He was a loyal and active denominational worker.

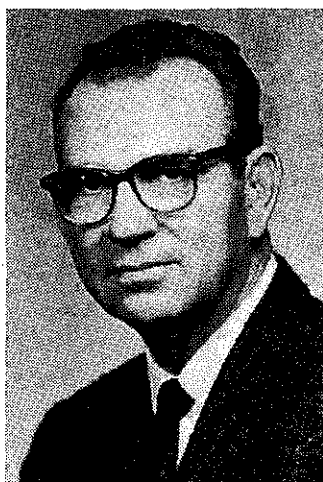
A great Bible preacher, teacher and scholar.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 50 members, provided that no church shall have over 10 messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the executive secretary-treasurer, shall be elected annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving a majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This board of directors shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the convention and 60 other members who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. The membership of this board shall include not less than 16 persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight men and at least eight women.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors shall be the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary-treasurer to serve, until such time as the convention meets. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

Section 4. This board shall elect all department heads, including the editor of the **Baptist Messenger** and the assistant executive secretary. The executive secretary-treasurer, in consultation with the committees of the Board of Directors which are involved, shall select the workers in the executive division, with the exception of office or similar personnel. The department heads, in counsel with the executive secretary-treasurer and the committees of the Board of Directors which are responsible for their work, shall select their workers, other than office or similar personnel. The executive secretary-treasurer and each department head shall select his office or similar personnel. Those responsible for electing or selecting workers shall fix their salaries.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS**ARTICLE I**

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be sixty (60) plus the president and the recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided; the term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen (15) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

... In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors, shall be the

Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semiannual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be: A president of the Board of Directors, elected by the convention; a recording secretary, elected by the convention; an executive secretary-treasurer, elected by the convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The president of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The executive secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The executive secretary-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The bylaws shall be adopted by the general convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the bylaws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

Section 2. Election of officers shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the convention or the

Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the general convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the general convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Charter and Bylaws

CHARTER AND BYLAWS OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation Feb. 9, 1910, amended Jan. 26, 1956.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is Paul K. Nance, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are: to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of

the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provide for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

The qualifications of said Board of Trustees and of the presidents of said institution and of all departments thereof shall be as follows: That each member of said Board of Trustees shall be a member of a Baptist Church within the state; that the presidents of said institution and each of its departments shall be members of Baptist churches."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election

of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semiannual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semiannual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semiannual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustees occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a

secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 12. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semiannual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 13. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 14. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 15. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, under Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section #12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma, and of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of the said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work.

ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist church affiliated with the Bap-

ARTICLE I**Membership**

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

NAME**RESIDENCE**

who were recommended by the Board of Directors of the Convention to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and ratified and approved by said Convention. Such membership to continue until their successors are elected; and all shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of accredited Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II**Annual Meeting of the Directors**

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting at a designated place at the call of the President of the Foundation a short time prior to the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the annual report and recommendation of the Directors shall be presented to and acted upon by the Convention at its regular meeting.

ARTICLE III**Officers**

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, one or more vice-presidents, an executive secretary, who shall also be the secretary and the treasurer of the corporation. Such elective officers, with the exception of the executive secretary, shall be chosen at a meeting of the Board of said corporation, to be held at the Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the Board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only. The executive secretary shall be elected by the Board of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected.

In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lessor officers as it deems necessary, or desirable, such as administrative assistants, assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Director from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

Section 1—President:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2—Vice-Presidents:

It shall be the duty of each of the vice-presidents to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3—Executive Secretary:

The executive secretary shall be the official administrator of all of the work of the Board of Directors and shall make full report of all matters committed to the Board of Directors.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of secretary; shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors and then shall perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

The executive secretary shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The executive secretary shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expense of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 4—Directors:

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

ARTICLE V

Method of Election and Terms of Office

Section 1—Directors:

The directors for the first year shall be those designated in the charter and as may be approved at the Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, when the charter and these bylaws are submitted for the approval of the board.

The directors shall serve for a term of four (4) years, beginning with the 15th day of November, 1946, and the first sixteen (16) directors shall serve as follows:

for a term of four (4) years;

shall serve for a term of three (3) years;

shall serve for a term of two (2) years;

shall serve for a term of one (1) year.

Each year thereafter the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma the four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years, and shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year.

Section 2—Other Officers:

The directors shall select from among their own number a president, and one or more vice-presidents, each of whom shall hold office for one year.

Section 3—Vacancies:

Vacancies on the board of directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If the Baptist General Convention shall fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Directors

Section 1—Regular Meeting:

The board of directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings:

Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the board of directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committee:

The board of directors may, at their first meeting, or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum:

A quorum of the board of directors shall consist of at least five (5) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority:

The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral

deeds, releases, receipts, acquaintances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice-president of the board of directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

ARTICLE VII

Distributees

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VIII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of _____, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA."

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meetings of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, nor shall any such amendment become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. T. B. Lackey, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

(a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.

(b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

(c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

(d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.

(e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.

(f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.

(g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:

(1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;

(2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;

(3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;

(4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

(5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or non-negotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

(h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.

(i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation

ARTICLE I

Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. **WAIVER AND CONSENT.** The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II

Directors

Section 1. **NUMBER.** The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. **ELECTION AND TERMS.** The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. **QUORUM.** Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III

Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meeting.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V

President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI

Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X**Notice of Regular Meetings**

Section 1. **DISPENSED WITH.** Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI**Amendments**

Section 1. **METHOD OF AMENDMENT.** These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII**Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds**

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

Evangelism

For 22 years it has been my privilege to report to the Convention on our work in evangelism. On April 1, 1948 I became the first secretary of the department of Brotherhood and Evangelism. The report for 21 of these years reveals a total of 395,297 people won to Christ and baptized into our churches. This is an average of 18,844 per year.

We praise God for each of these precious souls. This record has been achieved by the co-operative effort on the part of our pastors, churches, associational leadership and state leadership. It is a proven fact that we do best that which we do together.

On September 30, 1969 I will retire as the Secretary of the Department of Evangelism. I shall never cease to thank God and Oklahoma Baptists for the privilege I have had through these years of serving in this capacity. Dr. Jerold McBride has been elected as my successor. I commend him to you. He is eminently qualified for this important place. Let me urge you to pray for him and give him your wholehearted support as you have given me.

For three consecutive years we have had a slight increase in baptisms. For this we are grateful. Indications are that we will show another increase for this year of the Crusade of the Americas.

For the simultaneous revivals this year we had a total of 960 churches participating. The reports reveal 5750 received for baptism with total additions of 7882. This is a good increase over last year. Many of the churches reported excellent revivals and the largest number received for baptism in several years.

Youth Evangelism Conference

On December 27 and 28 we had our first statewide Youth Evangelism Conference in the Sheraton-Oklahoma Hotel. In spite of the bad icy weather over 700 young people registered for the conference. It was indeed a successful meeting.

State Evangelism Conference

The 1969 Evangelism Conference was well attended. The 1970 conference will be in Oklahoma City, January 26, 27 and 28. The day sessions will be held in the Northwest Church. The night sessions will be in the Civic Center Music Hall. Our out-of-state speakers will be Gray Allison, Harry S. Wright, Winfred Moore, Clyde Francisco and John Havlik. Claude Rhea will be directing the music.

As we face the future let us continue to keep evangelism in the forefront. Keep it church centered. Continue to "preach the Gospel" for it is "the power of God unto salvation." Our methods may change and must change, but the message remains the same.

Evangelism must saturate the '70 onward program. We dare not become so involved in other programs that we neglect the winning of the lost to Christ and church membership.

As Napoleon once said "Conquest has made me, and conquest must maintain me." As Oklahoma Baptists we must ever remember that evangelism has made us and evangelism alone can preserve us. Evangelism should be the soul and the spirit of every organization and endeavor of every church.

Department of Missions

In the organizational structure of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Department of Missions has the responsibility of directing the mission program of the state convention. Within the department there are three general programs of service (associational missions, language missions, and work with National Baptists) and numerous specialized ministries.

Associational Missions

There are 37 associations in Oklahoma with a superintendent of missions directing the work in each association. Two new superintendents of missions have been called to fields of service during this year—Keith Wilkinson to Chickasaw Association and Sewell Farrell to LeFlore Association. It is the purpose of the Department of Missions to work with and assist the associations and their missionaries in projecting, promoting and executing an effective program of missions.

New Mission and New Church Sites

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is endeavoring to assist associations in the purchase of sites for new missions and churches. The Department of Missions has been given the responsibility of distributing these funds according to a formula adopted by the Board of Directors.

The following associations have received these funds from the 1968 allocation: Central, Craig-Mayes, Kay, East Central, Johnston-Marshall, Northeastern, Pittsburg, and Tulsa.

World Missions Conferences (Schools of Missions)

In co-operation with the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, each association is entitled to a World Missions Conference every five years. The five-year schedule for Oklahoma is:

The five objectives suggested as special emphases during a world missions conference are: (1) stimulate soul-winning; (2) encourage organization of local missions; (3) inspire concerted prayer for missions; (4) increase financial support of missions; and (4) secure life commitments to mission service.

State Baptist Bible Conference

There were 310 full-time registrations for the 1969 Bible Conference May 13-16. The 1970 conference is scheduled for May 12-15 at Falls Creek Assembly grounds. The program personnel will be: Clyde T. Francisco, professor of Old Testament Interpretation, Southern Seminary; S. M. Lockridge, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, San Diego, Calif.; Grady Cothen, president of Oklahoma Baptist University, and Albert McClellan, program planning secretary, Executive Committee, SBC.

Student Summer Missions

The Home Mission Board employs college and seminary students to serve as summer missionaries in the various states and areas of home mission work under the supervision of the state missions department and the local superintendents of missions. The purpose of student summer missions is to meet mission needs while providing an opportunity for students to discover their interest and aptitudes for mission service. Fourteen of these students served in our state during the summer of 1969.

Resort Missions

In co-operation with the Home Mission Board, Pittsburg Association, and First Church, Eufaula, the Department of Missions sponsored a pilot program of resort missions in the area of Lake Eufaula during the summer of 1969. According to the Oklahoma Industrial Development and Park Department 13,494,268 people visited the 43 state parks and recreation areas in 1968.

Language Missions

Crusade of the Americas revivals were observed in most language congregations this past year. The increase in the number of baptisms is a significant indication of the success of these efforts.

The first Missions Workshop for missionaries jointly employed by the Home Mission Board and the state convention was held in April of this year. It was a tremendous success, with information and inspiration being shared. All of the missionaries attending expressed gratitude for the help given—and a desire to make this an annual meeting. Plans are being made to do so.

Financial assistance is being given to 39 fields of language missions work through the Department of Missions. Those who serve have reported 880 professions of faith during the past year through their ministry.

The State Language Assemblies recorded a total registration of 1,352 in the three assemblies, with 317 decisions reported.

Language missions in Oklahoma provides a ministry to Indians, Spanish and deaf with missionaries serving in each area. Laddie Adams is the director of language missions.

Work With National Baptists

The state director of work with National Baptists works with leaders of the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention (Negro) in an effort to strengthen local churches and their denominational program of activities.

Area Stewardship Conferences are held each year. Tithers Enrolment Day materials are distributed and encouragement is given to pastors to conduct a Tithers Enrolment Day. In 1968 more than 100 National Baptist churches were reached through these conferences. Help is also provided by the Evangelism and Religious Education Departments through conferences, clinics and workshops.

The National Baptist Youth Assembly, June 9-13 at Falls Creek was attended by 101 young people and sponsors. We are now trying to develop a youth camp for National Baptists northeast of Oklahoma City known as Camp Burges, named after Mrs. Burges who donated the 40 acres of land for the camp. The Home Mission Board has given \$15,000 for this purpose and our own state WMU will give a part of the 1970 State Mission offering for the development of Camp Burges.

Christian Social Ministries

Christian social ministries is an emphasis on Christian witness that helps churches respond to the physical needs of people through Baptist Centers, juvenile rehabilitation, literacy ministries, migrant ministries, disaster relief and relief and rehabilitation work with alcoholics, drug addicts and ex-prisoners.

We have two mission centers, one in Tulsa, one in Oklahoma City, a rescue mission in Oklahoma City and a part-time program of migrant work.

It appears that some doors are now opening which will enable us to perform a larger ministry in the future.

Seminary Extension

Baptist Messenger

Oklahoma Baptists have one mission magazine to tell the story of their work in the state, the nation and the world. It is the **Baptist Messenger**, owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and printed each week in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. The purpose of the publication is to develop well-informed Baptists and spiritually mature Christians.

Nearly all of our churches have seen the wisdom of providing the state Baptist newsmagazine, just as other helpful literature is provided, for every family and individual in the church membership. A slight increase in subscription rates to help meet rising production costs has been voted by the state convention's Board of Directors. The church budget subscription rate in the every-family plan will increase from 3.2 cents per copy to 4 cents per copy effective Jan. 1, 1970 and the individual rate will increase at that time from \$2 per year to \$2.50. This will be the first price increase since 1956 and the second in 23 years. Your editor completed 20 years of service in that position on Aug. 1.

Present circulation of the **Baptist Messenger** each week is 82,689.

Child Care

Oklahoma Baptists have made giant strides in recent years to meet the needs of children. Effort has been expended to take advantage of present day knowledge in every area of serving the little ones as well as meeting the severe problems of the teen-age group.

No matter how sophisticated or knowledgeable a staff may become, there is still the same hurt in a child's heart at separation from loved ones. No matter how up-to-date a building facility may be, such as the new family cottages, there is still a real emotional upheaval that tries the metal of those who would help. Many children have been irreparably hurt before any application is ever made for the services we offer.

The Department of Child Care of the convention now offers facilities through the Baptist Children's Home, Boys Ranch Town, adoption agency, unwed mother care, foster family care, family aid and counselling. Each has originated to meet particular needs of children and young people.

A staff with devotion and dedication has been engaged and trained to work with the children as they can comprehend and accept each child as they are and whatever problems they may have. These workers are there with love and understanding. It is truly a God-called missionary task of Christian service.

The Baptist churches have presented appeals for support through the Birthday Offering, Food Offering, and the Thanksgiving Love Offering. Many fine Baptist people have the cause of children at heart and give substantially of their means on a regular basis. The cost of child care has increased at the rate of 5 per cent a year. Now, more than ever before, we appeal to our churches, our Baptist people and friends of children to stand by the increased program of caring for children in need.

Historical Commission

The first meeting was during the Evangelism Conference at Ponca City, and the second meeting was at the Baptist Building Sept. 19.

Lackey's Life Story

One year ago it was reported that Sam Scantlan had been asked to write a book, with the possible title, **The Life and Labors of Thomas Bert Lackey**. Scantlan reports favorable progress in the preparation of his manuscript, which will be submitted to the commission about one year from now. The book is scheduled for publication by or before Sept. 1, 1971.

Book Inventory

In the last commission meeting a report was submitted on the current inventory of books which the Historical Commission and the state convention have published. Encyclopedia

The Historical Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has begun steps toward the publication of Volume III of the **Encyclopedia of Southern Baptists**, first printed in two volumes in 1958. J. M. Gaskin has been requested to work for the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Commission in editing and writing the Oklahoma material for this project.

Folsom Marker

Herbert M. Pierce, Wilburton, continues his work toward erecting a suitable historical marker to the memory of Peter Folsom, noted 19th century Choctaw Indian Baptist preacher. The marker is to be erected at or near the New Hope Baptist Church, about three miles southwest of Keota in Haskell County. The Historical Commission is assisting Pierce in defraying the costs of this project.

E. W. Thornton

In September, E. W. Thornton completed his first year as curator of the historical collection at the OBU library. During the year, Thornton has done a superb job of rearranging materials, filing, labeling, classifying, and making generally more usable the materials collected and placed in the collection over a period of years. This project is supported in its financial needs by a joint agreement of the commission and OBU.

Historical Society

The Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society is auxiliary to the commission. It currently has 131 members, of whom 108 are annual memberships, 22 are life, and one is honorary—awarded to E. W. Thornton.

Publishing Policy

Since the Historical Commission was first formed there has never been any set guidelines on the policy to be followed in considering books for publication. In the last meeting, the commission voted for the chairman to appoint a committee to draw up suggested guidelines for the future in the matter of accepting manuscripts, or inviting prospective writers to submit manuscripts for review with the view to their being published. Chairman of this committee is Robert S. Jackson, Poteau. Members are Brad Allen, Lawton, and J. M. Gaskin, Durant.

Chronicle

The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle has now completed 12 years of publication. Issued twice annually, the Chronicle is edited by J. M. Gaskin and goes without cost to all members of the Historical Society. This work is growing in its acceptance by libraries, historical collections, and museums as a reference work by history researchers.

Recommendations

1. More churches, associations, and institutions are encouraged to write their histories. Where possible, these should be published.
2. Churches and other Baptist groups should have minutes and other valuable historical materials microfilmed.
3. Baptists should continue to collect, preserve, and utilize their history materials. All necessary steps should be taken to encourage a growing awareness of the sense and meaning of history among the Baptists of Oklahoma.

Each customer will have a plastic credit card with an account number which will allow him to buy in any Baptist Book Store including the assemblies and conventions.

The stores in Oklahoma City and Tulsa have shown continued growth during the past year. This is the measure of our service to Oklahoma Baptists. Our whole reason for existence is to provide you with efficient, courteous "Service with a Christian Distinction." Our locations are: 5545 East 41st, Tulsa and 208 N.W. 11th, Oklahoma City.

Baptist Student Union

The beginning of the 1969 fall school semester is a time of rapidly expanding Baptist Student Union ministries. The first man director, Jere Mitchell, has accepted the BSU job at Oklahoma College of Liberal Arts in Chickasha. First full-time director, Utah Humphrey, is at work at Northeastern State College in Tahlequah. At Tahlequah, plans are being completed for a new student center. At Oklahoma City University, a new center has been opened under the direction of Baptist Temple. At the University of Oklahoma, there is a new look in BSU following a \$30,000.00 renovation. The first student-led

prayer in the remodeled OU center included these words. "In the midst of beauty, we thank thee for Baptists who care."

The evening prior to this writing, 75 leaders from the churches of southwestern Oklahoma gathered to launch a fund raising drive for a new center at the college at Weatherford. Although the major responsibility for the financing of BSU programs and Centers is borne by Baptists in the areas adjacent to the campus, all Oklahoma Baptists are sharing an increased responsibility in Student Work through the Cooperative Program. In 1968, several BSU's received more than twice the Cooperative Program funds as in earlier years.

The OU student's prayer is true. Baptists are a people who care.

Convention Building Committee

The Building Committee is elected by our convention for three-year terms, and on a rotating basis. The purpose of this committee is to correlate all building programs of the convention, and through sub-committees, to help in planning and supervision. Thus, either the committee as a whole, or a sub-committee, approves final plans and contracts. Then, upon completion of a project, the committee inspects and approves acceptances. In a very real sense, the committee serves as a liason between local committees and boards for the Baptist General Convention.

During 1968-69 the following projects were dealt with by this committee:

Bass Memorial Hospital, Enid

Where a \$2½ million construction program was started in the summer of 1968, and is about 60 per cent complete. Completion of this project in 1970 will provide Northwest Oklahoma with one of its most modern hospital facilities, capable of caring for 240 patients.

Falls Creek Assembly

Two new parks were built to accommodate more young people. Several, modern and attractive new buildings were constructed by churches this year, with others on the drawing boards.

The committee asked E. W. Westmoreland to assist them in drawing up some building and safety codes, to use as a guideline for all

future construction, and to help those who already have cabins, bring them up to the code. This was adopted by the Board of Directors.

A contract was awarded and construction started on a new water system, Sept. 1, 1969. This system should be complete and in full use next summer.

Child Care

The major building project this year, was the new administration building at Boys Ranch Town. The Board of Directors votes to name this the H. Truman Maxey Administration Building in honor of the one who is retiring this year after having served the Child Care Department for 35 years. The building which will cost, with furnishings, a little over \$100,000, was accepted on Oct. 1, 1969.

Sayre Hospital Expansion

Under the leadership of our administrator, W. C. Campbell, the local board at Sayre, built an extended care unit of 24 beds and eight additional private rooms. Likewise they enlarged the kitchen, x-ray, emergency room and nursing station, thus doubling the hospital facilities for the people in Western Oklahoma.

Baptist Building Elevator

When our Baptist Building, 1141 N. Robinson, Oklahoma City, was built, only one elevator was installed. However, a place was left for another. The administration and our building committee felt the present traffic flow in the building justified the installation of the second elevator. Therefore it was installed this year and has greatly facilitated the movement of people within our building.

Student Union Building, OBU

Although planning and construction of this new addition to the Shawnee campus is under the direction of the University Board of Trustees; we are happy to see the progress being made on the badly needed facility and to hear the contractor's assurance of its completion by school time in September 1970.

Christian Life Committee

In the world of changing values and moral deterioration, we believe Baptists need to become more aware of the ethical implications of the gospel with special regard to alcohol, communism, drugs, gambling, honesty, pornography, poverty, race relations, separation of church and state and sex education.

Alcohol

Beverage alcohol has been an issue throughout recorded history. The problem dates back as far as the account of Noah's drunkenness in Genesis 9. The effect of the sale and use of intoxicating beverages has been deplored in every age. Statistics reveal that two out of three adults in the United States drink alcoholic beverages to some extent, and that the Nation's annual expenditure for drinking exceeds \$13 billion. The fact that the most reliable estimates now place the number of alcoholics at more than 6,500,000 with 250,000 added each year, gives only an inkling of the human suffering involved.¹

Oklahoma Baptists and other forces of righteousness are faced with a battle with the forces of evil in an endeavor to liberalize alcoholic beverage laws in general, and liquor by the drink in particular. Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education, under the directorship of Ross McLennan, is to be commended for their leadership in this battle. We urge all Oklahoma Baptist churches to give SANE financial and moral support.

We are grateful for government agencies and other organizations that are using the mass media to give information on the dangers of cigarette smoking. We respectfully request these same agencies to launch a campaign against alcohol as a physical and social menace.

Communism

We call attention to the menace of the Communist movement that has gained control of one-fourth of the earth's land and one-third of the world's people. There is a very real sense in which the United

States of America must concern itself with the Communist threat for the designs of world conquest. Communism is based upon the concept of dialectical materialism, class hatred, revolution, situation ethics, and the ultimate rejection of the worth of the individual.

The Christian must not cringe in impotent fear before the Communist threat. The best defense against communism is the good offense of a sound and vigorous faith in Jesus Christ. If one takes Christ seriously, it is impossible to condone injustice, defend prejudice, tolerate tyranny, or harbor hate. If we can recapture the spirit of New Testament Christianity, then the churches of today will develop a moral and spiritual thrust before which no false doctrine on earth can stand.

Drugs

We wish to commend many law enforcement officers, court officials and various organizations for taking positive action against the growing drug traffic which has become so alarming, especially among the youth.

We urge the churches to utilize every resource available for the instruction and education of parents with regard to the symptoms of drug usage by their children, and to alert them to the unique vocabulary of drug users and pushers so as to recognize immediately when drugs are the subject of conversation. Churches and their members are urged to become active in every legitimate means of reclaiming and rehabilitating these in the Lord.

Gambling

Approximately one out of every four Americans gambles. They wager more each year than is spent on education or religion. The annual profit of professional gamblers is estimated to be larger than the combined profits of dozens of the nation's largest corporations. Gambling corrupts individuals and society. The per capita crime rate is twice as high for states with legalized gambling as for other states. Oklahoma is now threatened by this insidious evil. Gambling often contributes to crime, corrupts public officials, disrupts the economy, wrecks lives, hurts innocent persons and violates biblical principles. The desire to get something for nothing is the root of all gambling activity. It is selfish, destructive and irresponsible. No Christian person should ever under any circumstances engage in such activity. Christian men and women should work together to rid society of this evil which brings much suffering to the innocent. We recommend that we go on record as a convention as being against any legislation to bring Pari-Mutuel Gambling to our state.²

Honesty

We recognize the deep-seated trend of dishonesty within our society. The apathy of citizens in all strata of society toward this problem is appalling.

We affirm our belief in the biblical teaching that man is personally responsible to God for his acts. We believe a man does not lose this responsibility by attributing his moral failure to the nature

of the business or enterprise he may direct, or else to the employer, individual or corporation through which he receives his livelihood.

Therefore, we call upon our people to become personally alert to any failure at this point and to be a corrective for our society rather than a part of the problem.

We take our stand against the whole spectrum of dishonesty whether it be a credibility gap in government, favoritism in administration of justice, misrepresentation in business, willful misuse of time and effort by labor, or cheating on exams.

Pornography and Mass Media

The advance in production and distribution of pornographic materials in our country, especially to unsuspecting children, immature youth and maladjusted adults, is deplorable and alarming.

We urge our people to be alert to salacious literature in their vicinity, to acquaint themselves with local, state and federal laws concerning such, and to tactfully express their disapproval of this literature to senators and congressmen, as well as to neighborhood and wholesale magazine dealers, and editors of the publications involved.

Parents are urged to be cautious of publications and television programs allowed in their homes; and to show wise discretion concerning their use and that of their children for radio programs and recordings, whether disc or tape. We express our extreme distaste for many current movies being shown in theaters and now finding their way into our homes by television. Every appropriate action must be taken by members and churches to remedy this condition.

Poverty

In both the Old and New Testaments, the spirit of compassion toward the poor is exalted, while covetousness, greed and injustice are invariably denounced (Prov. 17:5, 3:14b-15, Deut. 14:22-29, Matt. 25:31-46, 26:11). A Christian attitude toward the poor must grow out of an understanding of God's concern for human suffering.

Churches are urged to survey community resources which can help to eliminate poverty, and to consider the possibility of establishing some poverty-related ministries in the local church. Some churches have set up day-care centers for children, employment services, migrant ministries, recreational programs, emergency relief plans, goodwill centers and various types of community organizations aimed at removing dependency.

Race Relations

The tremendous changes in the social and political life within this generation have caused the race problem to become both national and worldwide in scope. Christians must confront the issue on race relations as church members, citizens, employers, business men and as public officials. In this day of extremism and violence, Christians of all races should be urged to find common ground in Christ. The assertion of the worth and dignity of every human is the starting point.

We must not allow debates over the way in which various groups are dealing with civil rights issues to take our attention from the central biblical precept of the dignity of all men.

We call upon each person to accept his own responsibility in solving the problems associated with race. We also call upon the churches to preach and teach the biblical truths relative to race and to exemplify the spirit and mind of Christ in all human relationships.

Separation of Church and State

In 1952, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma made clear its position on separation of church and state by passing the following resolution:

"Whereas, the doctrine of separation of church and state has, through the years, been a basic doctrine of Baptists, and

"Whereas, there is a widespread tendency in certain religious circles to violate this doctrine by receiving gifts, grants or aid from the Federal government as evidenced by the fact that one religious group has received more than \$68,000,000 from the Federal government for hospital purposes, since the passing of the Hill-Burton Act by congress, therefore

"Be it resolved the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma should positionize itself on this vital matter in the following statement:

Neither the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, nor any institution or agency of this convention, shall accept directly or indirectly any gifts, grants or aid from Federal, State, County, City or any other governmental agency. Neither shall any lease or purchase of government owned property be made, except by payment of a reasonable value, either in cash, exchange of property or in service rendered."

This position was reaffirmed in 1959 with an additional dimension:

"That we keep our people informed concerning the ever threatening danger of the breakdown of the long cherished doctrine of "Separation of Church and State" and that we urge all our churches, boards and agencies to steer clear of any semblance of our weakening of this position; that we bring all the force we can, through prayer, teaching, warnings and requests, to bear upon our officials—both state and national in this matter."

The same sentiment was expressed in the Christian Life Committee report to the convention in 1960.

In 1961, the convention, upon recommendation by the Board of Directors, elected a special committee to study the separation of church and state as it affects our Baptist life and witness. The committee of 20 met several times during the year, made exhaustive studies and recommended that we reaffirm the articles of faith on religious liberty adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925, that we reaffirm the action taken by the 1952 convention and make a practical application of those principles and laws as related to the Baptist

General Convention of Oklahoma. The principle of separation of church and state was reaffirmed by resolution at the 1967 convention. In 1968, the convention voted to reprint the 1962 "Statement of Principles."

We ask that this convention again reconfirm these past actions relative to separation of church and state and that this convention also recommit ourselves to the principles of religious liberty for ourselves and others.

Sex Education

We believe that proper sex education is needed for children. We further believe that parents are the logical ones to give sex instruction to their own children. Because many parents, unfortunately, give little or no instruction concerning sex, we believe that churches can and should do much more than they have done. We would caution against giving overall approval to every proposed program of sex instruction in the public schools. We believe, however, that Baptist parents within each public school district should become thoroughly knowledgeable of the sex instruction program for their community and voice their support of their present programs or be just as vocal in requesting change when it is needed according to the dictates of a Christian conscience.

We commend the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention for producing the series of tracts entitled, "Issues and Answers." These tracts may be purchased from the Christian Life Commission, 460 James Robertson Parkway, Nashville, Tenn. 37219 at a nominal cost.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has endeavored to give impetus to this work by asking Joe L. Ingram, assistant executive secretary, to correlate the work of the Oklahoma Christian Life Committee and the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention and to make Christian Life resources available to Oklahoma Baptist churches. We commend to associations and churches the new tract (jointly prepared by Ingram and the Christian Life Commission), "The Christian Life Committee Guidebook."

54. The Resolutions Committee Report was presented as follows:

(1) Resolution No. I presented by J. P. Dane:

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists have always maintained a firm stand against the sale and use of beverage alcohol because of its destructive and corrupting influence in the state and community, and

WHEREAS, studies conducted by reputable research organizations as well as state commissions and several other agencies definitely indicate that liquor-by-the-drink brings an estimated 60 per cent increase in the sale of liquor to the area adopting such laws, and

WHEREAS, increased sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages within a given area will bring about an increased alcoholism ratio with its resultant increase in crime, delinquency and mental illness, and

WHEREAS, an initiative petition has been filed which seeks to legalize the sale of liquor-by-the-drink in hotels, motels, restaurants, bars, taverns, clubs, bowling alleys, airplanes, buses, etc., and

WHEREAS, the so called liquor-by-the-drink petition would weaken the alcohol control laws by:

1. Allowing beer taverns to remain open 24 hours a day,
2. Removing penalties against violations of beer laws,
3. Removing authority from local governing bodies to control closing hours of beer taverns,
4. Establishing a power-building franchise system in the already strong beer industry,
5. Permitting the advertizing of liquor,
6. Taking the power of taxation away from the state legislature as far as taxing of increasing taxes on alcoholic beverages,
7. Repealing the tax on liquor sold by the bottle in retail stores,
8. Removing all alcoholic beverages from being taxed by any present or future city or state sales tax,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma declare its opposition to this or any other attempt to legalize liquor-by-the-drink or loosen the controls on liquor sale and distribution, and

2. THAT we give encouragement and our full support to Sooner Alcohol Narcotics Education, Inc., and its director, Ross J. McLennan in the campaign to defeat the current endeavor to liberalize alcoholic beverage laws in general, and liquor-by-the-drink in particular, and

3. THAT we urge our churches to make sizeable and immediate contributions to the work of SANE so that emergency funds needed for this campaign will be available, and

4. THAT we urge our churches to maintain a perennial program of education in the areas of alcohol and narcotics use in order that these evils may not weaken our witness and that Baptists may continue to maintain a firm stand against them.

Motion carried to adopt.

(2) Resolution No. II presented by Bob Worley:

Inasmuch as the 1962 Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma adopted a statement of principles in reference to our position on the separation of church and state, and

WHEREAS, this statement was reaffirmed and reprinted in the 1968 convention annual, and

WHEREAS, in 1969 there is a continuous and growing threat to the principle of separation of church and state and religious liberty to all men as provided in the First Amendment of the Constitution,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT any trespass upon the freedoms established by the Constitution of the United States be met and opposed with firm conviction and practical actions.

BE IT RESOLVED, ALSO:

THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma express to Americans United for Separation of Church and State and the edi-

torial staff of the publication, **Report from the Capital**, our approval of, and our appreciation for their work in keeping important information available; and that we encourage every Baptist in Oklahoma to use this material in becoming better informed in the realm of church and state relations.

Motion carried to adopt.

(3) Resolution No. III presented by S. W. Keeton:

WHEREAS, there is a need for a strong Christian witness in these troubled times of immorality, and

WHEREAS, there is a need for moral responsibility in the communication media, both printed, visual and oral,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

That our convention commend the Oklahoma Publishing Company for refusing to accept advertising for "X" rated movies in their newspapers, the **Daily Oklahoman** and **Oklahoma City Times**, and on their WKY radio and television stations; and that we encourage other newspaper publishers and television and radio station owners to do the same.

Motion carried to adopt.

(4) Resolution No. IV presented by Clyde Riddle:

WHEREAS, the Scriptures set forth Sunday as a day of rest and worship, and

WHEREAS, the success and well being of the churches is greatly dependent upon the preservation of Sunday as a day for worship and church activity, and

WHEREAS, the rapidly increasing business practice of remaining open on the Lord's Day has resulted in Oklahoma remaining second only to Florida in the south and southwest in Sunday openings, and

WHEREAS, our sister states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Missouri, Mississippi, Kansas and Texas have enforceable Sunday closing bills that do not adversely affect their residence; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. THAT we urge the management of business houses in Oklahoma not related to necessary services, to keep their businesses closed on Sunday, and

2. THAT we urge members of our churches to refrain from unnecessary shopping on Sunday, and

3. THAT we urge our churches as a body and also individual members to express their protest to the business establishments which remain open on Sunday, and

4. THAT our convention and our local churches use every means at their disposal to encourage the membership of our churches to write letters to their State Representatives, sending copies to the Governor, Speaker of the House, and President Pro-Tempore of the Senate, asking them to protect our Sundays by passing necessary legislation opposing Sunday openings, permitting, of course, those whose day of worship is Saturday to have the option of remaining open

either Saturday or Sunday, and recognizing that certain necessary items could be excluded from the general law.

Motion carried to adopt.

(5) Resolution No. V presented by Eugene Enlow:

WHEREAS, H. Truman Maxey has been the director of the Department of Child Care for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and has been actively engaged in this work for 35 years, and is now retiring from this responsibility,

WHEREAS, he has diligently and faithfully served with an exemplary program of children's work,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma express its appreciation and cordial good wishes for Dr. and Mrs. Maxey.

Motion carried to adopt.

(6) Resolution No. VI presented by Dan Pruitt:

WHEREAS, J. A. Pennington has been the secretary of the Department of Evangelism for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and has given dynamic leadership to this work for 21½ years, and is now retiring from this responsibility,

WHEREAS, he served with great energy and dedication, and united our state in the concerns for evangelism:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma express its appreciation and fraternal best wishes to Dr. and Mrs. Pennington.

Motion carried to adopt.

(7) Resolution No. VII presented by Bob Woods:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT we express our gratitude to Herschel H. Hobbs and First Church, Oklahoma City, for the use of their beautiful building and for their gracious hospitality during the convention.

THAT we express our appreciation to the news staffs of the **Daily Oklahoman**, the **Oklahoma City Times**, the **Oklahoma Journal**, **Tulsa World**, **Tulsa Tribune**, the radio and television stations and all other news media for their outstanding coverage of the convention,

THAT we commend D. A. Williams Jr. for his dedicated service and fruitful leadership this past year, and that we express our gratitude to Memorial Church, Tulsa, for sharing its pastor so that he might render services across the state,

THAT we also express gratitude to all convention officers and to the program committee for their outstanding work this year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

THAT we express our appreciation to the agencies of our convention for the tremendous contribution they make to the life of our churches,

THAT we express appreciation to T. B. Lackey for his untiring leadership in all areas designed to strengthen our churches and to extend their witness.

Motion carried to adopt.

The convention's Board of Directors is the Governing Board of these hospitals and golden age home. Since it is impractical for this board to meet regularly in each institution, local Baptists are elected to serve as the Governing Board's Committees. The board is represented by one or more of its members on each committee. The executive secretary-treasurer or his representative and each hospital's administrator serve as ex-officio members.

Falls Creek Water System

The Convention's Building Committee, Falls Creek Committee and Stewardship Committee brought a joint recommendation that a water system as planned by C. H. Guernsey Engineering Company of Oklahoma City be constructed beginning Sept. 1, 1969. The estimated cost is \$150,000. In order to help finance this and other proj-

ects at Falls Creek Assembly, a fee of \$2 per bed per year with a minimum of \$25.00 is charged cabin owners. This was made effective Jan.-1, 1969.

Hospitals and Golden Age Homes

Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Enid:

1. A recommendation was made and approved:

A. That the convention's pledge to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital be a firm \$500,000 and that the hospital and citizens of Enid and Northwest Oklahoma continue to work toward the full \$1,000,000. By Dec. 31, 1968, the convention paid \$155,609.98. With an appropriation of \$30,000 in 1969 and \$30,000 in 1970, \$215,609.98 will be paid by the end of 1970. The convention's pledge to Baptist Memorial Hospital of \$500,000 will be paid by the end of 1970, except for \$5,572.85. If from these two sources \$75,000 could be appropriated in 1971, 1972 and 1973 and \$64,962.87 in 1974, the convention's pledge of \$500,000 will be met and reduce the appropriation for hospital expansion at the same time.

B. That in an effort to encourage and assist the Enid people that Baptist churches over the state be invited to receive an offering designated for this expansion on or near Mother's Day, May 11, 1969. Churches that give as much as \$1.00 per resident member will be listed on a plaque in the hospital lobby.

C. That a resolution be approved to grant authority to borrow up to \$1,200,000 in long-term financing and \$500,000 short-term financing against the unpaid pledges, and that a loan be secured for \$1,700,000, plus expenses required for securing the financing. Of this amount, \$500,000 will be repaid from pledges.

D. That the convention purchase the Doctors Medical Building, equipment and land adjacent to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital in Enid at a price of \$190,000, amortized over 15 years at 6 per cent interest, or in lieu thereof purchase all of the corporate stock of the corporation owning said property for the same purchase price. The owners have given and will continue to give liberal contributions to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital.

Hugo Golden Age Home:

1. A recommendation was made and approved:

A. That the Governing Board of the Hugo Golden Age Home be authorized to borrow approximately \$150,000 provided that the Governing Board determines that an addition should be made, and provided satisfactory arrangements can be made for borrowing the necessary funds and repaying same amount without subsidy from the convention.

B. That authority be given to the executive secretary-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to sell any or all stocks contributed for that purpose to institutions owned or operated by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Stillwater Municipal Hospital:

The convention entered into a 25-year lease agreement with the city of Stillwater for the operation of the hospital in 1952. We have enjoyed excellent working relations with the city officials, Baptist leaders and general public for more than 17 years. During this time 55,579 patients were admitted and 10,791 babies were born.

The hospital was constructed in 1939. Hospital buildings and equipment become obsolete quite rapidly; therefore, a new modern hospital is needed and the city of Stillwater desires to build a new facility. City leaders want Baptists to continue to operate the hospital after new facilities have been provided.

For two reasons, those charged with the responsibility of hospital operation feel it would be inadvisable for the convention to continue operating the hospital.

1. Only seven years remain in the lease agreement. By the time a new hospital is built, furnished, equipped and opened for operation not many years will be left for Baptists to serve.

2. The city desires to borrow all funds necessary for construction and requests that whoever operates the hospital meet the debt service from operating income.

It is the opinion of the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee, the Hospital's Governing Board and the administration that the convention should not assume this obligation.

The convention will be in position to phase out its operation by meeting all financial obligations, including proper consideration of long-term employees. After these responsibilities are met, the convention will be able to transfer to the city of Stillwater considerable assets including inventory, accounts receivable, equipment and cash.

Therefore, the Governing Board of Stillwater Municipal Hospital, the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee and the Board of Directors jointly agreed that the committee and the local Governing Board along with the administration be authorized to close out the operation at a time mutually agreed upon with officials of the city of Stillwater.

The convention has informed the city of Stillwater that the lease will be terminated not later than March 15, 1970. It appears that the transition may be made by Oct. 31, 1969.

The following resolution was passed by the Stillwater Board of Commissioners and sent to the convention as an expression of the city's appreciation:

WHEREAS, for the past 17 years, the Baptist Convention has operated and administered the Stillwater Municipal Hospital in an exemplary fashion; and

WHEREAS, the Baptist Convention in its role as administrator of the Stillwater Municipal Hospital has become a vital part of our history and progress; and

WHEREAS, this organization has encountered, lived with, and conquered many problems of operations; and

WHEREAS, as a result of unrelenting demands of change it has become desirable for the Baptist Convention to give notice of termination of operating the Stillwater Municipal Hospital.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF CITY COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF STILLWATER, OKLAHOMA, that the city of Stillwater express the great debt of gratitude owed to the Baptist Convention for their outstanding contribution to this community.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we pay tribute to the administration staff of the Stillwater Municipal Hospital who have never failed to give to the best of their ability at all times to all who have come requesting aid.

Annual Convention

The board approved a recommendation from the committee appointed to plan the program for the annual meeting that the permanent convention date be the week following the second Sunday in November, with sessions to begin Monday afternoon and close Wednesday noon, and that meeting places be alternated between Tulsa and Oklahoma City.

Guidelines for Falls Creek Buildings

Approval was made by the board regarding buildings at Falls Creek Assembly:

PURPOSE: The Falls Creek Building Committee feels that there is a desire on the part of Oklahoma Baptists to upgrade the camps and buildings of our assembly. Buildings at Falls Creek Assembly are covered by lease agreement between the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the church, or group, which builds at the assembly. However, as a service to those who plan to build, the committee has developed the following guidelines which will be helpful to any church or group planning a Falls Creek building.

BOUNDARY LINES: Before building construction is begun, proper boundary lines should be determined by the building committee in co-operation with the Falls Creek supervisor of grounds.

WALL CONSTRUCTION: The materials used in the construction of walls should be brick, rock, concrete block (or other block material or equivalent strength and durability), or steel. If it may seem feasible for some churches to use wood or other building materials not heretofore mentioned, this matter should be considered and approved by the Falls Creek Building Committee.

DINING AREA: The size of the dining area is determined on a basis of 10 or more square feet per person. Minimum need is 10 square feet per person and 12 square feet per person is desirable.

Ventilation—is a prime factor and the placement of louvers and possible exhaust fans for the best movement of air currents is vital to comfort, unless the dining area is completely air-conditioned.

Tables—8 to 10 feet long by 2½ feet wide are desirable.

Aisles—Ample aisle space between tables for easy traffic movement is essential.

KITCHEN AREA: A minimum of three square feet per person served may be the norm for determining the size of the kitchen area. This includes provision for ample refrigeration and four foot aisles between equipment and facilities.

Refrigeration—is tremendously important in preserving the good health of the camp. For preservation of milk and perishable foods, temperature of refrigeration must not exceed 50 degrees, and 40 degrees is preferable.

Dishwashing—The dishwashing area and proper provision for it is also a health feature. Camp authorities state that 1½ gallons of hot water per person per meal should be used. Water for dishwashing should reach a minimum of 120 degrees and when treated with a detergent or soap, sterilizing is assured.

Storage Area—Ample food storage area should be provided.

SLEEPING AREAS: 40 square feet of floor space per person is desirable in the sleeping areas. This includes space for sufficient shelving, clothes-hanging and drawer space for clothing and personal items. If double bunks are used, the space per person may be reduced to 30 square feet. Sleeping units should provide a minimum of 30 inches between beds.

SANITATION: The ratio of washroom fixtures to users will take into account the maximum number of users to be accommodated at the same time.

Faucets—one faucet for each 10 to 12 persons is needed. It is good to have faucets that mix hot and cold water in delivery.

Showers—one shower head is needed for each 10 to 15 persons. Other important appointments in the washroom include mirrors, electric outlets, towel dispensers, shelves and wooden pegs.

Toilets—one toilet seat for each 10 to 12 persons is needed for women; for men one seat is needed for each 12 to 15 persons, with a urinal for each 30.

SAFETY: Electrical wiring and plumbing for the use of gas should be planned by competent engineers. Short cuts in planning in these areas are dangerous. A garden hose of one inch diameter, connected to a similar size faucet on the outside of the building, might be the means of saving the building in case of a small fire. A fire extinguisher must be provided in every kitchen. An entrance in the front of the building and an exit to the rear is very necessary for

the protection of persons occupying the building. If sleeping quarters are on the second floor, a front and a rear stairway is a necessity for the safety of the occupants.

STATE HEALTH CODE: Churches and other groups building on the Falls Creek Assembly grounds must comply with the rules and regulations of the Oklahoma State Department of Health governing camps for religious, recreational, or educational purposes.

PARKING: Adequate provision should be made by each church, or group, for parking the number of cars necessary to the operation of the camp during the assembly.

45 degree parking requires approximately 370 square feet per car.

60 degree parking requires approximately 360 square feet per car.

90 degree parking requires approximately 325 square feet per car.

BUILDING PLANS: All building plans are to be approved by the Falls Creek Building Committee.

Camp Hudgens Unit Lodge

The board approved a recommendation brought by the Camp Hudgens Committee that a unit lodge be constructed at a cost of approximately \$15,000. Funds should be available from Cooperative Program allocations, Edna McMillan State Mission Offering, and pledges.

Baptist Building Parking

The convention has a 25 year contract with First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City for parking privileges, but it was pointed out that either the convention or the church can terminate this agreement with a 12 month notice. Due to the very limited parking facilities adjacent to the Baptist office building, there would be a very serious problem if the contract should ever be terminated.

A special committee appointed by the convention president brought the following resolution which was approved by the board:

That the executive office in consultation with the Parking Lot Committee be authorized to negotiate the purchase of the three lots east, across Robinson Street, from the Baptist building, at the lowest possible cost, with the best and most feasible financial arrangements available. This land includes the corner lot 75' X 140' deep, the lot to the south which is 50' X 140' deep with a building, and the adjacent lot still to the south which is also 50' X 140'.

Maxey and Pennington Retire

In the May 6 meeting of the board, H. Truman Maxey and J. A. Pennington announced their intentions to retire. Maxey will retire Dec. 31 and Pennington, Sept. 30. Both of these men have served the convention in an efficient and faithful way. Maxey will complete 35 years of service and Pennington will have served 21½ years.

Upon the recommendation of the president, the board approved the appointment of the Child Care Committee and Evangelism Committee to serve in their respective capacities to present nominations of successors for the two positions and that an appreciation dinner

be held in honor of the Maxeys and Penningtons on Tues., Nov. 11 at 5:00 p.m.

Oklahoma Baptists come to the retirement of these two faithful servants with mixed emotions. Perhaps our feelings can best be expressed in the following statements:

H. Truman Maxey

Congratulations to H. Truman Maxey who has been serving in the Child Care Department of our convention for 35 years. During that time, he has led in the modernizing of our Childrens' Home and our Boys Ranch Town, making them as fine as any in the nation. He has also become one of the leading authorities in the nation on child care, especially on problems coming from broken homes and deserted children.

Throughout these many busy years, this devoted man of God and his faithful companion have dedicated their hearts and lives to this service, which is filled with difficulties of a most delicate nature. They have made a vivid impression on all who have come to know them.

H. Truman Maxey has been a father to many a hurt child. In his big heart, there has been room for all of them. To see his large family of children crowd around him, and to sense his tender affection for them, is to remember how much our Lord loved little children.

We will miss the Maxeys. But they leave us after having "finished their course," with the love, affection and full confidence of Oklahoma Baptists. And the words that seem most appropriate as they go, are "Thank you; well done; and God bless you."

J. A. Pennington

Evangelism and Pennington have become almost synonymous words to Oklahoma Baptists. For 21½ years, J. A. Pennington has been the "voice crying in the wilderness," seeking to stir Baptists to greater effort in winning souls to Christ. In this effort he has become a man of honor, in the sight of his brethren.

The contest has been long; and it was a "strong conflict" which was given to him, but he has overcome. As he steps down after the days of fruitfulness as the Secretary of Evangelism and Brotherhood, he is worthy to be honored. We salute him today as one of the most generous and pleasant spirits ever to walk among us. No heart ever held lost men in such esteem. He loved those who stood in need of the gospel. His messages were strongly evangelistic and enriched by the power of the Holy Spirit. Only our Heavenly Father knows the number of people this good man has introduced to Christ.

Another battle-field always lay before him on which he could "fight the good fight." Tirelessly and prayerfully he vindicated his right to preach the gospel. His voice was heard in conference across the nation. His messages rang out on the streets, in brush arbors, in the church houses and homes wherever there was opportunity to

proclaim the gospel. His faithful companion, though often ill, encouraged him in his efforts to stir the hearts of men for Christ.

Honorable in his ministry and accomplished in his work, this able man will be missed by Oklahoma Baptists. But as he leaves the department, it is with the respect and love of Oklahoma Baptists. May he hear the Master say, "Thou hast been faithful . . ." We say, "God bless you Doctor and Mrs. Pennington as you retire to greater things."

Jerold McBride

In a called meeting of the board, upon the unanimous recommendation of the Evangelism Committee, Jerold McBride was unanimously and enthusiastically elected to be secretary of the Department of Evangelism. Coming from Texas, McBride served First Church, Chickasha as pastor and then for five years as pastor of First Church, Ponca City prior to his new election. He holds a Doctor of Theology degree from Southwestern Seminary. A letter from Kay Association is typical of many expressions regarding McBride:

"I am writing you in behalf of the Kay Association. We write you and the Baptists of Oklahoma to say that it has been a great pleasure to have Jerold McBride in our association. He has lent strength to our work here, and it is knowing that after much prayer that he has decided to accept the post of Evangelism Secretary of Oklahoma.

"McBride's work here has been recognized by all of our churches, and we feel a great loss at his leaving but know that the Lord would have his way in this matter.

"I know that you will express to the denominational workers in Oklahoma City our love and appreciation for this man and his work. We hope and pray that the same kind of leadership and dedication will be shown as he assumes his new duties."

Public Relations

The Public Relations office is constructively working at the job of telling the story of Baptist work in Oklahoma. Continuous activities include providing newspapers, radio and television stations and wire services with comprehensive and objective information concerning all major convention meetings and speaking engagements of convention personnel. "Oklahoma Newsbreak" continues to be produced by the office and is heard over 15 Oklahoma radio stations.

Joe L. Ingram, assistant executive secretary, serves as director of Public Relations and is ably assisted by Dana Williamson, news-writer, and Margaret Lackey, office secretary.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation

The Baptist Laymen's Corporation is composed of 30 laymen from 16 Baptist churches in the Oklahoma City area. Their names are recorded elsewhere in this report. Haskell Harris is president.

The Corporation owns and operates the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes composed of 20 apartments and the Lackey Manor

Nursing Home with 109 beds. All apartments are filled and about 80 of the beds in the nursing home are occupied. There are, no doubt, many Baptist friends over the state who would like to live in a fine home such as this. Any member of the Corporation would welcome the opportunity to talk with older people and their relatives who are interested in participating in this marvelous facility.

Oklahoma State Board of Health recently made a survey and presented the home a Certificate of Classification with a rating of TYPE I. The rating is based on a maximum of 1,000 grading points and the home earned 987. This indicated that ours is one of the best in the state of Oklahoma.

The Laymen's Corporation has arranged with the administration of Baptist Memorial Hospital to operate the home under their direction.

Stewardship and Cooperative Program

Since 1925 Southern Baptists have used a vehicle called the Cooperative Program to sustain World Missions — to the tune of more than \$50,000,000. Oklahoma Baptists have stood by the Cooperative Program as the main channel of mission expression.

In 1962, Oklahoma Baptists adopted a 12 year program of Cooperative Program mission advance. This successful venture was modified at a special convention held in Shawnee, May 19, 1967. The plan provided for increasing the 1967 budget from \$3,125,000 to \$3,500,000 in 1968 and increasing the budget \$100,000 each year through 1972, with the stipulation that the convention make necessary adjustments year by year. If the total budget should be reached for the five year period, Oklahoma Baptist University would receive a total of \$3,781,777.50 and Baptist Student Union work \$950,252.50. If adopted, the 1970 budget will provide \$390,794 in advance funds — \$293,095.50 for OBU and \$97,698.50 for BSU work. It will also increase giving to Southern Baptist Convention causes from \$1,396,555.72 to \$1,422,959.23.

To accomplish these challenging 1970 objectives, the following promotional plans are projected:

In 1968 the Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma received \$5,811,648 and disbursed \$5,700,152. Combined volume in receipts and disbursements increased nearly 7 per cent over 1967.

Cooperative Program receipts were about \$182,000 more in 1968 than 1967.

Administrative costs increased in 1968, but the per dollar cost of administering funds received, decreased from 3.22 cents in 1967 to 3.13 cents in 1968. The Executive Office continues to perform an excellent service for Oklahoma Baptists in accounting for the receipt and disbursement of Baptist funds for Christian ministries.

Thus if approved, Article II, Section 1 of the Constitution would read: "This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention. These churches shall be affiliated and be in good standing with one of the associations of churches which co-operates with and is recognized by the convention."

56. T. Hollis Epton made the following motion concerning Section IX:

"I move that the recommendation of the Board of Directors regarding a Constitutional change of Article II, Section I, be referred to the Board of Directors for further consideration."

Motion carried to adopt.

57. Motion carried to adopt the full report of the Board of Directors with the referral of recommendation IX back to the Board of Directors.

Supplement to Report of the Board of Directors

Since the report of the Board of Directors went to press, there have been two called meetings of the Board of Directors to consider recommendations of the Child Care Committee relative to the executive director of the Department of Child Care.

The first meeting was held on October 23 at which time Forrest Siler, pastor of First Baptist Church, Lawton was elected. Wednesday,

October 29, Siler informed the chairman of the committee that he had a conviction that he should not accept the call of the board.

The committee went to work immediately in an effort to find God's man for this important position. After much prayer and many conferences, the committee reported that it was ready to offer a recommendation.

Another called meeting was held on November 7 and Dr. Lowell Milburn, pastor of First Baptist Church, Shawnee was elected.

Dr. Milburn has had 27 years of pastoral experience and has served effectively for 13½ years as pastor of First Church, Shawnee. He is a graduate of Baylor University, attended two years at Southern Seminary in Louisville, Ky. and graduated from Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth. For the past year he has served as first vice-president of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Dr. and Mrs. Milburn have three children, a married daughter in Waco, Texas, a son in college at East Central State in Ada, and a son at home.

58. T. B. Lackey called attention to the report on Church Building and Fund Raising.

Church Building and Fund Raising

During the past year I have worked with 91 Oklahoma churches in making a survey of building needs. In some instances complete new buildings were to be erected; however, in most instances an addition was being made to existing buildings. On several occasions my services to the church was in the nature of a restudy of educational facilities to determine what changes, if any, needed to be made to comply with the new grouping and grading program of Southern Baptists.

As church building consultant for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, I am looking forward during the first year of the 70's to the privilege of making this kind of study with many churches in our state. For some churches the change in grouping and grading will be easy but in many churches an adjustment in the educational building will be tremendously important. Let us remember that this change in grouping and grading is not simply a Sunday School Board plan, but a Southern Baptist Convention plan which will include the work of the Sunday school, Training Union, WMU, Brotherhood and music. Since church programs must conform in some degree to the church buildings, it is necessary that we have buildings which will implement our church programs.

It has been my privilege to supply the pulpit on Sunday for 31 churches in our state and to lead Sunday school enlargement campaigns with Highland Church, Lubbock, Texas; First Church, Borger, Texas and First Church, West Monroe, La.; also, in an associational-wide campaign with the East Bay Association in California. During the Crusade of the Americas I had the privilege of working in revival with Mayfair Church, Oklahoma City.

April 28-30, Ernest B. Myers, church building consultant with the Church Architecture Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board, was in Oklahoma for a church building tour, and he returned on Sept. 8-10 for a second tour. We deeply appreciate the tremendous contribution made to Oklahoma churches by the Church Architecture Department.

The Church Architecture Department seeks to serve the churches through conferences, visits and consultations. After studying a situation, if desired, the department will make a floor plan layout and furnish sketches for either a new building or for remodeling and enlargement of an existing building. They can also be helpful in a study of building location, design, furnishing and equipment.

On Feb. 6-7 of this year, a Church Building Fund-Raising Workshop was held under the direction of James V. Lackey of the Stewardship Commission in Nashville, at which 57 clinicians from over Oklahoma were led by Lackey and John Alexander of Mississippi, in a study of a new church building fund-raising plan which was developed largely through the work of Lackey. Soon after this clinic the Del City Church used this plan under the direction of Lackey, seeking to raise \$600,000 in pledges for a new church auditorium and actually almost \$700,000 was pledged.

As fund-raising consultant for our convention, I am available to pastors and fund-raising committees in the churches to interpret the Church Building Fund-Raising Program which has been developed by the Stewardship Commission.

D. Brad Allen, pastor of Central Church, Lawton, nominated Forrest Siler, pastor of First Church, Lawton.

E. J. P. Dane was elected president, having received a majority of all votes cast.

(2) First vice-president

A. Richard Hopper, pastor of First Church, Ardmore, nominated Fred Willhoite, pastor of Council Road Church, Oklahoma City.

B. John Sullivan, pastor of Prairie View Church, Beckham-Mills Association, nominated Bob Denny, pastor of First Church, Elk City.

C. Bob Denny was elected first vice-president.

(3) Second vice-president

A. T. T. Crabtree, pastor of Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City, nominated Fred Willhoite.

B. There were no other nominations. A motion carried to elect Fred Willhoite by acclamation.

(4) Recording Secretary

A. J. P. Dane, pastor of Portland Avenue Church, Oklahoma City, made a motion that the assistant recording secretary be asked to cast the ballot for Hale A. Dixon, pastor of First Church, Woodward, as recording secretary. Motion carried.

(5) Assistant Recording Secretary

A. Hugo Lindquist, pastor, Bethel Church, Oklahoma City, made a motion that the recording secretary be asked to cast the ballot for Eugene Thomas, pastor of Highland Hills Church, Oklahoma City, as assistant recording secretary. Motion carried.

(6) Historical Secretary

A. Forrest Jackson, pastor, First Church, Pryor, made a motion that the recording secretary be asked to cast the ballot for J. M. Gas-kin, pastor of First Church, Durant, as historical secretary. Motion carried.

61. Hugo Lindquist, pastor, Bethel Church, Oklahoma City, made a motion to amend Article 6, Section 2, of the Constitution by adding the following to paragraph one:

"That as a guideline to achieve equitable representation for each of the associations in the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma geographical area, that the Nominating Committee shall present at least one nominee from each association and that the additional members of the Board of Directors shall be determined on the basis of one additional member for each 10,000 members, but that there not be more than eight members for any association."

Since Article X provides that any change to the constitution must have two-thirds vote of those present at any regular annual meeting provided that the proposed amendment is submitted in writing one year before action is taken or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper, the motion was referred for further action.

62. D. A. Williams Jr. led in a closing prayer.

The convention stood adjourned until Wednesday evening 6:30 p.m.

Wednesday Evening November 12, 1969

63. Pre-session music was presented by Gene Bartlett.

(1) He led the convention in singing "How Firm a Foundation," "Love Is the Theme," and "Grace Greater Than All Our Sins."

(2) The Chapel Hand-bell Choir of First Church, Oklahoma City under the direction of Mrs. Clifton Danner, presented several special numbers.

(3) Gene Bartlett sang the following solos to close out the pre-session music:

"I Can Never Thank My God Enough," "God's Love Sustains Me," "Where Can I Go," "Grace So Amazing."

64. President D. A. Williams Jr. called the convention to order at 6:30 p.m.

65. Lin Jones, pastor, Gracemont Church, Tulsa, read the Scripture and led in prayer.

66. Mrs. Charles Boldin presented the report of Home Missions.

Home Missions

"The Church Fulfilling Its Mission Through Evangelism and World Missions" has been the theme of this climactic year for majoring on evangelism and missions. The Crusade of the Americas involved 10 million people with over 40 co-operating Baptist bodies. PACT, a prayer partner agreement, was an international project enlisting Christians in various parts of the lands and throughout the hemisphere in prayer for the Crusade. The Home Mission Board financed a nationwide color telecast to coincide with the March-April revivals. More than 2,000 viewers requested the packet of materials furnished free by our evangelism department. During the Christmas holidays of 1969 a Youth Missions Conference will be held in Atlanta which will challenge youth with world opportunities.

Since adoption of the crisis statement by Southern Baptists, the Home Mission Board has pressed forward on every front with its traditional emphasis on evangelism and missions plus meaningful involvement and application of the gospel message to every area of human life.

LANGUAGE MISSIONS—The program of language missions relates to over 30 million people identified with one of 17 major ethnic or cultural minorities. One of the new directions in language missions is the appointment of laymen as pastors, however, our board is still providing major assistance in appointment of mission pastors, as well as aiding in the building of churches and missions. Important to any outreach of any language culture group is a willingness to communicate an openness to either welcome them into an existing fellowship or to help them establish their own worship forms and language. Twenty-four thousand, eight hundred and thirty-nine professions of faith were reported last year through this ministry.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES—The basic objective of this work is to help people help themselves and to provide a context in which they can have a redemptive experience with Christ. The five major areas of service include Baptist centers, weekday ministries, literacy, migrant missions and liaison and consultant work with the 31 Baptist children's homes. Rehabilitation work with the ex-prison-

ers, drug addicts, and alcoholics are now under development. Last year over 15,000 professions of faith were reported through the work of 323 missionaries in this program.

CHAPLAINCY—This is Southern Baptists' oldest mission effort, having been implemented 190 years ago with the military chaplains. The newest direction in chaplaincy, however, encompasses a greater outreach through use of institutional and industrial chaplains. Some are referred to as "chaplains of the market place" as they mingle among the people of the large shopping centers. Some 1,300 of the 1,700 Southern Baptist chaplains are militarily related and about 100 of these are currently serving in Vietnam.

NATIONAL BAPTISTS—In addition to encouraging co-operation between Southern Baptists and National Baptists, the Home Mission Board's stated objective now is "to prepare Southern Baptists at all levels of personal and church life to minister to Negroes the same way they minister to other people." The trend toward multiracial members in our convention is underway. Scholarships to ministerial students numbered 150 last year. National and Southern Baptists have the potential not only to help stem the tide of black and white racism in this country, but to help chart the course of Christian relations between the races of the U.S. and the world.

ANNIE ARMSTRONG EASTER OFFERING—This offering ran to a 15 per cent increase over the previous year. The goal of \$6,500,000 was allocated to assist in supplying 675 college students for summer missions, 65 college graduates as US-2 Missionaries, as well as give assistance to churches and communities affected by major disasters. This offering also provides mission buildings, scholarship funds for children of missionaries and helps support the force of over 2,300 regular missionaries now under appointment.

PROJECT 500—1969 climaxes a two-year effort to establish 500 new churches in strategic locations. In the March report the effort had slowed because of inadequate financing. The \$1,500,000 allocated from this year's offering would see this project carried to completion.

Dr. Rutledge summarizes home mission work by stating "evangelism and social ministries are the opposite side of the coin of genuine Christian love and witness, with concern for spiritual values dominant. Hopefully Southern Baptists are moving into our greatest years of evangelism as we add a vastly increased witness by loving deed to our continued witness by faithful word."

67. The motion carried to adopt the report.

68. Richard Moody presented the report of Foreign Missions.

Foreign Missions

On May 1, 1969, Southern Baptist missionaries were at work in 67 geographical or political entities and were under appointment to three more (Dahomey, Egypt, Senegal). During 1968, missionaries went to live in Angola, Botswana, Iran, and South West Africa. The board no longer has work in Iceland.

The 67 countries include: Angola, Argentina, Austria, Bahamas, Belgium, Bermuda, Botswana, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Ethiopia, France, French West Indies, Gaza, Germany, Ghana, Guam, Guatemala, Guyana, Honduras, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Iran, Israel, Italy, Ivory Coast, Jamaica, Japan, Jordan, Kenya, Korea, Lebanon, Liberia, Libya, Macao, Malawi, Malaysia, Mexico, Morocco, Nigeria, Okinawa, Pakistan, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Rhodesia, Singapore, South West Africa, Spain, Switzerland (Baptist Center), Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Togo, Trinidad, Turkey, Uganda, Uruguay, Venezuela, Vietnam, Yemen, and Zambia.

At the close of 1968 the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board had an overseas missionary staff of 2,371. This included 119 missionary associates, three special project medical personnel, and 122 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 247 (131 career, 38 associates, 69 journeymen, three special project people, and six career reappointments). Between January and May, 1969, 107 more were added, 76 of them journeymen.

As of Aug. 1, 1969, the Foreign Mission Board overseas staff totaled 2,445, including 2,167 career missionaries, 145 missionary associates, 129 missionary journeymen, and four special project medical missionaries under appointment to 70 countries.

Even with the additional personnel (the largest number in any year thus far), several hundred calls for missionaries are still unanswered.

The ultimate purpose underlying all our missionary endeavors is the leading of people to new life in Jesus Christ and the cultivation of New Testament churches. At the year's end, reports from the Missions (organizations of Southern Baptist missionaries) totaled 5,154 churches (3,672 self-supporting), 6,974 mission points, and 4,413 national pastors. Also reported were 50,003 baptisms, 611,470 church members, and 538,304 enrolled in Sunday school. Mainland China, closed to missionaries since 1951, was last estimated as having 392 churches, with 123,000 members, related to Southern Baptist mission work.

The Foreign Mission Board shared in major evangelistic campaigns in France, Germany, Italy, the Philippines, and Rhodesia. The first converts to result from French-language work in West Africa were baptized in Ivory Coast and Togo.

Baptist radio and television outreach continues to expand. A television workshop in Costa Rica brought together representatives

from six countries. European Baptists held a similar conference in England. Radio broadcasts developed in Portugal, Uruguay, Italy, and Taiwan.

The 837 schools (in 43 countries) with which our missionaries are related enrolled 87,597 students and were staffed by 3,497 national and 437 missionary teachers and administrators. Among the schools were 46 theological institutions having 1,894 students, and nine women's training schools with 832 enrolled.

The seminary in Vietnam was in its first year of operation in 1968. An addition was built for the Bible School at Greenville, Liberia. In Italy a linguistic school began on the Baptist seminary campus. A youth center for national and foreign students opened in Austria.

Literature in the language of the people becomes increasingly important on mission fields. Rising literacy rates give book stores and reading rooms unprecedented opportunity to confront multitudes with the Christian message.

Twenty-seven publication centers overseas and at El Paso, Texas, produced over 24 million pieces: tracts, books, periodicals, Bibles, hymn books. Staffing these centers were 67 missionaries and 578 nationals.

Correspondence courses in Bible and Christian leadership training were having remarkable outreach. Indonesian Baptists held a writers' workshop during the year. New facilities for publication work were opened in the Philippines.

The Commission, foreign missions journal of the board, reported an average monthly circulation of 84,760 in 1968.

Medical institutions included 21 hospitals and 83 clinics and dispensaries, with a total of 1,582 beds. In 1968, 208 national and 56 missionary physicians served with 424 national and 63 missionary nurses. They treated 47,586 inpatients and cared for 631,977 outpatients. Engaged additionally in the medical ministry were 1,108 nationals and 41 missionaries.

The new Wallace Memorial Hospital building was dedicated in Korea; second-floor facilities were opened at the hospital in Mexico; a clinic was reopened in Jordan. The new hospital in Yemen was dedicated, and a community development program (including health centers) began in Ethiopia.

To meet urgent needs for relief of human suffering in Nigeria, Vietnam, and other countries, the Foreign Mission Board provided emergency funds totaling \$98,233.82.

Twenty-four good will and community centers in 11 countries reached people in varied ways: literacy classes, homemaking courses, Bible study clubs, and evangelistic services. Staffed by 38 missionaries and 132 nationals, these centers enrolled 10,779 children and adults. Two missionaries assisted 99 national workers in caring for 800 boys and girls in 16 children's homes.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$29,745,692 as 1968 closed (an increase of 5.16 per cent over 1967). The 1968 Lottie Moon Christmas offering had reached a total of \$15,159,206.92 by May 1, 1969.

The percentage of the total gifts of Southern Baptists used in the local churches for 1968 was 83.9 per cent. The remaining 16.1 per cent goes for all mission causes. Per capita gift of Southern Baptists for all mission causes was \$11.30. Percentage of the total gifts to foreign missions was 3.74 per cent and the per capita gift to foreign missions \$2.62.

In 1968 the cost of the Foreign Mission Board program was \$31,785,568.61. The percentage of total operation costs were as follows: home expenses 6.02 per cent, promotional expense for home cultivation 2.08 per cent and foreign fields expenditures 91.90 per cent.

Financial needs continue to be beyond resources made available by Southern Baptists. Land, buildings, and equipment—several million dollars' worth—are urgently needed in mission fields.

The Mission Board continues to press forward toward the objective of 5,000 missionaries at the earliest possible date with full confidence that Southern Baptists will continue to provide the necessary funds through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

Baker J. Cauthen, executive secretary, emphasizes the great need of prayer: "Most of all, the board requests that Southern Baptists undergird the cause of missions at all times in intercessory prayer. Remember that God's servants in disturbed areas such as Vietnam, Eastern Nigeria, and the Middle East continue to serve with remarkable stability, patience, faith, and courage. The hearts of God's servants wherever they labor throughout the world rejoice as they know that they are being remembered at the throne of grace in churches and homes and by individuals throughout this land."

(1) A panel composed of Joe L. Ingram, Lyle Garlow, Bill Haggard, Abbie Louise Green, Bob Banks and Gene Bartlett discussed various phases of the program "Shaping the Seventies" as it related to their departments of work in the convention.

Woman's Missionary Union

"A Church Fulfilling Its Mission Through Evangelism and World Missions" was carried out by Woman's Missionary Union work in all phases of its program during the year 1968-69.

Educating Youth in Missions

The youth work in Woman's Missionary Union is under the direction of Ida Mae Hays, Young Woman's Auxiliary director and Marie Faircloth, Girls' Auxiliary director. The Sunbeam Band work is also directed by this office.

The YWA Convention was held Oct. 20-21 at Oklahoma Baptist University. The theme, "To Know Him . . . To Make Him Known" was used. Missionary speakers were Roger Duck, Foreign Mission Board; Phyllis Ragan, Kansas City, Mo., and Jaxie Short, Hong Kong. Leona Smith, Duncan, was chosen Miss YWA of 1969. Registration was 454.

The YWA Retreats were held at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha, May 2-4 and May 9-11. The theme was "The Master . . . Callesth for Thee." Missionary speakers were Mrs. Claudio Iglesias, Newkirk; Pat Meador, Purcell; Mrs. Rondal Merrell, Vietnam; Mrs. Marvin Sorrels, Muskogee, and Rafael Venegas, Fort Worth, Texas.

Two chartered busses took girls and leaders to the YWA Conference, Glorieta, N.M. Many others traveled to Glorieta by car.

Two Intermediate Girls' Auxiliary Conferences were held at Oklahoma Baptist University Feb. 21-22 and March 28-29 with 857 girls attending. Missionary speakers were Rafael Venegas, US-2 missions; Mrs. Rondal Merrell, Vietnam; Janet Brooks, summer missions, and James Hampton, Tanzania. The theme for the conferences was "Committed to Christ . . . Commissioned to Serve."

The seven Girls' Auxiliary camps held this summer at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha had 1,287 girls attending. Missionary speakers were Anna Keelin, Virginia; Mrs. Ernest Day, New Mexico; Mr. and Mrs. Theo Patnaik, California; Mrs. Don Jones, Korea; Mrs. Anita Aycox, Oklahoma City; Pat Meador, Purcell; Mrs. Charley Westbrook, Argentina; Lucy Smith, Hong Kong, and Mrs. Ralph Rummage, Rhodesia.

Falls Creek Assemblies

Each year missionaries are secured to teach mission classes at Falls Creek Assembly. Woman's Missionary Union provides scholarships through the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions for girls attending a Southern Baptist Seminary, one sophomore student majoring in nursing at Oklahoma Baptist University, one student nurse at Enid General Hospital and one student nurse at Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City. Scholarships were granted to three girls attending Southwestern Seminary and two girls attending Southern Seminary.

Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of Woman's Missionary Union was held at First Church, Tulsa. The theme for the meeting was "Christ, Our Hope . . . The World, Our Responsibility." Home missionaries serving in Oklahoma presented state missions. Robert Tremaine, Massachusetts, was the home missionary speaker. Foreign Missionary speakers were Jesse Fletcher, Foreign Mission Board; Dorene Hawkins, Brazil; Jaxie Short, Hong Kong; Mrs. Avery Willis Jr., Indonesia, and Lucy Smith, Hong Kong. Betty Jo Corum, director of editorial services, represented Woman's Missionary Union, SBC.

Special Offerings

Woman's Missionary Union promotes three mission offerings each year: Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions. The 1968 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$585,235.75. The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering received by October 3 was \$167,085.59. As of October 3 the Edna McMillan Offering had reached \$44,092.73.

Writers of the program material for the State Mission Season of Prayer were Laddie Adams, Woman's Missionary Society and Baptist Men; Mrs. A. L. Karcher, Young Woman's Auxiliary; Baptist Young Men and Ambassadors; Mrs. M. D. Ganote, Girls' Auxiliary and Royal Ambassador, and Mrs. Carl Stringer, Sunbeam Band. The theme for the program was "Declare . . . His Wonders Among the People" (Psalm 96:3). The 1969 goal is \$84,000.00.

Religious Education

The Department of Religious Education continues to assist the churches in planning, conducting, and evaluating two major programs—Sunday school and Training Union. In addition, our department provides consultative and resource services in several areas including: Church Administration, Church Library, Church Recreation, Family Ministry, Vocational Guidance, Audiovisual Education, Vacation Bible School, Weekday Bible Study, Kindergarten, and Day-Care Program.

Responsibility for developing the program for Falls Creek Baptist Assembly is assigned to the department. This year marked the beginning of an annual "Special Teaching Citation" being awarded to faculty members who serve without remuneration. Perhaps the

best opportunity pastors and others have to span the generation gap is through attendance and service to youth at Falls Creek.

Personnel in the department, other than the secretary who also directs the Sunday school work, include, Bill C. Haggard, associate secretary and director of Training Union work; Hugh E. Willoby, director of youth and Vacation Bible School work; Miss Alga Motychak, director of preschool and children's work; Mrs. Herb Collins, administrative secretary; Mrs. Gerald Jennings, secretary to Haggard; Mrs. Roberta Peck, receptionist and Mrs. Hugh Harrell, our newest secretary.

Crusade of the Americas

The department was vitally involved in the Crusade with the promotion of the Statewide Census, the YES-U Sunday School Enrolment Emphasis, and the Church Outreach Workshops in each association. In addition to these three Sunday school preparation projects, there were two Training Union projects designed and directed by Haggard to conserve the results of the crusade revivals. New Member Orientation Clinics were conducted in 21 associations and 14 associations conducted Training Union Enlargement Projects.

Shaping the Seventies

Considerable time and effort has been given to planning for the seventies. The next 12 months will demand the priority time of the staff in field projects designed to interpret the changes in curriculum, grouping/grading, organization and methods. The report of the State CPP Committee will list details of the dates and projects.

Our major concern is to assist the church leaders in understanding these changes. A word of CAUTION must be given to NOT REDUCE THE NUMBER OF WORKING UNITS and LEADERS in either Sunday school or Training Union when making the adjustments. GROWTH still comes in proportion to the number of working units and leaders.

LAUNCHING THE SEVENTIES IN SEVENTY DAYS is a plan developed in Oklahoma and adopted by the Sunday School Board for use throughout the convention, Sept. 12-Nov. 21, 1970. A successful launch that reaches and wins people will mark Oct. 2, 1970, as a great day in Baptist history. The 70/70 Launch begins with a week of visitation to all Sunday school pupils and prospects to deliver the new curriculum pieces. This is followed by Leadership Preparation Week, Promotion Day on Sept. 27, and a HIGH ATTENDANCE DAY on Oct. 4, 1970 with recognition and dedication of workers. A six week OUTREACH VISITATION-ENROLMENT EMPHASIS concluding the last week with an emphasis on witnessing through visitation and/or revival closes the 70/70 Launch. Special guidance and promotional materials will be provided for the 70/70 Launch, including charts, registration cards, etc., for both the High Attendance Day and the Enrolment Emphasis.

Success in this program will provide growth, motivation, and enthusiasm for all programs and emphases being projected for the seventies.

Sunday School Statistics

Sunday school enrolment for the past year totaled 326,578, a decline of 1,588. Vacation Bible School enrolment was 128,520 in 1,020 reported schools with 1,751 professions of faith reported. On Aug. 31, 1969, Oklahoma Sunday schools led the SBC states in total units of recognition (795) on the Achievement Guides.

Training Union Statistics

Training Union enrolment reached 127,733 in both continuous and short-term training in 1,093 churches. "M" Night attendance totaled 15,246 with 707 churches represented with 652 pastors and 581 directors in attendance. Eleven associations had participants in the State Drills and Tournament. Four State Regional Training Union Conventions were conducted Oct. 13, 14, 16 and 17, 1969 at Pryor, McAlester, Lawton, and Woodward.

Brotherhood

The Brotherhood Department has the responsibility of promoting and assisting churches and associations in a mission education program for men and boys. In addition to this, the department administers in the development, use, and program of Camp Hudgens, located near McAlester. The department is seeking to coordinate its efforts in mission education and mission action with the convention's WMU and Missions departments.

Statistical Report

Preliminary reports reveal that in Oklahoma churches we have 446 Baptist Men's units, 15 Baptist Young Men's units, and 874 Royal Ambassador chapters in 475 churches.

Under the direction of Henry Chennault, associate secretary, three area training sessions were held over the state at Southwest Assembly, Disney Assembly, and Camp Hudgens. In the fall of 1968, 190 associational officers and church Brotherhood leaders attended the three sessions. In other areas of leadership training, associational and church officers in nearly all associations received instruction from trained specialists.

Three area training sessions were held again in 1969. At Southwest Assembly, Disney Assembly, and Camp Hudgens the curriculum was enlarged to include study in some of the new mission action group guides; the guides were selected to fit particular needs in each area of the state.

The state RA Congress met at the Civic Center in Muskogee with 1,704 boys and adult leaders present. Officers elected were president, Jimmy Adair, Norman; vice-president, Terrell Gurley, Oklahoma City; and secretary, David Searcey, Norman.

1970 Refinements

In October 1970, the Brotherhood program, along with other church program organizations, will enter into a new grouping-grading plan. Coming out of the new plan will be some refinements in organization and materials. The main thrust of Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors will continue to be mission and ministry-missionary education.

Very few refinements are being made in Baptist Men's work. The Baptist Young Men will become a part of Baptist Men and the Mission Action Leader will become the Mission Activities Leader.

The Royal Ambassador program will be enlarged and somewhat changed. The WMU has requested that the Brotherhood assume the responsibility of the 6-7-8 year old boys, and they will become a part of the Crusader RAs. The state WMU and Brotherhood Departments are urging churches to provide a program for the 6-7-8 year olds and that the WMU continue to work with these boys until such is done. The Crusader RAs will include boys in grades 1-6, and the Pioneers will include boys in grades 7-12.

The Brotherhood Department will seek to interpret program refinements and train leaders as a part of the "Shaping the 70's" program beginning January 1970.

Camp Hudgens Report

The six weeks of state RA camp provided for 718 resident campers and staff and 83 day campers and staff, totaling 801 in the regular summer program. Of those attending, 40 made professions of faith, 35 rededicated their lives, and 26 surrendered to church-related vocations.

The facilities at Camp Hudgens are heated and, therefore, can be used throughout the year. During the off-season, 35 groups used the camp for retreats and other purposes.

Improvement in facilities included the construction of two winterized cabins at a total cost of \$10,978.12 making five modern cabins at the camp and completing the sleeping facilities for the younger campers. Two hogans were purchased and made possible separate provision for Ambassador age boys. A lodge is to be built for the cabin unit this winter. The lodge is to provide for unit meetings, quarters for unit staff, kitchen for refreshments and for small group meals in the off-season, and complete facilities for family or small groups the year-round.

2. Associational music leadership conferences designed to assist the part-time and volunteer music directors especially. We also assist in the organization of children's choirs and the training of their leaders.

3. Youth Music Workshops and Choir Directors' Retreats.

4. Youth and Junior Choir Festivals.

5. Falls Creek music and music for the various state conventions and conferences.

Shaping the 70's is one of the great Southern Baptist happenings of the century. Church music methods and materials will be better

Annuity Board

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has rendered more than a half century of service to Southern Baptist churches, agencies and institutions. Being one of the denomination's four major boards, it is entirely owned, controlled and operated by the Southern Baptist Convention.

As of June 30, 1969, the Annuity Board had assets in excess of \$220 million. These funds are reserves to help pay accrued pension benefits for more than 30 thousand persons. The Annuity Board does not own these funds, but is trustee for them. The funds belong to the individuals conventions, agencies, etc. who have deposited them. The Annuity Board only administers and invests such funds. Investment earnings of \$9 million were added last year.

During its 51 years of service, the Board has paid benefits totaling more than \$66.4 million. Of this amount, \$8.7 million was relief grants and the remaining \$57.7 million paid in various retirement benefits.

In 1968, retirement benefits were paid to 6,461 persons totaling \$6,369,306. An additional \$173,863 was paid to 501 relief recipients from Cooperative Program funds allocated by the Southern Baptist Convention for this purpose.

Approximately \$3.3 million was paid in claims under the Health Benefit Plan, with a total of \$7 million benefits paid to Dec. 31, 1968. Membership in the plan as of Dec. 31, 1968, was 15,521.

Death claims totaling \$544,824 were paid to 47 claimants in the Life Benefit and Group Life Plan, bringing the total insurance benefits paid as of Dec. 31, 1968, to \$1.4 million. More than 14,000 persons have life coverage in these plans.

On Oct. 1, 1969, a new Group Life Insurance Plan began. It succeeds the Life Benefit Plan which has been offered since 1964. Members in LBP will have the option of remaining in the older plan or transferring to the new Group Plan.

Two benefit schedules are offered in the new plan. The first parallels coverage offered by LBP, except it does not decrease until age 65. The second provides benefits from \$5,000 to \$60,000, depending on the participants annual earnings. Both schedules include provisions for accidental death and dismemberment; continuation of some coverage after age 65; dependent life insurance benefits for spouse and all children, ages 14 days to 23 years, except those residing in Texas where insurance laws preclude the offering of such coverage; and Long Term Disability Income Protection, paying 60 per cent of the participant's monthly earnings (70 per cent if dependent Social Security is involved) to age 65 with \$1,000 a month maximum.

Any minister or church related employee may join the Group Insurance Plan when it initially opens without a medical examination or other evidence of good health.

Two areas of development and growth are especially important:

1. Churches now participating need to increase their coverage by paying 10 per cent on total compensation. This will provide larger benefits to meet inflated retirement needs.

2. Churches not participating should enrol now. The Southern Baptist Protection Program will be needed in addition to Social Security or other private plans to provide adequately for all life situations.

As of Jan. 1, 1969, 701 churches in Oklahoma were participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program. There are 13 state Baptist agencies in the program; these are:

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

This report is for 12 months, from Sept. 1, 1968, through Aug. 31, 1969.

Receipts and Disbursements

The year brought income from 14 bequests in wills and from seven trusts, gift annuities and other gifts, temporary funds and income from other sources, bringing the total receipts to \$2,461,391.91. Dur-

ing this period, \$251,957.11 was distributed to Oklahoma Baptist University; \$65,540.31 to child care ministry; \$52,684.66 to child care for capital improvements, and \$64,446.85 to other institutions and agencies.

There are now 603 churches having placards showing their participation in the Foundation's endowment program.

Foundation Earnings from Investments

Net income produced on Foundation investments for 1968 was \$358,929.03. This is 4.884 per cent of earnings on investments.

Living Trusts and Wills

During this 12-month period more than 343 individuals have shown their interest in the institutions and agencies represented by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma by signing wills and trusts, which will eventually make possible an increased income for these institutions and agencies. There are a number of others who have made contributions of various kinds which did not require formal agreements.

Investments and Procedures

The Baptist Foundation through the Church Building Loan Trust Fund has been making loans to the churches throughout Oklahoma since June, 1954. More than 350 loans have been made and there are now 154 outstanding loans. Our churches have co-operated in a very splendid way in this effort of the Foundation to be of assistance to them.

Probate of Wills

During the past 12 months, 14 probates have been closed. In four of these, the executive secretary of the Baptist Foundation acted as the executor and was fully responsible for guiding the estates through probate. In 10 others someone else acted as the executor but gifts came to the Foundation, ranging from 10 per cent to the entire estate. Included in this latter group was the R. H. Nicholson Estate, which brought a total of \$975,000 in trust funds: one-third for Oklahoma Baptist University, one-third for Child Care ministries, and one-third for Olivet Baptist Church, Oklahoma City.

At the other end of the pendulum is the Estate of Vida Ethel Boyd, who left her entire estate to the Foundation as endowment for Oklahoma Baptists' Cooperative Program. This was a total of \$3,155.83 in endowment.

All of these estates together brought in \$1,200,828.82 in value. Some real estate and other assets are included in this, which are to be handled by the Foundation.

Promotion

The Foundation staff has continued its program of dealing with individuals and is seeking to reach the people through the opportunities of appearing in various churches throughout the state. All of our staff members assisted by Augie Henry and Earl L. Stark have the opportunity to supply for various churches and to tell a little about the Foundation. Then we all work together in the program known as "Implementing the Forward Look."

During 1969 we will have been in five associations: Salt Fork, Craig-Mayes, Banner, Northwest and Tillman. The response has been splendid in these various associations, as well as over the state.

Twice each year bulletin inserts for distribution in the churches are mailed to the interested pastors throughout the State of Oklahoma. One is during January, Will and Trust emphasis month, and the other is in September, Foundation Month. Along with these bulletin inserts, the **Baptist Messenger** assists us by giving us a two-page spread for presenting the work of the Baptist Foundation in January and September. Each time the response from the bulletin inserts and from the **Baptist Messenger** article brings word from a great number of people who want members of the Foundation staff to contact them. These, along with the Implementing the Forward Look Program, have kept our staff busy following up on the requests.

Horace Lee Janes, the retired assistant executive secretary of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, assisted in the early part of the year in the Implementing Programs and other work of the Foundation. However, his health has not permitted him to continue. Horace Lee is known and loved by people throughout the State of Oklahoma, and his work with the Foundation is greatly missed.

Augie Henry completed 20 years with the Baptist Foundation on Sept. 15, 1969 — 18 years as executive secretary-treasurer, and two years as executive secretary emeritus.

Student Loans and Scholarships

The Foundation began the task of handling student loan and scholarship funds in 1947.

During the past 12 months, 41 students have been granted loans, amounting to \$18,574, and 33 students have received scholarships totaling \$10,351.41. These do not include funds from the Prichard Trust.

Board of Directors

The Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation is made up of 16 splendid, Christian men who serve without compensation, and out of a desire to give of their knowledge and experience to the Lord's work. Two of these men are ministers, and the other 14 are outstanding businessmen in our state. Four men went off the board at the close of 1968. These were: Raymond A. Young, Oklahoma City; Warren C. Hultgren, Tulsa; James M. Thompson, Ada, and Hugh A. Jolley, Enid. Four new men came on to serve for the first time: Joe Brown, Ardmore; Charles S. Storms, Duncan; John Crain, Tulsa, and Stanley Jordan, Muskogee. These men have made a very fine contribution this year and are taking an active part in the program.

Through the rotation of our board members, the last of our original board members will go off the board at the close of 1969. This is E. A. Abernethy, M.D., of Altus, an outstanding member of First Church, Altus, and a man who has given his life in helping students attend Oklahoma Baptist University, and serving on the Board of

Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Doctor Abernethy on April 15, 1969, observed his ninetieth birthday. During the years since 1947 that he has served on the Board of Directors of the Foundation he has missed two meetings, one because of illness and one because the highways were so bad it was impossible to make the trip. He will be greatly missed but we know that he will continue to be a part of us even though not an active member of the board.

There will be four members rotate off the board this year. They are: J. Ray Smith, Tulsa; E. A. Abernethy, Altus; William M. (Jack) Bell, Shawnee, and Herschel H. Hobbs, Oklahoma City. The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma is recommending the following for a four-year term on the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation: **Buford L. Cloar, Hobart; Flavel Perry, Ponca City; James M. Thompson, Ada, and Raymond A. Young, Oklahoma City.**

89. Donald E. Cook, professor of Southeastern Seminary, spoke to the convention concerning the work of the seminaries of the Southern Baptist Convention.

90. The report of Oklahoma Baptist University was presented by Grady C. Cothen, president of the university.

Oklahoma Baptist University

After three years of intensive study, the faculty in May gave unanimous approval to a new curriculum model for degrees offered in the College of Liberal Arts. The new plan was to be considered by the OBU Board of Trustees in their fall, 1969 meeting. If adopted, the new curriculum would likely go into effect in the fall of 1970.

Objectives of the proposed curriculum are:

(1) To revise and improve a curriculum which has grown into a collection of isolated blocks of knowledge taught too much as specialties.

(2) To write a program which brings about an integration or synthesis of knowledge with the development of ethical qualities and Christian principles as its center.

(3) To develop graduates with a world view and a dedication of service to others.

(4) To develop creative graduates able to recognize or envision new socio-economic relationships in a fragmented society.

An integral feature of the recommendation is a new academic calendar, known as the 4-1-4 plan. It provides for a first semester of four months, a one-month interim term, and a four-month second semester. The new calendar arrangement was implemented in the fall of 1969, with the first semester scheduled to end before Christmas, and second semester registration slated for January 28-29, 1970. The first official interim term, however, will not be held until January, 1971. In January, 1970 the faculty will spend the month in curriculum planning and implementing sessions.

The interim term is expected to be very attractive to students, who will have opportunity to give full time for a month to a project of their choosing, and which they will be able to help structure. The interim term courses would take the form of projects, seminars, workshops, field studies, travel, remedial work and other types of participatory studies.

The new curriculum plan requires 34 courses for graduation. Seventeen of the courses would be in the category of Unified Studies, as follows: Religion 2, English 1, Language 2, Humanities 2, Western Civilization (history and literature) 4, Natural Science 2, Non-Western Studies 1, Math or Philosophy 1, and Social Sciences 2.

The remaining courses would be in the area of concentration (replaces major-minor system), eight courses; electives, six courses; and three interim term courses. Significantly, the required religion courses have been placed in the freshman year to provide the student with the biblical concepts and history and to establish religion as a central theme through all of education.

Every attempt will be made to help the student to integrate and relate knowledge. Faculty members will be seeking to utilize the interdisciplinary approach as much as possible in all liberal art courses.

Under the plan, all students would be required to complete in the junior or senior year an interim term project which would examine the problems of a comprehensive Christian world view or philosophy of life.

No significant problems are anticipated for students who wish to transfer to OBU or to another institution from OBU under the new curriculum.

Concerning the proposed model, President Cothen said, "When implemented, this curriculum plan will give OBU an up-dated, more relevant curriculum. It takes into account the basic Christian philosophy of the university and the complex needs of the world in which we live. The new curriculum in no way jeopardizes existing professional studies programs, such as nursing and teacher education; in fact, we believe it will enhance these programs because graduates will have an improved base of knowledge."

In another academic achievement of 1968-69, the Oklahoma Department of Education renewed accreditation of all elementary and

secondary teaching certificate programs at OBU. OBU is also accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the National Association of Schools of Music, and the National League for Nursing. The university was accepted into membership of the Council of Protestant Colleges and Universities.

The OBU faculty for 1969-70 consists of 118 members, a net increase of three over the previous year. Ninety-three are full-time, 22 are part-time, and three are on leaves of absence. Doctoral degrees are held by 24 members of the faculty and administration, an increase of five over the previous years. Five faculty members are nearing the completion of their doctoral programs. Of special importance was the expansion of sociology to a two-man department. New positions were also added in church history, education, debate, nursing, Spanish, French and reading. Miss Charlotte Martin, a concert pianist and recording artist, was named in the fall of 1969 as the first artist-in-residence.

In July, 1969 the new post of university counselor and coordinator of religious organizations was filled with the coming of Tom Yarbrough. Another staff appointment was John Scales, new assistant director of development.

In the summer of 1969, OBU's sixth European Study Tour was conducted with 28 participants. Eighty were enrolled in the summer Academy program for promising high school students. During the year, OBU worked with the Association of Southern Baptist Colleges and Schools for the purpose of developing a co-operative Baptist overseas study program.

Improvement of academic facilities and resources continued in 1968-69 with the development of a reading improvement center, increased library holdings, the air-conditioning of Shawnee Hall, and the addition of closed-circuit TV equipment.

Financial support of the university by Oklahoma Baptists and alumni and other friends continues to be notable. The five-year program adopted by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to almost double the annual appropriations to OBU from \$427,000 in 1966 to a projected \$850,000 in 1972, is almost on target. During the 1968-69 academic year BGCO gifts to OBU totalled \$670,962. This included \$207,703 in advance funds, \$94,500 for debt retirement and \$52,750 for endowment.

Baptists of Oklahoma have also responded well in the current capital funds campaign being led by Robert L. Cargill, director of development. As of Sept. 15, 1969, the total raised in cash and pledges for the building of a student center and the completion of fine arts space in Raley Chapel stood at \$841,071. This included \$376,613 in Oklahoma County, \$389,026 in Shawnee, \$43,742 in Duncan, \$18,805 in Lawton, \$10,725 among trustees (non-duplicating total), \$1,160 among other alumni, and \$1,000 in Tulsa, where a campaign was just being launched. The largest gift was a pledge of \$130,000 by the Kerr Foundation, Inc.

Current fund income received during the fiscal year 1968-69 was \$2,547,971 with tuition and fees amounting to \$962,938 of this total. Endowment earnings were \$134,753.

Scholarships and grants to students at OBU totaled a record \$370,-389 during 1968-69. Of that amount, \$124,716 was expended from the operating budget for academic, athletic, music, minister's dependents, faculty dependents and foreign student scholarships. Some 311 ministerial and missionary students received \$147,058 for scholarships. Some 311 ministerial and missionary students received \$147,-058 for scholarships from the Prichard Trust Fund. Scholarships and grants from churches, lodges, Vocational Rehabilitation, Bureau of Indian Affairs, and other outside sources totalled \$98,516.

Endowment funds for OBU held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma increased in fiscal 1968-69 to \$3,114,319. Since the close of the fiscal year, an additional \$700,000 in endowment has been added, which included proceeds of part of the estate of the late R. H. Nicholson of Oklahoma City.

Enrolment reached a record 1,666, a gain of 13 per cent, in the fall semester of 1968, and 1,487 for the spring semester. Included in the fall total were 1,222 young people from Oklahoma, with 73 of 77 counties represented. Counties leading in number of students were Pottawatomie, 402; Oklahoma, 232; Tulsa, 110; Seminole, 27; Cleveland, 24, and Comanche, Kay and Washington, 23 each. Some 409 out-of-state students hailed from 42 of the 50 states, and 11 foreign countries.

Preliminary fall, 1969 registration totals were running about the same as in 1968, despite a rise in tuition. Even with the increase, fees at OBU continue to be the lowest of any private college in Oklahoma, and among the lowest of any of the Southern Baptist colleges.

The increased numbers of students at OBU have caused the women's dormitories to be filled beyond normal capacity. Brotherhood Dormitory for men reached full capacity (400) in September, 1969 for the first time since it was doubled in size in 1958. A \$75,000 partial renovation of Brotherhood Dorm was completed in the summer of 1968.

The first major building program in several years was begun in May, 1969 with the breaking of ground for the new \$1,400,000 student center. Completion of the structure is slated for the summer of 1970.

Student involvement in the life of the university was augmented by the increasing of the number of students serving on some faculty committees and by the active participation of five student leaders who served with the Curriculum Revision Committee composed of faculty and administrators. The office of the dean of students led during the year in the development of policies defining the relationship of students and the university.

In 1968-69, OBU's student body was 44 per cent men and 56 per cent women. Some 87 per cent of the day students are Baptists.

In 1968-69, the number of ministerial students increased to 215, 28 per cent more than 1967-68.

OBU continues to attract students with high academic potential and dedication. American College Testing figures for the entering freshman class of 1968 showed OBU freshmen with an ACT average of 21.1 and a grade-point average of 3.01, second highest in the state of Oklahoma. Some 38 per cent of OBU graduates go on to graduate school.

93. T. B. Lackey presented to retiring president, D. A. Williams Jr. a certificate of appreciation for his services to the convention the past year.

94. The new officers of the convention were introduced to the convention.

95. D. A. Williams Jr. presented the gavel to the new president, J. P. Dane.

96. T. B. Lackey led the convention in a closing prayer.

The convention stood adjourned until Nov. 9, 10, 11, 1970.

In our opinion, with the explanation stated in the preceding paragraph, the accompanying balance sheets and statement of fund balances present fairly the assets and liabilities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1969, arising from cash transactions and the changes in fund balances during the year then ended, in conformity with accounting practices generally followed by nonprofit organizations applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense

On March 16, 1956, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000.00, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760.00. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1969, the unamortized balance amounted to \$32,853.00.

4. Notes Payable

Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000.00, due in monthly installments of \$1,000.00 each applied first to interest from date at 5½% and then to principal, balance at December 31, 1969, \$134,360.17.

5. Endowment Funds

Endowment funds for "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" are carried on the books of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. These endowment funds consist of funds included in current and prior year budgets of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma together with designated contributions and proceeds of land sales. These funds, approximating \$2,000,000.00, and designated for the following departments or agencies:

- Department of Child Care
- Falls Creek Assembly
- Baptist Student Union Centers
- Camp Hudgens
- Hospitals and Golden Age Homes—office
- State Missions
- Cooperative Program
- Baptist General Convention Fund

6. Baptist Memorial Hospital Expansion

The convention Board of Directors, in session May 10, 1962, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Baptist Memorial Hospital.

All real and personal property owned by the hospital was subject to a mortgage note to Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company in the amount of \$4,431,944.25. Furthermore "It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

7. Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Expansion

The convention Board of Directors, in session December 5, 1968, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital. During the current and prior years, funds have been applied by the convention for this expansion as follows:

Plant Fund**8. Improvements to Leased Real Estate**

In approximately fifty years the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma will receive title to certain major leasehold improvements which have been or will be constructed on land owned by the convention.

9. Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma

Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, ceased operating as a general hospital on September 15, 1962, at the request of the administration and governing board of the hospital.

Under the authority of the Board of Directors of the Convention, a lease contract was made with the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 20, Muskogee County, on December 17, 1964, providing for rental payments of \$4,000.00 annually for the use of the real estate and personal property of Oklahoma Baptist Hospital. The lease is renewable annually at the option of the lessee. The contract also provides that, when the rental payments total \$40,000.00, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall convey title to the leased real estate and personal property to the lessee.

10. Baptist Laymen's Corporation

On June 10, 1964, land was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The value of this land was reduced to \$1.00 as shown in this report.

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole, as explained in the accountants' opinion.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgement, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization and Major Activities

Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years. Amended Articles of Incorporation filed in March, 1928 and May, 1961, provide for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Major activities of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are described below:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the Co-operative Program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and periodically transmitting portions allocated to Southern Baptist Convention, various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and other designated donees.

The Baptist Messenger—Printing and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

Department of Child Care—Operation management of "The Baptist Children's Home" and "Boys Ranch Town," construction of buildings and maintenance of buildings and grounds.

Falls Creek Assembly—Providing vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of assembly properties.

We have examined the fund balance sheets of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 1969, and the related statement of changes in fund balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

On January 1, 1964, the Foundation adjusted the book value of securities held to market value. The net effect of this adjustment was to increase the book value of securities and the corresponding fund balances by \$92,147.75. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, have been recorded at cost or appraised value at acquisition date.

No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties or depletion of mineral properties.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the items noted in the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying fund balance sheets and statement of fund balances present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1969, and the results of its transactions for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting practices generally followed by nonprofit organizations applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
For the Year Ended December 31, 1969

1. Investments:

Securities acquired prior to January 1, 1964, are included herein at market value as of that date. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, are shown at cost or at an appraised value at acquisition date.

All investments except those noted above are valued at appraised or market value at time of gift or cost if purchased.

The investment pool securities are periodically valued. These valuations serve to establish the means for the distribution of income.

2. Investment in Limited Partnership:

In March 1968 the Foundation received several lots of real estate in Rogers county as a contribution. Shortly thereafter, this land was deeded to the Orchard Hill Company, a partnership formed by and between the original donors of the land and the Foundation for the purpose of land development. The Foundation does not participate in the management of the business but shares in the profits and losses of the operations; provided, however, that the Foundation's participation in the losses is limited to its investment in the partnership.

3. Fund Balances:

Annuities of \$169,302.99 arose from gifts made to the Foundation in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor.

A revolving fund has been established within the operating fund of the Foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds and making periodic payments to annuitants. The revolving fund is also used to pay estate expenses prior to the closing of the estate, at which time the Foundation becomes the beneficiary of part or all of the estate's assets, and such expenses are reimbursed. At December 31, 1969 the balance of the revolving fund was \$13,746.58.

In addition to the annuities mentioned above, certain trusts have been created naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. The net income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and, upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at the book value of their assets at December 31, 1969. No attempt has been made to compute any liability of these funds for future payments to beneficiaries.

**ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY
FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, except for the effect of items noted in the accountants' letter, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on November 6, 1946. It was created as a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships, for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the director of the corporation, its responsibilities are to obtain funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disburse and invest funds according to designation made and as set out in the charter.

Church Building Loans—Church building loans stated at \$4,159,761.52 are secured by first mortgages on church buildings and individual personal endorsements to total 100% of the original amount of each loan. Most of the loans were on ten-year terms with provision for monthly payments of principal and interest. Most loans were at 6%, but interest rates have been revised twice during the last two years in keeping with the current money market. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
For the Year Ended May 31, 1969

Pledged Assets

1. Kerr Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$788,014.07, and land upon which it is located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$483,000.00. Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,115,505.43, and land upon which it is located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$595,000.00.

2. Thurmond Hall and John Wesley Raley Chapel, and land upon which they are located, included herein respectively at the university's cost of \$536,448.27 and \$1,665,427.41, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$535,000.00.

3. Ford Music Hall, included herein at the university's cost of \$216,319.74, and Brittain Library and Art Center, included herein at the university's cost of \$140,015.27, and land upon which they are located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$234,000.00.

Pledged Income

4. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, the women's dining hall, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, the men's dining hall, and to the extent necessary, the income from WMU Memorial Dormitory are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

5. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$67,500.00, is pledged to insure deposit with bond indenture trustees of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

6. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$27,000.00, are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

7. All funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969 from pledges to the 1969-1970 capital funds campaign and designated for the Student Center Project, and 75% of all funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969 from undesignated pledges to the 1969-1970 capital funds campaign are to be remitted to the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority under terms of a lease agreement between the university and the authority. These funds are to be used by the authority for redemption of bonds described in Note 9.

Long-Term Lease

8. In May, 1967, Oklahoma Baptist University entered into an agreement to pay \$1,166.67 per month for 180 months beginning September 1, 1967 for the use of apartment houses. The agreement includes a purchase option.

9. On May 1, 1969, the university entered into a lease agreement with the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. Under the agreement, the authority has issued \$1,400,000.00 revenue bonds for the construction of a new Student Union Building on the campus. The university agrees to lease the new building until November 1, 1984, or until provision is made for the retirement of all bonds issued. Rental payments of approximately \$35,000.00 are to be paid to the authority quarterly for application to bond debt service.

Changes in Accounting

10. Prior to the year under review, Oklahoma Baptist University had increased the book value of buildings by \$1,272,453.08 appraisal value, and had recorded provisions for depreciation of \$487,729.15 on certain property. Both of these items were eliminated from the financial statements as of May 31, 1969, resulting in a decrease in the plant fund balance of \$784,723.93.

No provision has been made for depreciation on educational plant or auxiliary facilities during the current year in accordance with this policy.

In addition, endowment funds totaling approximately \$3,100,000.00 were previously included as investments of the university, although these investments were held and administered by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the benefit of Oklahoma Baptist University, as stated in the fund balance sheet. These investments were eliminated from the financial statements as of May 31, 1969. The result of this change was to reduce the endowment fund balance by \$3,107,996.91.

Revised principles of accounting and financial reporting for institutions of higher education were published by the American Council on Education in 1968, and Oklahoma Baptist University changed its financial reporting policy on May 31, 1969 to omit all of the aforementioned items in accordance with the revised principles.

**ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY
FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

For comparative purposes, the change to revised principles of accounting and financial reporting for institutions of higher education published by the American Council on Education in 1968, which we approve, as outlined in Note 10 to the financial statements should be considered.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, except for the combined totals in the accompanying supplementary financial information which are included for statistical purposes only, this information is fairly stated in all material respect in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Restricted Assets—On May 31, 1969 restricted assets totaled \$7,283.63, consisting of unexpended cash and receivables from economic opportunity grants for aid to qualified students.

Faculty Building Association—The cumulative liability of Oklahoma Baptist University at May 31, 1969, to the Faculty Building Association was \$44,770.66. The amount accumulates from rent due on property leased from the Faculty Building Association, less prior advances and interest due to the university of \$116,700.00. Faculty Building Association notes held by Oklahoma Baptist University.

Loan Fund

National Student Loan Programs—At May 31, 1969, Oklahoma Baptist University had received capital contributions from the federal government to National Defense and Nursing Student Loan Programs of \$653,559.00 and \$31,054.52, respectively. An additional \$73,000.00 was advanced to Oklahoma Baptist University by the government under the nursing loan program. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds, and from matching funds (10% of federal capital contributions) furnished by the school. Borrowers who become qualified teachers or nurses under the respective programs may have portions of principal and interest payments forgiven. Operations of these revolving funds have reduced the government's participation to \$612,603.40 and \$30,585.52 as shown on Exhibit A.

University Loan Funds—In addition to the revolving funds aforementioned, the university has received loan funds totaling \$62,569.40 for loans to qualified students.

Endowment Funds

Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—During the year under review, Oklahoma Baptist University changed its method of reporting endowment to comply with revised principles of financial reporting for institutions of higher education published by the American Council on Education in 1968. These principles recommended that funds held in trust for the benefit of an institution should not be reported as belonging to the institution. At May 31, 1969, funds totaling approximately \$3,100,000.00 were being held and administered by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the benefit of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Other funds were being held in trust on May 31, 1969 for the benefit of Oklahoma Baptist University by the Liberty National Bank and Trust Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The university's economic interest in these funds could not be determined by the trustee at May 31, 1969, pending settlement of contingencies related thereto.

Plant Fund

Additions—During the year ended May 31, 1969, additional equipment was acquired costing \$43,966.31:

Change in Accounting—Revised principles and procedures of accounting and financial reporting for institutions of higher education were published in 1968 by the American Council on Education. These principles recommend valuation of fixed assets at acquisition cost

without provision for adjustments relating to market value or depreciation. In accordance with these recommendations, Oklahoma Baptist University made no provision for depreciation of fixed assets during the year under review, and removed appraisal valuations of \$1,272,-453.08 and prior accumulated provisions for depreciation of \$487,-729.15 from the fixed asset accounts.

Bonds Payable—The university is obligor to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States government under two bond indentures totaling \$1,847,000.00 at May 31, 1969.

The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory bonds, Series 1955, consists of \$483,000.00 of 2¾ % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$12,000.00 on November 1, 1969, to \$23,000.00 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory. The first \$91,000.00 of these bonds were retired on schedule, and \$2,000.00 of the bonds, due November 1, 1995, have been retired.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1969, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series of 1957, consists of \$595,000.00 of 2⅞ % first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$13,000.00 on October 1, 1969, to \$33,000.00 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory. During the year under review, \$13,000.00 of these bonds were retired as scheduled.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1969, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$535,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 31, 1961, with semiannual maturities varying from \$19,000.00 on September 1, 1969, to \$26,000.00 on September 1, 1975, with the remaining \$249,000.00 due on March 1, 1976. Interest rates vary from 4¾ % to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) the apportionment from Baptist General Convention for building program; (2) \$67,500.00; or (3) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$234,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semiannual maturities varying from \$7,000.00 December 1, 1969, to \$10,000.00 on December 1, 1977, with the remaining \$97,000.00 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rates vary from 4¾ % to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000.00 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

Gentlemen:

We have completed an audit of the books of the Cordell Memorial Hospital at Cordell, Oklahoma, for the twelve months period ended June 30, 1969. Attached, as part of our report thereon, please find exhibits and schedules as follows:

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of June 30, 1969, with limited spot-check of detail transactions.

We confirmed the bank accounts and savings accounts by outside correspondence.

We confirmed the accounts receivable by outside correspondence, as of June 18, 1969. There were no significant, unexplained changes in the receivables from then to closing date. We aged the accounts, as of June 18, with the following results:

The above did not include patients in the house. In view of the above, we only hope that the reserve of \$10,208.63 is sufficient.

We did not witness the actual inventory count, but our spot-check indicated that the hospital is carrying the approximate quantities shown on the physical inventory. (See "Comments" Section for more on inventories).

We confirmed the principal accounts payable by outside correspondence. The retroactive adjustments, from and to Medicare and Welfare are as computed by my colleague and fellow Certified Public Accountant, Mr. Edwin Briscoe, of Edmondson, Wilson and Briscoe, Tulsa, Oklahoma.

COMMENTS

We computed the retroactive payment due from Blue Cross to be \$1,334.16.

The perpetual inventory records are very good; and we believe the physical count is very accurate. In future years, however, we recommend more care in the pricing and extension of the inventories, as our spot-check turned up several errors in this area.

We made all retroactive adjustments, affecting prior fiscal years, as "Surplus" adjustments (See Exhibit C), so they would not distort the income statement for the fiscal year.

We found the general ledger bookkeeping to be in very good condition. However, in the important area of claims and collections, we found a state of near-chaos. The office personnel apparently quickly filed some back claims, after the results of our confirmations began to come in, which was commendable; but we do not believe that a once-a-year maximum effort is an adequate substitute for the day-to-day effort needed to stay current with all claims and follow-up. This is, by far, the most pressing problem we encountered at this hospital.

AUDITORS' OPINION

In our opinion, the attached statements present fairly the financial condition of Cordell Memorial Hospital, as of June 30, 1969, and the results of operations for the twelve months then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a consistent basis.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
June 30, 1969

1. Organization of the Hospital

The Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital is owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Although accounted for separately, the Hospital is not a separate legal entity, but operates under the corporate charter of the Convention.

2. Accounts Receivable

An analysis of patients accounts receivable and the allowance for uncollectible accounts for the year ended June 30, 1969, is as follows:

The allowance for uncollectible accounts has been provided by charges to income at the rate of 2½% of patient charges. This rate was determined by a review of the Hospital's bad debt experience, and a review of the current trends in the accounts.

3. Accounts Receivable—Student Nurses

For many years the Hospital has operated a school of nursing. Payments received for tuition, books, etc., from the student nurses have been recognized as income as collected. During the current fiscal year the Hospital has changed to a policy of accruing this revenue as it is earned by recording the balance due from the students at June 30, 1969, as an account receivable. The balance which was receivable at July 1, 1968, has been recorded as an increase to the general fund balance. The net change in the balance from July 1, 1968, to June 30, 1969, amounting to \$2,624, has been reflected in the accompanying financial statements as income from the school of nursing.

4. Notes Payable

The notes payable of the Hospital have been classified by fund in accordance with the uses to which the proceeds were applied. The details of these notes are as follows:

The note to Mr. Herrian is secured by a mortgage on land having a cost of \$50,000. The notes to the First National Bank of Enid were paid after June 30, 1969.

5. Accounts Payable—Baptist General Convention

The account payable to the Baptist General Convention consists of amounts owed for purchase of hospital supplies, insurance premiums, and administrative expense. It is the policy of the Hospital to pay these amounts only when funds are not required for other operating purposes.

6. Advances Received from Medicare

The Medicare program, if requested by the Hospital, advances funds to the Hospital to cover amounts due from Medicare, but not yet billed or which are in process of being paid. At June 30, 1969, Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital had received advances totaling \$69,000.

The amount which can be advanced to the Hospital is limited by a formula and is computed quarterly by Medicare. The advances need not be repaid unless they exceed the maximum allowable for two consecutive quarters, and then only the excess is repaid.

7. Construction in Progress and Debentures Payable

An addition to the Hospital's building was in process of being constructed at June 30. The cost of the addition is estimated to be in excess of \$2,000,000, and is to be financed by funds raised in the community (see Exhibit C), funds supplied by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and by the issuance of bonds by the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority. Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority is a public trust created under the laws of the State of Oklahoma.

Under agreements between the Baptist General Convention and the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority, the facilities of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, including buildings and equipment, inventories, and other assets of the Hospital, except its parking lot and school of nursing, have been leased to the Trust. In addition the lease covers the revenues from operation of the Hospital, and the Convention's interest in building fund pledges to the Hospital. This leasehold interest and the gross revenues of the Hospital are to be assigned as security for the bonds to be issued. The full faith and credit of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is also to be pledged to the payment of the bonds.

In compliance with the agreements, the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority, on March 3, 1969, issued \$500,000 of 5% first lien debentures as initial financing of the construction program. The debentures mature \$100,000 annually commencing March 3, 1970.

The Trust will also issue \$1,300,000 of gross revenue bonds, payable on a long-term basis. Pending the issuance of these bonds the Trust, under an indenture dated as of July 1, 1969, has issued an additional \$300,000 of 5% debentures, which are to be redeemed upon issuance of the bonds.

Under the terms of the indentures, the gross receipts from the operation of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and from construction pledges are to be deposited to the revenue account of the Authority. Amounts required for the payment of periodic principal and interest payments are to be transferred to a sinking fund prior to the due dates. Amounts necessary for the operation and maintenance of the Hospital are also to be paid from the fund. Remaining amounts determined by the trustees to be in excess of the needs of the Trust may be paid to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Unexpended construction funds derived from the sale of the \$500,000 debentures, and the amount incurred for construction to June 30, 1969, have been shown as "Assets in Trust for Construction" in the accompanying fund balance sheet.

Title to the facilities being constructed remains in the Trust until the bonds and debentures have been paid, at which time it will be transferred to the Baptist General Convention.

8. Hospital Plant and Equipment

In order to comply with Medicare requirements, the Hospital is presently in the process of establishing a formal plant ledger detailing the cost of major moveable equipment and the related depreciation by individual asset. In addition, the Hospital is required to obtain historical cost appraisals and to adjust the asset valuations accordingly, when the original cost invoices are not on file. As of June 30, 1969, all of the historical cost appraisals necessary had not been obtained; therefore, all the adjustments to cost and related depreciation had not been determined and recorded on the books. Accordingly, the asset costs, accumulated depreciation and the provision for depreciation for the year ended June 30, 1969, have been presented in the accompanying financial statements on a basis of either original invoice cost or historical cost appraisals obtained as of that date. Additional amounts will be recorded as the historical cost appraisals are received. The depreciation rates have also been revised to reflect the estimated remaining useful life at date of inclusion in the plant ledger.

The Hospital has also changed its accounting policy regarding the reporting of the cost of its building. The Hospital building and facilities were contributed in 1953 to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The valuation of the building recorded on the books at the date donated and also used in subsequent financial reports was the donor's cost basis. During the year ended June 30, 1969, the Hospital adopted the policy of reporting the buildings at the fair market value at the date of donation, as determined by an appraisal made by Mr. Russell Swan, member of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers. Accumulated depreciation and the provision for the current fiscal year have been revised to reflect this revaluation and a revised depreciation rate based upon estimated remaining useful life at the date of donation. Since the appraisal to arrive at fair market value at date of donation included the fixed (building) equipment, the cost and related depreciation of this equipment have been removed from

the records. The effect of the restatement of the building cost and related depreciation provision and accumulation are as follows:

9. Reserve Funds

The hospitals operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma deposit funds with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. These funds are invested by the Foundation and comprise an emergency fund to meet the needs of the hospitals. The funds are withdrawable upon approval of the hospital administrator, the executive secretary of the Convention, and the chairman of the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes committee of the Convention's Board of Directors.

NOTE 1—DUE FROM BLUE CROSS, MEDICARE AND OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

The amounts due from the respective third party purchasers of care for retroactive adjustments are as follows:

The above amounts are from cost reports for the year ended June 30, 1969, submitted by the hospital to the respective agencies and are subject to audit and verification by the agencies.

NOTE 2—PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

The land, building and certain equipment and supplies are leased from the Sayre Public Works Authority for a nominal rent under a twenty-three year lease with option to renew for an additional twenty-five years. The lease is dated March 14, 1961. At the termination of the lease all leased assets or their replacements together with the remaining accounts receivable will revert to the Authority. The cost of the leased assets is as follows:

These costs have been included in the accompanying balance sheet in accordance with certain regulations as prescribed by Oklahoma Blue Cross and the Health Insurance Program for the Aged (Medicare) and have been tested and accepted by the Health Insurance Program for the Aged.

Property and equipment subject to depreciation is amortized over its estimated useful life by application of the straight-line and double declining balance methods of depreciation. The rates used are in accordance with rates prescribed by Oklahoma Blue Cross and are considered to be adequate and reasonable. Additions to property and equipment for the current year have been recorded at cost.

The Sayre Public Works Authority is currently financing construction of an acute wing and an extended care facility which will become a part of the existing hospital facilities. These assets under construction will not be recorded on the books of the hospital until such time as the assets are complete and ready for use by the hospital; accordingly, no provision for the new wing or any related liability is reflected on the accompanying balance sheet.

NOTE 3—ADVANCE FROM HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM FOR THE AGED (MEDICARE)

The liability of \$19,000.00 to the Health Insurance Program for the Aged (Medicare) represents an advance received under that Program's provision for current financing. Such advance is subject to adjustment by the Social Security Administration and is payable at termination of the hospital's contract for care of Medicare patients.

The following are excerpts from a letter to David Foster from the auditor, Robert M. Bland, C.P.A., concerning contributions that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma made to the City of Stillwater:

"When the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma turned the Stillwater Municipal Hospital back to the City of Stillwater on October 31, 1969, they turned over the following assets which are cash or which will be turned into cash after October 31.

"The net amount which the City of Stillwater received from the above listed assets was \$280,311.00 because on October 31, 1969, there were \$31,818.00 accounts payable which were paid from the funds derived from account receivable collections.

"In addition to the current assets or what is sometimes called quick assets, the Baptist Convention spent \$211,574.00 for asset additions being fixed and movable equipment. These assets were purchased over the period of the Baptist operation of the hospital, consequently, they also have been depreciated during that period leaving a net book cost on October 31, 1969 of \$73,506.00.

"The net book value of assets turned to the City of Stillwater by the Baptist Convention on October 31, 1969 after deducting accounts payable and accumulated depreciation was \$356,421.00. These assets are in addition to the building and equipment owned by the city at the time the Baptist Convention started operating the hospital. This also amounts to 59% of the City of Stillwater's investment in the hospital and equipment before interest on bonds.

"It also might be worthy to note that in addition to the discussed above, there was a multitude of items called minor equipment which were also turned to the city. This minor equipment includes surgical instruments, wastebaskets and a multitude of other low cost pieces of equipment or pieces of equipment which could not be controlled and consequently were charged to expense on the books as they were purchased. I would not want to make an estimate of the value of this minor equipment, but, I know that it would amount to several thousands of dollars.

"Another item which might be of interest would be the value of the Baptist operation of the hospital to the City of Stillwater economically. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1969, \$617,612.00 was paid in salaries. If the four months ended October 31, 1969 were annualized, that is converted to a full year basis, it would amount to \$637,225.00 and in addition to these salaries and wages paid, there was a considerable amount spent locally for supplies of various kinds. I do not have the information which would give me the amount of such expenditures.

"I don't know whether you would want to mention it or not, but, during the period the Baptist Convention operated the Stillwater Municipal Hospital, they were paid an average of \$582.84 per year as reimbursement of general and administrative costs attributable to their operation of the hospital. The Convention also has been paying \$1,500 a year as reimbursement of chaplain expenses."

Note 1—

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorized the conveyance of 35 acres of land to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation as trustee, to be held in trust for use and benefit of the Baptist General Convention. The land was conveyed to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation in June, 1964, at an appraised value of \$122,500.000.

Note 2—

Prior to December 31, 1967, 6% Series "A" bonds, totaling \$700,000.00 had been issued. Prior to June 30, 1968, \$215,000.00 6% Series "B" bonds had been issued. The terms pertaining to the retirement of interest and principal of the indenture had been met and the status of the bonds on June 30, 1969 was:

Series "A" maturity dates on outstanding bonds varies from January 1, 1968 to July 15, 1975. Series "B" maturity dates on bonds outstanding varies from January 15, 1972 to July 15, 1975.

Bonds, Series "A" and Series "B," are secured by first mortgage on blocks 1 and 2 of the Baptist Golden Age Homes Addition Number 1 in Oklahoma City and improvements thereon. Blocks 1 and 2 contain approximately 7 acres of the 35 acres conveyed in trust to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation.

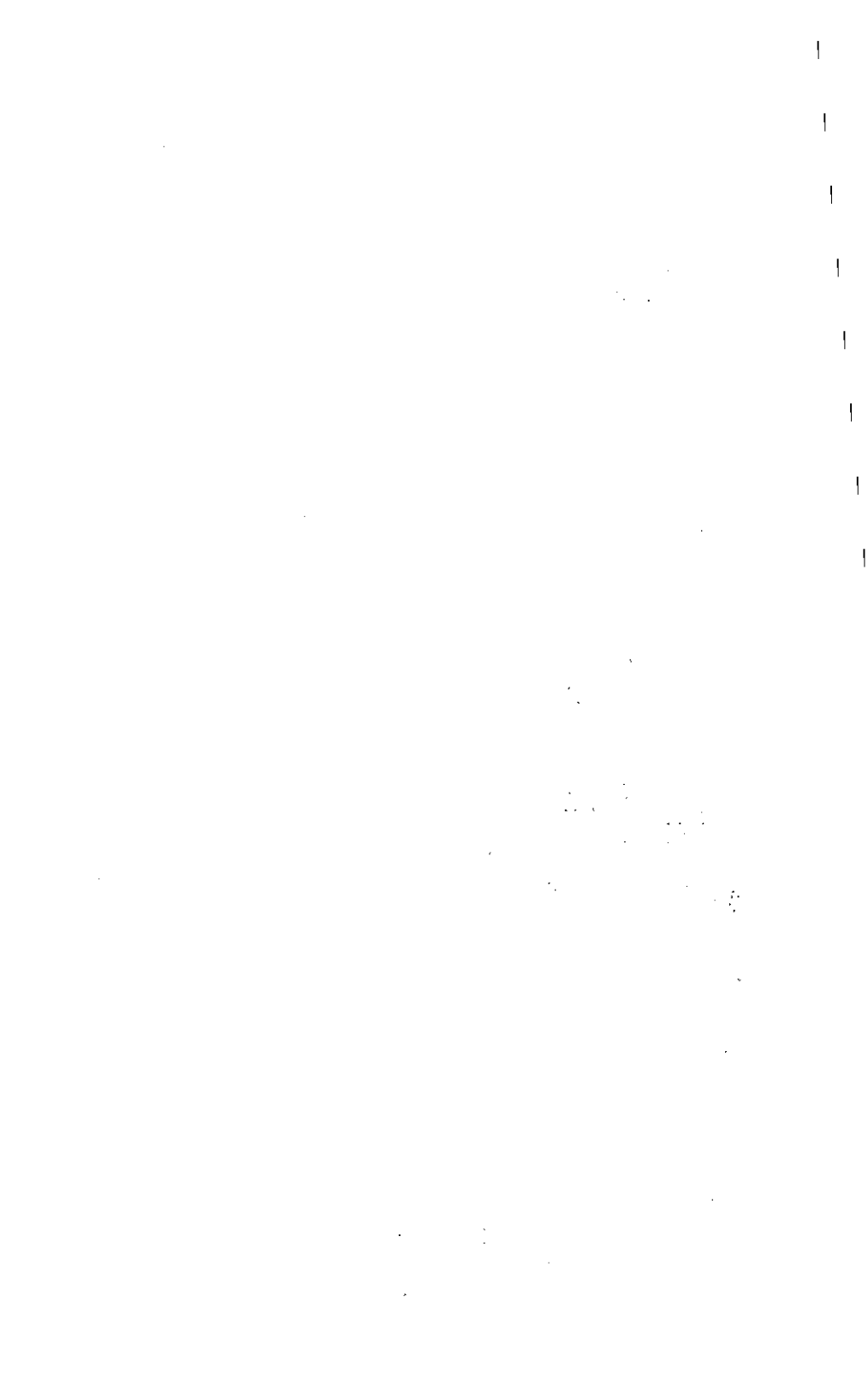
