Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 50 members, provided that no church shall have over 10 messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the executive secretary-treasurer, shall be elected annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving a majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected.
- Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. This board of directors shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the convention and 60 other members who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. The membership of this board shall include not less than 16 persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight men and at least eight women.

Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors shall be the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary-treasurer to serve, until such time as the convention meets. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

Section 4. This board shall elect all department heads, including the editor of the Baptist Messenger and the assistant executive secretary. The executive secretary-treasurer, in consultation with the committees of the Board of Directors which are involved, shall select the workers in the executive division, with the exception of office or similar personnel. The department heads, in counsel with the executive secretary-treasurer and the committees of the Board of Directors which are responsible for their work, shall select their workers, other than office or similar personnel. The executive secretary-treasurer and each department head shall select his office or similar personnel. Those responsible for electing or selecting workers shall fix their salaries.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE X-CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be sixty (60) plus the president and the recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen (15) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors, shall be the Exec-

utive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

- Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.
- Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.
- Section 5. The directors shall hold semiannual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

- Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.
- Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

- Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be: A president of the Board of Directors, elected by the convention; a recording secretary, elected by the convention; an executive secretary-treasurer, elected by the convention.
- Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.
- Section 3. The president of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.
 - Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to ap-

point a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The executive secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The executive secretary-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The bylaws shall be adopted by the general convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the bylaws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

Section 2. Election of officers shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

ARTICLE V

- Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the convention.
- Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the convention or the

Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the general convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the general convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Charter and Bylaws

CHARTER AND BYLAWS OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation Feb. 9, 1910, amended Jan. 26, 1956.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is Paul K. Nance, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are: to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of

the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provide for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

The qualifications of said Board of Trustees and of the presidents of said institution and of all departments thereof shall be as follows: That each member of said Board of Trustees shall be a member of a Baptist Church within the state; that the presidents of said institution and each of its departments shall be members of Baptist churches."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election

of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parlimentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semiannual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semiannual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

- Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.
- Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.
- Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semiannual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
- Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.
- Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.
- Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.
- Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Bap-

tist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 12. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semiannual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 13. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 14. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 15. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, until Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section #12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma, and of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of the said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work.

ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and all shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma; and at an election held at Oklahoma City, on the twenty-eighth day of October, 1946, the following names were selected as temporary directors for the purpose of this organization, who are to serve as such until their successors and the full complement of said sixteen (16) directors are elected and qualified, said directors to be presented to the Baptist General Convention at its annual meeting in Oklahoma City on Wednesday, November 6, 1946, to be approved by it, and the temporary directors signing the Articles of Incorporation, are as follows, to-wit:

All of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma—Andrew Potter, Berta K. Spooner, J. B. Rounds, W. R. Wallace, John T. Daniel, R. C. Howard, R. H. Nicholson, Rupert Naney, Thos. P. Haskins, Thomas B. Lackey, Mrs. Bill V. Carden, Robert S. Kerr, Lawrence B. Cobb, E. W. Westmoreland, Guy Bellamy, Garland Howard, Albert McClellan, Charles H. Black, Lucille Driggers, H. Truman Maxey, Mabel Morris and Ira C. Prosser.

Said directors were elected to serve until the first annual meeting or other meeting called to elect directors, and after said sixteen directors shall be approved and affirmed by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma on November the 6th, 1946.

ARTICLE XIII

The subscribers of these Articles constitute the members of the corporation upon organization and for the purpose of adopting any code or bylaws, and transacting any other business that may lawfully be transacted. In the event of the dissolution of the corporation, all of its property whether real, personal or mixed of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated shall vest immediately in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, to be disposed of by said Convention.

ARTICLE XIV

The fiscal year of the Foundation shall be January 1st of each successive year.

ARTICLE I

Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

NAME

RESIDENCE

who were recommended by the Board of Directors of the Convention to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and ratified and approved by said Convention. Such membership to continue until their successors are elected; and all shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of accredited Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

Annual Meeting of the Directors

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting at a designated place at the call of the President of the Foundation a short time prior to the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and he annual report and recommendation of the Directors shall be presented to and acted upon by the Convention at its regular meeting.

ARTICLE III Officers

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, one or more vice-presidents, an executive secretary, who shall also be the secretary and the treasurer of the corporation. Such elective officers, with the exception of the executive secretary, shall be chosen at a meeting of the Board of said corporation, to be held at the Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the Board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only. The executive secretary shall be elected by the Board of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected.

In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lessor officers as it deems necessary, or desirable, such as administrative assistants, assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

Section 1—President:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2-Vice-Presidents:

It shall be the duty of each of the vice-presidents to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3—Executive Secretary:

The executive secretary shall be the official administrator of all of the work of the Board of Directors and shall make full report of all matters committed to the Board of Directors.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of secretary; shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors and then shall perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

The executive secretary shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The executive secretary shall file with the Board of Directors of

the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Óklahoma, the expense of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 4—Directors:

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

ARTICLE V

Method of Election and Terms of Office

Section 1—Directors:

Each year thereafter the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma the four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years, and shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year.

Section 2—Other Officers:

The directors shall select from among their own number a president, and one or more vice presidents, each of whom shall hold office for one year.

Section 3-Vacancies:

Vacancies on the board of directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If the Baptist General Convention shall fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

ARTICLE VI Board of Directors

Section 1-Regular Meeting:

The board of directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings:

Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the board of directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committee:

The board of directors may, at their first meeting, or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum:

A quorum of the board of directors shall consist of at least five (5) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority:

The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquaintances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice-president of the board of directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

ARTICLE VII

Distributees

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VIII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of _____, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA." ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meetings of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, nor shall any such amendment become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. T. B. Lackey, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.
- care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

ARTICLE I Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been

designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III

Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporamay be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24)) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meeting.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X

Notice of Regular Meetings

Section 1. DISPENSED WITH. Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI Amendments

Section 1. METHOD OF AMENDMENT. These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII

Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Thomas E. Carter, Executive Secretary

This report is for 12 months, from Sept. 1, 1967, through Aug. 31, 1968.

Receipts and Disbursements

The year brought income from five bequests in wills and from 55 trusts, gift annuities and other gifts, temporary funds and income from other sources, bringing the total receipts to \$967,579.88. During this period, \$231,314.35 was distributed to Oklahoma Baptist University; \$67,478.82 to child care ministry; \$141,745.18 to child

care for capitol improvements, and \$87,013.03 to other institutions and agencies.

There are now 564 churches having placards showing their participation in the Foundation's endowment program.

Foundation Earnings from Investments

Income produced on Foundation investments for 1967 was \$376,-360.99. This is 4.7 per cent of earnings on investments.

Living Trusts and Wills

During this 12-month period a total of 371 formal wills and trusts have been prepared by various attorneys throughout Oklahoma, from which the Foundation, as trustee, will be the recipient of further cash, other properties and real estate. In addition, hundreds of other gifts for our Baptist causes have come to the Foundation which did not require a formal trust agreement. There have been 3,505 individuals participating through wills and trusts in the endowment program of the Baptist Foundation.

Investments and Procedures

Since 1954 the Foundation has been authorized to place 50 per cent of all assets into the church building loan trust fund. During the 12-month period 15 loans have been closed in the amount of \$285,955. Since 1954, 327 loans have been closed and 179 have been repaid in full. Not one cent has been lost on church loans.

Student Loans and Scholarships

The Foundation began the task of handling student loan and scholarship funds in 1947.

During this 12-month period 48 students have been granted loans and 31 students have received scholarships.

Personnel

Thomas E. Carter succeeded Auguie Henry as executive secretary on Jan. 1, 1968, after serving more than five years as assistant executive secretary. Auguie Henry became executive secretary emeritus, continuing with the Foundation on a consulting basis. Earl L. Stark retired, but continues with the Foundation on a part-time basis.

C. Fred Williams came to the Foundation on Jan. 1, 1968, as an administrative assistant, having served about three years with the Stewardship Commission as a director of endowment and capitol giving promotion. Previously Fred was in the Department of Religious Education in Oklahoma for seven years. He had served various pastorates in Oklahoma prior to his denominational work. He is now responsible for promotion, implementing programs and the field work for the Foundation.

Marvin H. Hall came to the Foundation Aug. 1, 1965, and on Jan. 1, 1968, he was named administrative assistant. He is responsible for property management, church building loan program, student loans and assists in the field work.

Raymond J. Hurt came to the Foundation on Aug. 1, 1966. Hurt is the chief accountant, handling the accounting procedures on all trust funds, all investments, including the investments in church

loans. He works with the Special Investment Committee in the investment of these funds and supervises the day by day accounting procedures of the Foundation.

On Aug. 26, 1968, Betsy J. Czajkoski came to the Foundation office as receptionist. Mrs. Czajkoski is also serving as secretary to C. Fred Williams.

Others on the office staff are Mrs. Delbert Marlow, who works with Raymond Hurt as bookkeeper, and Ednamae White Bennett who is secretary to Thomas E. Carter.

Promotion

The program of the Baptist Foundation centers in working with individuals. It seeks the assistance of the churches and the associations in getting the message to the individuals. This has been made possible through the opportunities to supply for various churches throughout the year, and with a program called "Implementing the Forward Look." This program presents the work of the Foundation in each church in a given association over a period of two or more Sundays, either in the morning or evening service. The first effort of this kind was in Frisco Association in 1956. Since that time the program has been presented in 38 associations and seven associations for the second time. It is the plan of the Foundation staff to continue in four or five associations each year. During 1968 this program is being presented in Union, Northeastern, Frisco and Central Associations. Plans are already under way for presenting it in at least four associations in 1969. During 1968 both Auguie Henry, executive secretary emeritus, and Earl L. Stark have assisted in these Implementing Sundays, making it possible for the entire program to be presented by the Foundation staff. In each of these associations, a dinner meeting is held for the pastors, education and music directors, and their wives. The purpose of this meeting is to acquaint them in more detail with the work of the Foundation, thus they can be of more assistance in their churches. The two Foundation filmstrips, "Pastor, Do You Have a Will?" and "Generations to Come," are shown in these dinner meetings and the work of the Foundation is explained by the staff members.

Board Members

The Foundation is losing four of its very fine board members this year. One, Hugh A. Jolley from Enid, was a charter member of the board, having taken office in November, 1946; Raymond A. Young, Oklahoma City, who came to the board in November, 1947, has served as president of the corporation since January, 1963; Warren C. Hultgren, Tulsa, came to the board in November, 1961; James M. Thompson, Ada, became a board member in May, 1964. These men have rendered an outstanding service to the Baptist Foundation, and we regret that the rotation system necessitates their going off the board this year. The Foundation board has recommended to the Board of Directors of the Convention, for nomination at the annual meeting of the Convention the following men as new members, each

Baptist Messenger Jack L. Gritz, Editor

The Baptist Messenger is the official weekly news publication of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. It is edited and printed each week in the Baptist Building at Oklahoma City and mailed to members of churches which have subscribed for their members and also to individuals who have subscribed. The cost of the 16-page magazine to churches is 3.2 cents per copy and the cost to individuals is \$1.75 per year in clubs of three or more or \$2 per year singly.

The primary purpose of the publication is to help the members of Baptist churches in the state to be informed concerning church and denominational activities. The wide range of such information extends from events in the churches to associational activities, to state convention undertakings, to Southern Baptist Convention institutions and agencies, and to the work of the Baptist World Alliance. The news of the departments, agencies and institutions of the state convention is of primary interest to Messenger readers. Each department, agency and institution is provided space and this space is used by each as it sees fit. Present circulation is in excess of 81,000.

Some of the other objectives of the publication in the life of the denomination are as follows: (1) To provide doctrinal guidance to church members through articles. (2) To provide informed comment concerning denominational affairs and moral and social issues. (3) To provide a forum for the expression of opinions and ideas by church

members. (4) To provide devotional help for the enrichment of the readers' spiritual lives. (5) To inspire individual Christians to do and be their best for God. The Messenger is a missionary journal, telling about and encouraging missions both at home and abroad.

The slogan of the publication for many years has been "An informed Baptist is a better Baptist."

Religious Education Lyle Garlow, Secretary

The Department of Religious Education lost a most loyal and capable associate in the action of the Board of Directors, May 7, 1968. On the recommendation of the Religious Education Committee, a separate Department of Student Work was approved with Clyde C. Clayton named secretary. Clayton became an associate in the Religious Education Department in 1947 and became director of student work, January, 1958 when student work became a part of this department. Under his leadership, student work has grown and today is a most significant part of Baptist life. We congratulate Clayton and anticipate continued advance for the work among students on our campuses.

Personnel in the department include Bill C. Haggard, associate secretary and director of Training Union work; Hugh E. Willoby, director of youth and Vacation Bible School work; Miss Alga Motychak, director of children's work; Mrs. Herb Collins, administrative secretary; Mrs. Gerald Jennings, secretary to Haggard; Mrs. Roberta

Peck, receptionist, and Miss Judy Hill, secretary.

The department is currently involved in preparation activities in the Crusade of the Americas and will continue to contribute to its success.

Sunday School

The first STATEWIDE CENSUS was promoted and directed by the department through each association. A report of the results was made at the state Sunday School Convention, Oct. 15, 1968. Another first was the use of prime television time to promote the survey. Saturation of the state was obtained through the use of six stations located in Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Lawton and Ada. The expense was provided by the four local associations, assisted by the Departments of Religious Education and Evangelism with contributions from 14 other associations.

Another project related to the Crusade was the Church Outreach Workshops conducted during September, 1968 in all but four associations. These workshops were designed to promote visitation, witnessing, improvement, enlargement and a six-week enrolment emphasis.

Enrolment in Sunday school totaled 328,166. Vacation Bible School enrolment totaled 136,179 in 1,177 schools with 2,196 pro-

fessions of faith reported.

Training Union

There are several encouraging aspects in the Training Union report this year. According to records of this past year, 1,081 of the 1,354 churches and missions in Oklahoma reported functioning Training Unions, with an enrolment of 119,866. "M" Night continues to have exceptional response in Oklahoma with a total of 16,400 present with 854 churches represented and 650 pastors present. The annual Drills and Tournament program continues to receive statewide response with 14 associations represented in at least one of the three events, Junior Memory Work, Intermediate Sword Drill, and Young People's Speakers' Tournament. The Oklahoma Baptist Training Union Convention was conducted, Oct. 19-20, 1967 at Sequoyah Hills Church, Tulsa, with a total attendance exceeding 1,300.

Dates, Goals, and Projects, 1968-69:

1. A major emphasis in Training Union will be the role of Training Union in its relation to the Crusade of the Americas. Two major projects are emphasized:

(1) A statewide New Church Member Orientation emphasis. The goal is a New Church Member Orientation program in every church.

(2) The promotion of Training Union improvement month, May 1969. Every association will be encouraged to conduct a Training Union Enlargement Project following the Crusade of the Americas.

7. A State Church Administration long-range planning confer-

8. The new emphasis on the enlarged concept of the Training program of the church is strengthening and preparing more leaders to carry on the total church program.

Baptist Student Union

New attention was focused by Oklahoma Baptists on our 24,000 Baptist college students in 1968. When the first funds from the Advance Cooperative Program budget became available, it was clear that Baptists were saying, "Devote greater attention to our college sons and daughters." "More attention" has taken two forms. First, there is the beginning of more money for the 26 BSUs. Second, a Department of Student Work has been established. More money means more student directors and a stronger program of evangelism and Christian education at the campuses. A separate Department of Student Work will be in the position of calling to the attention of Oklahoma Baptists the needs of the 24,000 Baptists on Oklahoma campuses and the thousands who are not Christians.

Child Care

H. Truman Maxey

October 10, 1902 was the day important history was made in child care as J. A. Scott, pastor of Washington Avenue Church of—Oklahoma City, stood in the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention meeting in Norman and made the motion, "That this convention appoint a committee to consider the propriety of founding and locating a Baptist Orphan's Home for Oklahoma." Then, in 1903 the Baptist General Convention of Indian Territory joined the state convention in its effort to establish and maintain a Baptist Orphan's Home.

March 16, 1903 a home was started by renting a small house in Oklahoma City. A joint committee of the two conventions decided on the present location Sept. 27, 1905. This year 1968, we commem-

orate our 65th anniversary of this illustrious beginning of Oklahoma

Baptists to do mission work in the area of child care.

Fifty years after this noble beginning (1953), Baptists received the gift from Mr. and Mrs. James M. Johnson to begin a work for meeting the needs of boys with problems. Now, 15 years later we all glow with pride at the rapid growth in buildings and facilities as well as the development of programs to teach and train in a Boys Ranch Town program.

For simplicity of operation, for all the efforts of caring for children by Baptists and their churches, the Department of Child Care was organized in 1956 to direct all the child care ministries. These include the Baptist Children's Home, Boys Ranch Town, adoptions, foster family care, maternity care for unwed mothers, family aid and family counseling. A daily average of over 200 children are in care. Over 3,000 have been enrolled in the total program of the past 65

years.

The "past is only prologue" for the future. Baptists must be challenged to equip themselves both in facilities and program to meet the sad condition of many children in this our day who are not receiving much help. The marginal and the handicapped child are still left out. Many applications for average or normal children are referred elsewhere for lack of room. There are some problem areas of teenagers which we are not serving for they require professional services which we cannot afford.

This is our anniversary year but after the look back, we see it only as a first step to all the possible things that must be done in this the tomorrow of child care in the years to come. It can be done with God's help through our faithful Baptist people. You can answer the challenge of your child care ministry as you give to its support through your local Baptist church.

Historical Commission

There have been two meetings of the Historical Commission during the year. The first meeting was held at Muskogee, Jan. 29, and the second was at the Baptist Building, Sept. 19, 1968. Several items

of importance were considered at these meetings including the projects and programs reported below.

Life of Lackey

The commission has requested Sam W. Scantlan to write a book on the life of Thomas Bert Lackey. In the January meeting of the commission Scantlan submitted a proposed title for the book and a time table for completing the manuscript. In the September meeting these items were reviewed and confirmed. The book will be called **The Life and Labors of T. B. Lackey.** The manuscript is to be submitted to the Historical Commission in January, 1971 to be scheduled for publication by or before Sept. 1, 1971.

Gaskin's Writings

Since 1964 two books have been published by the convention of which J. M. Gaskin was the author. The first was **Baptist Milestones in Oklahoma** of which 3,000 copies were printed. Through Aug. 30, 1968, 2,238 copies of this book have been sold for a total in cash receipts of \$5,044.82. Expenses in publishing this book were \$5,787.22 leaving a deficit of \$742.40 with 762 copies of the book still on hand. This book sells for \$2.55 per copy.

The second book was entitled The Falls Creek Story published in the summer of 1966 in connection with the golden anniversary of the assembly. Cost of printing this book was \$4,874.01 for the publication of 3,000 paper back books and 300 hard back books. The report for Aug. 30, 1968 which was approved at the September meeting of the Historical Commission showed 261 copies of this book in the paper back still on hand with a financial profit on the books of \$372.50.

Book Inventory

A recent inventory of historical books which have been published by the convention in recent years showed the following in stock at the Baptist Building: Not Yours But You by W. A. Carleton (96 copies cloth, 320 copies paper); A Question Once Asked by Argye M. Briggs (171 hard back, 653 paper back); Andrew Potter, Baptist Builder by Sam Scantlan (41 hard back); Annals of OBU by James N. Owens (197 hard back); Trail Blazers of Sooner Baptists by J. M. Gaskin (hard back, 48 first edition, 20 second edition); Baptist Milestones in Oklahoma by J. M. Gaskin (762 hard back); The Falls Creek Story by J. M. Gaskin (261 paper back).

In its September meeting the commission voted to offer these books for sale during the convention. They may be obtained at the commission's exhibit or from the book store.

"Summer's Child"

The commission assisted in the preparation of "Summer's Child," a 16 mm film, in the summer of 1967. This film was shot on the scene during the summer encampment at Falls Creek, and tells the assembly's history in a very effective manner. Sixteen prints of the film were received, three of which were for public relations, two

sold to associations, and 11 are for rental. As of Aug. 30, expenses in producing this film totaled \$14,423.98; income from offerings and gifts amounted to \$8,377.67; from film rentals the income was \$1,-646.30, leaving a deficit of only \$4,400.01.

Folsom Grave

The commission continues to study with Herbert M. Pierce the possibility of erecting a marker to indicate the location of Peter Folsom's grave near Keota. Folsom was reported to be the first Choctaw Indian convert to Christianity. He was a well-known Baptist preacher among the Choctaws after their removal to the West.

E. W. Thornton

September 19 the Historical Commission elected E. W. Thornton to the place of curator for the historical collection at the Oklahoma Baptist University library. Thornton is a retired history professor at OBU, and will work on a limited basis under the joint support and direction of OBU and the commission.

Historical Society

The Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society is auxiliary to the Commission, and reports 97 active members. Nineteen of these are life members, and there is one honorary life member. One year ago this honor was awarded to E. W. Thornton for his distinguished service to the history interests of Oklahoma Baptists.

The Chronicle

The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle is now completing the 11th year of its publication. Volumes I-V were indexed in 1962, and Volumes VI-X were indexed this year. Volume VI, No. 1 carries a complete index to the first five volumes, and Vol. XI, No. 1, carries a full index to the second five volumes. The magazine is published twice each year, and is mailed without charge to all members of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society. This work is growing in its acceptance in libraries, historical collections, museums, and as a reference work by researchers.

Recommendations

- 1. More churches, associations, and institutions should take steps to have their histories written.
- Churches and other Baptist bodies should microfilm their minutes and other valuable records.
- 3. Baptists should continue to collect, preserve and utilize their history. All necessary steps should be taken to encourage a growing awareness of the sense of history among the Baptists of Oklahoma.

American Bible Society

The American Bible Society appreciates the privilege of working with Southern Baptists in their worldwide mission task and the special opportunity of serving in the Crusade of the Americas. The

entire program of Bible Society work is founded on these basic missionary principles:

People must have the Bible because it presents Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary can not go. It can stay on after he must leave—and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

But, there is a worldwide shortage of Bibles—because, in most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The American Bible Society is a missionary non-profit organization, serving churches of many denominations in the USA and abroad. It helps missionaries translate the Bible. It publishes the Scriptures without note or comment. It distributes without profit, usually below cost, and without any charge in cases of special need. For the blind it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems, Talking Bible records and tape recordings.

"God's Word for a New Age—the Book for New Readers" is the current theme of the program of worldwide missionary advance being carried on by the American Bible Society, in co-operation with 34 other national Bible Societies around the world. Its aim is to provide greatly increased quantities of Scriptures urgently needed for mission work. Long range goals are:

- -a Bible for every Christian home
- -a New Testament, at least, for every Christian
- -a portion of Scripture, at least, for everyone who can read
- —an opportunity for every church member to share in local Scripture distribution

During 1967 the American Bible Society—

- —rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1326 languages; the full Bible in 242, a Testament in 307 more, a Gospel or other complete book in 777 more. In 1967 Scriptures were published in 46 new languages—almost one per week. But, there are still more than 1000 languages in which not one book of the Bible has yet been published.
- —gave 1,190,839 Scripture volumes for distribution by chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veterans' hospitals, as a vital link between the home churches and the men in service. This was over twice the number distributed in 1966.
- —continued to develop Scriptures in everyday speech printed in attractive forms. Outstanding among these is Good News for Modern Man, the today's English Version New Testament. Illustrated with line drawings, it is available in paperback and in a vinyl binding. By mid-summer 1968 its total distribution had exceeded 12 million

copies. A similar translation of the New Testament in popular Spanish, with the same line drawings, has been very well received. Its total distribution by midsummer 1968 was more than 1 million copies.

—set new records by distributing 43,931,553 Scripture volumes in the U.S.A. and a total of 70,113,004 volumes, in over 800 languages, in some 150 countries. For the first time, one year's combined distribution of all Bible Societies broke the 100-million mark and totaled 104,805,807 volumes. This was 1 copy for every 33 people in the world today—giving hope that a world population explosion can be overtaken by a Scripture distribution explosion.

Southern Baptists support the work because the Bible Society serves mission work around the world—and missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people—Southern Baptists believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

In 1967 Southern Baptist churches gave \$218,509 to the American Bible Society and ranked first among all denominations. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$1,414,290.

Although Southern Baptist churches lead in total gifts, the per capita gift is less than 2 cents per year—and less than the per capita gift from several other major denominations. Southern Baptist churches can lead, even in per capita gifts—if every church will give. Has your church given this year? Here are suggestions, based on what many churches are doing:

Every church can give at least these amounts each year: Smaller churches—\$10 to \$60 Larger churches—\$60 to \$300 Great city churches—\$300 to \$600 or more

Church Music

The Crusade of the Americas has been one of the main thrusts of your State Music Department this year and will be most of the next.

The Singing Churchmen recorded a Crusade of the Americas album at the request of the Home Mission Board and the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission and will be singing on the national crusade television programs next March. These will be narrated by Paul Harvey. Billy Graham will preach.

We urge you to clear this time on your church calendar and lead your entire membership to view these special programs which will be a "kick-off" for the crusades in the United States.

Our various associational organizations have done a fine job of furnishing the right kind of music for the crusade rallies. All of our festivals and workshops have given emphasis to the coming revivals.

Since the annual state Junior Choir Festivals would conflict with the crusades, we are cancelling them so that the music directors and

the children can give their full energies to this great effort.

The Crusade of the Americas Song Book, edited and compiled by Hines Sims, Bill Ichter and William J. Reynolds, was introduced at Falls Creek last summer and will be used again next year.

Sims and Ichter wrote the theme song for the crusades. Hymnbook size copies may be secured from the Baptist Book Store at a nominal cost and can be inserted in your regular hymn books.

Dwight L. Moody, Billy Sunday and Billy Graham have all brought in revivals on wings of song. May the Crusade of the Americas be brought in on wings of glorious Spirit filled songs and sermons.

Miami Baptist Hospital

The Miami Baptist Hospital has replaced all windows with new aluminum windows. Other improvements have been made at a cost of about \$50,000 which makes the appearance of the building more attractive.

Grand Valley Hospital

December 23, 1967 contracts in the amount of \$134,000 were awarded. These improvements include maintenance department, emergency addition including physical therapy, inhalation therapy and laboratory were completed. The hospital contributed from its operating fund \$84,000 and \$50,000 was borrowed to be repaid from the operating funds. Although the improvements are made on a county owned building, all funds are earned in the careful operation of the hospital. Open house and dedication services were conducted Sept. 29, 1968.

Sayre Hospital

The City of Sayre is constructing an extended care unit consisting of 24 beds and eight additional private rooms. This is being financed by the city since the hospital belongs to the City of Sayre. However, the hospital has agreed to invest \$31,000 from operating reserve on furnishings.

The hospital is also making additional improvements in enlarging kitchen, x-ray, emergency rooms and nurses stations. All improvements will cost approximately \$430,000 and will be financed from operating funds.

Camp Hudgens

Unit Lodge #3 was completed at a cost of approximately \$9,000. Road and sewer work was finished at a cost of \$7,778. Two additional winterized cabins are being constructed at a cost of approximately \$5,000 each.

Child Care

Dedication and open house services were held Oct. 6, 1968 for Oatley Anderson and Tom Lucas Cottages at the Baptist Children's Home. These buildings were constructed at a cost of approximately \$94,000 each.

Bids were opened on the administration lodge at Boys Ranch Town on Sept. 23, 1968. The contract was awarded to Sooner Construction Company in the amount of \$83,605.00. This lovely building should be completed in 1969.

Falls Creek .

Many churches have built new cabins this year and others plan to construct new buildings before next assembly. All plans are approved by the Building Committee or its sub-committee.

C. H. Guernsey Engineering Company has surveyed the assembly grounds and recommended a new modern water system that is estimated to cost approximately \$150,000. This should be constructed as funds become available.

Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital

Ground was broken May 19, 1968 for the construction of a new wing and complete modernization that will cost approximately \$2½ million. One-half of the funds are being raised and the other half will be borrowed. Construction is under way, but approximately two years will be required before completion.

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes

The Baptist Laymen's Corporation constructed a new wing to Lackey Manor with 44 additional beds and other improvements. The cost, including furnishings, was approximately \$215,000. Dedication of these new facilities was Aug. 11, 1968. The manor now has 109 beds, and there are 20 apartments and three private dwellings. This is rapidly becoming one of the most beautiful facilities in the state.

Hugo Golden Age Home

Plans are being completed for another addition to Hugo Golden Age Home. Some time will be required for planning and financing.

Oklahoma Baptist University

Funds are being raised and plans made for a Student Union Building at Oklahoma Baptist University. The chapel will be finished and other improvements made.

Baptist Building

A contract has been let for installing a second elevator in the Baptist Building. The cost is approximately \$35,000. It should be in use by April 1, 1969.

Home Missions

Arthur B. Rutledge, executive secretary-treasurer of the Home Mission Board said, "The emphasis on 'The Church Fulfilling Its Mission Through Ministry' has placed the spotlight on the minorities, the disadvantaged, the poor. These have been brought to our attention as objects of divine love and as persons we ought to reach for Christ. We now move to the climactic emphasis on 'The Church Fulfilling Its Mission Through Evangelism and World Missions.' The Crusade of the Americas and Project 500 will magnify the ultimate purpose of all home mission work—to lead people to know and follow Christ."

GOD'S WORD will be distributed in ever increasing numbers and variety in 1968 because of action by the Home Mission Board. The agency and concerned individuals have purchased 75,000 copies of Good News for Modern Man. The Division of Communication has prepared a list of Scripture portions and other Bible aids for use with all people served by mission and evangelism workers. This list is available on request from the division.

PREPARATION FOR THE CRUSADE of the Americas dominated much of the work of evangelism during the past year, serving also as the theme for most of the evangelism conferences in the states the early part of 1968. The response was excellent to many special projects, such as the numerous crusades in the Northeast.

THE MISSIONARY FORCE totals almost 2,300 representing a gain of over 100, although 460 appointments were made of associate and career missionaries. Most of them are jointly employed with a

state convention, association, and/or local congregation.

OTHER MISSION WORKERS included 740 student summer missionaries, with 626 supported by the Home Mission Board and 114 by Baptist Student Unions. There was greater interest and participation in the Christian Service Corps, including more than 100 (enlisted in part by the Brotherhood) who assisted with flood relief in Fairbanks, Alaska.

CHAPLAINS on active duty in Vietnam number more than 100, while there are 666 chaplains on duty with all the military. In addition about 300 chaplains serve in hospitals, institutions, and industry.

THE DOWNTOWN CHURCH STUDY was completed in cooperation with the Sunday School Board, and the first urban studies seminar was held in co-operation with Southeastern Seminary and the District of Columbia convention.

THE NORTHEAST has become the scene for some of Southern Baptists most creative and rapid growth (with a 25 per cent increase in the year) as part of an intensive emphasis upon pioneer missions.

LANGUAGE CONGREGATIONS are studying ways in which they might move to early self-support through a new emphasis implemented by the Language Missions Department. The study stresses a study of each field, consideration of fields of churches and missions by missionary personnel, and stronger self-determination by these congregations.

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM and the Annie Armstrong Offering provided the largest support in the history of the agency, with \$5,253,718 coming from the Cooperative Program including \$323,268 from the advance section and the Annie Armstrong Offering brought \$4,088,513.

NEW QUARTERS FOR THE STAFF and office force of the Home Mission Board have been secured in Atlanta at 1350 Spring Street, N.W. (30309) and are now occupied. The new building, a seven-story structure, nearly doubles the available space of the old building purchased more than 20 years ago.

A MAJOR USE OF RESOURCES is made in the newer areas of the convention where the board helps in mission work through state conventions. Allocations to the older state conventions are limited mostly to the programs of language missions, Christian social ministries, work with National Baptists, special mission ministries, and with survey and special studies.

CHURCH LOANS for the purchase of sites and for building construction were made by the Division of Church Loans to 310 churches with loans totaling \$7,199,377.

PROJECT 500 LOCATIONS have been identified and plans are being made in the state conventions and the associations for the establishment of these 500 congregations during the two-year emphasis of the project. More than half of these new churches will be located in pioneer fields.

THE GROWING LEISURE CRISIS and ways of ministering to resort communities have been under study, through conferences, pilot projects, and on-going mission efforts as directed by the Department of Rural-Urban Missions.

FRATERNAL AND COOPERATIVE RELATIONSHIPS with National Baptists and Southern Baptists are seen as major factors in helping to solve problems of race. The Department of Work with National Baptists reports more good will, co-operation, and sharing between the two groups of Baptists, beginning at the grass roots and continuing throughout the denominations.

THE EXPANDING PROGRAM OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES reported extensive evaluation of existing ministries, studying centers in New Orleans, searching for a change in strategy in literacy missions, establishing guidelines for disaster relief, and designing a ministry to ex-prisoners. The ministry of juvenile rehabilitation has expanded to 100 areas, and new methods and new concerns are under study.

AN INTEREST IN NON-EVANGELICALS, their beliefs and ways in which Southern Baptists might witness to them has been projected by the Department of Work Related to Non-Evangelicals, including the Christian sects, Jews, non-Christian world religions, and Roman Catholics.

The Christian task in the homeland grows with each passing day. The population has passed 200 million. By 1980 it is expected to reach 242 million. Migration from central cities to suburbs will continue, as doubtless will problems of poverty, racial tension, and public and private morality. More than seventy-five million people in the United States are unchurched. Our national involvement around the world constitutes a heavy burden. We must pray and work for a renewal of spiritual vitality, a revival of Christian faith.

Foreign Missions

On May 1, 1968, Southrn Baptist missionaries were at work in 65 geographical or political entities and were under appointment to four more, pending official government permission to enter. During 1967 missionaries went to live in Ethiopia and Botswana. A couple stationed in Luxembourg moved to Belgium to work with Americans and Belgians. __

We have work in Argentina, Austria, Bahamas, Belgium (and Luxembourg), Bermuda, Botswana, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Ethiopia, France, French West Indies, Gaza, Germany, Ghana, Guam, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Hong Kong, Iceland, India, Indonesia, Israel, Libya, Macao, Malawi, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Nigeria, Okinawa, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Rhodesia, Singapore, Spain, Switzerland (Baptist Center), Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Togo, Trindad, Turkey, Uganda, Uruguay, Venezuela, Vietnam, Yemen, and Zambia.

At the close of 1967 the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,277. This included 91 missionary associates, three special project medical personnel, and 102 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 222 (130 career, 32 associates, 55 journeymen, and five reappointed). Between January and May, 1968, 115 more were added, 73 of them journeymen.

Even with the additional appointments, several hundred calls for missionary personnel are still unanswered. Preachers and medical people continue to be the most urgently requested.

The leading of people to new life in Jesus Christ is the ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors. Years of foreign mission labor have taught us that the cultivation of New Testament churches is the wisest investment of missionary resources. At the year's end, reports for the missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries) totaled 4,918 churches (3,211 self-supporting), 6,463 missions points, and 4,119 national pastors. Also reported were 46,275 baptisms, 561,647 church members, and 515,630 enrolled in Sunday school. Mainland China, closed to missionaries at present, was last estimated as having 392 churches and 123,000 members related to Southern Baptist mission work.

The Foreign Mission Board shared in seven major evangelistic campaigns (Chile, East Africa, Indonesia, Japan, Jordan, Portugal and Zambia), in which more than 17,000 decisions were reported. The third Orient Missions Conference, a highly significant meeting, convened in Hong Kong.

Amazing results continue to accompany Baptist radio and television efforts. Correspondence courses, sponsored through Baptist radio programs, enrolled thousands of people. New radio recording studios opened in Lebanon and Rhodesia.

The 1,295 schools (in 42 countries) with which our missionaries, are related enrolled 181,639 students and were staffed by 6,469 national and 399 missionary teachers and administrators. Among the school were 44 theological institutions having 1,766 students, and six women's training schools with 627 enrolled.

Book stores and reading rooms on the mission fields are confronting hundreds with the Christian message. Literature in the language of the people has become increasingly important for evangelism, leadership training, and Christian education.

Twenty-four publications centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas (Spanish), produced over 23 million pieces; tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymn books. Staffing these centers were 71 missionaries and 566 nationals.

The Commission, foreign missions journal of the Board, reported an average monthly circulation of 87,541 in 1967.

Medical institutions included 20 hospitals and 86 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,438 beds, in 1967, 145 national and 58 missionary physicians served with 367 nationals and 65 missionary nurses. They treated 47,580 in-patients and cared for 597,711 outpatients. Engaged additionally in the medical ministry were 913 nationals and 43 missionaries.

Twenty-five good will and community centers in 14 countries reached people in various ways: Literacy classes, homemaking courses, Bible study clubs, and evangelistic services. Staffed by 31 missionaries and 112 nationals, these centers enrolled 10,030 children and adults. In 15 children's homes, four missionaries assisted 113 national workers in caring for 1,168 boys and girls. Two new servicemen's centers in Korea began their ministry, and a Baptist center opened in Lome, Togo.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$28,286,597 as 1967 closed (an increase of \$1,239,397 over 1966). The 1967 Lottie Moon Christmas offering had reached a total of \$14,664,679.30 by May 1, 1968.

Still, needs continued to be far beyond financial resources. Unfilled requests from the missions for urgently needed land, equipment, and buildings amounted to several million dollars.

The following is the last report of the Foreign Mission Board before this report went into the hands of the printer to be placed in the

Book of Reports.

As of July 1, the Foreign Mission Board overseas staff totaled 2,265 missionaries under appointment (including 2,104 career missionaries, 97 missionary associates, 62 missionary journeymen, and two special project medical) to 68 countries. Since the missionary couple serving in Iceland has been transferred to Germany and the missionary couple from Luxembourg and Belgium is now stationed in Belgium, the Foreign Mission Board no longer has missionaries resident in Iceland or Luxembourg.

A new Cooperative Program pamphlet has recently come off the press, showing the importance of the Cooperative Program witness in foreign lands entitled "You Multiplying Yourself." In it Baker James Cauthen, executive secretary of the Foreign Mission Board says, "The Cooperative Program is You multiplying yourself in many countries."

In 1967 a record of 222 new missionaries re-enforced and expanded the efforts of Southern Baptists in foreign lands. This is the most that the board has appointed in one year. The nearest appointments previous to this amount was in 1965, when 220 were appointed. Consider the 2,210 missionaries under appointment now in comparison to 803 in 1950. We have come so far, but there is yet much farther to go.

Jesse Fletcher, secretary for missionary personnel, cries out the hope of all concerned Southern Baptists when he says "throughout our convention there are compassionate-hearted, tough-minded men and women who are setting their eyes and their wills with a flintlike devotion toward the adventure of this task. Hope of increasing the missionary force to 5,000 and beyond rests on them and upon the kind of support and encouragement they receive from their fellow Baptists."

Brotherhood Bob Banks, Secretary

On May 7, 1968, the convention's Board of Directors took action to set up a Brotherhood Department separate from evangelism effective June 1, 1968. Coupled with the objective of missionary education and involvement, this action gives to Brotherhood work in our state a possibility of greater growth and service to our churches than ever before.

In connection with the above action, the board elected Bob Banks as department secretary. For the past 14 years, Banks has served as director of Royal Ambassadors and RA camps in the Department of Brotherhood and Evangelism, and in addition to heading up the department, Banks will continue his responsibilities in these areas.

On Sept. 1, 1968, Henry Chennault became associate secretary in the department with special responsibilities in the area of Baptist Men and in leadership training for the total Brotherhood program. Prior to coming to the Brotherhood Department, Chennault served as director of work with National Baptists in the convention's missions department.

Tribute to Pennington and Stockwell

Oklahoma and Southern Baptists owe much to J. A. Pennington for his 20 years of service as secretary of Brotherhood work in Okla-

homa. He has contributed to many Brotherhood materials and has served on various planning and curriculum committees of the Brotherhood Commission. The work in our state has shown progress under Pennington's leadership: number of churches with Brotherhood work has grown from 220 in 1948 to 933 and membership from 7,736 to 19,396; RA work became a part of his department and has shown growth in all areas; a camp for RAs was secured and has been developed to \$200,000 evaluation and serving hundreds of boys; and the training program enlarged. Pennington has been a most effective and dedicated Brotherhood secretary and we pay tribute to his leadership and service.

Eugene E. Stockwell left the Brotherhood and evangelism department on May 1, 1968, to become pastor of First Church, Edmond, after serving as associate secretary, with major responsibility in Brotherhood work, since July 1, 1961. We are especially indebted to Stockwell for his promotion of work among the men and churches, his leadership of laymen's crusades on the west coast and in Nevada, and for training of leaders throughout the years.

Statistical Report

Preliminary reports indicate that in the churches we have 463 Baptist Men's units, 18 Baptist Young Men's units, and 936 Royal Ambassador chapters in 495 churches.

Oklahoma has been leading the Southern Baptist Convention during the last year in category 21, Brotherhood methods. There were four area training sessions held for associational and church Brotherhood officers and members with 296 attending, and the department also assisted with associational and church training events.

The state RA Congress met at OBU with 2,216 in attendance. Officers elected were Allen Locke, Oklahoma City, president; Eugene Sumrall, Del City, vice-president; and Steve Vaught, Norman, secretary.

The National RA Congress was the high light of the year, both from a program and attendance standpoint. The total attendance was 10,800, including 2,634 from Oklahoma. The Brotherhood Department is grateful to hundreds who served on promotional and local arrangement committees and helped to make the meeting a success.

Camp Hudgens Report

Boys and girls, six, seven and eight years of age, became a part of the Camp Hudgens program for the first time in 1968. A day camp for the McAlester area churches enrolled 55.

There were six weeks of RA resident camp with 788 campers and staff attending. More decisions were recorded than ever before totaling 177: 43 professions of faith, 92 rededications, and 42 for church-related vocations.

Facilities were winterized and made available for off season use this year. There were 27 BSU, youth, RA, Brotherhood, WMU, and family groups who took advantage of this. Improvement of facilities continue to be made. A new unit lodge consisting of bath facilities, storage room, unit leader's quarters, and meeting shelter was built at a cost of \$9,151. Road, sewer and water improvements for the unit lodge cost \$8,600. Two winterized cabins are under construction, being made possible by the state WMU mission offering.

Annuity Board

Important Date for all new members in Plan "A"

Plan "A" one of the three plans in the Southern Baptist Protection Program which went into effect on Jan. 1, 1968, has a provision which vitally affects all prospective members. Careful thought and consideration should be given to this provision which is called "Penalty of Delayed Participation."

This provision, commonly known as the "grace period," which becomes effective Jan. 1, 1969, is established in one of three ways:

(1) As of Jan. 1, 1969, if a minister was active in pastoral duties on Jan. 1, 1968; (2) on his 26th birthday, or (3) one year from the date he first becomes eligible; whichever is the latest date.

This simply means that, if a prospective member joins Plan "A" of the Protection Program later than the grace date, the disability, widow, child, education and dependent parent benefits will be reduced proportionally. The benefit reduction will be according to the ratio the years of delayed participation bear to the total number of years from the grace date to the normal retirement date. It is, therefore, very imporant for all persons who are contemplating joining the plan, and are now eligible, to do so before Jan. 1, 1969.

Response to the new program has been good. As of July 31, 1968, 1,956 persons joined some part of the Protection Program. The plans in the program are: Plan "A," the plan in which benefits were increased and new ones added; Plan "B," a supplemental retirement plan for ministers and the basic plan for other church and denominational employes with a fixed dollar benefit; and Plan "C," the supplemental retirement plan with variable benefits.

Christian Life Committee

The need is great in these times for Baptists to carry their Christianity out of the church buildings and into all areas of everyday life.

Many church members and leaders want to use their talents, imagination, and creativity in new ways to share their faith in Christ with their communities. Therefore, we urge churches and associations to organize Christian Life committees so that the talents of these dedicated people may be used to the fullest, and that churches may have a greater impact upon the communities and a more effective ministry.

Such a committee can be the unifying and guiding force to discover human needs, evaluate resources, inform constituents, plan and execute action, and help the people of God apply Christian principles in every area and relationship of life.

The committee's task should involve both a program of moral education and of Christian social action. It should strive to educate Baptists on the claims of Christ in their daily lives. It should also initiate, co-operate with efforts to lift the life of the community to the standards of God in Christ.

There are at least five areas which the committee should consider emphasizing: (1) family affairs; (2) race relations; (3) daily work; (4) moral issues, and (5) Christian citizenship.

What are some of the functions of a Christian Life Committee?

- (1) Conduct community projects. Carry out campaigns to rid newsstands of obscene reading materials, initiate educational programs in the public schools, to spread the truth about tobacco, narcotics and alcohol.
 - (2) Distribute appropriate material.

A. Display Christian Life literature.

B. Suggest materials to be used in encampments, retreats, study groups, Sunday school, Training Union, missionary programs, etc.

We urge churches and associations to order the Christian Life Committee Guidebook (free from the Executive Office) and work toward the creation of effective Christian Life Committees.

We commend the Sooner Alcohol Narcotics Education organization for their continuing efforts against the liquor traffic and urge all Baptists to support them in their efforts.

Oklahoma Baptist University Grady C. Cothen, President

The 1967-68 academic year at OBU was marked by increasing support from off the campus and increasing strengths on the campus.

In May, 1967 Oklahoma Baptists voted to embark in 1968 on a five-year Cooperative Program advance to expand their aid to OBU and BSU work. Even before the start of 1968, Baptists gave \$107,000 in 1967 advance funds to OBU. Through the first two quarters of 1968, \$90,000 in advance money had been allocated to the university, and indications are that the \$235,000 advance goal for 1968 will be reached.

With these funds and other advances in 1969-72, OBU should be able to compete in the increasingly costly higher education field.

Of widest significance was the receipt in the fall of 1967 of the largest gift in OBU history. Mrs. Louise M. Prichard's multi-million dollar trust was set up through the Baptist Foundation to provide ministerial and missionary scholarships at OBU. In 1967-68, 204 students received a total of \$73,750 in aid through this fund.

The Prichard scholarships were publicized widely, and are expected to attract to OBU increasing numbers of students preparing for religious vocations.

In the second year of the administration of Grady C. Cothen, the administrative staff was completed with the addition of Robert L. Cargill as director of development. Cargill, OBU alumnus and pastor of First Church, Hollis, was given the responsibility of building a long-range development program to undergird the institution in the years ahead.

With a new \$1,250,000 student center and completion of fine arts space in Raley Chapel as goals, fund campaigns were begun in early 1968. Citizens of Shawnee responded in the spring with \$350,000 in pledges, largest amount raised for any cause in the city. Current trustees pledged \$30,000, and a drive in Lawton netted over \$18,000 in pledges.

Other campaigns among alumni and friends are expected to make possible the breaking of ground for the student center in the spring

of 1969.

Academic progress was highlighted by the renewal of accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The college was commended for its faculty strengths and faculty loyalty to the institution, for student quality and performance, and for the sound growth in plant and equipment resources since initial accreditation in 1952.

Membership in Mortar Board, national senior women's honor society, was achieved by OBU's Zeta Chi chapter. OBU is only the fourth college in Oklahoma and the 128th in the nation to hold membership.

Faculty meetings in 1967-68 were devoted largely to the study of curriculum revision. In September, 1968 President Cothen appointed a new curriculum revision committee, with Professor Leroy Bond as chairman, to recommend an up-dated curriculum and calendar model for OBU. Emphasis will be placed on educating youth for meaningful roles in today's complex world and upon the essential Christian character of OBU.

In the Spring, a visit for accreditation purposes was made to the campus by a team from the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education; the self-study of the education program at the university was made prior to the visit. Accreditation by NCATE, if extended, will result in improved recognition for elementary and secondary school teaching certificates earned by OBU students. The university holds membership in the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, and is also accredited by the National League for Nursing and the National Association of Schools of Music. Programs leading to standard certificates in elementary and secondary education are approved by the Oklahoma State Department of Education.

The College of Liberal Arts offers majors in business, economics, English, French, German, Spanish, history, hospital administration, music, philosophy, physics, religion, biology, chemistry, education, government, home economics, journalism, nursing, physical education, psychology, sociology and speech. In addition pre-professional programs are offered in dentistry, law, medicine, pharmacy, engineering, medical technology, theology and public health.

The Warren M. Angell College of Fine Arts offers the following degrees: Bachelor of Music in vocal music, church music, instrumental music, and piano pedagogy; Bachelor of Music Education in vocal music, instrumental music, combined vocal and instrumental music.

The OBU faculty for 1968-69 consists of 115 faculty members, 33 of whom are part-time instructors, 79 are full-time in instruction or administration, and three are on leave of absence. Nineteen of the faculty and administration possess doctoral degrees in their teaching fields. New instructors have been added for 1968-69 in religion, music, nursing, physical education, English, sociology, biology, education, government, hospital administration and French.

The Department of Religion and Philosophy was strengthened with the addition of two doctorates in the fall of 1968. George R.

Wilson became professor of religious education, and Robert E. Clarke, professor of philosophy. William L. Horton became associate professor of music, C. Lee Brigham was named chairman of the Department of Physical Education and track coach, and Walter O. Mason, the university's first Negro faculty member, became associate professor of education and Upward Bound director. George A. Letchworth, assistant professor of psychology, earned his Ph.D. degree from the University of Oklahoma in the summer of 1968.

The Board of Trustees approved the creation of a new position, director of religious activities. The administration is searching for a qualified person to aid in counseling and coordination of religious life

on campus.

On-campus enrolment reached a record 1,462 for the fall semester of 1967, and 1,325 during the spring semester of 1968. The student body came from 46 states and 17 areas outside the continental United States; 62 Oklahoma counties were represented with the largest enrolments from Pottawatomie, Oklahoma and Tulsa counties. Every Baptist association in the state had students attending the university.

Preliminary fall, 1968 registration totals indicate the largest enrolment increase since post World War II days. Through Sept. 17, 1968, 1,644 had registered, with 11 more days before close of registration. This represented a dramatic 13 per cent increase over the previous year.

The large number of students caused the women's dormitories to be filled beyond normal capacity. Brotherhood Dormitory had more than 385 residents, largest number since capacity was doubled in 1958. During 1967-68 the completed Bel Air Apartment Complex for women was used to house 70 women. During the summer of 1968, major renovation of Brotherhood Dormitory was completed and a new heating system was installed in Shawnee Hall.

Despite soaring education costs, student fees at OBU continued to be lowest of any private college in Oklahoma.

Current fund income received during fiscal year 1968 was in excess of \$2,263,000, with tuition and fees amounting to \$799,000 of this total. Endowment earnings were \$131,000 and gifts to the university were \$588,000. The latter figure includes \$488,000 for operations from the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In addition, the convention allocated \$94,500 for building fund and \$52,750 for university endowment.

Approximately \$83,000 in university scholarships was granted to students, and over \$151,431.50 in outside scholarships from churches, corporations and individuals was issued to students.

Sadness gripped the campus in May upon the death of John Wesley Raley, whose 27-year tenure as president was the longest of any of OBU's 10 presidents. Under his leadership OBU grew from a four-building campus with a property evaluation of \$428,000 to a university with more than 20 buildings and a property evaluation of \$8,000,000. He led the way in establishing continuing annual financial

support by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for OBU, and during his tenure OBU received academic accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Services for Raley were held on May 21 in the chapel named for him.

In September, 1968 another distinguished former OBU president, J. B. Lawrence (1922-1926), died in Atlanta, Ga.

Public Relations Joe L. Ingram, Secretary

The Public Relations Department is constructively working at the job of telling the story of Baptist work in Oklahoma. Continuous activities of the department include providing newspapers, radio and television stations and wire services with comprehensive and objective information concerning all major convention meetings and speaking engagements of convention personnel. Each year the staff produces a number of feature stories focusing in greater depth on various facets of work related to the convention.

Upon request, the department assists churches and convention departments, institutions and agencies with the production of posters, brochures, program folders, direct mail pieces and layout design.

The Public Relations Department publishes "Falls Creek News" at the statewide summer assembly and helps participating churches get their own Falls Creek story in their local papers. The department also makes arrangements for Falls Creek services to be broadcast on several radio stations.

"Oklahoma Newsbreak" a year-round five-minute radio program of local and international religious news, is produced by the Public Relations Department and is now in its 230th week of broadcasting over 15 stations. Miss Joan Harvison, director of communications, produces "Newsbreak," while the Southern Baptist Radio and TV Commission, narrates, records, and mails the newscast, which is carried as a public service.

The Public Relations Department periodically sponsors a statewide public relations conference.

The present staff is composed of Joe L. Ingram, assistant executive secretary of the convention and Miss Joan Harvison, who serves as director of communications and assistant public relations secretary.

A statewide public relations workshop, sponsored by the convention, will be in Oklahoma City on May 19, 1969.

The public relations committee is composed of: Ralph Crawford, chairman, N. N. Antonson, C. Wade Freeman Jr., Robert Haskins, Alvin Hedin, Mrs. M. M. Littrell, Charles McBee, Everett Smalts.

Department of Missions

J. T. Roberts, Secretary

In the organizational structure of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Department of Missions has the responsibility of directing the mission program of the state convention. Within the department there are three general programs of service (associational missions, language missions, and work with National Baptists) and numerous specialized ministries.

Associational Missions

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is composed of 37 associations with a superintendent of missions directing the mission program of each association. Two new superintendents of missions have been called to their fields of service during this year—Luther Nelson, LeFlore, and Joe Ray Land, Pittsburg. It is the purpose of the Department of Missions to work with and assist the as-

sociations and their missionaries in projecting, promoting and executing an effective program of missions.

New Mission and New Church Sites

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is endeavoring to assist associations in the purchase of sites for new missions and churches. The Department of Missions has been given the responsibility of distributing these funds according to a formula adopted by the Board of Directors.

The following associations have received the indicated amounts since Sept. 1, 1967: Central—\$8,382.18; Craig-Mayes—\$1,215.53; Kay—\$517; Northeastern—\$729.30; Oklahoma County—\$10,562.75; Pottawatomie-Lincoln—\$933.33; Tulsa—\$2,677.53; and Union—\$4,181.64.

World Missions Conferences

(Schools of Missions)

In co-operation with the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, each association is entitled to a World Missions Conference every five years. The five-year schedule for Oklahoma is:

The five objectives suggested as special emphases during a world missions conference are: (1) stimulate soul winning; (2) encourage organization of local missions; (3) inspire concerted prayer for missions; (4) increase financial support of missions; and (5) secure life commitments to mission service.

State Pastors' Retreat

There were 223 registrations for the first state Pastors' Retreat, May 14-17, 1968. The 1969 retreat will be at Falls Creek Assembly May 13-16. The program personnel will be: James L. Sullivan, executive secretary-treasurer, Sunday School Board, SBC, preacher; Manuel L. Scott, pastor, Calvary Church, Los Angeles, Calif., teaching the Book of Jonah; and from Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, J. W. MacGorman, professor of New Testament, teaching the Epistle of James and Jack Gray, professor of missions, will lead in a study of "Missions in the Bible."

Student Summer Missions

The Home Mission Board employs college and seminary students to serve as summer missionaries in the various states and areas of

home mission work under the supervision of the state missions department and the local superintendents of missions. The purpose of student summer missions is to meet mission needs while providing an opportunity for students to discover their interest and aptitudes for mission service. Seventeen of these students served in our state during the summer of 1968.

Seminary Extension

The six Southern Baptist seminaries recognizing that many people who desire to attend seminary cannot do so, created the Seminary Extension Department to provide training for ministers and other Christian leaders in Bible study and other religious subjects.

The strategy is simple. Trained men can train others also. Local pastors who are seminary graduates teach courses using study guides prepared by Baptist seminary professors and other noted Christian

leaders.

Several of our associations are participating in this program of training.

Christian Social Ministries

The objective of the program of Christian social ministries is to work with and assist churches and associations to provide a Christian witness through special missions actions such as—mission centers, rescue mission homes and migrant ministries. We have two mission centers, in Tulsa and Oklahoma City and a rescue mission in Oklahoma City.

We began a part-time program of migrant work in March of this year by joining in the support of Carl Leeper who directs migrant work in Texas, Oklahoma, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Work With National Baptists

Our co-operative work in this phase of our mission program includes two education centers in Oklahoma City and Tulsa and a BSU on the campus of Langston University.

The state director works with the directors of the centers and the BSU, the WMU executive secretary and the executive secretarytreasurer and the other officers of the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention in planning, promoting and executing a joint work between

the two state conventions.

Language Missions Laddie Adams, Director

Training was the high light emphasis in language missions in 1968. Evangelism clinics were held in every Indian association, sponsored by the Baptist General Convention. A Vacation Bible School clinic was held in Cherokee Baptist Association with the assistance of the Department of Religious Education. The Home Mission Board invited all Indian pastors to attend Home Missions Week at Glorieta. Thirty-three Indian pastors from Oklahoma attended in addition to 20 missionaries from Oklahoma Indian fields.

J. R. Stogsdill has been appointed to serve as a General Missionary. Brother Stogsdill will serve as liaison between associations and local language congregations where the 33 appointed pastors serve.

Our ministry to the deaf continues to make good progress under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Gunn. We now have eight congregations engaged in providing a silent ministry.

The state Spanish Camp, in its sixth year, met at Southwest Baptist Assembly with close to 100 registered during the week. A good number of decisions for Christ were recorded.

Tribute to John Wesley Raley By Bruce G. Carter

John Wesley Raley is dead. His body lies in the soil near Oklahoma Baptist University, which he loved dearer than life itself. His spirit abides with the blessed, in the eternal presence of God.

John Wesley Raley was born in Rosebud, Texas, Aug. 15, 1902, the son of Margaret Frances Duncan Raley and Leonidas Washington Raley. The father of Dr. Raley was a Methodist, hence, the name John Wesley.

Dr. Raley received his A.B. degree from Baylor University, his Th.M. degree from Southwestern Seminary, and his Th.D. degree from Eastern Seminary. Honorary doctorate degrees were conferred on him by Oklahoma Baptist University and by his Alma Mater, Baylor University.

Dr. Raley served as a teacher in the public schools of Texas and New Mexico, before directing his life and his services to the ministry of the gospel.

On June 23, 1929, Dr. Raley married Helen Thames of Smithville, Texas. The Raleys have two children: John Wesley Jr., of Oklahoma City, and Mrs. James R. Nash of Waco, Texas. There are three grand-children.

After receiving his Doctor of Theology degree from Eastern Seminary in Philadelphia, Dr. Raley was selected as pastor of First Church, Bartlesville. As a young, dynamic, forceful leader of the great church in Bartlesville, he was soon called upon to deliver an address on Christian Education at the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Those who were present at that convention in November, 1933, will never forget his stirring message. A new champion had been found . . . a new, vibrant voice for Christian Education was speaking out in forceful terms. Although some time elapsed, it was soon evident that John Wesley Raley's convention address had automatically elected him to the presidency of Oklahoma Baptist University. He certainly must have been within the will of almighty God and under the direction of the Holy Spirit when he gave that great address. His insight into the problems and needs of Christian Education was uncanny. His was to be the voice, not only of Oklahoma Baptist University for 27 years, but during this time, one of the outstanding voices in the nation and the world for Christian Education.

On June 1, 1934, at the age of 31, John Wesley Raley became the President of Oklahoma Baptist University. Many of us know that Oklahoma Baptist University was burdened financially and held in low esteem at that time. It was given to Dr. Raley, during his 27 years (the longest term of any Southern Baptist College President) to take a small Baptist college with a property evaluation of less than half a million

dollars and, together with the Baptists of Oklahoma, to develop a great faculty and a great student body, and to build some 20 buildings with an evaluation of some \$8 million.

Dr. Raley was prophetic in that he saw the problems ahead as he accepted the responsibility of building a great university. On June 21, 1934, he wrote the following in a personal letter to Dr. George W. Truett:

"I believe wholeheartedly in the cause of Christian Education as a determining factor in the realization of the kingdom of God. It is to this cause and for this purpose that I gave my life."

In his Inaugural Address, delivered on Sept. 27, 1934, these meaningful, significant statements indicated his grasp of the challenge ahead and his determination in seeking an answer to the problems con-

fronting the university:

"God, in this task to which I put my hand, give faith to follow thee;
Courage to face the facts that are;
Wisdom to know right;
Love to be kind;
Strength to bear burdens;
Gentleness in decision;
Light clear and clean as sunlight.
God make this my altar,
Myself the sacrifice,
This task to which I put my hand."

There is, on Bison Hill, a great Christian college, recognized as such not only by Oklahoma Baptists but by all educators and school men throughout Oklahoma, the United States . . . and the world. We have a great Liberal Arts Christian College there, due to the dedicated work and tireless energy and service of John Wesley Raley. During the entire tenure of his service as president of the university, he spoke an average of at least once a day and traveled countless thousands of miles, each and every year, presenting the cause of Oklahoma Baptists and especially Oklahoma Baptist University.

With the death of Dr. Raley, Oklahoma Baptists have lost one of the greatest leaders they have ever had. During the 27 years that he served as President of Oklahoma Baptist University, his determination overcame obstacles; his spirit gave strength; his love bridged chasms; his insight gave guidance, and his vision provided objectivity.

With the death of John Wesley Raley, students have lost a great friend... the trained... the untrained... the churched... the unchurched... the Chinese... the Indian... the Negro... the Mexican... all were in the circle of his love and concern. Each church, each association, each institution was in the realm of his love and care.

Foreign Missions lost a great friend in the death of John Wesley Raley. He had a heart big enough to encompass the whole world . . . his love included all mankind.

It is significant that prior to his death, he spent countless hours helping to build a great hospital.

Dr. Raley was a great family man—he loved his family as few men do. His influence, his love, and his vision will continue to live, not only through Oklahoma Baptist University, but through the closeknit members of his family. He watched his own children, John and Helen, grow up on the OBU campus. Both, are OBU graduates. His wife, children, and grandchildren have inherited much of the love and strength which were great attributes of that dynamic leader.

Oklahoma Baptists have lost a great preacher. Throughout the length and breadth of this nation, John Wesley Raley has poured out his heart and soul, preaching the unsearchable riches of God. He preached in the small church as well as the large; he went on every occasion, night or day, and gave tirelessly of his energy and strength and inspiration.

Southern Baptists have lost a great leader in the death of John Wesley Raley. He was a southwide leader of great vision and unusual oratorical ability, a promoter and developer of the highest order. He was endowed with great intellectual ability, and a driving desire to accomplish. He served with distinction for a number of years on important committees of the Southern Baptist Convention.

John Wesley Raley is dead but the evidence of his endeavor lives on in the lives of thousands of students who have come closely in contact with him as he guided the destiny of a great university for more than a quarter of a century. His inspiration lives on in those who have come under his influence, his preaching, and his dedication. . his work will continue on to eternity.

As the great John Wesley Raley Chapel stands on the Oklahoma Baptist University campus, as an expression of our faith, pointing its inspirational spire to the sky, so stands the life of John Wesley Raley, the greatest Bison of them all.

So, like great Christians, John Wesley Raley is not dead in spirit, for his spirit abides in eternity; he is not dead in person, for his life, his dedication, and his influence have been imprinted in the hearts, the minds, and the souls of so many people that his leadership and his great deeds will carry until Jesus comes again.

John Wesley Raley traveled with God and was not, for God took him.

A tree is known by its fruit. The following expressions, from the mind and the heart of John Wesley Raley, delivered at various November addresses to the Baptist General Convention show the dreams, the visions, the purposes, and the ideals which made him the great leader that he was . . .

"The vitalizing force of Christian principles impregnating all education and cultural growth of the student citizen must be our objective if we expect to keep democracy alive for the next generation. It is axiomatic in history that, while Christianity can exist without freedom, freedom cannot exist without Christianity."—Nov. 1, 1951

"We represent a dynamic constituency of dedicated men and women who are sufficiently steeped in Christian ethics to believe that the Christian message can be and therefore must be passed across the earth, and who are optimistic enough to believe that it can and will save all mankind from the fears and despairs of a pain-studded world."—Nov. 13, 1952

"It is a cliche that youth is intolerant—and so it is. It is intolerant of sham and hypocrisy; it is intolerant of delay; it is intolerant of failure; it is intolerant of inaction. Youth is so explosive a thing that it must be carefully and skillfully guided to maturity." . . . "A nation is strong only as its youth is strong; it survives only as its youth survives. It conquers or is conquered in and by its youth." . . . "The conquest of tomorrow's American will be the conquest of today's youth. Oklahoma Baptist University campus is the parade ground for the conquering army of the future."—Nov. 12, 1953

"Education is power. Intellectuality is strength. Leadership inheres in the man who knows, who knows why he knows, and who knows to what end his knowledge is to be used."—Nov. 11, 1954

"This country is not founded on natural resources or industry, commerce or technology; but on ideas and ideals, and on the character and high purposes of its people."—Nov. 10, 1955

"The Christian college has a responsibility to produce men who can lead and inspire men. The genius of our being is concern for our fellow man. The tradition of our teaching is in the humanities. We sharpen curiosity about our fellow man's being. We inspire and instill a love of service. We major on moral strength in character."—Nov. 15, 1956

"We shall build this chapel as an expression of our faith in those intangible, eternal things and in the dynamic vitality of the cultural and Christian forces of life. It shall become the microcosm of our faith expressed in beautiful architecture. The strength of our faith, the poetry of our hearts, and the music of our soul will become a part of the steel and stone of this tower, and from its chimes our youth shall hear the very songs of God's summoning them to preparation and achievement."—Nov. 13, 1957

"Without this Christian force, applied with intelligence and enthusiasm, we will find ourselves living in a civilization based on the mechanics of living without morals, knowhow without conscience, statistics of production without standards, fragmentary specialties without an integrating philosophy, and world concepts without world concerns."—Nov. 13, 1958

"There must never be a divorce of intellectual awakening and spiritual awareness—for they are complementary, not contradictory forces in life."—Nov. 12, 1959

"If survival only is all that we have to offer the future, then we have too little and we are already too late. Our presence in history demands more. We must reverse the trend."—Nov. 17, 1960

A mighty oak has fallen . . . there is a lonesome place in the sky.

92. Richard Peterson presented the report of the Resolutions Committee.

"The Committee on Resolutions considered all the resolutions that were presented to it. Some of the resolutions were a matter of convention policy, and therefore not the function of this committee. We respectfully request that resolutions of this matter be referred to the convention Board of Directors.

1. Whereas there is a continuous need for vigilance concerning the destructive and morally-corrupting influence of beverage alcohol and; whereas there are powerful forces that work daily to change or liberalize the present liquor control laws, to permit the sale of liquor by the drink.

Therefore be it resolved:

That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma declare its opposition to the change in the liquor laws that would permit liquor by the drink; and

That we commend SANE, the organization known as the Sooner Alcohol and Narcotics Education, Inc., and its director, Ross J. Mc-Lennan for its leadership against this morally-corrupting influence in our state; and for its vigilance and work in combating the efforts to legalize gambling and the illicit use of narcotics; and

That we urge our churches to lend spiritual and financial support to this organization and its educational program in combating these social issues.

2. Whereas our nation is faced with the war in Vietnam, violence in our streets, disrespect for law and order, tension among the races, and division in our nation on the solutions to these problems, and

Whereas the nation is in the process of transition of government from one administration to another; and

Whereas the Scriptures teach that Christians are to pray for magistrates and all in authority; therefore, be it resolved: that we call upon all of God's people to pray earnestly for our President and President-elect for guidance and wisdom in these crisis times; and

That we commend the law enforcement officers for the good work they do in maintaining peace and order in the face of criticism, and vile and abusive treatment.

That we urge our parole authorities to exercise care and caution in releasing or pardoning unrepentant and unrehabilitated criminals to prey on society.

3. Therefore be it further resolved:

That our convention approve the statement on the crisis of our nation adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention; and

That we call upon the churches, institutions, and agencies in Oklahoma to intensify the priority of evangelism in the Crusade of the Americas and to be alert to the opportunities of Christian action to meet the needs of mankind.

4. Whereas it has been several years since we adopted the statement of principles of our position on the separation of church and state; and

Whereas in the passing of time many may not be familiar with the action of the 1962 Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Therefore be it resolved that we reaffirm and reprint in the 1968 Convention Annual the statement of principles passed by the 1962 Convention.

II. A Statement of Principle

1. Your committee recommends that the Baptist General Convention affirm the article of faith on religious liberty adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in annual session in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1925 as a statement of our beliefs as follows:

"God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The Gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends.

"The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power."

- 2. Your committee recommends that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma affirm its support of Article II, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of Oklahoma, which is as follows: "No public money or property shall ever be appropriated, applied, donated, or used, directly or indirectly, for the use, benefit, or support of any sect, church, denomination, or system of religion, or for the use, benefit, or support of any priest, preacher, minister, or other religious teacher, or dignitary, or sectarian institution as such."
- 3. Your committee recommends that the Baptist General Convention express its thanks to God and to our founding fathers for the first amendment to our national constitution as herein stated: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."
- 4. Your committee recommends that we reaffirm the following action taken by the 1952 Convention:
 "Neither the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, nor any institution or agency of this convention, shall accept directly or indirectly any gifts, grants, or aid from Federal, State, County, City, or any

other governmental agency. Neither shall any lease or purchase of government owned property be made, except by payment of a reasonable value, either in cash, exchange of property or in service rendered."

III. A Practical Application of These Principles and Laws to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Your committee recognizes and acknowledges that the areas involved are manifold and complex. It also wishes to report that some of the broader areas, such as tax-exemption for religious institutions and properties, are under study by both government and religious groups, and that within the forseeable future this and other issues about which we are making no recommendation at this time may need to be considered by our Convention. It is also recognized by your committee that new areas of involvement may arise to which these principles will need to be applied from time to time.

- 1. It is recommended that no department, agency, or institution of the convention accept free services from governmental agencies such as grading of roads, etc.
- 2. Oklahoma Baptist University has borrowed federal funds for the construction of two dormitories and federal funds have also been borrowed to assist in furnishing and equipping the Baptist Memorial Hospital and for the construction of a nurses' dormitory in Oklahoma City.

The sub-committee on relations between government and various agencies, departments, and institutions of Oklahoma Baptists has substantiated the fact that these institutions have paid the same rate of interest which the government has paid, plus one-fourth of one per cent for servicing the loans. A paragraph from a letter written March 22, 1962, by Sidney H. Woolner, Commissioner of the Community Facilities Administration of Housing and Home Finance Agency, sheds light upon this question:

"The Government does not assume any charges relative to closing the loan. They are direct Government loans and bear interest at a statutory rate which is determined to be the average interest cost to the Federal Government of the obligations comprising the national debt, plus one-quarter of one per cent. It is anticipated that this one-quarter of one per cent differential will pay for the cost of administering the program and that it will operate without eventual cost to the Federal Government."

Your committee is of the opinion that these loans from the Federal Government do not constitute a subsidy. These loans differ from other business arrangements in only two respects, neither of which changes the loans from business transactions into federal aid:

- 1. The government lends the money instead of a bank.
- 2. The government does not make any money on these loans but neither does it lose. It collects from the institution whatever interest is necessary to service the loans and insure the government against any loss.

It can be stated in the following manner: A loan from a private lending agency must be repaid on the basis of principal, plus cost, plus profit; the government loan is repaid principal, plus cost, but no profit. Both transactions, when completed are terminated. In this manner, the government provides assistance for the construction of dormitories and hospital facilities at no cost to the government and at a reduced cost to these institutions. Upon the full payment of the loan and interest all obligation is terminated. In view of the above facts, your committee makes the following recommendation:

Although the survey of your committee reveals that there is no legal or technical violation in the borrowing of federal funds, it is the recommendation of this committee that the Baptist General Convention or any of its agencies or institutions borrow funds from private sources whenever the terms are comparable.

3. Since 1951, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has leased several hospitals from cities and counties which were in part constructed with government funds. Questions have arisen concerning the wisdom of such lease relationships.

Your committee agrees that the hospital ministry of Oklahoma Baptists should be continued, but in order that the constituency of our convention might move forward together in this vital ministry, we make the following recommendations:

- (1) That we honor our present lease contracts, it being understood that none of these is to be renewed;
- (2) That the convention confine its future operation of hospitals to those which it owns, or such institutions it may lease that do not have tax money involved;
- (3) That in the event any tax-built or government-owned hospital, or any other institution, be purchased by the convention that an adequate and fairly appraised price be paid for the same.
 - 5. Therefore be it resolved;

That we express our gratitude to Warren C. Hultgren and First Church, Tulsa, for the use of their beautiful building and for their genuine hospitality during the convention.

That we express our appreciation to the news staff of the Tulsa World, Tulsa Tribune, Daily Oklahoman, Oklahoma City Times, the radio and television stations and all other news media for their coverage of the convention sessions.

That we commend T. Hollis Epton for his diligent service and faithful leadership this past year and we express our gratitude to First Church, Duncan, for sharing its pastor so that he might render service across the state.

That we also express gratitude to all the convention officers and to the program committee for their outstanding work this year.

Be it further resolved, that we express our appreciation to the agencies of our convention for their tremendous contribution they make to the life of our churches.

That we express appreciation to T. B. Lackey for his untiring leadership in all areas designed to strengthen our churches and to extend their witness.

Church Building and Church Fund Raising E. W. Westmoreland

Beginning Jan. 1, 1966, I was requested by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to continue my work with the convention on a retired part-time basis. My work was to be focused in two directions: first, as church building consultant to help churches plan buildings. Second, as a church fund-raising consultant.

During the last year, I have worked with 103 Oklahoma Baptist churches in helping plan their buildings. The Architectural Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board has worked with many more Oklahoma churches through direct correspondence.

I have supplied the pulpit of 33 churches on Sunday; have spoken at four district stewardship conferences; on Tues., April 10, conducted a church building conference in Oklahoma City, assisted by Ellis B. Evans, church building consultant, and James Coile, architect, both of Nashville. We visited churches the day before and the day following this conference.

Then on Tues., Sept. 10, Evans and I had another building conference in Tulsa, assisted by Gene Carter, a specialist in sanctuary design and decoration. Evans and I visited churches in the area the day preceding and the day following this conference. Evans and I also had a church building conference at the pastors' retreat at Falls Creek on May 14-17.

I spoke at the state Sunday School Convention and have had several out-of-state engagements; two weeks at Glorieta where I conducted the Sunday school superintendents' conference; four days with First Church, Lubbock, Texas; four days with First Church, El Paso, Texas; one week in Ontario, Canada; a brief engagement in California and another in South Carolina. I also spoke at the annual meeting of the Texas superintendents of missions at Mineral Wells.

We will continue our work as church building consultant, but in 1969 we will focus particularly on church fund raising.

In the year 1967, according to figures released by Martin Bradley of the Department of Survey and Statistics of the Sunday School

Board, Southern Baptists expended \$155,000,000 for new church buildings and \$6,500,000 for local church missions. Most of this money was borrowed and in many cases it was 100 per cent borrowed money. It might be noted that this \$155,000,000 was approximately \$35,000,000 more than the \$120,000,000 which was given by all Southern Baptist churches in the same year for all mission causes including local, state, Southern Baptist and worldwide.

The Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has felt for many years that they had an obligation to the churches to assist them in raising funds for church buildings. After many years of study and planning they have developed a church fund-raising service. In co-operation with state conventions they plan to enlist and train qualified volunteers who will provide assistance to churches desiring to secure funds for special building purposes. They will conduct seminars for church personnel desiring to lead self-directed fund-raising campaigns.

During 1969, I plan to give as much time as possible in working with the Stewardship Commission and our convention in promoting church fund raising for church buildings in Oklahoma. It will be my purpose to meet with church fund-raising committees to interpret the plan which has been developed by James Lackey, which can be used by a church fund-raising consultant furnished by our department or the Stewardship Commission, or to meet with committees to explain the plan in detail for the church which desires to have a self-directed fund-raising campaign, conducted either by the pastor or someone in the church, selected by the church, as campaign director.

The Stewardship Commission, under the direction of James Lackey, and in co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, will promote a Church Fund-Raising Seminar on Feb. 6-7, 1969 at the Downtown Holiday Inn, Oklahoma City. This seminar will be limited to 40 people and a charge of \$25 will be made for each person registering. The \$25 fee will cover the motel room and meals and pay for printed materials used in the seminary. Write E. W. Westmoreland for information and reservations.

The convention's Board of Directors is the Governing Board for these hospitals and golden age home. Since it is impractical for this board to meet regularly in each institution, local Baptists are elected to serve as the Governing Board's Committees. The board is represented by one or more of its members on each committee. The executive secretary-treasurer or his representative and each hospital's administrator serve as ex-officio members.

Annuity Made Available to National Baptists

The following report brought by the Annuity Committee was approved: That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma enter into an agreement with the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention relative to the participation of National Baptists in the annuity program. At their state convention, recently, the National Baptists voted to adopt this program. The financial agreement is that their local churches pay 10 per cent of the salary basis and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention (National) will pay four per cent of the salary basis. And that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma pay one per cent of the salary basis. This is done in order to meet the Annuity Board charter limitations as they may offer the annuity program only to Southern Baptist churches, boards or agencies. Thus National Baptists in Oklahoma who desire may participate through the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Increased Annuity for State Workers

The board also approved increased annuity for state workers in keeping with the Annuity Board's recommendation that churches, boards and agencies pay 10 per cent of the total salary into the Southern Baptist Protection Program. The Board of Directors voted Nov. 29, 1966 to pay 10 per cent of the total salary for women employees and maintenance personnel. This action included all other men employed by the Baptist General Convention. The additional expense was absorbed in the 1968 department budgets.

Falls Creek Rules Regarding Attire

Revision was made in the rules regarding attire at Falls Creek

Baptist Assembly. The new rules read as follows:

"Since Falls Creek Baptist Assembly is a Christian camp, it affords an opportunity to lift the standard of living for Baptist young people by observing the New Testament principle of modesty in dress. 1 Timothy 2:9 '... that women adorn themselves in modest apparel.' This principle applies to both sexes.

"All wearing apparel should at least reach the vicinity of the knees. At times other than recreational periods girls should wear dresses and boys should wear full length apparel. Shorts of bermuda length or similar apparel may be worn during recreational periods only.

"Capes, robes or other full length apparel must be worn over

bathing suits in going to and from the swimming pool.

"We strongly urge parents and church leaders to see that their young people do not take clothing to Falls Creek that violates the policies and regulations of the assembly. Sponsors, camp directors and pastors of the church groups are requested to see that members of their groups obey these and other rules and regulations of the assembly.

"These rules will apply to all groups using Falls Creek facilities

throughout the year."

Elevator to Be Installed

When the Baptist office building was constructed in 1950, only one of the two elevators was installed. The board approved a recommendation that the Building Committee be empowered to proceed with this work. It is on order and should be installed in 1969.

Camp Hudgens Enlarged

The board approved recommendations to purchase 26 acres of land adjacent to Camp Hudgens and to construct additional buildings. Details are given in the report of the Building Committee.

Enid Hospital Expansion

Upon joint recommendations from the Governing Board of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, sub-committee of the Convention's Building Committee and the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee of the board the following were approved:

- 1. That the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Governing Board be authorized to secure a long-term loan, not to exceed \$1,200,000 from commercial sources.
- 2. That the administration and the Governing Board negotiate a short-term loan, not to exceed \$500,000 to be liquidated as campaign pledges are paid.
- 3. That the Governing Board and Building Committees be authorized to enter into contracts in line with the financial plan stated above, and that officials of the Governing Board and convention be authorized to sign necessary documents for contracts and loans.

Boys Ranch Town to Construct Administration Building

The administration of the Department of Child Care in co-operation with the Convention's Building Committee was given approval for construction of an administration building at Boys Ranch Town. Details of the report are given in the Building Committee's report.

Time Extended for Purchase of Farm Property

An extension of time was given to W. P. Atkinson Enterprises, Inc. and Travco Developers, Inc., in what is called the "Second Supplement to Contract for Sale and Agreement for Options," which extended the date for purchase of the first tract of land to Jan. 2, 1969, and increased the earnest money by \$6,000 to a total of \$16,000, and the president and recording secretary of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma were granted authority to sign the second supplement.

Brotherhood Department

Approval was given to the recommendation that a Brotherhood Department be established separate from the Department of Evangelism, and that Bob Banks, Royal Ambassador secretary, be elected Brotherhood secretary effective June 1, 1968. Henry Chennault, assistant in Department of Missions was transferred Sept. 1, 1968 as assistant Brotherhood secretary.

BSU Department

Creation of a Baptist Student Union Department was approved and Clyde Clayton was elected secretary effective June 1, 1968. BSU has been a part of the Department of Religious Education and Mr. Clayton served as assistant in charge of student work.

Land Adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital Leased

The board authorized a committee to lease land adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital as is set forth in the following resolution:

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting by and through its duly elected Board of Directors, as follows:

- 1. The trust created by virtue of the aforesaid Warranty Deed with Trust Provisions, dated July 6, 1959, recorded in Book 2384, page 78 of the records of Oklahoma County, Oklahoma, be and it is hereby revoked in its entirety; and pursuant to such revocation, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, as Trustee, is hereby directed to reconvey to the convention all of the aforesaid real estate, together with all improvements thereon, subject to the lease hold estate covering a portion of said real estate, granted to Voyager Inn, Inc., an Oklahoma corporation, as aforesaid.
- 2. The president or vice-president, and recording secretary or assistant recording secretary, of the convention are hereby authorized and directed to grant leasehold estates of all or any portion of the real estate adjacent to Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City, lying East of Independence Avenue and South of Northwest Highway, which is the entire tract included in the plat designated as "The Golden Age Home," Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, according to the recorded plat thereof. Said leasehold estates shall be granted to third parties for business or other uses, for terms of years not to exceed a total of 55 years, covering any particular portion of said real estate, upon such terms, and for such rentals as may be determined upon the recommendation and with the approval of the Committee which is hereby created and appointed for such purpose. Said Committee is hereby designated as the Convention Oklahoma City Hospital Development Committee, and is authorized to make expenditures and to take such other actions as it may deem necessary and advisable in order to develop the land for leasing purposes; and the membership of the committee shall consist of the persons filling the following offices from time to time; namely:
- (a) the chairman of the Governing Board of said Baptist Memorial Hospital, and the chairman of the said Governing Board's Planning Committee, (presently being filled by Robert C. Howard and R. A. Young, respectively);
- (b) the Oklahoma City members of the Board of Directors of the Convention (presently being filled by Ralph Crawford, J. P. Dane, T. T. Crabtree, R. P. Thompson, Robert B. Haskins, and J. C. Segler).
- (c) the president and executive secretary-treasurer of the Convention.

The committee chairman shall be the president of the convention and the vice-chairman shall be the chairman of the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital. Committee actions shall be by majority vote of members present, with six members constituting a quorum.

- 3. The aforesaid officers of the convention are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such lease agreements, and other legal documents, and to do any and all other acts that may be necessary and proper to carry out the terms and intent of this resolution.
- 4. Until authorized and directed to the contrary, the convention is hereby authorized and directed to pay annually, or at frequent in-

tervals, to the Baptist Memorial Hospital of Oklahoma City, to meet its current needs and expenses, all net earnings and income received by the convention by virtue of leasehold estates granted by the convention pursuant to this resolution.

The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma entered into a lease agreement with C. A. Henderson, John Michael Henderson and Charles Travis Henderson on July 11, 1968. The lease covers 13.5 acres of land east of Baptist Memorial Hospital. The lease agreement contains 18 legal size papers, but some of the pertinent facts are:

Payment of Rentals. A. Guaranteed Minimum Rental. The Lessee covenants and agrees to pay to the Lessor, as a guaranteed minimum rental for said premises during said demised term of fifty (50) years, the sum of ONE MILLION SIX HUNDRED SEVENTY TWO THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED FIFTY SIX AND 14/100 DOLLARS (\$1,672,356.14), (subject to the modifications provided in 2G hereof under certain circumstances) and in addition thereto, the percentage of gross receipts provided herein, said guaranteed minimum rental to be payable as follows:

- (i) The sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Thirty One and 63/100 Dollars (\$1,231.63) per month, representing rental for Parcel No. 1, beginning on Dec. 1, 1968, and payable on or before the first day of each month thereafter, until construction begins on Parcel No. 2 or until Sept. 30, 1970, whichever date is sooner, at which time the guaranteed minimum rental shall be increased by the payment of,
- (ii) the additional sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Thirty One and 63/100 Dollars (\$1,231.63), representing rental for Parcel No. 2, for a total payment under (i) and (ii) in the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Sixty Three and 26/100 Dollars (\$2,463.26) per month, beginning on Oct. 1, 1970, or on the first day of the month during which construction begins on Parcel No. 2, whichever date is sooner, and payable on or before the first day of each month thereafter until Nov. 30, 1993; and, thereafter, the total minimum guaranteed rental shall be,
- (iii) the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred One and 58/100 Dollars (\$3,201.58) per month beginning Dec. 1, 1993 to and including Nov. 30, 2018.
- B. Additional Percentage Rental. In addition to the guaranteed minimum rental, Lessee agrees to pay to Lessor monthly an amount equal to 2½ per cent of all gross receipts from Lessee's apartment operations on the premises, to and including Nov. 30, 1993, and, thereafter said monthly payments shall be increased to 3½ per cent of all such gross receipts beginning on Dec. 1, 1993, and continuing monthly thereafter to Nov. 30, 2018.
- C. Additional Percentage Rentals for Commercial Uses. If any parts of said premises are used by Lessee for commercial purposes, Lessee agrees to pay to Lessor a percentage of the gross receipts therefrom to be determined so that Lessor will be paid approximately 25 per cent thereof and Lessee will retain approximately 75 per cent there-

of, it being the intent of the parties that the rentals to be charged by Lessee for such commercial purposes shall be equal to the going rate for similar commercial facilities.

Lessee represents and covenants as follows:

- (i) Lessee will commence construction and will complete the construction contemplated in the lease with due diligence. Lessee estimates that the construction on each phase will require approximately one year, and estimates that construction will commence on Parcel No. 1 by Oct. 1, 1968, and on Parcel No. 2 by Jan. 1, 1970.
- (ii) The improvements are to be constructed in two phases, one phase on each of the two parcels referred to in this lease. Lessee estimates that each phase, when completed, will produce an estimated annual gross revenue of approximately \$402,000.

(iii) The improvements to be constructed will be luxury and semiluxury apartments of high quality construction, and approximately

150 to 200 units will be constructed in each phase.

- (iv) Lessee may construct and operate commercial storeroom buildings on not to exceed two acres of the total land leased hereunder, in conformity with Lessor's over-all general development plan for the area including said leased land.
- (v) The location, type and quality of the apartments to be constructed will conform with the over-all plans of Lessor for the development of its adjoining land; and all improvements shall be planned and built in accordance with plans and specifications to be approved, in writing, by the Lessor.

Lessee to Pay All Taxes and Assessments

A. As a material consideration for the leasing, demising and renting of said premises, the Lessee further agrees, promises, and covenants to bear and pay, in addition to the above rentals so provided for, when due and before the same become delinquent, all taxes, assessments, and levies, general and special, ordinary and extraordinary, of every name, nature, and kind whatsoever, including all utility charges, which may be levied and assessed against said premises and the improvements thereon including all real and personal property of every kind, during the entire term of this lease.

LESSEE FURTHER AGREES that it shall not use or permit use of any part of said premises in violation of any federal or state law or municipal ordinance; nor shall Lessee use or permit use of any part of said premises as a saloon or gambling establishment, nor shall Lessee permit the sale or dispensing of any type of beer or other alcoholic beverages of any kind, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the leased premises or in any improvement, any portion of which is situated on said premises. It is understood, however, that Lessee is not bound to control the tenants in their personal use of alcoholic beverages and such use and consumption by tenants will not be a violation of this lease.

Improvements and Personal Property Become Lessor's Property upon termination of Lease. At the expiration of this lease, or the sooner termination thereof, all buildings, improvements, fixtures, fur-

nishings and all tangible personal property of whatever nature or description belonging to or owned by Lessee on said premises shall be surrendered to the Lessor in good order, condition, and state of repair, the usual wear and tear excepted, free and clear of all mortgages, liens, claims, and encumbrances of every kind and nature, and Lessee agrees to execute and deliver to Lessor such assignments, conveyances, grants, bills of sale, or acquittances thereto as may be necessary to vest in Lessor all of Lessee's right, title, and interest therein.

Lessee agrees and warrants that all improvements constructed on said premises will conform to the over-all land usage planned for the area by Lessor.

Lackey Appointed As Convention Agent :

The board was polled by mail to adopt the following resolution: "RESOLVED, that the Corporation appoint T. B. Lackey, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, as its registered agent, and 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, as its registered office, and that a Statement of Change of Registered Office and Agent to this effect be filed with the Secretary of the State of Oklahoma on July 24, 1968." Fory-five affirmative votes were received to adopt the resolution.

1969 Stewardship and Cooperative Program Promotion

In 1962, Oklahoma Baptists adopted a three-point 12-year program of stewardship and mission advance. The program challenged (1) the churches to increase their income by at least five per cent each year, and also (2) to increase their Cooperative Program percentage a minimum of one per cent each year. (3) The third point called for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to increase its percentage giving to Southern Baptist Convention by one per cent each year, or to increase the percentage to Southern Baptist Convention by the average percentage of increase (over the preceding year) in undesignated budget receipts contributed by the churches through Cooperative Program.

This program has been successful in that since its inception, churches have increased their total giving by almost \$5,000,000 and Cooperative Program gifts by more than \$700,000. In addition, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma increased its Southern Baptist Convention percentage from 40 per cent to 43 per cent. However, due to the unprecedented needs of OBU and BSU work, these plans were altered by the special meeting of the convention of May 19, 1967. The following are five of the eight points adopted:

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1968 be \$3,500,000 including a basic budget of \$3,186,402 to be divided 57 per cent State and 43 per cent Southern Baptist Convention. All received over the basic budget will be divided between Oklahoma Baptist University and Baptist Student Union work on the basis of 75 per cent to Oklahoma Baptist University and 25 per cent to Baptist Student Union work.

2. That 1968 budget allocations for state work be held to an increase of \$35,000 over 1967 allocations (the average increase to these departments over the past five years).

3. That this plan or a similar plan be considered each year

through 1972.

4. That the churches be challenged to increase their Cooperative Program objectives from one to three per cent of the total church budget over the 1967 percentage. (This would produce a 10 to 30 per cent increase in Cooperative Program dollars over 1967.)

5. That all 1967 Cooperative Program receipts over \$3,125,000 be distributed 75 per cent Oklahoma Baptist University-25 per cent

Baptist Student Union.

Oklahoma Baptists rallied to the cause and gave \$143,000 more than the 1967 budget called for, thereby giving OBU an additional \$107,371.75 and BSU \$35,790.58.

Dear Mr. Christiansen:

The results of our examination of the Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the year ended Dec. 31, 1967 again indicates the fine efficient job being done by the Executive Office for Oklahoma Baptists.

Cooperative Program receipts for 1967 exceeded the goals by some \$143,000, reflecting Baptists' confidence in the convention, and providing substantial supplementary income for OBU and BSU work.


Attached charts show the continued growth of Cooperative Program and Other Receipts over the past eight years, using 1960 receipts as the base (or 100 per cent) point.


Another chart shows the relative increase in administrative costs over the same period. These costs have not risen in proportion to the receipts being handled. In fact, the over-all administrative cost of handling funds received in 1967 was only slightly over three cents per dollar. This figure is substantially less than the average cost of handling contributions, and is the lowest per dollar cost of the eight-year period.



Baptist Laymen's Corporation

Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a nonprofit organization, was incorporated under the laws of the state of Oklahoma on Feb. 12, 1960. The general purpose of the Corporation, composed of 30 Baptist laymen, representing 16 churches in the Oklahoma County area, is to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry

on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scienctific work, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws of the Baptist Laymen's Corporation provided for convention approval of its Board of Directors.

The first project undertaken by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation was financing, constructing and leasing the Doctor's Medical Building near Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City. Ground-breaking was held on Aug. 28, 1960 and the building was completely occupied in June, 1963.

The Trust Agreement by which the Baptist Laymen's Corporation held the land on which the Doctor's Medical Building was located was revoked by mutual agreement by the convention's Board of Directors on Oct. 23, 1963. At this time, the land and building were conveyed to the Baptist General Convention along with the assets and liabilities of Baptist Laymen's Corporation arising from the construction of the building.

In September, 1963, following a request from the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention, Baptist Laymen's Corporation agreed to assume the responsibility of financing, constructing and operation of the Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes at Northwest Highway and Council Road on land given to the convention for this purpose. The 35-acre tract of land was deeded to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation in accordance with the same terms and conditions set forth in the resolution regarding the Doctor's Medical Building.

This project was financed by the sale of first mortgage real estate bonds and was completed and ready for open house as a part of the program at the Baptist General Convention's annual meeting on Nov. 10, 1965.

The major project of the Corporation this year was construction of and opening of a new 44-bed addition of Lackey Manor. The new wing was dedicated Aug. 11, 1968. Approximately 300 people were in attendance for the dedication and open house. Construction and furnishings cost about \$215,000. The majority of the financing was handled through the sale of bonds. Capacity of the manor now is 109, and 20 apartments and three homes are occupied. This is one of the best homes for older people to be found any place.

The Baptist Laymen's Corporation has secured James L. Henry and his associates at Baptist Memorial Hospital to operate the Golden Age Homes.

An audit is published in the convention annual.



The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma represents only one of the segments of the operations of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. As stated in Note 4 of notes to the financial statements, this report does not include assets, liabilities, fund balances, receipts or disbursements of: (1) Hugo and Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes; (2) ten hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or lessee; and the following affiliated or associated organizations operating as separate corporations; (3) The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; (4) Oklahoma Baptist University; (5) Faculty Building Association; (6) Baptist Laymen's Corporation and (7) Baptist Building Federal Credit Union.

In our opinion, with the explanation stated in the preceding paragraph, the accompanying balance sheets and statements of fund balances present fairly the assets and liabilities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1968, arising from cash transactions and the changes in fund balances during the year then ended, in conformity with accounting practices generally followed by nonprofit organizations applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Furthermore "It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

2. Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Expansion

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole, as explained in the accountants' opinion.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS

Organization and Major Activities—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years. Amended Articles of Incorporation filed in March, 1928 and May, 1961, provide for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Major activities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are described below:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the Cooperative Program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and periodically transmitting portions allocated to Southern Baptist Convention, various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, Oklahoma, The Bapist Foundation of Oklahoma and other designated donees.

The Baptist Messenger—Printing and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

Department of Child Care—Operation management of "The Baptist Childrens Home" and "Boys Ranch Town," construction of buildings and maintenance of buildings and grounds.

Falls Creek Assembly—Providing vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of assembly properties.

Department of Religious Education—Providing for advancement and enlargement of education activities in churches of the state.

Baptist Student Union Department—Coordinating Baptist work in student union centers at various educational institutions.

Woman's Missionary Union—Promotion of Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Building Program—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, ceased operating as a general hospital on September 15, 1962, at the request of the administration and governing board of the hospital.

Under the authority of the Board of Directors of the Convention, a lease contract was made with the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 20, Muskogee County, on December 17, 1964, providing for rental payments of \$4,000.00 annually for the use of the real estate and personal property of Oklahoma Baptist Hospital. The lease is renewable annually at the option of the lessee. The contract also provides that, when the rental payments total \$40,000.00, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall convey title to the leased real estate and personal property to the lessee.

Prepaid Expense (Parking Lot)—On March 16, 1956, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000.00, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760.00. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1968 the unamortized balance amounted to \$34,613.00.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation—On June 10, 1964, land was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The value of this land was reduced to \$1.00 as shown in this report.

We have examined the fund balance sheets of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 1968, and the related statement of fund balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

On January 1, 1964, the foundation adjusted the book value of securities held to market value. The net effect of this adjustment was to increase the book value of securities and the corresponding fund balances by \$92,147.75. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, have been recorded at cost or appraised value at acquisition date.

No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties

or depletion of mineral properties.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the items noted in the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying fund balance sheets and statement of fund balances present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1968, and the results of its transactions for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting practices generally followed by nonprofit organizations applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. Investments

1. Investments

Securities acquired prior to January 1, 1964, are included herein at market value as of that date. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, are shown at cost or at an appraised value at acquisition date.

At December 31, 1968, the market value of securities with an available market value was \$402,892.54 greater than book value:

Investment pool securities

Other trust and endowment funds

7,456.77

The investment pool was revised as of January 1, 1964, to provide for periodic revaluation of securities held. These periodic revaluations are for statistical purposes and are used to determine a unit valuation for distribution of income.

2. Investment in Limited Partnership

In March 1968, the foundation received several lots of real estate in Rogers County as a contribution. Shortly thereafter, this land was deeded to the Orchard Hill Company, a partnership formed by and between the original donors of the land and the foundation for the purpose of land development. The foundation does not participate in the management of the business but shares in the profits and losses of the operations; provided, however, that the foundation's participation in the losses is limited to its investment in the partnership. the partnership.

3. Fund Balances

Other trust and endowment fund balances of \$7,944,203.36 (Exhibit A) include annuity and individual trust balances as follows:

Annuities arose from gifts made to the foundation in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor.

A revolving fund has been established within the operating fund of the foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds and making periodic payments to annuitants. The revolving fund is also used to pay estate expenses prior to the closing of the estate, at which time the foundation becomes the beneficiary of part or all of the estate's assets, and such expenses are reimbursed.

At December 31, 1968, the balance of the revolving fund was \$7,583.33.

In addition to the annuities mentioned above, certain trusts have been created naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. The net income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and, upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at the book value of their assets at December 31, 1968. No attempt has been made to compute any liability of these funds for future payments to beneficiaries.

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, except for the effect of items noted in the accountants' letter, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on November 6, 1946. It was created as a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or fixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships, for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the directors of the corporation, its responsibilities are to obtain funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disburse and invest funds according to designation made and as set out in the charter.

Most of the loans were on ten year terms with provision for monthly payments of principal and interest. Loans committed after December 8, 1967, were to be made at a maximum rate of 7%.

Pledged Assets
1. Kerr Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$788,014.07 and land upon which it is located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$495,000.00. Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,115,505.43, plus appraised value of \$93,217.12, and land upon which it is located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$608,000.00.
2. Thurmond Hall and John Wesley Raley Chapel, and land upon which they are located, included herein respectively at the university's cost of \$336,448.27 and \$1,665,427.41, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$571,000.00.
3. Ford Music Hall, included herein at the university's cost of \$216,319.74, and Brittain Library and Art Center, included herein at the university's cost of \$140,015.27 plus appraisal value of \$114,908.73 and land upon which they are located, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$241,000.00.

Pledged Income

4. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, the women's dining hall, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, the men's dining hall, and to the extent necessary, the income from the WMU Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

5. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$67,500.00 is pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of amounts necessary to pay twelve months' principal and interest on certain bonds.

6. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$27,000.00 annually, are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of the amounts necessary to pay twelve months' principal and interest on certain bonds.

Appraised Value

7. Included in the book value of buildings is \$1,272,453,08 of appraised value, consisting of \$1,354,294.65 less \$81,841.57 amortization. Since the amounts carried did not arise from purchase it is therefore a departure from generally accepted accounting principles.

8. The university follows a policy of valuing library books at \$60,000.00 plus the cost of books acquired during the past four years. Library books costing \$13,554.99 were purchased during the year ended May 31, 1968, and were added to the capitalized value of library books. Library books costing \$10,877.78 which had been purchased during the fifth year ended previous to May 31, 1967, were removed from the capitalized value of library books. At May 31, 1968, the remaining book value of capitalized library books was \$116,164.36.

The following supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations, but is submitted for supplementary analysis purposes. It has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to such financial statements, except for appraisal values previously referred to in this report taken as a whole.

Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909, to function as an operating unit of the convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that body. On February 9, 1910, Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a perpetual corporation without capital stock for the purpose of providing opportunities for all departments of higher education and connected preparatory schooling of persons of both sexes on equal terms.

BALANCE SHEET COMMENTS

Current Fund

Relief and Annuity—During the period July 1, 1937, to May 31, 1968, the university has contributed to the Educational Institutions Employes Retirement Plan of the Relief and Annuity Board of Southern Baptist Convention for the benefit of officers and faculty participation in the plan. According to direct confirmation, the university's accumulations at May 31, 1968, were \$37,135.10. Amounts contributed on behalf of any employe may be refunded to the university upon the death of the employe before retirement, or upon the employe's withdrawal and demand.

Deferred Charges—Deffered charges at May 31, 1968, totaled \$26,975.08. In addition to maintenance supplies of \$17,370.72 and unexpired insurance of \$7,674.09, other deferred charges amounted

to \$1,930.27, as listed below:

Deferred Income—Deferred income of \$39,546.63 at May 31, 1968, consisted of \$59,165.72 scholarship grants being held by the university for future use by qualified students in accordance with grantors' provisions, less \$19,619.09 of scholarships committed pending receipt of grants.

Faculty Building Association—Prior to the year under review credits for rent and endowment earnings for Faculty Building Association exceeded the cumulative advances made by Oklahoma Baptist University to Faculty Building Association. At May 31, 1968, the cumulative liability of Oklahoma Baptist University to Faculty Building Association was \$35,154.86.

Loan Fund

National Student Loan Programs—On May 31, 1968, the federal government had made net capital contributions to the university of \$579,235.00 under the National Defense Student Loan Program. Under this program loans are made to qualified students from funds furnished by the federal government (90%) and the university (10%). Loan repayments are scheduled over a maximum of 15 years. Any borrower who becomes a full-time public elementary school teacher may have 10% of the principle of his loan plus interest forgiven for each year of full-time service as a teacher up to a total of five years. During the year under review \$11,868.33 was forgiven under this program. The university is also participating in a similar loan fund program for student nurses. On May 31, 1968, the government had made capital contributions of \$31,054.52 to the Nursing Student Loan Program. At May 31, 1968, no principal or interest had been forgiven under the Student Nurses Loan Program.

University Loan Funds—In addition to the revolving funds aforementioned, the university has received loan funds totaling \$62,519.40 for loans to qualified students.

Endowment Funds

Included in the endowment funds is \$243,500.00 which the university may use for any purpose at its discretion.

Bonds Payable—The university is obligor to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States government under two bond indentures totaling \$1,915,000.00 at May 31, 1968.

The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University dormitory bonds, Series 1955, consists of \$495,000.00 of 23/4 % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$12,000.00 on November 1, 1968, to \$23,000.00 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory. The first \$79,000.00 of these bonds were retired on schedule, and \$2,000.00 of the bonds, due November 1, 1995, have been retired.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1968, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series of 1957, consists of \$608,000.00 of 2% % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$13,000.00 on October 1, 1968, to \$33,000.00 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory. During the year under review, \$13,000.00 of these bonds

were retired as scheduled.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1968, the sinking fund

requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$571,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 31, 1961, with semiannual maturities varying from \$18,000.00 on September 1, 1968, to \$26,000.00 on September 1, 1975, with the remaining \$249,000.00 due on March 1, 1976. Interest rates vary from 43/4% to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) the apportionment from Baptist General Convention for building program; (2) \$67,500.00; or (3), the amount necessary to pay principal

and interest during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary

deposits during the year under review.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$241,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semiannual maturities varying from \$7,000.00 on December 1, 1968, to \$10,000.00 on December 1, 1977, with the remaining \$97,000.00 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rates vary from 43/4 to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000.00 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due

during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

We have examined the balance sheets of the Operating Fund, the Plant Fund and the Emergency Reserve Fund of the Bristow Memorial Hospital as of June 30, 1968 and the statement of General Fund income and expense for the twelve months then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

We did not observe the taking of the physical inventores as of June 30, 1968. However, we used other auditing procedures to determine the reasonableness thereof.

In our opinion, the accompanying balance sheets and statement of income and expense present fairly the financial position of the Operating Fund, the Emergency Reserve Fund and the Plant Fund at June 30, 1968, and the results of their operations, where applicable, for the twelve months ended June 30, 1968, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with hospital accounting.

We have completed an audit of the books of the Cordell Memorial Hospital at Cordell, Oklahoma, for the twelve months period ending June 30, 1968. Attached, as part of our report thereon, please find exhibits and schedules as follows:

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of June 30, 1968, with limited spot-check of detail transactions.

We confirmed the bank accounts and savings accounts by outside

correspondence.

We confirmed the accounts receivable by outside correspondence, as of June 12, 1968. There were no significant, unexplained, changes in the receivables from then to closing date. We aged the accounts, as of June 12, with the following results:

The total accounts receivable increased during the year by nearly one-half, and those 90 days and over old more than doubled, indicating the possible need for a more aggressive approach to the matter of claims and collections. Even so, we have reason to hope that the reserve, in amount of \$4,547.73, is sufficient.

We did not witness the actual inventory count, but our spot-check made shortly after indicated that the hospital is carrying the approximate quantities shown on the physical inventory. The perpetual inventory records are also very reliable. See "Comments" section for more about the physical inventory itself.

The principal accounts payable were confirmed by outside correspondence. The retroactive adjustments, from and to Medicare and Welfare, are as computed by my colleague and fellow C.P.A., Mr. Cecil Conner.

### COMMENTS

We computed the retroactive payment due from Blue Cross to be \$976.32.

While we are satisfied that the over-all inventories are approximately as reported (see above), the classification of inventories differed from that taken a year ago. This made the problem of inventory adjustments to expenses a difficult one. We worked out the best solution we could, in the circumstances, by attempting, we believe fairly successfully, a reclassification of opening inventories. We are deferring, at this time, any recommendations, since we hope to have time this fall to write up some suggestions, in detail, for the benefit of our hospitals.

We made all retroactive adjustments, affecting the prior fiscal year, as "surplus" adjustments (See Exhibit C), so they would not distort the income statement for this fiscal year. Even so, however, these financial statements are not consistent with prior years in one respect. At the suggestion of the Medicare auditors we accrued, for the first time, earned vacation pay. This amounted to \$1,167.29.

AUDITORS' OPINION

In our opinion, excepting our comment above regarding consistency, the attached statements present fairly the financial condition of Cordell Memorial Hospital, as of June 30, 1968, and the results of operations for the twelve months period then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a consistent basis, except as above noted.

The Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital is owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Although accounted for separately, the Hospital is not a separate legal entity, but operates under the corporate charter of the Convention. The name of the hospital was changed from Enid General Hospital by action of the Baptist General Convention in November 1967.

2. Accounts Receivable

An analysis of accounts receivable and the allowance for uncollectible accounts for the year ended June 30, 1968, is as follows:

This rate was determined by a review of the Hospital's bad debt experience, and a review of the current trends in the accounts. 4. Accounts Payable—Baptist General Convention

The account payable to the Baptist General Convention consists of amounts owed for purchase of hospital supplies, insurance premiums, and administrative expense. It is the policy of the Hospital to pay these amounts only when funds are not required for other operating purposes.

#### 5. Advances Received from Medicare

The Medicare program, if requested by the hospital, advances funds to the hospital to cover amounts due the hospital, but not yet billed or which are in process of being paid. At June 30, 1968, Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital had received advances totaling

The amount which can be advanced to the hospital is limited by a formula and is computed quarterly by Medicare. The advances need not be repaid unless they exceed the maximum allowable for two conscutive quarters, and then only the excess is repaid. 6. Hospital Plant and Equipment

The Hospital has not, in prior years, maintained individual property records on its equipment. Information required for proper retirement of asset cost and accumulated equipment. Information required for proper retirement of asset cost and accumulated depreciation from the accounts upon disposition of an asset has therefore not been available. Equipment cost as reported in the accompanying balance sheet represents recorded cost at date of the donation of the hospital to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma (October 1953), plus cost or equivalent of equipment acquired subsequently and less proceeds received upon disposition of assets.

Building cost has been recorded in the accounts on the same basis as the equipment. Management of the hospital is contemplating an appraisal of the plant and equipment to determine historical cost on an item by item basis.

Depreciation is computed on a composite straight-line basis, using the following rates:

During the year ended June 30, 1968, items having a total cost of \$36,837, were reclassified from "major movable" to "fixed" equipment. The transfer was made to conform to the equipment classifications designated in current hospital accounting literature.

The Hospital also decided to return to its former policy of not capitalizing equipment of a minor nature. Therefore, cost and depreciation related to such equipment has been removed from the accounts.

The Hospital has begun construction on an addition to the building which will increase the bed capacity to approximately 200 beds. The cost of the addition is estimated to be in excess of \$2,000,000, and is to be financed by funds raised in the community (see Exhibits C and E), funds supplied by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and the long-term borrowing. Construction in progress as shown on the accompanying plant fund balance sheet consists of consultant and architect fees in connection with this building program.

#### 7. Reserve Funds

7. Reserve Funds

The hospitals operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma deposit funds with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. These funds are invested by the Foundation and comprise an emergency fund to meet the needs of the hospitals. The funds are withdrawable upon approval of the hospital administrator, the executive secretary of the convention, and the chairman of the hospitals and Golden Age Homes committee of the Convention's Board of Directors. According to the 1966 resolution of these reserve funds are to be used to help pay the convention's pledge (see Notes 6 and 8).

8. Development Fund Piedge Receivable
Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma
The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, in a resolution published in the 1966 annual of the Convention, has pledged funds to the Hospital's building program on the following basis.

"\$1 for each \$2 raised in the campaign, with a maximum of \$500,000 from the vention." (The campaign referred to is the Enid development fund campaign.) The resolution also designates the means by which the convention's pledge is to be 4, "—until \$250,000 or one-half of the Convention's part is raised." Convention."

The hospital is to be authorized to borrow the remaining one-half of the Convention's pledge. Included in the funds designated to be used for payment of the Convention's pledge are \$14,489.61 of hospital reserve funds. These funds are listed as an asset on the hospital's plant fund balance sheet.

Under terms of the resolution as described above, actual cash pledged by the convention at June 30, 1968, is as follows:

Under terms of the resolution, the Convention's pledge will increase proportionately as additional pledges are received in the Enid fund campaign.

9. Pledge on Deposit with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

One of the contributors to the Hospital's development fund has deposited her contribution with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The contribution is available for the use of the Hospital, with interest thereon to be paid to the donor during her lifetime; upon her death the contribution becomes the unrestricted proprty of the Hospital.

10. Discounts to Department of Public Welfare and Medicare Program

Discounts to Department of Public Welfare and Medicare patients were reported in the financial statements for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1967, on an estimated basis. The reported estimates exceeded the final computed settlements with these agencies by a total of \$12,739. The discounts for the current fiscal year have been reduced by the amount of the prior year over-estimates, resulting in reported negative discounts to these agencies. The portion of the discounts pertaining to the current fiscal year have been reported at the amounts computed in the initial settlements with these agencies. These settlements are subject to audit by the agencies.

NOTE 1—ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE FROM PATIENTS

Patients' statements of account totaling \$29,104.57 at June 17, 1968 were mailed by us with the request attached that we be notified of any errors in the account balances. All differences reported were satisfactorily explained. We did not confirm Medicare balances; however, the substantial accuracy of Medicare balances at June 30, 1968 was verified by reconciliation of book balances with year-end reports furnished by the Medicare intermediary. We did not confirm Welfare balances.

NOTE 2-ALLOWANCE FOR DOUBTFUL ACCOUNTS

Based upon our computation of the loss on doubtful accounts for the preceding five years the allowance for doubtful accounts in the amount of \$13,827.92 exceeds the minimum requirements,

#### NOTE 3—INVENTORIES

Physical inventories were taken by hospital employees under our supervision on June 24 and 25, 1968. The inventories were priced at cost or market, whichever was lower, cost being computed on the first-in, first-out basis. We made selective test counts, tested prices and computations, and reconciled the adjusted inventory at June 25, 1968, with the June 30, 1968 total by applying the transactions during the intervening period.

NOTE 4—PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Additions to property and equipment accounts during the year were examined by us and are properly recorded at cost.

The land, building, and certain equipment and supplies are leased from the Sayre Public Works Authority for a nominal rent under a twenty-three year lease with option to renew for an additional twenty-five years. At the termination of the lease all leased assets or their replacements together with the remaining accounts receivable will revert to the Authority. The cost of the leased assets is as follows:

These costs have been included in the accompanying balance sheet in accordance with certain rules and regulations as prescribed by the Oklahoma Blue Cross and the Health Insurance for the Aged Program (Medicare) and have been tested and accepted by Health Insurance for the Aged Program.

Property and equipment subject to depreciation is amortized over its estimated useful life by application of the straight-line method of computation. The rates used are in accordance with rates prescribed by the Oklahoma Blue Cross and are considered to be reasonable and adequate.

The amount due for the year ended June 30, 1968 is based upon reports submitted by the hospital to the Medicare intermediary. These reports are subject to audit and review by the Social Security Administration. The amount due for the year ended June 30, 1967, is from an amended report audited by a firm of certified public accountants engaged by the Medicare intermediary, which report is subject to further review by the Social Security Administration.

Social Security Administration.

The hospital has submitted a report for reimbursement of inpatient costs under Title XIX of the Social Security Act of 1965, as amended, to the Oklahoma Department of Public Welfare for the year ended June 30, 1968. This report reflects an amount of \$2,630.00 due the hospital. The hospital also submitted a report to the Oklahoma Blue Cross which reflects a payment due the hospital for services provided Blue Cross members in the amount of \$1,098.37. Both the Oklahoma Blue Cross report and the Oklahoma Department of Public Welfare report are subject to review by the respective

The long-term liability of \$12,000.00 payable to the Health Insurance Program for the Aged (Medicare) represents an advance received under that Program's provision for current financing. Such advance is subject to adjustment by the Social Security Administration and is payable at termination of the hospital's contract for care of Medicare

The accompanying notes are an integral part of this statement.

#### 1. Land Held in Trust

On December 3, 1963, the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of a tract of land containing 35 acres to Baptist Laymen's Corporation, as trustee, to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention. The tract was conveyed in June, 1964, at an appraised value of \$122,500.00.

The trustee is authorized and empowered to erect one or more buildings for the housing and care of elderly persons, and such other improvements as it deems necessary and advisable.

The trustee is authorized to grant leasehold estates of this real estate or any part thereof for terms of years not to exceed a total of twenty years.

The trustee shall pay annually or at more frequent intervals, to Baptist General Convention the income and earnings from this real estate held in trust, after deduction of taxes all expenses incurred, and all payments on debts incurred in the erection and operation of the improvements.

The convention may revoke this trust at any time, and upon revocation, all or any part of the real estate shall be reconveyed by the trustee to the convention as it may

direct, subject to such mortgages, liens, and leasehold estates as may have been granted or created by the trustee prior to such reconveyance.

2. Bonds Payable

On February 12, 1965, the Board of Directors adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of real estate first mortgage 6% interest bearing bonds with a trust indenture providing for a total issuance of \$2,000,000.00, in amounts to be paid in 10 years. The bonds are to be issued in series as funds are needed to finance construction projects of Baptist Golden Age Homes in Oklahoma City.

The trust indenture provides that all bonds issued under its provisions will have identical security rights, liens and privileges. The indenture further provides that whenever the issuance of additional bonds is authorized by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, such bonds may be issued and their proceeds used for the purpose of refunding or repurchasing the then outstanding bonds.

Prior to December 31, 1967, Series "A" bonds totaling \$700,000.00 had been issued. On Jan. 15, 1968 Series "B" bonds totaling \$250,000.00 were authorized to be issued. By June 30, 1968, \$215,000.00 of Series "B" bonds had been issued. During the period the terms of the indenture pertaining to the retirement of principal and the payment of interest had been met, and on June 30, 1968, the status of each series of bonds was:

Maturity dates on outstanding Series "A" bonds varied from January 1, 1968, to July 15, 1975, with \$9,500.00 due July 1, 1968, Maturity dates on outstanding Series "B" bonds varied from January 15, 1972, to July 15, 1975.

Series "A" and Series "B" bonds are secured by a first mortgage on blocks 1 and 2 of the Baptist Golden Age Homes Addition Number 1 in Oklahoma City, and improvements thereon. Blocks 1 and 2 contain approximately 7 acres of the total tract of land conveyed in trust to Baptist Laymen's Corporation. The total tract contained 35 acres and was transferred at its appraised value of \$122,500.00.

Series "B" bonds are being used to pay for construction of a north wing to Lackey Manor and such equipment and furniture as will be needed to furnish the wing. The following shows the status of the construction in progress as of June 30, 1968:

The administrative residence, costing \$16,586.76 to construct was subject to a first mortgage note with an unpaid balance of \$15,250.66 at June 30, 1968.

4. Residential Property Subject to Occupancy Agreements

Two residences, included herein at their combined construction costs of \$27,500.00, were given to Baptist Laymen's Corporation for the use and benefit of Baptist Golden Age Homes located in Oklahoma City, by the occupants thereof. Under terms of the gift, occupants shall possess the premises for their lifetime, subject to physical occupancy of the premises.

5. Baptist Laymen's Corporation was defendant in one suit at June 30, 1968. It appears that insurance is adequate to cover any loss sustained.

### ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION

The following supplementary information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations, but is submitted for supplementary analysis purposes. It has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our examination of the financial statements and is, in our opinion fairly stated in all material respects in relation to such financial statements, taken as a whole.

Organization |

Baptist Laymen's Corporation was incorporated February 12, 1960, under Oklahoma law, with perpetual duration and without capital stock.

The general purpose of the corporation is to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by Southern Baptist Convention.

### COMMENTS

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes

The current project of Baptist Laymen's Corporation is the financing, construction and operation of Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes on a 35-acre tract of land conveyed to the association, as trustee, by the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The land, conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation on June 10, 1964, is shown herein at an appraised value of \$122,500.00.

Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes presently consists of a sixty-two bed nursing home known as Lackey Manor, twenty apartments, an administrator's residence and two residences constructed by the occupants with right to full possession and uninterrupted use during their natural lives. The nursing home and apartments have been erected on approximately seven and one-half acres of the 35-acre tract. Subsequent to June 30, 1968, construction was completed on a 44 bed addition to the nursing home.

### ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

#### COMMENTS

Organization: Federal credit unions are cooperative associations in accordance with the Federal Credit Union Act. Federal credit unions are chartered, examined, and supervised by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions. The bureau's operating expenses are borne by the federal credit unions. The bureau receives no direct appropriations of public funds.

Members' shareholdings are not insured by any agency of the government.

Baptist Building Federal Credit Union was organized by the Bureau of Federal Credit Unions on July 11, 1958, with perpetual duration. The par value of each share is \$5.00.

The by-laws of the credit union provides as follows:

"The purpose of this credit union is to promote thrift among its members, by affording them an opportunity for accumulating their savings; and to create for them a source of credit for provident or

productive purposes.

"The field of memberships shall be limited to those having the following common bond of association, occupation, or residence: Employees of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated, the Oklahoma County Baptist Association, the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Home Missions Board who work in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; employees of the Child Care Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Incorporated who work in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma; employees of this credit union; and members of their immediate families."

Savings and Loan Shares: Funds were invested in savings and loan shares with Oklahoma City Federal Savings and Loan Association of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, in the amount of \$6,835.30. An additional \$33,000.00 was invested in certificates of savings and loan shares.

Certificates of Deposit: The credit union was holding nine certificates of deposit with redemptive values totaling \$8,709.80 at December 31, 1968. The notes mature on April 29, 1971 at maturity values totaling \$10,000.00.

Loans (Notes Receivable): Loans were receivable from 51 individual members in the total amount of \$38,232.18 at December 31, 1968.

Loan protection insurance is provided by the credit union in the form of life insurance on the life of the borrowing member equal to his loan balance up to \$5,000.00.

Members Savings Share Accounts: Deposits were held as savings accounts from 132 members in the total amount of \$83,028.87 at December 31, 1968.

Life savings insurance is provided by the credit union which insures the member's life in an amount equal to his savings in shares up to \$2,000.00.

Reserve for Losses: The Federal Credit Union Act provides that all entrance fees and charges to members, and 20% of the net earnings of each dividend period, before the declaration of any dividends, shall be set aside as a regular reserve against losses on bad loans until this reserve shall equal 10% of the total members' shareholdings. No further transfer of net earnings is required except such amount as may be needed to maintain this 10% ratio.

**Individed Earnings:** Accumulated earnings available for dividends at December 31, 1968 were \$2,097.79.
