The Articles of Incorporation and Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma will serve as the guide for policies and procedures of the Special Care Ministries.

Special Care Committee will participate in budget approval (final approval is by entire Board), concur on major administrative appointments, assist Executive Director-Treasurer in selection of the Executive Director of the ministries office, review and approve the policies and procedures outlined in the Staff Manual, guide and assist the administration with major conflicts and problems confronting the agency, approve any substantial outlay of funds for construction or other major projects, avoid conflict of interest by refusing to use position as board members for personal gain.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE	PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institu-

tions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than fortyone (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their actions shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by

the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area: no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called board meeting, the president and

executive director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommendation, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the board of directors.

Section 4. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 5. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 6. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER—The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or

depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant:

- (1) In the event the vacancy of the office of executive directortreasurer occurs between sessions of the convention, the associate executive director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the board of directors.
- (2) A search committee of seven members of the board of directors shall be elected without nomination by the board of directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.
- (3) When the committee has a nomination to make to the board, a meeting of the board of directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the board of directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the convention.
- (4) The person elected by the board of directors shall serve until the convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.
- Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto: and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.
- Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.
- Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opprtunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's board of directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected conven-

tion committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTEES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

ARTICLE V—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Or Or

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.



Charter and Bylaws

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, the ology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical

education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment of the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office ex-

pire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

ARTICLE I POWERS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the corporation (referred to in this and the following articles as "University," and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- Appoint or remove the President and other Officers of the University Corporation in accordance with these Bylaws;
- Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty;
- Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board Committee;
- 4. Establish and review the educational programs of the University after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs or Special Committees of Review set up by the President and Chairperson of the Board in financial emergency situations.
- Establish annually the budget of the University, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee:

- Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
- 7. Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the University;
- 8. Institute and promote major fund raising efforts of the University;
- 9. Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the University;
- 10. Authorize Officers or agents of the University to accept gifts for the University;
- Authorize the incurring of debts by the University and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of real and personal property, tangible and intangible;
- 12. Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he/she is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself/herself. An employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

Section 2.

Vacancies in the office of the trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the State of Oklahoma or member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma, or death of a trustee, or as the result of his/her inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy in the office of trustees occur during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by affirmative vote of the Convention then in office.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, one or more Assistant Secretaries, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board Trustees at its last meeting of the University's fiscal year. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the corporation and Vice Chairman with the office of Vice-President of the corporation. At the March Board Meeting the Board shall elect three trustees to serve as a nominating committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. These trustees shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and written ballot. The nominating committee shall nominate candidates to serve as officers of the Board at the July meeting with opportunity provided at that meeting for nominations to be made from the floor. The term of service for officers of the Board begins at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November.

Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 3.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The President of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose. The Vice President for Business Affairs of the University shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

Section 4.

The Board may appoint one or more Vice Chairmen, Assistant Secretaries, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the University Corporation.

Section 5.

All Officers of the University Corporation shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board

of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such Office may have against the University.

ARTICLE IV POWERS AND DUTIES OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION OFFICERS

Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2.

The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of

Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency.

Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the University and shall be as Treasurer an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He/She shall have the duty to keep or cause to be kept full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to obey all lawful orders of the Trustees, the President of the University, and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the University. He/She shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the University, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, depostit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs Committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the University. He/She shall not pay out any money unless by order of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs Committee may prescribe. He/She shall cooperate with any independent auditors or certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the University, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the University at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may duly require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the University faithfully to perform the duties of his/her office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his/her hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

ARTICLE V POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

Section 1.

The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Such tenure shall include a periodic evaluation system by the Board of Trustees and/or its agents. Such evaluation shall also set the salary and compensation for the President for the term acceptable to the Board and the President.

Section 2.

The President of the University shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the University and the official adviser to and executive agent of the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. The President of Oklahoma Baptist University must be an active member

of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church. He/She shall, as educational and administrative head of the University, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He/She shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts, and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws he/she shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

Section 3.

The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the Administrative and Staff Handbook then in force.

Section 4.

The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in July of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment and tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the Faculty Handbook then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 5.

In the event the office of President of The Oklahoma Baptist University becomes vacant, a special nominating committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board before which two weeks notice has been given concerning this needed action. The committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service, shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and secret ballot. This special nominating committee shall nominate five trustees to serve as members of the Presidential Search Committee in the next meeting of the Board of Trustees with opportunity provided for nominations to be made from the floor. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the five trustees elected, he shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Chairman of the Faculty Council, the President of the Alumni Association and the President of the Student Government Association shall serve as ex officio. non-voting members of the Search Committee.

The Search Committee shall notify in writing all members of the

Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of any prospective candidates. A vita of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents a candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1.

All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in November or December, following the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of March, at which time the Board of Trustees shall adopt the budget for the University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Turstees during the month of July, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper. except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter or the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

ARTICLE VII ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING

Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the Trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by all members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or the committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1.

There may be such special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President, annually, at or following the November-December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these bylaws the Chairman of the Board and the President of the University shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least five additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. The chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees, however.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its standing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the Chairman of the Board, may request the President of the University to appoint an Administrative Officer of the University or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the

office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

Section 6.

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be organized into the following committees:

The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the Board (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary) and the Chairmen of the Administrative Committees. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall receive from the Secretary annually in July the record of attendance and participation by all Board members during the fiscal year preceding. In the event that a trustee has failed to meet the responsibilities of service, the committee shall request from the trustee an indication of his desire for continuing service on the Board or his intention to resign in light of the circumstances and report his response to the Chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Okahoma's Nomination Committee. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Administrative Committees: There shall be five standing administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, Student Development Committee, and the Spiritual Life Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the University. The Administrative Committees shall receive reports from University administrators and consider policies and recommendations regulating the life and function of the University.

Section 7. Academic Affairs Committee.

The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall, in coopertion with the President, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long range enrolment goals; advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs; recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel; and shall review matters affecting the faculty of the University; consider proposals on such matters; and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 8. Business Affairs Committee.

The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Vice President for Business Affairs shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.

Section 9. Development Committee.

The Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review and recommend fund raising and public relations programs and report to the business Affairs Committee on fund raising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting.

Section 10. Student Development Committee.

The Student Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the University, other than those relating to the spiritual life and academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 11. Spiritual Life Committee.

The Spiritual Life Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review all matters concerning religious activities and the programs that promote spiritual growth and development at Oklahoma Baptist University, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

ARTICLE IX IDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the University shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he has been made a party by reason of his being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as to which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

ARTICLE X CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such member's indepen-

dent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his responsibilities to the University, or (b) such Trustee is aware that a member of his family (which for purposes of this paragraph shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his family) is an officer, director, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter, under consideration at a Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATOR OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the University to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the University, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the University shall be signed by such officer or agent of the University and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees shall require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the University to give bonds in amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the University.

Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the University shall be deposited to the credit of the University in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the University any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the University, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the University.

Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the University shall begin the first day of August and end the last day of July in each year.

ARTICLE XII BYLAW AMENDMENT

Section 1.

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each trustee at his/her usual place of residence.

Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Section 3.

Prior to each November/December meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation

We, the Undersigned, John R. Crain, President and C. Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

ARTICLE I

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious



and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

- 1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
- 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;
- 3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;
- 4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;
- 5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and
- 6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII

Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IX Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI Adoption of Amended Articles

- 1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.
- 2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the 20th day of December, 1974.
- 3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

Amended Bylaws

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

(Effective December 20, 1974)

ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II Meetings

- 2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.
- 2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.
- 2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.
- 2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.
- 2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

ARTICLE III Officers

- 3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.
- 3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.
- 3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Direc-

tors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

- 4,2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.
- 4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.
- 4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.
- 4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.
- 4.4 Vice-Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each

of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V Directors

- 5.1 **Duties and Restrictions.** The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.
- 5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.
- 5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 5.2 Election of Directors and Term of Office. In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as directors.
- 5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.
- 5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of all standing committees and the

President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.

- 5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.
- 5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE VI

Administration of Funds and Property

- 6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property divised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.
- 6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

- (a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.
- (b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE VIII Idemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

- 8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer of employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.
- 8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.
- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, inform, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

- (d) To assist by gift, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigatge cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and real in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;
- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of ex-

change, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

- (a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election. and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.
- (b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have

a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

ARTICLE I Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. G. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio;

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than twothirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable inter vivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than twothirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected to serve for

the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adiourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefore being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a

quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Directors or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors. Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as herein above provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meetings.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year:

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X Notice of Regular Meetings

Section 1. DISPENSED WITH. Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1.42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI Amendments

Section 1. METHOD OF AMENDMENT. These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII

Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets

of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Tulsa

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION OF TULSA.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The corporation is formed exclusively for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), and particularly the following purposes:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or

assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.
- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees; or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges

of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bill of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or non-negotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection.

A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was seventeen (17). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the Administrator of Lackey Manor in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, or their successors in office, shall at all times be Directors of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Owasso, Oklahoma, on the 28th day of September, 1979, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

John D. Setser, Calvin Vogt, Howard Doak, Charles Leake, Bert McElroy, Joy Huitt, Norman Farrell. J. Ray Smith, John Crain, Claude H. Rogers, Joseph R. Coleman, Al Geiger, Victor Thompson. Robert D. McCullough, Joe Moore, John Nikkel, Joseph M. Best, and Joe L. Ingram, Ex-Officio and Don Donalson. Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner or to such organization or organizations organized or operating exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Directors shall determine and which disposition has been approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court in the county

in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

- 61. Glenn Boyd directed the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace," prior to the address of the Executive Director-Treasurer.
 62. Joe L. Ingram, Executive Director-Treasurer since 1971, made
- the following statement regarding his resignation from that position:
- "In December last year, I made the following statement to the Board of Directors:

'Most of you attended the November 1984 meeting of the Convention and are therefore familiar with my declaration of intentions relative to my service as your Executive Director-Treasurer.

'In that same session, Dr. Warren Hultgren made a three-part motion: (1) that the 65 year age limitation of retirement be rescinded for Ingram, (2) that Ingram be asked to continue to serve as Executive Director-Treasurer; and (3) that he bring a report of his decision at the December Board of Directors meeting. I was pleased with the tremendous affirmation of the Convention.

'I have carefully assessed my physical strength and honestly sought God's will in this matter of continuing to serve in my present capacity. In feeling the assurance of His wisdom and His strength, I announce to you today that I shall continue to serve as the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention. I walk in the light of a limitless horizon. leaning on His everlasting arms, confident of the leadership of the Holy Spirit, and depending on continuing cooperative support of the Baptist people of this state.

'I seek no power or honor. My only desire is to be a servant. I may no longer have the strength of a twenty-year-old, but thank God, I still know how to wash the feet of the saints.'

"Now, almost a year has passed. My health has improved. With a few modifications, I am back to a normal schedule. In the providence of God, it has been a good year. In a depressed economy that leveled off giving to the churches and by the churches, we have managed to keep a balanced budget without cutting any programs and services—and we have given 50 percent of every Cooperative Program dollar to mission causes beyond Oklahoma. We have restructured our organization to effect economy and efficiency.

"The institutions and agencies and staff are doing the best work ever—united in serving the churches with maximum effectiveness. There is a spirit of unity and harmony in the convention. We are bound together in doctrine and in purpose. We are ready to do our greatest work.

"There are three phases of planning in the convention work: Longrange, mid-range and short-range. The short-range program is planned and ready to launch immediately. The mid-range—1987 through 1989 is not only on the drawing board, but already programmed. What is yet to be done is the long-range plans—1990-1995. This needs to be started in 1987. Actually, in the mind of the state Executive Director, the thinking and work for the long-range needs to be started in mid-1986.

"My common sense tells me that the man who leads this convention in 1990 needs to be elected in 1986 so he can have the lead time to plan for the 1990's, implement the plans, and lead the convention to its greatest days. The 1990's planning must be done in the next two years—and the man who has to carry out the program ought to have the privilege of leading in the designing of it.

"Therefore, I announce to you my intention to make June 30, 1986 my last day to serve as your Executive Director-Treasurer. I am not resigning. I am not retiring. I do not plan to take Social Security retirement. I am simply completing the work you elected me to do in 1971. July 1, 1986, God willing, I will serve full-time as President-Treasurer of the Baptist Health Care Corporation—a corporation which operates nine hospitals and four Baptist villages. In addition to serving as President of this corporation, I shall continue to serve the churches in supplying, revivals, Bible studies, and in whatever way I may be useful in the Kingdom. I pray that my life will be fruitful and that God will give me the strength and wisdom to lead the growing Baptist Health Care Corporation into a Christian health care ministry that will touch every part of this state.

"At the November 21 Board of Directors meeting, I shall ask the Board to set in motion the process to elect my successor, according to the Convention's Bylaws. I do not plan to be a lame-duck. I plan to vigorously exercise the leadership of this office until the day the responsibilities are passed on to my successor—with this one exception: I will not be involved in the process of electing my successor.

"In the words of another, 'The work goes on, the cause endures, the hope still lives, and the dreams shall never die.'

"This convention for almost 25 years has been my life. I've never thought of my work for you as a mere job. I have woven myself into the very fabric of this convention. Accept my deepest gratitude for your love, support, and friendship. Baptists of Oklahoma, I love you."

63. Dr. Ingram addressed the congregation on the subject of "Why

Should the Work Stop?" His text was Nehemiah 6:1-16.

64. Robert McCaslin, pastor of First Church, Atoka, led the closing prayer and the convention was adjourned until Wednesday afternoon.

Wednesday Afternoon November 13, 1985

65. President Estep called the session to order at 1:30 p.m.

66. Robert Winn, minister of music, Southern Hills Church in Tulsa led the congregation in singing "Come Thou Fount."

68. Nathan Stuart, minister of youth at Surrey Hills Church, Oklahoma City and student at Oklahoma Baptist University, led in

prayer.

69. A panel presentation was made by Glenn Brown, associate director of Planning and Promotion and director of Stewardship and Church Administration; Cade Garrison, director of Video/Media; and Roy Moody, associate director of Evangelism. Moody made a motion that the Evangelism report be approved as printed in the Book of Reports. (See Part 4, Reports, pages 161-162.)

The report was approved.

- 70. Dr. Ingram recognized the out-of-state visitors and new pastors and other church staff people that had moved into the state since the last convention.
 - 71. "My Jesus, I Love Thee" was led by Robert Winn.
- 72. Lowell Milburn and Don Donalson presented the Special Care Ministries report (formerly Child Care and Retirement Centers). They were assisted by several administrators and chaplains in the various institutions and by some of the residents in the villages. Dr. Milburn asked that the report as printed in the Book of Reports be approved. (See Part 4, Reports, pages 162-163.)

Approval was given to the report.

73. Dick Rader, dean, School of Christian Service, Oklahoma Baptist University, and chairman of the Convention's Christian Life Committee presented the Committee's report and spoke to it. He moved the approval of the report as printed in the Book of Reports. (See Part 4, Reports, pages 163-170.)

The report was adopted.

- 74. Robert Winn directed the congregation in singing "Victory in Jesus."
- 75. Charles Graves, pastor of Nichols Hills Church, Oklahoma City, preached regarding moral concerns based on Isaiah 58:1-2. By common consent the message will be printed in the Baptist Messenger.

76. Jerry Fielder, pastor of Southern Hills Church, Oklahoma City, and chairman of the Nominations Committee, presented the following report:

Report of Nominating Committee

Article IV-Section 1 of the Convention's Bylaws empowers the President to appoint a fifteen member Nominating Committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice; an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to September 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations.

According to the Constitution and Bylaws relative to the Board of Directors, instructions are that due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation; there shall be at least one nominee for each associational area; additional nominees shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident church members in a given associational area; no association shall have more than eight members on the Board; there shall be at least eight laymen and eight women; and any Board member shall be considered resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected. Your committee has carried out these guidelines and submits the following names for your consideration:

Resolution No. 5

WHEREAS, the 1981 and 1983 sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma passed strong resolutions regarding the ordination of women,

BE IT RESOLVED, that we go on record as reaffirming the 1983

resolution which was as follows: "WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists do recognize and appreciate the significant contribution of women within the framework of our local church ministries, we nonetheless believe that the ordination of women as deacons and ministers deviates from accepted faith and practice and creates a discord among our fellow churches."

A motion was made to amend the resolution; however, the original resolution was affirmed.

Resolution No. 6

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists have built an historic tradition of absolute opposition to the use of alcoholic beverages in all forms; and,

WHEREAS, we are equally opposed to gambling in all forms; and, WHEREAS, in recent years there has developed a moral laxity on the part of our people in taking a strong, united stand on these issues; and,

WHEREAS, Oklahoma as a state has legalized pari-mutuel gambling; and,

WHEREAS, the legislature has shackled the counties of our state with the nefarious problem of legalized gambling at proposed horse racing tracks; and,

WHEREAS, the legislature has further passed unwelcome legislation which burdens every county in the state with a constant problem of meeting the serious social, economic, moral, and spiritual problems of meeting the money-hungry liquor forces with an ongoing battle at the ballot box on liquor-by-the-drink;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, (1) That this convention go on record as reaffirming our historic, traditional stand against gambling in all forms; and, (2) That we reaffirm our generally accepted Church Covenant which declares total abstinence from the use of all alcoholic beverages in whatever form; and finally, (3) That we respectfully implore the legislature in the State of Oklahoma to reform the inequities of the present county option law to give us as dry forces equal rights with the liquor forces on the frequency of county option votes; as to how such votes shall be called; and that any county may have an equal right to vote repeal of liquor-by-the-drink by the same process through which the liquor forces now enjoy under present legislation and bring about one vote after another in their endless efforts to bring liquor-by-the-drink to the several counties of the State of Oklahoma.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 7

WHEREAS, the State of Oklahoma has been severely afflicted with devastating, senseless violence; and,

WHEREAS, many Baptist churches in Oklahoma have suffered crippling losses because of mindless, depraved acts of murder; and

WHEREAS, the First Baptist Church of Geronimo has suffered through, and ministered in the heartbreaking loss of members of their church and community in the Geronimo bank murders; and

WHEREAS, the community of Geronimo and surrounding communities are still grieving because of the irreplaceable loss of precious loved ones; and

WHEREAS, the Pastors Conference of Comanche-Cotton Baptist Association has, on November 4, voted unanimously their disapproval of the October 31 Baptist Messenger feature article on Robby Johnson, convicted of murder by the Comanche County District Court on May 24, 1985;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 80th session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma go on record as urging the editor and staff of the **Baptist Messenger** to exercise caution and sensitivity to counsel relative to such matters; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this 80th session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma express its heartfelt love, sympathy, and compassion for the families and friends of those who lost their lives in the Geronimo bank tragedy; and that we pledge ourselves to sustain them in prayer and to seek God's healing for every broken heart.

The resolution was adopted.

Institutions and Agencies

The Baptist Messenger and Office of Communications

Almost 75 years ago a brand new publication called **The Baptist Messenger** was distributed to messengers to the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. The convention met that year in Oklahoma City. The first issue went to only a handful of paid subscribers and a few hundred of the 1,228 convention messengers. Much has happened among Oklahoma Baptists since May 12, 1912. As the **Messenger** begins its 75th year of publication next May, it is well to consider our present situation.

The **Baptist Messenger** passed another circulation milestone in 1985. Circulation was 120,171 for the issue of August 22, 1985. Last year, the August 23 issue went to 117,199 subscribers.

The Messenger is sent by 1,176 churches to their members through the church budget plan. The number of special church pages continues to increase as more churches and associations use the Baptist Messenger for their periodic newsletters. The August 22 issue contained 163 special pages for 103 churches and four associations. Last year we reported 86 churches using special editions. The Messenger continues to be an economical alternative as churches face increasing costs of producing and mailing separate newsletters.

A monthly special Care and Share section was published in behalf of the child care work. A quarterly newsletter for Baptist Retirement Centers, The Center Resident, also was featured during 1985. Oklahoma Baptist University used a similar eight-page section to tell its story to Oklahoma Baptists.

Subscription prices continue among the lowest of Baptist state papers across the Southern Baptist Convention. The prices established for 1986 are \$3.50 per year for churches sending the **Messenger** to members through the church budget plan. Individual subscriptions will continue at \$4.00.

The work of the convention's Central Service printing department also is directed through the office of the **Baptist Messenger**. Marchetta Hedrick, who supervised the printing operation for 31 years, retired during the year because of a medical disability. Ken Jones, manager of the **Baptist Messenger** printing plant, now supervises both printing shops.

The **Baptist Messenger** continues to be the main line of communication among Oklahoma Baptists. Every member family should have access to information about our missions activities through the **Messenger**. Better informed Christians are stronger church members and the result is a stronger church and denomination.

Planning and Promotion

Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion Office was established during the 1972 reorganization of the Convention structure. As an extension of the Executive Office, the Planning and Promotion Office relates most directly to those departments and programs of work which have programs and counterparts in the local church. These departments include Brotherhood, Church Music, Cooperative Missions, Evangelism, and Religious Education. Woman's Missionary Union became a department in 1980 and Falls Creek in 1982. These two departments are also a part of the Planning and Promotion area.

Specific relationship to the seven departments is in the area of planning, promotion, calendaring and budget development. Direct supervision is the responsibility of the Executive Director-Treasurer.

The associate executive director, Lyle Garlow, supervises the Planning and Promotion Office, including: (1) liaison with the 41 associations and associational directors of missions, and (2) Cooperative Program promotion. Glenn Brown, associate director of Planning and Promotion, directs (1) stewardship development, (2) Church Administration, and (3) guides the development of materials for coordinated promotion planning. Cade Garrison supervises the video/media work for the Convention as a part of the Planning and Promotion Office.

The reports on basic areas of Planning and Promotion work are:

Cooperative Program Promotion

The 50 percent/50 percent division of the Oklahoma Cooperative Program was achieved January, 1985. Oklahoma was the first state to have Cooperative Program dollars (on a 50 percent/50 percent basis) forwarded and received by the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee. The Florida Convention also began a 50 percent/50 percent division in 1985.

The 50 percent/50 percent achievement was a direct result of the challenge and leadership of Joe L. Ingram, Executive Director-Treasurer. He directed the progress in annual increases, beginning with ½ percent per year in 1973. In 1982 and 1983, there was a one percent increase. A two percent increase per year was approved for the 1984 and 1985 budgets.

Receipts for 1984 were \$15,712,619.43. This was an increase of \$918,103.51 above 1983—a 5.84 percent gain. During 1984, each Cooperative Program dollar was divided 48 percent for Southern Baptist Convention Ministries and 52 percent for Oklahoma Ministries.

Church tithes and offerings received and reported by the churches in 1984 were \$171,147,945—a six percent increase over 1983. Churches shared 9.18 percent of these funds through the Cooperative Program.

It is interesting that, in 1984, church tithes and offerings were up six percent over 1983, and Cooperative Program giving was up 5.8 percent. In 1983, tithes and offerings were up 8.78 percent, but Cooperative Program giving was up only 3.69 percent.

To maintain the 50 percent/50 percent division of the Cooperative Program between state and Southern Baptist Convention, churches are urged to increase their annual percentage objectives each year. Planned Growth in Giving suggests 15 annual growth steps beginning in 1985 through 2000 A.D. Each church increasing its giving by only one percent would result in a 10 percent increase in dollars—an amount equal to \$1.5 million.

The 5M PLAN for Church Treasurers (Mail Mission Money Monday Morning) is significant for increased giving. The constant cash flow, along with efficient and effective banking procedures, helps fund the promotion and administrative expense of the Convention with non-Cooperative Program dollars. Thus, every mission gift from your church goes directly, in just a few days, for a mission ministry. This is instant missions.

Coordinated Promotion Planning

1985 concludes the third year of the current Bold Mission Thrust planning cycle, 1982-1985. The Oklahoma 1985-1990 goals have been adopted by the convention previously and will be basic to much of the planning of various departments.

1990-1995 Southern Baptist Convention planning is already under way. Direction 2000, a survey being conducted in many associations, will provide criteria for future planning.

This area of work is conducted by Lyle Garlow.

Associational Services

All 41 Southern Baptist Associations in Oklahoma enjoy and exert their autonomy and self-governing privilege. Each association employs a director of missions. The finest directors of missions in all the Southern Baptist Convention serve in Oklahoma. They are committed, capable, and caring persons. Through their efforts, new missions and churches are begun. New church sites are purchased. Every phase of Baptist life is advanced by these men of God. It is a joy to work with the directors of missions in Oklahoma.

Since the last publication of the Book of Reports, we have had the following changes in associational leadership. New directors of missions: Lee Carshall, Choctaw-Chickasaw (9-84); Tom E. Cox, Washington-Osage (11-1-84); Joshua Davis, Cherokee (8-84); Gerald Dyer, North-eastern (12-1-84); William V. Hart, Pittsburg (1-14-85); Victor Letbetter Jr., Sans Bois (10-1-84); J. V. Lobaugh, Southwest (7-1-85); Kenneth Romines, North Canadian (4-85); and Earl Scott, Craig-Mayes (2-4-85). Joe Ray Land (16 years, Pittsburg) and Loren F. Messenger (22 years, Caddo and Craig-Mayes) retired as directors of missions. John O. Capps (Southwest) resigned to pastor a church in Canada.

During the past year, the following former directors of missions have gone to be with the Lord: Haskell Beck (Salt Fork) and Guy Bellamy (Capital).

Church Administration

Church Administration services seeks to strengthen the ministry of

pastors, staffs, deacons, church officers and committees by providing specialized conferences, consultations, and resource information. Helps are provided in the following areas:

- 1. Pastoral leadership in the functions of preaching, leading the church, and caring for the members
- 2. Church staff relations and skills
- 3. Church growth planning
- 4. Deacon ministry
- 5. Church organization, church council and church committees
- 6. Church business administration

Glenn Brown serves as our convention's Church Administration Consultant.

In 1985, "Shared Ministry" concepts and materials were introduced to approximately 235 pastors, staffs, and laymen. We were able to work with the Baptist Sunday School Board in "pilot" conferences in our state in advance of the 1986 emphasis. Seventeen associations elected "pastoral ministries" leaders to assist in interpreting the new thrust of shared ministry.

Eight hundred and fifty pastors, deacons and wives attended a retreat focusing on deacon ministry and featuring 12 special interest conferences related to the scope of deacon ministry. In addition, participation in the northeastern Oklahoma Deacon Conference (co-sponsored with the First Baptist Church, Vinita) and associational or church conferences increased total participation to more than 1,050.

More than 100 pastors registered for the specialized skills conferences in counseling individuals and families in crisis. In addition, ministers of education were led in a two-day programming retreat.

Stewardship

Glenn Brown, Director of Stewardship Promotion, works closely with Lyle Garlow, who directs Cooperative Program Promotion, to provide services to churches in the areas of stewardship education, budgeting, mission support, accounting and stewardship leadership. Together they produced the "First Fruits First" program for the promotion of individual giving and mission giving. Brown and Garlow headed up two teams comprised of an 18-member state task force to introduce the convention-wide emphasis on "Planned Growth in Giving." Eleven two-day pastors' seminars were conducted, reaching approximately 400 pastors and laymen from 250 churches in preparation for the first round of Planned Growth in Giving Church Events.

Planned Growth in Giving calls for a) each individual/family to increase personal giving to their church each year, from 1985-2000, by some percentage of their income, and b) each church to adopt a plan to increase by some percentage each year, 1985-2000, the amount given through the Cooperative Program and the association. The plan, based on Biblical stewardship, has the spiritual growth of individuals at its heart and world evangelization as its focus.

Additional seminars to prepare pastors and key laymen to lead their

churches in Planned Growth in Giving are scheduled for April and May of 1986.

In addition, free stewardship promotion materials are provided to churches (on request), along with consultations and seminars on budgeting, Christian family money management, how to conduct stewardship campaigns, etc.

Video/Media

Cade Garrison is director of Video/Media. Areas of work include ACTS, BTN, and VTS. Garrison also assists the BGCO staff and local churches in video ministries.

ACTS (American Christian Television System), now in its second year, is reaching into approximately 170,000 Oklahoma homes (via cable) in 15 communities. Thirty-two local Southern Baptist churches are directly involved in managing these local ACTS affiliates. Several are televising worship services and special events over their local ACTS channels. ACTS is owned and operated by the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission in Fort Worth.

In February, more than 60 people attended the first Oklahoma ACTS Video Workshop at First Church, Moore. Skill enhancement sessions were offered in 20 areas and exhibitors displayed the latest in audio and video equipment.

BTN (Baptist Telecommunication Network) is owned and operated by the Baptist Sunday School Board. Approximately 200 Oklahoma churches have access to BTN through church and association participation. BTN sends "in house" leadership and training messages. A BTN high point was its telecasting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Dallas. Several hundred Oklahomans viewed the proceedings in seven locations across the state.

VTS (Video Tape Service) currently includes 120 leadership and training tapes for churches. These tapes are available through many associations and the state office.

Report of the Board of Directors Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

One of the last actions at any annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention is a motion to authorize the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention; and that the president and recording secretary be authorized to sign legal papers of the convention which require signatures.

The Board of Directors met December 4, 1984, May 14 and October 1, 1985 to fulfill these responsibilities.

The Convention's Constitution requires that the Board of Directors make a general report of all its actions to the annual meeting of

the Convention. Here is the report of all transactions of the Board since the 1984 annual meeting.

In order to better carry out their work, the Board has been divided into five areas of work: administrative, business management, child care, retirement centers and chaplaincy, and planning and promotion. Just following the annual meeting, President Wendell Estep, in consultation with the Executive Director Joe. L. Ingram, and Vice-Presidents Brad Allen and Travis Wiginton, assigned committees of the Board to give direction to each of these areas of work. Approval was given to the following assignments:

The Executive Committee

The Convention's Bylaws state that the Executive Committee shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors. This committee is made up of the Convention president, the executive director, recording secretary and the chairmen of the five board committees. The chairmen of the committees this year were William H. Cook, Brad Allen, Keith Wiginton, James Sanderson and Warren C. Hultren. No matters were referred to the committee this year.

Ingram to Remain as Executive Director-Treasurer—The December meeting opened with the following statement by Dr. Joe L. Ingram:

"Most of you attended the November 1984 meeting of the Convention and are therefore familiar with my declaration of intentions relative to my service as your Executive Director-Treasurer.

"In that same session, Dr. Warren Hultgren made a three-part motion: (1) That the 65-year age limitation of retirement be rescinded for Ingram: (2) that Ingram be asked to continue to serve as Executive Director-Treasurer; and (3) that he bring a report of his decision at the December Board of Directors meeting. I was pleased with the tremendous affirmation of the Convention.

"I have carefully assessed my physical strength and honestly sought God's will in this matter of continuing to serve in my present capacity. In feeling the assurance of His wisdom and His strength, I announce to you today that I shall continue to serve as the Executive Director-Treasurer of this Convention. I walk in the light of a limitless horizon leaning on His everlasting arms, confident of the leadership of the Holy Spirit, and depending on continuing cooperative support of the Baptist people of this State.

"I seek no power or honor. My only desire is to be a servant. I may no longer have the physical strength of a twenty year old, but thank God, I still know how to wash the feet of the saints.

"I look forward to working with you. I treasure your friendship and I seek your prayerful support as we cooperatively lead Oklahoma Baptists to be the people God wants us to be. God bless you."

A motion unanimously carried to concur with Dr. Ingram's decision to remain as Executive Director-Treasurer.

Business Management Committee

The Business Management Committee has the responsibility of the Accounting Office, all insurance, Baptist Building management, and management of all properties other than Falls Creek, Camp Hudgens and Nunny Cha-ha. Brad Allen served as chairman.

December Report-

The December meeting of the committee was for orientation. Accounting procedures, and insurance and property management were discussed. There were no recommendations.

Russell Named Manager of Accounting—An announcement was made that Kerry Russell would assume the title of manager of accounting effective January 1, 1985. He had been serving as staff accountant.

May Report and Recommendations-

1. Distribution of Income from Warwick West—Several years ago the Board of Directors voted for the net income of Warwick West Apartments I and II to be applied to the Executive Office budget to reduce the requirement for Cooperative Program funds.

Years before, land which was just east of the apartments was leased for the construction of a motel. Because of some financial problems of the motel operator, the Convention purchased the buildings and took over the operation of the motel. Subsequently, it was leased to C. A. Henderson, the developer of the apartments. At that time, the Board voted that after the convention's deficit for purchase and operation of the motel was satisfied, the revenue would be available for the benefit of the Oklahoma City Retirement Center so long as that institution needed assistance from the Convention, and as long as the convention desired its support.

The motel was later torn down and the land was leased to Mr.

Henderson for the third addition of Warwick West Apartments. In 1980, the Board sold the land to Mr. Henderson for \$2,000,000. All three phases of Warwick West Apartments are located on this property.

In light of present day circumstances, the Board approved a recommendation that interest income from the sale of the land be made available to the Executive Office to be used as the Board directs from year to year, and that when the principal of \$2,000,000 is paid, that this money be used as endowment for the Executive Office as long as the Board determines that it is needed.

- 2. 1984 Audit—The committee reviewed the audit of the Convention, and recommended approval to the Board. The Board asked that the audits be printed in the 1984 State Convention Annual and distributed to all churches.
- 3. 1985 Auditor—Englebach, Roberts and Company, certified public accountants, were approved as auditors for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for 1985.

September Report and Recommendations-

1. Insurance Study Requested—Several indicated problems in securing adequate insurance for church properties at a reasonable rate. The Board voted to ask the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee to look into the possibility of the Annuity Board establishing a casualty insurance program which would be made available to the churches.

Child Care Committee

Chairman Keith Wiginton gave direction to the Child Care Committee. The Committee has the assignment to give assistance to operation and/or construction of children's homes in Oklahoma City, Owasso, Madill, Ada, Duncan, Clintion, McAlester, Mooreland and Boys Ranch Town near Edmond, foster homes and additional child care ministries.

December Report and Recommendations-

- 1. Mother's Day Offering Goal—Approval was given for the 1985 Mother's Day Offering Goal to be \$505,505.05.
- 2. Activities Building to Be Constructed—The Board gave authority for the construction of an activities building at the Owasso Children's Home as soon as funds are available.
- 3. Offering Designated—The 1985 Mother's Day Offering from the churches in Northwest Association was designated toward the construction of a group home at Mooreland.
- 4. Long-Range Study Committee Appointed—An affirmative vote was given to the appointment of a sub-committee of the Child Care Committee to do long-range planning and to set some priorities for ministry. Gerald Lunsford was asked to serve as chairman. Joe Williams and James Robinson will serve with him.

May Report and Recommendation-

1. Child Care to Seek Accreditation—The National Association of Homes for Children has developed a plan of accreditation for child care institutions. The Board asked that the Department of Child Care move

towards the accreditation of the department and each home operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

2. Staff Changes—It was announced that James Browning, superintendent at the Oklahoma City Children's Home would be retiring after 31 years on the staff. Jerry Bradley, superintendent at the children's home in Madill, will become the superintendent in Oklahoma City. Chris Walker, who has served in various responsibilities at Boys Ranch Town for many years, will become superintendent at Madill. Mr. Browning will serve on a retired basis as an assistant to the department director.

Planning and Promotion Committee

The Planning and Promotion Committee gives counsel in stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, disaster relief and also to the church program departments. James Sanderson was chairman.

December Report-

Disaster Relief Sub-Committee Appointed—James Sanderson, Mrs. Coy Shelby and David Forester were asked to serve on the Disater Relief Sub-Committee.

May Recommendations—

Guidelines for Leasing and/or Renting at Falls Creek—The committee was asked to study the policies of leasing and/or renting facilities at Falls Creek Conference Center to an organization, or a church sponsoring some organization whose intent, purpose, and/or doctrine is not compatible with the basic position of Oklahoma Baptists. Background information was given along with some recommendations, which the Board adopted.

Background:

A. The Business Management Committee, on August 21, 1973, discussed the use of Falls Creek Assembly Grounds by other denominational groups. The committee gave directions to the Falls Creek business director as follows:

"After considerable discussion, it was the consensus of the committee that it would be best for the Convention facilities to not be leased to groups other than Baptist."

B. The Business Management Committee, BGCO, brought a recommendation to the Board of Directors, March 16, 1978, concerning changes in the lease agreements relative to property. The Board approved the following recommendation:

"That the terminology in the contract for Falls Creek lease agreements be updated using correct titles such as Falls Creek Baptist Assembly and Conference Center and Executive Director-Treasurer; and that an additional paragraph be added as follows: It is agreed that the purpose of Falls Creek Baptist Assembly and Conference Center coincide with those of the Southern Baptist churches of Oklahoma, the Southern Baptist associations of Oklahoma, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; that, therefore, any lessee at Falls Creek Baptist Assembly and Conference Center be a cooperating Southern

Baptist church of Oklahoma or a cooperating Southern Baptist association of Oklahoma; and that any unexpired lease will revert to lessor when lessee is no longer a cooperating Southern Baptist church or association."

- C. Currently, the facilitites are being rented only to churches, associations, or some department or agency of the BGCO, except in the case of the "Texas Week," and some Texas churches.
- D. The Baptist Women's and Men's Retreats at Falls Creek are conducted by the Allendale Baptist Church, Austin, Texas. However, they are **sponsored by** a cooperating Oklahoma Southern Baptist Church, and not sponsored by the BGCO.

It appears that the basic guidelines for renting facilities at Falls Creek Conference Center should coincide with the basic guideline for leasing property established March 16, 1978. That statement reads, "It is agreed that the purposes of Falls Creek Baptist Assembly and Conference Center coincide with those of the Southern Baptist Churches of Oklahoma, the Southern Baptist Associations of Oklahoma, and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma."

Recommendations:

- A. That the convention-owned facilities at Falls Creek be leased or rented primarily to Southern Baptist churches of Oklahoma, Southern Baptist associations of Oklahoma, and departments or agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and secondarily, to Southern Baptist churches from neighboring states which cooperate with their state convention and local association.
- B. That facilities at Falls Creek be available first for the use of Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma sponsored meetings.
- C. That Falls Creek facilities rented to any church or association be rented with the understanding that the facilities are to be used by the constituency of the renter and not sub-rented or sub-leased, and that all groups are subject to the general Falls Creek rules and guidelines established by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
- D. That all conferences, workshops, clinics, etc. conducted at Falls Creek Baptist Conference Center be sponsored by a department or agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. (This would not apply to conferences, seminars, etc. conducted by a church for its own constituency.)
- E. That the scheduling of Falls Creek facilities for any activity, workshop or clinic which involves a larger audience than a church or an association be coordinated through the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma calendar process in order to maintain a minimum of calendar and audience conflicts.
- F. That the existing Texas Falls Creek Week, the Children's Camp cosponsored by several associations, and the Allendale Women's and Men's Retreats sponsored by a local Oklahoma church, be permitted to continue subject to the above guidelines and at the discretion of the Board of Director of the Baptist General Convention

of Oklahoma. All encampments and retreats named in this paragraph are to be cleared by, approved by and overseen by a designated agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

September Report and Recommendations-

1. WMU Guidelines Amended—The Board approved amendments to the guidelines of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union. The amended Guidelines are as follows:

Name

The name of this organization shall be Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.

Purpose

The purpose shall be to promote the teaching of and participation in Christian missions through the organizations of Woman's Missionary Union in the churches and missions cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Relationships

- Section 1. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be the organization through which cooperating church and associational Woman's Missionary Unions achieve unity of purpose and collective action.
- Section 2. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be a department of work of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and shall work with other departments to advance the total work of Oklahoma Baptists.
- Section 3. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall cooperate with the Southern Baptist Convention; and the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, in the promotion of Christian missions, through a program of teaching, providing and participating for missions achievement.
- Section 4. Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall recognize the autonomy of the association and church organizations as provided in the Baptist democratic process of operation.
- Section 5. Church organizations shall be recognized as units through which the purpose of Woman's Missionary Union is accomplished, each responsible for its own program, and contributing successively through the association and the state to the total activity of Woman's Missionary Union, Southern Baptist Convention.

Membership

The members of Woman's Missionary Union organizations in the churches and missions cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma shall comprise the membership of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.

Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be a president; vice-presidents (the associational WMU directors); and recording secretary. These officers with the exception of vice-presidents, shall be elected at the annual ses-

sion and shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected. The term of elected officers shall not exceed four years and one year shall lapse before officers shall be eligible for election to the previously held office. The term of office shall begin at final adjournment.

Section 2. A vacancy occurring in an office shall not be filled; the administrative committee shall determine the manner in which the duties of the office shall be discharged for the unexpired term.

Department Leadership

Section 1. The employed leadership shall include the director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union and consultants as needed. The employed leadership shall be elected and/or employed in accordance with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma's bylaws.

Section 2. The duties of these leaders shall be specified in the Position Description Manual of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Nominations and Elections

Section 1. A nominating committee shall be named at the business meeting at each annual session, whose duty it shall be to nominate officers at the next annual session and appoint members of the nominating committee. The nominating committee shall be composed of a chairman from the State WMU Council from an association that is not eligible to have a member that particular year and one member from each of the six areas (Woman's Missionary Union grouping of associations) who are not on the State WMU Council. All members shall be nominated by the previous nominating committee to serve one year. If a vacancy occurs on this committee, the committee appoints another person from the association from which vacancy occurred to serve the unexpired term.

Section 2. The associations within an area shall rotate numerically in having a member on the nomination committee.

Section 3. During the first business meeting of the annual session the recording secretary shall read the nominating committee and shall call the meeting for the election of the co-chairman and a secretary.

Section 4. The nominating committee shall meet at least four months prior to the next annual session for the selection of nominees. The chairman shall notify all members 30 days before the meeting.

Section 5. The chairman shall bring the report of the nominating committee to the Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union in annual session; nominations may also be brought from the floor. Election by ballot shall be taken should more than one person be nominated for any office.

Meetings

Section 1. A regular session of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be held annually; the time and place shall be determined at a previous annual session, or in an emergency, by the council.

Section 2. The director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union, in consultation with the president, shall plan the program for the annual session.

Section 3. The annual session shall be open to members of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union and visitors. The privilege of making motions, debating and voting shall be limited to members only.

Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union Council

Section 1. The Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union Council shall be composed of the officers of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union. The council will be responsible for making plans and setting forth policies for the promotion of the work of the organization.

Section 2. Regular meetings of the council shall be held twice during the year; the time and place to be determined by the council.

Section 3. Special meetings of the council may be called in consultation with the director by the president, or shall be called at the request of at least one-third of the voting members of the council.

Section 4. Minutes of all council meetings shall be mailed to council members.

Section 5. The council shall have the following committees: administrative, planning and promotion.

Section 6. The council shall make a report to Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union in annual session and to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The reports shall be given by the director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union.

Committees

Section 1. The president and the director of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be members ex-officio of all committees of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union except the nominating committee.

Section 2. Committees, standing or special, as authorized by the Council of Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union shall be appointed by the president in consultation with the director. The chairman shall be chosen from the council.

Section 3. The administrative committee shall be composed of half of the council members. This committee will consider seminary scholarships, state mission allocations and goals for foreign, home and state missions.

Section 4. The planning and promotion committee shall be composed of half of the members of the council. The function of this committee is to plan for State Missions Season of Prayer (theme and writers) and discuss the promotion of age level organizations: Mission Friends, Girls in Action, Acteens, Baptist Young Women and Baptist Women.

Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall govern Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union in all cases to which they are consistent with these guidelines.

The guidelines may be amended by the Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union Council's recommending the changes to the convention's Board of Directors with the changes becoming effective upon approval by the conventions' Board of Directors.

- 2. Mailing List Policy Reaffirmed—The long-standing Convention policy that the BGCO mailing list of pastors and churches be used only by Convention departments, agencies and institutions was reaffirmed by the Board.
- 3. Falls Creek Guideline Still Firm—The Board voted to maintain its position on the Falls Creek Guideline relative to camper participation which states: "All campers are expected to attend all morning assemblies, study sessions and worship services."

Retirement Villages and Chaplaincy Committee

There are retirement villages at Oklahoma City, Owasso, Hugo, Cleveland, Ada, and Madill. This committee has the responsibility for recommendations concerning the operation of these villages. It also gives direction to the chaplaincy ministry in hospitals in Enid, Miami, Grove, Pryor, Stroud, Bristow, Cordell, Hugo, McAlester, Baptist Medical Center in Oklahoma City, and in all of the above mentioned retirement villages. Warren C. Hultgren served as chairman.

December Recommendations and Approvals-

- 1. Auditors for Oklahoma City and Hugo Named—Englebach, Roberts and Company, certified public accountants, were approved as auditors for the retirement villages at Oklahoma City and Hugo. Accounting for the other villages is done by the Convention's Accounting Office, and is included in the Convention's audit.
- 2. Laymen's Corporations and Administrative Committees Approved—The Board voted for the recommendation of persons to serve on the Oklahoma City and Tulsa Laymen's Corporations and the Administrative Committees at Ada, Hugo, Cleveland and Madill retirement villages. They are as follows:

4. Approval Given for BHCC Board—In the Bylaws of the Baptist Health Care Corporation it is stated that their Board of Directors shall all be cooperating participants in a local Baptist church, and they shall be approved by the Convention's Board of Directors. 
5. Donalson Elected—The Board elected Don Donalson to serve as director of Baptist Villages and Chaplaincy Ministry for the convention. Mr. Donalson has been serving as administrator of the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center for a number of years, and for the past several years as associate director to the executive director-treasurer in this area of work. Donalson will continue his responsibilities at the Oklahoma City Center.

Joint Recommendations

The Child Care, Retirement Centers and Chaplaincy, and Administrative Committees presented joint recommendations to the Board in May.

Revisions in Convention Organization—From time to time, revisions have been made in the Convention's organization chart in order to meet changing administrative needs. The Committees presented three recommendations and all were adopted.

(1) That approval be given to the revised organization chart which relates Planning and Promotion, Communications, Business Management, and Special Care Ministries Offices to the Executive Office.



The Special Care Ministries Office is a combination of the Child Care and Retirement Centers and Chaplaincy Departments. With the approval of this new office, Lowell Milburn became director of the Special Care Ministries Office which oversees both Child Care and Adult Care Ministries. Dr. Milburn is continuing to serve as director of Child

Care Ministries and Don Donalson is director of Adult Care Ministries.

- (2) As the Board voted for the revision of the organization chart, they gave approval of the Board being reorganized into four committees: Administrative, Business Management, Planning and Promotion and Special Care Ministries.
- (3) The Board authorized these changes to become effective July 1, 1985.

Special Care Ministries Committee

The previous Child Care and Retirement Centers and Chaplaincy Committees were combined to form the Special Care Ministries Committee. Keith Wiginton and Warren Hultgren served as co-chairmen.

May Report and Recommendations

1. Rental Assistance Program Made Available—The expanded Annuity program is designed to give pastors retiring several years from now a comfortable retirement income. However, the present Oklahoma Baptist retirees and/or their widows are receiving only an average of \$148 per month, plus Social Security benefits. Few have meager savings. Housing has become a real problem for these who have retired on low incomes. The retirement villages ministry has an endowment of approximately \$775,000 which is producing \$75,000 to \$80,000 a year. This endowment has produced an accumulative fund of around \$375,000.

The Board approved a recommendation that a rental assistance program be established, and that it be continued as long as funds are available, for Baptist retirees and/or their spouses who wish to live in Madill, Ada, or Cleveland Baptist Villages. The basis for assistance would be that the applicants would pay only 30 percent of their income for a one bedroom apartment. The fund would pick up the balance. Sixty units could be provided for approximately \$115,000 a year.

The Board asked the Special Care Ministries Office to draft guidelines for the rental assistance program.

September Report and Recommendations-

1. Pregnancy Crisis Center to be Established—Information was given regarding the need for a Pregnancy Crisis Center and guidelines were approved. The report and approved guidelines are as follows:

Recognizing the need to take positive action in confronting the issue of abortion, the convention through the Child Care ministry started an Alternatives Counseling Ministry in January 1981. This counseling ministry has been expanded to the Oklahoma City area and other areas of the state. The expansion has come about due to a growing concern on the part of Baptists in the local communities for help in dealing with the problem of abortion.

A group of concerned Oklahoma City pastors approached Lowell Milburn and Joe L. Ingram in April 1985 and proposed the development of a Crisis Pregnancy Center. This center would serve as a model which could be duplicated in other parts of the state as interest, need, and support dictate.

A task force composed of Chairman Anthony Jordan, Charles

Graves, Bill Merrell, Joe Williams, Gerald Lunsford, Ron Chastine, Judy Stovall, Debby Brown, Michael A. Nomura and Debbie Hearn was appointed to develop a Crisis Pregnancy Center and a model program for the approval and implementation of this ministry. The task force recommends that a center be set up under the following guidelines to minister to the pregnant woman and her child both before and after birth.

Agency and Church Relationship:

The Special Care Ministries Department is an agency of the state convention and thus an extension of the ministry of the local church. The agency has for many years had a ministry to the unwed mother and is a licensed adoption agency. Since 1981, it has had an abortion counseling program on a smaller scale. This Crisis Pregnancy Ministry and full-time Crisis Pregnancy Center is a realization of the partnership between the agency and the local church. The agency will provide leadership, sponsorship, and co-ordination. This will include providing training for volunteers, professional staff as consultants, promotion in churches across the state, materials and brochures, and help in advertising and public relations. The local churches will provide Christian volunteers who are willing to be trained and willing to make a commitment of their services over a period of time. The churches will help with the education of members about abortion and the needs of pregnant women. The churches will also be encouraged to support the ministry with both prayer and financial support.

Guidelines for Operation:

Board of Directors of Convention will serve as governing board and will be responsible for philosophy, policies and procedures. Special Care Ministries office will operate the center.

A committee of local pastors and lay persons will be appointed to assist in operating the center. Committee will serve on rotation basis with three-year terms and will be appointed by the Executive Director of Special Care Ministries' office in consultation with Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention.

The Executive Director of Special Care Ministries in consultation with the Convention Executive Director-Treasurer will have veto power over all actions, policies, and decisions made by committee, volunteer workers, or the director of the center until such a time as the Special Care Committee and the Board of Directors of the Convention could make a final decision.

Our Approach

- —To counsel the mother about making wise choices during and after the pregnancy.
- -To provide information to the mother about:
 - —the development of her unborn child,
 - —the methods and effects of abortion on her and on her unborn child, and
 - —the alternatives to abortion available to her.
- -To save the life of the unborn child.

- —To present the gospel of Christ and minister to the mother's spiritual needs.
- —To provide services to the mother and her child during and after the pregnancy.
- —To involve the churches in positive actions in responding to the pregnant woman and her child and present programs in churches when invited.

Our Strategy

The Crisis Pregnancy Ministry:

- Crisis Pregnancy Center—for larger, urban areas. This consists of a counseling office staffed by trained Christian volunteers from local churches. The Center is located in a non-church facility. It is operated throughout the week as a location where women can come for free pregnancy tests, counseling, and other services.
- 2. Crisis Pregnancy Hotline—for smaller communities. This is a telephone hotline answered by trained Christian volunteers from local churches. The pregnant woman is provided information, counseling, a pregnancy test, in-depth counseling, and other services.

Our Services

The Crisis Pregnancy Ministry includes the following services:

- 1. A free, confidential pregnancy test.
- 2. Information about:
 - -the development of her unborn child,
 - —the methods and effects of abortion on her and on her unborn child.
 - -the alternatives to abortion available to her,
 - —contraception counseling will not be given nor referrals made to agencies making contraceptives available.
- 3. Free, confidential counseling—to help the pregnant woman make wise choices, and to refer her when necessary for premarital or family counseling.
- Medical Referral—to help a woman locate and obtain needed medical services.
- Shepherding Homes—a Christian home in which a pregnant woman can live during and immediately after her pregnancy.
- Adoption and Pre-Adoption Services—includes supportive counseling, medical and legal services, possible maternity or foster home care for the mother, and adoptive placement for the child.
- 7. Church Referral—to help the woman locate a local church which can minister to her ongoing spiritual needs.
- 8. Counseling, as possible, with parents of those who are not of legal age.

2. Guidelines to Rental Assistance—Approval was given to guidelines to Rental Assistance.

(1) Retired Baptist pastors and missionaries and/or their widows are eligible to participate in the Convention's Rental Assistance Program in Baptist Villages at Ada, Madill, and Cleveland. Preference will be given to the above named people, but others are eligible as long as funds are available. Apply directly to the administrator of the village.

(2) Minimum age for these pastors and missionaries is 62. Minimum age for the wives or widows is 55. The minimum age can be adjusted for those who are disabled, but who are still able to care for their own

needs.

(3) Adjusted gross income is figured so that no person or couple would pay more than 30 percent of their income for rent after certain allowances have been considered.

(4) Allowances could be made for excessive medical and drug bills. Director of Adult Care Ministries will make the final decision.

Rent based on the 30 percent formula would be \$75 a month.

(6) Baptist General Convention would supplement the balance from specific endowment funds designated for this purpose.

Administrative Committee

William H. Cook served as chairman of the Administrative Committee which has the responsibility for work related to personnel, budget, annuity, ministerial services, **Baptist Messenger** and Baptist Student work.

December Recommendations and Approvals-

- 1. Formula for Annual Meeting Dates Established—The Convention in the 1984 session asked the Board of Directors to set a formula for determining annual meeting dates. It was determined that the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma will begin on Monday evening and close with the Wednesday evening session following the second Sunday of November.
- 2. Elam Elected—Joe Elam was elected to complete the unexpired term of the Board of Directors left by David Flick when he moved from Arbuckle Association.
- 3. **OBU's Bylaws Amended**—The Board of Trustees at Oklahoma Baptist University made a study of the Bylaws of the University and asked that the Board of Directors approve the changes. The Convention's Bylaws state: "The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma." Basically, the changes were in order to conform to the Convention's Constitution. The Board approved the changes and the amend-

ed Bylaws are printed along with other governing documents, in the front section of this annual.

May Recommendations and Approvals-

- 1. Endowment Income Funds to Be Used—There is an economic recession in Oklahoma, and an assessment of business and governmental leaders indicated that Oklahoma economy will continue to be slow on into 1986. Although the churches are continuing to give faithfully, it appears that there will be a shortfall for the basic budget in 1985. Cost saving procedures were instituted. As an additional safeguard, the Board approved a recommendation that all endowment earnings produced by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for Convention departments, unless otherwise restricted, be applied to the 1985 and 1986 budgets for the appropriate departments.
- 2. Replacements for Unexpired Terms on Board—Since the annual meeting of the State Convention, five Board members moved outside the associational areas from which they were elected. The Convention's Bylaws state: "In case of any vacancy on the Board of Directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term." The following were elected:

- 3. Lump-Sum Payment of Annuity Benefits—The Board voted for the Lump-Sum Payment of Benefits Amendment to the Church and Convention Annuity Plans. This allows for lump-sum payment of benefits if the value of the benefit does not exceed \$3,500. The limit under prior law, and as currently allowed by Subsection 7.4 of the Church or Convention Annuity Plan is \$1,750.
- 4. Transfer of Accumulations Amendment to Church and Convention Annuity Plans—Approval was given for the Transfer of Accumulations Amendment to the Church and Convention Annuity Plans, effective July 1, 1985, to permit members to transfer once each month certain accumulations invested in the Fixed, Balanced, Short-Term, or Variable Funds to any other of these four funds.

September Report and Recommendations—

1. Abernathy Resigns—Announcement was made that Jerry Don Abernathy has resigned as director of evangelism to become co-pastor of Riverside Church, Denver, Colorado. The process was set in order to find a replacement.

Recommendations

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1986 be \$17,746,300 to be distributed as follows: 50 percent Southern Baptist Convention and 50 percent State, with the 50 percent to Southern Baptist Convention being distributed on a weekly basis. Of the 50 percent State, Oklahoma Baptist University will receive 26.8 percent, The Baptist Foundation 3.8 percent, and the remaining departments and agencies will

receive 69.4 percent. All funds beyond the budget will be distributed on the same percentage basis. This process will enable the Executive Director-Treasurer to keep Cooperative Program expenditures in line with Cooperative Program income.

2. That the 1986 Cooperative Program be distributed as outlined:

Oklahoma Baptist University

Seventy-five years! From the red clay dust of a buffalo wallow in a remote area of the country known for years as Indian Territory has risen an institution which has made a significant impact on higher education in middle America. Prominent doctors, lawyers, business men and women; educators, ministers, missionaries, nurses; an astronaut, authors, performers and public servants of every description all find their common roots in the red clay of Bison Hill. All because of a vision!

Oklahoma Baptists had a vision, one hammered out over years of struggle, disappointment and multiple difficulty. They saw a need for a quality Christian institution of higher education here on the frontier.

Those who established this university took its educational mission seriously and committed themselves to see that this institution was not limited in its purpose and scope. Theirs was a vision of comprehensive educational service that would seek to respond to the needs of people.

That vision went a step further. They not only dreamed of an educational experience of the highest quality, they longed for an educational experience that would be uniquely and distinctively Christian with an obvious Baptist flavor. They dreamed of an institution that would not only have a reputation for academic excellence, but would also be noted for the spiritual impact it made upon the lives of students and the subsequent spiritual impact those students would make on their world.

Now 75 years later, Oklahoma Baptist University remains committed to the vision of those founders. The university's 75th anniversary theme, "The Vision Remembered—The Vision Renewed," reflects this continuing commitment.

The idea of vision also is present in OBU's ongoing Vision for Excellence capital campaign. At the close of the university's 1984-85 fiscal year, more than \$8.71 million in gifts and pledges had been raised through the campaign, which has a base goal of \$6 million and a challenge goal of \$10.25 million. Funds from the campaign will be used for construction, renovation and endowment projects.

Three of the campaign's first-phase projects were begun during the 1984-85 year. Ground was broken November 27, 1984 for the W. P. Wood Science Building. The facility will include classrooms, laboratories

and offices for the areas of biology, chemistry and physics, along with a science museum and planetarium.

The science building is being named in honor of the late W. P. Wood, establisher of the Wood Trusts, which provided a lead gift for the construction project. Other major gifts for the facility have been contributed by Kresge Foundation of Troy, Michigan, and the Mabee Foundation of Tulsa.

Renovation work began during the spring of 1985 to convert the former Women's Building/Theater Annex into the Sarkeys Telecommunications Center. The facility will house video production facilities, a theater and classroom and office space. The facility is being named in honor of the Sarkeys Foundation, which provided a lead gift for the project.

Construction of a second unit of apartments for married students also was begun and nearly completed during the 1984-85 year. The apartments are being named in honor of Roy E. and Jessie Newman Cobbs, parents of Mrs. Elmer Burns of Nowata. Mrs. Burns and her husband provided the lead gift for the project.

Additional living space for married students was provided by OBU's purchase of an existing apartment complex. These apartments have been renamed as the Ray and Fredda Devereaux Apartments, in honor of the donors of the funds for the purchase.

The Vision for Excellence Campaign is being conducted in several phases. A campaign for faculty and staff completed in 1983-84 exceeded its challenge goal by pledging over \$238,000. The Tulsa campaign exceeded its challenge goal with a total of \$1,020,995. Campaigns still under way during 1984-85 included the alumni campaign, which is nearing the \$2 million mark; trustees-former trustees campaign, which has resulted in almost \$600,000; and the Oklahoma City campaign, which almost has reached its \$1 million victory goal.

OBU's vision for the future included setting goals in the area of student enrollment. The university registered the highest percentage increase in student enrollment in Oklahoma. OBU's fall 1984 enrollment was 1,590 students, a 4.1 percent increase over 1983.

In addition to new students, several new members also joined the OBU faculty and staff. New faculty members included Larry Allen, assistant professor of business; Journey Beard, instructor of health, physical education and recreation and women's basketball coach; Judith Briggs Coker, visiting assistant professor of English; Robert A. Dawson, assistant professor of religion; Gary Doby, assistant professor of education; Stephen Goforth, instructor of music; Roger Hadley, associate professor of telecommunications; Cynthia Hanchey, assistant professor of computer science; Dale Hanchey, assistant professor of computer science and McCasland professor of business; Carol Humphrey, assistant professor of history; Darrel Johnson, assistant professor of health, physical education and recreation and men's basketball coach; Gary Mayfield, assistant professor of sociology; Gregory McAdoo, instructor in physics; Diane Everson Morgan, visiting instructor in English; William Mullins,

associate professor of history; Harvey Weber, instructor in business/health, physical education and recreation and tennis coach; Mike Wilson, missionary-in-residence; James Worley, visiting instructor of communication arts; Sue Yarbrough, instructor in nursing, and Gladys Zausmer, assistant professor of nursing.

New staff members included Larry Brumley, director of public relations; Pam Clark Fletcher, admissions counselor; Sharon Goforth, campus ministry intern; Mae Jennings, assistant director of alumni/development; Don Jones, director of planned giving; Ronald Pettit, director of food service, and Teri Young, director of Geiger Center and student activities.

Two vice-presidents and two deans were appointed during 1984-85. Mack Roark accepted the position of vice-president for religious life, and David Sallee became vice-president for admissions. Jerome Lake was appointed dean of OBU's School of Business and Administration. Dick Rader, who had been serving as acting dean, became dean of OBU's School of Christian Service.

OBU students participated in a number of spiritual growth opportunities. More than 60 OBU student served in various roles through summer mission programs. Numerous other students took part in revival teams, discipleship training, Bible studies and Ministerial Practical Experience Days.

A number of guests also came to the OBU campus to address students in various settings. Lloyd Elder, president of the Baptist Sunday School Board, and George Wilson, president of Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary, were among the year's chapel speakers. Grady Wilson, a member of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, led the fall campus revival. Walter B. Shurden, Callaway professor of Christianity at Mercer University, served as OBU's ninth Hobbs Lecturer, while Robert Baker, professor emeritus of church history at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, presented the Hobbs Lecture in the spring. Wendell Belew, director of missions for the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board, led the campus' Missions Emphasis Week during the fall.

In an attempt to assist in bringing speakers to campus, the family of Thomas Harlan Henry, longtime Shawnee citizen and educator, established the Henry Lectureship in Oklahoma Heritage. The gift will provide a series of lectures to bring to the OBU campus prominent public servants who have a perspective on Oklahoma history and heritage with a special focus on Oklahoma's contribution to world affairs.

During the spring, OBU trustees approved a record budget for 1985-86 of \$11.28 million. The university balanced its budget for 1984-85, the 10th consecutive year the institution has accomplished that feat.

This past year has been one of growth and blessing. In the face of the many pressures, the almost overwhelming challenges, the seemingly unsurmountable obstacles, however, do we dare dream of a growing university, increasing in strength, attempting to make an even more profound impact upon the world?

Our 75 years of heritage compel us. We have no choice. We must dare. We must dream. We must make the vision become reality.

Religious Education Department

Bill C. Haggard, Director

In this climactic and final year of "8.5 By '85," the blessing of God has been evidenced in the churches of Oklahoma. Although all reports are not in, it now appears that 1984-85 will be another recordbreaking year for the work of your department of religious education. For this we thank God!

Religious Education Staff

This past year has been a year of continued strength because of an efficient staff.

The field staff consists of the department director; Robert Audd, director of Church Training; Billy Allen, director of adult education and associational projects; David Fuller, director of youth work and Vacation Bible School, and Darlene Koch, director of childhood education.

Serving on the secretarial staff are Joan Eischen, secretary to Haggard; Sybil Cox, secretary to Audd; Donas Cook, secretary to Allen; Lou Rodriquez, secretary to Fuller, and Olive Hays, secretary to Koch.

Statistics

Sunday Schools continue to grow in Oklahoma. In October 1984, when all statistics were reported, the total Sunday School enrollment had reached 383,035, an increase of about 2,700 over the previous year. This marked the 13th consecutive year of increase for Sunday School enrollment in Oklahoma. Our goal is 400,000 enrolled by September 31, 1985. With God's help, we will reach or exceed that goal with an emphasis on "From Here to Victory." Nationally, Sunday School enrollment in Southern Baptist Churches reached 7,857,337 on our way to "8.5 By '85."

Vacation Bible School reported an enrollment of 140,584 in 1,266 schools. This represents a slight decrease under the previous year. There were 2,466 professions of faith and 23,508 prospects were located. Follow-up on the previous year's prospects revealed that 7,074 prospects were cultivated, and 1,387 or 19.6 percent of them were enrolled in Sunday School as a result. Of this number 503 made professions of faith.

Church Training reported a net enrollment of 97,351, which is an increase of 1,058 over the previous year. This represents the largest total increase in Church Training enrollment in many years. New interest is being shown in the equipping center modules and the MasterLife program.

Projects and Emphases

A fourth in the series of "Glorieta in Oklahoma" Sunday School Leadership Conferences was conducted on April 1-2, 1985 at Enid with about 1,500 leaders and workers attending. This project was sponsored jointly by the department of religious education and six associations. Associational projects provide one of the strongest means of Sunday School growth in Oklahoma. This past year, 238 ASSIST members received training at the annual faculty institute. Many associations conducted associational training schools, some of which used their own ASSISTeam as the faculty. Six associations, Beckham Mills, Caddo, Johnston-Marshall, Salt Fork, Sans Bois and Union, conducted central training schools in cooperation with the state department. Eightytwo (82) percent of the associations reported a complete basis ASSISTeam. Five associations, Bryan, Cimarron, Central, Grady and Union conducted enrollment-enlargement campaigns.

Developing Believers is the theme for Church Training for the years of 1985-90. Various Church Training projects have been conducted this past year. Associational "M" Night was observed in 35 associations with 5,955 total attendance. Doctrine Week Clinics were conducted in Muskogee and Clinton on January 14-15 with 87 church leaders from 15 associations present. A Family Ministry Retreat was conducted at Falls Creek with 25 couples present. During February and March 12 associations conducted Church Training Growth Workshops with 289 participants from 121 churches.

The State Youth/Children's Bible Drills, March 24, attracted 105 from 11 associations. The speakers tournament had five participants. The Bold Growth in Discipleship Team Training reached 164 leaders. Other projects included a media center conference, a MasterLife Workshop at Falls Creek, and a series of area Church Training leadership conferences.

Church Music

State Leadership Training

The Church Music Department served Oklahoma in the following ways: Baptist Education Music Association, February 7-8, Oklahoma Baptist University; State Youth Choir and Ensemble Festivals, January 18-19, Trinity Baptist Church, Norman, and February 22-23, First Baptist Church, Muskogee; State Handbell Festival, February 2, Oklahoma Baptist University; five Area Hymn Playing Festivals: First Baptist Church, Enid; Southern Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City; Memorial Baptist Church, Tulsa; First Baptist Church, Duncan; and First Baptist Church, McAlester, January 26. Statewide Hymn Playing Festival, Oklahoma Baptist University, February 16; State Training Meeting for Associational Officers, April 26-27, First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City; Young Musicians' Festival, April 20, Oklahoma Baptist University; Senior Adult State Singin' and Praisin' Meeting, Council Road Baptist Church, Bethany, April 11-12; State Methods and Materials Conferences, Southern Hills Baptist Church, Tulsa, August 19-20, and Nichols Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, August 22-23; State Adult Choir Retreat, Falls Creek, September 6-7.

Southern Baptist Leadership Training

We also provided promotion and encouragement to the following church music training opportunities: Southern Baptist Church Music Conference, Dallas, Texas, June 9-10; Church Music Weeks at Ridgecrest, June 13-26, and Glorieta, Jula 1-13; Music Conference, Baylor University, July 29-31; Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Church Music Workshop, January 28-February 1.

Supportive Help

In addition to the regular programming that the Church Music Department does, we are pleased to support the other agencies and departments of our convention. This year we had the privilege of assisting 10 of our departments and agencies in planning and executing their programs.

Singing Churchmen

This has been a very busy year for the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma. It continues to grow and give encouragement to the music leadership of our churches. We had over 115 men enrolled in the organization this year with seven performances and rehearsal choral clinics within the state. We also did a major recording session producing a new album for the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma. This is the first time we have done anything like this in about 15 years. We were

a part of the program, by invitation, of the Southern Baptist Church Music Conference in Dallas, Texas, June 10. We opened the second week of music week at Glorieta on Sunday night, July 7. October 10-25 we took a small group of the Churchmen to Spain to participate in the Spain partnership wth Oklahoma Baptists. We encourage all full-time music directors to be a part of this organization. If you have questions concerning The Singing Churchmen, please contact the office.

Falls Creek

Falls Creek is always one of the most exciting parts of our work. We had over 1600 young people and adults participate in our choir and instrumental programs this year. We had 32 young people make a life commitment to the music ministry.

Readin' and Singin' Schools

Thanks to the progressive insight of directors of missions and associational music directors, needs for musical growth are being met. Associations are still providing help for the untrained musicians in the form of five week Church Music Readin' and Singin' Schools. The Concord-Kiowa Baptist Association hosted a school this year, and the Craig-Mayes and Kay Baptist Associations have schools scheduled this fall.

Pilot Project

Along the same line as Church Music Readin' and Singin' Schools, Union Association hosted a school for keyboard leaders. The school was the first of its kind for us. Over a three-week period organists and pianists improved keyboard skills with classroom study. The results were most positive, and we look forward to other custom designed keyboard schools.

Statistical Report

The figures released by the Southern Baptist Convention's statistical department show that Oklahoma Baptist churches were down a little bit this past year in the number of people involved in their music ministries. This is the first time we have shown a decrease in many, many years. However, I feel one of the biggest problems we have is getting our churches to report on the annual church letter. We have 27 percent of our churches that we need to hear from. I want to continue to urge all churches to report their church music enrollment on their annual church letter.

Your Church Music Department is made up of Glenn Boyd, director; Paul Magar, associate director; Mary June Tabor, assistant; Judy Enegren, secretary. We are happy to be a part of Oklahoma Baptists working together to reach the world for our Lord Jesus.

Baptist Student Union

Bob Lee, Director

Baptist Student Union experienced another good year across our state. Student involvement in the various ministries continued to grow and support by churches and associations also increased.

Over 800 students came to know the Lord as a result of evangelistic efforts sponsored by the various BSU programs. Several hundred students were involved in witness training projects. Over 500 Bible study groups met each week with about 5,000 students participating. These studies were led by either BSU Directors or trained students and took place in Baptist Student Centers, dormitory rooms, apartment complexes, sorority or fraternity houses and/or other campus facilities.

Seventy-five students served as summer missionaries in Oklahoma and many other states as well as Germany and Haiti. Almost \$120,000 was raised by Oklahoma BSU students to fund this mission program. Approximately \$50,000 helped support BSU programs on 19 different campuses in new convention areas where BSU work is just getting started. In addition, eight Oklahoma BSU'ers who have graduated from college served as Mission Service Corp volunteers starting new BSU programs and assisting local churches in Oregon and Washington. Nearly 1,000 students participated in various short-term mission projects during the year as well.

The Student Department experienced changes in positions and personnel. Three new Associate BSU Directors were employed: Roxanna Boaldin at Tulsa Junior College, Donna Wright at Panhandle State and Gladie Beck at Oklahoma State University. Sharon Goforth and Jody Johnson serve as BSU Student Interns at OBU and Gary Garrett at Oklahoma City Community College. These BSU Directors were employed during the year. John Lacy left the state and Steve Lewis took his place as BSU Director at Western Oklahoma State. Rosemary Lackey became the BSU Director at Phillips University, replacing Dan Marantica.

Building on the philosophy of student work suggested by the National Student Ministries, Oklahoma BSU has chosen four areas of primary ministry: evangelism, missions, Bible study and discipleship. These four areas represent the Oklahoma BSU commitment to quality in ministry to students on our state college and university campuses.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Director

There are nine members on the Historical Commission. They are elected annually by the convention to three-year staggered terms. The Commission's stated purpose is to collect, preserve, and utilize Oklahoma Baptist history. It works with state Baptist institutions, associations, and churches in implementing these stated purposes by con-

stantly encouraging the values inherent in a better awareness of Baptist heritage. The Commission is funded by the Cooperative Program.

Meetings

Through the years it has been the Commission's practice to hold two meetings each year. This year's meetings were held at the Baptist Building on April 9, and September 10. Slayden Yarbrough served as chairman.

Historical Society

This question is asked frequently: What is the connection between the Historical Commission and the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society? The Commission was created first (1952) by act of the state convention. Its members are elected by and are responsible to the convention. The Society was formed in 1956 as auxiliary to the Commission. Its membership is composed of all persons interested in the work of the Commission and Society. Dues are \$2 per year for Annual Membership, or \$25 for a Life Membership. The past two years Russell Newville has been president of the Society. The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle is the official historical journal of the Commission/Society. It is mailed without charge to all active members of the Historical Society. J. M. Gaskin has been editor since the Chronicle was founded in 1958.

Oklahoma Baptist Collection

The Oklahoma Baptist Collection is housed in the library at Oklahoma Baptist University. Its director is the convention's director of history. The collection consists of thousands of convention and associational Annuals; books—mostly on some field of history; doctoral dissertations and many other manuscripts; pictures, museum pieces, and a variety of other Baptist memorabilia. This year the collection experienced its second expansion. This was effected when OBU built its own space for Archives and a Museum. When OBU moved out, the Baptist Collection gained three full-length stacks and about 800 or more square feet of floor space. This added space will house the collection for many years to come.

The collection room is open each afternoon (and by appointment). The director is on duty much of the time, and each afternoon his work is supplemented by a student assistant. Becky Foster is in her second year in this position.

Historical Markers

During 1985, the Commission erected two historical markers. One was dedicated June 1, on the grounds of the Leon Baptist Church in partial commemoration of the centennial of the Enon Baptist Association. The other was dedicated July 10, to mark the spot where a white cottage once stood. In 1941, Baptists from churches in 10 southeastern Oklahoma counties gathered there to organize and form the Kiamichi Baptist Assembly. The Commission bore the full cost of the KBA marker, and one-half of the cost to erect the Enon marker. Each marker cost \$850.

Baptist Women

About 13 years ago, Miss Abbie Louise Green asked J. M. Gaskin to write the history of Baptist women's work in Oklahoma. The book was completed in early 1985. The title is **Baptist Women in Oklahoma**. Early plans called for Gaskin to be present for an autograph party for the book at 4:30 p.m. on Monday of this convention session. The Historical Society and Woman's Missionary Union of Oklahoma scheduled a joint meeting on the same Monday evening with Albert McClellan and J. M. Gaskin among the speakers, following the Society's annual dinner meeting.

Director's Report

The Director of History submitted a detailed report of his activities to the Historical Commission on Sept. 10, 1985. Highlights of the report included work involved in writing script, ordering, erecting, and dedicating the two historical markers; completion of the manuscript for **Baptist Women**; edited two numbers of **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**; conducted about 20 conferences and seminars in churches and associations; assisted in planning numerous anniversaries; supervised the rearrangement of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection; established the GASKIN CHURCH HISTORY AWARD; wrote Part I of the history of OBU; did about 15 oral history interviews; retrieved a number of small historical collections from individuals; developed and delivered on several occasions a historical monologue, "A Pilgrim Whose Name Was Baptist;" worked with a number of churches and associations in planning their anniversaries and writing their histories.

Recommendations

The Historical Commission recommends the following projects for consideration in 1985-86, or later:

- 1. The publication of a small book on the life of F. M. McConnel who was state secretary (director) in Oklahoma in 1916-22. J. M. Gaskin was commissioned to write the book.
- 2. The publication of a second edition of Southern Baptists: Who Are We? by Slayden A. Yarbrough.
- 3. The erection of two historical markers—with possible sites being Stuart, where T. B. Lackey held his first pastorate to begin his illustrious career in Oklahoma; and the former location of the Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home, founded in 1903.
- 4. Using **Baptist Women in Oklahoma** in Baptist Heritage studies in June 1986, with the study guide prepared by Mrs. Fern Hurt helping to implement the studies.
- 5. Consider developing a VCR project on Oklahoma Baptist history (in 1986, or later).
- 6. Study plans to initiate a Distinguished Service Award or Meritorious Service Award in the field of Oklahoma Baptist history.

Ministerial Services

Clyde Cain, Director

The Office of Ministerial Services provides a general ministry of: (1) Information to churches, pastors and staff members, and (2) Continuing Education.

Services to Pastors and Staff

Ministerial Crises—Due to the fact that we are presently experiencing several pastors and staff members being coerced to resign or terminated, a special Ministerial Crises Committee has been established. This committee determines necessary assistance for the individual who has experienced termination. Some limited financial assistance may be given on a short-term basis to provide a ministry of encouragement and financial help due to termination or forced resignation. A ministry of counseling is also included in the assistance provided.

Personal Retreat, Falls Creek—Arrangements have been made with Falls Creek Conference Center to provide certain cabins to pastors, staff and their families at a reduced, supplemented cost. This is an attempt to provide a place for the staff member and his family for a personal retreat. Pastors and staff are also encouraged to seek out such a place at an associational camp that might provide the same kind of relaxed atmosphere. However, no financial assistance is provided for the associational retreat setting.

Career Assessment Seminar—A seminar designed especially for the pastor/staff member, to take an indepth look at their ministries including: goals and aspirations, as well as struggles. Special emphasis is given to relationships, leadership styles, problems and solutions, reflections on ministry and goals for future ministry. A limited number are invited to the Career Assessment Seminar each year.

Services to Churches

Information on Calling a Pastor—The informational service provided primarily through biographical information sheets continues to be a growing ministry. In 1984 there were over 3,100 resumes shared with churches in Oklahoma and other states. In 1983 there were 2,468 resumes shared. These include resumes on pastors and staff personnel and are provided without recommendation or endorsement. They are sent by request.

Assistance is also given in counseling with search committees upon request and securing of pulpit supply and/or interim pastor on request. If a pastor needs to be out of his pulpit, assistance is given in securing a pulpit supply.

A new packet of materials, "On Calling A Pastor," has been written and produced to provide assistance for pastorless churches.

Continuing Education

State Bible Conference—The annual State Bible Conference provides detailed study for the January Bible Study book and the Baptist Doctrine Study emphasis. The conference was conducted May 6-9, 1985

with an emphasis on Hebrews, the January Bible Study book for 1986 and the Doctrine of the Laity, which is the doctrinal emphasis for the spring of 1986. Over 300 registrants attended the conference.

Ministry Training Institute—A new approach to education has been instituted in the "Ministry Training Institute." This ministry is designed with a cooperative relationship between OBU and the BGCO to provide courses of study toward the Baccalaureate Degree or the Associate Degree at OBU, or toward the Associate of Divinity Degree at any of our six Southern Baptist seminaries. Courses of study are also available with CEU credit only. Any certificate of diploma level course is available for pastors, staff members and lay persons. We currently have 15 centers, in addition, we also have 13 Seminary Extension centers.

The director of the Ministry Training Institute is Dick Rader, dean of the School of Christian Service at OBU. The program coordinator is Clyde Cain, director of Ministerial Services for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Southwestern Study Center—A record number of students was enrolled at the Southwestern Seminary Study Center at OBU with 122 students during the spring of 1985. Conferences have also been conducted with students on four seminary campuses and Oklahoma Clubs on these campuses met, enjoyed fellowship and a banquet sponsored by the BGCO.

Seminary Extension—Nine Seminary Extension Centers are currently active in Oklahoma. These centers are providing training for approximately 120 students. Some centers have switched to the Ministry Training Institute and, therefore, are not counted as Seminary Extension Centers. In addition to Seminary Extension studies being available through the centers, approximately 125 students in Oklahoma are participating in the Independent Study program through Seminary Extension.

Annuity Services

J. T. Roberts, Director

The Annuity Board continued its reputation in 1984 of being a strong and financially sound Southern Baptist institution.

Total assets administered by the Board as of December 31, 1984 were \$1,430,966,407 compared with \$1,251,643,084 December 31, 1983.

Investment income for 1984 totalled \$115,374,232. Earnings on retirement and related funds for the six months ended June 30, 1985 totalled \$73,142,522. This compares to \$17,860,781 for the first half of 1984 or an increase of \$55,281,741.

As of June 30, 1985, assests held in trust by the Annuity Board totalled \$1,562,021,356. This is an increase of \$253,083,356 over June 30, 1984.

Premiums and dues through the first two quarters of this year reached \$60,947,044 compared with \$52,551,012 a year earlier.

As of June 30 this year, the Board paid a total of \$22,275,327 in benefits to 15,123 annuitants (540 in Oklahoma).

Oklahoma has 1,507 churches and associations; 1,330 employees participating.

Through June, with a total of 37,955 churches and associations, there were 31,350 employees participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program. The number of new retirement applications received for Oklahoma during the first six months was 65. The following Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program:

Cooperative Missions

Robert E. Haskins, Director

Missions is alive, well and growing in Oklahoma. The year 1985 has seen progress in every area. The Holy Spirit is blowing Oklahoma Baptists across new frontiers and is bringing new life in traditional ministries.

Language Missions

Every month this year a new language work has been started. Six of these are Indian Missions; one is a Korean Mission; three are Spanish Missions; one is a Vietnamese Mission and one is a Chinese Mission.

Thirty-five full-time and 20 part-time missionaries work with American Indians, Koreans, Laotians, Chinese, Japanese, Vietnamese, Thais, Indonesians, Russian Jews, French, Afghans, Asian Indians, Deaf, etc. They traveled over a half million miles in their mission work and reported more than 1,700 professions of faith, additions by letter and special service commitments.

A new work was begun with Internationals in Edmond. Dan Marantica, an Indonesian, was appointed as a missionary coordinatior for International Ministries at First Baptist Church, Edmond.

The Chinese had their second annual Falls Creek encampment with over 100 attending the four-day camp. Eighteen people from the two Chinese churches attended the special Chinese Sunday School Week at Glorieta Baptist Conference Center, August 19-24.

Danny Bice, State Missionary to the Deaf, and Jari Saavalainen participated in the special Deaf Olympics held in Los Angeles, California in July.

The largest Indian Falls Creek Assembly in its history was held June 17-21 with 2,250 people registered. John Goodrich, evangelist from Cherokee Baptist Association, served as camp pastor. Tyrone Smith, minister of music at Sunnylane Baptist Church in Del City, served as music director. A special children's worship was conducted each day by Jimmy Anderson.

Our largest State Spanish Camp was held at Falls Creek June 10-14 with 233 registered. Daniel Caceres, missionary-pastor from Clinton, served as camp director. There were 58 professions of faith.

The State Indian Leadership Conference was held at First Indian Baptist Church, Ada, October 10-12. Jack Comer, multi-ethnic catalytic missionary, served for the second year as director.

The fourth Annual State Hispanic Workshop was held at First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, October 11-12. Age level conferences were

provided for Sunday School teachers and general officers. The Sunday School Board, in cooperation with the State Missions and Religious Education Departments, provided the conference leaders. Angel Murillo, Southwest Area Hispanic Catalytic Missionary, is the State Hispanic Religious Education Coordinator.

Five Indian, four Hispanic and one Chinese Crusades were conducted this year. Hundreds of people made meaningful decisions for Christ.

Church Extension

Two Area Church Planters, a Church Planter Apprentice and a Church Planter Pastor work in our state. At least 20 new churches/missions and mission points have been established since October 1984. Our goal for the year was 41. We will need to begin 25 new churches per year between now and 1990.

Campers on Mission

The Spring and Fall Rallies were held at the Post Oak and Little Axe Assigned Area of Clear Bay State Park.

The Spring Rally program included a drama group from First Baptist Church, Bethany, and Robert Haskins led the training in the use of Big "A" Club's for reaching children.

Resort Missions

More than 800 children attended Day Camp held by summer missionaries on the various lakes in Oklahoma this summer.

Through the summer mission program, associational programs and local church programs, witnessing ministries, Backyard Bible Clubs and Mission Vacation Bible Schools were provided in at least 15 recreational areas. "Bo" Holland and two summer missionaries coordinated the Day Camps on Lake Tenkiller.

US-2

Maxine Locklear, Lumbe Indian from North Carolina, completed her third year as a US-2er. She worked with the Southern Cheyenne/Arapaho Area. She assisted the first Indian Baptist Church, Clinton and the Weatherford and Thomas Indian Missions.

Christian Service Corps

At least 35 individuals and 25 groups (ranging from 5-50 persons) have assisted with more than 17 different mission projects in our state. Eleven of the projects were building projects, two were Indian projects and five were inner-city projects. More than 500 people came from Missouri, Texas, North Carolina, South Carolina, Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Kentucky and Oklahoma to assist. Oliver Barnes, State Construction Coordinator from Chattanooga, coordinated the construction projects.

Chaplaincy

There are 89 chaplains serving in Oklahoma this year. They serve in hospitals, institutions, military, police and fire departments, etc.

A retreat for the Chaplains and their spouses was held at the Falls Creek Baptist Conference Center, September 6 and 7. Walter Jackson, Director of Pastoral Care at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, was guest speaker.

The 1985 officers of the Chaplains' Fellowship are Kim Mahn, president; Darlene Sellers, vice-president; Bill Forester, secretary.

Interfaith Witness

A statewide youth Interfaith Conference was held in Knob Hill Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. An Awareness conference was held in Rogers Association and approximately 400 people attended both the conferences. The subjects studied were Mormonism, Jehovah's Witness, The Way International and World Religions.

Mission Service Corps

Fourteen Oklahomans have been assigned to mission projects in Oklahoma and other states. Two Mission Service Corps volunteers were assigned to mission projects in Oklahoma. Eighteen Oklahomans have applied for Mission Service Corps appointment and five requests have come from churches and associations for Mission Service Corps volunteers.

Black Church Relations

Four missionaries jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention work in the area of Black Church Relations. Dr. Eddie Mabry is the Dean of the School of Religion in Tulsa and directs the program of Christian Education for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention. Verlene Farmer is the Baptist Student Union director of Langston University and teaches some courses in religion for the university. Clarence Shuler is a Regional Missionary in Eastern Oklahoma serving as director of Rural Church Development. Patricia Reed is the WMU Executive Secretary for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and directs the woman's work of the convention. A fifth missionary, Reverend Urban Green, and his wife, Loretta, Education Center Director in Tulsa, resigned in September 1984, to return to Nigeria as foreign missionaries. This position remains vacant since his resignation.

The School of Religion in Tulsa, with 11 learning centers across the state, had 878 adults enrolled in at least one course. There were 2,602 people reached through study courses. Thirty-nine workshops and institutes were held with 903 people receiving certificates, diplomas and awards.

The BSU at Langston has been very active during the year. Four students served as summer missionaries for nine weeks during the summer of 1985. Four students accepted Christ during the BSU Spring Revival. Fifteen BSU students went to the 36th Annual Student Missions Conference at Southwestern Seminary and two of them made commitments to missions at the conference. The BSU was given a large trophy at the Spring Awards Dinner for being the outstanding non-Greek

organization on campus. They reached their \$2,200 goal for summer missions.

An assist team from Tulsa and one from Oklahoma City attended the Small Sunday School Week at Glorieta, August 19-23, 1985. They received special training so that they will be able to train other Sunday School leaders when invited to do so.

Church-Community Ministries

This is the Oklahoma name for the area of ministries which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries.

Five missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local associations are serving in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are associational directors of church-community ministries, Jack Bettis, Capital Association, and Richard Humble, Tulsa Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Gray, Oklahoma City, and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa; and Women's Shelter director, Sharyan Utley. Financial assistance is provided the directors of the Baptist Women's Center and Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City. Connie Crew and Lee Martin are the directors respectively.

The missionaries reported 349 professions of faith, 25 baptisms and 121 special decisions. They delivered 604 sermons and addresses during the year.

Grace Rescue Mission reported approximately 21 men per month on an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program. Meals were provided for 195,392 transients and rehabilitation program people and 80,162 beds were provided.

Oklahoma City, Baptist Women's Center reported that 23,852 meals were provided and 8,415 beds furnished for 707 women and children.

The Baptist Mission Center, Oklahoma City reports that 56,110 pieces of clothing were distributed; 5,391 people helped with food; \$118,420 worth of medical care and \$8,784 worth of free dental care provided.

The Women's Shelter, Tulsa housed 178 children and 233 women. They reported 34 professions of faith. In February the shelter celebrated its fifth anniversary. Selma Talbert is the new assistant.

The Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa had six weeks of Vacation Bible School and ministered to approximately 200 children per day. Two hundred and fifty-seven young people were presented packets of personal hygiene at the Clown's Christmas Party.

A group of students at Oklahoma Baptist University receive some expense money which makes it possible for them to be involved in community ministries. The strongest work has been at the Baptist Mission Center in Oklahoma City. Usually three car loads participate each Friday. Students tutor, provide recreation, minister, counsel and do whatever ministry is needed. A ministry at the Tecumseh Juvenile Center was started this year.

Workers in literacy missions are continuing to be trained. All sec-

tions of the state have leaders who can lead workshops to train others in literacy missions. One statewide workshop was held during the year with 46 people attending the three-day event. The need for literacy missions volunteers is great. Our state continues to attract internationals at an increased rate.

Alfalit training was provided this year. This trains Spanish speaking people how to help Spanish speaking non-readers to become literate in their own language. The needs are growing in our state for this type training. Literacy missions provides a good opportunity for sharing the gospel.

Pact

Project: Assistance for Churches in Transitional Communities (PACT) is a Home Mission Board-developed program to respond to a church's request for help when it discovers itself located in a significantly changing community. PACT helps a church to rediscover its mission and to redream its dream as well as plan programs for reaching and ministering to the people in the church and its community.

Bob Lovejoy is the state PACT coordinator. He has helped one church this year. Contact the Missions Department for more information.

Student Summer Missions

Twenty-eight Oklahoma college young people served for nine weeks in missions all across Oklahoma during the summer of 1985. They served in rural, inner city, language, resort, metropolitan and general missions in 17 different areas of the state. Their work included surveys, Vacation Bible Schools, construction projects, backyard Bible clubs, mission center activities, Boy Scout Camp chaplains, resort missions, counselors in camps, language missions and a host of other responsibilities. Several of the students made commitments to full-time Christian service during the summer.

Refugee Sponsorship

Baptist churches are still being sought as sponsors for refugees who are seeking to come to our country. They are leaving their own country either for political or religious oppression. They must have sponsors before they are permitted to come to the United States. This year we have been asked to provide sponsorship for people from eastern Europe as well as Indo-Chinese people. Sponsorship provides an excellent opportunity for sharing Christ.

Brotherhood

Laddie R. Adams, Director

SBC Brotherhood enrollment increased to 568,383 and Oklahoma Brotherhood had an increase of 165 for a total enrollment of 18,210. For the church year October 1, 1984 through September 30, 1985—101 more churches registered Brotherhood work for a total of 632 churches with 431 Baptist Men's Units, 767 Royal Ambassador Chapters (551 Crusader, 145 Pioneer, 71 Combined) reported.

- March 11-12—Laddie Adams and Pete Walmer attended National VOAID meeting in Texas
- April 12-13—Camp Hudgens hosted 21 Missionary Kids for annual retreat

- April 22-23—52 Associational Brotherhood Officers received training at Annual Meeting, Oklahoma City

Eight weeks of RA Camp were held for 753 campers and 192 staff. There were 52 professions of faith, 95 rededications and 118 surrendered for special service

Along with Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for the three weeks of prayer for missions (Edna McMillan, Annie Armstrong and Lottie Moon)

July 27-28—In conjunction with National Ham Radio Meeting, the Oklahoma Baptist Hams met and sponsored a worship service for 30 of our Hams

August 26-27, September 16-17—318 local Brotherhood officers received training in Brotherhood (Baptist Men and/or Royal Ambassadors) in eight Area Training Sessions.

As always the assignment of Disaster Relief kept Brotherhood very active. During the year a new 45-foot trailer was customized for feeding, communications and first aid. Approximately \$15,000 was spent preparing this new unit and over 1,000 man-hours were donated by volunteer crew members. On April 12 a 1975 Peter-Bilt twin-screw tractor was purchased for \$15,500 to pull the feeding unit. The old unit and tractor were transferred to Panhandle Association which has agreed to prepare it for use in disasters in the western part of the state where it is much needed. This will enable Oklahoma Baptists to meet the immediate needs of all Oklahomans during disasters. On April 6 the new unit was dedicated and the Child Care Unit was on display at the Baptist Building. The volunteer crew prepared a "disaster" meal for the 60 present.

On September 26, 1985 the Foreign Mission Board requested our large Mobile Disaster Unit to go to Mexico City to assist in the feeding

of the homeless following the earthquakes.

A crew of 12 men left with three vehicles on Friday, September 27. A relief crew of 12 men was flown in (courtesy of American Airlines) on Saturday, October 5, with the original crew being flown out the same day. The men served 3,000 to 4,000 meals per day the first week. It is estimated a total of at least 30 volunteers will serve on our unit from Oklahoma before anticipated pull-out of mobile feeding on October 18. Reports from our missionaries there say up to 300 professions of faith each day are being registered. The men are still serving as this report is being written.

Oklahoma Baptists had the opportunity of giving \$15,500 in immediate direct financial aid to 39 families which represented seven

associations.

World Hunger developments, information and materials were provided as requested.

The four pilot associations for the Brotherhood Venture enlargement program showed an increase of 15 Baptist Men and/or Royal Ambassador Units. If the program is this successful in the other associations our reports will certainly show increases for the next years.

Joe Herndon, Volunteer Projects Personnel Coordinator, reports 90 volunteers gave 15 weeks in eight different locations from nearby Colorado to Bordeaux, France this year.

Woman's Missionary Union

Frances Grafton, Director

During 1984-85 Woman's Missionary Union had the emphasis, "By Love Compelled." Members were encouraged to minister within the complexity of urban life and seek to involve each church member in a lifestyle of personal ministry and witness.

WMU has been a BGCO department for four years with regular support provided by Joe L. Ingram and Lyle Garlow. Serving in the department is WMU Consultant (Girls in Action/Mission Friends), Dorothy Thayer; WMU Consultant (Acteens), Lawana Roberts; Secretary to the Director, Eula Mae Stewart; Receptionist, Carleata Horton; and Secretary, Connie Webb. As a department we:

-participated in the BGCO TIME MANAGEMENT program

—participated in GLORIETA FOREIGN MISSION WEEK spotlighting Oklahoma/Spain partnership with all BGCO departments

—are participating in preparation for Oklahoma City to be a MEGA FOCUS city in 1986 with Capital Association, Home Mission Board, Baptist General Convention Departments—Brotherhood, Church Music. Cooperative Mission, Evangelism and Religious Education

—promoted the OKLAHOMA/SPAIN PRAYER EMPHASIS for the October Renewal Crusades with the Brotherhood and Evangelism Departments

—promoted WORLD HUNGER with BGCO Christian Life Committee and Brotherhood Department

—serve on the BGCO MISSIONS COMMITTEE with the Brotherhood and Cooperative Missions Departments

—cooperate in the INTERNATIONAL FELLOWSHIP with the Baptist Student Union Department

-participated in an ASSOCIATIONAL WMU TRAINING WORKSHOP for Black WMU leadership

Baptist Women in Oklahoma, a history written by J. M. Gaskin, BGCO historian, has been completed. The book is expected to be available to the public by November 1985. It is suggested that the book be taught in the churches during Baptist Heritage month, June, 1986. Mrs. Raymond (Fern) Hurt, retired associate editor, Baptist Messenger, has written the teacher's guide.

NATIONAL BAPTIST NURSING FELLOWSHIP was organized in November, 1983 with June Whitlow, WMU/SBC, serving as Executive Director. The OKLAHOMA CHAPTER OF BAPTIST NURSING FELLOWSHIP was organized in November, 1984. Mrs. W. (Leslie) Williams was elected president and Mrs. Frances Grafton, Executive Director. This is a companion organization with Baptist Medical-Dental Fellowship. These organizations are sponsored by the Foreign Mission Board, Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union, SBC.

The NATIONAL WMU ENLISTMENT SEMINAR was held in Birmingham in June 1985. Four Oklahomans Mrs. Perry Cox, Oklahoma WMU Enlistment Coordinator; Mrs. Joshua Davis, Assistant Oklahoma WMU Enlistment Coordinator; Mrs. Dorothy Thayer,

Oklahoma WMU Tele-Conference Coordinator and Mrs. Frances Grafton, Oklahoma WMU Director, attended. The seminar focused on WMU enlistment plan VISION 88 with the goal of two million women, girls and preschoolers in quality mission education by September 1988. Oklahoma WMU goal is to have 44,691 enrolled by September 1988. In 1984 Oklahoma WMU enrollment was 35,710, a decrease of 316 from 1983.

The SEVENTY—NINTH WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION ANNUAL SESSION was held November 12-13, 1984, Council Road Baptist Church, Bethany. "Building On Our Heritage" was the theme. The program featured the women for whom the special mission offerings were named, Lottie Moon, Annie Armstrong and Edna McMillan. Bobbie Sorrill, WMU, SBC, and author of Annie Armstrong: Dreamer in Action, spoke on our heritage in home missions. The Monday evening was a joint meeting of the Baptist General Convention, Pastor's Conference and Woman's Missionary Union. During this meeting Woman's Missionary Union presented "Lottie D", a dramatic musical of the life of Lottie Moon. Mike Meece, Dallas, Texas, directed the musical. The part of Lottie Diggs Moon was played by Dee Anne Meece.

Our heritage in state missions was presented by Oliver Barnes, Newman Douglas, Paul Rutledge and James Warren who were recipients or represented organizations that receive money from the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions.

VOLUNTEER IN MISSION WORKSHOP was held May 19, 1985. Testimonies from Oklahoma volunteers were presented. Mrs. Grafton presided and Mrs. Frank Gigliotti, BYW Director of Capital Association, gave a segment of VBS and Big A Club crafts. Approximately 60 volunteers attended.

Fifty-six missionaries were obtained by WMU for the five weeks of FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLIES. The missionaries taught in each class, gave testimonies in general morning sessions, gave devotionals in church cabins and participated in a Mission Fair each Tuesday afternoon.

WMU secured 15 staffers to assist in the children's park for the five weeks of assemblies. Mrs. Thayer directed the park two of the five weeks.

The STATE ACTEENS CONFERENCE was held March 8-9, 1985, Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. Sheryl Churchill, WMU, SBC; Danny Bice, Oklahoma Consultant for the Deaf; Rev. and Mrs. Woody Fletcher, missionaries to Peru, were guest speakers. The attendance totaled 802 representing 101 churches.

An ACTEENS ACTIVATOR team from First Church, Pawhuska served in New Mexico for one week. Activators are trained by the church, association and state Acteens leaders. They are assigned by WMU, SBC and the Home Mission Board.

Oklahoma WMU had a NATIONAL ACTEENS PANELIST, Carol Coon, First Church, Carnegie, who served during the Woman's Missionary Union Annual Meeting in Dallas, Texas.

Orientation was held for 26 staffers serving at Camp Nunny Cha-

ha for the summer. Two Mother/Daughter Girls in Action Camps were held May 30-31 and May 31-June 1 with 306 attending.

Six GIRLS IN ACTION/ACTEENS CAMPS were held at Camp Nunny Cha-ha June 3-July 30. There were 689 resident campers, 30 professions of faith, 20 special service decisions and 42 rededications. For the third year the Fourth of July week was used for "work-week" involving the camp program director and staffers.

WMU participated in the STATE TRAINING MEETING FOR ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS, April 26-27, First Church, Oklahoma City. Overview of the 1985-86 associational work was presented to 145 WMU leaders. Mickey Martin, WMU Consultant, SBC, led the conference for WMU directors.

GLORIETA WMU WEEK was attended by 246 from Oklahoma. Mrs. Dorothy Thayer and Mrs. J. T. Robison led conferences.

The third OKLAHOMA WMU CONFERENCE was held August 22-24, Falls Creek Conference Center, providing training for 460 ladies. Thirty-nine conferences were offered. Five missionaries were on the program and 31 conference leaders.

Nine WMU AREA TRAINING MEETINGS were held in six locations—three night and six day meetings. A total of 946 attended.

Mrs. Nila Murillo reported HISPANIC WMU AREA MEETINGS in two locations with 97 attending from 12 cities.

Pastors are becoming a positive factor in the Area Training Meetings. Some are providing transportation for church WMU leaders and members to attend, some are bringing out topics of concern that have enabled Oklahoma WMU to strengthen its training material, and some are learning ways to support and strengthen mission education in their churches.

Dr. Paul Rutledge, WMU Professor of Sociology at Oklahoma Baptist University, has worked closely with Oklahoma WMU. He spoke at the WMU Annual Session in November 1984; spoke at four sessions of the 1985 Oklahoma WMU Conference, and taught the Mission Action conference during the WMU Area Training Meetings.

During the 1984-85 school year 16 scholarships were given through OBU to members of Acteens in cooperation with Oklahoma WMU.

Scholarships from the Margaret Hutchison Educational Fund in the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions were granted to 16 women to attend a Southern Baptist seminary.

A gift of \$50 was sent to 193 foreign missionaries from Oklahoma. A gift of \$250 was given to 11 newly appointed missionaries from Oklahoma.

The results from the two WEEKS OF PRAYER and SEASON OF PRAYER FOR STATE MISSIONS with special offerings promoted by WMU indicates the commitment to world missions by Oklahoma Baptists.

Evangelism

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has a distinctive and distinguished record for the last three years. We have led in ratio of baptisms to members and in percentage of Sunday School growth among the established or older Southern Baptist states. As these factors continue, the Oklahoma convention of churches can maintain a high evangelism profile.

To foster the revival in the churches and winning of the lost and unenlisted in 1986, National Simultaneous Revivals have been scheduled March 16 through April 6. The revivals are scheduled to correlate with media outreach, witness training, scripture distribution and evangelistic prospect search. These activities afford maximum programming utilization for evangelistic results. The best contributing factors which provide evangelism results have been coordinated in this national project.

The combined efforts of the State Convention program organizations have been applied to assist the churches. Associations are giving key leadership to the project. It is the best and largest effort Southern Baptists have ever mounted to reach Americans with the gospel for Christ. Every Oklahoma Baptist church should participate with maximum effort.

Youth Evangelism Conference

The 1985 State Youth Evangelism Conference is scheduled for December 26-27 at Immanuel Baptist Church, Tulsa and First Southern Baptist Church, Del City. Program personalities include Paul Jackson, Evangelist; Rod Masteller, Pastor; Yo Yo Collins, Music Evangelist; Michael Haynes, Evangelist, "The God of Rock Seminar;" Paul Purifoy, Minister of Music; Richard Huggins, Evangelist, and the Youth Evangelism Conference Choir.

State Evangelism Conference

The 1986 State Evangelism Conference is scheduled for January 20-21 at First Southern Baptist Church, Del City. Speakers include Duane and Iris Blue, Frank Crumpler, Sammie Davis, Charles Graves, Joel Gregory, Michael Haynes, Richard Jackson, D. L. Lowrie, Harry M. Piland, Bill Stafford, Jerry Vines, Keith Wiginton and Ed Young.

The music will feature John Shillington, choirs from First Southern Baptist Church, Del City; Putnam City Baptist Church and Northwest Baptist Church of Oklahoma City; David Dale and Richard Huggins as accompanists.

Total Church Life Conference

A special evangelism leadership conference for pastors, staff and others is scheduled for December 12-13, 1985 at Putnam City Baptist Church. Darrell Robinson will share the principles and procedures he follows to lead church growth.

Special Care Ministries

Lowell D. Milburn, Executive Director

Only street crime and war are more violent than today's American home. Abuse has become the number one killer of children. Divorce affects the lives of millions of children. Children born to unwed mothers increased 150 percent from 1970 to 1980. One out of every six teenagers will become pregnant out of wedlock. As long as misfortune, tragedy, and divorce continue robbing children of the privilege of living in their own homes, the Child Care ministry will be greatly needed. Adult Care is also urgently needed as there are now more adults above 65 than youth under 21.

By action of the Board of Directors on May 14, 1985, Child Care and the Baptist Retirement Centers were combined into one office called Special Care Ministries.

PURPOSE—Special Care Ministries seeks to care for children and adults in time of need. A Christian environment is provided for children who must live outside their own homes. Our goal is to mend broken families by rehabilitating and restoring members of families where possible. A Christian environment is also provided for adults who choose to live in one of our retirement villages.

PROGRAM—You can see missions at work in Child Care as we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and care for the fatherless. Counseling is provided for children and adults in our Children's Homes and Baptist Villages. Limited care and nursing care are available for adults in three of our villages. Rental assistance is available for retired Baptist pastors and wives, pastors' widows, and missionaries in villages at Ada, Cleveland, and Madill.

PEOPLE—There were 1,657 children and families served, 406 unwed mothers counseled and served, 40 adoptions completed or placements made in Child Care. This includes care in four Group Homes and 60 foster homes. There were approximately 1,065 adults served in six Baptist Retirement Villages.

PROGRESS—Alternatives to Abortion Counseling Centers have been opened in Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Shawnee, Stillwater, and others are planned. Plans to set up a model Crisis Pregnancy Center in the Oklahoma City area have been made. Group Homes for children were completed and dedicated at Clinton, Ada, and one just completed at McAlester. Raised \$400,000 (including \$100,000 Challenge Grant from Mabee Foundation) to construct an Activities Center at Owasso. Completed horse barn and corral and an agriculture building at Boys Ranch Town. Secured land for Group Home at Mooreland. Conducted a workshop for foster parents and two seminars for prospective adoptive parents. Rewrote Social Services Manual. Have received \$83,000 toward a Noble Foundation Challenge Grant of \$100,000 for Activities Center at Madill. Baptist Villages were completed at Ada, Madill, and Cleveland. Activities Center was completed at Owasso Baptist Village. Limited Care program was begun and Nursing Care is nearing completion at Owasso.

PROVISION—Thank you for the splendid support received from various sources. There were 1,183 of our 1,475 Oklahoma churches which gave to the Mother's Day Offering. The following selected items show record offerings: Cooperative Program—\$650,000; Endowment—\$1,054,567; Mother's Day Offering—\$516,521; Birthday/Anniversary Offering—\$125,326; Sponsorship—\$62,497; Direct Mail and Special Gifts \$376,645; Memorials—\$71,180. Much of the income for Baptist Retirement Villages comes from rental of apartments. Other income is provided by the Cooperative Program and endowment funds.

How grateful we are for the concern, prayers, and gifts of all Oklahoma Baptists.

Christian Life Committee

Dick Rader, Chairman

Over the years the Christian Life Committee has sought to deal with a variety of issues seeking to give some information which would serve as guidance to those who read the book of reports. This year we are keenly aware of the many prevailing ethical problems about which we as Christians ought to be concerned. Although we cannot focus our attention on all of these issues or even a majority of the issues, we have sought to write about some matters which have not received extensive attention in the past. We find that each of the following issues is pertinent to us in our Baptist churches and it is our intention to supply some insight to aid in understanding these problems and issues with the hope that through the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the wisdom of God's word we can endeavor to make decisions which will glorify Jesus Christ.

The Christian Life Committee urges the leadership of each church to become more aware of the bountiful supply of excellent resources produced by the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. These tracts, booklets, videos and other materials will be a very helpful addition to pastors, youth directors, and educational directors for the overall membership of the churches. The Christian Life Commission personnel have worked hard to keep us informed about numerous issues which concern Christians. These resources are available for you to order as you have need. We urge every church to take advantage of this unique opportunity so that they can provide quality,

biblically-based material to inform their congregations about ethical issues.

The Christian Home and Moral Values

One of the most familiar church covenants adopted by many Southern Baptist churches reads, "We also engage to maintain family and secret devotions; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintance," . . . This covenant recognizes and encourages the responsibility of the home to teach moral and spiritual values to each succeeding generation.

The Bible places emphasis upon the family and its role in teaching moral and spiritual values. Moses was given the task of changing a group of desert wanderers to a well-ordered and settled nation. The basis for doing this was given in the book of Deuteronomy. Moses emphasized the interrelationships of family members in learning the skills of living and obeying the Word of God (Deut. 6:4-9).

The fifth commandment given to Israel through Moses states, "Honor your father and mother" (Deut. 5:16). This commandment is said by Paul to be "the first commandment with promise" (Eph. 6:2). While many see this as a promise of longevity, others see the promise as applying rather to Israel's national life. The strength of a nation is to be found in its family life.

Plato said that the life of the nation is only "the life of the family writ large." History reveals that when there are efforts to change the national attitudes there have been subsequent attitude changes toward the family. When ancient Sparta turned toward a military dictatorship the first step was the elimination of the family unit. Men and women lived in separate barracks, while the children were reared under the supervision of the State and trained to be loyal to the State alone.

This ideology has emerged in our day in the Communist Manifesto written by Marx and Engels. In laying down their fundamental premise for a communist regime they wrote, "We replace home education with social." In denying the Judaeo-Christian ethic communism seeks to destroy the family and ultimately dominate the world.

What communism is doing in a deliberate way we are unwittingly doing when we fail to teach moral and spiritual values in the home.

Modern parents have become adept at the art of delegating. We expect others to do the teaching. But there are responsibilities which cannot be delegated. While our churches, schools and other religious institutions are designed to help teach truth to our children, they cannot fulfill the responsibility of the home.

The church's responsibility is to minister to the family as no other institution can, by stregthening the family to do its job of teaching in the home. The church should continue to strengthen families by providing a setting for worship, training and fellowship.

The Family Ministry Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board and the Christian Life Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention have written excellent materials which can be used in strengthening families. These materials can and should be used by churches and by families in fulfilling the responsibility of the home to teach moral and spiritual values.

Television

Television is perhaps our culture's most pervasive influence. Social critics have described television as "the primary socializing agent in our society." In the United States more homes have televisions than have indoor plumbing.

According to the television rating professionals the average American viewer watches television between six and seven hours daily. Homes with three or more persons and those with children record over 60 hours of television each week. In other words, most of us spend as much time in front of a television set as we do sleeping.

Television programming continues to be a major concern. Lowest common denominator morality, affirmation of violence as a way of life, and the promotion of greed and materialism seem to be the major components of daily television fare. The availability and expansion of cable has enlarged the problem. In order to be "competative" many cable companies now offer sexually explicit scenes into the American home. These negative realities tend to overwhelm the positive services of information, education, and entertainment that edify which television can and does offer.

How should we respond to the reality of television? On a personal level, let us:

- Discipline our television usage in harmony with our Christian discipleship.
- Teach our family members how to balance television's negative influences, both subtle and overt, with the values of the Kingdom of God.
- Monitor our family's television usage in terms of content and time.

As citizens and consumers, let us:

- Use our influence to urge television producers, sponsors and cable system suppliers to provide more quality programming.
- Support stricter community standards and ordinances regulating the use of public airways.

As Southern Baptists let us:

- Encourage our churches to provide materials and programs enabling us to be more discriminate television viewers. The Help for Television Viewers Awareness/Action Guide published by the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission is an excellent resource.
- 2. Support the efforts of our Radio and Television Commission in its attempt to provide meaningful entertainment and Christian programming through the ACTS Network.

The television producers should provide what the public desires and demands. Just as in other areas of social concern, Christians can make a difference in the content of television. We recognize that it is not a short-term issue answerable by a quick solution. Therefore, let us heed

Paul's injunction to "not be weary in well-doing" in the on-going concern for better television.

Total Abstinence for Christians

In a time when alcoholic beverages are becoming increasingly available in Oklahoma and when the number of alcoholics is reaching alarming proportions, the traditional Southern Baptist position of total abstinence is still relevant. Now that many Oklahoma counties have chosen liquor by the drink the availability of alcoholic beverages is on the increase. More people are tempted to try alcohol and become social drinkers. Society accepts alcoholic beverages as a part of modern culture. Christians are also tempted to identify with their social peers and blend into the social scene.

Perhaps the most alarming result of the increased availability of alcohol is the rise in alcohol consumption and alcoholism. In this country, it is reported that 75 percent of the men drink and 66 percent of the women. Americans consume an average of two gallons of wine and two gallons of hard liquor per year. The average beer drinker in the U.S. consumed 44.57 gallons of beer in 1980. As a result of the increased consumption the death toll from all alcohol-related causes is estimated to be between 50,000 and 200,000 people a year.

Since one person out of every 10 who drink becomes an alcoholic, it is necessary to teach total abstinence. No person can know if they are a candidate for alcoholism when they take their first drink. For some people they are able to drink moderately for many years before they become alcoholics. Others become severely addicted much sooner. This is especially true if they come from families with a recent history of alcoholism. The only safe approach to be totally sure a person never becomes an alcoholic is through total abstinence. Programs which promote moderation or responsible drinking cannot assure their participants that they will never become alcoholics. Alcoholism is a disease for which there is no known medical cure.

The Bible very clearly teaches through both principles and precepts that drinking is harmful for Christians. Admonitions such as "Wine is a mocker, strong drink a brawler, and whoever is led astray by it is not wise (Proverbs 20:1), and "Hear, my son and be wise, and direct your mind in the way. Be not among winebibbers . . ." (Proverbs 23:19-20) are throughout the Bible. Daniel showed the value of abstinence by refusing the wine and rich foods from the King's table (Daniel 1:8).

In addition there are several strong basic principles which can help Christians resist the temptations to drink, even moderately. The Bible teaches us that we should do everything for the glory of God (I Cor. 10:31). Christians can glorify God by refusing all alcoholic beverages, not by joining in with the world. They have an obligation to care for their bodies, which belong to God and which are the dwelling place of the Spirit (I Cor. 6:15 and Romans 12:1-2). Since alcohol, even in small amounts, damages the body and the threat of addiction is so great, Christians need to practice total abstinence. Paul's testimony to the Corin-

thians certainly applies to us: "'Everything is permissible for me' but not everything is beneficial. 'Everything is permissible for me' but I will not be mastered by anything' (I Cor. 6:12).

Christian leaders need to teach their fellow believers both the dangerous effects of alcohol on the body and the biblical principles which teach us to abstain from everything which harms our bodies or our influence. Young people, especially, need to be taught clearly and definitely that alcohol is dangerous and that using it is disobedience to God.

Racism

The Bible teaches that all people are created in the image of God and therefore have equal worth in God's sight. In order for people to develop freely and fully they need freedom within their society. Institutionalized racism, such as apartheid, and other oppressive governmental systems are therefore contrary to God's will for man's complete freedom and development.

While we as God's people cannot condone such oppression we must remember Jesus' warning to his followers about seeing the "speck" in another's eye while being oblivious to the "plank" in our own. We as Americans, and even as Christian Americans, must remember the racial discrimination of our recent past. We must also acknowledge that racism and oppression, particularly of minorities, exists in ourAmerican society and even in the hearts of the followers of Jesus Christ in a variety of forms and in varying degrees.

We must therefore commit ourselves to treat all persons with the dignity and respect due them as God's creatures. We should accept our responsibility for promoting better relations between the races and for opposing every form of racism. We are also called to pray for both the oppressed and their oppressors that hate and disrespect can be banished and all people can live together in peace.

Drought and Starvation

In a world of daily crises, Christians face none as shocking as the headlines screaming about starvation in our global village. The believer is stunned at scenes of the dying, doubly shocked, because of our Lord's metaphor, "I am the Bread," and His command, "Feed my sheep."

With mounting publicity, many groups and people have united to turn the tragedy by raising money and instituting feeding programs. Southern Baptists channel relief funds through the Foreign Mission Board and the Home Mission Board. Dollars given to feed the hungry go farther when given through Southern Baptist channels. Because of administrative economy, Southern Baptist missionaries can provide more feeding value per dollar given. Missionaries on the field work long hours, day after day, to get food to people in a short-range effort. Long term solutions are sought by digging wells and teaching farming methods. And yet, the crush of starving people continues, appearing to maintain a problem greater than all the potential solutions. According to Dr. Keith Parks, president of the Foreign Mission Board, "Some 30 countries (in Africa) have passed the point at which human wisdom alone can find a solution to their agony." Because widespread, continuous drought is at the core of the problem, Dr. Parks has issued a call to Southern Baptists to continue to pray for rain.

Yet Africa is not the only area suffering for lack of water. South America has water needs, and even the United States has suffered drought conditions in 1985, as well as economic disasters.

What can Christians do?

Be aware of the problem.

Pray for: rain, people to support food programs, money to fund them, missionaries and others who distribute food, governments to access efforts to help, water programs (wells, conservation, etc.), education in food production.

A dying, starving world cries out for life. Southern Baptists must respond with physical nourishment and spiritual nurture.

Pluralism

For most of our history America has enjoyed the designation of a "Christian Nation." Our forefathers built our nation on basic Christian principles and the overwhelming majority of our people were either Christians or at least sympathetic to the Christian faith. Christians have certainly enjoyed a favored status in the United States and have helped to build a great nation.

During the past few decades this nation has experienced an influx of immigrants who have come from a variety of non-Christian religious backgrounds. Today there are large population groups in America, especially in the metropolitan areas, where Buddhists, Hindus, Muslims, Jews and others worship and practice their religious teachings. Add to these the multitudes who espouse atheism or some form of materialistic secular humanism and you have a very pluralistic society.

Although Christians may still be in the majority in most areas, the presence of other active religious groups cannot be ignored. The rights which we enjoy as Christians must be shared with the non-Christian religious groups if we are to maintain our cherished freedom of religion. We must be willing to stand up for the rights of these groups just as we would for our own. Living in a pluralistic society also means that we must be careful to maintain the separation of Church and State. We cannot always assume that Christianity will be the dominant religion. For instance, it would be impossible to require religious instruction in our public schools because there is too much diversity among the people of a given community and their respective religions. In fact to use the public school as a form for sectarian indoctrination would violate our historic Baptist principle of the separation of Church and State. Therefore, to preserve the balance between church and state in a

pluralistic society we must teach the Bible and the Christian way in our homes and churches.

The Christian tension is heightened in a pluralistic community by the confrontation with widely-divergent viewpoints on moral issues. While we know with great assurance that the message of the Scriptures is right, true, and best for our society we must realize that not every person can accept our biblical basis for moral decisions. This does not mean that we should abandon or weaken our Christian position in any way, but it may mean that we become more tolerant of others' views and that we seek to persuade people on the basis of the desired good for all people, not just because a matter is Christian or biblical.

Finally, living in such a pluralistic society must spur us on to greater efforts in evangelism. Caring people who witness of God's love can open the way for the Holy Spirit to penetrate the hearts of our non-Christian neighbors. Learning to listen and love these lost ones could lead us into a new dimension of missions and evangelism.

Homosexuality

The number of homosexuals in America has been estimated to be as few as two million to as many as 15 million, possibly making up the nation's second largest minority group. The determination is difficult partially because public response makes it dangerous for them to "come out of the closet." The accuracy of the count is further complicated by how the term "homosexual" is descriptively employed.

The categories of homosexuality include (1) the transient, which occurs in preadolescent period and may stem from curiosity or experimentation: (2) situational, where there is an absence of members of the opposite sex; (3) latent, where the person has an impulse toward homosexual behavior but does not act on it; (4) episodic, where the person engages in both homosexual and heterosexual activities; and (5) exclusive homosexuality, where overt homosexual activity is consistent. To apply the term "homosexual" equally to all categories significantly inflates the estimates above.

Research indicates that homosexual orientation and behavior is learned or acquired in interpersonal relations, but the causes are multiple and complex. The possibility of change therefore exists but may be more complicated than generally thought. Experience shows that a homosexual's desire to change is essential for change, but even then it can be a long and difficult process.

A Christian response to this reality begins with a Biblical view which rejects homosexuality as an acceptable behavior and stresses the need for Christian ministry and witness to all persons.

The Scripture stresses that heterosexuality is God's design for human relationships from the account of creation (Gen. 1-2) to Jesus' reaffirmation of heterosexual marriage (Matt. 19:1-9). Homosexuality is then a violation of God's will. In Romans 1:26-27, Paul refers to homosexuality as "degrading passions . . . receiving in their own persons the due penalty of their error."

The Scripture also stresses God's love for all persons irrespective

of their sexual inclination or behavior. The membership of the Corinthian church was comprised of persons who had practiced homosexuality, and other sins, but who had been redeemed by Christ and included in her fellowship (I Cor. 6:9-10). The sin of homosexuality is pardonable and homosexuals stand in need of Christian ministry and witness, just as any other segment of lost humanity does.

Therefore, Christians are encouraged to:

- 1. Maintain a strong stand for God's ideal for sexual relationships in keeping with biblical teachings;
- 2. Overcome their fear of homosexuals as persons which stands as a barrier to a positive ministry;
- 3. Relate to homosexuals with compassion, not contempt or condemnation, with an attitude of redemption, not ridicule or rejection;
- 4. Proclaim the liberating message of Christ which offers hope and the power of transformation for all people;
- 5. Recommend competent pastoral counseling to homosexuals or their families who are interested in changing to a heterosexual life-style;
- 6. Strive to maintain quality family relationships and healthy attitudes toward sexuality;
- 7. Encourage positive youth ministries in churches to limit opportunities for recruitment of the young.

Report of the Board of Directors of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

By vote of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in general session on November 6, 1946 at First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was established. Its Articles of Incorporation, as amended December 20, 1974 and approved by the convention's Board of Directors May 27, 1975, sets forth the primary purpose of the Foundation "to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, any money or other property absolutely, or in trust to be used, either principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of the gospel of Jesus Christ as represented by the agencies, institutions and departments of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the Southern Baptist Convention."

We make this report with an awareness of the trustee relationship under which we serve. As the only incorporated trust agency of the convention, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma bears a sacred responsibility to both the convention and to its agencies, institutions and departments, as well as to the hundreds of individuals and churches for whom we manage assets.

The report for the year concluded July 31, 1985 shows a total of \$55,650,309.78 endowment and capital needs assets. Total receipts for the period were \$11,243,403.46 and total earnings from investments were \$5,805,508.91.

The business and professional people who comprise the Foundation's Board of Directors, all active members of Oklahoma Baptist churches, provide general guidelines for management of assets. The Foundation's administrative staff is responsible for the daily application of the guidelines. Current board members are James L. Barham, chairman; Leslie Pain and John R. Redwine, II, vice-chairmen; Jack Brewer, Ralph A. Crawford, Harold McConnell, Frank A. McPherson, Ray Mason, Oneal Netherland, John G. Nikkel, Thomas L. Pate, Don Ritter, Charles E. Sutter, H. Forrest Tennant, Granville O. Ward and Kenneth Weddle.

For administrative purposes and distribution of staff responsibilities, the programs of the Foundation are divided into eight sections over which the president provides general supervision and direction: Computer Accounting and Special Investment Services, Church Building Loan Services, Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services, Endowment Procurement Services, Communication and Estate Stewardship Services; Charitable Giving and Estate Planning Services, Personal Trustee Services and Estate Sales and Distribution Services.

Computer Accounting and Special Investment Services Computer Accounting Services:

The Foundation has made great strides this year in the area of computer accounting. Information for reports, normally taking hours, is now ready in minutes. Reports are available for donors and printed quarterly if needed.

This year we started the Real Estate Investment Pool and all the programs necessary to allow it to function properly have been created.

Currently there are 864 trusts on file and a master chart of accounts with 4,727 entries. With these as examples of records necessary to maintain the assets of the Foundation, it is easy to see why it was necessary to add another computer disk drive this year.

Special Investment Services:

Funds managed by the Foundation are in five investment pools: the EQUITY POOL is composed of blue chip stocks; the FIXED INCOME POOL is composed of corporate bonds; the SHORT TERM INVESTMENT POOL is composed of government securities and certificates of deposit; the CHURCH BUILDING LOAN POOL provides funds to churches for building construction; and the REAL ESTATE POOL has just recently been established. These pools enable a diversity of investment opportunities.

Scholarships and Student Loans:

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has administered student loans and scholarship funds since 1947. These trusts established through wills and outright gifts, are primarily for the benefit of students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. The loans carry a nominal interest rate payable quarterly while the student is in school. Repayment of the principal must begin upon graduation or leaving school.

The Prichard Scholarship Trust, the largest scholarship fund, is for ministerial and church-related vocation students attending Oklahoma Baptist University. The income is paid to the Foundation by the Liberty National Bank in Oklahoma City, for distribution to worthy students as directed by OBU.

Church Building Loan Services

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund has been functioning effectively since 1954 helping the Foundation fulfill a vital part of its task. The fund does so in two major ways:

- (1) It is a primary channel for the investment of endowment funds and, consequently, provides a large percentage of the income distributed to Oklahoma and Southern Baptist institutions and agencies and to individuals.
- (2) It provides to Oklahoma Baptist churches, local Baptist associations and Oklahoma Baptist Student Unions a means for financing building needs. The interest paid supports the causes represented in the Cooperative Program.

For the year ending July 31, 1985, 34 loans were closed totaling \$6,227,789.61. During the 12- month period, 41 loan commitments were made which totaled \$5,550,331.00.

Since the establishment of the Fund, 814 loans have been made totaling \$48,632,937.86 which have earned \$16,846,901.06 in interest.

As of July 31, 1985, \$29,395,043.36 was invested in the Fund with 257 loans in force.

The Fund is administered by a committee composed of members of the Foundation's Board of Directors. Copies of the "Policies and Regulations" brochure are available upon request. The brochure provides pertinent information including eligibility requirements, interest rate, payment schedule and application procedure.

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund has experienced its most active year in its history. It has assisted the Foundation in its role as trustee. The Fund is a complement to the Cooperative Program as Oklahoma Baptists seek to fulfill the task of the Great Commission.

Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services Property Management Services:

Management of real property held by the Foundation is supervised by a committee of eight board members. The committee meets monthly or on special call. Decisions to sell, lease, rent or repair property are determined by the committee upon recommendation of the vice-president for property management and mineral leasing services.

Real property held by the Foundation consists of houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and open grassland. The Foundation operates no businesses or farms but leases them to others. Grassland and farms are leased on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential property is rented by the month or a cash basis.

During the year concluded July 31, 1985, 21 pieces of real property were received including 12 pieces in the Oklahoma City area. The committee makes the final decision on every transaction.

Mineral Leasing Services:

The Foundation's mineral interest business is supervised by a committee consisting of eight board members. The committee meets each month to review lease offers, bonuses, rental delays and sales.

The Foundation holds deeds to mineral interest in 61 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states. The units vary in size from .25 acre to 320 acres.

During the past year the Foundation received 30 units of mineral interest, including 24 units in Oklahoma and five units in Texas.

Interesting changes have occurred during the past year. Production income has decreased by less than two percent from August 1, 1984 to July 31, 1985 while at the same time, bonuses increased by almost 15 percent. The figures are as follows:

Beyond This Time Endowment Procurement Services

BEYOND THIS TIME is a plan for raising extra endowment for

some of the Baptist ministries in Oklahoma. These ministries include Oklahoma Baptist University, Department of Child Care and other family related services, Falls Creek Conference Center, Baptist student unions, Baptist retirement centers, regional and associational camps and a balanced mission support system of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has established the office of Endowment Procurement for the purpose of developing ways and means for securing these additional endowment funds.

One of the key approaches to fulfilling this task involves the use of lay persons who host small group meetings. In this setting a member of the BEYOND THIS TIME staff is able to impart quality information that shows the potential donor how he can save taxes, express his Christian stewardship, and extend his circle of influence beyond his lifetime.

A quarterly newsletter is being sent to approximately 2,000 people across the state. Expert information is provided in an effort to encourage taxwise giving which can greatly benefit the Lord's work. Other literature is being used to promote living gifts through BEYOND THIS TIME.

It is interesting to note that according to the latest statistics on charitable giving in the United States, \$74.2 billion was given in 1984 for all charitable causes. Of this amount \$66.5 billion was given by individuals. This is \$3.5 billion more than was donated in 1983 by the entire private sector.

In light of this developing trend, the Baptist Foundation is on target in enlisting people to share some of their material possessions that will help supplement the regular giving of Oklahoma Baptists in supporting the causes we love and cherish.

As of July 31, 1985, \$1,735,045.83 had been pledged and \$1,722,587.81 had been received for the BEYOND THIS TIME causes. Other gifts were pending.

The need for endowment continues to grow as Oklahoma Baptists face the challenge of meeting the needs of people. The future is now. BEYOND THIS TIME is another way of providing a bridge to the future . . . today, tomorrow, until . . .

Communication and Estate Stewardship Services

Much of the growth of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in recent years is attributable to an effective communication program. The paragraphs which follow summarize certain dimensions and strategies of this program as it relates to a Baptist constituency, church and associational leaders, attorneys and other professionals, and the general public.

Promoting Special Emphases:

January and September are special months on the denominational calendar. January is observed as "Make Your Will Month," and September is designated "Baptist Foundation Month."

To encourage these observances, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma prepares and mails bulletin inserts to the churches for distribution to their people. The inserts, which contain an estate stewardship theme and message, provide forms to request additional information and estate planning assistance. Last year nearly 300,000 inserts were sent to the 1,466 congregations.

Further promotion of these emphases is done through articles in the **Baptist Messenger**, Care 'N Share, and associational newsletters.

Other special emphases observed are the birthdays of those persons with whom the Foundation has worked. Last year more than 14,000 birthday cards were sent to individuals expressing best wishes and encouraging them to keep their estate plans current.

Promoting Scriptural Teachings:

Most men on the Foundation staff are ordained ministers and former pastors, and because they are gifted preachers, they are busy almost every Sunday preaching in churches across the state. They serve as interim pastors, preach revivals, conduct Bible studies, teach at Falls Creek, participate in World Mission Conferences and other meetings.

In addition to these preaching appointments, Foundation staff members conduct Future Thrust programs in churches during January and September. They speak on the work of the Foundation at morning worship services, lead estate planning seminars during Church Training hours, and preach on estate stewardship at evening worship services. They also meet with persons interested in receiving estate planning assistance.

Last year 77 churches participated in Future Thrust. Presenting Important Information:

During the past year, Foundation staff members led 74 estate planning seminars in churches, associations and at other meetings such as the Senior Adult Conference at OBU. These seminars deal with such topics as types of property ownership, distribution of estate assets when

there is no will or trust, purposes served by wills or trusts, Oklahoma and federal estate tax laws, ways to make charitable gifts in wills or trusts, and other related matters.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma also joined with Dean Witter Reynolds Inc. in sponsoring an estate planning seminar for persons with substantial estates. The half-day seminar, held at the Sheraton-Kingsington Hotel in Tulsa, was led by Gordon Caswell, a renowned expert in financial planning.

The distribution of literature is yet another way the Foundation presents important information. Literature is distributed as staff members speak in churches or associations, and by mailings to person requesting additional information. Literature is also supplied to associational offices, associational Baptist Foundation representatives, and is included in packets provided to attorneys, pastors and other professionals.

Literature pieces currently available for distribution are: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," "Do You Need a Will?," "Estate Planning, A Christian Perspective," "When Death Does Us Part," "The Personal Representative," "The Gift Annuity Contract," "The Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust," "The Charitable Remainder Unitrust," "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," "The Personal Record Album," "Policies and Regulations; Securing a Church Building Loan."

The **Baptist Messenger** also provides an excellent means for communicating important information to Baptist people. The Foundation president or vice-presidents write weekly columns in the state Baptist magazine going to more than 120,000 subscribers. These articles deal with the more personal aspects of the Foundation's ministries—stories about persons who make gifts to Baptist causes through various types of life income trusts, or about particular events or promotions. Reader response to these articles is most gratifying and often leads to estate planning opportunities.

When Foundation staff members preach in churches or speak at other meetings, press releases and pictures are sent to local newspapers. News stories were also sent last year to selected daily, weekly and biweekly newspapers across the state when new board members were elected, the estate sales and distribution center was opened, staff members retired and others joined the staff.

Planning Needed Programs:

Pastoral support is essential to any communication endeavor the Foundation undertakes with people in the churches. There is no substitute for the pastor's enthusiastic endorsement and recommendation of this ministry. However, before pastors can respond in this manner, they first must have an understanding and appreciation for the purposes and programs of the Foundation.

For this reason, selected pastors from across the state are invited to be guests of the Foundation eight different times during the year. They attend an hour and a half orientation session in which each aspect of the Foundation's work is presented, and open discussion is encouraged. They also sit in on the monthly committee meetings of the Foundation's work is presented.

dation board of directors and observe the quality of those persons serving on the board and the high degree of expertise they contribute to the work. Last year 52 pastors attended these programs.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma works with hundreds of attorneys each year in securing the preparation of legal documents and in the probate of estates. Therefore, it is imperative that the Foundation have good working relationships with members of the Oklahoma Bar Association, and also provide to them opportunities to become more familiar with the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Last year the Foundation hosted attorneys' luncheon or dinner meetings in Norman, Oklahoma City (2), Tulsa (2), Pawhuska, Broken Arrow, Durant and Ponca City with 99 attorneys in attendance.

Church secretaries play a vital role in handling and responding to Foundation correspondence and placing estate stewardship inserts in church bulletins. In appreciation of their significant contributions to the work of local churches and the Foundation, selected church secretaries were invited to Oklahoma City for a day in November. Twenty-nine church secretaries from across the state attended a program especially designed for them.

Key lay persons from the churches were invited to be guests of the Foundation in April. They attended a program similar in format to the program for pastors. There were 27 lay persons in attendance.

A major denominational event that takes place each spring is the State Training Meeting for Associational Officers. More than 500 persons from 41 associations come to Oklahoma City for Friday evening and Saturday morning training sessions. Among those who seek information and suggestions which will better equip them for their responsibilities the next year are associational Baptist Foundation representatives.

Fourteen representatives attended the five-hour conference led by Foundation staff members this year at the First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City.

Because of increasing numbers of requests for estate planning services and a limited staff to respond to the workload, 16 persons from different geographical locations around the state were enlisted to assist the Foundation in gathering information from individuals for the preparation of wills and to supervise the proper execution of legal documents. These men and women, known as Baptist Foundation field representatives, receive assignments from the Oklahoma City office and are compensated for the services they perform as well as being reimbursed for their expenses.

Two-day training sessions for Baptist Foundation field representatives were conducted in Oklahoma during January, and a follow-up review session was held in March.

Providing Resource Materials:

Some years ago The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma secured the services of a well known Oklahoma City law firm to prepare specimen documents of various types of wills, trusts, charitable remainder annuity trusts, charitable remainder unitrusts, and gift annuity contracts. These model documents with margin references and foot notes were printed in quantities and placed in packet form along with other materials for distribution to attorneys.

The attorneys packet is reviewed from time to time and revised as law changes or new tax structures come about. The last revision in April, 1982 followed the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981. Since that time attorneys packets have been presented to 672 Oklahoma attorneys. Distribution of this valuable resource material is done at attorneys luncheon or dinner meetings, delivered personally by staff members or is mailed to attorneys requesting the packet.

Estate planning guides are 10-page booklets now made available to persons requesting estate planning assistance. The first half of the booklet discusses the decisions which must be made before making a will. The second half of the booklet contains a form for individuals or couples to complete indicating the provisions and instructions they wish to have included in their wills. These forms may either be taken to an attorney for the actual preparation of the documents or they may be returned to the Foundation to secure legal counsel for their preparation. During the past year approximately 500 estate planning guides were distributed.

When Death Does Us Part was first published in early 1984, but because of an unusual number of requests for the 21-page booklet, there have been several printings since. To date more than 16,500 copies have been distributed to pastors, attorneys, funeral directors, widows, widowers and others. The booklet offers important information to the surviving spouse about how to apply for insurance, social security and other death benefit claims, how to terminate joint tennancy ownerships with a deceased spouse, along with other helpful suggestions.

The Personal Representative is a comprehensive six-page pamphlet outlining the duties and responsibilities of the person(s) named in a will to administer the estate of a deceased friend or loved one during probate. This pamphlet is available upon request and has also been placed with numbers of attorneys for their distribution to clients called upon to act in this capacity.

Each year the Foundation provides to the associations program covers, incorporating an estate stewardship theme and design for the printing of the agenda of their annual associational meeting. This year 18 associations requested 7,500 program covers.

Plotting the Steps of a Good Man

In commemoration of C. Fred Williams' 12½ years of service as president of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, a biography about Williams entitled **The Steps of a Good Man** was written by Robert L. Ross, Foundation vice-president. Publication of the 100-page booklet was paid for by private contributions. The title comes from Psalm 37:23 "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord; and he delighteth in his way." Copies of the biography and story of Williams' contribution to the ministry of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma were

distributed at the annual associational meetings and at the annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Charitable Giving and Estate Planning Services August 1, 1984-July 31, 1985

When reference is made to the Baptist Foundation and its many facets, emphasis must be placed on the word "Service." The Estate Planning Services of the Foundation are directed toward many entities.

The family of people who are members of the Baptist churches of Oklahoma are among the first beneficiaries of the Foundation's service.

By appointment, a well-trained staff member of the Foundation will assist Baptist people in planning a Last Will and Testament, Gift Annuity contract, Charitable Remainder Unitrust or other documents important to the individual or family estate plan.

At the same time one's stewardship plan may be completed by naming a Baptist cause or causes as beneficiaries of some portion of their estate after the Lord calls them to their ultimate reward. Thus, the Lord's work on earth is blessed and the Christian steward has completed his trusteeship to the glory of God.

When the Foundation serves a Baptist family in this manner and a Baptist cause benefits from the plan, all of this can be completed without expense to the person for whom the plan is prepared.

If requested to do so, the Foundation will also serve as the personal representative or personal trustee without fee for those who use a Foundation staff member to assist in the planning.

During the 12 months from August 1, 1984 through July 31, 1985 the Foundation assisted in securing the information for the preparation of 1,456 Last Wills and Testaments, 42 Trusts and 15 Gift Annuity Contracts in which Baptist causes have or will benefit.

A placard is given to each church of the state indicating the number of persons in that church who have used the services of the Foundation in their estate planning. There are 973 churches in Oklahoma in which one or more families have undertaken to accomplish their estate stewardship goals by requesting the assistance of the Foundation.

Personal Trustee Services

For several years, the Foundation has rendered a special ministry to many of our trustors. The assistant to the president, Finley W. Tinnin, who retired from the pastorate of The Baptist Temple of Oklahoma City, has served in this capacity.

Personal trustee services include special assistance to individuals for whom the Foundation holds trusts. Transportation to hospitals, clinics, doctors' offices, regular contact by means of personal visits or telephone calls and many other personal services are rendered to the scores of people for whom the Foundation serves as personal trustee.

Estate Sales and Distribution Services

Within the year Estate Sales and Distribution Services was created and Estate Distribution Center was secured. It is located at 4600 N. Oklahoma in Oklahoma City. Personal and household effects are accumulated at the Center and periodically auctions are conducted. In addition to services rendered in the probate of estates, we are also in the position to serve churches and associations. David L. Williams is in charge of this area of the Foundation's work.

SALARY INFORMATION

Since the auditor's report does not give salaries of all elected employees, we are printing the salaries and benefits of department directors and associate department directors. Salaries of secretaries and other convention employees are in line with those doing similar work in the Oklahoma City area.

Salary and Fringe Benefits Explanation

Every employee receives a basic salary plus fringe benefits. The base salary may be divided as follows:

Cash

House Allowance (if ordained)

Various Annuity Board Plans

Base salary, including Longevity Pay

Fringe benefits include comprehensive medical insurance, long-term disability insurance, life insurance, accident insurance, dependent life insurance and retirement (10 percent of base salary). For unordained persons, the convention pays employer's part of Social Security.

Here are two samples from 1986 salary schedules. Annual base pay for department directors is \$33,757.68 and for associates \$28,693.92.


Employees who travel are reimbursed for their expenses when on convention business. The budgets carry a line item for the cost of leasing and insuring cars. There is an additional line item for other travel expenses which includes gas, oil, lodging, etc.

LONGEVITY PAY SCHEDULE

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved a longevity pay schedule for employees on May 15, 1978. A separate line in the budgets indicate the longevity pay in order to clearly identify the base salary level which is the same for all employees with similar responsibilities.

Rationale Considered by Board of Directors

- 1. Presently, all employees are employed at the same salary for similar jobs.
- 2. Recognition for previous experience and skills is presently taken into account by beginning the employee at the same salary as his or her predecessor.
- 3. Short-term employees cost the BGCO repeated hours of training, moving expenses, etc.
- 4. A person becomes more valuable as he or she continues serving the BGCO.
- 5. There are a minimum number of positions in the BGCO and a person of ability, etc. often is limited in opportunities to move up in the organization to a higher salaried job. Longevity pay would help compensate at this point.
- 6. Recognition for continuous years of service could be accomplished through a longevity pay schedule that:
 - 1) Acknowledges the completion of 3 years with a \$200 base longevity compensation.
 - 2) Increases each succeeding year with .2 percent of the salary, per year for each year beyond three years added to the base.
- 7. This suggested plan gives advantage to lower salaried persons by using the \$200 base for all persons.
- 8. The plan also gives credibility to longevity pay for higher salaried persons by using a percent of base salary for the annual increase.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted

by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include only operations designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund balances and results of operations of the following owned organizations,

operated and reported as separate organizations, are not included.

1. Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma

2. Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Basis of Accounting.—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.—Separate funds have been established to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources contains. funds) and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions (restricted and endowment funds). The following funds have been established for the Convention:

Current Unrestricted Fund—This fund accounts for all resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of the Convention.
 Current Restricted Fund—These funds account for those resources currently available for

use, but expendable only for operating purposes specified by the donors.

 Plant Fund—This fund accumulates the net investment in fixed assets and accounts for the unexpended resources contributed specifically for the purpose of acquiring or replacing land, buildings, or equipment for use in the operations of the organization. Mortgages or other liabilities relating to these assets are also included in this fund.

• Endowment Fund—This fund represents the principal amount of gifts and bequests accepted with the donor-stipulation that the principal be maintained intact in perpetuity, until the occurrence of a specified event, or for a specified period, and that only the income from investment thereof

be expended either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor.

Inventories—Inventories of office and printing supplies and items held for resale at Camps Hudgens and Nunny Cha-ha are stated at the lower of cost or market.

Inventories of livestock, poultry, and feed at the boys' ranch and farm are stated at a nominal value. These items have either been grown or have been contributed and therefore, have no cost value.

Property and Equipment-The Convention capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of donation of \$500 or more. Depreciation was recorded on the straight-line method from dates of acquisition or donation. The lives generally used are:

Land improvements	20-40 years
Buildings	20-50 years
Furniture and office equipment	4-10 years
Automobiles and machinery	4-10 years

Revenue Recognition-Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. The donor may designate its use by the Baptist General Convention. Such designated (restricted) contributions are recognized as revenue

when the obligation imposed by the restriction has been met.

Investments and Endowments-The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. Only those funds held by the Foundation for "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" are included in this report. These funds include designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions, and restricted funds held for the Convention. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense
On September 3, 1963, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot
from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease
amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1985 and 1984, the unamortized balance amounted to \$4,693 and \$6,453, respectively.
4. Notes Payable

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—Notes payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is represented by a promissory note dated May 14, 1965, in the original amount of \$153,000, due in monthly installments of \$1,000, including interest at 5½%. The note was created for expansion of The Baptist Bookstore, Oklahoma City. The balance at December 31, 1985 and 1984, was \$16,506 and\$27,275, respectively.

Bank of Oklahoma-On October 15, 1985, the Covention entered into a loan agreement with the Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City in the amount of \$300,000. The note is due on demand. Interest

is payable monthly. Proceeds were used for Owasso Nursing Home Project.

Tulsa Industrial Authority-Tulsa Baptist Village—On December 13, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance the expansion of the Tulsa Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "Promissory Note, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Project" in the amount of \$4,500,000. The promissory note is secured by land upon which the expansion is erected (included in Note 8), the facility expansion, related equipment and rentals from tenants.

At December 31, 1985 and 1984, the note payable balance was \$3,881,250 and \$4,106,250, respectively. Loan repayments of \$56,250 plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due quarterly starting May 15, 1983 through August 15, 1992. The final payment of \$2,362,500 is due November 15, 1992.

Tulsa Industrial Authority-Owasso Nursing Home-On May 1, 1985, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance construction of the Owasso Nursing Home facilty. The Authority issued its "Revenue Bonds, Series 1985 (Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso Nursing Home Project)" in the amount of \$2,2000,000. The note is secured by land upon which the facility is to be erected, the facility, related equipment, and rentals from tenants.

At December 31, 1985, the notes payable balance was \$1,990,058. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting May 1, 1987, through 1995. Interest is due semi-annually at an

effective rate of 9% starting November 1, 1985.

The Marshall County Development Authority—On December 28, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Marshall County Development Authority to finance construction of the Southern Oklahoma Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Madill Retirement Center Project, Series 1982" in the amount of \$1,200,000, secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1985 and 1984, the notes payable balance was \$1,097,000 and \$1,151,000, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum

tively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount plus interest at a variative rate of 8% to 14% per amount are due semi-annually starting June 15, 1984 through December 15, 1997.

The Pontotoc County Area Authority—On May 1, 1983, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Pontotoc County Area Authority to finance construction of the Ada Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1983" in the amount of \$1,500,000. The Convention entered into supplemental loan agreements with the Authority to finance completion of the facility during 1984 and 1985. The Authority issued its "First Mortage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1984" in the amount of \$150,000 on April 1, 1984 and "Series 1985" in the amount of \$625,000 on May 1, 1985. The original and supplemental loan agreements are sequently are resulted by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment. agreements are secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1985 and 1984, the notes payable balance was \$2,290,000 and \$1,650,000, respec-

tively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting May 1, 1985, through May 1, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting November 1,

May 1, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting Novemoer 1, 1983 for the original issue and May 1, 1984 for the supplemental issues.

The Cleveland Industrial Trust Authority—On June 30, 1983, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Cleveland Industrial Trust Authority to finance construction of the Cleveland Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1983" in the amount of \$1,500,000. During 1984 and 1985 the Convention entered into supplemental loan agreements with the Authority to finance completion of the facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1984" in the amount of \$150,000 and "Series 1985" in the amount of \$25,000. The original and supplemental loan agreements are secured by certain real estate the facility and related enuinment. by certain real estate, the facility and related equipment.

At December 31, 1985 and 1984, the notes payable balance was \$2,190,000 and \$1,650,000, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting June 10, 1985 through June 10, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting December

10, 1983.

6. Mortgage Notes Receivable

During 1981, the Convention sold all land occupied by the Warwick West Apartments for \$2,000,000. The terms of the sale provided for interest at 10% on the unpaid balance with one half of the annual interest payment payable monthly and the remaining one half of the annual interest payment payable on each anniversary date, and for repayments of \$400,000 annually for five years beginning in 1986. The note was collected in full during 1985.

During 1985, the Convention sold a house and received a note in the amount of \$26,700. The note provides for monthly payments of \$295 including interest at 10.5%. The final payment is due in January, 1991.

7. Notes Receivable

The Convention has a note receivable secured by land located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, resulting from a sale of dairy farm. The outstanding balance at December 31, 1985 was \$230,000. On January 1, 1986, \$25,000 was received and the note was renewed in the amount of \$205,000 due July 1, 1986 with interest at 11%.

During 1985, the Convention obtained a note for funds advanced to the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, an affiliate, totaling \$500,853. The note provides for monthly principal payments of \$4,300 with interest at 6.5%. At December 31, 1984, \$224,448 had been advanced to this affiliate.

8. Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center-Capital Lease Obligation

On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The duplex units were completed during 1981 at a total cost of \$322,923.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy both bond obligations. The original and supplemental leases are scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008 and April 1, 2001, respectively.

The Convention has the right to purchase both the project and duplex units at any time on or after February 1, 1988, at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

9. Deferred Life Estates

Certain duplexes were constructed by donors on land owned by the Tulsa Baptist Village in Owasso. These duplexes were donated to the Village and the donors have a rent-free life estate in the duplexes. The duplexes were capitalized at a value approximating total construction costs, and are being depreciated over their estimated useful lives. The deferred liability for the life estates, representing future rentals to be provided, is reduced annually for rentals, based upon the donors' life expectancy. At December 31, 1985 and 1984, the deferred life estates totaled \$1,016,885 and \$636,891, respectively. The original capitalized value was \$1,057,935 and \$689,000 for the two years.

10. Prior Period Adjustment

In 1985, additional information obtained from the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma indicated that several trusts not previously reported in the financial statements of the Convention in prior years should have been included. Also, several trusts previously reported as endowment funds were reclassified as restricted and unrestricted funds. The accompanying financial statements of the Convention for 1985 properly reflect these trusts on the basis of information provided by the Foundation.

The financial statements for 1984, presented herein for comparative purposes, have been restated to give retroactive effect to the inclusion and classification of such trusts for 1985. The following is a summary of the restatements to the 1984 financial statements:

Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above, present fairly the assets and liabilities of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma arising from cash transactions and contributions received as of December 31, 1985 and the support and revenue collected, expenses paid, and changes in fund balances and the changes in funds arising from cash transactions and contributions received for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examinations of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) is a private, nonprofit religious association chartered by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention to administer funds and property received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work.

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements except that they include a provision for depreciation of equipment and depletion on mineral properties. Major expenditures for equipment are capitalized at cost while donated property and equipment are capitalized at fair market value at the date of the gift. Depreciation of equipment in the Operating Fund is provided for over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis. No provision is made for depreciation of rental and other properties carried as investments in the Trust and Endowment Fund.

Fund Accounting—To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. The assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Foundation are reported in two self-balancing funds as follows:

Operating Fund—The Operating Fund is designed to account for resources which are expendable for support of Foundation operations and for the acquisition of equipment.

Trust and Endowment Fund—The Trust and Endowment Fund is comprised of resources received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise that are subject to restrictions of the gift or trust instrument. The trust funds are custodial in nature and require that distributions be made to the designated beneficiaries. Endowment funds account for assets received under the stipulation of the donors that the principal be invested and that only the income be used for the designated purposes until a specified time or occurrence, or in perpetuity. In addition to the Operating Fund and the Trust and Endowment Fund, five investment

In addition to the Operating Fund and the Trust and Endowment Fund, five investment pools have been established for convenience in managing the resources entrusted to the Foundation. The five investment pools are as follows:

(A) Church Building Loan Pool-accounts for funds loaned to churches.

(B) Fixed Income Pool—accounts for funds invested in bonds and preferred stocks.

(C) Equity Pool—accounts for funds invested in common stocks.

(D) Short-Term Pool-accounts for funds invested in government securities.

(E) Real Estate Pool—accounts for funds used in the acquisition and management of real estate.

For financial reporting purposes, the financial position and results from operations of the investment pools are reported with the Trust and Endowment Fund.

Annuities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions which require the Foundation to pay the donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified portion of the income of these trusts in disbursed to the individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of the Baptist agencies or institutions as designated.

Annuities and individual trusts are included herein at an amount equal to the book value of their assets. Due to the Foundation's use of the cash basis of accounting, no attempt has been made to compute any liability in connection with these funds for future payments to beneficiaries.

Appropriation for Corpus Preservation—For certain endowments, the Foundation appropriates a portion of the income to preserve the value of the corpus. Such appropriation is included in nonexpendable fund balance. This appropriation is generally for endowments with depletable assets such as mineral properties, but may also be specified for other endowments. Various methods are used to calculate the amount to be appropriated.

Income Taxes—The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 6-RELATED PARTIES As disclosed in Note 1, the Foundation is affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The majority of the funds administered by the Foundation are for the benefit of the Convention, its agencies and various other Baptist organizations. Throughout the year the Foundation makes distributions either directly to these organizations or on their behalf. The Foundation also receives funds from these organizations, both to administer for their benefit and to support the Foundation's operations.

The Foundation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Appropriation for the year ended December 31, 1985 was \$333,716.

The Foundation makes loans to Baptist churches to finance the construction of church buildings.

These loans are secured by first mortgages on the buildings constructed and require personal endorsements of church representatives. The lives of these loans vary from 10 to 15 years. Interest rates are set at the approximate current rate available from commercial sources. The balances of church building loans outstanding at December 31, 1985 was \$25,923,889. NOTE 7—PENSION PLAN

All employees of the Foundation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1985 was \$42,994. The Foundation's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis—Except for depreciation which is discussed later in this note, the financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statements of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are statements of current period financial activities. They do not purport to present the results of operations or net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacements or equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) normandatory transfers, in all other cases.

The library is valued at an amount equal to the cost of books, periodicals and microform acquired during the past ten years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years. Library acquisitions totaled approximately \$55,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist primarily of bookstore supplies held for resale and maintenance supplies. Inventories are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Externally restricted funds may only be utilized only in accordance with purposes specified by the source of such funds. This is in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and only the income be utilized,

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned the assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and similar assets is accounted for in the funds owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds. Such income is accounted for in the funds to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in the current unrestricted fund.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the current unrestricted fund. Restricted gifts, grant appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Current restricted funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments which were purchased by the University are generally stated at cost. Investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at the date of acquisition or at fair market value at the date of donation. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuition, fees and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated uses are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and contributions are recognized as income when received.

2. Pledges

As a result of organized requests for gifts, the following pledges have been received and are uncollected. These pledges are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements.

3. Loan Fund

The University received capital contributions from the federal government for the Nursing Student Loan Program which total \$236,474 from the inception of the program to July 31, 1985 and 1984. The University has repaid \$43,200 to the federal government. An additional \$95,647 was advanced to the University by the government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans; \$75,917 has been repaid to the government. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds and from matching University funds (1/9 of the federal capital contribution). Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the respective programs may have portions of the principal and interest forgiven.

5. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and payment of trust expenses. These funds are disignated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The Prichard Trust had a corpus of \$5,461,248 at July 31, 1985.

The American National Bank and Trust Company of Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard

T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after payments of beneficiary and trust expenses. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$1,322,085 at July 31, 1985.

The assets of the above trusts are not included in the accompanying financial statements.

6. Bonds Payable

(A) The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, consists of 23/4% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$15,000 in 1976 to \$23,000 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$878,387.

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing Bonds, Series

1957, consists of 2-7/8% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$17,000 in 1976 to \$33,000 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$2,765,248.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the specific income of Kerr Dormitory, Brotherhood Dormitory, and, to the extent necessary, W.M.U. Memorial Dormitory are pledged for the retirement of these bonds. The University is required to maintain sinking funds with the trustee.

7. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority—1979 Capitalized Lease Obligation
The University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority

in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities complex; to remodel the Brotherhood and W.M.U. Memorial Dormitories and the Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. The Authority obtained funds for these improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979". Assets totaling approximately \$7,400,000 have been constructed or purchased under this lease. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

The lease was amended on June 1, 1985 to obtain funds to finance a portion of the construction of the science building, married student housing, and a campus ministries center, and for the renovation of Kerr Dormitory, the Theater Annex, Montgomery and Thurman Halls, and Parkway and Jent Apartments. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$5,300,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1985". As of July 31, 1985, accumulated costs on these projects totaled \$2,565,300. Projects totaling \$307,668 have been completed and are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund. These remaining projects are still in process and their accumulated costs (\$2,257,632 as of July 31, 1985) are included in construction in progress in the plant fund along with \$3,270,001 in funds held by the trustee pending disbursement by the trustee on the above projects.

Both bond series are secured by rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities, by mortgages on specified real estate which comprises the main campus, and by a guarantee

from The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Oklahoma Baptist University Authority

On December 30, 1982, the University entered into an agreement with the Authority in which the Authority agreed to loan the University up to \$400,000. To secure this loan the University transferred certain University property to the Authority. Upon repayment of the loan the property will be transferred back to the University. The proceeds of this loan were used to purchase additional real estate and to construct new student apartments.

On December 30, 1984, the loan converted to a permanent loan payable in 120 equal monthly principal payments of \$3,333, plus interest. The interest rate is equal to 55% of the base rate of the Federal National Bank & Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, adjusted quarterly. At July 31, 1985, this note was payable as follows:

The total rental expense for operating leases is approximately \$3,000 per year.

11. Capital Improvements Program

As a part of the Capital improvements program adopted in 1979, the University authorized a special fund drive to raise funds for the program. This fund drive is to extend through 1985. The funds raised, plus investment earnings, were used for the long-range construction, renovation and restoration of campus facilities, and for debt service requirements under the 1979 capitalized lease obligation (note 7). Construction was completed during 1984 on projects initiated in 1979, and the remaining balance of contributed funds has been transferred to the Retirement of Indebtedness Fund and will be used for retirement of the capitalized lease obligation.

In November 1983, the University Board of Trustees authorized The Vision for Excellence Campaign with a goal of \$6,550,000. Funds raised by this campaign, plus investment earnings, will be used for several priority needs, including the new science building, scholarships, renovation and construction of student housing, operational support, and debt service requirements under the amendment to the 1979 capitalized lease obligation (Note 7).

12. Year Ended July 31, 1984 Financial Information

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Center is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and operates a nursing home for the elderly in Hugo, Oklahoma. The Center presents its financial statements in accordance with the "hospital Audit Guide", published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provision of that Guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds-Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property and equipment are added to the unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for boarddesignated purposes are not considered to be restricted.

Basis of Accounting-The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period

service is provided.

Inventories-Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property and Equipment-Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

Land improvements 5% 2 to 5% 5% Buildings and improvements Fixed equipment Major movable equipment 10%

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation. Funds equal to a portion of depreciation expense have been set aside to ultimately be used to replace property and equipment as necessary. The balance of such funds at December 31, 1985 was \$40,934 (December 31, 1984, \$38,584). In addition, \$49,771 has been set aside for renovations.

2. Notes Payable

At December 31, 1984, the Center was obligated to Miami National Bank, Miami, Oklahoma, on a note with a balance due of \$10,245, secured by automotive equipment. This note was paid in full during 1985.

 Receivable from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma During 1985, the Center advanced \$50,000 on an open account to The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The advance is unsecured.

4. Agreements with Hugo Golden Age Home Authority

In 1970, the Center underwent a large expansion which was financed through the Hugo Golden Age Home Authority, a public trust. The Authority issued tax exempt bonds in the amount of \$320,000, of which \$125,000 was used to retire indebtedness to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the remaining \$195,000 was used for improvements to the facility, bond issue costs, and other related expenses.

At that time, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased the facilities to the Authority for a period that would coincide with the bond life of approximately sixteen years. The Authority then executed an operating and maintenance agreement with the Convention, which provides for the Convention to operate the Center on behalf of the Authority. The form of this agreement provides for the Authority to pay to the Convention, as rent, the net results of operations after deducting sufficient funds to meet annual bond debt service consisting of principal, interest, trustee fees, and any other related costs. The substance of the agreement differs from form in that the Convention retains all benefits of ownership and operations because all funds resulting from operations less debt service payments inure to the Convention. The financial statements for the Center have been prepared recognizing the substance over the form of this agreement.

In addition to the leasing of the facility to the Authority, the Convention also pledged its "full faith and credit" toward the payment of all principal and interest due under the bonds as an additional guarantee to the bond holders. This additional guarantee has, in effect, caused the convention to be responsible for the payment of debt service in the event that facility operations are insufficient to meet such payments.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma was constructed in 1965 by Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a nonprofit corporation affiliated with Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Center is located near Northwest Highway and Council Road in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It consists of Lackey Manor (a nursing home), houses and apartment units located adjacent thereto.

In 1974, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation conveyed ownership of the Center to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Baptist Laymen's Corporation continues to operate the Center for the Convention.

The Center reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provisions of that guide, the following accounting

Basis of Accounting—The accrual basis of accounting is used. Service revenue is recognized in the period service is provided. Apartment revenue is recognized in the period service is provided. Center.

Inventories-Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property, Plant, and Equipment-Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

Land improvements 2 to 5% Building and improvements 5% Fixed equipment Major movable equipment 10% to 20%

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation. Investments Held by Other Entities—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as a recipient for funds that could be invested. Funds held by the Foundation, included herein at cost or market value at date of receipt or donation, were derived from contributions both by the retirement center and

individual donors with the retirement center as beneficiary.

The Center has an endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. with a balance of \$25,000 at December 31, 1985 (1984—\$25,239). The Center received \$2,250 income from this fund during the current year. The income from this fund may be used for any purpose; however, the corpus may not be withdrawn, and therefore is not included as an asset in the accompanying financial statements.

Life Estates—Several residents have remitted funds to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to be used to build houses or duplexes at the Center. In exchange for the funds, these residents have the right to live in the dwellings rent-free for the remainder of their lives. These funds are recognized in the financial statements as deferred annuities which will be amortized over the life expectancy of the residents. The amount amortized each year is included in apartment revenue.

2. Capitalized Lease Obligations (Bonds Payable)

In 1964, land on which the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma,

In 1971, the Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA), OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (Convention). OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The Series A bonds outstanding at December 31, 1985 totaled

\$295,000 (1984—\$330,000). Series B bonds were retired in 1982.

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The bonds outstanding at December 31, 1985 totaled \$1,830,000 (1984-\$1,865,000).

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The note is guaranteed by the Convention. The OCIA assumed responsibility for the construction of a 36 unit intermediate care apart-ment complex with cafeteria and 22 quadruplexes. The term of the lease is 10 years with quarterly payments equal to principal, premium, and interest due on next note payment date and any administrative expenses, less any surplus in the sinking fund. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time prior to the expiration of the least term for the amount required to retire all outstanding indebtedness plus \$500. The note payable outstanding at December 31, 1985 totaled \$3,881,250 (1984-\$4,106,250).

Interest earned by the indenture trustee was used to reduce the 1984 lease payments otherwise required of the Retirement Center. This amount, which is primarily nonrecurring, totaled \$14,402 and was reported as interest income in the accompanying statement of income for 1984.

On July 1, 1974, the Corporation transferred back to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma all of the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center's real and personal property used in its operations. Baptist Laymen's Corporation acts as the governing body of the Center for the Convention.
