Second Amended Articles of Incorporation of Baptist General Convention

of the State of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

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Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I-NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vicepresident, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive directortreasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure or capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than fortyone (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporation organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than fortyone (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their acting shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, action in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meetings may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Con-

vention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area: no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than fortyone (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than fortyone (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case any member misses two consecutive meetings of the board without giving advance notification to the office of the Executive Director-Treasurer, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the
remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 4. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called board meeting, the president and executive director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommendation, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the board of directors.

Section 5. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 6. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 7. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER—The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive directortreasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant:

(1) In the event the vacancy of the office of executive directortreasurer occurs between sessions of the convention, the associate executive director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the board of directors.

(2) A search committee of seven members of the board of directors shall be elected without nomination by the board of directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.

(3) When the committee has a nomination to make to the board, a meeting of the board of directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the board of directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the convention.

(4) The person elected by the board of directors shall serve until the convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.

Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of the recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.

Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of churches. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to Sept. 15. Between

the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's board of directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected convention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTEES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Program Committee, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

Section 4. A member of any convention committee shall be considered as having resigned when missing two consecutive meetings without giving advance notification to the office of Executive Director-Treasurer.

ARTICLE V—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incoporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current operations. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII-BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

Charter and Bylaws

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to

persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions. and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner: That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

ARTICLE I POWERS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the corporation (referred to in this and the following articles as "University") and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- Appoint or remove the President and other Officers of the University Corporation in accordance with these Bylaws;
- 2. Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty;
- Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board Committee;
- 4. Establish and review the educational programs of the Univer-

sity after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs or Special Committees of Review set up by the President and Chairperson of the Board in financial emergency situations.

- 5. Establish annually the budget of the University, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee;
- Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
- 7. Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the University;
- 8. Institute and promote major fund raising efforts of the University;
- 9. Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the University;
- 10. Authorize Officers or agents of the University to accept gifts for the University;
- 11. Authorize the incurring of debts by the University and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of real and personal property, tangible and intangible;
- 12. Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he/she is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself/herself. An employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

Section 2.

Vacancies in the office of the trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the State of Oklahoma or member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma, or death of a trustee, or as the result of his/her inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy in the office of trustees occur during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

In the event any member misses two (2) consectutive meetings of the Board without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the University, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by affirmative vote of the Convention then in office.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, one or more Assistant Secretaries, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board Trustees at its last meeting of the University's fiscal year. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the corporation and Vice Chairman with the office of Vice-President of the corporation. At the March Board Meeting the Board shall elect three trustees to serve as a nominating committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. These trustees shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and written ballot. The nominating committee shall nominte candidates to serve as officers of the Board at the July meeting with opportunity provided at that meeting for nominations to be made from the floor. The term of service for officers of the Board begins at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November.

Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected. Section 3.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The President of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose. The Vice President for Business Affairs of the University shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

Section 4.

The Board may appoint one or more Vice Chairmen, Assistant Secretaries, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the University Corporation. Section 5.

All Officers of the University Corporation shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such Office may have against the University.

ARTICLE IV POWERS AND DUTIES OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION OFFICERS

Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2.

The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency. Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the University and shall be as Treasurer an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He/She shall have the duty to keep or cause to be kept full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to obey all lawful orders of the Trustees, the President of the University, and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the University. He/She shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the University, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, deposit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs Committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the University. He/She shall not pay out any money unless by order of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs Committee may prescribe. He/She shall cooperate with any independent auditors or certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the University, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the University at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may duly require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the University faithfully to perform the duties of his/her office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his/her hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

ARTICLE V POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

Section 1.

The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Such tenure shall include a periodic evaluation system by the Board of Trustees and/or its agents. Such evaluation shall also set the salary and compensation for the President for the term acceptable to the Board and the President.

Section 2.

The President of the University shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the University and the official adviser to and executive agent of the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. The President of Oklahoma Baptist University must be an active member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church. He/She shall, as educational and administrative head of the University, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He/She shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts, and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws he/she shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

Section 3.

The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the Administrative and Staff Handbook then in force.

Section 4.

The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in July of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment and tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the **Faculty Handbook** then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 5.

In the event the office of President of The Oklahoma Baptist University becomes vacant, a special nominating committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board before which two weeks notice has been given concerning this needed action. The committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service, shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and secret ballot. This special nominating committee shall nominate five trustees to serve as members of the Presidential Search Committee in the next meeting of the Board of Trustees with opportunity provided for nominations to be made from the floor. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the five trustees elected, he shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Chairman of the Faculty Council, the President of the Alumni Association and the President of the Student Government Association shall serve as ex officio, non-voting members of the Search Committee.

The Search Committee shall notify in writing all members of the Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of any prospective candidates. A vita of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents a candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1.

All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in November or December, following the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of March, at which time the Board of Trustees shall adopt the budget for the University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Turstees during the month of July, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper, except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it. Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter or the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

ARTICLE VII ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING

Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the Trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by all members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or the committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1.

There may be such special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President, annually, at or following the November-December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these bylaws the Chairman of the Board and the President of the University shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least five additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. The chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees, however.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its stand-

ing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the Chairman of the Board, may request the President of the University to appoint an Administrative Officer of the University or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

Section 6.

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be organized into the following committees:

The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the Board (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary) and the Chairmen of the Administrative Committees. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall receive from the Secretary annually in July the record of attendance and participation by all Board members during the fiscal year preceding. In the event that a trustee has failed to meet the responsibilities of service, the committee shall request from the trustee an indication of his desire for continuing service on the Board or his intention to resign in light of the circumstances and report his response to the Chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Okahoma's Nomination Committee. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Administrative Committees: There shall be five standing administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, Student Development Committee, and the Spiritual Life Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the University. The Administrative Committees shall receive reports from University administrators and consider policies and recommendations regulating the life and function of the University.

Section 7. Academic Affairs Committee.

The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall, in coopertion with the President, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long range enrolment goals; advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs; recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel; and shall review matters affecting the faculty of the University; consider proposals on such matters; and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 8. Business Affairs Committee.

The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Vice President for Business Affairs shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.

Section 9. Development Committee.

The Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review and recommend fund raising and public relations programs and report to the business Affairs Committee on fund raising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting.

Section 10. Student Development Committee.

The Student Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the University, other than those relating to the spiritual life and academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required. Section 11. Spiritual Life Committee.

The Spiritual Life Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review all matters concerning religious activities and the programs that promote spiritual growth and development at Oklahoma Baptist University, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

ARTICLE IX IDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the University shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he has been made a party by reason of his being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as to which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

ARTICLE X CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such member's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his responsibilities to the University, or (b) such Trustee is aware that a member of his family (which for purposes of this paragraph shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his family) is an officer, director, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter, under consideration at a Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATOR OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the University to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the University, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the University shall be signed by such officer or agent of the University and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees shall require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the University to give bonds in amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the University.

Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the University shall be deposited to the credit of the University in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the University any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the University, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the University.

Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the University shall begin the first day of August and end the last day of July in each year.

ARTICLE XII BYLAW AMENDMENT

Section 1.

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each trustee at his/her usual place of residence.

Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Section 3.

Prior to each November/December meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

Certificate of Incorporation of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

ARTICLE I

The name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDA-TION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is Robert L. Ross, 1141 North Robinson, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73103.

ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its corporate powers; 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;

3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;

4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;

5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and

6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI Directors

There shall be sixteen (16) directors of this corporation, each of whom shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and a resident of the State of Oklahoma. The membership of this board shall include fourteen (14) laypersons and two (2) persons who are ordained ministers of the Gospel or in other church-related vocations.

In electing members of the Board of Directors, which shall be composed of both men and women, due consideration shall be given to both geographical and vocational representation. Nominees shall be presented from the various sections of the State of Oklahoma to the end that all areas of the State will have representation on the Board of Directors at all times. Prerequisite vocational qualifications for nomination of the lay Directors shall include, among other things, (1) extensive personal knowledge in business affairs which is gained from actual experience in conducting a personal business or profession; (2) an established good reputation in his or her section of the State as a sound and stable business or professional person, and (3) a person whom the general public would normally respect and rely upon, if called to mind, in making their financial investments and decisions.

Subject to the approval of the Directors of the corporation, the President shall annually appoint persons, not to exceed six (6) in number, to serve in an advisory capacity to the Board of Directors and to the committees of the Board of Directors but who shall not have the right to vote. Persons serving in an advisory capacity shall include at least one (1) representative of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and at least one (1) representative of Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE VII Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII

Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE IX

Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI Amendments to Certificate of Incorporation

This Certificate of Incorporation may be amended from time to time at any regular meeting of the Board of Directors, or at a special meeting called for that purpose, by a two-thirds majority vote of those Directors present at said meeting.

These amendments are made pursuant to a Resolution of the Board of Directors duly adopted at its regular annual meeting held on December 18, 1987, wherein said proposed amendments were set forth and were declared to be advisable. Thereafter, this Amended Certificate of Incorporation was duly adopted by two-thirds majority vote of all of the Directors, at a meeting of the Board of Directors held on January 22, 1988.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, this Amended Certificate of Incorporation has been duly executed by the officers in multiple counterparts this January 22, 1988.

Bylaws

of

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II Meetings

2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.

2.2 Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the directors shall be held during the month of December of each year, at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.

2.3 Other Meetings. A regular meeting of the directors shall be held in May of each year at a time and place and on a date to be fixed by the President and designated in the Call and Notice of the Meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairperson of the Board, the President or the Executive Committee.

2.4 The date, time and place of any meeting may be changed by resolution of the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.

2.5 Notice of Meetings. Notice of the time and place of meetings of the Board of Directors and committees shall be given by mailing such notices not less than five days before the meeting, unless a longer notice is required by law. Notice of special or called meetings shall also specify the purposes of the meeting.

ARTICLE III Officers

3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.

3.2 The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairperson of the Board. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesperson, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

4.2 Vice-Chairpersons of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

4.3 **President.** The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.

4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergencv occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairperson or one of the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.

4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

4.4 Vice-Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V Directors

5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.

5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

5.2 In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall, in compliance with Article VI of the Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation, nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and each such member shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. Recognizing that he is uniquely informed as to persons whose particular capabilities and dedication set them apart for such service, the President of the corporation, acting with the approval of the Executive Committee of the corporation, shall recommend to said Committee on Nominations those persons from the various sections of the State whom he deems qualified to serve as directors, with the full expectations that his recommendations shall be given foremost consideration by the Committee on Nominations.

5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.

5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairperson and Vice Chairpersons of the Board, and the Chairpersons of all standing committees. The President, Executive Vice President and Vice Presidents shall serve as ex-officio members without right to vote.

5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.

5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of members, and all matters properly coming before them shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE VI

Administration of Funds and Property

6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property divised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.

6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

(a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall

have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

(b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following: "THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA,

CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE VIII

Idemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer of employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.

8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

29. Executive Director-Treasurer William G. Tanner, brought his convention address. The title was "Somewhere Between Vanity Fair and Armageddon." The scripture text was Matthew 16:18.

31. Juanita Rinks, Stephanie Barbour, and Dorena Flick, Acteens, and Thomas Brewer and John Bridges, Royal Ambassadors, were introduced by Paul McCullough, associate director in the Brotherhood Department. He announced that these young people will be serving as pages throughout the convention.

32. Bill Polk, manager of the Tulsa Baptist Book Store, called attention to the book store report on page 103. Messengers and guests were invited to visit the book display set up at the church. Royce Dodd was introduced as the new director of the Western Region of Baptist Book Stores.

Upon the recommendation of Mr. Polk, the report was approved. 33. Lyle Garlow, associate executive director and director of Planning and Promotion, brought a message on the theme, "Move Up: Reach Oklahoma and the World." He moved the adoption of the Planning and Promotion report printed on pages 159-161, and it was approved.

34. Rosie Hines sang special music.

35. Rod Masteller, pastor of Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City, brought a message on the Cooperative Program. His text was from the 24th chapter of Luke.

36. Attention was directed to the Christian Life Committee report on pages 103-110 by Steve Diehl, a member of the committee and pastor of Trinity Church, Lawton. Michael Catt, chairman, had moved out of state.

Anthony Jordan, pastor of Northwest Church, Oklahoma City, was asked to speak briefly. He emphasized the importance of Oklahoma Baptists being involved in the fight against abortion which is a major social and moral issue in our state and nation. He announced a breakfast meeting on Wednesday morning. Richard Land, executive director of the Christian Life Commission, would be the speaker.

37. Business Session—Election of president and vice-presidents.

The vote was delayed until after the Board report.

45. Oklahoma Baptist University President Bob R. Agee, introduced students Scott Bostwick and Brenna Blackley for their testimonies of the influence OBU is having on their lives. Brenna, her brother and sister, triplets, are attending the university. The combined glee clubs sang, and Dr. Agee concluded the report by telling of many accomplishments of OBU and its graduates. Dr. Agee called attention to the written report of the university (see pages 121-124).

WHEREAS, Baptists have historically taken this injunction seriously both in standing alone and in joining hands with other citizens in promoting moral and civic righteousness, and

WHEREAS, the apparent unbridled immorality of much television programming poses a serious and continuous threat to the moral wellbeing of our nation, and

WHEREAS, the American Family Association (formerly the American Federation of Decency), and Clear-TV have joined hands to challenge such programming through leading a one year boycott on the purchase of all products of the Mennen and Clorox Corporations because they have been judged the most prolific sponsors of programs containing profanity, gratuitous sex, and violence, and

WHEREAS, many Southern Baptist leaders are participants in Clear-TV, and have heartily endorsed the boycott, and

WHEREAS, the use of a boycott is a proper way to address the problem in a democratic society since it does not impose censorship upon those who produce and/or sponsor such programs, but it does encourage selective purchasing on moral principles, and

WHEREAS, many television programs contain profanity, gratuitous sex, violence, and anti-Christian caricaturing of ministers and other believers,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we commend Dr. Donald Wildmon, Executive Director, American Family Association, and the hundreds of Christian leaders who comprise Clear-TV, for their moral courage in leading the boycott, and

That we support the boycott through selective purchasing this year and encourage other citizens to do so, and

That we pray for the success of the boycott as one means of diminishing the immorality of television programming which comprises a serious and continuous threat to the moral health of our nation.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 4

RESOLUTION ENCOURAGING LAWS AGAINST ABORTION

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists have historically upheld the sanctity and worth of all human life, both born and pre-born, as being created in the image of God; and

WHEREAS, the messengers to the annual meetings of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the Southern Baptist Convention durng the past decade have reaffirmed their opposition to legalized abortion except in cases where the mother's life is immediately threatened; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of the United States in the 1973 **Roe v. Wade** decision, and its progeny denied the right of the fifty state legislatures and the Congress to protect the pre-born child by law; and

WHEREAS, the Court is now willing to permit the states and the Congress once again to enact legislation regulating and restricting abortion and in the recent Supreme Court decision of Webster v. Reproductive Health Services invited the states to enact laws which will provoke a direct reconsideration of **Roe** and other previous abortion decisions, BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we the messengers of the

Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, meeting in Tulsa on November 13-15, 1989, do strongly urge the Oklahoma state legislature in its forthcoming session to enact legislation declaring that human life begins at conception and restricting the practice of induced abortion to the fullest possible extent of the Webster ruling; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we urge the staff of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Oklahoma **Baptist Messenger**, the Oklahoma Baptist Christian Life Committee, and the pastors and members of churches affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma actively to promote the passage of such legislation; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that we do reaffirm our opposition to legalized abortion, and our support of appropriate federal and state legislation and/or constitutional amendment which will prohibit abortion except to prevent the death of the mother.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution No. 5

RESOLUTION ON HOMESCHOOLING

WHEREAS, the parents of Oklahoma have historically been recognized as responsible and competent to provide education for their children, and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptists support the injunction enunciated in many Baptist church covenants and in the Baptist Faith and Message which encourages our parents to educate religiously their children, and

WHEREAS, other state legislatures have enacted laws restrictive to the free practice of home schooling, and

WHEREAS, home schooling, while it is not the only valid method of educating children, has proven to be a viable alternative to public and private education,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the messengers of the 1989 annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma support the present laws in Oklahoma providing parents freedom to home school their children, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that attempts to further restrict the right and freedom to home school children be rejected by the Oklahoma State legislature.

The resolution was approved.

Resolution 6

RESOLUTION ON THE AUTONOMY OF LOCAL CHURCHES AND THE AUTONOMY OF LOCAL BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS

WHEREAS, the Scripture clearly admonishes cooperation between God's people in accomplishing the tasks of His kingdom, and

WHEREAS, God's people in local assemblies known as churches are the primary expressions of God's ministry on earth, and

WHEREAS, Southern Baptists have historically affirmed and practiced both the autonomy of the local church and the autonomy of the local association of churches, and

WHEREAS, we recognize and affirm local Baptist churches in

association with one another to further the work of the Kingdom of God, and

WHEREAS, Baptists have historically opposed any hierarchical or connectional relationship between its churches, associatons, and conventions, and

WHEREAS, we recognize and affirm that local associations are free to determine their own requirements for messenger representation, and

WHEREAS, the Baptist Faith and Message of 1963 has been affirmed by Oklahoma Baptists in annual session as a reliable instrument to describe theological agreement;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the 1989 meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma reaffirm the long held Southern Baptist doctrine of the autonomy of local churches, separate from but in cooperation with, the local associations of Baptist Churches,

FURTHER, we affirm The Baptist Faith and Message Statement of 1963 as the standard of theological unity for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

The resolution was approved.

93. A move to adjourn prevailed.

94. Russell Cook, pastor of Clearview Church, Broken Arrow led the closing prayer.

95. The convention adjourned until 6:45 p.m. Wednesday.

Wednesday Evening Session November 15, 1989

96. Hoyt Adduddell called the closing session to order.

97. Paul Magar led in singing "Set My Soul Afire, Lord," "Rescue the Perishing," and "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."

98. John Allen, pastor of First Church, Noble selected Rom. 1:3-5 for scripture reading.

99. R. P. Thompson, pastor of West Tenth Street Church, Oklahoma City led the convention in prayer.

100. The Eastwood Church choir, under the direction of Phil Ferguson, minister of music, presented a brief concert.

101. Matthew 5:1-10 was the basis of the Bible study by Mack Roark.

102. Paul Magar led in singing "Higher Ground."

103. Dr. Tanner presented certificates of appreciation to Hoyt Aduddell, president; Anthony Jordan, first vice-president; and Bryan Glass, second vice-president for the service to the convention throughout 1989.

104. The Religious Education report was given by Bill Haggard, department director. He introduced Harry Piland, director of the Sunday School Division of the Sunday School Board, Nashville, TN. Mr. Piland presented a challenging message using as his text Joshua 14:6. Upon the recommendation of Mr. Haggard, the department report was approved. (See pages 163-165).

105. Eastwood Church choir and orchestra presented additional special music.

106. Wayne Bristow brought the closing message on the importance of Oklahoma Baptists fulfilling our evangelistic responsibilities. He chose Luke 19:10 as his text.

107. Eugene Stockwell made the following motion: That the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be authorized to transact unfinished or new business during the time the convention is not in session; and that the president and recording secretary be authorized to sign documents of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma which require signatures. The motion was seconded and carried.

108. M. H. Koonce, pastor of First Church, Bethany, led the closing prayer in the absence of Bill Eubanks who had moved out of state.

109. The convention adjourned until the 85th annual meeting, November 12-14, 1990 which is to meet at First Baptist Church, Moore.

The past year was a very successful one for BSU work in Oklahoma. More than ever before students were involved in various ministry and mission opportunities. Associations and churches continued to be very strong in their support of the ministry.

Because of a strong emphasis in Bible study and evangelism several hundred students came to know the Lord and several thousand students were involved in hundreds of Bible studies. Students still want to have an understanding of what God's Word has to say to them. Studies were led by BSU directors and students in dorms, apartments, BSU centers, fraternity and sorority houses, churches, and homes.

All over the state, the largest group of students in the history of BSU missions was chosen to serve as summer missionaries. There were 123 students who served in Oklahoma and other states across the U.S.A. Some financial support is still going to help BSU work in newer convention areas. Students are again serving as semester missionaries and Missions Service Corps volunteers doing BSU work in Oregon, Washington, California, and Hawaii. Over 1500 students participated in short-term and community mission projects.

Work continues to grow in ministries to International, American Indians, and Black students on our campuses. A special project supported by the Foreign Mission Board and Oklahoma BSUs has been put together to reach and work with Chinese students going to school in Oklahoma. God has truly opened the door for foreign missions work in our own state with over 9500 internationals going to school in our state.

New work is to begin on the campus at Bacone College in Muskogee. Jim Kutz will serve as BSU Director at Phillips University in Enid. Rusty Elkins, BSU Director at El Reno Junior College has moved to Northeastern Oklahoma State University, Tahlequah.

Christian Life Committee

As believers, we are called to be salt and light in a dark and decaying society. Thus, we must confront the questions and problems of social and personal morality. The solutions to these problems are provided in the Scripture. We cannot afford to act as a subculture, but as Francis Schaeffer said, we must "take charge of the cultured direction." This means, we must move beyond paper pronouncements and religious resolutions. As salt (Matthew 5:13) we must be willing to be rubbed into the decaying carcass of an unregenerate world system. Proverbs 28:12 (NASB) instructs us, "When the righteous triumph there is great glory, but when the wicked rise, men hide themselves." This report is offered with the hope and prayers that it will provide a catalyst for pastors, staff and lay persons to be involved in ethical and moral issues.

Abortion

The battle lines are drawn. PROLIFE and PROCHOICE are now clearly polarized. The recent Supreme Court ruling on the Webster case of Missouri did little more than muddy the water. Both sides claimed a victory. What the decision did was throw the issue of abortion back to the different state legislatures to write their own law.

Since the 1973 Roe vs Wade decision, each year 1.6 million innocent lives have been ended by abortion. Clearly abortion on demand is wrong in the eyes of God and should not be made legal. Forgotten in this are the millions of mothers who have to live with their decision to have an abortion

Now is the time for Oklahoma Baptists to speak up. Far too long our silence on public issues has let other more vocal groups get by with

"murder." Now is the time to write and call your state senators and representatives. Tell them how you feel about this curse on our society. Encourage them to make laws against abortion on demand. Other words of encouragement about participation in campaigning for candidates who are against abortion are found elsewhere in this report. You can continue to support the sanctity of life Sunday, contribute to the Mother's Day offering, support local Crisis Pregnancy Centers, and continue to pray for our nation and its leaders as we come to grips with this issue.

Alcohol and Drugs

Reportedly, Mark Twain was going through customs on his return to the United States from Europe. The customs inspector queried regarding the contents of a small suit case, and Mark Twain answered, "Clothing." Upon inspection the agent found a bottle of liquor. Holding it up he asked "And what piece of clothing is this?" Mark Twain replied, "That's my nightcap."

Use and abuse of alcohol, and other drugs, may be fodder for humor, but the fact is that the real truth about alcoholism, and drug addiction, is anything but funny. Today the problem touches far more than just a few pitiful "gutter bums" who might frequent the rescue missions. It touches men, women, and children from all stratas of life. It even touches young promising athletic stars in our Oklahoma universities.

Dr. Wm. C. Menninger of the famed Menninger Clinic wrote, "If any other disease (other than alcoholism) affected our citizens so much, a national emergency would be declared."

Thankfully, our President, and other national leaders, are waging a "War On Drugs", but this is not enough. In the first place it does little about problems related to the use of alcohol which is our number one drug problem. And further, we as Oklahoma Baptists must recognize that the battle will not be won in our state simply because Washington, D.C. is involved. If we are going to see victory Oklahoma Baptists must strengthen their resolve against alcohol and drug abuse, and must begin to wage war on the local level.

Only genuine concern and personal involvement will win against such enemies. The Bible is very clear in warning us about the evils of mind altering substances. (e.g. Proverbs 4:17; 20:1; 23:20-21, 31-32; 31:4-5) We must preach and teach these truths in our churches, homes, and schools. Along with this we must support the efforts of our police and political leaders as they work to control the availability of illegal and addictive substances.

Oklahoma Baptists must take seriously their role in the battle against purveyors of misery who care only about their profits and nothing about the people whose lives they ruin. We have the answer to the emptiness and hurt within the lives of those attracted to alcohol and drugs. Jesus

Christ can deliver them and satisfy their longing; whereas, alcohol and other drugs only destroy them and leave them empty and unfulfilled.

May God strengthen Oklahoma Baptists as we lovingly help these people find what they have been searching for.

_Christian Activism

We live in a day in which many of the issues confronting lawmakers are explicitly moral issues. The sad tragedy is that far too many Christians and many of our churches are basically silent on these issues. Somehow many of us have been duped into thinking that the separation of church and state is, by whatever definition one chooses, an excuse for Christian complacency. Many feel that all we can do is shake our heads and complain to one another about the state of current affairs. However, Bible-believing Baptists can really make a difference.

First of all, we must simply make the decision to become actively involved in the decision making process, especially with regard to moral and family issues. Strangely enough, that decision is one that has been left unmade by many Baptists. Somehow many people have thought that it is a choice between evangelism and Christian activism. That simply is not the case. Jesus said that we are the salt of the earth and many of our people in the pews are frustrated in that they have a desire to do something about matters such as abortion, gambling, pornography, etc.; but they need leadership, education, and a means by which to make a difference.

Secondly, there is the very real choice as to which issues to approach. Whereas we need to have a ready answer for virtually all moral issues, there is a need to choose our fights in terms of local church involvement as well as individual influence.

Once we've made the decision to be involved and chosen some issues upon which to take a strong stand, then we simply need to know what means we should use to approach those issues; and certainly the methods are numerous. One of the easiest, yet sometimes neglected, methods for preachers is to confront moral issues directly from the pulpit. This is a very effective way to make known the position of a local church as well as to inform the attending membership. From time to time we are encouraged to be involved in exerting pressure through a boycott. For example, the Christian Life Commission of the SBC has encouraged us to join with CLeaR-TV in a boycott of the products of the Mennen Company and the Clorox Corporation who are major sponsors of sex, violence, profanity, and anti-Christian stereotyping on television.

We can also be involved in public demonstration. One pastor of a very evangelistic church in our state was pleasantly surprised when, after announcing a lawful anti-abortion demonstration to be held the next day, he discovered over one hundred of his local church members, including grandmothers and grandfathers as well as younger adults, eagerly participating. Oftentimes we can have an impact by writing individual letters—hundreds of them—to legislators and decision makers in the private sector. In this way, vulgar and blasphemous movies can sometimes be kept out of local theatres. One legislator recently brought to our attention that senators and representatives are just people like the rest of us and are, generally speaking, very responsive to a personal phone call.

Pastors and church leaders can take the initiative to take their local representatives out to lunch and simply, with a very positive attitude, share our concerns and our desires with the lawmakers. Many legislators are not responsive to the Bible-believing Christian's position simply because they have never heard anyone express their convictions in a Christian way. We need to apply pressure when such pressure is called for, and we need to be diligent to express our appreciation and praise when a politician courageously does the right thing.

As you can see, methods can vary tremendously and that which may be appropriate in one situation might not be so in another. Different people have differing comfort zones as well, but let's not fight with one another about methods. Let's simply but firmly commit ourselves to shunning the silence and making a difference as long as our Lord gives us opportunity.

Christians and Public Decency

No one can deny the fact that we live in an age wherein the accepted standards for public appearance, behavior and language are changing. In the midst of this seemingly wholesale abandonment of biblical and even traditional decency, it is imperative that Christians stand true to Christ's call to live lives that point men to Him.

Jesus said, "Ye are the light of the world. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in heaven." (Mt. 5:14a, 16) The non-Christian community is not impressed with our religious works. They do notice, however, when Christians live lives of purity and intregity in the neighborhood, the school, and the marketplace.

The failures of well-known religious figures are held up to scorn in the media, and the Christian community is judged guilty by association in the minds of many. The remedy for this is not to simply attack the media. Rather the remedy is for Christians to become recommitted to living out biblical standards in all our public dealings, as well as privately and in the church. First century Christians faced social conditions similar to those of our day. The apostle Peter urged them to live their lives consistently under Christ's lordship. This is the way to be salt and light to our society, so that "whereas they speak evil of you, as of evildoers, they may be ashamed that falsely accuse your good conversation in Christ." (I Peter 3:16)

The greatest single agent in promoting the decline in public morals is television. Capable of much good, TV is not to be blamed for all social ills, but it is the single influence with the greatest access to the minds of people in America, especially children and young people.

Pro-Family Forum Newsletter in April 1982 reported, "Crime provides the single most recurrent theme on prime time television . . . adventure shows always involve a crime . . . always violent." The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) in 1985 stated that on an annual basis, children spend more time in front of their television sets than they spend in school. Child behavioral expert Dr. William Dietz of the AAP says the evidence from research shows "television causes violent or aggressive behavior." Researchers are studying the link between television and sexual behavior, substance abuse, and low grades.

Hollywood, with standards often too low even for prime-time TV, has virtually equal access today through pay cable and satellite systems, and the mushrooming videocassette market. Through the television medium, alcohol and drug abuse is glorified, pre- and extra-marital sex and every kind of filthy language is presented as normal and desirable, right in our living rooms.

Language used in public today illustrates how far we have departed from the biblical standard. What a few years ago could have been found only on public restroom walls, is now paraded freely through our streets and highways on bumper stickers. Cursing and taking our Lord's name in vain is considered just a part of everyday life in the marketplace and the halls of government. To listen to the conversations of children in the shopping mall or the schoolyard would be an embarrassing education for many adults!

It is time for Christian parents to re-think our use of the television. We must carefully evaluate whether to continue subscribing to pay television. We must take responsibility for regulating our childrens' access to these influences. We will give account to God for these decisions.

We call upon Oklahoma Baptists to become informed and involved in upholding righteous standards of public decency. We call upon our pastors to preach and teach with vigor and conviction the Bible's teachings relevant to these critical needs. We call upon our pastors, concerned laymen and state Baptist leaders to use every means, including legislative action, to re-establish righteous standards of appearance, behavior and language in public life. It is time to get the salt out of the salt-shaker and into the world at large!

Issues Affecting Families

Cultural changes have always directly affected the family. A brief look back at the decades of this century shows the impact of social issues. The thirties brought the great depression and parental control was strong and bound the family together. The forties and fifties saw the family go from interdependent to individualistic as parents were determined that their children would not go without as they had. During the sixties the generation gap widened and parents began to be seen as just another part of the "establishment." "Do your own thing" was the theme-song of the younger generation. In an effort to regain the rapport with their children, parents adopted the "child-centered" parenting strategy during the seventies. Parents began to avoid conflict by giving more freedom.

We now near the closing of the decade of the eighties. What issues have impacted the family during the last ten years? The continued growth in fragmented families to the point where, at current trends, by the year 2000, families with step children will out number families raising their

own children. Along with these, single parent homes and dual-income homes have greatly increased the need for quality child care. The Infant and Toddler Child Care Act and Child Development and Education Act of 1989 have been introduced in Congress with debate likely to continue into 1990. Mental illness grips thousands of Oklahomans with sixty percent of its victims living at home. Drugs and alcohol not only break up families but destroy lives. The pro-abortion forces continue to protect the choice and convenience of pregnant women with no consideration for the life of the unborn child. Recent Supreme Court decisions have allowed for this battle to be brought back to the state level.

Along with these, the attitudes of our nation regarding the definition of a family continue to change. Recently a New York State Court of Appeals ruled that a homosexual couple constitutes a family. The AIDS pandemic threatens every spectre of society. There are 1½ million active AIDS patients in the United States and by 2000, 15-20 million will be infected by the AIDS-causing HIV virus. The innocent suffer also with over 1,000 cases of AIDS reported in children under thirteen since 1981. Syphilis, another sexually transmitted disease is up 50 percent since 1980.

The change in standards in the media has greatly influenced our families and children. The combination of lower standards and the fact that the average U.S. household watches fifty hours of TV each week greatly compounds the problem.

Pornography, compulsive behavior, child abuse, commercialization of contraceptives, stress in the workplace and growing crises in the area of education; these all have taken their toll on the family.

What is the solution? Is there a solution? The answer is only in surrender to the Lordship of Jesus Christ and commitment to His liberating Word. We must:

- * Continue to maintain and proclaim the biblical standards for the family.
- * Show compassion for those who are suffering the consequences of sin along with their loved ones.
- * Develop creative ministries to touch the ever-changing circumstances that today's families face.
- * Encourage each local church to penetrate its community with the message of the gospel and ministries that demonstrate the love of Jesus.

One nationally recognized family minister has called the decade of the nineties, "the last battleground for the minds and hearts of the next generation—winner takes all." If that proves to be true, the church must not stand by and allow a secular philosophy which ignores God to take our children captive. Heeding the words of the apostle Paul we must be "steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord." (I Cor. 15:58)
Secular Humanism

Secular humanism continues to be a dominant force in American society. In order to deal with this intellectual movement, Southern Baptists need to distinguish carefully three types of humanism. (1) "Humanism" is a general term that stresses the value of human beings. Southern Baptist philosopher Richard Cunningham lists eight common values in all forms of humanism: the dignity and worth of human beings, the importance of this historical life, human freedom and responsibility, human potential for influencing the future for the better, the value of science and reason in solving problems, the good and happiness of the human family as a goal for life and society, humanitarian ethical principles, and a human rights emphasis (The Christian Faith and Its Contemporary Rivals, pp. 101-103). (2) "Christian humanism emphasizes the value of human beings in the context of the lordship of God as creator and redeemer of humanity. A biblical world view is Godcentered rather than human-centered, but the relative value of human beings can and should be affirmed by Christians.

(3) "Secular" humanism is a serious rival to Christian humanism because of the beliefs it adds to the general humanistic emphasis on human dignity and worth. After reviewing several forms of secular humanism, Norman Geisler identified five common elements in secular humanism: nontheism, naturalism, evolutionism, ethical relativism, and human self-sufficiency (Is Man the Measure? An Evaluation of Contemporary Humanism, pp. 121-122). Secular humanists generally deny or question the existence of God, argue that the natural world is a totally closed system, trace human origin to a non-purposive evolutionary process, reject absolute ethical standards, and insist that human beings can solve their problems on their own. Secular humanism can be identified as the official philosophy of groups such as the International Humanist Union, the American Humanist Association, and the American Ethical Union (Cunningham, p. 99), but it is also a mindset that prevails in many arenas of American society.

How should Southern Baptists in Oklahoma respond to secular humanism? Our response can be two-pronged. First, our positive response should be to accent the Christian view of human nature. Secular humanism has a reductionistic, narrow view of human beings. Christians need to reaffirm the biblical view of humanity as creatures created in God's image. God is interested in human welfare. David was impressed with human stature in God's sight: "What is man, that thou are mindful of him? and the son of man that thou visitest him?" (Ps. 8:4). Human beings are sinners who can be saved by God's grace. Secular humanism may have won such a large following because some Christians have not presented a realistic, comprehensive statement of human nature. We are sinners, but we are also God's creatures. Our highest dignity comes from a right relation with God. Christians insist on a God-sufficiency for living life rather than a secular self-sufficiency (Phillipians 4:13, 19). When Christians attack "humanism" in sweeping, general terms we may sound like we are rejecting humanity rather than the naturalistic, secular

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viewpoint of some humanists. True human fulfillment comes through Jesus Christ (John 10:10b).

Second, Southern Baptists should also be alert to the influence of secular humanism in American life. Through sermons, Bible studies, and other educational programs in our churches we can identify the salient tenets of secular humanism and alert our congregations to their dangers. Two examples of places where secular humanism can make inroads are our schools and the mass media. The selection of textbooks for public schools is a crucial area of Christian concern. For example, in a 1961 decision (Torcaso v. Watkins), the United States Supreme Court identified secular humanism as a religion (Geisler, p. 121). Public schools, then, should not adopt textbooks that espouse secular humanism. Parents and church leaders should become aware of the philosophical viewpoints of the textbooks in their school systems and exert a positive Christian influence on the selection of textbooks. We can also watch for the impact of secular humanism in television, radio. and movies. Television shows that advocate ethical relativism, hedonism, and a naturalistic view of life should be avoided by concerned Christians. The products of sponsors of such shows could be boycotted as well until the moral level of the shows is improved.

Christians can respond constructively and positively to secular humanism without rejecting worthwhile human activities and achievements. Working for human well-being in areas such as health, education, and human rights does not require losing sight of the Godcentered Christian worldview. Biblical faith is both pro-human and pro-God.

Report of the Board of Directors Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

The Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma states in Article VI, Section I: "There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work." The Board is made up of 64 members, plus the president, first and second vice-presidents and recording secretary, all of whom are elected by the convention. At the close of each annual meeting of the convention a motion is presented which authorizes the Board of Directors to transact unfinished business during the time that the convention is not in session; and also authorizes the president and recording secretary to sign legal papers of the convention which require signatures.

The Board of Directors met December 8, 1988, February 24 (a special called meeting), March 21, and September 12, 1989. The Board was polled twice by mail on May 19 and July 19, 1989. The Constitution requires that a general report of all Board actions be made to the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. The following report indicates the actions of the Board.

The Board is organized into four areas of work which are: administrative, business management, family care ministries and planning and promotion. The newly elected convention president, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the first and second vicepresidents met following the annual meeting and organized the Board into committees representing the four areas. Assignments were announed at the December meeting and the Board gave approval.

The Executive Committee

The Bylaws provide for an executive committee which performs only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the Board of Directors. Those who serve on this committee are the convention president, executive director-treasurer, recording secretary and the chairmen of the four board committees. No referrals were made to the executive committee during the year.

Business Management Committee

The responsibilities of the business management committee are in the areas related to the controller's office, all insurance, Baptist Building management, and oversight of all properties other than Falls Creek, Camp Hudgens and Camp Nunny-Cha-ha. Chairman was Lynn Hill, pastor of First Church, Claremore.

December Report—

1. Orientation—Since this was the first meeting of this newly formed committee, considerable time was spent receiving information on how all funds are received, managed and disbursed. Chairman Hill stated that the committee was impressed with the careful manner in which funds are handled.

2. Insurance Bids—In order to assure that the convention is receiving the maximum coverage at the minimum cost, insurance bids are received and studied periodically. This will be done during 1989.

3. **Baptist Building Renovation Study**—The committee viewed pictures of the deteriorating condition of the Baptist Building. Preventive maintenance and repairs have not been done due to the lack of funding; however, there are some situations that are becoming critical due to the lack of upkeep. During the year the committee will be studying ways to finance renovation. Any recommendations will be brought to the Board.

March Report-

1. Board Urges Renovation Study to Continue—The Board was made aware that a recent report came to the convention administration of some potentially dangerous situations in the pressroom area and other places in the Baptist Building. The Board requested Marlin Hawkins and the committee to interview and select an architectural firm to study and evaluate the repair needs of the Baptist Building. This study would also include costs, repairs, suggestions of future space needs and options for expansion. 2. **Insurance Reviewed**—Jim Cole, convention insurance counselor, met with the committee and reviewed property and casualty insurance coverage. The committee found that coverage is adquate and that rates are competitive.

September Report—

1. Vote by Mail Ratified—The Business Management Committee met May 19 after which they asked the Board of Directors to consider three recommendations:

(1) **1988 Audit**—The committee reported that the auditors carefully reviewed the convention audit with them. This audit includes all convention institutions and agencies other than The Baptist Foundation and Oklahoma Baptist University. The committee recommended that the audit be approved and printed in the convention annual for distribution to all churches.

(2) 1989 Auditor—The committee further recommended that Englebach, Roberts and Company, certified public accountants, be approved as auditors for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for 1989.

(3) Name Change—The third recommendation was that the name of the Business Management Committee be changed to Business Management and Audit Committee.

There were 54 ballots returned and all were affirmative for the three recommendations.

In the September Board meeting a motion was approved to ratify the votes of the mail ballots.

2. Report of Baptist Building Study—This is a follow-up report of the action of the Board in March.

It was reported that on May 12 a sub-committee of the Business Management Committee met to interview five architects. A full day was spent studying their proposals. A recommendation from the subcommittee to the full committee was that Nixon Associates Inc., an architectural and engineering firm, be asked to evaluate the present Baptist Building facilities, prioritize repair needs, study possible space reallocations and expansion, report requirements to bring the building up to code, and determine costs for each. Other options are being explored.

At the September meeting information was given that Nixon Associates Inc., had been employed and they had completed the study of the Baptist Building. It was found that several things needed to be done immediately for safety reasons, such as auxiliary lighting, fire and smoke alarms, and a sprinkler system in the pressroom area. The architects will be invited to the December meeting of the Board to carefully review their report. Adequate time for a very complete study is being given and recommendations will be presented at a later date.

Family Care Ministries

Stephen Murdock, a layman and member of Baptist Temple in Oklahoma City, served as chairman of the committee that gives direction to the child care and adult care ministries. Children's homes are located in Oklahoma City, Owasso, Madill, Ada, Duncan, Clinton, McAlester, Mooreland, and Boys Ranch Town near Edmond. Additional ministries include foster homes, alternatives to abortion, unwed mother programs, adoption and many others. Adult care ministries operates retirement centers at Owasso, Oklahoma City, Hugo, and villages at Ada, Madill, Cleveland and Okmulgee.

December Recommendation-

Mother's Day Offering—The Board gave approval to the 1989 Mother's Day Offering goal of \$505,505 and the theme "Their Need— Our Responsibility" was adopted.

Special Called Meeting Recommendation-

Refinancing of Certain Retirement Centers Indebtedness—February 24 there was a special called meeting of the Board to consider refinancing of the indebtedness of the retirement centers at Oklahoma City, Owasso, Ada, Cleveland, Madill and Okmulgee. The amount to be refinanced was estimated at \$21,000,000 which would include fees and other costs. It was explained that one of the major reasons for refinancing was that in 1992 a balloon note of over five million dollars would be due and in 1995 there would be another one due for over 1.8 million dollars. Also, balloon notes would be due in 1997, 1998 and 1999 of approximately \$400,000 each year. It would not be possible to meet these additional payments and the regular annual payments. After discussion it was felt that the best solution would be to refinance the total indebtedness. This would eliminate the two balloon notes and reduce the amount of the regular payments. The refinancing would be at a variable interest rate that would never be more than 14% and the floor would be 4%. The projection was that the interest would average around 6% over the twenty year period of financing.

Upon the recommendation of the Family Care Ministries Committee, the Board gave unanimous approval to the following resolution: AP-PROVING THE REFINANCING OF OUTSTANDING IN-DEBTEDNESS PERTAINING TO THE VARIOUS RETIREMENT FACILITIES OF THE CONVENTION, AUTHORIZING THE EX-ECUTIVE DIRECTOR/TREASURER WITH THE APPROVAL OF COUNSEL TO NEGOTIATE THE FINAL TERMS OF SUCH REFINANCING WITHIN SPECIFIED PARAMETERS AND AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF AGREEEMENTS PERTAINING TO THE REFINANCING.

WHEREAS, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma owns or has under its control various retirement facilities with outstanding obligations related thereto, at least a part of which are described on the December 5, 1988, Memorandum of Leo Oppenheim & Co., Inc. attached hereto; and WHEREAS, it is deemed prudent to refinance all or part of such obligations by the issuing agencies.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA, TO-WIT:

1. The refinancing of any or all of the outstanding obligations relating to the referenced retirement facilities is hereby authorized.

2. The Executive Director/Treasurer of the Convention with the approval of Counsel, is hereby authorized to negotiate the final terms of such refinancing, provided the initial average interest rate payable on the new refinancing obligations taken as a group shall not exceed 7.75% per annum.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Convention authorizes the Executive Director/Treasurer and the Secretary or Assistant Secretary to execute any and all loan, lease or guaranty agreements necessary to accomplish the foregoing refinancings and that the Executive Director/Treasurer and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such other instruments and other documents and approve such other documents and instruments including Official Statements as may be necessary to carry out the intent of and to consummate the transactions authorized by this Resolution. The Executive Director of Family Care Ministries is hereby appointed an Assistant Secretary for the purpose of this transaction.

March Report—

1. **Refinancing Update**—It was reported that the refinancing of the retirement centers would be completed the first week in April. The amount, including fees, would be \$20,030,000.

2. **Rentals Improving**—It was reported that for the first time ever in the history of Ada Baptist Village all apartments are rented and 26 of the 47 available apartments are rented at Southern Oklahoma Baptist Village at Madill.

3. Owens Retires—Announcement was made that Jack Owens would retire at the end of March as administrator at Cleveland Baptist Village.

4. Expanding Ministries—Studies are being made to determine the

feasibility of increasing from one to two maternity homes at Owasso and establishing a ministry to mentally retarded adults, a program for drug and alcohol abuse, as well as providing counselors in the area of teenage suicides.

Planning and Promotion

Chairman W. C. (Nick) Garland, pastor of First Church, Broken Arrow, led the Planning and Promotion Committee. Their responsibilities are in the areas of stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion, church administration, associational services, disaster relief, video/media and the church program departments.

December Report—

Disaster Relief Sub-Committee—Rusty Fuller was asked to serve as chairman of the Disaster Relief Sub-Committee. Robert Reed Lynn and Harry Dee Griffin are other committee members.

March Report—

Housing for Disaster Relief Equipment—The Board authorized the construction of a $60' \times 90'$ metal building with 18'' eaves at Boys Ranch Town to house the disaster relief equipment. The contract was awarded to Kinser Construction Company and the cost of the building was \$53,129.

Administrative Committee

The Administrative Committee has the assignment of work related to personnel, budget, annuity, ministerial services, **Baptist Messenger**, and Baptist Student work. Anthony Jordan, pastor of Northwest Church, Oklahoma City, served as chairman for the second year.

December Report-

Budget Sub-Committee Named—Rex Blankenship was asked to serve as chairman of the budget sub-committee for the indepth study of the proposed 1990 Cooperative Program budget. Russell Cook, Carolyn Ellenbrook, Alton Fannin and Ernie Perkins agreed to serve with Blankenship.

March Report—

Magar Becomes Director of Church Music Department—The Glenn Boyds returned to the foreign mission field leaving the position of department director vacant. Upon the committee's recommendation, Paul Magar was unanimously approved as director. He had served as associate in the department for eleven years.

September Report-

1. Vote by Mail Ratified—In July the Administrative Committee asked the Board to consider by mail two recommendations regarding a bond issue for Oklahoma Baptist University. Detailed information was furnished to the Board. The current membership of the board returned ballots by mail unanimously approving the following:

(1) Bond Issue for OBU—The Board of Trustees at Oklahoma Baptist University was authorized to borrow approximately \$3.4 million to build five new student apartment buildings (providing residence for 160 students), construct additional parking lots, acquire property on the south edge of the campus, install a new telephone system, refund an existing loan with The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and relocate the campus safety offices. The majority of the debt service will come from student housing income and the remainder will be funded from the operating budget.

(2) **Resolution Adopted**—A resolution authorizing the execution of an amendment to the guaranty agreement pertaining to the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority financing for Oklahoma Baptist University was also approved. The resolution states:

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptist University Authority proposes to issue tax exempt revenue bonds to finance miscellaneous projects for Oklahoma Baptist University and it appears necessary that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma guarantee said bonds, and in addition, guarantee certain other obligations in relation thereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, to-wit:

The Convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of an Amendment to Guaranty Agreement, from the Convention to BancFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Convention authorizes the corporate officers to execute the Amendment to Guaranty Agreement and that the President or Vice President and Recording Secretary or Assistant Recording Secretary, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such other instruments and other documents and approve such documents and instruments including Official Statements as may be necessary to carry out the intent of and to consummate the transactions authorized by this Resolution.

The Board voted to ratify the vote by mail ballot.

2. Revisions to Church Annuity Plan—The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention continues to keep the Church Annuity Plan in conformity with the changes in law and to comply with applicable regulations and rulings. In addition to changes required by law, the state convention executive directors in their meeting in February 1989 requested some revisions be made to allow churches to waive the threeyear waiting period for the purpose of member and church contributions by other than ministerial employees. This would not change the time state convention contributions would begin. Other changes simplify the administration of the plan. The Board gave approval to the changes in order to comply with the needed changes and that the Amended and Restated Church Annuity Plan be retroactive to January 1, 1989.

Recommendations

1. That the Cooperative Program objective for 1990 be \$16,500,000 to be distributed as follows: 44.25% Southern Baptist Convention and 55.75% to State, with the 44.25% to SBC to be distributed on a weekly basis.

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Oklahoma Baptist University

More than 79 years ago, a handful of visionary Oklahoma Baptists gathered to charter a Christian university that would educate the minds of young people and at the same time nurture their spirits. In 1988-89, OBU remained true to its heritage and strengthened its position as a pacesetter in the Christian higher education arena.

The University reached a significant milestone in the fall of 1988 as enrollment grew for the seventh consecutive year, pushing the headcount to an all-time record of 1,967 students. Recent enrollment increases have made OBU one of the fastest-growing four-year colleges in the Southwest.

The 10.8 percent increase over 1987's enrollment level was paced by a 22 percent rise in the size of the freshman class and significant growth in the University's off-campus Ministry Training Institute. The 1988 freshman class totaled 518 students—an increase of 94 over last year's total—and the Ministry Training Institute's 21 centers across the state showed an enrollment of 316 students, compared with 222 in 1987.

Corresponding with the climb in enrollment is a rise in the average ACT score of entering freshmen. The 1988 freshman class had an average ACT score of 20.8, compared with the previous class' average of 20.6.

More than 1,470 of OBU's 1,967 students last fall were enrolled full time. Seventy-two of Oklahoma's 77 counties were represented in the student body, which also included students from 40 other states and more than 20 foreign countries. Over 90 percent of OBU's students are Baptist. Seventy-four percent of the University's students came from Oklahoma. Texas, Colorado, and Kansas provide large numbers of OBU's out-of-state students.

OBU students and faculty members continued to reap national and international recognition for their achievements. Dr. Douglas Watson, associate professor of English, was the recipient of a Fulbright-Hayes Lectureship and a Rotary Foundation grant to teach at Rivers State University of Science and Technology in Port Harcourt, Nigeria. He served as a Reader in English at the Nigerian university during the 1988-89 school year.

Dr. Rosemarie Lones, professor of German, became the first Oklahoman to be presented a Certificate of Merit from the American Association of Teachers of German. The award, which recognizes outstanding achievement and dedication to the profession, is presented annually to 15 German language educators from across the nation.

Stephen Goforth, assistant professor of music, won second place at the Ellsworth Smith International Trumpet Competition, which was held at Ohio State University. The competition drew participants from around the world and was judged by internationally-acclaimed musicians. Ron Lewis, assistant professor of music, served as Goforth's accompanist. Two OBU seniors, Teressa Yates of Pawnee and Steve Doucette of Broken Arrow, were selected last spring to serve as Fulbright Scholars during 1989-90. Yates will study methods in foreign language teaching at the University of Marburg, and Doucette will examine the relationships between local and state representatives and their constituencies in Bavaria at the University of Augsburg. OBU has an excellent history of placing graduates in the Fulbright scholarship program. It is unusual, however, for a university the size of OBU to have two students selected for Fulbright Grants in the same year.

Two major task forces were formed during 1988 to begin studying new academic programs. A Graduate Education Task Force was appointed to examine the feasibility of establishing graduate programs. Another task force was formed to look at opportunities to further expand the University's international programs. These task forces are expected to make recommendations to the president and the board of trustees during the 1989-90 academic year.

OBU suffered a major disappointment in June when it was forced to suspend its China Exchange Program following the tragic events in Beijing. Fortunately, the University was able to get its two students and faculty member out of the country following the upheaval. Joy Washburn, a junior from Plainview, Texas, and Jean Gassett, a senior from Peyton, Colo., were serving as interns at Xinjiang University and Xinjiang Education College in Urumqi when the clashes broke out between government troops and student demonstrators. Wes Friberg, OBU's China studies coordinator in Urumqi, was also able to safely leave the country with his wife and two small children.

The University had a 17-member delegation of students and faculty members scheduled to leave in July for a four-week teaching assignment at the two Chinese universities. Dr. Agee was also scheduled to travel to China in July to meet with officials at Beijing University. The president was in the final stages of negotiations on a new graduate program to be offered by a consortium of Southern Baptist institutions at Yantai University. Administrators determined that it would be best to suspend the program for a year to allow the situation in China to stabilize. OBU is committed to maintaining this very important program, and will resume the exchange when conditions improve.

OBU's athletic program enjoyed tremendous success during the 1988-89 school year. The men's and women's cross country teams captured NAIA District 9 championships in the fall, and the men's indoor track team finished 11th at the NAIA Indoor Championships in February. The outdoor track team won its second consecutive District 9 championship in April and went on to finish eighth at the NAIA Outdoor Championships in California in May. The Bison baseball team finished fourth in the NAIA College World Series in Lewiston, Idaho, in June after winning its first District 9 championship in 23 years and its first-ever Area 3 championship. Senior pitcher David Hocking of Del City was named NAIA Player of the Year after compiling a 14-0 record. In June, OBU's men's athletic program finished 13th in the annual NAIA All-Sports Competition, which ranks the top overall sports programs at the nation's 500 NAIA-member institutions.

The academic year was capped on May 27 with the University's 75th commencement. More than 230 students graduated during the ceremony, which featured a keynote address by Congressman Wes Watkins. Two faculty members and an administrator were presented service awards during commencement. Dr. Marilyn Ogilvie, associate professor of natural science, received the Distinguished Teaching Award; John W. Parrish, vice president for institutional advancement, was given the Meritorious Service Award; and Anne Hammond, assistant professor of English/academic resources, was presented the Promising Teacher Award.

OBU's spiritual life programs continued to draw significant involvement from OBU students during 1988-89. Special emphases such as the Campus Revival in the fall and Focus Week in the spring challenged students, faculty and staff to examine their spiritual commitments. Dr. John Sullivan, executive director-treasurer of the Florida Baptist Convention, received a great response during the Campus Revival, with more than 30 students making decisions. In the spring, Focus Week featured Dr. Phil Lineberger, pastor of Richardson Heights Baptist Church in Richardson, Texas. Dr. Lineberger's sessions with students emphasized the importance of discipleship.

The 17th and 18th Hobbs Lectures were delivered by Dr. Larry McSwain, dean of the School of Theology at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and Dr. Denton Lotz, general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance, respectively.

Outreach received increased emphasis during the year, and the Baptist Student Union continued to be a major vehicle for providing students with mission, ministry and evangelistic opportunities. Among the ministries offered by the BSU are Age to Age, a nursing home ministry; the Oklahoma City Mission Center; Prison Ministry; Hope House, a halfway house for problem juveniles; Shawnee Youth Ministries; Wives of the Word, a Bible study program for wives of students; Campus Baptist Young Women; and Discipleship, which is a focal point of the BSU program.

Almost 100 OBU students devoted the summer of 1989 to serving others and sharing the Gospel around the globe. Students served in South America, Europe, Mexico, Africa and dozens of locations throughout the United States.

Construction began in July of 1989 on Montgomery Hall, a new 12,000-square-foot structure which will house the University's Campus Ministry Center. Scheduled for completion in the spring of 1990, the two-story building will feature offices for Dr. Mack Roark, vice president for religious life; Odus Compton, assistant campus minister; Guy Grimes, director of religious activities/Baptist Student Union director; and other religious life personnel. The first floor will also have a lounge/meeting area and conference rooms for the BSU and other campus religious organizations. The second floor will contain classrooms for OBU and for Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary's

Oklahoma satellite campus. The new building replaces the original, 72-year-old Montgomery Hall, which was removed from the Oval last spring. Its new location is on University Drive, just south of WMU Dormitory.

The University's five-year Bridging the Centuries Campaign neared the halfway point during the summer of 1989 with more than \$9.7 million in gifts and pledges. The campaign has a \$10 million base goal and a \$15 million victory goal. Providing a significant boost to the effort was the establishment of a \$2.6 million charitable remainder unitrust by Ardmore businessman Paul Dickinson. The gift, which is being administered by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, will be used for endowment in the School of Business. The board of trustees voted at its June meeting to honor the 94-year-old Baptist layman by naming the School of Business in his honor. Dickinson's gifts to the University over the past three years have totaled approximately \$3.4 million.

OBU continued to demonstrate financial responsibility during difficult economic times in 1988-89. The board of trustees, at its spring meeting, approved a 1989-90 budget of \$14.5 million.

The University is maintaining its commitment to attract and hire outstanding Christian scholars. Dr. Robert M. Babb, former chairman of the computer science department at Marshall University in West Virginia, was named dean of the Paul Dickinson School of Business in the spring of 1989. New faculty members for 1989 include: Dr. Oteka Ball, assistant professor of sociology/child care administration; Murray M. Blose, visiting professor of mathematics (two-year appointment); Dr. Clarence Holland, associate professor of education and director of the teacher education program; Janet Hart Johnson, instructor of piano pedagogy; Dr. Dale A. Utt, assistant professor of biology; Barry F. Vaughan, instructor of philosophy (one-year appointment); and Dr. Anna C. Walsh, assistant professor of anthropology (one-year appointment). Mrs. Nelle Agee, wife of President Agee, will serve as a parttime instructor in art and education.

The blessings of God were evident at OBU this past year. We believe the best is yet to come. With the continued financial support and prayers of Oklahoma Baptists, OBU will seek to carry out the dreams of those early Baptist pioneers who brought this university into being.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is the incorporated trust agency of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. All endowment gifts received by or for Convention agencies, institutions, departments or special projects are transferred to the Foundation for management. No convention entity holds and/or manages its own endowment funds.

Because of this unique relationship, dating back to November, 1946, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has grown to be second in size among the 29 Southern Baptist foundations in the United States. Only the Baptist Foundation of Texas is larger.

As of December 31, 1988, assets held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma reached \$72 million. New income received during the past audit year was \$6.5 million, with earnings for this period totaling \$8,963,057.

As trustee for endowment gifts for Oklahoma and Southern Baptist causes, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma distributed more than \$6 million in behalf of approximately 100 beneficiaries during the past year. These beneficiaries include churches, associations, foreign, home and state missions, Oklahoma Baptist University, the Southern Baptist Convention and individuals who receive income from trusts during their lifetime.

The ethic and philosophy of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is clearly defined by an investment policy statement adopted by the Foundation's Board of Directors in October, 1986:

"The Foundation is committed to conducting its business affairs in a manner consistent with the highest Christian moral and ethical standards taught and implied in the Scriptures, and shall in no way compromise its Christian witness in the world by investment in a company or activity which does not promote the best interests of a wholesome society. No assets held by the Foundation are invested in companies related to the liquor, tobacco or gambling industries, or companies dealing in pornographic materials, or companies promoting entertainment forms which present as norm lifestyles inconsistent with Christian morality, or companies which violate basic human rights by their manner of doing business."

The Foundation's Board of Directors is composed of 16 business and professional people from across the state, each serving a four-year term. The directors are organized into six functioning committees. These committees are: audit control, charitable giving and estate stewardship, church building loan, communication and public relations, investment, and real estate and minerals. The chairpersons of each of these committees constitute the executive committee. In addition, there are four individuals who serve as advisors to the Foundation's Board of Directors.

Board members are: Oleta S. Carmack (Hinton), William H. Clark (Duncan), Chris Condley (Muskogee), Kay Dudley (Oklahoma City), David L. Field (Enid), Frank T. Fleet (Ada), William R. Roop (Heavener), Frank Thomas (Ardmore), Joyce Shelby (Oklahoma City) and Charles Sutter (Edmond). Advisors are: Jack Brewer (Chickasha), John Crain (Tulsa), Marlin Hawkins (Oklahoma City) and Thomas Terry (Shawnee).

The Foundation's programs and day-by-day operations are administered by an executive staff consisting of Robert L. Ross, president; C. Duane Riley, executive vice president for charitable giving and estate stewardship services; James R. Smith, senior vice president for communication and public relations services; Celinda Olszewski, vice president and controller; Ronald L. Fannin, vice president for church building loans and student services; Mart Hardin, vice president for property management services; Bill Bardwell, interim director of trust administration services and Melinda Warren, director of estate stewardship services.

This report which follows is presented under sub-headings representing areas of work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

GENERAL CONVENTION OF OKLAHOMA

Investments

Assets held by the Foundation are, for the most part, invested in the General Investment Fund. More than \$60 million is presently invested in the Fund, composed of church building loans, government and corporate bonds, equities and cash equivalency instruments. An asset mix is established to provide diversity, with the earnings from each of the component parts flowing into a common distribution pool for income payment to beneficiaries based on their proportionate ownership in the Fund.

The asset mix of the Fund is: 60%-75% church building loans and/or fixed income securities and 25%-40% common stocks. There are other assets managed by the Foundation not invested in the Fund because of their nature, such as real estate properties, mineral interests and production, tax exempt bonds and other miscellaneous gifts.

Equities are managed by three professional equity management firms: Dreman Value Management, New York City; Jenswald King and Associates, Houston, Texas and Tom Johnson and Company, Oklahoma City. The Foundation's bond portfolio is managed by Gardner and Preston Moss, Inc., Boston, Mass. Shearson-Lehman and E.F. Hutton Company serves as an investment consultant to the Foundation in monitoring and reporting on the performance of the investment managers. The investment committee of the Board of Directors meets monthly to review the progress of the Foundation's investment strategy.

Trust Administration

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma administers more than 900 separate trusts. Such administration involves thousands of transactions annually including the receiving and investing of corpus contributions, paying expenses, distributing income to beneficiaries and making reports to appropriate individuals and other entities. Fiduciary responsibility requires a continuing monitoring process to assure that trust provisions are carried out and properly documented and that there is full and accurate accounting of income and expenses.

Approximately 30% of trusts administered by the Foundation require reporting tax information to Internal Revenue Service and the Oklahoma Tax Commission. These personal and trust returns are prepared by an outside accounting firm.

Computer operations are vital to efficient trust administration. Reorganization of computer files and programming information for easy accessibility is an ongoing activity. Computer reports necessary to the Foundation's functions are produced on a timely basis to assist personnel in performing their responsibilities.

Copies of "Trust Administration Policies of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," adopted by the Board of Directors in May, 1987 are available upon request. Procedures for implementation of trust administration policies are subject to continuing review and revision.

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Bill Bardwell, interim director of trust administration, supervises new trust creation and the administration of existing trusts.

Charitable Giving and Estate Stewardship Services

One cannot describe the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma without using words like "service" and "ministry." For 43 years, the Foundation has offered estate planning information and assistance to Baptist people. During this time, one or more persons from 1,034 of the approximately 1600 churches affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma have availed themselves of this special service.

Last year 1,136 persons were assisted by Foundation personnel in estate planning leading to the preparation of 1,064 wills, 56 trusts, and 16 gift annuities. Duane Riley gives direction to charitable giving services while Melinda Warren directs the estate stewardship services. The state is divided into sections for assignment. Rex Wilkinson living in Muskogee serves as an estate stewardship counselor for the eastern half of the state. Kenneth Mullins is responsible for western Oklahoma. J.C. Bunn works in the Tulsa area while Forrest Siler responds to requests in the Oklahoma City area.

Charitable giving and estate stewardship is a highly specialized area complicated by changing tax laws and emerging techniques. Therefore, professional training is an ongoing activity with the Foundation staff. Foundation personnel also relate to other professionals such as attorneys, accountants and financial planners to accomplish the charitable objectives of clients.

Much of the growth of the Foundation can be attributed to this effective ministry of charitable giving and estate planning. More importantly it helps people mature in their giving and it helps agencies, institutions, and departments of our Convention to fulfill their mission.

Church Building Loan Services

The Church Building Loan Program was established by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in 1953 as an investment strategy to provide endowment income for Baptist causes. Cooperating churches, as well as associations, institutions and agencies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma may secure long term financing at reasonable interest rates and know that their interest payments go to support Baptist causes.

The Foundation made 48 loans from August 1, 1988 through July 31, 1989. Since 1953 a total of 1,097 church building loans have been made. Loans in effect during the past 12 months produced \$3,846,663 in interest.

As Foundation assets grow the amount of money to be loaned to churches increases. Presently the Foundation will loan up to 55% of the total assets under management. Our current loan investment is \$35 million.

Loan applications are considered each month by the church building loan committee. Applications received by the first of the month are considered in the meeting that month. Interest rates are set four times each year by the committee, with the annual variable rate of interest being set in September each year for the following January through December. This allows borrowers who have chosen this type interest to schedule their new payment amount into the budget for the following year.

Communication and Public Relations Services

An effective communication program is a vital part of the ministry of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The following summary highlights the communication and public relations programs relating to the Baptist constituency, church and associational leaders, attorneys and other professionals, and the general public.

Communicating through special emphasis:

Each year two observances on the denominational calendar focus on Foundation ministries. January is observed as "Make Your Will Month," and September is designated "Baptist Foundation Month."

To mark these observances The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma prepared and mailed over 140,000 bulletin inserts to more than 1,600 churches. The inserts contained an estate stewardship theme and message and provided a form to request estate planning assistance or additional information.

These emphases are also promoted through articles in the **Baptist** Messenger, Care 'N Share, and associational newsletters. The **Baptist** Messenger devoted front cover and editorial space to promoting these events.

Another special emphasis was the State Evangelism Conference. The Foundation sponsored a booth at the Oklahoma Evangelism Conference January 23-24. Foundation staff members attended the booth, distributed and displayed materials.

Communicating with churches:

Most of the executive staff of the Foundation are ordained ministers and former pastors. Because they are gifted preachers they are busy almost every Sunday preaching in churches across the state and representing the work of the Foundation. They serve as interim pastors, preach revivals, conduct Bible studies, teach at Falls Creek, participate in World Mission Conferences and other meetings.

In addition to preaching schedules, Foundation staff members conducted Future Thrust emphases in churches throughout the year. Thirtyfour Future Thrust programs were conducted this year in which staff members spoke on the work of the Foundation in morning worship services, conducted estate planning seminars during Church Training hours, and preached on estate stewardship in evening worship services. They also met by appointment with persons interested in receiving estate planning assistance. Kay Association had an associational Future Thrust emphasis in September. Thirty-four churches completed the Future Thrust emphasis this year. They include: Enid, First; Tulsa, Eastwood; Cushing, Park Place; St. Louis, First; Tulsa, Berryhill; Lawton, Central; Webbers Falls, First; Broken Bow, First; Claremore, Memorial Heights; Cheyenne, First; Nowata, First; Valliant, First; Pittsburg, First; Okay, First; Oklahoma City, South Lindsay; Garber, First; Skiatook, First; Oleta, Sobol; Eufaula, North Fork; Mannsville, First; Haskell, First; Perkins, First; Ponca City, Sunset, Northeast, Longwood, Osage Heights, Southside; Blackwell, First; Red Rock, First; Lamont, First; Tonkawa, First and Newkirk, First.

Communicating through literature:

Distributing literature and other materials is yet another way the Foundation presents important information. Literature is distributed as staff members speak in churches or associations, and by mailings to persons requesting information. Literature is supplied to associational offices, associational Baptist Foundation representatives, pastors, staff members and directors of missions. Literature and materials are supplied in packets provided to attorneys, accountants, pastors and other professionals.

Special materials developed for the year include a fan for Falls Creek campers, a synchronized dual slide presentation and program covers for associational annual meetings. The Falls Creek fan this year featured the theme, "Unlimited Horizons." The slide presentation, "Today, Tomorrow, Until . . .," is an audio-visual presentation of Foundation history and information.

Literature pieces currently available for distribution include: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," "Do You Need A Will?," "Estate Planning, A Christian Perspective," "When Death Does Us Part," "The Personal Representative," "The Gift Annuity Contract," "The Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust," "The Charitable Remainder Unitrust," "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," "The Personal Record Album," "The Revocable Living Trust," "Policies and Regulations for Student Scholarships and Loans," and "Trust Administration Policies."

Communicating through media:

Press releases are prepared periodically for major regional and local newspapers, the **Baptist Messenger**, other denominational publications and professional publications for foundation executives and development officers. Public service announcements are prepared for use through radio and television.

The **Baptist Messenger** provides an excellent means for communicating important information to Baptist people. Articles in the state Baptist paper go to more than 110,000 subscribers weekly. These articles feature personal aspects of the Foundation's ministry, board actions, materials, programming, personnel and policy news. Reader response to these articles is significant and often leads to estate planning opportunities.

Press releases and pictures are sent to newspapers across the state regarding activities of the Foundation staff, preaching and speaking opportunities, church events, activities of the Foundation Board of Directors, retirements, anniversaries, board decisions and other Foundation news.

Communicating through ongoing programs:

The Pastor's Program is an ongoing event designed to establish communication with pastors state wide. Pastoral support is essential to Foundation activities with people in the churches. There is no substitute for the pastor's enthusiastic endorsement and his recommendation of this ministry. However, before pastors can respond in this manner, they first must have an understanding and appreciation for the purposes and programs of the Foundation.

Through the Pastor's Program, selected pastors, church staff members and others from across the state are invited to be guests of the Foundation eight different times a year. They attend an hour-anda-half orientation presenting each aspect of the work of the Foundation. Open discussion is encouraged through question-and-answer periods. Guests also attend monthly committee meetings of the Foundation's Board of Directors, as observers. Evaluations reflect the appreciation pastors have for the Christian commitment and high degree of expertise board members contribute to the work. Last year 49 pastors and other guests attended these programs.

Personal Trustee Services

The Foundation, in serving as trustee for the assets of individuals, renders more than a financial service but offers a ministry with a personal touch as well. Many trustors require assistance in other areas of their lives than the investment of funds to provide for their livelihood. They need personal attention and practical help such as transportation to doctors appointments amd assistance in filing insurance claims and tax returns. They also need a spiritual ministry of encouragement. Many of them have no family members to care for them.

Finley Tinnin, administrative assistant and former long-time pastor of Baptist Temple in Oklahoma City, regularly visits with these individuals and assists them in ways mentioned above. The Foundation presently has this kind of relationship with 35 persons across the state.

Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services

During the past year, the Foundation received six pieces of real estate valued at \$130,000. These gifts of real property, including houses, farms, commercial buildings, vacant lots and grassland, were received through wills, trusts, or outright transfers.

Management of real property is supervised by a committee of seven board members. Decisions to sell, lease, rent, or repair properties are determined according to provisions in legal documents by which properties are received and upon recommendations of the vice president for property management and mineral leasing services.

The Foundation operates no businesses or farms, but leases them to others. Grassland and farms are leased on a cash-per-acre basis or a percentage of crops produced. Residential properties are either sold or rented by the month on a cash basis. Income from the management of real properties last year totaled \$260,318.

The Foundation holds deeds to 12,000 acres of mineral interests in 61 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states. During the past year the Foundation received four units of mineral interest, all in Oklahoma. Production and bonus income for last year was \$875,802. This compares to \$643,759 in 1987.

The Foundation's mineral interest business is also supervised by a committee of seven board members. This committee meets monthly to review lease offers, bonuses, rental delays, and sales.

Student Scholarship and Loan Services

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma invests in ways other than equities, church building loans, cash equivalency instruments, and real estate. The Foundation also invests in people—especially young people involved in educational pursuits—by providing student scholarships and/or loans. There is no more effective way to shape the future than to assist in the educational preparation of bright, committed Christian young people who can significantly impact their world for Christ.

Presently the Foundation administers more than 300 scholarship and loan trusts. In most cases, donors establish within trust documents certain criteria for the determination of recipients. The majority of these grants and loans are limited to students attending Oklahoma Baptist University or Southern Baptist seminaries. However, there are a few scholarships provided through the Foundation to qualified applicants on a "funds available" basis.

During the 1988-89 school year, 182 students benefited from Foundation administered scholarships totaling \$125,385.

One hundred and thirteen low interest student loans total over \$276,000 of current investment. Loan recipients are required to pay only the interest on such loans while in school. Upon graduation or termination of their education, amortized schedules are established for repayment of loans over an extended period of time. Interest received on student loans during the past 12 months amounted to \$18,099.

Baptist Messenger and Office of Communications

Glenn A. Brown, Editor

For 77 years the **Baptist Messenger** has been the official news magazine of Oklahoma Baptists. Since its beginning in 1912, the purpose of the state paper has been to strengthen and support the work of our churches and denomination by informing, describing, interpreting and promoting matters of interest and concern to church members.

The weekly paper is the primary means for communicating news about the larger family of Baptists in Oklahoma and the only paper that details the progress of the many ministries assigned to our convention by the churches. The editor also serves as director of communications for our convention.

As of last August, 1,168 of our churches included the cost of the **Messenger** in their budgets.

In August, 1989, a promotion plan was initiated to encourage churches without the **Messenger** to begin sending it to their members on a trial basis in view of considering it for inclusion in their 1990 budgets.

The 1989 budget income and expense for the **Messenger** office was \$1.26 million. The source of income was as follows: subscriptions, 38 percent; Cooperative Program, 38 percent; special editions, 19 percent; and advertising, 5 percent.

Continued belt-tightening in local church budgets resulted in a decline in subscriptions from 114,303 in January 1989 to a low of 111,232 in July before starting the slow climb upward.

From its beginning in 1912, the **Messenger** has depended upon the verbal and financial support of the churches for its existence. That is still true today. We urge churches to continue their support by including the **Messenger** for every family in the church budget.

Office of Ministerial Services

Clyde Cain, Director

On an average Sunday in Oklahoma there are 18 pastoral changes. Nine churches become pastorless and nine churches call a pastor. In addition, there is an average of four staff changes per Sunday. One of the areas of ministry assigned to the Office of Ministerial Services is the Church-Minister relations work. This office provides assistance, through the director of missions or directly to the church, to find a pastor or staff member. A biographical resume file, with approximately four thousand resumes, is made available to churches in a confidential way. Each year, every pastorless church receives information from the Of-

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fice of Ministerial Services in the form of a packet, "On Calling a Pastor." Approximately 75 percent of all churches seeking a pastor request and receive information from this office in a given year.

Conflict ministry in the local church has become a major area of ministry in the last five years. Assistance is provided through the director of missions office or directly to the local church where conflict is of major concern within the local congregation. Efforts are made to restore fellowship.

Continuing education, a second major area of work, has experienced a very fine growth.

1. Ministry Training Institute—Twenty-one centers with approximately 350 students.

2. Southwestern Seminary Study Center at OBU—Meets on Monday and enrolls approximately 130 students.

3. Seminary Extension—Thirteen certified centers, as well as Independent Study with a total of approximately 150 students.

4. Midwestern Seminary—Doctor of Ministry program, meets in Tulsa and Oklahoma City on alternating semesters and has approximately 25 students.

Six hundred and fifty students are involved in some type of continuing education in Oklahoma.

Two other arms of continuing education include the State Bible Conference at Falls Creek in May and the Kiamichi Bible Conference at Kiamichi Assembly in August. Between three and four hundred persons were involved in these two conferences.

Woman's Missionary Union

Frances Grafton, Director October 1988—September 1989

The EMPHASIS for the year, A FUTURE TO FULFILL— LAUNCHING CENTURY 1 has focused on Woman's Missionary Union strengthening missions in the church and denomination. Ladies were encouraged to teach missions in flexible and innovative ways in order to make Southern Baptists aware of missions opportunities and responsibilities. This was reinforced with the WATCHWORD, Isaiah 48:6: "You have heard; look at all this. And you, will you not declare it? I proclaim to you new things from this time, Even hidden things which you have not known."

With gratitude for our heritage, WMU began Century 2 realizing that more was demanded in commitment, imagination, and risk in responding to the world's physical, emotional, and spiritual needs.

EULA MAE STEWART, assistant to the Oklahoma WMU director and office manager, retired June 30, 1989 after 23 years of service for Oklahoma Woman's Missionary Union. She served two years in the Religious Education Department making a total of 25 years serving Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. She has served as assistant to

two Oklahoma WMU directors and worked with six state WMU presidents. Eula Mae has been a loyal, tireless worker who has been invaluable to Oklahoma WMU. She is appreciated for what she has meant to the Lord's work and she will be missed.

The position held by Mrs. Stewart has been filled by Carol Cox (Mrs. Perry) who began work May 1, 1989. Mrs. Cox brings years of WMU experience to this important position. Dorothy Jones (Mrs. Joe) continues to serve as WMU consultant for Girls in Action and Mission Friends. Lawana Roberts continues to serve as WMU consultant for Acteens. Nita Morrison (Mrs. Don) continues to serve as receptionistsecretary, and Gail Lanier (Mrs. David) began work as a secretary in the WMU Department May 20, 1989. She replaced Kelly Bolt (Mrs. Jeff) after she transferred to The Baptist Foundation, April, 1988.

Reports indicated Oklahoma had four Acteens ACTIVATORS groups and their leaders serving in four locations during 1989.

The 1987-88 Uniform Church Letter indicated Oklahoma WMU has an **ENROLLMENT** of 36,355 in 2,890 missions organizations in 903 churches. WMU, SBC enrollment is 1,203,929.

The WMU, SBC SECOND CENTURY FUND is an endowment for the development of women's work for missions around the world. It was officially launched May 14, 1988. Contributions are conserved for investment according to the policies set by the WMU, SBC Executive Board.

The **BAPTIST NURSING FELLOWSHIP OF OKLAHOMA** provides nurses and nursing students opportunities for worship, witnessing, ministering through personal involvement in foreign, home missions activities, and provides prayer support for career missionaries. Merlyn Kelley is president and Frances Grafton is Executive Director of Oklahoma BNF.

The WMU WEEK AT GLORIETA was attended by approximately 200 ladies from Oklahoma and five attended WMU Week at Ridgecrest.

For the first time two state GIRLS IN ACTION MISSIONS VEN-TURES were held. One was held Saturday, October 1, Muskogee, Central Church and one was held Saturday, October 15, Clinton, First. A total of 429 members and leaders attended, representing 55 churches.

The EIGHTY-THIRD WOMAN'S MISSIONARY ANNUAL SES-SION was held November 14-15, 1988, Putnam City Church, Oklahoma City. In keeping with the centennial celebration the theme was "A Future to Fulfill." Dr. Wesley McCoy led the music with Rosemary Byrd accompanying at the piano. Other program personalities included James "Bo" Holland, home missionary, Oklahoma; Ted Stephens, missionary to Macao; Jeanie Wood, missionary to Mauritius; Von and Marge Worten, missionaries to Indonesia; and Catherine Allen, associate executive director, WMU, SBC. Mrs. Allen also spoke Monday evening during the joint session with the Baptist General Convention.

The STATE ACTEENS CONFERENCE was held at OBU March 10-11, 1989 with 944 attending representing 117 churches. The meeting for High School Baptist Young Men was also held on the OBU campus at the same time. The general sessions were attended by Acteens and High School Baptist Young Men. "In Harmony" was used as the theme.

VOLUNTEER IN MISSIONS WORKSHOP was held May 20, Trinity Church, Oklahoma City with 159 attending conferences to improve their skills used in volunteer work and to hear testimonies from others who have done volunteer service. The workshop is sponsored by WMU, Brotherhood, and Cooperative Missions Departments.

The **MOTHER/DAUGHTER CAMPS** were held for Girls in Action members who will enter first through third grades in the fall, and their mothers. A total of 495 attended the three two-day camps.

There were six **CAMPS** held for **GIRLS IN ACTION** and **AC-TEENS** members. A total of 754 campers attended. Decisions included 36 professions of faith, 12 special service, 83 rededications and 22 special service.

FALLS CREEK ASSEMBLIES are supported by the WMU Department. Ten foreign and home missionaries are secured to serve each of the five weeks of assemblies. The missionaries brought brief messages at the eleven o'clock services, rotated into different classes to tell of their mission work, presented a missions fair each week, led cabin devotionals and counseled those who made decisions for special service.

Woman's Missionary Union pays the travel expense for the teachers serving at Falls Creek through Sooner Alcohol Narcotic Education. And Children's Park staffers are secured by the WMU Department for the five assemblies. The **SIXTH NATIONAL ACTEENS CONVENTION** was held July 12-15, 1989, San Antonio, Texas. Five hundred and fifty-one attended from Oklahoma.

TRAINING leaders of WMU is a priority of the state WMU. Upon request assistance is given in training through the associations and churches. The following meetings presented opportunities of training—

1. The STATE ASSOCIATIONAL LEADERSHIP TRAINING was held April 28-29, First Church, Oklahoma City. A total of 124 associational WMU leaders received training. Guest conference leaders were Joyce Mitchell, Director, Interpretation Section, WMU, SBC; Sue Stephens, state WMU president; Pam Tolson, BYW director, Capital Association, and Hazel Kight, Sperry.

2. The SEVENTH ANNUAL OKLAHOMA WMU CON-FERENCE was held August 17-19, 1989, Oklahoma Baptist University. Thirty-nine conferences were led by six missionaries and conference leaders. "In His Name—Reach, Teach, Touch" was the theme for the conference. A total of 363 attended.

3. The WMU AREA TRAINING CONFERENCES were conducted September 5-22 in seven locations. There were three evening meetings and seven day meetings. A total of 1.122 attended.

The SEASON OF PRAYER and EDNA MCMILLAN OFFERING FOR STATE MISSIONS was emphasized September 10-13, 1989. The theme was "Planters With God" with the scripture, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that planteth anything, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase." I Cor. 3:6-7 (KJV).

The writers for the program material were J. R. Stogsdill, Tahlequah, adult; Sarah Zimmerman, Oklahoma City, youth; Gladys Lewis, Edmond, children; and Nina Edwards, Mustang, preschool. Eula Mae Stewart edited the program material.

A WRITERS CONFERENCE for the State Mission writers was held February, 1989. June Hobbs, Norman, led the conference.

Allocation money from the EDNA MCMILLAN OFFERING for STATE MISSIONS administered by the WMU Department are as follows:

Oklahoma WMU is the only state WMU with a WMU PRO-FESSOR. He also is Sociology Professor at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee. This position was begun in 1978 by Miss Abbie Louise Green, former Oklahoma WMU Director, Dr. Joe L. Ingram, former BGCO Executive Director-Treasurer, and William Neptune, former Interim President, OBU. Dr. Gary Farley served from 1978 through 1984. Dr. Paul Rutledge has filled the position since 1985. Dr. Rutledge resigned June, 1989 to become a professor at the University of Missouri. Dr. Bob Agee, president of OBU, will appoint a professor to this position. Through the Edna McMillan Offering for State Missions a \$10,000 allocation supplements the professor's salary and assists with research projects.

During 1988-89 SBC SEMINARY SCHOLARSHIPS were given

to 12 single Oklahoma women to attend a Southern Baptist seminary.

OBU ACTEENS SCHOLARSHIPS were given to 36 girls during 1988-89.

TRAVEL EXPENSE was paid to missionaries who spoke at associational WMU summer meetings and camps, and to state Brotherhood and WMU camps and meetings.

A GIFT of \$250 was given to newly appointed missionaries from Oklahoma and a gift of \$50 is given to each Oklahoma foreign missionary at Christmas time. Oklahoma presently has 238 missionaries serving under appointment of the Foreign Mission Board.

Gratitude goes to the State WMU President, Sue Stephens; State Secretary, Patricia Prater; associational leaders and leaders in the local churches who work together to carry on the work of Woman's Missionary Union.

Brotherhood

Laddie R. Adams, Director

October 1, 1987 SBC Brotherhood began new age grouping for men and boys. The uniform church letter was changed in 1988 to correspond. Since space is limited Basic Baptist Men, Mission Action, Witnessing and Lay Renewal which had one space each were combined. Unfortunately adequate explanation was not given to the churches to combine these four areas of work to one space. This resulted in a 47,476 decrease in 1988 leaving a total of 525,511 SBC Brotherhood enrollment. Oklahoma Brotherhood enrollment taken from the church letters showed a decrease of 1,522 in 1988 leaving a total of 16,127. Our annual report revealed we now have 573 churches reporting 364 Baptist Men's Units, 36 Baptist Young Men's Units, 73 High School Baptist Young Men's Units, and Royal Ambassadors reported 861 chapters (394 Lad, 305 Crusader, 128 Pioneer, and 34 Combined) for a total of 1,334 Brotherhood units.

February 13—planning meeting at Falls Creek for associations having 1988-1989 World Missions Conferences—16 DOMs attended. During 1988 eight associations held World Missions Conferences in 194 churches with 54,548 in attendance.

Royal Ambassador Congress

March 3-4—1,500 attended Congress, Baptist Temple, Oklahoma City. Basketball playoffs had 34 teams participate representing 21 associations.

High School Baptist Young Men

March 10-11—the FIRST annual High School Baptist Young Men's Conference held at Oklahoma Baptist University with 70 participating.

Royal Ambassador Camp

March 31-April 1-57 attended Mini Camp at Camp Hudgens.

Mayor's Prayer Breakfast

April 12—Brotherhood assisted in Mayor's Annual Prayer Breakfast where over 900 participated and 135 decisions were made.

Salt

April 28-29—43 Associational Brotherhood Officers received training at Oklahoma City, First. The approximately 500 participants were fed the closing meal from the Disaster Van by the trained volunteer Disaster Crew.

Missionary Kids Retreat

- May 5-6—30 missionary kids attended annual retreat at Camp Hudgens. Volunteers in Missions Workshop
- May 20—Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and Missions Departments conducted the Workshop, Trinity, Oklahoma City for 159 volunteers.

Senior Adult Spectacular

May 22-24-183 Senior Adults attended spectacular at Falls Creek.

Royal Ambassador University

May 25-26—the first Royal Ambassador University for nation's RA leadership held at Rhodes College, Memphis, and 11 attended from Oklahoma.

MissionsFest

June 2-3—we assisted in MissionsFest at OBU by providing transportation for Foreign Mission Board personnel and missionaries. Also enlisted flag bearers for ceremony.

Royal Ambassador Summer Camps

June 2-3 and 23-24—166 attended Lad & Dad camps at Camp Hudgens. During June and July seven weeks of RA camp had 635 campers and 245 staff. There were 285 decisions: 91 professions of faith, 130 rededications and 64 surrendered for special service.

Campers on Missions

June 23-25—the national rally was held at Guthrie for 186 rigs and 397 people. Brotherhood provided conference on Disaster Relief.

Ham Radio Fellowship

July 30—provided assistance with worship service for 20 at HamFest, Oklahoma City.

Brotherhood Leadership Training

September 14, 18, 19 and 21—eight Area Training Sessions provided training for 340 church Brotherhood leadership. Additional training and inspiration was provided in 118 other locations through the year.

Disaster Relief

First week of October 1988—21 Oklahoma Disaster Relief volunteers cooked and served over 43,000 meals following Hurricane Gilbert in Santa Catarina, Mexico. October 14-15 at the Baptist Men's Retreat, Falls Creek, training provided for 26 volunteers. Baptist General Convention Disaster Relief funds of \$3,225.00 were distributed 11-18 to 19 families following mass fires in Altus. December 8-10—14 volunteers received specialized training in Memphis. A disaster garage building was constructed at Boys Ranch that is large enough to house all disaster units as well as provide storage for food supplies and ham radio equipment. It is ideally located to quickly reach any point in the state where needed. July 31—one of the large Oklahoma Disaster Relief Units assisted by Texas and Missouri prepared and served over 1,500 evening meals at Glorieta Jericho by 15 of our volunteer crew members.

Volunteer Missions

Joe Herndon, Volunteer Projects Personnel Coordinator, reports 243 volunteers comprised of 30 teams from 50 churches worked in 16 different projects in nine states. These volunteers spent approximately \$30,972.00 of their own money to participate in these missions projects.

Weeks of Prayer

Along with Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for the three weeks of prayer (Edna McMillan, Annie Armstrong and Lottie Moon).

World Hunger

Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for World Hunger assistance to local churches and associations.

Lay Renewal

We provided trained renewal coordinators and team members for 26 Oklahoma Baptist churches that scheduled renewal events.

Cooperative Missions

Robert E. Haskins, Director

Missions originated in the heart of God. It is not something we decide to do for God. God shows us his divine purpose so that we may have a creative part in **HIS** mission. The 15 different programs and ministries listed in this report are testimonies to the faith God has put in us and the teamship involved in carrying out God's mission in Oklahoma.

Language Missions

Our cooperative mission efforts have resulted in growing ethnic/language missions/churches and ministries. This year 18 new language churches, missions, and ministries were begun. They included eight American Indian, seven Hispanic, one Filipino, and two deaf. Forty-one full-time and 21 part-time missionaries work with American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, Koreans, Laotians, Cambodians, Vietnamese, Filipinos, Thais, Malays, Indonesians, Nigerians, Jordanians, Liberians, Arabs, Iraneans, Lebanese, French, Asian Indians, Hispanics, Germans, Deaf, etc. They traveled more than one million miles.

A new Indian Church began in the Craig-Mayes Association building. They have chosen the name Coo-Y-Yah Baptist Church. Clarence Kingfisher is church planter/pastor. First Indian Baptist Church, Shawnee began an Indian Bible Study in Perkins and jointly sponsored an Indian Mission at McLoud with First Baptist Church, McLoud. Jim Jones has been called as pastor of the McLoud Indian Mission. Other new Indian missions/ministries have been started in Marland, Eufaula, Stillwater, and Oklahoma City.

Randy Colbert of Eufaula and Bill Barnett of Shawnee have been contracted to be youth and religious education consultants for Indian Churches in Oklahoma. They are available to train adult, youth, and children's leadership.

Victor Orta was appointed in January as Multi-Ethnic Missionary for the Northeastern Quadrant of Oklahoma. His primary assignment is the starting of new Hispanic congregations and ministries. Since January he has assisted new Hispanic works in Stilwell, Muskogee, and Tulsa.

Other new Hispanic missions/ministries have begun in El Reno, Anadarko, Gate, Durant, Sulphur, and Altus. Surveys are being conducted in McAlester, Oklahoma City, Tahlequah, and Hugo-Idabel area to determine the need and type ministry needed.

The first state-wide Hispanic Evangelistic Conference was cosponsored by the Missions and Evangelism Departments April 7-8, 1989 with approximately 300 in attendance. This two-day conference provided both training and inspiration for pastors and lay leadership.

The National Language Missions Conference was conducted in Oklahoma City and hosted by the Missions Department. A special 19 minute video "The Many Voices of Oklahoma" was premiered. The tape is now available for use in Oklahoma churches to give awareness to language mission needs and ministries in our state.

Blind Ministries

Three thousand cassettes have been provided Ruth Versaw to assist with a growing tape ministry for the blind. Presently, tapes are being sent to more than 500 people in the United States and 362 overseas. Letters have been received from blind people in Malawi, Central Africa, Nanjing, China, Chilanga. Letters averaging 18 per week in Braille are being received from foreign countries asking for the Word of God on tape. The "Today English Version" of the Bible on cassette and five volumes of the New Testament in braille were purchased for Leanne Bracket, a blind student at Cameron University in Lawton. Jimmy Lehew, BSU Director, presented the cassette tapes and braille New Testament to Leanne.

Campers on Mission

The National Campers on Mission Rally was hosted by the Oklahoma Chapter June 23-25 at the Fairgrounds in Guthrie. Fourteen states were represented with 187 units and 397 people. Texas had the largest representation with 44 units and 99 people. The Roberts' from Florida traveled the longest distance. Attendance at all the sessions was excellent. The program was great and there was excitement in the air over many first timers. Our Oklahoma Chapter worked long hours and did a tremendous job as hosts.

The Oklahoma Chapter has two state-wide meetings. The Spring Rally was held at Guthrie. The Fall Rally was conducted in Midwest City. Kenneth deCordova, Midwest City, served as National Rally Chairman and Bob Martin, Duncan, is state chapter president.

Resort Missions

Bo Holland, assisted by summer missionaries Kristen Clark, David Stone, and Janet Walker from Alabama, directed the Grand Lake resort ministries. Both Craig-Mayes and Northeastern Associations assisted financially. The program was enlarged to include Cherokee Park near Disney and the Blue Grass Festival at Powder Horn Park near Jay.

Denise Gore, in consultation with Bill Fuller, coordinated day cam-

ping on Lake Tenkiller. Twelve groups from Oklahoma, Texas and Missouri, and an acteen group from First Baptist Church, Harrah assisted her. A total of 900 children attended. Four evening sessions were conducted each evening in four different camp grounds. Sunday morning services were conducted in four camp grounds each Sunday. Twenty-three people made professions of faith.

Multifamily Housing Ministry

A Multifamily Housing Ministry Conference was conducted at First Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, April 28-29, with Barbara Oden of Houston, Texas leading the conference. Twelve association and church leaders were trained, from Oklahoma City and Tulsa, in "How to Begin" apartment missions.

The ministry continues in the Normandy Apartments in Tulsa. Ranch Acres Baptist Church is the sponsoring church.

A ministry was begun in the Quail Ridge Apartments, sponsored by Quail Springs Baptist Church of Oklahoma City. Allen Faries is leading the ministry, assisted by Sarah Zimmerman. Sarah is a member of the missions committee of the sponsoring church and is Assistant Editor for the **Baptist Messenger**. The Department of Missions has provided some financial assistance.

Mission Service Corps

Twenty-seven Oklahomans applied for Mission Service Corps this year and five have been assigned. Two are working in Montana in new church starts and three are serving in Oklahoma.

Rosemarie Jones of Spokane, Washington and Evelyn Cline have been assigned to the Tulsa Women's Shelter. Allen and Jewel Davis are serving with church planter strategist, "Bo" Holland in Northeastern Oklahoma in starting new churches. Ruth Versaw is serving in Oklahoma City in blind ministries. Mr. and Mrs. Herman Lackey are serving in the U.S. and overseas in lay evangelism training. Joe and Wilma Herndon of Duncan are assisting the Brotherhood Department in coordinating Brotherhood mission projects outside Oklahoma and overseas.

Four area consultants assist the State Director. Leon Postoak works with Indian Baptist Churches in Oklahoma and limited projects in the United States. Claude and LaWanda Mabery (Atoka) serve Southeastern Oklahoma; Bob Carner (Mounds) serves Northeastern Oklahoma; and Bonnie King (Marlow) serves Southwestern Oklahoma.

Construction Projects

More than 600 construction volunteers, representing nine states, including Oklahoma, assisted in 31 construction projects this year. The states other than Oklahoma assisting were: Alabama, Mississippi, Missouri, Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Georgia. The construction projects included a first unit building at Bellview, Norman; a new parsonage at Fargo; a new dining hall at Grand Lake Baptist Assembly; remodeling the gymnasium at the Baptist Mission Center in Oklahoma City; a new auditorium at Blackburn Chapel, Shawnee; replaced roof at Stonebluff near Bixby; a new fellowship hall at First Baptist Church, Stuart; remodeling First Indian, Weatherford; an addition to the Faith Baptist Church, Chouteau. Oliver Barnes, State Construction Coordinator, coordinated each of these projects.

Black Church Relations

This is a program of cooperation between Southern Baptists and National Baptists of Oklahoma. Reverend Jerone Roland and his wife Clemme were appointed this year by the Home Mission Board to serve as director of Christian Education for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention. He also serves as the Dean of the School of Religion which is located in Tulsa. He joins three other appointed missionaries who serve with the department of Black Church Relations. Verlene Farmer is the BSU Director at Langston University and teaches some courses in religion for the University. Patricia Reed is the WMU Executive Secretary for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and directs the woman's work of the convention. Clarence Shuler serves as director of the Baptist Education Center in Tulsa and provides many programs of training and education for the Black Baptist churches in the greater Tulsa Area.

Six Black Baptist students served as student summer missionaries in Oklahoma this summer. Five of these students came through the BSU of Langston University. The Langston BSU was given a trophy from the University for being the outstanding off campus organization for the 1988-89 school year.

In March 37 members of the Langston BSU went to Atlanta, Georgia for the 44th Annual National Black BSU retreat. Isaac Coleman, the Langston BSU president, was a national officer for 1988-89. He is the first student from Langston BSU to hold an office in the national BSU organization.

The Oklahoma School of Religion in Tulsa had eight education centers across the state. Over 55 courses of study were offered to nearly 550 people. Five of these centers were Minister's Training Institutes (MTI) through which nearly 150 students received college credit from Oklahoma Baptist University.

The four missionaries met in March and discussed ways in which they can cooperate in the emphasis of Move-Up Reach Oklahoma.

Church-Community Ministries

This is the Oklahoma name for the area of ministries which the Home Mission Board calls Christian Social Ministries.

Six missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the local associations are serving in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. They are: associational directors of churchcommunity ministries, Jack Bettis, Capital Association, and Richard Humble, Tulsa Association; directors of Baptist Mission Centers, Beverly Perez, Oklahoma City, and Valadean Gardner, Tulsa; Women's Shelter supervisor, Sharyan Utley, Tulsa; and Lee Martin, director of Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City.

The missionaries reported 456 professions of faith and 24 people
making decisions for special service. They delivered 456 sermons and addresses during the year.

Grace Rescue Mission reported approximately 28 per month participating in an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program called "New Life." Sixty-seven thousand, one hundred and sixty-nine meals were provided for transients and rehabilitation program people and 11,558 people were given lodging. "Tender Haven," a program to assist families, provided food and lodging for 3,258 people. This year the mission was opened during the day as a day shelter and averaged 45 people per day. The chapel as remodeled in February by volunteers.

The Baptist Mission Center, Oklahoma City, reports that 50,948 pieces of clothing were distributed to 12,054 people; 4,280 days of food were distributed to 7,325 people; \$73,062 worth of free medical care and \$4,672 worth of free dental care was provided. Twelve summer missionaries served during the summer of 1989 at the center.

The Tulsa Women's Shelter housed 218 children and 305 women during the last 12 months.

The Baptist Mission Center, Tulsa, held the Annual Youth Conference, January 27-29 with approximately 300 in attendance each day.

For 16 years a group of students from Oklahoma Baptist University have received some expense money from the Missions Department through their BSU, which made it possible for them to be involved in community ministries. Students tutor, lead in recreation, minister, counsel and do whatever ministry is needed. This year two new ministries were added to the outreach area. A student led puppet and clowning ministry team called "Light Heart" and a new evangelistic ministry called "Shawnee Serf Club" aimed at reaching youth and getting them into our local Baptist churches. At least 30 OBU students helped with a carnival in Oklahoma City at the Baptist Mission Center where several hundred children and youth were entertained.

Workers in literacy missions are continuing to be trained. On June 28-30, a Literacy Missions Workshop was held at OBU. Approximately 40 people have received training in conversational English or adult reading and writing or Alfalit literacy. All sections of the state have certified leaders who can lead workshops to train others in literacy missions. The need for literacy missions volunteers is great. Our state continues to attract internationals at an increased rate and literacy missions provides a good opportunity for sharing the gospel.

Pact

Project: Assistance for Churches in Transitional Communities (PACT) is a Home Mission Board developed program to respond to a church's request for help when it discovers itself located in a significantly changing community. PACT helps a church to rediscover its mission and to redream its dream as well as plans programs for reaching and ministering to the people in the church and its community.

Bob Lovejoy is the state PACT coordinator. Three churches have received consultation this year. Contact the Missions Department for more information or assistance.

Student Summer Missions

Twenty-nine student summer missionaries served in missions all across Oklahoma during the summer of 1989. They served in rural, inner city, resort, metropolitan and general missions in 13 different areas of the state. Their work included surveys, Vacation Bible School, backyard Bible clubs, mission center activities, resort missions, counselors in camps, children's homes, and a host of other responsibilities. Some of the students made commitments to full-time Christian service during the summer.

Interfaith Witness

One conference was held in the state May 30-31, with 51 people receiving training toward becoming certified Interfaith Witness Associates. Their training in the beliefs of Mormons, New Age Movement and Satanism equips them to lead awareness conferences and to share how Christians can effectively witness to other religious groups.

Hunger Funds

Fifty-seven thousand, six hundred anf forty-six dollars from the Home Mission Board hunger funds have been channeled throughout the state to help the hungry in Oklahoma during this time of economic slowdown.

Chaplaincy

Chaplaincy, both military and civilian, has a long and intriguing history. The sick, the wounded, the imprisoned and the institutionalized have been spiritually ministered to by concerned chaplains. Today, 147 chaplains serve in career and volunteer chaplaincy ministries in Oklahoma.

One of the exciting new chaplaincy ministries is the State Fair in Oklahoma City. Seventy-three volunteer chaplains made 6,120 personal contacts with 1,303 being one-on-one counseling sessions.

Joe Williams, Chaplaincy Director for the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, assisted the Oklahoma County Sheriff's Office in establishing a chaplaincy ministry along with several other law enforcement agencies in the state. He has also assisted the Bethany Hospital in beginning a Chaplaincy Program.

A retreat was provided for chaplains and spouses in September at the Falls Creek Conference Center. A Chaplains' luncheon was held in November in Tulsa. Quarterly meetings were conducted with the Chaplaincy Advisory Committee.

A mobile unit for specialized chaplaincy ministries has been donated to the Missions Department. The unit is presently being repaired, renovated and made usable for a mobile chapel to be used around the state at truck stops, special events, prison facilities, and to be made available for disaster emergencies.

An adult study on Satanism was coordinated by the Chaplaincy Director and taught at Falls Creek in which there were 654 people involved.

Church Extension

New Church/Mission Starts

The following new church/mission starts and preaching points are in addition to those presented in the Language Mission report. they include Wimer Baptist Mission in Rogers Association, sponsored by First Baptist Church, Lenapah. The Wimer Mission began in February with 74 persons present in the first service (40 from the sponsoring church). Director of Missions, Weldon Foster, and Nowata County churches assisted the Lenapah church in distributing promotional leaflets and preparing the facility for worship. One adult was saved during the first service.

Emmanuel Baptist Church of Edmond started Hope Community Church in North Edmond. Pastor John Meador also preaches at the Hope Church. The Hope Church, which meets in a theatre, had 82 persons present in the first service on April 30. Pastor Meador and Emmanuel Church placed 3,000 phone calls to homes in North Edmond and compiled a mailing list of 400 families who expressed interest in receiving additional information. Mail-outs were sent four weeks in-arow giving information about the new church and the date, time and place for the first service. Hope Church got off to a good start. Attendance has remained good.

Truelove Baptist Church of Spencer is a new black congregation in Capital Association sponsored by Dixon Baptist Church. Calvin Muse is pastor of Truelove. Seventy were enrolled in Vacation Bible School. Sunday School average attendance is 45. First Baptist Church, Spencer, deeded their building and property to Capital Baptist Association who in turn made it available for starting Truelove Baptist Church.

New Faith Baptist Church of Muskogee is another new black congregation. Kyle White is pastor.

Bethany, First Baptist Church, where Matthew Koonce is pastor, has voted to sponsor a new black congregation. A pastor has been approved and the first service will be conducted upon completion of plans for a meeting place.

Other new congregations this year include the Osage Mission of Sunset Baptist Church, Ponca City; Harrah Mission of First Baptist Church, Harrah; Trinity Fellowship Baptist Church, presently under the watchcare of East Central Baptist Association; Lahoma Baptist Mission in Perry Association which is sponsored by First Baptist Church, ringwood; and Calvary Baptist Church, Terral, which began March 26 with 33 persons present. The Terral Church plans to petition Mullins Association for membership.

New preaching points this year include Indian Hills Resort and Horse Creek Resort on Grand Lake in Northeastern Association. Services are conducted by James "Bo" Holland, Church Planter for Northeastern Oklahoma. Charles Remple, pastor at Langley in Northeastern Association, conducts services at Cherokee State Park on Grand Lake. In Craig-Mayes Association, another preaching point has been established at Green Country Family Resort. An Apartment Ministry was begun this summer in the Quail Ridge Apartments and sponsored by Quail Springs Baptist Church in Oklahoma City.

The following missions were constituted as churches this year: Faith Baptist Church in Banner Association; Bellevue Baptist Church, Blanchard, in Union Association; and Canadian Valley Mission in Central Association. Canadian Valley was a mission of Chisholm Heights, Mustang.

A combined report of Language and Church Extension reveals 31 new churches/missions and mission ministries.

Mission Sites Purchased

The Cooperative Missions Department gave assistance in the purchase of three mission property sites this year. The Edna McMillan State Mission Offering made this assistance possible.

Southern Hills Baptist Church of Oklahoma City purchased 10 acres at 134th and Pennsylvania in Southwest Oklahoma City. Pastor Jerry Fielder explained that the mission site has a 400 ft. frontage and is located in a projected growth area.

Kay Baptist Association, under the leadership of Cliff Fite, Director of Missions, purchased a 4.9 acre site with a 500 ft. frontage. The property is located on U.S. 60 and Indian Hills Road in Osage County. Sunset Baptist Church of Ponca City has voted to start the new work. Pastor David Waganer and the Sunset Church utilized a PRAXIS team to assist them in church starting ministries. Mobile units have been purchased for temporary facilities. A church starting revival has been planned for this fall.

Henderson Hills Baptist Church in Edmond purchased an 11 acre site with a 305 ft. frontage on the south side of Sorghum Mill Road (N.E. 234th) about ¼ mile east of Broadway. Capital Baptist Association and the Cooperative Missions Department of the BGCO assisted in the property purchase.

Church Starting PROBEs

A PROBE is an intensive field study of an association to determine potential new work needs. Some have called PROBE a "sophisticated windshield survey" or a "conference on wheels." The PROBE utilizes guest church extension consultants who work with local teams of pastors and associational leaders. The teams study the background data and research materials prepared and examine assigned areas to discover church starting needs. The PROBE emphasizes the need for new churches/missions; however, other mission needs are also discovered.

The Cooperative Missions Department helped plan and assist in three church starting PROBEs. The PROBEs were conducted in Banner, Craig-Mayes and Commanche-Cotton Associations. Sixteen participants on four teams discoverd 16 areas where mission ministries or new churches/missions are needed in Banner Association. In Craig-Mayes Association, 26 participants on five teams discoverd 17 such needs. In Commanche-Cotton Association, 27 participants on four teams located 31 needs for mission ministries or new churches/missions. PROBE information indicated that less than 10% of the population in these three associations is active in Southern Baptist churches.

Church Starting Team

Jim and Eloise Murphy, students at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary were approved as a church starting (PRAXIS) team to serve during the summer in Kay Baptist Association. The Murphys were assigned to Pastor David Waganer and Sunset Baptist Church of Ponca City. They were involved in church starting projects such as home Bible studies, door-to-door visitation, community survey, mission Vacation Bible School, compilation of a prospect file, community cultivative events, bulk mail-outs and numerous other activities.

Church Starting Conference

A "Growth 2000" Church Starting Conference was conducted March 2-3 at Kelham Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. The conference provided training in starting new churches/mission. Thad Hamilton, from the Evangelism Department of the Home Mission Board, and Wayne Bristow, Evangelism Director for the BGCO, shared information and materials on how to start churches with revivals. Floyd Tidsworth, Home Mission Board consultant, presented methods for starting churches in mobile home parks. He noted that it is often possible to start a church in a mobile home park that has 100 or more homes. Boyd Rayburn, Church Planter for Union Baptist Association, gave practical suggestions on how to sponsor a mission. Kenneth Neibel, Church Extension Consultant with the Home Mission Board, discussed the use of the telephone and mail-outs in starting new churches/missions. The 56 conferrees also heard personal testimonies on new church starts and viewed church starting films.

Missions Development Programs

The term "Missions Committee" has been replaced by "Missions Development Council" in both the church and associational organizations. The Missions Development Council is responsible for assessing mission needs and discovering ways to meet those needs.

This year, orientation and/or training was completed in Union, Caddo and North Canadian Associations in regard to the Associational Missions Development Council. A.M.D.P. materials were mailed on request to Salt Fork and Northeastern Associations for orientation or training of council members. Contact Donald Brent for information or training in the Associational Missions Development Program.

Specialized Conference

The Church Extension Consultant conducted two conferences in San Bois Association for churches experiencing plateau and/or decline. Church Planters Approved

Commanche-Cotton and Tulsa Baptist Associations approved church planter positions. Church planter personnel should be secured this year.

Church Music

Paul Magar, Director

Events sponsored by the Department of Church Music in 1988-89 included: Five Area Hymn Playing Festivals, January 21 at First Baptist, Enid; Northwest Baptist, Oklahoma City; First Baptist, McAlester; Skelly Drive Baptist, Tulsa; First Baptist, Ardmore. State BEMA Workshop, February 2-3, Oklahoma Baptist University. State Youth Choir Festival, First Baptist, Tulsa, February 24-25. State Senior Adult Singin' and Praisin' Meeting, First Baptist, Norman, April 13-14. State Young Musicians' Festival, April 22, Oklahoma City. State Handbell Festival, April 8, Exchange Avenue Baptist, Oklahoma City. State Training Meeting for Associational Officers, Oklahoma City, April 28-29. State Methods and Materials Conferences, August 21-22, Olivet Baptist, Oklahoma City, and Southern Hills Baptist, Tulsa. Bi-Vocational and Part-time/Volunteer Song Leaders and Accompanists Retreat, Falls Creek, September 8-9.

Southern Baptist Leadership Training

We also promoted these church music training opportunities: Southern Baptist Church Music Conference, Las Vegas, NV, June 11-12; Church Music Week at Ridgecrest, June 17-23, and Glorieta, July 8-14; Music Conference, Baylor University, July 31-August 3.

Supportive Help

We are happy to support the other agencies and departments of our convention. We have had the privilege of assisting 10 of our departments and agencies in planning and carrying out their programs.

Singing Churchmen

We had 127 men enrolled in the organization this year with eight performances and rehearsal clinics within the state. We also sang at the Southern Baptist Church Music Conference in Las Vegas, NV. We encourage all full time ministers of music to be a part of this organization.

Falls Creek

Over 1,200 young people and adults participated in the choir and instrumental ensemble during the five weeks. This year all the choral directors were from Oklahoma Baptist churches: Max Pyron, First, Marlow; Dan Heath, Emmanuel, Enid; James D. Woodward, Oklahoma Baptist University; David Scherler, First, Bartlesville; Tom Willoughby, First, Lawton. Instrumental directors were Rusty Stowe, Exchange Avenue Baptist, Oklahoma City; Susan Clothier, graduate student at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, TX; Sim Flora, Oklahoma Baptist University.

Readin' and Singin' Schools

We had one five week school in Arbuckle association with approximately 15 enrolled. Directors of missions and associational music directors are encouraged to provide this type of training to help church members be better prepared to aid in their own music ministries.

Singing ChurchWomen of Oklahoma

A singing group for women in Oklahoma Baptist churches has been organized this summer. We have 200 women who will participate in two choirs. They will sing two times this year and will also sing with The Singing Churchmen at the state convention in Tulsa in November. James D. Woodward will direct both groups. We are excited about the possibilities of this group.

Music in Worship Workshops

These workshops are planned for those who participate in worship planning in the churches: pastor, minister of music, accompanists. This year they have been hosted by East Central, Craig-Mayes, Central, and Northeastern associations.

Statistical Report

Oklahoma Baptist churches had a 1.0 decrease in the music ministry enrollment this past year. However, in the past five years we have had a 2.8 increase and a 25.6 increase in the past 10 years. This increase would be greater if all our churches who had music ministries would report on the annual church letter. We had 78% reporting in 1988. We continue to urge all churches to make this report.

Your Church Music Department is made up of Paul Magar, director; Mary June Tabor, assistant; Judy Enegren, secretary.

Paul Magar was elected as director of the Department of Church Music in March, 1989, succeeding Glenn Boyd who returned to Kenya, East Africa, as music missionary.

Historical Commission

The 1988-89 year has been marked by progress in a number of areas. Special and ongoing projects have been profitable. The Baptist public in Oklahoma and elsewhere is growing in its use of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection at OBU.

Awards

Four standing awards were given the past year. Lem Ball received the Distinguished Service Award for Outstanding Contributions to Baptist History. Linda Green, Walters, received the GASKIN CHURCH HISTORY AWARD. J. D. Ward, Shawnee, was given the Baptist Heritage Sermon Award. Carron Clements, OBU, received the GASKIN BAPTIST HISTORY AWARD. Linda's entry was a history of the New Salem Baptist Church of which her husband is pastor. Carron is a 1989 graduate of OBU. The two Gaskin awards brought certificates and \$350.00 checks to the two winners. The cash portion of these awards comes from endowments with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

'89er Celebration

The Spring Number of the **The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle** for 1989 was a special edition. It was dedicated to the Run of '89. Papers in that journal give appropriate information relative to that historical event in central Oklahoma. Copies are still available at \$2 each, postpaid. Order from J. M. Indian Missionary

One year ago, the Historical Society adopted a special project for this year. The project involves encapsulation of about 640 pages of **The Indian Missionary.** This publication was issued in 1884-93. It was the first and only official news journal of the antecedent bodies of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma before the **Baptist Messenger** was founded in 1912. Cost of the non-budgeted project will approximate \$2,500. The completion date for this restoration/preservation job was scheduled for October of this year for showing at this year's annual meeting of the Historical Society at 5:00 p.m., Nov. 15.

McConnell Book

During the yeat J. M. Gaskin completed the manuscript for The McConnell Years in Oklahoma. During the summer months the Messenger Press has been printing the book to have is ready for this convention. The 198-page book is available in good quality hardback and paperback. The hardback copies are priced at \$7.95 per copy and the paperback edition at \$4.95. Dr. McConnell was Corresponding Secretary (now Executive Director-Treasurer) of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in 1916-22. The book is more than a biography. It includes a definitive history of Oklahoma Baptists during one of the most crucial periods in the history of the state of Oklahoma.

Handbook

Several years ago the Historical Commission recommended to the convention that J. M. Gaskin prepare a **Handbook** for the Commission and the Historical Society. In a meeting April 16, 1989, final approval was voted by the Commission to print from the galley proofs Gaskin submitted for consideration. The **Handbook** details the work of the Commission and Society; explains the relationship between the two; gives a documented history of the history program of Oklahoma Baptists back to 1906; specifies duties of the present and future directors of history; provides a guide and key to the use of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection; explains how that collection evolved, its ownership, and administration; and offers numerous other details incident to the Commission/Society's programs of work. Copies are available to interested persons for \$1 each. However, it was written for use as an inhouse organ. Commission members feel this booklet, which is now available, will be a useful reference piece for years to come. It will be a daily working instrument in the Baptist Collection, especially for persons who have responsibilities there.

Encyclopedia

The Historical Commission of the Southern Baptist Commission is in the planning stages to publish Volume V of **The Encyclopedia of Southern Baptists**. Within the year plans should be in shape for Oklahoma's participation in this project.

The Historical Society is auxiliary to the Commission. Commission members are elected by the convention. Society membership is open to any interested person. Society dues are \$25 for Life and \$2 for Annual. Monies received from Society dues barely help with postage costs in the work of the Society and Commission. The work of the Historical Commission is funded from the Cooperative Program.

Family Care Ministries

Sam L. Garner, Executive Director

I. Developing the Image

Family Care Ministries encompasses three major areas of interest, as follows:

1. Child Care Ministries—Residential care of dependent children on 10 campuses, foster care, and psychological counseling.

2. Adult Care Ministries—Seven retirement centers across Oklahoma, three assisted living units, and nearly 350 nursing home beds.

3. Special Care—Crisis Pregnancy Ministry, maternity home, adoptions, and special needs counseling.

4. Total number of people Family Care Ministries served in 1988 was 12,183. Of this number, over 3,300 were counseled through the Crisis Pregnancy Ministry.

II. Enlarging the Boundaries

Among the dreams for the future are the following:

1. Developing a ministry to the developmentally disabled.

2. Expansion of service to troubled boys through facilities at Boys Ranch Town.

3. Centralization and enlargement of Baptist Maternity Home services.

4. Crisis Pregnancy Center to include a toll-free, 800 number in Oklahoma.

5. Enlarging Adult Care services to include an Alzheimer's Wing at Oklahoma City, and the continuation of construction of Life Estate Duplexes and Quadruplexes at all villages.

6. Develop and implement a Drug and Alcohol Counseling Center.

III. Financing the Opportunities

Four major avenues of revenue are available to continue and expand these ministries as follows:

1. Cooperative Program gifts are a major lifeline to this ministry. Without Cooperative Program gifts our present ministries could not continue.

2. Mother's Day Offering has averaged over \$500,000 for the past six years. This annual mission offering may be received any time in the year.

3. Special gifts, including direct mail—\$93,000; Birthday/Anniversary Banks—\$135,000; and memorials and honor gifts—\$70,500.

4. Endowment/wills and trusts—Expanded stewardship of faithful individuals continue to provide blessings throughout and beyond our lifetime.

5. A total of \$20,030,000 in debt service for Adult Care Ministries was refinanced during the year. The refinancing project leveled out the payments on a monthly basis and also lowered the interest rate that was presently being paid.

Several administrative changes were made in both Child Care and Adult Care services. Oklahoma City Baptist Children's Home Administrator Jerry T. Bradley was named as Director of Child Care Ministries. Rod A. Phillips was named to the Oklahoma City Children's Home campus, moving from the Owasso campus. Tandy V. James became administrator of Baptist Children's Home in Madill, moving from the staff of Boys Ranch Town. Douglas McWhirter became administrator of Baptist Children's Home, Owasso, moving from a position with Arkansas Children's Services.

Robert D. Griffin was named administrator of Baptist Retirement Center in Owasso. Due to the retirement of Jack H. Owens, Administrator/Chaplain of Cleveland Baptist Village, James E. Taylor was named to fill the vacancy, moving from the pastorate of Terlton, First.

Family Care Ministries extends a special word of gratitude to Oklahoma Baptists whose prayers and support enable Child Care, Adult Care, and Special Care Ministries to serve a growing number of individuals each year.

Annuity Services

J. T. Roberts

ANNUITY—As of June 30, 1989, 1,386 ministers and employees of Oklahoma churches and associations were participating in the Church Annuity Plan; 708 churches and associations had entered into Cooperative Agreements with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to provide the Church Annuity Plan's expanded benefits. Ministers and eligible employees of these expanded participating

churches and associations benefit from matching employer and Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma contributions as well as supplemental life and disability protection.

There were 969 active members in the Convention Annuity Plan in Oklahoma at the end of the second quarter. This is the pension plan used by most Southern Baptist institutions, agencies and state conventions.

In total, 62,834 Southern Baptist ministers, church employees and denominational workers had active retirement accounts at the Annuity Board. This cooperation between the Board and its participants fulfills the commitment to develop benefit programs that will give Southern Baptist ministers, missionaries and denominational workers security in old age and protection against the financial burdens of illness, disability and death.

On June 30, 1989, 20,557 retirees and other annuitants (772 in Oklahoma) had received benefits totaling \$40,805, 161 in the preceding six months.

INSURANCE—Illness and accident are always tragic. But prudent purchase of insurance by participants and sound management of insurance assets by the Annuity Board allowed payment of medical claims in excess of \$42 million through the second quarter of 1989.

Protection through illness remains the most difficult challenge in 1989 with the cost explosion in medical care. This results in a nationwide increase in medical insurance rates. The Annuity Board remains acutely aware of the impact soaring health-care costs have on the 38,428 participants in the Church, Group and Seminarian medical plans. The Insurance Services Division is committed to finding solutions to the challenging problems these burdensome costs impose on Southern Baptist ministers, church staffs and denominational workers.

A new Annuity Board program offers property and casualty insurance administered by the Southern Baptist Convention Managing General Agency, Inc. This affiliate makes available property and casualty coverage for church-owned property, general liability, workers' compensation, bus liability, day-care liability and ministers' malpractice insurance.

Property and casualty insurance is being offered in Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas this year, and it will expand to other states in 1990.

THE ANNUITY BOARD managed total assets of \$2.6 billion on June 30, 1989. Though the magnitude of this statistic can be overwhelming, the Annuity Board's employees and those in the Annuity Services Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma endeavor to make every letter, every call, every application, and every claim form a personal event.

The Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and the Annuity Services Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma are anxious to help churches and church staff members in Oklahoma have the best retirement plans and insurance programs available.

Evangelism

Wayne Bristow, Director

Baptisms were up 1.64% in 1988, 18,434 compared to 18,137 in 1987. This was the first increase in baptisms in five years. The ratio of baptisms to resident church membership improved slightly to 24.34.

Nineteen associations reported increases in baptisms in 1988. Union and Comanche-Cotton reported the largest increases, 298 and 246 respectively. Each had better than average baptisms to church membership ratios, 16.17 for Comanche-Cotton and 19.19 for Union. Joe Knowles was the associational evangelism director for Union and Gary Mac-Manamy for Comanche-Cotton.

The Cherokee Indian Association showed an increase of 127 baptisms in 1988 and had the best ratio in the state, 12.81. Joe Pershica was associational evangelism director.

Fourteen BGCO churches baptized over 100 people in 1988 and six exceeded 200. These churches were led by First Southern, Del City with 387 baptisms and First Baptist, Moore with 349. Tom Elliff is pastor at Del City and Bobby Boyles at Moore.

With 1.33 Oakview Hispanic Baptist Mission in Madill led in the ratio of baptisms to resident membership. Mariano Alvarado is the pastor.

Capital, Tulsa and Union associations combine for 38% of BGCO church membership and reported 38% of the 1988 baptisms.

Conferences

The evangelism department of the Baptist General Convention planned and promoted six evangelism-related conferences in 1988-89.

The **YOUTH EVANGELISM CONFERENCE** was held December 27-28, 1988, at First Southern Baptist Church in Del City. The Lord continues to bless this effort. Some 8,000 youth attended. Several hundred rededicated their lives by standing as directed by evangelist Jerry Johnston. Those who wanted to accept Christ were asked to come forward. Eighty-five youth made this commitment.

What may have been the largest crowd ever to attend the STATE EVANGELISM CONFERENCE heard Arthur Blessitt preach the closing service January 24, 1989. His message had been preceded by other inspirational messages by Noel McCullins, O. S. Hawkins, Adrian Rogers, Bobby Boyles, Ron Long, Doug Knapp, Ron Dunn, Esther Burroughs, Perry Sanders, and Roy Edgemon. The 1990 conference will be held at First Southern Baptist Church, Del City, January 22-23. John Bisagno of First Baptist Church, Houston, Texas, will be the closing speaker.

The INDIAN EVANGELISM CONFERENCE was held at First Baptist Church, Moore, March 9-10, 1989. Speakers included Johnny Lay from Yakima, Washington and Dr. Perry Sanders from First Baptist Church, Lafayette. This conference will be held in March of each year. A Regional **PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL AWAKENING CON-FERENCE** was held March 20-22, 1989, in the Oklahoma City area. The conference was hosted by Council Road Baptist Church, Bethany, the Home Mission Board, and the BGCO evangelism department. Guest speakers were Tom Elliff, Dwight Reighard, Henry Blackaby, Nell Bruce and Miles Seaborn. Guest musicians were Ron and Patricia Owens.

The HISPANIC EVANGELISM CONFERENCE was held for the first-time ever in Oklahoma. A joint venture of the Baptist General Convention evangelism and missions departments, it was held April 8, 1989, with 300 people in attendance at Exchange Avenue Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. The featured speakers were Gilbert Herrera, Alberto Mottesi and a singing group from Guatemala, "Los Nazareos." People came to the conference from Oklahoma, Nebraska, Kansas and Arkansas. We are optimistic that this conference will continue to grow in numbers.

At the time of the report, the first-of-its-kind, **THE NATIONAL SOUL-WINNING CONFERENCE** will have been held at the Council Road Baptist Church here in the Oklahoma City area. Oklahoma was chosen to host the first conference because the Home Mission Board felt that a climate for outreach and evangelism already existed among the churches in Oklahoma. This conference featured a door-to-door witnessing ministry.

Evangelism Training

Ed Chaney, BGCO associate evangelism director continues to lead in an aggressive personal evangelism training emphasis.

The C.W.T. (CONTINUING WITNESS TRAINING) SEMINAR, February 6-10, 1989, was a successful and inspirational seminar. This past year Oklahoma helped to introduce the ADVANCED CWT SEMINAR. This training was held at the same time as the basic course. The advanced seminar targets specific areas of training for the Christian witness such as various cults. It also has a lesson on how to witness to the secular man.

Training in the use of the LAY EVANGELISM SCHOOLS in our churches continues to be a strong emphasis. Another 150 LES leaders were trained in 1988 in addition to the 191 already trained. Exciting reports continue to come in to the evangelism department from churches who are conducting LES's.

Ed Chaney had the opportunity February-March of 1989 to travel to Korea and to participate in the training of over 700 Korean pastors and church leaders in the use of the LES materials.

Evangelism Department Ministries

Youth Evangelism Teams

Youth revival teams conducted services in 21 churches during the summer of 1989. Two churches reported over 20 professions of faith as a result of their ministry. Most of the young people were from Oklahoma Baptist University, while one was from the Baptist Student Union at Cameron, Lawton.

ANNUAL OF THE BAPTIST

Tent Evangelism

Both tents, one a 200-seating capacity and the other a 500-seating capacity continue to be used for evangelism events around the state. They were used 33 times during the past year. An Olympic Festival, July 21-30, 1989, was hosted by Oklahoma. During the festival, the small tent was used to a wonderful advantage in Lawton. For more information about the tents, contact the BGCO evangelism department.

Falls Creek

Six hundred and fifty-eight men and women were trained as Falls Creek counselors in 1989. One hundred and fifty pastors helped as pastor-advisors. Evangelism staff members and volunteer section leaders directed the work of counseling 3,052 inquirers during the five weeks of Falls Creek.

Simultaneous Revivals

Diligent preparation was made throughout the state for the **1990** Here's Hope, Jesus Cares for You Simultaneous Revivals. Many churches conducted prayer seminars and LES's.

Wayne Bristow conducted Revival Preparation Seminars in 15 associations during 1988 and 1989.

The revival preparation emphasis continues to be available through the evangelism department.

We believe God is going to bless the simultaneous revival effort in a dynamic way.

Oklahoma Evangelists' Retreat

A two-day retreat was held December 15-16, 1988, for full-time Oklahoma evangelists and their spouses at the Hilton Inn West in Oklahoma City. Guest speakers were Dr. Don Wilton, Dr. Claude Thomas, and David Chambers. About forty people were in attendance. The retreat was so successful and positive that another one is scheduled for December 14-16, 1989, in Oklahoma City. Featured speakers are Dr. Bob Kendig and Dr. Mack Roark.

The Planning and Promotion Office is an extension of the Executive Office. The associate executive director of the BGCO serves as director of this area of work, in addition to administrative responsibilities.

Departments relating to Planning and Promotion are those most closely related to programs and activities with counterparts in the local church—Brotherhood, Church Music, Cooperative Missions, Evangelism, Falls Creek Conference Center, Religious Education and Woman's Missionary Union. Coordination includes program and budget development, program promotion, calendar coordination and denominational emphasis planning.

Along with the coordinating function, the Planning and Promotion Office has been assigned six programs of work. Programs, staff assignments, and reports for last year are:

Cooperative Program Promotion

Lyle Garlow is the Director of Cooperative Program promotion.

Total 1988 Cooperative Program receipts were the highest in history, reaching \$16,056,645—\$547,170 above 1987, a 3.5% increase. However, this was \$443,335 below our \$16.5 million objective.

Total church tithes and offerings were \$170,465,580, an increase of \$41,250 over 1987. Total undesignated receipts (basically budget receipts) were up \$2,484,135, indicating an increased support of church budgets.

The 1988 Cooperative Program was divided 44% for SBC mission ministries and 56% for Oklahoma ministries.

The 1990 proposed budget remains at \$16.5 million and reflects a one-fourth of one percent increase to SBC, setting the 1990 division at 44.25% and 55.75%. The promotion emphasis, "MOVE UP: REACH OKLAHOMA and the WORLD through the Cooperative Program," focuses on an endeavor to lead each church to consider a 1%, or a $\frac{14}{5}$ % fraction, such as $\frac{34}{5}$ %, $\frac{12}{5}$ %, or $\frac{14}{5}$ %, increase to world missions through the Cooperative Program. Leadership has been asked to share information and encourage the church to consider an increase.

During 1988-89, Appreciation Dinners were conducted in 20 associations. Seventeen are scheduled for 1989-90. Participants include the pastor, treasurer, chairman of deacons and budget committee, and the four spouses. Content of the program includes an emphasis on missions support through the Cooperative Program.

Coordinated Promotion Planning

"MOVE UP: REACH OKLAHOMA" is Oklahoma's thematic emphasis for 1989-90. All programs of work are relating to this theme. Churches have been encouraged to establish enrollment and growth goals. During 1990, awareness and training meetings are scheduled to launch the 1990-1995 SBC denominational emphasis, "Hope and Heritage." Lyle Garlow is the state director of Coordinated Promotion Planning.

Associational Services

The liaison relationship between the state convention and the 41 Oklahoma associations is directed by Lyle Garlow.

The state convention works with associations to strengthen them just as we work with individual churches. All Baptist entities are independent and self-governing. However, we are all interdependent and strive to coordinate our work to best accomplish our mutual tasks.

Since the last publication of the Book of Reports, we have had the following changes in associational leadership. New directors of missions are: Ralph Chapman, Beckham-Mills Association (5-89); J. R. Stogsdill, Cherokee Association (7-89) where he previously served; Wade Robertson, LeFlore Association (3-89); Darryl Moore, Perry Association (1-89); and Chester A. Ward, Jr., Pittsburg Association (9-89). M. H. Childers retired (5-89) after serving Beckham-Mills Association 12 and a half years; Joshua Davis retired (12-88) having served Cherokee Association four years; Richard Brooks retired (9-88) after serving LeFlore Association 11 years; and Tom Cotten retired from Enon Association (12-88) where he served 20 years. William V. Hart resigned Pittsburg Association (8-89) to return to the pastorate. Don Clark moved (4-89) from Johnston-Marshall Association to Enon Association. L. M. Norwood, former director of missions in Union, Banner and South Canadian Associations, went to be with the Lord.

Church Administration

Church Administration supervision and planning are done by Henry L. Chennault who is the Church Administration Consultant for the BGCO. In 1988-89, several training conferences were held, as well as personal consultations, to serve churches and staff:

October 11, 1988-Pastoral Training Conference

October 13, 1988—Pastoral Training Conference

October 27-28, 1988-Conference on Preaching

February 27-28, 1989—Oklahoma Preaching Conference

May 18-19, 1989—Ministers of Education Programming Retreat

Week-by-week, the church administration office provides resources and information to assist churches in their planning.

Stewardship

Henry L. Chennault serves as Director of Stewardship for the BGCO. The Planning and Promotion Office aids Oklahoma Baptist churches in stewardship promotion and development. Assistance is given through area and associational conferences, individual church conferences, and personal staff conferences. Budget and stewardship materials are provided at no cost to the churches.

Each church is encouraged to have at least one stewardship emphasis per year. In 1989, churches were encouraged to have an abbreviated, or mini-stewardship campaign prior to the summer months.

From October, 1988, to September, 1989, eighteen associational stewardship conferences were conducted.

In September, 1989, four area-wide stewardship preaching conferences were conducted in Enid, Lawton, Oklahoma City and Muskogee. The objective of these conferences was to prepare and encourage pastors in their stewardship preaching.

Media Services

This past year saw an increase in demand for media services. As more materials become available on video tape, churches and associations are acquiring video players, monitors and video projectors. With the closing of the Baptist Film Centers across the country, video is rapidly becoming the media training tool of choice and necessity. Churches are discovering exciting ways to use these tools, along with radio and television to enhance training and outreach.

Cade Garrison serves as Director of Media Services. Areas of service include video productions for the BGCO; media consultation for the convention, churches and associations; church media library training and consultation; and BTN consultation and training.

BGCO video productions this past year included:

Missions News Network (local church)

Many Voices of Oklahoma (Cooperative Missions)

Falls Creek Assembly and Conference Center

The Baptist Faith and Message After 26 Years (Historical Commission)

Convention Reports (state convention presentations of several BGCO departments)

In addition to video productions, media services provided numerous personal consultations to churches involved in radio and television ministries, BTN and church media library.

Currently, over 430 Oklahoma Baptist churches have access to BTN. Owned and operated by the Baptist Sunday School Board, BTN provides video resource materials to aid the entire church program. This past year, BTN area training meetings were conducted in five different locations across the state.

The annual State Church Media Library Conference was held this past June. Members approved an updated version of their bylaws and enjoyed the various training sessions provided. Regional representatives were added to provide better service to local churches.

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a Cafeteria entrance awning, poured a cement cap on lake road crossing, purchased a new backhoe, purchased a new caretaker pickup, purchased a golf-cart for director (old one used by housekeeping department), installed a new phone system.

Religious Education

Bill C. Haggard, Director

Although 1987-88 was a year of challenge in many respects, it was a very productive year for the Department of Religious Education. The annual theme for Sunday School beginning in October 1988, was "Gather the People," which is a part of the five year "challenge 10/90" thrust.

Church Training emphasized "Developing Believers" through leadership training and curriculum. A new Church Training record system is being developed which will more accurately reflect the total number involved in discipleship training throughout the year.

Department Personnel

The department maintains an exceptional staff of five field workers and five secretaries. Included on the staff are: Darlene Koch, Preschool and Childhood Education Consultant, Special Education, and Children's Weekday Education; David Fuller, Youth Consultant, language/ethnic work, and Vacation Bible School; Billy Allen, adult consultant, associational projects; and Joe Sherrer, general administration consultant, state projects. One of the five secretaries, Mrs. Joan Eischen, retired this year after 10 years of faithful, effective service. Joining the staff in this position was Mrs. Janice Newton. We welcome her to the R.E. family as secretary to the department director. The other secretaries are: Sybil Cox, secretary to Sherrer; Donas Rye, secretary to Allen; Lou Rodriquez, secretary to Fuller; and Olive Hays, secretary to Koch.

Statistics

In spite of the great out migration from Oklahoma, the spirit of Oklahoma Baptists has been most encouraging. Sunday School enrollment continues to be affected in that this year, a total of 372,622 was reported, a net decline of over 7,000. The entire Southern Baptist Convention showed a slight decline with a total enrollment of 7,911,373 reported. As the enrollment in Oklahoma shows a decline, the percentage of attendance to enrollment continues to climb.

Vacation Bible Schools in the state reported a total enrollment of 145,865 for 1988. Probably, one of the most productive tools we have is Vacation Bible School. Total prospects discovered reached a projected total of 26,919. According to our reports, churches are following up on less than 10% of these prospects. In 1988, 2,665 professions of faith were reported in V.B.S. Think of the potential if 100% of the prospects had received follow-up.

Church Training enrollment showed a decline of 1,728, bringing the present total enrollment to 89,257. National enrollment also showed a slight decline with a total of 1,993,738.

Church Training is experiencing a renewed interest because of the annual Doctrine Week, and the continued development of the new LIFE series. Equipping center modules continue to receive good acceptance by the churches.

Ministries

Associational work continues to be effective. In the annual ASSIST Training Institute, 239 team members from 39 associations received training. Actual ASSIST members totals 422, which is 94% of the full potential.

Many associational training schools have been conducted, six of which were conducted by the Department of Religious Education with an enrollment of 1,594. God is blessing this approach to training. The vast majority of the associations are now conducting an annual Sunday School training conference using their ASSISTeams as the faculty.

Among the state projects conducted this past year was the state Sunday School Leadership Seminar at Falls Creek with almost 700 leaders registered. Also, Glorieta in Western Oklahoma, conducted at Weatherford, FBC, April, 1988, registered approximately 1,000. Glorieta Style Church Training Conference was conducted in October, 1987, at the Immanuel Church, Tulsa, with over 400 participants. Another major state training event was Glorieta Style Sunday School Leadership Conference at First Church, Tulsa, with over 2,200 participants.

Other events included a State Baptist Doctrine Clinic, three regional outreach Bible study clinics, and two "How to Put LIFE in Church Training" conferences.

A state Church Building Conference was conducted at Central Church, Lawton, May, 1988, with about 30 church pastors and committees.

About six months of the year included a time consuming task of developing the Falls Creek program for over 25,000 youth. Approximately 315 teachers were enlisted to teach the classes during this five week assembly. The teachers are pastors and staff members who are attending Falls Creek with their churches. Only eternity can tell of the value of this encampment where literally thousands of lives are changed.

We rejoice and praise God for what He has done in the "Teaching and Training Department" of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended December 31, 1989

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in proteutity.

with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity. Composition of Reporting Entity—The accompanying financial statements include all net assets and operations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, except for The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and Oklahoma Baptist University.

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Fund Accounting—Separate funds have been established to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions (restricted and endowment funds). The following funds have been established for the Convention:

 Current Unrestricted Fund—This fund accounts for all resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of the Convention.

 Current Restricted Fund—These funds account for those resources currently available for use, but expendable only for operating purposes specified by the donors.

 Property Fund—This fund accumulates the net investment in fixed assets and accounts for the unexpended resources contributed specifically for the purpose of acquiring or replacing land, buildings, or equipment for use in the operations of the organization. Mortgages or other liabilities relating to these assets are also included in this fund.

 Endowment Fund—This fund represents the principal amount of gifts and bequests accepted with the donor-stipulation that the principal be maintained intact in perpetuity, until the occurrence of a specified event, or for a specified period, and that only the income from investment thereof be expended either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor.

be expended either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor. Statement of Cash Flows—For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, the Convention considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase to be cash equivalents.

Property and Equipment—The Convention capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of donation of \$500 or more. Depreciation was recorded on the straight-line method from dates of acquisition or donation. The lives generally used are:

Land improvements Buildings Furniture and office equipment Automobiles and machinery 20-40 years 20-50 years 4-10 years 3-10 years

Revenue Recognition—Revenue of the Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. The donor may designate its use by the Convention. Such designated (restricted) contributions are recognized as revenue when the obligation imposed by the restriction has been met.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. These funds include designated endowment contributions and earnings on such contributions, restricted and custodial funds held for the Convention. The contributed assets are reflected herein at the fair market value at date of contribution.

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. administers a \$25,000 endowment fund for the benefit of the Convention's Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City. The income from this fund may be used for any purpose; however, the corpus may not be withdrawn, and therefore is not included as an asset in the accompanying financial statements. No distributions were received from this fund in 1989.

Notes Payable

3. Notes Payable Oklahoma County Industrial Authority

On March 31, 1989, the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (the Authority) issued its "Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Retirement Center Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1989" in the amount of \$20,030,000. The net proceeds of \$17,472,936 from the bond issue were loaned to the Convention and were used to retire debt obligations of the Convention's retirement centers and nursing homes, including \$771,000 advanced from the Convention. The Convention has executed a note to repay the Authority for its costs under the bond issue.

Monthly payments are required by the note in amounts equal to the Authority's debt service for the bonds. Final payment under the note is scheduled for May, 2008. The Convention's effective in-

The unrestricted gross revenues of the Convention are pledged as security under the note. The Convention has agreed not to permit any new liens or encumbrances on its endowment funds or consent to the subordination of the Convention's rights to any other person. In addition, the Convention has obtained a letter of credit to guarantee note payments and has agreed to comply with certain financial ratio covenants under the letter of credit agreement.

As a part of the debt refinancing arrangement, funds were placed in irrevocable trusts to provide for the retirement of the Tulsa Industrial Authority's "Revenue Bonds, Series 1985 (Tulsa Baptist Retire-ment Center at Owasso Nursing Home Project)" and the "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)". The Convention has been released from liability under the note and leases pertaining to these projects.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

On November 19, 1986, the Convention entered into a loan agreement with The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) in the amount of \$250,000. The agreement calls for monthly payments of principal and interest at 11% per annum with the final payment due January 1, 2001. The note was created for remodeling of the area leased to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as described in Note 6 to the financial statements. The balance on the note at December 31, 1989 and 1988 was \$225,911 and \$234,631, respectively.

The Convention was also liable to the Foundation at December 31, 1989 for \$370,179 (1988-\$386,608) under an unsecured agreement dated June 30, 1988. The agreement calls for monthly payments of principal and interest at 7% per annum with final payment due September 15, 2005. Pro-ceeds from the note were used for operations at Evergreen nursing home at Owasso.

The Convention has assumed responsibility for the repayment of certain loans The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has made to various Baptist Associations in connection with Baptist Student Unions in their area. These eleven loans, with original amounts totaling \$492,750 dating from 1978, are generally secured by real estate, bear interest at rates ranging from 91/2 % to 11%, and have a balance due of \$377,636 at December 31, 1989 (1988-\$402,870).

Frontier Federal Savings & Loan Association—The Convention's Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City entered into a loan agreement with Frontier Federal Savings & Loan Association, Oklahoma City. The loan is secured by certain real property. The balance outstanding at December 31, 1989 and 1988 was \$268 and \$1,471, respectively. The following schedules maturities for notes payable:

4. Commitments and Contingencies

In 1988, the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority issued bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1989'' totaling \$11,800,128, and entered into a capital lease with the University. The Series 1988 bonds are secured by proceeds from the lease of the main campus facilities, mortages on the real estate comprising the campus, a municipal bond insurance policy, a letter of credit from a financial institution, and the guarantee of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The present value of the net minimum lease payments required of the University is approximately \$9,700,000.

5. Capital and Operating Lease Receivable

The Convention borrowed \$250,000 from The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for the purpose

of remodeling office space and the acquisition of office furnishings leased to the Foundation. Rental payments by the Foundation are equal to the debt service requirements of the Convention. The capital portion of the lease (\$87,500) relates to the office furnishings. Rent on this portion totals \$11,934 annually. The remaining \$19,322 is considered annual space rent costs under the operating portion of the lease. The financial statements reflect a receivable of \$79,335 and \$82,121 at December 1,000 and 1090 31, 1989 and 1988, respectively for the portion of such rental applicable to the office furnishings.

6. Notes Receivable

During 1985, the Convention sold a house and received a note in the original amount of \$26,700 (balance at December 31, 1989, \$23,601). The note provides for monthly payments of \$295 including interest at 10.5%. The final payment is due in January, 1991.

During 1988, the Convention received a contribution of a note secured by a mortgage on real property. The balance on the note at December 31, 1989 was \$11,780.

7. Capital Lease Obligations

Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center—On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its 'First Morgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)' in the amount of \$2,310,000. The project was completed during 1979 at a total cost of \$1,872,343.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The bonds were defeased under the 1989 loan the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority as described in Note 3.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy the bond obligation. The lease is scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008.

The Convention has the right to purchase the project at any time on or after February 1988, at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City—The Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City was constructed by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (an affiliate) in 1965 and transferred to the Convention in 1974.

In 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Convention. OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

June 30, 1981, for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate at any time after March 1, 1988, for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The bonds were defeased in 1989 as discolsed in Note 3.

Office Equipment—The Convention leases certain office equipment for use in its operations. The equipment which has a cost of \$183,853 has been capitalized and is being depreciated over the term of the leases.

8. Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue of \$3,772,468 and \$3,870,804 at December 31, 1989 and 1988, respectively, consists of unexpended contributions for which the donor-imposed restrictions have not been met. The following is a schedule of deferred revenue at December 31, 1989:

Deferred life estates consist of duplexes constructed at various retirement centers on land owned

by the Convention. The construction cost of these duplexes was donated to the Convention and the donors have a rent-free life estate in the duplexes. The duplexes have been capitalized by the Convention at a value approximating total construction costs, and are being depreciated over their estimated useful lives. The deferred liability for the life estates, representing future rentals to be provided, is reduced annually for rentals based upon the donor's life expectancy. At December 31, 1989 and 1988, the deferred life estates totaled \$1,476,785 and \$1,553,707, respectively.

9. Pension Plan

All employees of the Convention are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Convention contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for Convention employees for the year ended December 31, 1989 was \$492,296 (1988–\$490,102). The Convention's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

10. Restatement of Funds held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and Other Reclassifications In 1989, additional information obtained from The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma indicated that several trusts not previously reported in the financial statements of the Convention in prior years should have been included. The accompanying financial statements of the Convention for 1989 properly reflect these trusts on the basis of information provided by the Foundation.

The financial statement for 1988, presented herein for comparative purposes, have been restated to give retroactive effect to the inclusion and classification of such trusts for 1989. The following is a summary of the restatements to the 1988 financial statements:

The endowment fund balance at December 31, 1988 have been restated to reflect the increase of \$165,278.

In addition, certain income and expenses for 1988 (presented for comparative purposes in the accompanying financial statements) have been restated from amounts previously reported to conform to the classifications used for 1989.

11. Year Ended December 31, 1988 Financial Information

The amounts shown for December 31, 1988 and the year then ended in the accompanying financial statements are included to provide a basis for comparison with the year ended December 31, 1989, and present summarized totals only. Accordingly, the 1988 amounts are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. 12. Subsequent Event

In March 1990, the Convention formed the Baptist Building Corporation (the Corporation) to purchase an office building and provide office space to the Convention and other not-for-profit organizations. The Convention authorized The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma to invest up to 54,800,000 of the Convention's custodial funds held by the Foundation to fund the Corporation's purchase and remodeling of the new office building. The Convention will make annual lease payments of approximately \$630,000 to the Corporation.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. We believe our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly in all material respects, the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as of December 31, 1989, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

General—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) is a private, nonprofit religious association chartered by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual ex-istence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention) to administer funds and property received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention, and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work.

Basis of Accounting-The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Fund Accounting-To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in ac-cordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund groups as follows:

Unrestricted Operating Fund--The Unrestricted Operating Fund is designed to account for resources which are expendable for support of Foundation operations and for the acquisition of equipment. This fund has no external restriction on its use or purpose, and can be used for any purpose designated by the governing board. Property and Equipment Fund—This fund reports the carrying value of all property

and equipment utilized by the Foundation in its operations, exclusive of those real properties held for investment or received under fiduciary responsibility.

Restricted Funds-Restricted funds are funds other than endowments, the use of which has been restricted by outside agencies or persons (donors/grantors) for specific purposes. Such funds are generally restricted for capital improvements. Revenues of restricted funds are reported as such to the extent that expenses have been incurred for the purpose specified by the donor or grantor during the period.

Endowment and Trust Funds—Endowment and Trust Funds are comprised of resources received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise that are subject to restrictions of the gift or trust instrument. Endowment funds account for assets received under the stipulation of the donors that the principal be invested and that only the income be used for the designated purposes until a specified time or occurrence, or in perpetuity. Trusts generally require that distributions be made to designated beneficiaries. Endowment and Trust Funds also include revocable trusts totaling approximately \$5,600,000 at December 31, 1989 (1988—\$5,300,000).

Loan Funds-These funds represent resources restricted for loans.

Custodian Funds-These funds account for assets received by the Foundation to be held and disbursed only on instruction of the person or organization from whom they were neceived, as contrasted with funds held under fiduciary capacity. The receipt of such funds and the disbursement thereof are reported in the net capital additions section of the state-ment of support and revenue. The net balances of custodian funds are reported in the statement of assets and liabilities as amounts held for others.

General Investment Fund-This fund is an investment pool for the various funds of the Foundation. A participating fund increases or decreases ownership in the fund by the purchase or redemption of units. The fund is operated on the market value method whereby units are valued based on the relationship of total units outstanding to total assets. Investment income is allocated to participating funds based on percentage of ownership. Assets of the General Investment Fund consist primarily of church building loans, commercial stocks, bonds, and bankers acceptances

-Cash balances in excess of FDIC limits are automatically transferred into interest-bearing Cashaccounts secured by U.S. government obligations.

Allowance for Doubtful Loans-The financial statements present notes receivable net of the allowance for doubtful loans. The allowance is based on historical information coupled with a review of the status of delinquent loans. The allowance for church building loans is 21/2 % of the outstanding balances.

Property and Equipment-Major expenditures for equipment are capitalized at cost while donated property and equipment are capitalized at fair market value at the date of the gift. Depreciation of equipment is provided for over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis. No provision is made for depreciation on rental and other properties carried as investments in the Endowment and Trust Funds.

Annuities-The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions which require the Foundation to pay the donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified portion of the income of these trusts is disbursed to the individuals during their lifetime, and upon their death the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of the Baptist agencies or institutions as designated. The liability for future payments to beneficiaries is reported as a reduction of the corpus of such funds. Liabilities to annuitants totaled \$475,690 and \$457,314 at December 31, 1989 and 1988, respectively.

Appropriation for Corpus Preservation—For certain endowments, the Foundation appropriates a portion of the income to preserve the value of the corpus. Such appropriations totaled \$1,716,036 and \$1,743,093 at December 31, 1989 and 1988, respectively, and have been included as a part of the total corpus balance. This appropriation is generally for endowments with depletable assets such as mineral properties, but may also be specified for other endowments. Various methods are used to calculate the amount to be appropriated.

Income Taxes—The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Statement of Cash Flows—For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, the Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less at the time of purchase to be cash equivalents. No cash flow statement is presented for the general investment fund as the activity in this fund has been reported in the various investing funds.

2. Investments

4. Fund Balances and Related Accounts

Except for the Operating and Property and Equipment funds, the Foundation holds net assets either in fiduciary or custodial capacity, or as agent.

The Foundation has fiduciary responsibility for endowment and trust funds and loan funds. Restricted funds are generally held as agent for others. Custodian funds represent assets received by the Foundation to be disbursed only on instructions of the person or organization from whom they were received.

5. Related Parties

As disclosed in Note 1, the Foundation is affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). The majority of the funds administered by the Foundation are for the benefit of the Convention, its agencies and various other Baptist organiza-tions. Throughout the year the Foundation makes distributions either directly to these organiza-tions or on their behalf. The Foundation also receives funds from these organizations, both to administer for their benefit and to support the Foundation's operations.

The Foundation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Convention. Appropriations for the year ended December 31, 1989 were \$320,592 (1988-\$325,946).

The Foundation, through its General Investment Fund, makes loans to Oklahoma Southern Baptist churches to finance the purchase of land and/or construction of church buildings after the projects are completed. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the property and buildings constructed and may require personal endorsements of church members. The lives of these loans vary up to a maximum of 15 years. Interest rates are set by the Church Building Loan Committee with consideration given to the current rates available from commercial sources. The balances of church building loans outstanding at December 31, 1989 was \$33,235,643 (1988–\$36,386,839). Allowances of \$830,891 and \$500,000 for uncollectible accounts were recorded as of December 31, 1989 and 1988, respectively. At December 31, 1989, the Foundation had outstanding commitments totaling \$3,432,000

for church building loans.

6. Pension Plan

All employees of the Foundation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participation employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1989 was \$50,861 (1988—\$51,404). The Foundation's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

7. Capital and Operating Leases

The Foundation occupies office space in the Baptist Building, which is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, under an agreement expiring in 2001. The Convention borrowed \$250,000 from the Foundation's General Investment Fund for the purpose of remodeling the office space and for the acquisition of office furnishings for the Foundation.

Rental payments by the Foundation are equal to the debt service requirements of the Polndation. The office furnishings thus acquired, totaling \$87,500, have been capitalized by the Foundation. A portion of the rental cost, totaling \$11,934 annually, is applicable to the office fur-nishings acquired under capital lease. The remaining \$19,322 is considered annual space rent costs under the operating portion of the lease. The financial statements reflect a liability of \$79,127

and \$81,914 at December 31, 1989 and 1988, respectively, for the portion of such rental applicable to office furnishings.

8. Susequent Event

The Foundation has entered into negotiations with the newly-formed Baptist Building Corporation for the lease of office space in a new facility. The lease will require payment of \$630,000 over a ten year period. Upon commencement of this lease, the Foundation will be released from the capital and operating lease described in Note 7.

9. Restatement of Components of Endowment Fund Balance

The balances of endowment fund undistributed income and corpus at December 31, 1988 (presented for comparative purposes in the accompanying financial statements) have been restated from amounts previously reported. This restatement was made to reclassify by component the reporting of 1988 unrealized gains totaling \$2,569,653, and had no effect on the total endowment fund balance.

Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Oklahoma Baptist University as of July 31, 1989 and 1988 and the results of its operations for the year ended July 31, 1989 in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY Shawnee, Oklahoma NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended July 31, 1989

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies Organization—The Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of the Baptist General Con-vention of the State of Oklahoma in 1909 to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that Convention. Articles of Incorporation were filed February 9, 1910 and amended November 25, 1974 with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a corporation of perpetual duration without capital stock. The purpose of the corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings

which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Accrual Basis-Except for depreciation, which is discussed later in this note, the financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statements of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are statements of current period financial activities. They do not purport to present the results of operations or net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacements or equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) nonmandatory transfers in all other cases.

The library is valued at an amount equal to the cost of books, periodicals and microform acquired during the past ten years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years. Library acquisitions totaled approximately \$42,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist primarily of bookstore supplies held for resale and maintenance supplies. Inventories are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis. Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the

use of resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accord-ance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Externally restricted funds may be utilized only in accordance with purposes specified by the source of such funds. This is in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and only the income be utilized. All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other

noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned the assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and similar assets is accounted for in the funds owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds. Such income is accounted for in the funds to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in the current unrestricted fund.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the current unrestricted fund. Restricted gifts, grant appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Current restricted funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments-Investments purchased by the University are generally stated at cost. Investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at the date of acquisition or at fair market value at the date of donation. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Revenue Recognition-Charges for student tuition, fees and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated uses are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and contributions are recognized as income when received.

2. Pledges

In July, 1987, The University Board of Trustees approved a new campaign "Bridging the Centuries," with a goal of \$15,000,000. Total pledges and contributions to date for this campaign approximated \$10,700,000, with approximately \$3,000,000 remaining uncollected at July 31, 1989. Funds raised will be used for several priority needs, including construction of Montgomery Hall and student housing,

Scholarships, educational equipment, operational support, and endowed faculty/staff positions. As a result of this campaign and campaigns conducted in prior years, uncollected pledges at July 31, 1989 total \$3,328,409. These pledges, which are summarized below, are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements.

3. Loan Fund

The University received \$95,647 from the U.S. Government under the Federal Capital Loan Program for nursing loans; \$77,461 has been repaid. Loans are made to qualified students from these funds. Borrowers who become qualified nurses under the program may have portions of the principal and interest forgiven.

4. Investments Held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

 Funds Held in Trust by Others The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Louise M. Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and payment of trust expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The market value of the Prichard Trust corpus was \$6,070,773 at July 31, 1989. The American National Bank and Trust Company of Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T. and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Foundation from which the University receives the net income after

payments of beneficiary and trust expenses. The Riddle Foundation had a corpus of approximately \$1,712,271 at July 31, 1989.

The assets of the above trusts are not included in the accompanying financial statements.

6. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority—Capitalized Lease Obligation The University entered into a capitalized lease obligation with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities complex; to remodel the Brotherhood and W.M.U. Memorial Dormitories and the Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. The Authority obtained funds for these improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979". Assets totaling approximately \$7,400,000 have been constructed or purchased under this lease. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

The lease was amended on June 1, 1985 to obtain funds to finance a portion of the construction of the science building, married student housing, and a campus ministries center, and the renovation of Kerr Dormitory, the Theater Annex, Montgomery and Thurman Halls, and Parkway and Jent Apart-ments. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$5,300,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1985." The remainder of the costs of these projects is to be financed by funds raised in a special fund raising campaign and by University resources. Assets totaling approximately \$6,600,000 have been constructed, renovated or purchased under this amendment. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund. On May 18, 1988, the Authority issued \$11,800,128 in new bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University

Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding bonds, Series 1988". The proceeds of these bonds were used to defease in substance the Series 1979 and Series 1985 bonds. The capitalized lease obligation with the Authority was amended during May, 1988, to allow for the change in sinking fund requirements under the new bonds.

The series 1988 bonds are secured by rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities, by mortgages on specified real estate which comprises the main campus, by a guarantee from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by a municipal bond new issue insurance policy issued by Financial Guaranty Insurance company, and by an irrevocable direct pay letter of credit issued by Barclays Bank PLC, New York branch. The letter of credit is scheduled to expire May 18, 1993, but is renewable on an annual basis.

7. Notes Payable

Current Unrestricted Fund

On July 28, 1989, the University borrowed \$300,000 for operating capital from BancFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma. The interest rate is variable based on New York Prime. The maturity date of the note is October 28, 1989.

Harmon Foundation Student Loan Fund

The University received a noninterest-bearing loan in the amount of \$120,000 from the Pearl M. & Julia J. Harmon Foundation. The proceeds of the loan were used to establish a perpetual, everincreasing loan fund for student tuition, fees and room and board charges. The loan is secured by University investments. The following is a schedule of payments due under this note as of July 31, 1989.

Investment in Plant Fund

On December 30, 1982, the University entered into an agreement with the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in which the Authority agreed to loan the University up to \$400,000. To secure this loan, the University transferred certain property to the Authority. Upon repayment of the loan the property will be transferred back to the University. The proceeds of this loan were used to purchase additional real estate and to construct new student apartments. The loan is payable in 120 equal monthly principal payments of \$3,333, plus interest. The interest rate is equal to 55% of the base rate of BancFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma (formerly Federal National Bank and Trust Company, Shawnee, Oklahoma), adjusted quarterly.

On June 24, 1987, the University borrowed 311,550 from the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Proceeds of the loan were used to retire bonds. The loan, secured by a mortgage on certain properties held by the University, bears interest at 9.75%, adjustable annually not to exceed a change of 1% per year or a 5% change over the life of the loan. The loan will be repaid in monthly payments of 33,300.

On July 31, 1987, the University borrowed \$95,000 from BancFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma. The proceeds were used to upgrade the telephone system and purchase automobiles. These loans are unsecured and the interest rate is variable based on New York prime, adjustable quarterly.
