The Family Care Ministries Committee of the Board of Directors will serve with the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Executive Director of Family Care Ministries, and Director of Adult Care Ministries in matters of policy pertaining to the operations and in making recommendations to the Board of Directors. The Articles of Incorporation and Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma will serve as the guide for policies and procedures of the Family Care Ministries.

The Family Care Committee will participate in budget approval (final approval is by entire Board), concur on major administrative appointments, assist Executive Director-Treasurer in selection of the Executive Director of the ministries office, review and approve the policies and procedures outlined in the Staff Manual, guide and assist the administration with major conflicts and problems confronting the agency, approve any substantial outlay of funds for construction or other major projects, avoid conflict of interest by refusing to use position as board members for personal gain.

Second Amended Articles of Incorporation of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

TO: WILLIAM N. CHRISTIAN, SECRETARY OF STATE
OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA
KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related

activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortgages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all

the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure or capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-

one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporation organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their acting shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, action in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meetings may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Con-

vention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case any member misses two consecutive meetings of the board without giving advance notification to the office of the Executive Director-Treasurer, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the

remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 4. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called board meeting, the president and executive director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommendation, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the board of directors.

Section 5. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 6. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 7. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. **PRESIDENT**—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER**—The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the conven-

tion. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant:

(1) In the event the vacancy of the office of executive director-treasurer occurs between sessions of the convention, the associate executive director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the board of directors.

(2) A search committee of seven members of the board of directors shall be elected without nomination by the board of directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.

(3) When the committee has a nomination to make to the board, a meeting of the board of directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the board of directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the convention.

(4) The person elected by the board of directors shall serve until the convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.

Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of the recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.

Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between

the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's board of directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected convention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTEES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

Section 4. A member of any convention committee shall be considered as having resigned when missing two consecutive meetings without giving advance notification to the office of Executive Director-Treasurer.

ARTICLE V—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current opera-

tions. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

Charter and Bylaws

of

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to

persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

“That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

ARTICLE I POWERS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the corporation (referred to in this and the following articles as "University") and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

1. Appoint or remove the President and other Officers of the University Corporation in accordance with these Bylaws;
2. Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty;
3. Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board Committee;
4. Establish and review the educational programs of the Univer-

- sity after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs or Special Committees of Review set up by the President and Chairperson of the Board in financial emergency situations.
5. Establish annually the budget of the University, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee;
 6. Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
 7. Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the University;
 8. Institute and promote major fund raising efforts of the University;
 9. Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the University;
 10. Authorize Officers or agents of the University to accept gifts for the University;
 11. Authorize the incurring of debts by the University and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of real and personal property, tangible and intangible;
 12. Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he/she is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself/herself. An employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

Section 2.

Vacancies in the office of the trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the State of Oklahoma or member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma, or death of a trustee, or as the result of his/her inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy in the office of trustees occur during the interval be-

tween the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

In the event any member misses two (2) consecutive meetings of the Board without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the University, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by affirmative vote of the Convention then in office.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, one or more Assistant Secretaries, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board Trustees at its last meeting of the University's fiscal year. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the corporation and Vice Chairman with the office of Vice-President of the corporation. At the March Board Meeting the Board shall elect three trustees to serve as a nominating committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. These trustees shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and written ballot. The nominating committee shall nominate candidates to serve as officers of the Board at the July meeting with opportunity provided at that meeting for nominations to be made from the floor. The term of service for officers of the Board begins at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November.

Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

Section 3.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The President of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose. The Vice President for Business Affairs of the University shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not

be counted a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

Section 4.

The Board may appoint one or more Vice Chairmen, Assistant Secretaries, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the University Corporation.

Section 5.

All Officers of the University Corporation shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such Office may have against the University.

ARTICLE IV POWERS AND DUTIES OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION OFFICERS

Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2.

The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and

a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency.

Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the University and shall be as Treasurer an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He/She shall have the duty to keep or cause to be kept full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to obey all lawful orders of the Trustees, the President of the University, and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the University. He/She shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the University, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, deposit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs Committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the University. He/She shall not pay out any money unless by order of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs Committee may prescribe. He/She shall cooperate with any independent auditors or certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the University, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the University at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may duly require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the University faithfully to perform the duties of his/her office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his/her hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

ARTICLE V POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

Section 1.

The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Such tenure shall include a periodic evaluation system by

the Board of Trustees and/or its agents. Such evaluation shall also set the salary and compensation for the President for the term acceptable to the Board and the President.

Section 2.

The President of the University shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the University and the official adviser to and executive agent of the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. The President of Oklahoma Baptist University must be an active member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church. He/She shall, as educational and administrative head of the University, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He/She shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts, and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws he/she shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

Section 3.

The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the **Administrative and Staff Handbook** then in force.

Section 4.

The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in July of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment and tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the **Faculty Handbook** then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 5.

In the event the office of President of The Oklahoma Baptist University becomes vacant, a special nominating committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board before which two weeks notice has been given concerning this needed action. The committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service, shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and secret ballot. This special nominating committee shall nominate five trustees to serve as members of the Presidential Search Committee in the next meeting

of the Board of Trustees with opportunity provided for nominations to be made from the floor. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the five trustees elected, he shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Chairman of the Faculty Council, the President of the Alumni Association and the President of the Student Government Association shall serve as ex officio, non-voting members of the Search Committee.

The Search Committee shall notify in writing all members of the Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of any prospective candidates. A vita of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents a candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1.

All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in November or December, following the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of March, at which time the Board of Trustees shall adopt the budget for the University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of July, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper, except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it.

Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter or the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

ARTICLE VII ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING

Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the Trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by all members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or the committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1.

There may be such special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President, annually, at or following the November-December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these bylaws the Chairman of the Board and the President of the University shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least five additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. The chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees, however.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its stand-

ing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the Chairman of the Board, may request the President of the University to appoint an Administrative Officer of the University or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

Section 6.

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be organized into the following committees:

The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the Board (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary) and the Chairmen of the Administrative Committees. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall receive from the Secretary annually in July the record of attendance and participation by all Board members during the fiscal year preceding. In the event that a trustee has failed to meet the responsibilities of service, the committee shall request from the trustee an indication of his desire for continuing service on the Board or his intention to resign in light of the circumstances and report his response to the Chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma's Nomination Committee. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Administrative Committees: There shall be five standing administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, Student Development Committee, and the Spiritual Life Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the University. The Administrative Committees shall receive reports from University administrators and consider policies and recommendations regulating the life and function of the University.

Section 7. Academic Affairs Committee.

The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall, in cooperation with the President, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class

size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long range enrolment goals; advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs; recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel; and shall review matters affecting the faculty of the University; consider proposals on such matters; and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 8. Business Affairs Committee.

The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Vice President for Business Affairs shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.

Section 9. Development Committee.

The Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review and recommend fund raising and public relations programs and report to the business Affairs Committee on fund raising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting.

Section 10. Student Development Committee.

The Student Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the University, other than those relating to the spiritual life and academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 11. Spiritual Life Committee.

The Spiritual Life Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review all matters concerning religious activities and the programs that promote spiritual growth and development at Oklahoma Baptist University, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

ARTICLE IX IDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the University shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he has been made a party by reason of his being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as to which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action,

suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

ARTICLE X CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such member's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his responsibilities to the University, or (b) such Trustee is aware that a member of his family (which for purposes of this paragraph shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his family) is an officer, director, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter, under consideration at a Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATOR OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the University to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the University, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the University shall be signed by such officer or agent of the University and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees shall require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the University to give bonds in amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the University.

Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the University shall be deposited to the credit of the University in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the University any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the University, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the University.

Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the University shall begin the first day of August and end the last day of July in each year.

**ARTICLE XII
BYLAW AMENDMENT****Section 1.**

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each trustee at his/her usual place of residence.

Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Section 3.

Prior to each November/December meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

We, the Undersigned, John R. Crain, President and C. Fred Williams, Secretary, being persons legally competent to amend and restate the Articles of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, pursuant to the provisions of the laws of Oklahoma pertaining to religious and nonprofit corporations, do hereby execute the following Amendments and Restatement of the Articles of Incorporation; and do further affirm that the Amendments were adopted in the manner prescribed by law.

ARTICLE I

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is C. Fred Williams, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III

No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V

Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious

and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers;

2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;

3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;

4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;

5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and

6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI

Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be residents of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII

Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII**Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes**

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IX**Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status**

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distribution in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X**Dissolution**

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI**Adoption of Amended Articles**

1. The amendments contained in the foregoing Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation were proposed by a Resolution of the Board of Directors at a meeting duly held on the 20th day of December, 1974.

2. The Amendments were adopted by a vote of the members of the corporation in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma at a meeting which was held on the 20th day of December, 1974.

3. Notice of said meetings was duly waived, and all of the directors of the corporation and all of the members of the corporation voted for such Amendments.

Amended Bylaws

of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

(Effective December 20, 1974)

ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist

association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

Meetings

2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.

2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.

2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairman of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.

2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.

2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

ARTICLE III

Officers

3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairman of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairmen, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.

3.2 The Chairman of the Board and the Vice-Chairmen of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board of Direc-

tors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesman, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

4.2 Vice-Chairmen of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairmen to act for the Chairman in the absence or incapacity of said Chairman; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.

4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairman or one of the Vice-Chairmen of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.

4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

4.4 Vice-Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each

of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V

Directors

5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.

5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

5.2 Election of Directors and Term of Office. In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and he shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. The President of the Foundation may recommend to said Committee on Nominations persons deemed to be qualified to serve as directors.

5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.

5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chair-

man of the Board, the Chairmen of all standing committees and the President, as ex-officio member, without right to vote.

5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.

5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE VI

Administration of Funds and Property

6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property divised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.

6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

(a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

(b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

**"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA,
CORPORATE SEAL."**

ARTICLE VIII

Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer or employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.

8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

1. President Rod Masteller called the 83rd annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to order at 6:40 p.m.

2. Claude Thomas, host pastor, brought greetings from the membership of Council Road Church along with his personal welcome.

3. Glenn Boyd, director of Department of Church Music, led the congregation in singing two hymns: "Brethren, We Have Met to Worship" and "Glorious Is Thy Name."

4. The pastor of First Church, Meridian, Jason Duckworth read from Deuteronomy 31:9ff.

5. Rusty Fuller, pastor of Trinity Church, Ada, led in prayer.

6. W. C. (Nick) Garland, Jr., pastor of First Church, Broken Arrow and chairman of the Credentials Committee, presented the committee's recommendation: "The Committee on Credentials recommends that the 509 messengers from the churches who have registered to date, as duly elected messengers from the churches under the terms set forth in Article II of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, and such other messengers who shall register during the convention, constitute the 1988 annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma on this 14th day of November, 1988." Wayne Keely, pastor of Faith Church, Claremore presented a motion to amend the recommendation to prevent some churches from seating messengers if they were not of like faith and order. This was ruled out of order by the president because the Convention's Constitution states that the "Convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority over the churches." Keely appealed to the messengers to speak to his motion, but the messengers voted to sustain the chair.

The committee's recommendation was approved.

7. J. W. (Bob) Evans, J. W. Hollums associate professor of Religion, OBU, and chairman of the Program Committee, recommended "That the program as printed and distributed among the messengers and all in attendance, serve as the official program of this annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; and that the President or person moderating be authorized to make whatever changes that may be needed as the convention progresses."

Report of Nominating Committee

Article IV-Section 1 of the Convention's Bylaws empowers the President to appoint a fifteen member Nominating Committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice; an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to September 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations.

According to the Constitution and Bylaws relative to the Board of Directors, instructions are that due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation; there shall be at least one nominee for each associational area; additional nominees shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident church members in a given associational area; no association shall have more than eight members on the Board; there shall be at least eight laymen and eight women; and any Board member shall be considered resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected. 96. Opportunity was given for conducting miscellaneous business. There was none.

97. Alan Day, pastor of First Church, Edmond and chairman of the Resolutions Committee presented the following:

Resolution No. 1

WHEREAS, the Council Road Baptist Church of Bethany, the professional staff, support staff, other employees, and members have graciously provided their beautiful facilities for the eighty-third annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma;

BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the messengers and guests of this annual session express our sincere appreciation for countless hours of diligent preparation for and during this Convention.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we commend the Council Road membership and staff for hosting our Convention in such a professional and most gracious manner.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 2

WHEREAS, the messengers to the 1986 annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, man was created to be a reflection of God's dignity; and

WHEREAS, pornography distorts that God-designed reflection; and,

WHEREAS, pornography degrades the God-ordained relationship between a man and a woman within the confines of marriage; and,

WHEREAS, the evidence is increasing to prove that a direct connection exists between the distribution of pornography and the incidents of abuse aimed at both children and adults; and,

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of Oklahoma require communities to establish standards of decency before legal action can be taken against the distributors of pornography;

BE IT RESOLVED, that we are opposed to pornography in any form; that we emphasize the dignity of the marriage relationship and respect the privacy of the physical union of a married couple; that we encourage the wholesome and godly development of children and believe they have a right to grow to maturity without being violated either physically or emotionally.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage Christians in every community to become familiar with the process of establishing a standard of decency and to work to rid their community of pornography.

BE IT RESOLVED, THAT THE MESSENGERS TO THE 1988 Annual Meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma reaffirm the action taken by the 1986 Convention opposing pornography.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Baptists of Oklahoma be

encouraged to refuse to do business with those firms that sell, rent, or otherwise deal in pornographic materials.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 3

WHEREAS, legalized abortion in America is responsible for the destruction of about 1.8 million babies annually, and continues to increase; and

WHEREAS, the Bible teaches the sanctity of all human life, born and unborn, and

WHEREAS, the judgment of God extends not only to those who have been responsible for this human holocaust, but also to those who have permitted it by their indifference;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Baptist churches of Oklahoma dedicate their energies to bringing an end to this callous and murderous behavior.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Baptist churches of Oklahoma be urged to observe "Sanctity of Life" Sunday, January 15, 1989.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this body inform its membership about the ministry of the Crisis Pregnancy Centers in Tulsa and Oklahoma City, and that the churches prayerfully consider financially supporting the Crisis Pregnancy Ministry of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 4

WHEREAS, the priesthood of the believer is clearly taught in the New Testament (I Timothy 2:5; I Peter 2:4-5); and

WHEREAS, the priesthood of the believer is the belief that Christians have direct access to God in Christ by the Holy Spirit without the necessity of other mediators or priests; and

WHEREAS, the priesthood of the believer is a fundamental and historic Baptist distinctive;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Messengers to the 1988 Annual Session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma reaffirm the closing statement of the preamble of The Baptist Faith and Message of 1963, which states:

"Baptists emphasize the soul's competency before God, freedom in religion, and the priesthood of the believer. However, this emphasis should not be interpreted to mean that there is an absence of certain definite doctrines that Baptists believe, cherish, and with which they have been and are now closely identified."

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 5

WHEREAS, the number of churches in conflict is growing at such an alarming rate so that 25 pastors are being fired each Sunday across our Southern Baptist Convention, and one pastor per Sunday in Oklahoma is being fired or forced to leave a church; and

WHEREAS, pastor/staff/church conflict creates tremendous emotional pain for both staff and churches; and

WHEREAS, some pastors, staff members and churches have received unjust and un-Christlike treatment;

BE IT RESOLVED, that we pledge our aid and prayers to churches, pastors and staff members involved in conflict.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we call on churches, pastors and staff to exhibit integrity, Christlikeness and spiritual discernment in the midst of conflict.

WHEREAS, the number of Oklahoma churches in conflict is growing at an alarming rate, with one pastor per Sunday being fired or forced to leave the church, and with staff members being terminated at such a rapid rate; and

WHEREAS, there is no place for the vast majority of these pastors and staff members to call home, since most have lived in church-owned housing; and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists have no structured pastoral support network apart from the Ministerial Service Department of the State Convention, and some local associations; and

WHEREAS, these pastors and staff members need genuine love, understanding and, in some cases, forgiveness, counseling and restoration;

NOW THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED that we, as Oklahoma Baptists, declare our unconditional love for all our pastors and staff members, regardless of their standing with the local church; that we pledge our aid to those who are hurting and homeless, and that we seek unity in the body of Christ.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we affirm the autonomy of the local church; yet we believe that while a church may always act independently of its association, as well as its state and national conventions, it must never act independently of Holy Scripture.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we agree to seek peaceful solutions to all conflicts in the church without compromising the authority of God's Word or relaxing the Biblical standards for church leadership; that when a local church removes a pastor or staff member, its people do so with the utmost love and humility; that, if at all possible, the church offer the departing pastor or staff member reasonable time to find other living arrangements and seek further employment; and that the church provide adequate compensation to prevent undue hardship on the departing individual and his family.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we covenant to show Christlikeness to all by seeking the lost and compelling them to come into our churches; by sharing God's Word without compromise and without respect of persons; by resolving our differences in lowliness of heart; by restoring the fallen to fellowship, if not leadership; and finally, by removing the stigma both from men of God who have been fired and from the churches who have asked them to leave. "Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another" (I John 4:11).

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 6

At the close of the Resolutions Committee report at the 1987 annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma the following motion was made and approved:

"That at future conventions the report from the Resolutions Committee be included in the Messenger Packet and distributed at the time a person registers."

This motion has raised some questions and concerns about the work of the Resolutions Committee. Because of this, we make the following motion:

1. That all resolutions to be submitted to the Convention be referred through the Resolutions Committee.

2. All proposed resolutions must be presented in writing to the Resolutions Committee no later than the conclusion of the Tuesday Afternoon Session of the Convention, and preferably in advance of the Convention.

3. The Resolutions Committee will provide printed copies of its report not later than the beginning of the business session during which the Committee's report is to be presented.

The following amendment was approved to be added to Resolution No. 6:

4. That the Resolutions Committee report to any person or persons submitting a resolution that is not considered and presented to the convention of the resolution.

98. A suggestion was made that the printed resolutions be distributed at the door at the beginning of the session in which the resolutions are to be considered.

99. Ted Baird, pastor of Beverly Hills Church, Oklahoma City, led in prayer at the close of the afternoon session.

100. The convention was adjourned until 6:45 p.m.

Wednesday Evening November 16, 1988

101. President Masteller called the evening session to order at 6:45 p.m.

102. Glenn Boyd, director of the Department of Church Music, led in singing "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah."

103. Don Clark, director of missions in Johnston-Marshall Association, read Galatians 6:1-10.

104. Dave Bryan, pastor of First Church, Fairview, led in prayer.

105. Norman Behymer directed the adult choir and orchestra from Council Road Church in special music.

106. The text for the Bible study led by Robert Sloan was Acts 2:40-41.

107. Glenn Boyd led the congregation in singing a medley of hymns:

"What a Friend," "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross," "What Can Wash Away My Sins," and "'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

108. Dr. Tanner made the following presentations:

(1) Certificates of appreciation were presented to Johnnie Curt-singer and Ben Loring for their service the past year as vice-presidents of the convention.

(2) A plaque was given to Gene Thomas in appreciation for the 21 years he served as assistant and recording secretary for the convention. He asked not to be re-elected because of commitments that made it difficult to attend meetings of the Board of Directors during the year.

(3) Rod Masteller received a plaque in gratitude for the two and one-half years he served the convention as president. He was serving as first vice-president when President Wendell Estep moved out of state. Masteller stepped into the position to complete that term and then was elected for two one year terms.

109. The Woman's Missionary Union and Department of Cooperative Missions involved a large number of people in a parade of flags representing the countries and states where foreign and home missionaries are serving.

110. Mrs. Frances Grafton, director of Woman's Missionary Union, and Robert Haskins, director of Department of Cooperative Mis-sions, gave reports of their work. Attention was called to their respec-tive reports on pages 150-161. A motion carried to approve the reports.

111. There was a special dramatic presentation of "Missions in Oklahoma and Around the World."

112. Glenn Boyd directed an ethnic choir in singing several hymns. Then each group sang "Amazing Grace" in their own language.

113. Charles Fuller, pastor of First Baptist Church, Roanoke, VA. spoke. The emphases of his message was that the gospel must be made presentable, understandable and believable.

114. Gene Thomas made the following motion: I move that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be authorized to transact unfinished or new business during the time the Convention is not in session; and that the president and recording secretary be authorized to sign documents of the Baptist General Con-vention of Oklahoma which require signatures. The motion carried.

115. Rod Masteller introduced the newly elected officers: Hoyt Aduddell, president; Anthony Jordan, first vice-president and Bryan Glass, second vice-president. The gavel was presented to President Aduddell.

116. Misty Chennault, daughter of Reverend and Mrs. John Chen-nault, pastor of First Church, El Reno, led the closing prayer.

117. The convention was adjourned until the 84th annual meeting, November 13-15, 1989 which will meet at Eastwood Church, Tulsa.

Report of the Board of Directors Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

"All boards, trustees and standing committees . . . shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention." In keeping with this statement contained in Article V of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Board of Directors elected by the convention gives the following accounting of their activities and actions.

Each year at the convention's annual meeting the Board of Directors is empowered to transact any unfinished or new business necessary to the work of the convention; and the president and recording secretary are authorized to sign legal documents which may be required.

Since the convention last met, the Board of Directors has had the following meetings: a called meeting on December 1, and regular meetings on December 18, 1987, March 22, May 17 and September 6, 1988.

The work of the convention is divided into four areas of responsibility: administrative, business management, family care ministries and planning and promotion. Following the annual meeting of the convention, the president, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the vice-presidents, assigns each member of the board to serve on one of these committees. The board gave approval to the following assignments.

The Executive Committee

According to the bylaws, the Executive Committee performs only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors. The convention president, executive director-treasurer, recording secretary and the chairmen of the four board committees make up the Executive Committee. There were no referrals made to the committee during the year.

Business Management Committee

The Business Management Committee has responsibilities in the areas of the controller's office, all insurance, Baptist Building management, and oversight of all properties other than Falls Creek, Camp Hudgens and Camp Nunny Cha-ha. The chairman was James Evans.

December Report—

This was primarily an orientation meeting with discussion of accounting procedures, insurance and property management.

Construction Contract Control Procedures—The board voted to support the executive director-treasurer in the implementation of the following document:

1. All proposed convention construction projects costing \$100,000 or more must be approved by the convention's board of directors before construction is started, even if such project was previously planned and approved through the convention's capital budgeting procedures.

2. When required, an architect will be employed to draw plans and specifications and to supervise construction. On some smaller construction or renovation projects, convention employees may have the expertise to provide the construction drawings and to supervise construction.

3. Competitive bids will be solicited from general contractors or sub-contractors for all construction projects costing in excess of \$25,000. Contracts will be awarded based on the bid, usually the lowest bid submitted by a qualified general contractor or sub-contractor. The convention reserves the right to reject the bid from any general contractor or sub-contractor.

4. Bids submitted for contracts in excess of \$100,000 shall be accompanied by appropriate bid bonds. A bid bond is a guarantee from a bonding company that the contractor will provide payment, performance, and warranty bonds and will not withdraw his bid. Should the contractor fail to provide these bonds or withdraw his bid, the bid bond provides for payment to the convention of an amount equal to 5% of bid amount as compensation for costs incurred in the bidding process and the cost of rebidding if required.

5. When construction contracts are awarded, the successful contractor will provide payment, performance, and warranty bonds.

Payment bond guarantees that should the contractor fail to pay labor, materials, or sub-contractors, the bonding company will pay for these items.

Performance bond guarantees that should contractor fail to complete the construction, the bonding company (1) will require him to complete it or (2) will secure another contractor to complete the construction.

Warranty bond guarantees a specified warranty (for example, 1 or 2 years) on entire structure and mechanical operating systems.

6. For contracts not requiring payment, performance, or warranty bonds (generally contracts costing less than \$100,000), lien releases will be required from all material suppliers, contractors, sub-contractors, and contractor or sub-contractor's material suppliers.

7. Construction contracts will be reviewed and approved by (1) convention attorney, (2) department director responsible for the project, and (3) executive director-treasurer, before signing by convention officers.

8. Periodic payments for completed construction (that is, requests for funds by contractors and sub-contractors to or through the convention), along with complete supporting documentation will be approved by architect and/or convention construction supervisor and by the convention controller. These periodic payments must be requested on AIA Document G702, American Institute of Architects "Application and Certification for Payment."

9. The Controller's office will maintain records of construction periodic payments by contract to make certain no payments are made in excess of the agreed contract price.

10. A 10% retainage of contract amount will be held on each periodic payment until the project has been completed as per contract documents and approved by architect and/or convention construction supervisor.

Any deviation from these procedures must be discussed with and approved by the executive director-treasurer, and the officers of the convention.

May Report and Recommendations

1. **Convention Audit Approved**—The audit of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma was carefully reviewed by the committee and the board approved the recommendation that the 1987 audit be printed in the 1987 convention annual for distribution to all churches.

2. **1988 Auditor**—Upon the recommendation of the committee the board voted for Englebach, Roberts and Company, Certified Public Accountants, to serve as auditors for 1988.

3. **Mailing List Policy**—The board confirmed a long standing policy of limiting the use of the BGCO convention's mailing lists by adopting the following:

A. BGCO mailing lists or labels will only be distributed to state

convention departments, Oklahoma Baptist University, and the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

B. Requests for mailing lists or labels from OBU or the Baptist Foundation must come from the individual executive offices along with an explanation of the planned use.

C. Associations may request address lists or labels applicable to their cooperating churches.

D. **Baptist Messenger** subscription lists and Family Care Ministries special mailing lists are excluded from distribution to anyone.

E. A charge will be made for all lists and labels.

Planning and Promotion

The Planning and Promotion Committee gives counsel in the areas of stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, disaster relief, video/media and also to the church program departments. Russell Cook served as chairman.

December Report

As orientation to new committee members the directors of the departments that relate to the church program organizations reported on their work and plans for future emphases. There were no recommendations.

May Report

Lyle Garlow reported on Cooperative Program receipts and encouraged board members to have a '90 ONWARD stewardship emphasis in their own churches and to promote it among other churches. There were no recommendations.

Family Care Ministries Committee

William F. Carpenter gave direction to the committee that advises in the child care and adult care ministries. Children's homes are operated at Oklahoma City, Owasso, Madill, Ada, Duncan, Clinton, McAlester, Mooreland, and Boys Ranch Town near Edmond. Child care ministries also include foster homes, alternatives to abortion, unwed mother program, adoption and many others. Through adult care ministries retirement centers are operated at Oklahoma City, Owasso, Hugo, and villages at Ada, Madill, Cleveland and Okmulgee.

December Report and Recommendations

1. **Duo-Pay Application Filed for Evergreen**—Approval was given for the administration of Evergreen Care Center, a nursing home facility which is part of the Rayola Baptist Community at Owasso, to file Application 1122 with the Oklahoma Health Planning Commission. This would change the facility from total private pay to a duo-private pay and Medicaid facility. The only cost was for the preparation of the application.

2. **Offering Goal Set**—The board adopted a Mother's Day offering goal of \$575,757 for 1988.

March Report and Recommendations

1. **Resolution Approved**—The board approved this resolution: "WHEREAS, by resolution adopted May 13, 1986, the board of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma accepted a conveyance

from Baptist Healthcare Corporation of Oklahoma of a parcel of land located in Okmulgee County, Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, through inadvertence, the legal description of the entire tract intended to be accepted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was not contained in the deed; and

WHEREAS, it was the desire of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at the time of the prior conveyance to accept title to the entire tract owned by Baptist Health Care Corporation in Okmulgee County comprising the Okmulgee Baptist Village campus;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, acting by and through its Board of Directors, hereby authorizes its officers to accept delivery of a warranty deed from Baptist Healthcare of Oklahoma, Inc., formerly Baptist Health Care Corporation, when said deed is tendered, conveying the land and improvements comprising the Okmulgee Baptist Village, subject to liens, mortgages, existing easements, zoning regulations and restrictive covenants, more particularly described as follows:

The surface and surface only in and to the West Half of the Northeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter (W/2 NE/4 NW/4) of Section 12, Township 13 North, Range 12 East, I.M., together with all the improvements thereon and the appurtenances thereunto belonging."

2. Quit Claim Deed Granted—At the time of the aforementioned conveyance of the Okmulgee Baptist Village property, Baptist Healthcare of Oklahoma, Inc., owned surface rights only. The original deed from BHO to the convention did not limit the interests in the property to surface rights only. The board authorized the president and recording secretary to sign for the convention a Quit Claim Deed disclaiming any interests in the minerals.

3. Child Care Director Job Description—Prior to the retirement of Lowell Milburn, he served as executive director of the Department of Special Care Ministries and as director of child care which was his area of expertise. Sam Garner, Dr. Milburn's predecessor, is experienced more in the area of adult care. In addition to serving as executive director of Family Care Ministries, Dr. Garner will temporarily serve as adult care director. A job description was previously approved for this position. There has not been a job description for a director of child care. One was presented to the committee for study. Upon recommendation to the board of directors it was approved and it will be printed in the convention's Position Description Manual. A person to fill this position was not employed at this time.

4. Department Name Changed—The board was asked to consider changing the name of the Special Care Ministries Department to Family Care Ministries Department. In addition to child care and adult care, there are numerous special areas of ministry such as the unwed mother program, foster homes, adoptions and many others that relate to the family. The board agreed that Family Care Ministries Department was much more descriptive of the work.

5. OKC Laymen Deed Property to Convention—Over the years

property at Oklahoma City Retirement Center has been deeded back and forth from the convention to the laymen's corporation because of requirements for bond issues for building projects. By mutual agreement between the laymen's corporation and the board of directors, it was determined that the 36.01 acres of land, together with all improvements thereon should be conveyed to the convention so that the convention is the record owner of the full legal and equitable title of the entire tract of land originally conveyed to the laymen's corporation by the convention.

May Report

Ashley Introduced—Earl Ashley was introduced as the newly employed chaplain/administrator at the Madill Retirement Center. He formerly served as pastor of First Church, Valliant.

September Report and Recommendation

Policies and Procedures Manual Approved—A revised Policies and Procedures Manual for the Baptist Retirement Centers and Villages owned and operated by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma was approved. The document states the purpose of the retirement center ministry which is: "Inspired by a concept of Christian love and service that arises above self-interest and reflects the concern of Jesus Christ for the sick and helpless, Oklahoma Baptists are engaged in an extensive retirement centers ministry. Through retirement centers the Convention functions on behalf of Oklahoma Baptist churches as an instrument of God's grace in enriching and prolonging human life within the scope of Divine Providence—to serve both resident and family in the name and in the spirit of Christ—to comfort those who come within our walls by conveying a positive Christian interpretation of the experiences of disease, disability and death—to bring people into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ by means of direct personal witness as occasion permits." It also gives direction for control and responsibility of operations, and states the duties of the local administrative committee, as well as those of the administrator.

Administrative Committee

Anthony Jordan served as chairman of the Administrative Committee which has the assignment of work related to personnel, budget, annuity, ministerial services, **Baptist Messenger** and Baptist student work.

December 1 Special Called Meeting

The board of directors met in a special called meeting on December 1. The Administrative Committee recommended that the board of directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma give authority to convention attorneys to settle all claims arising out of business dealings with Wayne Bramlett, doing business as Bramlett Construction Company, during 1982-83, by payment of \$300,000 from the convention to Bramlett, and that the \$300,000 be provided by interest earnings from the Special Care Ministries endowment funds and repaid by future monies generated by the Oklahoma City Baptist Retirement Center. It was explained that this payment was final settlement of claims arising

from the construction in 1982-83 of a two-story, 36-unit limited care apartment building at the Oklahoma City Retirement Center. After thorough discussion by the board, it was agreed that the convention did, in fact, owe Bramlett the amount of the settlement for the labor and materials used in building the facility described. The recommendation was approved by the board by a vote of 56-1.

The committee made a further recommendation that the board go on record commending Dr. William G. Tanner and his supporting employees for giving Christian leadership in resolving difficult issues with integrity and wisdom which transpired prior to his tenure. Unanimous approval was given.

December 18 Report and Recommendations

1. Matters Related to Annuity Approved—The board voted for each of the following items related to church annuity programs:

(1) A 25% increase in benefits for all Plan A participants be effective January 1, 1988.

(2) Personnel of day care centers and schools operated by churches not be eligible to participate in the Expanded Church Annuity Plan.

(3) Vocational evangelists must be members of cooperating Oklahoma Baptist churches to qualify for participation in the Expanded Church Annuity Plan.

(4) For eligible members of churches that have adopted the Expanded Church Annuity Plan, the convention will match one-third of the total member/church contributions up to \$35.00 per month (\$420.00 annually).

(5) The convention will contribute a minimum of \$17.50 per month (\$210.00 annually), for eligible members of churches that have adopted the Expanded Church Annuity Plan, that contribute a minimum of \$33.34 per month, (or \$400.00 annually.)

(6) The convention will contribute \$17.50 per month (\$210.00 annually) for eligible members of churches that have not adopted the Expanded Plan, that contribute a minimum of \$33.34 per month (\$400.00 annually), through 1988 or the date of adoption of the Expanded Church Annuity Plan.

2. Baptist Health Care Corporation Board Approved—The bylaws of Baptist Health Care Corporation states "All members of the Board of Directors shall be cooperating participants in a local Southern Baptist church, and they shall be approved by the board of directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma." 4. Study Regarding Relationship Between Convention, BHCC and BMC—It was reported that the chairman of the Administrative Committee had been asked to appoint a sub-committee to study the relationship of the convention to Baptist Health Care Corporation and Baptist Medical Center, Inc. A report will be made to the board when the study is complete.

5. Burns Introduced—John Burns was introduced as associate director in the Baptist Student Department.

March Report and Recommendations

1. Refinancing for OBU—The board of trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University through the administrative committee recommended that the board of directors give consideration to refinancing the university's bond issues of 1979 and 1985. The outstanding balance of the issues was \$11,355,000. The refinancing would bring debt service requirements in line with cash flow expectations. The convention's board gave approval and joined with the trustees in asking the administration of the university to closely monitor the bond market for a drop in interest rates of 7.5% or less before refinancing.

2. Amendments to Certificate of Incorporation and Bylaws of Foundation—The board of directors of the Baptist Foundation asked the convention's board to consider some changes updating terminology in the Certificate of Incorporation and amendments to the Amended Bylaws of that organization. The convention's board voted to approve the changes.

3. Relationship of BGCO to Baptist Health Care—A sub-committee composed of William H. Cook, chairman, Alton Fannin, Joe Hubb Collier, Bob Woods and Charles Amos recommended through the administrative committee that the following changes be made:

(1) March 16, 1978 the convention transferred the operation of hospitals at Miami, Enid, Pryor, Bristow, Cordell, Grove and Stroud to Baptist Health Care. This provision was made in the transfer agreement: "Health Care provides in its Article of Incorporation that all of its members and directors are members of Southern Baptist churches cooperating with the convention, and that the election of each of its directors, from time to time, shall not become effective until said election is approved or confirmed by the convention or its board of direc-

tors." It was voted that this statement be deleted from the transfer agreement.

(2) The board adopted the recommendation that the executive director of the convention shall no longer be an ex-officio member, at-large director, and member of the corporation's executive committee.

(3) It was announced that Baptist Health Care had removed the name "Baptist" from retirement villages at Grove and Miami and are working with the people at Cordell to make the deletion there.

May Report and Recommendations

1. Purchase of Property for BSU Center—Approval was given for the purchase of property located at 737 Northeast 13, Oklahoma City as a BSU center for Health Sciences Center. The cost of the property and remodeling was estimated at \$100,000. The funds would be taken from the convention's undistributed undesignated endowment earnings with the Baptist Foundation. The money would be replaced to this same fund from contributions raised from doctors who had graduated from the Oklahoma University Health Sciences Center and were active in the BSU program while in medical school.

2. Messenger Subscription Rate Increase—The board adopted a recommendation to increase annual subscription rates for the **Baptist Messenger** by 50 cents per year, per subscription, beginning June 1, 1988, to help defray actual cost increases imposed by the U.S. Postal Service. The new rate increased the Every Member Church Group rate from \$4.00 to \$4.50 and increased the individual subscription rate from \$4.50 to \$5.00.

3. Permanent Board Meeting Dates Set—The permanent dates for future board meetings were approved as Tuesday following the second Sunday of March, May, September and December.

4. Resolution Authorizing OBU Bond Issue—Through a resolution the board authorized the execution of two guaranty agreements pertaining to the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority Refinancing for Oklahoma Baptist University. The resolution is as follows:

"WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptist University Authority proposes to issue tax exempt revenue bonds for refinancing its outstanding bonds issued for Oklahoma Baptist University and it appears necessary that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma guarantee said bonds, and in addition, guarantee certain other obligations in relation thereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, to-wit:

The Convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of two Guaranty Agreements, one denominated 'Guaranty Agreement' and being from the Convention to Federal National Bank & Trust Company of Shawnee, Shawnee, Oklahoma, and the other being denominated 'Guaranty' and being from the Convention to Barclays Bank PLC, New York, New York, drafts of which are attached hereto and incorporated herein.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Convention authorizes the corporate officers to execute the Guaranty Agreement and the Guaranty and the President or Vice President and Recording Secretary or Assistant Recording Secretary, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such other instruments and other documents and approve such other documents and instruments including Official Statements as may be necessary to carry out the intent of and to consummate the transactions authorized by this Resolution.

ADOPTED by the Board of Directors in its meeting assembled this May 17, 1988."

September Report and Recommendations

1. **Prayer Garden at Falls Creek Named**—It was recommended that the prayer garden at Falls Creek Conference Center be named for Harry Dodd, director of the conference center and that a plaque be placed in an appropriate place. Mr. Dodd asked that the place simply be called "Prayer Garden" and that if the board so desired for his name to be there that his dream of such an area could be mentioned in the text of the plaque. The Board approved an amendment to the original motion. It will be done as Mr. Dodd suggested.

2. **Amendments to Convention Annuity Plan**—The Southern Baptist Annuity Board suggested some minor changes updating language to cause better clarity to the Convention Annuity Plan. The Annuity Board also suggested the following in order to comply with the Tax Reform Act of 1986:

(1) Where some employees are permitted to make tax sheltered contributions, the privilege must be made available to essentially all employees. The new wording is: "However, all non-covered employees may make voluntary Tax Sheltered Contributions pursuant to a written salary reduction agreement but shall not be entitled to receive any additional contributions from the employer." (Non-covered employees are those working less than 1,000 hours a year.)

(2) Conditions under which in-service withdrawals can be permitted in a plan were modified by the Tax Reform Act. The revised supplement language continues the provision in the amendment to the current supplement, incorporates this amendment in the revised supplement and permits in-service withdrawals to the extent permitted under Internal Revenue Code.

The convention's board approved the Amended and Restated Supplement to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan.

3. Relationship of BGCO to Baptist Healthcare of Oklahoma and Baptist Medical Center Studied

In February 1988, Anthony Jordan, chairman of the Administrative Committee of the BGCO, appointed a sub-committee to study the relationship of Baptist Healthcare of Oklahoma (BHO) and Baptist Medical Center of Oklahoma (BMC) to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma (BGCO). Members of the Administrative Committee appointed to the Study Committee were William H. Cook, chairman;

Charles Amos, Joe Hubb Collier, Alton Fannin and Bob Woods. Executive Director of BGCO William G. Tanner and Lyle Garlow also met with the committee in the meetings held during the six-month study period. The conclusion was that the final report should include three specific things:

(1) A list of every action and transaction officially taken since the organization of the BGCO in 1906. This Chronological History would include references documenting book, year and page number for individuals in the future who may have questions or desire to do historical study.

(2) Preface pages to the Chronological History would include some possible reasons for some of the historical actions, although final conclusions for actions taken would have to be shared by those who were administrative leaders and board members at the time of that specific action.

(3) Conclusions of the members of the Study Committee as to projected future relationships between the BGCO and BHO.

Concerning the three items mentioned above:

(1) The Chronological History listing the actions taken, and the reference for further reading, including volume and page number, is available from the Executive Office, Baptist Building, 1141 N. Robinson, Oklahoma City, OK 73103.

(2) At one time, the BGCO owned the Baptist Hospital in Oklahoma City, and hospitals in Grove, Miami and Enid. Other hospitals in the state were leased. over a period of time BGCO transferred all of these to BHO, except Baptist Hospital, which was transferred to Baptist Medical Center, Inc. At no time did the BGCO own the retirement centers at Grove, Cordell and Miami. The BGCO has not loaned money to BHO hospitals or retirement centers. At one time, the BGCO stood behind some hospital bonds which were subsequently recalled and reissued leaving the BGCO free of any financial liability. The BHO, an entity unrelated to the BGCO, has since dropped the name "Baptist" from all the retirement centers under their direction, to eliminate possible confusion between the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma (BGCO) and Baptist Healthcare of Oklahoma (BHO) Why did BGCO transfer ownership of some institutions across the years? Some of the reasons may have included church-state relationship, federal laws and their intrusion into the hospital and retirement fields, moral integrity, and financial and legal responsibilities. As previously stated, final reasons would have to be shared by those responsible for each transaction at the time the transaction was made. Current relationship of the BGCO to the Baptist Medical Center of Oklahoma, Inc. (not related to BHO) is through the following: 1) Annual BGCO approval of 60% of the directors of BMC, who shall be members of churches cooperating with the BGCO; 2) Continuing a Baptist chaplaincy program in the Baptist Medical Center; and 3) Not performing abortions on demand nor sex change operations (gender dysphoria surgeries).

(3) Relationships between BGCO and the BHO are, at the present time, minimal. There is still some shared leasing of computer equipment (privacy of BGCO records is assured), sharing a computer service

company, and workman's compensation insurance. Also, the BGCO purchases Falls Creek First Aid Station medical supplies through one BHO hospital. All agreements between BGCO and BHO are for a calendar year only, and are subject to annual renewal of contracts.

4. Annual Review of Undesignated BGCO Endowment Funds—

In order to assist in funding the new annuity program costs to the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Board voted that the annual distribution formula adopted in 1961 for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be adjusted for the 1989 distribution as needed and the distribution allocation be reviewed annually by the Executive Director-Treasurer with recommendations presented to the Board of Directors.

Recommendations

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1989 be \$16,500,000 to be distributed as follows: 44% Southern Baptist Convention and 56% State, with the 44% to SBC to be distributed on a weekly basis.

2. Should the total Cooperative Program receipts for 1989 be less than \$16,500,000, the following adjustment would be implemented:

(1) If receipts are \$16,150,000 or less:

A. The following items would be reduced as indicated:

B. Should receipts fall below \$16,150,000, all line items will be reduced proportionately.

(2) If receipts are between \$16,000,000 and \$16,500,000, the items listed in (A) above will receive proportionate amounts.

This process will enable the Executive Director-Treasurer to keep Cooperative Program expenditures in line with Cooperative Program income.

Oklahoma Baptist University

Bob R. Agee, President

During the 1987-88 academic year OBU reaped the rewards of an uncompromising commitment to offer its students a superior undergraduate liberal arts education in an environment which stimulates spiritual growth and development.

The fall semester began with the third-largest enrollment in the University's 77-year history and the largest in more than a decade. A total of 1,776 students from 43 states and 21 foreign countries enrolled in 1987. That represented an 8.4 percent increase over the 1986 fall headcount of 1,638. On-campus enrollment totaled 1,554, compared with 1,460 in 1986. The University's off-campus Ministry Training Institute registered a record 222 students at its 16 teaching centers across the state. The momentum carried over into the spring when OBU recorded its largest spring semester enrollment ever with 1,700 students, breaking the previous record of 1,672 set in 1975.

OBU enjoyed a successful visit in February from the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools evaluation team, which made an unqualified recommendation that the University be reaccredited for another 10 years. OBU received strong favorable comments regarding the strength of the institution from the five team members, who represented colleges and universities from across the nation.

The University's teacher education program attracted statewide and national recognition during 1987-88. OBU ranked first in the state in the percentage of education students passing the November state teacher certification test, and an OBU student was judged by the National Education Association as one of the seven best student teachers in the nation.

Results released in January by the Oklahoma State Department of Education showed that 88 percent of OBU students who took the certification exam passed. That percentage placed OBU above the other 21 colleges and universities which had students participating in the exam.

Lisa Nelson, a senior English/secondary education major from Topeka, Kan., placed first in the junior high and senior high school student teaching category at the western regional level of the NEA's 1987-88 National Student Teaching Competition. The western region is made up of nine states, including Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and Texas. Nelson, who was the first Oklahoma student to ever earn the honor, received \$500 and an expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., where she competed at the national level.

Another significant academic achievement was the expansion of OBU's China exchange program, which began during the summer of 1987 with three faculty members and seven students spending four weeks teaching English at Xinjiang University in the northwestern Chinese city of Urumqi. The 1988 OBU delegation to China included two faculty members and 15 students who taught English at Xinjiang and at the Educational College, which is also located in Urumqi. While in China,

Dr. C. Mack Roark, vice president for religious life, met with officials of the Fine Arts College in Urumqi and the International Language Institute in Shanghai to discuss the possibility of establishing similar programs with those institutions. OBU's China project is serving as a model for other Baptist colleges which are exploring similar programs with institutions in China and other developing countries.

The academic year was capped off on May 28 with the University's 74th Commencement. A total of 244 students walked across the stage to receive their diplomas. Commencement speaker Dr. Russell H. Dilday, president of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, urged the graduates to develop a concern for others as they go through life, rather than settling into a pattern of "self-love." Commencement also featured the presentation of faculty awards. Dr. Joe Hall, professor of English, received the Distinguished Teaching Award; M. Norman Searcy, retiring dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, was presented the Meritorious Service Award; and Dr. Frank J. Smist, assistant professor of political science, was given the Promising Teacher Award.

Campus ministries at OBU experienced a banner year in 1987-88, riding on the strength of a successful Campus Revival in the fall and Focus Week in the spring.

The year began with the arrival of important new personnel in the Office of Religious Life. David James, director of the Baptist Student Union, resigned to become director of BSU work for the Arkansas Baptist Convention. Guy and Roxanna Grimes arrived on campus in August to serve as a husband/wife, director/associate director team. Previously they had served in the same capacity in the Tulsa Junior College system.

More than 100 spiritual decisions were made during the fall revival, which was preached by Dr. Joel Gregory, pastor of Travis Avenue Baptist Church in Fort Worth, Texas. The revival established a sense of renewal that set the spiritual environment for the entire year.

Focus Week during the spring featured Rolland DeLapp, an evangelist from the Home Mission Board, who emphasized discipleship and scripture memorization. Through the week, six students made professions of faith, and many others made recommitments in their spiritual lives.

Involvement in ministry continues to be an important part of our students' academic journey. More than 100 students from OBU were out during the summer serving as short-term missionaries across the nation and around the world.

Emphasis on missions and global awareness was given sharp focus on campus as well as off campus. Wednesday Chapel, the weekly worship experience for the University family, had missionaries Wade Akins, Rue Scott and Don Langford as speakers. Chapel was also the setting when Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs, pastor emeritus of First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, and Dr. Morgan Patterson, president of Georgetown College, Georgetown, Ky., delivered the 15th and 16th Hobbs Lectures, respectively.

Six revival teams from OBU, working with the Department of Evangelism of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, led 25

revivals during the summer weeks. The 21 students involved saw 237 decisions made, including 110 professions of faith. Growing out of this effort was the largest number of students ever participating in the Student Ministry Teams at OBU. Some of the teams were out every week serving the churches of Oklahoma.

According to figures compiled by the Office of Religious Life, 362 OBU students, professors and staff members were in 651 churches during the year participating in University-sponsored activities. Those figures do not include the ongoing work of faculty, staff and students in the local churches where they serve as members and/or staff members. In University-sponsored activities, the Office of Religious Life estimates that more than 700 people received Christ, and more than 200 made commitments to answer God's call to ministry. Doors continue to be opened for OBU students, faculty and staff to be involved in sharing the Gospel. Year-in and year-out, the OBU family will lead over 1,000 people to Christ.

The University's five-year Bridging the Centuries Campaign got under way during 1987-88. Through July of 1988, more than \$3.1 million had been committed toward the campaign's \$15 million goal. Funding priorities include several construction/renovation projects, academic and administrative equipment, on-going operations needs, scholarships, and endowment for faculty-staff salaries, program support and financial aid. The University topped \$2 million in contributions for the eighth consecutive year, although gifts were down from a record \$3.35 million in 1986-87.

The renovation of Jent Alumni Center was completed in November of 1987, and the new facility, which houses offices for OBU's alumni and development operations, was dedicated during Homecoming on Nov. 14. The new Williamson Nursing Education Center in Thurmond Hall—the first permanent home for OBU's School of Nursing—was also dedicated during Homecoming ceremonies.

The University continued to demonstrate fiscal responsibility during difficult economic times in 1987-88. The board of trustees, at its spring meeting, approved a 1988-89 budget of \$13.2 million.

OBU is maintaining its commitment to recruit the finest Christian scholars in America. Dr. Joseph R. Weaver, former assistant superintendent for the Oklahoma Department of Education, was chosen in May to succeed M. Norman Searcy as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Searcy retired at the end of the 1987-88 academic year after more than 33 years of service to OBU as a faculty member and administrator. Dr. Jerome G. Lake, dean of the School of Business, resigned in November of 1987 to accept a position at the University of Maryland. A nationwide search for his successor is under way. New faculty members for 1988 include: Jan Barnes, assistant professor of mathematics; Rock Byargeon, instructor in religion; Marilyn Haller, assistant professor of education; Glenn Sanders, instructor in history; Daniel Weinland, assistant professor in finance; Dr. Barney T. Raffield, Dickinson Professor of Business; Don Bridgewater, assistant professor of biology; and Sim Flora, assistant professor of music.

This past year has been one of accomplishments and blessings. We believe God is guiding this great institution to make a profound impact on the world through the lives of its students, faculty, staff and alumni. We have an exciting future because of the outstanding support of Oklahoma Baptists. With your continued prayers and financial support we will dare to be all that God would have us to be.

Family Care Ministries

Sam L. Garner, Executive Director

"Making a Difference—Because Jesus Cares" has served as the theme for Family Care Ministries during 1988. Family Care Ministries has helped make a difference in over 6,000 lives this past year, caring for dependent children, troubled youth, and retired adults because Jesus loves and cares.

Making a Difference—Numerically—Over 4,500 young people and related family members were touched last year in residential care on 10 child care campuses plus individual and family counseling, foster care, maternity home, and through our two Crisis Pregnancy Centers. Most of these young people represent individuals whose lives have been scarred by sin. In addition, over 1,500 retired adults have benefitted from security, love, excellent health care, and companionship of a Christian environment in 7 Baptist Adult Care Villages.

Making a Difference—Financially—Total combined budgets for child care and adult care ministries was \$11,267,486. Cooperative Program and endowment provided \$2,610,155; Mother's Day Offering totaled \$532,255; other special gifts amounted to \$305,000. Mother's Day Offering goal for 1988 is \$575,575.

Making a Difference—Spiritually—Because Oklahoma Baptists have provided a ministry for all ages and needs, spiritual results are evident. Approximately 200 religious decisions are witnessed every year throughout the various ministries of Family Care Ministries office. Special attention is given by over 500 employees to meet the spiritual needs of young and old alike 24 hours each day, 7 days a week.

Thank you Oklahoma Baptists, for helping Family Care Ministries make a difference in so many lives. Our commitment is to continue reaching and touching lives across Oklahoma's 77 counties because Jesus Cares.

Remember to pray daily in your life and weekly in your church and association for Family Care Ministries, "A Ministry of Love, of Oklahoma Baptists."

Office of Ministerial Services

Clyde Cain, Director

The Office of Ministerial Services ministers in three specific areas: first, a ministry to pastors, staff, and search committees; second, main-

taining a biographical file on pastors and staff personnel; and third, providing a strategy of continuing education for the purpose of strengthening ministers and churches.

During 1987, over 2,000 biographical resumes were shared with search committees. Over 600 pastor and staff changes were made in the state with 75% of the pastorless churches in Oklahoma requesting biographical resumes and all pastorless churches receiving information from the Office of Ministerial Services.

Continuing education has experienced and enjoyed good growth. A brief breakdown and look at continuing education will provide a better understanding of what is currently being done in Oklahoma:

1. The Ministry Training Institute—Twenty centers with over 200 students.

2. Southwestern Seminary Study Center at OBU—Meeting every Monday with over 120 students.

3. Seminary Extension—Thirteen certified centers, as well as Independent Studies with a total of 150 students.

4. Midwestern Seminary—Doctor of Ministries Program—Meeting in Tulsa.

Over 600 students are involved in long-term continuing education.

In addition, approximately 350 persons registered for the State Bible Conference at Falls Creek.

The most recent addition to our total approach to continuing education is the Summer School for Preachers at Camp Kiamichi, now known as the Kiamichi Baptist Assembly Bible Conference. Next year's conference will be conducted August 14-16.

Annuity Services

J. T. Roberts

On January 1, 1988, the expanded features and benefits of the Church Annuity Plan went into effect. This is the most dramatic breakthrough in church retirement planning since the introduction of Plan A. Today's ministers and eligible church employees now have a new and flexible approach to retirement planning.

As of June 30, 1988, 1,364 ministers and employees of 794 Oklahoma churches and associations were participating in the Church Annuity Plan; 629 churches and associations had entered into Cooperative Agreements with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to provide the Church Annuity Plan's expanded benefits. Ministers and eligible employees of these expanded participating churches and associations may now benefit from matching employer and Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions as well as supplemental life and disability protection.

In 1988 current retirees in Plan A received a significant 25 percent increase in benefit payments. More than 28,600 future retirees throughout the Southern Baptist Convention will also receive a 25 per-

cent increase. But Plan A, a defined benefit plan, was not designed to cope with inflation.

The Church Annuity Plan was designed so that the plan member and the church or association can keep projected benefits in proper relation to inflation and growth in income.

In total, 58,495 Southern Baptist ministers, church employees, and denominational workers had active retirement accounts at the Annuity Board. These members and their employers contributed \$71,388,245 during the first two quarters of 1988.

On June 30, 1988, 18,332 retirees and other annuitants (713 in Oklahoma) were receiving benefits from Southern Baptist retirement plans. They received \$33,666,186 in retirement benefits through the first half of 1988.

Action at the 1988 Southern Baptist Convention allows the Annuity Board to develop the organization to offer property and casualty coverages such as coverage for church-owned property, general liability, worker's compensation, bus liability, day-care liability, and minister's malpractice insurance.

The Annuity Board managed total assets of \$2,273,652,056 on June 30, 1988. The magnitude of this statistic can be overwhelming. But each dollar represents retirement provisions or insurance protection for a Christian servant in a Southern Baptist church or agency.

As the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma prepares to meet the challenge of the 21st Century, the Department of Annuity Services will be ready to assist those who serve Oklahoma churches, associations, and denominational institutions and agencies through the benefit programs administered by the Annuity Board.

Planning and Promotion

Lyle Garlow, Director

The Planning and Promotion Office is an extension of the Executive Office. The Associate Executive Director, Lyle Garlow, supervises this office in addition to administrative responsibilities related to and assigned by the Executive Director-Treasurer of the BGCO.

The Planning and Promotion Office is responsible for coordinating the work of the related departments: Brotherhood, Church Music, Cooperative Missions, Evangelism, Falls Creek Conference Center, Religious Education and Woman's Missionary Union. Coordination includes program and budget development, program promotion, calendar coordination, and denominational emphasis planning. Directors of these departments are supervised directly by the Executive Director-Treasurer.

In addition to the coordinating function, the Planning and Promotion Office has six assigned programs of work. These programs, staff assignments, and reports for last year were:

Cooperative Program Promotion

In addition to administrative responsibilities, the major program assignment of Lyle Garlow is Cooperative Program promotion.

Total Cooperative Program receipts for 1987 were \$15,509,284. This was \$420,422 below 1986—a 2.6% decrease. The last time the annual gifts fell below the previous year was 1934.

The decrease in Cooperative Program receipts followed a decrease in local church receipts (tithes and offerings). The 1986 church receipts were \$174,337,195—\$2.5 million less than 1985, and 1987 receipts were \$170,424,330—a decrease of \$3.9 million from 1986. The two years of church receipt decrease were the first since 1933.

The 1986 and 1987 church receipt decreases are quite a contrast to the increase of 1982 over 1981 of \$21.6 million.

The division of the Oklahoma 1987 Cooperative Program was 56% for Oklahoma mission ministries and 44% for SBC ministries.

The 1987 budget objective was adjusted to \$16,500,000. Receipts fell \$990,716 below the objective—a shortfall of 6.0%.

The 1989 budget objective remains \$16,500,000. Churches are encouraged to "Move Up to New Horizons" in mission support. "Moving Up" a percentage point, or a fraction thereof, by every church would help reach the growing mission needs.

Coordinated Promotion Planning

"Let the Churches Grow," an emphasis introduced in 1986-87, will continue through 1989-90. The SBC denominational emphases for 1990-95, "Hope and Heritage," will be introduced during 1990.

All our efforts still carry the motivation of Bold Mission Thrust through the year 2000. Lyle Garlow is responsible for coordination of denominational program emphases.

Associational Services

The liaison relationship between the state convention and the 41 associations in Oklahoma is directed by Lyle Garlow.

Each association in Oklahoma employs their own director of missions. Each association is self-governing and autonomous, but chooses to cooperate with the state convention, in a most harmonious manner. Working together to design and conduct programs and ministries to benefit the churches is our objective.

Since the last publication of the Book of Reports, we have had the following changes in associational leadership. Tommy Billings is the new director of missions (4-88) in Mullins Association. Lloyd Q. Jones retired after serving 25 years in Mullins Association and Bill O'Dell retired having served 29 years as a director of missions, 14 of those years in Perry Association. W.P. Mugg, former director of missions in Arbuckle (12 years) and Creek (three years) associations, went to be with the Lord.

Church Administration

Henry L. Chennault, associate director of Planning and Promotion, is the Church Administration Consultant for BGCO. Through

training conferences and personal consultations, the Church Administration office serves churches and staff people in Oklahoma.

Three Area Pastoral Conferences were held to help pastors and staff to sharpen their skills in meeting the many spiritual needs in church and community life.

Weekly, the Church Administration office provides available information and resources—people and/or materials—to assist churches in their planning, church council and other committee responsibilities.

Stewardship

The Planning and Promotion Office offers aid to Oklahoma Baptist churches in stewardship promotion and development. Henry L. Chennault serves as Director of Stewardship. Assistance is given through area and associational conferences, individual church conferences, and personal staff conferences. In addition, budgeting and stewardship materials are provided without cost to churches.

Every church is encouraged to conduct at least one stewardship emphasis per year.

From October, 1987 to September, 1988, eighteen (18) associational stewardship conferences were conducted by Henry L. Chennault, Lyle Garlow, and other staff to provide instruction and to promote the "New Horizons '90" emphasis in Oklahoma.

Also, in January-March of 1988, more than 250 consultants and coordinators were trained to assist Oklahoma Baptist churches in stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion.

In September, 1988, four area Stewardship Preaching Conferences were held in Clinton, Oklahoma City, Tulsa and McAlester to aid pastors in preparing for and preaching on the subject of stewardship.

Churches are encouraged to use the "Missionary Moments" weekly in their services to promote stewardship and the Cooperative Program through the year. "Missionary Moments" is provided by the Cooperative Program office.

Media Services

Media Services, directed by Cade Garrison, works with various departments of the state convention in developing and producing video tapes for training and promotional purposes. In addition, consultation and training is given to local churches involved in radio, television and cable.

Other responsibilities of Media Services include BTN and Church Media Library development and promotion.

BTN is owned and operated by the Baptist Sunday School Board. Over 400 Oklahoma Baptist churches have access to BTN through church and associational participation.

In June, the annual State Church Media Library Conference was held offering training to church media library directors.

Baptist Student Union

Bob Lee, Director

The past year was a very fulfilling one for BSU work in Oklahoma. More and more students were involved in various ministry and mission opportunities. Support by associations and churches continued to be strong.

Because of a strong emphasis in Bible study and evangelism over 700 students came to know the Lord and several thousand students were involved in hundreds of Bible studies. Students continue to want to know what God's Word has to say to them. Studies were led by BSU directors and students in dorms, apartments, BSU centers, fraternity and sorority houses, churches, and homes.

Another large group of students was chosen to serve as summer missionaries in Oklahoma, seven other states, and Guam. Money to support is sent to BSUs in 23 newer convention areas across the USA. This money is also raised by the BSUs and will amount to over \$55,000.00. In addition, several students are serving as semester missionaries and Missions Service Corps volunteers doing BSU work in Oregon, Washington, California, and Hawaii. Over 1350 students participated in short term and community mission projects.

Significant gains have been made in ministries to International, American Indians, and Black students on our campuses. We are truly grateful that God has given us the opportunities to minister to these students.

Several changes were made in the area of personnel. We had five new directors and four associates employed: Jeff Johnson at Connors

State College, Brad Crosswhite at Northern Oklahoma College, David Curry at Southwestern at Sayre, Steve Masters and Shellye Snowden at Murray State, Tishomingo, Dale Griffin at Western Oklahoma State College, Scott Hadden and Dennis Blackwood at the University of Oklahoma, and Dana Fuller at Northeastern State University. Gus Blackwell moved from Southwestern at Sayre to Panhandle State University. Steve Lewis moved from Western Oklahoma State College to Tulsa Junior College. Guy Grimes moved from Tulsa Junior College to Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee. Minnie Pack moved from Northeastern to Rose State College.

BSU work in Oklahoma continues to emphasize primarily four areas of ministry: evangelism, missions, Bible study and discipleship. All other areas of activities are based upon these four principle emphases. These four areas highlight our commitment to quality in ministry to students on our state college and university campuses.

Brotherhood

SBC Brotherhood had a gain of 3,783 for a total enrollment of 572,987 in 1987. Oklahoma Brotherhood gained 114 and now has an enrollment of 17,649. A new age grading began October 1, 1987 with the following age groups: Royal Ambassadors is for grades 1 through 9; Lads (grades 1-3); Crusaders (Grades 4-6); Pioneers (Grades 7-9); High School Baptist Young Men (Grades 10-12, ages 15-17); Baptist Young Men (Ages 18-34); Baptist Men (Ages 35-64); Senior Baptist Men (Ages 65 and up). New curriculum has been provided for each age group which meets their specific needs and interests. Our annual report revealed we now have 619 churches reporting 398 Baptist Men's Units, 15 Baptist Young Men's Units, 63 High School Baptist Young Men's Units, and Royal Ambassadors reported 872 chapters (265 Lad, 374 Crusader, 124 Pioneer, and 109 Combined).

February 26-27—43 attended a Disaster Relief Training Session at Camp Hudgens, with 39 receiving Red Cross certification in mass feeding and damage assessment.

March 4-5—1,500 attended Royal Ambassador Congress, Southern Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, 31 teams from 22 associations participated in basketball playoffs.

April 15-16—88 attended Mini Camp, Camp Hudgens.

April 22-24—57 Associational Brotherhood Officers received training, Oklahoma City.

May 6-7—25 Missionary Kids attended annual retreat, Camp Hudgens.

May 14—Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and Missions Department conducted Volunteers in Missions Workshop, Trinity, Oklahoma City, over 200 attended.

May 26—Special training was given to 12 of the Disaster Relief child care volunteers, Council Road Baptist Church, Bethany.

June 3-4 & June 24-25—134 attended Lad & Dad Camps, Camp Hudgens.

Seven weeks of Royal Ambassador Camp were held, Camp Hudgens, for 595 campers and 193 staff. There were 188 decisions made: 55 professions of faith, 83 rededications and 50 surrendered for special service.

August 22-24—Brotherhood accepted the responsibility of the Senior Adult Retreat and for our first year experienced a delightful Spectacular at Falls Creek with over 130 Senior Adults. The 1989 Spectacular is scheduled for May 22-24.

August 29-30 and September 19-20—Brotherhood Area Training Sessions were held in eight locations for 399 local Brotherhood Officers (Baptist Men, Baptist Young Men, High School Baptist Young Men, and Royal Ambassadors). In addition training and/or inspiration was provided in 111 local churches and associations.

Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma Disaster Relief funds provided \$2,500 for Blackjack Baptist Church in Atoka-Coal Association that was damaged by fire. The large Disaster Relief unit, manned by volunteers, was displayed September 16-October 2 at the State Fair, Oklahoma City.

Joe Herndon, Volunteer Projects Personnel Coordinator, reports 253 volunteers comprised of 25 teams from 72 different churches, worked in 19 projects in 8 states and Guatemala. Those volunteers spent approximately \$60,916.00 of their own money to participate in these mission projects.

Along with Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for the three weeks of prayer (Edna McMillan, Annie Armstrong and Lottie Moon).

The Department continues to promote and provide materials for World Hunger assistance.

We provided trained lay renewal coordinators and team members for 27 Oklahoma Baptist churches that scheduled renewal events.

Baptist Messenger and Office of Communications

Glenn A. Brown, Editor

There's only one newsmagazine attuned to Baptists in Oklahoma and their involvement in our state and around the world. It's the **Baptist Messenger**, our convention's official news publication.

For only nine cents a copy, Oklahoma Baptists can keep up with what's happening in the churches, key events on the mission fields, in the denomination and current issues. In its pages this past year has been news of the fight against abortion, alcohol, gambling and other threats to society.

The publication has chronicled events on both sides of the controversy between conservatives and moderates. Special ministries of individuals and groups have been highlighted in feature articles. Pictures and news have been carried regularly telling of the activities and key events involving children and youth through mission organizations, OBU, family care, BSU, choirs, etc.

The **Messenger** has been sent to approximately 114,000 persons and families each week except for two weeks the press was closed for vacation. The drop of approximately 2,000 subscriptions from 1987 was traced to economic conditions in the churches. Special pages ranging between 165 and 184 have served 118 churches and six associations each week.

In November of 1987, associate editor Norman Jameson resigned to become the director of communications for North Carolina's child care institutions' publication. In May 1988, Bettie Moore, a 26-year employee, retired.

Sarah Zimmerman was hired as assistant editor, Mary Miller was promoted to editor's secretary and Jackie Fields was hired as receptionist in the **Messenger** office. Responsibilities were increased for associate editor, Bob Mathews, and newswriter, Dana Williamson. Williamson provides news releases about Baptists to their local newspapers in the state.

The editor serves as business manager for the **Messenger** office, **Messenger** press and convention printing. The editor also serves as Director of Communications for the state convention, providing news releases to the media as needed. Kenny Jones supervises printing operations.

New postal rate hikes went into effect April 1, 1988, raising the cost of mailing the **Messenger** by approximately \$1,000 each week. This necessitated increasing subscription rates by one cent per copy per week.

Effective work among Baptists depends upon timely and accurate news and information. Subscription rates are kept low to encourage every church to include the **Messenger** in its budget so every Baptist can receive the news each week. At present, 1,165 churches are having the **Messenger** sent to their members.

Report of the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

Robert L. Ross, President

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma enjoys the distinction of being the only incorporated trust agency of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. All endowment gifts received by or for Convention agencies, institutions, departments or special projects are transferred to the Foundation for management. No convention entity holds and/or manages its own endowment funds.

Because of this unique relationship, dating back to November, 1946, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has grown to be second in size among the 29 Southern Baptist foundations in the United States. Only the Baptist Foundation of Texas is larger.

As of December 31, 1987, assets held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma reached \$67 million. New income received during the past audit year was \$4.5 million, with earnings for this period totaling \$4,994,262. The 7.45% yield on all assets includes non-income producing properties.

As trustee for endowment gifts for Oklahoma and Southern Baptist causes, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma distributed more than \$6 million in behalf of approximately 100 beneficiaries during the past year. These beneficiaries include churches, associations, foreign, home and state missions, Oklahoma Baptist University, the Southern Baptist Convention and individuals who receive income from trusts during their lifetime.

The ethic and philosophy of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is clearly defined by an investment policy statement adopted by the Foundation's Board of Directors in October, 1986:

"The Foundation is committed to conducting its business affairs in a manner consistent with the highest Christian moral and ethical standards taught and implied in the Scriptures, and shall in no way compromise its Christian witness in the world by investment in a company or activity which does not promote the best interests of a wholesome society. No assets held by the Foundation are invested in companies related to the liquor, tobacco or gambling industries, or companies dealing in pornographic materials, or companies promoting entertainment forms which present as norm lifestyles inconsistent with Christian morality or companies which violate basic human rights by their manner of doing business."

The Foundation's Board of Directors is composed of 16 business and professional people from across the state, each serving a four-year term. The directors are organized into six functioning committees which meet monthly. These committees are: audit control, charitable giving and estate stewardship, church building loan, communication and public relations, investment, and real estate and minerals. The chairpersons of each of these committees constitute the executive committee. In addition, there are three individuals who serve as advisors to the Foundation's Board of Directors.

Board members are: James L. Barham (Guymon), Jack Brewer (Chickasha), Oleta S. Carmack (Hinton), William H. Clark (Duncan), David L. Field (Enid), Frank T. Fleet (Ada), William R. Gwartney (Tulsa), J. V. Lobaugh (Altus), William M. Pierce (Sapulpa), Ray Mason (Noble), Harold J. McConnell (Yukon), O'Neal Netherland (Tulsa), Irene S. Roop (Heavener), Joyce Shelby (Oklahoma City), Charles Sutter (Edmond), and Kenneth Weddle (Muskogee).

Advisors are: John Crain (Tulsa), Marlin Hawkins (Oklahoma City) and Thomas Terry (Shawnee).

The Foundation's programs and day-by-day operations are administered by an executive staff consisting of Robert L. Ross, president; C. Duane Riley, executive vice president for charitable giving and estate stewardship services; James R. Smith, senior vice president for communication and public relations services; Celinda Olszewski, vice president and controller; Ronald L. Fannin, vice president for church building loans and student services; Mart Hardin, vice president for property management services; Bill Bardwell, interim director of trust administration services and Melinda Warren, director of estate stewardship services.

During the past year, there have been two retirements. Kenneth R. Mullins, vice president for church building loan services, retired on December 31, 1987 and W.G. Kersh, executive vice president, retired on August 31, 1988.

New persons coming to the Foundation staff during the past year were: Rex Wilkinson, minister of church administration at First Bap-

tist Church, Muskogee who became estate stewardship counselor for Eastern Oklahoma, on January 1, 1988 and Ronald L. Fannin, minister of administration and music at Central Baptist Church, Lawton, who assumed responsibilities as vice president for church building loans and student scholarships and loan services on June 1, 1988.

"The Certificate of Incorporation and Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," first adopted in November 1946 and amended in December 1974, were amended again in February 1988 to more clearly define the composition of the Foundation's Board of Directors as 14 lay persons and two ordained ministers or persons from church related vocations. The amendment further provides for geographical and vocational representation of board members and the naming of six advisors to the Board of Directors. Copies of "The Certificate of Incorporation and Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma Amended and Restated, February 1988" are available from the Foundation office upon request.

This report which follows is presented under sub-headings representing areas of work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Investments

Assets held by the Foundation are, for the most part, invested in the General Investment Fund. More than \$55 million is presently invested in the Fund, composed of church building loans, equities and cash equivalency instruments. An asset mix is established to provide diversity, with the earnings from each of the component parts flowing into a common distribution pool for income payment to beneficiaries based on their proportionate ownership in the Fund.

The asset mix of the Fund is: church building loans (45-55%), equities (15-35%) and cash equivalency instruments (15-35%). There are other assets managed by the Foundation not invested in the Fund because of their nature, such as real estate properties, mineral interests and production, tax exempt bonds and other miscellaneous gifts.

Equities are managed by three professional equity management firms: Dreman Value Management, New York City; Jenswald King and Associates, Houston, Texas and Tom Johnson and Company, Oklahoma City. Shearson-Lehman and E.F. Hutton Company serves as an investment consultant to the Foundation in monitoring and reporting of the performance of the investment managers. The investment committee of the Board of Directors meets monthly to review the progress of the Foundation's investment strategy.

Although the October 1987 stock market crash resulted in a "paper loss" the Foundation, the first quarter of 1988 saw the market value returning to "pre-crash" values. In the long term, consistent growth is expected because of the high quality of the Foundation's equity portfolio. Copies of the "Investment Statement, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma" are available upon request through the Foundation office.

Trust Administration

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma administers more than 900 separate trusts. Such administration involves thousands of transactions

annually including the receiving and investing of corpus contributions, paying expenses, distributing income to beneficiaries and making reports to appropriate individuals and other entities. Fiduciary responsibility requires a continuing monitoring process to assure that trust provisions are carried out and properly documented and that there is full and accurate accounting of income and expenses.

Approximately 30% of trusts administered by the Foundation require reporting tax information to Internal Revenue Service and the Oklahoma Tax Commission. These personal and trust returns are prepared by an outside accounting firm. This year, an additional step was taken in conducting an extensive audit of all tax returns to assure compliance with fiduciary and tax law.

Computer operations are vital to efficient trust administration. Reorganization of computer files and programming information for easy accessibility is an ongoing activity. Computer reports necessary to the Foundation's functions are produced on a timely basis to assist personnel in performing their responsibilities.

"Trust Administration Policies of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," adopted by the Board of Directors in May, 1987, have served the Foundation well during the past year and chart a more clearly defined course for the future. Copies of these state policies are available upon request. Procedures for implementation of trust administration policies are subject to continuing review and revision.

Bill Bardwell, internal auditor, was reassigned on June 1, 1988 to interim director of trust administration. In this capacity he supervises new trust creation and the administration of existing trusts.

Charitable Giving and Estate Stewardship Services

One cannot describe the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma without using words like "service" and "ministry." The focus of the Foundation is people. Nowhere is this more evident than in the area of charitable giving and estate stewardship.

The primary motivation of the Foundation is not raising money or soliciting gifts for Baptist causes but helping people to complete their Christian stewardship and realize their highest aspirations in giving. It is affording to them opportunities to express their spiritual commitments in tangible ways and to extend their Christian witness beyond their lifetime through gifts from their estates. Such gifts may be in the form of living trusts from which individuals receive income as long as they live or through bequests in wills at their death.

For more than 40 years, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has been offering estate planning information and assistance to Baptist people. During this time, one or more persons from 1,034 of the 1,476 churches affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma have availed themselves of this service. Last year Foundation personnel assisted nearly 1300 persons in estate planning leading to the preparation of 1,160 wills, 54 trusts and 11 gift annuities.

All of this could not be possible without the assistance of members of our staff. Beginning the first of this year we divided the state into

sections. Mr. Rex Wilkinson joined our staff and serves the Eastern half of the state out of Muskogee. Mr. Kenneth Mullins serves the Western half of the state out of Oklahoma City. Dr. J.C. Bunn serves the Tulsa area and Dr. Forrest Siler serves the Oklahoma City area. Mrs. Melinda Warren is the director for estate stewardship services. We are grateful for these dedicated people who serve Oklahoma Baptists as Estate Stewardship Counselors.

Charitable giving and estate stewardship is also a highly specialized area complicated by changing tax laws and emerging techniques. Therefore, professional training is an ongoing activity with the Foundation staff. Members of the staff attend training conferences and seminars to better qualify themselves to serve our Baptist people. Foundation personnel also relate to other professionals such as attorneys, accountants and financial planners to accomplish the charitable objectives of clients.

Much of the growth of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma can be attributed to this effective ministry of charitable giving and estate planning. More importantly it grows people.

Church Building Loan Services

The Church Building Loan Program was established by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in 1953 as an investment strategy to provide endowment income for Baptist causes. Cooperating churches of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma may secure long term financing at reasonable interest rates and know that such interest payments go to the support of Baptist causes. This program also provided long term financing to associations and institutions and agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

From August 1, 1987 until July 31, 1988, interest earned from the 316 loans in effect produced \$4,038,064. Since 1953, 1,049 loans have been made by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

The Board of Directors authorizes the percentage of Foundation's assets to be loaned and sets fixed and variable interest rates for such loans. At present, 55% of the Foundations total assets, representing \$38,500, is invested in Church Building Loans.

Because of limits on the asset mix, a moratorium on church building loans was instituted on August 10, 1987 and continued until April 22, 1988. The moratorium was lifted in April to allow for loan amounts equal to principal in payments from the prior month.

The Church Building Loan Committee meets monthly to consider loan requests from churches and other qualified borrowers. The committee has also spent a great deal of time this year updating policies and reviewing procedures for a more efficient administration of the program.

Communication and Public Relations Services

An effective communication program is a vital part of the ministry of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The following summary highlights the communication and public relations programs relating to the Baptist constituency, church and associational leaders, attorneys and other professionals, and the general public.

Communicating through special emphasis:

Each year two observances on the denominational calendar focus on Foundation ministries. January is observed as "Make Your Will Month," and September is designated "Baptist Foundation Month."

To mark these observances The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma prepared and mailed over 140,000 bulletin inserts to more than 1,460 churches. The inserts contained an estate stewardship theme and message and provided a form to request estate planning assistance or additional information.

These emphases are also promoted through articles in the **Baptist Messenger**, **Care 'N Share**, and associational newsletters. The **Baptist Messenger** devoted front cover and editorial space to promoting these events. A special edition of the **Baptist Messenger** was published September 3 highlighting "September: Baptist Foundation Month." The Oklahoma Foundation's partnership with Oklahoma Baptists was also highlighted in a special six-page section.

Another special emphasis was the state evangelism conference. The Foundation sponsored a booth at the Oklahoma Evangelism Conference January 18-20. Foundation staff members attended the booth, distributed and displayed materials. Mr. Smith attended the annual luncheon for Oklahoma evangelists and the luncheon for directors of missions at the conference, spoke and made presentations from the Foundation at both meetings.

Communicating with churches:

Most of the executive staff of the Foundation are ordained ministers and former pastors. Because they are gifted preachers they are busy almost every Sunday preaching in churches across the state and representing the work of the Foundation. They serve as interim pastors, preach revivals, conduct Bible studies, teach at Falls Creek, participate in World Mission Conferences and other meetings.

In addition to preaching schedules, Foundation staff members conducted Future Thrust emphases in churches throughout the year. Twenty-nine Future Thrust programs were conducted this year in which staff members spoke on the work of the Foundation in morning worship services, conducted estate planning seminars during Church Training hours, and preached on estate stewardship in evening worship services. They also met by appointment with persons interested in receiving estate planning assistance.

The following churches participated in Future Thrust: First Baptist Churches of Sapulpa, Collinsville, Atoka, Leedey, Tecumseh, Whitefield, Enid, St. Louis, Webbers Falls, Broken Bow, Cheyenne, Nowata, Valliant, Pittsburg, Okay and Garber. Also Tulsa, Ranch

Acres; Oklahoma City, Rancho Village; Oklahoma City, Baptist Temple; Oklahoma City, Crestview; Enid, Calvary; Tulsa, Southwood; Tulsa, Eastwood; Cushing, Park Place; Tulsa, Berryhill; Ponca City, Southside; Lawton, Central; Claremore, Memorial Heights; and Oklahoma City, South Lindsay.

Communicating through literature:

Distributing literature and other materials is yet another way the Foundation presents important information. Literature is distributed as staff members speak in churches or associations, and by mailings to persons requesting information. Literature is supplied to associational offices, associational Baptist Foundation representatives, pastors, staff members and directors of missions. Literature and materials are supplied in packets provided to attorneys, accountants, pastors and other professionals.

Special materials developed for the year include a fan for Falls Creek campers, a synchronized dual slide presentation and program covers for associational annual meetings. The Falls Creek fan this year featured the theme, "Unlimited Horizons." The slide presentation, "Today, Tomorrow, Until . . .," is an audio-visual presentation of Foundation history and information.

Literature pieces currently available for distribution include: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," "Do You Need A Will?," "Estate Planning, A Christian Perspective," "When Death Does Us Part," "The Personal Representative," "The Gift Annuity Contract," "The Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust," "The Charitable Remainder Unitrust," "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," "The Personal Record Album," "The Revocable Living Trust," "Policies and Regulations for Student Scholarships and Loans," and "Trust Administration Policies."

Communicating through media:

Press releases are prepared periodically for major regional and local newspapers, the **Baptist Messenger**, other denominational publications and professional publications for foundation executives and development officers. Public service announcements are prepared for use through radio and television.

The **Baptist Messenger** provides an excellent means for communicating important information to Baptist people. Articles in the state Baptist paper go to more than 120,000 subscribers weekly. These articles feature personal aspects of the Foundation's ministry, board actions, materials, programming, personnel and policy news. Reader response to these articles is significant and often leads to estate planning opportunities.

Press releases and pictures are sent to newspapers across the state regarding activities of the Foundation staff, preaching and speaking opportunities, church events, activities of the Foundation Board of Directors, retirements, anniversaries, board decisions and other Foundation news.

Communication through ongoing programs:

The Pastor's Program is an ongoing event designed to establish

communication with pastors state wide. Pastoral support is essential to Foundation activities with people in the churches. There is no substitute for the pastor's enthusiastic endorsement and his recommendation of this ministry. However, before pastors can respond in this manner, they first must have an understanding and appreciation for the purposes and programs of the Foundation.

Through the Pastor's Program, selected pastors, church staff members and others from across the state are invited to be guests of the Foundation eight different times a year. They attend an hour-and-a-half orientation presenting each aspect of the work of the Foundation. Open discussion is encouraged through question-and-answer periods. Guests also sit in on monthly committee meetings of the Foundation's Board of Directors, as observers. Evaluations reflect the appreciation pastors have for the Christian commitment and high degree of expertise board members contribute to the work. Last year 79 pastors and other guests attended these programs.

Because of the vital role church secretaries play in handling and responding to Foundation emphases, selected church secretaries are invited to Oklahoma for Secretaries Day in November. Thirty secretaries from across the state attended this program.

Personal Trustee Services

The Foundation, in serving as trustee for the assets of individuals, renders more than a financial service but offers a ministry with a personal touch as well. Many trustors require assistance in other areas of their life than the investment of funds to provide for their livelihood. They need personal attention and such practical help as transportation to doctors appointments, to go shopping, to file insurance claims or tax returns, etc. They also need a spiritual ministry of encouragement. Many of them have no family members to care for them.

Finley Tinnin, administrative assistant and former long-time pastor of Baptist Temple in Oklahoma City, regularly visits with these individuals and assists them in ways mentioned above. The Foundation presently has this kind of relationship with 35 persons across the state.

Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services

During the past year, the Foundation received six pieces of real estate valued at \$400,000. These gifts of real property, including houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and grassland, were received through wills, trusts, or outright transfers.

Management of real property is supervised by a committee of nine board members. Decisions to sell, lease, rent, or repair properties are determined according to provisions in legal documents by which properties are received and upon recommendations of the vice president for property management and mineral leasing services.

The Foundation operates no businesses or farms, but leases them to others. Grassland and farms are leased on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential properties are either sold or rented by the month on a cash basis. Income from the management of real properties last year totaled \$164,606.

The Foundation holds deeds to 11,000 acres of mineral interests in 61 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states. During the past year the Foundation received four units of mineral interest, all in Oklahoma. Production and bonus income for last year was \$643,759. This compares to \$581,898.85 in 1986.

The Foundation's mineral interest business is also supervised by a committee of nine board members. This committee meets monthly to review lease offers, bonuses, rental delays, and sales.

Student Scholarships and Loans Services

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma invests in other ways than equities, church building loans, cash equivalency instruments, real estate, etc. The Foundation also invests in people—especially young people involved in educational pursuits—by providing student scholarships and/or loans. There is no more effective way to shape the future than to assist in the educational preparation of bright, committed Christian young people who can significantly impact their world for Christ.

Presently the Foundation administers more than 300 scholarships and loan trusts. In most cases, donors establish within trust documents certain criterion for the determination of recipients. The majority of these grants and loans are limited to students attending Oklahoma Baptist University or Southern Baptist seminaries. However, there are a few scholarships provided through the Foundation to qualified applicants on a "funds available" basis.

During the 1987-88 school year, approximately 260 students benefited from scholarships administered by the Foundation totaling \$200,019.00.

Low interest student loans were made to 25 students in the amount of \$40,325.00 during the past year. Loan recipients are required only to pay the interest on such loans while in school. Upon completion or termination of education, amortized schedules are established for repayment of loans over an extended period of time. Last year, interest received on student loans totaled \$17,259.00.

Historical Commission

J. M. Gaskin, Director

During the past year the Historical Commission had two meetings. Slayden A. Yarbrough, Shawnee, is chairman. Mrs. Lloyd Jones, Duncan, is recording secretary.

The following projects have occupied the attention of the Commission during its last two meetings:

Celebration—The 1988 annual meeting of the Historical Society, auxiliary to the Commission, will spotlight the work of Baptists during and immediately after the famous run of 1889. All churches and associations in central Oklahoma, where once the territory was known as "Unassigned Lands," are urged to make elaborate plans to write their histories and observe "89er Celebrations" in 1989.

Collection—Continued growth, both in holdings and use, is a favorable factor in operating the Oklahoma Baptist Collection in the OBU Library at Shawnee.

Awards—The Commission continues to emphasize several awards. These include the GASKIN BAPTIST HISTORY AWARD at OBU; the GASKIN CHURCH HISTORY AWARD, a state project; the Baptist Heritage Sermon Award, as part of Baptist Heritage month emphasis in June of each year; and the Distinguished Service Award for persons

who have made outstanding contributions to Baptist History. A certificate of award is presented to the winner of each of these awards. The two Gaskin awards include a cash stipend, provided from Trusts Gaskin endowed with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The Baptist History Award is open to OBU students only. The Church History Award is open to any person(s) who wish to participate, in or out of the state. However, the Commission has voted that the cash portion of the Church History Award shall be available only to Oklahoma participants. The guidelines for both of these cash awards provide for the accumulations to be added to the corpus of the Trust in the event in any given year the judging committee does not deem any entry worthy of the award. When there are co-winners, if one is out-of-state, he will receive a certificate; the in-state co-winner will receive a certificate and all of the cash portion of the award according to the earnings of the Trust. Co-winners of the award at OBU receive certificates and equal sums of the Trust earnings.

Annals—The collection of state convention and associational **Annals** in the Collection at OBU continues to grow. These holdings now may approximate 9,000 copies. The last few years the Collection has had a one hundred percent success ratio in acquiring **Annals** from Oklahoma Associations.

Indian Missionary—During the years 1884-93, **The Indian Missionary** was published at Eufaula and McAlester, Indian Territory. This was the only paper ever published in Oklahoma and recognized by any of the antecedent conventions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma until the **Baptist Messenger** was founded in 1912. The only known file of this paper in the original is in the vault of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection at OBU. Copies are too fragile to use. The Commission proposes that a plan be devised and pursued to encapsulate every page of this paper in hand. The purpose for encapsulation is to make the fragile document safe for use without destroying parts of pages; and, to ensure permanent preservation.

Publications—The only ongoing publications issued by the Commission are **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle**, and a **Circular Letter**. Published twice yearly, the **Chronicle** journal was founded by J. M. Gaskin in 1958. He has been its only editor. Gaskin publishes the **Circular Letter** two/three times each year. It is a promotion/information piece.

Many books have been published by the Commission since it was created by the state convention in 1952. Currently, the Commission has reaffirmed the intention of publishing **Dr. McConnell in Oklahoma** and **Oklahoma Baptist Imprints**. The former will be a biography of Franz Marshall McConnell (1862-1947). The main thrust of the book will be concerned with the years McConnell was Corresponding Secretary of the state convention in Oklahoma (1916-22). The second book will be a short paperback, with a compilation of monographs on Baptist papers published in Oklahoma dating back to 1844. J. M. Gaskin is now in process of preparing both of these manuscripts.

Handbook—Some years ago the Commission expressed the sense

of need to have an in-house organ for ready reference on the work of the Historical Commission, the Historical Society, the Oklahoma Baptist Collection, the work of the Director of History, and a short summary of the work of the convention in matters related to collecting, preserving, and utilization of Baptist history in Oklahoma. J. M. Gaskin is pulling these fragments of information together for publication in the near future. The published work will be available to all persons who desire a better understanding of the Commission/Society and their work.

Qualifications—In the September 8, 1988 meeting of the Commission, a general list of suggested qualifications for future directors of history was received by the Commission for study. Persons who wish to offer input to this item should write their suggestions to Wm. G. Tanner, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Convention.

Marker—Due recognition is extended to James V. Browning and the alumni of the Oklahoma Baptist Children's Home, once located at 63rd and Pennsylvania in Oklahoma City, for raising funds and erecting a historical marker to preserve the location of the site. The marker was unveiled at the July 4, 1988 Children's Home alumni homecoming.

The work of the Historical Commission is funded from the Cooperative Program.

Religious Education

Bill C. Haggard, Director

1986-87 marked the second year of the "Challenge 10/90" theme for Southern Baptists in the area of Sunday School work. All activities, training projects, and promotion supported the annual theme, "Touch Lives—Change People," as we continued in an effort to enroll 10 million people in Sunday School by 1990, as a part of the Bold Mission Thrust.

Church Training continues to keynote "Discipleship Training" with an emphasis on new materials, such as the LIFE series, which strongly support this emphasis.

Staff

For the first time in several years, there have been no changes in department personnel. The Department of Religious Education has an exceptional staff which includes: Joe Sherrer, director of general administration and state projects; Billy Allen, director of adult work and associational projects; David Fuller, director of youth work, language/ethnic work, and Vacation Bible School work; and Darlene Koch, director of childhood education, special education, and Children's Weekday Education.

Secretaries in the department include Joan Eischen, secretary to Haggard; Sybil Cox, secretary to Sherrer; Donas Rye, secretary to Allen; Lou Rodriguez, secretary to Fuller; and Olive Hays, secretary to Koch.

Statistics

Although Sunday School enrollment showed a decline of 6,614 under the previous year, with a total of 380,578 being reported, interest

and response to leadership training opportunities continued at an all time high. For the second year, much of the decline parallels the exodus of state population. According to a news source, Oklahoma ranked third among states in out-migration of its population. It is of interest to note that average attendance in Oklahoma increased to 44.3%. National enrollment also showed a slight decline.

Vacation Bible School enrollment reached 146,450, one of the largest increases for any state in the nation. A total of 2,381 professions of faith were reported. A projected total of 58,297 prospects were discovered. 22.1% of last year's prospects who received follow-up are now enrolled in Sunday School. Of this number, 333 have received Christ as Saviour.

Church Training enrollment was reported at 90,985, which was a decline of 1,689 under the previous year. National Church Training enrollment also showed a very slight decline. Total attendance at "M" Night in 1987 was 5,226, with 361 churches and 279 pastors participating. This event was observed by 28 associations.

Two new curriculum items were introduced which are receiving unusual acceptance in the churches. They are "DecisionTime" and "PrayerLife." MasterLife continues to be a strength in the Church Training Program.

Projects and Emphases

Associational work continues to be one of the most effective methods for training leadership for Sunday School, Church Training and Vacation Bible School. Each year a state institute is conducted to train ASSIST and ACT teams. This year the ASSIST/ACTeam Institute was conducted on February 11-12, at the Southern Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. A total of 230 ASSISTeam members and 62 ACTeam members participated from 37 associations out of a total of 41. As a result, many associations conducted central training schools, using their associational teams as the faculty. In addition, the Department of Religious Education conducted six associational Sunday Schools, and one associational Church Training conference.

A "Glorieta in Western Oklahoma" was conducted in Weatherford, First Church, with approximately 1,000 registered. A "Church Training Glorieta Experience" was conducted at Tulsa, Immanuel with 300 workers registered.

In addition a stronger emphasis on language and ethnic work was implemented through the development of a state Indian team and a state Hispanic team. Both teams have been involved in training conferences.

The Department of Religious Education was deeply involved in the enlistment of personnel and the direction of the Falls Creek General Assembly program for the five-week assembly.

The annual Sunday School Leadership Seminar at Falls Creek netted a registration of 700 Sunday School workers from all over the state.

Evangelism

Wayne Bristow, Director

1987 Baptisms

Eighteen thousand, three hundred and ninety-seven baptisms were reported by Oklahoma's Southern Baptist Churches in 1987, the lowest number in 17 years.

That year, 198 churches reported no baptisms and statewide there was one baptism for every 24.66 resident church members.

The urban associations in Tulsa and Oklahoma City reported 32 percent of the state baptisms. Twenty-five churches baptized 65 or more people, 11 exceeded 100.

Peggs Mission of First Baptist Church, Tahlequah, in East Central Association, had the best ratio of baptisms to resident members, 1.12. First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, again led in total baptisms with 421.

Conferences

Spurred by the falling baptismal statistics, and an awareness of over two million lost people in their state, Oklahoma Baptists entered the 1987-88 church year with a renewed sense of urgency about evangelism. This was encouraged by three major evangelism conferences.

December 28-29, 1987, 8,000 people attended the **YOUTH EVANGELISM CONFERENCE** at First Southern Baptist Church in Del City. The program personalities were Dawson McAllister, Al Denson, and Paul Jackson. Seven hundred and forty-two inquirers were counseled following two invitations.

The **STATE EVANGELISM CONFERENCE** was staged in the Del City facility January 18-19, 1988. With the theme, "Finding Lost People," the program featured a balance of mass and personal evangelism, discipleship, church growth and home and foreign missions personalities. These included Tom Wolf, Herman Rios, Avery Willis, Ike Reighard, Rod Masteller, Freddie Haynes, and Richard Jackson.

May 23-25, 1988, the BGCO Evangelism Department and the Mass Evangelism Department of the Home Mission Board cooperated to plan, promote and conduct a **NATIONAL MASS EVANGELISM CONFERENCE** at Council Road Baptist Church in Bethany. Over 400 people from 22 states plus Puerto Rico enrolled in seminars on prospect discovery, music evangelism, women in evangelism, revival preparation and area-wide crusades. On the opening night, 180 pastors and spouses from small church and bi-vocational situations heard Tal Bonham speak on "Making Small Churches Grow." On the second evening, Roy Fish addressed a rally on universalism and its effect on evangelism.

Evangelism Training

Ed Chaney, BGCO Associate Evangelism Director, led aggressively to implement a personal evangelism training strategy in 1987-88.

The **NATIONAL C.W.T. SEMINAR**, February 8-11, 1988, at First Baptist Church, Moore, was one of the most successful in the nation last year. Forty evangelism leaders, primarily from Oklahoma churches, enrolled and 36 of these completed the seminar.

A new dimension to BGCO Continuing Witness Training came in 1988 when Ed Chaney was invited to teach C.W.T. as a course during the fall semester at **OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY**.

Last year, training continued relative to **LAY EVANGELISM SCHOOLS**. This fits the Evangelism Department's plan to help lead Oklahoma churches to participate in the **YEAR OF THE LAITY** emphasis in 1989.

In more than a dozen conferences, 191 LES leaders were trained. At least 40 churches reported having Lay Evangelism Schools last year. One church reported 19 professions of faith in Christ as a direct result of its school.

DURING 1989, it is anticipated that 200 to 300 churches in Oklahoma will conduct Lay Evangelism Schools. The state now has 15 certified LES pastor/leaders. (For information about LES in your church, contact the BGCO Evangelism Department.)

Youth Evangelism Teams

Three Youth Evangelism Teams (**YET**) conducted revivals in 14 BGCO churches during the summer of 1988. These students also assisted with camps and participated in three crusade-type events.

Tent Evangelism

A new 55 x 90 tent was added in 1988 to the smaller one already owned by the BGCO Evangelism Department. These tents are for mass evangelism events and were used 22 times from August, 1987 to August, 1988. Randy Russell serves as the tent consultant. For information contact the BGCO Evangelism Department.

Falls Creek

Six hundred and forty-four people were trained as Falls Creek counselors in 1988. One hundred and twenty-eight pastors helped as pastor-advisors. Evangelism department staff members and volunteer

section leaders directed the work of counseling 3,361 inquirers during the five weeks of Falls Creek.

Oklahoma Baptist All State Youth Choir and Orchestra

We are proud of our young people who are involved in our all state youth choir and orchestra program. This past year we met on the campus of Oklahoma Baptist University, July 5-8, for rehearsal and training. We boarded buses for the First Baptist Church of Santa Fe, New Mexico, and Church Music Leadership Conference at Glorieta Baptist Conference Center where we sang, July 9 and 10. It was a good experience, and we are looking forward to next year.

Southern Baptist Leadership Training

We also provided promotion and encouragement to the following church music training opportunities: Southern Baptist Church Music Conference, San Antonio, TX, June 11-13; Church Music Week at Ridgecrest, June 18-24, and Glorieta, July 9-15; Music Con-

ference, Baylor University, August 1-3; Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Church Music Workshop, February 15-19.

Supportive Help

In addition to the regular programming that the Church Music Department does, we were happy to support the other agencies and departments of our convention. This year we had the privilege of assisting 10 of our departments and agencies in planning and executing their programs.

Singing Churchmen

This has been another good year for the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma. It continues to grow and give encouragement to the music leadership of our churches. We had 132 men enrolled in the organization this year with seven performances and rehearsal clinics within the state. We also sang at the Church Music Workshop at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, February 16. We were the first state men's group to be invited to sing on this program. We encourage all full time music directors to be a part of this organization. If you have questions concerning the Singing Churchmen, please contact the Church Music Office.

Falls Creek

Falls Creek is always an exciting and rewarding experience for our work. We had over 1600 young people and adults participate in our choir and instrumental programs this year.

Readin' and Singin' Schools

Once again thanks to the progressive insight of directors of missions and associational music directors, needs for musical growth are being met. This year Muskogee and Arbuckle associations have had schools. This type of school is still proving to be very effective in helping members of the churches be better prepared to aid in their own music ministries.

Statistical Report

The figures released by the Southern Baptist Convention's Statistical Department show that Oklahoma Baptist churches have had a 1.4% decrease in their music ministry enrolment this past year. However, in the past five years we have had an 8% increase and in the past 10 years have had a 28% increase. I am proud of what Oklahoma Baptists are doing in growing their music ministries. I feel that our growth could be even better if we could get more of our churches to report their music ministries on the annual church letter. We have 23% of our churches who did not report on the annual church letter. I want to continue to urge all churches to make this report.

Christian Life Committee

Stephen J. Spann, M.D., Chairman

The ethical and moral issues facing the Church in the world of today literally threaten individual health, family stability, and world peace. Jesus has called us to righteousness; to be the salt of the earth and the light of world (Matthew 5:20, 13, 14). We are to stand up for right, and make a difference in our world by shedding light on that which is wrong and evil. Jesus has also called us to ministry. We are to meet the needs of the hurting humanity that surrounds us (Matthew 25:34-40). While we must be articulate and unswaying in repudiating sinful behaviors and lifestyles, we must also be willing to reach out in ministry to needy victims of these. This report seeks to take a biblically based stand on some of these critical issues, while pointing to the many opportunities for ministry that they offer to Christians everywhere. It is presented with hopes that it will move to concern, and stir into action.

The Challenge to Biblical Stewardship

Approaching the final decade of this century, economic issues are vital concerns worldwide. Recent stresses in Oklahoma's economy have touched us all. Such times as these call for serious evaluation of our stewardship.

Our world is a hungry world. Insulated by plenty, we barely comprehend reports of millions starving. Television images of malnourished children flicker and fade with hamburgers, cars and celebrities. While Southern Baptist missionaries are feeding the hungry, for most of us the hungry world is still a remote world.

Our world is a wounded world. Wars and natural disasters produce endless streams of refugees, sick, and hurting. Millions are desperately in need of the hope only Christ provides. Southern Baptist missions minister daily to these needs, though we seldom see them.

Our world is a lost world. It is estimated that at least 1.3 billion people are not even aware of the gospel. Hundreds of millions more have no accurate knowledge of salvation. The planned response of Southern Baptists is to increase our overseas missionary force by 50 percent, to a total of 5,600 by A.D. 2000.

Obviously, foreign missions alone is only part of our stewardship accountability. Yet it is vital to fulfilling the Great Commission. In light of world opportunities, and our God-given vision, we strengthen our stewardship. The stewardship decisions we make in Oklahoma directly affect our capacity to reach the world for Christ.

A study of giving patterns among 31 denominations reveals that, from 1968 to 1985, income after taxes and inflation increased by 31 percent, while per-member giving declined by 8.5 percent. Christians today are in general objectively richer, yet that wealth is not being used to expand the ministry of the church. Will we merely accommodate our lifestyles to the expectations of society, or will we make the Bold Mission Thrust a top priority, trusting God to supply our needs as we steward His resources?

We call upon Oklahoma Baptists to teach our people world-awareness. Jesus still looks upon the multitudes with compassion. He calls us to lift up our eyes and look on a ripe harvest. We must teach our people what we can do as faithful stewards of our resources and of the gospel.

We call upon Oklahoma Baptists to continue to preach the biblical standards of stewardship. Let us reject materialistic values, which urge us to accumulate only for ourselves. Let us preach and teach the tithe as our minimum standard, and sacrificial love-giving as our mature practice.

We call upon Oklahoma Baptists to exemplify biblical standards of stewardship in all of life. We seek to carry the gospel to all peoples by A.D. 2000. If we are to be credible messengers, we must validate the gospel message with personal concern. Biblical stewardship will lead us to implement that concern meaningfully and tangibly. As Christ's stewards we can feed the hungry, heal the wounded, and win the lost.

May the Lord Jesus find His Oklahoma Baptist stewards faithful!

Issues Affecting Families and Children

Governor Bellmon held a summit this year attended by people and agencies who deal with problems affecting children. The statistics that came from that meeting illustrate the depth of those problems:

1) One-third of Oklahoma's population is made up of children. At any given time, one out of every seven of those children is in a single-parent family headed by the child's mother. National figures indicate that about 10 times more single parent families are headed by mothers than by fathers.

2) In 1986 in Oklahoma, 7,894 babies were born to teenage parents. 56.4 percent of child abuse and neglect occurs to children whose mothers bore their first child before age 20. Confirmed cases of abuse increased by 126 percent from 1981 to 1987. Thirty-one children died in 1987 from abuse.

3) About 2,100 Oklahoma children are in state custody and living in foster homes.

4) The Oklahoma Department of Mental Health estimates that over 15,000 children suffer from emotional disturbances.

5) Our state's teen suicide rate grew by 350 percent from 1970 to 1986, placing it 31 percent above the national average. (Experts estimate that there may be about 100 attempts for every actual suicide.)

6) It is estimated that 19 percent of all youth are at high risk for developing dependency on drugs, including alcohol.

Solutions to many of the problems that threaten our young people lie in the enhancement of the self-image of our children, making it unnecessary for them to look for an escape, such as drugs or suicide. The strongest self-image possible comes through a personal relationship with Christ. Through knowing that a loving God cares for them and about their problems on an individual basis and that He wants the best for them, children can truly realize their worth and potential. So it is important that we continue to encourage ministry to our children, at every

age, and make sure such ministries are always centered around Christ.

Christian parents must supplement the building of our children's self-image by allowing Christ's love to permeate our relationships with our children. By doing so, we lessen the likelihood that our children will try to find affection through a sexual relationship or by trying to be popular with their peers by indulging in harmful behaviors.

The Bible tells us that we are to "Train up a child in the way he should go. . . ." Many parents, like those who abuse their children, lack parenting skills. They learned improper parenting techniques from their own parents, and now, are repeating those techniques. We must not only have compassion for child abuse victims, and condemnation for the crime, but we must try, whenever possible, to "love our enemies," by reaching out in compassion to the abuser.

Finally, we must redouble our efforts to reinforce the family. In our mobile society that separates us from the roots of extended family relationship and often intimates that relationships are easily formed and just as easily discarded, we must deal openly and frankly with the forces that are brought to bear upon the family. Seminars, films, etc., that educate parents and children about those forces and about the human toll they take, along with reinforcement from the wisdom of the Bible, help arm families for the spiritual warfare that so often threatens to destroy them.

Perhaps, in all our reaching out in special ministries to the single, the needy, and others, we have forgotten that those who minister must also be ministered to. Let the well-adjusted family not only be a launching pad to reach out to others, but let it also be a focus of ministry, ministry that teaches parents and their children Christian principles, and ministry that allows opportunities within the church setting for families to be together, and, on occasion, to **minister together**. In all our rush for successful parents to teach and for children to be involved in youth programs, let us not become so spread out that we do not encourage the family to have moments together within the church setting.

Following the Governor's summit, he said "Families, communities, private organizations, churches, and government must work together to assure a brighter tomorrow for Oklahoma's children and youth." The church has always shouldered more than its share of the load, setting an example for others. But instead of growing weary, and by stepping out even further on behalf of families and children, we have great opportunity to witness to the world that all positive social changes come from spiritual transformation within each human heart.

Harmful Addiction

In many ways America is becoming a nation that is hooked. Many of the people to whom we have been called to minister are addicted to harmful substances or practices. Bible believing Christians and our churches must not remain silent concerning these harmful addictions, just a few of which are mentioned here.

1. Gambling

Just like dueling is murder by mutual consent, gambling is theft

by mutual consent. It is, of course, built on a get-rich-quick, something-for-nothing philosophy and ultimately weakens the economy and moral fiber of a society. Here in Oklahoma gambling has been highly touted and professionally packaged as a blessing to the State. It will not take much time or many individual case histories to reveal how deadly the gambling game can really be. Already we are seeing individuals who compulsively wager, who squander the rent money on the slim chance that they might strike it rich. The testimony of many gambling addicts is that whether they win or lose they want to gamble more. Even casual investigation will reveal the addictive nature of gambling.

2. Illicit Drugs

A drug addict rehabilitation center in New York called the Phoenix House reports that 398 out of 400 addicts they treat began their habit with marijuana. Although cocaine seems to be replacing marijuana as the drug of choice for some, we must educate and motivate our young people to resist the temptation for any experimentation with narcotics. The "just say no" campaign has received a great deal of national attention but we as churches have the opportunity to go a step further and help our folks to know abundant life in Christ so that the phony dream world life of drugs will have no appeal.

3. Alcohol

Alcohol has been called America's number one drug problem. This depressant has the added danger of being legal and socially acceptable. Our churches need to return to the unpopular position of encouraging total abstinence. The hypocrisy of the liquor industry must be exposed as they are motivated simply by the financial gain of an alcoholic society and, at the same time, desire to be thought of as the good natured supporters of athletic events.

4. Pornography

The use of pornography needs to be seen today as an addictive behavior. Just as the alcoholic desires more and more of his ruinous drink, the consumer of pornography desires more and more perversion—something just a little kinkier this time—until finally the individual begins to act out in real life those things which he has fantasized before. The danger is that pornography (even "kiddie porn") is actually becoming accepted in America. As churches we must raise a standard of purity and not lose our disgust and anger over this industry which actually does put our little children in peril.

Of course, there are many other compulsive behaviors that confront us day by day. As Tom Watson, Jr. says in his book **Don't Bet On It**, "Compulsion of one kind or another probably is a weakness afflicting every member of the human race." However, the above mentioned addictions and numerous others have a decidedly detrimental effect not only on the individuals, but on society, often leading to death and disaster. Christians who care about the morals of our society need to use every available means to express ourselves to legislators as well as our fellow citizens in order to fill our role as changed people changing the world.

Abortion

Abortion continues to be one of the most serious problems facing concerned Christians. Several times in the last 10 years the Christian Life Committee has addressed this issue in its report. Although this moral struggle has continued for several years, we need to recommit ourselves to a positive Christian stance on this vital issue. Since 1976 more than one million unborn children have been aborted each year, primarily through abortion on demand. Recent studies indicate that about 25% of pregnancies end in induced abortion. In 1985, for example, over 1300 abortions were reported in Oklahoma.

The Bible clearly presents the sanctity of human life as an abiding moral principle. Christians need to proclaim this principle clearly in a society that seems to exalt convenience above the value of the life of an unborn child. While upholding this moral ideal, Christians need to respond compassionately and redemptively to everyone involved in the decision making about abortion.

Oklahoma Baptists can respond to the abortion crisis in the following ways:

1. Encourage our churches to observe Sanctity of Human Life Sunday in January. Helpful materials can be obtained from the Christian Life Commission of the SBC.
2. Devote attention in our churches to the Christian view of the family, human sexuality, teen pregnancy, abortion, and related issues.
3. Support the Family Care Ministries program of the BGCO in its effort to provide alternatives to abortion for unwed mothers. Oklahoma Baptists operate two crisis pregnancy centers, one in Oklahoma City and the other in Tulsa.
4. Practice responsible citizenship by supporting leaders in public life who adhere to the biblical view of the sacredness of life.
5. Develop an atmosphere of compassion and concern in our churches that will encourage women contemplating abortion to seek our ministry.

AIDS And The Church

Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) is a disease that impairs or destroys the body's ability to fight infection which is caused by the Human Immunodeficiency Virus Type 1 (HIV-1). The first cases in the United States were reported in 1981 among male homosexual communities in New York City and Los Angeles.

The majority of cases have been contacted through sexual promiscuity or intravenous drug abuse (64% have occurred in homosexual/bisexual males, 18% in IV drug abusers, 7% in homosexual/bisexual male drug abusers, 4% in heterosexuals). A small number (3%) of cases have been contacted through transfusion of contaminated blood products, most of which occurred before routine blood screening for AIDS. Two percent of cases have occurred in children under the age of 13, mostly transmitted by the mother during pregnancy.

At the end of August, 1988 there had been 72,024 cases of AIDS

reported in the United States, 313 of those in Oklahoma. Of these, 40,593 (56%) of these had died nation-wide; 167 (53%) had died in Oklahoma. From January through June 1987 there were 11,058 new cases reported nationally and 56 new cases report in Oklahoma; from July through December 1987, there were 11,800 nationally and 69 in Oklahoma; from January through June, 1988 there were 10,759 new cases reported nationally and 62 in Oklahoma. The United States Centers for Disease Control estimates that some one million to 1.5 million people are infected with the AIDS virus nationwide. The incubation period from exposure to symptoms onset ranges from a few months to seven years or longer. There is no known cure for AIDS; it is currently felt that every infected person will ultimately die of the disease, barring the discovery of a cure.

The increasing prevalence of the disease and its uniform fatality rate have contributed to unrealistic fears about AIDS. Infected persons have been shunned in the workplace, in schools, and even in churches. Much of this hysteria is fostered by the public's ignorance about the relative contagiousness of the disease. To date the AIDS virus is only known to be transmitted through sexual contact with an infected carrier, through exposure to contaminated needles, syringes, blood products, or through pregnancy or delivery in an infected mother. There is no evidence that the virus has been transmitted through saliva, sweat, tears, urine, feces, food or insects. The virus is not spread through shaking hands, hugging, or other forms of casual contact. One cannot catch AIDS by being in the same room with an infected person, or from a toilet seat.

The seriousness of the disease and the sinful lifestyle through which it is frequently contracted may influence Christians to shun AIDS patients. Yet these isolated individuals with a terminal illness have a unique need for community and ministry. There is no known risk relating to these persons in a caring and supportive way. The New Testament teaches that we must minister to hurting, needy people (Matthew 25:34-46; Luke 16:22-31) even when this entails personal risks (1 John 3:16-18). May we never let unrealistic fears of contracting the disease keep us from ministering to AIDS patients in need.

Christian Citizenship

Being a citizen of the heavenly kingdom and of the United States of America presents believers with both great privilege and great responsibility. Jesus said we are to be both "salt" and "light" (Matt. 5:13-16) in a world of corruption and darkness. This is a mandate to be responsible citizens living an influential life from a biblical world view. The prevailing humanistic world view believes that the church should not be involved in affairs of government. But our nation was not founded upon such a principle. Charles Colson, in his book **Who Speaks For God?**, reminds us that "the 'wall of separation' between church and state . . . was erected to protect the church from the domination of government, not vice versa." He further points out that "to suggest that the purpose of the church and state separation was to keep religion out of politics betrays abysmal ignorance of our history." For more

than two hundred years the church has served as salt and light having "actively pursued biblical justice and righteousness in society" making sure that "religiously founded values have been the cutting edge in shaping our national character." It is vitally important that we continue to call our nation to godliness by the exercise of our freedoms.

The Christian Life Committee encourages Oklahoma Baptists to be informed and involved citizens. We urge them to seek out, and vote for, representatives on all levels of government who believe in and will stand for biblical principles. Know the issues and communicate your convictions to your elected officials. Then hold them accountable for their decisions.

In order for us to do all that we can to influence our government toward godliness Christians must not only exercise our freedoms of voting, petitioning, and lobbying government, but we must be willing to run for and hold elected office.

In this year of national elections please hear and heed Paul's exhortation to pray for our leaders: 1) "I exhort therefore, that, first of all, supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks, be made for all men; 2) For kings, and for all that are in authority; that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty." (I Tim. 2:1-2)

Cooperative Missions

Robert E. Haskins, Director

Oklahoma's Bold Mission Goal is to share the Gospel of Jesus with every person in his or her setting, culture, language and lifestyle so they can have the opportunity of receiving Christ as their personal Savior and to plant local churches in every culture, language, and lifestyle so believers can be involved in the life, ministry, fellowship, and world mission program of a Southern Baptist Church. No one program or approach is adequate for our state's diversity. The 18 different programs and ministries listed in this report are samples of the multi-faceted outreach programs of local churches, associations, the State Convention and the Home Mission Board. Cooperation and teamship in Missions has helped Oklahoma stay on the cutting edge in mission advance.

Language Missions

Cooperation and the sharing of resources for planting new ethnic churches has resulted in at least 14 new language churches/missions/preaching points; three Indian, one Korean, five Hispanic, one Japanese, one Chinese, one Filipino, one Deaf, and one Cambodian. Fifty-one full-time and 22 part-time missionaries work with American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, Laotians, Cambodians, Vietnamese, Filipinos, Thais, Malays, Indonesians, Nigerians, Liberians, Ghanaian, Arabs, Iranians, Lebanese, French, Russian Jews, Asian In-

dians, Hispanics, Deaf, etc. They traveled more than one million miles and reported more than 1,614 professions on faith, additions by letter, and special service commitments.

A new Chinese work was begun in the Oklahoma City/Moore area with the target group being the Cantonese speaking. Crompton Wan, a student at Southwestern Seminary, is serving as missionary pastor. The Oklahoma City Chinese Church purchased a five acre building site on North May. Plans are being made to build their first unit building in the near future. The fifth annual summer camp was held at Falls Creek Conference Center August 17-20 with more than 200 in attendance. Sam Luk and Paul Chao directed the camp.

A new Filipino mission was begun in February in Tulsa with Immanuel Baptist Church serving as sponsor. They have chosen the name "Northeastern Oklahoma Filipino Baptist Mission." Pedro Aquino has been serving as mission pastor.

The "Vision 88" Indian Falls Creek encampment was held June 20-25 with approximately 2,800 in attendance. Herman Rios, ethnic consultant for the Home Mission Board's Evangelism Division, served as camp pastor, and Emerson Falls, pastor of First Indian Baptist Church, Phoenix, served as music director. Other special speakers included Dr. Larry Lewis, President of the Home Mission Board; Carolyn Weatherford, President of Woman's Missionary Union; Peter Kung, Ethnic Consultant for the Sunday School Board; Victor Kaneubbe, past Vice President of the Southern Baptist Convention; and Dr. Oscar Romo, Director of the Language Mission Division of the Home Mission Board. Special conferences for training Indian leadership were provided.

Daniel Caceres was appointed, in April, as Hispanic Catalytic Missionary for the Southeastern Quadrant of Oklahoma. He has already begun new work in Ardmore and Durant. The Annual Hispanic Falls Creek encampment was conducted June 13-17 with Mario Zamarron, pastor of Exchange Avenue Spanish Mission, serving as director. James Crane, retired foreign missionary to Mexico, served as camp pastor. More than 225 campers attended. Over 200 people attended the Annual Hispanic WMU Conference at Exchange Avenue Baptist Church on February 27. Elvira Vasquez served as Hispanic WMU Director. The Fall State Leadership Conference provided training in stewardship and Christian money management.

Yaichi Waguri, Japanese student at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, spent the month of August conducting a survey and beginning a Home Bible Study Fellowship. Hopefully, the Fellowship will become a mission in the near future. Approximately 1,500 Japanese live in the greater Oklahoma City area.

Eddie Lindsey was appointed Indian Catalytic Missionary to work with Indians in Eastern Oklahoma. He will train leadership, begin new churches, and coordinate the Ethnic Leadership Development Centers.

Church Extension

"Growth 2000" is a cooperative effort of Oklahoma Baptist to start 450 new churches/missions by the year 2000. A "Growth 2000" Con-

ference was conducted, sharing the "nuts and bolts" of church planting, along with several models or approaches to starting new congregations.

Associational Church Starting PROBES were conducted in nine associations. They are: Panhandle, Capital, Atoka-Coal, Rogers, Frisco, LeFlore, Northwestern, Northeastern and Muskogee. A PROBE is an intensive field study to determine new work needs. Sixty-eight (68) locations were identified as needing new churches.

Praxis teams (seminary students serving 10 weeks during the summer) served in three areas of Capital Association to initiate new congregations. Religious surveys, Vacation Bible Schools, door-to-door visitation, and Home Bible Studies were some of the methods used by the teams.

To reach our "Growth 2000" goal, we must begin 35 new congregations each year.

Blind Ministries

The work with the blind continues to grow. Crestwood Baptist Church in Oklahoma City has begun an outreach to the blind. Their interest was sparked by the testimony and encouragement of Ruth Versaw, Mission Service Corps volunteer missionary working with the blind. The Department of Missions is providing the tapes for the Library for the Blind coordinated by Mrs. Versaw. She is presently sending tapes to more than 500 blind people in the United States and 194 in foreign countries, including China.

Campers on Mission

The Oklahoma Chapter of Campers on Mission has been busy this year preparing for hosting the National Chapter in 1989. The 1989 National Meeting will be held at the Fair Grounds in Guthrie. Kenneth deCordova, President, had appointed several committees who are preparing publicity, welcome packets and the program. The Spring and Fall Rallies met at Clear Bay State Park near Norman. Carl Reagan, volunteer Campers on Mission Consultant for the Home Mission Board, spoke to the Spring Rally.

Chaplaincy

Chaplaincy remains one of the fastest growing areas of ministry. One hundred twenty-eight (128) chaplains serve in hospitals, institutions, military installations, law enforcement agencies, fire departments, businesses, etc.

Chaplaincy is very effective in touching the lives of people that are sometimes beyond the reach of the local church. This is true because of the crisis nature of chaplaincy ministry which touches lives at the time of special needs. Chaplaincy places a minister, whether full-time, part-time, or volunteer, out in the "hiway and hedges" of life to meet people.

A retreat was provided for all chaplains and their spouses in September; a luncheon was held in November, and other meetings were conducted for specific groups of chaplains.

Several chaplaincy ministry projects have been conducted around the state this year with more planned for future years.

Joe Williams is Associate Director/Coordinator of Chaplaincy.

Resort Missions

Bo Holland, assisted by Mark Richardson and Janice Demaray, summer missionaries, directed the Grand Lake family resort ministry. They conducted three worship services and four day camps weekly. Approximately 600 attended the day camps and worship services. The churches in the area experienced growth as a result of the summer mission ministries.

Michael Varble, summer missionary, in consultation with Bill Fuller, coordinated day camping on Lake Tenkiller. Thirteen youth and adult groups from four states, including Oklahoma, assisted with the various ministries on the lake.

Multifamily Housing Ministry

Tulsa Baptist Association and the Department of Missions are working with Ranch Acres Baptist Church and Westside Baptist Church in an apartment ministry at the Normandy Apartments. Forty-two (42) enrolled in Backyard Bible Clubs with an average attendance of 26. A Vacation Bible School was conducted July 18-22 with 166 enrolled and 30 professions of faith. There is an average weekly attendance of 30 from the apartments. J. T. Gorrill, a layman from Tulsa, is assisting with this special project.

Mission Service Corps

Ten Oklahomans applied for Mission Service Corps this year and four have received assignments. One is working in Oklahoma and three are serving in other states.

Four area consultants continue to assist the State Director. Claude and LaWanda Mabery (Atoka) serve Southeastern Oklahoma; Bob Carner of Mounds serves Northeastern Oklahoma; Bonnie King of Marlow serves Southwestern Oklahoma, and Howard Sellers serves Northwestern Oklahoma.

Construction Projects

More than 500 construction volunteers, representing 39 different churches, assisted in 22 construction projects this year. These included an educational building and auditorium at Morrison, a two-story education building at Fairview, a first unit building for the new Garland Road Baptist Mission in Enid, remodeling of the First Indian Church, Kingfisher, remodeling of the Hispanic Mission in Tulsa, a first unit building for the First Indian Baptist Church, Marble City, a new auditorium at Rufe, an associational office building for Johnston-Marshall and Northwestern Associations, first unit building for Bugtusle Mission, new roof on Oklahoma Avenue, Shawnee, etc.

MissionsFest

A "grass roots" missions conference will be held at Oklahoma Baptist University, June 2-3, 1989, co-sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the Foreign Mission Board. Committees have

been organized and preparation is being made for this missions spectacular. It will include "sights and sounds" of missions, a global walkaround, mission conferences, missionary testimonies, parade of flags, commissioning service, and a dialogue with Dr. and Mrs. Keith Parks from the Foreign Mission Board. Robert Haskins is coordinating the project.

Black Church Relations

Three missionaries jointly employed by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention work in the area of Black Church Relations. Verlene Farmer is the Baptist Student Union director of Langston University and teaches some courses in religion for the University. Patricia Reed is the WMU Executive Secretary for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and directs the woman's work of the convention. Clarence Shuler is serving as Director of the Education Center in Tulsa.

Jerone Roland, in Tulsa was recommended to be appointed as a missionary associate by the personnel department of the Home Mission Board to serve as State Director of Christian Education.

The Oklahoma School of Religion in Tulsa, with seven learning centers across the state, had 446 adults enrolled in at least one course during this year.

The BSU at Langston has been very active during the year. Six students served as summer missionaries during the summer of 1988. On March 4, 17 students went to the 39th Annual Student Mission Conference at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth. Twenty-six from Langston BSU went to Baton Rouge, Louisiana for the southwide Black BSU retreat. Isaac Coleman was elected as National Music Director for the 43rd BSU Retreat. The Scripture Memory Choir was invited as special guests to be on the program at OBU, November 18 for a 20-minute presentation.

During Religious Emphasis Week 35 students were saved.

Four students from the BSU have been called to preach.

May 14, Verlene Farmer was a guest speaker for the Centennial Celebration of the WMU in Richmond, Virginia.

Church-Community Ministries

This is the Oklahoma name for the area of ministries which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries.

Six missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local associations are serving in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are: associational directors of church-community ministries, Jack Bettis, Capital Association, and Richard Humble, Tulsa Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Perez, Oklahoma City, and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa; Women's Shelter director, Sharyan Utey, Tulsa; and Lee Martin, director of Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City. Financial assistance is provided on

the salary of Connie Crew who serves as director of the Baptist Women's Center in Oklahoma City.

The missionaries reported 398 professions of faith and 210 special decisions. They presented 654 sermons and addresses during the year.

Grace Rescue Mission reported approximately 15 per month participating in an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program called "New Life." Meals were provided for 44,940 transients and rehabilitation program people and 10,402 beds were provided. "Tender Haven" program helped 4,179 families.

Oklahoma City, Baptist Women's Center reported that 5,858 meals were provided and 1,896 beds furnished for 154 women and children during the past year. Remodeling of the building was done March 8-April 25. Many different nationalities were helped this year.

The Baptist Mission Center, Oklahoma City, reports that 35,177 pieces of clothing were distributed to 10,394 people; 3,200 days of food were distributed to 6,095 people; \$74,967 worth of free medical care and \$4,140 worth of free dental care was provided. Eighteen summer missionaries served during the summer of 1988 at the center.

The Women's Shelter, Tulsa, housed 172 children and 122 women during the last 10 months.

Hale Station Mission Center distributed 325 Thanksgiving baskets and 500 Christmas baskets.

The Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa, held the Annual Youth Conference, January 29-31 at Metropolitan Baptist Church with approximately 450 in attendance each day. A single parent club was started in September.

For 16 years a group of students from Oklahoma Baptist University have received some expense money from the Missions Department through their BSU, which made it possible for them to be involved in community ministries. Students tutor, lead in recreation, minister, counsel and do whatever ministry is needed. Thirty OBU students volunteer their Saturday nights to help at the Shawnee Youth Center and others work with the youth at the Baptist Mission Center in Oklahoma City every Friday night. A prison ministry at Lilley Correctional Center was started and five services are conducted each month. Approximately 300 Bibles were distributed through a local craft show.

Workers in literacy missions are continuing to be trained. On June 29-July 1, a Literacy Missions Workshop was held at OBU. Fifty-two people have received training in conversational English or adult reading and writing or Alfalit literacy. All sections of the state have leaders who can lead workshops to train others in literacy missions. The need for literacy missions volunteers is great. Our state continues to attract internationals at an increased rate and literacy missions provides a good opportunity for sharing the gospel, especially since the Amnesty Law was passed.

PACT

Project: Assistance for Churches in Transitional Communities (PACT) is a Home Mission Board developed program to respond to

a church's request for help when it discovers itself located in a significantly changing community. PACT helps a church to rediscover its mission and to redeem its dream as well as plans programs for reaching and ministering to the people in the church and its community.

Bob Lovejoy is the state PACT coordinator. Contact the Mission Department for more information or assistance.

Student Summer Missions

Twenty student summer missionaries served in missions all across Oklahoma during the summer of 1988. They served in rural, inner city, language, resort, metropolitan and general missions in 13 different areas of the state. Their work included surveys, Vacation Bible School, backyard Bible clubs, mission center activities, resort missions, counselors in camps, language missions, children's homes, and a host of other responsibilities. Several of the students made commitments to full-time Christian service during the summer.

Refugee Sponsorship

Baptist churches are still being sought as sponsors for refugees who are seeking to come to our country. They are leaving their own country either for political or religious oppression. They must have sponsors before they are permitted to come to the United States. This year we have been asked to provide sponsorship for people from eastern Europe, Indo-China, Poland, and people from Ethiopia. Sponsorship provides an excellent opportunity for sharing Christ.

Interfaith Witness

One conference was held in the state May 31-June 1, with 32 people receiving training toward becoming certified Interfaith Witness Associates. Their training concerning the beliefs of Jehovahs Witnesses, Mormons, and New Age Movement equips them to lead awareness conferences and to share how Christians can effectively witness to the cultic groups.

Hunger Funds

Sixty-one thousand dollars from the Home Mission Board hunger funds have been channeled throughout the state to help the hungry in Oklahoma during this time of economic slowdown.

Ministry to Noncitizens

The Mission Department assisted some of the Hispanic congregations in the convention as they worked with the undocumented residents in their communities to start the process of becoming legal residents. A lot of confusion and misunderstandings have been cleared up. Some good reports have come from churches and individuals as a result of providing free assistance to the illegals. Ministering in this way has provided the churches with a great opportunity for sharing the gospel.

Woman's Missionary Union

Frances Grafton, Director

WMU, SBC CENTENNIAL has been visible for two years in the activities of Woman's Missionary Union. Mary Edna Hopper (Mrs. Richard), State WMU Centennial Chairman, along with church and associational Centennial Chairmen, has led Oklahoma to be aware of the vital part of WMU as a missions educator in Southern Baptist churches for 100 years. With the encouragement of many pastors, the Foreign Mission Board and the Home Mission Board, WMU was organized May 14, 1888 in Richmond, Virginia.

Many churches, associations and the state observed special centennial celebrations. Over 100 Oklahomans attended the national centennial celebration May 13-14, 1988 Richmond, Virginia with 48 flying with the state WMU sponsored tour group. The total attendance was over 11,000. Verlene Farmer, BSU Director, Langston University, and Jimmy Anderson, State-wide Church Developer among the Indian churches in Oklahoma, were the home missionaries from Oklahoma who were on the program. For the first time, foreign and home missionaries were commissioned together. Dr. Keith Parks and Dr. Larry Lewis presented certificates to their respective missionaries. Marjorie McCullough, WMU, SBC President, gave certificates to foreign missionaries and Carolyn Weatherford, WMU, SBC Executive Director, gave certificates to home missionaries. This was the largest group of missionaries to be commissioned at one time.

VISION 88 countdown is here. Carol Cox (Mrs. Perry) serves as State Enlistment Coordinator and Mary Davis (Mrs. Joshua) as Associate Enlistment Coordinator. The churches and associations have renewed their skills in reporting progress. Statistics from the Uniform Church Letter indicates Oklahoma has 1,107 new WMU members giving us 36,580 total enrollment in 2,907 WMU organizations in 914 churches in 1986-87. We gained members in every age level except Acteens (minus 65) and Campus BYW (minus 2). We gained in the number of organizations in every age level except Acteens (minus 11), BYW (minus 10), mission churches (minus 8) and Campus BYW which remained the same. This makes two years consecutively that Oklahoma WMU has increased in membership. We have WMU in 15 more churches than we did in 1985-86.

A CENTURY TO CELEBRATE . . . A FUTURE TO FULFILL emphasis for 1987-88 focused on the contributions WMU has made to the church and denomination, enlisting more in WMU organizations and encouraging each church to experience increased involvement in all the missions tasks.

The **WATCHWORD** was Hebrews 13:7-8 RSV. "Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God; consider the outcome of their life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever."

DEPARTMENT OF BGCO status has been in effect for Woman's Missionary Union since October 1, 1981 and is under the direct super-

vision of Dr. William G. Tanner, Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In December, 1987 Nita Morrison (Mrs. Don) came to serve as Receptionist-Secretary. She replaced Carleata Horton (Mrs. Willard) who had served in the Department since 1979. Mrs. Horton transferred to the Baptist Foundation Department in December, 1987.

Continuing to serve in the department is Dorothy Jones (Mrs. Joe) WMU Consultant for Girls in Action/Mission Friends; Miss Lawana Roberts, WMU Consultant for Acteens; Mrs. Eula Mae Stewart, Secretary to the Director; and Kelly Bolt (Mrs. Jeff), Secretary, who took maternity leave to have Brandon Todd on June 22. The department has been without a Baptist Women/Baptist Young Women Consultant since 1978. The department was involved in many activities related to the WMU, SBC Centennial throughout the state.

The **ANNIE ARMSTRONG LOBBY** in the WMU, SBC building in Birmingham, Alabama was sponsored by Oklahoma WMU. Elva Landers (Mrs. Virgil) served as chairman of this project. We pledged \$12,768.00 to pay for the lobby. As of May 31, 1988 Oklahomans have given \$15,196.43. We are grateful to many givers for going over our pledge.

The **BAPTIST NURSING FELLOWSHIP OF OKLAHOMA** is sponsored by WMU. The purpose of the organization is to provide nurses and nursing students opportunities for worship, witnessing, ministering through personal involvement in home/foreign missions activities and provide prayer support for career missionaries. Oklahoma is one of 17 states that have reported formally organized chapters. Janet Brawley (Mrs. Don) is president and Frances Grafton is Executive Director of Oklahoma BNF.

The 82nd **ANNUAL SESSION OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION** was held November 9-10, 1987, Council Road Church, Bethany. The theme was "A Century to Celebrate . . . A Future to Fulfill." Special speakers included Christine Gregory, President of Virginia Baptist Association and past President, WMU, SBC; and missionaries, Betty Coy, Chile; Sharon Everhart, Korea; Faye Pearson, Taiwan and James Westmoreland, Southern Africa. The Oklahoma WMU President, Sue Stephens, presided during the joint session of WMU, BGCO and Pastor's Conference.

TRAINING leaders of WMU is a priority of the state WMU. The following opportunities were available.:

1. The **STATE TRAINING MEETING FOR ASSOCIATIONAL OFFICERS** WAS HELD April, 1988, First Church, Oklahoma City. Six conferences were provided for 148 associational WMU leaders from 39 associations. Mickey Martin, Administrative Consultant, WMU, SBC was guest speaker and conference leader.
2. The sixth annual **OKLAHOMA WMU CONFERENCE** was held August 11-13, 1988, Oklahoma Baptist University. Thirty-four conferences were led by five missionaries and conference leaders. For the first time a conference was offered for Spanish speaking ladies. The new Spanish WMU Manual was taught by former missionary

to Chile, Fern Bitner (Mrs. James). The Baptist Nursing Fellowship was in charge of a conference and chose "Suicide" as the topic with Mary Ann Cahill as leader. Inspiration and information for the 1988-89 WMU program was received by 312 ladies.

3. **WMU AREA TRAINING CONFERENCES** were conducted September 6-9 and 19-22 in six locations. There were four night and six day meetings. Bob Audd taught the pastors conference for the second year. Until 1987 the conference was led by the state WMU Director. A total of 1,235 attended.

Training was provided for WMU leaders through 10 conferences.

4. **HISPANIC WMU** meetings were held under the direction of Elvira Valez, WMU President of Oklahoma Spanish Fellowship.
5. **GLORIETA WMU WEEK** was attended by approximately 175 ladies from Oklahoma. Many of the regular attenders used their Glorieta budget allowance to attend the Centennial Celebration in Richmond, Virginia.
6. **RIDGECREST WMU WEEK** was attended by four ladies from Oklahoma.

STATE MISSIONS theme for 1988 was "**MULTIPLY . . . GROW**" with the scripture, "But the word of the Lord continued to grow and to be multiplied." Acts 12:24 (NASV). Emphasis continued to be on starting new missions and churches which supports the Oklahoma Growth 2000 project of having a church for every 2000 people in Oklahoma by the year 2000.

WRITERS for the program material were June Hobbs, Norman; Scott Neighbors, Pryor; Karen Young, Bartlesville; Alga Hitchcock, Altus; Laddie Adams, BGCO Brotherhood Director and Frances Grafton, BGCO WMU Director. Eula Mae Stewart, Secretary to the WMU Director, edited the program material and wrote the family prayer guide.

WRITER'S CONFERENCE for state missions was held February, 1988 with Willa Ruth Garlow (Mrs. Lyle) leading the conference. This was the second conference to provide information regarding writing skills, information concerning the allocations and focus the attention of the writers on the program emphasis—starting new missions and churches in Oklahoma.

ALLOCATIONS from the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions administered by the WMU Department are as follows:

- WMU PROFESSOR** of Sociology at Oklahoma Baptist University, Dr. Paul Rutledge, the only WMU Professor in the Southern Baptist Convention. A supplement to his salary and for research is given

through the state missions offering. Dr. Rutledge is available for pulpit supply. He speaks and teaches in state WMU meetings.

- OBU ACTEEN SCHOLARSHIPS** were given to 65 girls in 1987-88.
- SBC SEMINARY SCHOLARSHIPS** were given to 11 single Oklahoma women to attend New Orleans, Southern and Southwestern Seminaries.
- MISSIONARY GIFTS** were given to Oklahoma missionaries as follows: Twenty-six newly appointed missionaries received \$250.00 each and 240 missionaries from Oklahoma received \$50.00 at Christmas.

CAMP NUNNY-CHA-HA was repaired and improved during the year.

STAFF ORIENTATION was held for 35 teen-age girls serving the various positions during the camps in June and July.

MOTHER-DAUGHTER GIRLS IN ACTION CAMPS were held: June 2-3, 120 attending; June 3-4, 174 attending and June 10-11, 39 attending. Total attendance for the three camps was 333. This is the second year for three Mother-Daughter GA Camps.

Girls in Action members in Oklahoma have 8,799 enrolled in 791 WMU organizations in 1986-87 which indicates a gain of 287 members and 14 organizations from 1985-86.

Six **GIRLS IN ACTION/ACTEENS CAMPS** were held. A total of 714 campers attended with 46 professions of faith, 68 rededications and 40 for special service.

ACTEENS in Oklahoma have 2,745 enrolled in 329 WMU organizations in 1986-87 which indicates only a loss of 65 members and 11 organizations from 1985-86.

The **STATE ACTEENS CONFERENCE** was held March 11-12, 1988, Oklahoma Baptist University with 965 attending representing 107 churches. Program personnel included missionaries, Ida Mae Hays, Brazil and Sylvia Boothe, Home Mission Board; Virginia Holmes, First

Church, Nowata; Larry Delay, Minister of Music, First Church, Nowata; Linda Henley, Minister to Youth, First Church, Ardmore; Dave Fuller, Director, Youth Education, Religious Education Department, BGCO; Rod Masteller, President, BGCO and Pastor, Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City; Nancy Norwood, First Church, Prescott, Arizona; and Marti Solomon, Acteen Consultant, WMU, SBC.

There were eight **ACTEENS ACTIVATOR** groups that served during 1988. The assignments were as follows: Council Road Church, Bethany, inner-city missions, Houston, Texas; First Church, Harrah, resort missions, Lake Tenkiller, Cookson, Oklahoma; First Church, Pryor, associational ministries, Johnston-Marshall Association, Oklahoma; Southwest Church, Ardmore, resort missions, Spartanburg, South Carolina; Rancho Village Church, Oklahoma City, pioneer missions, Questa, New Mexico; First Church, Boise City, inner-city missions, New Orleans, Louisiana; Southeast Church, Commerce, inner-city missions, New Orleans, Louisiana; and First Church, Fort Cobb, resort missions, Branson, Missouri.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLIES are supported by the WMU Department by securing missionaries to provide campers an opportunity to become aware of the work missionaries do under appointment by the Foreign and Home Mission boards. Fifty missionaries were used during the five weeks of assemblies. The missionaries brought brief messages at the eleven o'clock services, rotated into different classes to tell of their mission work, presented a Missions Fair each week, led cabin devotionals and counseled those who made decisions.

CHILDREN'S PARK staffers are secured by the WMU Department for the five assemblies. Dorothy Jones, GA/MF Consultant, directs the Children's Park for one week in cooperation with the Religious Education Department.

VOLUNTEERS IN MISSIONS WORKSHOP was held May 14, 1988, Trinity Church, Oklahoma City with 200 attending conferences to improve their skills used in volunteer work and to hear testimonies from others who have done volunteer service. The workshop is sponsored by Cooperative Missions, Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union Departments.

The **NATIONAL MISSION PRAYER PLAN** encourages every Southern Baptist to develop the habit of praying daily for missions. It is a three year plan promoted in Oklahoma by Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Evangelism and Music Departments with the cooperation of the Baptist Messenger. Commitment cards have been signed by 3,025 people from 59 churches and two associations.

The **WMU, SBC DATED PLAN WORK GROUP** uses people from various states to plan age level curriculum and emphasis. Last year Dorothy Jones represented Oklahoma WMU.

BAPTIST WOMEN DAY sponsored by Oklahoma Baptist University was held for the seventh year to show appreciation for what WMU women in the state have done for OBU. There was a chapel program and a luncheon held for about 250 women attending.

The emphasis on Woman's Missionary Union heritage during

1987-88 will strengthen the influence of this basic church program as they continue to help the church fulfill its mission.

SALARY INFORMATION

Since the auditor's report does not give salaries of all elected employees, the salaries and benefits of department directors and associate department directors are shown here. Salaries of secretaries and other convention employees are in line with those doing similar work in the Oklahoma City area.

Salary and Fringe Benefits Explanation

Every employee receives a basic salary plus fringe benefits. The base salary may be divided as follows:

Cash

House Allowance (if ordained)

Various Annuity Board Plans

Fringe benefits include comprehensive medical insurance, long-term disability insurance, life insurance, accident insurance, dependent life insurance and retirement (10 percent of base salary). For unordained persons, the convention pays employer's part of Social Security.

Here are two samples from 1988 salary schedules. Annual base pay for department directors is \$35,107.92 and for associates \$29,841.60.

Employees who travel are reimbursed for their expenses when on convention business. The budgets carry a line item for the cost of leasing and insuring cars. There is an additional line item for other travel expenses which includes gas, oil, lodging, etc.

LONGEVITY PAY SCHEDULE

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma approved a longevity pay schedule for employees on May 15, 1978. A separate line in the budgets indicates the longevity pay in

order to clearly identify the base salary level which is the same for all employees with similar responsibilities.

Rationale Considered by Board of Directors

1. Presently, all employees are employed at the same salary for similar jobs.

2. Recognition for previous experience and skills is presently taken into account by beginning the employee at the same salary as his or her predecessor.

3. Short-term employees cost the BGCO repeated hours of training, moving expenses, etc.

4. A person becomes more valuable as he or she continues serving the BGCO.

5. There are a minimum number of positions in the BGCO and a person of ability, etc. often is limited in opportunities to move up in the organization to a higher salaried job. Longevity pay would help compensate at this point.

6. Recognition for continuous years of service could be accomplished through a longevity pay schedule that:

1) Acknowledges the completion of 3 years with a \$200 base longevity compensation.

2) Increases each succeeding year with .2 percent of the salary, per year for each year beyond three years added to the base.

7. This suggested plan gives advantage to lower salaried persons by using the \$200 base for all persons.

8. The plan also gives credibility to longevity pay for higher salaried persons by using a percent of base salary for the annual increase.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
For the Year Ended December 31, 1988**

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include all net assets and operations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, except for The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and Oklahoma Baptist University.

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Fund Accounting—Separate funds have been established to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions (restricted and endowment funds). The following funds have been established for the Convention:

- **Current Unrestricted Fund**—This fund accounts for all resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of the Convention.
- **Current Restricted Fund**—These funds account for those resources currently available for use, but expendable only for operating purposes specified by the donors.
- **Property Fund**—This fund accumulates the net investment in fixed assets and accounts for the unexpended resources contributed specifically for the purpose of acquiring or replacing land, buildings, or equipment for use in the operations of the organization. Mortgages or other liabilities relating to these assets are also included in this fund.
- **Endowment Fund**—This fund represents the principal amount of gifts and bequests accepted with the donor stipulation that the principal be maintained intact in perpetuity, until the occurrence of a specified event, or for a specified period, and that only the income from investment thereof be expended either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor.

Statement of Cash Flows—The Convention has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 95 "Statement of Cash Flows" for the year ended December 31, 1988. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, the Convention considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase to be cash equivalents.

Property and Equipment—The Convention capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of donation of \$500 or more. Depreciation was recorded on the straight-line method from dates of acquisition or donation. The lives generally used are:

Land improvements	20-40 years
Buildings	20-50 years
Furniture and office equipment	4-10 years
Automobiles and machinery	3-10 years

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Baptist General Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. The donor may designate its use by the Baptist General Convention. Such designated (restricted) contributions are recognized as revenue when the obligation imposed by the restriction has been met.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. These funds include designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions, restricted and custodial funds held for the Convention. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. administers a \$25,000 endowment fund for the benefit of the Convention's Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City. The Center received \$2,000 income from this fund during 1988. The income from this fund may be used for any purpose; however, the corpus may not be withdrawn, and therefore is not included as an asset in the accompanying financial statements.

3. Prepaid Parking Lot Expense

On September 3, 1963, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma leased a parking lot from The First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City for a period of 25 years. Consideration for the lease amounted to \$44,000, paid in advance. The lease is being amortized by annual charges to operations of \$1,760. The unamortized balance at December 31, 1987 was \$1,172.

4. Notes Payable

Bank of Oklahoma—In 1985 and 1986, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Bank of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City borrowing a total of \$500,000 for operations of the Owasso Nursing Home Project. The balance outstanding at December 31, 1987 was \$390,000. The loan was refinanced during 1988 through The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Frontier Federal Savings & Loan Association—The Convention's Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City entered into a loan agreement with Frontier Federal Savings & Loan Association, Oklahoma City. The loan is secured by certain real property. The balance outstanding at December 31, 1988 and 1987 was \$1,471 and \$2,605, respectively.

Tulsa Industrial Authority-Tulsa Baptist Village—On December 13, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance the expansion of the Tulsa Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "Promissory Note, Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Project" in the amount of \$4,500,000. The promissory note is secured by land upon which the expansion is erected (included in Note 8), the facility expansion, related equipment and rentals from tenants.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the note payable balance was \$3,206,250 and \$3,461,250, respectively. Loan repayments of \$56,250 plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due quarterly starting May 15, 1983 through August 15, 1992. The final payment of \$2,362,500 is due November 15, 1992.

Tulsa Industrial Authority-Owasso Nursing Home—On May 1, 1985, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Tulsa Industrial Authority to finance construction of the Owasso Nursing Home facility. The Authority issued its "Revenue Bonds, Series 1985 (Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center at Owasso Nursing Home Project)" in the amount of \$2,200,000. The note is secured by land upon which the facility is to be erected, the facility, related equipment, and rentals from tenants.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the notes payable balance was \$2,020,097 and \$2,055,097, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due annually starting May 1, 1987, through 1995. Interest is due semi-annually at an effective rate of approximately 9% starting November 1, 1985.

The Marshall County Development Authority—On December 28, 1982, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with the Marshall County Development Authority to finance construction of the Southern Oklahoma Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Madill Retirement Center Project, Series 1982" in the amount of \$1,200,000, secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the notes payable balance was \$910,000 and \$977,000, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount plus interest at a variable rate of 8% to 14% per annum are due semi-annually starting June 15, 1984 through December 15, 1997.

The Pontotoc County Area Authority—On May 1, 1983, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Pontotoc County Area Authority to finance construction of the Ada Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1983" in the amount of \$1,500,000. The Convention entered into supplemental loan agreements with the Authority to finance completion of the facility during 1984 and 1985. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1984" in the amount of \$150,000 on April 1, 1984 and "Series 1985" in the amount of \$625,000 on May 1, 1985. The original and supplemental loan agreements are secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the notes payable balance was \$1,943,000 and \$2,032,000, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting May 1, 1985, through May 1, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting November 1, 1983 for the original issue and May 1, 1984 for the supplemental issues.

The Cleveland Industrial Trust Authority—On June 30, 1983, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Cleveland Industrial Trust Authority to finance construction of the Cleveland Baptist Village facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1983" in the amount of \$1,500,000. During 1984 and 1985 the Convention entered into supplemental loan agreements with the Authority to finance completion of the facility. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds Retirement Village Project, Series 1984" in the amount of \$150,000 and "Series 1985" in the amount of \$625,000. The original and supplemental loan agreements are secured by certain real estate, the facility and related equipment.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the notes payable balance was \$1,943,000 and \$2,032,000, respectively. Loan repayments of a scheduled amount are due semi-annually starting June 10, 1985 through June 10, 1998. Interest is due semi-annually at a variable rate of 8 5/8% to 14% starting December 10, 1983.

Oklmulgee Baptist Village—In May 1986, the Convention accepted transfer of the Okmulgee Baptist Village from Baptist Health Care Corporation and assumed the associated liabilities. The Baptist Health Care Corporation had entered into a loan agreement with the Oklahoma Development Authority to finance construction of the Okmulgee Baptist Village facility. The note is secured by certain real estate, the facility, and related equipment.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the note payable balance was \$1,100,000 and \$1,250,000, respectively. Loan repayments of \$50,000 are due semi-annually through January 1, 1995 with a balloon payment due July 1, 1995. Interest is due semi-annually at 75% of prime.

The Baptist Health Care Corporation had also entered into a loan agreement with the Okmulgee County Housing Finance Authority which was also assumed by the Convention. The note is secured by land, building, and revenue of the project.

At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the note payable balance was \$262,462 and \$271,835, respectively. Monthly installments of principal and interest at 75% of prime are due under the note.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma—The Convention has entered into several loan agreements with The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation). These eight loans, with original amounts totaling \$2,865,448 dating from 1983, are generally secured by real estate, bear interest at rates ranging from 7% to 11%, and have a balance due of \$2,586,941 at December 31, 1988 (1987—\$2,385,020).

In addition, the Convention has assumed responsibility for the repayment of certain loans the Foundation made to various Baptist Associations in connection with Baptist Student Unions in their area. These seven loans, with original amounts totaling \$279,750 dating from 1978, are generally secured by real estate, bear interest at rates ranging from 9¼% to 11%, and have a balance due of \$215,456 at December 31, 1988 (1987—\$174,826).

5. Commitments and Contingencies

In 1988, the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority issued bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1988" totaling \$11,800,128, and entered into a capital lease with the University. The Series 1988 bonds are secured by proceeds from the lease of the main campus facilities, mortgages on the real estate comprising the campus, a municipal bond insurance policy, a letter of credit from a financial institution, and the guarantee of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The present value of the net minimum lease payments required of the University is approximately \$9,700,000.

6. Capital and Operating Lease Receivable

The Convention borrowed \$250,000 from The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the purpose of remodeling office space and the acquisition of office furnishings leased to the Foundation. Rental payments by the Foundation are equal to the debt service requirements of the Convention.

The capital portion of the lease (\$87,500) relates to the office furnishings. Rent on this portion totals \$11,934 annually. The remaining \$19,322 is considered annual space rent costs under the operating portion of the lease. The financial statements reflect a receivable of \$82,121 and \$84,856 at December 31, 1988 and 1987, respectively for the portion of such rental applicable to the office furnishings.

7. Notes Receivable

During 1985, the Convention sold a house and received a note in the original amount of \$26,700 (balance at December 31, 1988, \$24,607). The note provides for monthly payments of \$295 including interest at 10.5%. The final payment is due in January, 1991.

The Convention has a note receivable secured by land located in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, resulting from a sale of a dairy farm. The outstanding balance at December 31, 1988 was \$55,000.

During 1988, the Convention received a contribution of a note secured by a mortgage on real property. The balance on the note at December 31, 1988 was \$14,061.

8. Capital Lease Obligations

Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center—On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The duplex units were completed during 1981 at a total cost of \$322,923.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy both bond obligations. The original and supplemental leases are scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008 and April 1, 2001, respectively.

The Convention has the right to purchase both the project and duplex units at any time on or after February 1, 1988, at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City—The Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City was constructed by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (an affiliate) in 1965 and transferred to the Convention in 1974.

In 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Convention. OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The note is guaranteed by the Convention. The OCIA assumed responsibility for the construction of a 36 unit intermediate care apartment complex with cafeteria and 22 quadruplexes. The term of the lease is 10 years with quarterly payments equal to principal, premium, and interest due on next note payment date and any administrative expenses, less any surplus in the sinking fund. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time prior to the expiration of the lease term for the amount required to retire all outstanding indebtedness plus \$500.

Office Equipment—The Convention leases certain office equipment for use in its operations. The equipment which has a cost of \$123,505 has been capitalized and is being depreciated over the term of the leases.

9. Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue of \$3,828,926 and \$2,655,304 at December 31, 1988 and 1987, respectively, consists of unexpended contributions for which the donor-imposed restrictions have not been met.

Deferred life estates consist of duplexes constructed at various retirement centers on land owned by the Convention. The construction cost of these duplexes was donated to the Convention and the donors have a rent-free life estate in the duplexes. The duplexes have been capitalized by the Convention at a value approximating total construction costs, and are being depreciated over their estimated useful lives. The deferred liability for the life estates, representing future rentals to be provided, is reduced annually for rentals based upon the donor's life expectancy. At December 31, 1988 and 1987, the deferred life estates totaled \$1,553,707 and \$1,570,339, respectively.

10. Pension Plan

All employees of the Convention are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Convention contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for Convention employees for the year ended December 31, 1988 was \$490,102 (1987—\$472,290). The Convention's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

11. Change in Reporting Entity and Other Corrections

In 1988, the Convention determined that a more accurate reflection of its operations would be presented by including in its financial statements the net assets and operations of all retirement centers. Therefore, the assets, liabilities, fund balances and results of operations of the Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma and the Baptist Retirement Center, Hugo, Oklahoma have been included in the 1988 financial statements.

The effect of inclusion of these entities in the financial statements increased support and revenue over expenses for 1988 by \$370,814 and fund balances at January 1, 1988 by \$2,389,475. Of the increase to fund balances, \$278,095 is applicable to support and revenue over expenses for 1987 and has been reflected for that year; the balance of \$2,111,380 (applicable to years prior to 1987) has been credited to fund balance at January 1, 1987.

In addition, the Convention corrected the reporting of certain deferred revenue for donor-restricted contributions. This change decreased support and revenue over expenses for 1988 by \$231,728 and fund balances at January 1, 1988 by \$1,573,871. Of this amount, \$315,437 is applicable to 1987 and has been reflected as a reduction in designated contributions for that year, the balance (applicable to years prior to 1987) has been charged to fund balances at January 1, 1987.

12. Year Ended December 31, 1987 Financial Information

The amounts shown for December 31, 1987 and the year then ended in the accompanying financial statements are included to provide a basis for comparison with the year ended December 31, 1988, and present summarized totals only. Accordingly, the 1987 amounts are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

13. Refinancing of Debt Instruments

Subsequent to December 31, 1988, the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority issued its "Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Retirement Center

Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1989" in the amount of \$20,030,000. The proceeds of the bond issue were loaned to the Convention. Approximately \$16,800,000 was used to retire debt obligations of the Convention's retirement centers and nursing homes; the remainder was used to fund reserves and to pay certain fees in connection with the bond issue.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1988

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

General—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) is a private, nonprofit religious association chartered by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention) to administer funds and property received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention, and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work.

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Fund Accounting—To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund groups as follows:

Unrestricted Operating Fund—The Unrestricted Operating Fund is designed to account for resources which are expendable for support of Foundation operations and for the acquisition of equipment. This fund has no external restriction on its use or purpose, and can be used for any purpose designated by the governing board.

Property and Equipment Fund—This fund reports the carrying value of all property and equipment utilized by the Foundation in its operations, exclusive of those real properties held for investment or received under fiduciary responsibility.

Restricted Funds—Restricted funds are funds other than endowments the use of which has been restricted by outside agencies or persons (donors/grantors) for specific purposes. Such funds are generally restricted for capital improvements. Revenues of restricted funds are reported as such to the extent that expenses have been incurred for the purpose specified by the donor or grantor during the period.

Endowment and Trust Funds—The Endowment and Trust Funds are comprised of resources received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise that are subject to restrictions of the gift or trust instrument. Endowment funds account for assets received under the stipulation of the donors that the principal be invested and that only the income be used for the designated purposes until a specified time or occurrence, or in perpetuity. The trust funds require that distributions be made to the designated beneficiaries.

Endowment and Trust Funds also include revocable trusts totaling approximately \$5,300,000 at December 31, 1988 (1987—\$5,700,000).

Loan Funds—These funds represent resources restricted for loans.

Custodian Funds—These funds account for assets received by the Foundation to be held and disbursed only on instruction of the person or organization from whom they were received, as contrasted with funds held under fiduciary capacity. The receipt of such funds and the disbursement thereof are reported in the net capital additions section of the statement of support and revenue. The net balances of custodian funds are reported in the statement of assets and liabilities as amounts held for others.

General Investment Fund—This fund is an investment pool for the various funds of the Foundation. A participating fund increases or decreases ownership in the fund by the purchase or redemption of units. The fund is operated on the market value method whereby units are valued based on the relationship of total units outstanding to total assets. Investment income is allocated to participating funds based on percentage of ownership. Assets of the General Investment Fund consist primarily of church building loans, commercial stocks, and bankers acceptances.

Cash—Cash balances in excess of FDIC limits are automatically transferred into interest-bearing accounts secured by U.S. government obligations.

Property and Equipment—Major expenditures for equipment are capitalized at cost while donated property and equipment are capitalized at fair market value at the date of the gift. Depreciation of equipment in the Operating Fund is provided for over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis. No provision is made for depreciation on rental and other properties carried as investments in the Endowment and Trust Funds.

Annuities—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions which require the Foundation to pay the donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified portion of the income of these trusts is disbursed to the individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of the Baptist agencies or institutions as designated. The liability for future payments to beneficiaries is reported as a reduction of the corpus of such funds. Liabilities to annuitants totaled \$457,314 and \$359,061 at December 31, 1988 and 1987, respectively.

Appropriation for Corpus Preservation—For certain endowments, the Foundation appropriates a portion of the income to preserve the value of the corpus. Such appropriations totaled \$1,743,093 and \$1,677,514 at December 31, 1988 and 1987, respectively, and have been included as a part of the total corpus balance. This appropriation is generally for endowments with depletable assets such as mineral properties, but may also be specified for other endowments. Various methods are used to calculate the amount to be appropriated.

Reclassifications—The amounts received from trusts not administered by the Foundation for 1987 have been reclassified as capital additions in order to be consistent with reporting of such amounts in 1988.

Income Taxes—The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Statement of Cash Flows—The Foundation has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 95 "Statement of Cash Flows" for the year ended December 31, 1988. For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, the Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase to be cash equivalents. No cash flows statement is presented for the general investment fund as the activity in this fund has been reported in the various investing funds.

2. Investments

4. Fund Balances and Related Accounts

Except for the operating and property and equipment funds, the Foundation holds net assets either in fiduciary or custodial capacity, or as agent.

The Foundation has fiduciary responsibility for endowment and trust funds and loan funds. Restricted funds are generally held as agent for others. Custodian funds represent assets received by the Foundation to be disbursed only on instructions of the person or organization from whom they were received.

5. Related Parties

As disclosed in Note 1, the Foundation is affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). The majority of the funds administered by the Foundation are for the benefit of the Convention, its agencies and various other Baptist organizations. Throughout the year the Foundation makes distributions either directly to these organizations or on their behalf. The Foundation also receives funds from these organizations, both to administer for their benefit and to support the Foundation's operations.

The Foundation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Convention. Appropriations for the year ended December 31, 1988 were \$325,946 (1987—\$337,555).

The Foundation, through its General Investment Fund, makes loans to Oklahoma Southern Baptist churches to finance the purchase of land and/or construction of church buildings after the projects are completed. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the property and buildings constructed and may require personal endorsements of church members. The lives of these loans vary up to a maximum of 15 years. Interest rates are set by the Church Building Loan Committee with consideration given to the current rates available from commercial sources. The balances of church building loans outstanding at December 31, 1988 was \$36,386,839 (1987—\$38,018,204). Allowances of \$500,000 and \$750,000 uncollectible accounts were recorded as of December 31, 1988 and 1987, respectively.

At December 31, 1988, the Foundation had outstanding commitments totaling \$833,082 for church building loans.

6. Pension Plan

All employees of the Foundation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1988 was \$51,404 (1987 \$45,852). The Foundation's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

7. Capital and Operating Leases

The Foundation occupies office space in the Baptist Building, which is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, under an agreement expiring in 2001. The Convention borrowed \$250,000 from the Foundation's General Investment Fund for the purpose of remodeling the office space and for the acquisition of office furnishings for the Foundation. Rental payments by the Foundation are equal to the debt service requirements of the Convention.

The office furnishings thus acquired, totaling \$87,500, have been capitalized by the Foundation. A portion of the rental cost, totaling \$11,934 annually, is applicable to the office fur-

nishings acquired under capital lease. The remaining \$19,322 is considered annual space rent costs under the operating portion of the lease. The financial statements reflect a liability of \$81,914 and \$84,862 at December 31, 1988 and 1987, respectively, for the portion of such rental applicable to office furnishings.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
For the Year Ended July 31, 1988

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization—The Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1909 to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that Convention. Articles of Incorporation were filed February 9, 1910 and amended November 25, 1974 with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a corporation of perpetual duration without capital stock. The purpose of the corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Accrual Basis—Except for depreciation which is discussed later in this note, the financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statements of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are statements of current period financial activities. They do not purport to present the results of operations or net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacements or equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) nonmandatory transfers in all other cases.

The library is valued at an amount equal to the cost of books, periodicals and microform acquired during the past ten years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years. Library acquisitions totaled approximately \$73,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist primarily of bookstore supplies held for resale and maintenance supplies. Inventories are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Externally restricted funds may be utilized only in accordance with purposes specified by the source of such funds. This is in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and only the income be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned the assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and similar assets is accounted for in the funds owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds. Such income is accounted for in the funds to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in the current unrestricted fund.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the current unrestricted fund. Restricted gifts, grant appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Current restricted funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments which were purchased by the University are generally stated at cost. Investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at the date of acquisition or at fair market value at the date of donation. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuition, fees and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated uses are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and contributions are recognized as income when received.

2. Pledges

In July, 1987, The University Board of Trustees approved a new campaign "Bridging the Centuries," with a goal of \$15,000,000. Total pledges to date for this campaign approximated \$3,300,000, with approximately \$1,400,000 remaining uncollected at July 31, 1988. Funds raised will be used for several priority needs, including renovation of Montgomery Hall, construction of student housing, scholarships, educational equipment, operational support, and endowed faculty/staff positions.

As a result of this campaign and campaigns conducted in prior years, uncollected pledges at July 31, 1988 total \$2,644,132. These pledges, which are summarized below, are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements.

3. Loan Fund

The University received \$95,647 from the U.S. Government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans; \$77,461 has been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds. Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the program may have portions of the principal and interest forgiven.

5. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Louise M. Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and payment of trust expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The market value of the Prichard Trust corpus was \$6,246,566 at July 31, 1988.

The American National Bank and Trust Company of Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after payments of beneficiary and trust expenses. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$1,596,243 at July 31, 1988.

The assets of the above trusts are not included in the accompanying financial statements.

6. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority—Capitalized Lease Obligation

The University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities complex; to remodel the Brotherhood and W.M.U. Memorial Dormitories and the Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. The Authority obtained funds for these improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979". Assets totaling approximately \$7,400,000 have been constructed or purchased under this lease. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

The lease was amended on June 1, 1985 to obtain funds to finance a portion of the construction of the science building, married student housing, and a campus ministries center, and the renovation of Kerr Dormitory, the Theater Annex, Montgomery and Thurman Halls, and Parkway and Jent Apartments. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$5,300,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1985." The remainder of the costs of these projects is to be financed by funds raised in a special fund raising campaign and by University resources. Assets totaling approximately \$6,600,000 have been constructed, renovated or purchased under this amendment. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

On May 18, 1988, the Authority issued \$11,800,128 in new bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding bonds, Series 1988". The proceeds of these bonds were used to defease in substance the Series 1979 and Series 1985 bonds. The capitalized lease obligation with the Authority was amended during May, 1988, to allow for the change in sinking fund requirements under the new bonds. The revision of the lease agreement resulted in an accounting loss due to the increase in the present value of future lease payments of \$689,642. This loss will be offset in future years by a decrease in interest expense.

The series 1988 bonds are secured by rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities, by mortgages on specified real estate which comprises the main campus, by a guarantee from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by a municipal bond issue insurance policy issued by Financial Guaranty Insurance company, and by an irrevocable direct pay letter of credit issued by Barclays Bank PLC, New York branch. The letter of credit is scheduled to expire May 18, 1993, but is renewable on an annual basis.

7. Notes Payable

Current Unrestricted Fund

On June 30, 1988, the University borrowed \$300,000 for operating capital from Federal National Bank & Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma. The interest rate is variable based on New York Prime. The maturity date of the note is September 30, 1988.

Current Restricted Fund

The University received a program loan of \$50,000 from the Pearl M. & Julia J. Harmon Foundation on May 7, 1981. The loan was non-interest bearing and was used for energy saving expenditures. The note was paid off during the year ending July 31, 1988.

Harmon Foundation Student Loan Fund

The University received a noninterest-bearing loan in the amount of \$120,000 from the Pearl M. & Julia J. Harmon Foundation. The proceeds of the loan were used to establish a perpetual, ever-increasing loan fund for student tuition, fees and room and board charges. The loan is secured by University investments. Investment in Plant Fund

On December 30, 1982, the University entered into an agreement with the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in which the Authority agreed to loan the University up to \$400,000. To secure this loan, the University transferred certain property to the Authority. Upon repayment of the loan the property will be transferred back to the University. The proceeds of this loan were used to purchase additional real estate and to construct new student apartments. The loan is payable in 120 equal monthly principal payments of \$3,333, plus interest. The interest rate is equal to 55% of the base rate of the Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma, adjusted quarterly.

On June 24, 1987, the University borrowed \$311,550 from the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Proceeds of the loan were used to retire bonds. The loan, secured by a mortgage on certain properties held by the University, bears interest at 9.75%, adjustable annually not to exceed a change of 1% per year or a 5% change over the life of the loan. The loan will be repaid in monthly payments of \$3,300.

On July 31, 1987, the University borrowed \$95,000 from Federal National Bank & Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma. The proceeds were used to upgrade the telephone system and purchase automobiles. These loans are unsecured and the interest rate is variable based on New York prime, adjustable quarterly.
