Second Amended Articles of Incorporation of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Constitution and Bylaws

CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

ARTICLE I-NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

Section 1.

A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vicepresident, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.

B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.

C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.

Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive directortreasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure or capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than fortyone (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporation organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than fortyone (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their acting shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, action in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meetings may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

BYLAWS

ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Con-

vention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area: no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than fortyone (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than fortyone (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case any member misses two consecutive meetings of the board without giving advance notification to the office of the Executive Director-Treasurer, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the

remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 4. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called board meeting, the president and executive director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommendation, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the board of directors.

Section 5. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 6. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 7. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER—The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive directortreasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the convention. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant:

(1) In the event the vacancy of the office of executive directortreasurer occurs between sessions of the convention, the associate executive director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the board of directors.

(2) A search committee of seven members of the board of directors shall be elected without nomination by the board of directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.

(3) When the committee has a nomination to make to the board, a meeting of the board of directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the board of directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the convention.

(4) The person elected by the board of directors shall serve until the convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.

Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of the recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.

Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

ARTICLE IV-COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint a fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of church. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to September 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. This committee shall not recommend a fellow committee member or the member's spouse for nomination to any convention elected position. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's board of directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected convention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Committee on Order of Business, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

Section 4. A member of any convention committee shall be considered as having resigned when missing two consecutive meetings without giving advance notification to the office of Executive Director-Treasurer.

ARTICLE V—STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Bap**tist Messenger. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current opera-

.

tions. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VII—LIABILITY

Indemnification of Directors, Officers, Employees and Agents

Section 1. INDEMNIFICATION—The convention shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a director, officer, employee or agent (including volunteers) of the convention, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding except that no indemnification shall be made in respect of any claim, issue or matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged to be liable for gross negligence or misconduct in the performance of this duty to the convention.

Section 2. AUTHORIZATION OF INDEMNIFICATION—Any indemnification under this Article shall be made by the convention only as authorized in the specific case upon a determination that indemnification of the director, officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in this Article. Such determination shall be made: by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of directors who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable a quorum of disinterested directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in written opinion.

Section 3. NON-EXCLUSIVE INDEMNIFICATION—The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the convention's certificate of incorporation or constitution, statutes, regulations, any agreement, any insurance purchased by the convention, vote of the disinterested directors or otherwise, and shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a director, officer, employee or agent of the convention and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs and personal representatives of such person.

Section 4. INSURANCE—The convention shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the convention, against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the convention would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provision of this Article.

ARTICLE VIII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the con-

stitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

Charter and Bylaws

Oklahoma Baptist University

Filed as the Articles of Incorporation February 9, 1910, amended January 26, 1956, March 12, 1965, October 10, 1967, September 27, 1974.

ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation is The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE II

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, in the City of Shawnee, County of Pottawatomie, and the name of its registered agent is John Thomas Terry, whose business address is Thurmond Hall, The Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III

The duration of the corporation is perpetual.

ARTICLE IV

The purpose of this corporation is to encourage, support, provide, and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In carrying out this purpose, the corporation may endeavor to provide departments of higher education to persons of both sexes on equal terms; to establish, conduct, and maintain and conduct training schools in connection with such preparatory schools or departments; to establish and maintain one or more colleges and to provide instruction in all collegiate studies; to establish and maintain an institution of higher learning in which all the branches of advanced learning may be taught, and which may comprise separate departments of literature, law, medicine, music, technology, theology, the various branches of science, both abstract and applied, the cultivation of the fine arts, and all other branches of professional and technical

education which may properly be included within the purpose and object of such an institution; and to provide and maintain courses of instruction in each of the departments thereof, and to fix rates of tuition and the qualification for admission to the said institution and its various departments; to receive, hold, invest, and disburse all moneys and properties, or the income thereof, which may be vested in the said corporation or entrusted to its care, whether by gift, grant, bequest, devise, or otherwise, for educational purposes; to act as trustees for persons desiring to give or provide money or property or the incomes thereof, for any one or more of the departments of said institution, or for any of the objects aforesaid, or for any educational purposes; to grant such literary honors and degrees as are usually granted by like institutions, and to give suitable diplomas; and generally to pursue and to promote all or any of the objects above named, and to do all things necessary or pertaining to the accomplishment of the said objects and purposes or either of them. And such institution or institutions as shall be established hereunder, shall be given such name or names as the Board of Trustees hereinafter provided for shall designate.

ARTICLE V

The corporation was formed for Charitable, Benevolent, Religious, Education, or Scientific purposes and has no stated capital. This corporation is owned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and is operated through the Board of Trustees elected by that Convention.

ARTICLE VI

By appropriate resolution, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a corporation, on the 10th day of September, 1934, authorized an amendment to the Amended Articles of Incorporation of The Oklahoma Baptist University so as to provide that the number of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be thirty-two (32) Trustees instead of twenty-four (24) Trustees, and said resolution further provided the manner of electing such thirty-two (32) Trustees, but through inadvertence this has not been done. Article Six (6) of the Amended Articles of Incorporation is hereby amended to read as follows:

"That the membership of this corporation shall consist of the several persons who shall be the members of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and they shall annually elect Trustees to fill the place of those whose terms of office expire, and shall have perpetual succession and be elected in the following manner:

That at the next regular meeting of said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, eight Trustees shall be elected for a term of four years, two for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year; and thereafter, at the regular annual meeting of each year said Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall elect eight such Trustees for a term of four years to fill the expiring terms, and the eight Trustees whose terms of office expire annually as herein provided, shall not be eligible for reelection for a period of one year. Vacancies occurring by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise, shall be filled for the unexpired term at the next regular meeting after such vacancy occurs.

That the President and each member of the Board of Trustees of said institution shall be a member of an Oklahoma Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma."

ARTICLE VII

All acts and deed, including the execution of any and all instruments heretofore at any time performed and executed by the Board of Trustees and Officers, or those persons acting as the Board of Trustees and Officers of The Oklahoma Baptist University be and are ratified and confirmed in all respects. In particular, all actions taken and all resolutions adopted at, and all instruments executed pursuant to the meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University held on November 29, 1955, including the election of officers, the authorization, issuance, and sale of The Oklahoma Baptist University Dormitory Bonds, Series 1955, in the amount of \$600,000.00, and the authorization and execution of the indenture and mortgage securing same, and the adoption of parietal rules and rates and charges in connection therewith, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

ARTICLE I POWERS OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the corporation (referred to in this and the following articles as "University") and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- Appoint or remove the President and other Officers of the University Corporation in accordance with these Bylaws;
- 2. Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty;
- 3. Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board Committee;
- 4. Establish and review the educational programs of the University after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs or Special Committees of Review set up by the President and Chairperson of the Board in financial emergency situations.
- 5. Establish annually the budget of the University, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee;
- Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
- 7. Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the University;

- 8. Institute and promote major fund raising efforts of the University;
- 9. Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the University;
- 10. Authorize Officers or agents of the University to accept gifts for the University;
- Authorize the incurring of debts by the University and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of real and personal property, tangible and intangible;
- 12. Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University.

Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors or its Executive Committee.

ARTICLE II MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Each trustee shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, four of whom shall be from among the professional clergy (pastors, church staff, directors of missions, etc.) or their spouses and four of whom shall be among the laymen/laywomen in the churches. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he/she is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself/herself. An employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

Section 2.

Vacancies in the office of the trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the State of Oklahoma or member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma, or death of a trustee, or as the result of his/her inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy in the office of trustees occur during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

In the event any member misses two (2) consectutive meetings of the Board without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the University, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by affirmative vote of the Convention then in office.

ARTICLE III OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, one or more Assistant Secretaries, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board Trustees at its last meeting of the University's fiscal year. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the corporation and Vice Chairman with the office of Vice-President of the corporation. At the March Board Meeting the Board shall elect three trustees to serve as a nominating committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. These trustees shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and written ballot. The nominating committee shall nominte candidates to serve as officers of the Board at the July meeting with opportunity provided at that meeting for nominations to be made from the floor. The term of service for officers of the Board begins at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November.

Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected. Section 3.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The President of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose. The Vice President for Business Affairs of the University shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

Section 4.

The Board may appoint one or more Vice Chairmen, Assistant Secretaries, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the University Corporation.

Section 5.

All Officers of the University Corporation shall hold office at the

discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such Office may have against the University.

ARTICLE IV POWERS AND DUTIES OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION OFFICERS

Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2.

The Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the Board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency.

Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the University and shall be as Treasurer an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He/She shall have the duty to keep or cause to be kept full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to obey all lawful orders of the Trustees, the President of the University, and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the University. He/She shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the University, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, deposit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs Committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the University. He/She shall not pay out any money unless by order of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs Committee may prescribe. He/She shall cooperate with any independent auditors or certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the University, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the University at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may duly require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the University faithfully to perform the duties of his/her office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his/her hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

ARTICLE V POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

Section 1.

The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Such tenure shall include a periodic evaluation system by the Board of Trustees and/or its agents. Such evaluation shall also set the salary and compensation for the President for the term acceptable to the Board and the President.

Section 2.

The President of the University shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the University and the official adviser to and executive agent of the Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee. The President of Oklahoma Baptist University must be an active member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church. He/She shall, as educational and administrative head of the University, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He/She shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts, and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws he/she shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

Section 3.

The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the Administrative and Staff Handbook then in force.

Section 4.

The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in July of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment and tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the **Faculty Handbook** then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

Section 5.

In the event the office of President of The Oklahoma Baptist University becomes vacant, a special nominating committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board before which two weeks notice has been given concerning this needed action. The committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and secret ballot. This special nominating committee shall nominate five trustees to serve as members of the Presidential Search Committee in the next meeting of the Board of Trustees with opportunity provided for nominations to be made from the floor. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the five trustees elected, he shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Chairman of the Faculty Council, the President of the Alumni Association and the President of the Student Government Association shall serve as ex officio, non-voting members of the Search Committee.

The Search Committee shall notify in writing all members of the Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of any prospective candidates. A vita of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents a candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

ARTICLE VI MEETINGS

Section 1.

All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the state of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in November or December, following the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of March, at which time the Board of Trustees shall adopt the budget for the University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Turstees during the month of July, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University, receive reports, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper, except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it. Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter or the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

ARTICLE VII ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING

Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the Trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by all members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or the committee.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES

Section 1.

There may be such special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President, annually, at or following the November-December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these bylaws the Chairman of the Board and the President of the University shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least five additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. The chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees, however.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its standing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the Chairman of the Board, may request the President of the University to appoint an Administrative Officer of the University or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

Section 6.

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be

organized into the following committees:

The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the Board (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary) and the Chairmen of the Administrative Committees. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall receive from the Secretary annually in July the record of attendance and participation by all Board members during the fiscal year preceding. In the event that a trustee has failed to meet the responsibilities of service, the committee shall request from the trustee an indication of his desire for continuing service on the Board or his intention to resign in light of the circumstances and report his response to the Chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Okahoma's Nomination Committee. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Administrative Committees: There shall be five standing administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, Student Development Committee, and the Spiritual Life Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the University. The Administrative Committees shall receive reports from University administrators and consider policies and recommendations regulating the life and function of the University.

Section 7. Academic Affairs Committee.

The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall, in coopertion with the President, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long range enrolment goals; advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs; recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel; and shall review matters affecting the faculty of the University; consider proposals on such matters; and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

Section 8. Business Affairs Committee.

The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Vice President for Business Affairs shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.

Section 9. Development Committee.

The Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review and recommend fund raising and public relations programs and report to the business Affairs Committee on fund raising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting.

Section 10. Student Development Committee.

The Student Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the University, other than those relating to the spiritual life and academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required. Section 11. Spiritual Life Committee.

The Spiritual Life Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review all matters concerning religious activities and the programs that promote spiritual growth and development at Oklahoma Baptist University, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

ARTICLE IX IDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the University shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he has been made a party by reason of his being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as to which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

ARTICLE X CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such member's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his responsibilities to the University, or (b) such Trustee is aware that a member of his family (which for purposes of this paragraph shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his family) is an officer, director, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter, under consideration at a Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The

minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATOR OF PROPERTY

Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the University to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the University, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the University shall be signed by such officer or agent of the University and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees shall require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the University to give bonds in amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the University.

Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the University shall be deposited to the credit of the University in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the University any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the University, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the University.

Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the University shall begin the first day of August and end the last day of July in each year.

ARTICLE XII BYLAW AMENDMENT

Section 1.

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each trustee at his/her usual place of residence.

Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

Section 3.

Prior to each March meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

Adopted by the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University in regular session on March 16, 1990.

Certificate of Incorporation of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

ARTICLE I

Name of Corporation

The Name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

ARTICLE II Registered Office and Agent

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 3800 North May Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is Robert L. Ross, 3800 North May Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112.

ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV Duration

The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V Purpose

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose with its corporate powers;

2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;

3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;

4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;

5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and

6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE VI Directors

There shall be twenty (20) directors of this corporation. Each Director shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated and cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

To assure representation from all areas of the State of Oklahoma, the

membership of the Board of Directors shall be drawn from the following geographical areas:

1. Four (4) directors shall be from the Oklahoma City metropolitan area.

2. Four (4) directors shall be from the Tulsa metropolitan area.

3. Twelve (12) directors shall be from the four quadrants of the state excluding the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. The four quadrants of the State of Oklahoma shall be created by a north-south line consisting of Interstate Highway 35 and an east-west line consisting of Interstate Highway 40 and shall exclude the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. There shall be three (3) directors from each quadrant. No more than two (2) directors from each quadrant shall be from the same city or town.

Of the twenty (20) directors, seventeen (17) shall be lay persons and three (3) shall be ordained ministers of the Gospel or in other church related vocations. At least five (5) of the directors shall be women. To assure continuity, at least four (4) directors shall be persons who have previously served on the Board of Directors. However, a director may not serve consecutive terms, but may be elected to a new term as director after at least one (1) year from the end of his or her previous term as director.

Prerequisite vocational and personal qualifications for nomination of lay directors shall include, among other things, (1) extensive personal knowledge in business affairs which is gained from actual experience in conducting a business or profession; (2) an established good reputation in his or her section of the State as a sound and stable business or professional person, and (3) respect by the general public in his or her section of the State as a person who, if called to mind, would make sound financial investments and decisions and safeguard funds and property.

Subject to the approval of the Board of Directors of the corporation, the President shall annually appoint not to exceed six (6) persons to serve in an advisory capacity to the Board of Directors and to the committees of the Board of Directors. These Advisors shall not have the right to vote. Persons serving in an advisory capacity shall include at least one (1) representative of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and at least one (1) representative of The Oklahoma Baptist University.

ARTICLE VII Members

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE VIII

Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

ARTICLE IX

Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE X Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

ARTICLE XI

Amendments to Certificate of Incorporation

This Certificate of Incorporation may be amended from time to time at any regular meeting of the Board of Directors, or at a special meeting called for the purpose, by a two-thirds majority vote of those Directors present at said meeting.

THIS AMENDMENT is made pursuant to a Resolution of the Board of Directors duly adopted by more than a two-thirds majority vote of all of the Directors at its regular meeting held on May 21, 1993, wherein the proposed amendment was set forth and declared to be advisable. Thereafter, this Amended Certificate of Incorporation was duly adopted by more than two-thirds majority vote of all of the members of the Corporation at a special called meeting held on July 20, 1993.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, this Amended Certificate of Incorporation has been duly executed by the officers this 7th day of September, 1993.

Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE II

Meetings

2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be acts of the members.

2.2 Annual Meetings; Notice. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held during the month of December of each year. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year. No notice of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors is required where the Board of Directors has fixed a regular date, time and place for its annual meeting. Otherwise, the President will fix the date, time and place of the annual meeting and the Secretary shall give notice of the date, time and place of the annual meeting by mail or facsimile transmission more than ten (10) days before the annual meeting.

2.3 Regular Meetings; Notice. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held in the months of January, March, May, July, and October. No notice of regular meetings of the Board of Directors is required where the Board of Directors has fixed a regular date, time and place for its regular meeting. Otherwise, the President shall fix the date, time and place of the meeting and the Secretary shall give notice of the date, time and place of each regular meeting by mail or facsimile transmission more than ten (10) days before the meeting.

2.4 Special Meetings; Notice. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the Chairperson of the Board of Directors, the President, or by one third of the directors then in office. The Secretary shall give notice of the date, time, place, and purpose or purposes of each special meeting by mail more than five (5) days before the meeting or by facsimile transmission or by telephoning more than two (2) days before the meeting.

2.5 Telephone Conference Meetings. Both regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors may be held by telephone conference calls confirmed by minutes to be distributed to each director for his or her approval within ten (10) days after such meeting. Approval will be manifested by the director signing an approval of the minutes and returning such approval to the Secretary.

2.6 Waiver of Notice of Meeting. Attendance at any meeting waives notice of that meeting, and notice may also be waived in writing either before or after such meeting.

ARTICLE III Officers

3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation.

3.2 The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommeded by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

3.3 Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairperson of the Board. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesperson, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

4.2 Vice-Chairpersons of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

4.3 President. The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.

4.3-1 The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma,

shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the President (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the Board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be countersigned by the Chairperson or one of the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.

4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.

4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.

4.4 Vice-Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 Secretary. The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

ARTICLE V

Directors

5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by twenty (20) directors.

5.1-1 It shall be the duty of the directors to invest and re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval and with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a

report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.

5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

5.2 In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Convention, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall, in compliance with Article VI of the Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation, nominate five members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term for each such member shall be four years, and each such member shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. Recognizing that he is uniquely informed as to persons whose particular capabilities and dedication set them apart for such service, the President of the corporation, acting with the approval of the Executive Committee of the corporation, shall recommend to said Committee on Nominations those persons from the various sections of the State whom he deems qualified to serve as directors, with the full expectations that his recommendations shall be given foremost consideration by the Committee on Nominations.

5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.

5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairperson and Vice Chairpersons of the Board, and the Chairpersons of all standing committees. The President, Executive Vice President and Vice Presidents shall serve as ex-officio members without right to vote.

5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint from their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the directors deemed advisable.

5.6 Quorums. A quorum of the Board of Directors, Executive Committee and any other committee appointed by the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of the authorized number of Directors (if the Board of Directors) or a majority of the members entitled to vote (if a committee). All matters properly coming before the Board of Directors, Executive Committee and any other committee shall be determined by majority vote of those Directors present (if the Board of Directors) or of those members present who are entitled to vote (if a committee). In the absence of a quorum, those Directors or committee members present may adjourn any meeting from day to day, but may not transact any business.

5.7 Meetings of the Committees; Telephone Meetings Permitted. Regular and special meetings of the Executive committee and any other committee appointed by the Board of Directors may be called by the chairperson or by one third of the members entitled to vote. The secretary of the committee shall give notice of the date, time, place, and purpose or purposes of each meeting by mail more than five (5) days before the meeting or by facsimile transmission or by telephoning more than two (2) days before the meeting. Attendance at any meeting waives notice of that meeting, and notice may also be waived in writing either before or after such meeting. Both regular and special meetings of the Executive Committee or of any other committees appointed by the Board of Directors may be held by telephone conference calls. The actions taken in telephonic conferences shall be confirmed by minutes which shall be distributed to each member of the committee prior to the next regular or special meeting of the committee and shall be ratified by the acceptance of the minutes of such telephonic meeting by the majority of members of the committee entitled to vote.

ARTICLE VI

Administrations of Funds and Property

6.1 Extent of Authority. The directors shall have and exercise full authority with reference to the investment, reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to the corporation, and shall have authority to execute property transfers, assignments, contracts, deed, oil and gas leases and mineral deeds, releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and all instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and, in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.

6.2 Designated Gifts. Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

(a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.

(b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies located in the State of Oklahoma, and of causes, agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

ARTICLE VII

Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA, CORPORATE SEAL."

ARTICLE VIII

Idemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer or employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.

8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

ARTICLE IX

Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the convention

ARTICLE ONE

Name

The name of the Corporation is OKLAHOMA BAPTIST HOMES FOR CHILDREN, INC., hereinafter called "OBHC."

ARTICLE TWO

Registered Office and Agent

The domicile of this Corporation shall be 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112-6506, which address shall also constitute the location and post office address of its registered office. The name of the initial registered agent of the OBHC is Ron Argo, and his address is 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112-6506.

ARTICLE THREE

Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes

This Corporation is a not-for-profit (eleemosynary) religious, and charitable Corporation as defined in Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE FOUR Duration

The period of its duration is perpetual.

ARTICLE FIVE

Capital Stock

This Corporation does not have the authority to issue capital stock.

ARTICLE SIX Purpose

The purposes of the Corporation shall be charitable, eleemosynary, religious, to provide care for children, and to provide preventive and redemptive services for children, parents and family as mandated by the scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ which are in keeping with the purpose of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. This Corporation is an auxiliary Corporation of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma under the terms of Article VI of the Convention's Bylaws. In furtherance of its general purpose, the Corporation shall perform any or all of the following:

a. To provide and maintain facilities known as the Baptist Children's Homes and Boys Ranch Town or such other facilities as may be established for dependent, neglected, and/or needy children of the State of Oklahoma.

b. To establish and maintain a child care program to meet the spiritual, physical, mental, and emotional needs of homeless and dependent children;

c. To establish Christian homes in the State of Oklahoma as foster homes for children;

d. To provide group care and treatment for children whose needs cannot at the time be adequately met in a family;

e. To provide supportive and supplementary services for children in need of assistance while the child is living in his or her home with natural or foster parents;

f. To provide and maintain facilities known as Crisis Pregnancy Centers and/or such other facilities as may be established for providing help to women in crisis pregnancies, promoting sanctity of life and giving Christian witness.

g. To secure and maintain Child Placement license, residential, and other licenses as needed.

h. To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

ARTICLE SEVEN Members

The subscribers of the original Certificate of Incorporation constitute the members of the Corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected trustees of the Corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE EIGHT Board of Trustees

All corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the direction of the Corporation's Board of Directors, who shall be called Trustees. Upon the formation of the Corporation, there will be five (5) interim

trustees of the Corporation, whose terms will expire upon the election of trustees at the next succeeding annual meeting of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma following the formation of the Corporation. There shall be not less than five (5) and no more than twenty-five (25) trustees of this Corporation. Each Trustee shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated and cooperating with The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and a resident of the State of Oklahoma. Except for interim trustees described above, all trustees shall be elected by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. The number of Trustees serving at any time shall be established by the existing Trustees of this Corporation, subject to the number, terms of office, and other restrictions for persons serving as Trustees of this Corporation as shall be determined by the Corporation's Board of Trustees. Provided, all such restrictions must first be approved by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE NINE

Powers

The Corporation shall have the following powers:

a. To purchase and hold title in fee simple absolute, without any remainder or reversion, any real estate, and to convey, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge, exchange or otherwise dispose of any such reality.

b. To purchase and own personal property, which is suitable, necessary, useful or advisable for the transaction of the business of the Corporation,

c. To enter upon, improve, develop, manage, and otherwise deal with such real property.

d. To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, and to hold, barter, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, sell, invest, and otherwise dispose of all money or property, real, personal, or mixed, either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purpose or any other purpose within its corporate powers;

e. To prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the Corporation is involved;

f. To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration, and disposition of property; the making of conveyances, assignments, and contracts; and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general powers and object of this Corporation; and

g. The Corporation is authorized to exercise any and all powers authorized by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE TEN

Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status

No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of or be distributable to its trustees, officers, or other private persons; however, the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article Six. No part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrving on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate, for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a Corporation exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE ELEVEN Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the Corporation, title to all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

In the event The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall not be an organization qualified as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code upon dissolution or disbanding of the Corporation, then the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be distributed to such other like organizations which then qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as the Board of Trustees of this Corporation may select and designate; and in no event shall any of said assets or property, in the event of dissolution thereof, go or be distributed to any private individuals, either for the reimbursement of any sum subscribed, donated or contributed by such private individuals, or for any other purpose.

ARTICLE TWELVE Amendments to Certificate of Incorporation

This Certificate of Incorporation may be amended from time to time at any regular meeting of the Board of Trustees, or at a special meeting called for that purpose, by a two-thirds majority vote of those Trustees present at said meeting; except that Article Eight, Article Eleven and Article Twelve may not be amended without the approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

BYLAWS

OF

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST HOMES FOR CHILDREN, INC.

The purposes of the Corporation shall be charitable, eleemosynary, religious, to provide care for children, and

to to provide preventive and redemptive services for children, parents and family as mandated by the scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ

ARTICLE I OFFICES/MEMBERSHIP

1.01. Registered Office. The registered office shall be located at 3800 North May in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112.

1.02. Principal Office. The principal office of the Corporation is 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112.

The Board of Trustees shall have full power and authority to change the principal office of the Corporation from one location to another as the Board of Trustees deems advisable. Any such change shall be noted in the Bylaws by the Secretary in this section to state the new location.

1.03. Other Offices. The Corporation may also have offices at such other places within the State of Oklahoma as the Board of Trustees may from time to time determine or the business of the Corporation may require.

1.04. Members of Corporation. The subscribers of the original Certificate of Incorporation constitute the members of the Corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected trustees of the Corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE II PURPOSES AND POWERS

2.01. Purposes and Powers. The purposes of the Corporation shall be charitable, eleemosynary, religious, to provide care for children, and to provide preventive and redemptive services for children, parents and family as mandated by the scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ which are in keeping with the purpose of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. This Corporation is an auxiliary Corporation of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma under the terms of Article VI of the Convention's Bylaws. In furtherance of its general purpose, the Corporation shall perform any or all of the following:

A. To provide and maintain facilities known as the Baptist Children's Homes and Boys Ranch Town or such other facilities as may be established for dependent, neglected, and/or needy children of the State of Oklahoma.

B. To establish and maintain a child care program to meet the spiritual, physical, mental, and emotional needs of homeless and dependent children;

C. To establish Christian homes in the State of Oklahoma as foster homes for children;

D. To provide group care and treatment for children whose needs cannot at the time be adequately met in a family;

E. To provide supportive and supplementary services for children in need of assistance while the child is living in his or her home with natural or foster parents;

F. To provide and maintain facilities known as Crisis Pregnancy Centers and/or such other facilities as may be established for providing help to women in crisis pregnancies, promoting sanctity of life and giving Christian witness.

G. To secure and maintain Child Placement license, residential, and other licenses as needed.

H. To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

The purposes specified herein shall be construed both as purposes and powers and shall be in no wise limited or restricted by reference to, or inference from, the terms of any other clause in this or any other Article hereof, but the purposes and powers specified in each of the clauses herein shall be regarded as independent purposes and powers, and the enumeration of specific purposes and power shall not be construed to limit or restrict in any manner the meanings of general terms or of the general powers of the Corporation; nor shall the expression of one thing be deemed to exclude another, although it be of like nature not expressed. In carrying out the spirit and letter of the corporate purposes and objectives of the Corporation, as expressed in its Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, the Corporation shall have the following powers:

A. To purchase and hold title in fee simple absolute, without any remainder or reversion, any real estate, and to convey, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge, exchange or otherwise dispose of any such reality.

B. To purchase and own personal property, which is suitable, necessary, useful or advisable for the transaction of the business of the Corporation,

C. To enter upon, improve, develop, manage and otherwise deal with such real property.

D. To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, and to hold, barter, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, sell, invest, and otherwise dispose of all money or property, real, personal, or mixed, either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purpose or any other purpose within its corporate powers;

E. To prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the Corporation is involved;

F. To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration, and disposition of property; the making of conveyances, assignments, and contracts; and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general powers and object of this Corporation; and

G. The Corporation is authorized to exercise any and all powers authorized by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III TRUSTEES

3.01. Powers/Exclusivity. Subject to the limitations provided by law and the Certificate of Incorporation of this Corporation, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under the authority of a Board of Trustees, and the business and affairs of such Corporation shall be managed and conducted exclusively by the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors.

3.02. Number of Trustees. The number of voting trustees shall be not less than five (5) and no more than twenty-five (25).

3.03. Criteria for Selection of Trustees. A trustee shall be a mem-

ber of a Baptist church cooperating with The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

To assure representation from all areas of the State of Oklahoma, the membership of the Board of Trustees shall be drawn from the following geographical areas:

- 1. Twenty percent (20%) of the trustees shall be from the Oklahoma City metropolitan area.
- 2. Twenty percent (20%) of the trustees shall be from the Tulsa metropolitan area.
- 3. Sixty percent (60%) of the trustees shall be from the four quadrants of the state excluding the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. The four quadrants of the State of Oklahoma shall be created by a north-south line consisting of Interstate Highway 35 and an east-west line consisting of Interstate Highway 40 and shall exclude the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. There shall be an equal number of trustees from each quadrant. No more than two (2) trustees from each quadrant shall be from the same city or town.

Of the trustees, one-half (1/2) shall be lay persons and one-half (1/2) shall be ordained ministers of the Gospel or in other church related vocations. At least twenty-five percent (25%) of the trustees shall be women.

An employee of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children become an employee of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

3.04. Election and Term of Office.

A. Election. All trustees shall be elected by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma by a majority of those messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. These trustees shall be nominated by the Convention's Committee on Nominations.

B. Term of Office.

1. Initial Trustees. Except for the interim trustees provided in Article Eight of the Certificate of Incorporation whose terms expire upon the election of initial trustees provided herein, there will be twenty (20) initial trustees of the Corporation. The terms of the initial trustees shall be as follows: five (5) trustees shall serve a term of one (1) year, five (5) trustees shall serve a term of two (2) years, five (5) trustees shall serve a term of three (3) years, and five (5) trustees shall serve terms of four (4) years each.

2. Term After Initial Trustees. After the election of the initial trustees, a trustee shall serve a term of four (4) years, except if the

trustee is elected to fill a vacancy, the trustee shall serve out the term of the prior trustee.

3.05. Ex Officio Members. The Executive Director of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or his designee shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees. He shall not count as one of the twenty-five (25) trustees.

3.06. Vacancies.

A. Vacancies may be filled by a majority of the remaining trustees of the Corporation then in office. Any interim trustee so chosen shall hold office until the next annual meeting of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any interim trustee so chosen shall also serve until such interim trustee's successor is duly elected and shall qualify, unless such trustee resigns or is removed.

B. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Trustees shall be deemed to exist in the event of the death, resignation or removal of any trustee, or if the Board of Trustees by resolution declares vacant the office of a trustee who has been declared of unsound mind by an order of court or convicted of a felony. In the event any person elected to the Board of Trustees fails to attend two (2) consecutive meetings of the trustees without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the Corporation, his or her position on the Board may be deemed to have become vacant, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

C. Any trustee may resign effective on giving written notice to the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, unless notice specifies a later time for that resignation to become effective. If the resignation of a trustee is effective at a future time, the Board of Trustees may elect a successor to take office when the resignation becomes effective.

3.07. Removal of Trustee(s). Any trustee may be removed, for cause, by a majority vote at any meeting of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

3.08. Place of Meetings. The Board of Trustees may hold meetings, both regular and special, either within or without the State of Oklahoma at a place which has been designated from time to time by the Office of the President.

3.09. Annual/Regular Meetings. An annual meeting of the Board of Trustees for the purpose of election of officers of the Corporation and the transaction of any other business as may be properly brought before such meeting shall be held on the first Tuesday in December of each year. In addition to the annual meeting, the Board of Trustees will hold a meeting in each other quarter of the calendar year.

Other regular meetings of the Board may be held at such time as shall from time to time be determined by the Board.

3.10. Quorum. At all meetings of the Board, a majority of trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the act of

a majority of the trustees present at any meeting shall be the act of the Board of Trustees, except as may be otherwise specifically provided by law or by the Certificate of Incorporation. If a quorum shall not be present at any meeting of the Board of Trustees, the trustees present may adjourn the meeting from time to time, without notice other than announcement at the meeting, until a quorum shall be present.

3.11. Voting. Each trustee shall have one (1) vote on each matter presented to the Board for a vote. No trustee may vote by proxy.

3.12. Special Meetings.

A. Special meetings of the Board for any purpose or purposes may be called at any time by the Chairperson of the Board or President, or if either of them are absent or unable to act, by any Vice Chairperson, Vice President or Secretary, when, in such person's judgment, a matter of sufficient importance requires the immediate attention of the entire Board of Trustees. By unanimous consent of the trustees, special meetings of the Board may be held without notice at any time and place.

B. Special meetings shall be called by the Chairperson of the Board, President or Secretary in like manner and on like notice, if any, on the written request of eleven (11) trustees.

C. No business shall be considered at any special meeting other than the purposes mentioned in the notice unless the trustees present waive this section.

3.13. Continued Meetings. A quorum of the trustees may adjourn any trustees' meeting to meet again at a stated day and hour; provided, however, that in the absence of a quorum a majority of the trustees present at any trustees' meeting, either regular or special, may adjourn to a later date but may not transact any business until a quorum has been secured. At any continued meeting at which a required number of trustees shall be present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified.

3.14. Notice of Continued Meetings. Notice of the time and place of holding an adjourned meeting which is to be continued at a later date need not be given to absent trustees if the time and place is fixed at the adjourned meeting.

3.15. Telephonic Meetings. Members of the Board of Trustees, or of any committee thereof, may participate in a meeting of such Board or committee by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment that enables all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other. Such participation shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.

3.16. Action Without Meeting. Unless otherwise restricted by the Certificate of Incorporation or these Bylaws, any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Board of Trustees or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if a written consent to such action is signed by all members of the Board or of such committee

as the case may be, and such written consent is filed with the minutes of proceedings of the Board or committee.

3.17. Fees and Compensation. No trustee (as such) of the Corporation shall receive, directly or indirectly, any salary or compensation from the Corporation, but may receive reimbursement for personal expenses actually incurred in carrying out their responsibilities as trustee.

3.18. Maintenance and Inspection of Bylaws. The Corporation shall keep at its principal office, the original or a copy of the Bylaws as amended to date, which shall be open to inspection by the trustees at all times during office hours.

3.19. Maintenance and Inspection of Other Corporation Records. The accounting books and records and written actions of and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Trustees and any committee or committees of the Board of Trustees shall be kept at the principal office of the Corporation. The minutes and actions shall be kept in written form and the accounting books and records shall be kept either in written or in any other form capable of being converted into written form. Every trustee shall have the absolute right at any reasonable time to inspect all minutes, accounting books, records and documents of every kind and the physical properties of the Corporation.

ARTICLE IV NOTICES

4.01. Notice of Annual/Regular Meeting of Board of Trustees. The Secretary of the Corporation shall cause written notice of annual and regular meetings of the Board of Trustees to be given to each member of the Board of Trustees at least ten (10) days prior to any meeting of the Board of Trustees. Such notices shall set forth the date, time, and place of the annual and regular meeting and shall be addressed to each trustee at the addresses that appear on the books of the Corporation or at such other address as supplied by such trustee. Delivery of notices shall be deemed sufficient if deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid; delivery of electronic transmission of facsimile copies; or personally delivered.

4.02. Notice of Special Meetings of Board of Trustees. Except as specified in the paragraphs 3.15, 3.16 and 4.03, written notice of the place, date, hour, and the purposes of all special meetings shall be delivered to each trustee. Notices to trustees of special meetings shall be in writing and delivered personally or mailed to the trustees at their addresses appearing on the books of the Corporation, or at such other address as may be supplied by said trustee for the purpose of notice. In case such notice is mailed or sent by facsimile transmission, it shall be deposited in the United States Mail or sent by facsimile transmission in the place in which the principal office of the Corporation is located at least five (5) days prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. In case such notice is delivered personally, it shall be so delivered at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. Such mailing, facsimile transmission, or delivery as provided above shall be due, legal, and personal notice to such trustee.

4.03. Waiver of Notice. Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of law or of the Certificate of Incorporation or of these Bylaws, a waiver in writing signed by the trustee to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to notice. Attendance of a person at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except when the person attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting, at the beginning of the meeting, to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

ARTICLE V OFFICERS

5.01. Officers Designated. The elective officers of this Corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, the President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, and a Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation.

5.02. Election Term. The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the trustees for terms of one (1) year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the trustees of said Corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents, Secretary, and Chief Financial Officer shall be recommended by the President and elected by the trustees and shall serve until their successors are elected.

5.03. Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Trustees shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Trustees from time to time.

5.04. Removal and Resignation.

A. Any officer may be removed, either with or without cause, by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees, at any regular or special meeting there of.

B. Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Trustees, or to the President, or to the Secretary of the Corporation. Any such resignation shall take effect at the date of the receipt of such notice or at any later time specified therein; and, unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

5.05. Vacancies. If the office of any officer becomes vacant by reason of death, resignation, retirement, disqualification, removal from office, or otherwise, the Trustees then in office, by a vote of a majority

of the members of the Board, may choose a successor or successors, who shall hold office for the unexpired term in respect of which such vacancy occurred.

5.06. Filling More Than One Office. Any two offices of the Corporation may be held by the same person, except that no officer shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument in more than one capacity if the instrument is required by law or the Certificate of Incorporation or the Bylaws to be executed, acknowledged or verified by two or more officers.

ARTICLES VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

6.01. Chairperson of the Board. The Chairperson of the Board of Trustees shall preside over all meetings of the Trustees; shall be their official spokesperson and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

6.02. Vice-Chairpersons of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Trustees. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Trustees.

6.03. President. The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and, subject to the control of the trustees, shall supervise and control generally all the business and affairs of the Corporation, including:

A. He shall, after consulting with the Board of Trustees, appoint all committees of the Board of Trustees and shall be an ex-officio (non-voting) member of each committee.

B. He, or his designee(s), shall sign or countersign, as may be necessary all such bills, notes, checks, contracts and other instruments as may pertain to the ordinary course of the Corporation's business.

C. He shall execute bonds, mortgages, and other contracts requiring a seal under the seal of the Corporation, except where required or permitted by law to be otherwise signed and executed and except where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the Board of Trustees to some other officer or agent of the Corporation.

D. At the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees, he shall submit a complete report of the operations of the Corporation's affairs as existing at the close of each year and shall report to the Board of Trustees from time to time all such matters coming to his attention and relating to the interest of the Corporation as should be brought to the attention of the Board.

E. He shall have such usual powers and duties of supervision and management as may pertain to the Office of the President and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees or the Bylaws.

F. In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of

Trustees, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements.

G. The President shall file with the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the Corporation as an operating expense.

6.04. Vice-President. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the Corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

6.05. Secretary. The Secretary of the Corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Trustees, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

6.06. Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation shall:

A. Have the care and custody of all corporate funds, securities and properties of the Corporation, and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Corporation;

B. Deposit all monies, and other valuable effects, in the name and to the credit of the Corporation in such depositories as may be designated by the Board of Trustees;

C. Keep separate, apart, and inviolate all funds given to the Corporation in trust, or with limitations as to the income or use thereof, and the investments thereof shall be made as directed by the Board of Trustees;

D. Disburse the funds of the Corporation as may be ordered by the Board of Trustees;

E. Render to the President and Trustees, at the regular meetings of the Board or whenever they may require it, an account of all transactions made as Chief Financial Officer and of the financial condition of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VII

RECEIPT, INVESTMENT AND DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS, ACCOUNTING OF ASSETS, BORROWING FUNDS AND AUDITORS AND AUDITS

7.01. Funds. The Board of Trustees may from time to time authorize additional persons to draw upon the funds of the Corporation, whether by check or otherwise.

7.02. Bond. All officers and employees of the Corporation whose duties shall require them to handle funds belonging to the Corporation shall be bonded for the faithful performance of their duties at the

expense of the Corporation by sureties selected by the Corporation. The President may forthwith terminate the services of any employee who is unable to furnish a satisfactory bond.

7.03. Trust Funds. Any funds received in trust or for a specific purpose shall be segregated and not commingled with other funds of the Corporation. All funds received by the Corporation in trust shall be turned over to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for management.

7.04. Disbursement of Funds. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this Corporation, no funds or property of this Corporation shall be disbursed except for a proper corporate purpose and unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor.

7.05. Loans. This Corporation shall comply with Article V Section 4 of the Constitution of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and in accordance therewith the Corporation may borrow such sums as may be necessary and essential to the routine, prudent, and efficient operation of the Corporation in carrying out its corporate purposes, provided that the aggregate amount of debt incurred by the Corporation, less any indebtedness due and owing to or obtained from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, shall not exceed the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00); provided that, in the event the Corporation shall need to borrow sums in excess of the aggregate amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) (exclusive of any amounts owed or obtained from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma), which sum shall be determined to be a "Major Expenditure" under Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, the Corporation shall obtain the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In no event shall the Corporation give any security for such borrowing, to include mortgages and security interests in the personal property of the Corporation, without the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

7.06. Annual Report of Auditor. The Chief Financial Officer shall submit to the Trustees an annual report of all income and disbursement prepared by an independent Certified Public Accountant firm. The auditor shall answer to and report to the Board of Trustees through the Chief Financial Officer its findings pertaining to the Corporation audit.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees may, by resolution passed by a majority of the whole Board, designate one or more committees, including but not limited to an Executive Committee, each committee to consist of three (3) or more of the trustees of the Corporation, which to the extent provided in the resolution, shall have and may exercise the powers of the Board of Trustees in the management of the business and affairs of the Corporation, except where action of the Board of Trustees is required by law, and may authorize the seal of the Corporation to be affixed to all papers that may require it. Such committee or committees shall have such name or names as may be determined from time to time by resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE IX PROPERTY

9.01. General Powers Regarding Property. Subject to Sections 9.02 and 9.03 below, the Corporation, acting through its Board of Trustees, shall have the right to own, to buy or sell, to alienate or convey, and to mortgage or pledge any or all of its property, personal, real or mixed, in such way as the Board of Trustees may in its judgment think is beneficial to the Corporation and in furtherance of its general purpose as declared in the Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, including the right to lend, rent, or lease any or all of its property on such terms as the Board of Trustees may think is in furtherance of the main purpose for which the Corporation is established.

9.02. No Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Without Approval by Board of Trustees of Corporation and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No personal property having a value in excess of \$100,000.00, and no real property, may be purchased, acquired other than by gift, sold, transferred, assigned or conveyed by the Corporation, unless the Board of Trustees of the Corporation and the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma approves such purchase or sale and determines that such sale shall be necessary or convenient and for the best interests of the Corporation. No acquisition, purchase, assignment, conveyance, or transfer of such property or any interest therein either to or from the Corporation shall at any time be made by the Corporation until such purchase, acquisition, assignment, transfer or conveyance shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such transfer or conveyance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

9.03. No Encumbrances of Property Without Approval of Board of Trustees of Corporation and of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Corporation shall not pledge, hypothecate, mortgage, assign, or grant a security interest or lien in or to any real or personal property owned or to be acquired by the Corporation without the prior approval of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation and of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation until such approval has been obtained by a vote of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

ARTICLE X

LIABILITY: INDEMNIFICATION OF TRUSTEES, OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES AND VOLUNTEERS

10.01. Limited liability. To the maximum extent permitted by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma, and any other provision of Oklahoma law, as now existing or as it may hereafter be amended, no trustee of this Corporation shall be personally liable to this Corporation for monetary damages for breach of fiduciary duty as a trustee.

10.02. Indemnification of Trustees. The Corporation shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a trustee, officer, employee, or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, officer, employee, or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines, and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding if he acted in good faith and in a manner he reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the Corporation, and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, and reasonable cause to believe that his conduct was not unlawful.

10.03. Authorization of Indemnification. Any indemnification under Section 10.02 of this Article (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation upon a determination that indemnification of the trustee, officer, employee, or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Section 10.02. Such determination shall be made by the Board of Trustees by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of trustees who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable, a quorum of disinterested trustees so directs, by independent legal counsel in a written opinion.

10.04. Non-Exclusive Indemnification. The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the law

of the State of Oklahoma, as now or hereafter enacted; the Certificate of Incorporation; any agreement; and any insurance purchased by the Corporation. Such rights shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a trustee, officer, employee or agent and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, and administrators of such a person.

10.05. Insurance. The Corporation shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a trustee, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, officer, employee, or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provisions of this Article X.

ARTICLE XI CONFLICT OF INTEREST

11.01. Definition. A trustee or officer of the Corporation shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such trustee or officer has existing or potential financial or other interests which might impair or might reasonably appear to impair such person's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his or her responsibilities, or (b) if such trustee or officer is aware that such trustee or a member of his or her family (which for purposes of this provision shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the trustee or officer) is an officer, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interest. Any trustee or officer who is uncertain whether he or she has a conflict of interest may request the Board of Trustees shall resolve the question by majority vote, with the requesting trustee abstaining.

11.02. Disqualification Because of Conflict of Interest. A trustee or officer of this Corporation having a conflict of interest shall be disqualified from dealing or contracting with the Corporation as a vendor, purchaser or otherwise; and any transaction, contract or act of the Corporation with such trustee or any member of his family as defined in 11.01 above having a conflict of interest shall be void.

11.03. Disclosure of Conflict of Interest. The fact that such trustee or officer has a conflict of interest shall be disclosed or shall be known to all of the trustees, or to such members thereof as shall be present at any meeting of the Board of Trustees at which action upon any such contract, transaction or act shall be taken. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the trustee or officer having a conflict of interest declared such conflict of interest.

ARTICLE XII DISSOLUTION

12.01. Dissolution. The Corporation may be dissolved by an affirmative vote of a majority of all the trustees of the Corporation then in office at a meeting called for the purpose of considering such a proposal or, if there be not any trustees, by order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

12.02. Disposition of Property. Upon final dissolution of the Corporation or disbanding of the Corporation, title to the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be vested in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In the event The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall not be an organization qualified as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code upon dissolution or disbanding of the Corporation, then the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be distributed to such other like organizations which then qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as the Board of Trustees of this Corporation may select and designate; and in no event shall any of said assets or property, in the event of dissolution thereof, go or be distributed to any private individuals, either for the reimbursement of any sum subscribed, donated, or contributed by such private individuals, or for any other purpose.

ARTICLE XIII FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall be as the Board of Trustees shall designate and may be changed from time to time as deemed for the best interests of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XIV TAX EXEMPT STATUS

14.01. Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes. The Corporation is organized exclusively as a not-for-profit (eleemosynary) corporation as defined in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Code.

14.02. Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other

provision of these Articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt under Section 501(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE XV SEAL

The seal of the Corporation shall consist of a flatfaced die with the following words and figures cut or engraved thereon:

ARTICLE XVI

AMENDMENTS, SEVERANCE, CAPTIONS, CONSTRUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

16.01. Amendments. These Bylaws will be reviewed annually. They may be repealed, amended, or added to, at any meeting of the Board of Trustees by the affirmative vote of a majority of the trustees attending such meeting, or by written assent of a majority of the trustees, so long as such amendments are not inconsistent with law, and so long as such amendments do not disqualify the Corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or the corresponding provision of any future United States Revenue Law; except that Sections 3.01, 3.03, 3.04.A, 3.07, 7.05, 9.02, 9.03, and 16.01 of these Bylaws may not be amended without the approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. 16.02. Severance. If any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or provision of these Bylaws is void or illegal, it shall not impair nor affect the rest of these Bylaws and the shareholders and trustees do hereby declare that they would have adopted and approved the rest of these Bylaws if such void or illegal provision had been excluded therefrom.

16.03. Captions. The captions contained in these Bylaws are for convenience and reference and in no way define, describe, extend, or limit the scope or intent of these Bylaws or the intent of any provision contained herein.

16.04. Construction and Definitions. Unless the context otherwise requires, the general provisions, rules of construction, and definitions contained in the general provisions of the Oklahoma General Corporation Act shall govern the construction of these Bylaws.

This Corporation is an auxiliary corporation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma under the terms of article VI of the Convention's bylaws. In furtherance of its general purpose, the Corporation shall perform any or all of the following:

a. To operate one or more long term care institutions, nursing facilities, assisted living units, independent living units, day care units, respite care service or other housing facility for elderly persons.

b. To provide care to the aged, sick, injured, destitute or otherwise needy persons.

d. To promote cooperation and coordination between health care professionals, institutions, facilities, groups, individuals and public agencies in community health planning efforts.

e. To develop, produce, publish and make available items for educational purposes which will promote or improve the physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs of elderly persons.

f. To seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from contributions and from other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the directors be deemed judicious and proper.

g. To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

ARTICLE SEVEN Members

The subscribers of the original Certificate of Incorporation constitute the members of the Corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected Board of Directors of the Corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE EIGHT Board of Directors

All corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the direction of the Corporation's Board of Directors. Upon the foundation of the Corporation, there will be five (5) interim directors of the Corporation, whose term will expire upon the election of Directors at the next succeeding annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma following the foundation of the Corporation. There shall be not less than five (5) and no more than twenty-five (25) Directors of this Corporation. Each Director shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated and cooperating with The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and a resident of the State of Oklahoma. All Directors shall be elected by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. The number of Directors serving at any time shall be established by the existing Directors of this corporation, subject to the number, terms of office, and other restrictions for persons serving as Directors of this corporation as shall be determined by the corporation's Board of Directors. ARTICLE NINE Powers

The Corporation shall have the following powers:

No part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate, for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a Corporation exempt from Federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

ARTICLE ELEVEN Dissolution

In the event of the dissolution of the Corporation, title to all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

In the event the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall not be an organization qualified as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code upon dissolution or disbanding of the Corporation, then the remaining assets of the

Corporation shall be distributed to such other like organizations which then qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as the Board of Directors of this Corporation may select and designate; and in no event shall any of said assets or property, in the event of dissolution thereof, go or be distributed to any private individuals, either for the reimbursement of any sum subscribed, donated or contributed by such private individuals, or for any other purpose.

ARTICLE TWELVE

Amendments to Certificate of Incorporation

ARTICLE I OFFICES/MEMBERSHIP

1.01. Registered Office. The registered office shall be located at 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112-6506.

1.02. Principal Office. The principal office of the Corporation is 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112-6506.

The Board of Directors shall have full power and authority to change the principal office of the Corporation from one location to another as the Board of Directors deems advisable. Any such change shall be noted in the Bylaws by the Secretary in this section to state the new location.

1.03. Other Offices. The Corporation may also have offices at such other places within the State of Oklahoma as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine or the business of the Corporation may require.

1.04. Members of Corporation. The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constitute the members of the Corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected Board of Directors of the Corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

ARTICLE II PURPOSES AND POWERS

2.01. Purposes and Powers. A not-for-profit corporation organized for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes in providing aged, sick or injured persons with housing facilities, long term care nursing facilities and other services designed to meet their physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs and to contribute to their health, security, happiness, spiritual well-being and usefulness in longer living as mandated by the Scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ. This Corporation is an auxiliary Corporation of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma under the terms of article VI of the Convention's by-laws. In furtherance of its general purpose, the Corporation shall perform any or all of the following:

A. To operate one or more long term care institutions, nursing facilities, assisted living units, independent living units, day care units, respite care service or/other housing facility for elderly persons.

B. To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care to the aged, sick, injured, destitute or otherwise needy persons.

C. To engage in research and scientific and educational activities related to the care of the aged, sick and injured in promoting long-term care and nursing care.

D. To promote cooperation and coordination between health care professionals, institutions, facilities, groups, individuals and public agencies in community health planning efforts.

E. To develop, produce, publish and make available items for educational purposes which will promote or improve the physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs of elderly persons.

F. To seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from contributions and from other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the directors be deemed judicious and proper.

G. To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

The purposes specified herein shall be construed both as purposes and powers and shall be in no wise limited or restricted by reference to, or inference from, the terms of any other clause in this or any other Article hereof, but the purposes and powers specified in each of the clauses herein shall be regarded as independent purposes and powers, and the enumeration of specific purposes and power shall not be construed to limit or restrict in any manner the meanings of general terms or of the general powers of the Corporation; nor shall the expression of one thing be deemed to exclude another, although it be of like nature not expressed.

In carrying out the spirit and letter of the corporate purposes and objectives of the Corporation, as expressed in its Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, the Corporation shall have the following powers:

A. To purchase and hold title in fee simple absolute, without any remainder or reversion, any real estate, and to convey, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge, exchange or otherwise dispose of any such reality.

B. To purchase and own personal property, which is suitable, necessary, useful or advisable for the transaction of the business of the Corporation,

C. To enter upon, improve, develop, manage and otherwise deal with such real property.

D. To solicit, collect, receive, accumulate, administer and disburse funds. To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, and to hold, barter, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, sell, invest, and otherwise dispose of all money or property, real, personal, or mixed, either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purpose or any other purpose within its corporate powers;

E. To prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the Corporation is involved;

F. To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration, and disposition of property; the making of conveyances, assignments, and contracts; and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general powers and object of this Corporation; and

G. The Corporation is authorized to exercise any and all powers authorized by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma.

ARTICLE III BOARD OF DIRECTORS

3.01. Powers/Exclusivity. Subject to the limitations provided by law and the Certificate of Incorporation of this Corporation, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under the authority of

a Board of Directors, and the business and affairs of such Corporation shall be managed and conducted exclusively by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors.

3.02. Number of Directors. The number of persons that shall constitute the voting members of the Board of Directors shall be not less than five (5) and not more than twenty-five (25).

3.03. Criteria for Selection of Directors. A director shall be a member of a Baptist church cooperating with The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

The desired qualifications for service as directors of this Corporation shall include recognized effort and experience in Christian causes, knowledge of and ability in business affairs, and an interest in promoting the purposes of the Corporation.

The Board of Directors shall be geographically representative of the State of Oklahoma. At least one (1) director shall be from each of the areas of the State in which a Baptist Retirement Center of Oklahoma Inc. facility is located. Three (3) directors shall be ordained ministers or persons serving in church related vocations.

An employee of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve on the Board; and should a director of the Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma become an employee of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

3.04. Election and Term of Office.

A. Election. All directors shall be elected by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma by a majority of those messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. These directors shall be nominated by the Convention's Committee on Nominations.

B. Term of Office.

1. Initial Directors. Except for the interim directors provided in Article Eight of the Certification of Incorporation whose terms expire upon the election of initial directors provided herein, there will be twenty (20) initial directors of the Corporation. The terms of the initial directors shall be as follows: five (5) directors shall serve a term of one (1) year, five (5) directors shall serve a term of two (2) years, five (5) directors shall serve a term of three (3) years, and five (5) directors shall serve terms of four (4) years each.

2. Term After Initial Directors. After the election of the initial directors, a director shall serve a term of four (4) years, except if the director is elected to fill a vacancy, the director shall serve out the term of the prior director.

3.05. Ex Officio Members. The Executive Director of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or his designee shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Directors. He shall not count as one of the twenty-five directors.

3.06. Vacancies.

A. Vacancies may be filled by a majority of the remaining directors of the Corporation then in office. Any interim director so chosen shall hold office until the next annual meeting of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any interim director so chosen shall also serve until such interim director's successor is duly elected and shall qualify, unless such director resigns or is removed.

B. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in the event of the death, resignation or removal of any director, or if the Board of Directors by resolution declares vacant the office of a director who has been declared of unsound mind by an order of court or convicted of a felony. In the event any person elected to the Board of Directors fails to attend two (2) consecutive meetings of the directors without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the Corporation, his or her position on the Board may be deemed to have become vacant, at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

C. Any director may resign effective on giving written notice to the Chairman of the Board of Directors unless notice specifies a later time for that resignation to become effective. If the resignation of a director is effective at a future time, the Board of Directors may elect a successor to take office when the resignation becomes effective.

3.07. Removal of Director(s). Any director may be removed, for cause, by a majority vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

3.08. Place of Meetings. The Board of Directors may hold meetings, both regular and special, either within or without the State of Oklahoma at a place which has been designated from time to time by the Office of the President.

3.09. Annual/Regular Meetings. An annual meeting of the Board of Directors for the purpose of election of officers of the Corporation and the transaction of any other business as may be properly brought before such meeting shall be held in the month of November.

In addition to the annual meeting, the Board of Directors will hold a meeting in each other quarter of the calendar year.

Other regular meetings of the Board may be held at such time as shall from time to time be determined by the Board.

3.10. Quorum. At all meetings of the Board, a majority of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the act of a majority of the directors present at any meeting shall be the act of the Board of Directors, except as may be otherwise specifically provided by law or by the Certificate of Incorporation. If a quorum shall not be pre-

sent at any meeting of the Board of Directors, the directors present may adjourn the meeting from time to time, without notice other than announcement at the meeting, until a quorum shall be present.

3.11. Voting. Each director shall have one vote on each matter presented to the Board for a vote. No director may vote by proxy.

3.12. Special Meeting.

A. Special meetings of the Board for any purpose or purposes may be called at any time by the Chairman of the Board or President, or if either of them are absent or unable to act, by any Vice Chairman, Vice President or Secretary, when, in such person's judgment, a matter of sufficient importance requires the immediate attention of the entire Board of Directors. By unanimous consent of the directors, special meetings of the Board may be held without notice at any time and place.

B. Special meetings shall be called by the Chairman of the Board, President or Secretary in like manner and on like notice, if any, on the written request of a majority of directors.

C. No business shall be considered at any special meeting other than the purposes mentioned in the notice unless the directors present waive this section.

3.13. Continued Meetings. A quorum of the directors may adjourn any directors' meeting to meet again at a stated day and hour; provided, however, that in the absence of a quorum a majority of the directors present at any directors' meeting, either regular or special, may adjourn to a later date but may not transact any business until a quorum has been secured. At any continued meeting at which a required number of directors shall be present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified.

3.14. Notice of Continued Meeting. Notice of the time and place of holding an adjourned meeting which is to be continued at a later date need not be given to absent directors if the time and place is fixed at the adjourned meeting.

3.15. Telephonic Meetings. Members of the Board of Directors, or of any committee thereof, may participate in a meeting of such Board or committee by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment that enables all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other. Such participation shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.

3.16. Action Without Meeting. Unless otherwise restricted by the Certificate of Incorporation or these Bylaws, any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Board of Directors or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if a written consent to such action is signed by all members of the Board or of such committee as the case may be, and such written consent is filed with the minutes of proceedings of the Board or committee.

3.17. Fees and Compensation. No director (as such) of the Corporation shall receive, directly or indirectly, any salary or compen-

sation from the Corporation, but may receive reimbursement for personal expenses actually incurred in carrying out their responsibilities as director.

3.18. Maintenance and Inspection of Bylaws. The Corporation shall keep at its principal office, the original or a copy of the Bylaws as amended to date, which shall be open to inspection by the directors at all times during office hours.

3.19. Maintenance and Inspection of Other Corporation Records. The accounting books and records and written actions of and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and any committee or committees of the Board of Directors shall be kept at the principal office of the Corporation. The minutes and actions shall be kept in written form and the accounting books and records shall be kept either in written or in any other form capable of being converted into written form. Every director shall have the absolute right at any reasonable time to inspect all minutes, accounting books, records and documents of every kind and the physical properties of the Corporation.

ARTICLE IV NOTICES

4.01. Notice of Annual/Regular Meeting of Board of Directors. The Secretary of the Corporation shall cause written notice of annual and regular meetings of the Board of Directors to be given to each member of the Board of Directors at least ten (10) days prior to any meeting of the Board of Directors. Such notices shall set forth the date, time and place of the annual and regular meeting and shall be addressed to each director at the addresses that appear on the books of the Corporation or at such other address as supplied by such director. Delivery of notices shall be deemed sufficient if deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid; delivery of electronic transmission of facsimile copies, or personally delivered.

4.02. Notice of Special Meetings of Board of Directors. Except as specified in the paragraphs 3.15, 3.16 and 4.03, written notice of the place, date and hour and the purposes of all special meetings shall be delivered to each director. Notices to directors of special meetings shall be in writing and delivered personally or mailed to the directors at their addresses appearing on the books of the Corporation, or at such other address an may be supplied by said director for the purpose of notice. In case such notice is mailed or sent by facsimile transmission, it shall be deposited in the United States Mail or sent by facsimile transmission at least five (5) days prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. In case such notice is delivered personally, it shall be so delivered at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. Such mailing, facsimile transmission or delivery as provided above shall be due, legal and personal notice to such director. **4.03.** Waiver of Notice. Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of law or of the Certificate of Incorporation or of these Bylaws, a waiver in writing signed by the director to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to notice. Attendance of a person at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except when the person attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting, at the beginning of the meeting, to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

ARTICLE V OFFICERS

5.01. Officers Designated. The elective officers of this Corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, the President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, and a Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation.

5.02. Election Term. The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the directors of the Corporation for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said Corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents, Secretary, and Chief Financial Officer shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

5.03. Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

5.04. Removal and Resignation.

A. Any officer may be removed, either with or without cause, by the Board of Directors, at any regular or special meeting there of.

B. Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Directors, or to the President, or to the Secretary of the Corporation. Any such resignation shall take effect at the date of the receipt of such notice or at any later time specified therein; and, unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

5.05. Vacancies. If the office of any officer becomes vacant by reason of death, resignation, retirement, disqualification, removal from office, or otherwise, the Directors then in office, by a vote of a majority of the members of the Board, may choose a successor or successors, who shall hold office for the unexpired term in respect of which such vacancy occurred.

5.06. Filling More Than One Office. Any two offices of the Corporation may be held by the same person, except that no officer

shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument in more than one capacity if the instrument is required by law or the Certificate of Incorporation or the Bylaws to be executed, acknowledged, or verified by two or more officers.

ARTICLE VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

6.01. Chairperson of the Board. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesperson, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

6.02. Vice-Chairpersons of the Board. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.

6.03. President. The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and, subject to the control of the directors, shall supervise and control generally all the business and affairs of the Corporation, including:

A. He shall, after consulting with the Board of Directors, appoint all committees of the Board of Directors and shall be an ex-officio (non-voting) member of each committee.

B. He, or his designee(s), shall sign or countersign, as may be necessary all such bills, notes, checks, contracts and other instruments as may pertain to the ordinary course of the Corporation's business.

C. He shall execute bonds, mortgages, and other contracts requiring a seal under the seal of the Corporation, except where required or permitted by law to be otherwise signed and executed and except where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the Board of Directors to some other officer or agent of the Corporation.

D. At the annual meeting of the Board of Directors, he shall submit a complete report of the operations of the Corporation's affairs as existing at the close of each year and shall report to the Board of Directors from time to time all such matters coming to his attention and relating to the interest of the Corporation as should be brought to the attention of the Board.

E. He shall have such usual powers and duties of supervision and management as may pertain to the Office of the President and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors or the Bylaws.

F. In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements.

G. The President shall file with the Board of Directors of The Baptist

General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of the Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the Corporation as an operating expense.

6.04. Vice President. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the Corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

6.05. Secretary. The Secretary of the Corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

6.06. Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer of the Corporations shall:

A. Have the care and custody of all corporate funds, securities and properties of the Corporation, and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Corporation;

B. Deposit all monies, and other valuable effects, in the name and to the credit of the Corporation in such depositories as may be designated by the Board of Directors;

C. Keep separate, apart, and inviolate all funds given to the Corporation in trust, or with limitations as to the income or use thereof, and the investments thereof shall be made as directed by the Board of Directors;

D. Disburse the funds of the Corporation as may be ordered by the Board of Directors;

E. Render to the President and directors, at the regular meetings of the Board or whenever they may require it, an account of all transactions made as Chief Financial Officer and of the financial condition of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VII

RECEIPT, INVESTMENT AND DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS, ACCOUNTING OF ASSETS, BORROWING FUNDS AND AUDITORS AND AUDITS

7.01. Funds. The Board of Directors may from time to time authorize additional persons to draw upon the funds of the Corporation, whether by check or otherwise.

7.02. Bond. All officers and employees of the Corporation whose duties shall require them to handle funds belonging to the Corporation shall be bonded for the faithful performance of their duties at the expense of the Corporation by sureties selected by the Corporation.

The President may forthwith terminate the services of any employee who is unable to furnish a satisfactory bond.

7.03. Trust Funds. Any funds received in trust or for a specific purpose shall be segregated and not commingled with other funds of the Corporation. All funds received by the Corporation in trust shall be turned over to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for management.

7.04. Disbursement of Funds. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this Corporation, no funds or property of this Corporation shall be disbursed except for a proper corporate purpose and unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor.

7.05. Loans. This Corporation shall comply with Article V Section 4 of the Constitution of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and in accordance therewith the Corporation may borrow such sums as may be necessary and essential to the routine, prudent and efficient operation of the Corporation in carrying out its corporate purposes, provided that the aggregate amount of debt incurred by the Corporation, less any indebtedness due and owed to or obtained from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, shall not exceed the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00); provided that in the event the Corporation shall need to borrow sums in excess of the aggregate amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) (exclusive of any amounts owed to or obtained from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma), which sum shall be determined to be a "Major Expenditure" under Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, the Corporation shall obtain the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In no event shall the Corporation give any security for such borrowing, to include mortgages and security interests in the personal property of the Corporation, without the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

7.06 Annual Report of Auditor. The Chief Financial Officer shall submit to the directors an annual report of all income and disbursement prepared by an independent Certified Public Accountant firm. The auditor shall answer to and report to the Board of Directors through the Chief Financial Officer its findings pertaining to the Corporation audit.

ARTICLE VIII COMMITTEES OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors may, by resolution passed by a majority of the whole Board, designate one or more committees, including but not limited to an Executive Committee, each committee to consist of three or more of the directors of the Corporation, which to the extent provided in the resolution, shall have and may exercise the powers of the Board of Directors in the management of the business and affairs of the Corporation, except where action of the Board of Directors is required by law, and may authorize the seal of the Corporation to be affixed to all papers that may require it. Such committee or committees shall have such name or names as may be determined from time to time by resolution adopted by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IX PROPERTY

9.01. General Powers Regarding Property. Subject to Sections 9.02 and 9.03 below, the Corporation, acting through its Board of Directors, shall have the right to own, to buy or sell, to alienate or convey, and to mortgage or pledge any or all of its property, personal, real or mixed, in such way as the Board of Directors may in its judgment think is beneficial to the Corporation and in furtherance of its general purpose as declared in the Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, including the right to lend, rent, or lease any or all of its property on such terms as the Board of Directors may think is in furtherance of the main purpose for which the Corporation is established.

9.02. No Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Without Approval by Board of Directors of Corporation and of Baptist General Convention. No personal property having a value in excess of \$100,000.00, and no real property, may be purchased, acquired other than by gift, sold, transferred, assigned or conveyed by the Corporation, unless the Board of Directors of the Corporation and the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma approves such purchase or sale and determines that such sale shall be necessary or convenient and for the best interests of the Corporation. No acquisition, purchase, assignment, conveyance or transfer of such property or any interest therein either to or from the Corporation shall at any time be made by the Corporation until such purchase, acquisition, assignment, transfer or conveyance shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such transfer or conveyance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

9.03. No Encumbrances of Property Without Approval of Board of Directors of Corporation and of Baptist General Convention. The Corporation shall not pledge, hypothecate, mortgage, assign, or grant a security interest or lien in or to any real or personal property owned or to be acquired by the Corporation without the prior approval of the Board of Directors of the Corporation and of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation until such approval has been obtained by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

ARTICLE X

LIABILITY: INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS, OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES AND VOLUNTEERS

10.01. Limited liability. To the maximum extent permitted by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma, and any other provision of Oklahoma law, as now existing or as it may hereafter be amended, no director of this Corporation shall be personally liable to this Corporation for monetary damages for breach of fiduciary duty as a director.

10.02. Indemnification of Directors. The Corporation shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding if he acted in good faith and in a manner he reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the Corporation, and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, and reasonable cause to believe that his conduct was not unlawful.

10.03. Authorization of Indemnification. Any indemnification under Section 10.02 of this Article (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation upon a determination that indemnification of the director, officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Section 10.02. Such determination shall be made by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of directors who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable, a quorum of disinterested directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in a written opinion.

10.04. Non-Exclusive Indemnification. The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the law

of the State of Oklahoma, as now or hereafter enacted; the Certificate of Incorporation; any agreement; and any insurance purchased by the Corporation. Such rights shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a director, officer, employee or agent and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such a person.

10.05. Insurance. The Corporation shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provisions of this Article X.

ARTICLE XI CONFLICT OF INTEREST

11.01. Definition. A director or officer of the Corporation shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such director or officer has existing or potential financial or other interests which might impair or might reasonably appear to impair such person's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his or her responsibilities, or (b) if such director or officer is aware that such director or a member of his or her family (which for purposes of this provision shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the director or officer) is an officer, employee, member, partner, director, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interest. Any director or officer who is uncertain whether he or she has a conflict of interest may request the Board of Directors to determine whether a conflict of interest exists and the Board of Director shall resolve the question by majority vote, with the requesting director abstaining.

11.02. Disqualification Because of Conflict of Interest. A director or officer of this Corporation having a conflict of interest shall be disqualified from dealing or contracting with the Corporation as a vendor, purchaser or otherwise; and any transaction, contract or act of the Corporation with such director or any member of his family as defined in 11.01 above having a conflict of interest shall be void.

11.03. Disclosure of Conflict of Interest. The fact that such director or officer has a conflict of interest shall be disclosed or shall be known to all of the directors, or to such members thereof as shall be present at any meeting of the Board of Directors at which action upon any such contract, transaction or act shall be taken. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the director or officer having a conflict of interest declared such conflict of interest.

ARTICLE XII DISSOLUTION

12.01. Dissolution. The Corporation may be dissolved by an affirmative vote of a majority of all the directors of the Corporation then in office at a meeting called for the purpose of considering such a proposal or, if there be not any directors, by order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

12.02. Disposition of Property. Upon final dissolution of the Corporation or disbanding of the Corporation, title to the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be vested in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In the event The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall not be an organization qualified as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code upon dissolution or disbanding of the Corporation, then the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be distributed to such other like organizations which then qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as the Board of Directors of this Corporation may select and designate; and in no event shall any of said assets or property, in the event of dissolution thereof, go or be distributed to any private individuals, either for the reimbursement of any sum subscribed, donated or contributed by such private individuals, or for any other purpose.

ARTICLE XIII FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall be as the Board of Directors shall designate and may be changed from time to time as deemed for the best interests of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XIV TAX EXEMPT STATUS

14.01. Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes. The Corporation is organized exclusively as a not-for-profit Corporation as defined in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Code.

14.02. Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its directors, officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on

behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt under Section 501(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code.

ARTICLE XV

SEAL

The seal of the Corporation shall consist of a flatfaced die with the following words and figures cut or engraved thereon:

AMENDMENTS, SEVERANCE, CAPTIONS, CONSTRUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

16.01. Amendments. These Bylaws will be reviewed annually. They may be repealed, amended, or added to, at any meeting of the Board of Directors by the affirmative vote of a majority of the directors attending such meeting, or by written assent of a majority of the directors, so long as such amendments are not inconsistent with law, and so long as such amendments do not disqualify the Corporation under Section 501(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or the corresponding provision of any future United States Revenue Law; except that Sections 3.01, 3.03, 3.04.A, 3.07, 7.05, 9.02, 9.03 and 16.01 of these Bylaws may not be amended without the approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

16.02. Severance. If any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or provision of these Bylaws is void or illegal, it shall not impair nor affect the rest of these Bylaws and the directors do hereby declare that they would have adopted and approved the rest of these Bylaws if such void or illegal provision had been excluded therefrom.

16.03. Captions. The captions contained in these Bylaws are for convenience and reference and in no way define, describe, extend, or limit the scope or intent of these Bylaws or the intent of any provision contained herein.

16.04. Construction and Definitions. Unless the context otherwise requires, the general provisions, rules of construction and definitions contained in the general provisions of the Oklahoma General Corporation Act shall govern the construction of these Bylaws. KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the undersigned, being the President and Secretary of the above named Corporation, incorporated, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of sixteen (XVI) Articles, were duly approved and adopted as the Bylaws of the Corporation on this 14th day of October, 1993, by a resolution of a majority of the Board of Directors.

Nominating Committee Report

Article IV-Section 1 of the Convention's Bylaws empowers the President to appoint a fifteen member Nominating Committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size churches. The committee shall meet at least twice: an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to September 15. Between the two meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations.

According to the Constitution and Bylaws relative to the Board of Directors, instructions are that due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation; there shall be at least one nominee for each associational area; additional nominees shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident church members in a given associational area; no association shall have more than eight members on the board; there shall be at least eight laymen and eight women; and any board member shall be considered resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected. Resolution No. 2

RESOLUTION ON RU 486, THE FRENCH ABORTION PILL

WHEREAS, the Bible clearly teaches that human life is sacred and must be protected; and

WHEREAS, Southern Baptists have consistently upheld the sanctity of human life by adopting numerous resolutions at the associational, state and national venues, advocating public policies to protect the unborn and encouraging the developing of crisis pregnancy centers; and

WHEREAS, RU 486, the French abortion pill is a direct assault on the sacredness and value of unborn human life, that this drug kills an unborn child whose heart has already started to beat; and

WHEREAS, while RU 486 has often been called a "morning-after" pill its only proven use is as an abortifacient and is, therefore, not a true contraceptive; and

WHEREAS, President Clinton signed an Executive Order on January 22, 1993 (the 20th anniversary of the Roe v Wade Supreme Court decision legalizing abortion on demand), ordering the Food and Drug Administration to facilitate the introduction of RU 486 into the United States markets; and

WHEREAS, on May 16, 1994, the French drug company Roussel Uclaf donated its U.S. Patent rights for the RU 486 abortion technique to the Population Council, an American pro-abortion organization, for the purpose of bringing the drug to America; and

WHEREAS, Roussel Uclaf acknowledged the pressure applied by the Clinton administration to accomplish the transfer of the patent rights when Roussel's representative said on May 16 "it was only when President Clinton changed the governmental policy and specifically asked Roussel to make the procedure available here that our client (Roussel Uclaf), out of respect for the President of the United States, agreed to make every effort to comply with his request"; and

WHEREAS, the stated purpose of the use of RU 486 according to its advocates is to make abortion more accessible to women by encouraging more physicians to become abortionists; and

WHEREAS, past experience has demonstrated that increasing the number of abortionists vastly expands the number of abortions, which currently stands 1.6 million per year in America; and

WHEREAS, the use of RU 486 has resulted in the injury and death of some women in nations where this abortion technique is currently available; and

WHEREAS, the Clinton administration's advocacy for RU 486 clearly belies the President's repeatedly stated goal for his abortion policy to make abortion "safe and legal, but rare"; and

WHEREAS, pro-life organizations, including the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission, have announced the intention of initiating a boycott against Roussel Uclaf and its German parent company, Hoechst A G (including their American subsidiaries, Hoechst Celanese and Hoechst Roussel), for their corporate responsibility for making this drug available in America; and

WHEREAS, economic boycotts are a legitimate means for Christians to use to express their convictions about immoral products in the marketplace.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the messengers to this 89th Annual Meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, condemn the blatant advocacy of RU 486 by the Clinton administration, and oppose the testing, approval, manufacturing, marketing and sale of abortion pills in the United States; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that we urge Oklahoma Baptists and their churches and associations to support the impending boycott which will be waged against Roussel Uclaf and Hoechst A G, including their American subsidiaries.

Larry Bishop, messenger from First Church, Norman, spoke against the resolution in its current form.

The resolution was adopted as presented.

RESOLUTION ON "HERE'S HOPE"

WHEREAS, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has planned "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now." soul winning emphasis for 1995 in conjunction with "Here's Hope. Jesus Cares for You." harvest revivals; and

WHEREAS, the state Evangelism Department under the leadership of Cloyd Sullins has challenged Oklahoma Baptists to participate in "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now." witnessing emphasis and harvest revivals; and

WHEREAS, the commands of our Lord Jesus Christ, found in His precious word, compels us to "go into all the world" sharing the message of hope that "Jesus Saves!"

PART 4 Reports of Departments, Institutions and Agencies



Evangelism

Cloyd Sullins, Director Local Church Evangelism

The 1994 year concluded in transition as the Evangelism Department awaited the arrival of the new Evangelism Director-elect, Cloyd Sullins. Approved at the May 26, 1994, Board Meeting, he came on the field from the Alaska Baptist Convention September 1, 1994.

According to the Baptist Sunday School Board, 1,496 churches from 41 associations in the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma reported 16,484 baptisms in 1993. This report indicates one baptism for every 28.41 Southern Baptist in Oklahoma.

The top ten associations in baptisms were: Capital, Tulsa, Union, Comanche-Cotton, Cimarron, Muskogee, Pottawatomie-Lincoln, Northeastern, Southwest and Rogers. The top ten associations in ratio of baptisms to resident members were: Choctaw-Chickasaw, Muskogee-Seminole-Wichita, Cherokee, Chi-Ka-Sha, Southwest, Northeastern, Comanche-Cotton, Union, Craig-Mayes and Atoka-Coal. The top ten churches in baptisms in 1992 were: First, Moore-Bobby Boyles 374; First, Altus-Keith Wiginton 310; First Southern, Del City-Tom Elliff 262; South Lindsay, Oklahoma City-George Brock 159; Eastwood, Tulsa-Pastorless 132; First, Edmond-Alan Day 125; Cameron, Lawton-Bob Jones 123; Arrow Heights, Broken Arrow-Bob Green 105; and First, Broken Arrow-W.C. "Nick" Garland 102.

The number one church in Oklahoma in ratio of baptisms to resident members was the Chinese Mission, Stillwater, Paul C. Chao (Cimarron Association) with a ratio of 0.39. The top mission pacesetter was Iglesia Bautista, Edmond (mission of Waterloo Road), Alfaro Orozco with a ratio of 1.50.

Evangelism Conferences

The 1993 Youth Evangelism Conference was held December 27-29 at First Southern Baptist Church in Del City, Oklahoma. This conference was done in two sessions: YEC West for churches west of I-35, December 27-28; and YEC East for churches east of I-35, December 28-29. A record crowd of more than 5,800 youth and sponsors attended and 319 decisions were recorded. Fifty-eight young people made professions of faith in Christ. The featured program personalities were: Dan Carson, Bryant Bush, Bobby Boyles, and David Edwards. Music was performed by several youth ensembles from various churches across the state, One Heart Band from Council Road, Bethany performed and Wes King, Christian singing-recording artist.

The 1994 Conference will return to First Southern Baptist, Del City. Program personalities will include Ken Freeman, Jon Randles, Skyler Parker, Act One Ministry (drama), Matt Blagg, Cindy Morgan, One Heart Band and various other featured musicians. The 1994 State Evangelism Conference under the theme of, "Evangelism: Power, Purpose and Place" was conducted at First Southern Baptist, Del City, on January 17-18, 1994. The featured speakers were: Edgar Chaney, Utah-Idaho Southern Baptist Convention, Sandy, Utah; Rick White, First-Franklin, Tennessee; Joe S. Ratliff, Brentwood-Houston, Texas; Bobby Boyles, First-Moore; J. W. Hutchens, HMB-Atlanta; Keith Wiginton, First-Altus; Sam Shaw, First-Tulsa; Forrest Sheffield, First-Harrah; Ronnie Floyd, First-Springdale, Arkansas; Larry Thompson, Dauphin Way-Mobile, Alabama; and Alan Day, First-Edmond. Various other pastors and evangelists gave their testimonies. Featured musicians were: the "Down East Boys," Northwest Baptist choir and orchestra, a young men's singing group from Zambia, Africa called, "Acappella" and various other soloists.

The 1995 State Evangelism Conference under the theme of, "Here's Hope. Share Your Faith" will be conducted at First-Moore, on January 23-24, 1995. Featured speakers will be Roy Fish, Charles Sullivan, Darrell Robinson, Tim Lee, Jimmy Draper, Sammie Davis, Bob Jones and O.S. Hawkins. Twelve seminars relating to evangelism will also be conducted during the Tuesday morning session. Featured musicians will be: Greg Buchanan, harpist; Chris and Diane Machen; the Oklahoma Singing Churchmen and ChurchWomen; the Oklahoma Baptist Symphony and various other ensembles and soloists.

The sixth annual Hispanic Evangelism Conference was held March 26, 1994, at Agnew Avenue Baptist-Oklahoma City. The featured speakers were: Bob Sena, Language Church Extension Division, HMB-Atlanta, Georgia; Leovardo Flores, Trinity Mission-Norman; Ramon Aleman, State Hispanic Coordinator-Oklahoma; Charles Paramore, Dallas, Texas; and musicians, Miguel Angel Gonzalez, Macon, Georgia and Rafael Murillo, Olivet Mission-Oklahoma City. The 1995 conference is scheduled for April 8. The location will be determined later.

Evangelism Training

The National C.W.T. Seminar scheduled for February and September, 1994, were cancelled due to lack of registration. The churches continued to use the Lay Evangelism Schools and the One-Day Soul-Winning Workshop to train their people in witnessing methods.

Evangelism Department Ministries Youth Evangelism Teams

Since the new evangelism director had not arrived on the field, the youth revival teams project was cancelled until 1995. It will be evaluated by the new director.

Tent Evangelism

The convention tents, a 250-seat capacity and an 800-seat capacity, continued to be used by the churches and associations during 1993. The

tent consultant, Charles A. "Randy" Russell, set the tents up 31 times during the year for various evangelism events.

Falls Creek

Five hundred and seventy men and women were trained as Falls Creek "encouragers" in 1994. One hundred and twenty-four church staff helped as pastor-advisors. Evangelism staff members and volunteer section leaders directed the work of the decision-time area by helping 3,510 inquirers during the five weeks of Falls Creek. Nine hundred and nine professions of faith were reported.

Brotherhood Laddie R. Adams, Director

The total Southern Baptist Convention Brotherhood enrollment reported for 1993 was 613,774. Oklahoma recorded 17,919, an increase from 17,614 reported in 1992. We now have 512 churches reporting 278 Baptist Men's Units, 31 Baptist Young Men's Units, 64 High School Baptist Young Men's Units, and 774 Royal Ambassador Chapters (258 Lad, 344 Crusader, 110 Pioneer, 258 Combined) for a total of 1,147 Brotherhood Units.

Brotherhood planned, promoted and directed the following:

TRAINING

Area Training Sessions

Area Training Sessions were held in the fall of 1994 for 324 people in 27 associations. Additional training was provided in 62 other locations during the year.

Volunteers in Missions Workshop

February 26, 1994 - Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and Missions Departments conducted the workshop, Portland Avenue, Oklahoma City. One hundred seventy-nine attended.

Brotherhood University

September 22-25, 1994, Camp Copass, Texas - Attended by department director and associate along with twelve Oklahoma men to whom we gave scholarships. They received updated Brotherhood information and were certified as trainers.

SALT

April 29-30, 1994 - Thirty-four associational Brotherhood officers received training at Moore, First Baptist.

STATEWIDE MEETINGS Royal Ambassador Congress

March 4-5, 1994 - Sixteen hundred attended Congress, South Lindsay Baptist Church, OKC. Forty-eight basketball teams representing 27 associations participated in playoffs. A Missions Fair was held. Awards were given for projects, RA racer competition and mission notebook content. The 1995 RA Congress will be held at Portland Avenue Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, March 3-4.

Baptist Men's Retreat

October 15-16, 1993 - One hundred ten men participated in advanced training, fellowship, and worship at Falls Creek. The 1994 Retreat featured Dr. James Williams, President of the Brotherhood Commission, SBC, October 14-15.

Missionary Kids Retreat

May 6-7, 1994 - Twenty-three missionary kids attended annual retreat at Camp Hudgens. Dr. Dick Rader was in charge of the program.

MISSION MINISTRIES

Camp Hudgens

June 3-4 & 24-25, 1994 - Ninety-one attended Lad & Dad camps at Camp Hudgens. During June and July 360 campers and 233 staff attended seven weeks of Royal Ambassador camp. There were 207 decisions (49 professions of faith, 102 rededications and 56 surrendered for special service). That was a grand total of 684 in summer camp at Hudgens in '94. November 12-13, 1993 - seventy-one attended Mini Camp; April 8-9, 1994 - forty-two attended Mini Camp.

Disaster Relief

Forty-four volunteers from Oklahoma ministered in California following the January earthquake. Over 200,000 hot meals were prepared and served from our feeding unit and auxiliary unit stationed at the Van Nuys airport.

The child care unit was called and served for a short time in Miami following the spring flooding.

\$18,800 in emergency disaster relief funds assisted 69 families in three associations whose homes were damaged by flooding. Also, two churches damaged by storms were assisted in the amount of \$3,900.

A new truck and other equipment (tilt skillet, high pressure washer, water heaters, rice cookers, water purification units, water carriers) were purchased this year which will help in future disaster relief ministry.

Training for Disaster Relief volunteers was held June 10-11 at Boys Ranch in Edmond.

The Disaster Relief unit and volunteers were part of the Capital Association Feeding the Homeless project on March 26.

Department director and associate and one layman attended the Disaster Relief Roundtable in Nashville, Tennessee in May.

Volunteer Mission Building Projects

Carl Davis, Volunteer Projects Personnel Coordinator, reports that 19 teams worked on 16 different projects in 10 states, Japan and Mexico. The 279 volunteers on the teams spent approximately \$51,050 of their own money to participate in these missions projects and contributed \$10,500 to the churches they worked on.

Lay Renewal

Trained volunteer Brotherhood leadership was provided to twenty- four churches that scheduled renewal events through the Brotherhood Department. More than 2,500 people participated in these events.

World Hunger

Brotherhood promoted and provided materials concerning World Hunger Relief to local churches and associations, and channeled donations to the Home and Foreign Mission Boards

Weeks of Prayer for Missions

Along with Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for the three weeks of prayer (state, home and foreign missions), and assisted in local churches and associations in speaking as requested.

World Missions Conferences

Brotherhood worked with Directors of Missions to conduct World Missions Conferences in six associations during 1993. One hundred forty churches participated, with 31,201 attending and twenty-six professions of faith recorded. In 1994 five World Missions Conferences are planned with 114 churches participating.

Department Personnel

Included on the department staff are: Jerry Kersey, Associate; secretaries Louise Hagen, Joann Lindsay, and Mary Stephens; Herb Shaw, resident caretaker at Camp Hudgens; and Carl and Ruth Davis, Mission Service Corps coordinators for volunteer mission construction projects outside Oklahoma.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST NURSING FELLOWSHIP has 90 members. The president is Cathy Welborn and the Oklahoma WMU Director, Mrs. Frances Grafton, is executive director.

STATE MISSIONS ALLOCATIONS administered by WMU are listed below:

- 1. CAMP NUNNY CHA-HA, the state WMU camp for missions education was attended by 603 campers and 47 staffers. There were decisions for professions of faith, 19; special service, 19; and rededication, 49. Funds assist with repairs, maintenance, and equipment.
- 2. WMU LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT—OTHER STATES funds assist leadership teams travel/materials requested by pioneer state WMUs. Training plans are being coordinated with Indiana WMU for 1995.
- 3. MISSIONARY SPEAKERS' expense was paid when requested to 81 who spoke at associational summer meetings/camps, state WMU/Brotherhood meetings/camps.
- 4. MISSIONARY GIFTS of \$500 were given to eight Oklahomans newly appointed SBC foreign missionaries. A Christmas gift of \$75 was given to 211 Oklahoma foreign missionaries.
- 5. OBU/WMU PROFESSOR OF MISSIONS Dr. Dick Rader, dean, Joe L. Ingram School of Christian Service, and vice-president of Religious Life, Oklahoma Baptist University. A former foreign missionary, he is involved in strengthening missions in local churches as he works with WMU organizations, state pastors, and OBU students called by God for special service.

Religious Education

Frank Foutch, Director

How do you follow a year as big and successful as "The Year of the Sunday School?" How about with "The Year of Discipleship Training," of course. The year 1992-93 was an outstanding year in Discipleship Training for Oklahoma Baptists and was a major emphasis of the Department of Religious Education. Discipleship Training enrollment reached 102,676 which is the highest enrollment since 1969, and an increase of 10,000 over the previous year. Hundreds of churches made a commitment to specific levels of achievement in Discipleship Training and to enrollment and attendance goals.

There were 57 churches from 22 associations that received a plaque or certificate in recognition of outstanding achievement as participants in the Year of Discipleship Training. Events during the year included six area-wide Discipleship Training Workshops and a special feature at the State Convention.

The theme for 1993-94 is "4 by 94." This is an emphasis to encourage all of the churches in Oklahoma to team up and reach a state Sunday School enrollment of 400,000 by September 30, 1994.

Personnel

Following Bill Haggard's retirement June 30, 1993, Robert Haskins served as interim director through the month of November. At the December Board meeting, Frank Foutch was elected as the new department director. He was moved from within the department where he was serving as general administration consultant. His former position was not filled, and the department was downsized one field worker and one secretary.

Present field staff include Sam Vinall, adult and associational consultant; Buddy Hunt, youth and family ministry consultant; and Darlene Koch, childhood education and VBS consultant. Department secretaries include Janice Newton, Carolyn Morton, Mary Sue Robbins and Barbara Harville.

Statistics

Although it was a great year for Discipleship Training, Sunday School growth experienced the first loss in five years. Sunday School enrollment dropped from 386,317 to 382,122, a loss of 4,195 persons. An aggressive state enrollment emphasis called "4 by 94" is being conducted in 435 churches, and is expected to help our Sunday School enrollment not only recover last year's losses, but reach an all-time high.

Through Vacation Bible School, our churches enrolled 149,897 persons, reported 2831 professions of faith, transferred 3,537 persons to their Sunday School rolls and discovered 21,020 prospects.

Associational "M" Night was conducted in 26 associations, with a total attendance of 4,009 representing 343 churches.

The State Children/Youth Bible Drills and State Youth Speakers Tournament had great participation, with 265 children in the Bible Drill from 72 churches and 26 associations and 16 youth in the Speakers Tournament and Bible Drill.

Projects and Ministries

During 1992-93, 29 state and associational training events were conducted by the department of Religious Education involving over 4,500 church leaders from churches in every association in Oklahoma. Among the State Sunday School meetings, clinics and conferences were: State Growth Spiral Conference, October 1; two state Vacation Bible School Clinics, February 25-26; Glorieta Comes to Lake Country, March 29-30; a National Sunday School Directors' Seminar, August 20- 21; and the Sunday School Leadership Seminar at Falls Creek, August 17-18.

State Discipleship Training events included: six area Discipleship Training Workshops to kick off "The Year of Discipleship Training;" the State Baptist Doctrine Clinic, January 12; a Family Ministry Workshop, February 12; and the State Children/Youth Bible Drill and Speakers Tournament, May 1. Two training conferences on "Conducting Children's Bible Drills" were also conducted.

To help associations develop strong leadership teams for Sunday School and Discipleship Training, annual ASSIST/ADT training is provided in two locations, Muskogee and Oklahoma City. In 1993 the dates were March 18 and 19. There were 174 ASSISTeam members and 86 ADT team members in attendance. There were 35 associations represented.

In addition, a number of associational projects were conducted by the department of religious education in the following associations: Panhandle, Mullins, East Central, Kay, Caddo, Bryan, Beckham-Mills and Perry.

Cooperative Missions

Donald Brent, Director

Staff members in Cooperative Missions take seriously the words of Jesus in John 4:35 "to open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest."

Personnel in Cooperative Missions includes Donald Brent, Director; Bob W. Lovejoy, Associate Director; Joe B. Williams, Associate; and Jack Comer, Associate. The secretarial staff includes Agnes Welton, administrative secretary; and department secretaries, Delores Mohr, Penny Corbin, and Roberta Cothrum.

In cooperation with the Home Mission Board, the Department of Cooperative Missions involves four major areas of mission ministries. Those areas are Language Missions, Church-Community Ministries, Chaplaincy, and Church Extension. The Department also relates to many other mission ministries in cooperation with the Home Mission Board. Those ministries include supervision of jointly appointed missionary personnel, leadership training, Black Church Extension, interfaith witness, literacy missions, student summer missions, resort missions, volunteer construction, multihousing missions, volunteers in missions, work with bivocational churches and pastors, and campers on mission. This does not exhaust the list, but gives some idea of the Department's leadership and involvement in mission ministries. Following is the report of many of these ministries.

Missionary Personnel Complete Witness Training

March 14-16, 1994 the Missions Department Staff and the Jointly Employed Missionaries met for their annual retreat at Falls Creek. Three days were given to Witness Training. A part of the training was spent visiting prospects with members of Black, Indian, Hispanic, and Anglo Churches in Ardmore. Visits were made in 29 homes with 25 persons professing faith in Jesus as personal Savior. Leaders for the witness training were enlisted by the Home Mission Board. Herman Rios led the Hispanic group and W.C. Garland led the English speaking group. Some of the missionaries have followed up by using the Witness Training Program in their own churches.

523 Bivocational Churches

One Call-Two Vocations—Sixty-nine bivocational pastors and their wives attended a celebration for bivocationals April 22-23 at OBU. Sponsored by the BGCO Cooperative Missions Department, the event included conferences, testimonies, fellowship and a "glad time celebration" led by Dale Holloway, Director of Bivocational Ministries for the Home Mission Board. Kay Cain of Edmond led sessions of special interest for pastors' wives. Many of the conferences were led by the bivocational pastors. Subjects discussed included laity in ministry, personal family time, planning visitation and deacon family ministry. Dr. Clyde Cain spoke on the church and legal issues and also presented information on the Annuity Program. Plans call for expanding the event to include bivocational church staff members (music and youth directors).

Multihousing Residents Number 590,000

A dozen churches are involved in over 30 ministries in apartment complexes and mobile home parks. Some of the churches have made a priority commitment to evangelism and missions outreach through the Home Mission Board's Key Church Strategy. Over 60 persons from 17 churches attended a Key Church Conference on March 4 at Meadowood Baptist Church. Speakers included Dr. William G. Tanner, Executive Director, BGCO; state key church leaders Dr. Bob Rutherford and Mark Cordray from Meadowood Baptist Church; and Dr. Gary Cook and Dr. Bill Watkins from First Baptist Church, Lawton. National key church speakers included Mrs. Tillie Burgin of Mission Arlington and Dr. J.V. Thomas, Home Mission Board.

Church Extension Assistance

A total of \$12,407 per month was approved for assistance to Church Starter Strategists, apartment ministers, and new Anglo and Black church/mission pastors. The funds were made available through HMB-BGCO Cooperative Program Budget, Edna McMillan State Mission Offering and designated new work funds.

The Cooperative Missions Department assisted four associations and/or sponsoring churches in the purchase of five mission property sites. A total of \$52,600 was expended in Tulsa, Muskogee, Pottawatomie-Lincoln, and Northeastern Associations. The amount of \$30,000 was approved for assisting six new congregations in the cost of first unit facilities.

This year 14 new churches and missions have been started—13 Anglo and one (1) Black. Also six (6) new preaching points, Bible studies and/or ministries have been started. The number of new mission/ churches started among the ethnic groups is given in the Language Missions report.

Campers on Mission

Two state rallies were held at the Shawnee Exposition Center on May 6-7 and September 8-9. At the Spring Rally campers heard the Armenian Musical Trio perform. Plaques were presented to Dr. Robert E. Haskins for his support of the Campers on Mission since it was chartered, and to Charles Krumtum, Volunteer Construction Coordinator, for the good work that he has done. The Fall Rally scheduled Dr. Ernie Perkins, DOM, Capital Baptist Association. Oklahoma had six (6) couples attend the National Campers on Mission Rally, June 21-23, Tallahassee, Florida. There were 229 rigs and approximately 500 people attended the rally. The 1995 National Rally will be held in Hope, Arkansas (fairgrounds) on June 12-16.

Volunteers In Missions

Reverend and Mrs. Bobby Burnett are the coordinators for Volunteers in Missions in Oklahoma. They have enlisted ten (10) couples to serve as regional consultants. Coordinators and consultants provide information to churches, recruit volunteers and assign volunteers to mission projects both in and out of state. This year volunteers have been involved in resort ministries, construction projects, ministry at Camp Hudgens, lay evangelism schools, vacation Bible schools, revivals, etc.

Black Church Relations

This is a program of cooperation between Southern Baptists and National Baptists of Oklahoma. Three missionaries serve with the Department of Black Church Relations. John Thomas, Jr. is state director of Christian Education for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and dean of the Oklahoma School of Religion which is located in Tulsa. Patricia Reed is the W.M.U. Executive Secretary for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and directs the woman's work of the convention. Urban Green serves as director of the Baptist Education Center in Tulsa.

Two Black Baptist students served in Tulsa as student summer missionaries in 1994. They came through the BSU at Langston University.

The Oklahoma School of Religion located in Tulsa has ten centers of education across the state. Over 700 adults were enrolled in 33 courses of study. Twenty-three students graduated in May 1994. Some of these centers participate in the MTI program sponsored by Oklahoma Baptist University.

Special Ministries Department

Verlene Farmer, BSU director at Langston University for more than 23 years is the one missionary serving with the special missions ministries department of the Home Mission Board.

Fifty children from the Langston community are enrolled in a weekday community scripture memory choir that is sponsored and directed by Miss Farmer and the Langston BSU. They come to the BSU building for practice. Some of the BSU members assist with the program.

Mohamed Abrahim, a student from Gondar, Ethiopia, E. Africa, was a student in Miss Farmer's New Testament class. He became a Christian during the semester.

In honor of Miss Farmer, the Langston community committee named the Fifth Annual Community Vacation Bible School, The Verlene B. Farmer Langston Community Vacation Bible School.

Ten BSU students attended Student Week at Glorieta in August 1993.

September 3-4, 1993, eleven students attended the BSU Leadership Conference, First Baptist Church, Midwest City, Oklahoma.

Seventeen Langston University BSU students attended the Oklahoma Black BSU retreat in Tulsa, October 8-9, 1993. The Langston BSU Scripture Memory Choir shared scripture during the retreat. The BSU Scripture Memory Choir gave a presentation at Southwestern State BSU on February 23, 1994.

Twenty students attended the Annual Student Missions Conference, Fort Worth at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, March 4-6, 1994. The BSU Scripture Memory Choir gave a presentation.

A spring revival was held at the BSU January 30 through February 3, 1994. Kevin Lee was the evangelist. There were twenty rededications during the revival.

A two day growth oriented Sunday School conference emphasizing Bible Teaching Through the Sunday School was held November 5-6, 1993 at Fairview Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. Approximately 150 adult leaders from Black Baptist churches attended. Steve Warfield from the Sunday School Board and Buddy Hunt, Religious Education Department, BGCO, enlisted leaders from outside Oklahoma to lead the different conferences. It was a cooperative effort of the Sunday School Board of the SBC, the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention.

Church-Community Ministries

Six missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma serve in this ministry. They are: associational director of church-community ministries, Jack Bettis, Capital Association; Bill Sisson, Baptist Mission Center director of Oklahoma City; Beverly Goss, Tulsa Baptist Women's Shelter supervisor; Gerald Lunsford, director of Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City; Lois Coleman, Baptist Mission Center Director, Tulsa; and Jackie Huber, Benevolence Ministries Coordinator, Tulsa Metro Baptist Association, Tulsa, Oklahoma. Jackie Huber was appointed a missionary associate by the Home Mission Board to this position January 1, 1994.

The missionaries reported 238 professions of faith and 37 people made decisions for special service this year. They delivered 548 sermons and addresses during the year.

Grace Rescue Mission had an average of twelve men per month participating in an alcohol and drug rehabilitation program called New Life. An Overcomers program has 15-20 people attending the meeting which is held once a week. Transient and rehabilitation program people were provided 88,588 meals and 26,920 beds during the year. One thousand one hundred forty-eight individuals were given 6,945 articles of clothing. Thanksgiving dinner was served to 125 people. Four hundred six children received toys and food at Christmas. Two rooms were remodeled.

The Baptist Mission Center in Oklahoma City provided 23,563 pieces of clothing to 10,231 people. It gave approximately 5,400 days of food to 2,083 people and made it possible for the needy to receive over \$26,131 in free medical care and \$6,660 worth of free dental care. A new eye clinic was opened on January 10, 1994. The Christmas Store provided toys and gifts for over 600 children. The mission gave 160 food baskets for Christmas.

The Women's Shelter in Tulsa housed 300 children and 250 women during the last twelve months. Twenty-five professions of faith in Christ were reported by those living at the shelter.

The Annual State Literacy Missions Workshop was held at OBU, June 8-10. Approximately 55 leaders and conferees received training. Subjects covered were the Basic 16 Hour Conversational English, the Basic 16 Hour Adult Reading and Writing, Tutoring Youth and Children, Advanced Conversational English, Advanced Adult Reading and Writing, Alfalit, See the Sound/Visual Phonics, The Organizational Plan for a Conversational English Ministry and Using "English Lessons from the Bible: Book of Mark" Book 1. Two new features were added to the workshop this year, "Video Theater" and "Breakfast Buzz Groups." There are approximately 800 church volunteers who are trained in some phase of literacy work. There are more than 1,000 people enrolled in 37 organized Baptist literacy missions programs in Oklahoma. Oklahoma has 56 teachers certified in conversational English, 26 certified in adult reading and writing and 10 certified as tutors of youth and children. There were thirty-one professions of faith, ten Bible classes started and a Big A Club for children begun as the result of the literacy program. Fran deCordova is the state literacy missions consultant serving as a contract worker with the Missions Department.

Student Summer Missions

Twenty-seven student summer missionaries served in missions all across Oklahoma during the summer of 1994. They served in rural, inner city, resort, metropolitan, medical, and general missions in 16 different areas of the state. Their work included resort ministries, Vacation Bible Schools, Backyard Bible Clubs, church-community ministries, camps, surveys, youth programs, visitation, witnessing, recreation, ranch work, mission center activities, serving as counselors, role models, construction work, music leading and performance, children's day camp, GA/RA work, nursing/medical clinic and mission VBS. Some of the missionaries have surrendered to full-time Christian service during their time of serving as summer workers.

Interfaith Witness

The interfaith witness program is an integral part of Southern Baptists' efforts in evangelizing, congregationalizing, and ministering. Its role is to help Southern Baptists to understand and to witness effectively to persons of other religious beliefs. Religious pluralism has come to be a reality in the United States. Religious groups in our country can be divided into three broad categories—American Christianity, Cults or sects, and World Religions. New religious groups are arriving on the scene almost daily. Resources of literature and training are being provided to members of Southern Baptist churches so that they may know who these groups are. Suggestions are made on how to have an effective Christian witness to them.

There are 28 individuals in Oklahoma who have been certified by the Home Mission Board as Interfaith Witness Associates. They are qualified to lead interfaith witness awareness conferences dealing with eight different religious groups. Several associational awareness conferences are being planned for 1995.

Language Missions

The 350 plus language congregations are in the midst of their greatest opportunities. The numerical and percentage of increase over the next few years is unprecedented in Oklahoma. The largest growth will be among the Hispanics and the Asians. Witness training and spiritual growth are being emphasized.

This year, national meetings were held in Oklahoma by Laotians, American Indians and the Deaf. An Experiencing God Seminar for Koreans is planned for October of this year. Missionary personnel from Oklahoma have led out in planning and carrying out these important programs.

There are approximately 350 language churches cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. We have a total of 80 missionaries who work with American Indians, Arabs, Cambodians, Chinese, Deaf, Filipinos, Germans, Hispanics, Hmong, Indonesians, Iranians, Internationals, Japanese, Koreans, Laotians, Thais and Vietnamese. The total mission dollars spent in 1994 for language mission work in Oklahoma exceeds \$650,000.

New language pastors who begun work in 1994 are Alex Casias in Altus, Leon Clay in Oklahoma City, Tony Emamghoraishi in Oklahoma City, Marcos Garcia in Tahlequah, Mario Garcia in Hollis, James Hudson in Seiling, Christopher Kim in Oklahoma City and Dewitt Teehee in Tulsa.

One great accomplishment of the language churches is their increase in mission giving through the Cooperative Program and special offerings. Below is the report of their gifts for 1993.

Chaplaincy

The mission statement for the chaplaincy program in Oklahoma is, "To Take The Presence of God into Every Situation." In keeping with the mission statement, "chaplaincy" is attempting to take the gospel of Jesus Christ to people in specialized settings by reaching through the cracks of our society and touching the lives of people who are hidden or out of reach of most local churches. Chaplaincy is the most effective means of reaching secular society because there are times when chaplains are the only persons who can go through some doors to provide ministry.

There are five major areas of mission ministry in chaplaincy: (1) healthcare and pastoral counseling, (2) law enforcement, (3) Corrections, (4) Military, (5) business/industrial. Each of these areas provide opportunities for full-time, part-time and volunteer participation of ministry oriented persons. Each of these areas also provides the opportunity of the local church and its staff to extend their ministry into communities that may otherwise be closed to them.

Healthcare chaplaincy and pastoral counseling is growing as many small hospitals throughout the state implement volunteer chaplaincy programs. So many lives can be touched in the hospital setting that may otherwise be missed.

Associations and churches are initiating counseling services by providing office space for pastoral counselors who can be involved in longterm counseling. This is meeting some very desperate needs in marriage and family issues.

Law enforcement chaplaincy remains the fastest growing area of chaplaincy in Oklahoma and the United States. In Oklahoma, there are 143 law enforcement chaplains representing 48 different agencies. The major emphasis of law enforcement chaplaincy is the officer, his family and the victims of crime. The ministry opportunities are unlimited as ministers are involved as volunteer police chaplains in their community.

Corrections chaplains are providing ministry in perhaps one of the most difficult settings. It is also very rewarding as they touch the lives of people, many of whom have never experienced genuine Christian care. There are hundreds of volunteers who work along side the fulltime chaplains. One of the most significant developments in this area of chaplaincy is the "Church/Inmate Connection." This program links an inmate and his family to a local church during and after incarceration. The sponsoring church provides a ministry to the inmate family during incarceration and the whole family in after-care.

Military Chaplaincy—Although there continues to be a downsizing of military personnel, there are 21 military chaplains serving in Oklahoma. These include Active Duty, National Guard, Reserve and Civil Air Patrol. There remains several openings for chaplains in the Civil Air Patrol. Business/Industrial and special event chaplaincy is the broadest of the chaplaincy categories for ministry in specialized settings. There are many businesses in Oklahoma that are willing to provide a chaplain service to their employees. These may include, automobile dealerships, banks, hotels, motels, and retail stores. Special events chaplain opportunities are unlimited. State and County Fairs, auto races, and community events are just a few that could be considered. Creative thinking and a willingness to go the "second mile" can open doors of ministry opportunity.

Resort Missions

Resort missions are growing every year throughout the United States and Oklahoma. There are so many "mission trip" opportunities right here in the state. It is not necessary to spend large sums of money traveling to distant locations to do missions. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in conjunction with the Home Mission Board is involved in growing numbers of mission opportunities in resort missions in Oklahoma. As an example, the report from Lake Texoma area is as follows: 58 teams ministering in day camps during the eight weeks with 54 professions of faith, including 36 adults. The mission opportunities go beyond the recreational areas to doing lake community surveys for the possibility of starting new churches and other continuing ministry activities.

Reaching people at leisure is another specialized setting where people can be touched with the gospel. For more information contact the Department of Cooperative Missions at the Baptist Building, (405) 942-3800, ext. 301.

Volunteer Construction

Volunteer construction teams completed 14 projects in 1994. These teams consisted of 102 volunteers from out of state and 251 from Oklahoma.

These projects included additions to present facilities such as auditoriums and educational buildings to relocating entire church buildings at a savings of \$294,120 which is approximately 45 percent of the total construction costs.

Churches that are interested in having skilled volunteers assist in the construction phase of their buildings should begin with requesting a form from the Department of Cooperative Missions at the Baptist Building, 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, OK 73112 or calling the department (405) 942-3800, ext. 301.

Volunteer construction also provides opportunities for people with construction skills to be vitally involved in ministry as they participate in these projects. There are churches in the state that would be unable to have adequate facilities if there were not people with construction skills willing to give of their time and talents.

Church Music

Bill Green, Director

The Church Music Department continues to be committed to provide programs for churches to help them minister through music and to reach out into the community to express, in evangelism and outreach, that music is a language of love and a gift from God. Staff adjustments were made as Cara Smith resigned to continue work on her masters degree and God sent a dear friend, talented musician and warm Christian spirit, Wynn Anne Hook, to complete our church music team. The year of 1994 has been a continuing time of growth and ministry for music through the local churches through the church music department.

Equipping

This summer nearly 500 musicians came from across the state to participate in Church Music Oklahoma. Nationally acclaimed clinicians provided training to enhance the growth of the local church through church music. In addition to this annual state-wide event, several individual training conferences were held in associations on Music in Worship, Graded Choir Methods and Materials, Accompanists Seminars and specific helps for bi-vocational and full time ministers of music. Oklahoma rated number one in the convention in associations attaining the Standard of Excellence awards.

Festivals

Oklahoma Baptist Choir Festivals are a major part of the state music program. Seven area keyboard hymn playing festivals attracted over 700 participants. Those involved received valuable critiques and encouragement to develop their talent. The State Keyboard Festival was held at Oklahoma Baptist University for those who received superior ratings in categories III and IV. The need is great to continue encouraging young people and adults to play piano and organ in the churches. The keyboard festival includes categories for piano, organ students as well as adult participants.

Youth Choir Festival

Three Youth Choir Festivals were held in Enid, Tulsa and Lawton. Youth choirs in Oklahoma are alive and well as evidenced by the attendance of over 1200 participants this year. Clinicians, Bob Morrison of FBC, Pensacola, Florida and Charles Collins of FBC, Broken Arrow, worked with the mass choirs and each choir that came was able to sing for constructive comments from the judges. A celebration worship service concluded each event.

FestiBell

FestiBell '94 was held at the Myriad in Oklahoma City and was one

of the most successful handbell festivals ever in Oklahoma. Over 36 handbell choirs received valuable training from the clinician, R.E. Thompson of Broadmoore Baptist Church, Memphis, Tennessee and were also adjudicated during the day's activities. Image magnification was used to help all participants to better be involved in the mass rehearsal and celebration service.

Singin' & Praisin' Meetin' for Senior Adults

The Singin' & Praisin' Meetin' for Senior Adults was held at Southern Hills Baptist Church, Tulsa, and over 1500 people attended the two-day event. Guest clinician, Fes Robertson, who served at our own Baptist Sunday School Board for years, continues to use his talents and skills in leading others in rehearsal and in praise.

Young Musicians Festival

The department of church music is committed to training and encouraging all ages, most especially children, who will become our leadership and singers of the future. In April a state Young Musicians Festival was held at FBC, Edmond with over 1000 participants, followed by a special afternoon of fun at Frontier City. Our guest clinician this year was Helen Kemp. This event continues to be one of the most effective ministries for children in our state.

All State Youth Choir and Orchestra

Over the past three years the All State Youth Choir and Orchestra has grown tremendously. Eighteen different locations were provided for auditions during November and December of 1993, for young people to apply for the all state choir. This year, under the choral direction of Bill Green and instrumental direction of Jim Hansford, 360 young people and sponsors participated in the tour. Concerts were held at Fiesta Texas, Sea World, the Riverwalk and several churches in the San Antonio area, as well as the final concert at First Baptist Church of Moore, Oklahoma. The All State Ensemble, directed by Jon Duncan, was selected from the choir. They sang every Monday night at Falls Creek during the five-week assembly. A final concert of choir, orchestra and ensemble took place at First Baptist Church, Norman, for Church Music Oklahoma. The choir had a total of 282 singers and the orchestra had 47 players. This group is anxiously anticipating a Baptist Heritage tour of England and Wales in 1995.

The Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma

For 33 years the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma have been ministering throughout our state as they share their witness in song. From a talented but slight 20 men in the original group, they have grown to an enrollment of over 240. The churchmen present individual concerts throughout the year and sing with the Singing ChurchWomen and the Oklahoma Baptist Symphony at many state functions. This group represents a body of men dedicated to spreading the word of Christ throughout their churches, cities, this state and wherever the Lord may lead them to sing His praises.

The Singing ChurchWomen of Oklahoma

The Singing ChurchWomen finished their sixth year of ministry with a momentous mission trip to Brazil during which as many as 1000 professions of faith were recorded. During their eleven-day mission trip 5,000 Portuguese New Testaments and 30,000 tracts were given away. The Singing ChurchWomen are most grateful for the prayers and support of Oklahoma Baptists before, during and after this event. The two choirs, divided by I-35, have individual concerts throughout the year and sing together at state events and in other joint concerts.

Falls Creek

No doubt, Falls Creek is one of the greatest impacts for Christ in our state program and music is a great part of that experience. Approximately 2,000 young people made up the five choirs during Falls Creek with our guest choral directors Paul Hammond, Jerry Gregston, Norman Behymer, Dan Heath and Leroy Yarbrough. The orchestra involved over 40 participants each week, topping an all-time record one week of 68, under the direction of Keith Haygood, Susan Clothier, Rusty Stowe, Jim Hansford and David Westgate. In addition, Timothy Company, now in it's fourth year of Falls Creek ministry, presented dramatic interpretations in every worship service. This group was directed this year by Suzie Munday and Brent and Kristi Hazelrigg.

Oklahoma Baptist Symphony

The Oklahoma Baptist Symphony, the first of its kind in any state convention, was a tremendous success during it's inaugural year. This group of 68 of the finest instrumentalists anywhere presented one concert each month to churches and associations throughout our convention. Oklahoma Baptists have clearly communicated a strong desire to hear more of this group and to benefit from their leadership in instrumental emphasis throughout our churches. The orchestra is under the direction of Jon Duncan, associate director of the church music department.

Baptist Messenger, Office of Communications and Convention Printing

Glenn A. Brown, Editor and Director

August 1994 marked the completion of the first full year with all staff and operations of the *Baptist Messenger*, Messenger Press and Convention Printing under the same roof in the new Baptist Building at 3800 N. May, Oklahoma City. During the first three years in the new Baptist Building, all the printing was actually done in the basement of the old building. The new facility has succeeded in bringing new efficiencies and reduced stress.

Earlier calculations proved true that the convention could save about

\$30,000 a year by securing the equipment and space needed to handle and store paper purchased directly from the mills. In time, the savings will pay the total cost of remodeling the first floor of the Baptist Building to accommodate both the *Messenger* press and the convention's print shop.

About 100,000 copies of the *Baptist Messenger* are mailed to subscribers each week, the bulk of them to mailing lists provided by the 1,184 churches that include the *Messenger* in the church's budget. In addition, 114 churches and eight associations purchase special pages to carry their news along with *Messenger* copy.

As the official news magazine of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the purpose of the *Messenger* is to:

1. Publish timely, objective and accurate accounts of news and events of interest to Southern Baptists, with an emphasis on Oklahoma Baptists' work and concerns, using a balanced application of the historic Baptist principle of a free press.

2. Promote all phases of the work sponsored and supported by the convention, denomination and cooperating churches.

3. Make available information relevant to the growth, the welfare and the mature, informed judgment of leaders and members of the churches.

4. Encourage readers to faithfulness in their Christian walk, witness and church involvement.

5. Promote faithfulness in stewardship and mission support.

6. Encourage high moral standards and practice among all people.

7. Serve as an avenue for the dissemination of Baptist doctrine, history and polity.

To achieve this goal, news and commentary are printed on a wide range of subjects, from campaigning against the lottery to missions projects overseas to features on special ministries in our state.

The Convention Printing operation prints the tracts, books, booklets, posters, forms, etc. used by the various departments of the Baptist Building in both field service and office work.

The Office of Communications provides news releases concerning Baptist work and personalities to the state's 48 daily newspapers, 178 weekly newspapers, six television stations and 50 radio stations.

Falls Creek

Gary Fielding, Director

Great days are ahead for Falls Creek Baptist Assembly. The activity of God's Spirit is life changing, almost earth shaking, like a whirlwind. Things get all turned around in a whirlwind. Ministerial Services

Clyde Cain, Director

The Office of Ministerial Services has specific areas of assignment: Church Minister Relations, Conflict Ministry and Annuity Services. **Church Minister Relations**—Interrelated ministries linking the BGCO, associational office and local church involves itself in sharing biographical data to churches regarding pastors and staff persons. This information is shared without recommendation or endorsement from the office of Ministerial Services. Pastors and staff persons are requested to provide this office with material that can be shared with churches when needs arise and requests are made. The biographical information is also shared with Directors of Missions who, in turn, may share this information with churches. A kit designed to equip pastor search committees, "On Calling a Pastor," is available through the Associational office at no cost to the pastorless church. Annually, approximately 2,700 to 3,200 resumes are shared with churches in Oklahoma and several surrounding states.

Conflict Ministry—Directors of missions, pastors, deacons, and other lay persons in the church sometimes find themselves involved in a church conflict. This office seeks to relate to each of these persons or groups to assist in resolving the issues. Conflict resolution is God's work. However, the Office of Ministerial Services seeks to assist in becoming a channel through which God can bring about a resolution. Working with terminated pastors/staff is a continuing ministry and service.

Annuity Services—A growing number of churches and ministers are catching a vision for insurance protection and preparation for retirement. Unfortunately, far too many pastors, other ministers and church and associational personnel do not have adequate financial protection. A primary focus for the Office of Ministerial Services is enrolling as many people and churches as possible in the Church Life and Health Program and the Church Annuity Plan.

Life and Health Program. On January 1, 1994, new life plans were offered that were much more competitive, with enhanced benefits and lower premiums.

Annuity Plan. Approximately 1,241 persons in Oklahoma are participating in the Church Annuity Plan. A major concern is that approximately 50 percent of the churches in Oklahoma do not have their pastors or any staff person in the Annuity Plan. All persons employed by a local Southern Baptist Church (except employees of church schools and day care centers) who work at least 20 hours per week are eligible to participate in the Church Annuity Plan. These persons may benefit in five significant ways:

The Plan includes a choice of plan funds offering valuable, advantageous investment opportunities for retirement. In 1993, the Variable Fund credited 10.5 percent earnings, the Balanced Fund credited 13.25 percent earnings and the Fixed Fund 7.06 percent earnings. The Plan offers significant opportunities for avoiding unnecessary income tax. Ordained ministers do not pay self-employment tax or Social Security on contributions to the Church Annuity Plan. These advantages exceed those offered by IRAs. The plan includes matching state convention Cooperative Program dollars for eligible members' retirement income accounts. This can amount to \$210 per year resulting in higher benefits at retirement.

Annuitants in Oklahoma. In 1994, the average annuitant check was \$343 per month. Approximately 24.8 percent of the annuitants received less than \$200 a month. A special fund to assist annuitants with very low incomes has been established in the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. Contributions are currently being received to assist the funding of this program and ministry.

The Office of Ministerial Services exists to serve churches and staff personnel.

The Board of Directors Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Each year in annual session, the State Convention authorizes the Board of Directors to transact convention business between sessions. The President and Recording Secretary are entrusted with the responsibility to sign legal documents of the convention when signatures are required.

This report consists of actions taken by the board subsequent to the 1993 annual meeting. Regular meetings of the board were held on December 14, 1993; and March 15, May 26, and September 13, 1994. In addition, the board convened July 12, 1994, for a called meeting to consider recommendations of the Budget Subcommittee.

In 1993-94, the board was organized into three committees—Administrative, Business Management and Audit, and Planning and Promotion—in order to effectively accomplish its tasks. Committee assignments were determined by the President in consultation with the Executive Director-Treasurer and the two Vice Presidents.

The Executive Committee

The Bylaws call for an Executive Committee—the convention President, Executive Director-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, and the chairpersons of the three board committees—to perform only such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Directors. Referred matters are considered to be those not under regular assignment to the three committees heretofore specified. No referrals were made to the committee.

Special Committee Appointments

Falls Creek Ad Hoc Committee—The Falls Creek Ad Hoc Committee, appointed following the 1992 annual meeting, continued to evaluate the Falls Creek program for youth camp. Ted Kersh, pastor of Oklahoma City, Village, chaired the committee, which also included Golda Duncan, Rusty Fuller, Scott Neighbors, Judy Parsons, Max Pyron, Trey Smart and A. L. Swagerty.

Evangelism Director Search Committee—The committee appointed to assist Executive Director-Treasurer William G. Tanner in the selection of the Evangelism Department director also continued its work. In addition to convention President Keith Russell and Administrative Committee chairman Alan Day, that committee consisted of John Allen, Bobby Boyles, Forrest Sheffield and Keith Wiginton. Nick Garland, pastor of Broken Arrow, First, served as chairman. The committee met with directors of missions and with a group of small church pastors, among others, to develop a profile of the kind of man they believed would best fit the needs of Oklahoma Baptists. In the ensuing phases of their work, the committee devised a job description and asked the Lord's help in focusing on three or four men to be invited for interviews in April. Definitively, the candidate was required to be a man of prayer with the anointing of the Holy Spirit, a soul winner.

Strategic Planning Committee-The Strategic Planning Committee was expanded to 40 members. Members were Randy Allen, Keith Arledge, Steve Bass, Wade Burleson, Kevin Clarkson, Mike Crook, Eric Dennis, Kay Dudley, Sam Dyer, Alton Fannin, Jerry Faught, Jerry Fielder, Bill Ford, Rick Frie, Nick Garland, James Graham, Kirk Humphreys, Joe Hunt, Anthony Jordan, Ted Kersh, Wendell Lang, Pat Layne, Tom Lee, Gary Lillie, Larry Masters, Dick McClure, Gary McKeen, Nadine McPherson, Bill Merrell, Linda Ochsner, Victor Orta, Sam Porter, Judy Robinson, Clayton Spriggs, Ray Talbott, Pat Taylor, Pat Wagstaff, and Larry Wileman. Dr. T. David Willets served as chairman. Russ Richardson resigned in August and a replacement had not been named at the time of printing. BGCO department directors were asked to serve as ex officio members. Auxiliary corporations of the convention could communicate with the committee but did not have representation on the committee.

The committee, inspired by a February prayer retreat led by Glenn Sheppard, corporately and individually devoted themselves to prayer. On May 3, during the State Bible Conference, all Oklahoma Baptists were invited to converge at Falls Creek for prayer and fasting. Henry Blackaby, previously enlisted for the Bible Conference, agreed to initiate the season of prayer.

Members of the Strategic Planning Committee were appointed to information gathering subcommittees—Demographic Survey, Historical Survey, Economic Survey, Hearing Sessions and Questionnaire. Each subcommittee met several times in order to complete its assignment. Hearing sessions were held in every association across Oklahoma.

Larry L. Rose, director of missions, Tarrant Baptist Association, Fort Worth, Texas, was enlisted as the Strategic Planning Consultant. Rose met with the full committee in October to initiate development of a purpose/mission statement.

Business Management and Audit Committee

The Business Management and Audit Committee relates to the controller's office, which is responsible for all accounting, budgeting, insurance and oversight of properties other than the Baptist Building (operated by the Baptist Building Corporation), Falls Creek, Camp Hudgens and Camp Nunny Cha-ha. Jack Bettis, associate director of missions, Capital Baptist Association, served as chairman of the committee.

December Report—

The committee met to discuss the manner in which funds are received, managed and disbursed. There were no recommendations. March Report-

The Business Management and Audit Committee did not meet in March 1994.

May Report-

1. 1993 Audit Approved-The 1993 convention audit was conducted by the auditing firm, Engelbach Roberts & Company. The board confirmed the committee's recommendation that the audit be approved and printed in the convention annual for distribution to the churches.

2. 1994 Auditor Named --- Approval was given to the recommendation that Engelbach Roberts & Company, certified public accounting firm in Oklahoma City, be employed for the 1994 convention audit. September Report—

The Business Management and Audit Committee did not meet in September 1994.

Planning and Promotion Committee

Responsibilities of the Planning and Promotion Committee are in the fields of stewardship and Cooperative Program promotion; church administration; associational services; disaster relief; video/media; and the church program departments. A. L. Swagerty, pastor of Apache, First, served as chairman.

December Report—

The committee met for orientation, but there were no recommendations in December 1993.

March Report—

1. Funds Appropriated for Equipment for Disaster Relief Unit— The board approved the purchase of new items to replace outdated or worn-out equipment up to an amount of \$75,000. The funds were to be appropriated from the existing disaster relief fund supplied by the State Missions Offering and money donated by churches and designated for disaster relief.

2. "Cooperative Program Champions" Theme Adopted-The board approved the recommendation of the Cooperative Program theme and CP advocacy program, "Cooperative Program Champions," for the years 1994-95, 1995-96, and 1996-97.

May Report-

The Planning and Promotion Committee did not meet in May. September Report—

1. Interim Associate Evangelism Director Presented—Russell Richardson was introduced as full-time interim associate evangelism director for a one-year period beginning December 1, 1994.

Administrative Committee

The assignment of the Administrative Committee is to give counsel and direction in areas of personnel, budget, ministerial services (including annuity services), Baptist Messenger, and Baptist student work. Alan Day, pastor of First Church, Edmond, served as chairman. December Report—

1. BGCO Bylaws Amended to Provide for Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees—A motion passed to amend the Bylaws of the Convention by adopting new Article VII as part of the Bylaws and renumbering existing Article VII as Article VIII in order for the Convention to indemnify to the full extent permitted by law the directors, officers, and employees of the Convention for actions taken by such persons on behalf of the Convention in good faith.

ARTICLE VII

LIABILITY: INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS, OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES AND AGENTS

Section 1. INDEMNIFICATION—The convention shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a director, officer, employee or agent (including volunteers) of the convention, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding except that no indemnification shall be made in respect of any claim, issue or matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged to be liable for gross negligence or misconduct in the performance of this duty to the convention.

Section 2. AUTHORIZATION OF INDEMNIFICATION—Any indemnification under this Article shall be made by the convention only as authorized in the specific case upon a determination that indemnification of the director, officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in this Article. Such determination shall be made: by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of directors who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable a quorum of disinterested directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in written opinion.

Section 3. NON-EXCLUSIVE INDEMNIFICATION—The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the convention's certificate of incorporation or constitution, statutes, regulations, any agreement, any insurance purchased by the convention, vote of the disinterested directors or otherwise, and shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a director, officer, employee or agent of the convention and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs and personal representatives of such person.

Section 4. INSURANCE—The convention shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the convention, against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the convention would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provision of this Article.

2. Crisis Pregnancy Center Advisory Council Members Elected—Dr. Mayo Gilson, physician and member of Village Baptist Church; Mrs. Glenda Steves, member of Edmond, First; and Dr. Dan Maxwell, pastor of Oklahoma City, Heritage, were elected to serve on the Crisis Pregnancy Center advisory council.

Upon recommendation of the Falls Creek Ad Hoc Committee, the board approved the following three proposals from the Administrative Committee:

3. Falls Creek Registration Fee Increased—The board voted to increase Falls Creek registration fees from \$7.25 to \$9 per camper in order to provide funds to purchase image magnification equipment and to reorganize and improve the recreation activities during the five weeks of Falls Creek.

4. Controlled Use of Falls Creek Facilities by Other Groups Approved—Contingent upon sponsorship by an Oklahoma Southern Baptist church and approval of the BGCO Board of Directors, the board voted that the Falls Creek director be encouraged to fill vacant weeks or weekends by groups and organizations such as Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Navigators, and Dawson McAllister Ministries.

5. Falls Creek Dress Code Modified—The board approved modification of the Falls Creek dress code to allow campers to wear medium length shorts, except during worship times, as long as the "New Testament principle of modesty in dress is observed."

6. Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church Property Deeded to LeFlore Association—Title to the property of Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church in LeFlore County was transferred to BGCO when the church disbanded. The board authorized the property to be deeded to LeFlore Baptist Association to begin a new church. In the event the new church does not develop, consent was granted for LeFlore Association to sell the property and use the proceeds for new church work.

7. Roland Edge Re-elected to Board of Baptist Building Corporation—Roland Edge was re-elected to serve a second four-year term as a member of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Building Corporation.

8. Money Allocated to SBC Ministers' Wives Conference-A

motion carried that \$1,000 be allocated for use by the SBC Ministers' Wives Conference, of which Ellen Tanner was current president, for publicity, etc.

9. Strategic Planning Committee Expanded; Replacement Authorized—Approval was granted for an additional five members and one replacement to be appointed to the Strategic Planning Committee, for a total not to exceed 40.

10. Day and Russell Approved to Recommend Board Member Replacements—The Administrative Committee Chairman and the BGCO President were authorized to submit for approval to the Board of Directors names for replacements of three board members who had resigned.

11. BGCO President and Administrative Committee Chairman to Appoint Committee to Study Restructuring of Board Committees—Creation in 1993 of two new auxiliary corporations, BRCO and OBHC, eliminated the need for the Family Care Ministries BGCO board committee. Keith Russell and Alan Day were charged with the responsibility of appointing a committee to study the restructuring of the BGCO Board of Directors.

12. Frank Foutch Named Director of Department of Religious Education—The board affirmed the selection of Frank Foutch as director of the Department of Religious Education.

13. Baptist Messenger Employee Upgraded to Assistant Editor—A recommendation was approved to promote Dana Williamson from newswriter to assistant editor of the BAPTIST MES-SENGER with the compensation level of associate department director effective January 1, 1994.

March Report-

1. Budget Subcommittee Named—Paul Clark, Jone Duck, Wendell Lang, Bill Liggett, Gerald Peters and Forrest Sheffield were approved to serve on the Budget Subcommittee as appointed by President Russell, with Sheffield designated as chairman.

2. Committee Named to Study Restructuring of Board Committees—Jack Bettis, Gary Caldwell, Russell Cook, Anthony Jordan, A. L. Swagerty and Ray Talbott were approved to study the committee structure of the BGCO Board of Directors, with Jordan designated as chairman.

3. 1995 Budget Goal Deferred Until May—In order to determine a more realistic goal, the board postponed specifying the 1995 Oklahoma Cooperative Program Ministries budget objective until the projection could be based on a study of receipts for four full months.

4. BGCO Board Vacancies Filled—Recommendation was approved to fill vacancies created by resignations as follow: Lawrence Cox, Johnston-Marshall Association director of missions, to replace Joey Lansdale; Charla Parker of Alva, First, to replace Annette Lillie in Salt Fork Association; James Beck, pastor of Mannford, First, to replace Jim Gerlt in Tulsa Association.

5. Sumitomo Bank Letter of Credit Renewed—Renewal of the Letter of Credit for up to \$21,183,158.67 in connection with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Variable Rate General Obligation Refunding Bonds (the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Project) Series 1989-A from The Sumitomo Bank, Ltd., for a three year period was approved.

6. Funds Allocated for Purchase of Bibles for Brazil—Approval was granted for the \$40,000 surplus remaining from donations received for Bibles prior to The Singing Churchmen's 1993 trip to the former Soviet Union to be handled as follows: \$10,000 to be allotted for the purchase of Bibles to be distributed in Brazil during the Singing ChurchWomen's 1994 summer mission trip, and \$30,000 to be retained in the special account for Bible distribution in 1996, at which time The Singing Churchmen will make another major mission trip. May Report—

1. 1995 Cooperative Program Budget Objective Established— The recommendation was approved to set the 1995 Cooperative Budget Objective at \$17,450,000.

2. Board Vacancy Filled—The board approved Susan Mullins, member of Norman, Bethel, to replace Darlene Dye in Union Association for a term expiring November 1997 on the BGCO Board of Directors.

3. Historical Commission Vacancy Filled—J. R. Stogsdill was recommended and approved to fill the vacancy on the Historical Commission created by the death of David Forester.

4. BRCO Home Health Care Ministry Authorized—The BGCO board authorized the BRCO Board of Directors to file documents with the State Department of Health to begin a home health agency program and request Medicare certification from the Health Care Financing Administration of the federal government.

5. Land Transfer to Frisco Association Approved—A resolution approving transfer of land from BGCO to Frisco Association, to be used as the site of a residence for their director of missions, was approved.

6. Building Loan Approved to Assist Rogers Association—The board agreed to a recommendation to approve a \$40,000 loan from The Baptist Foundation to assist Rogers Association in building a joint associational/BSU building adjacent to the campus of Rogers State College.

7. Sullins Named Evangelism Director—The board approved Cloyd Sullins as director of the Evangelism Department. September Report—

1. Oklahoma Baptist Historical Collection to Be Moved to Baptist Building—Upon recommendation from the Historical Commission the board voted to permit relocation of the Oklahoma Baptist Collection from OBU to the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. 2. 1954 Resolution Authorizing and Transferring "In Trust" Funds to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma Reconfirmed; Language Updated—The board reconfirmed the resolution dated May 18, 1954, authorizing and transferring "in trust" funds of the Convention to the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The board also approved the addition of terminology specifically referring to auxiliary corporations of the Convention and to custodial funds.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND TRANSFERRING IN TRUST FUNDS OF CONVENTION TO THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

WHEREAS, by Resolution dated May 18, 1954, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma determined that all property, whether real, personal, or mixed, of the Convention or any of the Convention's auxiliary corporations, which properties are trust funds or are held as endowments and are not being used directly in the operation of the Convention, or any of its auxiliary corporations, should be transferred to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, an Oklahoma corporation, to be held in trust; and

WHEREAS, The Resolution of May 18, 1954, does not specifically reference "auxiliary corporations" of the Convention, a term used in Article VI of the Convention's Bylaws, although such Resolution, by implication included auxiliary corporations, because it included the two auxiliary corporations of the Convention then in existence, namely Oklahoma Baptist University and the Oklahoma Baptist Orphans' Home; and

WHEREAS, the Resolution of May 18, 1954, references trust funds of the Convention but does not reference custodial funds of the Convention, because the term "custodial funds" was not in general use at the Convention at the time such Resolution was adopted even though the term "trust funds" would include funds presently considered by the Convention to be custodial funds; and

WHEREAS, in order to eliminate any possible confusion or misunderstanding, the Resolution of May 18, 1954, should be re-confirmed and specifically include reference to auxiliary corporations of the Convention and custodial funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BAPTIST GEN-ERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA, acting by and through its duly elected and authorized Board of Directors, in regular session at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on this 13th day of September, 1994, that all real estate or interest therein, all personal property or interest therein, and all mixed property or interest therein which are now held and owned, or which may be acquired in the future, by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or any of its auxiliary corporations, which properties are trust funds or custodial funds or are held as endowment, of any nature, and which properties are not then needed to be used directly in the actual operation of the Convention, or any of its auxiliary corporations, are to be set over and transferred by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its auxiliary corporations to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, an Oklahoma corporation, to be held in trust (if endowment) or for investment (if custodial funds) by said Foundation in accordance with its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws; and the officers of said Convention or its auxiliary corporations are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma at any time in the future any and all deeds, conveyances and instruments of every nature, and do any and all acts which may be necessary, in order to carry out the purpose and intent of this Resolution.

3. Proposed 1995 SBC Protection Program and Church Annuity Plan Amendments Adopted—In addition to changes and deletions of certain definitions in the SBC Protection Program and Church Annuity Plan as Amended and Restated January 1, 1995, the board also adopted the Annuity Board's proposed modifications regarding state convention contributions; Revenue Ruling 90-24 transfers from the Plan; withdrawals; protection benefits; participant loans; and Plan A early retirement benefit.

4. Baptist Building Corporation Director Appointment Approved—Hoyt Aduddell was approved to serve as a director for the Baptist Building Corporation for a term expiring in 1998.

5. BGCO Board of Directors Restructured—The board approved the recommendation of the Board Restructure Committee and directed that the new configuration begin with the formation of the Board of Directors in December 1994. The reorganization specified an Executive Committee consisting of the Convention's President, Vice Presidents, Recording Secretary, Executive Director-Treasurer, and the chairmen of the standing committees of the Board of Directors; an Administrative Committee with Personnel and Falls Creek Conference Center subcommittees; a Business Management Committee with Budget, Property and Insurance, and Baptist Messenger subcommittees; and a Program Committee with BSU, Missions, and Church Development subcommittees.

Additional Information

December Meeting-

1. Hoover Foundation Grant Accepted on Behalf of OBHC-A

resolution was approved to accept a grant of an estimated \$11,028.52 from the Hoover Foundation, Inc., on behalf of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc., since OBHC had not yet been granted a tax exemption number.

2. President Reports on Convention Motion to Meet with Ingram—Keith Russell reported on developments resulting from the motion made at the annual meeting that he meet with Dr. Joe Ingram. Ingram declined the request to meet.

3. Tanner Asked to Write Sympathy Letter to Akins Family— The board requested the Executive Director-Treasurer to write a letter of Christian sympathy to Dr. Wade Akins and family upon the untimely loss of Mrs. Akins.

May Meeting-

Appreciation Expressed to Forrest Claunch, Christian Life Committee Chairman and State Chairman of Oklahomans Against the Lottery—The board enthusiastically passed the following resolution of appreciation for Forrest A. Claunch, Sr.:

"WHEREAS, Governor David Walters introduced State Question 658 and brought it to a vote of the people; and

WHEREAS, the bill would have brought state run lottery to all 77 counties of Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, lottery would have weakened government, family and society in general, and would have further deteriorated the moral and spiritual fiber of our great state; and

WHEREAS, the lottery would have preyed especially upon those who are economically disadvantaged; and

WHEREAS, Forrest A. Claunch, Sr., provided leadership for the organization of Oklahomans Against the Lottery and led our state in the overwhelming defeat of State Question 658 on May 10, 1994; now

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, by the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, believing that the effectiveness of our efforts against the lottery is due largely to the commitment, dedication and vision of Forrest A. Claunch, Sr., that recognition for outstanding leadership be extended to him; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that profound gratitude be expressed to Forrest A. Claunch, Sr., for persistent, visionary, dedicated and exemplary Christian leadership."

July Report-Called Meeting-

The Budget Subcommittee worked diligently to determine budget needs in order to make realistic recommendations. Members met individually with department directors to discuss budget concerns and requirements. Members of the Budget Subcommittee were Forrest Sheffield, pastor of Harrah, First, chairman; Paul Clark, Jone Duck, Wendell Lang, Bill Liggett and Gerald Peters. Keith Russell and Alan Day served as ex officio members. Through the Administrative Committee and the Board of Directors, the Budget Subcommittee offered these recommendations. 1. That the 1995 Cooperative Program total objective be \$17,450,000 to be distributed 60 percent Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and 40 percent Southern Baptist Convention.

2. That the 1995 Budget be approved as printed. (A motion from the floor amended the \$75,000 additional allocation to OBU to \$50,000 and redirected the remaining \$25,000 to the convention's Special Projects fund. The 1995 Budget was approved as amended.)

3. In the event Cooperative Program income for 1995 does not reach the \$17,450,000 budget, then distribution to all departments, institutions, and agencies, including the Southern Baptist Convention, will be proportionately adjusted.

4. In the event the Cooperative Program receipts for 1995 exceed \$17,450,000 by 5 percent or less, the Executive Director-Treasurer is authorized to distribute Oklahoma's portion. If receipts are greater than 5 percent over budget, the Executive Director-Treasurer will recommend through the Administrative Committee to the Board of Directors the distribution of Oklahoma's share.

5. That the Executive Director-Treasurer be authorized to adjust this budget by not more than 5 percent as prudent or necessary.

6. That the Edna McMillan State Missions Offering goal be \$675,000; that the allocations be \$510,100; and that all offerings received over the stated allocation go to special association projects and new missions, churches and sites.

September Meeting-

1. Board of Directors Report Approved—The printed summary of the actions of the 1993-94 Board of Directors was approved and authorization was granted for the Executive Director-Treasurer to add the actions of the September 13, 1994, meeting for inclusion in the BOOK OF REPORTS for the annual meeting in November.

2. Budget Subcommittee Asked to Monitor Cooperative Program Receipts; Consideration of Adjustment in CP Division Requested; Replacement Appointed; New Chairman Named—The board concurred with a suggestion by Dr. Tanner that, because God had blessed BGCO with CP receipts \$369,287 greater than the comparative period in 1993, the Budget Subcommittee monitor CP projections and receipts prior to the Convention, make a recommendation and poll the Board of Directors by mail if receipts continued to indicate the possibility of meeting or exceeding the budget. In related action, the directors authorized the President to appoint a replacement for a Budget Subcommittee member who had moved out of state and to appoint a new chairman. [Larry Nigh was later added to the subcommittee, and Wendell Lang was appointed chairman.]

Lyle Schaller, in his book "Innovations in Ministry" says that the second most exciting era in the history of American Protestantism is the last quarter of the twentieth century. He states several reasons, among them being the openness of congregations to new forms of ministry. He says that the generations born after 1955 are forcing the churches to be more sensitive to the religious needs of people. He cites the fact that new records in church attendance are being set year after year with the total number attending church on a typical week-end in 1993 being larger than the totals in 1953, 1973 or 1983.

It is an exciting time to be alive. 1993-94 has been a challenging year for Oklahoma Baptists. The following report is simply a few of the things God has allowed us to do together.

Cooperative Program Promotion

Churches in Oklahoma gave \$16,942,580 to world missions through the Cooperative Program in 1993. This was 71,494 below 1992. In addition to the regular Cooperative Program, \$183,481 was given as Designated Oklahoma Cooperative Program. Oklahoma churches gave \$10,322,089 through the Cooperative Program the first seven months of 1994. We will likely end 1994 with Cooperative Program gifts being \$300,000-\$400,000 above 1993 receipts. Perhaps God will do the miraculous and we will meet our basic \$17,450,000 objective.

A Cooperative Program memo has been sent to the pastor and church treasurer each month. A vignette of Cooperative Program ministries is highlighted each month.

Promotion packets for both Cooperative Program Day and Cooperative Program Month were sent to each church. In the Cooperative Program Month packet, new materials on Cooperative Program Champions were included.

Several churches have increased their percentage giving through the Cooperative Program. In fact, 107 churches have increased their percentages from October 1993 through August 1994. Churches are encouraged to look at their percentage giving at least once per year and to ask the question, "Lord, what would you have our church do for the world?" Many churches are being led to make significant increases at sacrifice to their own local church needs.

Coordinated Promotion Planning

The 1993-94 emphasis, "Hope for Hurting Humanity," is drawing to a close. Several churches have made significant advancement in beginning new ministries. The "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now" emphasis for 1994-95 is in the countdown stage. Everything is falling into place for "60 Days of Sharing Jesus with 60 People" for January through March 1995. Also, Harvest Revivals are being planned throughout 1995.

Orientations

Two orientations were conducted at the Baptist Building this year for new directors of Associational Missions. They spent 30-minutes to one hour with each department/agency learning the work of that department/agency and becoming familiar with the resources for the association.

Employee Appreciation Day

A BGCO Employee Appreciation Day was held at the Baptist Building, April 8, with a catered meal and a brief program led by Bill Shiflett, Minister of Music at First Baptist Church of Sapulpa. Dr. William G. Tanner expressed appreciation for the fine work of the employees. They were then given Friday afternoon, April 8, as a Spring holiday in appreciation for their faithful work.

Day of Prayer

A Day of Prayer has been conducted each Wednesday of 1994 in the

Baptist Building Prayer Room. Departments have committed thirtyminute segments of time to be in the Prayer Room praying for special needs in churches, associations and individuals' lives. Chapel has been changed to Wednesday at 10:45 a.m. This gives us a concentrated day of prayer. There are many reports of answered prayer.

Associational Services

Among Baptist bodies, associations are closest to the churches. Their communication with churches is rapid, direct, personal, and reciprocal. Associations mediate communication between the larger bodies and the churches. The associations' work is vital to the work of our Lord and Baptists in Oklahoma.

We have 41 associations, each with their own elected Director of Missions. The following directors are new to their positions since the last publication of the Book of Reports: Derrel D. Lewis, Panhandle Association (9/7/93), and Ray Taylor, Chi-Ka-Sha Association (8/94). The following have retired or resigned: Richard N. McClure served in Muskogee Association from 1966 to 1969 and in Frisco Association from 1986 until his retirement June 1, 1994. Howard Baker served in Chi-Ka-Sha Association from April 1983 until his retirement in December 1993. Brother Baker passed away September 14, 1994. Memorial services were held at Trinity Baptist Church in Ada on September 16, 1994.

David Forester served as Director of Missions for Caddo Association from 1976 until his death, April 5, 1994. Memorial services were held April 8 at the Anadarko High School Auditorium. Joshua Davis, former Director of Missions in Cherokee Association from August 1984 to December 1988, passed away November 16, 1993. Memorial services were held November 20 at the First Baptist Church of Jay. Luther Nelson, former Director of Missions in LeFlore Association, passed away in November of 1993. Brother Nelson served LeFlore Association from January 1968 until his retirement November 1976.

A special training meeting was held in March for nine Associational Directors of Missions. This training meeting was led by Everett Anthony of the Home Mission Board. Directors of Missions were assisted in helping churches in changing communities. Capital Association has completed their Mega Focus study and are now in the resourcing and implementation stage. Comanche-Cotton has begun Metro Thrust. They are in the beginning stage and have not had their first SRT (Strategic Resource Training) meeting. Union Association has requested inclusion in the Metro Thrust program. They have been approved and are awaiting the strategy process.

Two training conferences were conducted with the Directors of Missions at Falls Creek Conference Center on February 14-17 and August 24-26. The February conference provided skills development in the work of the association. J.C. Bradley, from the Home Mission Board, spent six hours covering various aspects of the role of the Directors of Missions and the Association. Henry Blackaby, also of the Home Mission Board, spent an entire day sharing "Fresh Encounter." Robert Haskins presented a "Pastor Mentor Program" for the Association. The August conference provided a marriage enrichment emphasis for the Directors of Missions and spouses. Dr. Bill Carpenter, Director of Pastoral Care and Outpatient Ministries, Baptist Medical Center, Oklahoma City, was the enrichment leader. Brooks Faulkner and his wife led conferences focusing on ministering to ministers and their wives, and health in ministry.

90 Onward Dialogues

Each year the Associate Executive Director schedules dialogues in 12 or 13 associations. The Executive Director-Treasurer, Associate Executive Director, Editor of the *Baptist Messenger*, Director of Ministerial Services, BSU Director, Baptist Foundation President, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma President, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children President, and the President of Oklahoma Baptist University meet with pastors and interested lay people to answer questions relative to the programs and work of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In 1994, dialogues were conducted in the following associations: Comanche- Cotton, Mullins, East Central, Craig-Mayes, Northeastern, Grady, Central, Capital, Pottawatomie-Lincoln, and Panhandle. Dialogues were scheduled in Banner and Frisco Associations but had to be cancelled because of ice and snow.

Church Administration

Henry L. Chennault serves the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma as consultant in church administration. During 1993-94, several training conferences were provided across the state of Oklahoma:

October 12, and

- November 4, 5, 8-11, 1994—regional tax seminars for church staff, treasurers and financial secretaries
- June 27-29, 1994—church secretaries certification seminar offering advanced skills certification
- Throughout 1993-94—Met with several associations and conferred with pastors and lay leaders about tax matters and IRS regulations Stewardship

Henry L. Chennault also serves as director of stewardship. The Planning and Promotion Office aids Oklahoma Baptist churches in stewardship promotion and development. This assistance is given through area and associational conferences, individual church conferences, and personal staff conferences.

Each Oklahoma Baptist church is encouraged to have at least one stewardship emphasis per year. It is suggested that churches also have a mini-stewardship emphasis in May, prior to the summer months. 1994 saw a record number of churches implementing the materials for May Mini-Stewardship Emphasis. In 1993, Henry L. Chennault and Jim Rich of the Missouri Baptist Convention developed a new stewardship program, Try Me, Trust Me, Tithe. It was very well received by Oklahoma Baptist churches. In 1993-94 Try Me, Trust Me, Tithe was also promoted and used by many churches in Oklahoma.

Stewardship packets, with detailed information, suggestions and samples of free materials are mailed in the spring and summer for use by all churches.

Media Services

The Media Services were assigned, late in 1990, to Henry L. Chennault, associate director of Planning and Promotion. The media library continues to service needs of Oklahoma churches regarding video tape rental. Also, a state church media library conference was conducted June 20-21, 1994 at the Baptist Building. A very fine attendance resulted in many church librarians receiving excellent training.

Chennault compiles and edits a quarterly Christian Life Report for Oklahoma Baptists' Christian Life Committee. This report deals with moral issues and is mailed to pastors and Directors of Missions. The materials in this report are designed to help pastors in their communication with their people.

Continuing Education

January 1, 1994 the work of continuing education was moved to the Office of Planning and Promotion and Dr. Henry L. Chennault became director.

This ministry includes a working relationship with Oklahoma Baptist University through the Ministry Training Institutes, Southwestern and Midwestern Seminaries, providing both master and doctoral level work as well as seminary extension ministry through the Southern Baptist Convention. Persons involved in this ministry include: Ministry Training Institutes—300 to 350, Southwestern Seminary— 115 to 130, Midwestern Seminary—15 to 25, and Seminary Extension 75 to 150. The State Bible Conference at Falls Creek and the KBA Bible Conference at Kiamichi provided continuing education for approximately 600 pastors and staff persons in 1994.

Oklahoma Baptist University

Bob R. Agee, President

Historic events shaped the 1993-94 year at Oklahoma Baptist University. Record enrollments, a unique new academic program, and the opening of a new business education center were highlights of a busy period in the life of the 84-year-old institution.

OBU's student enrollment for the fall of 1993 was a new record for the university as 2,432 students registered for classes. The fall enrollment was a 7.6 percent increase over the fall 1992 total of 2,260 students. A record total of 1,972 students studied on the Shawnee campus. An additional 421 students were enrolled in Ministry Training Institute courses at more than 30 locations across Oklahoma, with MTI courses also offered in Indiana, Montana and Kansas. An additional 39 students enrolled for OBU courses at the Absentee Shawnee Tribal Complex in Shawnee. The full-time student enrollment rose from 1,650 in 1992 to 1,723 in the fall of 1993. Approximately 72 percent of the students came from 74 of Oklahoma's 77 counties, with the remainder representing 42 other states and 31 other countries.

Enrollment for the spring 1994 semester jumped by 5.1 percent over the previous spring when 2,262 students registered for classes. The total included 1,867 students on campus, 379 students studying through the MTI program, and 16 at the Absentee Shawnee Tribal Complex.

In August of 1993, classes began for OBU's first-ever graduate level program. A maximum capacity of 20 students enrolled for the master's degree program in marriage and family therapy. OBU is one of only two Oklahoma universities offering the degree, and the only one offering the program from a distinctively Christian perspective. The master's degree courses are designed to promote both clinical and biblical accountability.

In September, for the third time in four years, U.S. News & World Report recognized OBU as one of the 10 best regional liberal arts colleges in the western United States. The rankings are based on student selectivity, faculty resources, financial resources, and graduation rate. In a new category for excellence, U.S. News named OBU the "most efficient" regional liberal arts college in the West. The top efficiency rating was based on the university's overall score in the U.S. News rankings divided by its 1992 spending on education programs per student.

OBU's Bailey Business Center, a \$3.5 million project, opened for the fall 1993 semester, and was dedicated in October. The 31,290square-foot facility includes 11 classrooms, 15 faculty offices, the 150seat Tulsa Royalties Auditorium, two computer labs, and the OBU business hall of fame. The center features computer-enhanced teaching capabilities for each classroom, as well as satellite down-link capabilities.

Major landscaping work on the university's oval complemented completion of the Bailey Business Center. In addition, major improvements were completed on Shawnee Hall, OBU's oldest building, during the academic year. Campus renovation work also included installation of elevators in Thurmond Hall and Ford Music Hall.

Installation of a fully integrated computer automation system was completed in OBU's Mabee Learning Center during the summer. The system replaces the university's card catalog, offering students and faculty enhanced searching capabilities. Through the system, OBU is linked to libraries across the nation, allowing greatly expanded research and information gathering capabilities. The Robert N. Hammons Biblical Research Center was dedicated in January. Housed in Montgomery Hall, the research center offers a study location for upperlevel biblical studies students, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary students studying at the OBU satellite campus, and pastors or other ministers in the state who want to do research at OBU. The center is named in honor of Rev. Robert N. Hammons, a long-time Oklahoma pastor who retired from the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Seminole in early 1994.

Signifying the university's long-standing traditions in the fields of church music and mission involvements, two OBU graduates, Bill J. Pearson and Donald R. Kammerdiener, were presented honorary doctorates by OBU during Founders' Day in February. The two represent more than 77 years of work in Southern Baptist ministry efforts.

In the spring, Dr. C. Mack Roark, OBU vice president for religious life since 1984, accepted a full-time faculty position as OBU's Ruth Dickinson professor of Bible. Dr. Dick A. Rader, dean of OBU's Joe L. Ingram School of Christian Service and WMU professor of missions, added the duties of vice president for religious life, and Dr. Tom Wilks, OBU professor of applied ministry, was named director of off-campus programs.

OBU picked up the pace in the area of summer mission efforts in 1994. A long-time leader among Southern Baptist colleges and universities in the number of mission volunteers, the university had a record number of 200 students, faculty and staff serve in mission projects during the summer. Their work spanned 19 states and 12 other countries.

A team of nine people taught English in Karamai, China, as the university marked its eighth year of partnership with Xinjiang University in China's most inland province. For the fifth straight year, a team of four OBU representatives taught English at the International Baptist Lay Academy in Budapest, Hungary.

More than \$3.4 million was raised for the university during the 1993-94 fiscal year, as more than 5,800 people contributed to OBU. The financial support provided funds for scholarships, endowment, equipment, operational support, and construction/renovation projects.

OBU trustees approved a \$23.4 million operating budget for the 1994-95 fiscal year during their spring meeting. The university's tuition and fees were raised for the fall 1994 semester, but OBU continues to be among the lowest of the 53 Southern Baptist colleges and universities. OBU is still the least expensive private university in the state.

In athletic programs, OBU capped off the academic year with three national top-four finishes in the spring. The indoor and outdoor track and field teams each placed third in the national championships, garnering 26 All-America honors, with three individual national champions. In addition, Bison head coach Glen Stone was named the NAIA Track Coach of the Year. OBU's cross country team finished 20th in the

nation in the fall, after winning its third straight District 9 championship.

The OBU men's basketball team followed up its record-setting 1992-93 campaign with a return trip to the NAIA Final Four. The Bison were ranked first in the nation for most of the regular season and compiled a 29-8 record overall. The men's basketball program also had its first-ever Academic All-American selected in the spring.

In women's basketball, the Lady Bison gained a national ranking early in the season and compiled a 21-11 record in the rugged Sooner Athletic Conference. The season was highlighted by a 14-game winning streak, as the team advanced to the second round of the conference playoffs.

In baseball, the Bison battled through a seesaw season to compile a 30-20 record and reach the District 9 playoffs. The Lady Bison softball team finished second in District 9, compiling a 22-21 record.

The Bison tennis team battled injuries throughout the year, compiling a 6-9-1 mark for the season. It snapped a string of 15 consecutive winning seasons.

In May, OBU's trustees approved the addition of three new women's varsity sports, beginning with the 1994-95 year. The new sports include women's cross country, indoor track and field, and outdoor track and field.

The university welcomed eight new faculty members in the fall of 1994. The full-time faculty totals 107, with more than 63 percent holding earned doctorates.

As OBU continues to expand its efforts in the arena of Christian education, the university is grateful for the faithful and prayerful support of Oklahoma Baptists.

Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma

Oklahoma Baptists' thirty-fifth anniversary year in ministry to older adults through retirement centers was also a year of new beginnings. A new auxiliary corporation of the convention, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, was formed. This new organization is enabling us to focus entirely on ministries to older adults. We hit the ground running and are making a difference in the lives of people. We know that, sooner or later, every Baptist in Oklahoma has a need for the ministry we provide.

Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma provides three retirement centers and four villages including more than 675 independent living apartments, 90 assisted living apartments and provisions for 340 persons in long term nursing care. Services are designed to meet needs and contribute to health, security, happiness, spiritual well-being and use-fulness in longer living. More than 1,100 people live in the Baptist Retirement Centers.

Opportunities to minister to older adults in our state are expanding. A twenty-member board of directors is focused on the needs of older adults. Home health care and an expanded assisted living program are rewarding new avenues of ministry.

I Program Highlights

- Monroe Palmer, administrative chaplain at Okmulgee Baptist Village, and wife, Juanita, were presented the 1994 "Extra Mile Award" for outstanding service to retirement center residents.
- 2. An administrator's home was constructed at Cleveland Baptist Village.
- 3. A new program was begun providing home health care services to the residents of the Baptist Retirement Center of Owasso and the surrounding area.
- 4. The Board of Directors recommended that land located across from the Baptist Retirement Center of Hugo be given to Frisco Association for the purpose of constructing a director of mission's residence.
- 5. Warren and Dolly Lamons were named Mission Corps Volunteers at Okmulgee Baptist Village after a ministry of more than 20 years as pastor of First Baptist Church, Yale.
- 6. A plan was approved to construct ten additional life-occupancy duplex units at the Baptist Retirement Center of Owasso.
- 7. Due to storm damage in the Ada area, roof replacement was completed for the second consecutive year at Ada Baptist Village.
- 8. More than 500 older adults attended Bible study or chapel services on campus each week.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is the incorporated trust agency of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. All endowment gifts received by or for Convention agencies, institutions, departments or special projects are transferred to the Foundation for management. No Convention entity holds and/or manages its own endowment funds.

Because of this unique relationship, dating back to November, 1946, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has grown to be third in size among the 29 state Southern Baptist foundations.

As of December 31, 1993, assets held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma reached \$112.9 million. New gifts received during the past audit year were \$8 million, with earnings for this period totaling \$11.1 million.

As trustee for endowment gifts for Oklahoma and Southern Baptist causes, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma distributed more than \$6 million on behalf of approximately 100 beneficiaries during the past year. These beneficiaries include churches, associations, foreign, home and state missions, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Oklahoma Baptist University, the Southern Baptist Convention and individuals who receive income from trusts during their lifetime.

The ethic and philosophy of The Baptist Foundation	of Oklahoma is

clearly defined by an investment policy statement adopted by the Foundation's Board of Directors in October, 1986:

"The Foundation is committed to conducting its business affairs in a manner consistent with the highest Christian moral and ethical standards taught and implied in the Scriptures, and shall in no way compromise its Christian witness in the world by investment in a company or activity which does not promote the best interests of a wholesome society. No assets held by the Foundation are invested in companies related to the liquor, tobacco or gambling industries, or companies dealing in pornographic materials, or companies promoting entertainment forms which present as norm lifestyles inconsistent with Christian morality or companies which violate basic human rights by their manner of doing business."

The Foundation's Board of Directors is composed of 20 business and professional people from across the state, each serving a four year term. The directors are organized into four functioning committees. These committees are: audit and trust administration; estate stewardship and promotion; church building loans/real estate/student services, and investment. The chairpersons of each of these committees constitute the executive committee. In addition, there are six individuals who serve as advisors to the Foundation's Board of Directors.

Board members are: Sidney M. Adkinson (Duncan), J. Chris Cariker (Stigler), Beverly Clark (Tulsa), Chris L. Condley (Muskogee), Stephen Earle (Ponca City), Linna Edwards (Oklahoma City), David B. Gillogly (Bethany), C.B. Graft (Clinton), Ron Harris (Mooreland), Bob Jones (Lawton), Ray Mason (Noble), Raymond McDowell (Mustang), David W. Morley (Enid), Oneal Netherland (Tulsa), Ed Peterson (Lawton), Henry D. Powell (Bartlesville), Paulette Reed (Durant), Marcia Robb (Tulsa), Janelle Sloan (Oklahoma City), and Bob Wagoner (Broken Arrow). Advisors are Bob Agee (Shawnee), John R. Crain (Tulsa), Marlin Hawkins (Oklahoma City), Randy Long (Enid), Joyce Shelby (Midwest City) and Charles Sutter (Edmond). Ed Packwood (Oklahoma City) is an advisor emeritus.

The Foundation's programs and day-by-day operations are administered by an executive staff consisting of Robert L. Ross, president; Ronald L. Fannin, senior vice president for loan services; Robert Kellogg, vice president and chief financial officer; James H. Lockhart, vice president and general counsel; Celinda K. Olszewski, vice president and controller; Melinda Warren, vice president for estate stewardship services; Wayne Childers, director of communication and public relations; Bill Gwartney, director of the Tulsa regional office; ShryIn Treadwell, director of trust administration.

The Foundation's main offices are in the Baptist Building at 3800 North May Avenue in Oklahoma City. A full service regional office is located in the Southern Oaks Building at 7335 South Lewis Avenue, Suite 307 in Tulsa. Estate stewardship counselors also reside in Muskogee and Duncan and may be reached through a Baptist Foundation listing in those cities.

Copies of "The Certificate of Incorporation and Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma Amended and Restated, July 1993" are available from the Foundation office upon request.

The report which follows is presented under sub-headings representing areas of work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

Investments

Assets held by the Foundation, were for the most part, invested in the Equity Investment Pool (EIP) and the Fixed Income Pool (FIP) during last year. The EIP is composed of stocks and cash equivalent investment instruments while the FIP contains church building loans, corporate and government bonds. The market value of the combined pools exceed \$97 million.

The various account types administered by the Foundation are invested in different proportions of equity and fixed income investments (asset mix) based on their account type and investment objectives. The asset mix expresses the percentage of investment in the EIP and FIP.

Assets that are not endowment in nature are invested with an asset

mix of 65% in the FIP and 35% in the EIP. The Foundation distributes earned income (stock dividends and interest on bonds and cash equivalents) to the beneficiaries of these accounts.

In accordance with the Foundation's Spending Policy and total rate of return concept, and in compliance with Oklahoma's Uniform Management of Institutional Endowed Fund Act, the Foundation is allowed to recognize and distribute asset appreciation, in a prudent manner, on endowment assets. Endowment asset accounts have an asset mix of 55% in the EIP and 45% in the FIP. The Foundation distributes \$0.06 per share to beneficiaries of these accounts.

The Foundation's equity portfolios are managed by four professional equity management firms: Laurel Capital Advisors, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Sirach Capital Management, Seattle, Washington; Talon Asset Management, Chicago Illinois and Tom Johnson Investment Management, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The Foundation's bond portfolio is managed by Ferguson, Wellman, Rudd, Purdy and Van Winkle, Portland, Oregon. Dave Patrick of Smith Barney Shearson Company serves as an investment consultant to the Foundation in monitoring and reporting on the performance of the investment managers. The investment committee of the Board of Directors meets periodically to review the progress of the Foundation's investment strategy.

Other assets managed by the Foundation are not invested in the investment pools due to the nature of the assets, such as real estate properties, mineral interest and production, tax exempt bonds and other miscellaneous gifts.

Trust Administration

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma currently administers more than 1200 trusts. Such administration involves the receiving and investing of corpus contributions, distributing income to beneficiaries, and reporting to appropriate individuals and other entities. Fiduciary responsibility requires a continuous monitoring process to assure that trusts are administered according to the terms of the document and that there is full and accurate accounting of income and expenses.

Approximately 30% of trusts administered by the Foundation require tax reporting to the Internal Revenue Service and the Oklahoma Tax Commission. These personal and trust returns are prepared either by The Baptist Foundation or by an outside accounting firm.

Copies of "Trust Administration Policies of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," adopted by the Board of Directors in July, 1992 are available upon request. Procedures for implementation of trust administration policies are subject to continuing review and revision.

Charitable Giving And Estate Stewardship Services

One cannot describe the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma without using words like "ministry" and "service." For forty-eight years, the Baptist Foundation has offered estate planning information and assistance to Baptist people. Last year 802 persons were assisted by the estate stewardship staff of the Foundation. This led to the preparation of 612 Christian wills, 168 trusts, and 22 gift annuities.

Melinda Warren directs the estate stewardship services. Five other staff members assist in the area of estate stewardship. Rex Wilkinson serves as an estate stewardship counselor for the eastern half of the state. Mart Hardin serves as an estate stewardship counselor for the western part of the state. Neal Wooldridge has no assigned territory, but has responsibility for the entire state. Judy Branom has estate stewardship responsibilities in the Oklahoma City area. Bill Gwartney directs the Tulsa office.

Charitable giving and estate stewardship is a highly specialized area complicated by changing tax laws and emerging techniques. Therefore, professional training is an ongoing activity with the Foundation staff. Foundation personnel also relate to other professionals such as attorneys, accountants and financial planners to accomplish the charitable objectives of clients.

Much of the growth of the Foundation can be attributed to its charitable giving and estate planning services. More importantly, it helps people mature in their giving and it helps agencies, institutions, and departments of our Convention to fulfill their mission.

Church Building Loan Services

The Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma established the Church Building Loan program as an investment strategy in 1954. It is designed to provide endowment income for Baptist causes through long term financing of church and associational building projects. Cooperating churches, associations, institutions and agencies of the BGCO have secured loans from the Foundation knowing that their interest payments help support various Baptist causes.

Current church building loan investments total nearly \$28.5 million, including participation loans with the Home Mission Board. In addition to the loans made to Oklahoma Southern Baptist Churches, loans have been approved for Southern Baptist churches in Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado. However, Oklahoma churches are always given first priority. Loan application packets are available upon request from the Foundation's Loan Services Department. Ron Fannin, senior vice president, visits personally with each applicant to assure adequate collateral for the loan and to answer all questions from the borrower. Applications received by the first of the month are considered in that monthly meeting of the Church Building Loan Committee.

A total of 1,172 loans have been made since 1954. This past year from August 1, 1993, through July 31, 1994, 35 loans were made, totaling \$7,560,312.18. Loans in effect during the past year produced more than \$2.3 million in interest income for Baptist causes during this same time period.

There are four types of competitive interest rates offered to borrowers: (1) an annual adjustable rate, (2) a three year adjustable rate, (3) a five year guaranteed fixed rate and (4) a ten year guaranteed fixed rate. A maximum term of 15 years is offered for each loan and each interest rate has a maximum adjustment of 5% over the life of the loan.

Communication And Public Relations Services

An effective communication program is a vital part of the ministry of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma. The following summary highlights the communication and public relations programs relating to the Baptist constituency, church and associational leaders, attorneys and other professionals, and the general public.

Communicating through special emphasis:

Each year two observances on the denominational calendar focus on Foundation ministries. January is observed as "Make Your Will Month" and September is designated "Baptist Foundation Month." To mark these observances The Foundation provides more than 160,000 bulletin inserts to all of the 1,600 Baptist churches in Oklahoma. The inserts promote an estate stewardship theme and provide a form to request estate planning assistance or additional information.

These emphases are also promoted through articles in the *Baptist Messenger*, and associational newsletters. The *Baptist Messenger* devoted editorial space to promoting these events.

Another special emphasis was at the state Evangelism Conference where the Foundation had a booth. Foundation staff members attended the booth, and distributed materials.

This year the Foundation sponsored two Taxable Estate Seminars led by the Foundation personnel and local professionals. These seminars addressed complicated issues in taxable estates. The Foundation further sponsored three community-wide estate planning seminars. One seminar addressed revocable living trusts, wills, gift annuities and other planning options. Another seminar, *Financial Planning in the 90's*, provided basic information on the creation, preservation and the distribution of an estate.

Other seminars conducted by the Foundation include; Options for Aging Parents, W.A.T.S. (Will and Trust Seminar), and Church Building Loans.

In May 1994, the Foundation conducted two identical conferences for attorneys, certified public accountants, chartered life underwriters and bank trust officers in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. 140 professionals attended in Oklahoma City and 71 in Tulsa.

Communicating with churches:

Several members of the Foundation staff are ordained ministers and former pastors. Because they are gifted preachers they are busy almost every Sunday preaching in churches across the state and representing the work of the Foundation. They serve as interim pastors, preach revivals, conduct Bible studies, teach at Falls Creek, participate in World Mission Conferences and other meetings.

In addition to preaching schedules, Foundation staff members conducted 50 W.A.T.S. emphases in churches. A W.A.T.S. emphasis involves staff members speaking on the work of the Foundation in morning worship services, conducting estate planning seminars and preaching on estate stewardship in evening worship services. They also meet by appointment with persons interested in receiving estate planning assistance.

Foundation personnel also provided programs for senior adult ministries in 19 churches this past year.

Communicating through literature:

Distributing literature and other materials is yet another way the Foundation presents important information. Literature is distributed as staff members speak in churches or associations, and by mailings to persons requesting information. Literature is supplied to associational offices, associational Baptist Foundation representatives, pastors, staff members and directors of missions. Literature and materials are supplied in packets provided to attorneys, accountants, pastors and other professionals.

Using the promotional theme "Planting Today...for Future Generations" program covers for associational annual meetings were developed and distributed.

A booklet, "Galatians The Gospel of Grace," was prepared and distributed at Falls Creek to pastors and sponsors in the class on Galatians taught by the Foundation representatives. Dr. Finley Tinnin was the author of the Bible study guide.

Literature pieces currently available for distribution include: "The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma," "Do You Need A Will?," "Estate Planning, A Christian Perspective," "When Death Does Us Part," "The Personal Representative," "W.A.T.S. A Bright Idea," "The Forever Fund," "A Gift Annuity; Having Your Cake and Eating It Too," "The Gift Annuity Contract," "The Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust," "The Charitable Remainder Unitrust," "The Lawyer and His Baptist Client," "The Personal Record Album," "The Revocable Living Trust," "Policies and Regulations for Church Building Loans," "Policies and Regulations for Student Scholarships and Loans," and "Trust Administration Policies."

Communicating through media:

Press releases are prepared periodically for major, regional and local newspapers, the *Baptist Messenger*, other denominational publications and professional publications for foundation executives and development officers.

The *Baptist Messenger* provides an excellent means for communicating important information to Baptist people. Articles in the state Baptist paper go to more than 100,000 subscribers weekly. These articles feature personal aspects of the Foundation's ministry, news about board actions, programming and personnel. Reader response to these articles is significant and often leads to estate planning opportunities.

Pillars is a new publication distributed by the Baptist Foundation to nearly 10,000 persons. The quarterly newsletter provides information about estate planning, personal interest stories, and other matters related to the Foundation's work. The first publication was in the Fall of 1993. Persons interested in receiving this newsletter may contact the Baptist Foundation offices.

Press releases and pictures are sent to local newspapers across the state regarding activities of the Foundation staff, preaching and speaking opportunities, church events, activities of the Foundation Board of Directors, retirements, anniversaries, board decisions and other Foundation news.

Communicating through ongoing programs:

There is no substitute for the pastor's enthusiastic endorsement and recommendation of this ministry. However, before pastors can respond in this manner, they first must have an understanding and appreciation for the purposes and programs of the Foundation. This year the Foundation sponsored associational pastors luncheons or dinners in western and northeastern Oklahoma. A Clients' Conference was held again this year attended by 51 persons. Clients are individuals who have a special trust relationship with the Foundation. This conference is an annual event.

Personal Trustee Services

The Baptist Foundation, in serving as trustee for the assets of individuals, provides financial services in addition to meeting the ministry and personal needs of trustors. For those individuals who have established a Life Care Trust with the Foundation, the following services are provided by staff members: managing of trust assets, paying bills, filing and tracing insurance claims, sending regular distribution checks, explaining financial reports, and distributing trust assets according to the document.

Because many trustors have no close family members to care for them, assistance is also required in other areas of their lives. Whether help is needed in scheduling and arriving at doctor's visits or simply a personal visit to the retirement center or nursing home is desired, Foundation staff members will work to see that both personal and spiritual needs are met.

Finley Tinnin, administrative assistant regularly visits with these individuals and provides for many of their personal needs. In addition, Janna Charles works with trustors in answering questions and managing their personal finances. At this time, the Foundation has this kind of relationship with 26 persons across the state.

Property Management and Mineral Leasing Services

Management of real and mineral properties is directed by a committee of board members. Decisions to sell, lease, rent, or repair properties are determined according to provisions in legal documents by which properties are received and upon recommendations of staff.

Gifts of real property are usually in four categories: residential, commercial, farm land, and wasting properties, such as lake lots, cemetery lots, etc. It is the policy of the Foundation to sell properties that have been received by the Foundation as quickly as possible.

The Foundation holds deeds to more than 25,000 acres of mineral interest in 61 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states. During the past year the Foundation received 13 units of mineral interest in Louisiana and Oklahoma. Mineral income last year audit totaled \$471,719.

Ron Fannin, senior vice president and Jim Lockhart, vice president and general counsel provide staff supervision of this area of work.

Student Scholarship And Loan Services

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma invests in people - especially young people involved in educational pursuits - by providing student

scholarships and/or loans. There is no more effective way to shape the future than to assist in the educational preparation of bright, committed Christian young people who can significantly impact their world for Christ.

Presently the Foundation administers more than 300 scholarship and loan trusts. In most cases, donors establish criteria for the determination of recipients. Most of these grants and loans are limited to students attending Oklahoma Baptist University or Southern Baptist seminaries. There are a limited number of scholarships provided through the Foundation to qualified applicants on a "funds available" basis.

During the 1993-94 school year, 91 students benefitted from Foundation administered scholarships totaling \$48,900.

Baptist Student Union

Bob Lee, Director

We had another banner year in BSU work in Oklahoma. Students continue to participate in large numbers in ministry and mission projects. Support from the convention, churches, and associations continues to be strong and encouraging.

Students continue to be interested in studying the Bible and sharing their faith with other students. Every year more and more students are won to the Lord and involved in Bible study and discipleship groups. Today, as much as at any time, students are hungry to know what God's Word has to say to them.

Plans call for all BSUs to be involved in "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now." Special emphases, which include revivals and evangelism training, will be happening on every campus. Students will be trained to share their faith and Bible studies will emphasize evangelism.

Oklahoma students continue to respond to the call for missions. Close to 500 students served in missions during the summer of 1994. Sixty-five students served in foreign countries. Foreign mission projects were conducted in 14 countries including Indonesia, Austria, Japan, Ukraine, Hungary, Bulgaria, Cameroon, Brazil, Mexico, Belgium, Singapore, Uzbekistan, Taiwan, and the Philippines. The BSU group from Southeastern at Durant saw over 350 people come to know the Lord as a result of their evangelism efforts in the Philippines.

Students raised over \$188,000 to help fund summer missions, special mission projects, and support BSU work in newer convention areas. A large number of students are serving as semester missionaries and Mission Service Corps volunteers doing BSU work in Oregon, Washington, Arizona, Utah, California, Oklahoma, and Hawaii. Over \$40,000 was sent to support BSU work in newer convention areas. Finally, over 3,000 students participated in short-term and community mission projects.

It seems like there are always changes in the BSU Director positions. This year was no exception. Joe Schmidt moved from Redlands in El Reno to Northeastern in Tahlequah. Jon Herring is the new Director at El Reno after serving two years as an associate at Tulsa Junior College. Brian Matlock is the new Associate Director at Tulsa Junior College and Curtis Cook is the new Associate at OSU. David Curry has moved to Oklahoma City from Sayre to direct the BSU work at Oklahoma City Community College and OSU/Oklahoma City. Joy Godby is serving as the BSU Director at Southwestern at Sayre.

Because of the special emphasis on evangelism, Bible study, discipleship and missions, BSU work continues to grow and remain strong. Other areas of activities are based upon these four basic areas. It is still our strong commitment to see that students have an opportunity to come to know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and to grow through Bible study, missions, discipleship and church involvement.

Christian Life Committee

More and more churches are realizing the most effective way for members of their congregations to influence their society is through a Christian Life Committee. That group (CLC) can lead the church to fulfill its call from *The Baptist Faith and Message* to "bring industry, government and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love."

Some may be unclear about the nature and purpose of a CLC. A CLC is a standing committee in a local church or Baptist association which consists of a small group of interested persons with special concerns about how Christian principles can be applied to the daily lives of believers and their society. It is charged with the responsibility of leading a congregation or association to be aware of moral, social, religious liberty, legislative and public policy issues and what Christians can do to make a difference in their communities by standing for Biblical values.

In fulfilling this role, the committee performs these tasks:

- **STUDY.** The CLC will identify social and moral issues to which the congregation needs to respond. It will also discover information and gather resources related to particular concerns.
- EDUCATION. The CLC will bring appropriate issues and concerns to the attention of the congregation and make suggestions for individual and church response. In a variety of ways, the CLC will supply significant factsand information to the local church to raise the level of awareness regarding specific issues. Such edu-

cation may also include Bible teachings which deepen Christian motivation.

ACTION. The CLC will provide the church with strategies, techniques and resources for action.

There is a wealth of information available and a myriad of organizations offering help on moral, public policy and religious liberty issues. Your BGCO Christian Life Committee has prepared a handbook for a church or association considering or in the process of establishing or training such a committee. The handbook not only contains practical, useful information and suggestions on how to get started, but it also provides a comprehensive listing of sources of additional information and help. A packet of samples of available material is also included.

Any CLC should be careful to evaluate information in light of God's principles found in His Word, instead of the current political trends or "politically correct" views of the world. The CLC should also be careful not to be swayed by personal agendas or partisanship. Recognition of these dangers is the best safeguard of assuring they do not become problems.

A CLC must recognize the inevitability of warfare when the forces of evil are challenged. The devil wastes little energy battling lukewarm, ineffective Christians, but reserves his forces for God's people who go to work. In the midst of the battle, God's people can humbly, but confidently, remember that He that is in us is greater than he that is in the world (1 John 4:4).

An Observation of the American Family

Any casual observation of the family in America points to pain and disintegration. There is a crisis in the family. Just read the headlines of any local paper or watch the news and you'll agree that today's family is in crisis. Father indicted for killing family; boy blows away grandparents; teen-ager seeks divorce from parents are just the tip of the iceberg. The crisis in the family involves divorce. Families are being torn apart and separated because dad and mom cannot get along. No fault divorces and a lack of commitment are just some of the reasons. The crisis in the family involves *despair*. Parents are finding out their children are drug addicts, sexually active, homosexual or a part of a gang. Kids are finding out that dad left mom for a younger woman or in some cases another man. The home is exclusively becoming a place for people to lay their heads at night to sleep. There is no involvement or communication. The crisis in the family also involves death. Family members are killing one another. There seems to be no love or support, only pain and suffering.

If the <u>condition</u> of the family today in America was compared to the standard of a person's condition in a hospital, it would be in critical condition. The condition is two-fold. The family is *divided within*. Fighting between parents, kids, parents and kids seem to be the norm in our society. Some kids have gone so far as to ask for a divorce from their par-

ents. Jesus said in Mark 3:25 that "a house divided cannot stand." The family is also *disillusioned without*. The anti-family groups in our society are doing their best to give the family its death blow. The secular elitists, humanists, and the feminists are just a few who believe the family is a passing fad. The homosexual movement is bent on destroying the traditional family. Is there any hope?

The <u>cure</u> for the family's ills is found in the person of the Lord Jesus Christ. He is the *crucified* Lord who was nailed to the cross for the sins that dads, moms, and children commit. All the sins that are destroying the family Christ paid for with His precious blood. That is why He is also the *convicting* Lord. He lovingly convicts parents and children of their sin that can weaken the family unit. Jesus is also the *counseling* Lord who gives instruction for daily living. He encourages mutual submission between parents and uncompromising obedience from children. The cure for the family today rests in the person of Jesus Christ.

The <u>choice</u> facing the family today is found in Joshua 24:15. For many families the decision has been a choice of *convenience*. The temptation to follow the gods of this world has been too great to overcome. Materialism, secular humanism and hedonism has the allegiance of many families today. Can we afford to make the convenient choice? There is also the choice of *conviction*. It was the choice made by Joshua in his day. It must be the choice of every family today if we are to survive the attacks from the evil one. Today's dads and moms are challenged to say with conviction "as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Only then will the chaos be turned into contentment in America's families.

Pornography's Pain

For the last 25 years, we have witnessed the constant increase of pornographic material being poured into the marketplace through magazine sales, video outlets, cable television companies, movies; a host of other methods now available through direct mail, computer networking and programs; and "live" vulgarities in various clubs and night spots. Sometimes people are not aware of the scope of the problem.

DID YOU KNOW THAT

- 1. There are more outlets for hard-core pornography in America than MacDonald's restaurants.
- 2. According to the FBI, the pornography industry grosses 8-10 billion dollars per year and is controlled by organized crime.
- 3. At least one woman is raped every 48 seconds in the U.S. Rapists, when arrested, state that pornography served as the manual and motivation for their acts.
- 4. Child molesters also confess that pornography was the stimulus that motivated their crimes. Experts estimate that one out of three girls and one out of seven boys will be sexually molested by age 18.
- 5. Pornography's number one consumer group is adolescent boys

between 12 and 17 years old. Pornography distorts their view of women, family life, and their own sexuality.

Christians of all people need to be armed with Scripture to know how to combat the onslaught of the enemy with regards to the problem of pornography. There are many Biblical passages that confront the problem of lust which is the basis for pornography's growth.

BIBLICAL PASSAGES THAT CONFRONT PORNOGRAPHY:

- 1. We are to take thoughts captive 2 Corinthians 10:1-5
- 2. We have armor for our warfare Ephesians 6:10-20
- 3. Avoid becoming prey for Satan 1 Peter 5:6-11
- 4. Lust is a sin of the mind and will Matthew 5:27-30
- 5. Abstain from "porneia" (sexual uncleanness) 1 Thessalonians 4:3
- 6. Living the life of holiness and moral purity is a spiritual battle -Romans 7:8-23
- 7. Lust caused the downfall of Adam and Eve Genesis 3:5-7
- 8. Lust of this world is passing away 1 John 2:15-17
- 9. Your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit 1 Corinthians 6:9-20
- 10. We please God when we walk in the power of the Spirit rather than the desires of our flesh Galatians 5:17-25
- 11. We are to overcome temptation by transforming our minds -Romans 12:1-2
- 12. We live as conquerors when our thoughts are pure -Philippians 4:8-9.

The Morality of Harvesting Fetal Tissue

It is now legal for human-to-human tissue transplantation from electively aborted fetuses. President Bill Clinton signed into law the National Institutes of Health Revitalization Act on June 10, 1993, authorizing government funding for research using such tissue.

Babies were protected from conception onward in every state by the 1870s. However, when the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Roe v. Wade that abortions were legal, the fetus became a "nothing." The U.S. government has now authorized the murder and commercialization of preborn babies from the wombs of their own mothers.

One method of execution is called "dilation and extraction" (D & X). This gruesome procedure is actually infanticide. The abortionist grabs the baby's feet with forceps and pulls its body through the birth canal, except for the head, which remains within the cervix. Then blunt surgical scissors cut through the base of the baby's skull. Next a tube (cannula) is inserted and its brain is suctioned out. The skull collapses and the remainder of its body is aborted. This procedure is preferred by tissue harvesters so that cells are not oxygen deprived, as body parts are able to be immediately removed. There is no anesthetic given to the baby. This procural procedure has lowered U.S. citizens to the level of

funding government-approved practices no less barbaric than those of Nazi Germany and their experiments in their death camps during the "holocaust."

The morality of such practices, or determination of whether it is right or wrong, or ethical, must be based upon some civilized standard. For Christians, it is the Biblical standards. First, is it right to terminate the life of the pre-born human being? Second, is such a harvest method even humane in a society claiming to be "civilized"? If a criminal were executed without anesthetic, or opportunity to breathe, or scream, would anyone cry, "cruel and unusual punishment"? Would animalrights activists cry "foul"? The unborn can feel pain. A professor of neurosurgery, Dr. Robert White, says it is even possible by the seventh week.

We do have Biblical standards regarding the "innocent" babies, whether pre-born or born. First, God recognizes, sees, and is with the pre-born babies (Psalm 139:13-16; Luke 1:41-44; Jeremiah 1:5). Second, they are not to be killed or sacrificed, for God's judgments have surely followed (Exodus 1:16; 12:29; 13:15; Deut. 27:25; Deut. 18:10, 12; 2 Kings 17:17-18; 24:4; Jer. 7:31-34; Psalm 106:37-41; Matt. 18:6, 14). Infanticide and idolatry almost always go hand-in-hand. God has in the past judged and punished those who have killed their innocent little ones. It is plausible to assume God's judgment will certainly come upon any society who so disregards His laws as to commit the same practices. Third, they are to be loved and provided for, even as Jesus demonstrated and taught (Mark 10:13-16; Matt. 14:19-21; 25:40).

In discussing fetal tissue harvesting, it is virtually impossible to separate abortion from it. A concern for such subjects must, of necessity, overlap. Dr. John Wilke, president of the National Right to Life Committee, says, "The abuse is not in the sale of those tissues, but in killing the baby in the first place." The majority of Southern Baptists have consistently expressed their convictions as to the sanctity of human life at recent S.B.C. meetings. A 1992 Wirthlin poll reported that 63 percent of Americans opposed fetal tissue research. Dr. Richard Land, Executive Director of the Christian Life Commission of the S.B.C., has written, "The federal government's approbation and endorsement of this immoral and unethical practice is an abhorrent thought to taxpaying citizens who regard unborn life as sacred."

True Love Waits

For the past thirty years, rising statistics continue to prove the negative consequences of sexual activity outside the bonds of marriage. Each year, one in ten teenage girls becomes pregnant and 400,000 teens have abortions. One in four children is born out of wedlock, compared to one in twenty in 1960, and 13 million people are infected annually with sexually-transmitted diseases. Of course, there are no statistics measuring the resulting guilt, anxiety, corruption of character and loss of self-esteem for which, sadly, there is no protection. In efforts to curb this destructive tide, educators have attempted to teach young people methods and mechanics of "safe sex" with no values training included. They have in essence said, "We know you will be promiscuous, so we will teach you how to best protect yourself." The emphasis is always on the physical body and how to reduce the risk of pregnancy and disease, even though the failure rate of condoms is well documented. In this age of AIDS, one must ask why would any reasonable person only attempt to "reduce the risk" of acquiring a 100 percent fatal disease?

Sexual behavior is governed by values, not by knowledge. When young people are taught the benefits and rewards of a sexually pure life, they will strive to govern their actions in order to protect their futures. Christian youth will want to keep themselves healthy and available for what God has planned for their lives.

"True Love Waits" is a national campaign of encouragement and support for sexual abstinence among teenagers. Teens participating sign commitment cards as a public testimony of their desire to be obedient to God's mandate of marriage before sex. More than 200,000 cards were displayed in Washington, D.C. recently as the year-long emphasis gains ground both nationally and internationally.

The campaign theme includes the following elements for motivating sexual purity:

- *True love for God*—Obeying God's commandments is a pure way to show your love for Him.
- True love for your current date—Sex before marriage always hurts people. If you care about the person you are dating, you can choose not to hurt him or her through sexual misbehavior.
- True love for your future mate—You can make a commitment to that person even before you know him or her, including a commitment to sexual purity.
- *True love for your future child*—You can begin now to love the child you will bring into the world. That love includes a desire to see that child born into a complete, permanent family.
- True love for yourself---Your concern for yourself can allow you to choose to avoid that which leads to guilt, broken relationships, disease, and even death.

Fear of the Almighty Fuels Faith in Action

A popular brand of clothing advertises that having "No Fear" results in winning. However, as Christians, a reverent fear of God is what actually provides the winning strategy in conquering our opponents.

Isaiah reminded the outnumbered remnant to, "Sanctify the Lord of hosts himself; and let him be your fear, and let him be your dread" (Is. 8:13). The Apostle Peter refers to this text in his epistle (1 Pet. 3:14) for

it was this same fear of God that thrust him boldly against the threatening powers of false religion and ferocious Rome. A holy fear of God is the distinguishing birthmark of one called into the Lord's family. This fear is what compels us to persevere in heralding and in applying the truth even when times are perilous. Instructing on the cost of discipleship, Jesus said, "And fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Mt. 10:28). The fear of God that ushered your salvation is the same fear of God that will sustain a righteous walk.

"The fear of the Lord is a fountain of life" (Prov. 14:27) for it is our **motivation** for pure living (cf. Eph. 5:21; Heb. 12:28-29). The Corinthian believers resided in a pagan society so the encouraging letter reads: "Having therefore these promises, dearly beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God" (2 Cor. 7:1). Our **witness** not bending to peer-pressure is due to our firm roots in the fear of God. Indeed, it is this holy fear that makes bold our witness (cf. Ps. 66:16; 2 Cor. 5:11). The fear of God is the foundation for **worship** (cf. Ps. 22:23; 25:14; 118:4; Rev. 14:7). Remember also there are **rewards** for those who invest in the fear of God (cf. Prov. 3:7, 8; 10:27; 14:26; 15:16; 19:23; 22:4; 23:17).

The lost are described as those who have "no fear of God before their eyes" (Ps. 36:1; Rms. 3:18). A.W. Tozer observed, "No one can know the true grace of God who has not first known the fear of God." The mother of Jesus praised: "And his mercy is on them that fear him from generation to generation" (Luke 1:50). How comforting to know that, "There is forgiveness with thee, that thou mayest be feared" (Ps. 130:4).

Our commission to preserve and illuminate can only be successful as we "treasure" (Is. 33:6) the fear of the Lord. As Solomon concluded: "Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man" (Ecc. 12:13).

Victory Found in Vision

Proverbs 29:18 records, "Where there is no vision, the people perish: but he that keepeth the law, happy is he." This verse is commonly used as a support in the implementation of goals and objectives. However, the vein of truth here is much more valuable than a helpful business principle.

In His loving grace, God has chosen to make His character and His commandments known. "Vision" refers to divine instruction, revelation, or prophecy. Because of man's proven inability to regulate himself, God has given humanity the great blessing of vision. It is therefore accurate to realize that the greatest calamity to befall people is the removal of that vision. We often think that God's anger is displayed through lightening bolts or natural calamities, but the worst judgment occurs when God withdraws His revelation from the land. This elimination is evidenced by the subsequent loss of moral government. To "perish" signifies a casting off of restraint. Bible scholars of the past have even translated the word "perish" as "made naked." What graphic exposition of people stripped of their civility!

God judged Israel's lack of righteousness and neglect of mission concern by removing the vision (cf. 2 Chron. 15:3; Ps. 74:9; Ez. 7:26). The Lord also warned the apocalyptic church that failure to return to her first love would result in the removal of the "candlestick" (Rev. 2:5).

Believing they would discover freedom in uncharted waters, many in our nation have cut loose the anchor of vision. Our society is adrift in a licentious sea where shipwreck is imminent. The lighthouse can provide no guidance because the beacon has been extinguished.

Prophecy has never been popular, yet the only hope of survival rests in the Christian responsibility to preach the vision (Romans 10). Genuine happiness awaits those who obey the message!

Historical Commission

J.D. Dowdell, Director, Oklahoma Baptist Historical Collection

Five more persons were inducted into the Oklahoma Baptist Hall of Fame at the annual Historical Society dinner meeting, Tuesday evening, November 15, at Southern Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City.

The inductees this year included: J.N. Owen, called "Uncle Jimmy" by students and friends at Oklahoma Baptist University; J.W. Jent, long time OBU professor and well known authority in rural church administration; T.P. Haskins, who served the BGCO in several capacities; Ebenezer Lee Compere, organizer of churches and associations in early Baptist life; E.C. Routh, prolific writer and editor of the *Baptist Messenger* for many years. This brings a total of thirty inductees into the Hall of Fame. These are on poster and picture display at the Historical Commission booth each year at the convention.

The third annual Gaskin Lectureship in Oklahoma Baptist History and Heritage was sponsored by OBU on October 4-5 with Dr. Don Kammerdiener as guest lecturer. Dr. Kammerdiener is an OBU grad and has spent years as a foreign missionary with the Foreign Mission Board.

At the Historical Society annual meeting, recognitions were also given to the 1994 winner of the Gaskin Church History Award, and Mrs. Helen Raley was honored with the 1994 Distinguished Service Award.

Southern Baptists are preparing and planning for the 150th Anniversary of the founding of the Southern Baptist Convention at Augusta, Georgia, May 8-12, 1845. The theme is "The Spirit of Southern Baptists, 1845-1995." The 1995 convention will be at historic Augusta, May 8-10, 1995. Suggestions on how local churches might get involved are free at the Historical Commission booth during the convention, or may be received by contacting J.D. Dowdell, Director, Oklahoma Baptist Historical Collection, 500 W. University, Box 61154, Shawnee, OK 74801.

Dowdell has prepared a paper showing the chronological development of organized Baptist work in Indian Territory before the SBC was organized in 1845. The paper is called "Oklahoma Baptists' Sesquicentennial Plus." Pick up a copy and learn of the vast amount of Baptist activity during the 28 years from 1817 to 1845 in Eastern Oklahoma.

The first increase in society dues since its organization in 1956 is now in effect. Annual dues are \$5, life membership is \$50.

Three new members of the Historical Commission are elected by this convention each year. There are nine members of the commission. They serve three years, with three members going off and three being elected each year. Oklahoma Baptist Historical Society membership is open to anyone interested. Members receive two copies of *The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle, Circular Letter*, and may attend the annual meeting during the state convention by purchasing dinner tickets.

Several Oklahoma Baptist churches have celebrated their Centennial during the past few years. Free packets to assist churches in preparing to write a church history or celebrate an anniversary are available from the Baptist Collection. Mailing address is given elsewhere in this article.

Baptist Collection To Move

The Historical Commission and the Administrative Committee make the following recommendations concerning the Baptist Collection:

"That the Oklahoma Baptist Collection be moved to the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. Upon approval, the space in the Baptist Building will be prepared and a time set for consummating the move. The Historical Commission further recommends that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and Oklahoma Baptist University develop a long-range program for accessibility of materials necessary for maintaining essential portions of the Baptist Historical Collection in the OBU library. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma acknowledges the tremendous contribution Oklahoma Baptist University has made through the years to the Oklahoma Baptist Collection in providing space, utilities, custodial services and staff services as needed, and expresses deep gratitude and thanks for the partnership and pledges a continued partnership in developing a long-range program for accessibility of materials necessary for maintaining essential portions of the Baptist Historical Collection in the Oklahoma Baptist University library for students and faculty."

The Historical Commission submits the following reasons for this recommendation:

- 1. The former Baptist Building at 1141 North Robinson did not have space for the collection in 1976 when it was placed at Oklahoma Baptist University. In the present location at 3800 North May, there is ample space and also space for growth.
- 2. There is plenty of parking space for staff personnel, groups and special guests.
- 3. There is an excellent opportunity to build a pool of volunteers in Oklahoma City interested in working with the collection.
- 4. The Baptist Building is the hub of activity for Baptists from the entire state, and it is also centrally located.
- 5. In the Baptist Building, the Oklahoma Baptist Collection would be placed in close proximity to other Baptist collections, namely: the WMU Library and Archives, the Baptist Messenger Library and the J.A. Pennington Collection in the Evangelism Department.
- 6. Groups of all ages, such as Vacation Bible School, Senior Adults, WMU, DOMs, Board of Directors, Church Media Library Directors, Pastors, Church Secretaries, Youth Ministers, Music Ministers, etc., would have quick and easy access to the Historical Collection, thus enhancing our historical materials to the Baptist public of Oklahoma.
- 7. It is anticipated that the larger exposure would cause pastors and others to add to the Baptist Collection.

THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended December 31, 1994

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations-The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Composition of Reporting Entity-The accompanying financial statements include net assets and operations of The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The "Executive Office" is defined to include all statewide activities conducted by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma except for activities conducted by Oklahoma Baptist University (OBU), The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (BFO), Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. (BRCO), Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. (OBHC) and Baptist Building Corporation. These organizations' boards of directors are elected by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and thus are considered to be under common control.

Basis of Accounting-The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Fund Accounting-Separate funds have been established to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the governing board (unrestricted funds) and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions (restricted and endowment funds). The following funds have been established for the Convention:

* Current Unrestricted Fund-This fund accounts for all resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of the Convention.

° Current Restricted Fund-These funds account for those resources currently available for use, but expendable only for operating purposes specified by the donors. Property Fund—This fund accumulates the net investment in fixed assets and accounts for the unex-

pended resources contributed specifically for the purpose of acquiring or replacing land, buildings, or equipment for use in the operations of the organization. Mortgages or other liabilities relating to these assets are also included in this fund.

* Endowment Fund-This fund represents the principal amount of gifts and bequests accepted with the donor-stipulation that the principal be maintained intact in perpetuity, until the occurrence of a specified event, or for a specified period, and that only the income from investment thereof be expended either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor. Statement of Cash Flows-For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, the Convention considers only bank

deposits subject to immediate withdrawal to be cash equivalents.

Property and Equipment-The Convention capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of donation of \$500 or more. Depreciation was recorded on the straight-line method from dates of acquisition or donation. The lives generally used are:

Land improvements	20-40 years
Buildings	20-50 years
Furniture and office equipment	4-10 years
Automobiles and machinery	3-10 years

Revenue Recognition-Revenue of the Convention consists primarily of voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma. The donor may designate its use by the Convention. Such designated (restricted) contributions are recognized as revenue when the obligation imposed by the restriction has been met.

Investments and Endowments—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) was created as an agency of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds and all property, real, personal, or mixed, for endowment purposes. These funds include designated endowment contributions and carnings on such contributions, and restricted and custodial funds held for the Convention. The contributed assets are reflected at the fair market value at date of contribution. At December 31, 1994, the fair market value of marketable securities held by the Foundation exceeded the carrying cost of these investments by approximately \$\$4,000. This total includes approximately \$52,000 of endowment fund appreciation and realized gains that may be added to corpus or distributed as income in the future based upon the total return distribution policy adopted by the Foundation during 1993.

Other trustees administer endowment trusts with assets totaling \$465,695 for the benefit of the Convention. The income from these trusts may be used for any purpose; however, the corpus may not be withdrawn, and therefore is not included as an asset in the accompanying financial statements. During 1994, distributions totaled \$12,859.

3. Notes Payable

Oklahoma County Industrial Authority

On March 31, 1989, the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (the Authority) issued its "Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Retirement Center Revenue Refunding Bonds, Scries 1980" in the amount of \$20,030,000. The net proceeds of \$17,472,936 from the bond issue were loaned to the Convention and were used to retire debt obligations of the Convention's retirement centers and nursing homes, including \$771,000 advanced from the Convention. The Convention has executed a note to repay the Authority for its costs under the bond issue and to fund interest and bond retirement. The Convention's Ilability under the note at December 31, 1994, was \$16,516,304, which is equal to the bond liability net of unamortized issuance costs and unapplied bond fund earnings.

As discussed in Note 11, assets to which this note relates have been transferred to BRCO and a receivable from BRCO recorded. BRCO is to make all scheduled note payments and assets transferred to BRCO remain pledged as collateral on the notes.

Monthly payments are required by the note in amounts equal to the Authority's debt service for the bonds. Final payment under the note is scheduled for May, 2008.

The unrestricted gross revenues of the Convention are pledged as security under the note. The Convention has agreed not to permit any new liens or encumbrances on its endowment funds or consent to the subordination of the Convention's rights to any other person. In addition, the Convention has obtained a letter of credit to guarantee note payments and has agreed to comply with certain financial ratio covenants under the letter of credit agreement.

As a part of the debt refinancing arrangement, funds were placed in irrevocable trusts to provide for the retirement of the Tulsa Industrial Authority Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, 1981 Owasso Baptist Village Project issued pursuant to terms and conditions of a 1978 bond indenture (see Note 6). The Convention has been released from liability under the note and leases pertaining to these projects.

Effective June 3, 1991, the Convention entered into an interest rate swap and cap agreement. The agreement provides for interest rate protection on the total of \$20,030,000 in bonds issued. Under the agreement, the Convention was required to pay interest at a fixed rate of 7.07% per annum through September 1, 1994. Interest accrues based upon the variable rate at which the bonds are remarketed each period, but not exceeding 6.97% per annum. At December 31, 1994, the variable interest rate being paid by the Convention was 4% per annum. Interest and related expenses will be recognized by BRCO. As all debi service payments are to be made by BRCO,

Interest and related expenses will be recognized by BRCO. As all debt service payments are to be made by BRCO, the Convention will recognize no income or expense during the term of the note.

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

The Convention has assumed responsibility for the repayment of loans The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has made to various Baptist Associations in connection with Baptist Student Unions in their area. These twelve loans, are generally secured by real estate, bear interest at 7.95% and have a balance due of \$341,098 at December 31, 1994 (1993-\$317,136).

4. Commitments and Contingencies

The Convention has guaranteed bonds issued by The Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. The bonds are secured by proceeds from a lease of the main campus facilities at Oklahoma Baptist University (OBU), mortgages on real estate comprising the campus of OBU, a municipal bond insurance policy and a letter of credit issued by a financial institution. At December 31, 1994, the unfunded liability for bond principal and interest approximated \$11,700,000.

During 1992, the Convention adopted a plan to self insure workers compensation. Insurance is carried which limits liability on individual and aggregate claims. The Convention has recognized as expense in the current year the amount of claims paid for the year and an amount equal to the estimated amount of future claims arising from losses incurred in the current and prior periods. At December 31, 1994, accounts payable include \$12,277 related to estimated future claims.

5. Notes Receivable

On October 2, 1990, the Convention sold facilities from which it operated (see Note 9) and received a note in the amount of \$400,000. The note provides for 119 monthly payments of \$3,102 including interest at 7%. The final payment of \$270,196 is due in December, 2000.

6. Capital Lease Obligations

Capital lease obligations consist of two obligations under which the Convention remains primarily liable. Assets subject to the lease have been transferred to BRCO under a sublease agreement. A receivable from BRCO has been recorded. Payments under the capital lease obligations will be made by BRCO.

Tuisa Baptist Retirement Center—On February I, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tuisa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981, in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The bonds were defeased under the 1989 loan from the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority as described in Note 3.

The lease rental to be paid by BRCO is an amount sufficient to satisfy the bond obligation. The lease is scheduled to

terminate by February 1, 2008,

BRCO, through its sublease with the Convention, has the right to purchase the project at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City-The Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City was constructed by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (an affiliate) in 1965 and transferred to the Convention in 1974.

In 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first morgage on the property and guaranteed by the Convention. OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. BRCO has acquired through its sublease, the Conventions option to acquire the leasehold estate for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On Match 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds were guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. This option has been granted to BCCO under the sublease agreement.

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The bonds were defeased in 1989 as disclosed in Note 3.

Office Equipment—The Convention leases certain office equipment for use in its operations. The equipment which has a cost of \$45,291 has been capitalized and is being depreciated over the term of the leases.

.7. Deferred Revenue

Deferred revenue of \$2,438,736 and \$3,717,501 at December 31, 1994 and 1993, respectively, consists of unexpended contributions for which the donor-imposed restrictions have not been met. The following is a schedule of deferred revenue at December 31, 1994:

At December 31, 1994, deferred revenue includes an amount included in accounts receivable totaling \$333,984. This amount represents a credit issued by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention which will be applied to reduce future payments for the Convention's matching contribution for church staff retirement and insurance benefits. The amount will be recognized as income ratably over a three year period as payments to the Annuity Board are reduced.

8. Pension Plan

All employees of the Convention are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Convention contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for Convention employees for the year ended December 31, 1994, approximated \$310,000 (1993-\$516,000). The Convention's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

9. Leased Facilities

During 1990, the Convention leased office facilities from the Baptist Building Corporation (a corporation owned and controlled by the Convention) (Note 10). Lease payments of \$\$2,500 per month commenced in November, 1990. During 1993, the Convention increased the total square footage leased and monthly payments were increased to \$\$8,574. The agreement provides for increases based on escalations in operating costs.

The lease agreement has a term of ten years with options to renew for ten additional one year periods. Payments under

the agreement totaled \$708,938 for 1994.

During 1994, the Convention subleased space to BRCO and OBHC on a month to month basis for a total of \$70,436. Expense under the agreement for 1994, net of subleases, was \$638,502. The Convention expects to enter into subleases over the time period of the original lease.

10. Investment in Baptist Building Corporation

During 1990, the Convention entered into an agreement under which custodial funds held by the Foundation were invested in a newly-formed corporation for the purchase and renovation of an office building. Upon completion of renovation, the building was leased, principally to the Convention and its agencies and affiliates. A total of \$4,331,000 has been invested in the Bapits Building Corporation. Repayment of invested funds is at the discretion of the Bapits Building Corporation, however all invested funds must be repaid upon any sele or conveyance of the building. The agreement provides that the Bapits Building Corporation will pay a reasonable rate of return equal to the distribution rate established by the Foundation on investments of its endowment fund.

As discussed in Note 11, these custodial funds have been transferred to OBHC.

11. Transfer of Assets to Auxiliary Corporations

During 1993, the Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. (OBHC) and Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. (BRCO) were created as a result of actions of the board of directors of the Convention. These corporations were formed to conduct the operations of the Family Care Ministrics.

Directors of the new corporations are elected by the Convention. These entities may not create debt for capital needs or undertake any major expansion projects without consent of the Convention or its board of directors.

Operations of the new entities commenced on January 1, 1994 and utilized operating assets associated with the conduct of their respective activities. During 1994, the board of directors of the Convention authorized the executive director-treasurer of the Convention, in consultation with the presidents of the Convention, BRCO and OBHC, to determine specific assets to be transferred. The following schedules assets and liabilities transferred to BRCO and OBHC or identified to be transferred under the previously mentioned board authorization. All transfers are considered to have occurred on January 1, 1994 consistent with the board intention.

- (A) Funds held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma include both custodial and endowment funds. Included in the amount transferred to OBHC are funds invested in the Baptist Building Corporation (Note 10).
- (B) Amounts receivable from BRCO consist of \$16,900,850 and \$2,687,399 which is equal to the net liability under notes payable (Note 3) and capital lease obligations (Note 6) under which the Convention remains primarily liable. Also included in amounts receivable from BRCO is \$2,000,000, representing prior advances to retirement centers reduced to \$2,000,000 by action of the board.

The amounts representing bond indenture debt (Note 3) and capital lease obligations (Note 6) are payable by BRCO under terms identical to those of the Convention liability. The \$2,000,000 halance is subject to a five year moratorium on interest. At the conclusion of the initial five years, the boards of directors of the Convention and BRCO will jointly establish repayment terms or determine the need for continuance of the moratorium.

The Convention receives and disburses cash on behalf of BRCO. At December 31, 1994, \$266,365 was owed to BRCO.

12. Year Ended December 31, 1993 Financial Information

The amounts shown for December 31, 1993 and the year then ended in the accompanying financial statements are included to provide a basis for comparison with the year ended December 31, 1994, and present summarized totals only. Accordingly, the 1993 amounts are not intended to present all information necessary for a fair presentation in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Amounts for 1993 include assets, liabilities and operating results of BRCO and OBHC which are not included in 1994 balances.


13. Accounting Principles to be Adopted

Several statements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board become effective for the year beginning January 1, 1995. Management has indicated an intention to adopt these pronouncements. Specifically two statements are expected to have a significant impact on the Convention's financial statements and the method in which financial data is presented.

Employer Accounting for Post-retirement Benefits—Statement 106 establishes procedures under which the cost of benefits provided to retirees in addition to funded pension costs will be recognized. Under this statement, these costs will be recognized as services are rendered by the employee.

The Convention currently provides health and life insurance to employees retiring with at least ten years of service. Costs which are currently recognized when paid approximated \$113,000 in 1994. The present value of the Convention's liability for future payments approximates \$3,700,000 at January 1, 1995. This amount may be recognized as a cost in 1995 or amortized over a period not to exceed twenty years. After adoption, periodic cost will include the systematic accrual of future estimated benefit expenses for current employees and interest on the unfunded future liability.

Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations--Statement 117 provides principles for accounting for financial position and results of operations. Under this statement, the concept of fund accounting (see Note 1) is abandoned and replaced by three categories of net assets. The financial position of the Convention and results of its operations will account for categories of assets that are unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted. The resulting financial presentation is expected to differ significantly in content and format from the financial statements presented for the year ended December 31, 1994.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS OF OKLAHOMA, INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended December 31, 1994

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations—Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. (the Corporation) is a not-for-profit corporation organized for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes in providing aged, sick or injured persons with housing facilities, long term care nursing facilities and other services designed to meet their physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs and to contribute to their health, security, happiness, spiritual well-being and usefulness in longer living as mandated by the Scriptures as a ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This Corporation is an auxiliary corporation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). Directors of the Corporation are elected by the Convention.

Basis of Accounting—The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Assets and liabilities are categorized into General Funds, subject to no external restriction and Donor-restricted funds. Donorrestricted funds are composed of perpetual endowments and funds restricted to a specific use or purpose.

Revenue—Revenue from services to patients is reported on the accrual basis in the period service is provided. Rental income is recorded ratably over the term of the lease or rental agreement. Contributions are recognized upon receipt of an unconditional promise to pay, which generally corresponds with a transfer of assets. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue when the obligation imposed by the restriction is met.

Investments and Endowments—The Bapitst Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation), an auxiliary corporation and agency of the Convention, receives and manages funds as trustee or in a custodial capacity for the Corporation. Funds include endowments, funds restricted for specific purposes, and unrestricted funds placed with the Foundation for management. Contributions received by the Foundation for the benefit of the Corporation are valued at fair market value at the date of contribution. At December 31, 1994, the market value of securities held by the Foundation exceeded their cost by approximately \$34,000.

An unrelated trustee administers an endowment irust with assets totaling \$77,004 for the benefit of the Corporation. The income from this trust may be used for any purpose; however, the corpus may not be withdrawn, and therefore is not included as an asset in the accompanying financial statements. During 1994, distributions totaled \$2,058.

Property and Equipment—The Corporation capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of contribution of \$500 or more.Depreciation has been provided on the straight-line method.Lives generally used are:

Income Taxes-The Corporation is exempt from federal income taxes under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Statement of Cash Flows-For purposes of the statement of cash flows, only bank deposits subject to immediate withdrawal are considered to be cash equivalents.

2. Transfer of Assets from Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

During 1993, the Board of Directors of the Convention formed the Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. and initiated a plan under which all operating assets of retirement centers operated by the Convention, subject to certain liabilities, were to be transferred to the Corporation. Prior advances to fund retirement centers' operations were reduced to \$2,000,000 and transferred as a note payable to the Convention subject to a five year morntorium on interest or payments of principal. Transfers were subject to approval by creditors of the Convention, and assets transferred remain pledged as collateral on Convention debt.Debts for which the Convention remains primarily liable, but which relate to assets included on the Corporation balance sheet, are reported as liabilities of the Corporation.

Assets were transferred at the Convention's historical cost. The following is a summary of assets and liabilities transferred:

3. Notes Payable

As discussed in Note 2, certain assets transferred to the Corporation were encumbered by liabilities. The following note remains a direct liability of the Convention but under terms of the transfer the Corporation has agreed to fund all required principal and interest payments. Therefore, the liability is recorded on the balance sheet of the Corporation subject to the following provisions.

Oklahoma County Industrial Authority

On March 31, 1989, the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (the Authority) issued its "Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Retirement Center Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1989" in the amount of \$20,030,000. The net proceeds of \$17,472,936 from the bond issue were loaned to the Convention and were used to retire debt obligations of the Convention's retirement centers and nursing homes, including \$771,000 advanced from the Convention. The Convention has executed a note to repay the Authority for its costs under the bond issue and to fund interest and bond retirement. The Convention's liability under the note at December 31, 1994 was \$16,543,559, which is equal to the bond liability net of unamortized issuance costs and unapplied bond fund earnings.

Monthly payments are required by the note in amounts equal to the Authority's debt service for the bonds. Final payment under the note is scheduled for May, 2008.

The unrestricted gross revenues of the Convention are pledged as security under the note. The Convention has agreed not to permit any new liens or encumbrances on its endowment funds or consent to the subordination of the Convention's rights to any other person. In addition, the Convention has obtained a letter of credit to guarante note payments and has agreed to comply with certain financial ratio covenants under the letter of credit agreement. The note is further guranteed by Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. and Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc.

As a part of the debt refinancing arrangement, funds were placed in irrevocable trusts to provide for the retirement of the Tulsa Industrial Authority Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, 1981 Owasso Baptist Village Project issued pursuant to terms and conditions of a 1978 bond indenture (see Note 4). The Convention has been released from liability under the note and leases pertaining to these projects.

Effective June 3, 1991, the Convention entered into an interest rate swap and cap agreement. The agreement provides for interest rate protection on the total of \$20,030,000 in bonds issued. Under the agreement, the Convention is required to pay interest at a fixed rate of 7.07% per annum through September 1, 1994. Upon expiration of the swap period, interest will accrue based upon the variable rate at which the bonds are remarked each period, but not exceeding 6.97% per annum.

Interest expense will be recognized as it accrues under the agreement, net of Bond Reserve funds earnings that may be applied to debt service. Fees of \$200,000 which were paid upon execution are being amortized over the life of the agreement. The Convention is exposed to loss in the event of nonperformance by the other party to the agreement. However, no such loss is anticipated.

During 1994, the Convention, on behalf of the Corporation, entered into a forward delivery contract under which rights to earnings on principal and interest advance payments were sold for total consideration of \$209,000. The amount received was added to the Corporation's custodial funds on deposit with the Foundation. Income is being recognized ratably over the life of the note.

As discussed in Note 2, the Corporation as a condition to the transfer of assets, agreed to pay \$2,000,000 representing a reduced balance of previous advances by the Convention to support retirement center operations. The note bears no interest for five years during which time no principal payments are due. At the conclusion of the five year period, the Board of Directors of the Convention and Corporation will jointly establish repayment terms or determine the need for continuance of the moretorium on payments.

4. Capital Lease Obligations

As previously discussed in Notes 2 and 3, the Corporation received assets from the Convention subject to certain liabilities. The Corporation has entered into a sublease agreement under terms of the capital lease obligations discussed below.

Talsa Baptist Retirement Center—On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The bonds were defeased under the 1989 loan from the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority as described in Note. 3.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to statisfy the bond obligation. The lease is scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008.

The Convention has the right to purchase the project at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City—The Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City was constructed by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (an affiliate) in 1965 and transferred to the Convention in 1974.

In 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Convention. OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1978, the Bapiist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The bonds were defeased in 1989 as disclosed in Note 3.

5. Commitments and Contingencies

As discussed in Note 2, the Corporation assumed certain liabilities of the Convention as a part of the transfer of assets. In addition, the Corporation has guaranteed notes payable as discussed in Note 3.

The Corporation self insures workers compensation. Insurance is carried to limit liability on individual and aggregate claims. The Corporation has recognized as expense in the current year the amount of claims paid for the year and an amount to accrue estimated future claims arising from losses in the current period.

6. Deferred Life Occupanices

Deferred life occupanices consist of duplexes constructed at various retirement centers on land owned by the Corporation. The construction cost of these duplexes was donated and the donors have a rent free life occupancy in the duplexes. The duplexes have been capitalized at a value approximating total construction costs, and are being depreciated over their estimated useful lives. The deferred liability for the life occupanices, representing future rentals to be provided, is reduced annually for rentals based upon the donor's life expectancy.


7. Pension Plan

All employees of the Corporation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Corporation contributes an amount equal to 10% of administrative employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Pension expense for the year totaled \$64,363. Pension costs are funded as incurred.

8. Leased Facilities

The Corporation leases office facilities from the Convention under a month to month agreement. Expenses in the current year totaled \$24,504. The Corporation anticipates entering into a long-term agreement to sublease office space. Annual rentals are expected to approximate \$25,000.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST HOMES FOR CHILDREN, INC. Notes to Financial Ststements

1. Organization

Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. ("OBHC") is an Oklahoma not-for-profit organization supported pri-marily by private donations. OBHC was incorporated in September 1993, and began operations on January 1, 1994 to provide care for children and to provide preventive and redemptive services for children, parents, and families. With donated funds, OBHC operates five homes or other living facilities for children in need and two crisis pregnancy centers. Previous to 1994, OBHC was a division of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Inc. ("BGCO").

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following summarizes certain significant accounting policies followed in the preparation of these financial statements. These policies conform to generally accepted accounting principles.

Cash and cash equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, OBHC considers cash on hand and deposits in banks to be cash and cash equivalents.

Investments

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma ("BFO") was created for the purpose of receiving and managing all trust funds, property and other assets donated to the various Baptist entities including OBHC. These funds are separated into the following categories.

Endowment-Investments in perpetuity, the income from which is expendable to support the donor imposed restriction, if any.

Restricted--Non-endowment investment for which the principal and income have donor restrictions as to their use. Custodial--Non-endowment investments for which the principal and income are not donor restricted.

Loan-Non-endowment funds for which the principal and income may be used for providing loans to OBHC

Investments of the various funds under management of BFO are held in two investment pools, the equity investment pool and the fixed income pool. Amounts held in the equity investment pool include interest bearing cash, money market accounts, marketable equity securities, and accrued interest income. Amounts held in the fixed income pool include interest bearing cash, money market accounts, Marketable debt instruments, church building loans, net of allowance for doubtful loans, participation in Home Mission Board loans, real estate, and accrued interest. All investments in the pools are held at market value.

Furniture and covipment

Furniture and equipment are recorded at cost. Maintenance repairs and minor renewals are expensed as incurred. These assets are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. The following useful lives are used:

ν Ŀ Net Asset Classifications

Net assets have been segregated to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the board and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions. The following net asset segregations have been established for OBHC.

Unrestricted net assets-Represents resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of OBHC

Temporarily restricted net assets-Represents resources currently available for use, but expendable only for purposes specified by the donor.

Permanently restricted net assets-Represents resources for which the principal is to remain intact in perpetuity, the income from which is expendable either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue of OBHC consists primarily of Cooperative Program distributions, voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the State of Oklahoma and income carned on long term investments. OBHC's Cooperative Program distributions are budgeted annually at the discretion of BGCO.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

Expenses are organized in both natural and functional classifications to provide useful information about the costs of significant programs or services provided by OBHC. Costs incurred are either directly related or allocated to a specific program or service.

Contributions

The Company reports gifts of cash and other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated asset. If a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, in the same fiscal year as the year of the receipt of the gift, the gift is considered unrestricted. When a donor restriction expires on gifts classified as temporarily restricted, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restriction. All contributed assets are reflected at the fair market value at the date of contribution.

Workers Compensation Insurance

OBHC is self insured with respect to workers' compensation insurance. Monthly payments are made to a self insured plan established by BGCO. This plan is self insured to the extent of the excess liability insurance with an employers' liability limit of \$500,000 and a self insured retention of \$190,000.

Workers compensation expense totaled \$82,085 for the year ended December 31, 1994. OBHC maintains a liability of \$42,328 for incurred but not paid and incurred but not reported claims.

Income taxes

OBHC is a not-for-profit organization as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the internal Revenue Code and is exempt from Federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501)a) of the Code.

3. Investments

Investments are carried at market or appraised value, and realized and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the statement of activities. Investments transferred to OBHC from BGCO were transferred as of December 31, 1994. Investments at December 31, 1994 are as follows:

The costs for the above investments was \$23,311,401 at December 31, 1994.

BGCO intends to transfer to OBHC during fiscal year 1995 additional custodial funds with a cost and market value of \$9,622,578 and \$9,722,865, respectively, at December 31, 1994. Until such dates the transfer is consummated, income earned on these funds is available for distribution to OBHC. Included in these custodial funds is a \$4,3 million investment in the Baptist Building Corporation ("BBC"). Repayment of invested funds is at the discretion of BBC, however all invested funds must be repaid upon any sale or conveyance of the building. The agreement provides that BBC will pay a reasonable rate of return equal to the rate of return realized by BFO's investment pools.

7. Pension Plan

All full time employees of OBHC are cligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and administered by BGCO. Under the plan, OBHC contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1994 was \$128,533.

Effective January 1, 1995 the employer contribution on the defined contribution pension plan changed to 5% of participating employees salareis, with an employer matching of up to 2.5% of employee contributions.

8. Other Post Retirement Employee Benefits

In addition to participating in a defined contribution pension plan, OBHC sponsors unfunded postretirement health care, life insurance and retirement gift benefits. These postretirement benefits are offered to all full time employees who were hired prior to September 27, 1994.

Effective January 1, 1994, OBHC adopted the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions." In applying this pronouncement, OBHC immediately recognized the Accumulated Postretirement Benefit Obligation as of January 1, 1994, as a transfer from BGCO.



THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended December 31, 1994

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

General—The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) is a private, nonprofit religious association chartered by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention) to administer funds and property received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention, and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work.

The financial statements include the accounts of the Foundation, trusts for which the Foundation serves as trustee under fiduciary responsibility and custodial trusts and accounts placed with the Foundation by the Convention and its affiliates for management.

Basis of Accounting-The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Fund Accounting—To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Foundation, the accounts of the Foundation are maintained in accoundance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund groups as follows:

Unrestricted Operating Fund—The Unrestricted Operating Fund is designed to account for resources which are expendable for support of Foundation operations and for the acquisition of equipment. This fund has no external restriction on its use or numbers and can be used for any number designated by the accuration based.

external restriction on its use or purpose, and can be used for any purpose designated by the governing board. **Property and Equipment Fund**—This fund reports the carrying value of all property and equipment utilized by the Foundation in its operations, exclusive of those real properties held for investment or received under fiduciary responsibility.

Restricted Funds—Restricted funds are funds other than endowments, the use of which has been restricted by outside agencies or persons (donors/grantors) for specific purposes. Such funds are generally restricted for capital improvements. Revenues of restricted funds are reported as such to the extent that expenses have been incurred for the purpose specified by the donor or grantor during the period.

Endowment Funds-Endowment funds are comprised of resources received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise that are received under the stipulation of the donors that the principal be invested and that only the income be used for the designated purposes until a specified time or occurrence, or in perpetuity. Trusts generally require that distributions be made to designated beneficiaries.

Other Trust Funds-Other trust funds are comprised of all non-endowed or restricted funds held in trust along with assets received under gift annuity contracts. Other trust funds include charitable remainder trusts, trusts restricted for loans, and life income trusts.

Other trust funds also include revocable trusts totaling approximately \$9,700,000 (\$10,300,000 in 1993).

Custodian Funds—These funds account for assets received by the Foundation to be held and disbursed only on instruction of the person or organization from whom they were received, as contrasted with funds held under fiduciary capacity. The receipt of such funds and the disbursement thereof are reported in the net capital additions section of the statement of support and revenue. The net balances of custodian funds are reported in the statement of assets and liabilities as amounts held for others.

Fooled Investment Fund-In prior years, the Foundation maintained a general investment fund to pool the investments of the various funds. As discussed in Note 2, during 1993 the assets of this fund were divided into equily and fixed investment pools.

At December 31, 1994 and 1993, assets of the pools are accounted for under the market value method. As discussed in Note 2, this constitutes a change from the lower of cost or market method employed in prior years.

Prorata ownership in the pools is determined under a system where theoretical units of ownership are recorded to represent each pool member's share of the total market value of assets. Investment income, gains and losses realized and appreciation or depreciation in market value are allocated based upon each pool member's percentage.

Assets of the equity pool consist primarily of cash and equivalents and marketable equity securities. Assets of the fixed pool consist primarily of cash and equivalents, corporate and governmental bonds and church building loans.

Cash-Cash balances are transferred daily into interest-bearing accounts secured by U. S. government obligations.

Allowance for Doubtful Loans—The financial statements present notes receivable net of the allowance for doubtful loans. The allowance is based on historical information coupled with a review of the status of delinquent loans. The allowance for church building loans is 2½% of the outstanding balances with adjustments for delinquent or doubtful loans.

Property and Equipment—Major expenditures for equipment are capitalized at cost while donated property and equipment are capitalized at fair market value at the date of the gift. Depreciation of equipment is provided for over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis. No provision is made for depreciation on rental and other properties carried as investments in the endowment and trust funds.

Annulties—The Foundation accepts gifts made in trust for various Baptist agencies and institutions which require the Foundation to pay the donors substantially the equivalent of interest on the amount of the gift during the lifetime of the donor. The Foundation also accepts trusts naming individuals as lifetime beneficiaries rather than Baptist agencies and institutions. A specified portion of the income of these trusts is disbursed to the individuals during their lifetime, and upon their deaths the trusts are to be administered for the benefit of the Baptist agencies or institutions as designated. The liability for future payments to beneficiaries is reported as a reduction of the corpus of such funds. Liabilities to annuitants totaled \$771,766 and \$859,408 at December 31, 1994 and 1993, respectively.

Appropriation for Corpus Preservation-Where donors have specified or where trusts include producing min-

erals, a portion of income is appropriated to preserve the value of the corpus. Such appropriations totaled \$2,102,424 and \$2,054,829 at December 31, 1994 and 1993, respectively, and have been included as a part of the total corpus balance. Appropriations are generally equal to fifteen percent of mineral production or at the rate specified in the trust document. The amount is in addition to the provision for inflation discussed in Note 4.

Income Taxes-The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Statement of Cash Flows-For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, the Foundation considers accounts with financial institutions with rights to withdraw without penalty to be cash equivalents. No cash flows statement is presented for the investment pools as the activity of these pools has been reported in the various investing funds.

2. Change in Accounting Principle

Effective January 1, 1993, the Foundation adopted the market value method of accounting for marketable equity securities and debt instruments held in the investment pools. Adoption of the market value method is a change in accounting principle from the lower of cost or market method formerly applied to these assets.

At January 1, 1993, the market value of marketable securities in the investment pool exceeded the carrying cost of these assets by \$6,307,923. This amount is reflected in the Statement of Support, and Revenue, Expenses, Capital Additions and Changes in Fund Balances as "Cumulative Effect on Prior Years of Change in Accounting Principle.

Appreciation or depreciation net of gains and losses realized from the sale of marketable securities is included in the financial statements for the unrestricted operating and property and equipment funds as revenue. For all other funds this amount is reported under net capital additions.

Market value is determined by closing quotes on applicable security exchanges for all marketable securities held in the investment pools. Church building loans included in the fixed income pool (Note 3) continue to be carried at cost less an allowance for doubtful loans.

3. Investment Pools

Investments of the various funds under management of the Foundation are held in investment pools. On April 1, 1993, the existing investment pool was divided into an equity investment pool and fixed income pool. Trust and custodial accounts participate in the respective pools based upon investment models. These models rep-

resent ownership percentages designed for various types of trusts and accounts based on the respective needs for current income or capital appreciation.

As discussed in Note 2, marketable securities held in the pools are accounted for under the market value method. Entry or withdrawal from the pools is based upon the market value of a pool unit. Market value of a pool unit is deter-mined by dividing the total assets by total units outstanding. Within the fixed income pool, the market value of church building loans is assumed to be equal to the total principal balance of these loans less an allowance for doubtful loans equal to approximately 2%% of the principal balance. 4. Stabilization Account and Total Return Concept

Effective January 1, 1993, the Foundation adopted the total return method for distributions to endowment income beneficiaries. In addition, owners of custodial accounts have requested that custodial distributions be made under this method.

Under the total return method, an annual income distribution rate of six cents per unit (approximately 6% of fair market value) was established by the Foundation for all trusts and accounts subject to this distribution method and was applied to all assets held within the investment pools. This rate was established based upon a projected five year average total return after provisions to establish a stabilization account and a provision for inflation of one cent per unit (approximately 1% of fair market value). Total return includes gains and losses realized from the sale of investments, appreciation or depreciation of investments determined under the market value method and dividend and interest income net of applicable expenses.

Under the method, a stabilization account is established for the purpose of reducing fluctuations in distributions caused by market fluctuation or changes in interest or dividend paying capacities. The stabilization account is credited annually with the net excess of total return over distributions to income beneficiaries and appropriations to corpus for inflation.

The stabilization account for the endowment fund is presented on the fund balance sheet. Because custodial funds are under the discretionary control of the owners of these funds, the balance of the stabilization reserve in the custodian funds is included in funds held for others.

7. Fund Balances and Related Accounts

Except for the operating and property and equipment funds, the Foundation holds net assets either in fiduciary or custodial capacity, or as agent.

The Foundation has fiduciary responsibility for endowment and trust funds and loan funds. Restricted funds are generally held as agent for objects. Custodian funds represent assets received by the Foundation to be disbursed only on instructions of the person or organization from whom they were received.

8. Affiliated Entities

As disclosed in Note 1, the Foundation is affiliated with the Baplist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). The majority of the funds administered by the Foundation are for the benefit of the Convention, its agencies and various other Baptist organizations. Throughout the year the Foundation makes distributions either directly to these organizations or on their behalf. The Foundation also receives funds from these organizations, both to administer for their benefit and to support the Foundation's operations.

The Foundation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Convention. Appropriations received for the year ended December 31, 1994 were \$305,105 (1993-\$328,919). A Foundation distribution of \$40,568 to the Convention in 1994 (\$67,880 in 1993) has been offset against the Cooperative Program allocation.

As discussed in Notes 10 and 11, the Foundation has invested funds in the Baptist Building Corporation and has entered into an operating lease for office facilities.

The Foundation, through its fixed income pool, makes loans to churches, associations and agencies affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to finance the purchase of land and buildings. These loans are secured by first morigages on the property and buildings constructed and may require personal endorsments of church members. The lives of these loans vary up to a maximum of 15 years. Interest rates are set by the Church Building Loan Committee with consideration given to the current rates available from commercial sources. The balance of church building toans outstanding at December 31, 1994 was \$28,128,176 (1993-\$31,298,515) and at December 31, 1994, included \$3,023,458 of participating loans serviced by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention (1993-\$3,163,187). Allowances of \$1,003,654 and \$1,025,084 for uncollectible accounts were recorded as of December 31, 1994 and 1993, respectively.

At December 31, 1994, the Foundation had outstanding commitments totaling \$1,650,000 for church building loans.

9. Pension Plan

All employees of the Foundation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1994 was \$69,764 (1993-\$67,199). The Foundation's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

10. Leased Facilities

During 1990, the Foundation entered into a lease with the Baptist Building Corporation (a corporation owned and controlled by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma) for facilities in a newly-purchased building. Payments of \$5,250 per month commenced in November, 1990.

The lease has a term of ten years with options to renew for ten additional one year periods. The agreement provides for increases based upon escalations in operating costs. Rental expense under the lease totaled \$63,000 for 1994 and 1993.

The Foundation leases office facilities in Tulsa under a three year lease expiring in 1996.

11. Investment in Baptist Building Corporation

During 1990, the Convention entered into an agreement under which custodian funds held by the Foundation were invested in a newly-formed corporation for the purchase and renovation of an office building. Upon completion of renovation, the building was leased, principally to the Convention and its agencies and affiliates including the Foundation. A total of \$4,231,000 was invested in the Baptist Building Corporation. During 1993, an additional \$100,000 was invested. Repayment of invested funds is at the discretion of the Baptist Building Corporation, however all invested funds must be repaid upon any sale or conveyance of the building. The agreement provides that the Baptist Building \$315,810 was received under this agreement in 1994 and \$306,747 in 1993.

12. Transfers Among Funds

During 1994, a program designed to review all trust documents was continued. As part of this program, the criteria for classification of trusts has been modified so that only trusts for which the Foundation serves as trustee are classified as endowment, restricted or other trust funds. Generally all trusts for which the Foundation is not trustee have been classified as custodial although these trusts may represent endowment or restricted funds to the beneficial owner. As a result, certain trusts have been reclassified from one fund type to another. Principally this involves transferring from the endowment, restricted and other funds to the custodial fund.


13. Accounting Principles to be Adopted

Several statements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board become effective for the year beginning January 1, 1995. Management has indicated an intention to adopt these pronouncements. Specifically two statements are expected to have a significant impact on the Foundation's financial statements and the method in which financal data is presented.

Employer Accounting for Post-retirement Benefits—Statement 106 establishes procedures under which the costs of benefits provided to retirees in addition to funded pension costs will be recognized. Under this statement, these costs will be recognized as services are rendered by the employee.

The Foundation currently provides health and life insurance to employees retiring with at least ten years of service. Costs which are currently recognized when paid approximated \$30,000 in 1994. The present value of the Foundation's liability for future payments approximates \$77,000 at January 1, 1995. This amount may be recognized as a cost in 1995 or amountized over a period not to exceed twenty years. After adoption, periodic cost will include the systematic accrual of future estimated benefit expenses for current employees and interest on the unfunded future liability.

Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations--Statement 117 provides principles for accounting for financial position and results of operations. Under this statement, the concept of fund accounting (see Note 1) is abandoned and replaced by three categories of net assets. The financial position of the Foundation and results of its operations will be be divided to account for categories of assets that are unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted. The resulting financial presentation is expected to differ significantly in content and format from the financial statements presented for the year ended Docember 31, 1994.



Independent Auditors' Report

The Board of Trustees Oklahoma Baptist University Shawnee, Oklahoma

We have audited the accompanying fund balance sheets of OKLA-HOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY as of July 31, 1994 and 1993, and the related statements of changes in fund balances and current fund revenues, expenditures, and other changes for the year ended July 31, 1994. These financial statements are the responsibility of the University's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As discussed in Note 1 to the financial statements, no depreciation has been recorded on the plant assets. Generally accepted accounting principles require that an allowance for depreciation of such assets be recorded.

In our opinion, except for the effect of not recording depreciation of Plant Fund assets as discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Oklahoma Baptist University as of July 31, 1994 and 1993, and the changes in fund balances and current funds revenues, expenditures, and other changes for the year ended July 31, 1994 in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended July 31, 1994

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization—Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in 1909 to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that Convention. Articles of Incorporation were filed February 9, 1910 and amended November 25, 1974 with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a corporation of perpetual duration without capital stock. The purpose of the corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Accrual Basis—Except for depreciation, which is discussed later in this note, the financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statements of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes are statements of current period financial activities. They do not purport to present the results of operations or net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacements of equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) nonmandatory transfers in all other cases.

The library is valued at an amount equal to the cost of books, periodicals and microform acquired during the past 10 years, plus an estimated replacement cost of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than 10 years. Capitalization of library acquisitions totaled approximately \$27,000 for the current year.

Inventories consist of maintenance supplies. Inventories are priced at cost, generally on a first-in, first-out basis.

Fund Accounting—In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the University, the accounts of the University are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups.

Externally restricted funds may be utilized only in accordance with purposes specified by the source of such funds. This is in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of the gift instruments requiring that the principal be invested and only the income be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the funds which owned the assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and similar assets is accounted for in the funds owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds. Such income is accounted for in the funds to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in the current unrestricted fund.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the current unrestricted fund. Restricted gifts, grant appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Current restricted funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investments—Investments purchased by the University are generally stated at cost. Investments received from donors are stated at market value as of the date of the gift.

Property, Plant and Equipment—Property, plant and equipment is stated at cost at the date of acquisition or at fair market value at the date of donation. No depreciation of plant assets has been recorded.

Revenue Recognition—Charges for student tuition, fees and other charges are recognized as income when charged to the students. Collections on pledges are recognized as income when the cash is received. Gifts and other contributions for designated uses are recognized as income when expended. Undesignated gifts and contributions are recognized as income when received.

Tulsa Royalties Company, a Charitable Not-for Profit Foundation

During 1991, the University accepted a gift of the mineral assets of Tulsa Royalties Company, a charitable foundation, as partial payment of a pledge to be used for the construction of the new School of Business building. Tulsa Royalties Company will remain intact as a separate company, having directors in common with the University, in view of the purpose of this gift, the unique organizational relationships and differing nature of operations between the University and Tulsa Royalties Company, meaningful financial information would not result from the presentation of combined financial statements.

2. Pledges

In March, 1987, The University Board of Trustees approved a new campaign "Bridging the Centuries." Total pledges and contributions to date for this campaign approximated \$21,502,000. Funds raised will be used for several priority needs, including construction of Bailey Business Center and student housing, scholarships, educational equipment, operational support, and endowed faculty/staff positions.

As a result of this campaign and campaigns conducted in prior years, uncollected pledges at July 31, 1994 total \$1,172,535. These pledges, which are summarized below, are not recognized as receivables in the accompanying financial statements.

3. Pension Plan

The University provides a defined contribution pension plan that covers substantially all of its employees. Under the plan, the University contributes an amount equal to 6% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension contributions for the year ended July 31, 1994 was \$402,855. The University's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

During 1993, the Foundation adopted the total return method for determining amounts distributable to income beneficiaries. Under the total return concept, traditional net interest and dividend income along with realized gains and investment appreciation may, at the discretion of the governing board, be distributed to income beneficiaries or added to endowment principal.

The Foundation maintains a stabilization reserve representing the excess of income gains and appreciation over income distributions. At July 31, 1994, the balance related to the University endowment trusts equated \$943,550. This balance included appreciation determined under the market value method of accounting used by the Foundation.

The stabilization reserve, net of appreciation of \$773,512, is included as part of the endowment fund balance. Gains and appreciation, when remitted to the University as a distribution of income, will be accounted for as a transfer to the appropriate fund.

5. Funds Held in Trust by Others

The Liberty National Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma administers the Louise M. Prichard Trust from which the University receives the net income after payments to beneficiaries and payment of trust expenses. These funds are designated for scholarships to ministerial and missionary students. The cost of the Prichard Trust corpus was \$6,725,861 and its market value was \$8,362,046 at July 31, 1994.

The American National Bank and Trust Company of Shawnee, Oklahoma administers the Howard T, and Leoti W. Riddle Scholarship Trusts from which the University receives the net income after payments of beneficiary and trust expenses. The Riddle trusts had corpus of approximately \$2,793,903 at July 31, 1994.

The Oklahoma City Community Foundation, Inc. administers various endowment funds for which the University has been designated as a beneficiary. Distributions of endowment earnings and realized investment gains are made annually at the discretion of the Foundation. The balances of funds designated for the University totaled \$318,303 and \$302,299 at July 31, 1994 and 1993; however the corpus may not be withdrawn. Distributions approximating \$18,154 were received for 1994.

The assets of the above trusts are not included in the accompanying finanical statements.

6. Oklahoma Baptist University Authority-Capitalized Lease Obligation

The University entered into a lease with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities complex, to remodel the Brotherhood and W. M. U. Memorial Dormitories and the Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. The Authority obtained funds for these improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979." Assets totaling approximately \$7,400,000 have been constructed or purchased under this lesse. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

The lease was amended on June 1, 1985, to obtain funds to finance a portion of the construction of the science building, married student housing, and a campus ministries center, and the renovation of Ker Dormitory, the Theater annex, Montgomery and Thurmond Halls, and Parkway and Jent Apartments. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$5,300,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1985." The remainder of the costs of these projects is to be financed by funds raised in a special fund raising campaign and by University resources. Assets totaling approximately \$6,600,000 have been constructed, renovated or purchased under this amendment. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund.

On May 18, 1988, the Authority issued \$11,800,128 in bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1988," The proceeds of these bonds were used to defease in substance the Series 1979 and Series 1985 bonds. The lease with the Authority was amended during May, 1988, to allow for the change in sinking fund requirements under the new bonds.

The lease was amended on August 1, 1989, to obtain funds to finance the construction and furnishing of student apartments, purchase of a new telephone system, acquisition of land adjacent to the campus, refinancing of some existing loans, and completion of other miscellaneous projects. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$3,400,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1989." Assets totaling approximately \$2,659,585 have been constructed or purchased under this amendment. These assets are included with other property, plant and equipment in the plant fund. \$288,691 of the proceeds were used to pay the balance due on the note payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

On May 21, 1992, the Authority issued \$8,282,809.70 in bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1992." The proceeds of these bonds were used to defease in substance \$7,038,128 of the \$9,988,128 outstanding Series 1988 bonds. The lease was amended during May, 1992, to allow for the change in sinking fund requirements under the new bonds.

The series 1988, 1989, and 1992 bonds are secured by rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities, by morgages on specified real estate which comprises the main campus, by a guarantee from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by a municipal bond new issue insurance policy issued by Financial Guaranty Insurance Company.

7. Notes Payable

Current Unrestricted Fund

As of July 31, 1994, the University had an outstanding note for operating capital for \$300,000 from BaneFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma. The note represents a draw on a letter of credit for \$1,200,000 with a variable interest rate based on New York Prime. The letter of credit is for the year ended December 14, 1994.

The University borrowed \$70,000 from The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma in February, 1992, with an interest rate of 8%. The proceeds of the loan were used for current operations of the University. The loan is to be repaid with contributions received from Tulsa Royalites Co. This Ioan was paid in full during February, 1994.

These loans are payable as follows:

Harmon Foundation Student Loan Fund

The University received a noninterest-bearing loan in the amount of \$120,000 from the Pearl M. & Julia J. Harmon Foundation. The proceeds of the loan were used to establish a perpetual, ever-increasing loan fund for student tuition, fees and room and board charges. The loan is secured by University investments. The following is a schedule of payments due under this note as of July 31, 1994.

Endowment Fund

In 1990, the University received a contribution of property subject to a mortgage which the University is obligated to pay. The donors of the property have pledged monthly contributions equal to the note payments. This note was paid in full during July, 1994.

Investment in Plant Fund

On December 30, 1982, the University entered into an agreement with the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in which the Authority agreed to lean the University up to \$400,000. To secure this lean, the University transferred certain property to the Authority. Upon repayment of the lean the property will be transferred back to the University. The proceeds of this lean were used to purchase additional real estate and to construct new student apartments. The lean is payable in 120 equal monthly principal payments of \$3,333, plus interest. The interest rate is equal to 55% of the base rate of BancFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma, adjusted quarterly. This lean was paid in full during March, 1994.

8. Operating Lease

The University has a lease agreement, classified as an operating lease, for land upon which the maintenance department offices and shops were constructed. This lease is for a period of 25 years beginning in November 1977, and contains an option to renew at the end of the lease. The following is a schedule of future minimum rental payments required under this lease as of July 31, 1994.

The total rental expense for operating leases is approximately \$3,000 per year.

10. Bookstore Lease

Effective December 1, 1991, the University entered into a five (5) year lease with Barnes and Noble Bookstores,

Inc. for the operation of the bookstore. The University will receive as rental income, a percentage of sales with a guar-anteed annual miminum of \$70,000. In addition, Barnes and Noble agreed to remodel and upgrade the store facilities.

11. Cash Deposits in Excess of Federally Insured Limits As of July 31, 1994, the University had checking and savings accounts with one financial institution which ex-ceeded the federal deposit insurance coverage by approximately \$86,000.
