.

Trusts

The Foundation has been procuring trusts of various kinds. In some cases properties are deeded outright to us wherein we have the responsibility of immediate management. However, The Foundation will write trusts and give the donor the privilege of management until his decease.

We are writing Annuity trusts for cash, real and other properties, whereby the annuitant, or donor, is guaranteed a certain income until his death, based upon his age. Upon the death of the annuitant, the corpus is used by The Foundation for the cause designated by the annuitant.

Wills Written

The Foundation has directly assisted in the writing of twenty (20) wills, during the period of this report, and we have reason to believe that a number of other wills have been written with The Foundation as the legatee or devisee.

Wills Probated

There are three (3) wills being probated at the present time, with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer as the Executor. These wills include: Rev. J. W. Hollums, Oklahoma City; Nick H. Harrell, Carnegie, and L. P. Elliott, of Oklahoma City.

These wills were written with the assistance of The Foundation during the past four years. One of the wills is in the smaller bracket, but two of them have valuations far beyond the average estate.

There are Baptists in Oklahoma who should make their wills, and leave their estates to The Foundation for the benefit of Baptist agencies and institutions; others, should set apart in their wills at least one-tenth of their estates to The Foundation for some worthy object or cause, accepting the slogan: "Tithing while I live, and of thing when I am dead."

We appreciate the "Stewardship after Death" program which is being promoted by the Brotherhood Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention which has as its objective the encouraging of them to make wills and to leave a bequest to The Foundation for Baptist causes. The Foundation should have the utmost cooperation of our constituency in the matter of writing wills.

Construction of New Buildings

During this twelve month period, construction was begun on seven buildings, for which funds were wholly or partially procured by The Foundation. These include:

- Baptist Student Center, Southeastern State College, Durant, which was dedicated on January 29, 1953;
- Baptist Student Center, The University of Oklahoma, Norman, which was dedicated on October 24, 1953;
- 3. Baptist Student Center, Oklahoma A&M College, Stillwater, which was dedicated on October 10, 1953;
- 4. W. S. Kerr Memorial Cottage, Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home, which was dedicated in connection with the Golden Anniversary Celebration of the Home, October 30, 1953;
- 5. Andrew Potter Memorial Cottage, Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home, which was dedicated, October 30, 1953, also;
- Thurmond Memorial Science-Administration Building, Oklahoma Baptist University, which is now under construction, and for which additional funds are being procured, upon authorization of the Convention.
- 7. Boys Ranch Town, near Oklahoma City, the first unit, utilities, etc. of which will cost approximately \$100,000.00, the amount allowed in the Johnson Trust for the construction of the first unit. It is hoped that immediate capital and endowment funds will be provided by individuals for this new institution, which is a Home for underprivileged and delinquent boys, owned and operated by the Convention. Ground breaking ceremonies were held on October 12, 1953.

Oklahoma City Hospital

The Foundation is receiving contributions for the Oklahoma City Hospital. The first contribution for this Hospital was received from C. C. Clayton of Houston, Texas, on September 27, 1951. Mr. Clayton is the father of Clyde Clayton, Assistant in the Department of Religious Education.

The funds procured in the 1954 Campaign by citizens of Oklahoma City-County for \$2,500,000 will be turned to The Foundation to be held in trust until used by the Convention. The Convention has agreed to raise \$1,500,000 for the first unit of this Hospital which will cost approximately \$4,000,000. It will provide 250 beds and a Nurses' Training School for 150 students. It is expected that a

considerable amount of the \$1,500,000, to be provided by the Convention, will be contributed as special gifts.

As the building and operation of this Hospital has already been approved by the Convention, The Foundation is anxious to receive every dollar possible for the Oklahoma City Hospital by the time the Oklahoma City-County Campaign is completed.

Endowment Gains

It is interesting to note the increase in endowment gifts during these twelve months, the total being \$487,417.84. This figure does not include the 1952 and 1953 allocations from the Cooperative Program for Oklahoma Baptist University Endowment and Church Building Loan Funds, which will not be received by The Foundation until the first of 1954.

An increasing interest in Endowment is, also, noticeable in the wills which are being written. This interest should appreciated by all concerned because of the urgent need for undergirding all our agencies and institutions.

Church Building Loan Department

Printed below are the plans for a Church Building Loan Department, which were approved by the Board of Directors on June 22, 1953, subject to the approval of The Convention. The setting up of this Department of The Foundation was precipitated by the allocation of \$100,000.00 from the 1952 Cooperative Program and \$36,232.85 from the 1953 Cooperative Program for O.B.U. Endowment, with the provision that The Foundation may lend the funds as church building loans.

Also, the Trustees of the University have authorized The Foundation to lend an O.B.U. Endowment Fund of \$35,997.95 received from the Thurmond Estate for church building loans. This means that by the first of the year, The Foundation will have \$172,230.80 from the three sources named above, for the beginning of the Church Building Loan Department.

It is expected that a number of donors will contribute directly to the Church Building Loan Fund; such as, one who purchased an annuity with The Foundation, the corpus of which has been designated for the Church Building Loan Fund; and the First Baptist Church of Lawton recently contributed \$1,000.00 for O.B.U. and the Church Building Loan Department.

Contributions can be designated as endowment funds for any Baptist cause, and, at the same time, the donor may provide that the funds be used for church building loans. In this way, a donor can help in the vitally important endowment program, and, also, help toward meeting the urgent need for church building loan funds.

STATEMENT OF POLICIES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE CHURCH BUILDING LOAN TRUST FUND OF THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

Nature and Purpose of the Trust

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund is a Fund legally established to endow and perpetuate Baptist causes, agencies and institutions. The principal of this Trust Fund is made up of gifts from individuals, groups and churches, and is to be held and ad-

ministered by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, as Trustee, as an express trust, and is to be invested in first mortgage loans to Eaptist churches in Oklahoma for building purposes, with special consideration to be given to mission projects. The earnings and income from such loans are to be designated solely for endowment of Eaptist causes, agencies and institutions.

Thus, this Trust Fund has a two-fold purpose: To provide a source for building loans to Baptist churches which are to be made from the principal, or corpus, of the Trust Fund; and to meet current needs of Baptist causes, agencies and institutions from the earnings and interest received from the loans.

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund is completely set apart from all other moneys and properties held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; and the administration of this Trust is entirely separated from all other functions of The Foundation.

This Trust Fund will be controlled and administered by The Church Building Loan Trust Fund committee, composed of five (5) members of The Board of Directors of The Foundation. This Committee has final authority in granting loans and in carrying out all other business in connection with the proper administration of the Trust. In discharging its duties and responsibilities, the Committee will be guided by the Statement of Policies and Regulations set out herein.

I. Eligibility for Loan

- 1. Denominational loyalty. This loyalty should be evidenced by fellowship and cooperation with the Association in which the church is located, and with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. It shall contribute to mission causes through the Cooperative Program.
- 2. Church budget. Each church desiring a loan shall agree to adopt a budget unless one has already been adopted; and shall make an every-member-canvass unless such has been done in the twelve months preceding the application for a loan.
- 3. Location. The church shall be wisely located in a community which presents opportunities for building and maintaining a church, based upon a religious census taken during the 90 days prior to application for a loan. Church buildings shall be well located in the community on ample space, sufficient for contemplated expansion.
- 4. Consistency. The building shall be consistent with the needs of the community. The type, physical appearance, and general arrangement of the building are of utmost importance, and must be approved by The Department of Church Architecture of the Sunday School Board.

II. Application for A Loan

- 1. All applications for loans shall be made on blanks prepared by The Church Building Loan Trust Fund Committee, hereinafter referred to as "The Committee," which blanks will be furnished upon request.
- 2. The application for a loan shall be authorized in a regular church business meeting. The application must bear the approval of the Executive Board of the particular Association in which the

church is located, after an on-the-field inspection by representatives of the Association's Board.

- 3. A church applying for a loan must furnish a current financial statement of receipts and disbursements for the preceding five years, or longer, if practicable; or, in the case of a younger church, the statement must include the period from the church's organization until application for loan is made.
- 4. Upon receipt of application for loan, a survey and an appraisal of the property, a study of the organizational work of the church shall be made by The Committee before a loan is finally approved. The Committee reserves the right to require additional security for the loan if it is deemed necessary.
 - 5. Final approval of loans shall be made by The Committee.
- 6. No loan will be granted for less than \$1,000.00, nor for more than \$20,000.00.
- 7. No loan will be made in excess of 50% of the fair value of the property to be improved as determined by the appraisal approved by The Committee, and every loan shall be secured by first mortgage on such improved property. However, consideration will be given to collateral other than church property, such as: personal endorsements, and endorsements of the Association or neighboring churches.
 - 8. No loan shall be made for longer than ten years.

III. Rate of Interest and Method of Payment

- 1. The rate of interest to be charged on loans shall be 6% per annum.
- 2. All payments shall be made directly to The Church Building Loan Trust Fund of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, Baptist Building, 1141 N. Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.
- 3. Payments including principal and interest shall be made monthly, with the privilege of prepayment after two years, or privilege of prepaying in less time by paying necessary expenses.
- 4. The church shall continue to cooperate with the local Association and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma throughout the life of the loan. Otherwise, the indebtedness shall become due and payable immediately. Non-cooperation shall be determined by the Association in which the church is located.

IV. Approval of Loan

- 1. When a loan shall have been approved, The Committee shall give to the church an irrevocable commitment, the same to be in effect for sixty (60) days.
- 2. Such loan shall be consummated when the project is completed according to plans and specifications; the mortgage having been duly executed and accepted by The Committee.
- 3. In the case of a church purchasing a building previously erected, The Committee will pay the amount of loan to the church after all terms and provisions for purchase of said property have been fulfilled by the church and the seller.
- 4. Construction costs during the period of construction must be financed by the applicant. After completion of the building, the

loan must be used to retire any indebtedness incurred during construction.

5. If for any reason a church should decide not to accept a loan after approval by The Committee, the church shall be expected to pay the expenses incurred by The Committee relative to the application for loan.

V. Acceptance of Loan by the Church

- 1. The church shall signify in writing to The Committee its acceptance or rejection of the loan within sixty (60) days.
- 2. Conditions and requirements the church must meet after the acceptance of the loan:
 - (1) The church at its own expense shall furnish to The Committee title policy issued by an approved title insurance company, insuring the title to its property as a good and merchantable title.
 - (2) The church shall furnish to The Committee a certificate that it is complying with all codes, rules and regulations of the municipality, city and state, including those of the State Fire Marshal and the Health Department.
 - (3) The church shall furnish The Committee an itemized cost of all new materials and of all indebtedness incurred during construction,
 - (4) If the church for which the loan is being made is purchasing a previously erected building, the church shall furnish The Committee a statement showing the amount of purchase, and the expense for making improvements on same, if any.
 - (5) The building upon which the loan is made must be kept insured by the church for fire and extended coverage during the existence of the loan, in some good and solvent insurance company satisfactory to The Committee, for a sum equal to an amount necessary to protect the loan, with a mortgage clause attached to the policy, making the loss, if any, payable to The Church Building Loan Trust Fund, as its interest may appear. A copy of the policy shall be deposited with The Committee.
 - (6) A church to which a loan is made shall be required to pay the cost of recording mortgage, and other incidental legal expenses involved in completing the transaction.
 - (7) A certificate shall be executed by the trustees of the church, showing that all indebtedness on property which secures the loan has been paid, and that the loan from The Church Building Loan Trust Fund is the only obligation against the church organization, except current bills or obligations expressly waived by The Committee.
 - (8) After The Committee approves the loan, the church will be expected to keep its records so that monthly statements of its receipts and disbursements may be furnished when requested.
 - (9) The church shall notify The Committee two or three weeks before it is ready to close the loan, so that the note, or

notes, mortgage, and other necessary papers may be prepared and sent to the church for execution. These papers must be examined and approved by The Committee's attorney before the loan can be closed.

Safeguarding and Investing Funds

We make a distinction between safeguarding and investing funds because some funds are held in trust over too short a period of time to invest them. For example: Building funds of an agency or institution that are to be used within a short time are entrused to The Foundation until such time as the funds are needed for construction purposes. In other words, it is the policy of the Convention to channel all building funds for its agencies and institutions through The Foundation.

As stated before, the major emphasis of The Foundation has been given to the procuring of funds, but more and more attention will have to be given to the investment of funds. The Foundation has an excellent investment record. It is the policy of the Board to make investments at the best interest rate possible without sacrificing security.

Services of The Foundation

More and more, The Foundation is receiving requests for its services. The Executive Secretary-Treasurer is being asked for his assistance in the writing of wills, in serving as executor of wills, as guardian for individuals, and as trustee for certain individual trust funds.

The services rendered as executor of wills has almost become a full-time position for one person.

General Recommendations

Future Plans and Policies

In cooperation with the Four-Year-Program of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, we recommend the following goals for 1954:

New Wills to be Written ______ 43 Capital and Endowment Gifts _____\$1,400,000 Suggestions for attaining future goals are as follows:

1. Pray for The Foundation leaders.

- Observe "Foundation Month" in September, which is in the Calendar of Activities of the Southern and Oklahoma Conventions.
- 3. Observe "Make-Your-Will-Month" in January.
- Invite a representative of The Foundation to speak at church and Associational meetings.
- 5. Read and distribute Foundation literature.
- 6. Furnish names and addresses of prospective donors.
- 7. Procure contributions from individuals and groups, regardless of the amount in cash, stocks, bonds, properties, life insurance, annuities, and bequests in wills.
- Make all contributions for capital and endowment funds for all Baptist agencies and institutions, including: Oklahoma Baptist University; Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home; Baptist Student Union Centers; Baptist Hospitals; Boys Ranch Town; Falls Creek Assembly; State Missions, The Baptist

Messenger; Home and Foreign Mission Board, and the Seminaries directly to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, designating the agency or institution that is to benefit from the gift.

9. Make all bequests in wills to: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, a corporation, for the use and benefit of" and name the agency or institution the testator desires to designate as the beneficiary of his bequest.

In keeping with actions of the Convention, special building fund emphasis shall be given to the Oklahoma City Hospital and the Thurmond Science-Administration Building at Oklahoma Baptist University, but not to the neglect of any other agency or institution. Because of the great need for endowment funds, the major emphasis on the procuring of funds shall be for the endowing of our institutions and agencies.

We recommend that the plans for the Church Building Loan Department as printed on pages 43 through 46 be approved.

Boys Ranch Town

At the April 21, 1953, meeting of the Board of Directors, Auguie Henry and T. B. Lackey brought to the attention of the Board the possibility of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Johnson, members of First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, making a substantial contribution toward the building and maintaining of a BOYS RANCH TOWN. A special committee, composed of R. C. Miller, H. H. Hobbs, and Grady Cothen, was appointed to work with Auguie Henry and T. B. Lackey in an effort to secure this gift.

On May 18 a special, joint meeting of the Board of Directors and the Baptist Foundation was called, at which time the following trust agreement was entered into:

TRUST AGREEMENT

This Agreement, made and entered into this 18th day of May, 1953, by and between The Jimmy Johnson Foundation, hereinafter referred to as DONOR, and Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, hereinafter referred to as the CONVENTION, and The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, hereinafter referred to as TRUSTEE, all non-profit corporations of a benevolent, charitable, or religious nature, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Oklahoma: WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the said DONOR was organized and created for the purpose of, and with the end in view, of establishing a home for underprivileged and delinquent boys, in memory of Jimmy Johnson, now deceased, son of James M. Johnson and Florence Georgia Johnson; and,

WHEREAS, said DONOR has now accumulated a sum of money and property sufficient in amount to justify the construction of such a home, and partially endow the same; and,

WHEREAS, the said CONVENTION is willing to accept the responsibility of providing such care, support, education and guidance of underprivileged and delinquent boys, and operate and maintain such a home; and,

WHEREAS, the said TRUSTEE is willing to accept the moneys and properties accumulated by DONOR, and from other sources, and hold the same in trust for the sole purpose of establishing, operating, and maintaining a home for underprivileged and delinquent boys, and to endow said home;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises and agreements hereinafter set forth, it is hereby agreed between the DONOR, the CONVENTION, and the TRUSTEE as follows:

Ţ

The trust hereby created shall be perpetual and irrevocable.

II

The name of the home to be established, endowed, operated and maintained, shall be known as BOYS RANCH TOWN and there shall be a suitable plaque placed at the entrance to said home with the following inscription thereon:

BOYS RANCH TOWN
Founded by James M. Johnson
and Florence Georgia Johnson
in Memory of Their Son,
Jimmy Johnson.

III

There is appended to this agreement and made a part hereof, marked Exhibit "A," a list of all moneys and properties, real and personal, accumulated by DONOR, which are hereby delivered and conveyed to THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, Trustee, by The Jimmy Johnson Foundation, pursuant to the author-

its Board of Directors, and in accordance with its Articles if Incorporation, and By-Laws;

To Have And To Hold said moneys and properties, real and personal, unto the said Trustees, its successors and assigns, in the timest, for the uses and purpose described and declared in this agreement.

IV

It is understood and agreed that said trust property shall be field by the TRUSTEE as an endowment fund for the establishment, maintenance and operation of a home for the care, support, education and guidance of underprivileged and delinquent boys, and come to be know as BOYS RANCH TOWN, as above stated; and to be owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of be State of Oklahoma, as hereinafter stated. Provided, however, the TRUSTEE is authorized and directed to turn over and transfer to the CONVENTION all of the increment, earnings and income from said trust property, or so much thereof as the CONVENTION may deem necessary, to maintain and operate said home; and provided further the TRUSTEE is specifically authorized, empowered and directed to transfer a portion of the principal or corpus of the rust property, or the proceeds thereof, not to exceed \$100,000.00 in value, to the CONVENTION, to defray construction costs of initial buildings and other improvements for said home.

V

In the management of the trust estate, the TRUSTEE is fully and completely empowered and authorized to sell, convey, or transfer the trust assets, to invest and reinvest the same, and to do all things and matters set forth in the provisions of the Oklahoma Trust Act, Section 175.1 to 175.53, Title 60, Okla. St. Ann., being Chapter 4, Title 60 of the Session Laws of Oklahoma of 1941, which provisions shall be binding and effective throughout this trust even though the provisions of said Act be modified or repealed.

VI

The said CONVENTION further promises and agrees to assume full and complete responsibility for the continued maintenance and operation of said BOYS RANCH TOWN, with the view of its perpetuation as a continued and ever-increasing service to underprivileged and delinquent boys. In this connection, it is expressly understood and agreed by and between the parties that all real and personal property used by and for the said home, apart from the trust estate, shall be owned by and belong to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and that said CONVENTION shall have sole and complete charge of the management and operation of the said home, and the formation of its policies.

VII

The CONVENTION promises and agrees that it will sponsor, promote and publicize BOYS RANCH TOWN in its literature, and in other ways, and will endeavor to secure additional funds to operate, maintain and endow said home; that it will at all times surround said home with a religious atmosphere, and do everything possible to build the boys into resourceful Christian citizens.

VIII

That the moneys and property held in trust for BOYS RANCH TOWN shall not be obligated for any debts other than those created in the operation of said trust and in the operation and maintenance of said home.

IX

That no discrimination will be shown by the CONVENTION in the selection of boys on account of any, or lack of, religious faith; and that careful consideration will always be given toward the selection of a larger proportion of delinquent boys, in the hope that they can be built into useful citizens.

X

TRUSTEE agrees to serve without compensation, with no charge being made against the trust except for actual expenses incurred in its administration.

XI

In all transactions involving oil and gas leases, royalties, or other mineral interests, the TRUSTEE agrees to seek the advice and counsel of James M. Johnson, which advice and counsel the said James M. Johnson agrees to give without compensation.

XII

It is further understood and agreed that the trust property may be increased at any time in the future by additional gifts from the DONOR, or James M. Johnson or Florence Georgia Johnson, or any other person, and that such additions to the trust fund shall be subject to the terms and provisions as herein set forth.

This gift included properties and assets, as follows: U.S. Certificates of Indebtedness, \$420,000; Oil and Gas Minerals, \$62,355; Capitol Hill Savings and Loan, \$5,462.82; Security Federal Savings and Loan \$5,453; Mortgage-Real Estate, \$1,290; cash, \$21,262.03; a ranch covering 160 acres, on which stands a four room dwelling and other improvements, valued at \$32,000; making a total of \$547,787.39.

The Board charged Secretary Lackey with the responsibility of supervising the administration of BOYS RANCH TOWN.

June 1, Rev. J. A. Russell of First Baptist Church, Fairview, was named resident manager. Rev. and Mrs. Russell now live on the ranch and three boys, ages 11 to 13, have been admitted as residents. Friends have shown considerable interest in helping establish the institution. The following gifts have been received: seven head of cattle; two horses; 75 chickens, 100 bales of hay; one Chevrolet pickup truck; and one mechanical milking machine. These items plus some cash, have a value of approximately \$2200.

A master plan, sufficient to care for 200 boys, has been worked out and approved by the Convention's building committee. Ground-breaking services were held on October 12, and the first unit, which will accommodate a family of 23, is now under construction. Cost of the first unit will be approximately \$65,000, plus \$35,000 for utilities and other improvements, including sewage, electricity, streets, et cetera.

The remainder of Mr. Johnson's contribution is held in trust by the Baptist Foundation, income from which will be used to assist in operating BOYS RANCH TOWN. Churches and individuals will want to contribute toward the building and operation of one of the finest homes to be found anywhere.

Endowment and Church Building Loan Trust Fund

In March, 1952, the Board of Directors passed the following recommendation: "We further recommend that all Cooperative Program monies above the original one million dollar goal be divided fifty-fifty between state and Southern Baptist causes and that the state's fifty per cent, in so far as practical, be placed with the Baptist Foundation to be used as an endowment fund for Oklahoma Baptist University and that these funds, together with any other secured, be used as a church building loan fund, the income of which is to go to the university. Preference on these loans would be given to churches desiring to build mission buildings."

We are happy to report that the 1952 goal was reached in full and that \$100,000 is available for this purpose. In addition \$68,997.95 has been received by the Foundation from the Thurmond estate as O.B.U. Endowment, of which \$35,997.95 is available as loans to churches. We also have \$36,232.85 in the 1953 budget for this purpose. The Baptist Foundation has adopted the following statement of policies and regulations for the church building loan trust fund. We recommend that these policies and regulations be adopted by the Convention.

STATEMENT OF POLICIES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE CHURCH BUILDING LOAN TRUST FUND

10

THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

NATURE AND PURPOSE OF THE TRUST

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund is an endowed fund legally established to perpetuate Baptist agencies and institutions, the trust fund being comprised of gifts from individuals, groups and churches, to be held and administered in trust by THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, and is to be used solely for the purpose of making building loans to Baptist churches in Oklahoma.

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund is by law completely set apart from all other moneys and properties held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; and the administration of this trust is entirely separated from all other functions of The Foundation.

I. ELIGIBILITY FOR LOANS

- 1. It is understood and agreed that preference will be given to churches that are constructing mission buildings.
 - 2. Other qualifications to be considered:
 - (1) DENOMINATIONAL LOYALTY. This loyalty should be evidenced by fellowship and cooperation with the Association in which the church is located, and with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. It shall contribute to mission causes through the Cooperative Program.
 - (2) CHURCH BUDGET. Each church desiring a loan shall

agree to adopt a budget unless one has already been adopted; and shall make an every-member-canvass unless such has been done in the twelve months preceding the application for a loan.

- (3) LOCATION. The church shall be located in a community which presents opportunities for building and maintaining a church, based upon a religious census taken during the 90 days prior to application for a loan. Church buildings shall be well located in the community on ample space, sufficient for contemplated expansion.
- (4) CONSISTENCY. The building shall be consistent with the needs of the community. The type, physical appearance, and general arrangement of the building are of utmost importance, and must be approved by The Department of Church Architecture of the Sunday School Board.

II. APPLICATION FOR A LOAN

- 1. All applications for loans shall be made on blanks prepared by The Church Building Loan Trust Fund Committee, which will be furnished upon request.
- 2. The application for a loan shall be authorized in a regular church business meeting. The application must bear the approval of the Executive Board of the Association in which the church is located, after an on the field inspection by representatives of said Associational Board.
- 3. A church applying for a loan must furnish a current financial statement of receipts and disbursements for the preceding five years, or longer, if practicable; or, in the case of a younger church, the statement must include the period from the church's organization until application for loan is made.
- 4. Upon receipt of application for loan, a survey and appraisal of the property, and a study of the organizational work of the church shall be made by The Committee before a loan is finally approved.
 - 5. Final approval of loans shall be made by The Committee.
- 6. No loan will be granted for less than \$1,000.00 nor more than \$20,000.00.
- 7. No loan will be made in excess of 50% of the fair value of the property, as set up by the appraisal approved by The Committee, and every loan shall be secured by first mortgage on the church property.
- 8. Consideration will be given to collateral other than church property, personal endorsements, and endorsement of associational or neighboring churches.
 - 9. No loan shall be for longer than ten years.

III. RATE OF INTEREST AND METHOD OF PAYMENT

- 1. The rate of interest to be charged on loans shall be 6% per annum.
- 2. All payments shall be made directly to The Church Building Loan Trust Fund of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, Baptist Building, 1141 N. Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

- 3. Payments including principal and interest shall be made muthly, with the privilege of prepayment after two years, or privilege of prepaying in less time by paying necessary expenses.
- 4. The church shall continue to cooperate with the local assomation and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma throughout the life of the loan. Otherwise, the indebtedness shall become due and payable immediately. Non-cooperation shall be determined by the Association in which the church is located.

IV. APPROVAL OF LOANS

- 1. When a loan shall have been approved, The Committee shall give to the church an irrevocable commitment, the same to be in effect for sixty (60) days.
- 2. Such loan shall be consummated when the project is conpleted according to plans and specifications; the mortgage having been duly executed and accepted by The Committee.
- 3. In the case of a church purchasing a building previously erected, The Committee will pay the amount of loan to the church after all terms and provisions for purchase of said property have been fulfilled by the church and the seller.
- 4. Construction costs during the period of construction must be financed by the applicant. After completion of the building, the loan must be used to retire any indebtedness incurred during construction.
- 5. If for any reason a church should decide not to accept a loan after approval by The Committee, the church shall be expected to pay the expenses incurred by The Committee relative to the application for loan.

V. ACCEPTANCE OF LOAN BY THE CHURCH

- 1. The church shall signify in writing to The Committee its acceptance or rejection of the loan within sixty (60) days.
- 2. Conditions and requirements the church must meet after the acceptance of the loan:
 - (1) The church at its own expense shall furnish to The Committee title policy issued by an approved title insurance company, insuring the title to its property as a good and merchantable title.
 - (2) The church shall furnish to The Committee a certificate that it is complying with all codes, rules and regulations of the municipality, city and state, including those of the State Fire Marshall and the Health Department.
 - (3) The church shall furnish The Committee an itemized cost of all new materials and of all indebtedness incurred during construction.
 - (4) If the church for which the loan is being made is purchasing a previously erected building, the church shall furnish The Committee a statement showing the amount of purchase, and the expense for making improvements on same, if any.
 - (5) The building upon which the loan is made must be kept insured by the church for fire and extended coverage

during the existence of the loan, in some good and solvent insurance company satisfactory to The Committee, for a sum equal to an amount necessary to protect the loan, with a mortgage clause attached to the policy, making the loss, if any, payable to The Church Building Loan Trust Fund, as its interest may appear. A copy of said policy shall be deposited with The Committee.

- (6) Churches to which loans are made will be required to pay expense of recording mortgage, and other incidental legal expenses involved in completing the transaction.
- (7) A certificate shall be executed by the trustees of the church, showing that all indebtedness on property which secures the loan has been paid, and that the loan from The Church Building Loan Trust Fund is the only obligation against the church organization, except current bills or obligations expressly waived by The Committee.
- (8) After The Committee approves the loan, the church will be expected to keep its records so that monthly statements of its receipts and disbursements may be furnished when requested.
- (9) The church shall notify The Committee two or three weeks before it is ready to close the loan, so that the note, or notes, mortgage, and other necessary papers may be prepared and sent to the church for execution. These papers must be examined and approved by The Committee's attorney before the loan can be closed.

New Proposed Ministers Retirement and Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan

The Relief and Annuity Board, state boards and many individuals have given prayerful thought to the possibility of expanding the Ministers Retirement and Widows Supplemental Annuity plans.

The new program, known as the Ministers Security Plan, must be approved by each state convention. Later 2/3 of the present active members of the Ministers Retirement Plan of each state must agree to change to the revised program.

After discussions of executives of the Relief and Annuity Board with the actuary and state executive secretaries, agreement was reached on six points of the proposed expansion. Maximum salary participation (\$4,000 per year) will remain the same.

- 1. Disability annuity will be increased from the maximum of \$500 to \$900, or the minister may retire on a commuted annuity if disability occurs after age 60. Widows Plan will remain in effect at no cost to disabled member.
- 2. Early retirement will be possible at age 60 on a commuted annuity, whereas present retirement age is 65 or after.
- Maximum annuity available (\$2,000 per year or 50% of average salary) will remain the same.
- 4. Widow's provision before retirement will remain the same (maximum of \$800 per year or 20% of average salary after six years).

- 5. After retirement, benefits of Widows Plan will remain in effect with the stipulation that the amount of Widow's annuity fincrease as follows for the first six years new Plan is in operation: First year, 50%; second, 60%, increasing 10% until the full 10% of widow's annuity available at retirement is reached.
- 6. Participation for full benefit will be required only from age 15 instead of from date of first pastorate.

Cost of the new plan will increase from the present 3%-3%-2% LTP only) or 4½%-3%-3½% (MRP and WSAP) to 5%-5%-5% New MSP) member-church-convention dues.

We recommend the following resolutions:

- 1. That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approve the expanded program of security for our pastors and their families provided in the Ministers Security Plan, and hereby authorizes the expenditure of funds sufficient to pay the state convention's portion of the additional cost of such program; and that the Relief Annuity Board be authorized to work out, as soon as practical, a similar plan to cover those participating in institutional and board employee plans.
- 2. Be it further resolved that we pledge our cooperation to the Relief and Annuity Board in the matter of publicity and promotion looking toward the inauguration of this expanded program in our state by July 1, 1954, understanding that, in order for the program to be inaugurated, at least two-thirds of the present active members of the Ministers Retirement Plan of this state must agree to transfer their membership to the Ministers Security Plan. The cost to our Convention will be increased from approximately \$35,000 to approximately \$55,000 annually.

RELIEF DEPARTMENT

The ever-increasing load on the Relief Department of the Relief and Annuity Board has become a cause of deep concern for the Relief and Annuity Board and for the state conventions. With so many pastors retiring who have never joined the Ministers Retirement Plan, the problem has become acute.

There are more than 7,000 pastors over the southland who have refused or failed to join this Plan and as they retire, they ask to be placed on the relief roll. A careful study of this problem with the state secretaries during the past several months has resulted in a drastic change in policy. After May 1, 1954, pastors in active service who refuse to enter the Ministers Retirement Plan will no longer be eligible for assistance from the Relief Department. This Plan is the method of our denomination for taking care of retired and disabled ministers. The denomination must have the cooperation of the church and its pastor.

Every church should enter the Plan and urge its pastor to enroll without delay. Even pastors lacking only a few years of retirement age can, with the help of the denomination, earn for themselves small annunities. Your state secretary and the Relief Committee will take pleasure in recommending that these small annuities be supplemented by the Relief and Annuity Board. An intensive effort will be made during the next six months to enroll

all active pastors in the Ministers Retirement Plan before May 1, 1954

The change of policy outlined above has had much study by the Relief and Annuity Board of The Southern Baptist Convention and the Relief Committee of our Board of Directors. Upon the recommendation of these two groups, the Board of Directors voted April 21, 1953 to adopt this policy.

All Out for Christian Education

The greatest effort for Christian education for Oklahoma and Southern Baptists will be launched in April, 1954. All departments, agencies and institutions, southwide, state, association and churches, are urged to cooperate fully in this effort. The program originated in a joint meeting of state secretaries, editors, members of the Southern Baptist Education Commission, and others interested in Christian education as promoted by Southern Baptist colleges and universities.

We are fortunate in having, in Oklahoma Baptist University, one of the leading Christian schools in the nation. Every Baptist young person should be informed of the advantages in education plus.

We recommend:

- 1. That Oklahoma Baptists go all out in promoting the emphasis on Christian education during April, 1954.
- 2. That every department, agency and institution be marshaled to concentrate on this effort.
- 3. That all churches be urged to cooperate in informing their young people about the advantages of Oklahoma Baptist University.
- 4. That a steering committee of 12 be appointed by the president of this Convention to guide Oklahoma Baptists in this endeavor.

Baptist Messenger Printing Transferred

Circulation of the Baptist Messenger reached a point, during 1953, where its printing over-taxed the capacity of Oklahoma Baptist University Press at Shawnee, making it necessary either to spend considerable money for new printing equipment or transfer the Messenger printing to another plant.

Numerous conferences were held with President John W. Raley and his associates at OBU press and others experienced in the field of printing. Dr. Raley submitted the following letter to the executive secretary, emphasizing the necessity for a change:

"Since we have had a round robin discussion of the problems connected with the printing of the Baptist Messenger, with specific reference to re-organization of the press, involving purchase of considerable new equipment, it is my opinion that all of us have arrived at about the same conclusion and that is that the best interest of all involved would be for the Baptist Messenger to be printed in Oklahoma City.

"The mailing service would be greatly improved. Initial outlay of between \$75,000.00 and \$100,000.00 for new equipment will be

avoided. The constant pressure of facing financial loss in the operation of the press, which would necessarily have to be charged to general operations by the university, will be relieved. The university gress can be reorganized to do job printing and other specialized work, moving into the art printing field more in line with work now being done by the press at William Jewell College. These are some if the benefits that I can see accruing to the Convention, the Baptist Messenger readers, and the university by making the change."

The Baptist Messenger committee of the Board of Directors and the executive committee of the Board of Directors met on September 15 for discussion of the matter with representatives of the University, Messenger, and others.

After full discussion the Messenger committee recommended that the executive committee negotiate a contract with the Leader Press of Oklahoma City for printing of the Messenger. The contract has been negotiated upon approval of the executive committee, and printing of the Messenger transferred to the Leader Press effective November 1, 1953.

The size of the Messenger page is reduced slightly, although the amount of copy per page is approximately the same. Page size is now standard, such as used by the Texas Standard, Georgia Index, Virginia Herald and some other state Baptist papers.

Oklahoma City Hospital

The Convention last year adopted the following recommendations, which are printed again in order to keep this big program before all our people.

- 1. "That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma now initiate the founding of an ultimately 500 bed voluntary General Base Hospital to be built in Oklahoma City, and a complementing School of Nursing preliminarily estimated to require an ultimate capacity for 150 student nurses.
- 2. "That the Convention assume the responsibility of planning, administering and operating such hospital and nursing school.
- 3. "That as the first part of this over-all project there be adopted as the immediate objective of the Convention, the securing of the financing and the building of a General Hospital of approximately 250 beds, to be so designed as to accommodate future expansion, and a School of Nursing, which first part of the project is estimated to cost approximately \$4,000,000.00
- 4. "That the Convention initiate the financing of this first project by agreeing to provide \$1,500,000.00 toward its cost, of which \$1,000,000.00 will be made available by the time construction contracts are ready to be let to build the hospital, and \$500,000.00 of which will be made available when contracts are ready to be let for construction of the School of Nursing, subject to the general provision and condition that citizens of Oklahoma City-County raise \$2,500,000.00 toward this first part of the project, by subscription, grants, and gifts from individuals, foundations, corporations, firms and/or other nongovernmental sources. Further that the Board of Directors be authorized and empowered to determine

all matters of policy and detail to implement and expedite consummation of the foregoing objectives, undertaking and general plan.

5. "That your hospital committee be continued and instructed to recommend methods for providing the Convention's share of the financing to assist in every way possible with the Oklahoma City-County phase of the undertaking; and to supplement the work of the Board in carrying out details for furthering the Oklahoma City General Hospital program."

During the year considerable progress has been made on this project.

- 1. The firm, National Fund-Raising Services of Fort Worth, Texas, was engaged to lead in the Oklahoma City-County phase of the campaign. Representatives of this firm have been on the job a good part of the year, preparing prospect lists and organizing committees for the gigantic undertaking.
- 2. A group of 50 Oklahoma City businessmen met June 15 to discuss the matter of the proposed hospital, and agreed to conduct a campaign for public subscription of the \$2,500,000 in the spring of 1954.
- 3. The city planning board has cleared the spring months of 1954 for the launching of the campaign.

We recommend:

- (1) That the Hospital committee be commended for its diligent work thus far and that it be continued and instructed to lead in the consummation of plans for the Oklahoma City hospital.
- (2) That our people give every possible assistance in the Oklahoma City-County campaign, in gifts, work, and prayer.
- (3) That the churches be urged to increase Cooperative Program contributions as much as possible in future years, following the slogans "4 More in '54"; "Strive for 5 in '55"; and "Pick up 6 in '56." It is entirely possible that most of the Convention's share in this project can be obtained within a few years, from the state's 50% of the Cooperative Program. This will greatly increase gifts to missions beyond our own state, avoid the necessity of a church campaign, and permit the continued expansion of other institutions, agencies and departments.

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Public Relations

The Board of Directors authorized the executive secretary to find a suitable person to serve the churches and the Convention in the field of public relations, including publicity, radio-television, visual aids, photography and newspaper reporting. We were fortunate in prevailing upon Mr. Arthur S. Davenport, prominent Oklahoma City public relations man and consecrated deacon at Olivet Baptist Church, to accept this place of service.

Mr. Davenport began work in this capacity June 1 and has already rendered efficient and helpful service to many of the departments, agencies and institutions of our Convention, and to the local churches and associations. He is eminently qualified for this position by training and experience.

Home for Aging People

There has been a growing interest on the part of many that Baptists provide a home for aging people. The Baptist Foundation has received some funds designated for this purpose. Several people have inquired of our interest in this worthy cause. Doubtless there is a growing need for such an institution. Many elderly people, left alone, would rejoice to live in such a home operated by Baptists. We, therefore, recommend:

That the Convention go on record as favoring the erection of a home for aged people and that those interested in making gifts toward its ultimate reality be encouraged to do so.

We further recommend that the Board of Directors study the need, make further investigation, and proceed as funds are obtained.

Historical Commission

The Historical Commission, created by the Convention last year, has held two meetings, given much thought to its responsibilities and made progress in many phases of its work. Progress was retarded to some degree, by the fact that Dr. W. A. Carleton, historical secretary, moved from our state. J. M. Gaskin was elected to serve as chairman of the Commission for the remainder of the year. The Commission makes the following recommendations, which the Board of Directors joins in presenting to the Convention:

- 1. That J. M. Gaskin be asked to print a second edition of his recent book, "Trail Blazers of Sooner Baptists," and that all our people be urged to avail themselves of this attractive and helpful publication on the history of Oklahoma Baptists.
- 2. That W. A. Carleton be invited to submit for publication his manuscript on the life of Dr. J. S. Murrow, which should be released by June 1, 1954.
- 3. That Sam W. Scantlan be asked to prepare a biography of the late Andrew Potter, to be ready for distribution by June 1, 1955.
- 4. That the Convention cooperate with Woman's Missionary Union in publishing a history of that organization to be released by June 1, 1956.
- 5. That the Convention bear the cost of publishing these manuscripts, income from which will be applied toward the cost of publication, until covered in full. Income from sale of books beyond expenses of publication will go to authors.
- 6. That the authors of said books retain copyright, and that our arrangements with these authors shall pertain only to such editions as we deem necessary during the publication periods we assign to each, all subsequent editions to be undertaken by the author entirely at his own expense.
- 7. That in order to make proper preparation for the Golden Anniversary Convention in 1956, the date, meeting place and program committee be determined by this Convention.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

According to the By-Laws of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors of the Foundation is authorized to nominate personnel for its Board of Directors; the same to be approved by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma before being recommended to the Convention for election.

According to the above provision of the By-Laws, the Board of Directors of the Foundation, in its meeting on October 12, nominated the following brethren to succeed themselves for four-year terms:

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention recommends the election of the above named persons to the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation.

Stewardship

The proposed Stewardship Revival for 1954 will be known as "ABC Days" after the ABC'S of Bible stewardship: A—Ask God, B—Believe Him, C—Commit Thy Way. Slogans already in use are "Ask, Believe, Commit," and "Ask God."

The 1953 stewardship study course books have been used in most of the churches during our recent Stewardship Revival. Some churches may desire to use these books again in 1954 as texts for the study part of the revival. However, for the great majority of churches which have already used these books an Outline of the Bible Plan of Stewardship is being prepared by the office of the Director of Promotion for the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention. These outlines will be available the early

summer of 1954. The Promotion Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention has also suggested the possibility of using Dillard's "Bible Stewardship" and the Tither's Enlistment Visitation Chart.

The program suggested for use in Baptist churches during the simultaneous Stewardship Revival of 1954 is as follows: Forty-five minutes in Bible study followed by a forty-five minute worship period in the sanctuary with a message by a different speaker each night except Friday. There would be a stewardship playlet by the young people on Friday night, or films or film strips. A stewardship playlet is being prepared by the Promotion Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The suggestion has also been made that the associational stewardship committee help the churches to arrange themselves in groups of four in order to permit each of the four pastors to speak in his own and three neighboring churches during the week. It is suggested that the messages might be on the following subjects: Monday—Tithing; Tuesday—Church Budgets; Wednesday—Every-Member-Canvass; Thursday—Cooperative Program; Friday—Stewardship play by local youth. This plan would make it necessary that every pastor prepare to speak on one or all of the four subjects mentioned above. It will be a state-wide speakers' bureau of more than 1000 persons. The state-wide planning and training session for all of the speakers who are planning to participate in the Stewardship Revival will be held on the afternoon of January 25 at Stillwater from 1:00 to 4:00 o'clock. This will precede the Evangelistic Conference beginning the night of January 25. At that time, four outstanding Southern Baptist leaders will speak on the subjects: Church Budgets, Every-Member Canvass, Cooperative Program, and Tithing. Prospective Stewardship Revival speakers who attend will be given printed materials to help in the preparation of their own messages. Speakers tentatively invited to participate in this important conference are: Doctors Merrill Moore, Albert McClellan, Robert S. Scales, and H. H. Hobbs.


Present plans call for Stewardship Rallies in all associations in May or June. Associational committees under the leadership of the associational superintendents of missions and moderators will be asked to plan these programs and obtain the desired speakers. The purpose of the rallies will be to enlist the popular support of all Baptists.

We heartily recommend that all Oklahoma Baptist pastors and churches participate in the convention-wide Stewardship Revival plans for the Southern Baptist Convention, November 1-5, 1954.

Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program is constantly challenging Oklahoma Baptists to advance in missionary giving. It is always saying, "Let us do something and let us do more than we have ever done before."

We are happy to report continued advance in our convention's work again this year as Oklahoma keeps step in a challenging, forward program. Our advance is reflected in increased financial support for all causes, state and worldwide, through the Cooperative



Program and through the enlarged ministries of all departments and agencies of our work.

This has been another year of gains in Cooperative Program contributions and for this evidence of divine leadership and of a growing response to Bible Stewardship we are deeply grateful.

The Cooperative Program is the Great Commission in action. Its hearty support shows that the heart of a Baptist church is missions and that the cross is at the heart of all our work. Through the Cooperative Program our churches give to every Baptist cause every week.

Our 1952 goal of \$1,200,000 was exceeded when receipts totaled \$1,304,392.94. The objective for this year of 1953 is \$1,400,000. At the end of nine months, January 1—September 30, 1953, receipts totaled \$1,063,785.02 or \$13,785.02 above the goal for this period. For the same period of last year, January 1—September 30, 1952, receipts totaled \$935,397.40 indicating that through the Cooperative Program our churches have given \$128,388.62 more during the first nine months of this year than in 1952.

Since the convention year does not close until December 31, we urge our churches to put forth even greater effort on the behalf of the Cooperative Program during November and December in order to bring the year's work to a successful conclusion and provide for the various causes supported by the 1953 Cooperative Program budget.

The idea of churches contributing a fixed percentage of the entire budget through the Cooperative Program and endeavoring to increase that percentage each year has blessed us and brought untold good to the cause of Christ. Many churches have already indicated an increase of at least 4 per cent to missions through the Cooperative Program as an objective during 1954. Others will follow.

On September 30, 330 churches had indicated an objective for the 1954 Cooperative Program. Sixty-two churches had accepted the percentage plan for the first time. Records reveal that 706 or 67% of our 1062 white Baptist churches in Oklahoma are now operating on the percentage plan.

All churches will be urged to "Strive for 5 in '55" and "Pick up 6 in '56". This means that our churches will be urged to contribute 5 per cent more of the budget through the Cooperative Program in 1955 and to increase by at least 6 per cent in 1956.

Only six churches failed to make a contribution through the Cooperative Program in the calendar year of 1952.

In keeping with the previously adopted objectives of the Four Year Program of Progress the Board of Directors recommends a state-wide objective of \$1,600,000 for missions through the Cooperative Program in the Calendar year of (1954) to be distributed as follows with the Board of Directors making such changes as may be necessary during the year:

Enid General Hospital

In the early part of 1953 officials of the Enid General Hospital Foundation approached the executive secretary-treasurer concerning the possibility of giving to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma the Enid General Hospital. After thorough investigation, many meetings with the Foundation, the hospital committee of the Board of Directors, and Baptist groups in Enid and surrounding area, the proposal was submitted to the Board of Directors at its April meeting. The Board voted to accept this institution as a gift, under certain conditions.

Other conferences were held, a few minor changes made in the proposal, and complete agreement reached on October 12, at which time this institution of 110 beds, valued at approximately \$1,000,000 including furnishings, accounts receivable, and over \$100,000 in cash was accepted.

In receiving this valuable gift we have agreed to the following:

1. To accept the Enid General hospital and all of its assets and to operate it according to high standards and in such manner that the hospital will be judged and considered as an efficient and qualified hospital organization; to perpetuate the hospital, and to enlarge its services and facilities by additional construction and improvement of existing buildings, such as air conditioning, etc.,

as rapidly and to such extent as circumstances permit and as deemed practicable by the Convention.

- 2. The Convention will maintain the present facilities for training nurses until a thorough study of the over-all nurses' training program as to future policies and needs has been completed.
- 3. The Convention will provide additional facilities as soon as practicable, and in any event within 12 months after the properties are received, to accommodate the reasonable needs for office, consultation, examining, treatment and waiting room space for the Enid Clinic. It is understood that the Enid Clinic will occupy this space so provided under a lease arrangement for a term of years with option to renew for additional periods.
- 4. The Convention specifically promises and agrees that at least \$100,000.00 of the moneys received from the Hospital Foundation will be used only for emergencies which may arise in the operation of the hospital.
- 5. No mortgage shall be executed covering any part of the present hospital property during the next ten years.
- 6. In the event the Convention, at any time within 20 years after receiving and taking over all of the assets of the Hospital Foundation, finds that it is unable for any reason, except for reasons beyond the control of or through no fault of the Convention, to continue the operation of the hospital and its properties, then and in that event the Convention promises and agrees to turn over, reconvey and deliver to the Enid General Hospital Foundation, or if the Foundation has ceased to exist, to some Protestant organization to be designated by the City of Enid, all real estate, buildings and equipment received from the Foundation; and in such event, all buildings erected and improvements made by the Convention while said hospital was in its possession shall always remain the property of the Convention and shall be considered and treated by the parties as personal property, and the Convention shall have the right at its option to remove such buildings and improvements from the premises within a reasonable time or to sell same to the Foundation at a price to be agreed upon between the parties; it being understood in this connection that it is the intention of the parties to exclude from such improvements any facilities which can be considered as replacements of those present in the hospital at the time of the original transfer of possession.
- 7. It will be the stated policy of the hospital management to continue and maintain an open medical hospital staff, under an organization with a Constitution and By-Laws acceptable to the Joint Committee on Accreditation for American Hospitals. It is understood that the custom practiced by most outstanding hospitals whereby medical staff members conducting at least 75 per cent of their hospital practice in the hospital where they are members of the Active Attending Medical Staff, are given priority when a shortage of beds exists in that hospital, will be followed in the conduct of this hospital.

Muskogee Hospital

The hospital committee of the Board of Directors, and a committee of Muskogee Baptist pastors have given much thought to future plans for Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has operated this institution since 1909. 100,00 patients have been treated in the name of Christ, 25,000 babies born, and 4,000 charity cases reported during these years. The standing of the hospital in the community is better now than in its entire history. The administrator, Dr. J. F. Murrell, and his staff have made excellent progress in the last 16 months. However, present buildings and equipment are inadequate to meet the pressing need for most efficient and economical hospital service. It will take considerable funds to bring this institution to the high level of efficiency found in our other hospitals.

The city operates the Muskogee General Hospital, which is also old and inadequate. Recently the Board of Trustee of General Hospital, representing the City of Muskogee in the operation of General Hospital, secured the services of a hospital consultant who made a thorough survey of hospital needs in that area.

After studying the report of this consultant, it appears to us that there are two alternatives in the solution of the hospital problem in Muskogee and surrounding area.

- I. FOR THE CITY OF MUSKOGEE TO BUILD ONE NEW, MODERN HOSPITAL ADEQUATE TO MEET THE NEED.
- II. FOR THE CITY OF MUSKOGEE TO LAUNCH A CAM-PAIGN FOR FUNDS SUFFICIENT TO IMPROVE AND EN-LARGE BOTH MUSKOGEE GENERAL AND OKLAHOMA BAP-TIST HOSPITALS SO THEY CAN MEET THE NEED.

Should the City of Muskogee choose alternative No. 1, "to build one new, modern hospital adequate to meet the need," we recommend:

- 1. That Baptists join with other residents of Muskogee in a consolidated plan to obtain one adequate, modern hospital for Muskogee, the same to be built by the city.
- 2. That we urge all Baptists in Muskogee to support the city in its effort to meet this need.
- 3. That Oklahoma Baptist Hospital consolidate its 44 year hospital ministry with that of Muskogee in the new plan for providing necessary hospital service for that area.
- 4. That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be authorized to dispose of the Convention's property in Muskogee in the most feasible manner.

Should the City of Muskogee decide on alternative No. II, "for the City of Muskogee to launch a campaign for funds sufficient to improve and enlarge both Muskogee General and Oklahoma Baptist hospitals so they can meet the need," we recommend:

1. That we request the City of Muskogee to give Oklahoma Baptist Hospital the same support and consideration given Muskogee General Hospital, such as reduction in cost of utilities and public solicitation of funds. It must be clearly understood that Oklahoma Baptist Hospital does not expect, nor will it receive, tax funds. However, if tax money is secured with which Muskogee General is improved, we feel that the citizens of Muskogee should contribute an amount sufficient to bring Oklahoma Baptist Hospital to the same standard of efficiency.

In view of the facts,

- (1) That the Baptist General Convention has contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars to this institution across the years;
- (2) That the Baptist General Convention has never asked the City of Muskogee, as such, for assistance;
- (3) That other cities are providing buildings and equipment to care for their needy sick, and
- (4) That the Baptist General Convention does not have sufficient funds with which to meet capital need alone,

We feel fully justified in the above request.

2. We further recommend, That, should Muskogee grant the above request, the Baptist General Convention shall continue to operate the Baptist Hospital, to help meet the need in the City of Muskogee and eastern Oklahoma.

Whatever the citizens of Muskogee decide as the most feasible plan for meeting this emergency, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma pledges its full support and help. If the most feasible plan is for the City of Muskogee to build and maintain its own hospital facilities, we will gladly consolidate our interest with theirs.

A Year of Building

1953 will go down in history as a year of expansion and building. The building committee, created by the Convention last year and composed of Thurmond George, chairman; H. H. Hobbs, H. Tom Wiles, Harold McGlamery, M. E. Ramay, J. W. Wade, Harold Lindsey, Max Stanfield, J. P. Dane, R. A. Young and O. L. Ledgerwood, is to be commended for its work.

Orphans' Home.

Two new buildings have been erected, furnished, occupied and dedicated at the orphanage during the past year. They are the W. S. Kerr and Andrew Potter buildings. Senator R. S. Kerr gave funds for the construction of the W. S. Kerr building in memory of his deceased father. Many lovers of homeless children shared in making possible the building dedicated to the memory of Andrew Potter, former executive secretary who led Oklahoma Baptists in doing so much for the Home. Nothing was closer to the heart of this beloved leader. The two new buildings, furnishings, new streets and other improvements in connection with them cost \$198,981.77.

2. Baptist Student Union Buildings.

The Baptist Student Union buildings, adjacent to the state university at Norman, and Oklahoma A & M, Stillwater were completed during the past Convention year at a cost of \$334,381.64, including furnishing and building sites. These two new buildings, so well located, so attractive and so well arranged are buildings

which every Oklahoma Baptist can take pride. Hundreds of Baptist youth are already making full use of these facilities. We lack \$85,260.67 having enough to pay for this work. We urge those having unpaid pledges and those who have not yet contributed to come to our rescue as soon as possible.

We have also shared in the Baptist Student Union building at Southeastern State Teachers College, Durant. Mr. S. A. Whale gave the Baptist Foundation attractive property adjacent to the campus. First Baptist Church, Durant and other individuals and churches have contributed approximately \$9,000.00, to which the Convention added \$5,000 for this attractive student center.

3. Falls Creek Tabernacle,

The tabernacle at Falls Creek Assembly was enlarged and improved at a cost of \$17,294.75. Other improvements bring the total to \$18,784.95.

The Convention also contributed \$2,500 toward improvements at Kiamichi Assembly near Talihina and \$10,000 on Oklahoma Hall at Glorieta.

We have invested a total of \$586,148.36 for these buildings and improvements which have been completed the past year.

4. Buildings Under Construction.

Two buildings are now under construction. They are the science-administration building at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, which will cost more than one-half million dollars including furnishings, and the first unit of Boys Ranch Town, 13 miles northeast of Oklahoma City, which will cost approximately \$100,000.00 for building and other necessary improvements, exclusive of furnishings.

The Thurmond estate made available approximately \$260,000 to be used on the science-administration building. The Convention is contributing \$100,000 through the Cooperative Program in 1954, 1955, leaving approximately \$175,000 to be raised from interested individuals and corporations. President John W. Raley and Dr. Auguie Henry, executive secretary-treasurer of the Baptist Foundation are leading in this undertaking.

Mr. and Mrs. James M. Johnson have agreed that up to \$100,000.00 of their gift for Boys Ranch Town may be used in the initial building and improvements. Funds for the furnishings and other improvements must come from friends interested in this institution. Dr. Henry and Rev. J. A. Russell, resident manager, will be seeking these funds.

Kerr Memorial Dormitory.

The Baptist Foundation has announced a gift from Senator R. S. Kerr of \$250,000.00 toward the building of a new girls dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. This gift was made on the condition that the Convention provide additional funds for the construction of this building. This structure will be a memorial to Mrs. W. S. Kerr, now deceased, mother of Senator R. S. Kerr. Approximately \$350,000.00 in addition to the initial gift of \$250,000.00 will be required to make the building ready for occupancy; \$250,000 to complete construction, and \$100,000 for equipment and furnishings.

We recommend:

That the Convention begin construction on the Kerr Memorial girls dormitory at Oklahoma Baptist University as soon as the science-administration building is completed and paid for in full, with the hope that construction on the new dormitory may be started in 1956.

General Recommendations

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma recommends:

- 1. That we continue to exercise the strictest economy which is consistent with efficient administration.
- 2. That we continue the policy of operating on a cash basis as far as possible.
- 3. That the 1954 State Mission budget be projected in such a fashion as to incur no deficits.
- 4. That all institutions and agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be instructed to incur no debts that are not authorized by the Board of Directors.
- 5. That we continue to emphasize the Cooperative Program as the main line of missionary endeavor for 1954.
- 36. Time having arrived for the annual sermon, Rev. J. E. Kirk was presented. Brother Kirk introduced Rev. John W. Salzman who read the second epistle of John and then led in prayer. Paul Green sang "Open My Eyes."

Rev. Kirk brought the annual message based upon the text in II John:8. "Look to yourselves, that we lose not those things which we have wrought, but that we receive a full reward."

It was a tender and stirring message which inspired the hearers to renewed devotion and service for God and program. Rev. G. R. Naylor led in the closing prayer.

- 37. Vice-president George Miller called the convention to order and Bob Wooley led in song service singing "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" and "Majestic Sweetness." Ken Hufman, El Reno, sang "Balm in Gilead."

- 39. Rev. W. E. Dittmer led in prayer for the guidance of the Holy Spirit upon our convention.
- 40. Miss Mary Tongee brought the report regarding the Baptist Book Store.

Baptist Book Stores

The Baptist Book Stores depend on Baptists for the support of the stores and the stores themselves support all phases of the denomnational life in every way possible. During the year 1952 the Church Library Consultant worked consistently on the promotion of libraries for town and rural churches. Forty-seven new libraries were organized during the year. The Visual Aids Department emphasized the local church workshops for all departments of the church, and they report 134 Baptist churches had such workshops. It is our privilege to furnish the materials with which the various departments work and we endeavor to keep informed on future plans for all of them. During the summer months we are planning for fall materials and at the same time supplying exhibits for the various state meetings held at Falls Creek and Kiamichi Assemblies. We need to place orders for materials three to six months before they will be needed in the churches.

The increase in growth in all phases of Baptist life is reflected in the increase in sales and services shown by both of our Baptist Book Stores. The sales in both stores showed a nice gain over the previous year, the Tulsa store showing a 40.98% increase and the Oklahoma City store an increase of 21.14%.

Thanks to the splendid cooperation of all the churches we are glad to report that all orders for Stewardship Revival books were filled as of October 12. For these books we placed large orders in July and August, urging that orders be placed by churches for delivery at an early date. We used 13,000 Adult books, 3,700 young people's books, 4,400 intermediate books, 1,600 primary books and 5,000 junior books.

Early in August Miss Virginia Martin was transferred from the Tulsa store to the Memphis, Tenn., store. Mrs. Lola Allen has been Acting Manager since Miss Martin left. Mrs. Allen and the personnel in the Tulsa store will be pleased to have you visit the store in its enlarged space during your visit to Tulsa. Both of the Baptist Book Stores are pledged to serve you and your church to the best of their ability. Any suggestions or criticisms will be gratefully received.

STUDENT CONVENTION—The annual Student Convention was held in the fall of 1952 at the University of Tulsa, with registration totaling an all-high of 1,126. The attendance goal for 1953 Student Convention in Shawnee has been set at 1,500.

STUDENT NIGHT AT CHRISTMAS—This observance in the churches, the last Sunday evening in December, is becoming increasingly popular. One of the objectives of the observance is to acquaint the home people with the ministry of the church at college.

STATE SPRING RETREAT—The annual Retreat was held at the Falls Creek Assembly in April. Although the attendance for this meeting is restricted to B.S.U. Council Officers, the registration of 269 was the largest to date.

SOUTHWIDE STUDENT RETREATS — One hundred and forty-five students and student leaders attended the Pioneer Student Retreat at the new Baptist Assembly at Glorieta, New Mexico, in August. This was the largest group from Oklahoma ever to attend a southwide retreat. Twenty-five were present at Ridgecrest, in June.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY—Scores of prospective college students were contacted through the class "Heads Up for College" at Falls Creek. The Baptist Student Center also served as an enlistment agency for the local church, or churches, when students enroll in the college or university of their choice.

THE ANNUAL PLANNING MEETING was held in Stillwater, October 9-10. Forty-five persons, representing 15 campuses, met and planned a wider field of ministry in every area of our calendar of activities for 1954, in cooperation with the "Million More in 54" Campaign of Southern Baptists, and the "Four Year Program of Progress" being promoted by Oklahoma Baptists.

A NEW PUBLICATION—A B.S.U. Paper is being mailed from the State Office to the campuses, periodically. The purpose of this paper is to publicize state promotional activities and serve as a coordinator for the local B.S.U. organizations.

NEW BAPTIST STUDENT CENTERS have been erected at the Oklahoma A.&M. College, Stillwater, and the University of Oklahoma, Norman. These buildings are the culmination of years of praying, dreaming, planning, and giving, on the part of Oklahoma Baptists. The A.&M. Center was dedicated October 10; the O.U. Center October 24. Southeastern State College, Durant, is also benefiting from a new and adequate Student Center. These Centers, situated adjacent to the campuses, serve as an enlistment agency for the local Baptist church, or churches.

Church Music

The interest and appreciation of Oklahoma Baptists for better church music continues to grow. This is due to the faithful, cooperative directors who are serving 630 churches in the state. Fifteen of these are full-time ministers of music; 65 serve on a combination basis; 125 are paid part-time workers; and 425 volunteer their services. In addition to providing music for the regular worship services of the church, many directors give their people further opportunities for training and service through special occasional music programs.

THE LOCAL CHURCH

A dynamic music education program for the local church will give emphasis to the following:

1. Competent leadership.

2. Adequate budget.

3. Congregational singing.

4. Graded Choirs.

5. Church music classes for teaching and training.

6. Regular seasonal music activities.

7. Summer music schools.

Ask any pastor whose church has a graded choir program and you will get an enthusiastic report of the blessings that have come to the entire church life through this emphasis:

Provides a new, vigorous program of utilizing natural talents;

Enlists children, parents and friends;

- Gives definite responsibility to children in the church services;
- Ties children to church program as a whole, as well as worship services;
- 5. Lifts level of music appreciation of the church;
- 6. Provides new evangelizing opportunities;

7. Makes for well integrated services;

8. Assures a good church choir for future;

9. Increases membership of church;

Pays its way.

Such benefits are worthy of every church. Every child is worthy of such a church.

THE ASSOCIATION

Thirty-seven of the 38 associations elected music directors to serve 1952-53. These directors cooperated in the promotion of many of the church music activities recommended for the association. During 1954 our emphasis will be to get associational directors to complete the associational organization and to promote the following recommended associational music educational program:

1. A music department in every church.

 At least a one week associational music school each year.

3. A hymn sing each quarter.

4. An annual church music festival.

- 5. Annual carol sing on Sunday afternoon before Christmas.
- 6. Each church subscribing to and using *The Church Musician*, the monthly magazine for church music departments. Sufficient quantities should be ordered regularly from the Sunday School Board by each church to supply each choir singer, organist, pianist, director, music committee member and the pastor.
- 7. Adequate publicity.
- 8. Summer music schools.
- Promotion of State and Southwide Conferences, Clinics, Assemblies and Festivals.

THE STATE

We are grateful for the effective work of the state church music officers, in cooperation with the promotional activities outlined for the state. Encouraging reports have come to the state office for the Five Mission Schools promoted in needy areas, and graded teaching and choir programs for three assemblies, using some of the finest music talent in the state. Sincere effort has been made, through the music leadership, to keep the music for all conventions on a level commensurate with the rest of our work.

The first state Church Music Festival for junior and senior high school ages was conducted at the Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, with 27 churches participating and a total of 1,000 voices singing in the Mass Choir Concert. Dr. Alfred M. Greenfield, Head of the Department of Music at the New York University, was Guest Conductor.

SOUTHWIDE

Pamphlets outlining the church music program and giving up-to-date methods of promotion are published by the Department of Church Music at the Baptist Sunday School Board and are available without cost from either the southwide or state offices.

Thirty-eight Oklahomans attended the Southwide Church Music Conference at the new Glorieta Assembly in June. Seven of these musicians served on the faculty. Thirty-five attended the Conference at Ridgecrest in August with three serving on the faculty. We expect to participate in these activities on a much larger scale next year.

MORE IN '54

A competent music committee, led by the state director and Paul Green, state president, is planning our greatest state church music promotional program for 1954. Some of the activities are:

Public Relations

Oklahoma Baptists have taken a pioneering step in the establishment of a public relations office to promote and publicize Baptist work in Oklahoma and the cause of Christ.

The public relations office was established June 1, 1953, and is primarily concerned with four phases—printed promotional materials, newspaper publicity, radio and audio visual aids. The office functions through established media using tested public relations techniques.

Public relations is telling the world—not covering up. Modern public relations goes much deeper than a press release. It is concerned with the basic ideas that make for better public acceptance. For that reason, considerable time is spent in planning, conferring and analyzing various aspects of the work.

During the first four and one half months, Oklahoma newspapers published 559 stories sent out by the public relations office. Those stories would have filled a 30-page newspaper without advertisements. In addition, promotional materials, posters, etc., have been prepared for practically every department of the state office and assistance has been given several individual churches and associations. A church publicity class was taught during the second Falls Creek assembly with an average attendance of about 45. It is expected that similar conferences will be held in several associations during 1954.

Your public relations director has spoken at approximately 40 church and associational meetings during the past four and one half months.

46. Miss Margaret Hutchison, secretary of our State Woman's Missionary Union, introduced Mrs. C. A. Summers, re-elected president of the organization. Miss Hutchison called attention to the work of our women's work in Oklahoma noting the plans and program for the coming year.

Woman's Missionary Union

Woman's Missionary Union has chosen "Jesus Saves" as her hymn for the year, 1953-54. Out of that song comes this uplifting phrase, "This our song of victory." We are building our report around This phrase, feeling that every bit of our work during the nine months of 1953 has been done in order that people in our homes, but towns, our state, our Southland and the entire world may know that "Jesus Saves!" Our report will contain some high motes, a few low notes, some new notes, some steady notes and blended notes, making a harmonious chord.

CHORDS

Woman's Missionary Union is an auxiliary of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and cooperates with the Unions of other states through Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary of the Southern Baptist Convention, Our president, Mrs. C. A. Summers, is a vice president of the Southern Union and is on the Board of Managers of this southwide organization. She and the executive secretary attended the mid-year meeting of Woman's Missionary Union, where the plans and policies of the Union are set. The Executive Secretary served as chairman of the committee on the 1954 Home Mission Week of Prayer which was responsible for the week's programs and the Annie Armstrong Offering allocations.

The young people's secretary and the part-time Royal Ambassador secretary attended the mid-year meeting for state young people's workers where plans for WMU young people are formed. All four of these workers attended the pre-session committee meetings and the annual meeting of Southern Woman's Missionary Union in Houston in May. Oklahoma had its full delegation of 60 plus many visitors at this annual meeting.

For three years Southern WMU has held council meetings for the three important phases of our work. The chairmen of these phases, Mrs. H. B. Wilhoyte, mission study; Mrs. John Livingston, community missions; Mrs. Sanford Lackey, stewardship, having attended their respective years. All three of these state chairmen, as well as Mrs. W. R. Fisher, State Business Woman's Circle Advisor, attended the WMU Week at Glorieta.

These four chairmen have given liberally of their knowledge, strength and time to share with our state. All four held morning and afternoon conferences at all fourteen district WMU conferences, held just prior to the beginning of the new WMU year. In all there were ten conference leaders for these meetings in which were registered 2,945 women from 384 societies. All 38 associations had representation at these meetings. The mission offering amounted to \$891.47.

We have been blessed with our state officers and chairmen. Mrs. S. L. Stacy, state hospitals chanrman, not only attended the state but all five regional hospital meetings in the spring and many associational WMU rallies which featured the hospitals. The offering for the School of Nursing and the charity fund of our hospitals this year amounted to \$17,571.44. We believe the emphasis the women gave helped in this.

Mrs. T. Grady Nanney, Christian Education Chairman, led in a meeting of associational Christian education chairmen. She made many contacts with scholarship students in OBU, keeping the Union informed as to their needs. Mrs. Guy Old, Orphans Home chairman, met with the associational Orphans' Home chairmen. All state chairmen have made reports to the state WMU board meetings and the annual meeting.

Our state WMU field worker, the special Indian WMU worker and the Negro WMU field worker, have all done splendid work and reported regularly.

SOME NEW NOTES

WMU of Oklahoma turned its face gladly toward Glorieta this first year. There were 97 registered for WMU Week; a chartered bus and several cars making the stops enroute there and back at eleven different home mission points, Indian and Spanish. Thirty-one YWA's went to the YWA Week. These were new experiences and the number participating far exceeded former groups to the Ridgecrest weeks.

Another new note this year was the first convention-wide Royal Ambassador Congress held in Atlanta with 5,000 boys in attendance. Bob Banks took a chartered bus with 24 boys from Oklahoma. A new note was sounded when Bob Banks, assisted by Ivyloy Bishop, held a Royal Ambassador Clinic for RA counselors and young people's directors. There were 50 who attended.

The women and young people made special gifts to send Miss Green to the Baptist World Youth Congress in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and a tour of Baptist mission fields in all Latin America.

STEADY NOTES

Always there are state WMU meetings of one kind or another. Twenty-three state meetings or series of meetings were held. Nine of these were young people's meetings.

Two of the state meetings were mission study institutes; 198 attending from 25 associations and 2 Indian associations in the December one and 186 from 29 associations in the September institute. These five teachers from each association in turn held associational mission study institutes, reaching 3057 teachers in our churches.

Another state meeting was the community missions conference which presented practical helps on doing mission work in one's own community.

The state WMU Board Meetings were held at their regular times with 50 members present in November and 48 members present in May. The young people's directors of associations were invited guests to these board meetings.

The Girls' Auxiliary Houseparty enrolled 298 and the YWA Houseparty 108. The State Royal Ambassador Conclave enrolment reached 255. Four young people's camps were held at Falls Creek with 456 boys and 438 girls in their respective camps.

Woman's Missionary Union provides missionary teachers for both state assemblies at Falls Creek. This year there were enroled in mission classes, 1,943 the first week and 1,272 the second week.

As is the custom, WMU secured 37 missionary speakers to serve from one to four weeks each in our summer rallies, camps and assemblies. This year these missionaries served in 26 camps, houseparties and assemblies and in 32 associational rallies, con-

tacting a total of 12,213 people. Offerings in these meetings for missions amounted to \$825.88.

Associational presidents promoted WMU work through mission study institutes, officers' clinics and regular quarterly rallies. For the four quarters, 114 quarterly WMU rallies were held with an average attendance of 3,296 each quarter. There were 25 associational mission study institutes held this fall with 1,499 in attendance from 248 churches.

Although the state and associational leaders have done much to inspire and plan, the local leadership is responsible for the fine response to missions in service and gifts. In our state on September 30, 1953, which is the end of our WMU year, there were 834 WMS and 1,746 young people's organizations. Of these, 61 were new WMS organized in 1952-53 and 181 were new young people's organizations. The reported membership in missionary societies is 24,894.

HIGH NOTES

Woman's Missionary Union rejoices that the Cooperative Program total has advanced to such amounts. We keep no records of the women's part in this but there are more than 21,000 WMS members reported as regular contributors through the Cooperative Program of their churches and more than 11,000 are tithers.

The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions for 1952 reached \$139,892.85. The Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions for 1952 reached \$45,451.28 and the offering for 1953 had reached \$47,707.88 as of October 13, 1953. The Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions for 1952 was \$21,746.87 and through October 29, 1953, had reached \$21,893.06 with more coming in daily. The WMU apportionment as of October 13, had reached \$12,076.73.

Oklahoma WMU through scholarships helped eleven young women in the WMU Training School and the seminaries last year and one Indian and one Alaskan student in OBU; and assisted with the nursery for OBU students.

Miss Margaret Hutchison, Executive Secretary-Treasurer

47. Rev. Sam W. Scantlan presented our State Mission program and introduced our associational missionaries who represented 191 years of service, 113,320 baptisms, 179 new churches, 465 new buildings, 299 new missions, \$5,386,998 Cooperative Program. These statistics represent the results during the time these missionaries have labored.

Rural and City Missions

"We are debtors." Rom. 8:12.

"Ye ought to walk so ye would abound more and more." I Thess. 4:1.

Our field of state missions is Oklahoma. The specific purpose of a Rural and City Missions Department is the reaching of all the people in Oklahoma for Christ. If there is a neglected area, or community, where a mission or church is needed, it is the business of this department to assist the churches in the establishment of that work.

Where there are weak churches, or ones that are new and struggling, Oklahoma missionaries lend helping hands.

Through this department assistance goes to every association. In each association there is a superintendent of missions whose business it is to promote evangelism, Sunday schools, training unions, workers' conferences, vacation Bible schools, brotherhoods, WMU's, simultaneous revivals, simultaneous study courses, schools of missions, and any other work which Baptists do for the Lord.

"More in Fifty-four" has the support of all Oklahoma Baptist missionaries. More money raised; more souls saved; more people baptized; more in Sunday school (A Million More in Fifty-four); more in training union; more in prayer meeting; more and better preaching; more of everything for Christ will be the theme and goal of every superintendent of missions.

The Summer School for Preachers each summer at Oklahoma Baptist University is one of the finest things we do. In 1953 there were 101 enrolled.

This coming term, June 21 to July 2, 1954, Dr. Sydnor Staley of Southeastern Seminary, Dr. Albert McClellan of the Executive Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and Dr. L. E. Maples of Miami, Oklahoma, will be our teachers. We pray that the coming term will be the greatest we have had.

TweIve college students from over the Southern Baptist Convention came to Oklahoma to work with our missionaries this last summer. Their final reports gave full account of their work as follows:

Worked in 45 Vacation Bible Schools Witnessed 36 conversions Visited 616 homes taking census VBS enrolment 2,434 where they worked Led 4 to surrender for special service Worked a total of 626 days.

Missionaries of Oklahoma played a vital role in the summer assemblies. They are always important assistants at Falls Creek and usually have to do with managing the smaller assemblies throughout the state.

Oklahoma superintendents of associational missions have worked in 59 Schools of Missions during this convention year. Seven of these schools were in Oklahoma.

Falls Creek Assembly

"Falls Creek"—these are short but significant words of many hundreds of people. They denote a place in the southern Oklahoma hills, a particular section of the countryside with its winding stream. But more significant than the place, are the experiences that countless young people and adults can recall as they reflect on the high moments at Falls Creek, our Baptist assembly. The changed lives, the calls and responses to greater Christian service, and the deepened spirituality, that have been achieved through the years, give it a special place in the hearts of Oklahoma Baptists.

The 1953 assembly was again divided into two seven-day sessions. Dr. J. D. Grey was the assembly speaker for both sessions. Dr. Grey, pastor of First Baptist Church, New Orleans, and past president of the Southern Baptist Convention, proclaimed the gospel and declared the doctrines in a powerful manner at each service. Many expressed their gratitude for the continuing effect that his messages will have in the lives of our young people, and the benefits that resulted in promoting the total program of our churches and denomination.

Many popular classes were conducted during the two weeks, not only for intermediates and young people, but also for adults. Mission study classes were taught for all ages and new courses were offered this year in Bible study for adults. Dr. Dale Moody, Southern Seminary, and Dr. Ralph Baker, Southwestern Seminary, taught these Bible classes.

Falls Creek continues to expand in many ways, and surely this institution with its rich tradition will be supported in the coming years as it becomes even more important as a place of spiritual enrichment and growth. Falls Creek, along with all of our other agencies, institutions and departments will look forward to "More in Fifty-four."

Attendance was more evenly balanced between the two sessions this year than in 1952. Scores of churches participated in the assembly that had never before been able to share in this part of Baptist life. Three churches from Texas occupied rented cabins during the second week of the assembly and were blessed by the ministry of Oklahoma's Falls Creek. Total registration was 19,002 for both weeks of the assembly. Full-time registration reached an all-time high with 7,279 persons attending either one or both of the sessions.

The spirit of the assembly was high. Young and old entered into the total program with enthusiasm and cooperation. The program of play and recreation was enjoyed by a host of participants and spectators. The classes were well attended, with more than 90 different classes being offered during the two weeks period. Approximately 7,000 awards were earned during the assembly.

There were 1,784 significant public decisions during the twice-daily worship services. Total professions of faith in Christ numbered 121. A total of 58 young men surrendered to the gospel ministry. There were 157 missionary volunteers and 392 for other full-time Christian service. Rededications and other definite public decisions totaled 1,056.

The major physical improvement accomplished during the year was enlargement of the main tabernacle. Seating capacity was increased approximately 750. The addition to the large structure included the construction of a greatly enlarged choir section with more than 500 seats banked against the north end of the tabernacle. Twice during the assemblies this section was filled with singers who carried the thousands of worshipers to glorious heights as they sang the praises of God. The total cost of constructing this addition to the tabernacle was \$17,295.

M. Judson Cook became business manager of the assembly on November 1, 1953. He has been associated with the Baptist Orphans' Home, and succeeds Vernon C. Walker who has served as business manager during the past three years. Mr. Walker became administrator of the Miami Baptist Hospital. Mr. Cook will manage the convention's office at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City and serve as superintendent of Boys' Ranch Town in addition to his Falls Creek responsibilities.

Baptist Hospitals

Oklahoma Baptists are on the march in the hospital ministry. The convention now operates six hospitals and plans are being made to launch the fund raising campaign to build a 500-bed hospital in Oklahoma City. This movement is in keeping with "More in '54."

The convention owns hospitals at Muskogee, Miami, and Mangum, as well as the recently acquired 110-bed institution at Enid. City-owned hospitals are leased by the convention and operated as Baptist institutions at Perry and Stillwater. A more detailed account of the transfer of Enid General Hospital to Oklahoma Baptists is given in the report of the Board of Directors.

Administrators in our six hospitals, as of November 1, 1953, J. F. Murrell, Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee; Joe R. Baker, Enid General Hospital, Enid; David C. Foster, Southwest Baptist Hospital, Mangum; Tom E. Carter, Stillwater Municipal Hospital, Stillwater; Robert S. Bazzell, Perry Memorial Hospital, Perry; and Vernon C. Walker, Miami Baptist Hospital, Miami. Ben F. Bland has served as chaplain of the five hospitals during the year, and has covered more than 25,000 miles in this work. Thousands of tracts, Bibles and other materials have been distributed and Brother Bland has led twenty six persons to acceptance of Christ in our hospitals. Brother S. U. Butts has been selected to serve as chaplain for Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, and Miami Baptist Hospital, Miami. Brother Butts began his work November 1, 1953, and will serve these two hospitals in this important spiritual ministry that is so fruitful. Brother Bland will serve the hospitals at Stillwater, Perry and Enid. A chaplain from the southwest area will be selected to serve the hospital at Mangum. All of the administrators, and the chaplains, have supplied many church pulpits during the year and serve in other fields of ministry in addition to their regular work in the hospitals. A total of more than 300 employees, including nurses, technicians, assistants, office personnel, engineers and service workers are required to keep our hospitals open and ready to meet the needs of Oklahoma.

The record, during the year, in our hospital ministry is indeed impressive and gratifying. The information in this report does not include data from Enid General Hosptal which was acquired on October 15, 1953. Most significant is the fact that a Christian atmosphere has been provided and efficient service given in the name of Christ for 10,151 persons. This host of people spent a total of 54,992 days under the care of Oklahoma Baptists. This means that an average of 150 patients were in our Baptist hospitals each day during the past twelve months.

A total of 1,759 babies were born in these hospitals and more than \$30,000 was expended in charity service during the year. The combined costs of all hospital work engaged in by our state convention has been \$1,052,345.37. The total program is, in general, a self-supporting enterprise, but certain phases of this work require large expenditures for equipment and service. This is particularly true in the field of nurses training, and even on a national basis it is not uncommon for programs in nursing education to operate with a deficit. Our people must catch the vision of this

endeavor and give it the supplemental help that is required if accreditation standards are to be maintained and the program continued. The annual hospital day offering was promoted this year as a "Quest for Quarters" with a goal of \$25,000. More than 500 churches shared in this offering and contributed \$17,571.44. Of this amount \$13,101.37 was invested in Christian education at Oklahoma Baptist School of Nursing at Muskogee. A fund, totaling \$1,858.69, was allotted for charity service and made available to all hospitals prorated on the basis of number of beds. Value of linens and other materials given to the hospitals during the year totaled \$5.363.21.

Every church is urged to support our important hospital ministry. The 1954 hospital day offering on May 2 should be included in the church calendar and a worthy offering made throughout the state. Division will again be made of these funds with the nurses training at Muskogee and Enid, and charity work in all hospitals sharing in the offering.

Every association in the state has conducted a Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade this year. Many of our churches are making use of the Evangelism Church Council in planning a perennial program of evangelism for their church. Revivals sponsored by local and associational Brotherhoods and youth-led revivals have resulted in the winning of many people to Christ and His church during this year.

We are grateful to the Lord for the fine work done in each association by the chairmen of evangelism and the associational organizers. Our deepest gratitude goes to our pastors for their leadership and untiring efforts in this great work of evangelism.

In addition to the revivals, Brother Haskins has filled other engagements in our churches and associations. We praise God for the good work being done by this man of God.

When we plan our work under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, when we work our plans in the power of the Holy Spirit we rejoice in the attainments and give praise unto the Lord. Our program of evangelism is a planned, pleasing and productive program.

Therefore, we again recommend this tested, tried, and proven program.

- 2. Every association with an evangelistic organizer and a chairman of evangelism elected annually.
- 3. Every church with at least two revivals every year (one simultaneous).
- An evangelism church council functioning in every church.
- 5. A perennial visitation program of evangelism.
- 6. A "New Members' Union" in every Training Union with the pastor teaching the booklet, "Your Life and Your Church."
- 7. Every pastor attending the statewide Evangelistic Conference each year.
- 8. A constant effort by every church in solving and preventing the non-resident church membership problem.

Looking to the future we urge you to begin now to pray and plan for the nation-wide evangelistic crusade in 1955. The dates for Oklahoma are as follows:

Religious Education

"Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His holy name! Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits \dots "

When we read the record of progress made by Baptist churches in Oklahoma during the past year, we feel a deep sense of gratitude to our God for his manifold blessings upon us.

Our churches continue to make progress in the development of greater teaching and training programs. The progress made in Vacation Bible School work is a thrilling chapter in the history of our state work. Our training course program, both in Sunday school and in Training Union has been greatly accelerated during the last three years and the growth in Standard Sunday school units during the past two years has been sensational.

This record indicates that the teaching and training program in our churches is growing in two directions. First, we are growing in numbers in Sunday school, Training Union and Vacation Bible School work. In the second place, the number of training awards and the number of Standard units indicate improvement in the quality of work that is being done.

Because of the preparation which has been made for the "Million More in '54" Sunday school crusade, our churches are at the present time making enlargement plans which are much greater than at any time in our history. The enlistment of more workers, providing more space and the organization of new classes and departments is the order of the day.

The record is a follows:

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Our Sunday school enrollment at the end of 1952 was 258,269, a gain of 11,437 over the previous year.

Eight hundred eighty three Vacation Bible Schools were held last year with an enrollment of 93,157.

We now have 1,080 Standard Sunday school units. The most sensational growth we have ever enjoyed in Sunday school work has been in the number of Standard units developed during the last two years in Oklahoma. In the Southern Baptist Convention we are second only to Florida.

Sunday school officers and teachers in Oklahoma earned 35,633 training awards during 1953. This too is a new record for our state.

Our State Sunday School Convention last year, held at the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, was the best attended Sunday school convention we have ever had. Program type conferences were held for every department and more than 100 persons participated in the program.

Our 1954 Sunday School Convention will be held at the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, on March 11-12.

TRAINING UNION

Eight hundred seventy two churches in our state had Training Union work at the end of 1952. During the year 37 new Training Unions were organized. Our Training Union enrollment was 91,361 at the end of 1952, a gain of 6,459 over the previous year. You will observe that from a percentage standpoint our Training Union gains were much larger during the previous twelve months than were our Sunday school gains.

We are very happy to report that we are now enjoying unusual Training Union growth in most of our churches. Our enrollment goal for 1954 is a net gain of 15,000. Our Training Union slogan for the new year in Oklahoma is "Sunday Night for Christ."

We are now planning the largest Training Union promotional program that the Department of Religious Education has ever sponsored. During 1954 we will have four district Training Union conventions on the following dates: March 29, Enid; March 30, Lawton; April 1, Muskogee; April 2, Ada. Then on Thursday and Friday, November 25-26, 1954, we will have a State Training Union Convention at the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City.

Our State-Wide Training Union Youth Rally will be held at Oklahoma Baptist University on Saturday, May 15.

Thirty-four thousand, four hundred thirty-two Training Union awards were issued to Oklahoma Training Union members during the past year. This record does not include awards earned during the recent Stewardship Revivals.

"M" NIGHT

Thirty-two of our associations observed "M" Night last year. We had a total attendance of 13,270, with 523 churches represented in the meetings.

The annual "M" (Mobilization) Night meetings have made a tremendous contribution to the promotion of our Training Union work. The "M" Night meeting this year wil be held on the evening of December 7.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY

The Department of Religious Education sponsored 70 classes during the Falls Creek Assembly and more than 7,000 awards were earned. In addition to the general books on the Christian life, stewardship, missions, doctrine, evangelism, the Bible, etc., the Department of Religious Education built a faculty for the purpose of teaching all the department method books, both in Sunday school and Training Union.

STEWARDSHIP WEEK

Stewardship Week, October 18-23, was promoted by every agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. This report is being written the week previous to Stewardship Week, but from the number of books which have been sold, we know now that this week will be the all-time high in any type of training program which has ever been observed in our state. The awards earned in this study of stewardship are not reported because our awards reports close on September 30 each year.

A LOOK INTO THE FUTURE

The factual report which has just been made does not include a report of awards for the "Pull of the People." Those awards will be included in our 1954 report. We are happy to say, however, that Preparation Week, September 21-25, was extremely successful. More people were studying Sunday school work at the same time than ever before in any one week.

Let us remember that November, 1953, and April, 1954, have been set aside as "Half Million" months. It is expedient that all our churches put on a visitation crusade commensurate with the great task we have undertaken in enlisting "A Million More in '54."

There are still approximately 300 churches in our state which have not had a Vacation Bible School. We are exceedingly anxious that the day will soon come when every Baptist church in Oklahoma, without a single exception, will give youth in their community the opportunity of this Bible study program.

There are 290 churches in Oklahoma which do not have Training Union work. We are tremendously concerned that during 1954 at least 100 of these churches begin a Training Union program.

To the promotion of this task, we in the Department of Religious Education dedicate our lives and talents.

Radio and Television

The Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention had its beginning with the appointment of a radio committee in 1938. The Radio Committee was changed to the Radio Commission in 1946, when the Convention placed the work in the Cooperative Program.

The radio ministry of Southern Baptists, which began with much opposition and has now grown to an institution of power and influence, is largely due to the vision and determination of Dr. S. F. Lowe, who for 18 years guided the Radio and Television Immission. Southern Baptists were shocked and saddened by the home-going of Dr. Lowe on October 4, 1952. Mr. Dupree Irrdan served most efficiently as interim director, until October 1953, when Rev. Paul M. Stevens, one of our outstanding Oklahima pastors, assumed the duties of directing this gigantic task of giving the gospel to all men by means of radio.

At the present time the Baptist Hour, radio program of Southern Baptists, is being carried by 350 stations all over this muntry and in seven foreign countries. There is a potential Estening audience of 5,000,000 people each week. In Oklahoma, II stations are now carrying the program: KADA, Ada; KWHW, Altus; KWON, Bartlesville; KBEL, Idabel; KNED, McAlester; EMUS-FM, Muskogee; KVLH, Pauls Valley; KWSH, Seminole; EMUS-FM, Shawnee; KRMG, Tulsa; and KSIM, Woodward. All of these broadcasts are on Sunday, most of them during the after-EDOD.

The television field was entered in 1952 when the Commission produced two 15-minute television films. These were shown across the nation. The response was such that three series of films have are being produced and shown. One series deals with the lime, another with Bible stories, and the third with worship. In addition to producing the Baptist Hour, Good News Hour, Chapel Upstairs, and other transcribed programs the commission began in October 1, 1953, a cooperative effort with Methodists and Presbyterians, a program known as The Vesper Hour.

We are thoroughly convinced that anyone who is willing to look at results and see what is accomplished through the work of the Radio Commission, will be anxious to invest money in gospel broadcasting.

Social Service

The Social Service Committee, in making its report, will follow the outline suggested by the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. The report falls naturally into eight separate parts:

I Family and Home.

"As the home goes, so goes the nation." America is great today because it has had great Christian homes. The home has survived a spite of its many enemies. Perhaps the greatest test of the home will come in this generation.

Each year more subtle attempts are made on the family and home. Easy divorces have encouraged quick break-ups of our families, the advertisements in the daily papers, magazines, radio and television offer to the American family the ways and means to become "cough proof" smokers, "moderate" drunkards, speed conscious, semi-sober pleasure lovers, and above all, "Men and Women of Distinction." These baser things plus the growing lack of character and sanctity among the non-Christians make it difficult to have a Christian family and home. These social and spiritual parasites cannot overcome the influence of a good Christian home, a home where children are taught and trained by consecrated parents. We suggest each family renew its vow to God, to the church, the Bible and the Sabbath Day. We will save our homes, not by "negative preachments," but by positive teaching and preaching of the Great Commission.

II. Juvenile Delinquency.

This growing menace is due to "adult delinquency." "Like father, like son" is true, and we are reaping what we have sown.

"A child left to himself bringeth his mother to shame."—Proverbs 29:15

The modern mother who works should ponder these words. If the child is left with a baby-sitter or a nursery worker she should know of the helper's character.

Parents have real responsibility in teaching their children the facts of life. The time to prevent addiction to drugs, alcohol, nar-cotics, gambling, and bad social habits is before they are formed.

To combat juvenile delinquency we have a Christian home, the public school, and the church with its agencies to enlist and teach the proper things. If Southern Baptists would enroll a million more boys and girls in Sunday School in 1954 juvenile delinquency would drop over our Southland. To reach the delinquent we must reach his heart through teaching and the work of regeneration. This alone will give permanent results.

III. Salacious Literature.

Someone has said that the Kinsey report on American Women had to wait until American morals got low enough to allow such a thing to be published.

A fleeting glance at a news stand is enough to convince one that the American public will rebel at nothing. Surely Christians should let publishers, readers and sellers know that filthy literature is not appreciated by everyone.

We need to make ourselves heard calling for biblical moral standards.

IV. Gambling.

This writer is not in a position to know what can be done about gambling at race tracks, ball games and other such big time gambling. However, at the beginner gambling level it is possible to be heard and felt in protest to the teaching of gambling in our public schools.

We must make every possible protest against cake walks, bingo, chance selling, and other "good Cause" gambling carried on by schools, clubs, veterans' organizations and some churches.

Something is wrong with our thinking when we let our children play "Bingo" for prizes at the school carnival so the PTA can buy a picture of George Washington to silently say to that same child from the school wall, "Don't Gamble."

. Alcohol.

One of the greatest threats to moral decency in our day is Elohol. It is a monster like unto the uncircumcised Goliath coming to of the Philistines to defy the army of God. Alcohol is Emerica's modern Goliath. David took time out to deal with this giant. So should we.

As Goliath was the product of Israel's neglect, so the alcohol stant is the product of our neglect. This giant is becoming more toyious when we are reminded that about 65,000,000 Americans trink at least occasionally. Authorities estimate that this "giant" has produced 7,000,000 alcoholics (weaklings) in the last ten years. It is conservatively estimated that alcohol is responsible for 33% to 50% of the traffic deaths.

May we not trust this cause to legal measures and regulations some, but educate from the cradle to the grave the insidious evils of the alcohol traffic.

The total expenditures for advertising of those engaged in the manufacturing of alcoholic beverages as reported by the National Temperance and Prohibition Council amounts to \$165,000,000 annually. This figure does not include advertising of wholesalers and retailers. Much of this advertising is done around the Thanksgiving-Christmas Season. As Christians, we must be militant against alcoholand by personal vote destroy this evil in our midst. We heartily recommend the support of the United Drys as one of the means of alcohol's destruction in Oklahoma.

VI. Progress in Race Relations.

The anti-Christian attitude of Hitler toward the Jews and the condition of Germany today should serve as solemn reminder to be even more thoroughly Christian in our attitude toward other races. We should see the races of men through the eyes of Jesus, whether black, brown, yellow or white.

Some eleven million Negroes live in our midst in the South and afford us our greatest opportunity to demonstrate the truly Christian attitude. Almost a third of the Negro population has embraced the Baptist faith.

Progress toward better race relations is not to be accomplished by wishful thinking. However, it is gratifying to know that there has been a general decline in the number of lynchings in the last few years.

There is not a greater force for improving racism than the people of God who know the intrinsic value of human life. Therefore, we should search more diligently than ever to find the Christian word to say and the Christian way to act.

VII. Industrial Relations.

In recent years the south has developed rapidly as a growing industrial empire. This development brings with it attendant problems too critical to be ignored and too complex to be treated lightly. Jesus Christ is interested in every movement and force that affects

the life of man. As His followers we must recognize Christian responsibility for honesty and justice in the production and distribution of goods. Christian standards must be recognized and applied to every economic situation. It is not our business as believers to take sides either with management or with labor, but to proclaim and put into practice the ideals of our Saviour.

We recognize the right of the leaders of management to organize their capital and the right of wage earners to organize their labor. We maintain, however, that such organization on the part of both should be for the mutual well-being of each and not for the

advantage of one over the other.

Let us discover more effective ways of expressing the Christian spirit of respect for persons in the midst of the impersonal relationships which characterize so much of modern industry. Let us challenge the monetary standard as the sole criterion of success and work for the introduction of higher motives than financial profit into economic enterprise. A great challenge faces us and we can only meet it by providing leadership nurtured in the ethical attitudes which are motivated when life is in full surrender to Jesus Christ. VIII National and World Peace.

Few in our day are foolish enough to believe that the end of hostilities in Korea marks the beginning of peace in any sense of the word. There are many parts of our world where trouble brews and unrest is apparent. One or more of these may erupt at any time. Ours is still a military age filled with its attendant evils: unrest, suspicion, frantic armament races, increased indebtedness, and the ominous shadow of another world holocaust, which, should it come, could well destroy civilization. Powerful forces have pushed mankind to the brink of an awful abyss. The first and urgent task is to check these forces.

In the light of the desperation of our day it becomes every Christian to earnestly seek national and world peace. Let us be steadfast in prayer for all peoples of the world that they may learn the things that make for peace; for our own nation and our government, that they may become willing to serve the purpose of God.

Let us redouble our efforts to reconcile men with God. This is our basic task. The peace of God is the only peace which will endure.

Let us refuse to tolerate fatalism about war. Let us combat hysteria and blind hatred. Hitlerism was built upon the myth of racial supremacy and the rabid hatred of a minority people. We must avert such a spirit in America.

Let each individual use his voice and his vote in behalf of constructive measures by our government to increase the margin of safety from war.

S2. The report of the American Bible Society was read by the recording secretary and the report and the accompanying resolution were, upon motion, adopted.

American Bible Society Report

The world must have the Bible. It is the one primary source is knowledge of Christ. Travel to Africa and see a group of people central Congo, gathered about a missionary reading from the Bible in their own Luba-Lulua language. Listen to a small boy say to him, "May I have that book? Those words made holes in my heart! I want to read it to the people of my own village far off in the forest." That boy expressed a missionary principle true in all lands: Every person must have the Bible in his own native language if the word of God is to speak to his heart.

The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. He uses it in every form of mission work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave and keep on working in a man's heart.

Giving the Bible to the people of the world in their languages is a missionary task. Someone must translate it, publish it, send it to the people wherever they may live and make it available at a price they can afford to pay (far below cost in most countries) or without charge in cases of special need.

The American Bible Society serves as that "someone." It aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for mission work around the world. For the blind, it supplies Scriptures in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in their worldwide mission work. The Society serves every form of missions at home and abroad.

During 1952 the American Bible Society—

—distributed throughout the world more than 13 million volumes of Scriptures.

—helped the Japan Bible Society to distribute some 3 million Scripture volumes, making a total of more than 13 million volumes distributed in Japan since V-J Day.

—aided the Korean Bible Society in supplying Scriptures for civilians, South Korean and other UN forces, and North Koreans and Chinese in prisoner-of-war camps.

—provided 904,753 Scripture volumes for our own Armed Forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to almost 11 million volumes.

—received gifts which made possible its largest budget—and adopted for 1953 an even greater program to meet expanding needs for Scriptures around the world.

—but faced other requests for urgent needs on many fields, especially Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, India, Burma and Brazil, again emphasizing the fact that missionary advance, through increased Scripture distribution, waits only for needed funds!

Southern Baptists can lead in providing enough Bibles for world needs now!

In 1952 Southern Baptist churches gave \$102,872 to the American

Bible Society. Gifts from churches of all denominations totaled \$750,147. Southern Baptist gifts stood in second place, exceeded only by Methodist gifts of \$125.552.

The help of every Southern Baptist church is needed. Every church can give at least these amounts each year: Country and village churches, \$10 to \$25. Churches in small cities, \$25 to \$100. Larger churches, \$100 to \$200. Great city churches, \$200 to \$500 or more. Please send the gifts from your church to your Baptist state headquarters office, marked "for the American Bible Society."

WHEREAS, this Convention recognizes that widespread distribution of the printed Word of God is a basic necessity in the missionary task to which we are committed, and

WHEREAS, we recognize that the American Bible Society renders an essential worldwide missionary service through translating and publishing the Scriptures without note or comment and through distributing them without profit and usually below cost, and

WHEREAS, the American Bible Society, in addition to serving the regular needs of mission work throughout the world, is supplying millions of Scripture volumes each year in Japan, Korea, West Germany and other lands where special needs and opportunities are now so great,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,

First, that we carnestly request our churches and our people to make contributions to the work of the Society, all such contributions to be sent through the regular channels to the Baptist state headquarters office, marked "for the American Bible Society," and

Second, that we approve an offering in the churches for the work of the American Bible Society, as in previous years, to be taken on the fourth Sunday in January (January 31, 1954) as provided by the Board of Directors in the calendar of Activities for 1954 and to be promoted by our Convention as a part of our mission program.

Report of the President

To the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University and to the Baptist General Convention in session at Tulsa, Nov. 12, 1953. The Student Body

Enrolment statistics are only a quantitive measure of a school's growth. The current semester's registration of 1,074 resident students is the largest since 1949, and it is believed the intellectual, religious and social program for these students is the fullest ever offered in Oklahoma Baptist University.

Oklahoma Baptist University continues as a fully accredited member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Through its membership on the National Commission on Accrediting, OBU is doing its part to secure institution-wide standards for all academic and non-academic departments.

The enrolment summary is as follows:

Total resident enrolment—1,074, an increase of 99, or 10.1 per cent over the first semester of 1952-53.

Men enrolled—616, an increase of 34, or 5.8 per cent; and women's enrolment—458, an increase of 65 or 14 per cent.

Fine Arts enrolment—106, an increase of nine, or 9.7 per cent. Oklahomans enrolled—884, from 70 of the 77 counties. Pottawatomie County enrolment—314, an increase of 101, or 47.4 per cent. Extension enrolment—118, an increase of 100 per cent. This total is not included in the resident enrolment. (Only Oklahoma City and Tulsa classes are now organized for extension work.)

Grand total enrolment—1,192, an increase of 161, or 13.1 per cent.

Twenty-six states and the District of Columbia are represented among the 190 non-Oklahomans. The leading contributors are Missouri—38; Texas—21; Arkansas—20; California—19; and Kansas—18. The overseas students include eight from Hong Kong; eight from Hawaii; one each from British Guiana, Formosa and Saudi Arabia. Faculty

Thirteen new faculty members have joined our staff this term, two doctorates of philosophy among them. In all areas of faculty training and status, we may rightfully claim continued improvement.

The graduate schools from which the new teachers have been drawn are a catalogue of American universities. The list reflects the breadth and scope of their geographic backgrounds, which are no less varied than their intellectual interests: Columbia University, University of Virginia, University of Havana, Union Theological Seminary, Juilliard School of Music, American Conservatory, Western Reserve University, University of Oklahoma, Washington and Lee University, University of North Carolina, Baylor University, Southern Seminary, Southwestern Seminary, Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical College, Institute Tecnologico de Monterrey, Texas Christian University, University of Chicago, and University of Texas.

Financial Report

A summary of the report of the treasurer and comptroller shows the University with assets of \$4,553,398.56, of which \$3,951,-

992.96 is in physical plant facilities. The annual income was \$919,-687.65, more than one-half of which was from the auxiliaries, food and housing. The subsidy from the convention for the operating budget was \$100,000.

Academic expenses for the year were \$353,619.16, of which the largest outlay was for instruction: \$196,582.44. The library received \$17,282.46; student aid in scholarships of every description amounted to \$120,699.41.

Religious Activities

Intertwined with the churches of this convention are the religious programs of OBU campus. A new all-time record enrolment of ministerial students is the current semester's registration figures with 287 ministerial students enrolled. To qualify for beneficiary tuition the ministerial student must present evidence from a cooperating Baptist church that he has been licensed or ordained.

In addition, 112 definite commitments to full-time Christian service are to be found within the membership of the Life Service Band: 49 missionaries, two medical missionaries, 25 ministers of music, 28 church secretaries and church administrators, eight ministers of education, and two religious journalists.

Seventy-two ministerial students were enrolled in the summer session. The weekly reports submitted to the campus Ministerial Alliance by these young men reveal in a graphic way the interdependence of the churches and their University.

Capital Improvements and Building Projects

The most heartening evidence of physical growth is now rising on the east side of the oval. Groundbreaking for Thurmond Hall took place on Founders' Day, Feb. 17, and construction of this largest academic unit began in April. Equipped, it will cost approximately \$550,000. This building is to house the departments of biology, home economics, and physical sciences, in addition to all administrative offices.

In addition to Thurmond Hall, the following building projects are in the planning stage:

Completion of the second and third floors of Ford Music Hall.

Modernization and expansion of Montgomery Hall to become a student center to match the splendid recreational facilities erected by the convention on the campuses at Norman and Stillwater.

A dormitory for women underwritten with an initial gift of \$250,000 from Senator Robert S. Kerr.

A great chapel at the center of the University including quarters for faculty studios and a recital hall, a church music library, instrumental rehearsal rooms, and listening rooms.

Renovation and rehabilitation of Shawnee Hall, the original classroom building now in its fortieth year of uninterrupted operation.

Reconversion of the present University Auditorium to a woman's symnasium.

Conversion of the present administrative offices to facilities for the department of business.

If we are to meet the needs of 1,500 students by 1956 or 2,000 students by 1960, the building program herein outlined is the minimum requirement. For all these capital needs, the agency of the Baptist Foundation under Dr. Auguie Henry has proved to be a great blessing. The management of the gifts now coming to OBU and all our institutions has earned the respect and confidence of every Baptist so that increasing numbers have entrusted their estates to the Foundation.

Endowment

It is a source of deep satisfaction to the University faculty and gratification to all who hold the University's interest close to their hearts that this convention has undertaken a regular plan of endowment building as part of the Program of Progress. Thanks to the Thurmond estate and to other gifts and bequests, the endowment now stands at approximately \$240,000.

Thus we have already come a long way toward realizing the million dollar endowment adopted as one of the immediate goals of the Program of Progress. We are reminded once again of the forword looking leadership of our convention under Dr. Lackey and Brother Grindstaff. Their planning has been a boon to all our institutions.

Events of the Year

Significant events of 1952-53 have included:

The awarding of 165 church scholarships by 104 congregations.

The distribution of 40 performance scholarships at the "June Jamboree," the remarkable talent week brought a record 224 high school juniors and seniors to the campus.

Affiliation with the American University for the "Washington Semester," a plan which permits an OBU student of the social sciences to spend one semester actively participating in the work of the federal offices in the nation's capitol.

The activation of a United Nations club—19 overseas students of rare promise who will return to their homelands in a better position to interpret American institutions and Christian purpose. These young men and women represent the leadership of their countries. To help one of them is to seize a mission opportunity that could not be duplicated in many years of missionary effort by an outsider.

If the past is prologue to the future, and I believe it is, then OBU faces great growth and increasing usefulness.

COMMENTS

The Baptist General Convention of the State of ORGANIZATION Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided for by the various contributors. It was incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma without authorized capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed on or about May 1917, for a term of twenty years, and its amended Articles of Incorporation were placed on record March 6, 1928, as an organization in perpetuity.

Since November 1, 1935, the convention has had direct supervision of The Baptist Orphans' Home, and its assets, liabilities, income and expenses are treated as a separate fund, both on the convention books and in this report. The Home is located in the environs of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oklahoma as a charitable institution without authorized capital. It was organized in March 1904, for the purpose of providing protection and care for needy orphans.

On October 28, 1946, the convention created a separate corporation, namely, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahma, for the stated purpose of building, undergirding, and stabilizing the agencies and institutions owned and operated by the convention. Subsequent thereto transfer of custody of certain investments for trust and endowment funds was made by the convention to the foundation. The accounting for such specified funds has been handled by the foundation as a separate entity, since its inception.

The operations of the executive office of the convention are divided into the major classifications described below:

COLLECTING AND ACCOUNTING—Receiving contributions for the cooperative program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention, the various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and other designated donees.

STATE MISSIONS—Subdivided into rural and city missions, promotional and general, miscellaneous, and administrative activities of all departments of the convention.

THE BAPTIST ORPHANS' HOME—Embracing all transactions pertaining to solicitation of monies and supplies, operation of the

children's home, care and training of the boys and girls placed under its protection, and maintenance of the orphanage properties.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLY—Covering vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma, and the maintenance of assembly properties.

BAPTIST MESSENGER—Maintenance and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger".

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND BAPTIST TRAINING UNION—Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in churches of the state.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION AND SACRED MUSIC—Coordinating Baptist work in the student union centers at the various state educational institutions, and fostering better music in the churches.

BOYS' RANCH TOWN—Operation of the Boys' Ranch Town as a home for underprivileged and delinquent boys, construction of buildings, and maintenance of ranch properties.

MINISTERS', EMPLOYES', AND WIDOWS' RETIREMENT, RELIEF, AND ANNUITY PLANS—For collecting and transmitting dues from the ministers, missionaries, churches, and organizations, throughout Oklahoma, participating in the pension plan adopted by the Southern Baptist General Convention.

BUILDING PROGRAM—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

COMMENTS

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock, with its principal place of business at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It was created by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and its Articles of Incorporation and by-laws were approved by the body in convention assembled at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 28, 1946. Its stated purpose was to build, undergird, and stabilize the agencies and institutions owned and operated by the conventions.

The purpose for which the corporation was formed is that of a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest, and otherwise dispose of all real, personal, or mixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated-for the church and other religious and charitable purposes—necessary for its membership-worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and, both home and foreign missionary work; to borrow money; hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to procure funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, dispense and invest funds according to designations made and as set out in the charter.

Accordingly on April 7, 1947, transfer of custody was made from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma of certain investments and their corresponding trust and endowment funds totaling \$76,776.29.

Cash and other contributions during the year 1953 are summarized in Exhibit C-"Statement of General Fund", and the cash transactions are further detailed in Exhibits D, E, and F, and in Schedule 1.

COMMENTS

The Baptist University of Oklahoma was created ORGANIZATION by action of the Baptist General Convention while in session at Chickasha, Oklahoma during November 10 to 13, 1909, to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a board of trustees elected by that body. On February 9, 1910, Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a per-

petual corporation formed without capital stock for the purpose of providing opportunities for all departments of higher education and connected preparatory schooling to persons of both sexes on equal terms, the location being at Shawnee, Oklahoma. In an Amended Certificate of Incorporation filed July 6, 1921 the name of the institution was changed to Oklahoma Baptist University.

The school, opened in September, 1911, held in city and church buildings, was closed from 1912 to 1914, and re-opened in September, 1915 in its own structure, the nucleus of a group of buildings now located on the campus.

Amounts arising from contributions on account of any employe may be refunded to the university upon the death of the employe before participation or upon the employe's withdrawal and "demand".

The university is liable upon the completion of construction of Thurmond Hall, now in progress, for approximately \$450,000.00.

Certain officers of the university and a faculty member are defendants in a suit for damages in the amount of \$50,000.00 now pending in the District Court of Pottawatomie County, Oklahoma as case number 22618.
