## In Memoriam



Thomas Paul Haskins—Oklahoma's Apostle of Love Born at Sharon, Tenn. March 2, 1891 Died Dec. 18, 1976 at the Hugo Retirement Center

He was converted and baptized in 1902 at Pleasant Hill Church in Tennessee

Graduated from Hall-Moody College at Martin, Tenn.

Attended Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas

Received honorary doctorate from OBU in 1940

Moved to Oklahoma in 1913 and served Fairfax, Ralston and Pawnee churches

First full-time pastorate was First Church, Hennessey (1915-16)

Other Oklahoma pastorates were at Walters, First; Pauls Valley, First; Frederick, First; Duncan, First and Enid, First

He was assistant executive secretary of the Baptist Gneeral Convention of Oklahoma, 1935-48. He also served as state evangelist, chaplain of Baptist Memorial Hospital, Oklahoma City, and assistant pastor of Enid, First.

He was known throughout the Southern Baptist Convention as the "Apostle of Love."

# Second Amended Articles of Incorporation

of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

#### ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the abovementioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and

institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the abovementioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

#### ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

#### ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

#### ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## Constitution and Bylaws

## CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

#### ARTICLE I-NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

#### ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

#### ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

#### Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term
- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.
- Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent

and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

## ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

#### ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee

shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their actions shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the Baptist Messenger.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches:

#### ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

#### ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist** Messenger two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

#### BYLAWS

#### ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is

understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than the officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call.

Section 4. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 5. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 6. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

#### ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

- Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.
- Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.
- Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.
- Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.
- Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of the recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.

Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

#### ARTICLE IV—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the Baptist Messenger. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

## ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

- Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.
- Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.
- Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VI—BYLAWS

- Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.
- Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meet-

ing shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

## Resolutions

#### Concerning Baptist Churches

A resolution concerning "Baptist churches" was adopted by the Convention November 10, 1949.

"Be it resolved that the words 'Baptist churches' which appear in Article II, Section 1, be interpreted to mean churches that are sound in faith and practice, and

"Be it further resolved, that churches which accept alien immersion, practice open communion or affiliate with the Federal Council, World Council or similar unionizing organizaton, shall be considered unsound in faith and practice."

#### Concerning Board of Directors

A resolution concerning numerical representation of the Convention's Board of Directors was adopted by the Convention November 11, 1970.

"Article I, Section 1 of the Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention instructs the Convention to give due regard to both geographical and numerical representation in electing members of the Board of Directors, therefore, be it resolved: That the Committee on Nominations use the following guidelines in interpreting the phrase 'both geographical and numerical representation':

- "1. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area;
- "2. The additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 members of the churches in a given associational area;
- "3. That no associational area have more than eight members on the Board of Directors."

## Charter and Bylaws

#### of Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

#### ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

#### ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose the corporation may endeavor to provide opportunities for all departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each and all of said departments; to prescribe the course of study, employ instructors and teachers and to maintain and control the government and discipline of said institution and in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant bequest, devise or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any or more of the departments

of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees herein after provided for shall designate.

#### ARTICLE V

This corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Educational or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

#### ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect trustees to fill the places of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, eight trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall elect eight such trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VII

All acts and deeds, including the execution of any and all instruments, heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers, of the Oklahoma Baptist University, be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance and sale of the Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

#### **BYLAWS**

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual conventions held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two semi-annual meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first semi-annual meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees within thirty days after the date of the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, which is held in November of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall organize, elect its officers, appoint committees, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second of the semi-annual meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees at some time within the last fifteen days of the month of February of each year, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both semiannual meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees,

and notice thereof shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees by mail seven days before the hour of the meeting by mailing notice thereof to each trustee at his place of residence or post office address. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officers for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and an Assistant Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first semi-annual meeting following the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees

from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board, issue notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman, have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary from the State of Oklahoma or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 12. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 13. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semi-annual meeting in February of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 14. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 15. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of

Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 16. There shall be formed from the membership of the Board of Trustees an Executive Committee consisting of not more than seven members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

The following officers of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Secretary of Board of Trustees.

The following Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the Board of Trustees, who are appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Committee on Student Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Administrative Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Development Affairs.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be Secretary of the Executive Committee.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session and to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the Board of Trustees; said Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Section 17. The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

Section 18. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

We, the Undersigned, John R. Crain, President, and C. Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

#### ARTICLE I

#### Name

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUN-DATION OF OKLAHOMA.

#### ARTICLE II

#### Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

#### ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereot.

## ARTICLE IV Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

### ARTICLE V

#### Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and

otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

- 1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
- 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;
- 3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;
- 4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;
- 5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and
- 6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VII Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

#### ARTICLE VIII

Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

#### ARTICLE IX

Prohibitions to assure tax-exempt status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

### ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

#### ARTICLE XI

Adoption of Amended Articles

1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.

- 2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 1974.
- 3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

## **Amended Bylaws**

of

#### The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

(Effective December 20, 1974)

#### ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## ARTICLE II Meetings

- 2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of the directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.
- 2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.
- 2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.

2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.

2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

## ARTICLE III Officers

3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.

3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President

shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

### ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

- 4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- 4.2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.
- 4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that at any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.
- 4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for

publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribuiton at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

- 4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.
- 4.4 Vice Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.
- 4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

### ARTICLE V Directors

- 5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.
- 5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.
- 5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 5.2 Election of Directors and Term of Office. In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist

General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as Directors.

- 5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.
- 5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairmen of all standing committees and the President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.
- 5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.
- 5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### Administration of Funds and Property

- 6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.
- 6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

#### 6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

(a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full

accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

(b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

#### ARTICLE VII Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, CORPORATE SEAL."

#### ARTICLE VIII

Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

- 8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer or employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.
- 8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

### ARTICLE IX Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S COR-PORATION.

#### ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

#### ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals
- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

#### ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

#### ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

#### ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

#### ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

#### ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

#### ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

# Bylaws of

# **Baptist Laymen's Corporation**

#### ARTICLE I Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

#### ARTICLE II Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

### ARTICLE III Meetings of Directors

- Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporamay be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.
- Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.
- Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.
- Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24)) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meeting.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

#### ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

#### ARTICLE V President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

#### ARTICLE VI Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

#### ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

#### ARTICLE X

#### **Notice of Regular Meetings**

Section 1. DISPENSED WITH. Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

#### ARTICLE XI Amendments

Section 1. METHOD OF AMENDMENT. These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

#### ARTICLE XII

#### Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

#### ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

## Policies and Procedures Manual for Hospitals Owned and Operated By the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

The Articles of Incorporation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma states that "... the corporation among other things is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, but not limited to child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons, and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes."

Pursuant to its Corporate Charter and Constitution and Bylaws, the Convention operates several hospitals under one Corporate Charter. In order to fully establish guidelines for effective operation of the hospitals, the Convention's Board of Directors adopted this POLICIES AND PROCEDURES MANUAL ON December 2, 1975.

#### ARTICLE I

#### Purpose

Inspired by a concept of Christian love and service that rises above self-interest and reflects the concern of Jesus Christ for the sick and helpless, Oklahoma Baptists are engaged in an extensive hospital ministry. Through hospitals the Convention functions on behalf of Oklahoma Baptist churches as an instrument of God's grace in enriching and prolonging human life within the scope of Divine Providence—to serve both patient and family in the name and in the spirit of Christ—to comfort those who come within our walls by conveying a positive Christian interpretation of the experiences of disease, disability and death—to bring people into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ by means of direct personal witness as occasion permits.

The carrying out of this purpose involves:

- 1. Conducting a high-quality program of hospital care.
- 2. The enlistment, employment and training of competent personnel. Care must be given to convey to all employees that they are employees of the Convention and that their responsibilities should be carried out in a manner consistent with the Christian objectives of the Convention.
- Services shall be offered to the public without discrimination as to race, color or religious belief, and shall be offered at the lowest

reasonable cost under a rate structure which is fair and equitable to all patients and yet defray the cost of operation of the hospital.

4. The provision of an adequate chaplaincy service to patients

#### and their families, hospital personnel and the medical staff.

#### ARTICLE II

#### Control by the Board of Directors

The final authority and control of the business and affairs of each hospital operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is vested in the Convention's Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE III

#### **Director of Hospitals**

'Section 1. In keeping with Article ÎV, Section 3 of the Convention's Constitution, and in order to promote a direct channel of administrative responsibility between the Convention and its Board of Directors and each hospital, the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention shall be the Director of Hospitals. He is charged with the general supervision of each hospital operated by the Convention, and shall be an ex-officio member of each Governing Board, with full voting rights.

Section 2. In consultation with the Board's Hospitals Committee, he shall select, employ, supervise and set the compensation of the

various administrators and/or presidents.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### Hospitals Committee of the Board of Directors

Section 1. The Hospitals Committee shall serve with the Executive Director-Treasurer, the Director of Hospitals, the administrators and/or presidents, and the various governing board committees in all matters pertaining to the operation of each of these hospitals.

Section 2. The Hospitals Committee shall report to the Board of Directors annually, or more often if desirable, concerning its activities and concerning conditions and accomplishments of these hospitals. The Hospitals Committee shall make such recommendations to the Board of Directors as it deems advisable as to actions to be taken by the Board of Directors in the operation of these hospitals.

Section 3. The Hospitals Committee shall nominate to the Board a governing board committee for each hospital.

#### ARTICLE V

#### **Governing Board Committees**

Section 1. Composition of Governing Board Committees. In order to extend the authority of the Convention directly to each of these hospitals, the Board of Directors shall elect a Governing Board committee for each of these hospitals. The Governing Board shall consist of not less than nine (9) nor more than twelve (12) members. All members who are elected by the Board of Directors of the Convention, with the exception of those who at that time are members of the Board of Directors of the Convention, shall serve for a period of three (3) calendar years, and may be re-elected for a second three (3) year term, but shall not be elected for a third successive term. Those members who are also serving on the Board of Directors of

the Convention shall be elected for one (1) calendar year, and may be re-elected for additional one (1) year terms, but not more than four (4) successive one (1) year terms.

- Section 2. Additional members. The Governing Board is authorized and empowered to appoint additional members to serve on the Governing Board, when in its opinion the hospital will benefit by reason of the service of local prominent citizens. Such additional members shall not exceed one-third of the membership elected by the Board of Directors of the Convention; and shall be appointed for one (1) year terms, but not more than three (3) successive one (1) year terms. These additional members shall serve on committees of the Governing Board and otherwise participate in all functions of the Governing Board. This section is not mandatory, but permissive in nature. It should be an unusual circumstance for the Governing Board to elect members in addition to those elected by the Board of Directors.
- Section 3. Responsibility. In the operation of the particular hospital, each Governing Board shall function as a local arm of the Board of Directors, and each is subject to control by the Board of Directors. In cooperation with the Administrator and/or President of the particular hospital, the Governing Board is charged with the responsibility of operating the hospital in accordance with the policies and procedures which may be established from time to time by the Board of Directors of the Convention.
- Section 4. Functions. The Governing Board shall conduct regular meetings periodically, at which time it will review the operations of the hospital and advise itself concerning the hospital's financial and physical condition. The Governing Board shall carry on its work through its officers and such committees of its members as it deems necessary and advisable.
- a. The Governing Board should be provided by the administrator and/or president with adequate financial reports, accompanied by basic departmental and operational statistical information, which may be used to interpret the financial picture in terms of patient service.
- b. The reliability of these reports shall be assured by the installation and maintenance of adequate accounting practices and procedures. These procedures shall be verified by the added protection of at least one annual external audit. Additional audits may be requested by the Governing Board of the Convention's Board of Directors.
- c. Changes in rate structures shall be recommended by the Governing Board to the Director of Hospitals, which changes shall be effective at the time said recommendation is made and until disapproved by the Hospitals Committee.
- d. Adequate purchasing procedures shall be set up and maintained to assure the economical acquisition and use of necessary supplies.
- e. A control system shall be established, governing the hiring and discharging of employees, the personnel policies which will gov-

ern the employees' working conditions, and a definite projection of the number of employees required for the operation.

- f. Budgetary projection shall be instituted not only for the purpose of actual monetary control but also for the psychological effect the preparation and monthly examination exerts on those responsible for expenditures.
- g. There shall be a clearly defined authority by the Governing Board, for the Administrator's and/or President's guidance in the purchase of equipment and services. It is the Administrator's and/or President's responsibility to recommend to the Governing Board the setting up of these policies so that funds will be spent in a reasonable and acceptable manner.
- h. Day-to-day control and observation of cash income and expenditures shall be maintained and the reports kept on file. The Administrator and/or President is responsible to the Governing Board for sound management of the hospital in its day-to-day operations.
- i. The Governing Board shall exercise the required supervision and give the necessary authority to the Administrator and/or President to cause the hospital to maintain the standards required by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals for an accredited hospital. The Governing Board should be ready to counsel with the Administrator and/or President in the case of needed disciplinary action when members of the Medical Staff fail to meet their responsibilities necessary to the requirements of accreditation.
- Section 5. Limitations. a. The Governing Board shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Convention or the Board of Directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the Executive-Director-Treasurer.
- b. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by the Governing Board involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. All documents pertaining to property must be executed by the officers of the Convention.
- Section 6. Authority to Establish Rules and Bylaws. The Convention, or its Board of Directors, as a part of its supervisory control which it retains at all times, shall establish, revoke, or amend any and all rules, regulations, or bylaws pertaining to the operation of all hospitals, or any particular hospital. However, subject to such supervisory control, which it reserves for itself, the Convention, and its Board of Directors, hereby delegates to each Governing Board the power and authority to establish rules, regulations or bylaws for the operation of the particular hospital, including those governing the membership, conduct and operation of the various professional staff members, such as Medical Staff, Medical and Surgical Staff, or Medical and Dental Staff; and same shall be effective as adopted by the

Governing Board unless and until amended, revised and supplemented, or revoked by the Governing Board, Convention or its Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### Administrator and/or President

The Administrator and/or President shall be held responsible for the administration of the hospital and all its departments, subject only to the policies enacted by the Board of Directors of the Convention, the Hospitals Committee, the Director of Hospitals and the Governing Board of the particular hospital. The authority and duties of the Administrator and/or President shall include the following:

- a. To organize the personnel and others concerned with the operation of the hospital, both professional and administrative personnel, and maintain them as efficient working units or departments.
- b. To present a full report of operations each month to the Governing Board and to the Director of Hospitals.
- c. To select, employ, control and discharge all employees necessary for the efficient operation of the hospital.
- d. To see that the buildings, grounds and equipment are kept in good state of repair, conferring with the Governing Board pertaining to major matters, but carrying on routine repairs, replacements, and maintenance without consultation.
- e. To supervise all business affairs such as the records of financial transactions, collection of accounts, and purchase and issue of supplies, and to be certain that all funds are collected and expended to the best possible advantage.
- f. To cooperate with the Medical and Surgical Staff and to secure like cooperation on the part of all those concerned rendering professional services to the end that the patient may receive the best possible care. If necessity arises, the Administrator and/or President as the representative of the Governing Board, shall make such decisions which appear to him to be consistent with the welfare of the patients and the continuing good reputation of the hospital.
- g. At all regular meetings of the Governing Board, to submit reports showing statistical, professional and financial activities of the hospital, and to prepare and submit any special reports that may be requested by the Governing Board.
- h. To surround the patient with every reasonable protection, thereby fulfilling the moral and legal responsibility of the Convention.
- i. To attend all meetings of the Governing Board and its committees.
- j. To perform any other duty that may be necessary in the best interest of the hospital.

# Student Work Bob Lee, Director

The Baptist Student Department and BSU directors are reaching and ministering to students from 38 campuses across Oklahoma. There are 28 Baptist Student Centers where thousands of students can find a friendly place to meet and fellowship. More than 27,000 Baptist students are going to college in Oklahoma and the 36 full-time and 12 part-time directors and associates are working with them as counselors, teachers, witnesses and friends. The BSU center is a place where students from all religious faiths can come and find a deeper meaning for life through Bible study, missions, worhip, evangelism and fellowship.

The Cooperative Program support for student ministry continues to grow each year. In 1977, \$452,000 will come from the CP for BSU work. The 1978 figure will be approximately one-half million dollars. These figures will be matched by church and association gifts in 1977 and 1978. Our future continues to look bright with the fine financial support we receive from Baptists in Oklahoma.

The 1976-77 school year has been a very good one for BSU across the state. It is our hope to have close to 600 students at Glorieta Student Week. Reports show that we had approximately 8,000 students to participate in student work ministries and that 750 were won to the Lord through our evangelism ministry. Work with more than 1,500 International students continued to be a big emphasis and 35 of them came to know the Lord. One hundred and thirty-five attended the International Student Conference. Twelve hundred students participated in the BSU Convention at First Church, Oklahoma City with Jimmy Allen and Ken Medema as the speaker and musician. The basketball tournament was won by the Connors girls and the OBU boys teams. More than 550 students participated in this event. The Leadership Training Conference at Falls Creek climaxed the school year in a big way with 776 registered. Bill Hendricks of Southwestern Seminary and Robert Campbell, pastor of the Ardmore, Northwest Church, were speakers. Jim and Sonya Greer of Nichols Hills Church led the music.

A big emphasis was again put on missions. This involved sending over 40 students to serve as summer missionaries to such places as Arizona, New Mexico, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Arkansas, Georgia and five different places in Oklahoma. The need for helping BSU work in new convention areas was still realized. Part of the mission money raised by the students was sent to help begin and strengthen Student Work in such states as Kansas, Nebraska, Maryland, Indiana, Illinois, Wyoming, Ohio, Montana and Michigan. Assistance was also sent to the University of Saskatchewan in Canada. Total funds sent to help in new convention areas totaled more than \$21,000.

The work has continued to expand. Full-time work has started at Western Oklahoma State in Altus. A new building has been built at Altus that will house the Southwest Association and the BSU. Work has been strengthened at Carl Albert Junior College and Sayre Junior College. A new building was erected at Carl Albert and more money for salaries was provided there and at Sayre.

All in all it has been a good year. With the continued support of Oklahoma Baptists, we will be able accomplish the things God has given us a vision to do.

# Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma C. Fred Williams, President

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma staff and Board appreciate the opportunity of serving as the incorporated trust agency for Oklahoma Baptists, their agencies, institutions and departments. The primary purpose of the Foundation is to secure and administer capital and endowment funds for all of the agencies, institutions and departments of the State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. We are happy to report that as of July 31, 1977 total endowment and capital assets held by the Foundation was \$21,697,948.67 and that the total income distributed to agencies, institutions, departments and individuals for that period was \$1,055,571.51.

These endowment and capital needs funds are managed in strict compliance with the trust instruments created by the persons who gave them. As the title of this report indicates, the administration of these funds is managed, not by the Foundation's administrative staff, but by a Board of Directors elected by the convention. These business and professional people, 16 in number, are faithful members of Baptist churches. They serve, meeting by committees monthly or on special call, without compensation. Current board members are: John R. Crain, chairman; Charles Allen, vice-chairman; Ferdie Deering, vice-chairman; Albert F. Norman, vice-chairman; Alfred J. Ashton, Robert S. Carmack, Carl S. Carnes, Otis Duran, Norman D. Farrell, Willis Fry, Robert N. Hammons, Claude H. Rogers, J. Ray Smith, James M. Thompson, Finley Tinnin and R. A. Young.

The convention's Committee on Nominations will recommend to this convention four men for election to four-year terms on the Foundation's Board of Directors to replace those rotating off. Those rotating off this year are: John R. Crain, Carl S. Carnes, Robert S. Carmack, and Albert F. Norman. We are greatly indebted to these competent and dedicated men and hereby express appreciation to them.

Those serving on the Foundation staff are: C. Fred Williams, president; Betsy Czajkoski, secretary to Williams and secretary to the corporation; William G. Kersh, vice-president—estate planning and personal trustee services; Melinda Wright, secretary to Kersh; Marvin H. Hall, vice-president—property management and church loan services; Jana Charles, secretary to Hall; Robert L. Ross, vice-president—communication and estate stewardship services; Kay Singer, secretary to Ross; James E. Stewart, vice-president—administrative assistance and special investment services; Juanita Smith, secretary to Stewart and receptionist; Raymond Hurt, chief accountant; Naomi Marlow, bookkeeper; H. Truman Maxey, estate planning consultant.

For administrative purposes the work of the Foundation is divided into five primary programs over which the president provides general supervision and direction. The divisions are: accounting services, property management and church loan services, estate planning and personal trustee services, communication and estate stewardship services, and administrative assistance and special investment services. This is the most ever earned in one year, and is 7.09 percent earnings on our average assets for the period, including the non-income producing assets, such as life estates on farm land, etc.

# Property Management and Church Loan Services

# **Property Management:**

Property management involves the management of mineral interest and real property. Two committees of the board, the Farm and Minerals Committee and the Real Estate Committee, confer with Marvin H. Hall in these areas of work.

The Foundation holds title to and manages 59 units of property consisting of farms, residential dwellings, business buildings, and lake-shore property. Many mineral acres are held in trust and managed by the Foundation. This mineral interest is located in 54 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states.

Farm land is rented to operators on a cash or crop division basis. Grassland is rented for cash only.

Residential property is leased by the month or year for cash. Occasionally, such property is sold. The disposition made of the property is in complete compliance with the directions of the donors and under the guidance of the Board's Farm and Minerals Committee.

Business property is leased for cash and usually the contracts are from one to five years. Some business property is held jointly with other owners. The Foundation does not operate farms or retail outlets. The highlight of the year was a 6 percent Unitrust established by Mr. and Mrs. Havis Watson. The trust was funded with a gift of 16 pieces of real property located in Stillwater consisting of rental houses and apartments. Total value of this trust exceeds \$245,000.

# Church Building Loan Services:

The Church Building Loan Fund was established in 1954 to provide funds from which qualifying churches could borrow money for new construction or for remodeling and at the same time provide a beneficial place for investment of funds held in trust by the Foundation. The program has now been expanded to include associations and Baptist Student Unions.

The board has determined that up to 40 percent of the trust assets held by the Foundation may be invested in Church Building loans. Thirty-three and one-half percent of the total assets held in trust by the Foundation are now invested in the Church Building Loan Fund. Since its beginning in 1954, \$14,504,320.73 has been invested in the fund from which \$4,557,079.21 has been earned for Baptist causes. There are 172 loans in effect totaling \$7,261,502.

# **Estate Planning and Personal Trustee Services**

These services of the Foundation include the personal aspects of the agency's ministry. At this point the Foundation becomes, "people meeting some paramount needs of other people."

# Estate Planning:

In this day of rapid appreciation in the value of many assets, escalating tax structures, and mass casualties, estate planning has taken on a new importance to many Baptist families.

Some of the most valuable services can be rendered to individuals or families when there is the involvement of minor children, ownership of real estate and other property, insurance benefits, or family members who are dependent upon others for the provisions of life's necessities.

Without expense to Baptist families, where Baptist causes are included, a Foundation staff member will, upon invitation, make an appointment to assist in working out the details for a will and other entities of estate planning. Legal counsel will be used to actually prepare the documents.

This assistance is especially valuable to those who want to develop a total stewardship program in order to perpetuate their witness after death.

In the 12 months' time covered by this report, Aug. 1, 1976 through July 31, 1977, the Foundation assisted 449 people in securing information for the preparation of Christian wills.

There were 17 gift annuity contracts signed, 32 trusts prepared in which Baptist causes were remembered, and 24 wills admitted to probate.

#### Church Placards:

Eight hundred and three Baptist churches have received Foundation placards. These indicate the number of individuals in the church who have used the services of the Foundation to help underwrite the future of some phase of Baptist life. These placards are updated annually.

#### Personal Trustee Services:

From time to time, there are individuals who, for various reasons, can no longer take care of their personal business. They plan for the Foundation to assume the obligation of receiving their income and paying their bills. Often, it is necessary to be responsible for where they live, admitting them to the hospital when they become ill and handling all sorts of personal services for them. On occasion it has fallen the Foundation's lot to plan for the funeral services for a trustor when there were no family members to do so.

In a very real sense, the Baptist Foundation staff has become the family of individuals who have grown dependent on others. In these times, because they planned in advance, they were able to depend on The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

## Tulsa Office:

The Tulsa Baptist Center becomes the Foundation office serving Tulsa and the northeast area of Oklahoma. The first week of each month a member of the staff works out of this office. Anyone in that area may contact the Tulsa office, telephone 918-939-2457, when the services of the Foundation are desired.

# Communication and Estate Stewardship Services

Communication and education is a never-ending and yet everchanging task. Constant efforts are made to up-date information in order to keep current with legal and procedural changes. This section of the report includes:

#### **Educational and Promotional Materials:**

Because of the passage of the Tax Reform Act in October 1976, much of the literature previously distributed by the Foundation became out-dated. All such materials were reviewed, revised or rewritten. Among these is the pamphlet furnished exclusively to attorneys, "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," and the basic information booklet, "That You May Know." New materials produced this year included a bookmark on which is defined important terms of estate planning and a brochure, "Estate Planning—A Christian Perspective."

Distribution of these materials and others is done by mail as individuals request them, or as Foundation staff members take them to estate planning seminars which they conduct, or to churches where they preach. Again, this year these materials were made available at each annual associational meeting. A number of associational offices have such literature on hand for distribution to the churches.

A new service initiated by the Foundation was the offering of program covers to the associations for the printing of the agenda of their annual meetings. Most of the associations used these program covers which contained on the backside information about The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

#### Communication Via Media:

A series of 10 public service announcements was prepared for the Foundation and copies have been distributed to a number of radio stations in Oklahoma. These 30, 45 and 60-second spots give general information about wills, trusts, estate taxes, etc. They encourage the listener to respond by seeking legal counsel and/or contacting The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for further information. Radio stations in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Bethany, Cushing, Enid, Hugo, Lawton, McAlester, Midwest City and Pryor are presently using the announcements.

Television commercials, produced for the Foundation by the Southern Baptist Stewardship Commission, were purchased in April for use in late 1977 and 1978. These spots will be made available to all state television stations on a rotating basis.

As Foundation staff members are invited to preach in churches throughout the state, a news story and picture of the staff member is sent from the office to the local newspaper for publication. The news story includes basic information about the Foundation, its identity, purposes and ministries.

# Annual Emphases:

"Make Your Will Month" in January and "Baptist Foundation Month" in September were again observed in most Oklahoma Baptist churches. To promote these emphases bulletin inserts were provided by the Foundation to the churches. The 125,000 inserts, mailed in the past, were distributed this September by the Directors of Missions to the churches. We are especially grateful to these men for their assistance in making personal contacts and giving added importance to these emphases.

The Baptist Messenger through the assistance of Jack Gritz, editor, provides space for special promotion for these activities. An article by the president of the Foundation also appears in the Messenger each week.

To encourage pastors to preach on the biblical doctrine of estate stewardship, model sermons on estate stewardship have been included in a mailout to state pastors regarding the September emphasis.

# **Estate Planning Seminars:**

Probably the most effective educational program carried on by the Foundation is the estate planning seminar. The seminar is usually conducted for a church group and provides an opportunity for dialogue between the Foundation staff member and the audience. The setting for this kind of session can be at the Church Training hour, Baptist Men's meeting, senior citizen's group, an open meeting for interested persons, etc. The seminar provides the flexibility as to time, subject matter and size of group. The response of persons requesting personal assistance in estate planning as the result of a seminar-type meeting has been exceptionally good.

# Associational Foundation Representative:

Most of the 41 associations have elected Baptist Foundation representatives. These persons received special training at the State Planning Meeting for Associational Officers held in Oklahoma City in April. The associational representative is a resource person for the Foundation to the churches, distributing literature and speaking to congregations or before special groups. In consultation with the director of missions, he schedules estate planning seminars and/or promotional emphases on the associational level. He also helps local churches and individuals in making contact with the Foundation staff for further assistance. A continuing correspondence is carried on from the Foundation office with the associational Foundation representatives.

# Administrative Assistance and Special Investment Services

# Administrative Assistance:

This area of work requires consultation with the chief accountant, bookkeeper and the Investment and Special Investment Committees of the Foundation's Board. Two investment pools administered by the Foundation—the Equity Pool and Fixed Income Pool—fall under this section of administration. Nineteen and seven-tenths percent of the trust assets administered by the Foundation are in the Equity Pool with thirteen and eight-tenths percent in the Fixed Income Pool.

# Scholarships and Student Loans:

The Foundation has handled student loans and scholarship funds since 1947. The funds are largely for the benefit of students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. Nominal interest is payable quarterly while the students are in school. Repayment of the principal amount of the loan is required when a student graduates or leaves school. This past year 62 loans were made totaling \$31,735; 268 scholarships were awarded totaling \$55,174 including the Willie Taylor Scholarship Trust established for Indian students.

The Louise Prichard Trust, by far the largest fund, is for ministerial and mission volunteer students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. Distribution of more than \$250,000 is made annually through this trust to Oklahoma Baptist University.

The D. N. Caulk Student Loan Fund for black students now has in effect loans totaling \$3,126.23.

# Sunday School Work

Reaching and teaching have been two major areas of work for the Department of Religious Education relating to the current statewide theme of "Church Alive." The major purpose of the work of the department is to aid the individual Southern Baptist churches in developing effective Bible teaching and Church Training programs. A continuing interest in reaching more people for Christ and the church is reflected in the response of church leaders across the state.

# **Department Personnel**

Several changes have occurred in department personnel this past year.

Robert Audd became state director of Church Training and associate director of the department on Feb. 1, having served previously as director of adult education.

On Feb. 1, Ann Gardner assumed the responsibility of director of youth education, coming from the staff of First Church, Oklahoma City.

Billy Allen accepted the responsibility of director of adult education on May 15 after having served very effectively as state Sunday school secretary for the Southern Baptist Convention of Illinois.

Mrs. Darlene Koch continues to serve as director of childhood education. She is now in her seventh year on the staff. Your field work staff is one of the finest ever to serve in the department. Each one is an accomplished expert in his respective field of work.

Secretaries serving on the staff include: Mrs. Wanda Jennings, Mrs. Olive Hays, Mrs. Lou O'Neal, Mrs. Pauline Self and Mrs. Marilyn Morgan.

#### Statistics

With the help of Action, Sunday school showed one of its greatest gains in many years with an increase of 13,414 in enrolment, with the total reported at 331,814. On High Attendance Day, 182,427 were reported in Sunday school, an increase of 7,237 over the previous year. Total enrolment in V.B.S. was 124,732. In these schools, 1,788 professions of faith were reported and 20,049 prospects were discovered. Mission offering given was \$28,258.

The total Church Training enrolment reported was 89,870, a decrease of 3,237. Seventeen associations showed an increase in enrolment. "M" Night attendance totaled 6,839 in 29 associations across the state. Tulsa Association was first in attendance with 1,225. Twelve associations participated in the State Speakers' Tournament.

# Highlights of 1976-77

"Building on Basics Workshops" were conducted in 33 associations, reaching over 4,000 Sunday school and Church Training workers. The remaining workshops are to be conducted this year. In these workshops a study was made regarding past growth patterns and future possibilities as the basic principles of growth are applied. Results of these workshops are still being experienced in churches' outreach, teaching and training programs.

The State Bible Teaching/Learning Workshops, March 28-29, at the Trinity Church, Oklahoma City, reached more than 1,000 workers from all areas of the state. Video tapes were introduced in this meeting.

Sunday School Enlargement Campaigns and Central Training Schools were conducted in six associations. Vacation Bible School teams were trained for every association in Oklahoma in two state VBS training meetings. Two Leadership Seminars were conducted at Falls Creek with a registration of 419. A Single Adults Retreat reached approximately 300.

One Church Training Growth project was conducted in Tulsa Association with nine churches participating. Six hundred and eleven people participated in a Marriage Enrichment Conference in Oklahoma City.

35. The Woman's Missionary Union report and the Brotherhood report were both presented at this time. Abbie Louise Green, director, Woman's Missionary Union, gave the report of the women's work. Laddie Adams, director, Department of Brotherhood, gave the report of the men's work.

Miss Green interviewed Adams concerning the work, and Adams interviewed Miss Green concerning the work.

# Woman's Missionary Union Abbie Louise Green, Director

The work of Woman's Missionary Union centered on two emphases for the church year 1976-77—Teach Missions: to know, to grow; and Minding the Future. Through the emphasis, Teach Missions, WMU sought to accomplish the following objectives:

To improve the image and quality of teaching missions;

To encourage participation in mission study.

The second WMU emphasis, Minding the Future, promoted the following age level organizations: Mission Friends, Girls in Action, and Acteens seeking to accomplish the following objectives:

To increase church leader and adult member awareness of personal responsibility for preschoolers, children and youth in missions organizations;

To enlist more preschoolers, children, and youth in missions organizations.

Members of the WMU staff are: Sue Stephens, Baptist Young Women—Baptist Women director; Lawana Roberts joined the staff June 1, 1976 as Acteens director; Dorothy Thayer, Mission Friends—Girls in Action director; Eula Mae Stewart, secretary to the director and supervisory secretary; Frances Evans, secretary, and Joann Lindsay, receptionist-secretary.

During the year state meetings were held to reach women and all ages of girls. The first meeting for the year was the Acteens Conference held Feb. 18-19 at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. A total of 509 were present, representing 75 churches in the state. The girls and leaders received inspiration and mission information.

The Seventy-Second Annual Session of Woman's Missionary Union was held at First Church, Tulsa, April 18-19. In keeping with the objectives of Southern Baptists to let every person have an opportunity to hear and accept the gospel of Jesus Christ by 2000, "Bold Mission Thrust" was selected as the the theme for the meeting. The WMU song for the year, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus," was also used throughout the program in developing the theme.

Woman's Missionary Union participated in the State Training Clinic for Associational Officers held May 27-28, Northwest Church, Oklahoma City. The associational WMU directors and age level directors were invited to the two days of training conferences. There were 146 WMU associational officers in attendance.

During the seven weeks of camp at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha 787 Girls in Action and Acteen members were privileged to attend. The decisions made included 50 professions of faith, 37 for special services and 70 rededications. A home and a foreign missionary served on the staff each week to help provide missionary education for the girls.

Twelve missionaries were secured by Woman's Missionary Union each of the five weeks of the Falls Creek Assemblies. The missionaries rotate to the youth classes presenting a missionary message in each class during the week. There are two classes in the children's division and one in the adult division that are led by missionaries. For each week of the assemblies Woman's Missionary Union works with Sooner Alcohol Narcotics Education in securing leaders for two classes on "What the Bible Says About Alcohol and other Drugs." WMU also provides six preschool workers for each week of the assemblies.

The **Baptist Young Women Workshop** was held Aug. 18, First Church, Oklahoma City. There were 132 in attendance representing 42 churches. This meeting is designed to give training and inspiration.

During September of each year 15 WMU Area Meetings are held in 15 areas of the state. This is a time when officers and members are trained for the work in their churches for the new church year. During the 1977 meetings 2,129 were in attendance and a total of \$1,356.83 mission offering was received.

Through the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions scholarships are provided for single women attending a Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Oklahoma Baptist University School of Nursing. During the 1976-77 term scholarships were granted to 19 women all of whom were attending Southwestern Seminary. Scholarships were granted for two girls attending OBU School of Nursing.

The three mission offerings promoted by Woman's Missionary Union each year are: Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions. Amounts received were as follows:

Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for 1976—\$1,147,795.50 (books closed April 30, 1977).

Annie Armstrong Easter Offering as of Oct. 14, 1977, \$347, 304.51 (books to close Dec. 31, 1977).

Edna McMillan Offering as of Oct. 14, 1977, \$150,516.76 (books to close Dec. 31, 1977).

Woman's Missionary Union secured writers for the program material for The State Mission Season of Prayer and prepared the materials for mailing to the churches. The 1977 theme is "Faith Unlimited." The state goal is \$250,000.

# Brotherhood

# Laddie Adams, Director

Brotherhood enrolment showed an increase this past year and more interest and progress has been noted in all areas. Today is the greatest time for the mission program of a church to function and our men are aware of the need for involvement of men and boys in missions. The Brotherhood Department exists to assist churches in training men and boys to meet those needs.

## Church Alive

The 19 men who received specialized training to assist in Brother-hood's pilot program for Church Alive—Missions Thrust—have been meeting with the churches who will serve. This second year of Church Alive Missions Thrust has many of our associations planning to participate.

**Area Training Sessions** 

The eight area training sessions offered excellent training to equip men to meet the needs around us for witness and ministry. An increase in attendance over last year allowed participation from all areas of the state.

RA Congress

The 70th Anniversary of Royal Ambassador work provided an excellent theme for the 1977 RA Congress held on the Oklahoma Baptist University campus. Attendance was good and the participation of T. B. Lackey, J. A. Pennington, Abbie Louise Green, Bob Banks, along with other program personnel, made for one of the most interesting Congresses we have had.

Camp Hudgens

Seven weeks of camp resulted in 58 professions of faith and over 172 decisions at Camp Hudgens. Boys from 118 churches attended these weeks and a volunteer staff of 68 men gave of their time and energy to help boys have a meaningful experience. The generous giving of Oklahoma Baptists through the Cooperative Program has provided a camp that has excellent facilities and provides a wonderful and Christian camping program for boys. A total of 896 participated this past year.

# Lay Couples Retreat

This unusual opportunity for couples to participate in a sharing time of inspiration and fellowship was well attended at Quartz Mountain Lodge. The cooperative effort of the Brotherhood and Evangelism Departments to provide this meeting caused expressions of appreciation by all those attending.

#### **World Missions Conferences**

Eight associations provided the opportunity for their churches to participate in being able to meet, hear, and have fellowship with state, home, and foreign missionaries. This is more associations having World Missions Conferences in Oklahoma than we have had in several years. Attendance was excellent and more churches participated in each association than usual. Next year promises to be as great with eight more of our associations scheduled for a World Missions Conference.

# Lay Renewal

Lay Renewal and Ministry Evangelism Weekends have been on the increase this year. At the Falls Creek Renewal Training Session, 123 team members, consultants and coordinators received inspiration, training, and enjoyed good fellowship. Oklahoma will participate in a four-state Southwest Regional Training Conference at Texoma Lodge, April 20-22, 1978.

## **Regional Training Institute**

Forty-four of our men received extensive training in Brotherhood work at the Regional Training Institute at Texoma. Several churches were enlisted in the surrounding associations and the trainees participated in on-the-job training in the local churches. The regional training institute for 1978 will be held in conjunction with the second Brotherhood week at Glorieta, July 8-14.

## First Brotherhood Week at Glorieta

Oklahoma had the highest atendance at WMU-Brotherhood Week at Glorieta. Conferences were held to help prepare men and boys to meet the challenges of our work. Next year plans are in the making for conferences that will be attractive to families. They will provide something of interest for all ages and men will be encouraged to bring their family July 8-14, 1978.

#### Disaster Relief

The 37-foot mobile disaster relief unit was completed with the help of men and money from almost every association in the state. Most of the labor for this \$50,000 unit was contributed by Baptist

laymen. The Brotherhood Department coordinated the building of this unit and provided the training for the men who will operate the van. It is capable of the emergency feeding of 3,000 hot meals per day, first aid, clean-up work, and also will minister to the spiritual needs of victims of disaster.

The report was approved.

36. Glenn Brown, associate director, Planning and Promotion, presented the stewardship report. James Westmoreland, missionary in residence for the convention, spoke to the report.

# Planning and Promotion Office Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion office is directed by Lyle Garlow, associate executive director and is related directly to the executive office. Glenn Brown serves as associate director with major responsibility as director of stewardship and consultant in church administration. Dana Williamson serves as convention newswriter and is assigned to this office. Major areas of work include:

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM PROMOTION — Two major church activities were suggested in 1976-77—Cooperative Program Month, October, 1976 and Cooperative Program Day, April 17, 1977. New materials were provided for these promotional activities. Church receipts were \$68,363,462 for 1976. They gave \$6,573,000 to world missions through the Cooperative Program.

Nine Pastor-Treasurer Appreciation Dinners were conducted during 1976-77. Twelve are scheduled for 1977-78. Eight area Bold Advance in Giving Dinners were conducted in April and May of 1977.

For several years a suggested annual percentage increase formula has been shared. This graduated formula seems to be reasonable and acceptable.

1-2% increase for churches under 20%

1/2-1% increase for churches between 20-30%

1/4-1/2 % increase for churches reaching 30%

STEWARDSHIP PROMOTION—During 1977, two emphases have received special attention in the area of stewardship promotion: 1) in-depth Bible study of personal stewardship, and, 2) developing a custom-written workbook, as well as messages from leading preachers.

(2) Six area Pastor-Church Council Conferences were conducted focusing on leading the church to determine its priorities and to develop a plan for working together for church growth.

(3) The state Pastor/Deacon Chairmen and Wives Retreat at Falls Creek with interest-conferences on various aspects of the work of a deacon. The ministry aspect of deacon work was stressed.

An outgrowth of the Preaching Conference will be the use of video-tapes, equipment and workbooks in associational preaching conferences in 1978. Three associations have already conducted one each this year.

COORDINATED PROMOTION PLANNING — Our 1976-79

theme, CHURCH ALIVE—Preaching, Reaching and Teaching has become a basic thrust for church growth. Churches are urged to adopt numerical growth goals in the Reaching and Teaching areas. The Church Alive goals are:

## PREACHING

GOAL 1—We will provide resources for our pastor to participate in training activities to assist him in his work.

church budgets using a "ministries" approach. Materials were developed under the theme: "BOLD BELIEVERS IN GIVING . . . Through a Ministering Church."

Nineteen major associational stewardship conferences were conducted including six (6) five-hour Bible conferences, and nine two-hour

stewardship decision nights.

A two-section stewardship planner was designed and distributed to pastors. The "budgeting" section contained a new budgeting approach: "Simplified Budgeting for Ministries." The "giving" section carried a new plan: "Bold Ministries Support Plan." In addition, Sunday school lessons, devotionals, tracts, posters, commitment cards, envelopes, etc., were printed and offered, free of charge, to Oklahoma Baptist churches desiring to use them.

Also, a 20-page booklet, Financial Support for Pastor and Staff, was written and distributed for use by church leaders in determining

their level of support for those called to serve them.

**CHURCH ADMINISTRATION**—1977 was an exciting year with three new "firsts" in church administration:

(1) The Oklahoma Preaching Conference, a three-day, in-depth workshop on Bible preaching with emphasis on sermon preparation and delivery. Extensive use was made of video-taped sermons and

The Southern Baptist Convention emphasis on Bold Mission Thrust—"Evangelizing" and "Congregationalizing" relates to the "Reaching" emphasis of Church Alive.

ASSOCIATIONAL SERVICES—Each association in Oklahoma has an elected director of associational missions. These men give

direction to the associational program according to the guidelines established by their particular association. Our office serves basically as a program communications and coordination office as it pertains to mutual interests of the churches, associations, state convention and Southern Baptist Convention agencies.

Two times a year this office plans and conducts planning meetings for the directors of missions and the staff of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. These are mutually helpful conferences.

# Child Care

## Lowell D. Milburn, Director

Oklahoma Baptists have been helping children since 1903. Approximately 5,000 boys and girls have been served by the various ministries during this time. A growing number of children are unable to live in their homes because of alcoholism, illness, drug addiction, poverty, crime, desertion, divorce and family breakdown. The children served are more disturbed today than in years past. One reason is that many of them have experienced neglect, mistreatment, deprivation, or abuse. Some have developed rather devious ways of dealing with life, such as lying, stealing, manipulation, and seduction. Thus, Child Care is more complex, more expensive, and more challenging than in the past.

More Children Served—A summary of the various areas of ministry shows a record number of children served during the past year. We served 418 children, compared to 366 the year before.

Greater Support Noted—There are three major sources of income for the department. The basic resource continues to be the Cooperative Program, which will provide \$276,000 this year. Mother's Day Offering goal is \$275,000. Endowment income from Baptist Foundation will total approximately \$290,000 for the year. Further, birthday gifts will reach about \$84,000 and sponsors will give \$60,000. Other support will come from parents, welfare, Social Security, veterans, farm, memorials, and individuals.

New Buildings Started—The past year has been one of significant progress. Shannon Cottage and Mabee Administrative and Counseling Center are under construction at Owasso. Barby Cottage and Deer Creek Farm Home are being built at Boys Ranch Town. I. L. Yearby Counseling Center (an addition to Administrative Building) is being constructed at Children's Home in Oklahoma City.

Kingston Home Commenced—Groundbreaking was held for the Baptist Children's Home at Kingston on March 5, 1977. Four buildings are being constructed: superintendent's residence, two cottages for children, and administration building. Jerry Bradley and his family have moved into the superintendent's residence. One cottage is nearing completion and children will soon be living on campus. More support is urgently needed for this new home. Every church is asked to give a worthy Mother's Day Offering, as \$60,000 will go for Kingston Home if 1977 goal of \$275,000 is reached.

Sincere Gratitude Expressed—Thank you, Oklahoma Baptists, for your concern, gifts and prayers. Child Care is a spiritual ministry and must be spiritually empowered, sustained, and blessed if children are to grow in Christian experience. Therefore, your prayers are needed most of all.

# Baptist Book Stores Mrs. Lola Allen, Manager, Tulsa

Baptist Book Stores have been operating under a new concept during 1976-77. Mail orders from the Oklahoma City and Tulsa stores were discontinued as of Oct. 1, 1976. All mail orders have been processed from the Arlington Mail Order Center in Arlington, Texas. The Oklahoma City and Tulsa stores continue to offer sales and service on a local basis. The Oklahoma stores continue also to provide displays for major State conventions and assemblies. They provide consignment shipments of materials for associational conferences and meetings as requested.

The new concept should enable Baptist Book Stores to serve people and churches better because of the following reasons:

- (1) All catalogued items will be stocked in the Arlington Mail Order Center warehouse. This gets more of the books and materials closer to the people and churches in the service area and reduces the number of out of stock situations.
- (2) It will enable the Oklahoma stores to give more personal attention to the needs of people and churches.
- (3) In May and June, 1977, studies were made of how long it takes to process an order and how much shipping time it takes to send a parcel to all parts of the state from the Arlington Mail Order Center. Orders were processed in one to three days and it took one to three days shipping time on about 92 percent of all orders. Although this is not as quick in some instances as ordering from an Oklahoma store, the variance in time is very little and the percentage is high for completely filling an order when the items are catalogued.

The basic purpose is the same as that of the Sunday School Board. It is to bring men to God through Jesus Christ. Book Stores feel they are partners with churches and people in this task through the distribution of Bibles, books, music, visual aids and church supplies. The entire staff of Baptist Book Stores in Oklahoma and Arlington Mail Order Center is dedicated to this purpose and desires to be involved in the growth of people and churches in the service of the Lord.

# Evangelism

## Tal D. Bonham Director

Who ever heard of 28,000 people attending evangelism conferences in a five-month period? Well, that's what happened in Oklahoma from December, 1976 to April, 1977—28,000 people attended conferences sponsored by the Oklahoma Evangelism Department.

Oklahoma Baptists are thankful for the untiring efforts of Associate Director Clyde Cain in the area of personal evangelism. We, in the Evangelism Department, operate under the conviction that churches grow best where personal and mass evangelism are undergirded by Bible teaching and Bible preaching.

#### Come Alive Revivals

The Evangelism and Religious Education Departments are cosponsoring the bold, new "Come Alive Oklahoma." This emphasis will include an extensive Sunday school enrolment campaign early in 1978 followed by Simultaneous "Come Alive" Revivals in the spring of 1978.

- \* SIX WEEKS BEFORE COME ALIVE REVIVAL...
  Begin preparation for ACTION
- \* THREE WEEKS BEFORE COME ALIVE REVIVAL . . . Conduct Enrolment Week
- \* TWO WEEKS BEFORE COME ALIVE REVIVAL . . . Follow-up on new enrollees and new prospects
- \* COME ALIVE REVIVAL . . . During the three-week period of March 26-April 16, 1978

Every association in our state is encouraged to have report meetings during the whole three-week period and to encourage every church to participate during one of the three suggested weeks.

Our churches are encouraged to have at least three revivals a year—an eight-day crusade in the spring, a four-day crusade in the fall and a weekend crusade in the summer.

# Youth Evangelism Conferences

The Youth Evangelism Conference of 1976 set a new record in attendance. Over 10,000 youth and their sponsors gathered at three separate conferences in Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Lawton.

YEC '77 will be held in Lawton, Dec. 26-27; Oklahoma City, Dec. 27-28; and Tulsa, Dec. 28-29. Program personalities include: Tom Elliff, David Ring, Jeff Woolwine, Paulia Box and David Meece.

# State Evangelism Conference

Approximately 6,000 attended the 1977 State Evangelism Conference. All sessions of the 1978 Conference (Jan. 23-24) will be held at First Southern Church in Del City. The 1978 Conference will feature the following out-of-state speakers: Jimmy Allen, Austin Brown, Bill Hogue, Nelson Price, Adrian Rogers, Charles Forbes Taylor and Avery Willis Jr.

# Preachin' and Singin' Fest

Last year was the first time to have the Preachin' and Singin' Fest sponsored by the Oklahoma Conference of Evangelists. Evangelist Nathan Bussey will direct another Preachin' Fest on Wednesday morning, Jan. 25 on the day following the State Evangelism Conference. Approximately 1,500 people attended last years' Preachin' and Singin' Fest.

# "Come Alive" Area Evangelism Conferences

An estimated 9,400 attended the first Area Evangelism Conferences ever held in our state in 1977. All but four associations were represented at the evening sessions across the state and there were over 2,000 decisions made at the conferences. # Resurrection Rally

The first annual statewide Resurrection Rally was held April 8 and 9 at Eastwood Church in Tulsa. This rally attended by over 1,700 was an inspirational and training conference. In 1978 the rally will be held at Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City on March 24 and 25. Time will be given to training young people in personal witnessing, the Reach Out strategy and WOW retreats.

## Tell School

Opportunities for training lay persons to be faithful in lifestyle witnessing are available today as never before. More churches are using this method of training because of involvement in the preparation of the local church and the results produced. Several associations have used the Central School for providing training in a large percentage of churches. Most materials may now be purchased at the Baptist Book Store.

## Tell Machine

The Audio-Visual Modular Response System of training is a unique approach to evangelism training. The small portable machine uses a cartridge in training individuals in sharing their faith. Designed for small group training, the TELL Machine is recommended for local church use. The use of the machine will greatly strengthen the follow-up of a TELL School, Lay Renewal Weekend or revival. We now have 10 of these machines placed in Oklahoma. Additional information is available through the Evangelism office.

Reach Out Strategy for Youth Evangelism

Reach Out is an approach to youth evangelism involving both youth and adults. It provides both evangelistic and discipleship training and is being used effectively in many of our Oklahoma churches. There are actually five major phases of the overall strategy.

- (1) Leadership Family—trains adults for this ministry.
- (2) Discipleship Family—one adult working with three to 10 youth as a growing evangelistic family.

- (3) Touch Ministry—the discipleship family reaching out to the lost about them.
- (4) Joy Explosion—which may take the form of a youth retreat, evangelistic social or weekly youth meeting.
  - (5) WOW—training in personal witnessing.

# Single Adult Evangelism

A new emphasis is being given to Single Adult Evangelism which focuses primarily on the single adults in college, military service and those employed in the given community. This is a new strategy in assisting the individual in personal evangelism training, developing friendship with others and discipleship ministry. This strategy has just recently been developed and we will be hearing more about it during the coming year.

# Falls Creek Counseling

Approximately seven hundred counselors are enlisted annually for Falls Creek. These counselors are pastors, church staff members, laymen and older youth. They are provided with a counseling guide and training in personal witnessing. In 1977, they counselled with a total of 4,052 youth who made decisions at Falls Creek.

# Michigan Crusades

This past year Baptists in Michigan were joined by Baptist teams in Florida, Kentucky, Oklahoma and Arkansas in what was termed "The most successful evangelistic event in the state convention's 20-year history." Some 21,315 people attended the two-week emphasis which began with crusades in key metropolitan cities and concluded with simultaneous revivals in 140 churches.

Oklahoma Baptists helped sponsor the areawide crusade in Grand Rapids. According to the chairman of the crusade more people were saved during that week than were saved in all the Southern Baptist churches in the Grand Rapids area during the previous year.

Oklahoma Baptist churches sent teams to 24 Southern Baptist churches in Michigan for local church revivals. These local church revivals, held in three different associations, recorded a total of 290 decisions. Many of the pastors reported, "We had the greatest revival in the history of our church."

# Come Alive! Come Alive!

This next associational year should be Oklahoma Baptists' finest hour in evangelism. Our churches have always reached more people for Christ when they concentrated on enrolling people in Sunday school and having great revivals. Simultaneous revivals, properly planned and prayed for, should help our churches reach an unprecedented number of lost people in 1978.

Let us move forward on our knees to share our Lord with every last person in Oklahoma.

# Cooperative Missions Robert Haskins, Director

Some very good things have been happening in mission work in Oklahoma this past year. Each year that passes seems to be the best year. God is so good. He opens up new doors constantly for sharing the "Good News" of his love and grace.

#### Church Extension

A new door has been opened to us in the starting of new "store front" churches in neglected areas of Oklahoma City. J. R. Sammons has been serving since March 1 as a "church starter." This is a joint project of the Capital Association, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and the Home Mission Board. Two new missions and approximately 10 Bible Study Fellowships have been started.

A man has been employed to work with Frisco Association on a short term basis for starting new Sunday schools and missions. According to a recent survey, McCurtain County needs at least 10 new churches by 1980 in order to maintain a ratio of one Baptist for every 4.5 persons residing in the county.

# Language Missions

A new work began this year with the Thai's in Lawton. We have also discovered a number of Filipino's in the Lawton and Oklahoma City areas and plans are in the making for beginning some type of ministry to these people in the near future.

Three new Spanish works have been started this past year. A simultaneous Spanish laymen led week-end revival was held in each of the Spanish churches and missions. Also two Area Leadership Training Seminars were conducted for training Sunday school leadership in the Spanish speaking churches. We have a goal of 20 new Spanish units by the end of the year 1980.

Two Indian churches and three missions were established in 1977. Indian Falls Creek Assembly included representatives of 24 tribes from eight different states. There were 1,200 campers registered with many making meaningful commitments to Jesus Christ. Plans are now to have several Indian Crusades in 1978 and 1979 climaxing this decade and beginning a new decade with a nationwide Indian Crusade in 1980.

A beautiful statewide Christmas banquet for the deaf was held at First Southern Church, Del City. Three new deaf units have been established across the state. Several interpreter's workshops have been conducted. The State Deaf Camp was conducted at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha the third week in August.

Twenty-one language churches were assisted in 1977 with building projects. One new church was assisted with the construction of a building.

# **Campers on Mission**

Two state rallies were held at Little River State Park near Norman. Testimonies of the campers involvement in mission projects throughout the nation were shared. A special remodeling project of the Indian Nations Church building, Seminole was conducted on Sept. 17. Approximately 30 of the children at the Baptist Children's Home, Oklahoma City were hosted at a special "camping trip" Sept. 30-Oct. 1 by the Oklahoma Chapter of "Campers on Mission."

# Interfaith Witness

Approximately 400 University students at Oklahoma University, Norman and Central State University, Edmond were exposed to the teachings and beliefs of nine different Religious Cults and World Religions in four days of conferences. They were also taught how we as Baptists can share a winsome Christian witness to people of other religious persuasions.

#### **Student Summer Missions**

Fifteen Home Mission Board sponsored summer missionaries and six sojourners spent an exciting summer in missions in Oklahoma. They represented the states of Nebraska, Florida, Louisiana, Alabama, Maryland, Texas, Tennessee, Indiana, South Carolina and North Carolina. They served in Language, rural, resort, inner city, and general mission work.

# Christian Service Corp

Seven Oklahoma families served in mission projects in the Northwest, Kansas, Arizona and Iowa. Fifteen families from other states came to Oklahoma to work in mission projects. With the strong emphasis on "Volunteers in Missions" in the Southern Baptist Convention, no doubt more and more people will be involved in short term and long term mission projects.

# Chaplaincy

Carl Hart, director of the Chaplains Commission, Home Mission Board, was the guest speaker at the 5th Annual Chaplains' Luncheon held at First Church, Tulsa, Nov. 14. There are approximately 55 Baptist chaplains serving in hospitals, institutions and the military in Oklahoma.

#### **US-2 Work and Semester Missions**

James Gamble, a US-2'er from Alabama is entering his second year in Metropolitan Oklahoma City Ministry to Indian youth.

A lady semester missionary (Joan Hiatt) has served with Downtown Church in its inner city ministry and a young man (Eddie Upshaw) has served two semesters with the Indian Nations Church, Seminole.

# Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists

This area of work involves the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention (National Baptists). The state director of cooperative minisries with National Baptists plans with the leadership of the Oklahoma Baptist State Con-

vention those areas of work being done cooperatively. This includes such things as printing and publishing a monthly paper, physical development of Burge Camp, planning for and promoting a youth camp, providing educational training for church leadership and supporting the jointly employed missionaries. Missions, evangelism, Bible study, Christian education and college student ministries are being supported cooperatively.

Four workers currently serving as missionaries are jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. They are: Roy Enterline, director of education center in Tulsa; Miss Verlene Farmer, BSU director, Langston University; Mrs. Patricia Reed, executive-secretary-treasurer, WMU of Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and Eddie Mabry, state director of Christian Education, Oklahoma Baptist State Convention.

Scholarships from the Home Mission Board were granted to seven students who are preparing for church vocations. They are working toward degrees in Bible school, college and seminary.

Some state and associational officers were financially assisted in attending a week at Glorieta Conference Center.

Some Southern Baptist and National Baptist churches have voluntarily agreed to be companion churches in 1977. Each agreed to host the other in at least two activities in their church during the year. Many good experiences have been reported as a result.

# **Church-Community Ministries**

Church-Community Ministries is the Oklahoma name for the area of work which the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention calls Christian Social Ministries. It is primarily a week-day ministry to meet the needs of people and to establish a witnessing relationship with them.

Church-Community Ministries responds to the needs of people through: day care programs, mission centers, free medical and dental care, literacy work, and through ministries to the aging, prisoners and their families, migrants, juveniles, alcoholics, internationals, military families, economically poor and emergency care as need arises.

Three missionaries are presently serving in Oklahoma in this area of work. Ed Onley, associational director of Church-Community Ministries for Capital Association; Mrs. Martha Sterling, director, Baptist Mission Center, Oklahoma City and Mrs. Valadean Gardner, director, Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa. Also, the department is involved with Capital Association in supporting the ministry of Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City, and with Oklahoma Baptist University in sponsoring a student community action project at Oklahoma Baptist University.

The missionaries have reported 107 professions of faith, 27 additions to the church by transfer of letter, 38 additions by baptism, and 23 decisions for special service.

Area conferences were held this year spotlighting ministries to the older adult, economically poor, and adult non-reader. Much interest was expressed by the churches attending.

In connection with Bold Mission Thrust, the goal for church community ministries is to have a Baptist witness or ministry in every county and regularly manned city jail in Oklahoma by the end of 1979.

The motion carried to approve the report.

# Baptist Messenger Jack L. Gritz, Editor

Many and varied are the influences which are brought to bear upon the hearts and lives of our Baptist people in our churches. There are the experiences of everyday life in the homes and places of business, radio, television, motion pictures, newspapers and magazines. The media mentioned contain very little of a religious or spiritual nature. Every Baptist church member in the State of Oklahoma should receive and read his state Baptist paper.

The cults and sects are busy. Their literature is distributed from door to door and is found in many public places, such as libraries, restaurants, courthouses, office buildings and physicians' waiting rooms. But error and falsehood can be overcome by truth and honesty. We wish our Baptist people would read the Baptist Messenger carefully each week and then pass it on to friends, neighbors and relatives of other faiths or no faith. It could be for them a missionary message bringing light where there is darkness and truth where there are mistaken views.

We have many publications for special groups and purposes, but only one for all of our people, the Messenger. It unites our efforts in kingdom service as nothing else. It is designed to help the pastor grow more mature Christian church members by increasing their doctrinal understanding and deepening their spiritual lives week by week.

This has been another good year as far as circulation and contents are concerned. The present circulation of the **Baptist Messenger** is in excess of 93,000, which is reported to be the fourth largest circulation of any news publication of any kind in the state. We have had the privilege of publishing many interesting articles, excellent picture features (done in the main by Bob E. Mathews, associate editor) and some of the most humorous cartoons seen anywhere. All of this in addition to the Baptist news each week from Oklahoma and around the world, editorial comments on our times, and our regular reports. Our "Letters from Readers" column seems to become better and better as the weeks go by and we encourage our readers to write short but pertinent letters of opinion or comment.

There were at the last count 1,113 churches using the "Every Family Church Budget Plan of Subscription." We wish every church in the state would include the state Baptist paper in the budget and its program of work. It really does not cost—not nearly as much as Sunday school literature for a family—it pays in an informed and interested church membership.

Inflation continues to cloud the picture. The cost of postage and of paper have increased tremendously in recent months. Salaries, too, are up as they should be.

But where else can you get so much for so little?

Please pray for us as we endeavor to make the **Baptist Messenger** in the months ahead the best influence for our people which it can possibly be.

# Christian Life Committee

Christians live in a society that constantly faces issues and problems. God has not, however, left us to struggle in confusion and chaos as we seek to speak to various issues from a Christian standpoint. Instead, God has given in the Bible ideals and guiding principles which are to be applied as the Christian lives within the framework of his society each day. It is important that as the Christian lives in his world, he constantly maintains the tension toward leading his world to live according to the principles that God has given.

The Convention's Christian Life Committee seeks to draw attention to and emphasize some of the areas in which Christians should be concerned and involved.

# Progress Report on Anti-Pornography

The Christian Life Committee sponsored the State Anti-Pornography Conference, Feb. 11, in response to the great interest of Oklahoma Baptists. The conference was well attended and sparked numerous associational and community Anti-Pornography rallies.

A tract, "The Law of Pornography in Oklahoma" was prepared for the Baptist General Convention by their legal counsel. This tract, and others, gave guidelines and suggestions for community organizations and the establishment of "community standards."

We are far from being rid of the obscene literature on the newsstands across our state. However, progress is being made community by community, as church and civic leaders organize to set community standards and to implement activities that bring the problem to the attention of law enforcement groups.

Reports indicate that numerous cities and communities have had good success. Others are now in the process of updating their laws and organizing for action.

We wish to commend several groups:

- (1) The associational anti-pornography coordinators and community chairmen for their efforts in communicating the problem and how to correct it.
- (2) The Target Stores and others for clearing their shelves of undesirable magazines and literature.
- (3) The local FBI for their aggressiveness in combating pornographic films, etc.
- (4) The law enforcement men and prosecutors across Oklahoma that have enforced local laws and endeavored to assist various groups in discerning and writing laws for their community.
- (5) The many pastors and church leaders that have been actively involved in combating all kinds of pornography at all levels.

We urge every Christian person to accelerate his involvement in the fight against pornography. Too much is at stake for there to be any reduction of activity.

# Marriage and the Family

The family, as a primary social unit, is in a deep crisis. Communal living, increased divorce, abortion and the changing role of women, are knocking the supports out from under the Christian family. The family and marriage is meeting a new complex syndrome of circumstance that it has never met before. Families are breaking up at the rate of one divorce for every marriage.

Extreme pressures are driving families apart. These pressures are joined in automation, depersonalization and demoralization. Preoccupation with amusement sports and television tend to silence communication. The ever present media onslaught, which herald the fantasies that our problems will be gone magically if we will only buy
the right product or employ the right gimmicks or gadget, drive our
families further from each other, further from the Bible and further
from God.

The most destructive forces to family and marriage are those that call into question its very relevance and usefulness. We live in large, impersonal communities where the old restraints of public opinion, religion and duty are gone. Our mobile society has destroyed our roots. Ethical standards such as fidelity, constancy, responsibility and accountability are passe.

To endure, the family and marriage must be securely moored to God's eternal truth. We must not take the standard of the home from the world or the university or a movement—but from the Scripture.

Every church must proclaim what the scriptural structure of the family is. The authority, discipline and accountability in marriage is described in Scripture. The churches of the convention can, if we will follow God's direction, begin to change the course of marriage and the family. We should designate the year, 1978, as the "year of the family," in our churches. We must help young people understand the permanency of marriage and the permanency of the family. In order to guarantee the stability of the home, churches should encourage young people to marry like-minded believers and to rear their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

This nation's only hope lies in a revitalization of the kind of Christianity that is awake and alert to our society's needs.

There is a great need for churches to state their ethics and principles for marriage and the family in terms everyone can understand. Churches can be potent forces in reestablishing the biblical code of ethics and love for marriage and the home. The family is falling apart because of the lack of love and understanding, both of which are the foundation of the Christian life.

In order for us to help in life's most vital relationship, churches must be better informed about the sickness and cure for marital failure and be more explicit about what Christ teaches in the whole area of family. Every Christian has an all-important part to play in reestablishing the moral fiber now missing.

# Morality in Media

The media both reflect and influence the thinking of a society. All forms of media have immediate and cumulative effects on the ideas and habits of the people they touch. Because of this, Christians have a responsibility to alert themselves to the messages being communicated by all the media forms in their community. They also have the responsibility of influencing positively the content and moral tone of the message of the media.

The general trend of the media has been toward communicating a hopeless picture of man. Christian morals and the message of Christ are either ignored or assumed to be too "unsophisticated for the minds of modern man." Sexual laxness and profanity are too frequently blended with violence and given as a diet to people who are taught to assume that they personally must conform to this modern standard for living. This brainwashing creates a false image of life and denies the concept of a Christian life. Each year's media diet becomes more permissive as a matter of media policy. As public tolerance for profanity, passion, a pleasure philosophy, and pessimism increases, the media industry utilizes this tolerance to move even further toward permissiveness. Recognizing this trend, Christians, and particularly Oklahoma Baptists need to involve themselves actively in promoting morality in media.

We encourage individuals, families and churches to become involved in supporting beneficial media programs and other forms of media communications. We also encourage them to take forceful stands against those which are harmful in either content or intent. We further encourage the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to involve itself actively in training families, individuals and churches in methods that can be used effectively in doing this. This action should take the form of publicizing available materials prepared by the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention and other boards and agencies who may address this problem. It could further include the preparation of such materials and conferences as may be determined by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, it's executive director and the Board of Directors, or the Christian Life Committee in cooperation with the executive director.

# Christian Citizenship

Never has there been a more strategic time in history for the Christian to demonstrate a deep concern for his community and fellow man.

We find ourselves citizens of two kingdoms—the one heavenly and the other earthly. Each subjects us to responsibilities that we cannot evade. As citizens within our society we must seek to involve ourselves in the issues, problems and moral concerns that face us. We would not want to leave the area of involvement in political and social matters that affect the lives of people and threaten the Christian lifestyle. Praying for our government and constantly stressing the application of the principles and teachings of Jesus is the responsibility of every Christian citizen.

Born into the family of God and enjoying his freedom and love, we cannot escape the scene of a broken world, searching in the wrong direction for peace.

Often, we see the conflicts and know the problems—but we sing Christ's praises behind church walls—thus insulating ourselves from any involvement.

It would be well to remind ourselves that God has not changed his standards—the world has changed its convictions.

Every Christian citizen is called to live a consistent, Christlike life in the home, in recreation, among friends and places of business.

# Ministry to Broken People

In contemporary society there are many people who are personally experiencing brokenness in their lives. This brokenness assumes many forms and expresses itself in many ways. Brokenness within the lives of people has come as a result of crises that people often face. Alcoholism, a major problem in society, has left in its wake broken humanity. The climbing divorce rate has tragically affected the lives of countless fathers, mothers and children. The ever present occurrence of tragedy, the all too often overlooked problem of loneliness, coping with the death of a loved one, and a multitude of other crises which people often face has left a path of broken, hurting people.

Brokenness has also come as a result of the demands and expectations that society has placed upon people. When one does not measure up to the "success standard" that he has set for himself, or the standards others have set for him, he often begins to experience anxiety, frustrations, feelings of failure, and a sense of worthlessness.

People experience these crises everyday. Even those within the churches have not escaped these crises. Broken people cannot be overlooked and ignored. Some people, in time, are able to cope with them, while others have a more difficult time in doing so. Still others are feeling that all is lost and only hopelessness remains. A society that is hostile to Christian concepts only enhances this feeling of hopelessness.

We encourage Christians to recognize the fact that Jesus showed his compassion for broken people many times. He healed, taught, encouraged and forgave.

We encourage churches to seize the opportunity and accept the responsibility to minister to people who feel that the world is collapsing around them. We urge churches not to leave this vital area of ministry unattended, but to continue to minister in Jesus' name to those who are broken. What can churches do? Churches can: (1) Seek to become even more aware of broken people around them. (2) Seek ways in which to minister to broken humanity. (3) Provide programing in the church which would be designed to help people cope with their brokenness. (4) Provide programing aimed at preventing brokenness within people. (5) Train the great resource of laymen to recognize and aid suffering people. (6) Continue to spread the good news that in Jesus Christ there is hope.

# World Hunger

Hunger overshadows the world today. It is the aftermath of war, storms, drouth and over population. In the past few years hunger and famine have ravaged hundreds of millions of the poorest in at least 40 nations.

During the hour it takes to eat dinner tonight, more than 1,000 people, most of them children, will die of hunger and its related diseases. Parents in these undernourished countries watch half of their children die before reaching age five. Jesus said, "To the extent that you did it to one of these brothers of mine, even the least of them, you did it to me" (Matt. 25:40 NAS).

Every person should have enough to eat and every person should have a chance to know God. Southern Baptists' efforts around the world endeavor to place these two together.

All hunger and disaster funds channeled through the Foreign Mission Board go directly to the field and purpose for which they are designated. In 1976, \$1,646,130.66 was given above the regular Cooperative Program and Lottie Moon Offering. These funds were distributed by our Southern Baptist missionaries. No administrative, promotional or overhead costs are deducted. These costs are already provided by the Cooperative Program.

We, therefore, urge our people and churches to channel any hunger and disaster relief money through the Foreign Mission Board designated for the specific cause if any. (These may be sent through the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma when the treasurer mails the regular mission checks.)

## Homosexuality

Those of us who are concerned with the moral life of America are shocked at the large percentage of the population who are homosexual.

Homosexuality is, it appears another of the spiritual malfunctions created by the failure of the Christian home. In most cases of homosexuality there is an underlying emotional disorder stemming from childhood. Frequently there is neglect, rejection, domination, limitability, over-indulgence, confusion of the sexual roles, poor example, immaturity in parents passed on to the child, lack of proper training in self-control, lack of proper supervision or any of the problems evidenced in the casualty of broken homes. These failures found in the home indicate the failure to be the Christian partner and parent God intends us to be. Homosexuals ask, "Why do you condemn me since I was made this way by God?" The answer to that question is that men are not born alcoholics, drug addicts or homosexuals. All three are sin problems. All three are made, certainly aided by contributing factors in his society, not born.

Ordinarily the church has ignored the homosexual except in an aside to condemn him. The responsibility of the church is to sound the Scripture and admonish the person and practice. The Scripture's major emphasis is that the homsexual is outside the Kingdom of God

(I Cor. 6:9). The apostle indicates that homosexuals are those who have neglected and rejected God and continue in their chosen way of life (Rom. 1:24, 26-27).

Biblical writers always condemn sin, while maintaining an interest in the sinner. The practicing homosexual alienates himself from the redeemed community. By putting emphasis on self-satisfaction, the homosexual cannot give God the central place in life.

The homosexual is to be more pitied than scorned. He can be to us a scapegoat, or a challenge as is the alcoholic, the drug user or the blatant sexual offender. He, as others in sin, provides a test for our love and our understanding. In order for him to be saved, he must repent of his sin and turn to Christ in faith, his life will be reoriented under its lordship of Christ without compromise or partial reform. There cannot be a cheap gospel or forgiveness which will do no more than salve guilty feelings. We must stand firm in condemning the sin and firm in the knowledge that God is big enough for all our sins and for every sinner. The Bible has an answer for us in regard to the homosexual and it most certainly has a message that God can change him and help him manage the out-of-balance emotions. God, however, has no favorite sin or sinner. To the homosexual, as to other sinners, the word of Jesus is "go thy way and sin no more."

Christians cannot afford to be silent either about this sin or its cure.

## Alcohol

Ethyl alcohol is America's number one drug problem.

Americans spend \$35 billion annually for alcoholic beverages. As a result, nine to ten million Americans are alcoholics or problem drinkers; 450 thousand of these are aged ten to seventeen years. The debilitating effect of alcoholism directly affects 50 million lives.

Annually, alcohol advertisers expend \$50 million, ironically, the same amount spent by federal and state governments to combat alcoholism.

Fifty-five percent of highway fatalities are alcohol related, while arrests of teenagers for drunken driving have trippled in three years.

Alcohol is devastating the lives of many individuals, families, churches, communities and nations. Economically, socially, politically it is a curse.

Christians continue to live and minister within the context of this problem. Christians, spiritually motivated, abstain from alcohol.

Particularly commendable for their abstinence are multitudes of teenage Christians who brave intense social pressure. While most junior and senior high school students are drinking alcoholic beverages, many Christian youth are setting powerful, positive examples of following Christ in the sufficiency of God's Spirit.

Likewise, business executives willing to affirm positively their total abstinence, and stalwart Christian laymen are also to be commended. Those who have not yet come to total abstinence are encouraged to come to this depth of Christian commitment.

Vigilant Christian citizenship, compassionate Christian ministry, consistent Christian discipleship will have a restraining and redeeming effect upon a society cursed by alcohol.

Sooner Alcoholic-Narcotics Education, under the able direction of Ross McLennan, is to be commended and should be supported by all Christian and concerned parties.

# Business Management Committee Recommendations to Board

## 1. 1976 Audit Approved

In the May meeting the 1976 audit of the executive office was approved, and Wolf and Company was approved to serve as the auditing firm for 1977.

# 2. Building Named for Scantlan

During 1976-1977 work was completed on the administration-cafeteria building at Falls Creek. A recommendation was approved in May to name the building "The Sam W. Scantlan Center" and that it be dedicated each of the five weeks of the 1977 assemblies.

## Child Care Committee Recommendations to Board

The responsibility of the Child Care Committee is to assist in the operation of the children's homes in Oklahoma City, Owasso and Kingston, Boys Ranch Town near Edmond, foster homes and additional child care services. Chairperson is Mrs. R. Paul Henry.

# 2. Construction Projects Approved

In December the board gave approval for the following construction projects as funds are available:

- (1) Administration and Counseling Center and cottage at Owasso.
- (2) New cottage at Boys Ranch Town (major gift by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Barby).

- (3) Farm home for six boys (from capital improvement funds).
- (4) Four buildings (two cottages, superintendent's home and administration building) on land at Kingston (gift from Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Gary).
- (5) Remodel Phillips Building and resurface streets with asphalt at Oklahoma City Children's Home.

Progress reports of these projects are printed in the Convention Building Committee's report.

3. Offering Goal Approved

A recommendation was approved that the 1977 Mother's Day Offering goal be \$275,000 and that all funds over the basic budget of \$215,000 be designated for expansion of the Kingston Children's Home.

4. Mini-Fund Raising Campaign Authorized

In December authority was given for a mini-fund raising campaign to be conducted on an individual basis in the Tulsa and Northeastern Oklahoma areas in order to raise money needed to claim the matching grant from the Mabee Foundation.

5. Counseling Center Approved

Approval was given in May for the construction of the Yearby Counseling Center, an addition to the existing administration building at the Oklahoma City Children's Home. This is in memory of I. L. Yearby.

6. Kingston Children's Home to Be Completed

A report was given in the October Board meeting that to complete the first phase of construction at the Kingston Children's Home will cost approximately \$300,000. This includes power, sewer lines, roads, architect's fees and construction of four buildings. Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Gary provided \$200,000 of this amount, others have given \$20,000 and the Mother's Day Offering will provide \$60,000, if the goal is reached. It is anticipated that another \$20,000 can be raised by the time the campus is completed in early 1978. The Board gave approval to proceed with construction of the four buildings on the campus at the Kingston Home as funds are available.

#### 2. Additional Indebtedness Approved for Bass Hospital

In December the following information and recommendation was presented for consideration:

"By agreement, dated May 27, 1975, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma leased to the Bass Memorial Hospital Authority, a public trust created as of March 1, 1969, under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, to aid in the financing and construction of hospitals and related facilities, the facilities of the Medical Center Plaza, including buildings and personal property incidental thereto. In addition, the lease covers the revenues from operation of the office building. The leasehold interest and gross revenues of the Medical Center Plaza have been assigned as security for the convertible promissory note. The full faith and credit of the Authority has been pledged to the payment of the indebtedness.

"(Note: the holder of the promissory note has an option to convert the promissory note to term or serial definitive coupon bonds with a final maturity date not to extend beyond June 1, 1996.)

"In the event of any deficits in the payments on the indebtedness, the Governing Board of the Authority is authorized to utilize available excess funds of the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, after providing for payment of all hospital obligations and for adequate depreciation funds and other reserves.

"On May 27, 1975 the Authority authorized \$700,000 of bonded indebtedness for the purpose of constructing a professional building known as Medical Center Plaza.

"As of Sept. 22, 1976, \$694,429 has been advanced to the Authority. The final completion of 12,000 square feet of floor space has now been made that will complete the contract. Due to cost overruns, an additional \$40,000 was needed.

"Commitments for the space have progressed faster than anticipated. An additional 1,000 square feet has been leased requiring an additional \$20,300 for completion.

"There is a remaining 2,000 square feet to be completed when leased. The cost of this, when needed will require an additional \$40,000.

"Finally, the purchase of x-ray equipment in the amount of \$5,000 is needed.

"The total additional funds needed is \$105,000.

"The Hospitals and Retirement Centers Committee recommends that the Board of Directors authorize the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority to borrow \$105,000 to complete construction of the Medical Center Plaza Building and that \$60,800 be advanced now. The balance of the funds shall be advanced as leases are made for the remaining 2,000 square feet of floor space.

"Under the terms of this agreement the convention agrees that the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital will establish a sinking fund of \$115,000 for future years.

"The board also agrees that in the event of any deficits in the payments on the indebtedness in excess of \$805,000 Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital will pay these deficits from excess funds of the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital after providing for payment of all hospital obligations and for adequate depreciation funds and other reserves."

The board approved the recommendation.

# 3. Development Plans for Owasso Village to Proceed

In September 1976 the board authorized the Hospitals and Retirement Centers Committee to formulate definite plans for the Baptist Village at Owasso and present plans to the December board meeting for action. The committee recommended and the board approved the appointment of a Governing Board to develop plans for the village, including proposed architectural drawings, costs, and methods of financing and, that the plans be presented in the May meeting of the board. At that meeting the board ratified a vote by mail and approved the advancement of \$10,000 from the Special Projects Fund to be used to develop the preliminary master plan and the working plans for the apartment complex.

The Board gave approval in the October meeting for the executive director-treasurer to advance, as needed, up to an additional \$25,000 for ground preparations, sewer system, engineering fees and other projects in preparation for construction of the Owasso Baptist

Village. All advanced funds are to be returned to the Convention when permanent financing is arranged.

# 4. Funds for Refurbishing at Baptist Medical Center

In May the board ratified a vote by mail (60 affirmative, 0 negative) that authorized the executive director-treasurer and the president of Baptist Medical Center to negotiate a loan not to exceed \$1,000,000 at prime interest to be repaid over a five-year period from operating revenue to finance construction of Projects #1 and #2.

**Project** #1—Baptist Medical Center began operation in 1959. There are two floors, 5-West and 6-West, of the original construction that have not been remodeled. These are well used nursing units, and it is necessary that they be brought up to standards of other patient care units. There is an increased demand for private rooms. Presently there are some four-bed wards on these floors that can be converted to private rooms. The number of beds per unit would be reduced from 50 to 42, but there would be more private rooms available. During the remodeling of these two units, windows would also be replaced to meet the Joint Commission safety standards. The estimated cost of the project would be approximately \$760,404.

Project #2—There is a continuing emphasis on outpatient services. Baptist Medical Center needs to remain abreast of these recent trends by making available special provisions for outpatient surgery. The proposed facility would include a reception area for outpatient surgery patients and the place for recovery following surgery. These functions are presently taking place in the holding area of the Emergency Unit. The facility would centralize and simplify the outpatient surgery activities and should promote greater utilization and growth of this service. The facility will be located on the second floor, immediately adjacent to the present post-anesthesia recovery room and would also provide a waiting room in conjunction with the unit. This would provide more convenience for surgeons and anesthesiologists for observing and following their patients during the recovery period.

In order to make the outpatient surgery facility available, it will be necessary to relocate the present EEG-ECG service. Another area on the second floor near the clinical laboratory has been selected as the site for remodeling and relocation of the EEG-ECG service. The approximate cost for the relocation of these facilities would be \$46,860.

Total cost of construction of both Projects #1 and #2 is estimated to be \$905,400. Planning costs are estimated to be \$40,000 and equipment should be \$55,000, bringing the total project to approximately \$1,000,000. Starting date for the projects was April 1, 1977. Further details regarding

this construction is in the Convention Building Committee Report.

# 5. Miami Hospital Authorized to Borrow Funds

In a vote by mail in February the board authorized Miami Baptist Hospital to borrow up to \$300,000 to replace operating funds expended on capital needs. The executive director-treasurer was authorized to negotiate the loan which is to be repaid from the hospital's operating funds at a rate of not more than 8½ percent for a period not to exceed three years. The vote was 61 affirmative and 0 negative and was ratified in the May board meeting.

## 6. Additional Property Purchased by Miami Hospital

The board was polled by mail on May 2 and voted 60 affirmative and 0 negative for Miami Hospital to purchase property at 115 and 121 "D," S.W., Miami, Lots 7, 8, 11 and 12 for \$32,000. A ten-year loan was negotiated from the First National Bank of Miami. This was ratified in the May meeting.

In October the Board authorized Miami Baptist Hospital to purchase property at 125 "D" Southwest, Lots 13 and 14, Block 106, Miami, which is adjacent to presently owned property, for \$22,000 to be financed through a Miami bank and amortized at \$200 per month, the fair rental rate; and the Convention officers were authorized to sign necessary papers for both the purchase and the loan.

# 7. Refunding of Miami Hospital Bonds

A mail ballot of 61 affirmative and 0 negative votes authorized the convention officers to execute a resolution for the refunding of \$5,440,000 of Miami Baptist Hospital bonds. The new bonds have a 6½ percent interest rather than 8½ percent which was being paid.

#### Resolution

Section 1. The AMENDMENT TO TRUST INDENTURE dated as of Aug. 1, 1977 which amends the Trust Indenture dated March 25, 1974 creating the Miami Baptist Hospital Authority by increasing the number of Trustees of said Authority is hereby approved and the president is authorized and directed to execute same for and on behalf of the convention as trustor.

Section 2. The WARRANTY DEED dated as of Aug. 1, 1977 whereby the convention deeds the Miami Baptist Hospital to the trustees of the Miami Baptist Hospital Authority upon condition subsequent is hereby adopted and approved and the president is hereby authorized and directed to execute same for and on behalf of the convention.

Section 3. The BILL OF SALE dated as of Aug. 1, 1977 whereby the convention conveys to the trustees of the Miami Baptist Hospital Authority all of the personal property constituting a part of Miami Baptist Hospital is hereby adopted and approved and the president is authorized and directed to execute same for and on behalf of the convention.

Section 4. The LEASE AGREEMENT AND OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE CONTRACT dated as of Aug. 1, 1977 by

and between the trustees of the Miami Baptist Hospital Authority as lessor, and the convention as lessee, whereby the Authority leases Miami Baptist Hospital to the convention and the convention agrees to operate and maintain same so long as any bonds issued by the Authority remain outstanding is hereby adopted and approved and the president is authorized and directed to execute same for and on behalf of the convention.

Section 5. Insofar as the facts pertaining to the present or past operations of the hospital are reflected in the OFFICIAL STATE-MENT pertaining to the issuance of \$5,440,000 Miami Baptist Hospital Authority First Mortgage Hospital Revenue Bonds, Series 1977, is hereby adopted and approved and to such extent said Official Statement is correct and does not contain an untrue statement of material fact or omit to state a material fact required to be stated therein or necessary or make the statement therein, in light of the circumstances under which they were made, not misleading.

Section 6. The Trustees of the Miami Baptist Hospital Authority are authorized to issue their \$5,440,000 First Mortage Hospital Revenue Bonds, Series 1977 according to the terms and conditions of, and for the purposes set out in a certain BOND INDENTURE dated as of Aug. 1, 1977, by and between the Authority and the Bank of Oklahoma, N.A., as trustee.

Section 7. The CERTIFICATE OF CORPORATE REPRESEN-TATIONS to be dated on the date of delivery and payment for the above mentioned bonds is hereby adopted and approved and the president is hereby authorized and directed to execute same on said date for and on behalf of the convention.

# 8. Authority Given for Short Term Loans for Hospitals and Retirement Centers.

The Board of Directors in May authorized a resolution for shortterm loans for hospitals. The resolution is as follows:

That authority be granted for short-term loans for Baptist hospitals and retirement centers as follows:

WHEREAS, it appears that there are times when it is necessary for hospitals and retirement centers operated by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to borrow funds for current operating needs, or for immediate purchase or replacement of essential equipment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the executive director-treasurer, the chairman of the Hospitals and Retirement Centers Committee, and the chairman of the Governing Board involved, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to authorize jointly the administrators of the hospitals to procure short-term loans, not to exceed one year and not to exceed \$25,000, from banks at prevailing commercial rates of interest to meet the needs for current operating funds and for temporary financing of the purchase of urgently needed equipment; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the negotiations of each loan by an administrator pursuant to the provisions of this resolution shall be specifically, jointly authorized and jointly approved by the executive director-treasurer, the chairman of the Hospitals and Retirement Centers Committee, and the chairman of the Governing Board involved, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the administrators be and they are hereby authorized to execute evidence of debt in the name of this corporation for loans procured pursuant to the provisions of this resolution; and

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED that the executive director -treasurer of this corporation be and he is hereby authorized to furnish certified copies of this resolution to banks from which loans are procured pursuant to the provisions hereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall be in effect until changed or voided by action of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

# 9. Permit to Purchase Alcohol Approved

The following resolution was approved by the board in the May meeting:

That authority be given to permit the purchase of alcohol.

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma is a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma and engaged in a religious benevolent and charitable work; and,

WHEREAS, the said Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma operates four (4) hospitals:

Baptist Medical Center, Oklahoma City, Okla.

Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Enid, Okla.

Grove General Hospital, Grove, Okla.

Miami Baptist Hospital, Miami, Okla.

WHEREAS, it is necessary from time to time for each of these four (4) hospitals to make and execute papers, writings and documents required by the Alcohol Tax Units of the Department of Internal Revenue in connection with permit matters; and

WHEREAS, it is inconvenient to have all such matters submitted to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma for signing any papers in connection with said Alcohol Tax Units,

NOW THEREFORE, in order to facilitate the execution of any necessary papers of any nature or kind in connection with said Alcohol Tax Units of the Department of Internal Revenue in the conduct of the hospitals operated by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, it is hereby resolved that:

James L. Henry, president, Baptist Medical Center, Oklahoma City:

Eugene Baxter, administrator, Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Enid;

Henry Lamb, administrator, Grove General Hospital, Grove;

B. Joe Gunn, administrator, Miami Baptist Hospital, Miami;

BE AND ARE HEREBY, fully and completely authorized to execute any and all applications for permits to use, renewals and amendments thereto, bonds, consents of Surety, application for permits to procure tax free alcohol, monthly reports and all other documents required in connection with permit matters in behalf of said hospitals and for what purpose are authorized to execute and sign the names of the hospitals as follows:

Baptist Medical Center, Oklahoma City by James L. Henry; Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Enid, by Eugene Baxter; Grove General Hospital, Grove, by Henry Lamb; Miami Baptist Hospital, Miami, by B. Joe Gunn.

In all matters aforesaid, and to fully and completely effectuate the authority of said administrators, as aforesaid, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma hereby ratifies, affirms and confirms any and all of past acts as well as future acts of the administrators in relation to all the Alcohol Tax Unit matters as aforesaid.

#### 10. Auditors Approved

In May the Board approved these auditors for the Hospitals and Retirement Centers:

### 11. Approval of Bond Issue for Baptist Laymen's Corporation

A resolution was approved by the Board of Directors in the May meeting authorizing Baptist Laymen's Corporation to borrow \$1,900,000 to pay for additional improvements to the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center; and pledging the credit of the convention to pay for indebtedness to be created by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation.

#### Resolution

WHEREAS, Baptist Laymen's Corporation is planning to expand the facilities of Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center, in Oklahoma City, Okla., which expansion program would include the construction of additional apartments for elderly persons, the central activities building, and related improvements; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by Baptist Laymen's Corporation that the most feasible means of financing the construction of these needed improvements is by the issuance of income tax-exempt bonds by and through a Trust Authority, which bonds, when issued, will be legally deemed to be issued by a governmental agency of the State of Oklahoma; and it further appears that the greater portion of the financing may be accomplished by Baptist Laymen's Corporation in obtaining first mortgage loans on the real estate upon which the added facilities are to be constructed; and

WHEREAS, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation has been holding said real estate and operating said facility as a part of the ministry program of the convention, and since Baptist Laymen's Corporation is without financial resources to secure the payment of the obligations to be incurred under the expansion program, it appears that it will be necessary for the convention to pledge its full faith and credit to guarantee the payment of said obligations, which in any event shall not exceed a total sum of \$1,900,000;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma authorize the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (1) to expand the facilities of the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center, in Oklahoma City, Okla.; and in carrying out said expansion program to construct additional apartments and a central activities building; and (2) to secure funds for such expansion and construction program by the issuance of income tax-exempt bonds to be secured by first mortgages on the real estate on which the added facilities to be constructed are located; and such debts shall be created in such manner and upon such terms as the Baptist Laymen's Corporation may determine, in the exercise of its discretion.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that since the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center is being operated as a part of the convention ministry program, and since the Baptist Laymen's Corporation is without financial resources to secure adequately the repayment of said indebtedness to be incurred by reason of the aforesaid expansion and construction program, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its Board of Directors, hereby pledges its credit to guarantee the payment of the said debts incurred by Baptist Laymen's Corporation in the aforesaid expansion and construction program, including payment of income tax-exempt bonds by and through a Trust Authority, notes, and mortgages securing said bonds or other borrowings; provided, that the total sum of the debt for which the said convention hereby pledges its credit shall not exceed \$1,900,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the president, or vice-president, and recording secretary, or assistant recording secretary of the convention be, and they are hereby authorized and directed, to obligate the convention to carry out the intent and purposes of this resolution by executing such documents as may be necessary or practicable to pledge the convention's credit for the payment of said debts, including the execution of indemnification agreements, guaranty agreement mortgages, and such other instruments as may be deemed necessary by the Trust Authority and lenders of other monies in obtaining the aforesaid funds for the aforesaid expansion and construction program.

# 12. Constraint Against Gender Dysphoria Surgical Procedures

At the October meeting of the Board approval was given for a constraint against gender dysphoria surgical procedures (transsexual surgery) to be placed in the Baptist Medical Center Medical Staff Bylaws.

# 13. Study Regarding Divestiture of Hospitals

The Board of Directors in October authorized the current Hospitals and Retirement Centers Committee to study the feasibility of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma divesting itself of the ownership and operation of hospitals; and instructed the committee to present its report to the December meeting of the Board for consideration.

#### Planning and Promotion Committee Recommendations to the Board

The Planning and Promotion Committee gives assistance and counsel in stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, news office and church program departments. The chairman is John McClung.

#### 1. Funds Allocated for Resort Ministry

An allocation of \$5,000 was approved by the board in December to assist in the 1977 funding of a Church Extension Field Ministry in the Eastern resort areas of Oklahoma. The funds were taken from the Special Missions Project Fund, and the Home Mission Board also provided \$5,000 for the project.

# 2. Amendment to Disaster Relief Guidelines Added

The following statement was approved in December to be added to the Disaster Relief guidelines: "The Disaster Relief fund of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma was established to assist churches in their ministry and witness within their community during a time of natural disaster. The fund is and has been administered through the association. No individual claims are considered by the State Disaster relief Committee.

"Individual disasters occur in many communities almost every day. This is a real opportunity for a mission-minded church to act. One family fires, auto and boat accidents and other such occurrences provide an immediate platform for mission action by the local church. When disaster is communitywide or citywide it usually requires more resources than a church or even an association can provide. This is when the state Disaster Relief program and fund comes into the picture. It is Oklahoma Baptists' way of saying 'we care.' It is one way of sharing Christ's love in a tangible expression of concern. Thus, through the Cooperative Program and State Missions Offering, all Oklahoma Baptists can say to a disaster-torn community, 'we love you'."

# 3. Volunteer Mission Projects to Be Handled by Brotherhood Department

The Southern Baptist Convention Brotherhood Commission changed their task statement from "study-action" to "action-study" approach to mission education and involvement of men and boys in mission activities. Due to this emphasis change suggested by the "Impact 80's" Committee, approval was given in December by the board that requests for volunteer mission projects for men and boys be channelled through the convention's Brotherhood Department for

coordination and implementation. It is understood that the major attention will be given to projects within the state. Limited project requests from pioneer areas will be considered as time and resources permit.

4. Garlow and Brown Assist in Hong Kong

It was reported to the Board in October that the Foreign Mission Board has plans for a Major Cities Evangelism thrust with the intent of reaching the major cities of the world with the gospel. Early in the 18-24-month emphasis in each of the selected cities is a Spiritual Preparation Phase which includes Stewardship Development. The Foreign Mission Board has asked Oklahoma to give leadership direction in this activity in Hong Kong. The Board gave approval for Glenn Brown to participate in the Hong Kong planning activities, Oct. 18-Nov. 10, including assistance to the early planning phases with the countries of Malaysia and Indonesia; for Lyle Garlow to direct the pilot project which will include six churches in Hong Kong, Jan. 10-31, 1978; and for Glenn Brown to direct the follow-up project in about forty churches in the Hong Kong area March 21-April 11, 1978. The cost for the trips is estimated at approximately \$4,400.

# Administrative Committee Recommendations to the Board

The Administrative Committee is responsible for work related to personnel, budget, Annuity and Ministerial Services, **Baptist Messenger** and Baptist Student work. The committee chairman is Brad Allen.

1. Anti-Pornography

At the 1976 annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, two motions were passed concerning pornography:

"(1) Be it resolved that the Christian Life Committee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma begin a concerted effort directed against obscene literature available on the open news stands across the state.

"Be it further resolved that we ask the Christian Life Committee to take the lead in acquainting Oklahoma Baptists of the seriousness of this harmful influence.

"Therefore, we call upon our convention and its legal advisors to give advice and assistance to local churches in leading their communities to set community standards as provided in a recent Supreme Court decision. We give authority to our Board of Directors and our executive director-treasurer to authorize expenditures that seem advisable in order for the Christian Life Committee to carry out the instructions of this convention.

"(2) We charge the executive director-treasurer to devise a program and to lead our churches in direct action in the battle against pornography."

In order to implement these motions the following recommendations were approved in the December meeting:

- "(1) That the Christian Life Committee, with the counsel of the executive director-treasurer and president, sponsor a statewide conference on pornography. We recommend that the best personnel possible be enlisted to lead the conference and that three representatives for each association, including director of missions, be enlisted to attend so that each county in Oklahoma will have leadership trained to mount a campaign against pornography. We feel that this conference should be widely promoted and that the general public be invited, including the Governor, Attorney General, Judges and District Attorneys. We further recommend that the Christian Life Committee prepare appropriate materials for use by the churches to inform church members how they can be involved in cleaning up community magazine racks, etc.
- "(2) We recommend that the convention attorney be authorized to prepare legal guidelines relative to pornography so that we may make our efforts more effective.
- "(3) We recommend that in order to get a broader base of involvement and so that there may be an organization to take possible legal actions, that the Board of Directors request the Social Betterment Council of Oklahoma to involve itself in the battle against pornography and that we pledge them our cooperation.
- "(4) We recommend that the executive director-treasurer be authorized to spend up to \$10,000 from the Special Projects Fund in order to carry out these directives, and then if additional funds are needed that the Executive Committee of the Board be authorized to approve an additional \$5,000."

A report regarding these recommendations is found in the Christian Life Committee report.

# 2. Budget Deficits Picked Up

In the December meeting a recommendation was approved that as much as possible of the accumulated deficits for Falls Creek, Camp Hudgens, and Baptist Student work be paid from Cooperative Program funds received beyond the budget. Further approval was given for any additional Cooperative Program funds received beyond the above mentioned items to be placed in the Special Projects Fund.

#### 3. Revision of Annuity Plan

Recognizing that the welfare of our people who serve the Lord in the ministry and other denominational work is a joint responsibility of the church, state convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and further recognizing that the continued increase in the cost of living has created a pressing need for broader benefits, it was suggested that the Oklahoma Convention join other state conventions and associations in accepting the program offered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

A recommendation was approved that the following revised Annuity Plan be adopted:

"(1) That we close the present Southern Baptist Protection Plan (Plan A) to new members as of Jan. 1, 1978.

- "(2) That the present members of the Southern Baptist Protection Program and the Southern Baptist Benefit Program (these are in A Plans) may remain in their present plan or elect to transfer to the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program for Career Ministerial Personnel or the Southern Baptist Retirement Plan for non-ministerial personnel.
- "(3) That the Southern Baptist Retirement Program be promoted through the individual churches encouraging them to contribute an amount equal to 10 percent of the Career Ministerial Personnel's compensation for retirement purposes. The church may contribute more or less than the 10 percent, but the amount should never be less than \$400 per year. The state convention's contribution to this program (\$200 annually per member if the church's contribution is at least \$400; if not, then 50 percent of the church's contribution) will provide the survivor and disability benefits.
- "(4) That this convention pledge to promote actively this program, and that it seek to maintain and improve as a minimum its present percentage of participation and its present level of average age (not lower than the Southern Baptist Convention level) and that, in the event it fails to do so, this convention recognize and absorb an actuarial liability caused by such failure to do so.
- "(5) That the Southern Baptist Retirement Plan be promoted through the individual churches encouraging them to contribute an amount equal to 10 percent of the non-ministerial personnel's compensation for retirement purposes. The church may contribute more or less than 10 percent."

# 4. Funds for Oklahoma City Retirement Center Activities Building

When the lease for the Perry Hospital was terminated and all financial obligations were satisfied there were funds remaining. It has been the convention's practice that when funds are left over after ceasing to operate a hospital, that the remaining funds be used for an institution with a similar purpose. By previous convention action funds from this account were contributed toward the construction of the T. P. Haskins Chapel at Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital in Enid, and \$7,500 was given to the Oklahoma City Retirement Center for the Activities Building. There was a balance of approximately \$25,000 left in the account and in December the board approved a recommendation that the approximate balance in the Perry Hospital Account be given toward construction of the activities building at the Oklahoma City Retirement Center.

# 5. Taylor to Continue as Chaplain

In August, 1973 the Board of Directors adopted a policy regarding retired people serving on the convention staff. A portion of that policy states that when a person reaches 70 years of age he can no longer serve on a retired basis except upon year by year permission of the Board of Directors. In December the board gave approval for Stanley Taylor to continue on a retired basis as chaplain at Talihina Indian Hospital for 1977.

#### 6. Health Insurance Premium Increased

Information was received from the Annuity Board that health insurance premiums for convention employees would be increased in 1977 as follows: Individuals from \$19.56 to \$22.50, dependents from \$40.57 to \$46.65 and family plan from \$60.13 to \$69.15. These figures were not received until after the 1977 budget was approved. In December the board approved a recommendation that the premium increase be taken from the Special Projects Fund.

# 7. Appreciation Expressed for Gritz 27 Years as Editor

A recommendation was approved in December that in appreciation for Jack Gritz's 27 years as editor of the Baptist Messenger that he be given \$100 for each year of service, to be paid from non-mission funds, and that he be given an additional 30 days in 1977 to attend vocationally related meetings.

# 8. Study of Objectives and Job Descriptions Authorized

In the May meeting of the board approval was given for the executive director-treasurer to be granted his desire to make an administrative study of all convention department and agencies and recommend to the Board of Directors objectives for all departments and agencies and detailed job descriptions for all employees and that it be completed by the Fall Board Meeting. In the October meeting a Manual of Position Descriptions was presented and approved by the Board.

# 9. Approval for Variations of Policies for Board Employees

In May approval was given to the recommendation that the present employees policies be administered without variation, and that the same policies apply to personnel employed by the Board of Directors, with the exception that any variations of policy pertaining to board-elected employees must be recommended by the executive director-treasurer to the board and approved by them.

### 10. Study of Need for Counseling Ministry

A recommendation was approved in May that the Board of Directors go on record as recognizing the need for a church staff counseling ministry; that the Administrative Committee be authorized to project program, personnel and cost for such a program, and that a report and recommendation be brought back to the Board of Directors.

# 11. Convention Bylaws Amended

At the meeting of the Board in October approval was given to amend the Bylaws of the Convention by a vote of 56 affirmative and no negative. The amendment is to add the following to Article I, Section 1, Paragraph 4: The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected."

12. Baptist Messenger Subscriptions Increased

Approval was given in October to increase Baptist Messenger subscriptions by one-cent-per-copy for individual and Every Family Church Budget Plan which would mean that the churches will pay seven cents per copy or \$3.50 per year and individual subscriptions will be \$4 per year.

### 13. OBU to Borrow Funds

In the October meeting authority was given for the Oklahoma Baptist University Board of Trustees to negotiate a loan and borrow an amount not to exceed \$150,000 to be used to develop a new physical plant warehouse and headquarters; and that the funds be repaid within 15 years from current operating funds and designated gifts.

14. Mountain View Property Sold

Information was presented in the October Board meeting regarding the former Mountain View Church. It disbanded many years ago. The buildings and equipment were disposed of, but not the two acres of land on which it was located. The property is nearby but not adjacent to Mountain View Cemetery. Some former members of the church indicated that it was the intent of the church that the property should go to the cemetery. An offer of \$750 per acre has been made for the land. According to Oklahoma Statutes, since the church no longer exists, the property automatically comes under the ownership of the Convention. In consultation and in agreement with Comanche-Cotton Association, the Board approved the recommendation that the two acres on which the Mountain View Baptist Church was located be sold for \$750 per acre and the money, less approximately \$75 legal fees, be given to the Mountain View Cemetery organization.

# 15. 1978 Cooperative Program Recommendations

- (1) That the Cooperative Program objective for 1978 be \$7,550,000 to be distributed across the board 57½ percent State and 42½ percent Southern Baptist Convention; that the total objective be divided as follows: Basic Budget, \$7,025,000 and the Challenge Section, \$525,000; that all items in the Basic Budget have priority over items in the Challenge Section; that all receipts over the \$7,550,000 be distributed 57½ percent State and 42½ percent Southern Baptist Convention.
- (2) That the director-treasurer be instructed to keep Cooperative Program expenditures in line with Cooperative Program income and that he be authorized to adjust department and agency budgets up or down by not more than 5 percent in order to carry out this directive.

60. Joe Williams presented the report of the convention Building Committee.

# Convention Building Committee

Joe Williams, Chairman

The responsibility of the convention's Building Committee is to review convention building projects and give a written report on their progress or completion.

Pursuant to these responsibilities, the committee met on March 4. The following sub-committees were appointed:

Baptist Medical Center, Oklahoma City—Ted Coldiron, W. E. Marshall and Jerry Highfill.

Owasso Baptist Village—Eulis Grisham, Herb Masters and John Nantz.

Owasso Children's Home—George Denny, John Nantz and Eulis Grisham.

Madill Children's Home—Joe Williams, Sam Thomas and Charles Horton Jr.

Falls Creek—James Miller, Tom Ritzinger, Richard McClure, Joe Williams and Ron Fannin

- 1. Camp Hudgens—A 20 x 28 ft. addition was made to the caretaker's residence at a cost of approximately \$5,700. This included an office, utility room, hallways and bath. The caretaker provided the labor.
- 2. Falls Creek—The Sam W. Scantlan Center at Falls Creek was completed and dedicated during the 1977 assembly. The building was constructed in 1974, but only the cafeteria and grocery store areas were completed. During 1977 the office area which includes the registration area, offices, conference room and storage were finished. This completes the building. The Scantlan Center was built without debt as Cooperative Program funds became available over a period of several years.

#### Child Care

- 1. Owasso Children's Home—Shannon Cottage and Mabee Administrative and Counseling Center are under construction. The cottage will be built for approximately \$75,000 and the construction cost for the Administrative and Counseling Center will be \$235,000. Paving of streets and parking lot around the Administrative Center is estimated to cost \$55,000 upon completion.
- 2. Madill Children's Home—The superintendent's residence has been completed at a cost of \$40,000. The first cottage was completed in October at a cost of \$80,000. The second cottage and administration building are under construction and should be ready for occupancy by late spring, 1978.
- 3. Boys Ranch Town—A farm home is under construction at Deer Creek and will be occupied by boys from Boys Ranch Town. Barby Cottage is being built at the ranch. Both buildings should be completed by Dec. 31, 1977 at a cost of \$285,000, including furnishings.
- 4. Oklahoma City Children's Home—The I. L. Yearby Counseling Center is an addition to the existing administration building. The cost will be about \$70,000.
- 5. Child Care Department's Falls Creek Cabin—"Tabernacle Echoes" has been renovated and air-conditioned at a cost of \$2,500.

#### Hospitals

# 1. Baptist Medical Center, Oklahoma City

- (1) Completion of west tower renovation—The third floor now houses the newly remodeled burn center and acute care area, and the fourth floor, the newly remodeled psychiatric unit. The remodeling of the fifth floor was completed in October and the sixth floor should be completed by early 1978.
- (2) Occupational therapy psychiatric facility—occupational therapy patients were previously treated in one general location on the first floor of the medical center. This unit generally serviced the stroke, physically disabled and the psychiatric patients. Obviously, a separate area was needed for the psychiatric patients. This need

was met by the completion of the psychiatric occupational therapy facility on the fourth floor between the east and west towers. The first floor area is now used exclusively for occupational therapy.

(3) Outpatient surgery facility—Outpatient surgery at Baptist Medical Center will be performed on a centralized basis when the new outpatient surgery facility is completed early in 1978. This space, directly to the east of the present operating room, which was the EEG/ECG area, is being renovated and remodeled to house the new outpatient surgery area.

(4) Alternative EEG/ECG facility—In order to expand the outpatient surgery area to the east end of the second floor, the EEG/ECG department had to be relocated. Uncompleted space on the second floor was designated to house the new EEG/ECG facility and con-

struction was completed in September.

(5) Hemodialysis area—Hemodialysis facilities at BMC have expanded over the past three years, requiring space on the old fifth west unit for these expanded services. In order to remodel five west, using an identical floor plan as that of six west, it was necessary to relocate Hemodialysis on the 10th floor of the west tower. This was done in September.

(6) Administrative services building—The second floor of the Administrative services building has been renovated and brought up to functional use for general operating departments of the medical center. Oklahoma Baptist University School of Nursing has been

relocated on the first floor area of this building.

(7) Linear accelerator room—Facilities for the new 18 MeV Linear Accelerator have been completed. Equipment calibrations require additional time before the facility is operational.

- (8) Emergency power system—In order to meet requirements for emergency power throughout the west tower floors seven, eight, nine and 10, major reworking of electrical systems is in progress. This is the first of several long-range plans to upgrade emergency power systems of the medical center and should be completed over the next two years.
- (9) East parking lot expansion—One hundred additional parking spaces were added in the free parking lot to the far east of Independence. Parking in this area has been extremely congested and inadequate during the past year.
- (10) Glass enclosures of patient cubicles in special care units— In order to provide additional privacy in special care areas, special care cubicles, accommodating one patient bed, were installed with glass partitions. This provides 24 patient cubicles on the sixth floor ICU and seventh floor ITCU.
- (11) Cardiac rehabilitation unit—With the implementation of the new cardiac inpatient diagnostic and treatment program, additional space was required to provide clinical services required for the specialized care. The nursing classroom and the adjacent visitors' waiting area were converted to a diagnostic therapeutic center for inpatient cardiac rehabilitation.

- (12) Outpatient oncology Unit—This unit was moved from the first floor outpatient area to the oncology nursing unit, located on the seventh floor west. Facilities were provided in the patient treatment area, nursing conference room, with research area established in the patients' waiting area. This service was established on this seventh floor area in order to provide optimum location to administer chemotherapy services by a specially qualified nursing staff.
- (13) Smoke barrier doors—the Joint Commission for Accreditation of Hospitals and the insurance carrier, required that the hospital install smoke barrier doors to provide additional patient safety and protection. Smoke barrier doors are being installed on floors seven, eight, nine and 10 of the west tower and floors three, four, five and six of the east tower.
- 2. Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, Enid—A nuclear medicine addition has been added at an approximate cost of \$58,000.
- 3. Miami Baptist Hospital—During the past year a major building program was completed which consisted of a new laboratory, x-ray, coronary-intensive care, progressive care beds, the new dietary department, other ancillary services, such as central sterile supply, maintenance, environmental service, medical records, accounting, admitting, as well as emergency room and respiratory therapy. Now under construction is the total remodeling of the newborn nursery area to provide for 15 bassinets and the remodeling of the post-partum maternity beds in the same area. This should be completed by May, 1978.
- 4. Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center—The Baptist Layman's Corporation has \$213,546 in pledges toward the construction of a community building at the retirement center. A contract was let to H.S.P. Construction Company in the amount of \$301,272.90. Construction began July 1, 1977 and is expected to be completed by January, 1978.

On May 20, 1977 the Board of Directors adopted a resolution authorizing the Baptist Laymen's Corporation to borrow funds for the construction of 100 apartment units and the community center by means of a bond issue through the Oklahoma Industries Authority. It is estimated that the 100 apartments will cost \$1,830,000. About \$90,000 of the borrowed funds will be used to pay the remainder of the community center construction costs. Plans for the apartments are in the final stage.

5. Owasso Baptist Village—The Board of Directors authorized the development of the Owasso Baptist Village for retired people to be constructed as soon as plans are completed and financial arrangements are made. It is to be located east of Owasso near Tulsa and adjacent to the Baptist Children's Home. The master plans are being completed by the architect.

The first development will be the construction of 96 apartment units:

Eight efficiency units of 450 square feet each. Seventy-two one-bedroom units of 550 square feet each. Sixteen two-bedroom units of 750 square feet each.

There will be an administration office, chaplain's office, beauty shop, coin-operated laundry, library and multiple use space for various activities.

The motion carried to approve the report.

61. The following motion was introduced on Monday afternoon and was called up for consideration at this time.

James Reese, pastor of Gracemont Church, Tulsa, introduced the following motion: "That in order to provide time for a pastors' conference and/or Woman's Missionary Union and Brotherhood Convention that the annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma begin on Tuesday noon following the second Sunday of November and conclude Thursday noon." The motion carried.

62. Robert Hammons, chairman of the Nominating Committee presented the report of the committee.

# Historical Commission J. M. Gaskin, Historical Director

The work of the Historical Commission and the director of history is convention oriented. This is due to the fact the work is funded by the convention from the Cooperative Program; the director is elected by the convention through its Historical Commission; and the program and job description of the director have been and are from time to time approved by the convention.

#### Job Titles

The director actually bears three job titles, all inter-related. First, he is director of history, by designation in his job description, for the convention; he is director of research in the Oklahoma Baptist collection (archives) at Oklahoma Baptist University's Mabee Learning Center (library); and he is director of the oral history program at OBU.

#### Historical Society

The Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society continues to prosper with a growing interest in its work.

About 60 of the state's more than 200 church libraries have joined. The society's annual meeting is held during the annual meeting of the State Convention. Approximately 200 attended last year.

#### Marker

Plans are in the making in cooperation with the convention's church music department to erect a historical marker at Falls Creek in 1978. The marker will indicate the location and some of the history of the B. B. McKinney-E. E. "Hot Dog" Lee cottage. McKinney and Lee were noted personalities each year at Falls Creek during the assembly's early years.

#### Oral History

Workshops in oral history were held during the past year at Bethel Hawley Church, Tahlequah, Duncan, Boise City, Guymon, and one more is scheduled at Temple. Several have already been scheduled for 1978. These are usually set up on an area or associational plan. Interested persons write J. M. #### Recommendations

The following recommendations are offered for the convention's approval:

- 1. That endorsement be given to the publication and widest possible circulation of THE CHILD CARE MINISTRY OF OKLA-HOMA BAPTISTS, now in process of being written by J. M. Gaskin. The book will in part commemorate four anniversaries in Oklahoma Baptists' Child Care work: it will be the year of the 75th anniversary of the Children's Home at Oklahoma City; the 25th for Boys Ranch Town; the fifth for the Home at Owasso, and the first for the new home at Kingston.
- 2. That each church and association be encouraged to elect each year a historian and a history committee.
- 3. That each church and/or association library (media center) be urged to provide a designated area for Baptist history and to make provisions for space to house an archival collection. In these two areas materials of local interest can be collected, placed for preservation, and cataloged for utilization; and books, periodicals, and other materials can be purchased or otherwise collected and shelved in the history portion of the library. This is an area of work which has too long been neglected, and needs much, much more immediate attention at the local level.
- 4. That more churches and associations be encouraged to invite the director of history to work out a schedule for oral history and history writing workshops. Both are needed, very much, at the local and area levels.
- 5. That efforts be made to strengthen the ties between the church libraries (media centers) and the Oklahoma Baptist collection, and where possible that inter-library services between the two be established as the norm in this relationship.
- 6. That individuals, churches and associations be asked to inform themselves so as to become more aware of the services offered from the Oklahoma Baptist collection (archives) at OBU; to call on the director of research for help from the OBU library; and to ask the director of history to render needed services with committees, churches, associations and others. Assistance is available in such matters as writing history; doing oral history interviews; setting up archival collections and museum collections; and to work as otherwise desired by these groups in implementing a history program of their choosing.

# Annuity and Ministerial Services J. T. Roberts, Director

#### Annuity

Darold H. Morgan, Annuity Board president, describes the present as a "pivotal time" in the ministry of the board. The reason is clear.

On Jan. 1, 1978 the Annuity Board officially launches the new Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

Approved by all state conventions, the new plan is especially designed for career ministerial personnel serving the churches throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. It is expected to become "the standard" for ministers all over the denomination.

The new retirement program represents only one example of progress in planning being made by the board as it fulfills its purpose of administering insurance and retirement programs for Southern Baptist churches and agencies.

Besides career ministerial personnel, the board also has plans for salaried church lay personnel, as well as employees of Southern Bap-

tist hospitals, colleges and universities, seminaries, homes for children and the aged, and many other institutions.

Through the board's programs, Southern Baptist state conventions provide more than \$4 million in Cooperative Program funds to undergird retirement plans for ministers.

Premium and dues income amounted to a record \$20,532,025 through the first six months of 1977. The board has distributed \$8,935,058 to 12,511 annuitants through June of this year.

A total of 21,236 churches and associations are participating currently with 28,693 employees in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program.

In Oklahoma 813 churches and associations with 1,151 employees participate. Fifty new members were enrolled in the Family Benefit Section (Plan A) during the first six months of 1977. The following agencies participate in the retirement program:

#### Ministerial Services

Maintaining a biographical file on ministers and other church staff; counseling with ministers, pulpit and other church committees and promoting a program of continuing education are the basic services provided through this office.

The church staff information service continues to be used extensively. This past year an average of 90 copies of biographical data per month were shared as requested by church pulpit and personnel committees.

In November a conference for the directors of missions was held with representatives from the Annuity Board and Seminary Extension as resource people.

Deacon-pastor conferences held in 13 associations during January and February were attended by a total of 744 deacons and 185 pastors.

Dinner meetings were held for Oklahoma students who are attending Southwestern, Midwestern and Southern seminaries. Individual conferences were scheduled with students who requested them.

A total of 327 pastors, other church staff and lay people registered for the State Bible Conference.

The 1978 Bible Conference will be May 1-4. Huber Drumwright, dean of the School of Theology and Professor of New Testament at Southwestern Seminary, will teach the book of Mark; Roy L. Honeycutt, provost dean, School of Theology and Professor of Old Testament Interpretation at Southern Seminary, will teach Habakkuk; and Jimmy Draper, pastor of First Church, Euless, Texas, will teach Titus. Joe Ingram will teach the Beatitudes and Sandy F. Ray, pastor of the

Cornerstone Church in Brooklyn, New York, will bring three messages.

Twelve Seminary Extension Centers were active during 1976-77.

Nine area orientation meetings were held to introduce the New Retirement Program which is to become effective January 1, 1978.

# Report prepared by William E. Neptune, Acting President

The 1976-77 school year was an interim administrative period as William G. Tanner resigned the presidency to become the new executive director-treasurer of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board. William E. Neptune, vice-president for academic affairs at OBU, was appointed acting president by the Board of Trustees. His term as acting president began Oct. 1, 1976.

Following two years of record enrolments of more than 1,800, enrolment was down during the fall semester, 1976, with a total of 1,723. Although 95 below the previous year, it was the third highest enrolment in university history. Spring semester enrolment was also down, approximately 6.3 percent.

The OBU student body included 1,231 students from Oklahoma, 71.4 percent; 468 from other states, 27.2 percent; and 24 from other countries, 1.4 percent. Women students outnumbered men students, 52.3 percent to 47.7 percent.

Two new facilities were completed during 1976-77 and opened for student use. The \$1.9 million renovation and addition to the OBU library was completed and was dedicated during November. The Mabee Learning Center, which includes the Owens Hall office building and the library, Brittain Hall, represents a \$3.5 million complex.

West University Apartments, a new housing complex for women, was completed and opened during the spring. The complex will house 92 students.

The east wing of Bel Air Apartments was damaged by fire during January. A potential disaster was averted when Jack Brakefield, husband of Dean of Women Lucy Brakefield, smelled smoke and alerted students in the apartments. Damage to the apartments totaled approximately \$73,000. Repair and renovation was completed last spring. Improvements to conserve energy and to give greater protection in case of future fires were made as the apartments were rebuilt.

OBU distributed approximately \$1.8 million in financial aid to students during 1976-77. Riddle Scholarships for students from Potta-

watomie, Lincoln and Seminole Counties were increased from a minimum of \$200 to \$300 per year, and a new freshman achievement scholarship was created which provides \$200 for the freshman year for students with ACT scores of 22-25.

The Mabee Learning Center received an \$8,000 grant from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation to participate in the Ohio Library College System, a bibliographic network of public and private libraries. The Learning Center also acquired the "Microbook Library of American Civilization," a microfilm library of 12,000 volumes of American History.

The University received a \$73,037 grant from the Exxon Resource Allocation Management Program for improvement of management effectiveness and administrative decision making.

Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary established a branch campus on the OBU campus last year and courses were taught on Mondays by seminary faculty members from Fort Worth.

OBU participated in the Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow Program for the fourth consecutive year. Visiting the campus were Lord Caradon, former British ambassador to the United Nations, and Milton Viorst, syndicated political columnist for the Washington Starnews. Both men had visited the campus previously.

The Kerr Leadership Development Program brought former North Carolina Senator Sam Ervin to campus in May to deliver the annual Kerr Lecture. Ervin spoke on integrity and ethics in politics.

The university implemented an academic skills program to assist freshmen with academic deficiencies in certain areas. A course called "Career Search" was offered for the first time to assist students undecided on vocational goals. A core of freshman advisers was appointed from the faculty to assist all freshmen with academic and enrolment problems. New courses in early childhood education were added to the OBU curriculum and will be offered in the fall term, 1977, for the first time.

More than 50 different courses were offered during the 1977 January Interim, including a "Missions Practicum" which took students to the Caribbean to work with missionaries and mission churches. One of the highlights of the Interim was the course "Christian Mission in the 20th Century," which had such guest speakers as Grady C. Cothen, president of the Sunday School Board; Foy Valentine, executive director of the Christian Life Commission; James E. Wood, executive director of the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs; Eugene Hill, retired secretary of missionary education for the Foreign Mission Board; and James M. Sapp, director of communication for the Home Mission Board.

Rowena Strickland, who became OBU's first woman Bible teacher in 1953, received another first in February, when she was named distinguished service professor of biblical studies by the Board of Trustees. She is the first woman to receive the distinguished service professor title.

Convocation ceremonies last fall honored Eugene Hill, Richmond, Va., Thomas P. Lane, Memphis, Tenn. and Forrest Siler, Lawton, who were awarded honorary doctoral degrees.

The traditional Founders' Day observance in February featured Joe L. Ingram, executive director-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The late Louise M. Prichard, donor of the largest single gift ever to OBU, was honored in March on the 10th anniversary of the establishment of the Prichard Scholarships for ministerial students and missionary volunteers. Porter Routh, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee, was the speaker for the event.

More than 500 students were preparing for religious vocations during 1976-77. As many as one-fourth of the students participated in OBU's In-Service Training Program, gaining practical experience as pastors, assistant pastors, and youth, music and education directors under the tutelage of Baptist leaders throughout the state. Other students used the January Interim for special training projects.

Community service events during 1976-77 included the second annual Business Outlook Conference, a Church Finance Workshop, and a series of one-day workshops for area elementary school teachers, sponsored by the Teacher Education Activities for Mainstreaming program.

The Board of Trustees approved a record budget of \$5,884,843 for 1977-78, an increase of approximately \$600,000.

More than 500 students attended summer school classes during the summer of 1977. Approximately 50 students participated in the 10-week European Study Program, which toured much of Europe and spent a six-week residence in Vienna.

A motion carried to approve the report.

- 91. Hale A. Dixon made the following motion which carried: "That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention be authorized to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention, and that the president and recording secretary of the convention be authorized to sign any legal papers of the convention which require signatures."
- 92. Richard B. Douglass presented the gavel to Jerry Don Abernathy, newly elected president and introduced the other new officers of the convention: Hoyt Aduddell, first vice-president; J. R. Wallace, second vice-president.
- 93. Joe L. Ingram presented to Richard B. Douglass a certificate of appreciation for his services as president of the convention the past year.
- 94. The closing prayer was led by Richard B. Douglass and the convention was adjourned until Nov. 14-16, 1978, at which time it will meet in Oklahoma City.

The effect of this practice as compared to generally accepted accounting principles, which would require capitalization and depreciation of property and equipment, is not determinable.

In our opinion, except for the adjustments that might be required, if any, to restate property and equipment for replacement items which have been expensed, and the effect of depreciation expense which has not been recorded, all as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1977, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Composition of Reporting Entity—The balance sheet and various accompanying supporting exhibits and schedules apply only to operations designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund reserves and disbursements of the following affiliated or

Assets, liabilities, fund reserves and disbursements of the following affiliated or associated organizations, operated as separate organizations, are not included:

1. Hugo Golden Age Home
2. Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma
3. The hospitals operated by the Convention as owner
4. The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma
5. The Oklahoma Baptist University
6. Baptist Laymen's Corporation
7. Baptist Building Federal Credit Union
Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on a modified accrual basis of accounting and do not include trade accounts payable or liabilities for payroll tax expenses. The differences between such basis and the accrual basis are relatively immaterial.

Inventories—Inventories of office and printing supplies and items held for resale at Camps Hudgens and Nunny-Cha-ha are stated at the lower of cost or market. Inventories of livestock, poultry and feed at the boys' ranch and farm are stated at a nominal value. These items have either been grown or have been contributed and,

therefore, have no cost value,

Property and Equipment—It has been customary to expense items even though of

a capital nature, which are purchased as a replacement for like items which have been capitalized in the past. Otherwise, all items of a capital nature are capitalized. It has not been the policy of the Convention to record depreciation. Therefore, items capitalized are generally carried at either cost or contributed value with no provision for depreciation.

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. It is recognized as income as received. The donor may designate its use by the

homa. It is recognized as income as received. The donor may be a support of the s

2. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense
On March 16, 1956, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1977, the unamortized balance amounted to \$18,753.

3. Notes Payable
The Payable The Property Foundation of Oklahoma Notes Payable to The Boartet Foundation of

At December 31, 1977, the unamortized balance amounted to \$18,773.

Notes Payable

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000, due in monthly installments of \$1,000 each applied first to interest from date at 5½% and then to principal. The note was created for expansion of The Baptist Bookstore, Oklahoma City. The balance at December 31, 1977 is \$88,162.

Voyager Inn, Inc.—The Mayfair House, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, a motel, was located on land owned by the Baptist General Convention. The Convention purchased it November 29, 1971, and the improvements were removed. Purchase price was \$338,524. A note at 4½% interest was a part of the settlement. The balance of the note at December 31, 1977 was \$140,993. Payments of \$2,600 are due the first day of each month. The board of directors minutes show that this property is to be operated for the benefit of the Oklahoma City Golden Age Homes.

An agreement dated December 23, 1975 with C. A. Henderson provides for Mr. Henderson to lease the ground for 50 years (to December 31, 2025) for the total sum of \$1,560,000 at \$2,600 per month.

4. Expansion Programs

Baptist Memorial Medical Center of Oklahoma—The Baptist General Convention determined that it would be desirable to expand Baptist Memorial Medical Center of Oklahoma by adding 219 new beds and certain other facilities.

In order to accomplish this, the Convention entered into an agreement of lease dated as of January 1, 1972 with Oklahoma Industries Authority, a public agency established as a trust for public purposes wherein:

a. The Convention conveyed to the Authority the existing facilities.

b. The authority issued its bonds to pay the cost of acquiring the existing facilities and construction the project.

and constructing the project.

c. The Authority leased to the Convention the existing facilities and the project

improvements.

c. The Authority leased to the Convention the existing facilities and the project improvements.

For the purpose of providing funds to pay the cost of acquiring the existing facilities and constructing the project, the Authority has issued bonds of the Authority in the aggregate principal amount of \$29,100,000 designated "Oklahoma Industries Authority First Mortgage Hospital Gross Revenue Bonds, Series 1972 (Baptist Memorial Hospital Series)" dated January 1, 1972.

When the term of this lease expires (January 1, 2002) and the bonds, including principal, interest and redemption premium, if any, and all other obligations incurred by the Authority in connection with the hospital have been paid, the Authority will transfer to the Convention all of the trustee's and Authority's right, title and interest in the hospital.

Bass Memorial Hospital—In order to obtain funds for expansion of the facilities of Bass Memorial Hospital, Enid, Oklahoma, the Baptist General Convention transferred certain real estate and personal property to Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority, a public agency established as a trust for public purposes. In turn, the Authority issued its bonds to provide funds for the expansion. The Baptist General Convention executed a lease dated March 1, 1969 with the Authority wherein the Convention leases the property transferred to the Authority. When the term of the lease expires, and the bonds, including principal, interest and redemption premium, if any, and all other obligations incurred by the Authority in connection with the hospital have been paid, the Authority will transfer to the Convention all of the trustee's and Authority's right, title and interest to the hospital.

The bond states "the full faith and credit of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority and the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma—On July 15, 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises occupied by the Retirement Center to the Oklahoma Industries Authority, which organization then issued its Ser

Convention.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has entered into negotiations with Oklahoma Industries Authority for the proposed issuance of bonds in the approximate amount of \$2,000,000 to provide funds for the construction of the activities center and a proposed 100 unit apartment project. The full faith and credit of Baptist General Convention will be pledged to insure prompt payment of the bonds. This transaction had not been completed at December 31, 1977.

Owasso Baptist Village, Owasso, Oklahoma—The Convention has entered into negotiations with Tulsa Industries Authority for the proposed issuance of bonds in the approximate amount of \$2,000,000 to provide funds for the construction of 96 apartments. The full faith and credit of Baptist General Convention will be pledged to insure prompt payment of the bonds. This transaction had not been completed at December 31, 1977.

5. Improvements to Leased Beal Estate.

5. Improvements to Leased Real Estate

On November 30, 2018, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma will receive title to certain major leasehold improvements which have been or will be constructed on land owned by the Convention. These improvements are known as Warwick West Apartments, The board of directors' minutes show that the income from the apartments is to be given to the Baptist Medical Center until otherwise directed by the Convention.

By contract for sale and agreement for options dated May 27, 1966 between
Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and W. P. Bill Atkinson Enterprises, Inc. and Travco Developers, Inc. the Convention agreed to sell the 800 acre
dairy farm located in Oklahoma City in Sections 7 and 12, T13N, A4W. The property
was to be sold in 160 acre parcels on an option schedule. Four parcels have been sold
prior to 1977. The remaining option was exercised January 2, 1977 by the issuance of
two purchase money promissory notes dated January 3, 1977. Each note was for
\$280,000. One note bore interest at 8% and was due January 3, 1978. The other note
is due January 3, 1979 and is interest free from note date to January 3, 1978 and bears
interest at 8% thereafter. The total sale price is approxicately \$2,362,250 (with an

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting Basis of Statements—The financial statements are presented on the modified cash basis, which, because of the nature of the operations, does not materially differ from the results that would be obtained on the accrual basis, except for undistributed gains of the Group Investment Funds. Such undistributed gains are recognized as earnings of the Trust and Endowment Fund when received, and as disbursements of the Group Investment Fund when transferred.

Funds invested in the Group Investment Funds by the Trust and Endowment Fund and Operating Fund are recorded as investments of the investor fund. These investments are also reported on the fund balance sheets of the Group Investment

Funds.

Investments—All investments are valued at appraised or market value at time of gift, or cost, if purchased. For convenience in managing the funds entrusted to them, the Foundation trustees have established three group investment funds; (1) Funds loaned to churches as described in Note 3, (2) Funds invested in common stock of publicly held corporations and, (3) Funds invested in bonds of publicly held corporations.

The income, except for gains and losses on disposition of securities, are distributed to the trusts of the Trust and Endowment Fund quarterly. This income is

Ownership—The ownership of the Trust and Endowment Fund has been separated into the various categories of trusts in this fund. Endowment Funds account for assets received under stipulation of the donors that such assets be invested, and that only the investment income be used for specific purposes until a specified time or the occurrence of a specified event or in perpetuity. The other Trust categories are either custodial in nature or are self-evident as to purpose.

Annutities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annutities and individual trusts are included herein at an amount equal to the book value of their assets. No attempt has been made to compute any liability in connection with these funds for future payments to beneficiaries. During the current year, approximately \$30,377 (1976—\$39,647) was paid to the annutants participating in these contracts.

in these contracts.

A revolving fund was established within the operating fund of the Foundation for the purpose of receiving income earned from the investment of annuity funds and making periodic payment to annuitants. This use of the revolving fund was discontinued in 1976. The revolving fund is also used to pay the estate expenses prior to the closing of the estate at which time the Foundation becomes the beneficiary of part or all of the estate's assets, and such expenses are reimbursed.

Depreciation and Depletion—No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties or office furniture and fixtures owned by the Foundation. Depletion of mixeral properties is recognized as a percentage of income received from production

The Foundation makes loans to Baptist churches to construct church buildings. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements. The lives of these loans vary from 10 to 15 years. The Foundation attempts to set interest rates at the current rate available from commercial SOUTCES.

6. Insurance Coverage

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma carries the following insurance coverage:

A—Directors and officers liability insurance—The policy provides that the Foundation is reimbursed by the insurer when required or permitted to indemnify the directors and officers of the Corporation for damages, judgments, settlement costs, charges or expenses, incurred in connection with the defense of any action to which the officers and directors are a party. The total liability under this coverage is \$1,000,000 per policy year. The insurer pays 95% of the excess of \$2,500 per claim.

B—Workmen's Compensation and employers liability insurance with a maximum liability of \$500,000 per accident under a policy with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

C—Automobile liability under a policy carried by The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The coverage provides for bodily injury liability of \$250,000/\$500,000 and property damage liability of \$100,000 for each occurence.

D—Commercial Blanket Bond covering losses due to dishonesty of employees. The limit of liability is \$500,000 with a \$5,000 deductible.

E—The Foundation also carries insurance under which "Comprehensive General Liability" coverage is provided to scheduled properties. The coverage per occurence is (a) Bodily Injury Liability—\$300,000 (b) Property Damage Liability—\$100,000. A policy is maintained with The Baptist General Convention providing for \$1,000,000 excess coverage for the general liability coverage.

7. Recording of Depletion

During 1976, the Foundation initiated a policy of recording depletion of oil properties, based on a percentage of royalty income received. Depletion was not recorded in prior years and the change in policy was applicable only to 1976 and future years.

The purpose of such depletion is to provide for a retention of cash for future investments and distributions.

## ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole

The information in this section, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of transactions in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements. In our opinion, except for the effect of the item noted in the accountants' report, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on Oct. 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on Nov. 6, 1946. It was created as a private, nonprofit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers"

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis—The financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation as explained later in this note. The statements of current fund revenues and expenditures are statements of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. They do not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts of provided are accounted for as expenditures in the case of additions and normal replacement of buildings, equipment, library books and debt service.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes

Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control in use in achieving any of its institutional

purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted fund. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments which were purchased by the University are generally stated at cost and investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Fixed Assets—Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuilton, fees, and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated causes are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and other contributions are recognized as income when received. 2. Pledges

3. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, and to the extent necessary, the income from WMU Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds.

4. The annual apportionment from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, not oxceed \$67,500 was pledged to insure deposit with bond indenture trustees of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds. (See Note 11).

5. Other contributions from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma not to exceed \$27,000 are pledged to insure deposit with the bond indenture trustee of amounts necessary to pay twelve months principal and interest on certain bonds. (See Note 11).

6. All funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969, from pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign are to be remitted to the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority under terms of a lease agreement between the University and the Authority. These funds are to be used by the Authority for redemption of bonds described in Note 12.

7. Loan Fund

At May 31, 1977, The Oklahoma Baptist University had received capital contribu-tions from the federal government to National Direct and Nursing Student Loan Pro-grams of \$1,288,950 and \$176,944, respectively. An additional \$95,647 was advanced to the University by the government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for Nursing Loans with \$40,945 having been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds, and from matching funds (10% of federal capital contributions) furnished by the school. Borrowers who become qualified teachers or nurses under the respective programs may have portions of principal and interest payments forgiven. 8. Endowments

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The Prichard Trust had a corpus of \$4,975,014 at May 31, 1977, and \$5,007,143 at May 31, 1976.

The American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundations from which the University receives the net income after payment of beneficiary and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships. The Riddle Foundations had a corpus of approximately \$633,044 at May 31, 1977 and \$668,109 at May 31, 1976.

Funds have been given to the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. with The Oklahoma Baptist University as beneficiary. The carrying value at May 31, 1977 and 1976 was \$28,884.

9. Long-Term Lease

In May, 1967, The Oklahoma Baptist University entered into an agreement to pay approximately \$1,858 per month for 180 months beginning September 1, 1967, for the use of apartment houses. The agreement includes a purchase option. 10. Mortgaged Land

The University has purchased real estate which is subject to a first mortgage. The interst rate is 7% and the balance of the mortgage note at May 31, 1976 was \$5,625 and at May 31, 1976 was \$7,500.

The University is obligor to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government under the following two bond indentures:

(A) The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory bonds, Series 1955, consists of 234% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$15,000 on November 1, 1976 to \$23,000 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$878,387.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Bantist University Student Housing

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series 1957, consists of 2%% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$17,000 on October 1, 1976 to \$33,000 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$1,115,505.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

fund with the trustee.

(C) The University was obligor under a bond indenture of first mortgage serial bonds, dated March 31, 1961, with \$249,000 due on March 1, 1976. The bonds were secured by a first mortgage on John Wesley Raley Chapel and Thurmond Hall, included herein at the University's cost of \$2,130,472 and \$541,024, respectively.

The balloon installment of \$249,000 was paid with \$27,750 transferred from the current unrestricted funds and \$221,250 borrowed from a Ford Foundation grant held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the endowment fund. The borrowed funds which are included in notes navable are to be naid heak at no interest by three annual which are included in notes payable are to be paid back at no interest by three annual payments of \$67,500 and a final payment in 1980 of \$18,750. Interest which normally would be earned on these funds would have been used for general operations of the

University.

(D) The University is also obligor under a bond indenture of first mortgage serial bonds, dated June 1, 1962, with semi-annual maturities of \$10,000 on December 1, and June 1, with the remaining \$97,000 due on June 1, 1978. Interest rate on the remaining bonds is 5.6%. The bonds are secured by a first mortgage on Ford Music Hall and Brittain Library and Arts Center, included herein at the University's cost of \$216,320 and \$147,848, respectively.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma as trustee, the University is required to deposit with the trustee annually the lesser of (1) \$27,000 from Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions, or (2) the amount necessary to pay principal and interest due during the twelve months next following. (See Note 5).

12. Oklahoma Baptist University has entered into certain agreements with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, a public trust created for the benefit of The Oklahoma Baptist University.

The University has entered into cereal agreement of The Oklahoma Baptist University.

On May 1, 1969, the University entered into a lease agreement with Oklahoma Baptist University Luniversity Authority. Under the Agreement, the Authority issued \$1,400,000 in revenue bonds for the construction of The University Center building on the campus. The University agreed to lease the new building until November 1, 1984, or until provision is made for the retirement of all bonds issued. Rental payments of approximately \$35,000 quarterly are to be paid to the Authority for application to bond debt service. The balance of the bonds outstanding at May 31, 1977 was \$355,000, at May 31, 1976, \$435,000.

The University has entered into a lease agreement dated February 1, 1975 with the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. Under this agreement, the Authority proposes to issue its capital facilities revolving note for a maximum of \$1,500,000 which, together with donor pledges, will be used to acquire, construct, equip and furnish additional student housing at the University. The Authority will then lease these acquisitions to the University.

The University agrees to pay to the Authority all donor pledges received by them during the lease term. These pledges shall be used by the Authority in the acquisition and construction and equipping of the above mentioned facilities. The amount transferred for the year ended May 31, 1977 was \$345,418, which includes architect fees incurred. As additional rentals for and in consideration of the use and possession of said facilities, the University agrees to pay into the Authority on or before August 1, 1976 and on or before the first day of each February and August thereafter, agreed upon amounts.

The University has an option to purchase the facilities upon sixty days prior written.

The University has an option to purchase the facilities upon sixty days prior written notice to the Authority. The purchase price payable, if the University exercises its option to purchase the facilities, shall be \$1 plus a sum sufficient to pay all principal and interest on the indebtedness incurred by the Authority for the above mentioned

and interest on the indeptedness incurred by the Authority for the above manifolds acquisition purposes.

The buildings and land upon which they stand, (The University Center Building, Brittain Library and other property) have been deeded to Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. Since the title to this property will revert to the University upon termination of the leases and payment of the debt, the cost of this property is included in these statements.

13. Year Ended May 31, 1976 Financial Information

The amounts shown for the year ended May 31, 1976 in the accompanying statements of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are included to provide a basis for comparison with the year ended May 31, 1977 and present summarized totals olny. Accordingly, the year ended May 31, 1976 amounts are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

14. Restatement of Fund Balances

As a result of a change by management in the method of valuation of library books and similar media, the asset addition involved a restatement of the prior years fund balance of \$60,315.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies
(a) The Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital is owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Although accounted for separately, the Hospital is not a separate legal entity, but operates under the corporate charter of the Convention. The Convention also owns Medical Center Plaza, a doctors office building. Separate financial statements have been issued for Medical Center Plaza (see Note 4).
(b) The hospitals operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma deposit funds with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. These funds are invested by the Foundation and comprise an emergency fund to meet the needs of the hospitals. The funds are withdrawable upon approval of the hospital administrator, the executive secretary of the Convention, and the chairman of the Hospitals and Golden Age Homes Committee of the Convention's Board of Directors.

2. Bonds and Debentures Payable
In 1969 and 1970 Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital Authority, a public trust created under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, issued bonds to finance the construction and equipping of new facilities for the Hospital.

Under agreements between the Baptist General Convention and the Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital, including buildings and equipment, inventories, and other assets of the Hospital, except its parking lot, have been leased to the Trust. In addition the lease covers the revenues from operation of the Hospital. This leasehold interest and the gross revenues of the Hospital are assigned as security for the bonds issued. The full faith and credit of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is also pledged to the payment of the bonds.

The first mortgage gross revenue bonds of 1969 mature in varying amounts to November 1, 1989, including \$53,000 due November 1, 1977. The first mortgage revenue bonds of 1970 mature serially January 1 of each year through January 1, 1980, including \$100,000 due January 1, 1978. Interest is payable semi-annually on each of the issues. Under the terms of the indentures, the gross receipts from the operation of Bass Memorial Baptist Hospital are to be deposited to the revenue account of the Authority. Amounts required for the payment of periodic principal and interes payments are to be paid from the fund. Remaining amounts determined by the Trustees to be in excess of the needs of the Trust may be paid to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The amounts deposited in the Authority funds have been shown as "Cash in Trust for Debt Retirement" in the balance sheet of the restricted funds. Title to the facilities constructed and equipment purchased remains in the Trust until the bonds and debentures have been paid, at which time it will be transferred to the Baptist General Convention.

6. Long-Term Debt—Bonds Payable
The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma entered into a financing arrangement through Miami Baptist Hospital Authority effective January 1, 1975 for the issuance of bonds to be used for construction and remodeling of Miami Baptist Hospital.

Through Miami Baptist Hospital Authority, bonds were issued in the amount of \$3,750,000. These bonds are entitled "Miami Baptist Hospital Authority First Mortgage Revenue Bonds, Series 1975, Miami Baptist Hospital Issue."

The repurchase price is the amount required to pay the obligations incirred by Miami Baptist Hospital Authority in issuing the bonds in the amount of \$3,750,000 and all applicable expense including interest thereon.

7. Unamortized Bond Discount and Expense

Bond discount and issuance cost of \$305,193 was capitalized as bond discount and expense and will be amortized over the life of the bond issue.

(a) On pledges made for new expansion, an allowance was provided for pledges with no payments made during the past year, plus a percentage of the balance.
(b) On employee pledges, 100 percent allowance has been provided.

((11) Development Fund—Land—
An individual donated 39,1666 acres of real estate located in the Northwest Quarter and the Southwest Quarter of Section Twenty, Township Thirteen North, Range Four West, Oklahoma County, Oklahoma, having an agreed value of \$195,833. The land is to be used for the purpose of establishing a cardiovascular center at the Medical Center.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is to act as trustee for the land and has excepted these partial three partials.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is to act as trustee for the land and has executed three annuity contracts as follows:

(a) A lifetime annuity payable to the donor equivalent to interest at 7.4 percent per annum on a principal gift of \$95,833, with payments to be paid quarterly in the amount of \$1,773.

(b) A lifetime annuity payable to an individual equivalent to interest at 6.8 percent per annum on a gift in the principal sum of \$50,000 with a payment to be paid monthly in the amount of \$283.

(c) A lifetime annuity payable to an individual equivalent to interest at 7.1 percent

(c) A lifetime annuity payable to an individual equivalent to interest at 7.1 percent per annum on a gift in the principal sum of \$50,000 with payment to be paid monthly in the amount of \$296.

(12) Noncontributory Pension Plan—
The Medical Center has a noncontributory pension plan covering substantially all of its employees. The total pension expense was \$351,975 for 1977 and \$164,225 for 1976. (See Schedule 4)

(13) Related Party Transactions—
The Baptist Medical Center is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which also owns the Doctors Medical Building. The doctors located in the Medical Building utilize the Medical Center facilities to care for their patients. During the years ended June 30, 1977 and 1976, the Medical Center transferred \$262,135 and \$147,153, respectively, to the Medical Building to be used in the operations of the facility. At June 30, 1977 and 1976, the total amount of funds transferred was \$1,124,681 and \$862,546, respectively. The amounts received by the Medical Building are to be paid back whenever funds are available.

#### Auditor's Comments

June 30, 1977

The General Fund cash account balance was verified with the depository.

The Cash and Investments of the Bond Fund Accounts were verified with the Trustee Bank.

Deposits are being made monthly to the Trustee Bank for retirement of bonded indebtedness as required.

The average number of residents for the year ending June 30, 1977 was 91. This was a decrease of 4 from the prior year. Resident accounts receivable shows an increase of \$2,534.06 over the prior year.

Insurance coverage was increased again this year on the administrator's house from \$38,500.00 to \$41,500.00. The Baskett house remains the same at \$60,000.00. The nursing home and contents was also raised this year from coverage of \$721,000.00 to \$725,000.00. The home also has coverage for workmen's compensation and liability insurance.

There were additions to Furniture and Fixtures in the amount of \$1,199.55 and improvements to building of \$925.00 for the year.

Operating income reflects an increase of 5% for the year ended June 30, 1977. Operating expenses show an increase of 6.88% for the same period with greatest increase being in utilities and insurance.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policles

The Center reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provisions of that guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and

that guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds—Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property, plant and equipment are added to the unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for board-designated purposes are not considered to be restricted.

Basis of Accounting—The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period service is provided.

Inventories—Inventories, are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property and Equipment—Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation.

Investments Held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as a recipient for funds that could be invested. Funds held by the Foundation, included herein at cost or market value at date of receipt of donation, were derived from contributions both by the retirement center and individual donors for the retirement center as beneficiary. 2. Expansion

Prepaid Professional Fees—\$27,784 has been expended in architectural and planning costs at the Center. It will be allocated to costs of quadruplexes and apartments

constructed.

Community Activity Center—A campaign was held in 1976 to raise \$250,000 in contributions to construct an activities center for the retirement center. At December 31, 1977, a total of \$220,925 was pledged, of which \$70,361 (\$144,133—1976) remain uncollected at that date. The estimated cost of the activities center approximates \$300,000, exclusive of furnishings and equipment.

Baptist Laymen's Corporation has entered into negotiations with Oklahoma Industries Authority for the proposed issuance of bonds in the approximate amount of \$2,000,000 to provide funds for the construction of the activities center and a proposed 100 unit apartment project. This transaction had not been completed at December 31, 1977.

3. Capitalized Lease Obligations (Bonds Payable)

On June 10, 1964, land on which the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

As of July 15, 1971, the Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority, which organization then issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. On this same date the Oklahoma Industries Authority subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years at an annual rental equal to the annual debt service requirement of the Authority on bonds issued as described below. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981 for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued over the life of the bond issue.

On July 1, 1974, the Corporation transferred back to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma all of the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center's real and personal property used in its operations. The Corporation retained approximately 27 acres of land in trust for the Convention. Baptist Laymen's Corporation acts as the governing body of the Center for the Convention.

Monthly payments were made to the sinking fund in accordance with the bond indenture for the retirement of bond principal and interest, and trustee expenses. The sinking fund balance at December 31, 1977 was \$12,114 (1976—\$14,113).
