Pastored several churches in Oklahoma.

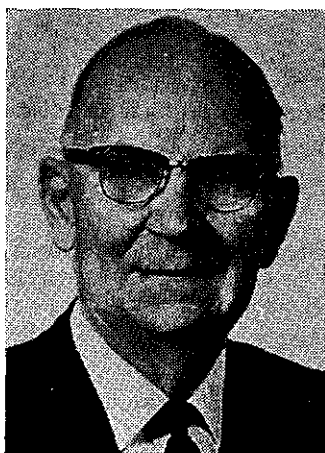
Chaplain in the Army.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 50 members, provided that no church shall have over 10 messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the executive secretary-treasurer, shall be elected annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving a majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This board shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the convention and forty-eight (48) other members who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four (4) years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors shall be the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary-treasurer to serve, until such time as the convention meets. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

Section 4. This board shall elect all department heads, including the editor of the Baptist Messenger and the assistant executive secretary. The executive secretary-treasurer, in consultation with the committees of the Board of Directors which are involved, shall select the workers in the executive division, with the exception of office or similar personnel. The department heads, in counsel with the executive secretary-treasurer and the committees of the Board of Directors which are responsible for their work, shall select their workers, other than office or similar personnel. The executive secretary-treasurer and each department head shall select his office or similar personnel. Those responsible for electing or selecting workers shall fix their salaries.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS**ARTICLE I**

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be fifty (50) including the president and the recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided; the term of office for these members shall be four years. Twelve (12) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

... In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors, shall be the Exec-

utive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semiannual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall an executive committee and the president of the convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors be: A president of the Board of Directors, elected by the convention; a recording secretary, elected by the convention; an executive secretary-treasurer, elected by the convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The president of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to ap-

point a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The executive secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The executive secretary-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The bylaws shall be adopted by the general convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the bylaws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

Section 2. Election of officers shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the convention or the

Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the general convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the general convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Charter and Bylaws

CHARTER AND BYLAWS OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation Feb. 9, 1910, amended Jan. 26, 1956.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is Paul K. Nance, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are: to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of

the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provide for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

The qualifications of said Board of Trustees and of the presidents of said institution and of all departments thereof shall be as follows: That each member of said Board of Trustees shall be a member of a Baptist Church within the state; that the presidents of said institution and each of its departments shall be members of Baptist churches."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election

of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semiannual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semiannual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semiannual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Bap-

tist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 12. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semiannual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 13. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 14. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 15. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, until Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section #12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma, and of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of the said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work.

ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist church affiliated with the Bap-

tist General Convention of Oklahoma, and all shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma; and at an election held at Oklahoma City, on the twenty-eighth day of October, 1946, the following names were selected as temporary directors for the purpose of this organization, who are to serve as such until their successors and the full complement of said sixteen (16) directors are elected and qualified, said directors to be presented to the Baptist General Convention at its annual meeting in Oklahoma City on Wednesday, November 6, 1946, to be approved by it, and the temporary directors signing the Articles of Incorporation, are as follows, to-wit:

All of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma—Andrew Potter, Berta K. Spooner, J. B. Rounds, W. R. Wallace, John T. Daniel, R. C. Howard, R. H. Nicholson, Rupert Naney, Thos. P. Haskins, Thomas B. Lackey, Mrs. Bill V. Carden, Robert S. Kerr, Lawrence B. Cobb, E. W. Westmoreland, Guy Bellamy, Garland Howard, Albert McClellan, Charles H. Black, Lucille Driggers, H. Truman Maxey, Mabel Morris and Ira C. Prosser.

Said directors were elected to serve until the first annual meeting or other meeting called to elect directors, and after said sixteen directors shall be approved and affirmed by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma on November the 6th, 1946.

ARTICLE XIII

The subscribers of these Articles constitute the members of the corporation upon organization and for the purpose of adopting any code or bylaws, and transacting any other business that may lawfully be transacted. In the event of the dissolution of the corporation, all of its property whether real, personal or mixed of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated shall vest immediately in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, to be disposed of by said Convention.

ARTICLE XIV

The fiscal year of the Foundation shall be January 1st of each successive year.

ARTICLE I**Membership**

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

NAME**RESIDENCE**

who were recommended by the Board of Directors of the Convention to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and ratified and approved by said Convention. Such membership to continue until their successors are elected; and all shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of accredited Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II**Annual Meeting of the Directors**

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting at a designated place at the call of the President of the Foundation a short time prior to the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the annual report and recommendation of the Directors shall be presented to and acted upon by the Convention at its regular meeting.

ARTICLE III**Officers**

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, one or more vice-presidents, an executive secretary, who shall also be the secretary and the treasurer of the corporation. Such elective officers, with the exception of the executive secretary, shall be chosen at a meeting of the Board of said corporation, to be held at the Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the Board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only. The executive secretary shall be elected by the Board of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected.

In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lessor officers as it deems necessary, or desirable, such as administrative assistants, assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

Section 1—President:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2—Vice-Presidents:

It shall be the duty of each of the vice-presidents to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3—Executive Secretary:

The executive secretary shall be the official administrator of all of the work of the Board of Directors and shall make full report of all matters committed to the Board of Directors.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of secretary; shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors and then shall perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

The executive secretary shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The executive secretary shall file with the Board of Directors of

the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expense of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 4—Directors:

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

ARTICLE V

Method of Election and Terms of Office

Section 1—Directors:

The directors for the first year shall be those designated in the charter and as may be approved at the Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, when the charter and these bylaws are submitted for the approval of the board.

The directors shall serve for a term of four (4) years, beginning with the 15th day of November, 1946, and the first sixteen (16) directors shall serve as follows:

for a term of four (4) years;

shall serve for a term of three (3) years;

shall serve for a term of two (2) years;

shall serve for a term of one (1) year.

Each year thereafter the board of directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma the four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years.

Section 2—Other Officers:

The directors shall select from among their own number a president, and one or more vice presidents, each of whom shall hold office for one year.

Section 3—Vacancies:

Vacancies on the board of directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If the Baptist General Convention shall fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

ARTICLE VI
Board of Directors

Section 1—Regular Meeting:

The board of directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings:

Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the board of directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committee:

The board of directors may, at their first meeting, or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum:

A quorum of the board of directors shall consist of at least five (5) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority:

The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral

deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice-president of the board of directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

ARTICLE VII

Distributees

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VIII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of _____, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA."

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, nor shall any such amendment become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

The YWA retreat at Nunny-Cha-ha attracted 158 girls. Speakers at this meeting were: Mr. and Mrs. Travis Wiginton, missionaries to Korea; Miss Nicy Murphy, WMU executive secretary-treasurer in Colorado, and J. T. Roberts, associate, missions department.

The YWA convention in Oklahoma City registered 450. Speakers

for this meeting were: Miss Doris DeVault, conventionwide YWA director; Nathan Porter, personnel department, Home Mission Board, and Miss Kathryn White, missionary to Hong Kong. A real high light of the program was the selecting of the first Miss Oklahoma YWA. Miss Karen Miller of Lawton was chosen by Miss DeVault, Porter and Miss White on the basis of an essay she had written entitled "My Experience in Personal Soul Winning," an extemporaneous speech and a talent presentation.

This year we had 51 girls to travel to the YWA conference at Ridgcrest by chartered buses. Enroute they visited the mission fields in New Orleans.

The five weeks of Girls' Auxiliary camps were planned and promoted by Elizabeth Curtis. Over 1,100 girls attended the camps. Thirty young people served as staffers. Missionaries were: Mrs. M. V. Gonnson, Albuquerque, N. M.; Miss Betty Hart, New Orleans, La.; Miss Lelia Jackson, Phoenix, Ariz.; Miss Sistie Givens, Brazil; Mrs. Travis Wiginton, Korea; Miss Dale Moore, Nigeria; Mrs. J. D. McMurray, Uruguay, and Mrs. Stephen Jackson, Brazil. Nineteen girls made a profession of faith, while 125 surrendered their lives for special service.

Seven hundred and seventy-seven girls attended the Intermediate Girls' Auxiliary conferences held at Norman. The missionary serving at these meetings was Miss Sistie Givens, Brazil.

Mrs. Roy Clayton, Sunbeam Band director, directed five Sunbeam Band area meetings which were held in five different areas of our state. All of these meetings were well attended. This was the first time we had the area meetings and we felt they were very successful.

Camping Workshop

This summer at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha a camping workshop was held for associational Girls' Auxiliary directors and leaders who were directing day camps for eight-year-old Sunbeam Band members. Skills of camping were presented at this workshop.

Falls Creek Assemblies

Mrs. Haskell (Anita) Aycox told of her trip to Japan to aid in the New Life Movement there.

Abbie Louise Green, executive secretary-treasurer of Woman's Missionary Union, was presented at the annual meeting.

Special Mission Offerings

The 1963 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions amounted to \$477,885.99. The 1963 Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions amounted to \$106,195.91. The 1964 Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions, as of Oct. 1, is \$25,075.98. The largest portion of the Edna McMillan Offering will go in paying off the furnishings of the School of Nursing at Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City.

We are looking forward to a great year this next year as we help the churches carry out the emphases for the year in a church fulfilling its mission through worship.

Department of Missions

Sam W. Scantlan, Secretary

Joel 3:13-14, "Put ye in the sickle, for the harvest is ripe: come get you down for the press is full, the fats overflow; for their wickedness is great. Multitudes, multitudes in the valley of decision: for the day of the Lord is near in the valley of decision."

Two associates, J. T. Roberts and Bailey Sewell, share the responsibility with the secretary of the department. Bailey Sewell is in charge of language missions and J. T. Roberts works with National Baptists.

Associational Missions

Oklahoma Baptists have 37 associations and each has a full corps of officers and a superintendent of missions. The state convention supplements the salaries of the superintendents of missions in every association except one in order that associations may have extra funds with which assistance may be given to churches and missions where needed. These men promote every department of work in the association, the state and Southern Baptist Convention.

The Baptist associations have a program of practical objectives—a 12-month task that seeks to enlist the churches to co-operate in a worldwide missionary endeavor, set forth by our Lord in Matthew 28:19-20.

Oklahoma Baptists have some very fine associations with strong leadership that ever keeps a lost world before the churches, and we think that is as it should be.

D. D. Barber, superintendent of missions of Enon Association passed away Aug. 6, 1964.

Mrs. M. R. Dareing, wife of the superintendent of missions of Northeastern Association, passed away Aug. 16, 1964.

Language Missions

"... Every man heard them speak in his own language" (Acts 2:6).

This has been a year of sacrificial sharing with us. So far, seven of our workers have gone to serve in other areas. The Saunkeahs, Jasper and Dorothy, after five years, were appointed early in 1964 as missionaries to Argentina, and are now in language study in Costa Rica. Joe Prickett was transferred from Anadarko after four years to serve in Bocas Del Toro, Panama. Mr. and Mrs. Conrad (Bea

and Bruce) were transferred after 11 years at the Chilocco Indian School to serve in the Intermountain Government Boarding School at Brigham City, Utah. The L. E. Saunders were transferred to Mexico after nine years with the First Mexican Church, Oklahoma City.

We were saddened by the sudden death of Napoleon Guarnero. He had served at Hollis Spanish Mission and in southwest Oklahoma for some four years and just prior to this appointment, four years as pastor of First Mexican Church in Oklahoma City.

The 1964 session of Falls Creek Indian Assembly was our largest and in many respects our best. The attendance was a record breaking enrolment of 1,410. There were 65 professions of faith. Jack Stanton of the Home Mission Board, Department of Evangelism, Dallas, Texas, was our camp pastor. Plans are in the making for the 19th consecutive session in 1965. Charles LeClair of South Central Church, Oklahoma City, has been the able director since February. C. Y. Dossey will be the camp pastor.

We rejoice in the coming of able replacements. J. R. Stogsdill is serving in a good way at Anadarko. The Stogsdills came to us from a seven-year pastorate of First Church, Cuba, Mo. Wayne Flanigan has come to work with us as pastor of Indian Center Church, Oklahoma City. He formerly served First Church, Mansville, and pastorates in California. Coming to fill the vacancy left by the death of Guarnero is Eugene Sloan. The Sloans have served Spanish missions in New Mexico, Oklahoma and a church in Puerto Rico.

The Leslie H. Gunns continue to serve as our missionary to the deaf. Regular services are held in First Church, Oklahoma City and interpretation services in some half dozen other churches in the state.

Work with National Baptists

"... Multitudes, multitudes in the valley of decision" (Joel 3:14).

Our program of work with National Baptists is one of co-operation with them in the field of missions, including evangelism, Christian education and enlistment. This work is projected in co-operation with National and Southern Baptist churches, district associations, state conventions and National conventions throughout the nation. The purpose of the program is to strengthen National Baptist churches as they seek to win the lost, develop Christian leaders, enlist mission volunteers and share with Southern Baptists in world missions here and abroad.

Through this program of work in Oklahoma we are seeking to build a spirit of co-operation and good will between National and Southern Baptists in all areas of church and denominational life.

The Oklahoma Missionary State Baptist Convention has made some very significant accomplishments during the last year under the leadership of F. D. Moon, executive secretary-treasurer, and J. P. Patterson, president.

(1) The number of churches giving through their Cooperative

Program is increased, as well as the total amount given during its second year.

(2) The second annual youth assembly at Falls Creek registered approximately 225 with 78 decisions.

(3) The School of Religion, adjacent to Langston University, was discontinued and a BSU, with a chair of Bible, was started with the 1964 fall term. A director of this work will be employed immediately..

(4) The convention is promoting and financing a scholarship program for their young people to attend OBU.

Jewish Work

"Brethren, my heart's desire and prayer to God for Israel is, that they might be saved" (Romans 10:1).

Work among our Jewish friends is a great challenge. It is one of the most needed fields of endeavor and brings great rewards to those who win them to Christ. There are Jewish friends in nearly every community and they need to know our Christ. Most of these people live in our larger cities, and our churches in those areas are working among them. The challenge is to do more in the days ahead.

A special effort to win the Jews is made during April of each year as we observe Jewish Fellowship Week. Every church is urged to put April 11-17, 1965 on their calendar and make a special effort to win these friends. Of course, the churches must be concerned about these people. Winning Jews to Christ is not an easy task, therefore, it is necessary for church members to live for Christ before them and continually be on the alert to point them to Jesus.

Cuban Refugee Relief Program

"If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, and one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?" (James 2:15-16).

The Home Mission Board is still relocating Cuban families across the convention territory. We suggest that any church desiring to assist one of these families with a home and a job, get in touch with the Department of Missions at once.

Caring for the displaced people is Christianity in action. We are thankful to each church and pastor who has taken a family to love, protect and assist in the establishment of a new home among us.

30,000 Movement

"And so were the churches established in the faith, and increased in number daily" (Acts 16:5).

The 30,000 Movement, begun June 1, 1956 in which the Southern Baptist Convention set a goal of 10,000 new churches and 20,000 new missions by 1964, is now in its closing year. The department has been promoting the program, with the secretary serving as state director. The emphasis for 1964 is on the Jubilee Year.

The eighth year of this program closed on July 1 and there have been 151 new churches constituted and 434 new missions started in Oklahoma. The following are some of the results of this effort:

Schools of Missions

"Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15).

One of the most interesting and helpful programs any association can have is schools of missions. In such a campaign each church will have a week of intensive study about the mission fields of Southern Baptists and hear a different missionary speak each night about his field of work. There were no programs promoted this year through

the office of the Department of Missions, however, six associations have scheduled programs for this fall and six associations have programs scheduled for 1965 and one in 1967.

Summer Seminar for Preachers

"Then I saw . . . and received instruction" (Prov. 24:32).

The Summer Seminar for Preachers is a one-week, intensive program of study held at Oklahoma Baptist University each year. This program has proved popular with everyone who attends.

The teachers for 1964 were Wayne Ward, Charles E. Myers, T. B. Lackey, E. W. Westmoreland, J. A. Pennington, Gene Bartlett, Augie Henry and Miss Abbie Louise Green. The enrolment was 93. C. W. Montgomery, Pawhuska, was elected president of the class; Sunny B. Stuart, Oklahoma City, vice-president; H. P. Elliott, Elk City, secretary; Thomas J. Cotten, Norman, assistant; Mrs. Jerry G. Southern, Porum, pianist; Mrs. Andrew A. Bolton, Oklahoma City, assistant; Elliott Leitka, Okmulgee, song leader, and Ezeikel H. Hill, Oklahoma City, assistant. The 1965 session will be July 5-10.

We appreciate the interest Oklahoma Baptist University shows in the Summer Seminar for Preachers. Oklahoma Baptist University and the Department of Missions co-operate in making the seminar a successful venture.

Student Summer Mission Program

The Home Mission Board employs college and seminary students for mission work for 10 weeks each summer and some of these are assigned to work with our missionaries in Vacation Bible Schools, revivals, study courses, surveys, youth camps, etc. This year there were 15 of these students who served in Oklahoma. Rural Church Development Program

"Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (II Tim. 2:15).

The Rural Church Development Program is a ministry of our Baptist state convention, in co-operation with the Home Mission Board, through the Department of Missions, and is designed to pro-

mote the total church program of any size church in any type of community.

The ministry stresses development toward a better church, a better community and a better world. It also includes recognition of outstanding churches by the state and then by the Home Mission Board.

At the heart of the ministry is a concise guidebook which leads each participating church through four phases: (1) a survey of the community, (2) an inventory of the ministry of the church, (3) the adopting of immediate and long-range projects in the areas of a better church, community and world, and (4) the preparation of a record of the church's progress.

Liberty Church, Northwestern Association, received the certificate of award in this program for the year Aug. 30, 1962-Sept. 1, 1963. Wayne Brown is pastor.

Rural Church Conference

"... The inspiration of the Almighty giveth them understanding" (Job. 32:8).

The 1963 rural church conference met with First Church, Anadarko, Feb. 20-21. There were 358 registered, the largest attendance of the nine conferences.

Carl Stringer, superintendent of missions in Union Association, Norman, was elected president and O. E. Permitter, pastor, Bethel Church, Frederick, was elected vice-president. The 1965 conference will be held with First Church, Seminole on Feb. 18-19.

Falls Creek Assembly

"Young men likewise exhort to be sober minded" (Titus 3:6).

The secretary of the Department of Missions serves as business manager of Falls Creek Assembly. Several of our superintendents of missions, as well as laymen and pastors, assist us with all three weeks of the assemblies. There was a total registration for the three weeks of 18,546; 11,924 of these were full-time campers. The Indian Assembly reported 1,410 and the deaf assembly 82. All of the personnel in the Department of Missions work during the assemblies helping to see that each person attending has an enjoyable and profitable stay on the assembly grounds.

Jail Services

"I was in prison and ye came unto me" (Matt. 25:36).

People who are in jails and prisons need our help. We encourage the churches located in areas where there are jails and prisons to make arrangements to preach the gospel to these unfortunate people.

Every prisoner has the right to hear the gospel as Baptists preach it. We must not fail them.

Falls Creek Assembly

The 1964 Falls Creek assemblies were the best we have ever had. The finest of Oklahoma Baptist youth came together in five separate assemblies for information, inspiration and fellowship. The Indian Assembly had over 1,400, the Deaf Assembly 82, and over 6,000 attended the other three assemblies each week. The total attendance for the four weeks was 20,038; 1,410 for the Indian Assembly, 82 for the Deaf, and 18,546 for the other three weeks.

There was a total of 2,885 decisions in the three assemblies, 244 in the Indian Assembly and four in the Deaf Assembly; a total of 3,133 decisions. These included 302 professions of faith, 519 volunteers for special service and 2,312 rededications.

The speakers for the five assemblies were excellent and an inspiration to all who heard them. They were:

The Bible study has proved a popular part of the Falls Creek

program and all agree it is one of the finest additions made to the program in many years.

The second Spanish camp was held at Southwest Assembly grounds at Lugert on Lake Altus, May 28-30. There was a total of 70 in the camp with three professions of faith, three rededications, and one dedication for full-time Christian service.

There are a number of associational and district assemblies in the state which swell the total attendance at Baptist assemblies in Oklahoma each year to a large figure. The value of such assemblies can only be measured by eternity.

National Baptist youth met June 15-18 at Falls Creek for their second state youth camp. There were 204 in regular attendance and 78 decisions were made.

Improvements

A cabin was purchased which increased our dormitory space by 32 beds. Other general improvements were made to the camp. The chapel is being torn down and rebuilt in another location, making room for the new B. B. McKinney Chapel. The new chapel will be ready for the 1965 assembly.

B. Rutledge on Jan. 1, 1965. The new secretary has been director of the division of missions since 1959.

A total of 2,299 missionaries serve in every state, Cuba, Panama and Puerto Rico. An average of 30 missionaries were appointed each month last year. Critical personnel needs exist in mission center and Spanish language work.

More than \$6½ million came from Southern Baptists for home missions through the Cooperative Program, the Annie Armstrong Offering and from other sources of income. This amounted to about 62 cents for each Southern Baptist, a nickel per month.

New work and the pioneer areas received increasing support as the older and stronger states took additional financial responsibility. Two-thirds of the more than \$4 million spent by the missions division went to the newer states. Also most of the \$6½ million loaned to 479 churches in 1963 went to pioneer areas.

Six hundred forty-five student summer missionaries served 10 weeks in every state and Panama during the 20th year of the ministry.

Seven hundred and fifty Southern Baptist chaplains presently serve in the military or with hospitals, industry and other institutions.

A total of 46,226 professions of faith were reported by the missionary force. This was a decrease from the 48,700 reported the previous year and reflected a like percentage decrease within the convention, which reported 355,325 baptisms.

The Latin American refugee resettlement ministry aided churches to resettle 450 persons, bringing to 1,100 the number assisted by Southern Baptists.

Mission opportunities in Puerto Rico were studied, and the board voted to support mission work there on a limited basis in 1964.

New staff members are L. W. Crews, director of juvenile rehabilitation, metropolitan missions department; E. L. Golonka, field worker with Slavic-speaking people, language missions department, and Gene E. Moffatt, photographer-technician, promotion department.

Cuba and Panama work has been interrupted by the political situation, Redford reported in May. Most of the churches in Cuba continue to function; seminary enrolment is larger, and though two missionaries were forced to leave during the year, others remain at work. In Panama the work was temporarily interrupted but all workers are back on the field.

The church extension program is receiving increased emphasis in preparation for its role as the major vehicle to continue the 30,000 Movement. The 30,000 Movement, in its climactic year in 1964, reported by Jan. 1 that 5,884 churches and 16,016 missions had been started.

Language instruction for missionaries has been emphasized by the board in sending missionaries to study in Italy, Brazil and special schools in the United States. A language instruction center was established for Spanish in San Antonio.

Educating church members in missions, a plan to confront every Southern Baptist with the mission story, has been developed and stressed by the Division of Education and Promotion. This plan shows the church how a year-round emphasis can be given to missions, in both activities and in money.

Fourteen programs of work were adopted by the board at its midyear meeting, becoming effective Jan. 1. They are church extension, associational administration services, pioneer missions, language missions, church loans, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions, urban-rural missions, Jewish work, mission center work, National Baptists, evangelism, survey and special studies and special mission ministries.

Foreign Missions

"The gospel is the power of God to every one that believeth."

Believing this great precept, the Foreign Mission Board is seeking to project a dramatic new program of advance on every front.

The Foreign Mission Board came to the close of 1963 with a mission staff in excess of 1,800, an objective toward which we have been working since 1948. Appointments totaling 195 during 1963 and 32 from January to May, 1964, bring the number of foreign missionaries in active service to 1,819. Twenty-seven missionary associates are included in this number.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$21,431,202.10 during 1963. Funds from the 1963 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$10,949,857.35. Oklahoma contributed \$477,885.99 to foreign missions through the Lottie Moon Offering to April 30, 1964.

Southern Baptists now have missionaries under appointment to 54 political entities.

Southern Baptist foreign missions reached out to two additional countries in 1963 and one in early 1964.

National pastors number 2,822. Most of the churches have Sunday schools, and many have other church-affiliated organizations. In 1963, the 3,943 churches and 6,999 chapels reported 540,849 enrolled in Sunday school, 41,147 baptisms, and 523,603 church members. (These figures include estimates for China.)

The new program of advance calls for 5,500 foreign missionaries to be supported by an estimated \$55,000,000 budget. The urgency of the world's lost plight makes it imperative that Baptists give their best in this tremendously challenging enterprise.

An expanding enterprise utilizing every possible implement to reach the lost has been launched by the board. Career missionaries, associate missionaries, publications, radio and television, medical and educational resources, pastors for English speaking churches abroad, missionary journeymen, and simultaneous revival crusades on every foreign field are some of the things included in the advance.

Two of the most exciting of these enterprises are those of the radio and missionary journeymen. Every national in every country in which we work has a Japanese transistor radio and the Foreign Mission Board is seeking to reach millions behind the iron, bamboo and velvet curtains with the gospel.

Missionary journeymen will work under the direction of career missionaries in Africa, Europe and the Middle East, Latin America and the Orient. Baptist young people under 27 years of age may apply. Basic qualifications include a required skill, a college degree, good physical health, spiritual maturity, Christian dedication and a desire to serve people in need. The term is two years and is a non-repeatable term. The categories of work include education, medicine and clerical. The first contingent of this missionary group will be utilized in 1964-1965.

This is our day. We must rise to meet the challenge of a dying world and the urgent command of our Savior.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Presented by Auguie Henry, Executive Secretary-Treasurer

This report covers the 12 months from Oct. 1, 1963, to Sept. 30, 1964, and is the 16th report presented by the Foundation's Board of Directors to this convention, during the administration of Auguie Henry. Henry became executive secretary of the Foundation on Sept. 15, 1949. Two years later, he was elected treasurer and secretary, so for the past 13 years he has actually filled three official positions. In 1963 the amended bylaws of the constitution changed the duties of the executive secretary to include the duties of the treasurer and secretary of the corporation.

Prior to Sept. 15, 1949, the Foundation had received less than \$200,000, including the \$76,000 in trust funds transferred from the convention to the Foundation in April, 1947. During the past 15 years, the average annual receipts have been \$763,159.32, and the Foundation has become the second largest state foundation in the Southern Baptist Convention. As a service organization and trust agency, it has been recognized and respected not only by Oklahoma and Southern Baptists, but by the business and professional people of Oklahoma.

Promotion

Back in 1946 when The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created and established by the convention few trails had been blazed in the forest of general convention trust agencies. Baptist institutions and agencies of Oklahoma had practically no endowment and other permanent trust funds. The institutions in most of the older states had administered their own trust funds.

The idea of an incorporated trust agency of the convention that would administer all trust funds for the convention and for all of its institutions and agencies was new to most Baptists everywhere. Thus it was necessary for our Foundation to pioneer in this vast area of Christian stewardship.

The Foundation has endeavored to inaugurate the best possible methods for promoting the work of the Foundation in co-operation with the convention, the institutions and agencies. In the procurement of trusts for Baptist causes the Foundation has endeavored to assist

donors in doing what they wanted to do. In the administration of trusts received, the Foundation has diligently used business methods that would produce a good income and at the same time safeguard the security of the trusts. In the administration of trusts, the Foundation must comply with agreements made with donors in keeping with the trust laws of the state.

During 1964 the goal was to present the work of the Foundation in 250 churches, in addition to associational and state meetings. On the basis of the report for the first nine months of the year this goal will be reached.

New printed material has been prepared and some former folders have been revised. The new publications include:

1. The booklet, "That You May Know," which gives details that cannot be printed in a four-page folder. This booklet is available for church, associational and state leaders and for individuals who desire detailed information on the work of the Foundation;

2. "Living on What You Give," which is being distributed for the first time at this convention, and which is available for distribution in the churches;

3. A new folder which is prepared and distributed to attorneys only;

4. During January, 106,000 bulletin inserts were sent to churches for distribution for "Make Your Will Month";

5. A four-page bulletin insert for churches, to be used during "Foundation Month" in September. Pastors of 535 churches as of Sept. 1 had requested 106,000 of these inserts.

6. The folder, "Three Ways the Foundation Serves You," has been revised and is available for distribution at church and other Baptist meetings.

7. The state Woman's Missionary Union has revised the folder, "How the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and the Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma Are Working Together in the Promotion of Christian Missions," and is giving distribution to same.

8. The state Brotherhood has revised the folder, "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and Baptist Men Working Together for Baptist Causes," and is distributing same.

All of this is being done during 1964 along with the presentation of the Foundation's "Implementing Program," co-operating with the executive offices of the convention in promoting the Associational Stewardship Development Clinics, and in carrying out regular promotional plans, which have been used for a number of years.

The Board of Directors has authorized plans for the observance in 1966 of the 20th anniversary of the establishment of the Foundation.

It is important that the convention realize that the Foundation must not only carry on a progressive and aggressive promotional program, but that it has many other responsibilities. It has always conscientiously served our churches, associations, institutions and agencies, and it has served individual Baptists in areas where they are

greatly in need of help. Then it has the additional responsibilities of procuring and efficiently administering trust funds for Baptist institutions and agencies. The many important, and in some respects highly technical, work of the Foundation necessitates a staff that has had training and experience in the various phases of its work.

Procurement

The three questions most often asked Foundation representatives are:

1. What were the receipts of the Foundation during the past year?
2. How much was disbursed to Baptist causes?
3. What are the present assets?

These questions can be briefly answered by reporting that during the past 12 months, the receipts have been \$1,358,801.48. The amount disbursed to Baptist causes has been \$951,833.12. The assets as of Sept. 30 were \$5,523,693.07.

However, in order to fully appreciate procurement accomplishments it is necessary to look at the receipts during the past 15 years, which total \$11,477,389.81. Of this amount, \$5,953,696.74 has been disbursed to Oklahoma and Southern Baptist causes.

The Foundation's 1964 goal of \$1,500,000 in receipts, which was approved by this convention one year ago, can be reached with the full support of our state, associational and church leaders.

The Foundation is taking seriously the objectives in the 10-year program, which will end on Dec. 31, 1966. One of these objectives is to have \$10 million in endowment and other trust funds. Our institutional and agency leaders said eight years ago, when the 10-year program was launched, that they needed at that time as a minimum the income from \$10 million for Oklahoma institutions and agencies alone.

The need for endowment income is greater today than it was in 1946, when the Foundation was established—yes, even greater than it was eight years ago. This is so because of sociological and economical changes in this state and in the nation during the past eight years. And, it is so because of political changes. The Federal Government is ready to do for private colleges and universities what it has already done for private hospitals and homes for retired citizens. Most denominations have accepted grants from the Federal Government for hospitals and homes for retired citizens. In our opinion, most denominations will accept grants from the government for their colleges and universities in the future. If Baptists continue to maintain their historical position on the doctrine of separation of church and state, and if they maintain their freedom regarding their institutions, there is left only one course to follow—provide endowment and other trusts with their Baptist Foundations that will produce an income which will give adequate security for their institutions.

In order to reach the goal of \$10 million in trust funds by 1966, Oklahoma Baptists must supply most of the funds needed to reach that goal with various types of living trusts, and with life insurance

policies. Bequests from wills during the next two years will not be sufficient to reach this objective. In fact, if we depend on bequests from wills alone to endow our institutions and agencies they will not be adequately endowed in time to avert an inevitable crisis that is coming in the future for all institutions that are not adequately endowed.

With this emergency in mind, the Foundation has provided plans by which most Baptists can do something toward helping to endow our Baptist causes. In addition to making an endowment bequest in one's will to the Foundation for any Baptist institution or agency, one may purchase a life insurance policy and name the Foundation trustee for any cause as beneficiary, or use any of the numerous living trust plans of the Foundation.

We name two types of living trusts that have been provided for individuals who have money they intend to come to the Foundation upon their deaths, but from which they need some income while living. They are plans by which the donor can "live on what he gives." These plans are:

1. **Gift Annuity**—This is a plan that has been in operation for several years. A number of individuals and couples have contributed either with a single or a joint and survivor gift annuity. The plan is simple. The donor (or donors) is paid an annuity as long as he lives, at a rate based on his age. The rate never changes. The rate is as high as 7.4 per cent for one person, and as high as 7.2 per cent for couples. The annuity is paid semiannually. This is one type of irrevocable trust. Upon the death of the donor (annuitant) the income from the corpus will be disbursed to the Baptist cause designated by the donor.

2. **Revocable Trust**—At the May meeting of the Foundation's directors a new type of revocable trust was approved. It was provided for those who can make a gift in money but should an emergency arise they may, upon a 60-day notice to the Foundation, recall a portion or all of the corpus of the gift. The Foundation will make a contract with the donor, agreeing to pay the net income earned on the gift up to 4½ per cent per annum during the life of the donor. Then upon his death the income from the corpus of the gift will be disbursed to the Baptist cause designated by the donor.

In the use of these two plans, or any other type of trust, the donor may designate his gift as undesignated endowment. When this is done, upon the death of the donor the income is disbursed to Baptist causes according to a schedule that is approved from time to time by the convention.

All told 283 trusts and wills have been written during the past 12 months with the assistance of the Foundation. We believe that a sizable number of other wills have been written as a result of the Foundation's promotion.

Production

Another question often asked is "What rate of income was produced by the Foundation during the past year?" Well, during the

year 1963 the net return of income from the investment portfolio was 4.697 per cent. This income was earned from the commercial investment pool, as rentals from real properties, interest on real estate first mortgage loans and from church building loans.

It is our hope that Oklahoma Baptists will keep in mind the fact that 50 per cent of the Foundation's investment portfolio is invested sometimes in church loans. This means that the donor who gives endowment is not only helping to provide an income for Baptist causes but that he at the same time is helping churches to provide for auditoriums, educational buildings and parsonages.

In order to be more specific 260 loans and committals for loans have been made to churches during the past 10 years. The importance of this program is not only seen in the number of churches assisted but in the fact that every penny earned in interest went to a Baptist cause.

A total of \$295,764.88 has been earned as endowment income and on other income-producing trusts during the past 12 months.

Personnel

Due to health conditions it was necessary for Sid Spears, Ada, to resign as a director in December, 1963. The Foundation appreciates the services of this devoted Baptist layman, who succeeded C. C. Morris on the board, and who served from Dec. 18, 1956, to Dec. 2, 1963.

At the spring meeting of the board, on May 4, 1964, James M. Thompson, Ada, was unanimously elected to succeed Spears. Thompson is a deacon in First Church, Ada, and has for many years been recognized as one of the leading businessmen of southern Oklahoma.

ELECTION OF DIRECTORS: In keeping with the Foundation's bylaws the Foundation's Board of Directors is recommending to the directors of the convention that the following Foundation directors be elected by the convention for a four-year term: **Hugh A. Persevering Recommendations

(1) That we "persevere to the end" of the Foundation's 10-year program, with an enthusiastic determination to reach the objective of \$10 million in endowment and other permanent trust funds. (Most of the other objectives have already been reached.)

(2) That we urge all state and associational leaders, pastors and other church leaders, to make plans for the presentation of the Foundation's 10-year program in state, associational and church meetings during 1965.

(3) It has always been a policy of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma to request the convention to approve the percentage of distribution of income from undesignated endowment funds. In keeping with this policy, and upon a request of the Camp Hudgens Committee that consideration be given for the inclusion of Camp Hudgens in the formula for the distribution of income for undesignated endowment funds, the Foundation recommends to the convention that the formula for 1965, and until it is changed by the convention, be as follows:

19. The Public Relations report was presented by Joe L. Ingram, secretary of Public Relations, and Floyd Craig, assistant secretary of Public Relations and director of Communications. Motion carried to adopt the report.

Floyd Craig spoke to the report, emphasizing the main plans for getting the Baptist message before the people of Oklahoma.

Public Relations

Joe L. Ingram, Secretary

Good public relations involves successful communication. And this has been the objective of the department as it continued to serve as the press representative of Baptist work to the 190 weekly and 55 daily newspapers; the 12 television and 52 radio stations, the two wire services and other state Baptist papers.

Assistance has been given to departments, institutions and agencies of the convention in the production of booklets, folders, posters and brochures. The department has also prepared visual materials using all types of photography, including filmstrips and motion pictures. Two new filmstrips were completed—one on the 12-year program of stewardship, "Blueprint for Mission Advance," and another for Camp Hudgens for Royal Ambassadors, "A Challenge for Youth."

Both the **Hospital News**, official publication of Oklahoma Baptist hospitals, and the **Falls Creek News** are edited by the department. The **Falls Creek News** carried in all 15 issues a new format with photographs—an innovation for the News.

An improvement of the recording and public address systems was completed at Falls Creek Assembly enabling special interviews of local church personalities to be made for 24 radio stations. Assem-

bly services were broadcast for all three weeks on KBYE, Oklahoma City, and KGLC, Miami.

A weekly five-minute radio newscast, "Oklahoma Baptist News," is produced and is enjoying its 72nd week of broadcasting over 15 Oklahoma stations.

In other radio work, three 15-minute music specials were produced featuring the church music department's workshops and festivals held at OBU. These specials logged approximately 12 hours of radio time on Oklahoma radio stations.

Press awards and the annual public relations conference are the responsibilities of the department. The 1965 conference is to be held in Oklahoma City, April 29. Each church is encouraged to send a representative to this "how to do it" meeting.

Miss Joan Harvison, former assistant editor of the **Southwestern News**, Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, was employed as staff writer during the year to fill a vacancy left open for two years. Miss Harvison writes and edits the news about Oklahoma Baptists and has assumed additional tasks of writing copy for certain brochures and booklets.

The public relations committee of the Board of Directors will give guidance to the 1965 program. Associational public relations chairmen will continue to be of assistance to churches.

In the context of Southern Baptists' life, good public relations can be thought of as doing whatever contributes toward making a church or convention deserve and receive the confidence and cooperation of increasing numbers of people. In still simpler form, it is making friends for Christ and his work.

20. J. C. Segler, president of the convention, brought the annual presidential address on the subject, "Reaffirmations of Our Faith." It was a well prepared message calling us away from modern theories of religion and the Bible and back to the Bible and Jesus as the authority for our faith and practice.

21. E. W. Westmoreland, secretary of the Department of Religious Education, presented the report of the Religious Education Department and motion carried for its adoption.

Clyde Clayton, Baptist Student Union director, spoke to the report regarding the work among students on our campuses.

Religious Education

E. W. Westmoreland, Secretary

We come to the end of the year 1964 with deep appreciation for the work our Oklahoma churches have done in the field of religious education during the last year; and our hopes have never been higher than they are for 1965. Attendance at all meetings which have to do with the promotion of Sunday school, Training Union and student work has been much larger this year than ever before; and as we have moved among the churches during the summer and early fall, we

have observed that far more planning is being done now than at any time in recent years.

The Department of Religious Education leads in the state promotion of Sunday school, Vacation Bible School, Training Union, Baptist Student Union, and in church building and church recreation service.

Those who serve in these areas of the work are: E. W. Westmoreland, department secretary and church building consultant; Clyde Clayton, director of Baptist Student Union; Lyle Garlow, superintendent of Sunday school; Fred Williams, director of Training Union; Hugh Willoby, director of youth and recreation; Alga Motychak, elementary secretary; Mrs. Dorothy Sneed, office supervisor and secretary to Westmoreland; Mrs. Leta Hall, secretary to Garlow; Mrs. Joan Garrison, secretary to Clayton; Mrs. Carolyn Dittmer, secretary to Williams; Mrs. Eula Mae Stewart, receptionist and office assistant.

Sunday School

The most significant development in Sunday school work in recent years was the response of approximately 2,500 people attending the two state Adult Thrust meetings in September, 1964. The Adult Thrust is the first all-out effort to reach people since 1954. This response indicated a new concern and sets us on the way toward 400,000 enrolled in Oklahoma Sunday schools by 1970. Reaching adults is essential to growth in every church and "Advance on all Fronts Waits on Advance on the Adult Front."

Oklahoma's 1963 Sunday school enrolment reached a total of 334,655, a gain of 2,510. Our state ranked seventh in the convention in the total number of awards in Category 17, Sunday School Principles and Methods, which is most excellent.

Standard Sunday school units during 1963 totaled 1,108, placing Oklahoma second in the convention as compared to third in 1962.

Associational Sunday school witnessing campaigns have been conducted in 20 associations and have stimulated a concern for witnessing.

Vacation Bible School enrolment reached a record high of 129,233 in the 1,116 schools. Professions of faith totaled 2,395 in 788 reporting schools. Two associations, Arbuckle and Concord-Kiowa, reported 100 per cent of their churches having a school.

The quality of work done by our churches during the last year and the concern expressed for reaching adults hold bright prospects of an upward trend in reaching people for Bible study. Preparation Week, 1964, with the new book, **Reaching All Prospects for the Church**, should get us off to a good start in the new Sunday school year.

Training Union

1. New lesson courses, tasks, learning procedures, planning guides and alternate union organization plans are now available to Training Union leaders. The future is both challenging and bright.

2. Of the 1,335 churches in Oklahoma, 1,152, or 87 per cent reported Training Union work in 1963. Of these 1,335 churches, 111 are Indian, of which 49 per cent report Training Union; while 1,224 are white churches with 90 per cent reporting Training Union work.

3. On Oct. 1, 1963, Training Union enrolment in Oklahoma was 132,967, a gain of 1.2 per cent over 1962.

4. "M" (Mobilization) Night was conducted Dec. 2, 1963 in every association in the state, with a total attendance of 16,992; 911 churches represented and 737 pastors present.

5. The "ABC Plan for Advancement in Training Union" was used by many churches during the months of July, August and September, 1964.

6. A state Adult Training Union interpretation clinic was conducted Oct. 3, 1963, with more than 700 in attendance.

7. Adult Training Union interpretation clinics were conducted in 20 associations during 1964, with 200 churches represented and 180 pastors attending.

8. Most of the associations conducted Youth Night in 1964, and many churches observed Youth Week.

9. A state youth convention was conducted in connection with the state drills and tournament, May 9, 1964, with 17 associations represented in one or more events and a total attendance of 557.

10. Eight associations report 100 per cent of their churches with Training Unions.

11. Church members earned 1,487 church study course awards in Category 18, from October 1963-September 1964.

12. Baptist Heritage Week (Church Membership Study Week) was promoted for the week of April 20-24, 1964.

13. The 100,000 Adult Training Union enlistment campaign was launched in October 1963. Oklahoma's goal is an additional 5,000 adults and their families enrolled in Training Union during 1964.

Baptist Student Work

All Oklahoma Baptists with an interest in a ministry to college students should be acquainted with a statement made by student workers from over the Southern Baptist Convention, known as "The Philosophy of Baptist Student Work." The statement is as follows:

"The Christian witness of Southern Baptist work in all institutions of higher learning is in response to our Lord's command to make known the gospel to all men.

"This witness is an integral part of the nature and mission of the church. The role of the churches is indispensable to the maturing spiritual, moral, and intellectual lives of students and faculty members.

"Because the university is engaged in the search for truth, of which God is the source, the Christian perspective is essential to the realization of the ultimate purpose of higher education.

"The unique nature of the university situation demands a specialized ministry by our denomination to the individuals in the campus community with their need for redemption and Christian nurture."

The purchase or erection of Baptist student centers has been an outstanding phase of the ministry of Baptists to students in Oklahoma.

Each of the 23 BSU's in the state has some meeting place provided by Baptists. In some instances, the place is a room in a Baptist institution. In most instances, however, it is a building provided for the use of students.

In 1964, new centers were completed in Tishomingo and Tulsa. A residence near the campus was purchased for use of students at Oklahoma College for Women in Chickasha. New structures were completed at Goodwell and Wilburton. These buildings, for the most part, are planned locally and financed by a church, groups of churches and associations. Many individuals have made contributions. All Oklahoma Baptists, through the Cooperative Program, have assisted in the purchase or erection of BSU centers. This assistance has totaled as much as one-third of a project not exceeding \$60,000. On a \$12,000 building, for instance, the convention will consider a contribution of \$4,000, payable over about two and one-half years. On a project costing \$60,000 or more, the convention will consider providing as much as \$20,000, payable over a period of several years. Since 1957, the convention has assisted with 16 centers.

Church Building

We are elated over the fact that our Oklahoma churches are now using a planning and survey committee to make a thorough study of their needs before plans for a new building are made. We especially enjoy this phase of our work because more and more we have come to believe that when a new church building is erected, that church has made permanent progress.

One has only to look at many of our present buildings to know that very little planning was done in advance of the actual building. That, however, has not been true in 1964. We are deeply grateful to the Architectural Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board for the terrific contribution they have made to Oklahoma in helping to plan church buildings.

We would like our constituents to know that the Department of Religious Education and the Architectural Department of the Sunday School Board stand ready at all times to assist pastors and committees in every way possible in planning the church buildings they need.

We would encourage planning and survey committees to take their time in making a study of church building needs. Many of the errors that have been made in planning buildings have been made by committees which started their buildings before they knew exactly what their needs were. Occasionally we see a church that is unhappy

with their building because they have found that it does not provide for the needs of the church. That church will be unhappy as long as the building lasts. We ought to begin to plan for a building at least one year before the actual construction begins.

22. T. B. Lackey, executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, brought the report of the Board of Directors.

Vote to adopt the report was reserved until the business session on Thursday afternoon.

Members of the Board of Directors were introduced as a group. Pastors, music and educational workers and their wives, who have come to our state during the past year, were welcomed.

Baptist Book Stores

The Baptist Book Stores in Oklahoma, serve the churches in Oklahoma in their needs for church records, supplies, hymnals, study course books, church music, church library and audio visuals. The Baptist Book Stores also cater to all denominations in their respective territory. The needs of the individual are also cared for with books of inspiration, teaching, and entertainment.

Both Baptist Book Stores employ 31 Christian employees dedicated to the service of the churches, associations, denominations, and individuals who come our way—into the stores or send orders through the mail. These men and women serve actively in the Southern Baptist Convention churches as teachers and officers, also in the financial program of the Lord's work.

The Baptist Book Stores are available for counsel and instruction as well as distribution. We have people qualified to give expert advice

in establishing church libraries, audio-visuals and church music. We can advise you on record systems on church finance, church membership rolls and the many other organizational records. The satisfying of needs of all of you for materials is the only reason for the existence of the Baptist Book Stores. We will be able to serve you in a better way as the program of all departments of state work is presented to us.

As managers of the respective Book Stores, may we cordially invite you to pay us a visit anytime. We want you to feel free to visit us or write us at any time we can be of service to you.

We are humble in asking for your prayers and in offering our continuing services to you and to the churches of the state of Oklahoma.

Religious Literature

In a world literally stormed on every hand by a deluge of printed matter—some of it good, but much of it exceedingly bad indeed—there is a definite need at this hour for wise production and distribution of wholesome religious literature. Christian people may resolve to offer a remedy for this world condition, but until such resolutions are backed by positive action on the part of leaders and individuals across our nation not much can be accomplished.

Distributing the Bible

There is no other source book for a true guide to Christian living but the Bible. Today the American Bible Society is to be commended for its valiant work as an organization that leads out in distribution of the Bible and Scripture portions in America and around the world. This important society finances the translation, publication and distribution of the Bible in many languages to many peoples. Our Baptist churches would do well to recognize and support this vital ministry.

Obscene Literature

Appalling figures are available on the amount of obscene literature that gets into the hands of teen-agers in America today. Post office officials report that they deal with increasing case rates each year. Distribution of pornographic materials is on the increase each year. There are bold, flagrant displays under the guise of art of this type of literature in most communities across Oklahoma. Any age person can buy it. Such filth preys upon young minds. Sex-related

crime and general moral decay continue. We deplore these conditions and urge the support of leaders and individuals in correcting them.

Our Own Publications

Within the Southern Baptist Convention there are many worthy materials published and distributed that present the claims of Christ upon human life. These we need to use more freely and urgently in our church programs. Magazines, books, periodicals, pamphlets, booklets, tracts and other items are available through the various agencies and are vital teaching and training aids.

We commend **Home Life** as a family magazine of excellence. It should be in every home, and made available to readers outside of Baptist homes. The **Commission** and **Home Mission** magazines present the world and home outreach of our denomination.

Other Christian literature, some of it not necessarily Baptist, is available through our Baptist Book stores. Many churches have a wealth of religious materials in their own loan libraries. Better use should be made of all of these.

Baptist Messenger

A well-edited state paper is an excellent piece of religious literature. Such is the **Baptist Messenger** in Oklahoma. It carries the Christian message to thousands of homes. News of statewide interest, doctrinal studies, pertinent and timely messages by prominent leaders, convention reports, editorial and other vital facts are included in the information that goes directly to Baptist families.

The **Messenger** is like a mirror, reflecting the Baptist image of Oklahoma and the nation. Providing a means of sending the **Baptist Messenger** into the home of each church member through the annual budget plan is an undertaking worthy of consideration by any church.

We commend Editor Jack Gritz upon 15 years of dedicated service, and the Baptist General Convention on the quality and message of the **Baptist Messenger** in Oklahoma.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Secretary

Abraham Lincoln once said, "We cannot escape history." History is the life of the past, and it provides the opportunities for, and sets the limits to, our lives in the present and the future. History is a study of life in the past, and the story derived from that study. Our

conceptions of the past have significant bearing upon our attitudes and actions in the present and the future.

In America's free society historians have a right to know the past as it actually was. Sometimes our supreme limitations in quest of the facts of the past are our own present biases. It is the historian's duty to be intellectually honest, to discover what can be learned from the past, then to preserve and make usable that information to current times and for posterity. History, therefore, is no idle pastime. It is essential to intelligent life, and contributes to the successful work of a free, democratic way of life. The Historical Commission, and the Historical Society, auxiliary to the commission, are both dedicated to serve the present and future interests of the Baptists of Oklahoma in the light of the above principles.

Commission Meetings

Two meetings of the Historical Commission were held in 1964. John W. Dowdy is chairman and Z. L. Brister is recording secretary.

Historical Society

There are 119 paid members of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society. J. W. Pace, Ringling, is president. O. O. Morgan, Anadarko, is vice-president and R. Y. Audd, Tulsa, is secretary. Annual meeting of the society will be at 5:45 p.m., Wed., Nov. 11, 1964 in the Green Room of First Church, Tulsa. These meetings are always open to persons interested in Baptist history, and those who wish to join the society may become members by paying a \$2 fee for annual dues or \$25 for a life membership.

History Clinics

July 10, 1964, the commission sponsored a history clinic at Cyril, for Caddo Baptist Association. Previous one-day clinics have been held at Hugo, Muskogee, Duncan, Heavener and Miami. Purpose of these clinics is to acquaint our people with methods of collecting, writing, preserving and using Baptist history.

Stubblefield Chapel

February 20, 1964 Stubblefield Chapel was dedicated at Oklahoma Baptist University. This late 19th century structure was the first house of worship of First Baptist Church, Shawnee. It was purchased, relocated and restored at OBU as a joint venture of the university and the Historical Commission. It will be a permanent history center.

Buckner Marker

June 9, 1964 a historical marker was dedicated at Eufaula marking the graves of H. F. Buckner, pioneer missionary to the Creek Indians, and others associated with him. George Horton, pastor, First Church, Eufaula and former member of the commission, led in arrangements for this project. Expenses for the marker were provided from the commission's budget, which comes from the Cooperative Program.

Books of History

During the year a promotional effort was made resulting in the sale of a large number of books on Oklahoma Baptist history, pub-

lished by the commission in recent years. The commission voted at its meeting Sept. 3, 1964 to continue this sale while the books last. Books for sale and the price of each volume in the series include: **Annals of OBU**, by James N. Owens, \$1; **Andrew Potter, Baptist Builder**, by Sam W. Scantlan, \$1; **Not Yours But You**, W. A. Carleton, 50 cents; **A Question Once Asked**, by Argye M. Briggs, \$1. A package price for all of these books in one purchase is only \$2.95. Order any or all of these from your Baptist Book Store.

Historical Collection

The commission's historical collection is in the library at Oklahoma Baptist University. E. W. Thornton has been working several months processing the collection to catalog the materials and make them easily usable for research purposes. Churches, associations and individuals are encouraged to deposit valuable items of historical interest in our collection for safekeeping and to make them accessible to persons doing research.

Series of New Books

In the commission's meeting Sept. 3, 1964, J. M. Gaskin, pastor, First Church, Durant, was selected to write a series of new books to be published during the next 10 years. Tentative titles of the books proposed in this order are: **Baptist Milestones in Oklahoma**, **The Falls Creek Story**, **A History of Oklahoma Baptists** and **Who's Who Among Oklahoma Baptists**.

Immediate Objectives

Churches and associations are encouraged to continue writing their histories and when possible have them published. The observance of Baptist heritage weeks or months in the churches afford excellent opportunities to focus attention upon history and lead the people to become better informed. A written history, fully documented, of every Baptist Student Union, hospital under the administration of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and all regional assemblies is desired. In so far as it is possible, the commission will co-operate with local groups and institutions in the preparation and publication of these histories, and many of them will be used as articles in the **Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**, if they meet the standards desired in research and documentation.

34. H. Truman Maxey, executive director of Department of Child Care, presented the report on Child Care. Motion carried for its adoption. Those present who assist with the Child Care program were introduced.

"Baptists Make Miracles" was the theme used by Maxey as he gave the history of child care work from its beginning to the present time. It has been a marvelous contribution in the lives of many needy children.

Child Care

H. Truman Maxey, Executive Director

In the past 12 months 332 boys and girls have received direct care through the five areas of service provided by the Baptist people of Oklahoma, namely, Baptist Children's Home, Boys Ranch Town, adoptions, foster family care, and family aid and counseling.

Two fine young ladies graduated from Oklahoma Baptist University this past spring. Eight from the home and two from the Boys Ranch Town graduated from high school. Seven are now enrolled in college.

Boys Ranch Town

Two new vocational education buildings have been completed. One was given in memory of William Frank Tubbs, by his wife, Ida Mae Tubbs. Auto mechanics, woodwork, printing, welding and other trades will be taught. The black-top road has been extended to these two new units and paid for by direct mail contributions. A small school bus was obtained by gifts of green stamps.

Baptist Children's Home

In 1941 the convention began to upgrade the Baptist Children's Home by building family or cottage-planned units. In 15 years, seven cottages were built. Then we had an eight-year building drouth except for the shops building in 1962. We had continued to use the two old dormitories which were outmoded and distressingly out of repair.

The child care committee of the Board of Directors both for 1963 and 1964 recommended that they be closed at the earliest possible time. As of Sept. 1, these buildings, the Winnie Mitchell Hall and the D. L. Martin Hall, were vacated and plans made for their removal. The total number of children will not be decreased. We will increase the number in the other seven units and place more in foster family care.

New cottages will be built as soon as we can find friends who would like to memorialize their family name. A professionally planned, fireproof cottage, costing approximately \$75,000 would be a home for 12 children and their houseparents. Three such units are needed now.

Committee to Study and Report

Several requests from associations and individuals have been made concerning the possibility of extension of services of the child care department in the area of: (1) Help for emotionally disturbed and delinquent girls, (2) The possibility of establishing a maternity home for unwed mothers. The Board of Directors asked the child

care committee to study these requests, survey the needs and to report back to the board at the earliest possible time.

Operational Budget

Income from endowment has increased each year. The allocation from Cooperative Program is \$105,000 for operation, \$5,000 for endowment and \$15,000 for buildings. The average cost is \$1,000 per day to operate the child care department with all its services. Each year we must by faith spend money we "hope to receive" during the year through the designated offerings.

We started the year 1964 with enough cash on hand for eight days. We depend upon the Baptist churches and their members to be faithful in presenting the opportunities for giving through the Birthday Offerings, Egg Offering, Thanksgiving Love Offering, clothing offering, and personal gifts so that the enlarged work of child care might be underwritten. We are truly "in your hands." The next very important day to child care and its operation is Nov. 15, when our churches will be receiving the Thanksgiving Love Offering. Remember our theme song is, "Stand By Me." Thank you Oklahoma Baptists.

A Denomination Remembers

"I love these little people," said Charles Dickens, "and it is not a slight thing, when they, who are so fresh from God, love us." But these words may well be described as the heartbeat of H. Truman Maxey. For through these 30 years he has loved the little people, and has, in turn, been loved by them.

A native Oklahoman, Truman Maxey has invested his life in the service of Christ in the state of his birth. His academic training plus the fatherly love which characterizes his life equipped him admirably for the work to which God was to call him. In 1934 he left the pastorate for the intimate relationship of a home for the homeless, to become the incarnate expression of his fellow-Baptists' love for little children. His efficient and devoted service has been expressed in his varied capacities as assistant superintendent of the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home, its resident manager, its superintendent, and for eight years as the executive director of the Department of Child Care for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. This department is comprised of the Baptist Children's City and the Boys Ranch Town, a unique ministry which began in 1953.

The success of Truman Maxey's leadership in these areas of service may be seen as they were and as they are today. Shortly after he

came to the Baptist Orphans' Home, a report to the state convention described the condition of the home.

"The home property is in a terribly dilapidated condition. . . . The lighting system needs to be rebuilt . . . the heating system needs to be junked . . . nearly every mattress at the home ought to be burned . . . there is scarcely any furniture worthy of the name in the boys' building."

Since that time seven well-equipped cottages have been built at the home plus an administration building, a commissary, an official residence, swimming pool, shop building and other facilities. Eight hundred additional acres of land have been purchased; an efficient and devoted staff second to none has been enlisted; so that today our Department of Child Care stands as a model and challenge in its field of service. All of this has been made possible largely through the generosity of Oklahoma Baptists who have confidence in Truman Maxey, who stands as a symbol of love and ability in child care and whose vision has served as a challenge for us to "visit the fatherless—in their affliction."

The service of this devoted man has extended beyond the borders of our state, as is evidenced by the fact that for two years he served as the first president of Child Care Executives among Southern Baptists. He continues to stand high in the councils of this labor of love. Oklahoma Baptist University recognized his accomplishments when in 1957 it conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Humanities.

But the greatest measure of his service is seen in the lives of a multitude of boys, girls, young men and women who under his guidance have achieved the better life to become useful Christian citizens throughout this land and in lands afar. He has served as "father," counsellor, guide, and inspiration. He has given his "daughters" away at the marriage altar, and has united many in holy wedlock setting them forward in the establishment of Christian homes. Wherever they may live and serve, these young people always know that they have a home to which they may return for love and advice from him who has ever been their source of strength and encouragement.

But through these years Doctor Maxey has not served alone. For always by his side has stood Mrs. Maxey, a mother in Israel to her "children." She has loved them and is loved by them. Together this devoted couple has walked arm in arm and heart to heart, as they have gone forward from victory unto victory in the greatest of all arenas of conquest, the arena of nurturing and developing human personality so that through regenerated hearts and transformed lives they might grow into the likeness of their heavenly Father.

As we pause to express our gratitude for you both, we also blend our vision with yours and join our hearts and hands with yours that, not only now but in the unfolding years, if our Lord delays his coming, we shall see the harvest of your labors in the fruits of your love.

You have answered the call of him who said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God." In his name you have taken little children into

your arms, placed your hands upon them; and been a blessing to them. Your greatest reward is to hear the "well done" of him who loved little children more than he loved himself.

A century and a half ago Thomas Scott expressed a truth which is timeless in its application. "A man cannot leave a better legacy to the world than a well-educated family"; the larger the family, the greater the legacy. How better can we express our gratitude and appreciation for John Wesley Raley than by recognizing in him a living commentary on these words uttered so long ago!

A Texan by birth and an Oklahoman by choice, his name is not so much written as engraved into the life of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. But more so, it is imbedded in the lives of an innumerable caravan of young people who have been set forward and guided in the pursuit for and realization of a more abundant living.

Coming to us with the best in academic training, including the doctor in theology degree, it was prophetic that he should begin his ministry in Oklahoma as a pastor. Thus in 1934 he brought to the presidency of Oklahoma Baptist University the scholarship of a sage enriched by the heart of a shepherd. In such capacity he began a 27 year tenure of service, a service encompassing more years than that of any other college president in the history of our state.

God has a man for every task, and there was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He was a modern-day Moses leading a small struggling school through the depression wilderness of financial hardship, and by his vision to stand on the Nebo heights of accomplishment viewing the Promised Land of even greater possibilities in its ever-beckoning future.

Statistics cannot tell the entire story. But they may become the outward reflection of an inward glory. During this man's administration at Oklahoma Baptist University, the school's property value increased from \$428,000 to more than \$7,000,000, with assets exceeding \$11,000,000. On its campus Raley led in the erection of 20 major buildings, the crowning glory of which is the John Wesley Raley Chapel, a one-million dollar structure which was dedicated in 1962. During this period Raley assembled about himself a dedicated and scholarly faculty which through the years has taught a flowing and ever-enlarging stream of young men and women. As chancellor of the university this consecrated, dynamic man continues to serve in the fields of public relations and of soliciting endowment for the university. It is no wonder, therefore, that he has been referred to variously as "Mr. OBU" and "The Little Giant of Bison Hill."

Alongside this great man stands a great woman, for it is impossible to think of the marvelous accomplishments at Oklahoma Baptist

University during these gigantic years without thinking also of Mrs. Helen Thames Raley. So as we honor Chancellor Raley, we honor Mrs. Raley also.

Yes, a man and a woman can leave no better legacy to the world than a well-educated family. Speaking for this devoted couple, Raley said recently, "Our graduates, whom we see in positions of responsibility all over the world, constitute the greatest reward of the 30 years of service. This is the reward; this is our family."

Dr. Raley, your visions for Oklahoma Baptist University are so great and far-reaching that they cannot possibly be realized fully in one lifetime. So as we honor you and your Elect Lady we would dedicate ourselves and, we pray, if our Lord delays his coming, those who shall come after us, that we shall mingle our dreams with yours; and shall continue to scale the vaulting heights toward a greater Oklahoma Baptist University, until we shall all march through the gates of glory to hear with you, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Evangelism

J. A. Pennington, Secretary

"Baptists must 'evangelize' or 'fossilize.' We must rescue the perishing or perish with the perishing," so stated Roland Q. Leavell some 25 years ago. It is still true today. Napoleon is quoted as having said, "Conquest has made me what I am, and conquest must maintain me." As Baptists we can truly say, "Evangelism has made us what we are and evangelism must maintain us."

But what is evangelism? C. E. Autrey has defined it in these words, "Evangelism is the outreach of the church by confrontation with the gospel of Christ to bring people to a personal faith and commitment to Christ as Savior and Lord, in order that the committed may become a part of the outreach." Autrey continues by stating,

"This definition of evangelism emphasizes that salvation is a personal experience with God, and it comes by personal faith in a personal Christ." This definition of evangelism, also, emphasizes the fact that the committed must become a part of the outreach. Any conception of evangelism that overlooks this important phase is inadequate.

Bible Methods

There are only two methods of evangelism taught in the word of God; namely, mass and personal. The word of God also teaches that evangelism is to be perennial. Any soul that was ever won to Christ by another, regardless of time, place or condition, was reached either through mass or personal evangelism. Neither of these methods can succeed without the other. By mass evangelism we mean all types of evangelistic approach to people in groups. Personal evangelism is the man to man or person to person approach. The task of winning men to Christ and of building Christlike character in them should not be done spasmodically. It should be a perennial effort—day by day and week by week.

The Annual Religious Census

To make evangelism effective in any church we must know who the people are and where they are before we can win them to Christ. Securing the desired information can best be done through the religious census. Possibly, the best time of the year for the census is in September. This makes possible the most effective use of the information obtained.

The Prospect File

The information which has been secured from the census should be made available to all of the organizations of the church. Therefore, an accurate up-to-date prospect file is a necessity for a perennial program of evangelism in any church.

Personal Evangelism

Personal evangelism is "every Christian's job." The Lord has commanded all saved people, "Ye are witnesses of these things" (Luke 24:40). Every church should strive to enlist and train every member of the church to be personal soul winners. To assist the churches in this task the following programs and materials are available:

1. Soul-Winning Commitment Day (Suggested date is the first Sunday of the year.)
2. Soul-Winning Training (Materials for three training sessions are provided in the Pastor's Guide.)
3. Cultivative Commitment Witnessing.
4. The Sunday School Witnessing Campaign.

Mass Evangelism

This group effort of reaching people for Christ should be done by the Sunday school and all other organizations of the church and in the worship services each week. Evangelism should be a perennial effort in every church. However, we should not neglect special revival meetings. In every Baptist church there is the need for two or more

revival meetings every year. In 1958-59 we had only 46 churches that did not have a revival meeting. In 1962-63 this number increased to 98 churches reporting no revival meeting. We can permit our church program to become so full that there is no time for the revival and the preparation necessary for an effective meeting.

Churches with two or more revival meetings per year are reaching more people for Christ. In a study of the records for 1962-63 we found that the churches with no revival meetings averaged 3.7 baptisms for the year. Those with one revival meeting averaged 7.5 baptisms, those with two averaged 14.9 and those with three revival meetings averaged 27.4 baptisms for the year.

Simultaneous Revivals

What is a simultaneous revival? "An associational simultaneous revival is one in which the churches of like faith and convictions enter into a revival meeting in each local church beginning on the same day and closing on the same day." It is definitely a concerted effort, all of the churches doing the same thing the same way at the same time. This type of revival effort has proved to be the most effective method in promoting mass evangelism in recent years.

Since 1948 Oklahoma Baptists have been promoting the annual simultaneous revival as a definite part of our program of evangelism. We have the associational simultaneous revival reports for 15 of these 16 years. These reports show 103,996 people made professions of faith and joined our churches for baptism. This is approximately 36 per cent of our total baptisms for these 15 years.

For 10 years we adhered very closely to the original plans for preparation and promotion of the simultaneous revival program. Most of our churches participated in the revivals for the two full weeks. The Lord blessed our efforts and we rejoiced in many souls won to Christ. In the last few years we have drifted away from this phase of our program. We dropped the annual census, the length of the revival meetings was shortened, and many other phases of the program were left out. As a result of this and other factors our baptisms have declined from year to year.

What of the Future?

What of the future for the simultaneous revival effort? It can still be effective if followed according to the original plans and promoted with zeal and enthusiasm. But let us emphasize again that every program, method and technique, must be undergirded with prayer and energized by the Holy Spirit to be effective.

It is the consensus of this committee that every pastor and the leadership in each association is vitally concerned about this our pre-eminent task, EVANGELISM. We believe that you seek to know God's will and follow the Holy Spirit's leadship in all you do. Therefore, we would urge you to pray earnestly as you plan for the future. Do that which you feel is wise and would be most effective in reaching people for the Lord. If the simultaneous effort has lost its effectiveness in your association or church, then drop it for a year or so,

or until the time when you feel that the churches can with zeal and enthusiasm enter into such a program. Remember, you are accountable only to the Lord for your stewardship. You must do that which he would have you to do.

Area Revivals

In recent years the area crusade has proven very successful in reaching people for Christ. The area crusade is a co-operative effort by the churches of a given area to join hands and hearts to see revival in that area. The services are held in a central or suitable place every night for the duration of the revival. If the area churches are properly organized, the meeting well publicized, and the people led to agonize in prayer, genuine revival will result. Such revivals are more effective if they are not held too often. Possibly every three or four years would be best.

Simultaneous Citywide Crusades

John Dowdy, pastor of First Church, Guthrie, reports that for three years the city of Guthrie has had a citywide simultaneous "Crusade for Christ." The crusade lasted for eight days. The churches of all denominations, except the Catholic, have co-operated. Each church has its own meeting, followed their own plans, and enlisted their own evangelistic help. This one week was set aside as a time when there were to be no activities in the schools, civic clubs, fraternal organizations or any other groups that would interfere with the revival effort. With long range planning they were able to secure enthusiastic co-operation from these groups.

With such a crusade, Dowdy reports, "A tremendous impression is made on the community during the week. The cause of Christ is set forth in the newspaper, on the radio, in the clubs and fraternal organizations, in the business associations and in the schools, as it could not have been done by the efforts of one denomination."

This is not a union meeting. It would not follow the same pattern as has been used in our associational simultaneous revivals.

This type of revival effort could be very effective in many of our large towns and cities across our state. This would offer a new approach to our evangelistic effort.

Associational Evangelism Clinics

A well-planned and properly-timed associational evangelism clinic can provide excellent preparation for revival. This should be a part of the evangelism program in each association every year. Thirty of these clinics were scheduled for 1963-64. Reports have been received from 27 associations revealing 497 churches represented, with a total attendance of 3,884, and 414 of these were pastors.

Statewide Evangelistic Conference

This conference will meet Jan. 25, 26, 27, 1965 in First Church, Enid. Our out-of-state speakers will be Vernon Yearby, of the Division of Evangelism of the Home Mission Board; Vance Havner, Greensboro, N. C.; Harper Shannon, pastor of First Church, Dothan, Ala.; Wayne Dehoney, president of the Southern Baptist Convention,

and John T. Sisemore, supervisor, Adult Field Services Unit of the Sunday School Department of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors

J. A. Pennington, Secretary

The number of Brotherhood organizations in Oklahoma is up slightly from last year with a total of 604 reported this year. The total enrolment is 11,429.

One of the outstanding events this year was the West Coast Laymen's Crusade. Of the 896 men who participated in the crusade in California, Oregon and Washington, 78 were from Oklahoma. A total of 29,141 visits were reported for the entire crusade with 6,109 decisions made. This includes 1,205 professions of faith.

A total of 76 associational Brotherhood officers met for an overnight training session at Camp Hudgens.

Our Concerns for the Coming Year

The year 1964-65 has been designated as a year of enlargement for Brotherhood work in Oklahoma. The goal for this effort is a 10 per cent increase in the number of Brotherhood organizations and also a 10 per cent increase in Brotherhood enrolment. We also

plan to increase by 10 per cent the circulation of the **Brotherhood Journal** and the **Brotherhood Handbook**. These enlargement efforts will require planning and work on the part of each Brotherhood. It is suggested that each organization adopt goals that would be equal to or above the 10 per cent goal set for the state.

Royal Ambassador Report

Royal Ambassador work continues to show growth, though not as great as in previous years. During 1964, there were seven additional churches with chapters making a total of 563 and 30 new chapters for a total of 1,047.

The goal for 1965 is 1,200 Royal Ambassador chapters in 600 churches and a 10 per cent increase in enrolment.

The state Royal Ambassador Congress meeting in Oklahoma City had its largest attendance ever with 2,800 boys and leaders attending.

The attendance goal for the 1965 Congress meeting in Tulsa, March 5-6, is 3,000 boys and leaders.

Camp Hudgens Report

"Camp Hudgens—for the cause of world missions" was certainly evident in the visible results of the six weeks of camps in 1964 with a total of 133 life decisions. Of the total, there were 28 professions of faith, 63 rededications, 24 for church-related vocations, and 18 mission volunteers. Not so tangible, but evident and important, was the spiritual growth experienced by campers.

There was a total of 674 boys and leaders in attendance at Camp Hudgens. Unfortunately, 75 boys had to be denied attendance because there was no room for them—29 percent of them were not Christians! Oklahoma Baptists must meet the needs of boys in the state who want a camping experience such as that provided at Hudgens.

The camp was not only used by state RA camps but by 13 different church and associational groups with a total attendance of 1,366 for the year.

39. During the business session, H. H. Hobbs brought the report of the Referral and Resources Committee which was concerned with the Teacher and Teaching situation in Oklahoma Baptist University.

Progress Report of the Referral and Resources Committee

Early last summer certain matters relating to the academic and extracurricula life of Oklahoma Baptist University were presented to President James Ralph Scales by an interested group of pastors. Subsequently a committee from the Board of Trustees was appointed by the President of the Board of Trustees, in co-operation with President Scales, to look into these matters and also to make a study of certain long range objectives pertaining to the life of the university. This committee is composed of Charles Myers, Finley W. Tinnin, Richard Peterson, Charles Green, J. Ray Smith, and Warren C. Hultgren, with the speaker as chairman. President Scales and T. B. Lackey have by invitation been meeting with the committee.

Early in September this committee held the first of several meetings to determine the scope of its responsibility and to establish methods of procedure. Subsequently a notice was published in the **Baptist Messenger** listing the committee personnel and requesting anyone who so desired to contact any member of the committee with respect to matters concerning the university. To date no matters have been brought to the committee other than the initial presentation made to President Scales. One request has been made for the privilege of appearing before the committee to express appreciation for the university.

Since its initial meeting the committee has met four times. At the first of these additional meetings certain interested brethren were invited to confer with the committee with respect to the matters which had been presented to President Scales. In this meeting a most wholesome atmosphere prevailed as these matters were presented to the committee. A second meeting was held by the committee to discuss these items and to determine procedure from that point forward.

Through President Scales, Dean Neptune of the university requested the privilege of meeting with the committee. Following said meeting a further meeting was held with Dean Neptune and certain members of the university faculty who had requested the privilege of conferring with the committee. For six and one-half hours this group discussed thoroughly the matters which were before the committee and which are of mutual concern. As Christian brethren the group prayerfully, frankly and thoroughly considered these matters. It was felt by all who were present that the meeting was most wholesome and helpful toward producing a mutual understanding of the problems, program and ideals of the university relative to the matter of Christian education.

The committee expresses its appreciation to those who presented these matters, to T. B. Lackey, and to the administration and faculty of Oklahoma Baptist University for their excellent co-operation in the study that is being made. It asks your patience and prayers as the study continues, not only with regard to present matters but concern-

ing recommendations as to future policies and programs for the school which is dear to all of our hearts.

When your committee shall have completed its study a full report will be made to the Board of Trustees, the body which brought the committee into being.

Church Music

Music schools, festivals, youth music workshops, choir directors' retreats, Falls Creek, Singing Churchmen concerts, and conventions are only a few areas in which your Church Music Department works.

Our efforts this year prompted such statements as: **YOUTH MUSIC WORKSHOP**—"Music is something that may stir one's soul. I believe my greatest experience of this nature took place last June on a warm and humid night. The 200-voice choir was in its place. The conductor gave the first downbeat, and the choir began to sing. The sound produced thrilled my innermost emotions as we sang 'Great is the Lord and greatly to be praised.' The concert continued, and as the end drew nearer, excitement rose. Finally the chords of the last composition were heard. All who participated uttered a silent prayer to God for music which may turn one's thoughts and emotions from laughter to sorrow, from hatred to love, but most of all from man to God."

"As always the workshop continues to be one of the finest opportunities available to Oklahoma youth musicians. It lifts the soul to both musical and spiritual heights, and it is an incomparable blessing."

"This has been an excellent workshop. It was my first and I was truly impressed."

We especially desire to serve the small church both in the rural and city areas. Our ministry at Falls Creek will be greatly improved with the building of the B. B. McKinney Chapel. We hope to dedicate it next year.

5. **Within a Little Stable**, Graham (Christmas Cantata) for Juniors with recording.

6. **His Saving Grace Proclaim**, Hooper (Cantata for SAB choirs). Record available.

7. **The Lord Emmanuel**, Graham (Christmas cantata for mixed voices SATB). Easy to perform. Record available.

One of the greatest and most useful books ever to be published by the Sunday School Board is **Hymns of Our Faith** by William J. Reynolds. It is the handbook for **The Baptist Hymnal** and has historical and inspirational material concerning every hymn in the **Baptist Hymnal**.

L. Taylor Daniel, associate secretary of the Annuity Board, outlined the progress of the program offered by this Southern Baptist Convention board.

Annuity Board

On Oct. 1, 1964, the Annuity Board broadened its ministry to Southern Baptists by putting into effect the new Life Benefit Plan, a group term plan.

The Life Benefit Plan provides low cost protection against death in active service, disability or age retirement for any church or denominational employee who receives a salary from a Southern Baptist agency or church.

Benefits in the Life Benefit Plan are based on the participant's annual salary and age. Benefits are between \$10,000 and \$30,000 for a participant through age 45. At age 46, benefits are scaled down progressively to retirement. The plan also provides for double benefits in the event of accidental death; waiver of dues in case of disability; and a paid up benefit of up to \$1,000 if the participant joins when he is first eligible and continues actively for at least 10 years.

Cost for this protection is one per cent of the participant's annual salary with a minimum salary basis of \$4,000 and a maximum of \$12,000 a year.

Detailed information is available on this plan from the Annuity Board, 511 North Akard Building, Dallas, Texas.

The Life Benefit Plan is the first in a series of life and health plans. Health plans including hospitalization, surgical and major medical are in the early stages of study by the Annuity Board and its actuary. They should be ready for announcement in January, 1965. So watch your mail and state papers for the announcements of these important health plans.

Hospitals and Golden Age Homes

William G. Kersh, Executive Director

The month of November, 1963 saw the Grove Medical Center at Grove added to our hospital ministry. This has proved to be one of the best small hospitals in Oklahoma. Operating with an average daily census of about 20 patients, it has met with remarkable acceptance by the people of the Grand Lake area. We shall always be grateful to Norman C. Cotner and others of the Grove Community whose gifts to us made the Grove Medical Center possible.

The Miami Baptist Hospital opened a new addition to its building. This brings the possible bed capacity to 110 beds. Work is going on now that will modernize some of the older parts of the building. All this has been made possible by contributions from the people of the community and the excellent administration of W. C. Campbell.

Under the capable hand of Herbert M. Usry, Grand Valley Hospital at Pryor, has built and occupied a new medical records building. Public dining facilities have also been added, meeting a real need. Ed Foreman retired from the hospital chaplaincy at Grand Valley and Francis Broyles was appointed as the new chaplain.

George Hart, administrator of the Sayre Hospital, led in the construction of a new storage building for the hospital, and a new kitchen and dining room at the Chronic and Convalescent Hospital. This building has been almost completely redecorated and the hospital has a waiting list of those who would like admission.

Cordell Memorial Hospital is soon to undergo the rigors of expansion. Bennie Hargrave has done a splendid job of administration and the hospital has been crowded the last three years. The city of Cordell voted a bond issue and will add 12 beds to this building. A contract is expected to be let before this year is up.

The construction of four additional floors on Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City, is well under way. When the building is finished late in 1965 we will have 400 beds and an excellent medical center. The hospital has been constantly in a state of growth almost from its inception. James L. Henry has demonstrated remarkable administrative ability in the development of the hospital.

The contract has been let for the construction of two floors on the Doctor's Medical Building. Agreements of intent have already been signed for about 75 per cent of the new space.

The Enid General Hospital has undergone a complete change in appearance. The old roof of clay tile is gone, and a new flat roof has been constructed. A new elevator has been installed, and total air conditioning has been added. The decorating program begun last year is nearing completion. The insight and ability of Joe Baker in getting the most out of a construction dollar have enabled us to have a hospital there of which we can be proud.

The hospitals at Bristow, Robert S. Bazzell, administrator; Stillwater Municipal, David C. Foster, administrator; Southwest Baptist, Mangum, Ralph A. Hill, administrator, and Perry Memorial, C. E. Hendricks, administrator, are continuing their services in a manner that is most satisfactory. We can never know the extent of our ministry through all of our hospitals. We are sure that it is a good work and deserves the best of support from all our churches.

Golden Age Homes

The Hugo Golden Age Home moved into the new J. Frank Murrell addition on Mother's Day. This brings our capacity at Hugo to 61 residents. At the rate the new rooms are being occupied, we can expect all the available space to be filled by this winter.

The Golden Age Home in Oklahoma City, under the direction of Baptist Laymen's Corporation and John Strutton, administrator, is moving along well. Building plans are presently being drawn, and we hope to go to bid within the next two or three months. This Golden Age Home is to be a 62-bed nursing home, and four different types of apartments. The development of this home promises to be one of the finest things we have ever done.

The construction of the homes is a real financial burden. The Mother's Day Golden Age Homes offering has been designated to help shift the burden. We must help pay for the new wing at Hugo, as well as lend assistance for construction in Oklahoma City. It will take the wholehearted support of every church and every pastor if we are to meet these needs.

59. Evans T. Moseley, assistant to the president of Oklahoma Baptist University, presented the report of the university and motion carried for its adoption.

Verses from Luke 9 and 10 were read by Moseley.

Robert Cargill, Hollis, led in prayer and continued after his prayer with words of appreciation for our university.

Ed Sanders, missionary to Indonesia and former student at OBU, spoke about the influence of the school in his life and in the lives of other missionaries.

The Bison Glee Club, under direction of Warren Angell, sang two numbers.

Ferne Hooper, Lawton, president of the Student Government Association, brought greetings from the student body at the university.

Walter Wan, a music student, sang "The Greatest of These Is Love."

President James Ralph Scales delivered his annual message to the convention, during which he recounted the contribution OBU students have made in this needy world.

Following a number by the Bison Glee Club, Ed Sanders led the prayer of benediction.

Oklahoma Baptist University

James R. Scales, President

Through Saturday, Sept., 12, some 1,373 students had enrolled in the various fall programs at Oklahoma Baptist University. Enrollment on campus was not complete at that time, and no figures were available on extension courses. Final enrollment should be in the neighborhood of 1,450 students.

OBU offers enrollment in regular day classes, the evening college, extension classes, a special hospital administrator's program, and college preparatory coursework.

The religious extension program, conducted for a number of years in Oklahoma City and expanded last year to Ardmore, takes on a new look this year with six new cities in Oklahoma and one in Kansas. Under the direction of Evans T. Moseley, extension courses will be taught in Altus, by C. E. Garrison; in Hobart, by Jerry L. Barnes; in McAlester, by Charles E. Myers; in Ponca City, James E. Still; in Tahlequah, by Joel N. Blanton; in Woodward, by Clyde L. Riddle; in Wichita, Kan., by Stan Nelson; in Oklahoma City, by M. E. Ramay, and in Ardmore, by Richard T. Hopper.

Courses this semester include "Old Testament History and Literature," "Christian Doctrines" and "New Testament History and Literature." Extension classes will also be offered at these locations during the spring semester.

Oklahoma Baptist University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities, the National Association of Schools of Music, and the National League of Nursing. The university holds membership in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the university alumnae are approved for membership in the American Association of University Women.

The 1964-65 faculty includes 87 full-time instructors and 40 part-time instructors, assistants and lecturers, an increase of nine full-time staff members and 16 part-time instructors. Twenty-nine of the faculty members have obtained the highest academic degrees—Ph.D., Th.D., D.Ed., D.M.A. Six of the part-time faculty members also hold doctorates.

Four new faculty members have only recently completed studies in Europe, and John Eighmy, associate professor of history, was a Fulbright Fellowship winner this past summer, studying Chinese Civilization in Taiwan University.

Bob Bass, director of athletics, was selected to manage U. S. State Department goodwill basketball tour in parts of South America and the Caribbean Islands. The two-month instructional tour included

Surinam, Curacao, Trinidad, Guadeloupe, and Barbados. Upon returning to the U.S., Bass spent one day in Washington, D.C., reporting to the State Department on the success of the tour.

Joining the OBU staff this fall is the university's first full-time alumni secretary. Robert D. Alcorn, prominent Shawnee businessman and civic leader, will be working to develop an active alumni program in the future.

OBU's third annual European study course was successfully completed this past summer under the direction of Professor LeRoy Bond. Some 33 students participated in the program, which is designed to stress the liberal arts. Bond, head of the art department, was assisted in teaching duties by Myrtle Merrill and Katherine Rader. Merrill is on the OBU music faculty and Rader is professor of English at OBU. The English emphasis was on the 400th anniversary of Shakespeare's birth.

The physical plant department was extremely busy during the past summer. So far in 1964 work has been completed on the Van Deren Chapel organ, the Stubblefield pioneer church, periodical reading room in Brittain Library, the repair of damages to Shawnee Hall and the renewal of 11 classrooms and Dorland Theatre, complete redecoration of the Women's Missionary Union Memorial Dormitory, and the air conditioning of the lecture-recital hall in Raley Chapel.

Still to be completed are the refurnishing of Baxter Hall, the resurfacing of the tennis courts and installation of backstops, and the modernization of WMU swimming pool. In the planning stages are the air conditioning of the dining hall in Brotherhood Dormitory; new stagecraft facilities for Dorland Theatre, and further expansion of the basement of Raley Chapel—all pending the availability of funds.

As of May 31, 1964, the value of the OBU physical plant was more than \$8 million.

The endowment, held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, now has book value of \$2,572,000. These funds are supervised and invested by the foundation, and the earnings are used to help underwrite operating expenses of the university, scholarship grants and student loan funds.

The lifeline of the university's support is the Cooperative Program of the Baptist General Convention, which this fiscal year furnished \$279,800 for general operations, \$73,000 for building debts and \$45,000 for endowment.

65. Warren Terry, Oklahoma City, presented the report of the Christian Life Committee and motion carried to adopt the report.

Ross McLennan, executive secretary of SANE, spoke to the report emphasizing the challenge of alcohol and narcotics as it exists in Oklahoma.

Christian Life Report

The purpose of the Christian Life Commission is to carry into every area of Southern Baptist life a reminder, that in every facet of our work, we must be Christian not only in word, but in deed.

Paul B. Clark, a member of this committee, in writing on the subject of race relations says, "The problem of race relation is by no means the only domestic difficulty in America, but it certainly is one of the biggest." To such a problem there is no small or easy answer, but the Christian knows that the answer must be found in the will of God through Jesus Christ.

The Christian remembers that all men are created in the image of God! And for one race to positionize itself above another is to deny the Sovereignty of God. The words of the poet are a challenge to us in our day.

"In Christ there is no East or West, In Him no South or North."

"Join Hands, then brother of the faith. What e'er your race may be: Who serves my Father as a son is surely kin to me."

We urge every pastor and church leader, through preaching, teaching and example, to plant the seeds of love and good will toward all men in order that our people might grow in their understanding of the will of God in human relationships.

Philip B. Harris, editor of our **Training Union Magazine** says, "Southern Baptists face the most deteriorated moral conditions America has ever known.

1. Sunday desecration figures boldly in America's moral slump.
2. The collapse of America's home life is staggering.
3. The liquor traffic steadily increases the carnage of America's misery.
4. Our schools continue to feel the tightening harness of paganistic trends.

Our preachers and teachers and colleges, seminaries and every institution of our denomination must sound the trumpet against further destruction of America's morals.

We are reminded by Luther Griffin another committee member that, "Oklahoma Baptists must stand up and be counted. Insidious attempts by wicked men will be made to bring legalized gambling into our state.

"To legalize gambling and bring pari-mutuel betting into our state will breed further crime and kindred evils. The environment that would be created would deal a devastating blow to our economy and would create what would be a most unhealthy atmosphere for our youth."

The apostle Paul says in II Corinthians 5:17, "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature, old things are passed away; behold all things are become new." Again Paul says, "Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you."

So as Christians and Oklahoma Baptists we must take our stand against every evil that would destroy us or render the church less effective.

American Bible Society

"God's Word for a New Age" is the theme of a program of missionary advance in which the American Bible Society is seeking to provide greatly increased quantities of Scriptures urgently needed for mission work around the world

If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

But, in most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay after he must leave—and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists. It serves mission work at home and abroad. It helps missionaries to translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. For the blind, it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems and talking book records.

In the program of "God's Word for a New Age" your American Bible Society is working in co-operation with 22 other national Bible Societies throughout the world.

The goal for the years just ahead is to increase the total world-wide Scripture distribution to 150 million volumes per year, which is three times the present global distribution, with half of this goal (75 million volumes per year) being undertaken by the American Bible Society. The long-range goals are:

A Bible for every Christian home

At least a New Testament for every Christian

At least a Scripture Portion for all who can read

An opportunity for every Christian to distribute Scriptures
in personal witness

During 1963 the American Bible Society—

- rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1,216 languages; the full Bible in 231, a Testament in 290 more, a Gospel or other complete book in 695 more—but counted over 1000 more languages in which no book of the Bible has yet been published.
- gave almost a million Scripture volumes for distribution by chaplains to our armed forces and veterans' hospitals, as a vital link between the home churches and men in service.
- distributed a record total of over 34 million Scripture volumes in 444 languages, in more than 120 countries—with almost half the total going to other countries—and dedicated itself to the task of doubling its annual distribution to meet urgent worldwide needs.

Southern Baptists Support the Work

Because the Bible Society serves mission work—and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people—Southern Baptists believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

In 1963 Southern Baptist churches gave \$167,498 to the American Bible Society. Methodist gifts were \$172,771. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$1,120,277.

67. H. Tom Wiles, Lawton, brought the report of the Convention Building Committee and motion carried for its adoption.

Convention Building Committee

Each year the convention elects a building committee to work with institutions in supervising and correlating building programs. Those serving on this committee since the last convention are: H. Tom Wiles, Larry Eakin, W. F. Crow, T. Hollis Epton, M. L. Jones, H. E. Alsup, L. E. Maples, Frank Baugh, Ted Coldiron, Hollis Morris and George Horton. H. Alton Webb was an original member of this committee, but is now serving as assistant administrator of Miami Baptist Hospital. At the April 22, 1964 meeting, T. Hollis Epton was elected chairman. It is the policy of the committee to appoint or elect sub-committees or local members to work with other officials in planning and construction of local building projects.

Assets and Liabilities

B. B. McKinney Chapel

The Board of Directors voted that, when one-half of the funds needed for constructing a chapel-music building at Falls Creek was available and when Falls Creek Assembly obligations on other projects were liquidated, the building committee be authorized to start construction. These requirements have been met; therefore, ground was broken on Friday of each of the three assemblies during the summer of 1964. The building, which will cost approximately \$60,000 and will seat 500 people, is now under construction. The committee asked the business manager of Falls Creek Assembly, Sam W. Scantlan, and the resident manager, Ezra Edwards, to serve as superintendents of construction. The sub-committee to work with these men is composed of T. Hollis Epton, Larry Eakin, Tom Wiles and W. F. Crow. The Board of Directors, upon recommendation of the Missions-Falls Creek Committee, named this building the B. B. McKinney Chapel in memory of the late B. B. McKinney, who directed music at Falls Creek for many years.

This chapel will be used by the Church Music Department during the summer assemblies and by various groups throughout the year. It will be air-conditioned and heated, and should be finished and ready for use by the 1965 assemblies.

Baptist Memorial Hospital and Doctors Medical Building

Construction is progressing on the four million dollar expansion of Baptist Memorial Hospital. The committee guiding this project is made up of representatives from the Convention Building Committee, the Hospital Governing Board and Advisory Board, as follows: Ray Young, chairman, O. C. Brown, James Battle, R. C. Howard, H. B. Lee, Marvin Staton, Warren Terry and Harvey Elledge. Ex-officio members are T. B. Lackey, William G. Kersh and James L. Henry. Joe Dee Ray and Luther Cox were original members of the committee, but have both left the state. A contract was awarded July 13, 1964 to Manhattan Construction Company in the amount of \$368,602 for adding two floors to the Doctors Medical Building, which will increase this building to a capacity of 60 physicians. Four

additional floors may be added as needed. This building is self-liquidating. The committee for this project is made up of hospital governing board members, as follows: H. H. Raborn, chairman, R. H. Nicholson, H. B. Lee, James Battle and R. C. Howard.

More information on this building project will be found in the report of the Board of Directors and the report of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes.

Hugo Golden Age Home

The new wing on the Hugo Golden Age Home was completed, dedicated and opened on Mother's Day, May 10, 1964. Capacity of the Home was increased from 33 to 61. Cost of new construction, furnishings and equipment was around \$140,000. We now have a beautiful home at Hugo, valued at approximately \$400,000. The local governing board was asked to serve as building committee during construction.

Trades-Educational Building

The committee awarded a contract to Liebolt Construction Company in the amount of \$47,780 on May 22, 1964, for construction of the Trades-Educational Building at Boys Ranch Town. The committee also approved resurfacing of streets and parkway at Boys Ranch Town. Both projects are completed. The sub-committee working with H. Truman Maxey and Charles Boldin are Hollis Morris, Frank Baugh and H. E. Alsop.

Baptist Building Expansion

A contract in the amount of \$145,918 was awarded to J. J. Cook Construction Company Sept. 1, 1964 for expansion of the Baptist Building. This addition will almost double Book Store space and increase Baptist Messenger print shop space by approximately 40 per cent. It will also provide additional storage for all offices in the Baptist Building. A new 15-year lease contract has been signed with the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board. Monthly income from rental on Book Store space will be adequate to amortize payment of this expansion over a period of approximately 19 years. The committee working on this project is made up of local members of the Convention Building Committee and local members of the Board of Directors as follows: Johnie Stuckey, chairman, Kenneth Staton, Robert S. Scales, T. T. Crabtree, Francis White, Frank Baugh, Guy James, John Shelton, Hugh Bumpas, and M. L. Jones. Luther Cox and Joe Dee Ray were also original members of this committee.

Camp Hudgens

A special committee composed of George Horton, M. L. Jones and L. E. Maples was appointed to work with Bob Banks, T. B. Lackey and the architects in making preliminary plans for a dining hall at Camp Hudgens. Date for construction will be determined by the availability of funds.

Oklahoma City Golden Age Home

The convention asked the Baptist Laymen's Corporation to assume responsibility for building and operating the Oklahoma City

Golden Age Home. Plans are being drawn and the Laymen's Corporation expects to have the nursing home for 60 residents and apartments for 40 residents under construction very soon. Other units will be added as needed. Although this is not a responsibility of your building committee, we are still very interested in the development of this much needed facility.

Baptist Student Union Buildings

From 1957 to 1964 the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has assisted or has made commitments to assist in erection or purchase of fifteen Baptist Student Center buildings. Total funds committed through 1964 are \$134,016. The convention assists local groups in financing of projects to the extent of one-third of cost of the project not to exceed \$60,000. In other words, the convention's maximum participation in any BSU building project is \$20,000. The Religious Education Committee of the Board of Directors determines allocations of building funds for BSU construction. Like other convention building funds, these are contingent on the convention's entire budget being reached.

68. Jack Carroll, Seminole, brought the report of the Committee on Resolutions, which was presented in nine sections.

I. Bill G. West, Okmulgee, brought the first resolution on separation of church and state.

WHEREAS, it is an irrefutable historical fact that the First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which guarantees the separation of church and state, can be credited to the influence of Baptists; and

WHEREAS, this sacred safeguard to religious liberty is being attacked from without, and is in danger of erosion from within;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT this Convention reaffirm its commitment to the principle of the separation of church and state as provided for by the First Amendment and apply the principle, with conviction, in such practical matters as:

(1) **Opposing** an alteration of the First Amendment;

(2) **Instructing** all Convention agencies and institutions to refuse any federal funds that could in any way be construed as grants or subsidies;

(3) **Admonishing** local churches and associations to refuse materials or services that represent tax dollars, such as food commodities or the improvement and upkeep of church parking facilities by any city or county agency.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the rising tide of atheism be resisted by all due process of law and countered with the most vigorous and aggressive propagation of the gospel that has been known in the history of the nation.

II. The second resolution on involvement was presented by Bill West.

WHEREAS, by precept and example Christ taught his disciples to make their influence felt in every area of social intercourse; and

WHEREAS, the need for Christian influence in every area of modern business and social life is readily apparent;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT while the inadvisability of ecumenical involvements is fully recognized and should be avoided, all church members should nonetheless be encouraged to actively and aggressively involve themselves in projects of community, state and national moral improvement and social betterment:

(1) Pastors are encouraged to seek opportunities for service in community affairs;

(2) Laymen are encouraged, out of a sense of the stewardship of life, to make their influence felt in business, social and political life;

(3) Young people are encouraged to seek careers that offer the greatest opportunities for Christian service and influence.

III. Victor Granberry, Hugo, brought the third resolution on personal commitment.

WHEREAS; our Baptist constituency is seemingly in an unstable condition spiritually and morally, evidenced by lack of conviction in divorce, social drinking, gambling, and a general tendency toward tolerance in all moral matters;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT we urge the local church leadership to promote and pursue a program of Christian growth, development and witnessing that will result in personal commitment to the Great Commission.

In order to enhance the above, **BE IT RESOLVED THAT** we re-affirm our Baptist belief in a God called, God placed, God directed ministry, and **THAT** we urge our pastors and churches to consider the advantages to the Kingdom of God by longer pastorates and a mutual respect of pastor and people for the practical application of this principle. We further encourage a revival of the sacred relationship of love and respect of pastor for his people and the people for their pastor.

IV. Eugene Enlow, Tulsa, brought the resolution regarding SANE.

WHEREAS, SANE is the one organization in our state dedicated to alcohol education, and the eradication of the usage of alcoholic beverages, and the illegal use of narcotics, and acts as a resource counsel for our churches in their specific area;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT we urge our churches to support said organization.

V. Jack Carroll presented the resolution concerning gambling.

In view of the continued efforts of the gambling interests seeking to be legalized in the state;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the total constituency of our convention be alerted and urged to actively oppose any legislation that would legalize gambling in Oklahoma.

FURTHER, BE IT RESOLVED THAT we commend our sister state of Arkansas for their rejection of legalized gambling.

VI. The resolution on the 15th anniversary of Jack Gritz as editor of the **Baptist Messenger** was presented by Jack Carroll.

WHEREAS, Jack Gritz recently observed his 15th anniversary as editor of the **Baptist Messenger**; and

WHEREAS, he has given unstintingly of his mind, time and talent for the extension of the Kingdom of God and Oklahoma Baptists;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT we commend him on this occasion and ask that God's blessings continue with him in his vital capacity as editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

VII. Eugene Enlow gave the resolution on public safety.

WHEREAS, on our highways there is one death every 12 minutes, one serious injury every 20 seconds, and property damage every three seconds, and in these United States 45,000 people were killed on the highways last year, and;

WHEREAS, we regard the sacredness of human life, and desire for each to have a full and useful life;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this body commend Robert Lester, Commissioner of Public Safety for the State of Oklahoma, for his action in promoting safety in the preservation of human lives, and for his courage in pointing out the high percentage of accidents caused by drinking drivers. **BE IT ALSO RESOLVED THAT** total abstinence from the use of alcoholic beverages be encouraged, and that the laws be vigorously enforced against drinking drivers. **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT** we call upon our people to drive safely, sanely, and courteously at all times with respect for the traffic laws of our state and its enforcement officers.

VIII. C. E. Garrison, Altus, presented the resolution on religious liberty.

WHEREAS, the New Testament teaches that every man must stand before God and give account for the deeds done in the flesh; and,

WHEREAS, Baptist people in Europe, America and wherever else they are found upon the face of the earth have consistently and insistently affirmed the freedom of man's conscience before God; and

WHEREAS, Baptists in one generation after another have suffered, bled, and died for their adherence to the propagation of the principles of religious liberty, having been persecuted many times, but never persecuting others;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT we reaffirm our belief in complete religious liberty for all men in conscience and

worship as a God-given right, not to be confused with mere religious tolerance; and **THAT** we hereby encourage and request men of good will in all faiths to join us in such affirmation.

IX. John W. Dowdy, Guthrie, brought the resolution expressing appreciation for the hospitality shown us during convention sessions.

Acknowledging our indebtedness to Joe L. Ingram and his associates in the Department of Public Relations for making reports available to the people and to our Baptist fellowship through the public press, television and radio services;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma meeting at First Church, Tulsa, make known its gratitude and appreciation to these agencies of communication for their effective coverage of news relative to the convention sessions; **THAT** we commend the staff of the **Baptist Messenger** for their faithful reporting of news relating to convention activities and the preparation of information which has interpreted the spirit and purpose of our Baptist witness to the world; and **THAT** we commend the news staffs of the state newspaper, radio and television stations for their coverage of the convention sessions.

The 59th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is sincerely grateful to First Church, Tulsa, for the generous hospitality extended through its services and facilities during in these days of fellowship and inspiration;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma express to Warren C. Hultgren, pastor, and the members of First Church, Tulsa, its thankful appreciation for the use of their beautiful and commodious facilities during the convention sessions; **THAT** our gratitude be expressed to J. C. Segler for his faithful and outstanding leadership as president during the past year and his effective presiding over convention meetings, and to other officers who have shared in the conducting of the convention proceedings; and **THAT** our sincere appreciation be conveyed to the pastors, churches and citizens of Tulsa for their kindness in helping to provide for the care and comfort of the messengers and guests through the rendering of innumerable services during convention days.

Conveyance in Trust of Real Estate to Baptist Laymen's Corporation

On Dec. 3, 1963, the Board of Directors adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma recognizes the need for the construction of buildings to meet the needs for residential housing and otherwise to care for elderly persons, which facilities are to be commonly referred to as the Baptist Golden Age Home in Oklahoma City, Okla., and further recognizes the desirability that the said facilities, when constructed, be operated by some agency other than itself; and

WHEREAS, Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, is willing to accept the responsibilities for the construction and operation of said facilities;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting by and through its

duly elected Board of Directors, on this 3rd day of December, 1963, A.D., that the said convention transfer and convey to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, subject to encumbrances, easements, and restrictive covenants of record, the hereinafter described real estate in Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, to wit:

A tract of land located in the Southwest Quarter (SW/4) of Section 29, Township 13 North, Range 4 West, I.M., more particularly described as follows: Beginning at a point that is 1070.00 feet north of the Southwest corner of said section; thence east a distance of 865.00 feet; thence north a distance of 375.00 feet; thence north $30^{\circ} 00' 00''$ E. a distance of 400.10 feet; thence north $75^{\circ} 00' 00''$ W. a distance of 333.81 feet to a point on the centerline of an existing 100 foot wide easement to the Oklahoma Gas and Electric Company; thence north $32^{\circ} 03' 37''$ E. along said easement centerline a distance of 79.84 feet; thence north $45^{\circ} 01' 11''$ E. along said easement centerline a distance of 779.15 feet; thence north $0^{\circ} 05' 23''$ W. a distance of 130.00 feet to a point on the north line of said Southwest Quarter (SW/4) of Section 29; thence north $89^{\circ} 54' 37''$ W. along said north line of the Southwest Quarter of Section 29 a distance of 1350.49 feet to the northwest corner of said Southwest Quarter of Section 29; thence south along the west line of said Section 29, a distance of 1572.57 feet to the point of beginning. Said tract containing 36.01 acres more or less;

and that the said convention transfer and assign to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as Trustee, a certain easement for outfall sanitary sewer over and across certain real estate adjoining the above described tract of land, more particularly described as follows:

Easement for outfall sanitary sewer located in the South Half (S/2) of Section 29, Township 13 North, Range 4 West, I.M., lying 5 feet either side of the following described centerline: Beginning at the Northwest corner of the Southwest Quarter (SW/4) of said section; thence south $89^{\circ} 54' 37''$ E. a distance of 1350.49 feet; thence south $0^{\circ} 05' 23''$ E. a distance of 25.00 feet to the true point of beginning of said easement; thence south $89^{\circ} 54' 37''$ E. a distance of 1292.26 feet; thence south $0^{\circ} 09' 01''$ E. a distance of 175.00 feet; thence south $89^{\circ} 54' 37''$ E. a distance of 183.75 feet to a point in the sewage treatment lagoon;

to be held in trust for the use and benefit of said convention under the following terms and conditions:

1. The trustee is hereby authorized and empowered to erect one or more buildings for the housing and care of elderly persons, and such other improvements on said real estate as it deems necessary and advisable, and, further, to carry out such purpose, is authorized and empowered to mortgage and otherwise encumber said real estate and improvements in any manner, and to do any and all other things which are incidental or related to the erection of such improvements.

2. The trustee is hereby authorized and empowered to grant lease-

hold estates of the said real estate, or any part thereof, or any improvement thereon, or any part thereof, for terms of years not to exceed a total of 20 years covering any particular portion of said real estate, to third parties upon such terms and for such rentals and for such uses as the Trustee may determine.

3. The trustee shall pay annually or at more frequent intervals, to the said convention the income and earnings from said real estate held in trust, after deduction of taxes, all expenses incurred, and all payments on debts incurred in the erection and operation of said improvements; payments to the convention to be allocated to meet the financial needs of the convention as may be determined by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

4. The said convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the said convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

5. No person, firm, or corporation dealing with Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, with reference to any of the trust property, if acting in good faith, shall be required to ascertain the authority of the trustee, or to see to the performance of the trust, or be responsible in any way for the proper application of funds or properties paid or delivered to the trustee for the account of the trust but, if acting in good faith, may deal with the trustee as though the trustee were the unconditional owner. Laymen's Corporation a warranty deed subject to encumbrances, easements, and restrictive covenants of record, conveying the above described real estate and easement to be held in trust by said Baptist Laymen's Corporation pursuant to the terms of this resolution, and to do any and all other acts that may be necessary and proper to carry out the terms and intent of this resolution.

Child Care Expansion to Be Studied

The child care committee of the board recommended in the May 4, 1964, meeting that a committee be selected to study the possibility and advisability of expanding the services of the child care department to include emotionally disturbed girls and unwed mothers. The board authorized the child care committee to assist the administration in making a thorough study of these needs and report to the board.

There seems to be considerable interest among our people in these services as indicated in the following excerpts from letters received in recent months:

1. From letter of Juvenile Rehabilitation Committee of Muskogee Baptist Association—

"We have a good program for boys but something is needed for girls. It has been suggested that a work similar to Boys Ranch Town might be started . . . We also discussed the great need in our state for an establishment for unwed mothers. Our prayer is that God

will help us do something to meet our need in the future."

2. From letter of child care committee, Tulsa Baptist Association—"It is recommended that we ask the Child Care Committee of the Baptist General Convention to give serious consideration to the expansion of our child care program in making provision for delinquent girls and unwed mothers."

3. From letter of Union Association committee—"There are girls in our midst in desperate need of Christian homes. We believe Oklahoma Baptists can and will, with proper leadership, provide such a home for them. We are confident our child care department can give this leadership. We are ready to assist in any way you request us."

The committee, assisted by H. Truman Maxey and his associates, are making the requested study.

Baptist Student Union

Upon recommendation of the religious education committee, the board adopted the following statement of policy and recommendations. The committee is composed of Mart Hardin, Kenneth Staton, Stanley Jordan, George McDow, Dale Geis, Bill D. Donovan, Robert L. Cargill and Hale Dixon.

The Purpose and Program of Baptist Student Work in Oklahoma

I. Objective

The objectives of student work are: leading students and faculty members to commitment to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord; involving them in responsible church membership and in denominational understanding and participation; guiding them in worship and devotional experiences; involving them in the study of the biblical faith and Christian life; guiding them in Christian witnessing; involving them in experiences of Christian community; involving them in Christian social life and recreation; leading them to participate in Christian world missions; leading them to accept and practice the principles of Christian stewardship; leading them to examine academic disciplines from a Christian perspective; and enlisting them for a life of Christian service.

II. The Program

The program of student work seeks to achieve these objectives by assisting churches, Oklahoma Baptist University, campus Baptist organizations and associations in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving their program for college and university students including internationals.

The program of student work includes reaching students and faculty members for Christ and the churches; providing special campus activities for students and faculty members in worship, proclamation, education, and ministry; developing Christian students and faculty members for campus, community, and world leadership; providing vocational information for students and recruiting them for church-related vocations; providing organization and leadership for church and denominational programs and projects, and providing and interpreting information regarding the work of the churches and denomination.

III. The responsibility of implementing this program in the state has been assigned to the Department of Religious Education. One person in the department has been designated as state director of Baptist student work. The Department of Religious Education in relation to Baptist student work in the state is primarily a promotional and service agency assisting local churches, associations, Oklahoma Baptist University and campus Baptist organizations in developing a Baptist student program in the various student centers over the state. The state director of Baptist student work is to give direction to and assist the church, the churches, or associations in helping them to build a workable student program where student work is done in co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The state director of Baptist student work is to assist the local Baptist student work in every way possible in developing a program which will implement the objectives of student work on each campus. He is not to exercise authority, but to give direction and assist the campus Baptist organizations, churches and associations in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving their program for college and university students including internationals.

IV. The local Baptist Student Union operates through an executive council composed of 12 to 20 consecrated Baptist students elected annually. An adult sponsor, preferably an employed Baptist student director, serves as "spiritual coach" to the Baptist student group. The Baptist Student Union invites every college student to attend Sunday school, church and Training Union regularly; to transfer his church membership to the Baptist church of his choice in the college community; to participate in the campus devotional meetings scheduled by the Baptist Student Union; to make his college career and vocational plans Christian.

The college student automatically becomes a member of the Baptist Student Union when (1) he joins a Baptist church in the college community, or (2) he joins a campus unit organization of the Sunday school, Training Union, YWA, or Brotherhood, or (3) he is an active member of his home church and commutes to college.

V. Recommendations

1. That the local Baptist student director and other personnel, if any, are to be elected and directed by the church or churches, or the representatives of the church or churches, which may become an executive committee or board. The election of the local Baptist student director shall be done in consultation with the state Baptist student director and approved by the religious education committee of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Before any contribution is made to Baptist student work in any area by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the election of the local Baptist student director shall be approved by the state director of Baptist student work and the religious education committee of the Board of Directors of the convention.

2. We recommend that each annual local Baptist student budget,

including total expenses, is to be prepared by the local forces in consultation with the state director of Baptist Student work and submitted through the stewardship-budget committee to the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

It is further recommended that a monthly financial and activities report be sent to the state director of Baptist student work, after which the funds voted by this board shall be sent to the treasurer of the local church, or churches, or to the person designated by the local church or churches, whose responsibility it is to defray expenses.

3. We recommend that Baptist student work on each campus and in each college or university center be promoted and directed by a committee, or board, made up of representatives elected by the church, the churches, or the association operating student work in each given area and that this committee, or board, be given the authority to determine any or all policies relative to the promotion of development of Baptist student work in their area and to employ and to dismiss the local student director and/or other employees of the local committee or board.

4. We would also recommend that the state director of Baptist student work be either a member of each local board or committee, or an ex-officio member of each board or committee in order that the local and state programs of Baptist student work may be coordinated in every way possible.

We feel that it is expedient and desirable that local Baptist Student work be co-ordinated with the Southern and statewide objectives of Baptist student work in so far as possible. Therefore, we believe that the state director of Baptist student work should have an opportunity to serve the local committee or board in assisting the committee or board in determining all policies and programs of Baptist Student work.

Baptist Memorial Hospital and Doctors Medical Building

The Board of Directors presented a complete report to the Baptist General Convention in its annual meeting in Oklahoma City, Nov. 12-14, 1963. This report was adopted and is recorded in the 1963 Convention Annual.

November 27, 1963, bids were opened on the hospital expansion. Low bidder was J. J. Bollinger Construction Company of Oklahoma City, in the amount of \$3,372,321. Since this was more than the Board of Directors and convention authorized, a contract was awarded the low bidder on adding four floors to the present building and completing the shell of the four-story east addition. This amounted to \$2,433,865. The contractor agreed that, if the additional \$838,456 could be secured by Dec. 1, 1964, he would complete the job at the original bid.

May 4, 1964, upon recommendation of the hospital governing board's committee and the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee, the board authorized the administration and governing board to borrow an additional \$800,000 and finish the building on the original low bid.

On July 13, 1964, a contract was awarded Manhattan Construction Company in the amount of \$368,602, for adding two additional floors to the Doctors Medical Building. The Doctors Medical Building will have six floors and basement, and will accommodate 60 physicians when this addition is completed. Four additional floors may be added as needed. Total assets on the Doctors Medical Building will be approximately \$2,000,000. This is a self-liquidating project, and is proving to be a substantial asset to the total hospital program.

A thorough analysis of expansion costs, funds borrowed, projected cash flow and operating costs of Baptist Memorial Hospital was made by Champlin, Moak, Hunsaker and Rouse, certified public accountants. This study reveals that total long-term indebtedness on the hospital will be approximately \$4,000,000, which is less than 50 per cent of the total hospital assets. Projected annual income will exceed \$5,000,000. Annual debt payment will be approximately \$300,000, which represents only 6 per cent of total income, and the operating expense, including debt payments, will be less than the total net income. The above analysis also reveals that annual income from Doctors Medical Building will be \$206,000, with annual debt payment of \$127,964, leaving \$78,036 for operation and upkeep.

Insurance Plan to Be Discontinued

November, 1962, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma voted to make available to pastors and other full-time church workers in Oklahoma a group life insurance plan. At that time no plan was available to our Baptist church leadership. Arrangements were made with American General Life Insurance Company to carry our group. This company set as a minimum 300 participants.

June 1, 1963, we had 249 enrolled. Although this number was below the required minimum, American General agreed to put the insurance in effect. We expected the number of participants to increase. However, one year later, June 1, 1964, we had only 225 active participants.

In the meantime, the Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board made available an excellent group plan. Practically all those in the Oklahoma group are eligible for the Southern Baptist Convention plan. Those in the American General program are also eligible to convert this insurance to another permanent policy with American General without a medical examination.

In view of the above developments, the Board of Directors voted Sept. 22, 1964, to discontinue the American General group plan effective Nov. 30, 1964, at which time all policies will expire unless transferred.

We are glad the convention made this group plan available, because 285 have had protection all or part of the time. The families of three of our co-workers, Max Stanfield, D. D. Barber and Charlie Collum, have received benefits.

We express our thanks to American General Life Insurance Company for working with us. Our relationships have been most satisfactory. We are also grateful to those who have participated, and

encourage them to contact American General if they want to convert this insurance to a permanent policy. We also encourage them to participate immediately in the Southern Baptist Convention Life Benefit Plan.

Stewardship-Budget

Upon recommendation of the Stewardship-Budget Committee, the board approved the following report and promotional plans:

Report on First Year of Twelve Year Program

The world mission task has found strong root in the hearts of the people who make up Oklahoma Baptist churches. Co-operatively, these churches have made tremendous progress in giving the gospel of Christ to the world. To Oklahoma Baptists the world is a mission field. It is a vast area teeming with multitudes of lost people. It is the intention and command of Christ that this spiritual lostness be met by persistent, compassionate and personal proclamation of the gospel.

Out of the world need came an idea—a plan for doubling the missionary outreach of every Oklahoma Baptist church in the next 12 years. This plan, approved by the 1962 annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, was titled "Twelve Years of Mission Advance." The plan has a four-fold objective.

1. An increase of at least 5 per cent each year in church budget receipts.

2. Churches increasing at least 1 per cent each year in gifts through the Cooperative Program.

3. The convention increasing at least 1 per cent each year to Southern Baptist Convention causes, until a division of 50 per cent state-50 per cent Southern Baptist Convention is reached.

4. The setting of minimum Cooperative Program objectives through 1975.

This plan is off to a good start. By means of associational "Blueprint for Mission Advance" conferences each church has been challenged to adopt its own 12-year program. During 1964 we have continued to re-emphasize the Cooperative Program as the main channel of mission expression. We must ever be mindful of the danger of succumbing to a fragmented approach to missions. Oklahoma Baptists have stayed on the main line and have enjoyed tremendous missionary growth.

We have also continued to emphasize **weekly mission giving**. More than 340 churches are now giving weekly. Almost without exception these churches have increased their dollar giving to missions.

We have also accepted the responsibility of leading every church to utilize available stewardship materials, so that every church member may be made aware of his individual responsibility as a Christian, and be given the opportunity to make a prayerful, obedient and definite stewardship commitment.

We feel that the groundwork has been done for making the 12-year plan successful, and we are confident that Oklahoma Baptists will rise to meet the challenge.

Stewardship Development Materials Available

The Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has produced a wide variety of materials to help the churches in their stewardship plans. All materials have been revised to make maximum use of existing church organizations.

The following materials will be released April 1, 1965:

1. Stewardship Development Program for Baptist Associations.

This guidebook was developed in answer to requests from many associational superintendents of missions, who desired an effective tool to aid in promotion of the associational budget, as well as enlist the churches in a stewardship development program. It co-ordinates the promotion of the associational budget, the church budget, and the Cooperative Program.

2. Year-Round Stewardship Development. This booklet doesn't present a new plan, nor does it suggest an extra program. The materials will aid the churches to make more effective and proficient use of time, materials and workers.

3. Forward Program of Christian Stewardship. The materials have been extensively revised.

4. Growth in Christian Stewardship. This emphasis is a spiritual approach to stewardship development for churches with membership up to approximately 300. The plan takes the limited facilities of these churches into consideration.

5. Your Church and Stewardship. This booklet is available without cost from the executive offices, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City. It has been written to aid pastors of churches which have had little or no stewardship emphasis. The adoption of these suggestions will doubtless be the beginning of a growing congregation.

Tithe Now Campaign, April 1, 1965-March 31, 1966

The need for a tithers' campaign among Southern Baptists is self-evident. The fact that 85 per cent of the 10 million plus Southern Baptists do not tithe punctuates the need for a new thrust on tithers' enlistment in the churches.

Although stewardship has been vigorously promoted, there has not been a strong Southern Baptist Convention tithing campaign since the days of the "Tithers' Enlistment Visitation" in the early 1950's. A "Tithe Now" campaign will be waged between April 1, 1965, and March 31, 1966. The goal is to increase the number of tithers from one and a half million to two million. Oklahoma's objective for the campaign is 120,000.

"Every Baptist a Tither" has been and always will be our objective. However, the best way to attain an objective is to set a tangible goal which can be reached in a given period of time—and then move on to a higher goal.

Each church will be encouraged to set a reasonable but challenging tithers' goal and then use a Southern Baptist stewardship emphasis to reach their tithers' objective. "Two Million Baptist Tithers" is the immediate goal. "Every Baptist a Tither" is the continuing objective. "Tithe NOW" is the message—"that All May Know HIM!"

Cooperative Program Promotion

Since 1925 Southern Baptists have used a co-operative mission plan whereby New Testament churches could share in the support of Christian education, benevolence, and missions in the states and through Southern Baptist boards, commissions and agencies.

The Cooperative Program makes it possible for every Baptist to be a missionary. It furnishes the pattern and the plan through which the doctrine of Christian stewardship may be put into practice.

In 1965 we seek to lead Oklahoma Baptists to see that the Cooperative Program is not just a channel but **the primary channel**; to see the Cooperative Program is not just a program but a divinely approved plan for putting mission money under the mastery and into the service of Jesus Christ.

The following plans are projected for 1965:

1. Prepare attractive exhibits for every convention, major conference and assembly.
2. Annual Cooperative Program and stewardship conference in January.
3. Make careful distribution of Cooperative Program tracts.
4. Continue Cooperative Program report mailings each month.
5. Continue utilization of the **Baptist Messenger**.
6. Promote weekly giving.
7. Effect a distribution plan to get Cooperative Program and stewardship visual aids (filmstrips, slides, sound films, etc.) in every church.
8. Promote Cooperative Program Day in April or May.
9. Promote Cooperative Program month in October.
10. Continue wall placards.
11. Interpret the Cooperative Program to Baptist college students, not only in Oklahoma Baptist University, but in all of the state universities and colleges.
12. Continue full co-operation with the Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention.

CONCLUSION

By the end of 1964 we will have reached a total membership of over one-half million in co-operating, Oklahoma Baptist churches. This represents about one-fifth of the total population in our state. There are more Baptists in Oklahoma than there are members in the next three largest denominations combined. In 1963, 1335 churches, with another estimated 125 missions, were reported. These churches baptized 16,766 in 1963—total receipts were \$23,963,766, with \$3,458,936 for missions. Baptist church property was valued at \$108,251,598. Convention assets are valued at \$30,186,443, making a total of \$138,438,041. Total receipts in all institutions and agencies

for 1963 were over \$13,000,000. Thank God for our Baptist heritage in this state—for those before us who built churches and institutions under difficult circumstances.

Our convention is well organized with departments, agencies and institutions to assist churches in every phase of the work. The men and women serving in the various departments, agencies and institutions are trained, efficient and dedicated. They are available to help the associations, churches and individual as time permits. Our conception is that the state office should be a clearing house for the churches. State workers are servants of the churches. We endeavor to supply materials, offer helpful suggestions, encourage church leaders and co-ordinate the work to the best of our ability. We are conscious of the fact that we shall never be able to furnish sufficient personnel in any field to do all the work. This would not be a desirable even if it were possible. The work is to be done by the churches. Christ gave his Commission to New Testament churches. With this in mind, we strive to hold state offices and personnel to a minimum.

Receipts to world missions through the Cooperative Program continue to increase. In 1963 receipts were \$2,560,312, as compared to \$2,494,413 in 1962. This represents an increase of \$65,899. Receipts for the first eight months of 1964 increased from \$1,628,841 in 1963 to \$1,784,660, which represents a \$155,818 increase. Oklahoma is near the top in sharing with the Southern Baptist Convention and the rest of the world. Last year 40½ per cent of every Cooperative Program dollar received was forwarded to the Southern Baptist Convention. The average through the Southern Baptist Convention was 35 per cent. If the increase in receipts continues the rest of the year, we should reach the objective of 42 per cent-58 per cent division. We try to practice what we preach—that the Cooperative Program is the lifeline of our mission work and should have the undivided support of every Baptist. Designated offerings are fine in their places. We should give our people opportunities to give over-and-above to mission causes, but never should a part receive more emphasis than the whole. We have a conviction that we will do more for a lost world through the Cooperative Program and the regular special offerings than by designating to a multitude of causes regardless of how worthy they may be. We have received some criticism for not promoting a campaign for OBU as some states have done for their schools, and for not adopting some pioneer state or nation as our special project, but we sincerely believe that we can accomplish more, better train our people and extend the kingdom of God by pushing, promoting, and encouraging the Cooperative Program, regular specials, store-house tithing, use of the Baptist Foundation, and providing plans of stewardship promotion such as Forward Program and Growth in Christian Stewardship Program.

We are pleased to report that we have no operating deficits in any department, agency, or institution, except for short periods in a few instances. All of those in places of responsibility are constantly reminded that operating deficits are not permitted. All our co-workers

are in full accord with this policy. We have borrowed funds for capital needs at Oklahoma Baptist University, Hugo Golden Age Home, and, Baptist Memorial, Enid General and Miami Baptist Hospitals. These loans are well in hand. Every payment is being met promptly.

The future for Oklahoma Baptists is as bright as the promises of God and the vision of our people. We have more churches with more members than ever. We have better trained denominational workers, pastors, music directors, educational directors and church members. We have the most attractive educational and promotional materials. We have the best buildings and equipment. We have hospitals, homes for children and aged, assemblies, BSU's and a Baptist school second to none. In addition to all of this, we have God!

Let's stay out of the debunking business. We are members of the construction crew and not the wrecking gang. Our people should be led to hold up the hands of pastors and others in places of heavy responsibility. Our institutions were founded and built at great sacrifice. You can't build a strong denomination without institutions. We have a well-rounded program of local, associational, state, home and foreign missions. Our departments and agencies are rendering effective service. Our institutions must be undergirded with prayer, and expanded as needed to meet the demands of the future. We have a big job to do. With the complete co-operation of our one-half million people and our faith in God, we can continue to march forward.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation

E. V. Mashburn, President

Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a nonprofit organization, was incorporated under the laws of the state of Oklahoma on Feb. 12, 1960. The general purpose of the corporation, composed of 30 dedicated Baptist laymen, representing 16 churches in the Oklahoma City area, is to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific work, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Baptist Laymen's Corporation provide for convention approval of its Board of Directors.

The first project undertaken by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation was financing, constructing and leasing of a Doctors Medical Building adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City. Ground-breaking for the Doctors Medical Building was Aug. 28, 1960; Open house for the completed building was Nov. 19, 1961 and June 1, 1963 the four-story building was completely leased and occupied.

The trust under which the Baptist Laymen's Corporation was

holding the land on which the Doctors Medical Building was constructed was revoked by the convention's Board of Directors on Oct. 23, 1963 and the land and completed building was conveyed to the Baptist General Convention at which time the convention assumed all assets and liabilities of Baptist Laymen's Corporation arising from financing, constructing and leasing of the building. However, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation continued the operation and management of the building until Dec. 31, 1963. The Doctors Medical Building is now being operated and managed by Baptist Memorial Hospital. Construction is under way for two additional floors to the building.

In September, 1963, following a request from the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention, Baptist Laymen's Corporation agreed to assume the responsibility of financing, constructing and operating the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes at Northwest Highway and Council Road on land given to the convention for this purpose. The 35-acre tract of land was deeded to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation in accordance with the same terms and conditions set forth in the resolution regarding the Doctors Medical Building. Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes funds accumulated from the transfer of land and appropriations from the 1963 and 1964 budgets are being transferred to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation. Architects drawings have been approved for a 62-bed nursing home and 20 apartment units and construction is expected to begin within the next few months.

Also included in the development of Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes is land set aside for private cottages and dwellings. These residences may be financed by individuals who wish to make a gift to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation to cover the cost of construction. The size and type of dwellings constructed will be agreed upon by the donors and the Baptist Laymen's Corporation's architect. It would be understood and agreed that upon completion of the construction of such residential improvements by the owner, the occupants would receive full possession of the premises for and during their natural lives and during the life of the survivor of them.

October 1, 1963, John Strutton was employed as administrator for Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes. Strutton has an office in the Department of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes in the Baptist Building and may be contacted there by anyone interested in securing information regarding golden age homes.

72. Warren Terry, Oklahoma City, presented the following statement of principles and moved for their adoption.

Statement of Principles

To the Administration and Board of Trustees, Oklahoma Baptist University:

We, the undersigned pastors of Oklahoma County, wish to express our concern about the theological and spiritual problems now existent at Oklahoma Baptist University. We would first commend the faculty and administration in what we believe is a sincere attempt to raise the academic level of the university and to recognize that this effort is meeting with success.

However, it is our feeling that in the search for academic excellence, much of the spiritual vitality and theological soundness of the school have been sacrificed. From first hand information, conversation with some of the faculty, and conversations with many of the students, it is our conclusion that all is not well spiritually and theologically at OBU and steps should be taken to bring the school in line with the basic purposes and expectations of the Baptist churches of Oklahoma. As owners and supporters of the school, we feel that Baptists have a right to control it and make it an asset to the program of our churches rather than a detriment to Oklahoma Baptist life.

In the light of the above statements, we would like to offer the following recommendations:

1. That a thorough analysis be made of the prevalent doctrinal beliefs of the faculty by a special committee selected from the Board of Trustees.

2. That the Southern Baptist Statement of Faith, adopted by the convention in Kansas City in 1963, become the statement of faith of the school and that each faculty member be required to subscribe to it.

3. That the administration and faculty seek to become more sensitive to the doctrinal beliefs of Oklahoma Baptists and seek more to reflect those beliefs in their teaching rather than attempt to re-shape them. This does not mean that our doctrines could not be subjected to analysis and criticism in a constructive manner.

4. That the faculty at all times seek to manifest positive Christian attitudes designed to strengthen, rather than weaken the faith and spiritual life of the students.

5. That the faculty reflect an attitude of sympathy with Baptist

beliefs and that the department of Religion include in its curriculum a two-hour course in Baptist beliefs and distinctives, in addition to the six hours of Bible now required and that this course be required of all Baptist students

6. That some system of screening new faculty members in regard to doctrinal and moral beliefs be established and that this be administered by the special committee mentioned above to determine the theological soundness of existing faculty personnel.

7. That the trustees be asked to better inform themselves concerning the policies and operation of the school and seek to keep in closer touch with campus and administrative as well as theological problems.

8. That each faculty member shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church.

It is interesting to note that our beautiful new Baptist college in Houston, Texas, has an all Baptist faculty. Also, our new Southern Baptist Junior College in Dallas, Texas, is all Baptist. Our great new Grand Canyon Baptist College in Arizona has a faculty that is Baptist. To say we can't, here in Oklahoma, is not true.

73. Bill G. West, Okmulgee, made a substitute motion giving an expression of confidence in the trustees and administration of Oklahoma Baptist University in their sincere effort to handle with discretion and propriety many delicate problems confronting them, and referred this matter to them for their consideration and action.

Richard Peterson, Stillwater, spoke to the substitute motion as a member of the special committee of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University, asking that the convention give the committee time to finish their study before taking any action.

Substitute motion carried by a vote of 263 to 191.

74. M. W. Gay, Fairview Church near Shawnee, offered the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this convention go on record as being unalterably opposed to the advertising of intoxicating liquors of all kinds as being contrary to the constitution of the State of Oklahoma and detrimental to the moral welfare of its people.

Motion carried for the adoption of this resolution.

75. Time arrived for the election of convention officers. The following officers were to be elected: president, first vice-president, second vice-president, recording secretary, assistant recording secretary and historical secretary.

76. Bob Norsworthy, Cushing, nominated Jack Carroll, Seminole, for president of the convention.

Jerold McBride, Ponca City, nominated T. T. Crabtree, Oklahoma City, for president of the convention.

H. Tom Wiles, Lawton, nominated Richard Hopper, Ardmore, for president of the convention.

A. A. Davis, Nowata, nominated L. E. Maples, Tulsa, for president of the convention.

Motion carried for nominations to cease.

77. On the first ballot the result was: Jack Carroll, 195; Richard

Hopper, 97; T. T. Crabtree, 83; L. E. Maples, 83.

On the second ballot the result was: Jack Carroll, 260 and Richard Hopper, 196.

Motion carried to make the election of Jack Carroll, Seminole, unanimous.

78. Harold Thompson, Choctaw, nominated Wade Freeman Jr., Tulsa, for first vice-president.

Cliff Fite, Ponca City, nominated Paul Graham, Ponca City, for first vice-president.

Jack Carlton, Tulsa, nominated Hub Collier, Midwest City, for first vice-president.

Motion carried for nominations to cease.

The result of the first ballot was: Wade Freeman Jr., 123; Paul Graham, 106; Hub Collier, 50.

The result of the second ballot was: Wade Freeman Jr., 153; Paul Graham, 106.

79. Wade Freeman Jr., Tulsa, was elected first vice-president of the convention.

80. Jack Carlton, Tulsa, nominated Hub Collier for second vice-president and moved that he be elected by acclamation.

Motion carried and Hub Collier, Midwest City, was elected second vice-president of the convention.

81. H. E. Alsup, Perry, nominated John T. Daniel, Oklahoma City, as recording secretary.

Motion carried for his election by acclamation.

82. Paul Maxey, Tulsa, nominated Hale A. Dixon, Woodward, as assistant recording secretary.

Motion carried for his election by acclamation.

83. Kenneth Mullins, Tulsa, nominated J. Marvin Gaskin, Durant, for historical secretary.

Motion carried for his election by acclamation.

84. Recording Secretary John T. Daniel presented the following motion, giving authority to the Board of Directors, and it was passed by unanimous vote:

"That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma be authorized to transact any unfinished or new business, necessary to the work of the convention, and that the president and recording secretary of the convention be authorized to sign any legal papers of the convention which require signatures."

85. Newly elected officers of the convention were introduced.

86. Jack Carroll, Seminole, newly elected president of the convention, led in prayer, bringing to a close the 1964 annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

We have examined the balance sheet of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, including only the funds as herein named, as of December 31, 1964, and the related statements of fund reserves and receipts and disbursements for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

No provision was made for depreciation of property and equipment.

The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma represents only one of the segments of the operations of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. This report does not include assets, liabilities, fund reserves, receipts or disbursements of: (1) Hugo Golden Age Home; (2) the eleven hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or lessee; and the following affiliated or associated organizations operating as separate corporations; (3) The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; (4) Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma; (5) Oklahoma Baptist University; (6) Faculty Building Association; (7) Baptist Laymen's Corporation and (8) Baptist Building Federal Credit Union.

In our opinion, with the explanations in the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying balance sheet and statements of fund reserves and receipts and disbursements present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1964, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applies on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTS

Organization

Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated under Oklahoma law without capital stock. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May 1917, for a term of twenty years. Amended Articles of Incorporation filed March, 1928, and in May, 1961, provide for an organization in perpetuity.

The administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

The major activities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are described below:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the Co-operative Program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and transmitting periodically the portion allocated to Southern Baptist Convention, the various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, Oklahoma, Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and other designated donees.

Baptist Messenger—Printing and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

Department of Child Care—Operation and management of "The Baptist Orphans' Home" and "Boys Ranch Town," construction of buildings, and maintenance of buildings and grounds.

Falls Creek Assembly—Providing vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma, and the maintenance of assembly properties.

Department of Religious Education—Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in churches of the state, and coordination of Baptist work in the student union centers at the various educational institutions.

Building Program—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

Temporary Investment

On August 7, 1964, The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention placed \$50,000.00 with The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as a temporary investment "for a period of ninety days." These funds were to be available for return to the convention at the end of ninety days, or upon request of the convention.

On February 1, 1965, the convention requested that the \$50,000.00, plus interest, be paid by the foundation as soon as possible after maturity of the investment in February, 1965.

Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, ceased operating as a general hospital on September 15, 1962, at the request of the administration and governing board of the hospital.

A committee was authorized to act for the Board of Directors of the convention in negotiating and consummating an agreement to sell, lease, rent or otherwise dispose of the buildings.

The indebtedness of the hospital is to be liquidated by the collections of the hospital accounts receivable, proceeds from the sale or leasing of the buildings and future Cooperative Program appropriations.

The \$28,075.24 owed to Baptist General Convention represents the remaining indebtedness of the hospital as of December 31, 1964.

A lease contract was made with The Board of Education of Independent School District No. 20, Muskogee County, State of Oklahoma on December 17, 1964, which provides that rental payments totaling \$40,000.00 over a ten year period shall constitute the total purchase price of all real property and all personal property belonging to the hospital.

The above-mentioned rent income and any collections on hospital accounts receivable are to be credited to the \$28,075.24 receivable from Oklahoma Baptist Hospital.

The \$71,586.95 receivable from Baptist Memorial Hospital includes \$69,574.93 applicable to the land transferred from the books of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma to the books of Baptist Memorial Hospital at December 31, 1963.

The \$23,577.45 receivable on notes was loaned from funds received as deposits from Baptist hospitals for investment purposes;

Prepaid Expense (Parking Lot)—A contract dated March 16, 1956, by and between The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City and Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma concerning the joint use of an automobile parking lot and the balance (\$44,000.00) of a loan in the original amount of \$50,000.00 to the church by the convention was cancelled by a new contract dated September 3, 1963.

The new contract provides that the convention shall have full and unrestricted use of the automobile parking lot to be used jointly with the church for a period of 25 years, except that this contract may be terminated by either party upon written notice of one year, unless the party receiving such notice consents to an earlier termination.

In the event of termination of this contract by the convention, "the church will pay to the convention, a sum which shall be equal to \$44,000.00 less 1/25 part of such sum, i.e., \$1,760.00, for each full year that this agreement has been in effect prior to discontinuance of use as provided in this agreement." Any fractional portion of a year shall be a pro rata part of \$1,760.00.

In the event of termination of this contract by the church, the church will pay to the convention, the amount as scheduled in the contract by years from date of execution of the contract. The scheduled amounts are reduced from \$43,058.62 for the first year to \$1,462.04 for the twenty-fourth year from September 3, 1963. The amount to be paid for any fractional portion of a year shall be determined by an interpolation of the schedule.

The amount shown as "Prepaid Expense (Parking Lot)," \$41,653.00, represents the balance of \$44,000.00 at September 3, 1963, reduced at the rate of \$1,760.00 per year for the expired time to December 31, 1964.

The Sunday School Board of Southern Baptist Convention which operates the Baptist Book Store shares with the convention in the expense of this parking area.

Property and Equipment—The net changes in property and equipment accounts are summarized in Exhibit F.

The \$47,404.62 addition to the convention office building represents the completed portion of an addition to the building which is to be rented to Baptist Sunday School Board of Southern Baptist Convention for expansion of its Baptist Book Store operation.

This building addition is scheduled for completion in the early part of 1965.

Senior Citizens Village—Land conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, trustee, was reduced to a nominal value of \$1.00. The land was conveyed on June 10, 1964, to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has awarded contracts for Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes buildings to be erected on the land.

The trustee shall pay annually, or at more frequent intervals, to Baptist General Convention the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust, after deduction of taxes, all expenses incurred, and all payments on debts incurred in the erection and operation of the improvements.

The convention may revoke the trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

Payable to Woman's Missionary Union—This amount, \$36,919.34, received from the State Mission "Edna McMillan" offering is payable to Woman's Missionary Union.

Payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—Endowment funds appropriated in 1964, payable in 1965 to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma are for the benefit of the following institutions and agencies:

NOTES TO THE BALANCE SHEET**Depreciation**

No provision has been made for depreciation of property and equipment.

Transfers to Baptist Laymen's Corporation

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has assumed the responsibility of constructing and operating Oklahoma Baptist Golden Age Home, at Northwest Highway and Council Road, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

A tract of land containing 35 acres was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, on June 10, 1964, subject to encumbrances, easements, and restrictive covenants of record.

The convention is to receive the income and earnings from the real estate annually or at more frequent intervals.

The convention may revoke the trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

Golden Age Home funds in the amount of \$107,511.42 were paid to Baptist Laymen's Corporation in 1964 to assist in the financing of this Golden Age Home project. The remaining funds held by the convention in the "Golden Age Homes Building Fund" in the amount of \$72,771.20 are to be paid to Baptist Laymen's Corporation in 1965.

Baptist Memorial Hospital Expansion

The convention's Board of Directors, in session May 10, 1962, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Baptist Memorial Hospital.

Cooperative Program funds have been appropriated for this hospital expansion as follows:

The Baptist Memorial Hospital property was refinanced in 1964. Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company increased its mortgage note to \$4,560,000.00. This note is secured by a mortgage on all real and personal property owned by the hospital, and also, "It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma."

Baptist Building Expansion

On September 2, 1964, J. J. Cook Construction, Inc. was awarded a contract for an addition to the Baptist Office Building in the amount of \$145,918.00. At December 31, 1964, \$41,070.00 had been paid on this contract. The remaining \$104,848.00 is to be paid in 1965.

General

The balance sheet and the various accompanying and supporting exhibits and schedules apply only to the operations of the department of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

We have examined the balance sheet of THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 1964, and the related statement of fund reserves for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

On January 1, 1964, the foundation adjusted the book value of securities held to market value. The net effect of this adjustment was to increase the book value of the securities, and the corresponding fund reserves, by \$92,147.75. Securities acquired in 1964 were recorded at cost or at an appraised value.

No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties or depletion of mineral properties.

In our opinion, subject to the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying balance sheet and statements of fund operations and reserves present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1964, and the results of its transactions for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year, except for the change explained in the preceding paragraph to an alternate acceptable method of valuing investment securities.

COMMENTS

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. It was created by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma as a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal, or mixed property of whatever nature, and where-soever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships, for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to obtain funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disburse and invest funds according to designation made and as set out in the charter.

Investments

Prior to January 1, 1964, the foundation had consistently followed the practice of recording investments received as contributions at an appraised or market value as of the date of acquisition. Gain or loss or fluctuations in the market was not taken into account until disposition of the asset.

On January 1, 1964, the foundation adjusted the book value of securities held to market value. The net effect of this adjustment was to increase the book value of the securities, and the corresponding fund reserves by \$92,147.75 as follows:

Securities acquired in 1964 were recorded at cost or at an appraised value. No further revaluations are contemplated.

The purpose of the revaluation at January 1, 1964 was to place all funds on a more equitable basis at the beginning of the operation of the unit system in the investment pool.

The adopted procedure for the investment pool provides that periodic revaluations of those securities held by the pool shall be made for the purpose of determining unit values, and that funds invested shall be on a unit basis determined by the latest market valuation.

The church building loans consisted of 149 separate loans ranging from \$37.60 to \$96,842.00 at December 31, 1964. The balances of the majority of these loans were confirmed by direct correspondence.

All church building loans are made with interest at 6% and are secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements to total 100% of the original amount of each loan. The majority of these loans are on a ten year term with provision for monthly payments of principal and interest.

General

Hollums Building—The property which was donated in 1950 by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hollums was sold in 1958 for \$55,000.00 with the consent of Mrs. J. W. Hollums, the surviving grantor.

The net proceeds from the sale of this building have been applied to establish a "living trust" for the benefit of Mrs. J. W. Hollums.

The Old Baptist Building—A lease was executed on October 20, 1955, with Felix Investment Co., Inc. covering property known as "The Old Baptist Building," located at 223 W. Park Ave., Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, for a period of 99 years from January 1, 1956 to December 31, 2054.

This lease, as amended April 5, 1956, and a supplemental agreement entered into on August 7, 1956, provided for a total consideration of \$1,070,000.00 for the 99 year period.

Investments

Securities acquired prior to January 1 1964, are shown at market value as of that date. Securities acquired in 1964 are shown at cost or at an appraised value as of the date of acquisition.

The investment pool was revised, effective January 1, 1964, to provide for periodic revaluation of the securities held. These periodic revaluations are for statistical purposes and are used to provide a unit valuation for the distribution of income and investment of funds.

The book value of the mineral deeds as shown in Exhibit E is the appraised value at the date of acquisition. No provision has been made for depletion of these mineral interests.

Fund Reserves

Included in the \$5,588,531.17 of "Other Trust and Endowment Funds" (Exhibit E) are:

The annuities arose from gifts made to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has agreed to pay to such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. At the death of the donor the obligation to make further payments ceases.

A revolving fund has been established within the operating fund of the foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds, which are accumulated for the purpose of paying the annuitants periodically and also to provide funds from which estate expenses may be paid prior to the reimbursement of such expenses.

The balance of this revolving fund as of December 31, 1964 was \$13,740.92.

The individual trusts were created naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries, rather than naming Baptist agencies and institutions. The net income from these trusts is disbursed to the specified individuals during their lifetime and, upon their death, is administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

The annuity and individual trust values shown above represent the book values of these funds at December 31, 1964. No attempt has been made to compute any liability of these funds for future payments to the beneficiaries.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, the accompanying fund balance sheets and summary of changes in fund balances and statement of income and expenses, general fund, present fairly the financial position of Oklahoma Baptist University at May 31, 1964, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

COMMENTS

Organization—Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909, to function as an operating unit of the convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that body. On February 9, 1910, Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a perpetual corporation without capital stock, for the purpose of providing opportunities for all departments of higher education and connected preparatory schooling of persons of both sexes on equal terms.

General Fund

Relief and Annuity—During the period July 1, 1937 to May 31, 1964, the university has contributed to the Educational Institutions Employees Retirement Plan of the Relief and Annuity Board of Southern Baptist Convention for the benefit of officers and faculty participating in the plan. According to direct confirmation, the employer's accumulations at May 31, 1964, were \$35,983.09. Amounts contributed on behalf of any employee may be refunded to the university upon the death of the employee before participation, or upon the employee's withdrawal and demand.

Short Term Treasury Bills—Current operating funds totaling \$109,021.15 were invested in short term treasury bills at May 31, 1964. Subsequent to that date, these treasury bills were redeemed for deposit in the operating account.

Inventories—On May 31, 1964, inventories on hand of \$44,-486.86 consisted of bookstore merchandise of \$32,623.86 and dining hall food supplies of \$11,863.00

Deferred Charges—Deferred charges at May 31, 1964, totaled \$41,480.66. In addition to maintenance supplies of \$15,046.37 and prepaid insurance of \$8,979.00, other deferred charges amounted to \$17,455.29. Other deferred changes were as follows:

Deferred Income—Deferred income of \$14,522.93 at May 31, 1964, consisted of scholarship grants being held by the university for future use by qualified students in accordance with grantors' provisions.

Loan Fund

National Defense Student Loan Program—On May 31, 1964, the federal government had made net capital contributions to the university of \$346,806.09 under the National Defense Student Loan Program. Under this program the federal government furnishes 90% of the funds and the university furnishes 10% to loan to qualifying students. Loan repayments are scheduled over a maximum of 15

years. Any borrower who becomes a full time public elementary school teacher may have 10% of the principal of his loan plus interest forgiven for each year of full time service as a teacher, up to a total of five years. During the year under review, \$4,696.41 was forgiven under this program.

Endowment Fund

Included in the endowment fund balance is \$243,500.00 grants from Ford Foundation. The income from these grants is to be used for faculty salaries for ten years. After this time the principal of the fund may be used for any purpose designated by the university.

Plant Fund

Plant and Equipment—Land, improvements and equipment are included herein at cost. The net book value of buildings includes \$1,272,453.08 of appraisal value.

Bonds Payable—The university is obligor under two bond indentures in the total amount of \$1,196,000.00 to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government.

The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, consists of \$540,000.00 of 2¾ % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$11,000.00 on November 1, 1964 to \$25,000.00 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory. The first \$58,000.00 of these bonds were retired as scheduled, and \$2,000.00 of the bonds due November 1, 1995 have been retired.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee of a specified amount.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1964, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing Bonds, Series of 1957, consists of \$656,000.00 of 27/8 % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$11,000.00 on October 1, 1964 to \$33,000.00 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory. The first \$44,000.00 of these bonds were retired as scheduled.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for retirement of these bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee of a specified amount.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1964, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$696,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 1, 1961, with semiannual maturities varying from \$14,000.00 on September 1, 1964 to \$26,000.00 on September 1, 1975, with the remaining \$249,000.00 due on March 1, 1976. Interest rates vary from 43/4 % to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) the apportionment from Baptist General Convention for building program; (2) \$67,500.00; or (3) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the twelve months next following.

During the period under review the university made the necessary deposits with the trustee.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$290,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semiannual maturities varying from \$6,000.00 on December 1, 1964 to \$10,000.00 on December 1, 1977, with the remaining \$97,000.00 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rates vary from 43/4 % to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000.00 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the twelve months next following.

During the period under review, the university made the necessary deposits with the trustee.

May 31, 1964

Pledged Assets

1. Kerr Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$788,014.07 and the land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$540,000.00. Brotherhood Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,112,120.23 plus appraisal value of \$93,217.12, and the land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$656,000.00.

2. Thurmond Hall, included herein at the university's cost of \$535,653.37 and the land upon which it is located and John Wesley Raley Chapel, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,653,122.61 and the land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$696,000.00.

3. Ford Music Hall, included herein at the university's cost of \$216,319.74, and Brittain Library and Arts Center, included herein at the university's cost of \$140,015.27 plus appraisal value of \$114,908.73 and the land upon which they are located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$290,000.00.

Pledged Income

4. The specific income Kerr Dormitory, the women's dining hall, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, the men's dining hall and, to the extent necessary, the specific income from WMU Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

5. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$67,500.00, is pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of the amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

6. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$27,000.00 annually, are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of the amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

Appraisal Value

7. Included in the book value of buildings is \$1,272,453.08 of appraisal value, consisting of \$1,354,294.65, less \$81,841.57 amortization.

COMMENTS

Scope of Audit

The examination of the books and records of the Hospital was for the year ended December 31, 1964. The system of internal control and accounting procedures were received and, without making a detailed audit of all the transactions, the accounting records and other supporting evidence, were examined or tested to the extent deemed appropriate under the circumstances.

Organization

The Bristow Memorial Hospital is operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the City of Bristow. The Hospital began operations on December 6, 1954, with an investment by the City of \$362,471.28. In 1959 a new wing was added to the building at a cost of \$112,445.00. As of December 31, 1964, the total investment by the City is \$474,916.28. Refer to Schedule 4 for detail.

Cash

The checking accounts in the American National Bank and the Community State Bank were reconciled with bank statements furnished by the banks at December 31, 1964. The savings account at the Community State Bank was verified by direct confirmation with the bank. The cash on hand consists of a petty cash fund of \$85.28 and undeposited receipts of \$400.58. The \$400.58 was included in the deposit of the first day of business in January, 1965. The Emergency and Reserve Funds were verified by letter from Mr. W. G. Kersh, Executive Director of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes, at December 31, 1964. For detail of these accounts, refer to Schedule 3 of this report.

Accounts and Notes Receivable

We confirmed the current accounts receivable, other than Welfare accounts, to our satisfaction. The Welfare accounts were verified by subsequent settlements from the State Welfare Department.

The Note Receivable of \$12,056.12, due from Oklahoma Baptist Hospital at Muskogee, was also confirmed by Mr. Kersh.

Inventories

We were not present when the physical inventory was taken, but have tested the quantities and extensions sufficiently to satisfy us as to its overall fairness.

Accounts and Notes Payable

Accounts Payable are stated herein as reflected by the records without direct confirmation with the suppliers, but were verified by subsequent payment.

The Note Payable to the Bristow Memorial Hospital Foundation in the amount of \$6,000.00 was verified. The balance of \$315.00 is an amount due the Coca Cola Co. on a conditional sales contract.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1964, with spot-check of detail transactions.

The accounts receivable were confirmed by outside correspondence.

We did not witness the actual physical inventory count, but did spot-check a few of the items, which definitely indicated that the hospital is carrying the approximate quantities shown on the physical inventory.

The accounts payable were not confirmed by outside correspondence.

COMMENTS

The average per diem cost of in-patient care is up from \$23.57 in 1963, to \$29.44. This can be attributed, at least in part, to a decrease in occupancy rate from 66.1% in 1963, to 57.45%. Because of the increase in per diem cost, from the interim rate, we computed your retroactive payment due from Blue Cross to be \$5,339.88.

The hospital is presently engaged in an expansion program; however that part to be paid for by the city of Cordell is not sufficiently far enough advanced to be entered on the books.

The books were found to be in excellent condition. No recommendations for changes are made.

AUDITORS' OPINION

With the above limitations and exceptions, in our opinion the attached statements present fairly the results of operations for the period January 1 to December 31, 1964, and the financial condition of the hospital for the period then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, applied on a basis consistent with the preceding year.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1964, with spot-check of detail transactions.

The accounts receivable were confirmed by outside correspondence.

We had no opportunity to witness the physical inventory taking, but did spot-check some of the items to verify that stocks are being maintained at the approximate levels reported.

The accounts payable were not confirmed by outside correspondence.

COMMENTS

In general the books were found to be in excellent order. We did charge additional administrative expense and dietary expense to the nursing home.

The nursing home shows a loss, whereas the hospital proper shows a net gain, after re-allocation of expenses; however we believe this reflects the realities of the situation. Even so the hospital does profit financially over-all from the nursing home, since it absorbs much of the fixed overhead.

AUDITORS' OPINION

With the above exceptions and limitations, in our opinion the attached financial statements present fairly the financial condition of this hospital as of December 31, 1964, and the results of operations for the period then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Gentlemen:

We have completed an audit of the Sayre Hospital at Sayre, Oklahoma, for year ending December 31, 1964. Attached, as part of my report thereon, please find exhibits and schedules as follows:

Exhibit A: General Fund Balance Sheet, as of December 31, 1964.

Exhibit B: Plant Fund Balance Sheet, as of December 31, 1964.

Exhibit C: Statement of General Fund Income and Expense, January 1 to December 31, 1964.

Schedule C-1: Earnings from Routine and Special Services, January 1 to December 31, 1964.

Schedule C-2: Expenses of Routine and Special Services, January 1 to December 31, 1964.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1964, with spot-check of detail transactions.

We had no opportunity to witness the physical inventory taking, but did spot-check some items to verify that stocks are being maintained at the approximate levels reported.

The accounts receivable were confirmed by outside correspondence.

The accounts payable were not confirmed by outside correspondence.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

We found the books of account to be in excellent condition, generally speaking; however the statistical records are still not good. We attribute this, not to any lack of good intent or conscientious effort on the part of the personnel involved, but to a lack of training. If you like we can suggest a hospital not far away which has excellent records that we feel sure would be willing to help you. We again recommend that, since the statistics are of such vital importance, they should be made the direct responsibility of one person. We suggested a method of balancing each month's statistics, which should also be of some help. The following comments are made:

The average per diem cost of in-patient service for the entire year was down to \$27.03, from the average cost of \$27.30 for 1963.

This improvement can be attributed at least in part to an increase in occupancy rate from 58.06% to 68.35%.

AUDITORS' OPINION

With the above exceptions and limitations, in our opinion the attached financial statements present fairly the financial condition of this hospital as of December 31, 1964, and the results of operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

We have completed an audit of the books of the Sayre Chronic and Convalescent Hospital at Sayre, Oklahoma, for the year ending December 31, 1964. Attached, you will please find exhibits and schedules as follows:

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of December 31, 1964.

We had no opportunity to witness the physical inventory taking, so accepted the inventory figures compiled by the hospital personnel. In any case apparently extensive stocks are neither maintained nor needed.

In view of the nature of patient population and heavy reliance upon third party payors, we did not attempt to confirm receivables.

Accounts payable were not confirmed by outside information.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

We again found the inter-hospital accounts out of balance, but only by one item. We believe this problem is now virtually solved.

Except for the above, we found the books to be well kept.

Since the Sayre Chronic and Convalescent Hospital and the Sayre Hospital are entirely separate institutions, we again recommend strongly that the Oklahoma City office bill each institution separately for insurance and all other items, if any. Your insurance carrier can break this down for you, and we recommend you insist upon it.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

For the principal reason that we made no outside confirmation, we should not express an over-all opinion as to the attached financial statements; as the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, which organization sets the standards for our profession, would not approve. At the same time we are not apologetic, neither about the books nor about these financial statements. Giving due consideration to all that we did not do on this audit, in our opinion the attached financial statements reliably report the financial operations and condition of this convalescent hospital for the period and time indicated.

COMMENTS

Organization

Baptist Laymen's Corporation was incorporated under Oklahoma law on February 12, 1960, as a corporation with perpetual duration and without capital stock.

The general purpose of the corporation is to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by Southern Baptist Convention.

Doctors Medical Building

The first project of Baptist Laymen's Corporation was the financing, construction and leasing of a Doctors medical Building, adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This was completed in 1963.

This building and land held by Baptist Laymen's Corporation as trustee, was conveyed to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in 1963, at which time the convention assumed all the liabilities of Baptist Laymen's Corporation arising from financing, construction and leasing of this building.

Baptist Memorial Hospital, a division of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, assumed the management of Doctors Medical Building as of January 1, 1964.

The First Mortgage Serial Sinking Fund Bonds issued by Baptist Laymen's Corporation in connection with the financing of Doctors

Medical Building were prepaid by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in April, 1964, from funds made available through refinancing of Baptist Memorial Hospital property.

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes

On December 3, 1963, the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of a tract of land containing 35 acres to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention.

The trustee is authorized and empowered to erect one or more buildings for the housing and care of elderly persons, and such other improvements as it deems necessary and advisable, and, further, to carry out such purpose, is authorized and empowered to mortgage such real estate and improvements in any manner.

The trustee is authorized to grant leasehold estates of this real estate or any part thereof for terms of years not to exceed a total of twenty years.

The trustee shall pay annually or at more frequent intervals, to Baptist General Convention the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust, after deduction of taxes, all expenses incurred, and all payments on debts incurred in the erection and operation of the improvements.

The convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

The 35 acres of land, which was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation on June 10, 1964, is shown at an appraised value of \$122,500.00.

Golden Age Homes Building Funds in the amount of \$11,167.93 were held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1964. These funds will be available for construction purposes.

On February 12, 1965, the Board of Directors of Baptist Laymen's Corporation adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of

real estate first mortgage 6 per cent interest bearing bonds with a trust indenture providing for a total issuance of \$2,000,000.00 in bonds to be paid in 10 years. The bonds are to be issued in series as the funds are needed to finance the construction of the apartment houses and the nursing home to be located on the 35 acre tract of land adjoining the Senior Citizens Village at Northwest Highway and Council Road, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

On December 3, 1963, the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of a tract of land containing 35 acres to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention. The tract was conveyed in June, 1964, at an appraised value of \$122,500.00.

The trustee is authorized and empowered to erect one or more buildings for the housing and care of elderly persons, and such other improvements as it deems necessary and advisable.

The trustee is authorized to grant leasehold estates of this real estate or any part thereof for terms of years not to exceed a total of twenty years.

The trustee shall pay annually or at more frequent intervals, to Baptist General Convention the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust, after deduction of taxes, all expenses incurred, and all payments on debts incurred in the erection and operation of the improvements.

The convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

3. Bond Issue Authorization

On February 12, 1965, the Board of Directors of Baptist Laymen's Corporation adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of real estate first mortgage 6 per cent interest bearing bonds with a trust indenture providing for a total issuance of \$2,000,000.00 in bonds to be paid in 10 years. The bonds are to be issued in series as the funds are needed to finance the construction of the apartment houses and the nursing home to be located on the 35 acre tract of land adjoining the Senior Citizens Village at Northwest Highway and Council Road, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

COMMENTS

Organization

Federal credit unions are cooperative associations organized in accordance with the Federal Credit Union Act. Federal credit unions are chartered, examined and supervised by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions. The bureau's operating expenses are borne by the Federal credit unions. The bureau receives no direct appropriation of public funds.

Members' shareholdings are not insured by any agency of the government.

Baptist Building Federal Credit Union was organized by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions on July 11, 1958, with perpetual duration. The par value of each share is \$5.00.

"The purpose of this credit union is to promote thrift among its members, by affording them an opportunity for accumulating their savings; and to create for them a source of credit for provident or productive purposes."

"The field of membership shall be limited to those having the following common bond of association, occupation, or residence: employes of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated, the Oklahoma County Baptist Association, the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Home Mission Board who work in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; employes of the Child Care Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated, who work in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma; employes of this credit union; and members of their immediate families."

Loans (Notes Receivable)

Loans were receivable from 50 individual members in the total amount of \$30,216.51 at December 31, 1964.

Loan protection insurance is provided by the credit union in the form of life insurance on the life of the borrowing member equal to his loan balance up to \$5,000.00.

Members' Savings Share Accounts

Deposits were held as savings accounts from 114 members in the total amount of \$51,984.80 at December 31, 1964.

Life savings insurance is provided by the credit union which insures the members life in an amount equal to his savings in shares up to \$2,000.00

Reserve for Losses

The Federal Credit Union Act provides that all entrance fees and charges to members and 20% of the net earnings of each dividend period, before the declaration of any dividends, shall be set aside as a regular reserve against losses on bad loans until this reserve shall equal 10% of the total amount of members shareholdings. No further transfer of net earnings is required except such amounts as may be needed to maintain this 10% ratio.

Undivided Earnings

Accumulated earnings available for dividends at December 31, 1964, were \$1,221.46.
