# Second Amended Articles of Incorporation

of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

STATE OF OKLAHOMA )
COUNTY OF OKLAHOMA J

TO: WILLIAM N. CHRISTIAN, SECRETARY OF STATE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL. CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

#### ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and

institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

#### ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

#### ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

#### ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

#### ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## Constitution and Bylaws

## CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

#### ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

#### ARTICLE HI-OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

#### ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

#### Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.
- Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent

and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

## ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

#### ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee

shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their actions shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the Baptist Messenger.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

#### ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

#### ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

### BYLAWS ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is

understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than the officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the President in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called Board meeting, the President and Executive Director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the Board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommenda-

tion, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 5. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 6. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

#### ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER — The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations,

and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or banks or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of Executive Director-Treasurer becomes vacant:

- (1) In the event the vacancy of the office of Executive Director-Treasurer occurs between sessions of the Convention, the Associate Executive Director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the Board of Directors.
- (2) A Search Committee of seven members of the Board of Directors shall be elected without nomination by the Board of Directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.
- (3) When the Committee has a nomination to make to the Board, a meeting of the Board of Directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the Board of Directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the Convention.
- (4) The person elected by the Board of Directors shall serve until the Convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.
- Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contacts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto: and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.
- Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.
- Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

#### ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's Board of Directors and boards

of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected convention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTEES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

#### ARTICLE V-STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

## ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

## Resolutions

#### Concerning Baptist Churches

A resolution concerning "Baptist churches" was adopted by the Convention November 10, 1949.

"Be it resolved that the words 'Baptist churches' which appear in Article II, Section 1, be interpreted to mean churches that are sound in faith and practice, and

"Be it further resolved, that churches which accept alien immersion, practice open communion or affiliate with the Federal Council, World Council or similar unionizing organization, shall be considered unsound in faith and practice."

## Charter and Bylaws

#### of

### Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

#### ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

#### ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies: to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, thechnology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

#### ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

#### ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said

resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist Gneral Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

#### ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

#### BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY, A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION February 26, 1980

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention

held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parlimentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 3. All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold two meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in October on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect its officers, receive reports and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of April, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of both meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 4. The presence of eleven members of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 5. All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 6. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, and an Assistant Secretary, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its first meeting of the University's fiscal year.

Section 7. Vacancies in the office of the trustee shall occur through resignation or death of a trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act, and the Board of Trustees shall have the power to fill any vacancies in the office of trustee occurring during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the persons elected to such vacancies by the Board of Trustees to hold office only until the vacancies are filled by the next annual session of the Baptist Gneral Convention of Oklahoma, and also to elect the successor or successors of any trustee or trustees in case the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma fails to elect such successor or successors.

Section 8. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees, and exercise generally such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 9. The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees from the state of Oklahoma, or in the event of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 10. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 11. The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary from the State of Oklahoma or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, or casualty.

Section 12. The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be the chief executive officer of the University

and shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Dean, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President.

Section 13. The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their semi-annual meeting in April of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 14. These bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such meeting.

Section 15. The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 16. There shall be formed from the membership of the Board of Trustees an Executive Committee consisting of not more than seven members. The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

The following officers of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Secretary of Board of Trustees.

The following Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the Board of Trustees, who are appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees: Chairman of Committee on Student Development, Chairman of Committee on Academic Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Business Affairs, Chairman of Committee on Development Affairs.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee, the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be Secretary of the Executive Committee.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session and to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and shall perform such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the Board of Trustees; said Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Section 17. The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

Section 18. These bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

# Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation

of

We, the Undersigned, John R. Crain, President, and C. Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

#### ARTICLE I

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUN-DATION OF OKLAHOMA.

#### ARTICLE II

#### Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

### ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

#### ARTICLE V Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

- 1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
- 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;
- 3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;
- 4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;
- 5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and
- 6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and dispo-

sition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

### ARTICLE VII Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

#### ARTICLE IX

#### Prohibitions to assure tax-empt status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

#### ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist Gneral Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### Adoption of Amended Articles

- 1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.
- 2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the —— day of \_\_\_\_\_\_,1974.
- 3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

# **Amended Bylaws**

of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (Effective December 20, 1974)

# ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

# ARTICLE II Meetings

- 2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.
- 2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuring year.
- 2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.
- 2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.
- 2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer

notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

# ARTICLE III Officers

- 3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.
- 3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.
- 3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

# ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

- 4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- 4.2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.
- 4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer)

without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.

- 4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.
- 4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.
- 4.4 Vice Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibililities.
- 4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

# ARTICLE V Directors

- 5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.
- 5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said

annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

- 5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 5.2 Election of Directors and Term of Office. In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as directors.
- 5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.
- 5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of all standing committees and the President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.
- 5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.
- 5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

## ARTICLE VI

# Administration of Funds and Property

6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and,

in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.

6.2 **Designated Gifts.** Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

# 6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

- (a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.
- (b) All funds received and administred by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

# ARTICLE VII

### Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, CORPORATE SEAL."

### ARTICLE VIII

# Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

- 8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer of employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.
- 8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

# ARTICLE IX

# Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist

General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

# Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

STATE OF OKLAHOMA ) S COUNTY OF OKLAHOMA )

TO: Secretary of State of the State of Oklahoma:

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

# ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

### ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

# ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

# ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.
- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, inform, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and real in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

# ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

# ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

# ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

# ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

# ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

# ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

# ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

# Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

# ARTICLE I Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than two-thirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected

to serve for the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. OUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at and adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefor being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

# ARTICLE II Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the

Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Directors or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form

of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors.

Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

# ARTICLE III Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as hereinabove provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meetings.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of

the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes theeof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

# ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

# ARTICLE V President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

# ARTICLE VI Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-

Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

### ARTICLE VII

# Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

# ARTICLE VIII

# Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

### ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

# ARTICLE X

# Notice of Regular Meetings

Section 1. DISPENSED WITH. Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1. 42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

# ARTICLE XI Amendments

Section 1. METHOD OF AMENDMENT. These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

### ARTICLE XII

# Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this

corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

# ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

# Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Tulsa

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

# ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION OF TULSA.

# ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

### ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

# ARTICLE IV

The corporation is formed exclusively for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), and particularly the following purposes:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or

assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.
- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees; or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner—thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;

- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;
- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bill of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

# ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

### ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

# ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and

in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was seventeen (17). The number of Directis provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall tors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the Administrator of Lackey Manor in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, or their successors in office, shall at all times be Directors of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Owasso, Oklahoma, on the 28th day of September, 1979, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

John D. Setser, Calvin Vogt, Howard Doak, Charles Leake, Bert McElroy, Joe Huitt, Norman Farrell, J. Ray Smith, John Crain, Claude H. Rogers, Joseph R. Coleman, Al Geiger, Victor Thompson. Robert D. McCullough, Joe Moore, John Nikkel, Joseph M. Best, and Joe L. Ingram, Ex-Officio and Don Donalson, Ex-Officio.

# ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

# ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

### ARTICLE X

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner or to such organization or organizations organized or operating exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Directors shall determine and which disposition has been approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District

Court in the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

## ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

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# Monday Evening November 15

Combined Session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Woman's Missionary Union, and Pastors' Conference Theme: "With Holy Boldness—We Go" Matthew 28:19-20

- 1. President Keith Wiginton called the 77th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to order at 6:50 p.m.
- 2. Glenn Boyd, director, Department of Church Music, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, led in singing "Rescue the Perishing" and "How Great Thou Art."
  - 3. Ron Argo, pastor, First Church, Alva, read Acts 4:13-20.
  - 4. Ben Mosley, pastor, First Church, Bristow, led in prayer.
- 5. Forrest Siler, chairman, presented the report of the Program Committee.

"The Program Committee recommends that the program that is printed and distributed among the messengers serve as the official program of the 77th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, with such changes as may become necessary throughout the convention. We further recommend that all new business be presented by Wednesday afternoon in order that the program committee may announce time for discussion."

The motion carried to approve the report.

- 6. Mrs. Richard H. Sample, president, Woman's Missionary Union, Southern Baptist Convention, addressed the convention on the subject of missions.
- 7. Glenn Boyd led in singing the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story."
- 8. Keith Parks, president, Foreign Mission Board, Southern Baptist Convention, led in a program concerning foreign missions. He was assisted by members of the Foreign Mission Board staff, Carl W. Johnson; William W. Marshall; William R. Wakefield; Dr. and Mrs. Sam Cannata, missionaries; and Herman Hayes. The Glenn Boyd family, former missionaries, presented special music. A question and answer period was held which proved to be very helpful and informative. Parks closed the report with a message on "The Macedonian Call."
- Keith Parks led in a closing prayer and the convention was adjourned until Tuesday afternoon.

### Tuesday Afternoon November 16

10. Keith Wiginton, president, called the convention to order at 2 p.m.

"As all of us are aware, an overwhelming victory was recently gained by the advocates of pari-mutuel gambling in Oklahoma. We are all deeply indebted to our executive director, Joe Ingram, for his valiant leadership in opposition to the pari-mutuel question and for his Christian concern for the moral climate of Oklahoma. Had each of us here worked as hard as he did, the pari-mutuel issue would have been defeated.

"The reality, however, is that we lost and now are faced with a county by county referendum on the issue. Those of us on the front line in the counties will need all the organizational and strategy help we can get in order to successfully oppose this influence for evil in our communities. In addition, we shall need to maintain an evaluation of state government on this and other moral issues. Because of the extensive dimensions of such an assignment, I believe Oklahoma Baptists need a department within our convention specifically designed and staffed for such a task.

"Therefore, for the sake of more effectively preserving moral values, strengthening family life, and promoting a consciousness of Christian principles for everyday living, I move that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma establish a Department of Christian Moral Concerns charged with such responsibilities."

The motion was referred to the Program Committee to be scheduled for later consideration.

## Oklahoma Baptist University Bob R. Agee, President

Encouraging, positive, energetic, heartening—all these words may be used to describe the current status of Oklahoma Baptist University. This 1981-82 Report is designed to share with you some of the past year's highlights in order that you, too, can become a part of the excitement found at Oklahoma's Baptist university.

OBU closed the 1981-1982 year under the leadership of a new president, Bob R. Agee. Agee was chosen as the 13th president of Oklahoma Baptist University after the resignation from the presidency of E. Eugene Hall, who returned to the classroom as professor of preaching at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Agee brings

to OBU considerable experience as a pastor, preacher, teacher and higher education administrator. President Agee was elected unanimously by the university's board of trustees on Aug. 6. The Presidential Search Committee of the board worked intensely, and their presentation of Agee and his subsequent election brought their responsibilities to a close. The search committee consisted of Shirley Jones (faculty), Alan Parker (student), Lloyd Minter (chairman), Larry Payne, John Wheeler, Larry Wileman, Elsie DeFehr, William Z. Cook, Joe L. Ingram (ex officio), and Kenneth Shaw (ex officio).

J. Thomas Terry, vice-president for business affairs and treasurer, served admirably as interim administrator and chief executive officer between presidents. Terry effectively handled the summer recruitment of faculty and the many other tasks necessary to prepare for the fall 1982 semester.

A non-duplicating headcount of 2,064 made up OBU's spirited student body this past year. In addition, there were 1,075 students enrolled in non-credit continuing education courses; thus, 3,139 persons received instruction from OBU. Of the 2,064 credit earning students, 45 percent were male and 55 percent were female. Seventy percent claimed Oklahoma as their home state, while 27 percent hailed from other states all across America. The remaining three percent were foreign students, gracing our campus with beauty and culture from 23 different countries.

Jimmy Allen, president of the Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, gave the 1982 commencement address at annual May exercises. He expressed to the standing room only crowd the need for all individuals to be keenly aware of the changes taking place in the world and to take necessary steps to meet future challenges. Following the commencement address, President Hall conferred degrees upon 249 students, bringing to 9,050 the number of students receiving degrees from Oklahoma Baptist University since its founding.

In 1981-82, 494 OBU students were preparing for vocations in Christian ministry—175 for the pastorate, 73 for educational ministries, 103 for the music ministry, 131 for missions both at home and foreign, and 12 for other areas of Christian service. Last year these students reported preaching over 800 sermons, traveling at least 88,000 miles in ministry or mission-related work, and being used of the Lord as 240 people accepted Christ and made over 700 other decisions.

The summer revival teams were very successful. Nine students travelled the state taking revival services and ministry to 10 Oklahoma churches, and one church out of the state. Twenty-two decisions for Christ were made as a result of speaking to about 2,000 people over the course of the summer.

The financial aid program continued to be one of the finest in the nation for 1981-1982. Financial support is one of the major recruitment and retention tools for privately supported institutions like OBU. During 1980-1981, the most recent year for which comprehensive data are available, 91 percent of enrolled OBU students received financial aid packages, and the aid amounted to an average of \$2,194 per person. A total of \$895,161 was given for scholarships; \$736,211 given through loans; \$1,033,072 given in grants; and \$378,245 was given through campus employment. All categories together totaled \$3,042,689 for the year.

The financial aid program was augmented this year by the initiation of the Partnership Scholarship Program. The Partnership Program guarantees that OBU and the BGCO, combined, will match with a gift of \$300 if a student's home Baptist church will sponsor him or her with a \$200 scholarship. OBU, BGCO and the home church may then provide together a handsome scholarship equalling \$500. Over seventy Oklahoma Baptist churches participated in this program established for first time, full-time freshmen.

Regarding the actual campus of OBU, developing and maintaining the physical plant of our institution is vital to its success and growth in contemporary society. Oklahoma Baptist University has seen several major projects undertaken and completed in the past year. On Sept. 22, 1982, OBU dedicated the new \$3.5 million Noble Complex, the University's health, physical education and recreation activities center. The Noble Complex houses a 2,600 seat basketball arena, a 25-meter swimming pool, four handball/racquetball courts, a human-performance laboratory, physical education classrooms, dressing and training rooms for individuals and teams, an Athletic Heritage Center and the athletic offices. The first official Bison basketball game to inaugurate the first season in the new area was held on Nov. 13. The complex also consists of the remodeled Clark Craig field house, a completely resurfaced running track, and an updated baseball field.

Shawnee Hall, the oldest building on campus and the main classrooms building, experienced interior and exterior renovation during the summer and early fall. Classrooms were updated with new ceilings, lighting, fans, and heating and cooling systems. Entry-ways were remodeled and an elevator was installed to make all areas of the building easily accessible for handicapped persons.

Other renovation projects saw the completion of the Van Deren Memorial Organ housed in Raley Chapel. Two Tulsa friends of the university provided funds for the organ's completion, and dedicatory ceremonies were held on March 2. The organ boasts 67 ranks, over 1,000 new pipes, and an antiphonal trompette-en-chamade. Al Travis, OBU alumnus, gave the dedicatory recital. Ford Music Hall was also remodeled this past year, bringing new life to that practice facility which is important to music students on the campus. The Ford family of Shawnee and the Wimberly family of Okeene contributed funds for the remodeling. A dedication dinner and program for Ford Music Hall were presented prior to the annual Concerto and Aria Concert on April 5.

Two other major remodeling projects involved the Geiger Center for University Life and the Howard Residential Park. The Geiger Center, formerly the University Center, was remodeled in the Fall of 1981, with new carpet and wall treatments throughout its interior, and painting and sandblasting on its exterior. The name of the building was changed to the Albert J. and Laura Belle Geiger Center for University Life in recognition of the philanthropy and friendship to OBU of the Geigers of Tulsa. The Howard Residential Park, formerly the Bel Air Apartments, received new vinyl siding, landscaping and interior paint and wall treatments in recognition of the generosity of the R. C. Howard family of Oklahoma City.

New construction on the Oklahoma Baptist University campus in 1981-1982 included the recently completed Burns Apartments, married student housing named for the Elmer Burns' parents of Burns Flat. The eight unit apartment building is the first of three proposed for married students. A pedestrian mall and campus beautification plan is underway including the Peitz Plaza, a beautifully landscaped arbor and seating area surrounding a reflecting pool and waterfall just east of Raley Chapel. A new physical plant storage building was also constructed to house physical plant implements and supplies as well as the university's motor pool vehicles.

Academically, Oklahoma Baptist University remains sound and eager to meet the challenges of the present day and the future. OBU took a major step this past year by establishing the Oklahoma Baptist University School of Christian Service Northeastern Oklahoma Center in Tulsa. This extension center will help meet the ministerial education needs of Tulsa area ministers and laypersons who wish to engage in college-level study of the Bible and related areas but who might find attendance at a residential liberal arts university inconvenient. The first courses were offered in September 1982. The Northeastern Center utilizes the classroom facilities of Tulsa's Eastwood Church.

The university faculty adopted a revised Faculty Handbook in April. The handbook received major re-writing and updating from cover to cover bringing into focus more clearly the purpose and structure of the University.

New faculty members for 1982-1983 are: Richard Alexander, computer science; Teresa Bringman, health, physical education and recreation activities; James "Bob" Evans, religion; Carol Frosch, education; Hal E. Jenkins, education; Paul Rutledge, sociology; Charles White, business dean; Kathy Palen, journalism; Claudine Dickey, nursing dean.

Bison Athletics maintained fine records again for 1981-1982. Women's softball players boasted a 31-16 record becoming District IX Champions, Bi-district Champions and placing third in the NAIA Division I national tournament. The women's volleyball team was champion in NAIA District IX and was the Sooner Athletic Conference Champion. Men's basketball sported a 24-11 season and finished second in NAIA District IX and the Sooner Athletic Conference. Men's tennis players finished the season with a 15-2 match record and were SAC champions; they were second in NAIA District IX. Women's basketball had a 26-10 season and finished as Sooner Athletic Conference Champions and second place winners in District IX.

A principal achievement of the Office of Student Development, which enjoys administrative responsibility for several areas of non-academic student life and services, was the initiation of a pre-school orientation program for entering freshmen. The three-day programed orientation experience included introductions to specific areas of University life from an administrative perspective; tours of the campus and Shawnee; picnics and social gatherings; worship services; faculty, student and professional entertainment; and multimedia presentations featuring historical and contemporary views of campus life. A similar, although more modest, program was prepared for entering transfer students.

Student housing fulfilled financial and program expectations as improvements in physical facilities continued apace. All housing units maintained programs of diverse activities in which approximately 6,000 students participated during the September 1981-May 1982 school term.

Among the personalities taking leadership roles in Chapel/Assembly programs last year were Mack Roark, Chuck Bowman (Fellowship of Christian Athletes), Dean Warren Angell, Lavonn Brown, Michael J. Parenti, Representative Mickey Edwards and Darrel Baergen.

The third and fourth Herschel H. and Frances J. Hobbs Lectures in Baptist Faith and Heritage were given in the Fall and Spring semesters by Duke K. McCall, president of the Baptist World Alliance, and Russell Dilday, president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, respectively.

Peter Rhea Jones, senior pastor of First Church, Decatur, Ga., led in the spring campus revival. Five well attended and spirited services comprised the formal aspects of the revival which centered around the theme, "Setting Life's Goals."

The financial situation of Oklahoma Baptist University has never been stronger as records were broken again this year in resource development. The university's contributors gave over \$2,350,000 in 1981-1982, including \$436,252 (total incomplete) from the Oklahoma Baptist Foundation. Individuals, corporations and foundations making up the Presidents' Council and Distinguished Leadership group gave \$2,149,652, or 89.9 percent of the total funds given to the university. Ninety current and former trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University gave \$318,810, and 166 present faculty and staff donated \$27,806 to their institution in the past year.

Current concerns of the university involve rallying behind a new president as he endeavors to utilize the strong base of support set before him to build an even stronger OBU which will further meet the demanding spiritual and intellectual needs of its students and constituents. Other concerns include the continued effort to attract endowment funds for restricted and non-restrictive use by the university; continuing to make gallant strides to complete the campus by its Diamond Jubilee Anniversary in 1985; reversing the slight downward trend in enrolment; and in the words of President Agee, "to keep the institution

academically strong, unapologetically Christian and unashamedly Baptist."

Oklahoma Baptist University clearly understands the importance of the university's purpose which is to prepare Christian leaders for effective service in the various vocations through providing effective educational opportunities rooted in the premise that Jesus Christ is Lord. OBU is grateful for the generous support provided by the Baptists of Oklahoma. Your Baptist university is committed to responsible stewardship of all blessings, tangible and intangible, for the further benefit of all Baptists in Oklahoma and throughout the world.

## Planning and Promotion Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion office of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is an extension of the Executive Office. Lyle Garlow, associate executive director of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, in addition to administrative responsibilities relating to the total work of the convention, serves as director of Planning and Promotion. Glenn A. Brown serves as associate director of this office.

The Planning and Promotion office gives general direction to the denominational annual emphasis planning, and to the development of a coordinated calendar of activities for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The Planning and Promotion office is most closely related to those programs which work in the area of church programing. These departments include: Brotherhood, Church Music, Cooperative Missions, Evangelism, Religious Education and Woman's Missionary Union. These departments relate to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma Board of Directors through its Planning and Promotion Committee.

The Planning and Promotion office has been assigned several specific programs in addition to the general assignment above. These programs and the reports for last year follow:

### COOPERATIVE PROGRAM PROMOTION.

Cooperative Program receipts for 1981 were \$12,414,112.32, a 16.4 increase above 1980. These dollars were divided 44 percent for SBC ministries (\$5,462,209.42) and 56 percent for Oklahoma Baptist ministries (\$6,951,902.90). Churches in Oklahoma reported total tithes and offerings during 1981 of \$126,805,820. They gave 9.8 percent of these dollars through the Cooperative Program. The SBC average is 8.9 percent.

The actual Cooperative Program percentage objectives of Oklahoma churches is much higher than indicated above since the total receipts of churches includes building fund, love offerings, special mission offerings and other designated gifts. There has been a definite trend toward a higher percentage objective, as follows:

The Bold Mission Thrust goal to double the Cooperative Program receipts is within reach. At the Southern Baptist Convention in Nor-

folk in 1976, a goal to double the Cooperative Program by 1982 (from 1977) was adopted. Oklahoma Baptists should reach that goal by the end of 1982. The dollars going beyond Oklahoma will have more than doubled. Note the record.

Should the economy in Oklahoma not hold through 1982, we will still have made great gains. We are grateful to every church and her pastor for their great missionary commitment to Bold Mission Thrust.

Joe L. Ingram challenged Oklahoma Baptists with a Master Plan in his address to the state convention in November 1978. The plan called for advancing from \$10 million in 1980 to \$20 million in 1985, and to divide the Cooperative Program dollar 50 percent/50 percent between Oklahoma and SBC. With only a 14 percent annual increase during 1982, 1983, 1984 and 1985, we would exceed the 20 million dollar goal. Only a drastic reversal in the economy will move us off target.

The 50 percent/50 percent division is on target. The 1983 division is 46 percent; 1984 is 48 percent; and 1985 is 50 percent.

Our Bold Mission Cooperative Program Goal for 1982-85 is "2-5 percent MORE by 1985." This is the SBC conventionwide goal.

Each church must ask itself some questions. Are we willing to let Christ determine the life style of our church? Do luxuries mean more to us than witnessing to the lost world? Are we only concerned about local ministries or are we committed to the Great Commission?

Each church is challenged to put the Cooperative Program in the budget on a percentage basis and increase that percentage each year. The plan suggests every church to increase its Cooperative Program giving by an additional 2 to 5 percent during the three-year period. This means a church now giving 13 percent would move up to 15-18 percent by 1985. Many churches will be able to do even more than a 5 percent increase.

A guideline which a church might consider is:

If your church is giving-

- —Up to 5 percent, increase at least 2 percent per year through 1985 or until the church reaches its projected goal.
- -6 to 15 percent, increase from 1 to 2 percent per year through 1985 or until the church reaches its projected goal.
- —16 percent or more, increase ½ to 1 percent per year through 1985 or until the church reaches its projected goal.

It is important for your church to determine its own objective and

determine the rate of percentage increase necessary to reach that objective.

A new three-year mission giving placard was presented to each church in the Fall of 1982. Churches may use the placard to indicate progress in Cooperative Program and associational mission percentage giving for the years 1983, 1984 and 1985.

### COORDINATED PROMOTION PLANNING

The second phase of BOLD MISSION THRUST, 1982-85 was launched during 1982. Each association was provided the training and materials to conduct a CHURCH GROWTH WORKSHOP in the Fall of 1982.

Through the associational Church Growth Workshop, the first of three emphases, (1) reach people, (2) develop believers, and (3) strengthen families was launched. The reach people emphasis centered on the church growth launch—8.5 by '85—bold witness training—bold new work. Early reports indicate a good response to the associational Church Growth Workshops.

### ASSOCIATIONAL SERVICES

The 41 Southern Baptist associations in Oklahoma are each a self-governing, autonomous body. Each association employs an associational director of missions, plans, develops and carries out its own program. Each association cooperates 100 percent with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The staff of the Planning and Promotion office works closely with the associations and their directors of missions. Two extended planning meetings are conducted each year between the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma staff and the directors of missions.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shared \$102,468 Cooperative Program dollars with the associations during 1981, and \$115,156 projected for 1982. These funds are for promotion purposes.

A revised procedure was prepared in 1982 for distribution of the 1983 funds. The new formula gives consideration to the financial needs of both the smaller and larger association since these funds are designated for promotion costs shared jointly by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the association.

Changes in associational leadership since publication of prior **Book of Reports:** 

New to associational work: Dennis Garner, director of missions, Atoka-Coal Association, June, 1982; Lin Jones, director of missions, South Canadian Association, April, 1982; and Sanders McLemore, associational missionary in Cherokee Indian Association.

### CHURCH ADMINISTRATION

Church administration service is housed in the convention's Planning and Promotion Office and provides information and resources to churches, along with various skills conferences for pastors, staff, deacons and church officers and committees.

In 1982, (1) a church secretaries conference was sponsored with 129 secretaries participating; (2) a minister of education programing retreat was conducted for 45 ministers of education; (3) planning was initiated for an early 1983 Oklahoma Preaching Conference and a State Pastor/Deacon Retreat; (4) plus individual church assistance.

### STEWARDSHIP PROMOTION

Planners of Bold Mission Thrust considered it essential that churches experience an average increase of at least 15 percent in budget receipts each year (at least through 1985) in order for there to be an ample base for the outflow of mission giving for Bold Mission Thrust. The cash flow into the offering plates of Oklahoma Baptist churches in 1981 reflects a 17.8 percent increase over the previous year, the third year in a row the increase has been above 15 percent.

A major stewardship emphasis of 1982 has been "Bold Mission Encounter"—a plan for utilizing a group of selected, trained laymen to make a Bold Mission Thrust stewardship presentation in churches at the pastor's invitation. Their presentations highlighted the necessity for individual growth as Christian stewards to undergird advancement in the local church and world evangelization. A total of 165 choice laymen completed the training and were equipped to service between 600 and 700 churches in 23 participating associations.

Free stewardship education and promotion materials were provided to churches, along with individual assistance, as requested.

A pastor/staff compensation survey was completed and results made available to pastors and church leaders.

Also, the first associational Christian Family Money Management Conferences were conducted in the state.

A series of associational stewardship conferences has been projected for 1982 featuring the new SBC stewardship "STANDARD."

(2) Religious Education—Bill Haggard

## Religious Education Department Bill C. Haggard, Director

Aiding Oklahoma Baptist churches, by introducing Bold Mission Thrust, has been at the heart of the work of the Department of Religious Education this past year—1981-82. The Sunday school launched the "8.5 By '85 Sunday School Enrolment Plan," and the Church Training program laid foundations for "Bold Witness Training." As a result of these efforts, the trend of upward growth is evidenced in the statistical records in this report.

### Department Personnel

We are grateful to report that there have been no changes in the entire department staff this past year.

Field workers include: Robert Audd, director of Church Training; Billy Allen, director of adult education and associational projects; David Fuller, director of youth work and Vacation Bible School; and Darlene Koch, director of Childhood Education."

A fine staff of dedicated secretaries includes: Mrs. Joan Eischen, secretary to Haggard; Mrs. Sybil Cox, secretary to Audd; Mrs. Donas Cook, secretary to Allen; Mrs. Lou Rodriquez, secretary to Fuller; and Mrs. Olive Hays, secretary to Koch.

### Last Year's Records

With another year of growth, Sunday schools reported a total enrolment of 354,784, for a net gain of 4,883 over the previous year. This year marked a decade of growth for Oklahoma Sunday schools with an increase of 44,693 in the last 10 years! Our state goal is 400,000 enrolled by 1985.

Vacation Bible School enrolment reported was 137,209, an increase of 1,024 over the previous year. A total of 2,722 professions of faith was reported, and 26,197 prospects were discovered. Follow-up indicated that 20.1 percent of those visited enrolled in Sunday school, and 402 eventually made professions of faith. It is interesting to note that according to the report, only 5,275 prospects out of the 26,197 discovered, received follow-up visits from the churches!

Church Training enrolment was reported at 89,235, with 22 associations reporting a gain. With an increase of Equipping Centers and MasterLife training, it is difficult to acquire an accurate figure of the total number involved in complete Church Training program. "M" Night reported, from 33 associations, indicates a total attendance of 7,428.

### Report of Projects and Activities

The Sunday school response to Bold Mission Thrust is the "8.5 by '85" Sunday School Enrolment Plan—an effort to reach 8.5 million people enrolled in Sunday school by 1985. This emphasis received its first introduction in Oklahoma with the 8.5 by '85 Associational Workshops in 38 of the 41 associations. A total of 3,573 church workers attended, including 864 pastors and staff members.

Seven associational training schools have been conducted and three more are scheduled before the end of this church year. Approximately 1,150 Sunday school workers have received training in Concord-Kiowa, Enon, Perry, Pottowatomie-Lincoln, Northeastern, Arbuckle, and Muskogee-Seminole-Wichita Associations. Johnston-Marshall, Rogers, and Washington-Osage Associations will have training schools later this year. In addition to these, many associations conducted training schools, using their ASSIST as their faculty.

Related projects also included an "8.5 By '85" Adult Emphasis Training Meeting and an "8.5 by '85" Representatives Training Meeting. The adult emphasis meeting trained 107 workers and the representative training meeting trained over 150 workers from associations across the state. These people have accepted specific responsibilities in the development of the enrolment emphasis in Oklahoma.

Over 200 "Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Teams" (ASSIST) received training in April, 1982, in teaching the new "How To Guide" books in their associations. Eighty-one percent of the associations now have a full basic team.

A State Church Building Conference was conducted in May, 1982, with 62 pastors and committee members attending.

In September, 1981, two Sunday school leadership seminars were conducted at Falls Creek, and one at Tulakogee, reaching over 700 workers and leaders.

The promotion of Church Training was maintained at a high level. Two State Church Training Conventions were conducted Oct. 26-30, 1981, reaching 213 leaders.

Eighty-two pastors and church staff members participated in the Baptist Doctrine Clinic at Clinton and Henryetta, Jan. 9-10, 1982.

On March 9-10, 1982, an Equipping for Growth Workshop was conducted in which 162 church leaders responded.

The Children's State Bible Drill, March 28, attracted 41 participants from five associations, and the Better Speakers Tournament for youth involved eight.

Additional projects were conducted in the area of January Bible Study, library work, family life enrichment, weekday early education and church recreation.

The development of the Falls Creek Assembly program involved the enlistment of almost 500 teachers and leaders. Annual preparation for this youth encampment, which attracts between 32,000 and 35,000 during the five identical weeks, begins in February and extends through August. All of the department staff are involved in this project.

## Cooperative Missions Robert E. Haskins, Director

As Lieutenant Colonel John Glenn was passing over Australia on his first orbit around the earth, he discovered that the citizens of the city of Perth had turned on all of the lights in their homes, industries, office buildings, and streets. They had spread reflectors on the lawns and streets to intensify the luster of their city. To his friend in the Australian tracking station, Glenn exclaimed, "Oh, what a beautiful sight. Tell everyone thank you for turning on the lights!"

Many people in Oklahoma who have trusted Jesus as Savior this year through our state mission work say "Thank you Southern Baptists and Oklahoma Baptists for turning on the lights so we could find Jesus."

### Language Missions

Twenty-eight full-time missionaries and nine part-time missionaries work in language missions with American Indians, Koreans, Chinese, Japanese, Hispanics, Laotians, Cambodians, Vietnamese, Thais, Indonesians, Internationals, and the Deaf. They traveled approximately 560,000 miles in their mission work and reported 1,623 professions of faith, additions by letters and special service commitments.

Two very historic events took place this year in our work with the deaf. The Alpha Baptist Chapel of the Deaf, which began in September, 1981 as a mission of Western Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, called the first full-time deaf pastor ever to serve in our state. He is Jari Saavalainen. The Deaf Mission of First Southern Church, Del City called a part-time music director. He is the only paid music director in the Southern Baptist Conference of the Deaf. He is Norman Collins.

Trinity Church, Okiahoma City, in cooperation with Capital Association, the State Convention and Home Mission Board, called a missionary pastor for the Oklahoma City Laotian Congregation. He is Bouchanh Vongsurith. He is the first and only Laotian pastor in Oklahoma.

Northwest Church, Oklahoma City, began a Cambodian Mission in July. The first Sunday there were 80 Cambodians in attendance. The Cambodian Mission continues to grow.

Three new Spanish Missions and preaching points have been established this year. The Spanish Mission of First Church, Ardmore called its first full-time pastor, Chris Trevino. First Church Duncan's Spanish Mission called its first full-time pastor, Herminio Rios.

The State Spanish Camp at Falls Creek was the largest ever in attendance. There were ten churches represented. Special Sunday School Leadership Training was provided by Tito Fafasuli of the Sunday School Board's Ethnic Department. More than 300 persons were trained in the three area Hispanic WMU Conferences led by Nila Murillo, Lawton and Doris Diaz of Birmingham, Ala.

The State Hispanic Leadership Conference met at First Hispanic Church, Oklahoma City Oct. 15 and 16. The Sunday School Board, SBC and the Religious Education Department, BCGO provided five age group workers to train the entire Sunday school staff of our Hispanic Sunday schools.

Three new Indian churches have been established this year.

The largest Indian Falls Creek Assembly in this decade (and perhaps in history) was held June 21-26. Approximately 1,800 people were registered representing 38 tribes and 100 churches. Leslie Clark, a Choctaw from Dallas, Texas was the camp pastor. Fermin Whittaker of the Home Mission Board's Language Missions Division, served as camp missionary. Training was provided for the pastors in counseling and marriage enrichment.

Two "Schools of the Prophets" were conducted for Indian preachers. Courses on counseling, "How Southern Baptists Work Together," sermon preparation, pastoral ministries, and "Understanding Indian Missions" were offered. Jimmy Anderson, state Indian church growth missionary, planned and coordinated the schools.

A special workshop on the use of the survival kit was conducted in Oklahoma City for pastors and missionaries working with Indians, Hispanics and Internationals.

### Church Extension

At least 28 new churches and missions have been started this year. Twenty-five key pastors and selected associational directors of missions attended a four-day regional workshop at Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth on starting new churches. This workshop was planned by the state mission directors from Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas and New Mexico in cooperation with the Home Mission Board and Southwestern Seminary.

Thirty associational missions committee chairmen were trained at a special Church Growth Workshop. One associational workshop on "Starting New Churches" was conducted.

### Resort Missions

The missions department and East Central Association worked together in a special project on Lake Tenkiller. A couple, Charley and Okie Rempel, were employed for 10 weeks to coordinate youth and adult groups who conducted day camps, mission Vacation Bible Schools, and other witness ministries.

Through the summer mission program, witnessing ministries were provided on at least five other lakes and recreational areas. A special Scripture portion for use in resort areas is being distributed in the various leisure communities in Oklahoma.

### Campers on Mission

A spring rally was held at Keystone Lake in April. The featured speaker was Les Reed, Christian entertainer from Tulsa. A special work project was conducted in June at Midway Church, Choctaw. The fall rally was held in September at Kaw Lake. Several of the campers worked on the Kaw City Mission building in conjunction

with the rally. Arnold Pratt of Woodward served this past year as president.

### Mission Service Corps

Blake and Linda Winn of Oklahoma City went to Haiti in January for a two-year assignment. Their salary support is being underwritten by several individuals and churches in Oklahoma. Mrs. Billie June Brown of Warner is serving in Yuma, Ariz. as nurse and Bible study leader. Alma Lou Webb of Indian Head, Md. is serving at the Women's Shelter in Tulsa. Eileene Justice is serving at Indian Church in Pawhuska.

### US-2

Maxine Locklear, a Lumbe Indian from North Carolina, will be working in Oklahoma for two years. Her assignment is to assist with Indian Mission work in Weatherford, Thomas and Colony.

### Christian Service Corps

Approximately 250 adults from Oklahoma and other states assisted with 12 mission projects in our state. In addition to Oklahoma, these people came from Texas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Kentucky, South Carolina, Arkansas and Missouri. They helped with construction projects, women's programs, mission center outreach programs, mission Vacation Bible Schools, day camping, language mission work, starting new churches, resort ministries, Backyard Bible Clubs, youth work, visitation, surveys, etc. The construction projects in Oklahoma were coordinated by Oliver Barnes of Chattanooga and Leonard Potter of Guymon. Oliver Barnes serves as volunteer construction coordinator for Oklahoma and Kansas. Work crews built the Kay Association Building, Ponca City, Crestview Church building, Oklahoma City, Kaw City Mission building, Kaw City, and Midway Church building, Choctaw. They remodeled the "Old Cherokee WMU Building" at Tahlequah. Literally thousands of mission dollars were saved by the volunteer labor of the construction crews.

### Chaplaincy

The Tenth Annual Conference of Oklahoma Baptist Chaplains met at the Baptist Building Chapel, Oklahoma City Nov. 16. Dale Wright, chaplain at the Baptist Memorial Hospital, Kansas City, Mo., was guest lecturer. A noon luncheon was attended by the Chaplains and their wives. Carl Hart, Home Mission Board, Chaplaincy Department, was the luncheon speaker. Officers were elected and plans were made for the Chaplains Retreat in September, 1983. The 1982 officers of the Chaplains Fellowship are Frank Marks, McAlester, president; Jake Clemmons, Grove, vice-president; Bill Forrester, Pryor, secretary.

#### Black Church Relations

Five missionaries jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention work in the area of Black Church Relations. They are involved in student work, Christian education and WMU. They are responsible for planning and promoting Christian education, evangelism, missions, steward-

ship, church leadership development, Bible study, youth camp and programs specifically planned for individual churches.

Five students preparing for church vocations received Southern Baptist Convention Home Mission Board scholarships while attending college or seminary this year.

The School of Religion in Tulsa, with learning centers across the state, had 624 adults enrolled in at least one course of study for which they earned credit. There were 1,281 enrolled for workshops, institutes and classes during the year.

Two students from Langston University served as student summer missionaries in Oklahoma. Kevin Lee, president of the Langston University Baptist Student Union, was named "Mr. Langston." He was chosen as one of the Oklahoma Baptist college students to go to Spain for six weeks in the summer of 1982. They did personal witnessing while working with the Baptist churches of Spain. The Baptist Student Union annual spring revival in February resulted in 43 professions of faith and 55 rededications. The Langston BSU raised more money for summer missions and world hunger for 1981-82 school year than ever before. They raised \$2,300.

The Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa, had an average daily attendance of 170 for eight weeks of day camp during June, July and August.

Six church leaders from Oklahoma (three National Baptists and three Southern Baptists) and the five missionaries of the Black Church Relations Department attended a National Conference in Louisville, Ky., to explore ways of working together for redemptive reconciliation.

Two meetings were held with the three National Baptist Conventions and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to plan for future cooperative ministries.

Fifty-five women from 14 National Baptist churches representing the three National Baptist Conventions in Oklahoma attended a prayer clinic. Mrs. Pat Reed, jointly employed missionary who serves as executive secretary of the WMU led the clinic.

Donnell Smith was employed during the year as regional director of Christian education for eastern Oklahoma to work specifically with the rural National Baptist churches.

### **Church-Community Ministries**

This is the Oklahoma name for the area of ministries which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries.

Five missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local associations are serving in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are: associational directors of church-community ministries, Ed Onley, Captial Association, and Richard Humble, Tulsa, Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Gray, Oklahoma City, and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa; and Women's Shelter director, Sharyan Lott, Tulsa.

Financial support through the cooperative missions department is given Capital Association to help with the ministry of Grace Rescue

Mission and the Women's Center in Oklahoma City. Also, Oklahoma Baptist University receives some finances to assist a group of students to be involved in community ministries.

A program of rehabilitation has been initiated this year at the Grace Rescue Mission. Its objective is to win the men to faith in Christ and to rehabilitate them from alcohol and drug abuse to become self-sufficient useful community and family citizens. Approximately 24 per month have participated in this program. A bus was purchased to transport residents to church services.

The two women's centers for abused and transient women and their children have provided shelter and food for many people this year. There were 57,434 meals served and 17,428 beds provided for those in need. A new home for the Women's Center in Oklahoma City has been secured. It will give them capacity to house 88 women and children.

The Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa, had 518 attend their Annual Youth Conference. There were two professions of faith and 60 rededications.

Several Spanish speaking migrants have been reached with the gospel by cooperating with language missions in supporting missionaries in the areas where the migrants are living and working.

Literacy missions continues to grow as volunteers in churches across Oklahoma are teaching conversational English to non-English speaking who have moved to Oklahoma. A statewide Literacy Missions Workshop was sponsored last fall and 13 were trained. Another workshop is scheduled for the fall of 1982. Literacy missions has proved to be an excellent way of sharing Christ with those who know him not.

The jointly employed church-community missionaries have reported 334 professions of faith during the year.

#### Student Summer Missions

Twenty-one college students from eight states were assigned by the Home Mission Board to serve in Oklahoma for 10 weeks during the summer. They served in rural, inner city, language, resort, metropolitan and general missions in 11 different areas of the state. They did survey work, worked in Vacation Bible Schools, led back-yard Bible clubs, witnessed in resort areas, served as chaplains in two Boy Scout Camps and served as counselors at youth camps. They came to serve in missions and some made commitments for full-time mission service.

### Refugee Sponsorship

The number of refugees sponsored by the Baptist churches of Oklahoma has declined greatly this year. However, the need for sponsors is still great. Thousands are still in refugee camps and can leave only when they have a sponsor. Most of the refugees coming to our state are not Christians. It becomes an evangelistic opportunity for those willing to sponsor.

### PACT

Project: Assistance for Churches in Transitional Communities (PACT) is a Home Mission Board response to the needs of churches in significantly changing communities. An estimated 56 per cent of all Southern Baptist Convention churches in metropolitan areas are in pretransitional or posttransitional communities. These churches have to rediscover their mission, in the midst of the changing situation, and adapt their structure and programs to relate to the needs of the people within the church and its community or it will face a limited future.

Four people in Oklahoma have been trained to serve as PACT consultants. They, when invited, will contract with a church to do a consultation. This normally will be done over a period of several weeks.

(4) Evangelism-Jerry Don Abernathy

### Evangelism

### Jerry Don Abernathy, Director

Oklahoma Baptists continue to experience God's rich blessings in evangelism. This year has proven to be another good year of soul winning. Indications are that when the reports from the churches are compiled, we will have a record or near record year in baptisms. Doing so we will post the three highest years in baptisms in the history of Oklahoma Baptists.

As pastors continue to maintain the evangelism priority given by the Lord, the proper spiritual tension will be created. Out of that challenge, the churches become creative and bold in sharing Christ.

### Goal Setting

Godly goals are tremendously helpful to creating an aggressive evangelistic church. Through goals, we translate vision into specific, challenging, measurable intentions. They demand action. Proper goals which produce right action bring good results.

- 1. To develop the desired goals, a church should pray, study the Bible and survey its community in light of God's calling. As churches maintain a 10 percent baptism increase or more, we will continue to see record years of soul winning in Oklahoma.
- 2. Evangelism training is essential to equip Christians for an evangelistic life style. Continuing Witness Training is the priority method the evangelism department is currently using. Knowing that no single program meets every need, we encourage that churches also consider TELL Witness Training, Lay Evangelism Schools, and short-term training courses. The 8.5 by 85 enrolment emphasis of the Sunday school will win many to Christ if we equip our people to share the gospel.
- 3. Revival and area crusades continue to be vital means of evangelism harvest. This past year, many churches have experienced large number of conversions and baptisms through revivals. Those who have done so report that they expectantly prepared through prayer,

promotion, and personal witnessing. Each church should schedule and conduct great revivals.

### Youth Evangelism Conference

In 1981, we experienced a good conference at the Lloyd Noble Civic Center in Norman. The two 1982 conferences are scheduled Dec. 28-29 at First Southern Church, Del City; and Dec. 29-30 at Immanuel Church, Tulsa. The program personalities include: Earnest Alexander, Beth Davis, Dan McBride, Jay Strack, John Tresch and others.

### State Evangelism Conference

The 1982 Conference was tremendously blessed by God. The 1983 conference is set for First Southern Church, Del City, Jan. 17-18, 1983. Program personalities include Jimmy Draper, Junior Hill, Angel Martinez, Stephen Olford, Perry Sanders, Bill Stafford, R. O. and Angie Stone, the Stone Brothers and Robert Hamblin.

### Falls Creek

The 1982 assemblies set a record for conversions, with 2,094 recorded professions of faith in Christ. Two of the past three years have been the highest years in conversions to Christ in the history of Falls Creek.

### Spain Evangelism Projects

Twenty-five Baptist students from Oklahoma under the leadership of John Tresch witnessed, sang, and shared Christ at the World Cup Soccer Matches in Spain.

In October, Roy Moody led a group of evangelism leaders to conduct revival and evangelism training for the Spain pastors.

April 10-17, 1983, are the dates when simultaneous revivals will be conducted throughout Spain. Teams must be enlisted to assist these Spain revivals.

### Billy Graham Crusade

October 23-30, 1983, are the dates presently scheduled for an Oklahoma City Area Crusade.

(5) Church Music-Glenn Boyd

## Church Music

The Church Music Department served Oklahoma Baptists in the year 1981-82 through church music training with: Baptist Education Music Association, Jan. 14-15; State Handbell Festival, Feb. 6; Oklahoma Music Conference, Capital Association, Feb. 22-25; Youth Music Leadership Clinic, Feb. 26-27, OBU; Young Musicians Festival, April 25, OBU; State Training Meeting for Associational Officers, Oklahoma City, April 30-May 1; State Methods and Materials Conference, First, Edmond, Aug. 23-24, and First, Broken Arrow, Aug. 26-27; Adult Choir Retreat, Sept. 10-11, Falls Creek; Adult Choir Retreat, Oct. 22-25, Tulakogee; Regional Instrumental Workshop, William Jewell College, Liberty, Mo., Oct. 11-12; Minister of Music and Wives Retreat, Nov. 5-6, Falls Creek.

We also provided promotion and encouragement to the following church music training opportunities: Southern Baptist Church Music Conference, New Orleans, La., June 14-15; Church Music Week at Glorieta, July 17-23; Music Conference, Baylor University, Waco, Texas, Aug. 2-4.

In addition to the regular programing that the Church Music Department does, we act as a supportive department in helping other departments and agencies within our convention. This year we assisted 11 of our departments and agencies in planning and executing their programs and we are happy to have this opportunity.

The Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma had another great year. We had 103 men enrolled in the organization with a total of seven performances and rehearsal choral clinics within the state. I encourage all full-time music directors to be a part of this organization, if possible. If you have questions concerning the Singing Churchmen, please contact our office.

Falls Creek is always a very important part of our work and this year was no exception. We had a tremendous participation among the young people and adults in our Falls Creek choir which reached an enrolment of over 2,000 during the five weeks of the encampment with 42 young people making a life commitment to the music ministry.

The figures released by the Southern Baptist Convention's statistics department shows that Oklahoma Baptist churches have 58,863 people involved in their music ministries. This is an increase over last year of about 2.5 percent. We are thankful for that. We would like to urge all churches to report their church music enrolment on the annual church letter.

Your Church Music Department is made up of Glenn Boyd, director; Paul Magar, associate director; Mary June Tabor, assistant; Judy Trent, secretary. We are happy to be a part of Oklahoma Baptists working together to reach the world for Jesus Christ.

### Historical Commission

### J. M. Gaskin, Director

The Historical Commission is an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. There are nine members. They are elected annually by the convention to three-year staggered terms. Usually there are two meetings of the commission held each year. In 1982, the commission met Feb. 25 and Sept. 9.

Historical Society: There are 230 active members of the Historical Society. It meets annually during the state convention. Membership is open to all persons interested in Baptist history. Dues are \$25 for life and \$2 per person for an annual membership. Institutions may purchase annual memberships at the same rate of dues, or obtain a perpetual membership for \$25.

Baptist Collection: Last winter the space which houses the Oklahoma Baptist Collection at OBU was enlarged. Open house for the expanded facility was held on Feb. 25.

Special Collections: The Oklahoma Baptist Collection continues to grow. Many people have given books, manuscripts, periodicals, pictures, tapes and Annuals (convention and association) to the collection during the past year. The largest collections have come from Auguie Henry, who gave his library; Mrs. M. E. Ramay, who gave her late husband's library; Mrs. Laurence Mantooth (state WMU president in 1960-64), who gave a valuable collection of WMU materials; and the A. D. Lester materials, which consist largely of Mr. Lester's lifetime collection of information on Landmark Baptists in northeastern Oklahoma along with a good quantity of resource materials on Baptist work among the Cherokee Indians.

Books Published: The commission published two books during the past year. The first was a history of Camp Hudgens by James Warren. This manuscript was the winning paper in the Gaskin Baptist History Award at OBU in 1981. The other book is a compilation of Falls Creek poems by Albert McClellan and Sam Scantlan. Its title is The Falls Creek Spirit.

Historical Marker: A historical marker has been erected on the lawn of Stubblefield Chapel at OBU. Dedication ceremonies have been scheduled for 2 p.m. Nov. 18, 1982. The marker details the meaning of Stubblefield Chapel, named for Cortez Stubblefield, which is a symbol of the pioneer leaders and churches in the building of the Baptist denomination and its institutions in Oklahoma.

Historical Tour: The commission will sponsor its fifth Oklahoma Baptist Historical Tour May 12-13, 1983. The tour route will visit historic spots in southwestern Oklahoma.

Microfilm: A recent report from the Southern Baptist Historical Commission reveals only eight Oklahoma churches have put their minutes on microfilm. They are Grandfield, First; Tuttle, First; Hartshorne, First; Oklahoma City, Airline; Idabel, First; Lawton, First; Heavener, First; and Blue, Philadelphia (Choctaw Indian).

Short Courses: The commission sponsored two short courses at OBU this summer. There were 41 enrolees in the Writers Short Course and 33 came for the History-Heritage short course. Continuing Education credit was given by OBU for both courses. Instructor was J. M. Gaskin.

The Historical Commission submits the following recommendations for the convention's approval:

- 1. That we erect one historical marker in 1983.
- 2. That we work with OBU to publish the life story of Warren M. Angell, a manuscript recently completed by Mrs. John Wesley Raley.
- 3. That we reaffirm in perpetuity the action of the Historical Commission on June 5, 1979 (which was subsequently approved by the convention), on the "Ownership of Materials" in the Oklahoma Baptist Collection. The action of the commission on Sept. 9, 1982, was unanimous to submit for reaffirmation the following statement:

The materials in the Oklahoma Baptist Collection have been and are being collected by and for the Historical Commission of the Baptist General Convention. By mutual agreement between the Historical Commission and the university, the Mabee Learning Center is designated the official repository of the materials. This agreement (was) first made in 1955 by T. B. Lackey, executive secretary-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, (and John Wesley Raley, president of Oklahoma Baptist University). (This agreement was reaffirmed by the Historical Commission on June 5, 1979.)

- 4. That each church and association elect a historian and a history committee each year as ongoing parts of their regular rosters of officers and committees.
  - 5. That more churches put their minutes on microfilm.
- 6. That J. M. Gaskin be authorized to write a definitive history of the Baptists in Oklahoma.

The motion carried to approve the report.

## Baptist Student Work Bob Lee, Director

The continued support of student work by the Baptists of Oklahoma has made it possible for us to have another good year on our campuses.

Several changes in directorships took place during the year. David James moved from Miami to Tulsa and Jim Lehew moved from Tishomingo to Lawton. New directors hired were Ron Henderson at Seminole, Alan Campbell at Warner, Bill Zodrow at Miami, Harold Biggs at Claremore, Terry Armstrong at Tonkawa and Tom Greenfield at Tishomingo. John Reimer was hired as an associate of Edmond, Jay Kindsvater at Tahlequah, and Anna Jo Wilson at Oklahoma City. Full-time BSU work was started at Tonkawa and Seminole.

Sixty-two students were sent out as summer missionaries to locations in Oklahoma and 12 states. Six thousand dollars was sent to the Foreign Mission Board MANNA program for World Hunger. Eighteen students were sent to Spain for the summer of '82 as a part of the convention's alignment with the Spanish Baptist Convention. Students in BSUs across Oklahoma raised over \$120,000 for all mission work. Part of this money went to assist BSU work in 17 new convention states.

Students involved in BSU across Oklahoma participated in programs emphasizing Bible study, evangelism, discipleship, worship and missions. Several thousand students attended events such as Glorieta Student Week, Student Skills Training Conference (BSU Convention, State Spring Retreat (Leadership Training Conference), missions conferences at Southwestern and Midwestern Seminaries, International Student Conference, and other worship gatherings.

The financial support of student work through the Cooperative Program, associations, and churches continues to increase. The 1982 CP support will be close to \$900,000. That amount will be increased to over \$1,000,000 in 1983. Money received from associations and churches totals over \$600,000. It is with support of this nature that we will be able to see the continued involvement of thousands of students across Oklahoma in BSU, and hundreds won to the Lord.

Your continued support and prayers are needed and greatly appreciated by all involved in student work across Oklahoma.

## Annuity Services J. T. Roberts, Director

Solid growth and expanding achievements characterize the current state of affairs of the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in Dallas, Texas.

"Despite the unusual challenges of 1981, we are reporting record numbers in assets, benefits paid and member accounts. The decline in the stock market and the uncertainty over the future of the economy make our work difficult. However, it is the desire of the Annuity Board staff as we work harder to strive to contribute something to the churches and agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention," said Darold H. Morgan, president of the Annuity Board.

As of June 30, 1982, the total assets held in trust by the Annuity Board totaled \$939,199,196. This is an increase of \$90,243,432 over June 30, 1981.

Premiums and dues through the first two quarters of this year reached a record \$44,090,415. A year earlier, the total was \$34,581,980.

As of June 30 this year, the Board paid a record \$19,159,248 in benefits to 18,866 annuitants.

### Oklahoma State Convention Report

Oklahoma has: 885 churches and associations; 1,329 employees participating.

Through June a total of 22,536 churches and associations were participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program with 32,598 employees. The number of new retirement applications received in the program in your convention during the first six months was 50. The following Baptist agencies and institutions participate in the retirement program.

Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home

Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Baptist Health Care Corporation

Oklahoma Baptist University

The basic services provided through the office of Annuity Services is to promote the retirement and insurance program through the Annuity Board.

A conference was held in December for the directors of missions at which time a representative of the Annuity Board served as a source person.

Deacon-Pastor Conferences were held in 12 associations during January, February and March, 1982.

## Woman's Missionary Union Frances Grafton, Director

The Woman's Missionary Union will complete its first year as a department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma—October, 1982. This same date also marks the first year of the new director of the department, Mrs. Frances Grafton. Due to these "firsts," many adjustments have been necessary which have occurred with smoothness since everyone concerned has had an attitude of cooperation and a dependence upon God.

All the people in the Baptist Building have really welcomed the new department in their midst. Joe Ingram, Lyle Garlow and others have gone the second mile in fitting Woman's Missionary Union into the convention program. Garlow has been working with us on communication lines in our new situation. Therefore, we were particularly impressed at the interest and concern he exhibited by going to national Woman's Missionary Union in Birmingham, Ala., for a whole day of meetings with the WMU/SBC staff led by Miss Carolyn Weatherford.

The WMU/BGCO staff has come through the year with flying colors. Building on the firm foundation prepared by Miss Abbie Louise Green, we have been able to move forward. Mrs. Eula Mae Stewart, secretary to the director, kept the foundation intact during the interim period. Mrs. Stewart has been extremely helpful with her vast experience and her willingness to share it for the future of a strong WMU program in Oklahoma. Mrs. Carleata Horton and Mrs. Jean Archer have assisted with their skills and Christian spirit. Another plus factor is the department consultants—Mrs. Dorothy Thayer and Miss Lawana Roberts. Their supportive team spirit is invaluable. They have taken on new responsibilities with a willing attitude toward the whole WMU program.

The enthusiasm of the Oklahoma WMU ladies added to the BGCO staff and the Oklahoma WMU staff add up to a tremendous accomplishment through the leadership of our Lord.

The Seventy-sixth Annual Session of Woman's Missionary Union, Department of BGCO, was held Nov. 9-10, 1981, at Eastwood Church, Tulsa. The theme was "Go With Haste." The Monday evening session was combined with the Baptist General Convention for their 75th Anniversary Celebration.

In December, a Christmas gift of \$50 was sent to each Oklahoma Foreign Missionary. A gift of \$250 is given to each Oklahoma missionary at the time they are appointed.

The International Student Conference, Feb. 20, Oklahoma State University, Stillwater was co-sponsored by Baptist Student Union and Woman's Missionary Union.

In cooperation with the WMU National Enlargement Plan, seven STARTEAM members, a home missionary and three WMU staff members were trained to start WMU organizations in Oklahoma

churches without a WMU. Miss Evelyn Blount, National Enlargement Plan Director, WMU/SBC, led this training session Feb. 23-25 at Falls Creek Conference Center. Since that date new WMU organizations have been organized in 77 churches.

The State Acteens Conference, March 12-13 was held at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. There were 1,027 present, representing 126 churches. At this conference, the first Acteen Activator group from Oklahoma was commissioned. The Acteens of First Church, Chattanooga were assigned by the Home Mission Board to serve one week in Houston, Texas. Four Acteens and four sponsors participated.

The State Training Clinic for Associational Officers, April 30-May 1 was held at the First Church, Oklahoma City. There were 137 WMU associational officers present.

A Career Missions Seminar, May 8 at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, was co-sponsored by Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union.

The Volunteers in Missions Workshop, May 15 at Baptist Building, Oklahoma City, was co-sponsored by Cooperative Missions, Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union.

The Mother-Daughter Camp, June 4-5 at Camp Nunny Cha-ha registered 160 from 27 churches.

Seven weeks of Girls in Action/Acteens Camps between June 7 and July 24 were held at Camp Nunny Cha-ha with a total of 831 campers. Decisions included 46 professions of faith, 100 rededications and 14 for special service. A variety of decisions were made by 37 people. There was a mission offering of \$472.27.

During the five weeks of Falls Creek Assemblies, WMU secures 12 missionaries for each week and four teachers for Sooner Alcohol Narcotics Education for each week. WMU also directs the Children's Park for two weeks during the assemblies.

Fifteen area training meetings were held from Sept. 7 through October 8. There were nine conferences attended by 1,404 ladies.

Eight scholarships were granted for women to attend a Southern Baptist seminary.

Woman's Missionary Union secured writers for the program material for the State Mission Season of Prayer and prepared the material for mailing to the churches. The writers were: Joye Wilkinson of First Church, Muskogee—Baptist Women, Baptist Young Women, Baptist Men; Sue Sanderson of First Church, Jenks—Acteens/Pioneer Royal Ambassadors; Freda Cunningham of Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City—Girls in Action/Crusader Royal Ambassadors; and Geri Emery of Meadowood Church, Midwest City—Mission Friends. The 1982 theme is "Before Thee . . . Open Doors." The goal is \$382,000.

### Brotherhood

### Laddie Adams, Director

Brotherhood has shown an increase in enrolment the past two years. Oklahomans led the way with increases both years. The total 1981 Brotherhood enrolment was 17,890. This was an increase of 309 in enrolment and 127 units. For the church year 1981-82 we show total units: Baptist Men, 329; Crusaders, 617; Pioneers, 202; combined chapters, 40; total 1,188 units. The department planned/promoted:

## Christian Life Committee Kent Kellogg, Chairman

The seriousness of the time, in which we live, challenges us as Christians to address ourselves to the burning issues of the day.

Issues such as home and family, alcohol and gambling, separation of Church and State, war and peace, law enforcement and world hunger, are but a few of the pressing problems in our world today.

As responsible Christians, we must become informed and act to alleviate society of these injustices, wrongs and evils.

Your Christian Life Committee challenges you, as pastors, staff workers and laypersons, to address yourselves to these current, pressing issues.

This is a great day for the preaching of the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. As we address ourselves to the issues of the day, we must point people to the Christ, who can forgive sin and change lives. As lives are changed and channeled into the service of the Lord Jesus Christ, our world becomes a better place to live.

### The Family

Your committee applauds the Southern Baptist Convention's plan to emphasize the strengthening of the family in its curriculum materials from 1982 to 1985. We encourage Oklahoma Baptist congregations to participate fully in this emphasis.

Your committee sought to undergird this emphasis by co-sponsoring last summer a seminar "Families in Crisis: How Shall We Minister?" on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University. The seminar was directed by OBU's professor Gary Farley and by Robert Audd from the State convention. Speakers and workshop leaders identified eight areas in which churches should assist families:

- 1. Prepare young people for life-long marriages.
- 2. Help them work through a Christian perspective on such moral issues as pre-marital sex, extra-marital sex, alcohol and drug use, gender roles, birth control and abortion, work ethics, and family relationships.
  - 3. Teach and model good parenting skills.
  - 4. Provide and/or arrange counseling for problemed families.
- 5. Strengthen good marriages through enrichment retreats, recreational opportunities and a variety of other services to families.
- 6. Support the "single again" as he/she works through guilt and grief to meaning.
- 7. Program week-day activities and projects for the aged family member.
- 8. Assist members in facing the reality of death and in working through a Christian position on the attendant moral issues of disposition of person and property, content of the funeral service, suicide, euthanasia, and organ donations.
- 9. Demonstrate Christian love by caring for grieving family members.

We feel that strengthening families is an integral part of the gospel ministry of Baptist churches. We encourage churches to make use of materials in this area of ministry which are available from our Sunday School Board.

### Work Ethic

In Gen. 1:28 man was given the task of subduing the earth. Jesus worked as a carpenter. Paul urged his converts to earn their own living by honest work. Paul went so far as to say, "If a man will not work, he shall not eat" (II Thess. 3:10). The New Testament, in agreement with the fourth commandment, recognizes the need of leisure for rest and worship; "the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath" (Mark 2:27-28). Work is a normal and necessary part of man's existence. Jesus has shared with man in this experience.

We can gather that God planned for man to work both to meet his own needs and to help others. However, God's plan for man's work involved meaningful and purposeful partnership between God and man. Sin has marred God's purpose for man and brought toil and pain to man's work.

As we let the Lord reign in our lives we can come to a sense of calling and purpose in our work. Let us do all things "as unto the Lord." Christians have the responsibility of working toward the good of all and of sharing with those who are genuinely in need and unable to work to meet that need. On the other hand, we should work to rid the system of the dehumanizing and demoralizing aspects of welfare that discourage productive participation in society.

We should strive personally and work in anyway possible to encourage our society to remember the sabbath. Man needs an opportunity for leisure, rest and worship.

### Religious Liberty-Separation of Church and State

Historically, Baptists have held the freedom to worship to be one of their most important doctrines.

The driving force that led the Pilgrims to settle this country was the need for religious liberty.

However, from our country's beginning there were attempts to aid churches by means of legislation and edict. Baptists led then in the struggle to maintain separation of church and state. And throughout the succeeding years Baptists have wisely and scripturally continued to resist all attempts to bridge that gap.

History validates the wisdom of this course. In every country where the state has involved itself in the church, evangelical Christianity has withered and the flame of the "Holy Spirit" has passed from that country.

Many complex questions are in the legislative halls which involve significant and historic Baptist principles. Baptists would do well to look long and hard beneath the surface on these questions to be certain that we "render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's and unto God that which is God's."

The results of ignoring that command have been such historical horrors as the "Inquisition," the "Dark Ages" and repeated persecutions of Christians. But the most heinous crime of all history was also the product of a church/state merger. The Jewish church, powerless to rid itself of Jesus, and the Roman state, which had no desire or cause to punish Jesus, merged in that one cause and crucified Christ.

If we should succumb to the political wooings of an amoral government and the misguided counsel of radicals we will be in danger of seeing the evangelical flame pass from these shores.

Worship must remain free. The church must remain separated from government. The "Good News" of Christ and of him only must be proclaimed from the pulpits of this land.

#### War and Peace

War is always the result of sin, selfish ambition, and/or cruel exploitation. The suffering and anguish of the victims of any conflict stagger the imagination. Nuclear war threatens the very existence of civilization and life as we know it.

That all right thinking men desire peace is evident. Yet, we live in a world that knows little peace. Consequently, we are to seek peace in every way possible without selling out or surrendering to the forces of evil. There can be no real peace apart from justice and respect for the dignity and worth of man. Only as Jesus, the Prince of Peace, comes to reign in the hearts of men will there be lasting peace.

We urge all Christians to "as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men" (Rom. 12:18). Then, we urge all Christians to earnestly pray and work for peace. Pray that God will intervene in the affairs of nations to bring peace. Work to influence those around us that they will live peaceably and desire peace.

Finally, we urge Baptists to commit themselves seriously in Bold Mission Thrust to share Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, with a warweary and lost world.

### Law Enforcement

"Law" is as old as history. There are natural laws established that govern the universe. There are international laws established to govern the nations. There are national laws established to govern each nation. There are state laws established to govern the state. There are civil laws established to govern the citizenry. There are moral laws established to govern individual morality. There are spiritual laws established by God to govern all of history for as long as there is history.

Some laws are fixed and cannot be altered.

Some laws are altered and need to be fixed.

Some laws are enforced.

Some enforcement is law.

Some laws are inadequate and need to be changed.

Some changes are inadequate.

Some laws are enforced by some.

Some enforce the law.

WHEREAS, laws are established to insure the rights and liberty and justice for all, and

WHEREAS, the enforcement of the enacted laws are essential to the protection and guarantee of these rights for all people, and

WHEREAS, God is the divine law giver, and ultimate law enforcer;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we commit ourselves:

- (1) To the biblical principles set forth in the Word of God as law abiding individuals.
- (2) To encourage Christians to become actively engaged at all levels of law and order.
- (3) To encourage all Christians to be actively involved through all legitimate and moral action to change laws of injustice.
- (4) To encourage all Christians to go to the polls and vote the Christian ethic to prohibit the enactment of laws that would foster and encourage the criminal element in our society.

- (5) To insist that all levels of law enforcement from the private citizen to the Justices of our Supreme Court be carried out with all circumspection.
- (6) To pray for those who make and enforce our laws that they keep this sacred trust with all diligence.

#### World Hunger

God's Word tells us that in the beginning of beginnings God gave man the responsibility of "subduing" the earth. In fact he said man was to "cultivate it and keep it."

Only the sleeping are unaware of the food problems confronting our world today. Scarcely a country on the globe has not had to take increased measures to meet the growing demands of a hungry populace. Some countries are in truth not meeting those demands.

As we are subjected to soul-wrenching pictures and statistics of starving children and adults the first reaction is "get them something to eat!" This is natural, and necessary. But there must be more, and the Southern Baptists are doing more.

From West Africa to the Philippines, Haiti to Acra, Southern Baptist Missionaries are developing excellent programs of farming and animal husbandry. At the same time our Foreign Missionaries are distributing food-stuffs where the needs are most severe.

Inform the churches and then lead them into sharing ventures through the World Hunger Fund of our Foreign Mission Board. This money goes entirely for world hunger.

Christians must share, but it must be done through the channels which will bring the most relief to the most people.

#### Alcohol and Gambling

The Bible points out that drunkenness and gambling are sins. They are to be avoided in the Christian life. The Bible shows in spiritual principles that the Christian lifestyle is to be beyond drunkenness and gambling.

The problem of beverage alcohol and gambling continues to grow in intensity with the passing of each day. Because of this, the Christian must take a stand on these issues whenever the opportunity affords itself.

These two evils in our society affects the family in every area of life.

#### Alcohol: A Witness Against Itself

- 1. Alcohol is the number one drug problem of American youth.
- 2. Studies show a clear relationship between alcohol consumption and the rate of crime. Alcohol is involved in 80 percent of all crime.
- 3. One out of every 10 persons who drink will become an alcoholic.
- 4. Alcohol depresses brain function from the first drink and destroys thousands of irreplaceable brain cells with every drink.
  - Alcohol has no food value and takes from family needs.
  - 6. It is a major cause of family break-up in the United States.

- Alcohol causes 60 percent of teenage deaths on the highway and 50 percent of all highway deaths.
- 8. Beer drinking is the number one drug problem among teenagers in Oklahoma.

The open invitation to drunkenness is through the door of social drinking. To prevent this, the Christian position must be that of total abstinence. Not only should the Christian practice total abstinence but use his or her influence in fighting the evils of beverage alcohol.

#### Church Members Are Called Upon To:

- 1. Refrain from the use and sale of intoxicating beverage.
- 2. Speak out on the evils of alcohol.
- 3. Support those businesses which do not sell beverage alcohol.
- 4. Vote in every public election supporting the Christian stand on the evils of alcohol.
- 5. Encourage the officers of the law to enforce all laws pertaining to beverage alcohol—from the local to the state level.
- 6. Write your Senators and Representatives and encourage them to support bills and introduce new legislation that will deal with the evils of alcohol in the state of Oklahoma.
- 7. Be alert to what is taking place in your church, school, and community by those who sell and promote the use of beverage alcohol.
- 8. Discourage the advertising of beverage alcohol through newspapers, magazines, community programs, and other publications.

#### Gambling: A Witness Against Itself

- Gambling has been proven over and over again to be bad for the people.
  - 2. Gambling is not good for a healthy and moral society.
  - 3. Gambling is not acceptable in the Christian lifestyle.
  - 4. Gambling never fits into the will of God.
  - 5. Gambling reduces the character of the person who engages in it.
    - 6. Gambling dries up the compassionate spirit of Jesus in a person.
    - 7. Gambling creates the lust of getting something for nothing.
    - 8. Gambling destroys the family.
    - 9. Gambling tears down law and order.
    - 10. Gambling breeds crime.
    - 11. Gambling is sin however you look at it.

Gambling takes many forms and Christians must be able to recognize these when they see them—from the local to state level. Some of these forms of gambling are: betting on sporting events, selling chances for money raising projects, bingo, lottery, race track gambling, matching quarters, rooster fighting, and betting on any game of chance.

#### Church Members Are Called Upon To:

- 1. Oppose gambling in any form at any level.
- 2. Speak out on the evils of gambling.
- 3. Reemphasize the biblical teachings on gambling.
- 4. Vote in every public election opposing the evil of gambling.

- 5. Support those organizations such as the Anti-Crime Council with your influence and money.
- 6. Teach and preach what the Bible says about the gambling principle.
- 7. Challenge laws in Oklahoma that legalize gambling: such as bingo.
- 8. Encourage law enforcement officers to enforce all laws pertaining to gambling.
- 9. Write and encourage your state senators and representatives to support laws and pass laws that would do away with the gambling menace in Oklahoma.

Because of the above reasons, the Christian of today, in love and compassion for the sinner, and hate for the sin, must take a firm uncompromising stand of total abstinence regarding the evils of beverage alcohol and gambling.

#### The Third Wave

Futureologist Alvin Toffler has recently noted that many smaller towns will experience growth in the 1980's as people leave the cities. He has called this the Third Wave of migration. Census data confirm that this is happening in many Oklahoma communities. After three or four decades of decline many towns and small cities have begun to grow again. People have come by the hundreds to our lakes, oil fields and industries from other states and nations.

The coming of Third Wave people to Oklahoma means that our churches will be confronted by the greatest opportunity for evangelism since before the "Dust Bowl" days. These newcomers need to be reached for the gospel, discipled and involved in the ministries of the churches.

We are conscious of the fact that the churches of the Industrialized North failed for the most part to reach newcomers following World War II (Toffler's Second Wave). This was because (1) they did not provide the kind of worship experience the newcomers were used to, and (2) they demonstrated prejudice toward the Southerner.

God has given to us a great opportunity. Let's not miss it. We must welcome the newcomer. We must accommodate to his/her needs, wishes and expecations. We must build bridges and create bonds of love. We must witness and share the truth. This statement is included in the Christian Life Committee's report because witnessing is an integral part of the Christian life and because we see the gospel as the answer to the social problems which will attend this growth.

The motion carried to approve the report.

- 59. Charles L. Ivey, pastor, First Church, Clinton, addressed the convention on the subject of "Recovery of Fellowship Among the Brethren."
- 60. Joe L. Ingram recognized and introduced new pastors and church staff members, visitors, and Southern Baptist Convention agency representatives.
  - 61. Joe L. Ingram presented the report of the Board of Directors.

## Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

At the close of the annual meeting of the convention each year a motion is passed authorizing the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention. Article VI, Section 1 of the convention's constitution states, "There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which the convention shall function in its cooperative work." Section 5 states, "The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma." Since the 1981 Convention, the board has met four times: Dec. 8, 1981, March 11, May 13, and Sept. 7, 1982.

There are five areas of work into which the convention is organized. President Keith Wiginton, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and two vice-presidents, assigned committees of the board to give direction to each of these areas. Approval was given to the following committee to be responsible for the five areas:

The Executive Committee is made up of the chairmen of the five committees and the executive officers. Convention President Wiginton served as chairman and other members were Robert C. Bayles, Loyd Crawford, Hale A. Dixon, Joe L. Ingram, Joe C. Knowles, Earl Scott and Sam Thomas. The committee meets only upon matters referred to it by the board. It was not necessary for the committee to meet during the year.

#### **Business Management Committee**

The Business Management Committee has the responsibility for the management of the Baptist Building facilities, central services, annuity, accounting, property management and insurance. Sam Thomas served as chairman.

There were no recommendations in the December meeting.

March Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Appreciation Expressed to Contributors—Approval was given to a recommendation that the board express appreciation to churches who made contributions to the road resurfacing at Falls Creek and that other cabin owners and cabin users be encouraged to participate financially in the project.
- 2. Construction of Additional Public Restrooms at Falls Creek at an approximate cost of \$8,000 was authorized.
- 3. Need to Update Heating and Cooling of Baptist Building—It was reported that the heating and cooling system at the Baptist Building is 32 years old and in need of major overhaul. Authority was given for a study to be made of requirements to update the system.
- 4. Housing for Full-time Employee at Falls Creek.—The usage of facilities at Falls Creek Conference Center increases each year. This has made it necessary to have another full-time employee living on the grounds, but housing was not available. Approval was given to construct a house containing 1,344 square feet with three bedrooms, at an approximate cost of \$32,000. The house was completed around July 1.

#### May Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. 1981 Audit—The committee reviewed with Bill Bardwell, Wolf and Company, the 1981 audit for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. A report on the review was given. The board approved the audit and asked that it be printed in the 1981 Annual for distribution to all churches.
- 2. 1982 Auditor—Approval was given for Wolf and Company, Oklahoma City, to serve as the auditor for the Baptist General Convention for 1982.

#### September Recommendation and Approval

**Proposed Construction at Falls Creek**—The Board of Directors voted to look with favor on the construction of three new concession buildings in the central area at Falls Creek Conference Center. They also voted for the old book store building (which in more recent years has served as the pop and ice cream stand) to be remodeled into offices on the first floor and conference rooms on the second floor. Additional storage space will be added to the cafeteria. These projects will be done as funds are available.

#### Child Care Committee

The Child Care Committee has the assignment to give assistance to the operation and/or construction of children's homes in Oklahoma City, Owasso, Madill, Ada and Duncan; Boys Ranch Town near Edmond, foster homes and additional child care facilities. Robert C. Bayles, second vice-president, was chairman of the committee.

#### December Recommendations and Approvals

- 1. Land Gift in Ada—The Sciences and Natural Resources Foundation offered a gift of approximately 100 acres of land near Ada. The desire of that foundation is to have a retirement center and children's home built on the land. A recommendation was approved for approximately \$130,000 to be allocated from funds to be received from the sale of the property at 63rd and North Pennsylvania, Oklahoma City, for the building of a cottage at Ada. This amount, along with funds being provided by the Ada group should be sufficient to build the first cottage. This development is in progress.
- 2. Approval of In-House Transactions for South OKC Children's Home—Through the Tubbs Trust Agreement with the Baptist Foundation, land in South Oklahoma City was given in trust for the benefit of Boys Ranch Town. When the zoning application was made to the Oklahoma City Council, the convention attorney pointed out that the convention per se needed to own the property in order to make a valid application for zoning approval. In order to accomplish this, the Foundation gave the convention a check for \$200,000 from the capital needs funds being held for child care. The convention then gave the Foundation a check for \$200,000 and it was designated as endowment for the use and benefit of Boys Ranch Town. According to the attorney these actions fulfill the terms of the Tubbs Trust Agreement and make it possible to get the property zoned. The board gave approval to the transactions.
- 3. Streets Paved at Owasso Children's Home—Approval was given for streets at the Baptist Children's Home in Owasso to be paved, guttered, curbed and culverts installed at an approximate cost of \$175.000 as funds are available.
- 4. Mother's Day Offering Designated—The board accepted the recommendation for churches in Mullins and Banner Associations to be encouraged to designate the 1982 Mother's Day Offerings to the building of the children's home in the respective areas.
- 5. The 1982 Mother's Day Offering Goal was set at \$424,424.24. March Recommendations and Approval
- 1. Offer accepted for land at Boys Ranch Town—The US Corps of Engineers is building a dam on Arcadia Lake and water will cover about 24 acres of land at Boys Ranch Town. A negotiated offer of \$138,000 was made. The board voted to accept the offer.
- 2. Commissary to be Constructed—Because of the close proximity of Boys Ranch Town to the children's home at 63rd and North Pennsylvania, both institutions used the commissary at the home. The new location of the children's home in South Oklahoma City makes it no longer feasible for the same one to be used by both. Construction in South Oklahoma City includes a commissary there. Authority was given for a commissary to be built at Boys Ranch Town at an estimated cost of \$125,000.
- 3. Land Given for McAlester Group Home—The board accepted the offer of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Ward to give 40 acres of land near McAlester for a children's group home.

4. Expansion of Madill Administration Building—Authority was given for the expansion of the administration building at the Madill Children's Home for an approximate cost of \$75,000.

#### May Recommendations and Approvals

Temporary Housing for Child Care in Moore—There was a span of time between when the children's home at 63rd and North Pennsylvania had to be vacated and the new home was completed that provision had to be made for the children and staff. The board authorized the director of the Department of Child Care and the executive director-treasurer of the convention to negotiate the purchase of temporary housing in the Moore area to accommodate 15-18 children, and granted authority to the convention officers to sign necessary legal papers. Other children were accommodated at Boys Ranch Town, Madill and in foster homes. When the new South Oklahoma City home is completed the houses will be sold and all the children moved to the new site.

There were no recommendations in the September meeting.

#### Retirement Centers and Chaplaincy Committee

This committee is responsible for the operation of retirement centers at Oklahoma City, Owasso and Hugo, and development of one at Ada. It also gives direction to the chaplaincy ministry in hospitals at Enid, Miami, Grove, Pryor, Stroud, Bristow, Cordell, McAlester, Baptist Medical Center in Oklahoma City and in the above mentioned retirement centers. The chairman was Loyd Crawford.

#### December Recommendations and Approvals

1. Baptist Health Care Corporation Board Approved—The bylaws of Baptist Health Care Corporation states that their Board of Directors shall be cooperating participants in a local Baptist church and shall be approved by the convention's Board of Directors. - 3. Development of Retirement Village at Cleveland—The executive director-treasurer and the convention's assistant director of retirement centers were authorized to work with First Church, Cleveland in looking toward the development of a retirement village on property which the church will deed to the convention.

#### September Recommendations and Approvals

1. Growth 2000—Oklahoma Baptists' Strategy for Beginning New Work was approved. It is as follows:

#### The Goal

Two thousand Cooperating Southern Baptist churches in Oklahoma by 2000 A.D. The BGCO proposes to work with and through the 41 associations in Oklahoma in identifying priority and financing the purchase of church sites to meet the needs of the future. This is a part of BMT in Oklahoma.

An alternate annual goal would be one church for each 2,000 population in Oklahoma.

#### The Need

- 1. The projected population growth of 25 percent in Oklahoma during the next two decades presents a challenge to Oklahoma Baptists. Reaching the anticipated 3,629,000 (an increase of 731,000 between 1980 and 2000 A.D.) for Christ means the existing 1,430 cooperating Sounthern Baptist churches will need to redouble their efforts.
- 2. Oklahoma's shifting population will call for new churches. In every area listed below there are churches in transition—some emerging, some declining; others that may need to relocate to survive.
  - a. The growing metropolitan areas.
  - b. The changing suburban communities.
  - c. The transitional rural-urban areas.
  - d. The changing rural scene.
  - e. The changing/growing ethnic scene.
- 3. The existing churches, in addition to strengthening their own outreach, will need to begin new churches to reach the masses. Presently, Southern Baptists in Oklahoma have a church for every 2,116 population. Our best record (during the 60's) was one church for every 1,800 population. The ratio was 1/2,306 in 1940; 1/2,008 in 1950; 1/1,781 in 1960; and 1/1,870 in 1970. At our best rate of 1/1,800 we would need 2,000 churches by 2000 A.D. At our present rate of approximately one church for each 2,000 we would need 1,775 churches. Growth 2,000 anticipates a Bold Mission Thrust goal of 2,000 churches by 2000 A.D. or a minimal goal of 1,775 churches (one church for each 2,000 population).

#### The Strategy

1. To encourage each association through its Associational Missions Committee (or special Survey and New Works Committee), to thoroughly survey the association, identifying population and growth trends, cultural, racial and socio-economic factors, current unchurched areas, and future church and mission needs for the next decade.

- 2. To identify, from the surveys conducted by the associations, priority new church and mission sites that will require financial assistance from the associations and state convention. Many of the sites would be purchased and churches begun that would not require financial help beyond the sponsoring church.
- 3. To provide BGCO matching funds with the associations, up to one-third of the purchase price of the new church sites. This general guideline could be adjusted in special cases. Allocation of funds would be determined by the availability of funds.
- 4. To begin immediately the process of identifying the 100 sites in Phase I and to work with the associations in their providing matching financial resources to purchase these sites.
- 5. To encourage the associations in the early purchase of sites before prices become unreasonable.
- 6. To support the associations in the early purchase of sites by making 3-5 year commitments of matching financial support for approved sites.
- 7. To provide to the associations (if deemed wise) the legal counsel of the BGCO in setting up an Associational Laymen's Corporation for the purpose of buying and holding certain properties for future church sites. (It is possible that each association could handle the purchase of these sites through their elected trustees.)
- 8. To use the **Baptist Messenger** to publish the need of new church sites and new churches.
- 9. To encourage the establishment of a Revolving Fund for new work in the Baptist Foundation.
- 10. To prepare and distribute a map of Oklahoma identifying locations of needed sites and indicating priority concerns for those needed sites.

#### The Finances

Financial resources for Growth 2000 are available. In addition to self-support, finances may come, in part or total, from sponsoring church(es), associations, individuals, foundations, corporations, etc. and the BGCO.

#### Associational Resources

Associations are encouraged to establish a "New Church Site" fund through the associational budget. An additional fund should be established to assist new churches which need support during their first years.

#### Church Resources

Churches are encouraged to support new work through (1) direct financial support, (2) sponsorship of a new work, and (3) providing a credit line to a new work.

#### **BGCO** Resources

Through the Cooperative Program approximately one and onehalf million dollars will be available for new church sites. Matching funds from associations and churches will bring the total available from 1981-1985 to approximately \$5 million. The challenge section of the Cooperative Program includes the following amounts:

These funds will be made available annually through three funds: Ten percent for the New Site and Small Church Emergency Fund Ten percent for Non-Impacted Areas

Eighty percent for Metropolitan (Impacted) Areas

#### The Plan

- 1. The association, through its mission committee and director of missions, would take the initiative. They would:
  - 1) Make a survey of the association.
  - 2) Determine locations of the needed sites.
  - Request BGCO funds through the Associational Missions Committee.
  - 4) Negotiate for the site(s).
  - 5) Hold title to the site(s).
  - Transact all legal work relative to securing a clear title to each site.
  - 7) Transfer clear title to sponsoring church at appropriate time.
  - 8) Take initiative in seeing that an appropriate reversionary type clause or gift lien clause is included in the title and the BGCO Letter of Commitment is completed and filed by the sponsoring church.
  - 9) Return to the appropriate BGCO fund, the BGCO matching funds, plus any accured value, should the site be determined unsuitable and sold. In case of such a sale the money may be applied to another approved new site with the association.
- 2. The association would submit its request for BGCO funds through the Planning and Promotion Office.
  - 3. The request from the association would include:
  - (1) Map of the general area locating proposed site and existing churches in the area.
  - (2) Population and land development study for the area.
  - (3) Current appraisal of the site.
  - (4) Estimated cost of the site with proposal for financing the purchase.
- 4. The request would be approved on the basis of data, proposed purchase date and availability of funds.
- 5. The request would be for an amount to be matched by a like amount from the associational budget. BGCO matching funds would be allocated on the basis of availability of funds. Any donations of land, money or negotiable paper would first be deducted from the

cost of the site and the balance would be the amount used for determining matching funds.

- 6. The matching funds would be based on the value of the site only. Buildings, etc. would be excluded.
- 7. The commitment of BGCO funds would generally be spread over a predetermined period of years as approved in the initial request (maximum of 3-5 years).
- 2. Pastors Encouraged to Attend Falls Creek—Due to the fact that churches whose pastors attend Falls Creek with their campers have less discipline problems and realize greater spiritual benefits, the board voted to encourage all pastors to attend Falls Creek with their young people.

#### Miscellaneous

Children's Financial Aid From State No Longer Accepted—The board unanimously voted to commend the executive director for the action he took to no longer accept financial aid from the State of Oklahoma. It was explained that for many years the Department of Child Care received some funds from the State of Oklahoma for several of the children committed to our care. At the time the decision was made to accept the funds, it was the opinion that it was help for the child and did not benefit the institution. Ingram states: "I have never felt good about this and want to be able to say that Oklahoma Baptist churches and individuals completely fund the convention's Child Care program. It is my feeling that this is in keeping with separation of church and state."

#### Administrative Committee

The Administrative Committee is responsible for work related to personnel, budget, ministerial services, **Baptist Mesenger** and Baptist Student work. The chairman was Joe C. Knowles.

#### December Recommendations and Approvals

1. Amendment to Purchase Contract Approved—A joint recommendation from the Administrative and Child Care Committees presented the First Amendment for the Purchase and Sale of Property at 63rd and North Pennsylvania in Oklahoma City. It was approved and authority was given to the convention officers to sign necessary documents. There was an explanation that when the original contract for the purchase of the property was approved, a small portion of land was excluded. This is the land surrounding the oil well located on the southeast corner. The amendment provides for the inclusion of surface rights for this portion of land. The convention will retain the mineral rights. The document is as follows:

#### First Amendment to Agreement for the Purchase and Sale of Real Estate

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT, made and entered into by and between JOHN H. KENNEDY JR., JOHN KILPATRICK and MICHAEL S. SAMIS, all individuals, jointly and severally, hereinafter collectively referred to as "Buyer," and the BAPTIST GENERAL

CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA, an Oklahoma non-profit, religious corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Seller;"

#### **Premises**

Prior to the date hereof and on Aug. 19, 1981, Buyer and Seller executed that certain Agreement for the Purchase and Sale of Real Estate (the "Agreement"), covering certain real property located in the Oklahoma City, Oklahoma commonly known as the Baptist Children's Home (the "property"); and

The Agreement recited that the Buyer agreed to purchase and the Seller agreed to sell the Baptist Children's Home, which was more specifically described by the insertion in the Agreement of the legal description of the property (the "legal description"), and

The legal description contained an exception of a tract 280 feet by 410 feet in the Southeast (SE) corner of the property (the "excepted tract"), which exception was included because Buyer was of the understanding that Seller did not hold title to the surface of such excepted tract; and

Buyer has become aware after examination of the Title Commitment and Survey on the property as called for by the Agreement and as supplied by Seller, that Seller in fact does hold title to the surface of the excepted tract; and

It was and is the intent of Buyer to purchase all of the surface of the Baptist Children's Home owned by Seller; and

Buyer and Seller desire to amend the Agreement so that the surface of the excepted tract is no longer to be an exclusion from the real property covered by the Agreement, and to correctly state and reaffirm the intentions of both parties.

IN CONSIDERATION of the premises and other good and valuable consideration the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Buyer and Seller agree that the Agreement should be and is amended by deleting from the indented legal description on the first (1st) page of the Agreement the following language:

"less a tract in the Southeast (SE) corner of said quarter section more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the Southeast (SE) corner of said quarter section, thence north 280 feet, thence west 410 feet, thence south 280 feet, thence east 410 feet to the point or place of beginning of such excepted tract,"

The legal description contained in the Agreement shall now cover all of the following:

"The surface only of the Northwest Quarter (NW/4) of the Northwest Quarter (NW/4) of Section Eight (8), Township Twelve (12) North, Range Three (3) West of the I.M., containing forty (40) acres,"

Except as amended by this First Amendment, the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect according to all its terms, covenants and conditions, and Buyer and Seller hereby restate and affirm all of the provisions of the Agreement.

2. Short-Term Fund Amendment to Convention Annuity Plan Approved—Approval was given to the Short-Term Fund Amendment to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan. The Amendment is as follows:

## The Short-Term Fund Amendment to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan

The Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma (hereinafter referred to as the "Employer") hereby amends the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan effective Jan. 1, 1982 in the following manner:

- (1) By adding the following new Subsection 2.1(bb):
- "2.1(bb) 'Short-Term Fund' shall mean an investment fund maintained by the board which is invested in short-term instruments maturing in 12 months or less including, but not limited to, securities issued or guaranteed by the U.S. Government or its agencies or instrumentalities, negotiable certificates of deposit issued by domestic banks, bankers acceptances, bank time deposits, high grade commercial paper and repurchase agreements covering U.S. government obligations or certificates of deposit.
- (2) By substituting for the present Subsection 4.5 the following new Subsection 4.5:
- "(a) The Employer shall have the right to elect to have future Employer contributions invested in the Fixed, Balanced, Variable or Short-Term Fund. The most recent election shall be effective until changed. If there is no election, the Employer's contributions shall be invested in the Fixed Fund. The Employer may permit the Member to make these investment choices by so indicating in the Supplement.
- (b) The Member shall have the right to elect to have future Member contributions, including Tax Sheltered Contributions, invested in the Fixed, Balanced, Variable or Short-Term Fund. The most recent election shall be effective until changed. If there is no election, the Member's contributions shall be invested in the Fixed Fund.
- (c) The Employer may elect once, at any time during each calendar year, to have accumulations in Employer Contributions Accounts and/or in the Employer's Liability Reserve Account which are invested in the Variable Fund transferred to and invested in the Fixed, Balanced or Short-Term Fund. The Employer may elect once, at any time during each calendar month, to have accumulations in Employer Contributions Accounts and/or in the Employer's Liability Reserve Account which are invested in the Short-Term Fund transferred to and invested in the Fixed, Balanced or Variable Fund. The Employer may permit the Member to make these choices related to amounts credited to the Member's Employer Contributions Account by so indicating in the Supplement.
- (d) The Member may elect once, at any time during each calendar year, to have accumulations in the Member's Tax Paid Contributions Account or Tax Sheltered Contributions Account which are in the Variable Fund transferred to and invested in the Fixed, Balanced

or Short-Term Fund. The Member may elect once, at any time during each calendar month, to have accumulations in the Member's tax Paid Contributions Account or Tax Sheltered Contributions Account which are in the Short-Term Fund transferred to and invested in the Fixed, Balanced or Variable Fund."

- (3) By substitution for the present 10.1(c) the following 10.1(c):
- "(c) To invest sums from time to time received from the Employer or the Member with respect to the Plan in the Fixed Fund, the Balanced Fund, the Variable Fund, the Short-Term Fund or such other funds as may be established by the Board, in accordance with instructions received from the Employer or Member, as applicable regarding the choice of Fund."
- 3. Short-Term Amendment to Church Annuity Plan Approved— The recommendation regarding the Short-Term Fund Amendment to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan was approved. It is as follows:

## The Short-Term Fund Amendment to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan

The Undersigned State Convention hereby amends the Southern Baptist Protection Program Church Annuity Plan, effective January 1, 1982, in the following manner:

- (1) By adding the following new Subsection 2.1(gg):
- "2.1(gg) 'Short-Term Fund' shall mean an investment fund maintained by the Board which is invested in short-term instruments maturing in 12 months or less including, but not limited to, securities issued or guaranteed by the U.S. government or its agencies or instrumentalities, negotiable certificates of deposit issued by domestic banks, bankers acceptances, bank time deposits, high grade commercial paper and repurchase agreements covering U. S. government obligations or certificates of deposit.
- (2) By substituting for the present Subsection 4.4(a) the following new Subsection 4.4(a):
- "(a) For Accumulation Benefit Members, the Participant Church contribution shall be allocated to the Fixed, Balanced, Short-Term or Variable Fund of the accumulation benefit in accordance with the investment election under 7.7(a)."
- (3) By substituting for the present Subsection 7.7 the following new Subsection 7.7:
- "(a) Unless otherwise designated by the Participant Church, the Member shall have the right to elect in writing to have Participant Church contributions allocable to the accumulation benefit under Section 5 invested in the Fixed, Balanced, Short-Term or Variable Fund. The most recent election shall be effective until changed. If there is no election, such contributions shall be invested in the Fixed Fund.
- (b) The Member shall have the right to elect in writing to have Member contributions, including Tax Sheltered Contributions, invested in the Fixed, Balanced, Short-Term or Variable Fund. The most

recent election shall be effective until changed. If there is no election, the Member's contributions shall be invested in the Fixed Fund.

- (c) The Member may elect in writing once, at any time during each calendar year, to have accumulations in the Member's contributions accounts which are invested in the Variable Fund transferred to and invested in the Fixed, Balanced, and/or Short-Term Fund. The Member may elect in writing once, at any time during each calendar month, to have accumulations in the Member's contributions accounts which are invested in the Short-Term Fund transferred to and invested in the Fixed, Balanced and/or Variable Fund."
- (4) By substituting for the present Subsection 11.1(c) the following new Subsection 11.1(c):
- "(c) To invest sums from time to time received from the Participant Church, the Convention and the Member with respect to the Plan in the Fixed Fund, the Balanced Fund, the Variable Fund, the Short-Term or such other funds as may be established by the Board, in accordance with instructions received regarding the choice of Fund."
- 4. Allocation of CP Funds Beyond Budget—It was projected that \$900,000 would be received beyond the allocated 1981 Cooperative Program budget. According to the budget, Southern Baptist causes were to receive 44 percent of all Cooperative Program receipts. Authority was given for the following distribution of funds received beyond the 1981 budget:

A further recommendation was approved that if funds are received beyond the allocated \$900,000 that 45 percent will go to Southern Baptist Convention and the remainder will be placed in the Special Projects Funds for distribution by the Board of Directors from time to time. Actually \$1,014,123.32 in additional CP funds were received and distributed as voted by the Board of Directors.

#### MARCH RECOMMENDATIONS AND APPROVALS

1. Equipment for Messenger Press—In order for the Baptist Messenger to be operated as efficiently and effectively as possible in communicating with Oklahoma Baptists new equipment was needed. The board gave approval to the purchase of the following equipment as funds are available:

- 2. Assistance for Nevada Convention—Approval was given to assist the Nevada Convention for three years by helping to provide a director of evangelism at \$20,000 a year. In 1982 the funds will be taken from the Special Projects Fund and \$20,000 is to be included in the Cooperative Program budget for 1983 and 1984.
- 3. Funds Designated for Spain Partnership—In 1981 the Board of Directors voted to enter into a partnership agreement with the Foreign Mission Board and the Spanish Baptist Mission. Witness training sessions were conducted in October 1982. In November 1982 about 20 evangelism rallies are scheduled. In the Spring of 1983 approximately 400 Oklahoma Baptists will be assisting in revivals in about 100 churches, missions and preaching stations. The board designated \$85,000 toward the budget for these projects from the Special Projects Account.
- 4. The Tulsa Baptist Laymen's Corporation was authorized to borrow \$4,500,000 to pay for additional improvements to the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso. The credit of the convention was pledged to pay for the indebtedness created by the Laymen's Corporation.
- 5. Additional Improvements for Oklahoma City Retirement Center Approved. A resolution was approved which authorized the Oklahoma City Baptist Laymen's Corporation to borrow \$4,500,000 to pay for additional improvements to the Oklahoma City Retirement Center. The resolution pledged the credit of the convention to pay for the indebtedness created by the Laymen's Corporation.
- 6. Board Members Elected for Unexpired Terms—The following people were approved to complete the unexpired terms of persons who have resigned from the Board of Directors:
- Mrs. Edward Leader is pastor's wife at Montezuma Church. She will complete the term of her husband who had to resign due to ill health.

John Capps, director of missions in Southwest Association, replaced Ron Ledbetter who moved to another association.

Robert Hammons, pastor of First Church, Seminole, will serve out the term of Sam Burnett, vacated when he moved to another association.

There were no recommendations in the May meeting.

#### SEPTEMBER RECOMMENDATION AND APPROVAL

Life Estate Interest Granted—In November 1946, Carolyn Forsythe, by quit claim deed by her mother was granted a life estate in

eighty acres of land in Alfalfa County. Upon Mrs. Forsythe's death the property is to become the possession of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. July 1982, Carolyn Forsythe and her husband, Paul V. Forsythe, established a trust with the Baptist Foundation in which they placed all of their property, both real and personal. Upon the death of the survivor of the Forsythes, the entire estate will be transferred to the Baptist Foundation for the use and benefit of Baptist causes. In order to secure the consent of Forsythe to leave their total estate of approximately \$1,000,000 in trust with the Foundation, he requested that the convention agree to give him a life estate in the 80 acres in the eventuality that he survives Mrs. Forsythe. The only possible interest that the convention could lose in such an agreement would be the possession of the 80 acres for the years Forsythe might outlive his wife. The board approved the following document:

#### Agreement to Recognize Life Estate Interest

Comes now Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a not for profit, religious corporation ("Convention"), and for and in consideration of the sum of Ten and No/10 Dollars and for other good and valuable consideration receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, said convention hereby agrees as follows:

1. Remainder Interest in Property. Said convention acknowledges that it is the owner of a remainder interest in the following described estate:

West half of Southeast Quarter of Section 11 Township 23 North, Range 10 West of the Indian Meridian, Alfalfa County, Oklahoma, ("Real Estate")

by reason of a certain Quit Claim Deed dated Feb. 10, 1947, executed by Carrie G. Freeman, a widow, as grantor, wherein a life estate in said real estate is granted to Carolyn Forsythe, with remainder to the convention.

2. Recognition of Life Estate in Paul V. Forsythe. Said convention hereby agrees to recognize and acknowledge that Paul V. Forsythe, husband of Carolyn Forsythe, shall hold a life estate in said Real Estate, in the event that he survives Carolyn Forsythe. Said convention will take no action to establish or possess its interest in said Real Estate so long as either Carolyn Forsythe or Paul V. Forsythe is living.

Land Offer at Lake Eufaula Accepted—A vote by mail was taken in October in which the board accepted the offer of Dr. Curtis Harris to deed to the convention a parcel of land on Lake Eufaula. The recommendation continued further that plans be made for the development of the property for rest and recreation, mainly for pastors, church staff members, and their families; and that the convention president appoint an advisory committee of 15 pastors to work with the Business Management Committee of the Board of Directors to bring recommendations to the board regarding the orderly development of the property. It was understood that the recommendation did not authorize the expenditure of any funds.

#### Cooperative Program Recommendations

- 1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1983 be \$15,250,000 to be distributed across the board 54 percent State and 46 percent Southern Baptist Convention; that the total objective be divided as follows: Basic Budget, \$13,575,950 and the Challenge Section, \$1,674,050; that all items in the Basic Budget have priority over items in the Challenge Section; and that all receipts over the \$15,250,000 be distributed 54 percent State and 46 percent Southern Baptist Convention.
- 2. That the executive director-treasurer be instructed to keep Cooperative Program expenditures in line with Cooperative Program income and that he be authorized to adjust department and agency budgets up or down by not more than five percent in order to carry out this objective.
- 3. That the 1983 Cooperative Program income be distributed as outlined:

### Report of Nominating Committee

Article IV-Section 1 of the Convention's Bylaws empowers the president to appoint a 15-member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice; an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations.

According to the constitution and bylaws relative to the Board of Directors, instructions are that due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation; there shall be at least one nominee for each associational area; additional nominees shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident church members in a given associational area; no association shall have more than eight members on the board, there shall be at least eight laymen and eight women, and any board member shall be considered resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected. #### 65. Miscellaneous Business:

The motion presented by John Wheeler on Monday was presented for discussion at this time. It is as follows:

"As all of us are aware, an overwhelming victory was recently gained by the advocates of pari-mutuel gambling in Oklahoma. We are all deeply indebted to our executive director, Joe Ingram, for his valiant leadership in opposition to the pari-mutuel question and for his Christian concern for the moral climate of Oklahoma. Had each of us here worked as hard as he did, the pari-mutuel issue would have been defeated.

"The reality, however, is that we lost and now are faced with a county by county referendum on the issue. Those of us on the front line in the counties will need all the organizational and strategy help we can get in order to successfully oppose this influence for evil in our communities. In addition, we shall need to maintain an evaluation of state government on this and other moral issues. Because of the extensive dimensions of such an assignment, I believe Oklahoma Baptists need a department within our convention specifically designed and staffed for such a task.

"Therefore, for the sake of more effectively preserving moral values, strengthening family life, and promoting a consciousness of Christian principles for everyday living—I move that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma establish a Department of Christian Moral Concerns charged with such responsibilities."

A motion carried to refer the Wheeler motion to the Board of Directors for further study and that a report of the findings be made to the 1983 convention.

#### Child Care

#### Lowell D. Milburn, Director

"What is the greatest commandment of all?" asked the scribe. In essence Jesus answered, "Thou shalt love God and thou shalt love thy fellow man." Child Care is rooted in Christian love. Alan Keith-Lucas in his book "This Difficult Business of Helping" reminds us that there are two reasons for wanting to help people; one, pity and two, love. Those who would help only out of pity will generally only help those who seem to be below their own level or somewhat inferior to their own feelings about themselves. Those who will help out of love do so on the basis of need and without regard to another's economical or social standing in the community.

The question is, do we have the kind of love that will survive the test of caring for children hurt by divorce, those who are emotionally disturbed, those with learning difficulties, those needing supervision, or with behavioral problems. Child Care celebrates its finest year of service to children.

Year of Continued Services—The total number of children served was 678. There were 117 unwed mothers counseled and served, 126 children cared for in foster homes and 21 adoptions. The staff also answered approximately 2,000 inquiries about adoption. There were nine young people attending college.

Year of Staff Stability—Our records show fewer staff turnovers during the year. The past few years have been marked by larger percentage of salary increases for houseparents and by more training for them. This along with the enlistment of some quality people are some reasons for more stability. Many of our staff members feel a deep sense of missionary dedication to the task.

The staff numbers 91-full-time and 18 part-time and occasional workers, including supply houseparents for our four homes.

Year of Dramatic Happenings—The Oklahoma City Children's Home property (forty acres at 63rd and Penn) was sold for \$12 million. Up to \$3.5 million will be used to rebuild the Home. The remainder of the money will be put into endowment funds held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and 80 percent of the interest earned will be used for operations. The remaining 20 percent interest will be added to the corpus.

Construction was begun on a group home for children at Duncan and one at Ada. Other group homes will be erected at Clinton, Woodward and McAlester.

Year of Outstanding Support—Child Care received \$450,000 from the Cooperative Program; endowment provided \$525,017; spon-

sorship brought in \$73,164; birthday and anniversary gifts totaled \$118,788; memorials provided \$51,924. Mother's Day Offering received \$422,555. Gratitude is extended to all who remembered Child Care in their wills.

Year of Overflowing Gratitude—Thank you Oklahoma Baptists for your prayers, gifts and concern and to the Lord for his blessings. Please pray for those who serve in Child Care.

The motion carried to approve the report.

## Ministerial Services Clyde Cain, Director

Effective Jan. 1, 1982 the office of Annuity and Ministerial Services was divided. The office of Ministerial Services is housed in the executive offices.

#### Statement of Purpose

The office of Ministerial Services is a ministry of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Its purpose is to assist churches and ministers by providing information and counsel upon request, and to project continuing education services to assist the pastor and staff person in developing more effective ministries.

While safeguarding the autonomy of the local church and the freedom of the minister, the office seeks to provide information that enables both church and minister to find and do the will of God.

#### Areas of Ministry

#### SERVICES TO CHURCHES

#### 1. Providing Information to Churches

The office will provide information for the work of a pastorselection committee and personnel committee on request.

This will generally include search committee responsibilities, biographical information, staff salary schedules, etc.

#### 2. Counsel with Pulpit and Personnel Committees as Requested

On request, we will counsel with pulpit pastor search or personnel committees. It is clearly understood that each local committee will do their own evaluation of the suitability of persons as they seek the Lord's leadership in directing them to the right person.

These names will be given WITHOUT ENDORSEMENT OR RECOMMENDATION from the office of Ministerial Services.

Additional names will be offered as requested until the position is filled.

In cooperation with the office of Planning and Promotion, information regarding church staff job descriptions, staff salary schedules, etc. is also available to Oklahoma Baptist churches.

#### 3. Biographical Information on Prospective Staff Members

The office of Ministerial Services maintains a permanent file of biographical information on many Oklahoma pastors and other staff persons and will provide this information to authorized church committees upon request. If information on a person is not on file, the office will seek to obtain it without involving the church requesting it. If that information cannot be obtained the church will be contacted by our office. Some resumes from out of state are also on file.

### 4. Assistance is Given in Securing a Pulpit Supply and/or Interim Pastor on Request

When a church is without a pastor this office will work with that church in finding a pulpit supply or interim pastor.

If a pastor needs to be out of his pulpit, this office will assist in locating a pulpit supply.

#### SERVICES TO PASTOR/STAFF PERSONNEL

#### 1. Permanent File of Biographical Data

Any pastor, minister of education, minister of music, minister of youth or other church staff person, or one seeking such a position may file his biographical information with the office of Ministerial Services.

#### 2. Biographical Information Shared with Churches

Biographical data provided by church staff persons will be made available upon request to authorized pastor-selection or personnel committees. It will be shared as factual information only, without evaluation or recommendation.

#### 3. Permanent Biographical Data Forms Available

A special biographical data form is available from the office of Ministerial Services. It is in the interest of every pastor and church staff person to see that their original form is carefully prepared and then periodically updated to assure that the information is kept current.

#### COUNSEL WITH MINISTERS

- 1. The director is available as personal counselor and referral resource for pastors and other staff members in matters relating to career assessment, vocational adjustment and relocation.
- 2. To assist in providing counseling services for pastors and church staff members and their families upon request.

- 3. Provide a referral service of professional counselors to pastors upon request.
- 4. To work cooperatively with the office of Planning and Promotion in seminars and conferences relating to the counseling ministry. CONTINUING EDUCATION

#### 1. Coordination of Continuing Education Ministries

The Seminary Extension ministry is a service of both classroom and correspondence course work. The office of Ministerial Services will be working through the association in assisting in the establishment of, continuation of, or enlargement of Seminary Extension ministries.

#### 2. Plan and Promote the State Bible Conference

The annual State Bible Conference is conducted at Falls Creek Conference Center in early May. Being conducted in a retreat setting, it is designed to provide intensive Bible study, inspiration and fellowship.

### 3. Plan and Promote Conferences Related to Helpful Learning Experiences

The "Pastors Continuing Training" will be conducted at Oklahoma Baptist University in cooperation with the office of Ministerial Services and the School of Christian Services of OBU. This conference of intensive learning experiences will be conducted in late June beginning in 1983 and will provide intensive training in given subject areas that will vary each year.

### 4. Southwestern Seminary Training on Oklahoma Baptist University Campus

The director of the office of Ministerial Services serves as the state coordinator in consultation with the executive director-treasurer for the Southwestern Satellite Seminary in Oklahoma at OBU. Nat Bettis and David Fite coordinate the program at OBU and from Southwestern Seminary.

### Maintain contact with Oklahoma students attending Southern Baptist Seminaries.

Each year the director of Ministerial Services and the executive director-treasurer, BGCO make trips to selected seminary campuses for the purpose of interviewing students who are completing their seminary training and have an interest in locating in Oklahoma. In addition, we also host a banquet for Oklahoma students.

- —During 1982, the biographical resume form has been revised and each pastor and/or staff member in Oklahoma has had an opportunity to complete a revised form, bringing his biographical data to a current status for our files.
- —The "Office of Ministerial Services" brochure stating the purpose of this office has been written, printed and mailed to each church.
- —A new brochure entitled "On Calling a Pastor" has been written and printed and is available to each pastorless church. This brochure is designed especially to be of help to pulpit/search committees.
  - -The State Bible Conference was attended by approximately

340 pastors, directors of missions, church staff members and laymen. The 1983 State Bible Conference will be held May 2-5. Program personalities include Joe L. Ingram, Harper Shannon, Virtus Gideon, and James Smith.

#### Baptist Messenger Richard T. McCartney, Editor

The **Baptist Messenger** celebrated its 70th anniversary this year. Volume I, No. 1 was published May 15, 1912 to coincide with the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Oklahoma City.

The first issue printed a letter from W. D. Moorer that seemed to express the sentiments of many Oklahoma Baptist leaders. "There is no greater need in Oklahoma today than one Baptist newspaper that will furnish a means of communication for all the Baptists of Oklahoma."

The pledge of the first editor, C. P. Stealey, set the course for the newly founded **Baptist Messenger** and remains our pledge today. "This paper will earnestly support the organized work of the state and shall ever seek to be a helpful factor in solving the problems that are before us. We sincerely desire to be used for the glory of Christ and his cause in this state of abounding opportunity."

When the Messenger was purchased from Mr. Stealey in 1919, the circulation was approximately 5,000. It increased to 8,500 by the end of the first year of convention ownership. Steady growth has marked the history of the Messenger. The first issue in September, 1982 was mailed to 109,627 subscribers. Last year the Sept. 3 issue went to 102,591.

One important factor in the circulation increases of recent years has been the growing number of churches and associations using the Messenger to publish their local news. A total of 122 special pages for 74 churches and four associations were published as a part of the Sept. 2, 1982 issue. Significant savings in clerical time, printing costs and postage make it economical for churches to publish special editions of the Baptist Messenger.

The number of churches subscribing to the Baptist Messenger for their members under the church budget plan has grown to 1,161. Only 189 churches in Oklahoma do not have the Messenger in their budgets. Subscription prices have been held at \$3.50 per member per year through the allocation of more Cooperative Program funds to help pay the higher cost of postage. Postage for the Messenger more than doubled at the beginning of 1982.

A free flow of information is essential in every democratic organization. The **Baptist Messenger** is committed to the task of keeping Oklahoma Baptists informed about events affecting their interest. Every church that is concerned about keeping its members fully informed should send the **Messenger** to every member family.

In addition to the editor, the staff of the Messenger includes two associates, Bob Mathews and Fern Hurt; a newswriter, Dana Williamson and a secretary/receptionist, Bettie Moore.

# Report of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

C. Fred Williams, President

The Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as amended on Dec. 20, 1974 and approved by the convention's board of directors on May 27, 1975, states that the primary purpose of the Foundation is to "receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, any money or other property absolutely or in trust to be used, either principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of the gospel of Jesus Christ as represented by the agencies, institutions and departments of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and of the Southern Baptist Convention."

The board of directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma presents this report to the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma with an awareness of the sacred parent-child relationship under which we serve. As the only incorporated trust agency of the convention, the Foundation bears a double responsibility both to the convention and to our agencies, institutions and departments.

The report for the year concluded July 31, 1982 shows a total of \$31,132,382.66 endowment and capital needs assets. Total receipts for the period were \$5,711,653.61 and total earnings from investments were \$3,436,615.54. This is the largest income ever earned by the Foundation in one year and reflects an 11.6 percent earnings on average assets held for the period including the non-income producing assets such as life estates.

The business and professional people who comprise the Foundation's board of directors, all active members of Oklahoma Baptist churches, provide general guidelines for management of assets. The Foundation's administrative staff is responsible for the daily application of the guidelines. Current board members are: Paul Box, chairman; M. L. Marrs, Bill W. Presnell and Donald L. Sullivan, vice chairmen; Walt Allen; James M. Barham; Bill G. Cantrell; Howard J. Doak; Joe F. Gary; George W. Hall; Cecil R. Ivey; Eugene M. Knight; John R. Redwine II; H. Forrest Tennant; Robert M. Wadlow and Barney Ward.

We happily welcome Kenneth Shaw and Duane Riley to our staff this year.

For administrative purposes and distribution of staff responsibilities, the programs of the Foundation are divided into six sections over which the president provides general supervision and direction: Computer Accounting and Special Investment Services, Church Building Loan Services, Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services; Charitable Giving and Estate Planning Services; Personal Trustee Services and Communication and Estate Stewardship Services.

### Computer Accounting and Special Investment Services Computer Accounting Services

The last year has been very enlightening. In connection with almost 700 trusts administered by the Foundation, over 53,000 transactions were processed reflecting changes in assets and recording income to over 3,000 separate accounts. Numerous modifications were made to existing computer programs and several programs were added including a mailing list "on line" making it possible to prepare lists as needed.

Three investment pools provide a diversified portfolio and require close contact with the board's General Investment and Equity Investment committees.

The Equity Investment Pool is composed of common stocks of blue chip companies. The Fixed Income Pool is composed primarily of corporate bonds which provide a steady and guaranteed income. The Short Term Investment Pool (STIP) although newly established has far-reaching possibilities for short-term investment of liquid assets.

#### Student Loans and Scholarships

Since 1947 the Foundation has handled student loan and scholarship trusts. These trusts, established through bequests in wills and by outright gifts, are primarily for the benefit of students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. The requirements of each trust were determined by the donor.

The Foundation currently holds over \$800,000 in scholarship funds and over \$425,000 in loan funds. The loans carry a nominal interest payable while the student is in college. Repayment of the principal begins upon graduation or when the student leaves school.

#### Church Building Loan Services

Since the Church Building Loan Trust Fund was established in 1954, 687 loans have been made to Oklahoma Baptist churches, associations and Baptist student unions totaling in excess of \$30 million.

This service is administered through the Church Building Loan Trust Committee which is composed of members of the Foundation's board of directors. Information regarding eligibility for a loan, interest rate and payment, application process and the general guidelines for obtaining a loan are stated in the Policies and Regulations brochure, copies of which are available upon request.

The board of directors has given authorization for up to 50 percent of the total assets managed by the Foundation to be invested in the Church Building Loan Trust Fund. As of July 31, 1982, \$14,714,300.71 was invested in the fund, or 47 percent of the assets held by the Foundation. This total represents 219 loans currently in force.

During the past 12 months, as of July 31, 1982, 41 loans were closed totaling \$3,802,947.88. In addition, 17 loan commitments have been approved by the committee totaling \$3,209,500. These loans will be closed upon the completion of the building construction projects.

Throughout the years more than \$9 million in interest has been distributed to Baptist causes as a result of the establishment and work of this fund. The Church Building Loan Trust Fund has been, and will continue to be, an able supplement to the work of the Cooperative Program and to the accomplishment of the Great Commission.

### Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services Property Management Services

Management of real property held by the Foundation is supervised by a committee of seven members of the board and two non-board members who are professionals in the field. The committee meets each month or upon special call. Decisions to sell, lease, rent and repair are determined by the committee after conferring with the vice president for property management and mineral leasing services.

Real property held by the Foundation consists of houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and open grassland. The Foundation operates no businesses or farms but leases them to others for operation. Grassland and farms are leased on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential property is rented by the month for cash.

During the past year 40 pieces of real property were sold including 30 units in the Havis and Evelyn Watson unitrust. The committee makes the final decision on every transaction. Occasionally during probate it is necessary to sell real property. This is usually done by public auction wherein the right to refuse any or all bids is retained. Five public auctions were conducted this past year—two in Oklahoma City, one each in Meeker, Ponca City and Cushing.

#### Mineral Leasing Services

Foundation mineral interest business transactions are supervised by a committee of eight board members and two non-board members who are professionals in the oil leasing business. The committee meets each month to review lease offers, bonuses, rental delays and sales.

The Foundation holds deeds to mineral interests in 58 counties in Oklahoma and in 10 other states. The units vary in size from .25 acre to 320 acres.

During the past year the Foundation has received 28 units of mineral interest from the estate of Judge W. H. Brown as endowment for OBU and 82 units from the estate of Myrtle Freeman Meek as endowment for the Baptist Children's Home in Oklahoma City. Agnes and Minnie Callaway of Duncan deeded 83.33 acres of minerals along with 166 acres of surface to the Foundation. The surface is designated for a children's home in Duncan.

During the past 12 months receipts from mineral interests were: mineral income, \$451,227.33; lease rental and shut-in, \$3,790.84; bonuses, \$599,652.63; for a total of \$1,054.670.80.

#### Charitable Giving and Estate Planning Services

These services of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma are designed to assist Baptist people in fulfilling their stewardship obligations and desires. Primary instruments for accomplishing effective Christian estate stewardship are last wills and testaments, testamentary trusts and living trusts such as annuity trusts, unitrusts and gift annuity contracts. Such documents may be prepared with several goals in mind, one of which should be making a gift to a Baptist cause.

A member of the Foundation staff will respond to a phone call or written request and will provide the estate planning assistance necessary to secure one's objectives. The request for assistance may be directed to the office in the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City or to one of the branch offices in Tulsa, Lawton or Shawnee.

If requested to do so, the Foundation will serve as personal representative (executor) or trustee, without fee, for those who make gifts to Baptist causes.

During this reporting period the Foundation staff assisted 1,337 individuals in securing information for the preparation of their wills, ten gift annuity contracts were signed and 42 trusts established in which Baptist causes were remembered, and 19 wills were probated with Baptist causes included as beneficiaries.

An attractive placard is supplied to churches indicating the number of members who have used the services of the Foundation in estate planning. The number is updated quarterly. There are now 928 churches in which one or more families have secured the assistance of the Foundation in accomplishing their estate stewardship desires.

#### Personal Trustee Services

Many individuals have established trusts with The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma through which the Foundation manages all their assets. Upon the death of the trustors the residue of the trust assets (or a part of it) is held for the benefit of Baptist agencies and institutions. Incident to the managing and investing of such funds it becomes necessary for the Foundation to provide "personal caring services" to the trustors. Age, disease and dependency make it necessary to render personal services, especially when family or friends are not available to help.

Serving as administrative assistant in personal trustee services is H. Truman Maxey. He provides transportation to health service centers and for other personal needs. Among those who receive this "caring service" is a lady who celebrated her 100th birthday this year. Another is a double amputee. A few are bedfast. Many are limited to wheelchairs. Some live in nursing homes or retirement centers. A few are still able to live in their home. The personal trustee service provides a sense of security to the trustors—their finances are in good hands and there is someone on whom they can call.

### Communication and Estate Stewardship Services

Never have the reasons and opportunities for good communication been greater than during this past year. Changes in state and federal estate tax laws, Foundation staff responsibilities, and the introduction of new persons to the work of the Foundation emphasize the importance of accurate information effectively presented. The Foundation's 35th anniversary also provided an excellent opportunity to "tell again our story."

## Communication is people

There are 15 persons on the staff of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, all of whom are involved in communication in one way or another. The men on the Foundation staff are ordained min-

isters and are busy each Sunday in pulpit supply. Last year they preached in more than 250 churches. As they go to "preach the gospel" they also share the purposes and work of the Foundation.

In addition to pulpit supply, Foundation staff members led 64 estate planning seminars in churches and other settings. They also preached revivals, participated in world mission conferences, spoke at associational meetings, state and Southern Baptist Convention conferences and taught adult Bible classes during the five weeks of Falls Creek.

A partner with the Foundation staff members in communication is the associational Baptist Foundation representative. Each association elects someone to serve as liason person between the association and the Foundation and to communicate the concept of estate stewardship to the pastors and churches of their area. The representative further participates in associational calendar planning to promote special Foundation emphases and to schedule meetings where the work of the Foundation may be presented.

Each spring, the newly elected associational Baptist Foundation representatives meet in Oklahoma City for a two-day training session. Methods and materials for communication are reviewed and practical suggestions are offered. This year persons representing 18 associations attended the conference.

### Communication is programs

There are two months in each year when the focus of the churches and the denomination is on estate stewardship. January is observed as "Make Your Will Month." September is designated as "Baptist Foundation Month."

These special emphases are promoted through the cover page and articles in the **Baptist Messenger**. Other periodicals and papers also encourage Baptist people to estate stewardship. **Care 'N Share** and the associational papers are supplied with promotional materials by our office.

Bulletin inserts are sent to the churches to be distributed to their people on a Sunday during these particular months. Each year our office receives hundreds of requests for estate planning assistance from persons across the state who read the inserts and return the request coupons to us. Last year more than 260,000 inserts were packaged and mailed to the 1,430 churches in January and September.

Future Thrust is an educational program conducted by Foundation staff members in the churches of at least two associations each year. Information about the work of the Foundation is shared with the congregations, estate stewardship literature is distributed and the Foundation staff member may lead an estate planning seminar and preach.

In September 1981, 35 churches in Northeastern Association participated in this special emphasis. During January 1982, Foundation staff members were guests of 25 key churches across the state.

The January program resulted in the largest number of estate planning requests for a single month in history—more than 300.

Because the Foundation works with hundreds of attorneys each year in the preparation of legal documents and the probate of estates, communication with attorneys is very important. In recent years, the Foundation has conducted attorneys' dinner meetings across the state. It has proven to be a very effective means for presenting the work of the Foundation and for establishing a working relationship with those of the legal profession.

During the past year, attorneys' dinner meetings were conducted in Ardmore, Chickasha, Alva, Woodward and Guymon. A presentation was also made to the Kay County Legal Secretaries Association meeting in Tonkawa.

Perhaps the most effective forum of communication conducted by the Foundation is the pastor's program. A small group of pastors from across the state are invited to be the guests of the Foundation each month (except February and August). Foundation staff members share with the pastors information about their particular area of responsibility, pastors have opportunity for open discussion, and then sit in as observers of the Foundation's board of directors meeting as committees.

More than 70 pastors have participated in the pastor's program during the past year. This means of communication has resulted in better understandings, the disspelling of rumors and invitations from the pastors to Foundation staff members to speak in their churches and to assist them with their own estate planning needs.

#### Communication is special projects

November 6, 1946, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was born by action of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. On this same date 35 years later, more than 200 persons gathered in Geiger Center on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University at Shawnee to celebrate the Foundation's anniversary. In attendance were former and present Foundation board and staff members and their spouses, denominational and church leaders and other guests. A delicious meal was followed by a program of recognitions and special presentations. A drama performed by OBU students depicted the history and purposes of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. C. Fred Williams, Foundation president delivered a formal address to highlight the evening.

On Nov. 10, 1981 at the evening session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma meeting in Tulsa, the Foundation made its annual report. However it was no ordinary report. A drama "The Good Provider" written by Brack Marquete, chairman of the Department of Speech and Theatre at OBU was presented by selected OBU students. The 20-minute presentation to the 1,500 persons at Eastwood Church, Tulsa had been months in preparation and was the "icing on the cake" to the 35th anniversary year of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

The drama has been video taped and has been used in several training sessions since. It is available to churches and cable television stations for showing.

"Being of Sound Mind" is a four-part television program series on estate planning which has been jointly produced by the First Continental Bank and Trust Company of Del City, First Church, Moore and The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The format of the program series is a panel discussion punctuated by short dramatic vignettes to illustrate the discussion topics. One of the panel members was C. Fred Williams, Foundation president.

These four 30-minute programs were taped in May. They have since been edited and put in final form. Some 122 cable television stations have been offered the program series for their local programing schedule. The response has been excellent and the program series will be shown during the fall and winter months on stations across Oklahoma.

"Being of Sound Mind" is also being offered to churches for church training seminars, senior adult groups and other settings. Communication is process

The distribution of literature continues to be an important method of communication. As staff members speak in the churches, attend the annual associational meetings, conduct seminars and participate in Future Thrust programs they also distribute literature.

Literature on various options in estate planning and about the services of the Foundation are included in attorneys and pastors packets. Hardly does a day pass that there does not come a request to our office for additional information.

The Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 made revisions in much of the literature being distributed a necessity. Information in the brochure "Estate Planning . . . A Christian Perspective" was brought into conformity with the provisions in the new law and was reprinted. Also, "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," a brochure especially for attorneys was revised. Other literature pieces were also reviewed and are scheduled for revised printings when present supplies are exhausted.

During the past three years, attorneys' packets provided by the Foundation containing specimen copies of wills, trusts, charitable remainder annuity trusts and unitrusts, etc. have been distributed to more than 500 attorneys in Oklahoma. Because of changes in the estate tax laws as of January 1982, it became necessary to revise many of the materials in the attorneys' packet.

WHEREAS, we believe that gambling spawns crime, breaks up families, develops into a vicious habit that is detrimental to the financial, mental, and spiritual conditions of individuals, and communities, and

WHERSAS, we believe that gambling is in direct contradiction to the biblical teachings concerning personal morality and individual financial responsibility,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the messengers of this Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, in spite of the recently approved pari-mutuel gambling issue, reaffirm our historic opposition to gambling, and

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the messengers of this Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma challenge individual Christians, local churches, and denominational leadership to combat parimutuel gambling on the local county option level.

### (4) BOLD MISSION THRUST

WHERSAS, Bold Mission Thrust can be attributed only to the working of the Holy Spirit; and

WHERSAS, the idea of sharing the gospel with every person on earth by the year 2000 has challenged Oklahoma Baptist churches; and

WHERSAS, it appears that many Bold Mission Thrust goals shall be realized; and

WHERSAS, we anticipate a record number of first time appointments to foreign missions this year with approximately 820 unmet critical needs;

BE IT RESOLVED, that all local churches re-evaluate their budgets, their giving to missions, and their goals in the light of the needs of both home and foreign missions, and

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that all Oklahoma Southern Baptists renew their commitment to the accomplishment of these goals through a continued spirit of cooperation in giving, education, evangelism, and missions.

### (5) PARTNERSHIP IN EVANGELISM

WHEREAS, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has entered into a partnership in evangelism with Spain through 1985;

BE IT RESOLVED that the student team led by Dr. John Tresch be commended for their efforts during the World Cup Soccer Games of 1982;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that churches be urged to send their pastor as a part of this evangelistic team;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the churches be urged to support this effort with prayer:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the churches be urged to utilize and support pastors from Spain in Oklahoma revival efforts during the fall of 1983.

#### (6) A COMMITTEE ON HUNGER

WHEREAS, hunger and malnutrition are a fact of daily life for millions of people in this world; and

WHEREAS, concern for and identification with the poor and the hungry was a major part of the teachings and actions of Jesus; and

WHEREAS, the agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention have recognized the seriousness of world hunger by establishing a World Hunger Day on the denominational calendar, and by establishing channels of hunger relief through our Foreign Mission Board and Home Mission Board and our state convention; and

WHEREAS, this convention has for several years approved reports of the Christian Life Committee calling for greater awareness of the tragedy of world hunger; and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists must intensify their response to the world's hungry masses;

BE IT RESOLVED that we, the messengers of the 1982 meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, urge our president to appoint a committee on hunger to cause Oklahoma Baptists to become more informed about the conditions, reasons and possible solutions to hunger in Oklahoma, the United States and the world.

- 91. Charles Hopkins led in singing "Come Thou Fount."
- 92. Webster Carroll, Southern Baptist missionary to Uganda, addressed the convention on the subject "Evangelism Every Day." He based his message on Acts 5:42.
- 93. Hale A. Dixon made the following motion which was approved: "That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma be authorized to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention; and that the president and recording secretary of the convention be authorized to sign legal papers of the convention which require signatures."
- 94. Joe L. Ingram presented certificates of appreciation to the second vice-president, Robert C. Bayles; the first vice-president, C. F. Keim; and to the president, Keith Wiginton, for their service as officers of the convention during 1981-82.

95. Keith Wiginton presented the new officers of the convention for 1982-83:

William H. Cook, president, to whom he presented the gavel;

Hayes Wicker, first vice-president; and Lee V. Sneed Jr., second vice-president.

96. The motion to adjourn the 77th convention carried and Hayes Wicker led in the closing prayer.

### SALARY INFORMATION

Since the auditor's report does not give salaries of all elected employees, we are printing the salaries and benefits of department directors and associate department directors. Salaries of secretaries and other convention employees are in line with those doing similar work in the Oklahoma City area.

Salary and Fringe Benefits Explanation

Every employee receives a basic salary plus fringe benefits. The base salary may be divided as follows:

Cash

House Allowance (if ordained) Various Annuity Board Plans

Fringe benefits include comprehensive medical insurance, longterm disability insurance, life insurance, accident insurance, dependent life insurance and retirement (10 percent of base salary). For unordained persons, the convention pays employer's part of Social Security.

Here are two samples from 1980 salary schedules. Annual base pay for department directors is \$23,171.76 and for associates \$21,306.24.

Employees who travel are reimbursed for their expenses when on convention business. The budgets carry a line item for the cost of leasing and insuring cars. There is an additional line item for other travel expenses which includes gas, oil, lodging, etc.

The salary proposals include a 10 percent cost of living increase, plus an additional amount for longevity. The Longevity Pay Schedule is explained following:

### LONGEVITY PAY SCHEDULE

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved a longevity pay schedule for employees on May 15, 1978. A separate line in the budget indicates the longevity pay in order to clearly identify the base salary level which is the same for all employees with similar responsibilities.

### Rationale Considered by Board of Directors

- 1. Presently, all employees are employed at the same salary for similar jobs.
- 2. Recognition for previous experience and skills is presently taken into account by beginning the employee at the same salary as his or her predecessor.
- 3. Short-term employees cost the BGCO repeated hours of training, moving expenses, etc.
- 4. A person becomes more valuable as he or she continues serving the BGCO.
- 5. There are a minimum number of positions in the BGCO and a person of ability, etc. often is limited in opportunities to move up in the organization to a higher salaried job. Longevity pay would help compensate at this point.
- 6. Recognition for continuous years of service could be accomplished through a longevity pay schedule that:
  - 1) Acknowledges the completion of 3 years with a \$200 base longevity compensation.
  - Increases each succeding year with .2 percent of the salary, added to the base.
- 7. This suggested plan gives advantage to lower salaried persons by using the \$200 base for all persons.
- 8. The plan also gives credibility to longevity pay for higher salaried persons by using a percent of base salary for the annual increase.

We have examined the fund balance sheet of THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA, including only the funds herein named, as of December 31, 1982 and the related statements of support and revenue, expenditures and changes in fund balances and changes in financial position for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The title "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of The State of Oklahoma" represents only one segment of the operations of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and does not include other operations of the Convention as explained in Note 1 to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at December 31, 1982, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year after giving retroactive effect to the change, with which we concur, in the method of accounting for property and equipment and for depreciation expense as described in Note 6 to the financial statements.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The supplementary financial information on pages 21 through 22 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic Financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

#### 1. Summary of Significant Account Policies

Nature of Operations-Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the voltous contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma Lev. As first Articles of incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of trenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetually.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include only operations designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Assets, liabilities, fund balances and results of operations of the following owned organizations, operated and reported as separate organizations, are not included.

1. Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma

2. Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Basis of Accounting-The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Inventories—Inventories of office and printing supplies and items held for resale at Camp Hudgens and Nunny Cha Ha are stated at the lower of cost or market.

Inventories of livestock, poultry, and feed at the boys' ranch and farm are stated at a nominal value. These items have either been grown or have been contributed and therefore, have no cost value.

Property and Equipment—During 1982, the Convention inventoried property and equipment and capitalized items with a cost or fair market value at date of donation of \$500 or more. Depreciation was recorded on the straight-line method from dates of acquisition or donation. The lives generally used are:

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. It is recognized as income received. The donor may designate its use by the Baptist General Convention.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. Only those funds held by the Foundation for "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" are included in this report. These funds include designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense
On September 3, 1963, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1982, the unamortized balance amounted to \$9,973.

4. Notes Payable
The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000, due in monthly installments of \$1,000, including interest at 5½%. The note was created for expansion of The Baptist Bookstore, Oklahoma City. The balance at December 31, 1982 is \$47,118.

Voyager Inn, Inc.—The Mayfair House, a motel, was located on land owned by Baptist General Convention. The Convention purchased the motel on November 29, 1971. The purchase involved the assumption of a note with Quail Creek Bank at 4½% interest with monthly payments of \$2,600. The balance of the note at December 31, 1982 was \$1,916.

The motel was subsequently removed and an apartment complex known as Warwick West III was constructed thereon.

In addition, Baptist General Convention leased land on which Warwick West I

In addition, Baptist General Convention leased land on which Warwick West 1 and II apartment complex was constructed.

By contract dated January 13, 1981, the Convention sold all land occupied by the Warwick West apartments for \$2,000,000. The proceeds from the sale are to be received in five annual installments beginning in 1986, plus interest at 10%.

Tulsa Industrial Authority—On December 13, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance the expansion of the Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center facility. The Authority issued its "Promissory Note, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Project" in the amount of \$4,500,000. The promissory note is secured by land upon which the expansion is erected (included in Note 9), the facility expansion, related equipment and rentals from tenants. The project completion date is March 31, 1984.

At December 31, 1982, notes payable were \$644,703, representing expenditures for and security interest in capitalized land improvements of \$284,642 and construction in progress of \$360,061.

Loan repayments of \$56,250 plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per

progress of \$360,061.

Lean repayments of \$56,250 plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due quarterly starting May 15, 1983 through August 15, 1992. The final payment of \$2,362,500 plus the applicable interest rate is due November 15, 1992.

The Marshall County Development Authority—On December 28, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Marshall County Development Authority to finance construction of the Madill Baptist Retirement Center facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Madill Retirement Center Project, Series 1982" in the amount of \$1,200,000, secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment. The project completion date is October 1, 1983.

At December 31, 1982, notes payable were \$196,165, representing expenditures for and security interest in construction in progress of \$196,165.

Loan repayments of a scheduled amount plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due semi-annually starting June 15, 1984 through December 15, 1997.

5. Commitments and Contingencies

During 1982, the Convention entered into several contracts for the construction of certain childrens homes costing \$3,818,091. At December 31, 1982, construction in progress was \$2,396,109 and the remaining liability of \$1,421,982 will be recognized as construction is completed.

During 1982, the convention entered into several contracts for the construction of certain facilities at Falls Creek Assembly costing approximately \$200,000. At December 31, 1982, construction in progress was \$33,897 and the remaining liability of \$166,103 will be recognized as construction is completed.

6. Prior Period Adjustment

7. Notes Receivable

The Convention has a note receivable secured by 800 acres located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, resulting from a sale of dairy farm. The present note is dated July 2, 1982, and is due January 1, 1983 in the amount of \$380,000, bearing 13% interest. 8. Sale of Baptist Children's Home

During 1981, the Convention contracted to sell the Baptist Children's Home located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The sale was completed September 6, 1982. The total sales price was \$12,103,721, which resulted in a gain of \$11,324,834.

9. Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center—Capital Lease Obligation
On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenues Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The duplex units were completed during 1981 at a total cost of \$322,923.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy both bond obligations. The original and supplemental leases are scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008 and April 1, 2001, respectively.

The Convention has the right to purchase both the project and duplex units at any time on or after February 1, 1988, at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the Bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

We have examined the combined balance sheet, modified cash basis, of the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (a nonprofit organization) as of December 31, 1982 and the related combined statements of receipts, expenditures, reductions and ownership, modified cash basis, and changes in cash balance for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1 to the financial statements, the Foundation's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, except for the Operating Fund; consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Generally accepted acounting principles for nonprofit organizations require that annuities can be recorded by reflecting as a liability the present value of the actuarially determined future payments, and as income (or deferred income) the excess of the amount of the annuity gift over the liability. The Foundation has not attempted, at this time, to compute any liability in connections with annuities, or to determine the accounting treatment to be accorded such annuities based upon their individual provisions. It has not been practicable for us to determine the adjustments, if any, that might be required to the financial statements to reflect the liability to annuitants and the accounting treatment to be accorded such contracts, or the materiality of these matters.

In our opinion, except for the Trust and Endowment Fund, for which no provisions have been made for depreciation of rental property (included in investments—other), and for the liability for future payments to annuitants as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly the combined balance sheet, modified cash basis, of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at December 31, 1982 and the results of its transactions and the changes in cash balance for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.

1. Significant Accounting Policies-

The following is a summary of certain significant accounting policies followed in the preparation of these financial statements:

Basis of accounting—The Foundation prepares its financial statements on a basis of cash receipts and disbursements, except for the Operating Fund which is maintained on the accrual method. The Trust and Endowment Fund provides no depreciation on rental property which is included in investments—other on the balance sheet. This fund also provides depletion on its mineral interest included in investments—other based on 25 percent of revenue. Undistributed gains of the Group Investment Fund are recognized as earnings of the Trust and Endowment Fund when received, and as disbursements of the Group Investment Fund when transferred.

Monies invested in the Group Investment Fund by the Trust and Endowment Fund and Operating Fund are recorded as investments of the investor fund. These investments are also reported on the fund balance sheets of the Group Investment Fund.

Investments—All investments are valued at appraised or market value at time of gift, or cost, if purchased. This basis is not adjusted to recognize market value fluctuations occurring subsequent to date of receipt. For convenience in managing the funds entrusted to them, the Foundation trustees have established four group investment funds (1) funds loaned to churches as described in Note 3, (2) funds invested in common stock of publicly held corporations, (3) funds invested in bonds and preferred stock of publicly held corporations, and (4) funds invested in Government securities.

The income, except for gains and losses on disposition of securities, is distributed to the trusts of the Trust and Endowment Fund monthly. This income is reported on a cash basis.

Annuitles—The Foundation has engaged to prevented to prevented

to the trusts of the Trust and Endowment Fund monthly. This income is reported on a cash basis.

Annuities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions. The Foundation has agreed to pay such donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified income of these trusts is disbursed to specified individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death, the trusts are to be admistered for the benefit of Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at an amount equal to the book value of their assets. No attempt has been made to compute any liability in connection with these funds for future payments to beneficiaries. Annuitants participating in these contracts were paid \$102,336 for 1982.

Depreciation—Property owned by the Operating Fund is depreciated on the straightline method at rates that will write off the cost of the office furniture, equipment and computer software over their estimated useful lives. No provision has been made for depreciation of rental properties in the Trust and Endowment Fund.

Depletion—Depletion of mineral properties is recognized in certain trusts as a percentage of income received from production of oil and gas. This procedure is followed to permit the Foundation to exclude from distribution a portion of the income received from mineral interests. Twenty-five percent (25%) is used to compute the depletion.

Oil and gas properties are in various producing stages, and information is not currently available with respect to proved reserves or proved developed reserves. Earnings from oil and gas production totaled \$578,790 for the year ended December 31, 1982.

2. Organization-

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was granted a charter by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock. It was created as a private, nonprofit, religious association.

3. Church Building Loans Receivable-

The Foundation makes loans to Baptist churches to construct church buildings. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the church buildings and individual personal endorsements. The lives of these loans vary from 10 to 15 years. The Foundation attempts to set interest rates at the current rate available from commercial

4. The Old Baptist Building-

On October 30, 1955 property known as "The Old Baptist Building" at 223 Park Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, with a cost of \$61,554 (included in investments—other), was leased to Felix Investment Company for a period of 99 years. The annual rentals are \$10,808, which is included in rental properties receipts of \$168,505.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis—The financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation as explained later in this note. The statements of current fund revenues and expenditures are statements of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. They do not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as expenditures in the case of additions and normal replacement of buildings, equipment, library books and debt service.

The library is valued at cost for books, periodicals, and microform acquired during the past 10 years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than 10 years. Library acquisitions totaled approximately \$60,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist of book store supplies for resale and maintenance supplies. These are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting into funds in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund group.

Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in a

institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds, restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments which were purchased by the University are generally stated at cost and investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

During the year ended July 31, 1982, the University prepared a plant ledger listing all property, plant and equipment owned by the University. The plant ledger was based on a physical inventory of University property. The general ledger balance of net investment in plant was adjusted to the balance of the plant ledger as of July 11982. 31, 1982.

In prior years, in order to estimate the amount of obsolescence and disposals, the University eliminated equipment acquired over 20 years ago. The amount of write off in 1981 was \$40,145. The University will no longer need to follow this practice since it is now maintaining a plant ledger.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuition, fees, and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated causes are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and other contributions are recognized as income when received.

As a result of organized requests for gifts, the following pledges, by fund, have been received and are uncollected. These pledges are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements. July 31,

3. Pledged Income

The specific income of Kerr Dormitory, Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, and to the extent necessary, the income from W.M.U. Memorial Dormitory, are conditionally pledged to bond sinking funds for the retirement of first mortgage bonds described in Note 7.

4. Loan Fund

The Oklahoma Baptist University has received capital contributions from the federal government to the Nursing Student Loan Program which total \$236,474 from the inception of the program to July 31, 1982, (\$236,474 at July 31, 1981). An additional \$95,647 was advanced to the University by the government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans with \$72,272 having been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds, and from matching funds (1/9 of federal capital contributions) furnished by the school. Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the respective programs may have portions of principal and interest forgiven.

5. Investments held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma Funds held and administered by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the benefit of The Oklahoma Baptist University are in the following amounts, by fund:

6. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The Prichard Trust had a corpus of \$4,952,574 at July 31, 1982.

The American National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after payment of beneficiary and trustee expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$750,760 at July 31, 1982.

(A) The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, consists of 234% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$15,000 on November 1, 1976 to \$23,000 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$878,387.

Under the terms of the bond indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee. Oklahoma as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of the bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

B. The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing bonds, Series 1957, consists of 236% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$17,000 on October 1, 1976 to \$33,000 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$2,765,248.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, certain income of the University is pledged for the retirement of these bonds, and the University is required to maintain a sinking fund with the trustee.

8. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority—1979 Capitalized Lease Obligation
The Oklahoma Baptist University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with
Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct
a Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Activities Complex; to remodel the
Brotherhood Dormitory, WMU Memorial Dormitory, and Clark Craig Field House; to
finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. Oklahoma Baptist University
Authority obtained the funds for the improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds
titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979." The bonds are payable
from the rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities.
The lease agreement is classified as a capital lease, the assets (\$4,869,247) and the
lease liability (\$5,896,272) are recorded in the accompanying financial statements.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Center operates a nursing home for the elderly in Hugo, Oklahoma, and reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide", published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provision of that Guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds—Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property and equipment are added to the unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for board-designated purposes are not considered to be restricted.

Basis of Accounting—The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period service is provided.

Inventories—Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property and Equipment—Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation. Funds equal to a portion of depreciation expense have been set aside to ultimately be used to replace property and equipment as necessary. The balance of such funds at December 31, 1982 was \$19,315 (December 31, 1981, \$11,327). In addition, \$50,091 has been set aside for renovations. 2. Notes Payable

3. Agreements with Hugo Golden Age Home Authority
In 1970, the Center underwent a large expansion which was financed through the
Hugo Golden Age Home Authority, a public trust. The Authority issued tax exempt
bonds in the amount of \$320,000, of which \$125,000 was used for retire indebtedness
to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the remaining \$195,000
was used for improvements to the facility, bond issue costs, and other related expenses.
At that time, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased
the facilities to the Authority for a period that would coincide with the bond life of
approximately sixteen years. The Authority- then executed an operating and maintenance agreement with the Convention, which provides for the Convention to operate
the Center on behalf of the Authority. The form of this agreement provides for the
Authority to pay to the Convention, as rent, the net results of operations after
deducting sufficient funds to meet annual bond debt service consisting of principal,
interest, trustee fees, and any other related costs. The substance of the agreement interest, trustee fees, and any other related costs. The substance of the agreement differs from form in that the Convention retains all benefits of ownership and operations because all funds resulting from operations less debt service payments inure to the Convention. The financial statements for the center have been prepared recognizing

the convention. The mancial statements for the center have been prepared recognizing the substance over the form of this agreement.

In addition to the leasing of the facility to the Authority, the Convention also pledged its "full faith and credit" toward the payment of all principal and interest due under the bonds as an additional guarantee to the bond holders. This additional guarantee has, in effect, caused the convention to be responsible for the payment of debt service in the event that facility operations are insufficient to meet such payments.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1982

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization—Hugo Golden Age Home Authority (the Authority) is a public trust and an agency of the State of Oklahoma. It was created on December 17, 1970, under the provisions of Title 60, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, the Oklahoma Trust Act, and other applicable statutes and laws. The Authority was created to promote the development of Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma (the Center), which is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). Upon termination of the Trust, the remainder and residue of the Trust's estate will be distributed to Choctaw County, Oklahoma, the beneficiary.

Basis of Presentation—The accompanying financial statements are presented in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and conform to the principles promulgated by Governmental Accounting, Auditing, and Financial Reporting (GAAFR) published by the National Committee on Governmental Accounting. The Authority is accounted for as an "Enterprise Fund" as defined by GAAFR. Generally, Enterprise Funds account for the financing of self-suporting activities of governmental units.

Income from Financing Activity—The Authority obtains funds for the payment of debt service on the bonds, and other related expenses, from the operations of the Center. The form of the agreement provides for the net results of operations of the Center (after payment to the Authority of funds sufficient for debt service) to be paid to the Convention (see Note 2). However, for accounting purposes a receivable from the Center is recorded in an amount sufficient to pay all principal of, and interest on, the outstanding bonds. A contra account is established for the deferred finance charge which is included in the receivable.

As payments are collected from the Center, the balance in the receivable account is reduced by the full amount of the payment. Deferred finance charges are reduced and revenue is recognized in amounts

The revenue portion of the payments received under the financing arrangement is shown in the accompanying statement of revenue and expense as "lease financing revenue."

Bond Discount and Issue Expense—Bond discount and issue expense is amortized on the straight-line method over the life of the bond issue and approximates \$1,020 annually.

Fund Accounting—The indenture agreement for the Authority's bond issue creates Project (or Revenue) Funds, into which all revenues and income from the trust estate is deposited, and Sinking Funds, restricted to use for the payment of principal and interest as required by the bond issue. 2. Bonds Payable

On February 1, 1971, the Authority sold \$320,000 in first mortgage revenue bonds to finance an addition to the Center and to retire indebtedness of the Center to the Convention.

Convention.

At that time, the Convention leased the Center's facilities to the Authority for a period that would coincide with the bond life of approximately sixteen years. The Authority then executed an operating and maintenance agreement with the Convention which provides for the Convention to operate the Center on behalf of the Authority. The form of this agreement provides for the Authority to pay to the Convention, as rent the net results of operations after deducting sufficient funds to meet annual bond debt service consisting of principal, interest, trustee fees, and any other related expenses. The substance of this agreement differs from form in that the Convention retains all benefits of ownership and operations because all funds resulting from operations less debt service payments inure to the Convention. The financial statements for the Authority have been prepared recognizing the substance over the form of this agreement (see have been prepared recognizing the substance over the form of this agreement (see Note 1).

4. Reserve and Project (Revenue) Funds

The reserve, totaling \$17,093 at December 31, 1982 (\$14,438, December 31, 1981), represents the excess of restricted assets over current liabilities payable from such restricted assets. The reserve for sinking fund is restricted for the payment of principal and interest on the next maturity dates of the bond issue.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Center reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provisions of that guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds—Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property, plant and equipment are added to he unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for board-designated purposes are not considered to be restricted. The Center currently has no balances of unexpended funds which are considered to be restrictd.

Basis of Accounting-The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period service is provided.

Inventories-Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market,

Property, Plant, and Equipment—Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

Land improvments 2 to 5% 5% Building and improvements Fixed equipment Major movable equipment 10%

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition of donation.

Investments Held by Other Entities—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as a recipient for funds that could be invested. Funds held by the Foundation, included herein at cost or market value at date of receipt or donation, were derived from contributions both by the retirement center and individual donors from the retirement center as beneficiary.

During 1982, a \$5,000 trust fund was established with the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, designating the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, as income beneficiary of the fund. The balance at December 31, 1982 is approximately \$5,000.

Life Estates—Several residents have remitted funds to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to be used to build houses or duplexes at the Center. In exchange for the funds, these residents have the right to live in the dwellings rent-free for the remainder of their lives. These funds are recognized in the financial statements as deferred annuities which will be amortized over the life expectancy of the residents. The amount amortized each year is included in apartment revenue. 2. Community Activity Center

A campaign was begun in 1976 to raise \$250,000 in contributions to construct an activities center for the retirement center. At December 31, 1978, a total of \$220,780 was pledged, of which \$16,655 (\$18,821—1981) remained uncollected. At December 31, 1982 the balance for estimated uncollectible pledges is \$16,655. The cost of the activities center was \$408,083.

3. Capitalized Lease Obligations (Bonds Payable)

On June 10, 1964, land on which the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Oklahoma is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be mean an intust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (Convention). On this same date the OIA subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The Series A bonds outstanding at December 31, 1982 totaled \$397,500, Series B bonds were retired in 1982 (Series A and B—1981—\$456,000).

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. The OIA assumed responsibility for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The bonds outstanding at December 31, 1982 totaled \$1,602,832 (1981—\$1,955,000).

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's

Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The note is guaranteed by the Convention. The OCIA assumed responsibility for the construction of a 36 unit intermediate care apartment complex with cafeteria and 22 quadruplexes. The term of the lease is 10 years with quarterly payments equal to principal, premium, and interest due on next note payment date and any administrative expenses, less any surplus in the sinking fund. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at anytime prior to the expiration of the lease term for the amount required to retire all outstanding indebtedness plus \$500. At year end seven of the quadruplexes were complete with substantial completion on the other quadruplexes. Work on the intermediate care facility and cafeteria had just begun. The note payable outstanding at December 31, 1982 totaled \$4,399,077.

Interest earned by the indenture trustee was used to reduce the 1982 lease payments otherwise required of the Retirement Center. This amount, which is primarily nonrecurring, totaled \$29,779 (1981—\$22,260) and was reported as interest income in the accompanying statement of income for 1982.

On July 1, 1974, the Corporation transferred back to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma all of the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center's real and personal property used in its operations. The Corporation retained approximately 20 acres of land in trust for the Convention. Baptist Laymen's Corporation acts as the governing body of the Center for the Convention.
