Served as Executive Secretary Treasurer of the Kentucky Baptist Convention.

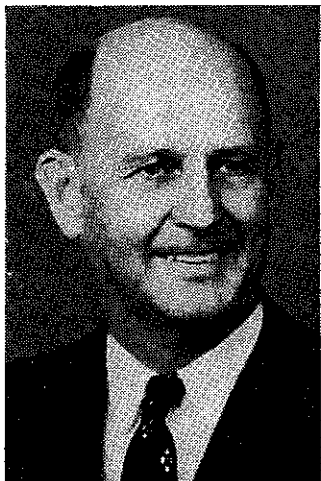
He served churches in Kentucky, Mississippi, Arkansas, Virginia and Tennessee.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

Section 1. This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every 50 members, provided that no church shall have over 10 messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely co-operative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, an executive secretary-treasurer, and a historical secretary.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of his term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. These officers, with the exception of the executive secretary-treasurer, shall be elected annually and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving a majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive secretary-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected.

Section 3. The duties of these officers shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES, AND COMMITTEES

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees as shall be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention.

Section 2. That these boards, trustees and standing committees shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its co-operative work.

Section 2. This board of directors shall consist of the president and recording secretary of the convention and 60 other members who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. The membership of this board shall include not less than 16 persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight men and at least eight women.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors shall be the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive secretary-treasurer to serve, until such time as the convention meets. He shall be the official superintendent of all the work of the board and shall make full report of all matters committed to it.

Section 4. This board shall elect all department heads, including the editor of the **Baptist Messenger** and the assistant executive secretary. The executive secretary-treasurer, in consultation with the committees of the Board of Directors which are involved, shall select the workers in the executive division, with the exception of office or similar personnel. The department heads, in counsel with the executive secretary-treasurer and the committees of the Board of Directors which are responsible for their work, shall select their workers, other than office or similar personnel. The executive secretary-treasurer and each department head shall select his office or similar personnel. Those responsible for electing or selecting workers shall fix their salaries.

ARTICLE VII—PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The proceedings of the convention, the report of the Board of Directors, and such useful information as the secretary may be able to obtain from the proceedings of the convention shall be published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—ANNUAL MEETINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the Board of Directors, in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

ARTICLE IX—SPECIAL FUNDS

Section 1. All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE X—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended and published by the board two months prior to the meeting of the convention in the Oklahoma Baptist state paper.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the Board of Directors.

The number of directors shall be sixty (60) plus the president and the recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the Board of Directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided: the term of office for these members shall be four years. Fifteen (15) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one year. In electing members of the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

. . . In order to comply with the requirements of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes, the directors of the corporation, hereinafter referred to as corporate directors, shall be the

Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, including the president and recording secretary of the convention, and the executive secretary-treasurer of the convention; and the acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to, and governed by, the acts of the convention, or of the Board of Directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The Board of Directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 4. In case of any vacancy in the directors the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 5. The directors shall hold semiannual meetings at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call.

Section 6. Sixteen (16) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE II

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee and the president of the convention shall serve as its chairman. The executive committee shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action by the general Board of Directors from time to time.

Section 2. All actions of the executive committee shall be reported to the Board of Directors at its meeting next succeeding such action, and shall be subject to revision or alteration by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. The executive officers of the Board of Directors shall be: A president of the Board of Directors, elected by the convention; a recording secretary, elected by the convention; an executive secretary-treasurer, elected by the convention.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention, shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Board of Directors. All officers, agents, and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. The president of the Board of Directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

Section 5. The executive secretary-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the Board of Directors may designate. The executive secretary-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands, to the Board of Directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

Section 6. The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall attest with the president all contracts authorized by the Board of Directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of secretary, subject to the control of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. The bylaws shall be adopted by the general convention and when once adopted the Board of Directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors at any regular or special meeting of the board, provided that the notice calling the board together shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at that meeting, provided that in case of emergency three-fourths of all the directors voting therefore, the bylaws may be amended at any general or special meeting of the board without notice.

Section 2. Election of officers shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

ARTICLE V

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which has been adopted, and in case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The Board of Directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations or associations shall be subject to the general control of the Board of Directors of the convention.

Section 3. No agency or institution belonging to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall incur an indebtedness without the knowledge and consent of the convention or the

Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive secretary.

Section 4. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation, or association, involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 5. The Board of Directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages, and other evidence of indebtedness when expressly authorized so to do by the general convention. Except in cases of emergency a three-fourths majority of the board may authorize the incurring of indebtedness, but the same shall be done in cases of emergency which were unforeseen by the general convention at its annual convention.

Section 6. The Board of Directors through the president and secretary thereof shall make a general report of all its accounts at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Section 1. No existing institution or agency of this convention shall launch any move or enterprise calling for the expenditure of money apart from operating expenses, until same has been approved by the Board of Directors, or by the convention itself, after having been published in the Baptist state paper at least three months prior to the coming of the convention of the same year.

Charter and Bylaws

CHARTER AND BYLAWS OF OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation Feb. 9, 1910, amended Jan. 26, 1956.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is Paul K. Nance, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are: to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of

the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provide for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

The qualifications of said Board of Trustees and of the presidents of said institution and of all departments thereof shall be as follows: That each member of said Board of Trustees shall be a member of a Baptist Church within the state; that the presidents of said institution and each of its departments shall be members of Baptist churches."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election

of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semiannual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semiannual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semiannual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semiannual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustees occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a

secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 12. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semiannual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 13. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 14. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 15. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws

of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That we, whose names are hereunto subscribed, do hereby associate ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private religious corporation, not for profit, under Title 18, O.S. 1941, Sec. 541, of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and for that purpose state:

ARTICLE I

That the name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

The place in this State where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

The purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, and one authorized under the above-named Title 18, O.S. 1941, Section #12 of said laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Sections Nos. 15, 91, 541, 543, and 545, and all applicable laws of the said State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, as such corporations are authorized by law to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest or otherwise dispose of said property for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and such purposes as may be necessary for its membership and such worship and exercise of such powers according to the general laws and regulations of the State of Oklahoma and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and in compliance with all the special laws and regulations of The Baptist General Convention of the State

of Oklahoma, and of the State of Oklahoma; and all other laws, rules and regulations of duly authorized powers promulgating the same.

ARTICLE VI

To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers.

ARTICLE VII

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of any educational institution or institutions now owned by, or under the control of, The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any other school which The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, may promote; or the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property adjacent or in connection with any other school where it would be advantageous to carry out the Baptist principles and doctrines; to assist and promote any of the hospitals under the control and ownership of the said Convention; and to acquire and dispose of any property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of said Convention; and to promote and assist the Baptist Children's Home, and any other Baptist orphanage or orphanages under the control and supervision of the said The Baptist General Convention; and to aid and assist all Baptist student union centers on campuses of schools other than those of Baptist denomination.

Among the other purposes for which this corporation is formed is to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work.

ARTICLE VIII

To provide space in the Baptist Headquarters for the offices of the corporation.

ARTICLE IX

To enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation.

ARTICLE X

To prosecute or defend any action or suits that said corporation may be involved in.

ARTICLE XI

To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the purposes and object of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, all of whom shall be members of a Baptist church affiliated with the Bap-

ARTICLE I**Membership**

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the sixteen (16) individual Oklahoma directors, to-wit:

NAME**RESIDENCE**

who were recommended by the Board of Directors of the Convention to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and ratified and approved by said Convention. Such membership to continue until their successors are elected; and all shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of accredited Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II**Annual Meeting of the Directors**

This corporation shall hold a regular meeting at a designated place at the call of the President of the Foundation a short time prior to the meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the annual report and recommendation of the Directors shall be presented to and acted upon by the Convention at its regular meeting.

ARTICLE III**Officers**

Elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a president, one or more vice-presidents, an executive secretary, who shall also be the secretary and the treasurer of the corporation. Such elective officers, with the exception of the executive secretary, shall be chosen at a meeting of the Board of said corporation, to be held at the Baptist Building, or other suitable location, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, annually at a time to be determined by the Board, at which meeting each member shall be entitled to cast one vote only. The executive secretary shall be elected by the Board of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected.

In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lessor officers as it deems necessary, or desirable, such as administrative assistants, assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Director from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

Section 1—President:

The president shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesman, and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

Section 2—Vice-Presidents:

It shall be the duty of each of the vice-presidents to act for the president in the absence or incapacity of said president; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 3—Executive Secretary:

The executive secretary shall be the official administrator of all of the work of the Board of Directors and shall make full report of all matters committed to the Board of Directors.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of secretary; shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors and then shall perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of secretary.

The executive secretary shall perform all normal duties of treasurer; and, subject to the provisions of these bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the executive secretary without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the executive secretary to sign drafts or checks that the assistant executive secretary is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by at least one officer of the Board of Directors; and provided further that current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the executive secretary.

The executive secretary shall cause to be published an annual report of all income and disbursements and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least once each three months and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

The executive secretary shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expense of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

Section 4—Directors:

The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen (16) directors, each of whom shall be a regular member of a Missionary Baptist Church, which is in active co-operation with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer direct to the institution named such funds as may be undesignated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make an accounting of their administration of all funds so intrusted to them and to the corporation, to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

ARTICLE V

Method of Election and Terms of Office

Section 1—Directors:

The directors for the first year shall be those designated in the charter and as may be approved at the Convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, when the charter and these bylaws are submitted for the approval of the board.

The directors shall serve for a term of four (4) years, beginning with the 15th day of November, 1946, and the first sixteen (16) directors shall serve as follows:

for a term of four (4) years;

shall serve for a term of three (3) years;

shall serve for a term of two (2) years;

shall serve for a term of one (1) year.

Each year thereafter the Board of Directors of the Foundation shall recommend four (4) members to the directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and said Board shall then report and recommend to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma the four (4) members, to be elected, whose tenure shall be for four (4) years, and shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year.

Section 2—Other Officers:

The directors shall select from among their own number a president, and one or more vice-presidents, each of whom shall hold office for one year.

Section 3—Vacancies:

Vacancies on the board of directors arising by reason of death, expiration of term, resignation, removal from state, or for any cause, shall be filled by the remaining directors. If the Baptist General Convention shall fail to confirm any director chosen in the foregoing manner, the remaining directors shall choose another director to succeed the one failing of confirmation. In the event the Convention does not approve the nominations made by the directors, the Convention shall nominate and elect directors of its own selection to fill the vacancies.

ARTICLE VI

Board of Directors

Section 1—Regular Meeting:

The board of directors shall meet and organize as soon as possible after their election, which shall be their organization meeting. Thereafter, they shall hold at least two meetings annually at such time and place as they may determine.

Section 2—Called Meetings:

Called meetings may be had upon call of the president or upon the request of any three members of the board of directors, and the president or secretary shall give sufficient notice of the time and place thereof to enable the directors to attend.

Section 3—Committee:

The board of directors may, at their first meeting, or any subsequent meeting, appoint from their own number such committee, or committees, and delegate to it or them such authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable, so long as the same shall be within the limits of their own authority and discretion.

Section 4—Quorum:

A quorum of the board of directors shall consist of at least five (5) members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

Section 5—Extent of Authority:

The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinstatement and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral

deeds, releases, receipts, acquaintances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation, and the purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them is executed by the president or vice-president of the board of directors and, in the case of real estate, attested by the secretary under the seal of the corporation; and upon proper resolution of the board of directors. And where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions. In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

ARTICLE VII

Distributees

All funds so received and administered by the corporation and distributed as herein provided, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VIII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form, and shall consist of _____, around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

“THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.”

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of members present and voting at any annual meeting of this corporation held in connection with the meetings of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No amendment shall be voted on until the same has first been presented at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, nor shall any such amendment become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. T. B. Lackey, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

(a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.

(b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

(c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

(d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.

(e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.

(f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.

(g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:

(1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;

(2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;

(3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;

(4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

(5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or non-negotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

(h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.

(i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation

ARTICLE I

Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. **WAIVER AND CONSENT.** The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II

Directors

Section 1. **NUMBER.** The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. **ELECTION AND TERMS.** The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. **QUORUM.** Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III

Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meeting.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V

President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI

Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. **POWERS AND DUTIES.** The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. **POWERS AND DUTIES.** The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X**Notice of Regular Meetings**

Section 1. **DISPENSED WITH.** Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI**Amendments**

Section 1. **METHOD OF AMENDMENT.** These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII**Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds**

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

6. Joe Hubb Collier presented the report of the Credentials Committee:

"The Committee on Credentials recommends that the 750 persons who have registered to date, as duly elected messengers from the churches co-operating with and contributing to the work of this convention, under the terms set forth in Article II of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and such other messengers who shall properly register during the convention, constitute this 1970 convention."

7. Motion carried to approve the recommendation.

8. H. H. Hobbs, chairman of the Program Committee, made the following recommendation:

"That the program as printed and distributed among the messengers serve as the official program of this annual session of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, with such changes as may become necessary throughout the convention."

9. Motion carried to approve the recommendation.

10. Special music was presented by the "Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma" under the direction of Bill Littleton, minister of music, Eastwood Church of Tulsa.

11. Robert Denny, first vice-president was called to preside over the convention during the time of the president's annual message.

(1) Members of the Portland Avenue Church, Oklahoma City were introduced.

12. J. P. Dane brought the annual message of the president. His subject was "The Divine Dimension." Scripture text was I Samuel 17:45, 47.

13. Gene Bartlett led the convention in singing the hymn "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name."

14. Joe L. Ingram, assistant executive secretary-treasurer, presented the report on Stewardship-Cooperative Program.

15. James Lackey, executive director-treasurer elect, Stewardship Commission, Southern Baptist Convention, was presented and spoke on Stewardship and the Cooperative Program.

16. James Lackey presented a "gavel" from Dennis Treat, missionary in Uruguay, to President J. P. Dane.

17. Special music was presented by the "Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma."

18. Carl Bates, president, Southern Baptist Convention, pastor, First Church, Charlotte, N. C., brought the closing message of this session of the convention. His subject was "Why Are Our Lips Closed in the Day of Good Tidings?" His Scripture text was II Kings 7:3 ff.

19. Joe Ingram led the convention in a closing prayer.

The convention stood adjourned until Tuesday morning, Nov. 10, 1970.

Tuesday Morning November 10, 1970

20. Robert Denny, first vice-president, called the convention to order at 9 a.m.

21. Fred Jackson, minister of music and education, Parkland Church, Tulsa, led the convention in singing the hymns, "I Am Resolved," "Nothing But the Blood" and "I Saw the Cross of Jesus."

22. Don Clark, pastor, First Church, Marietta, read Romans 8:1-6 and led in prayer.

23. Kyle M. Yates Jr., professor, the Chair of Bible, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, began the first of a series of Bible studies, on the theme "Prophetic Voices for Today."

24. J. T. Roberts, secretary, Department of Missions, presented the report of the department.

Department of Missions

J. T. Roberts, Secretary

The Department of Missions has been assigned the responsibility of coordinating, interpreting, promoting and directing the missions programs of the state convention.

Effective Jan. 1, 1970 the organizational structure of the Department was revised and additional responsibilities were assigned to the two associates:

Robert Haskins, director of language missions, also directs work related to non-evangelicals, seminary extension and chaplaincy ministries (industrial, institutional, and military).

John W. Brill, director of work with National Baptists, also directs the program of Christian social ministries.

Associational Administrative Services

It is the purpose of the program of associational administrative services to work with and assist the 37 associations of the state convention and their superintendents of missions toward achieving more effective administration in the association by providing information and guidance to associational leaders in all areas of state and associational missions.

Christian Social Ministries

Christian social ministries is an emphasis on Christian witness that helps churches respond to both the physical and spiritual needs of people through mission centers, juvenile rehabilitation, literacy ministries, migrant ministries, disaster relief, rehabilitation work with alcoholics, drug abusers and ex-prisoners, and through jail ministries and ministries to the aging.

This program helps to support four mission projects in Oklahoma. They are the Baptist Mission Center in Oklahoma City, Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City, the Baptist Educational Center in Tulsa, and a student community project at Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee.

Plans are now being made to introduce the different areas of Christian social ministries to our state through the Metropolitan Missions Conferences and Rural-Urban Missions Conferences scheduled for February of 1971, and other associational and state conferences.

Work with National Baptists

The state director of work with National Baptists works with leaders of the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention (Negro) in an effort to strengthen their local churches and their denominational program.

Area stewardship conferences are held each year. Tithers Enrolment Day materials are distributed and assistance is given to pastors who wish to conduct a Tithers Enrolment Day. A statewide evangelistic conference was conducted at Fairview Church, Oklahoma City, on March 3, 1970. Approximately 150 pastors and leaders attended this conference.

The National Baptist Youth Assembly was held June 8-12 at Falls Creek; 151 young people and sponsors were registered. Seventy decisions were recorded during the assembly.

The Oklahoma Baptist State Convention is developing Camp Burgess, a youth assembly near Luther. During the spring and sum-

mer of 1970, a dormitory valued at about \$30,000 was erected. The Home Mission Board contributed \$15,000 to this project. Through the State Mission Season of Prayer Offering in 1970 an additional \$12,000 will be made available for this camp. Present facilities include a dormitory, a dining room, and a tabernacle.

Six Negro students in Oklahoma have received scholarship assistance for college and seminary training for the school year of 1970-71.

A new teacher-missionary was employed in August of 1970 to work with the students at Langston University. Other workers sponsored through the Department of Missions are: an executive secretary-treasurer, an executive secretary of women's work, and two directors of educational centers in Tulsa and Oklahoma City.

Non-Evangelicals

The objective of the program of work related to non-evangelicals is to work with and assist churches and associations in witnessing to people of non-Christian world religions and to all other non-evangelicals. This program has been presented to the Superintendents of Missions and will be launched on a statewide basis in 1971.

Seminary Extension

The Seminary Extension Department provides the best in off-campus seminary study in your home community. The six Southern Baptist seminaries jointly sponsor this program and direct it through this department. The program is designed to develop leaders, provide instruction in Bible, doctrines, church history, preaching, religious education, music and other vital subjects. There are several Extension Centers in the state.

Chaplaincy Ministries

(Industrial, Institutional and Military)

The objective of the program of chaplaincy ministries is to bring Southern Baptist ministers into contact with chaplaincy opportunities and to work with and assist churches and associations in providing a spiritual ministry to military personnel and their families, and to persons in penal and other institutions, and business and industry.

A state chaplaincy conference is planned for Jan. 19, 1971 in Oklahoma City in co-operation with the Baptist Hospital chaplaincy of our state and the Home Mission Board.

New Mission and New Church Sites

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is endeavoring to assist associations in the purchase of sites for new missions and churches. The Department of Missions has been given the responsibility of distributing these funds according to a formula adopted by the Board of Directors.

The following associations have received these funds from the 1969 allocations: Enon, Panhandle, Pottawatomie-Lincoln, Tulsa, and Rogers.

World Missions Conferences

In co-operation with the Foreign Mission Board, the Home Mission Board and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, each association is entitled to a World Missions Conference every four years. The four-year cycle is:

The five objectives suggested as special emphases during a World Missions Conference are: (1) stimulate soul-winning; (2) encourage organization of local missions; (3) inspire concerted prayer for missions; (4) increase financial support of missions; and (4) secure life commitments to mission service.

Caddo, Comanche-Cotton, Delaware-Osage, East Central, and Salt Fork associations had World Missions Conferences in 1970.

State Baptist Bible Conference

There were 250 full-time registrations for the 1970 Bible conference May 12-15. The 1971 conference is scheduled for May 11-14, on the Falls Creek Assembly grounds. The program personnel will be: Manuel Scott, pastor of Calvary Church, Los Angeles, Calif.; Harper Shannon, pastor of First Church, Dothan, Ala.; Robert Naylor, president of Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, and T. B. Lackey, executive secretary-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Language Missions 1970

This has been a good year in our language mission work. In March we had our annual workshop for missionaries jointly employed by the Home Mission Board and the state convention. It was a good

meeting with inspiration and information being shared by all. The missionaries expressed gratitude for the help given. Another meeting was held in September with the missionaries to plan a strategy for language missions for the future.

Financial assistance is being given to 40 fields of language mission work through the Department of Missions. Those who serve have reported 590 professions of faith during the past year through their ministry.

The nine language assemblies held in our state recorded a total registration of 1,843 with 377 decisions, 134 of these being professions of faith.

Thirty-five Indian pastors and missionaries were assisted financially in attending the State Bible Conference at Falls Creek Baptist Assembly. Those attending experienced a great spiritual blessing and expressed a desire to attend again next year. Also, six Indian lay leaders were assisted financially in attending Glorieta and Ridgecrest Baptist Assemblies this past summer.

The Spanish work in our state is expanding. We now have five organized missions, three mission stations that meet monthly, and two new Spanish departments organized in two Anglo churches. The Spanish assembly doubled its registrations over last summer. There are still other areas that we hope to move into with a Baptist witness this next year.

The deaf work continues to grow in our state with more and more lay people sharing in this vital ministry. The deaf youth camp was held this summer at Camp Hudgens on Lake McAlester. The week was a great success. Next year promises to be an even greater year with the experience and inspiration gained through this year's camping program.

Language missions in Oklahoma provides a ministry to Indian, Spanish, Orientals, deaf, and other language culture groups with missionaries serving in each area.

Special Mission Ministries

Student summer missions—The Home Mission Board employs college and seminary students to serve as summer missionaries in the various states and areas of home mission work under the supervision of the state missions department and the local superintendents of missions. The purpose of student summer missions is to meet mission needs while providing an opportunity for students to discover their interest and aptitudes for mission service. Twelve of these students served in our state during the summer of 1970.

US-2 Workers—College graduates who are 27 years and younger are appointed to serve for two years in urgent mission tasks. One young man has just finished a term of service in Oklahoma, and an application has been made for another to serve in 1971.

Church Missions Committee

On Jan. 1, 1970 the church missions committee was recognized by the Inter Agency Council of the Southern Baptist Convention as

an administrative service committee to make studies, recommend plans and administer work assigned to it.

Every church is being urged to have a mission committee recommended by the nominating committee and elected by the church to conduct studies and recommend plans for local mission work. Information concerning this committee is available from the Department of Missions.

Rural-Urban Missions

Rural-Urban Missions is a program designed for associations composed of rural, town and small city areas. In addition to the programs listed above there is a program of resort missions. Many of our churches and associations are carrying on a resort ministry. Pittsburg Association and First Church of Eufaula in co-operation with the state convention and the Home Mission Board sponsored two student summer missionaries in a 10-week resort missions program last summer.

Five area rural-urban missions conferences are scheduled for February of 1971.

Metropolitan Missions

Metropolitan missions serves churches and associations in metropolitan areas. In addition to the programs described above, there is a program of apartment missions. Through conferences, clinics and depth studies, the Department of Missions is helping these associations to find ways and means of more effectively reaching the people in these areas. Metropolitan missions conferences are scheduled for Oklahoma City and Tulsa in February of 1971.

Church Music

Gene Bartlett, Secretary

Since our last convention many great things have happened in the field of church music.

New materials such as **The Church Musician**, **Choral Tones**, **Choral Overtones**, **Opus One**, **Opus Two**, **Makers of Music**, **Young Musicians**, and **The Music Leader** have come from the Baptist Sunday School Board in order to make us more effective in our local church programs.

Your music department also has charge of the music for the state evangelistic conference in January. Then in the spring we had one of our greatest junior choir festivals meeting on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University with 1,689 juniors attending. The festival was directed by Mrs. Pete Butler.

The Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma made history by flying to the Baptist World Alliance in Tokyo and singing daily for this most impressive meeting. On our way we witnessed to service men in Anchorage, Alaska who were on their way to Vietnam. We also had the privilege of singing at EXPO 70.

Then there is Falls Creek! What a year for witnessing to teenagers. We have averaged 450 in the choir each week at Falls Creek

and about 90 per cent of these are from the small churches in Oklahoma. We see a great improvement in the music in our smaller churches and plan to make a major thrust with the teenagers. We also plan to set up music leadership classes especially designed to help the music leadership in our small churches.

We have started a new part-time music directors' fellowship in Rogers and Delaware-Osage associations. We continue to meet regularly with the Tulsa and Oklahoma County part-time organizations. It is our desire that we have one of these in every association.

Our latest attempt to communicate with teenagers has been a folk song writing competition and a Youth Celebration in the Civic Center Music Hall in Oklahoma City which was built around music.

Several of our associations have junior choir camps. Our department assists financially and with promotion of these efforts. Oklahoma County associational camp enrolled 575 juniors; Tulsa association, 290 juniors; Banner, Enon, Arbuckle and Mullins associations combined with a total of 375 juniors.

I Corinthians 14:15 reads: "I will pray with the spirit, and I will pray with the understanding also: I will sing with the spirit, and I will sing with the understanding also." This is my desire for the music program in all of our churches."

Baptist Messenger

Jack L. Gritz, Editor

The state Baptist paper, the **Baptist Messenger**, is dedicated to the task of keeping Oklahoma Baptists informed concerning their churches and denomination. There is no other publication of any kind which seeks to meet this need. In the truest sense the **Messenger** is a missionary magazine, telling each week the news of local church activities, the agencies and institutions of the state convention, and all the work of the Southern Baptist Convention including home missions and foreign missions.

The purpose of the publication is to help church members become well-informed as Baptists and spiritually mature as Christians. For this reason many articles of a devotional, doctrinal and inspirational nature are printed. Most of our churches have seen the wisdom of providing this news magazine to the families in the church membership each week just as other helpful literature is provided. The cost to the churches is only four cents per copy and the church treasurer

receives a monthly statement. Since the publication appears 50 times each year the cost annually to the church for each subscription is \$2. Individual subscriptions are \$2.50 each per year.

This year the quality of paper used has been greatly increased and is now slightly superior to that used by most national magazines. This makes for a more attractive and easier read publication. The circulation is now the largest which it has ever been in the publication's 58 years of history. We wish to be of as much service as possible to our churches and our convention and through them to our Lord. Please join us in a prayer that we may be used effectively to that end.

The '70's have ushered in a new decade and with it many changes in religious as well as secular circles. Many of us have accepted the changes, caught step and moved forward in the meaningful task of using new ideas, new methods and new materials to tell the old, old story.

We have heard many and varied comments about the purpose for all these changes and some have chided us about spending our Book Store earnings; so perhaps this is a good opportunity to clarify some of the thinking.

To begin with, may we say that Baptist Sunday School Board, our parent organization, does not receive funds from the Cooperative Program, as some suppose, but rather puts a portion of its earnings back into each state.

Many of our stores are not self-supporting, due to the lack of sufficient Baptist strength; therefore it is necessary for those of us who are, to help carry these mission stores.

Through the earnings of the stores, we are privileged to have a part in many mission endeavors; and many free helps, available to our churches, are provided through this avenue. Primarily we serve Baptist churches; however other individuals and churches help us, through the use of our books and materials.

It is through the loyal support of our people that both stores in Oklahoma have been able to maintain a reasonable net income; and for this, we want to say "thank you" and may we have the privilege of continuing to serve you.

Hospitals and Golden Age Homes

T. B. Lackey, Director

The committee met Feb. 6 at Holiday Inn, Enid with the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Governing Board and Authority. The joint committees brought a report and recommendation to the Board of Directors authorizing the issuance of additional debentures for Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital in the amount of \$700,000. The resolution was adopted by the board on May 5 and it appears in the report of the Board of Directors.

A second meeting was held on March 10 jointly with the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City and a special planning committee composed of the Oklahoma County members of the Board of Directors. A report and recommendation was

presented to the board on May 5 concerning enlargement of Baptist Memorial Hospital and Doctors' Medical Building. A complete report is recorded in the report of the Board of Directors.

June 15, a third meeting was held to make plans for opening of the enlarged Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and reorganizing the administrative staff for the proper operation of the 240 bed hospital. Joe Baker, who has served as administrator at Enid for 18 years was approved as Executive Director of Development, and Eugene Baxter was approved as administrator effective Aug. 1, 1970.

The division of responsibilities between the executive director of development and administrator are as follows:

Executive Director of Development

1. Oversee general operations of all convention owned properties related to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital. This should include:

- A. Advice and counsel to the administrator in management and administration of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital.
- B. Continuation of the present negotiations for sale of school of nursing property.
- C. Continue attempts for the recruitment of physicians for the clinic building.

2. Direct the new building program to completion with the counsel of the administrator.

3. Supervise the planning and renovation of the old building inside and out with counsel of the administrator.

4. Continue the present program of fund raising and development for improvement of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital properties and equipment.

5. Continue management of the bond program.

Administrator

1. Shall be given the complete authority and responsibility for internal operations of the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and School of Nursing including but not limited to the following:

- A. Medical Staff
- B. Hospital Board
- C. Management of all hospital departments
- D. Personnel

2. Participation in community relations activities including:

- A. Public Relations
- B. Press Relations
- C. Contacts with other hospitals
- D. Organization memberships

3. Assist the executive director of development in the completion of the new building and remodeling of the old building.

4. Work jointly with the executive director of development in the recruitment of physicians for the clinic building and Enid.

5. Such other responsibilities considered important to the furthering of Baptist work in the community and state whether health facility related or not.

Eugene Baxter

The new administrator at Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Eugene Baxter is a native of southwestern Oklahoma. He served in several administrative positions in hospitals and came to this position from the State Department of Health. Baxter has a B.A. degree in journalism from the University of Oklahoma, a B.S. degree in hospital administration from Oklahoma Baptist University, an M.S. degree in administration from Wichita State University and he is working on a doctorate of public health at University of Oklahoma School of Health-Medical School.

Chaplains

Francis Broyles, who served as chaplain of the Grand Valley Hospital for a number of years, terminated his work Oct. 1. John Strutton, chaplain of the two hospitals at Talihina, was transferred to Pryor. Stanley Taylor, presently superintendent of missions in North Canadian association, will retire from this position Feb. 15, 1971. He will become chaplain of the Talihina hospitals on a retired basis on March 1, 1971.

David Foster

David Foster, who served as administrator of the Stillwater Municipal Hospital until the convention discontinued the operation of the hospital, has been assisting the executive secretary-treasurer in directing the hospitals and golden age homes work. Foster served several months as administrator of the Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes and is still officially the administrator, but he is giving considerable time to supervising the other Baptist hospitals and golden age homes.

Ray Northrip Medical Clinic Falls Creek Assembly

The hospital office directs the medical clinic at Falls Creek each year. Administrators, nurses and physicians assist as medical missionaries. Oklahoma Baptists are indebted to these for the time they give in service.

Christian Life Committee

W. E. Smith, Chairman

The Christian life is entered into by repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ. This enables the man of faith to come into right relationship with the God of grace. The Christian life develops as the believer brings under the Lordship of Christ every area and relationship of life. The lessons of God's Word are never out of date. The Bible message concerning the great moral issues, public and private, with which Christians must come to grips, is as pertinent to this modern age as it was 20 centuries ago. The greatest satisfaction and

the highest usefulness of the Christian lies in complete obedience to the Lord's commands. Let us examine the application of the Christian message to the most pressing problems of our day.

Pornography and Mass Media

The advance in production and distribution of pornographic materials in our country, especially to unsuspecting children, immature youth and maladjusted adults, is deplorable and alarming.

We urge our people to exercise personal integrity in being alert to licentious literature, to study local, state and federal laws concerning the control of such, and to express tactfully their disapproval of this material to senators and congressmen, as well as to those who print or sell such material.

Parents are urged to be cautious and discrete in selecting the media allowed in their homes and to be prepared to discuss with their children the ways in which prevalent television, movie and record themes vary from Christian ideals. Every positive action should be taken to encourage wholesome literature as opposed to that which is unwholesome.

Alcohol

Oklahoma Baptists and other forces of righteousness in our nation face a continuing battle over the problems caused by the sale and use of intoxicating beverages. Alcohol has been called "the ignored drug with the polished image." The problems caused by alcohol are increasing in alarming proportions each year.

Reliable estimates indicate that there are now over nine million alcoholics in the nation; that the economic waste caused by alcohol abuse is approximately \$7 billion annually; that as many as 50 per cent of our highway fatalities are connected with problem drinking, and that alcoholism is now rated our fourth major disease in terms of seriousness and number affected. Even these figures do not tell half the story of the terrible toll in wasted lives, broken homes, destruction of youth, misery and heartache.

Perhaps the greatest impediment to a strong constructive spirit of moral outrage against alcohol and alcohol abuse is the fact that Christians have wearied in the long struggle and there is a tendency toward complacency. Our state is most fortunate to have the Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education organization, under the capable leadership of Ross McLennan, to lead out in this vital issue. We urge all Oklahoma Baptist churches to give SANE financial, prayerful and moral support.

We hope that both individual Christians and churches will stand up and be counted in this continuing struggle.

Secularism

The popular philosophy of our age is to give higher regard for worldly matters than to spiritual matters. We are alarmed at this growing secularism in our society.

Certain inroads have been made toward secularization through our public schools. We are not advocating a return to sectarian ap-

proach in public education. However, we do deplore circumstances when they arise where children are reprimanded and reproved by their instructors for attributing to God his place of sovereignty in their personal lives and on the stage of history. We protest the use of any curriculum materials in our system of public education which seek to answer the great spiritual questions concerning life but, without giving consideration to Jesus Christ, whose life and teaching are more evident in our society than any other.

Secularism is making its greatest onslaught perhaps through the printed page. Atheistic, agnostic and humanistic writers are foisting their philosophies off on unsuspecting readers, young and old, who frequent the growing number of newsstands and bookstores where all titles are sold without regard to the content. Pornography, treated elsewhere in this report, proceeds directly from this secularistic philosophy of life.

We believe the greatest deterrent to secularism is an aroused Christian citizenry speaking and acting responsibly in whatever capacity of influence they may have.

Involvement in Public Affairs

Spiritual growth and a definite responsible ministry should follow the vital first step of believing in Christ as Savior and Lord. We urge each local church to establish a Christian Life Committee to be the guiding force in promoting and magnifying the application of Christian principles in every area and relationship of life. Concern and active involvement by Christian men and women in all segments of public affairs is essential to elevating the civic righteousness of our communities.

We recommend the use of the pamphlet, "The Christian Life Committee Guidebook," in establishing such a committee. Guidelines, functions and resources are clearly presented. Other resource material is available from the Christian Life Commission, SBC.

Race Relations

We assert our belief in the worth and dignity of every human being regardless of race, color or national origin as is manifest in the Scriptures.

Again we call upon each person to accept his own responsibility in solving the problems associated with race, and we also call upon the churches to preach the biblical truths relative to race and to exemplify the mind and spirit of our Lord in all human relationships.

We would give the added challenge to all of our churches to recognize in those international students who are among us as our greatest potential source of gifted missionaries to their own people and to take appropriate steps to win them to Christ and a life of obedience to him.

Drugs

We wish to emphasize the dangers inherent in the "permissive acceptance" of the use of drugs by our society and in the publicity given

by the various news media to those promoting the use of marijuana, LSD, and other hallucinatory drugs for the solving of life's problems and the attainment of an emotional utopia.

We must utilize every resource to educate ourselves, our children and the public in all facets of drug usage—the benefit to mankind to certain drugs when used properly in the practice of medicine, and the authenticated and documented dangers of all drugs when used improperly by a permissive society.

We again wish to commend many law enforcement officers, court officials and various organizations for taking positive action against the growing drug traffic which has become so alarming, especially among the youth.

We urge churches and their members to become increasingly active in every legitimate means of reclaiming and rehabilitating drug users.

Sunday Closing

We would recommend that our churches give full support to the statewide efforts now being made to bring about a Sunday closing law in Oklahoma. Churches have a vital interest at stake in the preservation of Sunday as a day of worship and rest. A widespread disregard of Sunday would weaken our witness and reduce our opportunity to enlist people in Bible study and church attendance.

Since the current initiative petition being circulated by "the Citizens for a Day of Rest and Relaxation" will, in effect, result in the closing of many business houses on Sunday, we urge that our churches give the project their full support and co-operation.

44. R. C. Miller, Oklahoma annuity secretary, Southern Baptist Convention, presented the report of the Annuity Board.

Annuity Board

R. C. Miller, Oklahoma Secretary

Most active and retired members of the Southern Baptist Protection Program have received increased benefits from the "good experience credit" for the first time during 1970.

"Good experience credit" and the 13th check are methods of sharing equitably excess interest earnings and actuarial gains with both active and retired lives. Annual experience is the basis for these credits.

A total of 6,558 retired persons, church staff members and denominational employees, have received monthly retirement benefits amounting to more than \$4.4 million during 1970, which included the

amount given for "good experience credit." Southern Baptists used the facilities of the Annuity Board to distribute \$70,546 to 440 relief recipients through funds of the Cooperative Program.

More than \$69.1 million in retirement benefits has been paid by the Annuity Board in its 52-year history; approximately \$8.9 million in relief grants also has been channeled through the Board by Southern Baptists.

Marked increases have also been noted in the Annuity Board life and health insurance services during the first half of this year. The new Group Insurance Program, initiated in late 1969, and the Board's older Life Benefit Plan, now provide life insurance coverage for more than 23,000 persons. The total volume of life insurance in force now exceeds \$342 million.

During 1970, life insurance claims have amounted to \$583,210, while more than \$2.2 million has been paid for health insurance claims. More than 16,000 persons are currently participating in the Annuity Board health insurance programs.

The total number of Oklahoma churches is 630 currently participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program. In this state convention, the number of new members enrolled in Plan A is 33. There are 13 state Baptist agencies in the Program which include:

45. Stanley Jordan, chairman of the Memorials Committee led the Convention in the memorial service, for those who had departed to be with the Lord since our last Convention.

"Paul said, 'having a desire to depart and be with Christ which is far better.' Again, he said, 'Absent from the body; present with the Lord.'"

"Moreover, we believe these spirits who have departed the body are alive, conscious, and active. The rich man in hell looked up and saw Abraham and Lazarus. He recognized them and called them by name. They all remembered their experiences and relationships back on the earth.

"Peter, James and John saw Moses and Elijah on the Mount of Transfiguration and heard them talking to Jesus about His departure from the earth.

"Our departed loved ones then, are alive, with the Lord, and in a state of blessedness. They have finished their course down here, but their works continue through us."

Following the Scripture reading by Robert S. Scales, and prayer by G. H. Crittenden, the members of the committee read the names of our known departed pastors and denominational leaders; then Howard Lee, minister of music of First Church, Muskogee, sang "Face to Face with Christ My Savior."

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Secretary

During the past year the Historical Commission held two meetings. M. J. Lee, Guymon, has served as chairman. Items of business transacted in the meetings included the following reports and recommendations to the state convention:

Encyclopedia

Work was completed on the Oklahoma material for the **Encyclopedia of Southern Baptists**, Vol. III. A total of 9,132 words of material was submitted to the Historical Commission, SBC, at a basic cost to Oklahoma in the sum of \$182.64. The new **Encyclopedia** is due for publication in 1971.

Lackey Book

Sam Scantlan has met regularly with the Commission for progress reports on his book on the life of T. B. Lackey, which Scantlan proposes to entitle, **T. B. Lackey: The Man and an Epoch**. The manuscript is due for completion this fall, and the book will be ready for sale by summer, 1971.

Book Inventory

According to the latest inventory the state convention still has the following books in stock, which were published under auspices of the Historical Commission: **Not Yours But You**, by W. A. Carleton, 80 hard back and 316 paper; **A Question Once Asked**, by Argye Briggs, 169 hard back and 647 paper; **Andrew Potter, Baptist Builder**, by Sam W. Scantlan, 20 hard back and 1 paper; **Trail Blazers of Sooner Baptists**, by J. M. Gaskin, 23 hard back and 16 paper; **Annals of OBU**, by James N. Thornton Report

Two years ago E. W. Thornton became curator of the historical collection at the OBU library. The Heritage Room, which houses the collection, actually consists of two adjoining rooms with over 700 square feet of floor space. Shelves, cupboards, boxes, work tables, archival fibredex boxes of the type used in archives constitute the principal method of preserving materials. Filing cabinets are used for some materials, and shelves hold bound volumes.

Groupings of the historical materials fall mostly into the following categories: **SBC Annals**; State Convention **Annals**; **Baptist Messenger** files; **Annals (Minutes)** of many Baptist associations; files of **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**, **Yahnseh**, and **OBU Bison**; micro-

filmed records; many books; letter files; church histories; pictures, and artifacts.

Three large personal collections are housed in the collection, but have not been processed. These are the L. W. Marks, E. C. Routh, and J. B. Rounds materials. The Rounds collection is the largest of these.

When new items are received, they are acknowledged and a careful record is made. During the past two years about 34 separate contributions have been received. This category includes certain misplaced material which has been recovered from closets and storage rooms elsewhere on campus, the most recent being original copies of minutes of the Board of Trustees of both OBU and Oklahoma Baptist College at Blackwell. Such records are now being placed in fireproof or fire-resistant safes, but it is important that more use be made of microfilming and other duplicating methods of assuring the preservation of rare materials.

Thornton says, "Perhaps the chief purpose of keeping historical data, along with other reasons, is to make the records accessible for research and writing. An indication of the growing availability and use of our records is the fact that during the past two years 13 persons have made use of these sources at OBU for major research, several results of which have been published."

Publishing Policy

Robert S. Jackson, Poteau, submitted a report from a committee of which he was made chairman, to recommend policies for the Commission on publications. The report as revised and approved by the Commission in its Sept. 17, 1970 meeting reads:

I. WRITERS:

Writers for and of articles, books and addresses shall be solicited by the following methods:

1. Writers who are solicited by the Historical Commission to write a certain work for publication.

2. Writers who believe they have a manuscript which is in keeping with the nature and work of the Historical Commission may submit it on the following bases:

- (1) The article be submitted to the Committee on Publications which will review the manuscript and decide upon its suitability as a published article of the Historical Commission.

- (2) Unsolicited articles may be considered for publication by the Committee without remuneration to the writer if the content and subject matter is acceptable.

- (3) Any paper or address delivered at the annual meeting of the Historical Society may be used by the Commission for publication in the **Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**.

- (4) Articles reprinted by permission from other journals will not be considered material for which an honorarium is due.

II. STANDARDS:

1. The best standards of writing style shall be employed in articles, books, addresses, and papers. The style used shall be that of the latest edition of the Chicago **Manual of Style**.

2. All articles are to be documented and the request to use copy-right material is the responsibility of the writer and he must possess correspondence granting such permission.

3. All books of biography, history or research works shall be documented to enhance their worth. Documentation shall conform to the acceptable style of listing footnotes and references.

III. ACCEPTABLE WORKS:

Writings of any type which are submitted for acceptance to the Committee on Publication, whether by solicitation or unsolicited, shall be judged on the merit of their basic and relative worth to the nature and scope of the Historical Commission. Monetary return or public response is not to be a deciding factor.

IV. SCOPE OF MATERIAL:

Material which is selected by the Historical Commission will be related to the function, nature and purpose of the Commission in its publishing ventures. This material may be of varied nature: Books of history, biography, research articles, speeches and addresses.

V. REMUNERATION:

1. When a book, article, speech or address is requested or accepted from a writer by the Committee on Publication for publication by the Historical Commission, the Committee will work out an agreement suitable both to the writer and the Historical Commission.

2. Addresses or papers delivered to the annual meeting of the Historical Society and used in the **Chronicle** may be used without remuneration.

3. Articles reprinted by permission from other journals will not be considered material for which an honorarium is due.

Guidelines for Historical Collection

As a firm policy concerning the historical collection at OBU, the Commission voted Sept. 17, 1970 to adopt the following guidelines:

1. The Historical Commission welcomes people to give materials of all kinds—photographs, manuscripts, diaries, journals, letter files, artifacts, and similar items for the historical collection at Oklahoma Baptist University.

2. The Commission reserves the right to place, display, catalog, classify, and otherwise determine the best ways to make use of such materials.

3. The Administration at OBU is respectfully requested to provide more space for our expanding collection as soon as possible.

4. We should endeavor as best we can to keep materials in our collection intact and at all times under the careful supervision of our authorized curator (who at the present time is E. W. Thornton).

5. A leaflet should be prepared in vast quantity for distribution informing Oklahoma Baptists of what is available in our collection and the necessary procedures in making use of these materials.

6. We should encourage the general public, and Baptists in particular, to make use of our materials in research for theses, anniversaries, church and other histories, and any other useful purpose which our materials may serve.

Recommendations

The Commission recommends the adoption of the Publishing Policy and Guidelines for the Historical Collection as outlined above; that more Oklahoma Baptists join the Historical Society, auxiliary to the Commission; that more churches, associations, and institutions write and publish their histories; and that churches, associations, and institutions microfilm minutes and other valuable primary historical sources.

(1) E. W. Thornton, curator of the historical collection at the OBU Library, spoke concerning the work of the historical materials of the convention.

(2) M. J. Lee presented the "publishing policies" of the Historical Commission and the recommendation of the Commission, incorporated in the report.

47. Motion carried to approve the report and recommendation.

48. Clyde Clayton, secretary, Department of Student Work presented the report of the department.

Baptist Student Union

Clyde Clayton, Director

Concern expressed by Oklahoma Baptists has made 1970 a year of both expansion and stability in student work. Concern has been shown in many ways. More laymen and pastors are giving time for the benefit of BSU than ever before. Two major Student Center building projects are under way. One at Weatherford and one at Tahlequah. Centers at Norman and Stillwater have been remodeled. The tenure of talented competent BSU directors is lengthening. Evangelistic zeal has been strong.

More funds have been channeled into student work from churches in the vicinity of the schools. Nearly all associations participate in one or more BSU programs. Wills and trusts are being written on behalf of student work with the assistance of the Baptist Foundation. All of the churches will make a larger contribution than ever through the Cooperative Program.

Advance Funds have been a life saver for BSU. But, more importantly, students have been saved and their lives strengthened in Christ because of concern of Oklahoma Baptists.

Members of the BSU Committee from the Board of Directors are: D. A. Williams, chairman, Mrs. T. Roy Barnes, Pete Butler, Monroe Palmer, Earnest Potter and Mrs. Dan Rainbolt.

C. Murray Fuquay serves as chairman of the full committee.

William G. Kersh and A. E. Nikkel presented preliminary plans for remodeling and additional space at Grove General Hospital. This would provide for rechanneling public traffic away from the area of the operating rooms, additional office space, and more space for the clinic for x-ray and laboratories. A motion was adopted for the hospital's administration, governing board and sub-committee to bring any recommendations for definite expansion to the Board of Directors.

Preliminary plans for remodeling and additional space at Miami Baptist Hospital were presented by William G. Kersh. The hospital's governing board recommended that architects be asked to do an over-

all master plan for expansion, and that new construction to provide better location of present facilities and space for some new facilities be approved. It is estimated that this would cost approximately \$1½ million. The committee approved a motion for the hospital's governing board, administration and sub-committee of the building committee serve on this project for future recommendations to the Board of Directors.

The Camp Hudgens sub-committee inspected and approved the construction of a new unit lodge which cost approximately \$10,200. The lodge was ready for use during the 1970 camping season. Already approved by the Board of Directors is the construction of a residence for the camp director. It should be ready for use by the summer of 1971.

The new water system was in use for the various assemblies at Falls Creek. The committee looked with favor on the Architectural Department of the Sunday School Board helping to develop a master plan for an administration unit at Falls Creek Assembly. The unit would include the Baptist Book Store, administration building, cafeteria, grocery store and other such facilities. The Baptist Book Store will be the first phase of the development as approved previously by the Board of Directors.

Some of the outside buildings at Boys Ranch Town were destroyed or heavily damaged during a tornado in the spring. These buildings have been replaced or repaired through insurance. Judson Cook reported to the committee that the great need is for activities buildings at both the ranch and the Baptist Children's Home. Each would cost approximately \$253,000. A financial feasibility study was presented and it was thought that by 1972 or 1973 these could possibly be built.

The new student union building at Oklahoma Baptist University has been completed and opened for use at the beginning of the fall semester. This is an excellent facility and will contribute much to the effectiveness of the university. The trustees of the university supervised the construction of this fine building.

Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital in Enid which has been under construction for the last two years was completed in the fall of 1970. This expansion provides for 240 bed patients. It cost in excess of \$3,000,000. The above named sub-committee worked with the hospital's governing board in supervising the construction.

In 1968 upon the recommendation of the Hugo Golden Age Home governing board and the sub-committee of the building committee, the convention's Board of Directors authorized the construction of an addition to the home which would bring the capacity to approximately 100 residents. Because of the tight money situation and high cost of construction, this project has been delayed; however, the sub-committee of the building committee of the Hugo Golden Age Home agreed to proceed immediately with the construction of the new wing.

Religious Education

Lyle Garlow, Secretary

"Shaping the Seventies" activities required the majority of the resources of the Department of Religious Education during the past year. Churches and associations were assisted as we planned and conducted projects interpreting the 70's program.

Sunday school and Training Union (Church Training) leaders from every association participated in the state and associational Shaping the Seventies meetings. Of the 935 associational church program leaders given "specialized" training at the Divisional Book Institutes in March, 219 were Church Training leaders and 313 were Sunday school leaders.

There was much excitement and enthusiasm for the 70's program and it had a good start in the majority of churches through the implementation of the 70/70 LAUNCH.

Follow-up Projects

1. **The Curriculum Dialogues**, Oct. 12-23, 1970, were planned for each association. A faculty composed of editors and consultants from Nashville, along with special workers, provided assistance "close-by" each church and at the critical time of the "initial usage" of the materials.

2. **A Sunday School/Church Training Preschool-Children's and General Officers Clinic** is planned for January, 1971 (Muskogee, Jan. 18; Ponca City, Jan. 19; Clinton, Jan. 21, and Duncan, Jan. 22).

This clinic, designed for all Sunday school and Church Training workers will major on making effective use of the materials for improvement of teaching and training. It also will serve as a "Problem Solving" clinic.

3. **A Sunday School/Church Training Youth-Adult and General Officers Clinic** is scheduled for February, 1971 (Enid, Feb. 22; Lawton, Feb. 23; Pryor, Feb. 25, and McAlester, Feb. 26). The purpose and design will be similar to the previous project.

Sunday School Statistics

Sunday school enrolment for 1969 totaled 317,282. Vacation Bible School enrolment reached an all-time high of 149,026 in 1,048 schools with 1,663 professions of faith from the 560 schools reporting. For the second consecutive year, Oklahoma has led all SBC states in the number of units receiving recognition on the Achievement Guide.

Church Training Program Statistics

On the recommendation of the Religious Education Committee of the Board of Directors, April 23, 1970, we began using the designation "Church Training Program" to replace "Training Union." Churches are encouraged to make this change if they so desire.

Enrolment for Church Training in 1969 was 122,931 which is a cumulative enrolment of ongoing and short-term training, including new member orientation, church leader training, and church member training.

"M" Night attendance for 1969 was 15,444 with 864 churches represented and 690 pastors present. The regional church training conventions in 1969 registered 1,407 persons.

Youth Bible Drills and Speaker's Tournament

It has been decided to have a **Youth Bible Drill and Speaker's Tournament** on both state and SBC levels as in the past. Procedures, rules, type of drills, Scriptures and topics will be described in a book-

let, "Skill Lab: Developing Bible Skill I," available for 15 cents from the Church Literature Department, Nashville. Youth training groups in the churches will need these booklets.

Department Staff

After 13 years of faithful and excellent service, Miss Alga Motychak resigned last June. She was married to Thurman Hitchcock and moved to Altus, where he serves as minister of education. Mrs. Hitchcock has contributed immensely to the teaching and training program in Oklahoma and was highly respected and appreciated. We shall miss her but congratulate Thurman and First Church, Altus.

On June 1, 1970, Mrs. E. M. (Darlene) Koch, joined our staff as director of Preschool and Children's work. She previously served First Church, Midwest City in a similar position.

Mrs. Koch was already known in Oklahoma and was familiar with our state program and the 70's changes. Immediately she was received across the state and is already making a real contribution to our work. We feel fortunate to have her on our staff.

Other staff members include, Bill C. Haggard, associate secretary and director of Church Training; Hugh E. Willoby, director of youth and Vacation Bible School work; Mrs. Darlene Koch, director of Preschool and Children's work; Mrs. Herb Collins, administrative secretary; Mrs. Gerald Jennings, secretary to Haggard; Mrs. Hugh Harrell, Sunday school records secretary, and Mrs. Roberta Peck, receptionist.

Consultative Services

In addition to Sunday school, Church Training, and the Falls Creek program, our department provides numerous consultative services. The consultants and areas are, Haggard: church administration, church library, vocational guidance, family ministry, and audio visual education; Willoby: church recreation; Mrs. Koch: church day-care, kindergarten and special education.

66. Lowell Milburn, executive director, Child Care Department, presented the report of the department.

Child Care

Lowell D. Milburn, Executive Director

"The chief failure of our generation is one of imagination, the incapacity to realize emotionally what we know intellectually." These words of Archibald McLeish place the finger on a problem of the child care department. On one hand many of our children at the Baptist Children's Home and Boys Ranch Town come from a background where they have actually struggled for the necessities of life. A few of them have even known poverty, penury, and misery in their deprivation. On the other hand very few Oklahoma Baptists have known any desperate need of food, clothing, or shelter.

It is not easy for Americans who spend \$40 million a year on reducing pills to identify with needy children. Can an affluent people who have plenty to eat, live in fine houses, and attend comfortable churches visualize the truth that our department could actually need funds to care for the children?

The magnitude of our ministry calls for greater support. Look at our varied and helpful ministries:

The Baptist Children's Home was begun in 1903 and is now blessing the lives of some 227 boys and girls each year.

Boys Ranch Town was started in 1953 and serves some 80 boys each year who are having a difficult time at home, in school, in their community, or with the law.

An Adoption Agency is another service of our department and is licensed by the State Department of Public Welfare as is all of our work.

Foster Family Care is mainly for preschool children who are provided for in private homes. We pay their room and board and make periodic visits so as to look after their best welfare.

Counseling by a professionally trained staff helps people solve their problems about their children and their responsibility as husband and wife or father and mother.

Unwed Mother care is a helpful ministry given to the mother to help her through this trying time so she may find a healthy mental and spiritual balance.

Group Home care is a new type of service which we are beginning on our farm, north of Oklahoma City.

Through the years the ministry has changed so that now we care for children who usually are not orphans, but those who have an even greater need. It takes all the technical and professional knowledge and skills that we can provide to care for them. The use of social work, psychiatry, and psychology has become an integral part of our program in meeting the needs of today's disturbed children. Many other special services must be provided such as remedial education, vocational training, and music training of all kinds.

We believe as James teaches in his book that to care for these homeless children is the "purest form of religion." We encourage the support of the churches in the offerings which are taken each year for the benefit of the child care ministry.

Those serving on the Child Care Committee of the Board of Directors are: Chairman John Dowdy, D. H. Corwin, Walter Jolly Jr., Mrs. V. H. Landers, Mrs. M. M. Littrell and Clifford Lyon.

Evangelism

Jerold R. McBride, Secretary

A new spirit of concern for evangelism is being felt all across the state of Oklahoma. Pastors and people alike are eagerly seeking new ways and means for reaching more people for Christ.

This past year has registered some outstanding accomplishments in the area of evangelism. Good reports have come from citywide crusades, local church revivals, youth evangelism emphases and personal evangelism efforts.

Personal Evangelism Institute

Personal Evangelism Institutes which will be conducted in each of the associations across Oklahoma were termed, "A major emphasis for 1970-71," by the state evangelism committee. The purpose of the

Personal Evangelism Institute is to develop a strong program of perennial evangelism by training a large number of lay people. The Institutes give special emphasis to the Sunday school classes' becoming involved in a year around program of outreach. Twenty Personal Evangelism Institute Directors have received special training and are available to come into each association and put on a three-night Institute.

History will record that those churches and associations which became the most involved in these Institutes will reach the largest number of people.

State Evangelistic Conference

The 1971 Evangelistic Conference will be held in Northwest Church, Oklahoma City, Jan. 25-27. Some of the program personalities are Bill Glass, C. E. Autrey, Stanley Collins, Bo and Dick Baker, Franklin Paschall, Claude Rhea, Jack Stanton, John W. Williams and Victor McManus.

Falls Creek

In an effort to make more meaningful the decisions made at Falls Creek special training is provided for counselors. Also new materials have been prepared which will help the young people to understand more clearly their new relationship to Christ. The Department of Evangelism has begun a program of follow-through with each individual who registers an open decision.

The four weeks during the 1970 Falls Creek season resulted in 915 professions of faith, 823 special service decisions and 4,394 rededications. Better than one out of three full-time campers or 30.4 per cent registered an open public decision.

New Bible Study Materials

Our state secretary of evangelism along with eight other men across the Southern Baptist Convention has authored a new series of Bible study books. These books are designed to assist the new Christian as he is introduced to the Christian faith and as he grows spiritually. Also the materials are beneficial for any Christian who desires to become involved in a deeper study of the Bible. These materials will be announced in August 1970 at our Southern Baptist Assemblies.

Youth Evangelistic Conference

The Department of Evangelism and the Baptist Student Department jointly will sponsor a Youth Evangelistic Conference Dec. 30-31, 1971. The purpose of the conference will be to create a new awareness within young people of the tremendous contribution that they can make to the field of evangelistic outreach.

Melvin Moody served as chairman of the Evangelism Committee. Other members of the Board of Directors serving on this committee are: Wilton Cook, Eugene Enlow, Mart Hardin, Gerald Peters and Dan Pruitt.

Report was approved.

Oklahoma Baptist University

Robert L. Lynn, Interim President

The school year, 1969-70, featured the approval and implementation of OBU's new curriculum; the construction of the new \$1,400,000 University Center; and successful financial campaigns for the Fine Arts Center in the basement of Raley Chapel.

OBU trustees approved the new curriculum and its 4-1-4 calendar at their fall meeting. The OBU faculty spent the entire month of January in planning and implementation meetings. And OBU freshmen in the fall of 1970 entered under the new program.

Construction of the new University Center began in May, 1969, and the building was opened for use Aug. 31, 1970. With central dining facilities, lounges, meeting rooms, and recreational facilities, the University Center serves as the "living room of the campus."

In January, 1970, the Mabree Foundation of Tulsa, a philanthropic organization, pledged a \$200,000 matching grant to the completion of the Fine Arts Center, if OBU could raise an additional \$250,000. Under the direction of Robert L. Cargill, director of development, campaigns were conducted in the Oklahoma Panhandle, Northwestern Oklahoma, Northern Oklahoma, North Central Oklahoma, Southern Oklahoma, Seminole-Hughes Counties, Fort Worth, and among special interest groups such as the Bison Glee Club, Bisonettes, and alumni. By Sept. 1, 1970, nearly \$280,000 had been pledged and the \$200,000 Mabree gift secured. Added to \$150,000 which had been pledged prior to the Mabree Challenge, the total for the Fine Arts Center was about \$630,000 in September. Construction was expected to begin about Nov. 1, 1970.

With the move to the University Center, the dining hall in Kerr Dormitory and Montgomery Hall (the old student union) were freed

for conversion during the summer to women's housing. In addition to this work, new lecture rooms were constructed in Shawnee Hall.

Fall 1969 enrolment was 1,462, approximately the same as the previous year. Two hundred students were graduated in the 1970 commencement exercise. Fall 1970 registration reached a record 1,670.

At the fall 1969 convocation, honorary degrees were presented to George Dale Hann, regional assistant commissioner of the U. S. Office of Education, and Joe L. Ingram, assistant executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

During the 1969-70 year, OBU was accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Financial

Financial support for current operations and capital needs increased substantially in 1969-70. The five-year program adopted by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to almost double the annual appropriations to OBU from \$427,000 in 1966 to a projected \$850,000 in 1972 proceeded as planned. During the year, a total of \$724,545 was received through Cooperative Program support including \$261,500 in advance program funds, \$52,750 for endowment and \$94,285 for debt retirement.

In addition to the capital funds campaigns, other noteworthy gifts were received during the year. The family of the late Everett E. Neptune announced an initial gift of \$50,000 to establish an endowment in honor of this outstanding businessman and former trustee. The estate of Miss Maude Roark and a bequest from the estate of Mrs. Julia Robinette were left to the University to establish a student loan fund with a corpus expected to exceed \$50,000. The two benefactors, sisters, were early teachers of Dr. John W. Raley. Mrs. Myrtle Downing of Chandler left a \$16,000 endowment bequest.

Scholarships and grants to students at OBU were in excess of \$418,000. Of this amount, \$155,227 came from university operating funds for academic, athletic, music, ministers' dependents and other scholarships. In addition, 295 ministerial and missionary students received \$134,412 for scholarships from the Prichard Trust. Scholarships and grants from churches, lodges, and other outside sources exceeded \$128,500. Long-term loans to students accounted for an additional \$131,000 in assistance.

Endowment funds exceeded \$3,900,000 at the end of the fiscal year with endowment earnings for current operations totalling a record \$183,000 for the year.

Administrative Changes

Tom Yarbrough joined the OBU staff as university counselor after work with a counseling service in Dallas. Rev. and Mrs. Victor Varner, missionaries to Brazil, were appointed missionaries-in-residence. John Fluke, OBU student government president in 1960, and former baseball star, was named director of field services (student

recruiting) and financial aid. Gene Wallace, OBU baseball coach since 1965, was also named basketball coach and athletic director succeeding Raymond "Red" Miller.

Faculty and Administrative Honors

Dr. Grady C. Cothen was appointed chairman of the committee on education of the Oklahoma Commission on Education by Governor Dewey Bartlett. In June, 1970, Dr. Cothen preached the annual sermon at the Southern Baptist Convention in Denver.

Dr. W. E. Neptune, dean of the College of Liberal Arts, was elected to the Commission of Colleges and Universities of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Tom Terry, treasurer, was elected president of the Oklahoma Association of College and University Business Officers. Mrs. Patricia Pernalet, assistant professor of Spanish, served as president of the Oklahoma Foreign Language Teachers Association. Mrs. Peggy Askins, registrar, served as president of the Oklahoma Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers. Walter Mason, associate professor of education and director of the OBU Upward Bound project, served as president of the National Upward Bound Directors.

Student Honors

John Heinze, student government president, won a 1970 merit award as one of the top 12 college chemists selected by the **Chemical and Engineering News**. Mike Hunkapiller, another OBU chemist, won first place in the Southwest Regional meeting of the American Chemical Society. Pat Brummett, senior music major, was named Miss New Mexico and was one of the top ten finalists in the Miss America pageant.

The OBU Tuneclippers, a 15-member singing group directed by James Woodward, toured Hawaii in August, 1969, and then took a two-month USO-sponsored tour of European military installations in the spring of 1970.

Deaths

The university was saddened by the deaths of several individuals close to university life: Dr. John Eighmy, professor of history; Mrs. J. D. Owens, wife of "Uncle Jimmy" Owens, professor emeritus of modern languages; Mrs. Ruth Duffield, wife of tennis coach Paul Duffield; W. C. Boone, former OBU president; Dr. J. W. Storer, long-time chairman of OBU trustees, and Lee B. Spencer, former librarian.

Resignation

The start of the fall, 1970 semester was clouded by the resignation of President Cothen on Sept. 18 to accept the presidency of the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. During his four and one-half years at OBU, enrolment increased from 1,378 to 1,670; university valuation (physical plant and endowment) from \$10,000,000 to \$19,000,000; and operating financial support by Oklahoma Baptists

from \$460,000 to \$760,000 per year. Endowment increased by \$6,000,000. Fund-raising campaigns during Dr. Cothen's administration have secured more than \$1,400,000 in cash and pledges, making possible the new University Center building and the proposed Fine Arts Center. In 1967, Dr. Cothen appointed a long-range curriculum study committee which resulted in the implementation of a new calendar system in the new liberal arts curriculum. In addition, the school received renewal of accreditation from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Report approved.

70. Charles Green, Lawton, closed this session with prayer, and the convention stood adjourned until Wednesday morning at 9 a.m.

Wednesday Morning November 11, 1970

71. J. P. Dane, president, called the convention to order at 9 a.m.

Brotherhood

Bob Banks, Secretary

An increased interest and activity in mission education for men and boys has been somewhat evident during this last year in Oklahoma. While many churches yet need to become informed and do something about mission education for men and boys, it does seem that the growth pattern has now somewhat turned upward. The great need is for pastors and other church leaders to see the value of mission education and provide for it in the total church program.

This last year has been one of preparation. The Brotherhood Department joined with other departments in the convention to help prepare leaders and churches for the refinements in its organization effective this last October. Representatives from 38 associations attended the State Shaping the 70's Conference and 113 specialists received training in area meetings. This means that churches have available more resources and help than ever before.

One of the major tasks in the work for this year is the transfer of the 6-7-8 year old boys from Sunbeams to RAs. This will take

some time to accomplish. The department assisted the state WMU in interpreting the transfer and program plans in various meetings in the state and will continue to assist in the transfer task.

This has been a year of evaluation for the department. With the help of the Brotherhood Commission and the Brotherhood Committee of the convention's Board of Directors, a study was made of every aspect of the department's work. This has and will bring changes in schedules and other phases of work.

Mission Education Dialogues

The most important program of the Brotherhood Department for many years is projected for Oct. 18-29, 1971. Dialogues for pastors and church educational staff are to be scheduled in each association. The purposes of the dialogues are to interpret how men and boys can study missions, be involved in missions and support missions and to give participants opportunity for reaction and dialogue.

Statistical Report

Preliminary reports indicate some gain in Brotherhood work: 38 new Baptist Men's units, totaling 499; 142 new RA chapters, totaling 1,016 in 73 more churches and totaling 548 churches with RA work.

In the fall of 1969, 180 associational and church Brotherhood leaders attended the three area training sessions. Meetings were held in 1970 at Southwest Assembly, Disney Assembly, and Camp Hudgens with major emphasis on the 1970 program refinements. Women who work with RAs were included in the training.

The 1970 RA Congress met in three separate sessions in the McAlester area. Attendance totaled 1,815. Officers elected were Terrell Gurley, Oklahoma City, president; Steve Austin, Tulsa, vice-president; and Jerry Cole, Edmond, secretary.

No meeting of the Baptist Men was held in 1970 but the conference will be held each spring in conjunction with the state RA Congress.

A new opportunity for leadership training will be offered in the early spring in eight locations across the state. These Regional Brotherhood Workshops will meet February 1-2 and 4-5 in 1971.

Camp Hudgens Report

Seven weeks of state RA camps were held, with 719 regular campers and staff and 33 day campers and staff attending, totaling 752 for the summer. Decisions totaled 126 of which 41 were professions of faith, 46 rededications, and 39 for special service.

Camp Hudgens facilities were used by 40 church groups during the off-season.

A unit lodge for the cabin unit was constructed and used as a temporary staff cabin during the summer. It can be utilized also for dining and group meetings. A new camp director's cottage is scheduled for construction this year. The convention's Board of Directors

has voted to look with favor upon completion of the camp master plan of development by 1975, calling for an expenditure of approximately \$100,000.

Woman's Missionary Union

Abbie Louise Green, Executive Secretary-Treasurer

Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma placed emphasis on the church and its mission in all phases of its program during 1969-70.

Educating Youth in Missions

The youth work in Woman's Missionary Union was under the direction of Ida Mae Hays, Young Woman's Auxiliary director and Marie Faircloth who served as Girls' Auxiliary director until June. The Sunbeam Band work is also directed by this office. Sandra Malin joined our staff in September to lead the work of Baptist Young Women.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary Convention was held Oct. 17-18, 1969, at Oklahoma Baptist University. "Aware . . . Care . . . Share" was the theme. Each session was built around one word from the theme. Missionary speakers were Mrs. Edward Sanders, Indonesia; Mrs. James Westmoreland, Rhodesia, and Norman Beckham, Venezuela. Elizabeth Hodges, Oklahoma City was chosen as Miss YWA of 1970. Registration was 292.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary retreats were held at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha, May 1-3 and May 8-10 with 278 in attendance. The theme for both retreats was "Confused or Committed." Missionary speakers included Mrs. Ralph Rummage, Rhodesia; Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Gunn, missionaries to the deaf in Oklahoma; Miss Lucy Smith, missionary emeritus to Hong Kong; Carolyn Harrison, summer missionary, and Cherri Burnett, missionary journeyman.

A chartered bus took girls and leaders to the YWA Conference, Ridgecrest, N. C. Some traveled to Ridgecrest by car.

"Awake! Alert! Alive!" was the theme for the two Intermediate Girls' Auxiliary Conferences held at Oklahoma Baptist University March 27-28 and Feb. 20-21. Missionary speakers included Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Spear and daughter, Linda, Thailand; Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wolf and family, Mexico. Conferences included the different types of mission work in Oklahoma. There were 800 girls in attendance for these conferences.

Eleven hundred and ninety-seven girls attended the seven weeks of Girls' Auxiliary Camps held at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha during the summer. The camp had a staff of 34 people each week. "God . . . make me lovely too" was the theme emphasized throughout the summer as the girls studied the Bible, sang, worshiped, played and heard missionaries speak. Each week home missions was emphasized by a home missionary, and a foreign missionary emphasized foreign missions.

Twelve missionaries per week were secured to teach missions during the four weeks of the Falls Creek Assemblies. Missionaries included Mr. and Mrs. Paul Box, Malaysia; Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Gilbert, Mexico; J. C. Lewis Sr., Florida; Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lindsey, Israel; I. S. Steve Ditmore, Peru; Mr. and Mrs. James Crawford, Nigeria; Mrs. J. H. Humphrey, Philippines; Mrs. Jerry S. Key, Brazil; Mrs. Orvil Reid, Mexico; Urban L. Green, Nigeria; Mr. and Mrs. Dale Thorne, Israel; Mrs. W. J. Williams, Nigeria; Harry Griffin, Japan; Dr. Walter Moore, Nigeria; Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Davis Jr., Vietnam; Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Krause, Germany; Mr. and Mrs. Russell A. Morris, Singapore; Eugene Thomas, Malawi; Mr. and Mrs. James Foster, Ghana, and Allen Neskahi, Colorado. Ross McLennan of Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education taught a class of young people each week using the book **Alcohol and Christian Influence**. Sunbeam leaders for the children's park and two teachers each week for the Junior park were also secured for the assemblies.

Scholarships

Woman's Missionary Union provides scholarships through the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions for girls attending a Southern Baptist Seminary, one sophomore student majoring in nursing at Oklahoma Baptist University, one student nurse at Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and one student nurse at Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City. Scholarships were granted to five girls attending Southwestern Seminary and one girl attending Southern Seminary. The scholarship was divided between two student nurses at Oklahoma Baptist University.

Annual Session

During the 1969 annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma the recommendation that the convention begin with the Monday afternoon session was accepted. This made it necessary that Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma change the time of the annual session; therefore, two annual sessions were held during the 1969-70 church year.

The 1969 annual session was held at First Church, Oklahoma City, Nov. 10-11, 1969 using the theme "Tell It Like It Is." Missionary speakers included Mrs. David Fite, former missionary to Cuba; Eva Marie Kennard, California; Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Roberts, Kenya; Mr. and Mrs. James Westmoreland, Rhodesia; and Arthur Rutledge,

executive secretary, Home Mission Board, SBC. Mrs. R. L. Mathis, president, represented Woman's Missionary Union, SBC. Woman's Missionary Union and the Baptist Men held a joint meeting Monday evening. Edward Lindaman, assistant to the vice-president, North American Rockwell Corp., Downey, California was the speaker.

The 1970 Woman's Missionary Union annual session was held April 27-28, First Church, Tulsa. "Give Me a Vision" was the theme for the session. "Give Me a Vision . . . of God, . . . of My World, . . . of My Homeland, . . . of Myself" was the theme used for the four meetings. The music was led by Joe Ann Shelton with Loeen Bushman at the organ. Missionary speakers were J. Bryant Durham, Nigeria; Mary Evelyn Fredenberg, Nigeria; Merrill Moore Jr., Gaza; Mrs. Joe Snyder, Kenya; Mr. and Mrs. Edward Sanders, Indonesia; and Glendon McCullough of the Home Mission Board, SBC. Other speakers included John Burns, Baptist Student Union director, Central State College; Mrs. Robert Fling, Pleasantville, N. Y.; Daniel Holcomb, Oklahoma Baptist University; Frank Lawton, Brotherhood Commission, SBC, and Ross McLennan, Sooner Alcoholic-Narcotics Education. June Whitlow, promotional division director, represented Woman's Missionary Union, SBC.

Special Offerings

Woman's Missionary Union promotes three mission offerings each year. Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions. The 1969 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$585,299.14. The 1970 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering received by October 26 was \$159,611.08. As of October 23 the Edna McMillan Offering had reached \$64,232.65.

Writers of the program material for the State Mission Season of Prayer were Robert S. Scales, Woman's Missionary Society and Baptist Men; Mrs. Laddie Adams, Young Woman's Auxiliary, Baptist Young Men and Royal Ambassadors; John Scales, Girls' Auxiliary and Pioneer Royal Ambassadors, and Mrs. Henry Moran, Sunbeam Band. The theme for the program material was "Love in Action" (I John 3:18 TEV). The 1970 goal is \$85,000.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Thomas E. Carter, Executive Secretary

This report is for 12 months, from Sept. 1, 1969, through Aug. 31, 1970.

Receipts and Disbursements

The year brought income from 11 bequests in wills and from three trusts, gift annuities and other gifts, temporary funds and income from other sources, bringing the total receipts to \$2,384,360.17 for this period. During this time, \$169,575.03 was distributed to Oklahoma Baptist University, exclusive of the Louise Prichard Trust; \$105,339.33 to the child care ministry, and \$167,294.31 to other institutions and agencies.

Foundation Earnings from Investments

The net income produced on Foundation investments for 1969 was \$434,474.02. This is a 5.04 per cent earnings on investments.

Probate of Wills

One of the unusual experiences of the promotional work of the Baptist Foundation is that more and more people are going to their own attorneys and having wills prepared, in which gifts are left to the Baptist Foundation for one or more of the institutions and agencies of our convention or the Southern Baptist Convention. This is the first 12-month period in which more has come in from wills of this nature than from those that the Foundation had some record of and knew about before the will was admitted for probate. The executive secretary has served as executor for six wills where the probates were closed during the past 12 months, but five were closed where someone else served as executor and gifts came to the Foundation. The total corpus from these various estates amounted to approximately \$521,235.40, which will be handled by the Foundation.

Living Trusts and Wills

During this 12-month period more than 379 individuals have shown their interest in the institutions and agencies represented by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, by signing wills and trusts, which will eventually make possible an increased income for these institutions and agencies. There are a number of others who have made contributions of various kinds which did not require formal agreements.

Investments and Procedures

The Baptist Foundation through the Church Building Loan Trust Fund has been making loans to the churches throughout Oklahoma since June, 1954. More than 366 loans have been made and there are now 163 outstanding loans. Our churches have co-operated in a very splendid way in this effort of the Foundation to be of assistance to them. During the past 12 months 16 loans have been made for \$654,500.

Promotion

Responsibility for the Foundation's promotion is that of C. Fred Williams, administrative assistant. The following is a report of his stewardship for the past 12 months.

Foundation staff members have assisted 400 individuals with their estate planning, which has resulted in the actual signing of 369 wills, the establishment of seven living trusts, and three annuity contracts.

Foundation endowment placards for churches, indicating the number of persons in the church who have secured the services of the Baptist Foundation in their estate planning, now stands at 628. This is an increase of 32 over the previous year.

The "Implementing the Forward Look Program," an estate stewardship emphasis in selected associations each year, was conducted in Northwest Association the Sundays of Oct. 5 and 12, 1969; Tillman Association Sunday, Nov. 16, 1969; North Canadian Association the Sundays of Feb. 22 and March 1, 1970; Perry Association the Sundays of April 19 and 26, 1970; and Rogers Association the Sundays of June 14 and 21, 1970. Foundation staff members spoke in 93 of the churches within the associations participating in this emphasis.

Two special mailings were made to approximately 400 families concerning the endowment program of the Baptist Foundation. Information on the Tax Reform Act of 1969 and means of giving to the Lord's work through life insurance was enclosed in the mailings.

Approximately 115,000 bulletin inserts were made available to 1,030 churches for distribution to church members in connection with September, "Baptist Foundation Month" and January, "Make Your Will Month."

At the invitation of the Baptist Foundation, associational Foundation representatives attended a special workshop at Fountainhead State Lodge. Special direction and information were provided to these leaders for their assistance in promoting the work of the Baptist Foundation in their associations.

In co-operation with the agencies and institutions of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, the Baptist Foundation prepared an 8½ x 11 four-color brochure depicting the endowment program of Oklahoma Baptists and describing plans whereby interested individuals may participate in the program.

In addition to the Baptist Foundation's office in the Baptist Building, Oklahoma City, an office is maintained in Tulsa. At least one of the staff is in the Tulsa office the first full week of each month. Many individuals in the Tulsa area have found this arrangement very helpful to them.

Student Loans and Scholarships

The Foundation began the task of handling student loan and scholarship funds in 1947.

During the past 12 months, 26 students have been granted loans amounting to \$9,572.50, and 54 students have received scholarships, totaling \$14,078.73. These do not include funds from the Louise Prichard Trust.

The major portion of scholarships for students comes from the Louise Prichard Trust, which is administered by Oklahoma Baptist University but is disbursed through The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Although this was held in abeyance for a time because we were awaiting a decision from the Internal Revenue Department, it has been completely cleared and actually should increase in value during the next 12 months.

The Willie Taylor Trust is entirely for Indian students and is not limited to OBU. This is a Committee consisting of: Mrs. Philip Coon, Miss Abbie Louise Green, Howard Baker, Bob Haskins, J. T. Roberts, Marvin Hall and Thomas E. Carter.

There are a number of other scholarships, most of which are handled through OBU, and during the past year scholarships were awarded from the Willie Taylor Trust for 31 students, and from these other scholarships, not including the Louise Prichard Trust, 23.

There are a large number of student loan funds and during the past 12 months 26 students have been granted loans in the amount of \$9,572.50. One such loan fund is the D. N. Caulk Trust, which is for black students only, and is not limited to OBU. Three loans were granted through this fund this year.

Property Management

The responsibility for the Foundation's property management is that of Marvin H. Hall, administrative assistant. Included under this are the student loans and scholarships mentioned above, and also the church loans which have been mentioned.

The Baptist Foundation has farm properties ranging in size from three acres to 430. These farms, with a few exceptions, are leased to farmers in the area and are producing a reasonable income for the beneficiary institutions and agencies.

During the past year, nine pieces of real property came to the Baptist Foundation and were added to the 41 that were owned at that time. Of these six have been sold and there are still five properties that are held for sale.

Board of Directors

In the history of the Baptist Foundation there have been 36 men who have served on the Board of Directors and given of their time wonderfully and liberally, in making possible the accomplishments of the Foundation since its organization in 1946. Of these, nine have died, including: Dr. H. G. Bennett, R. C. Howard Sr., Guy H. James, The Hon. Robert S. Kerr, C. C. Morris, Andrew Potter, J. W. Storer, Bryce W. Twitty and Judge W. R. Wallace.

Judge W. R. Wallace and Sen. Robert S. Kerr served as president of the Foundation's Board of Directors. None of the original board members is now on the Board of Directors, and yet there are 16 outstanding men who are serving. Four of these will complete a four-year term and will rotate off the board at the end of 1970. These

are: E. W. Claiborne, Bartlesville; Hicks Epton, Wewoka; Charles E. Green, Lawton; and Hubert H. Raborn, Oklahoma City. They are not eligible for re-election for at least one year. Our four newest members who have served in 1970 are: Buford L. Cloar, Hobart; Flavel Perry, Ponca City; James M. Thompson, Ada, and R. A. Young, Oklahoma City. Of those rotating off the board this year, Hicks Epton has served as vice-president and chairman of the Promotion Committee. Ed Claiborne has served as co-chairman of the Church Building Loan Trust Fund Committee. Charles Green, M.D., has served as a member of the Investment and Church Building Loan Committees, and for the past two years has been a member of the Promotion Committee.

Hubert H. Raborn has served as a member of the Investment and Church Building Loan Committees and has been a member of the Executive Committee, and chairman for two years. For the past two years he has served as president of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation. Mr. Raborn is retiring as senior vice-president of Kerr-McGee Corporation and will be moving to Houston, Texas. He will continue to serve on a consulting basis at Kerr-McGee and will be available as an advisor to the Baptist Foundation from time to time. We regret very much to lose this outstanding layman, not only from our board but from Oklahoma. He has been a splendid member of the Baptist Laymen's Corporation, the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital and has made a great contribution to the work of the Baptist Foundation. It is with real regret that we see him leave our board and our state.

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma is recommending the following men for four-year terms on the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation: Charles Allen, Chickasha; F. E. (Mutt) Farrier, Miami; Herschel H. Hobbs, Oklahoma City; and J. Ray Smith, Tulsa.

Observations Along the Way

Before the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, I will observe, if it is God's will, some significant anniversaries—at least they will be significant to me.

First, Jan. 17, 1971, will be my 65th birthday.

Second, Sept. 4, 1971, will mark my 20th anniversary as executive secretary-treasurer and my 25th anniversary in the executive office.

Third, October, 1971, I will complete 45 years of service in Oklahoma Baptist work — 14 years as pastor, six years as district and general missionary, five years as assistant executive secretary and 20 years as executive secretary-treasurer.

Therefore, I announce my intentions to retire from this responsibility on Sept. 4, 1971. I ask the convention's Board of Directors to take appropriate action to have someone ready to assume this position from Sept. 4 until the next annual meeting in November, 1971, at which time the convention should elect an executive secretary-treasurer.

These have been 45 years filled with busy, happy and satisfying activities. Oklahoma Baptists have been good to me and my family for which we are extremely grateful. We have the highest regard for everyone and will continue to serve whenever and wherever opportunities present themselves.

When God called me to preach at the age of 16, he put a verse of Scripture on my mind and in my heart which has been my motto for almost one-half century: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matt. 6:33). I have tried to be obedient to his command and he has been generous in fulfilling his promise.

Although I claim little or no credit for success among Oklahoma Baptists during these 45 years, I have been privileged to observe many accomplishments along the way. I trust that I have made some small contribution to the cause of Christ in Oklahoma and beyond.

The Baptist church at Stuart, called me as pastor in 1926 when I was 20 years of age. At that time, there were 1,066 churches in Oklahoma with a combined membership of 133,000. The churches that year received for all purposes, local, home and foreign missions, less than \$2 million. Gifts to missions through Cooperative Program were \$116,000. Church property was valued at about \$6 million.

There were only five institutions — Oklahoma Baptist University, Muskogee and Miami hospitals, Baptist Children's Home and Falls Creek Assembly. I have seen these grow from small, struggling institutions to large, strong, thriving institutions of service. Property valuation of these institutions and new ones established has increased from less than \$1 million to over \$50 million.

While serving at Stuart half-time, I was also pastor half-time at Pilgrim's Rest Church at Fame. Later I served Krebs and Indianola half-time each. During these pastorates, I enrolled in high school at Oklahoma Baptist University in January, 1930. There were 750 enrolled and valuation of property was about \$500,000. Student pastorates were Fairview Church, Shawnee; Second Church, McAlester, and Bowlegs. Following graduation from OBU, I served Nogales Avenue Church, Tulsa, for almost five years.

God blessed our labors in all of these churches, especially Nogales Avenue. The last year I was pastor, our church baptized 252, leading the state in baptisms. During my pastorate at Nogales, I served as a member of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Conven-

tion, the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and as president of the state convention.

If I could live my life over, I would want to serve the same people in the same places.

Assistant Secretary

I became administrative assistant of the convention on Sept. 1, 1946. During this time, Andrew Potter led in establishing the Baptist Foundation and gave a good portion of his time to the promotion of this new agency. Our institutions at that time had less than \$100,000 endowment compared to over \$12 million in 1971. Planning and promoting the convention program was my responsibility. T. P. Haskins, the assistant secretary, gave much of his time to evangelism and Brotherhood work.

Executive Secretary-Treasurer

September 4, 1951, following the death of Dr. Potter, I was elected executive secretary-treasurer by the Board of Directors to finish the year. At the annual convention in November, I was elected by the convention. In 1951, Cooperative Program receipts reached \$1 million for the first time. We have seen it increase year-by-year. The objective for 1971 is \$3,800,000 — an increase of almost 400 per cent.

A few of the high lights of the convention during my period of service include the property evaluation which has increased from less than \$6 million to approximately \$50 million; church membership has increased from 340,660 to about 560,000 — a net increase of over 200,000; value of church property from \$30 million to \$160 million, and every department and agency has grown proportionately.

Some of the new departments established during my period of service are Baptist Student Union, music, evangelism, missions, Brotherhood and child care. In 1952 Baptist Student Union buildings were constructed at Norman and Stillwater. New buildings have been erected adjacent to most college campuses since that time.

In 1953 a group of physicians in Enid gave the convention what is now called Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital. It was valued at about \$1 million and has been enlarged from 100 beds to 240 beds, with a valuation of more than \$5 million.

In 1953 Boys Ranch Town came into existence and has grown to be a beautiful campus of six buildings, valued at more than \$1 million. Fifty boys are now living on the campus.

In 1959 the Hugo Baptist Golden Age Home opened. This home has become the pride and joy of Baptists in southeastern Oklahoma.

April 14, 1959, Baptist Memorial Hospital received its first patient. This has become one of the outstanding hospitals in the southwest. It is valued at more than \$12 million with plans for expansion in excess of \$25 million. Some of us worked for almost 10 years raising money, planning and building before the hospital was opened.

In 1956, Nunny-Cha-ha, a girls camp sponsored by the Woman's Missionary Union, was located on the Falls Creek Assembly grounds.

November, 1959 marked the beginning of Camp Hudgens for Royal Ambassadors near McAlester. Over 7,000 boys have been inspired by the programs conducted on these camp grounds. Investments in this institution exceed a quarter of a million dollars.

In 1965, Oklahoma City Baptist Golden Age Homes erected at Northwest Highway and Council Road were opened. Property valuation is approximately \$1½ million.

In 1963 the Grove Hospital was opened and has doubled in capacity. It is one of the most modern small hospitals in the state. We have operated successfully hospitals in six other cities in which thousands have been served in the name of Christ and Oklahoma Baptists.

Others will evaluate my administration, but I have tried to be impartial in relationships to all pastors, churches, associations, institutions and members of the staff. I have endeavored to be servant to all, without special favor to or from any.

I have tried to maintain a balanced program with proper emphasis on all phases of our work — evangelism, missions, stewardship, hospitals, homes for children, the aged, Christian education, youth camps, Baptist student work, state, home and foreign missions.

I have tried to give all the people, all the facts, all the time. Nothing has been covered or hidden from our people. I have tried to be completely honest in receiving and distributing mission funds. Every dollar has been used as designated.

I have tried to be faithful in attending and participating in meetings within the state, the Southern Baptist Convention and around the world where I have traveled. I have not missed a state convention in 44 years. I have missed few Southern Baptist Conventions. I have attended the Baptist World Congresses held in Cleveland, Ohio; London, England; Miami Beach, Fla.; Tokyo, Japan and the Baptist Youth Congress in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

I have tried to practice what I have preached. I do not believe one can be an effective leader without being a faithful follower.

I have preached in most of the churches, many of them numerous times. I have preached revivals in more than 100 different churches. Some of these churches I have been in two or more times as evangelist. I have assisted in ordaining hundreds of ministers and deacons, helped to dedicate many church buildings and assisted in organizing dozens of new churches.

I have sought to maintain a good fellowship, harmony and unity among the brethren. When I came into the ministry, Oklahoma Baptists were in battle among themselves. My first convention was in Tulsa in 1927. My second was in Ardmore in 1928. At this convention, the messengers refused to accept the report of the nominating committee. Board members were elected one by one from the convention floor. Some refused to serve when nominated. The convention was divided into factions. This also prevailed in some associations and

churches. In this deplorable situation, we were often called "those fighting Baptists." Even some of our own people would refer to a big fight as a "good Baptist meeting." I was always ashamed of such references.

I have maintained that we can have a better Baptist meeting in harmony, love and trust. I have not always had my way. Some of you have given in on methods and procedures for the sake of harmony and good fellowship. There have been few negative votes cast in our board meetings and our conventions.

Of all the accomplishments during my administration, I am most grateful for this spirit of harmony, and your confidence in me and other elected officials.

Greater Days Ahead

When I accepted the responsibility as executive secretary-treasurer, I pledged my best. When I pass the responsibility to the man you choose, I will pledge him, the Lord and you my best as a follower.

I challenge you to give your new leader your prayerful support, your love and confidence. Greater things will doubtlessly be accomplished in the days ahead.

I urge you to continue to enlarge every department of work. You should, in my opinion, continue to undergird all your institutions. They have been established through hard work, sacrificial giving and unceasing prayer.

In my judgment, great religious institutions of learning, healing and benevolent ministries are essential in building and maintaining a strong denomination. All influential religious denominations with which I am acquainted have built and maintained institutions. Our Catholic friends are a good example in this regard. Our Baptist brethren to the north divested themselves of most of their institutions and have slowly declined. This is not the only reason for decline, but it is probably one of them. I could name religious groups in our state who are evangelistic and aggressive, but have little influence. They do not have institutions.

It is impossible to over emphasize what Oklahoma Baptist University, Southern Baptist seminaries, Baptist hospitals and homes, camps and assemblies, such as Falls Creek, have contributed to the cause of Christ in Oklahoma.

I do not believe that institutions constitute our main business. Our main business is the Great Commission—"Go into all the world, make disciples, baptize them, teach them to observe the commands of the Lord." Soul winning, evangelism, missions, building churches, growing Christians, great institutions of learning, healing, ministering to children and older people can also help us to carry out the Great Commission of our Lord.

I urge you in the name of the Lord to keep up the good work.

Stay together. Follow the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

Keep your hearts warm. Preach, teach and sing the simple gospel of the humble Nazarene as recorded in the Word of God, and you will enjoy greater days ahead.

The president and executive secretary are ex-officio members of all committees.

Upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee, two proposals were adopted.

I. That those charged with long-range Cooperative Program planning be encouraged to plan the convention's budgets for 1973-75 in such a way as to preserve advances made to Oklahoma Baptist University and Baptist Student Union work during the current five year pro-

gram, 1968-72, and to provide more funds for other state and Southern Baptist Convention causes; and that the plan used prior to the five year advance program to increase percentages annually across the board to Southern Baptist Convention causes be resumed.

II. That the convention contribute, if necessary, \$10,000 per year for five years to the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention designated for Southern Baptist Convention work in the state of Kansas. The first payments are to be made in 1969 and 1970 from Convention Contingency Funds. Following these years the Stewardship-Budget Committee will include this allocation in the annual budgets. This assistance is to help the Kansas Convention in meeting an emergency created by a church bond loan program in the state.

The convention's Board of Directors is the Governing Board for these hospitals and golden age home. Since it is impractical for this Board to meet regularly in each institution, local Baptists are elected

to serve as the Governing Board's Committees. The board is represented by one or more of its members on each committee. The executive secretary-treasurer or his representative and each hospital's administrator serve as ex-officio members.

II. In consultation with the Governing Board of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and the Authority the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Trustees of the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority on Feb. 6, 1970, duly adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of additional debentures of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority in the aggregate amount of \$700,000 and have authorized the execution of an indenture providing for said debentures, the proceeds of the sale of said debentures to be used for hospital equipment and completion of the improvements to the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, a copy of which resolution is attached to and filed with the minutes of this meeting; and

WHEREAS, on Feb. 6, 1970, the Governing Board of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee each duly adopted resolutions approving and recommending to the Board of Directors the issuance and securing of such debentures;

RESOLVED that the Board of Directors authorize and approve the issuance of additional debentures of the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority in the aggregate amount of \$700,000 as provided in the resolution of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority; and

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Authority shall pledge the new equipment to be purchased as security for such debentures, that said debentures be further secured by a subordinate lien on hospital earnings, and by the pledge of the full faith and credit of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and

FURTHER RESOLVED that the officers of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the convention all documents and papers and to do any and all lawful acts as may be necessary or proper to carry out the above resolutions; and

FURTHER RESOLVED that the issuance and sale by the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority of debentures in the amounts of \$500,000 and \$1,300,000, the execution of indentures in connection therewith, the execution of the lease of the Trust Estate to said Authority, the pledge of the full faith and credit of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to secure said debentures, and all other acts of the convention and its officers in connection with the enlargement, renovation and equipping of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital are hereby fully ratified and approved.

Adopted this fifth day of May, 1970, A.D. at Oklahoma City, Okla.

III. The Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee in consultation with the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital and

a special planning committee composed of the members of the Board of Directors from Oklahoma County presented the following which was approved:

(1) Authorizing additional construction of Baptist Memorial Hospital so as to expand said hospital to 800 bed capacity, and authorizing sale of tax exempt bonds to finance the added construction;

(2) Authorizing additional construction for the Doctors Medical Building, and authorizing the borrowing to finance said improvements.

WHEREAS, the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Oklahoma City, Okla. has rendered an outstanding service to the people of Oklahoma City and of the State of Oklahoma generally, since its opening on April 14, 1959; and

WHEREAS, at this time there is a strong demand for additional hospital service and the need is apparent that the facilities of the Baptist Memorial Hospital should be expanded to fulfill the health needs of the community it serves; and

WHEREAS, the Convention Board of Directors has heretofore appointed a Planning Committee which was given the special task of studying the expansion needs of the hospital (which committee included, with others, the Oklahoma City members of the Board of Directors and the executive officials of the convention) and that this Planning Committee has unanimously recommended that the hospital should be expanded at this time; and

WHEREAS, it appears that it will be feasible to finance this expansion program by the sale of tax exempt bonds, supplemented by hospital operating funds, and private contributions, which financing, when accomplished, will relieve the convention of all obligations presently existing against Cooperative Program funds, and its other assets, and limited only to the hospital and the Doctor's Medical Building; and

WHEREAS, the Hospital and Golden Age Homes Committee of the convention and the Executive Committee of the convention, sitting in joint session, also unanimously recommend that the further expansion of the hospital be undertaken at this time.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the Board of Directors hereby reaffirms the convention's original plan to construct the Baptist Memorial Hospital to the ultimate capacity of approximately 800 beds; and to implement this original plan at the present time, as follows:

a. That the east tower of the hospital be constructed in two stages at a total construction cost for both stages of approximately \$25 million.

b. That the Doctors Medical Building be expanded to 10 floors, with the cost of the construction of the four additional floors to be approximately \$1,650,000.

c. That additional parking facilities be provided for Baptist Memorial Hospital so that the construction cost will be paid in a self-liquidating manner, and preferably by means of leasing the parking

facility to a third party who will finance, construct and operate the parking building.

2. That the proposed new construction and improvements to the Baptist Memorial Hospital be accomplished by Oklahoma Industries Authority through the issue and sale by said Authority of tax exempt bonds secured only by a first mortgage on the property and a pledge of the assets and revenues of Baptist Memorial Hospital, which bonds shall be in an amount of \$27,590,000, and whatever additional funds may be required, provided that said amount is not increased by more than 5 per cent; and it is anticipated that the two stages of construction will be financed by bond sales, as follows: The first stage of construction at a cost of \$16,622,000, which construction will provide six completed floors, or more, in the new east tower, and approximately 232 additional beds, to be financed by bond sales of approximately \$22,535,000 (which includes interim interest expense, retirement of existing long term hospital debt, and bond financing expenses); and the second state of construction at a cost of \$8,284,000, which construction will complete the entire east tower, providing an ultimate capacity of 784 beds, to be financed by bond sales of approximately \$5,055,000.

3. That the Board of Directors of the Convention hereby authorizes the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital to borrow approximately \$1,650,000 to construct the additional four floors to the Doctors Medical Building, which sum is planned to be repaid from Hospital operating funds during the next three year period.

4. That Baptist Memorial Hospital is hereby authorized to distribute from its operating funds approximately \$4,640,000, to be used in the aforesaid Hospital expansion program during the next 10 year period; and

5. That in order to supplement funds to be used in constructing the Hospital improvements, the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital be, and it is hereby, authorized to solicit private gifts from individuals, foundations and business entities, with a goal of \$1,500,000 in total gifts.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to procure funds for the aforesaid construction of improvements and the expenditures incident to said expansion, that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, through its duly elected officers, be and it is hereby specifically authorized to execute such instruments as may be deemed necessary and proper, including without limitation, conveyances, contracts, pledges, indentures, leases and other agreements, in order to effectuate the issuance and sale of tax exempt bonds to be issued by Oklahoma Industries Authority, which bonds are to be secured only by a first mortgage on the property and a pledge of the assets and revenues of Baptist Memorial Hospital, provided that nothing stated herein shall authorize the said convention to pledge its full faith and credit or to subject its other assets to the payment of said bonds; and that said bonds shall be issued in two or more series, the bonds of each series being co-equal with and on a parity

with, the bonds of each other series, in a total aggregate amount of \$27,590,000, which amount may be increased if required, provided said amount is not increased by more than 5 per cent; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the sale of the first series of said bonds in an amount of approximately \$22,535,000 be and the same is hereby authorized at this time, without any further action or approval of the Board of Directors; and that additional series of said bonds under said total bond issue shall be authorized and directed by the Convention or its Board of Directors only upon and after recommendation of the Governing Board of Baptist Memorial Hospital, and the further authorization and approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention, and provided further that the obligation and liability of the Convention by virtue of said bonds is limited only to said security, and that the Convention does not pledge its full faith and credit, nor subject its other assets for the payment of said debt, note and mortgage; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to refinance the Doctors Medical Building that the Convention, through its duly elected officials, borrow the sum of approximately \$2,100,000 from Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company, to be evidenced by a promissory note executed by the Convention, and secured only by a first mortgage on the Doctors Medical Building property and a lien on its revenues, provided that the liability of the Convention is limited only to said security, and that the Convention does not pledge its full faith and credit, nor subject its other assets for the payment of said debt, note and mortgage; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the officers of the convention be and they are hereby authorized to execute and deliver such instruments and other documents as may be necessary to carry out the intent of and to consummate the transactions authorized by these resolutions.

Adopted by the Board of Directors of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, sitting in regular session, this May 5, 1970.

Consultants

E. W. Westmoreland, former secretary of the Department of Religious Education, and Sam W. Scantlan, who served the convention as secretary of the Department of Missions and in other areas of work, are now serving the convention and the churches of the state on a retired basis. Both of these men served long terms in their described positions. Presently Mr. Westmoreland is the church building consultant and Mr. Scantlan is a general church consultant. Below are reports which will tell briefly of a few of the many facets of their work.

E. W. Westmoreland

During the past year Mr. Westmoreland worked with 97 Oklahoma Baptist churches. In some instances, he supplied for the pastor but in most instances he joined the planning and survey committee in a study of building needs.

Because of our new church programs and especially those related to Sunday school which began Oct. 1, 1970, Mr. Westmoreland joined many pastors in a restudy of their church buildings to determine what changes needed to be made to make the buildings adequate for the new Sunday school organization and Bible teaching program. He predicts that even more of this work will be done in the new year. Many churches will learn from experience during this first year that building changes are necessary to improve the Bible teaching program.

Many significant changes are being made at the Church Architecture Department in Nashville. Most of the literature which has been in use for many years is being rewritten. Every church building design, without exception, has had to be brought up to date. The books for planning and survey committees, those for building committees and the data books which are prepared for architects, have been rewritten. Every brochure containing designs for all types and sizes of church buildings are being brought up to date. Some of this work has already been completed. The new brochure for churches to 400 capacity are now available; those of designs for larger churches will be available in the not too distant future.

Churches have faced unusual problems during recent years. Money has been tight and the interest rates high. However, in spite of the problems, many of our churches have made great improvements during the last year and many are now in the process of building and readjusting buildings which need to be updated.

The Church Architecture Department at Nashville and Mr. Westmoreland are anxious to join pastors and planning and survey committees in a study of building needs.

Churches may feel free to call upon him when he can be of service.

Sam W. Scantlan

For a number of years there has been a need for someone to work with churches, particularly those in small town and rural areas, as a consultant on many of the problems of that area.

Many churches have difficulty locating a prospect for pastor and in making proper contact with one. Some of the brethren in the ministry need assistance in finding the will of the Lord for their place of service. Sam Scantlan was asked to serve in this capacity temporarily on a retired basis.

Mr. Scantlan has had numerous conferences with pastors and churches during the last year. He conducted five revivals, preached 122 sermons and assisted churches and pastors in many conferences. He taught a book at Indian Falls Creek Assembly, and served as chairman of the Murray County Challenge Campaign for OBU.

One of his major responsibilities for this year has been writing the book **T. B. Lackey—The Man and an Epoch**. The manuscript is almost completed. The book will be published and distributed by the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Commission.

Public Relations

Communicating the story of Oklahoma Baptist life is a vital part of the Public Relations task. Joe L. Ingram, assistant executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, serves as director of Public Relations and is assisted by newswriter Dana Williamson. Technical assistance is rendered by Dick McCartney, owner of Arthur Davenport and Associates, public relations firm. The story is constantly told by providing newspapers, radio and television stations and wire services with comprehensive and objective information concerning all major convention meetings.

Disaster Relief

Because of the state of unpreparedness in which Baptists found themselves when Hurricane Camille hit the Gulf Coast several months ago, steps are being taken to organize themselves to move in and meet needs in the case of large or small disasters in their locale. Henry Chennault, associate secretary of the Department of Brotherhood for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, has been selected as the head of disaster relief in Oklahoma.

On both the national and state level talks have been going on with Red Cross officials. Red Cross has been designated by congressional charter as the nation's official disaster relief agency. Red Cross officials cordially welcome our efforts in this area. Our involvement in disaster relief will be in complete co-operation and conjunction with them.

The basic need for co-operation is centered not in monetary contributions but in actual manpower contribution. Also the greatest need in Oklahoma is in the rural and small town areas.

Being discussed as possible areas of co-operation are the following:

1. Sharing weather data.
2. The designating of liaison representatives to work with the four Red Cross offices.
3. The use of church facilities for sheltering and/or feeding victims and workers, clothing sorting, warehousing, distribution, etc.
4. Identification at the scene of disaster.
5. The utilization of volunteer aircraft.
6. Plans for contact at time of disaster.
7. Encouragement of local Baptists to serve with local Red Cross chapter disaster committees. This would provide Baptists the ongoing opportunity for training and activity in the field of disaster relief.
8. There is great need during large operations for experienced social workers to deal with individual and family recovery planning.

9. There is a need for building estimators. This requires persons who have a background in home construction, engineering, or similar skills.

10. There is an occasional need for registered nurses.

11. During the early stages of a disaster there are needs for people in the mass care activities. This involves persons for shelter management, emergency feeding, transportation, communications, warehousing, supply, clean-up, etc.

12. At later stages of a disaster there are needs for persons with skills in carpentry, heating, plumbing, masonry, etc.

13. Mutual exchange of information on the effects of a disaster, the actions being taken, the needs that exist.

Red Cross officials are aware of Baptists' desires to work co-operatively with them, but within our denominational structure as well.

Mr. Chennault will be at work securing about six or seven persons to serve in a volunteer capacity with him. The function of this committee will be to organize groups at strategic points throughout the state who could possibly go to the aid of disaster victims in their area. Baptist Laymen's Corporation

The Baptist Laymen's Corporation operates the Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes, comprised of Lackey Manor Nursing Home, 20 apartments and three private dwellings.

For the last few years, the administration of Baptist Memorial Hospital operated the home for the corporation. James L. Henry was officially administrator.

This arrangement was terminated by mutual agreement and David Foster was elected to serve as administrator of the Golden Age Homes, in connection with helping to direct the convention's operation of hospitals and golden age homes.

There was a great conviction on the part of all concerned that the time had arrived when a full-time administrator was needed. Don Donalson was elected as business administrator effective June 15, 1970. David Foster and/or James L. Henry serve as the official administrators and work with Mr. Donalson. Both Foster and Henry are licensed nursing home administrators.

Mr. Donalson is a native Oklahoman and has been an active member of First Church, Oklahoma City for many years. For about 20 years he managed businesses in Oklahoma City. In addition he has built, leased and rented apartment houses and has experience in various other types of businesses. The Laymen's Corporation was fortunate in securing his services.

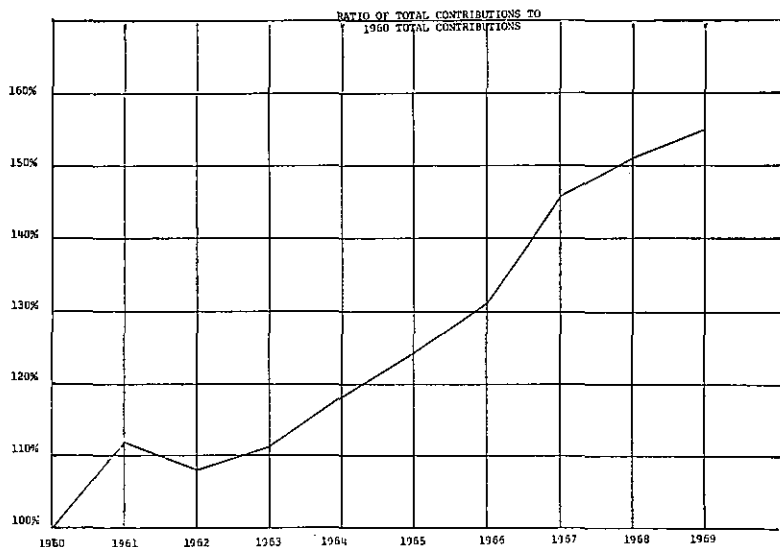

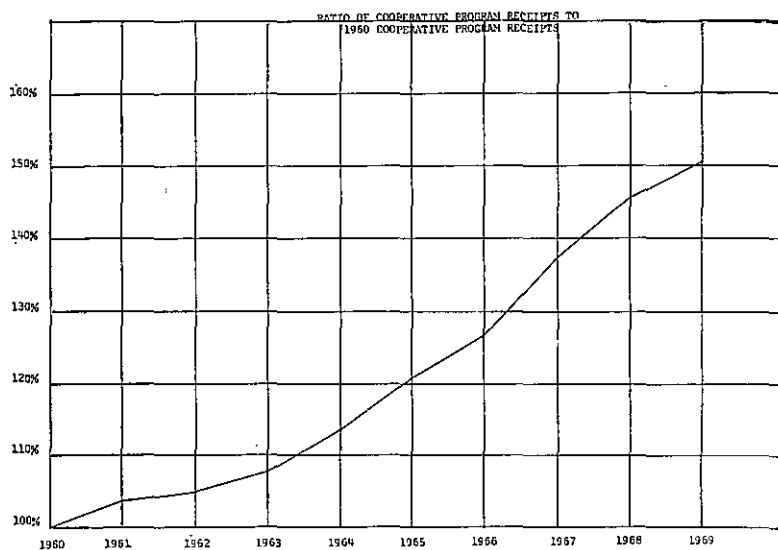
Stewardship and the Cooperative Program

Since 1962 Oklahoma Baptist churches have increased their total annual income by more than \$11,500,000 and their Cooperative Program gifts by more than \$1,100,000 a year. These dramatic increases reflect the deepening stewardship convictions of thousands of members and their growing confidence in the Cooperative Program as the main channel of all co-operative mission work. Since 1967 the Advance Plan has produced almost two million Cooperative Program dollars for Oklahoma Baptist University and about one-half million for Baptist Student Work.

If adopted, the 1971 budget will provide \$429,392 in advance funds—\$322,044 for Oklahoma Baptist University and \$107,348 for Baptist Student Work. Gifts to Southern Baptist causes will be increased to \$1,449,361.44.

2. That we exercise the strictest economy consistent with efficient administration and that the executive secretary-treasurer and Board of Directors take whatever steps may be necessary to administer the 1971 budget so as not to incur any operating deficits.

3. That all institutions and agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be instructed not to incur any debts that are not authorized by the convention or its Board of Directors.

II. That the Cooperative Program "Advance Plan" be considered through 1972.

III. That the churches be challenged to increase their Cooperative objective over the 1970 percentage.

IV. That Oklahoma Baptist University be encouraged to continue to solicit gifts from foundations, corporations, alumni, and other interested friends, but not from church budgets.

V. That churches, associations, and individuals adjacent to Baptist Student Union centers continue to support this work as a local obligation and privilege.

VI. That the Baptist Foundation be encouraged to continue leading Oklahoma Baptists and other friends to endow all our institutions, with the hope that regular Cooperative Program and endowment income will be adequate by 1973 to meet the needs of our institutions.

Motion carried to adopt.

85. Robert Hopkins presented the following resolution, which was read by Jess Wallace.

WHEREAS, Article I Section 2 of the Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma instructs the convention to give due regard to both geographical and numerical representation in electing members of the Board of Directors, therefore be it resolved:

THAT the Committee on Nominations use the following guideline in interpreting the phrase "both geographical and numerical representation:"

(1) The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee from each associational area;

(2) That the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 members of the churches in a given associational area;

(3) That no associational area have more than eight members on the Board of Directors.

86. Motion carried to adopt the resolution.

87. T. T. Crabtree brought the following resolution.

"For the sake of the democratic principle and in order to promote the harmony of our fellowship, that the Committee on Nominations be requested to refrain from nominating members of their Committee for vacancies on the boards and committees of the convention."

88. The resolution was ruled by the president as out-of-order and no action taken.

89. Hale A. Dixon made the following motion, which carried.

"That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention be authorized to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention, and that the president and recording secretary of the convention be authorized to sign any legal papers of the convention which require signatures."

90. M. J. Lee made a motion that the 65th annual convention adjourn. Motion carried.

91. Garnet Cole led the convention in a closing prayer.

The convention stood adjourned until Nov. 15-16-17, 1971.

As stated in Note 1 of notes to the financial statements, this report does not include assets, liabilities, fund balances, receipts or disbursements of: (1) Hugo and Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes; (2) nine hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or lessee; and the following affiliated or associated organizations operating as separate corporations; (3) The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; (4) Oklahoma Baptist University; (5) Faculty Building Association; (6) Baptist Laymen's Corporation and (7) Baptist Building Federal Credit Union.

In our opinion, with the explanation stated in the preceding paragraph, the accompanying balance sheets and statement of fund balances present fairly the assets and liabilities of the Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1970, arising from cash transactions and the changes in fund balances during the year then ended, in conformity with accounting practices generally followed by nonprofit organizations applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. General

The balance sheet and various accompanying supporting exhibits and schedules apply only to operations of the department of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund reserves and disbursements of the following affiliated or associated organizations, operated as separate organizations, are not included:

1. Hugo Golden Age Home
2. The nine hospitals operated by the convention either as owner or lessee
3. The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma
4. Oklahoma Baptist University
5. Faculty Building Association
6. Baptist Laymen's Corporation
7. Baptist Building Federal Credit Union

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense

On March 16, 1956, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000.00, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760.00. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1970, the unamortized balance amounted to \$31,093.00.

4. Notes Payable

Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000.00, due in monthly installments of \$1,000.00 each applied first to interest from date at 5½% and then to principal, balance at December 31, 1970, \$129,631.94.

5. Endowment Funds

Endowment funds for "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" are carried on the books of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. These endowment funds consist of funds included in current and prior year budgets of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma together with designated contributions and proceeds of land sales. These funds, approximating \$2,300,000.00, are designated for the following departments or agencies:

- Department of Child Care
- Falls Creek Assembly
- Baptist Student Union Centers
- Camp Hudgens
- Hospitals and Golden Age Homes—office
- State Missions
- Cooperative Program
- Baptist General Convention Fund

6. Baptist Memorial Hospital Expansion

The convention Board of Directors, in session May 10, 1962, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Baptist Memorial Hospital.

All real and personal property owned by the hospital was subject to a mortgage note to Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company in the amount of \$4,310,623.60. Furthermore "It is agreed that the obligations of this loan are further secured by a pledge as a first charge against the distributable Cooperative Program funds of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

7. Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Expansion

The convention Board of Directors, in session December 5, 1968, agreed to contribute \$500,000.00 over a period of years toward expansion of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital. During the current and prior years, funds have been applied by the convention for this expansion as follows:

Plant Fund**8. Improvements to Lease Real Estate**

In approximately fifty years the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma will receive title to certain major leasehold improvements which have been or will be constructed on land owned by the convention.

9. Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma

Oklahoma Baptist Hospital, Muskogee, Oklahoma, ceased operating as a general hospital on September 15, 1962, at the request of the administration and governing board of the hospital.

Under the authority of the Board of Directors of the convention, a lease contract was made with the Board of Education of Independent School District No. 20, Muskogee County, on December 17, 1964, providing for rental payments of \$4,000.00 annually for the use of the real estate and personal property of Oklahoma Baptist Hospital. The lease is renewable annually at the option of the lessee. The contract also provides that, when the rental payments total \$40,000.00, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall convey title to the leased real estate and personal property to the lessee.

10. Baptist Laymen's Corporation

On June 10, 1964, land was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The value of this land was reduced to \$1.00 as shown in this report.

ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole, as explained in the accountants' opinion.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the assets and liabilities and the changes in fund balances, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, with the explanation stated in the accountants' opinion this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization and Major Activities

Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years. Amended Articles of Incorporation filed in March, 1928 and May, 1961, provide for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by the Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Major activities of the Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are described below:

Collecting and Accounting—Receiving contributions for the Cooperative Program budget and other designated funds, maintaining records therefor by church units and funds, and periodically transmitting portions allocated to Southern Baptist Convention, various Baptist hospitals within the state, the university at Shawnee, Oklahoma, the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and other designated donees.

The Baptist Messenger—Printing and publishing a denominational paper known as "The Baptist Messenger."

Department of Child Care—Operation management of "The Baptist Children's Home" and "Boys Ranch Town," construction of buildings and maintenance of buildings and grounds.

Falls Creek Assembly — Providing vacation training at Falls Creek, Oklahoma and maintenance of assembly properties.

Department of Religious Education—Providing for advancement and enlargement of education activities in churches of the state.

Baptist Student Union Department—Coordinating Baptist work in student union centers at various educational institutions.

Woman's Missionary Union—Promotion of Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Building Program—Accounting for contributions and appropriations toward a building program of the convention, supervising construction of such projects and disbursing funds therefor.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
For the Year Ended December 31, 1970

1. Investments

On January 1, 1964, the Foundation adjusted the book value of securities held to market value. The net effect of this adjustment was to increase the book value of securities and the corresponding fund balance by \$92,147.75. Securities acquired prior to January 1, 1964, are included herein at market value as of that date. Securities acquired since December 31, 1963, are shown at cost or at appraised value at acquisition date.

All investments except those noted above are valued at appraised or market value at time of gift or cost if purchased. Current market values are not available on investments at a carrying value of \$727,623.47. Current market values of the remaining investments were \$741,944.89 at December 31, 1970.

The investment pool securities are periodically valued. These valuations serve to establish the means for the distribution of income.

2. Investment in Limited Partnership

In March 1968, the Foundation received several lots of real estate in Rogers county as a contribution. Shortly thereafter, this land was deeded to the Orchard Hill Company, a partnership formed by and between the original donors of the land and the Foundation for the purpose of land development. The Foundation does not participate in the management of the business but shares in the profits and losses of the operations; provided, however, that the Foundation's participation in the losses is limited to its investment in the partnership.

3. Fund Balances

Annuities of \$165,002.99 arose from gifts made to the Foundation in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor.

A revolving fund has been established within the operating fund of the Foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds and making periodic payments to annuitants. The revolving fund is also used to pay estate expenses prior to the closing of the estate, at which time the Foundation becomes the beneficiary of part or all of the estate's assets, and such expenses are reimbursed. At December 31, 1970, the balance of the revolving fund was \$12,458.45.

In addition to the annuities mentioned above, certain trusts have been created naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. The net income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and, upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at the book value of their assets at December 31, 1970. No attempt has been made to compute any liability of these funds for future payments to beneficiaries.

4. Depreciation and Depletion

No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties or depletion of mineral properties.

**ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, except for the effect of items noted in the accountants' letter, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on November 6, 1946. It was created as a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed; to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships, for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

As interpreted by the director of the corporation, its responsibilities are to obtain funds for capital improvements and endowments, and to hold, disburse and invest funds according to designation made and as set out in the charter.

Church Building Loans—Church building loans stated at \$4,533,-284.30 are secured by first mortgages on church buildings and individual personal endorsements to total 100% of the original amount of each loan. The life of the loans vary from 10 to 15 years with interest rates from 6% to 8¾ %, and provision is made for monthly payments of principal and interest. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
 For the Year Ended May 31, 1970

Pledged Assets

1. Kerr Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$788,014.07, and the land upon which it is located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$471,000.00. Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the university's cost of \$1,115,505.43, and the land upon which it is located are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$582,000.00.

2. Thurmond Hall and John Wesley Raley Chapel, and land upon which they are located, included herein, respectively, at the university's cost of \$536,448.27 and \$1,665,427.41, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$497,000.00.

3. Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Art Center, and land upon which they are located, included herein, respectively, at the university's cost of \$216,319.74 and \$140,015.27, are subject to first mortgage bonds in the amount of \$213,000.00.

Pledged Income

4. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, the women's dining hall, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, the men's dining hall, and to the extent necessary, the income from WMU Memorial Dormitory are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

5. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$67,500.00, is pledged to insure deposit with bond indenture trustees of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

6. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not to exceed \$27,000.00, are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds.

7. All funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969, from pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign and designated for the student center project, and 75% of all funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969 from undesignated pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign are to be remitted to the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority under terms of a lease agreement between the university and the authority. These funds are to be used by the authority for redemption of bonds described in Note 9.

Long-Term Lease

8. In May 1967, Oklahoma Baptist University entered into an agreement to pay \$1,858.50 per month for 180 months beginning September 1, 1967, for the use of apartment houses. The agreement includes a purchase option.

9. On May 1, 1969, the university entered into a lease agreement with the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. Under the agreement, the authority has issued \$1,400,000.00 revenue bonds for the construction of a new student union building on the campus. The university agrees to lease the new building until November 1, 1984, or until provision is made for the retirement of all bonds issued. Rental payments of approximately \$35,000.00 are to be paid to the authority quarterly for application to bond debt service.

**ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY
 FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The information in this section has been obtained in connection with our examination previously referred to in this report. While the information is not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position or the results of operations, the information is presented for supplemental analysis purposes. In our judgment, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909, to function as an operating unit of the convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that body. On February 9, 1910, Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a perpetual corporation without capital stock for the purpose of providing opportunities for all departments of higher education and connected preparatory schooling of persons of both sexes on equal terms.

Faculty Building Association—The cumulative liability of Oklahoma Baptist University at May 31, 1970, to the Faculty Building Association was \$54,386.46. The amount accumulates from rent due on property leased from the Faculty Building Association, less prior advances and interest due to the university on \$116,700.00. Faculty Building Association notes are held by Oklahoma Baptist University.

Student Aid Funds

On May 31, 1970 restricted assets totaled \$5,448.83, consisting of unexpended cash and receivables from participating institutions in the college work-study program.

Loan Fund

National Student Loan Programs—At May 31, 1970, Oklahoma Baptist University had received capital contributions from the federal government to National Defense and Nursing Student Loan Programs of \$725,592.00 and \$31,054.52, respectively. An additional \$95,647.00 was advanced to the university by the government under the nursing loan program, with \$907.62 having been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds, and from matching funds (10% of federal capital contributions) furnished by the school. Borrowers who become qualified teachers or nurses under the respective programs may have portions of principal and interest payments forgiven. Operations of these revolving funds have reduced the government's participation to \$669,854.28 and \$29,579.13, as shown on Exhibit A.

Endowment Funds

Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—At May 31, 1970, funds totaling approximately \$3,600,000.00 were being held and administered by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the benefit of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Other Funds—Other funds were being held in trust on May 31, 1970 for the benefit of Oklahoma Baptist University by The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The university's economic interest in these funds could not be determined by the trustee at May 31, 1970, pending settlement of contingencies related thereto. The university is also beneficiary under certain trusts administered by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the largest of which is the Nicholson Estate from which the university receives one-third of the income. The Nicholson Estate has a corpus fund of \$975,174.40.

Plant Fund

Additions—During the year ended May 31, 1970, the university purchased Lots 1, 2, 3 and 4 in amended plat of the South Half of Lot 12, Gilmore's Addition to the City of Shawnee for \$25,000.00. During the year, additions and renovations were made to the president's home and the library building amounting to a total cost of \$12,171.16. Architectural services for the completion of John Wesley Raley Chapel were incurred in the amount of \$21,165.00. Additional equipment was acquired during the year costing \$36,257.19.

Bonds Payable—The university is obligor to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government under two bond indentures with a balance due at May 31, 1970, of \$1,053,000.00.

The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory bonds, Series 1955, consists of \$471,000.00 of 2¾% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$13,000.00 on November 1, 1970, to \$23,000.00 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory. The first \$127,000.00 of these bonds were retired on schedule, and \$2,000.00 of the bonds, due November 1, 1995, have been retired.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1970, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series of 1957, consists of \$582,000.00 of 2-7/8% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$13,000.00 on October 1, 1970, to \$33,000.00 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory. During the year under review, \$13,000.00 of these bonds were retired as scheduled.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the university is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the university is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

The trustee reported that on May 31, 1970, the sinking fund requirements had been fulfilled by the university.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$497,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 31, 1961, with semiannual maturities varying from \$20,000.00 on September 1, 1970, to \$26,000.00 on September 1, 1975, with the remaining \$249,000.00 due on March 1, 1976. Interest rates vary from 4¾% to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) the apportionment from Baptist General Convention for building program; (2) \$67,500.00; or (3) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

The university is also obligor under a bond indenture in the amount of \$213,000.00 of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semiannual maturities varying from \$7,000.00 on December 1, 1970, to \$10,000.00 on December 1, 1977, with the remaining \$97,000.00 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rates vary from 4¾% to 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the university is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000.00 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the twelve months next following.

The trustee reported that the university had made the necessary deposits during the year under review.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
 June 30, 1970

1. Creation and Purpose

The Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority is a public trust created as of March 1, 1969, under the laws of the State of Oklahoma to aid in the financing and construction of hospitals and related facilities. The Trust shall terminate upon completion of the purpose for which it was formed, or as provided by law. Any voluntary termination requires the written consent of the owners of any Trust indebtedness then outstanding.

2. Bonded Indebtedness

The Authority has issued three series of debentures and bonds for the purpose of financing the expansion of the building and facilities of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Enid, Oklahoma. (Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital is not a separate legal entity, but is owned by and is an integral part of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.) Details of the issues are as follows:

The debentures mature March 3 of each year at the rate of \$100,000 annually until paid. The first mortgage gross revenue bonds, 1969, mature in varying amounts from November 1, 1972 through November 1, 1989. The first mortgage revenue bonds mature serially January 1 of each year through January 1, 1980, commencing with \$30,000 due January 1, 1971. Interest is payable semi-annually on each of the issues.

By agreement dated as of March 1, 1969, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has leased to the Trust the facilities of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, including buildings and equipment, and the inventories and other assets of the hospital, except its parking lot and school of nursing. In addition, the lease covers the revenues from operation of the hospital, and the Convention's interest in building fund pledges to the hospital. This leasehold interest and the gross revenues of the hospital have been assigned as security for the bonds and debentures. In addition, the full faith and credit of the Convention has been pledged to the payment of the indebtedness.

3. Accounting Principles

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared to present the accountability of the trustees for the assets placed in their possession, and their compliance with the accounting provisions of the various indentures under which bonds and debentures have been issued, and the requirements of the least agreement with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma (see Note 2).

A summary of the accounting requirements of the indentures and agreements is as follows:

(A) Gross receipts from the operation of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital and from construction fund pledges are to be deposited daily to the revenue fund. Amount required for the payment of periodic principal and interest payments are to be transferred to the sinking fund prior to the due dates. Amounts necessary for the operation and maintenance of the hospital are also to be paid from the fund. Remaining amounts determined by the trustees to be in excess of the needs of the Trust may be paid to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

(B) Proceeds from the sale of the debentures and the first mortgage gross revenue bonds, 1969, are required to be deposited in a separate "construction fund." These funds are to be used only to pay the cost of construction and certain expenses of the Trust. The proceeds of the first mortgage revenue bonds, 1970, are to be deposited in an "equipment" account, to be used to purchase equipment to furnish the hospital addition.

(C) Title to the additions to the hospital facility which are paid from the proceeds of the bonds or debentures issued by the Authority shall remain in the Authority until the bonds and debentures have been paid.

(D) The "Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Construction Fund" consists of amounts expended by the hospital on the construction program.

We have completed an audit of the books of the Cordell Memorial Hospital at Cordell, Oklahoma, for the twelve months period ended June 30, 1970. Attached, as part of our report thereon, please find exhibits and schedules as follows:

SCOPE OF AUDIT

A balance-sheet type of audit was made of the accounts as of June 30, 1970, with limited spot-check of detail transactions.

We confirmed the bank accounts and savings accounts by outside correspondence.

We confirmed the accounts receivable by outside correspondence, as of June 21, 1970. There were no significant, unexplained changes in the receivables from then to closing date. We aged the accounts, as of June 21, with the following results:

The above did, this time, include patients in the house. With the posting machine acquired early in the year, the income is now accrued daily. The reserve for bad debts is \$9,210.85, which is modest enough, but we hope sufficient.

We did not witness the actual inventory count, but our spot-check indicated that the hospital is carrying the approximate quantities shown on the physical inventory. (See "Comments" section for more on inventories).

We confirmed the principal accounts payable by outside correspondence. The retroactive adjustments, due from Medicare and Welfare are as computed by our colleague and fellow Certified Public Accountant, Mr. Edwin Briscoe, of Edmondson, Wilson and Briscoe, Tulsa, Oklahoma.

COMMENTS

We computed the retroactive payment due from Blue Cross to be \$587.22.

The perpetual inventory records are very good; and we believe the physical count is very accurate and complete. We do recommend however, that someone who is familiar with the packaging of the items assist in the pricing, to insure that units and pricing are consistent with each other.

We made all retroactive adjustments, affecting prior fiscal years, as "Surplus" adjustments (See Exhibit C), so they would not distort the income statement for the fiscal year.

In general we found the books to be in very good condition. In the area of claims and collections, the results of our confirmations indicated a great improvement from that of a year ago.

It was a source of gratification to us, to find that this hospital has now acquired a posting machine; and that the personnel have adapted very well to it. We believe this is a vast improvement over the hand posting system.

AUDITORS' OPINION

In our opinion, the attached statements presented fairly the financial condition of Cordell Memorial Hospital, as of June 30, 1970, and the results of operations for year then ended, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a consistent basis.

The above amounts are from cost reports for the year ended June 30, 1970, as submitted by the Hospital to the respective agencies. Such reports are subject to audit and verification by the respective agencies.

The current financing of \$18,000.00 from the Health Insurance Program for the Aged (Medicare) represents an advance received under the Program's provision for current financing of services rendered. Such advance is subject to adjustment by the Social Security Administration and is payable in full at the termination of the Hospital's contract for care of Medicare patients.

NOTE 2—PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

The land, building, and certain equipment and supplies are leased from the Sayre Public Works Authority for a nominal rent under a twenty-three year lease with an option to renew for an additional twenty-five years. The lease is dated March 14, 1961. At the termination of the lease all leased assets or their replacements together with the remaining accounts receivable will revert to the Authority. The cost of the leased assets is as follows:

These costs have been included in the accompanying balance sheet in accordance with certain regulations as prescribed by Oklahoma Blue Cross and the Health Insurance Program for the Aged (Medicare).

Property and equipment subject to depreciation is amortized over its estimated useful life by application of the straight-line and double declining-balance methods of depreciation. Property and equipment in the amount of \$73,248.42 was changed from the straight-line to the double declining-balance method of depreciation with the approval of the Health Insurance Program for the Aged (Medicare). Accumulated depreciation was not retroactively adjusted for such change. Net income for year and fund equity was decreased by \$7,900.98 which is the increase in depreciation expense as a result of the change from the straight-line method to the double declining-balance method. Additions to property and equipment for the current year have been recorded at cost and are being depreciated using the double declining-balance method.

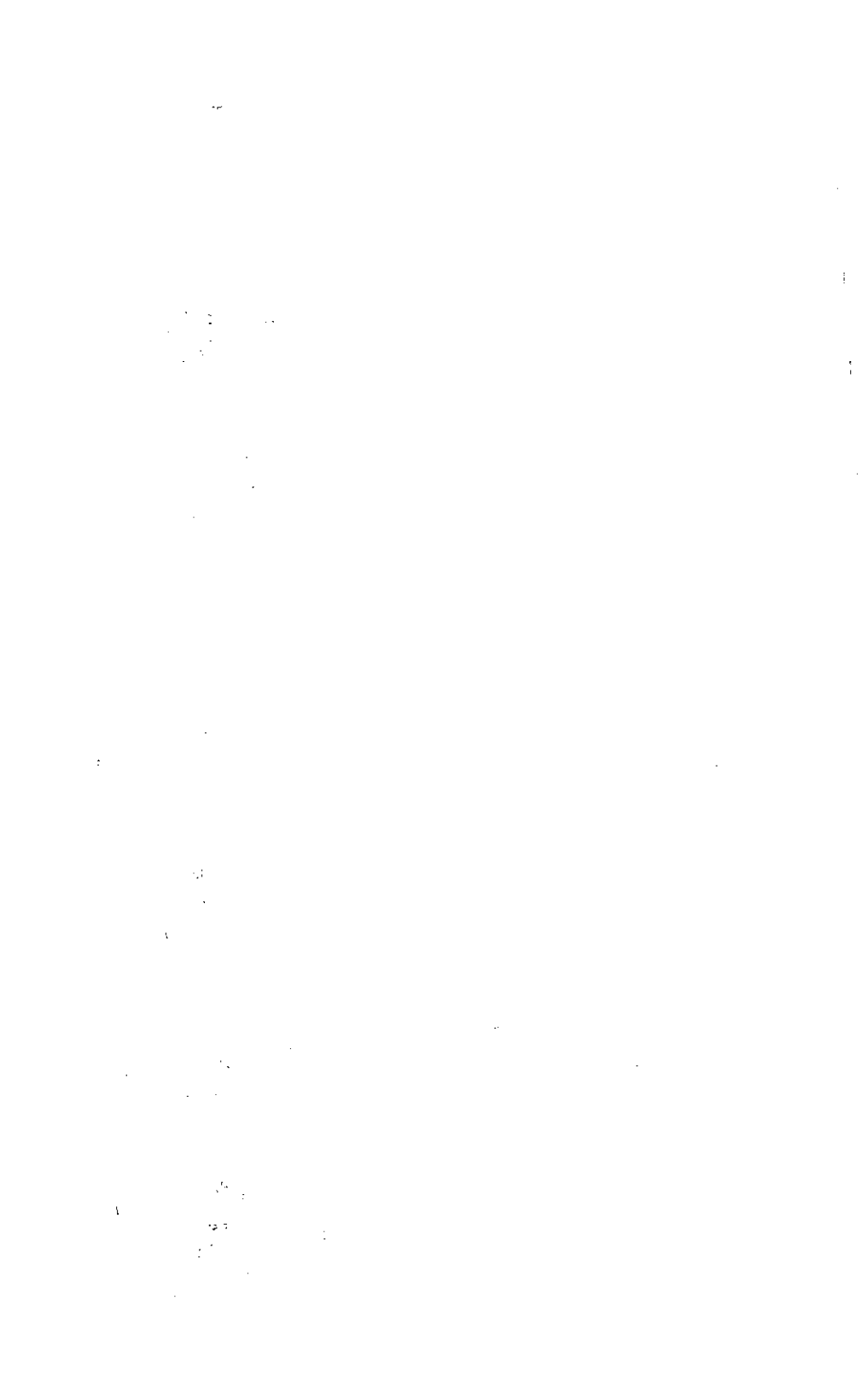
