Associational missionary in Oklahoma for 10 years.

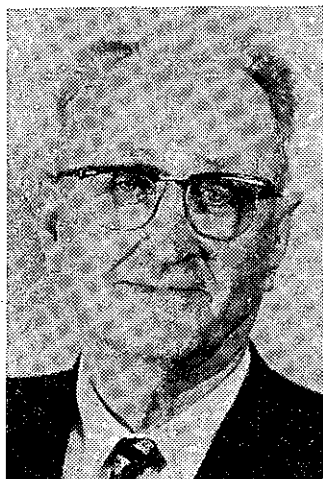
Associate executive secretary-treasurer of the Kansas Convention of Southern Baptists at the time of his death.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 50 members, provided that no church shall have over 10 messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the executive secretary-treasurer, shall be elected annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving a majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This board of directors shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the convention and 60 other members who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. The membership of this board shall include not less than 16 persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight men and at least eight women.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors shall be the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary-treasurer to serve, until such time as the convention meets. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

Section 4. This board shall elect all department heads, including the editor of the *Baptist Messenger* and the assistant executive secretary. The executive secretary-treasurer, in consultation with the committees of the Board of Directors which are involved, shall select the workers in the executive division, with the exception of office or similar personnel. The department heads, in counsel with the executive secretary-treasurer and the committees of the Board of Directors which are responsible for their work, shall select their workers, other than office or similar personnel. The executive secretary-treasurer and each department head shall select his office or similar personnel. Those responsible for electing or selecting workers shall fix their salaries.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be sixty (60) plus the president and the recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen (15) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

... In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors, shall be the Exec-

utive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semiannual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be: A president of the Board of Directors, elected by the convention; a recording secretary, elected by the convention; an executive secretary-treasurer, elected by the convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The president of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to ap-

point a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The executive secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The executive secretary-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The bylaws shall be adopted by the general convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the bylaws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

Section 2. Election of officers shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the convention or the

Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the general convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the general convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Charter and Bylaws

CHARTER AND BYLAWS OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation Feb. 9, 1910, amended Jan. 26, 1956.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is Paul K. Nance, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are: to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of

the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provide for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

The qualifications of said Board of Trustees and of the presidents of said institution and of all departments thereof shall be as follows: That each member of said Board of Trustees shall be a member of a Baptist Church within the state; that the presidents of said institution and each of its departments shall be members of Baptist churches."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election

of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semiannual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semiannual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semiannual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Bap-

tist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 12. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semiannual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 13. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 14. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 15. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, until Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section #12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma, and of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of the said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work.

ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist church affiliated with the Bap-

ARTICLE I**Membership**

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

NAME**RESIDENCE**

who were recommended by the Board of Directors of the Convention to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and ratified and approved by said Convention. Such membership to continue until their successors are elected; and all shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of accredited Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II**Annual Meeting of the Directors**

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting at a designated place at the call of the President of the Foundation a short time prior to the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the annual report and recommendation of the Directors shall be presented to and acted upon by the Convention at its regular meeting.

ARTICLE III**Officers**

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, one or more vice-presidents, an executive secretary, who shall also be the secretary and the treasurer of the corporation. Such elective officers, with the exception of the executive secretary, shall be chosen at a meeting of the Board of said corporation, to be held at the Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the Board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only. The executive secretary shall be elected by the Board of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected.

In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lessor officers as it deems necessary, or desirable, such as administrative assistants, assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

Section 1—President:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2—Vice-Presidents:

It shall be the duty of each of the vice-presidents to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3—Executive Secretary:

The executive secretary shall be the official administrator of all of the work of the Board of Directors and shall make full report of all matters committed to the Board of Directors.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of secretary; shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors and then shall perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

The executive secretary shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The executive secretary shall file with the Board of Directors of

the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expense of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 4—Directors:

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

ARTICLE V

Method of Election and Terms of Office

Section 1—Directors:

The directors for the first year shall be those designated in the charter and as may be approved at the Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, when the charter and these bylaws are submitted for the approval of the board.

The directors shall serve for a term of four (4) years, beginning with the 15th day of November, 1946, and the first sixteen (16) directors shall serve as follows:

for a term of four (4) years;

shall serve for a term of three (3) years;

shall serve for a term of two (2) years;

shall serve for a term of one (1) year.

Each year thereafter the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma the four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years, and shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year.

Section 2—Other Officers:

The directors shall select from among their own number a president, and one or more vice presidents, each of whom shall hold office for one year.

Section 3—Vacancies:

Vacancies on the board of directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If the Baptist General Convention shall fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Directors

Section 1—Regular Meeting:

The board of directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings:

Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the board of directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committee:

The board of directors may, at their first meeting, or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum:

A quorum of the board of directors shall consist of at least five (5) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority:

The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral

deeds, releases, receipts, acquaintances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice-president of the board of directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

ARTICLE VII

Distributees

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VIII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of -----, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA."

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meetings of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, nor shall any such amendment become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

May 19, 1967

J. M. Gaskin, President, Presiding

1. The Special Called Meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma met in Raley Chapel of Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, on May 19, 1967.

2. President J. Marvin Gaskin called the convention to order at 10 a.m.

3. Gene Bartlett of our State Music Department led the congregation in song service "All Hail the Power" and "Blessed Assurance" were used. Richard Huggins was the organist and Mike Manes the pianist.

4. Lowell Milburn, pastor, First Church, Shawnee, brought the report of the Credentials Committee stating that 856 messengers were present, and moved that these and others registering after this report be recognized as the convention. Those on the Credentials Committee were: Lowell Milburn, chairman, T. Hollis Epton, J. C. Segler, Sam Pace and Jack James.

5. M. J. Lee, pastor, First Church, Guymon, made a motion that the proposed program planned by the Stewardship-Budget Committee, and printed for distribution, be the order of business for this convention. Members of the Stewardship-Budget Committee are: M. J. Lee, chairman, Bob Evans, Ralph Crawford, J. C. Segler, T. Hollis Epton, J. P. Dane, Lowell Milburn and M. F. Ewton.

6. Special music was brought by Oklahoma Baptist University. James D. Woodward, professor of church music, directed the Chapel Choir. They sang "Take Up Thy Cross," "Gone to Live with God" and other wonderful numbers.

The faculty quartet, composed of Gary Horton, professor of voice; C. L. Bass, professor of theory; Jim Brown, professor of voice, and James D. Woodward, sang "Open the Door for Me" and "It Is Enough that Jesus Died."

7. M. J. Lee brought the recommendations of the Board of Directors of the convention and moved that the report be adopted as follows:

Report of the Board of Directors

TO THE SPECIAL CALLED MEETING OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF OKLAHOMA

May 19, 1967

The Board of Directors met in a called meeting Thursday, Feb. 9, 1967, to consider plans for meeting future financial needs of Oklahoma Baptist University and Baptist Student Union work.

Oklahoma Baptists are aware of the urgent need for additional funds for these purposes. After considering other methods of raising money, it was unanimously agreed that the best way is to greatly enlarge the Cooperative Program. This plan will produce more funds in the long run and will permit every person who gives through his church to share in meeting these needs. Since these additional funds are not preferred, but rather advance (that is to come after the basic budget is met), this plan will not take away anything from other mission causes in the state or beyond. Oklahoma Baptists are well able to meet these needs, and we believe they are fully ready to increase their Cooperative Program sufficiently to reach the objective. The board therefore recommends:

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1968 be \$3,500,-000 including a basic budget of \$3,186,402 to be divided 57 per cent State and 43 per cent Southern Baptist Convention. All received over the basic budget will be divided between OBU and BSU work on the basis of 75 per cent to OBU and 25 per cent to BSU work.
2. That 1968 budget allocations for state work will be held to an increase of \$35,000 over 1967 allocations (the average increase to these departments over the past five years).
3. That this plan or a similar plan be considered each year through 1972.
4. That the churches be challenged to increase their Cooperative Program objectives one to three per cent of the total church budget over the 1967 percentage. (This would produce a 10 to 30 per cent increase in Cooperative Program dollars over 1967.)
5. That OBU be encouraged to continue to solicit gifts from foundations, corporations, alumni, and other interested friends, but not from church budgets.
6. That churches, associations, and individuals adjacent to BSU centers continue to support this work as a local obligation and privilege.
7. That the Baptist Foundation be encouraged to continue leading Oklahoma Baptists and other friends to endow all our institutions, with the hope that regular Cooperative Program and endowment income will be adequate within five years to meet the needs of our institutions.

8. We also recommend that, if the above recommendations are approved, all 1967 Cooperative Program receipts over \$3,125,000 be distributed 75 per cent OBU-25 per cent BSU.

Motion was seconded.

8. President Grady C. Cothen of OBU spoke on the subject, "What This Can Mean to Oklahoma Baptist University." It was an inspiring message.

9. Director of Baptist Student Work, Clyde Clayton, spoke on the subject, "What This Can Mean to BSU."

10. Warren C. Hultgren, pastor, First Church, Tulsa, spoke on the subject, "What This Can Mean to All Missions."

11. Time arrived for the discussion and vote on the proposal presented to this convention.

Whitley Garrett, pastor, Fairview Church; Sunny Stuart, pastor, Sinclair Church, Oklahoma City; Richard Waters, pastor, Central Church, Lawton; T. S. Dane, layman, Kelham Church, Oklahoma City; Eugene Enlow, Immanuel Church, Tulsa, and Doyal Carpenter, Shawnee, spoke in favor of the proposal. Jack Thompson, Meridian Avenue, Oklahoma City, spoke against the proposal since his church was not in financial position to support it. D. A. Williams, Memorial Church, Tulsa, and others also spoke in favor of the proposal.

12. Motion carried to adopt the proposal by standing vote. Only 10 or 12 voted against it.

13. Vice-President Evans T. Moseley of OBU led in prayer closing the morning session.

14. President J. M. Gaskin called the afternoon session of the convention to order at 1:15 p.m.

15. Gene Bartlett led the congregation in song service, singing "Amazing Grace," with Richard Huggins at the organ and Mike Manes at the piano.

16. Special music was furnished by the combined Glee Club, under the direction of Warren M. Angell and James D. Woodward, including "Sing and Rejoice," "Amen," "The Unchanging God" and "The Lord Reigneth."

17. The congregation stood in appreciation of the music program at OBU.

18. Assistant Executive Secretary Joe Ingram spoke on the subject, "How We Can Succeed in This Program." Emphasis was placed upon the Cooperative Program as the best way to reach these objectives.

19. Lowell Milburn, pastor, First Church, Shawnee; Robert L. Cargill, pastor, First Church, Hollis; Miss Abbie L. Green, executive secretary-treasurer, Woman's Missionary Union, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; G. H. Crittendon, pastor, Central Church, Muskogee; Leon Sewell, pastor, First Church, Weatherford; T. Hollis Epton, pastor, First Church, Duncan, and H. H. Hobbs, pastor, First Church, Oklahoma City, spoke on the subject, "You Can Count On Us to Go the Second Mile." All of these indicated their personal support.

20. T. B. Lackey, executive secretary-treasurer of our state convention, spoke on the subject, "Now Perform the Doing."

21. Gene Bartlett led the congregation in singing "To God Be the Glory," and "Victory in Jesus."

22. Dean Lewis Solomon led in the prayer of adjournment.

To cope with the changes the agency has continued to experiment with and to search for relevant methods in missions, such as those to be used in resort communities, industrial situations, juvenile delinquency, and high-rise apartments. Studies continued in transitional areas, with downtown churches and with ministries to ex-prisoners.

Record support came during the year through the Cooperative Program (\$4.7 million) and the Annie Armstrong Offering (\$4 million). The goal for the Annie Armstrong Offering was reached for the first time since 1961.

Some pressing needs remain unmet in missionary appointments: 70 Spanish missionaries, 8 Italian, 18 Slavic, 14 Indian, 25 US-2, 25 other language groups, 9 couples and 11 single women for Baptist centers and weekday ministries, and 1 couple for migrant missions.

Funds for disaster relief, which started with \$50,000 in 1966, will reach \$235,000 during 1967 with increased funds coming through the Advance Section of the Cooperative Program.

Metropolitan and academic evangelism ministries received intensive study to plan Southern Baptist approaches in both areas. Metro-

politan crusades in Denver and Phoenix are planned for 1968, and the Dayton, Ohio crusade was planned for 1967.

Vietnam military forces were served by 100 of the 849 Southern Baptist military chaplains serving on active duty. Strengthened efforts have also been made for ministries by chaplains with hospitals, institutions, and in industry, and with churches in meeting the needs of military personnel near them or from their membership who are away on active duty.

Financial assistance went to 270 churches for loans totaling more than \$4.5 million. The funds of the Church Loans Division now total more than \$17.5 million, and the agency seeks new methods of guaranteed loans that will multiply these funds.

The Northeast Crusade, a concerted emphasis on missions for the 10-state northeastern area through 1970, was launched in 1966 with most of the agencies of the SBC participating, under the leadership of the Home Mission Board's Department of Pioneer Missions and the state conventions of Ohio and Maryland. This department also reported marked advance in work in all of the 24 states it serves.

Rural-Urban missions projects are under way in Indiana to establish new churches in small cities, and two other projects are planned for Ohio and Michigan. Resort mission techniques were studied in desert, mountain, inland lake and seashore pilot projects.

Metropolitan missions is implementing a significant and comprehensive pilot program for the Miami Beach area, and the department also is co-operating in an urban studies seminar in Washington, D.C. with Southeastern Seminary and the District of Columbia Convention.

A study of every language field where the board provides assistance is under way by the Department of Language Missions to secure the most effective use of resources.

Changes in attitudes among Southern Baptists toward the race problem and co-operation with National Baptists are slowly beginning to emerge—more open discussion, more involvement and a seeking after better relationships are reported by the Department of Work with National Baptists.

In Christian Social Ministries there has come a new awareness among Southern Baptists of the necessity to minister to all the needs of man; especially has this been noticed in the interest in weekday ministries. A research project is being conducted to discover how the church can make its message and ministry relevant to young people who are considered pre-delinquents or delinquents.

Because of increased dialogue between Southern Baptists and members of Christian sects, non-Christian world religions, and Roman Catholics, the Department of Work Related to Non-Evangelicals has sought to provide guidance and principles for such encounters.

The volunteers for special supporting missionary work swelled in number as 670 students from 212 colleges and four seminaries participated as student summer missionaries; 24 short-term volunteers were appointed for the Christian Service Corps; five were placed in pioneer areas as long-term volunteers, and a force of nearly 50 US-2

volunteers continue to serve, with approximately 25 being appointed each year for a two-year term.

A record attendance of more than 3,000 during Home Mission Week at Glorieta this year would seem to indicate an increased interest in the program of Home Missions.

(1) Representatives of the committee and foreign missionaries were introduced.

Foreign Missions

As of July, 1967, Southern Baptists had 2,301 missionaries under appointment to 65 countries, which means that since 1963 doors have been opened and missionaries have entered 12 new countries.

In 1966 a couple was appointed for work in Morocco. A missionary family was sent to Ankara, Turkey, in 1966 to work with English-speaking people. The first missionaries assigned to Bermuda arrived there near the beginning of 1966.

In the summer of 1966 a couple, after completing French language study, began residence in Abidjan, the capital of the Ivory Coast Republic. In June, 1966, a survey was made of mission needs and possibilities in Ethiopia. A missionary couple who had previously served in Tanzania took up residence in Addis Ababa, Ethiopian capital, in August, 1967, beginning the study of the Amharic language. Another couple was transferred from Rhodesia in late summer of 1967 to assist in the beginning of missionary advance in Ethiopia.

The Missionary Journeyman Program now provides opportunities for single college graduates under 27 years of age to serve with career missionaries for a nonrepeatable period of two years. Sixty-two of these choice young Southern Baptists were employed in April, 1967, to serve in various job categories, bringing the number of missionary journeymen employed since 1965 to 156.

Appointments by the Foreign Mission Board during the year of 1966 totaled 207 (131 career, 20 associates, 48 journeymen, 3 special project medical persons, and 5 reappointed). Between January and May, 1967, 45 more were added.

The winning of people to Jesus Christ is the basic purpose underlying all our missionary efforts. Through the years Southern Baptists have learned that the cultivation of New Testament churches is the wisest investment of missionary resources. At the close of 1966 there were 4,707 churches (3,076 self-supporting), 6,542 mission points, and 3,904 national pastors related to our Southern Baptist work. These reported 51,680 baptisms, 528,958 church members, and 604,487 enrolled in Sunday school. In each country the churches have voluntarily related themselves to each other in fellowships that have the

framework of either an association or a convention. China, closed to missionaries at present, was last estimated as having 392 churches and 123,000 members related to our mission work.

The 1,181 schools related to our missions in 41 countries had an enrolment of 185,050 students with a staff of 6,256 national and 387 missionary teachers and administrators. Among the schools are 43 theological institutions with 1,559 students and six women's training schools with 603 enrolled.

Book stores and reading rooms on our mission fields are confronting hundreds with the Christian message. Literature in the language of the people has become increasingly important for evangelism, leadership training and Christian education.

Our 23 publication centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas, (Spanish) produced over 21 million pieces: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymn books. Staffing these centers were 68 missionaries and 530 nationals.

Medical mission institutions include 20 hospitals and 56 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,391 beds. In 1966 there were 102 national and 62 missionary physicians serving with 312 nationals and 60 missionary nurses. They treated 589,055 patients. Engaged additionally in the medical ministry were 870 nationals and 40 missionaries.

Nineteen good will and community centers in 11 countries reach people in varied ways: literacy classes, home making courses, Bible study clubs, and evangelistic services. Staffed by 25 missionaries and 104 nationals, these centers enrolled 7,959 children and adults. In 13 children's homes, four missionaries and 99 national workers cared for 793 boys and girls.

The Cooperative Program continues to be the foundation of the greatest advance in foreign missions which Southern Baptists have ever experienced. In 1948 there were 625 Southern Baptist missionaries serving in 19 countries of the world. Cooperative Program gifts for foreign missions were slightly over two million dollars or 35 per cent of the total amount of money given through the Cooperative Program.

In 1966 with 2,212 missionaries serving in 62 countries, the Foreign Mission Board received \$11,829,531 or 49.3 per cent of the total Cooperative Program gifts. The enlargement of the Cooperative Program base has made possible the greatest missionary outreach in Southern Baptist history.

In emphasizing the importance of the Cooperative Program in foreign missions advance, Baker James Cauthen, executive secretary of the Foreign Mission Board, said,

"The Cooperative Program is many believers together reaching out in the name of Jesus Christ. The Cooperative Program is Southern Baptists. It's faith in action. It's love reaching out. It's a lifeline to the world. It's many church members multiplying themselves and entering countries for Christ. May God's blessings be upon Southern Baptists as they continue using the Cooperative Program so as to let Christ use them."

Last year we received \$13,760,146.80 through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. Total contributions to foreign missions through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas offering were \$25,589,677.80.

During 1966 many requests for additional missionary personnel came from the missions in 62 countries around the world. Included in these are requests for field missionaries who will be involved in field evangelism and church development, persons trained in religious education, workers with university youth, and teachers for Bible institutes and seminaries.

Multifaceted approaches to the missionary task have brought requests for people trained in agriculture, aviation, construction, public health, publication, radio and television, etc. The requests for medical missionaries continue to increase. One of the greatest needs is for career missionary nurses.

Advance in missionary personnel centers in the challenge to put 5,000 missionaries overseas at the earliest possible date. This goal is a part of a new program of advance projected by the Foreign Mission Board in 1964 which calls for a great new forward thrust in all phases of missionary appointment, support and expansion.

The new advance program was launched with 159 appointed or employed in 1964 followed by 220 in 1965 and 207 in 1966. Pray that God will help each of us to be deeply committed to this more realistic stewardship of the potential of Southern Baptists. Pray that we may realize that the goal of placing 5,000 missionaries abroad will demand greatly enlarged financial support.

The largest evangelistic thrust ever undertaken by Southern Baptists is the Crusade of the Americas. The idea was first suggested by Rubens Lopes, Brazilian Baptist leader, and was to be confined to Latin America. Later, the concept was expanded to include all the Western Hemisphere.

The Crusade is more a movement than an event and it will not be confined to 1969. This great evangelistic undertaking is already under way. Emphasis is being given this year to "Spiritual Preparation"; in 1968 to "Work and Witness"; in 1969 to "Proclamation," and in 1970 to "Follow Through."

Let us pray that through this Crusade, many people will be won to Christ, many new churches organized and countless young people will respond to the call of God.

God's worldwide redemptive plan calls for our participation. We have been given the ministry of reconciliation which requires us to do everything possible to bring all men to a saving experience with Christ. Let us accept anew the commission of Jesus in John 20:21, "... as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you."

(1) Members of the staff and Board of Directors were introduced.

(2) Thomas E. Carter, who will succeed Dr. Henry as executive secretary-treasurer, Jan. 1, 1968, was introduced, and spoke briefly of the work and accomplishments of the Foundation under Dr. Henry's leadership.

(3) Dr. Henry spoke to the report.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Presented by Augie Henry, Executive Secretary

This report covers the year from Oct. 1, 1966, through Sept. 30, 1967, and is the 19th report made to the convention during the administration of Augie Henry as executive secretary-treasurer.

Receipts and Disbursements

Total receipts for the year were \$1,434,517.28. Disbursements to Baptist causes were \$478,719.56, with \$211,711.68 being disbursed as endowment income, \$267,007.87 for buildings at institutions, and

for miscellaneous items. The assets on Sept. 30, 1967, were \$7,757,-775.83.

It should be noted that the above figures are based on the book value of cash, and the value of other properties on the dates the contributions were received. Today's market value of receipts and assets would be considerably larger than figures given above.

Income Produced on Foundation Trusts

Income produced on income producing Foundation trusts during the past year totaled \$364,149.91. The net percentage of income produced during the calendar year 1966, was 4.952 per cent.

Louise M. Prichard Trusts

The past year's receipts include \$192,313.28 from the estate of Louise M. Prichard, deceased. Several years prior to her death, on July 28, 1966, Mrs. Prichard set up living (intervivos) and testamentary (in her will) trusts in which she made contributions to the Foundation. Ultimately her contributions to the Foundation, as trustee for Oklahoma Baptist University ministerial and missionary student scholarships, for OBU endowment, and for building maintenance at First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, will amount to the largest contribution made thus far to the Foundation. And it will be the largest contribution made thus far for the benefit of Oklahoma Baptist causes by an individual. Mrs. Prichard was a faithful member of the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City.

Living Trusts and Wills Written

During the 12-month period a total of 316 formal living trusts and wills have been written from which the Foundation will receive in the future cash, other personal properties, (like stocks, bonds, etc.) and real properties. The 316 formal trusts and wills do not include hundreds of gifts made to the Foundation during the 12 months which did not require a formal trust agreement. Several trusts were made with life insurance policies. The policies are made payable to the Foundation as trustee for designated, or undesignated, Baptist causes.

Investments

According to a long-standing policy of the Foundation, 50 per cent of investment funds were committed for commercial investments, and the other 50 per cent for church loans. A total of 22 loans were committed for a total of \$676,000 for the year. These loans were committed on the condition that they would be closed when funds were available.

It is of interest to note that with the closing of the first loan, on Nov. 29, 1954, 312 loans have been closed for a total of \$6,584,-730.61. During this time interest on these loans, all of which goes to Baptist causes, has totaled \$1,324,384.89.

History of the Foundation

November 6, 1966, marked the 20th anniversary of the Foundation. The Board of Directors, upon the recommendation of the promotion committee, requested Thomas E. Carter, assistant execu-

tive secretary, to prepare a manuscript for the first 20 years' history of the Foundation, to be submitted to the committee and ultimately to the board for approval. The committee was composed of: Warren C. Hultgren, chairman; E. A. Abernethy, Bruce G. Carter, H. H. Hobbs, J. T. McAlester and Ray Murphy. Upon the recommendation of the above committee to the board at the meeting on July 14, 1967, the manuscript was approved, and the printing of 2,500 volumes was authorized.

The history has been distributed to all agencies, departments and institutions of the General Convention and to agencies and institutions of the Southern Baptist Convention. In addition, it has been distributed to pastors of churches that have libraries, to all associational superintendents of missions, to the various Baptist Foundations and to the executive offices of the state and Southern conventions.

Personnel

At the annual meeting of the Foundation's Board of Directors on Nov. 18, 1966, Auguie Henry, executive secretary-treasurer, requested his retirement as of Dec. 31, 1967. He also requested that a committee be authorized to nominate his successor, and to report to the board at the May 12, 1967, meeting.

The board voted to receive the announcement of Henry's retirement with regret, and to accede to his request. Also, the board authorized a committee to recommend Henry's successor. The committee was composed of the following: President Ray Young, chairman; Bruce G. Carter, H. H. Hobbs, W. M. (Jack) Bell and Warren C. Hultgren.

Then the board authorized the president to appoint a committee to plan for proper recognition, and to work out plans for Henry's retirement. That committee was composed of: Bruce G. Carter, chairman; R. A. Young, J. Ray Smith and Hicks Epton.

At the May 12 meeting of the board, the nominating committee unanimously recommended that Thomas E. Carter, who has been the assistant executive secretary since Sept. 1, 1962, be elected executive secretary-treasurer, effective as of Jan. 1, 1968. The recommendation was unanimously approved.

At the July 14 meeting of the board, the committee on Henry's retirement recommended that he be elected executive secretary emeritus, effective Jan. 1, 1968, and that he be requested to serve the Foundation on a retirement basis, in keeping with plans of the executive secretary-treasurer.

Henry has served as the first full-time executive secretary-treasurer since Sept. 15, 1949. He succeeded Andrew Potter, who was executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, and who served as the executive secretary-treasurer of the Foundation from its establishment to Sept. 15, 1949.

During the more than 18 years that Henry has served as the executive secretary-treasurer, the Foundation has grown in assets

from less than \$175,000 to \$7,757,775.83, on Sept. 30, 1967. We believe that the assets will be in excess of \$8 million on Dec. 31, 1967. Total receipts as of Sept. 30, were \$15,253,351.53. For several years it has been the second largest state Baptist foundation in the United States.

Along with trust funds for Baptist causes, and the large number of formal living and testamentary trusts which it is believed will more than double the present assets in the future, he will leave the Foundation \$92,690.88 in operating reserves and \$7,135.60 in operation revolving funds. In addition, he will leave to his successor an organization that is capable of administering all types of trust funds for Baptist causes, and for individual donors and their loved ones. Also, he will leave to his successor the responsibility of representing the Foundation in what has been an average of 25 wills in probate every day of the past nine years. The executive secretary-treasurer serves as executor of many of these wills. Finally, and it is very important, he will leave to his successor an organization that has made the Baptist Foundation a household name in most Oklahoma Baptist homes.

On Aug. 1, 1967, Earl L. Stark completed 10 years of dedicated and faithful service as the first field secretary of the Foundation. In addition to his speaking itinerary, his work primarily has been in working with donors and their attorneys in estate planning, and looking after the Foundation's rural real properties. He will retire as of Dec. 31, 1967, but the board has made it possible for him to serve the Foundation on a retirement basis after his retirement.

A New Experience

On July 14, 1967, the Board of Directors held its meeting at the Tulsa Baptist Center, Tulsa, where the Foundation has had an office since the beginning of the center. This was the first time in 18 years that a meeting of the board had been held outside of Oklahoma City. There was a twofold purpose in having the meeting in Tulsa: (1) so that the directors could see the center and the Tulsa office of the Foundation; and (2) to honor J. Ray Smith, an outstanding Tulsa businessman who has been a faithful member of the board since Oct. 20, 1955.

Promotion

During the first quarter of 1967, the Foundation's Implementing Program was presented in 59 of the 90 churches and missions of the Tulsa County Association. From Sept. 17 through Dec. 3, it is anticipated that this program will be presented in at least 94 of the 112 churches of Oklahoma County Association.

In February and March, 1967, the Foundation co-operated with the executive office of the convention in sponsoring five Stewardship-Foundation Leadership Workshops. These workshops were held at Quartz Mountain, Roman Nose, Western Hills, Arrowhead and Lake Texoma Lodges, with a total attendance of 126 leaders. Each meeting began at noon, with conferences being held during the afternoon and evening, and through the following morning.

The Foundation's Implementing Program will be continued in 1968. Plans are being made to present the program in at least four associations. Union, Frisco, Northeastern and Central Associations have been contacted regarding definite dates for the program.

The Stewardship-Foundation Leadership Workshops were well attended in 1967, therefore, it is planned to have five of these workshops during 1968 in different areas of Oklahoma.

Recommendations

1. We recommend to the Board of Directors of the convention, who will present the recommendation to the convention, that the following be elected to a four-year term as successors to directors of the Baptist Foundation who will not be eligible to succeed themselves immediately: Ralph Barby, Knowles; Herschel Bright, Hugo; Walter Grindstaff, Oklahoma City, and Robert C. Howard, Cushing.

2. We recommend that the associational stewardship chairman, who is elected by the association, shall be elected for a term of one year as a Foundation representative, together with the following:

This is nothing new or startling since we have been active in the publishing business since our beginnings. What is challenging is the rapidly increasing number of persons the world over who now can or are in the process of learning to read.

The rate of literacy in our world is ever-growing and these voracious reading appetites must be satisfied. One problem is the tremendous output of smut, secular and silly literature. As people of God with a commission of evangelism hanging over our heads, we must enter this field with spiritual literature at a rate never before felt necessary. To do otherwise will put us only farther behind in our attempts to reach our world. While some differences of opinion are voiced over content and application, the fact remains that Southern Baptists annually produce the finest and most comprehensive literature in the field of religion. Quarterlies, study course books, religious fiction and drama, scholarly and devotional books, children's literature and magazines of all shapes, sizes and purpose represent the heart of this significant ministry.

Most helpful to Oklahoma Baptists is the **Baptist Messenger**, our state weekly newsmagazine. The **Baptist Messenger** continually keeps Oklahoma Baptists informed, inspired and intelligent in matters of interest in the field of religion.

We pray that God will give us the wisdom and dedication needed to carry on this vital ministry of communicating the gospel to peoples of our world.

Religious Education

Lyle Garlow, Secretary

The work of the Department of Religious Education is most encouraging. The churches and leadership in our state seem to be vitally concerned with the three major programs of our work, namely, Baptist Student Union, Training Union and Sunday school. In addition to these, our department is responsible for other programs which include church administration, church library, church recreation, family ministry, vocational guidance, Vacation Bible School, weekday Bible study, audiovisual education and the program for Falls Creek Assembly.

The response to the ONE DAY GROWTH WORKSHOPS conducted in 36 of our associations this year was excellent. There were 678 churches represented with 870 pastors and staff members attending, with a total attendance of 5,052 church leaders. There is evidence of growth and renewed interest among our churches which should produce visible gains in coming months for both Training Union and Sunday school.

A number of changes in our educational programs are being projected by the Baptist Sunday School Board for 1970. Our department will endeavor to provide guidance and interpretation for these changes at the proper time.

It is my privilege to work with the finest staff to be found anywhere. They are: Clyde C. Clayton, director of student work; Bill C. Haggard, director of Training Union work; Miss Alga Motychak, director of children's work, and Hugh Willoby, director of youth and Vacation Bible School work. The office staff consists of: Mrs. Peggy Collins, administrative secretary; Mrs. Joan Garrison, secretary to Clayton; Mrs. Wanda Jennings, secretary to Haggard; Mrs. Roberta Peck, receptionist, and Miss Judy Hill, Sunday school records secretary.

The program of Sunday school work is directly my responsibility and the report is as follows:

Sunday School

Enrolment was reported at 330,943, with a total of 670 Standard units. **Vacation Bible School Work**, directed by Hugh Willoby, reported an enrolment of 141,819 in 1,153 schools. This is the largest number ever reported. Also, there were 2,032 professions of faith reported from 629 schools.

The major thrust of our Sunday school work in 1968 will be through two statewide projects, the CENSUS and the CHURCH OUTREACH WORKSHOPS. These are already scheduled in most associations and will contribute to the success of the Crusade of the Americas.

Training Union

Bill C. Haggard, director of Training Union work, is making a great contribution to the development of this work. He reports an enrolment of 121,263 in 1,103 functioning Training Unions. "M" Night was conducted in each association last year with an attendance of 16,792 from 849 churches. There were 730 pastors present.

Dates, goals and projects, 1967-68:

1. "Advance in Church Training" (ACT) will be a major program introduced to the churches in October, 1967. This is a project to strengthen the training program of the churches.

2. The Training Union Convention will be Oct. 19-20, 1967, Sequoyah Hills Church, Tulsa.

3. The associational "Mobilization Night" program is scheduled for Dec. 4, 1967. The statewide goal is 20,000. The suggested associational goals are 20 per cent of the Training Union enrolment.

4. A state finalist contest in Junior Memory Work, Intermediate Sword Drill, and Young People's Speakers' Tournament.

5. A goal of 20 new Training Unions in the state during the year with a statewide increase in Training Union enrolment of 5,000.

6. Four Training Union conferences to be conducted to train associational Training Union leadership.

7. A renewed interest in the Church Training Program and the availability of new materials indicates optimistic future for Training Union.

Baptist Student Union

Clyde C. Clayton continues to give excellent guidance to our student work as well as contributing significantly to areas of development on the SBC level.

Oklahoma Baptists came to grips with student work in a major way at our first special convention May 19, 1967 at Shawnee. The special convention acknowledged again the vital importance of the 24,000 Baptists who are in college in Oklahoma. Funds which will come as the churches embrace the proposals of the convention, will assist in providing trained talented directors of student work at the 26 BSUs over the state.

Personnel additions in student work during the 1966-67 school year have been, Max Barnett, OU; John Burns, Central State; Mrs. Gene Clayton, Altus Junior College; Jim White, Northern Oklahoma College; Dorothy Patterson, Oklahoma City University and Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City, and Leon Hill, Enid schools.

Schools of Nursing

We have three schools of nursing—the collegiate school at Oklahoma Baptist University which is affiliated with Presbyterian Hospital, Oklahoma City. The diploma school at Enid and the diploma school at Baptist Memorial, Oklahoma City. The Oklahoma City school is being changed to baccalaureate program (official action found in the Report of the Board of Directors).

Enid Name Changed

In the Report of the Board of Directors is the official action of the change of name from Enid General to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital.

All 10 hospitals are fully accredited by the Joint Commission. All 10 administrators and several assistant administrators have specialized training in hospital administration at Oklahoma Baptist University and/or master's degrees in hospital administration. James L. Henry, administrator of Baptist Memorial, Oklahoma City, will be installed as president of the Oklahoma Hospital Association at its annual meeting Nov. 14-15, 1967.

Child Care

H. Truman Maxey, Executive Director

Oklahoma Baptists through their Child Care Department ministered to 283 individual boys and girls and young people in the past 12 months. The daily average was close to 200.

The department is a multi-service organization so as to more nearly meet the need of each individual child. Children are cared for in group care of the Children's Home and Boys Ranch Town. Some are cared for on a permanent basis by adoption. Our responsibility will be from six-months to one year. On a temporary basis a foster family is used or family aid utilized if conditions warrant.

At present we have some excellent employees. The greatest need is always for those who will serve as houseparents or cooks. This is a wonderful work, and the salary is comparable to other jobs.

A new swimming pool was finished at Boys Ranch Town in time for them to enjoy it some this summer. The next project is an administration building providing offices, a central meeting place, a library and a place for counseling. Target date is Sept. 1, 1968.

Baptist Children's Home has a new family style, one-story cottage for 12. It was built and furnished by the estate of the late Oatley Anderson of Chickasha. A second cottage will soon be built by a living donor, Tom Lucas of Sentinel. It will be similar to the Anderson Cottage. A third family styled cottage is needed badly to bring the population back to where it was before the two old dormitories were removed. This would be a marvelous opportunity to memorialize a family name.

15 and 65—a worthy child care mark

80 good years of Baptist heart.

The element of "anniversary year" will be used throughout the year in promotion and publicity. "Eighty good years of Baptist heart" has written lots of history upon the hearts of many lives of boys and girls that have come our way. This is the "Inasmuch . . ." of Baptist people. Thank you.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Historical Secretary

The Historical Commission consists of nine members, three of whom are elected each year for three-year, staggered terms. The work of the commission is financed by a \$2,400 annual appropriation from the Cooperative Program, plus a nominal income from Historical Society dues.

Historical Society

The Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society is auxiliary to the commission. It meets annually during the sessions of the state convention. Membership is open to all interested persons. Annual dues are \$2, and life membership dues are \$25. Members of the society receive,

without charge, the semiannual publication **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**, edited by J. M. Gaskin.

Since its organization in 1956, there have been 198 persons who have held membership in the Historical Society. The current membership includes 75 persons who have paid annual membership dues and 18 life members. Norman W. Cox, emeritus secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention's Historical Commission, and E. W. Thornton, former history professor at Oklahoma Baptist University, are the only honorary life members.

Chronicle

The current issue of **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle** contains an exhaustive article by J. W. Hodges entitled "Periods of Controversy in Oklahoma Baptist History." This timely article covers many issues of tension which have characterized periods of Oklahoma Baptist history for more than 100 years. Persons who do not receive the **Chronicle** by subscription should order a copy of this number for their historical libraries. Address requests to J. M. Gaskin, Box 147, Durant, Okla. 74701. Send 50 cents per copy to cover cost of publication and postage.

The current issue of the **Chronicle** also carries a directory of the Historical Society.

Volumes I-V of the **Chronicle** were indexed by Robert S. Jackson in 1963, and the index was published in the spring, 1963, number of the **Chronicle**. Volumes VI-X will be indexed for publication sometime in 1968.

Falls Creek

The main project of the commission during the past year has been connected with the 50th anniversary observance of the founding of Falls Creek Baptist Assembly. **The Falls Creek Story** was written by J. M. Gaskin at the request of the commission and was published prior to the 1967 encampment season. Three thousand paperbound copies were issued, plus 300 clothbound copies. Convention officials report an encouraging response in the sale of the book. The price per copy is \$1.98 for the paperback, and \$2.50 for the cloth.

The Falls Creek Memorial Park was developed largely through the efforts of Sam W. Scantlan on the site where W. D. Moorner and J. B. Rounds are reported to have knelt in prayer to dedicate the Falls Creek grounds for a Baptist assembly sometime before August, 1917. This lot was formerly used by Downtown Baptist Church, Oklahoma City; and some years ago it was relinquished to the convention for use as an historical site. An appropriate marker has been erected on the lot in addition to 12 stones commemorating the services of the following persons in the founding and development of the assembly: Mrs. Maude Abner, Rosalee Mills Appleby, Blount F. Davidson, Thad H. Farmer, Sue Howell, E. E. "Hotdog" Lee, Fred A. McCaulley, Franz Marshall McConnell, William Durant Moorner, Andrew Potter, James Burley Rounds, Berta Keys Spooner.

This park was dedicated in four identical ceremonies during the four weekly encampments at Falls Creek in 1967.

Recommendations

The Commission submits the following general recommendations to the convention:

1. Each association should be encouraged to elect its own historian each year.

2. Associations and churches should be encouraged to microfilm their minutes.

3. Every association and church in the state should be encouraged to observe significant anniversaries, and those who have not prepared recent histories should appoint a history committee to select a writer at an early date to prepare a documented history.

4. We would strongly urge all churches and associations to publish their histories, if possible.

5. We would invite more interested persons to become members of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society.

48. Ed Stewart, Country Estates Church, Oklahoma City, presented the report of the American Bible Society.

American Bible Society

The American Bible Society shares the concern for worldwide missions which Southern Baptists are expressing in plans for the Crusade of the Americas and World Missions Year in 1969. The entire program of Bible Society work is founded on these basic missionary principles:

People must have the Bible because it presents Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after he must leave—and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

But, there is a worldwide shortage of Bibles, because in most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The American Bible Society is a worldwide missionary organization. It is an active partner in Southern Baptist work. It helps missionaries translate the Bible. It publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them without profit, usually below cost, and often without any charge in cases of special need. For the blind, it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems, Talking Bible records and tape recordings.

God's Word for a New Age — the Book for New Readers

A program of advance is being carried on by the American Bible Society in co-operation with 34 other national Bible Societies around the world. In 1968 this program will enter its second phase with the theme, "God's Word for a New Age—the Book for New Readers."

Its aim is to provide greatly increased quantities of Scriptures urgently needed for mission work. Long-range goals are:

- A Bible in every Christian home
- A Testament in every Christian's hand
- A Scripture portion for every reader
- Supplies of Scriptures for Christians to share

During 1966 the American Bible Society—

- rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1,280 languages; the full Bible in 240, a Testament in 301 more, a Gospel or other complete book in 739 more—but still counted over 1,000 more languages in which not one book of the Bible has yet been published.
- gave more than 500,000 Scripture volumes for distribution by chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veterans' hospitals, as a vital link between the home churches and men in service.
- produced, in several languages, Scriptures in everyday speech, printed in attractive forms. Outstanding among these is **Good News for Modern Man**, the today's English version New Testament, translated by the society's translation department. Published Sept. 15, 1966, at least 5 million copies are expected to be distributed by the close of 1967.
- set new records by distributing 39,981,620 Scripture volumes in the U.S.A. and a total of 61,815,238 volumes, in over 400 languages, in some 150 countries around the world—and continued to increase translation, publication and distribution to meet urgent needs.

Southern Baptists Support the Work

Because the Bible Society serves mission work—and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the society for Scriptures they need for their people—Southern Baptists believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

In 1966 Southern Baptist churches gave \$233,896 to the American Bible Society and ranked first among all denominations. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$1,472,307.

Although Southern Baptist churches lead in total gifts, the per capita gift is less than 2½ cents per year—and less than the per capita gift from several other major denominations.

Southern Baptist churches can lead, even in per capita gifts—if every church will give. Has your church given this year? Here are suggestions, based on what many churches are doing:

Every church can give at least these amounts each year:

- Smaller churches\$10 to \$60
- Larger churches\$60 to \$300
- Great city churches\$300 to \$600 or more

We would like to think that the music at our state conventions and at Falls Creek helped people to find God.

We would like to think that the Warren M. Angell School of Fine Arts at Oklahoma Baptist University and the newly created Church Music Department there helped people to find God.

The Baptist Sunday School Board, through its Church Music Department, provides many free aids in assisting us in leading people to find God.

Most people let the technical part of music keep them from finding God.

Your state Church Music Department is available to assist any church or association in getting beyond the notes.

One of the finest things that has ever happened to our department is the promotion of Mary June Tabor from office secretary to associate. Call upon us. We hope that the music ministry of your church is helping people to find God.

Camp Hudgens

Three cabins, winterized and with bath facilities, were constructed at Camp Hudgens at a cost of \$14,947 and used this last summer. The cabins will accommodate eight boys and a counselor each. Dedication was held July 1, 1967. A sewer lagoon, sewer lines, and winterization and improvement of the water system were completed at a cost of \$23,352. Other development included construction of an outdoor chapel, renovation of the office building, and purchase of equipment. All projects were made possible by \$8,000 in the Cooperative Program, \$10,000 in the 1967 state WMU mission offering, and fund drives in various counties.

Boys Ranch Town

A swimming pool was constructed at Boys Ranch Town by Pad-dock Pools, Inc. and Harris Builders, at a cost of \$48,247.70. The pool and bathhouse were dedicated July 29 with R. C. Howard bringing the address.

Children's Home

The Oatley Anderson Memorial Cottage was completed at the Children's Home at a cost of approximately \$89,000 including furnishings. This is a family style one-story cottage for 12 children. Funds were received from the estate of Oatley Anderson of Chickasha.

Another cottage has been assured by Tom Lucas of Sentinel, a long-time friend of the home. Lucas provided funds for the Trade-Educational Buildings at Boys Ranch Town in 1961. Lucas is a very thrifty and successful farmer. He has never been married, but says the children at the home and Boys Ranch Town are his family. Plans are being drawn for this building which should be constructed soon.

Pryor Hospital

Grand Valley Hospital, Pryor, is in need of additional buildings due to overly crowded conditions. The Governing Board, administration and subcommittee are planning for the addition of a room that will house work area for maintenance and engineering. The cost is approximately \$12,000.

Another addition being planned is a building 82' x 60'. It will house two new service departments, Inhalation Therapy and Physical Therapy. It will also provide for a larger emergency room, laboratory, office and storage space and a nurses lounge. Estimated cost of this addition is \$124,800 or a total of \$136,800.

Sayre Hospital

The Sayre Hospital is planning to enlarge its facilities by adding an extended care facility with 24 beds, 8 private beds, a maternity section and additional office space. The only financial obligation which the convention will have is furnishings for the new addition. Sufficient operating funds are on hand to meet this obligation. The furnishings will cost from \$35,000 to \$50,000. Construction should be started before the end of 1967.

Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes

The Baptist Laymen's Corporation voted Aug. 18 to build an additional wing, with a capacity of 46 beds, to Lackey Manor in the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes. The estimated cost is \$206,000. The Building Committee of the corporation was authorized to complete plans and the finance committee arrange financing. This will bring the capacity to 108 beds. The 62 beds now in use are all filled and others are requesting admittance. Charles Truhitte is president of the corporation. Additional information is found in the reports of the Board and Hospitals and Golden Age Homes.

Enid Hospital

For more than a year citizens of Enid have been engaged in a fund-raising drive to help enlarge and modernize the hospital. At the last report \$550,000 of an \$800,000 objective had been pledged.

Grove Hospital

An addition has been built to the Grove Hospital at a cost of over \$100,000. Local citizens raised about one-third of the necessary funds, and about one-third was available from operating funds. Eleven beds were added, along with new dining facilities, medical records, storage and office space. Construction has been concluded and the new addition is in use. This hospital has made tremendous strides in the short time it has been in operation.

The Crusade of the Americas 1968-69

The objective for the Crusade of the Americas is "Christ for the Americas." Believing that Christ is the only hope, this correlated program is designed to help churches in Oklahoma in the area of evangelism, outreach, mission endeavor and church member training. To this end we will seek to:

1. Encourage the direction of the total energies of Oklahoma Baptists toward a successful program of "Outreach Through Evangelism and Missions for the Years 1968 and 1969."

2. Discover the lost and unchurched persons in Oklahoma through a statewide census, Aug. 25-Sept. 4, 1968.

3. Kindle the fires of revival through the Crusade of the Americas Rally in each association the first two weeks of September, 1968.

4. Accelerate outreach through the Sunday schools of Oklahoma.

(1) Associational pastor-led church outreach workshops (last two weeks of September)

(2) Sunday school enrolment visitation emphasis (October-November 1968)

5. Cultivate and seek to win to Christ and church membership every lost and unchurched individual not enrolled in Sunday school through the Cultivative Commitment Witnessing Program. (Begin Oct. 20, 1968, and continue through Jan. 26, 1969).

6. Preach the gospel in sermon and song in a two-week simultaneous evangelistic effort in every church in Oklahoma either March 16-30 or April 6-20, 1969.

7. Establish mission work and churches in as many places as possible in Oklahoma using the efforts of Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union.

(1) Mission Bible classes

(2) Fellowship Bible classes

(3) Mission churches

(4) Mission Sunday schools

(5) Mission Vacation Bible Schools

8. Conserve outreach in evangelism and missions through the Training Union with:

(1) New member orientation program in each church.

(2) An accelerated program of total membership enlistment in the Church Member Training Program.

9. Continue with a perennial effort in evangelism using every means possible to give the message, "Christ the Only Hope" to every individual in the state.

Brotherhood

The new program of Brotherhood work which places men, young men and boys in missionary education and mission involvement has been well received by our churches. There are many encouraging signs of interest and enthusiasm. An adequate evaluation of the work is not possible because of the newness of the organization and materials, but indications are good.

All of the training books are now ready and available. To acquaint you with these books, they are listed below with a brief statement of their purpose:

The Brotherhood Program of a Baptist Church by George Euting—This book outlines the task of the Brotherhood and gives the total concept of Brotherhood work.

Missionary Education for Baptist Men by George Euting, **Missionary Education for Baptist Young Men** by Norman Godfrey, and **Missionary Education for Baptist Boys Through Royal Ambassadors** by Edward Hurt are the methods books on how to organize and conduct programs of work for the three separate units.

Church Study Course credit is now available on all of the above books in Category 21.

The missionary crusade in Nevada, Oct. 3-9, 1966 was a thrilling experience. During the crusade 48 men served 35 churches and missions. The men did many things to assist the churches in Nevada, such as, census taking, visiting, witnessing, testimonies, work on buildings, revivals, etc. Measurable results showed 52 professions of faith, 39 additions by letter, 137 rededications, and 2,015 visits made.

The first World Missions Conference was conducted at Ridgecrest on June 22-28, 1967 by Woman's Missionary Union and the Brotherhood Commission. The success of the conference was attested by the more than 2,300 who registered for the meeting.

The program of Brotherhood work in 1968 will follow the convention theme of ministering. Since mission action is a part of the task of the Brotherhood, this should present some real challenges.

In preparation for the Crusade of the Americas in 1969, the Brotherhood will be doing all it can to promote vital spiritual preparation to involve men in witnessing and any other thing that will allow God to send a great spiritual revival in our midst.

Royal Ambassadors

Preliminary reports indicate an increase of 22 churches with RA work and a decline of 60 chapters over the year before, leaving a total of 550 churches with RA work and 1,027 chapters. The total number of chapters tends to fluctuate from year to year because of the number of multiple chapters in the churches.

The 1967 state RA Congress meeting in Oklahoma City had an attendance of 2,400. Those attending elected the following state officers: Steve Wilson, Duncan, president; Scott Wolf, Okmulgee, vice-president, and Owen Finley, McAlester, secretary. The 1968 Congress will be held March 2 at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee.

The Fourth National RA Congress is to be held in Oklahoma City, Aug. 13-15, 1968, with about 10,000 boys and leaders in attendance. Local preparation is being made by a steering committee composed of Chairman Bob Banks, Cleeta John Rogers, Don Donalson, Joan Harvison, J. A. Pennington and Eugene Stockwell. Oklahoma's attendance goal is 3,000.

Camp Hudgens Report

Camp Hudgens continues to progress in terms of development and camper attendance.

Three cabins providing for eight boys and a counselor were constructed at a cost of about \$5,000 each and were in use this summer. Sewer and water improvements, which included a sewage lagoon and winterizing of the water system, were made at a cost of \$23,352. All of these improvements will now make it possible for the camp to be used throughout the year. It is planned that a new unit lodge, including bath facilities for the tent unit will be constructed for 1968.

Camp attendance hit a new high with 856 boys and leaders present. There were 121 decisions, including 27 professions of faith, 44 rededications and 50 for church-related vocations.

(1) Members of the staff were introduced.

(2) Eugene Stockwell spoke concerning Brotherhood work.

(3) Bob Banks presented the state Royal Ambassador officers, and they spoke concerning the different areas of work.

(4) J. A. Pennington spoke concerning the work of evangelism.

Oklahoma Baptist University

Grady C. Cothen, President

The opening of the 1967-68 academic year marks the beginning of the second year of the administration of OBU's 10th president, Grady C. Cothen. During the summer of 1967 the position of assistant to the president was reactivated. Robert L. Lynn, former managing editor of the All-Church Press in Fort Worth and an OBU alumnus, was chosen to fill the position. Lynn began his duties July 1 and has

from the beginning demonstrated his remarkable ability in his administrative tasks. Also coming from the employment of the All-Church Press is J. Thomas Terry, OBU treasurer and comptroller, who replaces Gene T. Lucas.

Enrolment in the university reached 1,463 for the fall semester and 1,336 during the spring semester of 1966-67 with a total of 19 persons enrolled for extension instruction in religion during the year at the center in Oklahoma City. Student body came from 37 states and 17 areas outside the continental United States; 61 Oklahoma counties were represented with the largest enrolments from Pottawatomie, Oklahoma and Tulsa counties; every Baptist association in the state had students attending the university. Early registration for the 1967-68 academic year is substantially higher than in previous years, and student housing is at full capacity; both of these factors indicate another year of somewhat increased enrolment.

Two dormitory units for women (housing 56 students) were added to the university residence hall complex for the first semester, 1967-68. The women's dormitories with 560 occupants were filled beyond the normal capacity of 533. Brotherhood Dormitory had 371 residents as classes began in September. The over-all increase in dormitory occupancy in comparison with first semester 1966-67 is almost 7 per cent. The university continues to house approximately two-thirds of the student body.

During the fiscal year which ended May 31, 1967, the university showed a net increase in assets of over \$247,000 bringing the total (net of reserves) to \$11,700,000. During the year the bonded indebtedness of the university was reduced by \$68,000 to a new balance of \$1,987,000. The current fund reserve for operations stands at \$150,000, a decrease of \$76,000.

Current fund income received during the fiscal 1967 was in excess of \$2,024,000 with tuition and fees amounting to \$780,000 of this total. Endowment earnings during the same period were \$128,000 and gifts and contributions to the university amounted to \$425,000, which includes \$300,000 for operations from the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In addition to that for current operations, the Baptist General Convention allocated \$94,500 for building fund and \$52,750 for the university's endowment fund.

The endowment fund held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, showed an increase of \$78,000 during fiscal 1967. Approximately \$127,000 in university scholarships was granted to students and over \$88,000 in outside scholarships from churches, corporations and individuals was issued to students during the fiscal year.

At the time of the writing of this report (early September), 902 scholarships had been issued for the first semester, 1967-68. Of these 236 were given to ministerial students, mission volunteers and ministers' dependents. Churches and associations afforded financial assistance to 96 students through the church scholarship program.

The OBU faculty for 1967-68 consists of 108 faculty members, 22 of whom are part-time instructors, 86 are full-time in instruction or

administration and five are on leave of absence (two of these are serving universities abroad and two are completing requirements for advanced degrees). Twenty-two of the faculty and administration possess doctoral degrees in their teaching fields. New instructors have been added to the instruction staff for the 1967-68 academic year in business, education, English, French, German, mathematics, music, nursing, psychology, and speech; additional professional staff members include personnel in financial aid, the library and student personnel services.

The accreditation of the university at the baccalaureate degree level was renewed by North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools following an inspection earlier this year. The college was commended for its faculty strength and loyalty to the institution, for student quality and performance and for the sound growth in plant and equipment resources since initial accreditation in 1952. The institution is currently under consideration for membership in Mortar Board, national women's honor society after inspection visits by this group during the last two years. Faculty activities during the present year will center on continued examination and revision of the baccalaureate degree program and review of the teacher education program in preparation for a visit for possible accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE).

The university holds membership in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and is accredited by North Central Association, the National League for Nursing, and the National Association of Schools of Music. Programs leading to standard certificates in elementary and secondary education are approved by the Oklahoma State Department of Education.

OBU offers degrees in 25 major fields in the College of Liberal Arts and in seven major areas in the College of Fine Arts. OBU is one of only a small number of schools offering degrees in hospital administration and a Bachelor of Science and Registered Nursing certification for completion of a four-year nursing program. OBU's nursing program was the first such accredited degree in Oklahoma, and the first in a Southern Baptist college.

The College of Liberal Arts offers majors in art, business, economics, English, French, German, Spanish, history, hospital administration, mathematics, music, philosophy, physics, religion, biology, chemistry, education, government, home economics, journalism, nursing, physical education, psychology, sociology, and speech. In addition programs are offered in pre-professional courses—dentistry, law, medicine, pharmacy, engineering, medical technology, theology and public health.

Among the special programs offered by the College of Liberal Arts were two outstanding summer presentations. The European Study Program involved over 30 students and instructors in a study tour of Western Europe, which included appropriate course work in art, literature, history and government. The High School Academy offered a preview of college work to high school juniors with superior aca-

demic records. The 1967 academy involved approximately 60 juniors, primarily from Oklahoma and neighboring states, in classwork, social activities, and a special interdisciplinary seminar on Twentieth Century Man.

The Warren M. Angell College of Fine Arts offers the following degrees: Bachelor of Music in vocal music, church music, instrumental music, piano pedagogy, Bachelor of Music Education in vocal music, instrumental music, combined vocal and instrumental music.

The College of Fine Arts in the 1966-67 year has shown an increasing growth along the lines of academic development, promotion of OBU in the state and across the country, and a high level of individual student achievement. This is the culmination of years of encouragement of each faculty member to develop himself as an individual and as a teacher, and to apply the same principles in his dealings with students.

In addition to faculty and student recitals and special programs for stated occasions, outstanding events in the College of Fine Arts 1966-67 included television performances on the Bell Telephone programs, "Campus Talent '66," in the fall and spring, the WKY-TV "Christmas on the Campus," two piano workshops on campus with the piano duo "Nelson and Neal" and a band workshop. Tours of choral groups included the OBU Singers, a small group from the Bison Chorale which toured the Far East, summer '67; the Bison Glee Club through the mid-South; the Bisonettes, Missouri, Kentucky and Oklahoma. The OBU Choral Society performed the "Damnation of Faust" by Berlioz with the Oklahoma City Symphony at the new Music Center and performed "St. Paul" by Mendelssohn, "Christmas Oratorio" by Saint-Saens, and "The Resurrection Story" by Claud Almond at home in the Chapel. The Chapel Choir performed twice weekly during the school year for the regular chapel assemblies.

Two-thirds of the classes at OBU are for fewer than 20 people. Seven large lecture classes meet in the specially equipped Yarborough Auditorium, which has a seating capacity of 400.

There are 58 campus organizations and activities at OBU, providing a continuous flow of social activity in the atmosphere of a Christian school.

Through the years the Department of Religion has played a key role in preparing young men and women for responsible positions of leadership in the Southern Baptist Convention. OBU has been the starting point for a great number of pastors, ministers of education and ministers of music. OBU is a world conscious university, with approximately 135 graduates currently serving as foreign missionaries. In the 1966-67 school year 179 students were preparing for the ministry. Through the Ministerial Alliance they reported preaching 3,318 sermons, traveling 251,031 miles, speaking with the unconverted 2,018 times. They witnessed 1,007 conversions and 548 additions to churches.

OBU produced two national sports champions during the 1966-67 school year. The basketball team, coached by Bob Bass reached the

finals in the NAIA championship competition for the third year. Al Tucker was named All-American for the third time, and Coach Bass was designated NAIA Coach of the Year. Three track stars were named to the All-American cross country team; Pat McMahon won the NAIA national championship for the second time; Willie Rios was named to the All-American track and field team as well as the cross country team.

C. Mrs. William Ratcliffe, granddaughter of Mrs. Prichard, spoke to the convention.

D. The Glee Clubs sang "Were You There."

(6) The Glee Clubs closed the hour with a special musical number.

Public Relations

Joe L. Ingram, Secretary

Someone has said that "Public Relations is doing the right thing in the right way and letting people know about it." This describes what the Public Relations Department tries to do as it acts in an advisory capacity to convention departments and agencies in the

production of posters, brochures, program folders, direct mail pieces, layout designs; provides newspapers, radio stations, television stations and wire services with comprehensive and objective information concerning all major convention meetings and speaking engagements for convention personnel, and upon request, assists churches in PR programs.

Floyd A. Craig resigned on May 1 as director of communications to become director of public relations for the Southern Baptist Convention's Christian Life Commission, Nashville, Tenn. For five years, Craig gave progressive and imaginative leadership in the field of communications.

He was succeeded in this job by Miss Joan Harvison, who had worked with the convention's PR Department for nearly three years, serving first as staff writer and later as assistant director of communications.

Production of "Summer's Child," a 28-minute documentary movie about Falls Creek Baptist Assembly, near Davis, has been one of the major responsibilities of the PR office this year. Marty Young of Dallas was producer of the movie, filmed in color on location at the encampment this past summer. He was assisted by Floyd Craig.

Another peak in the PR program was the intensive emphasis on Oklahoma Baptist University and Baptist Student Union work prior to the special called session of the state convention on May 19.

The special emphasis, designed to call attention to the urgent needs in Oklahoma Baptists' ministry to college students, involved direct mail to pastors and state news media, a series of feature stories on BSU directors and OBU, complete news coverage of the convention, and a follow-up program of district rallies.

From a news standpoint, the biggest project of the year for the PR Department continued to be Falls Creek.

Extensive publicity of the 50th anniversary assemblies included articles in a major percentage of the state's daily and weekly newspapers, film clips used on all Oklahoma City television stations, and numerous interviews taped for radio usage.

Radio coverage of the assembly also included three half-hour programs produced by the PR department in co-operation with the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission and broadcast over six Oklahoma radio stations.

"Newsbreak," a five-minute weekly program of religious news, has doubled its outlets this past year and is now being broadcast over 26 Oklahoma stations.

Annuity Board

The new Southern Baptist Protection Program officially goes into effect on Jan. 1, 1968, although the benefits under it are being given currently. The new program, made up of three plans, Plan "A", Plan "B" and Plan "C", provides substantial increases in benefits formerly offered as well as new benefits. **The increased benefits in Plan "A" include:**

1. **Disability**—is the same amount the member would have received at age 65, with no maximum. Previously, disability provided a maximum of \$900 a year.

2. **Widow**—benefit may be 40 per cent of the amount a member would get at age 65. Widow benefits previously were on a step-up basis taking six years to reach maximum coverage.

3. **Retirement**—Additional retirement benefits may be obtained by participating in Plan "B" (formerly Age Security Plan) and/or Plan "C" (Variable Benefit Plan).

New Benefits Added to Plan "A"

1. **Child Benefit**—Each unmarried, dependent child (up to four) under age 18 will get this benefit as follows:

a. If a member dies or becomes disabled, or retires at age 65 or after, each child will get 15 per cent of the amount the member would have received at age 65, or is receiving.

b. Under early retirement before age 65, each child will get 15 per cent of all retirement credits the member earned before reduction for early retirement was made.

2. **Educational Benefit**—A maximum of \$2,400 is payable to each unmarried, dependent child for the initial four years of full-time study immediately beyond high school as follows:

a. If the member dies or becomes disabled, or retires at age 65 or after, each child will get 40 per cent of the amount the member would have received at age 65, with a \$600 a year maximum.

b. Under early retirement before age 65, each child will get 40 per cent of all retirement credits the member earned before reduction for early retirement was made, up to a maximum of \$600 a year.

3. **Dependent Parent Benefit**—If no wife survives you, a qualified, dependent parent will receive the widow benefit.

Beginning on Jan. 1, all churches will be billed for the total dues of the program. For an adequate retirement program, the Annuity Board and the state conventions recommend 10 per cent of total salary of the member be put into the program. If a church pays its pastor less than \$4,000 a year, and desires to do so, it may pay 10 per cent dues on a \$4,000 basis to build greater benefits. There is no change in the cost. In fact, the Program eliminates the step-up in dues at age 60 which was required in the former plan.

Special Notice . . .

The Annuity Board offered the benefits of the new Protection Program more than a year before it was scheduled to go into effect so every minister could have the new benefits immediately. Anyone joining the program (after Jan. 1, 1968) will have full benefits after one year of continuous participation. The provisions on delayed participation in the new program states that to be eligible for full benefits one must join the program:

- a. During the first year from the date of inauguration (1-1-68); or
- b. One year from the date he first became eligible; or
- c. One year from the date of his 25th birthday, whichever is the latest date.

If he fails to join under one of the above, the amount of benefits for all except retirement shall be reduced proportionally by the number of years he delays in joining.

Christian Life Committee

Although a new era of Southern Baptist acceptance of Christian social responsibility seems to have dawned during the past several years, it is evident that we must approach the critical problems of our day as Christians whose faith compels us to chart the course of our life and behavior in the light of the revelation of God in Jesus Christ.

That we live in critical times is an axiom. Billy Graham recently said: "It is hardly necessary for me to inform anyone today that we are in the midst of one of the most far-reaching and devastating crises

in world history and spiritual convulsion is taking place so rapidly and so extensively that any analysis becomes difficult." Elton Trueblood points out the glaring weaknesses of the churches today in meeting the needs. He says: "Whether our religion is segregated from common life by being limited geographically (i.e., to a religious building), or temporarily (by undue emphasis on one hour a week, which is usually Sunday morning), or limited in personnel (by the assumption that religion is the responsibility of a special professional class called clergy), the damaging effect is the same. . . . When we think of religion as what transpires on Sunday morning, the harm lies in the tendency to suppose that what goes on at other times, in factories and offices, is not equally religious."

In the face of the new theology and new morality, there is hope. James Stewart of Edinburg says: "The very disillusionment of today is the raw material of the Christian hope." Graham adds: "Even a casual reading of the New Testament would thrust upon us the conviction that within these pages lies a message of hope to the human race in every generation under all conceivable circumstances."

The Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention is leading in creating a concern among Southern Baptists for applying Christian principles in every area and relationship of life.

A new committee structure has been developed within the Christian Life Commission, making it possible for the commission members to become more directly involved and to give more specific guidance to the work of the agency.

Sunday School Board publications in general and Training Union materials in particular provided outstanding co-operation in channeling to the various Southern Baptist publics the Commission's emphases concerning the application of Christian principles to daily life. The **Baptist Program** was also especially helpful in carrying articles to pastors and educational directors. Such other agencies as the Home Mission Board and the Radio and Television Commission have been keenly alert to ways in which they could help emphasize the ethical imperatives of the Christian gospel.

All Southern Baptist Christian social ethics seminary professors were brought together for the first time for conferences with the commission staff concerning the convention's needs in the field of applied Christianity. Insights gained in these conferences at Glorieta in August are proving to be helpful to the Christian Life Commission in particular and to the Southern Baptist General Convention in general.

Written materials, produced by the staff or solicited from competent authors, reached a total circulation of 53,736,023, representing an increase over 1964 of 24,122,610. Distribution of pamphlet literature on applied Christianity was likewise nearly doubled. One new book on citizenship for Christians by the commission's executive secretary was published in the Broadman Readers Plan during the year; and several other books, which the commission's staff either wrote or were instrumental in helping to get written and published, received

excellent distribution during the year. The Glorieta conferences produced a definitive manuscript on gambling which was published by Broadman Press Aug. 1, 1966. The Ridgecrest conferences on alcohol produced one volume by Wayne Oates and another by William S. Garmon, both to be published by Broadman this year. Five editions of "Light," the commission's occasional newsletter, including special issues on narcotics, alcohol, and war and peace, were prepared and distributed. A substantially enlarged ministry of helping pastors, seminarians, and church leaders with special concerns in the field of Christian social ethics was carried out by conferences, speaking, correspondence, personal counseling, and campus visitation.

Oklahoma Christian Life Committee

The state Christian Life Committee has worked closely with the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission. The following joint projects are in immediate prospect:

1. Development of a pamphlet for associational Christian Life Committees.
2. Development of a "how to do it" pamphlet for local church Christian Life Committees.
3. Make resources—tracts and conference materials—available to associations and churches.

In co-operation with the Home Mission Board and Christian Life Commission, we will have a statewide Race Relations Conference in Oklahoma City on Feb. 9. Race Relations Sunday will be Feb. 11. On this day, pastors might preach a sermon on race relations or exchange pulpits with Negro, Indian, and Mexican Baptist churches. Sunday schools might have special guests from other races in their assembly programs.

With the growing alcoholism problem and the rising action by the liquor industry to legalize liquor by-the-glass for sale in any eating place, we need to face this challenge unitedly and speak with a clear and factual voice. We commend the Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education organization for their continuing efforts against the liquor traffic.

Department of Missions

J. T. Roberts, Secretary

This has been a year of transition in the Department of Missions. Each member of the staff except one is either new in the department or has a new position.

Our department continues to major in three general areas of missions: work with National Baptists, language missions and associational missions. Two associates help direct the work of this department. Henry Chennault became director of work with National Baptists on Jan. 1 of this year. Laddie Adams, who has been in the department approximately one year, is directing the language mission work. Other members of the staff are: Mrs. Mildred Streeter, state Indian WMU field worker; and Mrs. Agnes Watkins, Mary Hill, Linda Johnson and Mrs. Judy Thompson, office secretaries.

Associational Missions

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is composed of 37 associations. It is the purpose of the Department of Missions to work with and assist these associations and their missionaries as needed to carry on an effective program of state missions.

From the new mission and church locations fund set up by the state convention and administered by the Department of Missions the following associations have received the specified amounts since Oct. 1, 1966: Central—\$4,675.45; Comanche-Cotton—\$4,472.20; Concord-Kiowa—\$300; Northwestern—\$1,762.20; Perry — \$4,217.70; Tulsa—\$6,810.10, and Union—\$10,515.85.

The following associations have new superintendents of missions since the last convention: Pottawatomie-Lincoln, James Maxwell; Central, A. A. Brady; Kay, Jim White; Comanche-Cotton, Bob Lovejoy, and Salt Fork Association, Jere Mitchell.

Schools of Missions

We are planning a schedule for schools of missions in our state that will enable each association to have a school every five years. Some objectives for special emphases in schools of missions programs are: (1) stimulate soul winning, (2) encourage organization of local missions, (3) inspire concerted prayer for missions, (4) increase financial support of missions, and (5) secure life commitments to mission service.

Six of our associations had schools of missions with 116 churches participating last year. These schools reported 20 conversions and 49 volunteers for special service. Six associations will have schools of missions in 1968.

State Pastors' Retreat

Both the Rural Church Conference and the Summer Seminar for Preachers have served a very real purpose since their inception a number of years ago. However, in recent years the interest and attendance have gradually declined to the extent that the State Missions Committee in their meeting on Sept. 6 recommended that these two activities be discontinued and that in lieu of these we have a State Pastors' Retreat, May 14-17, 1968, at Falls Creek Baptist Assembly. The program personnel will be Jack Stanton, associate, Department of Evangelism, Home Mission Board, preacher; Jesse J. Northcutt, dean of the School of Theology, Southwestern Seminary, and Roy L. Honeycutt Jr., Midwestern Seminary.

Student Summer Missions

The Home Mission Board employs college and seminary students to serve as summer missionaries in the various states and areas of home mission work under the supervision of the state missions department and the local missionaries. The purpose of student summer missions is to meet mission needs while providing an opportunity for students to discover their interest and aptitudes for mission service. Seventeen of these students were assigned to our state for the summer of 1967.

Seminary Extension

The six Southern Baptist seminaries recognizing that many people who desire to attend seminary cannot do so, created the Seminary Extension Department to provide training for ministers and other Christian leaders in Bible study and other religious subjects.

The strategy is simple. Trained men can train others also. Local pastors who are seminary graduates teach courses using study guides prepared by Baptist seminary professors and other noted Christian leaders.

This work will be promoted through the Department of Missions in the three general areas of associational missions, language missions and work with National Baptists.

Christian Social Ministries

The objective of the program of Christian social ministries is to work with and assist churches and associations to provide a Christian witness through special missions actions such as—mission centers, rescue mission homes and migrant ministries. We have a week-day school in Tulsa in connection with National Baptist Education Center. Mrs. Valadean Gardner is the director.

We support both the Grace Rescue Mission and the Good Will Center in Oklahoma City. Grace Rescue Mission is under the direction of W. E. Cook and Downtown Church. John Hawk is the director of the Good Will Center.

We are looking forward to participating in the migrant ministry in the near future.

Language Missions

Thirty-four missionaries served part or all of 1967 in the area of language missions. Twenty-nine of these missionaries work with

our Indian people and the remainder work with our Spanish-speaking people or our deaf friends. In addition to this number of missionaries employed by our mission boards and local forces, we have a large number of Indian pastors who receive no financial support or assistance from any area other than their own pastorate. We have six congregations in Oklahoma who have work with the deaf that carry on their work locally with the use of laymen or their own church staff members.

Almost all of the Spanish-speaking work in Oklahoma is financed on the local level.

Indian Falls Creek Assembly had a total registration of 1,232 in 1967. This was the first year of an assembly eliminating the weekend. We had 131 decisions for Christ.

The state Spanish Camp, in its fifth year, met at Southwest Baptist Assembly with close to 100 registered during the week.

The Deaf Assembly at Falls Creek was a great success this year with approximately 75 in attendance.

We've had marked progress in many areas, and we are planning much expansion in training among language leadership in 1968.

Work with National Baptists

This has been a significant year for National Baptists in Oklahoma. F. D. Moon who served so capably as executive secretary-treasurer retired and was succeeded by R. S. Corbin, pastor of First Street Baptist Church, Chickasha. W. K. Jackson, pastor of St. John's Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, succeeded J. P. Patterson as president of the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention.

The spirit of co-operation between Southern Baptists and National Baptists can be seen tangibly in the erection, completion, and dedication of the new BSU building at Langston. This \$60,000 structure is the product of our joint work. Dedication for this building was held on Sept. 29.

Several other very significant accomplishments were made last year under the fine dedicated Oklahoma Baptist State Convention leadership.

(1) The fifth Annual Youth Assembly at Falls Creek registered 128 and 94 decisions were made.

(2) The BSU work at Langston is under the leadership of a new director, Stanley Bagley. This work is a part of the total BSU program carried on by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

91. Business Session

(1) T. Hollis Epton, First Church, Duncan, presented the report of the Resolutions Committee.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in its annual session adopted the following resolutions. It was suggested by a messenger from the floor that a copy of these resolutions, together with a copy of the church covenant be mailed to each church.

I

WHEREAS crime and lawlessness in America continue to increase at an alarming rate, and since there appears to be a corresponding decrease in respect for the established laws of the land and for the agencies and persons charged with the responsibilities of the enforcement and administration of these laws, and

WHEREAS a proper regard for the law of the land is essential to the well being of a free and democratic society, and

WHEREAS Law Day USA had its beginning in Oklahoma, and by presidential proclamation and Joint Resolution of the Congress has been established annually as May 1, the observance of which is sponsored by the American Bar Association and 1,500 state and local bar associations, and

WHEREAS the purpose of Law Day USA is "To foster respect for law; to increase public understanding of the place of law in American life; to point up the contrast between freedom under the law in the United States and governmental tyranny under communism"

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

(1) That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma request our people to pray for those in places of civil authority and responsibility.

(2) That we urge the seeking of ways and means to build respect for law and order, and

(3) That we encourage the leadership of our churches, where possible and expedient, to observe Law Day USA with appropriate local programs and emphases in keeping with the purposes of Law Day USA as expressed herein.

II

WHEREAS the continued and accelerated advertising, sale, and use of beverage alcohol constitutes a serious threat to the social, economic, moral and spiritual welfare of our state, and

WHEREAS the attendant evils and vices accompanying the traffic of beverage alcohol compound its destructive influences, and

WHEREAS Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Incorporated continued to provide effective leadership in combating this evil and those associated with it,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

(1) That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma commend Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc. and Secretary Ross J. McLennan for significant leadership in these areas of civic righteousness, and

(2) That we encourage our people to utilize more fully the services, information and personnel provided by Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc., and

(3) That we urge our people to give spiritual and financial support to Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc.

AMENDMENT: by Brad Allen, pastor of First Church, Sentinel, that a letter be sent to Attorney General G. T. Blankenship asking that he hasten his opinion on Oklahoma Senate Bill #244 regarding whether or not liquor advertising is constitutional, and urge that his ruling be that the bill is unconstitutional.

III

WHEREAS Oklahoma Baptists have made history in 1967 by having two state convention meetings, and

WHEREAS these two convention meetings have placed extra work, in addition to their regular responsibilities, upon the officers of our convention, and upon the leadership of our institutions and agencies,

WHEREAS the officers of the convention and this leadership have performed significant service to Oklahoma Baptists,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma express to our president, J. Marvin Gaskin, and to the other elected officers of the convention, to T. B. Lackey and to the leadership of our institutions and agencies our sincere appreciation for the excellent leadership and service they have given during the past convention year.

IV

Your committee on resolutions is aware that the convention has already honored Auguie Henry and Earl Stark upon the occasion of their coming retirement from posts of leadership in the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Your committee believes, however, that it is fully appropriate for the convention to record here by resolution its cognizance of their years of faithful service.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma hereby express to Auguie Henry and Earl Stark its deep appreciation for their magnificent years of service to our denomination, and

That the convention express to these brethren and their families our cordial good wishes for the days of their ministry ahead.

V

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma is deeply appreciative of the hospitality of First Church, Oklahoma City as host church of this convention.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the convention express to the church and to Herschel H. Hobbs, the pastor, and to his staff, our sincere gratitude for the use of their facilities and for every expression of their gracious hospitality during these days.

VI

WHEREAS, the year of 1969 has been designated as the year for the Crusade of the Americas, and

WHEREAS, this is to be a united effort on the part of Baptist groups throughout the Americas,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, That

(1) Every Baptist church co-operating with this convention be urged to give careful consideration and attention to planning, and co-operating in this tremendous effort for evangelism in 1969;

(2) That we make an effort to enlist every church in the pre-crusade activities during 1968 that the crusade can be effective in 1969.

VII

WHEREAS, the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States guarantees the separation of church and state and is a safeguard to religious liberty, and

WHEREAS, there are growing encroachments upon the freedoms of the American people from without and within,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that

(1) This convention reaffirm its commitment to the principle of separation of church and state and religious liberty to all men as provided for by the First Amendment of the Constitution, and

(2) That any encroachments upon the freedoms recognized by the Constitution of the United States be opposed with conviction and practical measures.

VIII

WHEREAS, the program of a recent convention of the Oklahoma Education Association began on Sunday, and

WHEREAS, such a meeting involves more than 20,000 teachers and administrators, many of whom must be away from their churches on Sunday night in order to attend the opening session, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the OEA has announced that the 1968 annual convention will be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday and that the 1969 convention will be held on Thursday and Friday.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma commend the Oklahoma Education Association for this announced schedule and that we express to the proper officials of OEA our sincere appreciation for arranging their programs so as not to include a Sunday session.

IX

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma is in session this Nov. 16, 1967, and whereas this day marks the 60th anniversary of the statehood of Oklahoma, and

WHEREAS, the 521,000 members in our 1,352 churches and missions share, along with other Oklahomans, in the "Pride in Oklahoma" theme, and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Oklahoma has suggested that emphasis be given this theme during this anniversary year.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in session take note of this anniversary day and go on record as marking this day as one of pride in, and gratitude for, our state and that we pledge ourselves anew to the Christian ideals which make for the continued moral and spiritual development of our beloved Oklahoma.

X

WHEREAS, there is the showing on television of "adult only" movies at prime family viewing time, and

WHEREAS, many of these movies are morally and spiritually degrading and unfit to be shown at any time to any audience, and

WHEREAS, the **Baptist Messenger** launched recently a campaign against such movies as expressed in an editorial by Jack L. Gritz in the Oct. 12 issue,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma express to Dr. Gritz our approval of, and our appreciation for, his editorial position and his strategic suggestions in this area.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED

That we respectfully request the television networks and the local stations to delete such movies from their programming.

BE IT RESOLVED, ALSO, that

We express appreciation to the hundreds of people who have written letters of protest, and that we urge our people to continue such communication to appropriate station managers and network officials.

XI

WHEREAS, the sudden death of John T. Daniel at the beginning of this convention has brought a sense of sadness and distinct loss to the convention, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Daniel served Oklahoma Baptists officially for 42 years with distinction and Christ-like devotion.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma register our appreciation for his many years of dedicated service, that we thank God for his remarkable ministry among us, and that we express to the surviving members of his family our love and tender Christian sympathy.

AMENDMENT—that a memorial page be placed in the *Annual* in honor of John T. Daniel.

XII

WHEREAS, the church covenant has long been an important statement of faith and practice in Baptist life,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma urge our churches to re-emphasize the meaning and the use of the covenant in the spiritual life of their people.

AMENDMENT—by J. Harold Thompson, pastor First Baptist Church, Choctaw, "As a duly elected messenger of this convention I would like to move that the messengers of this convention go on record as suggesting to the co-operating churches that the church covenant which has long been a vital part of the fiber of Baptist life be made a necessary part of the entire polity of every segment of local church life."

Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Bylaws

The board also adopted the following bylaws pertaining to operation of Hospitals and Golden Age Homes:

Preamble

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was incorporated under the laws of Oklahoma on May 11, 1917. The Articles of Incorporation were thereafter amended on March 16, 1928, on July 14, 1928, and on May 16, 1961. As provided therein, "... the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons, and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes."

Pursuant to its corporate purposes, the convention owns and operates various Hospitals and Golden Age Homes throughout the

State of Oklahoma. In order to avail itself of the many advantages of operating its various Hospitals and Golden Age Homes under one corporate charter, rather than as separate organizational entities, the convention, through its Board of Directors, over a period of years, has determined upon certain policies and procedures to be followed in the operation of these institutions. Deeming it feasible to state said policies and procedures more fully in writing, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting by and through its Board of Directors, hereby adopts the following:

**Bylaws
Pertaining to the Operation of
Baptist Hospitals and Golden Age Homes**

ARTICLE I

Hospital and Golden Age Homes Committee

Section 1. The responsibility for the operation of Baptist Hospitals and Golden Age Homes in Oklahoma is placed upon the Board of Directors of the convention. In carrying out its responsibility the Board of Directors shall elect each year from its membership a Hospital and Golden Age Homes Committee (hereinafter referred to as the "Hospital Committee").

Section 2. The Hospital Committee is here authorized and directed to serve with the executive secretary-treasurer, the director of hospitals, the administrators, and the various Governing Board Committees in the operation of each of these institutions.

Section 3. The executive secretary-treasurer is empowered to select the various administrators of these institutions and to fix their compensation. The Hospital Committee is authorized and directed to consult with the executive secretary-treasurer in the selection of these administrators, and, in general, to provide counsel and supervision for the entire program.

Section 4. Prior to their nomination and election, the Hospital Committee shall consider and approve the members of the various Governing Board Committees for the several institutions; and upon approval shall submit them as nominees to be elected by the Board of Directors of the convention.

Section 5. The Hospital Committee shall report to the Board of Directors annually, or more often if desirable, concerning its activities and concerning conditions and accomplishments of these institutions. The Hospital Committee shall make such recommendations to the Board of Directors as it deems advisable as to actions to be taken by the Board of Directors in the operation of these institutions.

ARTICLE II

Governing Board Committees

Section 1. In order to extend the authority of the convention directly to each of these institutions, the Board of Directors of the convention shall elect a Governing Board Committee from nominees submitted by the Hospital Committee as hereinabove provided in Article I, Section 4 (said Governing Board Committee hereinafter re-

ferred to as "Governing Board"), for each of the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes.

Section 2. In the operation of the particular institution, each Governing Board shall function as a local arm of the convention and its Board of Directors. Each Governing Board is responsible to, and subject to control by, the convention and its Board of Directors; and shall co-operate with the administrator of the particular institution, the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, as the director of hospitals, and the Hospital Committee.

ARTICLE III

Organization and Functions of the Governing Board Committee (Governing Board) for Each Institution

Section 1. Members. The Governing Board shall consist of not less than nine nor more than 12 members, who are elected by the Board of Directors of the convention. Of these members, two members shall be serving at that time on the Board of Directors of the convention. The executive secretary-treasurer, or a representative designated by him, as the director of hospitals, shall be an ex-officio member, with all privileges of members except voting.

Section 2. Tenure of members. All members who are elected by the Board of Directors of the convention, with the exception of those who at that time are members of the Board of Directors of the convention, shall serve for a period of three calendar years, and may be re-elected for a second three year term, but shall not be elected for a third successive term. Those members who are also serving on the Board of Directors of the convention shall be elected for one calendar year, and may be re-elected for additional one-year terms, but not more than three successive one-year terms.

Section 3. Additional members. The Governing Board is authorized and empowered to appoint additional members to serve on the Governing Board, when in its opinion the institution will benefit by reason of the service of local prominent citizens. Such additional members shall not exceed one-third of the membership elected by the Board of Directors of the convention; and shall be appointed for one-year terms, but not more than three successive one-year terms. These additional members shall serve on committees of the Governing Board and otherwise participate in all functions of the Governing Board.

Section 4. Officers. The Governing Board shall elect the following officers: chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. Their tenure of office shall be for one year, based on the calendar year, and the officers are subject to re-election.

Section 5. Authority to establish rules and bylaws. The convention, or its Board of Directors, as a part of its supervisory control which it retains at all times, shall establish, revoke, or amend any and all rules, regulations, or bylaws pertaining to the operation of all institutions, or any particular institution. However, subject to such supervisory control, which it reserves for itself, the convention, and its Board of Directors, hereby delegates to each Governing Board the power and

authority to establish rules, regulations, or bylaws, for the operation of the particular institution, including those governing the membership, conduct and operation of the various professional staff members, such as medical staff, medical and surgical staff, or medical and dental staff; and same shall be effective as adopted by the Governing Board unless and until amended, revised, supplemented, or revoked by the convention, or its Board of Directors.

Section 6. Functions of the Governing Board. The Governing Board shall conduct regular meetings periodically, at which time it will review the operations of the institution and advise itself concerning the institution's financial and physical condition. The Governing Board shall carry on its work through its officers and such committees of its members as it deems necessary and advisable. In co-operation with the administrator, the Governing Board is charged with the responsibility of operating the institution in accordance with policies and procedures which may be established from time to time by the convention and its Board of Directors, and as interpreted and administered by the Hospital Committee, and the director of hospitals, including, but without limitation, the following responsibilities and duties:

a. The Governing Board should be provided by the administrator with adequate financial reports, accompanied by basic departmental and operational statistical information, which may be used to interpret the financial picture in terms of patient service.

b. The reliability of these reports shall be assured by the installation and maintenance of adequate accounting practices and procedures. These procedures shall be verified by the added protection of at least one annual external audit, as requested by the Governing Board.

c. Changes in rate structures shall be recommended by the Governing Board to the director of hospitals, which changes shall be effective at the time said recommendation is made and until disproved by the hospital committee.

d. Adequate purchasing procedures shall be set up and maintained to assure the economical acquisition and use of the necessary supplies.

e. A control system shall be established, governing the hiring and discharging of employees, the personnel policies which will govern the employees' working conditions, and a definite projection of the number of employees required for the operation.

f. Budgetary projection shall be instituted not only for the purpose of actual monetary control but also for the psychological effect the preparation and monthly examination exerts on those responsible for expenditures.

g. There shall be a clearly defined authority by Governing Board, for the administrator's guidance in the purchase of equipment and services. It is the administrator's responsibility to recommend to the Governing Board the setting up of these policies so that funds will be spent in a reasonable and acceptable manner.

h. Day-to-day control and observation of cash income and expenditures shall be maintained and the reports kept on file. The administrator is responsible to the Governing Board for sound management of the institution in its day-to-day operations.

i. The Governing Board shall exercise the required supervision and give the necessary authority to the administrator to cause the hospital to maintain the standards required by the Joint Commission for an accredited hospital. The Governing Board should be ready to counsel with the administrator in the case of needed disciplinary action when members of the medical staff fail to meet their responsibilities necessary to the requirements of accreditation.

ARTICLE IV

Administrator

Section 1. The executive secretary-treasurer shall select and employ the administrators of the various institutions, and shall determine their compensation. He shall consult with the Hospital Committee in making such selections and in determining the compensation.

Section 2. The administrator of the particular institution shall provide the best care possible for the patient. These services shall be offered to the public generally, without discrimination as to race, color, creed, or religious belief, and shall be offered at the lowest reasonable cost under a rate structure which is fair and equitable to all patients, and yet defrays the cost of operation of the institution.

Section 3. The administrator is authorized and empowered to administer, and shall be held responsible for the administration of the institution and all its departments, subject only to the policies enacted by the Board of Directors of the convention, the Hospital Committee, the director of hospitals, and the Governing Board of the particular institution. The authority and duties of the administrator shall include, without limitation, the following:

a. To organize the personnel and others concerned with the operation of the institution, both professional and administrative personnel, and maintain them as efficient working units or departments.

b. To present a full report of operations each month to the Governing Board and to the director of hospitals.

c. To select, employ, control and discharge all employees necessary for the efficient operation of the institution.

d. To see that the buildings, grounds, and equipment are kept in good state of repair, conferring with the Governing Board pertaining to major matters, but carrying on routine repairs, replacements, and maintenance without consultation.

e. To supervise all business affairs such as the records of financial transactions, collection of accounts, and purchase and issue of supplies, and to be certain that all funds are collected and expended to the best possible advantage.

f. To co-operate with the medical and surgical staff and to secure like co-operation on the part of all those concerned rendering professional services to the end that the patient may receive the best possible care. If necessity arises, the administrator as the representative of the

Governing Board, shall make such decisions which appear to him to be consistent with the welfare of the patients and the continuing good reputation of the institution.

g. At all regular meetings of the Governing Board, to submit reports showing statistical, professional and financial activities of the institution, and to prepare and submit any special reports that may be requested by the Governing Board.

h. To surround the patient with every reasonable protection, thereby fulfilling the moral and legal responsibility of the convention.

i. To attend all meetings of the Governing Board and its committees.

j. To perform any other duty that may be necessary in the best interest of the institution.

ARTICLE V

Director of Hospitals

Section 1. In implementation of long standing policy, which was established under prior administrative leadership, and in order to provide a direct channel of administrative responsibility between the convention and its Board of Directors, on one hand, and the particular institution, on the other hand, the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, or a representative designated by him, shall serve as director of hospitals. If the director of hospitals is some person other than the executive secretary-treasurer, he shall work under the direct supervision of the executive secretary-treasurer.

Section 2. The director of hospitals is charged with general supervision of the administrators of the institutions, particularly with the view of coordinating the work of all institutions to the benefit, economically and otherwise, of the convention and the public it serves in this ministry.

Baptist Memorial to Change School of Nursing From Diploma to Baccalaureate

The Governing Board's Committee of Baptist Memorial Hospital has given considerable thought and study to the possibility of discontinuing the diploma school of nursing in favor of a baccalaureate school. The Governing Board approached Oklahoma Baptist University about the possibility of Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City, affiliating with Oklahoma Baptist University in this school.

A committee of five from the hospital Governing Board was appointed to try to find a feasible plan. The Board of Trustees of OBU appointed a committee of five to survey the possibilities of this relationship and to meet with the committee from Baptist Memorial Hospital. Several conferences were held with the president of OBU, the administrator of Baptist Memorial Hospital, the executive secretary-treasurer, the above committees and the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee. After months of research and study, it was agreed that this affiliation was not best for the hospital or the university. Therefore, the following recommendation was presented to the Board of Directors and adopted:

THAT Baptist Memorial Hospital prepare to close its diploma school of nursing and through its hospital facilities and clinical services become an integral part of a recognized college or university baccalaureate program in nursing education; and THAT the sponsoring university within the next six or seven years endeavor to enrol approximately 200-250 students to meet the desired number of graduates to help alleviate the nurse shortage at Baptist Memorial Hospital and other community hospitals.

The diploma school of nursing at Baptist Memorial Hospital will continue until all presently enrolled students will have completed required studies, which will be in the spring of 1970.

Enid Hospital Name Changed

Upon the recommendation of the Governing Board of Enid General Hospital, the Board of Directors voted by mail ballot to change the name of this institution to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital. Many have felt that Baptist should be in the name of this institution, and Harry Bass agreed to contribute \$200,000 to the hospital campaign in memory of his parents who were pioneers in the Enid area. Citizens of Enid and Northwest Oklahoma are in a campaign to raise \$800,000 for the hospital. They believe that with this gift they can reach the objective.

Change of Policy for Leased Hospitals

In 1950 the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma entered into a lease agreement with the City of Perry, Oklahoma, to operate Perry Memorial Hospital. In subsequent years similar contracts were made with the Cities of Stillwater, Bristow, Cordell, Sayre and the County of Mayes. All of these operations have been successful economically and in service rendered. When these agreements were made, strong efforts were exerted to protect the convention against possible operating deficits. Each hospital was instructed to invest emergency funds with the Baptist Foundation to be reinvested and held for future emergencies. Accounts receivable, inventories, furnishings and equipment held as convention assets have accumulated until it appears that the convention is safe from operating deficits. The convention does not want to use mission funds to operate these institutions; neither does the convention want to use operating earnings for any other convention project. Therefore, upon the recommendation of the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee, at the May 2 meeting the board approved the following policy relative to the leased hospitals referred to above:

1. That buildings which are paid for by funds derived from the operation of these hospitals shall become the property of the lessors at the termination of the leases; but that such buildings which are built from convention funds obtained from sources outside of operation of these hospitals, and which have not been reimbursed by funds from hospital operations, will belong to the convention and may be purchased by the lessors as provided in the leases.

2. That the same provisions apply concerning equipment and supplies which are purchased during the lease periods and which are not classed as replacements of articles originally furnished by the lessors.

3. That lessee will turn to the lessors, at the expiration of the leases, the balance of any monies on hand which have been derived from operation of the hospitals throughout the lease periods, after deductions of all costs and expense of operation of the hospitals, including a reasonable charge for supervision services from the convention office.

4. That this action be reported to each lessor and that a copy be attached to the convention's signed copy of each lease.

5. That, in the event any particular lessor desires that the lease agreement be amended, the convention officers be authorized to execute such amendment in accordance with the policy.

Crusade of the Americas

All our people are urged to participate fully in the Crusade of the Americas to be held through 1969. The Crusade of the Americas is a first and one of the greatest aspects of it will be the working together of so many thousands of our Baptist churches concerned only with the evangelizing of the Americas. So far 26 of the 29 countries of the hemisphere have joined the crusade.

This crusade involves all of the organizations of the state, association, and church. Each has a vital role to fill in preparing for, carrying out, and following up the evangelistic effort.

The crusade plans can be conceived of in three stages. The first is work and witness beginning in January, 1968. The second is that of preaching beginning in January, 1969 (this includes the spiritual preparation). The third is that of conservation following the Crusade of the Americas revivals.

The magnitude of this crusade should call each of us to daily prayer and a full surrender of our lives to the Holy Spirit's leadership to the end that every individual in Oklahoma may have the opportunity of knowing Christ as their personal Savior.

Phoebe Shertz Young Trust

We are grateful to Raymond A. Young for establishing with the Baptist Foundation the Phoebe Shertz Young Trust in memory and honor of his mother. This trust is to provide funds for a Chair of Bible at Oklahoma State University.

The trust proposes the teaching of the Bible under the auspices of the Baptist General Convention. Instruction shall be in such a manner as to be acceptable for credit at the university.

(Section 3, **"Convention shall supervise instruction.** Except for the investment, management and disbursement of said trust estate, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall direct control and supervision of said chair of Bible, including the designation and the determination as to whether the purposes of this trust are tion of the person to serve from time to time as instructor of Bible, from time to time being fulfilled in accordance with doctrines and

tenets generally held by co-operating churches of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and as stated in such Statement of Faith and Practice as it may adopt from time to time.")

(Section 4, "Instruction shall be subject to accreditation. The teaching of the Bible is to be carried out at all times on sufficiently high standards so that the courses of instruction offered will be subject to receive full college accreditation by said university, and is to be conducted in such manner that, in the event said university accredits such course of instruction, students may receive full college credit for such study.")

Upon the recommendation of the Religious Education Committee, the board voted to accept this trust and that the instructor be employed as are associates in the various departments and agencies of the convention. The instructor, therefore, would be an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. His selection and the setting of his salary would be by the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, the secretary of the department of religious education and the director of student work, in consultation with the Religious Education Committee of the board.

Frank Moore, a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University and Southwestern Seminary, was selected as the first teacher. He has moved to Stillwater and assumed his responsibilities with the beginning of the 1967-68 school year. He will receive his Th.D. degree within a few months from Southwestern Seminary.

Stewardship-Budget

Since adopting a 12-year program of mission advance in 1962, Oklahoma Baptists have experienced dramatic growth in stewardship development and mission giving. Churches have increased their income an aggregate of \$3,721,103 (15.91 per cent increase) and Cooperative Program giving by \$515,915 (20.68 per cent increase). The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has increased its percentage giving of undesignated receipts to the Southern Baptist Convention from 40 per cent to 43 per cent..

The only negative note is in the small percentage increase of the undesignated dollars given in the churches going through the Cooperative Program. In 1962, the churches gave 11.72 per cent of their budget through the Cooperative Program; in 1966, the percentage had increased to 12.20 per cent.

Due to the unprecedented needs of Oklahoma Baptist University and Baptist Student Union work, it became apparent that the 1962 plan needed to be altered in order to give accelerated support to these two vital segments of co-operative missions.

Special Called Convention

The board met Feb. 9 with trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University, Baptist Student Union directors and other convention leaders to consider a plan whereby substantially larger support may be secured for Oklahoma Baptist University and Baptist Student Union work. Upon the recommendation of the Stewardship-Budget Committee, the board voted to call a special meeting of the convention in Shawnee,

May 19. There were 1,029 messengers registered. The following recommendations were enthusiastically adopted:

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1968 be \$3,500,-000 including a basic budget of \$3,186,402 to be divided 57 per cent State and 43 per cent Southern Baptist Convention. All received over the basic budget will be divided between OBU and BSU work on the basis of 75 per cent to OBU and 25 per cent to BSU work.

2. That 1968 budget allocations for state work be held to an approximate \$35,000 increase over 1967 allocations. (The average increase to these departments over the past five years.)

3. That this plan or a similar plan be considered each year through 1972.

4. That the churches be challenged to increase their Cooperative Program objectives from one to three per cent of the total church budget over the 1967 percentage. (This would produce a 10 to 30 per cent increase in Cooperative Program dollars over 1967).

5. That OBU be encouraged to continue to solicit gifts from foundations, corporations, alumni, and other interested friends, but not from church budgets.

6. That churches, associations, and individuals adjacent to BSU centers continue to support this work as a local obligation and privilege.

7. That the Baptist Foundation be encouraged to continue leading Oklahoma Baptists and other friends to endow all our institutions, with the hope that regular Cooperative Program and endowment income will be adequate within five years to meet the needs of our institutions.

8. That all 1967 Cooperative Program receipts over \$3,125,000 be distributed 75 per cent OBU-25 per cent BSU.

The promotional plans to implement the above recommendations were adopted, including the following 1968 activities:

1. Annual Statewide Stewardship Conference in January.
2. Pastor-Deacon Fellowship Meetings in January-March.
3. Four Stewardship-Foundation Workshops in February-March.
4. Promote Tithers Enrolment Day Clinics in May-August.
5. Observe Cooperative Program Commitment Month in September.
6. Promote Stewardship Emphasis in local churches in October and November, climaxing with Tithers Enrolment Day in November.

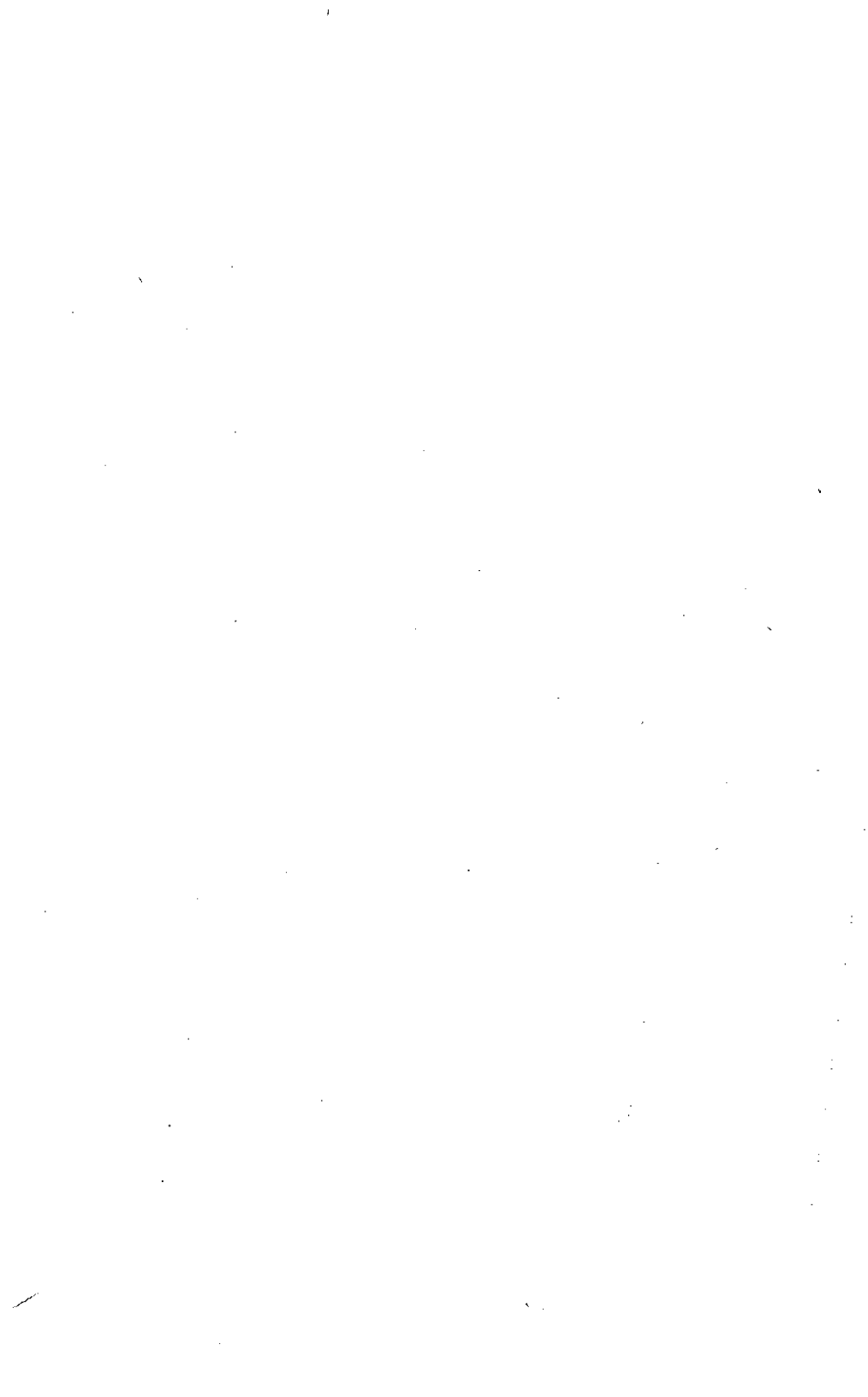

In our opinion, with the explanation stated in the preceding paragraph, the accompanying balance sheets and statements of fund reserves and receipts and disbursements present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1967, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Year Ended December 31, 1967

1. Baptist Laymen's Corporation

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has assumed the responsibility of constructing and operating Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes at Northwest Highway and Council Road, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

In 1964, a 35 acre tract of land with appraised value of \$122,500.00 was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation as trustee, subject to encumbrances, easements and restrictive covenants of record. As of December 31, 1967, Baptist Laymen's Corporation had erected and equipped a nursing home, Golden Age Apartments, and related improvements at a total cost of approximately \$843,000.00.

Proceeds from the sale of first mortgage real estate bonds of \$700,000.00 were used to finance the construction of these improvements.

Baptist General Convention may revoke the trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate and improvements thereon shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such conveyance.

The convention is to receive the income and earnings from the real estate annually or at more frequent intervals, after deduction of taxes, debt and operating expenses, and after all debts incurred in the erection and operation of the improvements have been paid.

2. Baptist Memorial Hospital Expansion

The convention Board of Directors, in session May 10, 1962, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Baptist Memorial Hospital.

All real and personal property owned by the hospital was subject to a mortgage note to Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company in the amount of \$4,655,580.14. Furthermore "It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma."

3. Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital (formerly Enid General Hospital) Expansion

The convention Board of Directors, in session May 12, 1966, assumed responsibility for providing \$1.00 for each \$2.00 raised by the citizens of Enid and northwest Oklahoma for the enlargement and modernization of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital. The convention's maximum contribution is limited to \$500,000.00.

Cooperative Program funds have been appropriated for this hospital expansion as follows:

Funds from the sale of Mangum hospital properties (\$59,565.12) and the Enid Clinic Building (\$2,068.72), and hospital property leased in Muskogee (\$4,491.90) have also been allocated to this fund, as partial fulfillment of the convention's obligation.

4. General

The balance sheet and various accompanying and supporting exhibits and schedules apply only to operations of the department of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund reserves, receipts and disbursements of the following affiliated or associated organizations, operated as separate organizations, are not included:

1. Hugo Golden Age Home
2. The ten hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or lessee.
3. The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma
4. Oklahoma Baptist University
5. Faculty Building Association
6. Baptist Laymen's Corporation
7. Baptist Building Federal Credit Union

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

The following supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and statements of fund reserves and receipts and disbursements, but is submitted for supplementary analysis purposes. It has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to such financial statements, taken as a whole.

COMMENTS

Organization and Major Activities—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years. Amended Articles of Incorporation filed in March, 1928 and May, 1961, provide for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Major activities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are described below:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the Co-operative Program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and periodically transmitting portions allocated to Southern Baptist Convention, various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and other designated donees.

The Baptist Messenger—Printing and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger".

Department of Child Care—Operation and management of "The Baptist Orphans Home" and "Boys Ranch Town", construction of buildings and maintenance of buildings and grounds.

Falls Creek Assembly—Providing vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of assembly properties.

Department of Religious Education—Providing for advancement and enlargement of educational activities in churches of the state, and coordination of Baptist work in the student union centers at various educational institutions.

Woman's Missionary Union—Promotion of Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Building Program—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, ceased operating as a general hospital on September 15, 1962, at the request of the administration and governing board of the hospital.

Under the authority of the Board of Directors of the Convention, a lease contract was made with the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 20, Muskogee County, on December 17, 1964, providing for rental payments of \$4,000.00 annually for the use of the real estate and personal property of Oklahoma Baptist Hospital. The lease is renewable annually at the option of the lessee. The contract also provides that, when the rental payments total \$40,000.00, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall convey title to the leased real estate and personal property to the lessee.

Funds totaling \$21,562.41 were being held for Baptist hospitals. Of this amount, \$10,500.00 received from Stillwater Municipal Hospital is invested with Hugo Golden Age Homes. The remaining \$11,062.41 from Bristow Memorial Hospital was uninvested at December 31, 1967.

Prepaid Expense (Parking Lot)—On March 16, 1956, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000.00, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760.00. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1967 the unamortized balance amounted to \$36,373.00.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation—On June 10, 1964, land was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The value of this land was reduced to \$1.00 as shown in this report. See notes to the financial statements for further information relative to this transaction.

We have examined the fund balance sheets of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 1967, and the related statement of fund balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

On January 1, 1964, the foundation adjusted the book value of securities held to market value. The net effect of this adjustment was to increase the book value of securities and the corresponding fund balances by \$92,147.75. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, have been recorded at cost or appraised value at acquisition date.

No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties or depletion of mineral properties.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the items noted in the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying fund balance sheets and statement of fund balances present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1967, and the results of its transactions for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting practices generally followed by nonprofit organizations applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Year Ended December 31, 1967

1. Investments

Securities acquired prior to January 1, 1964 are included herein at market value as of that date. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, are shown at cost or at an appraised value at acquisition date.

At December 31, 1967, the market value of securities with an available market value was \$336,264.82 greater than book value:

The investment pool was revised as of January 1, 1964 to provide for periodic revaluation of securities held. These periodic revaluations are for statistical purposes and are used to provide a unit valuation for distribution of income and investment of fund.

The book value of mineral deeds is shown in Exhibit A as \$205,668.58, representing the appraised value at date of acquisition. No provision has been made for depletion of these mineral interests.

2. Fund Balances

Other trust and endowment fund balances of \$7,606,514.10 (Exhibit A) includes annuity and individual trust fund balances as follows:

Annuities arose from gifts made to the foundation in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The foundation has agreed to pay to such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor.

A revolving fund has been established within the operating fund of the foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds and making periodic payments to annuitants. The revolving fund is also used to pay estate expenses prior to the reimbursement of such expenses.

At December 31, 1967, the balance of this revolving fund was \$9,056.70.

In addition to the annuities aforementioned, certain trusts have been created naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. The net income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and, upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at the book value of their assets at December 31, 1967. No attempt has been made to compute any liability of these funds for future payments to beneficiaries.

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

The following supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of transactions, but is submitted for supplementary analysis purposes. It has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to such financial statements, taken as a whole.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on November 6, 1946. It was created as a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or fixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships, for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property, make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to obtain funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disburse and invest funds according to designation made and as set out in the charter.

Church building loans have been made with interest at 6% and were secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements to total 100% of the original amount of each loan. Most of the loans were on ten year terms with provision for monthly payments of principal and interest. Loans committed after December 8, 1967 were to be made at maximum of 7%.

The Old Baptist Building—On October 20, 1955, a lease was executed with Felix Investment Company covering property at 223 W. Park Avenue, Oklahoma City, known as "The Old Baptist Building."

The lease is for a period of 99 years, and as amended April 5, 1956 by supplemental agreement, provided for a total consideration of \$1,070,000.00 for the 99 year period.

COMMENTS

Organization—Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909, to function as an operating unit of the convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that body. On February 9, 1910, Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a perpetual corporation without capital stock, for the purpose of providing opportunities for all departments of higher education and connected preparatory schooling of persons of both sexes on equal terms.

Current Fund

Relief and Annuity—During the period July 1, 1937, to May 31, 1967, the university has contributed to the Educational Institutions Employees Retirement plan of the Relief and Annuity Board of Southern Baptist Convention for the benefit of officers and faculty participation in the plan. According to direct confirmation, the university's accumulations at May 31, 1967, were \$43,986.93. Amounts contributed on behalf of any employe may be refunded to the university upon the death of the employe before retirement, or upon the employe's withdrawal and demand.

Inventories—On May 31, 1967, inventories on hand of \$47,660.27 consisted of bookstore supplies totaling \$35,005.02 and dining hall food supplies totaling \$12,655.05.

Deferred Charges—Deferred charges at May 31, 1967, totaled \$30,377.43. In addition to maintenance supplies of \$16,800.03 and unexpired insurance of \$9,033.38, other deferred charges amounted to \$4,544.02, as listed below:

Deferred Income—Deferred income of \$20,440.98 at May 31, 1967, consisted of \$24,218.54 scholarship grants being held by the university for future use by qualified students in accordance with grantors' provisions, less \$3,777.56 of scholarships committed pending receipt of grants.

Faculty Building Association—Prior to the year under review credits for rent and endowment earnings for Faculty Building Association exceeded the cumulative advances made by Oklahoma Baptist University to Faculty Building Association. At May 31, 1967 the cumulative liability of Oklahoma Baptist University to Faculty Building Association was \$25,539.06.

Loan Fund

National Student Loan Programs—On May 31, 1967, the federal government had made net capital contributions to the university of \$499,506.00 under the National Defense Student Loan Program. Under this program loans are made to qualified students from funds furnished by the federal government (90%) and the university (10%). Loan repayments are scheduled over a maximum of 15 years. Any borrower who becomes a full-time public elementary school teacher may have 10% of the principal of his loan plus interest forgiven for each year of full-time service as a teacher up to a total of five years. During the year under review, \$6,378.47 was forgiven under this program. The university is also participating in a similar loan fund program for student nurses. On May 31, 1967, the government had made capital contributions of \$29,854.52 to the Nursing Student Loan Program. At May 31, 1967, no principal or interest had been forgiven under the Student Nurses Loan Program.

University Loan Funds—In addition to the revolving funds discussed above, the university has received loan funds totaling \$60,-352.40 for loans to qualified students.

Endowment Funds

Grants received in 1956 and 1957 from Ford Foundation amounting to \$243,500.00 are included in the endowment fund balance. The income from these grants was to be used for faculty salaries for ten years. After that time the principal of the fund may be used for any purpose designated by the university.

Plant Fund

Plant and Equipment—Land and land improvements and equipment are included herein at cost. The net book value of buildings includes \$1,272,453.08 of appraised value.

Bonds Payable—The university is obligor to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government under two bond indentures totaling \$1,128,000.00 at May 31, 1967.

The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory bonds, Series 1955, consists of \$507,000.00 of 2¾ % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$12,000.00 on November 1, 1967, to \$23,000.00 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory. The first \$91,000.00 of these bonds were retired on schedule, and \$2,000.00 of the bonds, due November 1, 1995, have been retired.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1967, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series of 1957, consists of \$621,000.00 of 2⅞ % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$13,000.00 on October 1, 1967, to \$33,000.00 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory. During the year under review, \$13,000.00 of these bonds were retired as scheduled.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1967, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$605,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 31, 1961, with semiannual maturities varying from \$17,000.00 on September 1, 1967, to \$26,000.00 on September 1, 1975, with the remaining \$249,000.00 due on March 1, 1976. Interest rates vary from 4¾ % to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) the apportionment from Baptist General Convention for building program; (2) \$67,500.00; or (3), the amount necessary to pay principal and interest during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$254,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semiannual maturities varying from \$6,000.00 on December 1, 1967, to \$10,000.00 on December 1, 1977, with the remaining \$97,000.00 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rates vary from 4¾ % to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000.00 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Year Ended May 31, 1967

Pledged Assets

1. Kerr Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$788,014.07 and land upon which it is located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$507,000.00. Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,115,505.43, plus appraisal value of \$93,217.12, and land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$621,000.00.

2. Thurmond Hall and John Wesley Raley Chapel, and land upon which they are located, included herein respectively at the university's cost of \$536,448.27 and \$1,665,427.41, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$605,000.00.

3. Ford Music Hall, included herein at the University's cost of \$216,319.74, and Brittain Library and Art Center, included herein at the university's cost of \$140,015.27 plus appraisal value of \$114,908.73 and land upon which they are located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$254,000.00

Pledged Income

4. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, the women's dining hall, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, the men's dining hall, and to the extent necessary, the income from WMU Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

5. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$67,000.00, is pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

6. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$27,000.00 annually, are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of the amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

Appraisal Value

7. Included in the book value of buildings is \$1,272,453.08 of appraisal value, consisting of \$1,354,294.65, less \$81,841.57 amortization.

Library Books

8. The university follows a policy of valuing library books at \$60,000.00 plus the cost of books acquired during the past four years. Library books costing \$19,159.30 were purchased during the year ended May 31, 1967, and were added to the capitalized value of library books. Library books costing \$8,226.84 which had been purchased during the fifth year ended previous to May 31, 1967, were removed from the capitalized value of library books and charged to current year operating expense. At May 31, 1967, the remaining book value of capitalized library books was \$113,487.15.

Long-term Lease

9. In May, 1967, Oklahoma Baptist University entered into an agreement to pay \$1,166.67 per month for 180 months beginning September 1, 1967, for the use of apartment houses to be constructed. The agreement includes an option for the university to purchase the property.

Gentlemen:

We have completed an audit of the books of the Cordell Memorial Hospital at Cordell, Oklahoma, for the twelve months period ending June 30, 1967. Attached, as part of our report thereon, please find exhibits and schedules as follows:

Exhibit A—General Fund Balance Sheet, as of June 30, 1967.

Exhibit B—Plant Fund Balance Sheet, as of June 30, 1967.

Exhibit C—Reconciliation of Fund Balances and Reserve Account, July 1, 1966 to June 30, 1967.

Exhibit D—Statement of General Fund Income and Expense, July 1, 1966 to June 30, 1967.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of June 30, 1967, with limited spot-check of detail transactions.

We confirmed the accounts receivable by outside correspondence, as of June 20, 1967. There were no significant, unexplained, changes in the receivables from then to closing date. We aged the accounts, as of June 20, with the following results:

The hospital does not have a separate reserve account for Medicare rate loss; and whether the single reserve of \$2,806.19 is sufficient remains to be seen. Ordinary bad debt losses have always in the past, however, been very low at this hospital. This may be the time to suggest the establishment of separate reserve accounts for Medicare rate losses, and perhaps even Blue Cross. After another year under Medicare we will have a better basis upon which to judge potential Medicare losses.

We did not witness the actual physical inventory count, but our spot-check definitely indicated that the hospital is carrying the approximate quantities shown on the physical inventory. It also indicated a high degree of reliability upon the perpetual inventory records.

The principal accounts payable were confirmed by outside correspondence. The retroactive payment due Medicare is as computed

by my colleague, and fellow C.P.A., Mr. Cecil Conner. This does not include retroactive adjustment for Medicare out-patients, which information is not yet available.

COMMENTS

We computed the retroactive payment due from Blue Cross to be \$618.82.

The books were found to be in excellent condition. No recommendations for change are made, other than as mentioned above.

AUDITORS' OPINION

In our opinion, the attached statements present fairly the financial condition of Cordell Memorial Hospital, as of June 30, 1967, and the results of operation for the 12 months period then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

June 30, 1967

1. Organization of the Hospital

The Enid General Hospital is owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Although accounted for separately, the Hospital is not a separate legal entity, but operates under the corporate charter of the Convention.

2. Accounts Receivable

An analysis of accounts receivable and the allowance for uncollectible accounts for the year ended June 30, 1967, is as follows:

The allowance for uncollectible accounts has been provided by charges to income at the rate of 3½% of patient charges. This rate was determined by a review of the Hospital's bad debt experience, and a review of the current trends in the accounts.

3. Notes Payable

The notes payable of the Hospital have been classified by fund in accordance with the uses to which the proceeds were applied. The details of these notes are as follows:

*This note is payable at the rate of \$300 per month (which includes both principal and interest), until paid, and is secured by a mortgage on land held for expansion having a cost of \$50,000.

4. Estimated Amount Refundable to Medicare Program and Advances from Medicare

(a) Under terms of the Medicare program, hospitals are to be paid actual cost of care of Medicare patients. During the year the hospitals are paid on an estimated basis. At year end actual cost is computed by application of a formula prescribed in Medicare regulations. The report to the Medicare program has not as yet been completed. However, an estimate of Medicare's share of hospital cost has been made by applying the Medicare formula to the figures presented in the financial statements. It is estimated that the Hospital will have to refund \$42,800 to the Medicare program.

(b) The Medicare program, if requested by the hospital, advances funds to the hospital to cover amounts due the hospital, but not yet billed or are in process of being paid. At June 30, 1967, Enid General Hospital had received advances totaling \$44,000.

The amount which can be advanced to the hospital is limited by a formula and is computed quarterly by Medicare. The advances need not be repaid unless they exceed the maximum allowable for two consecutive quarters, and then only the excess is repaid.

5. Accounts Payable—Baptist General Convention

The account payable to the Baptist General Convention consists of amounts owed for purchase of hospital supplies, insurance premiums, and administrative expense. It is the policy of the Hospital to pay these amounts only when funds are not required for other operating purposes.

6. Due to Plant Fund

The interfund due to and due from accounts were established in 1965 to record interfund transactions. Prior to 1965 these transactions were recorded as increases or decreases in the applicable fund's fund balance. At the time of establishment of the due to and due from accounts, no retroactive adjustment to reflect prior year transactions was made.

7. Hospital Plant and Equipment

The Hospital is currently making a physical inventory of all hospital equipment and will identify it with its original cost in compliance with requirements of the Medicare program. Management contemplates no material adjustment to the property accounts upon completion of the inventory.

Depreciation is computed on a composite straight-line basis, using the following rates:

Minor equipment	33 1/3%

During the year ended June 30, 1967, items totaling \$74,711 were reclassified in the accounts from "major movable" equipment to "fixed" equipment. The transfer was made to conform to the equipment classifications designated in current hospital accounting literature.

Also, an inventory was made during the year of items of "minor" equipment in use in the Hospital. These items and estimated prior years depreciation were recorded in the equipment accounts. Cost less prior year depreciation was recorded as an increase in the plant fund balance.

8. Development Fund

The Hospital is currently engaged in a campaign to raise funds for a planned building program. These funds are being accumulated in a development fund pending completion of the project. Financial statements of this fund will not be prepared nor audited until the campaign is complete. Cash and prepaid building fund campaign expenses were transferred to the development fund during the year from the general and plant funds. These transfers have been recorded as reductions of the fund balances in the accompanying financial statements.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts, as of June 30, 1967, with limited spot-check of detail transactions. In this connection, we confirmed the bank accounts, accounts receivable, and principal accounts payable by outside correspondence. The accounts receivable were actually confirmed as of June 29, but there were no significant, unexplained changes from then until closing date. We also aged the accounts at that time, with the following results:

The above is exclusive of employees accounts, and before transfer of credit balances to liabilities. In view of the above, and past experience, we increased the reserve for uncollectibles to \$26,376.61, which we hope will cover Medicare rate loss, as well as other losses.

We did not have the opportunity to witness the actual physical inventory count; however, our subsequent spot-check indicated that the inventories are being maintained at the approximate levels reported.

COMMENTS

We found the books of account to be in excellent condition. The statistical records have shown some improvement since the establishment of a medical records library, separate from the administrative office; however, we experienced considerable difficulty in getting the patient statistics needed.

We were surprised to find a great number of credit balances in the Medicare accounts receivable (total \$2,359.74). We did not analyze these in detail, but transferred these and other credit balances to a liability account. A cursory examination indicated that some of these arose from outside insurance proceeds, in which cases the overpayments are refundable to the patients. In some cases, however, it appears that Medicare has overpaid, in that both Blue Cross and Aetna have paid part, or all, of part "B." We strongly recommend that these accounts all be analyzed and the discrepancies resolved, as we think this will affect the final Medicare settlement.

In a spot-check of receipts and deposits, we were unable, in all cases, to trace checks from the cash receipts to the deposit slips. This is partly due to the practice of cashing checks for employees, and others; and partly due to insufficient information on the cash receipts, themselves. The items we could not trace were small, and we have no reason to suspect any discrepancies; however, we could not be wholly satisfied with this phase of the audit.

The Medicare retroactive adjustment, and consequent Medicare rate loss, are as computed by my colleague and fellow Certified Public Accountant, Mr. Cecil Conner, of Duncan, Oklahoma, and does not include out-patients, which information is not yet available.

AUDITORS' OPINION

In our opinion the attached financial statements present fairly the financial condition of Sayre Hospital, as of June 30, 1967, and the results of operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a consistent basis.

(A) Liability for trade accounts payable has been set up. As the total accounts payable is not material in relation to total income and expense for the year, net profit from operations is not adversely affected.

(B) Due to normal deterioration of fixed assets and some degree of obsolescence, the establishment of a fund for replacement and expansion appears in order. In prior years no provision for depreciation was made. This necessitates a charge against prior years' net profit in the amount of \$46,406.14. This sum represents depreciation properly allocable to the period June 1, 1959 through June 30, 1966. Depreciation rates applied are: Buildings and Improvements 2%; Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment 10%.

Note 4:

In prior years no separation was made of Plant fund and General fund balance sheets. Expenditures for the plant fund in the amount of \$89,916.54 are represented by debt retirement of several plant fund obligations and various asset acquisitions during the period June 1, 1959 through June 30, 1967.

1. Land Held in Trust

On December 3, 1963, the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of a tract of land containing 35 acres to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention. The tract was conveyed in June, 1964, at an appraised value of \$122,500.00.

The trustee is authorized and empowered to erect one or more buildings for the housing and care of elderly persons, and such other improvements as it deems necessary and advisable.

The trustee is authorized to grant leasehold estates of this real estate or any part thereof for terms of years not to exceed a total of twenty years.

The trustee shall pay, annually or at more frequent intervals, to Baptist General Convention the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust, after deduction of taxes, all expenses incurred, and all payments on debts incurred in the erection and operation of the improvements.

The convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

2. Bonds Payable

On February 12, 1965, the Board of Directors adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of real estate first mortgage 6% interest bearing bonds with a trust indenture providing for a total issuance of \$2,000,000.00, in amounts to be paid in 10 years. The bonds are to be issued in series as funds are needed to finance construction projects of Baptist Golden Age Homes in Oklahoma City.

The trust indenture provides that all bonds issued under its provisions will have identical security rights, liens and privileges. The indenture further provides that whenever the issuance of additional bonds is authorized by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, such bonds may be issued and their proceeds used for the purpose of refunding or repurchasing the then outstanding bonds.

Prior to December 31, 1966, Series "A" bonds totaling \$700,000.00 had been issued, and \$9,000.00 were retired in 1967 as scheduled, leaving \$691,000.00 outstanding at December 31, 1967. Maturity dates on outstanding bonds varied from January 1, 1968 to July 15, 1975, with \$9,000.00 due January 15, 1968.

On November 30, 1967, Series "B" bonds totaling \$250,000.00 were authorized to finance construction of an additional 44 bed wing at Lackey Manor. None of the Series "B" bonds had been issued at December 31, 1967. Approximately \$125,000.00 of Series "B" bonds had been sold by February 16, 1968, and proceeds from the sale deposited in a special construction fund bank account.

Series "A" bonds are secured by a first mortgage on blocks 1 and 2 of the Baptist Golden Age Homes Addition Number 1 in Oklahoma City, and improvements thereon. Blocks 1 and 2 contain approximately 7 acres of the total tract of land conveyed in trust to Baptist Laymen's Corporation. The total tract contained 35 acres and was transferred at its appraised value of \$122,500.00.

3. Mortgage Note Payable

The administrative residence, costing \$16,586.76 to construct, was subject to a first mortgage note with an unpaid balance of \$15,447.89 at December 31, 1967.

4. Residential Property Subject to Occupancy Agreements

Two residences, included herein at their combined construction costs of \$27,500.00, were given to Baptist Laymen's Corporation for the use and benefit of Baptist Golden Age Homes located in Oklahoma City, by the occupants thereof. Under terms of the gift, occupants shall possess the premises for their lifetime, subject to physical occupancy of the premises by them.

5. Subsequent Events

On December 8, 1967 the Board of Directors approved additional construction costing approximately \$175,000.00. The construction began in late December, 1967.

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

The following supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations, but is submitted for supplementary analysis purposes. It has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material aspects in relation to such financial statements, taken as a whole.

Organization

Baptist Laymen's Corporation was incorporated February 12, 1960, under Oklahoma law, with perpetual duration and without capital stock.

The general purpose of the Corporation is to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by Southern Baptist Convention.

COMMENTS

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes

The current project of Baptist Laymen's Corporation is the financing, construction, and operation of Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes on a 35 acre tract of land conveyed to the association, as trustee, by the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The land, conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation on June 10, 1964, is shown herein at an appraised value of \$122,500.00

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes presently consists of a sixty-two bed nursing home known as Lackey Manor, twenty apartments, an administrator's residence and two residences constructed by the occupants with right to full possession and uninterrupted use during their natural lives. The nursing home and apartments have been erected on approximately seven and one-half acres of the 35 acre tract. Subsequent to December 31, 1967, construction began on a 44 bed addition to the nursing home.

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

The following supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations, but is submitted for supplementary analysis purposes. It has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to such financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS

Organization: Federal credit unions are cooperative associations organized in accordance with the Federal Credit Union Act. Federal credit unions are chartered, examined, and supervised by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions. The bureau's operating expenses are borne by the federal credit unions. The bureau receives no direct appropriations of public funds.

Members' shareholdings are not insured by any agency of the government.

Baptist Building Federal Credit Union was organized by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions on July 11, 1958, with perpetual duration. The par value of each share is \$5.00.

The bylaws of the credit union provide as follows:

"The purpose of this credit union is to promote thrift among its members, by affording them an opportunity for accumulating their savings, and to create for them a source of credit for provident or productive purposes.

"The field of memberships shall be limited to those having the following common bond of association, occupation, or residence: Employees of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated, the Oklahoma County Baptist Association, the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Home Missions Board who work in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; employees of the Child Care Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated who work in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma; employees of this credit union; and members of their immediate families."

Savings and Loan Shares: Funds were invested in savings and loan shares as follows:

Certificates of Deposit: Funds were invested in certificates of deposit in the Fidelity National Bank and Trust Co., Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in the amount of \$8,256.90. The certificates were purchased on April 29, 1966, at a cost of \$7,692.26 and will mature April 29, 1971, with a redemption value of \$10,000.00.

Loans (Notes) Receivable: Loans were receivable from 47 individual members in the total amount of \$36,446.25 at December 31, 1967.

Loan protection insurance is provided by the credit union in the form of life insurance on the life of the borrowing member equal to his loan balance up to \$5,000.00.

Members Savings Share Accounts: Deposits were held as savings accounts from 128 members in the total amount of \$70,840.79 at December 31, 1967.

Life savings insurance is provided by the credit union which insures the member's life in an amount equal to his savings in shares up to \$2,000.00.

Reserve for Losses: The Federal Credit Union Act provides that all entrance fees and charges to members, and 20% of the net earnings of each dividend period, before the declaration of any dividends, shall be set aside as a regular reserve against losses on bad loans until this reserve shall equal 10% of the total members' shareholdings. No further transfer of net earnings is required except such amount as may be needed to maintain this 10% ratio.

Undivided Earnings: Accumulated earnings available for dividends at December 31, 1967 were \$2,000.00.
