Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 50 members, provided that no church shall have over 10 messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the executive secretary-treasurer, shall be elected annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving a majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This board shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the convention and forty-eight (48) other members who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors shall be the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary-treasurer to serve, until such time as the convention meets. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

Section 4. This board shall elect all department heads, including the editor of the *Baptist Messenger* and the assistant executive secretary. The executive secretary-treasurer, in consultation with the committees of the Board of Directors which are involved, shall select the workers in the executive division, with the exception of office or similar personnel. The department heads, in counsel with the executive secretary-treasurer and the committees of the Board of Directors which are responsible for their work, shall select their workers, other than office or similar personnel. The executive secretary-treasurer and each department head shall select his office or similar personnel. Those responsible for electing or selecting workers shall fix their salaries.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS**ARTICLE I**

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be fifty (50) including the president and the recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors, shall be the Exec-

utive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semiannual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be: A president of the Board of Directors, elected by the convention; a recording secretary, elected by the convention; an executive secretary-treasurer, elected by the convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The president of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to ap-

point a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The executive secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The executive secretary-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The bylaws shall be adopted by the general convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the bylaws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

Section 2. Election of officers shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the convention or the

Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the general convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the general convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Charter and Bylaws

CHARTER AND BYLAWS OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation Feb. 9, 1910, amended Jan. 26, 1956.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is Paul K. Nance, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are: to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with said preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of

the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provide for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

The qualifications of said Board of Trustees and of the presidents of said institution and of all departments thereof shall be as follows: That each member of said Board of Trustees shall be a member of a Baptist Church within the state; that the presidents of said institution and each of its departments shall be members of Baptist churches."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election

of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semiannual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semiannual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semiannual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Bap-

tist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 12. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semiannual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 13. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 14. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 15. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION AND BYLAWS OF THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, until Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section #12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma, and of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of the said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work.

ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist church affiliated with the Bap-

ARTICLE I**Membership**

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

NAME**RESIDENCE**

who were recommended by the Board of Directors of the Convention to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and ratified and approved by said Convention. Such membership to continue until their successors are elected; and all shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of accredited Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II**Annual Meeting of the Directors**

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting at a designated place at the call of the President of the Foundation a short time prior to the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the annual report and recommendation of the Directors shall be presented to and acted upon by the Convention at its regular meeting.

ARTICLE III**Officers**

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, one or more vice-presidents, an executive secretary, who shall also be the secretary and the treasurer of the corporation. Such elective officers, with the exception of the executive secretary, shall be chosen at a meeting of the Board of said corporation, to be held at the Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the Board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only. The executive secretary shall be elected by the Board of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected.

In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lessor officers as it deems necessary, or desirable, such as administrative assistants, assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

Section 1—President:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2—Vice-Presidents:

It shall be the duty of each of the vice-presidents to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3—Executive Secretary:

The executive secretary shall be the official administrator of all of the work of the Board of Directors and shall make full report of all matters committed to the Board of Directors.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of secretary; shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors and then shall perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

The executive secretary shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The executive secretary shall file with the Board of Directors of

the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expense of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 4—Directors:

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

ARTICLE V

Method of Election and Terms of Office

Section 1—Directors:

The directors for the first year shall be those designated in the charter and as may be approved at the Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, when the charter and these bylaws are submitted for the approval of the board.

The directors shall serve for a term of four (4) years, beginning with the 15th day of November, 1946, and the first sixteen (16) directors shall serve as follows:

for a term of four (4) years;

shall serve for a term of three (3) years;

shall serve for a term of two (2) years;

shall serve for a term of one (1) year.

Each year thereafter the board of directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma the four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years.

Section 2—Other Officers:

The directors shall select from among their own number a president, and one or more vice presidents, each of whom shall hold office for one year.

Section 3—Vacancies:

Vacancies on the board of directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If the Baptist General Convention shall fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

ARTICLE VI
Board of Directors

Section 1—Regular Meeting:

The board of directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings:

Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the board of directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committee:

The board of directors may, at their first meeting, or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum:

A quorum of the board of directors shall consist of at least five (5) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority:

The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral

deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice-president of the board of directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

ARTICLE VII

Distributees

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VIII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of _____, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA."

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, nor shall any such amendment become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

4. Roy Clayton, chairman of the Committee on Credentials, brought the following recommendation:

Your Committee on Credentials recommends that the 602 messengers from churches co-operating with, and contributing to the work of the convention under terms of Article II of the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, who have already registered at 7 p.m., and other qualified messengers from the churches which shall register, be seated for deliberations and constitute the business body of this annual session of the convention.

5. Anson Justice, chairman, presented the report of the Program Committee and made a motion as follows:

Your program committee comes with the motion that the program, printed on pages 5-7 in the **Book of Reports**, with any needed adjustments, constitute the order of business of the 58th annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Hugo T. Lindquist made the motion that the program be amended to provide a 15-minute period for miscellaneous business at the Wednesday afternoon session, the time to be worked out by the program committee and to be announced at the Wednesday morning session.

Anson Justice, chairman, accepted this motion as a part of the program and a motion to adopt the report as amended carried.

6. E. F. Hallock, for 40 years pastor of First Church, Norman, brought the first of his devotional messages. His subject was "Christ Jesus . . . in the form of God," taken from Philippians 2:6.

7. Marion Beene, Oklahoma City, presented the report on Home Missions and motion carried for its adoption.

Home Missions

Southern Baptist mission forces reported approximately 5,000 missions and churches started in 1962. The goal is 30,000 missions and churches by 1964. C. C. Warren, director of the movement, reports a total of 19,117 units started since 1956. In 1963 the 30,000 Movement has emphasized missions with language groups and in 1964 with urban areas.

The Home Mission Board has helped meet another critical need. Winter and spring floods wrecked a number of churches in the Southern Appalachian Mountains and the mission agency voted \$5,000 to help restore buildings and furnishings in Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia.

Nearly 850 Cubans had been resettled thru the efforts of South-

ern Baptist churches by May, 1963. Churches in Richmond, Atlanta and other cities have responded to needs thru Spanish classes, departments and missions that these Latin friends might have the gospel.

A total of 738 Southern Baptist ministers are now serving as chaplains in the military, hospitals, industry and institutions. Added to the staff during 1962 were Cecil D. Etheredge, secretary of institutional and industrial chaplaincy, and Willis A. Brown, secretary of military personnel ministries.

The Home Mission Board enlarged its ministry of survey and special studies with the employment of William A. Powell of Chicago and Orrin D. Morris of Jackson, Miss. as assistants to Leonard G. Irwin, department secretary.

More than 2,100 missionaries now serve with the Home Mission Board. Most of these missionaries serve under 26 state agreements between the mission agency and the state conventions. These missionaries reported 48,700 professions of faith last year.

The migrant missions ministry of the Home Mission Board changed its emphasis to a church-centered approach. Missionaries to the migrants have sold their trailers and established permanent residence from which they will serve limited areas. Instead of ministering to the migrants on a direct basis, the missionaries now serve as advisors to associations and churches who will minister to migrants coming into given church fields.

The Division of Evangelism, which led Southern Baptists to baptize 381,510 during the year, is leading the convention toward the climactic year of the Baptist Jubilee Advance under the theme "Spiritual Conquest, Now!"

During 1962 the mission agency appointed 414 missionaries. Glendon McCullough, personnel secretary, says there has been a significant increase in interest and applications by qualified couples and single young women. There continues to be, however, an urgent need for missionaries to Spanish, Italian, Polish, Yugoslavian and good will center missions.

Home Missions magazine joined **The Commission** in making a special offer for 1963. Both magazines are being sold for two years for \$3.

According to Courts Redford, executive secretary, major changes in methods of informing Southern Baptists about home missions were made by the Education and Promotion Division. One change was the new mission study supplement, incorporating the best of tracts and giving full-page pictures for teachers of the graded series.

The Home Mission Board continues to play a significant role in meeting the changing and challenging needs of our America.

8. Dale Geis, Cordell, presented the report on Foreign Missions and motion carried for adoption.

Anson Justice, Oklahoma's member of the Foreign Mission Board, brought greetings from the Foreign Mission Board.

Foreign Missions

The program of foreign missions is defined in the Great Commission. Missionaries must be sent into all the world bearing the gospel of redemption to all people. We rejoice because this commission is being carried out today through preaching, teaching and healing by a mighty force of dedicated men and women. In the early 1950's Southern Baptists talked about doubling our missionary forces. In 1953 we had 908 missionaries serving in 34 nations of the world. By the end of 1963, more than 1,800 missionaries will be under appointment of the Foreign Mission Board. The July Commission announced that as of June 1, 1963, the number of missionaries in service had reached a total of 1,792. This includes 22 missionary associates. Southern Baptists now have missionaries under appointment to 53 political entities.

Advance in foreign missions is dependent upon the deepening of our spiritual lives. There must be an encounter with Christ which compels us to a commitment of heart and soul. We must be "there" sharing the gospel of redemption, embracing the world in Christian love. It is Christ's intention and command that the world be filled with the knowledge of God as the waters cover the sea.

World evangelization—the ultimate goal: Mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions on each mission field; churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants and good-will centers. But all are interactive and the goal of each is evangelization. National pastors number 2,701. Most of the churches have Sunday schools. In 1962 the 3,783 churches and 6,850 chapels reported 433,379 enrolled in Sunday school, with 35,509 baptisms and 487,943 church members.

Medical work—unlimited opportunity for soul winning: The primary aim of missionary medicine is the healing of the whole man; both spiritually through a personal knowledge of Jesus Christ and physically through the best possible practice of medicine.

Medical mission institutions include 18 hospitals and 46 clinics and dispensaries with a total of 1,156 beds. There are 55 missionary and 82 national physicians plus 56 missionary and 207 national nurses. During 1962 plans moved ahead for beginning medical work on Sumatra, and in Indonesia. A mobile medical unit was set up in Uganda; and the Thailand government granted licenses to our first medical missionaries there.

Baker James Cauthen said, "Statistical figures can never tell the story of missionary labor; they can only give a rough idea of some of the visible evidences which have come about. They can never tell the story of deep dedication, patience, forbearance and long suffer-

ing which characterize God's servants as they meet the realities of mission ministries in many lands."

"We face the future grateful for the growing concern among Southern Baptists for a larger world outreach. God is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think. He could light the fuses of a spiritual revival in many places throughout the world and bring about a vast spiritual awakening that would alter the tragic course that the world is following in our day."

16. E. F. Hallock, Norman, brought the morning devotional message, "Christ Jesus . . . in the Form of a Servant," with the text found in Philippians 2:7.

17. R. C. Miller, representing the Annuity Board in Oklahoma, presented his report. Motion carried for its adoption.

Annuity Board

New Benefit Added to Southern Baptist Protection Plan

The Annuity Board added a new death benefit to the Southern Baptist Protection Plan for all ministers or denominational employees under 40 years of age. In the event of the natural death of the members, the widow or estate will receive a cash settlement equal to the average annual salary on which dues were paid in the Protection Plan. If death is accidental, the widow will receive a check for **twice** the average annual salary. The benefit would pay as much as \$8,000 in case of the accidental death of a member who had paid on an average salary of \$4,000.

No Additional Cost

This added death benefit is provided at no additional dues cost to the member or his church. Everyone under 40 who is already a member of the Protection Plan automatically has this protection if dues payments are kept current. Those who enrol in the plan now or in the future have the added benefit coverage as soon as first month's dues are received, and it continues until they reach 40. This benefit is in addition to the liberal widow, disability and retirement provisions of the plan.

Four Widows Have Received Special Death Benefit

The added benefit was approved in April and made retroactive to Jan. 1, 1963. Since that time four widows, one each from Louisiana, Oklahoma, North Carolina and Georgia, have received the lump sum cash settlement. Mrs. Julia Hunt of Fort Polk, La., whose husband died Jan. 2, was the first to receive a check. She wrote:

"Let me express my appreciation for the special death benefit. . . . I am grateful for a Protection Plan such as Southern Baptists have. . . . The monthly check and the special death benefit check will enable us to have some of the things my husband would have provided for us were he still here." (Mrs. Hunt has two young daughters.)

T. T. Crabtree, Oklahoma City, reported the results of Pennington's trip to Japan last year.

Pennington brought the closing message about the work in his department.

Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors

J. A. Pennington, Secretary

According to the figures taken from the associational letters a total of 599 churches have Brotherhoods. The men enrolled in Brotherhood organizations total 12,235. One of the greatest needs in Brotherhood work is an adequate understanding of the purposes and procedures of a Brotherhood organization. This is accomplished through a training program. Last year 71 associational Brotherhood officers participated in the annual training session. A good number of associations promoted workshops and training sessions for their men.

The attendance at the State Brotherhood Convention was the largest ever with 1,314 registered.

A tremendous mission effort will be launched in 1964 when over 1,500 laymen go to the west coast for the West Coast Laymen's Crusade.

Royal Ambassador Report

The 1963 Royal Ambassador chapter goal has been met with reports showing 1,009 chapters in existence during the year. Our concern is that more churches will realize the need of an active RA program in the interest of boys and a lost world.

The state congress attendance was 2,500, largest ever. For the first time, separate meetings were held for the different age groups, which better met the needs of those attending.

The enlarged RA program continues to meet with good response over the state. The great need at this time is for basic leadership training for committeemen and counselors.

Camp Hudgens Report

Camp Hudgens attendance continues to grow, and improvements continue to be made.

A total of 651 boys and leaders attended camp during the six weeks. Decisions totaling 108 included 29 professions of faith, 28 church-related vocations and 51 rededications.

Presently, a new and adequate caretaker's home is under construction. This is being made possible by individuals living in the Pittsburg Association who gave through a fund-raising drive conducted last spring.

There are continuing needs. Unfortunately, this summer, about 50 boys had to be turned away because there was no room at camp. Additional facilities must be provided. It is hoped that a fund-raising drive among individuals in the south central part of the state in 1964 might provide for boys wanting to come to camp.

Evangelism

J. A. Pennington, Secretary

"Evangelism, in the New Testament sense of the word, is indispensable in Southern Baptist churches. Without it they will dwindle away and die. To a people who avoid catechisms and other similar methods of reaching 'unchurched' people, the choice is between a vital effort in evangelism and ceasing to exist altogether. What is more important, it is the choice between leading persons to him who is 'the way, the truth, and the life,' and of permitting them to go unchallenged into eternity, destined only for being everlastingly lost, which is the 'second death.'" So states H. H. Hobbs in his book **New Testament Evangelism**.

What Is New Testament Evangelism?

C. E. Autrey defines it in these words, "Evangelism is to bear witness to the gospel with soul aflame, and to teach and preach with the express purpose of making disciples of those who hear."

In his book **Basic New Testament Evangelism**, F. D. Whitesell, defines evangelism in these words, "New Testament evangelism is a passion, a proclamation and a program."

In this day of confusion, indifference and materialism we need to lead our churches to be busy in this all important business of New Testament evangelism. We need to do as L. R. Scarborough used to say, "Take your Bible and stay hot on the trail of lost souls."

There is not a problem in any church that cannot be solved with a warmhearted, Spirit-filled program of New Testament evangelism.

An Effective Program of Evangelism

For a program of evangelism to be effective in any church it must be perennial as well as seasonal. We need special efforts in evangelism through our revival meetings, but we also need to be busy week by week in seeking souls for Christ and church membership. Southern Baptists have the most effective methods and techniques to be found. What we need to do is to use them under the leadership of the Holy Spirit to implement this New Testament program of evangelism.

1964 Baptist Jubilee Year

Our Baptist Jubilee Revivals are to be concluded in 1964. Again Southern Baptists are to work together in another conventionwide simultaneous effort in evangelism. The dates are March 8-22 and March 29-April 12. This will be the fifth such effort. In each of the four previous co-operative efforts we have attained a new high in our record of baptisms. We believe that it will be true again in 1964. After 1964 some form of associational simultaneous revivals will be followed. Therefore, we would urge each association to continue to set the dates for such crusades.

Spiritual Conquest — Now!

To make effective this spiritual conquest—now, there are 25 top plans suggested. It is a step by step program for our 1964 Jubilee Revivals. Each step is important. These plans call for two full weeks of evangelistic preaching at the time set by the association. Every church should study carefully each suggested step and seek to tie as many of them as possible into their plans for evangelism in 1964. With full co-operation on the part of all our churches, under the Holy Spirit's leadership, we can win more in 1964.

Statewide Evangelistic Conference

Our evangelistic conference will meet Jan. 27-28-29, 1964 in First Church, Oklahoma City. Our Bible teacher will be Gray Allison of Louisiana. Other out-of-state speakers are Jack Stanton, of the Division of Evangelism of the Home Mission Board, and G. Earl Guinn, president of Louisiana Baptist College.

Associational Evangelism Clinic

The associational evangelism clinic provides an excellent opportunity for teaching methods and plans on evangelism. An effective clinic is the very finest preparation for revival. Twenty-six of our associations scheduled clinics for 1963. There were 385 churches represented with a total attendance of 2,771. We would urge every association to have a clinic in preparation for its 1964 Jubilee Revival.

Revival Is Possible — Now!

Our God is a great God. All things are possible with him. He is still concerned about his churches and the lost multitudes. He can give revival in this day. He waits on his people—when we meet the conditions of II Chronicles 7:14, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and

turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

Duty done, means victory won. Let us yield ourselves anew unto the Lord that we may win victories in his name in 1964.

23. The following resolution from the Brotherhood and Evangelism Committee of the Board of Directors was presented by T. T. Crabtree:

WHEREAS 1964 marks the 150th year of organized Baptist work on the North American continent; and,

WHEREAS we have the sincere desire to demonstrate concern for reaching the lost around us by enthusiastically joining hands with fellow Baptist groups; and,

WHEREAS evangelism is the number one task of each church; and,

WHEREAS God has chosen to bless Baptists greatly through evangelistic efforts; and,

WHEREAS Oklahoma Baptists are what they are today primarily because of a major emphasis on evangelism,

Be it therefore resolved that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma encourage every Baptist church and every member of the churches to participate to the fullest extent in the 1964 Baptist Jubilee

Revival. We suggest that the designated dates for the Baptist Jubilee Revival in Oklahoma have priority in each Oklahoma Baptist church calendar for 1964.

We further recommend that every church plan to conduct at least two revivals during the year with special evangelistic emphasis being given in the regular worship services and that consideration be given to utilizing the Cultivative Commitment Witnessing Plan by each church.

We further recommend that each association in Oklahoma make plans to conduct a Sunday School Witnessing Campaign as soon as possible.

We further recommend that all of us, individually, rededicate ourselves to the task of being good witnesses for Jesus Christ.

24. T. B. Lackey, executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, brought the report of the Board of Directors calling attention to the various committees and important items of special importance.

25. Vote on the report was delayed until Thursday afternoon.

26. Time having arrived for the annual sermon, Jack Carroll, Seminole, read from Hebrews 12:25 through 13:8, and led in prayer for the Holy Spirit's blessings upon the convention.

27. Richard Lin of the Oklahoma Baptist University music faculty sang "Hallelujah."

28. Lowell D. Milburn, Shawnee, brought the annual message to the convention, using as his subject, "The Gospel in a World of Revolution." His theme stressed that the return to New Testament and Bible practices of the centrality of Christ and dedication to him will produce the revolution the world needs.

28. H. W. Stigler, long time Oklahoma pastor, closed this session with prayer.

Wednesday Afternoon November 13, 1963

29. President M. J. Lee called the convention to order at 1:30 p.m.

30. Winifred Walker, Oklahoma City, led in the song service.

31. Prayer was led by Douglas Manning, Tulsa.

32. E. F. Hallock brought the devotional thought on "Christ Jesus . . . Made in the Likeness of Men," using as his Scripture Philippians 2:7.

33. M. F. Ewton, Enid, presented the report of the Christian Life Committee and motion carried to adopt the report.

Christian Life Committee

The primary task of the Christian Life Commission is to help Southern Baptists to carry into every area of life the whole gospel of Jesus Christ. The past year marked a significant acceleration of this

effort through the commission's program of Christian morality development.

The various state organizations have been unified in a manner to give a more meaningful and united Southern Baptist witness in the areas of family life, race relations, the economic order, Christian citizenship and Christian morality as it relates to such matters as drinking, gambling, delinquency and other related matters.

Significant high lights of the past year are as follows:

Under the direction of Foy Valentine, executive secretary-treasurer of the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention:

Messages were brought by staff members to various conventions and assemblies in 19 states.

The commission's written materials prepared last year had a total circulation of approximately 22,196,000.

During the year the commission worked vigorously in the field of anti-communism. At the commission's instigation, the Adult Training Union and the Young Adult Training Union lessons for November were devoted to a study of communism, a study book on the subject was released by the Sunday School Board, a 30-minute film and three 15-minute films on communism were prepared by the Sunday School Board, the commission's Ridgecrest and Glorieta conferences were devoted to the subject of communism, the commission filled orders for its tracts on communism from about 3,100 churches and 1,400 WMUs, and numerous speeches were made to leadership groups on the subject.

The commission has sought to channel its emphasis on applied Christianity in the various denominational media. Typical of this endeavor has been **Home Life** magazine's carrying of reprints of messages by David R. Mace prepared for the 1961 Ridgecrest Christian Life conferences on "Christian Answers to Family Problems." These reprints reached an accumulated audience of 2,527,305.

Thirteen brief messages dealing with Christian social ethics were recorded for use on 270 radio stations where the Radio and Television Commission's program, "MasterControl" now appears. That commission estimates that these brief messages reached an accumulated audience of 118,000,000. Printed copies of the messages have been distributed and 15 state Baptist papers have carried them in series form.

In line with the convention-approved program of specialized service and co-ordination in the area of world peace, the Christian Life Commission for the second time joined American Baptists and National Baptists in sponsoring a Baptist seminar on the United Nations. An observer and an alternate observer at the United Nations sought to interpret to Southern Baptists issues of special concern in the area of world peace and justice.

During the year the Christian Life Commission distributed on request about 200,000 pamphlets in the area of applied Christianity.

Southern Baptists have responded to the Christian Life Commission's work during the past year in a most encouraging manner. There is overwhelming gratitude to God for the "great door and effectual" that has opened wider to the commission during the year as the commission has sought to call Southern Baptists not only to believe but also to behave.

Your committee would strongly recommend:

1. That every pastor, lay-leader and denominational leader seek to keep the people informed regarding current trends of social and moral conditions.

2. That Oklahoma Baptists be challenged to lead the way for all Christians in sane and sober living.

3. That we pray daily for the "goodness of God to cover the earth as the waters cover the sea."

34. H. Truman Maxey, director of our Child Care Department, presented the report on Child Care, and motion carried that it be adopted.

A group of the first, second and third grade children of our Children's Home sang several impressive songs.

Maxey expressed gratitude for the contribution of Oklahoma Baptists for physical and sustaining work in the Child Care program.

Child Care

H. Truman Maxey, Executive Director

The year 1963, marks the 60th anniversary for the Baptist Children's Home and the 10th anniversary for Boys Ranch Town. These two fine institutions have had a total enrolment of 2,490. In the last 12 months 301 children have received direct care. The average monthly enrolment has been 208.

Building Program

With \$47,000 on hand designated for a trades education building at Boys Ranch Town, it is now possible to begin construction. A laundry building is desperately needed at the Children's Home. Two more cottages are needed at the home as well as a recreational building. At the ranch we need an administration building, another cottage and a recreational building. Any of these would make a wonderful memorial for a loved one or a family name.

A slight change in farming activities was made by permission of the child care committee of the Board of Directors. The dairy was sold at auction and the net profit of sale was placed in the Baptist Foundation as the W. L. Brittain Memorial Dairy Fund. The endowment income of this fund will be used to purchase milk in the years to come. Our present farm is now within the city limits. Emphasis will be upon beef cattle. The FFA and 4-H club projects will still be

strongly encouraged. All necessary beef, pork and poultry products will be provided for both institutions.

Financial

It has been a day by day struggle to carry the big load of child care within the budget income since two-thirds of the total amount is supplied by designated offerings. The Thanksgiving Love Offering, Nov. 17, will be the seasonal opportunity of our Baptist churches in Oklahoma to provide the money needed to meet expenses of the child care program. It will take the co-operation of every Baptist and the leadership of every pastor for a successful offering. The theme is "Stand by Me."

35. Augie Henry, executive secretary-treasurer of the Baptist Foundation, presented the report of the Foundation, calling attention to pertinent parts of the report.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Presented by Augie Henry, Executive Secretary-Treasurer

In order to give as nearly as possible an up-to-date report on the Baptist Foundation, and at the same time get the report ready for printing in the convention's **Book of Reports**, we are again using the year, Oct. 1 through Sept. 30. This report is for the year Oct. 1, 1962, through Sept. 30, 1963.

We are grateful that we can say, as statistics will show, that the Foundation has been blessed with another good year. It has been a good year in receipts, in the continued increase of manifested interest in endowment and other permanent trust funds. Also, it has been a good year in the presentation of the Foundation's program to hundreds who were not familiar with this program. Too, the number of various trusts written, and the continued improvement in the administration of trusts, have helped to make this a good year.

Changes in Personnel

The Foundation experienced a great shock and a great sorrow upon the death of its president, Sen. Robert S. Kerr, on Jan. 1. The following resolution, unanimously adopted by the Foundation's Board of Directors on Jan. 22, 1963, expresses the feelings of the Foundation for the loss of this great and good man:

"WHEREAS, in the providence of God, Sen. Robert S. Kerr, the best known Baptist layman of his generation and one of America's

greatest statesmen, was removed from us by death on Jan. 1, 1963, and

"WHEREAS, Senator Kerr, as a director on the Board of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, was one of those who led in the establishment of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and

"WHEREAS, he was one of the first elected directors of the Foundation and faithfully served as a director from the beginning of the Foundation until his death, and

"WHEREAS, he was the first vice-president of the Foundation and served in that position from 1947 until July 18, 1960, and

"WHEREAS, he was elected president of the Foundation on July 18, 1960, as successor to the late Judge W. R. Wallace, in which position he served until his death, and

"WHEREAS, for the past 13 years he made all of his contributions to Baptist institutions and agencies through the Foundation, and who was always willing to give his time and effort in the work of the Foundation as director, vice-president and president,

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

"FIRST, that we express our gratitude to God for this great Baptist layman and for the service that he has rendered to his church, to the Baptist denomination and particularly to the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma;

"SECOND, that we express the deep feeling of our loss in his passing;

"THIRD, that we assure his wife and his children and other loved ones of our prayers and sympathy during these days of bereavement and adjustment, occasioned by his departure; and

"FOURTH, that a copy of this resolution be spread on the minutes of this Board and that copies of same be sent to Mrs. Kerr and to each of the children.

"DONE BY ORDER of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, meeting in a special session in the office of the executive secretary at the Baptist Building, Oklahoma City, on this the 22nd day of January, A.D., 1963."

On Jan. 22, 1963, the directors elected Raymond A. Young, Oklahoma City, to succeed Senator Kerr as president. Young is an outstanding Oklahoma businessman and a deacon in First Church, Oklahoma City. He is best known in business circles as president of the T.G.&Y. store chain. He had served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Foundation since 1947, as chairman of the investment committee since 1955, and vice-president since 1960.

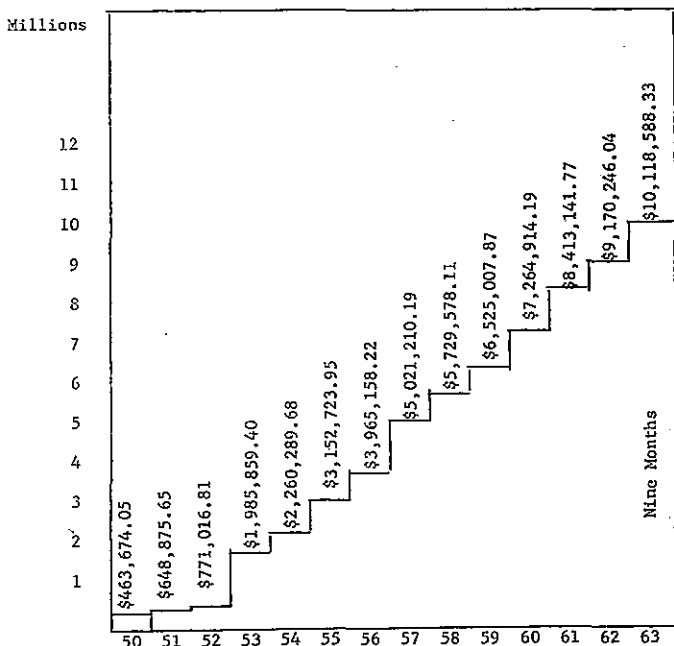
Guy H. James was elected a director to fill the unexpired term of Senator Kerr. James is a deacon in First Church, Oklahoma City and assistant teacher of the Builders Sunday school class for men. He has his own construction firm and is nationally known in business circles, and as an outstanding construction contractor.

The office staff has been strengthened by the coming of experienced personnel in office work. The new personnel are: Mrs. Herb Freyer, Mrs. Ernest Kirby and Mrs. Delbert Marlow. The present full-time personnel in addition to the executive secretary-treasurer are: Tom E. Carter, assistant executive secretary; Wayne A. Merritt, administrative assistant; Earl L. Stark, field secretary; Edna Mae White Bennett, secretary to Augie Henry; and Mrs. Herb Freyer, Mrs. Ernest Kirby and Mrs. Delbert Marlow, office secretaries.

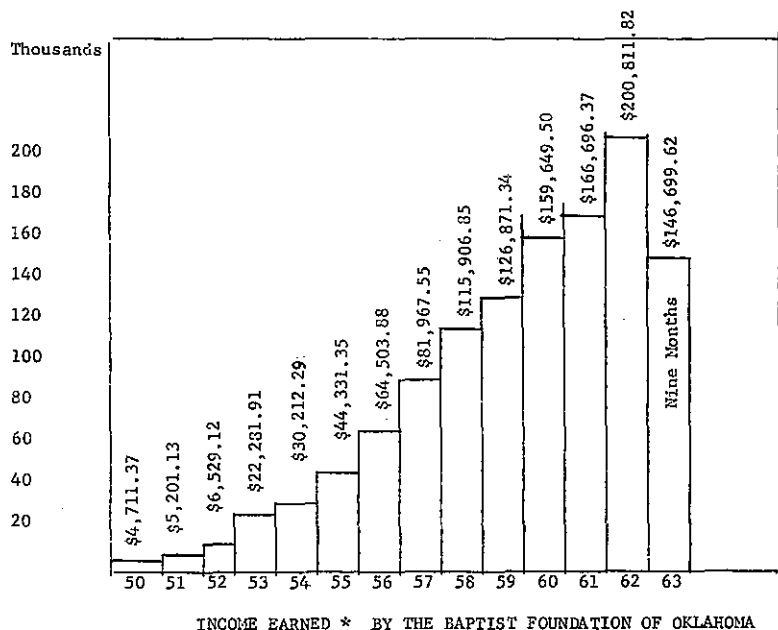
Receipts and Disbursements

Receipts have been \$1,179,944.09. This makes a total in receipts of \$10,118,588.33 since the Foundation was established. Of this amount, a total of \$5,001,863.62 has been disbursed to the convention, to institutions and agencies as endowment income, as building funds and as miscellaneous items. The assets of the Foundation on Sept. 30 were \$5,116,724.71. These figures are based on the value of the gifts and trusts on the dates received. An up-to-date evaluation would greatly increase the amount of assets.

*These amounts include all gross income earned on funds held by the Baptist Foundation for the institutions and agencies. These funds include temporary building funds, endowment funds, scholarship funds, student loan funds, emergency reserve funds and personal trusts.

Trusts and Wills

During the year, 271 trusts and wills have been written, in which the Foundation has been named as trustee for Baptist causes. During this time the number of church placards, indicating the number of churches that have members who have contributed in one way or another to the Foundation, has increased to 357. 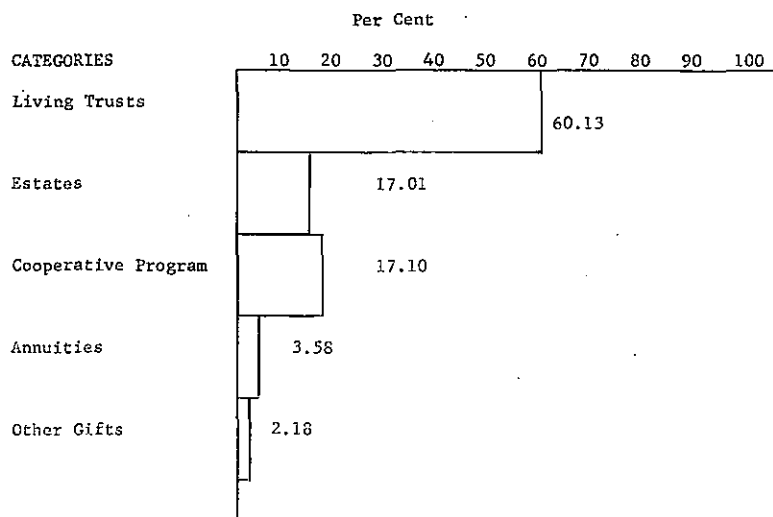

Administration of Trusts

It is one thing to receive trusts for Baptist causes. It is another thing to administer those trusts in order to produce as much income as possible for the causes, consistent with good business practice so as to give adequate security to the trusts.

During the calendar year of 1962, the net income on revenue producing trusts was 4.657 per cent.

Generally speaking, trusts administered by the Foundation are in five divisions:

1. Trusts for agencies and institutions. These trusts include endowment and other long-term items. They also include building and other short-term items.

2. Scholarship trusts for students attending OBU and training schools for nurses, operated by Oklahoma Baptists. In some of these scholarship trusts, the corpus may be disbursed. In others, only the income can be disbursed.

3. Student loan funds for OBU students, for students in Baptist schools of nursing, and for colored students in college.

4. Trusts for individuals, including minors and adults which have been made by donors to the Foundation for Baptist causes. For these individual trusts, the executive secretary, or his successor in office, is named trustee.

5. Executor of estates. Again, the executive secretary, or his successor in office, is named executor. This means that the executive secretary is responsible for the entire estate of a testator during the probate period.

During the past three years there has never been one single hour when there were less than 18 wills in probate, and up to as high as 28 in which bequests were left to the Foundation as trustee for Baptist causes. There are 20 wills in probate at this time. The executive secretary was named as executor for a number of the wills and the percentage of wills in which the executive secretary is named as executor is increasing from year to year.

The administration of trusts naturally includes the investment of funds that are available for investments from time to time. The Foundation has a policy that at least 50 per cent of the investment portfolio must be in commercial investments. The other 50 per cent may be in church loans. During the past year 25 commitments have been made for church loans, for a total of \$898,000. Since 1954, 234 commitments have been made for church loans, for a total of \$4,721,380.

The Foundation has never paid a dollar as a commission for the investment of Foundation funds. All investments are approved by the investment committee which meets monthly, and additionally upon call of the executive secretary. All church loans are approved by the church loan committee, which also meets monthly.

Working Toward 1966

The Foundation's ten-year program, which began Jan. 1, 1957, will close Dec. 31, 1966. One of the objectives of the ten-year program is to have on Dec. 31, 1966, a total of \$10 million as endowment and other permanent trust funds.

On the basis of past achievements, the directors of the Foundation believe that this figure could not only be reached, but that it could be surpassed. It could be realized and surpassed if Oklahoma Baptists would lift the horizon of their vision so they could see the imperative need for endowment funds, and if individuals would give prayerful consideration toward meeting this need by planning to con-

tribute endowment as a part of their contribution program during the next three years, in keeping with this need.

In order to reach the goal of \$10 million by the end of 1966, much of the contributions must come in cash, stocks, bonds, other securities and real properties, as living trusts. Some of it must come in Foundation gift annuities. Some must come as life insurance policies. Some will be received as bequests in wills.

Every contribution will be appreciated regardless of the amount. Those who contribute as much as \$500 for endowment will be memorialized on the Foundation's plaque at the beneficiary institution, or on the plaque in the lobby of the Baptist Building. The contributing church will receive credit for any size gift on the church placard.

Recommendations

3. **RESOLUTION:** The following resolution was approved by the Foundation's Board of Directors on Dec. 11, 1962, and was approved by the convention's Board of Directors on May 14, 1963, and is now submitted to this convention for ratification:

Requesting Amendments to Bylaws

WHEREAS, it is desirable and necessary that Article IV of the bylaws of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma be amended, therefor be it

RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma be requested to ratify amendments as follows:

ARTICLE IV, SECTION 3, Paragraph 3 is hereby deleted and the following language substituted therefor:

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be de-

signed by said board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be countersigned by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

4. We request the co-operation of church leaders toward making it possible for the Foundation to present the Foundation's program at some type of meeting in 250 churches during the calendar year of 1964.

5. We recommend a goal of \$1,500,000 in receipts during 1964, toward the completion of the ten-year program in 1966, and that convention, associational and church leaders give their utmost co-operation toward reaching other Foundation objectives in the ten-year program.

36. J. Marvin Gaskin, secretary of the Historical Commission, presented the report of the Historical Commission and motion carried for the adoption of the report.

Robert S. Jackson, Poteau, invited messengers to the annual Historical Society Dinner at 5 p.m.

Lowell D. Milburn reported that First Church, Shawnee had published the history of that church as written by Grover Scales.

Calvin Ussery, Mangum, reported that his church had completed its history.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Secretary

The Historical Commission continues to function as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in meeting the history needs of all Oklahoma Baptists. The program of the commission is designed to meet the fourfold need of helping Baptists collect, preserve, record and utilize their history.

Among the aims of the commission is the goal to create a growing consciousness among Oklahoma Baptists that at all levels their history should be written, and that every written history should be a work of superior quality. Cervantes said, "Historians ought to be precise, faithful and unprejudiced; and neither interest nor fear, hatred nor affection, should make them swerve from the way of truth" (*Don Quixote*, Pt. i, ch. 9).

Stubblefield Chapel

During the past year two meetings of the commission were held. Among the items of business transacted at these meetings, two are of exceptional significance.

The first item was the procuring, relocating and naming of the

pioneer church building at Shawnee. This project has been brought to near completion. The first house of worship owned by First Church, Shawnee was purchased from the Salvation Army of that city, and relocated at Oklahoma Baptist University. Commendation was voted to Link Cowen, Shawnee contractor, for his interest in this project and assistance in restoring the building which is to become a center of Oklahoma Baptist history. Cowen made a \$1,000 gift in addition to the service of his company. The newly-moved building is situated directly across University Street facing Kerr Dormitory. Furnishing and continuous maintenance of the building is to be a joint project of the commission and OBU. The building has been named Stubblefield Chapel in memory of Cortez Stubblefield, pioneer Oklahoma Baptist leader and first field worker for OBU. Art glass windows in the building were given by First Church, Durant, from its old house of worship, which was razed early this year. Stubblefield was pastor of the Durant church when the recently-razed building was erected in 1901. Financial assistance on the chapel was made possible by gifts of \$300 each from the five churches in Oklahoma where Stubblefield was pastor. These are First Church of Ardmore, Duncan, Durant, Ada and Miami. Other financial aid came from several nominal gifts by individual donors and \$1,000 from the Historical Commission's 1963 budget. Formal dedication of the chapel is set for Founders' Day at OBU in February, 1964.

Persons throughout Oklahoma are invited to assist in furnishing the chapel with hymnals, Bible, pews, pulpit furniture, communion ware and any other suitable items of historical significance.

History Approved

The other major action of the commission during the year was approval of a recommendation from a sub-committee looking to the publication of a comprehensive history of the Baptists in Oklahoma. January 28, 1963, the commission approved a committee report which reads as follows:

1. It is recommended that J. M. Gaskin, Durant, be invited to prepare an official history of Oklahoma Baptists provided that he and the committee can reach a satisfactory agreement as to the honorarium and other details.

2. It is recommended that the subject coverage be broad in scope including "splinter" groups, work with Negroes and Indians, etc., and that this committee be asked to advise with the author on manuscript details.

3. It is recommended that the style of the work be aimed at readability, primarily, with appendix inclusion of documentation and other bibliographical details.

4. It is recommended that the work be completed in time for publication prior to the state convention in 1966, or as soon thereafter as the author and the committee can agree.

5. It is recommended that financial details be subject to arrangement by the author and this committee.

Committee members submitting the above report were John

Dowdy, Hugh Davis and Lee Spencer. Harvey Albright has since been elected to the committee to replace Lee Spencer who has moved from Oklahoma.

September 5, 1963, in its second meeting of the year, the commission approved a revision of the above report to expand the history into a series of three books. The first in the series, if the present plan is brought to completion, would be ready for publication in 1966, the 60th anniversary of the organization of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Plans call for this book to be of a popular nature for general use, perhaps as a study course book. The second book would be a history of Falls Creek Assembly, to be published in 1967, in observance of the Golden Anniversary of the founding of the assembly. The final volume of the series would be a comprehensive, documented reference work with 1970 suggested as the publication date.

Objectives

General and specific objectives, in addition to the two main items, listed above, for the continuing activities of the commission include these:

1. Enlistment of more interested persons to become members of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society, auxiliary to the commission. Annual membership dues are \$2, and life membership dues are \$25. Address inquiries to J. M. Gaskin, Box 147, Durant, if you are interested in a membership.

2. Publication of the **Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**, a magazine-type work printed semiannually by the commission and society, with J. M. Gaskin as editor, will be continued. The **Chronicle** is sent without charge to all paid members of the Historical Society. (The Spring Number of the **Chronicle**, 1963, Vol. VI, No. 1, contains a checklist of Baptist materials in the historical collection at OBU, prepared by Lee Spencer and the library staff at the university. It also contains an index to the first five volumes of the **Chronicle**, prepared by Robert S. Jackson, Poteau, president of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society. This is a valuable reference work, and a few copies are available at a nominal cost. Write J. M. Gaskin, Box 147, Durant for extra copies.)

3. Plans to erect a history center at Falls Creek will be continued.

4. Several historical markers are to be erected in the near future.

5. Every association and church in the state is encouraged to microfilm its minutes, and prepare a written history for publication, if possible.

6. Churches, associations, institutions and individuals are urged to deposit items of historical value in the commission's archives at Oklahoma Baptist University. These items may be placed in the archives on loan or as gifts. Included in such valuables are manuscripts, diaries, pictures, printed or written minutes, rare books and

similar materials which provide basic resource materials for historical research.

7. Churches and associations are encouraged to observe their anniversaries. Those approaching the 25th, 50th or 75th anniversary of organization should make ample plans for an elaborate observance, which by all means should include a published history if one has not been printed recently.

8. Every church and association should consider observing Baptist Heritage Week, April 20-24, 1964. If that date is not suitable, choose a time near that time. Consult your Baptist Book Store for books recommended for study during the week.

37. William G. Kersh, director of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes, brought his report to the convention. Motion carried for its adoption.

Special music was furnished by a group from the School of Nursing at Oklahoma City Baptist Memorial Hospital.

Hospital administrators, chaplains and other personnel were introduced to the convention.

Hospitals and Golden Age Homes

William G. Kersh, Executive Director

Almost any enterprise will occasionally have a year that is extraordinary. This has been true with the Department of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes in 1963. Our Golden Age home program has taken on a rate of progress that has long been the dream of many people. The Baptist Laymen's Corporation in Oklahoma City, offered to assume the obligation of building and operating a dormitory building for our Oklahoma City Golden Age Home. The Board of Directors of the convention voted to accept their offer.

The home is to be built on a 35-acre tract of land adjacent to the Senior Citizens Village on Northwest Highway and Council Road. This land was given for this purpose largely through the leadership of C. A. Henderson, a layman in Trinity Church, Oklahoma City. Plans are under way and it is hoped that we can care for at least 60 residents in the first unit of this building by the middle of 1964.

The new wing for the Hugo Golden Age Home was under construction by the last of August, and work is progressing on this addition very nicely. Our capacity there will be increased to 60 residents upon the completion of this project. John J. Strutton, administrator,

has done an outstanding job in the growth and effectiveness of this ministry.

A new hospital is being added to this part of our ministry. This is the 25-bed Grove Medical Center at Grove. Dr. Norman A. Cotner, medical staff member at Miami Baptist Hospital, and resident of Grove, gave the convention a two-doctor clinic building equipped with laboratory and X-ray, situated on 7½ acres of land at Grove. The people of Grove are in the process of raising enough money to equip the hospital that is being built onto the clinic. Dr. Cotner has assumed the responsibility for the cost of the construction and has set the servicing of the loan so that the hospital can retire the indebtedness out of operation, at which time title to the property will be given to the convention.

The new hospital will be operated in conjunction with the Miami Baptist Hospital. W. C. Campbell will serve as administrator of both institutions. This hospital located in the heart of one of Oklahoma's most beautiful retirement areas offers promise of being one of the best and most efficient small hospitals in the state.

The Miami Baptist Hospital, with the help of the citizens of Miami, will occupy another new addition before the year is out. This will bring the Miami Hospital to a total capacity of 110 beds. Campbell is one of our most efficient administrators and is to be commended for the hard work he has put forth this year.

October will mark the 10th anniversary of the Enid General Hospital, Enid. In this 10-year period Joe R. Baker, administrator, has done a monumental piece of work in modernizing this building and the equipment. This hospital operates at near 100 per cent capacity, and we look forward to the time when the hospital can add to its capacity.

Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City is rapidly becoming the important medical center of the state of Oklahoma. This hospital, under the capable administration of James L. Henry, has been operating under the load of 100 per cent capacity all year. The people of Oklahoma City have raised a total of \$1,708,003.78 in cash and pledges toward the addition of 200 more beds. Construction on this project should be well under way before the end of this year.

The Doctors Medical Building on the hospital property has been leased to capacity and has been given by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation to the convention. Plans are under way for the addition of two more floors to this building, and the leasing of one of these floors has been guaranteed by letters signed by physicians who want to be located in this building. The financial structure of this building is such that it can build these floors and service its own indebtedness.

The land previously allocated to the Golden Age Home is being reallocated for hospital growth and future expansion.

The Southwest Baptist Hospital at Mangum, is continuing its plan for modernization and enlargement of both the General Hospital and the Chronic and Convalescent area. Ralph A. Hill, administrator, is

leading in this effort. The people of the area are planning a fund drive for this purpose in the not too distant future.

Our other hospitals at Pryor, Bristow, Stillwater, Perry, Cordell and Sayre, are continuing to operate in a very fine way. Their financial structure is sound and through them we have a witness we could not otherwise have.

Our chaplaincy program continues to honor the Lord in a very fine way. From Jan. 1 to Aug. 31, 1963 there have been 163 professions of faith in our hospitals. This reminds us constantly of the evangelistic opportunities in our healing ministry.

40. Winfred Moore, pastor of First Church, Amarillo, Texas, brought a message on the subject, "He Left Nothing Undone," using Joshua 11:15 and Proverbs 10:5 as his text.

41. Evans T. Moseley, Ponca City, led the closing prayer for this session of the convention.

Wednesday Night November 13, 1963

42. President M. J. Lee called the evening session to order.

43. Gene Bartlett led the congregation in "pre-session" music, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

A sextet composed of girls from Muskogee sang a group of numbers.

44. Stanley Jordan, Muskogee, led in prayer.

45. E. F. Hallock brought the devotional message from Philip-

pians 2:8 on the subject, "Christ Jesus . . . Became Obedient unto Death."

46. James Woodward, Tulsa, led the "Singing Churchmen" in a number of songs. This group has been invited to sing for the Southern Baptist Convention at Atlantic City, N. J., in May, 1964, and also for the Baptist Jubilee Celebration.

Church Music

Gene Bartlett, Secretary

A recent title that has become popular in Oklahoma is "The Singing Churchmen." While you might think of a group of men singing when you see the phrase I would like to think of every church member as a "singing churchman."

Oklahoma Baptist choir enrolment experienced a 10 per cent increase. Of course, choir enrolment is only one phase of our music ministry. We are also noting improvement in congregational singing throughout our state and this is the most important phase of a church's music ministry.

We have been urging our smaller churches especially to launch out on a three-point program as follows:

1. Buy **Baptist Hymnals** for the congregation.
2. Have a congregational hymn rehearsal at least once a month.
3. Provide music training for song leader and pianist.

4,293 "singing churchmen" actively participated in our state Junior and Youth choir festivals.

259 actively participated in our two state youth music workshops.

A new phase of our festival work will be on a district basis previous to the state festivals. The districts have been set up as follows:

I—Panhandle, Northwestern, Salt Fork, Kay, Perry

II—Deleware-Osage, Craig-Mayes, Northeastern, Rogers

III—Tulsa, North Canadian

IV—Muskogee, East Central, Sans Bois, LeFlore (with the exception of Hugo which would go with Atoka, Bryan, etc.).

V—Atoka, Bryan, Banner, Enon, Arbuckle, Johnston-Marshall

VI—Southwest, Tillman, Comanche-Cotton, Mullins, Caddo, Beckham-Mills, Concord-Kiowa

VII—Oklahoma County, Chickasaw, Union, Central

VIII—Cimarron, Pottawatomie-Lincoln, South Canadian, Pittsburg

District youth choir festivals will be held, Sat., Jan. 25; district Junior choir festivals, Sat., March 14.

State festival dates are: youth choir, Feb. 22; Junior choir, April 25 and May 2. Other state events are: youth music workshops, June 15-19, for ages 15-high school; June 22-26, ages 12-14.

The latest publications from the Baptist Sunday School Board

are: "What Gift Have I?" (Cantata), Robert Graham; "Lo! a Star" (Cantata), Robert and Jeana Graham; "Sing Noel," Jeanne Shaffer; "Golgotha" (Cantata), Robert Graham. These can be purchased from your Baptist Book Store. Recordings of these are also available.

We have three record albums of inspirational music which can be purchased at the Baptist Book Stores. They are: "Songs of Falls Creek" in hi-fi and stereo; "Singing Churchmen," and "Singing Youth." All proceeds from the sale of these go into the Falls Creek chapel-music building fund.

Many of our churches have reached their goal of \$2 per Falls Creek camper or \$2 per enrollee in their music ministry which makes them eligible to have their name on the plaque which will hang in the vestibule of the building. Also several individuals have given \$100 or more and will have their name on the plaque. Indications are that this building will be built soon if friends of church music continue to be faithful in their giving.

Let us all be "singing churchmen" and glorify God with our voices and our daily living.

56. Duke K. McCall, president of Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Ky., introduced representatives of the seminaries of the Southern Baptist Convention. He talked on "Theological Education" which covered the work of the seminaries.

57. Eugene McBride led the congregation in singing the hymn, "Higher Ground."

58. The Public Relations report was presented by Joe L. Ingram, secretary of Public Relations, and Floyd Craig, assistant secretary of Public Relations and director of Communications. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Albert McClellan was introduced and brought greetings from the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention, Nashville, Tenn.

Public Relations

Joe L. Ingram, Secretary

Much has been done during the year to use all available mass communications media to tell what the Lord has done through Oklahoma Baptists.

The department has continued to serve as the press representative of Baptist work to the 200 weekly and 50 daily newspapers; the 12 television and 52 radio stations; the two wire services and other state Baptist papers.

Assistance has been given to departments, institutions and agencies of the convention in the production of booklets, folders, posters and brochures. Other help was given in the preparation of visual materials using all types of photography, including filmstrips and motion pictures. Two new filmstrips are now in production—one on the 12-year program of stewardship and the other on Camp Hudgens for Royal Ambassadors will be released soon.

Both the **Hospital News**, official publication of Oklahoma Baptist hospitals, and the **Falls Creek News** are edited by the department.

During the year a weekly five-minute radio newscast, "Oklahoma Baptist News," was initiated and is now being broadcast over 14 radio stations.

Press awards and the annual public relations conference are the responsibilities of the department. The 1964 conference is to be held in Oklahoma City, April 29. Each church is encouraged to send a representative.

Extra recording equipment was installed at Falls Creek Assembly and recordings of all services were made available to campers. Assembly services were broadcast for all three weeks on KBYE, Oklahoma City, and KGLC, Miami. Special interviews of local church personalities were made for 20 radio stations.

The public relations committee of the Board of Directors will give guidance to the 1964 program. Associational public relations chairmen will continue to be encouraged to be of assistance to churches.

59. E. W. Westmoreland, secretary of the Department of Religious Education, presented the report of the Religious Education Department.

Lyle Garlow and Fred Williams spoke to the report.

Clyde Clayton yielded his time to David Alexander, secretary of the Student Department of the Sunday School Board.

Clayton followed and spoke to the report.

Motion carried for adoption of the report.

Religious Education

E. W. Westmoreland, Secretary

The promotion of Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, Training Union and Baptist Student Union work has been assigned by the convention to the Department of Religious Education. The secretary of the department also serves as church building consultant.

Personnel in the department is as follows: E. W. Westmoreland, secretary of the department and church building consultant; Clyde Clayton, director of Baptist Student Union work; Lyle Garlow, superintendent of Sunday school work; Fred Williams, director of Training Union work; Hugh Willoby, director of youth work; Alga Motychak, elementary secretary; Mrs. Dorothy Sneed, office supervisor and secretary to Westmoreland; Mrs. Leta Hall, secretary to Garlow; Mrs. Betty Finch, secretary to Williams; Mrs. Joan Garrison, secretary to Clayton; Mrs. Eula Mae Stewart, receptionist and assistant to Mrs. Sneed.

Sunday School

Sunday school enrolment in Oklahoma reached 332,145 for the year 1962, an increase of 63 over the previous year, the smallest net gain since 1963.

Sunday school principles and methods awards (category 17) Church Study Course, totaled 15,162. Oklahoma ranked seventh in category 17 and 11th in the total of all categories.

Sunday school Standard units totaled 1,091, third in the Southern Baptist Convention.

The state Cradle Roll, Extension and Young People Away workshop was held in Oklahoma City and Tulsa on May 21-23, 1962. These were very profitable age-group meetings.

Associational pastor-led Sunday school enlargement campaigns have been conducted in 28 associations, with eight scheduled for the fall of 1963 and two for 1964.

The associational Sunday school witnessing campaign has proven very successful. In August of 1962, 15 pastors received training as directors. Nine campaigns were conducted early in 1963 and it is hoped that every association will schedule a campaign prior to their Jubilee Revival in 1964.

An "Adult Thrust" emphasis will be introduced in 1964, and will continue for possibly five years.

Vacation Bible Schools

An enrolment of 127,106 was reached in 1962 in 1,110 Vacation Bible schools. There were 2,224 professions of faith. Salt Fork Valley

Association had 100 per cent of its churches with a school. The state Vacation Bible School clinic on Feb. 26, 1963, had a record attendance. An associational clinic was held in every association in 1963, with a total of 890 churches represented and a total attendance of 8,745.

Training Union

Student Week

An outstanding development in student work in 1963 has been the statement of the scope of student work, developed by men in three areas of the work, local, state and conventionwide. It is as follows:

(1) Leading students and faculty members to commitment to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

(2) Involving them in responsible church membership and in denominational understanding and participation.

(3) Guiding them in worship and devotional experiences.

(4) Involving them in the study of the biblical faith and Christian life.

(5) Guiding them in Christian witnessing.

(6) Involving them in experiences of Christian community.

(7) Involving them in Christian social life and recreation.

(8) Leading them to participate in Christian world missions.

(9) Leading them to accept and practice the principles of Christian stewardship.

(10) Leading them to examine academic disciplines from a Christian perspective.

(11) Enlisting and training for a life of Christian service.

An exciting event in student work in Oklahoma was the sending of the first students to remote areas served by the Foreign Mission Board. A student from the University of Oklahoma worked in Nigeria in Royal Ambassador work, an East Central State student served in Chile in general mission work, and seven other students worked in areas of the United States, all serving without salary. Their expenses were paid by their fellow students.

There are currently approximately 15,000 Baptist young people enrolled in the colleges of Oklahoma. Twenty-two Baptist student organizations seek to minister to these students.

In July, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Clayton and their daughters, Elizabeth and Carol, attended the Baptist Youth World Conference in Beirut, Lebanon.

The annual student retreat for Baptist student union officers, the student union convention and the annual retreat for international students were all well attended. More than 160 college students from Oklahoma attended Student Week at Glorieta.

Falls Creek Assembly

The Falls Creek Assembly program was radically changed for the 1963 assemblies. Each day began with a Bible study period, followed by a second study period which was one and one-half hours in length, divided into two 45-minute periods with a 15-minute intermission. A free period of 45-minutes followed the class periods immediately before the morning worship service. This program met with hearty approval by practically all who attended Falls Creek. We feel that the elimination of the Sunday program was one of the greatest improvements ever made in the assembly.

Church Building

More and more churches are calling upon the secretary of the department for help in planning church buildings. We are delighted to have the privilege of assisting the churches at this point. We work co-operatively with the Department of Church Architecture at the Sunday School Board which has available to the churches building

consultants of the highest caliber. The architects and draftsmen employed by the Sunday School Board are skilled men who know how Baptist churches use a building in the development of a church program.

On Dec. 31, 1962, the Department of Religious Education suffered a great loss when Miss Sophia Duerksen retired. We are happy to report that, although she retired from this department, Miss Duerksen continues to work with the churches in a most effective way. We are delighted that she is kept busy and hope the churches will continue to use her, because she is one of the strongest persons in the field of religious education in our convention.

We are fortunate in having secured the services of Hugh E. Willoby, former pastor of Walker Avenue Church, Oklahoma City, as director of youth work. The churches have received him enthusiastically and we feel that he will make a contribution to the work of the department as he serves the churches in the development of a program for Intermediates and Young People.

Miss Alga Motychak, elementary secretary, gives direction to the development of a program for children in both Sunday school and Training Union. Oklahoma is extremely fortunate in having many fine leaders in the field of children's work who work with Miss Motychak. This area of our work is making great progress.

Chancellor and Mrs. John W. Raley, Mrs. James Ralph Scales, Mr. and Mrs. Grover Scales, Mrs. Dial Currin, trustees and former students were introduced.

Oklahoma Baptist University

James Ralph Scales, President

As of the third day of registration for the fall semester of the 1963-64 sessions, the enrolment on the Shawnee campus stood at 1,224, with extension classes at Ardmore and Oklahoma City, as well as latecomers, to be added. These students are served by 78 full-time and 24 part-time faculty members. The university is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities, the National Association of Schools of Music and the National League for Nursing. This is the only school within the Southern Baptist Convention that has an accredited degree nursing program.

The university holds membership in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the alumnae of the university

are approved for membership in American Association of University Women.

During the past year the university had a complete inspection of its teacher education program, and received the full five-year extension for all its certificate programs, elementary, secondary and music education.

The faculty of dedicated men and women continues to uphold high standards in the lecture halls and laboratories. Twenty-eight professors hold the highest academic degrees—Ph.D., Th.D., D.Ed. or D.M.A. This number represents a creditable increase over that of 10 years ago, 29.1 per cent holding the doctorate in 1953; 36.8 per cent today.

Twenty-one of the faculty were represented by writings in 34 publications during the past year, and 33 are doing additional research on some educational topic. Fifteen faculty members presented papers during the past year before societies in music, musicology, journalism, English, speech, political science, psychology, history, nursing and education. One hundred and six meetings of these societies were attended by staff members, who were also frequent participants in panel discussions and seminars. Two of the staff members, Miss Faye Miller, dietitian, and Mrs. Mary Ann Shaw, bookstore manager, have been elected to national offices in their respective organizations.

Faculty members must constantly improve and update their preparation. Fifty-eight have done advanced work beyond the highest degree which they now hold. A conscientious effort is being made to relate this study to the needs of undergraduates. The quality of instruction is the chief concern of the university administration.

Members of the faculty are frequently called upon to give public performances, recitals, lectures and sermons. More than 225 appearances were listed in a recent study. These included high school commencements, school and college assemblies, civic club meetings, solo performances with symphony orchestras and choruses, and lectures for various study groups. The chief outlet for faculty work off-campus is, of course, our own churches. One study showed that 126 positions within the church and denomination were filled last year by faculty people.

Another indication of the strength of the university is that of the activity of its graduates. A large proportion of the graduates go immediately to graduate study in one of the seminaries or universities. During the past year, the university certified 102 public school teachers to the State Department of Education. Winston Tabb, '63 of Tulsa, won a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship to Harvard. Among Oklahoma schools, only the University of Oklahoma has produced more Woodrow Wilson scholarships, which are designed for future college teachers.

Among the 219 colleges listed in the rosters of 125 accredited seminaries, OBU ranks third, with 235 graduates attending 10 semi-

naries. Thus our university's policy of encouraging ministerial students to further their education is therefore effective.

The European Study Program which was initiated in the summer of 1962 has been made a permanent part of the university curriculum. Sixty persons have participated in the past two summers. The university's own faculty take the group to the major European countries for a first hand study of art, history, government and sociology. Formal instruction is given at Spurgeon's College, London, one of the great British Baptist schools. OBU students are active in the British churches.

Gene T. Lucas, of the Department of Mathematics, was named as treasurer and comptroller of the university at the February meeting of the Board of Trustees. In this capacity he has directed the program of the physical plant which now is valued at almost eight million dollars. This includes 122 acres of land, buildings valued at \$6,617,000, and approximately one million dollars worth of equipment.

The endowment is held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and its book value is \$2,440,000. These funds are supervised and invested by the foundation, and the earnings are used to help underwrite operating expenses of the university, scholarship grants and student loan funds.

Property adjacent to the university is being cleared of the inadequate temporary housing structures, and is being developed by private enterprise to provide housing for married students.

During the summer months the campus repair and maintenance department began major overhauling of the Woman's Missionary Union Memorial Dormitory, which was built in 1928, but because of limitations on funds has had little work done. The university has also constructed in Shawnee Hall, a communications center for the **Bison**, **Yahnseh**, **Anvil**, and photography studio. For the first time in many years all the publications of the university will be housed in this one complex of offices under the able leadership of Miss Dorothy Mae Finklea, '38, of Okmulgee.

Working with the local contractors, the lecture-recital hall in the basement of Raley Chapel has been completed. This spacious room, seating 400 makes possible an entirely new concept of teaching. Many large lecture sessions are held here. This area will be the ideal setting for the numerous fine arts recitals that are held throughout the school year.

The campus crew has installed in Shawnee Hall a new language laboratory. One of the greatest demands of the '60's is for missionaries, businessmen, doctors, nurses and technicians to serve overseas. Language study will be intensified.

During the 1963-64 term, the art department will move from Britain Hall into new quarters and thus free a large space for the enlargement of the library facilities.

The Cortez Stubbelfield Chapel has been added to the campus. This is a reconstruction of the old First Baptist Church, in which

much convention history was made. The assistance of some interested members of the convention and the class of 1963 assured the project, named for a pioneer preacher who served OBU as well as the Indian Territory Convention and five Oklahoma congregations, First Church, Durant, Ardmore, Duncan, Ada and Miami. When this building is completed, it will house the Baptist Historical Society, and will serve as the meeting place for the ministerial alliance and the organ guild.

Ron Bennett, president of the student body at OBU, spoke giving his reasons for coming to and remaining a student at OBU.

Earl Compton, professor of music at OBU, sang.

Ellis Bryan, Department of Sociology, led in prayer.

President James Ralph Scales brought the message on the subject, "Accentuate the Positive."

The Bison Glee Club closed the OBU hour with song.

This is the posture of the Christian in the presence of his memories of departed loved ones. He sees the breaking of day over the

edge of a night of sorrow, and in the full faith of a golden day of eternal reunion, his heart is glad.

So the symbol for this service is one of beauty and hope. The artistic arrangement of roses on the table before you speaks eloquently of those loved ones who no longer walk beside us. A rose for each, in some instances specifically by name, in others symbolically, since the name may not have reached your committee or be found in the category of our listing. But it is our wish that each loss be recorded and you will make our record complete by supplying names for the symbolic roses.

These are they—ministers of God—who walked among us in gallant faith and who now walk among the redeemed with God:

Russell Baker, Marion F. Brady, A. A. Braungardt, T. L. Burns, Dewey Cowan, Chester Collins, R. E. Covington, Onie Lee Garner, S. C. Hamilton, C. A. Higgs, Doc H. Hudson, John Isaacs, K. F. Citations and tributes have been paid them all, and such tributes will be remembered here. To all such we would add our mead of love.

It seems appropriate to your committee that special recognition be given in the two instances in which the official relationship to this Convention is involved. The reference is to MAX STANFIELD and to SENATOR ROBERT S. KERR.

Max Stanfield, alumnus of OBU, with graduate degrees from Southwestern and Central Baptist Seminaries, served as pastor and denominational leader, climaxing his career in Putnam City Church and as president of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Strong in civic activities, Stanfield served as president of the United Dry Organization for several years. Strength and tenderness both defined him and became him. Stanfield was a leader by instinct and by ability. Never harsh in setting forth his views and objectives, nevertheless, everyone knew just where he stood on any given issue. He seemed intuitive in understanding how to merge the concerns of differing groups and secure co-operation. His success was solidly based on a sacred desire to do right by all men and to co-operate in the great things of God. His voice of strength was heard in halls of both Church and State, yet always with compassion for those who were his concern.

This trait of high Christian sportsmanship, so evident in his student days, became the sentinel of his life and measured his service. As pastor, as denominational worker, and civic leader, this man, in the peak of his strength when God called him home, left a rich heritage to his family, his friends, his church, his denomination, and his state.

ROBERT S. KERR

Prominently displayed in the foyer of the Black Angus Restaurant in Poteau, the portrait of the world's most powerful elected official bears this inscription and autograph:

"To Bob Kerr, a devoted public
servant with the long view, the
high regards of his friend.—

John F. Kennedy"

This concise, intuitive evaluation of Robert Samuel Kerr is also comprehensive of the man and his work. Son of the red soil of frontier Oklahoma, humbly born, he found his way to national leadership through the complex maze of the twentieth century.

Caught up in the impatient velocity of our time, he matched his day and climaxed his career by probing the very edges of space. His life work and his interests define him in many frames of reference: a schoolteacher, lawyer, soldier, rancher, oilman, industrialist, statesman, humanitarian, author, orator and churchman.

It is our deep honor to speak of him today as we knew him best, Oklahoma's beloved Baptist layman. Senator Kerr was not only "Mr. Oklahoma" at home and around the world, he was "Mr. Oklahoma Baptist Layman" as well. Though he did not limit his good deeds to Baptist enterprises, he did earn this title by right of conquest through dedicated service to Baptist causes. The strategy of his religion was also the strategy of his life. He would lock his interest and strength on to something much greater than any resources he could muster alone. By such a process he merged with greatness. Following this basic strategy of sublimating the level of his own interests to that of great enterprises and religious causes, he shared in the rewards of a just providence and increased his strength for yet greater tasks ahead. He possessed the quality of intensity of concentration on any given problem and unrelenting drive toward any given objective. By this discipline he was enabled to serve in many capacities.

While he relied on brain power and drive, Senator Kerr was humble, apt to learn, and dedicated—in the words of his business partner, Dean McGee, "a Christian gentleman." The Senator brought all these personal powers into a beautiful synthesis with his concern for people. All humanitarian causes have been strengthened by his hands; orphaned children have been fed, clothed, and sheltered; the aged, sick, and the unfortunate given care; the education of youth upgraded; and all the resources of Oklahoma enriched because Senator Kerr cared. At the moment of his homegoing the strength of his life was applied to double the facilities of the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City.

On a more personal note, Senator Kerr is Oklahoma Baptists' greatest benefactor. Most of the buildings on the OBU campus bear in part the Kerr image. The beautiful Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory honors his mother, while his father is honored in Kerr Cottage in children's city. His leadership as the president of and his gifts through The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma make bene-

ficiaries of all Baptist causes for all time to come. Our loss can be measured only by the sustaining greatness of the days of his strength.

To conclude this memorial to loved ones whose roses are before us today, I turn to an experience with Senator Kerr. Again, it was a year ago today. He had visited in our home and commented on the beautifully colored sweetgum trees in the landscaping design around the house. Mrs. Raley suggested that it was our third planting of trees around houses on OBU's campus, and she still lived in the hope of sitting in the shade of one tree.

His reply was, "Helen, don't worry about that. I have planted a million trees in the last two years; and while I never expect to sit in the shade of a single one, someone else will. That's all that counts. I have had the fun of planting them."

So the big man with the long view gave us a great sermon to contemplate as we sit in the shade of his trees symbolized "upon the changeless horizons of the Eastern Oklahoma hills."

And so have all our loved ones made their bequests to our lives and now await our entrance into the fullness of their hopes.

Religious Literature

In 1903, Lenin established the Bolshevist Movement with 17 members. Fourteen years later, he conquered Russia with 40,000 followers. Communism now rules one third of the world's population and one fourth of the land area. It is shocking but true: in 50 short years, communism has won more converts than Christianity has won in 1,963 years.

Communists are engaged in an unbelievable literature crusade. While one piece of Christian literature reaches every 16 persons on earth, the Communists are endeavoring to put four pieces of literature into the hands of every man, woman and child. It was learned two years ago that the Bible is no longer "the world's best seller." In 1961, over one hundred million volumes of Khrushchev's writings were distributed in non-communist countries while only 55 million Bibles were distributed in the whole world. The need for religious literature is, therefore, well established.

American Bible Society

We commend the American Bible Society and urge the churches to support its ministry. We rejoice in the 1962 increase of Scripture distribution by 48.3 per cent over the previous record year. The American Bible Society distributed a total of 31,523,455 copies of the Bible in 107 countries in 1962. It has assumed the financial responsibility for the translation, production and distribution of the Bible in 40 countries.

Convention Publications

The Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention operates on the presupposition that the Bible is the source of our message, polity and pattern. The curriculum materials described in **The Curriculum Guide** claim a worthy objective: to help persons become aware of God as revealed in Jesus Christ, respond to him in a personal commitment of faith, strive to follow him in the full meaning of Christian discipleship, live in conscious recognition of the guidance and power of the Holy Spirit, and grow toward Christian maturity.

Biblical principles and objectives also permeate the literature of the Brotherhood Commission and WMU. We especially commend the Foreign Mission Board's magazine, **The Commission** and the Home Mission Board's magazine, **Home Missions**. We recommend the magazines, periodicals, bulletins, books, booklets, pamphlets and tracts published by the Sunday School Board for informational, instructional and devotional use in our churches. We further commend two of the main channels of Christian literature among Southern Baptists: the Baptist Book Store and the church library.

Obscene Literature

We strongly record our opposition to the distribution of obscene literature in our country. Post office officials estimate that 50 million pieces of such literature are mailed to teenagers each year. We firmly believe that much of the moral decay in our country can be traced to the growing traffic in pornographic literature. We, therefore, encourage the leaders of our state convention and local churches to make an organized effort to discourage the sale of such literature and to encourage the reading of wholesome literature. We recommend **Home Life** as a timely family magazine. We suggest that Baptist high school students read the materials placed in their school library by the vocational guidance department of our Sunday School Board.

Baptist Messenger

We feel that Oklahoma Baptists' greatest bargain in religious literature is the **Baptist Messenger** which now has a weekly circulation of 79,000. The "budget method" of subscribing to the **Messenger** through the budget of the local church brings this valuable piece of religious literature to Baptist homes for only 3.2 cents per copy.

We express our appreciation to Editor Jack Gritz and his staff for excellent news coverage, doctrinal studies, timely editorials and practical suggestions for Christian living. We heartily recommend that the **Baptist Messenger** be sent to every Baptist family in our state.

We also affirm its doctrinal solidarity, biblical foundation, evangelistic fervor and missionary vision.

All associational Superintendents of Missions were presented on the platform. Sam Scantlan led in prayer for God's blessings and guidance upon our mission program and leaders.

J. T. Roberts introduced the workers and leaders among National Baptists and presented the following Church Development Achievement Awards for 1963: Liberty Church, Northwestern Association, Wayne Brown, pastor; Indian Capital Mission of Anadarko, Caddo Association, Joe Prickett, pastor.

Bailey Sewell presented the workers among the language groups.

Faye Estlack, secretary to Sam Scantlan, and Louise Wagnon, office receptionist, were introduced before Scantlan spoke to the report regarding Falls Creek and made a passionate appeal for dedication to soul winning.

Department of Missions

Sam W. Scantlan, Secretary

"They that sow in tears shall reap in joy. He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him" (Psalms 126:5, 6).

There are many phases of work in this department. We are now completing the fourth year under the arrangements with the Home Mission Board for the work with the language groups and National Baptists. This has proved most satisfactory. We are able to have much closer contact with the missionaries on the field. Bailey Sewell is associate in charge of the work with language groups; J. T. Roberts is associate in charge of work with National Baptists.

Associational Missions

There are 37 associations in Oklahoma and each has a full corps of officers and a superintendent of missions. The state convention supplements the salaries of the superintendents of missions in order that associations may have extra funds with which church assistance may be given where needed. These men promote every department of work in the association, the state and Southern Baptist Convention.

Language Ministries

There are 33 missionaries and their wives serving in this phase of our work; one works with the deaf, two with Spanish speaking people and the others with Indians.

This year, 1963, has been exceptionally good in that we have had very little change in personnel. Many of the missionaries have been in their present work for over 10 years. This helps make for stability.

Prospects are good that the language churches will show their

10th annual consecutive increase in giving through the Cooperative Program this year.

The 1963 Falls Creek Indian Assembly had another record-breaking enrolment—1,363. There were 142 decisions. Sam W. Scantlan was camp pastor. We also had our first state Spanish retreat with 105 enrolled and seven decisions. Edmond Enriquez, pastor, First Mexican Church, McKinney, Texas, was camp pastor. A similar retreat is planned for 1964. The Oklahoma Baptist conference of the deaf met at Falls Creek June 21-23 with 53 full-time campers enrolled and Clifford Bruffey, director of deaf work for the Home Mission Board in Florida, was camp pastor. The 1964 session will be held June 26-28 at Falls Creek.

Work with National Baptists

Our program of work with National Baptists is one of co-operation with them in the field of missions, including evangelism, Christian education and enlistment. This work is projected in co-operation with National and Southern Baptist churches, district associations, state conventions and National conventions throughout the nation. The purpose of the program is to strengthen National Baptist churches as they seek to win the lost, develop Christian leaders, enlist mission volunteers and share with Southern Baptists in world missions here and abroad.

Through this program of work in Oklahoma we are seeking to build a spirit of co-operation and good will between National and Southern Baptists in all areas of church and denominational life.

The Oklahoma Missionary State Baptist Convention had its first youth camp at Falls Creek June 10-13. It registered 120. There was a total of 41 decisions.

Jewish Work

Work among our Jewish friends is a great challenge. It is one of the most needed fields of endeavor and brings great rewards to those who win them to Christ. There are Jewish friends in nearly every community and they need our help. Most of these people live in our larger cities, and churches in those areas are working among them. The challenge is to do more in the days ahead.

During the month of April each year we observe Jewish Fellowship Week. We urge every church to put this on their calendar, April 12-19, 1964, and make a special effort to win these friends.

Cuban Refugee Relief Program

Thousands of Cubans are now in Florida and the Home Mission Board has a program of resettlement for worthy families across the

convention territory. Churches are to take responsibility for bringing families to their communities and to help them get settled with homes and jobs.

Five families have been relocated in Oklahoma and the churches which are sponsoring them send glowing reports. Most of them are now gainfully employed and self-supporting.

Other churches have made applications for families and we hope they will soon arrive.

30,000 Movement

The 30,000 Movement, begun June 1, 1956, in which the Southern Baptist Convention set a goal of 10,000 new churches and 20,000 new missions by 1964, is now in its seventh year. This department was asked to promote the program with the secretary serving as state director. The whole program is church-centered and each new unit of work should be sponsored by a local church.

The emphasis for 1963 is on world missions, with special emphasis to overseas missions and to the mission work being done by the individual churches. World Mission Week was observed in April.

The seventh year of this program closed on July 1 and there have been 133 new churches established and 357 new missions started in Oklahoma. The following are some interesting figures concerning churches, missions and institutional services by associations.

Church Development Program

The Church Development Program is a ministry of our Baptist state convention, in co-operation with the Home Mission Board through the Department of Missions, and is designed to promote the total church program of any size church in any type of community.

The ministry stresses development toward a better church, a better community and a better world. It also includes recognition of outstanding churches by the state and then by the Home Mission Board.

At the heart of the ministry is a concise guidebook which leads each participating church through four phases: (1) a survey of the community, (2) an inventory of the ministry of the church, (3) the adopting of immediate and long-range projects in the areas of a better church, community and world, and (4) the preparation of a record of the church's progress.

Rural Church Conference

The 1962 conference was held at Ardmore, First Church Feb. 18-19. There were 180 people registered and most of them stayed through the entire program.

J. C. Neal of Kinta was elected president and Chester Johnson of Omega was elected vice-president of the 1964 conference which will be held with Anadarko, First Church on Feb. 20-21.

Falls Creek Assembly

The secretary of the Department of Missions also serves as business manager of Falls Creek Assembly. Several of our superintendents of missions, as well as laymen and pastors, assisted us with all three week of the assemblies. There was a total registration for the three weeks of 18,135; 11,525 of these were full-time campers. The Indian Assembly reported 1,363 enrolled and the deaf assembly enrolled 53.

Jail Services

People who are in jails and prisons need our help. We encourage the churches located in areas where there are jail and prisons to

make arrangements to preach the gospel to these unfortunate people.

Every prisoner has the right to hear the gospel as Baptist preach it. We must not fail them.

Baptist Jubilee World Missions Year

The secretary of the Department of Missions was chairman of the committee for the promotion of world missions in 1963. The objective was the enlistment of all our Baptist people, churches, associations, conventions and institutions in the evangelization of all the people of all the world. The slogan was "Sharing Christ with the Whole World."

The Training Unions gave special emphasis to this program by promoting the observance of World Missions Week in April.

Falls Creek Assembly

Sam W. Scantlan, Business Manager

The 1963 Falls Creek Assemblies, including the Indian Assembly, were about the finest we have ever had. Each year brings a serious group of our finest Oklahoma Baptist youth together for four separate assemblies. The Indian Assembly had over 1,300, while five or six thousand attended the other three assemblies each week. The total attendance for the four weeks was 19,498: 1,363 for the Indian Assembly and 18,135 for the other three weeks.

There was a total of 1,600 decisions in the three assemblies and 142 in the Indian Assembly; a total of 1,742 decisions. These included 160 professions of faith, 404 volunteers for special service and 1,178 rededications.

The speakers for the four assemblies were excellent and an inspiration to all who heard them. They were:

The Oklahoma Baptist Conference of the Deaf met at Falls Creek June 21-23. There were 53 full-time campers enrolled and Clifford Bruffey, director of deaf work for the Home Mission Board in Florida, was the camp pastor. The 1964 session will be held June 26-28 at Falls Creek.

The first Spanish camp was held at Southwest Assembly grounds at Lugert on Lake Altus. There were 106 enrolled. There are a number of associational and district assemblies in the state which swell the total attendance at Baptist assemblies in Oklahoma each year to a larger figure. The value of such assemblies can only be measured by eternity.

National Baptist youth met June 10-13 at Falls Creek for their first state youth camp. There were 120 in regular attendance and 41 made decisions for Christ.

Improvements

Four new class pavilions were erected this year. Improvements were made on the sanitation system. The resident manager's home was remodeled and general repairs were made over the entire campus.

Woman's Missionary Union

Woman's Missionary Union has completed its 75th anniversary year. We have celebrated in various ways, and the work continues to grow.

We celebrated the year of our 75th birthday by attending the annual meeting in Kansas City. The old-fashioned dresses of a by-gone day swept the city streets. Oklahoma had more than its quota present.

WE CELEBRATED THE GAINS OF THE PAST BY PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE. Two mission study institutes prepared our women to teach the foreign and home mission graded series of books. Teachers of the foreign mission helps were Mrs. Johnny Taylor, Adult; Mrs. Richard Lisk, Young People; Mrs. W. T. Broughton, Intermediate; Mrs. R. H. Nappa, Junior; Mrs. J. B. Badget and Mrs. William Rance, Sunbeam. Teachers of the home mission helps were Mrs. M. S. Whitehead, Adult; Mrs. Paul Stockton, YWA; Mrs. Tommy Gutt, Intermediate, and Mrs. Carl Stringer, Sunbeam.

We prepared our women for service through our rally programs. Mrs. Bill Carden continued to write the four rally programs. State officers prepared suggested conference material.

Leadership training is provided by WMU, and many women took advantage of these courses. WMS' leadership cards were awarded to 2,352; YWA cards of accreditation to 166, GA cards of accreditation to 683, and Sunbeam cards of accreditation to 427.

WMU prepared for the future through the Summer Seminar for Preachers. Nineteen wives took advantage of the course taught. WMU paid the tuition for these wives.

One thousand, three hundred and fifty-nine women attended the annual meeting in Shawnee. High lights of the convention were the GA pageant, given in honor of the 50th anniversary of GA; and the service at which Mrs. William McMurry received her doctorate of letters from OBU. A reception was held honoring the 50th anniversary of GA and the 75th anniversary of WMU. Speakers for this meeting were Mrs. William McMurry, Miss Mildred Streeter, Leroy Benefield, Mrs. Miles Seaborn, Miss Jaxie Short, Miss Elizabeth Provance and Mr. and Mrs. Ancil Scull.

Perhaps our best means of preparing for the future is by providing scholarships. The Indian scholarships were granted to Barbara Coachman, Jane Delaware and Teresa Wilson.

The seminary scholarships were granted to Bertha Wright, Phyllis Pierce, Lorene Pettyjohn, Jacquita Duncan and Verlene Farmer—all to Southwestern; Dorothy Patterson to New Orleans, and Beverly Wynn to Golden Gate.

WMU INSURES THE FUTURE BY TRAINING ITS LEADERSHIP. A total of 4,204 WMU leaders attended 15 district meetings. Sixteen conferences were held each day. Paul Box, missionary to Malaya, was the speaker for the first two weeks and Joe Mefford, missionary to Spain, was the speaker the third week.

Woman's Missionary Union celebrated the anniversary year by **educating youth in missions**. Youth work in Oklahoma continued to grow under the direction of Margaret Fairburn, Elizabeth Curtis, Nancy Bridges and Mrs. Roy Clayton.

The YWA retreat at Nunny-Cha-ha attracted 116 girls. Speakers at this meeting were Mrs. Bruce Conrad and W. A. Poe, missionary to Liberia. Miss Fairburn was honored at this meeting with a gift from the YWAs of the state.

The YWA convention in Tulsa registered 308 girls and leaders. Speakers for this meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Ancil Scull, Mr. and Mrs. Miles Seaborn and Miss Jaxie Short. Sixty girls made the trip by chartered bus to YWA Week at Glorieta. Miss Nancy Bridges was in charge of this trip.

Five weeks of Junior GA camp were planned and promoted by Miss Elizabeth Curtis. The camps were directed by Miss Curtis and Jacquita Duncan. Attending these camps were 965 Junior girls. Thirty-five full-time staffers came early for a pre-camp session, then stayed the five weeks. Missionaries at camp were Miss Dorine Hawkins, Miss Zilda Silva, Miss Dorothy Latham, Miss Sara Lou Henley, Miss Betty Hart, Mrs. Mike Naranjo, Mrs. Russell Freeman, Miss Clarabell Jeffers and Mrs. B. I. Carpenter. There were 27 professions of faith and many other commitments.

Eight hundred and sixty-nine Intermediate girls attended the Intermediate GA conferences, held each year in Norman. Four such meetings were held at which time special emphasis was placed on the anniversary year. Missionaries were Mrs. Ancil Scull and Miss Dorine Hawkins.

Seven thousand, one hundred and thirty-nine GAs attended anniversary banquets in their own associations. Associational GA directors planned and presided over these meetings.

One hundred and fifty-two Oklahoma GAs and their sponsors took an eight-day trip to visit missions in New Orleans and to attend the first GA convention. One hundred and sixty-seven other Oklahoma GAs attended the three meetings. Over 21,000 girls from all over the Southern Baptist Convention attended these 50th anniversary conventions.

Advanced Forward Step work was completed by 165 girls in Oklahoma. This included 101 Queens with a Scepter, 50 Queens Regent, and 14 Queens Regent in Service.

Mrs. Roy Clayton presided over the day camp conference at the

camping workshop. All Sunbeam leadership attending received advanced leadership training credit.

Falls Creek provides a wonderful opportunity for WMU to educate youth in missions. Mrs. Clayton planned and directed the Sunbeam classes for all three assemblies. Helping Mrs. Clayton with these classes were Miss Linda Reid, Mrs. Mary Willis, Mrs. Dempsey, Mrs. Betty Alexander and Miss Judith Clayton, Mrs. Harold Cook, Mrs. Frank Conway, Mrs. Carl Stringer, Mrs. G. Missionary teachers were provided for all age groups at Falls Creek. The representative from SANE was Ross McLennan. Miss Curtis served as hostess at Nunny-Cha-ha.

Forty missionary speakers were sent to 117 different assemblies, camps and associational meetings by the WMU this summer. The total attendance at these meetings was 7,609, and the total number of decisions was 136 with 107 volunteering for missions.

WMU CELEBRATED PAST SUCCESSES BY GIVING. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering amounted to \$431,959.27. The Annie Armstrong Offering amounted to \$98,525.69. The Edna McMillan Offering, as of Oct. 5, was \$33,545. The project for which the largest portion of the offering will go is the furnishing of the school of nursing of Baptist Memorial Hospital.

The writing of the State Mission Season of Prayer programs was done by Mrs. Uel James, Adult; Mrs. Richard Peterson, YWA; Mrs. Virgil Landers, GA, and Mrs. Carl Stringer, Sunbeam.

The WMU Board met twice in session; once in December and once in May. The board consists of the WMU staff, state WMU officers and the associational presidents. The three associational youth directors are asked to come as visitors.

The anniversary year has seen several new organizations brought into being. There were 36 new WMSs, 78 new GAs, 22 new YWAs and 66 new Sunbeams.

In this year of special significance to all of us, many changes have been made in the WMU of Oklahoma. Miss Margaret Hutchison, executive secretary-treasurer retired after many years of faithful service. Miss Margaret Fairburn, YWA director, left Oklahoma to go as a missionary to Liberia. Mrs. Roy Clayton became the Sunbeam director on a part-time basis and Miss Nancy Bridges came to us as YWA director.

Our grateful thanks go to the office staff and state officers for their gracious help in carrying on the work of the office during the months following the retirement of Miss Margaret Hutchison.

The anniversary year is over. We have loved looking back; we now face the future, praying that God will give us an even greater missionary vision.

71. W. J. Oldham, Tulsa, brought the report on the American Bible Society. Motion carried for its adoption.

American Bible Society

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in the missionary task of sharing Christ with the whole world—a task which calls for the widest possible distribution of the Scriptures.

People must have the Bible because it presents Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

In most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures. The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after he must leave—and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

The American Bible Society helps missionaries to translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. For the blind, it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

During 1962 the American Bible Society—

- rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1,202 languages; the full Bible in 228, a Testament in 285 more, a gospel or other complete book in 689 more—but still faced the task of translating the Scriptures into another 1,000 or more languages.
- extended its work to 40 additional countries and provided almost two-thirds of the year's total of nearly 50 million Scripture volumes distributed by all the Bible Societies of the world. Especially encouraging was its overseas distribution of almost 17 million volumes, which was a remarkable increase of 49 per cent over the year before.
- gave almost a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veterans' Hospitals, as a vital link between the home churches and men in service.
- sought new ways for reaching people who have little or no acquaintance with the Bible. Among these new approaches is a program throughout Latin America, in which Christian laymen are recruited and trained, in evening courses, in the evangelistic distribution of the Scriptures in their own communities, under the direction of their own churches.
- continued to expand its distribution of Scriptures to persons of special needs in our own land: people with different language backgrounds; victims of disasters; people in crowded problem-filled "inner-city" areas; patients in hospitals and nursing homes; persons

in jails, reformatories and prisons; migrant farm workers—and many others.

Southern Baptists Support the Work

Because the Bible Society serves mission work—and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people—Southern Baptist churches believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

Two years, 1958 and 1961, Southern Baptists led all denominations in gifts to the American Bible Society. But in 1962 Southern Baptist gifts of \$158,206 stood second, exceeded by Methodist gifts of \$206,580. Gifts from all churches in the USA totaled \$1,191,233.

The help of every Southern Baptist church is needed. Has your church given this year? Here are suggestions based on what many churches are now giving:

72. Johnie Stuckey, Oklahoma City, presented the report of the Convention Building Committee and motion carried for its adoption.

Convention Building Committee

The Convention Building Committee is to work with the various institutions in supervising and correlating the building program. Members of the committee presently serving are: Luther Cox, Oklahoma City; Johnie R. Stuckey, Pryor; K. Kip Owen, Claremore; J. B. Shinn, Tulsa; H. Tom Wiles, Lawton; Larry Eakin, Ardmore; W. F. Crow, Shawnee; T. Hollis Epton, Duncan; Joe Dee Ray, Oklahoma City; H. E. Alsup, Perry; L. E. Maples, Tulsa, and Frank Baugh, Oklahoma City.

Baptist Memorial Hospital

The largest building expansion program is the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City. The committee guiding this project is made up of representatives from the convention's building committee and the hospital governing board and advisory committee. The members are Joe Dee Ray, Frank Baugh, Ray Young, O. C. Brown, James Battle, R. C. Howard, H. B. Lee, Marvin Staton, Luther Cox, Warren Terry and Harvey Elledge. Ex-officio members are William G. Kersh, T. B. Lackey and James Henry.

Boone Powell and his associates from the Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas are serving as consultants. The expansion will double the bed capacity, bringing it to 400 beds. The Doctors Medical Building, adjacent to the hospital, is also being enlarged to care for additional doctors who are requesting space.

These projects are financed through gifts and an additional loan which will be liquidated from operating income. This is rapidly be-

coming one of the finest medical centers in the southwest. Architect's plans are finished and construction should be under way by the time the convention meets in November.

Hugo Golden Age Home

Construction of the new wing on the Golden Age Home at Hugo should be completed by the end of this year. This expansion will increase the capacity from 33 to 61. The building committee asked the governing board at Hugo to serve as the building committee during the expansion program and to arrange financing within limits voted by the convention's Board of Directors.

Oklahoma City Golden Age Home

The Board of Directors invited Baptist Laymen's Corporation to assume the responsibilities of building, operating and financing the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Home. A building committee, composed of James Gregory, J. D. Patteson, James Battle, Gene Warr, Lee V. Sneed Sr., Jerome Tubb, W. R. Wheeler Jr., Lloyd Bartlett and Guy James, is in the process of formulating plans. A 35-acre tract, located at Northwest Expressway and Council Road, was given to the convention for this purpose. This tract has been deeded to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation. Under the leadership of these dedicated Baptist laymen, Oklahoma Baptists will soon have a home of which all of our people will be proud. Ground was broken for this project Sept. 21, 1963.

Camp Hudgens

On Sept. 20, dedication services were conducted for the caretaker's residence at Camp Hudgens. This building cost approximately \$10,000 and was underwritten by pledges of friends in the McAlester area. A sub-committee was appointed to work with the directors and the architect as follows: Joe Dee Ray, W. F. Crow, K. Kip Owen. Other projects at Camp Hudgens will be undertaken as funds are made available.

Chapel Music Building

For a number of years funds have been raised for a Chapel Music Building at Falls Creek Assembly. The Board of Directors voted that when one-half the funds are available and all other projects at Falls Creek are paid in full, that construction may start on this building. We are approaching the time when these financial requirements will be made. Plans have been prepared and the committee is ready to proceed as soon as possible.

Trades Education Building

The Child Care Department has secured funds for a Trades Education Building to be constructed at Boys Ranch Town. The first unit of this building will cost approximately \$50,000. Many friends have contributed to this fund, including an anonymous friend who gave \$30,000. This building should be constructed within the next year.

Baptist Building Expansion

The Sunday School Board has requested more space for the Baptist Book Store, which is located in the Baptist Building. The Messenger Press is also in need of more space, and additional room for

storage is desperately needed by many offices. The Board of Directors elected the six local members of the Board of Directors and the four local members of the convention's Building Committee to study these needs and report back to the board.

Miami Hospital

The Miami Baptist Hospital has been in an expansion program for several years. Members of the building committee in that area of the state have worked with the governing board at the hospital in construction plans. The hospital has greatly enlarged and modernized its facilities.

1. Whereas we believe in the historic Baptist position of acknowledging the Bible as the sole authority for our faith and practice, and being aware of the confusing trends brought about by materialistic teaching of modernism and liberalism in our day;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT we reaffirm our faith in the infallibility of God's revealed Word; and,

That we urge upon Oklahoma Baptists to declare through the pulpits of every church, make known in the classrooms of our schools and institutions, reveal through the channels of the printed page, radio, television and every possible means of communication, and to establish in the hearts of all our people that the Bible, in its supernatural revelation, stands as the immutable, eternal, Word of God; and,

That we shall further urge upon our pastors, churches, and institutions to use every means of preserving and protecting the authenticity of the Bible message as we would declare to an unbelieving world our convictions relative to the principles of faith that are fundamental in the ordering and establishment of all successful social, moral and spiritual life.

2. Whereas we are entering upon a period that has been designated for Baptist Jubilee Revivals when our churches across America shall be engaged in planning for an intense program of evangelistic activity, which program of evangelism will be culminated in a gigantic Jubilee convention in Atlantic City, N. J., May 18-24, 1964;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT we encourage all of our churches to enlist every possible means of strengthening the outreach of the gospel message through dedicated efforts in winning men to Christ, as Savior and Lord, and magnifying the gospel appeal through consecrated support of world missions with our prayers, gifts and service; and,

That we encourage all of our churches to send their pastors and staff leadership to this significant meeting in Atlantic City, where they

will have an opportunity to review and bear witness to the historic Baptist positions that have been fundamental in the progress of our American way of life; and,

That we encourage every church co-operating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to give serious consideration to a full two week's program of evangelism during the simultaneous Jubilee Revivals in the spring of 1964.

3. Whereas there is a constant demand that Christian forces shall be continually vigilant concerning the sale and use of alcoholic beverages in the state of Oklahoma; and,

Whereas the organization known as the Sooner Alcohol and Narcotics Education, Incorporated continues to provide effective leadership in opposing the evil designs of those forces that threaten to destroy the moral stability of our commonwealth and to undermine the foundations of our beloved state;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma reaffirm its position of supporting this organization in the battle against the sale and use of alcoholic beverages; and,

That we commend SANE and its dedicated secretary, Ross J. McLennan, in their leadership to enforce the constitution of the state of Oklahoma; and,

That we encourage all of our churches to lend both spiritual and financial support to this program of education that concerns the moral and social dangers brought about by the use of narcotics and alcohol.

4. Acknowledging our indebtedness to Joe L. Ingram, Floyd Craig, and their associates in the Department of Public Relations in channeling reports to the people and to our Baptist fellowship through the public press, television, and radio services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma meeting at First Church, Oklahoma City, make known its gratitude and appreciation to these agencies of communication for their effective coverage of news related to convention sessions; and,

That we commend the staff of the BAPTIST MESSENGER for their faithful reporting of news relating to convention activity and the preparation of information which has interpreted the spirit and purpose of our Baptist witness to the world.

That we commend the news staff of the Daily Oklahoman and Times for their coverage of convention sessions.

5. The 58th Annual Session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma meeting with First Church, Oklahoma City is sincerely grateful for the generous hospitality extended through its services and facilities during these days of fellowship and inspiration;

J. A. Pennington, who has served the convention faithfully for many years, was invited to participate in the new life evangelistic movement in Japan in the spring of 1963. God blessed his efforts, along with hundreds of others from over the Southern Baptist Convention, in great revivals. Two pastors from Oklahoma, Hugh R. Bumpas of Capitol Hill Church, Oklahoma City, and T. T. Crabtree of Immanuel, Tulsa, also participated.

Hugo Golden Age Home

Because of crowded conditions in the Hugo Golden Age Home, and a long waiting list, the board increased the loan previously set at \$60,000 to \$100,000. The expansion will increase the capacity from 33 to 61. The indebtedness will be paid from operating income.

The original wing was named the "Will Baskett Wing" and the new addition the "J. F. Murrell" wing.

Miami Baptist Hospital—Grove Expansion

Upon the recommendation of the governing board of the Miami Baptist Hospital, and the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee of the convention's Board of Directors, a lease-purchase agreement was entered into, as follows:

Lease Agreement with Right to Purchase Real Estate

This agreement, made and entered into this 16th day of September, 1963, by and between Grove Medical Center, Inc., a corpora-

tion organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, hereinafter referred to as "owner"; and Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a religious corporation organized and existing under the laws of Oklahoma, hereinafter referred to as "convention";

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Grove Medical Center, Inc., owns the following described real estate in Delaware County, Oklahoma, to-wit:

Lots One (1), Two (2), Three (3), Four (4), Five (5),

Six (6) and Ten (10), Wilson Addition to the City of

Grove, Oklahoma according to the recorded plat thereof;

and has heretofore constructed certain improvements on said real estate and is in the process of constructing additional improvements thereon, all in accordance with plans and specifications submitted to the convention by the owner and made a part hereof by reference; and in order to construct said improvements, Grove Medical Center, Inc. has heretofore secured a loan in the sum of One Hundred Twenty Thousand and no/100 (\$120,000.00) Dollars from the State Federal Savings and Loan Association of Tulsa, a corporation doing business in Tulsa, Oklahoma, according to the terms of the note and mortgage, marked Exhibits "B" and "C", respectively, attached hereto and made a part hereof; and, a certain warranty deed from the Cotners to the owner marked Exhibit "A-1," and a letter from the lender dated May 28, 1963 marked Exhibit "A-2," both attached hereto and made a part hereof; and,

WHEREAS, all parties desire that said real estate shall become and be operated as a general hospital available to the general public; and the convention desires to lease said property for said purpose, with the understanding that when the above mentioned note and mortgage are paid that all right, title and interest in said real estate will vest in the convention as the owner of said real estate; and,

WHEREAS, the convention intends to provide equipment necessary for the operation of said property as a general hospital by obtaining funds for same through public subscription or donations from the general public in and in the vicinity of Grove, Oklahoma, and if such public subscriptions or donations are insufficient for said purpose, to provide other means of equipping said hospital.

Now, therefore, this agreement witnesseth:

For and in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, to which the parties mutually agree, Owner does by these presents, demise, lease and let unto the convention said above described property, to have and to hold the same from the 1st day of November, 1963 to the 31st day of October, 1983, upon the terms and for the consideration hereinafter set forth.

1. Convention promises and agrees to pay, as consideration for said lease, as follows:

a. The sum of Eight Hundred Sixty-one and no/100 (861.00) Dollars per month, beginning on the 1st day of January, 1963 and

on the 1st day of each month thereafter until such time as the note to State Federal Savings and Loan Association of Tulsa (Exhibit "B" attached hereto), or any extensions or renewal thereof, is fully paid. Owner agree that upon receipt of said rental payment, that said sum will immediately be paid to State Federal Savings and Loan Association of Tulsa, to be applied on said note, it being the understanding and intention of the parties hereto that this rental payment is made solely for the purpose of retiring said note and mortgage; and, it is further agreed that convention may pay without penalty the balance of said note at any time during the term of this lease, except such penalty as provided in said note and mortgage.

b. Convention agrees to pay any and all property taxes from and after the commencement of this lease which may be assessed against said premises beginning with the calendar year 1964 and the 1963 taxes are to be prorated so that the convention will pay only for the period it is in possession under this lease.

c. Convention agrees to pay all expenses of maintenance and upkeep of the premises and equipment located therein during the term of this lease and, at its own expense, to make all repairs and replacements necessary or advisable to keep said premises both inside and outside, and all additions thereto, from deteriorating in value or condition. Owner shall be absolutely exempt from making any repair, replacement, or addition to said premises and their appurtenances during the term of this lease.

2. Convention agrees to keep said premises insured against fire and other loss ordinarily covered by an extended coverage clause of an insurance policy, in an amount not less than the replacement cost of the improvements and equipment on said premises, with the owner designated as an additional loss payee as its interest may then appear, said insurance to be the sole cost of the convention. Owner shall be furnished a certificate of all such insurance.

3. Convention agrees to equip said premises as a general hospital and to operate said hospital according to high standards and in a manner in which said hospital will be adjudged to be an efficient and qualified hospital organization. Convention agrees to operate said hospital according to the rules and regulations that are now in effect by the Miami Baptist Hospital of Miami, Oklahoma and as the same may hereafter be amended, as same may pertain to the practice of medicine in said hospital and to membership on the medical staff of said hospital, or to adopt such reasonable rules and regulations from time to time as may be in keeping with good practice in the operation of such hospitals generally.

4. It is mutually agreed that the convention may by giving 180 days notice in writing to the owner terminate this lease upon payment of all rent due and owing to the final day of occupancy of the premises by the convention; and that thereafter each party shall be relieved of any obligation hereunder. In the event of default of the payment

of rent herein, convention agrees to surrender possession to the owner. At the time of such surrender of possession, either upon voluntary termination or by default, it is agreed that all equipment located on or in said premises shall thereupon become the property of the owner at no expense, except that in such event, the owner agrees to pay the convention a sum of money equivalent to the then fair market value of any such equipment which was provided by the convention from sources other than public subscriptions or donations made by persons or firms in the vicinity of the community of Grove, Oklahoma, such payment to be made to the convention upon surrender of possession of the premises.

5. The convention agrees to lease office space on said premises to N. A. Cotner, M.D., of Grove, Oklahoma, for his practice of medicine, upon such terms as may be agreed upon in a written lease attached hereto as Exhibit "D": and made a part hereof.

6. No portion of the leased premises shall be sublet by the convention nor shall this lease agreement be assigned without first having obtained the written permission of the owner.

7. It is understood and agreed that upon full and complete payment of the aforesaid note to State Federal Savings and Loan Association of Tulsa, the owner shall forthwith execute and deliver to the convention its good and sufficient warranty deed, conveying said premises to the convention free and clear of all encumbrances and such other bills of sale or other similar instruments which may be necessary to convey full and complete title to the entire premises and equipment to the convention, and thereafter the convention shall own and operate the real estate and all improvements thereon free and released from any and all obligations under this lease agreement.

Lease

(Exhibit "D")

THIS INDENTURE OF LEASE, made and entered into this 12th day of September, 1963, by and between the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, hereinafter called "convention," and N. A. Cotner, M. D., hereinafter called "Cotner."

WITNESSETH:

1. That the convention, for and in consideration of the rents, covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, does and by these presents, demise, lease and rent to Cotner that portion of the within described premises known as Rooms 78, 79, 80, 82, 83, 84, 85, 86, 87, and 88, together with access thereto and reasonable and necessary parking space adjacent thereto or in connection therewith, but said parking space shall not exceed more than space for 20 automobiles, the same being located upon the following described premises in Delaware County, Oklahoma, to-wit:

Lots One (1), Two (2), Three (3), Four (4), Five (5), Six (6) and Ten (10), WILSON ADDITION to the City of Grove, Oklahoma, according to the recorded plat thereof.

2. Cotner, for and in consideration of the use and possession of the above enumerated rooms, same to be used as medical offices, does hereby agree to pay unto the convention, the sum of \$150 per month during each month that this lease remains in force and effect, said payment to be made on the first day of each month in advance.

3. This agreement shall remain in full force and effect so long as Cotner shall continue to be a member in good standing of the medical staff of the hospital located on said premises, but shall automatically terminate upon his resignation or removal from said medical staff, or upon his death.

4. In the event the convention shall at any time require the use of said space for hospital purposes it shall have the right to provide Cotner with suitable office space, equal in size and character to the space herein described, on said above described premises, at the same rental.

5. Cotner shall have the right at any time during the term hereof and from time to time, to sublet any of the space rented under this lease to any physician of his choice who is a duly accredited member of the medical staff of said hospital. The rental of said premises shall be increased to \$300 per month at all times the sublease is in effect. All subleases shall be subject to approval of the convention and shall be subject to termination by said convention at any time, upon 60 days' notice in writing to Cotner and the sublessee.

6. The convention agrees to furnish all utilities for the leased space and to maintain leased space in good repair inside and outside, and Cotner shall have no liability on account of same, but it is understood that the convention shall not be obligated to repair or refurbish the interior of said space more often than each five years, EXCEPT when same is the result of an emergency or unusual incident not caused by users of said space.

7. This lease is binding upon the successors and assigns of the convention and the provisions thereof are personal to Cotner and are not assignable by him, and automatically expire upon his death.

Baptist Memorial Hospital Expansion

Baptist Memorial Hospital has made tremendous progress since its opening April 14, 1959. For several months patients have been turned away for lack of available beds.

The convention's Board of Directors, in session May 10, 1962, voted to challenge Oklahoma City-County in another fund-raising campaign by agreeing to contribute \$500,000 over a period of years, provided citizens would raise \$1,500,000. The citizens accepted the challenge, launched a campaign in January, 1963, and raised \$1,715,000 in cash and pledges to be paid within five years. This, with the convention's \$500,000, will make \$2,215,000 available for expansion.

When the hospital first opened, in April, 1959, indebtedness was \$2,907,000 as follows: Connecticut Mutual Insurance Company, \$2,-200,000; Department of Health, Education and Welfare, 507,000; and local, short-term financing, \$200,000.

During the first several months of operation, it was necessary to borrow \$400,000 with which to purchase supplies, inventory and other operating expenses. Thus, total indebtedness at its peak in 1960 was \$3,307,000.

The hospital has paid the interest on this indebtedness; has reduced the principal by approximately \$300,000; and has increased assets by \$700,000, including \$500,000 in accounts receivable, \$75,000 in inventory, and \$135,000 in additional equipment, parking, etc. This is an encouraging record for the first four years of a new hospital.

Cost of the original land, building and equipment was approximately \$4,500,000. The proposed \$3,000,000 addition, plus other assets and additional land included in this stage of development, will bring total assets in excess of \$8,000,000. Also, the added facility will practically double bed capacity, from 200 to 400 beds, thus doubling income and lessening the financial load considerably in the future.

By Jan. 1, 1965, the date scheduled for completion of expansion, the principal on the original indebtedness will have been reduced as follows: Connecticut Mutual, from \$2,200,000 to \$1,878,970 or \$321,030; Department of Health, Education and Welfare, from \$507,000 to \$442,000 or by \$65,000; local financing, from \$600,000 to \$334,680, or \$265,320, or a total reduction of \$651,350. We propose to transfer to long-range financing \$193,980 of the \$334,680. The hospital will pay the remaining \$140,700 from operating funds, as already scheduled.

Upon the joint recommendation of the governing board of Baptist Memorial Hospital and the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee of the convention's Board of Directors, the following action was approved by the board:

1. That the hospital be authorized to proceed with expansion at a total cost, not to exceed \$3,000,000. (This will include construction, furnishings, land, architects' fees.)

2. That interim financing be arranged at a local bank or banks, as needed, to provide funds for construction and that the executive secretary-treasurer and hospital administrator be authorized to sign notes at the bank or banks for this purpose. (It is estimated that approximately \$1,000,000 of the pledges will have been paid by the time construction is completed. It may be necessary, therefore, to borrow as much as \$2,000,000 on local, short-term basis for construction. Payments on remaining pledges will be applied on the indebtedness at the bank or banks.)

3. That \$785,000 (the amount required above amount pledged) plus the \$193,980 of local financing, or a total of \$978,980 be added

to the long-range financing, with Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company or some other financing firm. This would bring total long-range financing to \$3,299,950; local financing, \$140,700, making a total indebtedness of \$3,440,650 which is only \$133,650 more than the indebtedness at the peak in 1960. (The \$200,000 for land, included in these figures, will reduce the convention's obligation for land accordingly; thus the total indebtedness is actually less than it was at the peak.) In view of the fact that the hospital bed capacity will be doubled and that assets will have practically doubled, this will be a comparatively small increase in indebtedness and should be serviced much easier than the previous debt.

The \$785,000 of long-range financing will be applied against the local, short-term construction loan referred in Recommendation No. 2.

4. The Baptist Laymen's Corporation has done a magnificent job in constructing, financing, leasing and operating the Doctors Medical Building. This facility was absolutely necessary for the rapid growth and development of the hospital. It now appears that two additional floors must be added immediately to take care of the demand. The present building is so constructed that it may ultimately have ten floors and provide for approximately 100 physicians.

This project is financed with six per cent bonds. It may be possible now or sometime in the future to include this facility with the hospital property in long-range financing at a reduced rate of interest. When the two floors are added, indebtedness on this property will be approximately \$1,750,000. A $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent decrease in interest would amount to \$8,750 per year, or approximately \$100,000 during the life of the loan. If, or when, the above-mentioned reduction in rate of interest can be effected through long-range financing in connection with the hospital, it is recommended that the Board of Directors enter into consultation with the Baptist Laymen's Corporation in an effort to find the most feasible financial arrangement.

Following the board meeting George A. Scheidler, vice-president, mortgage loans for the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company, with whom we worked on the original loan at Baptist Memorial Hospital, was invited to consider re-financing the hospital and doctors medical building. After reviewing the situation, and meeting with representatives of the hospital governing board and the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, Scheidler returned to Hartford, consulted with his board, and wrote the following letter:

Dear Mr. Lackey:

This is to advise you that the authorized committee of our Board of Directors has approved the application of Baptist General Conven-

tion of the State of Oklahoma, signed by you, for an increase of \$2,575,118.76 in Loan No. 10289 to be secured by a first mortgage lien or deed of trust upon property containing approximately 20 acres known as Baptist Memorial Hospital and including the Doctors Medical Building, 5800 Northwest Grand Boulevard, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, more particularly described in the application papers, subject to the following provisions:

First: The amount of the increased loan is to be \$4,560,000;

Second: The term of the loan is to be 20 years;

Third: The rate of interest is to be $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum, payable quarterly, not in advance;

Fourth: Level payments are to be made of \$336,744 per annum, including both interest and principal, payable in equal quarterly payments;

Fifth: Privilege will be granted to make additional payments on interest dates not exceeding 10 per cent of the original amount, including required payments, in any one calendar year, not cumulative; and the further privilege of prepayment in full on any interest date after five years with a premium of 3 per cent of the amount prepaid, after years a premium of 2 per cent and after 15 years without premium; these privileges cannot be exercised concurrently;

Sixth: We shall require a chattel mortgage on all furnishings, fixtures and equipment owned by the applicant and used in the operation of these buildings as added collateral for the loan;

Seventh: It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma;

Eighth: It is understood that all title charges, attorney's fees and any other costs incurred in connection with this loan shall be paid by you;

Ninth: All details and papers in connection with the closing of the loan, including examination of title, are to be satisfactory to our legal counsel and ourselves;

Tenth: It will be necessary that a copy of this letter be signed by the applicant and returned to us promptly;

Eleventh: It is understood that \$1,700,000 of the loan proceeds are to be disbursed on or before Oct. 15, 1964, upon completion of the two additional floors to the Doctors Medical building in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted and approved by us; the balance of the loan is to be disbursed on or before March 15, 1965, upon completion of the new ad-

dition to the hospital in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted and approved by us.

Wolf and Company, auditing firm, with the counsel of the Baptist Memorial Hospital office and the treasurer of the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, prepared facts and projections which revealed the soundness of the proposed loan. The Board of Directors, Baptist Laymen's Corporation, and the governing board of the hospital have carefully studied these projections and are convinced that the indebtedness can be liquidated without appropriations from the Cooperative Program.

In its July meeting, the Baptist Memorial Hospital Governing Board took the following action:

"It is the decision of the governing board of Baptist Memorial Hospital that careful consideration must be given to consolidating the operation and debt retirement of all those buildings which complement the medical center and program of the care of the sick and injured. It is recognized by this board that the Doctors Medical Building has been undertaken by a group of generous and dedicated Baptist laymen who have given of their time, talents and money to insure the success of this aspect of the healing ministry of the denomination's hospital program. It is also recognized that the Doctors Medical Building was constructed principally to encourage and promote the establishment of medical practice in the hospital.

"It is for this reason that the governing board agrees to assume the responsibility for operation of the Doctors Medical Building and all its indebtedness and to prepare plans to provide for increase in the size of the facility to meet the future requirements for office space in the medical center area. With the addition of hospital beds, there is no doubt the two additional floors of the Doctors Medical Building can be leased by completion date and will provide adequate income to operate and service the loan without encumbrance on hospital operation."

Upon the joint study and recommendation of the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, the Baptist Memorial Hospital Governing Board, and the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, and in the best interest of the rapidly-growing medical center, the board in session Sept. 3, 1963 voted to deed the Doctors Medical Building to the convention and reconvey to the convention all real estate covered in the trust, subject to such mortgages, liens and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created prior to such reconveyance.

The board voted, also, to accept the terms of proposed re-financ-

ing of both the Baptist Memorial Hospital and Doctors Medical Building, by the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company of Hartford, Conn., according to their commitment letter dated July 24, 1963, which appears elsewhere in this report. The provisions in the commitment letter are essentially the same as approved by the convention in the first financing of Baptist Memorial Hospital in 1958.

Oklahoma City Golden Age Home

Since the Baptist Laymen's Corporation has fulfilled its purpose **in constructing, leasing, operating and financing the Doctors Medical Building**; and since the Doctors Medical Building will be deeded to the convention, the Board of Directors, after consultation with the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, voted that the corporation assume the responsibility of constructing, operating and financing the Baptist Golden Age Home at Northwest Expressway and Council Road, on land given to the convention for this purpose. It was further voted that this 40-acre tract be deeded to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation in accordance with the same terms and conditions set forth in the resolution regarding the Doctors Medical Building, it being understood that five of the 40 acres are to be reconveyed to Trinity Church for a mission, the location of the mission to be determined by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation and Trinity Church. The five-acre tract was originally given to Trinity Church for this purpose.

It was voted that Oklahoma City Golden Age Home funds accumulated from the transfer of land and appropriations from the 1963 and 1964 budgets be transferred to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation.

It is understood that the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, and the director of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes are to serve as ex-officio members of the corporation and shall make regular reports to the convention and its board of directors. It is further understood that a certified audit of the Golden Age Home shall be printed in the convention minutes annually.

The Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Baptist Laymen's Corporation provide for convention approval of its Board of Directors as follows:

"The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said convention shall fail to confirm the election of any director, the remaining directors shall elect another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the convention does not confirm the director who has been elected in substitution, the convention shall nominate and elect a director of its own selection. A director who has been elected

and whose election is pending confirmation by the convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of director."

Group Life Insurance

The convention voted in November, 1962, to offer a group insurance plan to pastors and assistants to pastors devoting full-time to Baptist work in churches co-operating with the convention.

The board, in session May 14, 1963, adopted the following:

1. That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma enter into a Group Life Insurance Plan with American General Life Insurance Company of Oklahoma.

2. That the insurance contract be issued to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Group Insurance Trust Fund; that the Auditing and Insurance Committee of the Board of Directors and the executive secretary-treasurer be the trustees of this fund. The executive secretary-treasurer may be appointed by the trustees to act for and in behalf of the trustees in conducting the normal, routine business pertinent to the group insurance trust fund.

The plan went into effect June 1, 1963, with 249 participants. Those who were eligible June 1, 1963, but did not enter the plan may do so on any Dec. 1 or June 1 (the semiannual dates,) but evidence of insurability will be required.

Those who have become eligible since the initial enrolment date of June 1, 1963, may enrol Dec. 1, 1963, without evidence of insurability. If they wait until the next semiannual enrolment date of June 1, 1964, evidence of insurability will be required.

Senator Robert S. Kerr

In the May, 1963, meeting of the Board of Directors, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Robert Samuel Kerr

Robert Samuel Kerr was one of those rare men of gentle heart, sober and unworldly, co-operative in spirit, cheerful and efficient in all that he attempted to do. No man ever gave himself more freely for the betterment of our nation and the world. Few men have accomplished so much. He was a Baptist and proud of it. His service on various boards and committees was always taken seriously. Often he attended meetings at great inconvenience to himself. In 1943, he was president of our convention and was president of the Baptist Foundation for three and one-half years.

The only book on his massive desk was a Bible which he loved and studied devotedly. His partner in business, Mr. Dean A. McGee, wrote concerning our brother in Christ: "He worshipped his God,

was devoted to his church, and had a deep affection for the land. He cherished his family and the firm he founded. He loved his country and, especially, that part of it called Oklahoma."

His untimely death on Jan. 1, 1963, has left a vacant place against our Baptist sky. His gifts, both large and small, are almost without number. He shared thousands of dollars with the sick and maimed, with worthy students, with struggling churches and pastors, with his own church, his denomination, great civic projects, and especially with Oklahoma Baptist University.

Wherever Robert S. Kerr went, he stirred up the lethargic waters to fresh life and utility. He earned by right of conquest the title, "Mr. Oklahoma," and had become known among us as "Mr. Baptist Layman"!

His personal appearance, no less than his vast contributions, admirably adapted him for the place of Christian statesman, to which he devoted his great life.

Robert S. Kerr once said, when an employee had fallen in death, "We must close ranks and march on." In deep respect for the work he did and for his tremendous influence, we humbly thank God for this man of faith and courage. It is with sincere thankfulness that we remember his helpfulness in every task we attempted while he was in our midst, and he would say to us, "Close ranks and march on."

We prayerfully sympathize with his family and thank them most heartily for sharing with us this great man of God.

Change in Constitution

The board voted in the May, 1963 meeting to approve and recommend to the convention a change in Article IV, Section 2 of the Constitution, as follows:

That the word **cast** be deleted from the sentence "The one receiving a majority of all votes cast shall be declared elected."

The amended sentence would read, "The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected."

Guidelines for Twelve Years of Mission Advance

On May 13, 1925 the Southern Baptist Convention adopted a report which recommended "that from the adoption of this report . . . , our co-operative work will be known as the Cooperative Program of Southern Baptists." The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma entered into this Cooperative Program, which made it possible for Oklahoma churches to share in the support of missions, Christian education and benevolence in the state and through Southern Baptist Convention agencies. Since 1926, Cooperative Program receipts in Oklahoma have increased from \$116,368 to \$2,494,413 in 1962. The

following is "A Study in Depth"; setting forth the progress of Oklahoma Baptists in co-operative endeavor.

Oklahoma Baptists face a challenging period. As a minimum, we must double what we are now doing. In the midst of an exploding population, we have unparalleled opportunity for the presentation of the gospel.

Here is the strategy for growth:

1. A 5 per cent increase each year in church budget receipts.
2. Churches increasing at least 1 per cent each year in gifts through the Cooperative Program.
3. The convention increasing at least 1 per cent each year to Southern Baptist Convention causes, until a division of 50 per cent state-50 per cent Southern Baptist Convention is reached.
4. The setting of minimum Cooperative Program objectives through 1975.

Fully achieving the first three objectives would produce the following results:

Stewardship Development

In order to attain our missionary challenge, objectives one and two of this report must become a reality. Such attainment depends on the churches developing their members in Christian stewardship.

Under the leadership of the Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, three stewardship programs are now available—two for churches and one for associations:

1. Forward Program of Christian Stewardship (All materials have been extensively revised).

2. The Growth in Christian Stewardship Program (For churches up to 300 members).

3. A Stewardship Development Program for Baptist Associations. Forthcoming is a "Year-round Stewardship Development Program" for churches, which will include the utilization of all unit organizations of the church that will have responsibilities in the area of stewardship development. The program is devised to correlate what is now being done by the various unit organizations for a more effective stewardship emphasis.

1964 Stewardship Development Promotion includes the following:

1. Working closely with associations in giving every assistance possible in their use of the Stewardship Development Program for Baptist Associations.

2. Conduct 17 associational stewardship development clinics. In these clinics we would strive to reach 100 per cent of the churches in a given association and seek to enlist each church in one of the stewardship development programs.

3. Production of a new filmstrip.

4. Frequent articles and advertisements in the **Baptist Messenger**.

5. Special stewardship development emphasis in July.

6. Joint stewardship mailing, designed to enlist churches in a stewardship development emphasis.

7. Counseling with as many churches (in the area of stewardship) as schedules permit.

8. Production of posters and tracts.

Cooperative Program

In the area of Cooperative Program promotion, long-range planning continues to be the goal. We are seeking a greater depth in promotional ideas and materials. The missionary nature and purpose of the local church requires emphasis. Great stress needs to be placed upon the Cooperative Program as the basic channel of mission support.

1964 Cooperative Program includes the following:

1. Prepare attractive exhibits for every convention, major conference and assembly.

2. Annual state stewardship conference in January.

3. Distribute all of the new Cooperative Program tracts. Twelve new tracts have been printed and will be distributed in monthly Cooperative Program mailings, as well as being made available to the churches for distribution.

4. Continue Cooperative Program report mailings each month.

5. Continue utilization of the **Baptist Messenger**. Frequent Cooperative Program articles in the form of illustrations and stories will be used.

6. Continue distribution of filmstrip, "Wide World of Missions."

7. Promote observation of Cooperative Program Day.

8. Promote weekly Cooperative Program giving.

9. Promote churches increasing at least 1 per cent each year to world missions through the Cooperative Program.

10. Utilize the new Cooperative Program film, "Heartbeat."

11. Promote Cooperative Program Month in October.

12. Continuation of wall placards.

13. Interpret the Cooperative Program to Baptist college students.

14. Continue full co-operation with the Southern Baptist Convention Stewardship Commission.

We have examined the balance sheet of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, including only the funds as herein defined, as of December 31, 1963, and the related statements of fund reserves and receipts and disbursements for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

No provision was made for depreciation of property and equipment.

The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma represents only one of the segments of the operations of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. This report does not include assets, liabilities, fund reserves, receipts and disbursements of: (1) Hugo Golden Age Home; (2) the eleven hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or as lessee; and the following affiliated or associated organizations operating as separate corporations; (3) The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; (4) Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma; (5) Oklahoma Baptist University; (6) Faculty Building Association; (7) Baptist Laymen's Corporation and (8) Baptist Building Federal Credit Union.

In our opinion, with the explanations in the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying balance sheet and statements of fund reserves and receipts and disbursements present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1963, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTS

Organization

Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated under Oklahoma law without capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years. Amended Articles of Incorporation filed in March, 1928, and in May, 1961, provide for an organization in perpetuity.

The administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are carried on through The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

The major activities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are described below:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the Co-operative Program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to the Southern Baptist Convention, the various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, Oklahoma, Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and other designated donees.

Baptist Messenger—Printing and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

Department of Child Care—Operation and management of "The Baptist Orphans Home" and "Boys Ranch Town," construction of buildings, and maintenance of buildings and grounds.

Falls Creek Assembly—Providing vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma, and the maintenance of assembly properties.

Department of Religious Education—Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in churches of the state, and coordination of Baptist work in the student union centers at the various educational institutions.

Building Program—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, ceased operating as a general hospital on September 15, 1962 at the request of the administration and governing board of the hospital. This action was approved by the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and was ratified by the Board of Directors in session, December 4, 1962.

A committee was authorized to act for the Board of Directors of the convention in negotiating and consummating an agreement to sell, lease, rent or otherwise dispose of the buildings.

The indebtedness of the hospital is to be liquidated by the collections of the hospital accounts receivable, proceeds from the sale or leasing of the buildings and future Cooperative Program appropriations.

The 1963 Cooperative Program appropriation of \$20,604.75 was paid to The Baptist Foundation in January, 1964.

The \$187,184.71 receivable from Baptist Memorial Hospital includes \$185,376.14 representing the value of land transferred from the books of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to the books of Baptist Memorial Hospital at December 31, 1963.

Notes Receivable, Baptist Laymen's Corporation—Notes receivable from Baptist Laymen's Corporation were made in connection

with the construction of a Doctors Medical Building near Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

The Doctors Medical Building and the liabilities of Baptist Laymen's Corporation were transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital as of December 31, 1963.

The plan for refinancing of Baptist Memorial Hospital property provides that these notes, made to mature April 15, 1971, shall be paid April 15, 1964.

Prepaid Expense (Parking Lot)—A contract dated March 16, 1956, by and between The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City and Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma concerning the joint use of an automobile parking lot and the balance (\$44,000.00) of a loan in the original amount of \$50,000.00 to the church by the convention were cancelled by a new contract dated September 3, 1963.

The new contract provides that the convention shall have full and unrestricted use of the automobile parking lot to be used jointly with the church for a period of 25 years, except that this contract

may be terminated by either party upon written notice of one year, unless the party receiving such notice consents to an earlier termination.

In the event of termination of this contract by the convention, "the church will pay to the convention, a sum which shall be equal to \$44,000.00 less 1/25 part of such sum, i.e. \$1,760.00, for each full year that this agreement has been in effect prior to discontinuance of use as provided in this agreement." Any fractional portion of a year shall be a pro rata part of \$1,760.00.

In the event of termination of this contract by the church, the church will pay to the convention, the amount as scheduled in the contract by years from date of execution of the contract. The scheduled amounts are reduced from \$43,058.62 for the first year to \$1,462.04 for the twenty-fourth year from September 3, 1963. The amount to be paid for any fractional portion of a year shall be determined by an interpolation of the schedule.

The amount shown as "Prepaid Expense (Parking Lot)," \$43,413.00, represents the balance of \$44,000.00 at September 3, 1963, reduced by 4/12 of \$1,760.00 (\$587.00) to the unexpired balance at December 31, 1963, of \$43,413.00.

The Baptist Sunday School Board which operates the Baptist Book Store shares with the convention in the expense of this parking area.

Property and Equipment—The net changes in property and equipment accounts are summarized in Exhibit F.

Land conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, trustee, has been carried on the books of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention at a nominal value of \$1.00.

This land which had been held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention was reconveyed to Baptist General Convention in 1963.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation had constructed a "Doctors Medical Building" on this land.

The land, "Doctors Medical Building" and all indebtedness relative thereto were transferred to the books of Baptist Memorial Hospital as of December 31, 1963.

The value of this land at date of acquisition by the convention was \$10,000.00. This amount was charged to Baptist Memorial Hospital as of December 31, 1963.

Land for future development—Medical Center, valued at \$5,000.00 was transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital as of December 31, 1963.

Golden Age Homes land and buildings were transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital as of December 31, 1963.

The total value of land transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital, \$185,376.14, was charged to the hospital as an account receivable.

The Golden Age Home buildings located near Baptist Memorial

Hospital, valued at \$54,495.13, were transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital with the understanding that Baptist Memorial Hospital would be responsible to carry out the terms of the contracts between the individuals occupying these properties and Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

NOTES TO BALANCE SHEET**Depreciation**

No provision has been made for depreciation of property and equipment.

Transfers to Baptist Memorial Hospital

Assets transferred from the books of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to the books of Baptist Memorial Hospital at December 31, 1963 were as follows:

1. Land which had been held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by Baptist Laymen's Corporation, trustee, valued at \$10,000.00 at date of acquisition by the convention. This land has been carried on the books of the Baptist General Convention at \$1.00.

2. Land for future development—Medical Center, valued at \$5,000.00.

3. Golden Age Home land, valued at \$170,376.14, and Golden Age Home Buildings (residences), valued at \$54,495.13 located adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

4. Land transferred to Baptist Memorial Hospital at \$185,376.14, as set out in Notes 1, 2 and 3 above, is included in account receivable from Baptist hospitals.

Baptist Memorial Hospital is obligated to carry out the terms of the contracts, with the original donors and residents of the Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes, under which the residence properties were constructed.

If any of these donor residents desire to move to the proposed new site of the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Home to be located at Northwest Highway and Council Road, the amount of money originally contributed for the construction of the

present residence facilities will be used for the purpose of constructing a new home for such donor resident at the new location.

If there are those who prefer to have their original contribution returned, the amount originally contributed will be returned.

These donor residents have been asked to make their decision by March 1, 1964.

Transfers to Baptist Laymen's Corporation

Golden Age Home funds and land located at Northwest Highway and Council Road are to be transferred to Baptist Laymen's Corporation in 1964.

A contingent appropriation of \$30,000.00 for buildings is included in the 1964 Cooperative Program budget.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has agreed to assume the responsibility of constructing and operating Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Home, to be located at Northwest Highway and Council Road, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

On December 3, 1963, the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of a tract of land containing approximately 35 acres at Northwest Highway and Council Road to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, subject to encumbrances, easements, and restrictive covenants of record.

This land is to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention.

There shall be paid annually or at more frequent intervals, to the convention the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust.

The convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

This land was not conveyed in 1963. It is included in property and equipment and is shown on Exhibit F as Senior Citizens Village—land, valued at \$40,000.00.

This land is planned to be conveyed in 1964.

Baptist Memorial Hospital Expansion

The convention's Board of Directors, in session May 10, 1962, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Baptist Memorial Hospital. Cooperative Program funds were designated for this hospital expansion:

The expansion construction is now in progress. The estimated total cost, including land, buildings and furnishings is \$3,000,000.00.

The plan for refinancing of Baptist Memorial Hospital property is based on a letter of commitment from Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company to increase its mortgage note payable to \$4,560,000.00 for a term of 20 years with interest at 5½% per annum, payable quarterly, not in advance.

This loan is "to be secured by a first mortgage lien or deed of trust upon property containing approximately 20 acres known as Baptist Memorial Hospital and including the Doctors Medical Building, 5800 Northwest Grand Boulevard, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

"We shall require a chattel mortgage on all furnishings, fixtures and equipment owned by the applicant and used in the operation of these buildings as added collateral for the loan.

"It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma."

General

This balance sheet and the various accompanying and supporting exhibits and schedules apply only to the operations of the department of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund reserves, receipts and disbursements of the following affiliated or associated organizations operating as separate corporations are also not included: (1) Hugo Golden Age Home; (2) the eleven hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or as lessee; (3) The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; (4) Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma; (5) Oklahoma Baptist University; (6) Faculty Building Association; (7) Baptist Laymen's Corporation and (8) Baptist Building Federal Credit Union.

In our opinion, subject to the preceding paragraph, the accompanying balance sheet and statements of fund operations and reserves present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1963, and the results of its transactions for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTS

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. It was created by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma as a private nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships, for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to obtain funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disburse and invest funds according to designation made and as set out in the charter.

Investments

Investments are presented in Exhibit I and Schedules 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

The foundation has consistently followed the practice of recording investments received as contributions at an appraised or market value as of the date of acquisition. Gain or loss or fluctuation in the market has not been taken into account until disposition of the asset.

At December 31, 1963, the market value was \$95,403.22 over the book value of certain stocks with an available market value quotation, as shown in Schedule 1.

The foundation has adopted a new policy effective January 1, 1964, providing for an adjustment to the market value as of December 31, 1963, of all securities held by the foundation.

A revision in the investment pool as of January 1, 1964, provides that periodic revaluation of those securities held by the investment

pool shall be made, and that funds invested shall be on a unit basis determined by the latest market valuation.

Church building loans totaled \$2,568,123.17 at December 31, 1963, or 49% of the total investments of \$5,256,041.09. Church building loans consisted of 147 separate loans ranging from \$171.34 to \$96,842.00 at December 31, 1963. The balances of the majority of these loans were confirmed by direct correspondence.

All church building loans are made with interest at 6% and are secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements to total 100% of the original amount of each loan. The majority of these loans are on a ten year term with provision for monthly payments of principal and interest.

General

Hollums Building—The property which was donated in 1950 by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hollums was sold in 1958 for \$55,000.00 with the consent of Mrs. J. W. Hollums, the surviving grantor.

The net proceeds from the sale of this building have been applied to establish a "living trust" for the benefit of Mrs. J. W. Hollums.

The Old Baptist Building—A lease was executed on October 20, 1955, with Felix Investment Co., Inc. covering property known as "The Old Baptist Building," located at 223 West Park Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, for a period of 99 years from January 1, 1956 to December 31, 2054.

This lease, as amended April 5, 1956, and a supplemental agreement entered into on August 7, 1956, provided for a total consideration of \$1,070,000.00 as follows:

R. A. Young Foundation Trust—A trust agreement was made on October 31, 1958, with R. A. Young Foundation which provided for a five year trust with disposition of the principal and income as follows:

A. Up to and including October 31, 1963, the trustee shall retain as a separate fund in the trust, the entire net income of the trust, to become a part of the trust fund known as the "Phoebe Schertz Young Trust."

B. On November 1, 1963, the trust shall terminate, at which time the trustee shall transfer and assign the principal of the trust to the grantor.

The trustee was specifically authorized to lend money to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma for construction and operation of Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

The principal amount of \$100,000.00 was loaned to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma on a promissory note dated November 21, 1958, with interest at the rate of 5%.

On October 31, 1963, the life of the trust was extended until such time as the hospital required the funds for its construction program. The loan to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was extended for a like period of time.

The trustee was directed by the grantor on February 1, 1964, to pay the corpus of the trust to Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and thereby terminate the trust. The income from the trust, up to the date of termination, is to be added to the "Phoebe Schertz Young Trust."

Investments

Investments are shown at an appraised or market value as of the date of acquisition.

At December 31, 1963, the market value was \$95,403.22 over the book value of certain stocks, with an available market value quotation, as shown in Schedule 1.

The foundation has adopted a new policy effective January 1, 1964, providing for an adjustment to the market value as of December 31, 1963, of all securities held by the foundation.

A revision in the investment pool effective January 1, 1964, provides that periodic revaluation of those securities held by the investment pool shall be made, and that funds invested shall be on a unit basis determined by the latest market valuation.

The book value of the mineral deeds as shown in Schedule 4 is the appraised value at the date of acquisition. No attempt has been made to substantiate these values, nor has any provision been made for depletion of these mineral interests.

Fund Reserves

Included in the \$5,214,754.89 of "Other Trust and Endowment Funds" (Exhibit G) are:

Annuities	128,605.16
Individual trusts	548,172.70

The annuities arose from gifts made to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has agreed to pay to such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. At the death of the donor the obligation to make further payments ceases.

A revolving fund has been established within the operating fund of the foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds, which are accumulated for the purpose of paying the annuitants periodically, and also to provide funds from which estate expenses may be paid prior to the reimbursement of such expenses.

The balance of this revolving fund as of December 31, 1963 was \$13,323.34.

The individual trusts were created naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries, rather than naming Baptist agencies or institutions. The net income from these trusts is disbursed to the specified individuals during their lifetime and, upon their death, is administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

The annuity and individual trust values shown above represent the book values of these funds at December 31, 1963. No attempt has been made to compute any liability of these funds that may be due as future payments to the beneficiaries.

In our opinion, the accompanying fund balance sheets and summary of changes in fund balances and statement of income and expenses, general fund, present fairly the financial position of Oklahoma Baptist University at May 31, 1963, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTS

Organization

Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909, to function as an operating unit of the convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that body. On February 9, 1910, Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a perpetual corporation without capital stock, for the purpose of providing opportunities for all departments of higher education and connected preparatory schooling of persons of both sexes on equal terms.

General Fund

Relief and Annuity

During the period July 1, 1937, to May 31, 1963, the university has contributed to the Educational Institutions Employees Retirement Plan of the Relief and Annuity Board of Southern Baptist Convention for the benefit of officers and faculty participating in the plan. According to direct confirmation, the employer's accumulations at May 31, 1963, were \$35,514.57. Amounts arising from contributions on account of any employee may be refunded to the university upon the death of the employee before participation or upon the employee's withdrawal and demand.

Loan Fund

National Defense Student Loan Program

The amount of \$265,265.00 has been advanced by the federal government under the National Defense Student Loan Program. Under this program the federal government furnishes 90% of the funds and the university furnishes 10% to loan to qualifying students with repayments scheduled over a maximum of 15 years. Any borrower who later becomes a full time public elementary school teacher may have 10% of the principal of his loan plus interest forgiven each year of full time service as a teacher, up to a total of 5 years. During the year under review, \$2,806.41 was forgiven on loans under this provision.

Endowment Funds

Included in the endowment funds balance is \$243,500.00 grants from Ford Foundation, the income from which is to be used for faculty salaries for ten years. After this time the principal of the fund may be used for any purpose designated by the university.

Plant Fund

Plant and Equipment

Land, improvements and equipment are included herein at cost. The net book value of buildings includes \$1,272,453.08 of appraisal value.

Bonds Payable

The university is the obligor under two bond indentures in the total amount of \$1,127,000.00 to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government.

The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series of 1955, consists of \$550,000.00 of 2¾ % first mortgage bonds. Interest is payable May 1 and November 1. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$10,000.00 on November 1, 1963, to \$25,000.00 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory. The first \$48,000.00 of these bonds were retired as scheduled, and \$2,000.00 of the bonds due November 1, 1995 have been retired.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of the bonds.

According to the terms of the loan agreement, the university is required to deposit \$16,000.00 semiannually with the trustee to meet principal and interest payments until such time as the balance remaining from such deposits is equal to the debt service of the current year plus the two succeeding years. After this requirement is met, the semiannual payments are to be the amounts required to pay the amount of principal and interest then due and to maintain the debt service requirements set out above.

On May 31, 1963, the sinking fund balance was \$73,639.62 as compared with the remaining current year plus two succeeding years debt service requirement of \$68,960.00.

The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing Bonds, Series of 1957, consists of \$667,000.00 of 2 7/8% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts from \$11,000.00 on October 1, 1963 to \$33,000.00 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming the Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee,

certain income of the university is pledged for retirement of these bonds.

According to the terms of the loan agreement, the university is required to deposit \$20,625.00 semiannually with the trustee to meet principal and interest payments until such time as the balance remaining from such deposits is equal to the debt service requirements of the calendar year plus \$60,000.00. After this requirement is met, the semiannual payments are to be the amount required to make principal and interest payments then due and to maintain the sinking fund balance as set out above.

On May 31, 1963, the sinking fund balance was \$68,956.70 as compared with the remaining current year debt service plus \$60,000.00 of \$80,588.12.

During the period under review the university made the necessary deposits with the trustee on both bond indentures as outlined above.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$724,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 1, 1961, with semiannual maturities varying from \$14,000.00 on September 1, 1963, to \$26,000.00 on September 1, 1975 with the balance of \$249,000.00 due March 1, 1976. Interest rates vary from 4¾ % to 5.6%. These bonds are secured by a first mortgage on the John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) the apportionment from Baptist General Convention for building program; (2) \$67,500.00; or (3) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the next twelve months following.

During the period under review the university made the necessary deposits with the trustee under the terms of this agreement.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$300,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semiannual maturities varying from \$5,000.00 on December 1, 1963, to \$10,000.00 on December 1, 1977, with the balance of \$97,000.00 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rates vary from 4¾ % to 5.6%. These bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000.00 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the next twelve months following.

During the period under review the university made the necessary deposits with the trustee under the terms of the agreement.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

May 31, 1963

1. Kerr Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$788,014.07 and the land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$550,000.00. Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,112,120.23 plus appraisal value of \$93,217.12, and the land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$667,000.00.

2. Thurmond Hall, included herein at the university's cost of \$535,242.79 and the land upon which it is located and Raley Chapel, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,578,932.19 and the land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$724,000.00.

3. Ford Music Hall, included herein at the university's cost of \$216,319.74, and Brittain Library and Arts Center, included herein at the university's cost of \$140,015.27, plus appraisal value of \$114,908.73, and the land on which they are located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$300,000.00.

4. The specific income from Kerr Dormitory, the women's dining hall, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, the men's dining hall and, to the extent necessary, the specific income from WMU Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

5. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$67,500.00, is pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of the amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest payments on certain bonds.

6. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$27,000.00 annually, are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of the amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest payments on certain bonds.

7. Included in John Wesley Raley Chapel equipment is a deposit of \$4,000.00 as part of the purchase price of an organ to be installed in the chapel recital hall. The balance of the organ obligation is \$36,716.00, which is to be paid in installments prior to May 31, 1964.

8. Included in the book value of buildings is \$1,272,453.08 of appraisal value, consisting of \$1,354,294.65, less \$81,841.57 amortization.

COMMENTS

Organization

Faculty Building Association, a benevolent organization was incorporated on August 21, 1936, under Oklahoma law. The Articles of Incorporation provide for a perpetual corporation without capital stock, for the purpose of building residences for members of the faculty of Oklahoma Baptist University; also to build halls, dormitories and other suitable buildings for the benefit of the university; and to aid in the improvement and beautification of the campus, with full power to acquire, by purchase or otherwise, any real estate necessary or proper in carrying out the purposes of the corporation, with right to borrow money, execute notes and mortgages, and to sell and convey any real property acquired by the corporation; also to do all things necessary or proper to advance the interest of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Operations

The association has leased all its properties to Oklahoma Baptist University. The lease agreement provides for an annual rental of 6 per cent of the cost (not appraised value), except the Press Building, which is on a fixed rental basis. The agreement may be cancelled by either party upon proper notice.

Fixed Assets

These are carried at cost or appraised value. No provision has been made for depreciation.

Notes Payable

The notes are unsecured and are presented in detail in Schedule 1.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1963, with spot-check of detail transactions.

The accounts receivable were confirmed by outside correspondence.

We had no opportunity to witness the physical inventory taking, but did spot-check some of the items to verify that stocks are being maintained at the approximate levels reported.

The accounts payable were not confirmed by outside correspondence.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

In general the books were found to be in excellent order. The following comments are made:

The differences between the physical inventories and the perpetual inventories, of drugs and medical and surgical supplies, was

comparatively very little this year, indicating a much tighter control over these items.

The Convalescent Home is showing a substantial loss indicating, it seems to us, that the revenue is too low for the type and extent of services required by these patients.

AUDITORS OPINION

With the above exceptions and limitations, in our opinion the attached financial statements present fairly the financial condition of this hospital as of December 31, 1963, and the results of operations for the period then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

We have completed an audit of the books of the Cordell Memorial Hospital at Cordell, Oklahoma, as of December 31, 1963. Attached, you will please find Exhibits and Schedules, as follows:

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts at December 31, 1963, with spot-check of detail transactions. The following comments are made:

The accounts receivable were confirmed by outside correspondence.

We did not witness the actual physical inventory count, but did, on January 7, spot-check a few of the items, which definitely indicated that the hospital is carrying the approximate quantities shown on the physical inventory.

The accounts payable were not confirmed by outside correspondence.

COMMENTS

The average per diem cost of in-patient care is down from \$25.77 in 1962, to \$23.57. This can be attributed, at least in part, to an increase in occupancy from 53% in 1962, to 66.1%. Because of the drop in per diem cost, from the interim rate, Blue Cross is due a refund of over \$2,000.00. We accrued this as a liability, and in this one respect, the attached income statement is not consistent with prior years. We have been picking up the retroactive payments from Blue Cross on a cash basis.

The books were found to be in excellent condition. No recommendations are made for changes.

Financially, this hospital is now obviously in a very favorable position.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

With the above limitations and exceptions, in our opinion the attached statements present fairly the results of operations for the period January 1 to December 31, 1963 and the financial condition of the hospital, for the period then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1963, with spot-check of detail transactions.

We had no opportunity to witness the physical inventory taking, but did spot-check some items to verify that stocks are being maintained at the approximate levels reported.

The accounts receivable were confirmed by outside correspondence.

The accounts payable were not confirmed by outside correspondence.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

We found the books of account to be in excellent condition, generally speaking; although we did find several discrepancies in the statistics. It appears that several different persons have worked on the statistical information. It seems to us, the statistics are of such vital importance that they should be made the direct responsibility of one person. We suggested a method of balancing each months' statistics, which should also be of some help. The following comments are made:

The average per diem cost of in-patient service for the entire year was down to \$27.30, from the average cost of \$27.57 for 1962. This improvement can be attributed at least in part to an increase in occupancy rate from 53.19% to 58.06%.

In one respect the attached income statement is not consistent with prior years. This year we accrued the reimbursement due Blue Cross because of a lower per diem cost than the interim per diem paid. In the past we have picked up the retroactive payments on a cash basis.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

With the above exceptions and limitations, in our opinion the attached financial statements present fairly the financial condition of this hospital as of December 31, 1963 and the results of operations for the year then ended.

Scope of Audit

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1963.

We had no opportunity to witness the physical inventory taking, so accepted the inventory figures compiled by the hospital personnel. In any case apparently extensive stocks are neither maintained nor needed.

In view of the nature of patient population and heavy reliance upon third party payors, we did not attempt to confirm receivables.

Accounts payable were not confirmed by outside confirmation.

Comments and Recommendations

We again found the inter-hospital accounts out of balance. We discussed this both with Rev. White, who keeps the hospital books and Rev. Hart, who keeps the convalescent home books; and feel very confident this will be corrected in the future.

The bank was not reconciled with the books. It appears that Rev. Hart has been reconciling his bank account with his check stubs, but not with his books. We believe he now understands the proper procedure.

Except for the above, we found the books to be well kept.

Since the Sayre Chronic and Convalescent Hospital and the Sayre Hospital are entirely separate institutions, we again recommend strongly that the Oklahoma City office bill each institution separately for insurance and all other items, if any. Your insurance carrier can break this down for you, and we recommend you insist upon it.

Auditors Opinion

For the principal reason that we made no outside confirmation, we should not express an over-all opinion as to the attached financial statements; as the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, which organization set the standards for our profession, would not approve. At the same time we are not apologetic, neither about the books nor about these financial statements. Giving due consideration to all that we did not do on this audit, in our opinion the attached financial statements reliably report the financial operations and condition of this convalescent hospital for the period and time indicated.

COMMENTS

Organization

Baptist Laymen's Corporation was incorporated under Oklahoma law on February 12, 1960, as a corporation with perpetual duration and without capital stock.

The general purpose of the corporation is to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Doctors Medical Building

The first project undertaken by Baptist Laymen's Corporation was the financing, construction and leasing of a Doctors Medical Building, adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This was completed during the year 1963, and tentative arrangements were made for an addition to the Doctors Medical Building.

The completion and leasing of this Doctors Medical Building substantially discharged the responsibility of Baptist Laymen's Corporation in connection with this project; therefore, the Baptist General Convention revoked the trust under which Baptist Laymen's Corporation was holding the land on which this Doctors Medical Building was built, and there was conveyed to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma this land together with the completed Doctors Medical Building, at which time Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma assumed all of the liabilities of Baptist Laymen's

Corporation arising from financing, construction and leasing of this building.

The revocation of the trust and conveyance to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was dated October 23, 1963, but the Baptist Laymen's Corporation continued the operation and management of the Doctors Medical Building until December 31, 1963, at which date recordings were made to give effect to such transfer and conveyance.

Doctors Medical Building will be operated and managed by Baptist Memorial Hospital, and all of the assets and liabilities conveyed to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at the revocation of this trust are to be taken into the books of Baptist Memorial Hospital as of December 31, 1963.

Schedule 1 and the pages immediately following set forth the assets and the liabilities conveyed to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and present an explanation of certain of these accounts.

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Home

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has agreed to assume the responsibility of constructing and operating the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Home, to be located at Northwest Highway and Council Road, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

On December 3, 1963, the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of a tract of land containing approximately 35 acres at Northwest Highway and Council Road to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, subject to encumbrances, easements, and restrictive covenants of record.

This land is to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention.

The trustee shall pay annually or at more frequent intervals, to the convention, the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust.

The convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

This land was not conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation in 1963, but is planned to be conveyed in 1964.

Golden Age Home funds, in addition to the above-mentioned real estate, are to be transferred to Baptist Laymen's Corporation by Baptist General Convention in 1964, to assist toward the financing of the project, as follows:

Assets and liabilities arising from the financing, construction, leasing and operation of Doctors Medical Building, were transferred from Baptist Laymen's Corporation to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, as of December 31, 1963. (See Schedule 1 and pages immediately following.) Since Doctors Medical Building is to be operated under the management and control of Baptist Memorial Hospital (owned and operated by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma), these assets and liabilities are to be taken into the books of Baptist Memorial Hospital.

While Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma has assumed all of the liabilities, as shown in Schedule 1, Baptist Laymen's Corporation will not have been discharged or relieved until such liabilities are paid. The plan for refinancing Baptist Memorial Hospital, to include a substantial addition to the hospital, and an addition to Doctors Medical Building, also contemplates funds for retirement of the liabilities transferred from Baptist Laymen's Corporation to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, as shown in Schedule 1. Until such time, however, Baptist Laymen's Corporation remains liable for these obligations.

Bonds Payable

A first mortgage was given to A. B. Culbertson and Company, as trustee, on land conveyed by Baptist General Convention and all improvements that may be placed thereon, to secure the payment of first mortgage serial sinking fund bonds issued in the total amount of \$1,000,000.00.

The first issue of bonds in the total amount of \$500,000.00, was dated April 15, 1960, with maturity dates from April 15, 1962 to October 15, 1970.

The second issue of bonds in the total amount of \$500,000.00, was dated October 15, 1960. All of these bonds mature on October 15, 1970.

All bonds bear interest from their date at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semiannually, as evidenced by the coupons attached thereto.

The trust indenture requires monthly deposits in a trust bank account in excess of amounts necessary for payments of semiannual maturities of bonds, interest and servicing costs, as of December 31, 1963.

Trust money deposits were insufficient to meet the scheduled sinking fund requirements by approximately \$35,400.00 as of December 31, 1963.

COMMENTS

Organization

Federal credit unions are cooperative associations organized in accordance with the Federal Credit Union Act. Federal credit unions are chartered, examined, and supervised by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions. The bureau's operating expenses are born by the federal credit unions. The bureau receives no direct appropriation of public funds.

Members' shareholdings are not insured by any agency of the government.

Baptist Building Federal Credit Union was organized by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions on July 11, 1958, with perpetual duration. The par value of each share is \$5.00.

"The purpose of this credit union is to promote thrift among its members, by affording them an opportunity for accumulating their savings; and to create for them a source of credit for provident or productive purposes."

"The field of membership shall be limited to those having the following common bond of association, occupation, or residence: Employees of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated, the Oklahoma County Baptist Association, the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Home Mission Board, who work in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; employees of the Child Care Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated, who work in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma; employees of this credit union; and members of their immediate families."

Savings and Loan Shares

Funds were invested with Local Federal Savings and Loan Association of Oklahoma City in the amount of \$7,508.38 at December 31, 1963.

Loans (Notes Receivable)

The total amount of outstanding loans to members was \$27,310.33 at December 31, 1963. This amount was receivable from 43 members. Loan protection insurance is provided by the credit union in the form of life insurance on the life of the borrowing member equal to his loan balance up to \$10,000.00.

Members Savings Share Accounts

The total amount held as deposits from 103 members was \$32,885.72 at December 31, 1963. Life savings insurance is provided by the credit union which insures the members life in an amount equal to his savings in shares up to \$2,000.00.

Reserve for Losses

This account is required by the Federal Credit Union Act. "All entrance fees and charges provided by the bylaws, and 20 per centum of the net earnings of each dividend period, before the declaration of any dividends shall be set aside as a regular reserve against losses on bad loans." "When the regular reserve thus established shall equal 10 per centum of the total amount of members' shareholdings, no further transfer of net earnings to such regular reserve shall be required except that such amounts not in excess of 20 per centum of the net earnings as may be needed to maintain this 10 per centum ratio shall continue to be transferred."

Undivided Earnings

This account represents the balance of the accumulated earnings of the credit union which are available for dividends.
