Second Amended Articles of Incorporation

of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

TO: WILLIAM N. CHRISTIAN, SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for

pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the abovementioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and

institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the abovementioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III.

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I-NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.
- Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent

and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee

shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their actions shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, electan executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the conven-

tion next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually attached time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and

distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds voteof the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments berecommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist**: **Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Articles III shall not be changed or

amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is.

understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than the officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called Board meeting, the President and Executive Director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the Board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommenda-

tion, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 5. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 6. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER — The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations,

and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of Executive Director-Treasurer becomes vacant:

- (1) In the event the vacancy of the office of Executive Director-Treasurer occurs between sessions of the Convention, the Associate Executive Director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the Board of Directors.
- (2) A Search Committee of seven members of the Board of Directors shall be elected without nomination by the Board of Directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.
- (3) When the Committee has a nomination to make to the Board, a meeting of the Board of Directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the Board of Directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the Convention.
- (4) The person elected by the Board of Directors shall serve until the Convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.
- Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contacts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto: and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.
- Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to afflix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's Board of Directors and boards

of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected convention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTEES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

ARTICLE V-STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

Resolutions

Concerning Baptist Churches

A resolution concerning "Baptist churches" was adopted by the Convention November 10, 1949.

"Be it resolved that the words 'Baptist churches' which appear in Article II, Section 1, be interpreted to mean churches that are sound in faith and practice, and

"Be it further resolved, that churches which accept alien immersion, practice open communion or affiliate with the Federal Council, World Council or similar unionizing organization, shall be considered unsound in faith and practice."

Charter and Bylaws

of

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said

resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY, A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

February 26, 1980

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention

held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parlimentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. meeting shall be held in October on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect its officers, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of April, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and an Assistant Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first meeting of the University's fiscal year.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the inter-

val between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary from the State of Oklahoma or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 12. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University

and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 13. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semi-annual meeting in April of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 14. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 15. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of the Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 16. There shall be formed from the membership of the Board of Trustees an Executive Committee consisting of not more than seven members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

The following officers of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Secretary of Board of Trustees.

The following Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the Board of Trustees, who are appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Committee on Student Development, Chairman of Committee on Academic Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Business Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Development Affairs.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be Secretary of the Executive Committee.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session and to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the Board of Trustees; 'said Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Section 17. The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

Section 18. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

ARTICLE I

Name

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUN-DATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

- 1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
- 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;
- to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;
- 4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;
- 5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and
- 6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and dispo-

sition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII

Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII

Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IX

Prohibitions to assure tax-exempt status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI

Adoption of Amended Articles

- 1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.
- 2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the ___ day of _____, 1974.
- 3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

Amended Bylaws

of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

(Effective December 20, 1974)

ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II Meetings

- 2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of the directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.
- 2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.
- 2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.
- 2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.
- 2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer

notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

ARTICLE III Officers

- 3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.
- 3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.
- 3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

- 4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- 4.2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 4.3 **President.** The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.
- 4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer)

without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that at any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.

- 4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.
- 4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.
- 4.4 Vice Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.
- 4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V Directors

- 5.1 **Duties and Restrictions.** The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.
- 5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said

annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

- 5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 5.2 Election of Directors and Term of Office. In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as Directors.
- 5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.
- 5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of all standing committees and the President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.
- 5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.
- 5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE VI

Administration of Funds and Property

6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and,

in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.

6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

- (a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.
- (b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE VIII

Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

- 8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer or employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.
- 8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist

General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S COR-PORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.
- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

ARTICLE I Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Director or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III

Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporamay be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24)) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meeting.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV

Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V

President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII

Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X

Notice of Regular Meetings

Section 1. DISPENSED WITH. Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI Amendments

Section 1. METHOD OF AMENDMENT. These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII

Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this.

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Tulsa

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION OF TULSA.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The corporation is formed exclusively for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), and particularly the following purposes:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or

assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.
- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees; or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;

- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;
- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and

in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was seventeen (17). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the Administrator of Lackey Manor in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, or their successors in office, shall at all times be Directors of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Owasso, Oklahoma, on the 28th day of September, 1979, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

John D. Setser, Calvin Vogt, Howard Doak, Charles Leake, Bert McElroy, Joe Huitt, Norman Farrell, J. Ray Smith, John Crain, Claude H. Rogers, Joseph R. Coleman, Al Geiger, Victor Thompson, Robert D. McCullough, Joe Moore, John Nikkel, Joseph M. Best, and Joe L. Ingram, Ex-Officio and Don Donalson, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner or to such organization or organizations organized or operating exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Directors shall determine and which disposition has been approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District

Court in the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Combined Session of the Woman's Missionary Union and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma
75th Anniversary Celebration

- 1. Beginning at 6:30 p.m. was presession music by the Oklahoma Baptist University Chorale, directed by James D. Woodward.
- 2. Sam W. Pace called the 76th annual session of the Baptist General Convention and the 75th Anniversary Celebration to order at 7 p.m.
- 3. Ruffin E. Snow, interim pastor, Eastwood Church, welcomed the convention and expressed the gratitude of the church in having the convention held in its facilities.
- 4. Forrest Siler, pastor, First Church, Lawton, gave the report of the Program Committee.

"The Program Committee recommends that the program that is printed and being distributed among the messengers serve as the official program of this 76th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and the 75th Anniversary Celebration with such changes as may become necessary throughout the convention. We further recommend that all new business be presented by Wednesday afternoon in order that the Program Committee may announce the time for discussion of such business."

The motion carried to adopt the report.

Oklahoma Baptist University E. Eugene Hall, President

In the past year, Oklahoma Baptist University has renewed its commitment to offer the finest in quality higher education while maintaining the Christian distinctions of its Southern Baptist heritage. The university's foundations have been further buttressed by wise academic and administrative reorganization, as well as with positive, forward steps in developing OBU's physical plant.

OBU had a non-duplicating headcount in student enrolment of 1,776 for the 1980-81 academic year. Seventy percent of these were Oklahoma residents. The remaining 30 percent came from all over North America and 21 different countries. Oklahoma Baptist University conferred 242 baccalaureate degrees from 75 areas of concentration in 33 departments of instruction.

United States Senator David L. Boren, OBU faculty member in political science from 1969-1974, gave the 1981 Commencement address at the annual May exercises. He expressed his appreciation for the meaningful relationship he has maintained with the OBU family. Boren challenged the attentive assembly to enter the decade of the 1980's with a new spirit of determination, courage and vision.

In 1980-81 over 440 OBU students were preparing for Christian vocations. Of these students, those who intend to pursue pastoral/missions/religious education careers preached 1,260 sermons, shared the gospel with nearly 7,200 people, travelled over 340,000 miles in ministry or mission related work, reported 625 people accepting Christ as Savior and 1,179 other decisions.

Financial aid for OBU students is important to their scholastic success. During the most recent year for which comprehensive data are available, 1979-1980, 93.1 percent of OBU students received \$826,225 in academic scholarships, \$441,477 in loans, \$1,137,432 through grants, and \$298,723 through student campus employment and college work study. The 1,425 non-duplicating recipients received an average award of \$1,897 totalling \$2,703,857 for the year.

The academic departments were reorganized to offer students a more complete and comprehensive education in their respective areas of study. The university now houses the Warren M. Angell College of Fine Arts, the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Nursing, the School of Business and Administration, and the School of Christian Service.

The School of Christian Service is composed of the departments of religion and philosophy. The school cooperates with the Department of Church Music, and assists in curriculum development in areas such as church recreation and church business administration. The School of Christian Service is vital in developing off-campus programs as well as campus-based workshops to serve the Baptist churches of Oklahoma. It also provides educational assistance to the bi-vocational minister. The dean of the School of Christian Service is

John W. Tresch, former associate professor of evangelism at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

The 1980-1981 year saw the initiation of the Herschel H. and Frances J. Hobbs Lectures in Baptist Faith and Heritage. The lectures were endowed by friends of the Hobbses and the university. Hobbs gave the first lectures in the fall of 1980, and William Hendricks from Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary presented lectures during the spring term.

During the past year OBU hosted several Baptist groups on campus: the annual Senior Adult Conference; a national Southern Baptist Convention music festival; a statewide minister of education conference; the State Acteens conference; a Young Musicians Festival; and "Jubilation," a youth choir clinic sponsored by the Sunday School Board.

Oklahoma Baptist University sponsored an evangelism/outreach team named **Harbor**. The team, comprised of four vocalists, a preacher, and a tour director, travelled extensively in the western United States during their three-month ministry in the summer of 1981.

A new structure for OBU's student development program emerged consisting of three specific program areas each headed by an associate dean. The associate dean for counseling and university chaplain coordinates religious life and activities on campus. The associate dean for student activities and University Center director oversees general student activities and the operation of the University Center and coordinates the utilization of university facilities for Baptist groups. The associate dean for residential life supervises student housing and also assists Baptist groups coming onto the campus.

This past year was a record-breaker for OBU athletics. Women's Volleyball boasted a 32-11 record and were the Oklahoma AIAW Division II Champions. Men's basketball had its best season since 1967 and finished 24-9. Men's tennis sported a 15-2 match record and were the champions of the Sooner Athletic Conference (SAC) and District 9. The netters were champions of the SAC for the third straight year. OBU also hosted or conducted a number of camps in soccer, basketball, tennis and cheerleading.

Bison athletics will experience real growth upon the completion of the \$3,000,000 health, physical education, recreation activities complex in September 1982. The new complex will house a 2,600 seat basketball arena, a 25-meter swimming pool, four handball/racquetball courts, a human-performance laboratory, physical education classrooms, dressing and training rooms, an Athletic Heritage Center and athletic offices. The HPER Center will be the focus of a new community-centered recreation program.

Oklahoma Baptist University's physical plant experienced rejuvenation and growth during 1980-81. Renovation of WMU and Brotherhood Dormitories was completed at a cost of over \$3.5 million. Dedication services for the new life in these dormitories were held during homecoming exercises. New typesetting equipment was installed for

journalism students which is comparable to that used by copy editors of major metropolitan daily newspapers. Two Tulsa families donated funds to complete the Raley Chapel pipe organ. The language lab in Shawnee Hall was remodelled incorporating the most modern electronic teaching and learning aids. Campus lighting was improved by installing outdoor lights which illuminate the paths between the academic buildings and campus residences. Ford Music Hall was refurbished using a grant from relatives and friends of the Ford family. Long-awaited new parking lots were prepared for faculty members and residents of men's and women's housing. A new computer laboratory was installed in the Mabee Learning Center, provided from funds donated by Tulsa friends of the university. Other remodelling and improvement projects were begun and/or completed.

The development program was very successful this past year. Benefactors of the university gave over \$2,100,000, including gifts of \$309,615.14 from the Oklahoma Baptist Foundation. Those individuals, foundations and corporations comprising the President's Council and recipients of Distinguished Leadership Awards gave \$1,901,771.64, or 90.1 percent of the total development funds for the university. These gifts included \$1,000,000 from the Noble Foundation, \$500,000 from the Mabee Foundation, and \$100,000 from the Rapp Foundation.

Current concerns of the university's administration include growth in enrolment; the development of a scholarship program for Baptist young people who attend OBU; attracting endowment funds for the School of Christian Service and for faculty development for the entire university; and continuing the effort to complete the campus by 1985, OBU's Diamond Jubilee.

OBU has faced great challenges in her past and stands firm to confront those of the present and future. The leadership of Oklahoma Baptist University comprehends the essentiality of the university's enterprise, namely, to prepare Christian leaders for effective service in the various vocations through an educational program which adheres to the truth revealed in faith in Jesus Christ as Lord. OBU is confident that God's blessings through the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma will enable us to be responsible stewards by meeting the spiritual and intellectual needs of our students and our constituents.

Report of the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

C. Fred Williams, President

This year the oral report of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is presented in the form of a drama, the title of which is "The Good Provider." We express our appreciation to Brack Marquette, chairman of the Department of Speech and Theatre at Oklahoma Baptist University, and drama students for the preparation and production of the report. The written report affirms again that the Foundation is a child of and responsible to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma through a board of directors of 16 people elected by the convention. The Foundation's articles of incorporation as amended on Dec. 20, 1974 and approved by the board of directors of the convention on May 27, 1975 affirms that the primary purpose of the Foundation is to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money, other property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of the gospel of Jesus Christ as represented by the agencies, institutions and departments of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Since the Foundation is the only incorporated trust agency of the convention and since the convention has directed all of its agencies, institutions and departments to transfer all endowment funds which come to them to the Foundation for managing, the Foundation bears a double responsibility both to the convention and to its agencies, departments and institutions.

The board of directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, therefore, makes this report to the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma with an awareness of the sacred responsibility under which it serves.

The annual report for the year concluded July 31, 1981 shows that the total endowment and capital needs assets were \$27,972,648.85. Total receipts for the period were \$5,468,610.39 and total earnings from investments were \$2,798,723.18. This is the most ever earned by the Foundation in one year and reflects a 10.8 percent earnings on average assets for the period including the non-income producing assets such as life estates. All endowment and capital needs funds are managed in strict compliance with the trust instruments created by those who gave them.

The business and professional people who comprise the Foundation's board of directors are active members of Baptist churches. They provide general guidelines regarding major decisions for the management of assets. The Foundation's administrative staff carry out these directions. Current board members are: Henry O. Arnall Jr., chair-

man; Paul Box, Wayne M. Pack, Donald L. Sullivan, vice-chairmen; Bill G. Cantrell, Howard J. Doak, Joe F. Gary, Cecil R. Ivey, Eugene M. Knight, James M. Loepp, M. L. Marrs, Bill W. Presnell, Ben Shackelford, H. Forrest Tennant, Robert M. Wadlow and Barney Ward.

For administrative purposes and distribution of staff responsibilities, the activities of the Foundation are divided into six sections over which the president provides general supervision and direction. The sections are: Accounting Services, Church Loan and Property Management Services, Estate Planning Services, Communication and Estate Stewardship Services, Computer and Special Investment Services and Personal Trustee Services. This report is presented accordingly.

Church Loan and Property Management Services

Church Loan Services:

The church building loan trust fund is the largest of the three investment pools administered by the Foundation. By direction of the board of directors up to 50 percent of the total assets held by the Foundation may be invested in church building loans. As of July 31, 1981, 48 percent of the assets were in this pool. As funds for investment are received and become available the general investment committee determines the amount to be invested in each of the pools.

The first church building loan was made in 1954. Since that time more than 644 loans have been closed for a total exceeding \$26 million.

The policies and regulations for church loans are discussed thoroughly with the leaders of each church making application for a loan. After meeting with the church the application is presented to the board's church building loan committee which makes the final decision on the loan.

During the past 12 months 29 loans have been made totaling. \$3,150,343. An additional 19 loans have been approved for \$3,546,500 which will be made available to churches upon the completion of construction and when funds are available.

As repayment by churches is made, the principal is reinvested in the church building loan fund and made available to other churches while the interest is distributed to the Baptist cause or causes designated by those who gave the funds. Thus, both interest and principal go to support the same causes which churches support through the Cooperative Program. More than \$7 million in interest income has been distributed to Baptist causes since the beginning of the church building loan fund.

During the past 12 months 30 churches have paid their loans in full; 202 loans are now in existence for a total of \$13,079,719.52.

Property Management Services:

Management of all real property held by the Foundation is supervised by a committee of six members of the board of directors along with two other men who are professionals in the field. The committee meets upon call or each month when other committees meet. Decisions to sell, lease, rent, repair and renew leases are determined by the committee after conferring with Marvin H. Hall, vice-president in charge of property management and church loan services.

Real property held by the Foundation consists of houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and open grassland. The Foundation does not operate any business or farm but leases them to others for operation. Income from real estate rentals is distributed as directed by the donors. The Foundation leases grassland and farms on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential property is rented by the month for cash. Total value of all real estate held by the Foundation is in excess of \$3 million.

Mineral interests held by the Foundation are supervised by a committee of seven board members and two additional men who are experts in the field. The committee meets each month and reviews lease offers, bonuses, rental delays and sales. Because of the accelerated search for energy this is a very busy committee. The Foundation holds mineral interests in 10 states and 56 counties in Oklahoma.

Income from mineral interests during the last 12 months was . \$840,399.08.

Estate Planning Services

The term "services" is not a misnomer. The estate planning assistance really is a very valuable service performed for Baptist people, families, churches and ministries.

Assistance in planning for last wills and testaments is available to those persons who desire to leave some portion of their estate to Baptist causes. All that is required is an invitation to provide that assistance.

The Baptist Foundation will also, upon the request of one who remembers Baptist causes in his or her will, serve as executor or as trustee without fee for doing so.

In the period covered by this report (Aug. 1, 1980-July 31, 1981) the Foundation gave assistance to 1,155 who requested this aid in planning for their wills. There were 15 gift annuity contracts signed and 27 trusts prepared in which Baptist causes were remembered. Twenty-five wills were admitted to probate in which Baptist causes were beneficiaries.

This reflects a marked increase in the number of people who have requested the services of the Foundation in the preparation of their estate plans.

Requests may be made through the Oklahoma City office or through the offices in Tulsa, Lawton and Shawnee.

An attractive placard is furnished to churches when members use The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in planning for their wills. These placards reflect the number of members in that church who have done so. This number is updated every three months. The display of this placard in a prominent place is a constant witness to the eternal stewardship of that church.

Communication and Estate Stewardship Services

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has an important message to communicate. It is that there is an ever increasing need for the endowment of Baptist work to assure the future effectiveness of our Christian witness and ministries, and that the "stewardship of estates" is a biblical concept, and therefore the responsibility of every Christian.

However, to communicate this message is not simply a matter of telling it. It involves relating to different groups of people with different interests and at different levels of understanding. Effective communication requires a variety of approaches and methods.

Communication in the churches:

Seldom a week passes when Foundation staff members are not invited to preach in churches across the state and often on such occasions they are asked to lead estate planning seminars. Wherever they speak they represent the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. During this past year, Foundation staff members spoke in 214 churches and led 33 seminars at mid-week services or during the Church Training hour on Sunday evening.

The color slide presentation, "Not All Foundations Are Made of Cement," was shown in four churches in Caddo Association during

January, 1981, in observance of "Make Your Will Sunday." Also during the past 12 months the movie, "A Better Way," was scheduled through the Foundation office and shown in more than 40 churches.

The Foundation also provides bulletin covers to churches for such special occasions as homecoming events, anniversary celebrations and building dedications. The covers, which are offered to the churches at no cost to them and in the quantity they desire, are attractively designed to fit the occasion and to communicate information about the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Last year three churches availed themselves of this service.

Perhaps the most effective method of communicating with the "person in the pew" is the bulletin insert. Last year more than 250,000 bulletin inserts were mailed to the more than 1,400 churches for distribution to their people on a Sunday during "January: Make Your Will Month" and again during "September: Baptist Foundation Month." Each year hundreds of requests for estate planning assistance are received in our office via coupons from the bulletin inserts.

Communication in the association:

Each association has an elected Baptist Foundation representative. Among this individual's responsibilities is to communicate information about the Foundation to pastors and church leaders in the association. He also promotes special emphases to be observed by the churches, such as "January: Make Your Will Month" and "September: Baptist Foundation Month." He further participates in the associational calendar planning process so as to schedule programs on estate stewardship.

A special training conference for associational Baptist Foundation representatives is conducted each spring. There were 17 in attendance at this year's meeting on May 1-2 in Oklahoma City.

In addition to meeting with the associational Foundation representatives, staff members met with the directors of missions several times last year.

For the past five years the Foundation has offered to each association program covers for the printing of the agenda of their annual meetings. More than 8,000 program covers were requested by 27 associations this year.

Foundation staff members also attend the annual association meetings in the fall. In most instances they are invited to speak to the Foundation report. Seven staff members were present in 37 annual meetings last year.

Caddo Association had a special dinner meeting in March, 1981, for pastors and wives and leading persons from each of the congregations in the associations. Foundation staff members presented the after-dinner program. This was an unusually good opportunity for communication.

Future Thrust is an educational emphasis conducted in at least two associations each year. The program consists of Foundation staff members speaking in the churches of the association, distributing literature, leading seminars and assisting individuals and families in estate planning. Last year 59 churches in Union and Central associations participated in two month-long emphases.

Communication with Baptist people:

The Baptist Messenger, with more than 100,000 circulation, is the most effective means of reaching the largest number of Baptist people every week. An article about estate stewardship or some phase of the Foundation's work appears in each edition of the Messenger. In addition to the weekly column, the cover page and other space is also provided for the promotion of the "January: Make Your Will Month" and "September: Baptist Foundation Month."

A special edition of the **Baptist Messenger** on Aug. 13 commemorated the 35th anniversary of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The entire 16-page edition was devoted to the Foundation's history, growth, present ministries and future plans. This edition, complete with feature stories and pictures, was nearly a year in preparation.

Care 'N Share, a publication of the convention's department of child care, also provides space to the Foundation for the promotion of special emphases in January and September.

Auguie Henry, Foundation executive secretary-treasurer emeritus, has for the past several years been writing a history of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. With the assistance of Marvin Gaskin, Oklahoma Baptist historian, a book entitled A Pillar of Strength was completed and published in January, 1981. The first printing of 2,500 was distributed to church media centers across the state, pastors and other persons requesting copies. Copies of the book were also made available to Baptist Foundation executives in other states and to Southern Baptist Convention leadership.

The Foundation further seeks to communicate with Baptist people and others through printed materials. Pamphlets on The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, Christian wills, charitable remainder annuity trusts and unitrusts, and gift annuity contracts are made available at seminars, programs and other meetings conducted by Foundation staff members. They are also mailed to hundreds of persons each year requesting additional information about wills or trusts.

Teaching at Falls Creek, participating in World Mission Conferences and senior citizen conferences are other ways that Foundation staff members keep in touch with Baptist people.

Communication with pastors:

It would be impossible to overestimate the importance of the pastor in any communication the Foundation seeks to have in the churches and with Baptist people. He may recommend and encourage his people to express Christian estate stewardship using the services of the Foundation or he may oppose or ignore the need for the endowment of Baptist causes and fail to inform his congregation.

In an attempt to communicate with pastors as to what The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is about, a pastor's program is conducted during eight months of the year. Selected pastors are invited to be guests of the Foundation on those days when the Foundation's board of directors meet as committees. An orientation program led by the

Foundation staff precedes the committee meetings. Pastors have opportunities to ask questions and to observe first hand the operations of the Foundation. During this past year 97 pastors attended these sessions.

To encourage pastors to preach on the biblical concept of estate stewardship model sermons on the subject were mailed from our office to the more than 1,400 pastors in the state. A number of leading pastors were invited to prepare manuscripts to be used as model sermons.

Communication with attorneys:

The Foundation works with hundreds of attorneys each year in securing the preparation of legal documents and in the probate of wills where the Foundation president is the executor.

To acquaint attorneys with the work of the Foundation and to get better acquainted with attorneys, dinner meetings for attorneys are conducted by Foundation staff members in cities across the state. Last year meetings of this type were held in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Ada, Stillwater, Durant and Chickasha with 79 attorneys in attendance.

Attorney packets containing specimen copies of wills, trusts, charitable remainder annuity trusts and unitrusts, gift annuity contracts and other materials were distributed to more than 165 attorneys during this past year. Since February, 1978 some 575 packets have been placed in the hands of those of the legal profession.

Communication with the general public:

When Foundation staff members speak in the churches or at other meetings across the state, press releases about the staff member are sent to the local newspapers in those cities. Press releases were also sent to selected newspapers across the state this past year to publicize such events as the election of a local citizen to the Foundation's board of directors, the election of C. Fred Williams as president of the Association of Baptist Foundation Executives and the conferring of an honorary doctor of divinity degree upon Foundation vice-president, Marvin H. Hall.

Public service announcements about estate planning are provided to radio stations in Oklahoma as a service of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Television spots about the Foundation's work are also made available to both network and cable stations.

Computer and Special Investment Services

Computer Services:

Since Jan. 1, we have been "on line" with our own in-house system. In spite of a few "bugs" in the program, it has greatly reduced our workload and we are able to provide more information to help in our management decision process. Though the cost is about the same as we were paying when we contracted this service, in a few years we will be far ahead in both cost and usable information.

Special Investment Services:

In light of recent developments in the stock market this area requires even closer work with the general investment and equity committees of the board. We have two investment pools to provide a more diversified investment portfolio. The equity investment pool is composed of common stocks and the fixed income pool is composed of corporate bonds.

Student Loans and Scholarships:

Since 1947 the Foundation has handled student loans and scholarships. These trusts, established through bequests in wills and by outright gifts, are primarily for the benefit of students attending Oklahoma Baptist University.

We currently hold over \$850,000 in scholarship trusts. Last year scholarships were awarded totaling \$400,000, including the Louise Prichard scholarships for religious vocation volunteer students at OBU. The loans carry a nominal rate of interest which is payable while the students are in school. Repayment of the principal begins upon graduation or when the students leave school. Loans currently amount to about \$50,000 each year.

Personal Trustee Services

A much appreciated service of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is the personal trustee service rendered through the office of the president. Since Jan. 1, 1980, H. Truman Maxey has served on a part-time basis as administrative assistant to the president for the express purpose of rendering personal assistance to those for whom the Foundation serves as trustee.

Personal trust funds are managed in the same manner as those held for Baptist causes. Through our personal trustee representative the needs for health care and personal necessities are provided. Several of these special people are in retirement homes; others still reside in their own homes. Upon the death of such individuals assets remaining in trust are held for Baptist causes as designated in the trust instrument.

Annuity and Ministerial Services J. T. Roberts, Director

Annuity

Growth, expansion and refinement of the programs provide an encouraging report on the current state of affairs at the Southern Baptist Annuity Board in Dallas, Texas.

"This significant growth takes place in the midst of some disquieting problems that still plague us. Staggeringly high interest rates, a destructive inflation factor and the uncertainty of the economy are some of the issues which impact our work," stated Darold Morgan, Annuity Board president.

"Joy and exhilaration are with us not only because some real progress has been made, but also because we are aware of the Lord's presence and power in these plans and actions," said Morgan. He expressed that new directions in the church pension area will command much of the board's attention for the next two years.

As of June 30, 1981, total assets held in trust by the Annuity Board totaled \$848,955,764. This is an increase of \$137,829,424 over June 30, 1980.

Premiums and dues through the first two quarters of this year reached a record \$34,581,980. A year earlier, the total was \$30,437,-746.

As of June 30 this year, the board paid a record \$11,584,120 in benefits to 16,322 annuitants.

Oklahoma State Convention Report

Oklahoma has: 874 churches and associations; 1,330 employees participating.

Through June, a total of 22,698 churches and associations were participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program with 31,922 employees. The number of new retirement applications received in the program in your convention during the first six months was 94. The following Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program.

Ministerial Services

The basic services provided through the office of Annuity and Ministerial Services are:

- -Maintain a biographical file on ministers and other church staff.
 - -Counsel with ministers, pulpit and other church committees.
 - —Promote a program of continuing education.
- -Promote the retirement and insurance program through the Annuity Board.

The church staff information service is being used extensively. Upon request, churches are assisted in securing pulpit supply and interim pastors.

A conference was held in December for the directors of missions at which time a representative of the Annuity Board served as a source person.

Deacon-Pastor Conferences were held in 12 associations during January, February and March, 1981.

Meetings for Oklahoma students at Southern, Midwestern, and Southwestern Seminaries were held in March, 1981. Individual conferences were scheduled with students who requested them. Also, a luncheon was given for Southwestern Seminary students who are enrolled on the Oklahoma Baptist University campus.

Seventeen Seminary Extension Centers were active during 1980-81.

Three hundred thirty pastors, directors of missions, other church staff, and laymen attended the 1981 Bible Conference. The 1982 State Bible Conference, May 3-6, will feature Milton Ferguson, president, Midwestern Seminary; Sam Pace, director of missions, Comanche-Cotton, Lawton; Keith Parks, executive director, Foreign Mission Board; Dick Rader, assistant professor of religion, OBU; Fred Sampson, pastor, Tabernacle Missionary Church, Detroit, Mich.

47. Richard T. McCartney, editor, presented the report of The Baptist Messenger.

Baptist Messenger Richard T. McCartney, Editor

The Baptist Messenger began publishing in 1912, six years after the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma was organized. For the past 69 years the Messenger has sought to keep Oklahoma Baptists informed about the cooperative work which binds us together.

The primary task of the weekly news magazine is to transmit information to the members of Oklahoma churches cooperating with the convention. A major portion of each issue is devoted to reporting news events in Oklahoma and around the world which have an impact on Baptist work. Some of these events are positive and some are negative, but most have an effect on what Baptist churches are doing or planning.

Inspiration is another task of the state paper. Frequent feature stories about people who are giving themselves to the service of Christ and other people are published. The inspiration derived from knowing how others are using their creative abilities and talents in God's service provides motivation for the people of God called Baptists to attempt greater things for him.

A third responsibility of the state paper is interpretation. The purpose of interpretation is to encourage people to think through issues and reach reasoned conclusions. The editorials and comment from readers and other writers deal with questions for discussion among Baptists. They are not statements of policy but raise issues for thought and discussion.

Circulation has increased significantly during the past 12 months. The number of subscribers for the first issue in September was 102,-591, more than 4,000 above the circulation a year earlier. The number of churches with special pages rose from 44 to 55 and two associations now use pages in the Messenger for weekly associational newsletters. A total of 93 special pages, the highest number in history, were published in the Sept. 3 issue.

The **Baptist Messenger** helps keep the cooperative spirit alive among Oklahoma Baptists. It goes into the homes of church members in every corner of the state fifty weeks of the year to help them understand and appreciate the mission programs they mutually support. It belongs in every Baptist home and should be sent by each church to its resident members.

The staff of the Messenger editorial office are the editor; two associates, Fern Hurt and Bob Mathews; a newswriter, Dana Williamson and secretary/receptionist, Bettie Moore.

- 49. Panel discussion: Missions in Oklahoma.
- (1) Child Care Department, Lowell Milburn, director.

Child Care Lowell D. Milburn, Director

The Department of Child Care seeks first of all to be thoroughly Christian in all of our services to children and their families. A second concern, however, is to be thoroughly professional in the sense of seeking the highest standards of excellence in caring for children.

CHILDREN SERVED: There were 679 children served during the past year. The staff also answered 343 inquiries about adoption and made 75 home studies. There were 71 unwed mothers counseled and served, 99 children cared for in foster homes, and 13 adoptions completed. There were 70 boys and girls baptized through our children's homes and others were reached through our foster homes.

STAFF RECOGNIZED: The staff numbers 97 full-time and 26 part-time and occasional workers, including supply houseparents for our four homes. The staff is receiving some 30-50 hours of training each year in the care of children who have more complicated problems. We have found that training makes a lot of difference in the toleration level of staff with acting-out youth.

Houseparents are needed from time to time and serving in this place is a wonderful missionary opportunity. Also, foster parents are needed in areas of a 60-mile radius of our homes.

ACHIEVEMENTS LISTED: Staff Handbook for our four homes was completed and published. The Oklahoma City home presented 16 Golden Alumni Awards at bienniel homecoming. Our Owasso Home had an 86 percent increase in number of children served in foster homes, 10 percent increase on campus, 43 percent increase in number placed for adoption and 32 percent more unwed mothers served. A fifth cottage was dedicated on the campus at Owasso and Madill.

RESOURCES ENUMERATED: The following were main sources of income: Cooperative Program, \$450,000; endowment, \$525,017; Mother's Day Offering, \$368,956; Birthday Offering, \$103,-148; sponsorship, \$69,668; farm, \$92,700. Total expenses were \$1,-830,530 and total income was \$2,197,763.

EXPANSION PROJECTED: The Baptist Children's Home in Oklahoma City was sold for \$12 million and part of the funds will be used to expand the child care ministry. Up to \$3½ million will be used to relocate the Children's Home on a site southwest of Moore. The remainder of the money will be put into endowment funds held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and 80 percent of the interest earned will be used for operations for the child care ministry. The remaining 20 percent interest will be added to the corpus. Further, board directors voted to expand the ministry by starting small children's homes in Duncan, Clinton, Woodward and McAlester areas. Plans call for doubling the number of children being cared for with enlarged budget of an estimated \$4,016,547 by 1985. Agnes and

Minnie Callaway have given 166 acres of land near Duncan on which to build a Children's Home.

GRATITUDE EXPRESSED: Child care is deeply grateful, first of all, to the Lord for his blessings and to all Oklahoma Baptists for their love, prayers and support in the care of homeless children. An urgent call to prayer is extended to all Oklahoma churches on behalf of the children and staff of the child care ministry.

(2) Brotherhood Department, Laddie Adams, director.

Brotherhood Laddie Adams, Director

Oklahoma Brotherhood is delighted to bring this report to you this year. Due to hard work of Baptist men, and particularly Brotherhood associational officers and training specialists, we had an increase of 1,852 in Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors. The 1980 enrolment of 17,581 was over our 10 percent goal. THANK YOU OKLAHOMA BAPTISTS.

—Five associations received \$15,950 from Oklahoma Baptists' Disaster Relief fund in '81—54 families were made aware that Oklahoma Baptists care in yet another way.

-Three mission offerings: Edna McMillan for State Missions; Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, and Lottie Moon Christmas Off-

ering were promoted.

(3) Woman's Missionary Union, Mrs. Frances Grafton, director.

Woman's Missionary Union Frances Grafton, Director

During the 1980-81 church year the challenge of the work of Woman's Missionary Union was, for the second year, to lead WMU members to make life-changing commitments. If Southern Baptists are to reach the Bold Mission goal of giving every person in the world the opportunity to hear the gospel, nothing less than life-changing commitments will do the job. Through the programs Oklahoma WMU has tried to accept this challenge to help women and girls find ways to spend less money and to save time in order to have more available for prayer and missions involvement. Life-changing commitments for the support for missions means that more Baptists will be involved in telling more people in more places about Jesus who loves them.

In the absence of a director the administrative work and office management has been carried out by Eula Mae Stewart, administrative secretary, as requested by the administrative committee. The work in the children's and youth area was directed by Dorothy Thayer, Mission Friends—Girls in Action director, and Lawana Roberts, Acteens director. Other members of the staff are Carleata Horton, receptionist-secretary, and two part-time secretaries, Jean Archer and Norma Anglin.

October 18-19, 1980 Oklahoma WMU sponsored its first retreat for MKs (missionary kids) which was held at Camp Nunny Cha-ha. The purpose of the retreat was for fellowship and inspiration. The program was planned and directed by Dick Rader.

The Seventy-Fifth Annual Session of Woman's Missionary Union was held Nov. 10-11, Del City, First Southern Church, "Committed" was the theme for the session with each meeting emphasizing a different commitment—spirit, thought and action.

In appreciation of 25 years of service, eight years as Young People's secretary and 17 years as executive director, the program carried a picture of the recently retired director, Abbie Louise Green. Immediately following the evening meeting a reception was held in Miss Green's honor.

In January, 1981, the National WMU launched an Enlargement Plan which will continue through September, 1983. The national plans will go hand-in-hand with the Enlargement Plan adopted by Oklahoma WMU Oct. 25, 1979. This is a joint effort between National WMU and State WMU to assist in organizing WMU organizations in churches without mission organizations. March 9-13 three women from Oklahoma, Mary McClain, Dorothy Thayer and Eula Mae Stewart, joined teams from every state in the convention in Birmingham, Ala. for a week of training. Others from Oklahoma will be trained later. The team will travel through Oklahoma and interpret the purposes of WMU to pastors and key women in churches without WMU and assist churches which need additional organizations. Oklahoma now has WMU work in 974 of the churches. Goals adopted by Oklahoma are to have WMU work in 1,049 churches by Sept. 30, 1982 and in 1,119 churches by Sept. 30, 1983.

Seven WMU Pastor Consultants have been enlisted. They are: Charles Becton, Elk City, First; Don Chaffin, Guymon, First; Gene Garrison, Oklahoma City, First; Cal Hunter, Mooreland, First; L. B. Flanigan, Valliant, Trinity; and Warren Hultgren, Tulsa, First. These are pastors who believe in WMU and have agreed to serve as a consultant to unofficially represent WMU in associational and state meetings and to help the state WMU to better relate to the churches.

The Acteens Conference for junior and senior high students was held March 13-14 at Oklahoma Baptist University. There were 883 members of Acteens and their leaders in attendance which represented 107 churches.

One hundred sixty-three associational WMU officers were present for the **State Training Meeting for Associational Officers**, May 1-2, First Church, Oklahoma City.

The third Mother-Daughter Camp was held May 22-23 at Camp Nunny Cha-ha. A total of 161 were in attendance representing 26 churches.

During the six weeks of Girls in Action and Acteens Camps there were 815 registered campers. Decisions included 28 professions of faith, 103 rededications and 23 for special service.

Missionaries were secured and housed by Woman's Missionary Union for each of the five weeks of the Falls Creek Assemblies. WMU also works with Sooner Alcohol Narcotics Education in providing four teachers each of the five weeks to teach a class on "What the Bible Says About Alcohol and Other Drugs."

The 15 WMU Area Training Meetings were held during the months of September and October. Missionary speakers for the three weeks included Leslie Williams, Mike Norfleet, Ruth Ann Smith and

Arylis Milligan. The total number of officers and members reached for training was 1,439.

Scholarships were granted to 10 women to attend a Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. This is made possible through the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions.

Woman's Missionary Union secured writers for the program material for the State Mission Season of Prayer and prepared the materials for mailing to the churches. The 1981 theme is "Go With Haste." The goal is \$325,000.

Woman's Missionary Union promotes the three special mission offerings—Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions, Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions and Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions.

The goal and total offering for each were as follows:

1980 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions—goal, \$500,000; offering received, \$564,980.57

1980 Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions—goal, \$300,000; offering received, \$311,363.47

1980 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions—goal, \$2,000,000; offering received, \$2,074,051.67

(Books close Dec. 31 for home and state offerings and April 30 for foreign mission offering.)

At a called WMU Executive Board Meeting, August 21, 1981, the Administrative Committee presented Mrs. Frances Grafton as their nominee for Director of Woman's Missionary Union. Mrs. Grafton was unanimously elected and began serving in this capacity Oct. 1.

The motion carried to approve the report.

(4) Cooperative Program, Lyle Garlow, director of Planning and Promotion.

Planning and Promotion Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion office is designed to assist all the areas of convention work, with special attention directed toward those departments which relate directly with the churches in the area of programing. Lyle Garlow, associate executive director of the Baptist General Convention, serves as director of Planning and Promotion Glenn Brown serves as associate director. This office organizationally is an extension of the executive office.

Coordination of programs is a vital concern to all Oklahoma Baptists. Through this office the programs of the following departments are coordinated: Brotherhood, church music, cooperative missions, evangelism, religious education and Woman's Missionary Union, which became a department on Oct. 1. Coordination includes, denomination planning, programing, calendaring and promoting.

Areas of specific assignment include:

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM PROMOTION, Lyle Garlow, director

Cooperative Program receipts for 1980 were \$10,667,483.78, an increase of 15.2 percent over 1979. These dollars were divided 43.5 percent for SBC mission ministries beyond Oklahoma and 56.5 percent for mission ministries in Oklahoma. The record of percentage distribution, 1973 through the 1985 projection is:

Churches in Oklahoma reported total receipts during 1980 of \$107,633,688. These gifts included special offerings, building fund gifts and other designated gifts. Churches shared an amount through the Cooperative Program equal to 9.9 percent of their total receipts. This is 1 percent higher than the SBC average of 8.9 percent. Since the total receipts include building fund and other special offerings, the percent of Cooperative Program dollars compared to budget receipts would be considerably higher than the 9.9 percent average.

Church total mission gifts were down last year by 1 percent which means churches spent more money locally. However, the Cooperative Program received a larger share of the total mission expenditure increasing from 53.9 percent to 56.6 percent. The balance of total mission dollars went to associational missions (which has remained at 2.5 percent for several years), special offerings and local missions.

Per capita giving in Oklahoma, through the Cooperative Program, for 1980 was \$24.97 per resident member. This compares with \$22 the previous year.

Our goal is "Every Church with a Percentage Objective for Missions Through the Cooperative Program." Only 168 missions and churches have no mission giving objective and 93 of these are Indian churches. Of the 1,337 churches with an objective, all have a percentage goal except 24 which are on a dollar objective.

Churches with percentage giving objectives are grouped as follows: 28 between 1-4 percent, 388 between 5-9 percent, 600 between 10-14 percent, 218 between 15-19 percent, 77 between 20-29 percent and 2 above 30 percent.

During January and February the 75th Anniversary Jubilation Celebrations were conducted in each association. More than 11,000 persons attended representing 953 churches. The book, **Oklahoma Southern Baptists Working Together**, Garlow/Ray, were distributed.

Major Cooperative Program promotion for 1982 centers around:

- (1) April 18—Cooperative Program Day
- (2) October—Cooperative Program Month
- (3) Pastor/Treasurer Appreciation Dinners in one-third of the associations

- (4) Materials explaining the Cooperative Program
- (5) Continued emphasis on weekly giving through the Cooperative Program

STEWARDSHIP PROMOTION, Glenn Brown, director

Total receipts in Oklahoma Baptist churches increased by 16.88 percent in 1980. This increase is above the approximate 15 percent increase in 1979 and places our churches on target with the objective proposed by Bold Mission Thrust leaders of at least 15 percent increase each year in local church receipts.

Churches reported 80,856 tithers out of a grand total of 430,958 resident church members—or less than one out of five. However, 303 churches failed to report the number of tithers.

Stewardship growth in the churches is being promoted in 1981 through:

- (1) Nineteen associational stewardship conferences;
- (2) Individual church consultations;
- The design and distribution of free budget and giving program materials;
- (4) A survey report on pastor/staff compensation.

Two key events are being projected for 1982: A "Large Church Stewardship Conference," May 24-26, 1982; and "Bold Mission Encounter"—a plan whereby trained laymen will be speaking in churches (by invitation) concerning Bold Mission Thrust, 1982-85, and the need for stewardship growth to support this worldwide evangelistic thrust.

COORDINATED PROMOTION PLANNING, Lyle Garlow, director

The BGCO denominational emphasis was coordinated with the SBC theme for 1979-82, "BOLD MISSION THRUST: Growing, Going, Giving." Special emphasis for the Fall of 1981 focused on "God Cares for You" and included:

September-October—Television, radio, billboards and newspaper impact

October 4—Training union high attendance

October 18—Scripture distribution

October 25—Sunday school high attendance and Sunday school evangelistic service

Expenses for the media impact, approximately \$85,000, was accumulated from the State Missions Offering. One-half of the cost of the 400,000 New Testaments was underwritten with \$142,500 from the 1980 Cooperative Program, making the 35 cent cost to the churches possible.

The 1982-85 emphasis "BOLD MISSION THRUST: Reach People, Develop Believers, Strengthen Families."

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION, Glenn Brown, director

The year 1981 was unique in church administration services in that a series of small-group skills conferences were offered to pastors, staff members and their wives at the Falls Creek Conference Center. Subject areas were: "Stress Management," "Pastoral Leadership for Growing Churches," "Pastoral Counseling," "Helping a Small Church Grow," "Pastoral Ministries for Bivocational Pastors," "Spiritual Growth Conference," and "Ministers of Education Programing Retreat," plus a conference for ministerial students conducted at OBU. The Sunday School Board assisted by providing leadership costs for all but two of the above conferences.

In addition to providing these statewide conferences, assistance was given to individual churches and associations, upon request.

The church administration office provides information and assistance in areas of pastor and staff skills, deacon ministry, long-range planning, and committee organization and functions.

ASSOCIATIONAL SERVICES, Lyle Garlow, director

Each association is an autonomous, self-governing body. Baptists choose to work together and it is a joy to work with the 41 directors of associational missions.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma provided \$91,912 in 1980 and has budgeted \$102,468 in 1981 for program and promotion supplements for associations. This is not salary supplements, but is intended to assist associations in promotion costs of programs mutually planned and promoted by the association and the Baptist General Convention.

Two planning meetings for directors of missions are conducted annually. These meetings are designed to assist the associations and convention in mutual planning activities.

Also Phillip Wade replacing Leslie Clark in Choctaw/Chickasaw Indian Association and Willie Brown replacing Peter Wall in Chi-Ka-Sha Indian Association.

The motion carried to approve the report.

- 50. Royce Brown led in the singing the hymn, "Amazing Grace."
- 51. Joe L. Ingram gave the report on retirement centers. He was assisted by Monroe Palmer, administrator, Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso, who spoke to the report.
- 52. Robert Haskins, director, Department of Cooperative Missions, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, presented slides

on Hispanic work and the celebration of continuous work with the Spanish speaking people in America for 100 years.

Cooperative Missions Robert Haskins, Director

Lyle Garlow, in his book Oklahoma Southern Baptists Working Together states, "Working together in mission advance characterizes Oklahoma Baptists. The strength of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is in its purposeful spirit of cooperation to take the gospel into all the world. In the early 1800's, the land, now called Oklahoma, was a giant mission field." It is still a mission field for Oklahoma Baptists. A truer word has never been spoken. Oklahoma is a mission field and Oklahoma Baptists and Southern Baptists through the cooperative efforts of the Home Mission Board are at work penetrating this exciting mission field. Thank you, Oklahoma Baptists, and thank you, Southern Baptists, for your dedicated mission support.

Language Missions

Twenty-four full-time missionaries and 11 part-time missionaries work in language missions with American Indians, Hispanics, Koreans, Laotians, Cambodians, Vietnamese, Japanese, Chinese, Thais, Indonesians, Internationals and the deaf. They traveled approximately 400,000 miles in their mission work and reported 1,243 professions of faith, additions by letter and special service commitments.

Two very historical events took place this year in our work with the deaf. The First Church of the Deaf began on April 5 as a mission of First Southern, Del City. A second church of the deaf, "Alpha Baptist Chapel" began in September as a mission of Western Hills Church, Oklahoma City. The deaf mission of First Southern, Del City has called Joe Cox, a deaf man, to be the pastor.

A new Korean Bible Fellowship was begun in Stillwater as a mission outreach of the Korean Mission of First Church, Tulsa. Jung Ku Suh, pastor of the Tulsa Korean Mission, leads the Bible study.

Three new Laotian mission works have been established this year. Capitol Hill and Trinity, Oklahoma City, and Nogales Avenue, Tulsa are sponsoring these needed ministries.

Jaxie Short, retired foreign missionary, has assisted us in beginning a ministry to Chinese in the greater Oklahoma City area.

Three new Spanish missions and preaching points have been established this year. An excellent state Spanish camp was conducted at Falls Creek Conference Center. A special feature of the camp was Sunday school leadership training conducted by Chuck Padilla of the Sunday School Board. The first state Hispanic WMU conference was held at First Mexican March 28. We are planning for three area Hispanic WMU training conferences in 1982. A state Hispanic fellowship has been established. Officers have been elected and several planning meetings have been held to devise a state strategy for expansion of the Hispanic work in the future.

Seven new Indian missions have been established this year.

Indian Falls Creek Assembly hosted the National Indian Leadership Conference sponsored by the Home Mission Board. A total of 1,585 people registered for the assembly and approximately 200 additional Indian pastors and leaders registered for the leadership conference. Exciting plans are under way to expand Indian work not only in Oklahoma but also in the nation.

A two-day preachers' school for Indian preachers was conducted at the Muskogee-Seminole-Wichita Assembly grounds near Henryetta Sept. 4 and 5. Jimmy Anderson, state missionary to the Indians, coordinated the school. Three professors from Oklahoma Baptist University taught three of the courses.

Church Extension

At least 20 new churches and missions have been started this year. Our state goal was 41 new churches by Miracle Sunday, July 26. Although we missed the goal this year we exceeded it last year and the increase in new churches is greater than if we had not pushed toward a goal of 41. Twenty-one associational missions committee chairpersons were trained and challenged to lead their associations in beginning new churches. This training will bear fruit in the future. Oklahoma's greatest days in church extension are ahead. The climate for new churches is growing.

Resort Missions

East Central Association led the way in 1981 in resort ministries. Through the leadership of Bill Fuller, association director of missions, day camping, using the Ranger Series, was conducted each week in four different areas on the lake. Three laymen conducted and continue to conduct studies in three different areas on the lake. Twelve churches were involved with the lake ministry.

Campers on Mission

A spring rally was held at Fountainhead Camp Ground II and a fall rally was held at Fort Cobb Lake. A special mission project was conducted on a portable mission building at Moore. The mission building will be used to start churches in Union Association. Midway Church, Choctaw and Chapel of the Pines, Broken Bow were assisted in building projects. Mission projects were also conducted in several other states by various Oklahoma campers.

Mission Service Corps

Two new Mission Service Corps people have been assigned to the Women's Shelter in Tulsa. They are Eleanor Bell and Rachel Milner. Mr. and Mrs. Joe Sloan from Tulsa were appointed to the Hawaii Baptist Academy. Donna Sue Patterson from Tulsa was appointed to work at the Infant Child Care Center in Jackpot, Nev. William E. Neptune of Shawnee was appointed to serve at the Home Mission Board, Atlanta, Ga. as consultant on in-service guidance and special projects.

Christian Service Corps and Special Mission Projects

At least 200 adults have come from states other than Oklahoma to assist with 15 mission projects in our state. These people came from Georgia, Mississippi, Texas, Florida, Alabama, Arkansas, South Carolina, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Missouri, Tennessee, Indiana and Virginia. They helped with construction projects, mission Vacation Bible Schools, day camping, resort ministries, inner city ministries, surveys, language missions work, youth work, mission center work, etc. Literally hundreds of youth and adults went from Oklahoma to various mission fields around the world. We have records of 15 youth groups totaling more than 500 youth who went outside Oklahome on mission assignments. Many other groups, of which we do not have records, also served outside Oklahoma in one or more special mission projects. Literally thousands of mission dollars were saved by the volunteer labor of these mission groups.

Chaplaincy

The Ninth Annual Conference of Oklahoma Baptist Chaplains met at Eastwood Church, Tulsa on Nov. 10 for a chaplains' luncheon, sharing of ideas, and election of officers. A chaplains and wives' retreat was held at Knob Hill Church, Oklahoma City, Sept. 11-12. Fifty-four chaplains and wives were present for the two-day retreat. Ted Dowell, professor at Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, was the guest lecturer. Gene Garrison, pastor of First Church, Oklahoma City, was the inspirational speaker. The 1981 officers of the Chaplains Fellowship are Monroe Palmer, Owasso, president; Frank Marks, McAlester, vice-president; and Bill Crow, Muskogee, secretary.

Black Church Relations

Black Church Relations is the new name adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention for the work previously known as Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists. The name was changed in order to relate to Black Southern Baptist churches. There are four Black Southern Baptist churches in Oklahoma and approximately 634 in the Southern Baptist Convention. Texas and California are the states having the most Black Southern Baptist churches.

Four missionaries jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention work in the area of Black Church Relations. They are involved in student work, Christian education and WMU. They are responsible for planning and promoting Christian education, evangelism, missions, stewardship, church leadership development, Bible study, youth camp and programs specifically planned for individual churches.

Six students preparing for church vocations received scholarships while attending college or seminary this year. One graduated from Southwestern Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree.

Over 100 young people were registered at the state youth encampment at Camp Burge. This was the first time ever to reach that many. A goal has been set for 175 for next summer.

The School of Religion in Tulsa, with learning centers across the state had over 400 adults enrolled in at least one course of study for which they earned credit.

Church-Community Ministries

This is the Oklahoma name for the area of ministries which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries.

Five missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in consultation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local associations are serving in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are: associational directors of church-community ministries, Ed Onley, Capital Association, and Rich Hagar, Tulsa Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Gray, Oklahoma City and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa; and Women's Shelter director, Tulsa.

Financial support through the cooperative missions department is given Capital Association to help with the ministry of Grace Rescue Mission and the Women's Center in Oklahoma City. Also, Oklahoma Baptist University receives some finances to assist a group of students to be involved in community ministries.

A program of rehabilitation has been initiated this year at the Grace Rescue Mission. Its objective is to win the men to faith in Christ and to rehabilitate them from alcohol and drug abuse to become self-sufficient useful community and family citizens.

The two women's centers for abused and transient women and their children have provided shelter and food for 1,146 women and children this year. Seventy-seven have been saved through this ministry. Homes have been salvaged and other family members have been reached through the ministry provided to these needy women.

Several Spanish speaking migrants have been reached with the gospel by cooperating with language missions in supporting missionaries in the areas where the migrants are living and working.

Literacy missions continues to grow as volunteers in churches across Oklahoma are teaching conversational English to non-English speaking who have moved to Oklahoma. A statewide Literacy Missions Workshop was sponsored last fall and another is scheduled for the fall of 1981. Literacy Missions has proved to be an excellent way of sharing Christ with those who know him not.

Student Summer Missions

Twenty-four college students from 12 states were assigned by the Home Mission Board to serve in Oklahoma for 10 weeks during the summer. They served in rural, inner city, language, resort, metropolitan and general missions in 10 different areas of the state. A special team of six served in Union Association to assist in starting new churches. They did survey work, Vacation Bible Schools, backyard Bible clubs and led in weekend revivals throughout the 10 weeks. They came to serve in missions and several made commitments for full-time mission service.

Refugee Sponsorship

The number of refugees sponsored by the Baptist churches of Oklahoma has declined greatly this year. However, the need for sponsors is still great. Thousands are still in refugee camps and can leave only when they have a sponsor. Most of the refugees coming

to our state are not Christians. It becomes an evangelistic opportunity for those willing to sponsor.

PACT

Project: Assistance for Churches in Transitional Communities (PACT) is a Home Mission Board response to the needs of churches in significantly changing communities. An estimated 56 percent of all Southern Baptist Convention churches in metropolitan areas are in pretransitional, transitional or posttransitional communities. These churches have to rediscover their mission, in the midst of the changing situation, and adapt their structure and programs to relate to the needs of the people within the church and its community or it will face a limited future.

Four people in Oklahoma have been trained to serve as PACT consultants. They, when invited, will contract with a church to do a consultation. This normally will be done over a period of several months.

A PACT blitz was done in Oklahoma City last fall. Five churches participated.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Director

Nine persons serve on the Historical Commission. Current members are Bob Jackson, Mrs. Clyde Goodson, Anson Justice, Dean Rainwater, Mrs. Joe Ray Land, Don Wheat (chairman), F. M. Byford and C. B. Lewis. Lucy Smith was serving a one-year term when she died earlier this year.

In 1981 the commission held two meetings. The first was held at OBU Feb. 27, and the second meeting was held at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City Sept. 11.

Historical Society

The Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society celebrates its 25th anniversary year with the convention's 1981 meeting. It was organized in Oklahoma City during the convention's Golden Jubilee session. Governed by its own constitution and bylaws, the society is auxiliary to the commission, which is elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Membership dues in the society are \$2 for annual memberships and \$25 for a life membership. Any person interested in helping collect, preserve and utilize Baptist history is invited to join.

Special Session

In partial observance of its 25th anniversary and the 75th anniversary of the BGCO, the Historical Society held a two-day special session in Shawnee on Oct. 22-23 of this year. A reenactment ceremony commemorating the merger of the two antecedent bodies which formed the present state convention in 1906, was held on Friday morning. Scholarly papers on matters of interest to Oklahoma Baptists were prepared and delivered at this session. These will be published in The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle, official journal of the society and commission and edited by J. M. Gaskin since 1958.

Oklahoma Baptist Collection

Located on the third floor of the Mabee Learning Center at OBU. the Oklahoma Baptist Collection is the property of the state convention. Acting through the executive director and the director of history, by authorization of the Historical Commission, the convention sets policies for acquisitions and general administration of the collection. During the past year a definitive statement of ownership and a statement of policy were adopted by the commission for the orderly administration of the collection. The ownership statement was formulated in conferences with the OBU administration and convention leaders, dating back to the original agreement made by John W. Raley and T. B. Lackey for the location of the collection at OBU and to operate it as a joint venture in serving the history interests of the university community and the state at large. Both statements appear on pp. 20-22 of, "A Guide to the Arrangement and Use of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection," prepared by J. M. Gaskin in 1981. The "Guide" is available on check-out by any interested person by writing or calling J. M. Gaskin at OBU.

Historical Marker

A historical marked was dedicated at Tyrone on Aug. 2. This site was selected because it was at Tyrone in 1894 that Baptist work was organized in the Panhandle; and, messengers from the Panhandle churches met there in 1904 to form the first Baptist association in the area. The commission purchased the marker.

Workshops

The director conducted about 20 area and local workshops during the past year. Writing, oral history and setting up local historical collection were the emphases in these workshops.

Tour

The commission sponsored a historical tour in eastern Oklahoma April 23-24. Registered tour members totaled 132 with additional participants at local program stops.

Pierce Collection

An agreement was completed with Herbert M. Pierce Feb. 27, by which he gave his historical collection to the Oklahoma Baptist Collection. The Pierce materials were moved from Wilburton to OBU March 26. The collection consists of about 1,800 books, more than 800 associational Annuals, about 200 convention Annuals (state and SBC), and four full-size filing cabinets of valuable reference materials. The collection has been sufficiently processed that it is usable.

A long time Oklahoma and Texas pastor, Pierce was born in China of Southern Baptist missionary parents. He spent more than 40 years building this valuable collection. The Oklahoma Baptist Collection has been greatly enriched by this valuable contribution.

Bartlett Collection

An agreement has been consummated with Gene Bartlett by which he will give his personal music collection to the Oklahoma Baptist Collection. Details are incomplete as to when and in what manner this collection will be acquired and displayed, but it should be in our possession and ready for use by researchers in a few months.

Space Enlargement

The commission voted in its Feb. 27 meeting to work with OBU in expanding the area which now houses the Oklahoma Baptist Collection and the university archives. The rapid acquisition of materials the past few years has created the need for more space. This project should be completed and materials rearranged this winter.

Recommendations

The commission submits the following recommendations for the convention's consideration and approval:

- 1. That a special expression of appreciation be communicated to Herbert M. Pierce and Gene Bartlett for giving their special collections to the Oklahoma Baptist Collection.
 - 2. That one historical marker be erected in 1982.
- 3. That a compilation of Falls Creek poems by Albert McClellan and Sam Scantlan be published in 1982 under the title, "The Spirit of Falls Creek."

- 4. That the commission work with the convention's Brotherhood Department in publishing a history of Camp Hudgens by James Warren. This was the 1981 winning paper for the Gaskin Baptist History Award at OBU.
- 5. That a short course for writers be offered at OBU in the summer of 1982.
 - 6. That a Heritage-Library Workshop be offered at OBU in 1982.
- 7. That more churches and associations be encouraged to write their histories and observe their anniversaries.
- 8. That we encourage all churches and associations in the state to develop their local historical collections in connection with media center (library) services.
- 9. That the director continue to work with the churches and associations as needed in conducting workshops and seminars to help facilitate history-writing, oral history projects and the development of local archival collections.

The motion carried to approve the report.

63. Don Turner, manager, Baptist Book Store, Oklahoma City, presented the report of the Baptist Book Stores.

Baptist Book Stores

This has been another banner year for Baptist Book Stores in Oklahoma. In February the Oklahoma City operation expanded to two locations. The main store is now located at 3023 N.W. 23rd Street where over-the-counter business and mail orders for the entire state of Oklahoma are handled. The former location in the Baptist Building is still in operation as a branch store. The Tulsa store continues to serve the needs of Baptist churches and leaders in the northeastern part of the state.

Church Music Glenn Boyd, Director

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom: teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, sing with grace in your hearts to the Lord" (Col. 3:16).

The design of our department is to help equip people so they might be more effective as they follow this Scripture.

The figures released by the Southern Baptist Convention Statistics Department in 1980, show that Oklahoma Baptist churches have 57,195 people involved in their church music ministry. We are thankful for that. We would like to urge all churches to report their church music enrolment each year on the annual associational letter.

The church music department served Oklahoma Baptists in the year 1980-81 through church music training with the Baptist Education Music Association, Jan. 8-9, (25); the Basic Handbell Leadership Conference at Memorial Church, Tulsa on Feb. 7, (15); the Youth Music Extravanganza at OBU, Feb. 28, (684); the Advanced Handbell Leadership Conference, Olivet Church, Oklahoma City, March 7, (40); the Young Musicians Festival, Oklahoma Baptist University, April 25, (1,401)); the State Training Meeting for Associational Officers in Oklahoma City on May 1-2, (17); the "Butler" Methods and

Materials Clinic, First Church, Ada, July 30; (180); the Bivocational Music Directors' and Accompanists' Retreat, Tulakogee, Sept. 25-26.

We also provided promotion and encouragement to the following church music training opportunities: Southern Baptist Church Music Conference, Los Angeles, Ca. June 7-8; Church Music Week at Glorieta, July 18-24; MusiConference, Waco, Texas, Aug. 3-6. In addition to the regular programing that we as the church music department do, we act as a supportive department in helping other departments and agencies within our convention. This year we assisted 10 of our departments and agencies in planning and executing their programs and we are happy to have this opportunity.

Another exciting part of our ministry is the organization of the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma. This year we have had 90 men enrolled in the organization and we have had seven performances and rehearsal choral clinics within the state. In addition to that, we had the opportunity of singing for the Southern Baptist Church Music Conference in Los Angeles, with 39 of our Singing Churchmen. They represented our Lord and Oklahoma Baptists well, and I love and appreciate these men.

Falls Creek is always a highlight of the year and this year was no exception. We had tremendous participation among the young people and adults in our Falls Creek Choir which reached an enrolment of over 2,000 during the five weeks of encampment, and saw 70 young people make a life commitment to the music ministry.

The future of church music in Oklahoma is bright and exciting. It is a joy to watch Oklahoma Baptists as they accept the responsibility of the "great commission" in reaching their community, their state and the world with the gospel. The church music department is happy in helping to equip Oklahoma Baptists to "... teach and admonish one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs. ..", and our desire is that we will gladly sing with grace in our hearts to the Lord.

Christian Life Committee Jerry Hall, Chairman

Your Christian Life Committee has sought to speak to some relevant issues facing us in 1981 and on through the decade of the 80's. This is by no means an all-inclusive report on issues that we face day by day but it hopes to present some of the more important ones. We as Southern Baptists, the largest non-catholic Christian group, have a very strong voice in America and around the world. But, the question is will we choose to use it? Will we take a stand on issues that face our world and most especially that affect our nation?

We challenge you as pastor, staff worker or layman of the church not to just read this report but to commit your time to speak to the problems that face people every day.

Jesus said, "For I was hungered, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger and ye took me in: Naked and ye clothed me: I was sick and ye visited me: I was in prison and ye came unto me . . . Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of my brethren ye have done it unto me" (Matt. 25:35, 36, 40b).

Whether it is feeding the hungry around the world or sharing the dangers of gambling, liquor and drugs or encouraging families to seek God's pattern for their home, it is still presenting God's love for people where they need it most.

Our most important message is the salvation of Jesus for all who will accept. But, we also must remember the great importance to Jesus of meeting man's every day needs and hurts.

The Sanctity of the Sabbath

The "Ten Commandments" have been recognized throughout history as the cornerstone of common law. Even the laws of non-Christian countries reveal a striking similarity.

These words outline the most practical and effective way of living for God, living with one's family and living among one's fellow-men.

As with the rest of the Scriptures the importance of the "Ten Commandments" is emphasized by the fact that they came to us directly from God himself through Moses and were often reaffirmed by Christ.

It is ironic then that the longest of these direct orders from God, the only one in which our Lord refers to himself as an example, is the one we Christians most often choose to disobey. Even though "The Lord blessed the Sabbath day, and hallowed it," we too often ignore it and neither rest nor honor God. The "Lord's day" has become just another day of commerce and work.

Throughout history Christians have led in the battle to effect changes. We can do it again now by:

- Individually choosing to obey God's law. Make our own Sabbath a day of rest.
- Collectively strengthen each other in this resolve.
- Encourage our churches to maintain a Sunday schedule that permits rest and meditation.
- Encourage merchants to support a "Uniform day of rest" law similar to that now in Texas. (A recent limited survey found little support among the major chains.)

Together, under God's leadership, much can be accomplished and his name will be glorified.

Crime

Whereas, crime is a major spiritual, moral, social and economic concern in our state and.

Whereas, we believe its dramatic increase and incidence are evidence of the decay of spiritual and moral values in our society and,

Whereas, we believe that the good news of Jesus Christ is for all, without regard for condition or station in life.

Be it therefore resolved that we commit ourselves to:

- 1. Strengthen the spiritual foundations of our homes in order to provide loving, firm, purposeful guidance to our children and to recognize the key role of the churches in building these foundations.
- 2. Inform ourselves of the factors and issues at work in crime and the Criminal Justice System so that we may seek and support solutions which are consistent with the teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ, whom we serve.
- 3. Pray for victims of crime in the crisis it creates and for the ones who commit the crime.
- 4. Be ministers of reconciliation to families broken and separated by crime and attendant incarceration by offering them material and spiritual aid through the ministries of our churches, and to support and encourage the offender in his honest effort to recenter his values and reenter society as a contributor.
- 5. Encourage our legislators to seek and support alternatives to incarceration for those who could better be served, and who could better serve society by remaining with their families and at their job and making restitution for the loss they have caused.
- 6. Pray for support and where possible involve ourselves in the preaching and discipling ministries in our city and county jails and in the correctional facilities of our state.
- 7. Pray for those entrusted with the task of enforcing and upholding the laws, and for their families, remembering the price that is sometimes required.

Child Abuse

Your Christian Life Committee felt that it is imperative that we address ourselves to the problem of child abuse this year, not only in the State of Oklahoma, but also across our nation. We are concerned about the number of children being mistreated by parents

who have become emotionally unstable because of drug habits, alcohol problems, marital problems and numerous other problems that exist because of inflation and world conditions around the globe.

Children are being subjected to beatings, rape, incest, and burning. We, as your committee, realize the only hope for these families is a saving knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Liquor and Gambling

Two of the most widespread social evils which not only plague our society, but continue to grow in intensity, are the problems related to beverage alcohol and gambling. For the following reasons, there must be no question about the Christian's stand on these issues. The effects of both problems are to be seen in relation to the individual, to the family, and to society as a whole.

Alcohol

Alcoholism is a personal problem involving inner motivation.

Alcoholism is a psychological problem involving emotional response, such as fear and insecurity.

Alcoholism is a moral and spiritual problem involving choice, responsibility and ethical evaluation.

Alcoholism is a health problem involving broken bodies and a mental hygiene problem of a shattered mind.

Alcoholism is an economic problem involving vast expenditures of money.

Alcoholism is a rehabilitation problem involving basic changes in behavior patterns.

Alcohol is a social problem involving the primary institutions of society.

Alcoholism is a social hygiene problem involving prostitution, veneral disease and promiscuity.

Alcoholism is a religious problem involving man's relation to God. The message of God, from a thorough study of his Word, can be summed up in the emphatic admonition to refrain from "drunkenness." The Christian is strongly admonished to be distinct from the "drunken" who are characterized as "of the night." As children of God, we are "of the day." Notice I Thessalonians 5:7, 8.

Since alcoholism begins with social drinking in almost every case, the only stance a Christian can take in keeping with the spirit of the Bible and the spirit of Christ is total abstinence.

The Dram Shop Liability Law has, at this time, passed the State House of Representatives, and is detained in the State Senate until the next session. This law, if passed, would make the bartender, or dispenser of alcohol, liable for damages caused by those to whom he dispensed the alcohol.

Church members are called upon to:

1. Speak out unapologetically on the evils of alcohol.

- Vote faithfully in every public election, supporting the Christian stand on alcohol.
- 3. Be alert to the results of alcohol and alcoholism in our society as reflected by every public media.
- 4. Write your senator encouraging passage of the Dram Shop Liability Law.

Gambling

Gambling is likewise a menace to society and a downfall to upright, moral living. "Gambling denotes any gaming, waging, or undertaking (whether or not lawful or respectable) whose determination is controlled or influenced by chance or accident and which is undertaken with consciousness of risk."—Enclyclopedia Brittanica.

Gambling is a social problem. The gambler is a parasite, living on that which others lose. It is also a critical social problem for the loser.

Gambling is a delinquency problem. It fosters and finances other forms of crime among young and old.

Gambling is an economic problem in that it produces economic waste estimated at one to five billions of dollars annually, by diverting money from legitimate business and productive occupations.

Gambling is consistently linked with crime, especially gangsterism. Gambling approaches our society in conspicuous legal and illegal forms, including forms such as bingo, as well as pari-mutuel gambling on horse races.

The present pari-mutuel gambling bill is being challenged on the basis that the proceeds of taxation as outlined in the bill are to be used unconstitutionally.

At the present time, bingo is lawful in Oklahoma for tax exempt institutions. The Christians of our state need to challenge this law. Even the law, as it now stands is being broken, and in many instances is being conducted by out-of-state syndicates.

Conclusion

For the above reasons, the Christian, today, must take a firm, uncompromising stand of total abstinence regarding these two evils.

Conservation of Energy

Almost every newspaper and publication we read today contains articles about energy shortages, costs, conservation, and international conflict resulting from the energy crisis.

No segment of society, including organized religion, will escape the energy crunch. Already Southern Baptist churches are experiencing problems associated with energy shortages. The adverse effect of the energy shortage on a church calls for a reassessment of the church's programs, schedules, finances and investments in property and buildings.

Biblical teachings relating to the stewardship of God's created resources and the Christian doctrine of responsibility are the bases of a Christian's concern for fuel conservation. But more than just advocating conservation the church must practice what it preaches. Every church needs to demonstrate its own energy stewardship. Setting an example itself, a church can then do several things to increase community energy awareness.

Rather than just calling for this awareness, and encouraging our churches and Christian people to "conserve," we wish to offer a few timely suggestions which might be implemented even now:

—Give heating and cooling units tune-ups for more efficient heating and cooling operation, thus reducing fuel consumption.

- -Caulk and weatherstrip cracks to reduce drafts and less obvious infiltration and loss of air.
- -Adjust thermostat settings to reduce energy consumption for winter heating and summer cooling.
- —Check lighting system to see where lamps can be removed or replaced with more efficient ones.
 - -Adjust heat setting on hot water system.
- ---Consider switching fuel being used. Often in Oklahoma natural gas is less expensive than electricity.
 - -Increase and/or improve insulation in present buildings.
- —Insulate pipes that carry water from the heater to other parts of the building to reduce distribution losses.
- —Consider adjusting church-use schedules to make the best use of your buildings, with more meetings on the same day or night.

More guidelines similar to the above, plus consideration in the construction of new buildings, can be found in the following publications: Church Property/Building Guidebook, Revised Edition, Energy Section, T. Lee Anderton, Convention Press, Nashville, Tenn., available through the Baptist Bookstores. Energy Management and Conservation Opportunities for Religious Buildings, Oklahoma Department of Energy. Wind Power for Your Home, George Sullivan, Cornerstone Library, N.Y. The Complete Energy Saving Home Improvement Guide, edited by James W. Morrison, Arco Publishing, N.Y.

It is the church's place to speak to a pressing, global problem. May our churches not only speak but lead the way to the alleviation of the problem.

Marriage and the Home

Marriage and the home form the most basic and important institution of our society. Marriage and the home were first instituted when God created Adam and Eve and performed the first marriage. The home is where character and security are built through love, discipline and the instilling of basic values.

There are many forces at work in our society, and often within us, that oppose or threaten the home. Some of these forces such as pornography, sex and violence on television, divorce and secular humanism are evil and openly destructive. Many other things which are good can be destructive to the home if allowed to consume too much time and energy of various family members. Some of these good things are careers, school and athletic activities, volunteer work, television and even church activities.

Christians should recognize their responsibility to God in the area of the home. A Christian home does not just happen. Christian mates must live their faith daily in the home. The example of Christian parents must validate the teaching of Christian truths by the parent and by the church. The Christian faith must be taught and caught.

Priorities and commitments should be reorganized to give time and place to wholesome family time and activities. We suggest screening of television viewing to eliminate the evil influence of many programs. This is good but not enough. Television viewing and many other activities that compete for our precious time together as families should either be curbed or eliminated.

We call upon our Oklahoma Baptist families to give support to family members by spending time together in prayer, Bible study, observing the Lord's Day in worship, teaching scriptural stewardship and accepting the roles and responsibilities of each person in thefamily.

We urge our families to schedule family meals together. We urge our families to spend "fun times" together.

We urge our churches to make greater efforts toward preparing young people for marriage through study groups and through premarital counseling.

We urge our churches to provide support to the Christian family. This should involve providing literature and programing that supports the family and consideration for the family when scheduling activities.

We urge that a caring and compassionate attitude be displayed by the church to lend support to those who have suffered the trauma of divorce.

Tax Credit for Tuition to Private and Parochial Schools

The Christian Life Committee sees a major assault on church/state separation coming at the point of tax credit for tuition to private and parochial schools. Baptists played a key role in the erection of the wall of church/state separation because Baptists believe that state should not seek to enforce religious belief or participation. For nearly 200 years we have been in the forefront of those who have maintained this wall.

Certainly, we affirm the right of anybody to found and support a private school. We recognize that our Baptist brethren have been among those who have chosen to do so. And we share a concern with them about the secular humanism which seems to pervade public education. We deplore the lack of discipline, the lowering of academic standards, and the failure to instruct youth in the values which make possible a society such as our own. For those churches which have felt impressed by God to offer an alternative by establishing and maintaining Christian day care centers, kindergartens, grade schools, junior and senior high schools, we express our appreciation.

However, churches should consider any private school strategy in light of the following reasons: (1) The basic Christian strategy in

the world has been to be salt, light and leaven, not to withdraw; (2) private schools may draw off resources which need to be used in our mission enterprise; (3) to seek federal and state funds for private schools, directly or indirectly through tax credits, opens the door for massive governmental regulation and meddling in religious enterprises; (4) tax credit for private school tuition will encourage the further decline of public education and further fracture communities.

Therefore, we urge Oklahoma Baptists to be wary of "throwing out the baby with the wash." Do not let your frustration with the public schools lead you to destroy an institution vital to the American way of life. We call upon Baptists of Oklahoma to share their opposition to tax credit for tuition at private schools with their elected officials. We also encourage Baptists to work with school officials to turn our public schools around. A possible starting point is value education. (We refer you to an excellent article which appeared in Christianity Today, April 10, 1981, "Clarifying 'Value Clarification' for the Innocent." In the article Christenson shares a list of 21 moral principles adopted for instruction by one school system without serious challenge or violation of constitutional rights.)

The Christian Life Committee urges Oklahoma Baptists to share with their local school boards a concern for value education, not clarification alone. We urge the many Christian school teachers of Oklahoma to actively present values in their courses. And we urge Christian families to discuss moral values around the dinner table and at family altar.

World Hunger

The Christian Life Committee calls upon Baptists of Oklahoma to examine this question: Has God not given to us a unique role of stewardship in the face of contemporary world crisis?

The world hungers for food—material and spiritual. The engines of industry and commerce thirst for fossil fuel. Truly, God has wonderfully blessed Oklahoma Baptists with resources to treat these needs. The Scriptures very clearly teach that with blessing come responsibility to minister to those who are in need (Matt. 5; Luke 10).

Ministry to needs takes two basic forms: (1) short-term care for immediate, pressing needs, and (2) long-term projects which seek to eliminate the causes of the problem. Focusing specifically on the issue of world hunger, the committee offers the following suggestions for you to consider in the formulation of your ministry to this grave problem:

- (1) Examine your buying habits: consume less, share more.
- (2) Become better informed. (The faculty of OBU has formed a World Hunger Clearinghouse, OBU, Box 48, Shawnee, OK 74801.)
 - (3) Put the topic of hunger on your family prayer list.
- (4) Be a voice for the hungry. Encourage the decision makers to strive for a more just world. We affirm the principle that the use of our food resources be governed by Christian-humanitarian, not political motives.

- (5) Find out where the hungry folk are in your community. Join: with others to minister to them.
- (6) Give sacrificially to the World Hunger Fund of our Foreign Mission Board. One hundred percent of all these funds are used for world hunger.
- (7) Encourage folk with agricultural skills to volunteer as short-term missionaries.
 - (8) Those who are farmers may consider a direct gift of grain.
- (9) Consider the feasibility of our state convention sponsoring an agricultural mission to a specific overseas community as Tennessee: Baptists have begun in Upper Volta.

Aging

Presently approximately one out of every eight persons in America is 65 years of age or older. With life expectancy increasing each year, aging is becoming an issue of increasing importance.

As individual Christians and churches, we need to be aware of the problems and needs of the aging, both for the sake of older members of our families and eventually for ourselves.

Among the many problems of the aging, are changing status, society's attitude, selfhood, health, finances, relationships, housing and spiritual needs.

Needs of the aging differ very little from those of younger persons. They need to be loved, to be useful, sufficient income for food, clothing, lodging, health care, transportation, recreation, etc. They need to be a part of the normal life of the family, church and community.

For those who have come to an old age without Christ, a personal relationship with Jesus Christ as Lord is needed.

As individuals and churches, we need to be familiar not only with the problems and needs of the aging, but we should be aware of the teachings of the Scripture concerning aging.

The Bible clearly calls for respect of parents and the older person. "Honor thy father and thy mother" is one of the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:12). In Lev. 19:32 we read, "Thou shalt rise up before the hoary head, and honor the face of the old man and fear thy God, I am the Lord." Throughout the Scripture we are admonished to show respect for the aging.

As we recognize the problems and needs of the aging, it becomes our responsibility and privilege to assist in finding solutions and ways to minister to the aging.

Our churches can help to educate individuals and families to understand the needs and problems of the aging. Our churches can plan and promote programs and activities to benefit the aging.

Each individual Christian can be involved in the process of helping the aging person to grow old gracefully and making the last years of life "Golden Years." Jesus said, "I have come that men may have life, and have it in all its fulness" (John 10:10 NEB).

Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Each year at the close of the annual meeting of the convention a motion is passed authorizing the Board of Directors of the Baptist. General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention. Article VI, Section 1 of the convention's constitution states, "Thereshall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which the convention shall function in its cooperative work." Section 5 states, "The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma." Since the 1980 Convention, the board has met five times on Dec. 9, 1980, March 31, May 26, Aug. 18, and Sept. 15, 1981.

The work of the convention is organized into five areas. President Pace, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and two vice-presidents, assigned committees of the board to give direction to each of the five areas. The following committees were approved in the December meeting:

Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is made up of the chairmen of thefive committees and the executive officers. Convention President Paceserved as chairman and other members were Jerry Fielder, Don Chaffin, Charles Amos, Finis Steelman and Kenneth Myers, Joe L. Ingram and Hale A. Dixon. The committee meets only upon matters referred to it by the board. It was not necessary for the committee to meet: during the year.

Business Management Committee

The Business Management Committee has the responsibility for the management of the Baptist Building facilities, central services, accounting, property management and insurance. Don Chaffin, first vice-president, was also chairman of the committee.

December Recommendation and Approvals

1. Camp Hudgens Repairs Authorized—Because of a shift in the sub-structure or possible water pressure built up underneath the swimming pool, broken water lines occurred in the filtration system. The Board of Directors gave approval, as funds are available and after consultation with C. H. Guernsey and Company, engineering firm from Oklahoma City, for repairs to be made to the pool and to make necessary improvements in the surrounding area to prevent future problems.

March Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Renewed Lease for Baptist Book Store—Approval was given for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to enter into a renewed five-year lease agreement with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention to lease 5,281 square feet on the first floor of the Baptist Building for \$1,500 per month, with the option to negotiate renewal at the end of the five years; to pro-rate the approximate cost of \$26,000 for providing them new office space and other remodeling at a rate of \$551.10 per month; and authorized the convention officers to sign the lease agreement.
- 2. New Dorm at Falls Creek—Authority was given for the construction of a 36-by-70-foot metal-type building at Falls Creek Conference Center. The building cost approximately \$60,000 and it accommodates 64 people.
- 3. Registration Fee Adjusted—The registration fee for Falls Creek assembly was adjusted to \$4.75 per person, plus the cost of the textbook-hymnal and the cost of medical insurance.
- 4. Study of Financial Matters at Falls Creek—The board discussed the high cost of renting church cabins during assembly time. Since Falls Creek Conference Center is used at various times during the year, it was felt a study should be made relative to charges for the use of the facilities. The board asked the Business Management Committee to study all financial matters.

May Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. 1980 Audit—The committee reviewed with Bill Bardwell, Wolf and Company, the 1980 audit for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. A report of the review was given. The board approved the audit and asked that it be printed in the 1980 Annual for distribution to all churches,
- 2. 1981 Auditor—Approval was given for Wolf and Company, Oklahoma City, to serve as the auditor for the Baptist General Convention for 1981.
- 3. Release of Gift Contract to Eldon Church A Release of Gift Contract was approved and the convention officers were authorized to sign the release.

September Recommendation and Approval

1. Study Regarding Resurfacing Falls Creek Roads—The board voted to look with favor on the appointment of a sub-committee from the Business Management Committee to investigate resurfacing roads at Falls Creek, and that if feasibility studies are positive that resurfacing be done as funds are available.

October Vote By Mail

1. Quit Claim Deed to Lebanon Church—In October it was reported by mail to the Board of Directors that in 1955 the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributed \$175 to the Lebanon Church in Johnston-Marshall Association for the purpose of erecting a church house. The convention obtained a gift contract, which in reality is a first lien on the property. The church wanted to remodel their building and needed to borrow some money from First National Bank of Madill. Before such a loan could be executed, there was a need for a Quit Claim Deed to the property in order that the bank could have the first lien. By a mail ballot the board voted unanimously to grant the Quit Claim deed to Lebanon Baptist Church.

Child Care Committee

The assignment of the Child Care Committee is to give assistance to the operation of the children's homes in Oklahoma City, Owasso and Madill, Boys Ranch Town near Edmond, foster homes and additional child care services. Charles Amos served as chairman.

December Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Offering Goal Set—A goal of \$400,000 was adopted as the 1981 Mother's Day Offering Goal. Of this amount \$360,000 was designated for the regular offering and \$40,000 as an advance goal toward improvements on the children's home campus at Owasso.
- 2. Long Range Study Authorized—The Child Care Committee was asked to make a study of the child care ministry and to develop long range plans to give direction for the years 1981 through 1986.

March Report

There were no recommendations made at the March meeting of the Board. Perry Cox, former pastor of Calvary Church, Tulsa, was introduced as the new director of public relations and development in the child care department. His employment became effective June 15, 1981.

August Recommendation and Approval

1. Expansion Plans Approved—The board adopted the following recommendations for the expansion of the child care ministry:

Plans are projected to provide for a capacity of 346 children in daily care by 1985, advanced section 370 children (approximately 100 more children and youth will be cared for in other services which includes unwed mothers, family aid, adoptions, and counseling). These projections provide for approximately 35 additional children annually for the next few years. Additional children, along with rising cost of living, inflation, and other accruing factors will require greater resources but should be within the scope of the enlarged program made possible by increased endowment.

2. Offer Accepted for the Sale of 63rd and North Pennsylvania Property. At a special called meeting on Aug. 18, 1981, on the recommendation of the Administration-Child Care Committees, the Board of Directors unanimously voted to accept the all cash offer of \$12,-000,000 from John Kilpatrick, John Kennedy Jr. and Michael Samis, all of Oklahoma City, for the purchase of the property at 63rd and North Pennsylvania, the location of the children's home. The board designated an amount not to exceed \$3,500,000 to implement plans for the expansion of the child care ministry. Direction was given by the board for the balance of the funds to be placed in a special account with the Baptist Foundation as endowment for the child care ministry; that no more than 80 percent of the endowment income go into operations of the child care ministry and that the remaining 20 percent be added to the corpus. The executive director-treasurer, convention president and attorney were authorized to negotiate the details of the contract in the best interest of the child care ministry and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Further, the convention officers were authorized to sign necessary documents to complete the sale.

September Report, Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Development Plans for Child Care—The following report and recommendations regarding the development plans for the child care ministry were approved:
 - (1) Employ architect-Lawrence, Lawrence and Flesher-September 1981.
 - (2) Announcement of gifts of 166 acres of land by Agnes and Minnie Callaway for building of children's home at Duncan— September 1981.
 - (3) Construct cottage No. 1 at Duncan and as funds become available construct cottage No. 2—Begin by January 1982.
 - (4) Plan campus at Moore—planning of roads, location of buildings and utility lines, etc.—September 1981.
 - (5) Proceed with preparation of campus at Moore-building roads, putting in sewer, water and power lines, etc. (Contingent upon status of zoning of property at 63rd and North Pennsylvania, Oklahoma City)—November and December 1981.
 - (6) Start building cottages at Moore as funds are available. (Also contingent upon zoning of property at 63rd and North Pennsylvania)-January and February 1982.
 - (7) Start construction of administration and recreation buildings as funds are available—June 1982.

- (8) Secure land and funds and construct cottage in Woodward area—1982.
- (9) Build cottages No. 3 and No. 4 at Duncan as need dictates and as funds are available—1983-84.
- (10) Secure land and funds and construct cottage in Clinton area— 1983-84.
- (11) Secure land and funds for construction of cottage in McAlester area—1985.

(Schedule for construction of these cottages will vary in accordance with gifts made available.)

Retirement Centers and Chaplaincy Committee

This committee is responsible for the operation of retirement centers at Oklahoma City, Owasso and Hugo, and for giving direction to the chaplaincy ministry in hospitals at Enid, Miami, Grove, Pryor, Stroud, Bristow, Cordell, McAlester and the Baptist Medical Center in Oklahoma City. The chairman was Finis Steelman.

December Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Policies and Procedures Manual—The board adopted the "Policies and Procedures Manual for Retirement Centers Owned and Operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma."
- 2. Hugo Governing Board Approved—Approval was given for Noel Pence, Mrs. V. C. Stiefer, Doug Dodson, Bill Stone, Eddie Dameron, James Watson, Sid Camp, L. B. Flanigan and Robert Griffin to serve as the governing board for Hugo Retirement Center.

The retirement center in Oklahoma City is operated by the Oklahoma City Baptist Laymen's Corporation and the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso is operated by the Tulsa Baptist Laymen's Corporation.

3. Baptist Health Care Corporation Board Approved—The bylaws of Baptist Health Care Corporation states that their Board of Directors shall all be cooperating participants in a local Baptist church and shall be approved by the convention's Board of Directors. March Recommendations and Approvals

1. Auditors Approved—Wolf and Company, Oklahoma City, was approved as auditors for retirement centers at Oklahoma City and Hugo.

All accounting for the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center of Owasso is done through the convention's accounting office and the books are audited by the convention's auditing firm, Wolf and Company.

2. Bond Issue for Tulsa Retirement Center Approved—The following Resolution authorizing the borrowing of \$325,000 for further development of Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso through the issuance of junior lien revenue bonds by the Tulsa Industrial Authority was approved. The Resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (Convention) is engaged in the further development of Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center of Owasso, which is a retirement center in Owasso, Oklahoma, and it appears feasible to obtain additional financing by supplementing and amending the lease agreement dated as of Feb. 1, 1978 between Tulsa Industrial Authority and the convention by the issuance of \$325,000 Junior Lien Revenue Bonds by the Authority, secured by a second mortgage and junior lien basis to the 1981 bonds, and a pledge of the revenues derived from the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center of Owasso, subject to the debt service requirements of the 1978 bonds, and the guaranty of the convention as a general obligation; and upon payment of all bonds, that the authority will reconvey to the convention the land and improvements according to provisions set forth in the deed from the convention to the authority, and the above described lease agreement as amended:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma hereby takes the following actions relating to the aforesaid bond issue, to wit:

- 1. The convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of the 1981 supplemental Bond Indenture securing the bonds, and the sale of the bonds under said Indenture;
- 2. The convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of the 1981 Supplemental Lease Agreement;
- 3. The convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of the Bond Purchase Agreement between the Authority and

Leo Oppenheim and Co., Inc.; and it hereby approves and authorizes the distribution of the official statement prepared for the 1981 bonds;

- 4. The convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of the Indemnity Agreement;
- 5. The convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of the 1981 Amended Guaranty Agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the convention authorizes corporate officers to effectuate the transaction and that the president or vice-president and recording secretary or assistant recording secretary, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such instruments and other documents as may be necessary to carry out the intent of and to consummate the transactions authorized by this resolution.

Planning and Promotion Committee

The Planning and Promotion Committee gives assistance and counsel in stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, disaster relief and church program departments. Kenneth Myers served as chairman.

December Recommendations and Approvals

1. WMU to Become a Department—At the November 1980 annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union, auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, has for 75 years worked along side the Baptist General Convention in a mutual commitment to the Great Commission, and

"Whereas the continuing objective of both the Woman's Missionary Union and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma focuses on Bold Mission Thrust and the promoting of missions in the churches and mission churches, and

"Whereas the Woman's Missionary Union organizations in most Oklahoma Baptist churches and associations are now an integral part of the organizational life and work of the churches and associations,

"Therefore be it RESOLVED that on Oct. 1, 1981, the Executive Board of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, become an Advisory Board, and the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, become a department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma,

"Be it FURTHER RESOLVED that the existing Bylaws of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, expire on Oct. 1, 1981 and that new operating guidelines for the Advisory Board be established by the present Executive Board of Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and submitted for approval, to the Board of Directors, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma on or before its September 1981 meeting.

"Be it also RESOLVED that all properties, assets and liabilities be transferred to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma."

The Planning and Promotion Committee recommended that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approve the resolution that on Oct. 1, 1981 the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, become a department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and that the present Executive Board of the Woman's Missionary Union become an Advisory Board.

A further recommendation was that the executive director-treasurer of the convention work with the present Woman's Missionary Union officers in making an orderly transition; and that all properties, assets and liabilities of the Woman's Missionary Union be transferred to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by Oct. 1, 1981.

Both recommendations were approved.

- 2. Title Change—Approval was given to the recommendation that the program assignment in the Cooperative Missions Department of "Cooperative Ministries with National Baptists be changed to "Black Church Relations."
- 3. Magar to the Philippines— Paul Magar was granted the opportunity to participate in the evangelistic crusade in the Philippines. Expenses would be \$1,600, including airfare. Authority was given for this to be taken from the Special Projects Fund.

March Recommendations and Approvals

1. Funds Allocated for Video Equipment and Participation—Authority was given for the convention to participate in the SBC Video Network at a cost of \$10 per church, per year for three years, and for the convention to assist associations in the purchase of basic video hardware up to \$500 per association. The funds for these were allocated from the Special Projects Fund.

September Recommendation, Approval and Reports

1. WMU Guidelines Approved—The following was approved:

GUIDELINES OF

OKLAHOMA WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION DEPARTMENT OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF OKLAHOMA

BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF URLAHOMA

Name

The name of this organization shall be Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.

Purpose

The purpose shall be to promote the teaching of and participation in Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Relationships

Section 1. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union, shall be the organization through which cooperating church and associational Woman's Missionary Unions achieve unity of purpose and collective action.

Section 2. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be a department of work of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and shall work with other departments to advance the total work of Oklahoma Baptists.

Section 3. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall cooperate with the Southern Baptist Convention; and the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to Southern Baptist Convention, in the promotion of Christian missions, through a program of teaching, providing and participating for missions achievement.

Section 4. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall recognize the autonomy of the association and church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.

Section 5. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the purpose of Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing successively through the association and the state to the total activity of Woman's Missionary Union, Southern Baptist Convention.

Membership

The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall comprise the membership of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.

Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a president; vice-presidents (the associational WMU directors); and recording secretary. These officers with the exception of vice-presidents, shall be elected at the annual session and shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected. The term of elected officers shall not exceed four years and one year shall lapse before officers shall be eligible for election to the previously held office. The term of office shall begin at final adjournment.

Section 2. The retiring president of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall not be eligible for membership on the council until one year has elapsed following her term of office.

Section 3. A vacancy occurring in an office shall not be filled; the administrative committee shall determine the manner in which the duties of the office shall be discharged for the unexpired term.

Department Leadership

Section 1. The employed leadership shall include the director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union and consultants as needed. The employed leadership shall be elected and/or employed in accordance with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma's bylaws.

Section 2. The duties of these leaders shall be specified in the Position Description Manual of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Nominations and Elections

Section 1. A nominating committee shall be named at the business meeting of each annual session, whose duty it shall be to nomi-

nate officers at the next annual session. This committee shall be composed of a chairman, appointed by the president from the council and one member from each area (Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union grouping of associations) elected in the area meeting. If a vacancy occurs among the area representatives on this committee, the area shall determine how the vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired term.

Section 2. The associations within an area shall rotate alphabetically in electing the member to serve on the nominating committee.

Section 3. During the first business meeting of the annual session the recording secretary shall read the nominating committee and shall call the meeting for the election of the co-chairman and a secretary.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall meet at least four months prior to the next annual session for the election of nominees. The chairman shall notify all members thirty days before the meeting.

Section 5. The chairman shall bring the report of the nominating committee to the Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union in annual session; nominations may also be brought from the floor. Election by ballot shall be taken should more than one person be nominated for any office.

Meetings

Section 1. A regular session of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be held annually; the time and place shall be determined at a previous annual session, or in an emergency, by the council.

Section 2. The director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union, in consultation with the president shall plan the program for the annual session.

Section 3. The annual session shall be open to members of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union and visitors. The privilege of making motions, debating and voting shall be limited to members only.

Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union Council

Section 1. The Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union council shall be composed of the officers of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union. The council will be responsible for making plans and setting forth policies for the promotion of the work of the organization.

Section 2. Regular meetings of the council shall be held twice during the year; the time and place to be determined by the council.

Section 3. Special meetings of the council may be called by the president, or shall be called at the request of at least one-third of the voting members of the council.

Section 4. The council shall have the following committees: administrative, planning and promotion.

Section 5. The council shall make a report to Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union in annual session and to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The reports shall be given by the director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.

Committees

Section 1. The president and the director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be members ex-officio of all committees of

Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union except the nominating committee.

- Section 2. Committees, standing or special, shall be appointed by the president as authorized by the council of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union. The chairman shall be chosen from the council.
- Section 3. The administrative committee shall be composed of half of the council members. This committee will consider seminary scholarships, state mission allocations and goals for foreign, home and state missions.
- Section 4. The planning and promotion committee shall be composed of half of the members of the council. The function of this committee is to plan for State Missions Season of Prayer (theme and writers) and discuss the promotion of age level organizations: Mission Friends, Girls in Action, Acteens, Baptist Young Women and Baptist Women.

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall govern Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union in all cases to which they are consistent with these guidelines.

The guidelines may be amended by the Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union Council's recommending the changes to the convention's Board of Directors with the changes becoming effective upon approval by the convention's Board of Directors.

- 2. New WMU Director—It was announced that effective Oct. 1, 1981 Mrs. Frances Grafton would become the director of Woman's Missionary work in Oklahoma. She was formerly the director of Baptist Women/Baptist Young Women's work for the Louisiana Convention.
- 3. Moody Introduced—Roy Moody Jr., pastor of Garnett Road Church, Tulsa, will become associate director in the Department of Evangelism effective Dec. 1, 1981.

Miscellaneous

The following items were presented in the September meeting of the board.

1. Study Regarding Weekly Attendance Report in Baptist Messenger—The Administrative Committee was asked to make a special study regarding the printing of the weekly attendance report in the Baptist Messenger. The committee was asked to make a report to the Board of Directors immediately prior to the annual meeting of the convention.

On Oct. 26 four conference telephone calls were arranged with members of the board to hear the report of the Administrative Committee regarding the printing of the weekly attendance report in the **Baptist Messenger**. Richard McCartney reported that a survey had been conducted, and he suggested that beginning as soon as possible the attendance report be printed in the **Baptist Messenger** again. The board unanimously approved the following: That Richard McCartney,

editor of the Baptist Messenger, be commended for the excellent survey which was made and for his sensitive response to the results; and that the committee concurs with the decision to resume printing the attendance reports in the Baptist Messenger.

2. Report on Partnership with Baptist Mission of Spain

In the September meeting Joe L. Ingram reported on the trip that he and Sam Pace made in relation to forming a partnership with the Baptist Mission of Spain. Lengthy conferences were conducted with the Spanish leadership in developing plans.

The first project would be to send 25 young people from Oklahoma Baptist University and the Baptist Student Unions across the state to Spain in June of 1982. They would be joined with 25 young people from over Europe and 50 from Spain in a concentrated witnessing program during the World Cup Soccer games. This would be about a 10-week project and would cost approximately \$40,000.

In the fall of 1982 there would be 10 training centers set up across the country in which Continuing Witness Training schools would be conducted. This would be an effort to infiltrate every church with the special training. Revivals would follow in the spring of 1983 in about 80 churches, missions and preaching stations. The leadership for the revivals would be from Oklahoma.

About 15-25 Spanish pastors would come to America to conduct revivals in Oklahoma churches during the fall of 1983. The love offerings should be sufficient to care for their travel expenses. Following the revivals, the men would be taken to Falls Creek, with the staff of the Baptist Building, for extensive training in the areas of religious education, evangelism techniques, how to give an invitation and other ways to assist in the development of the churches in Spain.

An expansion in the Bible teaching ministries would be launched in 1984 by taking some religious education people to Spain and the emphasis in 1985 would be on stewardship.

In the meantime there will be an effort to link the associations in Spain with associations in Oklahoma and the same with local churches so that there could be a free flow of spiritual energy through prayer and helpfulness.

Ingram said, "I pray that by 1985 we will have seen a doubling of the work in Spain. There must be a knowledge down in our hearts that we have a responsibility not only to Spain, but to every person in the world and to the person next door. God help us to do it."

Expenditure of \$40,000 authorized—The board authorized an expenditure of up to \$40,000 for expenses to send 25 young people from OBU and the BSU's to assist in the witnessing program during the World Cup Soccer Games in Spain in June of 1982.

Administrative Committee

The Administrative Committee is responsible for work related to personnel, budget, Annuity and Ministerial Services, **Baptist Messenger** and Baptist Student work. Jerry Fielder was chairman.

December Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Warwick West Land Sold—Approval was given to accept the offer of C. A. Henderson to purchase the land on which Warwick West Apartments are built, for \$2,000,000. The terms of the sale were that it would be effective Jan. 1, 1981; no principal would be paid for five years, with 10 percent interest paid on the principal (\$200,000 annually), with the right reserved to pay the principal earlier in whole or in phases. Five additional years would be given to pay off the principal, one-fifth each year plus a negotiated interest. The convention would have the right to ask for all principal to be paid at the end of the sixth year. The land would be mortgaged to the convention with releases given as principal payments are received. Authority was given for the convention attorney to write the contract with the instruction that the interest of the convention be protected. The contract has the provision that one-half of the interest be paid monthly and the remaining portion be paid annually. Direction was given that the principal from the Henderson contract, plus one-half of all interest earned, be put into endowment.
- 2. Moral Concerns Fund Established—At the 1980 meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma the following resolution was unanimously adopted: "Be it resolved that the Board of Directors be asked to consider the creation of a fund for the purpose of providing for initial expenditures in the effort to combat a relaxation of laws of control of beverage alcohol." The convention also passed a resolution opposing pari-mutuel gambling.

To support these resolutions, the Board of Directors authorized the creation of a \$50,000 moral concerns fund. The funds are to be taken from the 1980 Cooperative Program receipts or from the Special Projects Fund and the executive director-treasurer, in consultation with the Administrative Committee, were authorized to utilize these funds with reference to carrying out the convention's stand against liquor-by-the-drink and pari-mutuel gambling.

3. Allocation of Cooperative Program Funds Beyond Budget— It was projected that \$853,000 would be received beyond the allocated 1980 Cooperative Program budget. By previous action of the board, Southern Baptist Convention causes receive 43½ percent of that amount. Approval was given for the following distribution of the funds:

All funds received beyond the designations were to be divided 43½ percent to Southern Baptist Convention and the remainder placed in the Special Projects Fund for distribution by the Board of Directors from time to time.

A total of \$1,617,484 was received beyond the allocated budget. The 43½ percent to Southern Baptist Convention was \$703,605. After the other named designations were satisfied, a balance of \$86,538 was placed in the Special Projects Fund.

4. Supplement to SBC Convention Annuity Plan—A "Supplement to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan" was approved and the convention officers were authorized to carry out the purposes of the resolution. The supplement is as follows:

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma (hereinafter referred to as the "Employer") hereby agrees to cover employees in the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan in accordance with the provisions of said plan, as supplemented by the following:

- (1) Description of Employees to be Covered. The persons covered under the provisions of subsection 3.1 of the plan shall include all full-time employees of the employer. Each such employee shall begin participation in the plan as of the first day of service for the employer.
- (2) Effective Date. Jan. 1, 1981.
- (3) Employer contributions. The employer contribution under the provisions of subsection 4.1 of the plan for credit to each member's employer contributions account shall be an amount equal to 10 percent of the member's compensation.
- (4) **Member Contributions.** The member is not required to make any contribution under the provisions of subsection 4.3(a) of the plan, but may make voluntary contributions under the provisions of subsection 4.3(b) of the plan.
- (5) Compensation. A member's compensation is base salary including housing allowance, if any, and the tax sheltered contributions to this plan.
- (6) Investment Elections. The member shall have the right to make all investment choices under the provisions of subsections 4.5(a) and 4.5(c) of the plan.
- (7) Termination Withdrawal. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection 6.4, a member who terminates prior to age 55 for any reason other than death or disability may elect to receive the balance in the member's tax paid contributions account and tax sheltered contributions account in a single-sum payment.
- (8) Amendment of Prior Plans. Effective as of Jan. 1, 1981, this plan and supplement will supersede and replace the provisions of the Southern Baptist Protection Program and any other annuity benefit arrangements with the board previously

adopted by the employer for the benefit of its employees. The assets of the prior plans are hereby designated as a part of this plan for the purpose of funding the benefits of members for service prior to Jan. 1, 1981.

- (9) Prior Plan Benefits in Pay Status. All persons receiving annuity benefits as of Dec. 31, 1980, under the provisions of prior plans shall continue to receive such benefits from this plan in the same form and the same amount.
- (10) Prior Plan Accumulations. The sums standing to the credit of a member in individual accounts under the provisions of prior plans shall be transferred to this plan and identified as follows:
 - (a) the initial Tax Paid Contributions Account Balance if the original contributions were personal employee contributions.
 - (b) the initial Tax Sheltered Contributions Account Balance if the original contributions were tax sheltered annuity contributions.
 - (c) the initial Employer Contributions Account balance if the original contributions were employer contributions.

Any sums standing to the credit of the employer in an unallocated liability reserve account under such prior plans shall be transferred to this plan and be identified as the initial Employer Liability Reserve Account balance.

WITNESSETH, the employer hereby adopts and agrees to the provisions of the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan including the accompanying supplement thereto, as evidenced by the signatures set out below on this 9th day of Dec., 1981, and the resolution of the Board of Directors dated Dec. 9, 1981, a copy of which is attached hereto.

March Recommendations and Approvals

1. Spain Mission Projects—The board voted to look with favor upon entering into some mission projects with the Baptist Mission of Spain and encouraged the executive director-treasurer to work with the Foreign Mission Board regarding details. The board will consider definite recommendations as they are presented.

2. Financial Assistance for Nevada Convention—Information was received that the Nevada Baptist Convention was having some financial difficulties. The board asked the executive director-treasurer to check further into the matter and that a minimum of \$3,000 and a maximum of \$5,000 be sent to assist in their need. The funds were taken from the Special Projects Fund.

May Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Organizational Change for Annuity and Ministerial Services—A recommendation was approved that the organizational structure of the office of annuity and ministerial services be changed as follows: That the annuity work be separated from ministerial services; that the ministerial services office be retained in its present relationship to the executive office, that the annuity services be transferred to the Business Management area; that definite position descriptions be presented to the September board meeting; that Clyde Cain become the director of ministerial services; that J. T. Roberts serve as annuity director on a retired basis; that these changes become effective Jan. 1, 1982; and that the 1982 budgets reflect these changes.
- 2. Meeting with Leadership of Baptist Mission of Spain—It was reported that details have not been worked out with the Foreign Mission Board relative to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma working in Spain on special projects for the next several years. However, the board voted for a definite commitment to be made to work with the Baptist Mission in Spain through the Foreign Mission Board; and authorized the executive director-treasurer and convention president to accept the Foreign Mission Board's invitation to meet with the Baptist Mission leaders in Spain to make plans for cooperative partnership. Definite projects will be presented for approval by the Board of Directors through the Administrative Committee.

September Recommendations and Approvals

1. Additions to Bylaws Approved—At the annual meeting of the convention in 1979 the president appointed a committee to study the convention's nominating process. The committee met several times and through the Administrative Committee a recommendation was approved by the board to make the following addition to the convention's bylaws:

IV. Committees

Section. 1. Nominating Committee—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's Board of Directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected con-

vention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

- Section 2. Annual Session Committees—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.
- Section 3. Convention Committees—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.
- 2. Position Descriptions for Offices of Annuity and Ministerial Services Approved—In the May meeting the board authorized the division of responsibilities in the annuity and ministerial services office and asked that new position descriptions be prepared and presented in the September meeting. Approval was given and they will become a part of the Manual of Position Descriptions for all convention employees.
- 3. Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan Revised—In order to bring the Church Annuity Plan into compliance with Federal laws governing retirement programs some minor adjustments needed to be made. The following Resolution was approved:

Resolution

WHEREAS this convention, in cooperation with other State Baptist Conventions, has adopted certain retirement annuity plans administered through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention for the benefit of certain ordained ministers and eligible employees of churches or denominational agencies affiliated with a State Baptist Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention; and

WHEREAS, such plans continue to serve plan members, although many of the plans have been closed to new members and successor plans opened; and

WHEREAS, Hewitt Associates, an independent actuarial firm, has certified that such plans are actuarially sound as of Dec. 31, 1980; and

WHEREAS, such plans are extremely complex, their terms are in multiple documents, and laws have been enacted requiring certain provisions to be included in the documentation of such plans; and

WHEREAS, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and Hewitt Associates have prepared a restatement of such plans called the Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan (the "Church Annuity Plan") to meet the requirements of applicable

law and to document the provisions of all of such plans in one document; and;

WHEREAS, the Church Annuity Plan (as restated) changes the early retirement age to age fifty-five to meet the needs of the plan members and to be consistent with similar provisions in the Convention Annuity Plan, but utilizes the same actuarial equivalent reduction that has always been in the plan for early retirement; provides for a deferred vested retirement benefit payable at age fifty-five to meet the standards set by federal regulations and to coordinate with the early retirement benefit age; provides a written claims procedure to meet the standards set by federal law and to be consistent with similar provisions in the Convention Annuity Plan; and contains written provisions required by the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, and the regulations thereunder.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

This convention approves and adopts the Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan, a copy of which is to be kept by the secretary with the minutes of this meeting, and the executive director of this convention is authorized and instructed to execute the plan document and send it to the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

- 4. Tenth Anniversary to Be Observed September 4, 1981 marked the tenth anniversary of Joe L. Ingram as executive director-treasurer. The board unanimously approved a motion that in recognition of ten years of exemplary and outstanding service as executive director-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma that at the annual meeting of the state convention, as an expression of appreciation, a check for \$10,000 from non-Cooperative Program funds be presented to Dr. and Mrs. Ingram to be used for travel expenses to participate in foreign mission projects which are to be scheduled in such a manner as to provide the Foreign Mission Board the benefit of Ingram's service.
- 5. Base Salaries Set by Percentage Differential—Approval was given for the establishment of the following differential to determine base salaries for the professional staff:

170% Executive Director-Treasurer

135% Associate Executive Director

Evangelism

Jerry Don Abernathy, Director

Forging ahead in winning people to personal faith in Jesus Christ and new life in him is the work of evangelism. It is not one of the programs of a church but the purpose of a church. Keeping this principle right in our priorities creates a spiritual tension that is right.

Evangelism Goals Vital

A goal is a vision translated into specific, measurable intentions. Goals necessitate actions. People must set actions into motion. We must continue setting a 10 percent per year goal of increasing conversions and baptisms. This goal is realistic yet challenging. The following suggestion will enable a church to reach its goal:

1. Adopt a leadership style that is process oriented. If the main planning has been project oriented, churches have built their plans solely according to the projects scheduled during the year. Process oriented leadership adopts biblical principles and relates every activity to those principles in order to achieve the goals of the church.

- 2. Adopt church growth principles which can guide your planning. Great success is being recorded in reaching people when churches follow the tried and proven principles of church growth. During the years ahead, SBC leaders are committed to the united utilization of growth principles by all church program organizations. Churches should plan to capitalize on the workshops which will provide assistance in learning and applying these principles.
- 3. Conduct great revivals and crusades. Churches which consistently reach people for Christ have great revivals and crusades. They plan big, work hard and follow through on these efforts. Enlist preachers who can reach the lost. Provide great evangelistic music. Organize the people to witness to their lost friends. God will bless the church which is thorough in these areas.
- 4. Utilize Falls Creek and other youth camps and assemblies for evangelism. These efforts will be as evangelistic as the leaders and sponsoring churches make them. Pastors who want to win youth for Christ should be wise to know that camps are one of the best tools. Pastors should attend with their groups.
- 5. Training personal soul-winners is a priority in great evangelistic churches. While Continuing Witness Training is our current priority, we are not lessening our emphasis on Lay Evangelism Schools, TELL Witness Training, the Witness Training Module in church training and WOW Witness Training for youth. We currently have 36 churches in 14 associations involved in Continuing Witness Training. Our next training seminar is in January, 1982. Other seminars will be scheduled in 1982.
- 6. Churches need to make every effort to train Sunday school leadership in soul winning. This great outreach group of a church should be mobilized and motivated to keep evangelism in the priority position.
- 7. Churches should begin to budget for their pastor and minister of music to assist with evangelism projects in Spain. We will conduct training in the fall of 1982 and crusades in the spring of 1983.

The Past Year in Review Youth Evangelism Conferences

The 1980 Youth Evangelsm Conference recorded an attendance of over 9,000 participants. The conference was held at the Lloyd Noble Civic Center, Norman.

In 1981, under the direction of Clyde Cain, we are having one statewide conference at the Lloyd Noble Civic Center in Norman on Dec. 28-29. The guest personnel will be Charles B. Baker, Dave Bennett, Glenn Boyd, Evangelist YoYo Collins, Cornerstone, Buddy Griffin, Ken Medema, Dick Rader and Evangelist Jay Strack.

State Evangelism Conference

The 1981 Evangelism Conference continued the annual challenge in depth and was marked by full houses, great singing and compelling preaching.

Clyde Cain served very effectively for the past seven years in our department. His sense of God's direction for his ministry has taken him to the area of Ministerial services within our state leadership family. He will do an effective contributory ministry there. With true gratitude for faithful, untiring service, we say farewell to him.

Roy Moody has joined our team. He has the training, experience, temperament and commitment to serve effectively as associate evangelism director. Because he had been equipped to lead all of the SBC evangelism training programs, he is ready to assist in these ministries. His coming will enable us to continue and accelerate personal witness training. He is experienced in one vital new program, "The Prayer for Spiritual Awakening" Seminar.

The subject for the 1982 Evangelism Conference is the church reaching the lost. Our theme passage is Matthew 16:18. The guest personnel include Roy Fish, Charles Stanley, Jimmy Draper, Stan Coffee, Bailey Smith, Sam Cathey, Joe Ford, the Jim Griffin family, the Singing Churchmen and women, and the choir and orchestra of First Southern, Del City.

Evangelists' Preachin' and Singin' Fest

Moving this program from Wednesday to Monday morning was applauded by the evangelists and church leaders. It will be at First Southern on Mon., Jan. 18, 1982.

Student Work

Student work in Oklahoma continues to grow. This is especially exciting because so much of this is made possible by the fine support that is received from churches and associations across Oklahoma.

New buildings were used for the first time this past year at El Reno Junior College, Seminole Junior College, and Connors State College. Full-time BSU directors were hired at El Reno and Connors with the same occurring at Seminole the first of 1982.

Your student department sent out 55 summer missionaries and helped to support BSU work in 17 new convention states. In addition \$5,600 was sent to the Foreign Mission Board MANNA program for world hunger. The BSUs raised over \$90,000 for all of our mission work.

Oklahoma Baptists continue to support BSU work through the local churches, the associations, and the Cooperative Program. Because of this support student work is able to continue to expand and reach more students. The 1981 CP will provide in excess of \$750,000 with the 1982 CP providing approximately \$875,000. Associations and individual churches support the local programs with over half a million dollars of assistance.

The special emphasis in BSU work will be the Bible for the school year 1981-82. In addition to this the core areas of evangelism, discipleship, churchmanship, missions, work with Internationals, worship and fellowship will be incorporated into local and state programs. It is the hope of the student department that through these emphases students will be helped to become better church membrs.

Again the students have responded well to programs geared toward their growth. Hundreds of students attended events such as Glorieta Student Week, Student Skills Training Conference (BSU Convention), State Spring Retreat (Leadership Training Conferences), Mission Conferences at Midwestern and Southwestern Seminaries, and the International Student Conference.

This has been a good year for student work. The continued prayers and support for the work is greatly appreciated by all that are involved.

(3) Religious Education report was presented by Robert Audd, associate director and director of Church Training, Department of Religious Education, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

A. Plaques were presented to the following churches for having the fastest growing Sunday schools in Oklahoma this past year:

Receiving the plaque for the largest numerical gain was Eastwood Church, Tulsa, increasing from 4,969 to 5,821. Ruffin Snow is serving in an interim capacity. Second was Putnam City Church. Oklahoma City with an increase from 2,186 to 2,602. Rod Masteller is pastor and Jay Kennedy is minister of education.

Council Road Church, Bethany led the state in the numerical average attendance gain increasing from 674 to 831. Wendell Estep is pastor and Phil Myers is minister of education. Runner-up was Trinity Church, Norman, Bill Elliff, pastor and Joe Sherrer, minister of education. Their average attendance increased from 583 to 700.

The largest percentage enrolment gain award went to Mingo Church, Tulsa, Ray Martin, pastor, and Philip Smith, Sunday school director, increasing from 57 to 154, a 170.1 percent increase. Second was Northside Church, Blanchard, Stephen Ussery, pastor, increasing from 10 to 27.

Calvary Church, Sand Springs received the award for largest percentage average attendance gain going from 12 to 60 for 400 percent. Gene Snodgrass is pastor.

Religious Education Bill C. Haggard, Director

Not since the days of "A Million More in '54," has the desire for growth been more evident than it is today! This past year has been an exceptional year for the Department of Religious Education. Churches and associations have asked for, and responded to, help in training church leadership. This training is beginning to produce fruits in souls reached, taught, won and discipled.

Staff Changes

After serving faithfully as director of youth work since Feb.1, 1977, Ann Gardner resigned on April 15, 1981 to become an editor in the church recreation department of the Sunday School Board, Nashville.

Dave Fuller, with a rich experience in youth work, joined the staff on June 1, 1981 as director of youth work. Dave had served a number of Oklahoma churches prior to coming to the department staff.

Mrs. Donas Cook, with a background in public education, joined secretarial staff, as secretary to Billy Allen.

In addition to the above changes, the field work team includes: Darlene Koch, director of childhood education; Billy Allen, director of adult education; Robert Audd, director of church training; and Bill C. Haggard, director of the Department of Religious Education.

The secretarial staff includes: Mrs. Joan Eischen, Mrs. Sybil Cox, Mrs. Lou Rodriquez and Mrs. Olive Hays.

The Growth Picture

Sunday school enrolment continues to grow with a total reported enrolment of 349,901; an increase of almost 10,000 over the previous year. This represents the third largest increase for any state in the nation.

Vacation Bible School enrolment climbed to 136,185 for an increase of almost 6,000 over the previous year. For the second year, over 2,900 professions of faith were reported in VBS, and 23,192 prospects were discovered. Twenty four percent of the prospects from the previous year, who received follow-up, were enrolled in Sunday school, and 625 additional professions of faith resulted from this.

Church training enrolment reached 89,324 for an increase of almost 1,000 over the previous year. Total "M" Night attendance was 6,896, a decrease from the previous year. Thirty-eight associations conducted "M" Night.

Report of Activities

Projects and activities supporting the second year of "Bold Mission Thrust" were conducted this year.

Associational work included training schools, Bible Venture Campaigns, and other related projects in the following associations: North Canadian, Union, Grady, Cimmarron, Kay, Southwest, Washington-Osage, Panhandle, Atoka, Cherokee Indian and Salt Fork.

The Falls Creek Leadership Seminar continues to grow. The two annual seminars trained over 600 workers in every age level. October 1981, a third seminar was conducted at Tulakogee.

Two regional Sunday school conventions were conducted in October, 1980 at Lawton and Bartlesville with Leon Kilbreth as Keynote speaker. Almost 1,000 pastors and workers attended.

Two regional Vacation Bible School clinics for associational VBS teams were conducted at Oklahoma City and Muskogee during.

Feburary, 1981. Almost every association in Oklahoma was represented with complete or partial teams.

State January Bible Study clinics were conducted with approximately 90 pastors and workers attending. Beginning in 1982, one such clinic will be conducted annually at Oklahoma Baptist University.

The Oklahoma Youth Ski Bible Conference was conducted at Glorieta in March, 1981 with 458 Oklahoma youth attending.

State visitation evangelism clinics, with John Sisemore leading, attracted over 400 workers with focus being given to building evangelistic Sunday schools.

Church training conferences included 14 Ephesians "4" conferences and one Equipping for Growth conference. Approximately 559 pastors and church training workers received help in these series of meetings. An annual state doctrine clinic was conducted with Bill Austin and Clyde Lee Herring leading and 114 participants.

State Children's/Youth Bible Drills and Youth Speakers Tournament were conducted March, 1981 with 12 associations represented. This year's winners were Christine Quimby, Tulsa and Charlotte Cobe, Noble. An expense paid trip to Glorieta was a part of the award to the winners.

Other meetings conducted by the Department of Religious Education included: over 100 church building consultations; three "Training the Volunteer Coach" conferences; youth curriculum dialogues; a state Weekday Early Education Workshop; two state institutes for associational faculties; one Hispanic conference; and a state Adult Start-a-Class consultant training session.

In preparation for the annual Falls Creek Assembly, the department enlists almost 500 faculty members. Preparation and follow-up on the assembly program spans about six months of each year.

98. Bob Atterberry, chairman, presented the report of the Resolutions Committee.

(1) APPRECIATION

WHEREAS, the Eastwood Church of Tulsa, its staff and employees have provided excellent facilities for the 76th Annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, Sam W. Pace has served well the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma as president the year of 1980-1981; and

WHEREAS, he is the first and only director of missions to be elected to such office in this state,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, go on record expressing our appreciation to Sam W. Pace for a job well done, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we commend the Eastwood Church and staff for hosting our convention in such a gracious manner.

(2) GOVERNMENT

WHEREAS, we believe in the importance of government on all levels, and

WHEREAS, we uphold the biblical standards of morality and decency,

BE IT RESOLVED that we call all government officials to adhere to and practice the highest ideals of integrity and honesty in all of their dealings, both public and private.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage all Christians to support and vote for qualified political candidates who uphold such principles.

(3) ALCOHOL AND PARI-MUTUEL GAMBLING

WHEREAS, the manufacture, sale, and use of beverage alcohol, and the practice of pari-mutuel gambling are detrimental to the very moral fiber of our society, and are in direct contradiction to the biblical teachings concerning personal morality and individual financial responsibility;

BE IT RESOLVED that this 76th annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma commend the executive director-treasurer and the board of directors for their moral concerns and their efforts to kill the liquor-by-the-drink proposal, and for the legal efforts being made to get the pari-mutuel gambling proposition declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court, and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge churches to continue their efforts in areas of moral concern.

(4) HOME AND FAMILY

WHEREAS, Holy Scripture points to the family unit as being of primary importance to a strong and peaceful society;

WHEREAS, traditional family values and structures are being threatened on many sides;

WHEREAS, the Southern Baptist Convention has adopted projects to strengthen families as a major emphasis of Bold Mission Thrust from 1982-1985;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we urge Christian families to establish and maintain family worship and Bible study in their homes:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage cooperating churches to provide Christian family enrichment activities to strengthen family relationships and moral values; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we call on Christians everywhere to pray and work in opposition to such forces in public media,

legislation and education which tend to weaken the home and moral fiber of our nation.

(5) TELEVISION

WHEREAS, television has become one of the greatest influences in the experience of mankind, and

WHEREAS, some television programing has been a valuable asset to our communities in creating awareness of moral challenges, informing Americans on issues, and providing morally acceptable entertainment;

WHEREAS, much television programing has pandered to the lowest levels of immorality with a proliferation of profanity, violence, twisted sexuality, alcohol, drug abuse, marital infidelity and the promotion of unacceptable lifestyles; and

WHEREAS, some officials in broadcasting, Congress and the Federal Communications Commission are calling for economic forces other than public interest to be central in deciding the future of television in our society;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that we express our support for better quality television programing by communicating our concerns to television network officials, station owners and sponsors;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we support the efforts of the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission through the newly formed ACTS network to provide our people with greater access to television communication for clean entertaining programing, and for communicating the gospel;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the Christian Life Commission to continue efforts to equip Baptists to influence television morality through every available means;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage television station owners to continue to provide freedom of expression and access to responsible religious voices in their communities;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we communicate to the Federal Communications Commission and the Congress our concern about efforts to remove the public interest standard from primary consideration in television programing for themselves and their children, thus contributing to a climate of spiritual and moral health for our country.

(6) ROLE OF WOMEN

WHEREAS, through responsibilities in the family and in multiplied areas of service, women have made immeasurable contributions to the home, society, and the Kingdom of God, and

WHEREAS, contemporary pressures are forcing men and women to make difficult decisions regarding priorities and responsibilities;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that we express gratitude to God for the contribution made by women in all avenues of service, and we call on Christian men and women to follow the teachings of the Scripture in determining priorities and responsibilities;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that for women who work outside the home, we encourage equality in compensation, advancement, and opportunities for improvement:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this convention reaffirm the biblical role which stresses the equal worth but not always the

sameness of function of men and women; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that since we believe the Constitution of the United States already provides for the protection of the equal rights of men and women, we see no justification for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment.

(7) SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE

WHEREAS, Baptists have historically accepted the words of our Lord Jesus Christ recorded in Matthew 22:21 as the guide in the church's relation to the state, "Render therefore unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's and unto God the things which are God's."

Realizing that the power to tax is the power to control, and that, on the other hand, you cannot accept subsidy without surrendering sovereignty;

BE IT RESOLVED that we reiterate our ancient and biblical position of the separation of church and state; namely, free churches in a free state, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we urge our people to use every effort through their elected officials and at the ballot box to prevent the state from taxing our properties used in the exercise of our purely church functions:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we caution our churches and denominational agencies of the danger and inconsistency of taking subsidies in the forms of commodities, grants and gifts from any governmental agency, city, county, state, or federal;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we admonish our churches and denominational agencies to avoid the pursuit of and the reception of any grants, credits, or gifts from any governmental agency on any level for the support and promotion of any church activity including nursery schools, church day schools, rehabilitation functions, youth camps, and any other church use; and that we be extremely careful to pay our taxes on all properties not used exclusively for specific church functions.

(8) WHEREAS, Bold Mission Thrust is God's call for every Baptist to be involved in presenting the gospel of Christ and for every person in the world to hear and respond;

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is committed to Bold Mission Thrust and is moving toward a 50-50 percent distribution of Cooperative Program funds:

WHEREAS, the Cooperative Program, augmented by the Lottie Moon Offering for Foreign Missions, the Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions, and the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions, is the lifeline of support for our total mission program;

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has entered into a relationship with the country of Spain to win people to Christ by sending 25 students to form a witnessing team at the World Cup Soccer games during the summer of 1982; by sending a group of pastors and laymen to conduct Continuing Witness Schools during the fall of 1982; by helping to conduct simultaneous revivals there during the spring of 1983; and by hosting a group of Spanish pastors in Oklahoma during the fall of 1983;

BE IT RESOLVED that every church be urged and challenged to make the matter of our involvement with Spain an object of constant prayer during the next two years;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that every church be urged to challenge its members to consider God's will in their own lives relative to service as a mission volunteer as part of Bold Mission Thrust;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this convention encourage each church to renew its commitment to the Cooperative Program and the three special mission offerings; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this 76th annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma encourage each local cooperating church to renew its commitment to Bold Missions.

The motion carried to approve the report.

SALARY INFORMATION

Since the auditor's report does not give salaries of all elected employees, we are printing the salaries and benefits of department directors and associate department directors. Salaries of secretaries and other convention employees are in line with those doing similar work in the Oklahoma City area.

Salary and Fringe Benefits Explanation

Every employee receives a basic salary plus fringe benefits. The base salary may be divided as follows:

House Allowance (if ordained)

Various Annuity Board Plans

Base salary, including Longevity Pay
(to be distributed as below:)

Fringe benefits include comprehensive medical insurance, longterm disability insurance, life insurance, accident insurance, dependent life insurance and retirement (10 percent of base salary). For unordained persons, the convention pays employer's part of Social Security.

Here are two samples from 1980 salary schedules. Annual base pay for department directors is \$23,171.76 and for associates \$21,-306.24.

Employees who travel are reimbursed for their expenses when on convention business. The budgets carry a line item for the cost of leasing and insuring cars. There is an additional line item for other travel expenses which includes gas, oil, lodging, etc.

The salary proposals include a 10 percent cost of living increase, plus an additional amount for longevity. The Longevity Pay Schedule is explained following:

LONGEVITY PAY SCHEDULE

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved a longevity pay schedule for employees on May 15, 1978. A separate line in the budget indicates the longevity pay in order to clearly identify the base salary level which is the same for all employees with similar responsibilities.

Rationale Considered by Board of Directors

- 1. Presently, all employees are employed at the same salary for similar jobs.
- 2. Recognition for previous experience and skills is presently taken into account by beginning the employee at the same salary as his or her predecessor.
- 3. Short-term employees cost the BGCO repeated hours of training, moving expenses, etc.
- 4. A person becomes more valuable as he or she continues serving the BGCO.
- 5. There are a minimum number of positions in the BGCO and a person of ability, etc. often is limited in opportunities to move up in the organization to a higher salaried job. Longevity pay would help compensate at this point.
- 6. Recognition for continuous years of service could be accomplished through a longevity pay schedule that:
 - 1) Acknowledges the completion of 3 years with a \$200 base longevity compensation.
 - Increases each succeeding year with .2 percent of the salary, added to the base.
- 7. This suggested plan gives advantage to lower salaried persons by using the \$200 base for all persons.
- 8. The plan also gives credibility to longevity pay for higher salaried persons by using a percent of base salary for the annual increase.

We have examined the fund balance sheets of THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA, including only the funds herein named, as of December 31, 1981 and the related statements of support and revenue, expenditures and changes in fund balances and changes in financial position for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The title "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of The State of Oklahoma" represents only one segment of the operations of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and does not include other operations of the Convention as explained in Note 1 to the financial statements.

Prior to January 1, 1981, property and equipment purchased as a replacement for like items were expensed when purchased. All property and equipment acquired after that date have been capitalized. Depreciation expense is not recorded. The effect of this practice as compared to generally accepted accounting principles, which would require capitalization and depreciation of all property and equipment, is not determinable.

In our opinion, except for the adjustments that might be required, if any, to restate property and equipment for replacement items which have been expensed, and the effect of depreciation expense which has not been recorded, all as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1981, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The supplementary financial information on pages 18 through 19 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accommendation of the State of Oklahoma Composition of Reporting Entity—The accommendation.

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include only operations designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund balances and results of operations of the following owned organizations, operated and reported as separate organizations, are not included.

1. Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma
2. Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma
Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Inventories—Inventories of office and printing supplies and items held for resale at Camp Hudgens and Nunny Cha Ha are stated at the lower of cost or market. Inventories of livestock, poultry and feed at the boys' ranch and farm are stated at a nominal value. These items have either been grown or have been contributed and therefore, have no cost value.

Property and Equipment—It was customary in prior years to expense items of equipment, even though of a capital nature, which were purchased as a replacement for like items which had been capitalized in the past. Beginning January 1, 1981, items purchased during 1981 of a capital nature costing \$500 or more were capitalized.

It has not been the policy of the Convention to record depreciation. Therefore, items capitalized are generally carried at either cost or contributed value with no provision for depreciation.

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches thorughout the State of Oklahoma. It is recognized as income as received. The donor may designate its use by the Baptist General Convention.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. Funds held by the Foundation for those Departments and Agencies included in this report are included herein. These funds include designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense
On September 3, 1963, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1981, the unamortized balance amounted to \$11,733.

4. Notes Payable
The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000, due in monthly installments of \$1,000, including interest at \$1\frac{12}{20}.

The note was created for expansion of The Baptist Bookstore, Oklahoma City. The balance at December 31, 1981 is \$56,252.

Voyager Inn, Inc.—The Mayfair House, a motel, was located on land owned by Baptist General Convention. The Convention purchased the motel on November 29, 1971. The purchase involved the assumption of a note with Quail Creek Bank at 4½% interest with monthly payments of \$2,600. The balance of the note at December 31, 1981 was \$32,285.

The motel was subsequently removed and an apartment complex known as Warwick West III was constructed thereon.

In addition, Baptist General Convention leased land to C. A. Henderson on which Warwick West I and II apartment complex was constructed.

By contract dated January 13, 1981, the Convention sold all land occupied by the Warwick West apartments to C. A. Henderson for \$2,000,000. The proceeds from the sale are to be received in five annual installments beginning in 1986, plus interest at 10%. 5. Expansion Program

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma—On July 15, 1971, The Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises occupied by the Retirement Center to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA), which issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. OIA subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years at an annual rental equal to the annual debt service requirements of OIA on the bonds. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981 for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by OIA.

On March 1, 1978, The Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with OIA, OIA issued its "Baptist Laymen's Corporation (guaranteed by The Baptist General. Convention of the State of Oklahoma) Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C' in the amount of \$2,000,000. OIA assumed responsibility for the completion of the Activities Center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years or until the bonds have been paid. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by OIA. The Corporation retained approximately 20 acres of land in trust for the Convention. Baptist Laymen's Corporation acts as the governing body of the Center for the Convention. Baptist Laymen's Corporation total \$619,148 for Series A and B lease obligations and \$4,029,675 for Series C.

Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma—In 1970, the Center underwent a

Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma—In 1970, the Center underwent a large expansion which was financed through the Hugo Golden Age Home Authority, a public trust. The Authority issued tax exempt bonds in the amount of \$320,000, of which \$125,000 was used to retire indebtedness to the Baptist General Convention and the remaining \$195,000 was used for improvements to the facility, bond issue costs, and other related expenses.

At the time the Baptist General Convention lessed the facilities to the Authority.

and other related expenses.

At that time, the Baptist General Convention leased the facilities to the Authority for a period that would coincide with the bond life of approximaely sixteen years. The Authority then executed an operating and maintenance agreement with the Convention, which provides for the Convention to operate the Center on behalf of the Authority. This agreement provides for the Authority to pay to the Convention, as rent, the net results of operations after deducting sufficient funds to meet annual bond debt service consisting of principal, interest, trustee fees, and any other related costs.

Baptist General Convention is contingently liable for the payment of all bonds and interest due under the bonds, which totals \$156,017 at December 31, 1981.

6. Notes Receivable

The Convention has a note receivable secured by 800 acres located in Oklahoma. City, Oklahoma. The present note is dated July 2, 1981, and is due January 2, 1982 in the amount of \$430,000, bearing 1434% interest.

During August 1981, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma contracted to sell the Baptist Childrens Home located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The total sales price is \$12,000,000, and is due in cash less any earnest money paid at the closing date. The latest possible date of closing, baring certain contingencies, is August 19, 1982.

8. Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center—Capital Lease Obligation
On February 1, 1978, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage-Revenue Bends 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343.

A supplemental Bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The duplex units were completed during 1981 at a total cost of \$322,923.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy both bond obligations. The original and supplemental leases are scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008 and April 1, 2001, respectively.

The Convention has the right to purchase both the Project and duplex units at any time on or after February 1, 1988, at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the Bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued inteerst on all Bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

The Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center was constructed on land owned by Baptist General Convention which is included in the Child Care Fund (Note 2). The following is a schedule by years of future minimum lease payments under the original and supplemental Owasso Baptist Village lease obligations, together with the present value of the net minimum lease payments as of December 31, 1981:

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Summary of Investments by Funds

We have examined the fund balance sheets of THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA (a not-for-profit corporation) as of December 31, 1981 and 1980, and the related statements of receipts and expenditures and ownership, expenditures and reductions, and changes in financial position of the Trust and Endowment Fund; income and fund balance, and changes in financial position of the Unrestricted Operating Fund; and receipts and expenditures and balance of undistributed gains (losses) of the Group Investment Funds for the years then ended. Our examinations were made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Generally accepted accounting principles for nonprofit organizations require that annuities be recorded by reflecting, as a liability, the present value of the actuarially determined future payments, and as income (or deferred income) the excess of the amount of the annuity gift over the liability. The Foundation has not attempted, at this time, to compute any liability in connection with annuities, or to determine the accounting treatment to be accorded such annuities based upon their individual provisions. It has not been practicable for us to determine the adjustments, if any, that might be required to the financial statements to reflect the liability to annuitants and the accounting treatment to be accorded such contracts, or the materiality of these matters.

In our report dated March 10, 1981, our opinion on the 1980 financial statements was qualified because no provision had been made for depreciable property, a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. As explained in Note 7, the Unrestricted Operating Fund 1980 financial statements have been restated to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, our present opinion on the 1980 Unrestricted Operating Fund financial statements, as presented herein, is different from that expressed in our previous report.

In our opinion, except for the Trust and Endowment Fund, for which no provisions have been made for depreciation of property, and for the liability for future payments to annuitants as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and the funds administered by it at December 31, 1981 and 1980, and the results of its transactions and operations, and the changes in its financial position for the years then ended, applied on a consistent basis after restatement for the change, with which we concur, in the method of accounting for depreciable property of the Unrestricted Operating Fund as described in Note 7 to the financial statements.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The supplementary financial information on pages 17 through 19 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information except for that portion marked "unaudited," on which we express no opinion, has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accounting Basis of Statements.—The financial statements are presented on the modified cash basis, which, because of the nature of the operations, does not materially differ from the results that would be obtained on the accrual basis, except for undistributed gains of the Group Investment Funds. Such undistributed gains are recognized as earnings of the Trust and Endowment Fund when received, and as disbursements of the Group Investment Fund when transferred.

Funds invested in the Group Investment Funds by the Trust and Endowment Fund and Unrestricted Operating Fund are recorded as investments of the investor fund. These investments are also reported on the fund balance sheets of the Group Investment Funds.

Investment Funds.

Investment Funds.

Investments—All investments are valued at appraised or market value at time of gift, or cost, if purchased. This basis is not adjusted to recognize market value fluctuations occurring subsequent to date of receipt. For convenience in managing the funds entrusted to them, the Foundation trustees have established three group investment funds; (1) Funds loaned to churches as described in Note 3, (2) Funds invested in common stock of publicly held corporations, and (3) Funds invested in bonds and preferred stock of publicly held corporations.

The income, except for gains and losses on disposition of securities, are distributed to the trusts of the Trust and Endowment Fund monthly. This income is reported on a

cash basis.

Ownership—The ownership of the Trust and Endowment Fund has been separated into the various categories of trusts in this fund. Endowment Funds account for assets received under stipulation of the donors that such assets be invested, and that only the investment income be used for specific purposes until a specified time or the occurrence of a specified event or in perpetuity. The other Trust categories are either custodial in nature or are self-evident as to purpose.

Annuities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at an amount equal to the book value of their assets. No attempt has been made to compute any liability in connection with these funds for future payments to beneficiaries. Annuitants participating in these contracts were paid \$53,326 and \$40,249 for 1981 and 1980, respectively.

Depreciation—Property owned by the unrestricted operating fund is depreciated on the straight-line method at rates that will write off the cost of the office furniture and equipment and computer software over their estimated useful lives. No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties in the Trust and Endowment Funds.

Depletion—Depletion of mineral properties is recognized in certain trusts as a percentage of income received from production of oil and gas. This procedure is followed to permit the Foundation to exclude from distribution a portion of the income received from mineral interests.

from mineral interests.

Oil and gas properties are in various producing stages, and information is not currently available with respect to proved reserves or proved developed reserves. Earnings from oil and gas production totaled \$510,815 for the year ended December 31, 1981 (\$471,057 for 1980).

Current market values are not available on all investments of the Trust and Endowment funds. The following is a comparison of the cost or other basis of investments of the Trust and Endowment Fund for which current market value information is available or can be estimated.

3. Church Building Loans Receivable

The Foundation makes loans to Baptist churches to construct church buildings. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements. The lives of these loans vary from 10 to 15 years. The Foundation attempts to set interest rates at the current rate available from commercial sources.

4. The Old Baptist Building

On October 30, 1955, property known as "The Old Baptist Building" at 223 Park Avenue, Oklahoma, with a cost of \$61,554, was leased to Felix Investment Company for a period of 99 years. The annual rentals are \$10,808.

5. Notes Payable

5. Notes Payable
During 1981, the Foundation entered into a purchase agreement to purchase an IBM 6450 information processor which was previously leased under an operating lease. The note payable is for \$14,360, bears 20½% interest, and is due in monthly installments of \$441 to October 8, 1985. The balance at December 31, 1981 is \$14,320. The processor has a depreciated cost of \$13,650 at December 31, 1981.

In order to satisfy commitments to make church building loans, a note was given to the Central National Bank of Poteau, Poteau, Oklahoma. The Note was for \$280,000, bears 10½% interest, and was due May 24, 1980. During 1981, the December 31, 1980 balance of \$200,000 was paid off.

During 1980, the Foundation entered into an operating lease for an IBM 6450 information processor, for twenty-four months at \$885 per month. On October 8, 1981, the Foundation entered into a purchase agreement to purchase the processor (see Note 5).

7. Restatement for Depreciable Property

During 1981, the Foundation changed its method of accounting for depreciable property of the Unrestricted Operating Fund to conform to generally accepted account-

property of the Unrestricted Operating Fund to conform to generally accepted accounting principles.

In prior years, depreciable property purchased to replace existing property was expensed, and new property was capitalized but not depreciated. Effective January 1, 1981, all property owned at that date was capitalized, and depreciation was retroactively recognized from the date of acquisition. Depreciation expense was recognized in 1981.

The property and equipment fund balance at January 1, 1981 was decreased by \$46,139 (\$45,541 at January 1, 1980) to restate property and accumulated depreciation. The 1980 financial statements included herein have been restated for this change. This change in accounting method decreased net income for 1981 and 1980 by \$15,919 and \$598, respectively, from that which would have been reported by the accounting method previously in use.

8. 1980 Reclassifications

The section for contributions and other funds received in the 1980 Statement of Receipts and Expenditures and Ownership for the Trust and Endowment fund (page 4) has been reclassified as to the detail previously reported.

The total of \$1,797,399 did not change; however, the reclassification was made to correctly reflect such items by trust fund category.

Organization

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946, for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention on November 6, 1946. It was created as a private, non-profit, religious association "to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatever nature, and wheresoever situated . . . for the church and other religious and charitable purposes . . . necessary for its membership . . . worship and exercise of such powers."

Its duties and powers are to receive by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise, any money or property to be used as may be directed to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations, or partnerships for the purpose of furthering the interest of educational institutions, hospitals, orphanages, student centers, and any other property in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work, to borrow money, hold, administer and dispose of property; make conveyances and assignments; incur obligations and prosecute or defend any action or suit in which involved.

INSURANCE COVERAGE (Unaudited)

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma carries the following liability insurance coverage.

A—Directors and officers liability insurance—The policy provides that the Foundation is reimbursed by the insurer when required or permitted to indemnify the directors and officers of the Corporation for damages, judgments, settlement costs, charges or expenses, incurred in connection with the defense of any action to which the officers and directors are a party. The total liability under this coverage is \$1,000,000 per policy year. The insurer pays 95% of the excess of \$2,500 per claim.

B—Workmen's Compensation, statutory requirement, and employers liability insurance with a maximum liability of \$500,000 per accident.

C—Automobile liability with coverage for bodily injury liability of \$300,000 and property damage liability of \$100,000 for each occurrence.

D—Commercial Blanket Bond covering losses due to dishonesty of employees. The limit of liability is \$500,000 with a \$5,000 deductible.

E—The Foundation also carries insurance under which "Comprehensive General Liability" coverage is provided to scheduled properties. The coverage per occurrence is (a) Bodily Injury Liability—\$300,000 (b) Property Damage Liability—\$100,000. A policy is maintained providing for \$1,000,000 excess coverage for the general liability coverage.

F—Computer Policy with coverage for certain equipment and media on replacement cost basis including coverage for extra expense to continue operations in the event of an insurable loss.

I. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis—The financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation as explained later in this note. The statements of current fund revenues and expenditures are statements of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. They do not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement or revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as expenditures in the case of additions and normal replacement of buildings, equipment, library books and debt service.

The library is valued at cost for books, periodicals, and microform acquired during the past ten years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years. Library acquisitions totaled approximately \$74,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist of book store supplies for resale and maintenance supplies. These are priced at cost, general on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting into funds in accordance with the principles of bund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and recompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achievi

institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from inevstments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments which are purchased by the University are generally stated at cost and investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost and investments.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Equipment acquired over 20 years ago is eliminated from the financial statements. In 1981 and 1980, \$40,145 and \$37,659, respectively, were written off.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuition, fees, and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated causes are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and other contributions for designated causes are recognized as income when expended. 3. The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, and to the extent necessary, the income from W.M.U. Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds described in Note 7.

4. All funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969, from pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign and designated for the student center project, and 75 percent of all funds, receipts and revenues received on or after July 1, 1969 from undesignated pledges to the 1969-70 capital funds campaign were to be remitted to the

Oklahoma Baptist University Authority under terms of a lease agreement between the University and the Authority. These funds were used by the Authority for redemption of Oklahoma Baptist University Authority Revenue Bonds, dated May 1, 1969.

5. Loan Fund

5. Loan Fund
The Oklahoma Baptist University has received capital contributions from the federal government to the Nursing Student Loan Program which total \$236,474 from the inception of the program to July 31, 1981. (\$224,507 at July 31, 1980). An additional \$95,460 was advanced to the University by the government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans with \$68,653 having been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds, and from matching funds (10 percent of federal capital contributions) furnished by the school. Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the respective programs may have portions of principal and interest payments forgiven.

The following trusts are not included in the University's financial statements:

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The Prichard Trust had a corpus of \$4,934,261 at July 31, 1981.

The American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after payment of beneficiary and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$749,368 at July 31, 1981.

(A) The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, consists of 234% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$15,000 on November 1, 1976 to \$23,000 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$878,387.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series 1957, consists of 236% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$17,000 on October 1, 1976 to \$33,000 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$2,765,248:

July 31, 1980 was \$150,000. The trustee has paid these bonds and interest at July 31,
1981. This lease was cancelled and the property is included in the property pledged
under the 1979 capitalized lease described hereafter.

The Oklahoma Baptist University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with
Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct
a Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Activities Complex; to remodel the
Brotherhood Dormitory, WMU Memorial Dormitory, and Clark Craig Field House; to
finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority obtained the funds for the improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its
bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979." The bonds
are payable from the rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main
campus facilities. campus facilities.

The lease agreement is classified as a capital lease. The assets (\$4,869,247) and the lease liability (\$5,936,656) are recorded in the accompanying financial statements.

Under this agreement, the Authority issued its capital facilities revolving note for a maximum of \$1,500,000 whch, together with donor pledges, was issued to acquire, construct, equip and furnish a learning center; to remodel and modernize Montgomery Hall; and to acquire, construct, equip and furnish additional student housing at the University.

This note was paid from proceeds of the Authority's bond issue "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bond, Series 1979," dated December 1, 1979, and the lease was released.

This lease was reported as an operating lease with neither the liability nor the assets purchased recorded. The payment of the note released the following assets, which were then recorded on the University's books during the year ended July 31, 1980.

The University received a program loan from the Pearl M. & Julia J. Harmon Foundation dated May 7, 1981. The loan bears no interest and is to be used for energy saving expenditures. Repayment will be made in 72 installments beginning after the project is completed. The amount drawn at July 31, 1981 was \$9,062 (maximum loan, \$50,000).

10. Equipment Lease Contract Payable

The University is leasing a telephone system from Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. The lease began April 1, 1980 and is for a term of 120 months. It has been classified as a capital lease. The University has entered into two lease agreements which are classified as operating leases. The first is the lease of an apartment house for a period of 15 years from May, 1967, at a rental expense of \$1,858 per month.

The second is the lease of land upon which the maintenance department offices and shops were constructed. The lease is for a period of 25 years beginning in November of 1977. The lease provides for a rental expense of \$250 per month. The lease contains an option to renew at the end of the lease.

The total rental expense for operating leases was \$25,296 for both 1981 and 1980.

12. Change in Valuation Method for Library Books

At July 31, 1981, the library was valued at cost for books, periodicals, and microform acquired during the past ten years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years. In prior years the library was valued at an amount equal to the prior four years expenditures, plus \$2 per volume in the collection longer than four years.

The new method of library valuation was adopted to recognize cost for those

The new method of library valuation was adopted to recognize cost for those volumes which constitute the majority of the collections usage, which is books and periodicals added during the past ten years. The new method was applied retroactivitely to library acquisitions for prior years.

The change had no effect on revenues or expenditures for 1981. The adjustment of \$428,569 to apply retroactively the new method is included in the increase to the net investment in plant for 1981.

The Center operates a nursing home for the elderly in Hugo, Oklahoma, and reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provisions of that guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds—Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property and equipment are added to the unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for board-designated purposes are not considered to be restricted. The Center currently has no funds which are considered to be restricted.

Basis of Accounting—The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period service is provided.

During the current year, it was determined that generally accepted accounting principles would require that separate statements be presented for the Center and for the Authority as they are two separate entities.

The fund balance of the combined entities, totaling \$365,597 at July 1, 1980, has been restated in the accompanying financial statements to eliminate net assets totaling \$24,981 which are applicable to Hugo Golden Age Home Authority.

4. Hugo Golden Age Home Authority, a public trust. The Authority issued tax exempt bonds in the amount of \$320,000, of which \$125,000 was used to retire indebtedness to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the remaining \$195,000 was used for improvements to the facility, bond issue costs, and other related expenses. At that time, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased the facilities to the Authority for a period that would coincide with the bond life of approximately sixteen years. The Authority then executed an operating and maintenance agreement with the Convention, which provides for the Convention to operate the Center on behalf of the Authority. The form of this agreement provides for the Authority to pay to the Convention, as rent, the net results of operations after deducting

sufficient funds to meet annual bond debt service consisting of principal, interest, trustee fees, and any other related costs. The substance of the agreement differs from form in that the Convention retains all benefits of ownership and operations because all funds resulting from operations less debt service payments inure to the Convention. The financial statements for the Center have been prepared recognizing the substance over the form of this agreement.

In addition to the leasing of the facility to the Authority, the Convention also pledged its "full faith and credit" toward the payment of all principal and interest due under the bonds as an additional guarantee to the bond holders. This additional guarantee has, in effect, caused the Convention to be responsible for the payment of debt service in the event that facility operations are insufficient to meet such payments.

Investments held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as a recipient for funds that could be invested. Funds held by the Foundation, included herein at cost or market value at date of receipt of donation, were derived from contributions both by the retirement center and individual donors for the retirement center as beneficiary.

A campaign was begun in 1976 to raise \$250,000 in contributions to construct an activities center for the retirement center. At December 31, 1978, a total of \$220,780 was pledged, of which \$18,821 (\$24,278—1980) remained uncollected. During 1981, the Center recorded an allowance for estimated uncollectible pledges in the amount of \$16,905. The cost of the activities center was \$408,083.

3. Capitalized Lease Ohligations (Bonds Payable)

On June 10, 1964, land on which the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

As of July 15, 1971, the Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. On this same date the OIA subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The Series A and B bonds outstanding at December 31, 1981 totaled \$456,000 (1980—\$510,000).

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation (guaranteed by Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma) Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The OIA assumed responsibility for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements un

Interest earned by the indenture trustee was used to reduce the 1981 lease payments otherwise required of the Retirement Center. This amount, which is primarily nonrecurring, totaled \$22,260 and was reported as interest income in the accompanying statement of income for 1981.

On July 1, 1974, the Corporation transferred back to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma all of the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center's real and personal property used in its operations. The Corporation retained approximately 20 acres of land in trust for the Convention. Baptist Laymen's Corporation acts as the governing body of the Center for the Convention.

SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Organization

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma was constructed in 1965 by Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a nonprofit corporation affiliated with Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Center is located on Northwest Highway and Council Road in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It consists of Lackey Manor, (a nursing home), houses and apartment units located adjacent thereto.

In 1974, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation conveyed ownership of the Center to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Baptist Laymen's Corporation continues to operate the Center for the Convention.
