Second Amended Articles of Incorporation

of Baptist General Convention

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the abovementioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and

institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the abovementioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

WITNESS the corporate name duly subscribed, with corporate seal affixed, this 15th day of May, 1961, A. D.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent

and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee

shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their actions shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Articles III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is

understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than the officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called Board meeting, the President and Executive Director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the Board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommenda-

tion, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 5. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 6. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. **PRESIDENT**—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER** — The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations,

and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of Executive Director-Treasurer becomes vacant:

(1) In the event the vacancy of the office of Executive Director-Treasurer occurs between sessions of the Convention, the Associate Executive Director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the Board of Directors.

(2) A Search Committee of seven members of the Board of Directors shall be elected without nomination by the Board of Directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.

(3) When the Committee has a nomination to make to the Board, a meeting of the Board of Directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the Board of Directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the Convention.

(4) The person elected by the Board of Directors shall serve until the Convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.

Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contacts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto: and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.

Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

Resolutions

Concerning Baptist Churches

A resolution concerning "Baptist churches" was adopted by the Convention November 10, 1949.

"Be it resolved that the words 'Baptist churches' which appear in Article II, Section 1, be interpreted to mean churches that are sound in faith and practice, and

"Be it further resolved, that churches which accept alien immersion, practice open communion or affiliate with the Federal Council, World Council or similar unionizing organization, shall be considered unsound in faith and practice."

Charter and Bylaws

of

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and

degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

**BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY,
A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION****February 26, 1980**

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in October on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect its officers, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of April, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice

of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and an Assistant Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first meeting of the University's fiscal year.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary from the State of Oklahoma or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 12. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 13. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semi-annual meeting in April of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 14. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 15. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of the Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The

Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 16. There shall be formed from the membership of the Board of Trustees an Executive Committee consisting of not more than seven members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

The following officers of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Secretary of Board of Trustees.

The following Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the Board of Trustees, who are appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Committee on Student Development, Chairman of Committee on Academic Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Business Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Development Affairs.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be Secretary of the Executive Committee.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session and to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the Board of Trustees; said Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Section 17. The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

Section 18. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III

No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and

otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;

2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;

3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;

4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;

5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and

6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII**Members**

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII**Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes**

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IX**Prohibitions to assure tax-exempt status**

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X**Dissolution**

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI**Adoption of Amended Articles**

1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.

2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the ____ day of _____, 1974.

3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

Amended Bylaws

of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

(Effective December 20, 1974)

ARTICLE I

Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

Meetings

2.1 **Separate Meetings of Members Not Required.** It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of the directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.

2.2 **Annual Meeting.** The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.

2.3 **Other Meetings.** A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.

2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.

2.5 **Notice of Meetings.** Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

ARTICLE III

Officers

3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.

3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President

shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

4.2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.

4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that at any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.

4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for

publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

4.4 **Vice Presidents.** There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 **Secretary.** The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V

Directors

5.1 **Duties and Restrictions.** The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.

5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

5.2 **Election of Directors and Term of Office.** In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist

General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as Directors.

5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.

5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairmen of all standing committees and the President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.

5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.

5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE VI

Administration of Funds and Property

6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.

6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

(a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full

accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

(b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA,
CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE VIII

Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer or employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.

8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

(a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.

(b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

(c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

(d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.

(e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.

(f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.

(g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:

(1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;

(2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;

(3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;

(4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

(5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or non-negotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

(h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.

(i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

ARTICLE I

Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II

Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III

Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meeting.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V

President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI

Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. **POWERS AND DUTIES.** The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. **POWERS AND DUTIES.** The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X**Notice of Regular Meetings**

Section 1. **DISPENSED WITH.** Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI**Amendments**

Section 1. **METHOD OF AMENDMENT.** These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII**Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds**

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Tulsa

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION OF TULSA.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The corporation is formed exclusively for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), and particularly the following purposes:

(a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.

(b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or

assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

(c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

(d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.

(e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees; or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.

(f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.

(g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:

(1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;

(2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;

(3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;

(4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

(5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or non-negotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

(h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.

(i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and

in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was seventeen (17). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the Administrator of Lackey Manor in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, or their successors in office, shall at all times be Directors of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Owasso, Oklahoma, on the 28th day of September, 1979, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

John D. Setser, Calvin Vogt, Howard Doak, Charles Leake, Bert McElroy, Joe Huitt, Norman Farrell, J. Ray Smith, John Crain, Claude H. Rogers, Joseph R. Coleman, Al Geiger, Victor Thompson, Robert D. McCullough, Joe Moore, John Nikkel, Joseph M. Best, and Joe L. Ingram, Ex-Officio and Don Donalson, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner or to such organization or organizations organized or operating exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Directors shall determine and which disposition has been approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District

"The Committee on Credentials recommends that the 500 messengers from the churches who have registered to date, as duly elected messengers from the churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention, under the terms set forth in Article II of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of State of Oklahoma, and other such messengers who shall properly register during the convention, constitute the 1980 Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

The motion carried to approve the report.

7. Robert Helmich, director of associational missions, Muskogee, gave the report of the Program Committee.

"The Program Committee recommends that the program that is printed and distributed among the messengers, serve as the official program for this 75th annual session of the Baptist General Conven-

tion of the State of Oklahoma, with such changes as may become necessary throughout the convention. We further recommend that all matters of new business be presented by Wednesday afternoon in order that the Program Committee might announce the time set for the discussion of such business."

8. Hale A. Dixon, recording secretary, acknowledged fraternal greetings from the following state conventions: Illinois, Texas, Georgia, Maryland, Kansas-Nebraska, Virginia, Mississippi, California and Kentucky.

The motion carried to have proper replies sent to these conventions.

9. Joe L. Ingram, executive director-treasurer, addressed the convention, speaking on the subject "What Mean These Stones?" He recalled the accomplishments of the convention, calling attention to the fundamental principles of our faith and practice, that have guided us in the Lord's work.

10. Paul Magar led in singing "How Firm a Foundation."

11. Jerry Sullaway, pastor, Emmanuel Southern Church, Edmond, introduced the following motion:

"Article IV of the Charter and Bylaws of Oklahoma Baptist University states, 'The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.' Therefore, in keeping with the intent of Article IV and because I believe that the Baptists of Oklahoma are a people of the Book and because I believe that as Baptists we want a University that is distinctly Baptist, I move that the administration, the president, and the trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University be instructed by this convention to hire, from this day forth, only those men and women who are Baptist in name, in principle, in belief, in worship, and in action for those positions that become vacant in administration and classroom instruction and any other position that would reflect upon teaching, theology and doctrine."

This matter was referred to the program committee for consideration at the business session time on Wednesday.

12. Keith Hart, Mustang, gave his testimony concerning his evangelistic work and how God had healed him of cancer.

13. Albert McClellan, associate executive secretary, director of program planning, Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee, Nashville, Tenn., spoke to the convention on the theme "A New Commitment to Bold Missions."

Oklahoma Baptist University

E. Eugene Hall, President

As Eugene Hall began his fourth year as president, Oklahoma Baptist University was experiencing a renewed emphasis in providing a Christian atmosphere and activities.

One of President Hall's priorities has been to implement a values-centered curriculum with a special emphasis on Christian values. In the unified study courses, which all students must take, there is a conscious effort being made to understand and impart the traditional values of Christians.

Hall initiated a spring revival and personally led in all phases of the preparation for it. The preacher for the on-campus revival was Dan Griffin, pastor of Cliff Temple Church, Dallas; Don Blackley, from Shiloh Terrace Church, Dallas, led the music. Both are OBU graduates. In addition to the revival, a Religious Focus Week was sponsored by the Baptist Student Union and led by Tom Nettles, assistant professor of church history at Southwestern Seminary.

This past summer, one of Hall's dreams became a reality: a university chaplain for OBU. The new chaplain is Tom Wilks, formerly the director of student ministries for greater St. Louis and a former pastor. He is responsible for counseling students, planning and leading the chapel services, and coordinating all religious activities on campus.

In the religion department, Rowena Strickland retired after teaching Bible for 26 years, but she will continue teaching part-time. Warren McWilliams, in his fourth year of teaching at OBU, was elected chairman of the religion department. There were two additions to the religion faculty: Slayden Yarbrough, formerly a teacher at Southwest Baptist College in Missouri, and Dick Rader, former missionary to Zambia and South Africa.

Also, the religion department established two new degree programs, one in foreign missions and the other in home missions. The programs are the first among Baptist colleges and universities. A degree program in church business administration was also established.

One of the most unique and successful programs offered at OBU this year was an Alcohol Abuse Seminar initiated by Gary Farley, WMU professor of sociology, and implemented in cooperation with the Christian Life Committee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. About 150 attended the two-day seminar featuring numerous speakers from around the nation. The theme for the seminar was "Alcohol Abuse is a Sin—How Shall We Minister?"

A giant step in providing better accommodations was undertaken this past year with the \$3.5 million renovation of WMU Memorial Dormitory for women and Brotherhood Dormitory for men. The capacity of these two dorms is over 600 students, nearly 60 percent of the total housing on campus. All existing areas of both dorms were made "like new," whole new areas were created, air conditioning installed in both dorms for the first time, and ramps and elevators were installed for the handicapped. The purpose is to provide accommodations which will be the most conducive for the students' living, learning and personal growth.

A significant step was taken in the administration of the Prichard scholarship fund. Heretofore, Prichard scholarships were given only to students committed to the preaching ministry or to missions. As of this year, Prichard funds may be used to provide scholarships for students committed to other kinds of ministry such as youth, education, music, and recreation.

Of the nearly 1,550 students enrolled at OBU last year, approximately 432 were committed to a religious vocation—ministers (185), missions (131), church music (75), religious education (34), and church secretary (7).

There were 274 graduates this past year. The academic programs with the most graduates were business and administration (51), religion (47), and music (42). Twenty-six percent, or 72, of the graduates qualified for teacher certification.

One notable development at OBU this past year has been the election of three faculty and staff members to Southern Baptist boards. Tom Terry, vice-president of business affairs, is serving on the Sunday School Board; William Neptune, provost, is in his second term on the Foreign Mission Board, and Max Brattin, assistant professor of economics, is serving on the Annuity Board.

An exciting venture was undertaken last year—the production of a television special. Funding for the program was provided by several alumni and friends of the university. Produced in conjunction with the SBC Radio-Television Commission and directed by James Woodward, dean of the OBU school of Fine Arts, the 30-minute program has already aired on several commercial television stations throughout Oklahoma. It will be used the next couple of years to promote OBU on other TV stations, in churches and with visitors to campus.

The motion carried to approve the report.

Evangelism

Jerry Don Abernathy, Director

The climate of evangelism is great. This year we have seen one of our Oklahoma churches win and baptize the largest number of people ever recorded by any Southern Baptist Church, the largest number of professions ever recorded at Falls Creek, and indications

are that when all reports are received the largest number of baptisms ever recorded in the history of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. I believe these facts indicate that we are doing what the dear Lord wills for us to do. He has called us into a place of leadership in Oklahoma and our nation.

Increase Conversions

The goal of increasing conversions and baptisms by 10 percent each year is not only realistic but necessary as we obey our Lord. Here are some suggestions which, when implemented will help a church achieve the goal.

(1) Adopt the process of growing an evangelistic church. In light of the fact that churches of all sizes and locations have come alive evangelistically when they apply the evangelistic-growth principles we can no longer justify evangelistic failure. Instead, pastors should lead churches to adopt biblical principles and basic practices to reach their community for Christ. Our department will conduct a conference to teach these principles and procedures in all associations.

(2) Conduct great revivals in our churches. We are encouraging every church to participate in **Simultaneous Revivals** in 1981. North half of the state March 22-29, south half of the state March 29-April 5. Churches should also conduct a youth revival, another week-long or four-day revival, and a one-day revival in the fall in connection with high attendance day, Oct. 25, 1981. Revival planning is one crucial need today. Our department is working to develop resources for revival preparation.

(3) Continue to make Falls Creek and other camps and assemblies great evangelistic efforts. The record number of professions of faith at Falls Creek in 1980 should encourage everyone to do all we can to win the lost youth through summer camps. Church leaders, BGCO staff, teachers, counselors, musicians, and speakers should make evangelism a constant concern. Our department is committed to doing all we can to counsel effectively and help churches follow up all decisions made at Falls Creek.

(4) Train personal soul-winners through a process of witness training multiplication. Up to now witness training has basically been through programs such as Lay Evangelism schools, TELL Witness training, WOW Witness training for youth, and Witness Training modules. These effective programs will continue. Also we are working with the Southern Baptist Convention evangelism leadership in pilot testing of a new process. Two Oklahoma churches are among the testing churches. Our ultimate goal is to help all Oklahoma churches develop their witness training process.

(5) Conduct pastor-led and teacher-led departmental and class evangelistic-decision services for older children, youth and adults in Sunday school and Vacation Bible School. For these efforts, our department will assist any church with suggested approaches and sample materials. In the fall of 1981, we encourage every Sunday

school class for older children, youth and adults to conduct a decision session on High Attendance-Harvest Sunday, Oct. 25, 1981.

(6) Pray for the Philippine crusades Feb. 10-March 2, 1981. In cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board, we have been enlisting 65 preachers and 20 singers to conduct evangelistic crusades in the Philippine Islands. The goal is to see 30,000 decisions for Christ with 10,000 baptized, resulting in 100 new churches being established. All Oklahoma Baptist churches are being asked to undergird this mission effort with prayer. The preachers and singers are being sent by their churches as a missionary expenditure. Our department is coordinating this project.

The Past Year in Review

Youth Evangelism Conferences

The 1979 Youth Evangelism Conferences recorded an attendance of over 10,000 participants. Three separate conferences were held in Tulsa, Lawton and Oklahoma City.

In 1980 under the direction of Clyde Cain we are having one statewide conference in Norman at the Lloyd Noble Civic Center. For the 1980 Youth Evangelism Conference, we expect to have 12,000 participants to hear Bailey Smith, Ron Dunn, Nilon Elliott, Andy and Phil Deitz, David Ring, and Gabriel.

State Evangelism Conference

The 1980 Evangelism Conference continued the annual challenge in depth and was marked by full houses, great singing and compelling preaching.

The 1981 Evangelism Conference will follow the cry of Psalm 85:6. "Revive us again that thy people may rejoice in thee." Spiritual awakening is the theme. Sessions will cover the aspects of revival-awakening: characteristics, hinderances, instruments, urgency, and heart cry for revival. Our guest leaders include: Adrian Rogers, Stephen Olford, Russell Dilday, Bailey Smith, Junior Hill, Beverly Terrell and John Havlik.

Evangelists Preachin' and Singin' Fest

We are moving this program from Wednesday morning to Monday morning preceding the Evangelism Conference from 9:30 until noon. This conference will allow pastors and conference attenders to meet and hear Oklahoma evangelists and evangelistic singers.

Religious Education

Bill C. Haggard, Director

Your department of Religious Education continues to focus on helping the local church in reaching, teaching and training people for Christ. The major area of work is leadership training for church workers in outreach, Bible teaching and church member training. Jesus said, "Go . . . , teach . . . , baptizing them. Teaching them to

observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you" (Matt. 28:19-20). In these words we find the heart of the work of the church. Helping the church accomplish that task is the work of this department.

Personnel

Field workers in the department include: Robert Audd, director of Church Training; Billy Allen, director of adult education and associational projects; Ann Gardner, director of youth education; and Darlene Koch, director of childhood education.

A very efficient staff of secretaries include: Mrs. Joan Eischen, Mrs. Sybil Cox, Mrs. Ann Evans, Mrs. Lou Rodriguez and Mrs. Pauline Self.

Statistics

Sunday school enrolment was reported at 339,906 with one association failing to report 736, making a total state enrolment of 340,642, a slight increase over the previous year.

Enrolment in Vacation Bible School reached 130,260 which is an increase of 4,358 over the previous year. Total professions of faith were 2,931 and 22,954 prospects were discovered. Almost 23 percent of the previous year's prospects who were visited enrolled in Sunday school and 8 percent of these new members made professions of faith.

Church Training enrolment was reported at 88,330 which is a small decline over the previous year. "M" Night attendance was 8,169, an increase over the previous year. Thirty-seven associations reported an "M" Night.

Highlights of Last Year

"Bold Mission Thrust" has staggered our imagination with its possibilities. In aiding the churches with "Bold Growing," four regional Sunday School Growth Conferences were conducted in which approximately 1,600 pastors and workers participated. Specially prepared growth manuals were used in these conferences. Age level growth workbooks were also prepared for use in building departmental growth programs.

The continued emphasis on growth and evangelism in the Sunday school is reflected in the use of the "Reaching" series books. Additional emphases are being planned for the future.

Individual churches continue to use the ACTION Sunday school enrolment plan and the Growth Spiral. A large number of churches are using the Super Spiral which is an accelerated version of the Growth Spiral.

A state Bible Teaching Improvement Conference was conducted in Ponca City with 860 participants. A total of 28 central leadership training schools were conducted, 11 of which were jointly sponsored by the Department of Religious Education.

Two leadership seminars were conducted at Falls Creek for Sunday school leadership, drawing over 400 workers from across Oklahoma.

Over 70 Adult Start-a-Class team members received training in a state meeting resulting in over 84 new units up to this time.

In two state VBS training meetings, every association in the state was represented with over 350 total participants. As a result, 67 associational VBS clinics were conducted.

Church Training projects and programs included twin state Church Training Convention meetings with an attendance of 325; a Baptist Doctrine Study Clinic with 32 church leaders; four area Church Training Curriculum Studies with 102 age group workers present; a state Youth Speakers Tournament and Bible Drill; and a conference on conserving the results of evangelism.

A special series of meetings, Talk About Church Training (TACT) Conferences were conducted in 19 associations with 479 leaders and pastors attending.

Other highlights included a State Library/Media Center Meeting, four Equipping Center Clinics, four Family Life Conferences, a Week-day Early Education Workshop, a state Church Building Conference, a state Bus/Children's Worship Conference, two January Bible Study Clinics and a Pilot Bible Venture Campaign in Tulsa.

Report of the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

C. Fred Williams, President

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was established by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November, 1946. The Foundation is a child of, responsible to and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma through a board of directors of 16 people elected by the Convention. The Foundation's articles of incorporation as amended on Dec. 20, 1974 and approved by a vote of the board of directors of the Convention on May 27, 1975, point out that the primary purpose of the Foundation is to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money, other property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of the gospel of Jesus Christ as represented by the agencies, institutions and departments of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Since the Foundation is the only incorporated trust agency of the Convention and since the Convention has directed all of its agencies, institutions and departments to transfer all endowment funds which come to them to the Foundation for managing, the Foundation bears a double responsibility both to the Convention and to its agencies, departments and institutions.

The board of directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, therefore, makes this report to the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma with an awareness of the responsibility under which it serves.

The report for the year concluded July 31, 1980 shows that the total endowment and capital needs assets held and administered by the Foundation were \$25,122,908.01. Total receipts for the same period were \$4,391,919.38 and total earnings from investments were \$2,539,120.81. This is the most ever earned by the Foundation in one year and reflects a 10.44 percent earnings on average assets for the period including the non-income producing assets such as life estates. These endowment and capital needs funds are managed in strict compliance with the trust instruments created by those who gave them.

The business and professional people who comprise the Foundation's board of directors are active members of Baptist churches. They provide general guidelines for making major decisions concerning the management of the assets. The Foundation's administrative staff carry out these directions as administrators. Current board mem-

bers are: Otis Duran, chairman; Henry Arnall Jr., Alfred J. Ashton, Paul Box, vice-chairmen; Howard J. Doak, Willis Fry, Joe F. Gary, Robert N. Hammons, Cecil R. Ivey, Eugene N. Knight, James M. Loepp, Mike Marrs, Wayne M. Pack, Bill Presnell and Donald L. Sullivan.

The Convention's Committee on Nominations will recommend to this convention four men for election to four-year terms on the Foundation's board of directors. Four members (Alfred Ashton, Otis Duran, Willis Fry and Robert Hammons) rotate off this year. We are greatly indebted to these competent and dedicated men and hereby express our deepest appreciation to them.

For administrative purposes and distribution of responsibilities, the activities of the Foundation are divided into six sections over which the president provides general supervision and direction. The sections are: **Accounting Services, Church Loan and Property Management Services, Estate Planning Services, Communication and Estate Stewardship Services, Computer and Special Investment Services and Personal Trustee Services.** This report is presented accordingly.

Church Loan and Property Management Services

Church Loan Services:

The church building loan fund is most beneficial for Baptist causes and churches. By direction of the board of directors up to 50

percent of the assets administered by the Foundation may be invested in the church building fund pool. As of July 31, 1980, 40 percent of the Foundation's assets were invested in the pool. When new funds are received the General Investment Committee of the board determines what portion of them is to be placed in the church building loan fund after which the Church Building Loan Committee reviews applications for loans by churches and upon approval of such loans the funds are made available to the churches.

The policies and regulations for church loans are discussed thoroughly with the leaders of each church making application for a loan. The first church building loan was made in 1954. Since that time more than 615 loans have been closed for a total exceeding \$25 million. During the past 12 months 31 loans have been made for a total of \$2,633,964. An additional 18 loans have been approved for \$1,625,000 which will be made available to churches upon the completion of construction.

As repayment by churches is made the principal is reinvested in the church building loan fund pool and made available to other churches while the interest or income paid is distributed to the Baptist cause or causes designated by those who gave the funds. Thus, both interest and principal go to support the causes which churches support through the Cooperative Program. More than \$7 million in interest has been distributed to Baptist causes since the beginning of the church building loan fund.

During the past 12 months 21 churches have paid their loans in full, 204 loans are now in existence for a total of \$10,903,732.82.

Property Management Services:

Management of all real property held by the Foundation is supervised by a committee of six members of the board of directors along with two other men who are professionals in the field. The committee meets upon call or each month when other committees meet. Decisions to sell, lease, rent, repair and renew leases are determined by the committee after conferring with Marvin H. Hall, vice-president in charge of property management and church loan services.

Real property held by the Foundation consists of houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and open grassland. The Foundation does not operate any business or farm but leases them to others for operation. Income from real estate rentals is distributed as directed by the donors. The Foundation leases grassland and farms on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential property is rented by the month for cash. Total value of all real estate held by the Foundation is in excess of \$3 million.

The highlight of the year was the gift made by Havis and Evelyn Watson of Stillwater. They created a Charitable Remainder Unitrust funded with real estate valued at \$366,000 from which they will receive income for life. Upon the death of the survivor of them, the income will be distributed annually to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the \$25 Million Campaign. **The Watsons made a gift to live on that will live on.**

Mineral interests held by the Foundation are supervised by a committee of seven board members and two additional men who are experts in the field. The committee meets each month and reviews lease offers, bonuses, rental delays and sales. Because of the accelerated search for energy this is a very busy committee. The Foundation holds mineral interests in nine states and 54 counties in Oklahoma. Unprecedented records have been set this year. At one committee meeting leases were approved with bonuses exceeding \$50,000. Two new oil wells have been completed in Stephens County, income from which is distributed to the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Estate Planning Services

Assistance in estate planning has become a major entity in the activities of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Several things have contributed to the growth of this service. Inflation, changing economy, a more mature population, the growing possibility of estate tax liability as well as an increasing awareness of the heartache created by the lack of planning have all made their impact.

A major reason for growth in this area is the fact that Baptist people are recognizing that their stewardship is incomplete unless God has a part in the distribution of their estates after death.

The number of requests to provide assistance in the preparation of wills, trust agreements and gift annuity contracts has been the greatest of any year in the history of the Foundation. In the period covered by this report (Aug. 1, 1979 through July 31, 1980) the Foundation staff assisted 1,175 people in securing information for the preparation of their wills. There were 10 gift annuity contracts signed, 16 trusts prepared in which Baptist causes were remembered and 24 wills admitted to probate.

A very valuable service performed by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma through the office of its president, is that of serving as executor or trustee when requested to do so and when Baptist causes are remembered in the will.

In addition to the Oklahoma City office these services may be requested through the Tulsa office located in the Tulsa Baptist Center, the Lawton office in the Comanche-Cotton Baptist Center in that city.

Many churches display an attractive placard furnished by the Foundation that keeps the membership informed as to the number of church members who have used the services of the Foundation in some type of estate planning.

Communication and Estate Stewardship Services

Key to the continued success of any worthwhile endeavor is good communication. Most certainly this is true of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as it seeks to establish relationships of trust and confidence with various groups of people. First among these are members and pastors of Baptist churches in Oklahoma. In addition, the Foun-

dation seeks to communicate its purposes and work to denominational leaders, attorneys, estate planning professionals and the public in general.

Such communication requires different methods. While one approach may prove to be effective with one group of people, another means of imparting information may be better received by another group. The art of communication is in determining which methods of communication produce the most positive responses from particular groups. This report includes some of the ways in which The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma attempts to communicate. Communication through special emphases:

Twice during each year churches associated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma observe an "estate stewardship emphasis." In January, the focus is on "making a Christian Will." During September (Baptist Foundation Month) the theme has to do with "making gifts during life from which one receives a life income." In promotion of these emphases, the Foundation supplies to the churches bulletin inserts in sufficient quantity to be distributed to their people. Last year more than 250,000 bulletin inserts were sent to more than 1400 churches. As a result, hundreds of Baptist people used the coupons on the inserts to request estate planning assistance from the Foundation.

Future Thrust is an educational program conducted by the Foundation in at least two associations each year. Last year, Foundation staff members spoke, led seminars and distributed literature in more than 80 churches in Tulsa and Comanche-Cotton Associations during September 1979 and January 1980.

Communication through scheduled events:

Each month during the year (except December) The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma hosts a dinner or luncheon meeting for attorneys in a different city or county of the state. The purpose of these meetings is to get acquainted with those of the legal profession, to share information about estate planning procedures and the purposes of the Foundation and to establish a future working relationship with attorneys as to the preparation of legal documents and the probate of estates. More than a hundred attorneys from Enid, Anadarko, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Muskogee, Duncan and Norman have attended such meetings.

Selected pastors from across the state are also invited to be guests of the Foundation on the third Friday of those months when the Foundation's Board meets as committees. Foundation staff members meet with the pastors to discuss the purposes and various aspects of the Foundation's work. In an informal setting the pastors have opportunity to ask questions and voice criticisms and observations. The pastors then sit in on the committee meetings of the Board. More than 125 pastors attended the one-day sessions last year.

Communication through speaking and preaching:

Foundation staff members preach Sunday by Sunday in different churches across the state. As pulpit guests in the absence of the

pastor, evangelists in revival meetings, or as speakers on special occasions they represent the ministries of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma where they preach.

To encourage preaching on the biblical doctrine of estate stewardship, the Foundation twice a year sends to pastors model sermons on an estate stewardship theme. These model sermons are selected from a number of sermon manuscripts submitted to the Foundation by pastors who have preached them from their own pulpits.

Communication through seminars and conferences:

Upon request, Foundation staff members conduct estate planning seminars in churches, at associational meetings and/or before special groups. Last year more than 40 seminars were conducted. Usually these seminars are 45 minutes to an hour in length and are held during the Church Training hour. However, several times during the year the Foundation also sponsors community-wide in-depth seminars led by attorneys and other estate planning professionals as well as members of the Foundation staff. Last year such seminars were conducted in Oklahoma City and Lawton.

Money management seminars are also among the services offered by the Foundation to churches and church related groups. During the past several years requests for this type seminar have greatly increased.

The State Training Meeting for Associational Officers is always an important meeting. This year was no exception as 15 associational Baptist Foundation representatives came to Oklahoma City for a two-day conference. The five-hour sessions had to do with how to communicate more effectively the work of the Foundation to the pastors and churches of the associations.

Communication through literature and materials:

Each year thousands of pieces of literature are distributed from our offices. This distribution is done through the mail in response to persons requesting additional information and as Foundation staff members speak across the state. Although some literature pieces are purchased from the Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, most of the literature pieces are written and produced by the Foundation staff. Among these are: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," "Estate Planning . . . A Christian Perspective," "Not All Foundations Are Made of Cement," "Future Thrust," "Personal Record Album," "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," and a book-mark.

New pieces of literature written this year include the pamphlets about the regional offices in Tulsa and Lawton: "In Tulsa to Serve You" and "In Lawton to Serve You." Also, a pamphlet "A Better Way" was written and produced to be distributed in conjunction with the showing of the film by the same title.

The "attorneys packet" is a set of professionally prepared materials distributed exclusively to attorneys in Oklahoma. Among the

materials in the packet are specimen copies of wills, trusts, charitable remainder annuity trusts, charitable remainder unitrusts, gift annuity contracts, etc. Since the development of the packet in the spring of 1978 more than 600 have been distributed through the Foundation.

Communication through the media:

Perhaps the most effective way to communicate with the largest number of Baptist people is through the **Baptist Messenger**, the weekly magazine of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, whose circulation is nearly 100,000. Each week the president or one of the vice-presidents of the Foundation writes an article for the **Baptist Messenger** dealing with some facet of Christian estate planning or some activity of the Foundation's ministry. In addition, space is made available to the Foundation for the promotion of special emphases such as "Make Your Will Month" or "Baptist Foundation Month."

Care 'N Share, the monthly periodical of the Department of Child Care of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma also provides space twice a year (January and September) to the Foundation for the promotion of Christian estate stewardship.

When a Foundation staff member has a speaking engagement in a church or before another group, a press release about the staff member and The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is sent to that local newspaper for publication. The same procedure is followed upon the election of persons to the Foundation's board of directors and for other special events such as an estate planning seminar or an unusual gift through the Foundation which would be of interest to the community. The secular press has been most cooperative in printing articles and news stories related to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Public service announcements about estate planning in general are provided by the Foundation to radio stations for inclusion in their broadcast schedule. These 30, 45 and 60-second spots are on a reel-to-reel tape and in script form. Sixty-second television spot announcements about The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma are also supplied to television stations in Oklahoma. The First Baptist Church, Guymon, operates a weekend television station in the Oklahoma Panhandle and uses the television spots each weekend.

Communication through audio-visual aids:

"A Better Way" is a 20-minute, 16mm color movie which dramatically portrays the importance of estate planning, especially the making of a will. Written and produced by Family Films of Panorama City, Calif., it was adapted to Foundation purposes by the addition of a two-minute trailer explaining the functions and services of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Six copies of the film were purchased and made available to Oklahoma churches for showing at Sunday evening services. Since Jan. 1, 1980, 118 churches have shown the movie. The response to "A Better Way" has been most gratifying and, as the result, our office has received an increasing number of requests for estate planning assistance.

"Today, Tomorrow . . . Until" is a 15-minute color slide presentation shown to pastors and attorneys. Its content has to do with the Foundation's beginnings until the present, an overview of Baptist causes which the Foundation seeks to serve and an explanation of Foundation activities such as investments, church building loans, estate planning, services as executor, trustee, etc. This color slide presentation is shown on an average of twice a month.

Also available to churches or any other interested group is the color slide presentation "Not All Foundations Are Made of Cement." The 15-minute presentation prepared in November, 1979, tells the story of seven persons with whom the Foundation has or has had a special relationship. In telling their stories, all of the services offered by the Foundation are also set forth.

Communication through courtesy items:

One of the things for which The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is known is the felt tip pens distributed across the state. During the past several years more than 1,000 pens have been given away. They have been distributed at meetings conducted by Foundation staff members, associational meetings, state conventions and other meetings. Coin purses bearing the name, address and phone numbers of the Foundation have also been distributed.

Each year The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma provides program covers to the associations for the printing of the agenda of their annual meetings. Some 29 associations used this service in 1980 with more than 10,000 covers being furnished by the Foundation. This same service is available to churches for such special occasions as homecoming events, building dedications, anniversary observance, etc.

Computer and Special Investment Services

Computer Services:

We are now entering a new era of work in this area. By the first of the year we are scheduled to be "on line" with an in-house system. This will enable us to have a better turn around time as well as more information at a cost equal to or less than we are now paying for this service.

Special Investment Services:

This area of work requires consultation with the chief accountant, bookkeeper and the General Investment and Equity Investment Committees of the board. The two investment pools administered by the Foundation are the Equity and Fixed Income with 17 percent and 13 percent of the total assets in each pool respectively.

Student Loans and Scholarships:

The Foundation has handled student loans and scholarship funds since 1947. Over \$850,000 is now held in scholarship endowment. These trusts, established through bequests in wills and by outright gifts, are primarily for the benefit of students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. However, there is a limited number available for

other schools. The loans carry a nominal interest which is payable quarterly while the student is in school. Repayment of the principal begins when the student graduates or leaves school. The past year 54 loans were made totaling \$42,260; scholarships were awarded totaling \$60,689 including the Willie Taylor Scholarship Trust established for Indian students.

By far the largest scholarship fund, the Louise Prichard Trust, is for ministerial and mission volunteer students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. Annual distribution of more than \$250,000 is made through this trust.

The D. N. Caulk Student Loan Fund for Black students has loans in effect totaling \$3,821.86.

The Worten Orphan's Home Alumni Fund has loans in effect totaling \$1,253.44.

Personal Trustee Services

An unusual service rendered by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma through its president is that of personal trustee services. Since Jan. 1, 1980, H. Truman Maxey has served on a part-time basis as administrative assistant for personal trustee services.

The funds for individuals are handled in the same manner as funds handled for Baptist causes. Through our personal trustee representative the needs for health care and personal necessities are provided. Several of these folk with whom we work are in nursing homes. Others still live in their own homes. Upon the death of such individuals the assets remaining in the trusts are distributed to Baptist causes and individuals as designated in the trust instruments.

Brotherhood

Laddie Adams, Director

Figures released by the Southern Baptist Convention Statistics Department show Oklahoma Brotherhood enrolment for 1979 as 15,729. Churches are urged to check the annual associational letter to be sure all work is reported.

Out of 39 reporting associations, 30 met their goal of establishing a gain of at least four new units over 1978.

OKLAHOMA BROTHERHOOD DEPARTMENT served Oklahoma Baptists by:

—training 495 men in 15 Brotherhood/Woman's Missionary Union Area Training meetings in 1979.

—promoting and assisting churches with three mission offerings: Edna McMillian Offering for State Missions; Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions and Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions.

—providing inspiration and fellowship for 476 men at the Baptist Men's Rally, Nov. 9, Trinity, Oklahoma City.

—securing the newly elected director of Brotherhood Commission, SBC, Jim Smith, to speak at the Brotherhood sponsored luncheon for 234 people at the State Convention, Nov. 13, Immanuel, Tulsa, and introducing him to the convention during the Brotherhood report.

—encouraging participation of churches in Baptist Men's Day, Jan. 27. Excellent reports were received from 242 of the churches that participated, listing over 25 different ways of observing Baptist Men's Day.

—renewal coordinator training of 21 people, Camp Zephyr, Sandia, Texas, Feb. 7-9.

—presenting mission opportunities and information from Home and Foreign Mission Boards to 105 career mission volunteers, Oklahoma Baptist University, Feb. 15.

—preparing a Royal Ambassador Congress for 1,277 men and boys at Del City First Southern, Feb. 29 and March 1.

—assisting 36 men to attend specialized training at the Regional Brotherhood Institute at Camp Copass, Texas, March 27-29.

—training 44 associational Brotherhood officers concerning their responsibilities at the State Associational Officers Training meeting, First Church, Oklahoma City, April 25-26.

—having 965 attending the seven weeks of Camp Hudgens in 1980. Of this total, 737 were campers. Decisions totaled 310: professions of faith 88, rededications 157 and special service 65. This was the 21st year of camp and the total professions of faith during these years have now exceeded 1,000.

—six mini-camps at Camp Hudgens with a total attendance of 249.

—Lad and Dad camp at Camp Hudgens with an attendance of 29.

—planning the Falls Creek recreation program during the five weeks of the assembly and hired and supervised the 31 young people who directed the activities.

—providing leadership trainers for Brotherhood/Woman's Missionary Union week at Glorieta which was well attended by Oklahoma Baptists.

—a Couples in Missions and Ministry Retreat at Falls Creek, Aug. 14-16, where 46 people were taught how to serve the Lord by couples—both in their homes and churches.

—Lay-Led revival training May 16, Oklahoma City, for 33 men whose expertise will assist Oklahoma Baptist churches plan, conduct and evaluate a Lay-Led revival.

—providing a yearly training session for the associations having World Missions Conferences and conduct a clinic in each association

for associational and local church committees in preparation for their World Missions Conference. Seven associations had World Missions Conferences in 1979 with 43,067 people in attendance.

—40 families were assisted from the Oklahoma Baptist Disaster Relief fund through these associations: Craig-Mayes, \$1,150; Tillman, \$1,000; Backham-Mills, \$2,500; Johnston-Marshall, \$500; and Muskogee, \$8,950.

—nine men responded to the Brotherhood Commission's request to bring our Disaster Unit to Texas to assist in feeding displaced families after hurricane "Allen" in August.

—nine men also went to assist California Baptists with mud-out and repair to water damaged homes last March.

Church Music

Glenn Boyd, Director

Psalm 96:1-3: "Sing unto the Lord a new song: sing unto the Lord, all the earth. Sing unto the Lord, bless his name; shew forth his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the heathen, his wonders among all people."

As with the psalmist of old, the design of the Music Department is to help equip persons to declare the glory of the Lord among all people. The 1979-80 church music year has been packed with opportunities for Oklahoma Baptist church music leaders to become better skilled to use music to share the gospel.

Fundamentals of Church Music Schools, almost without exception, led the way in meeting needs of the smaller church. Other opportunities especially designed for leadership included a State Keyboard Festival for organists and pianists and a State Handbell Leadership Conference with response even from outside Oklahoma. Four Area Church Music Readiness Conferences provided leadership training for pre-school through adult choir leadership as well as special emphasis in the use of instrumental (band and orchestra) music in the church. Training was also made available to associational music directors at the Associational Officers State Training Meeting in Oklahoma City, and for ministers of music at a Building an Effective Music Ministry Seminar in Tulsa.

Festivals were held for young musicians choirs and youth choirs on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University with choirs from all areas of the state represented and two area Adult Choir Retreats provided more choir experience for adults.

With the retirement of our very dear friend and department director, Gene Bartlett, this year brought many changes. After Bartlett's 26 years, music at Falls Creek was under the direction of Paul

Magar for the summer of 1980, awaiting the arrival of the newly appointed department director, Glenn T. Boyd, to return to Oklahoma from Kenya East Africa.

Also returning to our staff as secretary to work alongside Mary June Tabor is Judy Trent from Newcastle, First.

For the first time in many months, the Church Music Department staff is complete. The future is exciting and bright as church music needs are sought out and met in the churches, that the wonders of our Lord may be made known to all people.

Annuity and Ministerial Services

J. T. Roberts, Director

Annuity

After two quarters of substantial growth and service, the Southern Baptist Annuity Board apparently is in the midst of a "watershed" year in its ministry as the denominational retirement and insurance programing institution.

Darold H. Morgan, Board president, used the word "watershed" to describe progress made by the Dallas-based agency through the end of the second quarter.

While gains were made in many areas, Morgan referred primarily to steps that have been taken by the Annuity Board that "are necessary to develop and implement a program which satisfies the requirements of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) of 1974 and the increasing regulations of the Internal Revenue Service."

Morgan noted that in-depth planning studies have been conducted which will affect the Annuity Board's ministry for years.

As of June 30, 1980, total assets held in trust by the Annuity Board rose to \$703,510,467. At the end of 1979, assets stood at \$667,521,000.

Premiums and dues through the first two quarters of 1980 amounted to \$30,437,746. A year earlier, the total was \$31,856,216.

By June 30, the Annuity Board paid a record \$10,088,703 in benefits to 15,474 annuitants.

Oklahoma State Convention Report

Oklahoma has: 857 churches and associations; 1,255 employees participating.

Through June, a total of 22,496 churches and associations were participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program with 31,005 employees. The number of new retirement applications received in the program in your convention during the first six months was 56.

Ministerial Services

The basic services provided through the office of Annuity and Ministerial Services are:

—Maintain a biographical file on ministers and other church staff.

—Counsel with ministers, pulpit and other church committees.

—Promote a program of continuing education.

—Promote the retirement and insurance programs through the Annuity Board.

The church staff information service is being used extensively. Upon request, churches are assisted in securing pulpit supply and interim pastors.

A conference was held in November for the directors of missions at which time a representative of the Annuity Board served as a resource person.

Deacon-Pastor Conferences were held in 12 associations during January, February and March, 1980.

Meetings for Oklahoma students at Southern, Midwestern, and Southwestern Seminaries were held in February, 1980. Individual conferences were scheduled with students who requested them. Also, a luncheon was given for Southwestern Seminary students who are enrolled on the Oklahoma Baptist University campus.

Sixteen Seminary Extension Centers were active during 1979-80.

Three hundred fifty-nine pastors, directors of missions, other church staff, and laymen attended the 1979 Bible Conference. The 1981 State Bible Conference, May 4-7, will feature M. C. Williams, pastor, Roger Williams Baptist Church, Los Angeles, Calif.; Joe L. Ingram, executive director-treasurer, BGCO; Grady C. Cothen, president, The Sunday School Board, SBC. The book of Jeremiah will be taught by Roy L. Huneycutt, dean, School of Theology and professor of Old Testament Interpretation, Southern Baptist Theological Semi-

nary; and II Timothy will be taught by Daniel Holcomb, professor, New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary (formerly of Oklahoma Baptist University). Glenn Boyd and Paul Magar will bring the special music.

The motion carried to approve the report.

Baptist Messenger

Richard T. McCartney, Editor

The **Baptist Messenger** is completing its 68th year of publication and the 61st year since it was purchased by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and became its official news publication in 1919. The present editor will complete his first year of service Nov. 30.

The cooperative mission work of Oklahoma Baptists is made possible through the mutual trust and cooperative spirit of more than 1,400 churches who work together in the convention. Trust is not spontaneous. It results from confidence built up through understanding

and information. People learn to trust each other through experience. Sharing of mutual concerns and participating in mission responsibilities foster understanding between individuals and churches. The **Baptist Messenger** seeks to play a key role in building up the level of trust among Oklahoma Baptist churches through information.

A primary purpose for a state Baptist paper is to inform the readers. We seek to report accurately and completely those events and activities which illustrate the cooperative work of Oklahoma and Southern Baptists. Local church activities which may be of interest and help to others also are reported to encourage all the churches in their work. Statements and activities of other people that may have an impact on Baptist churches also are reported. Some stories are published to help broaden our readers' understanding of world events.

Trust is built on understanding and understanding is built on information. The **Baptist Messenger** is seeking to strengthen the work of all the churches, enhance the cooperative spirit of Oklahoma Baptists and increase our mission commitment.

Circulation of the **Baptist Messenger** is approximately 98,000. Most of these are mailed on the church budget plan which enables a church to send the **Messenger** to every family for only \$3.50 per family per year (seven cents per issue). Many churches, approximately 44 at present, utilize the front and/or back page of the **Baptist Messenger** to publish their church newsletters. The cost is very small in addition to member subscriptions. The saving in cost of postage, mailing list maintenance usually is greater than the total cost of publishing and mailing a special **Messenger** edition.

During the past year a page of letters from readers has been added to the **Messenger** to enable our readers to respond to the editorials and other concerns. It has been well received and regularly publishes letters on many subjects.

The **Baptist Messenger** belongs to Oklahoma Baptist churches. The staff is encouraged by the support and response of Oklahoma Baptists to their news publication.

The editorial staff of the **Baptist Messenger** consists of the editor; two associates, Fern Hurt and Bob Mathews; a news writer, Dana Williamson and secretary, Bettie Moore. The printing plant has been transferred to the office of the business director.

50. J. M. Gaskin, director of history, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, presented the report of the Historical Commission.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Historical Director

Persons who have served on the Historical Commission the past year were C. B. Lewis, Robert S. Jackson, Roy McKeown, Mrs. Joe Ray Land, Miss Lucy Smith, Don S. Wheat, Norman Lamb, M. E. Ramay and Mrs. Lowell Stephens.

Meetings

Two meetings of the commission were held during the year: The first was April 17, and the other Sept. 18. Both meetings were at the Baptist Building. This report will summarize the actions and projects to which the commission gave attention in these meetings.

Display

November 14, 1979, C. B. Lewis, then president of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society, announced completion of the Society's special project for the year. An attractive display case has been placed in the lobby of the Baptist Building's first floor. The director of history is responsible for arranging a variety of displays in the case exhibiting Oklahoma Baptist memorabilia.

Historical Society

The Historical Society by provision of its constitution and bylaws is auxiliary to the Historical Commission. In 1980, the active membership in the society included 101 annual memberships, 71 life, 20 institutional, 11 perpetual, and one honorary life for a total of 204. (The honorary life membership, held by E. W. Thornton, was terminated by Thornton's death on Oct. 2, 1980.)

Annual and life memberships are open to all interested individuals. The cost of an annual membership is \$2, and a life membership is \$25. Churches, libraries, museums and similar institutional organizations may purchase memberships for the same cost figures. All active members receive **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**, the society's official journal, twice yearly without additional charge.

Society Anniversary

The Historical Society will observe its 25th anniversary in 1981. This will coincide with the convention's year-long 75th anniversary celebration. The Historical Commission recommends a special anniversary session of the society during the early fall of 1981.

Chronicle Index

A comprehensive, cumulative index of **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle** for its first 20 years (Vols. I-XX) was published during the past year. Extra copies are available at a nominal cost of \$1 postpaid. Send orders to the director of history at OBU. One or more copies of this number should be in each church library in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma Baptist Collection

The OKLAHOMA BAPTIST COLLECTION is located on the third floor of the Mabee Learning Center at OBU. Known in past years as the Archives, this collection is the property of the convention. It is housed at OBU by the terms of an agreement made in 1955 between T. B. Lackey, then executive secretary-treasurer of the convention, and John W. Raley, at the time president of OBU. A portion of the total collection is OBU archival material, and is therefore under the administrative care of the university. Estimates vary from 20,000-30,000 items in the entire collection. The largest holdings are in **Annals**—associational, state and Southern Baptist. More than 8,000 volumes of **Annals** are in the holdings as reflected by an inventory. The collection is available without charge to any researcher.

Falls Creek History

In 1980, J. M. Gaskin's latest book was published. The title is, **Sights and Sounds of Falls Creek**. The book is an update and revision of Gaskin's **Falls Creek Story (1967)**. The new book sells for \$4.50. It is marketed by the Baptist Book Stores.

Falls Creek Poems

The director of history has a collection of poems by Albert McClellan and Sam Scantlan. Each poem in some way relates to Falls Creek. The commission voted April 17, 1980, to consider publication of these poems in a book as part of Falls Creek's 65th anniversary in 1982.

Other Books

In addition to previously approved titles, J. M. Gaskin has been authorized to author the following books: **Baptist Women in Oklahoma**, a WMU history; **Black Baptists in Oklahoma**; **A History of Baptist Education in Oklahoma** and an **Oklahoma Baptist Encyclopedia**.

In 1980, Gaskin edited and wrote for Vol. IV, **Encyclopedia of Southern Baptists**, due for publication in 1981. Oklahoma will have about 8,000 words in this volume, which will give the state approximately 60,000 words in all four volumes of the **Encyclopedia**.

Historical Marker

Plans are under way, with the commission's approval, to erect a historical marker at Tyrone, Okla. in 1981. The first Baptist church in the Panhandle was constituted there in 1894, and the first Baptist association in the Panhandle was organized there in 1904.

Workshops

During the past year the director has held 12 workshops on oral history and history-writing. This is an ongoing program for the churches and associations.

Recommendations

The commission submits these recommendations:

1. That the marker as planned be erected and dedicated at Tyrone.
2. That churches and associations be encouraged to observe anniversaries and write their histories.
3. That the schedule of books listed above be published as manuscripts may be finished (with the exception that the convention will not assume any financial liability in publishing **BLACK BAPTISTS IN OKLAHOMA**—cost of this project will be borne by the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention).
4. That the Historical Society be encouraged to work out details and promote historical tour in 1981 (three previous tours were successfully conducted in 1956, 1958 and 1961).
5. That the commission continue working with the OBU administration to finalize a definitive statement of relationship between the convention and the university on the policies for operating the OKLA-

HOMA BAPTIST COLLECTION.

6. That the Historical Society be encouraged to consider holding a special anniversary session in the early autumn of 1981 prior to the state convention, and that the regular annual meeting be held as usual during the 1981 convention session.

7. That the winning paper in the **GASKIN BAPTIST HISTORY AWARD** at OBU shall be published each year in **THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST CHRONICLE**.

8. That the director of history shall serve as director of the **OKLAHOMA BAPTIST COLLECTION**.

9. That churches and associations use the director of history as needed for workshops, history-writing training, anniversary planning, and other special Baptist history events.

10. That churches be encouraged to set up local historical collections in their libraries (media centers).

11. That each church and/or association which publishes its history be asked to supply at least two copies for the **OKLAHOMA BAPTIST COLLECTION**.

51. A New Commitment—To Make Disciples.

The following led in the discussion of this commitment.

(1) Bob Lee, director, Department of Student Work, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Student Work

Bob Lee, Director

Student Work in Oklahoma experienced another year of growth. This was all made possible because of the interest and cooperative spirit of Baptists in Oklahoma.

A new building has been completed and is being used at OCU. The facility at Carl Albert Junior College in Poteau has been doubled in space. New buildings are presently being built at El Reno Junior College, Seminole Junior College and Connors State College. Remodeling of facilities was completed at NEO at Miami, East Central at Ada and the University of Oklahoma.

The Student Department sent out 56 students as summer missionaries and supported BSU work in 15 states in new convention areas. Two special ministry teams went to Taiwan and Belize for several weeks during the summer. Numerous help teams were sent out by the various BSUs to assist BSUs in other states and to assist churches in Oklahoma. Students across Oklahoma raised \$105,000 to do mission work and to assist BSUs in the new convention areas.

Because of your prayers and your financial support we are able to continue to grow and strengthen our programs. The 1980 CP provides \$655,300 for BSU work. The 1981 figures will be \$762,500. In addition to this our churches and associations support our work locally with contributions in excess of half a million dollars. These dollars enable us to continue our strong emphases in the areas of evan-

gelism, Bible study, missions, worship, international work, churchmanship, discipleship and fellowship. Our major emphasis in 1980-81 will be in the area of evangelism. Each BSU will be sponsoring a revival on the campus in hopes of communicating the love of Christ to numbers of students that do not know him.

Our students continue to participate in activities that will enhance their spiritual growth. Several hundred students attended Glorieta Student Week this past summer. They also represented our state well at the Student Conference on World Missions at Nashville, and the Student Missions Conferences at Southwestern and Midwestern Seminaries. Attendances are up at such state meetings as Fall Conference (convention), Spring Retreat at Falls Creek, International Retreat, and the State Basketball Tournament.

All in all it was a year that Oklahomans can be proud of their student work programs across the state.

Christian Life Committee

Jerry Hall, Chairman

Introduction

Baptists believe that each person is responsible before God and that each person must make his own choices. Sometimes we may assume that everyone understands right from wrong, but is this true? Have the majority of the people been taught the morals of God? Do they know what the Bible says about gambling, laziness, divorce, marriage, family, energy conservation, Christian virtues, alcohol, the Lord's Day and other Christian concepts?

Many young people know of a new morality but nothing of God's morality which never changes. Who is responsible to tell them? We can talk about the problems but the solutions must come from God's word, God's leaders and God's people. We must be vocal and share God's answers.

We cannot meet all of man's needs inside the church on Sunday morning. Jesus dealt with people where they were. His method has always been the most effective means of reaching and teaching people. It is still effective. Through radio, television, newspaper, video and audio tapes and every possible means, we must reach people in the market place and in their homes.

The Christian Life Committee shares these current issues with you that you may instruct your world, where you are, of God's desires for them.

Christian Virtues

Three areas of concern: honesty, morality and ethics, are woven together, making it difficult to separate each without mentioning a part of the others.

I. **Honesty**—is an important tenet of our Christian walk that would keep us from engaging in inappropriate business practices. The Bible speaks of the profit from these business practices as "ill gotten gain," or "filthy lucre." A man spoke one day of having "a two-pocket operation." Yet, our Lord told us "to render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's." Or, in other words, be honest in our dealings not only with our fellow man but also with our government. Some folks who would be offended at the thought of not being honest with their neighbors would not think twice about cheating on their income tax. There are several passages in the Scripture relating to honesty:

Acts 6:3—"Men of honest report."

Romans 12:17—"Provide things honest in the sight of all men."

II Corinthians 8:21—"Provide things honest in the sight of God and men."

Philippians 4:8—"Whatsoever things are honest."

II. **Morality**—is perhaps one of the most pronounced problems of our day. In the early 1960's there was a group who wanted to

speak out on what they termed the "new morality." Billy Graham spoke to that phrase most appropriately when he replied that it was nothing more than the old immorality. Sin is still sin no matter how it may be labeled. It was the sins of immorality that brought heartache and judgment upon the people of Israel. It was the sins of immorality the Apostle Paul dealt with in Romans 1:24, where he spoke of God having to give them up because of lust of the flesh.

Our generation has been confronted with many different attitudes concerning morality. Some call it free love, testing the waters, while others describe it as mutual consent between two adults. God calls it fornication, and adultery. We are besieged throughout the summer months with short shorts, mini halters and open front blouses. As a child of God, women are told to be modest in their dress.

III. Ethics—deals especially with the principles of one's life. As stated in the opening paragraph, it is difficult to separate these words. The word honesty can be equated with ethics in our business life and in our dealings with neighbors.

Morality is equated with ethics in our personal relationships. Ethics deals with all of life's principles. There is a philosophy called "situation ethics." This philosophy says, "when in Rome do as the Romans do," or "do whatever fits the circumstances if you can get away with it, and no one gets hurt." This is not God's way. God says we need to walk circumspectly in every walk of life. We are admonished by God to "Abstain from the appearance of all evil," and to "Come ye out from among them and be ye separate saith the Lord."

Many Christians and church members are unconcerned about their spiritual conduct. They do not seem to understand that when they drink, take dope, act immorally, and become known as "shady" among their business associates, they have proven to the world to be unethical in their commitment to Christ.

It is our prayer, and plea that God's people "walk in the light, as he is the light," so we can have "fellowship one with another."

The Lord's Day and Worship

From the beginning of the record of God's revealing himself unto man, there is evidence of God's knowing the desirability of and man's need of a special day, regularly observed in man's relationship unto God. At the close of the creation activities the Bible records that "God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good, and on the seventh day God ended his work which he had made. And God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it" (Gen. 1:31a, 2:2, 3). This seems to indicate that God recognized the worth of his creation.

The basic meaning of the word "worth" is worship. The Scripture calls attention to the worthiness of God to be worshipped and sets the stage for man to recognize a day of rest to worship God. The Commandments call for the remembering of "the sabbath day to keep it holy" (Ex. 20:8). "Holy" means set aside unto God. God

planned that there be a day in which no work would be done, thus freeing man that he might have opportunity to think on God, to worship God. The basic design of God for the Sabbath was that man might worship, refresh his total being and remind himself of the worth of God.

Since the resurrection of Christ, and after the transition of the early believers from Judaic worship to the Christian worship, Christians have met to worship on the Lord's Day, the first day of the week. The apostles were with Jesus on the resurrection day and on other "first days of the week."

Much may be said of the word "holy," which the Sabbath was to be, and of Christ's desire and design for drawing his followers around him on the first day of the week. The basic purpose in both cases is that of calling attention to the worth of God in man's life, thus worship in its purest expression. That wish of God for the Lord's Day is still true. We are called "not to forsake the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another" (Heb. 10:25a).

The quality of observance of the Lord's Day must be reemphasized through proclamation and practice if the Christian community is to know spiritual health and fulfillment. The greatest thing done through Christians coming together regularly in their meeting places is worship. Everything good which comes from our lives as Christians does so as a result of genuine worship. God called attention to his worth. Our greatest gift to those whom we influence is to remind them that God is worthy of our worship. We do this best as we worship regularly and let our lives be conformed to that of Christ's. Jesus said "the sabbath was made for man and not man for the sabbath" (Mark 2:27). Proper observance of the Lord's Day is indeed unto our benefit.

Family

A Christian home can and should be a refuge for family members from worldly stress. We call upon Oklahoma Baptist families to give support to family members by spending time together in prayer, Bible study, observing the Lord's Day in worship, teaching scriptural stewardship, and accepting roles and responsibility of each person in the family.

More thought should be given by the parents to being "examples" through the biblical standards of living.

We encourage our families to schedule family meals and fun times together regularly to help offset the many forces outside the home which tend to tear down family togetherness and Christian family activities.

From Baptist families, we pray, will come those individuals who will be emotionally, physically, socially and spiritually able to carry on Bold Mission Thrust in the eighties.

Energy Conservation

The recent gas lines and fuel prices brought on by the turbulence of world politics, among other factors, have made America painfully

aware of the need for energy conservation. We have come to a startling awareness of the fact that fossil fuels are a depletable resource. This is a new awareness of a very old biblical concern. From the first chapters of the Bible man is charged with the stewardship of the earth. We will be held accountable to God for the careless use of the earth's resources. This concern goes beyond the immediate thirst for energy in modern America. People around the world are affected by our use and especially our misuse of petroleum and other fossil fuels. The comfort setting on your thermostat will affect the margin of fuel available to produce and harvest food to feed hungry children in India. The speed you drive and the number of trips you make to the market will affect the amount and cost of heating fuel to heat a tenement house in Amsterdam or New York City.

The energy this generation of Americans conserve or waste will affect the lives of every person on earth today and until the return of Christ. Christian people should become aware of our responsibility to mankind and to God in this area. Just the energy saved in our homes and churches will have a positive effect upon a needy world, not to mention money savings that could be better invested in mission and ministry.

Indeed, our accountability extends beyond our own conservation. God's people must be examples to the lifestyles, and prophets to the ears, of a wasteful nation in a world of limited natural resources.

Profanity, Sex and Violence on Television

Whereas, Southern Baptists recognize the tremendous potential television possesses, which can be used either for good or bad and,

Whereas, Southern Baptist have a tremendous responsibility to help harness television's potential for moral good and to help check it's potential for moral evil and,

Whereas, we have always rejoiced in the good contributions television has made for American life and decried damage it has done to the morals of American life and,

Whereas, we are witnessing many indications of declining moral influences and we are seeing a tremendous increase in the unwarranted use of profanity, violence and sex on television and,

Whereas, we as Oklahoma Southern Baptists along with other concerned citizens stand for high moral principles,

Be it therefore resolved, that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma meeting at First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, urge our churches and members, in cooperation with others who share our deep moral concerns, to exercise strong leadership, in protesting television's current unwarranted use of profanity, violence and presentation of illicit sex as normal and proper,

Be it further resolved, that we communicate our concerns to the major networks, local stations, Federal Communications Commission and sponsors of such programs,

Be it finally resolved, that Oklahoma Southern Baptists make a great, aggressive, positive, united, visible, optimistic, effort to affect television for God and for good.

Crime

Whereas, crime is a major spiritual, moral, social and economic concern in our state and,

Whereas, we believe its dramatic increase and incidence are evidence of the decay of spiritual and moral values in our society and,

Whereas, we believe that the good news of Jesus Christ is for all, without regard for condition or station in life,

Be it therefore resolved that we commit ourselves to:

1. Strengthen the spiritual foundations of our homes in order to provide loving, firm, purposeful guidance to our children and to recognize the key role of the churches in building these foundations.

2. Inform ourselves of the factors and issues at work in crime and the Criminal Justice System so that we may seek and support solutions which are consistent with the teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ, whom we serve.

3. Pray for victims of crime in the crisis it creates and for the ones who commit the crime.

4. Be ministers of reconciliation to families broken and separated by crime and attendant incarceration by offering them material and spiritual aid through the ministries of our churches, and to support and encourage the offender in his honest effort to recenter his values and reenter society as a contributor.

5. Encourage our legislators to seek and support alternatives to incarceration for those who could better be served, and who could better serve society by remaining with their families and at their job and making restitution for the loss they have caused.

6. Pray for support and where possible involve ourselves in the preaching and discipling ministries in our city and county jails and in the correctional facilities of our state.

7. Pray for those entrusted with the task of enforcing and upholding the laws, and for their families, remembering the price that is sometimes required.

Total Abstinence in Relation to Alcoholic Beverages

"Win is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise" (Prov. 20:1).

"Be not deceived: neither fornicators, nor idolators . . . nor drunkards . . . shall inherit the kingdom of God" (I Cor. 6:9-10).

"Beverage alcohol has been an issue throughout recorded history—dating back as far as the account of Noah's drunkenness in Genesis 9. The effects of intoxication have been experienced and deplored in every age.

"Consumption of alcohol and serious problems related to its consumption have increased in the life of our nation. Statistics reveal

that 68 percent of Americans over 18 years of age drink alcoholic beverages to some extent, and that the nation's expenditure for drinking exceeds \$29 billion. The fact that the most reliable estimates now place the number of alcoholics (uncontrolled compulsive drinkers) at between nine and ten million gives only an inkling of the human suffering involved. In sheer magnitude, America's alcohol problem is staggering.¹

As the alcohol industry makes ever greater efforts to ensnare more and more people with their diabolical products, it becomes critical that Christians, and Oklahoma Baptists in particular, prepare to take a stand. Every Christian should be informed about alcohol and its dangers. We need to make special efforts to inform our youth. Christians must be prepared to take a personal and corporate stand of resistance to the proliferation of alcohol into our society and homes. We must oppose "liquor by the drink." We must resist any relaxing of present liquor laws and controls. We oppose any marketing of "children's beer" or any such products that tend to make alcohol acceptable for children. We abhor the flaunting of alcohol on television and should make our concern known to sponsors and broadcasters.

The best single Christian response to alcohol is total abstinence. The Bible presents total abstinence from alcohol as the ideal response (Num. 6:1-4; Dan. 1:8). Drunkenness is absolutely condemned (Gal. 5:19-20; I Cor. 6:9-10). Care for the body as the dwelling place of the Holy Spirit is emphasized (I Cor. 6:19). Christians always should be in control of their minds and actions (I Thess. 5:6; I Peter 5:8). In addition, we have an overwhelming responsibility not to be a stumbling block to others (Rom. 14:13, 21).

The total abstainer who is consistent in regard to irresponsible consumption of other things as well as alcohol can become the most effective challenge to increasing irresponsible drinking in our society.

Alcohol Abuse Seminar

A statewide Alcohol Abuse Seminar was conducted by the Christian Life Committee Aug. 18-19, in cooperation with Oklahoma Baptist University. Gary E. Farley, WMU professor of sociology, designed the program and was responsible for much of the details.

Participants from each association were in attendance and made plans to conduct similar type seminars and workshops in each association.

The 175 persons attending were complimentary of the content and nature of the meeting. Similar type meetings were requested for the future.

In the light of the foregoing statement relative to alcohol, and our continuing conviction concerning gambling, the Christian Life Committee recommends that:

(1) We urge churches and pastors to proclaim and teach a strong message of total abstinence from all forms of alcoholic beverages.

1. "Alcohol," in Issues and Answers series, Christian Life Commission.

(2) We urge churches, pastors and parents to teach total abstinence from all forms of gambling.

(3) The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma go on record as opposing the sale of liquor-by-the-drink and parimutual gambling; and we further recommend that the Board of Directors design and execute plans to inform Oklahoma Baptists and the general public of the moral issue involved; and should an election be called to legalize liquor-by-the-drink or parimutual gambling the executive director-treasurer be authorized to use funds recommended by the Administrative Committee from the special projects fund in order to execute these plans.

The motion carried to approve the report.

56. Charles Graves, pastor, Nichols Hills Church, Oklahoma City, addressed the convention on the subject "Reaffirming Moral Absolutes." He used Psalm 119:89-96.

57. Joe L. Ingram presented the report of the Board of Directors.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

The members of the Board of Directors are elected by the convention and the board makes a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The board endeavors to be good stewards of the work committed to it. Since the convention last met, the Board of Directors met on Dec. 11, 1979, March 11, May 20, June 3, and September 16, 1980.

The convention is organized into five areas of work. Direction was given to these five areas by committees assigned by President Smith in consultation with the two vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer. The following committees were approved in the December meeting:

Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is made up of the chairmen of the five committees and the executive officers. Convention President Bailey Smith served as chairman and other members were Roy Moody Jr., Sam L. Garner, Kenneth Lay, Monroe Palmer, Rex Wilkinson, Joe L. Ingram and Hale A. Dixon. The committee meets only upon matters referred to it by the board. It was not necessary for the committee to meet during the year.

Business Management Committee

The responsibility for the management of the Baptist Building facilities, central services, accounting, property management and insurance is assigned to the Business Management Committee. Sam Garner served as chairman.

December Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Vanoss Church Property Deeded**—It was reported that Vanoss Church in Banner Association had been inactive for many years, and in accordance with Oklahoma law, the property had been deeded to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Normally when property comes to the convention in this manner, it is deeded to the association in which the property is located for disposition as they deem wise. Approval was given for a Quit Claim Deed to be given to Banner Association for the property on which the Vanoss Church was located.

2. **Study of Facilities Authorized**—The Baptist Book Store for a number of years has occupied a portion of the ground floor and basement area of the Baptist Building. They have a need for additional space, particularly for storage and mailing. Since there was no additional space available in the Baptist Building, they have been looking for another location which would make available much needed space for convention offices. The board voted to encourage the convention staff to study the need for enlarged facilities for the Baptist Building and the Baptist Book Store.

May Recommendations and Approvals

1. **1979 Audit**—The committee reviewed with Mr. Bardwell, Wolf and Company, the 1979 audit for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. A report of the review was given. The board approved the audit and asked that it be printed in the 1979 Annual for distribution to all churches.

2. **1980 Auditor**—Approval was given for Wolf and Company, Oklahoma City to serve as the auditor for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for 1980.

3. **Resurfacing at Camp Hudgens**—Authority was given for the resurfacing of the entrance road, parking area and tennis/volley ball court at Camp Hudgens at a cost of \$15,934. The project was paid for with funds carried forward from 1978.

September Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Upgrading of Falls Creek Water System**—Approval was given that in 1981 priority be given in the development program at Falls

Creek to upgrading the water system. This will be accomplished at a minimum cost by maintaining the connection with the water supply from the City of Davis, keeping the new well in operation as an auxiliary supply and maintaining the connection to the spring which has been a major source of supply even though it is now limited in flow; that repairs be made to existing distribution lines at an approximate cost of \$2,000; that the existing filtration system be cleaned and that the special filtration sand be replaced for approximately \$4,000; and that the lake be cleaned so as to impound water as a major supply source at a cost of about \$60,000.

Child Care Committee

The assignment of the Child Care Committee is to give assistance to the operation of the children's homes in Oklahoma City, Owasso and Madill, Boys Ranch Town near Edmond, foster homes and additional child care services. Kenneth Lay served as chairman.

December Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Offering Goal Set**—A goal of \$350,000 was adopted as the 1980 Mother's Day Offering Goal.

2. **Fifth Cottage and Grounds Improvements at Owasso**—The board voted to look with favor on the erection of a fifth cottage at Baptist Children's Home at Owasso from funds on hand and for making other needed improvements such as curbing and paving streets, erection of a maintenance building and landscaping as funds are available.

3. **Appreciation Expressed**—It was reported that Charles Leake, has saved the convention thousands of dollars in the way he has handled the sub-contracts on construction of cottages at Owasso Baptist Children's Home. The board asked that a letter of appreciation be written to Mr. Leake.

The board also expressed appreciation to James Browning for 25 years of service on the staff at the Baptist Children's Home in Oklahoma City, to Lowell Milburn for the completion of 10 years as director of Child Care ministry for Oklahoma Baptists, and to Truman Maxey, former director of Child Care. Maxey is now serving on the Foundation staff on a retired basis and has assisted in the writing of about 1,000 wills, many of which name Child Care as benefactor.

Retirement Centers and Baptist Chaplaincy Committee

Monroe Palmer served as chairman of the Retirement Centers and Baptist Chaplaincy Committee until March 5, 1980 when he was employed as director of the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso. James Watson was elected as chairman to complete the year.

The committee is responsible for the operation of retirement centers at Oklahoma City, Owasso and Hugo and for giving direction to the chaplaincy ministry in hospitals at Enid, Miami, Grove, Pryor, Stroud, Bristow, Cordell, McAlester and Baptist Medical Center; and in the three retirement centers.

December Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Hugo Governing Board Approved**—Approval was given for Hershel Bright, Doug Dodson, L. B. Flanigan, Ralph Marshall, Noel Pence, James Sealy, Mrs. V. C. Stiefer, Bill Stone and James Watson to serve as the Governing Board for Hugo Retirement Center.

The retirement center in Oklahoma City is operated by the Oklahoma City Baptist Laymen's Corporation and the retirement village at Owasso is operated by the Tulsa Baptist Laymen's Corporation.

2. **Baptist Health Care Corporation Board Approved**—The by-laws of Baptist Health Care Corporation states that their Board of Directors shall all be cooperating participants in a local Baptist church and shall be approved by the convention's Board of Directors. The convention's Board of Directors authorized the following to serve as members of the BHCC Board of Directors:

March Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Loan for Hugo Retirement Center**—Authority was given for the Hugo Retirement Center to borrow up to \$32,000 at an interest rate of $8\frac{1}{2}$ percent for the purpose of installing a 50 ton air-conditioner with repayment to be made monthly from operating income.

2. **Appreciation Expressed to Hopkins**—Appreciation was expressed to Robert Hopkins for his sacrificial and effective service as director of the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Village at Owasso and the executive director-treasurer was authorized to present Hopkins with a plaque verbalizing this appreciation.

3. **New Administrators Introduced**—Sam Garner was introduced as the new administrator of the Hugo Retirement Center and Monroe

Palmer and administrator at Tulsa Baptist Retirement Village at Owasso.

May Recommendations and Approvals

1. Retirement Center Auditors — The recommendation was adopted that the 1980 auditors be as follows:

Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center—Wolf and Company, Oklahoma City

Hugo Retirement Center—Dale Hammons, CPA, Hugo

All accounting for the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Village is done through the convention's accounting office and the books are audited by the convention's auditing firm, Wolf and Company.

Planning and Promotion Committee

The Planning and Promotion Committee gives assistance and counsel in stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, disaster relief and church program departments. Rex Wilkinson served as chairman.

December Recommendation and Approval

1. Policy Regarding Pastoral Aid to Continue—During recent decades, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has limited its participation in Church Pastoral Aid (CPA-supplementing pastors' salaries) to language missions and special church-type missions that qualify for Home Mission Board participating funds administered through the Cooperative Missions Department. The board approved the recommendation that the present policy of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma related to Church Pastoral Aid be continued.

June Recommendation and Approval

1. Alcohol Abuse Seminar Funds—The board voted to allocate up to \$5,500 from the Special Projects fund for the Alcohol Abuse Seminar conducted at Oklahoma Baptist University, Aug. 18-19. The seminar was planned and conducted by the Christian Life Committee.

Administrative Committee

The Administrative Committee is responsible for work related to personnel, budget, Annuity and Ministerial Service, **Baptist Messenger** and Baptist student work. The chairman was Roy Moody Jr.

December Recommendations and Approvals

1. Distribution of Unallocated CP Funds—It was projected that approximately \$750,000 would be received beyond the allocated Cooperative Program budget for 1979. Of that amount, 43 percent would go for Southern Baptist causes, leaving a balance of approximately \$427,500 for state distribution. The board authorized that the funds be distributed as follows:

3. **Telephone System for OBU**—Approval was given to authorize the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University to enter into a financial agreement for a maximum of \$450,000 to purchase and install a campus telephone system with repayment to come from the current operating budget.

March Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Retirement Gift for Bartlett**—The board voted that in honor of 26 years of faithful and dedicated service of Gene Bartlett on the staff of the state convention that a gift of \$100 per year be given to him in addition to the traditional two months salary given to retirees; and that it be taken from non-Cooperative Program funds.

May Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Communications to Family of Deceased Ministers**—In honor of Oklahoma Baptist deceased ministers the board approved a recommendation that the executive office send flowers to the funeral; that a letter be written to the spouse or some family member; and that a certificate be presented to an appropriate family member by a convention employee or a member of the Board of Directors, expressing appreciation for the dedicated service and contributions made to the Kingdom of God by the deceased.

2. **New Works**—the following resolution regarding new works was approved by the Board of Directors:

WHEREAS, The current projections indicate a 25-30 percent increase in Oklahoma's population during the next two decades; and,

WHEREAS, there is an evident need for the establishment of new churches in all areas of the state, especially in the expanding metropolitan and impacted areas; and,

WHERSAS, The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has been responding for several years to the request from churches and associations to provide financial resources in the purchase of sites; and,

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has accelerated plans to provide significant amounts of Cooperative Program dollars during the next five years for purchase of property sites; and,

WHERSAS, any such plans to provide financial assistance should be done in cooperation with the association where said proposed church site is located;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Planning and Promotion Committee of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma continue to develop guidelines and strategies to assist associations in the purchase of new church sites.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that financial assistance from the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma relative to the purchase of new church sites be allocated to an association only for property which is located within the boundaries of said association, with the exception that Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma funds could be allocated to an association for a new church site in an adjacent association with the prior approval of the adjacent association.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that associations in metropolitan areas be encouraged to continue regular meetings of Metropolitan Mission Councils to help discover needs, establish priorities and implement strategies to plant new churches throughout Oklahoma.

June Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Boyd Employed as Director of Church Music**—The Board unanimously approved the recommendation to employ Glenn Boyd as director of the Department of Church Music.

2. **Magar Commended**—Paul Magar, associate director in the Department of Church Music, was commended and appreciation was expressed for his faithfulness and dedicated service in carrying for the responsibilities in the department in the interim period.

3. **Funds to Combat Liquor-by-the-Drink Issue**—On the November election ballot there will be a proposal regarding liquor-by-the-drink and beer franchising. The wets are proposing a budget of \$450,000. It was expressed that Oklahoma Baptists need to be involved personally and with money to combat this. Start up funds were needed to mount the campaign. The board authorized up to \$5,000 from the Special Projects fund to be used in conjunction with Sooner Alcohol-Narcotics Education to initiate the strategy to combat these issues.

Also in relation to this the Executive Director-Treasurer was authorized to encourage the churches to take a special offering to help finance the opposition of the liquor-by-the-drink and beer franchising proposals and to use his best judgment in suggesting ways and means for Baptist people to be involved.

September Recommendations and Approvals

1. **Gritz Sues** — It was reported to the Board of Directors that Jack L. Gritz has filed a law suit against Joe L. Ingram, executive director-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; Jerry Don Abernathy, convention president during the time that Gritz was terminated; and Administrative Committee members Cal Hunter, C. A. Spradlin, Roy Moody and Finis Steelman. The board reaffirmed the resolution passed on May 7, 1976, providing for indemnification of directors, officers, employees and certain persons serving its agencies. Confidence was expressed in the men being sued by Gritz as to their honesty and integrity and in their dealing with Gritz pursuant to and following the actions of the Board of Directors and the convention in terminating the services of Gritz as editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. In addition the board encouraged these men to take no action which might be construed as compromise or acknowledgement of guilt, and that the board undergird these men with prayer.

2. **Legal Fees Paid** — The Executive Director-Treasurer was authorized to pay legal costs involved in contesting Initiative Petition #314, State Question #550 related to legalizing liquor-by-the-drink and beer franchising. This amount was in addition to the \$5,000 allocated by the Board of Directors in the June meeting of the board.

3. **Study Regarding Possible Sale of Warwick West Property** — An offer has been made for the purchase of the property on which Warwick West Apartments are located which is east of Baptist Medical Center on Northwest Highway. The board asked that a sub-committee be appointed to study the matter with the possibility of bringing a recommendation at a later time.

Recommendations

1. Roy Moody, pastor of Garnett Road Church, Tulsa, presented the following recommendations concerning the Cooperative Program and Edna McMillan Offering:

(1) That the Cooperative Program objective for 1981 be \$11,400,000 to be distributed across the board 56 percent State and 44 percent Southern Baptist Convention; that the total objective be divided as follows: Basic Budget, \$10,225,000 and the Challenge Section, \$1,175,000; that all items in the Basic Budget have priority over items in the Challenge Section; and that all receipts over the \$11,400,000 be distributed 56 percent State and 44 percent Southern Baptist Convention.

(2) That the Executive Director-Treasurer be instructed to keep Cooperative Program expenditures in line with Cooperative Program income and that he be authorized to adjust department and agency budgets up or down by not more than 5 percent in order to carry out this directive.

(3) That the 1981 Cooperative Program income be distributed as outlined:

The M. Judson Cook Cottage at the Baptist Children's Home at Madill has been completed and was dedicated Aug. 21, 1980. The cottage has approximately 6,300 square feet and includes a staff apartment of some 500 square feet. It also has a basement which will serve as a storm shelter and game room. Total cost of the cottage was

\$157,000, including landscaping, parking area, furnishings, patio and concrete driveway.

Two buildings were completed at Falls Creek Conference Center. At a cost of approximately \$40,000 a dormitory to accommodate 40 women staff members was built. It will be used for the women staff members during the five weeks of assembly and will be available for rent to churches and associations at other times. A motel-type structure with 30 rooms that will accommodate up to 60 people was constructed at a cost of approximately \$300,000. This included furnishings. The lodge is a part of the developing Baptist Conference Center at Falls Creek.

President Bailey E. Smith appointed to the committee the men who have served as chairmen of the Nominating Committee for the last five years. These men are: Charles Graves, chairman, Robert Hammons, Finley Tinnin, Charles Becton. One man was unable to serve.

After a study of the nominating processes of other state conventions and a review of our convention's procedures, the committee has concluded that more time is needed to form a comprehensive proposal to the convention.

We, therefore, recommend that the study committee be continued for another year, with the addition to its membership of the 1980 chairman, George Boston, and bring a report to the convention in 1981. We further recommend, that should changes in the convention Bylaws be involved, the committee report their recommendations to the Board of Directors, and that the Board of Directors make a report directly to the convention concerning the Bylaws changes.

The motion carried to approve the report.

(2) Larry Adams presented the report of the Academic Affairs Committee of Oklahoma Baptist University.

(a) Larry Adams, pastor, Immanuel Church, Shawnee and chairman of the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University, read the following which was presented at the 1979 convention: "I further move that the chairman of the trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University appoint a study committee within the Board of Trustees to review textbooks, teaching assignments, doctrinal stance and all other matters pertinent to the instruction and teaching at OBU and to report back to the convention of 1980."

Adams stated that he asked the Academic Affairs Committee to make the study.

The report of the study committee was distributed and Lloyd Minter, chairman, read and spoke to the report.

Background of the Study

On November 14, 1979, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved the following motion:

In light of the present controversy and publicity, and in light of the fact there is widespread concern among Oklahoma Baptists and OBU students that the faculty of Oklahoma Baptist University have a high view of the Bible, its inspiration, its authority, and its infallibility, and in light of the

fact that the OBU Board of Trustees and its Academic Affairs Committee are dealing with this issue, I move that this Convention express its confidence in our elected trustees and affirm its expectation of the elected trustees and administration of this institution to fulfill their responsibilities in directing the affairs of our institutions in line with Historic Baptist Beliefs. I further move that the Chairman of the Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University appoint a study committee within the Board of Trustees to review textbooks, teaching assignments, doctrinal stance, and all other matters pertinent to the instruction and teaching at OBU and to report back to the convention of 1980.

At the regularly scheduled Trustee meeting held on December 4, 1979, in light of the prior trustee assignment of responsibility for studying the issues cited, Dr. Larry Adams, Board chairman, charged the Academic Affairs Committee with the responsibility for conducting the study required by the convention's motion.

Academic Affairs Committee

The Academic Affairs Committee of the Board is ordinarily composed of eight members. In the December meeting Reverend Charles Graves was added to the study group by virtue of his having served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees in 1978-79. Dr. Larry Adams, current chairman, served ex officio, along with Dr. Joe L. Ingram, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Membership of the Academic Affairs Committee follows:

Mr. Lloyd G. Minter, a 1940 graduate of the University and the current chairman of the Academic Affairs Committee, is a layman from the First Baptist Church of Bartlesville. An attorney, Mr. Minter has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees and is in this fourth year of a third term on the Board.

Reverend Ron Argo, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Alva, a 1969 graduate of the University, serves in his first year of a 4-year Board term.

Mrs. Betty Butcher, former missionary under appointment of the Foreign Mission Board; wife of a physician in Guymon, Mrs. Butcher, a 1949 alumna, is completing her third year of service.

Dr. William Z. Cook, Stilwell physician who graduated from OBU in 1951, is a layman in the first year of a second 4-year term on the Board of Trustees.

Reverend Charles Graves, pastor of the Nichols Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, in the fourth year of his present term on the Board of Trustees having concluded service as chairman in December 1979, is a 1953 graduate of the University.

Dr. Eldon Gibson, Shawnee physician, a member of the University Baptist Church, is a layman in his third year of service to the University as a member of the Board.

Dr. Leon Hill, pastor of First Baptist Church, Broken Arrow, a 1961 graduate of the University, is in his third year of service on the Board.

Reverend Sam Pace is Director of Missions, Comanche-Cotton Association, Lawton, an alumnus of 1947, in his third year of service on the Board.

Dr. Kenneth Shaw, pastor of First Baptist Church, Henryetta, is in his second year on the Board.

Dr. Cook, Dr. Gibson and Dr. Hill have children presently enrolled at Oklahoma Baptist University.

The committee met on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University and in Oklahoma City on the following dates: February 6, 1980, February 22, 1980, March 7, 1980, April 22, 1980, May 9, 1980, June 6, 1980, June 30, 1980, July 31, 1980, and August 12, 1980. In the period between meetings through correspondence and personal interview many of the members of the committee had additional opportunities for dialogue and discussion of areas of concern being studied in regular sessions. During its sessions the committee heard from students (including the authors of a document critical of the University), faculty members (including those named in the document), members of the administration of the University, pastors and other ministers, and laymen.

Following is the report of the Committee which sets forth its conclusions and recommendations.

Conclusions

1. Throughout extensive deliberations the Committee found cause for concern relative to the spiritual emphasis of Oklahoma Baptist University. The Committee has been impressed by the sincerity, integrity, and dedication of the students, members of the faculty and administration, pastors, and laymen who have met with the Committee to explore these issues. Much of the concern articulated was justified and must be addressed by the Trustees and the Administration of the University.

A. The Committee is convinced that the University is effectively discharging its academic obligations. This is evidenced by the quality of its students, faculty, and graduates.

3. In the Committee's judgment, the faculty has a deep sense of Christian dedication affirmed by the measure of service individually to Christian causes through their churches and in other organizations. The commitment of the faculty to the institution is exemplary. However, we are concerned that the faculty generally is not sufficiently aware of or sensitive to the feelings expressed to the Committee by Oklahoma Baptist churches and pastors regarding the University.

4. The Committee finds that the President of the University is deeply committed to Christian higher education, to academic excellence and to the improvement of the moral and spiritual climate of the University. The Committee is appreciative to the President for his openness and cooperative spirit throughout the course of the study.

5. The University basically is discharging the responsibilities and purposes placed upon it by its Charter of February 9, 1910.

6. The approach of the administration to effect a proper moral climate on campus is satisfactory. Although from time to time there is conduct on the University campus that does not correspond with the Christian ideals of Oklahoma Baptist University, such incidents are exceptional. The generally outstanding moral fiber of our students is the primary reason for a moral climate substantially above our society as a whole.

7. Under the leadership of the administration and faculty, progress is being made to implement the Christian thrust of the University.

8. Faculty and student interviews caused the Committee to conclude that a lack of communication in the classroom and in counseling sessions among members of the faculty and a number of students has occasioned concern. Although the Committee recognizes the importance of thought provoking and challenging presentations by the faculty, there has been a lack of identification of the teachers' personal commitment to the concepts contained in the **Baptist Faith and Message Statement of 1963** which is the theological base of the University. Accordingly professors, particularly in the departments of religion and philosophy, must exercise considerable care in order to avoid to the fullest extent possible misinterpretations and misconceptions by the students of the professors' personal convictions in the fields of morality and theology.

9. The Committee is of the view that the organizational structure of the University may be strengthened by providing the means for more direct organizational supervision by the President through appropriate amendments to the **Faculty Handbook** and by direct reporting of the deans to the President.

10. The Committee is convinced that there is a significant need for a closer relationship among members of the university community, Oklahoma Baptist churches and pastors.

11. The Committee recognizes the ongoing problems relative to textbooks and reading assignments. We commend the administration and faculty for dealing forthrightly with those problems called to their attention.

12. The Committee is convinced that the Trustees have not been sufficiently involved in the decision making processes of the University and in support and undergirding of the University. The administration is taking constructive steps in affording the necessary organizational modifications to encourage Trustee participation. In the final analysis, however, it is incumbent upon each Trustee to assume the significant responsibility attendant to his/her stewardship.

Recommendations

1. In order to give a sense of common direction and purpose to what is taught at OBU and in order for the University to fulfill its role as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, The Committee recommends that **The Baptist Faith and Message**,

adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1963, be affirmed as expressing the theological base for the University.

We agree that models of conflicting world views must be presented in classroom lectures, discussion, and reading assignments. We urge that in the presentation of differing views of Biblical concepts, the teacher should make clear his personal commitment to the principles of **The Baptist Faith and Message**.

2. The Committee recommends that the Board of Trustees reaffirm the stated principles set forth in the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University, and the **assignment of responsibility** for adherence to the principles to the trustees and President of the University.

3. The Committee recommends that the present statement of purpose of the University, approved on December 3, 1975, be amended by the trustees to eliminate the implications of a division between the spiritual and educational purposes of the University.

4. The Committee recommends that a School of Christian Service be established to include the departments of religion and philosophy, and that a dean of such school be sought for appointment by the 1981-82 academic year.

5. The Committee recommends that a periodic self-study be conducted by the School of Christian Service for the purpose of reviewing progress of the school and matters attendant thereto, and that the President report to the Board of Trustees the result of such self-study, and evaluation of the current status of the school, its effectiveness and commitment. The committee suggests that such self-study be conducted annually until such time as the Board concludes the periods of study should be less frequent.

6. In view of the announced intention of the Provost to retire from full-time service with the University to devote himself to other areas of Christian service, the Committee recommends that on December 31, 1980, the office of Provost be terminated. We further recommend that the deans of the colleges and/or schools report directly to the President beginning January 1, 1981.

7. The Committee recommends that statements of policy and procedure contained in the Faculty Handbook, official manuals, guidebooks, and catalogs be brought into agreement with the Charter of the University in respect to the responsibility and authority of the President of the University.

8. The Committee recommends that prior to employment of new faculty, appropriate review of candidates be conducted by the Academic Affairs Committee. The Academic Affairs Committee should participate to the extent possible in consideration of recommendations relating both to employment and continuance of service on the faculty.

9. The Committee recommends that the President develop a procedure for the review of textbooks and reading assignments.

10. The Committee recommends the formulation of an ad hoc committee, composed of members of the Board, administration and faculty, to make a report to the trustees regarding the manner in

which the University, the Convention, pastors and churches may best interrelate to promote the purposes of the University. Although all of the concerns expressed in respect to the University are not ascribable to lack of communication, the Committee is convinced that co-operative attention needs to be focused upon a cohesive program that will produce better understanding and engender a spirit of cooperation in the minimizing and resolution of problems that are inevitable in an increasingly complex society.

The recommendations of the Academic Affairs Committee were presented to the Board of Trustees at their September 11, 1980 meeting at which time the recommendations were approved unanimously.

The foregoing constitutes the report of the trustees to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma with respect to these matters.

The motion carried to approve the report and recommendations.

(3) Bailey Smith read the motion which was presented on Tuesday afternoon by Jerry Sullaway, pastor, Emmanuel Southern Church, Edmond. "Article IV of the Charter and Bylaws of Oklahoma Baptist University states, 'The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.' Therefore, in keeping with the intent of Article IV and because I believe that the Baptists of Oklahoma are a people of the Book, and because I believe that as Baptists we want a university that is distinctly Baptist, I move that the administration, the president, and the trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University be instructed by this convention to hire, from this day forth, only those men and women who are Baptist in name, in principle, in belief, in worship and in action for those positions that become vacant in administration and classroom instruction and any other position that would reflect upon teaching of theology and doctrine."

The motion was seconded at the time it was presented for discussion at this miscellaneous business session.

- a. Eugene Hall, president of OBU, spoke concerning the motion.
- b. Jerry Sullaway spoke for the motion.
- c. Lavonn Brown, pastor, First Church, Norman, spoke in opposition to the motion.
- d. Jimmy Reese, pastor, Gracemont Church, Tulsa, offered a substitute motion to give the matter back to the trustees, let them study it for a year and return a recommendation to the convention next year.

The substitute motion was seconded.

- e. David Hopper, Norman, spoke for the substitute motion.
- f. The substitute motion was not approved.
- g. Hugo Lindquist, pastor, Bethel Church, Oklahoma City, spoke in support of the motion.

h. Sam Scantlan, pastor, Beaty Church near Pauls Valley, spoke against the motion.

i. Question was called for and the motion was defeated 367 to 176.

63. Jim Woodward led in singing the "Doxology" and the convention was adjourned until Wednesday night.

Wednesday Evening November 12, 1980

64. Special music was presented by the Central Association choir, under the direction of Tony Cannon, minister of music, First Church, Kingfisher.

65. Hugo Lindquist called the convention to order at 7 p.m.

66. Glenn Boyd led in singing "Hallelujah, What a Savior."

67. H. Dayne Freeman, pastor, First Church, Idabel, read Phil. 2:5-16.

68. Jim Light, pastor, First Church, Oologah, led in prayer.

69. Landrum Leavell led in the Bible study of Romans 12:3-12, using the subject "Gift of Giving."

70. Lyle Garlow, associate executive director, director of planning and promotion, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, presented the program of "A New Commitment—75th Anniversary Jubilations." A film was shown entitled "A New Commitment to an Ancient Commission."

71. Gary Wadley, layman, First Church, Guymon, gave his testimony.

72. Glenn Boyd and his family presented special music.

73. Harper Shannon, pastor, Huffman Church, Birmingham, Ala., addressed the convention on missions, using I Cor. 9:16-22 as the basis for his message.

74. Hugo Lindquist led in a closing prayer and the convention was adjourned until Thursday morning at 9 a.m.

Thursday Morning November 13, 1980

75. Bailey E. Smith called the convention to order at 9 a.m.

76. Keith Butler minister of music, Olivet Church, Oklahoma City, led in singing "To God Be the Glory."

77. Bill Austin, pastor, First Church, Ponca City, read Psalm 91.

78. H. Perry Cox, pastor, Calvary Church, Tulsa, led in prayer.

79. Landrum Leavell led in the Bible study of Romans, 12:2-12 on the subject of "The Favor of Love."

80. Lowell Milburn, director, Department of Child Care, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, presented the report of the department.

Child Care

Lowell D. Milburn, Director

"How do you put your arms around a city?" asked a pastor as he was speaking to a great convention. He answered this question in a simple yet profound way, saying, "You love them one by one."

Since 1903 Oklahoma Baptists have been loving homeless children one by one. We have cared for more than 6,000 boys and girls.

Children who live in our homes continue to take their places of responsibility and leadership in the schools, churches and community and win their share of honors and recognitions.

Expanding Program—The total number of children served during 1979 was 637 compared to 586 in 1978. The staff also answered approximately 650 other inquiries and referrals of children.

Children were served by our ministries as follows:

Our fifth cottage (named for Judson Cook) has been completed at Madill, and a fifth cottage is under construction at Owasso.

Complex Task—The task is complicated by serving children who are older when they come to us and are under our influence a shorter time. The average age for entering our ministry is about 12, and the average stay is one year to 15 months. The average number of children in care fluctuates daily.

Missionary Opportunity—Most of our staff have felt a missionary impression to serve. Since we have 89 full-time and 36-part-time workers, one of our homes usually needs additional employees all the time, especially houseparents. Another chance to help children is by being foster parents; we now have some 75 foster homes. Also, sponsors and vacation homes for children are needed.

Encouraging Support—Child Care received \$400,000 last year from the Cooperative Program; endowment provided \$414,000; sponsorship totaled \$70,200; gifts from individuals were \$50,200; birthday gifts provided \$91,000; and memorials totaled \$42,200. Mother's Day Offering was a record of \$310,700 for the year. Many farmers and

ranchers gave grain, hay, and cattle. Thank you for all your gifts. Especially, are we grateful for those who remember our ministry in their wills.

Spiritual Ministry—We are grateful for the evangelistic opportunities provided by Child Care. There were 76 boys and girls baptized from our four homes. Others were reached for Christ through our foster homes. Pray that God will enable us to reach the boys and girls we serve one by one and will give power to shape their young lives.

The motion carried to approve the report.

81. A New Commitment—To All Nations.

The following led in the discussion of this commitment.

(1) Robert Haskins, director, Department of Cooperative Missions, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Cooperative Missions

Robert Haskins, Director

In J. M. Gaskin's book **Baptist Milestones in Oklahoma** he mentions the things that make Oklahoma Baptists strong. He says that "Since 1832 Oklahoma Baptists have been a missions-minded people. First, they were the recipients as missionaries flowed westward to build churches and schools. Then the churches began working together to send the gospel to the regions beyond." This missionary spirit continues to permeate the life of our state. Thank God for a great year in missions outreach.

Language Missions

Twenty-four full-time missionaries and ten part-time missionaries work in language missions with Indians, Hispanics, Koreans, Laotians, Cambodians, Vietnamese, Japanese, Thais, Indonesians, Internationals and the deaf. They reported 1,241 professions of faith, additions by letter and special service commitments.

The Koreans are responding favorably to the gospel. The Korean Mission in Tulsa is averaging more than 100 per Sunday and the mission in Bethany is averaging 50-60 per Sunday. In six months there have been 30 baptized into the Bethany Korean Mission.

A Korean Church Growth Workshop, sponsored jointly by the Home Mission Board and several state conventions, was held at Camp Copas in Denton, Texas. Oklahoma's three Korean pastors attended the workshop and their expenses were paid by the State Convention.

A new Vietnamese Mission was begun in the chapel of First Church, Oklahoma City on Sun., Aug. 10 with 42 Vietnamese and 7 Americans present.

We have 20 churches with ministries to Internationals. Two new International Friendship groups have been organized this year. There are approximately 750 Internationals who come together weekly to learn English, to receive citizenship and other training opportunities and to study the Bible. Strong ties are formed between the Interna-

tionals and their Christian American friends. Many are led each year to faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

The work of the missionary to the deaf has been expanded to include work with the blind. There are 23 churches with ministries to the deaf and one church with a ministry to the blind.

Three new Indian churches, four new Hispanic Missions, one new Korean Mission, three new deaf units were established in 1980. Indian Falls Creek Assembly had 1,300 registered representing 37 tribes and 9 states. There were 101 professions of faith. E. J. Barnes of Newkirk served as camp pastor, Tyrone Smith of Oklahoma City served as music director and Urban Green served as missionary.

Church Extension

At least 27 new churches and missions have been started this year. Our state goal was 25 new churches by MIRACLE SUNDAY, July 27. Twenty-three new churches were started by July 27 with four additional churches begun in August. A new church planter, Boyd Rayburn, was employed to assist in starting new churches in Union Association. W. J. Hart is serving as church planter in Frisco Association.

Resort Missions

Resort ministries were conducted by local churches and associations on at least 14 lakes during the summer. Special ministries were conducted at festivals and pow-wows and other leisure-time activities. A daily Vacation Bible School was held at the Indian Exposition in Anadarko. A booth with free Bibles, Scripture portions and tracts was also provided at the Anadarko Indian Exposition. At least 14 professions of faith were reported at the Exposition Vacation Bible School. God is blessing the witness of Baptists in resort and leisure areas.

Campers on Mission

A Spring Rally was held at the RTA Campground in Oklahoma City and a Fall Rally was held at Kaw Lake. Mission projects were conducted in Oklahoma at Tulsa and Seminole. Mission projects were conducted in several other states including Kansas and Arizona. The Oklahoma Chapter hosted the Summer 1980 "National Campers on Mission Rally." There were 250 registered campers with 375 in total attendance. Reports were given of many mission projects assisted in various states by these volunteer missionaries.

Mission Service Corps

Mission Service Corps is the plan of Southern Baptists to enlist by 1982, 5,000 adult volunteers who provide their own expenses and who serve full-time for one or two years in missions and evangelism in the home and foreign areas. Oklahoma has such volunteers who have served or are serving in Alaska, Colorado, Illinois and Venezuela. At least 16 people are still waiting for sufficient funds to be appointed.

Christian Service Corps

Twenty-eight families from other states came to Oklahoma to help in various mission projects. In addition, there were youth groups and adult groups from Texas, Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana and other

states who helped with construction projects and Mission Vacation Bible Schools. Literally scores of youth groups went from Oklahoma to Arkansas, Texas and other states to help them on mission projects. Christian Service Corps and other short term volunteers meet a real mission need in the homeland as well as on foreign fields.

US-2 and Semester Missions

Three US-2 missionaries completed their two-year assignment in Oklahoma in August. They served in Tulsa, Oklahoma City and Seminole.

Two semester missionaries have served in Indian Missions this year. Martha Kinney, Creek Indian from Wewoka, served in Weatherford and Suzanne Hanes, from Georgia, served in Seminole.

Chaplaincy

The Eighth Annual Conference of Oklahoma Baptist chaplains met in Del City, Nov. 11, for a chaplains' luncheon. A chaplains and wives retreat was held at Falls Creek Conference Center, Aug. 22-23. Forty chaplains and wives were present for the two-day retreat. Ed Thornton, professor in pastoral care at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., was the guest lecturer. Carl Hart, director of the chaplains division, Home Mission Board, led in the Bible studies. There are 60 chaplains serving in hospitals, institutions and the military in Oklahoma.

Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists

Five missionaries jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention serve in cooperative ministries with National Baptists. They are: Miss Verlene Farmer, BSU director, Langston University; Eddie Mabry, state director of Christian education and dean of the school of religion, Tulsa; Mrs. Patricia Reed, WMU state executive secretary; Urban Green, director, education center, Tulsa; the director of Christian education for Black Baptist churches, Oklahoma City.

They plan and promote evangelism, missions, Bible study, stewardship, development of church leadership, youth camps and programs specifically planned for individual churches.

Four students preparing for church vocations received scholarship assistance while attending college or seminary this year. One received his M.R.E. degree from Southwestern Seminary this summer. New students will enter school this fall.

The Tulsa based School of Religion with learning centers located in eight areas across the state had nearly 500 church leaders enrolled in a course of study during the year.

The largest youth camp attendance at Burge Camp was reached this summer. It continues to grow each year though it is still small. About 10 percent of those attending professed faith in Christ.

Church-Community Ministries

This is the Oklahoma name for that area of ministry which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries. It is a non-

traditional approach of Southern Baptists to proclaim the gospel to people by ministering to their physical as well as spiritual needs.

Four missionaries jointly employed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and their local association are serving in Oklahoma. They are: associational directors of church-community ministries, Ed Onley, Capital Association; Rick Hagar, Tulsa Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Gray, Oklahoma City and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has co-sponsored with Tulsa Association a Women's Shelter, director, Sheila Deweese.

Financial support through the Cooperative Missions Department is given Capital Association to help with the ministry of Grace Rescue Mission and the Women's Center in Oklahoma City. Also, Oklahoma Baptist University receives some finances to assist a group of students to be involved in community ministries.

Some migrants are being reached by cooperating with language missions in supporting missionaries in the areas where the migrants are working.

Literacy missions, teaching Adult reading and writing and conversational English, continues to grow in numbers as well as interest. Churches and individuals all across Oklahoma are seeing this as a means of sharing the gospel. One statewide workshop was held last year at Falls Creek and another is scheduled in the fall of 1980.

Student Summer Missions

College students from nine states were assigned by the Home Mission Board to work in Oklahoma for ten weeks this summer. They served in rural, inner city, language, resort, general and migrant missions in 15 different regions of the state. Their transportation and salary were provided by the Home Mission Board. Lodging and food was provided by local people. Several of the student missionaries made commitments to vocational missions during the summer. The Department of Baptist Student Work of Oklahoma appointed and paid for eight additional summer missionaries to work in Oklahoma.

Refugee Sponsorship

The Cooperative Missions Department has served as the Baptist coordinator for refugee resettlement in Oklahoma. Cubans, Chinese/Vietnamese, Laotians, Thai and Vietnamese have been sponsored by Baptists in Oklahoma this year. The need is still great for sponsors. Thousands are still in refugee camps and can leave only when churches or organizations agree to sponsor. It is an evangelistic opportunity for those who are willing to become involved.

Pact

Project: Assistance to churches in transition is a plan to help churches who are located in transitional neighborhoods. One meeting for such churches was held in Tulsa and one is scheduled for Oklahoma City this fall. Four consultants are being trained in ways to assist churches who are in the transitional neighborhood. At the

invitation of the transitional church a consultant will work with the church in gathering and analyzing data, considering alternatives to existing programs and planning strategy for the future.

The motion carried to approve the report.

(2) Laddie Adams, director, Department of Brotherhood, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

(3) Dorothy Thayer, director of Girls in Action and Mission Friends, Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma.

Woman's Missionary Union

During the 1979-80 church year the work of Woman's Missionary Union centered on the emphasis, **Life Changing Commitment**. Throughout the year, all age-level magazines zeroed in on various aspects of Christian lifestyle and suggested ways of helping WMU members make life-changing commitments. The state programs were centered around this emphasis encouraging women and girls to look at their lives and see if God is working through them to bring about change in his world.

The work of WMU was directed by Abbie Louise Green until her retirement Aug. 15. She took early retirement "because of the serious illness of her father." Miss Green had served 17 years as director. Our thanks go to her for her fine leadership and the growth that Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma experienced under her leadership.

Other members of the staff are Eula Mae Stewart, administrative secretary; Dorothy Thayer, Mission Friends-Girls in Action director; Lawana Roberts, Acteens director; Carleata Horton, receptionist-secretary, and two part-time secretaries, Jean Archer and Flora Jean Everett.

The **Seventy-Fourth Annual Session of Woman's Missionary Union** was held Nov. 12-13 1979 at Immanuel Church, Tulsa. The theme for the session was **Bold Mission Thrust—Bold Growing, Bold Going and Bold Giving**.

The **Acteens Conference** for junior and senior high students was held March 7-8 at Oklahoma Baptist University. There were 819 members of Acteens and their leaders present representing 113 churches.

One hundred fifty-three associational WMU officers were present for the **State Training Clinic for Associational Officers**, April 25-26 at First Church, Oklahoma City.

A **Mother-Daughter Camp** was held May 23-24 at Camp Nunny-Cha-ha. A total of 109 were in attendance.

There were 659 registered campers during the six weeks of **Girls in Action and Acteen Camps**. Decisions included 28 professions of faith, 70 rededications and 15 for special service.

Twelve missionaries were secured and housed by Woman's Missionary Union for each of the five weeks of the **Falls Creek Assemblies**. WMU also works with Sooner Alcohol Narcotics Education in providing four teachers each of the five weeks to teach a class on "What the Bible Says About Alcohol and Other Drugs."

The 15 **Brotherhood-WMU Area Training Meetings** were held during the months of September and October. The total reached for WMU and the mission action conference was 981.

Scholarships were granted to 16 women to attend a Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. This is made possible through the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions.

Woman's Missionary Union secured writers for the program material for the State Mission Season of Prayer and prepared the materials for mailing to the churches. The 1980 theme is "Bold Commitment." The goal is \$300,000.

Woman's Missionary Union promotes the three special mission offerings—**Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions, Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions and Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions.**

The goal and total offering for each was as follows:

The 1979 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions—goal, \$400,000; offering received, \$466,098.08

1979 Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions—goal, \$250,000; offering received, \$269,582.56

1979 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions—goal, \$1,700,000; offering received, \$1,755,608.69

The motion carried to approve the report.

(4) Glenn Brown, associate director, planning and promotion, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Planning and Promotion

Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion office, an extension of the Executive Office, is directed by Lyle Garlow, who serves as associate executive director of the Baptist General Convention. Glenn Brown serves as associate director of planning and promotion.

The Planning and Promotion office is assigned several specific areas of work discussed later. The office coordinates the work of these departments which basically relate to local church programs and emphases—Brotherhood, Church Music, Cooperative Missions, Evangelism, Religious Education and Woman's Missionary Union which is auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention. In the coordinating capacity the office also is concerned with denominational planning, programing, calendaring and promoting.

Specific assignments include:

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM PROMOTION, Lyle Garlow, director

Cooperative Program receipts for 1979 were \$9,255,710, an increase over 1978 of 12.12 percent. Churches in Oklahoma reported \$92,595,167 in total gifts. These gifts included special offerings, building fund gifts and other designated gifts. Of the total gifts, churches shared 10 percent through the Cooperative Program. The

per capita resident member gift through the Cooperative Program for 1979 was \$22.20 compared to \$20.26 in 1978.

The mission giving percentage objective of the churches cooperating with the convention continues to increase. The number of churches with percentage objectives are: 36 between 1-4 percent, 384 between 5-9 percent, 592 between 10-14 percent, 198 between 15-19 percent, 79 between 20-29 percent, and two above 30 percent. Only 25 churches reported a dollar objective for 1979. Our goal is for all churches to have a percentage objective.

The Cooperative Program dollar in 1979 was divided 43 percent for SBC ministries and 57 percent for state ministries. The 1980 division is 43½ percent — 56½ percent, and the 1981 proposed budget recommends a 44 percent — 56 percent division. If the convention is able to progress on schedule we'll be at a 50 percent — 50 percent division in 1985.

Major Cooperative Program promotion for 1981 centers around:

- (1) January-February—Associational 75th Anniversary Jubilations
- (2) April 12—Cooperative Program Day—Church
- (3) April 26—Church 75th Anniversary Jubilation Sunday
- (4) October—Cooperative Program Month—Church
- (5) Pastor/Treasurer Appreciation Dinners in one-third of the associations
- (6) Materials explaining the Cooperative Program
- (7) Continued emphasis on weekly giving through the Cooperative Program

Materials for the associational 75th anniversary jubilations include the film, "A New Commitment to an Ancient Commission," the book **Oklahoma Southern Baptists Working Together** by Garlow/Ray, "Teachers' Guide" for the book, and a "75th Anniversary Supplement" to be used with the book.

STEWARDSHIP PROMOTION, Glenn Brown, director

The total of all tithes, offerings and designated gifts to Oklahoma Baptist churches increased slightly more than 15 percent over the previous year. This is on target with our Bold Mission Thrust goal (nationwide)—a 15 percent annual increase in gifts received.

Stewardship growth in the churches in 1980 was promoted through:

- (1) Seventeen associational stewardship conferences in addition to working with individual churches, pastors and budget committees.
- (2) The design and distribution of a packet of new stewardship promotion and budget development resources for every church, including a new, revised Tither's Enrolment Day (TED) program.
- (3) Providing updated information on pastor/staff compensation for use by budget and personnel committees.

More and more churches are adopting the principles of ministry-action budgeting as a means of projecting the ministries of their church and as an educational tool to help members to see ministries beyond expense figures.

COORDINATED PROGRAM PLANNING, Lyle Garlow, director

Bold Mission Thrust: Bold Growing, Bold Going and Bold Giving is the denominational theme, 1979-82. State goals for the emphasis were set and reported last year.

A packet of Bold Mission materials for 1979-80 were shared last year with each pastor, and a set of file folders with 1980-81 materials were mailed this year. Plans are now under way for Phase II of Bold Mission Thrust, 1982-85.

Special emphases are planned for the fall 1981 under the title "God Cares for You."

They include:

September-October—Television Impact

October 4—Training Union High Attendance Day

October 18—Scripture Distribution

October 25—Sunday School High Attendance Day and Harvest Day

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION, Glenn Brown, director

The area of work assigned to church administration consists primarily of (1) planning and conducting special interest conferences for pastors and staff members to strengthen their leadership skills, and, (2) provide assistance for training deacons, church councils and church committees. Support actions for 1980 included:

1. Planning and conducting the second Oklahoma Preaching Conference.

2. Making available video tapes and materials for use in associational preaching conferences.

3. Promoting a regional church long-range planning seminar.

4. Planning and conducting the education director's programing retreat.

In addition to these statewide conferences, help was given to individual churches concerning the work of church committees, deacon retreats, etc.

Plans for 1981 include more extensive use of the Falls Creek Conference Center in offering several special interest two-day administrative conferences.

ASSOCIATIONAL SERVICES, Lyle Garlow, director

There are 41 associations in Oklahoma. Each association is autonomous and self-governing. A basic characteristic of Southern Baptists is the spirit of cooperation. Through the planning and promotion office a liaison type relationship is established.

The state convention provided \$91,740 to the associations during 1980 as program and promotion supplements.

Two planning meetings for directors of associational missions are conducted annually. These meetings are designed to assist the associations and convention in mutual planning and skills development.

Changes in associational leadership since publication of prior **Book of Reports**:

Retirement from associational work—Haskell Beck, Salt Fork Association.

The **Public Relations** responsibility, including Dana Williamson, news writer, previously assigned to the planning and promotion office was transferred on Jan. 1 to the **Baptist Messenger and Communications Office**.

The motion carried to approve the report.

82. Keith Butler led in singing "Grace, Greater Than Our Sins."

83. Jesse Northcutt, professor of preaching, Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, addressed the convention concerning the work of the seminaries.

84. Paul Colvin, layman, First Southern Church, Del City, gave his testimony and demonstrated his use of signs in witnessing for Christ.

85. J. A. Pennington, chairman, presented the report of the Memorial Committee.

(1) J. A. Pennington read I Thess. 4:13-18.

(2) Jake Self and Bill Crow presented the names of those who had gone on to be with the Lord since the convention in 1979.

(1) Appreciation

WHEREAS, the First Southern Baptist Church of Del City, its pastor, its staff and employees have provided excellent facilities for the 75th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and

WHEREAS, our president is also the president of the Southern Baptist Convention and this is in itself a historical event,

THEREFORE, Be it resolved that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma commend the church and staff and especially express our prayerful support for Dr. Bailey Smith for his untiring, dedicated, and loving efforts for our denomination statewide and nationally.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(2) Pari-Mutuel Gambling

WHEREAS, gambling is in direct contradiction to the biblical teachings concerning personal morality and individual financial responsibility,

Be it resolved that the messengers of this Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma reaffirm our historic opposition to pari-mutuel gambling.

Be it further resolved that the messengers of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma urge individual Christians, churches and our denominational leadership to be vigilant in their stand for biblical principles concerning the use of material possessions.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(3) Alcoholic Beverages

WHEREAS, the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages is not an inherent right but is legalized by legislation,

WHEREAS, beverage alcohol is a poisonous narcotic which effects in a debilitating way body tissues,

WHEREAS, the use of beverage alcohol causes the breakdown of homes and families, leaving uncounted numbers of children as innocent victims,

WHEREAS, the use of beverage alcohol results in great economic loss due to absenteeism and inferior workmanship,

WHEREAS, the use of beverage alcohol figures in the majority of fatal traffic accidents,

Be it resolved that this 75th Annual Meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma stands opposed to any relaxation of laws controlling the manufacture, sale and use of beverage alcohol and urges the strict enforcement of existing laws.

Be it Further Resolved that the officers of this Convention be urged to keep conversant with the actions promoted by the beverage alcohol industry and use every morally and ethically sound means to prevent the relaxation of controls on the manufacture, sale and use of beverage alcohol.

Be it Further Resolved that the Board of Directors be asked to consider the creation of a fund for the purpose of providing for initial

expenditures in the effort to combat a relaxation of laws of control of beverage alcohol.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(4) Pornography

WHEREAS, the promotion of pornography destroys the moral and spiritual fiber of man: and

WHEREAS, pornography is in direct contradiction to biblical morality:

Therefore be it resolved that the messengers of the Baptist General Convention meeting in Del City, November, 1980 encourage local communities to set high moral standards for their residents and encourage state and local officials to be sensitive to the moral conscience of the citizenry of the State of Oklahoma and in particular to the local communities they serve and represent.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(5) Hostages in Iran

Whereas, the 1979 convention passed a resolution concerning the release of the hostages from Iran,

Be it Resolved that this convention prayerfully reaffirm that statement.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(6) Sacred Scriptures

WHEREAS, we accept the sacred Scriptures to be the inerrant and infallible word of God, as truth without any mixture of error and,

WHEREAS, we believe the Scriptures to be the sword of the spirit, and

WHEREAS, 1981 has been set aside for statewide Bible distribution;

Therefore be it resolved that we encourage each church and individual Christian to actively participate in this vital endeavor.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(7) Foreign Earned Income Act

WHEREAS, the Foreign Earned Income Act of 1978, which eliminated the \$20,000 exclusion from taxable income for United States citizens residing overseas places a new and significant tax burden on overseas employees of charitable and religious organizations ministering in foreign countries, and

WHEREAS, because of that, significant portions of the tithes and offerings of Baptist people given for the vital task of spreading the gospel to the uttermost parts of the world as well as for relief, healing, agriculture, and community development would be diverted to assist missionaries in payment of taxes, and

WHEREAS, December 15, 1980 is the date of the final extension for payment of \$1 million in taxes for 1979, and at least another \$1 million in taxes will be payable in each subsequent year, and

WHEREAS, the Foreign Mission Board already assists its missionaries in the payment of taxes to governments in lands where they

serve in excess of \$1 million annually, so that the loss of the overseas exemption represents double taxation,

Be it therefore Resolved, That the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at its 1980 annual meeting in Del City, Oklahoma, go on record as urging Congress to adopt an amendment to the tax laws of the United States that would restore the \$20,000 tax exemption to employees of charitable and religious organizations working overseas.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

(8) Bold Mission Thrust

WHEREAS, Bold Mission Thrust is God's call for every Baptist to be involved in presenting the gospel of Christ and for every person in the world to hear and respond,

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is committed to Bold Mission Thrust,

WHEREAS, we are in the second year of this Bold Mission Thrust,

WHEREAS, the Cooperative Program, augmented by the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions, the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions, and the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions is the lifeline of support for our total mission program,

WHEREAS, inflation is cutting into the purchasing power of mission dollars both at home and abroad,

WHEREAS, Bold Mission Thrust can never be accomplished by monetary support alone,

Be it Resolved that this 75th Annual Meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma appeal anew to the cooperating churches to make a new evaluation of their commitment to Bold Mission Thrust,

Be it further resolved that this convention renew its commitment to the Cooperative Program and the three special mission offerings,

Be it further resolved that every church be urged to challenge its members to consider God's will in their own lives relative to service as a mission volunteer as part of Bold Mission Thrust.

The motion carried to approve the resolution.

87. Hale A. Dixon made the following motion which was approved: "That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma be authorized to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention; and that the president and recording secretary of the convention be authorized to sign any legal papers of the convention which require signatures."

88. Keith Butler led in singing "Great Is Thy Faithfulness," "Jesus Loves Me This I Know."

89. Adrian Rogers, pastor, Bellevue Baptist Church, Memphis, Tenn., addressed the convention on the theme "Bold Believing for Bold Mission Thrust." He used Hebrews 11-12 as the basis for his message.

90. Bailey E. Smith presented the new officers of the convention for 1980-81. He also presented the gavel to the new president, Sam Pace.

91. Joe L. Ingram presented to Bailey E. Smith a certificate of appreciation for serving as president of the convention, 1979-80.

92. Joe L. Ingram called the convention to a new commitment in the cause and service of our Lord. Bailey E. Smith led in the prayer of commitment and the convention was adjourned until November 10-12, 1981 at Eastwood Baptist Church, Tulsa.

SALARY INFORMATION

Since the auditor's report does not give salaries of all elected employees, we are printing the salaries and benefits of department directors and associate department directors. Salaries of secretaries and other convention employees are in line with those doing similar work in the Oklahoma City area.

Salary and Fringe Benefits Explanation

Every employee receives a basic salary plus fringe benefits. The base salary may be divided as follows:

Cash

House Allowance (if ordained)

Various Annuity Board Plans

Fringe benefits include comprehensive medical insurance, long-term disability insurance, life insurance, accident insurance, dependent life insurance and retirement (10 percent of base salary). For unordained persons, the convention pays employer's part of Social Security.

Here are two samples from 1980 salary schedules. Annual base pay for department directors is \$23,171.76 and for associates \$21,306.24.

Employees who travel are reimbursed for their expenses when on convention business. The budgets carry a line item for the cost of leasing and insuring cars. There is an additional line item for other travel expenses which includes gas, oil, lodging, etc.

The salary proposals include a 10 percent cost of living increase, plus an additional amount for longevity. The Longevity Pay Schedule is explained following:

LONGEVITY PAY SCHEDULE

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved a longevity pay schedule for employees on May 15, 1978. A separate line in the budget indicates the longevity pay in order to clearly identify the base salary level which is the same for all employees with similar responsibilities.

Rationale Considered by Board of Directors

1. Presently, all employees are employed at the same salary for similar jobs.

2. Recognition for previous experience and skills is presently taken into account by beginning the employee at the same salary as his or her predecessor.

3. Short-term employees cost the BGCO repeated hours of training, moving expenses, etc.

4. A person becomes more valuable as he or she continues serving the BGCO.

5. There are a minimum number of positions in the BGCO and a person of ability, etc. often is limited in opportunities to move up in the organization to a higher salaried job. Longevity pay would help compensate at this point.

6. Recognition for continuous years of service could be accomplished through a longevity pay schedule that:

1) Acknowledges the completion of 3 years with a **\$200** base longevity compensation.

2) Increases each succeeding year with .2 percent of the salary, added to the base.

7. This suggested plan gives advantage to lower salaried persons by using the \$200 base for all persons.

8. The plan also gives credibility to longevity pay for higher salaried persons by using a percent of base salary for the annual increase.

Property and equipment purchased as a replacement for like items are expensed when purchased. Depreciation expense is not recorded. The effect of this practice as compared to generally accepted accounting principles, which would require capitalization and depreciation of property and equipment, is not determinable.

In our opinion, except for the adjustments that might be required, if any, to restate property and equipment for replacement items which have been expensed, and the effect of depreciation expense which has not been recorded, all as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1980, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

For the Year Ended December 31, 1980**

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include only operations designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund balances and results of operations of the following owned organizations, operated and reported as separate organizations, are not included.

1. Hugo Golden Age Home

2. Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Inventories—Inventories of office and printing supplies and items held for resale at Camps Hudgens and Nunny Cha-ha are stated at the lower of cost or market.

Inventories of livestock, poultry and feed at the boys' ranch and farm are stated at a nominal value. These items have either been grown or have been contributed and, therefore, have no cost value.

Property and Equipment—It has been customary to expense items, even though of capital nature, which are purchased as a replacement for like items which have been capitalized in the past. Otherwise, all items of a capital nature are capitalized.

It has not been the policy of the Convention to record depreciation. Therefore, items capitalized are generally carried at either cost or contributed value with no provision for depreciation.

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. It is recognized as income as received. The donor may designate its use by the Baptist General Convention.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. Funds held by the Foundation for Departments and Agencies included in this report are included herein. These funds were designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

3. Construction in Process

The Convention has initiated construction of a cottage at Baptist Children's Home, Owasso, Oklahoma. The total estimated cost is \$118,000. The amount expended at December 31, 1980, was \$88,152.

4. Operating Leases

The Convention leased many of the automobiles used in its operations on two year operating leases. The cost of these leases in 1980 was \$49,121. All but four of these automobiles were purchased in 1980.

5. Contingent Liabilities

The Convention is a named defendant in several suits involving hospital malpractice and a slander suit filed against named employees and directors. The suits are being defended by insurance carriers, and it appears that judgments, if any, will be covered by insurance.

GENERAL FUND

6. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense

On March 16, 1956, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1980, the unamortized balance amounted to \$13,493.

7. Notes Payable

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000, due in monthly installments of \$1,000 each applied first to interest from date at 5½% and then to principal. The note was created for expansion of The Baptist Book Store, Oklahoma City. The balance at December 31, 1980 is \$64,898.

Voyager Inn, Inc.—The Mayfair House, a motel, was located on land owned by Baptist General Convention. The Convention purchased the motel on November 29, 1971. The purchase involved the assumption of a note with Quail Creek Bank at 4½% interest with monthly payments of \$2,600 per month. The balance of the note at December 31, 1980 was \$61,320.

The motel was subsequently removed and the property leased under an operating lease agreement to C. A. Henderson for a term of 50 years (to December 31, 2025) for the total sum of \$1,560,000 at \$2,600 per month. An apartment complex known as Warwick West III was constructed on the leased land and Baptist General Convention will obtain title at the termination of the lease.

In addition, Baptist General Convention leased land to C. A. Henderson on which Warwick West I and II apartment complex was constructed. The lease is an operating lease agreement for 50 years with a total minimum lease payments receivable of \$1,672,356, payable by monthly payments of \$2,463 plus 2½% of all gross receipts from the lessee's apartment operations. The lease expires November 30, 2018, at which time the Convention will receive title to all improvements.

Subsequent to December 31, 1980, the Convention sold all land occupied by the Warwick West apartments to C. A. Henderson for \$2,000,000, and terminated the above leases. The proceeds from the sale are to be received in five annual installments beginning in 1986, plus interest at 10%.

8. Expansion Program

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma—On July 15, 1971, The Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises occupied by the Retirement Center to the Oklahoma Industries Authority, which issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Oklahoma Industries Authority subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years at an annual rental equal to the annual debt service requirements of the Authority on the bonds. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981 for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the Authority.

On March 1, 1978, The Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its "Baptist Laymen's Corporation (guaranteed by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma) Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C" in the amount of \$2,000,000. The Authority assumed responsibility for the completion of the Activities Center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years or until the bonds have been paid. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the Authority. The Corporation retained approximately 20 acres of land in trust for the Convention. Baptist Laymen's Corporation acts as the governing body of the Center for the Convention.

Baptist General Convention is contingently liable for the lease obligation and interest which total \$765,307 for Series A and B lease obligations and \$4,188,527 for Series C.

CHILD CARE FUND

9. Notes Receivable

By contract for sale and agreement for options dated May 27, 1966, between Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and W. P. Bill Atkinson Enterprises, Inc. and Travco Developers, Inc., the Convention sold an 800 acre dairy farm located in Oklahoma City in Sections 7 and 12, T13N, R4W.

The last option was exercised by the issuance of a note secured by a real estate mortgage. The present note is dated August 5, 1980, due January 14, 1981, in the amount of \$455,000 bearing 13½% interest.

TULSA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTER**10. Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center—Capital Lease Obligation**

On February 1, 1978, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma executed with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343. The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy the lease obligation. The lease is scheduled to terminate February 1, 2008.

The Convention has the right to purchase the Project at any time on or after February 1, 1988, at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the Bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all Bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

The Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center was constructed on land owned by Baptist General Convention which is included in the Child Care Fund (Note 2).

BAPTIST STUDENT WORK FUND**11. Baptist Student Center—Edmond, Oklahoma**

The Board of Directors on March 16, 1978, approved the assumption of the \$11,000 balance of a note incurred by First Baptist Church, Edmond, to finance the BSU Building at The Central State University, Edmond, Oklahoma. The note dated February 1, 1974, is to the Vernon L. Helt Foundation, Edmond, Oklahoma. The original amount of the note was for \$29,500, and carried an 8% interest rate. The balance of the note was paid in January 1980.

We have examined the fund balance sheets of THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA (a not-for-profit corporation) as of December 31, 1980 and 1979, and the related statements of receipts and expenditures and ownership, and expenditures and reductions of the Trust and Endowment Fund; income and fund balance, and changes in financial position of the Unrestricted Operating Fund; and receipts and expenditures and balance of undistributed gains (losses) of the Group Investment Funds for the years then ended. Our examinations were made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Generally accepted accounting principles for non profit organizations require that annuities be recorded by reflecting, as a liability, the present value of the actuarially determined future payments, and as income (or deferred income) the excess of the amount of the annuity gift over the liability. The Foundation has not attempted, at this time, to compute any liability in connection with annuities, or to determine the accounting treatment to be accorded such annuities based upon their individual provisions. It has not been practicable for us to determine the adjustments, if any, that might be required to the financial statements to reflect the liability to annuitants and the accounting treatment to be accorded such contracts, or the materiality of these matters.

In our opinion, except that no provisions have been made for depreciation of property, and for the liability for future payments to annuitants as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and the funds administered by it at December 31, 1980 and 1979, and the results of its transactions and operations, and the changes in the financial position of the Unrestricted Operating Fund for the years then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a consistent basis.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
 For the Years Ended December 31, 1980 and 1979

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting Basis of Statements—The financial statements are presented on the modified cash basis, which, because of the nature of the operations, does not materially differ from the results that would be obtained on the accrual basis, except for undistributed gains of the Group Investment Funds. Such undistributed gains are recognized as earnings of the Trust and Endowment Fund when received, and as disbursements of the Group Investment Fund when transferred.

Funds invested in the Group Investment Funds by the Trust and Endowment Funds invested in the Group Investment Funds by the Trust and Endowment Fund and Unrestricted Operating Fund are recorded as investments of the investor fund. These investments are also reported on the fund balance sheets of the Group Investment Funds.

Investments—All investments are valued at appraised or market value at time of gift, or cost, if purchased. This basis is not adjusted to recognize market value fluctuations occurring subsequent to date of receipt. For convenience in managing the funds entrusted to them, the Foundation trustees have established three group investment funds; (1) Funds loaned to churches as described in Note 3, (2) Funds invested in common stock of publicly held corporations, and (3) Funds invested in bonds of publicly held corporations.

The income, except for gains and losses on disposition of securities, are distributed to the trusts of the Trust and Endowment Fund quarterly. This income is reported on a cash basis.

Ownership—The ownership of the Trust and Endowment Fund has been separated into the various categories of trusts in this fund. Endowment Funds account for assets received under stipulation of the donors that such assets be invested, and that only the investment income be used for specific purposes until a specified time or the occurrence of a specified event or in perpetuity. The other Trust categories are either custodial in nature or are self-evident as to purpose.

Annuities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at an amount equal to the book value of their assets. No attempt has been made to compute any liability in connection with these funds for future payments to beneficiaries. During the current year, approximately \$40,249 (1979—\$36,856) was paid to the annuitants participating in these contracts.

Depreciation and Depletion—No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties or office furniture and fixtures owned by the Foundation.

Depletion of mineral properties is recognized in certain trusts as a percentage of income received from production of oil and gas. This procedure is followed to permit the Foundation to exclude a portion of the income received from mineral interests, and delay its distribution until future periods when this income will presumably be reduced.

Oil and gas properties are in various producing stages, and information is not currently available with respect to proved reserves or proved developed reserves. Earnings from oil and gas production totaled \$471,057 for the year ended December 31, 1980 (\$247,443 for 1979).

2. Investments

Current market values are not available on all investments of the Trust and Endowment funds. The following is a comparison of the cost or other basis of investments of the Trust and Endowment Fund for which current market value information is available or can be estimated.

The foundation, because of its fiduciary capacity for its trustors, does not record adjustments to recognize market value fluctuations.

3. Church Building Loans Receivable

The Foundation makes loans to Baptist churches to construct church buildings. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements. The lives of these loans vary from 10 to 15 years. The Foundation attempts to set interest rates at the current rate available from commercial sources.

4. The Old Baptist Building

On October 30, 1955, property known as "The Old Baptist Building" at 223 Park Avenue, Oklahoma City, with a cost of \$61,554, was leased to Felix Investment Company for a period of 99 years. The total consideration of \$1,070,000 is to be received over the lease period.

5. Notes Receivable—Payable

The Foundation borrowed from The First National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City on notes listed below. The proceeds of the notes were loaned to The Oklahoma Baptist University at the same terms.

The University was using trust 5007, of which it is the beneficiary as collateral for the loans. The net worth of this trust at December 31, 1978 was \$258,242. The notes were paid in 1979.

6. Note Payable

In order to satisfy commitments to make church building loans, a note was given to the Central National Bank of Poteau, Poteau, Okla. The Note was for \$280,000, bears 10½% interest, and was due May 24, 1980. The balance at December 31, 1980, was \$200,000.

7. Leased Equipment

The Foundation entered into an operating lease for an IBM 6450 information processor, for twenty-four months at \$885 per month.

**ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY
FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The information in this section, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of transactions in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements. In our opinion, except for the effect of the item noted in the accountants' report, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on November 6, 1946. It was created as a private, non-profit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

INSURANCE COVERAGE

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma carries the following liability insurance coverage:

A—Directors and officers liability insurance—The policy provides that the Foundation is reimbursed by the insurer when required or permitted to indemnify the directors and officers of the Corporation for damages, judgments, settlement costs, charges or expenses, incurred in connection with the defense of any action to which the officers and directors are a party. The total liability under this coverage is \$1,000,000 per policy year. The insurer pays 95 percent of the excess of \$2,500 per claim.

B—Workmen's Compensation, statutory requirement, and employers liability insurance with a maximum liability of \$500,000 per accident.

C—Automobile liability with coverage for bodily injury liability of \$300,000 and property damage liability of \$100,000 for each occurrence.

D—Commercial Blanket Bond covering losses due to dishonesty of employees. The limit of liability is \$500,000 with a \$5,000 deductible.

E—The Foundation also carries insurance under which "Comprehensive General Liability" coverage is provided to scheduled properties. The coverage per occurrence is (a) Bodily Injury Liability—\$300,000 (b) Property Damage Liability—\$100,000. A policy is maintained providing for \$1,000,000 excess coverage for the general liability coverage.

Accrual Basis—The financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation as explained later in this note. The statements of current fund revenues and expenditures are statements of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. They do not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as expenditures in the case of additions and normal replacement of buildings, equipment, library books and debt service.

The University follows the practice of adjusting the value of the library to the prior four years expenditures for books, periodicals and bindings, and an amount representing an estimated cost per volume. The increase in value for 1980 was approximately \$66,000.

Inventories consist of book store supplies for resale and maintenance supplies. These are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting into funds that in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments which were purchased by the University are generally stated at cost and investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Fixed Assets—Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

The University adopted the practice in 1979 of reducing the equipment balance by acquisitions over twenty years old. In 1980 and 1979, \$37,659 and \$769,200, respectively, were written off. The 1979 adjustment represented all purchases prior to 1959 and a \$10,625 adjustment to automobiles.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuition, fees, and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated causes are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and other contributions are recognized as income when received.

2. Pledges

As a result of organized requests for gifts, the following pledges, by fund, have been received and are uncollected. These pledges are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements.

3. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, and to the extent necessary, the income from WMU Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds described in Note 7.

4. All funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969, from pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign and designated for the student center project, and 75 percent of all funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969 from undesignated pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign were to be remitted to the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority under terms of a lease agreement between the University and the Authority. These funds were used by the Authority for redemption of Oklahoma Baptist University Authority Revenue Bonds, dated May 1, 1969.

5. Loan Fund

The Oklahoma Baptist University has received capital contributions from the federal government to the Nursing Student Loan Program at July 31, 1980 of \$224,507 (\$213,221 at July 31, 1979). An additional \$95,460 was advanced to the University by the government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans with \$67,446 having been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds, and from matching funds (10 percent of federal capital contributions) furnished by the school. Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the respective programs may have portions of principal and interest payments forgiven.

The following trusts are not included in the University's financial statements:

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The Prichard Trust had a corpus of \$4,931,519 at July 31, 1980.

The American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after payment of beneficiary and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$673,017 at July 31, 1980.

(A) The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, consists of 2¾% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$15,000 on November 1, 1976 to \$23,000 on November 1, 1955, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$878,387.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series 1957, consists of 2¾% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$17,000 on October 1, 1976 to \$33,000 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$1,115,505.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

8. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority

The University has entered into certain agreements with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, a public trust created for the benefit of The Oklahoma Baptist University.

1969—Lease Contract

On May 1, 1969, the University entered into a lease agreement with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. Under the Agreement, the Authority issued \$1,400,000 in revenue bonds for the construction of The University Center building on the campus. The University agreed to lease the new building until November 1, 1984, or until provision is made for the retirement of all bonds issued. The balance of the bonds outstanding at July 31, 1980 was \$150,000. The trustee has sufficient reserve funds for the payment of these bonds and interest.

1979 Capitalized Lease Obligation

The Oklahoma Baptist University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December of 1979, to obtain funds to construct a Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Activities Complex, to remodel the Brotherhood Dormitory, WMU Memorial Dormitory, and Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority obtained the funds for the improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979." The bonds are payable from the rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities.

The lease agreement is classified as a capital lease. The assets (\$4,869,247) and the lease liability (\$5,987,914) are recorded in the accompanying financial statements.

1975—Lease Obligation

The University entered into a lease agreement dated February 1, 1975 with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. Under this agreement, the Authority issued its capital facilities revolving note for a maximum of \$1,500,000 which, together with donor pledges, was issued to acquire, construct, equip and furnish a learning center; to remodel and modernize Montgomery Hall; and to acquire, construct, equip and furnish additional student housing at the University.

This note was paid from proceeds of the Authority's bond issue "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bond, Series 1979," dated December 1, 1979, and the lease was released.

This lease was carried on the University's books as an operating lease with neither the liability nor the assets purchased recorded. The payment of the note released the following assets, which were then recorded on the University's books.

11. Operating Leases

The University has entered into two lease agreements which are classified as operating leases. The first is the lease of an apartment house for a period of 15 years from May, 1967, at a rental expense of \$1,858 per month.

The second is the lease of land upon which the physical plant was constructed. The lease is for a period of 25 years beginning in November of 1977. The lease provides for a rental expense of \$250 per month. The lease contains an option to renew at the end of the lease.

The total rental expense for operating leases was \$25,296 for both 1980 and 1979.

12. Prior Period Adjustment

The current fund unrestricted and restricted fund balance at July 31, 1979 have been restated from amounts previously reported. The restricted fund balance was increased by reclassifying amounts which were inappropriately reported as liabilities and receivables instead of a portion of restricted fund balance. The restricted fund balance was also increased and the unrestricted fund balance decreased by these same net assets which were held in the unrestricted balance sheet section, but were part of the restricted fund. The net effect was to increase restricted fund balance by \$140,419 and decrease unrestricted fund balance by \$59,806.

While the balance sheets for 1979 have been restated for these changes, data necessary to reclassifying revenues from other private grants is not available, and the amount previously reported for 1979 has not been changed.

Organization

The Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909 to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that convention. Articles of Incorporation were filed February 9, 1910 and amended November 25, 1974 with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a corporation of perpetual duration without capital stock. The purpose of the corporation is to encourage support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

AUDITOR'S COMMENTS

June 30, 1980

The General Fund cash account balance was verified with the depository. Petty cash funds were closed during the year with Office having no petty cash funds and Kitchen receiving funds direct from checking accounts.

The Bond Fund account with First National Bank, Oklahoma City, was verified with the Trustee Bank. Deposits are being made monthly to the Trustee Bank for retirement of bonded indebtedness as required by the bond indenture. Deposits for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1980 were \$469.96 under the required amount.

The average number of residents for the year ended June 30, 1980 was 95. This was an increase over the prior year of 7. Resident accounts receivable shows an increase of \$10,330 over the prior year. Over 30-day accounts are 7.75 percent of total accounts receivable.

Insurance coverage on Nursing Home building increased to \$1,000,000.00 during this fiscal year, an increase of \$75,000.00. Personal property of the home remains at \$100,000.00. Administrator's residence has coverage of \$44,000.00. Administrator's personal property coverage of \$15,000.00 was added this year. Baskett House remains the same at \$75,000.00. The Authority also has coverage of liability and workmen's compensation insurance.

Capital improvements to the Nursing Home Building for the year ended were \$34,122.00 with major improvement being in the air conditioning system. Administrator's Residence improvements were \$8,520.00. Purchase of new office equipment was \$6,619.00 and Furniture and Fixtures of \$2,602.00. A new fence was built at a cost of \$3,296.00.

Operating income reflects an increase of 24.18 percent for the year ended June 30, 1980 due largely to increase in resident service charge and increase in average residents. Operating expenses show an increase of 13.29 percent for the same period with greatest increases in salaries, consultant fees, food and repairs. There was a decrease in insurance expense for the year.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Years Ended December 31, 1980 and 1979

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Center reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provisions of that guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds—Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property, plant and equipment are added to the unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for board-designated purposes are not considered to be restricted. The Center currently has no balances of unexpended funds which are considered to be restricted.

Basis of Accounting—The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period service is provided.

Inventories—Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property, Plant, and Equipment—Depreciation is provided on the straightline method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

Land improvements	5%
Buildings and improvements	2 to 5%
Fixed equipment	5%
Major movable equipment	10%

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation.

Investments Held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as a recipient for funds that could be invested. Funds held by the Foundation, included herein at cost or market value at date of receipts of donation, were derived from contributions both by the retirement center and individual donors for the retirement center as beneficiary.

2. Expansion

Prepaid Professional Fees—\$28,434 was expended in architectural and planning costs at the Center. It was allocated to building costs in 1979.

Community Activity Center—A campaign was begun in 1976 to raise \$250,000 in contributions to construct an activities center for the retirement center. At December 31, 1978, a total of \$220,780 was pledged, of which \$24,278 (\$31,008—1979) remained uncollected. The cost of the activities center was \$408,083.

Apartments—Apartment construction began in March 1978 on 112 ground level apartments. Construction was completed in 1979 at a cost of \$1,428,862.

3. Capitalized Lease Obligations (Bonds Payable)

On June 10, 1964, land on which the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

As of July 15, 1971, the Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA), which organization then issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. On this same date the OIA subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981 for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The Series A and B bonds outstanding at December 31, 1980 totaled \$510,000 (1979—\$558,000).

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation (guaranteed by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma) Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The OIA assumed responsibility for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons (Note 2). The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988 for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The bonds outstanding at December 31, 1980 totaled \$1,980,000 (1979—\$2,000,000).

**ACCOUNTANTS' STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY
FOR SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Our examination has been made primarily for the purpose of formulating an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The information in this section, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position, results of operations and changes in financial position in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, is presented for supplemental analysis purposes, and has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements. In our opinion, this information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Organization

Baptist Retirement Center was constructed in 1965 by Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a nonprofit corporation affiliated with Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Center is located on Northwest Highway and Council Road in Oklahoma. It consists of Lackey Manor, (a nursing home), houses and apartment units located adjacent thereto.

In 1974 the Baptist Laymen's Corporation conveyed ownership of the Center to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Baptist Laymen's Corporation continues to operate the Center for the Convention.
