# **ARTICLE I Name of Corporation**

(No Change)

The Name of said corporation shall be THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA.

# ARTICLE II Registered Office and Agent

(No Change)

The address of its registered office in the State of Oklahoma is 3800 North May Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112, and the name and address of its Registered Agent is Robert L. Ross, 3800 North May Avenue, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112.

# ARTICLE III No Capital Stock

(No Change)

The Corporation shall be without capital stock and no dividends or pecuniary benefits shall be declared or paid to any member thereof.

ARTICLE IV

Duration

(No Change)

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The term for which this Corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

#### ARTICLE V

#### Purpose

(No Change)

The general purpose for which the corporation is formed is that of a religious association, authorized under the laws of the State of Oklahoma; and includes the exercise of all the powers authorized by law to be conferred upon or exercised by such a corporation, including those enumerated in all the applicable provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes 1971, and all applicable laws of the State; and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire by gift or otherwise, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated, in trust or otherwise, for church and other religious and charitable purposes, and for such purposes as may be necessary for the membership of churches and their worship, all in compliance with and subject to all rules and regulations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and the laws of the State of Oklahoma, and all other applicable laws, rules and regulations.

In furtherance of its general purpose, the corporation shall have and exercise the following powers:

- 1. to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purposes or any other purpose with its corporate powers;
- 2. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships (a) for the purpose of furthering the interest of any institution, agency, department or program of activity now owned by, or under the control of, or sanctioned by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention; or (b) for the purpose of the building and acquisition, as well as disposition, of any property which would be advantageous to the furtherance of Baptist principles and doctrines;
- 3. to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign missionary work by all proper means;

- 4. to enter into contracts or trust agreements with individuals, corporations or partnerships, and to act as trustee, in order to carry out and promote the purposes of this Foundation;
- 5. to prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the corporation is involved; and
- 6. to exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration and disposition of property, the making of conveyances, assignments and contracts and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general purpose and object of this corporation, subject to the limitations prescribed by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VI Directors

(Amended)

There shall be twenty (20) directors of this corporation. Each Director shall be a member of a Baptist church affiliated and cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

To assure representation from all areas of the State of Oklahoma, the membership of the Board of Directors shall be drawn from the following geographical areas:

- Four (4) directors shall be from the Oklahoma City metropolitan area.
- 2. Four (4) directors shall be from the Tulsa metropolitan area.
- 3. Twelve (12) directors shall be from the four quadrants of the state excluding the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. The four quadrants of the State of Oklahoma shall be created by a north-south line consisting of Interstate Highway 35 and an east-west line consisting of Interstate Highway 40 and shall exclude the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. There shall be three (3) directors from each quadrant. No more than two (2) directors from each quadrant shall be from the same city or town.

Of the twenty (20) directors, seventeen (17) shall be lay persons and three (3) shall be ordained ministers of the Gospel or in other church related vocations. At least five (5) of the directors shall be women. To assure continuity, at least 4 directors shall be persons who have previously served on the Board of Directors.

Prerequisite vocational and personal qualifications for nomination of lay directors shall include, among other things, (1) extensive personal knowledge in business affairs which is gained from actual experience in conducting a business or profession; (2) an established good reputation in his or her section of the State as a sound and stable business or professional person, and (3) respect by the general public in his or her section of the State as a person who, if called to mind, would make sound financial investments and decisions and safeguard funds and property.

Subject to the approval of the Board of Directors of the corporation, the President shall annually appoint not to exceed six (6) persons to serve in an advisory capacity to the Board of Directors and to the committees of the Board of Directors. These Advisors shall not have the right to vote. Persons serving in an advisory capacity shall include at least one (1) representative of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and at least one (1) representative of The Oklahoma Baptist University.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Members

(No Change)

The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constituted the members of the corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected directors of the corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### **Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes**

(No Change)

Said corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes, including, for

such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

#### ARTICLE IX

#### **Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status**

(No Change)

No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, (including the publishing or distribution intervene in statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

# ARTICLE X Dissolution

(No Change)

In the event of the dissolution of the corporation all of its property, whether real, personal or mixed, of whatsoever nature and wherever situated, shall vest immediately in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, subject to disposition by said Convention.

# **ARTICLE XI Amendments to Certificate of Incorporation**

(No Change)

This Certificate of Incorporation may be amended from time to time at any regular meeting of the Board of Directors, or at a special meeting called for the purpose, by a two-thirds majority vote of those Directors present at said meeting.

THIS AMENDMENT is made pursuant to a Resolution of the Board of Directors duly adopted by more than a two-thirds majority vote of all of the Directors at its regular meeting held on May 21, 1993, wherein the proposed amendment was set forth and declared to be advisable. Thereafter, this Amended Certificate of Incorporation was duly adopted by more than two-thirds majority vote of all of the members of the Corporation at a special called meeting held on July 20, 1993.

#### Resolution of the Board of Directors Amending the Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma Regarding Regular and Special Meetings of the Board of Directors

WHEREAS, Article II of the Bylaws of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma ("Baptist Foundation") provides for meetings of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation has recommended that the annual meeting date be specified and that the Baptist Foundation should hold quarterly regular meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Baptist Foundation have determined to fix the date of the annual meeting and to hold quarterly regular meetings; and

WHEREAS, Articles 2.2 and 2.3 of the current Bylaws of the Baptist Foundation should be deleted and a new provision be substituted in its place.

IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED that Articles 2.2 and 2.3 of the Bylaws of the Baptist should be deleted in its entirety and the following should be substituted in its place:

- 2.2 Annual Meetings; Notice. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held on either the second or third Friday during the month of December of each year as determined by the Board of Directors. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year. No notice of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors is required where the Board of Directors has fixed a regular date, time and place for its annual meeting. Otherwise, the President will fix the date, time and place of the annual meeting and the Secretary shall give notice of the date, time and place of the annual meeting by mail or facsimile transmission more than ten (10) days before the annual meeting.
- 2.3 Regular Meetings; Notice. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on the last Friday of the months of January, April, July, and October. No notice of regular meetings of the Board of Directors is required where the Board of Directors has fixed a regular time and place for its regular meeting. Otherwise, the President shall fix the time and place of the meeting and the Secretary shall give notice of the time and place of each regular meeting by mail or facsimile transmission more than ten (10) days before the meeting.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Robert L. Ross, President of the Baptist Foundation, and Betty McCully, Secretary of the Baptist Foundation be and are hereby authorized to prepare and execute the Amended Bylaws and file the Amended Bylaws in the permanent corporate records of the Baptist Foundation.

#### THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA

# ARTICLE I Membership

Membership in this corporation shall consist of the duly elected and acting directors. The membership of each director shall continue until his successor is elected and qualified. All members shall be resident Oklahomans, who are members of Baptist churches in the State of Oklahoma, which churches are cooperating with the local Baptist association, and are affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## ARTICLE II Meetings

- 2.1 Separate Meetings of Members Not Required. It shall not be necessary to conduct meetings of members separate from meetings of directors so long as the Articles and Bylaws provide that the members shall consist of the directors. All acts of the directors shall be deemed to be the acts of the members.
- 2.2 Annual Meetings; Notice. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held on either the second or third Friday during the month of December of each year as determined by the Board of Directors. At the annual meeting the newly elected directors shall be seated and officers shall be elected for the ensuing year. No notice of the annual meeting of the Board of Directors is required where the Board of Directors has fixed a regular date, time and place for its annual meeting. Otherwise, the President will fix the date, time and place of the annual meeting and the Secretary shall give notice of the date, time and place of the annual meeting by mail or facsimile transmission more than ten (10) days before the annual meeting.
- 2.3 Regular Meetings; Notice. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on the last Friday of the months of January, April, July, and October. No notice of regular meetings of the Board of Directors is required where the Board of Directors has fixed a regular time and place for its regular meeting. Otherwise, the President shall fix the time and place of the meeting and the Secretary shall give notice of the time and place of each regular meeting by mail or facsimile transmission more than ten (10) days before the meeting.

- 2.4 Special Meetings; Notice. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the Chairperson of the Board of Directors, the President, or by one third of the directors then in office. The Secretary shall give notice of the date, time, place, and purpose or purposes of each special meeting by mail more than five (5) days before the meeting or by facsimile transmission or by telephoning more than two (2) days before the meeting.
- 2.5 **Telephone Conference Meetings.** Both regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors may be held by telephone conference calls confirmed by minutes to be distributed to each director for his or her approval within ten (10) days after such meeting. Approval will be manifested by the director signing an approval of the minutes and returning such approval to the Secretary.
- 2.6 Waiver of Notice of Meeting. Attendance at any meeting waives notice of that meeting, and notice may also be waived in writing either before or after such meeting.

### ARTICLE III Officers

- 3.1 The elective officers of this corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, and the President, who shall also be the Treasurer of the corporation, one or more Vice-Presidents, and a Secretary of the corporation.
- 3.2 The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the directors for terms of one year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents and the Secretary shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.
- 3.3 **Designated Lesser Officers.** In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, and assistant treasurers, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

### ARTICLE IV Duties of Officers

4.1 Chairperson of the Board. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the Directors; shall be their official spokesperson, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.

- 4.2 Vice-Chairpersons of the Board. There hall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 4.3 **President.** The President shall be the chief executive and administrative officer of the corporation. He shall carry out the policies of the Board of Directors and shall make full report to the Directors concerning all matters committed to the Board of Directors; and thereafter make reports, as approved by the Board of Directors, to the Convention.
- The President shall also serve as Treasurer, and as such Treasurer, shall perform all normal duties of that office; and, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws and to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, shall have the custody of funds, securities and properties of the corporation and shall deposit all funds belonging to the corporation in such banks or trust companies as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors of said Foundation, or by such committee as may be designated by said Board of Directors. All funds, including operating and trust accounts, may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by the president (or Treasurer) without any additional signature being required; provided that in time of an emergency occasioned by the illness or inability otherwise of the President to sign drafts or checks that a particular Vice-President, so designated by the President or the board of Directors, is authorized to sign drafts or checks, said drafts or checks to be counter-signed by the Chairperson or one of the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors; and provided further that any time current and operating funds only may be withdrawn upon draft or check signed by such other elective or designated officer as may be determined by the President.
- 4.3-2 In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements, and shall distribute all designated income that is available for distribution at least annually, and shall furnish any interested institution any information requested concerning the investment of funds for such institution.
- 4.3-3 The President shall file with the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the corporation as an operating expense.
- 4.4 Vice-Presidents. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon

recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.

4.5 **Secretary.** The Secretary of the corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.

### ARTICLE V Directors

- 5.1 Duties and Restrictions. The affairs of the corporation shall be administered by sixteen directors.
- re-invest all funds delivered to the corporation by gifts, devises, bequests or otherwise, as well as the undistributed income arising from such investment, and to make distribution thereof only when the method of distribution of principal or income is designated by the donor or testator; otherwise, such distribution shall only be made upon the approval nd with the authority of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma; and said directors shall transfer directly to the institution named as beneficiary, such funds as are not designated for endowment. Said directors shall faithfully make a report to the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, of the administration of funds entrusted to the corporation. Said annual report shall bear the certificate of an independent and disinterested auditor.
- 5.1-2 The directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or make any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or the Convention's Board of Directors. No bond, mortgage or other evidence of debt shall be executed involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 5.2 In compliance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the conventions, at its annual session each year, the Committee on Nominations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall, in compliance with Article VI of the Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation, nominate four members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation for election by the Convention at its annual session. The term of each such member shall be four years, and each such member shall not be eligible for re-election to the Board of Directors for a period of one year. Recognizing that he is uniquely informed as to persons whose particular capabilities and dedication set them apart for such service, the President of the corporation, acting with the approval of the Executive Committee of the corporation, shall recommend to said Committee on Nominations those persons from the various sections of

the State whom he deems qualified to serve as directors, with the full expectations that his recommendations shall be given foremost consideration by the Committee on Nominations.

- 5.3 Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors until the next annual meeting.
- 5.4 Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall consider various matters including the annual budget to be acted upon by the Directors, and shall recommend actions to be taken from time to time by the Directors. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairperson and Vice Chairpersons of the Board, and the Chairpersons of all standing committees. The President, Executive Vice President and vice Presidents shall serve as exofficio members without right to vote.
- 5.5 Other Committees. The Board of Directors may appoint form their own number such committees as the directors may determine, as standing committees or otherwise, and delegate to said committees such duties and authority as may be by the majority vote of those present.
- 5.6 Quorum. A quorum of the Board of Directors, Executive Committee and any other committee appointed by the Board of Directors shall consist of at least a majority of the authorized number of Directors (if the Board of Directors) or a majority of the members entitled to vote (if a committee). All matters properly coming before the Board of Directors, Executive Committee and any other committee shall be determined by majority vote of those Directors present (if the Board of Directors) or of those members present who are entitled to vote (if a committee). In the absence of a quorum, those Directors or committee members present may adjourn any meeting from day to day, but may not transact any business.
- 5.7 Meetings Of Committees; Telephone Meetings Permitted. Regular and special meetings of the Executive Committee and any other committees appointed by the Board of Directors may be called by the chairperson or by one third of the members entitled to vote. The secretary of the committee shall give notice of the date, time, place, and purpose or purposes of each meeting by mail more than five (5) days before the meeting or by facsimile transmission or by telephoning more than two (2) days before the meeting. Attendance at any meeting waives notice of that meeting, and notice may also be waived in writing either before or after such meeting. Both regular and special meetings of the Executive Committee or of any other committees appointed by the Board of Directors may be held by telephone conference calls. The actions taken in telephonic conferences shall be confirmed by minutes which shall distributed to each member of the committee prior to the next regular or special meeting of the committee and shall be approved by the acceptance of the minutes of such telephonic meeting by the majority of members of the committee entitled to vote.

#### ARTICLE VI Administration of Funds and Property

- The directors shall have and 6.1 Extent of Authority. exercise full authority with reference to the investment. reinvestment and administration of the principal of all funds and property devised, bequeathed, given or transferred to corporation, and shall have authority to execute proper transfers, assignments, contracts, deeds, oil and gas leases and mineral releases, receipts, acquittances, and any and instruments that may be necessary in the administration of the property, and assets of the corporation. The purchaser or transferee of property, real or personal, notes, bonds, or securities, shall not be required to look to the application of proceeds so long as such instrument or instruments so delivered to him or them are executed by the President or a Vice-President of the corporation, and in the case of real estate, attested by the Secretary under the seal of the corporation.
- 6.2 **Designated Gifts.** Where funds or property are given or devised to said corporation in accordance with specific conditions and provisions as to how the same shall be administered or distributed, said directors shall have full authority to carry out such specific directions.

#### 6.3 Undesignated Gifts.

- (a) In the absence of such specific directions, said directors shall have no authority to distribute said funds or property, but only to administer the same in such manner as to realize the best return thereon by way of rental, interest or other income, and make full accounting of all such funds and property so administered by them to the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which Convention shall have full and final authority to make distribution of funds on hand and subject to distribution.
- (b) All funds received and administered by the corporation and not otherwise designated, shall be so administered and distributed for the benefit of Baptist institutions and agencies and institutions fostered by, and having the official sanction of, the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, or the Southern Baptist Convention, and for no other purpose.

### ARTICLE VII Seal

The seal of the corporation shall be circular in form around the outside border of which shall be inscribed the following:

"THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA,

CORPORATE SEAL."

# ARTICLE VIII Indemnification of Directors, Officers and Employees

- 8.1 The Corporation shall indemnify any present or former director, officer of employee against liabilities, judgments and all expenses incurred by reason of and arising out of his service to the Corporation, except as to matters in which he shall be adjudged to be liable for negligence or misconduct in the performance of his duties to the Corporation.
- 8.2 This right of indemnification shall not be exclusive of any other right of such person, including but not limited to rights provided by Resolution of the Corporation and by the provision of Title 18, Section 1.43a of the Oklahoma Statutes.

### ARTICLE IX Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended by a three-fourths vote of directors present and voting at any regular meeting of this corporation. No amendment shall become effective until approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, at its annual meeting, or approved by the Board of Directors of the Convention.

# Second Amended Articles of Incorporation

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, by and through its duly authorized officers, does hereby execute the Second Amended Articles of Incorporation, pursuant to resolution of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma duly adopted on May 15, 1961, as follows:

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be the BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA.

#### ARTICLE II

This corporation shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches which are cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. This Convention is a purely cooperative body, and its purpose shall be to furnish the means by which the churches of Jesus Christ, in their sovereign capacity, can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

This corporation is formed for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes under the applicable provisions of law, including the provisions of Title 18, Oklahoma Statutes of 1951, Section Numbers 541 and following sections. This corporation has no stated capital and the business to be conducted by this corporation is not for pecuniary profit.

In carrying out the above mentioned purposes, the corporation, among other things, is empowered and authorized to establish, maintain and operate agencies and institutions for the care, nurture and benefit of children, elderly persons, and persons who are sick, infirm, afflicted, incapacitated and otherwise in need, such agencies and institutions to include, but not limited to, child care institutions, hospitals, schools for training and educating nurses and others engaged in the field of medicine, and homes for elderly persons; and to conduct all related

activities in carrying out said religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes.

In carrying out the above stated purposes, this corporation shall exercise all of the powers authorized by law, and especially to purchase, control, manage, acquire, hold, barter, sell, convey, exchange, distribute, invest and otherwise dispose of all real, personal or mixed property of whatsoever nature and wheresoever situated; to borrow money, and to execute mortages of its property and other evidences of indebtedness; and to receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise any money or property, real or personal, either absolutely or in trust; and to use such property in the furtherance of any of the above mentioned purposes or any other purpose within its general corporate powers.

#### ARTICLE III

The term for which this corporation shall exist is perpetual.

#### ARTICLE IV

The place in this state where the principal office of the corporation is to be located is Oklahoma City, Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and at such other places in the State of Oklahoma as may be designated by the Convention or its Board of Directors when said Convention is not in session.

#### ARTICLE V

The terms of admission and qualifications of membership are as follows:

This Convention shall consist of messengers to the annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, which messengers are elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the Convention. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every fifty members, provided that no church shall have over ten messengers.

#### ARTICLE VI

This corporation shall have such officers and directors, with such duties, as may be provided in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

# **Constitution and Bylaws**

### CONSTITUTION OF THE BAPTIST GENERAL CONVENTION OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA

#### ARTICLE I—NAME

This body shall be known as the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II—CONSTITUENCY

Section 1. This convention shall consist of messengers elected by the Baptist churches cooperating with and contributing to the work of the convention.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) messengers and one (1) additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, provided that no church shall have over ten (10) messengers.

#### ARTICLE III—OBJECT

Section 1. This convention shall have no ecclesiastical authority or power whatever and shall never assume to write creeds or to exercise judicial or legislative control over the churches.

Section 2. This convention is a purely cooperative body and its purpose shall be to furnish a means by which the churches of Christ in their sovereign capacity can work together in promoting all denominational enterprises which they deem necessary in carrying out the Great Commission.

#### ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS

#### Section 1.

- A. The officers of the convention shall be a president, a first vicepresident, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, an assistant recording secretary, a historical secretary, an executive director-treasurer, and an associate executive director.
- B. And that in the event of the removal from the state of the president while in office, or should his death make vacant the office, he shall be succeeded for the remainder of the term by the first vice-president.
- C. And should either of these contingencies again make the office vacant, the second vice-president shall succeed to the remainder of the term.
- Section 2. The officers, with the exception of the executive director-treasurer and the associate executive director, shall be elected annually by the messengers of the convention and shall hold their respective offices until their successors are elected. The one receiving the majority of all votes shall be declared elected. The executive director-treasurer shall be elected by the convention and shall serve until his successor is elected; and the board of directors shall elect the associate executive director upon the recommendation of the executive director-treasurer.
- Section 3. The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all

the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the convention and of the board of directors. He shall be an ex officio member of all boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions.

Section 4. The duties of other officers of the convention shall be those usually required in similar organizations.

## ARTICLE V—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. This convention shall have power to elect such boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, as may be necessary for the handling of the affairs of the convention. All such boards, trustees and standing committee personnel, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall be nominated to the convention in its annual session by the convention committee on nominations.

Section 2. These boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions, shall make annual detailed reports of all transactions fully covering all work committed to them by this convention.

Section 3. All boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies and institutions affiliated with the convention, shall institute and maintain their corporate charter and other documents controlling policy and operation in harmony with and conformity to the constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Section 4. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure or capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors.

#### ARTICLE VI-BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. There shall be a board of directors elected by this convention through which this convention shall function in its cooperative work.

Section 2. The board of directors shall consist of sixty-four (64) members, plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary who shall be chosen by the convention at the annual meeting. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of this board shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least (8) women.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than fortyone (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporation organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, provided their acting shall at all times be subsequent to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 3. The board of directors shall, in case of vacancy, elect an executive director-treasurer to serve until such time as the convention next meets.

Section 4. Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the **Baptist Messenger**.

Section 5. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

## ARTICLE VII—GENERAL CONVENTIONS AND THEIR PROCEEDINGS

Section 1. The convention shall hold its meetings annually at such time and place as it may determine. Special meetings may be called and the time and place of meetings may be changed by the officers of the convention with the consent of the board of directors in case of an emergency deemed sufficient to justify.

Section 2. The proceedings of the general convention, including the report of the board of directors, shall be recorded, published and distributed annually among the churches.

#### ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL FUNDS

All funds paid into the treasury of the convention for any special object shall be applied according to the designation of donors.

#### ARTICLE IX—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any session of any regular annual meeting provided that proposed amendment be submitted in writing one year before action is taken on same, or provided such amendments be recommended by the board of directors and published in the **Baptist Messenger** two months prior to the meeting of the convention.

Section 2. Section 1 of Article III shall not be changed or amended but shall be held inviolate.

#### BYLAWS ARTICLE I—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The business and property of the Baptist General Con-

vention of the State of Oklahoma shall be managed and controlled by the board of directors. The board of directors herein provided for shall only execute bonds, mortgages and other evidence of indebtedness by a three-fourths majority vote by the board of directors. It is understood that as many of these actions as practicable shall be presented to the general convention in annual session.

The number of directors shall be sixty-four (64) plus the president, first vice-president, second vice-president and recording secretary of the convention.

The president of the convention shall be president of the board of directors, and the recording secretary of the convention shall be recording secretary of the board of directors.

The board of directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in its annual convention which meets from year to year as hereinafter provided. The term of office for the sixty-four (64) members, other than officers, shall be four (4) years. Sixteen (16) of them shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election to this board for a period of one (1) year. The membership of the board of directors shall include not less than sixteen (16) persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight (8) men and at least eight (8) women. In electing members of the board of directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation. The Committee on Nominations shall present at least one nominee for each associational area; the additional nominee(s) shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident members of churches in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the Board of Directors, and any board member shall be considered as having resigned when the person moves from the associational area where he or she has been elected.

The board of directors shall elect from the directors an executive committee consisting of not less than five (5) and not more than forty-one (41) members, including the president, recording secretary and executive director-treasurer of the convention. The executive committee shall at all times function as corporate directors, forming the board of directors of the corporation for legal purposes, in order to comply with the requirements of the law of Oklahoma pertaining to corporations organized for religious, charitable, educational and benevolent purposes which limits the number of corporate directors to no more than forty-one (41). The acts of said corporate directors of the convention shall be sufficient to bind the convention for all legal purposes, although their actions shall at all times be subject to and governed by the acts of the convention or of the board of directors elected by this convention, acting in the convention's place and stead.

Section 2. In case any member misses two consecutive meetings of the board without giving advance notification to the office of the Executive Director-Treasurer, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

Section 3. In case of any vacancy on the board of directors, the

remaining directors by an affirmative vote of the majority thereof may elect a successor to hold the office for the unexpired portion of the term.

Section 4. The board of directors shall hold three meetings per year and such special meetings as the president in his judgment may call. In lieu of having a special called board meeting, the president and executive director-treasurer in emergency situations may poll the board by mail upon the appropriate committee's recommendation, and the matter shall be decided upon the vote of a majority of the membership of the board of directors.

Section 5. Thirty-two (32) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 6. The date and place for the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall be set by the convention itself in annual meeting. The board of directors for good cause may change the time and place for the annual convention.

Section 7. The board of directors shall make a general report of all its actions at the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE II—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee as described in Article I, Section 1 of these bylaws shall act for the board of directors when the board of directors is not in session, but shall perform only such duties as may be referred to it for action from time to time by the board of directors.

#### ARTICLE III—OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. Election of officers at the general convention shall be by standing vote, unless the method of voting is changed by a majority of the messengers present and voting, as it may pertain to the election of any particular officer.

Section 2. All officers and agents, other than those elected by the general convention shall be subject to removal at any time by the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole board of directors. All officers, agents and employees, other than officers elected by the general convention shall hold office at the discretion of the board of directors.

Section 3. PRESIDENT—The president of the board of directors shall preside at all meetings of the board and by virtue of his office shall be a member of the executive committee. He shall have general supervision of such matters as may be designated by the board of directors. He shall have authority to appoint all committees of the board of directors, in consultation with the first and second vice-presidents and the executive director-treasurer of the convention. The president or any one of the vice-presidents, shall have the power and authority to sign deeds, mortgages, notes and other documents in behalf of the corporation, either of which signatures shall be attested as hereinafter provided.

Section 4. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR-TREASURER—The chief executive officer of the convention shall be the executive director-treasurer. He shall supervise and administer all the affairs of the convention and all its activities, and shall represent and carry out the policies of the board of directors and the executive committee of the conven-

tion. The executive director-treasurer shall have custody of all the funds and securities of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and when necessary or proper shall endorse, on behalf of the convention for collection, checks, notes and other obligations, and shall deposit the same to the credit of the convention in such bank or depository as the board of directors may designate. The executive director-treasurer shall make annual reports of all funds or securities coming into his hands to the board of directors, who shall audit and check the same and give the same their approval in writing.

The following procedure shall be followed in the event the office of executive director-treasurer becomes vacant:

- (1) In the event the vacancy of the office of executive directortreasurer occurs between sessions of the convention, the associate executive director shall assume the responsibilities of the office until a successor is elected by the board of directors.
- (2) A search committee of seven members of the board of directors shall be elected without nomination by the board of directors by secret ballot, the seven persons receiving the largest number of votes shall form the committee and the one receiving the largest number of all votes shall be chairman.
- (3) When the committee has a nomination to make to the board, a meeting of the board of directors will be called to consider the recommendation, and the nominee may be elected by the board of directors by a majority vote, subject to approval of the convention.
- (4) The person elected by the board of directors shall serve until the convention next meets, at which time the election of such person shall be approved or disapproved by a majority vote of the convention.
- Section 5. RECORDING SECRETARY—The recording secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the convention, including called meetings and votes taken by mail, and of the board of directors. He shall attest with the president or any one of the vice-presidents all contracts authorized by the board of directors or by the general convention and shall affix the seal of the convention thereto; and he shall perform all the duties incident to the office of the recording secretary, subject to the control of the board of directors.

Section 6. ASSISTANT RECORDING SECRETARY—The assistant recording secretary shall perform the duties of the recording secretary in his absence, and shall have the power to attest all contracts and legal documents of the convention and to affix its seal thereto.

Section 7. GENERAL COUNSEL—The board of directors shall have the power to appoint a general counsel to represent the board of directors in such legal matters as may require legal action or advice.

#### ARTICLE IV—COMMITTEES

Section 1. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—The president shall appoint a fifteen (15) member nominating committee composed of persons from various geographical areas and size of church. The committee shall meet at least twice, an orientation meeting prior to June 1, and a meeting to begin the nominating process prior to September 15. Between the two

meetings, the committee shall provide opportunity for the general constituency to submit recommendations. This committee shall not recommend a fellow committee member or the member's spouse for nomination to any convention elected position. The nominating committee shall recommend to the convention in annual session: (1) persons to serve on the convention's board of directors and boards of all agencies and institutions of the convention; (2) nominations for the elected convention committees; and (3) time, place and preacher for the following year's convention meeting. All persons nominated by the committee should be contacted prior to the annual session to affirm their willingness to serve if elected.

Section 2. ANNUAL SESSION COMMITTEES—The president shall appoint the committees related to the annual session over which he presides. The basic committees are (1) Credentials, (2) Memorial, (3) Resolutions, and (4) Tellers.

Section 3. CONVENTION COMMITTES—The Nominating Committee shall submit nominations for members of convention committees. Members shall be elected for three-year rotating terms. Convention committees include (1) Committee on Order of Business, (2) Christian Life Committee, (3) Historical Commission, and other committees that may be necessary from time to time.

Section 4. A member of any convention committee shall be considered as having resigned when missing two consecutive meetings without giving advance notification to the office of Executive Director-Treasurer.

#### ARTICLE V-STAFF MEMBERS

Upon recommendation of the executive director-treasurer and the administrative committee, the board of directors shall elect all department directors, the associate executive director and the editor of the Baptist Messenger. The department directors, in consultation with the executive director-treasurer and the appropriate committee, shall employ the department associates and the program leaders. Office workers shall be employed by the department directors in consultation with the executive director-treasurer. Salaries shall be in accordance with the remuneration scale set by the board of directors.

# ARTICLE VI—BOARDS, TRUSTEES AND STANDING COMMITTEES, INCLUDING THOSE OF SEPARATELY INCORPORATED AGENCIES AND INSTITUTIONS

Section 1. The board of directors may provide for auxiliary corporations working in connection with and in harmony with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, but such auxiliary corporations shall be subject to the general control of the board of directors of the convention.

Section 2. No boards, trustees and standing committees, including those of separately incorporated agencies or institutions, shall launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the convention or the board of directors. This provision shall not apply to short term loans for current oper-

tions. Such short term loans shall not be made without the knowledge of the executive director-treasurer.

Section 3. No bond, mortgage, or other evidence of debt shall be executed by an auxiliary corporation involving any of the property of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE VII—LIABILITY

#### Indemnification of Directors, Officers, Employees and Agents

Section 1. INDEMNIFICATION—The convention shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a director, officer, employee or agent (including volunteers) of the convention, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding except that no indemnification shall be made in respect of any claim, issue or matter as to which such person shall have been adjudged to be liable for gross negligence or misconduct in the performance of this duty to the convention.

Section 2. AUTHORIZATION OF INDEMNIFICATION—Any indemnification under this Article shall be made by the convention only as authorized in the specific case upon a determination that indemnification of the director, officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in this Article. Such determination shall be made: by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of directors who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable a quorum of disinterested directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in written opinion.

Section 3. NON-EXCLUSIVE INDEMNIFICATION—The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the convention's certificate of incorporation or constitution, statutes, regulations, any agreement, any insurance purchased by the convention, vote of the disinterested directors or otherwise, and shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a director, officer, employee or agent of the convention and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs and personal representatives of such person.

Section 4. INSURANCE—The convention shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the convention, against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the convention would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provision of this Article.

#### ARTICLE VIII—BYLAWS

Section 1. The bylaws herein adopted shall conform to the con-

stitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In case of conflict between the bylaws and the constitution, the provisions of the constitution shall prevail.

Section 2. The convention shall have the power to amend these bylaws by a vote of two-thirds of the messengers present at any session of any annual meeting, or the board of directors shall have the power to amend the bylaws of the convention at any regular or specially called meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the entire membership of the board of directors, provided that the notice calling the board meeting shall specify that amendments to the bylaws will be voted upon at the particular meeting. In case of emergency, the bylaws may be amended at any general or specially called meeting of the board of directors without prior notice, provided three-fourths of the entire membership of the board of directors votes affirmatively.

# AMENDED and RESTATED BYLAWS

**OF** 

#### BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS OF OKLAHOMA, INC.

A not-for-profit corporation organized for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes in providing aged, sick or injured persons with housing facilities, long term care nursing facilities and other services designed to meet their physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs and to contribute to their health, security, happiness, spiritual well-being and usefulness in longer living as mandated by the Scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

#### **BYLAWS**

#### OF BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS OF OKLAHOMA, INC.

#### ARTICLE I OFFICES/MEMBERSHIP

- 1.01. <u>Registered Office</u>. The registered office shall be located at 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112-6506.
- 1.02. <u>Principal Office</u>. The principal office of the Corporation is 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112-6506.

The Board of Directors shall have full power and authority to change the principal office of the Corporation from one location to another as the Board of Directors deems advisable. Any such change shall be noted in the Bylaws by the Secretary in this section to state the new location.

- 1.03. Other Offices. The Corporation may also have offices at such other places within the State of Oklahoma as the Board of Directors may from time to time determine or the business of the Corporation may require.
- 1.04. <u>Members of Corporation</u>. The subscribers of the original Articles of Incorporation constitute the members of the Corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected Board of Directors of the Corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

## ARTICLE II PURPOSES AND POWERS

- 2.01. <u>Purposes and Powers</u>. A not-for-profit corporation organized for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes in providing aged, sick or injured persons with housing facilities, long term care nursing facilities and other services designed to meet their physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs and to contribute to their health, security, happiness, spiritual well-being and usefulness in longer living as mandated by the Scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ. This Corporation is an auxiliary Corporation of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma under the terms of article VI of the Convention's bylaws. In furtherance of its general purpose, the Corporation shall perform any or all of the following:
- A. To operate one or more long term care institutions, nursing facilities, assisted living units, independent living units, day care units, respite care service or/other housing facility for elderly persons.
- B. To provide medical and surgical aid and nursing or other care to the aged, sick, injured, destitute or otherwise needy persons.
- C. To engage in research and scientific and educational activities related to the care of the aged, sick and injured in promoting long-term care and nursing care.
  - D. To promote cooperation and coordination between health care professionals, institutions,

facilities, groups, individuals and public agencies in community health planning efforts.

- E. To develop, produce, publish and make available items for educational purposes which will promote or improve the physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs of elderly persons.
- F. To seek out and investigate cases of worthiness, destitution and want, and to administer, in deserving cases, through means derived from contributions and from other sources as may be from time to time devised, such assistance as may in the discretion of the directors be deemed judicious and proper.
- G. To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

The purposes specified herein shall be construed both as purposes and powers and shall be in no wise limited or restricted by reference to, or inference from, the terms of any other clause in this or any other Article hereof, but the purposes and powers specified in each of the clauses herein shall be regarded as independent purposes and powers, and the enumeration of specific purposes and power shall not be construed to limit or restrict in any manner the meanings of general terms or of the general powers of the Corporation; nor shall the expression of one thing be deemed to exclude another, although it be of like nature not expressed.

In carrying out the spirit and letter of the corporate purposes and objectives of the Corporation, as expressed in its Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, the Corporation shall have the following powers:

- A. To purchase and hold title in fee simple absolute, without any remainder or reversion, any real estate, and to convey, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge, exchange or otherwise dispose of any such reality.
- B. To purchase and own personal property, which is suitable, necessary, useful or advisable for the transaction of the business of the Corporation,
  - C. To enter upon, improve, develop, manage and otherwise deal with such real property.
- D. To solicit, collect, receive, accumulate, administer and disburse funds. To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, and to hold, barter, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, sell, invest, and otherwise dispose of all money or property, real, personal, or mixed, either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purpose or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
  - E. To prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the Corporation is involved;
- F. To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration, and disposition of property; the making of conveyances, assignments, and contracts; and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general powers and object of this Corporation; and
- G. The Corporation is authorized to exercise any and all powers authorized by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE III BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- 3.01. <u>Powers/Exclusivity</u>. Subject to the limitations provided by law and the Certificate of Incorporation of this Corporation, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under the authority of a Board of Directors, and the business and affairs of such Corporation shall be managed and conducted exclusively by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors.
- 3.02. <u>Number of Directors</u>. The number of persons that shall constitute the voting members of the Board of Directors shall be not less than five (5) and not more than twenty-five (25).
- 3.03. <u>Criteria for Selection of Directors</u>. A director shall be a member of a Baptist church cooperating with The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

The desired qualifications for service as directors of this Corporation shall include recognized effort and experience in Christian causes, knowledge of and ability in business affairs, and an interest in promoting the purposes of the Corporation.

The Board of Directors shall be geographically representative of the State of Oklahoma. At least one (1) director shall be from each of the areas of the State in which a Baptist Retirement Center of Oklahoma Inc. facility is located. Three (3) directors shall be ordained ministers or persons serving in church related vocations.

An employee of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve on the Board; and should a director of the Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma become an employee of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

#### 3.04. Election and Term of Office.

A. <u>Election</u>. All directors shall be elected by The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma by a majority of those messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. These directors shall be nominated by the Convention's Committee on Nominations.

#### B. <u>Term of Office</u>.

- 1. <u>Initial Directors</u>. Except for the interim directors provided in Article Eight of the Certification of Incorporation whose terms expire upon the election of initial directors provided herein, there will be twenty (20) initial directors of the Corporation. The terms of the initial directors shall be as follows: five (5) directors shall serve a term of one (1) year, five (5) directors shall serve a term of two (2) years, five (5) directors shall serve a term of three (3) years, and five (5) directors shall serve terms of four (4) years each.
  - 2. <u>Term After Initial Directors</u>. After the election of the initial directors, a director shall serve

a term of four (4) years, except if the director is elected to fill a vacancy, the director shall serve out the term of the prior director.

3.05. <u>Ex Officio Members</u>. The Executive Director of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or his designee shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Directors. He shall not count as one of the twenty-five directors.

#### 3.06. Vacancies.

- A. Vacancies may be filled by a majority of the remaining directors of the Corporation then in office. Any interim director so chosen shall hold office until the next annual meeting of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any interim director so chosen shall also serve until such interim director's successor is duly elected and shall qualify, unless such director resigns or is removed.
- B. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be deemed to exist in the event of the death, resignation or removal of any director, or if the Board of Directors by resolution declares vacant the office of a director who has been declared of unsound mind by an order of court or convicted of a felony. In the event any person elected to the Board of Directors fails to attend two (2) consecutive meetings of the directors without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the Corporation, his or her position on the Board may be deemed to have become vacant, at the discretion of the Board of Directors.
- C. Any director may resign effective on giving written notice to the Chairman of the Board of Directors unless notice specifies a later time for that resignation to become effective. If the resignation of a director is effective at a future time, the Board of Directors may elect a successor to take office when the resignation becomes effective.
- 3.07. <u>Removal of Director(s)</u>. Any director may be removed, for cause, by a majority vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 3.08. <u>Place of Meetings</u>. The Board of Directors may hold meetings, both regular and special, either within or without the State of Oklahoma at a place which has been designated from time to time by the Office of the President.
- 3.09. <u>Annual/Regular Meetings</u>. An annual meeting of the Board of Directors for the purpose of election of officers of the Corporation and the transaction of any other business as may be properly brought before such meeting shall be held in the month of November.

In addition to the annual meeting, the Board of Directors will hold a meeting in each other quarter of the calendar year.

Other regular meetings of the Board may be held at such time as shall from time to time be determined by the Board.

3.10. Quorum. At all meetings of the Board, a majority of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the act of a majority of the directors present at any meeting shall be the act of the Board of Directors, except as may be otherwise specifically provided by law or by the Certificate of Incorporation. If a quorum shall not be present at any meeting of the Board of Directors, the directors

present may adjourn the meeting from time to time, without notice other than announcement at the meeting, until a quorum shall be present.

3.11. <u>Voting</u>. Each director shall have one vote on each matter presented to the Board for a vote. No director may vote by proxy.

#### 3.12. Special Meeting.

- A. Special meetings of the Board for any purpose or purposes may be called at any time by the Chairman of the Board or President, or if either of them are absent or unable to act, by any Vice Chairman, Vice President or Secretary, when, in such person's judgment, a matter of sufficient importance requires the immediate attention of the entire Board of Directors. By unanimous consent of the directors, special meetings of the Board may be held without notice at any time and place.
- B. Special meetings shall be called by the Chairman of the Board, President or Secretary in like manner and on like notice, if any, on the written request of a majority of directors.
- C. No business shall be considered at any special meeting other than the purposes mentioned in the notice unless the directors present waive this section.
- 3.13. Continued Meetings. A quorum of the directors may adjourn any directors' meeting to meet again at a stated day and hour; provided, however, that in the absence of a quorum a majority of the directors present at any directors' meeting, either regular or special, may adjourn to a later date but may not transact any business until a quorum has been secured. At any continued meeting at which a required number of directors shall be present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified.
- 3.14. <u>Notice of Continued Meeting</u>. Notice of the time and place of holding an adjourned meeting which is to be continued at a later date need not be given to absent directors if the time and place is fixed at the adjourned meeting.
- 3.15. <u>Telephonic Meetings</u>. Members of the Board of Directors, or of any committee thereof, may participate in a meeting of such Board or committee by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment that enables all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other. Such participation shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.
- 3.16. Action Without Meeting. Unless otherwise restricted by the Certificate of Incorporation or these Bylaws, any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Board of Directors or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if a written consent to such action is signed by all members of the Board or of such committee as the case may be, and such written consent is flied with the minutes of proceedings of the Board or committee.
- 3.17. <u>Fees and Compensation</u>. No director (as such) of the Corporation shall receive, directly or indirectly, any salary or compensation from the Corporation, but may receive reimbursement for personal expenses actually incurred in carrying out their responsibilities as director.
- 3.18. <u>Maintenance and Inspection of Bylaws</u>. The Corporation shall keep at its principal office, the original or a copy of the Bylaws as amended to date, which shall be open to inspection by the directors

at all times during office hours.

3.19. <u>Maintenance and Inspection of Other Corporation Records</u>. The accounting books and records and written actions of and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Directors and any committee or committees of the Board of Directors shall be kept at the principal office of the Corporation. The minutes and actions shall be kept in written form and the accounting books and records shall be kept either in written or in any other form capable of being converted into written form. Every director shall have the absolute right at any reasonable time to inspect all minutes, accounting books, records and documents of every kind and the physical properties of the Corporation.

## ARTICLE IV NOTICES

- 4.01. Notice of Annual/Regular Meeting of Board of Directors. The Secretary of the Corporation shall cause written notice of annual and regular meetings of the Board of Directors to be given to each member of the Board of Directors at least ten (10) days prior to any meeting of the Board of Directors. Such notices shall set forth the date, time and place of the annual and regular meeting and shall be addressed to each director at the addresses that appear on the books of the Corporation or at such other address as supplied by such director. Delivery of notices shall be deemed sufficient if deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid; delivery of electronic transmission of facsimile copies, or personally delivered.
- 4.02. Notice of Special Meetings of Board of Director. Except as specified in the paragraphs 3.15, 3.16 and 4.03, written notice of the place, date and hour and the purposes of all special meetings shall be delivered to each director. Notices to directors of special meetings shall be in writing and delivered personally or mailed to the directors at their addresses appearing on the books of the Corporation, or at such other address and may be supplied by said director for the purpose of notice. In case such notice is mailed or sent by facsimile transmission, it shall be deposited in the United States Mail or sent by facsimile transmission at least five (5) days prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. In case such notice is delivered personally, it shall be so delivered at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. Such mailing, facsimile transmission or delivery as provided above shall be due, legal and personal notice to such director.
- 4.03. <u>Waiver of Notice</u>. Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of law or of the Certificate of Incorporation or of these Bylaws, a waiver in writing signed by the director to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to notice. Attendance of a person at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except when the person attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting, at the beginning of the meeting, to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

#### ARTICLE V OFFICERS

- 5.01. Officers Designated. The elective officers of this Corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Directors, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, the President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, and a Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation.
- 5.02. <u>Election Term.</u> The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the directors of the Corporation for terms of one year and until their successors are

elected. The President shall be elected by the directors of said Corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents, Secretary, and Chief Financial Officer shall be recommended by the President and elected by the directors and shall serve until their successors are elected.

5.03. <u>Designated Lessor Officers</u>. In addition to the above elective officers, the Board of Directors shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries, with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors from time to time.

#### 5.04. <u>Removal and Resignation</u>.

- A. Any officer may be removed, either with or without cause, by the Board of Directors, at any regular or special meeting there of.
- B. Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Directors, or to the President, or to the Secretary of the Corporation. Any such resignation shall take effect at the date of the receipt of such notice or at any later time specified therein; and, unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.
- 5.05. <u>Vacancies</u>. If the office of any officer becomes vacant by reason of death, resignation, retirement, disqualification, removal from office, or otherwise, the Directors then in office, by a vote of a majority of the members of the Board, may choose a successor or successors, who shall hold office for the unexpired term in respect of which such vacancy occurred.
- 5.06. <u>Filling More Than One Office</u>. Any two offices of the Corporation may be held by the same person, except that no officer shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument in more than one capacity if the instrument is required by law or the Certificate of Incorporation or the Bylaws to be executed, acknowledged, or verified by two or more officers.

#### ARTICLES VI DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- 6.01. <u>Chairperson of the Board</u>. The Chairperson of the Board of Directors shall preside over all meetings of the directors; shall be their official spokesperson, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- 6.02. <u>Vice-Chairpersons of the Board</u>. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Directors. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Directors.
- 6.03. <u>President</u>. The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and, subject to the control of the directors, shall supervise and control generally all the business and affairs of the Corporation, including:
- A. He shall, after consulting with the Board of Directors, appoint all committees of the Board of Directors and shall be an ex-officio (nonvoting) member of each committee.
  - B. He, or his designee(s), shall sign or countersign, as may be necessary all such bills, notes,

checks, contracts and other instruments as may pertain to the ordinary course of the Corporation's business.

- C. He shall execute bonds, mortgages, and other contracts requiring a seal under the seal of the Corporation, except where required or permitted by law to be otherwise signed and executed and except where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the Board of Directors to some other officer or agent of the Corporation.
- D. At the annual meeting of the Board of Directors, he shall submit a complete report of the operations of the Corporation's affairs as existing at the close of each year and shall report to the Board of Directors from time to time all such matters coming to his attention and relating to the interest of the Corporation as should be brought to the attention of the Board.
- E. He shall have such usual powers and duties of supervision and management as may pertain to the Office of the President and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors or the Bylaws.
- F. In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Directors, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements.
- G. The President shall file with the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma a surety bond for the faithful performances of his duties in such sum as may be fixed by the Board of Director of the Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, the expenses of such bond to be paid by the Corporation as an operating expense.
- 6.04. <u>Vice-President</u>. There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Directors upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the Corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.
- 6.05. <u>Secretary</u>. The Secretary of the Corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Directors, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.
  - 6.06. Chief Financial Officer. The Chief Financial Officer of the Corporations shall:
- A. Have the care and custody of all corporate funds, securities and properties of the Corporation, and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Corporation;
- B. Deposit all monies, and other valuable effects, in the name and to the credit of the Corporation in such depositories as may be designated by the Board of Directors;
- C. Keep separate, apart, and inviolate all funds given to the Corporation in trust, or with limitations as to the income or use thereof, and the investments thereof shall be made as directed by the Board of Directors;
  - D. Disburse the funds of the Corporation as may be ordered by the Board of Directors;

E. Render to the President and directors, at the regular meetings of the Board or whenever they may require it, an account of all transactions made as Chief Financial Officer and of the financial condition of the Corporation.

# ARTICLE VII RECEIPT, INVESTMENT AND DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS, ACCOUNTING OF ASSETS. BORROWING FUNDS AND AUDITORS AND AUDITS

- 7.01. <u>Funds</u>. The Board of Directors may from time to time authorize additional persons to draw upon the funds of the Corporation, whether by check or otherwise.
- 7.02. <u>Bond</u>. All officers and employees of the Corporation whose duties shall require them to handle funds belonging to the Corporation shall be bonded for the faithful performance of their duties at the expense of the Corporation by sureties selected by the Corporation. The President may forthwith terminate the services of any employee who is unable to furnish a satisfactory bond.
- 7.03. <u>Trust Funds</u>. Any funds received in trust or for a specific purpose shall be segregated and not commingled with other funds of the Corporation. All funds received by the Corporation in trust shall be turned over to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for management.
- 7.04. <u>Disbursement of Funds</u>. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this Corporation, no funds or property of this Corporation shall be disbursed except for a proper corporate purpose and unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor.
- 7.05. Loans. This Corporation shall comply with Article V Section 4 of the Constitution of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and in accordance therewith the Corporation may borrow such sums as may be necessary and essential to the routine, prudent and efficient operation of the Corporation in carrying out its corporate purposes, provided that the aggregate amount of debt incurred by the Corporation, less any indebtedness due and owed to or obtained from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, shall not exceed the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00); provided that in the event the Corporation shall need to borrow sums in excess of the aggregate amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) (exclusive of any amounts owed to or obtained from The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma), which sum shall be determined to be a "Major Expenditure" under Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, the Corporation shall obtain the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In no event shall the Corporation give any security for such borrowing, to include mortgages and security interests in the personal property of the Corporation, without the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 7.06. <u>Annual Report of Auditor</u>. The Chief Financial Officer shall submit to the directors an annual report of all income and disbursement prepared by an independent Certified Public Accountant firm. The auditor shall answer to and report to the Board of Directors through the Chief Financial Officer its findings pertaining to the Corporation audit.

ARTICLE VIII
COMMITTEES OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors may, by resolution passed by a majority of the whole Board, designate one or more committees, including but not limited to an Executive Committee, each committee to consist of three or more of the directors of the Corporation, which to the extent provided in the resolution, shall have and may exercise the powers of the Board of Directors in the management of the business and affairs of the Corporation, except where action of the Board of Directors is required by law, and may authorize the seal of the Corporation to be affixed to all papers that may require it. Such committee or committees shall have such name or names as may be determined from time to time by resolution adopted by the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE IX PROPERTY

- 9.01. General Powers Regarding Property. Subject to Sections 9.02 and 9.03 below, the Corporation, acting through its Board of Directors, shall have the right to own, to buy or sell, to alienate or convey, and to mortgage or pledge any or all of its property, personal, real or mixed, in such way as the Board of Directors may in its judgment think is beneficial to the Corporation and in furtherance of its general purpose as declared in the Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, including the right to lend, rent, or lease any or all of its property on such terms as the Board of Directors may think is in furtherance of the main purpose for which the Corporation is established.
- "9.02. No Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Without Approval by Board of Directors of Corporation and of Baptist General Convention. No real property or personal property having a value in excess of \$100,000.00 may be purchased, acquired other than by gift, sold, transferred, assigned or conveyed by the Corporation, unless the Board of Directors of the Corporation and the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma approve such purchase or sale and determine that such sale shall be necessary or convenient and for the best interests of the Corporation. No acquisition, purchase, assignment, conveyance or transfer of such property or any interest therein either to or from the Corporation shall at any time be made by the Corporation until such purchase, acquisition, assignment, transfer or conveyance shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such transfer or conveyance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation."
- 9.03. No Encumbrances of Property Without Approval of Board of Directors of Corporation and of Baptist General Convention. The Corporation shall not pledge, hypothecate, mortgage, assign, or grant a security interest or lien in or to any real or personal property owned or to be acquired by the Corporation without the prior approval of the Board of Directors of the Corporation and of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation until such approval has been obtained by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

ARTICLE X
<u>LIABILITY</u>; INDEMNIFICATION OF DIRECTORS,
<u>OFFICERS</u>, EMPLOYEES AND VOLUNTEERS

- 10.01. <u>Limited Liability</u>. To the maximum extent permitted by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma, and any other provision of Oklahoma law, as now existing or as it may hereafter be amended, no director of this Corporation shall be personally liable to this Corporation for monetary damages for breach of fiduciary duty as a director.
- 10.02. <u>Indemnification of Directors</u>. The Corporation shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding if he acted in good faith and in a manner he reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the Corporation, and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, and reasonable cause to believe that his conduct was not unlawful.
- 10.03. <u>Authorization of Indemnification</u>. Any indemnification under Section 10.02 of this Article (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation upon a determination that indemnification of the director, officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Section 10.02. Such determination shall be made by the Board of Directors by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of directors who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable, a quorum of disinterested directors so directs, by independent legal counsel in a written opinion.
- 10.04. <u>Non-Exclusive Indemnification</u>. The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the law of the State of Oklahoma, as now or hereafter enacted; the Certificate of Incorporation; any agreement; and any insurance purchased by the Corporation. Such rights shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a director, officer, employee or agent and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such a person.
- 10.05. <u>Insurance</u>. The Corporation shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, employee or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provisions of this Article X.

## ARTICLE XI CONFLICT OF INTEREST

11.01. <u>Definition</u>. A director or officer of the Corporation shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such director or officer has existing or potential financial or other interests which might impair or might reasonably appear to impair such person's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his or her responsibilities, or (b) if such director or officer is aware that such director or a member of his or her family (which for purposes of this provision shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the director or officer) is an officer, employee,

member, partner, director, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interest. Any director or officer who is uncertain whether he or she has a conflict of interest may request the Board of Directors to determine whether a conflict of interest exists and the Board of Directors shall resolve the question by majority vote, with the requesting director abstaining.

- 11.02. <u>Disqualification Because of Conflict of Interest</u>. A director or officer of this Corporation having a conflict of interest shall be disqualified from dealing or contracting with the Corporation as a vendor, purchaser or otherwise; and any transaction, contract or act of the Corporation with such director or any member of his family as defined in 11.01 above having a conflict of interest shall be void.
- 11.03. <u>Disclosure of Conflict of Interest</u>. The fact that such director or officer has a conflict of interest shall be disclosed or shall be known to all of the directors, or to such members thereof as shall be present at any meeting of the Board of Directors at which action upon any such contract, transaction or act shall be taken. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the director or officer having a conflict of interest declared such conflict of interest.

## ARTICLE XII DISSOLUTION

- 12.01. <u>Dissolution</u>. The Corporation may be dissolved by an affirmative vote of a majority of all the directors of the Corporation then in office at a meeting called for the purpose of considering such a proposal or, if there be not any directors, by order of a court of competent jurisdiction.
- 12.02. Disposition of Property. Upon final dissolution of the Corporation or disbanding of the Corporation, title to the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be vested in The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In the event The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall not be an organization qualified as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code upon dissolution or disbanding of the Corporation, then the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be distributed to such other like organizations which then qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as the Board of Directors of this Corporation may select and designate; and in no event shall any of said assets or property, in the event of dissolution thereof, go or be distributed to any private individuals, either for the reimbursement of any sum subscribed, donated or contributed by such private individuals, or for any other purpose.

## ARTICLE XIII FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall be as the Board of Directors shall designate and may be changed from time to time as deemed for the best interests of the Corporation.

#### ARTICLE XIV TAX EXEMPT STATUS

- 14.01. <u>Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes</u>. The Corporation is organized exclusively as a not-for-profit Corporation as defined in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Code.
- 14.02. <u>Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status</u>. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its directors, officers, or other private persons, except that

the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt under Section 501(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### ARTICLE XV SEAL

The seal of the Corporation shall consist of a flatfaced die with the following words and figures cut or engraved thereon:

## ARTICLE XVI AMENDMENTS, SEVERANCE, CAPTIONS, CONSTRUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

- 16.01. <u>Amendments</u>. These Bylaws will be reviewed annually. They may be repealed, amended, or added to, at any meeting of the Board of Directors by the affirmative vote of a majority of the directors attending such meeting, or by written assent of a majority of the directors, so long as such amendments are not inconsistent with law, and so long as such amendments do not disqualify the Corporation under Section 501(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or the corresponding provision of any future United States Revenue Law, except that Sections 3.01, 3.03, 3.04 A, 3.07, 7.05, 9.02, 9.03 and 16.01 of these Bylaws may not be amended without the approval of the Board of Directors of The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
- 16.02. <u>Severance</u>. If any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or provision of these Bylaws is void or illegal, it shall not impair nor affect the rest of these Bylaws and the directors do hereby declare that they would have adopted and approved the rest of these Bylaws if such void or illegal provision had been excluded therefrom.
- 16.03. <u>Captions</u>. The captions contained in these Bylaws are for convenience and reference and in no way define, describe, extend, or limit the scope or intent of these Bylaws or the intent of any provision contained herein.
- 16.04. <u>Construction and Definitions</u>. Unless the context otherwise require, the general provisions, rules of construction and definitions contained in the general provisions of the Oklahoma General Corporation Act shall govern the construction of these Bylaws.

#### KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the undersigned, being the President and Secretary of the above named Corporation, incorporated, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, consisting of sixteen (XVI) Articles, were duly approved and adopted as the Bylaws of the Corporation on this 21st day of May, 1996, by a resolution of a majority of the Board of Directors.

#### **AMENDED BYLAWS**

OF

#### OKLAHOMA BAPTIST HOMES FOR CHILDREN, INC.

#### ARTICLE I

#### OFFICES/MEMBERSHIP

- 1.01. <u>Registered Office</u>. The registered office shall be located at 3800 North May in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112.
- 1.02. <u>Principal Office</u>. The principal office of the Corporation is 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73112.

The Board of Trustees shall have full power and authority to change the principal office of the Corporation from one location to another as the Board of Trustees deems advisable. Any such change shall be noted in the Bylaws by the Secretary in this section to state the new location.

- 1.03. Other Offices. The Corporation may also have offices at such other places within the State of Oklahoma as the Board of Trustees may from time to time determine or the business of the Corporation may require.
- 1.04. <u>Members of Corporation</u>. The subscribers of the original Certificate of Incorporation constitute the members of the Corporation upon organization, and for the purpose of adopting any bylaws, and transacting any other business. Hereafter, the duly elected trustees of the Corporation shall be its members for all purposes.

#### ARTICLE II

#### PURPOSES AND POWERS

2.01. <u>Purposes and Powers</u>. The purposes of the Corporation shall be charitable, eleemosynary, religious, to provide care for children, and to provide preventive and redemptive services for children, parents and family as mandated by the scriptures as a ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. This Corporation is an auxiliary Corporation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma under the terms of Article VI of the Convention's Bylaws. In furtherance of

its general purpose, the Corporation shall perform any or all of the following:

- A. To provide and maintain facilities known as the Baptist Children's Homes and Boys Ranch Town or such other facilities as may be established for dependent, neglected, and/or needy children of the State of Oklahoma.
- B. To establish and maintain a child care program to meet the spiritual, physical, mental, and emotional needs of homeless and dependent children;
- C. To establish Christian homes in the State of Oklahoma as foster homes for children;
- D. To provide group care and treatment for children whose needs cannot at the time be adequately met in a family;
- E. To provide supportive and supplementary services for children in need of assistance while the child is living in his or her home with natural or foster parents;
- F. To provide and maintain facilities known as Crisis Pregnancy Centers and/or such other facilities as may be established for providing help to women in crisis pregnancies, promoting sanctity of life and giving Christian witness.
- G. To secure and maintain Child Placement license, residential, and other licenses as needed.
- H. To exercise any and all rights and powers which a corporation may now or hereafter exercise.

The purposes specified herein shall be construed both as purposes and powers and shall be in no wise limited or restricted by reference to, or inference from, the terms of any other clause in this or any other Article hereof, but the purposes and powers specified in each of the clauses herein shall be regarded as independent purposes and powers, and the enumeration of specific purposes and power shall not be construed to limit or restrict in any manner the meanings of general terms or of the general powers of the Corporation; nor shall the expression of one thing be deemed to exclude another, although it be of like nature not expressed.

In carrying out the spirit and letter of the corporate purposes and objectives of the Corporation, as expressed in its Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, the Corporation shall have the following powers:

- A. To purchase and hold title in fee simple absolute, without any remainder or reversion, any real estate, and to convey, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge, exchange or otherwise dispose of any such reality.
- B. To purchase and own personal property, which is suitable, necessary, useful or advisable for the transaction of the business of the Corporation,

- C. To enter upon, improve, develop, manage and otherwise deal with such real property.
- D. To receive by gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, and to hold, barter, convey, exchange, expand, distribute, sell, invest, and otherwise dispose of all money or property, real, personal, or mixed, either absolutely or in trust to be used, either the principal or income therefrom, as may be directed in the furtherance of any of the above-mentioned purpose or any other purpose within its corporate powers;
- E. To prosecute or defend any actions or suits in which the Corporation is involved;
- F. To exercise any and all powers (including the borrowing of money and securing the same; the holding, administration, and disposition of property; the making of conveyances, assignments, and contracts; and incurring of obligations) which may be conferred by law, or which may be necessary, incidental or convenient to the general powers and object of this Corporation; and
- G. The Corporation is authorized to exercise any and all powers authorized by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma.

#### ARTICLE III

#### TRUSTEES

- 3.01. <u>Powers/Exclusivity</u>. Subject to the limitations provided by law and the Certificate of Incorporation of this Corporation, all corporate powers and purposes shall be exercised by or under the authority of a Board of Trustees, and the business and affairs of such Corporation shall be managed and conducted exclusively by the Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors.
- 3.02. <u>Number of Trustees</u>. The number of voting trustees shall be not less than five (5) and no more than twenty-five (25).
- 3.03. <u>Criteria for Selection of Trustees</u>. A trustee shall be a member of a Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

To assure representation from all areas of the State of Oklahoma, the membership of the Board of Trustees shall be drawn from the following geographical areas:

- 1. Twenty percent (20%) of the trustees shall be from the Oklahoma City metropolitan area.
- 2. Twenty percent (20%) of the trustees shall be from the Tulsa metropolitan area.
- 3. Sixty percent (60%) of the trustees shall be from the four quadrants of the state excluding the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. The four quadrants of the State of Oklahoma shall be created by a north-south line consisting of Interstate Highway 35 and an east-west line consisting of Interstate Highway 40 and shall exclude the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. There shall be an equal number of trustees from each quadrant. No more than two (2) trustees from each quadrant shall be from the same city or town.

Of the trustees, seventy-five percent (75%) shall be lay persons and twenty-five percent (25%) shall be ordained ministers of the Gospel/other church related vocations or their spouses.

An employee of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

#### 3.04. Election and Term of Office.

A. <u>Election</u>. All trustees shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma by a majority of those messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. These trustees shall be nominated by the Convention's Committee on Nominations.

#### B. Term of Office.

1. <u>Initial Trustees</u>. Except for the interim trustees provided in Article Eight of the Certificate of Incorporation whose terms expire upon the election of initial trustees provided herein, there will be twenty (20) initial trustees of the Corporation. The terms of the initial trustees shall be as follows: five (5) trustees shall serve a term of one (1) year, five (5) trustees shall serve a term of two (2) years, five (5) trustees shall serve a term of three (3) years, and five (5) trustees shall serve terms of four (4) years each.

- 2. <u>Term After Initial Trustees</u>. After the election of the initial trustees, a trustee shall serve a term of four (4) years, except if the trustee is elected to fill a vacancy, the trustee shall serve out the term of the prior trustee.
- 3.05. <u>Ex Officio Members</u>. The Executive Director of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or his designee shall be an **ex officio** member of the Board of Trustees. He shall not count as one of the twenty-five (25) trustees.

#### 3.06. Vacancies.

- A. Vacancies may be filled by a majority of the remaining trustees of the Corporation then in office. Any interim trustee so chosen shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. Any interim trustee so chosen shall also serve until such interim trustee's successor is duly elected and shall qualify, unless such trustee resigns or is removed.
- B. A vacancy or vacancies in the Board of Trustees shall be deemed to exist in the event of the death, resignation or removal of any trustee, or if the Board of Trustees by resolution declares vacant the office of a trustee who has been declared of unsound mind by an order of court or convicted of a felony. In the event any person elected to the Board of Trustees fails to attend two (2) consecutive meetings of the trustees without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the Corporation, his or her position on the Board may be deemed to have become vacant, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.
- C. Any trustee may resign effective on giving written notice to the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, unless notice specifies a later time for that resignation to become effective. If the resignation of a trustee is effective at a future time, the Board of Trustees may elect a successor to take office when the resignation becomes effective.
- 3.07. <u>Removal of Trustee(s)</u>. Any trustee may be removed, for cause, by a majority vote at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.
- 3.08. <u>Place of Meetings</u>. The Board of Trustees may hold meetings, both regular and special, either within or without the State of Oklahoma at a place which has been designated from time to time by the Office of the President.
- 3.09. <u>Annual/Regular Meetings</u>. An annual meeting of the Board of Trustees for the purpose of election of officers of the Corporation and the transaction of any other business as may be properly brought before such meeting shall be held on the first Tuesday in December of

each year. In addition to the annual meeting, the Board of Trustees will hold a meeting in each other quarter of the calendar year.

Other regular meetings of the Board may be held at such time as shall from time to time be determined by the Board.

- 3.10. Quorum. At all meetings of the Board, a majority of trustees shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and the act of a majority of the trustees present at any meeting shall be the act of the Board of Trustees, except as may be otherwise specifically provided by law or by the Certificate of Incorporation. If a quorum shall not be present at any meeting of the Board of Trustees, the trustees present may adjourn the meeting from time to time, without notice other than announcement at the meeting, until a quorum shall be present.
- 3.11. <u>Voting</u>. Each trustee shall have one (1) vote on each matter presented to the Board for a vote. No trustee may vote by proxy.

#### 3.12. Special Meetings.

- A. Special meetings of the Board for any purpose or purposes may be called at any time by the Chairperson of the Board or President, or if either of them are absent or unable to act, by any Vice Chairperson, Vice President or Secretary, when, in such person's judgment, a matter of sufficient importance requires the immediate attention of the entire Board of Trustees. By unanimous consent of the trustees, special meetings of the Board may be held without notice at any time and place.
- B. Special meetings shall be called by the Chairperson of the Board, President or Secretary in like manner and on like notice, if any, on the written request of eleven (11) trustees.
- C. No business shall be considered at any special meeting other than the purposes mentioned in the notice unless the trustees present waive this section.
- 3.13. <u>Continued Meetings</u>. A quorum of the trustees may adjourn any trustees' meeting to meet again at a stated day and hour; provided, however, that in the absence of a quorum a majority of the trustees present at any trustees' meeting, either regular or special, may adjourn to a later date but may not transact any business until a quorum has been secured. At any continued meeting at which a required number of trustees shall be present, any business may be transacted which might have been transacted at the meeting as originally notified.
- 3.14. <u>Notice of Continued Meetings</u>. Notice of the time and place of holding an adjourned meeting which is to be continued at a later date need not be given to absent trustees if the time and place is fixed at the adjourned meeting.

- 3.15. <u>Telephonic Meetings</u>. Members of the Board of Trustees, or of any committee thereof, may participate in a meeting of such Board or committee by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment that enables all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other. Such participation shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.
- 3.16. <u>Action Without Meeting</u>. Unless otherwise restricted by the Certificate of Incorporation or these Bylaws, any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Board of Trustees or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if a written consent to such action is signed by all members of the Board or of such committee as the case may be, and such written consent is filed with the minutes of proceedings of the Board or committee.
- 3.17. <u>Fees and Compensation</u>. No trustee (as such) of the Corporation shall receive, directly or indirectly, any salary or compensation from the Corporation, but may receive reimbursement for personal expenses actually incurred in carrying out their responsibilities as trustee.
- 3.18. <u>Maintenance and Inspection of Amended Bylaws</u>. The Corporation shall keep at its principal office, the original or a copy of the Bylaws as amended to date, which shall be open to inspection by the trustees at all times during office hours.
- 3.19. <u>Maintenance and Inspection of Other Corporation Records</u>. The accounting books and records and written actions of and minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Trustees and any committee or committees of the Board of Trustees shall be kept at the principal office of the Corporation. The minutes and actions shall be kept in written form and the accounting books and records shall be kept either in written or in any other form capable of being converted into written form. Every trustee shall have the absolute right at any reasonable time to inspect all minutes, accounting books, records and documents of every kind and the physical properties of the Corporation.

#### ARTICLE IV

#### **NOTICES**

4.01. <u>Notice of Annual/Regular Meeting of Board of Trustees</u>. The Secretary of the Corporation shall cause written notice of annual and regular meetings of the Board of Trustees to be given to each member of the Board of Trustees at least ten (10) days prior to any meeting of the Board of Trustees. Such notices shall set forth the date, time, and place of the annual and regular meeting and shall be addressed to each trustee at the addresses that appear on the books of

the Corporation or at such other address as supplied by such trustee. Delivery of notices shall be deemed sufficient if deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid; delivery of electronic transmission of facsimile copies; or personally delivered.

- 4.02. Notice of Special Meetings of Board of Trustee. Except as specified in the paragraphs 3.15, 3.16 and 4.03, written notice of the place, date, hour, and the purposes of all special meetings shall be delivered to each trustee. Notices to trustees of special meetings shall be in writing and delivered personally or mailed to the trustees at their addresses appearing on the books of the Corporation, or at such other address as may be supplied by said trustee for the purpose of notice. In case such notice is mailed or sent by facsimile transmission, it shall be deposited in the United States Mail or sent by facsimile transmission in the place in which the principal office of the Corporation is located at least five (5) days prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. In case such notice is delivered personally, it shall be so delivered at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the time of the holding of the meeting. Such mailing, facsimile transmission, or delivery as provided above shall be due, legal, and personal notice to such trustee.
- 4.03. <u>Waiver of Notice</u>. Whenever any notice is required to be given under the provisions of law or of the Certificate of Incorporation or of these Bylaws, a waiver in writing signed by the trustee to such notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to notice. Attendance of a person at a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except when the person attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting, at the beginning of the meeting, to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

#### ARTICLE V

#### **OFFICERS**

- 5.01. <u>Officers Designated</u>. The elective officers of this Corporation shall consist of a Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, one or more Vice-Chairpersons, the President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, and a Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation.
- 5.02. <u>Election Term</u>. The Chairperson of the Board and the Vice-Chairpersons of the Board shall be elected from among the members of the trustees for terms of one (1) year and until their successors are elected. The President shall be elected by the trustees of said Corporation and shall serve until his successor is elected. The Vice-Presidents, Secretary, and Chief Financial Officer shall be recommended by the President and elected by the trustees and shall serve until their successors are elected.
  - 5.03. Designated Lesser Officers. In addition to the above elective officers, the

Board of Trustees shall designate such additional lesser officers as it deems necessary or desirable, such as assistant secretaries with such powers and duties as may be determined by the Board of Trustees from time to time.

#### 5.04. Removal and Resignation.

- A. Any officer may be removed, either with or without cause, by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees, at any regular or special meeting there of.
- B. Any officer may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Board of Trustees, or to the President, or to the Secretary of the Corporation. Any such resignation shall take effect at the date of the receipt of such notice or at any later time specified therein; and, unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.
- 5.05. <u>Vacancies</u>. If the office of any officer becomes vacant by reason of death, resignation, retirement, disqualification, removal from office, or otherwise, the Trustees then in office, by a vote of a majority of the members of the Board, may choose a successor or successors, who shall hold office for the unexpired term in respect of which such vacancy occurred.
- 5.06. <u>Filling More Than One Office</u>. Any two offices of the Corporation may be held by the same person, except that no officer shall execute, acknowledge or verify any instrument in more than one capacity if the instrument is required by law or the Certificate of Incorporation or the Bylaws to be executed, acknowledged or verified by two or more officers.

#### ARTICLES VI

#### **DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

- 6.01. <u>Chairperson of the Board</u>. The Chairperson of the Board of Trustees shall preside over all meetings of the Trustees; shall be their official spokesperson and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to that office.
- 6.02. <u>Vice-Chairpersons of the Board</u>. There shall be one or more Vice-Chairpersons of the Board of Trustees. It shall be the duty of each of the Vice-Chairpersons to act for the Chairperson in the absence or incapacity of said Chairperson; and to perform such designated duties as may be determined by the Board of Trustees.
- 6.03. <u>President</u>. The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and, subject to the control of the trustees, shall supervise and control generally all the business and affairs of the Corporation, including:

- A. He shall, after consulting with the Board of Trustees, appoint all committees of the Board of Trustees and shall be an ex-officio (non-voting) member of each committee.
- B. He shall, when acting with the approval of the Chairman of the Administrative Committee, open bank accounts for the benefit of and in the name of the Corporation as the needs of the Corporation require, and he, or his designee(s), shall sign or countersign, as may be necessary all such bills, notes, checks, contracts, and other instruments as may pertain to the ordinary course of the Corporation's business.
- C. He shall execute bonds, mortgages, and other contracts requiring a seal under the seal of the Corporation, except where required or permitted by law to be otherwise signed and executed and except where the signing and execution thereof shall be expressly delegated by the Board of Trustees to some other officer or agent of the Corporation.
- D. At the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees, he shall submit a complete report of the operations of the Corporation's affairs as existing at the close of each year and shall report to the Board of Trustees from time to time all such matters coming to his attention and relating to the interest of the Corporation as should be brought to the attention of the Board.
- E. He shall have such usual powers and duties of supervision and management as may pertain to the Office of the President and shall have such other powers and duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Trustees or the Bylaws.
- F. In connection with the annual report submitted by the Board of Trustees, the President shall submit to the Convention for publication in its annual minutes a report of all income and disbursements.
- 6.04. <u>Vice President.</u> There shall be one or more Vice-Presidents, and within the area of duties and responsibilities prescribed for each of them by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the President, each Vice-President shall assist the President in performing the work of the Corporation under the supervision of the President within the areas of his prescribed duties and responsibilities.
- 6.05. <u>Secretary.</u> The Secretary of the Corporation shall keep a record of all minutes of each meeting of the Board of Trustees, and shall perform all duties which are usual and incident to that office.
- 6.06. <u>Chief Financial Officer</u>. The Chief Financial Officer of the Corporation shall:

- A. Have the care and custody of all corporate funds, securities and properties of the Corporation, and shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books belonging to the Corporation;
- B. Deposit all monies, and other valuable effects, in the name and to the credit of the Corporation in such depositories as may be designated by the Board of Trustees;
- C. Keep separate, apart, and inviolate all funds given to the Corporation in trust, or with limitations as to the income or use thereof, and the investments thereof shall be made as directed by the Board of Trustees;
- D. Disburse the funds of the Corporation as may be ordered by the Board of Trustees;
- E. Render to the President and Trustees, at the regular meetings of the Board or whenever they may require it, an account of all transactions made as Chief Financial Officer and of the financial condition of the Corporation.
- F. In the event the Chief Financial Officer is unable to perform his duties by reason of absence or incapacity, the President of the Corporation shall act as the Chief Financial Officer and shall be empowered to perform all of the duties required of the office.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### RECEIPT, INVESTMENT AND DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS, ACCOUNTING OF ASSETS, BORROWING FUNDS AND AUDITORS AND AUDITS

- 7.01. <u>Funds</u>. The Board of Trustees may from time to time authorize additional persons to draw upon the funds of the Corporation, whether by check or otherwise.
- 7.02. <u>Trust Funds</u>. Any funds received in trust or for a specific purpose shall be maintained by the Corporation in such a manner as to be able to account for such funds to insure they are being used for the purposes for which they were given. All funds received by the Corporation in trust shall be turned over to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for management.
- 7.03. <u>Disbursement of Funds</u>. Except as funds are applied to the expenses of the routine operation of this Corporation, no funds or property of this Corporation shall be disbursed except for a proper corporate purpose and unless an adequate and full consideration is received therefor.

7.04. Loans. This Corporation shall comply with Article V Section 4 of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma and in accordance therewith the Corporation may borrow such sums as may be necessary and essential to the routine, prudent, and efficient operation of the Corporation in carrying out its corporate purposes, provided that the aggregate amount of debt incurred by the Corporation, less any indebtedness due and owing to or obtained from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, shall not exceed the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000); provided that, in the event the Corporation shall need to borrow sums in excess of the aggregate amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) (exclusive of any amounts owed or obtained from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma), which sum shall be determined to be a "Major Expenditure" under Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, the Corporation shall obtain the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In no event shall the Corporation give any security for such borrowing, to include mortgages and security interests in the personal property of the Corporation, without the prior written approval of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

7.05. <u>Annual Report of Auditor</u>. The Chief Financial Officer shall submit to the Trustees an annual report of all income and disbursement prepared by an independent Certified Public Accountant firm. The auditor shall answer to and report to the Board of Trustees through the Chief Financial Officer its findings pertaining to the Corporation audit.

#### ARTICLE VIII

#### **COMMITTEES OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees may, by resolution passed by a majority of the whole Board, designate one or more committees, including but not limited to an Executive Committee, each committee to consist of three (3) or more of the trustees of the Corporation, which to the extent provided in the resolution, shall have and may exercise the powers of the Board of Trustees in the management of the business and affairs of the Corporation, except where action of the Board of Trustees is required by law, and may authorize the seal of the Corporation to be affixed to all papers that may require it. Such committee or committees shall have such name or names as may be determined from time to time by resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE IX

#### PROPERTY

- 9.01. General Powers Regarding Property. Subject to Sections 9.02 and 9.03 below, the Corporation, acting through its Board of Trustees, shall have the right to own, to buy or sell, to alienate or convey, and to mortgage or pledge any or all of its property, personal, real or mixed, in such way as the Board of Trustees may in its judgment think is beneficial to the Corporation and in furtherance of its general purpose as declared in the Certificate of Incorporation and in these Bylaws, including the right to lend, rent, or lease any or all of its property on such terms as the Board of Trustees may think is in furtherance of the main purpose for which the Corporation is established.
- 9.02. No Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Without Approval by Board of Trustees of Corporation and of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No personal property having a value in excess of \$100,000, and no real property, may be purchased, acquired other than by gift, sold, transferred, assigned or conveyed by the Corporation, unless the Board of Trustees of the Corporation and the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma approves such purchase or sale and determines that such sale shall be necessary or convenient and for the best interests of the Corporation. No acquisition, purchase, assignment, conveyance, or transfer of such property or any interest therein either to or from the Corporation shall at any time be made by the Corporation until such purchase, acquisition, assignment, transfer or conveyance shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such transfer or conveyance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.
- 9.03. No Encumbrances of Property Without Approval of Board of Trustees of Corporation and of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The Corporation shall not pledge, hypothecate, mortgage, assign, or grant a security interest or lien in or to any real or personal property owned or to be acquired by the Corporation without the prior approval of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation and of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation until such approval has been obtained by a vote of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such encumbrance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

## ARTICLE X

# <u>LIABILITY: INDEMNIFICATION OF TRUSTEES,</u> OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES AND VOLUNTEERS

- 10.01. <u>Limited liability</u>. To the maximum extent permitted by the General Corporation Act of the State of Oklahoma, and any other provision of Oklahoma law, as now existing or as it may hereafter be amended, no trustee of this Corporation shall be personally liable to this Corporation for monetary damages for breach of fiduciary duty as a trustee.
- 10.02. <u>Indemnification of Trustees</u>. The Corporation shall indemnify any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative, or investigative by reason of the fact that he is or was a trustee, officer, employee, or agent of the Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, officer, employee, or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust, or other enterprise, against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines, and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him in connection with such action, suit or proceeding if he acted in good faith and in a manner he reasonably believed to be in or not opposed to the best interests of the Corporation, and, with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, and reasonable cause to believe that his conduct was not unlawful.
- 10.03. <u>Authorization of Indemnification</u>. Any indemnification under Section 10.02 of this Article (unless ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation upon a determination that indemnification of the trustee, officer, employee, or agent is proper in the circumstances because he has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in Section 10.02. Such determination shall be made by the Board of Trustees by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of trustees who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding; or if such quorum is not obtainable, or, even if obtainable, a quorum of disinterested trustees so directs, by independent legal counsel in a written opinion.
- 10.04. <u>Non-Exclusive Indemnification</u>. The indemnification provided by this Article shall not be deemed exclusive of any other rights to which those seeking indemnification may be entitled under the law of the State of Oklahoma, as now or hereafter enacted; the Certificate of Incorporation; any agreement; and any insurance purchased by the Corporation. Such rights shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a trustee, officer, employee or agent and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, and administrators of such a person.
- 10.05. <u>Insurance</u>. The Corporation shall have power to purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a trustee, officer, employee or agent of the

Corporation, or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, officer, employee, or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise against any liability asserted against him and incurred by him in any such capacity, or arising out of his status as such, whether or not the Corporation would have the power to indemnify him against such liability under the provisions of this Article X.

#### ARTICLE XI

## CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- 11.01. <u>Definition</u>. A trustee or officer of the Corporation shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such trustee or officer has existing or potential financial or other interests which might impair or might reasonably appear to impair such person's independent, unbiased judgment in the discharge of his or her responsibilities, or (b) if such trustee or officer is aware that such trustee or a member of his or her family (which for purposes of this provision shall be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the trustee or officer) is an officer, employee, member, partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interest. Any trustee or officer who is uncertain whether he or she has a conflict of interest may request the Board of Trustees to determine whether a conflict of interest exists and the Board of Trustees shall resolve the question by majority vote, with the requesting trustee abstaining.
- 11.02. <u>Disqualification Because of Conflict of Interest</u>. A trustee or officer of this Corporation having a conflict of interest shall be disqualified from dealing or contracting with the Corporation as a vendor, purchaser or otherwise; and any transaction, contract or act of the Corporation with such trustee or any member of his family as defined in 11.01 above having a conflict of interest shall be void.
- 11.03. <u>Disclosure of Conflict of Interest</u>. The fact that such trustee or officer has a conflict of interest shall be disclosed or shall be known to all of the trustees, or to such members thereof as shall be present at any meeting of the Board of Trustees at which action upon any such contract, transaction or act shall be taken. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the trustee or officer having a conflict of interest declared such conflict of interest.

ARTICLE XII

DISSOLUTION

- 12.01. <u>Dissolution</u>. The Corporation may be dissolved by an affirmative vote of a majority of all the trustees of the Corporation then in office at a meeting called for the purpose of considering such a proposal or, if there be not any trustees, by order of a court of competent jurisdiction.
- 12.02. <u>Disposition of Property</u>. Upon final dissolution of the Corporation or disbanding of the Corporation, title to the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be vested in the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. In the event the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma shall not be an organization qualified as exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code upon dissolution or disbanding of the Corporation, then the remaining assets of the Corporation shall be distributed to such other like organizations which then qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as the Board of Trustees of this Corporation may select and designate; and in no event shall any of said assets or property, in the event of dissolution thereof, go or be distributed to any private individuals, either for the reimbursement of any sum subscribed, donated, or contributed by such private individuals, or for any other purpose.

## ARTICLE XIII

## FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall be as the Board of Trustees shall designate and may be changed from time to time as deemed for the best interests of the Corporation.

## ARTICLE XIV

## TAX EXEMPT STATUS

- 14.01. <u>Organization Exclusively for Tax-Exempt Purposes</u>. The Corporation is organized exclusively as a not-for-profit (eleemosynary) corporation as defined in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Code.
- 14.02. <u>Prohibitions to Assure Tax-Exempt Status</u>. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the Corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for service rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the

purposes set forth in Article V hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, the Corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt under Section 501(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code.

## ARTICLE XV

#### **SEAL**

The seal of the Corporation shall consist of a flatfaced die with the following words and figures cut or engraved thereon:

## ARTICLE XVI

## AMENDMENTS, SEVERANCE, CAPTIONS, CONSTRUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

16.01. <u>Amendments</u>. These Bylaws will be reviewed annually. They may be repealed, amended, or added to, at any meeting of the Board of Trustees by the affirmative vote of a majority of the trustees attending such meeting, or by written assent of a majority of the trustees, so long as such amendments are not inconsistent with law, and so long as such amendments do not disqualify the Corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, or the corresponding provision of any future United States Revenue Law; except that Sections 3.01, 3.03, 3.04.A, 3.07, 7.05, 9.02, 9.03, and 16.01 of these Bylaws may not be amended without the approval of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

16.02. <u>Severance</u>. If any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, or provision of these Bylaws is void or illegal, it shall not impair nor affect the rest of these Bylaws and the shareholders and trustees do hereby declare that they would have adopted and approved the rest of these Bylaws if such void or illegal provision had been excluded therefrom.

16.03. <u>Captions</u>. The captions contained in these Bylaws are for convenience and reference and in no way define, describe, extend, or limit the scope or intent of these Bylaws or the intent of any provision contained herein.

16.04. <u>Construction and Definitions</u>. Unless the context otherwise requires, the general provisions, rules of construction, and definitions contained in the general provisions of the Oklahoma General Corporation Act shall govern the construction of these Bylaws.

## KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the undersigned, being the President and Secretary of the above named Corporation, incorporated, organized, and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State, do hereby certify that the foregoing Bylaws, as amended, consisting of sixteen (XVI) Articles, were duly approved and adopted as the Bylaws of the Corporation on this 21st day of May, 1996, by a resolution of a majority of the Board of Trustees.

# BYLAWS OF THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY A RELIGIOUS AND EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

Adopted by the Board of Trustees in regular session on July 3, 1984, and amended in regular session on March 16, 1990.

## ARTICLE I

## POWER OF TRUSTEES

## Section 1.

The Board of Trustees shall have the power to manage the property and business of the corporation (referred to in this and the following articles as "University") and shall have the power to carry out any other functions which are permitted by the Charter, or these Bylaws, except insofar as such powers may be limited by law. These powers shall include but shall not be limited to the following:

- 1. Appoint or remove the President and other Officers of the University Corporation in accordance with these Bylaws;
- 2. Approve degrees in courses upon recommendations of the faculty;
- 3. Approve the awarding of honorary degrees upon recommendation of any of the following: Faculty, President, or appropriate Board Committee;
- 4. Establish and review the educational programs of the University after review by the Board Committee on Academic Affairs or Special Committees of Review set up by the President and Chairman of the Board in financial emergency situations;
- 5. Establish annually the budget of the University, which shall be submitted to it upon recommendation of the Board Business Affairs Committee;
- 6. Authorize the construction of new buildings and major renovations of existing buildings;
- 7. Authorize the sale and purchase of land, buildings or major equipment for the use of the University;
- 8. Institute and promote major fundraising efforts of the University;
- 9. Authorize any changes in tuition and fees within the University;
- 10. Authorize Officers or agents of the University to accept gifts for the University;
- 11. Authorize the incurring of debts by the University and securing thereof by mortgage and pledge of real and personal property, tangible and intangible;
- 12. Any other duties or responsibilities which obtain to it under the Charter of Oklahoma Baptist University.

## Section 2.

The Board of Trustees of the University shall not launch any expansion project, major expenditure of capital funds, creation of debt for capital needs, change in Charter or Bylaws, or any significant change in usual operations except upon authority given by a vote of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE II

## MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

## Section 1.

The Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall consist of thirty-two trustees who shall be elected by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma at their annual convention held in November of each year. Each trustee shall be a member of a Southern Baptist church affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Eight trustees of said thirty-two shall be elected at each annual convention of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, four of whom shall be from among the professional clergy (pastors, church staff, directors of missions, etc.) or their spouses and four of whom shall be from among the laymen in the churches. Each trustee shall hold office for a term of four years after he is elected, and no trustee may be elected to immediately succeed himself. An employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist University become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his term of service on the board will terminate.

## Section 2.

Vacancies in the office of the trustees shall occur through resignation, ceasing to be a resident of the State of Oklahoma or member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church in the State of Oklahoma, or death of the trustee, or as the result of his inability or failure to act. Should a vacancy in the office of trustees occur during the interval between the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the vacancy shall be filled at the next annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

In the event any member misses two (2) consecutive meetings of the Board without giving advance notification to the Office of the President of the University, the member shall be considered as having resigned.

## Section 3.

No person shall be eligible for election prior to attaining the age of twenty-one (21) years.

## Section 4.

Any member of the Board of Trustees may be removed from office, for cause, at any meeting of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and by affirmative vote of the Convention.

## Section 5.

All uses of the masculine gender in these bylaws may be construed as meaning either masculine or feminine gender as the case may be.

## ARTICLE III

## OFFICERS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND UNIVERSITY CORPORATION

## Section 1.

The officers of the Board of Trustees shall consist of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, one or more Assistant Secretaries, and Treasurer, all of whom shall be elected annually by the Board of Trustees at its last meeting of the University's fiscal year. For the purpose of executing legal documents in compliance with Oklahoma Law, the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall be synonymous with the office of President of the corporation and Vice Chairman with the office of Vice-President of the corporation. At the March Board Meeting the Board shall elect three trustees to serve as a nominating committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service. These trustees shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and vote of the members present and voting. The nominating committee shall nominate candidates to serve as officers of the Board at the July meeting with opportunity provided at that meeting for nominations to be made from the floor. The term of service for officers of the Board begins at the conclusion of the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma in November.

## Section 2.

All officers of the Board of Trustees shall hold office as such officer for a period of one year, or until their successors are elected.

#### Section 3.

The Chairman and Vice Chairman shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The President of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose. The Chief Financial Officer of the University shall serve as Treasurer of the Corporation and as such shall be an ex officio member of the Board without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board or any committee on which he may serve for any purpose.

## Section 4.

The Board may elect one or more Vice Chairmen, Assistant Secretaries, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for the proper management of the University Corporation.

## Section 5.

All Officers of the University Corporation shall hold office at the discretion of the Board of Trustees and shall be subject to removal by affirmative vote of a majority of the entire membership of the Board of Trustees, without prejudice to any contract rights such Officer may have against the University.

## ARTICLE IV

## POWERS AND DUTIES OF UNIVERSITY CORPORATION OFFICERS

## Section 1.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Trustees, sign all deeds, contracts, bonds, mortgages, and other papers evidencing the official acts of the Board of Trustees where the signature of a presiding officer is required by these bylaws or by custom or practice, and he shall call all special meetings of the Board of Trustees, give notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Board of Trustees as herein provided, appoint all committees and generally exercise such authority as is usually exercised by a chairman or president of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation. He shall also perform any other and further duties as may be determined or assigned to him by the Board of Trustees.

## Section 2.

The Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall perform all the duties of the office of Chairman of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or as a result of the inability of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency absence.

## Section 3.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall keep minutes of the meetings of the board; issue, or cause to be issued, notices of meetings under the direction of the Chairman; have charge of the seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University and affix and attest the same to all instruments which may require the corporate seal of The Oklahoma Baptist University; and shall perform the duties usually performed by a secretary of the Board of Trustees of a religious corporation and any other duties which may be assigned to the secretary by the Board of Trustees.

## Section 4.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees, with the approval of the Board of Trustees and the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University, may authorize an officer of The Oklahoma Baptist University and a person other than the Secretary of the Board of Trustees to affix the corporate seal to any diploma, transcript, or other instrument having to do with the administration of the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University, and to exercise the same authority with regard to the affixing of the corporate seal to such instrument as may be exercised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

## Section 5.

The Assistant Secretary shall perform all the duties of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees in the absence of the Secretary or in the event of the inability of the Secretary to attend a meeting of the Board of Trustees or as a result of the inability of the Secretary to act because of sickness, misfortune, casualty, or emergency.

## Section 6.

The Treasurer shall be the Chief Financial Officer of the University and shall be as Treasurer an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Board. He shall have the duty to keep or cause to be kept full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements and to obey all lawful orders of the Trustees, the President of the University, and the Business Affairs Committee respecting funds, property, and accounts of the University. He shall be responsible for the preparation of any corporate financial reports as may be required by departments of federal or state government. The Treasurer shall, in the name of the University, give receipts for monies or property as shall be required, deposit funds in accordance with resolution and direction of the Business Affairs committee or the Board of Trustees, and safeguard the money of the University. He shall not pay out any money unless by order of the Board of Trustees or under such regulations or with such approval as the Business Affairs committee may prescribe. He shall cooperate with any independent auditors or

certified public accountants retained by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of conducting audits of the accounts of the University, and shall make reports at meetings of the Board of Trustees or the Business Affairs Committee with respect to the financial condition of the university at such time and in such form as the Board or the Committee may duly require. The Treasurer shall give a bond to the University faithfully to perform the duties of his office, and to account for all monies and other matters and things which may come into his hands and possession by virtue of said office, in such amount as the Business Affairs Committee shall direct.

## ARTICLE V

## POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY

## Section 1.

The affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be administered by a President of the University who shall be elected by the Board of Trustees and hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees under the rules of tenure now existing which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. Such tenure shall include a periodic evaluation system by the Board of Trustees and/or its agents. Such evaluation shall also set the salary and compensation for the President for the term acceptable to the Board and the President.

#### Section 2.

The President of the University shall be the Chief Executive and Operational Officer of the University and the official adviser to and executive agent of the Board of Trustees and its executive Committee. The President of Oklahoma Baptist University must be an active member of a cooperating Southern Baptist Church. He shall, as educational and administrative head of the University, exercise a general superintendence over all the affairs of the institution, and bring such matters to the attention of the Board as are appropriate to keep the Board fully informed to meet its policy-making responsibilities. He shall have power, on behalf of the Trustees, to perform all acts, and execute all documents to make effective the actions of the Board or its Executive Committee. Except as otherwise provided in these bylaws he shall be an ex officio member of all committees of the Board without power to vote.

#### Section 3.

The President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall have the power and authority to appoint officers to assist him in the administration of the affairs of the University, including such officers as Vice-Presidents, Deans, Directors, Treasurers, Registrars, and their assistants. The officers so appointed by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall hold office for such periods of time as the President

determines and the tenure of office shall be subject to the will of the President and the contractual employment procedures of the Administrative and Staff Handbook then in force.

#### Section 4.

The members of the faculty of The Oklahoma Baptist University shall be recommended by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and elected by the Board of Trustees at their meeting in July of each year, and the members of the faculty, when their election has been confirmed by the Board of Trustees, shall hold office subject to the rules of the existing contractual employment and tenure which have been approved by the Board of Trustees in the <a href="Faculty Handbook">Faculty Handbook</a> then in force. Nominations of faculty members, however, may be made by the President of The Oklahoma Baptist University and confirmed by the Board of Trustees at any regular or special meeting.

## Section 5.

In the event the office of President of The Oklahoma Baptist University becomes vacant, a special nominating committee of three trustees shall be elected at a meeting of the Board. The committee, at least two of whom shall be in their fourth year of service, shall be elected by open nomination from the floor and secret ballot. At the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, this special nominating committee shall nominate seven trustees to serve as members of the Presidential Search Committee with opportunity provided for nominations to be made from the floor. Election shall be by secret ballot. If the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is not one of the seven members elected, he shall join the Presidential Search Committee as a voting member. The Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, the Chairman of the Faculty Council, the President of the Alumni Association and the President of the Student Government Association shall serve as ex officio, non-voting members of the Search Committee. In the event any trustee serving on the Presidential Search Committee should cease being a trustee for any reason except for the normal expiration of his elected term, a vacancy shall result and the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees shall appoint another to fill such vacancy. Trustees whose terms expire during the search process shall continue to serve on the Presidential Search Committee.

The Search Committee shall notify in writing all members of the Board of Trustees of the dates and times of the on-campus visit of the candidate to be recommended. A vita of the candidate shall accompany the notification. Members of the Board of Trustees shall have opportunity to participate in the on-campus visit. Before the Search Committee presents the candidate for election, an informal meeting of the candidate and the Board of Trustees shall be held.

## ARTICLE VI

## **MEETINGS**

#### Section 1.

All meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held upon the campus of The Oklahoma Baptist University in Shawnee, Oklahoma. The Board of Trustees shall hold three meetings each year and such other special meetings as may be called by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, or, in his absence from the State of Oklahoma, by the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees. The first meeting shall be held in November or December, following the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at which time the Board of Trustees shall orient newly-elected trustees, receive reports, and conduct any and all other business which it may desire to consider concerning the affairs of The Oklahoma Baptist University or its own affairs. The second meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of March, at which time the Board of Trustees shall adopt the budget for the University, elect returning faculty, receive reports and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The third meeting shall be held on a date selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees during the month of July, at which time the Board of Trustees shall elect any new members of the faculty, receive reports, adopt strategic objectives for the upcoming year, and consider any and all other business which the Board of Trustees may desire to transact. The dates of regular meetings and of all special meetings and the hour and place thereof shall be selected by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each trustee not less than seven days before the meeting. Notice of the time and place of all special meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be mailed to each trustee in such time and manner as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees deems reasonable and proper, except as hereinafter provided for amendment to the Bylaws. Notice of special meetings shall include a brief summary of the purpose of the meeting and the business expected to come before it.

## Section 2.

The presence of at least fifty percent of the Board of Trustees shall constitute a quorum and be sufficient to enable the Board of Trustees to pass any resolution or motion, receive reports or recommendations, and transact any business which may properly come before it.

### Section 3.

The meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with and governed by parliamentary law, insofar as is practicable, as laid down in Robert's Rules of Order.

#### Section 4.

No notice of the time, place, or purpose of any meeting of the Board of Trustees, except for amendment of the Bylaws, whether prescribed by law, by the Charter or the Bylaws, need be given to any member of the Board who attends in person, or who in writing, executed and filed with the records of the meeting either before or after the holding thereof, waives such notice.

## ARTICLE VII

## **ACTION WITHOUT FORMAL MEETING**

## Section 1.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Trustees or by any committee thereof may be taken without a formal meeting. Meetings may be conducted by mail, telegram, cable, teleconference, or in any other way the trustees shall decide. However, a written consent setting forth the action so taken and signed by all members of the Board or of a committee, as the case may be, must be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board or the committee.

## ARTICLE VIII

## COMMITTEES

## Section 1.

There may be such special or ad hoc committees as the Board of Trustees may from time to time establish for the discharge of particular duties.

## Section 2.

There shall be the standing committees specified in this Article. Members and chairmen of standing committees shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board after consultation with the President, annually, at or following the November-December meeting of the Board of Trustees. Except as provided in these bylaws the Chairman of the Board and the President of the University shall be ex officio members of all standing committees, and each standing committee shall include at least five additional Trustees. Except where otherwise provided in this Article, additional ex officio members, including persons who are not on the Board of Trustees, may be enlisted as resource persons. The chairman of each standing committee and a majority of its members shall be Trustees, however.

## Section 3.

The Board of Trustees may at any time discontinue any of its standing committees for such time as may be determined, and the duties of any committee so discontinued shall be performed during such discontinuance by the Executive Committee.

## Section 4.

The chairman of any committee, with the consent of the chairman of the Board, may request the President of the University to appoint an Administrative Officer of the university or a member of the administrative staff to serve as a liaison between the committee and the office of the President. Such liaison person shall assist the committee in the carrying out of its duties.

#### Section 5.

Except as provided in this section, all standing committees shall meet at least two times annually.

## Section 6.

The Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist University shall be organized into the following committees:

The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers of the Board (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary) and the Chairmen of the Administrative Committees. The presence of at least 50 percent of the members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the President of the University concerning affairs of the University when the Board of Trustees is not in session, to make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and to perform such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall receive from the Secretary annually in July the record of attendance and participation by all Board members during the fiscal year preceding. In the event that a trustee has failed to meet the responsibilities of service, the committee shall request from the trustee an indication of his desire for continuing service on the Board or his intention to resign in light of the circumstances and report his response to the Chairman of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma's Nominating Committee. The Executive Committee shall at all times be subject to and governed by the Board of Trustees of the University.

Administrative Committees: There shall be five standing administrative committees of the Board: Academic Affairs Committee, Business Affairs Committee, Development Committee, Student Development Committee, and the Spiritual Life Committee. The committees and their chairmen shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Board in consultation with the President of the University. The Administrative Committees shall

receive reports from University administrators and consider policies and recommendations regulating the life and function of the University.

#### Section 7. Academic Affairs Committee

The Academic Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall, in cooperation with the President, study and appraise the quality of the academic program, measure the program relative to other comparable institutions in terms of teaching load, class size, student-faculty ratios, instructional expenditures, research programs, and other relevant factors; formulate desirable short and long-range enrollment goals; advise the Business Affairs Committee on the specifications and requirements for financing the academic programs; recommend salary, pension, and other personnel policies concerning the academic and faculty personnel; and shall review matters affecting the faculty of the University; consider proposals on such matters; and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

## Section 8. Business Affairs Committee

The Business Affairs Committee shall be composed of at least five members. It shall review annual operating and capital budgets prepared and presented under the direction of the President and make recommendations with respect thereto to the Board of Trustees. It shall review major financial transactions not provided for in the budget and submit proposed variances with recommendations to the Board of Trustees or Executive Committee. The Chief Financial Officer of the University shall be an ex officio member of the Business Affairs Committee, without power to vote and shall not be counted as a member of the Committee for any purpose.

## Section 9. Development Committee

The Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review and recommend fundraising and public relations programs and report to the Business Affairs Committee on fundraising progress and estimates of income to be received therefrom. It shall report on its activities to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting.

## Section 10. Student Development Committee

The Student Development Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review matters affecting students of the University, other than those relating to the spiritual life and academic program, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

## Section 11. Spiritual Life Committee

The Spiritual Life Committee shall be composed of at least five trustee members. It shall review all matters concerning religious activities and the programs that promote spiritual growth and development at Oklahoma Baptist University, consider proposals on such matters, and report and make recommendations thereon to the Board of Trustees as may be required.

## ARTICLE IX

## INDEMNIFICATION

Each Trustee and Officer of the University shall be indemnified by it against all expenses actually and necessarily incurred by such Trustee or Officer in connection with the defense of any action, suit, or proceeding to which he has been made a part by reason of his being or having been such Trustee or Officer except in relation to matters as which such Trustee or Officer shall be adjudicated in such action, suit, or proceeding to be liable for gross negligence or willful misconduct in the performance of duty.

## ARTICLE X

## **CONFLICTS OF INTERESTS**

A Trustee shall be considered to have a conflict of interest if (a) such Trustee has existing or potential financial or other interests which impair or might reasonably appear to impair such member's independent, unbiased judgement in the discharge of his responsibilities to the University, or (b) such Trustee is aware that a member of his family (which for purposes of this paragraph will be a spouse, parents, siblings, children, and any other relative if the latter reside in the same household as the Trustee), or any organization in which such Trustee (or member of his family) is an officer, director, employee, member. partner, trustee, or controlling stockholder, has such existing or potential financial or other interests. All Trustees shall disclose to the Board any possible conflict of interest at the earliest practicable time. No Trustee shall vote on any matter, under consideration at a Board or committee meeting, in which such Trustee has a conflict of interest. The minutes of such meeting shall reflect that a disclosure was made and that the Trustee having a conflict of interest abstained from voting. Any Trustee who is uncertain whether he has a conflict of interest in any matter may request the Board or committee to determine whether a conflict of interest exists, and the Board or committee shall resolve the question by majority vote.

## ARTICLE XI

## ADMINISTRATOR OF PROPERTY

#### Section 1. Contracts

The Board of Trustees may authorize any officer or agent of the University to enter into any contract or execute and deliver any instrument in the name of or on behalf of the University, and such authority may be general or confined to specific instances.

## Section 2. Checks, Drafts, etc.

All checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued in the name of the University shall be signed by such officer or agent of the University and in such manner as shall from time to time be determined by the Board of Trustees.

## Section 3. Bonding

The Board of Trustees shall require all officers, agents, or employees charged with responsibility for the custody of any of the funds of the University to give bonds in amounts the Board of Trustees deems appropriate, the cost thereof to be paid by the University.

# Section 4. Deposits

All funds of the University shall be deposited to the credit of the University in such banks, trust companies, or other depositories as the Board of Trustees may from time to time select or approve.

## Section 5. Gifts

The Board of Trustees may accept on behalf of the University any contribution, gift, bequest, or device for the general purpose or for any special purposes of the University, and may delegate this authority to appropriate corporate and/or administrative officers. These officers shall make regular reports to the Board of Trustees of all gifts accepted by them in the name of the University.

#### Section 6. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the University shall begin the first day of August and end the last day of July each year.

## ARTICLE XII

## BYLAW AMENDMENT

## Section 1.

These Bylaws may be amended by the Board of Trustees at any meeting, regular or special, by a vote to amend constituting two-thirds of the members present at such a meeting, provided that the notice calling the Board meeting shall announce that amendments to the Bylaws will be voted upon and proposed amendments accompany the notice. Such notice must be mailed at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting to each trustee at his usual place of residence.

## Section 2.

These Bylaws shall stand in the place and stead of and shall be substituted for all other and former Bylaws of the Board of Trustees of The Oklahoma Baptist University which have heretofore been adopted.

## Section 3.

Prior to each March meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall review these Bylaws and suggest any necessary changes thereto.

## Section 4.

The corporate charter of the University or its bylaws cannot be changed without final approval of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma or its Board of Directors.

## 1996 Nominating Committee Report

According to the BGCO Constitution and Bylaws relative to the Board of Directors, due regard shall be given to both geographical and numerical representation; there shall be at least one nominee for each associational area; additional nominees shall be determined on the basis of one nominee for each additional 7,000 resident church members in a given associational area; no associational area shall have more than eight members on the board; there shall be at least sixteen persons who are not ordained ministers of the gospel, including at least eight men and eight women.

- 35. President Graves announced the names of members of the Falls Creek Strategic Planning Committee: Chairman, Scott Neighbors, minister of youth at First Church, Pryor; Stanley Baker, pastor of First Church, Walters; Mike Fetters, minister of youth at Village Church, Oklahoma City; Fred King, pastor of First Church, Kingfisher; John Lincks, minister of music at Arrow Heights Church, Broken Arrow; Zane Newton, minister of youth at First Church, Altus; Bob Shelton, minister of education at Northwest Church, Oklahoma City; Carl Thionnet, director of missions for Concord-Kiowa Association; and Rick Whitaker, minister of education at First Church, Duncan.
- 36. Billy Bissell, messenger and pastor of Boston Avenue Church, Muskogee, made a motion to amend Article II of the Constitution of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma by adding Sections 3, 4, and 5, as follow:

Section 3. A Baptist church shall be defined as one embracing the essential teachings of the New Testament commonly held by Baptist churches, a summary of which is contained in the *Baptist Faith & Message*.

Section 4. Cooperation shall be evidenced by fellowship and cooperation with an association of Southern Baptist churches and the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.

Section 5. Contributing shall be defined as regular, substantial, good faith contribution to mission causes through the Cooperative Program.

The motion was seconded. Bissell spoke in favor of the motion. Wade Burleson, pastor of Emmanuel Church, Enid and First Vice President, BGCO, spoke in opposition. The result of the ballot vote was 352 opposed and 130 in favor; the motion failed.

- 37. Keith Butler, minister of music, Olivet Church, Oklahoma City, led messengers in singing "To God Be the Glory."
- 38. Earl Brady, messenger and lay member of Council Road Church, Bethany, presented the following motion:
  That the Missions Subcommittee of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma be instructed to examine how Oklahoma Baptists can be more aggressively involved in the Oklahoma Prison Ministry through additional funding and organization. Furthermore, that such a study result in a recommendation

to the Board of Directors with a report to be given to Oklahoma Baptists at the next convention meeting in November 1997.

The vote in favor of the motion was unanimous.

- 39. Frank Foutch, director of the Department of Religious Education, BGCO, announced the program "Start Something New." Daniel Caceres, catalytic missionary for Hispanic work in Southeastern Oklahoma, and Lanny Loe, messenger and minister of missions at First Church, Broken Arrow, spoke of ethnic work as an example of starting something new in the area of missions and church planting. Bob Maxey, messenger and minister of education at First Church, Altus, and Jim Brunk, messenger and pastor of First Church, Barnsdall, announced the beginning of new ministries in those churches.
- 40. Dr. Jordan recognized and welcomed new pastors and staff of state churches as they were introduced.
- 41. V. K. Curtis, chief financial officer, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, BGCO, spoke on behalf of that organization. He introduced eleven of the children and teens from the homes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma affirms and encourages the thousands of excellent Southern Baptist public, private, and home-oriented educators; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that we encourage our government representatives at the local, state and federal level to develop the means and methods of returning educational and funding choices to the parents and reject the philosophy of Goals 2000.

Dale Blackwood, messenger from Tulsa, Parkview, commented that the last paragraph was too vague. The resolution was adopted.

(3) Randy Childers presented Resolution No. 3 and moved for its adoption.

#### Resolution No. 3

## RESOLUTION CONCERNING GAMBLING IN CASINOS IN OKLAHOMA

WHEREAS the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has frequently stated its opposition to the gambling industry and the devastating effects of gambling upon the moral and economic well-being of the people of Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, recent judicial decisions have brought the issue of casino gambling to the vote of the people of Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, the gambling industry is unashamed in its relentless pursuits of political advantage by monetary means:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma urge the people of Oklahoma to join us in a total rejection of casino gambling at the ballot box; and

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that Southern Baptists in Oklahoma pledge our prayerful support of our elected representatives as they stand against the pernicious evil against the good people of the State of Oklahoma.

Raymond McDowell suggested changing the word "their" to "the" in the last sentence. The resolution was adopted.

(4) Resolution No. 4 was presented by one of the Resolution Committee members who moved for its adoption. **Resolution No. 4** 

## RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION TO SAME SEX MARRIAGES

WHEREAS the compelling interest of the family and society is disposed to regard the exclusion of samesex marriages from the definition of marriage; and

WHEREAS the enforcement of marriage laws, standards of educational instruction in schools, and the regulation of fair business practices will be adjusted to require public recognition of homosexual marriages, and this adjustment will certainly undermine, and may even restrain, the public communication, influence, and independence of individuals, groups and institutions who believe and teach that homosexual behavior and marriage is immoral in both concept and practice; and

WHEREAS legalization of homosexual marriages raises the specter of new laws and policies intended to marginalize, privatize, or silence the social and moral influence of parents and churches which teach that homosexuality is wrong and that heterosexual marriage is morally superior,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we the messengers of the 91st meeting of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma assembled in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma November 11-13, 1996 do clearly and steadfastly oppose the legalization of homosexual marriage by the State of Hawaii, Oklahoma and the United States of America, and the world.

The resolution was accepted.

(5) Ronald Jenkins presented Resolution No. 6 and moved for its adoption.

#### Resolution No. 5

## RESOLUTION AGAINST PARTIAL-BIRTH ABORTIONS AND ALL ABORTIONS

WHEREAS the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has historically and overwhelmingly adopted resolutions supporting the fundamental right to life, affirming the Bible that all human life is a sacred gift from God, and therefore all abortions, except in rare cases where the mother's life is clearly in danger, are wrong, and

WHEREAS a specific technique known as "Partial-Birth Abortion" is a particularly grisly procedure where a live human baby is delivered, feet first until only the head is undelivered, and the physician by way of a mechanical suction device sucks the baby's brains out to the point of collapsing the skull and death occurs;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we the Messengers of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, meeting November 11-13, 1996 at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma do vigorously oppose this procedure and all who stand to defend it.

Attendance at the day time sessions was about 1,200: Monday evening. 2,500; Tuesday evening, 3,000; and total seminar attendance of 550 plus.

The 1997 conference will meet January 27-28 at Southern Hills Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. Personnel committed at this time include Ron Dunn, Junior Hill, Johnny Hunt, Rick Ousley, Tom Elliff and The Stone Brothers. Five growth seminars will be offered on Tuesday morning as follows: larger churches, smaller churches, Hispanic churches, Native American churches and Asian churches.

#### WIN Oklahoma

One of the most important phases of the WIN Oklahoma strategy has been training to equip pastors/staff/lay persons to lead the WIN schools. Twenty associations have scheduled the training to date and about 375 persons have been trained. The final phase of the strategy takes place September, 1996 - March, 1997, which is WIN schools being conducted in 500 BGCO churches in the autumn '96 months and 500 in the winter/spring '97 months. A dramatic increase in baptisms is anticipated if the WIN schools become a reality.

## Youth Evangelism

The 1995 Youth Evangelism Conference was held December 28-30 at the First Southern Baptist Church of Del City. The East conference was December 28-29 and the West Conference was December 29-30. The conference had 7,767 attendees with 93 public decisions. A new Youth witnessing tool was produced and released in Oklahoma during the 1995 Youth Evangelism Conference. The "Friend to Friend" wit-

nessing video incorporates Christian music and the testimonies of Christian artists with both live and taped testimony of Christian students in each local area. The tapes were produced for churches in Oklahoma but they have also been used widely in six other states during 1996.

The 1996 Youth Evangelism Conference date and location were changed to August 9-10, 1996, at the Lloyd Noble Arena in Norman. The speaker was Kyle Byrd with worship led by Chris Tomlin and Face to Face Drama Ministries. Concerts were given by Geoff Moore and the Distance, Rebecca St. James and Brian Barrett. The conference had 7,000 attendees with 161 public decisions. The 1997 Youth Evangelism Conference will be held at the Lloyd Noble Arena, August 8-9, 1997. Saturday, August 10, 1996, the Evangelism Department hosted Christian Family Day at Frontier City after the Youth Evangelism Conference. After a concert in the park, 34 public decisions were recorded. During the day the Evangelism Department trained 800 adults in basic youth ministry principles and strategies.

"See You at the Pole" continues to grow in Oklahoma as students pray publicly for their lost friends, teachers and administrators the third Wednesday morning in September. The 1996 date was September 18. In 1997 the date will be September 17. In 1996 a greater emphasis was made on forming Christian Bible Clubs on campus. This included two conferences on forming and maintaining an evangelistic Christian club on the secondary school campus as well as distributing materials to individuals interested in organizing a Christian Club.

A first ever nation-wide simultaneous witnessing weekend called "48 Hours" was held April 12-14, 1996. This weekend emphasized personal evangelism by students to students. Oklahoma churches participated statewide.

#### **Evangelism Tents**

The evangelism tents provided by the Home Mission Board were used by 27 BGCO churches and associations. Thomas Brewer, Oklahoma Baptist University ministerial student, continues to serve the department as Tent Consultant.

#### Falls Creek

A total of 3,550 recorded decisions were made at Falls Creek this year. The breakdown was as follows:

Each of the decision-makers received guidance in making his/her commitment from one of 478 Encouragers and 164 Pastor-Advisors. Evangelism Department leaders provided instruction and overall coor-

dination for this excellent corps of volunteers. Witness training classes were offered again this year. Five classes for youth and one for adults were offered each of the five weeks. The classes were attended by 1,328 youth and 121 adults.

## **Baptisms**

Based on reports received, baptisms for 1994-95 were 17,532. This represents a decline of 464 (about 2½ percent) compared to the previous year. However, because of a totally different reporting system, reports from many churches were not received. Consequently, even though the reports show a decline, it is strongly believed that there was actually another increase in baptisms this year. # **Brotherhood**

#### Dr. Robert Haskins, Interim Director

In 1995 Oklahoma recorded 589 churches with Brotherhood work. They reported 282 Men's Ministries groups, 160 Challengers units, and 648 Royal Ambassador chapters (274 Lad, 341 Crusader, 33 Combined) for a total of 1090 Brotherhood units.

Brotherhood planned, promoted and directed the following:

#### TRAINING

#### **Area Training Sessions**

Area Training Sessions were held in the fall of 1996 in six locations around the state. Additional training was held in other areas during the year.

#### **Volunteers in Missions Workshop**

February 17, 1996—Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and Missions Departments conducted the workshop at Portland Avenue Baptist Church, Oklahoma City. Two hundred thirty-one attended. More than half of these registered through the Brotherhood Department.

### STATEWIDE MEETINGS

#### Royal Ambassador/Challenger Congress

March 1-2, 1996—Seventeen hundred and fifty attended Congress, Village Baptist Church, OKC. A Missions Fair was held. Awards were given for projects, RA racer competition, and mission notebook content as well as archery, riflery and camperaft activities. The 1997 Congress will be held at South Lindsay Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, March 14-15.

#### Baptist Men's Retreat

October 13-14, 1995—Ninety-five participated in a prayer renewal conference, fellowship, and worship at Falls Creek. The 1996 Retreat featured a Legacy Builders Retreat led by Ray Newman, October 11-12.

## Missionary Kids Retreat

April 12-13, 1996—Twenty-four missionary kids attended annual retreat at Camp Hudgens. Dr. Dick Rader was in charge of the program

#### MISSION MINISTRIES Camp Hudgens

June 7-8 & 21-22, 1996—Ninety attended Lad & Dad camps at Camp Hudgens. During June and July 440 campers attended five weeks of Royal Ambassador camp. There were 184 decisions (35 professions of faith, 108 rededications and 41 surrendered for special service). April 19-20, 1996—78 attended Mini Camp.

#### **Disaster Relief**

In November of 1995 twelve volunteers spent fifteen days working in Antigua, rebuilding homes and churches damaged by a hurricane.

Five families from two associations were assisted in the amount of \$2,500 after damage to their homes by tornadoes.

Two churches destroyed by fire were assisted in the amount of \$6,500.

The Department Director and Associate as well as one layman attended the Disaster Relief Roundtable in Tennessee, April 1996.

#### **Volunteer Mission Building Projects**

Carl Davis, Volunteer Projects Personnel Coordinator, reports that 14 teams worked on 11 different projects in five states and Brazil, Bulgaria, Romania and Mexico. The 209 volunteers spent approximately \$137,150 of their own money in expenses and contributions to the churches they worked on.

#### Lay Renewal

Trained volunteer Brotherhood leadership was provided to eleven churches that scheduled renewal events through the Brotherhood Department.

# **World Hunger**

Brotherhood promoted and provided materials concerning World Hunger Relief to local churches and associations, and channeled donations to the Home and Foreign Mission Boards.

#### Weeks of Prayer for Missions

Along with Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood promoted and provided materials for the three weeks of prayer (state, home and foreign missions), and assisted in local churches and associations in speaking as requested.

### **World Missions Conferences**

Brotherhood worked with Directors of Missions to conduct World Missions Conferences in six associations during 1995. One hundred twelve churches participated.

#### Department Personnel

Laddie Adams retired in 1996 after serving 23 years as Department Director.

# Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma

William M. Pierce, President

The mission of Baptist Retirement Centers is to honor God by providing quality housing and compassionate health care to senior adults in a Christian environment.

Three retirement centers and four villages are provided including more than 675 independent living apartments, 90 assisted living apartments and provisions for 340 persons in long term nursing care. More than 1,100 people live in the Baptist Retirement Centers.

Statewide locations include: Ada, Cleveland, Hugo, Madill, Oklahoma City, Okmulgee and Owasso.

The 1996 Budget is approximately \$11,000,000.

Programs include: Independent Living, Assisted Living, Nursing Care, Specialized Alzheimers Care and Medicare certified Home Health Care.

#### **Expanded Assisted Living Program**

An expanded assisted living program is being implemented. Ground was broken for construction of new assisted living centers at Ada Baptist Village and Okmulgee Baptist Village. The Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma City and Owasso offer licensed assisted living services to residents. Assisted living is currently available in Ada, Okmulgee, Owasso and Oklahoma City.

#### **Board of Directors**

The BRCO Board of Directors is made up of twenty persons who have recognized effort and experience in Christian causes and knowledge of and ability in business affairs. The board is organized into three working committees including Ministry Program, Budget and Finance and Development and Public Relations.

#### Statewide Capital Campaign

A statewide capital campaign is under way. The base goal of \$1,100,000 has been exceeded in cash and pledges. The challenge goal is \$1,875,000. Campaign funds are being used on all seven campuses to upgrade facilities and strengthen services. The highlight of the campaign has been a \$175,000 challenge grant from the Mabee Foundation.

# **Facility Remodeling**

Remodeling projects are underway at retirement centers and villages in Oklahoma City, Owasso, Cleveland and Ada.

#### Chaplain Ministry

All seven facilities provide chaplain services to residents, their families and employees. Professions of faith have been reported on several

campuses this year. Vacation Bible Schools are conducted in cooperation with local churches. Revivals and Spiritual Emphasis Weeks are held in the fall of the year. More than 500 senior adults attend Bible Study or chapel services in a Baptist Retirement Center each week.

#### **Partnerships With Churches**

Several Oklahoma churches are expressing interest in constructing retirement center facilities on their church campuses. Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma is available to assist churches in planning, designing, construction and management phases of the project. Please contact the BRCO Baptist Building office for additional information.

#### Video Presentation

A fourteen minute video presentation which overviews the BRCO ministry is available to churches, associations or other groups. The video is available by telephoning the BRCO Baptist Building office.

#### Strategic Plan

A strategic plan was approved by the board of directors. The plan gives focus to seven areas of planning which will help take the BRCO ministry into the next century.

Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma is grateful to each church and individual for their support in this ministry to senior adults.

# **Religious Education**

# Frank Foutch, Director SUNDAY SCHOOL

## **Associational Sunday School Conventions**

It was the greatest training event ever conducted by Oklahoma Baptists! A major Sunday School convention was conducted in every association in our state. All but two were conducted between August 14 and August 29, 1995. Over 11,000 persons from over 1,000 of our churches participated. There were 12 teams with a total of over 180 conference leaders that conducted three to four conventions per team. From every corner of our state, great testimonies have been heard about how people were blessed, inspired, motivated, and trained through these conventions.

### The Great Oklahoma Roundup

Another first for Oklahoma Baptists was the first annual "Great Oklahoma Roundup" Sunday School high attendance day. The date each year will be the second Sunday in September. Beginning in 1997 this date will correspond with the SBC's Sunday School Launch Day.

200,000. The churches reported around 190,000 people in Bible Study on that day. Exciting reports came in from churches all over the state about how God blessed this special day. Many churches went all out with barbecue, western wear, western decor, horse back and pony rides and many other innovative, creative ideas.

#### **Other State Sunday School Events**

In addition to the Associational Sunday School Conventions, there were four other conferences conducted; Growth Spiral Conference, two Associational Training Schools in Frisco and Southwest Associations and ASSISTeam training for Associational Sunday School teams.

#### **Vacation Bible School**

12=374=4,163=147,000=3,000+20,000

The above formula speaks to the multiplication effect of our state VBS program. Twelve state team members were trained, they in turn trained 374 associational team members who in turn trained 4,163 church VBS workers resulting in 147,000 enrolled in VBS with 3,000 professions of faith and over 20,000 prospects discovered.

## **STATISTICS**

Because of a breakdown in reporting and receiving reports on the Annual Church Profile, complete and accurate statistics were not available on a statewide basis for Sunday School and Discipleship Training for the 1994-95 church year. However, the problems have been identified and corrected and next year a full report should again be available.

# DISCIPLESHIP AND FAMILY DEVELOPMENT Leadership Training

Two regional Discipleship Training Workshops were conducted, one in Chickasha and one in Enid. Leader Training to conduct Children's/Youth Bible Drill and Youth Speakers Tournament was held in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. A State Baptist Doctrine Clinic was held at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. Family Ministry Workshops were conducted in Tulsa and Oklahoma City. Associational leaders were trained in two locations, one in Muskogee and one in Moore.

#### **Participation Events**

The Fall Festival of Marriage was held at the Marriott Hotel in Oklahoma City. There were 246 participants.

The State Children's/Youth Bible Drill and Youth Speakers Tournament attracted 287 children and youth from 26 associations.

#### OTHER STATE EVENTS

The Religious Education Department conducted other training events during the year including the State Church Building Conference, the Christian Arts Festival, the Ministers of Education Program Planning Retreat and Conferences for Youth Ministers and

#### FALLS CREEK

Coordinating the planning, implementation and evaluation of the Falls Creek Program for the 5 weeks of youth camp is the responsibility of the Religious Education Department. For the first time in many years registration exceeded 30,000.

#### DEMOGRAPHICS SERVICE CENTER

Housed in the Religious Education Department, the Service Center provides demographic information to churches and associations on request at no charge.

# **Church Music**

The Church Music Department is committed to a diversified ministry designed to motivate, train, and challenge Oklahoma Baptist musicians to use our God given musical talents for the Lord. Music is a wonderful tool for evangelism and outreach, for worship and edification. A multiplicity of ministries are planned annually to give churches and individuals throughout the state an opportunity to share in festivals, concerts, training events, and in mission activities. Continued growth in participation has been evident throughout Oklahoma church music ministries. The fall of 1996 concludes the 50th year celebration of the Department of Church Music in Oklahoma. Many events have focused on this anniversary celebration. Oklahoma Baptists have the third oldest music department in the Southern Baptist Convention. The Oklahoma Baptist Annual State Convention will begin with a concert presented by The Singing Churchmen, The Singing ChurchWomen, and The Oklahoma Baptist Symphony at the Myriad in Oklahoma City. This will conclude all 50th Anniversary events. Dr. Bill Reynolds of Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary is commissioned to write a book on the history of church music in the Oklahoma Baptist Convention. This book will be available at the Myriad on November 11th.

**Equipping** 

Continuing the tradition of equipping the leaders of our state with tools that will insure growth in our Southern Baptist churches is the purpose of Church Music Oklahoma. Two thousand and fifty-five musicians including pianists and organists, leaders of all children's choir work, full-time and bi-vocational ministers of music, handbell leaders, composers and arrangers, sound equipment technologists, instrumental directors, and other specialized classes attended the two days of intensive training and skill sharpening. Other special features

included a concert by world-renowned harpist, Greg Buchanan and a presentation of The Oklahoma Baptist All State Youth Choir and Orchestra. This training event continues to grow and features outstanding clinicians and seminar leaders from across the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### FESTIVALS:

#### Keyboard

Enid, Emmanuel; Tulsa, South Tulsa; Guymon, Sunset Lane; Lawton, First; Meadowood, Midwest City; Oklahoma City, Village; Wilburton First; and Woodward, First each hosted an Area Keyboard Hymn-Playing Festival January 13, 1996. Eight hundred forty-seven pianists participated in this event designed to encourage young people and adults to play piano and organ in the churches. Forty-nine young people qualified to attend the state festival at Oklahoma Baptist University by receiving a superior rating in categories IV or V. An awards luncheon followed the competition for "talentships" to OBU as well as a concert by faculty members Dr. Ron Lewis and Dr. Ron Davis.

#### Youth Choir Festival

Joel Mikell served as clinician for the 1,259 participants at the Youth Choir Festivals February 23-24, 1996, at Portland Avenue, Oklahoma City, and March 29-30, 1996, at Skelly Drive, Tulsa. Choirs and ensembles were able to receive constructive comments from the adjudicators. The festival concluded with a worship and praise service featuring some of the individual choirs as well as banner and multimedia presentations.

#### **FestiBell**

FestiBell '96 is being held on November 16, 1996, at the Myriad Convention Center in downtown Oklahoma City. Mary Kay Parrish, OBU faculty member, will be the clinician for this event. She also is composing a commissioned arrangement in commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Church Music Department. In addition to rehearsals and the final celebration service, the participants will avail themselves of the expertise of conference leaders on subjects such as maintenance and adjustments, ensemble ringing and literature, four-in-hand, terminology and technique, unique techniques and bass bells.

#### Singin' & Praisin' Meetin' for Senior Adults

Composer/arrangers Paul Williams and Joseph Martin were guest director and pianist at the annual Singin' & Praisin' Meetin' on May 9-10, 1996. The two-day event was hosted this year by Southern Hills Baptist Church, Tulsa. The group of 1,125 senior adults enjoyed a break from the mass rehearsals and parade of choirs as they were entertained by Dr. Mark Reighard, music professor at Southern Nazarene University, Dennis Lee's "Nanna Puddin' Productions," and Joseph Martin, co-clinician and renowned pianist. Dr. Charles Graves, pastor

of Quail Springs Baptist Church, Oklahoma City served as master of ceremonies for the festival.

#### Young Musician's Festival

Betty Woodward, former Oklahoma Baptist University professor and renowned children's choir clinician, served as clinician for the 1996 Young Musician's Festival, April 27, at First Baptist Church, Moore. Seven hundred sixty-six young musicians participated in the one-day event which includes two hours of mass rehearsal and a parade of choirs during which groups are given the opportunity to sing prepared selections for adjudicators who encourage music excellence and growth with helpful comments. This event continues to be one of the most effective ministries for children in our state.

#### All-State Baptist Youth Choir & Orchestra

On May 31, 1996, 345 individuals converged on the Radisson Hotel in Oklahoma City to begin preparation for the Baptist All State Youth Choir and Orchestra tour to St. Louis, Missouri. These talented young people presented musical witness in 'Marketplace' settings as well as Baptist churches. The concert and tour provided lifetime memories for the youth who participated. They were led by Paul Hammond and Jim Hansford from Oklahoma Baptist University. The choir and orchestra had a reunion concert at Church Music Oklahoma in Norman to conclude this summer's activities.

#### Falls Creek

Falls Creek, 1996, may well be remembered as the outstanding encampment of the past 20 years. The spirit of the camp, the large attendance of churches and young people, the concerts, the inspiring messages, and the many commitments of lives to Christ and to His service will result in great movements of the power of God throughout Oklahoma in years to come. Over 2,000 young people made up the five choirs during Falls Creek with guest choral directors being Mike Knight, FBC, Choctaw; Tom Willoughby, FBC, Lawton; Travis Boyd, FBC, Weatherford; Max Pyron, FBC, Marlow; and Terry Taylor, FBC, Norman. The orchestra involved over 300 participants led by directors, Jerri Crockett, FBC, Richardson, Texas; Susan Clothier, Tecumseh High School: Lane Davis, Pawhuska Schools: and Rusty Stowe, Exchange Avenue, Oklahoma City. The Timothy Company had 130 participants in its sixth year of ministry at Falls Creek. For the second year, Act One Drama Ministries, under the direction of Clay Guiltner, wrote, produced, and directed the dramatic interpretations used in each worship service. Guest concert artists this year were, Point of Grace, Aaron and Jeoffrey Benward, Phillips, Craig and Dean, and Billy Crockett. The All State Ensemble sang each Monday evening of Falls Creek as a part of their responsibilities.

The Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma

For 35 years the Singing Churchmen of Oklahoma have spread

the Word of Christ through music into churches and cities throughout this state. Dr. Bill Green is the director of this men's choir which is composed of 255 singing churchmen. In April of 1996, the churchmen travelled to Hong Kong and to China on a historic mission ministry. The men presented over 60 concerts in a 15 day period of time and were able to work in Hong Kong directly with the Baptist Missions Department, Baptist Press, and Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary. While in Hong Kong, the men presented concerts, directed evangelistic services, sang at the National Baptist Convention, taught seminary music classes, tuned pianos, and interfaced with Baptist leaders throughout the city. In China the choir was invited to present concerts in Guangzhou, Shanghai, and Beijing. An organization known as I.D.E.A. invited the churchmen to do a benefit concert for scientific research in the elimination of the dreaded Hanson's Disease. They were also invited to present public concerts at the invitation of the Shanghai and Beijing Conservatories of Music. These public venues enabled the men to work directly in the local churches in all of these cities and to minister in the seminaries. Many concerts were given in churches and, through the liberality of Oklahoma Baptists, some 35,000 Bibles were distributed to all 20 provinces in China. Along with that, 190 seminary students were given libraries for personal study and other contributions were made to the religious community. All in all, there were many people won to Christ and many lives that were touched and encouraged throughout this ministry. While in Beijing, the churchmen presented a concert with the Philharmonic Men's Choir which was the first time that such a joint music activity had ever been accomplished. Amazingly, there were no restrictions of where the men sang their concerts and many open doors were the results of their ministry. This simply means that invitations have been made already for the churchmen to return someday to China. Along with the above mentioned ministry, the churchmen sang concerts throughout Oklahoma from September, 1995, to May, 1996. The men have continued to sell recordings of their music which extends the ministry beyond the places where they are able to present live concerts.

#### The Singing ChurchWomen of Oklahoma

The Singing Church Women of Oklahoma are directed by Dr. Bill Green and have expanded their spiritual and musical influence for the eighth year in ministry in Oklahoma. This 320 voice choir is divided into east and west groups by I-35. The women come from nearly 200 different churches in Oklahoma and new members are received yearly, by audition. This choir, along with the Singing Churchmen, provide joint concerts for statewide activities from time to time. It then becomes the largest, organized choir of this size in the world.

#### Oklahoma Baptist Symphony

The Oklahoma Baptist Symphony continues to grow in its sup-

port throughout the state of Oklahoma. This full orchestra of over 70 instrumentalists presents monthly concerts under the direction of Jon Duncan, Associate Director of the Church Music Department. The symphony presented a concert for the Southern Baptist Church Music Conference and the National Woman's Missionary Union Convention in New Orleans at the recent Southern Baptist Convention in June of 1996. The orchestra at present is the only instrumental group of its kind in the Southern Baptist Convention. Membership is by audition each year. This organization is also featured in concert with the Singing Churchmen and Singing ChurchWomen from time to time throughout the church calendar year.

#### **Seminary Extension**

The Church Music Department and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary sponsor music classes toward the Master of Church Music, Continuing Education, and Diploma of Church Music. The program is in its fourth year and has approximately 40 students enrolled from across Oklahoma. Classes are held on a two semester basis, Fall and Spring. All class instruction is given on Mondays at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City and enrollment is open to anyone wishing to continue his/her education at this advanced level. All students are enrolled as students of Southwestern Seminary and all administrative work and counselling is handled by the Church Music Department of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. This program is the only off-campus accredited church music curriculum in existence which can lead toward a Masters Degree in Church Music:

## **Cooperative Missions**

**Donald Brent, Director** 

This year Brother Bobby Burnett worked under contract with the Cooperative Missions Department. He assisted in ministry relating to Black Church Extension, Church-Community Ministries, Special Mission Ministries and continued donating his time and efforts to directing the Volunteers in Missions ministries. He is to be commended for a job well done.

I am personally grateful for all the personnel in the Cooperative Missions Department. Each serves unselfishly and with great commitment to Christ and His Kingdom. Staff members include Joe B. Williams, Director of Chaplaincy; Jack Comer, Director of Language Missions; and Bobby Burnett, contract worker. The secretarial staff includes Agnes Welton, administrative secretary; and department secretaries, Delores Mohr, Penny Corbin and Roberta Cothrum.

In cooperation with the Home Mission Board, the Department of Cooperative Missions involves four major areas of mission ministries.

Those areas are Language Missions, Church-Community Ministries, Chaplaincy, and Church Extension. The Department also relates to many other Mission Ministries in cooperation with the Home Mission Board. Those ministries include supervision of Jointly Appointed Missionary Personnel, Leadership Training, Black Church Extension, Literacy Missions, Resort Missions, Volunteer Construction, Multihousing Missions, Volunteers in Missions, work with Bivocational Churches and Pastors, and Campers on Mission. This does not exhaust the list, but gives some idea of the department's leadership and involvement in mission ministries. Following is the report of many of these ministries.

#### **Church Extension**

A total of \$11,235 per month was expended for assistance to three (3) associational new church strategists, four (4) key church ministries, and eleven (11) new church pastors. The funds were made available through HMB-BGCO Cooperative Program budget, Edna McMillan State Mission Offering and designated new work funds. The Cooperative Missions Department also expended \$27,500 on four (4) mission property sites; \$35,050 on four (4) first unit facilities, and \$2,900 on the national "Start Something New" Conference. "Start Something New" is the Bold Mission Thrust Emphasis for 1996-97 and 1997-98. Plans for increasing the number of starts for new churches, new missions, new classes, and new preaching points are being developed. Twenty-one (21) Southern Baptist leaders from Oklahoma attended the "Start Something New" SUMMIT in Birmingham in February. Hundreds of Baptist leaders were present from across the nation. Breakout conferences allowed leaders from each state to meet and begin developing a "Start Something New" strategy for their state. On May 3, Oklahoma conferees conducted a follow-up meeting at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. Additional plans were made for "Start Something New" in Oklahoma.

#### 588 Bivocational Churches

One call-two vocations – Fifty-eight bivocational staff members and their wives attended a celebration for bivocationals April 19-20 at the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. The event was sponsored by the BGCO Cooperative Missions and Religious Education Departments. The conference provided Bible study and worship experiences and emphasized church growth, evangelism, and the SBC annuity program. A special interest conference led by Nancy Pannell, Denton, Texas was provided for the wives. Other conference leaders included Dale Holloway, HMB; Charles Lee Williamson, Texas; Clyde Cain and James Lankford, BGCO; Charles Graves, BGCO president, Oklahoma City; and Leon Wilson, Regional Volunteer Consultant, HMB, Oklahoma City.

Leon Wilson, pastor of Oklahoma City, Southpark, and his wife,

Sharolyn were selected this year as Regional Volunteer Bivocational Consultants by the Home Mission Board. He will continue as bivocational pastor. As consultants, the Wilsons will assist in the organization of councils and fellowships for bivocational ministers, plan state retreats and assist associations and seminaries in their work with bivocational ministers.

The Cooperative Missions Department is producing a manual for bivocational ministers in Oklahoma. The manual should be in print by the end of this year, 1996.

#### **Missions Development**

Leon Shade, pastor, Calvary Baptist Church, Lindsay, serves as Volunteer State Consultant for Church and Associational Missions Development. His statewide network for Volunteer Regional Consultants for Missions Development has grown over the past year. Consultants include Dean Hudlow, layman from Shawnee; Ralph Heiney, pastor, First Baptist, Adair; Bo Holland, Tulsa Associational Church Strategist; Bobby Burnett, State Volunteer in Missions Director; Dan Shaeffer, pastor, First Baptist, Jay; and Tom Lazenby, pastor, Colcord Baptist Church.

The consultants have both received training and provided training to strengthen Missions Development in our churches and associations. A major emphasis for the next two years is "Start Something New." The consultants were involved in two major events this year. The first was leadership training for Associational Missions Development and the second was to provide leadership for Associational Missions Development Directors and Survey Directors at our Annual SALT Conference. A major goal is to provide associations with a vehicle for being on mission. Consultants are available to each of our associations for the purpose of assisting, training, consulting, and encouraging in the area of missions and mission involvement.

#### Language Missions

Language/Ethnic groups are the fastest growing segments of our population in Oklahoma. The Indian population is growing by 5,000 persons a year, Hispanics 4,000 and Asians at 4,000.

We have 85 missionaries and over 400 congregations ministering to this growing group of people. The ministries of our missionaries and churches are increasing in every area. Baptisms, Sunday School, church attendance and mission giving are growing.

This year, we have begun fifteen church-type missions, seven home Bible Fellowships, two Sunday School Departments and eight Mission Centers.

New Ethnic Leadership Development Centers have begun for Indians, Hispanics and Laotians. More than 200 persons are involved in ongoing training on a regular basis. Most are enrolled in the Ministry Training Institute of Oklahoma Baptist University and Ethnic Leadership Development from Golden Gate Seminary and Midwestern Seminary. Several are enrolled in the Southwestern Seminary which meets at O.B.U.

The Jointly Employed Missionary Workshop at Falls Creek in March provided training, inspiration and fellowship for our missionaries.

Over 3,000 were enrolled at Indian Falls Creek this summer with 165 professions of faith. Hispanic Falls Creek had an enrollment of 275 with a total of 50 decisions.

New missionaries for this year are: Samuel Lim, Korean, Richard Carr, Indian; Mario Garcia, Carlos Ybarro and Cesar Garcia, Hispanics.

In Oklahoma, we have seven Catalytic Missionaries. They have the task of working with churches, associations, and language persons to develop language congregations and ministries. Training of ethnic pastors and lay leaders is part of their responsibilities.

Angel Murillo serves in the Southwest portion of our state. He is involved in two Ethnic Leadership Development Centers, one in Chickasha and the other in Altus. He preaches every week on a Spanish radio station.

Ramon Aleman works in the Northwest section of the state. He has an E.L.D. Center in Guymon and a Spanish Ministry Training Institute in Oklahoma City. His home-cell approach in Hennessey has led to the continued growth of the Hispanic church located there. The Hennessey Cristo del Rey Baptist Church completed a \$250,000 building this year.

Victor Orta II serves as Catalytic Missionary in the Northeast part of our state. Brother Orta has many mission centers in that area that teach English as a second language, driver's education, citizenship training and other needed services to meet the needs of new immigrants and Internationals. Many congregations grow out of these centers.

Daniel Caceras serves in the Southeast section of our state. The Hispanic population is growing rapidly. Mission centers and preaching points are being started rapidly. Two new E.L.D. Centers opened this fall; one in Norman and the other in Ardmore. Brother Caceras has given excellent leadership as the coordinator of statewide Hispanic programs this year.

Dan Bice is Catalytic Missionary to the Deaf. Deaf Camp and the National Deaf Conference at O.B.U. were highlights of this year.

Max Malone serves as Catalytic Missionary to the Indians in Western and North-central Oklahoma. Training of leadership in E.L.D. and M.T.I. are a growing part of this work. Bible Schools were held in many locations this year for the first time.

Bill Barnett is Indian Catalytic Missionary with special emphasis on the "town or city" Indians. Leadership training is a big part of his work. The Training Center at Seminole has the largest enrollment of any M.T.I. class in Oklahoma.

Tom Anderson is Catalytic Missionary to the five Indian Baptist Associations. He has conducted many seminars and training sessions this year. E.L.D. classes began this fall in Ardmore.

Jack Comer, Director of Language Missions, was presented with the Ethnic Leadership Development Award by the Language Church Extension Division of the Home Mission Board. The award was presented at the National Meeting of State Language Directors at Birmingham, AL, February 26, 1996.

#### **Black Church Relations**

Black Church Relations is a program of cooperation between Southern Baptists and National Baptists of Oklahoma. On January 1, 1996, Bobby Burnett assumed responsibilities for the Black Church Relations program of the Department of Cooperative Missions.

Two missionaries serve with the Department of Black Church Relations. John Thomas, Jr. is state director of Christian Education for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and dean of the Oklahoma School of Religion in Tulsa. Patricia Reed is the W.M.U. Executive Secretary for the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention and directs the woman's work of the convention. Urban Green, who served as director of the Baptist Education Center in Tulsa, retired September 15, 1995.

Bobby Burnett attended the Oklahoma Baptist State Convention Evangelism Conference at Greater Mt. Olive Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, and shared in a luncheon sponsored by the BGCO for National Baptist pastors and their wives.

The Oklahoma School of Religion, Tulsa, has nine branches of education across the state. More than 350 adults were enrolled in 36 courses of study. Eighteen students graduated May 4, 1996. Fifteen students received certificates and diplomas and three students received degrees from Oklahoma Baptist University through the M.T.I. program. Dr. Tom Wilks represented OBU and Bobby Burnett represented the BGCO at the graduation ceremony. Reverend Dr. J.H. Corbitt, Dean of the Congress for Christian Education, National Baptist Convention USA, Inc., was the guest speaker for the annual commencement exercise at Morning Star Baptist Church, Tulsa.

#### **Special Missions Ministries Department**

Miss Verlene Farmer, BSU director at Langston University for more than 25 years, is the one missionary serving with the Special Missions Ministries Department of the Home Mission Board.

Approximately sixty-five children from the Langston community are enrolled in a weekday community scripture memory choir. The choir is sponsored and directed by Miss Farmer and the Langston BSU. They come to the BSU building for practice. Alicia Finley, eleven year old member of the Scripture Memory Choir, won the Bible Drill trophy, beating elementary, middle school and high school students.

Sixteen BSU students attended Student Week at Glorieta, August 1995, and ten students rededicated their life to Christ.

The Langston BSU Scripture Memory Choir was asked to share scriptures at Mt. Olive Baptist Church, Guthrie, in November.

Reverend Spencer Ledbetter is leading the Monday night Bible study and witness program for the students who attend the BSU.

Twenty-three students attended the 51st National BSU Retreat, Nashville, TN, March 28-31. The BSU Spring Revival was held January 28 – February 1. Rene' Rochester returned to help as Bible teacher and to share for four days.

Twenty students attended the annual Mission Conference, Ft. Worth, Texas, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, March 1-3, 1996. The students returned inspired and encouraged.

Twenty BSU members attended the State BSU Spring Retreat at Falls Creek the second week of April. The Scripture Memory Choir performed.

April 29 – May 2, 1996, the Langston community and the Langston University observed 90 consecutive hours of Bible reading.

Miss Farmer was honored to teach a prayer seminar from 8:00 – 10:30 a.m. at the 91st Annual Session of the National Baptist Congress of Christian Education, June 18-21, 1996. Eighty enrolled in her class.

Four students served as student summer missionaries from Langston BSU. Two served at DaySpring Villa, Tulsa; one served at the Baptist Center, Detroit, Michigan; and one served in Branson, MO.

#### **Church and Community Ministries**

Bobby Burnett assumed duties as Church and Community Ministries consultant on January 1, 1996.

Four missionaries appointed by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in cooperation with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma currently serve in this ministry. They are: associational director of church and community ministries, Jack Bettis, Capital Association; Bill Sisson, Baptist Mission Center director of Oklahoma City; Gerald Lunsford, director of Grace Rescue Mission in Oklahoma City; and Sheila Mitchell, who was appointed in December 1995 as director, DaySpring Villa Women's Shelter, Tulsa Metro Baptist Association, Tulsa. Jackie Huber's position in the Tulsa Metro Association office was terminated on June 1, 1996.

From June 1995 through June 1996, the missionaries reported 324 professions of faith and they delivered 333 sermons and addresses.

Grace Rescue Mission, Gerald Lunsford, director, had an average of 27 people per day participate in the alcohol and drug rehabilitation

program called New Life. Transient and rehabilitation program people were provided 135,220 meals and 36,926 beds during June 1995 through June 1996. They gave four thousand three hundred fifty-nine individuals 24,580 articles of clothing. They served Thanksgiving dinner to 185 people. They remodeled the transients' bathroom and showers this year. Mission Service Corps volunteer Vicki Burkett passed away with cancer in December. All the staff at the mission will miss her.

The Baptist Mission Center, Bill Sisson, director, provided 51,509 pieces of clothing to 12,746 people. The center provided two days of food for 2,413 people and made it possible for the needy to receive over \$79,315 in free medical care, \$16,915 worth of free dental care, and the eye clinic gave \$3,944 worth of free eye care to 127 people. The mission center started GED classes this year. Volunteers completed three building repair projects in October and November. A pharmacy computer system has been installed to facilitate distribution and inventory of medications.

DaySpring Villa Women's Shelter, Sheila Mitchell, director, opened June 14, 1995. The facility has housed 220 women and 211 children since it opened. There have been 24 professions of faith and 19 baptized. A 1995 Ford, 15 passenger van, was donated to the shelter. In October, the Women's Day of Prayer was held at DaySpring. They gave a tour of the facility to 100 women. December 1995, two new babies were born to residents of DaySpring. The director helped coach with the birth of one baby. June 14-15, 1996, they celebrated the One Year Anniversary with approximately 100 people attending. They gave a tour of the shelter and received over \$5,500 in donations. Six student summer missionaries served for 9-10 weeks. Two semester missionaries and two college students have served in the past year. Mission Service Corps volunteers and one M.O.S.T. (missions on short term) volunteer served April through July. One US-2 missionary will come in August to serve for two years. DaySpring Villa was featured in the March 1996 issue of Accent Magazine for Acteens. Associate director. Nelda English resigned in June 1996 to devote more time to her family and church.

Literacy missions, Fran deCordova, state literacy missions consultant, serves as a contract worker with the Missions Department. Literacy missions is a part of the church and community ministries program which meets continuing needs in our changing society. The Annual State Literacy Missions Workshop was held at OBU, June 5-7, 1996. Approximately 45 leaders and conferees received training.

Subjects covered were the Basic or Advanced 16-hour conversational English, new citizenship procedures, the Basic or Advanced 16hour adult reading and writing, Adult Reading and Writing Update for leaders and teachers, Basic 16-hour Tutoring Youth and Children. Approximately 900 church volunteers are trained in some phase of literacy work. There are more than 1,000 people enrolled in 58 organized Baptist literacy missions programs in Oklahoma. Kay Fryer of Edmond received 40 hours of training at the 1996 National Leadership Workshop, Samford University, in June.

A compilation of 1995 literacy missions reports from the Home Mission Board for Oklahoma reported 88 professions of faith, 12 Bible classes, 4 mission/church starts for 1995 (which are Bartlesville Hispanic Mission, Tulsa Hispanic Mission, Trinity Hispanic Mission, Tulsa and Buffalo Hispanic Mission), 10 Adult Reading & Writing Ministries, 33 Conversational English Ministries, 3 Tutoring Youth & Children Ministries, 1 Adult Reading and Writing Workshops, 5 Home Mission Board certified in Adult Reading and Writing workshops, 6 Conversational English workshops, 52 Home Mission Board certified in Conversational English workshops, 3 Tutoring Youth & Children workshops, 28 Home Mission Board certified in Tutoring Youth and Children workshops, and 15 Advanced training for experienced teachers/tutors.

#### **Campers on Mission**

Campers on Mission is a national fellowship of Christian campers who want opportunities to share their faith and love of Jesus Christ while camping or participating in ministry activities. They held two rallies at the Heart of Oklahoma Exposition Center, Shawnee, on September 8-9, 1995, and April 18-20, 1996. At the Spring Rally, the Oklahoma Chapter celebrated their 20th Anniversary with a catered meal and special program. April 19, at 9:02 a.m., the Campers on Mission members observed 168 seconds of silence in memory of the bombing disaster that occurred in Oklahoma City. "Touch a Life" gold coins were presented to those who attended the rally. The coins remind the campers to touch a life wherever there is a point of need. During the three-day spring rally Bob Ross, president of Oklahoma Baptist Foundation, made a presentation on estate planning and James Lankford, associate in the Evangelism Department, BGCO, led a seminar on evangelism and personal witnessing. Evening messages were brought by Bobby Burnett, Department of Cooperative Missions, on Thursday and Robert Haskins, associate executive director, BGCO, on Friday.

Hildred Harris, Fran deCordova's 90 year old mother, sewed 48 windsocks as souvenirs for the 20th Anniversary. Each couple received a windsock. Delores Mohr, secretary in the Cooperative Missions Department, was presented a plaque by Campers on Mission president, Ken deCordova, for serving with the Campers on Mission for 20 years. They gave her a T-shirt with the 20th Anniversary on it and a windsock. Oklahoma had 19 people attend the National Campers on Mission Rally, June 19-21, 1996, in Greenwood, Mississippi. There

were 254 rigs and approximately 568 people who attended the rally. They will hold the 1997 National Rally in Hutchinson, Kansas.

#### Volunteers in Missions

Our mission is to share volunteerism with all Southern Baptists in Oklahoma and assist applicants in finding meaningful volunteer service. To carry out this mission, Bobby Burnett, Director of Volunteers In Missions, has enlisted nine couples and one single lady as Area Volunteers In Missions Consultants across the state. The director's wife, Jo Ann Burnett, passed away October 1, 1995. Billie McDonald was enlisted in February 1996 to serve three associations. She works out of her home in Lawton. Wayne and Katy Merritt, Ardmore, serve as National Volunteers In Missions Consultants as field personnel of the Home Mission Board. All consultants are Mission Service Corps missionaries who have served more than two years and are included in the total missionary count of the Home Mission Board. The director and consultants provide information to associations, churches and individuals about volunteer opportunities in and out of state. Volunteers are active in serving in all areas of church work, associational activities and resort areas. Don and Joyce Pemp, Mission Service Corps volunteers, were assigned to Tulakogee Baptist Assembly, December 1995, with duties in overall maintenance and housekeeping.

Volunteers In Missions Consultant training was conducted in Oklahoma City February 15-16, 1996, with 21 missionaries attending. This was followed by the Volunteers In Mission Workshop, Portland Avenue Baptist Church, Oklahoma City, February 17, 1996, with more than 200 volunteers from across the state attending. The National Volunteer Celebration, September 19-21, 1995, conducted in Arlington, Texas, was well attended by Oklahoma volunteers.

There are forty-seven active Mission Service Corps missionaries assigned in Oklahoma and thirty-seven active Mission Service Corps missionaries from Oklahoma who are serving in out-of-state assignments. Oklahoma has a total of eighty-four active Mission Service Corps missionaries on assignment by the Home Mission Board.

#### Chaplaincy

The mission statement for the chaplaincy program in Oklahoma is, "To Take the Presence of God into Every Situation." In keeping with the mission statement, chaplaincy is attempting to take the gospel of Jesus Christ to people in specialized settings by reaching through the cracks of our society and touching the lives of people who are hidden or out of reach of most local churches. Chaplaincy is the most effective means of reaching secular society because there are times chaplains can go where the church cannot go.

There are five major areas of mission ministry in chaplaincy: (1) healthcare and pastoral counseling, (2) law enforcement, (3) corrections, (4) military, (5) business/industrial. Each of these areas provide

opportunities for full-time, part-time and volunteer participation of ministry oriented persons. Each of these areas also provides the opportunity for the local church and its staff to extend their ministry into communities that may otherwise be closed to them.

The presence of chaplains in the midst of crisis and tragedy is making a difference. Chaplains may be paid or volunteer people who are willing to adventure the "second mile" journey of ministry.

Healthcare chaplaincy, volunteer and full-time, continues to be a very effective means of touching the lives of people at a very critical time in many lives. Illness and death may encourage people to be receptive to the gospel. Many hospitals are employing full-time chaplains and many smaller hospitals throughout the state are developing volunteer chaplain services. So many lives can be ministered to in the hospital setting that may otherwise be missed.

Pastoral counseling, providing long term counseling, is making a positive impact on many lives. Associations are providing space for pastoral counselors outside the metropolitan areas. Marriage and family issues represent some very critical needs in every community. Depression, grief and many other forms of personal loss are among the many needs being addressed by pastoral counselors.

Hospice chaplaincy is another area of healthcare chaplaincy emerging rapidly as another expanding area of chaplaincy ministry. There are a growing number of hospice organizations across the state that provide in home services to the terminally ill. Chaplains have become a very vital part of this in home care providing a ministry to patients and their families.

Law enforcement chaplaincy continues to be one of the fastest growing areas of chaplaincy in Oklahoma and in the United States. In Oklahoma there are 161 law enforcement chaplains representing 60 different agencies. The major emphasis of law enforcement chaplaincy is the officer, his family and victims of crime. The ministry opportunities are unlimited, as ministers become involved in crisis incidents in their communities in the midst of the crisis and not after the fact.

The director of chaplaincy continues to be involved in the aftermath of the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City. This includes serving on two major committees responding to the financial and mental health needs of victims' families and survivors. Other responsibilities relating to the Oklahoma City bombing have been serving as a consultant to the Oklahoma City Disaster Relief Fund, Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma; as a member of the Resource Coordination Committee that coordinates the requests from victims and their families; and continuing to work with critical incident stress management teams in identifying rescue and recovery personnel who may need long term trauma therapy.

Corrections chaplains are providing ministry in a very difficult

setting. They continually relate to persons who are separated from family and live with the idea they are the outcast of society. Many incarcerated individuals have never experienced genuine Christian care. There are hundreds of volunteers who work with full-time chaplains. In Oklahoma, there are eight Baptist chaplains employed by the Department of Corrections, three with the Federal Prison System and one with a private prison.

Another facet of corrections ministry is the Hospitality House in McAlester. The Hospitality House provides ministry to inmate families during visits to inmates. This ministry provides lodging for weekend visitation and Christian love and care. Many practical needs of very special women and children are being met every weekend.

Military chaplaincy continues to provide a unique ministry to men and women in the military setting. There are 21 military chaplains in Oklahoma, including active duty, national guard, reserve, and Civil Air Patrol. There are several openings for Civil Air Patrol chaplains in Oklahoma. This is a great opportunity for ministry.

Business/Industrial and special event chaplaincy is the broadest of the chaplaincy categories. There are unlimited ministry opportunities in business settings throughout the state, including automobile dealerships, hotels, retail stores, industrial sites, etc. One of the most exciting ministries in the business/industrial category is truck stop chaplaincy. There are 7.6 million truckers in the United States with only 10 percent professing to be Christians. Churches and/or associations are sponsoring these ministries and are seeing many lives touched with the gospel. There are three truck stop ministries currently in Oklahoma involving local churches and associations.

#### Resort Missions

Resort missions are growing every year throughout the United States and Oklahoma. There are many mission trip opportunities here in Oklahoma. It is not necessary to travel to distant locations to be involved in missions. The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma is involved in growing numbers of mission opportunities through resort missions.

Resort missions are happening at some of the largest lakes and resort areas, such as Lake Tenkiller and Lake Texoma. Mission opportunities are also found in some of the smaller lakes where local churches are using their resources to provide ministry. Resort missions for the summer of 1996 took place at sixteen resort areas and consisted of distribution of Bibles and other literature. Those involved conducted Sunday worship services, prayer meetings and Bible studies resulting in professions of faith, rededications and other forms of decisions for Christ.

There are sixty-two lake and resort areas in Oklahoma that could

have some ministry activity from local church sponsorship or other groups coming into the area. Reaching people at leisure is another specialized setting where people can be touched with the gospel. For more information contact the Department of Cooperative Missions at (405) 942-3800, ext, 301.

#### **Volunteer Construction**

Volunteer construction teams completed 35 projects during October 1995 and July 1996. These teams consisted of 159 volunteers from out of state and 653 from Oklahoma. Construction projects included additions to present facilities such as auditoriums and educational buildings at a savings of \$1,773,000. This savings is approximately 45 percent of the total construction cost.

Churches interested in having skilled volunteers assist in the construction phase of their buildings should begin by requesting a form from the Department of Cooperative Missions, 3800 North May, Oklahoma City, OK 73112 or calling the department (405) 942-3800, ext. 301.

Volunteer construction also provides opportunities for people with construction skills to be vitally involved in ministry as they participate in these projects. There are churches in the state that would be unable to have adequate facilities if there were not people with construction skills willing to give of their time and talents.

### Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children

The following statistics represent an important part of the ministry of Oklahoma Baptists to abused and neglected children. Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children believes that every child is a gift from God to be loved and nurtured in a Christian home. While food, clothing, and shelter are important, sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ remains our top priority.

#### 2 Staff Changes

Sherry Peck joined the OBHC staff as Contributions Clerk. Toree Meek, from the Oklahoma City campus, is working three days a week at the Home Office as Information Records Clerk. Melissa Jones joined the development staff as Secretary and Jean Klingaman became the Development Representative for central and western Oklahoma. In August of 1996, Candy Hines joined the OBHC staff as Coordinator of the Crisis Pregnancy Center in Oklahoma City.

#### 3. Programs and Activities

In 1995, the Strategic Planning/Promotion Committee of the Board of Trustees for Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children developed several goals to guide OBHC for the next few years. A Crisis Communication Plan and a Handbook for Child Care Advocates were completed. OBHC is in the midst of the "Building for a Brighter Tomorrow" campaign and has reached the base goal of \$1,100,000 and the challenge goal of \$1,795,000. The plan calls for an additional projects goal of \$1,220,000 to be raised in the next two years, for a total of \$3,015,000. As part of the campaign, several cottages have been remodeled and ground was broken in June for a new cottage at Boys Ranch Town. On May 29, 1996, OBHC received approval from the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma to consolidate its residential child care ministry to four major campuses at Edmond, Oklahoma City, Owasso, and Madill. Group homes at Ada, Clinton, McAlester, Mooreland, Marlow, and Deer Creek will be sold and the proceeds placed in a custodial fund to help meet long-term needs. The mailing list for the Care & Share Newsletter grew from 19,000 to 27,000.

## **Oklahoma Baptist University**

#### Bob R. Agee, President

Continued success in academic programs and record-setting missions involvement highlighted the 1995-96 academic year at Oklahoma Baptist University. OBU also earned a unique national distinction as it marked its 86th year.

OBU's student enrollment for the fall of 1995 was 2,322, the third-highest headcount total in the university's history. On-campus enrollment totaled 1,993, with 304 students enrolled in Ministry Training Institute courses at 29 locations in Oklahoma, Indiana, Montana, and Kansas. An additional 25 students were enrolled in OBU courses at the Absentee Shawnee Tribal Complex in Shawnee. The full-time student enrollment was 1,707. Approximately 66 percent of OBU's students came from 73 of Oklahoma's 77 counties, with the remainder representing 36 other states and 38 other countries.

Spring semester enrollment was 2,117, with 1,559 students enrolled full-time. A total of 1,801 students were enrolled on campus, with 316 studying through the MTI program.

OBU students continued to excel academically during the year. Recent nursing graduates tied for best in the nation in 1995 licensing exams, with a 100 percent pass rate. Business students fared well in national Phi Beta Lambda competitions, with five students placing in the top ten, including first- and second-place winners in the computer concepts division. OBU's W.P. Wood Planetarium—the only permanent planetarium on a college campus in the state—opened during the year, giving students expanded learning opportunities as they produce and present shows in the facility. The university continued to offer a growing number of international education opportunities, including several four-week overseas courses during January Term. OBU also expanded its international accessibility, as it opened a site on the World Wide Web in November. Web visitors can take a campus tour or find information on OBU programs and events through the site at http://www.okbu.edu.

Students, faculty and staff set a new record for summer missions involvement during 1996, as more than 235 served in mission projects in 21 states and 21 other countries. That total included ongoing OBU efforts in China, Russia and Hungary. In addition to record-setting

summer mission involvement, OBU led the nation in the number of US-2 missionaries, as five 1996 graduates entered two-year appointments through the Home Mission Board, In addition, three 1996 OBU graduates started working as Journeyman missionaries through the Foreign Mission Board in the summer.

In September, for the fifth time in six years, U.S. News & World Report listed OBU as one of the top 10 regional liberal arts colleges in the western United States. U.S. News also ranked OBU as one of the top three "teaching schools" in the region, an honor which recognizes commitment to classroom instruction. For the third straight year, the news magazine rated OBU as the "most efficient" regional liberal arts college in the West. OBU also was named one of the top two "best buys" in terms of quoted tuition rates and in terms of "discount tuition." OBU was the only college or university in the nation named to all five major categories in the 1996 U.S. News rankings of "America's Best Colleges."

The university recognized the achievements of two longtime friends during Founders' Day ceremonies, as OBU presented honorary doctorates to Robert L. Ross and Albert J. Geiger. Ross, an OBU graduate, has served as president of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma since 1985. Geiger, a retired independent oil producer, has served four terms as an OBU trustee. OBU's student center, the Geiger Center for University Life, is named in honor of Geiger and his wife, Laura Belle.

Achievements by current students were honored during graduation ceremonies in December and May. A total of 71 candidates for graduation participated in OBU's second annual Winter Commencement, witnessed by an audience of nearly 800 people. An additional 299 participated in Spring Commencement, as approximately 2,300 people attended the ceremonies. The number of graduates included five who earned master's degrees in marriage and family therapy.

A new construction project was launched and several renovation efforts were completed during the year. To relieve overcrowded campus housing, OBU broke ground for a new women's dormitory on the north side of the campus in May. The \$3 million facility will open in the fall of 1997, housing 152 students. Renovation work during the year included completion of a new parking lot on the southwest edge of campus, installation of a new roof on the Mabee Learning Center, and completion of new teacher education offices and classrooms in Shawnee Hall. Members of the Class of 1996 donated a gazebo and park area as their senior gift to the university.

More than \$3.4 million was raised for the university during the 1995-96 fiscal year, as 5,827 individuals and organizations contributed to OBU. The financial support provided funds for scholarships, endowment, equipment, operational support, and construction/renovation projects.

OBU trustees approved a \$25.2 million operating budget for the 1996-97 fiscal year during their spring meeting. The university's tuition and fees were raised for the fall 1996 semester, but OBU costs continue to be among the lowest of the 50 Southern Baptist colleges and universities. In a 1996 survey of institutions in the Coalition of Christian Colleges and Universities, OBU ranked 77th out of 81 member schools in tuition costs.

In athletic programs, OBU men's and women's programs enjoyed one of the best years in Bison and Lady Bison history. Of the university's 11 varsity programs, 10 had athletes advance to national championship competition. The men's program ranked seventh in the National Association for Intercollegiate Athletics All-Sports Contest, which rates programs based on success in conference, regional and national championships. OBU was the only Oklahoma university ranked in the All-Sports top 10. The Bison indoor track team finished second in the nation at the championship meet. The outdoor team followed that success with an eighth-place finish at nationals. OBU's baseball team won the Sooner Athletic Conference and the Great Plains Region tournament to advance to the NAIA World Series for the first time since 1989. The Bison finished the season in seventh place, with a 52-13 record.

The Bison basketball team reached the national tournament for a school-record fourth straight time. OBU won the Sooner Athletic Conference title and compiled a 29-7 record for the year. The Bison tennis team finished the season with an 11-5 mark, and sent three players to the NAIA championships. One Bison runner qualified for the NAIA cross country championships in the fall of 1995.

The Lady Bison basketball team advanced to the NAIA championship tournament for the first time in school history. Nationally-ranked for most of the season, the women's team reached the finals of the Sooner Athletic Conference tournament and finished the season with a 21-12 record. OBU women athletes qualified for national championship competition in indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and cross country. The Lady Bison softball team, playing in a conference that has produced the last two national champions, finished with an 18-24 mark.

OBU will launch a women's tennis program during the 1996-97 year, bringing the total number of varsity programs to 12.

The university welcomed five new faculty members in the fall of 1996. The full-time faculty totals 115, with 69 percent holding earned doctorates.

As OBU continues to fulfill its mission of providing quality higher education in a distinctively Christian environment, the university is grateful for the faithful and prayerful support of Oklahoma Baptists.

# Report of the Board of Directors Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma

Each year in annual session, the State Convention authorizes the Board of Directors to transact convention business between sessions. The President and Recording Secretary are entrusted with the responsibility to sign legal documents of the convention when signatures are required.

This report consists of actions taken by the board subsequent to the 1995 annual meeting. Regular meetings of the board were held on December 12, 1995; May 28-29 and August 27, 1996. Called meetings were held January 19 and July 9, 1996.

In 1995-96, the board was organized into three committees—the Administrative Committee (with Personnel and Falls Creek Conference Center subcommittees); the Business Management Committee (with Budget, Properties and Insurance, and Baptist Messenger subcommittees); and the Program Committee (with BSU, Missions, and Church Development subcommittees)—in order to effectively accomplish its tasks. Committee assignments were determined by the President in consultation with the Executive Director-Treasurer.

#### **Special Committee Appointments**

Strategic Planning Implementation Committee—Messengers to the 1995 annual meeting approved appointment of a smaller Strategic Planning Implementation Committee to work in consultation with the Executive Director-Treasurer and the Executive Director-Treasurer Elect to develop a strategy for implementing structural and budgetary changes and to present the recommendations to the Convention in 1996. BGCO President Charles Graves appointed the following members of the Strategic Planning Committee to continue serving as the Implementation Committee: Wade Burleson, Kevin Clarkson, Alton

Fannin, Rick Frie, Nick Garland, Ted Kersh, Wendell Lang, Gary McKeen, Nadine McPherson, Linda Ochsner, Ray Talbott and David Willets. The Implementation Committee met November 28, 1995; and February 22, March 7-8, and May 2, 1996. Chairman Nick Garland presented the committee's report and recommendations to the Board of Directors on May 28, 1996 (see Additional Information section of this report).

Edna McMillan State Missions Offering Allocation Task Force—This task force, to be appointed annually by the Executive Director-Treasurer, includes representation from the Missions Subcommittee of the Board of Directors, BGCO missions leaders, and state convention officers. The 1996 task force included Bob Haskins, Chairman; Laddie Adams, Frances Grafton, Don Brent, Carolyn Ellenbrook, Dick Rader, Charles Graves, Darlene Peter, Mary Smith, Jackie Stolz, Doris Wininger, Ted Lam, C. A. "Pete" Spradlin, Lynda Archey and William G. Tanner. They met on February 12, 1996, to consider and evaluate requests. The task force later approved by mail poll the 1997 goal and allocations for presentation to the Missions Subcommittee (see May report of Program Committee).

Executive Director-Treasurer Search Committee—The search committee elected in accordance with Bylaws Article III, Section 4 (2), to recommend a new executive director-treasurer, continued its work. After much prayer and at the strong urging of the committee, Anthony Jordan resigned from the committee in order to be considered as a candidate for executive director-treasurer. Keith Russell assumed the chairmanship in September. Larry Nigh, according to the committee election process, moved into the resulting vacancy and joined members Wade Burleson, Russell Cook, Rod Masteller, Gerald Peters and David Willets. BGCO President Charles Graves served as an ex officio member. The search committee concluded its assignment and presented recommendations to the Board of Directors on January 19, 1996 (see Additional Information section of this report).

#### The Executive Committee

The Bylaws call for an Executive Committee to perform only such duties as may be referred to it by the Board of Directors. The 1995-96 Executive Committee consisted of the convention President, Vice Presidents, Executive Director-Treasurer, Recording Secretary, and the chairpersons of the three board committees. Referred matters are considered to be those not under regular assignment to the three committees heretofore specified. The Executive Committee makes recommendations and reports to the Board of Directors on matters pertaining to specific assignments by the Board of Directors; encourages and supports the Executive Director in his work; and serves as an "interagency" committee.

#### December Report-

- 1. BGCO Board Member Replacements Elected—Recommendations were approved for James Densman, pastor of First Church, Hollis, Southwest Association, to complete the 3-year unexpired term of Lawrence Gresham, who moved from the associational area; and for Lawrence Eagle, pastor of Salem Church, Stilwell, Cherokee Association, to complete the 1-year unexpired term of Rex Vann, who resigned from the board. (Shortly thereafter, Eagle withdrew from the board and never actually served.)
- 2. Oklahoma Baptist Historical Collection Renamed—Directors approved a recommendation that the Oklahoma Baptist Historical Collection be named the Gaskin Baptist Archives as a tribute to Dr. J. M. Gaskin, Oklahoma's Historical Secretary since 1953.
- 3. Oklahoma City Bombing Disaster Relief Committee Requested—Dr. Bill Tanner was asked to appoint a 7-person Oklahoma City Disaster Relief Committee to oversee the management of funds received by BGCO for that purpose. (The committee, enlisted in January 1996, included Joe Williams, Chairman; Laddie Adams, Tom Cole, Norma Corley, Kenneth de Cordova, Bob Haskins and Bob Rutherford. The group met February 5, May 21, June 24 and August 28.)

#### May Report-

1. OBU Authority Granted Permission to Execute Guaranty Agreement—The board approved the following resolution conferring authority for the OBU Board of Trustees to negotiate and cause issuance of bonded indebtedness not to exceed \$2,500,000 at a rate not to exceed 6.25 percent average annual interest for partial financing of a new dormitory on the campus of OBU; and to negotiate and cause a refund of existing Series 1989 bonds under terms and conditions the OBU administration may deem appropriate if the opportunity is presented for a savings of 3 percent of the amount of the new bonds issued:

WHEREAS, Oklahoma Baptist University Authority proposes to issue tax exempt revenue bonds for refinancing certain outstanding bonds issued for Oklahoma Baptist University and providing two million five hundred thousand in new construction bonds for the University and it appears necessary that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma guarantee said bonds, and in addition, guarantee certain other obligations in relation thereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, to-wit:

The Convention hereby approves and authorizes the execution of one or more Guaranty Agreements in relation to the aforesaid financing by the Oklahoma Baptist University Authority for Oklahoma Baptist University.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Convention authorizes the corporate officers to execute the Guaranty Agreement(s) and that the President or Vice President and Recording Secretary or Assistant Recording Secretary, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver such other instruments and other documents and approve such other documents and instruments including Official Statements as may be necessary to carry out the intent of and to consummate the transactions authorized by this Resolution.

2. BRCO Bylaw Regarding Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Amended—A request by the BRCO Board of Directors was approved, and the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. ("BRCO"), desires to amend Section 9.02 of BRCO's Bylaws to allow BRCO to acquire or dispose of real property having a value not exceeding \$100,000 without approval by the Convention as is presently required by Section 9.02 of the Bylaws of BRCO; and

WHEREAS, Section 16.01 of the Bylaws of BRCO provides that Section 9.02 of BRCO's Bylaws may not be amended without approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Convention has determined that it is in the best interest of the Convention and BRCO that BRCO's Bylaws be so amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma hereby approve an amendment to the Bylaws of Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc., so that Section 9.02 thereof will read in its entirety as follows:

9.02 No Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Without Approval by Board of Directors of Corporation and of Baptist General Convention. No real property or personal property having a value in excess of \$100,000 may be purchased, acquired other than by gift, sold, transferred, assigned or conveyed by the Corporation, unless the Board of Directors of the Corporation and the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma approve such purchase or sale and determine that such sale shall be necessary or convenient and for the best interests of the Corporation. No acquisition, purchase, assignment, conveyance or transfer of such property or any interest therein either to or from the Corporation shall at any time be made by the Corporation until such purchase, acquisition, assignment, transfer or conveyance shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting.

No such transfer or conveyance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.

3. OBHC Bylaw Regarding Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Amended—A request by the OBHC Board of Trustees was approved, and the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. ("OBHC"), desires to amend Section 9.02 of OBHC's Bylaws to allow OBHC to acquire or dispose of real property having a value not exceeding \$100,000 without approval by the Convention as is presently required by Section 9.02 of the Bylaws of OBHC; and

WHEREAS, Section 16.01 of the Bylaws of OBHC provides that Section 9.02 of OBHC's Bylaws may not be amended without approval of the Board of Directors of the Convention; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Convention has determined that it is in the best interest of the Convention and OBHC that OBHC's Bylaws be so amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma hereby approve an amendment to the Bylaws of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc., so that Section 9.02 thereof will read in its entirety as follows:

- 9.02 No Purchase or Sale of Certain Property Without Approval by Board of Trustees of Corporation and of Baptist General Convention. No real property or personal property having a value in excess of \$100,000 may be purchased, acquired other than by gift, sold, transferred, assigned or conveyed by the Corporation, unless the Board of Trustees of the Corporation and the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma approve such purchase or sale and determine that such sale shall be necessary or convenient and for the best interests of the Corporation. No acquisition, purchase, assignment, conveyance or transfer of such property or any interest therein either to or from the Corporation shall at any time be made by the Corporation until such purchase, acquisition, assignment, transfer or conveyance shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation at a duly called meeting, held pursuant to the provisions of these Bylaws, and shall have been authorized by a vote of the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at a special or regular meeting. No such transfer or conveyance shall be valid or binding upon the Corporation unless the vote by which the same is authorized shall have been entered and recorded in the records of the Corporation.
- 4. Special Action of OBHC Trustees Sanctioned; Assets of Group Homes to be Reallocated—The following recommendation by the OBHC Strategic Planning Committee in conjunction with the

OBHC Program Committee through that organization's Board of Trustees was approved:

#### REALLOCATION OF ASSETS

WHEREAS, Article Nine (9) of the Bylaws of the Corporation requires the Corporation, acting through its Board of Trustees, to approve the sale of any real property; and

WHEREAS, Provision 9.02 of the Bylaws of the Corporation further requires that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the "BGCO") approve the sale of real property by the Corporation; and

WHEREAS, the Corporation owns certain parcels of real property located in the State of Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, the Properties, as defined below, were donated or sold to the BGCO for its Child Care Ministry; and

WHEREAS, the buildings on the Properties were constructed with monies given for the Child Care Ministry; and

WHEREAS, the Strategic Planning and Program Committee of the Board of Trustees of OBHC extensively studied the program possibilities of OBHC's Properties; and

WHEREAS, the recommendation of the report of the Strategic Planning and Program Committee was adopted by the Trustees, calling for a reallocation of the assets of the group homes; and

WHEREAS, in order to be better stewards of the resources and assets owned by the Corporation, the Board of Trustees has determined that certain parcels of property formerly maintained as group homes, identified on Exhibit "A" attached hereto, (hereinafter the "Properties") should be sold so that the monies received from the sale of the Properties can be reallocated to better further the ministries of the Corporation;

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees hereby authorizes the Corporation to sell the Properties identified on Exhibit "A" attached hereto.

FURTHER RESOLVED, the Corporation shall seek the approval of Board of Directors of the BGCO concerning the Properties as is required by the Bylaws of the Corporation.

The undersigned Secretary of the above named Corporation, incorporated, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Oklahoma, does hereby certify that the foregoing resolutions were duly approved and adopted on this 27th day of February, 1996, by a majority of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation.

#### **EXHIBIT "A"**

Listed below are the Properties which have been authorized for sale by the Board of Trustees of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc., ("OBHC"). These Properties were formerly used as group homes by OBHC and are being identified by the names of the cities in which they are located: Ada Group Home, Clinton Group Home, Deer Creek Group Home, Marlow Group Home, McAlester Group Home and Mooreland Group Home.

- 5. OBHC Bylaws Amended to Alter Criteria for Selection of Trustees—Directors consented to a change in OBHC Bylaws, Paragraph 3.03, that had been adopted by the OBHC Board of Trustees on May 21, 1996, and required approval by the BGCO Board of Directors:
- 3.03 <u>Criteria for Selection of Trustees</u>. A trustee shall be a member of a Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and shall be a resident of the State of Oklahoma.

To assure representation from all areas of the State of Oklahoma, the membership of the Board of Trustees shall be drawn from the following geographical areas:

- 1. Twenty percent (20%) of the trustees shall be from the Oklahoma City metropolitan area.
- 2. Twenty percent (20%) of the trustees shall be from the Tulsa metropolitan area.
- 3. Sixty percent (60%) of the trustees shall be from the four quadrants of the state excluding the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. The four quadrants of the State of Oklahoma shall be created by a north-south line consisting of Interstate Highway 35 and an east-west line consisting of Interstate Highway 40 and shall exclude the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metropolitan areas. There shall be an equal number of trustees from each quadrant. No more than two (2) trustees from each quadrant shall be from the same city or town.

Of the trustees, seventy-five percent (75%) shall be lay persons and twenty-five percent (25%) shall be ordained ministers of the Gospel/other church related vocations or their spouses.

An employee of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, may not serve as a trustee; and should a trustee of Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children become an employee of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, its agencies or institutions, his/her term of service on the board will terminate.

6. Convention Automobile Given to Dr. Tanner—The board approved the following resolution proposed by the Tanner Retirement Celebration Committee:

We move to give Dr. William G. Tanner the convention automobile he is driving at the time of his retirement. This gift is effective July 1, 1996, and the title should be transferred as of that date.

This gift is not for past services rendered, not for any promises of

future rendered services, or any promise to retire, but for love and affection for Dr. Tanner.

7. James C. Shaw Designated Convention's Registered Agent— The board approved the following recommendation for "Change or Designation of Registered Agent and/or Location of Registered Office (Oklahoma Corporation)" with the Secretary of State of the State of Oklahoma:

The Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, a not-for-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Oklahoma, do hereby resolve that the location of the registered office of this corporation be changed to: 100 Park Avenue, Second Floor, Oklahoma County, Oklahoma City, OK 73102. The name of the registered agent at such address upon whom process against this corporation may be served is: James C. Shaw.

The undersigned corporation does hereby certify that the foregoing is a true copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Directors of the corporation, as provided in Section 1023/1026.B. of the Oklahoma General Corporation Act.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, said corporation has caused this certificate to be signed by its President and attested by its Secretary, this 29th day of May, 1996.

- 8. Liberty Bank and Trust Company Authorized to Honor Jordan's Signature—The board approved resolutions concerning the accounts of the BGCO with Liberty Bank and Trust Company of Oklahoma City, permitting that institution to honor for payment checks, drafts or other orders bearing the signature or authorized facsimile signature of Anthony L. Jordan.
- 9. December Board Meeting Date Set—Directors acceded to a request to change the December 1996 Board of Directors and related committee meetings to December 9-10.
- 10. Replacements Elected for BGCO, BFO Boards—The following persons were elected to fulfill unexpired terms on the BGCO Board of Directors: Tim Richardson, pastor of Waterloo Road, Edmond, to complete the remaining year of Anthony Jordan's term in Capital Association; John Hummingbird, pastor of Cherry Tree Church, Stilwell, to complete the remaining year of Rex Vann's term in Cherokee Association; Amos Taylor, Jr., layman from Grace Church, Calera, to complete the remaining three years of Wayne Scott's term in Choctaw-Chickasaw Association; and Bruce Sanders, pastor of North Fork Church, Eufaula, to complete the remaining three years of Terry Sledge's term in Pittsburg Association. Chester Ward, Jr., director of missions in Kay Association, was approved to complete the remaining two years of Stephen Earle's term on the Board of Directors of The Baotist Foundation of Oklahoma.

#### August Report—

The Executive Committee met for discussion in August but made no recommendations.

#### Administrative Committee

The assignment of the Administrative Committee is to make recommendations and reports to the Board of Directors on matters pertaining to Personnel, the Falls Creek Conference Center, and Ministerial Services. Tom Cole, director of missions, Union Association, served as chairman.

#### December Report-

- 1. All Sales on Falls Creek Properties to Benefit Falls Creek—The board established a policy requiring individuals and groups desiring to sell products or materials to contract with Falls Creek and to work with the director of the conference center concerning promotion, sales and sharing of revenue. (The policy did not apply to sales of T-shirt and soft drinks by churches.)
- 2. Recreational Vehicles to be Permitted on Falls Creek Grounds—The policy prohibiting tents and recreational vehicles was changed to permit RVs on the grounds except during encampments.
- 3. Convention Annuity Plan Amended; Convention Officers Authorized to Act for Convention—Directors sanctioned a resolution to adopt the Amended and Restated Supplement to the Southern Baptist Protection Program Convention Annuity Plan effective January 1, 1995. The revisions pertained to changes in applicable law, and the language was modified to simplify and clarify the administration of the plan. Further, BGCO officers were authorized to execute such documents, pay such amounts, make such contributions, and take such other actions as they deem necessary or advisable to carry out the purpose of these resolutions.

#### May Report-

1. Budget Subcommittee Asked to Study Christmas Bonuses—Directors approved the committee's request for the Budget Subcommittee to examine resources for providing one week's salary for each BGCO employee as an annual Christmas bonus beginning 1997.

#### July Report, Called Meeting-

1. David Clippard Called to Direct Department of Evangelism—The board elected David E. Clippard, pastor of Sarasota Baptist Church, Sarasota, Florida, to direct the department of Evangelism, effective August 12, 1996.

#### August Report—

1. Sunday Use of Falls Creek Cabins and Facilities Sanctioned—Directors endorsed a recommendation that Falls Creek cabin owners be allowed to use or rent their cabins for Christian retreats and seminars on Sundays, and that Falls Creek facilities be

open for such gatherings, and that the events be approved by the Falls Creek director and scheduled through his office.

2. President Authorized to Appoint Committee to Develop Strategic Plan for Falls Creek Conference Center—The board requested the President, in consultation with the Executive Director, appoint a committee of nine (9) people, including at least two youth ministers, to develop a strategic plan for Falls Creek Conference Center.

#### **Business Management Committee**

The Business Management Committee makes recommendations and reports to the Board of Directors on matters pertaining to Budget, Property and Insurance, and Baptist Messenger. Jack Bettis, associate director of missions, Capital Baptist Association, served as chairman.

December Report-

- 1. Baptist Building Corporation Leases Approved—Two leases of building space from the Baptist Building Corporation were approved for a term of years ending February 28, 2000: (A) Space for Baptist Messenger Press and Convention Printing at an annual rental of \$82,745, payable at \$6,895.42 per month; and (B) Space for all other BGCO offices at an annual rental of \$573,410 payable at \$47,784.17 per month.
- 2. Limited Power of Attorney Granted Barbara A. Spess, CPA—A power of attorney to be effective January 1, 1996, and limited to handling matters with the Oklahoma State Insurance Fund related to a BGCO workers compensation policy for churches and associations was authorized, facilitating a plan to provide workers compensation insurance to churches and associations at a tremendous cost saving.

March Mail Poll Report-

1. 1997 Cooperative Program Budget Objective Established—The 1997 Cooperative Program budget objective was set at \$18,250,000. Concurrence was determined by a mail poll of the board members.

May Report-

- 1. Baptist Messenger to Print Summaries of Major Sermons and Addresses—Directors instructed that only synopses and/or highlights of sermons or major addresses to the annual state convention and other BGCO state meetings be printed in the Baptist Messenger.
- 2. Engelbach Roberts & Co. Engaged to Perform '96, '97 and '98 Audits—Engelbach Roberts & Co. was approved to perform the audits for the next three years in order to provide continuity in anticipation of organizational changes and to aid in implementing Statements of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) numbered 106, 116, 117 and 124.
- 3. 1997 Budget Recommendations Authorized—The Budget Subcommittee, chaired by David Willets, heard individual presenta-

tions describing program and personnel requirements by every BGCO department director and reviewed, discussed, and modified the proposed budgets with each director. The Business Management Committee recommended the proposed 1997 Cooperative Program Ministries Budget to the Board of Directors, and the proposed 1997 Budget recommendations were endorsed as printed:

1. That the proposed 1997 Budget be adopted as printed and that the 1997 Cooperative Program objective of \$18,250,000 be distributed 60 percent Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and 40 percent Southern Baptist Convention.

- 2. In the event Cooperative Program income for 1997 does not reach the \$18,250,000 budget, then distribution to all departments, institutions and agencies, including the Southern Baptist Convention, will be proportionately adjusted.
- 3. In the event Cooperative Program receipts for 1997 exceed \$18,250,000 by 5 percent or less, the Executive Director-Treasurer is authorized to distribute Oklahoma's portion. If receipts are greater than 5 percent over budget, the Executive Director-Treasurer will recommend through the Business Management Committee to the Board of Directors the distribution of Oklahoma's share.
- 4. That the Executive Director-Treasurer be authorized to adjust this budget by not more than 5 percent as prudent or necessary.

  July Report, Called Meeting—
- 1. '96, '97 Budgets Adjusted to Fund BGCO Employee Christmas Gift—Adjustments to the 1996 and 1997 Budgets for General Operating Expenses (1104) were approved to pay a 1-week Christmas gift to all full-time employees at a cost of approximately \$75,571 in 1996 and approximately \$77,711 in 1997.
- 2. Ministerial Services Budget Revised for 1996, 1997—Revisions to the 1996 and 1997 budgets for Ministerial Services (1240) were adopted. Line item 703.01, Pastor Staff Annuity, was reduced to expected actual costs and line item 350.04, Annuity Board Credit on Billing, was eliminated.

(Note: The Budget Recapitulation printed above indicates these revisions.)

#### August Report-

- 1. General Operations Expense Budget Increased—Directors approved addition of a line item for Technology Transition in the General Operations Expense, Budget No. 1104, in the amount of \$58,000 for 1996 and \$67,700 for 1997, to be funded by the earnings generated by a gift from the estate of a benefactor.
- 2. Custodial Fund Redesignated as Operating Reserve Account—The board authorized the redesignation of Custodial Fund No. 85460, held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, as an Operating Reserve account.
  - 3. Baptist Messenger Mission Statement Established—Directors

ministry of Oklahoma Southern Baptists. As a weekly publication, its mission is to strengthen believers and local churches by providing information, encouragement and opinions."

#### **Program Committee**

The Program Committee will make recommendations and reports to the Board of Directors on matters pertaining to Baptist Student work, Missions, and Church Development. Mark Hartman, pastor of Council Road Baptist Church, served as chairman.

#### December Report—

1. Disaster Relief Equipment Purchase Authorized—The board approved purchase of a 1991 Freightliner tractor at a cost of \$24,000 from Oklahoma City Freightliner and a 1996 Ford XL250 pickup at a cost of \$19,331 from Fred Jones Ford.

#### May Report-

- 1. Non-Southern Baptist Christian Groups to Be Permitted Use of Camp Hudgens and Camp Nunny Cha-ha—Directors agreed to make these facilities available for rent by non-Southern Baptist Christian groups at a percentile surcharge that is consistent with other state camps. The Brotherhood and WMU Departments would assume responsibility for renting the properties.
- 2. Appreciation Expressed to Laddie Adams; Disaster Relief Center Named in His Honor—The following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, Laddie Adams began his work in the Brotherhood Department of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in 1973 and was elected Director of the Brotherhood Department January 1974, upon the resignation of Bob Banks; and

WHEREAS, he has provided outstanding leadership in missions education and missions involvement to the men and boys of Oklahoma for the past twenty-three and one-half years; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors go on record as commending him for his outstanding efforts; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Disaster Relief Center located on the campus of Boys Ranch Town be named the "Laddie Adams Disaster Relief Center" in his honor.

3. State Missions Offering Goal, Theme and Scripture Confirmed—For the year 1997, the board affirmed an Edna McMillan Offering goal of \$681,000; the theme, "Celebrate God . . . Hand in Hand"; and the scripture, Psalm 126:3a (KJV).

#### August Report—

1. BGCO Partnership with State Convention of Baptists in Indiana Planned—Directors voted to enter a partnership agreement between the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the State Convention of Baptists in Indiana, to remain in effect from January 1997 through December 1999. The agreement outlined the purpose, objectives, basic principles, and working guidelines for the partnership, which was subject to revision, continuation, or discontinuation by mutual agreement.

#### Additional Information

#### December Report—

1. Christmas Gift Authorized for BGCO Employees—The board voted affirmatively to approve the following personal recommendation from Wade Burleson: "In appreciation and acknowledgment of faithful service and ministry of the employees of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, I move that we, the Board of Directors of the BGCO, authorize the Executive Director-Treasurer to present each employee on the payroll of the BGCO a 1995 Christmas gift in the amount of one week's salary per employee. Total cost of this bonus will be \$71.413, and I recommend this money come from the Annuity

Board refund given to the BGCO, held by the Baptist Foundation, with a current balance of \$641,401. And I further recommend that the Personnel Subcommittee examine policy for future Christmas gifts."

- 2. Request Registered Concerning Board Meeting Scheduling— It was requested that those who schedule board meetings consider not having them during a holiday week.
- 3. Practice Initiated Regarding Guests at Board Meetings—Board members were notified that those who bring a spouse or other guest(s) to board meetings would be responsible for payment for meals of non-board members.

#### January Report, Called Meeting-

- 1. Executive Director-Treasurer Search Committee Recommends Anthony Jordan—Following numerous hearing sessions with Oklahoma Baptists, consideration of recommendations, and much time spent in prayer, the search committee offered the following recommendations which were strongly affirmed by a 49 to 1 secret ballot vote of the board:
- (1) That Dr. Anthony Jordan be elected as the Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma.
- (2) That Dr. Jordan begin his service as Executive Director-Treasurer Elect of the BGCO on May 1, 1996.
- (3) That Dr. Jordan be compensated at the present level allotted for the position of Executive Director-Treasurer of the BGCO.
- (4) That a transition period between May 1 and May 29, 1996, be established for the Executive Director-Treasurer and Executive Director-Treasurer Elect to communicate necessary details for the transition of administration of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Following May 29, 1996, Dr. Anthony Jordan will assume all administrative leadership of the BGCO. Dr. William G. Tanner will receive full salary and benefits as retiring Executive Director-Treasurer of the BGCO through June 30, 1996.

#### May Report—

1. Strategic Planning Implementation Committee's Recommendations Unanimously Approved—Directors enthusiastically endorsed the report of the Implementation Committee as it was presented, including eight recommendations. (1) The team concept structure, comprised of the Church Outreach Team, the Church and Family Equipping Team, and the Support Service Team, was designed to address the needs of the family, give the staff a sense of ownership through team relationships, and incorporate the Purpose/Mission Statement and Strategic Priorities already approved by the convention. Other recommendations unanimously approved were (2) That an advisory group of five [5] people from the current Implementation

Committee be appointed by the BGCO President to serve as an ongoing committee; (3) That this plan begin to be implemented in January 1997; the structure and budget changes be fully blended by January 1998; and we set a goal of January 2000 to achieve complete implementation of the plan; (4) That every staff position within the current BGCO structure be studied to determine its relevancy within the new proposal. A review of that magnitude would require [1] the establishment of some new staff positions; [2] the elimination of others: [3] and all necessary technological improvements to facilitate implementation; (5) That goals, strategies, and action plans needed to fulfill our Purpose/Mission Statement be developed by the staff of the BGCO; (6) That because our budget is prepared in advance of the fiscal year, the Board of Directors may be called upon to make necessary budget adjustments during the transition time; (7) That a committee be appointed in the future to address the relationship between the BGCO and the affiliate corporations [Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, and Oklahoma Baptist University]. Due to time constraints and the scope of the assignment for developing a strategic plan, the committee chose not to address the affiliate corporations and their vital relational roles to the BGCO; (8) That all of the appropriate bylaw changes and all legal issues raised in the proposed changes be addressed by the appropriate entities within the BGCO corporate structure and its legal counsel.

2. Dr. Tanner Commended, Named Executive Director Emeritus—The following resolution expressing appreciation to Dr. Tanner was approved:

WHEREAS, William G. Tanner was elected Executive Director-Treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma effective July 1, 1986; and

WHEREAS, he has provided wise counsel and outstanding leadership for the past ten years and endeared himself to the hearts of Oklahoma Baptists; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors go on record as commending him and thanking him for his outstanding efforts; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we pray for happiness and good health in his retirement; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that William G. Tanner be named Executive Director Emeritus.

3. Oklahoma City Newspaper Editor, Kansas Pastor Applauded—Mark Hartman proposed the following resolution to commend the people named therein:

WHEREAS, our society has so mastered the art of masking sin that it has even exchanged sin's words in order to remove their sting;

changing words like adultery to "an affair" and moral perversion to "being gay"; and

WHEREAS, many of our nation's pulpits have exchanged the Truth of the Word of God for "feel good" sermons designed to pacify their congregations, cowering from confronting God's people with His Word; and

WHEREAS, pastors are constantly under pressure to compromise their convictions and the Bible in the name of tolerance; and

WHEREAS, there are now few major newspaper editors who have the courage or conviction to take definitive stands for Biblical morality; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma commend Reverend Joe Wright of the Central Christian Church in Wichita, Kansas, for the prayer he led before the Kansas state legislature in January in which he courageously called sin to be sin and publicly upheld the moral truths of the Word of God; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma commend the editor of the Daily Oklahoman, Patrick B. McGuigan, for his consistent stands for Biblical morality and for his public endorsement of Reverend Joe Wright's action in a recent editorial; and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma challenge pastors everywhere to stand true to the uncompromised Word of God that alone has the power to change our nation.

4. Mantle of Leadership Passed from Tanner to Jordan—At the conclusion of the May 29 meeting, the transfer of leadership was commemorated with a time of prayer and scripture reading. Dr. Tanner presented a Bible to the new Executive Director-Treasurer; Dr. Graves issued a challenge; and Dr. Jordan responded. Board members prayed and offered words of encouragement for Jordan as he knelt in prayer.

#### July Report, Called Meeting-

1. Assignments Announced for Continuing Strategic Planning Implementation Committee— The President reported that Nick Garland, David Willets, Linda Ochsner, Alton Fannin and Rick Frie had been asked to continue serving as the Strategic Planning Implementation Committee throughout the restructuring of the BGCO.

#### August Report-

1. Summary of Board Actions Authorized—Directors authorized an account of Board actions to be printed in the 1996 Book of Reports, incorporating all proceedings from December 1995 until the 1996 annual meeting.

# **Baptist Messenger**and Office of Communications

Glenn A. Brown, Editor and Director

Communication through the *Baptist Messenger* is in reality a cooperative effort between the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma and the churches. The state convention produces the weekly news magazine and subsidizes its cost as an incentive to churches to provide it for their members. Nearly 1,200 churches currently include it in their annual budget for all or a portion of their members.

An in-depth reader analysis completed in September 1995 laid the foundation for a major redesigning effort in 1996 of the content and appearance of the 84-year-old state Baptist paper. The "new look" Baptist Messenger is scheduled to begin circulation in January 1997.

The 1995 reader survey showed 18 topics favored for inclusion in the *Messenger* by 80 percent or more of all readers. They were:

- 1. Beliefs and doctrines of the Baptist faith.
- 2. Major Baptist news and events in Oklahoma.
- 3. Christian life issues (prayer in school, etc.)
- 4. Baptist missionaries and their work.
- 5. How to minister to those in need.
- 6. "Baptist Beliefs" column by Herschel H. Hobbs.
- 7. How to witness (sharing your faith).
- 8. Inspirational articles from Christians/Baptists.
- 9. Major news and events of the Southern Baptist convention.
- 10. Commentary and opinion from Oklahoma pastors.
- 11. How to live the Christian life style.
- 12. Church staff and pastor changes.
- 13. Special events and announcements in Oklahoma churches.
- 14. History and tradition of the Baptist faith.
- 15. Individuals' stories and testimonials about their Christian faith.
- 16. Editorial (editor's column).
- 17. Letters from readers.
- 18. Christian conferences for families, men, women, singles, etc.

Younger readers (up to age 34) favored more topics dealing with issues and advice concerning children, teens, young adults and parents. Also, devotionals and religious education information and advice.

Readers age 35 to 49 expressed less interest in pastor/staff changes and editorials and greater interest in contemporary issues (abortion, gun control, crime/punishment, etc; want ads for church items or church staff positions; commentary and opinion from state convention leaders; information on upcoming meetings for church leaders and workers; and issues and advice for teenagers.

Danders age 50 and shove were somewhat more interested in

church attendance reports, church anniversaries and homecomings and Cooperative Program reports than they were in conferences for families, men, women, singles, etc.

Drawing the greatest opposition for inclusion were news and opinion from the moderate Baptist viewpoint (24.3 percent) and news and opinion from the conservative point of view (18.6 percent).

#### The purpose of the Baptist Messenger is to:

- 1. Publish timely, objective and accurate accounts of news and events of interest to Southern Baptists, with an emphasis on Oklahoma Baptists' work and concerns, using a balanced application of the historic Baptist principle of a free press.
- 2. Promote all phases of the work sponsored and supported by the convention, denomination and cooperating churches.
- 3. Make available information relevant to the growth, welfare and mature, informed judgment of leaders and members of the churches.
- 4. Encourage readers to faithfulness in their Christian walk, witness and church involvement.
  - 5. Promote faithfulness in stewardship and mission support.
  - 6. Encourage high moral standards and practice among all people.
- 7. Serve as an avenue for the dissemination of Baptist doctrine, history and polity.

Weekly circulation averaged just above 100,000 for the first eight months of 1996.

At midyear, 131 churches and 9 associations were using special *Messenger* pages to carry their local news. New postal rates and requirements scheduled to go into effect by Jan. 1997 spurred an increased interest in church special pages as a money and labor-saving measure. Churches must have a minimum of 100 subscriptions to qualify for special pages.

The news in the *Messenger* is available weekly on CompuServe worldwide.

Messenger staff members also provide news releases to the state's approximately 48 daily newspapers, 178 weekly newspapers, six television stations and 50 radio stations.

## **Baptist Student Union**

**Bob Lee, Director** 

God has blessed us again in BSU work in Oklahoma. Students continue to participate in large numbers in ministry and mission projects. Support from the convention, churches, and associations continues to

Students continue to be interested in studying the Bible and sharing their faith with other students. Every year more and more students are won to the Lord and involved in Bible study and discipleship groups. Today, as much as at any time, students are hungry to know what God's Word has to say to them.

Oklahoma students continue to respond to the call for missions. Over 400 students served in missions during the summer of 1995. More than 100 students served in foreign countries. Foreign mission projects were conducted in several countries including Albania, China, Kazakhstan and the Philippines. The Student Department completed its first year of supervising summer missionaries who come to Oklahoma from other states. This task was previously assigned to the Missions Department. A pilot project called "SYD's" (Summer Youth Directors) was established and five small churches received a full-time youth director for the summer. This project will become a regular part of student summer missions in the coming years.

Students raised over \$190,000 to help fund summer missions, special mission projects, and to support BSU work in newer convention areas. A large number of students participated in a variety of mission projects in Oregon, New York, Arizona, Colorado, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Montana, Massachusetts, Iowa, South Carolina, Georgia and Ohio as well as in Oklahoma. Over \$40,000 was sent to support BSU work in newer convention areas. Finally, over 3,000 students participated in short-term and community mission projects.

John Ramirez, BSU Director at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, will take a one-year sabbatical leave during the 1996-97 school year and serve as Interim State Director for the Baptist Convention of New England. His salary will be funded by the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Ron Driskill, Associate Director at Oklahoma State University, will serve as Interim Director during this time.

BSU work in Oklahoma responds to the needs of students throughout the state. Sometimes this means moving leadership or replacing vacancies. However, in 1995-96, fewer than usual leadership changes were required. Brett Rogers, BSU Director at Connors State College, Warner, began another BSU program at Connors State College, Muskogee Branch. For 1996-97, John Wanger will serve as Intern/BSU Director at Southwestern Oklahoma State University/ Sayre Branch.

Because of the special emphasis on evangelism, Bible study, discipleship and missions, BSU work continues to grow and remain strong. All other areas of activities are based upon these four basic areas. It is still our strong commitment to see that students have an opportunity to come to know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and to grow

### **Ministerial Services**

Clyde Cain, Director

The Office of Ministerial Services has specific areas of assignment: Church Minister Relations, Conflict Ministry, and Annuity Services.

Church Minister Relations--Interrelated ministries linking the BGCO, associational office and local church combine to make biographical data available to churches regarding pastors and staff persons. This information is shared without recommendation or endorsement from the Office of Ministerial Services. Pastors and staff persons are requested to provide this office with material that can be shared with churches when needs arise and requests are made. The biographical information is also shared with directors of missions and other BGCO departments who, in turn, may share this information with churches. A kit designed to equip pastor search committees, "On Calling A Pastor," is available through the associational office at no cost to the pastorless church. This kit should be returned to the associational office when the work is completed. Annually, approximately 3,000 resumes are shared with churches in Oklahoma, as well as other state conventions.

Conflict Ministry--Directors of missions, pastors, deacons, and other lay persons in the church sometimes find themselves involved in a church conflict. This office seeks to relate to each of these to assist in resolving the issues. Conflict resolution is God's work. However, the Office of Ministerial Services is available to assist in becoming a channel through which God can bring about resolutions. Working with terminated pastors/staff is a continuing ministry and service.

Annuity Services--A growing number of churches and ministers are catching a vision for adequate protection and preparation for retirement. Unfortunately, far too many pastors, other ministers and church and associational personnel do not have adequate financial protection. A primary focus for the Office of Ministerial Services is enrolling as many people and churches as possible in the Church Life and Health Program and the Church Annuity Plan.

Life and Health Program. Competitive rates make these plans attractive to churches, pastors, and staff.

Annuity Plan. Approximately 45 percent of the churches in Oklahoma participate in the Church Annuity Plan. A major concern is that 55 percent of the churches are not participating. All persons employed by a local Southern Baptist church, contributing a minimum of \$725 per year, per staff person to the Cooperative Program, who work at least twenty hours per week, are eligible to participate in the Church Annuity Plan.

These persons may benefit in five significant ways. The Plan includes a choice of plan funds offering valuable, advantageous invest-

ment opportunities for retirement. The Plan offers significant opportunities for avoiding unnecessary income tax. Ordained ministers do not pay self-employment tax or Social Security on contributions to the Church Annuity Plan. These advantages exceed those offered by IRAs. The plan includes matching state convention Cooperative Program dollars for eligible members' retirements income accounts. This can amount to \$210 per year resulting in higher benefits at retirement.

Annuitants in Oklahoma. In 1995, the average annuitant check was \$343 per month. Approximately 460 Oklahoma annuitants receive \$200 or less each month in retirement benefits. There are 127 Oklahoma annuitants receiving monthly annuity benefits of \$100 or less. Thirty-four "adopted" annuitants live in Oklahoma. A gift of \$600 will "Adopt An Annuitant" for one year and \$7,500 will provide monthly supplemental income in perpetuity to a worthy retired minister or widow.

### **Planning and Promotion**

#### Robert Haskins, Director

How would you describe 1996? For the Baptist Building family it has been a year of change and transition. Our Executive Director-Treasurer, Dr. William G. Tanner, retired after ten years as our executive in Oklahoma. Dr. Anthony L. Jordan was elected the new Executive Director-Treasurer assuming the duties of this office on June 1. Dr. Tanner was loved by the staff and will be missed. Dr. Jordan is rapidly winning the love and respect of our staff, as well as the Baptist people in our state. The future holds great challenge and promise under his visionary leadership.

The year 1996 has been a year of growth in Baptist work. Each department or office report has given a glimpse of a story much larger. The following pages simply contain some of the highlights of that much larger story.

#### Cooperative Program Promotion

Churches in Oklahoma gave \$18,034,699 to world missions through the Cooperative Program in 1995. This was \$580,201 above 1994. In addition to the regular Cooperative Program, \$183,253 was given as Designated Oklahoma Cooperative Program in 1995. Oklahoma churches gave \$10,358,565 through the Cooperative Program the first seven months of 1996. God gave us a great year in 1995 and we believe that He will do it again in 1996.

A Cooperative Program memo has been sent to the pastor and church treasurer each month. A vignette of Cooperative Program ministries is highlighted each month.

Promotion packets for both Cooperative Program Day and

Cooperative Program Month were sent to each church. In the Cooperative Program Month packet, the second year's materials on Cooperative Program Champions were included.

Several churches have increased their percentage giving through the Cooperative Program. In fact, 106 churches have increased their percentages from October 1995 through July 1996. Churches are encouraged to look at their percentage giving at least once per year and consider increasing it.

#### **Coordinated Promotion Planning**

The 1995-96 emphasis, "Go Make Disciples ... Live God's Word" is drawing to a close. More than 20 events were planned and conducted to help Oklahoma churches live and share God's Word. These events ranged from witness commitment to prayer seminars, Growth Spiral Consultations, Men's Convention, Volunteers in Missions Workshop, Bivocational Training, a 48-hour youth witnessing experience, State Youth Evangelism Conference, family ministry workshop, and a promotion brochure listing all the 1995-96 events was produced by Planning and Promotion and sent to all the churches.

#### **Orientations**

An orientation was conducted at the Baptist Building this year for two new Directors of Associational Missions. They spent thirty minutes to one hour with each department/agency learning the work of that department/agency and becoming familiar with the resources for the association. This has proven to be very helpful. A Director of Missions can learn in two days what would otherwise take months to learn about the work of the state convention.

#### **Employee Appreciation Day**

BGCO employees were given July 5 as an Employee Appreciation Day. This is the convention's way of saying "Thank You" for their hard work and dedication to Baptist churches in Oklahoma. We hope churches will do something for their staff to show appreciation.

#### Day of Prayer

A Day of Prayer has been conducted each Wednesday of 1996 in the Roberts' Prayer Room located on the first floor of the Baptist Building. Departments have committed thirty-minute segments of time to be in the Prayer Room praying for special needs in churches, associations and individuals' lives. Chapel services are held each Wednesday at 10:45 a.m. This gives us a concentrated day of prayer. Many individuals and churches have telephoned their prayer requests to the Planning and Promotion Office that coordinates the Day of Prayer.

#### **Orientation for New Pastors/Staff**

An orientation was conducted for new pastors/staff at the Baptist Building April 11. Resources from the Baptist General Convention and the Baptist Sunday School Board were shared. Norris Smith.

Pastor-Staff Leadership Department at the Sunday School Board, spent the afternoon talking about how pastors and staff can have a balanced, healthy ministry, "A Pastor's Manual for Pastors of Smaller in Membership Churches," "Young's Analytical Concordance," "We're Family" and other books were given to approximately 37 pastors/staff who attended.

#### Associational Services

Among Baptist bodies, associations are closest to the churches. The associations' work is vital to the work of our Lord and Baptists in Oklahoma. We have 42 associations. The following directors are new to their positions since the last publication of the Book of Reports:

David Shaw, Salt Fork (9/95 after two years as interim); Phillip Wade, Choctaw Association (11/95); Mike Tompkins, Comanche-Cotton Association (1/96); and Lonnie Latham, Tulsa Metro Association (8/96).

Jess. E. Dittmar, former Director of Missions in Washington-Osage Association from 1948-1966 passed away March 14, 1996.

Northeastern, South Canadian and Union Associations are in the final stages of strategy planning and will soon enter the implementation phase. Southwest and Muskogee-Seminole-Wichita Associations have requested assistance with strategy planning in their associations. They are in the process of selecting consultants.

Two training conferences were conducted with the Directors of Missions. They met at Falls Creek Conference Center, February 5-8, and Oklahoma City, August 22-23. The February conference provided training in Intentional Interim Ministry and Helping the Church Use Demographic Data in Church Outreach. Chester Davidson, from Texas, assisted with the training. Dr. Alton Fannin, pastor of Ardmore First Baptist Church, led the Bible studies. The August conference provided training in "Pastoral and Church Intervention," led by Norris Smith, from the Pastor-Staff Leadership Department at the Baptist Sunday School Board.

#### 90 Onward Dialogues

Each year the Associate Executive Director schedules dialogues in 12 or 13 associations. The Executive Director-Treasurer, Associate Executive Director, Editor of the *Baptist Messenger*, Director of Ministerial Services, BSU Director, Baptist Foundation President, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma President, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children President, and the President of Oklahoma Baptist University meet with pastors and interested lay people to answer questions relative to the programs and work of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. In 1996, dialogues were conducted in the following associations: Atoka-Coal, Bryan, Rogers, Washington-Osage, Kay, Cimarron, Southwest, Tillman, Union, Enon and Arbuckle.

#### Church Administration

Henry L. Chennault serves the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma as consultant in church administration. During 1995-96, several training conferences were provided across the state of Oklahoma:

- regional tax seminars for church staff, treasurers and financial secretaries
- church secretaries certification seminar offering basic and advanced skills certification
- meetings with several associations and conferences with pastors and lay leaders concerning tax matters and IRS regulations.

#### Stewardship

Henry L. Chennault also serves as Director of Stewardship. The Planning and Promotion Office aids Oklahoma Baptist churches in stewardship promotion and development. This assistance is given through area and associational conferences, individual church conferences, and personal staff conferences.

Each Oklahoma Baptist church is encouraged to have at least one stewardship emphasis per year. It is suggested that churches also have a mini-stewardship emphasis in May, prior to the summer months. 1996 saw a record number of churches implementing the materials for May Mini-Stewardship Emphasis.

In 1994, Henry L. Chennault and Jim Rich of the Missouri Baptist Convention developed a new stewardship program, WORSHIP-GIVERS. WORSHIPGIVERS will be the main stewardship promotion in 1996.

Stewardship packets, with detailed information, suggestions, and samples of free materials are mailed in the spring and summer for use by all churches.

Media Services

The Media Services were assigned, late in 1990, to Henry L. Chennault, associate Director of Planning and Promotion. The Church Media Library program continues to serve the needs of Oklahoma churches regarding video tape rental. Also, the state church/media library conference was conducted June 24-25, 1996, at the Baptist Building. A very fine attendance resulted in many church librarians receiving excellent training.

Chennault compiles and edits a quarterly Christian Life Report for Oklahoma Baptists' Christian Life Committee. This report deals with moral issues and is mailed to pastors and directors of missions. The materials in this report are designed to help pastors more effectively communicate with their people.

**Continuing Education** 

January 1, 1994, the work of continuing education was moved to the Office of Planning and Promotion and Dr. Henry L. Chennault became director This ministry includes a working relationship with Oklahoma Baptist University through the Ministry Training Institutes, Southwestern and Midwestern Seminaries, providing both master and doctoral level work as well as seminary extension ministry through the Southern Baptist Convention. Persons involved in this ministry include: Ministry Training Institutes - 300-350, Southwestern Seminary - 115-130, Midwestern Seminary - 15-25, and Seminary Extension - 75-150. The Oklahoma Bible Conference at Falls Creek and the KBA Bible Conference at Kiamichi provided continuing education for pastors and staff persons in 1996.

Voter Education/Registration

As Christians we have responsibilities both in the realm of the nation and in the realm of God's Kingdom. We have responsibilities and we have rights in both realms. We are commanded by Jesus to be the "salt" of the earth and the "light" of the world. This means that Christians as citizens are to be in active engagement with the world, preserving as salt and illuminating as light.

Our country was rooted in Christianity with the Pilgrims defying the odds of a 66-day Atlantic crossing for the sake of the gospel. James Madison, the chief architect of the United States Constitution, said, "We have staked the whole of our political institution on the capacity of mankind to govern themselves according to the Ten Commandments of God."

Over the past three decades, we have seen our nation turn away and scoff at the biblical principles on which our nation was founded. Now it is up to us to restore those principles. It is not a question of can Christians make an impact on government, but will we? We must make an impact because our nation's future as well as the future of our children and grandchildren is at stake. How can Christians make an impact on government?

The first step is to vote. Statistics reflect that less than half of the eligible voters actually vote. Only 62% of the public is even registered to vote. Why? Reasons range from apathy to a general frustration with the political process. Your vote in the primary elections can have even more influence than in the general elections. A tiny fraction of the American people narrow down the choice for everyone else in the country. The fewer number of people who vote, the more important each vote becomes. So in the local elections where voter turnout is

even lower, your vote can make a difference.

The second action item is we must stay in touch with our legislators by communicating our concerns. Write and/or call them to let them know how you feel about an issue. Attend town hall meetings.

The third action item is to work on campaigns—to help the candidate who promotes your convictions. Many times we Christians are too busy with hobbies, personal entertainment and other commitments to see the importance of campaign involvement.

The fourth action item is what self-government is all about—consider running for office yourself. Maybe not for the House or Senate, but you can run for City Council or school board. Our school boards need the influence of Christians to protect our children.

Fifth, we must pray. We must repent of our lack of past involvement and start praying now—fervently—for our nation. Pray specifically for our leaders by name. They need direction and wisdom from Almighty God.

Biblical passages that require Christians to be involved in government and public policy:

It is God's will that there be government—Is. 9:6-7;

Government has existed from eternity past—Ezek. 28:12-19;

Government will exist in eternity future—Rev. 20:4,6; 2 Tim. 2:12; Rev. 5:10;

God is personally involved in government affairs, even to the choosing of rulers—Is. 22:21; Is. 14:5;

We are to pray for all who are in authority over us—1 Tim. 2:1-2.

Although Oklahoma now has the "Motor Voter" law, everyone in the state of Oklahoma can be a "voter registrar" because anyone can carry around blank forms. These forms can be obtained at any post office or your county election board. Churches can still have voter registration since it is a non-partisan activity. Voter registration applications may be submitted at any time; however, voter identification cards cannot be issued during the 24 days prior to an election.

#### The NEA-Agent For the Homosexual Agenda

Many Oklahoma Baptists were aware of the resolution passed by the National Education Association in September of 1995 concerning the promotion of the homosexual agenda in our public schools. The resolution adopted by nearly 9,000 delegates attending the convention reads as follows:

#### B-9. Sexual Orientation Education

The National Education Association recognizes the importance of raising the awareness and increasing the sensitivity of staff, students, parents, and the community to sexual orientation in our society. The Association therefore supports the development of positive plans that lead to effective ongoing training programs for education employees

for the purpose of identifying and eliminating sexual orientation stereotyping in the educational setting. Such programs should attend to but not be limited to:

- a. Accurate portrayal of the roles and contributions of gay, lesbian, and bisexual people throughout history, with acknowledgement of their sexual orientation;
- The acceptance of diverse sexual orientation and the awareness of sexual stereotyping whenever sexuality and/or tolerance of diversity is taught;
- c. Elimination of sexual orientation name-calling and jokes in the classroom:
- d Support for the celebration of a Lesbian and Gay History Month as a means of acknowledging the contributions of lesbians, gays, and bisexuals throughout history.

Due to immediate action of aware teachers, parents and concerned Christians, not only in Oklahoma, but across the country, this threat to our children was somewhat averted. Because of pressure applied to the NEA in the form of letters, phone calls, faxes, newspaper ads, editorials, and threats to withdraw their NEA membership by opposing teachers, the resolution was removed. While this was a true victory for family values, the war is far from over. A new resolution was passed in July 1996 that reads as follows:

B-7. Racism, Sexism, and Sexual Orientation Discrimination

The National Education Association believes in the equality of all individuals. Discrimination and stereotyping based on such factors as race, gender, immigration status, physical disabilities, ethnicity, and sexual orientation must be eliminated.

The Association also believes that plans, activities, and programs for education employees, students, parents, and the community should be developed to identify and eliminate discrimination and stereotyping in all educational settings. Such plans, activities, and programs must:

- a. Increase acceptance of and sensitivity to individuals and groups in a diverse society composed of such groups as American Indians/Alaska Natives, Asians and Pacific Islanders, Blacks, Hispanics, women, gays and lesbians, and people with disabilities;
- Eliminate discrimination and stereotyping in the curriculum, textbooks, resource and instructional materials, activities, etc.
- c Foster the use of nondiscriminatory, nonracist, nonsexist and nonstereotypical language, resources, practices, and activities;
- d. Eliminate institutional discrimination:
- e. Integrate an accurate portrayal of the roles and contributions of all groups through history across the curriculum;
- f. Identify how prejudice, stereotyping, and discrimination have limited the roles and contributions of individuals and groups;

g. Eliminate subtle practices that favor the education of one student over another on the basis of race, ethnicity, gender, physical disabilities, or sexual orientation.

Reading carefully the working parts a. and g., one can see how the terms "gay, lesbian, and sexual orientation" are included in a listing of benign traits and qualities that, in actuality, one has little or no control over. "Race and ethnicity," etc. describe who a person is. "Sexual orientation" obviously refers to homosexual behavior in which one freely chooses to participate. Though this new resolution is "watered-down," there remains no doubt that those promoting the gay agenda plan to fight persistently to infiltrate our schools.

This frustration with the NEA has led to the organization of new teacher unions which more accurately reflect the values and educational philosophies of growing numbers of teachers. The Association of Professional Oklahoma Educators is an example of a teachers' organization that offers needed benefits without the controversial political and philosophical agendas promoted by the NEA.

While it is heartening to realize that change for good can be effected through prayer and activism, it is sobering to observe the relentless and insidious schemes that those in the homosexual movement persist in employing to further their cause. We must never become complacent in the face of popular cultural currents. We must be aware, educated, and ready and willing to act with boldness. We must never stop fighting, with God's help, for our children.

#### Partial-Birth Abortion: Infanticide

The partial-birth abortion procedure is used after 20 weeks (4½ months) of pregnancy. This procedure can be performed up to a full term pregnancy. The difference between partial-birth abortion and homicide is a mere three inches. As long as the baby's head is still inside the mother's birth canal it is considered an abortion. If the baby is fully delivered alive, then killed, it would be homicide. It's still infanticide, regardless of what type of procedure is used.

Can the baby feel pain? Yes! The anesthesia given the mother has little or no effect on the baby, according to congressional testimony by the nation's leading anesthesiologists, including the president of the American Society of Anesthesiologists. Medical experts testified that babies at this age can experience great pain.

What is the reason for this procedure? Dr. Martin Haskell, who has performed over 1,000 partial-birth abortions, said that he performs them "routinely" for non-medical reason, and that 80 percent are "purely elective." Medical experts testified before congressional committees that it is never necessary to kill a baby that has been almost entirely delivered to preserve the life or health of a mother.

Another abortionist, Dr. James McMahon, who has performed over 2,000 such procedures, submitted to the House Judiciary Committee a

paper indicating that 22 percent of the procedures he performed were for "maternal indications" (e.g., for the mother's health) for "depression."

A high proportion of late-term abortions including partial-birth abortions, are performed on healthy young teenage girls who conceal their pregnancies until the babies are far along. A spokeswoman for one clinic specializing in late second-trimester and third-trimester abortions said that "about three-fourths" of its clients "are teenagers who have denied to themselves or their families that they were pregnant until it was too late to hide it" (Kansas City Star).

On December 7, 1995, the Senate passed the Act to end partial-birth abortions by a margin of 54-44. On March 27, 1996, the House approved the Act by 286-129. President Clinton vetoed the bill April 10, 1996, thereby allowing this brutal procedure to continue with no restrictions. All six of Oklahoma's House members and both Senators voted for the bill when it originally passed.

Pro-abortion groups are demanding an exception for "health" abortions. This would allow a huge loophole for partial-birth abortions to include "emotional well-being" or "depression" in that category.

What can you do? Pray!! Educate yourself and others on abortion issues. Write to your congressmen and president to voice your concern. Participate in your local Life Chain each year during the first Sunday in October. Financially support and volunteer at your local Crisis Pregnancy Center. Show Christ's love to families in your church who are experiencing a pregnancy out of marriage. Promote a True Love Waits program in your church. Offer love and forgiveness to women who have had an abortion. Hug your children and grandchildren, especially teenagers. Tell them you love them, unconditionally.

## Report of the Board of Directors The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

#### Robert L. Ross, President

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is the incorporated trust agency of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. All endowment gifts received by or for Convention agencies, institutions, departments or special projects are transferred to the Foundation for management. No Convention entity holds and/or manages its own endowment funds.

Because of this unique relationship, dating back to November, 1946, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has grown to be third in size among the 32 state Southern Baptist foundations.

As of December 31, 1995, assets held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma totaled \$129.5 million. New gifts received during the past audit year were \$ 5.6 million.

As trustee for endowment gifts for Oklahoma and Southern Baptist causes, The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma distributed some \$ 6 million on behalf of approximately 100 beneficiaries during the past year. These beneficiaries include churches, associations, foreign, home and state missions, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Oklahoma Baptist University, Baptist Student Unions, the Southern Baptist Convention and individuals who receive income from trusts during their lifetime.

The ethic and philosophy of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma is clearly defined by an investment policy statement adopted by the Foundation's Board of Directors in October, 1986: "The Foundation is committed to conducting its business affairs in a manner consistent with the highest Christian moral and ethical standards taught and implied in the Scriptures, and shall in no way compromise its Christian witness in the world by investment in a company or activity which does not promote the best interests of a wholesome society. No assets held by the Foundation are invested in companies related to the liquor, tobacco or gambling industries, or companies dealing in pornographic materials, or companies promoting entertainment forms which present as norm lifestyles inconsistent with Christian morality or companies which violate basic human rights by their manner of doing business."

The Foundation's Board of Directors is composed of 20 business and professional people from across the state, each serving a four year term. The directors are organized into four functioning committees. These committees are: audit and trust administration; estate stewardship and promotion; church building loans/real estate/student services, and investment. The chairpersons of each of these committees constitute the executive committee. In addition, there are five individuals who serve as advisors to the Foundation's Board of Directors.

Sloan (Oklahoma City), Bob Wagoner (Broken Arrow) and Chester Ward Jr. (Ponca City). Advisors are:

David W. Morley (Enid), Ed Petersen (Lawton), Henry D.Powell (Bartlesville), Charles Sutter (Edmond) and Louis F. Trost (Oklahoma City). John Crain (Tulsa) and Ed Packwood (Oklahoma City) are advisors emeritus.

The Foundation's programs and day-by-day operations are administered by an executive staff consisting of Robert L. Ross, president; Ronald L. Fannin, senior vice president for loan services; Robert Kellogg, senior vice president and chief financial officer; Shryln Treadwell, vice president for trust administration; Melinda Warren, vice president for estate stewardship services; John Schantz, controller; Wayne Childers, director of communication and public relations and Perry Cox, director of the Tulsa regional office.

The Foundation's main offices are in the Baptist Building at 3800 North May Avenue in Oklahoma City. A full service regional office is located in the Bank of Oklahoma Mortgage Corporation Building, Suite 706 at 7060 South Yale Avenue in Tulsa. Estate stewardship counselors also reside in Muskogee and Duncan and may be reached through a Baptist Foundation listing in those cities.

The report which follows is presented under sub-headings representing areas of work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

#### INVESTMENTS

Assets held by the Foundation, were for the most part, invested in the Equity Investment Pool (EIP) and the Fixed Income Pool (FIP) during last year. The EIP is composed of stocks and cash equivalent investment instruments while the FIP contains church building loans, U.S. treasuries, corporate and government bonds. The Church Funds Income Pool (CFIP) was added in the third quarter of 1995 as part of the new Church Funds Management program. The pool is composed of U.S. treasuries, corporate and government bonds. The market value of the combined pools as of December 31, 1995, was \$113,948,060.

The various account types administered by the Foundation are invested in different proportions of equity and fixed income investments (asset mix) based on their account type and investment objectives. The asset mix expresses the percentage of investment in the EIP and FIP.

Assets that are not endowment in nature are invested with an asset mix of 65 percent in the FIP and 35 percent in the EIP. The Foundation distributes earned income (stock dividends and interest on bonds and cash equivalents) to the beneficiaries of these accounts.

In accordance with the Foundation's Spending Policy and total rate of return concept, and in compliance with Oklahoma's Uniform Management of Institutional Endowment Fund Act, the Foundation is allowed to recognize and distribute asset appreciation, in a prudent

manner, on endowment assets. Endowment asset accounts have an asset mix of 60 percent in the EIP and 40 percent in the FIP. The Foundation distributes \$0.0556 per unit to beneficiaries of these accounts.

The Church Funds Management program allows Southern Baptist churches and associations in Oklahoma to invest their discretionary funds with the Foundation. Currently, there are three funds, the church growth fund invested entirely in the EIP, the church income fund invested entirely in the CFIP and the church balanced fund that is invested equally in the EIP and CFIP.

The Foundation's equity portfolios are managed by five professional equity management firms: Brandes Investment Partners, Inc., San Diego, California; Laurel Capital Advisors, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; Mississippi Valley Advisors, St. Louis, Missouri; Sirach Capital Management, Seattle, Washington; and Tom Johnson Investment Management, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The Foundation's bond portfolio is managed by Ferguson, Wellman, Rudd, Purdy and Van Winkle, Portland, Oregon. Dave Patrick of Smith Barney serves as an investment consultant to the Foundation in monitoring and reporting on the investment activity and performance of the investment managers. The investment committee of the Board of Directors meets quarterly to review the progress of the Foundation's investment strategy.

Other assets managed by the Foundation are not invested in the investment pools due to the nature of the assets, such as real estate properties, mineral interest and production, tax exempt bonds and other miscellaneous gifts.

#### TRUST ADMINISTRATION

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma currently administers more than 1,200 trusts, including endowments, charitable remainder trusts, gift annuity contracts, and personal trusts. Administration of these trusts involves the receiving and investing of corpus contributions, distributing income to beneficiaries, and reporting to appropriate individuals and other entities. Fiduciary responsibility requires a continuous monitoring process to assure that trusts are administered according to the terms of the document and that there is full and accurate accounting of income and expenses.

Approximately 30 percent of trusts administered by the Foundation require tax reporting to the Internal Revenue Service and the Oklahoma Tax Commission. These personal and trust returns are prepared either by The Baptist Foundation or by an outside accounting firm.

of Oklahoma," adopted by the Board of Directors in July 1992 are available upon request. Procedures for implementation of trust administration policies are subject to continuing review and revision.

#### ESTATE STEWARDSHIP SERVICES

One cannot describe the work of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma without using words like "ministry" and "service." For nearly fifty years, the Baptist Foundation has offered estate planning information and assistance to Baptist people. Last year 793 persons were assisted by the estate stewardship staff of the Foundation. This led to the preparation of 618 Christian wills, 148 trusts, and 27 gift annuities.

Melinda Warren directs the estate stewardship services. Five other staff members assist in the area of estate stewardship. Rex Wilkinson serves as an estate stewardship counselor for the eastern half of the state. Mart Hardin serves as an estate stewardship counselor for the western part of the state. Neal Wooldridge serves as an estate stewardship counselor for the central part of the state. Judy Branom has estate stewardship responsibilities in the Oklahoma City area. Perry Cox directs the Tulsa office.

Estate planning is a highly specialized area complicated by changing tax laws and emerging techniques. Therefore, professional training is an ongoing activity with the Foundation staff. Foundation personnel also relate to other professionals such as attorneys, accountants, financial planners and insurance agents to accomplish the charitable objectives of clients.

The estate stewardship area assists persons in developing and raising their awareness in regard to their giving. It also assists agencies, institutions, and departments of our Convention to fulfill their mission.

#### CHURCH BUILDING LOAN SERVICES

The Board of Directors of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma established the Church Building Loan program as an investment strategy in 1954. It is designed to provide endowment income for Baptist causes through long term financing of church and associational building projects. Cooperating churches, associations, institutions and agencies of the BGCO have secured loans from the Foundation knowing that their interest payments help support various Baptist causes.

Current church building loan investments total nearly \$26 million, including participation loans with the Home Mission Board. In addition to the loans made to Oklahoma Southern Baptist Churches, loans have been approved for Southern Baptist churches in Kansas and Nebraska. However, Oklahoma churches are always given first priority.

Church equity loans are also available, allowing a church to borrow up to 50 percent of their property's present market value, provided debt service for the loan does not exceed 25 percent. This equity loan may be used for any ministry items the church deems feasable.

Loan application packets are available upon request from the Foundation's Loan Services Department at 1-800-949-9988. A foundation representative visits personally with each applicant to assure adequate collateral for the loan and to answer all questions from the borrower. Applications received by the first of the month are considered in that monthly meeting of the Foundation Loan Services Committee.

A total of 1,219 loans have been made since 1954. This past year from August 1, 1994, through July 31, 1995, 20 loans were made, totaling \$2,641,000. Loans in effect during the past year produced more than \$2 million in interest income for Baptist causes during this same time period.

There are four types of competitive interest rates offered to borrowers: (1) an annual adjustable rate, (2) a three year adjustable rate, (3) a five year guaranteed fixed rate and (4) a ten year guaranteed fixed rate. A maximum term of 15 years is offered for each loan and each interest rate has a maximum adjustment of 5% over the life of the loan.

### COMMUNICATION AND PUBLIC RELATIONS SERVICES Communicating through special emphases:

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 1996 with a myriad of events. Nineteen bus tours were conducted originating from all over Oklahoma. Each tour group visited Oklahoma Baptist University, a children's home, a retirement center, the Baptist Building and a local Baptist Student Union. More than 500 people participated in these tours. In addition to the bus tours the Foundation sponsored 5 golf tournaments, several small group meetings, drama team presentations in local churches and a major banquet in Tulsa.

Each year two observances on the denominational calendar focus on Foundation ministries. January is "Make Your Will Month" and September is "Baptist Foundation Month." News stories, articles and editorials in the *Baptist Messenger*, associational newsletters and other denominational publications promote these emphases in the churches.

The Baptist Foundation also presents its ministries and distributes literature through display booths at the Convention's annual meeting, the State Evangelism Conference, the Kansas-Nebraska Convention, Senior Adult Conference at OBU, associational annual meetings and this year at the Southern Baptist Conference of the Deaf at OBU.

This year the Foundation conducted a number of special programs. Among them was an estate planning seminar at Duncan sponsored by a Western Oklahoma bank in which the Baptist Foundation joined with the Oklahoma United Methodists in the program presentation.

The Foundation, in seeking to communicate with attorneys and other professionals distributed a number of attorney's packets again

this year. An attorney's packet consists of specimen copies of legal documents such as wills and trusts.

Two departments of the Convention received assistance from the Foundation in promoting endowment. The department of church music promoted endowment and estate planning among the Singing ChurchWomen and Churchmen prior to the trip to China. The Foundation assisted in the design of a brochure and individual appointments with those needing to prepare a last will and testament or trust.

Falls Creek Baptist Conference Center on the eve of its 80th birthday promoted endowment each week of 1996 by relating the story of Oran Carson, a farmer from Faxon, Oklahoma, who remembered Falls Creek in his will. A percentage of the offerings received was designated for endowment. The Foundation assisted in the offering, spoke to the sponsors and prepared a brochure and promotional fans for distribution.

Financial planning was a special emphasis in 1996. Melinda Warren, vice president of estate stewardship services, and a certified financial planner, conducted financial planning seminars in a number of churches. These one hour seminars deal with the creation and preservation of an estate.

#### Communicating through literature:

Distributing literature and other materials is yet another way the Foundation presents important information. Literature is distributed as staff members speak in churches or associations, and by mailings to persons requesting information.

Literature pieces currently available for distribution include: The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma; Do You Need A Will?; Estate Planning, A Christian Perspective; When Death Does Us Part; The Personal Representative; W.A.T.S., A Bright Idea; What on Earth Are You Doing For Heaven's Sake; The Forever Fund; A Gift Annuity, Having Your Cake and Eating It Too; The Gift Annuity Contract; The Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust; The Charitable Remainder Unitrust; The Lawyer and His Baptist Client; The Personal Record Album; The Revocable Living Trust; Policies and Regulations for Church Building Loans; Policies and Regulations for Student Scholarships and Loans; and Trust Administration Policies.

#### Communicating through media:

Press releases are prepared periodically for major, regional and local newspapers, the *Baptist Messenger*, other denominational and professional publications.

To make the Foundation more accessible to clients, churches, pastors, directors of missions, attorneys and other professionals an 800 number has been secured. The number is: 800-949-9988.

A video was produced in 1995-96 introducing the services of the Foundation. The video was used in pastors' meetings, small group meetings, clients' conference, and in other special emphases.

#### Communicating through ongoing programs:

Associational pastors' luncheons or dinners were conducted in four associations in Western and Southeastern Oklahoma. Attendance at these meetings totaled more than 100 with 41 churches represented.

The Annual Clients' Conference at Oklahoma City in September was attended by 90 clients, board members and guests. Clients are individuals who have a special trust relationship with the Foundation.

Foundation staff members conducted 60 W.A.T.S. (Will and Trust Seminar) emphases in churches. A W.A.T.S. emphasis involves staff members speaking on the work of the Foundation in morning worship services, conducting estate planning seminars and preaching on estate stewardship in evening worship services. They also meet by appointment with persons interested in receiving estate planning assistance. A number of these seminars were also conducted at noonday senior adult programs.

#### PERSONAL TRUSTEE SERVICES

The Baptist Foundation, in serving as trustee for the assets of individuals, provides financial services in addition to meeting the ministry and personal needs of trustors. For those individuals who have established a Life Care Trust with the Foundation, the following services are provided by staff members: managing trust assets, paying bills, filing and tracing insurance claims, sending regular distribution checks, explaining financial reports, and distributing trust assets according to the document.

Because many trustors have no close family members to care for them, assistance is also provided in other areas of their lives. Whether help is needed in scheduling and arriving at doctor's visits or simply a personal visit to the retirement center or nursing home is desired, Foundation staff members will work to see that both personal and spiritual needs are met.

Finley Tinnin, administrative assistant, regularly visits with these individuals and provides for many of their personal needs. In addition, Shryln Treadwell works with trustors in answering questions and managing their personal finances. At this time, the Foundation has a Life Care Trust relationship with approximately 20 persons across the state.

### PROPERTY MANAGEMENT AND MINERAL LEASING SERVICES

Management of real and mineral properties is directed by a committee of board members. Decisions to sell, lease, rent, or repair properties are determined according to provisions in legal documents by which properties are received and upon recommendations of staff.

Gifts of real property are usually in four categories: residential, commercial, farm land, and wasting properties, such as lake lots, cemetery lots, etc. It is the policy of the Foundation to sell properties that have been received by the Foundation as quickly as possible.

The Foundation holds deeds to more than 25,000 acres of mineral

interest in 61 counties in Oklahoma and in nine other states. During the past year the Foundation received 9 units of mineral interest in Oklahoma and Texas. Mineral income last year audit totaled \$358.822.

#### STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP AND LOAN SERVICES

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma invests in people—especially young people involved in educational pursuits—by providing student scholarships and/or loans. There is no more effective way to shape the future than to assist in the educational preparation of bright, committed Christian young people who can significantly impact their world for Christ.

Presently the Foundation administers more than 300 scholarship and loan trusts. In most cases, donors establish criteria for the determination of recipients. Most of these grants and loans are limited to students attending Oklahoma Baptist University or Southern Baptist seminaries. There are a limited number of scholarships provided through the Foundation to qualified applicants on a "funds available" basis.

During the 1995-96 school year, 111 students benefitted from Foundation administered scholarships totaling \$38,850.

Twenty-six low interest student loans totaling approximately \$71,800 are administered by the Foundation and serviced by AFSA Data Corporation. Loan recipients are required to pay only the interest on loans while in school. Upon graduation or termination of their education, amortized schedules are established for monthly repayment of loans over an extended period of time. Interest received from student loans is returned to student loan trusts so that more students may be helped with their educational needs.

### **Historical Commission**

#### J. M. Gaskin, Historical Secretary

The Historical Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma was formed by convention action in 1952. The nine members of the commission are elected by the convention to three-year, staggered terms. The two officers are chairman and recording secretary. In 1996 Lem Ball and Jerry Faught have served as chairman and secretary, respectively. Other members are Tommy Billings, Weldon Foster, Robert Jackson (resigned), Anson Justice, Rick McClatchy, Jack Robbins and Alton Webb. Meetings were held March 12 and September 6, at which times the commission heard reports from the

committees, Historical Secretary, Director of History and others as needs arose.

The Historical Commission is the convention's official history agency. It has a number of ongoing projects and sponsors frequent special projects. The work is funded by the convention from Cooperative Program allocations. The commission reports its activities to the state convention annually.

**Ongoing Projects** 

Publications: The oldest ongoing project is the publication of *The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle*, an historical journal published twice each year. J. M. Gaskin has been editor since the periodical was established in 1958. Another continuing project, *The Circular Letter*, published two issues of Volume XXI in 1996.

Awards: Four awards are made each year—the Gaskin Baptist History Award; the Gaskin Church History Award; the Distinguished Service Award; and the Baptist Heritage Sermon Award.

The Gaskin Baptist History Award is an OBU project. The person submitting the winning entry receives a cash award (from a modest endowment set up by Gaskin) and an attractive certificate. A faculty committee at OBU judges entries and selects the winning entry or entries. There have been times when there were co-winners.

The Gaskin Church History Award is a convention-wide project. Any person who submits two copies of a book or manuscript on any aspect of religious history in Oklahoma is a welcome participant. Subjects may range from a local church to a biography—including associations and conventions, extant and extinct; religious institutions; significant movements, such as the "Charismatic Movement"; and relevant issues such as Fundamentalism, Liberalism, Modernism, evolution, textual criticism, and a host of other Baptist and non-Baptist topics. The winning entry each year is selected by a committee of the Historical Commission. All entries received are retained by the Commission and become part of the Archives and Historical Library.

The Distinguished Service Award is given to one or two persons each year. Selections are made by a committee. This award goes to persons who have made significant contributions to Oklahoma Baptist history. The first recipient was J. M. Gaskin in 1987. Other recipients have been Lemuel F. Ball, Jr. (1988); Anson Justice (1989); C. B. Lewis (1990); J. R. Stogsdill (1991); Robert S. Jackson (1992); Margaret Brower Garner and Helen Gaskin (1993); Helen Thames Raley (1994); and Slayden A. Yarbrough (1995).

The Baptist Heritage Sermon Award goes to a person who submits the winning sermon in a given year. A committee judges entries as to historical relevance, form, content, grammar and other technical aspects of writing skills. This project is open to any Baptist preacher in Oklahoma. Manuscripts may or may not be published. They are retained in the Archives along with all other entries, whether in book or manuscript form.

#### **Occasional Projects**

Among the more significant projects of the year was the writing and publication of a biography of William G. and Ellen Tanner. J. M. Gaskin and Robert E. Haskins wrote William Graydon Tanner: A Man for the Times. It was published under the auspices of the Historical Commission and marketed from the Baptist Building. Copies in hard cover sell for \$15, and soft cover copies sell for \$10 each. The price includes handling and shipping.

Occasional projects the Historical Commission has sponsored include publication of more than 25 books; erection and dedication of 20 historical markers; five historical tours; three statewide history-writing contests; and many local, area and statewide workshops and seminars on planning church anniversaries and writing church history, family history, and doing oral history.

#### **Historical Society**

The Historical Society was constituted in 1956 at the direction of the convention's board of directors. Its constitution provides that it shall serve as auxiliary to the commission. The organizational meeting, held on November 1, 1956, at Beverly's Hideaway in Oklahoma City, was attended by 89 persons. The charter membership consisted of 141 persons. J. M. Gaskin was the first president; Roger D. Hebard, vice-president; and John Meadows, secretary.

Membership in the Historical Society is open to all persons who have an interest in Oklahoma Baptist history. The Society meets each year during the annual sessions of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. Annual memberships are \$5 and life memberships are \$50. Members receive the ongoing publications of the Historical Commission and the Historical Society (The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle and The Circular Letter).

Current officers are J. D. Dowdell, president; J. W. Ray, vice president; Forrest A. Upchurch, secretary; Anthony Jordan, treasurer; and J. M. Gaskin, historical secretary. There are 355 members.

#### Archives

In the mid-1950s, Dr. John W. Raley, president of OBU, proposed the formation of a Baptist collection in Oklahoma. He offered space to house the collection at OBU, and Dr. T. B. Lackey, executive secretary-treasurer of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, pledged his support to the project. Lee Bowen Spencer, OBU librarian, was made the curator. J. M. Gaskin, elected Historical Secretary in 1953, worked with Spencer in collecting, housing, and using the Baptist collection for several years. After Spencer moved to Arkansas in 1966, Dr. E. W. Thornton assumed the role of curator of the collection in 1968. A retired history professor at OBU, Dr. Thornton was the logical

and ideal person to give guidance to building the Baptist collection during the years 1968-78. He retired from his part-time position in 1978 and died at Shawnee in 1980.

In 1976 J. M. Gaskin became full time as Director of History for the convention. He served 15 years, retired from the OBU position in 1991, and was succeeded by J. D. Dowdell. After five years in that position, Dowdell resigned effective June 30, 1996.

In March 1996 the Oklahoma Baptist Collection was relocated to the Baptist Building in Oklahoma City. It was dedicated in formal ceremonies, including a noon luncheon, on April 12, 1996. Upon recommendation of the Historical Commission, the convention in its 1995 annual meeting approved renaming the collection the Gaskin Baptist Archives and Historical Library in honor of J. M. Gaskin.

Bettie M. Moore: When the Archives moved to Oklahoma City, Bettie M. Moore was employed as the Resident Director. She works most of five days each week. Her work includes correspondence, accessing new acquisitions, helping people do research, directing guided tours, and providing information by telephone, mail and personal interviews.

Archives Shelf List: Before the Archives moved to Oklahoma City, J. D. Dowdell did an inventory of holdings and prepared a shelf list. He gave the summary of holdings as 5,000 books; 10,000 Annuals of associations, state and Southern Baptist conventions; hundreds of periodicals including such titles as The Indian Missionary; the Baptist Messenger; the Quarterly Review; The Oklahoma Baptist Chronicle; The Baptist Worker; Baptist History and Heritage; The Chronicles of Oklahoma; The Baptist Program; Report from the Capital; and numerous titles lesser known.

There are more than 1,000 tape recordings, including a large collection of oral history interviews; hundreds of pictures and artifacts, including the famous Murrow Press; hundreds of church and associational histories; nearly 1,000 listings in the Baptist biography files; several dozen doctoral and master's dissertations on Oklahoma Baptist history; and a good collection of materials on the Baptist World Alliance and American Baptists (formerly Northern Baptists).

The Okiahoma collection is recognized as one of the larger and better resource centers for research among the many similar collections maintained by the various state Baptist history groups in the Southern Baptist Convention.

Persons working on graduate dissertations, writing college or seminary term papers, doing church and associational histories, making family history collections, and engaging in any other research pursuit on Oklahoma Baptist history and life are invited to make use of the Archives.

#### Independent Auditors' Report

Board of Directors The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma Oklahoma City, Oklahoma

We have audited the accompanying balance sheets of THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 1996 and 1995, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as of December 31, 1996 and 1995, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

As discussed in Note 2 to the financial statements, in 1995 the Foundation changed its method of accounting for contributions and postretirement benefits and its method of financial reporting and financial statement presentation.

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Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The supplementary financial information on pages 24 through 28 is presented for the purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

#### 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

General - The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (the Foundation) is a private, nonprofit religious association chartered by the State of Oklahoma on October 31, 1946 for perpetual existence without capital stock. Its creation was approved by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention) to administer funds and property received by gift, devise, bequest, or otherwise in order to assist and promulgate the furtherance of the Convention, and to promote Baptist doctrines, evangelism, Christian education, and both home and foreign mission work.

Nature of Activities - The Foundation in the capacity of trustee holds, administers, and invests assets for the Convention and institutions affiliated with the Convention as well as for its own account. Trusts may have other charitable or noncharitable beneficiaries. Interests of the Foundation, Convention or affiliates of the Convention may be total or may represent only income or remainder interest.

The Foundation also holds assets for investment in a custodial capacity for the Convention and its affiliates. In addition, the Foundation administers trusts where affiliated organizations serve as trustee.

Activities of the Foundation include estate stewardship and gift planning for the Convention and its affiliates. Staff members work with Southern Baptist Churches and associations within the State of Oklahoma to encourage financial support for local, state and national institutions through lifetime and testamentary planning.

The Foundation receives its financial support primarily from fees charged for the administration and investment of assets. In addition, annual appropriations are received from the Convention through its Cooperative Program.

Financial Statements Presentation - Effective January 1, 1995, the Foundation adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations". Under SFAS No. 117, the Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. As encouraged by this statement, the Foundation has discontinued the use of fund accounting and has reclassified its financial statements to present the three classes of net assets required. This reclassification has no effect on the change in net assets for 1995.

<u>Basis of Accounting</u> - Financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Recognition of Donor Restrictions - Contributions received without restriction are reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets. Donor restricted contributions are recognized as increases in permanently or temporarily restricted net assets. Permanently restricted net assets consist of permanent endowments or remainder interest that will become permanently endowed. Temporarily restricted net assets consist of remainder interests under split-interest agreements that transfer assets unconditionally upon the passage of a period of time, typically the life of the income beneficiary. The liability to income beneficiaries for future payments is determined by applying an annual discount rate of 5% to estimated payments under the agreements.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u> - Cash balances are transferred daily into interest-bearing accounts secured by U. S. Government obligations. Cash equivalents include broker money market accounts and short-term certificates of deposit primarily maturing within the first quarter.

<u>Investment Pools</u> - The Foundation pools the assets under its ownership, administration or control into investment pools. Pools consist of an equity investment pool, fixed income pool and church funds management pool.

Prorata ownership in the pools is determined under a system in which units of ownership are recorded to represent each member's share of the total market value of assets. Investment interest, dividends, gains, losses and appreciation or depreciation in market value are allocated based on each pool member's percentage of ownership represented by these units.

Assets of the equity investment pool consist primarily of cash equivalents and marketable equity securities. Assets of the fixed income and church funds management pools consist of cash equivalents and corporate and governmental notes and bonds. In addition, the fixed income pool holds church building loans.

Allowance for Doubtful Loans - Church building loans included in the fixed income pool (Note 3) are presented net of an allowance for doubtful loans. The allowance is based on 2-1/2% of outstanding balances with adjustments for delinquent or doubtful loans.

Property and Equipment - Major expenditures for equipment are capitalized at cost while donated property and equipment are capitalized at fair market value at the date of the gift.

Depreciation of equipment is provided for over the estimated useful

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lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis. No provision is made for depreciation on rental and other properties carried as investments in the endowment and trust funds.

Liabilities to Beneficial Owners - As discussed in Note 8 the Foundation has recorded liabilities for assets held as trustee, intermediary, custodian or agent for beneficial owners of income or remainder interests. Generally, the Foundation's liability is limited to assets held within a specific trust or account. The Foundation is, however, responsible for the payments to annuitants under certain gift annuity contracts out of its general assets.

Appropriations to Preserve Principal - The Foundation, as discussed in Note 4. manages assets of endowment funds utilizing a total return distribution policy that incorporates a provision under which a portion of asset earnings or appreciation is permanently restricted and added to principal. Where donors so specify, amounts are added to trust corpus from income. In addition, corpus of trusteed or administered trusts is credited with an amount equal to 15% of oil and gas revenue.

<u>Use of Estimates</u> - The preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that effect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual amounts could differ from those estimated.

Income Taxes - The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### 2. Changes in Accounting Policies

As more fully discussed in Notes 3 and 7, the Foundation has adopted SFAS No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made" and SFAS No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions".

SFAS No. 116 provides guidelines under which contributions are recognized as income. Contributions are defined to include unconditional promises to give. The statement specifies treatment in circumstances where the recipient is acting as an intermediary, trustee or agent for the donor and donee organizations and where transfers of assets are deemed to be conditional.

As a result of implementation of SFAS No. 116, assets held for affiliates included in previously issued financial statements under restricted, endowment or other trust fund balances, have been restated to reflect a liability to the beneficial owner of the assets

(see Note 8). Assets held under agreements that are revocable or where principal may be invaded for the benefit of the donor or another have been categorized as refundable advances.

Under SFAS No. 116, the Foundation's rights to remainder interests under irrevocable agreements which pay income to another are recognized as temporarily or permanently restricted contributions upon receipt of assets funding the agreements.

SFAS No. 106 establishes standards where costs under the Foundation's postretirement benefit plan are recognized ratably as services are performed.

As permitted by the Statement, SFAS No. 116 has been initially applied retroactively by restating opening balances at January 1, 1995. SFAS No. 106 has been applied under the immediate recognition option of that statement. Under this option the net benefit obligation at January 1, 1995, has been reflected in the Statement of Activities as the cumulative effect of an accounting change (see Note 7).

#### 3. <u>Investment Pools</u>

Investments of the various funds under management of the Foundation are held in three investment pools. Investment pools consist of an equity investment pool, a fixed income pool, and a church fund management pool.

Trust and custodial accounts participate in the respective pools based upon investment models. These models represent ownership percentages designed for various types of trusts and accounts based on the respective needs for current income or capital appreciation.

As discussed in Note 1, marketable securities held in the pools are accounted for under the market value method. Entry or withdrawal from the pools is based upon the market value of a pool unit. Market value of a pool unit is determined by dividing the total assets by total units outstanding. Within the fixed income pool, the market value of church building loans is assumed to be equal to the total principal balance of these loans less an allowance for doubtful loans equal to approximately 2-1/2% of the principal balance.

#### 4. Total Return Distribution Policy

The Foundation uses a method based upon the total return on assets to determine the amounts distributable from endowments held as trustee and amounts appropriated for expenditure for endowments under which the Foundation is the income beneficiary.

Under the method employed, the Board of Directors establishes a percentage of pooled fund assets to be permanently added to principal over the upcoming year and an amount to be distributed to beneficiary institutions or appropriated for use in operations. These percentages are then reflected as a specified monthly amount for units held in the equity investment or fixed income pools.

The percentages added to corpus and appropriated for expenditure are determined based upon a moving average of investment return over prior years but are also subject to the Board's judgment. During 1996 and 1995, approximately two percent of the initial fair market value of pooled assets was added to endowment principal to preserve its value. Under Oklahoma law, these additions are considered to be permanent and are in addition to any donor stipulated principal additions.

During 1996 and 1995, amounts approximating five and five and one-half percent of pooled asset values were appropriated for distribution or expenditure. After these allocations, the cumulative total investment return that has not been added to principal or appropriated for expenditure is available for future use to preserve principal or increase distributable amounts. This amount is referred to as the stabilization account. Changes in this account for endowments benefiting the Foundation or held by the Foundation as trustee for others are summarized below along with amounts for custodial accounts and endowments administered for other institutions that have elected to be managed under this distribution policy. Because amounts in these accounts are subject to no current restrictions, they constitute unrestricted amounts and the account related to the Foundation's endowment is a part of unrestricted net assets.

#### 5. Other Investments

Other investments totaling \$13,213,469 held outside of the investment pools are presented at cost. Cost generally represents the fair market value at the date of contribution for contributed assets. Purchased assets are recorded at their acquisition cost.

It is the policy of the Foundation to dispose of contributed assets as soon as practical after receipt unless donor provisions request that specific investments continue to be held.

Because these investments primarily: 1) are held at contributed fair market value pending sale; 2) are subject to donor intention to hold or restriction on sale; or 3) consist of revocably transferred assets

Lives of assets are predominantly five years. Automobiles are depreciated to an estimated residual value at the expected date of sale or trade.

# 7. Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pensions

Effective January 1, 1995, the Foundation adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pensions". Under this statement, the Foundation is required to accrue the estimated cost of retiree health, life and termination benefits during the employee's active service period. Previously these costs had been expensed as paid.

The Foundation has elected to recognize this change in accounting on the immediate recognition basis. The cumulative effect as of January 1, 1995, of adopting this standard is an increase in accrued postretirement benefits and reduction in net asset changes for the year of \$586,950.

In determining the obligation under the plan, a weighted average discount rate of 8% was assumed. Health care (premiums) costs were estimated to increase by 11% in 1996, with ratable annual reduction until an ultimate rate of 6% is reached in 2006. Unrecognized prior service benefits cost is being amortized over the remaining service to full eligibility of active employees which averaged 14-2/3 years in 1996.

A 1% increase in the assumed health care cost rate would increase service and interest cost components of the net postretirement benefit expense by approximately \$10,000 and would increase the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation at December 31, 1996 by approximately \$50,000.

#### 8. Liability to Beneficial Owners

The Foundation was formed to administer funds and receive property on behalf of the Convention and other Baptist institutions. In its capacity as trustee, administrator, custodian or agent, the Foundation holds assets for these organizations. In addition, the Foundation acts as trustee under revocable and irrevocable agreements in which donors have retained interest in income, principal or both. The following summarizes categories of arrangements under which the Foundation has liabilities to these beneficial owners. Obligations to make future payments are discounted at 5% which equals the estimated long-term return on investments.

# <u>Liabilities to Income and Remainder Beneficiaries under Split-Interest Agreements</u>

Gift Annuity Contracts - These agreements have been entered into between the Foundation and a donor under which the Foundation has agreed to pay a specified amount, at least annually, to a noncharitable income beneficiary. Typically income payments are for life. The liability to income beneficiaries has been estimated at \$1,127,254 at December 31, 1996, (\$1,019,122 - 1995) and represents a general liability of the Foundation. This liability is equal to the present value of estimated future payments.

Liabilities to Income Beneficiaries under Irrevocable Trust

Agreements - The balances of \$2,826,160 and \$2,895,313 at

December 31, 1996 and 1995 represent the present value of
estimated future payments to noncharitable beneficiaries under
irrevocable trusts. This includes amounts estimated to be payable
to beneficiaries of charitable remainder annuity trusts,
charitable remainder unitrusts and other trusts whose remainder
beneficiaries may be partially noncharitable.

Remainder Interests under Irrevocable Agreements - Liabilities at December 31, 1996 and 1995 of \$8,524,462 and \$8,067,991 represent the remainder interest in assets subject to payments to income beneficiaries as discussed above. Where agreements ultimately benefit the Foundation, remainder interests are included under temporarily or permanently restricted net assets.

# THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Cont'd) For the Years Ended December 31, 1996 and 1995

#### Refundable Assets

Assets Held under Custodial Arrangements - The Foundation holds and invests assets for the Convention and its affiliates in a custodial capacity. Balances of \$23,814,757 and \$20,906,947, respectively, represent the Foundation's liability to return amounts transferred and unremitted earnings to these affiliates. These funds are generally invested in the investment pools in ratios selected by the owner.

Conditional Transfers from Donors - The Foundation receives assets as trustee under agreements that are revocable or provide that trust corpus may be invaded for the benefit of the grantor or a noncharitable beneficiary. Because these assets may be withdrawn by revocation or through consumption by noncharitable beneficiaries, they are considered to be conditional transfers. To the extent the Foundation is an ultimate beneficiary under these agreements, a contribution will be recognized when all conditions are met. This typically will occur when the trust becomes irrevocable and the rights of noncharitable beneficiaries to corpus lapse. At December 31, 1996, net assets of \$15,165,740 (\$13,967,256 - 1995) were held under these agreements.

# Assets Held for Others

Assets Held as Trustee under Permanent Endowments - The Foundation acts as trustee for numerous permanent charitable endowment trusts. These trusts generally benefit the Convention and its affiliates or other Southern Baptist affiliated institutions. Earnings from these funds are disbursed periodically under terms of the agreement or at the discretion of the beneficiary, based upon the distribution policy discussed in Note 4. Net assets totaling \$73,960,463 and \$65,337,204 at December 31, 1996 and 1995 were held under these agreements. While the Foundation will administer these assets in perpetuity, the rights to enjoyment of benefits is vested in the income beneficiaries.

Assets Held under Agreements to Administer Trusts - The Foundation holds, invests and administers assets under trust agreements that name the Convention or its affiliates as trustee. These trusts are administered in a manner identical to those trusts in which the Foundation is named trustee. At December 31, 1996, net assets of \$11,394,166 (\$11,066,687 - 1995) were held under these agreements.

Remainder Interests under Irrevocable Agreements - See commentary under "Liabilities to Income and Remainder Beneficiaries under Split-Interest Agreements" above.

#### 9. Affiliated Entities

As disclosed in Note 1, the Foundation is affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). The majority of the funds administered by the Foundation are for the benefit of the Convention, its affiliates and various other Baptist organizations. Principal affiliates of the Convention and thus the Foundation, are Oklahoma Baptist University, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma and Baptist Building Corporation. For this purpose, affiliates are those organizations whose directors or trustees are elected by the participating churches of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at its annual meeting.

The Foundation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Convention. Appropriations received for the year were \$315,229.

As discussed in Notes 10 and 11, the Foundation has invested funds in the Baptist Building Corporation and has entered into an operating lease for office facilities.

The Foundation, through its fixed income pool, makes loans to churches, associations and agencies affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma to finance the purchase of land and buildings. These loans are secured by first mortgages on the property and buildings constructed and may require personal endorsements of church members. The lives of these loans vary up to a maximum of 15 years. Interest rates are set by the Church Building Loan Committee with consideration given to the current rates available from commercial sources. The balance of church building loans outstanding at December 31, 1996, was \$26,095,512 (1995 - \$27,130,304) including \$3,376,705 of participating loans serviced by the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. An allowance of

\$940,282 for uncollectible loans was recorded as of December 31, 1996 (1995 - \$979,711).

At December 31, 1996, the Foundation had outstanding commitments totaling \$2,648,000 (1995 - \$4,705,000) for church building loans.

#### 10. Pension Plan

All employees of the Foundation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Foundation contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1996 was \$79,602 (1995 - \$78,871). The Foundation's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

#### 11. Leased Facilities

The Foundation is obligated under a lease with the Baptist Building Corporation (a corporation owned and controlled by the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma) for facilities in a newly-purchased building. Currently, payments are \$6,808 monthly.

The lease had an initial term of ten years with options to renew for ten additional one year periods. The agreement provides for increases based upon escalations in operating costs. Rental expense under the lease totaled \$81,702 for 1996 and 1995.

The Foundation also leases office facilities in Tulsa under a five year lease expiring December 31, 2001. Expense under the lease totaled \$11,070 for the year.

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#### 12. Investment in Baptist Building Corporation

During 1990, the Convention entered into an agreement under which custodial funds held by the Foundation were invested in a newly-formed corporation for the purchase and renovation of an office building. Upon completion of renovation, the building was leased, principally to the Convention and its agencies and affiliates including the Foundation. A total of \$4,331,000 has been invested in the Baptist Building Corporation. During 1996, \$41,667 (1995 - \$58,333) was repaid. At December 31, 1996, \$4,231,000 (1995 - \$4,272,667) was outstanding. Repayment of invested funds is at the discretion of the Baptist Building Corporation, however all invested funds must be repaid upon any sale or conveyance of the building. The agreement provides that the Baptist Building Corporation will pay a reasonable rate of return approximating the pooled investment distribution rate. During the year, income totaling \$373,343 was received under this agreement.

#### 13. Remainder Interest in Assets Held by Others

During 1996, the Foundation was notified of the existence of a charitable remainder unitrust naming them as the principal remainder beneficiary. The fair market value of assets held by the trust approximated \$3,180,000 at December 31, 1996.

The trust agreement provides for specified payments to facilities now operated by Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children with the remainder to be distributed outright to the Foundation to be used for purposes as determined by its officers.

The trust agreement constitutes an unconditional promise to give. The present value of estimated future benefits to be received upon the death of the income beneficiary of \$567,746 has been recognized as a temporarily restricted contribution in 1996. Adjustments to reflect amortization of the present value discount, revaluation of assets, and estimated future payments to the income beneficiary will be recognized annually in the statement of activities.

#### 14. Adjustment to Amounts Restated January 1, 1995

At January 1, 1995, the Foundation applied the provisions of FASB 116 by retroactively restating opening balances of net assets and liabilities to beneficial owners (Note 2). During 1996, it was determined that a trust granted the Foundation the authority to determine recipients of income from a portion of its endowed principal. This portion of the trust has been reclassified from a liability to beneficial owners to permanently restricted net assets of the Foundation.

# THE BAPTIST FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Cont'd) For the Years Ended December 31, 1996 and 1995

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In addition, excess distributions of income from a permanently restricted endowment trust have been reclassified to reduce permanently restricted net assets and increase unrestricted net assets.

Unrestricted and permanently restricted net assets at January 1, 1995 and 1996 have been restated to reflect these adjustments. Elements of income, distribution and changes in net assets have been restated from amounts previously reported for the year ended December 31, 1995. The liability for assets held for others under permanent endowments at December 31, 1995 has been reduced by \$886,146.

The adjustment increased change in net assets by \$112,446 for 1995.

#### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations - The Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention) was organized for the purpose of fostering Baptist denominational activities in the State of Oklahoma, and to receive and disburse funds as provided by the various contributors. It was incorporated without capital stock under Oklahoma law. Its first Articles of Incorporation were filed in May, 1917, for a term of twenty years with subsequent amendments providing for an organization in perpetuity.

Administrative activities of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma are conducted by The Executive Office of Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Composition of Reporting Entity - The accompanying financial statements include net assets and operations of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma. The statements include all statewide activities conducted by the Convention except for activities conducted by Oklahoma Baptist University (OBU), The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (BFO), Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. (BRCO), Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. (OBHC) and Baptist Building Corporation. These organizations' directors are elected by messengers sent to the annual meeting of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma by its member churches. These same messengers elect the Board of Directors of the Convention.

As discussed in Note 3, these entities are considered to be affiliates based upon the election of their boards by a common delegate body. Because the Convention, through its governing board, has neither a voting interest nor ownership in these entities, financial statements are limited to direct activities of the Convention conducted through its Executive Office and do not consolidate activities of these affiliates.

Financial Statements Presentation - Effective January 1, 1995, the Convention adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations". Under SFAS No. 117, the Convention is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. As encouraged by this statement, the Convention has discontinued the use of fund accounting and has reclassified its financial statements to present the three classes of net assets

required. This reclassification has no effect on the change in net assets for 1995.

Gifts of cash or other assets received under endowment agreements where donors have restricted use to the income from the assets are reported as increases in permanently restricted net assets. These assets are generally held in trust by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (The Foundation) (Note 5) or by other trustees. To the extent income and realized or unrealized gains are not restricted by donor stipulations or state law, these items are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets in the statement of operations.

<u>Use of Estimates</u> - The preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that effect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual amounts could differ from those estimated.

Recognition of Revenue - The Convention reports contributions as support when assets are received or when an unconditional promise to give has been made. Revenue from sales of subscriptions, advertising, printing, fees and other sources is recorded based upon the receipt of cash or the completion of services or delivery of goods.

<u>Donor Restrictions</u> - The Convention reports gifts of cash or other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated asset. When a donor restriction expires, through the passage of time or when a stipulated purpose is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restriction. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

The Convention reports gifts of property, equipment and long-lived assets as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with specific use restriction and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. The Convention reports expiration of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service.

At December 31, 1996, temporarily restricted net assets consisted of remainder interests held in trust of \$1,548,095 (1995 - \$1,643,021) that are restricted for a period of time and \$1,334,334 (1995 - \$1,815,072) of assets restricted to specific purposes. Primarily these amounts are designated for use in state missions or disaster

relief. Permanently restricted net assets represent present and remainder interests held in perpetual endowment trusts under donor terms that restrict use to the income from these assets.

<u>Property and Equipment</u> - The Convention capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of contribution of \$500 or more. Depreciation has been provided on the straight-line method. Lives generally used are:

Land improvements	20	-	40	years
Buildings	20	-	50	years
Furniture and equipment	4	-	10	years
Automobiles and machinery	3	_	10	years

<u>Income Taxes</u> - The Convention is exempt from federal income taxes under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Statement of Cash Flows - For purposes of the statement of cash flows, only bank deposits subject to immediate withdrawal are considered to be cash equivalents.

#### 2. Changes in Accounting Policies

As more fully discussed in Notes 5 and 7, the Convention has adopted SFAS No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made", SFAS No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions", and SFAS No. 124 "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations".

SFAS No. 116 provides guidelines under which contributions are recognized as income. Contributions are defined to include unconditional promises to give.

Under SFAS No. 116, the Convention's rights to remainder interests under irrevocable agreements which pay income to another are recognized as temporarily or permanently restricted contributions upon receipt of assets funding the agreements.

SFAS No. 106 establishes standards where costs under the Convention's postretirement benefit plan are recognized ratably as services are performed.

SFAS No. 124 requires that investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair market values and all debt securities be reported at fair market value.

As permitted by the Statement, SFAS No. 116 has been initially applied retroactively by restating opening balances at January 1, 1995. SFAS No. 106 has been applied under the immediate recognition option of

that statement. Under this option the net benefit obligation at January 1, 1995, has been reflected in the Statement of Activities as the cumulative effect of an accounting change. SFAS No. 124 has been reflected as the cumulative effect of an accounting change.

#### 3. Affiliated Entities

As disclosed in Note 1, the Convention is affiliated with various other Baptist organizations within the state of Oklahoma. Principal affiliates of the Convention are The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Baptist University, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma and Baptist Building Corporation. For this purpose, affiliates are those organizations whose directors or trustees are elected by the participating churches of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at its annual meeting.

The Convention appropriates cooperative program receipts to these affiliates as follows:

As discussed in Notes 8 and 9, the Convention remains primarily liable on obligations associated with assets transferred to BRCO (Note 14). In addition, the Convention guarantees bonds issued by OBU (Note 13). The Convention leases office space from the Baptist Building Corporation from which accounts receivable totaling \$400,233 are held at December 31, 1996 and 1995.

The Convention participates in the cooperative program of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). Under this program, forty percent of amounts received under the cooperative program (\$7,266,967) were distributed to SBC during 1996 for its various ministries. For 1995, forty-two percent (\$7,574,574) of amounts receivable was disbursed. In addition, proceeds from offerings designated for specific SBC ministries totaling \$4,555,186 (\$4,334,588 in 1995) have been received and remitted to SBC.

For 1996, interest and dividends totaling \$459,561 (1995 - \$399,681) (net of fees) and realized and unrealized gains totaling \$1,348,626 (1995 - \$1,927,264) were earned on present interests. Gains relate to assets carried at market value.

The Convention is the ultimate beneficiary under certain irrevocable agreements trusteed or administered by the Foundation. Under these agreements, income is payable for life or a specified period of time to a beneficiary with the remainder payable to the Convention. Agreements include gift annuity contracts, charitable remainder trusts and other irrevocable trusts under which the Convention is a remainder beneficiary. These agreements constitute unconditional promises to give to be recognized as income when the promise is given. Gifts are valued by reducing total assets held by the Foundation by the present value of estimated future income payments over the term of the agreement or life expectancy of the income beneficiary utilizing a 5% discount rate. Based on these factors the present value of these remainder interests were as follows:

As a result of adopting SFAS No. 116, January 1, 1995 balances have been reflected in the accompanying financial statements by retroactively restating beginning net asset balances (Note 15). The increase in value due to the expiration of time reflects reductions in income beneficiaries' interests based on mortality or contract terms and has been recognized as an item of support in the current year.

As discussed in Note 2, the Convention has adopted SFAS No. 124. The excess of market value over the cost of marketable securities held on January 1, 1995 of \$18,567 has been reflected as the cumulative effect of a change in accounting principle.

#### 7. Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pensions

Effective January 1, 1995, the Convention adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pensions". Under this statement, the Convention is required to accrue the estimated cost of retiree health and life benefits during the employee's active service period. Previously these costs had been expensed as paid.

The Convention has elected to recognize this change in accounting on the immediate recognition basis. The cumulative effect as of January 1, 1995, of adopting this standard is an increase in accrued postretirement benefits and reduction in net asset changes for the year of \$4,282,246.

The plan provides health and life premium coverage for managerial employees and spouses after ten years of service upon normal retirement.

In determining the obligation under the plan, a weighted average discount rate of 8% was assumed for 1995 and a 7% discount rate for 1996 and 1997. Health care (premiums) costs were estimated to increase by 10% in 1996, with ratable annual reductions until an ultimate rate of 5% is reached in 2006. In calculating the liabilities at January 1, 1996, an increase of 11.5% decreasing to 5% in 2006 was used. These assumptions were changed to reflect managements' estimates of future conditions resulting in an unrecognized gain of \$614,199.

A 1% increase in the assumed health care cost rate would increase service and interest cost components of the net postretirement benefit expense by approximately \$91,000 and would increase the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation at December 31, 1996 by approximately \$635,000.

#### 8. Notes Payable

#### Oklahoma County Industrial Authority

On March 31, 1989, the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (the Authority) issued its "Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Retirement Center Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1989" in the amount of \$20,030,000. The net proceeds of \$17,472,936 from the bond issue were loaned to the Convention and were used to retire debt obligations of the Convention's retirement centers and nursing homes, including \$771,000 advanced from the Convention. The Convention has executed a note to repay the Authority for its costs under the bond issue and to fund interest and bond retirement. The Convention's liability under the note at December 31, 1996 was \$15,716,720 (1995 - \$16,133,179), which is equal to the bond liability net of unamortized issuance costs and unapplied bond fund earnings.

As discussed in Note 14, assets to which this note relates have been transferred to BRCO and a receivable from BRCO recorded. BRCO is to make all scheduled note payments and assets transferred to BRCO remain pledged as collateral on the notes.

Monthly payments are required by the note in amounts equal to the Authority's debt service for the bonds. Final payment under the note is scheduled for May, 2008.

The unrestricted gross revenues of the Convention are pledged as security under the note. The Convention has agreed not to permit any new liens or encumbrances on its endowment funds or consent to the subordination of the Convention's rights to any other person. In addition, the Convention has obtained a letter of credit to quarantee

note payments and has agreed to comply with certain financial ratio covenants under the letter of credit agreement.

As a part of the debt refinancing arrangement, funds were placed in irrevocable trusts to provide for the retirement of the Tulsa Industrial Authority Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, 1981 Owasso Baptist Village Project issued pursuant to terms and conditions of a 1978 bond indenture (see Note 9). The Convention has been released from liability under the note and leases pertaining to these projects.

Effective June 3, 1991, the Convention entered into an interest rate swap and cap agreement. The agreement provides for interest rate protection on the total of \$20,030,000 in bonds issued. Under the agreement, the Convention was required to pay interest at a fixed rate of 7.07% per annum through September 1, 1994. Interest accrues based upon the variable rate at which the bonds are remarketed each period, but not exceeding 6.97% per annum. At December 31, 1996, the variable interest rate being paid by the Convention was 3.75% per annum.

Interest and related expenses will be recognized by BRCO. As all debt service payments are to be made by BRCO, the Convention will recognize no income or expense during the term of the note.

#### The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma

The Convention has assumed responsibility for the repayment of loans The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma has made to various Baptist associations in connection with Baptist Student Unions in their area. These twelve loans are generally secured by real estate, bear interest at 7.95% and have a balance due of \$352,358 at December 31, 1996 (1995 - \$374,125).

#### 9. <u>Capital Lease Obligations</u>

Capital lease obligations consist of two obligations under which the Convention remains primarily liable. Assets subject to the lease have been transferred to BRCO under a sublease agreement. A receivable from BRCO has been recorded. Payments under the capital lease obligations will be made by BRCO.

Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center - On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The bonds were defeased under the 1989 loan from the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority as described in Note 8.

The lease rental to be paid by BRCO is an amount sufficient to satisfy the bond obligation. The lease is scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008.

BRCO, through its sublease with the Convention, has the right to purchase the project at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City - The Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City was constructed by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (an affiliate) in 1965 and transferred to the Convention in 1974.

In 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Convention. OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. BRCO has acquired, through its sublease, the Convention's option to acquire the leasehold estate for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds were guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the

activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA. This option has been granted to BRCO under the sublease agreement.

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The bonds were defeased in 1989 as disclosed in Note 8.

Office Equipment - The Convention leases certain office equipment for use in its operations. The equipment which has a cost of \$49,604 has been capitalized and is being depreciated over the term of the leases.

#### 10. <u>Deferred Revenue</u>

At December 31, 1995, deferred revenue consists of an account receivable of \$158,218. This amount represents a credit issued by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention which was applied to reduce payments for the Convention's matching contribution for church staff retirement and insurance benefits. The amount was recognized as income ratably over a three year period ending in 1996, as payments to the Annuity Board were reduced.

#### 11. Pension Plan

All employees of the Convention are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Convention contributes an amount equal to 10% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for Convention employees for the year ended December 31, 1996 approximated \$349,000 (1995 - \$343,000). The Convention's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

#### 12. Leased Facilities

During 1990, the Convention leased office facilities from the Baptist Building Corporation (a corporation owned and controlled by the Convention) (Note 3). Lease payments of \$52,500 per month commenced in November, 1990. During 1993, the Convention increased the total square footage leased and monthly payments were increased to \$59,865. The agreement provides for increases based on escalations in operating costs.

The lease agreement has a term of ten years with options to renew for ten additional one year periods. Payments under the agreement totaled \$727,768 for 1996 (\$718,377 for 1995).

During 1995, the Convention subleased space to BRCO and OBHC on a month to month basis for a total of \$71,640. Expense under the agreement for 1996, net of subleases, was \$657,316 (1995 - \$646,737). The Convention expects to enter into subleases over the time period of the original lease.

#### 13. Commitments and Contingencies

The Convention has guaranteed bonds issued by The Oklahoma Baptist University Authority. The bonds are secured by proceeds from a lease of the main campus facilities at Oklahoma Baptist University (OBU), mortgages on real estate comprising the campus of OBU, a municipal bond insurance policy and a letter of credit issued by a financial institution. At December 31, 1996, the unfunded liability for bond principal and interest approximated \$11,250,000 (1995 - \$11,500,000).

During 1992, the Convention adopted a plan to self insure workers compensation. Insurance is carried which limits liability on individual and aggregate claims. The Convention has recognized as expense in the current year the amount of claims paid for the year and an amount equal to the estimated amount of future claims arising from losses incurred in the current and prior periods. At December 31, 1996 accounts payable include \$48,000 (1995 - \$20,000) related to estimated future claims.

From time to time in the course of operations, the Convention may have cash on deposit with financial institutions in excess of federally insured limits. The primary operating account is swept daily into an account backed by U. S. Government Securities.

#### 14. Transfer of Assets to Auxiliary Corporations

During 1993, the Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. (OBHC) and Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. (BRCO) were created as a result of actions of the board of directors of the Convention. These corporations were formed to conduct the operations of the Family Care Ministries (see Note 3).

Operating assets and investments were transferred to these entities.

These entities may not create debt for capital needs or undertake any major expansion projects without consent of the Convention or its board of directors.

Amounts receivable from BRCO consisting of \$15,746,058 and \$2,312,998 relate to the net liability under notes payable (Note 8) and capital lease obligations (Note 9) under which the Convention remains primarily liable. Also included in amounts receivable from BRCO is \$2,000,000, representing prior advances to retirement centers reduced to \$2,000,000 by action of the board.

The amounts representing bond indenture debt and capital lease obligations are payable by BRCO under terms identical to those of the Convention liability. The \$2,000,000 balance is subject to a five year moratorium on interest. At the conclusion of the initial five years, the boards of directors of the Convention and BRCO will jointly establish repayment terms or determine the need for continuance of the moratorium.

#### Independent Auditors' Report

We have audited the accompanying balance sheets of BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS OF OKLAHOMA, INC. (a nonprofit corporation) as of December 31, 1996 and 1995, and the related statements of operations, changes in net assets, cash flows, and operating expenses for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Corporation's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. 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#### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations - Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. (the Corporation) is a not-for-profit corporation organized for charitable, religious, educational and scientific purposes in providing aged, sick or injured persons with housing facilities, long term care nursing facilities and other services designed to meet their physical, social, psychological and spiritual needs and to contribute to their health, security, happiness, spiritual well-being and usefulness in longer living as mandated by the Scriptures as a ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The Corporation is an auxiliary corporation of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention). Directors of the Corporation are elected by the Convention.

Basis of Accounting - The financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Assets and liabilities are presented in three categories based on the existence of any external restrictions on net assets. These categories are unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted.

<u>Use of Estimates</u> - The preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that effect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual amounts could differ from those estimated.

Financial Statements Presentation - The Corporation has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations". Under SFAS No. 117, the Corporation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets.

Gifts of cash or other assets received under endowment agreements where donors have restricted use to the income from the assets are reported as increases in permanently restricted net assets. These assets are generally held in trust by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma (The Foundation) (Note 5) or by other trustees. To the extent income and realized or unrealized gains are not restricted by donor stipulations or state law, these items are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets in the statement of operations.

Unconditional Promises to Give - The Corporation reports contributions as support when assets are received or when an unconditional promise to give has been made. Unconditional promises to give as reflected on the accompanying balance sheet consist of pledges made under a capital improvement fund drive (Note 3) and

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remainder interest in assets held in irrevocable trusts by The Foundation.

<u>Property and Equipment</u> - The Corporation capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value at date of contribution of \$500 or more. Depreciation has been provided on the straight-line method. Lives generally used are:

Land improvements	20	-	40	years

Income Taxes - The Corporation is exempt from federal income taxes under 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

<u>Statement of Cash Flows</u> - For purposes of the statement of cash flows, only bank deposits subject to immediate withdrawal are considered to be cash equivalents.

<u>Donor Restrictions</u> - The Corporation reports gifts of cash or other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated asset. When a donor restriction expires, through the passage of time or when a stipulated purpose is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified as unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of operations as net assets released from restriction. Donor restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

The Corporation reports gifts of property, equipment and long-lived assets as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with specific use restriction and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. The Corporation reports expiration of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service.

#### 2. Changes in Accounting Policies

As more fully discussed in Notes 3, 5, and 10, the Corporation has adopted SFAS No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made", SFAS No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions", and SFAS No. 124 "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations".

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SFAS No. 116 provides guidelines under which contributions are recognized as income. Contributions are defined to include unconditional promises to give.

Under SFAS No. 116, the Corporation's rights to remainder interests under irrevocable agreements which pay income to another are recognized as temporarily or permanently restricted contributions upon receipt of assets funding the agreements.

SFAS No. 106 establishes standards where costs under the Corporation's postretirement benefit plan are recognized ratably as services are performed.

SFAS No. 124 requires that investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair market values and all debt securities be reported at fair market value.

As permitted by the Statement, SFAS No. 116 has been initially applied retroactively by restating opening balances at January 1, 1995. SFAS No. 106 has been applied under the immediate recognition option of that statement. Under this option the net benefit obligation at January 1, 1995, has been reflected in the Statement of Activities as the cumulative effect of an accounting change. SFAS No. 124 has been reflected as the cumulative effect of an accounting change.

#### 3. <u>Unconditional Promises to Give and Remainder Interests</u>

During 1995, the Corporation initiated a program to raise support for facilities renovation and expansion and to increase permanent endowments. At December 31, 1996, cash and other assets of \$712,061 (\$183,545 - 1995) had been received along with written pledges to make future gifts of \$565,714 (\$275,680 - 1995). Assets received include \$297,000 of gift annuity contracts held by The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma with a present value of approximately \$187,000. These pledges constitute unconditional promises to give and have been recognized as temporarily restricted support in the current period. Pledges have been valued at the net present value of future cash flows net of an allowance for uncollectible pledges receivable of \$23,560 (\$16,541 - 1995). Pledges receivable have been discounted at 5% which represents an estimated rate of return on long-term investments.

The Corporation is the ultimate beneficiary under certain irrevocable agreements trusteed or administered by the Foundation. Under these agreements, income is payable for life or a specified period of time to a beneficiary with the remainder payable to the Corporation. Agreements include gift annuity contracts, charitable remainder trusts and other irrevocable trusts under which the Corporation is a remainder beneficiary. These agreements constitute unconditional promises to give to be recognized as income when the promise is given. Gifts are valued by reducing total assets held by the Foundation by the present value of estimated future income payments over the term of the agreement or life expectancy of the income beneficiary utilizing a 5% discount rate. Based on these factors the present value of these remainder interests were as follows:

The January 1, 1995, balances have been reflected in the accompanying financial statements as the cumulative effect of a change in accounting principle. The change in value of remainder relates to changes in life beneficiaries interest based on mortality or contract terms.

### 4. Transfer of Assets from Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma

During 1993, the Board of Directors of the Convention formed the Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. and initiated a plan under which all operating assets of retirement centers operated by the Convention, subject to certain liabilities, were to be transferred to the Corporation. Prior advances to fund retirement centers' operations were reduced to \$2,000,000 and transferred as a note payable to the Convention subject to a five year moratorium on interest or payments of principal. Transfers were subject to approval by creditors of the Convention, and assets transferred remain pledged as collateral on Convention debt. Final approval was obtained during 1995. Debts for which the Convention remains primarily liable, but which relate to assets included on the Corporation balance sheet, are reported as liabilities of the Corporation.

#### 6. <u>Notes Payable</u>

As discussed in Note 4 above, certain assets transferred to the Corporation were encumbered by liabilities. The following note remains a direct liability of the Convention but under terms of the transfer the Corporation has agreed to fund all required principal and interest payments. Therefore, the liability is recorded on the balance sheet of the Corporation subject to the following provisions.

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#### Oklahoma County Industrial Authority

On March 31, 1989, the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (the Authority) issued its "Oklahoma County Industrial Authority Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Retirement Center Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1989" in the amount of \$20,030,000. The net proceeds of \$17,472,936 from the bond issue were loaned to the Convention and were used to retire debt obligations of the Convention's retirement centers and nursing homes, including \$771,000 advanced from the Convention. The Convention has executed a note to repay the Authority for its costs under the bond issue and to fund interest and bond retirement. The Convention's liability under the note at December 31, 1996 and 1995 was \$15,746,058 and \$16,162,517, respectively, which is equal to the bond liability net of unamortized issuance costs and unapplied bond fund earnings.

Monthly payments are required by the note in amounts equal to the Authority's debt service for the bonds. Final payment under the note is scheduled for May, 2008.

The unrestricted gross revenues of the Convention are pledged as security under the note. The Convention has agreed not to permit any new liens or encumbrances on its endowment funds or consent to the subordination of the Convention's rights to any other person. In addition, the Convention has obtained a letter of credit to guarantee note payments and has agreed to comply with certain financial ratio covenants under the letter of credit agreement. The note is further guaranteed by Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc. and Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc.

As a part of the debt refinancing arrangement, funds were placed in irrevocable trusts to provide for the retirement of the Tulsa Industrial Authority Junior Lien Revenue Bonds, 1981 Owasso Baptist Village Project issued pursuant to terms and conditions of a 1978 bond indenture (see Note 7). The Convention has been released from liability under the note and leases pertaining to these projects.

Costs of refinancing are being amortized over the life of the issue.

Effective June 3, 1991, the Convention entered into an interest rate swap and cap agreement. The agreement provides for interest rate protection on the total of \$20,030,000 in bonds issued. Under the agreement, the Convention was required to pay interest at a fixed rate of 7.07% per annum through September 1, 1994. Upon expiration of the swap period, interest began to accrue based upon the variable rate at which the bonds are remarketed each period, but not to exceed 6.97% per annum.

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Interest expense will be recognized as it accrues under the agreement, net of Bond Reserve funds earnings that may be applied to debt service. Fees of \$200,000 which were paid upon execution are being amortized over the life of the agreement. The Convention is exposed to loss in the event of nonperformance by the other party to the agreement. However, no such loss is anticipated.

During 1994, the Convention, on behalf of the Corporation, entered into a forward delivery contract under which rights to earnings on principal and interest advance payments were sold for total consideration of \$209,000. The amount received was added to the Corporation's custodial funds on deposit with the Foundation. Income is being recognized ratably over the life of the note.

As discussed in Note 4, the Corporation as a condition to the transfer of assets, agreed to pay \$2,000,000 representing a reduced balance of previous advances by the Convention to support retirement center operations. The note bears no interest for five years during which time no principal payments are due. At the conclusion of the five year period, the Board of Directors of the Convention and Corporation will jointly establish repayment terms or determine the need for continuance of the moratorium on payments.

#### 7. Capital Lease Obligations

As previously discussed in Notes 4 and 6, the Corporation received assets from the Convention subject to certain liabilities. The Corporation has entered into a sublease agreement under terms of the capital lease obligations discussed below.

Tulsa Baptist Retirement Center - On February 1, 1978, the Convention executed a lease with the Tulsa Industrial Authority. The Authority issued its "First Mortgage Revenue Bonds 1978, Owasso

Baptist Village Project (Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma Issue)" in the amount of \$2,310,000.

A supplemental bond indenture dated April 1, 1981 in the amount of \$325,000 was issued by the Tulsa Industrial Authority for the purpose of constructing three duplex units. The bonds were defeased under the 1989 loan from the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority as described in Note 6.

The lease rental to be paid by the Convention is an amount sufficient to satisfy the bond obligation. The lease is scheduled to terminate by February 1, 2008.

The Convention has the right to purchase the project at a price sufficient to pay all outstanding principal of the bonds and any thereafter issued bonds, accrued interest on all bonds to the date of redemption, and other costs.

Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City - The Baptist Retirement Center, Oklahoma City was constructed by the Baptist Laymen's Corporation (an affiliate) in 1965 and transferred to the Convention in 1974.

In 1971, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation leased the premises to the Oklahoma Industries Authority (OIA). OIA issued its Series A and B bonds secured by a first mortgage on the property and guaranteed by the Convention. OIA then subleased the premises to the Baptist Laymen's Corporation for a period of twenty years with payments equal to the annual debt service requirement of the OIA on bonds issued as described below. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate for an amount necessary to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

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On March 1, 1978, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma Industries Authority. The Authority issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation Revenue Bonds 1978, Lackey Manor Series C in the amount of \$2,000,000. The bonds are guaranteed by the Convention. Bond funds were used for the completion of the activities center and the construction of 112 ground level apartments for retired persons. The term of the lease is 30 years with payments equal to annual debt service requirements under the bond issue. The Convention has the option to acquire the leasehold estate for the amount required to retire all outstanding bonds issued by the OIA.

On March 1, 1982, the Baptist Laymen's Corporation executed a lease with the Oklahoma County Industrial Authority (OCIA). OCIA issued its Baptist Laymen's Corporation First Mortgage Revenue Note, Series A (Lackey Manor Project) in the amount of \$4,500,000. The bonds were defeased in 1989 as disclosed in Note 6.

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#### 8. <u>Deferred Life Occupancies</u>

Deferred life occupancies relate to rights to occupy duplexes constructed at various retirement centers on land owned by the Corporation. The construction cost of these duplexes was donated and the donors have a rent-free life occupancy in the duplexes. The duplexes have been capitalized at a value approximating total construction costs, and are being depreciated over their estimated useful lives. The deferred liability for the life occupancies, representing future rentals to be provided, is reduced annually for rentals based upon the donor's life expectancy.

#### 9. Pension Plan

All employees of the Corporation are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan administered by the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the plan, the Corporation contributes an amount equal to 10% of administrative employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Pension expense for the year totaled \$58,513. Pension costs are funded as incurred.

#### 10. Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pensions

Effective January 1, 1995, the Corporation adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other Than Pensions". Under this statement, the Corporation is required to accrue the estimated cost of retiree health and life benefits during the employee's active service period. Previously these costs had been expensed as paid.

The Corporation has elected to recognize this change in accounting on the immediate recognition basis. The cumulative effect as of January 1, 1995, of adopting this standard is an increase in accrued postretirement benefits and reduction in net asset changes for the year of \$339,310.

The plan provides health and life premium coverage for managerial employees and spouses after ten years of service upon normal retirement.

In determining the obligation under the plan, a weighted average discount rate of 8% was assumed for 1995 and a 7% discount rate for 1996 and 1997. Health care (premiums) costs were estimated to increase by 10% in 1997, with ratable annual reductions until an ultimate rate of 5% is reached in 2006. In calculating the liabilities at January 1, 1997, an increase of 11.5% decreasing to 5% in 2006 was used. Differences in actual results from original assumptions are reflected as an unrecognized loss at December 31, 1996.

A 1% increase in the assumed health care cost rate would increase service and interest cost components of the net postretirement benefit expense by approximately \$13,000 and would increase the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation at December 31, 1996 by approximately \$73,000.

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#### 11. Affiliated Entities

As disclosed in Note 1, the Corporation is affiliated with the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma (the Convention), its affiliates and various other Baptist organizations. Principal affiliates of the Convention and thus the Corporation, are the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma, Oklahoma Baptist University, Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, and Baptist Building Corporation. For this purpose, affiliates are those organizations whose directors or trustees are elected by the participating churches of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at its annual meeting.

The Corporation receives appropriations from the Cooperative Program of the Convention. Appropriations received for the year were \$257,373.

#### 12. <u>Leased Facilities</u>

The Corporation leases office facilities from the Convention under a month to month agreement. Expenses in the current year totaled \$24,930. The Corporation anticipates entering into a long-term agreement to sublease office space. Annual rentals are expected to approximate \$25,000.

#### 13. Commitments, Contingencies and Concentrations of Credit Risk

As discussed in Note 4, the Corporation assumed certain liabilities of the Convention as a part of the transfer of assets. In addition, the Corporation has guaranteed notes payable as discussed in Note 6.

The Corporation self insures workers compensation. Insurance is carried to limit liability on individual and aggregate claims. The Corporation has recognized as expense in the current year the amount of claims paid for the year and an amount to accrue estimated future claims arising from losses in the current period.

From time to time in the course of operations, the Corporation may have cash on deposit with financial institutions in excess of federally insured amounts.

## Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. Notes to Financial Statements

#### 1. Organization

Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children, Inc. ("OBHC") is an Oklahoma not-for-profit organization supported primarily by private donations. OBHC was incorporated in September 1993, and began operations on January 1, 1994 to provide care for children and to provide preventive and redemptive services for children, parents, and families. With donated funds, OBHC operates five homes or other living facilities for children in need and two crisis pregnancy centers. Previous to 1994, OBHC was a division of the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma, Inc. ("BGCO").

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following summarizes certain significant accounting policies followed by OBHC. These policies conform to generally accepted accounting principles:

#### Unconditional promises to give

Effective January 1, 1995, OBHC adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS No. 116), "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made". SFAS No. 116 provides guidelines under which contributions are recognized as income. Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized as revenues in the period received at their fair values. Contributions made, including unconditional promises to give, are recognized as expenses in the period made at their fair values. Conditional promises to give, whether received or made, are recognized when they become unconditional, that is, when the conditions are substantially met. For financial reporting purposes OBHC distinguishes between contributions of unrestricted assets, temporarily restricted assets, and permanently restricted assets.

The adoption of SFAS No. 116 has been reported as a change in accounting principle, and resulted in a \$1,633,829 increase to unconditional promises to give remainder interests which was reflected in the December 31, 1995 statement of changes in net assets as an increase of \$945,114 and \$688,715 in temporarily and permanently restricted net assets, respectively, as a cumulative effect of a change in accounting principle.

OBHC began a fundraising campaign during 1995 entitled "Building for a Brighter Tomorrow". Amounts received during 1996 and 1995, and unconditionally pledged at December 31, 1996 and 1995, are recorded as temporarily restricted support in accordance with their donor imposed restriction. All proceeds from the fundraising campaign are for renovations to children's homes. Long term pledges receivable mature within one to five years and are recorded at their discounted present value.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, continued

The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma ("BFO") holds certain funds under gift annuity contracts and other irrevocable trust agreements for which the remainder interest is held for the benefit of OBHC. OBHC is entitled to these remainder interests which qualify as unconditional promises to give, which is recorded at their discounted present value at December 31, 1996 and 1995.

### Cash and cash equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, OBHC considers cash on hand and deposits in banks to be cash and cash equivalents.

#### Investments

In 1996, OBHC adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards Number 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-For-Profit Organizations" ("SFAS 124"). SFAS 124 requires investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities be measured at fair value. The gains and losses on debt and equity securities are reported in the statement of activities as increases or decreases in unrestricted net assets unless their use is temporary or permanently restricted by donor stipulations or by law. As Oklahoma Baptist Homes for Children reported investments at fair market value in prior years, the adoption of SFAS 124 had no effect on the valuation of investments. Additional disclosures are required under SFAS 124 which have been included in the notes to the financial statements.

BFO was created for the purpose of receiving and managing all investments for the various Baptist entities including OBHC. The investments managed by BFO are separated into the following categories:

Endowment - Investments in perpetuity, the income from which is expendable to support the donor imposed restriction, if any.

Restricted - Non-endowment investment for which the principal and income have donor restrictions as to their use.

Custodial - Non-endowment investments for which the principal and income are not donor restricted.

Loan - Non-endowment funds for which the principal and income may be used for providing loans to OBHC alumni.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, continued

Investments of the various funds under management of BFO are held in two investment pools, the equity investment pool and the fixed income pool. Investments held in the equity investment pool include interest bearing cash, money market accounts, marketable equity securities, and accrued interest income. Investments held in the fixed income pool include interest bearing cash, money market accounts, marketable debt instruments, church building loans, net of allowance for doubtful loans, participation in home mission board loans, real estate, and accrued interest. Marketable securities held in the pools are recorded at market value. The market value of church building loans is determined as the principal balance less the allowance for doubtful loans. Other investments held outside the investment pool are presented at cost.

### Furniture and equipment

Furniture and equipment are recorded at cost. The cost and related accumulated depreciation of assets sold or retired are removed from the accounts and the resulting gains or losses are included in the statement of unrestricted revenue, expense and other changes in unrestricted net assets. Maintenance repairs and minor renewals are expensed as incurred. These assets are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. The following useful lives are used:

Furniture and fixtures	6-20 years
Equipment	6 years
Vehicles	3 years
Buildings and leasehold improvements	10-40 years

### Net Asset Classifications

Net assets have been segregated to achieve a proper segregation and fair presentation of those resources available for use at the discretion of the board and of those resources over which the board has little, if any, discretion as to use because of externally imposed restrictions. The following net asset segregations have been established for OBHC:

Unrestricted net assets - Represents resources over which the governing board has discretionary control to use in carrying on the operations of OBHC.

Temporarily restricted net assets - Represents resources currently available for use, but expendable only for purposes specified by the donor.

Permanently restricted net assets - Represents resources for which the principal is to remain intact in perpetuity, the income, allocated under the BFO distribution policy, from which is expendable either for general purposes or for purposes specified by the donor.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, continued

### Revenue Recognition

Revenue of OBHC consists primarily of cooperative program distributions, voluntary contributions from Baptist churches throughout the state of Oklahoma and income earned on investments. OBHC's cooperative program distributions are budgeted annually at the discretion of BGCO. In accordance with the accrual basis of accounting, revenue is recognized when earned.

### Functional Allocation of Expenses

Expenses are organized in both natural and functional classifications to provide useful information about the costs of significant programs or services provided by OBHC. Costs incurred are either directly related or allocated to a specific program or service.

#### **Contributions**

The Company reports gifts of cash and other assets as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated asset. If a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, in the same fiscal year as the year of the receipt of the gift, the gift is considered unrestricted. When a donor restriction expires on gifts classified as temporarily restricted, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restriction. All contributed assets are reflected at the fair market value at the date of contribution.

#### Workers Compensation Insurance

OBHC is self insured with respect to workers' compensation insurance. Monthly payments are made to a self insured plan established by BGCO. This plan is self insured to the extent of the excess liability insurance with an employers' liability limit of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and a self insured retention of \$190,000 per occurrence.

Workers compensation expense totaled \$27,499 and \$46,726 for the year ended December 31, 1996 and 1995, respectively. OBHC maintains a liability of \$42,328 for claims incurred but not paid and incurred but not reported.

#### Income taxes

OBHC is a not-for-profit organization as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is exempt from Federal income taxes on related income pursuant to Section 501(a) of the Code.

### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, continued

### Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Risk and Uncertainties

Investments securities are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, market and credit risk. Due to the risks associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the value of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the financial statements.

#### 7. Pension Plan

All full time employees of OBHC are eligible to participate in a defined contribution pension plan through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and administered by BGCO. Under the plan, OBHC contributes an amount equal to 5% of participating employees' salaries. OBHC also matches employee contributions up to 2.5% of participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension expense for the year ended December 31, 1996 and 1995 was \$131,562 and \$128,619, respectively.

### 8. Other Post Retirement Employee Benefits

In addition to participating in a defined contribution pension plan, OBHC sponsors unfunded post-retirement health care, life insurance and retirement gift benefits. These post-retirement benefits are offered to all full time employees that were hired prior to September 27, 1994.

Effective January 1, 1994, OBHC adopted the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Post-retirement Benefits Other than Pensions." In applying this pronouncement, OBHC immediately recognized the Accumulated Post-retirement Benefit Obligation ("APBO") as of January 1, 1994, as a transfer from BGCO.

#### 9. Commitments

Prior to 1994, BGCO established a line of credit for \$20,000,000 with Sumitomo Bank of Japan for the retirement center operated under BGCO. Upon separation of the various Baptist entities, the loan was assigned to the retirement center. OBHC is a guarantor of this debt after BGCO and Baptist Retirement Centers of Oklahoma, Inc.

#### 10. Related Parties

OBHC is affiliated with all organizations whose directors or trustees are elected by the participating churches of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma at its annual meeting. Principal affiliates of OBHC are BGCO, BFO, and Baptist Building Corporation ("BBC").

OBHC holds a \$4.2 million and \$4.3 million investment in BBC at December 31, 1996 and 1995, respectively, which paid a rate of return of 8% and 5% during 1996 and 1995, respectively. Repayment of invested funds is at the discretion of BBC, however all invested funds must be repaid upon any sale or conveyance of the underlying building.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

We have audited the accompanying statements of financial position of THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY as of July 31, 1996 and 1995, and the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year ended July 31, 1996. These financial statements are the responsibility of the University's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> (1994 Revision), issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Oklahoma Baptist University as of July 31, 1996 and 1995, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year ended July 31, 1996, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

As discussed in Notes 1 and 2 to the accompanying financial statements, the University adopted the provisions of Statements of Financial Accounting Standards No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions", No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made", No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations", and No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations".

Our audits were made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The information in that Schedule has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

In accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, we have also issued a report dated November 20, 1996 on our consideration of The Oklahoma Baptist University's internal control structure and a report dated November 20, 1996 on its compliance with laws and regulations.

### 1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

#### Organization

The Oklahoma Baptist University was created by action of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma in 1909 to function as an operating unit of the Convention under supervision of a Board of Trustees elected by that Convention. Articles of Incorporation were filed February 9, 1910 and amended November 25, 1974 with the State of Oklahoma and a charter was granted for a corporation of perpetual duration without capital stock. The purpose of the corporation is to encourage, support, provide and maintain Christian education and to engage in Christian undertakings which are in keeping with the purpose of the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma.

#### Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Financial Statements - The financial statements of the University have been prepared on the accrual basis in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The University has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made", and SFAS No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations", and has applied these standards retroactively by restating net assets as of July 31, 1995 (Note 2). SFAS No. 117 requires the presentation of resources in three classes of net assets based on the existence of or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. SFAS No. 116 requires that contributions, including unconditional promises to give, be recognized as revenues in the period received or promised. Conditional promises to give are not recorded until conditions are substantially met. Net assets are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions as follows:

<u>Unrestricted</u> - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees or may otherwise be limited by contractual agreements with outside parties.

Temporarily Restricted - Net assets whose use by the University is subject to donor-imposed restrictions that can be fulfilled by actions of the University or by the passage of time. Assets received with donor-imposed restrictions that the University intends to use and actually uses within the same reporting period as received are treated in the same manner as unrestricted revenues for reporting purposes.

# THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Cont'd) July 31, 1996

<u>Permanently Restricted</u> - Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that they be maintained permanently by the University. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the University to use all or part of the income earned on related investments for general or specific purposes. Such assets also include the University's beneficial interest in irrevocable trusts held by others.

<u>Use of Estimates</u> - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and judgments that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingencies at the date of the financial statements and revenues and expenses recognized during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

<u>Measure of Operations</u> - The excess of revenues, gains and other support over expenses reflected in the accompanying statement of activities includes substantially all of the activities related to unrestricted net assets.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u> - Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and on deposit in demand and interest-bearing accounts administered by the University.

Investments - The University has adopted SFAS No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations". SFAS No. 124 requires that investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities be reported at fair value in the statement of financial position with gains and losses included in the statement of activities. The fair values of investments are generally determined based on quoted market prices or estimates of fair value provided by external investment managers. The amounts the University will ultimately realize could differ materially and significant fluctuations in fair values could occur from year to year.

Investments in real estate and mortgages and notes receivable are recorded at cost.

Income and gains or losses on investments are reported as follows:

Increases in permanently restricted net assets if the terms of the gift that gave rise to the investment or applicable law requires income or gains be added to the principal of a permanent endowment.

Increases in temporarily restricted net assets if the terms of the gift or applicable law impose restrictions on the use of the income and the income will not be used during the reporting period.

Increases in unrestricted net assets in all other cases.

Generally, losses on the investments of restricted endowments reduce temporarily restricted net assets to the extent donor-imposed temporary restrictions on net appreciation of investments have not been met before the loss occurs. Any remaining losses reduce unrestricted net assets, but can be restored through subsequent investment gains.

Contributions Receivable - During the 1995-96 fiscal year, the University initiated the Foundation for the Future Campaign to raise \$25,000,000. The goal of the campaign includes \$10,000,000 for capital improvements, \$10,000,000 for endowment and \$5,000,000 for operations. At July 31, 1996, pledges and cash totaling \$5,339,570 had been received. Contributions are recorded net of an allowance for doubtful receivables of 15% of the pledged contribution and net of a discount. The discount rate is based on the "risk free" treasury rates as quoted on July 31, 1996, and is applied on a quarterly basis. Significant estimates have been used to predict the future cash flows from pledged contributions. Amortization of the discount is recorded as additional contribution revenue.

Gifts of land, building and equipment and other long-lived assets are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how or how long the donated assets must be used, in which case the gift is reported as restricted support.

Educational Plant - Plant facilities are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation or, if received as a gift, at fair value or appraised value at the date received, less accumulated depreciation. Generally, improvements, renovations, and equipment purchases in excess of \$500 are capitalized. Depreciation is recognized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of buildings and improvements (50 years) and equipment (10 years). The library materials are valued at an amount equal to the cost of books, periodicals, microfilm and electronic media acquired during the past ten years, plus a residual value of \$5 per volume for those volumes which have been in the collection longer than ten years.

<u>Inventories</u> - Inventories are stated at cost.

Student Loans Receivable - Of the \$1,664,222 of notes receivable under student loans, \$1,256,511 has been made to students under U. S. Government loan programs. The loans are stated at net realizable value in the accompanying statements. It is not practicable to estimate the fair value of these receivables since they contain federally mandated interest rates and repayment terms subject to significant restrictions as to their transfer and disposition.

Funds Held in Trust by Others - Funds held in trust by others represent amounts held for the beneficial interest of the University under irrevocable perpetual trust agreements between donors and third-party trustees. The University's interest in the trusts are recorded at the fair value of the net assets of the trusts, with net increases or decreases in fair value during the year being reported as changes to permanently restricted net assets. The amounts the University will ultimately realize could differ materially and significant fluctuations in fair values could occur from year to year.

Remainder Interest in Trusts - Remainder interests in trusts represent amounts held in trusts by others that will be transferred to the University. Upon the death of the current beneficiaries, these assets generally will become permanently restricted net assets of the University.

Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions (Note 12) - The University adopted SFAS No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions" effective August 1, 1995. The Statement has been applied under the delayed recognition option. Under this option, the net benefit obligation at August 1, 1995, is being amortized on a straight-line basis over a 20-year period.

Advances Under Federal Loan Programs - Funds provided by the U. S. Government primarily under the Federal Perkins Loan Program are loaned to qualified students and may be reloaned upon collection. These funds are ultimately refundable to the government, and are reported as permanently restricted net assets.

Tuitions, Fees and Scholarships - Scholarships, including those awarded from designated or restricted resources, are reported as scholarships expense. Tuitions discounts granted to employees and their dependents are recorded as compensation expense in the appropriate functional expense classification. Deferred revenue, primarily prepaid tuition and other deposits, are those payments received before services or products are provided by the University.

Expenses and Other Activity - Expenses are generally reported as decreases in operations (unrestricted net assets). Temporarily restricted net assets for which donor-imposed conditions are met are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported as net assets released from restriction. Net assets released from restrictions generally represent expenses in excess of budgeted amounts that meet the donor-stipulated purpose and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed and capital expenditures made pursuant to donor specifications. Permanently restricted net assets reclassified to unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets represent changes in restrictions specified by the donor.

The costs of providing the various programs and supporting activities of the University have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated based on total personnel costs or other systematic bases.

<u>Income Taxes</u> - The University is exempt from Federal income taxes under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. If the University earns monies not in accordance with its primary purpose, such earnings, known as unrelated business income, are subject to Federal income taxes.

### 2. Changes in Accounting Policies

As more fully discussed in Note 1, the University has adopted the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 106, "Employers' Accounting for Postretirement Benefits Other than Pensions", No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made", No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations", and No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations". Also, as required by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants in its Statement of Position (SOP) 94-3, "Reporting of Related Entities by Not-for-Profit Organizations", the financial statements of Tulsa Royalties Company have been consolidated with the University's financial statements.

The University adopted SFAS Nos. 116 and 117, and SOP 94-3 by retroactively restating beginning net assets as of August 1, 1995. The adoption of SFAS No. 117 had no effect on net assets.

- (A) There are three individual beneficiaries in addition to the University that receive benefits from this trust for the remainder of their lives. Upon the death of the last of these beneficiaries, the assets will be transferred to the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as trustee to benefit the University. The University's interest is stated at the fair market value of trust assets less estimated discounted cash flows to the other beneficiaries. The University receives approximately \$300,000 annually from this trust to be used toward scholarships for students entering various ministry vocations.
- (B) There is an individual beneficiary in addition to the University that receives benefits from this trust for the remainder of her life. Upon her death, the University will become trustee. The University's interest is stated at the fair market value of trust assets less estimated discounted cash flows to the other beneficiary. The University currently receives \$90,000 annually to fund scholarships for students with financial needs who graduate from high schools in Pottawatomie, Lincoln or Seminole Counties.
- (C) \$8,750,769 of the trusts administered by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma list the University as the trustee. The University has placed these funds with the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma for investment.

<u>Investment and Endowment Income</u> - Investment and endowment income consist primarily of interest, dividends, gains and appreciation from assets held by others.

Assets held by the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma as trustee or in a custodial capacity are predominantly pooled investment interests consisting of approximately 60% equity and 40% fixed income investments. These assets are carried at fair market value. In addition, the Foundation holds mineral interests, real estate and mortgages which are recorded at contributed value. Realized and unrealized gains in excess of the amount distributed to the University are either added to historical corpus or to a stabilization pool which may be added to corpus or distributed for future expenditure by the University.

### 6. Capitalized Lease Payable - Oklahoma Baptist University Authority

The University entered into a lease with Oklahoma Baptist University Authority in December 1979, to obtain funds to construct a health, physical education, recreation and activities complex; to remodel the Brotherhood and W. M. U. Memorial Dormitories and the Clark Craig Field House; to finance computer facilities; and to pay existing indebtedness. The Authority obtained funds for these improvements by issuing \$7,640,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1979". Assets totaling approximately \$7,400,000 have been constructed or purchased under this lease. These assets are included with other educational plant assets.

The lease was amended on June 1, 1985, to obtain funds to finance a portion of the construction of the science building, married student housing, and a campus ministries center, and the renovation of Kerr Dormitory, the Theater annex, Montgomery and Thurmond Halls, and Parkway and Jent Apartments. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$5,300,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1985". The remainder of the costs of these projects was financed by funds raised in a special fund raising campaign and by University resources. Assets totaling approximately \$6,600,000 have been constructed, renovated or purchased under this amendment. These assets are included with other educational plant assets.

# THE OKLAHOMA BAPTIST UNIVERSITY NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Cont'd) July 31, 1996

On May 18, 1988, the Authority issued \$11,800,128 in bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1988". The proceeds of these bonds were used to defease in substance the Series 1979 and Series 1985 bonds. The lease with the Authority was amended during May, 1988, to allow for the change in sinking fund requirements under the new bonds.

The lease was amended on August 1, 1989, to obtain funds to finance the construction and furnishing of student apartments, purchase of a new telephone system, acquisition of land adjacent to the campus, refinancing of some existing loans, and completion of other miscellaneous projects. The Authority obtained funds for these projects by issuing \$3,400,000 of its bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Bonds, Series 1989". Assets totaling approximately \$2,659,585 have been constructed or purchased under this amendment. These assets are included with other educational plant assets. Proceeds totaling \$288,691 were used to pay the balance due on the note payable to The Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma.

On May 21, 1992, the Authority issued \$8,282,809 in bonds titled "Oklahoma Baptist University Authority, Oklahoma Baptist University Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1992". The proceeds of these bonds were used to defease in substance \$7,038,128 of the \$9,988,128 outstanding Series 1988 bonds. The lease was amended during May, 1992, to allow for the change in sinking fund requirements under the new bonds.

The series 1988, 1989, and 1992 bonds are secured by rentals and other monies derived from the lease of the main campus facilities, by mortgages on specified real estate which comprises the main campus, by a guarantee from the Baptist General Convention of the State of Oklahoma, and by a municipal bond new issue insurance policy issued by Financial Guaranty Insurance Company.

### 7. Notes Payable

Operations - As of July 31, 1996, the University has a letter of credit from BancFirst, Shawnee, Oklahoma, for \$1,200,000 with a variable interest rate based on New York prime. The letter of credit was cancelled on August 2, 1996, with no draws having been made.

Student Loans - The University received a noninterest-bearing loan in the amount of \$120,000 from the Pearl M. & Julia J. Harmon Foundation. The proceeds of the loan were used to establish a perpetual, ever-increasing loan fund for student tuition, fees and room and board charges. The loan is secured by University investments. The following is a schedule of payments due under this note as of July 31, 1996.

### 8. Operating Leases

Airport property (parking lot) - The University entered into a lease agreement on March 1, 1995, as lessee, with the City of Shawnee (City) for property at the Shawnee Municipal Airport (Airport). The lease is for a period of twenty-five (25) years, with an option to negotiate for an additional period of time at the lessee's option, provided that any new lease is in accordance with the then established fee and rent policies of the City.

The lease required a payment of \$15,000, and for the University to perform the following within three (3) years of the date of the lease:

- 1) Remove existing Airport building No. 24,
- Remove existing airport improvements consisting of underground fuel storage tanks described as Airport Improvement No. 23, including meeting any and all Environmental Protection Agency compliances and costs associated with the demolition of said building and storage tanks at no cost to the City,
- Remove and reconstruct an automobile parking lot on Tract I (land consisting of approximately 91,834 square feet) described as Airport Improvement No. 22,
- 4) Provide landscaping of Tract II (land consisting of approximately 191,194 square feet), which property lessee shall have access to use until such time as the City deems the property needed as required under its obligations to the Federal Aviation Administration.

The expenses of the above requirements are estimated to approximate \$466,035. The lease provides for reimbursement of such costs by the City to the University in the event the City terminates or cancels the lease within certain periods, as follows:

The costs incurred will be capitalized as prepaid rent or leasehold improvements and amortized over the remaining life of the lease. Through July 31, 1996, the University's cost has been \$224,163. The University could spend an additional \$241,872 in the years ending July 31, 1997 and 1998.

Airport Property (Physical Plant) - The University has a lease agreement, classified as an operating lease, for land upon which the maintenance department offices and shops were constructed. This lease is for a period of 25 years beginning in November, 1977, and contains an option to renew at the end of the lease. The following is a schedule of future minimum rental payments required under this lease as of July 31, 1996.

The total rental expense for this operating lease is approximately \$3,000 per year.

Hewlett Packard - The University leases a mini-computer and peripherals from Hewlett Packard at a cost of \$50,256 per year (\$4,188 per month). This computer services most of the administrative needs of the campus: accounting, academic records, financial aid, admissions, development and student affairs. The lease expires in August of 1997. Upon expiration of the lease, the University has the option to purchase the equipment at its fair market value as determined by Hewlett Packard.

<u>Xerox</u> - The University leases several copiers and facsimile machines from Xerox. The annual cost of the leases is approximately \$40,800 (\$3,400 per month). The terms of the leases range from three to six years.

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#### 9. Bookstore Lease

Effective December 1, 1995, the University entered into a five (5) year lease renewal with Barnes and Noble Bookstores, Inc. for the operation of the bookstore. The University will receive as rental income a percentage of sales with a guaranteed annual minimum of \$75,000. In addition, Barnes and Noble paid \$50,000 when the contract was extended.

#### 10. Financial Instruments and Concentrations of Credit Risk

At July 31, 1996, the University had certain concentrations of credit risk with several financial institutions in the form of uninsured cash and time deposits which amounted to approximately \$731,818. For purposes of evaluating credit risk, the stability of financial institutions conducting business with the University is periodically reviewed and management of the University believes that credit risk related to these balances is minimal.

#### 11. Retirement Plans

<u>Pension Plan</u> - The University provides a defined contribution plan that covers substantially all of its full-time employees. Under the plan, the University contributes an amount equal to 6% of the participating employees' salaries. Employee contributions are voluntary. Total pension contributions for the year ended July 31, 1996, was \$407,847. The University's policy is to fund pension cost as it is incurred.

Other Benefit Plan - The University also provides an OBU Executive Benefit Plan, covering certain key employees, which provides for benefits payable upon death or termination of employment. This plan is funded in the amount of approximately \$128,865, and the assets are included in the money market account deposited with the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, which is reported as an unrestricted asset. The liability is included in accrued expenses. Total contributions for the year ended July 31, 1996, were \$50,000. The maximum amount that can be accrued for each employee is limited to two years' salary. The University's policy is to fund such cost as it is incurred.

### 12. Postretirement Benefits

Exempt employees who retire after a minimum of fifteen years of service and have reached the age of 55 at the time of retirement are eligible to receive postretirement benefits in the form of medical insurance coverage until they reach the age of 65. Upon reaching age 65, the retiree is eligible to receive a medicare supplement insurance policy for life. Employees who retire after a minimum of fifteen

years of service and have reached age 55 at the time of retirement are eligible to receive postretirement benefits in the form of term life insurance. The University recognizes postretirement benefits on an accrual basis as employees perform services to earn such benefits. The plan is not funded. The University is amortizing the transition obligation resulting from this accounting change over 20 years beginning August 1, 1995.

Postretirement benefit expense for 1995-96 was \$280,378 and includes \$65,361 service cost, \$133,599 interest cost, and \$81,418 amortization of transition obligation.

For measurement purposes, an 11.5% increase in the per capita cost of covered medical care benefits was assumed for 1996. The rate was assumed to decrease to 6% for the year 2007 and remain at that level thereafter. The medical care cost trend rate assumption has a significant effect on the amounts reported. To illustrate, increasing the assumed medical care cost trend by 1% in each year would increase the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation as of July 31, 1996 by \$271,130 and the aggregate of the service and interest cost components of the net periodic postretirement benefit cost for the year then ended by \$42,832.

The discount rate used in determining the accumulated postretirement benefit obligation was 8% for the year ended July 31, 1996.

#### 13. Tulsa Royalties Company

During 1991, the University accepted a gift of the mineral assets of Tulsa Royalties Company, a charitable foundation, as partial payment of a pledge used for the construction of the new School of Business building. Tulsa Royalties Company remains intact as a separate corporation, having directors in common with the University. When control of the board was changed, the informal appraisal of the mineral interests was made at \$1,500,000. The University has used that figure as the cost basis and has used the "sum of the years"

digits" method over an estimated ten year life to record the depletion of the mineral assets. The value of the mineral interests net of accumulated depletion is stated at \$329,545 as part of the long-term investments. The income from Tulsa Royalties is unrestricted. Effective August 1, 1995, the financial statements of Tulsa Royalties Company were combined with the financial statements of the University resulting in an increase in unrestricted net assets of \$477,273.

We have also audited the University's compliance with requirements applicable to major programs and have issued our report thereon dated November 20, 1996.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> (1994 Revision), issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133, "Audits of Institutions of Higher Education and Other Nonprofit Institutions". Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement and whether the University complied with laws and regulations, noncompliance with which would be material to a major program.

The management of The Oklahoma Baptist University is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable. but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and that federal financial assistance programs are managed in compliance with applicable laws and regulations. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors, irregularities or instances of noncompliance may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audits of the financial statements of The Oklahoma Baptist University for the year ended July 31, 1996, we obtained an understanding of the internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they were placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and on its compliance with requirements applicable to major programs and to report on the internal control structure in accordance with OMB Circular A-133. This report addresses our consideration of internal control structure policies and procedures relevant to compliance with requirements applicable to federal awards. We have addressed policies and procedures relevant to our audit of the financial statements in a separate report dated November 20, 1996.

For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal control structure policies and procedures used in administering federal programs in the following categories.

- 1. Cash receipts,
- 2. Cash disbursements,
- 3. Payroll,
- 4. General ledger, and
- 5. Controls used in administering federal programs:
  - a. General requirements: political activity, civil rights, cash management, federal financial reports, allowable costs and cost principles, drug-free workplace and administrative requirements.
  - b. Specific requirements: types of services, reporting, specific grant conditions, and claims for advances and reimbursements, and amounts claimed for reimbursements.

During the year ended July 31, 1996, The Oklahoma Baptist University expended 100% of its total federal awards under major programs.

We performed tests of controls, as required by OMB Circular A-133, to evaluate the effectiveness of the design and operation of internal control structure policies and procedures that we considered relevant to preventing or detecting material noncompliance with specific requirements, general requirements, and requirements governing claims for advances and reimbursements that are applicable to the University's major programs which are identified in the accompanying schedule of federal awards. Our procedures were less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on these internal control structure policies and procedures. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

We noted certain matters involving the internal control structure and its operation that we consider to be reportable conditions under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation

of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the University's ability to administer federal awards programs in accordance with applicable laws and regulations. These reportable conditions are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs.

A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that noncompliance with laws and regulations that would be material to a federal awards program being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be reportable conditions, and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above. However, we believe that none of the reportable conditions described above is a material weakness.

In the discussions of the findings and questioned costs which follows, our consideration of materiality was affected by (1) the compliance requirements, which may or may not be quantifiable in monetary terms, (2) the nature and frequency of noncompliance identified with an appropriate consideration of sampling risk, and (3) qualitative considerations, including the needs and considerations of the U. There are no questioned costs or material findings for the year ended July 31, 1996. Below is the discussion of immaterial findings and recommendations.

#### Cash Management

#### 1. Excess Federal Cash on Hand

#### Statement of Condition

For the period December 7, 1995, through January 18, 1996, the University had excess federal cash on hand.

#### Criteria

Per 34 CFR 668.163(a)(ii) "An institution's request for cash must not exceed the amount of funds the institution needs immediately to make disbursements to students. The institution must make the disbursements as soon as administratively feasible but no later than three business days following the date the institution received those funds." Per 34 CFR 668.166(a) "An institution must return promptly to the Secretary any amount of excess cash in its account."

#### Effect

The University was not in compliance with regulations since it had excess cash on hand for more than three days and did not return the cash to the Secretary.

#### Cause

This was the result of a computational error the University made when preparing the request for funds. The error was found when the Federal Cash Transactions Report was prepared for the month of December, 1995. By the time the error was found, the funds had been expended.

#### Recommendation

This is an isolated incident. It is the University's policy to request funds after they have made the expenditure or credited the students' accounts. Based on the University's procedures, this error would not be expected to be made. In order to avoid this error, we recommend that the University consider having another employee check the computation before the request for funds is made.

#### Reports

#### 1. Federal Cash Transaction Reports - Form 272

#### Statement of Condition

Two Federal Cash Transaction Reports were filed late.

#### Criteria

According to instructions attached to the Forms 272 received from the U. S. Department of Education, the reports are due by the 25th day of the following month.

#### Effect

The U. S. Department of Education temporarily suspended the University's right to draw funds.

#### Cause

The reports were not timely filed.

#### Recommendation

We recommend that the University institute procedures to ensure that the reports are timely filed in the future.

#### RESOLUTION OF PRIOR AUDIT FINDINGS

The following is a summary of the findings for the year ended June 30, 1995, and the corrective actions taken by the University.

#### Student Eligibility

#### Finding

One student with approximately 125 credit hours had a 1.938 cumulative grade point average at the end of the Spring, 1994, semester (less than the required 2.00) and received Title IV financial aid during the 1994-95 academic year. This was considered an isolated incident. Because of the inclusion of the student on the August, 1994 graduation list, there appeared to be no reason to review the student's academic progress.

#### Status

The University now verifies that these students actually graduated.

#### Missing Selective Service System Statement

#### Finding

A student receiving only Federal Family Education Loan Program aid did not have a signed selective service system statement in his file. loan application signed by the student contained all of the required statements except the selective service statement. The selective service statement was overlooked.

#### Status

The University now requires all students who receive any form of federal aid to complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid form. As a result, all such students receive a Student Aid Report which contains the selective service statement and selective service verification code. The student files examined during the current audit contained all of the required statements.

#### Untimely Delivery of Checks to First-Time Freshmen Borrowers

#### Finding

Six first-time freshman borrowers endorsed their Stafford loan checks and the proceeds of those checks were credited to their student accounts before the expiration of the 30-day period after the first day of class.

#### Status

The University now requests that the banks disburse the first loan check for a first-time freshman borrower at the end of the 30-day period. During the current audit we did not find any exceptions.

#### Improper Use of Pro Rata Computation of Refunds

#### Finding

The University was using the pro rata refund computation method for first-time freshman students who received Title IV aid and withdrew during the first 60 percent of any semester in the academic year. The University was not restricting the computation to the semester in which the student was not a first-time student. We recommended that the University use the procedures and forms included in <a href="https://doi.org/10.1001/journal.org/">The Federal Student Financial Aid Handbook</a> (Handbook) to compute refunds and overpayments.

#### Status

The University is using the forms included in the Handbook to compute refunds and overpayments. No refund errors were noted during the current engagement.

#### Computation of Non-Pro Rata Refunds

#### Finding

The University was not computing the non-pro rata refunds using both the institutional method and the Appendix A method and comparing the refunds computed under both methods. We recommended that the University follow the procedures and use the forms included in the Handbook.

#### Status

The University is using the procedures and the forms included in the Handbook to compute refunds and overpayments. No refund errors were noted during the current engagement.

#### Allocation of Refunds

#### Finding

The University was not allocating refunds according to the refund distribution order listed in the Federal Regulations.

#### Status

The University is now following the refund distribution order as outlined in 34 CFR 668.22(g).

### RESOLUTION OF PRIOR FINDINGS OF DOE PROGRAM REVIEW

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The following is a summary of the findings from the U. S. Department of Education's expedited determination letter dated August 2, 1995, for the program review of the Title IV Federal Student Financial Assistance Programs administered by Oklahoma Baptist University.

#### FSEOG Exceptional Need Not Met

#### Finding

The University did not follow the regulatory requirement for awarding Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (FSEOG) first to Federal Pell Grant recipients with exceptional need (lowest expected family contribution (EFC)) and then to non-Federal Pell Grant recipients in order of lowest EFC's.

#### Status

Because the reviewer received acceptable institutional certification from the University, the finding was considered resolved by the U. S. Department of Education. During the current period, the University followed the above regulatory requirements.

#### Unauthorized Retention of Student Credit Balances

#### Finding

The University appeared to have been maintaining credit balances in students' accounts without the students' permission. This is permitted only if the students request in writing that the University maintain the credit balances.

#### Status

Because the reviewer received acceptable institutional certification from the University, the finding was considered resolved by the U. S. Department of Education. The University is now receiving signed authorizations from students permitting the University to maintain the credit balances until the student requests payment in writing.

#### FFEL Exit Counseling Not Documented/Performed

#### Finding

The University did not document/perform the required Federal Family Loan (FFEL) exit counseling for six students.

#### <u>Status</u>

Because the reviewer received acceptable institutional certification from the University, the finding was considered resolved by the U. S. Department of Education. The University is following the federal regulations regarding FFEL exit counseling in a timely manner for students who receive Federal Family Education Loans when the financial aid office becomes aware that the student is withdrawing, graduating, or is otherwise no longer enrolled at the University.
