Special Care Ministries includes Child Care Institutions and Adult Care Institutions. The Baptist Children's Home at 164th and South Western, Oklahoma City is the legal successor to the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans Home and also the Baptist Children's Home, 63rd and North Pennsylvania, Oklahoma City. The Special Care Ministries Committee of the Board of Directors will serve with the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Executive Director of Special Care Ministries, and Director of Adult Care Ministries in matters of policy pertaining to the operations and in making recommendations to the Board of Directors. The Articles of Incorporation and Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma will serve as the guide for policies and procedures of the Special Care Ministries.

Special Care Committee will participate in budget approval (final approval is by entire Board), concur on major administrative appointments, assist Executive Director-Treasurer in selection of the Executive Director of the ministries office, review and approve the policies and procedures outlined in the Staff Manual, guide and assist the administration with major conflicts and problems confronting the agency, approve any substantial outlay of funds for construction or other major projects, avoid conflict of interest by refusing to use position as board members for personal gain.

Second Amended Articles of Incorporation

of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE I	PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institu-

tions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vicepresident, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and ex-

ecutive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their actions shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets,

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meeting may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by

the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 3. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called board meeting, the president and

executive director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommendation, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the board of directors.

Section 4. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 5. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 6. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER—The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or

depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant:

- (1) In the event the vacancy of the office of executive directortreasurer occurs between sessions of the convention, the associate executive director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the board of directors.
- (2) A search committee of seven members of the board of directors shall be elected without nomination by the board of directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.
- (3) When the committee has a nomination to make to the board, a meeting of the board of directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the board of directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the convention.
- (4) The person elected by the board of directors shall serve until the convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.
- Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto: and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.
- Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opprtunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's board of directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected conven-

tion committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTEES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

ARTICLE V—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

Charter and Bylaws

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, the ology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical

education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment of the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office ex-

pire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

ARTICLE I POWERS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the corporation (referred to in this and the following articles as "University," and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- Appoint or remove the President and other Officers of the University Corporation in accordance with these Bylaws;
- Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty:
- Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board Committee;
- 4. Establish and review the educational programs of the University after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs or Special Committees of Review set up by the President and Chairperson of the Board in financial emergency situations.
- 5. Establish annually the budget of the University, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee:

- Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
- Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the University;
- 8. Institute and promote major fund raising efforts of the University;
- 9. Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the University;
- 10. Authorize Officers or agents of the University to accept gifts for the University;
- Authorize the incurring of debts by the University and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of real and personal property, tangible and intangible;
- 12. Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he/she is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself/herself. An employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

Section 2.

Vacancies in the office of the trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the State of Oklahoma or member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma, or death of a trustee, or as the result of his/her inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy in the office of trustees occur during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by affirmative vote of the Convention then in office.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, one or more Assistant Secretaries, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board Trustees at its last meeting of the University's fiscal year. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the corporation and Vice Chairman with the office of Vice-President of the corporation. At the March Board Meeting the Board shall elect three trustees to serve as a nominating committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. These trustees shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and written ballot. The nominating committee shall nominate candidates to serve as officers of the Board at the July meeting with opportunity provided at that meeting for nominations to be made from the floor. The term of service for officers of the Board begins at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November.

Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 3.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The President of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose. The Vice President for Business Affairs of the University shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

Section 4.

The Board may appoint one or more Vice Chairmen, Assistant Secretaries, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the University Corporation.

Section 5.

All Officers of the University Corporation shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board

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of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such Office may have against the University.

ARTICLE IV POWERS AND DUTIES OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION OFFICERS

Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2.

The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of

Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency.

Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the University and shall be as Treasurer an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He/She shall have the duty to keep or cause to be kept full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to obey all lawful orders of the Trustees, the President of the University, and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the University. He/She shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the University, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, depostit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs Committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the University. He/She shall not pay out any money unless by order of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs Committee may prescribe. He/She shall cooperate with any independent auditors or certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the University, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the University at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may duly require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the University faithfully to perform the duties of his/her office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his/her hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

ARTICLE V POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

Section 1.

The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Such tenure shall include a periodic evaluation system by the Board of Trustees and/or its agents. Such evaluation shall also set the salary and compensation for the President for the term acceptable to the Board and the President.

Section 2.

The President of the University shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the University and the official adviser to and executive agent of the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. The President of Oklahoma Baptist University must be an active member

of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church. He/She shall, as educational and administrative head of the University, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He/She shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts, and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws he/she shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

Section 3.

The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the Administrative and Staff Handbook then in force.

Section 4.

The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in July of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment and tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the Faculty Handbook then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 5.

In the event the office of President of The Oklahoma Baptist University becomes vacant, a special nominating committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board before which two weeks notice has been given concerning this needed action. The committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and secret ballot. This special nominating committee shall nominate five trustees to serve as members of the Presidential Search Committee in the next meeting of the Board of Trustees with opportunity provided for nominations to be made from the floor. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the five trustees elected, he shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Chairman of the Faculty Council, the President of the Alumni Association and the President of the Student Government Association shall serve as ex officio. non-voting members of the Search Committee.

The Search Committee shall notify in writing all members of the

Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of any prospective candidates. A vita of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents a candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1.

All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in November or December, following the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of March, at which time the Board of Trustees shall adopt the budget for the University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Turstees during the month of July, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper, except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter or the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

ARTICLE VII ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING

Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the Trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by all members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or the committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1.

There may be such special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President, annually, at or following the November-December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these bylaws the Chairman of the Board and the President of the University shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least five additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. The chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees, however.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its standing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the Chairman of the Board, may request the President of the University to appoint an Administrative Officer of the University or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the

office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

Section 6.

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be organized into the following committees:

The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the Board (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary) and the Chairmen of the Administrative Committees. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall receive from the Secretary annually in July the record of attendance and participation by all Board members during the fiscal year preceding. In the event that a trustee has failed to meet the responsibilities of service, the committee shall request from the trustee an indication of his desire for continuing service on the Board or his intention to resign in light of the circumstances and report his response to the Chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Okahoma's Nomination Committee. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Administrative Committees: There shall be five standing administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, Student Development Committee, and the Spiritual Life Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the University. The Administrative Committees shall receive reports from University administrators and consider policies and recommendations regulating the life and function of the University.

Section 7. Academic Affairs Committee.

The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall, in coopertion with the President, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long range enrolment goals; advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs; recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel; and shall review matters affecting the faculty of the University; consider proposals on such matters; and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 8. Business Affairs Committee.

The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Vice President for Business Affairs shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.

Section 9. Development Committee.

The Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review and recommend fund raising and public relations programs and report to the business Affairs Committee on fund raising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting.

Section 10. Student Development Committee.

The Student Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the University, other than those relating to the spiritual life and academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 11. Spiritual Life Committee.

The Spiritual Life Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review all matters concerning religious activities and the programs that promote spiritual growth and development at Oklahoma Baptist University, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

ARTICLE IX IDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the University shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he has been made a party by reason of his being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as to which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

ARTICLE X CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such member's indepen-

dent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his responsibilities to the University, or (b) such Trustee is aware that a member of his family (which for purposes of this paragraph shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his family) is an officer, director, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter, under consideration at a Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATOR OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the University to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the University, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the University shall be signed by such officer or agent of the University and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees shall require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the University to give bonds in amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the University.

Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the University shall be deposited to the credit of the University in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the University any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the University, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the University.

Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the University shall begin the first day of August and end the last day of July in each year.

ARTICLE XII BYLAW AMENDMENT

Section 1.

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each trustee at his/her usual place of residence.

Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Section 3.

Prior to each November/December meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation

We, the Undersigned, John R. Crain, President and C. Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

ARTICLE I

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious

and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

- 1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
- 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;
- 3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;
- 4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;
- 5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and
- 6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IX Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI Adoption of Amended Articles

- 1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.
- 2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the 20th day of December, 1974.
- 3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

Amended Bylaws

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The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

(Effective December 20, 1974)

ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II Meetings

- 2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.
- 2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.
- 2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.
- 2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.
- 2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

ARTICLE III Officers

- 3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.
- 3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.
- 3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Direc-

tors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

- 4.2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.
- 4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.
- 4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.
- 4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.
- 4.4 Vice-Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each

of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V Directors

- 5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.
- 5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.
- 5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 5,2 Election of Directors and Term of Office. In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as directors.
- 5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.
- 5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman of the Board, the Chairmen of all standing committees and the

President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.

- 5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.
- 5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE VI

Administration of Funds and Property

- 6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property divised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.
- 6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

- (a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.
- (b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE VIII

Idemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

- 8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer of employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.
- 8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1951, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purposes for which this corporation is formed are:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.
- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, inform, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.

- (d) To assist by gift, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees, or other agencies; to seek out and investigatge cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and real in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;
- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bills of ex-

change, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or nonnegotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

- (a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.
- (b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was twenty-one (21). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have

a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or his successor in office, shall at all times be a Director of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on the 12th day of February, 1960, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed Sr., L. F. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

In the event of dissolution of the corporation, the assets of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and debts, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, educational and scientific and similar activities performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Bylaws of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Oklahoma City

ARTICLE I Members

Section 1. The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed as incorporators and those elected as first Directors, as shown in the original Articles of Incorporation, now on file in the office of the Secretary of State, to wit:

James B. Battle Jr., Gene Warr, R. C. Howard, Marvin Staton, W. R. Wallace, D. N. Caulk, James M. Gregory, S. C. Clemens, C. A. Henderson, Haskell McClain, George Miller Jr., Guy H. James, E. V. Mashburn, H. H. Raborn, Lee V. Sneed, L. G. Skaggs Jr., H. B. Lee, R. A. Young, Jim Wright, Robert S. Kerr, R. H. Nicholson, and Tom E. Carter and T. B. Lackey, Ex-Officio:

and additional members may be admitted to the corporation at any meeting of its members, upon the vote, or written assent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than two-thirds of its existing members, or by the Board of Directors with the written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting of the Board of not less than twothirds of all the duly elected Directors. Membership or any interest in this corporation shall not be assignable intervivos by any member, nor shall membership or any interest in this corporation pass to any personal representative, heir, or devisee. Membership of any member shall cease upon his death or resignation, or upon the adoption at a meeting of the members, of a resolution assented to by the vote or written consent incorporated in the minutes of the meeting, of not less than twothirds of all of the members, on not less than ten days' notice of intent to present such resolution to such meeting having first been given to all members either personally or by mail as herein provided for in special meetings.

Section 2. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special or adjourned) of the members of this corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been designated by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the foregoing provision, the regular annual meeting of the members, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in the City of Oklahoma City, County of Oklahoma, State of Oklahoma, at the hour of 10:00 o'clock in the a.m., on the 1st day of February in each year, if not a legal holiday, and if a legal holiday, then on the next succeeding business day not a legal holiday. At said regular annual meeting, Directors of the corporation shall be elected to serve for

the ensuing year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 4. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called at any time by the President, or by the Board of Directors or by members holding not less than one-fifth of the voting power of the corporation or by any three or more members of the Board of Directors.

Section 5. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of special meetings of members shall be given by written notice personally served on each member, or deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to him at his address appearing upon the books of the corporation or supplied by him to the corporation for the purpose of notice at least three (3) days before the time fixed for holding said meeting; provided, however, that if the member has supplied no address and if the place of business or residence of the member is not known to the Secretary, then notice shall be deemed to have been given to him if mailed within such time to him General Delivery at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Section 6. QUORUM, VOTING AND PROXIES. At all meetings of the members (whether regular, special or adjourned), the presence in person or by proxy in writing of a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. All proxies shall be in writing subscribed by the party entitled to vote, or by his duly authorized attorney, and no such proxy shall be valid or confer any right or authority to vote or act thereunder unless such proxy has been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the meeting at which the same is to be used, provided that in case any meeting of members whatsoever (whether regular, special, or adjourned) shall have been for any cause adjourned, proxies shall be valid and may be used at such adjourned meeting, which have been offered for filing to, and left with, the Secretary of the corporation prior to the date upon which said adjourned meeting shall be in fact held. No proxy shall be valid after the expiration of eleven months from the date of its execution, unless the member executing it specified therein the length of time for which such proxy is to continue in force, which in no case shall exceed three years from the date of its execution.

Section 7. ADJOURNMENTS. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the members may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting. If no quorum be present at any meeting whatsoever of the members (whether regular, special, or adjourned), such meeting may be adjourned by those present from day to day, or from time to time, until such quorum be obtained, such adjournment and the reasons therefore being recorded in the journal, or minutes of proceedings of the members, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such adjourned meeting, unless the adjournment be for thirty (30) days or more, in which case a new notice must be given as in the case of a meeting originally called.

Section 8. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of members, however called or noticed shall be as valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a

quorum be present, either in person or by proxy, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the members, not present in person or by proxy, sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

ARTICLE II Directors

Section 1. NUMBER. The number of Directors of this corporation shall be thirty (30). The authorized number of Directors of this corporation may be changed by a Bylaw duly adopted by the members, provided that at no time shall the corporation have less than nine (9) nor more than thirty (30) Directors. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection. A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

Section 2. ELECTION AND TERMS. The Directors named in the Articles of Incorporation of this corporation shall hold office until the expiration of their respective terms and until their successors are elected either at an annual meeting or at a special meeting of members. Subject to the foregoing, those directors whose terms have expired shall be elected annually at an annual or a regular or a special meeting of the members. The initial terms of office shall begin immediately after election and shall continue for one year as to one-third of the board membership, for two years as to one-third of the board membership, and three years as to one-third of the board membership. After the initial terms, each director shall serve a term of three years until their successors are elected and qualified. No person may serve as director for more than two consecutive full three-year terms. At all elections or votes had for any purpose, there must be present in person or by proxy a majority of the members entitled to vote and every person acting therein in person or by proxy or representative must himself be a bona fide member of the corporation.

Section 3. QUORUM. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, a majority of the authorized number of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board for the transaction of business. Every act or decision done or made by a majority of the Directors present at a meeting duly held at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the Board of Directors, provided, however, that a minority of the Board of Directors, in the absence of a quorum, may adjourn any meeting of the Board of Directors from day to day, but may not transact any business except the filling of vacancies in the Board of Directors as in these Bylaws hereinafter provided.

Section 4. COMPENSATION. Directors (as such) shall not receive any stated or fixed salary for their services, but may receive a reasonable allowance for personal services actually rendered, by resolution passed by a majority vote at any regular or special meeting of the members; provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

Section 5. VACANCIES. Any vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors may be filled by a majority of the remaining Directors, though less than a quorum, and each Director so chosen shall hold office until his successor is elected at an annual or a regular or special meeting of the members. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in case of the death, resignation or removal of any Directors or if the authorized number of Directors be increased or if the members fail at any annual, regular, or special meeting of members to elect the full authorized number of Directors to be voted for at the meeting.

Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES. Subject to the limitations of the Articles and of pertinent restrictions of the laws of Oklahoma, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of, and the business and affairs of the corporation shall be controlled by the Board of Directors. Without prejudice to such general powers but subject to the limitations herein set forth, the Board of Directors shall have power:

First: To elect and remove at pleasure all the officers, agents and employees of the corporation, prescribe such duties for them as may not be inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, fix the terms of their offices and their compensation and in their discretion require from them security for faithful service.

Second: To appoint an executive committee and any other committee or any such other committee subject to the control of the Board of Directors, any of the powers and authority of the Board, except to adopt, amend or repeal these Bylaws; provided, however, that any such executive committee shall be composed of two or more Directors.

Third: To disburse the principal or the income of the property of the corporation to beneficiaries for charitable, scientific, educational, benevolent or other eleemosynary purposes, and generally to conduct, manage and control the affairs and business of the corporation, and to make such rules and regulations therefor, not inconsistent with law and these Bylaws, as they may deem best.

Fourth: To fix, from time to time, the office of the corporation, and to designate from time to time any place or places where meetings of the members and/or Directors of this corporation shall or may be held; to adopt, make, and use a corporate seal, and to alter the form of such seal, from time to time, as in their judgment they may deem advisable.

Fifth: From time to time or at any time, subject to the power of the members to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws, to adopt, amend or repeal Bylaws other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors. Sixth: Generally to do and perform every act and thing whatsoever that may pertain to the office of a Director or to a Board of Directors of a non-profit corporation.

ARTICLE III Meetings of Directors

Section 1. PLACE OF MEETINGS. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary of these Bylaws provided, any meeting (whether regular, special, or adjourned) of the Board of Directors of the corporation may be held at any place within or without the State of Oklahoma which has been theretofore designated for that purpose by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the written consent of all of the members of the Board.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS. Subject to the next preceding provision, regular meetings of the Board of Directors, of which no notice need be given, shall be held at the principal office of the corporation in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, immediately after the adjournment of each annual meeting of the members (which meeting shall be designated the Regular Annual Meeting) and at such other times at said place as may be designated as the times for regular meetings of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by order of the President or of any Vice-President or of three or more of the Directors.

Section 4. NOTICE OF SPECIAL MEETINGS. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be given to each Director by the delivery personally or by mail of a written or printed notice or by cable, telegraph, radio-telegraph, telephone or radio-telephone at least twenty-four (24) hours before the time fixed for holding said meeting. Each Director shall register his address with the Secretary and notice of meetings sent or given by mail, cable, telegraph, radio-telephone, telephone or radio-telephone, as herein above provided, to such address shall be valid notice of such meetings.

If any Director shall fail to so register his address such notice may be mailed to such Director, General Delivery, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Such service of notice shall be entered in the minutes of the corporation, and said minutes, upon being read and approved at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Directors shall be conclusive upon the question of notice.

Section 5. WAIVER AND CONSENT. The transactions of any meeting of Directors, however called or noticed, shall be valid as though had at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if a quorum be present, and if either before or after the meeting, each of the Directors not present sign a written waiver of notice or a consent to the holding of such meeting, or an approval of the minutes thereof.

Section 6. BUSINESS AT A SPECIAL OR ADJOURNED MEETING. Any business which might be done at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors may be done at a special or at an adjourned meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV Officers

Section 1. ELECTION AND QUALIFICATIONS. The officers of this corporation shall consist of a President, Vice-President, a Secretary and Treasurer, or a Secretary-Treasurer, and an Assistant Secretary. They shall be chosen by the Board of Directors, and the President must be chosen from the Directors. Any other officers may or may not be Directors. The same person may be chosen for and hold any of two or more of said offices, except that the same person may not hold both the office of President and that of Secretary. The Board of Directors, if it deems advisable, may elect at any time a Chairman of the Board, and additional Vice-Presidents, one or more Assistant Secretaries and/or one or more Assistant Treasurers, with such powers as the Board shall from time to time prescribe.

Section 2. TERMS AND COMPENSATION. The term of office and the salary of each of said officers, and the manner and time of the payment of such salaries shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Directors and may be altered by said Board from time to time, and at any time at its pleasure.

ARTICLE V President

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the President shall be:

First: To preside at all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors.

Second: Subject to the direction of the Board of Directors, to generally manage the affairs of the corporation, and handle the investment of the property and assets and the distribution of the income and principal of the corporation, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors.

Third: To call such special meetings of the Board of Directors to be held at such times and places as he shall deem proper.

Fourth: To affix the signature of the corporation to all deeds, conveyances, mortgages, leases, obligations, bonds, certificates, and other papers and instruments in writing that may require the same, and to supervise and control, subject to the advice and approval of the Board of Directors, all of the officers, agents and employees of this corporation.

ARTICLE VI Vice-Presidents

Section 1. POWER AND DUTIES. In case of the absence, disability or death of the President, the Vice-President senior in point of time of election shall take his place and perform his duties. Vice-Presidents of this corporation shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be granted or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII Secretary (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The powers and duties of the Secretary shall be:

First: To keep full and complete record of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and of the meetings of the members.

Second: To keep the seal of the corporation and to affix the same to all instruments which may require it.

Third: To make service and publication of all notices that may be necessary or proper, and without command or direction from anyone. In case of the absence, inability, refusal or neglect of the Secretary, to make service or publication of any notice, then such notice may be served and published by the President or a Vice-President, or by any person thereunto authorized by either of them, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority of the members.

Fourth: To supervise and control the keeping of the accounts and books of the corporation.

Fifth: Generally to do and perform all such duties as pertain to his office and as may be required by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VIII

Treasurer (or Secretary-Treasurer)

Section 1. POWERS AND DUTIES. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to or paid into the corporation and give receipts therefor as shall be required, and shall deposit such moneys, as he shall be directed by the Board of Directors, with one or more solvent and reputable bank or banks to be designated by the Board of Directors, and shall keep full and complete records of the funds received and disbursements thereof.

ARTICLE IX

Section 1. The Directors are to render an account annually, covering the following matters:

First: The gross income for the year;

Second: The expenses attributable to such income and incurred within the year;

Third: The disbursements out of income within the year for the purpose for which this corporation was formed;

Fourth: Disbursements within the year out of the principal accumulated in the current and prior years for the purpose set forth in Article IV of the Articles of Incorporation;

Fifth: A Balance Sheet showing assets, liabilities and net worth as of the close of each accounting year.

ARTICLE X Notice of Regular Meetings

Section 1. DISPENSED WITH. Notice of any and all regular meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors is hereby waived and dispensed with, and no notice whatsoever need be given of any such regular meeting, except as provided in Title 18, Section 1.42 of the Oklahoma Statutes, unless it is to be held at a place other than the principal office of the corporation in the State of Oklahoma, or the place at which it is regularly held.

ARTICLE XI Amendments

Section 1. METHOD OF AMENDMENT. These Bylaws may be amended by repeal and new and additional Bylaws may be made from time to time and at any time by a majority of the members or by the written assent of such members. Subject to the right of the members to amend or repeal these Bylaws, other than a Bylaw or amendment thereof changing the authorized number of Directors, may be amended or repealed by the Board of Directors in the exercise of the power granted to said Board of Directors in Article II, Section 6, Subdivision Fifth of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII

Receipts, Investment and Disbursements of Funds

Section 1. The corporation shall receive all moneys and/or other property distributed to it for charitable purposes which are in accordance with the provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and of these Bylaws, as determined by the Board of Directors. However, nothing contained herein shall require the Board of Directors to accept or receive any money or property of any kind if it shall determine in its discretion that receipt of such money or property is contrary to the public interest, or that of the corporation, or is undesirable for any other reason.

Section 2. The corporation may hold or disburse any funds or property, real or personal, received by it from any source, but in holding or disbursing such funds or property shall be bound by the terms and conditions, if any, under which such funds or property were given to the corporation if consistent with the purposes and aims of the corporation.

Section 3. No charitable disbursement shall be made unless it is first approved by a majority of all of the Directors then in office pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Directors. However, the Directors shall have the authority to appropriate specific sums to specific charitable purposes and to authorize a specific Director, or a specific officer of this corporation to apply funds so appropriated, from time to time, to the specific charitable purposes or purpose for which such appropriation is made. The restrictions herein contained shall not apply to disbursements made for the purpose of meeting the operating expenses of this corporation.

Section 4. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this corporation, no funds or property of this corporation shall be disbursed unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor, or unless, pursuant to Section 3 of this paragraph, such funds or property are distributed to beneficiaries for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational or eleemosynary purposes. No disbursements to or for the direct or indirect benefit of any Director or member of this corporation or to any firm or corporation controlled by such a Director or member shall be considered as being made for religious, charitable, benevolent, scientific, educational, or eleemosynary purposes within the meaning of this section.

Section 5. In the event of dissolution of this corporation, the assets

of the corporation, after payment of legitimate expenses and liabilities, shall be devoted exclusively for the benefit of religious, charitable, scientific, educational, and benevolent activities.

ARTICLE XIII

Section 1. INSTRUMENTS IN WRITING. All checks, drafts, demands for money and notes of the corporation, and all written contracts of the corporation shall be signed by such officer or officers, agent or agents, as the Board of Directors may from time to time by resolution designate. No officer, agent, or employee of the corporation shall have power to bind the corporation by contract or otherwise unless authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the undersigned, being all of the Directors and all of the members of the above named corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of Thirteen Articles, were duly adopted as the Bylaws of said corporation on this 12th day of February, 1960, A.D.

Articles of Incorporation of Baptist Laymen's Corporation of Tulsa

The undersigned incorporators, being persons legally competent to enter into contracts for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of Oklahoma under the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, Section 541 et seq. pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, or scientific purposes, do hereby associate ourselves together for such purpose, and pursuant thereto do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is BAPTIST LAYMEN'S CORPORATION OF TULSA.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and its Registered Agent is Dr. Joe L. Ingram, 1141 North Robinson Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III

The duration of this corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The corporation is formed exclusively for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes, including for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), and particularly the following purposes:

- (a) It is the general purpose of this corporation to engage in, develop, encourage, promote, finance, contribute to or carry on religious, charitable, educational, benevolent or scientific works, endeavors and activities of any and all kinds; and particularly those performed or promoted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by the Southern Baptist Convention.
- (b) To aid, support, maintain and assist, by gift, donation, or otherwise, established religious or charitable institutions, projects or endeavors whether incorporated or unincorporated, whose objects or purposes are to give spiritual or physical aid, comfort, support or

assistance to maimed, crippled, aged, indigent, or needy persons, or to aid, support, maintain, assist, give or donate to such individuals directly.

- (c) To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care for sick, infirm, aged, injured, destitute, or otherwise needy persons.
- (d) To assist by gift, loan, or otherwise, such worthy, talented, industrious or needy young man or young woman, as shall be selected by the Directors of this corporation to pursue his or her studies, or develop his or her talent in any school or university to be selected by such Directors.
- (e) To operate through its officers, directors, committees; or other agencies; to seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from the contributions of its members and others and from such other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the Directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- (f) To solicit and accept voluntary contributions, and to accept, receive and administer cash, securities and property, real, personal, or mixed, of any and all kinds, by gift, grant, devise, trust agreement, bequest, exchange, or otherwise.
- (g) In order that additional funds may be obtained with which to carry out the purposes of this corporation:
- (1) To acquire real and personal property by purchase, lease or otherwise, and to mortgage, lease, sell, erect, construct, improve, rebuild, maintain and operate buildings and institutions for business purposes, or otherwise, together with equipment, machinery and supplies, and all related facilities;
- (2) To subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with shares of the capital stock, scrip, warrants, bonds, debentures, debenture obligations and evidences of indebtedness created or issued by any government, or any political subdivision thereof, or created or issued by itself, or by any other corporation, joint stock company, or association, whether public, private, or municipal, or any corporate body whatever; and while the owner thereof to have and to exercise in respect thereof all the rights, powers, and privileges of ownership, including the right to vote thereon; to subscribe for, purchase or otherwise acquire, own, hold, negotiate, pledge, mortgage, sell, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of and deal in and with bonds, notes, and other evidences of indebtedness secured by first mortgages on real estate and/or the improvements thereon;
- (3) To purchase, take, own, hold, deal in, mortgage or otherwise subject to lien, and to lease, sell, exchange, convey, transfer, or in any manner whatever dispose of, any property, real, personal, or mixed, within or without the State of Oklahoma;
- (4) To purchase or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of the capital stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness created by other corporations and while the holder of such stock to exercise all the rights and privileges

of ownership, including the right to vote thereon, to the same extent as a natural person might or could do;

- (5) To borrow money for any of the purposes of the corporation and to draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute, issue, sell, pledge or otherwise dispose of promissory notes, drafts, bill of exchange, warrants, bonds, debentures and other negotiable or non-negotiable, transferable or non-transferable instruments and evidences of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured; and to secure the payment thereof and the interest thereon by mortgage or pledge, conveyance or assignment in trust of the whole or any part of the property of the corporation at the time owned or thereafter acquired.
- (h) To have and maintain one or more offices in order to conduct any or all of its operations and business and to promote its objects.
- (i) To do any or all of the things herein set forth as principal, agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others.

ARTICLE V

This corporation shall have no stated capital or capital stock. It is organized and shall be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, educational, benevolent, scientific or philanthropic purposes, and not for financial gain. No part of the net earnings shall inure to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual, and no part of the activities of this corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and any receipts of this corporation in excess of the expense of the conduct and operation thereof, shall be applied by the Directors to carry out the purposes of this organization and operation, as they, in their judgment may deem wise and proper.

ARTICLE VI

The members of this corporation shall be those whose names are subscribed hereto and such additional members as may be admitted upon qualifications, mode of election, and terms of admission, expulsion, and suspension, as shall be prescribed in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VII

(a) Subject to the limitations provided by law, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under authority of, and the business and affairs of such corporation shall be managed and conducted by a Board of Directors, the number, the qualifications, manner of election, and term of office of which may be prescribed by the Bylaws. The election of Directors shall be subject to approval and confirmation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting either in Convention assembled or by and through its duly elected Board of Directors. If the said Convention shall fail to confirm the election of any Director, the remaining Directors shall elect another Director to succeed the one failing of confirmation, and in the event the Convention does not confirm the Director who has been elected in substitution, the Convention shall nominate and elect a Director of its own selection.

A Director who has been elected and whose election is pending confirmation by the Convention shall exercise the full powers of the office of Director.

(b) The number of Directors elected at the first meeting of the members and incorporators was seventeen (17). The number of Directors may be changed from time to time in such a lawful manner as is provided by the Bylaws; provided, however, this corporation shall have a minimum of nine (9) Directors and a maximum of thirty (30) Directors at all times. In addition to the above Directors, the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the Administrator of Lackey Manor in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, or their successors in office, shall at all times be Directors of the corporation, ex-officio, with no voting privileges. At an election held in the office of the corporation at Owasso, Oklahoma, on the 28th day of September, 1979, the following Directors were elected to serve until their successors are elected and qualified:

John D. Setser, Calvin Vogt, Howard Doak, Charles Leake, Bert McElroy, Joy Huitt, Norman Farrell. J. Ray Smith, John Crain, Claude H. Rogers, Joseph R. Coleman, Al Geiger, Victor Thompson. Robert D. McCullough, Joe Moore, John Nikkel, Joseph M. Best, and Joe L. Ingram, Ex-Officio and Don Donalson, Ex-Officio.

ARTICLE VIII

The private property of the officers, Directors, and members of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of corporate debts to any extent whatever.

ARTICLE IX

In furtherance and not in limitation of the powers conferred by the laws of the State of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors is expressly authorized to make, alter, amend and repeal the Bylaws, and to authorize and cause to be executed bonds, debentures, promissory notes, and other evidences of indebtedness, either secured or unsecured, and mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property and franchises of this corporation.

ARTICLE X

Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner or to such organization or organizations organized or operating exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue law), as the Directors shall determine and which disposition has been approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court in the county

in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

ARTICLE XI

This corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in these Articles of Incorporation in the manner now or hereafter prescribed by law and all rights conferred on officers, directors, and members herein are granted subject to this reservation.

Jim Sanderson and Charles Womack spoke in opposition to the motion. Hubb Collier spoke for it and Charles Graves gave further explanation of the same.

The motion was approved.

Report of Nominating Committee

Article IV-Section 1 of the Convention's Bylaws empowers the President to appoint a fifteen member Nominating Committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice; an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to September 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations.

According to the Constitution and Bylaws relative to the Board of Directors, instructions are that due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation; there shall be at least one nominee for each associational area; additional nominees shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident church members in a given associational area; no association shall have more than eight members on the Board; there shall be at least eight laymen and eight women; and any Board member shall be considered resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected. Reports of Departments, Institutions and Agencies

Report of the Board of Directors Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Article V of the Convention's Constitution states that "all boards, trustees and standing committees . . . shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention."

As the convention closes each year a motion is made to authorize the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention; and that the president and recording secretary be authorized to sign legal papers of the convention which require signatures.

Since the convention last met the Board of Directors has had the following meetings: November 21, 1985, March 27, May 5, May 13 and September 30, 1986. The March 27 and May 5 meetings were special called meetings. This is a report of all transactions since the convention last met.

The organization chart of the convention divides the work into four areas of responsibility: administrative, business management, planning and promotion, and special care ministries. Each year just after the annual meeting of the convention, the president, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the vice-presidents, assigns each member of the board to serve on one of these committees. The board gave approval to the following assignments:

Special Care Ministries

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The Executive Committee

The Executive Committee, according to the Bylaws, performs only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors. This committee is made up of the convention president, the executive director-treasurer, recording secretary and the chairmen of the four board committees. The chairmen of the committees this year were Tom Shaw, Forrest Jackson, Richard Hopper and Robert Hammons. There were not any referrals to the committee this year.

Election of Search Committee

At the 1985 annual meeting, Dr. Joe L. Ingram announced his plans to step aside from his responsibilities as executive director-treasurer effective June 30, 1986. At the November 21 meeting of the board, President Estep announced that the Search Committee was to be elected. Two members of the board had reported they could not attend and had asked for the privilege of voting. One sent his selection by letter, the other by phone. The board voted to restrict voting only to those members present.

The president read from the Bylaws Article III, Section 4 the procedures to be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant. Warren Hultgren, First Church, Tulsa; Brad Allen, First Church, Duncan; Joe Hubb Collier, Texoma Southern Church, Kingston; Robert Hammons, First Church, Seminole; Richard Hopper, First Church, Ardmore; Rod Masteller, Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City; and Keith Wiginton, First Church, Altus were elected by secret ballot to serve as the Search Committee. By constitutional provision, the person receiving the largest number of votes serves as chairman. Dr. Hultgren served in that position.

Report of Search Committee

A special called meeting of the board was held on May 5 to hear the report of the Search Committee. Chairman Hultgren reviewed the process by which the committee worked. Twenty-one persons were recommended. The committee carefully considered each candidate and determined to interview 12 of the men. He expressed appreciation to the group that as far as he knew no one tried to exercise undue influence on the committee.

The committee was unanimous in their decision to nominate Dr. William G. Tanner, as executive director-treasurer effective July 1, 1986.

Prior to the vote of the board, members of the committee spoke briefly on various aspects of Dr. Tanner's life and ministry. The presentations were as follows:

Warren Hultgren—summary statement

Dr. Tanner was asked to express his feelings, desires, aims and dreams for Oklahoma Baptists. He stated that he would seek to lead Oklahoma Baptists to evangelize, congregationalize (organize churches)

By standing, the vote was affirmative for Dr. Tanner to become executive director-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma on July 1, 1986. There was one negative vote and one abstention. The person casting the negative vote made a motion to make the vote unanimous and it carried.

Dr. Ingram commended the board on their decision and pledged his support to his successor, Dr. Tanner.

Business Management Committee

The responsibility of the Business Management Committee is the Accounting Office, all insurance, Baptist Building management, and management of all properties other than Falls Creek, Camp Hudgens and Nunny-Cha-ha. The chairman was Forrest Jackson.

December Report—

and to minister in love.

The December meeting was primarily for orientation. Accounting procedures, and insurance and property management were discussed. The committee concurred with the plans to transfer the convention's workmen's compensation insurance to Baptist Health Care Corporation's Support Services Division.

May Report and Recommendations-

- 1. Convention Audit Approved—The committee reviewed the audits of the convention and recommended approval to the board. The board approved and asked that the audit be printed in the 1985 State Convention Annual for distribution to all churches.
- 2. 1986 Auditor—Englebach, Roberts and Company, Certified Public Accountants, were approved as auditors for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for 1986.
- 3. Financing for Remodeling of Former Book Store Area—In April the Baptist Book Store vacated the area they had leased in the Baptist Building. Because of very crowded conditions in the Baptist Foundation office, they will relocate in the area formerly used by the book store. There will have to be extensive remodeling. In order to finance the remodeling expense, the board authorized the convention to borrow up

to \$250,000 from the Baptist Foundation to be used for remodeling, renovation, and refurnishing of the office space for the Foundation. Interest rate will be the same as charged to churches for church building loans with the principal to be repaid in equal installments over a period of 15 years. Instead of making monthly payments, the Foundation will credit the Convention for the payments in lieu of monthly rental payments for the use of the space. After the note is repaid, the Foundation will resume customary rental payments to the Convention for the space.

Planning and Promotion

This committee gives counsel in stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, disaster relief, video/media and also to the church program departments. Richard Hopper served as chairman.

November Report-

The first meeting of the year was mainly for orientation. The chairman appointed Don Reed, chairman; Jerry Walker and Keith Russell to serve as the Disaster Relief Sub-Committee.

May Report and Recommendation-

A recommendation was made to the board that the Falls Creek policy concerning Sunday closing be amended to grant permission to any church to have a building dedication on Sunday afternoon, if requested. The recommendation was amended that this be done on a six months basis. After it is evaluated, a report will be brought back to the board.

September Report—

Chaney Introduced—Ed Chaney was introduced to the Board as the newly employed associate director in the Department of Evangelism.

Special Care Ministries Committee

Robert Hammons gave direction to the committee that advises in the child care and adult care ministries. Children's homes are operated at Oklahoma City, Owasso, Madill, Ada, Duncan, Clinton, McAlester, Mooreland and Boys Ranch Town near Edmond. There are many other areas of work in the child care ministries among which are foster homes, alternatives to abortion, unwed mother program, and adoption. Adult care ministries include the operation of retirement centers at Oklahoma City, Owasso, Hugo, and villages at Ada, Madill, Cleveland and Okmulgee.

November Report and Recommendations-

- 1. Mother's Day Offering Goal—Approval was given for the 1986 Mother's Day Offering goal to be \$555,555.55 with \$30,000 of that amount designated to the Baptist villages to assist in hardship cases, and \$25,000 to the Pregnancy Crisis Center.
- 2. Rayola Baptist Community at Owasso—The children's home and retirement centers at Owasso are located on land given by Mr. & Mrs. J. Ray Smith. It was announced that the two institutions will be called Rayola Baptist Community.

- 3. Personnel Changes Made Known—Robert Griffin was transferred from the Madill village to be administrator of the nursing home at Owasso. Chris Walker moved from Boys Ranch Town as a staff member to become administrator of the children's home and village at Madill.
- 4. Baptist Members of BMC Board Approved—The Transfer Agreement with Baptist Medical Center states that 60 percent of the members of their Board of Directors are to be active members of a local Southern Baptist church and are to be approved by the Convention's Board of Directors. The Laymen's Corporation will enter into a fund-raising campaign for a minimum of \$500,000 and the balance will be financed by tax-exempt bonds to be repaid from operating revenue. The skilled nursing facility will entitle Medicare patients to be admitted.
- 2. Remodeling Authorized for Lackey Manor—The Oklahoma City Laymen's Corporation was also authorized to borrow up to \$163,950 from the Baptist Foundation at the same interest charged to churches for church building loans for remodeling Lackey Manor Nursing Home. The loan will be repaid from operating revenues over a 15-year period.

Lackey Manor has not been extensively remodeled for approximately 21 years.

- 3. Auditors for Hugo and Oklahoma City Centers—Englebach, Roberts and Company, Certified Public Accountants, were approved as auditors for Oklahoma City and Hugo Baptist Retirement Centers. Accounting for the other centers and villages is done in the convention's accounting office.
- 4. Okmulgee Village Transferred to Convention—First Baptist Church, Okmulgee, originally requested that the convention build and operate a Baptist village in Okmulgee. Since the convention was in the process of building Baptist villages at Ada, Madill and Cleveland, the board asked Baptist Health Care Corporation to build and operate the Okmulgee facility. The church deeded the property to Baptist Health Care Corporation.

Three villages (Cordell, Miami, and Grove) operated by Baptist Health Care Corporation are located in towns where Baptist Health Care hospitals are located and administration of the villages is done by the administrators of the hospitals. Since the Special Care Ministries Office was created last year, it was felt that the convention would be the proper entity to operate the Okmulgee village since it was not near a hospital operated by Baptist Health Care Corporation. The following transfer agreement was approved by the board:

Resolution

WHEREAS, Baptist Health Care Corporation (Health Care) has acquired a certain tract of land at the outskirts of the City of Okmulgee, Oklahoma, upon which it has caused to be constructed a retirement center consisting of 52 apartment units, and 3 duplexes, known as the Okmulgee Baptist Village (Village); and

WHEREAS, in order to obtain necessary funds for its construction and to defray initial operating costs for the Village, Health Care has borrowed certain monies in the aggregate amount of \$1,800,000, and has advanced from its own operating reserves the sum of \$50,355; and

WHEREAS, both Health Care and the Convention recognize that the ministry which is being performed through the daily operation and management of the village is a proper and integral part of the Adult Care Ministry presently conducted by the Convention; and since the initial construction of the Village is now completed, and the facility is in full operation, Health Care is willing to convey said land and improvements to the Convention, provided the Convention assumes and agrees to pay the unpaid balance of all debts secured by mortgages and other liens against said real estate, and provided the Convention accepts legal and financial responsibility for the future operations of the Village;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting by and through its Board of Directors, hereby authorizes its officers to accept delivery of a warranty deed from Baptist Health Care Corporation when said deed is tendered, conveying the land and improvements comprising the

Okmulgee Baptist Village, subject to existing easements, zoning regulations, restrictive covenants and more particularly described as follows:

A tract of land in the W/2 of the NE/4 of the NW/4 of Section 12, Township 13 North, Range 12 East of the Indian Meridian, OKMULGEE COUNTY, STATE OF OKLAHOMA, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point 200 feet south of the Northeast corner of said W/2 of NE/4 of NW/4 of said Section 12; thence West 660 feet; thence South 550 feet; thence East 660 feet; thence North 550 feet to the point of beginning.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that by acceptance of said deed the Convention thereby assumes and agrees to pay the unpaid balances of all debts secured by mortgages and liens against said real estate, which debts are in the original aggregate principal amount of \$1,800,000, namely;

Promissory Note signed by Baptist Health Care Corporation, dated December 30, 1983, payable to THE OKLAHOMA DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY in the principal amount of \$1,500,000, which note represents Baptist Health Care Corporation's initial borrowing under a financing arrangement whereby said Authority issued its First Mortgage Revenue Note, Baptist Health Care Corporation Okmulgee Retirement Village Project, Series 1983, which note was purchased by Fidelity Bank, N.A., Oklahoma City, Oklahoma (now Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City, N.A.) in a private placement transaction;

A second Promissory Note signed by Baptist Health Care Corporation, dated November 7, 1984, payable to OKMULGEE COUNTY HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, Okmulgee, Oklahoma, in the principal amount of \$300,000, which note represents an additional borrowing by the Baptist Health Care Corporation to complete the project. The funds for this subsequent loan to Baptist Health Care Corporation were obtained by said Authority through its borrowing from Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City, N. A.

and to indemnify and hold harmless the Baptist Health Care Corporation from any loss, cost, or expense by reason of the aforesaid mortgage. September Report and Recommendations—

1. Vote by Mail Ratified—In July the board was polled by mail regarding a "pilot" program to minister to elderly Baptists on a limited income through the Southern Oklahoma Baptist Village at Madill. There were 53 affirmative votes, one no vote, two abstentions, and 10 who did not return their ballots. The board ratified the action in September. An explanation of the program follows:

This program has been designed to provide quality housing for retired adults on limited income in Oklahoma. An effort has been made so that NO INDIVIDUAL OR ADULT COUPLE IN RETIREMENT IS REFUSED ADMISSION BECAUSE OF INABILITY TO PAY. The outline is:

- 1. A graduated scale of payments:
 - 1) Anyone with income under \$300 monthly will pay only 20 percent of total income for rent at this facility.
 - With income up to \$400—Pay only 25 percent of total income for rent.
 - With income up to \$500—Pay only 30 percent of total income for rent.

NOTE: No individual or couple will be asked to pay more than \$325 monthly for rent. Utilities will be the responsibility of all residents.

- 2. Allowances will be made for excessive medical and drug bills.
- 3. The Director of Adult Care Ministry will make the final decision regarding these policies.
- 4. When there is a change in income, rent will be adjusted.
- 5. This is a pilot program to be reviewed after one year.
- 2. Construction of Activities Center at Madill Authorized—The Board voted for an activities center to be built at Southern Oklahoma Children's Home at Madill as soon as funds are available. The Noble Foundation pledged \$100,000 and gifts of over \$250,000 were raised through Special Care Ministries.

Administrative Committee

Tom Shaw served as chairman of the Administrative Committee which has the assignment of work related to personnel, budget, annuity, ministerial services, **Baptist Messenger** and Baptist student work.

November Report and Recommendation-

Foster Elected for Unexpired Term—Rick Edwards moved from Claremore to Okemah and according to the convention's bylaws, a board member is considered resigned if he moves from the associational area from which he was elected. Weldon Foster was elected to complete the unexpired term of Rick Edwards.

March Report and Recommendation-

Bristow Approved as Director of Evangelism—In a special called meeting of the board, William H. Cook was recognized as chairman of the Search Committee for director of evangelism. The Search Committee through the Administrative Committee recommended to the board that Wayne Bristow, from the Foreign Mission Board, be employed as director of evangelism. The board gave unanimous approval.

May Report and Recommendations-

- 1. Convention to Give Annuity Assistance—The Church Annuity Plan that will become effective January 1, 1988 calls for the convention annually to contribute \$420 for each person whose church and/or pastor contributes the minimum of \$1,260. In order for persons who have low salaries (such as bi-vocational pastors) not to be penalized, the board approved a plan whereby if the church pays 15 percent of the person's annual salary into the Church Annuity Plan, the convention will contribute \$420.
 - 2. Convention Employees to be in New Annuity Plan-The board

gave further approval to all convention employees' participation in the new Annuity Plan if they work at least 1,000 hours a year, unless otherwise excluded. This is to be effective January 1, 1988.

3. Amended and Restated Supplement to Convention Annuity Plan Approved—The board approved an amended and restated supplement to the Convention Annuity Plan. The basic change in the document was to specifically name those to be enrolled in the plan. This added clarification to previous plans.

September Report and Recommendations-

- 1. Baptist Messenger Subscription Rate Increased—Authority was given for the Baptist Messenger subscription rate to be increased from \$3.50 to \$4.00 per year for the church budget plan and from \$4.00 to \$4.50 for individual subscriptions. The increase is to become effective January 1, 1987.
- 2. Use of Endowment Funds Approved—The board voted that the action taken May 14, 1985 relative to the "use of endowment income," be extended three years. The newly approved recommendation reads as follows: "That all endowment earnings produced by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for Convention departments, unless otherwise restricted, be applied to the 1987, 1988, and 1989 budgets for those endowed departments.

Background

The following motion was approved by the Board of Directors, May 14, 1985.

"The economic recession in Oklahoma continues, and an assessment by business and governmental leaders indicates that the Oklahoma economy will continue to be slow on into 1986. Although the churches are continuing to give faithfully, it appears that we will have a basic budget shortfall for 1985. We have already instituted cost saving procedures in order to underspend the 1985 basic budget. As an additional safeguard, we recommend that all endowment earnings produced by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for Convention departments, unless otherwise restricted, be applied to the 1985 and 1986 budgets for those endowed departments."

Oklahoma Baptist churches continue to give faithfully during 1986. Likewise, the Convention departments and agencies continue to underspend the 1986 budget. However, since the economic picture in Oklahoma has not improved during 1985 and 1986, it would be wise to extend the May 14, 1985, recommendation.

Recommendations

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1987 be \$17,746,300; to be distributed as follows: 50 percent Southern Baptist convention and 50 percent State, with the 50 percent to Southern Baptist Convention to be distributed on a weekly basis. Of the 50 percent State, Oklahoma Baptist University will receive 26.8 percent, the Baptist Foundation 3.8 percent, and the remaining departments and agencies will receive 69.4 percent. All Cooperative Program receipts will be distributed on the same

percentage basis. This process will enable the Executive Director-Treasurer to keep Cooperative Program expenditures in line with the Cooperative Program income.

2. That the 1987 Cooperative Program be distributed as outlined:

Oklahoma Baptist University

Bob R. Agee, President

During a period when many institutions across Oklahoma were retreating in the face of difficult economic times, Oklahoma Baptist University was moving ahead boldly to fulfill the mission with which it was entrusted by its founders 76 years ago—to provide Oklahoma Baptists with a quality institution of Christian higher education.

God's blessings were evident in every area of the University in 1985-86 as students, faculty, administration, alumni and friends underscored their commitment through involvement.

The University gained nationwide attention in November when U.S. News and World Report magazine listed OBU as one of the top 15 smaller comprehensive institutions in a 16-state region. The magazine's listing of America's top colleges and universities was the result of a poll of 1,318 college presidents. The presidents were asked to rate institutions based on strength of curriculum, quality of teaching, relationship between faculty and students and atmosphere for learning.

For the fourth consecutive fall semester, OBU experienced a growth enrollment. In 1985 enrollment grew to a total of 1,604, an increase of one percent. The total included approximately 150 enrolled in OBU's Ministry Training Institutes. The student body was equally split between the sexes with 802 men and 802 women. Seventy-five percent of OBU's students last fall came from 71 of Oklahoma's 77 counties. A total of 41 states and 23 foreign countries were represented in the student population.

The commitment of OBU alumni and supporters was evidenced in the miraculous success of the Vision for Excellence Capital Campaign. A record \$2,813,292 in contributions was received by the University during the 1985-86 fiscal year, pushing the Vision for Excellence total to \$11.9 million. The campaign was launched in January of 1983 with a base goal of \$6 million, a challenge goal of \$10.25 million and a victory goal of \$12 million. The campaign's conclusion is scheduled for December 1986. Funds from the campaign are being used for construction, renovation and endowment projects.

The campaign's first priority, the \$2.9 million W. P. Wood Science Building, was opened to faculty and students in January and was dedicated on April 22. The facility is one of the finest of its kind in the Southwest and includes classrooms and laboratories for chemistry, biology and physics, as well as a science museum and planetarium.

Another campaign priority, the \$1.2 million Sarkeys Telecommunication Center, was also completed. The center houses a television studio and production suites for video programming and a black box theater. Classrooms, offices and other support facilities for the telecommunication program are also included in the complex.

Three new vice-presidents and one dean were appointed during 1985-86. John W. Parrish, former assistant vice-president for development and alumni director, was promoted to vice-president for institutional advancement in January. Dr. Pat Taylor, former associate vice-president for academic affairs at Union University, was named vice-president for academic affairs. He replaced former vice-president Dr. Shirley Jones, who returned to full-time teaching in the University's division of language and literature. Dr. Merl Jennings, former associate dean of students and director of the Career Planning Center, was promoted to vice-president for student development. He replaced Donald G. Osborn, who was named special assistant to the president for institutional research. Dr. Paul Hammon, former chairman of the church music department at Ouachita Baptist University, succeeded Dr. James D. Woodward as dean of the Warren M. Angell College of Fine Arts. Dr. Woodward was named OBU artist-in-residence in May.

New faculty include: Dr. Montie A. Campbell, associate professor of psychology; Barry Cavin, assistant professor of communication arts (theater) and director of theater; Dr. Yuan-Liang Albert Chen, assistant professor in physics and mathematics; Dr. Katherine Dawkins Hale, assistant professor of communication arts (speech); and Jeff David Potter, assistant professor of health, physical education and recreation, and track and cross country coach. Others are: Cynthia S. Schneider, assistant professor of nursing; Dr. Frank John Smist Jr., assistant professor of political science; Judith Couch Taylor, assistant professor of education; Margaret Tyner, assistant professor of communication arts (communications); Dr. Carolyn L. Tyree, assistant professor of education; and John Clay Willis, assistant professor of business.

New administrative staff members include: LeAnna Crow, WMU Dormitory director; Beth Davis, admissions counselor; Michael K. Edge, admissions counselor; R. Tom Evans, television production assistant; Stephen P. Holman, staff photographer/sports information director; Leanne Lewis, newswriter; C. Mark Smith, director of alumni and annual giving; and Steven J. Thomas, regional development director.

The OBU campus was vibrant with spiritual health in 1985-86. The year saw one of OBU's greatest campus revivals led by Wendell Estep, former pastor of council Road Baptist Church in Bethany and former president of the BGCO. A tone was set that still prevails.

Christian Focus Week in January explored the topic, Getting Ready for Harvest. Speakers such as Dr. Dean Finley, national evangelism counsultant for the Home Mission Board, and Rod Masteller, pastor

of Putnam City Church in Oklahoma City, led students through an emphasis on evangelism.

The spiritual highlight of the year, however, was the Home Mission Experience. OBU was selected as one of five Baptist college campuses to host this program. Fifteen home misionaries spent most of a week with students in worship services, classes, seminars and private conferences—all aimed at heightening missions awareness and encouraging individuals in either full- or part-time missionary work. Almost 100 students made commitments and the conference led more students than ever to pursue short-term missions possibilities.

More than 85 students demonstrated their commitment to missions during the summer of 1986 by volunteering for a variety of missions opportunities ranging from serving as BSU summer missionaries to short-term assignments across the country and around the world. Numerous other students participated in revival teams, discipleship training and Ministerial Practical Experience Days in 1985-86.

As OBU's 75th Anniversary celebration drew to a close in the fall, several distinguished alumni and former presidents returned to campus to speak in chapel. In October, former OBU President Dr. Grady C. Cothen presented the 11th Hobbs Lecture and former president Dr. William G. Tanner spoke in chapel. Other guest speakers included Dr. William Hendricks, professor of Christian ethics at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and Dr. J. J. Owens, retired John R. Sampey Professor of Old Testament at Southern Seminary. In conjunction with 75th Anniversary activities, OBU sponsored BGCO Appreciation Day to express gratitude to Oklahoma Baptists for their longtime support of the University.

In the spring, Dr. Bill J. Leonard, associate professor of church history at Southern Seminary, presented the 12th Hobbs Lecture.

In an effort to educate students on the issue of world hunger, the Kerr Leadership Development Program featured a host of nationally known authors and speakers who addressed the implications and issues related to the global problem. The weeklong symposium took place in February.

Other lecturers featured on the OBU campus in the spring included former Oklahoma Gov. Raymond Gary, who presented the Thomas Harlan Henry Lecture in Oklahoma Heritage.

In May, OBU demonstrated its appreciation and respect for a man whose commitment to Christian higher education in Oklahoma has left a permanent mark on the University. Trustees voted to name the School of Christian Service in honor of Joe L. Ingram, former BGCO Executive Director-Treasurer. The announcement was made at Dr. Ingram's retirement dinner on May 13.

The University demonstrated its commitment to fiscal responsibility in 1985-86 by operating in the black for the 11th consecutive year. The board of trustees at its spring 1986 meeting approved a 1986-87 budget of \$11.3 million.

The past year presented many challenges for OBU, but we not only met those challenges, we forged ahead and continued our path of commitment to being all that God and Oklahoma Baptists want us to be.

Religious Education

Bill C. Haggard, Director

1984-85 marked the final year of "8.5 by '85." The Department of Religious Education has seen significant achievement in every area of work in the churches of Oklahoma. With the conclusion of this emphasis, next year (1985-86) we will continue our forward march under the theme, "Challenge 10/90," a goal to reach a total Sunday School enrollment of 10 million by 1990. During this time, we will continue an emphasis on "Developing Believers" in Church Training. The thrust of the Church Training emphasis will include strengthening the churches through doctrine and discipleship.

Personnel

Robert Audd, who had served as director of Church Training work, retired after nine and one-half years of effective service in the department. A minor reorganization in the department, with the department director serving as director of both Sunday School and Church Training permitted the hiring of Joe Sherrer as director of general administration work in Sunday School and Church Training, and associate department director.

The rest of the field staff includes: Billy Allen, director of adult work and associational projects, and associate department director; David Fuller, director of youth work, Vacation Bible School work, and church recreation; and Darlene Koch, director of childhood education, special education, and children's weekday education.

Secretaries in the department include Joan Eischen, secretary to Haggard; Sybil Cox, secretary to Sherrer, Donas Cook, secretary to Allen; Lou Rodriquez, secretary to Fuller, and Olive Hays, secretary to Koch.

Statistics

Sunday School enrollment continues to show significant gains. For the 14th consecutive year enrollment for the state showed an increase, with a total of 389,607, an increase of 6,572 over the previous year. Fourteen associations reported "all time," record breaking enrollments. Enrollment for the entire Southern Baptist Convention reached 7,960,796. Although this was below the goal of 8.5 million, we praise God for the 600,000 new members who were reached.

Vacation Bible School enrollment for 1985 was 142,546, representing an increase of 1,962 over the previous year. Out of the 30,000 prospects discovered through Vacation Bible School the previous year, only 5,553 received "follow-up." Of this number, 1,158 were enrolled in Sunday School, and 381 of this number have been saved. This vast potential represents one of the greatest opportunities we have. Pastors and

church leaders are challenged to reap the harvest of Vacation Bible School.

A net loss of 2,112 in Church Training enrollment resulted in total enrollment of 95,247. Efforts to improve a record system continues in local churches. Oklahoma will continue to align itself with strategies that produce growth and development of believers. Task assignments in Church Training will strengthen the program of doctrinally sound believers and maturing of new church members. **Developing Believers** continues to be the over-arching theme for 1985-1990.

Projects and Emphases

"Glorieta in Oklahoma" was conducted at the First Church, Ada, with almost 1,200 registrants and at the First Church, Muskogee with over 1,500 registrants.

Sunday School Leadership Seminars (2) were conducted in September at Falls Creek with 645 registrants. Four area Growth Spiral Conferences were attended by approximately 800 workers and pastors.

Working through the association continues to be one of the vital links through which Sunday School workers are trained, using the ASSISTeam. This past year the 41 associations in Oklahoma had 323 ASSISTeam members which represented 82.5 percent of the associations with total teams. Six associations conducted associational training schools, jointly sponsored by the Department of Religious Education. There were 1,624 leaders who attended these schools. Three associations conducted Enrollment/Enlargement Campaigns, discovering 3,174 prospects on 33 church fields.

The Church Training theme is emphasized through five strategies, namely: Training Church Members, Train New Church Members, Provide In-depth Discipleship Training, Teach Baptist Doctrine, and Train Church Leaders. Projects to support these strategies are: Dynamic Doctrines, Sovereignty and Stewardship, Prime Time Pastor's Seminary, New Christian Encourager Plan, MasterLife, DiscipleYouth, Baptist Doctrine Study, LEADtime and LIFE: Lay Institute for Equipping.

In the year 1985, Church Training programs and events included: Associational "M" Night being observed by 28 associations with 4,846 attendance. Doctrinal Clinics in Muskogee and Clinton, January 14 and 15 enrolled 71 church leaders from 12 associations. A Family Ministry Blitz, Tulsa and Oklahoma City, April 8 and 9 involved 32 couples.

During February and March, 10 associations held Church Training Growth Workshops with 245 participants from 84 churches.

The State Youth/Children's Bible Drills, March 30 attracted 113 individuals from 20 associations and 38 churches. Speakers' Tournament had 18 representatives. Bold Growth in Discipleship Team Training attracted 74 leaders, March 14 in Oklahoma City.

The MasterLife Workshop at Falls Creek, October 14-18 enrolled 39 church leaders. State Church Training Area Meetings, October 29-November 2 in Vinita, Atoka, Woodward and Lawton involved 142 workers. The Church Training Leadership Seminar, September 27-28 had 84 participants.

Evangelism

Wayne Bristow, Director

1986 was a transition year in the evangelism department. Jerry Don Abernathy accepted the call to pastor Sarasota Baptist Church Sarasota, Fla. Roy Moody was named state evangelism director for the Kansas-Nebraska Convention of Southern Baptists. Wayne Bristow came from the Foreign Mission Board to be state evangelism director for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Ed Chaney came from being evangelism minister at First Baptist Church, Lafayette, La., to be the associate director of evangelism for the BGCO.

Based on initial reports from "Good News America" campaigns, etc., we anticipate an increase in baptisms in 1985.

Falls Creek Counseling

Over 750 counselors and pastor-advisors were trained at Falls Creek during 1986, as the evangelism department made a commitment to assure individual counseling for every person responding to an invitation appeal. In 1987, our goal is to train over 1,500 counselors and pastor-advisors.

Evangelism Tent

A tent, seating 200 to 300 people, has been given to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma evangelism department by the Home Mission Board, evangelism department. The tent's primary purpose is evangelism, and first choice will be given to churches and associations requesting it for evangelistic campaigns. Reverend Randy Russell at Canadian Valley Baptist Church, Mustang, is our primary tent consultant.

C.W.T. Seminars

National C.W.T. Seminars were conducted February 3-6, 1986, at First Baptist Church, Moore, and October 20-23, 1986, at First Baptist Church, Nicoma Park. Seminars are scheduled February 16-19, 1987, at First Baptist, Moore, and September 14-17, 1987, at Eastwood Baptist, Tulsa.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening

May 21-23, 1987, a Regional Conference on Prayer for Spiritual Awakening will be conducted at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. Speakers will include Roy Fish, J. Edwin Orr, James Smith and Glenn Sheppard. There will be a pre-conference session, especially for Oklahoma directors of missions and associational evangelism directors, on May 20.

Youth Evangelism Conference

December 29-30, 1986, the Youth Evangelism Conference will be conducted at First Southern Baptist Church, Del City. Anthony Campolo is the featured speaker and Mary Beth Kissee the featured soloist. Other program personalities will be Charlie Baker, Pastor; Monty Priest, Minister of Music; Richard Huggins, Minister of Music; and the Youth Evangelism Conference Choir.

State Evangelism Conference

January 19-20, 1987, the State Evangelism Conference will be located at First Southern Baptist Church, Del City. The conference will feature such speakers as Jim Henry, Ron Dunn, Joel Gregory, Roy Edgemon, Jack Stanton, Tom Elliff, D. L. Lowrie, William Tanner, and Wade Akins. Other personalities include Roy Fish, Leon Kilbreth, Reid Hardin, Gary Smith, and musician, John Shillington.

Baptist Student Union

Bob Lee, Director

Baptist Student Union experienced another good year across our state. Student involvement in the various ministries continued to grow and support by churches and associations also increased.

Nearly 800 students came to know the Lord as a result of evangelistic efforts sponsored by the various BSU programs. Several hundred students were involved in witness training projects. Over 500 Bible study groups met each week with about 5,000 students participating. These studies were led by either BSU Directors or trained students and took place in Baptist Student Centers, dormitory rooms, apartment complexes, sorority or fraternity houses and/or other campus facilities.

Seventy-one students served as summer missionaries in Oklahoma and many other states as well as Mexico and the Philippines. Almost \$120,000 was raised by the Oklahoma BSU students to fund this mission program. Approximately \$50,000 helped support BSU programs on 21 different campuses in new convention areas where BSU work is just getting started. In addition, six Oklahoma BSU'ers who have graduated from college served as Mission Service Corp volunteers starting new BSU programs and assisting local churches in Oregon and Washington. Nearly 1,000 students participated in various short-term mission projects during the year as well.

The Student Department experienced changes in positions and personnel. Five new Associate BSU Directors were employed: Janay Moody at Panhandle State, Phil Green and Paula Robertson at Oklahoma State University, Dave McKinney at Central State University and Jay Kindsvater at OSU Technical Branch, Okmulgee. Chris Snowden was employed as the new BSU Director at Murray State at Tishomingo. Tom Greenfield has moved from Murray State to USAO in Chickasha.

Building on the philosophy of student work suggested by the National Student Ministries, Oklahoma BSU has chosen four areas of primary ministry: evangelism, missions, Bible Study and discipleship. These four areas represent the Oklahoma BSU commitment to quality in ministry to students on our state college and university campuses.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Director

In essence, the Historical Commission is an agency of the convention. It is committeed to a three-fold stated purpose: Collection, preservation, and utilization of Baptist history in general and Oklahoma Baptist history in particular. H. Alton Webb has been chairman this year. Two meetings were held. The first was April 8, at OBU, and the second was September 5, at the Baptist Building. Major items of business transacted included the following:

Ingram Resolution

In its April 8, 1986 meeting at OBU, the Commission approved the following resolution:

That the Historical Commission express its appreciation to Joe L. Ingram for his generous support to our work during the 15 years he has been the convention's executive secretary (director). Dr. Ingram has evidenced his support to our work in many ways. He led the convention to designate \$25,000 to help provide space, as an exclusive area for the Oklahoma Baptist Collection, when the Mabee Learning Center (library) was under construction in 1975-76. Later, he led the convention to provide about \$6,000 in additional money for expansion of our area, and later he was responsible for a \$4,000 supplement to OBU when the University elected to provide space for its own archives apart from the Baptist Collection. This means he has been responsible for about \$35,000 in financial support toward providing archival space for the preservation of materials.

The Commission expressed its appreciation to Dr. Ingram for his diligence in attending meetings; indicating his support to our work at every opportunity, especially at the annual meetings of the Society. His leadership in planning budgets to provide for the work of the Commission and Historical Society have been noteworthy.

In expressing appreciation to Dr. Ingram, the Historical Commission is delighted to take note of the fact that his successor, Dr. William G. Tanner, has already exhibited an enthusiastic spirit of support toward continuing the work thus far begun.

Director of History

In 1976, J. M. Gaskin became Director of History for the convention. His work began with a simple set of guidelines approved by Joe L. Ingram and Wm. G. Tanner, who at that time was president of OBU. The work has grown. A more definitive job description became a more apparent need with the passing of the years. The Commission on April 8, 1986, approved the following item which was submitted by Joe L. Ingram and J. M. Gaskin:

Job Description and Working Relationships Director of History Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

- 1. The Director of History shall be elected for indefinite tenure by the Historical Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma upon the recommendation of the convention's Executive Director-Treasurer.
- 2. He shall be reportable to the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention.
- 3. The Director shall make periodic summary reports of his work to the Historical Commission.
 - 4. He shall submit comprehensive reports to the state convention

in the Convention's annual Book of Reports.

- 5. He shall act as Director of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection, presently at OBU, which has been, now is, and shall be in perpetuity the property of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. This statement of ownership stems from the investment of about \$35,000 during and since construction of the Mabee Learning Center at OBU to provide and equip space for the Oklahoma Baptist Collection, as defined by Joe L. Ingram under the sole administration of the state convention through its Historical Commission of officers.
- 6. The Director shall direct the Oral History Project of the convention.
- 7. A variety of duties shall be assigned to the Director of History such as: Oral History Interviews, Oral History Workshops, History Writing Workshops, local/regional workshops in the collection, preservation, and utilization of Oklahoma Baptist history—these workshops at all levels shall come by invitation; he shall work with churches, pastors, directors of missions, institutions of the Convention; and even non-Baptist groups in "how-to" sessions on the implementation of history programs as time and schedule may permit.

8. He shall continue his efforts to locate and retrieve for the Oklahoma Baptist Collection such materials as may have lasting value

for research purposes.

- 9. The Director is hereby instructed not to return items given by donors upon the request of heirs without authorization from the Commission. Each case of this nature should have careful consideration and be decided on its own merits.
- 10. The Director shall respond to research requests by mail or telephone as time permits. This does not apply to genealogy.
- 11. Working with church/associational committees in planning anniversaries, writing histories, and filling speaking engagements shall be an ongoing part of the Director's responsibilities.
- 12. The Director shall be bound to extreme caution in guarding all materials in the Oklahoma Baptist Collection and loans by mail should be viewed with even more caution and reluctance.
- 13. The Director should not accept items for the Collection on loan. Gifts should be accepted with discretion as to lasting value due to limitations of space.
 - 14. Heirs of a donor may reclaim a donor's materials when the

materials have not been kept in conformity to the terms of the donor's will or gift agreement. Even then, such materials may be returned by the Director only upon the official authorization of the Historical Commission.

- 15. It shall be the duty of the Historical Commission to make a periodic review of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection in cooperation with the Director of History; monitor special collections; and review on-the-scene performance of the Director.
- 16. If and when a special collection is not maintained intact, or otherwise preserved in the Oklahoma Baptist Collection in keeping with the terms of the donor's will or gift agreement, it shall become the duty of the Director of History to negotiate with the Commission and the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention, in a meeting or by mail, for heirs to reclaim all or part of a special collection. Once the terms of a will or gift agreement have been violated at any point, the Director shall be without authority to exercise unilaterial control over said collection(s).

17. The Director shall be the editor of The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle unless otherwise directed by the Historical Commission.

- 18. The Director shall prepare and direct the mailing to Historical Society members a Circular Letter two-four times per year for information/promotion purposes.
 - 19. The Director shall make preparations for the Annual Meeting of the Historical Society—including dinner arrangements, assisting with program planning, setting up exhibits, and any other related details.

20. Some qualifications:

- A. The Director should know Oklahoma history.
- B. The Director must know Oklahoma Baptist history.
- C. It is vitally important that the Director know and understand Oklahoma Baptists in the time frame of his work.
- D. The Director should have a proven record of credentials—which may, in part, be academic; but, may in addition include writing, manifest interest and involvement in Baptist history collection, preservation, and utilization in general and Oklahoma Baptist history in particular.
- 21. The Director of History shall be responsible for attending all details incident to various Awards of the Historical Commission each year.

Handbook

The Director was authorized at the April meeting to prepare a comprehensive Historical Commission Handbook. This is to be a definitive piece on the history of the Commission and Society; the relationship between the two; the Job Description of the Director; details about the Oklahoma Baptist Collection, and other pertinent matters. This small booklet will be used for reference by new members of the Commission each year; Commission and Society officers; and others who have occasion to know about the specific details involved in the history program of Oklahoma Baptists.

Promotion Piece

In the same April meeting, the Director was instructed to prepare a brief, attractive promotion piece for general distribution. The main purpose of this information pamphlet will be promotional. It will be used to let Oklahoma Baptists know what services are available in helping meet their history needs.

Murrow Press

The historic printing press which was used by J. S. Murrow in the late 1800s is now on display in the Oklahoma Baptist Collection at OBU. Murrow used the press for a variety of purposes in his work with the Indians. Anson Justice wrote an excellent pamphlet on the history of the press. Copies are available without charge. Address requests to J. M. Gaskin, OBU, Shawnee, OK 74801.

Ingram Memoirs

The Commission invited Joe L. Ingram to write his memoirs for publication. He has consented to do that work. Ingram says he will need at least two years to complete the work.

Ingram Biography

J. M. Gaskin is now writing Joe Ingram's biography. This will be a popular type book and not a critical, in-depth work such as Ingram's memoirs will be. The biography will bear the title, A Profile of Joe Ingram. Release is expected by spring or summer of 1987. Bob Agee, president of OBU, has indicated a desire to use 500 copies of the book in his projected plans for further development of the Joe L. Ingram School of Christian Service.

The book will be about 250 pages in length. It will be indexed, documented, and there will be a bibliography. The Historical Commission has suggested a pre-publication price of \$10 per copy until July 1, 1987. After that, if there are any books remaining unsold, the proposed price will increase to \$12.50. Both prices include postage and handling.

Baptist Heritage Sermon Award

June of each year is designated Baptist Heritage Month. Slayden Yarbrough made a proposal to the Historical Commission that a Baptist Heritage Sermon Award be established. The suggestion has been approved.

Criteria for this project will be available upon request to J. M. Gaskin, at OBU, 74801, or 2231 Gershwin Dr., Durant, OK 74701.

June 30, of each year will be the deadline to submit manuscripts. The criteria call for messages in manuscript form with a focus on any theme directly related to Baptist history.

Operation Baptist Biography

In the 1950s, a crash program was waged by the Southern Baptist Historical Commission to acquire biographies. The program was conducted by states. Oklahoma participated and acquired about 400 returns.

In the September 5, 1986 meeting of the Oklahoma Baptist

Historical Commission, the Director was authorized to prepare a quantity of forms for a new campaign to acquire biographies of Oklahoma Baptists. The forms are available at the Historical Commissin exhibit during this convention, and will be available upon request to any person—write J. M. Gaskin, 2231 Gershwin Dr., 74701, or at OBU, 74801. Any person, who has made meaningful contributions to Oklahoma Baptist life, is eligible to be included. Pastors, other staff members, evangelists, evangelistic singers, persons in Baptist education, lay leaders—even relatives of a deceased person such as a widow, parent, son or daughter, or other relative may acquire one of the forms, fill it out, and send it in for permanent keeping in the Oklahoma Baptist Collection.

Distinguished Service Award

The Commission has approved another suggestion from Slayden Yarbrough. A Distinguished Service Award will be offered to selected nominees for their contributions to Baptist history. The nomination or recommendation papers will be available on request. Send requests to J. M. Gaskin, OBU, Shawnee, OK 74801. A committee will evaluate the nominations and announce the recipient of the first award at the 1987 convention.

Recognition Certificate

Lem Ball, president of the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society, has suggested that an appropriate certificate of recognition be awarded to churches which observe Baptist Heritage Day or have special Anniversary ceremonies. It will be necessary for churches to make formal request for these certificates. In addition to this certificate, a new supply of the anniversary certificates used in recent years has been printed. One goes to the church and the other to the oldest person having membership in the church. These, too, will be sent upon request.

Guidelines

H. Alton Webb, chairman of the Commission, has been authorized to appoint a special committee to draw up recommended guidelines for accessions, loans, gift agreements, requests to reclaim items from the Oklahoma Baptist Collection, and similar important matters incident to the ongoing operation of the Collection.

Recommendations:

The Commission recommends that the items in this report be approved by the convention. And,

That each church and association elect a historian each year. And, That every church which publishes its history send at least two copies to the Oklahoma Baptist Collection at OBU, Shawnee, OK, 74801. And,

That more persons submit entries for the GASKIN CHURCH HISTORY AWARD. These entries are due October 1, of each year. An entry may be a manuscript or a book. It may concern a church, association, theological movement, a biography, or any other topic of the writer's choice. The only stipulation is that it relate to religious life in Oklahoma. Guidelines for this Award may be obtained from J. M. Gaskin, 2231 Gershwin Dr., Durant, OK 74701.

The Baptist Messenger and Office of Communications

Richard T. McCartney, Editor

On May 15, 1987 the **Baptist Messenger** will complete 75 years of publication. In the first issue of the **Messenger** the new editor, C. P. Stealey, stated his intentions. "This paper will earnestly support the organized work of the state and shall ever seek to be a helpful factor in solving the problems that are before us. We sincerely desire to be used for the glory of Christ and His cause in this state of abounding opportunity."

Circulation of the Messenger has grown through the years, but its purpose, and the commitment of its staff, continues to be the same as that expressed by editor Stealey. The purpose of any newspaper is to inform. The Baptist Messenger also seeks to garner support of individual church members for the local church and the mission work of Oklahoma and Southern Baptists.

The Messenger is sent each week by 1,170 churches to their members. The last issue of August went to 119,359 subscribers. Special pages carried the news of 104 churches and four associations, a total of 170 pages. The Messenger is an economical way for churches to communicate with their members in the face of rising postal and production costs.

Special Care Ministries publishes an eight-page special section, Care 'N Share, each month. Once each quarter, Baptist Retirement Centers include The Center Resident in the Messenger.

Effective January 1, Messenger subscription rates will be \$4.00 per year for churches subscribing for their members and \$4.50 for individual subscriptions.

Communication is an essential element in making democracy effective. The Messenger continues its commitment to report news affecting the interests of Baptists in Oklahoma. Every member of each church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma should have opportunity to read the Baptist Messenger each week: Informed members will be stronger in support of the local church and all of the mission work of Southern Baptists.

Report of the Board of Directors of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma marks its 40th anniversary this year. During these four decades, this incorporated trust agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has experienced phenomenal growth, becoming the largest religious organization of its nature in Oklahoma, and the second largest state Baptist Foundation in the Southern Baptist Convention.

Assets held by the Foundation in 1946 totaled only \$76,000; today they are \$61,470,000. In spite of a downturn in our state's economy, the past twelve months have been exceptionally good. Total corpus receipts for the period were \$8,470,648 and total earnings were \$5,521,053. This represents an 8.98 percent average earnings on assets held for the period, including non-income producing assets such as life estates.

As trustee for endowment gifts to Oklahoma and Southern Baptist causes, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma distributed a record \$4,378,471 to more than 100 beneficiaries during the past year. These beneficiaries include churches, associations, foreign and home missions, Oklahoma Baptist University and other student ministries, children's homes, retirement centers, nursing care facilities and youth camps. Of the total funds distributed \$889,859 were sent to individuals.

Funds managed by the Foundation are invested in five pools: the **Equity Pool**, composed of common stocks, the **Fixed Income Pool**, composed of corporate bonds, the **Short Term Investment Pool**, composed of government securities and certificates of deposit, the **Church Building Loan Pool**, and the **Real Estate Pool**.

The Foundation is committed to conducting its business affairs in a manner consistent with the highest Christian moral and ethical standards taught and implied in the Scriptures, and shall in no way compromise its Christian witness in the world by investment in a company or activity which does not promote the best interests of a wholesome society. No assets held by the Foundation are invested in companies related to the liquor, tobacco or gambling industries, or companies dealing in pornographic materials, or companies promoting entertainment forms which present as norm lifestyles inconsistent with Christian morality or companies which violate basic human rights by their manner of doing business.

Serving on the 16-member board of directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma are business and professional people from across the state. Each member serves a four-year term and is assigned to three functioning committees which meet monthly. Board members are: James L. Barham (chairman), Jack Brewer, Oleta S. Carmack, Ralph A. Crawford, David L. Field, Frank T. Fleet, Ray Mason, Harold J. McConnell, Frank A. McPherson, John G. Nikkel, Leslie Pain, Thomas L. Pate, Don Ritter, Charles Sutter, Granville O. Ward, and Kenneth Weddle.

The Foundation's programs and day-by-day operations are administered by an executive staff consisting of W. G. Kersh, executive vice-president; C. Duane Riley, first vice-president for charitable giving and endowment procurement services; Mart Hardin, vice-president for property management and mineral leasing services; Kenneth Mullins, vice-president for church building loan services; and James R. Smith, vice-president for communication and public relations services.

This report is presented under sub headings representing areas of work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Charitable Giving and Endowment Procurement

According to the American Association of Fund Raising Counsel, \$79.8 billion was given to charitable causes in 1985. Of that amount, individuals gave \$66.1 billion, representing an increase of 6.5 percent over the year before.

Traditionally, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has not been known as a "fund raising" organization. Foundation representatives have never aggressively solicited gifts for causes; rather the Foundation's position has been one of response to individuals requesting estate planning services by which they might make gifts to causes through wills or trusts.

However, in 1984 a new strategy in endowment procurement was initiated when the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma assigned the Foundation responsibility for the \$25 Million Endowment Campaign. The program, renamed BEYOND THIS TIME, is a concentrated ef-

fort to raise endowment for Oklahoma Baptist ministries through outright and deferred gifts made during the lifetime of donors.

As of this report, \$2,079,095 in endowment gifts have been received for the causes represented in BEYOND THIS TIME. Those causes are Oklahoma Baptist University, Special Care Ministries, Falls Creek Baptist Conference Center, Baptist Student Unions, regional and associational camps and a balanced mission support system of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Distribution of literature, program presentations, direct mail campaigns, a quarterly newsletter and small group meetings across the state are among the ways C. Duane Riley, vice-president for charitable giving and endowment procurement, conducts this special program.

Church Building Loan Services

The Church Building Loan Trust Fund has been functioning effectively since 1954 helping the Foundation fulfill a vital part of its task. The fund serves two major purposes:

- (1) It is a channel for the investments of endowment funds and, consequently, provides a large amount of the income distributed to Oklahoma and Southern Baptist institutions and agencies and to individuals.
- (2) It provides to Oklahoma Baptist churches, associations and Baptist Student Unions a means for financing building needs. The interest paid supports Baptist causes.

For the year ending July 31, 1986, 45 loans were closed totaling \$8,172,733.44.

Since the establishment of the Fund, 859 loans have been made. As of July 31, 1986, \$32,870,766.97 was invested in the Fund with 279 loans in force.

The Fund is administered by a committee composed of members of the Foundation's Board of Directors. Copies of the "Policies and Regulations" brochure are available upon request. The brochure provides pertinent information including eligibility requirements, interest rate, payment schedule and application procedure.

Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-Six will be remembered as a historic year in the operation of the Church Building Loan Trust Fund. Interest rate adjustments were offered to churches having an interest rate above 11 percent. One hundred and forty loans were adjusted. A number of churches were paying an interest rate as high as 15.75 percent. The second historical event was offering to the churches a choice between a fixed or adjustable rate of interest.

Restrictions on the size of loans were also removed, making the largest loan in Foundation history possible, \$2.7 million in July.

Communication and Public Relations Services

An effective communication program is a vital part of the ministry of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The following summary highlights the communication and public relations program used to relate to the Baptist constituency, church and associational leaders, attorneys and other professionals, and the general public.

Communicating Through Special Emphases

Each year two observances on the denominational calendar focus on Foundation ministries. January is observed as "Make Your Will Month," and September is designated "Baptist Foundation Month."

To mark these observances The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma prepares and mails over 300,000 bulletin inserts to over 1,460 churches. The inserts contain an estate stewardship theme and message and provide a form to request estate planning assistance or additional information.

These emphases are also promoted through articles in the **Baptist Messener**, Care 'N Share, and associational newsletters. The **Baptist Messenger** devoted front cover and editorial space to promoting these events.

Retirement events honoring retiring Foundation president, C. Fred Williams, included a reception, luncheon and dinner as well as publication of his biography, The Steps of a Good Man, authored by Robert L. Ross.

A worship service of dedication was held January 5 marking the beginning of Robert Ross' presidency of the Foundation. Hosted at Midwest City, Meadowood, the event featured four choirs, 12 program personalities, and a reception attended by almost 300 people. Over 600 programs were distributed.

The State Training Meeting for Associational Officers was held April 25-26 at Oklahoma City, First. As a part of that meeting orientation and training was provided for 14 associational Baptist Foundation representatives.

The first Chaplains Day Program was held in April. Thirty-one chaplains and guests attended the program, the Foundation Board of Directors committee meeting and a luncheon. The group represented chaplain ministries in hospitals, senior adult care, law enforcement and military service.

In addition to these events, special emphasis is given to observing the birthdays of individuals served by the Foundation. Last year more than 15,000 birthday cards were sent to individuals expressing best wishes and encouraging them to keep their estate plans current.

Communicating with Churches

Most of the executive staff of the Foundation are ordained ministers and former pastors. Because they are gifted preachers they are busy almost every Sunday preaching in churches across the state and representing the work of the Foundation. They serve as interim pastors, preach revivals, conduct Bible studies, teach at Falls Creek, participate in World Mission Conferences and other meetings.

In addition to preaching schedules, Foundation staff members conduct Future Thrust emphases in churches throughout the year. Nineteen Hundred and Eighty-six is the first year to calendar Future Thrust emphases outside of January and September. Forty-nine Future Thrust

programs have been conducted this year in which staff members spoke on the work of the Foundation in morning worship services, conducted estate planning seminars during Church Training hours, and preached on estate stewardship in evening worship services. They also met by appointment with persons interested in receiving estate planning assistance.

The following churches participated in Future Thrust: First Baptist Churches of Bartlesville, Fairview, Seminole, Chouteau, Chelsea, Pond Creek, El Reno, Kingfisher, Maysville, Coalgate, Elk City, Ardmore, Hominy, Claremore, Commerce, Comanche, Hulbert, Alva, Shawnee, Muskogee, Jones, Fletcher, Fort Cobb, Buffalo, Greenfield and Swink. Also Emmaus, Oklahoma City; Brookwood, Oklahoma City; Britton, Oklahoma City; First East, Lawton; Highland Hills, Oklahoma City; Portland, Oklahoma City; Putnam City, Oklahoma City; Skelly Drive, Tulsa; Southside, Stillwater; Sunset, Ponca City; Surrey Hills, Yukon; Twelve Corners, Noble; Central, Muskogee; Crestwood, Oklahoma City; Spring Creek, Oklahoma City; Tulakes, Bethany; Memorial Heights, Claremore; Sinclair Southern, Oklahoma City; Post Road, Oklahoma city; Glenwood, Tulsa; Berry Road, Norman; Howard Memorial, Del City; and Sharon, Chickasha.

Communicating Through Literature

Distributing literature and other materials is yet another way the Foundation presents important information. Literature is distributed as staff members speak in churches or associations, and by mailings to persons requesting information. Literature is supplied to associational offices, associational Baptist Foundation representatives, pastors, staff members and directors of missions. Literature and materials are supplied in packets provided to attorneys, accountants, pastors and other professionals.

Literature pieces currently available for distribution include: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," "Do You Need a Will?," "Estate Planning, A Christian Perspective," "When Death Does Us Part," "The Personal Representative," "The Gift Annuity Contract," "The Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust," "The Charitable Remainder Unitrust," "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," "The Personal Record Album," "The Revocable Living Trust," "Policies and Regulations for Student Scholarships and Loans," and "The Steps of a Good Man."

Communicating Through Media

Press releases are prepared periodically for major, regional and local newspapers, the **Baptist Messenger**, other denominational publications and professional publications for foundation executives and development officers. Public service announcements are prepared for use through radio and television.

The **Baptist Messenger** provides an excellent means for communicating important information to Baptist people. The Foundation president or vice-presidents write weekly columns in the state Baptist magazine going to more than 120,000 subscribers. These articles feature personal aspects of the Foundation's ministry. Such articles include stories about persons who make gifts to Baptist causes through various types of life income trusts, or about particular events or promotions.

Reader response to these articles is significant and often leads to estate planning opportunities.

Press releases and pictures are sent to newspapers regarding activities of the Foundation staff, preaching and speaking opportunities, church events, activities of the Foundation board of directors, retirements, anniversaries, board decisions and relocation of Foundation offices.

Communicating Through Ongoing Programs

The Pastor's program is an ongoing event designed to establish communication with pastors state-wide. Pastoral support is essential to Foundation activities with people in the churches. There is no substitute for the pastor's enthusiastic endorsement and recommendation of this ministry. However, before pastors can respond in this manner, they first must have an understanding and appreciation for the purposes and programs of the Foundation.

Through the Pastor's program, selected pastors from across the state are invited to be guests of the Foundation eight different times during the year. They attend and hour and a half orientation presenting each aspect of the work of the Foundation. Open discussion is encouraged by two question-and-answer periods. Guests observe monthly committee meetings of the Foundation board of directors, seeing the board members in action. Evaluations reflect the appreciation pastors have for the Christian commitment and high degree of expertise board members contribute to the work. Last year 38 pastors attended these programs.

Similar programs are also conducted for pastors wives, chaplains, church staff members and laymen.

Because of the vital role church secretaries play in handling and responding to Foundation emphases, selected church secretaries are invited to Oklahoma City for Secretaries Day in November. Forty-seven secretaries from across the state attended this program.

Finally, the Foundation works with hundreds of attorneys each year in securing the preparation of legal documents and in the probate of estates. Therefore, it is imperative that the Foundation have good working relationships with members of the Oklahoma Bar Association. Attorney meetings and local county bar programs provide opportunities for those in the legal profession to become more familiar with the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Last year the Foundation hosted attorney luncheon or dinner meetings in Wilburton, Purcell, Oklahoma City, Tulsa, Enid and Lawton, with over 95 attorneys in attendance.

Estate Planning Services

Estate planning services of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma primarily involve three distinct functions: (1) providing assistance in will and trust planning, (2) providing endowment income to Baptist churches, agencies, institutions and departments, and (3) conducting educational programs which communicate information about personal financial management and estate planning.

When requested, qualified Foundation staff members will help Baptist families gather information necessary for the preparation of wills or trusts by which they may provide for loved ones and/or some area of the Lord's work.

When Baptist causes are named beneficiaries in such plans, the required legal documents will be prepared without expense to individuals. The Foundation president will also serve as the personal representative in wills or as trustee of trusts when so requested and Baptist causes are included. The Foundation makes no charge for this service.

During the 12 months covered by this report, the Foundation assisted in the preparation of 1,399 wills, 59 trusts and eight gift annuity contracts.

Placards are distributed to churches indicating the number of individuals in that congregation who have used the Foundation's estate planning services. One thousand and thirty-four Oklahoma churches have one or more persons who have related to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in the past.

Personal Trustee Services

The Foundation, in serving as trustee for the assets of individuals, renders more than a financial service but offers a ministry with a personal touch as well. Many trustors require assistance in other areas of their life than the investment of funds to provide for their livelihood. They need personal attention and such practical help as transportation to doctors appointments, to go shopping, to file insurance claims or tax returns, etc. They also need a spiritual ministry of encouragement. Many of them have no family members to care for them.

Finley Tinnin, administrative assistant and former long-time pastor of Baptist Temple in Oklahoma City, regularly visits with these individuals and assists them in ways mentioned above. The Foundation presently has this kind of relationship with 35 persons across the state.

Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services Property Management Services:

During the year concluded July 31, 1986, 20 pieces of real property were received by the Foundation, including houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and grassland. These gifts of real property come through wills, trusts or outright transfers.

Management of real property is supervised by a committee of nine board members. Decisions to sell, lease, rent or repair property are determined by this committee according to provisions in the legal document by which the property is received and upon recommendation of the vicepresident for property management and mineral leasing services.

The Foundation operates no businesses or farms but leases them to others. Grassland and farms are leased on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential property is rented by the month on a cash basis.

Mineral Leasing Services:

The Foundation's mineral interest business is supervised by a com-

mittee consisting of nine board members. The committee meets each month to review lease offers, bonuses, rental delays and sales.

The Foundation holds deeds to mineral interest in 61 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states. The units vary in size from .25 acre to 320 acres.

During the past year the Foundation received 12 units of mineral interest, including 11 units in Oklahoma and one unit in Kansas. Both production income and bonus income have decreased rather sharply this past year because of the decline in oil prices and expoloration. The figures are as follows:

Planning and Promotion

Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion Office is an extension of the Executive Office and is directed by the Associate Director, Lyle Garlow. This office was established in 1972.

In addition to directing the specific programs outlined below, the director of Planning and Promotion also relates to a number of departments in the area of coordinating calendar planning, program promotion, and budget development: These departments are: Brotherhood, Church Music, Cooperative Missions, Evangelism, Falls Creek, Religious Education, and Woman's Missionary Union. The direct supervisor of these department directors is the Executive Director-Treasurer.

Specific programs assigned to the Planning and Promotion Office are: (1) liason with 41 associations and associational directors of missions; (2) Cooperative Program promotion; (3) coordinated promotion planning; (4) denominational calendar planning; (5) stewardship development and (6) church administration which Glenn Brown, Associate Director of Planning and Promotion, directs; and (7) media services, directed by Cade Garrison.

Cooperative Program Promotion

During 1985, 50 percent of each Oklahoma Cooperative Program dollar was divided with the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee for Southern Baptist Convention missions ministries. Approximately one-half of the Southern Baptist Convention Cooperative Program dollar goes to the Foreign Mission Board. This means that one-fourth of each Cooperative Program dollar shared by Oklahoma churches goes directly to foreign missions.

Total Cooperative Program receipts for 1985 were \$15,746,645.12—an increase over 1984 of only \$34,025.69, or .2 of one percent.

Due to the economic conditions in Oklahoma, the 1986 Cooperative Program budget was essentially the same as the 1985 budget. Current plans are to continue this same budget into 1987.

Church tithes and offerings received and reported for 1985 were \$176,863,710—a \$5,715,765, or 3.3 percent, increase over 1984. Churches shared 8.9 percent of these funds through the Cooperative Program.

Oklahoma Baptists care about mission needs in Oklahoma and around the world. To meet these ever-increasing needs, it is urgent that our mission giving increase. A one percent increase by each church would produce approximately a 10 percent increase in mission funds.

The 5M PLAN for Church Treasurers (Mail Mission Money Monday Morning) is significant for increased giving. The constant cash flow, along with efficient and effective banking procedures, helps fund the promotion and administrative expense of the Convention with non-Cooperative Program dollars. Thus, every mission gift from your church goes directly, in just a few days, for a mission ministry. This is almost instant missions.

Coordinated Promotion Planning

Bold Mission Thrust goals extend through the year 2000. Oklahoma Baptists have set specific numerical goals for the years 1985-1990. These goals are suggested and promoted by the various departments and programs.

Your convention is currently promoting a special Oklahoma emphasis, "Let the Churches Grow," for the period 1986-1987.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma will be cooperating with Southern Baptist Convention Boards and Agencies in the Directions 2000 planning for the time period 1990-1995.

Associational Services

The 41 Southern Baptist Associations in Oklahoma each support their own director of missions. The Planning and Promotion Office works with these directors in planning for the best possible programs of work to help undergird the work of the churches.

Since the last publication of the Book of Reports, we have had the following changes in associational leadership. New director of missions: Richard McClure, Frisco (4-86). Forrest A. Upchurch (13 years, Frisco) retired as director of missions. Don Reed (Union) resigned to become associate enlistment director for evangelism projects at the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board. Kenneth Romines (North Canadian) resigned to return to the pastorate.

During the past year, the following former directors of missions have gone to be with the Lord: Arlis A. Brady (22½ years in Central, Pottawatomie-Lincoln and North Canadian Associations), Stanley F. Taylor (12 years, North Canadian), and Dan P. Tyson (28 years in Panhandle and Enon Associations).

Church Administration

Church Administration services to Oklahoma Baptist Churches are planned by Glenn Brown, Church Administration Consultant, primarily

along two avenues: training conferences and personal consultations.

1. Training Conferences

A broad spectrum of skills development training events are cycled over a multiple year period, dealing with pastor/staff skills, deacon ministry, and church committee.

In 1986, several training events were conducted to strengthen pastor and staff skills:

- a) February—Multiple Staff Church Administration Conference—dealing with concepts and skills of effective staff relationships.
- b) April—Shared Ministry Conference—an overview of concepts and materials whereby the pastor multiplies his efforts through a teamwork approach utilizing the gifts and skills of the staff and laity.
- c) May—Minister of Education Programming Retreat—a personal growth and program awareness conference.
- d) September—Bi-Vocational Pastors and Wives Conference—pastoral skills for preachers and personal growth and support skills for wives.
- e) October—Oklahoma Preaching Conference—focusing on preparation and delivery of Biblical preaching with effective application.
- f) December—The Pastor Leading the Education Program in a Church—for pastors without a minister of education.

2. Personal Consultation

This office also provides information on resource persons and materials in the various areas of long-range planning, church council and church committees, church constitution and bylaws, deacon ministry and church staff.

Stewardship

Stewardship development services are provided to churches through associational and area conferences, individual church conferences, and through the provisions of free budgeting and giving promotion materials.

Every church is urged to conduct at least one major stewardship emphasis each year which gives attention to 1) sharing the Biblical message of responsible and growing personal stewardship, beginning with the tithe, and 2) providing an opportunity for personal and specific commitment to giving. To encourage this, extensive free materials are offered to churches each year.

In 1986, Glenn Brown, Director of Stewardship Promotion, and Lyle Garlow, Director of Cooperative Program Promotion, worked cooperatively in leading teams of workers to conduct six Area Planned Growth in Giving Conferences and 19 Associational Stewardship Conferences.

To date, approximately 300 pastors have completed the two-day Planned Growth in Giving Pastors' Seminars. Early results show the churches that have conducted the PGG Church Event have experienced very encouraging results. This is a long-term program that we hope every church will seek to do in the years ahead.

The First Fruits First giving program was so well received in 1985 that a revised version has been produced for use by churches in 1986-87.

Churches are urged to set a goal for the enlistment of new tithers during the coming year and to plan events throughout the year to cultivate growth in giving.

Media Services

Cade Garrison is director of Media Services. Areas of work include ACTS, BTN, VTS and Church Media/Library. Garrison also assists the BGCO staff and local churches in video ministries.

ACTS, American Christian Television System, now in its third year, is reaching into 18 Oklahoma communities. ACTS is owned and operated by the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission in Fort Worth.

BTN, Baptist Telecommunication Network, is owned and operated by the Baptist Sunday School Board. Approximately 300 Oklahoma Baptist churches have access to BTN through church and association participation. Once again, a high point for BTN was its telecasting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta. Several hundred Oklahomans viewed the proceedings in 35 locations across the state.

VTS, Video Tape Service, currently includes nearly 200 leadership and training tapes for churches. These tapes are available through many associations and the state media services offices.

In April, 60 church media/library workers attended a regional clinic at Southern Hills Church, Oklahoma City.

Church Music

Glenn Boyd, Director

State Leadership Training

The Church Music Department served Oklahoma in the following ways: Baptist Education Music Association, February 6-7, Oklahoma Baptist University; State Youth Choir and Ensemble Festivals, January 31-February 1, Oklahoma Baptist University, and February 21-22, First Baptist, Tulsa; State Handbell Festival and Clinic, February 7-8, Exchange Avenue Baptist, Oklahoma City; five Area Hymn Playing Festivals, January 25 at First Baptist, Enid: Southern Hills Baptist, Oklahoma City; Memorial Baptist, Tulsa; First Baptist, McAlester; Central, Lawton; Statewide Hymn Playing Festival, Oklahoma Baptist University, February 15; State Training Meeting for Associational Officers, April 25-26, First Baptist, Oklahoma City; Young Musicians Festival, April 19, Oklahoma Baptist University; Senior Adult State Singin' and Praisin' Meetings, April 10-11, Emmanuel Baptist, Enid, and Memorial Baptist, Tulsa; State Methods and Materials Conference, August 18-22, Sequoyah Hills Baptist, Tulsa; First Baptist, McAlester; First Baptist, Lawton; First Baptist, Moore; Bi-Vocational Pastors and Wives and Part-time/Volunteer Song Leaders and Accompanists Retreat, Falls Creek, September 5-6; Oklahoma Baptist All State Youth Choir and Orchestra, October 16-18, Falls Creek.

Southern Baptist Leadership Training

We also provided promotion and encouragement to the following church music training opportunities: Southern Baptist Church Music Conference, Atlanta, GA, June 7-9; Church Music Weeks at Ridgecrest, June 12-25, and Glorieta, July 5-18; Music Conference, Baylor University, August 4-7; Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Church Music Workshop, January 27-31.

Supportive Help

In addition to the regular programming that the Church Music Department does, we are pleased to support the other agencies and departments of our convention. This year we had the privilege of assisting 11 of our departments and agencies in planning and executing their programs.

Singing Churchmen

This has been another good year for the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma. It continues to grow and give encouragement to the music leadership of our churches. We have 143 men enrolled in the organization this year with 10 performances and rehearsal choral clincs within the state. We also had one performance in Wichita, Kansas for the Midwestern Musicians on Missions Workshop, Metropolitan Baptist Church. We also did a recording session of "El Shaddai—the Musical," by John Thompson arranged by Ronn Huff. This was done on the OBU campus in January. Also, one of the performances was singing for the district meeting of the American Choral Directors Association, Tulsa. We encourage all full-time music directors to be a part of this organization. If you have questions concerning The Singing Churchmen, please contact the office.

Falls Creek

Falls Creek is always an exciting and rewarding experience for our work. We had over 1650 young people and adults participate in our choir and instrumental programs this year. We had 24 young people make life commitment to the music ministry.

Readin' and Singin' Schools

Once again thanks to the progressive insight of directors of missions and associational music directors, needs for musical growth are being met. This past year the following associations had schools: Craig-Mayes, Kay, Concord-Kiowa, and Northwestern. Craig-Mayes has another planned for this next year along with Enon.

Statistical Report

The figures released by the Southern Baptist Convention's statistical department show that Oklahoma Baptist churches have a small increase in their music enrollment this past year. I feel that our growth would be even larger if we could get more of our churches to report their music ministry on the annual church letter. We have over 26 percent of our

churches that we have not heard from. I want to continue to urge all churches to report their church music enrollment on their annual church letter.

Your Church Music Department is made up of Glenn Boyd, director; Paul Magar, associate director; Mary June Tabor, assistant; Judy Enegren, secretary. We are happy to be a part of Oklahoma Baptists working together to reach the world for Him.

Cooperative Missions

Robert E. Haskins, Director

The goal of Missions in Oklahoma is "to proclaim Jesus Christ as God and Savior, to persuade people to become his disciples and responsible members of His Church." The Gospel is proclaimed weekly in at least 15 languages, and New Testament Churches are increasing weekly in membership because God is faithful to His promise that His Word will not return void, but will accomplish the things He (God) wants accomplished.

Language Missions

As a result of the preaching and sharing of the Gospel, at least nine new language churches/missions were born—three Indian, one Chinese, two Spanish, one Japanese, one Romanian, and one Laotian.

Thirty-eight full-time and 18 part-time missionaries work with American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, Laotians, Cambodians, Vietnamese, Thais, Indonesians, Nigerians, Liberians, Ghanians, Iraneans, Lebanese, French, Afghans, Asian Indians, Deaf, Hispanics, Romanians, etc. They traveled more than one million miles in their mission work and reported more than 1,755 professions of faith, additions by letter and special service commitments.

A new Chinese Mission was begun in Stillwater with Calvary Chinese Baptist Church, Moore serving as co-sponsor. Paul Chao, an active leader in the Moore congregation, helped begin the new work. The Chinese held their third annual summer assembly at Falls Creek Conference Center July 2-5 with over 200 attending. Ten people from the two Chinese Churches attended Small Sunday School Week at Glorieta Baptist Conference Center August 18-22. Sam Luk, pastor of the Calvary Chinese Baptist Church, Moore, led one of the conferences.

The largest Indian Falls Creek Assembly ever, was held June 16-21 with 2,464 people registered. Richard Pickup, evangelist from Cherokee Baptist Association, served as camp pastor. Tyrone Smith, minister of music at Rancho Village Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, served as music director. A special youth-led worship service was conducted each day at 11:00 a.m. by Belvin Hill, pastor of First Indian Baptist Church, Ada.

The Hispanic churches held their annual family camp at Falls Creek Conference Center June 9-13 with 19 churches represented and 249 reigstered. Herminio Rios, missionary/pastor from Duncan, served as camp director. Angel Murillo, area Hispanic missionary in Southwestern

Oklahoma, served as camp pastor. Thirty-four Hispanic Chuches shared in the "Good News America, God Loves You" Scripture Distribution. More than 2,000 New Testaments in Spanish were given to prospects in their communities. The fifth annual Sunday School conference was conducted at First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City with 109 Sunday School leaders present for the two day meeting. More than 200 ladies attended the State Spanish WMU Workshop in Oklahoma City on February 22, 1986.

Blind Ministries

The ministry to the blind continues to grow. Carl Davis serves in Enon Association as minister to the blind, deaf, and handicapped. Ruth Versaw, a member of Britton Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, has a tape ministry to the blind. Five hundred tapes were provided by the Department of Cooperative Missions to help her in her work. Karen Dudley of Cushing (a blind person) works with the blind in her area, but is also helping other churches in Oklahoma establish a ministry to the blind.

Church Extension

Two area church planters and four Praxis students (seminary students) have assisted this year in Church Extension. At least 21 new churches/missions and mission points have been established since October 1985. Our goal for the year is 25. We hope to begin at least 25 new churches/missions per year between now and 1990. Associational New Work Probes will be conducted in at least three associations per year during the next five years to locate places where new churches need to be started.

Campers on Mission

Spring and Fall Rallies were held at the Post Oak Assigned Area of Clear Bay State Park. Bob Martin, president, officiated at these meetings. The Spring Rally highlighted "clowning" as a means of reaching people for Christ in a resort setting. The Fall Rally featured Wayne Bristow, State Evangelism Director, who led in personal evangelism training.

Twenty members of the Oklahoma Chapter attended the National Rally at Mountain Home, Arkansas June 20-22. Eighteen members have been involved in four mission construction projects in Oklahoma and two out-of-state projects.

Resort Missions

More than 964 children attended Day Camps held by summer missionaries and adult/youth teams in six campgrounds on Lake Tenkiller. There were 19 professions of faith. Bo Holland coordinated the Lake Tenkiller ministry. A sacred concert was held at Fin 'n Feather Resort near Gore.

Through the summer mission program, associational programs, and local church programs, witnessing ministries, Backyard Bible Clubs, children's programs, mission Vacation Bible Schools, and other outreach programs were provided in at least 15 resort and recreational areas. The

resort areas continue to provide a challenge to the churches to "do" missions in their own setting.

Mission Service Corps

Twenty-five Oklahomans applied for Mission Service Corps assignments. Fourteen were appointed. Nine are serving in Oklahoma and five are serving in other states and/or overseas.

Three area volunteer consultants to assist the State Director were trained at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City on September 4. Bonnie King, Marlow, will be serving in Southwestern Oklahoma, Claude and LaWanda Mabery will be serving in Southeastern Oklahoma, and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Carner will be serving in Northeastern Oklahoma.

Christian Service Corps

At least 19 individuals and 19 groups (ranging from 8-62 persons) assisted with more than 19 different projects in our state. Thirteen of the projects were construction projects, and five were inner-city projects. Oliver Barnes, state construction coordinator from Chattanooga, coordinated the construction projects. The center directors coordinated the inner-city projects.

Chaplaincy

Eighty-seven chaplains serve in hospitals, institutions, military, police and fire departments, industry, etc. A luncheon was held at the Marriott Hotel November 11 with Huey Perry, Director of the Chaplains Division of the Home Mission Board, as guest speaker.

The 1986 officers of the Chaplains' Fellowship were Bill Forester, president, Boyd Welton, vice-president, and Bill Saunders, secretary.

Black Church Relations

Five missionaries, jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention, work in the area of Black Church Relations. Dr. Eddie Mabry is the Dean of the School of Religion in Tulsa and directs the program of Christian Education for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention. Verlene Farmer is the Baptist Student Union director of Langston University and teachers some courses in religion for the university. Clarence Shuler is a Regional Missionary in Eastern Oklahoma serving as director of Rural Church Development. Patricia Reed is the WMU Executive Secretary for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and directs the woman's work of the convention. The position of Director of Christian Education Center in Tulsa is vacant.

The School of Religion in Tulsa, with 12 learning centers across the state, had 1,029 adults enrolled in at least one course. There were 1,769 people reached through study courses. Twenty-eight workshops and institutes were held with 784 people receiving certificates, diplomas and awards.

The BSU at Langston has been very active during the year. Six students served as summer missionaries for nine weeks during the summer of 1986. There were 20 rededications during the BSU Spring Revival.

Twenty-two BSU students went to the Black Retreat, Memphis, TN. The BSU reached a \$2,100 goal for summer missions. The World Hunger Goal was \$300 and that was also reached.

Church-Community Ministries

This is the Oklahoma name for the area of ministries which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries.

Five missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local associations are serving in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are: associational directors of church-community ministries, Jack Bettis, Capital Association, and Richard Humble, Tulsa Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Gray, Oklahoma City, and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa; and Women's Shelter director, Sharyan Utley. Financial assistance is provided the directors of the Baptist Women's Center and Grace Rescue Mission, in Oklahoma City. Connie Crew and Lee Martin are the directors respectively.

The missionaries reported 208 professions of faith, 32 baptisms and 81 special decisions. There were 570 sermons and addresses during the year.

Grace Rescue Mission reported approximately 25 per month on an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program called "New Life." Meals were provided for 55,371 transients and rehabilitation program people and 11,061 beds were provided. "Tender Haven" program helped 4,507 families. Three hundred were served Thanksgiving Dinner.

Oklahoma City, Baptist Women's Center reported that 20,211 meals were provided and 6,790 beds furnished for 529 women and children.

The Baptist Mission Center, Oklahoma City, reports that 44,820 pieces of clothing were distributed; 6,478 people helped with food; \$48,520 worth of medical care and \$7,552 worth of free dental care provided for 1,253 patients. Twenty summer missionaries served this summer at the center. The center received 4,500 letters from GA's because of an article in DISCOVERY Magazine. The center was the recipient of Christmas in August this year.

The Women's Shelter, Tulsa, housed 133 children and 205 women. They reported 41 professions of faith.

The Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa, had six weeks of Vacation Bible School and ministered to approximately 500 children. Two hundred thirty-two young people were presented packets of personal hygiene items in Christmas stockings.

A group of students at Oklahoma Baptist University receive some expense money which makes it possible for them to be involved in community ministries. Students tutor, lead in recreation, minister, counsel and do whatever ministry is needed.

Workers in literacy missions are continuing to be trained. All sections of the state have leaders who can lead workshops to train others in literacy missions. The department chartered a bus to Glorieta for the Literacy Missions Convocation. Thirty-five people received literacy mis-

sions training. Oklahoma had the largest number of participants of any state represented. The need for literacy missions volunteers is great. Our state continues to attract internationals at an increased rate and literacy missions provides a good opportunity for sharing the gospel.

PACT

Project: Assistance for Churches in Transitional Communities (PACT) is a Home Mission Board developed program to respond to a church's request for help when it discovers itself located in a significantly changing community. PACT helps a church to rediscover its mission and to redream its dream as well as plan programs for reaching and ministering to the people in the church and its community.

Bob Lovejoy is the state PACT coordinator. Contact the Missions Department for more information.

Student Summer Missions

Twenty-seven student summer missionaries served in missions all across Oklahoma during the summer of 1986. They served in rual, inner city, language, resort, metropolitan and general missions in 14 different areas of the state. Their work included surveys, Vacation Bible Schools, construction projects, backyard Bible clubs, mission center activities, resort missions, counselors in camps, language missions and a host of other responsibilities. Several of the students made commitments to full-time Christian service during the summer.

Refugee Sponsorship

Baptist churches are still being sought as sponsors for refugees who are seeking to come to our country. They are leaving their own country either for political or religious oppression. They must have sponsors before they are permitted to come to the United States. This year we have been asked to provide sponsorship for people from eastern Europe, Indo-Chinese, and Polish people. Sponsorship provides an excellent opportunity for sharing Christ.

Interfaith Witness

Three awareness conferences were held in the state with approximately 100 people attending. Twelve people were trained in the beliefs of Mormons, 15 in Jehovah's Witnesses and 40 in Judaism in conferences at Knob Hill Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. The department has a goal of having Interfaith Witness Associates trained in Interfaith Witnessing throughout Oklahoma who can lead awareness and training conferences for churches and associations.

Hunger Funds

Thirty-two thousand dollars received from Home Mission Board hunger funds have been channeled throughout the state to help the hungry in our state during this time of economic slowdown.

Woman's Missionary Union

Frances Grafton, Director

"Multiply the Vision," the 1985-86 emphasis, related to the enthusiasm for and commitment to the missions task of Woman's Missionary Union. Major thrusts for the year have been personal witnessing, mission action and enlistment.

June 1, 1986 Kelly Bolt (Mrs. Jeff) came to serve as secretary in the WMU Department. She replaced Miss Connie Webb who accepted employment out of state in May. Continuing to serve in the department is Dorothy Thayer Jones (Mrs. Joe), WMU Consultant for Girls in Action and Mission Friends; Lawana Roberts, WMU Consultant for Acteens; Eula Mae Stewart, Secretary to the Director and Carleata Hortion (Mrs. Willard), Receptionist-Secretary. WMU has been a BGCO Department for five years with continued support provided by Dr. Joe L. Ingram until July 1, 1986 when Dr. William G. Tanner took on the support of WMU along with the whole convention. Lyle Garlow continues to function as BGCO representative to WMU on a daily basis.

Churches are encouraged to observe two separate weeks of prayer and season of prayer with mission offerings to focus the attention of the entire church on home missions in March, state missions in September and foreign missions in December. This provides effective learning, opportunity for prayerful response with monetary gifts at the time of increased missions awareness, helps to grow missionary congregations and contributes to the kind of support deemed essential by missionaries.

The CENTENNIAL CHAIRMAN SEMINAR was held in Birmingham, Alabama January, 1986. This was attended by Mary Edna Hopper (Mrs. Richard), Oklahoma WMU Centennial Chairman and Frances Grafton. May 14, 1988 in Richmond, Virginia, Woman's Missionary Union, SBC will celebrate 100 years of existence as a missions organization of Southern Baptist churches. The theme for the next two years is "A Century to Celebrate—A Future to Fulfill."

VISION 88 is the national WMU plan to help meet the Bold Mis-

sion Thrust challenge for more missionaries, money, prayers and missions awareness from every Southern Baptist. WMU, SBC goal is to enroll 2 million in quality missions education by September 1988. Oklahoma WMU goal is to have an enrollment of 44,691 by September 1988. The present WMU enrollment is 34,456 in 2,847 organizations in 882 Oklahoma churches. Carol Cox (Mrs. Perry) is Oklahoma WMU Enlistment Coordinator and Mary Davis (Mrs. Joshua) is Associate Coordinator.

The Eightieth WMU Annual Session was held November 11-12, 1985, Council Road Church, Bethany. There were 375 registered. The theme was "Magnify Our Vision." Emphasis was given to the book, Baptist Women in Oklahoma by Dr. J. M. Gaskin, BGCO Historian. Program personal included Miss Abbie Louise Green, former Oklahoma WMU Director, and June Whitlow, Associate Executive Director, Woman's Missionary Union, SBC. The music was led by Jacque Hocking and Susan Langley, pianist. The four missionaries giving information on their field of service were Jene and Richard Cheek, Malaysia, and Joseph and Lila Mefford, Spain.

Falls Creek Assemblies had 40 missionaries serving during the five weeks of the assemblies. They were obtained by WMU. The missionaries counseled with people who made decisions, taught in each class, gave testimonies in general morning sessions, gave devotionals in church cabins and participated in a Missions Fair each Wednesday afternoon. Approximately 200 attended the Missions Fair each week. WMU secured 14 staffers to assist in the Children's Park for the five assemblies. Dorothy Jones directed the Children's Park one of the five weeks.

Glorieta WMU Week was attended by 220 from Oklahoma. Training was available for associational and church WMU leadership. At the Enlistment VISION 88 Fair, Oklahoma participated by providing a missions quiz game. Carol Cox, Oklahoma WMU Enlistment Coordinator worked with Delores Creekmore, Tulsa Association WMU Director, on this project. Four Oklahoma women attended Ridgecrest WMU Week.

The Fourth Oklahoma WMU Conference was held August 14-15, 1986 with over 400 attending. This was the first time the conference was held on the Okahoma Baptist University campus. Forty-one conferences were offered. Five missionaries were on the program and twenty-seven conference leaders. Dr. Dorothy Sample, immediate past president, WMU, SBC from Flint, Michigan was the inspirational speaker and Gwen Williams, home missionary, New Orleans, Louisiana, led the music.

WMU participated in the State Training Meeting for Associational Officers April 25-26, First Church, Oklahoma City. An overview of the 1985-86 associational work was presented to 160 WMU leaders from 35 associations. Sheryl Churchill, WMU, SBC, taught the conference for Baptist Women Directors. A new conference was held for Associational Centennial Chairmen and was led by Mary Edna Hopper.

September 2-5 and 8-11 nine WMU Area Training Conferences were held in six locations. There were three night and six day meetings. A total of 1,179 attended from 38 associations.

Twelve conferences were taught. A new conference was for Church Centennial Chairmen, taught by Mary Edna Hopper.

A continuing focus on communication with pastors by the State WMU was strengthened by an opportunity to present the background and purpose of WMU to a Seminary Extension Class at OBU with three educational directors, one children's worker and 21 pastors.

A Hispanic WMU Meeting at First church, Oklahoma City was reported by Mrs. Nila Murillo with 191 attending from 18 cities.

The Oklahoma Chapter of Baptist Nursing Fellowship has been organized for three years and has 37 members including seven missionaries. National Baptist Nursing Fellowship has 569 members including 139 missionaries. There are seven state chapters, Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina and Texas.

The State Acteens Conference was held March 7-8 at OBU with 1,002 in attendance from 117 churches. Program personnel included Barbara Joiner, Colombiana, Alabama; Marti Solomon, Acteen Consultant, WMU, SBC; and missionaries Beverly Gray, Oklahoma City; and Mr. and Mrs. Mike Wilson, Togo.

Orientation was held in May for 35 staffers serving at Camp Nunny Cha-ha for the summer. Two Mother/Daughter Girls in Action Week-end Camps were held May 29-30 and 30-31, with 312 attending. Six Girls in Action/Acteens Camps were held at Camp Nunny Cha-ha June 2-July 19. There were 683 resident campers with 17 professions of faith, 49 rededications and 15 special service decisions. For the fourth year the Fourth of July week was used for "work week" for staffers.

There were Acteen Activator teams from Felt assigned to Arizona; Nowata team assigned to Houston and Elmore assigned to Rapid City, S.D. They were assigned by WMU, SBC and the Home Mission Board.

During the 1985-86 school year 19 scholarships were given through Oklahoma Baptist University to members of Acteens in cooperation with Oklahoma WMU.

Seminary Scholarships were granted to 12 women to attend Southern Baptist Seminaries. These scholarships are provided through the Margaret Hutchison Educational Fund in the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions.

Oklahoma Baptist University sponsored a Baptist Women Day in appreciation for what WMU women in the state have done for OBU. Dr. Bob Agee, OBU President, mentioned past accomplishments, what is being done today and anticipated continued support in the future. Mildred McWhorter was the special speaker.

Dr. Paul Rutledge, Oklahoma WMU Professor of Sociology at OBU, continues to teach and speak in WMU meetings. He is a vital part of the Oklahoma WMU team.

The first **Baptist Young Women Enterpriser** group in WMU, SBC was from Oklahoma. They were members of the OBU Campus BYW and were assigned to New Orleans, Louisiana for one week. Woman's Missionary Union, SBC and the Home Mission Board makes the assignments.

From the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions, a gift of \$50 was sent to 206 foreign missionaries from Oklahoma. A gift of \$250 was given to seven newly appointed foreign missionaries who were from Oklahoma.

We pray that God will continue to "Multiply the Vision" of Woman's Missionary Union members in the churches of Oklahoma.

Brotherhood

SBC Brotherhood enrollment increased to 573,740 in 1985 and Oklahoma Brotherhood had a total enrollment of 18,051. For the church year October 1, 1985, through September 30, 1986—618 churches registered with 406 Baptist Men's Units, 723 Royal Ambassador Chapters (526 Crusader, 139 Pioneer, 58 Combined) reported.

April 11-12—four additional men received certification in Memphis bringing to a total 24 Oklahoma men who are Nationally Certified Brotherhood Trainers

April 26—50 of the Disaster Relief Crew prepared and served lunch from the Disaster Relief Unit and displayed the Child Care Unit to the 514 Associational Officers at their annual Oklahoma City meeting

April 25-26—Dr. Jasper McPhail was re-elected president of the Oklahoma Baptist Medical/Dental Fellowship at their annual meeting in Tulsa where 70 attended

May 17—Woman's Missionary Union, Missions and Brotherhood had 85 attend the Volunteers in Mission Workshop, Knob Hill, OKC May 30-31—78 attended Lad & Dad Camp, Camp Hudgens, and another was scheduled

June 6-7—for the 36 that could not be accommodated the weekend before

Seven weeks of Royal Ambassador Camp was held for 611 campers and 186 staff. There were 33 professions of faith, 128 rededications and 59 surrendered for special service

August 25-26 and September 22-23—398 Local Brotherhood Officers (Baptist Men/Royal Ambassadors) received training at the eight Brotherhood Venture Area Training Sessions

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma Disaster Relief fund assisted two churches in the amount of \$3,750 and 25 families in two associations. On October 13, 1985 the last crew of volunteers returned from assisting in Mexico City after the earthquake. The 24 men had spent a total of 12 days serving 53,000 meals. They left behind much equipment from our large feeding unit. This equipment was to be used to set up field kitchens to continue the feeding—50 cots, blankets, pillows, butane tanks, stoves, tables, utensils and food were among the items left behind. They have been replaced. The relief work following the September 19-20, 1985, earthquake was the largest undertaking for the Oklahoma disaster relief units in their seven years of operation. The old number one disaster relief mobile unit has been completely remodeled by volunteers from Panhandle Baptist Association and is ready to serve.

Joe Herndon, Volunteer Projects Personnel Coordinator, reports 107 volunteers assisted in seven states and Honduras in 17 mission projects. They spent a total of \$31,813 in expenses and donated \$16,255 in equipment and money.

Along with Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for the three weeks of prayer (Edna McMillan, Annie Armstrong and Lottie Moon).

The Department continues to promote and provide materials for World Hunger assistance.

Annuity Services

J. T. Roberts, Director

The Annuity Board achieved unprecedented growth in 1985.

Total assets administered by the Board as of December 31, 1985, were \$1,689,798,415, an increase of more than \$250 million over the December 31, 1984 total of \$1,430,966,415.

Investment income for 1985 climbed to \$189,105,593. For the six months ended June 30, 1986, earnings on retirement and related funds reached \$141,208,114, or \$68,065,592 more than earnings during the first half of 1985.

As of June 30, 1986, total assets held in trust by the Annuity Board were \$1,867,469,674, an increase of \$305,448,318 over the assets held by the board on June 30, 1985.

The Annuity Board paid \$24,738,549 in benefits to 16,145 annuitants during the first two quarters of 1986 (607 in Oklahoma).

Oklahoma has 787 churches and associations; 1,265 employees participating.

Through June, with a total of 19,994 churches and associations, there were 30,854 employees participating in the Southern Baptist retirement program. The number of new retirement applications received in the program for Oklahom during the first six months of 1986 was 48. The following Baptist agencies participate in the retirement program:

Ministerial Services

Clyde Cain, Director

The Office of Ministerial Services provides a general ministry of: (1) Information to churches, pastors and staff members and (2) Continuing Education.

Services to Pastors and Staff

Ministerial Crises—Occasionally, pastors and staff members are coerced to resigned or terminated. The Ministerial Crises Committee determines necessary assistance for the individual who has experienced termination. Some limited financial assistance may be given on a short-term basis to provide a ministry of encouragement and financial help due to termination or forced resignation. A ministry of counseling is also included in the assistance provided.

Personal Retreat, Falls Creek—Arrangements have been made with Falls Creek Conference Center to provide certain cabins to pastors, staff and their families at a reduced, supplemented cost. This is an attempt to provide a place for the staff member and his family for a personal retreat. Pastors and staff are also encouraged to seek out such a place at an associational camp that might provide the same kind of relaxed atmosphere. However, no financial assistance is provided for the associational retreat setting.

Career Assessment Seminar—A seminar designed especially for the pastor/staff member to take an indepth look at their ministries including: goals and aspirations, as well as struggles. Special emphasis is given to relationships, leadership styles, problems and solutions, reflections on ministry and goals for future ministry. A limited number are invited to the Career Assessment Seminar each year.

Services to Churches

Information on Calling a Pastor—The informational service provided primarily through biographical information sheets continues to be a growing ministry. In 1985 there were over 2,800 resumes shared with churches in Oklahoma and other states. These included resumes on pastors and staff personnel and are provided without recommendation or endorsement. They are sent by request.

Assistance is also given in counseling with search committees upon request and securing of pulpit supply and/or interim pastor on request. If a pastor needs to be out of his pulpit, assistance is given in securing a pulpit supply.

A packet of materials, "On Calling A Pastor," has been written and produced to provide assistance for Pastor Search Committees. Also, a twenty-four minute video tape is available upon request and without cost to each Pastor Search Committee.

Continuing Education

State Bible Conference—The annual State Bible Conference provides detailed study for the January Bible Study book and the Baptist Doctrine Study emphasis. The conference was conducted May 5-8, 1986 with an emphasis on James, the January Bible Study book for 1987 and

the Doctrine of Prayer, which is the doctrinal emphasis for the spring of 1987. Over 300 registrants attended the conference.

Ministry Training Institute—This ministry is designed with a cooperative relationship between OBU and the BGCO to provide courses of study toward the Baccalaureate Degree or the Associate Degree at OBU. Courses of study are also available with CEU credit only. A certificate or diploma level course is available for pastors, staff members and lay persons. We currently have 18 centers in Oklahoma.

The director of the Ministry Training Institute is Dick Rader, dean of the School of Christian Service at OBU. The program coordinator is Clyde Cain, director of Ministerial Services for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Southwestern Study Center—Southwestern Seminary Study Center at OBU enrolled 114 students during the spring of 1986. Degree programs are available to enable a student to work toward the Associate in Religious Education, the Associate of Divinity, the Master of Arts in Religious Education or the Master of Divinity. Students are encouraged to consider taking approximately one-third to one-half of their program on the main campus in Fort Worth. Classes meet on Monday during the fall and spring semesters.

Seminary Conferences—Conferences have been conducted with students on four seminary campuses and Oklahoma Clubs on these campuses met, enjoyed fellowship and a banquet sponsored by the BGCO Office of Ministerial Services. Assistance is given to graduating students regarding location and places of service.

Seminary Extension—Thirteen Seminary Extension Centers are currently active in Oklahoma. These centers are providing training for approximately 100 students. Some centers have switched to the Ministry Training Institute and, therefore, are not counted as Seminary Extension Centers. In addition to Seminary Extension studies being available through the centers, approximately 75 students in Oklahoma are participating in the Independent Study program through Seminary Extension.

The Plight of the Poor and Unemployed

Today we are seeing more and more people in the ranks of the unemployed. People from many strata of society are losing jobs and farms because of the economic problems in our nation. These people present a challenge to our churches for ministry.

Concern for the poor is a consistent theme throughout the Old and New Testaments. The prophets of Israel call for justice and compassion toward the less fortunate. Jesus called the poor blessed and was numbered among those who had no place to lay his head. James called particular attention to the need for those with genuine faith to give help to those in need of food and clothing.

We must all become more sensitive to the needs of those who are perpetually poor—many elderly, the handicapped and those existing on welfare and handouts—and those new poor who have lost jobs or farms. Food and clothing collected from church members, programs of job retraining, temporary housing, charity medical clinics, job fairs, and counseling services are just a few suggestions churches might consider. Ongoing programs rather than one-time events must be instituted to minister effectively to those among us who are in need.

This could be a new day for churches if we seize this opportunity to give a cup of cold water (and much more) in Jesus' name. The words of Matthew 25:31-46 must surely challenge us to do these things "for one of the least of these" that we might truly be the people of God who will one day receive the full inheritance from the Father.

Gambling

Gambling is an insidious social addiction. Like a flood it is inundating our society, harming everyone that it touches. It violates God's commandment, "Thou shalt not covet," by seeking to get something for nothing. Every precept of the Scriptures inveighs against it. (I Timothy 6:9-10, Ephesians 4:28, II Thessalonians 3:10-12)

Gambling is practiced in many ways, beginning with small matters, and it subtly enslaves the devotee in a compulsive habit. Gambling takes many forms, sweepstakes of all kinds, football pools, horse race betting, lotteries, bingo, all kinds of card games, raffles by schools, churches, and civic organizations, and even matching coins for coffee at the corner cafe.

History tells us that gambling promotes waste, destroys stable character and is a drain on the economy. The practice of gambling despises the dignity of work, tempts the weakness of man, denies the sovereignty of God and deifies chance and luck. It is a known fact that gambling is often promoted and directed by gangsters and criminals. It is one of the ungodly trinity of the dread vices, liquor, prostitution and gambling. It is progressive, pervasive, and addictive.

Your Christian Life Committee encourages our pastors to identify the devastating effects of this social plague and to preach their best sermons enlightening our people and encouraging them to beware of it and abstain from it.

We call upon our Baptist constituency to avoid gambling as a moral ill in every form and device and to discourage it at every opportunity.

We urge concerned citizens to use every lawful means to oppose gambling in every place and under every circumstance in practice and at the polls. We caution against the false premise of revenue, properity and plenty by gambling proponents and against the deception of something for nothing.

We urge our elected officals to support every effort to oppose and defeat this debilitating social parasite.

Wife and Child Abuse

Each year 1.8 million wives in America are beaten by husbands. It is estimated that 16 out of 100 couples have violent confrontations during the course of a year.

The Challenge to pastors is to: Sensitize congregations on how to prevent violence in our society and increase efforts to help members learn to deal constructively with anger and conflict.

Child abuse includes sexual, physical and emotional abuse. This year half a million children will be molested. There has been one hundred percent increase every year for the past five years in child molestation. Of major concern is the increase in reports of children who have been threatened with death, dismemberment to themselves, parents or pets, if they disclosed sexual abuse.

The State of Oklahoma under Title 21 55846 makes it a misdemeanor for any person willingly or knowingly failing to report child abuse cases.

The Challenge to churches is to increase efforts to assist with child abuse problems in the community. Here are some ways churches can help:

- 1. Observe Child Abuse Prevention Sunday
- Sponsor "Safe at Home" Weekend Seminar (Georgia Council for Child Abuse provides packets of helpful planning materials)
- Increase efforts to make members aware of the need for foster parents
- 5. Volunteer the use of church facilities for Parents Anonymous Groups
- 6. Conduct effective parents' training groups
- Report cases of child abuse to Department of Human Services, Child Abuse—Phone: (405) 427-2735

"Liquor Advertising"

We are being massacred! Not in the same way that the postal workers were massacred in Edmond last August. Our massacre is more subtle. We are being victimized by the seductive advertising of the wine and beer industries through our media. Our children are being brainwashed by the perverted logic that black is white, that intoxication is better than sobriety, that illness is better than health! Let it be well understood that our convention is aware of this devastating deception and we purpose to fight it!

Drug Abuse

A recent survey revealed that the American public considers drug abuse, including alcoholism, to be the nation's most serious social problem. The deaths of Len Bias and Don Rogers, two nationally acclaimed athletes, earlier this year, was a grim reminder of the solemn truth that drugs kill.

Nothing less than a total war on drugs and alcohol will rid our society of this menacing evil. Success in the war against drugs and alcohol will require creative, co-operative efforts between the public and private sectors of society.

How can Christians respond redemptively?

- Christian preachers can preach and teach total abstinence from drugs (marijuana, cocaine, heroin, etc.) and alcohol as the only responsible Christian position.
- Christians can insist that public school officials institute and maintain comprehensive programs of drug and alcohol education for their students.
- Christians can support legislators, congressmen, and local, state, and national administrators who are willing to allocate large sums of money for dealing with the problem of illicit drugs.
- Christian preachers can preach Jesus Christ as one who promises a natural high that is infinitely superior to the euphoria sought through drugs and alcohol.

Abortion

The continued slaughter of untold thousands of human fetuses each year in this country through the practice of abortion on demand must cause us as Christians both sorrow and concern. Our concern must lead us to do more to begin to be part of an answer to this frightening problem.

Preventing the termination of thousands of unwanted pregnancies will take far more than decisive legislative action. We must work at a much deeper level than ever before to prevent the problem rather than just prevent the termination of the pregnancy.

If society is to limit unwanted abortions, society must support the prevention of unwanted pregnancies; and the church must work far more responsibly in this area in the future than we have ever done in the past (Foy Valentine, Christian Life Commission National Seminar, 1985).

Local churches can and must face the abortion issue directly and indirectly by:

- providing responsible education regarding abortion to help church members not be deceived, misled, or manipulated by those outside the church,
- offering a support ministry for families and individuals who are grappling with the moral issues related to abortion,
- encouraging Christian families to consider being foster or adoptive parents,
- encouraging informed and responsible Christian education regarding human sexuality and the sacred responsibility of its intended purpose,
- supporting the Child Care Ministry of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in their Pregnancy Crisis centers, hotlines, and programs for unwed mothers,
- encouraging responsible Christian citizenship which will be actively involved in the legislative process.

The Importance of Christian Citizenship

Both history and scripture clearly reveal that God's relationship to individual nations is directly affected by the activities of the citizens of those nations. Those nations who honor him and his work are blessed of God, but those who consistently ignore their responsibility to God and to his Son invariably pay a terrible price for their disobedience.

In America today we have seen the tragic results when Christians withdraw from the political aspects of life and leave that arena to those who do not name Christ as Lord and Savior. Our educational system, the public media, and to a very large degree, the political process has been abandoned by Godly men and women. Those areas of activity tend to reflect the principles and value systems of those who do not name Christ as Lord and Savior.

The Lord Jesus laid down for each of us an eternal principle concerning Christian citizenship in the 22nd chapter of Matthew. In response

to a question concerning tribute or taxes, Jesus gave us this principle: "Render therefore unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's; and unto God the things that are God's."

In these words the Master says to each of us that we are to be good citizens both in the Kingdom of God and the kingdom of man. Good citizenship obviously involves an active participation in both kingdoms. A child of God is to participate in those activities in the Kingdom of God and the kingdom of man that are reflective of an active concerned citizen. Christian citizenship is extremely important because it is a clear command of the Master.

Citizenship also is one means of carrying out the Lord's instruction given in the sermon on the mount that we are to be the "light of the world" and the "salt of the earth." These phrases certainly command Christian men and women to have a positive effect upon their community, their state, and their nation. There can be little question but that the clear implication of these terms is fulfilled by Godly men and women who take seriously their responsibility as citizens of this good nation as well as the Kingdom of God.

Strong and active Christian participation in the political process helps create a climate in the legislature where legislation that has positive moral implications and results can be more easily enacted into law. Although the sovereignty of God is not in question, there can be little question but that the Holy Spirit desires an ethical quality of life in which He can most effectively touch the hearts of men and women. Good Christian citizenship helps enhance such a quality of life for the work of the Spirit.

It is important to note that God looks unto his people to determine the quality and extent of a nation's blessing. In fact, the destiny of the nations of history has clearly been determined by the activities of God's chosen people within those nations. These words from II Chronicles 7:14 clearly teach this truth: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." The importance of Christian citizenship in the future of our nation cannot be overemphasized.

Special Care Ministries

Lowell D. Milburn, Executive Director

Special Care Ministries of Oklahoma Baptists represents the blending of Child Care and Adult Care. Thousands of today's children have been left homeless by divorce, alcoholism, illness, poverty, crime, abuse, or neglect. Abuse has become the No. 1 killer of children. Teenage pregnancies have reached epidemic proportion. Abortion has become the No. 1 moral problem of the nation. Only five percent of the people over 65 are independent. Nine out of 10 people over age 65 are either dependent or have to support themselves. There is a great need for ministries to children and adults.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES NOTED—Don Donalson became director of Adult Care. James V. Browning became assistant to Director Lowell D. Milburn on a retirement basis. Jerry T. Bradley was employed as administrator at Oklahoma City Children's Home and Christopher A. Walker became head of the Retirement Village and Children's Home at Madill. Larry Adams was employed as administrator at Oklahoma City Retirement Village and George Hair became chaplain at the Village at Madill. Michael A. Nomura became director of Rayola Baptist Community at Owasso, which includes Baptist Children's Home, Tulsa Baptist Village, and Evergreen Care Center. The combined Rayola Baptist Community was named in memory of J. Ray Smith and in honor of Mrs. Ola Smith because of their sacrificial gifts of land and resources.


MORE PEOPLE SERVED—Child Care served 1,607 in four children's homes, five group homes, and 60 foster homes. We served 19 college students and counseled 429 families. Adult Care ministered to 1,200 in the seven villages and three nursing homes.

SPECIAL MINISTRY EXPANDED—Crisis Pregnancy Centers were opened in Tulsa and Oklahoma City, Crisis Pregnancy Hotlines were opened in Stillwater, Shawnee, McAlester, and Chickasha. More than 556 unwed mothers were counseled and served. Alternatives to abortion are given and adoption is encouraged as an option.

NEW CONSTRUCTION COMPLETED—Buildings erected include McAlester Group Home, Tate-James Activities Center and Evergreen Care Center at Owasso, and Rademacher Agriculture Center at Boys Ranch Town. Construction was begun on the Mooreland Group Home for Children.

CONTINUED SUPPORT APPRECIATED—Combined budgets for Adult Care and Child Care total almost \$10,000,000. Cooperative Program and Endowment provided \$1,980,985. Mother's Day Offering contributed \$491,013. Birthday/Anniversary gifts totaled \$128,809, and Memorials totaled \$75,628. Cooperative Program supports the chaplaincy and Mother's Day Offering assists in support of hardship cases at our Baptist Villages. Baptist Villages are designed to support themselves, but rental schedules have been adjusted to meet the needs of any person or couple desiring to live in one of our Baptist Retirement Villages. Some income is provided by endowment with the Baptist Foundation.

SALARY INFORMATION

Since the auditor's report does not give salaries of all elected employees, the salaries and benefits of department directors and associate department directors are shown here. Salaries of secretaries and other convention employees are in line with those doing similar work in the Oklahoma City area.

Salary and Fringe Benefits Explanation

Every employee receives a basic salary plus fringe benefits. The base salary may be divided as follows:

Cash

House Allowance (if ordained)

Various Annuity Board Plans

Fringe benefits include comprehensive medical insurance, long-term disability insurance, life insurance, accident insurance, dependent life insurance and retirement (10 percent of base salary). For unordained persons, the convention pays employer's part of Social Security.

Here are two samples from 1987 salary schedules. Annual base pay for department directors is \$35,107.92 and for associates \$29,841.60.

Employees who travel are reimbursed for their expenses when on convention business. The budgets carry a line item for the cost of leasing and insuring cars. There is an additional line item for other travel expenses which includes gas, oil, lodging, etc.

LONGEVITY PAY SCHEDULE

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved a longevity pay schedule for employees on May 15, 1978. A separate line in the budgets indicate the longevity pay in

order to clearly identify the base salary level which is the same for all employees with similar responsibilities.

Rationale Considered by Board of Directors

- 1. Presently, all employees are employed at the same salary for similar jobs.
- 2. Recognition for previous experience and skills is presently taken into account by beginning the employee at the same salary as his or her predecessor.
- 3. Short-term employees cost the BGCO repeated hours of training, moving expenses, etc.
- 4. A person becomes more valuable as he or she continues serving the BGCO.
- 5. There are a minimum number of positions in the BGCO and a person of ability, etc. often is limited in opportunities to move up in the organization to a higher salaried job. Longevity pay would help compensate at this point.
- 6. Recognition for continuous years of service could be accomplished through a longevity pay schedule that:
 - 1) Acknowledges the completion of 3 years with a \$200 base longevity compensation.
 - 2) Increases each succeeding year with .2 percent of the salary, per year for each year beyond three years added to the base.
- 7. This suggested plan gives advantage to lower salaried persons by using the \$200 base for all persons.
- 8. The plan also gives credibility to longevity pay for higher salaried persons by using a percent of base salary for the annual increase.

THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS NOTES TO FINANICAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended December 31, 1986

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted

by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include only operations designated as "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

Assets, liabilities, fund balances and results of operations of the following owned organizations, operated and reported as separate organizations, are not included.

al. Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma

2. Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Fund Accounting—Separate funds have been established to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions (restricted and endowment funds). The following funds have been established for the Convention:

 Current Unrestricted Fund—This fund accounts for all resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of the Convention.

Current Restricted Fund—These funds account for those resources currently available for

use, but expendable only for operating purposes specified by the donors. Plant Fund—This fund accumulates the net investment in fixed assets and accounts for the unexpended resources contributed specifically for the purpose of acquiring or replacing land, buildings, or equipment for use in the operations of the organization. Mortgages or other liabilities

relating to these assets are also included in this fund.

 Endowment Fund—This fund represents the principal amount of gifts and bequests accepted with the donor-stipulation that the principal be maintained intact in perpetuity, until the occurrence of a specified event, or for a specified period, and that only the income from investment thereof be expended either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor.

Inventories-Inventories of office and printing supplies and items held for resale at Camps Hudgens

and Nunny Cha-ha are stated at the lower of cost or market.

Inventories of livestock, poultry, and feed at the boys' ranch and farm are stated at a nominal value. These items have either been grown or have been contributed and therefore, have no cost value.

Property and Equipment—The Convention capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair

market value at date of donation of \$500 or more. Depreciation was recorded on the straight-line method from dates of acquisition or donation. The lives generally used are:

Land improvements	20-40 years
Buildings	20-50 years
Furniture and office equipment	4-10 years
Automobiles and machinery	3-10 years

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. The donor may designate its use by the Baptist General Convention. Such designated (restricted) contributions are recognized as revenue

when the obligation imposed by the restriction has been met.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. Only those funds held by the Foundation for "The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma" are included in this report. These funds include designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions, restricted and custodial funds held for the Convention. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense

On September 3, 1963, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The approximate amount of the unamortized balance is refundable to the Convention in the event of early termination. At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the unamortized balance amounted to \$2,932 and \$4,693, respectively.

4. Notes Payable

Bank of Oklahoma-On October 15, 1985, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City in the amount of \$300,000. On March 3, 1986, the final advance of \$200,000 was made bringing the total loan proceeds to \$500,000. The note is due on demand. Interest is payable monthly. Proceeds were used for operations of the Owasso Nursing Home Project.

Tulsa Industrial Authority-Tulsa Baptist Village—On December 13, 1982, the Convention entered

into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance the expansion of the Tulsa Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "Promissory Note, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Project" in the amount of \$4,500,000. The promissory note is secured by land upon which the expansion is erected (included in Note 8), the facility expansion, related equipment and rentals from tenants.

At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the note payable balance was \$3,656,250 and \$3,881,250, respectively. Loan repayments of \$56,250 plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due quarterly starting May 15, 1983 through August 15, 1992. The final payment of \$2,362,500 is due November 15, 1992.

Tulsa Industrial Authority-Owasso Nursing Home-On May 1, 1985, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance construction of the Owasso Nursing Home facility. The Authority issued its "Revenue Bonds, Series 1985 (Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso Nursing Home Project)" in the amount of \$2,2000,000. The note is secured by land upon

which the facility is to be erected, the facility, related equipment, and rentals from tenants.

At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the notes payable balance was \$2,082,117 and \$1,990,058, respec-

tively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due annually starting May 1, 1987, through 1995. Interest is due semi-annually at an effective rate of 9% starting November 1, 1985.

The Marshall County Development Authority—On December 28, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Marshall County Development Authority to finance construction of the Southern Oklahoma Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Madill Retirement Center Project, Series 1982" in the amount of \$1,200,000, secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the notes payable balance was \$1,040,000 and \$1,097,000, respec-

tively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due semi-annually starting June 15, 1984 through December 15, 1997.

The Pontotoc County Area Authority—On May 1, 1983, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Pontotoc County Area Authority to finance construction of the Ada Baptist Village facility.
The Authority issued its "First Mortage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1983" in the amount of \$1,500,000. The Convention entered into supplemental loan agreements with the Authority the amount of \$1,500,000. The Convention entertee into supplemental total agreements with the Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1984" in the amount of \$150,000 on April 1, 1984 and "Series 1985" in the amount of \$625,000 on May 1, 1985. The Original and supplemental loan agreements are secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the notes payable balance was \$2,114,000 and \$2,100,00 respec-

tively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting May 1, 1985, through May 1, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting November 1,

1983 for the original issue and May 1, 1984 for the supplemental issues.

The Cleveland Industrial Trust Authority—On June 30, 1983, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Cleveland Industrial Trust Authority to finance construction of the Cleveland Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1983" in the amount of \$1,500,000. During 1984 and 1985 the Convention entered into supplemental loan agreements with the Authority to finance completion of the facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1984" in the amount of \$150,000 and "Series 1985" in the amount of \$625,000. The original and supplemental loan agreements are secured by certain real estate, the facility and related equipment.

At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the notes payable balance was \$2,114,000 and \$2,190,000, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting June 10, 1985 through June 10, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting December

10, 1983.

Okmulgee Baptist Village—In May 1986, the Convention accepted transfer of the Okmulgee Baptist Village from Baptist Health Care Corporation and assumed the associated liabilities. The Baptist Health Care Corporation had entered into a loan agreement with the Oklahoma Development Authority to finance construction of the Okmulgee Baptist Village facility. The note is secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

The note payable balance was \$1,400,000 at the date of transfer and \$1,300,000 at December 31, 1986. Loan repayments of \$50,000 are due semi-annually through January 1, 1995 with a balloon pay-

ment due July 1, 1995. Interest is due semi-annually at 75% of prime.

The Baptist Health Care Corporation had also entered into a loan agreement with the Okmulgee County Housing Finance Authority which was also assumed by the Convention. The note is secured by land, building, and revenue of the project.

The note payable balance was \$289,672 at the date of transfer and \$282,352 at December 31, 1986.

Monthly installments of principal and interest at 75% of prime are due under the note.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—The convention has entered into several loan agreements with The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. A summary of pertinent provisions of these agreements

5. Commitments and Contingencies

The Convention is contingently liable for certain lease obligations which are reported by separate organizations. These lease obligations as of December 31, 1986 (including amounts representing interest) are summarized as follows:

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma:

Oklahoma Industries Authority: 283,313 3,240,283 Series A Series C 3,523,596 Oklahoma County Industries Authority 5,464,586 8,988,182 Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma: Hugo Golden Age Home Authority 3,007

In addition, the Convention is co-guarantor on a note to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma by Indian Falls Creek Assembly. The balance at December 31, 1986 was \$11,940.

6. Capital and Operating Lease Receivable

The Convention borrowed \$250,000 from The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the purpose of remodeling office space and the acquisition of office furnishings leased to the Foundation. Rental payments by the Foundation are equal to the debt service requirements of the Convention.

The capital portion of the lease (\$87,500) relates to the office furnishings. Rent on this portion

totals \$11,934 annually. The remaining \$19,322 is considered annual space rent costs under the operating portion of the lease. The financial statements reflect a receivable of \$87,308 at December 31, 1986 for the portion of such rental applicable to the office furnishings.

7. Notes Receivable

During 1985, the Convention sold a house and received a note in the original amount of \$26,700 (balance at December 31,1986, \$26,263). The note provides for monthly payments of \$295 including

(balance at December 31,1950, 320,203). The note provides for minimal payments of 223 interest at 10.5%. The final payment is due in January, 1991.

The Convention has a note receivable secured by land located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, resulting from a sale of a dairy farm. The outstanding balance at December 31, 1986 was \$180,000. On January 1, 1987, \$25,000 was received and the note was renewed in the amount of \$155,000 due July 1, 1987, with interest at 9%.

The Convention has a note receivable for funds advanced to the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, an affiliate. The note provides for monthly payments of \$4,000 with interest at 6.5%. The balance at December 31, 1986 and 1985 was \$482,851 and \$500,853, respectively.

During 1986, the Convention loaned an additional \$163,950 to the Baptist Retirement Center,

Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The note provides for monthly payments of \$1,863 including interest at 11%. The balance at December 31, 1986 was \$161,318.

8. Capital Lease Obligations

Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center—On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority, The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The duplex units were

completed during 1981 at a total cost of \$322,923.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy both bond obligations. The original and supplemental leases are scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008 and April

1, 2001, respectively.

The Convention has the right to purchase both the project and duplex units at any time on or after

The Convention has the right to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter

issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Telephone System -- On July 23, 1986, the Convention executed a lease agreement for a telephone system. The lease calls for monthly payments of \$1,330 for five years. The Convention has the right to purchase the system at the end of the lease term for \$6,387.

The telephone system has been capitalized at \$65,460 and is being depreciated under the straightline method over five years.

9. Deferred Life Estates

Certain duplexes were constructed by donors on land owned by the Tulsa Baptist Village in Owasso. These duplexes were donated to the Village and the donors have a rent-free life estate in the duplexes. The duplexes were capitalized at a value approximating total construction costs, and are being depreciated over their estimated useful lives. The deferred liability for the life estates, representing future rentals to be provided, is reduced annually for rentals, based upon the donors' life espectancy. At December 31, 1986 and 1985, the deferred life estates totaled \$1,160,022 and \$1,016,885, respectively. The original control of the con capitalized value was \$1,340,935 and \$1,057,935 at December 31, 1986 and 1985.

10. Prior Period Adjustments

Funds Held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—In 1986, additional information obtained from the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma indicated that several trusts not previously reported in the financial statements of the Convention in prior years should have been included. Also, the classifica-tion of several trusts has been changed. The accompanying financial statements of the Convention for 1986 properly reflect these trusts on the basis of information provided by the Foundation.

The financial statements for 1985, presented herein for comparative purposes, have been restated to give retroactive effect to the inclusion and classification of such trusts for 1986. The following is

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1, the Foundation's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, except that they include a provision for depreciation of equipment. Consequently, certain revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above, present fairly the assets and liabilities of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma arising from cash transactions as of December 31, 1986 and the support and revenue collected, expenses paid, and changes in fund balances and the changes in funds arising from cash transactions for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year after giving retroactive effect to the change, with which we concur, in the method of accounting for restricted fund revenue and the restatement of fund groupings, as described in Note 9 to the financial statements.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1—SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General-The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) is a private, nonprofit religious association chartered by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention) to administer funds and property received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention and, to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work.

Basis of Accounting-The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, except that they include a provision for deprecia-

tion of equipment and depletion on mineral properties.

Fund Accounting—To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund groups as follows:

Unrestricted Operating Fund—The Unrestricted Operating Fund is designed to account for resources which are expendable for support of Foundation operations and for the acquisition of equipment. This fund has no external restriction on its use or purpose, and can

be used for any purpose designated by the governing board.

Property and Equipment Fund-This fund reports the carrying value of all property and equipment utilized by the Foundation in its operations, exclusive of those real proper-

ties held for investment or received under fiduciary responsibility.

Restricted Funds—Restricted funds are funds other than endowments, the use of which has been restricted by outside agencies or persons (donors/grantors) for specific purposes. Such funds are generally restricted for capital improvements. Revenues of restricted funds are reported as such to the extent that expenses have been incurred for the purpose specified by the donor or grantor during the period.

Endowment and Trust Funds-The Endowment and Trust Funds are comprised of resources received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise that are subject to restrictions of the gift or trust instrument. Endowment funds account for assets received under the stipulation of the donors that the principal be invested and that only the income be used for the designated purposes until a specified time or occurrence, or in perpetuity. The trust funds require that distributions be made to the designated beneficiaries.

Endowment and Trust Funds also include revocable trusts totaling approximately

\$5,300,00 at December 31, 1986.

Loan Funds—These funds represent resources restricted for loans.

Custodian Funds-These funds account for assets received by the Foundation to be held and disbursed only on instructions of the person or organization from whom they were received, as contrasted to funds held under fiduciary capacity. The receipt of such funds and the disbursement thereof are reported in the net capital additions section of the statement of support and revenue. The net balances of custodian funds are reported in the statement of assets and liabilities as amounts held for others.

General Investment Fund-This fund is an investment pool for the various funds of the Foundation. A participating fund increases or decreases ownership in the fund by the purchase or redemption of units. The fund is operated on the market value method whereby units are valued based on the relationship of total units outstanding to total assets. Investment income is allocated to participating funds based on percentage of ownership. Assets of the General Investment Fund consist primarily of Church building loans, commercial stocks, mortgage-backed repurchase agreements, and GNMA funds.

Property and Equipment—Major expenditures for equipment are capitalized at cost while donated property and equipment are capitalized at fair market value at the date of the gift. Depreciation of equipment in the Operating Fund is provided for over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis. No provision is made for depreciation of rental

and other properties carried as investments in the Endowment and Trust Funds.

Annuities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions which require the Foundation to pay the donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified portion of the income of these trusts is disbursed to the individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death, the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of the Baptist agencies or institutions as designated. The liablity for future payments to beneficiaries, totaling \$220,389 at December 31, 1986, is reported as a reduction of the corpus of such funds.

Appropriation for Corpus Preservation—For certain endowments, the Foundation appropriates a portion of the income to preserve the value of the corpus. Such appropriation, totaling \$1,895,181 at December 31, 1986, is included as a part of the total corpus balance. This appropriation is generally for endowments with depletable assets such as mineral properties, but may also be specified for other endowments. Various methods are used to calculate the amount to be appropriated.

Income Taxes—The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 2—CASH EQUIVALENTS

NOTE 5—FUND BALANCES AND RELATED ACCOUNTS

Except for the operating and property and equipment fund, the Foundation holds net assets either in fiduciary or custodial capacity, or as agent.

The Foundation has fiduciary responsibility for endowment and trust funds and loan funds. Restricted funds are generally held as agent for others. Custodian funds represent assets received by the Foundation to be disbursed only on instructions of the person or organization from whom they were received.

NOTE 6-RELATED PARTIES

As disclosed in Note 1, the Foundation is affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). The majority of the funds administered by the Foundation are for the benefit of the Convention, its agencies and various other Baptist organizations. Throughout the year the Foundation makes distributions either directly to these organizations or on their behalf. The Foundation also receives funds from these organizations, both to administer for their benefit and to support the Foundation's operations.

The Foundation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Convention.

Appropriations for the year ended December 31, 1986 were \$314,650.

The Foundation makes loans to Baptist churches to finance the construction of church buildings. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the buildings constructed and require personal endorsements of church representatives. The lives of these loans vary from 10 to 15 years. Interest rates are set at the approximate current rate available from commercial sources. The balances of church building loans outstanding at December 31, 1986 was \$30,895,325 (1985—\$25,923,889).

At December 31, 1986, the Foundation had outstanding commitments totaling \$6,069,000 for church building loans.

NOTE 7-PENSION PLAN

All employees of the Foundation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1986 was \$46,065 (1985—\$42,994). The Foundation's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

NOTE 8-CAPITAL AND OPERATING LEASES

The Foundation occupies newly remodeled office space in the Baptist Building, which is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, under an agreement expiring in 2001. The Convention borrowed \$250,000 from the Church Building Loan fund for the purpose of funding the remodeling costs and for the acquisition of office furnishings for the Foundation. Rental payments by the Foundation are equal to the debt service requirements of the Convention.

The office furnishing thus acquired, totaling \$87,500, have been capitalized by the Foundation. A portion of the rental cost, totaling \$11,934 annually, is applicable to the office furnishings acquired under capital lease. The remaining \$19,322 is considered annual space rent costs under the operating portion of the lease. The financial statements reflect a liability of \$87,308 at December 31, 1986 for the portion of such rental applicable to the office furnishings.

NOTE 9—RESTATEMENT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS



In addition to the changes in the reporting format for recognition of reclassified fund groupings, another significant change in accounting prinicple is the recognition of restricted revenue to the extent that expenses have been incurred for the purpose specified by the donor or grantor during the period. In prior years, since restricted funds were not classified as such, restricted revenue was recognized when received. This change in accounting principle for 1986 increased the excess of support and revenue over disbursements by \$143,732 over that which would have been reported by the method used in prior years.

 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies
 Organization—The Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909 to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that Convention. Articles of Incorporation were filed February 9, 1910 and amended November 25, 1974 with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a corporation of perpetual duration without capital stock. The purpose of the corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Chriatian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Accrual Basis—Except for depreciation which is discussed later in this note, the financial statements

of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statements of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are statements of current period financial activities. They

do not purport to present the results of operations or net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacements or equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) nonmandatory transfers, in all other cases.

The library is valued at an amount equal to the cost of books, periodicals and microform acquired during the past ten years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years. Library acquisitions totaled approximately \$55,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist primarily of bookstore supplies held for resale and maintenance supplies. In-

ventories are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Externally restricted funds may only be utilized only in accordance with purposes specified by the source of such funds. This is in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains

full control to use in achieving any institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and only the income be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned the assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and similar assets is accounted for in the funds owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds. Such income is accounted for in the funds to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in the current unrestricted fund.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the current unrestricted fund. Restricted gifts, grant appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Current restricted funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when ex-

pended for current operating purposes. Investments-Investments which were purchased by the University are generally stated at cost. In-

vestments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at the date of acquisition or at fair market value at the date of donation. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Revenue Recognition-Charges for student tuition, fees and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated uses are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and contributions are recognized as income when received.

2. Pledges

As a result of organized requests for gifts, the following pledges have been received and are un-collected. These pledges are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements.

The University received capital contributions from the federal government for the Nursing Student Loan Program which total \$236,474 from the inception of the program to July 31, 1986 and 1985. The University has repaid \$43,200 to the federal government. An additional \$95,647 was advanced to the University by the government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans; \$76,333 has been repaid to the government. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds and from matching University funds (1/9 of the federal capital contribution). Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the respective programs may have portions of the principal and interest forgiven.

5. Funds Held in Trust by Others The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and payment of trust expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The Prichard Trust had a corpus of \$5,677,884 (market value \$7,160,221) at July 31, 1986. The American National Bank and Trust Company of Shawnee, Oklahoma daministers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after

payments of beneficiary and trust expenses. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$1,391,589 at July 31, 1986.

The assets of the above trusts are not included in the accompanying financial statements.

6. Bonds Payable

The University is obligor to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government under the following two bond indentures:

(A) The first indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, consists of 23/4% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$15,000 in 1976 to \$23,000 on November 1, 1995, and are secured by a first mortgage on the Mrs. W. S. Kerr Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$921,139.

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing Bonds, Series

(B) The second indenture, known as Oklahoma Baptist University Student Housing Bonds, Series 1957, consists of 2-7/8% first mortgage bonds. These bonds mature in amounts increasing from \$17,000 in 1976 to \$33,000 on October 1, 1997, and are secured by a first mortgage on Brotherhood Memorial Dormitory, included herein at the University's cost of \$2,765,248.

Under the terms of the indenture, naming The Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, as trustee, the specific income of Kerr Dormitory, Brotherhood Dormitory, and, to the extent necessary, W.M.U. Memorial Dormitory are pledged for the retirement of these bonds. The University is required to maintain sinking funds with the trustee.

7. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority—1979 Capitalized Lease Obligation
The University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979. to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities

in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities complex; to remodel the Brotherhood and W.M.U. Memorial Dormitories and the Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. The Authority obtained funds for these improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979". Assets totaling approximately \$7,400,000 have been constructed or purchased under this lease. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

The lease was amended on June 1, 1985 to obtain funds to finance a portion of the construction of the science building, married student housing, and a campus ministries center, and for the renovation of Kerr Dormitory, the Theater Annex, Montgomery and Thurman Halls, and Parkway and Jent Apartments. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$5,300,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1985". The remainder of the costs of these projects ects is to be financed by funds raised in a special fund raising campaign and by University resources. As of July 31, 1986, accumulated costs on these projects totaled \$5,552,321. Projects totaling \$307,668 have been completed and are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund. These remaining projects are still in process and their accumulated costs (\$5,244,653 as of July 31, 1986) are included in construction in progress in the plant fund along with \$340,646 in funds held by the trustee pending disbursement by the trustee on the above projects.

Both bond series are secured by rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities, by mortgages on specified real estate which comprises the main campus, and by a guarantee from The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Oklahoma Baptist University Authority

On December 30, 1982, the University entered into an agreement with the Authority in which the Authority agreed to loan the University up to \$400,000. To secure this loan, the University transferred certain University property to the Authority. Upon repayment of the loan the property will be transferred back to the University. The proceeds of this loan were used to purchase additional real estate and to construct new student apartments.

On December 30, 1984, the loan converted to a permanent loan payable in 120 equal monthly principal payments of \$3,333, plus interest. The interest rate is equal to 55% of the base rate of the Federal National Bank & Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, adjusted quarterly. At July 31, 1986, this note was payable as follows:

In November 1983, the University Board of Trustees authorized The Vision for Excellence Campaign with a goal of \$6,550,000. As of July 31, 1986, campaign pledges approximated \$12,000,000. Funds raised by this campaign, plus investment earnings, will be used for several priority needs, including the new science building, scholarships, renovation and construction of student housing, operational support, new academic programs, and debt service requirements under the amendment to the 1979 capitalized lease obligation (note 7).

12. Year Ended July 31, 1985 Financial Information

The amounts shown for the year ended July 31, 1985 in the accompanying statement of current

fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are included to provide a basis for comparison with the year ended July 31, 1986 and present summarized totals only. Accordingly, the year ended July 31, 1985 amounts are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies
 The Center is owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma
 (Convention), and operates a nursing home for the elderly in Hugo, Oklahoma. The Center presents its financial statements in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Under the provision of that Guide, the following accounting policies, unique to not-for-profit hospitals and nursing homes, are in effect:

Funds—Restricted funds are used to differentiate funds, the use of which is limited by the donor, from funds on which the donor places no restriction or which arise as a result of the operation of the institution for its stated purposes. Funds restricted for property and equipment are added to the unrestricted fund balance to the extent expended within the period. Resources set aside for board-

designated purposes are not considered to be restricted.

Basis of Accounting-The accrual basis of accounting is used. Revenue is recognized in the period service is provided.

Inventories-Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property and Equipment—Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

Land improvements Buildings and improvements 2 to 5% 5% Fixed equipment 10% Major movable equipment

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation. Funds equal to a portion of depreciation expense have been set aside to ultimately by used to replace property and equipment as necessary. The balance of such funds at December 31, 1986 was \$12,569 (December 31, 1985, \$40,934). In addition, \$864 has been set aside for renovations.

2. Restatement of Amounts Due to Authority

The fund balance at January 1, 1986 has been restated to reflect an adjustment totaling \$25,673 in the amount due to Hugo Golden Age Home Authority (Authority). Of this amount, \$2,081 of interest was applicable to the year ended December 31, 1985, and the balance (applicable to years prior to 1985) has been credited to fund balance at January 1, 1985.

3. Agreements with Hugo Golden Age Home Authority

In 1970, the Center underwent a large expansion which was financed through the Hugo Golden Age Home Authority, a public trust. The Authority issued tax exempt bonds in the amount of \$320,000, of which \$125,000 was used to retire indebtedness to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the remaining \$195,000 was used for improvements to the facility, bond issue costs, and other related expenses.

At that time, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased the facilities to the Authority for a period that would coincide with the bond life of approximately 16 years. The Authority then executed an operating and maintenance agreement with the Convention, which provides for the Convention to operate the Center on behalf of the Authority. The form of this agreement provides for the Authority to pay to the Convention, as rent, the net results of operations after deducting sufficient funds to meet annual bond debt service consisting of principal, interest, trustee fees, and any other related costs. The substance of the agreement differs from form in that the Convention retains all benefits of ownership and operations because all funds resulting from operations less debt service payments inure to the Convention. The financial statements for the Center have been prepared recognizing the substance over the form of this agreement.

In addition to the leasing of the facility to the Authority, the Convention also pledged its "full faith and credit" toward the payment of all principal and interest due under the bonds as an additional guarantee to the bond holders. This additional guarantee has, in effect, caused the Convention to be responsible for the payment of debt service in the event that facility operations are insufficient to meet

such payments.

The lease will terminate during the year ending December 31, 1987. The amount due the Authority for debt service for that year is \$3,007.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma was constructed in 1965 by Baptist Laymen's Corporation, a nonprofit corporation affiliated with Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Center is located near Northwest Highway and Council Road in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. It consists of Lackey Manor (a nursing home), houses and apartment units located adjacent thereto.

In 1974, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation conveyed ownership of the Center to Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Baptist Laymen's Corporation continues to operate the Center for the Convention.

The Center reports in accordance with the "Hospital Audit Guide," published by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, Under the provisions of that guide, the following accounting policies, unique to puck for profit hospitals and pursing homes are in effect.

Basis of Accounting—The accrual basis of accounting is used. Service revenue is recognized in the period service is provided. Apartment revenue is recognized in the period service is provided. Apartment revenue is recognized in the period such revenue accrues to the Center.

Inventories-Inventories are stated at cost, but not in excess of market.

Property, Plant, and Equipment—Depreciation is provided on the straight-line method at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives. The rates generally used were:

Land improvements 5%
Building and improvements 2 to 5%
Fixed equipment 5%
Major movable equipment 10% to 20%

The property and equipment is shown at cost or fair market value at date of acquisition or donation.

Investments Held by Other Entities—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as a recipient for funds that could be invested. Funds held by the Foundation, included herein at cost or market value at date of receipt or donation, were derived from contributions both by the retirement center and individual donors with the retirement center as beneficiary.

The Center has an endowment fund at the Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. with a balance of \$25,000 at December 31, 1986 and 1985. The Center received \$3,375 income from this fund during the current year. The income from this fund may be used for any purpose; however, the corpus may not be withdrawn, and therefore is not included as an asset in the accompanying financial statements.

Life Estates—Several residents have remitted funds to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to be used to build houses or duplexes at the Center. In exchange for the funds, these residents have the right to live in the dwellings rent-free for the remainder of their lives. These funds are recognized in the financial statements as deferred annuities which will be amortized over the life expectancy of the residents. The amount amortized each year is included in apartment revenue.

2. Capitalized Lease Obligations (Bonds Payable)

In 1964, land on which the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma is located was conveyed to Baptist Laymen's Corporation to be held in trust for the use and benefit of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

In 1971, the Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (Convention). OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The Series A bonds outstanding at December 31, 1986 totaled \$225,000 (1985—\$295,000). Series B bonds were retired in 1982.

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. The bonds outstanding at December 31, 1986 totaled \$1,790,000 (1985—\$1,830,000).

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The note is guaranteed by the Convention. The OCIA assumed responsibility for the construction of a 36 unit intermediate care apartment complex with cafeteria and 22 quadruplexes. The term of the lease is 10 years with quarterly payments equal to principal, premium, and interest due on next note payment date and any administrative expenses, less any surplus in the sinking fund. The Corporation has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time prior to the expiration of the lease term for the amount required to retire all outstanding indebtedness plus \$500. During 1986, the Center began construction of a duplex and seven quadruplexes, renovation of a house, and repair of apartment roofs. The total cost of these projects was estimated to be approximately \$1,500,000. At December 31, 1986, the construction of the duplex and the renovation and repair projects were complete.

These projects were financed by a construction loan from Central Bank, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. the maximum amount of the loan is \$1,500,000. At December 31, 1986, the Center had borrowed \$725,021. Interest at 1\sqrt{w} above prime is payable quarterly. The loan is secured by certain real estate at the Center. The Center has a commitment from The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma to refinance the loan on a long-term basis upon completion of the project.

5. Accounts Payable

Accounts payable includes \$21,884 owed to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma on an open account.

6. Abandoned Construction Project

During 1984 and 1985, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma made architectural and feasibility studies of the construction of twin towers of luxury retirement apartments at the Center. During 1986, the Convention abandoned the project as unfeasible. The architectural feasibility study and related costs totaling \$220,424 were written off in 1986.

7. Year Ended December 31, 1985 Statement of Income

The amount shown for the year ended December 31, 1985 in the accompanying statement of income are included to provide a basis for comparison with the year ended December 31, 1986 and present summarized totals only.
